3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll call the --  
4 this is the second quarterly meeting of the Private  
5 Investigator Licensing Board to order.

6 Let's see. We have a couple of announcements  
7 today. This meeting is being taken down by a reporter.  
8 So it's important. Usually we have it recorded. But  
9 it's important that everybody, when you're going to make  
10 a comment or speak to the record, that do you so after  
11 identifying yourself by name, so that the court reporter  
12 can get the information down. And speak as clearly as  
13 possible and as committed as possible so that she can  
14 not have to go back and try to guess what she's typing.  
15 That would be appreciated. And the recording, or the  
16 communication system sometimes doesn't do its job  
17 perfectly. So bear with her a little bit. And  
18 remember, if you're a fast talker, she's trying to write  
19 down every word you say.

20 Secondly, here in Las Vegas, there's a heating  
21 and air conditioning control issue in the room. So if  
22 it gets cool in one section and hot in another, we  
23 apologize up front. We do have a fan to move some air  
24 over here, but I'm told it's pretty loud and it may  
25 interfere with the communication system. So we'll take

1 a break if it's necessary, and we'll watch for a level,  
2 if we can.

3 I want to make sure that all the cell phones or  
4 communications devices that make noises are quieted or  
5 shut off. We'd appreciate it.

6 And, I think, that's it. That's it. All  
7 right.

8 Okay. The first item on the agenda is the roll  
9 call of the Board members.

10 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.  
11 Board Member Colbert?

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Present.

13 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Collins?

14 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Present.

15 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Flynn?

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Here.

17 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nadeau?

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Here.

19 MR. INGRAM: And Chairman Zane?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Here.

21 Under the public comment section, at the  
22 beginning and at the end of the agendized meeting, the  
23 public is free, and it's totally allowed, and it's  
24 totally acceptable to make a public comment about  
25 matters that you believe to be of general or specific

1 interest to the Board, the industry, the professions,  
2 whatever you think is important. They're limited by  
3 time, not necessarily by subject matter, but they do  
4 need to have something to do with us.

5           So if you're complaining about something with  
6 the dairy board, I think, we'd probably shut you off.  
7 But if it has anything to do with us, we're here ready  
8 to listen and take your comments down on the record and  
9 give it any consideration that we can. But we can't  
10 make any decisions. It could be something that would  
11 need to be agendized for a later meeting, or whatever  
12 the case might be. But before the meeting starts and  
13 after the meeting, or before the meeting adjourns, that  
14 period of comment is open.

15           Additionally, in -- well, let me just read this  
16 so that it's real clear according to the statute:

17           In addition to the public comment taken at the  
18 beginning and the end of the meeting, public comment may  
19 be accepted after each agenda item prior to the Board  
20 taking action. However, prior to the commencement and  
21 conclusion of a contested case or a quasi-judicial  
22 proceeding that may affect the due process rights of an  
23 individual, the Board will not consider public comment  
24 pursuant to NRS 233B.126.

25           Today's agenda includes some of those type of

1 matters. So if we're in a hearing per se with someone  
2 in a due process situation, don't feel offended if we  
3 tell you we're not going to hear what you have to say,  
4 unless we feel it's important to the matter at hand.

5 Any questions about that?

6 Okay. Do we have any public comment at the  
7 beginning of the meeting right now?

8 We have one hand. Could you come forward,  
9 please.

10 If you -- two people. I'm sorry. Go ahead and  
11 have a seat.

12 MR. DALRYMPLE: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And one at a time, please  
14 state your name for the record.

15 MR. DALRYMPLE: My name is Matthew Dalrymple,  
16 spelled D-A-L-R-Y-M-P-L-E.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And before, before  
18 we -- I'm sorry. Before we get going, I'd like to ask  
19 everybody who is going to give comment today or testify  
20 about any matter whatsoever on the agenda today, to  
21 stand, raise your right hand, and be sworn.

22 MS. PALMER: The north as well.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Pardon?

24 MS. PALMER: I just want to make sure that  
25 people in the north were responding as well.



1           Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you  
2 shall give before this Board today shall be the truth,  
3 the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

4           (Applicants and witnesses present were  
5 sworn/affirmed.)

6           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm sorry. Thank you.

7           All right. Go ahead.

8           MR. DALRYMPLE: May I give you these documents?

9           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You can hand them to  
10 legal counsel or to the staff.

11          MR. DALRYMPLE: Thank you.

12          BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

13          MR. DALRYMPLE: Members of the Board, thank you  
14 for hearing this today. As I said, my name is Matt  
15 Dalrymple.

16                 Beginning in the spring of 2015, Scott Young  
17 and I hired Mr. Robert Clymer of Sin City Private  
18 Investigators, who did not fulfill his obligation to us  
19 as clients.

20                 After not having received any findings from him  
21 in more than four months, I submitted my complaint to  
22 the Private Investigator Licensing Board. And five days  
23 after its receipt, Mr. Clymer sent me a link, which I  
24 could never open, to a Dropbox file.

25                 The timing of the complaint is too

1 coincidental. With months of no correspondence, why now  
2 would he submit an enormous amount of cursory  
3 information? I believe that Mr. Clymer of Sin City  
4 Private Investigators, unbeknownst to you all, may have  
5 been informed of the complaint before it would be  
6 properly heard by the Private Investigator Licensing  
7 Board, allowing him the opportunity to supposedly  
8 provide those supposed requested services before any  
9 disciplinary action could have been taken.

10           Mr. Vincent Saladino reviewed my complaint.  
11 And it was determined that my complaint could not be  
12 upheld because there was no contract. According to that  
13 mentality, Mr. Clymer had no authorization to perform  
14 services and, therefore, cannot bill me for services  
15 that were not itemized in a contract.

16           Further, in the absence of a contract, or  
17 excuse me, if the absence of a contract renders the  
18 consumer or provider helpless in defending themselves in  
19 such cases, I believe it should be a Private  
20 Investigator Licensing Board requirement that no private  
21 investigator shall enter into employment by a consumer  
22 without a standardized contract.

23           Let's look at another scenario. There was  
24 indeed a contract. According to May vs. Anderson in  
25 2005, basic contract principles require, for an

1 enforceable contract, any offer and acceptance, meeting  
2 of the minds, and consideration. All three requirements  
3 were proven within my complaint packet, that Mr. Clymer  
4 provided a list of services of Sin City Private  
5 Investigators that they offer.

6           The services turnaround time is also included  
7 on this document, with the longest wait time of only a  
8 few days. And as I said earlier, it was more than four  
9 months before we received any communication or any  
10 information that was promised on that document.

11           His obligation to render services within the  
12 timeframe promised was not fulfilled, placing him in  
13 breach of that contract. And, therefore, the funds I  
14 have contested, I feel, are due back to me.

15           The document that you are holding is a letter  
16 from the attorney that Mr. Clymer has used as the  
17 backbone for performing unauthorized searches.  
18 Mr. Clymer claims that Kevin Hanratty, Esquire, required  
19 him to perform services, but this never happened. The  
20 letter you hold is a statement from the attorney  
21 clarifying this, that he never instructed, nor did he  
22 require Mr. Clymer to perform any services.

23           Robert Clymer of Sin City Private Investigators  
24 should be required to refund me the amount specified  
25 within my complaint packet. And I hope the Board will

1 consider disciplinary action to prevent what I feel has  
2 been exploitation and fraud.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 MR. DALRYMPLE: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you, sir, do you have  
6 anything to add?

7 MR. YOUNG: My simple --

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You need to identify  
9 yourself.

10 MR. YOUNG: My name is Scott Young. My last  
11 name is spelled Y-O-U-N-G.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

13 MR. YOUNG: I've been involved with this, my  
14 entire situation on it. And I believe that it has been  
15 hit with us multiple times stating that we need to have  
16 a contract, when you hire an individual out-of-state,  
17 who is a retired FBI agent, and you go with his  
18 integrity and honesty, and so forth, that is stated in  
19 the statutes that describe a private investigator. Not  
20 one time were we offered a contract. And we thought the  
21 price listing that he had on his website was the  
22 contract.

23 And I feel that maybe there needs to be a far  
24 better definition for the commission to consider, a  
25 contract, because it hasn't helped us at all. And we --

1 when you're out-of-state, each state works differently,  
2 and each state has its own way of doing things.

3 And we feel victimized on this completely. And  
4 I just feel like it's something that is something that  
5 the commission could actually consider changing and  
6 require private investigators to have a simple contract,  
7 nothing, you know, grand, grandiose or anything, but  
8 something that would protect the investigator and the  
9 victim in this case.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Thank you  
11 very much.

12 MR. YOUNG: Thank you.

13 MR. DALRYMPLE: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Appreciate it.

15 Is there anybody else who would like to make  
16 public comment in the south?

17 Nobody. Anybody in the north?

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, no one's stepping up.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

20 The next item on the agenda is review current  
21 financial report.

22 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

23 I've provided the financial report to the Board  
24 members prior to the meeting. If there's any questions,  
25 I'd be happy to try to answer those for you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have none.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I have a real  
3 quick question.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please, sir.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you. Thank you,  
6 Mr. Chair.

7 Help me, help me understand what work program  
8 is. I should know all this, and I know I've been  
9 looking at these forever. But I was just trying to  
10 figure out, what the actual -- what's work program? Is  
11 that the -- that's the state's column that identifies  
12 what the budget item is, correct, or what the expenses  
13 are?

14 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Nadeau, Kevin Ingram, for the  
15 record. Our agency, our agency, by being a self-funded  
16 agency and not going before the Legislature to ask for  
17 money, we have to have a way to establish a budget. So  
18 in a self-funded agency that doesn't have an executive  
19 line item budget, we go through the process of a work  
20 program. Other state agencies may have work programs  
21 for like their grant funding and situations like that.

22 So this is, as a work program, our budget for  
23 the year. However, one work program is not done for the  
24 entire year. There are actually about four or five work  
25 programs that I submit in a calendar year, or a fiscal

1 year. And the reason I do that is, as revenues increase  
2 over and above the projections, I have to do a work  
3 program to give ourself authority to receive those extra  
4 fees that come in.

5 On the other side, if the revenues are less  
6 than what was originally projected, I would have to do a  
7 work program to decrease revenue authority to be able to  
8 balance our budget at the end of the year.

9 So our budget is much like that of an  
10 independent corporation, where we have a bank account  
11 set up through the Treasurer's Office with the state.  
12 But as those monies come in, I can shift monies from one  
13 category to another to pick up expenditures that may  
14 increase over the year. An example would be, if we have  
15 some type of a contested case going on, or a potential  
16 lawsuit, I may have to shift monies from a reserve that  
17 we have established, and I may have to shift that into  
18 the litigation expenses to cover those expenses.

19 So it is our budget for the Board. And it's  
20 our way of being able to take in revenue and pay our  
21 expenditures.

22 Does that answer your question, sir?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, no, that explains  
24 the different obligations and that.

25 So just, for a while there, the fingerprint

1 fees, and that, were costing more than what were  
2 actually coming in. Has that been, has that been kind  
3 of evened out?

4 MR. INGRAM: It has evened out a little bit.  
5 The DPS lowered the rates the end of last year. So  
6 that's helped us out a little bit, on that the  
7 fingerprint fees. That's now 38.25 as opposed to the  
8 40.

9 There are the Nevada Administrative Code  
10 changes that we've discussed that are in final format to  
11 go to the LCB, the Legislative Counsel Bureau, for them  
12 to set up for hearing, where we are going to have to  
13 adjust some of the fees for registration work cards, to  
14 increase the amount to compensate the shortfalls in the  
15 fingerprint category. However, it has leveled out a  
16 little bit right now.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.  
18 I appreciate the opportunity.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

20 Any other questions on item number three?

21 Number four, review and approve minutes from  
22 March 2nd Board meeting.

23 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, those were actually  
24 transcripts and, again, have been provided to the Board  
25 prior to the meeting, for review and approval.



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any discussion or a  
2 motion?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Move to approve.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second to  
6 approve. Any Board discussion?

7 Hearing none, I'll take a vote on the motion.  
8 Say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
11 Motion carries. Thank you.

12 We already dispensed with item number five  
13 earlier. So we will go on with item number six.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman?

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Would you consider a  
17 block vote?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman, I would  
20 move that items six, seven, eight, nine and 10 be voted  
21 on in a block vote. And I would move that -- move  
22 for -- that they be approved, subject to all statutory  
23 and regulatory requirements.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Is  
25 there a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any  
3 Board discussion?

4 Any public discussion?

5 What's happening here is there's a motion on  
6 the floor to take these items, that are specified by  
7 number, and approve them all at one time. So that's  
8 what's just about ready to occur by vote, or not.

9 Any Board questions?

10 Let's vote on the motion. All in favor, say  
11 "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

14 Motion carries. Six, seven, eight, nine, 10  
15 are dispensed with, with approval. So if you're here  
16 for that, you're welcome to stick around and work with  
17 government all day. If not, thanks for coming.

18 Item number 11, change of license status,  
19 corporate name change, qualifying agent. Number 11 is  
20 Event Control Team, Inc., license number 1944B, who is  
21 requesting a corporate name change to EC Team Services.  
22 Robert E. Semaan.

23 Mr. Semaan here?

24 He's not here in the south. How about in the  
25 north?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. The Board's  
3 approval, can we trail this to the end?

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If you would accept a  
7 motion, I'd move to approve Event Control Team,  
8 Incorporated, license number 1944B, that the corporate  
9 name changes to EC Team Services, Incorporated,  
10 Robert E. Semaan to remain as qualifying agent, subject  
11 to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Is  
13 there a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any  
16 public comment regarding item number 11 and the motion?

17 Any Board comment regarding item number 11 and  
18 the motion?

19 All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

22 Motion carries.

23 Number 12, Trident Research Group, LLC, dba  
24 Trident, Trident Research, is applying for a new  
25 corporate private investigator license, Tracy J.

1 Rowland, who's applying for an individual license, and  
2 so that she can put it into abeyance and become the  
3 qualifying agent for the LLC.

4 Is Tracy Rowland here?

5 MR. ROWLAND: Present.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please come forward, have  
7 a chair. You were sworn, correct?

8 MR. ROWLAND: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. If you can  
10 tell us a little bit about yourself and what you'd like  
11 to do here in Nevada.

12 MR. ROWLAND: Yes. Tracy J. Rowland,  
13 R-O-W-L-A-N-D. I applied for the private investigator's  
14 license to work in the valley specifically. This would  
15 be 25 years, recently retired on the 18th of May. So  
16 looking to get into specifically investigations.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Retired from  
18 where?

19 MR. ROWLAND: Las Vegas Metro.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have the  
21 information, but the public doesn't have some of it, so  
22 we're just trying to make sure that no scoundrel is  
23 sneaking in here.

24 Are there any Board -- or I'm sorry. Is there  
25 any public comment or questions regarding the applicant,

1 any in the south?

2 Nothing in the south. How about in the north?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No comment in the north.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Nothing there.

5 Thank you, sir.

6 Are there any Board questions regarding the  
7 applicant, the application?

8 Not hearing any, anybody have a motion?

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that  
10 Trident Research Group, LLC, doing business as Trident  
11 Research, be granted a new corporate private  
12 investigator license, that Tracy J. Rowland, who is  
13 applying as -- for an individual private investigator's  
14 license, that that also be approved and placed into  
15 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.  
16 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
17 requirements.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion. And we have a  
20 motion and a second. Any Board comment on the motion?

21 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed to the  
24 motion, say "no."

25 Hearing none, congratulations.

1 MR. ROWLAND: Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

3 Marian Wilcox Corporation.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: She's up here, Mr. Chair.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 You're Cary Redwine?

7 MS. REDWINE: Yes, I am.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Can you tell  
9 us a little bit about where you've been and where you're  
10 going, what you're doing?

11 MS. REDWINE: Sure. I have a small research  
12 firm, and all we do is, that we specialize in is probate  
13 research, meaning we resolve heirship issues. And we've  
14 been doing it, well, I personally have been doing it for  
15 33 years. And our company has been in existence for  
16 over 30 years.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you said your  
18 specialty or your primary focus is in probate research?

19 MS. REDWINE: That's right. That's correct.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any  
21 public comment or question regarding the applicant or  
22 the application?

23 Don't see any. Any Board comment or questions  
24 regarding the application?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just real quick.

1 Ms. Redman -- or Redwine. Excuse me.

2 MS. REDWINE: That's okay.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You've been in Oregon,  
4 and now you're moving your office to Reno, or to Nevada?

5 MS. REDWINE: Well, I have like a satellite  
6 office here.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

8 MS. REDWINE: So most of our business will  
9 still be -- well, I work in several states.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

11 MS. REDWINE: So I am licensed in Florida. I  
12 work out of Illinois, Washington and Colorado.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Very good. Thank you,  
14 Mr. Chair.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 Do we have a motion?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that  
18 Marion Wilcox Corporation be granted a new corporate  
19 private investigator license, Cary S. Redwine be granted  
20 an individual private investigator license, and that it  
21 be placed in abeyance so that she may become the  
22 qualifying agent for Marion Wilcox Corporation. The  
23 corporate officer to be approved is Cary S. Redwine.  
24 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
25 requirements.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a  
3 second. Any Board comment or questions on the motion?

4 All in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Hearing none, congratulations.

8 MS. REDWINE: Thank you very much.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a good day.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

11 Number 14. Right?

12 MR. INGRAM: Number 14, yes. I got off by one.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Kenneth W. Hardy,  
14 who's applying for a private investigator license.

15 Good morning.

16 MR. HARDY: Good morning.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. Can you  
18 tell us a little bit about yourself and your hopes for  
19 licensure and successful business?

20 MR. HARDY: My name's Kenneth Hardy, H-A-R-D-Y.  
21 I'm born and raised here in Las Vegas, Nevada. Three  
22 months after high school, I was hired on with the  
23 Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. I did a  
24 26-year career with Metro, with 20 years of it being in  
25 investigations. Excuse me. And the last 16 years of my



1 career I was in the homicide section there.

2 After that, I retired after 26 years. I went  
3 on working under another private investigator's license  
4 as a registered employee and then went on to be the  
5 director of security for the Siegal Group that is here  
6 in Las Vegas and now am a senior investigator with  
7 U.S. Bank.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public  
9 comment or questions?

10 Hearing none, any Board comment or questions?

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, Mr. Chair.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a question, as you  
13 might imagine, with regard to the -- some of the  
14 historic financial difficulties.

15 MR. HARDY: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What was the percipient,  
17 or is there more than one?

18 MR. HARDY: Well, no, there's only one. I had  
19 a -- I went through -- I retired June 16th of 2011.  
20 Four days later, I started -- my ex-wife now filed for  
21 divorce. And all of those debts were in my name only.  
22 We're still in the process of getting those settled  
23 through family court. But it was where I went from a  
24 third of my income from when I was working, to retired,  
25 to being divorced, to having to give up 40 percent of my

1 retirement to my ex-wife, which is why I'm currently  
2 working and currently looking to obtain more -- (cell  
3 phone noise). Sorry about that.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's okay.

5 MR. HARDY: More income. But the only reason  
6 for that is the -- all the financial problems that I've  
7 had is as a direct result from the divorce.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Now, is it your  
9 impression that you've gotten pretty much everything  
10 under control, and you're walking toward a positive  
11 resolution?

12 MR. HARDY: I am.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do you feel that  
14 the handling of -- well, clearly, you're working for  
15 U.S. Bank, so they've taken a look and adjudged you to  
16 be proper to be looking at financial information.

17 MR. HARDY: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But from the perspective  
19 of your own, your own belief, are you in a position to  
20 financially keep control of your finances and make a  
21 business in the state?

22 MR. HARDY: Yes, I am. And, and I have been.  
23 Like I say, I've been going through this for three years  
24 now.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

1 MR. HARDY: And so I do believe I would, that  
2 I'm financially able to. My ethics are high. My morals  
3 are high. There's no reason that I would do anything.  
4 And my record has proven that.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 Are there any other Board comments, questions?

7 If not, I'll entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I ask that we  
9 approve Kenneth W. Hardy for his individual private  
10 investigator's license and this be subject to all  
11 statutory and regulatory requirements.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second? We've got a  
14 motion and a second. Any Board comment on the motion?

15 All in favor, say "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
18 Hearing none, congratulations. Good luck.

19 MR. HARDY: Thank you. And I'd also like to  
20 thank Investigator Batchelor and Ms. Corral for their  
21 professionalism during this whole time.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you very much.

23 MR. HARDY: Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item 15, right?

25 MS. BAKKE: Yes.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Leslie R. Bakke ("Bak"),  
2 ("Bak-ee"). Oh, I tried.

3 MS. BAKKE: Bakke (Bok-ee").

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Bakke ("Bok-ee"). Ah.  
5 Thank you. Have a seat, please. Either one of those.

6 I'm just finding you here. Just give me a  
7 second.

8 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, I have to apologize  
9 to the Board. I've noticed that the numbering is off by  
10 one. So my apologies for that.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Leslie Bakke. Can  
12 you tell us a little bit about yourself?

13 MS. BAKKE: I've been in the investigation  
14 business for very near to 30 years, initially as an  
15 investigator for insurance companies and then in the  
16 publishing world where I edited and did much of the  
17 writing for a magazine that serviced the  
18 investigative -- investigators from all different  
19 realms, both insurance and financial, for -- up till  
20 current. And I also started a -- it's  
21 FightFraudAmerica.com, which is a victim advocacy, to  
22 help people. And I continue in that. That's,  
23 basically, what I still do now.

24 And I have done much speaking, much teaching of  
25 investigators from all realms and the public, over the

1 years, I would estimate probably close to a thousand, if  
2 not more.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Is  
4 there any public comment or question regarding the  
5 applicant or the application?

6 Any Board comment or questions regarding the  
7 application?

8 Entertain a motion, please.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that  
10 Leslie R. Bakke be granted an individual private  
11 investigator license, subject to all statutory and  
12 regulatory requirements.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion and a  
15 second. Any Board comment on the motion?

16 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

19 Hearing none, congratulations.

20 MS. BAKKE: Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 The next item on the agenda is Flashpoint, LLC.  
23 Brock W. Rice.

24 Come forward, please.

25 MR. RICE: Hi.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

2 MR. RICE: Good morning.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you?

4 MR. RICE: Good. How are you?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Not too bad. Can you  
6 tell us a little bit about yourself?

7 MR. RICE: Yes. My name is Brock Rice. And  
8 I've spent 10 years on active duty as a combat  
9 controller. I've gone for seven deployments over to  
10 Afghanistan and Iraq. Got out about five years ago. I  
11 currently train our military drones, the pilots, on the  
12 latest surveillance techniques.

13 And I am applying for my private patrolman  
14 license in order to continue to train people on the safe  
15 use, the safe use of handguns, carbine pistols, I'm  
16 sorry, carbine rifles, and provide security at events  
17 and transportation security.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

19 Any public comment or question regarding the  
20 applicant or the application?

21 Any Board comment regarding the application?

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes. Just I missed  
23 something. I understand what you're currently doing.  
24 If you have this license, this will be a completely  
25 separate business than your teaching drone surveillance;

1 is that correct?

2 MR. RICE: So, basically, what I do currently  
3 is I'm on call. I work with a small company. And we  
4 teach surveillance techniques and munition deployment  
5 for the drones. But this will be a separate business,  
6 aside from that completely.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. And  
8 thank you for your service to our country.

9 MR. RICE: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board  
11 questions?

12 I'll entertain a motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that  
14 Flashpoint, LLC be granted a new corporate private  
15 patrolman license, that Brock W. Rice is also applying  
16 for a private patrolman license, and that it be held in  
17 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent,  
18 that this is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
19 requirements.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Do I  
21 have a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I didn't see who.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Colbert. Okay.

1 Mr. Colbert seconds. All right. Any Board question on  
2 the motion?

3 All in favor, say "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 Any opposed, say "no."

6 Congratulations.

7 MR. RICE: Thank you. And I'd like to thank  
8 Gisela for all of her guidance.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. We appreciate  
10 it.

11 All right. Southwest Protection Agency, L.L.C.  
12 We're looking for maybe John T. Davis.

13 MR. DAVIS: Here.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you both introduce  
15 yourself.

16 MR. CONTI: My name is Michael Conti, last name  
17 spelled C-O-N-T-I.

18 MR. BAKKE: And I am John Davis, common  
19 spelling.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Sorry for not  
21 acknowledging you, Mr. Conti. I skipped down on the  
22 item.

23 MR. CONTI: Of course.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Anybody  
25 speaking in turn?



1 MR. CONTI: Yes. I would like to say that,  
2 first of all, I'm honored to be here today. Thank you  
3 for your time, for your patience. I'd first like to  
4 thank Mr. Batchelor and Ms. Corral for their time and  
5 patience with us as a new company, here today to apply  
6 for or to speak on behalf of our private patrolman  
7 license.

8 We are a new company. Myself, I have over five  
9 years experience in private patrolman supervising,  
10 training officers in the field. I am a graduate of the  
11 University of Nevada, Las Vegas, UNLV, with a bachelor's  
12 degree in criminal justice.

13 My colleague here is also -- John Davis has  
14 worked in security for a number of years. And he will  
15 be involved mostly in our operations and supervising,  
16 monitoring our offices in the field, if we are granted a  
17 license here today.

18 I'd like to say that we are looking forward to  
19 a diverse portfolio. We'd like to be involved in a  
20 number of different operations. Mostly HOA facilities  
21 we'd like to do, mostly involved in residential  
22 communities. We would like to work heavily in our  
23 community with a lot of our local organizations,  
24 volunteer time as well, to allow people to come to us  
25 and to, basically -- for two things, to bring jobs back

1 to the community, to hire those who are qualified,  
2 deserving of jobs, and who want to come to us and to  
3 learn and to grow. Whether they stay with the  
4 organization or not, we want them to develop as  
5 individuals and grow each and every day.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

7 Do you have anything to add, Mr. Davis?

8 MR. DAVIS: No, that was pretty good.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

10 Is there any public comment regarding the  
11 applicant or the application?

12 Is there any Board comment regarding the  
13 applicant or the application?

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Just one comment to  
15 Mr. Conti. I was pretty impressed that you got  
16 Monsignor Greg to do a reference letter. Please tell  
17 him I said hi.

18 MR. CONTI: That would be my --

19 MR. DAVIS: That was for me.

20 MR. CONTI: That would be my partner, John  
21 Davis, the reference.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

23 MR. DAVIS: But Monsignor Greg loves him.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other comment  
25 or questions?

1 Hear a motion?

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move  
3 that --

4 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'll --

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: -- Southwest Protective  
6 Agency, L.L.C. be approved for a new corporate private  
7 patrolman license, and that Michael W. Conti, who is  
8 applying for his individual private patrolman license,  
9 be approved, and that his individual license be placed  
10 into abeyance so that he can become the qualifying  
11 agent. And member to be approved as John T. Davis. And  
12 this is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
13 requirements.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a  
16 second. Any Board comment on the motion?

17 All in favor, say "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
20 Congratulations.

21 MR. CONTI: Thanks so much. Thank you,  
22 Mr. Chairman. Thank you, Board.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Next is Command Security  
24 Corporation. Kyle Todd and Nicholas Brost or Craig P.  
25 Coy. Anybody of that name here?

1           Okay. Tell me your name.

2           MR. TODD: My name is Kyle Todd.

3           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Kyle. And tell us what  
4 you're hoping to do.

5           MR. TODD: I'm currently the district manager  
6 for the southwest region of Command Security  
7 Corporation. And we are applying for a license in the  
8 state of Nevada in order to better align ourselves with  
9 our customers on multiregional and national accounts.  
10 So as those companies grow, we need to be able to expand  
11 and obtain licenses into those areas that those  
12 companies are currently doing business.

13           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any  
14 public comment or question regarding the applicant or  
15 the application?

16           Any Board comment?

17           Where else are you licensed?

18           MR. TODD: As a company, we are in about 20  
19 states or so.

20           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 20?

21           MR. TODD: Yeah.

22           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. That's all I had.

23           BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that  
24 Command Security Corporation be granted a new corporate  
25 private patrol license, Kyle M. Todd be granted his

1 individual private patrol license, and that his  
2 individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may  
3 become the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be  
4 approved are Nicholas P. Brost and Craig P. Coy.

5 Subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a  
8 second. Any Board comment on the motion?

9 All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
12 Congratulations.

13 MR. TODD: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Saveh Security Network.  
15 "Saw-VEH"? "Suh-VAY"?

16 MR. WALDEN: "Suh-VAY."

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Suh-VAY." Thank you.

18 MR. WALDEN: You're welcome.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You are William Walden or  
20 Michael Davis?

21 MR. WALDEN: I am William Walden, last name  
22 spelling W-A-L-D-E-N.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Can you give  
24 us a little background and tell us what you're hoping to  
25 do?

1 MR. WALDEN: I've been in the security field  
2 for a while with hotels and casinos here in Las Vegas,  
3 also with another small upstart security company here in  
4 Vegas also.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 MR. WALDEN: What we're hoping to do is do  
7 private events, private events security. Also, and my  
8 partner is qualifying for the process server license,  
9 which he has just turned in his application.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are there any public  
11 questions or comments regarding the applicant or the  
12 application?

13 Any Board comment or questions?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, Mr. Chair. Just  
15 for --

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- Investigator Woodruff.  
18 I just wanted to clarify on the hours. I was reading in  
19 your report the -- you were able to verify hours, and  
20 that, as far as that they exceeded 10,000?

21 MR. WOODRUFF: Yes, Board Member Flynn. I was  
22 able to verify from those hours.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Because there was  
24 a question as far as working two jobs on that.

25 MR. WOODRUFF: Right. Correct. And we did not

1 give him the entire amount of time that he had  
2 qualifications for, but as a reduced amount, thinking  
3 that he was not going to be able to work full-time in  
4 two different positions continually. So we brought that  
5 down and cut those numbers in half. With that reduction  
6 in those hours, he still managed to have more than the  
7 10,000 required.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Great. Thank you. Thank  
9 you very. I appreciate that.

10 And then, for the applicant, just a  
11 clarification on the financial issues.

12 MR. WALDEN: Yes. The bankruptcy was through a  
13 divorce of almost 12 years. And I am fully recovered  
14 from all of that.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board  
17 questions, comments?

18 Do we have a motion?

19 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have a motion,  
20 Mr. Chairman.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

22 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: That Saveh Security  
23 Network, LLC be granted a new private patrolman's  
24 license. That William C. Walden is applying for an  
25 individual private patrolman license and hopes that is

1 granted as well. If approved, he is requesting that his  
2 individual license be put into abeyance so that he may  
3 become the qualifying agent. Members to be approved are  
4 William C. Walden and Michael A. Davis. This is subject  
5 to all statutory and regulatory requirements. For  
6 possible action.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. There's a motion.  
8 Do we have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second. Any Board  
11 comment on the motion?

12 All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
15 Congratulations.

16 MR. WALDEN: Thank you very much. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We've got a little bit of  
18 feedback when we're speaking up here, backfeeding. So  
19 it might be distracting for a minute. Can you guys hear  
20 all right down in the north?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, ma'am.

23 (The Reporter requested to those furthest from  
24 the microphone in Las Vegas that they speak loudly and  
25 clearly. The microphone in Las Vegas was repositioned.)



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And now Mr. Ingram and  
2 our legal counsel will be the one you can't hear.

3 THE REPORTER: Well, I can hear you okay. So,  
4 hopefully.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 All right. Well, I lost my space here. We're  
7 at Warren Security Services, LLC. And Barbara  
8 Wiedenhoft?

9 MS. WIEDENHOFT: Yes.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you today?

11 MS. WIEDENHOFT: I'm fine. How are you?

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Not too bad. Your name's  
13 spelled correctly on the agenda, W-I-E-D-E-N-H-O-F-T?

14 MS. WIEDENHOFT: That's right.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us a  
16 little bit about yourself and what you plan to do?

17 MS. WIEDENHOFT: How I got started on going  
18 into Nevada -- I'm already in Arizona and California --  
19 is that there was a procurement meeting at the Mojave  
20 Community College, and they had different personnel from  
21 different places come in. And the lady from Clark  
22 County put a bug in my ear and says, "You know, we'd  
23 like all kinds of different professions from Bullhead  
24 area to help us over in Laughlin, because it's too hard  
25 to administer from the companies that are out of Vegas.

1 And they're not getting the service that they need for  
2 that community."

3 So I started on that. And then I got to  
4 looking into solar plants. We've already done, on the  
5 construction phase, we've done several solar plants.  
6 And I know Nevada is doing solar plants, too, so.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any  
8 public comment or questions regarding the applicant or  
9 the application?

10 Any Board comment or questions?

11 Entertain a motion.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that  
13 Warren Security Services, LLC be granted a new corporate  
14 private patrol license, that Barbara E. Wiedenhoft be  
15 granted an individual private patrol license, and that  
16 that license be placed in abeyance so that she may  
17 become the qualifying agent for Warren Security  
18 Services, LLC. Member to be approved is Barbara E.  
19 Wiedenhoft. And this is subject to all statutory and  
20 regulatory requirements.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is  
22 there a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second. Okay. Any Board  
25 questions or comments regarding the motion?

1 All in favor, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

4 Hearing none, congratulations.

5 MS. WIEDENHOFT: Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 And next up is Security Tech Protective

8 Services. Krist Gukasi ("Goo-GAS-ee")?

9 MR. GUKASI: "Goo-GAUS-ee."

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Goo-GAUS-ee"? Thank  
11 you. Is the last name spelled, or both names spelled  
12 correctly on the agenda?

13 MR. GUKASI: Yes, it is.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Can you tell  
15 us a little bit about yourself?

16 MR. GUKASI: I'm currently the owner of  
17 Security Tech Protective in both northern and southern  
18 California. I started in security in 2001. And in  
19 2011, I started my own company, which recently became  
20 corporation. And now I want to extend to state of  
21 Nevada and protect the community and bring more jobs for  
22 people.

23 And prior to my opening company, I have  
24 operational management and experience in supervision and  
25 human resources stuff, too.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any public comment  
2 or questions regarding the applicant or the application?

3 Any Board comment or questions?

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I've got a couple  
5 questions, Mr. Chair.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: For the applicant, could  
8 you speak on behalf of your financial problems,  
9 specifically the amount of money you owe Sprint.

10 MR. GUKASI: Actually, I have an Lexington  
11 offer, and they're working on it for me. They're  
12 actually working on my credit right now, and they are  
13 going to be making arrangements and stuff so I could get  
14 that taken care of.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. That didn't answer.  
16 I'm curious how you got to that situation. How did you  
17 get into such financial trouble?

18 MR. GUKASI: Basically, all the financial  
19 trouble came from, just from my clients' part, since,  
20 you know, that I wasn't being paid on time, all the  
21 invoices that were being sent. So now, with the turning  
22 and stuff means getting back on my feet and stuff,  
23 getting back on the financial and stuff.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And then another  
25 question related to your criminal record. I see that

1 you were arrested a couple times for driving on a  
2 suspended license. Why was your license suspended in  
3 the first place?

4 MR. GUKASI: That was in 2000, between 2000,  
5 2004. It was for not having my fines paid on time. So  
6 they suspended my license for that. And then I have  
7 been, I was arrested for driving under suspended  
8 license, too, which all was cleared out already at that  
9 time.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comments  
12 or questions?

13 I've got a couple. Well, what -- how many  
14 employees, or how many people do you employ under your  
15 license with the Bureau of Security and Investigative  
16 Services?

17 MR. GUKASI: Currently, I'm down to four.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Four?

19 MR. GUKASI: Yeah.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

21 MR. GUKASI: Because I actually gave up about  
22 eight contracts for not being paid, and the just the  
23 service, they went with another company and stuff. So,  
24 currently, I'm down to four in California.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: At the height of what you

1 would consider your success, how many people did you  
2 employ there?

3 MR. GUKASI: In the past, I had from 15 to 25.  
4 And just managing and operational management, I've done  
5 about 30 employees in the past.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what process do you  
7 have in place to handle your accounting in the business;  
8 do you do it yourself, do you have a bookkeeper that's  
9 paid?

10 MR. GUKASI: I have a bookkeeper. And then  
11 paychecks is one of my resources in state of California.  
12 They do my payroll and stuff.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So a third party --

14 MR. GUKASI: Yes.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- administers the  
16 payroll?

17 MR. GUKASI: Third party.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board  
19 questions, comments?

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, Mr. Chair, I have  
21 one.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: The Sprint account, when  
24 did that go into arrears, how long has that been  
25 pending?

1 MR. GUKASI: About two, I think, it's at two  
2 years now. But I just never knew that in my credit.  
3 Because what happened is actually, when I've got, say,  
4 the early contract termination, they charged me the fees  
5 on it. So I wasn't even aware of that one. And that's  
6 what brought my invoice to 2,000 or more; I believe, it  
7 was like 2,000 something. And it's almost two years; I  
8 believe, it's two years.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: So have you been paying  
10 this down, or what -- how high did it get at one point?

11 MR. GUKASI: Well, the regular payment was  
12 about -- it was a business account. It was three,  
13 around 300. But the most now, which I know it's about  
14 2,000 or 2,200, I think.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Thank you.

16 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Let me ask a question  
17 on that particular incident. Was there multiple lines  
18 on the phone, or was it --

19 MR. GUKASI: Yeah, I had about four; I believe,  
20 it was like five lines, four lines, five lines.

21 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay.

22 MR. GUKASI: So it's all the determination,  
23 they charged me on it.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

25 Any motion?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we  
2 deny this application at this present time. The  
3 applicant can come back to us when his financial  
4 situation is better.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So the motion would be  
6 predicated upon the negative financial situation?

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 That's a motion. Do we have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Move and second. Any  
12 Board comment on the motion?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I don't know that I can  
16 support the motion. I think, the financial, obviously,  
17 the financial obligations are reflective of, you know,  
18 his business practices maybe. But he indicated that  
19 payroll and -- is being handled by a third party. He  
20 has an accountant or a bookkeeper that's doing the work.  
21 For less than -- I think, we're looking at less than  
22 \$5,000 of financial responsibility here, that I just, I  
23 can't support that motion. I mean we do have a  
24 responsibility to his customers or anyone that would  
25 utilize his services. But I just can't support the



1 motion.

2 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 Any other Board comment or question regarding  
5 the motion?

6 Call for a vote on the motion. All in favor of  
7 the motion, say "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed, say "no."

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No.

12 The motion carries three to two. Your license  
13 application has been denied.

14 MR. GUKASI: All right. Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 The next item is Jody McIntyre, who's applying  
17 for a private patrolman's license.

18 Good morning.

19 MR. MCINTYRE: Good morning, Chairman, Board  
20 members, staff. I'm Jody McIntyre, recently moved here  
21 from San Diego, California. I'm just retired from the  
22 military, 28 years of service in Navy special warfare.  
23 I'm currently getting employed with Pinkerton Security  
24 here in Las Vegas.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for your

1 service.

2 MR. MCINTYRE: Thank you, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And anybody from the  
4 public got a comment or question regarding the applicant  
5 or the application?

6 What are you thinking about doing?

7 MR. MCINTYRE: So I'm operations manager here  
8 for Pinkerton Security, for Las Vegas and Reno.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. If you said that,  
10 I'm sorry.

11 MR. MCINTYRE: That's okay. Don't worry, sir.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board questions  
13 regarding the applicant?

14 No. I'd entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that  
16 Jody L. McIntyre be granted an individual private patrol  
17 license, subject to all statutory and regulatory  
18 requirements.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Got a motion and a  
21 second. Any Board questions regarding the motion?

22 All in favor, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
25 Congratulations.

1 MR. MCINTYRE: Thank you. Appreciate it.

2 Thank you, guys. Thanks.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: For those of you left in  
4 the audience that wonder, why are we here, the reason  
5 that you're here is to give anybody who has a comment or  
6 a question the opportunity to voice it. And it could be  
7 that most of these applicants have been fully vetted,  
8 they've been fully investigated. We have our questions,  
9 and they have a right to be vetted in the public.

10 So, you know, there occasionally is somebody  
11 that knows something that we don't about a person,  
12 particular person that's up here being considered for  
13 licensure. So that's why we expect them to show up and  
14 talk to us and hold themselves out to be accountable to  
15 everybody who can pick up an agenda and read their name  
16 and be here.

17 So it's not as if this is a foregone  
18 conclusion. It's that we want to know what other people  
19 know, especially if it's negative. You know, we don't  
20 have time, effort or energy to listen to all the  
21 positive accolades about applicants. But we for sure,  
22 when they're here being considered, want to hear if  
23 somebody knows something bad about them. Because we  
24 don't want something bad purposely being allowed a  
25 license to do those type of things that could subject

1 the public to safety issues.

2 So, anyway, don't believe that what you have to  
3 say won't be heard and considered. Because it will.

4 Okay.

5 I just say that now so I don't have to answer  
6 to 10 other people at the end of the meeting on what was  
7 this all about, and why did I come?

8 Okay. Frank W. DiCerbo. Did I get you?

9 MR. DICERBO: You certainly did.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. You are  
11 applying for a private patrolman license.

12 MR. DICERBO: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us a little  
14 bit about yourself?

15 MR. DICERBO: Sure. I was born in 19 -- I'm a  
16 former Atlantic City police officer, former detective  
17 with the police department, former crime prevention  
18 commander. Left the police department, joined gaming,  
19 was the director of security at the Tropicana here in  
20 Las Vegas, was working for Templar Security & Protective  
21 Services. And now I want to start my own boutique  
22 business.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

24 MR. DICERBO: You're welcome.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment or

1 questions regarding the applicant or the application?

2 Any Board comment or questions?

3 Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mr. Chairman, I make a  
5 motion that Frank W. DiCerbo be granted his license for  
6 individual private patrolman, and subject to all  
7 statutory and regulatory requirements.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Do we have a  
9 second?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any  
12 Board comment or questions on the motion?

13 All in favor, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
16 Congratulations.

17 MR. DICERBO: Thank you very much.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Next item is Cynthia S.  
19 Haddox-Brumley, for a process server license.

20 Good morning.

21 MS. HADDOX-BRUMLEY: Good morning.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sorry about that.

23 MS. HADDOX-BRUMLEY: That's okay.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us a little  
25 bit about where you've been and where you're going?

1 MS. HADDOX-BRUMLEY: I started working as an  
2 investigator, process server in Denver, Colorado. My  
3 husband was relocated to Las Vegas. And I applied for a  
4 position with Elite Investigations. And I have been  
5 there since 2006. My desire to go forward with a  
6 process serving license is an opportunity to enhance  
7 Elite Investigations, to give them more opportunity to  
8 expand.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any public comment  
10 or questions regarding the applicant or the application?  
11 Any Board comment or questions?

12 Anybody got a motion?

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that  
14 Cynthia S. Haddox-Brumley be given an individual process  
15 server license, that if approved, that that individual  
16 license be placed into abeyance so that she may become  
17 the qualifying agent, qualifying agent for Elite  
18 Investigations, License Number 873, that this is subject  
19 to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a  
22 second. Any Board comment or questions on the motion?  
23 All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

1           Congratulations.

2           MS. HADDOX-BRUMLEY: Thank you very much.

3           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thanks for coming.

4           Are you the driver of her?

5           UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Yes, sir, again.

6           MS. HADDOX-BRUMLEY: My chauffer.

7           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. The next item  
8 on the agenda is Excalibur Consulting, LLC. James P.  
9 O'Burke or Hilda O'Burke.

10           MR. O'BURKE: Good morning, Mr. Chairman. I'm  
11 O'Burke.

12           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you doing?

13           MR. O'BURKE: Very good.

14           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good.

15           MR. O'BURKE: I'm James Patrick O'Burke,  
16 representing Excalibur Consulting this morning.

17           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Nice to have you.  
18 What's your background?

19           MR. O'BURKE: I've been a polygraph examiner  
20 for 33 years. I'm currently the president elect of the  
21 American Polygraph Association. I'm currently also at  
22 polygraph school teaching basic polygraph skills and  
23 advanced interviewing and interrogation. I'm licensed  
24 in Louisiana as well. Retired as a commander from the  
25 Texas Department of Public Safety. The last few years,

1 I've been doing a lot of polygraph and teaching and  
2 instructing worldwide.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 Is there any public comment or questions  
5 regarding the application or the applicant?

6 Any Board comments or questions?

7 Okay. Entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move  
9 that --

10 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have a motion on it,  
11 Mr. Chairman. I move that Excalibur Consulting, LLC,  
12 that Mr. James P. O'Burke be granted a license for  
13 individual polygraph examiner; if he's approved, his --  
14 let's see, that his license be placed in abeyance so  
15 that he may become the qualifying agent. Members to be  
16 approved are James P. O'Burke and Hilda O'Burke. This  
17 is subject to statutory, all statutory and regulatory  
18 requirements.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Do we  
20 have a second?

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did somebody second?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, I'll second.

24 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman. Mr. Chairman,  
25 before the vote, can Shannon read back to make sure that



1 we captured that Excalibur Consulting, LLC, that a  
2 corporate license also be granted. I didn't catch that  
3 part of it.

4 (The Reporter read back the motion.)

5 MS. PALMER: So what we're missing is the  
6 approval of the Excaliber Consulting for their corporate  
7 polygraph examiner license.

8 MR. INGRAM: We just need to amend the motion.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ms. Collins, could you  
10 withdraw your motion and restate it to include the LLC  
11 license.

12 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Whoever the second was, will you withdraw your  
15 second?

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay. I'll redo it,  
19 I'll do it over again. Okay. Mr. Chairman, a motion  
20 that Excaliber Consulting, LLC be granted a new  
21 corporate polygraph examiner's license. Okay. James  
22 O'Burke be granted individual polygraph examiner's  
23 license, and that he is requesting his license be placed  
24 in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.  
25 Okay. Members to be approved are James O'Burke and

1 Hilda O'Burke. This is subject to all statutory and  
2 regulatory requirements.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 Do we have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Board comment or  
7 questions?

8 I have a question regarding the legality of the  
9 corporate entity being a licensee for polygraph  
10 examinations.

11 MR. INGRAM: Well, they can have a corporation  
12 or LLC. They just can't employ other individuals to  
13 provide polygraph examinations unless they're hired on  
14 as an intern. So they can still have their license with  
15 the protections under the corporation or the LLC.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 MR. INGRAM: But will not be able to employ  
18 people other than an intern that is directly supervised  
19 by the applicant.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. That's the  
21 question I had. Any others?

22 I'd entertain a motion. Oh, I'm sorry. We've  
23 been there, done that. Twice. How about a vote? All  
24 in favor, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
2 Congratulations.

3 MR. O'BURKE: Thank you all.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

5 Okay. Bedrock Protection Agency, LLC.

6 MR. NELSON: Yes. Tony Henrie's not here  
7 today. I'm Paul J. Nelson. I can address the issue.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

9 MR. NELSON: My name is Paul J. Nelson. I am  
10 the owner of Bedrock Protection Agency, LLC. I've been  
11 licensed first in California in 1992, been licensed  
12 since 1992 with a PPO license, and also in Utah since  
13 1999. And last year, I came before the Board and was  
14 licensed as a private patrol, a private patrolman.

15 And so business is good. We're expanding. We  
16 do private investigations in Utah. And last year, I  
17 hired Tony Henrie, retired from the FBI. And Tony is  
18 not with us today because he is fulfilling a lifelong  
19 bucket list. He and his father, who is elderly, are on  
20 a backpack trip, horses and backpacks, from the Mexican  
21 border to the Canadian border and presently are in the  
22 Grand Canyon. And he said -- and I told him about this  
23 meeting. He said, "Well, I could get a train, a plane,  
24 or I can" -- anyway, so I excused him from this meeting.  
25 But he is applying for his licensure as a private

1 investigator. And the two of us, then, would like to  
2 put our licenses in abeyance so that we can properly  
3 license my Bedrock Protection Agency, LLC here as both a  
4 private patrolman, or a private patrolman and private  
5 investigator company here.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see. Thank you.

7 Any public comment or question regarding the  
8 applicant or the application?

9 Any Board comment or questions regarding the  
10 applicant or the application?

11 Hearing none, we'd entertain a motion.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that Bedrock  
15 Protection Agency, LLC, doing business as Bedrock  
16 Protection Agency, be granted a new corporate private  
17 patrol and private investigator license; that Paul J.  
18 Nelson, License Number 2046B, that his individual  
19 license be placed in abeyance so that he can be the  
20 qualifying agent for Bedrock Protection Agency, LLC;  
21 additionally, that Tony T. Henrie be granted an  
22 individual private investigator license; if approved --  
23 or and that his license be placed in -- individual  
24 license be placed in abeyance so that he may become the  
25 qualifying agent for Bedrock Protection Agency, LLC.

1 Member to be approved is Paul J. Nelson. Subject to all  
2 statutory and regulatory requirements.

3 And, I guess, I do need to clarify something on  
4 that motion. The only member I see is Paul J. Nelson.  
5 Is Mr. Henrie a member, also?

6 MR. NELSON: He is not, no. Tony Henrie works  
7 for me. He's an employee.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Got you. Thank  
9 you.

10 Then, the motion stands, subject to all  
11 statutory and regulatory requirements.

12 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Do we have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Got a motion and a  
17 second. Any Board comment or question on the motion?

18 All in favor, say "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

21 Congratulations.

22 MR. NELSON: Thank you so much. Thanks.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for coming to  
24 Nevada.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair?

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Can we take a quick  
3 five-minute break before we get into all this  
4 discussion?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir. How about a  
6 10?

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right, 10's fine.  
8 Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And so we'll reconvene at  
10 10:25, please.

11 \* \* \* \* \*

12 (A break was taken, 10:17 to 10:30 a.m.)

13 \* \* \* \* \*

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. If anyone has  
15 arrived since this morning, we require that anybody  
16 giving testimony or speaking today be sworn, so that  
17 your information is taken under oath. So if you haven't  
18 been sworn already, please stand and raise your right  
19 hand and be sworn.

20 MR. INGRAM: Is there anyone in the north?

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, we have no one.

23 MS. PALMER: Do you solemnly affirm that the  
24 testimony you shall give before this Board shall be the  
25 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

1 (Applicants and witnesses present were  
2 sworn/affirmed.)

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 Okay. The first item the agenda is Robert  
5 Aker.

6 MR. INGRAM: Did you want to go through the  
7 other business first?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I'm sorry. I'm  
9 sorry. It probably would be, I think, beneficial. I'm  
10 sorry.

11 Then, we'll go to number 27, discussion and  
12 decision on whether to hire a hearing officer pursuant  
13 to NRS 648.048.

14 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. This has  
15 been a topic of discussion in the past but was never  
16 agendized to actually take action.

17 With review of the statutes and the way that  
18 the budget is set up, I've been working with Deputy  
19 Attorney General Raelene Palmer on this. And we feel  
20 that it would be in the best interest of the Board to  
21 allow me to go ahead and move forward with hiring a  
22 hearing officer pursuant to 648.040, section 6. That  
23 would allow a hearing officer to hear any contested  
24 cases and try to gather as much information at that  
25 time, to be able to present to the Board their

1 recommendation, to help cut down on the timeframe that  
2 it takes for the Board to hear all of those.

3 In addition to that, if we were to hire a  
4 hearing officer to hear those cases, the monies that are  
5 brought in through those, those fines, would go back  
6 into the Private Investigator's Licensing Board fund,  
7 and that could be used to hire additional staff or to  
8 help, I want say streamline our processes. It would  
9 give you an ability, then, to have additional meetings  
10 set up outside of the Board meeting for those cases to  
11 be heard.

12 I've been in discussion, and Ms. Palmer's been  
13 in discussion with a hearing officer for the state. He  
14 was originally very interested in doing this, and it  
15 would be no fee for the Board. However, he is a hearing  
16 officer for the Gaming Control Board. And Gaming just  
17 took over managing and overseeing the nightclubs and the  
18 casinos as well as the casinos. This is new. And  
19 because of that, he's afraid that his workload might  
20 severely increase, he may not be able to provide the  
21 hearing services to us.

22 So if the Board so grants that we can move  
23 forward, that would give me the ability to start  
24 reaching out to other possible vendors, getting them set  
25 up with the state, so that we could get someone that



1 will work.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any public comment  
3 regarding the agenda item?

4 Board comment?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I may have missed it,  
6 Mr. Chairman. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

7 I may have missed it, but what would they be  
8 reviewing?

9 MR. INGRAM: They would be reviewing the  
10 contested cases, such as the unlicensed activity  
11 citations, if they were appealed. Or if a licensee was  
12 appealing a citation or fine, they would be hearing  
13 those as well. They would not be the final decision.

14 MS. PALMER: Yes, they would be.

15 MR. INGRAM: Oh, they would?

16 MS. PALMER: Yes.

17 MR. INGRAM: I'm sorry. I've just been  
18 corrected. The last we had spoken, I thought that they  
19 still had the ability to request the hearing before the  
20 Board. So maybe I'll -- do you want to interject a  
21 little more there, because?

22 MS. PALMER: Sure. This came about sometime  
23 between 1982 and 1994. There was an Assembly bill which  
24 changed the language. Before, the licensing boards,  
25 when you had disciplinary action, you were able to keep

1 any of the fines or penalties that were assessed. And  
2 then, through a series of different cases, both from the  
3 United States Supreme Court and the Nevada Supreme  
4 Court, which found that there was at least the  
5 appearance of a violation of a person's due process  
6 rights, when a board is self-funded and strictly  
7 responsible for its budget, that the inclination would  
8 be that a -- a certain bias in your decision-making.

9           And so, as a result of that, the State  
10 Legislature changed the law so that all money collected  
11 in fines and penalties from disciplinary action had to  
12 be deposited into the state general fund. And then, in  
13 turn, the Board would apply for a refund, if it would  
14 make a claim for any investigative costs or legal costs.  
15 And the State Board of Examiners would then approve that  
16 and reimburse you just for your costs.

17           Now, if you have a separate hearing officer  
18 that makes the determinations such that the Board is not  
19 involved in that decision-making at all, then any fines,  
20 penalties, and so forth, that is collected can go  
21 straight into the Private Investigator's fund as opposed  
22 to the state general fund.

23           So those are the competing interests. And it's  
24 a decision that you have to make whether or not you want  
25 to retain the authority yourselves to be able to issue

1 the disciplinary, to render the final decision. This  
2 would also include consent items, stipulations, that,  
3 again, would be outside of the Board's decision. It  
4 would go directly to the hearing officer for a decision.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, we have  
6 follow-up.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, I did have a  
8 follow-up. And that is, okay, I understand the  
9 distinction between the hearing officer. Again, so, for  
10 instance, if we go have any -- so any complaint would go  
11 before the hearing officer; is that correct?

12 MS. PALMER: That is correct.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. What's the due  
14 process if the folks don't like what the hearing  
15 officer's decision was?

16 MS. PALMER: A petition for judicial review.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So it would have to go to  
18 court, not to the Board?

19 MS. PALMER: Correct.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: The appeal would go --  
21 okay. It would go to the courts, not to the Board.

22 Okay. That's all I have. Thank you,  
23 Mr. Chairman.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That was my question, but

1 that sparked another one. So let's say this is  
2 approved. I just want to make sure I understand this  
3 correctly. So the Board then would be left only with  
4 initial licensing decisions?

5 MR. INGRAM: And work card appeals.

6 MS. PALMER: And work card appeals.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Oh, the hearing officer  
8 will not hear work card appeals?

9 MR. INGRAM: We can determine that.

10 MS. PALMER: I think, that's the next item.

11 MR. INGRAM: Well, no, because that's  
12 relinquishment.

13 The Gaming Control Board currently uses the  
14 hearing officer for all of their work card appeals in  
15 Gaming. And I don't know if they, if the Board could  
16 decide to let the hearing officer to hear those as well,  
17 or do they have that, do they have the discretion?

18 MS. PALMER: I think that it's, that that's  
19 something -- well, let me check. Let me read the  
20 statute real quick.

21 Well, the way that the statute reads right now,  
22 it says that the denial of a registration may be  
23 appealed to the Board. It's possible that by  
24 regulation, you could adopt procedures that would allow  
25 that to go to a hearing officer.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have a follow-up  
2 question, if I may, Mr. Chair.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

5 Can the person who is -- can they choose the  
6 track that they wish to take? Can they choose to -- is  
7 that a possibility that they could choose the track in  
8 which they wanted to go? Whether they wanted to go  
9 before a hearing officer or whether they wanted to go  
10 before the Board, would they have that option?

11 MS. PALMER: And are you referring to a  
12 disciplinary matter where a licensee or an un -- an  
13 unlicensed citation, is that what we're -- what your  
14 question is pertaining to?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, I'm sorry.  
16 Anything that would go, conceivably would go to a  
17 hearing officer, would that -- would there be the option  
18 for the -- that person to be -- to choose a track,  
19 either go to the hearing officer or go to the Board?

20 MS. PALMER: I'm not sure the answer to that.  
21 But the point of doing it by way of a hearing officer  
22 would be so that the Board can keep those fines and  
23 penalties. So if the decision rested in the hands of  
24 the person who would be appearing before the Board, then  
25 it sort of defeats the purpose of being able to place

1 that money into the Private Investigator's account.

2 But I mean probably they could, or you could  
3 decide which ones. But then you'd have to set up a  
4 different system for how you deposited money. In some  
5 cases, it would have to then go to the general fund. In  
6 other cases, it could go directly into your budget.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Sure, and I understand  
8 that distinction and that I'm -- part, part of me kind  
9 of thinks, well, the hearing officer would facilitate  
10 things, would be much more timely as far as any kind of  
11 an action or anything of that nature. Because we meet  
12 quarterly. The hearing officer could meet whenever.

13 But part of it is, from my perspective, part of  
14 the Board's responsibility is understanding what's going  
15 on with the players within the -- that they're  
16 licensing. And if all disciplinary went to a hearing  
17 officer, then we kind of lose touch with what's going on  
18 in the industry, other than -- you know, particularly  
19 for someone like me, who's a lay member. I'm not a  
20 practitioner. I'm a public member. So, therefore, you  
21 know, you and the practitioners know what's going on  
22 through probably word of mouth and things like that, and  
23 that kind of thing.

24 And I'm just trying to think how, how we keep  
25 in touch with what's going on within the industry. I

1 guess, that's where I'm -- part of what's -- where my  
2 discussion and thought process is.

3 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nadeau, if that was  
4 the case, where you were going to approve this, you  
5 could request me to provide updates at every Board  
6 meeting in regards to the actions taken. That would be  
7 an option for you.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You know, and, obviously,  
9 an update, periodic updates would be -- that has to be  
10 the way. But we've had some pretty flagrant violations.  
11 We've had some pretty, what I can say, pretty dramatic  
12 players in our industry. And that tells us what -- I've  
13 just got to say that that really has brought me into  
14 some of the goings-on and some of the bad players.

15 So, I guess, I don't know where I really want  
16 to go with it, but that's just kind of my thought  
17 process.

18 MR. INGRAM: You know, and at the time, yeah,  
19 and at the time I put this on the agenda, I was under  
20 the belief that if the hearing officer made a decision,  
21 that they would always have the ability to appeal to you  
22 if they wanted to. So I wasn't aware that this would be  
23 the final decision when I put it on the agenda. So just  
24 so you know where I'm coming from. At that time, I  
25 believed that after it was adjudicated by them, that

1 those wishing to move forward could then request to be  
2 heard by the entire Board. So that information is just  
3 been skewed a little bit today for me.

4 MS. PALMER: And just to add to that a little  
5 bit, part of the confusion is coming in, in the Gaming  
6 Control Board, they have the two-tiered system where  
7 they have the board and the commission. So their  
8 hearing officer issues the recommendation. And then  
9 those, those decisions, the denials can be appealed to  
10 the commission, but not to the board.

11 And so I'm not sure whether or not there's any  
12 possibility that this Board could hear just denials,  
13 where somebody could appeal the denial, where the Board  
14 has the ability to overturn the disciplinary but not to  
15 impose the disciplinary. And, you know, I could look at  
16 that and see if that's a possibility.

17 But the distinction between the way the Gaming  
18 Control Board does it and the way this body would have  
19 to do it is the fact that there is no commission, that  
20 secondary agency, that could hear it.

21 So I'm just not sure. If it's possible, that  
22 might be the best resolution for you, where somebody --  
23 because, I think, your concern is that it goes from the  
24 hearing officer, bypasses the Board entirely, and goes  
25 to judicial review.



1           And the opinion that I have is a 1994 opinion  
2 from the Attorney General's Office. And in that case,  
3 it was right after the new law went into effect. And  
4 what happened was the professional engineers and land  
5 surveyors made this inquiry as to whether or not, if  
6 they had an advisory committee or if they had a hearing  
7 officer, under what circumstances they could keep the  
8 fines and penalties. And the bottom line in the  
9 decision was that, that provided that the delegation of  
10 disciplinary authority and power to render a final  
11 decision, that that's the prerequisite to any deposit of  
12 fines and penalties directly onto the board's accounts.  
13 So that final decision, I think, is the key there.

14           But, again, if the hearing officer were  
15 recommending denial, and the Board were only sitting as  
16 a body that could possibly consider reversing the  
17 hearing officer, I don't know whether or not that might  
18 give you the additional input. And I can find out. But  
19 my thought is probably not; the final decision would  
20 have to be with the hearing officer.

21           BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Is part of this, it's --  
22 the North Carolina decision, is that driving any of this  
23 conversation?

24           MS. PALMER: No.

25           BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

1 MS. PALMER: Although that may be a factor to  
2 think about.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I've got --

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I  
5 appreciate that.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I've got a  
7 question.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: What would help me make a  
10 decision would be to give me an example. For example,  
11 last year, how much money in fines did we take in that  
12 would be applicable to this change? Secondly, how much  
13 would a hearing officer have costed during last year?  
14 And then how much money are we talking about the P.I.  
15 Board receiving to make a what I consider major change  
16 in how we operate? I'd like to, in my mind, weigh the  
17 cost benefit analysis.

18 MR. INGRAM: Approximately three years ago, the  
19 citations and fines were upwards of around \$60,000. The  
20 following year, it dropped to about 40,000. And as of  
21 right now, this year, we're at just under 40,000. So it  
22 does fluctuate based on, you know, the infractions.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And is there a way we  
24 could figure out what a hearing officer would have cost  
25 over the -- based on the amount of work for those three

1 years?

2 MR. INGRAM: Well, and, again, depending on  
3 which direction we went. The one hearing officer is a  
4 salaried employee for Gaming. And he would have taken  
5 that on as no cost to us. But for the sake of argument,  
6 let's say they charge a flat rate of \$500 a day, and  
7 they work, you know, a half day or a whole day. Because  
8 we don't have that many contested cases. Most of the  
9 fines, they realize that they were wrong, and they pay  
10 them, and they correct their behavior. Let's say we  
11 paid him \$500 a day, and we had four hearings a year.  
12 Pretty good return on investment, 2,000 versus 40 to 60  
13 thousand.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And, all right.  
15 Well, thank you. Because that, I was thinking something  
16 different. So if we have a hearing officer, all the  
17 fines, whether contested or not, can come back to the  
18 P.I. Board?

19 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

20 MS. PALMER: Right, but it's only -- well,  
21 contested by virtue of the fact. Whether somebody  
22 contests them or not, it's still considered a contested  
23 case. So, yes.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right.

25 MS. PALMER: All fines and penalties.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I have a  
3 question.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir, Mr. Colbert.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: My concern is that this  
6 is a lot of authority for one person to have for this  
7 decision-making. And, you know, this Board brings a lot  
8 of experience to the table here, and in all variety of  
9 fields. And with all that, we see how many times we  
10 have a split decision based upon all of our experience.  
11 And that would be totally lacking with just this one  
12 person.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair?

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

16 MR. INGRAM: Based on the information that I  
17 have before me today, I would personally suggest that we  
18 not change the way we're doing things. Because, I  
19 think, it is -- I think, the Board does need to have  
20 that final determination and dispo's on the licensees.  
21 And if we investigate further and find out that there is  
22 a way that they can choose, or you can choose, maybe we  
23 revisit it. But I would respectfully request that this  
24 be denied.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, I'm a pretty

1 strong proponent of the suggestion that we have a  
2 hearings officer, one, for the return of the revenue to  
3 its proper pot, but, more importantly, so that the  
4 matters are adjudicated quicker than us adjudicating  
5 them once every three months, so that people get a  
6 timely return on their denial.

7           But it was all-inclusive in any mind. If we  
8 were going to have a hearings officer, that hearings  
9 officer would need to do work card referral issues of  
10 denials. It would have to do contested cases and all of  
11 those things. But I was under the impression, and I  
12 based my support for the program on the fact that,  
13 ultimately, this body would be an appellate, sitting in  
14 an appellate position.

15           And I still very much am a proponent for that  
16 type of system. But if one has to go away at the  
17 expense of the other, I would just as soon stay exactly  
18 the way we are now.

19           BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I agree with  
20 you in the sense of trying to expedite, you know,  
21 hearings and that type of thing, I think, particularly  
22 when they get protracted. I mean we had one, one that  
23 went -- carried on for almost a full year.

24           But, I think, if there is either a dual track,  
25 in other words, two-track system, where they would

1 either appealed through the hearing officer or appealed  
2 to the Board, to me, there's some value in that. But.

3 Or if there was a way that if -- if there was a  
4 way that we could write the regulation or maybe even  
5 make a statutory change that allowed, if it went to the  
6 hearing officer and was adjudicated by the hearing  
7 officer, then the funds would be deposited into the --  
8 but if it came to the -- if the appeal was through the  
9 Board, then those funds would go, they'd go to the  
10 general fund.

11 Now, that would be -- that would require some  
12 accounting dancing. But it would seem to me that that  
13 might be -- you know, that's a viable option. I don't  
14 know.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The only issue I'd have  
16 there is I could foresee that the ones that came before  
17 the Board would be those protracted cases that are going  
18 to cost a lot in legal services and different things,  
19 that we end up with a big war on our hands, and then,  
20 ultimately, we don't get the benefit of the fines,  
21 because it happened to flow through the Board.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: But --

23 MS. PALMER: Mr. Chairman?

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

1 MS. PALMER: Your legal fees probably wouldn't  
2 change, because whether I was presenting a case to the  
3 Board or presenting a case to the hearing officer, it  
4 would still entail the same evidentiary process.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I guess, if there's going  
7 to be a 50/50, if the only appeal is through -- is the  
8 judicial appeal, that's going to entail some additional  
9 cost, because now you're going to have additional, you  
10 are going to have some additional court costs and things  
11 like that.

12 So, you know, I guess, there's a give-and-take  
13 on both sides, so, from my perspective.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I would envision, though,  
15 that there would be more of an apt to appeal something  
16 when it's heard before a single hearings officer, rather  
17 than the display that you have before you with us  
18 arguing among ourselves on the outcome of a particular  
19 adversarial situation, where it's the hearings officer  
20 setting, and it's supposed to be as clinical and  
21 sterile, and whereas, somebody before the Board gets the  
22 opportunity to make an argument to a jury, you know,  
23 sitting in judgment of their issue, rather than the one  
24 hearings officer. So.

25 But, ideally, you know, my first function is

1 where does the money go to, you know, to help operate  
2 this, that's supposed to be self-sustaining? I sure  
3 don't want to get into a position where we're fining  
4 people just simply because we need money, that's for  
5 sure.

6 MR. INGRAM: That's right.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But by the same token, we  
8 want to make sure that we can afford to have the support  
9 and the staff and the facilities to accommodate what our  
10 mission is.

11 So, like I say, my preference here is a  
12 hearings officer with an appellate review by the Board.

13 That's all I have. So maybe we put it on the  
14 next agenda and make a definitive vote at that time.

15 MS. PALMER: Yeah, and let me find out if there  
16 are any options where the Board could still hear some  
17 part of that.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I would prefer  
19 to have some time to think about this. I mean if I was  
20 forced to a vote right now, just out of an abundance of  
21 caution, I would say no. But I'd feel more comfortable,  
22 if we do bring this up for a vote, doing it at the next  
23 meeting, to give me some time to process this and also  
24 come up with some other questions to be answered.

25 I'll make that a motion, that we table this to



1 the next meeting.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any  
3 public comment, questions?

4 Thank you. Do we have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Do we need a motion, or  
6 just no action?

7 MR. INGRAM: Just table it.

8 MS. PALMER: Yes, just table it.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I guess, we just table  
10 it. Make sure it's on the next agenda.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I would also  
12 like to have input from the P.I. Board association. I'd  
13 be curious how our constituents feel about this matter.

14 MR. INGRAM: I'll reach out to them.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I don't know if  
16 they're in attendance today down south, or.

17 MR. INGRAM: No, not today.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So it'll be put on  
20 the next agenda.

21 MR. INGRAM: We have got somebody who wishes to  
22 speak.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh. Sorry. Hang on.  
24 Sorry. There is somebody that would like to speak.

25 MR. MOHEN: Lee Moen, Linda Moen

1 Investigations, private investigators and member of the  
2 NSPI, Nevada Society of Private Investigators. And I'm  
3 not an officer, so this is just as an individual  
4 company.

5           This is a tough one. I could see pluses and  
6 minuses. And one of the things that struck me as kind  
7 of a minus is if somehow we find ourself in a situation,  
8 and we haven't in almost 13 years, where we could get  
9 fined heavily or lose our license, we want to be sitting  
10 in front of people who know for real what, what's going  
11 on in this industry. I've been coming to meetings a  
12 long time. I think, it's pretty just.

13           The other side of me doesn't like unlicensed  
14 activity or bad actors. And we put up in that  
15 department. Kevin could verify it. We took many, many  
16 hours of our time over the years to present the  
17 investigators with evidence that enabled fines to be  
18 imposed and collected, and a considerable amount.

19           I think, one of the things you're going to hear  
20 back, as you discuss this further, is this individual  
21 that will be this judge, what does he know about our  
22 business? And he doesn't know as much as you all  
23 combined. I couldn't see how. Yeah, he knows how to do  
24 statutes, and this and that and everything else. But so  
25 many cases that come before this Board are not about

1 statutes. It's there. Somebody did something wrong or  
2 out of bounds. But it's -- a lot of it's about common  
3 sense and real justice.

4 So, I think, everybody's got a lot of homework  
5 to do on this one. We could use that money, that would  
6 not go in the general fund, to have more investigators  
7 and to chase more of the bad actors out of our state and  
8 out of our industry. On the other hand, I don't like  
9 losing my safety blanket. So.

10 That's all I got.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 MR. MOHEN: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Anybody else?

15 MS. PALMER: I would just make one more  
16 suggestion, that if you maintain the status quo, that if  
17 your investigators can develop a system, and maybe they  
18 already have one in place, where they can keep track of  
19 their hours. Because you can still go back to the Board  
20 of Examiners for reimbursement of both legal fees and  
21 investigative costs. And I know that, I believe,  
22 Executive Director Ingram is pursuing legal fees. We've  
23 had some expensive ones in this last couple years. So,  
24 I think, he is going to pursue recouping legal fees, at  
25 the very least.

1 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The other question that  
3 is somewhat related to it, though, and maybe we can  
4 address it at the next meeting as well, is the flow of  
5 the debt associated with noncompliance and nonpayment.  
6 Because, as I understand, it flows to the comptroller.

7 MR. INGRAM: The controller.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Or the controller. And  
9 then, once it gets to that point, it's whether or not  
10 they decide to actively chase it or not. And once they  
11 do get anything in return, we've levied some pretty good  
12 size fines in the past that I don't even know were ever  
13 collected.

14 MR. INGRAM: Portions of them are they keep  
15 their position, and we got a small amount back to us.  
16 So, yes, they are actively working on that.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. But it's -- you  
18 know, I mean I can recall one time we assessed a fine  
19 and fees, I think, around \$10,000. And I don't know  
20 that we ever received much in -- he was an out-of-state  
21 actor. You know, but we lose the opportunity to say  
22 anything about collections activity or whether or not  
23 it's just being bulked and sent out to a collections  
24 agency, or what happens when it returns.

25 So maybe when we talk about this the next time,

1 the money portion of it, which we always got to hold our  
2 nose at, we can address that as well.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, when you're  
4 referring to fines that have not been collected, is this  
5 in situations where people have lost their licenses, or  
6 they have still have the license, they've just chosen  
7 not to pay the fine?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The ones I'm talking  
9 about are people that were fined for unlicensed  
10 activity.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And we had to go through  
13 all of the hearing process and bring in witnesses and  
14 were required to expend a lot of funds just to prove up  
15 the case, and then all of a sudden they just vanished.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anyway, I'd like that, if  
18 possible, to be agendized in a fashion that that also  
19 could be discussed, if there's no opposition.

20 Okay. Anything else on item number 27?

21 Number 28, discussion and decision regarding  
22 process and procedure for individuals voluntarily  
23 surrendering their registered work card in lieu of  
24 revocation.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

1           The reason we wanted to put this on the agenda,  
2 again, legal counsel and I had been discussing  
3 situations where something comes to the Board staff's  
4 attention. An example would be a work card employee who  
5 is arrested for a felony, or arrested and has not  
6 been -- has been charged but hasn't been convicted, but  
7 it's -- there's some egregiousness there. If those  
8 individuals came to the Board and said, "You know what,  
9 I don't want to go before the Board. I don't want to  
10 air this in a public forum. I just want to give you my  
11 card back," can we accept that?

12           And I'll turn that over to Raelene on that one  
13 to discuss as well.

14           MS. PALMER: Yes. So this is as situation  
15 that's come up a few times. And in a situation where  
16 you have a licensee, that would usually be documented in  
17 a manner that would then come before the Board for  
18 approval when somebody's voluntarily surrendering their  
19 license.

20           But in the case of an employee -- and it's in  
21 lieu of disciplinary action. That's -- they would  
22 surrender their license in lieu of disciplinary action.

23           When you have a registered work card holder,  
24 there is no disciplinary action, because the Board is  
25 not in the business of disciplining the employees of

1 licensees, only the licensees themselves. There is one  
2 exception to that, and that is sometimes there's conduct  
3 that occurred that could rise to a criminal level, and  
4 then the Board has the ability to seek criminal  
5 violation. But, ordinarily, all that you're looking at  
6 is taking the person's work card.

7           So this has come up a few times now, whether or  
8 not the Board would like to allow its staff to just  
9 accept a person's work card. Again, maybe there could  
10 be a report if the Board still wanted to know, okay,  
11 whose cards did we voluntarily take, so that you had  
12 information about what was going on, but where that  
13 process would occur just at the staff level, somebody  
14 comes in and says, "Here's my work card."

15           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment,  
16 questions?

17           Any Board comment, question?

18           BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

19           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

20           BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I think, do we have to  
21 change the regulations in order to allow that to happen,  
22 or is that just a policy decision at the Board level?

23           MS. PALMER: It's a policy decision.

24           BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I mean if somebody wants  
25 to turn in their registration card, I say, good. If it

1 gets a bad actor out of the system, I think, that's  
2 good. If I'm understanding this correctly.

3 MS. PALMER: Yes, I guess, the concern and  
4 where we discussed it is that sometimes the conduct is  
5 very egregious, and whether or not the Board wants to  
6 know about that or whether or not it's sufficient that  
7 staff just takes the work card.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, let me ask you this  
9 question. Can we leave that up to the Director to make  
10 a determination whether to voluntarily take it, or if  
11 it's that egregious, to let us know?

12 MR. INGRAM: It's policy.

13 MS. PALMER: I'm just worried --

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If we have a policy, we  
15 don't want to just have -- it's too wishy-washy if it's  
16 up to -- no offense, Kevin. We understand this. But  
17 it's not --

18 MR. INGRAM: I understand.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: But it's not -- if we  
20 either have a policy that they can do it, or the  
21 Director, you know -- or it's reported back to us. But,  
22 I think, if they report, reported to us, then they --  
23 then that egregious behavior is brought to our  
24 attention. But we can't do anything against the  
25 employee anyway unless there's some kind of a criminal



1 act. If I understood that correctly.

2 MS. PALMER: That's correct.

3 MR. INGRAM: That's correct. And if anything  
4 comes to our attention that's criminal in nature,  
5 normally we get that information from law enforcement.  
6 But on occasion, an employee will come forward and say,  
7 "Hey, this happened. And I just want to give my card  
8 back to you. I don't want to, I don't want to, you  
9 know, have to explain myself in a public forum."

10 But if something came to our attention that was  
11 criminal, the first thing we would do is contact the  
12 A.G.'s criminal division and turn all that information  
13 over to them. And we have done that.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I mean a card --

15 MS. PALMER: I just wanted to speak --

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry. But a card  
17 revocation would come before us if they chose not to  
18 give it up, correct?

19 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And then it's in the  
21 public forum. So I just think it facilitates it and  
22 makes it an easier process. If they don't want to give  
23 it up, fine. Then they come before us, and revocation.

24 MS. PALMER: And I just want to clarify one  
25 thing, because there may be some confusion in criminal

1 meaning the underlying act, versus criminal for  
2 violating Private Investigator's Licensing statutes.

3 MR. INGRAM: Right.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Right.

5 MS. PALMER: So you have your own separate  
6 citations that can be issued, that, of course, are  
7 criminal citations. So really any behavior that is a  
8 violation of Chapter 648, well, the provisions 648.060  
9 through 648.205, are all themselves criminal violations.

10 So that would -- that's the concern, is that  
11 not -- not the underlying crime that they committed  
12 maybe, but it's the violation of the statutes. For  
13 example, lying to the Board. Sometimes something comes  
14 out where a person has lied to the Board, and sometimes  
15 it's significant enough where they actually were trying  
16 to circumvent the licensing procedures.

17 So that would be an example of a very egregious  
18 type of situation where the Board may want to be aware  
19 of the specifics. Again, that could happen through a  
20 reporting requirement or -- and then the Board maybe  
21 would perhaps decide we want to place this on the agenda  
22 for -- or we would like -- maybe what you could do is  
23 have a provision on whether or not there was anything  
24 that you wanted to refer to the A.G.s Office for  
25 criminal prosecution or to the D.A.'s Office for

1 criminal prosecution.

2 I think, those will be unique and rare  
3 circumstances. But we have seen some that probably fit  
4 that criteria.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment,  
6 questions?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just one clarification,  
8 if I may. If they turn in their card, in lieu of  
9 revocation, once they turn in that card, then do they  
10 have to reapply, or is that card reissued upon request?

11 MR. INGRAM: They would have to reapply.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Perfect.

13 MR. INGRAM: And at that time, they could be  
14 denied and brought before the Board for appeal.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Right.

16 MR. INGRAM: Would be an example.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I just wanted to  
18 make sure that it wasn't just a matter of saying, "Oh, I  
19 turned in my card, but now I want it back, so issue me a  
20 new one."

21 MR. INGRAM: No, sir.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: They'd have to go in for  
23 a full, full application. Perfect. Thank you.

24 MR. INGRAM: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

1 Can anybody muster a motion?

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'd make a motion. And my  
3 decision point was Commissioner Nadeau's last question,  
4 is that I'm much more comfortable with this now. And my  
5 motion would be to create, for the P.I. Board to create  
6 a policy that will allow individuals to voluntarily  
7 surrender their registered work card in lieu of  
8 revocation.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Any,  
10 do we have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second that.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All in favor, say  
13 "aye." I'm sorry. Any, any Board comment or question  
14 on the motion?

15 All in favor, say "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
18 It carries unanimously.

19 MS. PALMER: And then just for clarification,  
20 do you want the Board to then have an item on the agenda  
21 where they advise you of whose cards were surrendered  
22 and why?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would appreciate that,  
24 yeah.

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

1 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item 29, discussion on  
3 California Penal Code 1203.4 and how the Board should  
4 consider it in their decisions.

5 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

6 This item was added to the agenda at the  
7 request of Board Member Nadeau at the last meeting. And  
8 I believe that Deputy Attorney General Palmer is ready  
9 to address this as well.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

11 MS. PALMER: And so, I think, this most  
12 frequently comes up with the California Penal Code  
13 Section 1203.4, but I understand there are other states  
14 that have a similar provision in their statute. And  
15 actually your prior counsel had addressed this back in  
16 2013. And what she determined is, at least as far as  
17 California Penal Code Section 1203.4 goes, is that it's  
18 not -- it doesn't expunge the prior conviction. So the  
19 idea there was that you could certainly consider that.

20 I have a little bit of a different opinion, and  
21 that is looking at your registration statute. And,  
22 again, there's provisions in there that specifies when  
23 you must give someone a work card. And there's four  
24 criteria that are laid out there.

25 And it says if a person's of good moral

1 character and temperate habits, hasn't been convicted of  
2 or entered into a plea of nolo contendere to a felony or  
3 a crime involving moral turpitude, or the illegal use or  
4 possession of a dangerous weapon.

5 And, I think, that's the provision where you  
6 generally have this California statute coming into play.

7 Has not made a false statement of material fact  
8 on the application and has not violated any provision of  
9 this chapter or regulation.

10 So you have the discretion to determine  
11 someone's suitability if they don't meet that criteria.  
12 If they meet that criteria, the law says that you must  
13 give them a work card. If they don't meet that  
14 criteria, of course, you're looking at suitability and  
15 whether or not you believe that the person is suitable  
16 to work in the industry.

17 So in the case of this statute, they are still  
18 required to report that. So if they failed to report  
19 this particular, whatever the crime is that came under  
20 the California statute, then that would be reason that  
21 they didn't meet the qualifications for number three, a  
22 false statement of material fact on an application.  
23 Again, because this is the firearms statute, they also  
24 wouldn't meet the requirement for number two.

25 So, and, I think, how this Board has been

1 operating, then, is you're considering the underlying  
2 facts of the crime in determining whether or not you  
3 have a concern with that person working in the industry.  
4 And, I think, some of the criteria that you've taken  
5 into consideration is time between the actual violation,  
6 what they've done in the interim period of time and  
7 whether or not they stayed out of trouble. And, of  
8 course, the seriousness of the underlying crime.

9 Sometimes they've been very serious. And even though 20  
10 years have passed, the fact that somebody held a firearm  
11 to somebody else's head has been reasons to preclude  
12 them from working regardless of the fact that 20 years  
13 has passed.

14 So I don't really know what other questions you  
15 might have about it, but that's the general specifics.

16 MR. INGRAM: So the process we're currently  
17 using is, if there's been dismissal under 1203.4, or a  
18 similar law in another state, where they are required to  
19 disclose, Board staff automatically denies the  
20 application. And then they're able to appeal before  
21 you, for you to hear those underlying causes and get  
22 time and distance and things of that nature. That's the  
23 way Board staff has been acting and would continue to  
24 act unless told otherwise.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: The question I have,

1 Mr. Chair, in an applicant's ability to be an armed  
2 guard, with this in their background, is that a  
3 decision -- for instance, if they have a domestic  
4 violence conviction, they're not able to be an armed  
5 guard, correct?

6 MR. INGRAM: That is correct.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Yes.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So if they have, if they  
9 have a conviction under a similar type penal code as  
10 this 1204, or 1203.4, would that also preclude them;  
11 even if they were allowed to be a security guard, would  
12 they be allowed to be an armed guard?

13 MR. INGRAM: Staff's decision on that would be  
14 no.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

16 MR. INGRAM: If there's a firearms conviction,  
17 that, no, they would not be able to work armed, but that  
18 they would be able to have a guard card and work  
19 unarmed, if, if the Board so chose. We don't make that  
20 decision at staff level.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So, I think, my question  
22 at the last meeting was -- and, I think, I think,  
23 Ms. Palmer addressed it, and that is, we have, then, the  
24 discretion that if it's this type of a conviction, then  
25 we have the discretion to go ahead and set -- take it



1 into context and issue a permit based on that, correct?

2 MS. PALMER: Yes, as far as the -- as far as  
3 the unarmed guard status goes, you have discretion under  
4 any statute if suitability is what you're concerned  
5 with.

6 MR. INGRAM: I'd like to throw a little wrench  
7 in the decision, if I may.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Why not?

9 MR. INGRAM: Why not? Gaming Control Board,  
10 I've contacted Gaming Control Board and their chief  
11 investigator there to see how they decide whether an  
12 individual can have a gaming card or not. Their rule of  
13 thumb is felonies or any other convictions over 10  
14 years, they do not consider that when giving a gaming  
15 card. If it's over 10 years, they just automatically,  
16 if there's nothing been done or no offenses since then,  
17 they will issue a gaming card.

18 MS. PALMER: And that's 10 years post-release  
19 from prison.

20 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

21 MS. PALMER: It's not if they spent 10 years in  
22 prison and they get out.

23 MR. INGRAM: That's correct. Thank you for  
24 that clarification. The next day.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And that's regardless of

1 the offense, whether it's a felony or a gross  
2 misdemeanor, regardless of if it's 10 years since the  
3 they got out of prison, then they don't give it any  
4 consideration at all?

5 MR. INGRAM: That is correct.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And is that according to  
7 their regulations, or is that just policy?

8 MR. INGRAM: I believe, that's policy, sir.

9 MS. PALMER: That doesn't mean that you have to  
10 follow the same suit. And you may have considerations  
11 that are different than Gaming's. Again, you know, if  
12 you're talking about people that potentially are, you  
13 know, providing security.

14 MR. INGRAM: At a bank.

15 MS. PALMER: At a bank, was Kevin's example. I  
16 mean you have to decide. And you can take it on a  
17 case-by-case basis. You don't have to make a blanket  
18 rule. It's always what satisfies you that this person  
19 is suitable, that they're not going to be a concern in  
20 the industry.

21 But if you wanted to give staff some direction  
22 on this is what you should look for, if it's  
23 questionable, bring it to us, if it's not, I mean that's  
24 certainly something that the Board can do.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So as a practical matter,

1 if we were to approve this, there would most likely be a  
2 lot more approvals at the staff level, rather than the  
3 blanket now based upon the disclosure of the 1204 at  
4 issue?

5 MR. INGRAM: That could result, based on what  
6 you -- what direction you give us as far as moving  
7 forward with these types of requests.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

9 MR. INGRAM: I would think that any dismissal  
10 that had firearms underlying, that automatically we  
11 would deny for a armed position. That would be my  
12 preference. But that, again, is just my preference.

13 Board staff, did you have anything else you  
14 wanted to add?

15 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief of Operations Lori  
16 Irizarry. I just have a question. If, if it does pass  
17 and you take a chance and see what he has, would we  
18 still require them to list it on their application, or  
19 they would not require to list it if it's over 10 years?  
20 I just wanted to clarify that as well.

21 MR. INGRAM: That's a good question.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, doesn't the process  
23 in, take, for example, California, indicate that you  
24 have the ability not to disclose the conviction?

25 MR. INGRAM: In California, that is -- no, if

1 they're applying for licensure or a permit, they must  
2 disclose it. But California automatically accepts the  
3 1203.4, even though it's disclosed, as a true dismissal.

4 And speaking with California, they say, "I  
5 don't know what your problem is in Nevada. This is a  
6 dismissal." And we're saying, "This is a dismissal  
7 under California law, not under Nevada law."

8 MS. PALMER: Actually, there's California cases  
9 that say it is not a dismissal, it's not an expungement.

10 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

12 MR. INGRAM: But their bureau looks at it and  
13 says, "It's dismissed."

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah.

15 MR. INGRAM: "We have no issue." They'll give  
16 them an armed card in California.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: More experience.

18 MR. INGRAM: I think so.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions,  
20 comments?

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I guess, if staff is  
22 looking for direction, I think, I think, first off, I  
23 understand 1204, 1203.4 much better and for context for  
24 future hearings.

25 So, I think, we should continue. And if you

1 want a motion, fine. But I think that they should  
2 continue just denying it. And the person can appeal it  
3 to the Board. Again, the armed guard thing is of  
4 concern to me, too.

5 And if you need a motion, so moved.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So we want to keep it,  
7 the motion would be that we want to keep it as it is  
8 today?

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Correct.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board  
13 discussion on the motion?

14 All in favor, say "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
17 No.

18 It carries.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, thank you for  
20 bringing that back, because this really clarified it for  
21 me as far as my ability to synthesize it. So thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

23 Okay. Now, registration appeals.

24 If anybody's here for, to be heard on the next  
25 several matters, and you haven't been sworn, could you

1 raise your hand.

2 Okay. Could you stand, raise your right hand,  
3 and be sworn, and anybody else up north that might not  
4 have been sworn, too.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No one up north.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

7 MS. PALMER: So you solemnly affirm that the  
8 testimony you shall give before this Board will be the  
9 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

10 (Applicants and witnesses present were  
11 sworn/affirmed.)

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. All right.  
13 Is Robert Aker here?

14 MR. AKER: Yes.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 MR. AKER: Good morning, Mr. Chairman. Good  
17 morning, Board, staff.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

19 MR. AKER: Robert Aker, A-K-E-R.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 Let's see. You applied for registration, and  
22 you were denied, and you're now appealing the decision.

23 MR. AKER: Yes, Mr. Chair.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So we'll listen to the  
25 investigator.

1 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. I denied  
2 Mr. Aker in January. He was convicted of a felony in  
3 1993, and he was charged with possessing a deadly weapon  
4 in 1996.

5 His attorney has contacted our office and  
6 provided records, which we provided to the Board,  
7 because there was a lot more information. They'd gone  
8 to court and sealed the records. So.

9 MR. AKER: If I may say anything?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah, just a second, once  
11 we're on the right page.

12 Was that correspondence sent out to --

13 MR. INGRAM: That's what I'm looking for real  
14 quick.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

16 MR. INGRAM: It would be in your appeals  
17 folder, everything I had for appeals.

18 MS. DONALD: If not, I can expand on it.

19 MR. INGRAM: Pull that up real quick.

20 In your appeals folder, we have Mr. Aker's file  
21 there. There were some records that he requested that  
22 we provide to the Board ahead of time. And that came  
23 from the law offices was of William S. Skupa. Is that  
24 correct, Skupa?

25 MR. AKER: Yes, sir.

1 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, if I may interject  
2 while you're reviewing the documents?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

4 MR. INGRAM: Just to bring to the Board's  
5 attention, that while records were sealed or expunged,  
6 when applying for a privileged license or certificate or  
7 permit, those records, once the Board is aware of them,  
8 can still be considered. The sealing does not mean that  
9 you do not have to consider those.

10 Am I correct, counsel?

11 MS. PALMER: That's correct.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Aker, do you have any  
13 comments you'd like to make?

14 MR. AKER: I just, I know that it's been over  
15 20 years since all this has happened. And I'm just  
16 trying to better my career as getting another job. I'm  
17 currently employed at the Mirage. I've been a bellman  
18 with them for 23 years. They hired me with the felony  
19 background. I haven't gotten in trouble since then.  
20 And I'm just looking for a chance to better my career.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. In this portion of  
22 the agenda, we don't ask for public participation,  
23 because this is what we consider to be an adversarial  
24 setting. So don't be offended if I don't include you in  
25 the process.



1           Okay. Now, are there any Board questions?

2           BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes. Mr. Aker, can you  
3 briefly tell me what happened in 1996 for you to receive  
4 that charge?

5           MR. AKER: I was pulled over for driving on a  
6 suspended license. And when the officer searched my  
7 truck, there was a miniature souvenir baseball bat  
8 underneath my seat, and he said it was a -- it could be  
9 used as a bludgeoning device. And it wasn't in my hand.  
10 I didn't use it. I actually totally forgot that it was  
11 still underneath my seat. It had probably been there  
12 for years in the truck.

13           BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Were you --

14           MR. AKER: It's something that I bought from  
15 the -- sorry. Go ahead, sir.

16           BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Were you charged with  
17 anything else during that incident?

18           MR. AKER: For the '96?

19           BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah.

20           MR. AKER: No.

21           BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

22           MR. AKER: So that, what happened in '96, was  
23 just the possessing a deadly weapon. And it didn't even  
24 show up on the SCOPE when we ran it from Carson City.  
25 When PILB sent me the letter, that's the only time that

1 it came to my attention. Because when we did the SCOPE  
2 from Carson City, it wasn't even on there. Mr. Skupa  
3 and his paralegals didn't even find it. It was brought  
4 to our attention by the PILB. I went, we went to  
5 Henderson and got it sealed.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And then in '93  
7 incident, could you speak briefly about that.

8 MR. AKER: '93 was furnishing a controlled  
9 substance.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And for staff, just to  
11 confirm, this was denied for a non-armed position,  
12 correct?

13 MS. DONALD: Correct, yes. And as far as the  
14 '96 deadly weapon, he is correct, it did not show up on  
15 his fingerprints. When I ran the CJIS, it just showed  
16 up as a \$250 fine with the City of Henderson, possessing  
17 a deadly weapon. But since we knew about it at that  
18 point, we had to deny it, also based on that. But when  
19 his fingerprints came back, there was nothing on his  
20 fingerprints about that charge at all.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I do have one question.  
23 On 1992, it seems like a very significant charge, but it  
24 was actually dismissed?

25 MR. AKER: Correct.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay?

2 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: (Nodded head  
3 affirmatively.)

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?  
5 Entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would move that Robert  
9 Aker be granted his registration.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion to  
11 overturn and grant. Is there a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and second. Any  
14 Board comment on the motion?

15 All in favor, say "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
18 Congratulations.

19 MR. AKER: Thank you.

20 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? Can I ask a  
22 real quick question of Mr. Aker? Thank you.

23 MR. AKER: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did you really get a  
25 citation for walking and texting?

1 MR. AKER: No, sir. No, I was -- it was  
2 driving. The cellular phone one?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Oh, okay. Okay.

4 MR. AKER: I don't know.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So it was driving,  
6 it was driving while texting or talking on the phone.

7 Okay. I got it. Thank you very much.

8 MR. AKER: I believe, that was a trick  
9 question. Yes, sir.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

11 MR. AKER: Thank you, everyone, for your time.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Albert Gibbs.

13 Hello.

14 MR. GIBBS: Good morning.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll hear from the  
16 investigator, and then we'll talk to you. Okay.

17 MS. IRIZARRY: Hi, good morning. Chief of  
18 Operations Lori Irizarry. I was assigned Mr. Gibbs's  
19 case. On his application, he disclosed two arrests that  
20 happened in 2007. At the time that he applied for  
21 application, he did provide court documents, from the  
22 beginning. So he fully disclosed it from the beginning.

23 What the cases were was a -- they're both out  
24 of California, Los Angeles, California. One was a  
25 burglary charge felony. And the other one was a felony

1 resisting an officer. He was convicted of the burglary  
2 charge only. The resisting of an officer was dismissed  
3 due to a plea negotiation.

4 Sentenced, he was sentenced. The sentence that  
5 he had was suspended. He was placed on probation for  
6 three years. He was sentenced to 90 days jail, credit  
7 time served. So he only ended up doing a little less  
8 than 60 days. He paid fines, paid restitution. In the  
9 court document, in 2011, after he paid all of his  
10 restitution, he never defaulted on his probation. In  
11 2011, once he completed his case, it was dismissed under  
12 1203.4 in California.

13 Since then, he has not had any arrests. His  
14 fingerprint report came back. Nothing prior to this  
15 offense, nothing after this offense has come up. And as  
16 far as I understand, he does not have or never possessed  
17 a gaming card or a work card from us before.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 MS. IRIZARRY: M-hm (affirmative).

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Gibbs.

21 MR. GIBBS: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Your turn.

23 MR. GIBBS: Like she said, I haven't, I haven't  
24 gotten in any trouble since. I don't plan on getting in  
25 trouble. I just want to -- I moved out here from

1 California to get away from all the negativity, start  
2 anew. I just want to be able to show my kids there's a  
3 better way than, you know, doing anything negative.

4 And I really want my provisional card so I can,  
5 you know, continue on working. I do work. I am  
6 currently employed for an agency, for Brady,  
7 Incorporated, but it's -- the contracts only last for  
8 two to three weeks. And I'm really looking for  
9 something more permanent. And I see that in security.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you give us a  
11 little bit about the criminal activity that was subject  
12 to the denial, a little bit of something about what all  
13 happened there?

14 MR. GIBBS: As far as the case or --

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah.

16 MR. GIBBS: -- the incident?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The incident.

18 MR. GIBBS: Well, I made an honest mistake. I  
19 made some bad choices following other so-called friends.  
20 And since then, I've distanced myself from them, type  
21 of -- from that type of activity, from that type of  
22 environment. And like I said, you know, I'm just trying  
23 to start anew.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

25 Any Board questions?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I'll be more  
2 specific.

3 Mr. Gibbs, on that burglary, did you burglarize  
4 your employer, did you burglarize your mom, did you  
5 burglarize a house, a car?

6 MR. GIBBS: It was a house, sir.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have a question,  
9 Mr. Gibbs. Did you get the burglary charge and the  
10 resisting arrest at the same time?

11 MR. GIBBS: Yes.

12 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: It was the same?

13 MR. GIBBS: It was the same day, same, yeah.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any further questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Were there any -- yes,  
16 Mr. Chair.

17 Were there any, any injuries involved in the  
18 burglary?

19 MR. GIBBS: I was injured. But no one else was  
20 injured.

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Was the house  
22 vacant at the time?

23 MR. GIBBS: No, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Were there people  
25 present in inside the house?

1 MR. GIBBS: No one was present in the house.  
2 Actually, it was my friend's ex-girlfriend's house. And  
3 he -- and he didn't actually tell me that he wasn't  
4 allowed in the house. We got inside of the house. He  
5 actually asked me to help him to, you know, retrieve  
6 some of his things that wasn't returned to him, at the  
7 time. And when he asked me to, you know, help him get  
8 his stuff, I wasn't aware of the situation.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have no further  
10 questions, Mr. Chair.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.  
12 How many kids do you have?

13 MR. GIBBS: I have three kids and one on the  
14 way.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Three kids on and one on  
16 the way?

17 MR. GIBBS: Yes.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How long have you been  
19 here in Las Vegas?

20 MR. GIBBS: Three months. I've been here since  
21 March, the end of March.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What have you -- when do  
23 you consider that you were outside the criminal element  
24 in your life?

25 MR. GIBBS: Actually, after everything was



1 taken care of, after the case was done, after everything  
2 was taken care of, I made sure. I distanced myself  
3 after I was released from jail. As soon as I was  
4 released from jail, I made sure I did everything that  
5 was required of me. And I just made sure I was nowhere  
6 near those type of people anymore. Because I see where  
7 it led me.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what kind of work  
9 have you done since then?

10 MR. GIBBS: Done security. Actually, before I  
11 left California, I had three jobs at the time. I was a  
12 massage therapist. I was doing security as well. And I  
13 was also working at Ross overnight.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board  
15 questions?

16 Entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion --

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll make a motion to  
19 overturn the denial and issue the work card to  
20 Mr. Albert Gibbs.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll second.

22 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second.  
24 Board discussion?

25 All in favor, say "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Four to one.

5 Congratulations.

6 MR. GIBBS: Thank you.

7 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Tybell, is it Tybell?

9 Brewer.

10 Shannon, any time you need a break, you just  
11 let me know.

12 (There was a brief discussion off the record  
13 with the Reporter.)

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Item number  
15 32 is up. We'll hear from the investigator first.

16 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. I denied  
17 Mr. Brewer for possession of a weapon out of Iowa. He  
18 disclosed that on his application.

19 His fingerprints came back, and he had 11 other  
20 arrests that were not disclosed. We don't know the  
21 disposition. I don't know if he was convicted on all of  
22 them. But there were numerous arrests.

23 In 2006, he had an unlawful use of a weapon out  
24 of Chicago. We know he got probation for that.

25 2005, he was three and a half weeks shy of his

1 18th birthday, carrying, possessing a concealed weapon  
2 and delivering cannabis.

3 December of 2005, criminal trespass, a  
4 residence, out of Chicago.

5 February 2006, possession cannabis, out of  
6 Chicago.

7 2007, in January, carrying, possessing firearm  
8 in public, and aggravated unlawful use of weapon.

9 February 2007, DUI, drugs and possessing  
10 cannabis.

11 September 2007, possessing cannabis.

12 November 2009, possessing cannabis.

13 January 2013, violating the Extradition Act.  
14 This was in Chicago.

15 May 2010, charged with OWI, which is a DUI.  
16 That was in Iowa. He was convicted of a misdemeanor.  
17 He was fined and spent some time in jail.

18 And then January 2013, which was actually the  
19 2010 that he listed, but the years were just off by a  
20 few years, the carrying the weapons out of Iowa, he was  
21 convicted of a misdemeanor on that, fined and jailed for  
22 90 days.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Brewer, what do you  
24 have to say?

25 MR. BREWER: As far as the last, the last case,

1 with Iowa, I was held over 90 days. I was held six  
2 months before I was released. So I pled out to be for  
3 time served on that charge at the time.

4 As far as the criminal trespassing, I was just  
5 sitting on somebody's porch, and they pulled me off, you  
6 know, and they locked me up for criminal, criminal  
7 trespass.

8 And my other charges as far as with the weapons  
9 charge, I mean I made a lot of mistakes. I mean I've  
10 been trying to straighten my life out. You know, I got  
11 a daughter on the way. She'll be here in September.

12 Like as far as, as far as the other, the other  
13 aggravated, aggravated weapons charge, they say I was  
14 discharging a firearm, and they felt that in -- found it  
15 in the house, not in my possession. And I just pled out  
16 for probation. So I was just, you know.

17 As far as the cannabis charges, I did get  
18 caught with cannabis, you know.

19 But, you know, at the end of the day, you know,  
20 I ain't trying to make up no excuses about what I have  
21 done. You know, I regret what I have done. And I'm  
22 just trying change my life for the better.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What led you to  
24 not disclose the majority of these charges?

25 MR. BREWER: I mean I got so many, like she

1 brought up, a lot of charges. I couldn't remember them  
2 all, you know what I'm saying? So I mean I remember the  
3 main one that I needed to remember, which was the gun  
4 charge. So I put it on there. You know, and I just,  
5 probably just -- you know, I got a lot, like she said, I  
6 got a lot of charges. You know what I'm saying? So  
7 it's hard for me to really remember the dates and the  
8 times and, you know, as far as everything.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

10 Any Board questions?

11 I'll entertain a motion.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we  
13 deny the appeal and go with the recommendation of staff.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I've got a motion. Do I  
15 have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment on the  
18 motion?

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll in favor -- oh, I'm  
21 sorry.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry. I'm going to  
23 support the motion. Sir, you just need more time and  
24 distance from -- and you need to be disclosing. It's  
25 that 2013 is too soon, particularly since it was a

1 weapons charge. So I just wanted to explain why I'm  
2 supporting the motion.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. All in favor,  
4 say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Hearing none, the appeal's denied.

8 MR. BREWER: All right.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 33, Bobby -- or  
10 Robby Hines. Robby Hines?

11 Okay. How about we'll trail number 33.

12 Number 34, Richard Sanders, or Saunders.

13 Hello.

14 MR. SAUNDERS: Good morning.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll hear from the  
16 investigator and then talk to you.

17 MR. SAUNDERS: Okay.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. Mr. Saunders  
20 did disclose this arrest on his application. He was  
21 arrested on November 21st, 2002 for discharging a  
22 firearm within the city. He pled guilty in January of  
23 2003, was convicted of a misdemeanor, and paid a fine of  
24 \$290. He only has one other arrest on his record. It  
25 was a DUI. There's been nothing since then.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Saunders, can  
2 you tell us the circumstances, sir, on the discharge?

3 MR. SAUNDERS: Yes. One of my good friends, he  
4 had a death in the family. He got handed down a  
5 single-bolt action .22. I lived in a small town,  
6 population less than 3,000, but it was in the middle of  
7 the Mojave Desert, California City, real small town.  
8 And we went out to a place in the middle of the desert  
9 where people would discard furniture and appliances.  
10 And there was an elevated road. And all this stuff was  
11 already shot up by -- we used to venture through the  
12 desert. Just we were kids. Like since we were 12, 13  
13 years old, we just went on little hikes and stuff.

14 We took the gun out. And we were shooting  
15 stuff that was already shot up, like shooting on the  
16 elevated thing down towards all the furniture and the  
17 appliances. And all we -- all we really know is that  
18 somebody must have heard it and called it in. Because  
19 before we knew it, there were four cop cars, fully  
20 automatic weapons. Like we didn't know any better, like  
21 we didn't know any worse. I was 18.

22 And we got charged with a discharging a firearm  
23 within city limits, paid our fines. And I haven't even  
24 used anything further than a water gun since then.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

1 Any other Board questions?

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just what year was the  
3 DUI?

4 MR. SAUNDERS: I don't even remember.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Not recently, I guess?  
6 In the last 10?

7 MS. DONALD: It's --

8 MR. SAUNDERS: Yeah, I don't believe so.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm just trying to get  
10 clear how many years ago it was.

11 MS. DONALD: Yeah, that was like 2003.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

13 MS. DONALD: It's been a while.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board  
15 questions?

16 Do we have a motion?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that  
18 Richard Saunders, that the denial be overturned and he  
19 be issued a registration.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Do we  
21 have a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any  
24 Board comment?

25 All in favor, say "aye."



1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

3 Carries unanimously. Congratulations.

4 MR. SAUNDERS: Thank you.

5 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Timika Andrews.

7 Hello.

8 MS. ANDREWS: Hi.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please get comfortable.

10 We'll hear from the investigator, and then

11 we'll talk to you.

12 MS. ANDREWS: Thank you.

13 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief of Operations Lori

14 Irizarry. Ms. Andrews was denied originally because she

15 listed a felony conviction on her application. When she

16 came into the office, she did list the felony

17 conviction. She was truthful about it. And she listed

18 three other arrests.

19 But she informed the Board staff at the time

20 that she was familiar that she had other cases, but she

21 didn't remember them all at that time. So at a later

22 date, she came in and provided court documents. The

23 court documents did reveal quite a bit of arrests, from

24 1988 to 2009 was the last one recorded. There were a

25 total of 18 arrests, some convictions, some were

1 dismissed. I'll just go over them quickly.

2 In 1988, assault, misdemeanor. She did three  
3 years probation and a fine. At the time, there was also  
4 a battery charge, which was dismissed.

5 In '91, transport, sell narcotics or a  
6 controlled substance. She did a one-year diversion  
7 program.

8 In '93, transport, sell controlled narcotics.  
9 Diversion program was successful, and the case was  
10 dismissed.

11 In '95 -- this is when the felony came about --  
12 she was charged with two perjury offenses. Both were  
13 dismissed. And she was convicted of fraud to obtain  
14 aid. She did 60 months probation, and they imposed a  
15 suspended sentence while she was on probation.

16 In 2004, she violated an order to prevent  
17 domestic violence. It was a misdemeanor offense. She  
18 had an additional 36 months of probation, a fine, and  
19 they suspended her sentence.

20 2005, battery on a person, convicted,  
21 misdemeanor, suspended sentence.

22 2005 again, battery on a peace officer or  
23 emergency personnel, without injury, 30 days jail.

24 2005, inflicted corporal injury on a spouse.  
25 They detained only the victim. That case was

1 somewhat -- I couldn't get the exact records. It seems  
2 that it was either dismissed or the case was  
3 unavailable, based on the domestic violence. So it was  
4 undetermined.

5 But in 2005, force with not using a firearm.  
6 They detained her only. The victim was unavailable. In  
7 2008 -- that charge was dismissed.

8 2008, disobeying a court order, misdemeanor  
9 offence, 120 days jail time and a fine.

10 And in 2009, there was a custody case or  
11 visitation that she disobeyed, which was dismissed.

12 Disobeyed a court order, obstructing a police  
13 officer, misdemeanor.

14 And then, again in 2009, obstructing a police  
15 officer, 90 days jail time.

16 I think, there's 2009. But like I said, she  
17 did come back and provide all this information. And  
18 this was confirmed with her fingerprint report that has  
19 come back as well.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 MS. IRIZARRY: M-hm (affirmative).

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Could you give us a  
23 little bit of a rundown what was going on in your life  
24 during this period of time?

25 MS. ANDREWS: Sure can. Santa Barbara County.

1 I have kids. I was asked all my -- my kids' custody.  
2 And, of course, I didn't want to surrender my kids. I  
3 broke -- I had an ugly relationship breakup. The  
4 relationship got deteriorated. That was my Santa  
5 Barbara case over my beautiful twins that I do not have,  
6 as we speak, because I was done so wrong.

7 And, basically, all the other stuff, I was  
8 young, and I didn't understand the system. But,  
9 however, the welfare fraud, I was really young and  
10 didn't understand the system. However, I worked, and I  
11 collected welfare. I worked my whole life. I didn't  
12 know I had to report the earnings. So they put, they  
13 stuck the felony on me. And, sir, I had never paid it  
14 back. However, I've been working.

15 But this other stuff is so hurtful because it's  
16 due to my kids' custody. And all that that arrest, I  
17 didn't give my kids up, and I did 30 days in Santa  
18 Barbara County Jail for kidnapping my own kids. I'm  
19 very stricken and hurt as we speak. But, however, I'm  
20 able to move on.

21 So all that other, like the two -- that's my,  
22 totally, family, my kids. Yeah, that's been so very  
23 hurtful, as I sit here right now, but I'm able to re --  
24 go on with my life. I moved here with my fiance. We're  
25 going to get married. And I'm just trying to be --

1 however, I run a cleaning service, and I'm working  
2 part-time, as we speak, cleaning, and that's my passion.

3 And I applied for the security job. I like  
4 people, and I like to do that. So I paid my fine. And  
5 I wanted to challenge myself. I wanted to see where I  
6 stand with my fingerprints. Yes, I did that for my own  
7 uses. And this is my result. So I did all of my  
8 paperwork to prove that.

9 But my last -- I'm just going to say this,  
10 Mr. Zane. It was over my kids' custody in Santa  
11 Barbara. That's all kids. I didn't give my kids up.  
12 And they did me so wrong. But I went through all that.

13 So all this new stuff is for my family, my  
14 kids. Yeah.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What happened that you  
16 stopped your criminal activity at a certain point in  
17 time until now?

18 MS. ANDREWS: Excuse me?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What happened in your  
20 life that you no longer have this ongoing criminal  
21 activity?

22 MS. ANDREWS: Well, like I said, my -- these  
23 last ones was my kids. I moved on with my life.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 MS. ANDREWS: However, the kids are still in

1 legal, and, but I'm okay with that. I came a long way  
2 since that. And I rescheduled my -- I changed my whole  
3 zip code, to move on with my life.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How old are your  
5 children?

6 MS. ANDREWS: My girls, my twins are 15.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 15?

8 MS. ANDREWS: Yes, sir. And it started when  
9 they were eight years old. All that, it started then.  
10 Of course, I was not understanding the system. I didn't  
11 know I had to give my kids up. I had a person that went  
12 to court on me and said that they served me. So I  
13 missed my court date. I but I had moved on out of the  
14 city to just handle it from another city. And they did  
15 me wrong. But it's okay. It happens. And I accepted  
16 that.

17 But, however, I'm not this person. And, you  
18 know, I just want a chance. And I got a chance here,  
19 and I'm asking you guys to consider me. Cleaning is my  
20 passion. And security is, also. I'm just here for that  
21 today. I'm just thankful that I got this chance to get  
22 on the Board and talk to you guys as well.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

24 MS. ANDREWS: Yeah.

25 \ BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So where are your girls,

1 your twins now?

2 MS. ANDREWS: My girls in are Palmdale.  
3 However, I'll see them summer. It's still an ugly  
4 situation, but I'm bigger than that. So they're going  
5 to come and see me.

6 And when we went to court, he never followed,  
7 he never followed the court orders. It was just a whole  
8 big mess. And I had to get away from it and travel from  
9 Victorville to Santa Barbara County to try to get all of  
10 them together. They're okay. You know, they're fine.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

12 MS. ANDREWS: It's been like, it was 2008, that  
13 was all of them, all my custody stuff. I promise you,  
14 I'm not -- I'm 48 years old, a half of 50, I mean half  
15 of a hundred almost. And, I mean.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And how long have you  
17 been in Las Vegas?

18 MS. ANDREWS: Approximately, I'll be here a  
19 year in September. I moved here in September from  
20 Victorville.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board  
22 questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have a question,  
24 ma'am.

25 MS. ANDREWS: Sure.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: On your batteries  
2 charges that were relatively in the 2008 time --

3 MS. ANDREWS: Yeah. I can tell you what  
4 happened. Wow. My car was parked, and the lady went  
5 around my car. And when I asked her, "How did you move  
6 your car, ma'am?" and she went, delivered on me. It was  
7 in Martha, I remember, out of state. And we had a  
8 shoving thing. It wasn't battery. I'm a lover, not a  
9 fighter. And it wasn't bad, and it's not -- no. Her  
10 car was in front of mine, and I just asked her how did  
11 she do that, and she pushed me, and it went from there.  
12 But I got arrested and -- yeah. Real simple.

13 I don't -- yeah, that's what happened, ma'am.  
14 Real simple, I got arrested for pushing and pushing.  
15 And she went around my car. And, actually, she had left  
16 a mark on my car. And, you know, it was a push and  
17 shove. So it was my property that she damaged. But  
18 that's okay.

19 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Yes, thank you.

20 MS. ANDREWS: Yeah, no problem.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I do, for the  
23 investigator.

24 I kind of lost track when you were going  
25 through that series. Number one, were there any



1 felonies, convictions?

2 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes, in 1995. Yes, in 1995,  
3 fraud, felony failure to obtain fraud, or fraud to  
4 obtain aid. She did 60 months probation, and they  
5 suspended the sentence.

6 MS. ANDREWS: Thirty years ago.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So what was, that  
8 was the welfare thing that you were talking about?

9 MS. ANDREWS: (Nodded head.)

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

11 MS. ANDREWS: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And, but there are no  
13 other felony arrests other than that?

14 MS. IRIZARRY: Correct. The rest were  
15 misdemeanors or citations.

16 MS. ANDREWS: Never. I'm not a bad person.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

18 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

19 MS. IRIZARRY: M-hm (affirmative).

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

21 Anybody have a motion?

22 I move that we overturn the denial and issue a  
23 card to Timika Andrews.

24 MS. ANDREWS: Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion and a  
3 second. Is there any question, or comment on the  
4 motion?

5 All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed, say "no."

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'm an "aye."

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're an "aye"?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That's correct.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Three to two. You get your card.

15 MS. ANDREWS: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please don't make us look  
17 like fools.

18 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

19 MS. ANDREWS: Thank you, guys.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Salvador Ruiz.

21 Feel free to grab any one of the chairs.

22 MS. JEPSEN: Kendra Jepsen. I'm an attorney  
23 with Nevada Legal Services on behalf of Mr. Ruiz.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Welcome. Can you give  
25 your bar number?

1 MS. JEPSEN: 14065.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

3 All right. Now we'll hear from the  
4 investigator.

5 MS. IRIZARRY: Okay. Mr. Ruiz -- Investigator  
6 Irizarry. In 2006, when Mr. Ruiz applied for his work  
7 card, he did list a DUI felony conviction. There were  
8 multiple notes from the previous PILB staff noting that  
9 they were aware that he had a felony conviction, and  
10 they issued him a work card at that time.

11 So his work card expired in 2011. From 2011  
12 till now, he had not had a work card. He came back in  
13 to get his work card. And at that time, at that time,  
14 due to the felony DUI conviction, that's why I went  
15 ahead and denied him his work card.

16 Since the 2006 offense, he has had no felonies.  
17 And when his work card expired in 2011, he was  
18 continuing to work in the industry.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Will you be  
20 addressing the matter, or do we ask him individually?

21 MS. JEPSEN: I would just like to say a quick  
22 statement, and then Mr. Ruiz would be okay with  
23 answering any questions --

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

25 MS. JEPSEN: -- you have for him.

1           Mr. Ruiz has been honest about his felony DUI  
2 the multiple times he's applied for his work card.  
3 Since he received his felony DUI, he's continued to  
4 attend AA meetings regularly. He attends church every  
5 Sunday. We also brought a letter from his pastor, if  
6 that's needed.

7           Before his felony DUI, he worked for federal  
8 correctional institutions, rehabilitating prisoners so  
9 that they could get out and make a better life for  
10 themselves after their mistakes. So Mr. Ruiz is,  
11 basically, just asking for the same --

12           MR. RUIZ: Consideration.

13           MS. JEPSEN: Yeah, the same thing. He just  
14 wants to move on from his DUI and be able to get back  
15 into the industry.

16           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

17           Mr. Ruiz, what's the circumstances behind the  
18 felony nature of the DUI; was somebody injured or  
19 killed?

20           MR. RUIZ: No.

21           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How did it get to  
22 be a felony?

23           MR. RUIZ: Actually, the two that I had, I was  
24 out sleeping in the car. I got the two DUI felonies  
25 because I had the ignition key, switch.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So the felony  
2 nature came by virtue of the prior two felonies, and  
3 then you were convicted of a third?

4 MR. RUIZ: Right.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 MR. RUIZ: So, like she said, you know, I came  
7 from Virginia 11 years ago. I used to work for a  
8 federal correctional prison, rehabilitating the inmates  
9 inside the prison system, also for the state, Coffeewood  
10 Correctional Facility, so they could enter back into  
11 society, and they --

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you slow down just a  
13 little bit, so she can keep up with you? There you go.

14 MR. RUIZ: So I've been in for three --

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Just a little bit slower,  
16 if you can.

17 MR. RUIZ: Okay. I came from Virginia.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: She's got all of that.  
19 Just --

20 MR. RUIZ: So I used to rehabilitate the  
21 inmates inside the prison system, so they could enter  
22 them back into society. And I used to put them in the  
23 places for work, because when we -- we have -- I've got  
24 foundries, incentives, auto, farms, factories. So we  
25 have out of our boundaries, outside prison land, as

1 well. So I used to put these inmates to work in the  
2 factory that we have outside.

3 Because then, being in prison and coming out,  
4 with having felonies, it was very hard for them to get a  
5 job. So, for me, was putting them to work so they can  
6 be productive for the state and which they could have  
7 performance.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

9 MR. RUIZ: So now, after 17 years on the job, I  
10 get this DUI because I got depressed, because I got laid  
11 off when the recession came to the United States. So  
12 all the inventory that we have here in the factories, we  
13 send it to Mexico, Mexico, for the labor costs. So I  
14 stayed and got a job. So I got really depressed,  
15 because I lose everything. Thank god, I didn't lose my  
16 wife and my kids. I'm still with my wife of 33 years.  
17 I got my two kids. And I got three grandkids for now.

18 So I just want to keep going with my life, my  
19 career, going back to criminal justice, and keep  
20 following the law, because I got my job, keep following  
21 the law.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

23 Any Board questions?

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah. I must have missed  
25 it. It's my fault. What year was the felony DUI

1 conviction?

2 MR. RUIZ: 2009.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No. I think, it was  
4 2006.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: M-hm (affirmative).

6 MS. IRIZARRY: Correct, I have 2006.

7 MR. RUIZ: 2006.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, I had a question,  
9 and that is of the investigator.

10 Did you indicate that he'd had a work card  
11 previously, and then it lapsed, and he was reissued the  
12 one in 2011, and now, because -- and so he was denied  
13 this time because we're doing the work cards now; is  
14 that what I understood?

15 MS. IRIZARRY: Yeah, similar. In 2006, they  
16 were aware of the felony DUI. They gave him a work card  
17 in 2006. It expired in 2011. From 2011 till now, he  
18 had not had a work card. So in 2016, now that he's  
19 applying, because I'm aware of the felony conviction, I  
20 denied his work card.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Got you. Okay. So he  
22 was issued -- and I'm assuming that was by Metro, he was  
23 issued the work card in 2006, in spite of the DUI?

24 MR. RUIZ: Yes.

25 MS. IRIZARRY: Correct.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board  
3 questions?

4 Okay. Entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I would move  
6 that --

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- Salvador Ruiz be --  
9 that the denial be overturned and that he be granted a  
10 registration.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is  
12 there a second?

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any  
15 Board questions on the motion?

16 All in favor, say "aye."

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, Mr. Chairman, I  
18 hate to be -- I know I'm talking a lot. And I'm trying  
19 not to. But my justification on this is he's already  
20 received the work card. He's worked in the industry  
21 subsequent to that, to that arrest. And he has 10 years  
22 since the arrest. And I just think it's appropriate for  
23 him to be granted a work card.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

25 All in favor, say "aye."



1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And any opposed, say  
3 "no."

4 Okay. Was there a no?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Not from here.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Good luck to you.

7 MS. JEPSEN: Thank you very much.

8 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We need to take a break,  
10 I think, for nature here, I guess. So 10 minutes.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: (Clapped.)

12 \* \* \* \* \*

13 (A break was taken, 12:08 to 12:23 p.m.)

14 \* \* \* \* \*

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We're ready to get  
16 going here.

17 Next subject up is John Eyler.

18 Oh, we're missing one?

19 MS. DONALD: Well --

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can I have you wait a few  
21 minutes?

22 MR. INGRAM: Please have him take a look and  
23 see if she might be able to --

24 MS. DONALD: You know what, I'll take care of  
25 it.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, okay.

2 MS. DONALD: Yeah, this is pretty short.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I guess, we're going to  
4 give you a shot.

5 MS. DONALD: Okay. Investigator Donald. His  
6 scenario is based on the 1970 felony conviction for, I  
7 believe it was weapons.

8 MR. EYLER: She just stepped in.

9 MS. DONALD: Counterfeit government section.  
10 Okay.

11 I was trying to help.

12 MS. IRIZARRY: I got it.

13 MS. DONALD: Okay.

14 MS. IRIZARRY: Okay.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're up.

16 MS. IRIZARRY: Okay. Chief of Operations  
17 Irizarry. Mr. Eyler applied for his application, and he  
18 disclosed on his application that in 1977 he had a  
19 felony conviction for counterfeiting. Due to that, I  
20 went ahead and withdrew his card. He had not had a PILB  
21 work card or a gaming card since 1977. He had a gaming  
22 card, it seems, though, when he worked the at Aladdin.  
23 But since then, that expired in '81. He hasn't had a  
24 card or industry since then.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sir, what would you like

1 to say?

2 MR. EYLER: In 1980, I got out of the pen. I  
3 applied for a job. And the girl says, "Oh, you have to  
4 talk to the sheriff." So I said, "Okay." So I talked  
5 to this undersheriff, Bannick. He said, "What did you  
6 do?" and I said, "Possession of counterfeit food  
7 stamps." He says, "Is that illegal?" and I said, "Well,  
8 evidently; the Treasury Department gave me three years."  
9 And he gave me a -- he said, "You didn't do anything  
10 against the State of Nevada." He gave me a gaming card.  
11 I went back a few years later and got a food server's  
12 card. And I want to be an unarmed security guard.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MR. EYLER: I mean and I'm in a little  
15 different situation. But I mean after 30 -- wouldn't  
16 you think, after almost 40 years, that, you know, that  
17 felony would have gone away? I mean I couldn't believe  
18 it when they -- when they denied me now.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

20 MR. EYLER: I mean I understand you people  
21 have, you know, companies and things like that, that can  
22 get, you know, probably people in trouble. But, you  
23 know.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board  
25 questions?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: One question for the  
2 investigator and just to be clear before we do motions.

3 There hasn't been any criminal activity since  
4 his conviction in '77?

5 MS. IRIZARRY: He indicated there wasn't, there  
6 has not been. But I have not received his fingerprint  
7 results since he applied just recently.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, considering that --

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anybody got a motion?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Considering that, if we  
12 get the fingerprints back and it shows contrary  
13 information, he'd be back before us, I'll make a motion  
14 to deny the -- to grant the appeal of the denial and to  
15 issue a work card.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is  
17 there a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or  
20 questions on the motion?

21 All in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

24 It carries.

25 Thank you, sir.

1 MR. EYLER: So where do I get the card? Thank  
2 you. Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 Nathalie Reinoso. Hopefully, I didn't  
5 mispronounce it too bad.

6 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: Nathalie ("NAT-a-lee").

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Nathalie ("NAT-a-lee")?

8 How about we trail that.

9 I'm going to mess this one up. Tamasepani  
10 Brown.

11 How bad did I do?

12 MR. BROWN: You did all right.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I did all right. Have a  
14 chair, make yourself comfortable.

15 I think, we have some documents on that.

16 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Or that's -- or the  
18 folder's empty.

19 MR. INGRAM: That's for which one?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Brown.

21 MR. INGRAM: Brown's, it actually ended up on  
22 individual. So go back.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Here?

24 MR. INGRAM: Yeah, and browse documents, under  
25 there.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. We'll  
2 hear from the investigator, and then we'll come back to  
3 you.

4 MS. IRIZARRY: Mr. Brown was denied because of  
5 a 2003 robbery third-degree felony conviction. He did  
6 list it on his application. And along with his  
7 application, he provided an immense amount of court  
8 documents, not only labeling the actual events, but the  
9 actual myriad of timeline of the events that occurred,  
10 the day of his arrest.

11 What you should have would be he also wanted to  
12 provide to the Board a few references, some being from a  
13 bishop of the Family Connection Center in Utah and the  
14 police sergeant from Utah as well.

15 So due to the felony conviction, that's why I  
16 denied him.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 Can you tell us the circumstances behind the  
19 conviction?

20 MR. BROWN: It was 2001 when that actually  
21 happened, fresh out of high school, first semester of  
22 college, Fulbright on merit, was a kid. Then I came  
23 home to visit, picked up some friends. They stole some  
24 things. They ran out, hit a -- hit one of the workers.  
25 And they charged us with aggravated robbery.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

2 MR. BROWN: So that was my only offense, ever.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you pled to it?

4 MR. BROWN: Yeah.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 MR. BROWN: It was hard to get back on the road  
7 to travel with the team. And I lost a year of  
8 eligibility due to it.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That was what sport?

10 MR. BROWN: Football.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I didn't think it was  
12 dance.

13 Any other Board questions?

14 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I do have one. Did you  
15 go back to college, did you go back?

16 MR. BROWN: I have 32 credits left. But I was  
17 going into teaching and coaching. And so the dean of  
18 the school called the judge, and the judge made a deal  
19 with me, is if I get my bachelor's, I can expunge the  
20 case. So it was weird, because I had to change my  
21 whole, my whole degree to go get a different bachelor's  
22 so I could go back into my teaching and coaching. It  
23 didn't make -- you know. So I had like 140 credits when  
24 I graduated. And I need 32 more, so. They made the  
25 road pretty tough, all this incident, but.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

2 Entertain a motion.

3 I move that we overturn the denial and issue a  
4 card. Is there a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'll second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Are  
7 there any questions on the motion?

8 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying  
9 "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, "no."

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Four to one. Go  
14 to work.

15 MR. BROWN: Thank you. Appreciate it.

16 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

17 MR. BROWN: Appreciate it. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Michael Boyea

19 ("Boy-yah").

20 MR. BOYEA: "Boy-yay."

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Boy-yay." Thank you.

22 Sorry. We'll hear from the investigator, and then we'll  
23 come to you.

24 MS. IRIZARRY: Okay. The applicant, when he  
25 applied, he did list felony, felony arrest and



1 conviction, as well as a weapons conviction.

2 When doing his background, it was determined  
3 that in 1999 he had an aggravated assault felony  
4 conviction out of Arizona.

5 In 2004, he had an aggravated assault, weapon,  
6 dangerous instrument, felony conviction out of Arizona.

7 In 2005, a conspiracy to kidnap, felony  
8 conviction out of New Mexico.

9 And since then, in November of 2012, a battery,  
10 misdemeanor offense, where he had a 180 days suspended  
11 sentence and 100 hours community service.

12 The fingerprint results did add an additional  
13 2002 charge of assault, domestic violence, misdemeanor  
14 offense.

15 Like I said, he did list these on his  
16 application. And he did provide additional court  
17 documents to verify the arrests.

18 Mr. -- I'm sorry. The applicant would like to  
19 do repossession here in Nevada.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you take the  
21 oldest and bring us up-to-date through the --

22 MR. BOYEA: Yes, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- newest?

24 MR. BOYEA: In 1999, I was a 16-year-old kid.  
25 I was in juvenile prison. There was a sexual predator

1 that was in there. And he -- he was in there for  
2 hurting a family member. There was an altercation. And  
3 I was charged as an adult for that. That's why I listed  
4 it. The --

5 MS. IRIZARRY: 2004.

6 MR. BOYEA: 2004 aggravated assault was in the  
7 state of Arizona. I was a foreman at a cotton gin out  
8 in Mojave Valley. The way that all of it is set up  
9 there is there is no self -- there was in self-defense  
10 statute in the state of Arizona at that time. I got  
11 a -- there was a gentleman that I had on my crew. He  
12 had recently got out of prison. We were working on the  
13 baler at the cotton gin. Some of the wires kept  
14 snapping. They hit him a few times. The individual got  
15 aggravated. He came after me. He's six foot two. I  
16 was 145 at the time, next to nothing. I defended  
17 myself. They were saying I used an instrument. But I  
18 am a registered boxer. And so that's what they charged  
19 me with.

20 The kidnapping case, I had a friend that was  
21 getting beat. Her boyfriend had continuously beat her  
22 up pretty bad. She finally got up the gall to call  
23 something, "Hey, I need out of this situation. He won't  
24 let me out of the house. He has me locked in the  
25 bedroom." We went and we attempted to get the

1 individual out of the house, at which time he brandished  
2 a weapon. And because he was moved more than 75 feet,  
3 the kidnapping case, I was charged with that.

4 And --

5 MS. IRIZARRY: 2012 battery.

6 MR. BOYEA: 2012 battery. Being in  
7 repossession, any of these, we -- we're not the best  
8 well-liked individuals by certain establishments,  
9 especially casinos. I am not from this area. I'm from  
10 a small town in the tri-state area. And it was -- I had  
11 an altercation, or was maced by a security guard at the  
12 Riverside Casino in Laughlin, Nevada. And they said  
13 that his hand was hurt, injured in the altercation. I  
14 was leaving property. I was detained. And I told the  
15 guy, I was like, "Dude, I'm leaving property.

16 There's -- I didn't do nothing." He maced me. And then  
17 I got tackled by three guys as I was exiting the  
18 property. Judge Atkins, I believe, was the judge on  
19 that case. He gave me community service and a fine.

20 I have a lengthy history, and I understand  
21 that. And, but I have been in the industry for six  
22 years. I have helped. I have worked with really good  
23 companies. I started out with probably one of the worst  
24 repossession companies in the state of Arizona, when I  
25 first started. But then I was taken on by Camping

1 Companies. I worked with Camping for two years. They  
2 gave me a chance. Because, you know, they don't hire  
3 felons. But they hired me, they gave me a chance. I  
4 worked for them for two years until we parted ways. I  
5 chose to leave them and choose to have a career here in  
6 Nevada.

7           Laughlin -- or I mean Las Vegas, the guys work  
8 half the time, make two times the money as what we make  
9 in Arizona. On the normal, working in Arizona, I can  
10 work 80 plus hours and maybe pull 25 cars. Here, I work  
11 40 hours, less than that, and pull 25 plus cars.

12           I just want a chance to prove and further my  
13 career. I have five children I support. Three I have  
14 50 percent of the time. Another, I am I single father  
15 of one child. I got my child back from Child Haven here  
16 in Nevada. They've trusted me with him, to do that.

17           I have, since all those charges -- if the  
18 timeline was correct on when the charges were, actually  
19 happened, they would all be within the 2003, 2004 area.  
20 I served four and a half years in Arizona State Prison.  
21 I was given a concurrent sentence in New Mexico for the  
22 kidnapping charge. It just ran concurrent with the  
23 four-and-a-half-year tail. I was on probation. I  
24 completed probation. And I've furthered and bettered my  
25 life from that point.

1 I started -- when I first got out of prison, I  
2 worked in a factory, and I worked at a Subway to -- now,  
3 from that point, I got a job at the Tropicana in  
4 Laughlin. I worked there as a busboy. I worked my way  
5 up to waiter. From waiter, I worked myself into valet.  
6 I was the first ex-con to be a valet attendant there.

7 From there, I got into the repossession. I was  
8 offered a job. I started off spotting cars, in my own  
9 personal vehicle, spotting vehicles, finding them. I  
10 spotted so many, they got me a truck. I picked up so  
11 many, they got me my own yard. And then I opened three  
12 other yards for the first company that I worked for.

13 This is my life, repossession is my life. It  
14 is all I know. It is my niche in society. And I'm good  
15 at it. And I just want a chance to go forward with my  
16 career here in the state of Nevada, if you guys would  
17 allow so.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who, what company have  
19 you worked for up till now?

20 MR. BOYEA: I worked with Camping Companies.  
21 And then I started to work with Bolo, but pending this.  
22 If I don't get my license, they'd put me on a standstill  
23 until I get my license. And I have three other job  
24 offers here in Nevada if I get my license.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So when you're

1 talking about the repossessions that you're doing here  
2 and what your earning capacity is, that --

3 MR. BOYEA: I'm comparing them to other agents  
4 that work in this area, yes, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Now, when you  
6 mentioned that you had the scuffle in Laughlin with a  
7 security guard --

8 MR. BOYEA: Yes, sir.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who were you working for  
10 then?

11 MR. BOYEA: I was working for RMS, Recovery  
12 Management Solutions, under James Lick and -- or James  
13 Lick and Erin Housey in -- out of Phoenix, Arizona.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

15 MR. BOYEA: The altercation was -- I wasn't  
16 repossessing from Laughlin. It was I had repossessed  
17 Justin Laughlin's car.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What were you doing in  
19 Laughlin?

20 MR. BOYEA: I was at -- we had went to the  
21 club, and there was debtors inside that -- from a  
22 previous thing when I repossessed a boat. The guys  
23 weren't too -- you know, there was a little bit of a  
24 yelling match. I exited. And then they tried to detain  
25 me.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. But you were never  
2 charged with any unlawful act --

3 MR. BOYEA: No. I'm sorry.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- work activities on  
5 that?

6 MR. BOYEA: It was just that when they maced  
7 me, it was, you know, a guy in -- that's why it was just  
8 a misdemeanor. I didn't.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board  
10 questions?

11 Oh, I have another. I forgot. Well, why  
12 didn't you list the 2002 on the application?

13 MR. BOYEA: What's that?

14 MS. IRIZARRY: It was a 2002 assault, domestic  
15 battery, in fact, domestic violence, misdemeanor  
16 offense.

17 MR. BOYEA: Oh, it was, it was dropped. It  
18 didn't -- I -- I had probably forgot it because it had  
19 been dropped. I've never listed it.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

21 MR. BOYEA: It was just -- and I apologize for  
22 the oversight.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

24 MR. BOYEA: It was dropped. It was just thrown  
25 out.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So the felony  
2 conviction was 1999?

3 MR. BOYEA: The first one, yes, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. The first felony,  
5 or the --

6 MR. BOYEA: First felony, yes.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And the second  
8 felony?

9 MR. BOYEA: I would say they all pertained to  
10 2003, 2004.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

12 MR. BOYEA: They were like right next to each  
13 other. And like I said, I got five kids. I've grown up  
14 quite a lot since then.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So it might sound strange  
16 to people, but Arizona is a nonregulated state.

17 MR. BOYEA: Yes, very much so.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you've had the  
19 opportunity to work there without getting any type of  
20 work card.

21 MR. BOYEA: Exactly. That's why I actually  
22 look forward to working in a regulated state. Because  
23 like I said, the very first repossession company I  
24 worked for, I wasn't taught the right way. Since then,  
25 I've took the CARS program. I've -- you know, I do



1 everything to learn more. I read the court dockets  
2 here, believe it or not. And that's why I'm applying,  
3 because when you guys started allowing ex-cons this  
4 chance, I wanted to be -- I want to further my career,  
5 and I know this is the place to do that.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 Any other Board questions?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we  
11 deny the appeal.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion to deny.  
13 Is there a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Is  
16 there a question, Board question on the motion?

17 All in favor of the denial, say "aye."

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry, Mr. Chair.

19 I just -- again, there's too much in too short  
20 a time for me to feel comfortable with you working in  
21 that industry.

22 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 All in favor, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
2 It carries unanimous. You can reapply in a  
3 year.

4 MR. BOYEA: Okay.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Jeffrey Lowe.

6 MR. LOWE: Good afternoon, everybody.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon. All  
8 right. We will hear from the investigator, and then  
9 we'll chat with you.

10 MR. LOWE: All right.

11 MS. IRIZARRY: The information obtained for  
12 Jeffrey Lowe is strictly coming from what he listed on  
13 his application. To date, his fingerprint results have  
14 not been received. And when we ran his initial  
15 background in the State of Nevada, so nothing came up  
16 for here in Nevada, because his offenses occurred in  
17 California.

18 Mr. Lowe listed a 1998 felony grand theft,  
19 grand theft auto out of California, conviction. And he  
20 listed the disposition as served time.

21 1999, a probation violation, which he listed as  
22 served time.

23 A 2001, a 2002 and a 2004 domestic violence in  
24 California, all of which he listed as served time.

25 So I denied him for the grand theft auto

1 conviction felony in California.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What were the  
3 circumstances behind your criminal history?

4 MR. LOWE: Well, first off, let me go ahead and  
5 state that there's probably going to be more. Actually,  
6 there is more. You know, okay. The time span is way  
7 out there as far as, as far as that goes. You know,  
8 I've been in Arizona for the state, or in the state of  
9 Arizona since 2007. All right. And I've had two  
10 incidences in -- not in the state of Arizona, one in the  
11 state of -- sorry. One in the state of California, and  
12 that would stem from my ex-wife's ex-husband. We can  
13 get to that later. But as far as the felonies were  
14 concerned, there's grand theft auto, grand theft with  
15 a -- theft of an auto, and then two counts of receiving  
16 stolen property.

17 I was young, and I'd hang out with the wrong  
18 crowd. You know, I grew up in the neighborhood up in  
19 Santa Ana. And it was in the city, well, I was living  
20 in the City of Orange most of the time. Anybody got a  
21 stolen car, give me the keys, there you go, go spin the  
22 wheels, go have fun., basically joyriding, you know.

23 Those four counts, dragged over, there was  
24 stuff in the car. You know, there was a set of  
25 identifications and stuff like this. Those were the

1 receiving stolen property. And the car was the grand  
2 theft auto and the theft of an auto.

3           Basically, you know, they convicted me. They  
4 convicted -- well, I got arrested in May of '98, I  
5 believe, and I was convicted in August. You know, I did  
6 some time, did some time on it and everything else.  
7 They put me on probation. I violated probation. Went  
8 back. Got out. Met my first wife, you know. You know,  
9 and she was 14 years my elder, you know, into drugs  
10 big-time. She sucked me back into the scene. I was  
11 working solid. I was doing good. I was installing  
12 garage doors, you know. And me and her didn't see eye  
13 to eye, you know, on certain things. You know, my  
14 hard-earned money was going to things I didn't want, you  
15 know. And I played the flute, you know. So I mean we  
16 got in arguments.

17           And she had a very colorful history as far as  
18 domestic violence with her ex-husband. And I believe  
19 wholeheartedly that she used that, you know, tool to,  
20 you know, to get what she wanted. And when she didn't  
21 get what she wanted, she made sure I got what she  
22 wanted, you know, by sending me back to prison and  
23 everything else.

24           So, you know, in the long term, I ended up  
25 doing a few parole violations. I ended up, you know,

1 seeing a few different state prisons in the state of  
2 California, you know. You know, the Chino State Prison,  
3 Soledad, Wasco, Lancaster. The very last time I seen  
4 prison was in 2004. I discharged my number in April  
5 of -- April of 2004, and I discharged from the court  
6 system.

7 And California's a very tough state to get out  
8 of the system. And you don't, you don't just simply  
9 walk away from it all, you know, as much as I would like  
10 to say it. You know, it's a very hard thing to do,  
11 because the system, you know, it kind of keeps you  
12 oppressed, you know. And it only takes one person  
13 pointing a finger to put you back in that bad situation  
14 again.

15 I had a few little -- or things, you know, in  
16 California after that, you know, time served, you know,  
17 that, basically, stemmed from the same woman, you know.  
18 And those are the domestic violences, you know. And,  
19 you know, I finally parted ways with her.

20 You know, in 2006, I met the woman of my  
21 dreams, you know. And even though we're to there, we  
22 ended up getting married, but even though we're divorced  
23 today, we are still together. You know, and I've raised  
24 her girls for the past ten years, called them my own.

25 I'm in the repossession industry now. I've

1 been in the towing industry for 12 years, all right,  
2 towing heavy-duties, you know, haz-mat loads. I'm  
3 approved through Homeland Security to tow, you know, tow  
4 hazardous materials loads, all right, i that tells you  
5 anything as far as, you know, being approved with my  
6 felonies and my criminal convictions and everything  
7 else. You know, they did a full, full background check.

8           And I'm approved through Homeland Security to  
9 move explosives, to move fuel, to move any type of  
10 hazardous materials, you know, anything out there, you  
11 know. And at any given time, when I'm doing that, I  
12 could do anything with that stuff I wanted to. And, you  
13 know, I've chosen to use my powers wisely, you know.

14           I managed a towing company for three years down  
15 in Kingman, Arizona, called England Towing. And I was  
16 privy to sensitive information. And I didn't abuse it.  
17 You know, I took a company that was in the red \$85,000,  
18 and I made them flourish, you know. I had to do a  
19 little bit of liquidation and everything else, but, you  
20 know, I made it happen, you know, and paid off their  
21 trucks in three years, you know, put them in the black.  
22 I think, we still made money. Things were good, you  
23 know. We parted ways. You know, I wasn't making enough  
24 money, everything else, and I had some underwriters, you  
25 know, that were floating me, you know, and giving peace

1 to my company.

2 And I -- the reason I didn't disclose some of  
3 the stuff and everything else is for the sheer fact that  
4 I don't remember it, you know. I shut it out. I block  
5 it out. I don't want to, I don't want to remember that  
6 stuff, you know. And there's not enough paper there,  
7 you know.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So when your prints come  
9 back, what other things are we going to learn?

10 MR. LOWE: It's, basically, all the same stuff,  
11 you know. You know, with my first ex-wife, the domestic  
12 violence was a big mistake, you know. And, you know,  
13 my -- the most recent ex-wife, you know, Julie, she got  
14 me away from all that, you know. And I will say there  
15 were drugs involved, you know, up until, up until, until  
16 we moved to Arizona on July 1st of 2007, you know. And  
17 there were gangs involved and such, you know.

18 And I have a very colorful history, you know.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So from 2007, you should  
20 have a clean criminal history on your FBI report?

21 MR. LOWE: There was two incidences. Let's  
22 see. In two thousand and -- gosh, I don't even remember  
23 what the date was, to be honest. We were going through  
24 a huge custody battle her daughter, my oldest daughter.  
25 She's 21 years old. But it must have been about five

1 years ago or so. And her dad is a private investigator  
2 in the state of California, state of Nevada and a couple  
3 other states. And so he's very familiar with custody  
4 battles and such like this, you know, so he's very good  
5 at taking stuff like this and using it to his advantage  
6 to get what he wanted. You know, and he was fighting  
7 the custody battle.

8 I had bought my daughter a phone. And he took  
9 that phone away from her, to where she couldn't call her  
10 mother when she needed to or anything else. I went down  
11 to the state of California to go retrieve the cell  
12 phone. I had called the Orange County Sheriff's  
13 Department, and I had let them know that, I let them  
14 know that, you know, he has this cell phone, we want it  
15 back, you know, we want to make sure that, you know, my  
16 daughter Destiny is able to be able to call her daughter  
17 and such. Okay. Go around the corner from his house  
18 and meet us there. Like I did. I did. First time in  
19 my life I listened to a peace officer, you know, first  
20 time.

21 And, you know, I go there. I'm sitting there  
22 waiting. And I got, you know, my youngest daughter, you  
23 know, the 19-year-old, I got her there. She must have  
24 been about, you know, maybe 13. You know, she's in the  
25 car. My wife's in the car, you know. And the sheriff



1 pulls up, and he goes, "Let me go talk to him real  
2 quick." He pulls around the corner, comes back, there's  
3 three cops, they take me at gunpoint.

4 And he had forged. There is a process server  
5 in the state of Arizona, that actually resides in  
6 Florida, and it's an old friend of his, and he forged  
7 his name on the process server paperwork. I had no idea  
8 that I had a protective order. And I, honestly, had no  
9 idea that I wasn't supposed to be within X amount of  
10 feet. But I mean, you know, to my testimony, and I'm  
11 the one that initiated the sheriffs being out there, you  
12 know. And I was never in front of his house. I was  
13 arrested for it, you know.

14 And I violated the protective order through  
15 telephone contact. He called up my daughter while she  
16 was visiting us in Arizona, and he made her cry. Lost  
17 it. There were some things that were, you know, under  
18 the line there. And I wasn't going to have it. I got  
19 on the phone with him, I told him, I said, "You don't  
20 ever make this little girl cry again, never, ever,  
21 don't." You know, and I did some community service for  
22 it, you know.

23 Another one was, was the other one, the -- to  
24 be honest, I don't even remember if they dismissed the  
25 case or not, the one that happened in California. But

1 the violation thing, you know, they just had me do, they  
2 had me do community service. And I did that.

3           There was one issue about a year and a half  
4 ago, or something like that, in Arizona, got dismissed.  
5 You know, I was inside a store, and a gentleman made a  
6 comment about my wife's breasts, if you will. And we  
7 joked about it, you know. We let it go, and everything  
8 else. A few minutes later, the guy brandished a firearm  
9 at me. It was in the Smith's grocery store, you know.  
10 And I walked up to him, I stuck my hand on his gun, you  
11 know, and I told him, "Just don't you ever do that to me  
12 again, ever."

13           And, you know, I was just letting him know, you  
14 know what I mean. I -- you know, that makes me nervous,  
15 that an individual can walk around with a gun on his hip  
16 and everything else and just brandish it to whoever he  
17 wants, and everything else. It was concealed, and he'd  
18 taken it, you know, lifting up, lifted it up and then  
19 started, you know, put his hand on it. You know, and  
20 that disturbed me, you know. And I would rather take  
21 the upper hand in the situation, you know.

22           And since, since, I've learned a lot, you know.  
23 I mean I was down there. And thank you very much for  
24 the privilege of coming down to see that memorial, by  
25 the way. You know, something on that wall really struck

1 me, you know, that says that people -- people that  
2 values its privileges above its principles soon loses  
3 both. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

4 I was, I was a people that, you know, valued my  
5 privileges above my principles. You know, and, I lost  
6 it all, a number of times, started over with nothing  
7 about a hundred dollars getting out of prison every  
8 time. You know, I -- I'm not that guy anymore.

9 Last year in June, I gave myself to the lord.  
10 I was baptized, you know. I go to Connection Point  
11 Church in Kingman, Arizona. I could have came here with  
12 probably a dozen letters, you know, from law enforcement  
13 officials that I've worked with over the past, you know,  
14 over the past nine and a half years in Kingman,  
15 including the chief of police.

16 I can do it. I want me to be my testament. I  
17 want me to be the one that can prove to you folks that  
18 I'm worthy to work in your state. You know, I mean I  
19 enjoy coming here. I bring my family here. We go play.  
20 We go to the mall, stuff like this, you know. We play  
21 in the lakes, you know. I -- you know, as Mike before  
22 me, you know, I mean, you know, there's money to be made  
23 here.

24 My boss wrote me a letter. And I don't know if  
25 you all want to read it. You know, it's up to you

1 folks, you know. But, you know, he's just stating that  
2 I'm worthy, you know.

3 I've been in the industry down in Arizona for,  
4 you know, since, you know, as far as in the repossession  
5 industry, since December 28th of 2015. You know, since  
6 then, I've repossessed 250 cars. You know, I'm  
7 averaging about 50 cars a month and doing good, you  
8 know.

9 And I didn't get all dressed up today, you  
10 know. I came with a set of jeans, cowboy boots and a  
11 button-up, you know. This is how I jump into my tow  
12 truck.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MR. LOWE: You know, I come to debtors' doors.  
15 You know, I talk to them about the said debt looking  
16 just like this. You know, I'm no different, you know.  
17 If I could come in a business suit, I like getting  
18 dressed up. It's cool, feels good, you know. You know,  
19 I like to tie the tie and everything else. But I wanted  
20 you folks to see me as I am in the industry, you know.  
21 Well spoken, you know. I do my best to work with every  
22 single one. You know, and if I can, you know, set up a  
23 time and location, you know, to repossess that vehicle,  
24 and I get to close on that case, they pay, you know.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

1 MR. LOWE: I'm very diligent in what I do, and  
2 I do it correct. I've been perusing over the fair debt  
3 collectors act, and I want to abide by that, you know.  
4 I've looked over the service members civil liberties act  
5 and everything else as well, you know, and I want to  
6 abide by that as well. You know, my boss, my boss is  
7 tuning me up, and he's gotten me the binder for the CARS  
8 certification test. I'm looking forward to that.

9 You know, when I was in the towing, just the  
10 towing and recovery, you know, sector, I had, I had  
11 excelled. I went to the California Tow Truck  
12 Association, you know, and got my credentials to, you  
13 know, run a tow truck professionally and to actually,  
14 you know, be good at it. You know, I mean I was a  
15 certified professional. I also went with Wes Wilburn at  
16 the American Towing & Recovery Institute and got my  
17 credentials there. So not only, you know, am I good at  
18 this, I'm a certified professional with tow trucks.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We're going to  
20 have to cut around now. Any Board questions?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I do have a question for  
22 staff. In your experience, how much longer do you think  
23 before we get the complete background back on the  
24 fingerprints?

25 MS. IRIZARRY: He applied, he applied on,

1 excuse me, May 9th. And it usually takes anywhere, at  
2 the minimum, two to three months. We've looking right  
3 now, at in time of year, around three months, so mid to  
4 late August.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, this isn't a  
6 motion, but I'd feel a lot more comfortable after we get  
7 the complete background package. I'm leaning towards  
8 tabling this till that comes in. If I was forced to a  
9 vote today, I don't think it would be to the benefit of  
10 the applicant.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything further?  
12 Do we have a motion?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I have a  
14 question of counsel.

15 Ms. Palmer, do we have to, we have to either  
16 act on this appeal at this point, or can the applicant  
17 ask for it to come back when the rest of the information  
18 is in?

19 MS. PALMER: The applicant can agree to have it  
20 tabled.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: At this juncture, would  
23 you request that this matter be tabled until the next  
24 quarterly meeting?

25 MR. LOWE: I am completely fine with it.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah?

2 MR. LOWE: (Nodded head affirmatively.)

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That being the case, do  
4 we have a motion to table that?

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion, then,  
6 that we table this, at the request of the applicant, to  
7 our next scheduled meeting to allow time for a complete  
8 background investigation to be completed.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And we have a second.  
11 Motion and a second. Any Board questions on the motion?

12 All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
15 September.

16 MR. LOWE: You got it.

17 Is there anybody I should get in contact with  
18 as far as any letters of recommendation?

19 MS. IRIZARRY: I'll switch here.

20 MR. LOWE: Thank you very much. It's been  
21 interesting.

22 MS. IRIZARRY: M-hm (affirmative).

23 MR. LOWE: Thank you very much.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yolanda Peters?

25 MS. PETERS: Good morning.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are  
2 you?

3 MS. PETERS: Fine, thanks.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You've been here before,  
5 right?

6 MS. PETERS: Yeah.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll hear from  
8 the investigator, and then we'll come over to you.

9 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor here.  
10 And as you just mentioned, Ms. Peters has been here  
11 before. This is her third time here. And the first  
12 time she was here was December of 2014. And, and she  
13 was originally denied by staff for a weapons conviction.

14 And in the Board meeting in 2014, she informed  
15 the Board that the weapons conviction was from a -- the  
16 police stopped her in her vehicle, and they found the  
17 weapon in her vehicle. And at the time, Board staff  
18 didn't have all the information, so it was tabled to the  
19 next Board meeting. So no decision was made at the  
20 time.

21 And then, at the next Board meeting, we -- she  
22 came before the Board, and it was found that her  
23 conviction was not from a gun being placed -- found in  
24 her vehicle, it was from a gun conviction at her home at  
25 the time. And there was a -- her and another gentleman



1 in her home. And she had, according to the police  
2 report, and just paraphrasing, she pointed the gun at an  
3 individual in her home. And that was what she was  
4 convicted of at the time, for that.

5 So at that Board meeting a year ago, she was  
6 denied. And now she's back here a year later. She  
7 applied again, and she's back here. And since then, she  
8 has not had any convictions, any citations, any arrests  
9 at all.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good.

11 MS. BATCHELOR: Yeah.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ms. Peters.

13 MS. PETERS: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Your turn.

15 MS. PETERS: I -- what do you want to know,  
16 sir?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Just the circumstances  
18 surrounding. Act like you've never been here before.

19 MS. PETERS: No, no, I was just -- no, I didn't  
20 know where we were going. I had made a mistake. I was  
21 like really nervous. I knew what I was arrested for. I  
22 was not trying to lie, because it's on paper. I was  
23 just drawn and was just not myself that day. There was  
24 an incident that took place in my home. And every time  
25 I lie, it's in the record. So I was just finding out.

1 So forgive me if it seemed like that.

2 And it did happen, I do believe, in 2003. It  
3 was possession of a firearm, something that I'll never  
4 forget, because I have to live with it, something stupid  
5 that happened to me. And I'm sorry that it happened,  
6 because I've always been an upright citizen. I was a  
7 federal correction officer, ex-military. And I just --  
8 this is something that I have tried to live down, never  
9 tried to lie about it, but go on with my life from  
10 there. Because I made mistakes, and I'm trying to make  
11 amends for those mistakes.

12 And that's all I'm trying to do right now with  
13 my life is get on with my life. I was a security  
14 officer up until 2014, until my card expired, and then  
15 that brought me here. But ever since then, all I've  
16 been trying to do is do is just get my life back in  
17 order, you know. And if it hasn't been for the vets --  
18 that's who's housing me right now -- I would be on the  
19 streets. So I'm thankful to them for helping me out.  
20 And trying to get my life back in order, trying to get  
21 my back on -- I'm nervous still -- back on track.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

23 MS. PETERS: And I thank you guys for listening  
24 to me.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thanks.

1 Any Board questions?

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I got a question for  
3 staff. Just confirming, that is the only criminal  
4 matter, was the pointing of the firearm back in '03?

5 MR. BATCHELOR: It was actually 2000 and that  
6 that happened. She hasn't done anything since then.  
7 But in '97, she does have a battery conviction. And in  
8 '98, she has a DUI conviction. But those are the only  
9 two things previous to the firearms conviction.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ms. Peters --

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any questions -- go  
12 ahead.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You mentioned you worked  
14 as a corrections officer for the United States  
15 government. Can you expand on that?

16 MS. PETERS: Yes, sir. I was hired in, I  
17 think, I do believe it was '92, with the USP, Lompoc  
18 federal penitentiary.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And why did you leave  
20 their employment?

21 MS. PETERS: Because of the possession of a  
22 firearm.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

24 MR. INGRAM: Chairman?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other, any other

1 questions?

2 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I just have one. You  
3 left Lompoc in two thousand --

4 MS. PETERS: I think, it was 2003 or 2004.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Oh, and these were just  
6 after the --

7 MS. PETERS: Yes. Yes, ma'am.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Ingram.

9 MR. INGRAM: Yes, I just wanted to bring to the  
10 Board's attention that the statements that Mr. Batchelor  
11 had said, in reviewing the transcripts, a year ago, you  
12 know, Ms. Peters has testified today that she did not  
13 intentionally provide incorrect information. Reading  
14 the transcripts, we're very clear that she gave  
15 fraudulent information under oath to the Board about the  
16 incident where -- and she emphatically stated that it  
17 was a simple case of her driving down the road, getting  
18 stopped for a traffic stop, and having a weapon in the  
19 back seat, when, in fact, that was far from the truth.

20 As the police reports indicated, she held the  
21 gun to this gentleman's head in her home and made  
22 statements that were pretty obvious to that gentleman  
23 that she intended to take his life at that time. And  
24 that is reflected in all the police reports.

25 Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

2 Entertain a motion.

3 I move that we uphold the denial, based upon  
4 her perception of questionable veracity.

5 Is there a second?

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment?

8 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

11 Ms. Peters, you're denied.

12 MS. PETERS: May I just say one thing here?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

14 MS. PETERS: I would like to see the records.

15 I never held the weapon to anyone's head. I don't know  
16 where this information is coming from. I would not have  
17 been here and wasted your Board's time for something  
18 like that. I never held this gun to the person's head.  
19 It was a possession of firearm. This person tried to  
20 attack me. I never got any of those records stating  
21 that, no. But, and I know, I never held this gun, my  
22 gun to this person's head. I would like to see that  
23 proof, because I never, this never happened. I swear to  
24 you, this has never, that never took place.

25 And I would never have wasted the Board's time

1 applying for this card if that took place. I just would  
2 like to see this information.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ms. --

4 MS. PETERS: Because I never held a gun to  
5 anyone's head.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ms. Peters, I didn't deny  
7 based upon the fact that you held the gun to somebody's  
8 head or not. I denied because on the previous occasions  
9 that you've been here, under sworn testimony, you lied  
10 to this Board.

11 MS. PETERS: No, sir. I just made it clear.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You've said the gun was  
13 found in a car.

14 MS. PETERS: Car. It happened that way, also,  
15 sir. And then I said to the officer, to the  
16 investigator, that I, because I was so shaken, because  
17 the person said that I had become combative with the  
18 police officer, I got confused, and then it did take  
19 place. I did not get taken for the weapon in my car.  
20 And I didn't, I couldn't go back and say, because it  
21 seemed like I was lying, but I had never tried to lie  
22 that this was possession of a firearm in my home. I  
23 never tried to lie about that, because it actually  
24 happened.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a procedure in

1 place where you can make a filing for a Freedom of  
2 Information Act. And, also, if you contact the PILB  
3 staff, they would be happy to make you a copy of what's  
4 available.

5 MS. PETERS: I'd like to see that. Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 The next is James Boone. James Boone?

8 Well, we'll trail James Boone.

9 MR. BATCHELOR: Actually, it's not on the  
10 agenda today. Remember, Kevin, he's supposed to be  
11 taken off for -- Mr. Boone, he was a CFI.

12 MR. INGRAM: Oh, absolutely, yes. I'm sorry.  
13 He did request to not appear today. So he has been  
14 removed.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

16 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 44, Lakqueitha Batiste.  
18 Did I get you right?

19 MS. BATISTE: Yes.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. How are you?

21 MS. BATISTE: I'm fine.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll listen to the  
23 investigator, and then we'll hear what you got to say.

24 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.

25 Ms. Batiste was denied her work card for a 1999 felony

1 forgery conviction in Louisiana. And since then, there  
2 are no convictions, or any before that, that that's her  
3 only conviction. And that's why she was denied. And  
4 she also listed it on her application as a misdemeanor.  
5 When we got her fingerprints back, we found out that it  
6 was a felony as well. And then that's it.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell me the  
8 circumstances behind that conviction, that case?

9 MS. BATISTE: Yeah. I was 18 years old. I had  
10 a -- my best friend had stolen someone's personal check.  
11 And at the time, I had just opened up a checking account  
12 with a brand-new bank. She didn't have one. She asked  
13 me would -- at the time, I didn't know it was stolen.  
14 She asked me would I be able to cash it for her. And I  
15 told her that she had to be with me because she had to  
16 sign it as well as me.

17 And when we signed it and then got ready to  
18 cash it, that's when I found out it was a stolen check.  
19 If I would have never signed my signature on it, nothing  
20 wouldn't have never happened to me.

21 But I did get arrested. I didn't do any time.  
22 I got out on my option R -- OR. They gave me a two-year  
23 probation and \$1,400 court fee.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 MS. BATISTE: And that was it.



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. And  
2 nothing since then?

3 MS. BATISTE: No.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you have any kids,  
5 family?

6 MS. BATISTE: I just got married, with no kids.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You just got married?

8 MS. BATISTE: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what kind of business  
10 are you -- or what kind of work are you looking to get  
11 into?

12 MS. BATISTE: I was -- until I got denied, I  
13 was working for Allied Barton.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

15 MS. BATISTE: Security.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?  
17 Entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, I --

19 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'll make a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I do have just  
21 one question for clarification before either joining a  
22 motion or vote. And it's for the applicant, if I may go  
23 back to her, sir?

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You heard before that

1 there's a discrepancy about you claiming it was a  
2 misdemeanor and although it was a felony. Can you  
3 address that, please?

4 MS. BATISTE: The reason, I was, I was told  
5 that once I paid off the \$1,400 court fees that I had  
6 and the two-year probation, it would drop down to a  
7 misdemeanor. But it didn't. I thought it did, but it  
8 didn't. And I never followed up on it to see if it did  
9 or didn't. That's why, when I filled out the  
10 application, I put it down as a misdemeanor, because  
11 that's what was I told. But, obviously, it didn't.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Do we have a motion?

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I'd move that the denial  
16 be reversed.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a  
20 second. Any Board comment?

21 All in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
24 Congratulations.

25 MS. BATISTE: Thank you.

1 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Adonis, Adonis Cuffee?

3 Adonis Cuffee?

4 We will trail that.

5 Arnold Carter?

6 Welcome. Ready?

7 MR. CARTER: Yes.

8 MS. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.

9 Mr. Carter was denied for a March 1993 felony possession  
10 of cocaine conviction and a July of 1993 felony drug  
11 abuse conviction, both in Ohio. And he was also  
12 convicted of operating a vehicle impaired in 2007 in  
13 Michigan. And he did not list any of these on his  
14 application. I'm sorry. He did. He did. He did list  
15 them on his application. He did list them. And  
16 that's -- that's all.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sir, what's the  
18 circumstances behind the '93?

19 MR. CARTER: Actually, I was young, dumb. And  
20 I was in the bar with a young lady, and we were doing  
21 some things we shouldn't have been doing. She kind of  
22 convinced me to do some things I shouldn't have did.  
23 And for that reason, I got charged with possession of a  
24 controlled substance. I actually pleaded out to drug  
25 abuse and ended up going to jail for four and a half

1 months. And that's my first time getting in trouble.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And then the '07 driving  
3 while impaired?

4 MR. CARTER: I was -- had just moved to  
5 Michigan. And at the time, I was having problems  
6 sleeping, sleep insomnia. And someone had told me, if  
7 you smoke some marijuana, it might help you sleep. And,  
8 unfortunately, the next day, when I was driving after  
9 working out, I was kind of swerving in the car because I  
10 was getting dizzy. And then, when the cop pulled me  
11 over, I told him, actually, I had smoked some that  
12 night. So they took me to the hospital and gave me a  
13 drug test. And that's how that came about.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And pretty much that's  
15 it --

16

17 MR. CARTER: That's it.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- for the criminal  
19 justice system?

20 MR. CARTER: That's it.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board questions?

22 Entertain a motion.

23 I'd move that we overturn the denial and issue  
24 a work card. Is there a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Motion and a  
2 second. Any Board comment on the motion?

3 All in favor, say "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
6 Congratulations.

7 MR. CARTER: Thank you.

8 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Paul Nader? Paul Nader?  
10 Trail.  
11 Johnny Carrillo?

12 MS. MORGAN: I'm sorry for this. I'm here on  
13 behalf of Johnny. He had an emergency.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what is your name?

15 MS. MORGAN: Brittany Morgan.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What can we help  
17 you with?

18 MS. MORGAN: Can I be here to represent him?  
19 I have all the paperwork and documents and everything.

20 MR. BATCHELOR: And I have been working with  
21 her on the telephone.

22 MS. MORGAN: Yeah.

23 MR. BATCHELOR: So.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 MS. PALMER: Well, she's not counsel. So she's

1 not representing him in a counsel capacity. I mean I  
2 don't -- to the extent that you might need information  
3 directly from him. I mean, worst-case scenario, you can  
4 decide to table it.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 MS. PALMER: I think.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Go ahead.

8 MR. BATCHELOR: Okay.

9 MS. MORGAN: Thank you.

10 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.  
11 Mr. Carrillo was denied for a 2006 conspiracy to commit  
12 assault with a deadly weapon and possession of a  
13 dangerous weapon convictions. They were at the same  
14 time. And then he was also convicted of a DUI at the  
15 same time as well. And on his application, he only  
16 listed the 2006 DUI and not the other two convictions.  
17 And that's all that he's done.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

19 MS. MORGAN: The weapons charges were as a  
20 result of the DUI. Somebody did get hurt during the  
21 DUI. And that's what the weapons charges were from.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: They used a motor vehicle  
23 as a weapon?

24 MS. MORGAN: Yeah, that's what they were saying  
25 that the weapon was, was the motor vehicle.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

2 MS. MORGAN: And it was 10 years ago, the 2006.  
3 Is that right?

4 MR. BATCHELOR: M-hm (affirmative).

5 MS. MORGAN: And he hasn't gotten in any  
6 trouble since. He -- I'm his actual fiance. I just  
7 had, we just had a baby, and he's just trying to work.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And why isn't he, why  
10 isn't he here today?

11 MS. MORGAN: He's actually just gotten a job  
12 offer that he had to take in case he got denied this.  
13 So we couldn't risk it.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Yes, sir.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.  
16 I have to say, we don't -- this is a difficult  
17 situation. But Mr. Carrillo is not here, he's not  
18 testifying, he's not sworn. I can't make a decision on  
19 this, this item, without having him here speaking on his  
20 own behalf.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board  
22 questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: We're not even in a  
24 position where he can request a continuance on this.

25 MS. PALMER: Mr. Chairman, you can do that if

1 you want to do that. Or you can act on it today.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If the Chair would accept  
3 it, I would just make a motion that this be continued to  
4 the next regularly scheduled meeting, but, if the Chair  
5 will accept that motion.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

7 Is there a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment,  
11 questions?

12 All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

15 The matter's continued. So he will need to be  
16 here in September.

17 MS. MORGAN: In September. Okay.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Himself or by a lawyer.

19 MS. MORGAN: Okay. Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 Let's see. We're at Pamela Battiste.

22 Good afternoon.

23 MS. BATTISTE: Good afternoon. How are you?

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. We'll hear from  
25 the investigator, and then we'll come to you.



1 MS. BATTISTE: Thank you.

2 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.

3 Ms. Battiste was denied for her 1984 felony mail fraud  
4 conviction in Pennsylvania. And she's had no other  
5 convictions before that or since then. And she did not  
6 list the felony conviction on her application.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. First, can you  
8 tell us about the circumstances about the conviction?

9 MS. BATTISTE: It was so long ago that I  
10 completely forgot about it, because it was back in  
11 Philadelphia, and I was married back then. And my  
12 life's completely different.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MS. BATTISTE: So it was like I didn't even  
15 think about it, to be honest with you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 MS. BATTISTE: Because I have a sheriff's card.  
18 That's why. I mean if I would have known that I would  
19 have had to put that down, then I would have put it  
20 down.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How long have you  
22 had a sheriff's card?

23 MS. BATTISTE: Long time. Since '95, I think.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do you recall the  
25 events that ended --

1 MS. BATTISTE: Yeah, after I'd spoken to the  
2 woman in Pennsylvania, yes, I did recall what happened.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

4 MS. BATTISTE: I was married at time. And if I  
5 remember correctly, my ex-husband -- well, I did  
6 whatever he said. I was one of those, I'd do it. It  
7 was an abusive relationship. So I kind of did whatever  
8 he said. If he said, "Jump," I jumped. I was a kid. I  
9 didn't know any better.

10 And, apparently, we got into like a fake car  
11 accident. And there was like 250 people that all were  
12 involved. And we got in front of a judge. And she  
13 sentenced me to five years probation and a restitution  
14 of \$1,000. And then he paid everything back. And I  
15 left shortly after that.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did you do any  
17 jail time?

18 MS. BATTISTE: Oh, no. No. Hm-m (negative).  
19 I never did anything before. I mean she, basically,  
20 took my side, because I didn't -- I was stupid. Let's  
21 put it that way.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And how old were you in  
23 1984?

24 MS. BATTISTE: I was 26. But I had met my  
25 husband when I was 20.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what have you, what  
2 all have you been doing since?

3 MS. BATTISTE: I'm been working, taking care of  
4 my two children.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Without that guy?

6 MS. BATTISTE: Oh, yeah. I left him right  
7 after that. The judge, basically, took my side, and I  
8 went with her, basically.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Any  
10 other Board questions?

11 Any Board motion?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that  
13 Pamela Battiste be granted -- that the denial be --

14 MS. KLEMME: Be reversed?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, reversed. I'm  
16 sorry. That the denial be reversed and that she be  
17 issued a registration card.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second? Okay.  
20 Any Board question or comment on the motion?

21 All in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
24 Congratulations.

25 MS. BATTISTE: Thank you. Thank you very much.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Pesa Sitaga, Sit --  
2 someone's going to have to help me.

3 MR. SITAGATA: Sitagata.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sitagata?

5 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sorry about that.

7 "PEES-ah" or "PAY-sah"?

8 MR. SITAGATA: "PES-ah."

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "PES-ah." Okay. You've  
10 been sworn, right?

11 MR. SITAGATA: Yes.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

13 MR. BATCHELOR: Okay. Investigator Batchelor.  
14 Mr. Sitagata was denied for two counts of a 1995 felony  
15 assault with a deadly weapon in Santa Ana, California.  
16 And he's also convicted of a misdemeanor vandalism at  
17 the same time as that. And in the court documents, it  
18 did state that the felony counts will be reduced to a  
19 misdemeanor after the probation was served. And, but I  
20 have -- we have no documents that show that they were  
21 reduced. And, also, he did not list any of these  
22 convictions on his application. And that's all he's  
23 done.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us why you  
25 didn't include these?

1 MR. SITAGATA: I didn't list it because I had a  
2 sheriff's card, too. I get a sheriff's card, so I  
3 figured probably they have no felony.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You have to speak up a  
5 little bit.

6 MR. SITAGATA: I got a sheriff's card. So I  
7 figured I didn't have no felony or anything.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you thought you didn't  
9 have anything?

10 MR. SITAGATA: No. And, plus, it was back in  
11 '94, '95.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

13 MR. SITAGATA: 20 years ago, so.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: When did you get your  
15 sheriff's card?

16 MR. SITAGATA: Four years ago.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Four?

18 MR. SITAGATA: Yes.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what do you do for a  
20 living?

21 MR. SITAGATA: I work security.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: At a casino?

23 MR. SITAGATA: No. I do like with when movies,  
24 movie companies, you know, we're security for the  
25 equipments and all that.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, okay.

2 MR. SITAGATA: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you work for anyone in  
4 particular?

5 MR. SITAGATA: No.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh. Okay. Okay. What  
7 are the circumstances around the crimes?

8 MR. SITAGATA: It was my younger brother Gabby  
9 into a fight, and I jumped in to help. And we got  
10 locked up. And I did time, paid fines and everything.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How much time did you do?

12 MR. SITAGATA: Three, three weeks.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Three weeks?

14 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board  
16 questions?

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, Mr. Chair.

18 What was the weapon that was involved?

19 MR. SITAGATA: I never had a weapon.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You never had a weapon?

21 MR. SITAGATA: My brother, and I jumped -- had  
22 a bat. So they charged me and my little brothers with  
23 the bats again. But I never had a weapon.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have no further.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you able to hear?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Well, I had a hard time  
2 hearing. Was it a bat? Is that what he said?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: He said --

4 MR. SITAGATA: My younger brother had a bat.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

6 MR. SITAGATA: He's the one that had the  
7 weapon.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So there was a bat  
9 involved in the altercation, correct?

10 MR. SITAGATA: Yes.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

12 MR. SITAGATA: But I didn't have the weapon.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I got it. Thank  
14 you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: What type of employment is  
17 your sheriff's card for?

18 MR. SITAGATA: A couple of my friends, they do  
19 security work for movie companies. And that's what I  
20 need it for. Just watch the equipments and all that,  
21 and that's about it.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So it's for security  
23 officer?

24 MR. SITAGATA: Yes. Or why I need the card?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So, no, we're trying to

1 find out --

2 MR. SITAGATA: Why did I need?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, what work did you  
4 do under this sheriff's card?

5 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah, that was it.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

7 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah, just basic security, yes.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who employed you?

9 MR. SITAGATA: My friends.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Your friends?

11 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do they have a  
13 security company?

14 MR. SITAGATA: No.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh.

16 MR. SITAGATA: We were working through some  
17 other companies. So they called me if I want to come  
18 work, and I said, "Okay." So that was about it.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And how much time did you  
20 spend working in that environment?

21 MR. SITAGATA: Not, not long, a few days.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Just day stints?

23 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah, a couple of weekends.  
24 That's about it.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But what else have you



1 done for work to get by in the last four years?

2 MR. SITAGATA: Well, a couple of my friends,  
3 they do security, private security jobs. So. And  
4 that's why I'm asking to get the card. It's because I  
5 need that card from -- to work with them.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So they're as  
7 licensee?

8 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you need be  
10 legitimate to go work for them?

11 MR. SITAGATA: Yes, so I can work.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: When was the last time  
16 you did security work?

17 MR. SITAGATA: Couple of years ago, three, four  
18 years ago. I haven't been working. I'm still looking  
19 for -- I'm still looking right now.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Just a question for staff  
23 and my edification. If you have a work card from the  
24 sheriff's department for security, do you also need a  
25 work card from us? I'm missing something here. And

1 this is for staff, not for the applicant.

2 MR. BATCHELOR: Yeah, we would honor their work  
3 card to work for a licensee. Is that what you're  
4 asking?

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Correct. So do we have a  
6 dual system in Nevada where you could get a work card  
7 from the sheriff's office to work in security and not  
8 need one from us?

9 MR. INGRAM: No, not that I'm aware of. The  
10 sheriff's card normally is allowing them to work in  
11 other industries. You know, if he was working in gaming  
12 and casinos, or something like that, it would be a  
13 gaming card. But I'm not aware of a sheriff's card  
14 permitting them to work private security at all. In  
15 fact, that would be a violation of our laws. And he  
16 could potentially be facing unlicensed activity by  
17 providing security.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And for the investigator,  
19 Mr. Batchelor, have you seen this work card that he says  
20 he has?

21 MR. BATCHELOR: No, I haven't.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

23 MR. INGRAM: Do you have it with you?

24 MR. SITAGATA: Sheriff's card?

25 MR. INGRAM: Yeah. Could I take a look at it?

1 MR. SITAGATA: Yes. I wasn't using the  
2 sheriff's card for private security. I was using it  
3 just for security.

4 MR. INGRAM: Well, any kind of security, even  
5 if you're working for a movie company, movie company,  
6 like at Cinemacore, they're required to have work cards  
7 through us, and they're required to be licensed. So the  
8 company may have employed you without -- may have  
9 employed you without having a license through us. What  
10 was the name of the company that you were working for?  
11 I know you said it was friends, but.

12 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah.

13 MR. INGRAM: Oh, this is a gaming card. Okay.  
14 So this is different. This is issued by Las Vegas  
15 Metro. It's not their sheriff's card. This is a  
16 non-gaming, which allows him to work unarmed security  
17 within a casino environment.

18 MR. SITAGATA: Okay. That's --

19 MR. INGRAM: Is that what you were doing?

20 MR. SITAGATA: Yeah.

21 MR. INGRAM: Okay. So that is legitimate.

22 MR. SITAGATA: Not a sheriff's card, then.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That's what I understood  
24 it to be. I just was -- the applicant probably  
25 accidentally is confusing me. But thank you for the

1 clarification.

2 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. Thank you. No, that's  
3 it.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board  
5 questions?

6 Any Board motion?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'll make a  
8 motion that Pesa Sitagata be -- the denial be reversed  
9 and he be granted a registration card.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Do we  
11 have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a second. Any  
15 Board questions or comments?

16 All in favor, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

19 Congratulations.

20 MR. SITAGATA: Thank you.

21 (There was applause In Las Vegas.)

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Connie Jones?

23 Good afternoon.

24 MS. JONES: Good afternoon.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Make yourself at home.

1 You were here earlier, got sworn?

2 MS. JONES: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

4 MS. JONES: Investigator Batchelor. Ms. Jones  
5 was denied for her 1982 felony burglary conviction in  
6 California. And she also was convicted of petty theft  
7 twice, once in 1979 and once in 1980. And she also did  
8 not list any of these convictions on her application.  
9 And that's, that's all she's done, nothing before that  
10 and nothing since then.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ms. Jones, can you tell  
12 us why you didn't put it down?

13 MS. JONES: Yes. I put down petty theft  
14 because I did do that. The burglary, I do not know  
15 about, it's not one of the things I know about. I had  
16 my identity theft, and twice. And here, it is in  
17 California. The police do know about it. And there was  
18 an investigate -- I'm nervous -- investigation  
19 pertaining to that. And it was on file.

20 But the one about the petty theft, I did put  
21 that down as a misdemeanor.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

23 APPLICANT/ATTORNEY: And I scribbled it down.  
24 But I didn't put the box to X.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

1 MS. JONES: Burglary, I don't know nothing  
2 about.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do we have the  
4 fingerprint results?

5 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes. That's how we found the  
6 felony conviction, was from her fingerprints.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And that agency listing  
8 was who?

9 MR. BATCHELOR: It was Norwalk, California.  
10 The FBI had her fingerprints. So that was -- it showed  
11 a 1982 felony burglary conviction. Yeah.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you live in Norwalk,  
13 California in 1982?

14 MS. JONES: No. No, sir. No.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, your fingerprints  
16 are saying that you -- somebody rolled your prints, and  
17 they're classified.

18 MS. JONES: I didn't, no, sir. In 1982, I was  
19 at 1619 West Crescent, Apartment C-17. I had my  
20 daughter in '77. My mom died in '80, and I moved, and  
21 I've been in Anaheim ever since. I did not live in  
22 Norwalk. You said Norwalk, sir?

23 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, ma'am.

24 MS. JONES: I'm not aware of it.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

1 MR. BATCHELOR: Sometimes it does --

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If you'd accept a motion,  
4 I'd be willing to make a motion.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I move that the denial be  
7 reversed and that Ms. Jones be given her registration  
8 permit.

9 Ms. Jones, I would suggest you find out why  
10 that record is on there. But this is 24 years ago. I  
11 think, time, enough time has passed.

12 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Do we have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: 34 years. I'm sorry.  
16 Correct the record.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do I have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board  
20 questions or comments on the motion?

21 All in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Opposed, "no." Me, no.  
24 Congratulations. Go through the FBI.

25 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What do we have?  
2 Isaac Savala.

3 Good afternoon.

4 MR. SAVALA: How are you doing, sir?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. We'll go through  
6 the investigator, and then we'll --

7 MR. INGRAM: Has he been sworn?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you here earlier and  
9 got sworn this morning?

10 MR. SAVALA: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 MR. BATCHELOR: Okay. Investigator Batchelor.  
13 Mr. Savala was denied for carrying a concealed weapon  
14 without a permit in July of 2013 here in Las Vegas,  
15 which was a misdemeanor. And, also, in 2015, he was  
16 convicted of petty larceny here in Las Vegas. And, also  
17 in 2014, it's possession of a stolen vehicle here in  
18 Las Vegas as well. And he did not list any of these  
19 convictions on -- I'm sorry. He did list these  
20 convictions on his application. He listed them. That's  
21 all he's done.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So 2013 CCW, 2014  
23 possession of stolen property?

24 MR. SAVALA: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And 2015?



1 MR. SAVALA: Pardon?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 2015 was what?

3 MR. BATCHELOR: Petty Larceny.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us  
5 about those three events?

6 MR. SAVALA: Yes, sir. With the concealed  
7 weapon, I had a boot knife that I bought from Big 5.  
8 And I had it on my shoe. And I as I was riding my bike,  
9 my pants, they covered it up. And I was stopped by a  
10 officer in North Las Vegas because I didn't have a light  
11 on my bike. And when he asked me did I have any weapons  
12 on me, I said, "Yes." And he asked me where it was, and  
13 I said, "It's on my shoe." And when I looked down,  
14 that's when I seen it was covered up. And I was  
15 arrested for concealing a pocket knife. And I did one  
16 day credit time served, and they gave me a misdemeanor,  
17 and they let me go on that.

18 With the weapons -- what is it? It was  
19 receiving stolen property, for possession of a stolen  
20 vehicle. I bought a moped off of Craigslist. It came  
21 back stolen a week after I had it. I was also stopped  
22 on that motor vehicle because the taillight was out.  
23 When the officer stopped me, I let him know I just  
24 bought it. And they ran the plates and everything. It  
25 came back clean.

1           Later on that week, they did come back to my  
2 house and they told me that it was stolen. At that  
3 time, I did not have the moped in my possession. It was  
4 over at the guy's house that I bought it from because he  
5 was going to fix it for me. And then we drove up over  
6 there. The guy wasn't there at the time. And so I was  
7 arrested.

8           And, I guess, when went they back, or whatever  
9 it is, and they seen that I had no whereabouts that it  
10 was stolen, they dropped it down to attempted possession  
11 of a stolen vehicle. What's it? Transferring, you  
12 know, it was transferring of a stolen vehicle, and they  
13 gave me the gross misdemeanor.

14           And I took my brother to the store for the --  
15 what was it? What was that last one, sir?

16           MR. BATCHELOR: The petty larceny.

17           MR. SAVALA: The petty larceny. He decided to  
18 take something from the store, and I was with him. At  
19 that time, I was on probation from the moped. And I  
20 came in contact with the police officers, which violated  
21 me, which caused me to go inside. And I did eight  
22 months in. And I got out on house arrest. I paid my  
23 house arrest. I started working.

24           And I'm just looking to try to further my  
25 education and my work experience.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

2 MR. SAVALA: I am a registered firearm carrier.  
3 And I do want to be in a police law enforcement, and  
4 that's one of my goals.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board  
6 questions?

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, I do, Mr. Chair.  
8 Do we have any -- to the investigator, do we  
9 have any paperwork, police paperwork indicating,  
10 collaborating his story there about the moped or  
11 anything?

12 MR. BATCHELOR: No, we don't have any police  
13 reports. This is all from his FBI fingerprint report.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

16 MS. PALMER: Mr. Chairman, if the Board has  
17 concerns about wanting to validate what he says, I mean  
18 that's what happened in the prior investigation with  
19 Ms. Peters.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Correct.

21 MS. PALMER: They obtained the police report.  
22 Because the Board should be satisfied that this person's  
23 suitable.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, I'm done. I'm

1 good. Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is anybody prepared for a  
3 motion?

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? Mr. Chair?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I'd move that the  
7 denial be upheld. And I'll state my reason once the --  
8 if there's a second on the motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion  
11 and a second. Discussion?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: We're talking things that  
13 have all happened within the last three years,  
14 consistent pattern. I mean for me to be comfortable  
15 with Mr. Savala being in the industry, I'd have to see  
16 that that history is long time ago. So that's the  
17 reason for my motion.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board  
19 comment?

20 We have a motion to deny, a second. All in  
21 favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

24 Carries unanimous. You can reapply in a year.

25 MR. SAVALA: Okay.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

2 Frederick Hines?

3 Good afternoon. Have a chair.

4 (The Reporter requested a brief break.)

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, can we take  
6 five minutes?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

8 \* \* \* \* \*

9 (A break was taken, 1:50 to 1:57 p.m.)

10 \* \* \* \* \*

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are we ready to go?  
12 Okay.

13 MR. HINES: Okay.

14 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.

15 Mr. Hines was denied his work card for a 1993 carrying a  
16 loaded firearm in public in Long Beach. It was a  
17 misdemeanor. He had no convictions before that and no  
18 convictions after that. But he did not list the  
19 conviction on his application. And that's it.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Hines, is there a  
21 reason that you chose not to list it?

22 MR. HINES: I forgot it, sir. It happened so  
23 long ago, it was very long, and it's been a very long  
24 time ago.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

1 MR. HINES: And I did not do it intentionally.  
2 It was in my friend's bag. And I was never told not to  
3 look in a woman's bag. It was in her bag. She had a  
4 small satchel, shoulder. And I tried to go to return it  
5 to her. And then, when I went to go to return it,  
6 that's when I found out there was a gun in the bag. And  
7 then she even built me up that weekend, because she felt  
8 so bad what had happened. I spent in jail on the  
9 weekend. I did some community service. And that was  
10 it.

11 And they told me, when I went to go finish and  
12 pay the fine, that it would be off my record. So I did  
13 not know that it would still pop back up.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

15 Any other Board questions?

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just confirming, it was a  
17 misdemeanor, right?

18 MR. BATCHELOR: That's correct.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

20 Mr. Chair, are you prepared for a motion?

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman, I move that  
23 the denial of Frederick Hines' registration be reversed  
24 and that he be granted registration.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do we have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I got a first and a  
3 second. Any questions or comments on the motion?

4 All in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Congratulations.

8 MR. HINES: Thank you, sir. Thank you. Thank  
9 you, everyone.

10 (There was applause in Las Vegas.)

11 MR. HINES: Now, so do I still need to go to  
12 Long Beach to go get this expunged off my record?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It probably would. I  
14 don't know if you got to go there, but it would probably  
15 not hurt to have somebody address it.

16 MR. HINES: I can do it here?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, you can have legal  
18 aid or somebody out there do it for you.

19 MR. HINES: Okay. So I mean would it still pop  
20 up as applying for other jobs, I mean?

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It'll always be there  
22 until you remove it.

23 MR. HINES: So go to Long Beach, pay the fine,  
24 and be done with it?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You probably should seek

1 a lawyer's advice from legal aid and let them help.  
2 Even the local legal aid here probably has a brother or  
3 sister over there.

4 MR. HINES: Because, like I say, it happened so  
5 long ago that I forgot about that. I mean I was like  
6 19, 18, you know. And I did not know the gun was in the  
7 bag.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Never hurts to redo it if  
9 you can. If I had a chance to do it all over again, I'd  
10 be better looking.

11 MR. HINES: Thank you. I appreciate  
12 everything.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.  
14 Gary Ahquin. Sorry about that.

15 MR. AHQUIN: Yes.

16 BOARD MEMBER ZANE: Yes, sir.

17 MR. BATCHELOR: Okay. Investigator Batchelor.  
18 And Mr. Ahquin was declined for a December 2006 felony  
19 possession of marijuana for sale in Compton, California.  
20 That's his only conviction. He hasn't done anything  
21 before that or since then. He didn't list it on his  
22 application. But after I talked to him, he did amend  
23 that application and fill out an arrest history form.  
24 But he originally did not list it on his application.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you know the reason



1 why you didn't put it down?

2 MR. AHQUIN: I really forgot about it. Like  
3 when I first got arrested for the charge, it was a  
4 three-year joint suspension, which is I didn't know  
5 nothing about. I was 18. So like I really didn't know  
6 what it was about. She just told me I could get out of  
7 jail today, and it sounded good to me, like because I  
8 wasn't a jail-type person. I took the deal and then  
9 wind up telling them that I was going to do the  
10 probation and going to pay my restitution fee and do the  
11 CalTrans, which is I didn't do, so I wind up absconding,  
12 going to Barstow. And that's where they caught me.  
13 They sent me back. And then I did my time for it, which  
14 is, what, 350 days in the county jail, Los Angeles  
15 County Jail?

16 MR. BATCHELOR: I believe so.

17 MR. AHQUIN: 350, I think. I'm not sure. I'm  
18 not going to say, then, look it up for you. But, yeah,  
19 basically, that was it, the joint suspension and the  
20 restitution fee. I absconded because I didn't want to  
21 go to jail. I was scared to go back. So I wind up  
22 going back to jail. She gave me the same offer again  
23 and said, "Well, you can get out today. You'll still  
24 have to continue your probation and your CalTrans and  
25 your restitution. Or you want to do a county ledge,

1 which is a year in county?" And I was like, well, I'll  
2 take that," and get out just to a straight, clean slate.

3 Then I moved out here. And they gave me the  
4 opportunity California didn't give me, you know. So I  
5 started working in security. I was just working with  
6 three and a half months. I just started working last  
7 month. So I came by and got a spot, a new place. And  
8 my girlfriend's pregnant, got five kids, one on the way.

9 So I really need the second chance. I hope you  
10 guys look over it, because I really want to stay in  
11 Vegas and not have to go back out there to California to  
12 nothing again. I need to provide for my family and live  
13 like everybody else, like normal people do. It just  
14 doesn't feel good having five kids and not being able to  
15 do nothing for them.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Right.

17 MR. AHQUIN: It's pointless.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What was the  
19 circumstances around the charge?

20 MR. AHQUIN: It was, basically, I was at the  
21 wrong place at the wrong time, went back to my old  
22 neighborhood. I moved to Long Beach, went back to  
23 Compton to visit my old friends and family, wind up  
24 hanging out. And, I guess, the police was just doing a  
25 regular ride-by and seen my cousin bringing a DVD

1 player, which is to the house that we was at, that  
2 house. And he told me, "You come here." I heard him  
3 say, "Come here." And he dropped the DVD player, and he  
4 just started running.

5 So when he starts running, I guess, everyone  
6 came through the yard, and they came in. Everybody was  
7 like running everywhere. Knowing that the area I was  
8 in, it was like drugs is always sold around, I knew what  
9 was kind of going on. But I didn't know nobody had any.  
10 I was just going to see my family and just keeping  
11 moving. But I happened to be the last one in there.  
12 And I didn't run because I didn't feel like I had to run  
13 from them. I didn't have any on me, I had nothing in my  
14 possession at all.

15 So, I guess, when they took me out the house,  
16 they found the bag of marijuana on the side of the  
17 house, not in my possession, under a tire.

18 So that's what happened with that.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board  
20 questions?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: What year was the charge?  
22 Remind me.

23 MR. AHQUIN: 2006, the ending of 2006, which is  
24 nine and a half years. On the 28th, on my birthday, it  
25 would have been 10 years.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

2 Entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we  
4 reverse the denial for Gary Ahquin and issue him his  
5 work card.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Do I  
8 have a second? Any comment or discussion, question on  
9 the motion?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm going to oppose the  
13 motion. This isn't something you just forget. It  
14 should have been included on the application. It should  
15 not have had to have been brought to the attention of  
16 our investigator. So I'm going to oppose the motion on  
17 that basis.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other  
19 question, comments?

20 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed, say "no."

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No.

25 Three-two. Congratulations. You barely made

1 it.

2 MR. AHQUIN: Thank you. Appreciate that.  
3 Thank you. God bless you all.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Clyde Edelbaum.

5 MR. EDELBAUM: Good afternoon.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you?

7 MR. EDELBAUM: Very good, thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

9 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.  
10 Mr. Edelbaum was denied for his 1983 felony unauthorized  
11 use of a vehicle in New York. He's also been convicted  
12 of trespassing in 1979 and had a misdemeanor promotion  
13 of gambling in 1979, a misdemeanor obstruction of  
14 governmental administration in 1983, and misdemeanor  
15 possession of a controlled substance in 2008. And all  
16 of those convictions were also in New York. And he did  
17 not list any of these convictions on his application.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us why you  
19 didn't put them down?

20 MR. EDELBAUM: I didn't even know -- it was a  
21 long time ago. And I didn't even know they were  
22 felonies, it wasn't even a felony. They all happened  
23 when I was a kid, 20 or 30 years ago. I'm retired. I  
24 worked for Verizon for 30 years. And I came down, was  
25 just looking to do some security work, and I -- you

1 know, to supplement my income. And some of the stuff  
2 here happened when I was in my 20s. So I didn't realize  
3 they go back that far. And it was really a childhood  
4 thing, you know.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what did you  
6 do for Verizon?

7 MR. EDELBAUM: I was a technician and a frame  
8 torcher for 30 years. I just retired. I came down,  
9 bought a house over here and sold my house. And I was  
10 hoping to do security work here, to supplement my  
11 income, you know. I keep busy. I can't stay home till  
12 1:00 in the morning.

13 And I didn't even know, the driving with that  
14 car, I didn't know. I thought that was always a  
15 misdemeanor. I never knew that was a felony, until they  
16 told me, you know. And that's about it. And nothing  
17 else I can say.

18 The controlled substance was, at that time was  
19 my medication in the car, which wasn't in the bottle.  
20 So they -- you know, I was arrested for Vicodin and your  
21 Perkies. But I had the prescription, at the time with  
22 the court. I showed it to them. And that was taken  
23 off. You know, and I paid a fee. They gave me a fine.  
24 And that was it. I didn't do time, that it was a  
25 misdemeanor. And that's about it.

1           The car, I think, I did 30 days for that, or 90  
2 days for that. What happened was following some kids.  
3 You're young, you know. And they rented a car with a  
4 credit card. I was driving the car. I got caught. I  
5 did 90 days. And then I went back to work. It was  
6 crazy. In Brooklyn, everything is not normal. And  
7 that's about it. Hm?

8           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board  
9 questions?

10          BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one now,  
11 Mr. Chair. What was his last date of arrest?

12          MR. BATCHELOR: In 2008 was when he had that  
13 controlled substance conviction.

14          BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. And that was not  
15 listed, either, on his paperwork?

16          MR. BATCHELOR: Yeah, nothing, nothing was  
17 listed.

18          BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Mr. Chair?

19          BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else? Board  
20 comments, questions?

21           Entertain a motion.

22          BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I move that the denial  
23 remain.

24          BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion. And is there a  
25 second?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: First and a second to  
3 uphold the denial. Any Board questions or comments?

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, again, lack of  
5 disclosure when -- I mean 2008 was eight years ago. It  
6 was an arrest, and there was a conviction. Lack of  
7 disclosure, I mean 30, 30 or 40 years ago, I don't know.  
8 But eight years ago, I would, I would know if I would  
9 have been arrested. And I'm struggling with that. So  
10 lack of disclosure is really my basis for supporting the  
11 motion.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other  
13 comments?

14 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."  
17 Carries unanimously. You have the opportunity  
18 to reapply in a year.

19 MR. EDELBAUM: Reapply now?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: In a year.

21 MR. EDELBAUM: Oh, in a year.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah. Make sure you  
23 disclose all of that. You do have the opportunity to  
24 work for somebody that's not for hire in public, a  
25 casino. They don't have to come before us.



1 MR. EDELBAUM: Right. Well, the reason I  
2 didn't put that down was I wasn't really thinking about  
3 it, because it wasn't a felony. I thought it was just  
4 felonies they wanted. I didn't put.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: If you go back and read  
6 it, it's asking you for everything.

7 MR. EDELBAUM: I really realize it now. It's  
8 some many years. After seven years. I'm Italian.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.  
10 Lawrence DiVetro.

11 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, I'll be representing  
12 the Board on this case in the absence of Mr. Yarborough.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MR. INGRAM: October the 12th, 2014,  
15 Mr. DiVetro was arrested for burglary and impersonation  
16 of a police officer by the Henderson Police Department.  
17 He had entered Sunset Spa and Massage Parlor and  
18 demanded sexual favors. When he was refused, he told  
19 the worker that he was a Henderson police officer and  
20 that she was under arrest. He stated he was going to  
21 check with his supervisor and then walked out.

22 When he was arrested --

23 Am I going to fast, Shannon? I'm sorry.

24 THE REPORTER: It's okay if you want to slow  
25 down.

1 MR. INGRAM: Yeah. When he was arrested, he  
2 had a gold badge and handcuffs on the seat of his car.

3 On August 5th, 2014, he pled not guilty to one  
4 count of burglary, a felony, and one count of  
5 impersonation of a peace officer, a gross misdemeanor.  
6 He was sentenced in December. Or he was to be sentenced  
7 in December, but it was postponed until January 2015.

8 He had a guard card that was active at the  
9 time. It was set to expire in 2018. And he was  
10 employed at the time with Roeline Security &  
11 Contemporary Services Corp., which is one of our  
12 licenseholders.

13 After a little bit of back-and-forth with  
14 Investigator Yarborough, he -- and conversations with  
15 legal counsel, Mr. DiVetro had his work card. However,  
16 he did not go to work for anyone during the time. And  
17 after consultation with legal counsel, we determined  
18 that we would give him the opportunity to relinquish his  
19 guard card, the reason that it was placed on the agenda,  
20 in lieu of being brought before the Board for revocation  
21 of his card.

22 He voluntarily relinquished his card. He  
23 waited a period of time and is reapplying to appeal --  
24 which, at that time, we denied him -- so that he can  
25 plead his court, his case in front of the Board today.

1 I did supply you some medical documents as part  
2 of your packet. And, hopefully, you've had time to  
3 review those. If not, those are available to you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us the facts  
5 and circumstances behind the event?

6 MR. DIVETRO: First, I want to apologize for  
7 what happened on February 3rd, 2014.

8 At the time of the incident, I provided --  
9 well, actually, I provided to everybody the medical  
10 report, because it goes into great depth. I was under a  
11 lot of medication at the time. It was a gradual  
12 process, so I didn't realize how much of an effect it  
13 had on my mind.

14 And the time I entered Sunset Spa, 50 minutes  
15 into the session, the woman propositioned me. And upon  
16 her propositioning me, I kind of snapped. I don't know  
17 what happened. It had to do with the medication. And I  
18 just kind of acted, acted after that. Like I said, it  
19 was -- what happened was way out of character for me. I  
20 never had that ever happen before in my life.

21 I've done, I've done security a long time. I  
22 love doing security. Since the incident happened, March  
23 10th of 2014 I entered a detox program. Two days into  
24 detox, I had a grand mall seizure and split my head open  
25 on the cafeteria floor. Then I found out I had an

1 intensive outpatient program, which, you know, kind of  
2 educated me on what happened to me mentally.

3 And I just -- that's what happened. I kind of  
4 trusted my doctors, kind of left -- I was on the  
5 medication for a total of a year. This was a gradual  
6 process. And four months prior to this incident  
7 happening, my doctor increased me from two milligrams of  
8 Xanax to six milligrams plus a day.

9 Plus, I was in a car accident. I was also  
10 taking pain medication as needed. And the combination  
11 of both of them was kind of like a bomb.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you -- you pled  
13 guilty to the charges?

14 MR. DIVETRO: I was so intimidated by the  
15 charges. The report that was initially -- the report  
16 that you have is actually an updated one. But there was  
17 an actual one more similar, gave it to my lawyer. But  
18 it was never, it was never submitted into evidence. It  
19 was never read. I felt like if it was read, I would  
20 have either -- I would be in a predicament now. I was  
21 facing some serious charges, serious time.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what's your work  
23 history?

24 MR. DIVETRO: What am I doing now?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: In the last 10 years.

1 MR. DIVETRO: I've done, I did security. I've  
2 worked -- before I moved here from New Jersey, I was a  
3 welding inspector for Sunoco. They kind of, they closed  
4 up. So I went on unemployment. During my unemployment,  
5 I -- because when I was younger, I dropped out of  
6 school. I went back when I was 40 years old and got my  
7 diploma. I took the civil service exam to become a  
8 correction officer, parole officer, or probation  
9 officer, and went on a two-year wait list.

10 Moved here seven years, and moving -- I mean  
11 seven months and moving here, I got hotter than heck,  
12 you know, in my mom's house. But I went back home  
13 because it was kind of expensive to move here. So, you  
14 know, because they did a lot of cutbacks. So it's kind  
15 of weird, because I'm now on the other side of that  
16 fence.

17 My whole, my whole plan was to be a correction  
18 officer and actually retire as a correction officer or a  
19 probation officer.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now, what would you see  
21 as the answer that we would give somebody from the  
22 public when they ask why we allowed you to work with  
23 this record, what would you think our response would be?

24 MR. DIVETRO: Considering that my -- like I  
25 said, I'm not trying to, I never, ever try and

1 manipulate the system. But that's why my doctor typed  
2 up this medical report of what happened to me medically.  
3 Like I said, before that, never had, never had a problem  
4 like that. That's not my character.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 MR. DIVETRO: I've -- since, I mean, I came  
7 here, I did work for Alliance Security, CSC Security,  
8 never had any disciplinary action at the time. I'm  
9 just, I'm just trying to put it all behind me. But, you  
10 know, it -- how it happened, it happened. I'm the one  
11 that had to fix it. And it's -- I fixed it, or tried to  
12 go into detox, the IOP program. I'm still with my wife.  
13 She supports me. My family supports me. I mean I'm a  
14 totally different person.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 Any other Board questions?

17 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have none.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

19 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, Mr. Chair.

20 Is this the one and only time this ever  
21 happened to you, or has this ever happened before?

22 MR. DIVETRO: Only one. This is the only time,  
23 sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: And are you aware, were  
25 you abusing any of the painkiller drugs from all the

1 issues that were going on in your life at that time?

2 MR. DIVETRO: No, just whatever was prescribed  
3 for me, I never abused it, I just used it as prescribed.  
4 But the combination of everything, it kind of was like a  
5 bomb.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Thank you. I  
7 have nothing further.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions or  
9 comments?

10 Do we have a motion?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I make a motion that we  
12 deny the appeal based on recency.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a  
15 second. Any Board comment or questions?

16 Okay. All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

19 Carries unanimously. You can reapply in a  
20 year.

21 MR. DIVETRO: Okay. Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Other business.

23 MS. PALMER: There's four trails there.

24 MR. INGRAM: Yeah, Chairman Zane.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I'm sorry. Thank

1 you.

2 MR. INGRAM: The first one trailed was item  
3 number 33, Robby Hines.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We don't have anybody  
5 left here. How about you?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, would you  
7 accept a motion?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: In relationship to  
10 registration appeal number 33, Robby Hines; number 38,  
11 Nathalie Reinoso; number 43, James Boone -- or I'm  
12 sorry, that was withdrawn; number 45, Adonis Cuffee;  
13 number 47, Paul Nader, that the denials be upheld.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is  
15 there a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any  
18 question or comment on the motion?

19 All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

22 Carries unanimously.

23 Now, other business. And Board decision on  
24 whether to hold June 2nd meeting, for possible action.

25 Have we done enough damage, or do we want to be



1 here tomorrow?

2 MR. INGRAM: The second day Board meeting would  
3 only take place if there were carryover items, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, that was an  
5 excellent. What do we want to talk about tomorrow?

6 (Laughter.)

7 MR. INGRAM: Let's see.

8 MS. PALMER: It would already help to be on the  
9 agenda.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, you didn't put  
11 Board and future agenda items. That could make that  
12 last through tomorrow.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Public comment.

15 Yes, sir?

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Do we have Board  
17 comments?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's what they snuck  
19 away from me. But, I think, we can comment on it now if  
20 we want.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Under public comment,  
22 Mr. Chair, under public comment, I would like to welcome  
23 aboard Ms. Collins.

24 Since we haven't met you, and I just wanted to  
25 say hi. Do you know what you decided to do? You just

1 got a taste of it.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Thank you. It's great  
3 to be here. But, yeah, I just did realize the thick of  
4 it.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, you know, they  
6 made me stand in front of everybody and talk for 15  
7 minutes. But I'll be real kind and just ask her like a  
8 30-second background, so we know a little bit about her.

9 And I join my colleague in welcoming you  
10 aboard.

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

12 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Thank you. I guess,  
13 I'll speak now?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure, you might as well.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'm Charlotte Collins.  
16 I'm currently warden at Nevada Southern Detention  
17 Center, work for CCA. We have a federal contract with  
18 the U.S. Marshal Service and have recently obtained a  
19 modification in that contract to have immigration, ICE,  
20 detainees. So I've been with this company in  
21 corrections for 27 years. The company is based out of  
22 Nashville, Tennessee, with sites in Texas that I've  
23 worked at and in New Jersey prior to coming to Nevada.  
24 I've been here for approximately four and a -- about  
25 four years now.

1           And I feel very privileged to be here as far as  
2 the Board. I have two children which are grown adults  
3 now.

4           And, I think, that about sums it up.

5           BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

6           BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you. Welcome.

7           MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, I just wanted to  
8 also welcome two staff members. Some of you have met  
9 each of these new individuals, our new investigators.

10           In the north, we have Jason Woodruff, who's  
11 been on board with us for a short period of time. He's  
12 doing a phenomenal job. And I wanted to welcome him to  
13 our team.

14           And then our newest investigator in the south,  
15 Vincent Saladino, has been with us a couple of months  
16 now, and he's doing a great job as well.

17           So at this time, we're fully staffed again and  
18 feel like we've got a pretty rip-roaring team, and  
19 they're ready to go. So congratulations,  
20 congratulations to both of them for their appointments.

21           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other public comment?  
22 Nobody's here.

23           BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No one here.

24           BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, I guess, we  
25 will adjourn out of here.

1 MS. PALMER: You need a motion?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah. Oh, to adjourn?  
3 I'll make a motion we adjourn. We got a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. No one  
6 opposed?

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Shannon.

9 THE REPORTER: Thank you all. Thanks very  
10 much.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
