22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Here.

23 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nadeau?

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Here.

25 MR. INGRAM: Chairman Zane?

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Here.

2 MR. INGRAM: And for the record, Board Member
3 Collins and Board Member Flynn will not be present.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. At the beginning
5 and the end of all meetings, we have a period devoted
6 for public comment. This is the comment anybody from
7 the public can take the time and opportunity to make.
8 It's usually things that are not on the agenda
9 presentation, things that are of interest to the Board
10 or things that you want to bring to the attention of the
11 Board.

12 We do limit the issue on time. And we very
13 much limit the issue on substance. So if you want to
14 complain about the condition of the carpet in the
15 elevator, we're not the place. But if you want to
16 complain about anything having to do with NRS 648 or
17 NAC 648 our private investigations, security, any of the
18 license issues that we're in charge of, we'll be happy
19 to hear from you either now or at the end of the
20 meeting.

21 If you have something to discuss that's on an
22 individual agenda item, and unless that agenda item is
23 adversarial or an adjudication matter, you should wait
24 until such time as that agenda item is being considered
25 to comment on it.

2 they don't have to wait, but that's the Board's
3 preference is that it be addressed at that time. I mean
4 really public comment can be anything that the public
5 wants to say.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 Is there any public comment in the south?

8 Seeing none, is there any public comment in the
9 north?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No. No, there isn't,
11 Mr. Chair.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.

13 As I mentioned before, we will have, or we may
14 have some items on the agenda today that are
15 adjudication or adversarial. And we'll let you know
16 about that. And at that point, it's not that we don't
17 want to hear what you have to say. It's just that in
18 that forum, we're listening to almost what would be
19 considered to be evidence. So, therefore, unless you
20 have some evidence about the particular matter, we
21 withhold public comment at that time.

22 And if you want the legalese, it's contained in
23 the number 2, Public Comment, the second paragraph.

24 Next item is number 3, review current financial
25 report, please.

1 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, the current
2 financial report was provided to Board members prior to
3 the meeting.

4 We were able to close out our FY16 budget and
5 met the deadlines for closure. We have established a
6 budget for this fiscal year.

7 And if anyone has any questions, I'd be happy
8 to entertain those.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any questions?

10 Any public question, comment?

11 Any Board question or comment?

12 Okay. Number 4, review and approval of the
13 transcript from June 1st, 2016 Board meeting.

14 This would be the minutes, correct?

15 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any public comment
17 regarding the minutes of that meeting?

18 MS. PALMER: Mr. Chairman, you shouldn't take
19 public comments on that, because it is a contested
20 matter and it has not been concluded.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: On June 1st?

22 MS. PALMER: Oh, June 1st. I apologize. I
23 thought it was September. I apologize.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comments
25 regarding the minutes?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move for
2 approval of the June 1st Board meeting transcript.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
4 have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Any Board
7 comment regarding the motion?

8 All in favor, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
11 It carries unanimously.

12 Number 5, all applicants and witnesses to be
13 sworn in.

14 If you anticipate giving any testimony or
15 speaking today regarding a matter on the agenda, we need
16 for you to stand, raise your right hand, and take an
17 oath, please.

18 (Applicants and witnesses stood.)

19 MS. PALMER: Do you solemnly affirm that the
20 testimony you shall give to the Board, this Board shall
21 be the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?

22 (Applicants and witnesses were sworn in.)

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 So the first item on the agenda is item
25 number 6 --

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: We've got --

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- Blake Security -- yes,
3 sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: With your indulgence,
5 Mr. Chair, I'd move for several items in a block vote.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion on the
7 floor to consider several items on a block vote. What
8 that means is Mr. Nadeau is going to bring a motion to
9 consider, by number, items on the agenda in a block,
10 without further consideration.

11 There is the ability to pull certain items out
12 of that block. So if there's somebody here that has a
13 particular item that they wanted to address, when you --
14 if you hear that number of item in the block
15 consideration, you would need to speak up, so that you
16 may be heard.

17 Any questions?

18 Thank you.

19 Proceed, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
21 item 6, Blake Security L.L.C., item 7, All Nation
22 Security Services, Incorporated, item 8, GlobalOptions
23 Services, Incorporated, item 9, National Cinema
24 Security, LLC, item 11, Laura M. Gabel, item 13,
25 Tekstratex L.L.C., item 14, Thompson Security

1 Corporation, item 15, Bakken Consulting, Incorporated,
2 item 17, Linxx Global Solutions, item 18, J.A.T.C.
3 Group, LLC, and item 20, Surveillance Security,
4 Incorporated, all be considered, subject to all
5 statutory and regulatory requirements.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So that would be number
7 10 is not included?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Correct. Nor was 12.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Nor was 16, nor was 19.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Would it be possible for
12 you to consider pulling a couple of others?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Of course.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'd like to pull 17, 18
15 and 20.

16 I can explain the reasons behind it, if you'd
17 like.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: There's no problem. No,
19 I'm fine with -- I'm fine with that, Mr. Chair.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.

21 There's a motion on the floor that's been
22 amended. Do we have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

25 We have a motion to consider the agenda items

1 that were stated in a -- for block consideration --

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I just want to be clear
5 on the motion. So we're considering items 6, 7, 8, 9,
6 11, 13, 14 and 15, correct?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Great. I just wanted to
9 make sure my -- the motion was clear. Thank you,
10 Mr. Chair.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 We have a motion and a second. Is there any
13 public comment on the motion?

14 Any Board comment on the motion?

15 Okay. All in favor, say "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
18 Carries.

19 I'm sorry. Mr. Nadeau, that was block
20 consideration only or block consideration for approval?

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That was approval,
22 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Appreciate
24 it.

25 So those items, as they were agendized, have

1 been approved. If I confused you, I'm sorry.

2 Is there any, is there any questions?

3 Thank you. So anybody that was here to listen
4 or talk about those items, if you'd care to participate
5 in your state government, stick around; if not, thank
6 you for showing up.

7 All right. The first item next up would be --
8 correct me if I'm wrong -- number 10.

9 Number 10 is Michael W. Wood is requesting a
10 change in license status. Mr. Wood is requesting that
11 his individual license be -- license number 1345, be
12 kept in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying
13 agent for Andy Frain Services, license number 1141.

14 Is somebody here to speak to that?

15 MR. WOOD: Michael Wood.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Come on
17 forward, have a chair.

18 So what are you intending to do with this
19 license change?

20 MR. WOOD: I'm representing Andy Frain Security
21 Services.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

23 MR. WOOD: Making sure that they are following
24 all the statutory laws, and so forth, in reference to
25 the PI Board.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you hear in
2 the north all right?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, we can. Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Board -- or public
5 comment regarding the agenda item?

6 Board comment?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, Mr. Chair.

8 Mr. Wood, I just -- usually, this is
9 perfunctory. But you've had quite recent history in
10 financials, and I was just curious what that was
11 associated with.

12 MR. WOOD: Well, right now, I applied for
13 disability. And so I have no income right now, until I
14 start doing this licensing. I do have two items that
15 are outstanding that'll be taken care of once I start
16 getting paid.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. All right. That
18 was really, I just was trying to get some clarification
19 on that.

20 MR. WOOD: Yes, sir.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

23 Anything further?

24 Consider a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that

1 Michael W. Wood be granted his change in license status,
2 that his initial -- that his individual license, number
3 1345, be kept in abeyance so that he may become the
4 qualifying agent for Andy Frain Services, Incorporated,
5 license number 1141. This is subject to all statutory
6 and regulatory requirements.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Do we
8 have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
11 on the motion?

12 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

15 Hearing none, good luck.

16 MR. WOOD: Thank you, sir. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Keep track on which one
18 was next. Number 12, Majid -- I'm sorry. I'm going to
19 massacre this. Majid Daneshforouz. Is anybody here for
20 number 12?

21 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, all items that are
22 considered, you know, a change in licensing status,
23 they're given the opportunity to either appeal -- appear
24 or not appear. And it appears that he's not here.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I believe, it would be

1 appropriate to trail this till the end of the meeting,
2 just in case somebody's running late. Is that the
3 pleasure of the Board?

4 Oh, I believe, the applicant is here. But
5 it'll be a moment. So we'll go on to the next item,
6 which is?

7 MR. INGRAM: 16.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 16, The Ducharme
9 Agency, LLC. Is somebody here for 16?

10 MR. DUCHARME: I thought it was approved. Yes,
11 I'm here.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You thought what?

13 MR. DUCHARME: I thought it was called off by a
14 motion for approval.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was it? Okay.
16 Apparently, I think, it was called --

17 MR. INGRAM: I don't think it was approved.

18 MS. PALMER: It wasn't approved.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, if you're
20 here --

21 MR. DUCHARME: I'm here.

22 BOARD MEMBER ZANE: -- have a seat.

23 MR. DUCHARME: Okay.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We don't want to waste
25 your time.

1 MR. DUCHARME: Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're Eric?

3 MR. DUCHARME: Yes, sir, Ducharme.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let's see. If you can
5 give us just a brief overview of what you're intending
6 with the change.

7 MR. DUCHARME: Well, the LLC was just to --
8 just for corporate protection. And the process server
9 license is so I can start charging for what people want
10 me to do.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
12 public comments regarding the license?

13 Any Board comments regarding the license?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes. I guess, I should
15 have included this in the block vote, Mr. Chair. So I
16 apologize for that.

17 I will make the motion that The Ducharme
18 Agency, LLC, be granted a new corporate private
19 investigator license, Eric W. Ducharme, license number
20 1963A, be granted, his individual license be placed in
21 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent,
22 also that he be granted an individual process server
23 license, and then that individual license be placed in
24 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent for
25 the same agency, subject to all statutory and regulatory

1 requirements.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.
3 Is there a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and second. Any
6 Board comment on the motion?

7 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
10 It carries unanimously.

11 Sorry about that. That's what happens when you
12 become a number.

13 MR. DUCHARME: Thank you, gentlemen.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 12. Is Majid
15 here? I'm sorry to call you by your first name, but
16 it's easier.

17 MR. INGRAM: He's not here.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I believe, we'll trail
19 that till the next item.

20 MR. INGRAM: So 19.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 17.

22 MR. INGRAM: Oh, that's right, 17, correct.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The reason that I
24 called -- number 17 is Linxx Global Solutions. The
25 reason that I pulled, that I asked for 17 through 20 to

1 be pulled was that consideration of these particular
2 items included the consideration of corporate officers
3 associated, associated with the legal entity. And I
4 view that as a new application for full consideration,
5 less qualifying experience.

6 Now, if we're licensing a licensee, we have to
7 consider all the factors. And when we're considering a
8 corporate officer or a principal of an entity, we're
9 considering everything except qualifying experience,
10 unless they deem to put themselves forward in that
11 fashion.

12 So there's no negativity about pulling these
13 for issues. It's just that there are corporate officers
14 who are for the first time before the Board for
15 licensure. And I wanted to make sure that there was
16 ample consideration for those corporate officers.

17 Everybody here that's being considered, as far
18 as licensing is concerned, as an individual licensee,
19 already has been approved and has a license. But some
20 of the people that are -- now those licenses are being
21 transferred, to have not had initial consideration by
22 the Board as to whether or not they should be allowed to
23 be a corporate officer or a principal of an entity,
24 that's the reason for pulling these, hopefully.
25 Hopeful.

1 So let's see. Linxx Global Solutions, number
2 17.

3 MR. BAKER: Correct.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Baker, you're here to
5 represent them?

6 MR. BAKER: Yes.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Tell us a little bit
8 about what's going on, and.

9 MR. BAKER: Linxx Global is a provider of
10 services to the United States government. They bid
11 primarily on government projects and logistics, training
12 and security. And they are looking to expand into the
13 state of Nevada and some contracts here.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

15 Who is the investigator assigned to this case?
16 Or the corporate officer?

17 MR. BAKER: It is -- it says Vincent Saladino
18 on here, updated.

19 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

20 MR. BAKER: That may have just been mine,
21 though.

22 MR. SALADINO: No, it's right here.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The report that's issued
24 on behalf of our background packet, that's complete,
25 up-to-date, with the corporate officer information?

1 MR. SALADINO: Yes, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: They were cooperative and
3 did everything up to your expectation?

4 MR. SALADINO: Yes, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 That's all the questions I had. Any other
7 Board questions?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any -- okay. Any public
11 comment or questions?

12 Okay. Entertain a motion.

13 I'd move that Linxx Global Solutions, Inc., who
14 is applying for a new corporate private patrolman
15 license, be approved, that Steven T. Baker, license
16 number 1174B, who is requesting that his individual
17 license be kept in abeyance so that he may become the
18 qualifying agent, be approved. Corporate officers to
19 approved are Sydney J. Beem, Adam E. Burke and Martin L.
20 Strong. Subject to all statutory and regulatory
21 requirements.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second it.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
24 there a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes. I second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
2 questions?

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Shook head negatively.)

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Hearing none, call for a
5 vote. All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

8 Carries. Thank you.

9 Can we go back to item number 12, please,
10 Majid. Majid Daneshforouz?

11 We'll trail it till the next item.

12 Item number 18, J.A.T.C. Group, LLC.

13 Hello.

14 MR. GAITAN: Hi.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you doing?

16 MR. GAITAN: Good.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you state your name
18 for the record?

19 MR. GAITAN: Jordan Gaitan.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Spell your last name,
21 please.

22 MR. GAITAN: G-A-I-T-A-N.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And you, sir.

24 MR. ESPOSITO: Vincenzo Esposito.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Spell your last name,

1 please.

2 MR. ESPOSITO: E-S-P-O-S-I-T-O.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I was making sure
4 I didn't get yelled at by the stenographer.

5 Okay. All right. You folks are here from
6 J.A.T.C. Group?

7 MR. ESPOSITO: Yes.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And your
9 intentions are what for your license, what do you intend
10 to do, change things over and move in a different
11 direction?

12 MR. ESPOSITO: Well, it's just basic security,
13 you know, and what I did for the last few years, again.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So you're moving
15 your licenses in abeyance, and you're going over to help
16 these folks get started?

17 MR. ESPOSITO: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

19 You're Jordan, right?

20 MR. GAITAN: I'm Jordan, yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you had much
22 experience in the security field?

23 MR. GAITAN: I have.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You have. Okay. So
25 you're not just hiring a gun and coming in, seeing if

1 you can make some money?

2 MR. GAITAN: No, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So you're going to
4 participate and --

5 MR. GAITAN: I will.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- take his world of
7 knowledge and use it?

8 MR. GAITAN: Absolutely.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. As I
10 recall, I don't believe there was anything that was
11 prohibitive in the background. So.

12 Any Board -- or any public comment? I'm sorry.

13 Any Board comment regarding the license
14 application?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'd consider a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I --

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.

19 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yeah, I ask or request
20 approval for J.A.T.C. Group, LLC, who is applying for a
21 new corporate private patrolman license, and the current
22 license, Vincenzo Esposito, license number 1868BX, is
23 requesting that his individual license be kept in
24 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent, and
25 that the corporate officer to be approved is Jordan G.

1 Gaitan, be subject to all statutory and regulatory
2 requirements.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion and a
5 second. Any Board comment or question on the motion?

6 MS. PALMER: I didn't hear, none of us heard a
7 vote to approve for J.A.T.C. Group.

8 MR. INGRAM: Just rephrase his motion a little
9 bit.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So, to make sure that the
11 record is clear, the motion, then, is that J.A.T.C.
12 Group, LLC, who is applying for a new corporate private
13 patrol license, be approved, Vincenzo Esposito, license
14 number 1868BX, who is requesting his individual license
15 be kept in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying
16 agent, corporate officer to be approved is Jordan G.
17 Gaitan, subject to all statutory and regulatory
18 requirements, that's my understanding of the motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, Mr. Chair.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there -- and we have a
21 second?

22 You second, Mr. Nadeau?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, I did.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment?
25 All in favor, say "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

3 Hearing none, it passes unanimously. Good

4 luck.

5 MR. ESPOSITO: Thank you.

6 MR. GAITAN: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 12, please, back

8 up a page, Majid?

9 Thank you.

10 Have a seat, please. How do you pronounce your

11 last name?

12 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Dahn-esh-fohr-ooz.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What was that?

14 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Dahn-esh-fohr-ooz.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And it's spelled

16 D-A-N-E-S-H-F-O-R-O-U-Z?

17 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: (Nodded head affirmatively.)

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I wanted to make

19 that clear, because the stenographer is taking it down.

20 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Absolutely.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. And Majid

22 ("Mah-JID"), I'm pronouncing that correctly?

23 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. All right.

25 Can you tell us a little bit about the change that

1 brought you here today and the structure of the
2 business?

3 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: We decide to change the name
4 to be able to open another, branches in adjoining
5 states. And I'm working on it to add the cyber security
6 to our operation.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
8 public comment regarding the license application?

9 Any Board comment regarding the license
10 application?

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes. Mr. Chair?

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

14 Mr. Daneshforouz, you have quite a financial
15 thing going on here. Could you please explain what's
16 going on? I mean you're talking federal tax liens.
17 You're talking state tax liens. We're talking
18 bankruptcies. We're talking significant, significant
19 other financial things involving, you know, a variety of
20 companies. Could you just explain what's going on here.

21 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Those happened because of
22 lots of our clients, they file bankruptcy, and then they
23 didn't pay us. Then they put us in the situation that
24 we needed to work on it. And as a matter of fact, right
25 now, we have an attorney that's working to -- for tax

1 problems, and they added a payment, and we are doing
2 that.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Are these federal tax
4 liens, are they personal, or are they corporate?

5 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: They're corporate. They've
6 put some lien on my personal asset as far as the what
7 they call the trust fund was involved. But it is
8 nothing like personal lien contacts. And I always pay
9 my taxes, and I do not have any problem.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I have a
11 question.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Sir, how much was the
14 amount that the company defaulted on that created this
15 situation for you? How much did they fail to pay you?

16 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Oh, it was five and six
17 hundred thousand dollars.

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you.

19 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: And I told that to IRS
20 people. I said, "You guys give them a break and let
21 them file bankruptcy. Then you need to help us." And
22 they said, "I'm sorry. We cannot do anything. You
23 shouldn't wait them. You should collect the money in
24 advance." So.

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

2 Who was the investigator on the case?

3 MR. INGRAM: Investigator Woodruff in the
4 north.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is Investigator Woodruff
6 there in the north?

7 MR. WOODRUFF: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, he is.

9 Go ahead and come on up.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

11 MR. WOODRUFF: Good morning.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you able to hear the
13 applicant's explanation of the financials you can talk
14 to?

15 MR. WOODRUFF: Yes. He did tell me that he
16 had issues with the taxes and that he was taking care of
17 them in agreements of some sort. I asked him to bring
18 information to the Board meeting to be able to explain
19 those.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 Thank you.

22 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Pass these.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: If you could give it to
24 staff over there.

25 The applicant has given us some paperwork. If

1 you'll bear with me just for a minute, I'll see what we
2 got.

3 (There was a period off the record.)

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: While some documents are
5 being reviewed, is the bulk of your business located in
6 Nevada?

7 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes. Right now, we did not
8 open those branches yet, but the main office is here.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

10 (There was a period off the record.)

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We're reviewing some
12 documents from IRS indicating some payment detail for
13 941 employee taxes as well as an installment agreement
14 from the IRS regarding taxes.

15 (There was a period off the record.)

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: When did you originally
17 receive your current license from this Board, do you
18 remember?

19 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Approximately, I think, the
20 original license, 20 some years, and it's --

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: From the Private
22 Investigator's Licensing Board?

23 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes.

24 (There was a period off the record.)

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So when you got license

1 number 1173 --

2 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- that was over 20 years
4 ago?

5 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes. I think, they don't
6 change the license number. They keep the same license
7 number. They just change the name. As far as I
8 remember, it's the same license number. But maybe I
9 might be wrong.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So the first time
11 that you came before this Board to receive your license
12 was 20 years ago?

13 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes. It was 1987.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: '87?

15 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes. And I'm carrying three
16 licenses from the state, licensed real estate broker,
17 and I'm a licensed insurance and bail bondsman. I carry
18 all those licenses, and I never had any problem.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

20 (There was a period off the record.)

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The documents that were
22 presented were most all having to do with the Internal
23 Revenue Service and, and correspondence indicating that
24 he's either working with the IRS or scheduling hearings
25 with the IRS. So it would indicate that there's some

1 movement, but I don't know if the indication is
2 resolution.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I have an
4 additional question.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Daneshforouz, are
7 you -- what's going to happen with America's Best
8 Security Services?

9 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: As of -- we have an
10 attorney, which is their tax attorney, and they told us,
11 "If you close America's Best, we handle that, corporate
12 IRS, and you go on with your own business and your
13 business." And that's what. They give us a new EIN
14 number. And we going to start with a new company.

15 And the other company, because liability and
16 the account receivable that we have, they are working
17 together with IRS and to solve that problem. As you
18 know, they charge us interest and penalties and things
19 like that, so, as I'm sure everybody sees. So we ready
20 to pay the \$10 million, or whatever. So we are doing
21 it.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So if I understand
23 correctly, basically, America's Best Security Services
24 will be -- they have an umbrella of all the financial
25 associated with the previous --

1 MR. INGRAM: Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- situation, and you're
3 just opening, you're starting a new corporation, so a
4 new, fresh corporation, so you start fresh with --
5 without all those obligations. Is that what I'm
6 understanding?

7 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: That -- yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Any other
10 Board questions?

11 Hearing none, we'll entertain a motion. If
12 there's any public questions or comments? I'm sorry.

13 Entertain a motion.

14 I'd move that item number 12, Majid
15 Daneshforouz, that this matter be continued until the
16 December meeting of the Board, with instruction to staff
17 to be in contact with the applicant and get updated
18 information that's current as of the day closer to the
19 December meeting, that adequately addresses all of the
20 current debt associated with the corporation that's
21 being jettisoned, as well as the financial ability of
22 the new entity to properly function.

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I second that.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
25 second. Is there any Board comment on the motion?

1 Hearing none, I'd call for a vote. Any in
2 favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

5 Hearing none, the matter's been postponed until
6 December. Staff will be getting in touch with you to go
7 through this information so that we're a little better
8 informed and can better consider the license application
9 at that time.

10 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 All right. 18 or 20?

13 MR. INGRAM: No, it looks like 19.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Exclusive Investigations,
15 Inc.

16 Good morning.

17 MR. BEDINOTTI: Good morning.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you state your name?

19 MR. BEDINOTTI: Sure. Thomas Bedinotti.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you spell your last
21 name?

22 MR. BEDINOTTI: B-E-D-I-N-O-T-T-I.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And you've
24 currently got license number 1556?

25 MR. BEDINOTTI: Correct.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And you're moving
2 that to a new entity?

3 MR. BEDINOTTI: A corporation.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Corporation?

5 MR. BEDINOTTI: That's right.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Just you, yourself,
7 right?

8 MR. BEDINOTTI: Just myself.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'm sorry for
10 having not included you in the blanket motion.

11 MR. BEDINOTTI: That's okay.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Because the reason,
13 again, I was doing this was to find the few, because
14 you've already been through the process, you're already
15 approved.

16 MR. BEDINOTTI: Yes.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And if there had been
18 another person involved in your new corporate entity, I
19 would want to talk about them or to them. But since
20 you're it, I apologize. And thank you for sticking
21 around. But I move that you be approved if --

22 MR. BEDINOTTI: Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- there's no public
24 comment or Board comment. How's that for capturing it?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I second.

1 MS. PALMER: Should you still state?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I got to do it
3 legally.

4 MR. BEDINOTTI: Okay.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's what the lawyer's
6 here for.

7 I move that Exclusive Investigations, Inc.,
8 who's applying for a new private investigator license,
9 be approved, Thomas P. Bedinotti, license number 1556,
10 who is requesting that his individual license be placed
11 in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent,
12 be approved, done with all statutory -- subject to all
13 statutory, regulatory requirements.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comments on the
16 motion?

17 All in favor, say "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
20 Congratulations.

21 MR. BEDINOTTI: Thank you. I appreciate it.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

23 Number 20, Surveillance Security, Inc.

24 Good morning. Were you here before and were
25 sworn?

1 MR. JASPER: Sorry?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you get sworn in
3 earlier?

4 MR. JASPER: No, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Could you raise your
6 right hand, stand and raise your right hand. She'll
7 give you an oath.

8 MR. INGRAM: Is there anybody else that you
9 want to swear in at the same time?

10 MS. PALMER: Is there anybody else that hasn't
11 been sworn in, that's going to be giving testimony? If
12 you'd like to stand, I'll swear you in at the same time.

13 Anybody in the north?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, we're fine. Don't
15 mind me --

16 MS. PALMER: Do you solemnly -- oh.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry. Don't mind
18 me, Mr. Chair. I just have to stand periodically.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

20 MS. PALMER: Do you solemnly affirm that the
21 testimony you shall give before this Board shall be the
22 truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?

23 MR. JASPER: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you here at the
25 beginning, when we talked about these licenses being

1 handled in bulk?

2 MR. JASPER: No, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What it amounted
4 to is you're Dexter Jasper --

5 MR. JASPER: Yes.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sorry about that. But
7 you're Dexter Jasper, and you're currently licensed.

8 MR. JASPER: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you are moving over
10 to a new corporation --

11 MR. JASPER: Yes.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- where Brendan D.
13 Waller is the corporate officer.

14 MR. JASPER: Yes.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Usually, these are
16 handled in bulk, because it's just a matter of
17 transferring things over. However, since Mr. Waller has
18 never been before the Board before, I asked that it be
19 pulled so that he, his individual qualifications to be a
20 corporate officer, could be considered. We might not
21 have any questions about him, but we didn't handle it in
22 a bulk fashion, just because somebody may have had a
23 question, is all.

24 MR. JASPER: Okay.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public

1 comment or questions?

2 Is there any Board questions, comments?

3 Entertain a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
5 Surveillance Security, Incorporated, be granted and
6 approved for a new private patrol license, that Dexter
7 Jasper, licensing number 1844B, be approved -- that his
8 individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may
9 be the qualifying agent for Surveillance Security,
10 Incorporated. Corporate officer to be approved is
11 Brendan D. Waller. This is subject to all statutory and
12 regulatory requirements.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion, a motion
15 a second. Any Board comment or questions on the motion?

16 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

19 Hearing none, approved. Thank you.

20 MR. JASPER: Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 21, Ethos
22 Risk Services, LLC.

23 Good morning.

24 MR. COTILLA: Good morning. How are you?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Can you introduce

1 yourself, please, and tell us what you have in mind,
2 what you're going to do?

3 MR. COTILLA: My name is Edward Cotilla. We
4 are licensed, Ethos, in 45 states, and we're looking to
5 expand in Nevada ("Nev-AH-dah").

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So that would be
7 you're one free shot at calling it by its wrong name?

8 MR. COTILLA: Yes. Nevada ("Nev-AD-ah").

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There you go.

10 MR. COTILLA: Yes.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is that -- where are you
12 from?

13 MR. COTILLA: Florida.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Florida. Okay. How many
15 states are you licensed in?

16 MR. COTILLA: 45.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 45. I think, you said
18 that. I wasn't listening.

19 Okay. Any other, or is there any public
20 comment or questions about the application?

21 Okay. Any Board comment or questions about the
22 application?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that Ethos Risk

1 Services, LLC, be granted a new corporate private
2 investigator license, Edward J. Cotilla be granted his
3 individual private investigator license, and that his
4 individual license be placed into abeyance so that he
5 may become the qualifying agent of Ethos Risk Services,
6 LLC. Member to be approved, corporate member to be
7 approved is Edward J. Cotilla. This approval is subject
8 to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion, and we
11 have a second. Any Board comment or questions on the
12 motion?

13 All in favor, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
16 It carries. Thank you.

17 MR. COTILLA: Okay. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Welcome to Nevada.

19 MR. COTILLA: Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Tactical Real Estate
21 Solutions LLC.

22 Good morning.

23 MR. CANDELAS: Good morning.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you state your name
25 for the record, please?

1 MR. CANDELAS: Steve Candelas. The last name
2 is C-A-N-D-E-L-A-S.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you give us a
4 brief overview of what you're going to set out to do?

5 MR. CANDELAS: Tactical Real Estate Solutions
6 right now is consulting homeowners, HOAs, real estate
7 brokerages, as well as working with banks, on just
8 planning on taking to another level with that, with
9 crime prevention, and also being available to do
10 investigations with anything, residential or commercial
11 real estate.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

13 Any public comment or question?

14 Any Board comment or question?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I had one, the one, but
17 it's just name of the company, because I envisioned HOA
18 security going from golf carts to Brinks trucks.

19 Entertain a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
21 Tactical Real Estate Solutions LLC be approved for a new
22 corporate private investigator license and that Steve
23 Candelas be approved for his individual investigator's
24 license, and if approved -- well, and that his
25 individual license be placed into abeyance so that he

1 may become the qualifying agent for Tactical Real Estate
2 Solution LLC, and member to be approved is Steve
3 Candelas, and this subject to all statutory and
4 regulatory requirements.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Is
6 there a second?

7 I'll second it.

8 We have a motion and a second. Any comment or
9 question on the motion?

10 All in favor, say "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

13 Hearing none, it carries.

14 MR. CANDELAS: Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good luck.

16 MR. CANDELAS: Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 23, right?

18 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Albert M. Fuentes.

20 Good morning. How are you?

21 MR. FUENTES: Fine, sir. How are you?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good.

23 MR. FUENTES: Good morning, ladies and
24 gentlemen. Yes, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm sorry. Alberto.

1 MR. FUENTES: Yes. Yes.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I only read part of it.
3 Can you tell us what you're going to do, what you got in
4 mind?

5 MR. FUENTES: Well, I just moved here from
6 Colorado, but I'm originally from Miami. I was an
7 investigator in Miami for over 30 years, and also worked
8 in Colorado, moved here just shortly, about six weeks
9 ago. I had gone through already the investigator's
10 license application. Hopefully, I'll be getting
11 approved today.

12 And my specialty is criminal defense work. I
13 hope to solicit some business from some lawyers here
14 that do federal court-appointed cases and state
15 court-appointed cases at the beginning, so that at least
16 I could get to know some people here in town, and then,
17 hopefully, move on into the private field. That's
18 exactly the way I started in Miami 30 years ago, and it
19 was always successful for me, so this is what I plan to
20 do here.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

22 Is there any public comment or questions
23 regarding the application?

24 Any Board comment or questions regarding the
25 application?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Nothing? Okay. Consider
3 a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I move that --

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- Alberto M. Fuentes be
7 granted a -- and approved for an individual private
8 investigator license, subject to all statutory and
9 regulatory requirements.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion and a
12 second. Any Board comment or question on the motion?

13 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

16 Hearing none, it carries. Good luck.

17 MR. FUENTES: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I do a little criminal
19 defense work myself.

20 MR. FUENTES: Okay.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So if you're much of an
22 investigator, find me, and I'll try to get you some
23 work.

24 MR. FUENTES: Absolutely. I appreciate it.
25 And I do have a couple of questions, if you don't mind.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

2 MR. FUENTES: I need to educate myself. I
3 understand that there's an insurance requirement now
4 that I have to proceed before I get my license. And I
5 would like to know where I would find the companies that
6 work with the state, so that I can go ahead and do that.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You'd have to take that
8 up with the staff, and they might be able to point you
9 in the direction. If not, call me.

10 MR. FUENTES: Okay. And, also, I want to be
11 clear on this. My wife is also a licensed private
12 investigator in Florida. Now, for her to be able to
13 work with me, I understand she needs to be registered.
14 But she doesn't need to have a license, right, to be
15 able to work for me?

16 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

17 MR. FUENTES: Is that correct?

18 MR. INGRAM: Yeah. And, again, if you contact
19 Gisela, we'll be able to help walk you through that
20 process as well.

21 MR. FUENTES: Okay. Thank you very much,
22 gentlemen. Now, where, when will I receive the license,
23 after I do these, this, the insurance and things like
24 that?

25 MR. INGRAM: That's correct. Once the final

1 prorated licensing fees and the insurance requirements
2 are received, we will go ahead and issue that license at
3 that time, about seven to 10 days on average.

4 MR. FUENTES: Perfect. Thank you so much, and
5 have a wonderful day. God bless you all.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. And when I
7 made that offer for you to contact me, that's not as a
8 Board chairman. That's as a licensee.

9 MR. FUENTES: Perfect.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

11 MR. FUENTES: Well, if I could, you know,
12 Mr. Zane --

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're going to have to
14 find me. Otherwise, if you can't find me, you don't get
15 to work.

16 MR. FUENTES: Thank you very much. Have a
17 wonderful day.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Albert J. Reshaw IV.
19 Reshaw? Reshaw?

20 All right. How about we trail number 24.

21 Anybody up for a break?

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Sure.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can we take 10
24 minutes, please? Perhaps we can address some of the
25 folks hanging out in the hall, hopefully, get them a

1 little bit comfortable, if we can.

2 Thank you.

3 * * * * *

4 (A break was taken, 9:56 to 10:10 a.m.)

5 * * * * *

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. If you were just
7 joining us, could you make sure that your cell phones
8 are silenced or turned off, so that they don't make any
9 noise, please. Thank you.

10 Call the meeting back to order.

11 Okay. We'll recall item number 24, Mr. Reshaw.
12 Reshaw. And I'm told that he would be probably in the
13 north.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, he's not here. Can
15 we go ahead and continue to trail it?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

17 Number 25, Knowles Security, Inc. Have anybody
18 from Knowles?

19 MR. WRIGHT: Hello.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you?

21 MR. WRIGHT: Pretty good.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Can you introduce
23 yourself and tell us what you're --

24 MR. WRIGHT: My name is Patrick Wright. I'm
25 applying to be the qualifying agent for Knowles

1 Security, Incorporated.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How did you get to
3 know the security business?

4 MR. WRIGHT: I started at South Coast Medical
5 Center in 2007, and I've been working at it ever since.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. So you're the
7 person up for the license itself individually?

8 MR. WRIGHT: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And then you're going to
10 put that into abeyance and if we approve it?

11 MR. WRIGHT: Yes.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And Jessica Yune and Joe
13 Zuniga --

14 MR. WRIGHT: Yes.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- are a part of the
16 corporation. Okay. Is Mr. Zuniga here with you today?

17 MR. WRIGHT: He was present. I think, he's on
18 a phone call.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see. Okay. Do you
20 expect him back?

21 MR. WRIGHT: We can just move forward.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Could you answer
23 questions I have about his bankruptcy?

24 MR. WRIGHT: I talked about it with him
25 personally, but I wouldn't feel comfortable doing that

1 on his behalf.

2 BOARD MEMBER ZANE: Okay.

3 MR. INGRAM: I'll just send the investigator
4 out to see if we can get him in here.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Would you mind if
6 we trailed you?

7 MR. WRIGHT: Yeah, you can trail.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Took up one and then call
9 you back, or do you want to --

10 MR. WRIGHT: Yeah, of course.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How much time would you
12 like?

13 MR. WRIGHT: I've got enough time. I'll wait
14 for Joe to arrive, and I'll just wave when he's present.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. We'll
16 get you right in after that.

17 MR. WRIGHT: Okay.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 MR. WRIGHT: Oh, he's here. Is that okay, or
20 do you still want to trail?

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No, if he's here.

22 MR. WRIGHT: Perfect.

23 MR. ZUNIGA: Good morning.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you doing?

25 MR. ZUNIGA: Okay.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. I need to pull you
2 up here. I have a question about your bankruptcy.

3 MR. ZUNIGA: Sure.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I got to pull you up, so
5 I don't accuse you of being the wrong guy.

6 When was the bankruptcy discharged?

7 MR. ZUNIGA: I think, it was 2013.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 2013?

9 MR. ZUNIGA: Couple of years.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what was the
11 circumstances behind the filing?

12 MR. ZUNIGA: The company, when I had lost
13 business to larger companies, outbidding us by 25, 30
14 percent --

15 (There was a request by the Reporter to move
16 the microphone in Las Vegas so she could hear better.)

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, could you move the
18 microphone a little closer to him so that -- there you
19 go. Thank you.

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Try it again.

22 MR. ZUNIGA: Sure. During the time we lost a
23 lot of business due to larger competitors that were
24 outbidding us by 20, 40, 30 percent. So we went ahead
25 and settled in May over a quantity of about \$200,000.

1 So it was supposed to be, you know, putting it on
2 employees, several employees, took all my personal, so I
3 took all the interest I had build employees.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So this was a
5 corporate filing or an individual?

6 MR. ZUNIGA: A personal.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Personal.

8 MR. ZUNIGA: M-hm (affirmative).

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was it the business yours
10 personally or corporate?

11 MR. ZUNIGA: Personally.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you recall how much
13 debt was discharged in the bankruptcy?

14 MR. ZUNIGA: I don't recall.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: How much was discharged?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: He said he didn't recall.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Oh, okay.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who was the investigator
22 on the case?

23 MR. BATCHELOR: That would be me, Investigator
24 Batchelor.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Could you answer the

1 question he doesn't know the answer to.

2 MR. BATCHELOR: The amount wasn't in any of the
3 files that I had been shown on it.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. The reason that I
5 raised this, you know, a lot of times, in prior
6 bankruptcies, it's a matter of how much time has passed
7 and elapsed since the discharge was later or closer to
8 the current time. And it brings more of an interest --

9 MR. ZUNIGA: Okay.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- to determine
11 suitability.

12 That's all the questions I have. Thank you.

13 Any other -- any public questions?

14 Any Board questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
17 motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
19 Knowles Security, Inc., be approved for a new corporate
20 private patrolman license and Patrick Wright be approved
21 for an individual private patrolman license and that his
22 individual license be placed into abeyance so that he
23 may become the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to
24 be approved are Jessica Yune and Joe Zuniga. This
25 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I've got a motion and a
3 second. Any Board comment or question on the motion?

4 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Being none, congratulations.

8 MR. WRIGHT: Thank you very much.

9 MR. ZUNIGA: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Griz Global Solutions,
11 LLC. Anybody here for Griz Global Solutions, LLC?

12 MR. WICK: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: They're here in the
14 north.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 Good morning.

17 MR. WICK: Good morning.

18 MR. MCPEAKE: Good morning, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us a little
20 bit of information about yourself, identify yourself and
21 give us some information about yourself and what you'd
22 like to do?

23 MR. WICK: Yes, I'm Wick. I have three other
24 companies that are primarily focused on government
25 contracting. I had the opportunity early this year to

1 expand into the commercial market. And I formed Griz
2 Global Solutions to take care of that side of the work
3 that we're going to be doing.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

5 MR. MCPEAKE: And my name is Michael McPeake,
6 M-C-P-E-A-K-E.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Welcome.

8 Any public comment or question regarding the
9 license application?

10 Okay. Any Board comment or questions regarding
11 the license application?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Hearing none, I'll
14 entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
16 Griz Global Solutions, LLC, be granted and approved for
17 a new corporate private patrol license, Michael J.J.
18 McPeake be granted an individual private patrol license,
19 and that his individual license be placed into abeyance
20 so that he may become the qualifying agent for Griz
21 Global Solutions, LLC. Members to be approved are
22 William F. Cronin III, Robert E. Keene Jr. and Melvin L.
23 Wick. This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
24 requirements.

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion and a
2 second. Any Board question or comments?

3 I have a comment. For those of you who are
4 first-timers here, sometimes, when these go through in
5 this fashion, people wonder why are we taking the time
6 to go through these when there are no questions, or
7 there's a brief introduction and somebody walks out of
8 here with either a denial or an approval. Well, what it
9 amounts to is this investigation is done. The staff has
10 presented us with their findings. We put this on the
11 agenda so that the public, or anybody else in the
12 countryside who wants to know, has the opportunity to
13 address it. And if there's nobody to address it or
14 question it, then it goes through this process and it
15 either gets approved or denied based upon what exists
16 before us.

17 So it's not like the fix is in and everybody,
18 just certain people come in and get a license and walk
19 away, and certain people don't. That's the process.

20 So with that in mind, all in favor of the
21 motion, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed?

24 No. Congratulations. Thank you.

25 MR. MCPEAKE: Thank you.

1 MR. WICK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 27, Direct
3 Security Services, Inc.

4 MR. LENHART: Good morning.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
6 you?

7 MR. LENHART: Good.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good.

9 MR. LENHART: My name is Barry Lenhart,
10 L-E-N-H-A-R-T.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Could you tell us a
12 little bit about your background and what you hope to do
13 here in Nevada?

14 MR. LENHART: I hope to start a security
15 company from the ground up, provide security service
16 throughout the Las Vegas region.

17 I started in '72 as a police chief in
18 Pennsylvania, went to GE Aerospace between '86 and '93
19 as global security director for GE Aerospace, moved to
20 Johnson Matthey precious metals division as their global
21 security director from '93 to '98, and currently with
22 Harris Group, which was -- started off as GI, became
23 Motorola, became Google, and now it's purchased by
24 Harris, as global security director for the company.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Any public comment

1 about the license application?

2 Hearing none, any Board comment?

3 Hearing none, entertain a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
5 Direct Security Services, Inc., be approved for a new
6 corporate private patrolman license and that Barry L.
7 Lenhart have his individual private patrolman -- be
8 approved for his individual private patrolman license,
9 and that his individual license be placed into abeyance
10 so that he may become the qualifying agent for Direct
11 Security Services, Incorporated. The corporate officer
12 to be approved is Barry L. Lenhart. And this is subject
13 to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Do I
15 have a second?

16 I'll second. Any Board comment or question on
17 the motion?

18 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

21 Do we hear a vote?

22 MR. INGRAM: I don't think we heard it up here.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I took it for granted
24 that the record will reflect two "aye" votes in the
25 north.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, that's right.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We just didn't physically
3 hear it down here. But she's more important than we
4 are.

5 Thank you. Congratulations.

6 MR. LENHART: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 24/7 Security,
8 LLC.

9 They're from Winnemucca, so I would assume
10 they're coming to you.

11 MR. MURDOCK: Good morning.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
13 you?

14 MR. MURDOCK: Fine. How are you?

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
16 yourself and tell us what you're hoping to accomplish?

17 MR. MURDOCK: Jeff Murdock, M-U-R-D-O-C-K. And
18 we're seeking to provide security services to northern
19 Nevada corporations, primarily the mining industry.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Congratulations. Rural
21 Nevada is underserved in this area.

22 MR. MURDOCK: Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I think, you probably
24 found out. Otherwise, you wouldn't be seeking to go
25 and --

1 MR. MURDOCK: Yes, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment or
3 questions regarding the application?

4 Any Board comments or questions regarding the
5 application?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just a real quick one,
7 Mr. Chair.

8 You are retired, you are no longer a police
9 officer?

10 MR. MURDOCK: I am currently a reserve. And if
11 I'm approved, then I will immediately resign and provide
12 proof to you.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Perfect. Thank
14 you.

15 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.

17 Any other Board questions or comments?

18 I'd entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
20 24/7 Security, LLC, be granted and approved for a new
21 corporate private patrol license, Jeff, Jeffrey L.
22 Murdock be granted an individual private patrol license,
23 and that that license be placed in abeyance so that he
24 may become the qualifying agent. Member to be approved
25 is Megan E. -- or excuse me -- Megan A. Weaver. This is

1 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
4 second. Any Board comment or questions on the motion?

5 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

8 Hearing none, congratulations.

9 MR. MURDOCK: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sorry for the long drive.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, may I ask a
12 question on item 29?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I notice on the
15 background packet that we had that there was a corporate
16 officer to be approved, a Modarelli, and that that's not
17 noticed on the agenda. And so I was concerned about
18 that, that maybe we can only deal with the one
19 individual that's placed on the agenda and that the
20 corporate officer may have to be renoticed at a
21 different meeting.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's what counsel was
23 reviewing when the rest of us were taking our -- putting
24 our feet up.

25 MR. INGRAM: And, actually, Mr. Chairman -- for

1 the record, Kevin Ingram. This was our error. I failed
2 to add the corporate officer on item number 29. I've
3 spoken with Mr. Dewilde. And Mr. Modarelli is actually
4 on the east coast and unavailable to attend today
5 anyway. So he has agreed to move forward with the
6 agenda as it is. And we will get Mr. Modarelli
7 agendized for the December Board meeting as a corporate
8 officer.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did that answer the
10 question or address it?

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Fully.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So we move to
13 number 29, Patrick B. Dewilde.

14 MR. DEWILDE: Good morning.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you?

16 MR. DEWILDE: Good. I'm Patrick Dewilde.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: One more time?

18 MR. DEWILDE: Patrick Dewilde.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh. I thought you were
20 trying to be witty, like me.

21 MR. DEWILDE: Oh.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, welcome. Okay.
23 What's your intent with the change-up on the new
24 company?

25 MR. DEWILDE: Well, we're not a new company.

1 Garda is an existing armored car company. Our current
2 qualifying agent, he retired, up in Reno. I think, he
3 wants to fish more. So we're changing our qualifying
4 agent to me, a current employee.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you're, you are
6 subject to licensure here today --

7 MR. DEWILDE: Yes.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- as an individual, to
9 place that license into abeyance to become the
10 qualifying agent --

11 MR. DEWILDE: That's correct.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- for license number
13 1494. Okay.

14 So, is there any public comment or questions
15 regarding the application?

16 Okay. Board comment or questions regarding the
17 application?

18 In line with Mr. Nadeau's comments, from legal
19 counsel, we do have the ability to consider Mr. Dewilde
20 here at this time, without consideration of the
21 corporate officer?

22 MS. PALMER: That's correct.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Does the Board
24 have any questions, comments?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have no questions.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
2 motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move for
4 approval, that Patrick B. Dewilde be granted an
5 individual private patrol license, that that individual
6 license be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
7 qualifying agent for Guardian -- excuse me -- Garda CL
8 West, Incorporated, license number 1494. This is
9 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
12 second. Any Board comment or questions?

13 All in favor, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
16 None heard. Thank you. Appreciate it.

17 MR. DEWILDE: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 30, Gene L.
19 Jacobson.

20 MR. JACOBSON: Good morning, gentlemen.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
22 you?

23 MR. JACOBSON: I'm fine, thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Are you Gene
25 Jacobson?

1 MR. JACOBSON: Yes, I am, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Great. Can you tell us
3 what -- about your background and what you're hoping to
4 accomplish?

5 MR. JACOBSON: I've -- as you all know, I'm
6 retired from two law enforcement agencies, already
7 retired. I'm an investigator, State of California,
8 private, and I've had my patrol license over there for
9 about five years, and I gave it up, and because of the
10 compliances, the licensing variation, et cetera. I'm,
11 basically, happy to act as a patrol operator to do some
12 of the undercover plainclothes work that I like to do.
13 So.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you found Nevada an
15 embracing state --

16 MR. JACOBSON: Yes.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- for your business?

18 MR. JACOBSON: It's exciting.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's good. That's
20 good.

21 Any public comment or questions regarding the
22 applicant?

23 Any Board comment or questions regarding the
24 application?

25 Entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
2 Gene L. Jacobson, dba Private Investigators
3 International, be approved for his individual private
4 patrolman license, and this subject to all statutory and
5 regulatory requirements.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I've got a motion. Is
7 there a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Board comments or
10 questions?

11 I have a comment. Is there a reason that you
12 used that title for a private investigator for a
13 security company?

14 MR. JACOBSON: It's just that that was the name
15 I picked. And instead of changing it -- if there's a
16 requirement or compliance that I should change it, I
17 would. Most of the individuals that are going to be
18 doing the kind of work that I'm going to be doing,
19 they're going to be wearing suits, and you're not going
20 to really see an identifiable, you know, insignia on
21 their, you know, lapel or whatever, because it's more or
22 less like a -- not to elaborate, but I've worked with
23 groups, and myself, like Prince and like several
24 actresses, actors, that where we've we had to go across
25 state lines, so forth.

1 This state's a little more touchier than some
2 states. California, it's much different than this
3 state. There's like 20,000 some investigators, and my
4 license is 5,087. So you see when I got mine. But this
5 state is -- you're a little bit more sophisticated on
6 regulating compliance. And it's kind of impressive over
7 here. So not to get off that, just that --

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But you would acknowledge
9 that there's a difference between the function as a
10 private investigator and that under private patrol?

11 MR. JACOBSON: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There is some overlap,
13 whereas in a private patrol capacity, you do have the
14 ability to do investigations associated directly --

15 MR. JACOBSON: Right.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- with the security
17 activity --

18 MR. JACOBSON: Yeah.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- but not freestanding.

20 MR. JACOBSON: Right. And just recently got
21 the license, and I'm just saying it's -- when they start
22 having to put uniforms on, and individuals wear
23 uniforms, then I would, before I would do that, I would
24 definitely contact your great team over here and find
25 out what the compliances are, believe me.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you. That's
2 all I have.

3 That's all I had. Any other questions or
4 comments?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I think, we have a motion
8 on the table, Mr. Chair.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, you're right. I'm
10 sorry. Thanks for keeping me in line.

11 All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
14 Carries. Thank you.

15 MR. JACOBSON: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Congratulations.

17 MR. JACOBSON: Thank you, gentlemen.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ramy Mekhael. Get that
19 right?

20 MR. MEKHAEL: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

22 MR. MEKHAEL: Thank you, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

24 MR. MEKHAEL: Good morning, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us a little

1 bit yourself and what you hope to accomplish?

2 MR. MEKHAEL: Sure. I started doing security
3 in 2005. I have my bachelor degree in criminal justice.
4 And I have my private patrol greater in the state of
5 California, under Lamar Protection Services, too. And I
6 would like to expand here in the state of Nevada.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
8 public comment or questions regarding the application?

9 Any Board comment or questions regarding the
10 application?

11 Hearing none, I'll accept a motion.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I do have a
13 question real quick.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: For Investigator
16 Batchelor, you didn't have any issue with the hours?

17 MR. BATCHELOR: No, I did not.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I just wanted to
19 make sure. All right. That's it. Thank you,
20 Mr. Chair.

21 And I'll make a motion that Michael A. Davis --
22 excuse me -- how about Ramy A. Mekhael, doing business
23 as Lamar Protection Services, be granted an individual
24 private patrol license, subject to all statutory and
25 regulatory requirements.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a second on the
3 motion. Any Board comment or questions?

4 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Hearing none, congratulations.

8 MR. MEKHAEL: Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 32, process
10 server, Michael A. Davis.

11 Good morning.

12 MR. DAVIS: Hi, how are you?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Tell us a little
14 bit about your background and what you're hoping to do.

15 MR. DAVIS: I'm Mike Davis. Currently, I'm an
16 officer on an existing license. We wish to add a
17 process server piece to it. I have extensive background
18 in operations in the legal end. I have many
19 relationships. That's really it.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
21 public question or comment regarding the application?

22 Any Board comment or question regarding the
23 application?

24 I have a question regarding your bankruptcy,
25 sir. When was the bankruptcy discharged?

1 MR. DAVIS: It was discharged, I believe, in
2 February of 2014. Maybe 2013. I'm not sure.

3 The bankruptcy was a Chapter 13. I spent over
4 five years repaying all our creditors. It was the
5 result of we had -- I was newly married. We purchased a
6 house in 2007. The economy tanked maybe two months
7 after we purchased the house. And my wife had become
8 unemployed. She became pregnant. And the person she
9 was working for didn't understand you couldn't just fire
10 someone because they become pregnant. But that's what
11 happened.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you -- was
13 there -- is this right after -- was there a divorce?

14 MR. DAVIS: Yeah. The divorce was in September
15 of 2014. So, yeah, that's correct.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The thing that came to
17 mind is -- and I just need a quick response --

18 MR. DAVIS: Sure.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- or a quicker response.
20 How are you able to have the money that you have in your
21 bank after just being released from bankruptcy in the
22 last 24 months?

23 MR. DAVIS: Sure, not a problem. My
24 employment, I mean I did pretty well with my -- the jobs
25 I've got. I've ran companies for a gentleman who had

1 something like eight companies. I've been a collections
2 manager for years. I also had some property that I
3 inherited that was left to me. And as a result of that
4 sale, you know, that put money in my bank account.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 MR. DAVIS: Yeah, but I wasn't broke before
7 that.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 Any other Board questions?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Shook head negatively.)

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
13 motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
15 Michael A. Davis be approved for an individual process
16 server license and that his individual license be placed
17 into abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent
18 for Saveh Security Network, LLC, license number 2197B,
19 and this subject to all statutory and regulatory
20 requirements.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I've got a motion. Is
22 there a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll --

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll second it.

25 Any Board question or comment on the motion?

1 All in favor, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

4 Hearing none, congratulations.

5 MR. DAVIS: Thank you. I appreciate it. Have
6 a good day.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Moving on to
8 canine handler, number twenty -- or 33. I'm sorry.
9 Nosey Dogs Detection Services.

10 MS. SCHNEIDER: Hi.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
12 you?

13 MS. SCHNEIDER: I'm good. How are you?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Would you
15 introduce yourself, tell us a little bit about your
16 background.

17 MS. SCHNEIDER: My name is Amanda Schneider.
18 I'm the owner of Nosey Dogs Detection Services. What
19 we'd like to provide is narcotic detection services for
20 commercial and residential --

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

22 MS. SCHNEIDER: -- customers.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there public comment
24 or questions from the -- from the public about the
25 application?

1 All right. Is there Board comment or questions
2 regarding the application?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just verification on --
4 with the investigator, with Investigator Batchelor, that
5 she went through all the dog handling qualifications and
6 such?

7 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, she has, and we have her
8 certificate, if you'd like to, if the Board would like
9 to see it.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm fine. Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Not from me. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
15 Nosey Dogs Detection Services, LLC, doing business as
16 Nosey Dogs Detection Services, be granted and approved
17 for a new corporate canine handler license, Amanda L.
18 Schneider be granted an individual canine handler
19 license, and that that license be placed in abeyance so
20 that she may become the qualifying agent of Nosey Dogs
21 Detection Services, LLC. Member to be approved is
22 Amanda L. Schneider. Subject to all statutory and
23 regulatory requirements.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a

1 second. Any Board comment on the motion?

2 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

5 Hearing none, it carries. Congratulations.

6 MS. SCHNEIDER: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

8 Number 34, Dyas Canine Solutions, LLC.

9 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, this item is not
10 going to be able to be heard today. We gave Mr. Valdez
11 a second attempt at passing the canine test, and he
12 failed. So we are potentially looking at him coming
13 back before the Board in December.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So we're just removing
15 it --

16 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- from consideration?

18 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

20 Item number 35, Timothy Wells.

21 MR. WELLS: Good morning, everyone.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
23 you?

24 MR. WELLS: Fine, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us a little

1 bit of background about yourself and what you're hoping
2 to do?

3 MR. WELLS: Yes, sir. I'm a 20-year retired
4 Army veteran, former police officer with the State of
5 South Carolina, and a proud member of the G4S Secure
6 Solutions team here for eight years in Nevada. I
7 currently have been serving, and I also have my license
8 with the -- as an armed security guard here.

9 And what I want to do with the canine license
10 is to continue our canine program. Okay. We do -- two
11 of our biggest clients are the Howard Hughes Corporation
12 and Sunrise Hospital. And we are looking to continue
13 and expand our program throughout the state of Nevada.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. And thank you
15 for your service.

16 MR. WELLS: Thank you, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment or
18 questions regarding the application?

19 Any Board comment or questions regarding the
20 application?

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I have a
22 question.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So, I guess, my confusion
25 arises from the agenda item. He's going to be the

1 qualifying agent for G4S Secure Solutions? Is that
2 what --

3 MR. WELLS: That is correct, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. And so --

5 MR. WELLS: Oh, pardon me.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So, I'm sorry, you
7 already have, do you already have a private patrol
8 license, or are you currently licensed -- you said, I
9 thought you said you had a patrolman, your registered
10 patrolman. Do you have a -- I guess, do you have a
11 license, and what's the number for that license? That's
12 my confusion.

13 MR. WELLS: Okay. But that's -- okay. I
14 apologize. I may have stated it incorrectly. I am a --
15 I have my private investigator license as a security
16 officer for the state, just a regular security officer.

17 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, if I could clarify
18 maybe.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

20 MR. INGRAM: Okay. G4S holds multiple
21 licenses. They have their security license. He is a
22 registered work card holder to work armed. They have a
23 qualifying agent for the private security. He is
24 applying for qualifying agent for just the canine
25 portion of that corporation.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So that --

3 MR. INGRAM: Does that answer the question,
4 Mr. Nadeau?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thanks, Kevin. I
6 appreciate that clarification. I was trying to figure
7 out how, with the dog handler license, he could be the
8 qualifying agent for the whole security company, and
9 that was where I was getting confused. So that's --
10 thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

12 Any other questions?

13 Entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
15 Timothy Wells be approved for an individual canine
16 handler's license and that his individual license be
17 placed into abeyance so he may become the qualifying
18 agent for G4S Secure Solutions (USA), Incorporated,
19 license number 1563, and that this is subject to all
20 statutory and regulatory requirements.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Jim, would you accept an
24 amendment to your motion that says qualifying agent for
25 dog handling aspects of G4S Secure?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Yes.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So the motion is amended?

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And I'll second that
5 motion.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

7 Any Board comment or questions on the motion?

8 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
11 Congratulations.

12 MR. WELLS: Thank you, sir. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Number 36 is
14 polygraph examiner, Robert Lundell.

15 Good morning. You're Mr. Lundell?

16 MR. LUNDELL: I am.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you give us a
18 little bit of background about yourself and tell us what
19 you're hoping to accomplish?

20 MR. LUNDELL: Sure. I've been an Oregon
21 licensed polygraph examiner for 34 years. Prior to
22 that, I was a police trooper for 14 years. I'm quite
23 old. I had a company back in Oregon. I have two
24 associates that work with me, not for me. We decided to
25 move to Nevada just for better temperatures. I planned

1 on retiring, but I can't. So I'm applying for my
2 license in the state of Nevada.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 Any public comment or questions regarding the
5 application?

6 Any Board comment or questions regarding the
7 application?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have a few, Mr. Chair.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Ms. Lundell,
11 where did you take your basic training for polygraph?

12 MR. LUNDELL: Spokane Community College in
13 Spokane, Washington.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. And do you belong
15 to any organizations connected with the polygraph?

16 MR. LUNDELL: Yes. I'm a full member of the
17 American Polygraph Association and the Northwest
18 Polygraph Examiners Association.

19 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Any disciplinary
20 action ever placed against you?

21 MR. LUNDELL: Any what?

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Any disciplinary action?

23 MR. LUNDELL: I'm sorry. No, never.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Thank you. I
25 have no further, Mr. Chair.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

2 Accept a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
4 Robert G. Lundell be approved for his individual
5 polygraph examiner's license, and this is subject to all
6 statutory and regulatory requirements.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second? Okay. We have a
9 motion and a second. Any Board questions or comments on
10 the motion?

11 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

14 Hearing none, congratulations.

15 MR. LUNDELL: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 37, under
17 private investigator and process server.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: He's right here.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Taco Prins.

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: He's up north, sir.

21 MR. PRINS: Hi, how are you?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
23 you?

24 MR. PRINS: Good morning.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us a little

1 bit of background about yourself and tell us what you're
2 hoping to accomplish?

3 MR. PRINS: Well, I've been employed by The
4 Advantage Group since 1997 and working full-time there.
5 And the current qualifying agent, Duane Isenberg, wants
6 to, essentially, live on the golf course now. So I'm
7 going to take over that role for the company.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Any public
9 comment or questions regarding the application?

10 Any Board comment or questions regarding the
11 application?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
15 Taco L. Prins be granted an individual private patrol --
16 or his private investigator license and process server
17 license, and that these individual licenses be placed in
18 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent for
19 The Advantage Group, license number 631. This is
20 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
22 there a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any
25 Board comment or questions?

1 I need to make a comment regarding The
2 Advantage Group. My company has on occasion done some
3 work. It's by no means a great amount. It's not any
4 amount that would cause me to have any conflict of
5 interest with regard to the license application
6 currently pending. But I make that public disclosure so
7 that the public is aware.

8 And with that in mind, all in favor, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

11 Not hearing any, congratulations.

12 MR. PRINS: Thank you, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you.

14 MR. INGRAM: Do we want to go back to item 24
15 that was trailed, Reshaw?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 24, that we
17 trailed earlier, under the heading of private
18 investigator, Albert Reshaw? Up north?

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, we probably --
20 the investigator, Jason, might have something to add to
21 this, that we might want to have on the record.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now, or do you want to
23 trail it?

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I think, we --

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Now.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: We can do it now.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Okay. We're back
3 up to item number 24 on the agenda.

4 Go ahead.

5 MR. WOODRUFF: In conversations with
6 Mr. Reshaw, he had mentioned that he may not be at the
7 meeting. He is continuing looking for work. So he may
8 be out of state in order to procure employment.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How recent was that
10 conversation?

11 MR. WOODRUFF: That was early August.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: August.

13 MR. WOODRUFF: And I have not spoken to him
14 since.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: With that said, I just
18 want to -- should we go ahead and just postpone it,
19 then, you know, postpone it until our December meeting,
20 and then go from there? I mean I don't want to consider
21 it without him here.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No. I don't -- I would
23 at least want to have some acknowledgment of the
24 knowledge of the date of the hearing and his absolute
25 unavailability reason, therefore, for not being here.

1 So I would agree with you, Mr. Nadeau.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Then, I'll go
3 ahead and make a motion that the application for
4 Albert J. Reshaw be rescheduled for the December PILB
5 meeting.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
8 second. Is there any public comment regarding the
9 application? Not much is needed, but.

10 Any Board comment regarded about the --
11 regarding the application?

12 There's a motion and a second to postpone to
13 December. All in favor, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
16 It'll be postponed till December.

17 That's it, right?

18 MR. INGRAM: M-hm (affirmative).

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. How
20 about we take a 10-minute break?

21 * * * * *

22 (A break was taken, 10:55 to 11:08 a.m.)

23 * * * * *

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there anyone in
25 the audience that is going to give testimony or speak

1 today, regarding a matter on the agenda, that has not
2 been sworn, sworn in?

3 Okay.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You haven't been sworn
5 in, have you?

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Stand up.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We could have the folks
8 in the hall -- if you haven't been sworn in, you need to
9 be sworn before you testify. Just raise your right
10 hand.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Hold on.

12 MS. PALMER: We'll wait.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: We're ready now.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Now we're ready.

15 MS. PALMER: Do you solemnly affirm -- is
16 everybody standing, please?

17 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
18 shall give before this Board shall be the truth, the
19 whole truth and nothing but the truth?

20 (Potential witnesses were sworn.)

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Raelene, I'm sorry.

23 MS. PALMER: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: We have -- one of you
25 will be testifying? Will one of who be testifying?

1 UNIDENTIFIED MAN: For?

2 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: For himself?

3 UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes. Okay. You haven't
5 been sworn. So you'll need to be sworn in.

6 UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Oh, okay.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: We have two more.

8 MS. PALMER: Okay. Tell me when you're ready.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Raise your right hand,
10 please.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. We're ready.

12 MS. PALMER: Do you solemnly affirm that the
13 testimony you shall give before this Board shall be the
14 truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?

15 (Potential witnesses were sworn.)

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We've got item
18 number 38, unlicensed activity appeal.

19 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, for the record, at
20 further investigation and with communications with legal
21 counsel, we withdrew the citation, number I-050-16. So
22 this issue is no longer needed to be heard.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 Item number 39, Tomas Baltazar.

25 Good morning.

1 MR. BALTAZAR: Good morning.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Baltazar, you've been
3 sworn, right?

4 MR. BALTAZAR: Yes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So what you've got
6 to say here in under oath, right?

7 MR. BALTAZAR: Yes.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. What
9 we'll do is staff will give us a presentation on what's
10 going on, and then you'll be able to address what they
11 talked about. Okay?

12 Please.

13 MS. DONALD: Okay. Investigator Donald. I
14 have Mr. Baltazar's record, arrest record.

15 In June of 2008, he was convicted of battery.
16 And according to the fingerprints, he received 36 months
17 probation and 21 days jail. This was out of L.A.

18 8-2008, convicted of carrying a concealed dirk
19 or dagger. According to the fingerprints, he received
20 36 months probation and 26 days in jail.

21 December 2010, obstruction of a police officer.
22 There was no dispo listed in the fingerprints.

23 April 2011, charged with obstruction of a
24 police officer, one count of battery and one count of
25 carrying a concealed dirk or dagger. According to the

1 prints, the obstruction charge was dismissed. But I
2 don't know about the other two charges. It did list it
3 in the fingerprints.

4 12-2011, he was arrested for one count of
5 probation violation. Again, no disposition was listed
6 in the fingerprints.

7 March of 2016, I sent the applicant an email
8 requesting court documents for the weapons charge. And
9 I also left him a voicemail, or actually left a message
10 with somebody at his home, on August of 2016, to return
11 a call back to discuss the charges. But I did not hear
12 from him, so I don't know the outcome other than what
13 the fingerprints stated.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were all of those charges
15 included on the application?

16 MS. DONALD: He did list all of the arrests,
17 yes.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What can you tell us?

19 MR. BALTAZAR: Well, I'm just trying to get the
20 license, the guard card, so I can start a job already.
21 And I've been going to agencies; you know, I'm trying to
22 get a stable one already, so.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What was the
24 reasoning behind, is there some basic reason behind the
25 criminal activity?

1 MR. BALTAZAR: No, not really.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So your last
3 involvement is somewhere around 2012?

4 MR. BALTAZAR: I think, I have one right here
5 in Nevada.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: When, when was that?

7 MR. BALTAZAR: Last year, I think.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Last year?

9 MR. BALTAZAR: Yeah, I think so.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what's that
11 charge?

12 MR. BALTAZAR: It was defacing surface, I
13 think, surface deface, something there.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What were the
15 circumstances?

16 MR. BALTAZAR: They gave me a citation. I went
17 to court. But they said I didn't. So months later,
18 they gave me a bench warrant. And I was arrested for it
19 and booked, you know. And they gave me like a few days
20 in jail. And they just cleared it up like that, I
21 guess. I got time served.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. You got family?

23 MR. BALTAZAR: Yes, I do.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Girlfriend, husband?

25 MR. BALTAZAR: No, right now, I'm single.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Huh?

2 MR. BALTAZAR: Right now, I'm single.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Single?

4 MR. BALTAZAR: Yeah.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you have any kids?

6 MR. BALTAZAR: No.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
8 questions?

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Well, I was listening to
10 the charges. But were any of them felonies, or were
11 they all misdemeanors?

12 MR. BALTAZAR: They were all misdemeanors.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All misdemeanors?

14 MR. BALTAZAR: Yeah, they were all
15 misdemeanors.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is that what the
17 reflection on the record is?

18 MS. DONALD: It did not list any felonies. It
19 didn't state they were felonies. So I'm assuming not.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Anything else,
21 Mr. Nadeau?

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, thank you. Thank
23 you, Mr. Chair.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Shook head negatively.)

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

1 I'd make a motion that we overrule the denial
2 and issue a work card to Tomas Baltazar.

3 Is there a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I'll second it.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
6 second. Any Board comment on the motion?

7 I have a comment. I made the motion so that
8 the Board could talk about this. And the fact that you
9 don't have any felonies on the record is one important
10 factor. But your activity in the last few years tend to
11 indicate that you may not be the type of person that we
12 want to allow to be in a position to be approved to be
13 eligible for hire by a licensee.

14 MR. BALTAZAR: Okay.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But I made a motion to
16 approve because all of them are misdemeanors, you did
17 disclose all of them.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. --

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I don't know -- I'm
20 sorry.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, Mr. Chair, if I
22 may, I'll wait for you to finish your comments. But I
23 have a comment.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I -- if I had
25 more, a little bit more latitude, I would be a strong

1 proponent that you not receive this card.

2 MR. BALTAZAR: Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But I believe that I
4 don't have as much latitude as I'd like to have. And
5 putting someone who has exhibited your type of activity
6 in a position of public trust bothers me.

7 MR. BALTAZAR: Okay.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And I haven't even made
9 up my mind on how I vote. Because I made a motion to
10 approve you doesn't necessarily mean in a couple of
11 minutes that I will.

12 MR. BALTAZAR: Yes, I understand.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Nadeau.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
15 Maybe I didn't hear correctly, but I thought I heard
16 that he has two weapons convictions, in which case he
17 had 36 months probation in both cases. That troubles
18 me. And what troubles me, additionally, is that he
19 continues criminal behavior.

20 I can't support the motion. I've got to tell
21 you that. I just cannot support the motion, for those
22 reasons.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 Any other Board comment?

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I have to go

1 along with Mr. Nadeau's reasoning as well.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Any
3 other -- let's see. Call for the vote. All in favor of
4 the motion to overrule the denial and issue the card,
5 say "aye." Aye.

6 All opposed, say "no."

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. You can come back
10 in a year. You've been denied.

11 MR. BALTAZAR: Okay. Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

13 David Lopez? David Lopez?

14 Okay. We will trail number 30, or number 40,
15 David Lopez.

16 Next is item 41, Zakeem Williams.

17 MR. WILLIAMS: Good morning.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. You were
19 sworn, correct?

20 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. All right.
22 We'll have staff make a presentation, and then you'll
23 have your opportunity to address it, please.

24 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. In 2011,
25 Mr. Williams was convicted under 1203.4 for carrying,

1 bringing a firearm into a vehicle, out of Long Beach,
2 California. Per the fingerprints, he received three
3 years probation. And he did disclose this arrest.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Williams, what was
5 the circumstances surrounding that?

6 MR. WILLIAMS: That, I picked up a couple
7 friends. I didn't know that he had the pistol with him.
8 We got pulled over. He kind of tucked it under the
9 seat. And nobody owned up to it. So I was the driver,
10 and they gave me the charge.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what kind of
12 time did you do?

13 MR. WILLIAMS: It was like six days in a
14 holding cell. They released me on a D.A. reject, and
15 they refiled on me six months later. And that's when I
16 took the probation time.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It was strictly the six
18 days for in-custody originally?

19 MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And then --

21 MR. WILLIAMS: Six days, yeah.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you successfully
23 achieved probation?

24 MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And that was what

1 level, a felony, gross, misdemeanor?

2 MR. WILLIAMS: A misdemeanor.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Anything else?

4 Okay. Any Board questions?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That was in 2007?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? Mr. Chair?

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir. Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That conviction was in
14 2007; is that correct?

15 MS. DONALD: 2011.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 2011.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Oh, 2011. Okay. And it
18 was a misdemeanor, and it was disclosed, correct?

19 MS. DONALD: Correct.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Correct.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you. Thank you,
22 Mr. Chair.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 I'd move that we overturn the denial of Zakeem
25 Williams.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second that.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any

4 Board comment or question regarding the motion?

5 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

8 Okay. Staff will --

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry. I should
12 have, during the comment period, I should have made
13 this. The reason I'm supporting overruling the denial
14 is because of there's been no offenses subsequent. He
15 served his time. It's a misdemeanor. And, I believe,
16 those, those circumstances are, in this particular case,
17 a single event. So that's, that's my rationale for
18 that.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

20 The staff will be issuing you a card.

21 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

23 Matthew Roth?

24 Good morning.

25 MR. ROTH: Good morning.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have a chair, please.

2 You were sworn in, right?

3 MR. ROTH: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll have the
5 investigator tell us why they -- why she denied you, and
6 then you'll have an opportunity to discuss it. Okay?

7 MR. ROTH: (Nodded head affirmatively.)

8 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. He was
9 convicted of carrying a concealed weapon, found guilty,
10 and served 10 days. This was in Las Vegas in 2008.

11 And in 2011, he was found guilty of a DUI in
12 Dublin, Georgia.

13 And in January of 2012, possession of less than
14 one ounce of marijuana, found guilty, in Dublin,
15 Georgia.

16 He did disclose all his arrests.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Anything you'd
18 like to say about the report?

19 MR. ROTH: When I was -- for the -- the weapons
20 charge was brass knuckles. I was not in the best area,
21 so that was why I was carrying those on me. I never
22 used them. It was only possession. There was no, any
23 kind of aggressive charges or anything like that.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 MR. ROTH: The DUI, I did a lot for that. I

1 did. I was on probation for a year. I think, I was in
2 jail for like a week, maybe like four or five days, for
3 that. And then I did driving school. I did DUI school.
4 I did, I did, I went pretty far in order to take care of
5 that, as well as a -- like, I think, it was a good
6 \$1,500 fine or \$1,300 fine.

7 And the marijuana charge was I was in Dublin,
8 and I went and picked up some friends. And one of them
9 had some marijuana on them. And we got pulled over.
10 And the back seat passenger threw it under the seat.
11 And, I guess, we all got charged for it, because I was
12 the driver.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How long have you
14 been here in Nevada?

15 MR. ROTH: Two thousand -- since 2012.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 2012?

17 MR. ROTH: Yes.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you had any issues
19 here?

20 MR. ROTH: I got pulled over one time for -- I
21 didn't have my wallet on me, so no driver's license. I
22 couldn't find the insurance. There was no insurance and
23 all that. But it was all there in Fallon. I just
24 didn't -- it wasn't with me.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

1 MR. ROTH: I got it taken care of, though.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What kind of work
3 are you hoping to get?

4 MR. ROTH: A security guard through DTA.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So they've already
6 talked to you and said, if you can get a card, they'd
7 give you a job?

8 MR. ROTH: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see. Okay.
10 Any other Board questions?

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I just want to make sure
13 that the 2008 charge of carrying a concealed weapon, or
14 what, that was a misdemeanor?

15 MS. DONALD: That is correct, and I was able to
16 look at court documents online, because it happened in
17 Las Vegas. So it was a misdemeanor.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. And, Mr. Roth, you
19 said that that was, those were brass knuckles that you
20 were carrying?

21 MR. ROTH: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 Anything else?

25 I would accept a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
2 Matthew Roth be -- that the denial be overturned.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
5 second. Any Board discussion?

6 All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
9 Not hearing any. The Board will, or the staff
10 will issue you a card.

11 MR. ROTH: Thank you very much.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Lorenzo Garaycoa?

13 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, for the record,
14 Mr. Garaycoa was unable to attend this meeting. He
15 requested that his hearing be postponed till December.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

17 Number 44, Phillip Avery?

18 MR. AVERY: Here.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

20 MR. AVERY: Good morning.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. The
22 investigator -- were you sworn?

23 MR. AVERY: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. The
25 investigator will talk to us about the denial, and then

1 you'll have an opportunity to address it.

2 MR. AVERY: Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. In 1995,
5 Mr. Avery was convicted of a felony of unlawful use of a
6 weapon. He was given five years supervised probation in
7 Missouri. This is called an SIS, suspended imposition
8 of a sentence. It's similar to California Penal Code
9 1203.4. His sentence was dismissed after he completed
10 probation. And he did list the charge.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 Sir, what were the circumstances surrounding
13 that event?

14 MR. AVERY: I was living in Arizona at the
15 time, where carrying a gun is legal. I went back home
16 to visit in Missouri, not knowing that the law was
17 different. I was pulled over, saying that my vehicle
18 matched the description of some kind of activity. I
19 told the officer about the gun. Since the gun was
20 loaded, that's when I was informed that it wasn't legal
21 in Missouri, and I was arrested.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see. Okay. How long
23 have you been here in Nevada?

24 MR. AVERY: About seven years now.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Seven. Okay. And you're

1 thinking you might want to get in the security business?

2 MR. AVERY: I was actually a security guard the
3 last five years. Five years ago, my guard card was
4 approved. So I was kind of taken off guard by it not
5 being approved when I was renewed.

6 I guess, this is complex type of situation as
7 far as how the charge is listed. Public record, with my
8 fingerprints not being ran, as far as employment-wise,
9 it won't show up. Unfortunately, when my fingerprints
10 are ran, it doesn't disclose a definition of suspended
11 imposition of sentence, meaning it's not an actual
12 sentence, and it's not a -- not an actual conviction. I
13 did provide that for the Board as well, as far as a
14 printout from the courts of Missouri.gov, explaining the
15 definition of the suspended imposition of sentence.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 MR. AVERY: Where it's also not a no contest or
18 nolo prosequi. And it also states, again, nor is it
19 a -- nor is the SIS a conviction.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

21 Mr. Ingram, you had something that needed to be
22 placed in the record?

23 MR. INGRAM: Yes. I was contacted by the
24 qualifying agent of CSC, one of our license holders here
25 in the state, where Mr. Avery was employed. He asked

1 that I read this email into the record.

2 Is that --

3 MS. PALMER: Sure.

4 MR. INGRAM: Is that okay with you?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Take it forward.

6 MR. INGRAM: Okay. So this is from Mr. Jay
7 Purves. He says: "Kevin, I was planning on being at
8 the Board hearing on 9-7, but I have the Life is
9 Beautiful tabletop exercise at Metro and will not be
10 able to attend. I would like for this email to be read
11 into the record for the appeal hearing of Phillip Avery.
12 I'm not certain what is in the background of Phillip,
13 but I know he was put into PILB provisional status and
14 received his guard card in May, June of 2011. CSC hired
15 Mr. Phillip -- Mr. Avery to work the EDC with us as a
16 security guard. Within the first year of working with
17 us, he quickly showed leadership qualities and was
18 selected to go through our supervisor training course
19 for EDC 2012. Phillip is one that I would say that I
20 could always depend on, and when he's scheduled for
21 work, he was always on time and would go above and
22 beyond his areas of responsibilities to ensure our
23 clients' expectations were always met. While he worked
24 with us, we received many favorable comments and
25 accolades from our clients, and we're proud to have

1 Phillip on our team. If his appeal is granted, I would
2 definitely give him another opportunity to come back and
3 work for us. Thank you for taking the time to read this
4 into the record. Best, Jay."

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 Is there anything else you'd like to add, sir?

7 MR. AVERY: No, sir.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 Have any Board, further Board questions?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Shook head negatively.)

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
13 motion.

14 I'd move that we overturn the denial for
15 Phillip Avery and issue a card.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there -- I think, I
18 might have cut you off.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, I seconded it.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 Any Board comment or question regarding the
22 motion?

23 All in favor, say "aye."

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, just for the
2 record, I'm supporting this motion because of the time
3 and, also, the fact that it's been dismissed after
4 probation. Those are the reasons I'm supporting this
5 motion. So, Aye.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 Any opposed, say "no."

8 Hearing none, they'll issue you a card.

9 MR. AVERY: Thank you. Okay. I do have a
10 couple quick questions. How soon would I be able to go
11 back to work? And the reinstatement, does it start, as
12 far as the expiration date, from when it's issued now or
13 from when I first applied?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The card would be issued
15 in the next couple of days.

16 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Or by the first of the
18 week. And then that issue date will be on the date that
19 it's issued.

20 MR. AVERY: Okay. Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 MR. AVERY: Okay. Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 Number 45, Carol Hyman.

25 Good morning.

1 MS. HYMON: Yes, good morning, Board.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You were sworn in?

3 MS. HYMON: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. The
5 investigator will tell us why they denied you, and then
6 you'll have an opportunity to discuss it.

7 MS. HYMON: Okay.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. In 1971,
10 Mrs. Hymon was charged with felony assault with a
11 dangerous weapon. This was out of Ohio. Per the
12 fingerprints, she pled guilty, and she was placed on
13 probation for five years.

14 In 1993, she was charged with two felonies for
15 assault with a firearm on a person. Per the
16 fingerprints, she was convicted and sentenced to 36
17 months probation and 270 days in jail.

18 And she did disclose all the arrests.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. '71 and '93, not
20 good years.

21 MS. HYMON: No, sir. I wanted to tell you, in
22 1971, I was about 24. And me and another young lady,
23 both was carrying a gun. And we was young. We got into
24 an altercation. We was friends at the time. But it
25 turned into both of us was mad and angry. And we was

1 drinking. And we both, I was scared for my life, and
2 she was scared.

3 And so she dropped the charges. I didn't serve
4 any time. And they -- I was arrested and fingerprinted.
5 And she, when we went to court, she dropped the charges,
6 because she felt part of it was her fault. We were
7 friends. And we became friends a couple years later.
8 And I wasn't aware of it was a felony until I moved here
9 to Las Vegas and applied. That was 45 years ago when I
10 was -- that happened when I was about 24 years old. And
11 ever since then, I have had no problem.

12 And I moved from Dayton, Ohio and transferred
13 with the General Motors plant in Van Nuys, California.
14 And while working there, I knew a young man through his
15 mother. He was married to a lady. And they got
16 divorced. And we started dating. He thought she was
17 dating one of my friend girls. But when he found out it
18 was me, he was very angry. Him and his sister
19 approached the apartment that I was renting with the
20 young lady, Rhonda Thompson, at the time. And he
21 threatened me with a gun. Which I called 9-1-1. I shot
22 him because I thought he was going to shoot me. And his
23 sister. There was two of them. That's why there's two
24 counts. It was him and his sister that approached me at
25 the apartment I was in.

1 They gave me a jail time. They put me on
2 probation. They let me move to Vegas. And that's why
3 I'm here. In '94, I moved here, because it kept causing
4 me a problem. We lived sort of like within three miles
5 of each other. So, they kept, basically, going to the
6 probation officer, having me in and out of court. So I
7 talked to the probation office and asked them could I
8 remove myself from this situation, because I was still
9 with his ex-wife. And they had been divorced about a
10 year and a half when this incident happened. And he
11 wouldn't let it go.

12 I'm still present with the young lady today,
13 Rhonda Thompson. We have a home here in Silverado
14 Ranch. We've been together 25 years. And I have not
15 had any trouble of shooting, carrying a gun. I've been
16 working. I'll be 69 years old next month, on the 13th.
17 I had a bad car accident in 1994 at the Greater Nevada
18 Auto Auction on the job. I've been broken up. It's
19 hard for me to keep a job now because of the injuries to
20 my leg and hip. I have some screws in place.

21 I feel that the guard card, I don't want to
22 carry a gun, but just security. Where my lady friend
23 works, at Green Valley, I can go to work there. But I
24 got denied. So I'm trying to just get a job to sustain
25 my -- you know, my income. At my age and with the

1 health problems in my legs and hip from that accident, I
2 can't do a lot of twisting and moving and, you know,
3 bending. So I was hoping I would get the guard card to
4 sustain, you know, further income.

5 I have not been in any trouble since 1993, when
6 this incident happened. And, I think, with me moving to
7 Las Vegas, saved me, because he's still, due to family
8 members, got a lot of anger with this ex-wife. And that
9 was the reason of the shooting. And I didn't go out to
10 him. He did come to my apartment, him and his sister.

11 I apologize for the incident in 1971. I was
12 younger when that incident happened. I was not aware of
13 it was a felony. When I came here, I had to register
14 with the Nevada police, from California. They did not
15 tell me I had a felony from '71. All of the jobs I had
16 since I've been here, never told me, until I applied for
17 the guard card, and that's when I found out that the
18 1971 case was over my head over 45 years later.

19 If you give me the guard card, you won't have
20 no problem. I've not caused any problem. I've been a
21 citizen here. I've been working for different jobs,
22 Walmart. I have gave my fingerprints, and nobody never
23 told me until this incident. But I feel I'm a good
24 citizen. I feel I deserve to have the card. I have not
25 did anything wrong since 1993. And that was because of

1 the relationship with the young lady that I'm still with
2 today.

3 And the 1971, me and a friend, and she was not
4 my lover, we were just friends, and the drinking and the
5 argument caused that incident.

6 And I have not been in any trouble from those
7 two incidents.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 MS. HYMON: And at my age, I won't be getting
10 into any.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 Any other Board comment?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
16 motion.

17 I move that we overturn the denial and issue
18 the guard card to Carol Hymon.

19 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, I second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
25 and a second. Any comment or discussion on the motion?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'm going to
2 support the motion. I believe, it's time and distance.
3 And so I will support the motion.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything further?

5 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

8 Not hearing any, the staff will issue you a
9 card.

10 MS. HYMON: Thank you so much, Board. I
11 appreciate it very much. You won't be disappointed in
12 me.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Appreciate that.

14 MS. HYMON: Okay. Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Jaime Castaneda, number
16 46.

17 How are you?

18 MR. CASTANEDA: Good. How are you?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. You've been sworn?

20 MR. CASTANEDA: I have.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Following along how
22 things are going?

23 MR. CASTANEDA: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. She's up.

25 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. In 2010, he

1 was convicted for possessing a dangerous weapon. He was
2 charged with a misdemeanor and placed on summary
3 probation for a year in California. And he did disclose
4 his arrest.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What can you tell
6 us about the arrest?

7 MR. CASTANEDA: It was the only arrest I have.
8 It was a misdemeanor charge. I was caught with a knife.
9 I don't remember if it was in my right pocket or left.
10 It was inside a pouch. It was handed to me from my ex's
11 brother-in-law. He had trouble with some guys, and he
12 was carrying it. And, I believe, the manager from the
13 McDonald's called the cops. The cops showed up. He got
14 scared, and he passed it to me. And I ended up taking
15 it. And I got, we all got searched. Other guys had a
16 weapon, and I had the knife on me. He -- he went home.
17 I went to jail, served probation. And I haven't been
18 arrested since then.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

20 MR. CASTANEDA: Since that charge.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I move we overturn
24 the denial and issue a card to Jaime Castaneda.

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
2 second. Is there any Board comment or question?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'm going to
4 be supporting the motion. And the rationale is it was a
5 misdemeanor, it's six years ago, and he served his
6 probation, and it's over. Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

8 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
11 The staff will issue you a card.

12 MR. CASTANEDA: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Jose Manuel Loera? Did I get that right?

15 MR. LOERA: Yes.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you sworn in?

17 MR. LOERA: Yes.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. The
19 investigator will give us some information, and then
20 you'll have the ability to address it.

21 MR. LOERA: Thank you.

22 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino,
23 S-A-L-A-D-I-N-O. The applicant was denied for his 2007
24 weapons conviction. He did list one DUI out of -- from
25 2010 out of Las Vegas.

1 He did not list a 1994 burglary charge, with no
2 dispo, out of Norwalk, and a 1989 controlled substance
3 possession out of Pomona.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What can you tell
5 us about it?

6 MR. LOERA: The reason I got denied was for the
7 2007 weapons. At that time, I was 26, a little
8 immature, not aware of the rules of how to obtain a
9 legal firearm. I am now a legal responsible gun owner,
10 have been for the past five years. I hope to get a CCW
11 in the near future, also.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

13 MR. LOERA: I need this card so I can get a
14 better job. I've been in my current job for the past 13
15 years. We now have new owners, and I think it's going
16 backwards instead of forward. So I need a better job.
17 I recently am a homeowner now, so I have a mortgage. I
18 have three children. I need a better job.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Was there a
20 particular reason that you didn't list the older stuff?

21 MR. LOERA: On the application, it said to list
22 things, I think it was six, seven years. So, actually,
23 I didn't list that one, either, because that was in
24 2007, that was almost 10 years ago, so. The application
25 only said list between six, seven years, I believe. I

1 did list the DUI, though, because that was in 2010,
2 2011.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So if the
4 application doesn't say that, you just misread it?

5 MR. LOERA: What's that?

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I said, if the
7 application doesn't say that, you just misread it?

8 MR. LOERA: What do you mean?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: If the application asks
10 for any conviction.

11 MR. LOERA: What it told me was to list any
12 convictions within six, seven years.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Am I incorrect in my
14 assumption that the application doesn't say that?

15 MR. SALADINO: I believe, it says any and all
16 convictions.

17 MR. INGRAM: Yes. There's no limit.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So if you misread
19 it.

20 MR. LOERA: Maybe I misread it, then.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

22 MR. LOERA: Because, I believe, I asked
23 Anthony, which is the guy that was helping me fill out
24 the -- online. So, I believe, I asked him, too. And, I
25 believe, he told me it was six, seven years.

1 MR. INGRAM: Can we ask who Anthony is?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What's that?

3 MR. INGRAM: I'd like to know who Anthony is.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's Anthony?

5 MR. LOERA: Anthony is the -- I believe, he's a
6 human resource guy at Loomis.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Human resources at
8 Loomis?

9 MR. LOERA: I believe so.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

11 MR. LOERA: But he's the guy I talked to. He
12 said to get my fingerprints taken and do the online.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
14 questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, I have. Thank you,
16 Mr. Chair. I have a question.

17 The 2007 weapons --

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Your very first part
19 didn't come through. You were talking, but we weren't
20 hearing you.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Can you hear me
22 now?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right. The 2007
25 weapons conviction, what, what kind of weapon was

1 involved?

2 MR. LOERA: It was a .22 revolver, Ruger.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Was it -- could you -- I
4 didn't understand the circumstances, again, on that.
5 What were the circumstances? Why did you have the gun?
6 Where was the gun?

7 MR. LOERA: Oh, it was in a car. We were in a
8 car, me and my niece and a friend of ours. And, like I
9 said, I was unaware of the rules and regulations how to
10 obtain a legal firearm. We were driving down, and some
11 guys pulled up next to us and started saying stuff to my
12 niece. And I showed it to them. There was never any
13 intent to -- the gun was -- never had any ammunition.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And you said that you
15 now, you're an owner of a firearm?

16 MR. LOERA: Yes, I am, sir. I have been for
17 the past five years.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did you buy that, did you
19 buy that in a store, or did you buy that from another
20 individual?

21 MR. LOERA: No, at the gun store.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. All right. And
23 the burglary, was that a conviction?

24 MR. SALADINO: There was no dispo on it,
25 according to the fingerprint report.

1 MR. LOERA: I was 14 years old.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You were 14 years old?

3 MR. LOERA: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. All right. No
5 more questions. Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 Entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I recommend
9 we reverse the denial.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We've got a motion
11 to reverse the denial on Jose Manuel Loera. Is there a
12 second?

13 I second. Any Board comment or question?

14 All in favor of the motion, say "aye." Aye.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Aye.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Two to one.

19 You'll get your card issued by staff. Your denial is
20 overturned.

21 MR. LOERA: That means I will get a card?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You will get a card.

23 MR. LOERA: Thank you. Okay. Thanks. I
24 appreciate it.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're done. Thank you

1 for coming.

2 Robert Milton Emory? How are you?

3 MR. EMORY: Fine, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you been sworn in?

5 MR. EMORY: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. The
7 investigator will tell us his point of view, and then
8 you'll have an opportunity to respond.

9 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
10 1992 felony arson conviction out of --

11 MR. EMORY: Long Beach.

12 MR. SALADINO: -- Long Beach, California. And
13 it was not listed.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do you know why
15 you didn't list it?

16 MR. EMORY: That was, I suffer from PTSD. And
17 that's part of my past I was trying to block out. I
18 didn't want to remember any, you know, anything in that
19 past. That was, when I returned from Vietnam, I was
20 suffering from critical chronical PTSD.

21 I was married at the time. I was under the
22 influence of what I found out to be an evil woman. She
23 convinced me that it was okay, since it was our
24 property. She wanted to get out of from underneath the
25 contract she had with her stepfather. We were buying a

1 mobile home. And she wanted to get out of the contract.
2 So she convinced me it was all right, since it was our
3 property, we could go ahead and, you know, destroy it.
4 At which time I did. And, therefore, you know, we ended
5 up with the case.

6 I served -- when I went to court, we did a plea
7 bargain for one year county time. I served four months
8 and 11 days and then was released, and have had no
9 problems since that time.

10 I've lived in the Nevada, Arizona area for 14
11 years now. And the company that I'm -- was working
12 with, when I got my provisional card, we mainly provide
13 parking instructions for oversized vehicles for the
14 casinos, mainly, you know, boats, pulling -- you know,
15 trailers, boats and that type of thing.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was there a particular
17 reason, though, that you didn't note the arrest?

18 MR. EMORY: As I said, that was just part of
19 the past that I had tried to block out. And I just
20 didn't even think about it, actually, when I filled the
21 application out.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So the arson was a
23 felony?

24 MR. EMORY: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And have you had anything

1 since then?

2 MR. EMORY: No, sir. And I am receiving
3 treatment and medication for the PTSD now. So that's
4 all under control. I got rid of that wife and got me a
5 better one, so. She actually keeps me in control, so.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see.

7 MR. EMORY: Yeah.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What have you done for
9 work most of your life?

10 MR. EMORY: Most of my life. Well, when I was
11 in California, I was working for security, worked for
12 Stanley Smith out of Long Beach, at the time of the
13 arson actually. And since then, it's mainly been
14 construction. And then V.A. retired me in ninety --
15 '99, '98. And I haven't worked really since then. I've
16 picked up maintenance work, construction, that type of
17 thing. I'm 65 years old. There's not a lot I can do.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for your
19 service.

20 MR. EMORY: Thank you, sir.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
22 questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, Mr. Chair.
24 When you were arrested for the arson in '92,
25 was the PTSD brought into this, was there any kind of a

1 medical diagnosis presented at that time, or anything?

2 MR. EMORY: No, sir, there wasn't, because I
3 wasn't aware of the PTSD at the time. I figured that
4 was just a normal -- you know, my mind set was that what
5 I was doing was normal. And I didn't get diagnosed with
6 the PTSD until I got with -- my wife had passed away.
7 At -- in '96, I got diagnosed with chronic PTSD and
8 started receiving treatment and medication at that time.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you. I have no
10 further questions.

11 MR. EMORY: Thank you, sir.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

15 I'd move that we overturn the denial and issue
16 a card to Robert Milton Emory. Is there a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
19 second. Board discussion?

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'm going to
21 support the motion. Thank you, Mr. Chair. I'm going to
22 support the motion. That was a long time ago.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm supporting the motion
24 as well. I'm very concerned that you make real sure
25 that any prospective employer is aware of your mental

1 state --

2 MR. EMORY: Yeah.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- and treatment, so that
4 they --

5 MR. EMORY: The -- excuse me. The employer
6 that I have now is aware. And he sees working with me,
7 with the PTSD, as well as the employment, as the event
8 staff-type security with the parking. That's,
9 basically, all I do is -- at the casino parking, they
10 have oversized parking for boats, you know, large boats
11 and whatnot, that can't park in regular parking. So
12 they send them to the off-site with us, and we place
13 them. And that's mainly what I handle. He's real good
14 at working with me on that.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I don't have any
16 ability to impose conditions, but you better hang onto
17 the wife you got, too.

18 MR. EMORY: Oh, absolutely. She's a keeper.
19 She can handle me. If she can handle me.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor of the
21 motion, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
24 We'll issue you a card.

25 MR. EMORY: Thank you, sir. Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Cornelius Watkins?

2 Good morning.

3 MR. WATKINS: Good morning.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you?

5 MR. WATKINS: I'm good.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Were you sworn in
7 earlier?

8 MR. WATKINS: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Great. So
10 the investigator will give us a presentation, and then
11 you'll have the opportunity to respond.

12 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Watkins was denied for his
13 2004 weapons conviction out of Milwaukee. He did list a
14 1998 and a 2001 disorderly conduct.

15 He didn't list the 2004 carrying a concealed
16 weapon, Milwaukee, or the 2002, 2008, 2010; they were
17 driving on a suspended license and then failure to
18 appears.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Watkins, what
20 can you tell us about the reason that you didn't include
21 those four different?

22 MR. WATKINS: I thought, by putting driving on
23 there, it was for all of the driving charges, not just
24 one.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All the what?

1 MR. WATKINS: The driving cases, I put driving
2 on this. I thought they were going to look up all of
3 the driving cases, not that I had to put every year, you
4 know, in order.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you disclosed one
6 driving case and figured we'd look at all of them?

7 MR. WATKINS: Yes. I put disorderly conduct.
8 I put carrying a concealed weapon. I put driving. So I
9 thought, I ain't putting what year each one of them was.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Now, was the
11 carrying concealed on that?

12 MR. SALADINO: That was not listed on the
13 application.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What was the
15 circumstances behind the carrying the concealed weapon
16 charge?

17 MR. WATKINS: I was 22 years old. And I was
18 moving from my mama's house to my own house. There was
19 badges, guns. There was the gun. And we had the
20 trigger lock on the gun. I told the police about the
21 gun on the inside of the car when he pulled me over.
22 And he took me to jail anyway, because it's illegal
23 carrying. He said, even though it's my gun, it's still
24 carrying a concealed weapon. Because in 2004, we didn't
25 have a CCW license. I didn't, we didn't get that till

1 2010.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

3 MR. WATKINS: I got that gun right now at home.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was that a felony
5 conviction?

6 MR. WATKINS: Misdemeanor. They gave me seven
7 days of house arrest, gave me a ticket to go pick my gun
8 up.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. So you
10 have no felony conviction?

11 MR. WATKINS: No.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And you just
13 failed to disclose on the application.

14 MR. WATKINS: I thought I put it on there, that
15 that's the number one thing I put on there.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, for us, it's
17 a difficult situation, because we're trying to determine
18 whether or not you were trying to hide something from
19 us.

20 MR. WATKINS: I know.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And most all of these
22 would not be issues that you would need to hide from us.

23 MR. WATKINS: Look back at the application.
24 That thing is on there. I made sure that was the first
25 thing I put on there.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, apparently, it
2 didn't make it all the way through.

3 MR. SALADINO: The ones I have listed were the
4 1998 and, in 2001, disorderly conduct. That's what was
5 listed on the application.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are you hearing all right
7 in the north?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Kind of, sort of.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah, we're getting the
10 feedback down here, too.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I think, you're getting
13 the feedback, because we were kind of listening to
14 ourselves. All right.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm confused. The
18 investigator mentioned, the first thing he mentioned was
19 the 2004 weapons violation. Was that the 2004 CCW
20 violation? Are those one and the same?

21 MR. SALADINO: I don't understand.

22 MR. INGRAM: What was the weapons violation in
23 2004? He's calling it a CCW violation.

24 MR. SALADINO: Oh, the carrying a concealed
25 weapon.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. And that, that was
2 a misdemeanor, if I'm understanding correctly?

3 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 Did you have a assistance when you entered all
7 of the information to the application?

8 MR. WATKINS: I did it in the office.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: In the office?

10 MR. WATKINS: Yes.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So the only thing
12 that we're wrestling with is whether we had a glitch in
13 our system.

14 MR. WATKINS: No, I know I put it on the
15 application. Like I said, carrying a concealed weapon,
16 I put that first, and I put a comma, disorderly conduct,
17 comma, and then I put driving, because that's all I had
18 from my whole life there.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Okay. Well, like
20 I say, the only thing that we're -- you know, none of
21 that stuff, had it been there, would have been a basis
22 for denial, except for the concealed weapons issue,
23 which we have to come and talk about. But we're just
24 trying to make sure that you weren't trying to deceive
25 us.

1 MR. WATKINS: M-hm (affirmative).

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Because most of the jobs
3 that are associated with this industry are based upon
4 trust.

5 MR. WATKINS: Right.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And honesty.

7 MR. WATKINS: Right.

8 MR. INGRAM: The app is up there, right? The
9 app is up there, right?

10 MS. IRIZARRY: Mr. Chairman, if I may. If you
11 want to give me 10 minutes, I can get you an image of
12 what he provided.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That would help me.

14 MS. IRIZARRY: Okay. If you want to give me 10
15 minutes, I can get that.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do we need a
17 break, or do you want to go to the next one?

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, I'm up for a break.
19 And if we're going to get -- we're going to be able to
20 see the actual application; is that what it is?

21 MS. IRIZARRY: If he did a paper app -- I'm
22 sorry. If he did a paper application in the offices, I
23 can get an image, and we'll provide it.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ten minutes? Thank you.

25 * * * * *

1 (A break was taken, 12:07 to 12:21 p.m.)

2 * * * * *

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's continue
4 with Cornelius Watkins.

5 At the break, we were going to wait for
6 information regarding the actual application. And we've
7 received that. And we'd like to hear about it, please.

8 MS. IRIZARRY: Lori Irizarry. So I was able to
9 obtain an image from the application that he filled out.

10 On May 10th, '16, where it asks for probation,
11 he does list disorderly conduct probation from 2008 to
12 2009.

13 For the arrests, there's three sections to the
14 arrest page. It asks if you've ever been convicted of a
15 felony. He marked no. Have you ever been convicted of
16 a crime involving illegal use or possession of a
17 dangerous weapon? He marked no. When asked to list all
18 other arrests, he does list the '98 disorderly conduct,
19 disposition dropped, dismissed, 2001 disorderly conduct,
20 disposition jail time.

21 And then he does list four other offenses in
22 Wisconsin as driving but crosses them out. But he does
23 not list the weapons offense at all.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a chance you
25 could, we could show that --

1 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- to Mr. Watkins?

3 (Mr. Watkins was shown via a cell phone.)

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Does that refresh your
5 recollection?

6 MR. WATKINS: Yeah, I thought I put it on it,
7 though.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thought you did?

9 MR. WATKINS: I could have swore I put it on
10 there, because I knew you were going to list it.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That was -- you filled
12 that out before you did your fingerprints, right?

13 MR. WATKINS: Yeah, she told me not to worry
14 about the driving. That's why the driving is crossed
15 out. So I had put disorderly conduct. And, but I
16 thought I put the carrying a concealed weapon on there,
17 too.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Any
19 other Board questions?

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'd entertain a
23 motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
25 the denial be upheld.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion. Second?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. -- Jim did the
4 second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I didn't hear it.
6 I'm sorry. Okay. There's a motion and a second to
7 uphold the denial. Board comment or questions?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, the reason I'm
9 making the motion is lack of disclosure.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed to the
14 motion, say "no." No.

15 The motion carries two to one. You're able to
16 reapply in a year.

17 MR. WATKINS: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Now we're
19 going to break. It'll be a quick lunch. And we'll be
20 back at 1:00 o'clock. Thank you.

21 * * * * *

22 (A break was taken, 12:25 p.m. to 1:07 p.m.)

23 * * * * *

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We're back on the
25 record.

1 The next item up is number 50, Jerome Eudori
2 Jordan.

3 Good morning.

4 MR. JORDAN: Good morning.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you sworn earlier
6 today?

7 MR. JORDAN: Yes.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Okay. We'll
9 start out with the investigator.

10 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
11 applicant was denied due to his 1999 felony conviction
12 out of Terrell County. And that's it.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What was the charge?

14 MR. SALADINO: It was a possession, possession
15 of marijuana.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: In 1999?

17 MR. SALADINO: Yes, it was distribution or sale
18 of marijuana in 1999.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Jordan, do you
20 remember that occasion?

21 MR. JORDAN: Yes. And, actually, it's a
22 misdemeanor. And it was -- I was 17. And I was at a
23 football game. And, basically, it wasn't -- it was
24 possession. Me and a couple of guys, we were
25 tailgating, and there was a joint, and the police saw

1 it. And the rest is history.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It went from a felony to
3 a misdemeanor?

4 MR. JORDAN: No, it was never was a
5 misdemeanor. It was -- I mean it never was a felony.
6 It was always a misdemeanor. It never was a felony.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But your fingerprints
8 returned on the felony conviction?

9 MR. JORDAN: That's not true. I would just
10 like to submit this. It did happen in Georgia. I got
11 my own Georgia felony record, sir.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: M-hm (affirmative).

13 MR. JORDAN: And it came back, no, no record.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That would be in --

15 MR. JORDAN: The State of Georgia?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah.

17 MR. JORDAN: The Georgia Bureau of
18 Investigation, I did a record, felony record search with
19 them just to verify that it was really a misdemeanor.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are you aware of whether
21 or not they only go back 10 years or not?

22 MR. JORDAN: Well, they go back as far -- I'm
23 not sure. But they go back my whole record. Plus, I
24 didn't find out that I had a record until I got hired
25 with the school board in California. And then that's

1 when they told me that, you know, they pulled my file
2 and said I had a misdemeanor possession conviction.

3 And, also, this is a receipt that I ran the
4 search and got the record.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The disposition on that
6 is from what county?

7 MR. SALADINO: Terrell County. That was in
8 Georgia. It shows he pled nolo contendere on that
9 charge.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Does it give the
11 sentence?

12 MR. SALADINO: It doesn't. And according to
13 the fingerprints, it didn't say anything about a minor
14 charged as an adult.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What's your date
16 of birth?

17 MR. JORDAN: March 8th, 1982. In the state of
18 Georgia, at 17, you're considered an adult. So I was in
19 the like 11th, 12th grade. And that's -- I didn't know.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So they charged you as an
21 adult?

22 MR. JORDAN: Yeah. I was like -- my parents
23 handled the case. I didn't know anything. I didn't
24 find out about this until 2012. So I didn't know what
25 charge or anything.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What have you done
2 since then?

3 MR. JORDAN: Nothing. I have no record.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What about for work?

5 MR. JORDAN: Oh, I worked with the City of L.A.
6 for a few years. I've also worked with UPS. I've
7 worked with FedEx. No issues. Like I say, I was, got
8 hired in 2012 with the Victorville, California school
9 district, and then that's when this came up. So I am,
10 I'm a pretty good stand-up guy.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

12 MR. SALADINO: And, Mr. Chairman, it was listed
13 on the application.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.

15 Any other Board questions?

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move
19 that -- this is Jerome Jordan, right?

20 MR. JORDAN: Yes, sir.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I just wanted to
22 make sure. I would move that Jerome Jordan, that his
23 denial be overturned.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
2 and a second. Any Board discussion?

3 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

6 The staff will issue you a card.

7 MR. JORDAN: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 51, Jose Manuel
9 Santandreu ("San-tan-DREW").

10 MR. SANTANDREU: Close enough.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Close enough? Can you
12 fix it so I know next time?

13 MR. SANTANDREU: "San-tan-DRAY-oh."

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It even sounds better
15 like that. Okay. You're under oath, right?

16 MR. SANTANDREU: Okay.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The investigator will
18 tell us what we're here for.

19 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied due to
20 his 1997 felony conviction.

21 MR. SANTANDREU: It's not a felony conviction.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let him complete.

23 MR. SALADINO: I believe, that's what it says.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: He'll give his
25 presentation.

1 MR. SANTANDREU: Okay.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Then you'll have an
3 opportunity.

4 MR. SANTANDREU: Oh, yes.

5 MR. SALADINO: It was grand theft of a firearm.
6 There was -- that was a felony. The adjudication was
7 withheld.

8 Tight, that's how it was?

9 MR. SANTANDREU: Yes.

10 MR. SALADINO: And that's the same, it was like
11 a California 1203.4, out of Florida.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

13 MR. SALADINO: And the applicant was forthright
14 with it. He did list it on his application and, also,
15 provided court documents as well.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you recall the event?

17 MR. SANTANDREU: Every day.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Every day?

19 MR. SANTANDREU: I was a police officer in Dade
20 County and got involved in politics. But I take full
21 responsibilities for what I did.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. The arrest was
23 when you were a police officer?

24 MR. SANTANDREU: No. Oh, and I had to resign.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You had to resign?

1 MR. SANTANDREU: They arrested me the next day.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see. Okay. All right.
3 Do you care to elaborate on the circumstances?

4 MR. SANTANDREU: Got involved in politics. And
5 this is what happens in Dade County when you get
6 involved in politics. And my guy lost.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Any
8 Board questions?

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, I have none.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'd entertain a
12 motion.

13 I'd move to overturn the denial and issue a
14 card to Jose Manuel Santandreu.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
17 second. Any Board discussion on the motion?

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'll -- I'm
19 going to support the motion. I seconded it. I'm going
20 to support it. Just as with the last individual,
21 Mr. Jordan, we're talking time and distance, no
22 additional arrests, and that type of thing. So that's
23 my position on it.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

25 Anything further?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."
3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
5 Good luck. The staff will issue you a card.

6 MR. SANTANDREU: Thank you, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

8 Antonio Arzola Martinez.

9 Good afternoon.

10 MR. MARTINEZ: Good afternoon.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you?

12 MR. MARTINEZ: Fine.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you sworn earlier?

14 MR. MARTINEZ: Yes, I did, sir.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. We'll have
16 the investigator give a presentation, and then we'll see
17 what you have to say.

18 MR. MARTINEZ: Okay.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

20 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
21 1990 felony conviction, transportation, or transport,
22 sell narcotics, controlled substance. And it was
23 dismissed under 1203.4 out of -- Visasalia?

24 MR. MARTINEZ: Visalia.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Visalia?

1 MR. MARTINEZ: Yes.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was that disclosed?

3 MR. SALADINO: It was not disclosed.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And that's it?

5 MR. SALADINO: That's it.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, why didn't you put
7 it down on the application, that you had this arrest?

8 MR. MARTINEZ: I think, I did, but I don't
9 remember the date or the year that I did it. That's the
10 only thing. And that day, I got out of work, and I
11 had -- you know, I was young at that time. So I had
12 bought some for me. And we were going to have a party
13 that day. But I ran the stop sign, and I didn't see
14 that the cop was hanging. He seen me. When he stopped
15 me, I had it on me, so.

16 And since then, I got out of the bad friends
17 and moved from that state.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what have you done
19 for a living?

20 MR. MARTINEZ: I moved to Indiana. I was
21 working. I've been working for what's called -- now
22 it's IC; before, it was IVP, and then Indiana Packers,
23 and then Washington National who were the traders. And
24 I found my girlfriend back -- I was only 17 when I met
25 her. And I moved up here, try to do, you know, a life

1 with her and her daughter and my grandkid. And I
2 started working for security from Anderson, and that
3 came thing came up, so.

4 For right now, I work for Camera Ready. I work
5 two days, three days out of a week. And we go to the
6 Craigslist. And I pick up metal, you know, to support
7 my girlfriend, her daughter and my grandkid. I try to
8 do something, you know, to make money.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So, you had a work
10 card before, and then it expired, and then you applied?

11 MR. MARTINEZ: Yes, they told me that came up.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

13 MR. MARTINEZ: Then I gave it to them.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. You got it before
15 from the sheriff?

16 MR. MARTINEZ: Excuse me?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you get your original
18 work card from the sheriff?

19 MR. MARTINEZ: No, from this company right
20 here, that the investigator, that's where I applied.
21 And they send it through the phone. And that's how I
22 started working. And then they took it off, took it
23 away. I worked like -- four days I worked.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 MR. MARTINEZ: And then they stopped me, and

1 they said they found that, so. The company told me,
2 when I take care of that, to go apply again to start
3 working with them again.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see. All right. Thank
5 you. That's all I have.

6 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, if I could clarify
7 something on the record. When an applicant applies, as
8 long as the initial background comes back clear, we give
9 them a provisional status pursuant to the regulations.
10 Then, when their fingerprints come back from the
11 criminal repository, if there's something on there that
12 would prevent us from allowing them to continue to work,
13 we revoke it at that time. And then they can appeal to
14 the Board.

15 That's what's happened in this case. He was
16 given a provisional. Criminal repository brought back
17 some records. So at that time, we revoked it.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

19 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
21 questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah. Yes, Mr. Chair.
23 Did I hear correctly that it was 1990?

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Eight.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: 1998 or 1990?

1 MR. SALADINO: 1990.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Nine zero?

3 MR. SALADINO: Nine zero.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Nothing else. Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
9 Antonio Martinez's revocation be reversed.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
11 to overturn the denial and issue a card. Do we have a
12 second?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board question or
15 comment?

16 All in favor, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

19 The staff will issue you a card.

20 MR. MARTINEZ: And how long would that take,
21 sir?

22 MR. INGRAM: It takes anywhere from two to
23 three days.

24 MR. MARTINEZ: Two to three days?

25 MR. INGRAM: We'll go back, we'll have to close

1 out the Board meetings. As late as Monday.

2 MR. MARTINEZ: Thank you. I appreciate it,
3 because I just had talked to my girlfriend and my
4 daughter and told them that, that if I didn't get it,
5 we're moving back to Indiana. Because I never been in a
6 state so hard. And, you know, one thing is good,
7 because they check you all the way back. And where I
8 was, they check you only five years.

9 And, but I appreciate what you guys did. Thank
10 you. Have a good day, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We appreciate your
12 willingness to stay with us.

13 MR. MARTINEZ: Okay. I'm staying. I'm going
14 to stay. They'll be happy when they know that I'll get
15 it. Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good for you.
17 Number 53, Maricela Lomeli Ortega?

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: She's up here.

19 MR. INGRAM: She should be up north.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, she's up here.
22 Are you Marisela?

23 MS. ORTEGA: M-hm (affirmative).

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon.

25 MS. ORTEGA: Hello.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you here earlier and
2 got sworn in?

3 MS. ORTEGA: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, she was sworn in
5 this afternoon.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll listen to
7 the investigator to find out who and why they denied
8 you, and then we'll give you an opportunity to discuss
9 it.

10 MS. ORTEGA: Okay.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 MR. SALADINO: Okay. The applicant was denied
13 for a felony DUI in 2010. It was also child cruelty
14 along with the DUI causing bodily injury. And it was
15 not disclosed on the application.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you said 2010?

17 MR. SALADINO: 2010, yes.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And that was the
19 conviction date or arrest date?

20 MR. SALADINO: That was the arrest date. She
21 served five years, five years probation, and there was a
22 few other stipulations where she had to take classes and
23 stuff. She completed everything that the courts
24 required. And she wrote that in the letter along with
25 the appeal.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us
2 the circumstances around the case, surrounding the case?

3 MS. ORTEGA: Well, it was just a mistake that
4 it happened, and I really regret. And I just finished
5 my probation like in February 2016.

6 And I just want to work. I want to be a
7 security officer. That's something that I love to do.
8 I wake up every morning and I -- I just do what I have
9 to do.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who was the party that
11 was injured in the accident?

12 MS. ORTEGA: I don't know.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was there anybody
14 injured?

15 MS. ORTEGA: The people that hit my truck, yes.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And you had a
17 child, your child with you?

18 MS. ORTEGA: Yeah, she was. And she didn't get
19 injured, thank God.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And how much
21 injury was there to the people in the truck?

22 MS. ORTEGA: I think, they got hurt on their
23 legs. And they weren't wearing their seat belts.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there anything else
25 you'd like at the add?

1 MS. ORTEGA: I just really regret what
2 happened. And I finished everything that the courts
3 told me to finish and do. And I just want to be a
4 security officer.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
6 questions?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: (Shook head negatively.)

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
9 motion.

10 I move that we uphold the denial of the work
11 card. Is there a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board discussion or
14 comment?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

18 I'm going to have to support the motion. I
19 appreciate that you've gone through and done what you
20 needed to do. But you need to have some time and
21 distance. You need to have some time between your
22 conviction and your probation before you can be a
23 security guard.

24 MS. ORTEGA: I'm finished with my probation.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I know. But it's been --

1 it's not been long enough. So that's my -- that's why
2 I'm supporting the motion.

3 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

5 I'll make a comment. The primary reason that
6 I'm voting to uphold the denial is very much partly the
7 same as Mr. Nadeau just indicated.

8 But you will have the opportunity, if you
9 decide to do so, to reapply in a year, to be
10 reconsidered again, or to be considered again.

11 And it would seem, with your explanation of the
12 occurrence, that you may still hold others -- maybe you
13 don't hold yourself as the absolute to blame in the
14 situation. But we're here to talk about your conviction
15 and the results of your conviction of a criminal
16 offense. So the fact that some other people in another
17 vehicle weren't wearing their seat belts didn't really
18 bother me too much.

19 So that's the reason that I'm voting to uphold
20 the denial.

21 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

24 Not hearing any, the staff decision to deny the
25 work card stands, and you're eligible to reapply in a

1 year. Thank you for coming.

2 Sharon Rene Keenan, number 54.

3 Good afternoon.

4 MS. KEENAN: Good afternoon.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you been sworn
6 already?

7 MS. KEENAN: Yes.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. The
9 investigator will give us a rundown, and then we'll ask
10 you about it.

11 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
12 1994 felony conviction for larceny, out of Florida.
13 Also, there was some probation violations in '95,
14 ninety -- that one was dismissed. Yeah, convicted in
15 '94 of larceny, and which it was a felony.

16 Then, in March of '95, there was a violation
17 where she pled nolo contendere and was convicted again.

18 And then there was a rearrest. And that date
19 was -- that was September 30th of 1995, out of Tampa.

20 And the one, the one that was listed was a 1997
21 petty theft, out of Florida.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was the '95, the -- were
23 the two arrests predicated upon the charge in '94?

24 MR. SALADINO: I'm sorry.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You have the original

1 arrest for larceny in '94, right?

2 MR. SALADINO: Right.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And then a probation
4 violation based upon that case?

5 MR. SALADINO: Right. And then there was a --
6 that was in March of '95. And then there was a
7 subsequent, another arrest in September of '95.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Based upon a probation
9 violation?

10 MR. SALADINO: No, it was a totally nother
11 arrest.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And these were not
13 listed?

14 MR. SALADINO: And they were not.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you know why you
16 didn't list these?

17 MS. KEENAN: Because I now work at Danville
18 Group Home, and I had to be fingerprinted and
19 background-checked to get the job. And I really had
20 forgotten about that '94 and '95 conviction. And I've
21 been on my job 12 years. And every five years, I'm
22 refingerprinted and rebackground-checked, and none of it
23 never came up.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you see, did you ever
25 get an opportunity to see the results of your

1 fingerprint analysis?

2 MS. KEENAN: No.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So this is the
4 first time you've come to know that one exists?

5 MS. KEENAN: I work with memory-challenged
6 clients. So I was background-checked and fingerprinted
7 before I even got the job.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, what was the
9 circumstances behind the '94 arrest for the grand
10 larceny?

11 MS. KEENAN: In 1994, '95, I lived in Tampa,
12 Florida. I had no job and five children.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And did you get into --
14 go into somebody's house, go into somebody's business?

15 MS. KEENAN: Yes, it was just somebody's store,
16 running with the wrong people. And the felony charge
17 came when me and somebody else went in the store, and
18 they put us together, the stuff that we had, they put us
19 together.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What ages are your
21 children now?

22 MS. KEENAN: My children are 25, 26, 28, 30 and
23 35.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. And what
25 makes you want to get into this type of business?

1 MS. KEENAN: Well, the work that I'm doing now,
2 I've been doing for the longest. A friend of mine has a
3 security company, and he had told my son about the job.
4 And when he told my son about it, I said that I would do
5 it. So I went and applied for the license.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see.

7 Any Board questions?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
9 We're getting a lot of feedback up here.

10 But I'm just trying to figure out, why was
11 it -- why didn't you put it on the application, why
12 didn't you list it on the application?

13 MS. KEENAN: I had forgotten about it. And
14 I've been fingerprinted and background-checked before,
15 and it never came up.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

17 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nadeau?

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes?

21 MR. INGRAM: The speaker's real close to the
22 recorder right there in front of Mr. Colbert. If you
23 move that speaker away, we may get a little less
24 feedback. I'm talking about the flat speaker.

25 There you go. Thank you.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So there's been no
3 criminal activity since?

4 MS. KEENAN: Not --

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- the mid '90s?

6 MS. KEENAN: Not since I moved to Vegas, since
7 2001.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You've been in Vegas
9 since 2001?

10 MS. KEENAN: (Nodded head affirmatively.)

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
13 the application for registration, or the denial be
14 overturned in regards to Sharon Rene Keenan.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

18 Motion and a second. Any Board discussion or questions
19 on the motion?

20 All in favor, say "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

23 Hearing none, the staff will issue a card.

24 MS. KEENAN: Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

1 Number 55, Francis Nicholas Irby.

2 MR. IRBY: Yes, sir, and I've been sworn in.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Great. You're ahead of
4 me.

5 MR. IRBY: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, we'll hear from the
7 investigator, and then we'll turn to you.

8 MR. SALADINO: So the applicant was denied for
9 a 2003 felony robbery. And it was dismissed under
10 1203.4. And he did provide court documents.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was it disclosed?

12 MR. SALADINO: It was not.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry. We didn't
15 hear that, Mr. Chair.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It was not disclosed?

17 MR. SALADINO: It was not.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It was not disclosed.

19 Yes. And the conviction was in California?

20 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What say you, Mr. Irby?

22 MR. IRBY: It was -- I didn't disclose it
23 because it was expunged and dismissed. And, also, I've
24 been working in security. And I work for the V.A., too.
25 I'm a veteran. I work at the Long Beach V.A. And then

1 they just issued me another one, guard card, from out
2 there, so. And I'm -- I was trying to move here, to
3 work at the V.A. here and do security here, too. So
4 that's the reason why I didn't disclose it.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 MR. IRBY: And my understanding of expungement,
7 it's deleted, removed, like it never happened.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: By the way, thank you for
9 your service.

10 MR. IRBY: Thank you, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other, any Board
12 questions?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

16 I move that the denial of Francis Irby be
17 overturned and he be issued a work card.

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can we get a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Nodded head
21 affirmatively.)

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
23 and a second. Any Board discussion or decision? Or I'm
24 sorry. Yeah, one of those, too. Discussion or
25 question?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just for the record, you
4 know, we've been dealing with this 1203.4. And the way
5 I -- after it was explained to us, it seems to me that
6 that's, as the -- as Mr. Irby indicated, from
7 California's perspective, the records, for all intents
8 and purposes, are no longer a record. So that's why I'm
9 supporting the motion.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

11 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed?

14 None. They'll issue you a card.

15 MR. IRBY: Thank you. I appreciate it. You
16 guys have a great day.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, if I could go over
19 1203.4 a little bit?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And, I think, in this
21 particular situation, you have to clarify it to every
22 one of the applicants, because that's their
23 misunderstanding, and.

24 MR. INGRAM: Well, based on Mr. Nadeau's
25 interpretation of what was discussed.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, but every -- yeah,
2 I mean you can, but I mean it's going to still be a
3 continuing issue, because they're of the opinion that
4 the fact is that they don't have to disclose it,
5 although our statute says you do.

6 MR. INGRAM: Well, actually, under 1203.4, it
7 says they must disclose if they're applying for
8 licensure, certification or a permit. So 1203.4 does
9 say that they have to disclose it.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And almost every lawyer
11 explaining it will indicate that they don't.

12 MR. INGRAM: From California, correct.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Just like the magical
14 lawyer down at the courthouse in Las Vegas will say, you
15 don't have to do anything after 10 years, you're as free
16 as a bird, you know.

17 MS. PALMER: Well, and maybe just to add a
18 little bit of clarification so that the Board -- your
19 consideration is suitability. So, if you believe that
20 you can say that they didn't disclose because of their
21 belief, and that gives you comfort that they weren't
22 trying to deceive the Board, then, you know, that would
23 go to your determination of suitability.

24 The same goes with the actual arrest, that it
25 isn't black and white whether it's X number of years.

1 Your concern is suitability. So for you to look at the
2 facts and the circumstances surrounding the arrest, if
3 you have that information available to you, again, it's
4 all about suitability of the applicant.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 Anthony Deshone Mask. Anthony Deshone Mask?

7 Okay. We'll trail 56.

8 Howard Bruce Sharp, number 57.

9 MR. SHARP: Good afternoon.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you?

11 MR. SHARP: Good. I have been sworn.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

13 Proceed, please.

14 MR. SALADINO: Okay. The applicant was denied
15 for a 1979 assault with a deadly weapons conviction. It
16 was listed. And it was also dismissed under 1203.4.
17 The applicant provided all kinds of documentation, court
18 records, the copy of the petition of the 1203.4 as well.
19 And that's it.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 What was the circumstances that can you share
22 about the case here?

23 MR. SHARP: Section 245A has changed over the
24 years. The actual charge was assault with force capable
25 of great bodily injury.

1 This situation was a business dispute where a
2 customer punched a coworker and knocked them, knocked
3 them out. I intervened, pushed the person away. He hit
4 me in the head. I hit him back, one hit. I hit him
5 extremely hard. And due to the damage, the jury found
6 that I used excessive force. It was a misdemeanor
7 charge, not a felony.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

9 MR. SHARP: And it was dismissed under 1203.4.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
11 questions?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Again, just clarifying,
13 it was 1979?

14 MR. SALADINO: (Nodded head affirmatively.)

15 MR. SHARP: '77. It was dismissed in 1979.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
18 questions?

19 I move that we overturn the denial of Howard
20 Bruce Sharp and issue a card.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Discussion, questions on
23 the motion?

24 Well, part of the reason that I would -- I made
25 the motion was I didn't get caught for many of the

1 things that I did in 1977.

2 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

5 No? Congratulations.

6 MR. SHARP: Thank you, sir. Would you

7 entertain a comment?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: As long as it's clean.

9 MR. SHARP: I have the actual original court
10 order. I think, one of the things that seems to be
11 causing grief with your decisions, if I may quote from
12 it, "the verdict of guilty be set aside and a plea of
13 not guilty be entered and that the court dismiss this
14 action pursuant."

15 It's pretty clear on your form that you have to
16 disclose it, and as well as 1203.4, currently. But, I
17 think, that's where some of this is coming up, because
18 in California you no longer have to -- for normal
19 everyday circumstances, you don't have to disclose that.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Appreciate
21 it.

22 MR. SHARP: Thank you. Have a good day.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Esther Joyce Bright,
24 number five eight, 58.

25 Esther Joyce Bright?

1 MR. INGRAM: She was taken off the agenda, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

3 MR. INGRAM: Her issue was resolved.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Remove 58. It was
5 resolved prior to today.

6 59, Raymond Lee Mingo.

7 MR. MINGO: Good afternoon.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon. How are
9 you?

10 MR. MINGO: Good.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are you sworn?

12 MR. MINGO: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. We'll hear
14 what the investigator has got to say, and then we'll
15 turn to you.

16 MR. MINGO: Got it.

17 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
18 1985 carrying a concealed weapon. It was not listed.
19 Once I called the applicant and inquired about it, you
20 know, being that it was so far back, that was the only
21 reason why it wasn't disclosed. He's provided all kinds
22 of court documents from the State of Alaska in regards
23 to the arrest. And that's why we're here.

24 (Cell phone ringing.)

25 MR. MINGO: Sorry about that.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What were the
2 circumstances surrounding the case?

3 MR. MINGO: Actually, it's pretty
4 self-explanatory. I was coming back from a martial arts
5 event, actually, at that time. And I had weapons inside
6 an actual weapons carrying case at that point, simply
7 walking back from the event, and an officer pulled me
8 over, seen that there was martial arts weapons in it.
9 And that was, basically, what happened at that point.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You pled guilty, they
11 tried you?

12 MR. MINGO: Yeah, well, I was walking down the
13 road with a big old suitcase. It was there, you know.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

15 MR. MINGO: At that time, I didn't realize that
16 you could plea like no contest, or. You know, I was
17 just a kid, so.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. This was when,
19 again?

20 MR. MINGO: '85.

21 MR. SALADINO: 1985.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: '85. Any other Board
23 questions?

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a

1 motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
3 the denial of Raymond Lee Mingo be overturned.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do I have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll second. Okay. We
7 have a motion and a second. Any Board comment or
8 question?

9 Hearing none, all in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

12 The staff will issue you a card.

13 MR. MINGO: Thank you, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 60, Charles Maynard

15 Allred.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: He's up here, Mr. Chair.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 MR. ALLRED: Hello.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon. Were you
20 already sworn?

21 MR. ALLRED: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. We'll hear
23 from the investigator, and then we'll hear what you have
24 to say.

25 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a

1 1991 DUI felony conviction out of Sparks. And it was
2 not listed on the application.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Allred, do you want
4 to give us a little bit of information about the case?

5 MR. ALLRED: Yeah, sir, sure. I was arrested
6 for a felony, but it was not a felony, and they thought
7 it was my third DUI, and it was not, it was my second.
8 I did go to court. They dropped it to a first-time DUI,
9 which is a misdemeanor. I have the documents here.

10 It was over 25 years ago. I was stupid and did
11 something stupid. And that's about all I got to say
12 about that. I was turning my life around, I did, you
13 know, and then I got another one. And now I don't have
14 much more to say about it. It is a misdemeanor.

15 This job, I have a job waiting on me if this
16 card goes through here. I worked for them for a couple
17 months. They said they would hold my job if this does
18 go through, if I straighten it out. I have had health
19 problems. I've worked construction all my life. I
20 can't do it anymore.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Can you --

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Could you -- oh.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- show the documents to
24 the investigator for me, please. Thank you.

25 MR. ALLRED: And this is a new field for me. I

1 could do the work. I do need the income. Like I said,
2 I can't do what I've done my whole life in construction,
3 pounding nails. It's pretty physical work, you know.
4 And this is something I can do. And I do have to have
5 an income to help my household out and keep me afloat.
6 So if it goes through, I would really appreciate it.
7 That's about all I got to say.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a disposition on
9 the case listed?

10 MR. SALADINO: According to the fingerprint
11 report, it was a felony. He pled guilty to it. And
12 that's all the fingerprint report shows.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MR. INGRAM: Investigator Woodruff is reviewing
15 the documents now.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll take just a
17 minute to let the investigator up north get through the
18 documents you brought to us.

19 MR. ALLRED: No problem.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you remember how much
21 time you served on this case?

22 MR. ALLRED: I got a \$700 fine and two days in
23 Washoe County. I've lived here since '67, in the
24 Reno-Sparks area and Carson.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

1 MR. ALLRED: And I own a house out in Silver
2 Springs. So.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

4 MR. ALLRED: Yes, that was like I said, I put
5 it behind me. And the judge did reduce it to a
6 first-time DUI, a misdemeanor, so. He asked about it.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I've verified that the
9 documents he has list it as a misdemeanor.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is that good
11 enough?

12 MR. SALADINO: Yeah.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. You say you have,
14 you lived in Silver Springs?

15 MR. ALLRED: Yes. Yes, sir. I have property
16 out there, a house.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: In Silver Springs?

18 MR. ALLRED: Yes. Yes.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, if you'll
20 accept a motion.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

22 MR. INGRAM: Can we, can we verify the date on
23 that document versus what he's showing? Because he
24 listed it in two dates. I just want to make sure that
25 the court documents that Investigator Woodruff reviewed

1 were in response to the felony, not the previous one.

2 Is that okay?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

4 MR. INGRAM: So do you want to --

5 MR. SALADINO: The date is 3-31 of '91.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a case number?

7 MR. SALADINO: There is a case number.

8 MR. INGRAM: Investigator Woodruff?

9 MR. WOODRUFF: I'm looking for the case number
10 now.

11 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Perfect.

12 MR. WOODRUFF: This one shows he admitted
13 August 13, 1985.

14 MR. INGRAM: And that's the previous arrest?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Is that the previous one?

16 MR. WOODRUFF: Did that occur in 1991?

17 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. We have a Sparks
19 PD number 91-3834.

20 MR. SALADINO: Yes, that's correct.

21 MR. WOODRUFF: Let me --

22 MR. SALADINO: And that's the one that was
23 reduced to a misdemeanor?

24 MR. WOODRUFF: Let me take a look at this one
25 for a moment.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, just give us a
2 moment, please.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How much longer
4 before your commute to Reno is shortened up by the new
5 road?

6 MR. ALLRED: They say at the end of '17, or
7 August of next year, which will be great, boom, right
8 over the hill there. But, yes, they're working on it.
9 They're going pretty quick on it actually.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, the government's
11 not involved in it.

12 MR. ALLRED: Yeah, they're doing a good job.
13 They finally got it rolling, and now it's moving, yeah.
14 It's going to take about 20, 25 minutes off my commute.

15 MR. WOODRUFF: Mr. Chairman?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

17 MR. WOODRUFF: It states here that the office
18 will not be issuing a complaint for a felony DUI, on
19 these documents.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Thank
21 you.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If you'll accept a
23 motion, Mr. Chair?

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please, sir.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I move that the

1 registration denial be overturned in regards to
2 Raymond -- or excuse me. There's too many names here.
3 I'm sorry.

4 MR. ALLRED: I understand.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Charles Maynard Allred.

6 MR. ALLRED: Yeah.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
10 and a second. Any Board question or comment?

11 All those in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

14 Not hearing any, the staff will issue you a
15 card in due course.

16 MR. ALLRED: Thank you, sir. I appreciate it.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 MR. ALLRED: Have a good day. Have a good
19 night.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 61, Hubert Lee
21 Lytle ("Lite-1"). "Lit-1"?

22 MR. LYTTLE: "Ly-TEL."

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Ly-TEL." Okay.

24 MR. LYTTLE: How are you doing, Board members?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you sworn in?

1 MR. LYTLE: Yes, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. We'll hear
3 what the investigator's got, and then we'll check in
4 with you.

5 MR. LYTLE: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 MR. SALADINO: All right. The applicant was
8 denied for a 1999 felony conviction for the sale or
9 furnish of marijuana out of Kern County, California.
10 And it was not disclosed on the application.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

12 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chairman, once I did notify
13 Mr. Lytle, he did provide a whole bunch of letters of
14 recommendation, as well as certifications and stuff
15 showing his California guard card registrations and, you
16 know, stuff to further his career in California.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 Can you tell us a little bit about what the
19 conviction was from, what the circumstances were?

20 MR. LYTLE: Yes, sir. It was a 1999 case,
21 which was a -- they had an informant, targeted certain
22 people who sold drugs and the people who sold drugs. I
23 was one of those that was caught up. Didn't sell the
24 informant no drugs. I got caught up, didn't take no
25 deal, went to trial, and I lost it.

1 I was convicted, did 22 months. It was
2 overturned by the appeal courts because of a sentencing
3 error. And it was, supposedly, I got it corrected. I
4 was released from the prison, the State of California,
5 spent 10 days, and received half of parole at the time,
6 because of the sentencing error.

7 After this incident, I went ahead and started
8 studying criminal law, because I was wrongfully
9 convicted. And I learned a lot more about dirty
10 informants. And I was caught up with one of those with
11 a dirty informant.

12 I apologize for not putting that down, because
13 I've been doing security work in the state of California
14 for almost 10 years, and I'm about to get a degree in
15 administration of justice.

16 I came out to Vegas with my family -- I have a
17 10-year-old son and a two-year-old daughter -- to
18 further my security skills and experience out here.

19 I was promoted. I came out here with Universal
20 Protection. They're out here, too. I was promoted to
21 supervisor until I was pulled. I didn't know that
22 Nevada goes back that deep.

23 Since then, I decided to go through for loss
24 prevention jobs here in Nevada for Smith. I work, I am
25 employed now for Smith until I can get the security

1 stuff cleared up. And I got positions available for me
2 for loss prevention in this Nevada area.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Was there a
4 particular reason you chose not to disclose the arrest
5 and the conviction?

6 MR. LYTLE: No, sir. I was under the
7 impression that I got my case expunged. When I was
8 going to school, it was sending out paperwork to the
9 students. If you didn't have any felonies, you'd fill
10 out this paperwork, and they submit it. I was under the
11 impression it was done, because I just got reissued my
12 California guard card.

13 I'm a few classes short of obtaining a degree
14 in administration of justice. My goal was to be a
15 juvenile probation officer. That was my goal.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
17 questions?

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
20 motion.

21 I move we overturn the denial of Hubert Lee
22 Lytle and issue a card.

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second? Okay.
25 Motion and a second. Any Board comment or question?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I am, I'm bothered a
4 little bit. I'm going to support the motion, but I'm
5 bothered a little bit about the nondisclosure.

6 So, for the future, I would suggest, on at
7 least Nevada applications, you disclose.

8 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

10 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

13 Hearing none, the staff will issue you a card.

14 MR. LYTTLE: Thank you, and I appreciate that.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 Alejandro Moctezuma-Catalan. Alejandro

17 Moctezuma Catalan?

18 Okay. We'll trail 62.

19 63, Johnny Carrillo. Johnny "Car-il-oh" or
20 Johnny "Car-ee-oh," 63?

21 Trail 63.

22 Lakya Jackson. "Lah-KEE-ah"; is that right?

23 MS. JACKSON: "Lah-KYE-ah."

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Lah-KYE-ah."

25 MS. JACKSON: That's okay.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon.

2 MS. JACKSON: Same to you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you sworn?

4 MS. JACKSON: Yes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll hear from
6 the investigator, and then we'll turn to you.

7 MS. JACKSON: Okay.

8 MR. BATCHELOR: Thank you. Investigator
9 Batchelor. Ms. Jackson was denied for a 2007 felony
10 identity theft and 2008 felony conspiracy to commit a
11 crime, both in San Bernardino. And both convictions
12 were dismissed under 1203.4. And neither conviction was
13 listed on the application.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us
15 the circumstances surrounding the cases?

16 MS. JACKSON: Yes. Okay. So I didn't list
17 them because, in California, I had got everything
18 expunged, like he said. And prior to after everything
19 was clear, I received my guard card again and one of my
20 firearms permits. So I thought everything was clear,
21 honestly.

22 I've only been in Nevada about five months. So
23 I didn't, you know -- I'm finding out now that
24 everything is totally different. So I did actually hold
25 a job for about two months at another security company

1 out here. And due to the unfortunate situation, you
2 know, I had to be laid off because of it, because of my
3 guard card and what happened, so.

4 I've been in the field of security for over 10
5 years. So it's like that's all I, honestly, know to do.
6 So I'm just here hoping to, you know, get another
7 opportunity with it.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, when you said that
9 you had your guard card and your firearm permits, that's
10 in California?

11 MS. JACKSON: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Board questions?

13 Any Board questions?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How long have you
17 been here in Nevada?

18 MS. JACKSON: Five months.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Five months?

20 MS. JACKSON: M-hm (affirmative).

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what have you
22 been doing since you've been here?

23 MS. JACKSON: I had, like I said, I did have a
24 job for the first two and a half months or so. So,
25 actually, I've just been trying to apply for different

1 jobs. No luck yet. So I'm just still looking,
2 honestly.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. And who did
4 you work for originally?

5 MS. JACKSON: G4S Security. My boss was
6 actually here earlier getting his license for his
7 canine. But I was with G4S Security.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Which one of their
9 facilities?

10 MS. JACKSON: The facility that I worked for?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah.

12 MS. JACKSON: It was called Painted Desert. It
13 was like a community home association. I pretty much
14 logged all the visitors and the residents in and out of
15 the resident, just pretty doing like access control, you
16 could say.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

18 MS. JACKSON: And I was there until they, you
19 know, gained the call that the provisional didn't, you
20 know, go through, or what have you.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Okay.
22 Entertain a motion.

23 I move that we overturn the denial for Lakya
24 Jackson and issue a card.

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second? Okay.
2 There's a motion and a second. Any Board comment or
3 question?

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You know, I'm -- I guess,
7 I'm going to support the motion. But I'm concerned
8 about the identities theft issue. But I -- again, we're
9 dealing with how California handles their criminal
10 convictions. So I'm going to support the motion, but
11 I -- and the fact that she's had a guard card in
12 California for 10 years says something.

13 So, anyway, I'm going to support the motion,
14 but I at least had to get that on the record.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, I agree. I
16 probably -- I intend to support the motion, but I -- the
17 catalyst for me is the California issuance of the guard
18 card and the firearm permit. So.

19 All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
22 Hearing none, we'll issue you a card.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mustafa Ansari?
24 Close?

25 MR. ANSARI: Perfect. Perfect, yes.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

2 MR. ANSARI: Good afternoon, ladies and
3 gentlemen of the Board.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon. You've
5 already been sworn, right?

6 MR. ANSARI: Yes, sir, I have, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. We'll hear
8 from the investigator, and then we'll check in with you.

9 MR. ANSARI: Yeah.

10 MR. BATCHELOR: Mr. Ansari was denied for a
11 1974 felony bank robbery in Chicago when he was 23 years
12 old.

13 He was also arrested in 1988 for a failure to
14 provide a child -- provide for a child, and with no
15 disposition on the fingerprint report.

16 And Mr. Ansari was also arrested in 2006 for
17 domestic violence in Oakland, also with no disposition
18 off the fingerprint report.

19 And all, all of these charges, they were listed
20 on his application.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 Let's see. Let's start with bank robbery in
23 1974. What were the circumstances around that case?

24 MR. ANSARI: Thank you, Your Honor. I was
25 convicted under the Federal Youth Corrections Act in

1 1974. And under the Youth Corrections Act, my
2 conviction was set aside. And from the case reports,
3 from the case law, it says when you're under the Federal
4 Youth Corrections Act, that set aside is stronger than a
5 presidential pardon. Because they say, under the
6 congressional intent, it was -- it's for rehabilitation
7 and -- and for this. And so, and one of the main things
8 in that is that, the repair of the civil act liberties
9 and civil obligations. And most paramount in that was
10 the right to work.

11 So I'm kind of surprised that I'm here. It's
12 been a circuitous route. After '74, I went to law
13 school. I went to -- I obtained a baccalaureate degree,
14 graduated cum laude, and then went to law school,
15 graduated from law school. So I, then, have owned
16 several clinics. And I've been working in the law field
17 for probably about 20 years. Presently, I'm a professor
18 of law. I teach human rights.

19 And so it's never, it's never come up. Even
20 law school, I can apply for the bar, I can be a member
21 of the bar. Because it's set aside. And it's
22 tantamount to an arrest record. It's just an arrest.
23 It should be there. It's not an expungement. But it's
24 just an arrest record.

25 So I'm just very surprised that I -- that that

1 was held against me, because it never has been in law
2 school. In the colleges, I worked as a professor of
3 political science for five years, never been, never been
4 brought up. I worked through law school. I had to
5 work through law school. So I worked in law school
6 being a security guard, and it's never been brought up.

7 So I'm -- I was -- when Mr. Ingram informed me
8 of that, and the investigator had informed me of that, I
9 was, I was, I was very much surprised. Because in
10 reading the case law and finding out that the conviction
11 set aside provision under 5021 is better than a
12 presidential pardon, and then reading the other, further
13 case law saying that it's not a debilitating offense, I
14 mean debilitating affair, because of the fact that it
15 has been set aside and I have been rehabilitated.

16 And I think that my performance since then has,
17 has -- and I noticed that counsel talked about
18 suitability. I just really was surprised. I went to
19 Mr. Ingram and the investigator about it. But they
20 said, because it's a set-aside, that the Board wanted to
21 see and understand why it was a set-aside, I mean they
22 wanted to have everyone who had a set-aside come before
23 the Board.

24 And this set-aside is very different. It's a
25 set-aside under 5021, which is very different. This is

1 stronger than a presidential pardon.

2 So I'm a little bit miffed, and, but I
3 understand what the -- what everyone is -- has a
4 responsibility to do here. But I was kind of surprised
5 to be before the Board.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: At any time, did you take
7 any action to have it removed from your FBI fingerprint
8 record?

9 MR. ANSARI: That's, that's my -- that's my --
10 that's my -- well, actually, it says it's supposed to be
11 sealed. And so, when I worked in California, I worked
12 as a professor in California. No, it didn't come up
13 while I was a professor. It came up when -- after I was
14 a professor, and I was doing some substitute teaching.
15 And I went through the same thing with the California
16 conditional board. And the second, the second time, my
17 provisional was renewed, not the first time, so the
18 second time it was renewed, it came up. And the board,
19 the conditional board checked it out. The California
20 teachers conditional board came up. And it was -- they
21 okayed it, I mean.

22 And so I know I had a problem, because it
23 should have really -- it should have been sealed. But
24 the case law says that it's not as -- as strong as an
25 expungement. So. So employees have the opportunity to

1 look at it. It's like an arrest record. So I didn't, I
2 didn't seal it, because under the statute, it should
3 have been sealed. But it's something that you could
4 see, so.

5 I just, I just -- the inferences, though, that
6 come out of it is that, is that I shouldn't be denied
7 the right to work. Because that was one of the major --
8 that was the Congress, Congressional intent, was that
9 I'd be allowed, after rehabilitation, to have no
10 debilitations in any civil liberties, holding I can be a
11 witness, an expert witness in any case. I can be a
12 member of the bar in all of the states.

13 I just -- you know, it's just -- so since I'm
14 in semi-retirement now, it's -- and I say
15 semi-retirement, because I still teach civil human
16 rights courses right now. So I'm just -- and this all
17 was the reason for my appeal. I'm just a little bit
18 miffed as to why it came up.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What about the
20 case in 1988?

21 MR. ANSARI: Which case was that?

22 MR. BATCHELOR: Failure to provide for a child.

23 MR. ANSARI: I was -- I was -- I was -- I owned
24 several legal clinics at the time. And the only thing I
25 can think about -- and this is what me and the district

1 attorney talked about. Because at that time, my child
2 was in private school. So it was totally a false
3 charge. As soon as I went to the -- before the court,
4 the district attorney, very honestly, said we dismissed
5 in the interest of justice. And that was a correct -- I
6 should have never been charged with that, because my
7 child -- I always provided for all my children. I have
8 three children. I've always provided for all my
9 children. My children are in private school. So that
10 was a totally a false charge.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And the domestic violence
12 in 2006?

13 MR. ANSARI: I went to a jury trial, and that
14 was dismissed because -- and I was found not guilty,
15 because it just didn't happen.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do we have any
17 dispositions that reflect that?

18 MR. BATCHELOR: We don't. I've asked for them
19 several months ago, from Mr. Ansari, with no luck.

20 MR. ANSARI: Well, I did send it to you. And
21 what I sent to you was -- because it was more than 10
22 years ago, the courthouse didn't have the record. But
23 because it was a dismissal -- and that's what I presume.
24 I'm not sure of it. Because it was a dismissal, a jury
25 trial -- well, it wasn't a dismissal. It was a jury

1 trial acquittal. It was an acquittal on the facts. So,
2 because of that, they didn't keep it. So. And I wasn't
3 able to obtain it.

4 MR. INGRAM: Is he licensed to practice law?
5 Does he have his license to practice law?

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh. Did you say you were
7 licensed to practice?

8 MR. ANSARI: I'm a member of the international
9 bar.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

11 MR. ANSARI: And I teach human rights.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So you're not a
13 member of any state bar?

14 MR. ANSARI: No.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And where did you
16 get your degree?

17 MR. ANSARI: New College of California Law
18 School.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: New College?

20 MR. ANSARI: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Have you done
22 security-type work before?

23 MR. ANSARI: I worked my way through law
24 school. So I held a guard card for about six, seven
25 years. Then it was because -- and then I graduated from

1 law school. And I haven't returned to work, since I'm
2 now coming into semi-retirement.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So guard card or security
4 card?

5 MR. ANSARI: Security card, yeah.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what state was that
7 in?

8 MR. ANSARI: California.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And when was the last
10 time that you actively had a California BSIS card?

11 MR. ANSARI: 2006 or 2008, one of those. But I
12 haven't worked in security for -- since when I
13 graduated, was in 2000. Well, 2000.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So we're here
15 based upon a denial based upon lack of disclosure,
16 correct?

17 MR. BATCHELOR: No, that's not correct. It's
18 based on the '74 felony conviction that was set aside.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

20 MR. BATCHELOR: Yeah.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So it was disclosed?

22 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Any
24 other Board questions, comments?

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
3 Mustafa Ansari, that the denial be overturned.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Do I
6 have a have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 Any Board question or comment on the motion?
10 Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, say
11 "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
14 None heard. We will issue you a card.

15 MR. ANSARI: All right. Thank you, sir.
16 That's fine.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Wanda Wells? Wanda
18 Wells?

19 MR. INGRAM: She's here.

20 MS. WELLS: I'm here.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, thank you.

22 MS. WELLS: I'm sworn in.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Great. Thank you. I
24 appreciate it. We'll hear from the investigator, and
25 then we'll talk with you.

1 MS. WELLS: Thank you.

2 MR. BATCHELOR: Ms. Wells was denied for a 1990
3 felony possession of cocaine and for purposes of sale
4 in L.A. County. And the conviction was dismissed under
5 1203.4. And she did list it on the application.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us a
7 little bit, something about the case?

8 MS. WELLS: Oh. I was, at the time, I was
9 living with my brother. I had moved in with my brother.
10 And all I know is they raided the house. And I went to
11 jail. He went to jail. And I did -- I was on three
12 years probation, and I did two months, and they me an
13 expungement. They expunged me.

14 And I've been living in Vegas, and I've been
15 working security for 10 years.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who have you been working
17 for in Vegas?

18 MS. WELLS: I've worked for a lot of companies,
19 a lot of companies. And I just started at my new
20 company, where I work, my new company, United Security.
21 But I had to come here to try to get my card back so I
22 could start back to work.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

24 MR. BATCHELOR: And this was on a renewal. She
25 had a card previously.

1 MS. WELLS: Yeah, I had a card before.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Issued by us or --

3 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- by the sheriff?

5 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, us.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Issued by us. All right.

7 Any Board questions, comments?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I move we overturn
10 the denial and issue a work card to Wanda Wells.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
13 question on the motion?

14 All in favor, say "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
17 Hearing none, we'll issue you a card.

18 MS. WELLS: Thank you. Thank you very much.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 67, Christopher
20 Goodwin. Christopher Goodwin?

21 MR. GOODWIN: Here.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Were you
23 sworn before?

24 MR. GOODWIN: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

1 Proceed, please.

2 MR. BATCHELOR: All right. Mr. Goodwin was
3 denied for a 2010 misdemeanor drug addict in possession
4 of a firearm, which was later dismissed under 1203.4.

5 Mr. Goodwin was also convicted of a felony
6 possession of narcotics twice in 2002. And both of
7 those convictions were dismissed under Penal Code
8 1210.1, which is very similar to 1203.4. It's for drug
9 offenses. They have a special penal code for that.

10 He did not list any of his convictions.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Was there a
12 particular reason you didn't list these, Mr. Goodwin?

13 MR. GOODWIN: I kind of misunderstood where I
14 was to disclose my past.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

16 MR. GOODWIN: I thought it was after a certain
17 amount of years, six, seven years, I'd have to put it
18 there. So I didn't put it there. I thought that I
19 was -- because it was dismissed, that I would not have
20 to put it there, so.

21 The firearm charge, I was in the wrong place at
22 the wrong time. I was visiting a lady friend. And not
23 only -- I was there like 15 minutes, and the police came
24 in the door to raid her house, threatened to take her
25 kid to CPS. I was in a blind to the whole situation. I

1 was in the middle of a raid. When they tried to take
2 the kid to CPS, I was just sitting there, and it was
3 like everybody's going to jail, and I was like, "No, you
4 don't have to take the baby," you know. You know, they
5 came in to get the kid, and the mom was crying. So I
6 took it, said they want to take the kid. But it left me
7 here today.

8 So that's how I ended up in the situation.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did at any point
10 in time you agree that you had a narcotics problem?

11 MR. GOODWIN: No, I was -- actually, I was in
12 the wrong place at the wrong time growing up. I was
13 young, hanged out with a lot of different people at the
14 young age. I had no father at home. I had to grow up.
15 So I became -- moved here to Vegas. I moved here,
16 because to show my son how to be a working man and not a
17 hang-out man. You know, I have an eight-year-old
18 daughter and a 13-year-old son, that's about to turn 13.
19 And I'm just here to show them. I moved to show my
20 kids, you know, the real part of life and, you know, not
21 the fun part.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you had any issues
23 since 2010?

24 MR. GOODWIN: No, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you been able to

1 keep a regular job?

2 MR. GOODWIN: Yes, sir. I just got hired at
3 the Sigua Suite last week. And they allowed me to come
4 to my hearing this morning. I'm missing work today.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Pretty
6 understanding, though. For a new employee, I'd say
7 that's understanding of them to let you go handle
8 business.

9 MR. GOODWIN: Yeah.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
11 questions?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, Mr. Chair?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

15 This is for the investigator. There was a 2010
16 possession. What was that charge, again?

17 MR. BATCHELOR: It was a misdemeanor drug
18 addict in possession of a firearm. So it was a firearms
19 conviction.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: But it was dismissed; is
21 that correct?

22 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, it was dismissed under
23 1203.4.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Got you. Thank
25 you.

1 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

3 Any other questions?

4 I'd move that we overturn the denial for
5 Christopher Goodwin and issue a card.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board questions or
8 comments on the motion?

9 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

12 Motion carries. We'll let you get a card. In
13 the future, in Nevada, when it says fill it out all,
14 fill it out all. You wouldn't be here.

15 MR. GOODWIN: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Dennis Meade.

17 MR. MEADE: And it looks like I got this one.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Appreciate
19 it. We'll hear from the investigator.

20 MR. BATCHELOR: Mr. Meade was denied for a 1993
21 possession of a dangerous weapon conviction in
22 San Luis Obispo at 21 years of age.

23 He was also convicted of a 2003 felony
24 receiving stolen property in L.A. County. And that was
25 dismissed under 1203.4.

1 He did list the felony stolen property
2 conviction. He did not list the 1993 possession of a
3 dangerous weapons conviction.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us a
5 little something about, first, why you didn't list the
6 1993 case, and a little bit of something about both
7 cases?

8 MR. MEADE: Well, in -- not disclosing, I
9 apologize for that. It was kind of a rush for an
10 application process, because the company I worked for in
11 May was just being hired to work for EDC coming up. So
12 we all did the mass application at the same time. We
13 were all filling everything out. I blanked on that. I
14 apologize. I forgot to put that down.

15 When the investigator called me about it, I
16 remembered right away what happened. I sent in the
17 paperwork that I had on it and the disposition. It was
18 a misdemeanor. I did three years probation on that. So
19 my probation was done.

20 It was a bad time for me in '93. My
21 grandfather passed away in March. April, I got
22 arrested. I was in -- currently enrolled in
23 administration of justice courses going towards law
24 enforcement. After my grandfather passed, my friend
25 took me up north. I had had my firearms class the day

1 before, had the weapon in my truck. When we got stopped
2 by the police, they asked me. I said yes. They
3 arrested me for it. I pled. Misdemeanor, probation.
4 That was that.

5 2003, my vehicle matched another suspect
6 vehicle in the area. They stopped me. My friend, who
7 was in the process of moving apartments, he had been
8 staying with me. He was an L.A. County sheriff's
9 deputy. Some of his property was in the back of my
10 truck, just because he'd been staying with me, going
11 back and forth. I had to take him to work.

12 They charged me with an impersonation charge
13 and the felony possession of stolen property, which, by
14 California standards, was just reduced a couple years
15 ago to a misdemeanor across the board, anything under
16 950. And that one, they did have dismissed. And I know
17 there's a little confusion in California.

18 I worked in the private sector in technology
19 until about 2007. From there, I became a security
20 manager of a nightclub in California and Hollywood.
21 We'd deal with about two to three thousand people per
22 night, on the weekends, after hours. And then,
23 recently, I've been doing a lot of private security and
24 traffic control and events in Hollywood, and then do a
25 lot of big music shows and things like that. That's one

1 of the reasons why we applied for the Nevada card.

2 Also, my partner and I have been discussing
3 possibly moving to Nevada at some time in the future.
4 Since we're both in the security field, we wanted to
5 make sure that we were both licensed. I've been
6 licensed with the State of California since 2010.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: When you had the
8 misdemeanor arrest, was that a plea-down; is that why
9 you got three years of probation?

10 MR. MEADE: I believe, it was. Was that the
11 '93? I had a public defender at the time. And since it
12 was a couple hours away from me every time I traveled to
13 court, we opted to just, you know, come up with the
14 quickest solution and then put it away. And we did that
15 at that time. I believe, it was pled down from a -- I
16 think, it might have been charged initially as a felony
17 and then pled down, I believe.

18 MR. INGRAM: Do you have any records on that?

19 MR. BATCHELOR: He was originally charged with
20 a felony, carrying a loaded firearm in a public place,
21 which was dismissed, and he was convicted of -- where is
22 it? Yeah, possession of a dangerous weapon. It doesn't
23 say whether it was a misdemeanor or a felony. So it was
24 probably a misdemeanor, or it would say felony.

25 MR. INGRAM: But he did three years probation?

1 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes.

2 MR. INGRAM: That wouldn't be a misdemeanor.
3 That would be a --

4 MR. BATCHELOR: Probably, yeah.

5 MR. INGRAM: So it would be a felony.

6 MR. BATCHELOR: No, two years probation,
7 probably a misdemeanor.

8 MR. INGRAM: I thought you said three years
9 probation.

10 MR. BATCHELOR: No, it says here two. I didn't
11 say any years.

12 MR. MEADE: I'm sorry. I said three. I
13 thought it was three. Maybe it was two.

14 MR. BATCHELOR: Even so, three years probation,
15 it could go either way as well, in California. It could
16 be a felony or a misdemeanor.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
18 questions?

19 Okay. I'd entertain a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
21 Dennis Meade's denial be overturned and he be issued a
22 card.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Do I
24 have a second?

25 I'll second it.

1 So we have a motion and a second. Any Board
2 questions or comments?

3 Hearing none, all in favor of the motion,
4 signify by saying "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, "no."

7 We'll issue you a card.

8 MR. MEADE: Thank you.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: May we take a five- to
10 10-minute break, Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ten minutes, please.

12 * * * * *

13 (A break was taken, 2:30 to 2:45 p.m.)

14 * * * * *

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Back on the record.

16 Everybody ready up north?

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: We're ready.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okie-doke. Let's see.

19 Who did we leave off with?

20 MR. INGRAM: We are on 69. Unless you want to
21 go back to the trailed.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll wait till the end.

23 Okay. Number 69, Dominique Small. Dominique
24 Small. Or maybe it's "Dom-in-NIK." I don't think so.
25 "Dom-in-EEK" or "Dom-in-NIK" Small?

1 69, we'll trail.

2 Joanna Calhoun, number 70. Joanna Calhoun?

3 Trail.

4 MR. INGRAM: Joanna Calhoun contacted me on
5 Friday and requested it be postpone until December. So
6 we can take 70 off.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 71, Nakeisha
8 Kelly?

9 Hello.

10 MS. KELLY: Hello.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you sworn earlier?

12 MS. KELLY: Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Understand the
14 process?

15 MS. KELLY: Hm?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I said, do you understand
17 the process?

18 MS. KELLY: Yeah.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. The investigator's
20 going to go first, and then we'll talk to you.

21 MR. BATCHELOR: Thank you. Investigator
22 Batchelor. Ms. Kelly was denied for a 2005 felony
23 robbery conviction when she was 18, in California. And
24 she did, she did list that conviction.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us the

1 circumstances behind the charge?

2 MS. KELLY: I was young, and I made the
3 mistake, and I regret it.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was anybody injured?

5 MS. KELLY: No.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No. Was it a home, a
7 business?

8 MS. KELLY: No, it was outside.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Outside. Okay. Was
10 there a firearm or a deadly weapon used?

11 MS. KELLY: No.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you help me
13 out here much?

14 MS. KELLY: Me and a couple of fellas was at
15 the train station. They decided to rob a man. And the
16 man stated, said I went in his pocket.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: He said you went in his
18 pocket?

19 MS. KELLY: M-hm (affirmative).

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did you plea, or
21 did you go to trial?

22 MS. KELLY: I went to trial.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Went to trial. Anybody
24 else go to trial with you?

25 MS. KELLY: Yes. The co-defendants with me.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, why do you
2 think we should give you a card?

3 MS. KELLY: Because I learned my lesson. And I
4 didn't actually do the crime. I was there at the scene.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But a jury indicated that
6 you did the crime, right?

7 MS. KELLY: Yes.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do you feel all
9 right today?

10 MS. KELLY: M-hm (affirmative).

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

12 MS. KELLY: I'm just tired.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're what?

14 MS. KELLY: Tired.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Tired. Okay. Any other
16 Board questions?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you. Thank you,
18 Mr. Chair.

19 So what kind of sentence, or whatever, did you
20 get?

21 MS. KELLY: What kind of what?

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did you serve time --

23 MS. KELLY: Could you repeat that.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did you serve time in
25 prison or anything?

1 MS. KELLY: I served a month and four days in
2 the county jail.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did you have probation,
4 or?

5 MS. KELLY: Yes, five years.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Nothing else. Thank you,
7 Mr. Chairman.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
9 Do you have any experience in security?

10 MS. KELLY: Yes.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Where did you get that?

12 MS. KELLY: I have experience up in L.A. for
13 Pro Staff, Staff Pro.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Staff Pro?

15 MS. KELLY: M-hm (affirmative).

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 MS. KELLY: And then out here in Nevada, at
18 Green Valley.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Green Valley Security?

20 MS. KELLY: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How long did you work
22 there?

23 MS. KELLY: A month. Then they had called me
24 saying that I had to be removed.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How long did you

1 have a California guard card?

2 MS. KELLY: I never had one.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You never had one?

4 MS. KELLY: (Shook head negatively.)

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do you have any
6 children?

7 MS. KELLY: Yes. I have four.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Four?

9 MS. KELLY: (Nodded head affirmatively.)

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. When you were done
11 totally and completely with this, that was about, what,
12 2010, 2009?

13 MS. KELLY: Yeah, like around that time.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Were you on
15 supervised probation?

16 MS. KELLY: No. Formal.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

18 MS. KELLY: No, summary. My bad.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Summary?

20 MS. KELLY: M-hm (affirmative).

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
22 motion.

23 I move that the denial be upheld.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second that.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a

1 second. Any comments or questions by the Board?

2 I have a comment. I'm going to support the
3 motion to deny the card, because the conviction isn't
4 all that old when you consider the amount of time that
5 you've been on paper, one. And, number two, you haven't
6 given me a reason not to.

7 We don't need to have any more discussion about
8 it, because we're in the Board action. But when you
9 come back a year from now, if you -- if the motion is
10 approved, if you come back a year from now and apply
11 again, you might want to take a different approach and
12 stand up and say, "These are the reasons I need this
13 card. These are the reasons that I need to do things."

14 Any other Board questions or comments?

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Hm-m (negative).

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor of the --
17 oh, I'm sorry. All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed, say "no."

20 Motion carries. You're eligible to come back
21 and reapply in a year.

22 MS. KELLY: Okay.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 Jose Callejon. Jose C-A-L-L-E-J-O-N?

25 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, I was just informed by

1 an investigator at last break that Mr. Callejon had a
2 family emergency and requested that he be postponed
3 until December.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Number 73, Desta
5 Kahsay.

6 How are you doing? Have you been sworn in?

7 MR. KAHSAY: Yes, I have.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. We'll listen
9 to the investigator, and then we'll talk with you.

10 MR. KAHSAY: Thank you.

11 MR. BATCHELOR: Mr. Kahsay was denied for a
12 2006 felony theft conviction at 22 years old, and it was
13 dismissed under 1203.4.

14 He also has a 2004 and 2005 misdemeanor theft
15 convictions that were both also dismissed under 1203.4.

16 He did not list any of these convictions.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: First, can you say why
18 you didn't list them?

19 MR. KAHSAY: From what I'm understanding --
20 I've been in Las Vegas for 11 months. And before I
21 moved here, I spoke to my public defender. They're,
22 basically, like a student that go to UC Berkeley. They
23 are people that work there. And the people that work
24 there, my public defender, before I moved here, she say
25 you don't have to put anything in the application. You

1 know, if it asks you if you have a criminal record, you
2 say no. So I went by her word.

3 And I didn't do this intentionally because, in
4 my understanding, in California, if you apply anywhere,
5 they're like you don't have to put it on the
6 application. And I took what she said. The only thing
7 she told me, she told me, was, she said, if you don't
8 apply for a government, or some other thing, then you
9 got to. You know what I'm saying? You know, then you
10 have to put it in there, just, you know, stuff like
11 that.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

13 MR. KAHSAY: That's what I was told.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now, can you take me
15 through the '06 theft charge?

16 MR. KAHSAY: Okay. My 20s, I was being very
17 bad, for some crazy reason, because I was -- I was in
18 foster care. Okay. But I needed -- I'm not making any
19 excuses.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You state you were in
21 adult foster care?

22 MR. KAHSAY: Yeah, I was in a group home. I
23 was in a group home.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 MR. KAHSAY: I'm not trying to make excuses.

1 But, you know, I was like -- it made me become the
2 person that I was when I was young, in my 20s. And at
3 that time, in 2006 and those three cases that I was
4 charged with, I was in the streets. I was homeless. So
5 I did things, you know, just to survive. You
6 understand? I didn't do it because I enjoyed it. I
7 just did it to survive.

8 So now that that I have it on my back to pull,
9 I know everything's wrong, what I did was wrong. And I
10 know it was stupid, you know. But I can't take it back,
11 you know. So I'm just trying to make it all the right
12 way, you know, hoping to be better, you know.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, you would have to
14 understand our concern --

15 MR. KAHSAY: Yes.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- if we're going to give
17 you a work card to protect people's property, when you
18 have a history of taking it.

19 MR. KAHSAY: I think, let me explain. I worked
20 at the group -- before I came here, I was working at the
21 group home, the same place that I was in. We call it --
22 I mentor kids. You know what I'm saying? I let them
23 know to not to do the same thing I did, you know, and
24 check up on them, become a better person. So am I like
25 a person that just goes around and pick up somebody's

1 stuff? No. Because I know, eventually, you will be
2 caught and wind up getting behind bars. And I'm not
3 that type of person.

4 You know, lately, I work two jobs, since I've
5 been here. I work at McDonald's, you know, and I work
6 at a natural store. And those jobs are the reason I'm
7 doing them, because I don't always make enough money.
8 So I said, let me try security guard, even though my --
9 have a chance to show that I'm a changed man.

10 And, basically, it was a lesson, you know. And
11 I feel real guilty about it. You know what I'm saying?
12 There's nothing I can do, I could turn it back. I
13 wanted to start teaching them, you know, one of the
14 things, to help, you know, the youth. It's all because,
15 as a kid, take the money, and I want to take the next
16 step to use that and to help the younger, young kids to
17 not be in the same situation I have.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
19 questions?

20 Entertain a motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I move that the denial
22 for Desta Kahsay be upheld.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Is
24 there a second?

25 I'll second. There's a motion and a second.

1 Is there any Board discussion or question?

2 I haven't decided whether or not I'm going to
3 vote, although I did second the motion.

4 MR. KAHSAY: Okay. All I'm asking is,
5 hopefully --

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The Board --

7 MR. KAHSAY: Oh, I'm sorry, sir.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We're going to
9 conference --

10 MR. KAHSAY: Oh, that's okay.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- and make a decision.

12 MR. KAHSAY: Okay.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

16 I'm really struggling with this. I realize, in
17 all, all the cases have been dismissed. But in all the
18 cases that dealt with the theft of property, and going
19 back to the -- our esteemed counsel's comments, I don't
20 know that we -- I don't know that we have a suitability
21 issue here. I think, I'm going to support the motion.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment
23 or question?

24 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed? No.
2 Two to one. You're eligible to reapply next
3 year.

4 MR. KAHSAY: Okay. Thanks so much.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 Number 74, Alfred Clark.

7 MR. CLARK: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 MR. CLARK: How are you this morning?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Great. Okay. You're
11 Mr. Clark?

12 MR. CLARK: I am.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, you're
14 Mr. Batchelor. Mr. Clark's here.

15 MR. BATCHELOR: Thank you. Investigator
16 Batchelor. Mr. Clark was denied for a 2013 attempt to
17 carry a concealed firearm or other deadly weapon, which
18 was a gross misdemeanor, here in Las Vegas. And he did
19 list this conviction on his application.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What's the
21 circumstances behind that arrest?

22 MR. CLARK: The circumstances were I was
23 currently working for a company that works the gun show
24 circuit, selling taxable equipment, bags, chest rigs,
25 slings, that sort of thing. One of these new people

1 that he brought in as a managerial position had a
2 discrepancy with me and told me not to come in. And I
3 told him that I was going to come in and get the money
4 that was owed to me for the weekend. I had agreed with
5 the owner, which was I'd be paid for the weekend, not
6 per day.

7 And when I went into the shop, or when I went
8 into the gun show, I went in there and talked to the
9 owner. The owner said, "Get your money from the
10 manager." And I said, "I have an agreement with you,
11 not him."

12 So I went over to the manager. He shorted me
13 the money. I removed the rest of the money from the
14 register, went back to the owner, told the owner I took
15 the money out of the register, our agreement is our
16 agreement, not his. He said, "Okay. Fine. That works
17 for me."

18 And I went to leave the building. Upon
19 attempting to leave the building, I was confronted by
20 law enforcement. The gentleman falsified his statement.
21 And I was set aside in cuffs because I had a weapon on
22 me. They were going to let me go, because it was a
23 civil issue, until they ran my record and saw that I had
24 a speeding ticket warrant, which I thought I had a
25 little more time to take care of. I had a crotch rocket

1 and a wrist problem. I've since fixed that.

2 I went to -- I went to jail for 28 days,
3 because nobody bailed me out. And I had to plead guilty
4 in order to get out of jail.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And did you serve
6 anything more than 28 days?

7 MR. CLARK: The judge told me that she would
8 give me probation because she had to keep up
9 appearances. So I served eight months of a one-year
10 probation sentence and was discharged.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So that discharge
12 would have been in 2014?

13 MR. BATCHELOR: That would have been --

14 MR. CLARK: M-hm (affirmative), yes.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So the charge that you
16 were arrested for was the actual charge you were
17 convicted of?

18 MR. CLARK: Yes.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

20 MR. CLARK: I pled guilty to it, so.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
22 questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one question.

24 So --

25 MR. CLARK: Yes, sir.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: -- am I hearing you
2 clearly, when you said that the person that you had the
3 agreement with, the owner, or whatever, he then changed
4 his story to the police; is that what happened?

5 MR. CLARK: No, the -- no, the manager that he
6 brought on, basically, went over and told law
7 enforcement that I had stolen from them, even though the
8 owner and I had an agreement.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay.

10 MR. CLARK: Which is the only reason why law
11 enforcement got involved.

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you. I have
13 nothing further.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Is this classified as a
15 misdemeanor?

16 MR. CLARK: Gross misdemeanor, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry. Yes?

18 MR. CLARK: Gross misdemeanor, sir.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Gross misdemeanor?

20 MR. CLARK: Yes.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Gross misdemeanor.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Were you -- excuse me,
24 Mr. Chair.

25 Were you required to wear a weapon inside there

1 during your duties?

2 MR. CLARK: Not necessarily, but I was selling
3 holsters, so I would be wearing a holster to illustrate
4 to the patrons of the establishment who were coming in
5 and purchasing firearms accessories, how they were worn
6 and how they were used, what the best purpose would be
7 for them.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: So, and was the weapon
9 loaded?

10 MR. CLARK: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay.

12 MR. CLARK: I've had a weapon on my hip since I
13 was 18 years old, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. No further
15 questions.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'll entertain a
17 motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I would just
19 make the motion that in the case of Alfred Clark, that
20 the denial be upheld.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.
22 Is there a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

24 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, we couldn't hear it.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion

1 and a second?

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

3 MR. INGRAM: Okay.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board question or
5 comment?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman, I think,
7 the reason I'm making the motion is because of the
8 recency of the event and the circumstances of the event,
9 as explained by Mr. Clark. So that's my rationale for
10 the motion.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Okay. All in
12 favor of the motion, signify by saying "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And opposed? No.

15 Two to one. You're eligible to come back in a
16 year.

17 MR. CLARK: Thank you, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 MR. CLARK: Lucky I got the job in California.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 75, LaTanya Craft.

21 MS. CRAFT: Yes. Hi. Good afternoon.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Hi. How are you?

23 MS. CRAFT: I'm good.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you sworn in
25 earlier?

1 MS. CRAFT: Yes, I was.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Great.

3 MS. CRAFT: Okay.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

5 MR. BATCHELOR: All right. Ms. Craft was
6 denied for a 1995 carrying a loaded firearm in a public
7 place in California. And she did list it.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And that was a
9 felony, gross, misdemeanor?

10 MR. BATCHELOR: It's a misdemeanor.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

12 MR. BATCHELOR: Yeah.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what year was that,
14 again?

15 MS. CRAFT: 1995.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: '95. Okay. Do you
17 recall the events around that situation?

18 MS. CRAFT: Yes.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you share them with
20 us?

21 MS. CRAFT: Yeah. We had moving boxes, and we
22 had just moved, and there were a few moving boxes left
23 in the car. And the gun was in the moving boxes. I
24 didn't know at that time -- I was 22, 23 -- that you
25 couldn't have it in there. So the officer said he

1 pulled us over because there was a taillight out on the
2 license plate.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

4 MS. CRAFT: So then, when he came around to my
5 side -- because I wasn't driving, I was in the passenger
6 seat -- he asked me if I have any drugs, alcohol or
7 weapons in the car. And I said, "No," and then I said,
8 "Oh, yeah. My gun is in the boxes." And then he took
9 me to the police station. I sat there for an hour, and
10 my dad came and got me.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

12 MS. CRAFT: But since then, I went to security
13 school. So I obtained my security license and my
14 firearm permit in California. I did security for two
15 years. I moved here in 1999.

16 The other career that I had was driving. So
17 I've been driving for -- since '99 here as a city
18 driver, then a school bus driver.

19 And I've had my fingerprints taken several
20 times, because I also was a foster parent for two years.
21 So I've had my fingerprints, you know, ran several
22 times. I listed it because, like the other people said,
23 in California, after 10 years, you don't have to list
24 it. But, obviously, I listed it.

25 So now I'm a truckdriver. And, actually, I

1 just, I'm tired of being on the road a month or two
2 months at a time. And I just want my life back. So
3 that was the other field, security was the other field I
4 was good at. So that's why I'm picking it back up. So
5 I just want something that I could be at home every day.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 Any Board questions?

8 Entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
10 LaTanya Craft, that the registration denial be
11 overturned.

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any
14 Board discussion or questions?

15 All in favor, signify by saying "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any no, or opposed, "no."
18 Hearing none, we'll get you a card.

19 MS. CRAFT: Thank you. Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 76, George Clay.
21 George Clay?

22 We'll trail George Clay.

23 Number 77, Jonathan R. Luckey ("Luke-ee")?

24 MR. LUCKEY: "Luck-ee."

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Luck-ee." Were you

1 sworn earlier?

2 MR. LUCKEY: Yes, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. All right.
4 We'll have the investigator tell us what's the reason
5 for the denial, and then we'll come to you.

6 MR. LUCKEY: Yes, sir. Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you gamble?

8 MR. LUCKEY: No.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: With a name like that,
10 how do you not gamble?

11 MR. LUCKEY: I just don't see myself losing my
12 money to the casinos. So I try to keep my luck without
13 gambling.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see. Thank you.

15 MS. IRIZARRY: Lori Irizarry. I was assigned
16 Mr. Luckey's case. Before I start off, he actually, he
17 applied. He did not -- he applied online. So the
18 application was done online. But he has, since then has
19 not provided his fingerprints. But he is renewing his
20 work card. So the fingerprint results that I have were
21 when he had his card the first time, in 2006.

22 The reason for his denial was because he's
23 currently on probation for a felony grand larceny charge
24 in 2014, as well as not disclosing multiple arrests that
25 have happened since he's had his work card that was

1 initially issued.

2 His charges are, in March 2012, nonpossession
3 of -- I'm sorry -- nonmedical possession of a controlled
4 substance. The charge was dismissed.

5 In July 2013, marijuana possession,
6 misdemeanor, and for possession of interstate commerce,
7 misdemeanor, disposition unknown.

8 In September 2014, which is the initial denial,
9 was felony grand larceny, felony burglary, and felony
10 failure to obtain money under false pretenses. From
11 that charge, he was placed on probation. In June of
12 2015, he violated his probation. A warrant was issued.
13 The probation violation was due to a battery domestic
14 violence, misdemeanor, and battery strangulation,
15 felony, and possession of marijuana, misdemeanor.

16 Those charges I found on the court website.
17 Like I said, he has not supplied his fingerprint results
18 to us yet.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Luckey, why didn't
20 you put all that stuff down?

21 MR. LUCKEY: Well, at the time, I was working,
22 and my boss told me to -- said you have to renew your
23 guard card before it expired. So I called my mother and
24 asked her could she do it online for me. And then, I
25 guess, she didn't list the things that I went to jail

1 for. So when I called the license board, they told me
2 that I had to have it revoked. So I had to come to you
3 guys, or the Board.

4 And that was the reason why, that she just
5 didn't list anything on there.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So your mom did
7 the application?

8 MR. LUCKEY: Yeah, she did in my renew, renewal
9 application.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Who were you
11 working for when you were working?

12 MR. LUCKEY: I was working for SLA.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MR. LUCKEY: And a few other companies out
15 here. I've been doing security for like nine years now.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What's the -- what were
17 the circumstances surrounding the felony grand larceny?

18 MR. LUCKEY: Oh, I was with a couple of
19 friends. And they broke into a house, I guess. And I
20 picked them up, and they had all the stolen property in
21 my car. So we got pulled over. And they had received
22 all the stolen stuff.

23 And prior to that, I guess, before I picked
24 them up and stuff, I went and pawned some stuff or
25 whatever. And so that's why I got the obtaining money

1 under -- or however you say that, and went to jail, did
2 like two months, or something like that, got out on
3 probation.

4 And then I caught the battery. Me and my
5 ex-girlfriend got into it. And she said some things in
6 her report that wasn't true. So I ended up having -- I
7 didn't know nothing about the warrant. So I got pulled
8 over. And they said that I had a warrant for battery.
9 I went to jail for that. I was in jail for like, like a
10 week, or something like that. And then they reinstated
11 me on my probation. And that was about it as far as
12 that.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MR. LUCKEY: But I've been getting my life back
15 together.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 MR. LUCKEY: It's going good so far. I just
18 got to get over my probation and try to get my guard
19 card back so I can start back working.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
21 questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, I don't think I have
24 any questions. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a

1 motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I would move
3 that the registration denial on Jonathan Luckey be
4 upheld.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion and a
9 second. Any Board discussion or question?

10 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

13 It carries. The denial is upheld. You can
14 reapply in a year.

15 MR. LUCKEY: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

17 Number 78, George Walter.

18 MR. WALTER: Good afternoon.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon. Were you
20 sworn in earlier?

21 MR. WALTER: Yes.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll listen to the
23 investigator and then chat with you.

24 MS. IRIZARRY: Mr. Walter is actually renewing
25 his card for the third time. He was issued a work card

1 in 2006, one in 2011.

2 In 1996, he was convicted of felony for
3 burglary in San Diego, California. He completed three
4 years probation, community service, and paid his
5 restitution.

6 And in February of 2006, he applied and was
7 granted a dismissal under 1203.4 in California. We
8 don't have the record from when he originally applied in
9 2006. That would have been with the sheriff's
10 department. But in 2011, when he applied, he did list
11 it on his application. He did provide court documents.
12 They were all uploaded in the system. So there wasn't
13 much background or follow-up. And he hasn't had any
14 convictions since this one offense.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So the basis of the
16 denial is what?

17 MS. IRIZARRY: Felony burglary in 1996.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

19 MS. IRIZARRY: That was dismissed under 1203.4.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Walter, is
21 there anything you'd like to say about this?

22 MR. WALTER: Yes, sir. I take full
23 responsibility. I was 18. I was -- I wrote some bad
24 checks, willingly wrote some bad checks to our parts
25 store, knowing that I would take it back and get cash,

1 and got caught, and, you know, so.

2 Just, you know, I've turned my life around.
3 Just, you know, I've been -- this is, like she said,
4 this is going on my third work card. I have a gaming,
5 current gaming license. I have a temp card. I have a
6 health card. And I was actually working at the time
7 when my license expired. So I've had two jobs at the
8 time, two security jobs. And so I'm just ready to get
9 back to work.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
11 questions?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: None.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'd entertain a
15 motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
17 George Walter, that the registration denial be
18 overturned.

19 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Is
21 there a second? Okay. We have a second. Board
22 question or comment, or question or comments regarding
23 the motion?

24 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

2 Hearing none, congratulations.

3 MR. WALTER: Thank you. I appreciate it.

4 Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you ever heard the
6 term "giving back"?

7 MR. WALTER: Yeah.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: About giving back to
9 society? You know what Craigslist is?

10 MR. WALTER: Yeah.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You might put an ad on
12 Craigslist, if you get denied for a work card, come and
13 see me, and I'll help you.

14 MR. WALTER: Thank you. You do good work, you
15 know.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you very much.
17 Avenue Lawless.

18 You've probably been told before that's an
19 interesting name.

20 MR. LAWLESS: Yes, it is.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you thank your mother
22 for it?

23 MR. LAWLESS: Uh. Mm.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Were
25 you already sworn?

1 MR. LAWLESS: Yes, I was.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

3 Go ahead.

4 MS. IRIZARRY: Okay. Mr. Lawless was denied
5 for two offenses that he did list on his application.
6 They're from 2015. One was trespassing. The other one
7 was a carrying concealed weapon. He was -- the
8 trespassing offense is he was released, released on his
9 own recognizance. Which I did verify was correct. And
10 the carrying concealed weapon charge he listed as
11 pending but not convicted.

12 When his fingerprints came back, it did list
13 six weapons convictions, I'm sorry, weapons charges.
14 But they are still pending. It seems to be, when I
15 called the courts, that he would only be convicted of
16 the one. The reason being is he's in a program at the
17 moment. He's active with the National Guard. So he's
18 in a military program where it's similar to a treatment
19 program, from what I understand from the court system.
20 He served in the military. After he completes the
21 treatment program, he has the possibility of getting his
22 record for the weapons charges dropped and sealed.

23 A part of the treatment program, he needs to go
24 to AA meetings regularly. He's in part of a REACH
25 program. He has to attend motivational classes and deal

1 with, to deal with military issues. And he needs to
2 visit with a judge every three to four weeks.

3 While in this program, though, he has defaulted
4 once. Since then, he is current with the program. So
5 at the moment, these charges are currently pending.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What was the
7 circumstances surrounding the CCW?

8 MR. LAWLESS: Okay. Well, ever since I turned
9 21, I had -- that's when I was able to buy liquor. So
10 one day, I got off work. And I was intoxicated. And I
11 live in a gated community. I drove to the park. And I
12 was not really thinking, you know, I wasn't really
13 there. I was just drunk, plain, I was drunk. I got out
14 of the car, and I had a weapon on me, and I was messing
15 with it, and it discharged. And that was that. But the
16 neighbor heard it, called the police.

17 And the reason why I had multiple charges for
18 that is because I wasn't cooperating with the officer,
19 you know, I was being stubborn, and I was drunk, so. I
20 was just, I was being stubborn really.

21 And then, with the trespassing, one day, it was
22 my brother's birthday, my big brother's birthday, August
23 18th. We went to the Strip and was drinking. And I got
24 drunk, and I blacked out. And then I woke up like in a
25 neighborhood I'd never been in. And my phone was dead.

1 So I was knocking on a whole lot of people's doors.
2 And, finally, somebody answered. So I asked them if
3 they would call the cops for me and give me a ride home.
4 Instead of giving me a ride home, they took me to jail
5 for trespassing.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

7 MR. LAWLESS: And like with the program stuff,
8 Judge Stevens -- because I'm still in the National
9 Guard. Yeah, I still go to drill. I've got drill this
10 weekend coming up. But the job position I was offered
11 is at Alarm Code and is not necessarily with security.
12 I'm going to be an alarm technician. And the whole
13 package, though, is that I have to have the card to be
14 able to be in an establishment. And they already
15 offered me the job a couple months back. And they just
16 wanted me to take care of this and get it resolved and
17 start work.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So what is the --
19 you're entitled to a program, or you're enjoying a
20 program because you're in the National Guard?

21 MR. LAWLESS: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

23 MR. LAWLESS: It's for veterans. It's just a
24 treatment program. Like I said, when I turned 21, I was
25 able to legally buy liquor, so I started drinking a lot.

1 But ever since the program, I haven't been drinking, for
2 like eight months. And the time I defaulted was, was
3 because I was drinking, you know.

4 So the program does help. I haven't been
5 drinking. Instead, I stay clean. You know, I don't do
6 drugs or nothing.

7 That was mainly my only issue. Every time I've
8 been in trouble is I was intoxicated. And it's all my
9 fault, you know. There's no one to blame. It was on
10 me, you know. I shouldn't have got in the car that day
11 with the weapon. I shouldn't even have had it on me,
12 you know, but.

13 And then, with the trespass, that was my part
14 again. I should have been more aware of my
15 surroundings. And, yeah, there's nothing in it to pass
16 on, to be blamed.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But the original charge
18 that gets dismissed is a gross misdemeanor, right?

19 MR. LAWLESS: It's all of them, those.

20 MS. IRIZARRY: He says "all of them" because
21 there's five of them. They're all weapons charges.
22 When I spoke to the courts, it would be, then, the
23 program that he's in is to get it reduced all the way
24 down to he only gets convicted of the one, carrying a
25 concealed weapon, but possibly having it dismissed.

1 But the charges themselves, one is possession
2 under the influence of alcohol or drugs. I'm sorry.
3 Possession of a gun under the influence of alcohol or
4 drugs. Two, unlawful discharge of a firearm. Three,
5 discharging gun or other weapon where person might be
6 endangering. That's a gross misdemeanor. The other
7 two, I'm sorry, were misdemeanors. Number four,
8 indecent or obscene exposure, first offense, gross
9 misdemeanor. Carrying concealed machete without permit,
10 gross misdemeanor.

11 MR. LAWLESS: And on those last two, the
12 obscene exposure and then the carrying concealed
13 machete, the officer added those charges because I
14 wasn't cooperating with them. You know, so he was,
15 basically, trying to teach me a lesson.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 MR. LAWLESS: So, yeah. But I --

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What were you doing with
19 a machete?

20 MR. LAWLESS: I didn't have a machete, or I
21 wasn't obscene. Or is that the correct, obscene? I
22 wasn't obscene. He added those on there because I was,
23 literally, like being stubborn to him. You know, he was
24 trying to cooperate with me. And I was so drunk, I
25 wasn't trying to play it fair with him, I was dodging

1 all his questions. So he added those extra two.

2 But the program, all those charges will be
3 dropped. And I am going to complete the program.

4 But with the military, like my unit just went
5 to Iraq, Syria and Kuwait, April, Charlie Company 422.
6 And the reason I wasn't able to go with them was because
7 the charges that I have, you know. So I've suffered.
8 That's why I joined the military, go see the world, you
9 know. And I mean, so I can't even do that.

10 And they demote you. Yeah. I was a private
11 first class, and then I dropped, too. But I've been
12 showing my resilience with them, my integrity. And it's
13 putting me back. I'm now a team leader again. And next
14 month, I have my rank back.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
16 questions?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have a question,
18 Mr. Chair.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: How long is the program?

21 MR. LAWLESS: Is that for me?

22 MS. IRIZARRY: Well, as long as he does not
23 default, it should end June of next year.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

1 I'd entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, Mr. Chair, I'd move
3 that the denial for Avenue Lawless be upheld.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.
5 Is there a second?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second for
7 discussion.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
9 and a second. Board discussion?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd support the motion in
11 the sense that as long as the person is on probation for
12 a gross misdemeanor or a weapons charge, I have
13 difficulty overturning the denial.

14 My question is -- and counsel might be able to
15 help me on that. But this doesn't do him much good
16 right at the moment. But is it possible to overturn the
17 denial, pending his completion, successful completion of
18 the program?

19 MS. PALMER: I don't believe so. I don't
20 believe there's a provision for doing that. Yeah, I --
21 have you --

22 MR. INGRAM: We can allow him to reapply upon
23 completion instead of waiting a year, or we have
24 discretion there.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: My impression is that if

1 we deny, or the denial is upheld, then, by statute or
2 regulation, he cannot reapply for a year. I mean
3 that's -- so. And I thought that that was statutory.

4 MR. INGRAM: Does it say in the statute one
5 year?

6 MS. PALMER: We're checking to see if this
7 timeframe is correct.

8 (There was a period off the record.)

9 MR. INGRAM: Lori, what date was it denied?

10 MS. IRIZARRY: Oh. May 19th of this year.

11 MS. PALMER: So, Member Nadeau, I believe that
12 if he were to withdraw the appeal, and the Board did not
13 reach a decision -- based on this, the denial occurred
14 in May of this year. So he could then reapply in May of
15 next year.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Which would gain him --
17 well, and if he completed the program by June of next
18 year, then that would have gained him some time, at
19 least a few months. Okay. Thank you.

20 MS. PALMER: Yeah, or he could wait, he could
21 wait to apply until June. And that's, the code that we
22 were looking for, that's NAC 648.3447. That talks about
23 reapplication following denial.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Based on that, I
25 would withdraw my second.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I'd be willing to
2 withdraw my denial, based upon that.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So it would be up to him.
4 If he doesn't want the denial on the record, then it
5 would be up to him to withdraw his appeal, correct?

6 MS. PALMER: Correct. If he wanted to withdraw
7 the appeal, then the denial would stand based on the
8 Board decision. And that decision was made in May of
9 2016. He would have a year from that. You have to wait
10 a year after a denial to apply for a new work card.

11 MS. IRIZARRY: Chairman? Sorry. Apparently,
12 he has court on -- next Monday, which would determine if
13 he was -- if the CCW charges or weapons charge will be
14 upheld or not. So I don't know, maybe if you want to
15 maybe consider postponing it to December of '16.
16 Because he may not be convicted of it, which is the
17 reason for my denial.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So, if I'm understanding,
19 this court, he's going to have a court appearance that's
20 going to make a determination on whether or not these
21 charges will be filed, correct?

22 MS. IRIZARRY: I was just informed of that,
23 correct.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Then the choice --

25 MS. PALMER: I would just add that -- I'm

1 sorry, Member Nadeau. I was just going to say that
2 whether the charges were upheld or not upheld, your
3 consideration is suitability.

4 So, I guess, you have some options, again, with
5 the application's approval as well, that you could
6 postpone it until December. He could withdraw the
7 appeal and wait until after some time next May and
8 apply. Or, of course, the Board could rule on it today.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I understand. I don't
10 know if he understands.

11 MR. INGRAM: The only thing is that if he
12 requests to postpone until December, he could still
13 probably appeal at that time, and then May.

14 MS. PALMER: Correct. What Executive Director
15 Ingram was just talking about is that, if things didn't
16 go favorably for him next Monday, it could be set for
17 the December agenda, and then he could ask to have it
18 pulled from the December agenda.

19 MR. INGRAM: And then reapply again in May.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Right. I understand all
21 that. I don't know that if he understands all the
22 nuances associated with it.

23 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Lawless, do you understand
24 what we're discussing?

25 MR. LAWLESS: I believe so, with the

1 understanding that one of the options was I got to
2 withdraw my -- my appeal?

3 MR. INGRAM: Your appeal.

4 MR. LAWLESS: And then, because if it was in
5 May when it was denied, so that means next May it would
6 be fair game again. Or I can wait till December, and
7 then, if it doesn't go -- well, I know it is, but if it
8 doesn't go as planned, then I can tell you, let you guys
9 know, and you guys could take me off the December, and
10 then I still apply in May.

11 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

13 Is that something you want to do?

14 MR. LAWLESS: Yes, you know, that sounds good.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It would go --

16 MR. LAWLESS: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Put you on the December
18 agenda?

19 MR. LAWLESS: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do we have to have a
21 motion, or just ask that be continued until December?

22 MS. PALMER: It's cleanest that way. Why don't
23 you do it that way.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I move that we
25 move --

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll make the motion, if
2 you're looking for a motion.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll move that we accept
5 the request of Mr. Avenue Lawless to postpone this item
6 until the December agenda.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
10 second to continue the matter. Any Board question or
11 comment?

12 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

15 It carries.

16 MS. IRIZARRY: See you in December.

17 MR. LAWLESS: I appreciate it. Thank you.
18 I'll get like an email or something, like the date in
19 December I should be?

20 MR. INGRAM: Oh, yes.

21 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes. I'll let you know in
22 November.

23 MR. LAWLESS: All right. Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

25 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, we have several

1 items that were trailed, going back as far as item
2 number 40 on the agenda, David Lopez.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 40, David Lopez. Nothing
4 in the north?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Nothing.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, if you would
8 accept it, I'd make a motion for all the ones that we
9 trailed.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I just wanted to
11 call them, just in case.

12 MR. SALADINO: Chairman, nobody's here.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Nothing?

14 MR. SALADINO: Nobody's here.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Fine.
16 Yes, sir.

17 MR. INGRAM: Just for the record, I would say
18 that items number 40, item number 56, 62, 63, 69 and 76
19 were all noticed and confirmed attendance and then
20 failed to appear today.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That said, Mr. Chair, I'd
22 make a motion that item number 40, David Lopez, item
23 number 56, Anthony Deshone Mask, item number 72,
24 Alejandro Moctezuma-Catalan --

25 MR. INGRAM: 62.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- item number 63, John
2 Carrillo, item number 69, Dominique Small, and item
3 number 76, George Clay, that the denials be upheld.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second? And
6 for Board comment, this is a clarification. I think,
7 Member Nadeau, you indicated number 72 when you meant
8 number 62.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I'll be clear. I
10 did not mean 72. I meant 62. Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thanks.

12 Any Board discussion on the motion?

13 All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

16 Motion carries.

17 Public comment. Public comment in the north?

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No one here.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And if we don't have
20 Board discussion, I guess, it might be appropriate to
21 have any under this subject, if anybody's got any.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: To clarify, we do not
23 have a meeting tomorrow?

24 MR. INGRAM: That would be correct. We have no
25 carryovers. So, therefore, this will conclude our

1 quarterly Board meeting.

2 I'll be notifying all of you as soon as we get
