18	officers to work as supervisors in Nevada during the
19	Consumer Electronics Show, CES. This event will take
20	place January 2nd, 2017 through January 11, 2017, and
21	will be held in various locations throughout Las Vegas.
22	All five officers have registered work cards that are
23	only activated for this event each year. This is
24	subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
25	For possible action.

Please come forward, identify yourself. 1 2 MR. THEEL: Good morning. John Theel with SOA 3 Security. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good morning, John. 4 MR. THEEL: As most of you, or some you -- I 5 understand there's new Board members. I've been coming 6 7 here before the Board for the last 20 years, once a year, for this request. 8 Back in the old days, we were up to 60, 70 9 peace officers. And I've got it dwindled down to five. 10 These five officers work for me in other states, where 11 they're on my payroll already. Obviously, I can't bring 12 13 them here without the Board's permission. That's why I'm here, to get that permission. 14 The Consumer Electronics Show is the largest 15 convention in the United States. It'll be here in 16 January, 160 to 175 thousand people. I'll have 17 approximately 600 guards employed during that time. And 18 these people are just here to supplement the supervision 19 20 of those guards. 21 All of these people are active in the PILB

23 Administratively, they shut their cards off other than 24 time period, if it's approved. Otherwise, I don't use 25 them here in Nevada the rest of the year. But they all

4	Any questions or comments from the Board?

21	I've done this before, is to ensure that these five
22	out-of-state officers have permission, documented
23	permission from their employers.

13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We have a second. Any
14	discussion on these?
15	Is there any public comment in reference to the
16	block vote that we're ready to have?
17	MR. MARTINEZ: I have a comment, but it's not
18	in regards to these cases. Will I be able to speak at a
19	certain time?
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: If it's in reference to
21	any of these items that are on the block vote, I'll
22	allow you to speak now.
23	MR. MARTINEZ: Now?
24	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Martinez, you came in a little
25	bit late for the initial public comment. If you'd like

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1	to stay till the end, there will be public comment at
2	that time as well for open items.
3	MR. MARTINEZ: That's what I was asking.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Absolutely.
5	Absolutely.

14	status, qualifying agent, existing corporation.
15	James M. Harden, Jr. is requesting a change in licensing
16	status. Mr. Harden is requesting that his individual
17	license, number 2016BX, be kept in abeyance so that he
18	may become the qualifying agent for Vander Protective
19	Services, LLC, license number 1847B. In addition,
20	Vander Protective Services, LLC is applying for a new
21	corporate private investigator license. If approved,
22	James M. Harden, license number 2016AX, is requesting
23	that his license be kept in abeyance so that he may
24	become the qualifying agent. This is subject to all
25	statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible

1 action. 2 Is Mr. Harden here, or a representative? 3 Please come forward. Good morning, sir. Have a seat, get 4 comfortable. Were you here for the swearing in, sir? 5 MR. HARDEN: No, sir. 6 7 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We're going to have to 8 swear you in. MR. HARDEN: That's fine. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Please 10 stand. We're doing the exercise. 11 MR. KANDT: Mr. Harden, I'm going to go ahead 12 13 and swear you in. Okay? MR. HARDEN: That's fine. 14 MR. KANDT: So, under penalty of perjury, do 15 you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and 16 nothing but the truth? 17 MR. HARDEN: I do. 18 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 19 20 MR. INGRAM: And, for the record, did you also 21 sign in? Yes, I did, sir. MR. HARDEN: 22 MR. INGRAM: Wonderful. Thank you. 23 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have a seat. 24 2.5 MR. HARDEN: Okay.

ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 1 I'm kidding. No, 2 stand. 3 (There was laughter.) ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. Harden, 4 give us why you're here. 5 MR. HARDEN: I'm here to change my status to 6 7 represent Vander, from the company, with a private investigator license and a patrol service license. 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any comments from the 9 Board? 10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, sir. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I was confused on this. Vander Protective Services is already licensed, correct? 14 15 MR. INGRAM: Correct. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Because it talked 17 in the narrative here, saying Vander Protective Services 18 is applying for a new corporate private investigator 19 20 license. And I was trying to --MR. INGRAM: That's correct. 21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And so if they already 22 have a license, why are they applying for a new one? 23 MR. INGRAM: Their corporate license right now, 24 2.5 Mr. Nadeau, is for private patrol.

1	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.
2	MR. INGRAM: And they have not had a private
3	investigator license before. Mr. Harden has a license
4	in both categories. So Vander is requesting to add to
5	their corporate license private investigations as well.
6	And that's why it's, the narrative is the way it is.
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And then my other
8	question was, in the investigator notes it looks like
9	Vander Protective Services has had kind of a rocky past.
10	Could we get an explanation on that?
11	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. Vander Protection
12	has the last two individuals that were approved for
13	qualifying agent terminated their employment due to
14	failure to pay from the owner of Vander.
15	Because of that, I reached out to Vander and
16	said, you know, explained to her that and it was
17	actually Ms. Suzanne Belluschi I'm sorry that she
18	needed to get some things cleaned up there with her
19	previous qualifying agents. And I wanted to give her an
20	opportunity to do that without, you know, taking any
21	kind of action, or the Board taking any kind of action.
22	So I just spoke with her. She was very
23	pleasant. She gave me deadlines that she would make
24	sure she would get the other two qualifying agents paid
25	by. She did pay her previous qualifying agent,

1	Mr. Thompson, in full, within a two-week period of time.
2	However, there is one qualifying agent prior to
3	Mr. Thompson, who is still still has not received any
4	payment. He is owed \$10,000. And when I spoke to
5	Ms. Belluschi recently, she had informed me that she had
6	paid a lump sum to Mr. Randall Powers, who was the
7	previous qualifying agent, that she had paid him a lump
8	sum of \$3,000 and that she and Mr. Powers had set up a
9	payment plan. I contacted Mr. Powers to confirm that.
10	Mr. Powers informed me that, no, he had not received any
11	money, and nor had they set up any kind of a payment
12	plan.
13	So I just wanted to bring that to the Board's
14	attention. This is not a disciplinary action in any
15	form or fashion. I just wanted the Board to understand
16	the background of Vander Security and their failure to
17	pay their last two qualifying agents.
18	Thank you.
19	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I guess, with that, armed
20	with that information, why would we approve her for
21	another, a different license if she's struggling with
22	the one she has? I mean, I guess, that's a rhetorical
23	question. But that, you know, that brings that question
24	in my mind, why would we approve, you know, another
25	business.

And I'm assuming, Mr. Harden, you're familiar
with this background, and you're comfortable taking on
these responsibilities?

MR. HARDEN: Yes, sir. I was doing, you know, 4 due diligence, with Mr. Ingram and the conversation with 5 Ms. Belluschi in reference to her past experiences. And 6 7 in light of the past, which, you know, again, we're building business as we're growing, you know, certain 8 decisions we make may or may not be the wisest. But as 9 we progress, which is what I determined with working 10 with Ms. Belluschi over the last few months, and the 11 conversations, that, you know, she's, you know, 12 13 progressing through. And I haven't had an issue with mentioning the other qualifying agents I've had to this 14 15 point.

I understand your concern, sir, because of, again, you look at the past. But moving forward, one of the other reasons that I want to be qualifying agent, because I was representing a company that wasn't in the state. I live here. I wanted to put my license and work in a business scale and growing in Las Vegas. So that was probably why I appealed it.

And, again, I can't -- you know, I wasn't working with the other qualifying agents. I've only shared that since I've been working with her, and the

1	conversation, and come aboard, we've had great
2	relationship. She's been forthright with all the
3	information. And, I believe, we can grow through, you
4	know, her past experience and those things become a
5	learning experience, as opposed to, as Mr. Ingram said,
6	it's not a disciplinary. It's a growth, for me.
7	So I have haven't had any issues, sir. And I
8	don't mind working for, with a company that's, you know,
9	got some legs under it at this point maybe.
10	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
12	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No. Thank you,
13	Mr. Chair.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Is there anybody
15	in the room that's got some questions reference this
16	item?
17	Okay. I'll entertain a motion.
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
20	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll attempt a motion.
21	I'd move that James M
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead and attempt.
23	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: that James M. Harden,
24	Jr. be granted a change in licensing status and that his
25	individual license, number 2016BX, be kept in abeyance

1	so that he may become the qualifying agent for Vander
2	Protective Services, LLC, license number 1847B, subject
3	to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Take a second.
5	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All in favor?
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, may I explain
8	my motion?
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, my apologies. Of
10	course.
11	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm very uncomfortable,
12	given the history of this business, to grant them
13	additional licensure. So that's why I did not include
14	them being granted a corporate private investigator's
15	license.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I'd like to add
17	and put on the record that I want you to pass this on to
18	her, that if there's a third time
19	MR. INGRAM: She is present.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: She is present? Where
21	is she?
22	MS. BELLUSCHI: Right here.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: How come you did not
24	want to comment, ma'am? I asked if anybody had anything
25	to comment about this. Why don't you come forward,

1 please. BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, we can't hear 2 3 what's going on. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: She's here. I don't 4 know why she didn't come up before, but she's going to 5 come up now. 6 7 Were you here to be sworn in, ma'am? MS. BELLUSCHI: Yes, I was. 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please have a 9 seat. 10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And identify yourself 12 13 for the record. BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? I'll withdraw 14 15 the --ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. 16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- motion pending her 17 testimony. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. 19 20 For the record, please state your name and your 21 position. MS. BELLUSCHI: Suzanne Belluschi, CEO with 22 Vander Protective Services. 23 24 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please comment 2.5 on what we're talking about here.

1	MS. BELLUSCHI: So in the very beginning of our
2	company, we hired a consultant for \$26,000 to help us
3	get all of our licenses and make sure everything was on
4	the up-and-up. And we found out that he wasn't even
5	licensed. So that went out the door.
6	Then we hired Randall Powers. And we ended up
7	still using the consultant a little bit on jobs and
8	contracts and all kinds of stuff, because he did have
9	knowledge of that. And we ended up with a very, very
10	bad contract that we got stiffed \$23,000 on, which I'm
11	in a lawsuit with, pending, but it's almost done. So
12	it's drained the company.
13	And our executive protection company is doing
14	well. But if we added the private investigation, we
15	have a lot of inquiries and a lot of stuff that we do
16	with the private investigation. So we're hoping to be
17	able to pay the rest of the monies off to Randall. And
18	we have made payments to Randall Powers. So we're still
19	friends. I'm sitting next to him.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Randall Powers is here?
21	MS. BELLUSCHI: Yes, I'm sitting next to him.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: He didn't want to
23	speak, either? Okay. Be prepared, we'll be bringing
24	you up.
25	MS. BELLUSCHI: We started making, we started

1	out making our good payments in good faith. And then,
2	with the lawsuit, it kind of drained us a little bit.
3	But we're almost done with it, and then we'll be able to
4	pay Randall off. Plus, with the additional funds of the
5	private investigation, we'll be able to pay him off.
6	And I paid him complete, so.
7	The first gentleman, he was not a good QA.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: He was not a good what?
9	MS. BELLUSCHI: Nothing. The first gentleman,
10	or the second gentleman did not work out. He wanted me
11	to put him as an employee, he and his wife as an
12	employee on my company, and I refused. So we got in a
13	bitter battle with that.
14	And then James came to me. And, you know, we
15	have good ideas. We've set up, you know, we're trying
16	to set up a very good private investigation. Which I
17	already acquired the software, over \$3,000 of software
18	to start the company.
19	So that's all I have to say.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What state are
21	you based in?
22	MS. BELLUSCHI: Here in Nevada.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And you know now
24	that any consultant for security needs to be licensed
25	with the Private Investigator's Licensing Board?

1	MS. BELLUSCHI: Well, he was working, I guess,
2	through Rock Security or something. And he had us all
3	over the place. He even told me I had to go get a
4	license with Rock Security before I could start my own
5	license.
6	So we had no idea. We had not a clue what we
7	were doing. So.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's what made you
9	MS. BELLUSCHI: Well, we did our due diligence.
10	I mean we did try to do the right thing.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I say this not only
12	for the record, but for the audience here and up north
13	and for any licensee or potential licensee, that's what
14	the Private Investigator's Licensing Board is for, when
15	you have those questions, to contact us, so you're not
16	led astray.
17	MS. BELLUSCHI: Right. I didn't know you
18	existed, so.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, we exist.
20	MS. BELLUSCHI: Yeah, I found that out.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Even at
22	MS. BELLUSCHI: Randall was very good as far as
23	educating me and everything about the Board and the
24	rules. And James as well. So.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other

questions of the witness? 1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None. 2 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you for 3 coming forward, ma'am. 4 MS. BELLUSCHI: 5 Thank you. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sir, your turn. 6 Were 7 you here to be sworn in, sir? 8 MR. POWERS: I was, yes. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please come forward, 9 have a seat up here. 10 MR. POWERS: Good morning. 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good morning. When 12 13 you're comfortable, please identify yourself and your position for the record. 14 MR. POWERS: Sure. I'm Randall Powers. 15 I'm a private patrolman licensee and, also, a private 16 investigator licensee. 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Would you please 18 speak to what we're talking about this morning. 19 20 MR. POWERS: The last time I spoke with Kevin, 21 he was basically wanting to know about any payment made in 2016, my relationship with Vander Protective in 22 the -- I believe, well, August 31st of 2015. And I 23 prepared a letter, submitted it to the Board, to Kevin's 24 2.5 attention, and told him that the primary reason was for

through Kevin, that Vander had had some, some bad contracts, had some poor financial settings or outcomes And, but I decided not to continue, obviously, once we got to that \$12,000 point. So he and I, Kevin and I spoke sometime in 2016, probably in August or September, perhaps even a month before, and he was asking me whether or not other payments had been made. And payment was made in the amount of \$2,000 back in 2015. So I received \$2,000 after I had resigned as the qualifying agent. In 2016, I had some contact with Suzanne in January of 2016, and she said she was going to attempt to make some payments and to expect regular payments. And we never entered into any sort of agreement. And I did not receive any future payments. So the amount of \$10,000, as was testified to, it still stands to that. 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1 MR. POWERS: Thank you. 2 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Harden, do you want 3 to add? MR. HARDEN: Yes, sir, if I could, please. 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. 5 MR. HARDEN: You know, based on the statement 6 7 that you just heard and my decision to be a part of it, again, being licensed here in the state and wanting to, 8 again, you know, pour into a business that grows from 9 Las Vegas, you know, I had some, or a lot of 10 conversations with Ms. Belluschi, and to the point of 11 beginning the business, all the challenges you get 12 13 into, and those decisions you make, and the outskirts of 14 where she was, to where she is, and bringing my knowledge and experience aboard, help, kind of walk and 15 help her with better decisions, and, hopefully, 16 increasing decisions, I see it as a positive. And I 17 understand, in light of her past, somebody looks really 18 like they got a bit more challenges. 19 20 I just want to encourage the Board, and for the 21 record, to say that my attempt to scale, build and grow 22 something that's going to be positive and helpful to our community here is my heart's desire. And, I think, 23 Vander has a tremendous opportunity to grow and learn, 24 as she stated. And, I think, I can do that with her. 2.5

ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Could you expand on the
 \$3,000 in software.

3	MR. HARDEN: You know, it was my encouragement.
4	As we get into our investigations, there were there's
5	going to be software necessary to do some of the
6	investigation, you know, skip-trace and whatever. So
7	some of that search for software to, you know, do what
8	investigators do is what I was encouraging, we may need
9	software to do some of the investigations that are
10	necessary. Nothing, I mean I don't I didn't buy
11	anything. I just encouraged her to look for, you know,
12	the software that we will need to use for the business.
13	MR. INGRAM: I have a question.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
15	MR. INGRAM: It seems a little odd to me that
16	someone who doesn't have a private investigator license
17	yet would invest \$3,000 in software instead of paying
18	off a debt that she owes to a previous employee.
19	MR. HARDEN: And I and I would agree with
20	you as well.
21	(Cell phone ringing.) I think, that's my
22	phone, and I do apologize.
23	And I agree with you, Mr. Ingram. And, again,
24	I'm not privy to her financial, so I don't know that
25	depth of the business. But, again, my suggestion to her

1	was that we would need it. And so it wasn't a time
2	factor. But, again, I would imagine she was just
3	preparing to get ready to do the business so that she
4	could earn, to pay whatever, you know, she had
5	previously indebted.
6	So it's not you're not going to make any
7	money if you don't spend money. So. In our
8	conversations, it appeared that that's what she was
9	preparing to do. And I was. Again, I knew about the
10	debt. But if you're going to start on the other side of
11	the business and grow it so you can take care of that,
12	you need the necessary tools to do that.
13	MR. INGRAM: Thank you.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, just my
15	comment, you're well aware of our concerns.
16	MR. HARDEN: Yes, sir.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're well aware of
18	the history, and you still want to come forward. But
19	please understand, you know, our job is not only to
20	protect the industry, but at the right times, for the
21	right reasons, we're also protecting employees.
22	MR. HARDEN: Yes, sir. And if I could I'm
23	sorry, you know, to prolong this. But I want you to
24	understand that I appreciate this, because on one end,
25	Ms. Belluschi has the you know, there's the

1	accountability level. And don't misunderstand me. I'm
2	expecting our contract to be upheld. And there will be
3	accountability to you know, to the Board, as far as
4	if I see anything go awry. But I just see this as a
5	reset button and a positive forward progression, as
6	opposed to reliving a past debt that you never get out
7	of the hold of.
8	So I'm holding her accountable as well. And I
9	do have my own personal decisions. So that's where our
10	relationship is building and the business is starting at
11	this point. So I do, I do recognize that, sir.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
13	questions?
14	All right. I'll entertain a motion.
15	I'll call a second time. I will entertain a
16	motion.
17	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sir.
19	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll stand with my
20	previous motion.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a motion
22	on the table for approval. Do we have a second?
23	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
24	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And understand, this does
25	not include Vander Protective new corporate private

1	investigator license. Does not, does not include that
2	piece of that, my motion does not include that.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Could you state
4	what your motion is.
5	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: My motion is that
6	James M. Harden, Jr. be granted his change in licensing
7	status and that his individual license, number 2016BX,
8	be kept in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying
9	agent for Vander Protective Services, LLC, license
10	number 1847B, subject to oh, and that his his
11	license, Mr. Harden's license be placed in abeyance so
12	that he may become the qualifying agent, subject to all
13	statutory and regulatory requirements.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you understand what
15	he's saying?
16	MR. HARDEN: No, sir.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you want to expand
18	what he doesn't get?
19	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: My motion does if this
20	motion passes, and I don't know that it will, but my
21	motion does not include licensure for private
22	investigation.
23	MR. HARDEN: Just private patrol?
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Just private patrol.
25	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: The existing.

1 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you aware of that 2 now? 3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: The existing license. MR. HARDEN: Okav. 4 MR. KANDT: So I'll just clarify, that will 5 require a separate action from the Board at a later 6 7 time. MR. HARDEN: 8 Okay. MR. INGRAM: Additionally, for clarification, 9 if this motion was to pass, we would need to have you 10 and Ms. Belluschi submit a new contract of employment 11 that reflects the motion that is considered right now. 12 13 Okay? MR. HARDEN: Yes, sir. 14 15 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are we all clear? 16 MR. HARDEN: (Nodded head affirmatively.) 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Do I have a 18 second? 19 20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All in favor? 21 (Board members said "aye.") 22 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed? 23 The motion carried. 5	Talentwise, Incorporated, license number 1616, to
6	Sterling Infosystems, Inc., license number 1360.
7	Corporate officers to be approved are Steven L. Barnett,
8	Clare Hart, and Daniel P. O'Brien. This is subject to
9	all statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible
10	action.
11	Mr. Powers, you're back.
12	MR. POWERS: I'm back.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
14	MR. POWERS: Really nothing further to add
15	other than what's really already generated on the
16	agenda. This company I've been associated with since
17	2010, that is Talentwise, Inc., actually, Talentwise,
18	Inc., dba Talentwise Nevada. And we have been acquired
19	by another firm, which is also a licensee here in
20	Nevada, and that is Sterling Infosystems.
21	So I'm simply trying to merge the companies and
22	to retain the Sterling Infosystem license that they
23	presently have, that's presently active. And Talentwise
24	has released my requirement to be employed by them or
25	with them. They've relinquished their license. And I

1	simply am wanting to take over the license on behalf of
2	Sterling Infosystems.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What is their main
4	business, Sterling Infosystems?

24	(Board members said "aye.")
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

1	(There was a brief discussion off the record.)
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm new at this. I'm
3	sorry. Is there any public comment?
4	Okay. Seeing none, motion carried.
5	MR. INGRAM: Thanks.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The agenda item is
7	approved. Thank you, sir.
8	MR. POWERS: Thank you, Board members. Thank
9	you, Mr. Executive Director.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Item number 15,
11	change of licensing status, qualifying agent, new corp.
12	Acadia Protective Services, LLC is applying for a new
13	corporate private patrolman license. If approved,
14	Jeffrey L. LaRe, license number 1966BX, is requesting
15	that his individual license be kept in abeyance so that
16	he may become the qualifying agent. Members to be
17	approved are John D. Clark, Sr. and Myra D. Cole. This
18	is subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
19	For possible action.
20	Good morning.
21	MS. COLE: Good morning. My name is Myra Dawn
22	Cole.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
24	MS. COLE: I'm the managing member of Acadia
25	Protective Services.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
2	MS. COLE: So I came here
3	MR. KANDT: Oh, have you been sworn already?
4	I'm sorry.
5	MS. COLE: Yes, sir.
6	MR. KANDT: I just want to confirm for the
7	record. Thank you.
8	MS. COLE: Yes, I have.
9	MR. KANDT: Sorry to interrupt.
10	MS. COLE: No worries.
11	Acadia Protective Services is a joint venture
12	between the Whitestone Group owned by John D. Clark,
13	who's also the president and CEO, and Kerberos
14	International, which is a company I run and own. The
15	sole purpose of the joint venture is to provide security
16	services for U.S. federal agencies.
17	We actually won a contract for the Department
18	of Energy under Acadia. The way Acadia works is it's
19	called an unpopulated joint venture. So Acadia itself
20	does not do any of the work. It subcontracts the work
21	to the Whitestone Group and to Kerberos. The contract
22	we won had several states involved. The Whitestone
23	Group is licensed in Nevada and took the Nevada portion
24	of the contract.
25	We found out, after we started that, that

Acadia itself also needed to be licensed. So we're very 1 sorry we didn't realize that. But we have been working 2 very, very diligently to rectify that as quickly as 3 possible. 4 So we are applying for the license for Acadia 5 Protective Services. 6 7 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And keeping in the spirit of our Chairman, we pronounce our state 8 "Nev-VAD-ah." 9 MR. COLE: Thank you. The Texas part of me is 10 coming out. I apologize for that. 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: It's okay. I just 12 13 wanted to, if our Chairman is watching online. MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair? 14 15 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. MR. INGRAM: For the record, I've been 16 knee-deep in this endeavor, to the point where I was 17 working with the federal government, with Acadia, with 18 Whitestone. We had several meetings to come to a 19 20 resolution of this situation. And I just wanted to put 21 that on the record, that the federal government was also unaware, and we worked jointly to get to where we are 22 23 today. 24 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I appreciate 2.5 that.

7	MS. CURTIS: Good morning. I was not sworn in.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please stand.
9	MR. KANDT: Ms. Curtis, could you please stand,
10	identify yourself for the record.
11	MS. CURTIS: Wendy Curtis.
12	MR. KANDT: All right. Could you raise your

10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Item number 17, Rayken
11	LLC is applying for a new corporate polygraph examiner
12	license. If approved, Chad W. Russell, license number
13	1836E, is requesting that his individual license be
14	placed in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying
15	agent. This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
16	requirements. For possible action.
17	Mr. Russell, are you here?
18	Up north?
19	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
20	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment?
22	Okay. I'll take a motion.
23	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, could we go
24	ahead and just push this back on our agenda in case

25	corporation, Atlas Security Group. This is subject to

all statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible 1 2 action. 3 Sir. MR. KANDT: Sir, have you been sworn in yet? 4 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: No. 5 MR. KANDT: Okay. Could you please identify 6 7 yourself for the record. MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Majid Daneshforouz. 8 MR. KANDT: Thank you. If you would raise your 9 right hand. Okay. Under penalty of perjury, do you 10 swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing 11 but the truth? 12 13 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes, I do. 14 MR. KANDT: Thank you. And why don't we swear you in as well, ma'am. 15 Could you please identify yourself for the record. 16 MS. WALKEN: Jasmine Walken (phonetic 17 spelling). 18 MR. KANDT: Thank you. And, once again, under 19 20 penalty of perjury, do you swear to tell the truth, the 21 whole truth, and nothing but the truth? MS. WALKEN: Yes. 22 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 23 MR. INGRAM: And have you both signed in as 24 well? 2.5

MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes. 1 2 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you. 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Sir or ma'am, whoever wants to go first. 4 Introduce myself again, or? 5 MR. DANESHFOROUZ: ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Just tell us why you're 6 7 here. It's your time. MR. DANESHFOROUZ: We're changing our company 8 name, and due to some problem we had with IRS. And our 9 attorneys are negotiating with them. So they advise us 10 to close the America's Best and start a new company. 11 And, also, I'm getting into the cyber security, too. 12 13 So that's the reason we'd like to do that. 14 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ma'am? Nothing 15 to add? Okay. Any questions from the Board? 16 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 10	meeting that we get more information from
11	Mr. Daneshforouz regarding what he owes, and as his
12	attorney, or a firm out of Colorado is suggesting that
13	they do this with their current IRS debt load, I have
14	contacted the one that is taking care of the case, and
15	he has provided information that we provided to the
16	Board. You should have copies of those things that they
17	provided.
18	MR. INGRAM: Now, those haven't been provided
19	yet and until it's requested.
20	So the items he's talking about, sir, were sent
21	to us within the last couple of days. And I can provide
22	those copies to you if you'd like to review those.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I guess, the question
24	the Board has is does the staff have concerns, or are
25	you satisfied with the information provided thus far?

1	MR. WOODRUFF: Thus far, he has complied with
2	everything that you had requested and that we requested.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
4	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If I could inquire, what
5	are the additional documents that you have? May we have
6	a moment to review these?
7	MR. INGRAM: We have copies for the north.
8	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: May we have a moment to
9	review them?
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, you can take a
11	moment to review.
12	MR. INGRAM: So what the Board is looking at is
13	the installment payment agreement that was approved
14	through IRS and Mr. Daneshforouz's legal counsel.
15	(The Board reviewed the documents.)
16	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Sir, could you just
17	refresh my memory on how these debts were accumulated.
18	How were these debts accumulated?
19	MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Due to our clients'
20	bankruptcies and that they didn't pay us. And when we
21	explained that to IRS, they understand. And most of
22	these debts, they are interest and penalty, and interest
23	on the interest, and interest on the penalties. Which
24	we've been promised that approximately 90 percent of
25	that's going to be removed.

ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You understand the 1 concern that we have, I mean this is a substantial 2 3 amount of money. MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Sure. 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And not only if you 5 fall behind, but you failed to pay your employees or any 6 7 subcontractors. MR. DANESHFOROUZ: We always pay our employees. 8 And at the moment, they're going to put the lien on my 9 personal asset, which they check, and there is enough 10 real estate and things like that, so. 11 And --BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? 12 1.3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll ask this of counsel. 14 15 Can we, if we were to make -- if there was to be a motion for approval, could that motion include a 16 six-month financial review on the status of the other 17 corporation and the payment he'll get? 18 MR. KANDT: Yes. For the record, Brett Kandt, 19 20 Board counsel. Yes, and the Board's done that in the 21 past. 18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: A six-month and 12-month.
19	MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you.
20	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And this is subject to
21	all statutory and regulatory requirements.
22	Thank you, Mr. Chair.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sir, do you understand
24	the motion?
25	MR. DANESHFOROUZ: Yes.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a
2	motion. I'll take a second.
3	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And we've already
5	called for public comment.
6	Okay. I have a motion and a second. All in
7	favor?
8	(Board members said "aye.")
9	ACTING CHAIR FLYNN: Any opposed?

8	MR. RESHAW: Good morning.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have you already been
10	sworn in?
11	MR. RESHAW: Yes, sir.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please state
13	your name for the record and tell us why you're here and
14	tell us about your background.
15	MR. RESHAW: Albert Joseph Reshaw IV here to
16	obtain a Nevada private investigator's license.
17	My background, I did 30, 28 years in law
18	enforcement in California, retired in 2005. In
19	conjunction with that, I'm also a military reservist.
20	And after I retired in 2005, I pretty much went back on
21	active duty. I was released because I'm too old to be
22	in the military anymore, recently, and learned that my
23	private investigator's license in California is not
24	transferable. So I applied.
25	I still have my top secret government security

1	clearances that are still active, so I want to do some
2	consulting and potentially some investigations that
3	require security clearances, as an option.
4	I appreciate the Board pushing this back from
5	September. When I was retired in April, I've had a
6	challenging time finding employment, and I was offered a
7	job in South Carolina. And it was my first week, so I
8	wasn't going to take that off. So now that I've been
9	there three months, I flew in last night to be here
10	today.
11	So that's a short version of my background,
12	sir.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, first off, thank
14	you for your service to our country.
15	MR. RESHAW: You're very welcome.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Very appreciated.
17	MR. RESHAW: You're very welcome.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any questions from the
19	Board?
20	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment? Go
22	ahead.
23	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just, you know, in the
24	investigation, it referred to a lot of financial stuff.
25	Any reason for that?

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1	MR. RESHAW: Yes, sir. The bankruptcy back in
2	1992 was due to my military service. At the time, I was
3	a police lieutenant making about \$5,000 bucks a month.
4	When I was recalled for Desert Shield and Desert Storm,
5	my income dropped to a thousand a month. So all is my
6	wife could do was keep the lights on and pay the
7	utilities and food for the four kids.
8	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, actually, you know,
9	we don't need to go back that far. But I just noticed
10	some recent stuff in 2013 and 2012. And I was just kind
11	of curious about those kinds of things.
12	MR. RESHAW: I'm still fighting with the credit
13	bureaus. I'm Albert Joseph Reshaw IV. My son, Albert
14	Joseph Reshaw V, lives at my house in Minden, Nevada.
15	When he got unemployed and went through a nasty divorce,
16	he's been living with me. And the credit bureau doesn't
17	seem to check the birthdays. And some of his stuff is
18	on my credit.
19	I have current credit. I can show you the
20	credit cards with the there's no limits. Well, let
21	me. The American Express card, the platinum one, really
22	doesn't have a spending limit. I can spend as much as I
23	want, because I pay it off. The other card I have I
24	only carry two with me it's got about a \$22,000
25	limit.

1	So it's that bleedover of Albert Jr. You raise
2	the kids as best you can, and then things happen. So.
3	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.
4	MR. RESHAW: No, when they look at the
5	birthday, they see the difference in the year.
6	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I get it. Thank you.
7	Thank you, Mr. Chair.
8	MR. RESHAW: Yes, sir.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
10	questions?
11	Any public comment?
12	MR. MARTINEZ: I have one question.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Reference this item?
14	MR. MARTINEZ: Yes.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please come forward.
16	MR. MARTINEZ: I have a quick question.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Identify yourself.
18	MR. MARTINEZ: I'm Josh Martinez.
19	I just had a question. You're Board counsel?
20	MR. KANDT: I am. But I will tell you, sir,
21	public comment is for you to offer comment to the
22	Board
23	MR. MARTINEZ: Oh, but I just need to
24	MR. KANDT: that's not testified to. And
25	I'm not going to, I'm not going to provide any legal

advice at --1 2 MR. MARTINEZ: Oh, no, I'm not asking for 3 advice. I'm just asking for your name. MR. KANDT: At this Board meeting. Brett 4 Kandt. 5 MR. MARTINEZ: Brett Kandt. And do you have a 6 7 board number, or are you just counsel? MR. KANDT: 5384. 8 MR. MARTINEZ: 5384. Thank you. 9 ACTING CHAIR FLYNN: And that was related to 10 this item? 11 MR. MARTINEZ: Yes. 12 13 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I'll entertain a motion. 14 15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I approve that Albert J. Reshaw IV be approved for his individual 16 private investigator's license. And this is subject to 17 all statutory and regulatory requirements. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We have a motion. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second. 21 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We have a second. Any discussion? 22 All in favor? 23 (Board members said "aye.") 24 2.5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

1 Motion carried. Congratulations, sir. 2 MR. RESHAW: Thank you, sir. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you want to take a 3 quick break? 4 MR. INGRAM: Maybe check with the stenographer 5 up north. 6 7 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: For the stenographer up north, we've been going a little over an hour, would you 8 like to take a break? 9 THE REPORTER: I appreciate the offer, but I'm 10 able to go forward if you all want to. 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We'll go 12 13 forward. Item number 20, Dyas K9 Solutions, LLC, doing business as Dyas K9, is applying for a new corporate 14 15 canine handler license. Andre R. Valdez is applying for an individual canine handler license. If approved, he 16 is requesting that his individual license be placed in 17 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent. 18 Member to be approved is Andre R. Valdez. This is 19 20 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements. 21 For possible action. MR. VALDEZ: Good morning. 22 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good morning, sir. 23 24 Have you been sworn in? MR. VALDEZ: I have. 25

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
2	MR. VALDEZ: My name's Andre Valdez. My
3	background is I was in the Marine Corps. for 10 years,
4	three tours in Iraq. And now I'm a disabled vet,
5	business owner and looking to do protection work with
6	canines here in the state of Nevada.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And, again,
8	thank you for your service.
9	MR. VALDEZ: Thank you.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any questions from the
11	Board?
12	Any public comment on this item?
13	I'll entertain a motion.
14	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm trying to find why
15	was this delayed last pardon me, Mr. Chair. Why was
16	this delayed last time? Was it, it had to do with
17	testing?
18	MR. VALDEZ: Yes. Yes, sir. My the dog I
19	brought to the test the first time didn't pass the exam.
20	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Right.
21	MR. VALDEZ: So I had to retake the exam. And
22	I passed this time.
23	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So that's what I wanted
24	to check with the investigator, to make sure that it had
25	been.

1	MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, he passed last night.
2	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: State your name.
4	MR. BATCHELOR: It's Investigator James
5	Batchelor. We tested him last night, Metro, and he did
6	pass the exam.
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you. Thank you,
8	Investigator Batchelor.
9	Mr. Chair, I would move that Albert J
10	excuse me, that Dyas K9 Solutions, LLC, doing business
11	as Dyas K9, be granted a new corporate canine handler
12	license, Andre R. Valdez be granted an individual canine
13	handler license, and that his license be placed in
14	abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent,
15	with member to be approved is Andre R. Valdez, subject
16	to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
17	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. I
19	have a second. Any further discussion?
20	I'll take a vote. All in favor, state "aye."
21	(Board members said "aye.")
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
23	The motion's approved. Congratulations.
24	MR. VALDEZ: Thank you, Board. Thank you,
25	James. I appreciate all your help.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm just curious, how
2	late was the test?
3	MR. BATCHELOR: It was 7:30, and it lasted till
4	about 8:30.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. It was cold.
6	All right. Moving on to private investigator.
7	Item number 21, Denali Consulting, LLC is applying for a
8	new corporate private investigator license. Matthew S.
9	Moonin is applying for an individual private
10	investigator license. If approved, he is requesting
11	that his individual license be placed in abeyance so
12	that he may become the qualifying agent. Member to be
13	approved is Matthew S. Moonin. This is subject to all
14	statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible
15	action.
16	Have you been sworn in, sir?
17	MR. MOONIN: Yes, I have, sir.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Your name for the
19	record, and tell us why you're here.
20	MR. MOONIN: It's Matthew Moonin. I'm applying
21	for a private investigator's license and the corporate
22	license for Denali Consulting Services.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any questions from the
24	Board?
25	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment on
2	this item?
3	I'll take a motion.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
5	Denali Consulting Services, LLC be approved for a new
6	corporate private investigator's license and that
7	Matthew S. Moonin, applying for his individual private
8	license, and if approved, that his license be placed
9	into abeyance so that he may become the qualifying
10	agent. And member to be approved are Matthew S. Moonin.
11	And this is subject to all statutory and regulatory
12	requirements.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. Do I
14	have a second?
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a second. Any
17	further discussion?
18	Okay. I'll call for a vote. All in favor,
19	state "aye."
20	(Board members said "aye.")
21	MR. INGRAM: You said public discussion.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I said public
23	discussion? My apologies. Is there any public comment?
24	Okay. Seeing none, calling for the vote again.
25	All in favor?

(Board members said "aye.") 1 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed? 2 Motion carried. Congratulations, sir. 3 MR. MOONIN: Thank you. 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Moving on 5 to private patrolman. Item number 23, Centerra Services 6 7 International, Inc. is applying for a new --MR. INGRAM: 22. 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Woop. I skipped over 9 Rudolph Lara. Our Director threw me off there. Doing 10 the best I can, my first day chairing. 11 MR. INGRAM: I take full responsibility for 12 13 that, sir. 14 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Private 15 investigator. Number 22, Rudolph Lara is applying for an individual private investigator license. This is 16 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements. 17 For possible action. 18 Have you been sworn in, sir? 19 20 MR. LARA: Yes, sir, I have. 21 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please have a seat, your name and why you're here. Give a little 22 background on you, too. 23 MR. LARA: Okay. Rudolph Lara. I'm here for 24 2.5 the private investigator license.

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1	My background includes over 30 years of federal
2	law enforcement experience. And my last 20 years was
3	with the United States Marshals Service. I was a
4	criminal investigator with the U.S. Marshal. Prior to
5	that, I was with Department of Interior, with the Bureau
6	of Land Management, as a criminal investigator, special
7	agent, as a wild horse and water investigator for the
8	State of Nevada. And prior to that, I was with the
9	office of the Inspector General, United States
10	Department of Interior in Washington, D.C. doing
11	criminal correction. And prior to that, I was actually
12	a ranger, but they recruited me. I was a ranger. And
13	prior to that, I was a United States Border Patrol agent
14	at the southern California border. Prior to that, I was
15	working my way through college, working at a casino, was
16	a corporate investigator for one of the casinos here in
17	Las Vegas. Prior to that, I was in the United States
18	Air Force, military police, in Dallas Air Force Base,
19	Texas. Prior to that, I was in high school.
20	(There was laughter.)
21	MR. LARA: Actually, I was a Police Explorer
22	from nine years old until I was 18. So that's my
23	background. And I have a bachelor's in criminal
24	justice.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you're going to be a

1	recruiting poster for private investigators.
2	MR. LARA: Actually, I'm up for the position of
3	United States Marshal pending the outcome of the new
4	president. So, prior to that, I'm still holding on.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, I thank
6	you for your service, and that's an impressive resume.
7	Any questions from the Board?
8	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do we have any public
10	comment?
11	Okay. Seeing none, I'll take a motion.
12	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mr. Chair, I have a
13	motion that Rudolph Lara be granted his individual
14	private investigator's license, this subject to all
15	statutory and regulatory requirements.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
17	Do I have a second?
18	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any discussion?
20	All in favor?
21	(Board members said "aye.")
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
23	Motion carried. Congratulations. You got
24	another line now for your LinkedIn account.
25	MR. LARA: Thank you.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Private
2	patrolman. Item number 23, Centerra Services
3	International, Inc. is applying for a new corporate
4	private patrolman license. David A. Marvin is applying
5	for an individual private patrolman license. If
6	approved, he is requesting that his license be placed in
7	abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.
8	Corporate officers to be approved are Richard K. Allen,
9	David I. Beckett, Paul P. Donahue and Deborah F. Ricci.
10	This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
11	requirements. For possible action.
12	Good morning, sir. Have you been sworn in?
13	MR. MARVIN: Good morning. David Marvin,
14	Centerra Security.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have you been sworn in?
16	MR. MARVIN: Yes, I have.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell us why
18	you're here, a little background.
19	MR. MARVIN: I'm here to be the qualifying
20	agent for Centerra Security. I've been doing security
21	for the last 10 years. I was discharged from the Army
22	in 2005. So executive protection, all the way to armed
23	officer, to just about everything. So.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We've got a lot
25	of veterans here this morning.

1	MR. MARVIN: Yes, you do.

5	Thank you.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Item number 24, Salient
7	Consulting Group, Inc., doing business as Salient
8	Operations Group, is applying for a new corporate
9	private patrolman license. Mitchell J. McAlister is
10	applying for an individual private patrolman license.
11	If approved, he is requesting that his individual
12	license be placed into abeyance so that he may become

17	Good morning, sir. Have you been sworn in?
18	MR. MCALISTER: I have.

21	MR. MCALISTER: Mitchell J. McAlister. I'm
22	applying for a new corporate private patrolman license.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions
24	from the Board?
25	Any public comment on this item?

1	I'll entertain a motion.
2	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mr. Chairperson, I move
3	that Salient Consulting Group, Salient Operations Group
4	be granted a corporate private patrolman's license, and
5	that Mitchell J. McAlister be granted an individual
6	patrolman license, and that if it is approved, that his
7	individual license be placed into abeyance so that he
8	may become the qualifying agent. Corporate officer to

10	to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
11	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.
12	ACTING CHAIR FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. I

14	All in favor, state "aye."
15	(Board members said "aye.")
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
17	Motion carried. Congratulations.
18	MR. MCALISTER: Thank you.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 25, Shepherd
20	Security Services, Incorporated is applying for a new
21	corporate private patrolman license. Jeffrey W. Rush is
22	applying for an individual private patrolman license.
23	If approved, he is requesting that his individual
24	license be placed into abeyance so that he may become
25	the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be approved

1	are Gary B. Shepherd and Susan Wedin. This is subject
2	to all statutory and regulatory requirements. For
3	possible action.
4	I see you're all here. Have you all been sworn
5	in?
6	MR. SHEPHERD: Yes, sir.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I just need you
8	to identify yourself for the record. And then someone
9	speak why you're here.
10	MS. WEDIN: Susan Wedin.
11	MR. RUSH: Jeffrey Rush.
12	MR. SHEPHERD: Gary Shepherd.
13	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Who wants to speak?
14	MR. RUSH: My name's Jeffrey Rush. I'm
15	applying for an individual private patrolman license, to
16	be placed into abeyance, to become the qualifying agent
17	for Shepherd Security Services. Shepherd Security
18	Services is an established strong business in the
19	Phoenix area. And they're looking to expand their
20	business into the Las Vegas area.
21	My personal background is a little bit over 20
22	years in physical security, loss prevention, federal
23	contracts, casino security contracts, which is usually
24	up in Reno, and special events, armed, unarmed,
25	plainclothes, executive protection.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
2	MR. SHEPHERD: Shepherd Security has been in
3	operation in Phoenix for 12 years. And I personally
4	come from four generations of law enforcement and
5	military service, with a standing in Phoenix.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
7	MS. WEDIN: Susan Wedin. I'm the CFO. I
8	handle all the financial obligations and make sure that
9	we're in compliance.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You got the
11	toughest job.
12	MS. WEDIN: Sometimes.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions
14	from the Board?
15	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None here.
16	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Shook head negatively.)
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment on
18	this item?
19	Okay. I'll entertain a motion.
20	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I request
21	approval for Shepherd Security Services, and that they
22	receive a new corporate private patrolman license, and
23	that Jeffrey W. Rush be approved for his individual
24	patrolman license, and that his individual license be
25	placed in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying

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1	agent. Corporate officers to be approved are Gary B.
2	Shepherd and Susan Wedin. And this is subject to all
3	statutory and regulatory requirements.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. Do I
5	have a second?
6	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any further discussion?
8	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sir.
10	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I think, when Jim made
11	the motion, I think he said a new private patrolman
12	license, where it should be corporate license.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yeah.
14	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That was just
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you want to
16	amend that?
17	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, I'll amend it to

21	(Board members said "aye.")
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
23	Motion carried. Congratulations.
24	MS. WEDIN: Thank you very much.
25	MR. RUSH: Thank you.

1	MR. SHEPHERD: Thanks.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Item number 26,
3	Savannah Consulting Group, LLC, is applying for a new
4	corporate private patrolman license. Shane S. Owings is
5	applying for an individual private patrolman license.
6	If approved, he is requesting that his individual
7	license be placed into abeyance so that he may become
8	the qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Shane S.
9	Owings. This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
10	requirements. For possible action.
11	Have you been sworn in?
12	MR. OWINGS: I have not.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please.
14	MR. KANDT: Oh, I'm sorry.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's okay.
16	MR. KANDT: My mind was elsewhere. Thank you.
17	Raise your right hand. And just, under penalty of
18	perjury, do you swear to tell the truth, the whole
19	truth, and nothing but the truth?
20	MR. OWINGS: I do.
21	MR. KANDT: Thank you much.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good morning, sir. For
23	our recorder, please identify yourself, and tell us why
24	you're here.
25	MR. OWINGS: My name is Shane Owings. I'm

1	owner of Savannah sorry Consulting Services. And
2	I'm applying for private patrolman to provide consulting
3	services for retail and financial institutions in
4	Nevada.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.
6	Any questions from the Board?
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.
8	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Shook head negatively.)
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public, any public
10	comment on this item?
11	Okay. I'll entertain a motion.
12	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mr. Chairman?
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
14	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have a motion that
15	Savannah Consulting Group, LLC, be granted a new
16	corporate private patrolman license, and that Shane
17	Owings, Shane S. Owings be granted his individual
18	private patrolman's license. If approved, he's
19	requesting that his individual license be placed into
20	abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.
21	Member to be approved is Shane S. Owings. This is
22	subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

24	have a second. Any further discussion from the Board?
25	Seeing none, I'll call the vote. All in favor,

1	state "aye."
2	(Board members said "aye.")
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
4	Motion carried. Congratulations.
5	MR. OWINGS: Thanks.
6	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Item number 27.
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
9	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Who seconded that?
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I thought I heard a
11	second. I'll second it.
12	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Well, it wasn't a
13	matter it was just a matter that I didn't know if we
14	had it. I didn't second.
15	(To Board Member Colbert) And you didn't
16	second.
17	So I didn't know who seconded. And I just
18	wanted that for the record. I'm sorry.

16	come into town a couple times a year. We do some
17	security consulting for some different clients in the

19	following all the rules and getting all the right
20	licensing in place for that. So.
21	I was with the with a sheriff's department
22	in California for about eight years. And then I have
23	been doing security work for about the same amount of
24	time now. So it's about equaled out here recently. So.

17	MR. CLARK: Thank you.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Item 28, Griffin
19	Security Solutions, LLC is applying for a new corporate
20	private patrolman license. Sandy J. Griffin Jr. is
21	applying for an individual private patrolman license.
22	If approved, he is requesting that his individual
23	license be placed into abeyance so that he may become
24	the qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Sandy J.
25	Griffin Jr. This is subject to all statutory and

1	regulatory requirements. For possible action.
2	Good morning, sir. Have you been sworn in?
3	MR. GRIFFIN: Yes, sir, I have.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Your name for
5	the record, and tell us why you're here.
6	MR. GRIFFIN: I'm Sandy Julius Griffin Jr. I'm
7	here to get my individual private patrolman's license
8	and, also, apply for the new corporate patrolman license
9	for Griffin Security Solutions.
10	A little background about myself. I was
11	stationed at Nellis Air Force Base from 2003 to 2011,
12	six years active and two years active reserve. 2006,
13	after my first coming back from Iraq, I started getting
14	into the security field, and throughout 2006 to current
15	time now. I've worked all over town, from being a
16	supervisor at Anthem Country Club, to Southern
17	Highlands, and working armed and unarmed patrol, being
18	in charge of people and, also, working by myself. I
19	think, I'm ready at this point in my life to start my
20	own company and provide an excellent security service in
21	Nevada.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you for
23	your service.
24	MR. GRIFFIN: Thank you, sir.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any questions from the

1	Board on the applicant?
2	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any public
4	comment on this item?
5	Okay. Seeing none, I'll take a motion.
6	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chairman, I move
7	that Griffin Security Solutions, LLC be granted a new
8	corporate private patrolman license, and that Sandy J.
9	Griffin Jr. be granted an individual private patrolman
10	license, and that his individual license be placed into
11	abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.
12	Members to be approved are Sandy J. Griffin Jr., and
13	that this is subject to all statutory and regulatory
14	requirements.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
16	Do I have a second?
17	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further
19	discussion from the Board?
20	Seeing none, I'll call the vote. All in favor
21	of the motion, state "aye."
22	(Board members said "aye.")
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
24	Motion carried. Congratulations, sir.
25	MR. GRIFFIN: Thank you very much, Board,

1	appreciate it.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Item number 29,
3	Sentinel Armored, LLC is applying for a new corporate
4	private patrolman license. Matthew C. Greenwell is
5	applying for a individual private patrolman license. If
6	approved, he is requesting that his individual license
7	be placed into abeyance so that he may become the
8	qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Matthew C.
9	Greenwell. This is subject to all statutory and
10	regulatory requirements. For possible action.
11	Good morning, sir. Have you been sworn in?
12	MR. GREENWELL: Yes, sir.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Name for the record,
14	and tell us why you're here.
15	MR. GREENWELL: Matthew C. Greenwell. I'm here
16	to get my private patrolman's license for transporting
17	property in Nevada. I worked for Briggs, Incorporated
18	from 2007 to 2014, during which time I've done
19	everything from scheduling to hiring to setting up
20	contracts between different businesses. You name it,
21	I've done it.
22	So that's what I'm trying to do.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Don't test me.
24	MR. GREENWELL: I won't.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions

1	from the Board?
2	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, Mr. Chair.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Sir, could you give
5	us bring us up to speed there and enlighten us about
6	the financial issues that you had the Sears and such.

1	Seeing none, I'll entertain a motion.

10	requirements.
11	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
13	Do I have a second?
14	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a second.
16	Any further discussion from the Board?
17	All in favor, state "aye."
18	(Board members said "aye.")
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
20	Motion carried. Congratulations.
21	MR. GREENWELL: Thank you. Happy holidays,
22	everyone.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Item number 30, Agent
24	One Protective Services, LLC is applying for a new
25	corporate private patrolman license. Timothy C. Furnas

1	is applying for an individual private patrolman license.
2	If approved, he is requesting that his individual
3	license be placed into abeyance so that he may become
4	the qualifying agent. This is subject to all statutory
5	and regulatory requirements. For possible action.
6	Good morning, sir. Have you been, been sworn
7	in?
8	MR. FURNAS: Yes, sir.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Your name for the
10	record and why you're here.
11	Timothy C. Furnas. And I'm applying for a new
12	corporate and private patrolman license as well as an
13	individual private patrolman license.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions
15	from the Board?
16	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Furnas, could you
17	just explain what's going on with the financials that
18	you have mentioned in the investigative report?
19	MR. FURNAS: Yes. The two items that were on
20	there were actually part of the original bankruptcy and,
21	for some reason, weren't caught. And so we have spoken
22	to the Goodheart Company at that time, right after
23	whoever called me. And we didn't know that still
24	existed. And those are included in that bankruptcy. So
25	there's no financial issue at all. They were fixing

that, too. 1 2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. And the bankruptcy 3 was caused by? MR. FURNAS: I lived in northern California and 4 was a partner in a company. And when the bubble burst, 5 we got hit really hard. That was one of the hardest-hit 6 7 areas in the nation. And I actually went for two years and sustained two years without a paycheck. And then 8 finally, it just -- it collapsed, you know, our company. 9 Our customers were filing bankruptcy, and it just --10 that's what happened. 11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you. Thank 12 13 you. MR. FURNAS: Since then, I have -- I'm sorry? 14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, go ahead and finish. 15 I'm sorry. 16 MR. FURNAS: Oh, since then, I've definitely 17 reestablished myself. I purchased my home, I own it 18 free and clear. So we don't have financial issues. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right. Thank you. 21 Thank you, sir. Thank you, Mr. Chair. 22 MR. FURNAS: Thank you. 23 24 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other 2.5 questions from the Board?

1	Any public comment on this item?
2	Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.
3	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
4	Agent One Protective Services, LLC be granted a new
5	corporate private patrolman license, and Timothy C.
6	Furnas be granted an individual private patrolman
7	license, and that his individual license be placed into
8	abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent for
9	Agent One Protective Services, LLC. And this is subject
10	to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
11	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. I
13	have a second. Any further discussion, discussion from
14	the Board?
15	Okay. Seeing none, I'll call for the vote.
16	All in favor, state "aye."
17	(Board members said "aye.")
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
19	Motion carried. Congratulations.
20	MR. FURNAS: Thank you. Happy holidays,
21	everyone.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Happy holidays, too.
23	Okay. Item 31, John P. Keane ("Keen")?
24	MR. KEANE: Sure.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sure?

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1	MR. KEANE: I've been fighting it all my life.
2	"Kane" or "Keen," either one.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What do you prefer?
4	MR. KEANE: "Keen."
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. He's applying

18	qualifying agent for Securitas. Securitas has a long
19	history here in Nevada.
20	I've recently moved here from Texas. I've held
21	many licenses in different states throughout my career,
22	back when I got out of the Marine Corps. in 1989. I've
23	worked in the armored car industry as well as the
24	guarding industry. And, hopefully, I'm here in Nevada
25	to stay, for now.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
2	MR. KEANE: You're welcome.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any questions from the
4	Board?
5	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
6	I just had a question. It seems like we have
7	CSEQs, that we had like three all for the same period,
8	though they didn't agree in hours. I was just curious,
9	what was that about? And maybe the investigator can
10	tell me.
11	MR. KEANE: And the CSEQs, is that the
12	references?
13	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah.
14	MR. KEANE: Is that?
15	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes.
16	MR. KEANE: I'm not sure. I had no input on
17	what they submitted. So I'm not
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We'll ask for
19	the investigator to come up.
20	MR. KEANE: Okay.
21	MR. INGRAM: Investigator Woodruff in the
22	north.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: He's coming forward.
24	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I mean it's not a
25	question on hours. Just I was just confused why there

1	were the different CSEQs.
2	There's one by David McAlister, and that was
3	14,560 hours. Then there is one by Ty Stanford, and
4	that was 14,560 hours. And then there was a third by
5	Carol Christian, who attested to 16,640 hours. I was
6	just confused.
7	MR. WOODRUFF: Yes. Thank you. The CSEQs came
8	from several different types of people within the
9	organization. Carol Christian, Christianson has known
10	Mr. Keane for a long period of time, known of his
11	experience. Ty was a Ty Stanford was a coworker and
12	had different knowledge of his experience. And then,
13	thirdly, David McAlister, who is in the position of
14	human resources, had information not only of his
15	personal experience, but company files as to his
16	experience. And those were the differences.
17	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.
18	Thank you, Mr. Chair.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
20	questions?
21	Any public comment on this item?
22	MR. KEANE: I actually have a comment. Can I
23	comment?
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
25	MR. KEANE: You know, I've held licenses in a

1	number of states. And I want to commend the staff of
2	the PILB for holding my hand, specifically Gisela here
3	and Jason up in Carson City. As I, you know, got my
4	feet beneath me with all the rules and regulations in
5	Nevada, they've been very, very helpful. I expected to
6	hit a bureaucratic roadblock and not get any help. But
7	they've been fantastic throughout this whole process.
8	So I want to put on the record thanking them and the
9	Board during this process.

12	hear. And as most of us have mentioned before, that the
13	purpose of the Board is to assist the industry where
14	it's possible.
15	MR. KEANE: Well, I can attest to that. So,
16	thank you.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I already called
18	for public comment. I didn't see anybody come forward.
19	All right. All in I'll entertain a motion.
20	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move
21	that

5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is there a second?
6	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
7	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a second
9	down south. Any further discussion from the Board?
10	All in favor, state "aye."
11	(Board members said "aye.")
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
13	Motion carried. Thank you.
14	MR. KEANE: Thank you.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Item number 32,
16	Charles Q. Allaway, doing business as Watchdog Security
17	Services, is applying for an individual private
18	patrolman license. This is subject to all statutory and
19	regulatory requirements. For possible action.
20	Good morning, sir. Have you been sworn in?
21	MR. ALLAWAY: I have.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the record,
23	your name and why you're here.
24	MR. ALLAWAY: Charles Allaway, and I'm applying
25	for a private patrol license, as a sole proprietor to

1	start. And, I believe, it would behoove me to establish
2	operations before I go for a corporate status. So start
3	small, start building from there. And then later,
4	within the next year to two years, I plan on going for
5	the corporate status. Currently, I have licensure in
6	Montana, California and Texas, and looking to start in
7	Nevada. I'd like to incorporate out of Nevada state.
8	Yeah, that's where I'm at.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. Any
10	questions from the Board?
11	Any public comment on this item?
12	I'll call for a motion.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mr. Chairman, I motion
14	that Charles Q. Allaway, for Watchdog Security Services,
15	be granted an individual private patrolman's license.
16	This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
17	requirements.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
19	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a second. Any
21	further discussion from the Board?
22	All in favor, state "aye."
23	(Board members said "aye.")
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
25	Motion carried. Congratulations.

1	MR. ALLAWAY: Thank you all.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to
3	move on to repossessor. Item 33, Clifton L. Jones, Jr.,
4	is applying for an individual repossessor license. If
5	approved, he is requesting that his individual license

11	Good morning, sir. Have you been sworn in?
12	MR. JONES: Yes, sir.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please have a seat.
14	Your name and why you're here.
15	MR. JONES: Clifton Jones, Jr., to get my
16	repossessor's license and become the qualified agent for
17	my existing company.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions
19	from the Board?
20	Any public comment on this item?
21	Okay. Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.
22	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mr. Chairman, I motion
23	that Clifton L. Jones is granted his individual
24	repossessor's license; if approved, that his individual
25	license be placed into abeyance so that he may become

1	the qualifying agent for Kennedy Auto Recovery
2	Solutions, LLC, license number 2053D. This is subject
3	to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion, and I
6	have a second. Any further discussion from the Board?
7	All in favor, state "aye."
8	(Board members said "aye.")
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
10	Motion carried. Congratulations.
11	MR. JONES: Thank you.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll move on to
13	polygraph examiner. Item number 34, Kerry White is
14	applying for an individual polygraph examiner
15	certification until such time that she retires from law
16	enforcement. This is similar to an abeyance license for
17	any other category. If approved, she will not she
18	will notify the Board staff when she retires, at which
19	time she may activate her license. This is subject to
20	all statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible
21	action.
22	Good morning, Kerry.
23	MS. WHITE: Good morning.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good to see you again.
25	When are you going to be retiring? Okay.

This month, maybe next year. 1 MS. WHITE: The department's on ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 2 probation. 3 MS. WHITE: Pretty much, yes. 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I just want to directly 5 comment to counsel, in the past, I've abstained when an 6 7 individual has worked directly for me. Kerry has not worked directly for me, but she's been in my chain of 8 command over several years, in my previous life, for 9 years. Plus, I have nothing but positive comments about 10 her. But I don't feel I need to abstain, because she 11 was not directly reporting to me. 12 13 MR. KANDT: Well, I just remind the Board members that under the ethics in government law, the 14 decision whether or not to abstain is left to the 15 individual judgment of the Board member that may have a 16 potential or an apparent conflict of interest. So the 17 important thing, I think, is that you disclose any 18 potential or apparent conflict of interest the minute 19 20 the item comes up on the agenda, prior to any discussion 21 of the item. But, once again, to Mr. Flynn, your comments, 22 it's left to you, your determination as to whether you, 23 after disclosing the prior relationship, working 24 relationship with the individual, whether or not you 2.5

feel like there's any sort of conflict of interest that 1 would impair your judgment to act in an impartial 2 manner. 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okav. And then, for 4 the record, for the stenographer, as has been stated 5 before, Ms. White has not directly reported to me, 6 7 although has been in my chain. In the past, I've abstained from people that directly reported to me. 8 Ι feel I could be fair and impartial on this. 9 And, Ms. White, do you have any concerns? 10 MS. WHITE: No concern, sir. 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And for the 12 13 record, your name and why you're here? 14 MS. WHITE: My name's Kerry White, and I am 15 trying to get my private polygraph license so that I can do polygraphs after I retire in the private sector. 16 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions 17 from the Board? 18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none. Do you? 19 20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No. 21 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any public comment on this item? 22 All right. Seeing none, I'll entertain a 23 24 motion. BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that 25

1	Kerry White be granted an individual polygraph examiner
2	certification, and that it remain in abeyance until she
3	retires from law enforcement, and, if approved, that she
4	will notify the Board once she has retired, at which
5	time she may activate her license. And this is subject
6	to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion and a
9	second. Any further discussion from the Board?
10	I'll call for the vote. All in favor?
11	(Board members said "aye.")
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
13	The motion carried. Congratulations.
14	MS. WHITE: Thank you, sir.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Private
16	investigator and private patrolman. Item number 35,
17	Executive Security & Protection, Inc. is applying for a
18	new corporate private investigator and private patrolman
19	license. Michael D. Vishnesky ("Vish-nes-skee")?
20	MR. VISHNESKY: Rolled right off.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Is applying for
22	an individual private investigator and private patrolman
23	license. If approved, he is requesting that his
24	individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may
25	become the qualifying agent. This is subject to all

statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible 1 2 action. 3 Have you been sworn in? MR. VISHNESKY: I have. 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please have a seat. 5 Your name and why you're here, sir. 6 7 MR. VISHNESKY: My name is Mike Vishnesky. I would thank the Board for allowing me to present our 8 case, and the staff has been just terrific working with 9 10 us. I'm from Pennsylvania. And I've been a 11 licensed private investigator for 30 years, only job 12 13 I've ever had actually. So I've been fortunate to work in many states, and that has been -- I've been a guest 14 15 here many times. And now I've had friends and business acquaintances, and they've asked me to bring my business 16 out here. 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you, and thank 18 you for pronouncing our state correctly. 19 20 MR. VISHNESKY: I made sure. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Our Chairman will 21 appreciate that. 22 Any questions from the Board? 23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none. 24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No. 25

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any public
2	comments on this item?
3	I'll entertain a motion.
4	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
5	Executive Security & Protection, Incorporated be granted
6	a new corporate private investigator and private patrol
7	license, Mike, Michael D. Vishnesky be granted an
8	individual private investigator and private patrol
9	license, and that his license be placed in abeyance so
10	that he can become the qualifying agent for Executive
11	Security & Protection, Incorporated. This is subject to
12	all statutory and regulatory requirements.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion, and I
15	have a second. Any further discussion from the Board?
16	Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All in
17	favor, state "aye."
18	(Board members said "aye.")
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
20	The motion carried. Congratulations, sir.
21	MR. VISHNESKY: Thank you very much.
22	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, did you want to go
23	back to item 17?
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. Yep. I was going
25	to go there next.

1	MR. INGRAM: Excellent.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We're trailing one
3	item. That's item number 17. We're about ready to
4	conclude the first portion of our meeting today.
5	So is anybody here representing Rayken LLC?
6	I don't see any here. Any up north?
7	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll entertain a
9	motion. Well, hold on one second. Any public comment
10	on this item?
11	All right. I'll entertain a motion.
12	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
13	Rayken LLC be granted a new corporate polygraph license,
14	and that Chad W. Russell, license number 1836E, be
15	granted his individual license, requesting that his
16	individual license be placed into abeyance so that he
17	may become the qualifying agent. And this is subject to
18	all statutory and regulatory requirements.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. Do I
20	have a second?
21	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a second. Any
23	further discussion from the Board?
24	All in favor, state "aye."
25	(Board members said "aye.")

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
2	The motion carried.
3	All right. We've had a long way. I'm going to
4	call for a break, 15 minutes, for myself, as I'm losing
5	my voice, as well as our hard-working stenographer up
6	there. And we'll reconvene at 11:05.
7	Those of you that are here for the appeals,
8	make sure you've signed in, in the back.
9	And we are off the record.

11	(A break was taken, 10:50 to 11:09 a.m.)
12	* * * *
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We're ready to
14	go on the record.
15	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Let me go grab Jim.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. He needed to
17	make a call. It's all right with us. We've got a
18	quorum.
19	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, Jim, he let me
21	know right at the break that he needed to make a call.
22	We've got a quorum, so we can proceed.
23	Okay. This is a continuation of today's
24	Private Investigator's Licensing Board meeting. This
25	portion will be dedicated to registration appeals.

1	Before we get started, Executive Director, I
2	think, you've got some comments?
3	MR. INGRAM: Yes. We're aware right now,
4	agenda item 40, Jorel Strother, agenda item 46, Raymond
5	Torres, and agenda item 52, Wesley Jones, have withdrawn
6	their appeals.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So 40, 46 and 52?
8	MR. INGRAM: Correct.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And if the Board
10	doesn't have any objection, what I'd like to do is I
11	noticed there's a couple people here with children. I'd
12	like to call them first, so the kids don't have to sit
13	around all day. Because this could go a bit.
14	Otherwise, I could wait till your turn.
15	MS. ROBERTS: No, I'll take it.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Come up
17	front. And, you know, I understand.
18	Yes, ma'am, do you have an objection?
19	MS. MOATON: No.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You have children, too.
21	Okay. I'm going to go with her first, because I noticed
22	her, and then you.
23	And then, hopefully, the rest of the room will
24	understand why I'm doing this. Okay. Because I toted
25	around my kids when they were a lot younger. I should

tote them around now. They're in their 30s and 40s, 1 2 but. 3 Come up front. I don't know what agenda item is yours. But just please tell us your name. Give us a 4 minute to find it. 5 MS. ROBERTS: It's 37. 6 7 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're 37? MS. ROBERTS: Roberts. 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Chrishondala 9 ("Kris-ahn-DAHL-a") Roberts? 10 MS. ROBERTS: "Krish-AHN-dah-lah"). 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Chrishondala. 12 1.3 MS. ROBERTS: Yes. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. My apologies. 14 15 MS. ROBERTS: No problem. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Come 16 forward. And you need to be sworn in. 17 MS. ROBERTS: Okay. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So please stand. 19 20 MR. KANDT: Ms. Roberts, if you'll just come 21 up so the mic can pick you up. And just state your name for the record. 22 MS. ROBERTS: Chrishondala Roberts. 23 MR. KANDT: Could you raise your right hand, 24 please. Do you swear under penalty of perjury to tell 2.5

1	the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?
2	MS. ROBERTS: Yes.
3	MR. KANDT: Thank you.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please have a
5	seat. Identify your name again for the record, and.
6	MS. ROBERTS: Chrishondala Roberts.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And why are you
8	here?
9	MS. ROBERTS: I'm here. And I'm a security
10	guard in California. And I came to Nevada to get a
11	card, get work, and I didn't report that I had a
12	criminal record, because it was expunged, and they
13	didn't tell me I had to report it if it was expunged.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'd like to call
15	the investigator, either up north or down here.
16	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Can you hear
18	her, for the recorder?
19	THE REPORTER: Yes.
20	MS. DONALD: I can speak loudly.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. Okay. All right.
22	Please.
23	MS. DONALD: So Ms. Roberts had arrests that
24	she didn't disclose. She is correct on some of them,
25	they were dismissed under 1203.4. But Nevada doesn't

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1	recognize 1203.4, so we do require the applicants to
2	list them.
3	We provided the Board with the denial report,
4	listing, you know, if they were a misdemeanor or a
5	felony and what the outcome was for each arrest. I can
6	go through it if you would like me to.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please, for the record.
8	MS. DONALD: 2013, one count of force, possible
9	great bodily injury. 2015, one count of theft, personal
10	property. She received summary probation, 60 days in
11	jail, fines, anger management classes. This was a
12	misdemeanor. She completed probation in two thousand
13	so the '15 and misdemeanor charges were dismissed under
14	1203.4.
15	In 2004, she had one count of force, assault
16	with a deadly weapon but not a firearm. The type was
17	unknown. The disposition was unknown. She did provide
18	court documents, but they not list the disposition, and
19	neither did the fingerprints. It was incomplete.
20	2003, one count of force, assault with a deadly
21	weapon not a firearm. Again, that was unknown as far as
22	disposition. The fingerprints did not list it. No
23	court docs were provided.
24	2001, one count of making a fictitious check.
25	This was a felony. It was 36 months formal probation.

She received jail and fines. The felony conviction was 1 2 dismissed under 1203.4 after probation. 1998, assault with a deadly weapon on a person 3 without a firearm. This was a felony. Probation, 36 4 months jail, or 36 months probation, 90 days jail. It 5 was a felony conviction, dismissed under 1203.4 after 6 7 probation. One more, 1998 battery, misdemeanor. She was 8 convicted, given one day in jail. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the record, 10 which ones were not expunged? 11 MS. ROBERTS: I have the documents. 12 13 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll give you plenty of time. 14 MS. DONALD: There were -- one of them was the 15 The court docs she provided were incomplete. 2004. Ιt 16 didn't list the disposition. And like I said, the 17 fingerprints didn't, either. And that was one count of 18 force, assault with a deadly weapon not a firearm. 19 20 There was actually two, 2004 and 2003, we were 21 unable to obtain the disposition. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You wanted to 22 23 say anything? MS. ROBERTS: I have the documents that I 24 emailed her. 2.5

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1	MS. DONALD: But it wasn't complete. And we
2	had spoken about that. It didn't list whether she was
3	charged with a felony or a misdemeanor. So we were
4	unsure. Several of us had looked at it, and we weren't
5	able to determine.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Anything else
7	you want to add?
8	MS. ROBERTS: No.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No. Okay. Any
10	questions of the Board?
11	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
12	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have a question. On
13	the 2004 and 2003, they are the exact same charge?
14	MS. DONALD: Correct, it is.
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: And does the record
16	indicate she was arrested, but there's no disposition?
17	MS. DONALD: I don't know. She provided me
18	with a lot of court documents. I have them all here.
19	And I actually, I don't think, for '3 and '4, I've
20	even gotten court documents on it. Let me look on the
21	fingerprints, what the fingerprints say for those.
22	So those were out of Los Angeles. A lot of
23	times, when we get the fingerprint reports back, we
24	don't have any disposition.
25	This says count four is assault with deadly

1	weapon not firearm, great bodily injury. It was
2	9-11-2003 and 11-15-2004. It says "severity unknown" on
3	both of them.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Thank you.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you want to comment
6	about these incidents where force was related with great
7	bodily injury?
8	MS. ROBERTS: They were retaliation from
9	domestic violence.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do we have any reports
11	that state that this was in conjunction or a
12	continuation of domestic violence?
13	MS. DONALD: No, I don't see anything about if
14	it was domestic violence on the fingerprints. It
15	doesn't say it. It just says what I read before.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And your
17	reasoning, again, for not reporting any of these,
18	including the ones that weren't expunged?
19	MS. ROBERTS: From my understanding, everything
20	that I have is expunged. I emailed her the court
21	documents. And my paperwork just says that it was
22	expunged. When I faxed them over to her, and I got in
23	contact with her to find out if she received everything,
24	I never got a call back. It was supposed to be an
25	initial 44 pages that I faxed over to her. I never got

a call back whether she received every single last one 1 2 of them. 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other questions from the Board? 4 (Board Member Nadeau came back into the meeting 5 room in Las Vegas.) 6 7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment on 8 this item? 9 MR. MARTINEZ: I have one comment. 10 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: On this item? 11 MR. MARTINEZ: Yes. 12 13 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please come forward and identify yourself. 14 MR. MARTINEZ: Again, I'm Josh Martinez. 15 And somebody stated earlier that she failed to 16 report something. My question on that was, does she 17 still have the right to remain silent and not give 18 anything to the state? So that's my question about the 19 20 U.S. Constitution. 21 She -- it's the state's obligation to prove her wrong or somehow not worthy or not to work in this 22 field. So I just want to remind the Board of where your 23 constitution belongs. Because, obviously, she's here 24 with her child. She's trying to work in a business or 2.5

1	in an industry that you guys reserve the right to
2	approve or disapprove an individual.
3	So my argument, or my question, I'm sorry, my
4	question is, does she still retain the right to remain
5	silent without being punished later for it?
6	MR. KANDT: This is Board counsel. I remind
7	the Board that members of the public who want to provide
8	comment, whether it's in the general period of public
9	comment or on a specific item that's being considered
10	for action, they have a right to provide comment. They
11	don't have a right to ask questions of the Board, and
12	the Board is not obligated to provide answers to
13	questions that are asked.
14	MR. MARTINEZ: Okay. Well, can I share a
15	comment, then? Nevada Constitution, Article 1,
16	Section 2, says that paramount allegiance of every
17	citizen in the United States or in Nevada is due to the
18	central federal government and protected by all of its
19	constitutional powers. Therefore, her constitutional
20	rights are being violated right now, as we speak. So
21	that's part of my comment.
22	Another comment is I don't know why you don't
23	have a name. You just said Board counsel. You're
24	claiming to be counsel. You gave me your number
25	earlier. But none of that information is posted where

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1	all of us can see. That's another comment. I'm not
2	going to ask you, because you might get back with me on
3	that. So that's my comment. Can you answer that
4	comment, reply to that comment?
5	MR. KANDT: I already stated for the record my
6	name is Brett Kandt.
7	MR. MARTINEZ: And your bar number, please,
8	again?
9	MR. KANDT: 5384.
10	MR. MARTINEZ: 5384. Thank you.
11	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, if I may interject?
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
13	MR. INGRAM: We have different Board counsel
14	that represent us on a regular basis. That's why our ID
15	placard for Board counsel says Board counsel. We have
16	no, no responsibility to report the name on a placard.
17	It is on the record. And, you know, that suffices.
18	Thank you.
19	MR. KANDT: But just also to clarify, I'm with
20	the Attorney General's Office. The Nevada Attorney
21	General's Office is legal counsel for this Board. And
22	one of more members of my office may sit as Board
23	counsel at any given Board meeting.
24	MR. MARTINEZ: Okay. And I have more comment.
25	Due process, is this due process right here, that we

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1	are because like it seems like double jeopardy.
2	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Martinez, that's a question.
3	MR. MARTINEZ: Okay. A comment. This, this is
4	a violation of due process. Her she already paid for
5	what she's done. And this is double jeopardy. She is
6	about to be punished a second time for something she's
7	already done. And this is, again, by the state, the
8	punishment given by the state.
9	You're depriving her a right to work. That is
10	protected by the First Amendment of the United States
11	Constitution, an oath that you swore, you swore to
12	uphold that, that oath to that constitution.
13	So, again, due process is being violated. She
14	doesn't have right to counsel. She doesn't have 12
15	members of her peers deciding whether it's a yes or no.
16	You do not have the authority to do that. Your power
17	derives from the consent of the government. We the
18	people control you. You do not tell us what we can and
19	cannot do.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you for
21	your comment.
22	MR. MARTINEZ: Thank you.
23	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Any other questions or
24	comments from the Board?
25	I'll entertain a motion.

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1	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
2	Chrishondala Roberts' denial be continued, I mean that
3	it be approved, that we continue with the denial, that
4	is stand as is.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. Do I
6	have a second?
7	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
9	and a second.
10	MR. KANDT: This is Board counsel. Just to
11	clarify for the record, the motion is that the denial be
12	upheld?
13	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: That's correct.
14	MR. KANDT: Correct?
15	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: That's correct. Sorry.
16	MR. KANDT: Thank you.
17	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
19	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
20	I'm going to abstain from this vote since I wasn't here
21	for the full testimony of this particular item.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Understood.
23	All right. I have a motion. I have a second.
24	Any further discussion from the Board?
25	Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All in

1	favor of the motion, state "aye."
2	(Board members said "aye.")
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
4	Motion carried. And I'm sorry, ma'am.
5	We had somebody else identify they're here with
6	children. If they could come forward.
7	Good morning. What item number are you?
8	MS. MOATON: 42.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 42?
10	MS. MOATON: M hm (affirmative).
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: David Ewing?
12	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Yes.
13	MS. MOATON: No. No.
14	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Michelle Moaton.
15	MS. MOATON: Michelle Moaton.
16	MR. INGRAM: 41.
17	MS. MOATON: 41.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 41. Okay.
19	MS. MOATON: I was close.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I was looking at him
21	when I said the name.
22	Okay. Mechele, you haven't been sworn in.
23	Please stand.
24	MS. MOATON: Oh, I'm sorry.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, no problem.
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MR. KANDT: Ms. Moaton, please state your name 1 2 for the record. 3 MS. MOATON: Michelle Moaton. MR. KANDT: Thank you. And do you swear under 4 penalty of perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, 5 and nothing but the truth? 6 7 MS. MOATON: Yes. MR. KANDT: Thank you. 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mechele, why are 9 you here? 10 11 MS. MOATON: I requested an appeal. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Do you have 12 13 anything you'd like to say? No? 14 15 MS. MOATON: Hm-m (negative). No. Sorry. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. 16 MR. INGRAM: Investigator Woodruff in the 17 north. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: In the north, the 19 20 investigator, if you could come forward and give us a 21 little background. MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 22 Investigator Woodruff. 23 I denied her originally because under -- has 24 made false statements of material fact on the 2.5

1	application. She listed no arrest history, no
2	conviction history whatsoever on her application. When
3	we ran her, we found in December of 2013 that she was
4	arrested for theft and, also, burglary. That was
5	dismissed. That was not disclosed.
6	And on March 25th of 2012, she was convicted of
7	domestic violence. And that was also not disclosed.
8	And in that one, later, we found that it appears that
9	she did some prison time and possibly probation.
10	When we got the fingerprint report back, we
11	also found that she was charged with a felony. She was
12	arrested in 2002 for manufacture, delivery of cocaine.
13	And she was sentenced for marijuana, it looks like. She
14	did not disclose this as well.
15	2000, she was arrested for knowingly damaging
16	property and domestic battery. Again, she did not
17	disclose.
18	On her appeal, she said that she didn't know
19	that these things would come up.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did not know what?
21	MR. WOODRUFF: On her written appeal, for
22	today, she said that she didn't know that those things
23	would come up on her record.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Anything you
25	want to say?

1	MS. MOATON: Yes. That was a time over back in
2	my past. And I didn't think that it was going to be
3	it was going to come up, or whatever. So I didn't put
4	it, because I'm on public housing, and when they ran a
5	federal background, ain't none of that stuff come up, or
6	whatever. So I thought it was off my record. So that's
7	why I didn't put it.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions
9	from the Board?
10	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
11	I'm sorry. When, when I couldn't hear you
12	clearly. When did you say that they ran your they
13	ran a background check, and it didn't come up. Where
14	was that?
15	MS. MOATON: The only thing that had came up
16	was for the domestic battery. Which was a
17	misunderstanding. Some neighbors had called the police.
18	So it was a misunderstanding. And that was the only
19	thing that came up. The only thing I had to do was
20	bring the paperwork stating that the judge threw it out,
21	with the federal housing.
22	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. For the federal
23	housing.
24	MS. MOATON: M-hm (affirmative).
25	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: But the domestic

1 violence, you were convicted? 2 MS. MOATON: No. Which one, for the one in 2012? 3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes. 4 They threw it out. 5 MS. MOATON: BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: It's my understanding the 6 7 record says that you were sentenced. MS. MOATON: Not that I know. The only thing I 8 had to bring was the papers stating that it was thrown 9 out. 10 11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And for the investigator, from your records, the domestic violence was a 12 13 conviction? MR. WOODRUFF: Correct, from what I found. 14 15 After the fingerprints came up with the jurisdiction that the charge was, I went on line to that, that court 16 in San Bernardino, I believe it was, and they show that 17 she was convicted and --18 MS. MOATON: San Bernardino? 19 20 MR. WOODRUFF: The court records are very 21 difficult to read online. They don't give you the exact 22 details. But that's what the information was leading to, that she was convicted. She was put on probation. 23 Then she was -- had a violation of probation, and then 24 2.5 they sent her to prison.

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1	MS. MOATON: M-hm (affirmative). In San
2	Bernardino, California?
3	MR. WOODRUFF: Yes.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: She's asking if it was
5	San Bernardino, California.
6	MR. WOODRUFF: That's my recollection. I don't
7	have those documents with me today. I apologize.
8	MS. MOATON: I've never been to California.
9	No, I've never been to California.
10	MR. INGRAM: Just to reiterate to the Board,
11	the application is very clear that they are to list all
12	arrests, the requirements of the disposition. And it
13	also states on the application that failure to disclose
14	would, may result in a denial.
15	So I just want to put that on the record again.
16	They have the responsibility to report information to
17	the Board, to Board staff. They sign that document
18	stating that they have provided all the information.
19	And so, again, failure to disclose kind of trumps just
20	about anything else on the application.
21	Thank you.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions
23	from the Board?
24	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I just didn't get it, I
25	didn't really understand why she didn't disclose her

1	arrest and conviction.
2	MS. MOATON: I didn't think it was, I didn't
3	think it was going to come up, or whatever. I didn't.
4	Because with the housing, it didn't come up. The only
5	thing that came up, or whatever, was the domestic
6	battery.
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: But you didn't disclose
8	that, either.
9	MS. MOATON: I know.
10	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ms. Collins, do you
12	have a question?
13	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: The 2012, the battery
14	charge
15	MS. MOATON: He said in San Bernardino. I've
16	never been to San Bernardino. That's what I'm saying.
17	He said San Bernardino.
18	MR. WOODRUFF: Mr. Chairman?
19	MS. MOATON: I don't know where
20	MR. WOODRUFF: Mr. Chairman?
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
22	MR. WOODRUFF: I may have my recollection
23	incorrect on San Bernardino as far as that charge. I
24	don't have that was my memory, but it could be wrong.
25	I denied her originally based on the fact that

1	she did not disclose any of the arrests. And when we
2	got a fingerprint report, we got more information of
3	other activities as well. But she could be correct in
4	this matter as far as it may not have been originated
5	out of San Bernardino.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
7	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: So what is your what
8	was the outcome, the disposition from the charge?
9	MS. MOATON: It was a disagreement or
10	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: The disposition, the
11	outcome.
12	MS. MOATON: The outcome.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: What was the sentence?
14	MS. MOATON: They signed that they were my
15	time has been served, that case dismissed. And they
16	dismissed the charges and everything. And I just had to
17	go get a paper.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. My only comment,
19	and this Board has looked at time and recency before,
20	but to my knowledge, anytime someone has purposely not
21	been truthful on their application, we normally reject
22	it. I can't speak for today. But that's where we're
23	coming from. That's why we ask that question.
24	So any other questions from the Board?
25	Any public comment?

1	MR. MARTINEZ: One more public comment, please.
2	And it's just a comment. She was asked again why she
3	didn't disclose something. That's part of her Fifth
4	Amendment right. So I'm demanding that the PILB operate
5	within those boundaries.
6	Also, in Hale vs. Hinkel, page 201, U.S. 74,
7	the individual may stand upon their constitutional
8	rights as a citizen. They are entitled to carry on his
9	own private business in their own way. Their power to
10	contract is unlimited. No infringement from anyone.
11	Okay. And that is what is happening here.
12	She's being infringed upon. You're going to deny her,
13	from previous, previous charges.
14	So. And another thing. I'm not going to ask a
15	question. You guys are public officers. You guys swore
16	an oath to uphold and defend the constitution. You
17	should have a name tag, you should have something that
18	identifies you, so that we know who you are, just in
19	case you're not in time and trying to deprive us of any
20	laws or any rights, just like what's happening today.
21	I know you're going to deny, deny this
22	individual. So I'm here to state, as a citizen in
23	Nevada and the United States, that you have not, you do
24	not have that right.
25	Thank you.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll call for a
2	motion.
3	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
5	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that the denial
6	of registration for Michelle Moaton be sustained. Under
7	NRS statute 648.100, under Section 3, Section G,
8	subsection G, knowingly makes any false statement in an
9	application, failure to complete the application and
10	answer the questions truthfully is a failure to make
11	is knowing to make a false statement on an application.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. Do I
13	have a second?
14	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any further discussion
16	from the Board?
17	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes. Just for an
18	addition.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
20	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: In Section H, it also
21	says "or refuse to provide any information required by
22	the Board."
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
24	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll call for a vote.

All in favor of the motion, say "aye." 1 2 (Board members said "aye.") ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed? 3 Motion's upheld. I'm sorry. 4 MS. MOATON: Okay. Thank you. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Anybody else 6 with children? 7 Do we have anybody up north with children? 8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, sir. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We'll go back in 10 Number 36, Lorenzo Garaycoa. If I pronounced it 11 order. incorrectly, my apologies, and please correct me. 12 13 MR. GARAYCOA: That's right. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please stand and 14 be sworn in, sir. 15 MR. KANDT: Mr. Garaycoa, please, will state 16 your name for the record. Please stand. And will you 17 state your name for the record. 18 MR. GARAYCOA: Lorenzo Garaycoa. 19 20 MR. KANDT: Okay. Raise your right hand. And 21 under penalty of perjury, do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 22 MR. GARAYCOA: I do. 23 24 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 2.5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Why are you

1	here?
2	MR. GARAYCOA: I'm here because I would like to
3	appeal for my unarmed security card so I can work as a
4	security guard, in South Korea at this point.
5	And I thank the Board here, in front of the
6	Board. And, also, I am sorry for what happened 10 years
7	ago. And they said I had accost two others, as at the
8	moment, when that didn't happen, 11 years ago.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Can you tell us what
10	happened 11 years ago?
11	MR. GARAYCOA: Yes. I was working as a
12	security officer. And I've already got married. And
13	the mother got a miscarriage. So I was on under a lot
14	of pressure and, back then, lack of maturity. Lack of
15	maturity. So I was on assign with another worker. And
16	we were going to back and forth with her, because I
17	didn't know, when officers fall asleep, you're required
18	to quit on your own, so they don't have to pay you any,
19	any employment of when you they don't owe you
20	anything, as you were working.
21	So what happened was, I was going to find the
22	person with the chemical. But she start to make her
23	sick, the stomach, maker her sick, for about two days.
24	But I did not did that. So when then I left the
25	post, and I quit. But then I decided to come back,

1	because I don't want to lose my job. And that's when
2	the medical worker asked me where you been. I explained
3	the same as I explained to you this moment. But when I
4	left, after two weeks, I found out that she called
5	the what the also with the company that I was
6	working at the moment, they called the police.
7	And then I was at the community college. So
8	they show up on the scene, and they arrest me, and then
9	explain to me, and then ask me, "You know why we're
10	here?" And I said, "No, I don't know why you're here."
11	So they took me into custody. And I was two months,
12	given two months jail, pled not guilty, and then year
13	and a half with honorable discharge.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Who's the
15	investigator on this?
16	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Anything else
18	that you can add?
19	MS. DONALD: I mean he as he stated, it's
20	pretty accurate. He pled guilty to a felony. He
21	received a suspended jail sentence, three years
22	probation. And this was back in the beginning of 2006.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
24	MS. DONALD: He did disclose the arrest. We
25	have court documents that show what he was charged with.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And this is more
2	than 10 years ago?
3	MS. DONALD: Yes.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
5	doing now?
6	MR. GARAYCOA: Right now, I work as a teacher.
7	I prepare classes and also repair computers. I started
8	this on my own and educated myself, so I can move
9	forward with my career.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
11	Any other questions from the Board?
12	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment?
14	I'll entertain a motion.
15	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'll try for a
16	motion.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I
19	would move that Lorenzo Garaycoa, that his denial be
20	overturned and that he be issued his registration card.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
22	Do I have a second?
23	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any further discussion
25	from the Board?

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1	All in favor, state "aye," of the motion.
2	MR. INGRAM: Call public comment. Okay.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I did, I already called
4	public comment.
5	They're keeping an eye on me, down there. It's
6	all right.
7	All in favor, state "aye."
8	(Board members said "aye.")
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
10	Congratulations.
11	MR. GARAYCOA: Thank you, sir.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have a good day.
13	MR. GARAYCOA: Thank you.
14	MR. INGRAM: Just for the record, any of you
15	that are granted a work card after today's hearing,
16	Board staff will be in contact with you. And that
17	generally takes three to five business days before we
18	can make contact with you. And then you'll have your
19	card to follow.
20	MR. GARAYCOA: Take your time. That's okay.
21	MR. INGRAM: Thank you.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We're not going to take
23	that long. All right.
24	Okay. All right. Number 38, Lanier Fisher
25	applied for registration, was denied. Mr. Fisher is

appealing the decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. 1 For possible action. 2 MR. FISHER: Good morning. 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good morning. You need 4 to be sworn in, sir. 5 MR. KANDT: Mr. Fisher, could you state your 6 7 name for the record. MR. FISHER: Lanier Fisher. 8 MR. KANDT: Raise your right hand. And under 9 penalty of perjury, do you swear to tell the truth, the 10 whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 11 MR. FISHER: I swear to God. 12 13 MR. KANDT: Thank you. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please have a 14 15 seat. And tell us why you're here, sir. MR. FISHER: I'm here to appeal my work card 16 application, since it was denied. I have no, I have 17 no -- and I don't know it was denied, you know. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You don't know why it 19 20 was denied? MR. FISHER: Yeah, I mean I figured it was when 21 I put my charges on there, the one charge, and I 22 abbreviated "registered." And then it looked like, I 23 quess, it may have looked like "regular." But it was a 24 2.5 registered firearm, that I was calling it. Which in

1	California, they had changed the gun law, so anyone who
2	was found with any legal handgun, which is a firearm
3	that was that was with the serial number scratched
4	off, or purchased off the street without knowing its
5	registration or anything. And in my case, my firearm is
6	registered to me. That's really why it was a
7	misdemeanor.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. There's four
9	charges that we're looking at. You're saying you only
10	forgot about one of them?
11	MR. FISHER: I don't know about any other
12	charges.
13	MR. INGRAM: Two charges.
14	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Two charges.
15	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, my apologies.
17	Okay. We'll call the investigator up.
18	MR. FISHER: May I ask, what's the first
19	charge?
20	MS. DONALD: I'll let you know.
21	MR. FISHER: Okay.
22	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
23	In 1996, he was charged with carrying a loaded
24	firearm in a public place. And per our statutes, we
25	denied you for illegal use or possession of a dangerous

1	weapon. That's why you are denied.
2	It was a misdemeanor. He was convicted. He
3	got three years probation, 180 days jail and a fine.
4	Per the fingerprints, he did disclose it.
5	And in 1995, he was charged with having a
6	loaded firearm in a public school. That was dismissed.
7	And it was not 1203.4. Per the fingerprints, it was
8	dismissed. He did disclose that one as well.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So he disclosed both of
10	them?
11	MS. DONALD: Yes.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I'm correct that
13	these are over 20 years ago?
14	MS. DONALD: Correct, yes.
15	MR. FISHER: Correct. And, also, they say it
16	was a school ground. But I mean it was a school. But
17	after a certain time, it becomes a public park. And
18	that's when I was in the park. It was after school. It
19	was like 4:30 or something like that, so.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any
21	comments from or questions from the Board?
22	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have none.
23	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment on
25	this item?

1	I'll entertain a motion.
2	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
4	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I
5	would move that Lanier Fisher be granted, that his
6	denial for the registration be overturned and that he be
7	issued a registration card.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do I have a
9	second?
10	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
11	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
13	discussion from the Board?
14	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, may I
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
16	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: just make a comment?
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Of course, you may.
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: The fact that they're 20
19	years old and that he did disclose is very instrumental
20	in my motion.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I'll add that it
22	goes to your character, you've stayed out of trouble for
23	this long.
24	MR. FISHER: Yes. And I can't. I'm
25	family-oriented. I can't. Because I've got to try to

1	get them straight.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No problem.
3	MR. FISHER: If they're messing around.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I'll
5	call for a vote. All in favor, state "aye."
6	(Board members said "aye.")
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
8	Motion carried. Congratulations, sir.
9	MR. FISHER: Thanks so much.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Make sure I get
11	the right one this time.
12	MR. INGRAM: Go by the number.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Is Lori
14	Fields here?
15	Okay. Number 39, Lori Fields applied for
16	registration, was denied. Ms. Fields is appealing the
17	decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. For possible
18	action.
19	Good morning.
20	MS. FIELDS: Good morning.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Or, actually, good
22	afternoon just about.
23	MS. FIELDS: No, that's fine.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We'll swear you in
25	first.

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1	MR. KANDT: Thank you. Please state your name
2	once again for the record.
3	MS. FIELDS: Lori Fields.
4	MR. KANDT: Raise your right hand. Do you
5	swear under penalty of perjury to tell the truth, the
6	whole truth, and nothing but the truth?
7	MS. FIELDS: Yes.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Have a seat,
9	your name, and tell us why you're here.
10	MS. FIELDS: My name's Lori Fields. In two
11	thousand I really think it was like in 2006, I worked
12	for a company that was actually, it was just a friend
13	of mine I worked for. And really it was just point low
14	on friendship. And he needed some help. I worked for
15	him for a couple years. And it was a pretty shady
16	operation. There was a lot of stuff going on. He
17	wanted me to do a lot of different things. There was a
18	van exchanged between him and I, ledger sheets between
19	him and I.
20	I ended up getting sick. I had cancer. I
21	left. About two years after I left, he charged me with
22	embezzlement, embezzlement of taking the van, which was
23	a \$70,000 value.
24	(Interruption by a fire alarm in Las Vegas.)
25	MR. INGRAM: For the record, we are going

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1	well, hold on a second. If they make an announcement
2	that it's a test, we're okay.
3	(Interruption by a fire alarm in Las Vegas.)
4	MR. INGRAM: This is not the normal alarm. So
5	I'm going to sit here for a minute and see what follows.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Am I allowed to say
7	everybody keep your fingers crossed?
8	I'm with you, sir, I want to continue.
9	Okay. Let's give it a shot. All right. So.
10	MS. FIELDS: Okay.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: There was the van.
12	MS. FIELDS: There was a van, and it's where I
13	take the van with my
14	(Interruption by fire alarm in Las Vegas.)
15	MR. INGRAM: Can we check with Capitol Police
16	and see if this a test, or.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: If it's not, please
18	come back.
19	MR. INGRAM: I think, we can try, if you want.
20	(Interruption by a fire alarm in Las Vegas.)
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We're off the record
22	right now, so.
23	(There was a period off the record at
24	11:50 a.m.)
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We'll go

back on the record. 1 So just for the record, they're doing testing. 2 They've asked us to ignore all the alarms. So we'll try 3 our best. So. 4 So there was a van. 5 MS. FIELDS: There was a van. There was a lot 6 7 of -- like I said, a lot of shady stuff going on. Τwο years later, he ended up charging me with embezzlement. 8 (Interruption by a fire alarm in Las Vegas.) 9 MR. INGRAM: Wait. 10 MS. FIELDS: I apologize for not stating it on 11 my application. And the reason I didn't is because I 12 13 wasn't arrested. I never was arrested. An investigator called me into his office. He talked to me for about 14 15 two hours, asked me everything that went on from the time I started till the time I walked out. 16 He met with me probably for a week straight 17 over different things. And right after I had my cancer 18 surgery, he called me in -- it was right around 19 20 Christmas -- asked me to come in and talk to him for a final time. 21 When I walked in, he said, "I'm not arresting 22 I don't think any of this is -- you know, this is 23 you. a bogus situation. But the D.A. wants to charge you, 24 because they're friends. I have to do it." I lived in 2.5

1 a very small community. Everybody knew everybody. He's
2 like, "So I'm just going to fingerprint you and let you
3 go home." I said, "Okay."

The investigator went through court with me. 4 We went through two years of court. They could never 5 prove anything, neither. Finally, they went through 6 7 five D.A.s, and it just -- it was a mess. They ended up letting me go. But they, all the -- the judge, the 8 judge called me in chambers, and because they were going 9 to push it to a jury trial. Because I didn't want 10 nothing on my record. I had never been in trouble my 11 entire life, ever, ever, ever. And I didn't want 12 13 anything on my record. But the judge called me in 14 chambers, him and my attorney, and said, "I'm really sorry. We really need to just try to settle this. I 15 can't get a jury trial. Unfortunately, no one cares for 16 the gentleman" that was suing me. "It would take us 17 forever. They're offering you a misdemeanor. It's 18 Half of us have misdemeanors. Accept it and nothing. 19 20 walk out and let this go."

I didn't know. I had never been in trouble. So I said, "As long as it's not on my record, that's all I care." He said, "It's a misdemeanor. Everybody has them. It's nothing. It's a ticket." I said, "Okay, I'll take it." We walked back in the courtroom, and he

1	said, "We're going to accept a misdemeanor. Give her a
2	thousand-dollar fine. Let her go home."
3	That's what I did. I've lived the rest of my
4	life. I've never had this come up. I never knew that
5	it was on there. I never knew it would show after that,
6	because they told me it wouldn't.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Whereabouts did this
8	occur?
9	MS. FIELDS: Yuba County. It's a very small
10	town. It's called Marysville, California. They have
11	one Walmart.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The report also says
13	you had formal counseling besides, and also probation.
14	Are you aware of that?
15	MS. FIELDS: No, sir, I just all I had was a
16	probation officer. That's all I had. And I had to meet
17	with him for three months. I had to go in each month
18	and talk to him. And then, after that, I was just on a
19	written thing. I had to write monthly reports, fax them
20	in. And they came to my house one time, and then that's
21	that last I've ever heard of them.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
23	doing now?
24	MS. FIELDS: I'm an office manager for a
25	machine shop.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Does the investigator
2	have anything to add?
3	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
4	So, originally, she was charged with a felony.
5	She was fined. She did some informal probation and
6	counseling. According to the Superior Court of
7	California, County of Sutter we have minutes here.
8	It says both counsel stipulate to 15,000 in victim
9	restitution and that when the first 1,000 is paid, the
10	charge will be reduced to a misdemeanor. The court
11	states that when the matter is reduced to a misdemeanor,
12	it will still be formal probation. After the first
13	1,000 is paid, defendant and counsel may place the
14	matter on the calendar for modification of probation to
15	have the charge reduced to a misdemeanor. But the court
16	makes no promise of summary probation.
17	According to the court documents and the
18	record, she did complete probation. It is now a
19	misdemeanor. But she was originally charged with a
20	felony.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you aware now it's
22	on your record?
23	MS. FIELDS: Yes. This is the first.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you know to disclose
25	it in the future?

1	MS. FIELDS: Absolutely. It's the first I've
2	heard. Like I said, they never. They kept, they told
3	me time and time again, it's not a felony, it will just
4	be a misdemeanor, it will never show up. That's all.
5	And I never was arrested. I apologize. That's my
6	fault.
7	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
9	MR. INGRAM: I would like to put on the record
10	that, once again, the application states that you must
11	disclose any arrest, whether it's a conviction or not.
12	And there was a failure to disclose.
13	Thank you.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any questions or
15	comments from the Board?
16	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
17	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm not saying this is
19	going to happen this morning. But what I've done before
20	in situations like this, as I've mentioned publicly,
21	I've got a big issue with disclosure, but I might invite
22	you back after a certain period of time. And then you
23	can do the application correctly.
24	MS. FIELDS: No problem.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Now that you know. But

1	that we'll see what happens.
2	MS. FIELDS: So. Okay. No problem. So even
3	though they explained to me, because I wasn't so even
4	though I was, because I was fingerprinted, is that
5	considered arrested?
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
7	MS. FIELDS: Okay.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You were formally
9	charged.
10	MS. FIELDS: Okay. Because I just he just,
11	the investigator said, "I'm not even going to take you
12	to the jail. I don't even want to go over there. We're
13	just going to do it right here."
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You were not only
15	formally charged, you were also formally convicted.
16	MS. FIELDS: Okay.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you were formally
18	put on probation. And you formally fined. That's all
19	from the court documentation.
20	MS. FIELDS: Yes. Okay.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We'll see what
22	happens this morning. Okay.
23	MS. FIELDS: Okay. Thank you.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any public
25	comment?

1	MR. MARTINEZ: One more, please?
2	MS. FIELDS: No, I don't want him to come up.
3	MR. MARTINEZ: You guys remember me. I love
4	you all. I want to state that she
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you aware the
6	applicant really doesn't want you up here?
7	MR. MARTINEZ: Yeah, but it's public comment
8	right now.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I understand that.
10	MR. KANDT: Yeah, let me establish something
11	for the record, if I could.
12	MR. MARTINEZ: Yeah.
13	MR. KANDT: Are you a licensed attorney?
14	MR. MARTINEZ: No, I'm a civilian.
15	MR. KANDT: Okay. I just want to make it
16	clear, because you are this is the third time that
17	you've come up when an applicant's denial was being
18	considered on appeal.
19	MR. MARTINEZ: Okay.
20	MR. KANDT: And in the prior two instances,
21	you acted in a manner in which you were advocating for
22	the legal rights of the person that was up here. And
23	you're not a licensed attorney. You haven't been
24	retained by any of these people as a licensed attorney
25	to advocate their rights in this proceeding. I just

1	want to note that for the record.
2	MR. MARTINEZ: Right. Right. And the bar
3	association, they are bounded with contracts and with
4	people like you. I'm protected by the constitution.
5	Anyone has rights to that law, to the constitution. You
6	can look that up in Marbury vs. Madison.
7	Also, there's also Murdock vs. Pennsylvania.
8	That's Murdock vs. Pennsylvania, 319 U.S. 105. No state
9	shall convert a right into a privilege and issue a
10	license and be therefor.
11	Shuttlesworth v. City of Birmingham, Alabama,
12	373 U.S. 262, 1963. The state, if the state converts a
13	right into a privilege, the person can't ignore the
14	license of being engaged in the right with impunity.
15	That means, if she does decide to work in that field,
16	you can't punish her.
17	So, again, I'm not an attorney, but I do
18	understand common sense and common law. You do not have
19	to go to school, a decorated law school, to understand
20	that.
21	So I just want to remind you where your oath
22	belongs, which is the United States Constitution before
23	the bar. The bar association is controlled by Britain.
24	You do not have authority over what I can and cannot do.
25	Thank you very much.

Okay. I'll entertain a 1 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 2 motion. I'll make one. Am I allowed to make a motion? 3 First time as being the Chair. 4 MR. KANDT: Procedurally, that's fine. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: My motion is to uphold 6 7 staff's denial. But I'd put a condition on it allowing the applicant to come back every six months, fill out 8 the paperwork correctly, noting everything we know now. 9 And we'll see what happens. 10 MR. INGRAM: For the record, our statutes and 11 regulations state that, once denied, they must wait a 12 13 year to reapply. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, if that's your 14 15 regulations, I'm going to have to abide by the regulation. So a year. 16 MS. FIELDS: I just, all I was using it for was 17 mystery shopping. I was just being a mystery shopper 18 part-time. 19 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm trying to help you. 21 Okay. That's my motion. One year. BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second. 22 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a second. 23 Any further discussion from the Board? 24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? 25

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sir.
2	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I
3	think, I'm going to not support your motion. In spite
4	of the fact that you're absolutely correct, failure to
5	disclose is a violation of statutes, and, but, I think,
6	there was a I believe her story.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. It's on the
8	record.
9	All right. All in favor of the motion?
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
12	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Aye.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The motion
14	carries three-one. We'll see you in a year.
15	MS. FIELDS: Thank you.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You have a good day.
17	Thank you. Okay.
18	MR. INGRAM: We're up to 42.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.
20	Number 42, David Ewing applied for
21	registration, was denied. Mr. Ewing is appealing the
22	decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. For possible
23	action.
24	Good morning, sir.
25	MR. EWING: Good morning.

ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please, you need to be 1 2 sworn in. MR. KANDT: Please state your name again for 3 the record. 4 MR. EWING: David Ewing. 5 MR. KANDT: And raise your right hand. And 6 7 under penalty of perjury, do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 8 MR. EWING: Yes. 9 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 10 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Ewing, why 11 12 are you here? MR. EWING: Well, I'm here to appeal my 13 license, because I'm an addict in recovery. I had 14 substance issues for 29 years. About four years ago, I 15 had a little awakening. And I have changed my life a 16 hundred percent, you know, everything. I've had a job, 17 taken a job for the whole time. I've been clean. I got 18 my family back, my kids, everything. 19 20 I understand how -- you can look at my record. 21 I was not the upstanding citizen I am now, you know, for 29 years. I do admit I made mistakes. I just try not 22 to -- hopefully, those mistakes don't go with me the 23 rest of my life. You know, like I said, I sponsor 24 people in recovery. I volunteer at the Salvation Army. 2.5

1	I'm not in any run-ins. You know, like I said, I'm
2	trying, trying to re-right the wrongs I've done.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you're fully engaged
4	in the 12 Step?
5	MR. EWING: A hundred percent.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
7	MR. EWING: And like I said, I you all can
8	look at my record.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I am.
10	MR. EWING: I wasn't a nice person. But I've
11	changed, you know. I was given a chance. I thought I'd
12	come in and ask for it.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What type of drug?
14	MR. EWING: Methamphetamine.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What, meth?
16	MR. EWING: Methamphetamine.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Does the
18	investigator have anything to add?
19	MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.
20	The charges were a 2013 possession of a
21	controlled substance, felony. The applicant did
22	disclose this, provided court documents, as well as
23	completion for drug court.
24	1999 and 1995, again for possession of
25	controlled substance, where he was given probation.

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1	The applicant was he listed all the arrests.
2	He stated that he was an addict and he's gotten help to
3	move on from that. He also comes with recommendations
4	from employers that, you know, want to have him work for
5	them. And he was very perfunct with everything,
6	provided everything we needed.
7	We knew going into this that because it was a
8	felony, that we'd have to bring him before the Board.
9	And I've seen, everything that I've seen shows me that
10	he is working to make everything better.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Was the
12	recommendation from any security organizations?
13	MR. SALADINO: No, it was from a wrecking yard.
14	MR. EWING: I have
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I believe.
16	MR. EWING: No, I got one. Okay.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, go ahead. It's
18	your time.
19	MR. EWING: I have one with me. They run a
20	yard with another company. And I have recommendations,
21	also, from that company, also.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
23	MR. EWING: About my character, you know.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll take you at your
25	word.

But I'll -- I seconded the motion, and I'm 6 7 supporting the motion because of the recency. Mr. Ewing, I think, you're doing a great job in 8 trying to get things clean and that. I support that. I 9 give you all the credit in the world for doing that. 10 But I just -- the recency of this, in this industry, I'm 11 really struggling with that. So it's not a reflection 12 13 on what you're doing. It's a reflection on what you did. 14 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I would concur. 15 And I would encourage you to come back after a year. 16 MR. EWING: All right. 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 18 I have a second. All in favor of the motion? 19 20 (Board members said "aye.") 21 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anybody opposed? Motion carried. Thank you. 22 Florence Kendall, number 43, applied for 23 registration and was denied. Ms. Kendall's appealing 24 the decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. For 2.5

possible action. 1 2 Good morning. MS. KENDALL: Hi. 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Or good afternoon. 4 MS. KENDALL: Good evening. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Evening's good, 6 7 too. MS. KENDALL: That's okay. 8 MR. KANDT: Ready, ready to go. Thank you. 9 MS. KENDALL: You're welcome. 10 MR. KANDT: Would you state your name for the 11 record. 12 13 MS. KENDALL: My name is Florence Kendall. MR. KANDT: Okay. And do you swear under 14 15 penalty of perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 16 MS. KENDALL: Yes, I do. 17 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ma'am, please 19 20 have a seat. All right. Tell us why you're here. 21 MS. KENDALL: My guard card was taken from me. But I moved here from California, and I had my guard 22 card from California, in 2007. I worked five years, and 23 we got laid off when the economy dropped. And so I went 24 back home to take care of my brother and sister. 2.5

They're very sick. And now I'm back out here again. 1 And they took my guard card from me. But I did put it 2 on my application. 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We appreciate that. 4 MS. KENDALL: I did do that. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I know it's 6 7 quite a long time ago. MS. KENDALL: It was, yeah, 30 some years. 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I don't think it's 30, 9 is it? 10 MS. KENDALL: Yes. My daughter's 32. 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What was the deal with 12 13 the gun? MS. KENDALL: My son -- my two kids' father had 14 15 been jumping on me, raping me, beating me up, ripping out my heart. That when, at one point, I got tired of 16 it. He sprayed me with mace in my face. I ended up in 17 the hospital. And I just got fed up with it. He ended 18 up going to jail when the guy said he will kill me. 19 20 So I made a promise to my kids I wouldn't let 21 him hurt them or me, I would be here for them. And my kids are doing good. I have two truckdrivers and two 22 nurses now. 23 So that's the reason I had my gun, because I 24 2.5 was afraid for my life, and I thought he was going to

try to kill me. 1 2 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You've been in 3 no trouble since? MS. KENDALL: Huh-uh (negative). 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 5 Okay. MS. KENDALL: No. 6 7 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Which investigator has this? 8 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anything to add? 10 MR. SALADINO: It was 1989. And it was listed 11 on the application. It was a misdemeanor, possessing or 12 13 carrying a firearm in public, one year probation. And, like I said, it was disclosed. 14 15 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Anything else, ma'am? 16 MS. KENDALL: (Shaking head.) 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Comments or questions 18 from the Board? 19 20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No. 21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment on 22 this case or this agenda item? 23 Okay. I'll call for a motion. 24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? 25

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
2	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would move that
3	Florence Kendall be granted that the registration
4	denial be reversed and she be issued her registration
5	card.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
7	Do I have a second?
8	MS. KENDALL: Second.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any further discussion
10	from the Board?
11	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll call for a vote.
13	All in yes?
14	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm sorry. Just explain
15	the motion, because I want it to be on the record.
16	Fine?
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: This is so long ago. And
19	there have been no arrests. She did disclose.
20	Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chair.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And it also sounds like
22	you've been an outstanding mom.
23	MS. KENDALL: Thank you.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
25	We've got a motion. We got a second. All in favor?

1	(Board members said "aye.")
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
3	Motion carries. Congratulations.
4	MS. KENDALL: Thank you.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 44, Edward
6	Hickman applied for registration, was denied.
7	Mr. Hickman is appealing the decision to the Board
8	pursuant to NRS 648. For possible action.
9	Mr. Hickman?
10	Is Mr. Hickman up north?
11	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is anybody up north?
13	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
14	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.
15	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman?
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
17	MR. INGRAM: For the record, Mr. Hickman was
18	notified, failed to respond to any notices that he would
19	be attending today. He was notified by phone, email and
20	certified letter.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
22	MR. INGRAM: He was instructed to be here at
23	10:00 a.m.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: If there's no
25	objections from the Board, I'd like it trail it anyway.

We'll call him one more time. 1 2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I don't need a motion 3 for that, do I, counsel? 4 MR. KANDT: 5 No. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 45, Lucien Micah 6 7 Love applied for registration, was denied. Mr. Love is appealing the decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. 8 For possible action. 9 MR. KANDT: Mr. Micah, state your name for the 10 11 record. MR. LOVE: Lucien Micah Love, sir. 12 13 MR. KANDT: And do you swear under penalty of 14 perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 15 MR. LOVE: Yes, sir. 16 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Have a seat, 17 sir. 18 MR. LOVE: All right. First of all, I would 19 20 like to apologize to you guys for not disclosing my 21 record. The reason why I didn't disclose what was on my record was because I was under the impression that after 22 seven years, it doesn't show up. 23 I haven't been in trouble since that, that 24 I'm a new father. I'm here to take care of my 2.5 time.

1	family. I applied for a guard card. I'm a good
2	citizen. Right now, I work at a temporary agency just
3	doing little pick-up jobs. I have two brand-new
4	children that I need to take care of.
5	And, like I said, I wasn't trying to hide
6	nothing off my record. I just didn't disclose it,
7	because I was told that there was a statute of
8	limitations and that the stuff wouldn't show up. So I
9	do apologize for not disclosing it.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You've got a few
11	things here. Let's talk about the gun charges.
12	MR. LOVE: Okay. The gun charge, there's only
13	one gun charge, sir. The gun charge was I was walking
14	my dog. The gun was registered to me. I'm ex-military.
15	I went to the store, I bought my gun. I was walking my
16	dog. I used to live in Lancaster, California. It was
17	late night. I walk my dogs at night. And I had my
18	pistol on me.
19	The police approached me because someone had
20	pulled a gun on some people around the corner. It was a
21	party or something. And they approached me and my
22	buddy. Both were, were packing. It was both legal
23	guns. I disclosed that I had my gun. I went to jail
24	for one night. They sentenced me to 30 days. I did one
25	day off of that. And that was it. That was in 2003.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Who's the
2	investigator on this one?
3	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Anything you
5	want to add?
6	MR. SALADINO: No, there was the 2004 carrying
7	a loaded firearm in public. 2004 again, April. One was
8	March, one was April, the same one. In August 2005,
9	another carrying a concealed firearm in public.
10	December of 2005
11	MR. LOVE: Mr. Saladino, excuse me. I'm sorry.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Let him finish.
13	MR. LOVE: Oh, okay.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I'll give you all
15	the time you need.
16	MR. LOVE: All right.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
18	MR. SALADINO: April of 2016, there was a
19	possession of marijuana for sale. Marijuana possession,
20	or for sale in California is a felony. I wasn't
21	provided any court documents to the contrary.
22	2007, another loaded firearm.
23	2008, there was a possession of marijuana for
24	sale, but there was no disposition, per the
25	fingerprints.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
2	MR. LOVE: There was one, there was only one
3	case with a possession of a gun. I've never, ever been
4	caught with another gun before. That gun was mine. I
5	don't know why those other things are popping up like
6	that. I did get caught with marijuana. I had a lot of
7	marijuana with me in two thousand and that was six.
8	Yeah, that was 2006.
9	It's been over 10 years. I've cleaned my life
10	up. And like I said, the reason why I didn't disclose
11	it is because I thought that I was told by another
12	security guard that if you didn't, that it's been so
13	many years, that the stuff wouldn't pop up. That's the
14	only reason why. I'm not trying to hide my record.
15	When I was 21 or 23, I got caught with a bunch
16	of marijuana. And I got caught with my gun. I never
17	hurt anybody. I'm not if you look, I have no
18	violence on my record or nothing. And that's the only
19	reason I didn't disclose, because. And it's a new
20	state, also. So, you know, I'm under the impression
21	that I'm a brand-new citizen here. And that stuff was
22	old. I'm no longer on probation. I don't do drugs. I
23	don't do anything. I'm just here to take care of my
24	children, sir.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions

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1	from the Board, or comments?
2	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Sure. Mr. Chair?
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
4	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.
5	When was the last time you were arrested?
6	MR. LOVE: 2009 or 2006. It was like two
7	thousand it's been 10 years, sir.
8	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And then carrying a
9	loaded firearm in public in September of 2007.
10	MR. LOVE: No, sir. That's not me, sir. I
11	only got caught with a gun one time, and it was my gun,
12	sir.
13	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Well, apparently, this is
14	on your record.
15	MR. LOVE: Maybe it's a probation thing, a
16	violation. Because I don't know why it's in my record.
17	It only happened one time, though. The arrest, the
18	arrest for ecstasy was Lancaster, California, Lancaster
19	Sheriff's Department. And that was it. I mean I don't
20	know why those extra things are on my record. I really
21	don't.
22	The two things I do admit to is being caught
23	with the marijuana, and I got caught with my gun in 2003
24	or '4. And that's it.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I understand. Okay.

1	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mr. Saladino, there
2	appear to be five charges.
3	MR. LOVE: It's the same thing.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: So is it possible
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Let the investigator
6	answer, and then I'll let you. You can ask all the
7	questions you want and have all the time that you want.
8	MR. SALADINO: Recently, I have inquired on the
9	fingerprint reports of why stuff comes up multiple
10	times. And from what I gather, it comes down to the
11	court dates. If they have court dates pending or if
12	they're on probation, it'll show up again on their
13	fingerprint report if they're, you know, subsequently
14	arrested again, or for questions.
15	The one in 2007, it was September,
16	September 1st, 2007, it was one count carrying a loaded
17	firearm in a public place and one count of driving
18	without a license. The disposition of it, the loaded
19	firearm isn't there in the disposition. And then
20	there's no disposition available for the driving without
21	a license. And it shows that it went to a warrant.
22	That's how the fingerprint report reads.
23	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: So it is possible that
24	it could be one?
25	MR. SALADINO: It's possible it could be one,

1	and it's a continuation of the probation, that, you
2	know, when you get stopped, it just comes up again in
3	that.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
5	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Thank you.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you understand?
7	MR. LOVE: Yes, sir.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I mean that, what the
9	investigator is saying?
10	MR. LOVE: Yeah, that makes sense. That makes
11	a lot of sense.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
13	MR. LOVE: Because I only got caught with a gun
14	one time.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
16	MR. LOVE: And it was my gun. I wasn't pulling
17	it on anybody or nothing. The police came to me while I
18	was walking my dog and asked, needed to put my dog in
19	the thing, and I told him, he asked me if I had a
20	weapon, and I said, "Yes, I do."
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So you're aware
22	that's on your record?
23	MR. LOVE: Yes, sir. Yes, I do.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're aware you need
25	to disclose it in the future?

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1	MR. LOVE: Yes, sir. Yes, sir. Yes, sir.
2	Yes, sir.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
4	comments from the Board?
5	MR. LOVE: Oh, I do have one more thing to say.
6	As far as like the lady said earlier, with the housing
7	stuff, when I apply for my apartments and stuff and the
8	house that I live in now, you know, they do the
9	background check, and none of that stuff pops up. I had
10	a contact with the police. None of it popped up. And
11	that's why I didn't disclose it, because I thought it
12	was off my record after so long, after seven years. So
13	that's why I didn't disclose it. Otherwise, I would
14	have put it on there.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any
16	public comment on this particular item?
17	Okay. Seeing none
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: call for a motion.
20	Yes.
21	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm concerned about all
22	the number of things that have popped up here, whether
23	or not they're duplicate charges, just different court
24	dates, or whatever. If there's a motion, and it
25	sustains the denial, then Mr. Love won't be able to

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1	reapply for a year.
2	If for some reason we were able to get some of
3	this clarified and was to be able to be brought back
4	with this appeal at our next meeting, next scheduled,
5	next Board meeting, not the appeals hearing next week,
6	but then there would only be a three-month delay rather
7	than a year delay.
8	I don't know if there's any appetite among the
9	commissioners for delaying this to get that cleaned up.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, yeah, there's an
11	appetite here, with me.
12	What the commissioner go on.
13	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: It could seem to me
14	that I don't know. I don't know what the protocol is
15	here or the administrative law as far as whose onus it
16	is to delay it, whether it's his or ours. If we have
17	the ability to delay it, then I'd make that motion. But
18	if we don't, then the onus is upon him to ask for a
19	delay for clarification of the record.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, what we've done
21	in the past, and any of you can correct me if I'm a
22	little off, is we've explained to the applicant what
23	we're trying to do and let them know that they're the
24	only ones that can ask for a delay.
25	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Correct, that's what my

2ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And then we make a3motion based on the applicant's approval or disapproval4of the delay. So.5BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Based on6ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.7BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: My position right now is8if this isn't clarified, then I have to go with what the9record says and make my make up my decision based on10that. But if we are able to if Mr. Love was able to11come back and show us that these were multiple counts of12the same thing, then it may change our or my13interpretation of where to go.14ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Love, we're,15basically, leaning towards what you're saying.16MR. LOVE: Okay.17ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I'm not here to say18that the government documents are always correct. So19either work with staff or work with the counsel that you20had at the time. Let's get this cleared up, with the21onus being on you. And if you would ask for a delay, to22give you time to work on this, the Board is apt to give23you the delay.24MR. KANDT: Mr. Chairman, if I may?25ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.	1	recollection is.
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25 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.	24	MR. KANDT: Mr. Chairman, if I may?
	25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

MR. KANDT: Make sure it's framed properly. 1 2 You would ask, you would ask the applicant for a 3 continuance of this appeal. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okav. 4 MR. KANDT: They could stipulate to a 5 continuance. And then you, as a Board, give the 6 7 applicant the time to stipulate to a continuance, and then take action to continue the matter. That's the way 8 I would recommend you proceed. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to 10 change my wording from delay to continuance, to give you 11 time to work on this. 12 13 MR. LOVE: Okay. 25	name for the record.

Mary Elaine Rains. 1 MS. RAINS: MR. KANDT: Thank you. And do you swear under 2 3 penalty of perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 4 MS. RAINS: Yes, I do. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Why are you 6 7 here? MS. RAINS: I'm here to appeal my record. 8 I didn't -- I disclosed it. I didn't know that it was a 9 felony trespass from 1999. I thought it was a 10 misdemeanor. That's what I was told, and that's what 11 I've always thought. 12 13 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: But you did disclose it? 14 15 MS. RAINS: Yes. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So don't worry 16 about that part. 17 MS. RAINS: Okay. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Who's the 19 20 investigator? 21 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us what you 22 know about it. 23 MR. BATCHELOR: Like it says there in the 24 report, she has that one conviction from 1999 that was a 25

1	felony burglary conviction. And as she as it states
2	in there, she did complete a diversion program. And it
3	was has since then been dismissed. And as she
4	stated, she did disclose that on her application.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us about
6	that event, please.
7	MS. RAINS: My friend and I had broken up. And
8	I went to get my things. And I had given him these
9	candlesticks. And he went and threw one at the wall.
10	So I went to throw one at the wall, and he ran at me,
11	and I accidentally hit him in the head. And I did it,
12	and I can't change it.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I understand
14	that.
15	MS. RAINS: And I went through, I pled guilty.
16	He didn't press charges. And I went through diversion,
17	and I finished early, actually a half a year early. And
18	it's it changes in me.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We appreciate
20	your forthrightness. What are you doing now?
21	MS. RAINS: I am a staff accountant.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: A what?
23	MS. RAINS: A staff accountant.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
25	MS. RAINS: I was a claims adjustor at the

1 time. 2 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other 3 questions from the Board? BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No. 4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment? 6 All right. I'll entertain a motion. 7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that 8 Mary Rains' denial be overturned and she be issued a 9 card. 10 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I got a second. All those in favor of 1 motion. overturning, say "aye." 2 (Board members said "aye.") 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed? 4 Motion approved. 5 MS. RAINS: Thank you. 6 7 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're welcome. Now 8 you can go. MS. RAINS: Okay. Thank you. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Didn't want you to miss 10 11 the good part. All right. Number 48, Joanna Calhoun applied 12 13 for registration, was denied. Ms. Calhoun is appealing the decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. For 14 15 possible action. MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, for the record, she 16 was adequately notified. We left telephone messages, 17 email, certified mail. The certified mail came back 18 undeliverable, with no forwarding address. 19 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. If no one 21 objects, I'd like to trail this, also, to give the person the benefit of doubt. Rains trailed. 22 Where are we? 23 MR. INGRAM: 49. 24 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 49, Danny Elliott 2.5

applied for registration, was denied. Mr. Elliott is 1 appealing the decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. 2 For possible action. 3 Okav. Again, I'd like to trail this to the 4 end. 5 Number 50, Jeffrey Lowe applied for 6 7 registration. MR. LOWE: May I ask the court if my -- the 8 owner of my company can come up with me? 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Of course. 10 MR. LOWER: And, just for the record, his 11 name's Rodney Longberger. 12 13 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I got to read this into the record. But bring him up in the meantime. 14 15 Jeffrey Lowe applied for registration, was denied. Mr. Lowe is appealing the decision to the Board 16 pursuant to NRS 648. For possible action. 17 We got to get you guys sworn in. And then you 18 can tell me what's up. 19 20 MR. KANDT: Mr. Lowe, state your name for the 21 record. MR. LOWE: My name Is Jeffrey Lowe. 22 MR. KANDT: Raise your right hand. Do you 23 swear under penalty of perjury to tell the truth, the 24 2.5 whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

1	MR. LOWE: Yes, sir, I do.
2	MR. KANDT: Okay. Thank you.
3	Would you also state your name for the record?
4	MR. LONGBERGER: Rodney Longberger.
5	MR. KANDT: And raise your right hand. And do
6	you swear under penalty of perjury to tell the truth,
7	the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?
8	MR. LONGBERGER: Yes, sir.
9	MR. KANDT: Thank you.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Now tell us
11	what's going on.
12	MR. LOWE: Okay. So earlier this year, I was
13	asked to come up on behalf of my company. We have three
14	different offices. Two of them are in Arizona, one in
15	Kingman, one in Gilbert. And we also have a Las Vegas
16	office. We had a lull in employment out here due to,
17	you know, individuals that, you know, couldn't stay with
18	the company and stuff like this. So they asked me to
19	come up and observe and to come up and obtain my state
20	license so that I can come up and help out. We need it.
21	I kind of did it on a whim. So when I was
22	asked to go, I came to the office, the PILB office, at a
23	later hour in the evening, right before they were
24	getting ready to close. They said that, huh-uh
25	(negative). I believe, I went before the June Board

hearing. The only way I could get into that is if I,
you know, I put all the paperwork and then pay my fee,
got my fingerprint card, and then got the paperwork in
before they closed that day.
So I did, and I did. I got all the information
down the best I could. I didn't know what I was getting
into, as far as like, you know, what information I
needed. I had no paperwork with me. It was all off the
top of my head.
There was a failure to disclose on one charge,
and another arrest that got dismissed. All the other
charges, I did disclose. And if you want, we'll talk
about them.
ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And now you can
explain why you're here.
MR. LOWE: I'm sorry?
ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Who did you bring with
you?
MR. LOWE: Oh, sorry. I work for Bulldog
Recovery in the Kingman, Arizona and Gilbert, Arizona
and, also, out of Las Vegas, Arizona, or Las Vegas,
Nevada. This is the owner of our Kingman office, who I
work under. And we cover all of northern Arizona, from
Fort Mohave, Golden Valley, Bullhead City, Kingman, Lake
Havasu, all the way over to the New Mexico border.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You've got some
2	things on your record you want to talk about?
3	MR. LOWE: Yes.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
5	MR. LOWE: Back in '98, you know, I had a bunch
6	of friends, you know, and, I guess, you know, a lot of
7	people look at as undesirable and stuff like this. One
8	of my buddies, apparently, had stolen a vehicle. He
9	said, you know, "You want to go ahead and take the
10	vehicle to get home," and everything else. I said,
11	"Yes." And I took the vehicle, held onto it for a
12	couple days. And I got arrested by RFPD. And they got
13	me for grand theft auto, theft of an auto, theft of an
14	auto and then two counts of receiving stolen property,
15	which were those personals that were in the vehicle.
16	And I went before the court. You know, I had
17	to face my time, you know. And I admit it. You know,
18	it was a stupid decision, you know. I didn't personally
19	steal the vehicle myself, but I was in possession of it,
20	you know. And California likes to stack charges, and
21	they put four felonies on me at the time.
22	You know, I did disclose this. And I did talk
23	about it at the last, well, not the last one, but the
24	previous Board meeting before that, and we decided to
25	delay everything.

1	I had a few domestic violences. My previous
2	ex-wife, you know, she was 14 years my senior, you know,
3	heavy into drugs. I was trying to clean up my life and
4	move forward, you know, and grow. I became a union iron
5	worker down in San Diego, California. And I bounced
6	back and forth between Local 416, L.A., and Local
7	Local the local down in San Diego. And she held me
8	back, you know, and I let her influence me, you know.
9	And when work got slow, you know, we started to argue,
10	you know.
11	And in this day and age, you know, post O.J. in
12	California, the domestic violence laws, you know, became
13	very, very strict, you know. And, you know, I'm not
14	going to say I was an angel. I'm not going to say that
15	I ever laid a hand on her, because I didn't. You know,
16	but the way they interpret the laws in the state of
17	California, you know, they are very strict with them.
18	You know, so if there's any, you know, he said, she said
19	type of thing, you know, an individual, you know, has to
20	deal with it, you know.
21	And I did. I owned it. You know, I owned it.
22	You know, I may have raised my voice. I may have come
23	across good character unbecoming of a male, you know. I
24	may have, you know, kind of went towards her like this,
25	or something, you know, to put fear in her, and stuff

1	like this.
2	My dad didn't teach me that. You know, I since
3	learned the error of my way, you know. And I'm in a
4	beautiful relationship with a woman that I love, you
5	know. Which is not the same person, by the way, you
6	know. And, you know, so I mean, you know, I learned
7	about that, you know.
8	I think, it was Mr. Easton, he, you know, had
9	stated that I didn't disclose a charge for a
10	switchblade. I do not recall the date on this. I
11	acquired it. I remember the switchblade. I do.
12	Because I got it at the Orange County Swat Meet when I
13	was in sixth grade. You know, it was for sale. I
14	bought it. I thought it was cool. I kept it. And, you
15	know, I'd always stayed at the house. And one day, I
16	was stopped by a police officer. He asked me if I had
17	anything. I said, "I got a switchblade in my pocket."
18	Took it. Put me in jail for it, you know.
19	There was also an arrest that wasn't disclosed.
20	It was in California, the City of Huntington Beach. It
21	was dismissed. It was for, I think, destruction of
22	property, I believe, if I recall right. And me and my
23	current wife, we were dating at the time. And there was
24	still some, you know, some tension over my last, my last
25	wife. And I walked away. I walked way from her. And I

1	was walking through the parking lot. I was carrying a
2	Sierra Mist bottle. And she kept following me. And I
3	said, "Please, just, you know, let me go. You know, let
4	me, let me go cool off." You know, and she kept
5	following me. I turned around and faced away from her.
6	And I had a Sierra Mist bottle in my hand. I threw it.
7	It hit the ground, bounced, broke out the back window of
8	a Toyota Sienna.
9	I immediately went into Target, and I talked to
10	the security guard on duty, I said, "Can you please find
11	this individual. I need to go ahead and tell them that
12	I broke out the back window of their vehicle, and I want
13	to pay for it."
14	And they didn't. The security department
15	called, called the Huntington Beach P.D. They came out.
16	And they see, they see paper, they see everything on the
17	computer, and they hear everything over the radio. They
18	automatically, you know, start, you know, coaching the
19	individuals, if you will, you know.
20	And I'm not going to lie. I had a colorful
21	past, you know. I mean it's nothing for me to be proud
22	of, you know. But I deserve my day in court. Or I at
23	least deserve to have the one-on-one with the individual
24	who, you know, sustained the damage that I caused, you
25	know, to be able to work it out with them, instead of

1	something with the law, you know.
2	And they charged me with felony destruction,
3	you know, and that got dropped down to a misdemeanor
4	during court, and it got dismissed thereafter, after
5	going to my day in court.
6	So. And if there's anything else, you know,
7	I'm more than willing to answer any one of your
8	questions.
9	You know, I don't believe that, you know,
10	papers from my past should, you know, should stop me
11	from my personal growth. I've done well over the past
12	years. I moved to Arizona. You know, we own our own
13	home, 22 square foot house, we got a mortgage. You
14	know, I got two beautiful daughters, my stepdaughters,
15	who I treat like my own. They're 19 and 22.
16	And I work for a wonderful boss. I've been
17	with this company for a year now, come the 28th of this
18	month. And I want my, my growth to help his growth.
19	And because we're a team, we do this together, you know.
20	And we're not only helping us, we're helping the other
21	one over down in Gilbert and the Las Vegas office as
22	well. And if I can help out in this region, you know, I
23	want to do it.
24	You know, I've done over 550 repossessions in
25	the state of Arizona this year, by myself. You know, I

1	came across some pretty hairy situations. It's a right
2	to carry state, you know. And some individuals feel,
3	you know, they bestow their right on you, you know, when
4	you're trying to reclaim banks' property, you know.
5	I'm just asking for a chance, you know. And,
6	you know, we do service a subdivision of that area,
7	which is or a subdivision of Las Vegas, which is
8	Laughlin, Nevada. And right now, I can't do that. I
9	live, I live in Kingman, Arizona. I rent a place in
10	Bullhead City. We have to send our Kingman agent, who's
11	licensed in the state of Nevada. All right. So he has
12	to. I rent the place in Bullhead specifically to
13	service Bullhead, Fort Mohave, Mohave Valley. All
14	right. And I can't service, I can't service Laughlin
15	across the bridge, you know, a few miles away from me.
16	So we have to put another truck out there with our
17	driver from Kingman, who is licensed, to come out and
18	service the Laughlin area.
19	And that is you know, I understand your
20	guys' position. But, you know, for our growth as a
21	company, it hurts.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The
23	investigator?
24	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor. And I
25	have nothing further to comment. What he said was

correct, as far as charges, convictions. 1 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any 2 3 questions or comments from the Board? BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, Mr. Chair. 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. 5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: What were of the dates 6 7 of the domestic violence? MR. BATCHELOR: What was the dates of what? 8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: When was the arrest for 9 domestic violence? 10 MR. BATCHELOR: In 2002, he was convicted of 11 domestic violence. And, also, in 2004 as well. Those 12 13 years, he was convicted of domestic violence. 14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Thank you. 15 MR. BATCHELOR: He did list one of them. BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Thank you. 16 I have no further. 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions of 18 the Board? 19 20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No, I have nothing 21 further. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any public 22 comment? 23 24 He brought you up to the table. We might as 2.5 well get you involved, huh?

1	MR. LONGBERGER: Yep.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Anything
3	you'd like to add? Would you identify yourself for the
4	record.
5	MR. LONGBERGER: I'm Rodney Longberger. I am
6	part owner of Bulldog Recovery. And what he said was
7	correct. He's worked for me for coming up on a year
8	now. He's well done over five, six hundred
9	repossessions in the state of Arizona.
10	I've never had any complaints with him, as far
11	as going to people's homes, collecting the collateral.
12	Obviously, everybody knows that that can be a touchy
13	situation, repossessing a vehicle. Never had an
14	incident where we've had to have enforcement involved
15	with him in a home. Never had an instance where I've
16	had a debtor or anybody call and state that he's done
17	damage or got verbally violent or anything with them.
18	I've had no issues with Jeff being an employee
19	of mine for a year. And I'm happy to have him on the
20	team. And to be honest, if I could clone the guy, it
21	would be amazing, and I'd grow even more.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
23	MR. LONGBERGER: You're welcome.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll call for a motion.
25	I call for a motion a second time.

1	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
2	the denial for Jeffrey Lowe be upheld at this time.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
4	Do I have a second?
5	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a second. Any
7	further discussion from the Board?
8	Okay. I'll call for a vote. All those in
9	favor of the motion?
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any denials?
12	The motion carried. Sorry, sir.
13	MR. LOWE: But we could have your place.
14	MR. LONGBERGER: Thank you.
15	MR. LOWE: Thank you very much. Have a good
16	day, folks.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 51,
18	Lindsey
19	MS. MUSICANT: Musicant.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Musicant. Thank you.
21	Applied for registration, was denied.
22	Ms. Musicant is appealing the decision to the Board
23	pursuant to NRS 648. For possible action.
24	Please be sworn in.
25	MR. KANDT: Would you identify yourself for the

1	record.
2	MS. MUSICANT: My name is Lindsay Musicant.
3	MR. KANDT: Do you swear under penalty of
4	perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing
5	but the truth?
6	MS. MUSICANT: I do.
7	MR. KANDT: Thank you.
8	MS. MUSICANT: I'm here for my guard card or
9	test or PILB card for to be a security guard. I know
10	I forgot to disclose some of my information. But I'll
11	be honest. I'm a stupid child back when I was 11. I've
12	been on the street since I was 23. So I just barely got
13	my life back together. I'm 24 years old. So now I've
14	been in AA. And I'm currently working for a servant
15	place and for maids. So I do two jobs. I'm balancing
16	them both.
17	Most of my charges are all prostitution. I
18	know I have one drug charge. I don't know. I don't
19	even know how to argue with prostitution, because people
20	all frown upon it. It's probably horrible. But I
21	didn't have a choice. I had to learn to live. So I'm
22	not going to whatever. I just want to be a guard. I
23	like doing security. I actually love being a security
24	officer. So I found something I'm good at, and I'm
25	going to fight for it, I guess.

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Where have you been a
2	security officer?
3	MS. MUSICANT: Securitas in 2004. Oh, my gosh.
4	Fremont Security downtown. I worked, I guess, with
5	Metro as well. And most of the officers know me, and
6	they laugh because of my background. But those are the
7	two main I worked for a lot. So back and forth for a
8	couple of years on both of them.
9	I was just actually James, right? He called
10	me right when I was getting hired on my birthday, and
11	they denied me, and he told me I can't work there this
12	year. So. I was going to get rehired at Trion. So he
13	told me to come back, if I get my guard card, and I
14	could get hired right away.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anything else?
16	MS. MUSICANT: No, just messed up kid trying to
17	do better.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Does the investigator
19	have anything to add?
20	MR. BATCHELOR: Nothing more than what's on the
21	sheet. She did list all most of her stuff. She
22	stated she had multiple prostitution arrests and
23	convictions. And a lot of dispositions were not
24	available on the fingerprint report. But she did list
25	most of those on there.

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1	MS. MUSICANT: You can ask me any date, and I
2	can probably memorize it most of the time. And anything
3	past 18, I can't really remember, so.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I can only speak for
5	myself. With that many, if you forgot a couple
6	MS. MUSICANT: Yeah.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I can understand it.
8	MS. MUSICANT: I just know it's habitual
9	prostitution. That's all it was.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
11	questions or comments from the Board?
12	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None here.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment on
14	this particular case?
15	Okay. I'll call for a motion.
16	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that the
19	registration, the denial be reversed and that Lindsay
20	Musicant be issued her registration card. And if
21	there's a second, I'll explain my motion.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a
23	motion. Do we have a second?
24	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
25	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Go ahead.

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1	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
2	Again, these are all misdemeanors. She
3	included them in her application. Obviously, there's a
4	lot there. But, I think, I think, we're moving forward.
5	And, again, that's my justification.
6	MS. MUSICANT: Thank you.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a
8	motion. We have a second. Any other discussion from
9	the Board?
10	All right. I'll call for a vote. All in
11	favor?
12	(Board members said "aye.")
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
14	Motion carried. Congratulations.
15	MS. MUSICANT: I want to give you a hug really.
16	Thank you. Have a good day.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You too, ma'am.
18	How's our stenographer doing?
19	(The Reporter indicated that she's doing well
20	and we can keep going.)
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I believe,
22	we're up to number 53. Juan Frias applied for
23	registration, was denied. Mr. Fries is appealing the
24	decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. For possible
25	action.

1	Are you here, sir?
2	All right. I'm going to trail this one, also.
3	I apologize if I mess up the last name on this
4	one. Number 54, Mark Mosqueda.
5	MR. MOSQUEDA: Sure, Mosqueda.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mosqueda. Applied for
7	registration, was denied. Mr. Mosqueda is appealing the
8	decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. For possible
9	action.
10	We need to get you sworn in, sir.
11	MR. MOSQUEDA: Sure.
12	MR. KANDT: Mr. Mosqueda, could you identify
13	yourself for the record, raise your right hand.
14	MR. MOSQUEDA: Yes. My name is Mark Mosqueda.
15	MR. KANDT: If you'd raise your right hand.
16	Under penalty of perjury, do you swear to tell the
17	truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?
18	MR. MOSQUEDA: I do.
19	MR. KANDT: Thank you.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Have a seat.
21	MR. MOSQUEDA: Thank you.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tell us why you're
23	here.
24	MR. MOSQUEDA: I'm here because I applied
25	for in California, we call them guard cards. But you

call them PLB cards here. I'm still learning that. 1 So I'm here to apply to work here in Nevada. I do have a 2 current guard card. 3 I did bring supporting documents. I was not 4 aware that I was supposed to email them or give them to 5 the person here that needed to have them on file. So I 6 7 don't know if I'll be able to present these documents to you to for -- to support my case here. 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are they, they're 9 letters of reference? 10 MR. MOSQUEDA: References. Also, when I moved 11 to Nevada. And you guys can go ahead and keep them. 12 13 These are just copies of everything. That's my guard card. Also, certification for my college years. 14 A little, brief history on me. I've had my 15 quard card in California since 1990. I've worked in 16 numerous positions as a security officer, security 17 quard, slash, bouncer. From hospitals, warehouses, you 18 name it in between, it's all -- security work is a vast 19 20 amount of work out there. 21 My last job as a security officer, I was working at Mount Sierra College, which is a technical 22 college, very secured down. We had key access in there. 23 So it's really high-profile students, because we had 24 overseas students from Asia coming in there. So they're 2.5

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1	really high-profile.
2	Previous to that job, I was at my previous job
3	for 10 years as a substance abuse counselor. I worked
4	with dual diagnosis patients that had mental issues as
5	well as substance abuse issues, which was very
6	challenging. It was a very small company, nonprofit.
7	As you're aware, the State of California is going
8	through and still is in budget crisis. And they cut the
9	budget for that program. It was a nonprofit program.
10	So the last person to get hired was me, in that 10-year
11	span, so I was the first one to be let go.
12	So that's just the way it goes. And I try to
13	go back out there in the field. A little challenging,
14	different things out there, but I said, let me try a new
15	turn in life. Because being from California, we come
16	out, this is our ticket home, in California. I love
17	Las Vegas. We come, I come here with my wife quite
18	often, we can get away, and so forth.
19	Being in the substance abuse field, I have my
20	documents here to prove that I well, I will pull them
21	out for you. I'm certified as a chemical dependency
22	counselor. I graduated from East L.A. College in 2005.
23	This is you have to get state-certified from
24	California to be able to work in the field. At the
25	time, it is expired, because the cost is almost \$500 to

1 get it. So right now, all I have to do to renew it is 2 do my continuing education classes, and I will get them. 3 Pay the fees, obviously.

But I made a decision to come out here to 4 Las Vegas and give this a chance, in this field, because 5 there is a lot. When I come out to Vegas, every time, 6 7 especially in the hot days, or even now in the cold, people out there in the street. And most, most of them, 8 I have a compassion and a drive to help people that most 9 average people in this world just pass them by. Hey, 10 how about nickel or a dollar. They're begging for 11 change. I reach out to people and try to, you know, 12 13 give them a strength of hope that there is a way out of -- out of addiction. 14

And so here in Vegas, addiction is so rampant and out of control here. You just can walk down the street right now, and you'll see somebody here.

So I'm here because of that. But in the meantime, I need to get state-certified here and do some educational requirements to get certified in the state of Nevada. So in the meantime, with my guard experience in California, I would like to work as security to be able to support myself in the meantime.

24 I am -- I do have properties in California. I 25 have three properties in California. They're

investments properties right now. So that's how I'm 1 making it right now. But that money was supposed to be 2 put for retirement, because I don't think Social 3 Security's going to be here when I'm ready to retire. 4 So I've been living off that. But I want to get back 5 into the work field as far as supporting myself, working 6 7 at what I know how to do. And one of my jobs is 8 security.

And I was denied for my guard -- I keep saying 9 quard card. Sorry about that. When I applied, I 10 disclosed all my information. I was 100 percent honest 11 on everything. And so, in the meantime, while I get my 12 13 accreditations from the State of Nevada, I need to work. And working, for me, is doing security. So I'm a great 14 15 security quard. I'm customer service. I have, you know, a lot to offer professionally in my substance 16 abuse field. That is my main drive. 17

That is the main thing. When I'm here in 18 Vegas, I want to make a difference. I already looked 19 20 into the Catholic charities, that I have my spiritual 21 belief. I am a Catholic, rooted real deep in my spiritual belief. And I checked in there to do some 22 volunteer work that needs to get some networking done. 23 I can't work and get paid for it. But when you help 24 people that are strung out on narcotics, alcohol -- and 2.5

don't forget the other one, what's here, gambling. 1 That's a big one. And one more, and, I guess, I'll stop 2 of that, women or men. It's an addiction. It really 3 is. 4 And so, in the meantime, I need to get a job 5 and start working again. Because I'm using my 6 7 retirement money from my investments properties in California to live. I've been here since June 11th. 8 Ι came out here for one week, and I didn't leave. So I'm 9 trying to make a life here. I do have a -- I'm renting 10 a house here right now, with me and my wife and our 11 three dogs. We have three dogs, no children. 12 13 And so, at this time, I really would appreciate a chance. Because I am going to make a difference here 14 15 in Nevada. I will. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 16 MR. MOSQUEDA: And I just told all the 17 information on my application, as the investigator may 18 go ahead and disclose that right now, at this time. 19 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Well, we're 21 here because of the arrests. I mean I --MR. MOSQUEDA: Yes, sir. 22 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- think a lot of what 23 you want to do, and work with people and substance 24 2.5 abuse, that's a noble cause. But let's talk about your

1	arrests.
2	MR. MOSQUEDA: Yes, sir.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what can you tell
4	us, the background? Because there's several of them
5	here.
6	MR. MOSQUEDA: Yes, sir. Okay. The one was
7	the one disclosed, for the last one, was the checks. At
8	that time, me and a friend were in we had our
9	landscaping, landscaping business going. And it was
10	going through decent. I tried to, you know, try our own
11	little side business. Apparently, this guy we had a
12	couple accounts. And this guy was breaking into homes
13	and getting, you know, checks. Turned around, and he
14	said he said, "Oh, these were from the people," and paid
15	me with their checks. They reported it stolen. So that
16	was one of the charges there I got, that check one.
17	And so I took the deal, because I didn't want
18	to be wrapped up in all kinds of red tape. It was a
19	losing battle, because I was the one that cashed the
20	check, bottom line. So, very much, I took the deal, and
21	it was a misdemeanor charge.
22	I another one, which was also a misdemeanor
23	charge. And that was in 2001, the check, I think.
24	And then the discharge of the firearm was in
25	2000. The story behind that one is that I was security,

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1	so I purchased a gun. And I was interested in getting
2	my gun permit at the time. It was Thanksgiving, had
3	family over. One of my nephews, that's not too
4	intelligent, and he's a gang member, went into my room,
5	got my gun, went outside. I was preparing, you know,
6	Thanksgiving, trimmings and all that. Went outside, and
7	he shot the gun off.
8	I heard the I didn't know what was going on
9	at the time. I just went outside. Because when a gun
10	goes off, and it's really loud when it's super close, I
11	went outside. I said, "What's going on here?" "Oh, I
12	shot your gun." I said, "What are you shooting my gun
13	for?" I grabbed it from him. So I took it, put it back
14	here. And as I was turning around to go back inside,
15	the Los Angeles County sheriff came around the corner.
16	And I had the bottom line, I had the gun on me, so
17	they charged me with that, with that as a discharge of a
18	firearm.
19	So that's how that one happened there.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you're maintaining
21	that your relative didn't step forward to save you?
22	MR. MOSQUEDA: No, no, of course not. And
23	then, and, obviously, the sheriffs but I mean he was
24	gone by the time they pulled around the corner. He

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walked away or something. They were right there, where

1	they focused on me, once they found out that I had the
2	gun. And because I had it on possession, on me, they
3	I told them, I said, "I didn't do it." And so they, you
4	know, they had to do what they had to do, because I had
5	possession on me. So it was a misdemeanor.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Who is the
7	investigator on this?
8	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anything you want to
10	add?
11	MR. BATCHELOR: Sure. He did list most of his
12	convictions. He did list the firearms conviction,
13	the it's not known whether it's a felony or a
14	misdemeanor on the fingerprints.
15	He did not list a 1997 arrest for possession, a
16	felony possession of narcotics. And there's no
17	disposition on that in the fingerprints.
18	MR. MOSQUEDA: M-hm (affirmative).
19	MR. BATCHELOR: And he did, he had the two DUIs
20	he listed and his the bad checks charge, conviction.
21	MR. MOSQUEDA: M-hm (affirmative), yes. I'm
22	aware I'm sorry. Excuse me. Can I speak?
23	I am aware about that narcotic charge. But I
24	did go through a diversion program and completed the
25	diversion program, completed probation.

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1	And I was under the understanding that it was
2	eliminated from my record. I didn't know it was there.
3	Obviously, if I would have known it was still there, I
4	would have definitely put that on there, because I
5	complied with the courts 100 percent. And it was, I
6	guess, it was dismissed. It was a it's not a
7	conviction, but how I understood it, it wasn't a
8	conviction, but it was a charge, but it was still going
9	to be on my record. But I went through the diversion
10	program, the drug diversion program there in California.
11	If I would have known that, about that one, I
12	definitely would have put that down on the application,
13	because I want to be straightforward. Honesty is the
14	best policy.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any
16	questions from the Board?
17	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None.
18	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment on
20	this particular matter?
21	Okay. I'll entertain a motion.
22	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
24	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just as a clarification,
25	on the 2002 arrest, that was a misdemeanor?

ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll let the 1 2 investigator answer. 3 MR. BATCHELOR: On the fingerprints, it's unknown. It doesn't say whether it's a felony or a 4 misdemeanor. It just says he was convicted, and 45 days 5 jail, three years probation. It doesn't say whether or 6 7 not it's a felony or a misdemeanor. MR. MOSQUEDA: Like I say, it was a 8 misdemeanor, though, conviction. 9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And you successfully 10 11 completed your probation? MR. MOSQUEDA: I hundred percent completed all 12 13 my probations. There's nothing outstanding at this time. I've been an outstanding citizen. And like I 14 said, I'm here to help the city of Las Vegas and its 15 population that's bound by this drug epidemic that we're 16 having here. 17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that 18 Mark Mosqueda, that the denial of his registration be 19 20 reversed and that he be issued a registration card. 21 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. Do I have a second? 22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second. 23 24 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other discussion from the Board? 2.5

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1	Okay. I move for a vote. All those in favor?
2	(Board members said "aye.")
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
4	The motion carried. Congratulations, sir.
5	MR. MOSQUEDA: Thank you very much.
6	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm going
7	to call for a 10-minute break.
8	MR. MOSQUEDA: Thank you very much. Merry
9	Christmas.

23	decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. For possible
24	action.
25	You need to be sworn in, sir.

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MR. KANDT: Mr. Conti, state your name for the 1 2 record. MR. CONTI: Daniel Conti. 3 MR. KANDT: Do you swear under penalty of 4 perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing 5 but the truth? 6 7 MR. CONTI: I do. MR. KANDT: Thank you. 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good afternoon. And 9 tell us why you're here. 10 MR. CONTI: Well, I recently got refused for 11 the quards card, which is expectable. I'm in 12 13 construction. I -- I'm on disability, SSI, and I'm collecting a small pension. So since I can't do my 14 trade anymore, this would be perfect, a quard's job. 15 And I have a felony. If I'm not mistaken, it's 16 about 32 years old. It happened in '82. It happened so 17 long ago, I can't remember. 18 So I'm in front of the Board right now to 19 20 rectify the situation, hopefully. 21 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, you did some time. I mean what was the burglary about? 22 MR. CONTI: It happened so long ago, it's hard 23 to remember. It was a nonviolent. It was a very stupid 24 thing. I believe, I was 19, 20. This happened in the 2.5

1	White, Maui White. I was with three men, three boys, if
2	you will, at that time. And so we pulled into a fan
3	show, Hawaiian fans. And they went in, took some fans.
4	And I was the driver. And that was it.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
6	MR. CONTI: It was a very stupid thing. I
7	regret it. And I'm paying for it in my senior years.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And who's
9	the investigator on this?
10	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anything you can add?
12	MR. BATCHELOR: No. Mr. Conti's correct, he
13	was denied for that felony back in 1982. He listed it.
14	And he had a DUI since then. And after that,
15	that's all he's done. In 2006, he had that DUI, as you
16	guys can see.
17	There's another felony charge on there from
18	'73, possession of a controlled substance, where the
19	fingerprints had no disposition. It didn't say what
20	happened on that.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
22	MR. BATCHELOR: And that's it.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.
24	MR. CONTI: It was a felony?
25	MR. BATCHELOR: It was a felony charge.

1	I	MR. CONTI: I'm sorry. I didn't know about
2	that, or	I would have disclosed it.
3		ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What are you doing now?
4	I	MR. CONTI: Right now, I'm collecting my a

didn't know I had one. 1 At the time that I was convicted in '95 for 2 welfare fraud, I was a battered single woman, 3 struggling, on welfare, and I didn't want to stay on it, 4 so I applied for a job. Which I was employed. 5 I was making less than -- I mean I was getting the -- well, my 6 7 rent was more than my income, you know. And I was struggling, afraid. I knew that it was wrong, but I was 8 just afraid I'm going to -- you report it to the county 9 that I am working, and, but I was afraid over what's 10 going to happen if I don't have enough for my bills. 11 Which I regret. 12 13 So since that time, I have paid restitution I did everything that I was ordered to do by the 14 fees. judge. I went back to school, got a bachelor's degree 15 so I can better myself and take care of my children. 16 And at the time that I applied for employment 17 and was denied of a guard card, I had a -- was living in 18 California before that and holding a valid guard card, 19 20 and which I held for over 18 years, with one company for

21 17 and a half years. So I was just shocked when I got 22 here and applied in this state and was denied.

23ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you24doing now?

25

MS. JOHNSTON: Right now, I'm a volunteer at

1	Saint Rose Hospital in Henderson, Nevada.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Who is the
3	investigator on this?
4	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anything you can add?
6	MR. BATCHELOR: I really don't have anything to
7	add. She's correct, it was a 1995 welfare fraud and
8	conviction. And off the fingerprints, it doesn't say
9	whether it's a felony or a misdemeanor. Typically, this
10	charge is a felony. We weren't able to get any
11	documentation, since it's so sold. That's why she was
12	denied.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions
14	from the Board?
15	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just one, Mr. Chair.
16	Why didn't you disclose?
17	MS. JOHNSTON: I didn't know I had a record.
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: But you went through all
19	the steps to comply with the terms of the conviction,
20	right, you made restitution and you completed your
21	probation?
22	MS. JOHNSTON: Yes.
23	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Why, why would you not be
24	aware of the conviction?
25	MS. JOHNSTON: Because I was given in

1	California, when you have a guard card, every two years
2	you go to renew, to get it renewed every two years. And
3	every two years it went up, everything was approved. So
4	I didn't think I had anything on my record. Otherwise,
5	I would looked into that way back.
6	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I guess, my
7	question doesn't go to what California determines,
8	whether it's a conviction or not. You were aware that
9	it was a conviction.
10	MS. JOHNSTON: I thought it was overturned.
11	Once I paid the money back, I thought it was overturned.
12	Because, as I said, I didn't know. I don't know the
13	law. I don't know how it goes. I've never been in any
14	trouble in my life. I'm 62 years old, never spent an
15	hour or a minute in jail. So I just didn't know. I was
16	not aware.
17	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, for the record, again,
18	with California law, there's always a potential that by
19	not having an actual disposition because of the age,
20	it's very possible at that time that it might have been
21	dismissed under another provision. Which, in
22	California, they don't have to disclose. We require the
23	disclosure here.
24	So that could come into play, if that was
25	Mr. Nadeau's question.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
2	questions from the Board?
3	Any public comment on this particular matter?
4	Okay. I'll entertain a motion.
5	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mr. Chairman, I motion
6	that Debra Johnston's registration be reversed and she
7	be allowed to obtain a guard card.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a
9	motion. Do I have a second a second?
10	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And we have a second.
12	Any other comments from the Board?
13	My only comment, ma'am, is I appreciate living
14	a good life since then and not being in any trouble.
15	But bear in mind that this is on your record. You will
16	need to disclose it if this comes up again. Okay.

20	denied was for several arrests. Do you want to explain,
21	give us a little background on those?
22	MR. CARPENTER: Yeah, those were some pretty
23	dark days. I was using drugs. You know, I got into a
24	fight with my girlfriend, behind some stupid stuff. And
25	I hit her. And the judge gave me a year on that. I was

1	using drugs quite a bit, till they gave me the cell.
2	And I did the time on that. Plus, I had to do a year
3	with a program, which I completed, Briggs Kicks.
4	And I had a weapons charge. It wasn't mine.
5	It wasn't, it wasn't loaded. My friend had gave it to
6	me. You know, when you're into drugs. And they thought
7	that. And that's how I got that.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Who's the
9	investigator on this?
10	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor, again.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anything to add, again?
12	MR. BATCHELOR: Not really, it just he's
13	correct, he got those convictions back in 1982, 1983.
14	He did not list all four of those convictions on his
15	application.

17	list?

19	them.
20	MR. CARPENTER: I want to apologize on that,
21	because I thought it was just for the state of Nevada.

23	ask you if you've ever been arrested, if they would say
24	just state of Nevada

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: How long have you lived
2	in this state?
3	MR. CARPENTER: Six years. I haven't had no
4	contact with the police.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

7	no contact with the police since my last arrest that was
8	in '97.

KANDT: Do you swear under penalty of 5 perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing 6 7 but the truth? MR. GRAVES: I do. 8 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please have a seat, 10 Tell us why you're here. 11 sir. MR. GRAVES: I'm here because I failed to 12 13 disclose all my criminal activity on my application. 14 And when I got the letter from Investigator Batchelor, 15 he explained that's why I was denied, because I did not provide for an even disclosure. 16 A lot of those arrests, a lot of that criminal 17 activity was petty larcenies. 2	MR. RICHARDSON: My name's Matthew Richardson.
3	MR. KANDT: Do you swear under penalty of
4	perjure excuse me, penalty of perjury to tell the
5	truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?
6	MR. RICHARDSON: I do.
7	MR. KANDT: Thank you.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please have a
9	seat. Tell us why you're here.
10	MR. RICHARDSON: I'm appealing the denial of my
11	PILB card.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And the denial
13	was for what?
14	MR. RICHARDSON: A weapons charge in 1996.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell us
16	about that.
17	MR. RICHARDSON: I was working two jobs at the
18	time. I had a gun that was in pawn. And I went to pick
19	it up from the pawnshop one day. And I didn't have time
20	between my two jobs to go home and drop it off. It was
21	in the case. The case wasn't locked, because the
22	pawnshop wouldn't allow that, because they didn't want
23	to keep track of the key. And I had it in the case.
24	There was no bullets in the gun, no bullets in the car.
25	And I took it to my second job.

1	And the guy got fired that day. And the guy
2	from L.A. that I worked with always carries a gun. The
3	one guy calls up and tells P.D. that there is somebody
4	there pointing a gun at people. So they show up before
5	the L.A. guy gets there, and they get my gun and think I
6	was. So they took it.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I know this was quite
8	some time ago, but what did they do after your
9	conviction?
10	MR. RICHARDSON: I had probation and I had
11	this probation, informal probation.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
13	doing these days?
14	MR. RICHARDSON: I'm a locksmith. I'm applying
15	for the PILB card because the company I work for has
16	security guards, so they require all their employees to
17	have the PILB card.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And how long have you
19	been a locksmith?
20	MR. RICHARDSON: Over 20 years.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Who's the
22	investigator on this one?
23	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
25	INVESTIGATOR BATCHELOR: What he said was

1	correct. And he did disclose it.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions
3	from the Board?
4	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I have a question.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
6	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Richardson, was what
7	it, a felony or misdemeanor?
8	MR. RICHARDSON: It was a misdemeanor.
9	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment on
11	this one?
12	Okay. I'll entertain a motion.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'll take it, Mr. Chair.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, please.
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I make a I move to
16	restore Michael Bryner's guard card.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I got a motion.
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Wasn't this Richardson?
19	MR. RICHARDSON: Yeah.
20	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Oh, I'm sorry. Thank
21	you. Matthew Richardson. I'm off. Matthew Richardson.
22	I'm sorry. I move to restore his guard card, reverse
23	the denial.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do I have a
25	second?

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1	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ms. Collins, for
3	consistency, do you want to state why you're reversing
4	the decision, your motion is?
5	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Due to the amount of
6	time that has passed since the incident occurred and his
7	clear history of no criminal activity since that time.
8	MR. RICHARDSON: Just traffic tickets.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I got a
10	motion. I got a second. I'll call for a vote. All in
11	favor?
12	(Board members said "aye.")
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
14	Motion carried. Congratulations.
15	MR. RICHARDSON: Thank you, sir. You guys have
16	a good day.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You too now.
18	Okay. Number 62, Michael Bryner applied for
19	registration, was denied. Mr. Bryner is appealing the
20	decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. For possible
21	action.
22	We need to swear you in, sir.
23	MR. KANDT: State your name for the record.
24	MR. BRYNER: Michael Bryner, B-R-Y-N-E-R.
25	MR. KANDT: And do you swear under penalty of

perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing 1 2 but the truth? MR. BRYNER: I do. 3 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please have a seat, 5 please. 6 7 MR. BRYNER: Thank you. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell us why 8 you're here. 9 MR. BRYNER: To appeal my -- the decision of 10 the -- I guess, the Board for the denial of my PILB 11 card. 12 13 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Okay. And 14 they denied you why? 15 MR. BRYNER: Because of a -- being arrested back in 1990 for carrying a concealed weapon and 16 possession of stolen property, which was the gun. 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Can you 18 tell us what happened? 19 20 MR. BRYNER: I was helping a friend move. Ιt was inside the glovebox in my pickup truck at the time. 21 Metro came and arrested me because I didn't have the --22 any paperwork or anything concerning the owner, being 23 the owner of the weapon, and it was inside the glovebox 24 with the door shut. 2.5

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1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Batchelor,
2	throw me off, tell me it's not you.
3	MR. BATCHELOR: It's me.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
5	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor. What
6	Mr. Bryner said is correct. It's a misdemeanor weapons
7	conviction. And he listed it on his application.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions
9	from the Board?
10	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What are you doing
12	these days?
13	MR. BRYNER: Security. Been security for about
14	27 years.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Where?
16	MR. BRYNER: Harrah's, Lady Luck, Cauley Stop
17	(phonetic spelling), which is now Ogden Hampers
18	(phonetic spelling). I work for U.S. Security now, as
19	of about a month ago. Four Queens. I'm sorry.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, you're fine.
21	MR. BRYNER: No, I'm just saying I forgot about
22	them. I was there for five months.
23	MR. INGRAM: What's the name of the company
24	that you're currently working?
25	MR. BRYNER: That I started about a month ago?

MR. INGRAM: 1 Yeah. 2 MR. BRYNER: U.S. Security Associates. 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Questions from the Board? 4 Any public comment? 5 I'll entertain a motion. 6 7 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, before, if I could interject. U.S. Security Associates is a licensee of 8 ours. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Uh-huh (affirmative). 10 MR. INGRAM: And under NRS 648, NAC 648, no one 11 can be employed with them unless they have a guard card. 12 13 So my question is, to Mr. Batchelor, was he granted a provisional? 14 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes. 15 MR. INGRAM: And then, once the fingerprints 16 17 came back, then -- okay. MR. BATCHELOR: Denied, yes. 18 MR. INGRAM: Then he was denied. Okay. So, at 19 20 the time, he had been granted a provisional to allow him 21 to work with them, prior to the denial of the work card. I just wanted to put that on the record. 22 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're good. 23 24 MR. BRYNER: Okay. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You don't have to 25

1	worry.
2	MR. BRYNER: Oh, yeah. So I told my wife,
3	said, "You have to worry for no reason."
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Where was I?
5	Let's get I'm getting tired. My apologies.
6	Any other questions from the Board?
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: If I did it, I all
9	right. Any public comment?
10	Take a motion.
11	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll move that Michael
13	
14	Bryner be that his registration denial be reversed
15	and he be granted his card.
16	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
17	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And why are you
18	doing that?
19	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: His conviction was 20
20	years ago.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
22	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And he disclosed it. It
23	was a misdemeanor.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
25	motion. We have a second. We've had discussion. I'll

call for a vote. All those in favor? 1 2 (Board members said "aye.") ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed? 3 Okav. Motion carries. Congratulations, sir. 4 MR. BRYNER: Thank you. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Donald Williams 6 7 applied for registration, was denied. Mr. Williams is appealing the decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. 8 For possible action. 9 Good afternoon, sir. We have to swear you in. 10 MR. WILLIAMS: Okay. 11 MR. KANDT: Could you raise your right hand and 12 13 state your name for the record, please. MR. WILLIAMS: Donald Williams. 14 15 MR. KANDT: And do you swear under penalty of perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing 16 but the truth? 17 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, I do. 18 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 19 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Williams, 21 tell why is you're here. MR. WILLIAMS: Appealed the decision, appeal 22 the decision of my guard card, or PILB. 23 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: M-hm (affirmative). 24 2.5 And why was that denied?

1	MR. WILLIAMS: Because of a couple of
2	convictions I have. One was a felony, and, I guess, it
3	was reduced down to a misdemeanor, and the information
4	wasn't, I guess, available at the time.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did you disclose?
6	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Now, the one I'm
8	more concerned about is the recent one, 2013.
9	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why don't you tell us
11	about that one.
12	MR. WILLIAMS: I was at an apartment complex,
13	well, my apartment complex, and I was outside, and I had
14	contact with the police. And after the contact, they
15	put me in the back seat of a police car, got a warrant
16	and searched the whole apartment complex, and they found
17	a weapon inside one of the rooms in the complex, and I
18	was charged with that.
19	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
20	MR. WILLIAMS: Carrying a concealed weapon.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And how long was your
22	probation?
23	MR. WILLIAMS: Two years.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Batchelor?
25	MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, this one is mine. What

Mr. Williams is saying is correct. He did list these 1 two convictions. And on that, the 2013 receiving stolen 2 property, it was admitted and reduced in June of this 3 year when he finished his probation. 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Reduced to what? 5 MR. BATCHELOR: Reduced to a misdemeanor 6 7 receiving stolen property. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you 8 current doing, sir, for employment? 9 MR. WILLIAMS: I'm a stay-at-home father. And 10 I volunteer at Gilmore of Nevada and Three Squares, in 11 12 my spare time. 13 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other questions from the Board? 14 15 Any public comment on this one? I'll entertain a motion. 16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that 17 Donald Williams' denial be upheld. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 19 20 Do I have a second? BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second that. 21 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any comments 22 from the Board or discussion? 23 Mr. Williams, this for the -- is because of 24 recency. I think, we need to go a little longer on this 2.5

1 one. 2 MR. WILLIAMS: Okay. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I encourage you to come 3 And stay the clean life. back. 4 MR. WILLIAMS: Okay. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll call 6 7 for a vote. All those in favor of the motion? (Board members said "aye.") 8 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed? 9 Motion carried. Sorry, sir. 10 MR. WILLIAMS: All right. Thank you. 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 64. Shawn Kane 12 13 applied for registration, was denied. Mr. Kane is appealing his decision to the Board pursuant to NRS 648. 14 15 For possible action. Mr. Kane, I need you to stand. 16 MR. KANE: Oh, sorry. 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No problem. We got to 18 swear you in. 19 20 MR. KANE: I swore in already. 21 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, you did? MR. KANE: Yes, I did. 22 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, we need to swear 23 24 you in again. 25 MR. KANE: Absolutely.

MR. KANDT: I'll just do it again. 1 2 MR. KANE: Absolutely. MR. KANDT: For a clear record. State your 3 name for the record. 4 MR. KANE: Shawn Kane. 5 MR. KANDT: Okay. And, Mr. Kane, do you swear 6 7 under penalty of perjury to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 8 MR. KANE: Yes, I do. 9 MR. KANDT: Thank you. 10 11 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Kane, why 12 are you here? 13 MR. KANE: I'm here to appeal the registration 14 application that was denied for my guard card, or for my 15 work card. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And why was it denied? 16 MR. KANE: It was denied for felony 17 convictions. 18 Before we do go into this, I did request for a 19 20 closed hearing, formally, for the Board. So I'm not 21 sure if that can be discussed now, before that, before 22 we continue. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll leave that up to 23 counsel. I've never been asked that before. 24 MR. KANDT: Yeah, just to clarify for the 25

1	Board, the Board may close any portion of a public
2	meeting to consider the competence, mental health,
3	conduct of an applicant. But it's discretionary, it's
4	at the Board's discretion whether they want to close a
5	portion of the hearing.
6	If somebody makes a motion to, and the Board
7	acts to close a portion of the hearing on that basis,
8	then I just want to emphasize that the Board cannot take
9	any action during a closed portion of a meeting. The
10	Board would have to come out of the closed session
11	before deliberating and taking any action.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. It's a new one
13	on me.
14	MR. KANE: Sorry. And I apologize. I may not
15	have understood all of that, what you just said. And so
16	I understood it differently with what you were saying,
17	from the standpoint of not mental incompetence but, I
18	want to say, extenuating circumstances, or there's
19	MR. KANDT: Well, let me quote the exact
20	language. The statutory provision is NRS 241.030. It's
21	an exception in Nevada open meeting law that states a
22	closed session may be held to consider the character,
23	alleged misconduct, professional competence, or the
24	physical or mental health of a person, to consider an
25	appeal by the person. So

1	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah. Mr. Chair?
2	MR. KANDT: once again, it's your
3	discretion, it's your discretion as to whether to close
4	the meeting or not. Obviously, you have an applicant
5	here that's requested to have a portion of the meeting
6	closed. But they do not have a right to have the
7	meeting closed. You have the authority, should you deem
8	it appropriate, to close a portion of the meeting, once
9	again reiterating that you can only do it for the
10	limited purpose stated in the exception, and you cannot
11	take any action during the closed session.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Nadeau.
13	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
14	We have, on occasion, closed meetings, or had a closed
15	meeting for this type of purpose and at the request of
16	the applicant. So, though it's rather unusual, it's not
17	rare.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a
19	request. Do I have a motion?
20	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that we close
21	the meeting at the request of the applicant.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do we have a second?
23	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
24	MR. KANDT: And just is clarify once again for
25	the record, you're closing this portion of the meeting

1	pursuant to the provisions of NRS 241.030, correct?
2	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That's correct, thank
3	you.
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And should I take
5	public comment?
6	MR. KANDT: Sure, you can.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll take
8	public comment on this motion that's on the table.
9	Yes.
10	MR. MARTINEZ: On this matter?
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Just this matter.
12	MR. MARTINEZ: Never mind. Go ahead, continue.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. All
14	those in favor?
15	(Board members said "aye.")
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I'm opposed. So
17	three to one. All right.
18	MR. INGRAM: So, at this time, I'm going to ask
19	Investigator Saladino if you can escort the two
20	individuals that are present and take them a little bit
21	down the hall, away from the closed doors. And please
22	make sure the doors are closed.
23	Is there anyone in the north?
24	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
25	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: We have no, no public,

only PILB staff and Board members. 1 And I would ask, are the 2 MR. INGRAM: Okay. 3 doors closed? BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: They are. 4 MR. INGRAM: Okay. And if we can have 5 Investigator Woodruff just step outside the doors until 6 7 we open the meeting again, just to prevent anyone from entering during testimony. 8 MR. KANDT: And this is counsel. One other 9 thing, just logistically, you might consider. 10 One, I don't know, in terms of the court reporter or the 11 transcript, to ensure that this is a separate transcript 12 13 for the closed session. 14 And, two, to the extent this is being recorded, which is required by law, I don't know how easy it would 15 be to make a separate recording of the closed session. 16 That's sometimes done just to ensure that should a 17 member of the public make a request for the recording of 18 the meeting, which any member of the public may do, that 19 20 they only receive the recording of the public portion of 21 the meeting and do not receive a recording of the closed 22 portion of the meeting. MR. INGRAM: Yeah. So, Mary, do you have a 23 24 separate cassette that you could pop in for this 2.5 portion?

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1	MS. KLEMME: I don't. But I can pause it and
2	restart it, and so it will be a separate file.
3	MR. KANDT: That would be sufficient, sure.
4	MS. KLEMME: Okay.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Let us know when
6	you're ready.
7	MR. INGRAM: When you say "pause," we need to
8	have this portion of the meeting recorded.
9	MS. KLEMME: Right.
10	MR. INGRAM: Okay.
11	MS. KLEMME: If I paused it and restart it up
12	again, it will restart as a separate file.
13	MR. INGRAM: Thank you very much.
14	MR. KANDT: Yeah. Thank you.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Go ahead
16	and let us know when you're ready up there.
17	(There was a brief pause.)
18	MS. KLEMME: Okay. Ready.
19	* * * *
20	(A closed session of the meeting was held, after which
21	the meeting was then opened back up to the public and
22	resumed as follows.)
23	* * * * *
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We're back
25	in open session. We've had our questions. We've had

1	our answers. I will ask for a motion.
2	MR. KANDT: Pardon me. Once again, I would
3	recommend that the question about the basis for
4	nondisclosure
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh.
6	MR. KANDT: be put on the record.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
8	MR. KANDT: If I might, Mr. Chairman.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Kane.
10	MR. KANE: Yes.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Can you disclose, or
12	can you tell us why about the California 1203.4 and
13	how that confused you in terms of Nevada?
14	MR. KANE: Absolutely. As I mentioned, I have
15	licensing and licensure in other states, which would be
16	Florida, California, Utah, as well as my private
17	investigative license in Utah. I have my notary public
18	in Utah. I also have my concealed carry within Arizona
19	and Utah as well.
20	This incident happened back in 1993. And the
21	expungement from there, which is the 1203 dash 4, I have
22	never had to put this on any application, because of,
23	from my attorney, to my understanding, that I did not,
24	it was expunged, it was off of my record. It showed up,
25	but I didn't have to claim that I was arrested and/or

1	convicted of anything.
2	And so this would be the first time that I have
3	ever had to put this on any application. When
4	investigator James Batchelor
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We all know his name by
6	now.
7	MR. KANE: Yes. When he notified me of that, I
8	immediately sent him over the paperwork on it. I wasn't
9	trying to hide anything. This is not something that I
10	am trying to hide. As I mentioned, I sat on the
11	Department of Public Safety P.I. Hearing Review Board as
12	the chairman. I've sat in your position, in the sense
13	of private investigations. It's actually the Department
14	of Public Safety who governs this organization.
15	And I've not had to ever disclose this on an
16	application, for what my understanding of the
17	1203 dash 4 is, which was the expungement.
18	I do now understand and did understand
19	immediately after talking with Investigator Batchelor
20	and then contacting my attorney locally that, yes,
21	Nevada does not recognize this 1203 dash 4 statute.
22	Immediately from there, I submitted my paperwork. And,
23	As I mentioned, I gave him the actual dot matrix printer
24	of the paperwork from 1993, that I still had, that I
25	sent over to him.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm satisfied.
2	Any questions from the Board?
3	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No questions.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No questions.
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll entertain a
6	motion.
7	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?
8	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
9	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would move that Shawn
10	Kane's registration denial be reversed and he be issued
11	the registration card. And if there's a second, I'll
12	explain my justification.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
14	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second. Oh, okay.
15	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Collins
16	seconded first, so we'll take hers.
17	Go ahead, Mr. Nadeau.
18	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: This is a 1993 case,
19	long, 20 years plus, ago. There's been no additional
20	stuff and no additional interaction with law
21	enforcement.
22	Additionally, this Board is well aware of the
23	complications created by 1203.4. And so with that,
24	that, with that, our understanding of that, the
25	nondisclosure is understood.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
2	MR. KANE: Thank you.
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. I
4	have a second. We've had discussion. I'll call for a
5	vote. All those in favor?
6	(Board members said "aye.")
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
8	Motion carried. Congratulations, sir.
9	MR. KANE: Thank you very much. I appreciate
10	your time.
11	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 65,
12	Board comment and future agenda items for possible
13	action.
14	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, we trailed
15	several.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
17	BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: May we go ahead and
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, you know what, we
19	did. We did. Thank you. I appreciate it. I need to
20	call them.
21	All right. We trailed several. Yeah, number
22	44. Is Edward Hickman here or up north?
23	Number 48. Is Joanna Calhoun here or up north?
24	We'll probably do these as a block.
25	Number 49, Danny Elliott. Here, up north?

Number 53, Juan Frias. Is he here or up north? 1 And number 59, Tijuan Robertson. Is he here or 2 up north? 3 MR. INGRAM: Investigator Saladino, there's 4 nobody in the hallway? 5 MR. SALADINO: There's not. 6 7 MR. INGRAM: Thank you. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll entertain a 8 motion. 9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair? 10 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I'm not sure. Can 11 we do these, can we do these as a block? 12 13 MR. KANDT: I believe so. 14 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that --16 MR. KANDT: As long as you're very clear, 17 clear, what you're doing in the motion. That's all that 18 matters. 19 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. 21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I would move that number 44, Edward Hickman, number 48, Joanna 22 Calhoun, number 49, Danny Elliott, number 53, Juan 23 Frias, and number 59, Tijuan Robertson, that their 24 2.5 registration denials be upheld.

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1	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
3	I have a second. Any public comment?
4	Any further discussion from the Board?
5	All those in favor of the motion?
6	(Board members said "aye.")
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
8	Okay. Motion carries.
9	Okay. Number 65, Board comment and future
10	agenda items.
11	Director?
12	MR. INGRAM: I have nothing.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I only have one thing.
14	I mean this 1203.4 keeps coming up. And I'm just
15	throwing this out for discussion, because I don't know.
16	Could we create a piece of paper, a note, or whatever,
17	or explain to applicants that California expungement
18	does not count in Nevada, or words to that effect, after
19	we get it approved by our legal counsel?
20	MR. INGRAM: Well, one of the things that we've
21	looked into is 1203.4 is the California Penal Code that
22	addresses this. There are similar laws in just about
23	every state.
24	So to we've been trying to brainstorm, as
25	Board staff, on how to capture something like that on

1	our application. And I keep coming back to that it
2	doesn't ask about convictions. It asks about listing
3	all arrests as well as the convictions. And they're two
4	separate points of the application.
5	So in that regard, we're asking them to provide
6	any arrests. 1203.4 comes after a conviction.
7	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I understand that.
8	And I'm familiar, with a close friend here in Nevada,
9	and I'm not saying the person received proper legal
10	advice
11	MR. INGRAM: Right.
12	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: but received legal
13	advice stating that after their expungement here, they
14	didn't have to report anybody to anybody anytime.
15	MR. INGRAM: Right.
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So what I'm saying is
17	that folks are coming forward, thinking they're doing
18	the right thing. And I only know this through personal
19	experience
20	MR. INGRAM: Right.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: here in my own home
22	state. That maybe to alert them.
23	You know, we're not going to solve it today.
24	Kick it around, run it through legal. But it just, this
25	just keeps coming up, and up, and up. And my gut

1	feeling is that the overwhelming majority of people are
2	being sincere, based on what someone told them, whether
3	it might have been in court, it might have been their
4	counsel, it might have been, you know, legal aid. But
5	they're getting that from somewhere. Because I've seen
6	it here, in one particular instant.
7	MR. INGRAM: What we could do, as Board staff,
8	as soon as we are assigned our new legal counsel
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: M-hm (affirmative).
10	MR. INGRAM: I can put that on a priority to
11	discuss that with them and see if we can't get some
12	input on how we might be able to address that. And
13	then, at a future Board meeting, I can agendize that to
14	provide you input on what was discussed and what was
15	is that
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, that's all is I'm
17	asking, is to kick it around. And if you tell me we
18	can't, we can't. But I'd to kick it around and see if
19	we can try to do something.
20	MR. INGRAM: You got it.
21	MR. KANDT: And if I may add, we could come up
22	with some broad and clear disclosure language. And
23	certainly we can also consult with some the other
24	regulatory boards that license and regulate professions
25	in this state, because the same applies there.

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3 t	charged with protecting health, safety and welfare of
	the public. And that's why you require disclosure of
4 a	any prior arrest and why an expungement, a dismissal,
5 s	sealing of the records, none of those absolve the
6 a	applicant from the responsibility to disclose.
7	So we'll work to get you some language.
8	MR. INGRAM: That sounds great. Thank you.
9	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.
10	Anything else? Anything up north?
11	MR. KANDT: Mr. Chair, if I may, as Board
12 C	counsel, and I know it's been a long day, but I wanted
13 t	to bring this to your attention. I think, it is
14 i	important. That's a bill that's been proposed by the
15 G	Governor for consideration in the next legislative
16 s	session next spring. That's Senate Bill 69. It would
17 a	apply to all regulatory boards, including this Board.
18 I	It would do several things.
19	Just briefly, one, it would authorize the
20 G	Governor, in the instance that the Governor determines
21 t	that there's a critical shortage of licensees in a
22 p	particular profession, to direct the board that licenses
23 a	and regulates that profession to act on pending
24 a	applications within a time specific to the executive
25 0	order.

It enacts, to the extent a board does not 1 2 already have statutory provisions for what I'll call 3 reciprocity, for lack of a better term, from other states, of boards to enact provisions for reciprocity. 4 And next, it establishes term limits for 5 members of regulatory boards. 6 7 Next, it prohibits regulatory boards from entering into contingent fee legal contracts. 8 And then it imposes some additional reporting 9 requirements in terms of the activities of the 10 regulatory body in terms of applications, time taken to 11 process and take action on applications. 12 13 And then, finally, it's got some language. It's difficult to explain. I guess, I'll just read it. 14 Requires a regulatory body to exercise its authority 15 over an occupation or profession for the expansion of 16 economic opportunity, promotion of competition and 17 encouragement of innovation. 18 So, anyhow, that's a piece of legislation that 19 20 will be considered, that's proposed by the Governor, 21 that I know will directly affect this Board and the other Title 54 boards that our office represents. So I 22 wanted you to be aware. 23 24 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Can we get a copy of that? 2.5

1 MR. KANDT: Certainly. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm more of a 2 3 reader than a listener. MR. KANDT: Certainly. I will provide a link 4 to the bill to staff, and we'll get that disseminated. 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That would be great. 6 7 Thank you. MR. INGRAM: And then we'll be actively 8 watching that. 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Does the legal thing 10 apply to you guys, what we have to reimburse you? Or is 11 this for new contracts in private sector? 12 13 MR. KANDT: Well, last session, the Legislature actually enacted some statutory provisions limiting our 14 15 office's ability to retain outside counsel on a contingency fee basis. 16 ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 17 MR. KANDT: And, I think, this may have been a 18 follow-up to that. 19 20 Some of the boards have the authority. I don't 21 know that your Board does. But some of the boards actually have authority to hire their own outside 22 counsel. And, I think, this was an effort to ensure 23 that to the extent a board exercises that authority, it 24 2.5 does not hire outside counsel on a contingency fee

1	basis.
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
3	MR. KANDT: So I don't know that it directly
4	affects, that piece of this legislation would affect
5	your board.
6	MR. INGRAM: And our Board does not have the
7	provision in our statutes. We are to be represented by
8	the Attorney General's Office. We don't have the
9	ability to hire outside counsel.
10	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions up
11	north?
12	Mr. Director, anything else?
13	MR. INGRAM: Not from me.
14	ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 66,
15	public comment. Members of the general public may
16	comment on matters appearing on the agenda and may bring
17	matters not appearing on the agenda to the attention of
18	the Board. The Board may discuss the matters not
19	appearing on the agenda, but may not act on the matters
20	of this meeting. If the Board desires, the matters may
21	be placed on a future agenda for action. Public
22	comments may be limited to five minutes per person at
23	the discretion of the Chairman but will not be
24	restricted according to viewpoint.
25	Okay. I'm going to impose five minutes. And

do we have any public comment up north? 1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: 2 None. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do we have any public 3 comment down south? 4 Yes, sir. Please come forward. State your 5 name for the record. You can have a seat if you want. 6 7 MR. MARTINEZ: Yeah. Awesome. I've been sitting down all day. 8 All right. My name's Joshua Martinez. I'm 9 here to kind of speak up for the people of Nevada and, 10 also, defend the principle of liberty and the 11 constitution. 12 13 I'm not claiming any more rights other than the 14 rights that were dealt to me by my creator, and those rights are protected by the U.S. Constitution, the same 15 constitution that you swore an oath to uphold. I'm sure 16 that some of you on the Board will claim that your oath 17 is only for the Nevada constitution, bounded by the 18 statutes imposed thereof. 19 20 Let me remind you of Article 1, clause 2 -- I'm sorry, Article 1, Section 2, clause 2, of the Nevada 21 Constitution, a part you may have overlooked, and it's 22 purpose of government, paramount allegiance to the 23 United States: All political power is inherent in the 24 2.5 people. Government is instituted for the protection,

1	security and benefit of the people, and they have the
2	right to alter or reform the same whenever the public
3	good may require it. But the paramount allegiance of
4	every citizen is due to the federal government in the
5	exercise of all of its constitutional powers as the same
6	have been or may be defined by the Supreme Court of the
7	United States, and no power exists in the people of this
8	or any other state of the federal union to dissolve
9	their connection therewith or perform any act tending to
10	impair, subvert, or resist the supreme authority of the
11	government of the United States.
12	That shows where your oath belongs to. My
13	I'm protected by the U.S. federal government.
14	The PILB has ignored the supreme law of the
15	land, and it's time that you are corrected. You do not
16	have the right to infringe on the private citizen who
17	seeks to contract his or her time with a private
18	company. We have the right to work. We have a right to
19	contract our skill, our labor, our time of life as we
20	see fit, every single person here.
21	How can you judge someone, who has already paid
22	their dues for what they've done, and then deprive them
23	of a right? Is that not a violation of double jeopardy?
24	Is this not a violation of due process? Where does our
25	belief to work come from? It most certainly does not

1	come from you.
2	My right to make a living and to be left alone
3	should be respected. I am here to demand that you
4	respect the rights of the people of Nevada. I stand on
5	my constitutional rights as Hale v. Henkel states that
6	that is my right to do so. An individual may stand upon
7	his constitutional rights as a citizen. He is entitled
8	to carry on his own private business in his own way.
9	His power to contract is unlimited. He owes no duty to
10	the state or to his neighbor to divulge his business or
11	to open his doors to an investigation.
12	So, Murdock v. Pennsylvania states no state
13	shall convert a right into a privilege and issue license
14	and be therefor.
15	Shuttlesworth v. City of Birmingham, Alabama,
16	373 U.S. 262, 1963. If the state converts a right into
17	a privilege, the citizen can't ignore the license, and
18	gave him the right with impunity, because you can't
19	punish them.
20	So I'm here demanding that the PILB recognize
21	our paramount allegiance and honor the U.S.
22	Constitution.
23	I also want to leave this rose here for Boyd
24	Minnikin, who was murdered fighting tyranny. Even
25	though he's dead, his words live on through the people.

The people. We the people. His words have an endurance 1 that knows no end. 2 But I'm also going to leave you the U.S. 3 Constitution so you all can read that and understand 4 where your oath belongs to. Because no more will I 5 allow somebody to tell me what I can and cannot do. 6 7 Thank you. ACTING CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you. 8 Okay. With that being said, any other public 9 comment? 10 All right.
