3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll smash the gavel.
4	This is the quarterly meeting of the Private
5	Investigator's Licensing Board, and we're calling it to
6	order.
7	Can we have roll call of the Board members,
8	please?
9	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.
10	Board Member Colbert?
11	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Here.
12	MR. INGRAM: Board Member Flynn?
13	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Here.
14	MR. INGRAM: Board Member Collins?
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Here.
16	MR. INGRAM: Chairman Zane?
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Here.
18	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Nadeau will not be present for
19	the first part of the meeting. He will be joining us
20	around 10:30.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Item number
22	two on the agenda is the notification regarding public
23	comment. It says what it says, and it means what it
24	means.
25	We'll be happy to take public comment from
25	we'll be nappy to take public comment from

1	anybody at this time. If you have anything that you
2	feel is germane or important, that the Board needs to
3	know, that's not on the agenda today, we'd be happy to
4	hear from you now.
5	And, also, we allow for public comment at the
6	end of the meeting. So if you miss the opportunity at
7	this point in time or elect not to engage us right now,
8	you will have the opportunity at the end of the meeting
9	to talk to the Board about items you feel are important.

assigned to the Board as our new counsel. 1 She has an extensive background and has just recently been hired by 2 the Attorney General's Office. 3 So we're happy to have you on board with us, 4 Rosalie. 5 MS. BORDELOVE: Thank you. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Item number four, review and approve 8 transcripts from December 1, 7 and 8, 2016 Board 9 meetings, for possible action. 10 If possible, could we segregate those. I have 11 to abstain from one of them. So if -- I would need to 12 13 abstain from the December 1st Board meeting. So if we could have a motion. 14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion to 15 accept the minutes. 16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do we have a second? 18 Okay. We have a motion and a second. Any Board 19 20 discussion on the motion? 21 Any public comment on the motion? Okay. All in favor of the motion, signify by 22 saying "aye." 23 (Board members said "aye.") 24 2.5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed to the

1	motion, signify by saying "no."
2	I need to vote in the following fashion. I
3	need to vote, abstain from voting on December 1 minutes,
4	because I wasn't present. So I don't know what happened
5	except for what I read. So I can't validate that
6	they're correct. I was present on December 7 and 8. So
7	I vote yes.
8	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I think, we need a motion
9	separately.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, okay.
11	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And I'll make that motion
12	to accept the December 7th and 8th minutes.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So we'll record
14	the vote on the December 1st as three ayes and one
15	abstention.
16	And now we'll move to the motion. Do we have a
17	second to accept the 7th and 8th minutes?
18	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
19	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. We have a
21	motion and a second. Any public comment, or any Board
22	questions?
23	Hearing none, the vote for 7th and 8th would be
24	ayes. I'm sorry. If you are in agreement, vote "aye."
25	(Board members said "aye.")

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any nos?
2	Carries.
3	Okay. At this time, item number five is
4	notification that anybody that expects to give comment
5	or testimony or speak today to the Board about an agenda
6	item needs to be sworn in, so that all that you have to
7	say is done under oath.
8	So at this time, we'd like to do a blanket
9	oath, so that we it saves us time later on. So if
10	you'd stand, raise your right hand, and take the oath.
11	MS. BORDELOVE: Do you swear that the testimony
12	you're about to give today is the truth, the whole
13	truth, and nothing but the truth?
14	(Applicants and witnesses present were sworn.)
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you very much.
16	Now, we're moving to item number six, Triton
17	Security, Inc., license number 1439. Is there anybody
18	here from Triton?
19	MR. ROWLEY: I am.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you doing?
21	MR. ROWLEY: Good. How are you?
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Are you David?
23	MR. ROWLEY: I am not.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're not?
25	MR. ROWLEY: Haven't seen him. He's in

1	Florida.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
3	MR. ROWLEY: I'm Shane Rowley, the current
4	president and qualifying agent for Triton.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And how do you
6	spell your last name?
7	MR. ROWLEY: My name is Shane David Rowley,
8	R - O - W - L - E - Y.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Okay. So it
10	says here Triton Security is seeking corporate officer
11	approval for David Crupi. Is that correct?
12	MR. ROWLEY: Correct.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So we have the background
14	investigation completed on Mr. Crupi. And are there any
15	questions or added information that's required of the
16	applicant?
17	MR. SALADINO: That would be Investigator
18	Woodruff in the north.
19	MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you, Mr. Chair. And, no,
20	I don't have any additional information other than the
21	report.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you very
23	much.
24	Is there any public comment regarding the
25	agenda item?

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1	Okay. Any Board comment regarding the agenda
2	item?
3	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I have
4	one question.
5	How come Mr. Crupi is not here?
6	MR. ROWLEY: He actually had talked to Gisele
7	and let her know that he was not able to be here. He is
8	out of, lives out of state.
9	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment?
11	Okay. Do I have a motion on item number six?
12	I'd move that Triton Security, Inc., license
13	number 1439, that's seeking corporate approval for
14	David J. Crupi, be approved, subject to all statutory
15	and regulatory requirements.
16	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?
18	There's a motion and a second. Any Board comment or
19	question on the motion?
20	All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
21	"aye."
22	(Board members said "aye.")
23	Any opposed, say "no."
24	It carries unanimously. Thank you.
25	MR. ROWLEY: Thank you.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number seven, Kane
2	Consulting Group, Inc., license number 2258B. Anybody
3	here for Kane Consulting Group?
4	It's not unusual for some of these realignments
5	to occur, and there might not be an appearance. Some of
6	these items that are not dealing with a brand-new
7	license and brand-new licensees are considered on many
8	occasions to be just administrative acts. They are
9	fully and completely disposable occasionally by blanket
10	vote. But every once in a while, we go through each and
11	every one of them. Because they are subject to review
12	and decisions, just like all the rest of them. Just
13	sometimes there are no questions or might not be any
14	questions. And other times, they are.
15	To clarify that a little bit better, a lot of
16	times, these are already licensed entities who are
17	changing out a director or a board member in a corporate
18	structure, and the only entity or individual that's
19	subject to review is that newest board member, director
20	or entity.
21	So as we go through the agenda items, some
22	things will go quicker than others, and that's because
23	that there's a level of background that's already
24	established in the record before the Board. And, but
25	all of it is public, to the extent that it's subject to

1	the open meeting law. So it's not as if we're hiding
2	something. It's just some things we don't have any
3	questions on. We've the record has been established
4	by the staff work. And so, therefore, we just move
5	along and take names.
6	But on other occasions, if Board members have
7	questions, or if any member of the public raises an
8	issue of concern or interest to the Board, then we will
9	subject that license application for further scrutiny or
10	further questioning and to derive, make sure that we
11	have an open, illuminative portrayal of the license
12	application.
13	So. And on occasion, there will be situations
14	where some may not be in attendance. And there is no
15	law that says that you have to be here. It's just in
16	your best interest to do so, especially if a Board
17	member or someone raises an issue that may be of public
18	concern. So you're at your own risk if you don't show
19	up and you appear here, unless you have a good reason.
20	Any other Board comment on that particular
21	matter?
22	Kane Consulting, number seven, license number
23	2258B, is seeking corporate officer approval for Shawn
24	Kane. Is there anybody here on item number seven that
25	needs to be heard?

1	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, I received an email
2	late yesterday afternoon. Mr. Kane's daughter had a
3	medical emergency, and he had to take her to the
4	hospital. He felt so bad that he couldn't attend, he
5	actually sent a note from the hospital showing her
6	admittance and release and is hoping that the Board can
7	go ahead and make a decision in his absence.
8	He understands that if the Board requires
9	speaking to him, that the item would have to be
10	postponed to a later date.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Unless I hear otherwise,
12	we're taking it to conclusion that the matter is here
13	before us because it's finished and there are no
14	negative connotations that we need to consider.
15	So that being the case, is there any public
16	comment on item number seven?
17	Any Board comment on item number seven?
18	Can I get a motion on item number seven?
19	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I'll make a motion
20	that we accept Shawn Kane as a corporate officer.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. And do
22	I have a second?

13	Your name again, sir?
14	MR. GRAVO: Dennis Gravo.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right.
16	Mr. Gravo, can you give us a little bit of background
17	about your new corporation and what you intend to do out
18	here in the great state of Nevada?
19	MR. GRAVO: Well, we do the surveillance camera
20	systems now, but we're also doing the monitoring for
21	properties where we actually watch the property
22	virtually.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see.
24	MR. GRAVO: You know, with virtual monitoring.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see.

1	MR. GRAVO: And then we have a cop down that
2	intervenes when a suspect, or whatever, comes onto the
3	property, and we try to get them off.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. You've contracted
5	with Mr. Powers to be your eyes, ears and responsible
6	party here in the great state of Nevada?
7	MR. GRAVO: Yes.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Is
9	there any public comment regarding the agenda item
10	number 11?
11	Board comment regarding item number 11?
12	I'll entertain a motion.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move

13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 22, Daniel M.
14	Campos.
15	Good morning.
16	MR. CAMPOS: Good morning.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're Mr. Campos?
18	MR. CAMPOS: Yes, sir.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Great. All right. Can
20	you give us a little bit of background about yourself

1	Any Board comment regarding item number 24?
2	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair.
3	Mr. Shepard, on the background investigation
4	there were some concerns under your finances. Do you
5	want to address those? I'm sure you're aware.
6	MR. SHEPARD: Yes, sir. Yes, sir. I divorced
7	and had a huge amount, and I filed bankruptcy. Gosh,
8	that was probably 20 years ago. Then, when I moved from
9	L.A. to Nevada, I had some financial issues as well, and
10	I had a BK at that point in time as well.

12	concerned on several accounts being past due.
13	MR. SHEPARD: Yes. There are two accounts.

9	And I have 20, around 20 armed security officers and
10	four private investigators underneath my agency license.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
12	MR. HANKS: And why am I coming out here,
13	you're probably going to ask. We're going to work
14	with well, I went to school for advance and executive
15	protection through CRI out on the north, North
16	Las Vegas, and was very successful and graduated top of
17	my class. Very challenging. Went home, learned a lot
18	from there. They called and wanted me to become an
19	instructor. So I went through their instructor program
20	and then became a lead instructor with CRI here, out of
21	Nevada.
22	And after discussing with Doron, the owner of
23	that, and Brad Van Pelt, who's one of my senior security
24	supervisors back in Nebraska, we decided to start a
25	corporation here, because we do some high-end EP and

1	international client stuff, primarily in Nebraska, and

12	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: I was told that I didn't
13	report income to the welfare. And I did report it. But
14	they said that I didn't, so they charged me for welfare
15	fraud.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
17	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ma'am, what state did this
18	happen in?
19	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: What state?
20	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, what state?
21	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Oh. Los Angeles,
22	California.
23	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Los Angeles. And how long
24	have you lived in Las Vegas?
25	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Since I was four.

1	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So you were living in
2	California at the time, though?
3	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Yes.
4	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: How long did you live in
5	California?
6	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: How long did I live there?
7	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, ma'am.
8	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Since I was four years old,
9	so. I'm forty
10	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You're from Las Vegas, or
11	you're from L.A.?
12	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: I'm from Los Angeles.
13	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. I
14	misunderstood. And how long have you been in Las Vegas?
15	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: I'm not in Vegas now. I'm
16	trying to move to Vegas.
17	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And my last question, what
18	do you do for employment right now?
19	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: I'm a security officer.
20	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And how long have you been
21	a security officer in California?
22	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Almost 30 years.
23	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Oh, really?
24	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Yes.
25	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. I don't have any

other questions, Mr. Chair. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 3 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Yes, I do have one question. 4 MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Yes. 5 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: You were sentenced to 6 7 five years probation, community service and restitution. MR. 7	a long career with security in California since, and
8	there's she was forthcoming, which is refreshing for

14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board questions or
15	comments on the motion?
16	All in favor, say "aye."
17	(Board members said "aye.")
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
19	Passes unanimously.
20	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Thank you.
21	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Good luck.
22	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: It's not like it wasn't in
23	supply.
24	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Thank you very much. I've
25	been doing this for a long time.

1	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Welcome to Las Vegas.
2	MS. SPILLERS-COLE: Thank you.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let's see. Just so that
4	we're not getting paid to do nothing.
5	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He stepped in, and then he
6	stepped out.
7	MR. INGRAM: We're going to step out, see if we
8	can get Mr. Batchelor.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We can
10	(The Reporter interrupted because several
11	people were talking at the same time.)
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I'm sorry. No, I'm
13	sorry. I need to whip Mr. Ingram.
14	Why don't we open item number 54 for a little,
15	little bit. And then we'll reopen it later on in the
16	agenda. But I kind of thought, right now, we could take
17	a couple of minutes to discuss items that might be
18	germane to item number 54, because there's a time issue.
19	One of the items that I would like to get some
20	record on, because I don't think we've covered it, and
21	most of that's my fault, and that's a little bit of
22	spontaneous response from Mr. Ingram, who serves as the
23	president of an international regulatory entity. And
24	beings that my absence last time, I wasn't able to make
25	the disclosures that I wanted to.

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1 So you could tell everybody so that -- that's 2 not aware that what your other job is that you don't get 3 paid for.

MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

4

5 I've been of member for the past three years of 6 the International Association of Security and 7 Investigative Regulators. It is an association that the 8 previous director was a member of, Mechele Ray. And I 9 continued as a member in her absence.

10 This, this association is something that's 11 grown. We currently are represented by 32 states. 12 We're represented by seven providences in Canada, by the 13 Security Council in France, and are actively recruiting 14 other countries as we speak.

The association allows membership not only for 15 regulators across the nation and internationally, but 16 also allows industry individuals to join the 17 association. And the reason for that is we -- we have 18 several committees that are working on different items 19 20 throughout the year. It is an annual conference that is 21 attended by a large number of members. And every year, a different state tries to host the conference. 22

23 We were requested by the association to pick up 24 and see if we could host last year's conference in 25 November of last year here in Las Vegas, due to some

political decisions made, who were slotted to attend in 1 North Carolina, and due to some policy changes there, 2 many states were prohibited from traveling to North 3 Carolina. So they asked if we could put something 4 together here. Myself and Chief Irizarry were able to 5 bring it together, and actually hosted the conference 6 7 last year, which you so graciously attended, as did Board Member Collins. 8

9 Unbeknownst to me, the elections of board 10 members was due in November of last year. There was a 11 large turnover due to retirements. And I was at that 12 time elected as the president of the International 13 Association. So I'm serving in that capacity now as 14 well.

We are gearing up. We have several subcommittees still working on the items that we discussed at last year's conference. And we'll be doing updates at this year's conference, which will be held the last part of November in Chattanooga, Tennessee.

20 So thank you for allowing me to expand upon 21 that.
22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
23 Do we have any other Board issues of any import
24 or that would fall under the agenda item?
25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I have a question.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.
2	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: If we were to attend that
3	conference, is that something that the P.I. Board could
4	pick up or assist with travel, or is that on our on?
5	MR. INGRAM: We could talk about that. The new
6	budget for next fiscal year starts in July. So in May,
7	I will be creating a new budget. So if that's something
8	that any of the Board members are interested in
9	attending, let me know right away, and we can try to
10	work in the budget to accommodate that.
11	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, I think, it's just
12	the goal is to bring regulators from various states
13	together. I think, it will be important that at least
14	one of us attend. I know, if two of us attends, it
15	becomes an issue. If three of us attends, it's a bigger
16	issue. And four of us, we have to invite the entire
17	state of Nevada to attend with us, so.
18	MR. INGRAM: Right.
19	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: But my recommendation to
20	you would be to put an item in the budget for at least
21	one Board member to attend. And we can make a
22	determination amongst ourselves who we draw. If that's
23	okay, Mr. Chair.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Fine with me, sir.
25	MR. INGRAM: Okay.

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BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That's my recommendation 1 2 to you. MR. INGRAM: So noted. I'll make that 3 recommendation. Thank you. 4 I do have one other item, Mr. Chairman, I'd 5 like to bring up. The Board elects a chairman, and that 6 7 chairman serves for a two-year term. Your two-year term does end June 30th of this year. So July 1, we will be, 8 either through nominations and elections of the Board 9 members, that will be an agenda item for June, for the 10 Board members to consider either reelecting this chair, 11 or if they want to nominate other individuals or 12 13 themselves, that we will have that election on the record during the June Board meeting. 14 15 So if any Board members are interested or would -- I'd like you to consider your nominations and 16 be prepared for the June Board meeting. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okey-doke. 18 MR. INGRAM: Thank you. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions? 21 I'd like to get as many as we can, so that we can limit our oath to 30 times. 22 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN IN LAS VEGAS: Kevin, is it 23 24 Chattanooga, Tennessee, or Nashville this year? 25 MR. INGRAM: Chattanooga.

1	UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN IN LAS VEGAS: Chattanooga.
2	Thank you.
3	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And while we wait,
4	Mr. Chair, we can do item number 10.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 10, we're going to
6	go back to item number 10. Thank you, Mr. Flynn.
7	Chenega Infinity, LLC.
8	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And my question of the
9	applicant, who's not here, is, looking at his
10	application as well as his background, I really cannot
11	make a determination as to the scope of his employment
12	or prior employment. Maybe I'm missing something. But
13	that was my question. It's not necessarily an area of
14	concern, although I'd like to know more about the
15	individual.
16	And I know, during the short break, one of the
17	investigators went outside to do a follow-up. So I'll
18	let staff report.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
20	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor. I did
21	speak with Mr. Bentley. And he's planning on receiving
22	a contract with Hoover Dam, through the BOR, with Hoover
23	Dam and a few other dams he didn't say. But he's going
24	to plan on having around 50 armed guards at the various
25	dams here in Nevada and other states. And that's the

1	reason he's applying to receive his license, is for
2	that, is to bid and, hopefully, to seek that contract.
3	And that's it, it's what's his plans for here
4	in Nevada.
5	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Right, but what does he
6	currently, what's the scope of his employment now?
7	MR. BATCHELOR: Oh, his current employment?
8	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes.
9	MR. BATCHELOR: Well, on his application, let
10	me see here.
11	Yeah, I guess, as far as his current
12	employment, there's not much there. I could make a
13	call, a phone call on our next break.
14	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, please. Yeah,
15	especially considering the sensitivity of what he's
16	applying for, that it being a national resource, I
17	think, we need to know more about him.
18	MR. BATCHELOR: Okay.
19	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Again, for the record, I
20	don't, I'm not specifying an area of concern. But I
21	know nothing about the individual. And I don't feel
22	comfortable voting.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll trail
24	number 10.
25	Can I get a show of hands of everybody who is

1	here to here for license, or work card registration
2	appeals?
3	Okay. Well, we'll have you stand, raise your
4	right hand, and be sworn in, because your testimony
5	needs to be taken under oath. And then, when you come
6	up, we'll have to ask you your name. And you'll need to
7	spell your last name so that the stenographer can get it
8	down. And then we'll proceed with you.
9	There's quite a few on the agenda. So we'll
10	take you as you're seated. I'll call you forward. And
11	I don't mean to be rude, I'll just point and say you're
12	next. And then we'll get to know you a little bit. All
13	right.
14	If you'd all stand and raise your right hand,
15	please.
16	MS. BORDELOVE: Do you swear that the testimony
17	you give today will be the truth, the whole truth, and
18	nothing but the truth?
19	(Applicants and witnesses present were sworn.)
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
21	Ma'am, come forward. How are you?
22	MS. WHITTINGTON: I'm good, thank you. I'm
23	Ashley Whittington.
24	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: You can sit down.
25	MS. WHITTINGTON: Last name,

W-H-I-T-T-I-N-G-T-O-N. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, and I find that 3 you're number 52. MS. WHITTINGTON: Yes. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: On the agenda. 5 Okay. Who's the investigator that handled Ashley? 6 7 MR. BATCHELOR: Batchelor. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us why she 8 was denied? 9 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes. And she was denied for 10 multiple reasons, good moral character, crimes involving 11 moral turpitude. She has 10 convictions and --12 13 (The Reporter indicated difficulty hearing Mr. Batchelor.) 14 MR. BATCHELOR: Sure. She has 10 convictions. 15 And -- all right. I guess, what I saw online is that --16 (The Reporter indicated there's still 17 difficulty hearing.) 18 MR. BATCHELOR: And that's why she was denied. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Why don't you start over. MR. BATCHELOR: Okay. Good idea. 21 Ms. Whittington was denied for good moral 22 character and crimes involving moral turpitude. And she 23 has 10 convictions, or nine convictions and one that's 24 currently pending. She has a court date tomorrow for 2.5

1	possession of drug paraphernalia.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Can you tell
3	us what all you know about what Mr. Batchelor just
4	reported to us?
5	MS. WHITTINGTON: Yes, I know about everything.
6	I wrote something, if I may read it?
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.
8	MS. WHITTINGTON: Okay. Good morning. My name
9	is Ashley Whittington. And first and foremost, I would
10	like to thank you for that you all for your time. I
11	understand the reasons why I'm here today is because of
12	my extensive criminal history. But allow me to tell you
13	what I've been doing with my life in the last 10 months.
14	May 5th, 2016, I free-willingly accepted the
15	WIN Court program overseen by Judge Cynthia Leung, and
16	it has been the life-changing experience I needed. In
17	this time span, I have completed We Care and West Care's
18	extensive inpatient substance abuse programs. I
19	attended the American Leadership Camp and completed it.
20	And, most recently, I graduated from Hope for Prisoners.
21	I am also scheduled to take my GED test next week.
22	Today, I am a more reliable and dependable
23	person than I have been in 14 years. By staying
24	connected with my West Care alumni, I have a great
25	support team. And by my actively participating in Hope

1	for Prisoners workshop, shops, I have acquired a
2	personal mentor that I currently am mapping out my
3	dreams and visions with, and where people like John
4	Ponder and Captain McDerris believe in me. God is doing
5	something great with my life.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
7	MS. WHITTINGTON: I also was given a letter
8	from my court and just some certificates I received, if
9	you'd like to see them.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right.
11	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I would like to see
12	them.
13	(Items were handed to Board Member Collins.)
14	MS. WHITTINGTON: And there's also one in the
15	back of that.
16	(The items were reviewed.)
17	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Here, ma'am (returned
18	items).
19	Mr. Batchelor, are these felonies or
20	misdemeanors?
21	MR. BATCHELOR: Mostly all misdemeanors, a
22	couple of gross misdemeanors, but no felonies.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what's the time
24	frame, from the beginning to I know you have a
25	current something in the system, but.

1	MR. BATCHELOR: The oldest one was a petty
2	larceny conviction in 2003. And it goes up to the
3	current and possession of drug paraphernalia case.
4	And one other thing to add, it does say we did
5	not receive her fingerprints. We did receive her
6	fingerprints since the report was made. So we have
7	them, and they do confirm everything that she told us.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And was anything left out
9	of the application process; was everything fully
10	disclosed?
11	MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, she listed everything.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are there any questions?
13	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
14	Just a comment.
15	Ms. Whittington, as you know, as part of this,
16	we look at two things, forthcoming and recency. I
17	applaud you for being forthcoming.
18	MS. WHITTINGTON: Thank you.
19	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That always helps you.
20	Unfortunately, for me I can't speak for the other
21	Board members I'd like some more distance between
22	your last event and coming before the Board. And, also,
23	you also have an outstanding case. And I'm unaware if
24	the Board ever granted with an outstanding case out
25	there.

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You're definitely on the right track. 1 I hope to see you before us someday, too. We'll see how the 2 3 other Board members feel. MS. WHITTINGTON: Thank you. 4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I appreciate your honesty. 5 That goes a long way with me. And I'll be in your court 6 the next time you come back. 7 MS. WHITTINGTON: Thank you. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board 9 questions, comments? 10 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I would just like to 11 make the comment that, you know, you have a significant 12 13 history here, but the fact that there should be some time between this last incident and your future request 14 15 for a quard card. Please do not stop doing anything that you're doing, because you're definitely headed in 16 the right direction. And I, too, will be on your side 17 if you're not voted in today. 18 MS. WHITTINGTON: Thank you. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else? 21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I also confer with the statements of the other two Board members. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Entertain a 23 24 motion. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we 2.5

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1	deny the appeal but, also, that the applicant knows that
2	she is more than willing to put in again, possibly a
3	year down the road. And let's get all your court cases
4	adjudicated.
5	MS. WHITTINGTON: Okay.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
7	have a second?
8	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
9	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
11	MS. WHITTINGTON: Thank you.
12	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's item number 52 for
14	Ashley Whittington. So we have a motion, and we have a
15	second. And Board comments?
16	Nothing. All in favor?
17	(Board members said "aye.")
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
19	Okay. The denial has been upheld. And you
20	have the ability to reapply in a year.
21	MS. WHITTINGTON: Okay.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And please take to heart
23	the comments of the Board members.
24	MS. WHITTINGTON: I do. Thank you all.
25	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And good luck to you.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now, for those of you who
2	have already been sworn, the next up, going this
3	direction (indicating), this side of the room, who's
4	already been sworn in?
5	Would you come forward, sir.
6	Would you state your name and spell your last
7	name.
8	MR. HEARNE: Stephen Hearne, H-E-A-R-N-E.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let me find you here.
10	Number 34. Okay. So we're on agenda item number 34,
11	Stephen Hearne. Who's the investigator on this case?
12	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you give us
14	some background on why Mr. Hearne was denied?
15	Please, sit down. I'm sorry.
16	MR. HEARNE: Okay.
17	MS. DONALD: In back in 1984, he was convicted
18	of a misdemeanor for carrying a loaded firearm in a
19	public place. He was originally denied in 2012 for
20	carrying a loaded firearm. On June 10th, 2013, he
21	provided our office with court documents showing that
22	the conviction was dismissed under 1203.4. We then gave
23	him the work card.
24	Since that time, our stance has changed on
25	1203.4. So he was again denied when he tried to renew

his work card this year. And so now he's being brought 1 before the Board for approval. 2 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. MS. DONALD: His current work card does not 4 expire -- I think, it expires next week or --5 MR. HEARNE: Yes. 6 7 MS. DONALD: Yes. And he disclosed it. We have court documents. And that was the only arrest and 8 conviction on his record. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So I got the 10 chronology right, he applied in 2012, and we denied him? 11 MS. DONALD: Correct. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And then he got taken care of over 1203.4? 14 MS. DONALD: Yeah, from the court, showing it 15 was dismissed under 1203.4. So then Investigator 16 Yarborough gave him a card. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 18 MS. DONALD: So now he's up for renewal. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. MS. DONALD: And because it's on his record 21 and, you know, we changed our stance on 1203.4. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Got it. Okay. 23 24 MR. HEARNE: And just to explain a little bit of the background, first of all, it was over 30 years 2.5

1	ago. And back then, I lived in Wyoming, Cheyenne,
2	Denver, that area, working for different cable
3	companies, doing advertising, and did a lot of hunting
4	back then. And we always had a pistol we kept, because
5	there were a lot of rattlesnakes when we go hunting, so.
6	I had to come to California to hire some people
7	in Palm Springs for a company, and I just forgot to take
8	the pistol out of the glove compartment. It was a
9	little .22 that shoots rat shot. Which wouldn't kill
10	anybody. It would probably upset them. But, you know,
11	there was no intention of trying to hide it or anything.
12	I just forgot.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other
14	questions?
15	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Where are you currently
16	employed?
17	MR. HEARNE: I'm not employed with any security
18	now. When I went to apply for my new card, I was going
19	to get some part-time work, mainly extra money to help
20	out my kids. I lost my daughter last year. She has six
21	kids. And so I'm trying to help them. The father is a
22	pilot, also a veteran, been to Afghan three times. And
23	they just need extra money.
24	And so I wanted to get a part-time, you know, a
25	couple hundred dollars a week, working security. Which

1	I'm very well-versed in. I was in intelligence in the
2	Marines in Vietnam. And it's just, that's it, just earn
3	some extra money.
4	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And for staff, no
5	other issues in the last 33 years?
6	MS. DONALD: None.
7	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm willing to make a
8	motion.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other
10	questions?
11	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: None in the north.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir. You're
13	up, Mr. Flynn.
14	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we
15	grant the appeal based on the incident was over 33 years
16	ago, there's been no other issues, and he's been
17	forthcoming.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Got a motion. Is there a
19	second?
20	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
22	questions on the motion?
23	All in favor, say "aye."
24	(Board members said "aye.")
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

1	Carries unanimously.
2	MR. HEARNE: Okay.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
4	MR. HEARNE: Thank you.
5	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Stay on this side
7	of the room. Who's been sworn in?
8	Come on forward, please.
9	MR. INGRAM: 51.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you say your name and
11	spell your last name?
12	MS. WEEKLEY: Trumyia Weekley, W-E-E-K-L-E-Y.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you're number 51 on
14	the agenda. Make yourself comfortable.
15	Who's the investigator on the case?
16	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Why did we term?
18	MS. DONALD: Ms. Weekley had been made
19	complete. She was working for a licensee. But we
20	received information shortly after showing that her
21	arrests and convictions were indeed felonies. So her
22	work card was revoked.
23	When we got her fingerprints back, it didn't
24	show on there. But we had received some paperwork
25	showing that it was felonies, she was convicted. She

1	did disclose them. And this was back in 2006.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What are they?
3	MS. WEEKLEY: Credit card fraud and conspiracy,
4	so ID theft.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was that a common case or
6	a separate cases?
7	MS. DONALD: I believe, it was two separate
8	cases. She received three years in prison. Two years
9	were suspended. And then she had some fines as well.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is all this correct,
12	Ms. Weekley?
13	MS. WEEKLEY: Yes, but they were together. It
14	was the same.
15	MS. DONALD: Okay. Yeah.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Same event?
17	MS. DONALD: Two counts.
18	MS. WEEKLEY: Yes.
19	MS. DONALD: Two counts, same case.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there anything that
21	you want to add?
22	MS. WEEKLEY: I just wrote a little note for
23	you guys. As you said, I was charged with credit card
24	fraud and ID theft and conspiracy. That took place in
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1	each charge, and one year and 11 months was suspended,
2	and I did two months at Zephyr County jail.
3	Since the juvenile behavior, I have gotten my
4	associates and majoring in criminal justice, receiving a
5	3.94 GPA. I have not gotten in any trouble since. And
6	I understand this was a criminal act I acted in. And
7	this is, by far, not in my character by any means.
8	And I apologize with all my heart for acting so
9	juvenile. I have learned a lot and been through a lot
10	since this incident. I made it this far after what
11	happened by seeing a psychiatrist for six years and went
12	through anger management at the V.A. Hospital in
13	St. Louis, Missouri. As of today, I've been clean four
14	years, of marijuana.
15	I recently moved to Las Vegas, Nevada so that
16	my daughters could have a better life. Prior to my move
17	to Las Vegas, I worked in a warehouse excuse me.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No problem. Take your
19	time.
20	MS. WEEKLEY: I worked in the warehouse. And
21	I've done everything to my part to be a productive
22	member of society. At my previous employer, I received
23	several recommendations for being outstanding. I was
24	also given many tasks that were outside my job duties
25	and completed them satisfactorily. I was also a

1	dependable employee, having two years of continued
2	perfect attendance. I was a valuable team member.
3	Being short is hindering my ability to provide
4	for my family and take care of our home. I knew there
5	would be consequences for my actions, but I have also
6	completed by sentence satisfactorily. I have also been
7	a law-abiding citizen since this time. I have not
8	gotten in any trouble since, nor have I been in trouble
9	prior to.
10	I hope you grant me my guard card so that I can
11	continue to provide for my family and be an outstanding
12	citizen.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. What was your
14	age when this case got started?
15	MS. WEEKLEY: I was 24, 12 years ago.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 24? Okay.
17	MS. WEEKLEY: 24, 26.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And when were you off
19	paper, totally?
20	MS. WEEKLEY: When I was released, I was able
21	to pay the restitution. And so I wasn't on probation or
22	nothing, they just let me move back home.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And that was when, when
24	was that?
25	MS. WEEKLEY: 2007.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?
2	MS. WEEKLEY: I brung paperwork, if you guys
3	need to see it, also.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's okay.
5	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: The 2009 charge, it says
6	unknown, the disposition is unknown.
7	MS. DONALD: It came back from her fingerprints
8	that she had cannabis, criminal trespass. She did
9	disclose it. She did say both charges were dismissed.
10	There was no disposition on the fingerprints.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other
12	questions?
13	Entertain a motion.
14	I move that Trumyia Weekley, the denial issued
15	be overturned and that she be issued a work card.
16	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll second.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
18	second. Any Board comment or question on the motion?
19	All in favor, say "aye."
20	(Board members said "aye.")
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
22	Passes unanimously. Congratulations.
23	MS. WEEKLEY: Thank you.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you very much.
25	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

1	MS. WEEKLEY: Thank you.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let's see. I'm going to
3	this side of the room now, furthest from the front. Who
4	has been sworn in?
5	Okay. Would you come forward, sir.
6	MR. MORRISSEY: Can I say, I want to give
7	character witness. Can I come up?
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You want to be a witness
9	for him?
10	MR. MORRISSEY: Yes.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you been sworn as
12	well?
13	MR. MORRISSEY: Yes.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Come forward.
15	MR. NAGRAMPA: My name's Arthur Nagrampa,
16	N-A-G-R-A-M-P-A.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have a seat.
18	We're on agenda number 39. Okay. Who was the
19	investigator on this case?
20	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
22	MR. BATCHELOR: Mr. Nagrampa was denied for a
23	1998 alien smuggling conviction, which was a felony.
24	And he was sentenced to 15 months in prison, three years
25	supervised, federal release. That's Mr. Nagrampa's only

1	conviction, in 1998.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was it disclosed?
3	MR. BATCHELOR: No, he did not disclose it.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Could you tell us
5	a little bit of information about the conviction and the
6	reason for the nondisclosure.
7	MR. NAGRAMPA: When I was released, they had
8	sent me a document. So I went to a halfway house and a
9	Shasta court. At that point, I did not know I was
10	convicted of a felony. I thought it was just a just
11	a conviction. My lawyer that represented me never gave
12	me any information. So I had no knowledge if it was a
13	felony or not.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
15	MR. NAGRAMPA: I know I did something wrong. I
16	was convicted, did some time, so. I didn't know what
17	the how bad it was.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What have you done
19	for employment?
20	MR. NAGRAMPA: Since then?
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Since then?
22	MR. NAGRAMPA: Oh, I worked for Miramar Pontiac
23	for like four and a half years. Then an issue for the
24	family when we moved here, a death, like my father
25	passed away. And I started working at Santa Fe's. And

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1	then they did a background check there. And they didn't
2	find anything wrong, there were no convictions. So when
3	I had to fill out the application for this job, I didn't
4	put it down.
5	And I worked at a detail shop. I worked at the
6	theater for a year and a half. And then my mother
7	passed away. And then more issues popped up. And then
8	that's when I got this job at Security Unlimited.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did you have,
10	physically, a sheriff's card or a gaming card?
11	MR. NAGRAMPA: They gave me a work, a
12	registration card thing, a provisional. So if they
13	issued that, why, they should have found something
14	already, right?
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: When did you get that?
16	MR. NAGRAMPA: A month before I started
17	working.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. What
19	about the sheriff's card, the work at the Santa Fe, when
20	did you get that?
21	MR. NAGRAMPA: They didn't give me anything. I
22	just worked there. They just gave me the job. I
23	started working. It was for maintenance.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. The Santa Fe
25	Casino?

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1	MR. NAGRAMPA: Yeah, theater.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Theater. Oh, okay. All
3	right. All right. And, sir, what's your name?
4	MR. MORRISSEY: I'm Vincent Morrissey. But
5	I've lived in Sun City Anthem in Henderson since 2005.
6	And I met Art, we both worked together, 11 years ago.
7	I've known, I've known Art for 11 years. And we worked
8	together at Pat Clark GMC Pontiac dealership. And,
9	eventually, they closed their doors.
10	And the reason I got involved with the security
11	issue is that Art asked me to loan him the money for the
12	investigative background. And I had known previously
13	that he had a conviction in San Diego. He's told me
14	about that years ago. So I asked him, I said, "Was this
15	a felony?" And he said, no, he didn't think it was a
16	felony. And I said he said, "I've never received any
17	documentation. Nobody's ever told me it was a felony."
18	And then I remembered he was working at the
19	Santa Fe Casino, and I said, well, certainly they did a
20	background check on him. So if he had a felony, that
21	would come up.
22	Then I looked at the application, and it said
23	they were really interested in felonies of a serious
24	nature, like maybe a violence or a horrific crime. And
25	what he was involved with wasn't anything like that. So

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1	I felt confident to saying, "You know, I don't think you
2	have a felony." And if there is a problem, it's not a
3	serious felony like what they're concerned about on his
4	application. So he put it in.
5	And what he started, he what I can tell you
6	about Art is he's just an easygoing guy. He's I've
7	never seen him angry, upset. I wish I could be like
8	that. You know, things don't bother him. He takes life
9	as it comes.
10	And he hasn't been blessed like most of in
11	life. He's presently on welfare. He's got he's back
12	on his to pay his child support. He's going to be
13	homeless in a few days if he can't find employment.
14	It's hard for him to find employment, in the economy
15	that it was. It's better now.
16	But he the security job is important, not
17	only because of the financial aspect, but it gave him
18	pride, and he felt like he was accomplishing something.
19	And it was evidenced in his job performance. In fact,
20	he's got a job waiting for him at Unlimited Security.
21	If he can get reinstated, he can go back to work
22	immediately. Other, when he was on the site, other
23	people, other companies would offer him positions based
24	on his performance.
25	And I'm asking, I'm begging that he can get

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1	back into the security work, which he's good at, he can
2	do, and he can get back to being a productive citizen in
3	society, get off welfare and pay his bills.
4	And I thank you for listening, and I thank you
5	for your consideration.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
7	Is there anything else you'd like to add,
8	Mr. Nagrampa?
9	MR. NAGRAMPA: No. No, sir.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any questions?
11	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'll entertain a
13	motion.
14	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'm going move to go
15	ahead and uphold the appeal and issue Mr. Nagrampa,
16	Arthur Nagrampa his work card.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Uphold the appeal?
18	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: No, I'm sorry. Overturn
19	the appeal.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
21	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Sorry.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No problem. There's a
23	motion to overturn the appeal, the denial. Is there a
24	second?
25	I'll second. There's a motion and a second to

1	overturn the denial. Any Board questions or comments on
2	the motion?
3	All in favor of the motion, say "aye." Aye.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Aye.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed, say "no."
6	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.
7	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Two to two. So the
9	motion fails. You're welcome to reapply in a year.
10	MR. NAGRAMPA: Thank you.
11	MR. MORRISSEY: Thank you.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you very much.
13	Let's see. Next, who's been sworn on this side
14	of the room? Sir, please.
15	MR. WALLACE: My name is Chris Wallace. Last
16	name is W-A-L-L-A-C-E.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Have a chair.
18	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And which item do we have
20	here?
21	MS. DONALD: 49.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 49. Who's the
23	investigator?
24	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Why did we deny

1	Mr. Wallace?
2	MS. DONALD: We denied Mr. Wallace. He stated
3	he served five months in federal custody and was
4	sentenced to five years probation for an embezzlement or
5	misapplication by a bank employee. He was convicted of
6	a felony. He did disclose this. This was in 2002.
7	And then, additionally, in 2006, he was
8	arrested and convicted of domestic violence. He was
9	fined, had to do some community service. So he is not
10	firearm-eligible. And he did not disclose that.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Wallace,
12	you're familiar with what she's
13	MR. WALLACE: Yes.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: talked about?
15	MR. WALLACE: If I could first just introduce
16	myself. My name is Chris Wallace. I just moved here
17	from the Syracuse, New York area and Auburn, New York.
18	I moved out of Las Vegas in 2011. I've lived in
19	Las Vegas from 2000 all the way to 2011. I moved to
20	Syracuse, because my mother, she was dying of a liver
21	she had liver cancer. And she passed away in 2012. So
22	I moved here to take care of her.
23	Since my conviction, I've worked for the State
24	of New York, for the Office of Children and Family
25	Services. It was a juvenile probation and juvenile

1 detention center. I worked there for two years. I also 2 ran a group home for another two years out there in that 3 area.

The reason why I didn't disclose the domestic violence now is because, when they did the extensive background check, the judge said after five years that that would come off my case.

8 The reason, what happened on that is I've never 9 done drugs a day in my life. My girlfriend at the time 10 had drugs at the house. And I was on federal probation. 11 I was ending the relationship. And the reason, the 12 reason the domestic violence came in, in fact, I was 13 holding her down on my bed because she was trying to cut 14 her wrists.

And the reason why I went to jail is because they came, they knew I was on federal probation. I was the one that called the police. I called the police because, number one, I knew the drugs were in the house. Number two, I was holding her down on her will because I didn't want her to kill herself. And our daughter was in the home.

So they took me, they took to jail. The next day, my probation officer got me out. Within two weeks after that, I got off federal probation completely. The judge asked me do I want to do a deferred program? I

1	said, sure, I'll do a deferred program. I took the
2	classes. I successfully completed that. He said within
3	five years it'll be off my record.
4	When I applied in New York, that did not come
5	up at all. And I did disclose, you know, that I did go
6	to federal prison for stealing the money from the bank.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
8	MR. WALLACE: Currently here, I'm working for
9	Pepsi through Kelly Services. So I work at 4:00 a.m.
10	till about 2:30 in the morning. So I did go to work
11	last night and just came here this morning so I could be
12	here in front of you guys.
13	I also coach a semi-pro professional team here,
14	the Las Vegas Spartans. We have about 45 guys that have
15	been in and out of jail and getting in off the streets.
16	And I'm just trying to keep them positive and keep them
17	away from doing violent things.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.
19	Any questions?
20	Your lack of disclosure on the 2006 domestic
21	battery was because you
22	MR. WALLACE: I thought it came off my record
23	and it wasn't going to be disclosed. I would have, you
24	know, came forthright and told them. Because the only
25	problem I've ever had was the one I was convicted for,

1	that I went to federal prison for. The reason being,
2	that I went they didn't say it was domestic violence,
3	that I went that way, because I was on federal
4	probation. And, but I did admit, I did, held her down,
5	to keep her from killing herself, yes, sir.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And there was no
7	conviction on the battery?
8	MS. DONALD: There was.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There was?
10	MS. DONALD: Yes, he was convicted. It was a
11	misdemeanor. So he is not firearm-eligible.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other
13	questions?
14	Hear a motion.
15	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Wallace
16	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.
17	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: you heard my prior
18	comments with the other applicants. Two things the
19	Board looks at is forthcoming
20	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.
21	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: as well as the recency.
22	I appreciate your comments. That's a serious charge.
23	Please understand. And I respect your opinion. But
24	that's your opinion. And I'm sure the other party has
25	another opinion, as well as the courts, for you to be

1	convicted.
2	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.
3	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: If you come back in a year
4	and you disclose everything, I will think completely
5	different than I'm thinking today.
6	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.
7	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That is a serious charge,
8	especially before this licensing Board, concerning the
9	type industry that we're in.
10	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.
11	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So I'll make a motion to
12	deny the appeal based on the recommendation of staff.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Is
14	there a second?
15	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
17	questions or comments on the motion?
18	All in favor of the motion, say "aye."
19	(Board members said "aye.")
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
21	Passes unanimously. The denial is upheld.
22	Thank you.
23	MR. WALLACE: You said I can reapply, you said,
24	in about a year?
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: In a year. That's the

1 statute. 2 MR. WALLACE: Okay. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: In a year, you can be reconsidered anew. 4 MR. WALLACE: All right. Thank you. 5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you. 6 7 MR. WALLACE: Thank you for your time. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: On this side of the room, 8 who's already been sworn? Come forward, please. 9 MR. ELIAS: I'm Mark Mendoza Elias, E-L-I-A-S. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Have a chair, 11 12 please. 13 I've got a notice for me to check on a 14 conflict, because, I think, this is the applicant. 15 Did you start to go to work for Zane Investigations? 16 MR. ELIAS: No, for Speedy Recovery. 17 MR. INGRAM: It's 30. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, 30. I got you mixed 19 20 up with somebody else. Okay. Never mind, then. You're 21 not the right guy. BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: What's your name again? 22 MR. ELIAS: Elias, E-L-I-A-S, Mark Mendoza 23 24 Elias. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's where we were at. 25

1	The reason, the reason that there's some
2	confusion here is I, as a member, am in the industry.
3	And there was an employee who was, apparently, hired by
4	my company, whose work card was denied. And in order
5	for me to determine if I have a conflict of interest
6	apparently, we were fined by the PILB. And we,
7	apparently, paid the citation. And, but I need to just
8	make sure that I don't have a conflict with whoever it
9	is that is at issue.
10	MR. INGRAM: My apologies.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So that's why the
12	question. Because at that point in time, I've got to
13	determine whether or not I should vote on that
14	particular thing. And I thought it was you. No
15	problem.
16	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So we're good on this one.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, I am. I mean I am
18	so I can vote.
19	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: He's not the conflict.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: He's not the conflict,
21	yeah.
22	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. I was a little
23	confused.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
25	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So we're on number 30.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sorry about that.
2	MR. ELIAS: I was nervous for a while, but.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Who was the
4	investigator on the case?
5	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.
6	Mr. Elias was denied for a 2012 carrying a concealed
7	weapon conviction. It was a misdemeanor. He received
8	60 days in jail, a fine, and had to forfeit the weapon.
9	And, also, in 2010, he was convicted of
10	possession of drugs. And for that, he received
11	community service and counseling.
12	And, also, Mr. Elias received a DUI, 2013.
13	All misdemeanors. And he did list all three
14	convictions on his application.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So the denial was based
16	upon course and conduct?
17	MR. BATCHELOR: Based on a weapons conviction.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: On the weapons
19	conviction. Okay.
20	Mr. Elias, can you tell us about any of these
21	charges?
22	MR. ELIAS: Well, with the drug charges and all
23	that, at the time I was unemployed. I was a little
24	young, just making mistakes in life. That changed.
25	I've been seven years clean, off drugs, did a little 360

1	with my life.
2	With the weapon charge, I got off work. I was
3	work with Bumper Medic. One of my employees couldn't
4	find my box cutters, so my boss gave me just a
5	pocketknife, so opened up boxes to do the bumpers and
6	paint them on put them on cars. I forgot I had it in my
7	pocket.
8	That night, we went out for an employee
9	birthday. And one of the guys, there was a little
10	scuffle with security. But we were trying to break it
11	up, but they called the cops. And I totally forgot I
12	had it. And which I went to court. The bouncers forgot
13	to search me for weapons. And they ended up guarding
14	it, the charge, you know, with all that stuff there.
15	And I just did all my time and all that.
16	But since then, the last charge I had, I moved
17	out to California, got homeless for a while. My brother
18	and my mom kicked me out, just drugs and all that. I
19	was homeless. My dad found me, got me a job out there.
20	I worked for Kanapis, and then I worked for Shelfsville
21	and Louie's Landscaping. I lost my job at Shelfsville
22	about a year ago because of just low, low timing. I was
23	just a helper at the time. And then my brother got a
24	job back here. So we moved back here.
25	And I recently got hired at Speedy Recovery,

1	which is a family friend that owns it, a repo place. I
2	was working in the yard. But they had to let me go
3	because I didn't have a word card. And they didn't
4	think I needed a work card to work in the yard, which is
5	cleaning vehicles out and getting the property back.
6	And so that's why I'm here today.
7	But since then, I've changed a lot of things in
8	my life. I'm paying child support, getting custody back
9	of my daughter. I finally got my own apartment, finally
10	got a car. And I just changed a lot. Because I had to
11	give up the drugs and alcohol, because I almost died
12	from pneumonia. I got lime disease. So my doctor said
13	I can't do none of that stuff no more. I can't eat the
14	way I was eating. I just changed a lot of things, the
15	way I was living. So.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what about the
17	DUI?
18	MR. ELIAS: The DUI, which one, 2013?
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.
20	MR. ELIAS: That one, no. No, well the one in
21	California they said not to well, I listed it. But,
22	I think, that's the one. The 2010 was a drug and DUI.
23	The one, that one was just I had a couple beers, and I
24	was driving home, and then, when I got pulled over for
25	an illegal U-turn, I was like 1.0 over. And they were

1	reing to let me go because I record all the tests but
1	going to let me go, because I passed all the tests, but
2	it was already called in. I went in. They let me go
3	about an hour later. I did all that, paid all the fines
4	on that, too.
5	But since them, I've cleaned off everything.
6	I've changed my whole thing around. I'm doing none of
7	that stuff no more. I got a girlfriend, and I got my
8	two stepsons. And then, right now, I'm trying to get
9	custody of my daughter back. So, in our household, my
10	girlfriend really doesn't allow alcohol or nothing like
11	that. So.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Okay. Any other
13	Board questions?
14	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair, I have a
15	question directed to Director Ingram.
16	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.
17	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Do we have the ability to
18	limit the work card? The applicant's stating that he
19	does work in a licensed business, but his scope of
20	responsibility is strictly in the car yard. He's not
21	repo'ing. He's not exercising as a security officer or
22	a repossessor with the public.
23	MR. INGRAM: In the past, the Board has placed
24	limits on a work card. And at that time, legal counsel
25	believed that that was okay. The examples that I'll

1	give you that the Board has limited work cards has not
2	been something similar to this. It's been an individual
3	who was a peace officer status wanting to do nothing
4	more than mystery shopping, which was not seen as a
5	conflict with their duties as a peace officer.
6	So those are the only limits placed on work
7	cards that I'm currently aware of in the four and a half
8	years that I've been the Executive Director.
9	Counsel, do you have any input on that?
10	MS. BORDELOVE: I would say, without some
11	further review, which I can do if necessary, but the
12	caution I would put on the limit is it it goes beyond
13	what the license is probably described as in your
14	statutes. And I don't know that the Board wants to walk
15	down the road of this, essentially, creating a different
16	type of license by limiting, by granting an existing
17	license with limits.
18	It can open all a lot of doors to needing to do
19	that in the future for any number of things, as well as
20	having that license. I'm concerned, I guess, with some
21	of the enforcement, because the license itself is
22	specified by statute as allowing a certain thing. And
23	I'm not sure exactly how the Board can curtail what is
24	allowed.
25	MR. INGRAM: That would be the only other

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1	comment I would make, Board Member Flynn, is that if a
2	work card is limited, we, as Board staff, don't have an
3	ability to monitor or flag if somebody was to go to work
4	for another agency doing, you know, unlimited, either
5	security work, private investigations, repossessor. The
6	onus would be on the individual with the card to notify
7	us. But we would really have no way of monitoring that.
8	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So if they applied for
9	a if they go to work for another company, they don't
10	have to report that to the P.I. Board?
11	MR. INGRAM: Well, the licensee is responsible
12	for updating their roster.
13	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: But not the employee?
14	MR. INGRAM: But not the employee, correct.
15	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. That
16	answered it. Thank you.
17	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: How long have you been
18	on probation for the DUI charge?
19	MR. ELIAS: In '13, they never put me on
20	probation. It just, it was just pay the fines, and that
21	was it. The probation one in 2010, it was a community
22	service, and I did a little bit of time, and then they
23	released me after I paid all my fines and all that.
24	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Because the record is
25	indicating that there was a three-year probation for

1	2013, which would have been 2016.
2	MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, that's what the
3	fingerprints state. It was stopped in municipal court,
4	and his conviction, probation, three years probation,
5	fine, restitution, for a .08 DUI in 2013.
6	MR. ELIAS: I paid all the fines and all that.
7	They never I never checked on it. Nobody, they never
8	told me nothing. They just said keep paying, go
9	downtown, pay, pay, pay. And after I paid, it was done.
10	MR. SALADINO: We have seen that to be very
11	common in California. They do a thing called informal
12	probation, whereas it's noted in the courts, but there's
13	no probation officer to check in with. It's just noted
14	in the courts that it's an informal probation. And, you
15	know, it just kind of
16	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: It's not a supervised
17	probation or anything like that?
18	MR. SALADINO: Right, yeah, it's not
19	supervised. They call it informal.
20	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay.
21	MR. ELIAS: They just enforce it when I don't
22	pay. Like if I don't pay, then they'll come. But once
23	the payments keep going, going, they're just paid off
24	until you're done with it.
25	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?
2	Entertain a motion.
3	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I'll make a motion.
4	Mr. Elias, I was hoping that we could do something
5	different. But I can't, based on statute. And you
6	heard the comments earlier about forthcoming and
7	recency. And you were forthcoming. But I'd like to see
8	more time and distance.
9	I hope that you're involved in a program.
10	Because you just don't quit that kind of behavior. And
11	if you're not, take my words to heart.
12	And then I will support staff and deny the
13	appeal. That's my motion.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.
15	Do we have a second?
16	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
17	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any questions or comments
19	on the motion?
20	All in favor, say "aye."
21	(Board members said "aye.")
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
23	No.
24	You're eligible to reapply in a year.
25	MR. ELIAS: Thank you.

BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you. 1 2 MR. ELIAS: Thank you. You guys have a nice day. 3 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: You, too. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. On this side 5 of the room, who's been sworn? 6 7 MR. INGRAM: It looks like everybody. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anybody, anybody on that 8 side of the room been sworn? 9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: The gentleman in the 10 plaid's been here since this morning. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please. I'm sorry. Can 12 1.3 you tell us your name, please? 14 MR. AYALA: My name is Alfred Ayala. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And how do you spell your last name? 16 MR. AYALA: A-Y-A-L-A. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 20? 18 MR. SALADINO: 28. 19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 28 on the 20 21 agenda. Who's the investigator? MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And why did we deny 23 24 Mr. Ayala? MR. SALADINO: The application, or the 2.5

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applicant was denied for a couple felony, or
convictions, 1993, 1994 and 1996. He did list a 2010
DUI that was dismissed. In 1992, he was arrested for a
misdemeanor, taking a vehicle without the owner's
consent, obstruct with an officer. The first charge,
for taking the vehicle, was three years probation. The
second charge states probation.
Then, on December 23rd of 1992, he was
convicted of taking a vehicle without the owner's
consent and receiving stolen property. The receiving
stolen property was a felony. He received three years
in prison.
And January 21st, 1996, again for taking a
vehicle without the owner's consent, another felony, 16
months in prison.
A December 7th, 1999, felon in possession of a
firearm. The court showed that he was eligible for
parole on that one out of San Bernardino.
And then on February 6th of 2006, he was
arrested for possession of burglary tools, which was a
misdemeanor, and the courts did dismiss that.
The applicant did list a 2010 DUI out of
Las Vegas, which was dismissed, but did not disclose the
past criminal history.

1	Mr. Ayala, well, why didn't you put down the
2	'90s stuff when you made your application?
3	MR. AYALA: It was so far back, it was like 20
4	years ago, so I they said just put the recent, that's
5	seven years back. That's what the office told me. So
6	what I put down was driving, the reckless driving, you
7	know, while I was DUI, I was drunk. But I put the
8	reckless driving. That's what I put.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. When you said when
10	the office told you, what office was that?
11	MR. AYALA: It was when I applied for the
12	license.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It was a state office or
14	for an employer?
15	MR. AYALA: For the licensing board. I went up
16	there, and when I went and did everything, she told me
17	just put down seven years. So what I did is I put
18	down that's what I put. Because it was within seven
19	years. That's what I had had.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. So
21	what do you recall about the '93, '94 and '96 cases?
22	MR. AYALA: Oh, that was, that was so I was
23	so dumb, you know. I'm a lot different. It's been 20
24	years ago. I've been working for Fiberact Construction
25	for 10 years, doing underground water pipes for the

1	government and for the state. And for the state, I
2	recently gave it up on December 23rd, last year. I work
3	for Lowe's now. I'm 100 percent, totally, totally
4	different, you know. Stealing cars is like a it's a
5	totally it's a joke to me, because I'm totally
6	different. I'm just, I'm all about working and
7	providing for my kids and prospering in life.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other
9	questions?
10	Entertain a motion.
11	I'll move that we uphold the denial of
12	Alfred A. Ayala. That's my motion.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. There's a motion
17	and a second. Any Board questions or comments?
18	The reason that I voted to uphold the denial
19	was for the application process is reasonably clear that
20	all arrests and convictions are to be disclosed so they
21	can be adequately considered. And there is nothing in
22	the process that indicates time. And, you know, since
23	there was no disclosure, we can only take the position
24	that we were probably being misled about the criminal
25	history. So my motion is based upon the fact that the

felony cases, even though they were that old, were not 1 2 disclosed. 3 Any other Board questions, comments on the motion? 4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: 5 No. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All in favor of 6 7 the motion, say "aye." (Board members said "aye.") 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no." 9 Passes unanimously. You're eligible to come 10 back in a year and reapply. Disclose everything. 11 MR. AYALA: All right. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. 14 Anybody else on -- I'm sorry, sir. Come on 15 forward. Thank you. MR. MAGEE: My name is Tyjohn Magee. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Tyjohn? 17 MR. MAGEE: Tyjohn McGee. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 19 MR. MAGEE: And I do have some character 20 21 letters. I'd like to speak on my own behalf, but I do have -- I also brought an employer, my fiancee. And I 22 do want to say that I was --23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have a seat. 24 MR. MAGEE: When I filled out the application, 2.5

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1	I filled out the application to the best of my
2	knowledge. I put down the felonies. I put down some
3	arrests. But I wasn't for sure like what date and time,
4	whatnot, or what the allegations were. So I just wrote
5	like "by" or whatever, or something. But that was just
6	in case there was something that's like missing. It
7	wasn't intentional as far as not being forthcoming.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Who was the
9	investigator?
10	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
12	MS. DONALD: At the time, we had very limited
13	information on his arrests. But since then, we have
14	received the fingerprints back. Let me see here. He
15	did disclose several of them. He was convicted of a
16	felony robbery in 1996, felony grand theft in 1995,
17	felony forgery in 1995, and then, in '93, carrying a
18	loaded firearm in a public place.
19	He disclosed those four arrests. The firearm,
20	we don't know if it was a misdemeanor or a felony. The
21	other three were felonies.
22	However, when we got his fingerprints back, he
23	had several arrests that he didn't disclose from the
24	2000s, starting with March of 2000, domestic violence,
25	disposition unknown.

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1	2001 domestic violence. His probation was
2	terminated at that time.
3	2001, domestic violence, disposition unknown.
4	2003, contempt, disobeying court order, one
5	count of the threatening, crime with intent to
6	terrorize. The prosecution rejected that for lack of
7	evidence.
8	2003, driving while intoxicated. No
9	disposition.
10	2003, assault four, guilty, 90 days jail, with
11	the jail sentence being suspended for 89 days, and he
12	had a fine as well.
13	2004, he had another assault four. That was
14	dismissed.
15	2007, driving under the influence and reckless
16	driving. He was convicted of the DUI. The reckless
17	driving was dismissed.
18	And 2008, driving under the influence, guilty,
19	jailed and fined on that one.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: None of those were
21	disclosed?
22	MS. DONALD: No.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. McGee, what
24	reason would there be for the lack of disclosure in that
25	2000 range?

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	Because there was the two parts to the application. And
	because energy and energy parts to energy privation.
3	it was where it says felony arrests, and I remember on
4	the application that's where I list those. And those
5	are the only ones that's coming up right now that I put
6	on the application.
7	But there was a separate part, all things that
8	you have been arrested for, and I put, disclosed
9	everything else that I had been arrested for on the
10	second part, which is a whole nother paragraph. And
11	that's the part that's missing.
12	And I don't know. That's the part that I was
13	explaining in the beginning. Because there was two
14	parts. There was two different parts to that
15	application. And I'm sure, I thought I put something
16	in, I put something, because I scribbled over to the
17	corner and everything. Those charges right there was
18	just the felony part, that first paragraph.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
20	MR. MAGEE: That's all.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did he do a hard, hard
22	application, on paper?
	MS. DONALD: That I'm not sure. I don't have
23	MS. DONALD. THAT I M HOT SUIE. I GON C HAVE
	the copy if he did it. I do know what I wrote down, the

1	he had disclosed some. And those were the felonies.
2	Other than the carrying a loaded firearm.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. But in the
4	application format, is the next box something
5	additional, as he's just said?
6	MS. DONALD: Well, all it asks, felonies, gross
7	misdemeanors. At the bottom, list all other arrests, is
8	what it says.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
10	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair?
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sir?
12	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I have a question. Do we
13	have a copy of what he's alleging?
14	MS. SALADINO: We're getting it right now.
15	WOMAN IN LAS VEGAS: I have one right here.
16	MS. DONALD: Well, we need to see the things.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
18	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I've got questions.
19	Looking and hearing about your background, there's two
20	issues. One, you went through a criminal phase in,
21	obviously, 2000 that weren't good in your personal life.
22	So you've had some issues. Do you want to address all
23	of those for me?
24	MR. MAGEE: Okay. When I was, when I was
25	younger, in the situation with the felonies, I was being

1 responsible for my little brother and my little sister,
2 and my sister was -- and my sister was caring for more
3 than one child. And I made some drastic, bad decisions.
4 And I own that. I made that mistake.

And I also pled guilty because, a lot of times, 5 you know, the -- like the robbery was somebody owed me 6 7 money, and then, but it became we threatened each other. And I have it, I have my -- it's not even stipulated in 8 the sheetwork, but I had a child with me at the time, 9 and I was with a girlfriend, and I had her child with 10 me. And I wanted to protect to make sure nothing 11 happened to this child. 12

13 Because in the neighborhood where we were at, there was gang violence over there, and you don't 14 15 threatened nobody. And the guy that it was -- and, basically, the guy had a gun. But I took the gun from 16 the guy, which is not stipulated. And that was part of 17 the reason why I was arrested. I took the gun. I took 18 And then he left the bike, or whatever, and I just it. 19 20 drove off and went home. But I punched him to protect, 21 to keep him from -- I seen a bulge in his shirt.

And that was the circumstance. I pled guilty because that whatever, the lawyer told me that there was no way, because there was no witness in my behalf. The witnesses seen me punch him first. And it was my word

1	against his. So I pled guilty. I didn't know it was
2	going to hinder my life for the rest of my life.
3	The receiving, I seen the car. I got in the
4	car. It was a car with the keys in it. I got in the
5	car, and I drove, and I was driving, I was joyriding.
6	The forgery, I took some checks that somebody
7	gave to me, and they told me, "Oh, you can just put
8	these in your bank, and we can get some money." I put
9	those checks in my account. I made that mistake trying
10	to get some money off the bank, needed some money.
11	And listening to the wrong crowd, being around
12	the wrong people, and other circumstances, was just to
13	provide and look after. Here I am, going through foster
14	homes and stuff, and didn't have no at the time,
15	which I didn't even know I had, I didn't even know what
16	I needed to get a job, or whatever.
17	Once I got out of prison, I had to relearn how
18	to live over again, with a felony, and then it was
19	frustrating, wanting a job. I went and applied to temp
20	services. The temp services, I couldn't even move
21	furniture when I got out of prison, because it goes to
22	residences.
23	So, but since then, I've got arrested and
24	everything. The DUI, the other question that you asked
25	me, that situation was I was on parole.

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1	And one, the assault, later, that came in 2000,
2	that one was I was at a bar. I was at a bar. But
3	previous, I was with my ex-fiancee from California. We
4	got married to start our life over, got back together,
5	rejoined from when I went to prison, before I went to
6	prison. And her ex-boyfriend, or whatever, that didn't
7	want to take and back off, we was at the bar, or
8	whatever. We had been drinking. And the guy started
9	showing out, or whatever. And we was standing
10	face-to-face, and I punched him because I thought he was
11	going to punch me.
12	I previously had a C1-C2 fractured neck. So I
13	can't take no blow to the neck. It would paralyze me.
14	I'm already temporarily paralyzed down my right side.
15	So I acted out in defense in that. And I regret it, of
16	course.
17	And then they put me in alcohol they put me
18	in alcohol assessments, which I passed. And then I
19	volunteered to go into outpatient, outpatient treatment,
20	or whatever, for alcohol awareness. And, plus, because
21	of the DUI, or whatnot, I went on and went and did
22	everything to assess myself to see if I had begun to
23	start picking up with an alcohol problem.
24	And, but the domestic violence and everything
25	for the rest of a lot of those charges are dismissed,

1	or whatnot, is because my ex-girlfriend, she would
2	quickly call the police when she would see me with
3	another female and have me arrested. And then I'd go to
4	court, and then they get dropped. And then I'd go to
5	court again, and then they get dropped. It took I
6	mean, and that's because I was in Washington state, and
7	the state passed a law that if they come out for a
8	domestic call, somebody has to go to jail regardless.
9	So that was the situation.
10	But since then and my fiancee's here. And I
11	have been seeing her for over five years. I've been
12	heavily involved, you know, in church and ministry and
13	stuff like that.
14	And I've been to counseling, self, put myself,
15	volunteered to counseling, for one, not to only deal
16	with my childhood, but to also deal with my also to
17	deal with my being disabled. Because when I was in a
18	car accident in 2004, that severed the rest of my spine,
19	and things. And it took a lot to overcome that.
20	Then I lost a daughter in 2012. And that's
21	when I left Vegas and then decided to come back, after I
22	went back to Seattle and came back here.
23	And since I've been in Las Vegas, I have not
24	been in no more trouble, since I had a bad relationship
25	and knowing now what a domestic relationship, signs of a

domestic relationship, from getting counseling, and 1 2 stuff like that. I've also got an associate's degree. I had 3 enrolled in my bachelor's, but it got too expensive. Ι 4 have the financial aid I got to pay back. 5 I've been working for a couple of different 6 7 places, call centers and stuff like that. But I realized that call centers is not for me. It's kind of 8 hard for me, you know, when people are being 9 disrespectful on the phone. Like one time, I was being 10 disrespected on the phone, and I just couldn't take no 11 more, and the supervisor wasn't -- nobody was around. 12 13 So I just hung up the phone. I warned, I told him more than several times I would hang up the phone. 14 I hung up the phone and everything. But, unfortunately, it put me 15 on the final for me to be dismissed from my call center 16 job. 17 And I've always been a -- I want to, I want to, 18 I really just want to give back to the community from --19 20 you know, give back to the community by protecting those 21 that's trying to do something in the community. And that's all I ever do, is to protect my family, but I 22 want to do it in the right way and be licensed. I know 23 I can't carry a concealed weapon. And, therefore, you 24 know, I've been a bouncer before, you know, voluntarily, 2.5

1	at bars and stuff like that in the past.
2	But did that answer your question, sir?
3	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes. Thank you.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you have the
5	application?
6	MS. DONALD: It looks like the 2000 battery was
7	listed.
8	MR. MAGEE: I do like to say, my charges, most
9	of my charges, the felonies and stuff, was 20 years ago.
10	These charges, the actual, the actual charge, as far as
11	recent, for the most, it was 2003, or whatever, for DUI.
12	That was, that was somewhat of a sacrosentence with the
13	DUI, when I got convicted with that, because I left my
14	drink unattended, and when I left. Because I was
15	working on cars and stuff back then. It was a hobby.
16	And I was showing off my car and stuff. And I left my
17	drink in the bar. And, but it wasn't able to be proven
18	in court that I was also drugged.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
20	MR. MAGEE: And the police officer told me to
21	drive off while I was in the driver's seat laying back
22	in the seat. And I only lived three blocks away. So I
23	tried to attempt to drive. I do recall I was speeding,
24	because I was rushing. But when the officer pulled me
25	over, I actually blacked out and fell out of the car.

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1	And they actually arrested me, fingerprinted, processed
2	me, and brought me back home, because they said I was
3	coherent. But I wasn't. It was too dangerous for me to
4	be locked up at the time. But by the time they gave me
5	a court date to go in, there was nothing in my blood.
6	So.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
8	MR. INGRAM: We have an update on the
9	application, if you'd like to hear it.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.
11	MS. DONALD: Okay. So we have a copy of what
12	he wrote down. He did disclose the 2003, 2004 assault.
13	However, the other ones from 2000 were not disclosed.
14	And he disclosed all the felonies.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
16	MS. DONALD: From the '90s.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
18	questions?
19	Okay. It would be up to you if you'd like
20	somebody to speak about your character at this juncture,
21	if you want to call somebody, or.
22	MR. MAGEE: Yes. I would like to call my
23	fiancee, for one, because the domestic, I know that if
24	you can't handle your household and dealing in
25	relationships

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: M-hm (affirmative).
2	MR. MAGEE: that I would like for her to
3	come up and speak on my behalf of how I am and how I
4	deal with a personal relationship.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
6	MR. MAGEE: Her name is Danielle.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Danielle, will you come
8	forward.
9	MR. INGRAM: She did not stand when being
10	sworn.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
12	MS. BORDELOVE: I can swear her in now, though.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll need to swear you
14	in so you can give sworn testimony. All right. Raise
15	your right hand, please.
16	MS. BORDELOVE: Do you swear that the testimony
17	you're about to give and the truth, the whole truth, and
18	nothing but the truth?
19	MS. SCOTT: Yes.
20	MS. BORDELOVE: Thank you.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us your name
22	and spell your last name?
23	MS. SCOTT: My name is Danielle, excuse me,
24	Danielle Scott, S-C-O-T-T.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what can you

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1	tell us about your fiance?
2	MS. SCOTT: He's a really good guy. I wrote a
3	letter in reference to him. But he has a two-year-old
4	daughter. He her father is in her life, and he
5	stepped up before we went, we came together, but as the
6	role of her father.
7	Currently, I'm five months pregnant, you know.
8	And we're trying to build you know, like a family
9	structure, you know, a home and, you know, a mother and
10	father, two-parent home, you know, to try to kind of
11	beat out the statistics.
12	I'm working and paying by myself as of right
13	now. And it does get hard. And I know he feels it as
14	well. I come home, I'm tired, and I still got to do it
15	every day. He helps a lot by taking my daughter to
16	school. I have to be at work at 5:30 in the morning.
17	He gets up, gets her dressed. And he still goes out and
18	try to, you know, either look for jobs or, you know, to
19	help me, to help his, you know, other friends and that
20	own the businesses, to input something, to build.
21	And it would make it a lot easier if he was
22	granted, because it wouldn't be just on me. It would be
23	a two-person household. And, you know, that's all we're
24	trying to do is build.
25	And I know he's humble from his past

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1	experiences, and it made him, it gave him more of a
2	drive to do what's right, you know. He talks about, you
3	know, a career. You know, he wants to we want to go
4	into real estate. And we want to do group homes for,
5	you know, troubled kids and, you know, people in and
6	out, you know, the system, you know, to help.
7	So he's a good guy, and he's just really just
8	looking for that, that one chance to start over.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.
10	Do you have anybody else?
11	MR. MAGEE: Yes. I'd like to call Scott.
12	MR. GATEWOOD: How are you doing? Scott
13	Gatewood. I haven't been sworn in.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Come forward,
15	please.
16	MR. GATEWOOD: Thank you.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have to have you get
18	close enough where the microphone can pick you up good.
19	MR. GATEWOOD: Sure. I'm the licensee for Cobb
20	Security. I just, I've known Tyjohn since two
21	thousand
22	MS. BORDELOVE: We need to swear him in.
23	MR. GATEWOOD: What's it?
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We got to get you sworn
25	in.

1 MR. GATEWOOD: Oh, sure. MS. BORDELOVE: Raise your right hand. 2 3 MR. GATEWOOD: Yes. MS. BORDELOVE: Do you swear that the testimony 4 you're about to give is the truth, the whole truth, and 5 nothing but the truth? 6 7 MR. GATEWOOD: I do. MS. BORDELOVE: Thank you. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And can yo spell your 9 last name for the stenographer? 10 MR. GATEWOOD: Yes. Gatewood, G-A-T-E-W-O-O-D. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Go ahead. 12 MR. GATEWOOD: Okay. 13 I'd just like to say that I've known Tyjohn since 2006. I know him to be one of 14 the most honest, trustworthy people, with just a great 15 temperament. And he's great with children. I know him 16 to be a hardworking man, an honest man. I truly believe 17 that he's changed his life. I believe in second 18 chances. And the person that I know is one of the 19 20 people that I trust more than anyone else that I can think of. 21 So I can attest to his character. And I'd 22 appreciate the Board's consideration on our behalf. 23 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you. 2.5 MR. GATEWOOD: Thank you.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
2	questions?
3	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any motion?
5	What number are we at?
6	MR. INGRAM: It's 37.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It's 37. Okay. I move
8	that we overturn the denial and issue a card to Tyjohn
9	McGee. Is there a second?
10	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Any
12	Board comment on the motion?
13	All in favor, say "aye."
14	(Board members said "aye.")
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
16	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. They'll issue you
18	a card.
19	MR. MAGEE: I just want to say thank you, and I
20	really appreciate the opportunity to come in, just go to
21	work, so I can take care, take care of my family.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, likewise, we're
23	putting a lot of faith and hope in you that you don't
24	prove us to be fools.
25	MR. MAGEE: I promise.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
2	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.
3	MS. SCOTT: Thank you.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anybody else that's been
5	sworn in? Please come forward.
6	Make yourself comfortable.
7	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Good afternoon. My name's
8	Ruben Rodriguez, last name R-O-D-R-I-G-U-E-Z.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Who's the
10	investigator?
11	MR. WOODRUFF: Investigator Woodruff in the
12	north.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what can you tell us
14	about the denial?
15	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Well
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's him.
17	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Sorry.
18	MR. WOODRUFF: I denied this applicant based on
19	his January 13th, 2013 conviction of domestic battery
20	based on two reasons. First, the completion of the
21	sentencing requirements was within three years. And,
22	secondly, the severity of the actions performed by
23	Mr. Rodriguez were significant.
24	So I ran Mr. Rodriguez on SCOPE, and it listed
25	the disposition on February 12th, 2014 as found guilty,

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1	but nothing more.
2	Based on the date within three years, I
3	requested court documents and the police report from
4	Mr. Rodriguez. I reviewed the court documents and the
5	police report. The police report recapped the morning
6	in question and the interaction with Mr. Rodriguez's
7	roommate. One sentence caught my attention. The report
8	stated that Ruben began to yell that he was the
9	ineligible of God and that his corpse will be rotting as
10	he watches from above.
11	After reviewing all the documents I was
12	provided, I denied the applicant.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Rodriguez, do
14	you remember the case in particular?
15	MR. RODRIGUEZ: I really don't. Because I was
16	incredibly inebriated at the time. I'm a completely
17	different person now.
18	The reason why I'm here is because, because of
19	the application, I've been offered a promotion in my
20	current job right now. Been working at a this
21	third-party company that staffs all the production and
22	events staff for live music venues in the city. And I
23	need a PILB card for that.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
25	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Since then, prior to that, I've

1	maintained a job at the Clark County Parks and
2	Recreation Department for a few years now.
3	I understand I made a huge mistake that night
4	going out and partying too hard. I'm a completely
5	different person now. I'm just trying to be a
6	respectable person of society. I feel, with this job,
7	not only would I get more work, but further my career.
8	And I seem to like life entertainment, you know.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Now, is your job
10	with Parks and Rec, is that a full-time position?
11	MR. RODRIGUEZ: It's an on-call job. It was
12	part-time, but now that I got this other job, you know,
13	I can't do both at the same time, but.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you're physically not
15	employed with them right now?
16	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Not at the moment. But like
17	it's per event.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
19	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Like with this other job, I
20	work three days a week.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Does your job with
22	the city allow you to participate in the Public
23	Employees Retirement System?
24	MR. RODRIGUEZ: I'm not really sure that it is.
25	But probably, yeah, because we do a lot of everything

1	from special events to foundation events, you know.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
3	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Whatever they have.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are you considered to be
5	a city employee; do you get paid by the City of
6	Las Vegas directly?
7	MR. RODRIGUEZ: No. I know that it's like a
8	government check that I get from them. Like it says
9	Clark County, you know.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So this conviction
11	was in 2013, right?
12	MR. RODRIGUEZ: M-hm (affirmative).
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And it's totally and
14	completely done now?
15	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Yeah. I got I took care of
16	everything beforehand. I did community service, anger
17	management training. Everything was done prior.
18	Believe it or not, me and the roommate are still friends
19	actually. It's just that night.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
21	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Since then, I've kept a clean
22	record.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What, again, was the
24	charge?
25	MR. WOODRUFF: Domestic battery.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So what was the
2	nature of the physical altercation?
3	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Argument.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was there a physical
5	altercation?
6	MR. RODRIGUEZ: We were just kind of wrestling.
7	And he kicked me out of the house, he, you know,
8	overpowered me, and called the cops on me, so, while I
9	was trying to get in my room.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, and you were on
11	probation for a while, right?
12	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Yeah, for a year.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: For a year? Okay. So
14	that probation ended in 2014, '15?
15	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Correct.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And this was
17	disclosed on the application?
18	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Yes. I put I didn't know
19	exact dates, but I put everything that happened, like,
20	you know, all my charges that I know, because I didn't
21	know dates.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
23	MR. RODRIGUEZ: And I even provided further
24	documents. Like I got like scanned copies and submitted
25	them.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Okay. Any other
2	Board questions?
3	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one.
4	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Rodriguez
5	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Go ahead.
6	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Oh. Go ahead.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Go ahead, Mr. Colbert.
8	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Investigator
9	Woodruff, did the report list any injuries to the other
10	party; and if so, was there any weapon involved or
11	anything?
12	MR. WOODRUFF: Your indulgence for a moment,
13	please.
14	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Sure.
15	MR. WOODRUFF: There was no weapon that I can
16	see of that was listed. And I believe that the only
17	injuries were to Mr. Rodriguez. As he was trying to
18	break into the home, he cut up his hands as he was
19	breaking out the windows to get to his roommate. That's
20	all the report states.
21	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Thank you. No
22	further.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Flynn.
24	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And, Mr. Rodriguez
25	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Yes.

1	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm concerned that both
2	those charges have involved substance. You've been
3	through substance abuse counseling, or?
4	MR. RODRIGUEZ: No, I didn't. I didn't get
5	charged or have any disciplinary or anything.
6	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, that's a voluntary
7	thing, and it proves your character, and you've been to
8	substance abuse.
9	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Oh. I'm not a recreational
10	user of any kind, just blacked out that night, the
11	consumption of alcohol, overconsumption of alcohol.
12	And
13	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That's all right. You
14	answered my question.
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Were these misdemeanors?
16	MR. WOODRUFF: I believe so. I believe, they
17	were misdemeanors.
18	MR. RODRIGUEZ: I had a DUI charge, but other
19	than that.
20	MR. WOODRUFF: Yes. Yes, they were
21	misdemeanors.
22	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay. Thank you.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
24	questions?
25	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Nothing more.

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BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm prepared to make a 1 2 motion. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Rodriguez, I 4 appreciate your forthcoming. I do want to see some more 5 time and distance. As you saw what we did with prior 6 votes with the applicants, there are things going back 7 to 1990s or 1980s. So you're more than welcome to come 8 back and apply again in a year. 9 But by motion's going to be to support staff 10 and uphold the denial. But we'll see what the rest of 11 the Board does. 12 13 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Okay. Thank you. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a seat. That's just 14 15 my motion. MR. RODRIGUEZ: Oh, I'm sorry. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion. 17 Do we have a second? 18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board question or comment on the motion? 21 All in favor, say "aye." 22 (Board members said "aye.") 23 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed, say "no." 2.5 No.

Three to one. You'll be entitled to come back 1 2 in a year and reapply. 3 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Okay. Thank you. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there anybody else 5 that has been sworn prior? 6 7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Can we take a five-minute, quick five-minute break? 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can we take a five-minute 9 break, please? 10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 12 Thank you. 1.3 * * * 14 (A break was taken, 12:01 to 12:11 p.m.) 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are we ready up north? 16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, sir. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. For the rest of 18 the folks here that are scheduled to have a hearing 19 20 regarding the registration being denied, we will need 21 you to stand, raise your right hand, and be sworn. MS. BORDELOVE: Do you all swear today that the 22 testimony you're going to give is the truth, the whole 23 truth, and nothing but the truth? 24 (Applicants and witnesses present were sworn.) 25

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
2	And when you're called forward, and I don't
3	mean to be disrespectful, but I'll just point you out,
4	and, well, one at a time. Please, when you get up to
5	the table and you're close to the mic, say your first
6	and last name and then spell your last name, so that the
7	stenographer, we can make sure we get it all correct.
8	All right. Does anybody know who's been
9	sitting here the longest? That's where I'd like to
10	start. Thanks for the honesty. Come forward, please.
11	MR. ABEJUELA: Good morning.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
13	you?
14	MR. ABEJUELA: Great.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Could you give me your
16	name and your spell your last.
17	MR. ABEJUELA: Oliver Abejuela,
18	A-B-E-J-U-E-L-A.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Make yourself
20	comfortable.
21	MR. LAWSON: I'm a witness, and I was sworn in,
22	Robert Lawson, L-A-W-S-O-N.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.
24	Who was the investigator on the case?
25	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. And the

1	applicant was denied for a 2009 carrying a concealed
2	weapon, which is a misdemeanor. He forfeited the weapon
3	and paid a fine. He did disclose it. And he knew at
4	the beginning of the application process that he would
5	be denied, come before the Board, for his work card.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you recall the
7	incident?
8	MR. ABEJUELA: Yes.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What was the
10	circumstances surrounding the case?
11	MR. ABEJUELA: I brought a copy of the police
12	report. It speaks for itself. I was the co-owner
13	MR. LAWSON: Show it to them.
14	MR. ABEJUELA: Oh. Would you like to see the
15	arrest report?
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do we have that?
17	MR. SALADINO: I didn't have the arrest report.
18	I just have the court documents.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We wouldn't be
20	able to see it without all of the members being able to
21	have it. But you could feel free to send it over to the
22	investigator, if you'd like.
23	Thank you.
24	MR. ABEJUELA: Do you want me to continue?
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, please.

1	MR. ABEJUELA: Okay. At the time, I was the
2	co-owner of a smoke shop, slash, hookah lounge with
3	former business partners of mine. It was in the
4	afternoon. We weren't open for business yet. I was
5	sitting down inside the lounge and eating croissants
6	when Metro officers came in and told us to put our hands
7	up. I immediately threw the switchblade on the ground.
8	They asked me why I had the switchblade. I said it was
9	because I was using it to spread the butter on the
10	croissants. It's on the report, too.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And you pled
12	guilty, or tried, what?
13	MR. ABEJUELA: I pled guilty to the charges.
14	And they ordered me to pay a fine. I believe, it was
15	\$500. And they gave me an order to stay out of trouble
16	for, I believe it was a year. And after that, I haven't
17	been in any trouble.
18	MR. SALADINO: The police report does state
19	that it was a switchblade. And it was confiscated
20	without question, without any incident.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Lawson, what
22	would you like to add?
23	MR. LAWSON: I'm Robert Lawson. I'm from
24	Lawson Investigations. Oliver came to me through our
25	programs with the Southwest Institute. He's graduated

1	as a paralegal. And he's did a little bit of work for
2	me. And I asked him if he'd be interested in being a
3	private investigator, and he said he would.
4	We went through the application process. I
5	asked him to bring me the police report to make sure
6	that, in fact, he did, what happened happened. And,
7	again, it does speak for itself.
8	Since then, the law has changed, and having
9	that type of a weapon is no longer a crime. However, he
10	didn't make any excuses. It is what it is. But he's a
11	pretty good dude, and I'd like to have him work for me.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Anything
13	additional?
14	MR. SALADINO: No, there's nothing else.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And that was
16	disclosed, correct?
17	MR. SALADINO: It was disclosed, yes.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
19	questions?
20	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll take a quick read of
21	the arrest report.
22	(The report was handed to Board Member Flynn.)
23	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.
24	MR. ABEJUELO: You're welcome.
25	(Board Member Flynn looked at the report.)

1	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What was the preliminary
3	reason that you recall why Metro was at the lounge?
4	MR. ABEJUELA: From what one of the officers
5	explained to me, and from also my own belief, it's that
6	one of the my competitors had made a false call,
7	saying that we were being robbed. Then an officer that
8	happened to be across the street, conducting undercover
9	on a neighbor of ours, happened to notice one of my
10	employees standing outside smoking a cigarette. And he
11	had a handgun on his waistband. Which was registered.
12	So they thought he was trying to rob my store.
13	So they came in, uniform and undercover. And
14	that's why they came in, because they thought he was
15	robbing my store. We explained to them that that's one
16	of my employees. His picture was in a frame on the wall
17	as you enter the store, as a matter of fact.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Okay. And,
19	Mr. Lawson, you indicated that he's done a little bit of
20	work for you. In what capacity?
21	MR. LAWSON: Part of the program about
22	Southwest is when they come in, they actually have to do
23	practical work, not he didn't do any investigation.
24	But he has to like be in the office. He's answered my
25	phone. He's filed for me. He's sat in on interviews

1	when my other investigators have conducted interviews.
2	He's emptied the trash. That kind of stuff.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
4	questions?
5	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm prepared to make a
6	motion.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Please.
8	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion, based
9	on the time that's transpired, you're forthcoming, what
10	you've done since then, that we overturn the denial and
11	grant you your card.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
13	have a second?
14	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
17	questions, comments on the motion?
18	All in favor, say "aye."
19	(Board members said "aye.")
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
21	Hearing none, congratulations.
22	MR. ABEJUELA: Thank you.
23	MR. LAWSON: Thank you.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. This side of
25	the room? Sure, please.

1	MR. WALKER: Hello. My name is Lorenzo Walker.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It's Lorenzo?
3	MR. WALKER: Yes. W-A-L-K-E-R.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Have a seat.
5	Which number is this? Item number 53. So
6	who's the investigator?
7	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
8	applicant was denied for a 2009 unlawful carrying of a
9	concealed weapon. The applicant did disclose it. He
10	received three years probation and court fines. And he
11	did meet all the requirements of his probation.
12	And he, the applicant, also has a current
13	Nevada concealed weapons license that was issued 6-15 of
14	16.
15	He had applied once before. And, I think, it
16	was like a miscommunication between the investigator
17	that was working on it, and he didn't know that he had
18	appeal rights. So in talking with him, he was asking
19	again if he would be able to apply and, you know, come
20	before the Board. We told him you do have appeal
21	rights, and we will bring him before the Board and go
22	from there.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Okay. Mr. Walker,
24	do you remember the arrest, conviction, all those
25	things?

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1	MR. WALKER: Yes.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What were the
3	circumstances surrounding that?
4	MR. WALKER: Well, the situation happened with
5	my younger sister up at the school. It was close to the
6	time for my little niece to get out of school. But my
7	sister was at the high school, in the incident. My
8	little niece was in elementary. And it was almost time
9	for her to get out when I received the call that the
10	police had my sister.
11	My only concern, though, was because she's my
12	niece. So I went up there to not really to see what
13	was going on, but to get the keys, so I'll be able to
14	let my niece in the house and, you know, help her with
15	her homework. But I was coming from my instructor at
16	the gun range and when I received the call. That's the
17	only reason why my firearm was in the car. It wasn't
18	loaded. The magazine wasn't in it.
19	And actually, when I pulled up, the officer, it
20	was an officer that pulled up behind me. I saw my
21	little sister pointing at my car, so I knew that's why
22	he got behind me. Me being a law-abiding citizen, I
23	pulled over. And it just so happened, it happened to be
24	in the school zone.
25	So that's what he explained to me of what the

charges was. Because I, from my instructor out there in
 California, I was always instructed to let the officer
 know when the firearm was in the car. So that's what I
 did. I was being an honest man.

And I thought, honestly, he would set me free, 5 but he took me to jail. But I understood it. Т 6 7 understood where I was wrong there. I mean I know there's no cause for being ignorant to the law. So I do 8 know that now. I did everything I was supposed to do. 9 Actually, I just received my other concealed carry for 10 Utah. So. 11

And since I've been out here in 2012, I did odd jobs. I worked on the Strip at Westgate. I worked for Kane's Chicken Company. And I did odd jobs, worked at bars and all that. And then I ended up getting into a car accident. And throughout the time, with me being in the car accident, I had to get surgery done to my neck and all that. So I had to sit down. I couldn't work.

But I wanted my guard card. So when I went for my guard card, I actually had the temporary. And I was actually hired at SOA Security. I was scheduled, I was scheduled to go to the class. And while I was in the gun class, I was pulled out, letting me know that I was denied, the first time. And that broke my heart. Security is what I want to do. I didn't know

1 that it was still upon me. And that came back to haunt 2 me. So I had to find out, what can I do to right this 3 wrong?

And I was instructed by Bruce, the one what was working for you guys, to get a -- what was it called? You know, the pardon. I was instructed to get a pardon. I went for that, and then I just thought why don't I just get it all expunged so this will never have to come back up. So that's what I did. I got it expunged. They pardoned me.

And I came and reapplied. And I knew I would 11 get denied. I was instructed that I was getting denied, 12 13 you know. And it really hindered me from really wanting to do it. Because I went up there to apply, and I was 14 told that I would get denied. So that was -- I didn't 15 want to have that happen to me again. So I really 16 wasn't going to apply again. And my mom, my wife, 17 she -- they convinced me to just have faith and go. 18 So that's what I did. And I'm here before you 19 20 now. 21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And any other Board questions? 22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So, Mr. Walker, what 23 24 jurisdiction did this happen in? MR. WALKER: It was in Lancaster, Quartz Hill. 25

It was out in California. 1 2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So the weapon was in the 3 auto; it wasn't on you? MR. WALKER: No. 4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you. 5 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Is this the only thing 6 7 that you've ever been charged with? MR. WALKER: Ever. Ever. I know it was just 8 being ignorant to the law. But I know that's not an 9 excuse. But I know that now. I know about it now. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions? 11 I'll take a motion. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we 14 overturn, we grant Mr. Walker the appeal and grant him 15 his work card, based on time and distance from the offense, his forthcomingness and lack of any other 16 record. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we 18 have a second? 19 20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second. 21 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board 22 questions, comments on the motion? 23 All in favor, say "aye." 24 (Board members said "aye.") 2.5

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
2	Carries unanimously. We'll get you your card.
3	MR. WALKER: Thank you.
4	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.
5	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Good luck.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Over on this side.
7	Please.
8	MR. RANDOLPH: My name is Roger Randolph,
9	R-A-N-D-O-L-P-H.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have a chair, please.
11	We're on number 43. Okay. Who's the
12	investigator?
13	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
15	MS. DONALD: Mr. Randolph was previously denied
16	by us in 2014. He did not appeal at the time.
17	When I did this report, I said we didn't have
18	his fingerprints. And we do now. He has no new
19	arrests. And we just have the 1983 burglary, felony.
20	He disclosed it. He received probation.
21	And then, in 1988, unauthorized possession of
22	controlled substance, felony, one year in jail. He
23	disclosed that as well.
24	Those were the only two arrests that came back
25	on his fingerprints.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right.
2	Nothing since then, Mr. Randolph?
3	MR. RANDOLPH: No, sir.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What have you been
5	doing with your life?
6	MR. RANDOLPH: I've been working different
7	jobs. I've had all the guard cards, when I came here in
8	'90. I worked at the Texas Station, worked at the
9	Fremont, and several other casinos, as a security
10	officer. Also, I'm also a cook. So I've done odd jobs
11	like, you know, cooking food and stuff like that. I'd
12	like to start my own business.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So that there's no
14	confusion with anybody around, proprietary employers
15	don't have to come through this agency. So when he says
16	he's worked security for a casino, we're not over, we
17	don't have jurisdiction over casino employers. That's
18	what's called a proprietary employer. So they don't
19	offer services for hire to the public. So that's why a
20	casino can hire whoever they want, because they're
21	that's their employee, protecting their property and
22	their customers. So that's why there's a difference
23	between security companies, that hire people to provide
24	service to anybody in the public, and a casino or a
25	proprietary employer. That's the difference.

Okay. Any Board questions? I'll take a 1 2 motion. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we 3 grant his appeal and issue him a work card, because 4 that's more than a lifetime ago. 5 MR. RANDOLPH: Thanks. 6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And you've been a 7 productive member of our society and a good citizen 8 since then. I wish you the best of luck, sir. 9 MR. RANDOLPH: Thanks. 10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We have to vote. Just 11 because I feel that way doesn't mean they do. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We got a motion. We got 15 a second. Any Board questions or comments on the motion? 16 All in favor, say "aye." 17 (Board members said "aye.") 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no." 19 20 Now congratulations. 21 MR. RANDOLPH: Thank you very much. Thank you. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Next up on this side, 22 Good afternoon. 23 please. MR. WARNER: Good afternoon. Alton Warner, 24 W-A-R-N-E-R. 2.5

BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: 50. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number five zero. Who is the investigator? 3 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 5 Okay. MS. DONALD: In 1997, Mr. Warner had a grand 6 7 theft property. It was a misdemeanor. He disclosed it. In 2003, he was charged with a felony for one 8 count of making a fictitious check. He did not disclose 9 that. But when asked, he did provide court documents, 10 and that's when it shows the felony. 11 2005, one count of burglary. He did not 12 13 disclose, but the fingerprints showed that it was dismissed due to a delay. 14 15 And that was it. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Warner, what's 16 the reason behind the lack of disclosure for the 2003 17 and 2005 incidents? 18 MR. WARNER: I thought, I thought it was only a 19 20 10-year background. I didn't know that you had to 21 disclose anything that you ever did. That was long ago, so I thought it was -- I was going to be okay. 22 I just moved out to Vegas. I've been here 14 23 months now. And I had been working at another security 24 company, because I had a guard card in California. 2.5 Ι

1	didn't know that I was going to be able to get I
2	didn't know that when I got my provisional, I applied
3	and everything, I thought it was going to be okay. I
4	didn't think I had to go back so far. That's all.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And how long have you had
6	the guard card in California?
7	MR. WARNER: 14 years. I was I got my card,
8	and I was working. I was supervisor at HSS hospital.
9	I've been a supervisor all my career, the company that I
10	worked for. I've never been a regular guard, except for
11	when I first came out of high school. So.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What were the
13	circumstances behind the 2003 and the 2005 charges?
14	MR. WARNER: Well, the fictitious check was I
15	wasn't working, and I needed, I had to have, I needed a
16	hip replacement. I was in I made a stupid mistake.
17	Someone owed me some money, and I did something I
18	shouldn't have done. That was
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What about the other one?
20	MR. WARNER: 2005, I don't well, I guess,
21	they consider it burglary. But, basically, it was
22	someone, we got into an altercation, and I took a gun
23	from him, and I took their shoes and just made him walk
24	home. And then he ended up calling. I don't know why
25	it was burglary, but. That was basically, I don't

1	know what that, what that was.
2	MS. DONALD: That was dismissed.
3	MR. WARNER: Yes. That's why I was like, I
4	mean I never even knew that I needed any, you know,
5	anything about it. So, you know.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What have you been
7	doing for employment since you've been in Nevada?
8	MR. WARNER: I worked at the Hard Rock, I was
9	doing security at the Hard Rock. I was working for
10	Saber Security at different venues, and then at Ocean
11	Spray in Henderson. But I would prefer to have my guard
12	card so I can go back to work at HSS.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
14	questions?
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have one.
16	Investigator Donald, the theft was in 1997. It was
17	revealed, right?
18	MS. DONALD: It was disclosed, yes.
19	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Disclosed. Okay. And
20	the other two were not?
21	MS. DONALD: Not.
22	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay.
23	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Warner, what was the name of
24	the security company you said you were working for?
25	MR. WARNER: Saber.

1	MR. INGRAM: Saber?
2	MR. WARNER: Yes, out here, Saber.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?
4	I'll take a motion.
5	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'll make a motion that
6	Alton Warner's appeal be granted and he be allowed his
7	work card.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Is
9	there a second?
10	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Any
12	Board comment or questions on the motion?
13	All in favor of the motion, say "aye."
14	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Aye.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Aye. All opposed to the
16	motion, say "no."
17	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
18	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Warren, you'll
20	be entitled to reapply in a year.
21	MR. WARNER: Okay. Thank you.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
23	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Warner, when you
24	reapply in a year, disclose every single thing, now that
25	you understand how it operates in Nevada.

1 MR. WARNER: Okay. Thank you. 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Over on this side. Sir, please. 3 MR. SCOTT: My name is Robert Scott III, 4 S-C-O-T-T. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It's a couple. Item 6 number 46. Who was the investigator? 7 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 9 MR. BATCHELOR: Mr. Scott was denied for a 2007 10 possession of a controlled substance, felony conviction 11 when he pled quilty. He did list it on his application. 12 13 He pled quilty in 2007, and the probation conditions were met. In 2010, the conviction was set aside. 14 And, also, in 2016, Mr. Scott was convicted of 15 battery, a misdemeanor battery, which he also listed. 16 He received a fine, counseling, community service. 17 And those are all of Mr. Scott's convictions. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What was the date on the 19 20 first? MR. BATCHELOR: 2007. 21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Seven. Okay. Do you 22 recall both those incidents, Mr. Scott? 23 MR. SCOTT: Yes. 24 25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us the

circumstances surrounding 2007? 1 2 MR. SCOTT: I was new to Vegas, just separated, smoking marijuana on the Strip. And police officer saw 3 me and took me to jail for it. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You pled to it? 5 MR. SCOTT: Yes. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And then what about the 2016 battery? 8 MR. SCOTT: That was a little different. Ι 9 moved into an apartment. There had been a lot of 10 interest in my dog, several of the neighbors and other, 11 you know, people. I went outside one night and saw 12 13 someone messing with him. I asked the guy to stop and identify himself. We had an altercation. 14 He ran away. 15 I left it alone. And a few minutes later, the police knocked on my door saying that I assaulted him. 16 And we went to court for it. The counselor 17 advised me just to plead it out because it was a 18 misdemeanor. Which I chose to do. I was taking, you 19 20 know, counsel for it. So I did the community service. 21 I paid the fines off. And it's still pending now, I think, because I still have \$200 left on it. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board 23 24 questions? I'll take a motion. 25

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1	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion to deny
2	the appeal based on the fact of the recency of the
3	battery and, just as important, that he has not finished
4	his court-directed sentence.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Is
6	there a second?
7	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board discussion or
9	question regarding the motion?
10	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Looks like it's very,
11	it's really fresh, really new. And you probably need to
12	put some time between it.
13	MR. SCOTT: It would have been taken care of
14	already if I had just being able to work. Like I have
15	been doing security for Leading Edge before when I found
16	out that I needed a security card here. I was doing
17	security before I moved to Las Vegas with Securitas. I
18	had a guard card there. I fight professionally. I do
19	personal training. So it wasn't something that was at
20	the forefront for me taking care of when the battery
21	happened. I went through the community service, and I
22	paid the money that I could. But at the time, I'm all
23	out of money, so.
24	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Thank you.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor of the
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motion, say "aye." 1 2 (Board members said "aye.") BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed? 3 No. You can reapply in a year. 4 MR. SCOTT: Thank you, sir. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's see. Next 6 7 up? MR. HALL: I'm Jeffrey Hall, H-A-L-L. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Up here, please. 9 Number 33 on the agenda. And who's the 10 11 investigator? MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. So he was 12 13 charged and convicted in 2012 of carrying a concealed weapon, a misdemeanor, found guilty, 60 days suspended 14 15 sentence, fined. He did disclose it. It was brass knuckles. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's it? 17 MS. DONALD: Yeah. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do you recall the 19 20 situation, Mr. Hall? 21 MR. HALL: Yes. I was picking up my little sister from school. And before that, I was at home 22 cleaning my room. And my mom asked me to go get my 23 sister. And I had those knuckles in my hand, twirling. 24 And I had just put everything in my pocket, my keys and 2.5

1	my wallet. And I had it in my hand. And by the time I
2	got outside, I couldn't put it back inside. So I just
3	put it in my pocket. And when I went to the school, the
4	dean of the school had like seen the imprint, when the
5	wind blew, and the police was right there, and he
6	grabbed me for it.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
8	MR. HALL: And I have my the arrest record
9	stating what it was.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Any
11	Board questions?
12	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Hall, what have you
13	been doing?
14	MR. HALL: I was site supervisor for Larkin
15	Security.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Where, whereabouts is
17	that?
18	MR. HALL: Here in Las Vegas.
19	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You're a supervisor for
20	security?
21	MR. HALL: Yes, Larkin Security, site
22	supervisor for Ogden on Fremont.
23	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So you had a card
24	MR. HALL: M-hm (affirmative).
25	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: and it was taken away?

1	I'm confused.
2	MS. DONALD: Provisional.
3	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Oh, it was a provisional
4	card that we got
5	MS. DONALD: Yes. Yeah, when we got the
6	fingerprints back. And it is a renewal as well. He did
7	this at after he had received his first card. He
8	received his card in 2012, and then this happened a few
9	months after.
10	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Hall, do you
11	want to explain the "being rude, angry, argumentative
12	and swearing at our employees"?
13	MR. HALL: Honestly, I was just angry. Like I
14	was doing so good. And all this like was a setback for
15	me. And I had just got promoted. And like, you know, I
16	have a son. I have bills. And it was just a setback.
17	And I was really angry. Sorry about that, by the way.
18	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, it takes a lot to
19	apologize, and I appreciate that.
20	MR. HALL: Yeah, I was just really angry.
21	MS. DONALD: It was frustration in him.
22	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. I still look at it,
23	I still look at, that took a lot. I appreciate it.
24	Thank you.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

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1	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have one. You
2	received your card in 2012?
3	MR. HALL: Yes.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: And subsequently, after
5	that, you got into got this case, right? So you
6	was there how long of a time period did he not have
7	his card?
8	MS. DONALD: It was a few months. And it
9	wasn't a felony. So I don't think he was required to
10	disclose it.
11	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Mm, okay. So shortly
12	after you received the case, you were not working
13	anymore from that point, or?
14	MR. HALL: No, I was still working.
15	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: So he went to reapply?
16	MS. DONALD: He yeah. This was a renewal.
17	It's a renewal.
18	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay. All right.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?
20	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Is that the only charge
21	on your record?
22	MR. HALL: I'm clean. I'm done with that.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll take a motion.
24	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'll make a motion that
25	Jeffrey Hall's card be that his appeal be granted and

that he's allowed to get his work card. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion. 3 Do we have a second? BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll second that. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. 5 Any comment or question on the motion? 6 7 All in favor, say "aye." (Board members said "aye.") 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no." 9 Unanimous. 10 11 MR. HALL: Okay. Thank you. Do I have to go back and apply for it? 12 13 MS. DONALD: No. We'll be in touch about the card. 14 15 MR. HALL: Okay. MS. DONALD: I'll contact you in the next 16 couple of days. 17 MR. HALL: Okay. Thank you. 18 MS. DONALD: Okay. Thank you. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: This side? 21 MR. KILGORE: Good afternoon, members of the My name is "Shane," but it's spelled 22 Board. S-H-A-V-O-N, and K-I-L-G-O-R-E. 23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Just let me find 24 you here. Item number 36 on the agenda. "Sheh-VON"? 2.5

MR. KILGORE: "Shane." 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "SHAY-ven"? MR. KILGORE: "Shane." It's pronounced 3 "Shane." 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ah, got it. Who's the 5 investigator? 6 7 MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 8 MR. BATCHELOR: And Shavon was denied for a 9 2007 felony possession of controlled substance 10 conviction. And it was listed. He had 10 days in jail, 11 three years probation, a fine. And the conviction was 12 later dismissed under 1203.4 in California. 13 14 Also, two burglary convictions, misdemeanors, one in 2005, one in 2006. Both convictions also both 15 listed. 16 And then a 2007 misdemeanor DUI, which he also 17 listed, sentenced to three years probation and a fine. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So everything in 19 20 his past was listed? 21 MR. BATCHELOR: Yes. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us a rundown 22 on the criminal history issues? 23 MR. KILGORE: Oh, yeah. Well, the commercial 24 burglaries that I was given, I was with my ex-wife 2.5

1	actually at a young age. And, unfortunately, she handed
2	me a backpack that had a bunch of dresses in it, as we
3	were walking out. I did not know that she stole any
4	items. And, therefore, they grabbed me, and they
5	grabbed her. They arrested us. They charged us. I
6	paid all my fine, revenues, reimbursement, then went to
7	jail, did my time.
8	And then, right after, my cousin Justin decided
9	we were going to go to the store. And he started
10	stealing stuff. I walked away from him. I actually
11	walked out of the Dillard's, because I didn't want to be
12	any a part of it, for what just happened to me with my
13	ex. And so they grabbed me as I got to the door. He
14	was already in the dressing room. We were far apart.
15	They came at me saying that, you know, I was there.
16	What's it called when you're the accomplice or
17	something?
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Conspirator?
19	MR. KILGORE: Yeah. So they arrested me for
20	that. I did my time with that, fines, revenue,
21	reimbursement, everything.
22	My DUI, unfortunately, I don't know why I keep
23	getting myself with you know, getting in trouble. I
24	was under the influence of marijuana and just came back
25	from a concert. We were actually in California. She

1	was a dancer at a strip club. I told her I didn't want
2	to come pick her up. But she was heavily under the
3	influence of coke, drugs, and the list goes on, and
4	drinking. I didn't want to pick her up.
5	I went sideways over a railroad track, because
6	I have a very lowered Honda, and if I tried to go
7	straight over, I would have just got stuck on the
8	railroad track. The cop said I was swerving. I told
9	him I think he ought to look at the car. And they
10	actually couldn't give me the Breathalyzer, because I
11	wasn't under the influence with any drinking or
12	anything. I was just at a concert getting stoned.
13	So then he said, "Well, we want to take you in.
14	We're not going to impound the car." They actually let
15	her drive off with my vehicle, so they wouldn't impound
16	it. Which I don't know why, because that's even more
17	reckless than what I was just read. I wasn't, you know,
18	swerving or anything. I was just trying to pick her up
19	and go.
20	So they did the bloodwork. And then they gave
21	me, I think it was, you know, over the limit. And they
22	got me for the marijuana context. And I'm two months
23	away from actually having that off my record. It's 10
24	years old. So I've stayed out of the trouble since
25	then. I really don't want to go back down that road

1	with any of these.
2	My mom is here. I'm actually doing this for
3	the reasoning for the fact that I'm not allowed to rent
4	any apartments. I've applied a bunch of places. They
5	keep denying me because of my felony.
6	I actually got a really good job. I went for
7	the interview. They did the background check. They
8	didn't know I had a felony. Because when me and my mom
9	went to court for the controlled substance in Merced, we
10	moved out of Lancaster, California, went to Merced. I
11	did Prop. 36 for a couple I think, it was a year and
12	a half. I paid my fine for revenue reimbursement. I
13	also did NA/AA classes, and I had to see my probation
14	every single day, and I had to be drug-tested every
15	single day.
16	So they said once everything was done, if I got
17	in no more trouble, that they would reduce it down to
18	the misdemeanor. That wasn't the case. I actually
19	found out from a job that I applied for here in
20	Las Vegas, that when they did the background check, they
21	said, "You have a felony still."
22	So then we investigated a little bit more,
23	asking if they could send me the records to show where
24	it's coming up from, because I didn't know where it was
25	coming. It didn't come from Merced. We actually had a

fluke mishap where after we had the sentencing for the 1 controlled substance, they were supposed to reduce it 2 down to a misdemeanor, send the files back, because it 3 was a transferred case, from Mojave to Merced, so I can 4 do my hearing there. Somehow the paperwork didn't get 5 sent back down. And we thought for the longest that I 6 7 didn't have a felony, until I tried to apply for that 8 job.

So they found that. And then I'm just spending 9 loads of money to get my felony reduced to a 10 misdemeanor, not going for a Prop. 47, going for a 17 11 munition so I can get my gun rights restored. I did 12 13 that. I have my gun rights. I've already purchased a I've already filed for my CCW. I'm waiting two 14 qun. more months for it to come back, that they'll say, 15 "You're allowed to have it." 16

And I just want to change my life around. You know, I was young, dumb and out of control. You have to go through a couple failures in order to grow and gain the knowledge and become a better citizen in this role. And that's just something I want to do.

The other reason why I want to go for anything that's in security was I live right down the street from the incident that happened at the Starbucks. I was like two minutes away from going to that store where the guy

1	pulled the gun out and shot one of the customers. I was
2	about to go into that store. And I said, you know what,
3	that shouldn't happen to anyone, you know. I mean if I
4	was there and, you know, I was able to carry my CCW,
5	maybe I would have been able to help the people that
6	were in that store, you know.
7	And I just want to change my life. I want to
8	do something better for myself. And I want to become a
9	better citizen. So I fought 10 years to get all of this
10	off my record and take it out. I just, I don't want to
11	go down that path anymore.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Any
13	questions?
14	I'll entertain a motion.
15	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion to
16	grant his appeal based on the applicant's forthcoming,
17	time and distance. Almost 10 years, and I normally use
18	10 years, and we're only like a month away.
19	And like the Chairman said to another applicant
20	before, please don't prove me wrong.
21	MR. KILGORE: I won't. I will definitely gear
22	my path to stay on the right path. You know, my
23	parents, my dad is actually a security officer for the
24	Plaza. He was actually awarded employee of the year.
25	And I really look up to him because he's always been

1	there. He's actually a stepfather, but I don't see him
2	as that. I see him as a real father, because my real
3	dad's never really been in my life. And this is my mom
4	back here, who I live with. And she's seen the
5	struggles I've had to go through.
6	I don't want to ever go down that path again.
7	You know, there's a point in time where you got to grow
8	up and you got to change. And it's up to us to decide.

It's not the motivation that really pushed me forward. 9 It's the decision that I don't want to be locked into 10 the criminal lifestyle. You know, to fight 10 years to 11 get myself out of the criminal justice and start 12 13 becoming a normal citizen has been one heck of a ride. But it wouldn't regret anything that I've done, because 14 15 I don't think I would have ever grown if I didn't go through it. And that's the choices that God gave me, 16 and I have to do what's right for him and myself and for 17 my family. 18

19BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.20Do we have a second?

BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second. And any comments 23 or questions on the motion?

All in favor, say "aye."

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(Board members said "aye.")

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
2	Unanimous. Congratulations.
3	MR. KILGORE: Thank you so much. Like I know
4	you guys don't know my story. But it's been one long
5	road. And I really, really thank you.
6	MR. KILGORE'S MOM: It really has, it's been a
7	long struggle.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Good luck.
9	MR. KILGORE: Thank you.
10	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sir.
12	MR. BROWN: My name is James Brown, B-R-O-W-N.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have a seat.
14	Item number 29. How easy is it growing up with
15	that name?
16	MR. BROWN: I'm a junior, too. I'm the third.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's the investigator?
18	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
19	applicant was denied for a 2001 battery with serious
20	bodily injury, a felony. He spent five years probation,
21	eight months in jail. It was not disclosed on the
22	application.
23	And that is the only, that's the only felony
24	conviction that we have.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

I would like to say that that was 1 MR. BROWN: 2 the biggest mistake of my life and what changed me and, now, you know. I really, like the person before that, I 3 was in an abusive marriage. And it was just I pretty 4 much lost it. So it was like, after that, I realized 5 that that was the worst thing anybody, anyone would do. 6 7 And I regretted it then, and I regret it now. And I do have empathy for the victim. 8

9 I've changed my life, you know. And I've been 10 working with jobs. And I worked for Whirlpool, did 11 installation. I moved here from California. And I went 12 back to school and got my HVAC license. You know, I'm a 13 teacher right now and have been married many years to my 14 beautiful wife, Christine Brown. I have to say that.

And, you know, I like the security work. I worked with Century for a little bit. And then that, you know, they denied me.

So I'm here to just, just to let you know that that's the type of work I wouldn't mind doing, you know, helping people. I always did like helping people, giving me other ways, you know. I'll help them, like if they're going through situations in their relationships, I will use myself as an example of what can happen when you do something wrong.

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So that's, basically, why I'm doing it. But

1	I'm here to let you know that I have changed.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What was the
3	reason why you didn't disclose the
4	MR. BROWN: Oh. Oh, in California, I was, I
5	was dumb. Because I didn't want to go the past 10
6	years, you know. And I got here, and I didn't think.
7	You know, I was just I don't know why I did that.
8	You know, and I used like the years, like seven years,
9	10 years, whatever I did, and I just won't do it,
10	because, you know, it's past that. But that was the
11	only reason.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
13	questions?
14	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Is that all that's on
15	his record, is that?
16	MR. SALADINO: The number two, that's one
17	that's a typo.
18	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay.
19	MR. SALADINO: It was a carryover from a
20	MR. BROWN: But I wanted to say that I had a
21	year of anger management. And that taught me a lot.
22	You know, that really did teach me a lot, my empathy and
23	just, you know, control yourself, and not getting out of
24	character when something you know, and be in that
25	tough situation I was in.

1	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Was that a stipulation
2	from the battery charge, that you have anger management?
3	MR. BROWN: Yes. I took a year for that anger
4	management, too. And, I think, it was a probation like
5	five years or something.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
7	questions?
8	Entertain a motion.
9	I'd make a motion that number 29, James L.
10	Brown, that the denial be overturned and he be awarded a
11	card. Is there a second?
12	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'll second it.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
14	second. Any Board comment or questions on the motion?
15	All in favor, say "aye."
16	(Board members said "aye.")
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed, say "no."
18	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Colbert, your rule
20	was "aye," correct?
21	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I voted for it.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So it's three to
23	one. You will be given your card.
24	MR. BROWN: Thank you.
25	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

1	MR. BROWN: Thank you.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Next up?
3	MR. MITCHELL: I'm Demitris, last name
4	Mitchell, M-I-T-C-H-E-L-L.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have a chair.
6	Item number 38. Who's the investigator?
7	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor.
8	Mr. Mitchell was denied for a 2006 burglary conviction.
9	He had two felony, you know, two counts of felony
10	burglary. He did disclose the conviction. And he was
11	sentenced to 12 to 40 months in the Nevada State Prison
12	on both counts to run concurrent. His prison sentence
13	was suspended on both counts, and he only received three
14	years probation, boot camp, counseling, restitution.
15	But Mr. Mitchell, he did violate that probation multiple
16	times, was ordered back to camp. But he did eventually
17	receive a dishonorable discharge in 2008.
18	That's his only conviction. It was in 2006.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you remember the
20	occasion?
21	MR. MITCHELL: Yes, I do.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What were the
23	circumstances behind the criminal act?
24	MR. MITCHELL: Me and my son's mother, well,
25	I'll say my stepson

1	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You need to speak up.
2	MR. MITCHELL: Oh, I'm sorry. Me and my
3	stepson's mother, we got a was living on the north
4	side of town. It was called the Oasis Apartments. Just
5	moved in like probably four months, I think, four months
6	in. And one of my used-to-be close friends, or my
7	cousin called me one day and woke me up in the morning
8	and was saying that, oh, he needed a ride from where he
9	was at. And I was like, well, I got to work in the
10	morning. Because I was working intensive, the job,
11	trying to get hired on somewhere downtown, because I
12	used to work at Lady Luck, when it was open. I was
13	doing busing.
14	And then I got up in the morning. I'm like,
15	"Okay. I'll come and get you," went down there and got
16	him. He had stolen goods. And I was going to take my
17	girlfriend, Karla, and go get him, you know, so looking
18	out for a family member. And the next thing you know,
19	we get to the corner, the police just came and
20	surrounded us. And he had like four or five bags.
21	I'm not trying to put it all on him or anything
22	like that. I was in the wrong place at the wrong time,
23	just trying to look out. And that was my first, first
24	offense, anything. Like I didn't know what was on at
25	the time, because I was young. And they charged me with

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1	the same thing with him, and they charged me concurrent.
2	And that was my first time. So that's why they gave me
3	boot camp instead. And he had more time, because
4	multiples offense.
5	And the denial on the dishonorable discharge
6	was I'm new, and they switched probation officers, so I
7	didn't know that I had a curfew at the time. I didn't
8	know none of that. But my probation officer,
9	Mr. Segato, I believe, recommended me with no curfew, no
10	nothing. But when they switched it, I didn't know. I
11	moved. I went back to my mom's house, because the work
12	and stuff wasn't right. And we kind of like, me and my
13	son's mother started separating a little bit. And I
14	lived with my mom at the time. And then that's when
15	they put something for me at the old address. And so a
16	lot of things got misunderstood. And they denied me,
17	they gave me dishonorable discharge.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So how much time
19	did you do in total?
20	MR. MITCHELL: Well, I think, in total, I
21	think because I was in the county for a while. So I
22	was in there for like six months, I believe. And then
23	they finally came and got me, and I went to boot camp
24	that day. So I would say like a year, so six and six.
25	They gave me six months for boot camp.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
2	MR. MITCHELL: And ever since then, I've just
3	been just laying low, just keeping the straight and
4	narrow.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What have you been doing
6	for a living?
7	MR. MITCHELL: Oh, right now, I actually work
8	for Aristocrat. But through all the time that I've been
9	clean, I've been working through a lot of temp agencies
10	and stuff, just keeping focused. And then, right now, I
11	work for Aristocrat, the gaming company. That's where.
12	And I've been there for a year and a half, so.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I have a question for
14	you, sir. The burglary, you say you picked your cousin
15	up, and he had a what?
16	MR. MITCHELL: He had like a lot of bags and
17	stuff, so.
18	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Bags as in?
19	MR. MITCHELL: Like stolen things. And it was
20	in my car, so.
21	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: So there were things
22	just in bags?
23	MR. MITCHELL: Yeah, but I thought it was like
24	his clothes, or whatever, because he just called me and
25	said, "Come and get me."

1	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay.
2	MR. MITCHELL: That's what happened. Because
3	that's where I work for now. I got off of work today
4	just to come to the Board meeting. I was going to go
5	back, but they said I can come back anytime, so. But I
6	mean it's not permanent where I'm at.
7	And I'm just trying to make more money for
8	myself, you know. I think, that would be the best thing
9	for me, security, because I I forgot the company name
10	that actually worked for Aristocrat, told me just apply
11	and go, send me, go on somewhere else. I could just
12	work there, with security, right there, where I'm
13	already at and I'm already standard at already.
14	MR. INGRAM: Chairman, I've got a question.
15	Who was the boot camp man at the time?
16	MR. MITCHELL: I forgot his name. It was
17	Lieutenant what is his name? I've lost it. I want
18	to say Bookem, but. What is his name? He was an old
19	guy, too. I can't remember. It was so long ago.
20	MR. INGRAM: Okay. I was just curious.
21	MR. MITCHELL: It's going to pop up. I know
22	it's going to pop up. But it's been so long ago. Yeah,
23	I'll say he kept it straight on me the whole time, so.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?
25	Okay. Entertain a motion?

1	We're on 38, right?
2	MR. INGRAM: Yes.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I move that we
4	overturn the denial and issue a card to Demitris
5	Mitchell. Is there a second?
6	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
8	second. Any comment or questions of the motion?
9	All in favor, say "aye."
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
12	Don't make us out to be fools, please.
13	MR. MITCHELL: Thank you very much. I'm
14	shaking right now. Thank you so much. Working on these
15	temporary jobs, trying to stay out of the way.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for coming.
17	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.
18	MR. MITCHELL: Thank you.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sir, please.
20	MR. JOSHUA: Javarcus Joshua, J-O-S-H-U-A.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who was the investigator?
22	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
24	MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
25	conspiracy of carrying a concealed weapon in 2012.

1	He had some other arrests as well. And he did
2	disclose them. They were 2015, breaking and tampering
3	with a vehicle and domestic battery. The first charge
4	was reduced to a misdemeanor. The second charge, a
5	domestic battery, he was found guilty a misdemeanor, did
6	five days in jail.
7	2014, there was a DUI. He pled guilty and paid
8	a fine.
9	2013, possession of marijuana. It was a
10	misdemeanor. There was no disposition.
11	Again in 2013, there was a breach of peace, a
12	misdemeanor, no dispo listed.
13	2011, there was a trespassing.
14	And there was a few of them, from February 16,
15	2011 and 7-5 of 2010.
16	In 2010, there was a hit-and-run, but that was
17	dismissed per the courts and the fingerprint report.
18	Then, in 2010, there was an obstructing of a
19	peace officer. It was a misdemeanor. No dispo again on
20	that one.
21	And then, 2016, there was a domestic battery.
22	He's currently enrolled in a court program and enrolled
23	in community service. And it does show an outstanding
24	balance with the court.
25	And his background also showed a recent

1	September 22nd, 2016 domestic violence arrest.
2	Also, the applicant had been trespassed from
3	three different locations in Henderson and Las Vegas.
4	One was the Highland Village, the Walmart on Nellis, and
5	by a resident located at East Carey. He does have a
6	trespass ID number as well.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you recall all of
8	these incidents?
9	MR. JOSHUA: Yes.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What do you got to
11	say?
12	MR. JOSHUA: I don't know. Basically, the
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, we're going to have
14	to do better than that. You're here to convince us to
15	overturn something.
16	MR. JOSHUA: Basically, yeah, I like my job,
17	they like me. It's, basically, the only job I have for
18	so long, basically. And I was hoping that you would.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, without an
20	explanation, how are we supposed to?
21	MR. JOSHUA: It's not an explanation.
22	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Chairman?
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah.
24	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Joshua, what do you do for
25	a living now?

1	MR. JOSHUA: I was working for Protect. Right
2	now, I'm in the middle of looking right now.
3	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: How long were you were
4	Protect?
5	MR. JOSHUA: I was with Protect, I had just got
6	hired in December, and I got my card in January, and I
7	started January 1st.
8	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Oh, you had a provisional
9	card?
10	MR. JOSHUA: Yes. And on the 10th, I had got a
11	call from Denny.
12	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You've been here for a
13	couple hours, right?
14	MR. JOSHUA: Yes.
15	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And you've heard our
16	comments about time and distance since the last time
17	you've been in trouble. You need to show it for a few
18	years, sir, I mean if you want to be in security work.
19	I mean you've been in trouble, grave offenses, probably
20	the most I've seen this morning.
21	And I respect and I appreciate your interest in
22	the industry. But my opinion is that we need some time
23	and distance from your activity with the police.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board question,
25	comments?

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1	Is there anything you would like to add?
2	MR. JOSHUA: No.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'll entertain a
4	motion.
5	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion to deny
6	the appeal and follow the recommendations of staff.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Do we
8	have a second?
9	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.
10	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and second. Any
12	Board comment or question on the motion?
13	All in favor, say "aye."
14	(Board members said "aye.")
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
16	You're eligible to come back in a year and
17	reapply.
18	MR. JOSHUA: All right. Thanks.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
20	MR. JOSHUA: Have a nice day.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You, too.
22	Okay.
23	MR. PRENTISS: Ryan Prentiss. It's
24	P-R-E-N-T-I-S-S.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have a chair.

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1	Item number 41. Who's the investigator?
2	MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. Mr. Prentiss
3	disclosed his felony for a 2002 possession of cocaine
4	with intent to sell. He was sentenced to 12 to 48
5	months in Nevada State Prison, probation and counseling.
6	The court documents show he was charged with a felony.
7	But then probation was revoked, and he had to serve
8	time.
9	However, he has several other arrests that were
10	not disclosed. Let's see.
11	2009, driving under the influence, misdemeanor,
12	pled guilty.
13	2009, assault on a peace officer or public
14	official. It was originally charged as a gross mis.
15	This was reduced to a misdemeanor, and he served jail
16	time.
17	2009 again, possession of marijuana, one ounce
18	or less, misdemeanor, pled guilty.
19	2007, pled guilty to battery domestic violence,
20	misdemeanor. Let's see.
21	In 2000, he was charged with possession of
22	cocaine with intent to sell. This was reduced to a
23	misdemeanor. He was fined and served, Clark County, the
24	Detention Center.
25	And then, later, in 2000, he had possession of

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1	marijuana, a felony, but it was reduced to a
2	misdemeanor, and he was fined and served time in jail.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: None of them, except for
4	the felony, were disclosed?
5	MS. DONALD: Yeah, he did disclose one of the
6	domestic violences. So the 2004 possession, attempt to
7	sell felony and the 2000 domestic violence were
8	disclosed.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sir, is there a reason
10	that you didn't disclose?
11	MR. PRENTISS: Well, no, sir. I don't even
12	know what was going on as far as the word you guys got
13	right now. I went down to the police station and got my
14	report and brought it to the place where I, you know,
15	signed up to get my card. And the lady, she kept it.
16	And I don't know why she didn't put it in there with all
17	the other stuff I had.
18	But I don't know why they didn't disclose
19	those. Because I did my classes, I completed all my
20	classes for the other cases. I went to jail for it.
21	And, I believe, they're I don't know what was going
22	on with all the other stuff. I did my time for
23	everything.
24	And all of the domestic violences, I went to my
25	classes, and I completed the class. I got the

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1	certificates stating I completed them, and everything.
2	So I don't know what, what's going on with that, sir.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there a SCOPE
4	printout contained in the file?
5	MS. DONALD: Yes, there's a SCOPE.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: From the original
7	application that he provided?
8	MS. DONALD: I have the from what he had
9	written down, yes, I do have that.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Does that disclose
11	he's claiming that he brought in a SCOPE printout.
12	MS. DONALD: Oh.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And gave it to somebody.
14	Is that contained in the file?
15	MS. DONALD: We don't normally keep those,
16	because we can't upload it, but actually to have it,
17	yeah.
18	MR. PRENTISS: She took it.
19	MS. DONALD: They're not uploaded. Yeah. His
20	original application, he didn't list anything other than
21	the one. So I had talked to him, and he had to disclose
22	the rest of these. But it's all, it's all in the SCOPE.
23	MR. INGRAM: It's in the SCOPE we ran and in
24	the SCOPE that he provided us?
25	MS. DONALD: Correct. But the original

application, it was not disclosed. 1 MR. INGRAM: Does his SCOPE printout mirror the 2 3 SCOPE printout that we ran? MS. DONALD: Yes. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And is there a date on 5 both of them? 6 7 MS. DONALD: There's dates. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: When the printout was 8 done? 9 MS. DONALD: Oh, let's see. It was 7-19 of 10 Then, when I ran the SCOPE was April 5th, 2016. 11 2016. So when I ran the SCOPE, I've been working with him for 12 13 a while because there were some other things that we had to take care of, such as warrants. We took care of all 14 15 those. But I ran his background. He'd only disclosed one thing. I told him he had undisclosed arrests, you 16 need to get your SCOPE. That's when he went and got 17 that in July. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 19 20 MS. DONALD: Yeah. And then we got the 21 fingerprints back, and everything that happened is in Las Vegas. 22 MR. PRENTISS: I mean I'm born and raised here, 23 24 I am. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okav. So the last time 25

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1	you had any participation in the criminal justice system
2	was when?
3	MR. PRENTISS: It was like 2009, something like
4	that, or either '10.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what have you been
6	doing with your
7	MR. PRENTISS: I've been working, sir. I work
8	security at Saber Security. I worked there for a couple
9	months. And then I got kicked out of that because of my
10	card, my cards. And, basically, that's why I do
11	security. I worked, even though you said not to bring
12	it up, I worked at the Plaza. I worked for Saber
13	Security. I worked for there's like a bunch of
14	different security places I worked for, sir.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What would you say were
16	the catalysts or the were you a user of narcotics?
17	MR. PRENTISS: Yes.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Because that's usually
19	what the start of everything is?
20	MR. PRENTISS: Yes, basically. Yes. And I
21	have help. You know, I went to AA, NA, got help. And I
22	haven't been doing nothing since. It's been the whole
23	time. We're together, you know. I got kids to take
24	care of. I got bills, responsibilities. And like I
25	said before, that's my field of work, security.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So when you
2	originally applied, the very first time that you
3	applied, before they started working with you to try to
4	get things worked out, what, why did you not disclose
5	your criminal history, except for your 2004?
6	MR. PRENTISS: Oh, well, because like I thought
7	there was only supposed to be like my felony. I only
8	got one felony in my life. So I was like, I thought
9	that was I was supposed to just put that. But when I
10	talked to her, she said, no, I got to put, you know, all
11	my stuff. So I'm like I can't remember all the things
12	I've been through. So I went and got my SCOPE.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
14	MR. PRENTISS: I paid the 10 bucks and got that
15	and brought it back to her, and went from there. Like I
16	wasn't I only sit there and I write stuff that
17	that I, you know, forgot about, forgot about other
18	things that I've done in my life, you know. But that's
19	why I ordered the SCOPE, where she can have everything,
20	you know.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
22	questions?
23	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair.
24	Mr. Prentiss, tell us about when you assaulted
25	a police officer.

1	MR. PRENTISS: Assault? It wasn't like no
2	assault like that. I wasn't trying to fight with him.
3	It was just I ran. There was no physical fight. I just
4	like don't move up, ran. And they caught me and slammed
5	me and put me in jail.
6	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.
7	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: When you say you had
8	treatment, how long have you been clean?
9	MR. PRENTISS: Oh, I've been clean for like
10	almost 14, like 14 years.
11	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: 14 years?
12	MR. PRENTISS: Yes.
13	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Do you include alcohol?
14	MR. PRENTISS: I barely drink, only
15	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Do you still drink?
16	MR. PRENTISS: On occasions.
17	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.
18	MR. PRENTISS: As far as like weed and all
19	that, I don't indulge in that no more.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
21	questions?
22	Entertain a motion.
23	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I'll make the motion
24	that Ryan Prentiss be granted his appeal and issued a
25	work card. There's no it doesn't say anything really

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1	on his SCOPE stuff that I I don't know how to add for
2	the 14 years, but since all figured it out, the good job
3	services and the clean for 14 years, so you do put these
4	things behind you.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.
6	Is there a second?
7	I'll second.
8	We have a motion and a second. Any Board
9	comment, questions on the motion?
10	All in favor of the motion, say "aye."
11	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Aye.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed to the
13	motion, say "no."
14	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.
15	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No.
17	You're eligible to come back in a year.
18	MR. PRENTISS: All right. Thank you.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
20	Do we have anybody waiting to be heard in the
20	north?
	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No, there's no one here.
22	
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's see. I
24	guess, we better hopefully, somebody's been keeping
25	track so we can call all that's left.

1	MR. INGRAM: So we have item number 31, Paul
2	Espiritu. He was, all individuals have been noticed
3	appropriately and informed of their case. So item
4	number 31 is a no-show. Item number 32 is no-show.
5	Item number 40 is a no-show. Item number 42 is a
6	no-show. Item number 48 is a no-show. Item 45 withdrew
7	the appeal.
8	And did I miss any?
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So 31, 32, 40, 42 and 48
10	are no-shows?
11	MR. INGRAM: That's correct.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'll make a motion
13	to deny the appeals for items number 31, 32, 40, 42 and
14	48.
15	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I second.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
17	question on the motions?
18	All in favor, say "aye."
19	(Board members said "aye.")
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
21	It's unanimous.
22	We're not considering 45, because they withdrew
23	the appeal?
24	MR. INGRAM: Correct. We have to go back to
25	the trailed item, number 10 on the agenda.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Chenega Infinity, item
2	number 10, LLC.
3	MR. INGRAM: We trailed that in order to get an
4	answer to Mr. Flynn's question.
5	Do you have an answer for him?
6	MR. BATCHELOR: Yes, sir. I spoke with
7	Mr. Bentley again. He's been at Chenega for 10 years.
8	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's been what?
9	MR. BATCHELOR: At Chenega.
10	(The Reported indicated there's difficulty
11	hearing Mr. Batchelor.)
12	MR. INGRAM: He's our soft-spoken investigator.
13	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I can barely hear him, and
14	I'm 700 miles closer.
15	THE REPORTER: Thank you.
16	MR. BATCHELOR: Investigator Batchelor. I
17	spoke with Mr. Bentley again. He's been at Chenega for
18	10 years. He's currently the QA in other states, and
19	that's his position there. He's trying to be the QA for
20	them here, to start their business here, so they can get
21	that contract that I spoke about earlier.
22	And he's that's his position, just a QA.
23	And that's all he does, is handles licensing and
24	regulatory items for Chenega.
25	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. So he's never been

1	a security officer, he's just the business end?
2	MR. BATCHELOR: (Nodded head affirmatively.)
3	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And what do we know
4	about Chenega?
5	MR. BATCHELOR: Well, I don't know, as far as
6	his history before Chenega, because in his for an
7	application to change status like that, that's not in
8	the application, to his employment history. So. But
9	when I in my review of Chenega, I found nothing
10	negative for Chenega at all anywhere in my search for
11	Chenega.
12	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, and I'm not doubting
13	that. I mean if I started a security company tomorrow,
14	you'd find nothing negative about it, either. But I've
15	got no security experience. That's what I mean. I know
16	nothing about their company. I know nothing about the
17	man. And I'm being asked to make a decision.
18	MR. BATCHELOR: Okay.
19	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So I personally have
20	concerns on making the decision. On top of that, he's
21	not here. And it's also a very important contract to
22	the security of one of our national infrastructure
23	sites.
24	So I think that it's the pleasure of us, as the
25	Board. But I am very uncomfortable making a decision

without knowing nothing, anything about the company, or 1 2 him not being here. 3 MR. BATCHELOR: Okay. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I need to say, it's 4 nothing against your investigation. I just don't have 5 any information. 6 MR. BATCHELOR: Then, I suppose, we'll bring 7 him back next Board meeting, or request for him to. 8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: It's the pleasure of the 9 Board. That's just my opinion. 10 MR. BATCHELOR: Okay. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any questions? 12 13 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: And Mr. Lamb, he's also 14 employed there at Chenega? MR. BATCHELOR: He's, I believe, he's one of 15 the officers. 16 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Oh, he's one of the 17 officers. Yeah. 18 MR. BATCHELOR: Yeah. Owner, officer. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: M-hm (affirmative). 21 MR. BATCHELOR: Yeah. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It says in the notes that 22 his previous background investigation has established 23 sufficient hours of certified private patrol experience. 24 MR. BATCHELOR: Right. He's changing, he's 25

becoming QA for this new company. And he did have the previous background, for which I saw he was approved before for a PPL, for a security license, previously. That was back in 2009.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So he had the requisite 6 experience to be licensed in the 2009.

7 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, traditionally, in a 8 situation like this, if an investigation was completed 9 years prior, and it was determined by the Board staff at 10 that time, and granted a license by the Board at that 11 time, traditionally, we don't go back, staff doesn't go 12 back and reevaluate that or bring that information 13 forward.

If the Board would like us to do that in the 14 15 future, to give a little bit more of a summary that they in the past have been licensed and who were approved 16 years previous, we can definitely do that, if the Board 17 would like to see that. What we normally do is go back 18 and say they met the requirements at that time, the 19 20 Board approved it at that time, and then complete the 21 investigation moving forward.

So he's had an active license. It has not been in abeyance. So he's been meeting the requirements of the renewals every year, keeping his insurance up to date as well, but actually working for a company out of

1	state, not currently conducting business in Nevada.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.
3	Any other Board questions?
4	Okay. Did you make a motion, or just comment?
5	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That was my comment.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.
7	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And I'll add, I mean all
8	the other people that have come forward, either we know
9	something about their business or they tell us something
10	about their business. I don't have any knowledge. And
11	like I said, I'm skeptical, especially with that type of
12	contract.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
14	comment or question?
15	BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'll hear a
17	motion.
18	BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we
19	trail it to the next meeting. And either he attends or
20	we find out about his company.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. There's a motion.
22	Is there a second?
23	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Second.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and second to
25	trail the matter to the next scheduled quarterly

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1 meeting. Any questions or comments regarding the 2 motion? 3 All in favor, say "aye." (Board members said "aye.") 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Opposed, say "no." No. 5 Three to one. Trailed. 6 7 Let me see. Anything else? I think, that was it, right? 8 Okay. Do we have any other Board comment and 9 future agenda item possibilities? 10 Hearing none, do we have any public comment in 11 the north? 12 13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No. BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Nothing? Any public 14 comment in the south? Just making a hark in the air. 15 None here. 16 That should wrap us up. Move to adjourn. 17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Second. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor? 19 20 (Board members said "aye.") 21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you so much, folks. * * * * * 22 (The meeting adjourned at 1:33 p.m.) 23 -000-24 2.5
