4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'll call the meeting
5 of the Private Investigators Licensing Board to order.
6 First, roll call of Board members.

7 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

8 Board Member Flynn?

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Here.

10 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon?

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here.

12 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Gronauer?

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Here.

14 MR. INGRAM: And Chair Nadeau?

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Here. Very good.

16 MR. INGRAM: We do have one vacancy on the
17 Board right now due to Mr. Colbert's departure. And the
18 Governor is reviewing applications to fill that
19 position.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Great. Thank you.

21 All right. Now, public comment. Members of
22 the general public may comment on matters appearing on
23 the agenda and may bring matters not appearing on the
24 agenda to the attention of the Board. The Board may
25 discuss matters not appearing on -- may not -- it may

1 discuss the matters not appearing on the agenda, but may
2 not act on matters at this meeting. If the Board
3 desires, the matters may be placed on a future agenda
4 for action. Public comments may be limited to the five
5 minutes per person at the direction of the Chairman but
6 will not be restricted according to viewpoint.

7 And as a note, public comment is taken both at
8 the beginning and at the end of the meeting.

9 Do we have any public comment in the south?

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Doesn't appear to be any,
11 Mr. Chair.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do we have any public
13 comment in the north?

14 Seeing none.

15 Board -- we'll go to item number 3, Board and
16 Executive Director announcements, reports and updates.

17 Kevin, would you let us know, on the agenda,
18 would you identify if there are some changes to the
19 agenda.

20 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. So item number 6 on
21 the agenda has been withdrawn the request. They're no
22 longer going to be using out-of-state peace officers for
23 the jewelry show this year.

24 Item number 17 is something, I believe, that
25 the Board wants to pull from block vote.

1 Item number 25 withdrew their application.

2 Item number 31 would be an item that we wanted
3 to pull from block vote.

4 And item -- that's it, that's the only changes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

6 MR. INGRAM: As far as the other reports, I
7 provided -- I've got two other additional things that
8 come under item number 3. I've provided the budget
9 status report to the Board. I'd be happy to answer any
10 questions. We are, we're looking really good, strong.
11 We're in balance at 68, 69, 70 percent of our budget
12 year, and we're running at about 59 percent on our
13 budget expenditures.

14 Are there any questions about the budget status
15 report?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have none.

17 UNIDENTIFIED MAN IN LAS VEGAS: I have
18 something, sir.

19 MR. INGRAM: Okay. The next item is the
20 statistical --

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Hold on one second.

22 MR. INGRAM: Sure.

23 UNIDENTIFIED MAN IN LAS VEGAS: Item number 31,
24 in regards to the type of case.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh, we typically do a

1 block vote at the beginning of the meeting.

2 UNIDENTIFIED MAN IN LAS VEGAS: Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: But what he's indicated
4 is that item's not subject to block vote.

5 UNIDENTIFIED MAN IN LAS VEGAS: Oh, okay.

6 Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. I'm sorry,
8 Kevin. Go ahead.

9 MR. INGRAM: No problem. The statistical
10 report, we provided the most recent statistics from
11 December 1st through February 14th. Currently, we have
12 processed 1,695 work cards. Of those 1,695, 1,240 were
13 made active. 250 are currently in provisional status,
14 just meaning we've got fingerprints to conduct. There's
15 181 that are pending, that are being worked right now.
16 There's 27 that were withdrawn. And 37 were denied.

17 The licensing applications through those dates,
18 we had zero applications for canine handler. We had
19 four private investigator applications. Four were
20 approved at the last Board meeting. We had nine private
21 patrol applications. Eight were approved. One was
22 denied due to not meeting the minimum requirements. We
23 had three process server applications. All three were
24 approved. We had no repossession applications. And
25 that the corporate applications, new corporate

1 applications, we had 16 applications, and 16 were
2 approved at last Board meeting.

3 As far as complaints right now, December 1st
4 through February 14th, five complaints were received
5 against our license holders, ranging from a failure to
6 pay employees, civil complaint, process server handling
7 of a situation. And the approximate turnaround for our
8 investigations are one week. You can see that one was
9 referred to the Nevada Labor Board. One was referred to
10 the EEOC. Two of the investigations were closed with no
11 findings. And one was outside of PILB jurisdiction, was
12 referred to that authority.

13 The next page is the summary for a year. So
14 that would be status, the stats from January of 2018
15 through December. You can see at the top graph, these
16 figures don't include denied or provisional withdrawn
17 applications, but these are the approved number of work
18 cards by month. You can see our busy month last year
19 was April. We processed 1,188. This year, our busy
20 month is probably going to be anytime between now and
21 April. They moved the Electric Daisy Carnival up a
22 month. So we're going to be inundated with applications
23 during that timeframe.

24 As far as number of backgrounds for licensure,
25 you can see by each Board meeting. There were 33 new

1 licenses in March of last year, 80 in June, 55 in
2 September, and 39 new licenses in December.

3 As far as the unlicensed activity citations, we
4 provided a graph there. Right now, to date, starting
5 January 1, we've already issued \$62,500 in citations and
6 fines. And currently we're working on recouping them.
7 The majority of the individuals that set up payment
8 plans were paid in full. We do have, I believe, five
9 that were referred to the Controller's Office for
10 collections.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: What was the --
12 And that's all I have.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. What was the
14 unusual height for in January and February this year,
15 January this year, what was that?

16 MR. INGRAM: We became part of -- we became
17 part of the Night Watch program that is made up of
18 Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, their Special
19 Investigations Unit, their Events Planning Unit, and the
20 Gaming Control Board. And we've been cracking down on
21 unlicensed activity on executive protection inside the
22 nightclubs, inside of all the casinos. And we made
23 multiple arrests in one night.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh. All right. That
25 explains it.

1 Any questions from the Board? Board Member
2 Gronauer?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Did I get this right
5 this time?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's close. Bobby G
7 works.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
9 Nixon, any questions?

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair, just a
13 comment. This was something that I asked for, and I am
14 very pleased with the reporting that the Executive
15 Director has provided.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Kevin, is there
17 anything else?

18 MR. INGRAM: That's all I have under item 3.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

20 MR. INGRAM: Did you want me to go ahead and
21 introduce the staff before we got started?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I would like you to
23 introduce the staff. And then, if you don't mind, I'd
24 like you to -- I know we're talking about wanting a
25 report at the end of the agenda. But I would like to

1 see us talk just a little bit about what's happened over
2 the last two months and the changes that have gone on.
3 But I would appreciate if you'd introduce staff.

4 MR. INGRAM: Okay. We'll start with the north.
5 Directly to your right, Chairman, is Mary Klemme. She's
6 our northern office manager. Directly to your left is
7 Shawn Mahan. He's our investigator in the Carson City
8 area. We have our stenographer with us, Shannon. Good
9 to see you, Shannon.

10 THE REPORTER: Thank you.

11 MR. INGRAM: Directly to my left and at the far
12 end is Gisela Corral. She's our licensing specialist.
13 Next to her is Paul Maxwell. He's one of our
14 investigators in the south. We have Shelly Donald, an
15 investigator in the south. Zachary Swarthout, and he's
16 an investigator in the south. And then we have our
17 supervisory investigator, Vincent Saladino.

18 We also have a guest in the audience. Ryan
19 Hicks is our administrative support staff in our office
20 here in Las Vegas. He deals with all the walk-ins and
21 answers all the phones. And we wanted to give him an
22 opportunity to come to the Board meeting and see the end
23 result of the labor that he puts in there at the front
24 office.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you very

1 much. I appreciate the introductions.

2 So would you, just 30,000-foot level, kind of
3 go what -- discuss what's happened over the past few
4 months.

5 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. A.B. 184 is an
6 Assembly bill that's sponsored by Assemblyman Brittney
7 Miller in conjunction with a couple of our license
8 holders in the Carson City area. It puts forth an
9 amendment to our Nevada Revised Statutes requiring
10 mandatory training for not only unarmed security guards,
11 but also armed security guards.

12 In addition to that, it's asking or requiring a
13 psychological evaluation to be done prior to an
14 individual being granted armed status, as well as
15 alcohol and drug testing exam to be done prior to the
16 Board making them in an armed status.

17 Additionally, it's trying to add additional
18 penalties, that if a security officer is assaulted while
19 on duty, that it become a felony first offense for
20 assaulting an officer.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'm sorry. I probably
22 wasn't clear. I was asking more the 30,000-foot level
23 of what's been going on between the PILB and the
24 Attorney General's Office.

25 MR. INGRAM: Oh, I'm sorry. So you're talking

1 about the separation from --

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes.

3 MR. INGRAM: -- the Attorney General's Office?
4 Okay. So that's not tied to A.B. 184. New
5 administration, our newly elected AG, Aaron Ford, was
6 reviewing, you know, the budget, reviewing flow charts,
7 and he noticed that the Private Investigators Licensing
8 Board falls underneath the umbrella of the Attorney
9 General's Office.

10 That was established back in 1969. And at that
11 time, the Attorney General themselves sat on the Board as
12 the Chairman of the Board. In 2007, the Attorney
13 General had a conflict of interest with their spouse
14 being licensed with the Board. And amendments were made
15 to the statutes at that time removing the Attorney
16 General from the Chair position. However, our budget
17 still falls underneath the Attorney General's Office.
18 It should have been separated with that finding.

19 So in his review, he has asked for us to take
20 every action necessary to separate our board away from
21 them. Our board is the only board in the State of
22 Nevada that's set up as a state general fund and, again,
23 falling under the umbrella of the Attorney General's
24 Office. We did put forth a proposed amendment to
25 A.B. 184. That was found by legislative counsel to be

1 not germane.

2 So, therefore, we'll have to work on the
3 accounting and the personnel separation during the next
4 legislative session. But in the meantime, we are
5 creating our own databases. We're converting everything
6 over to the Enterprise IT system for the state. They're
7 the IT department for all state agencies. And we are
8 going to be changing our email. And we're going to be
9 having NEATS also post our new database.

10 So we're trying to separate as much as we can
11 at this time and then move forward with the regulatory
12 changes during the next session.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: It was pretty apropos
14 that we recently just did a whole new, what, system or,
15 you know, registration system. So that probably makes
16 it a little easier for us to cut those, those strings.

17 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir, it does.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Anything --

19 MR. INGRAM: In addition to that, we're
20 currently ending our lease in our Carson City office.
21 So, during negotiations, it's found that the owner does
22 not want to negotiate. So while we're doing all of
23 this, we're also looking for new office space in Carson
24 City. And we're working with Nevada -- or the
25 Department of Administration, Purchasing, and Buildings

1 and Grounds, and we think we found a place. We just
2 need to work out all the logistics on it.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do you need any other
4 balls in the air?

5 MR. INGRAM: I've got some personal ones I'm
6 dealing with now, too. So if I drop one once in a
7 while, please forgive me.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right.

9 All right. Any Board members have any
10 questions or comments?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Then, let's --
15 and, Kevin, do you have anything additional?

16 MR. INGRAM: No, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Review and
18 approve the transcripts from the December 13th meeting.

19 Do any of the Board members have any
20 corrections for the minutes or the transcript?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah. Mr. Chair, this is
22 Ray Flynn. On page 90, line 20, Mr. Thomas's response
23 was attributed to me. That's one change I'd like to
24 see.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And then the second one,
2 at page 165, line 10, Mr. Imbriani's response was also
3 attributed to me. I'd like to have that change also
4 made.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So noted.

6 Any other, any other corrections?

7 All right. Then, I'd accept a motion to
8 approve as amended.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn, for the record.
10 I make the motion to approve with the two amendments I
11 mentioned.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
13 motion. Do I have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
16 motion by Board Member Flynn, second by Board Member
17 Nixon. Any discussion on the motion?

18 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying
19 "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So at this time,
22 all applicants and witnesses to be sworn in.

23 Anyone that anticipates providing any
24 testimony, please stand and raise your hand and be sworn
25 in.

1 MS. BORDELOVE: Do you swear to tell the truth,
2 the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

3 (Applicants and witnesses present in Las Vegas
4 and Carson City were sworn.)

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: At this point, do any
6 of the members wish to make a block vote?

7 Could I make a suggestion that we might have a
8 block vote on items 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 16, 18
9 and 19.

10 I'll put that not form of a motion. Do I have
11 a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If I may, Mr. Chairman?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Board Member Gronauer.
16 Was number 10 included in that?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes, it was.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, number -- I'd like
19 to not have that in the block vote.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And that set aside.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: That sounds fine.

23 So, Kevin, would you mind reading the -- I
24 think, well, the motion is 7, 8, 9, 11, 12, 13, 16, 18
25 and 19.

1 MR. INGRAM: That's what I have, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Ray, are you good, are
3 you okay with holding 10 out of the block vote?

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, I am.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So we have a
6 motion and a second. Kevin, would you read all of
7 those, all of those items, please.

8 MR. INGRAM: Yes. Item number 7, Janus Global
9 Operations, LLC, license number 2056 is seeking member
10 status approval for Michael P. Pate II.

11 Item number 8, Pinkerton Consulting &
12 Investigations, Inc., license number 1029 is seeking
13 corporate officer approval for Miguel A. Martinez,
14 Jack I. Zahran and Santiago Galaz-Diaz.

15 Item number 9, Securitas Security Services USA,
16 Inc., license number 1100 is seeking corporate officer
17 status approval for William N. Barthelemy and Santiago
18 Galaz-Diaz.

19 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
20 requirements.

21 Item number 11, HireRight, LLC, license number
22 1449 is seeking member status approval for Guy P.
23 Abramo.

24 Item number 12, E-BackgroundChecks.com, Inc.,
25 license number 1574, seeking corporate officer approval

1 for Guy P. Abramo, Brian W. Copple and Thomas M. Spaeth.

2 Item number 13, General Information Services,
3 Inc., license number 1422 is requesting a corporate name
4 change to General Information Solutions, LLC. Jamie F.
5 Pelchat will remain the qualifying agent. Members to be
6 approved are Guy A. Abramo, Brian W. Copple and
7 Thomas M. Spaeth.

8 Item number 16, Grate Detections, LLC is
9 applying for a new private patrolman license. If
10 approved, Dustin Grate is requesting to place his
11 individual license into abeyance so that he may become
12 the qualifying agent.

13 Item number 18, Darren L. Shepard is requesting
14 a change of licensing status. Mr. Shepard is requesting
15 that his individual license, license number 2275 be kept
16 in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent
17 for SOS Security, LLC, license number 1319.

18 Item number 19, Thomas L. Derby is requesting
19 to transfer his qualifying agent status from Unified
20 Investigations and Sciences, Inc., license number 888,
21 to EFI Global, Inc., license number 644.

22 All of these are subject to statutory and
23 regulatory requirements.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

25 We have a motion. We have a second. Is there

1 any discussion on the motion? Board Member Flynn?

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Is there
8 any public comment on this motion?

9 Seeing none -- well, of course, I assume we
10 have none in the south. So with no public comment, all
11 in favor of the motion, signify by saying "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those opposed?

14 Passes unanimously.

15 So, Kevin, would you go ahead and advise
16 anybody that may be in the audience down south that were
17 here for those items, that they're welcome to leave now,
18 they don't have to stay unless they would like to.

19 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely.

20 So if you're here for those items numbers that
21 have just been approved, you're welcome to leave.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a good day.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We'll go
24 back to the agenda. Item number 10, Rancho Security
25 Services, LLC, license number 875, seeking member status

1 approval for Zlata Zujic and Nenad Stojanovic. Is that
2 correct? Are they there?

3 MR. INGRAM: They are not present.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
5 Gronauer, you had a question on this?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. You know, I
7 would like them to explain the criminal record that's on
8 the background here, and it's still pending. I'd like
9 to know the circumstances involved in that. And I had
10 some problems with all the witnesses on the
11 certification. On one person, it just was on
12 Stojanovic. Okay. And I had some problems with all the
13 people that have different residences all over the
14 place, and they all signed, they all appeared in front
15 of the notary on the same date and signed them. And I
16 just think that's a little suspect, and I just wanted to
17 see why.

18 So, I think, my view is since they're not here,
19 I would rather see them return, reapply -- or return in
20 three months at the next Board meeting.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It just has some --
23 it's a California charge, a DUI, and it says pending.
24 And like I said, all the notaries are signed the same
25 day, same time as they appeared in South Carolina. And

1 I don't know, it just didn't seem right to me. That's
2 all. It didn't pass the test for me.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have any
4 comment by the investigator? I think, it was
5 Investigator Maxwell?

6 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do you have any
8 comments in regards to what the -- Board Member
9 Gronauer, his questions and comments?

10 MR. MAXWELL: No, sir. I'd probably have to
11 look into that a little bit more deeper. I don't have
12 that in the background report, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right.
14 Kevin, were they advised not to come to the
15 meeting, or do you know?

16 MR. INGRAM: We always advise them that it's in
17 their best interest to be here, because if the Board has
18 any questions and they're not here that they could be
19 either be postponed or denied. Some people choose to
20 come. Some people choose not to.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chair, if I may?
23 It's Gronauer again. I said South Carolina. They were
24 notarized all at the same time in Nevada. However, the
25 people will have -- yeah, I guess, this may be

1 different. But I still was concerned about the DUI
2 that's pending, not knowing the circumstances, what it
3 means. If it was a DUI, was this a regular DUI? Was
4 there accidents involved or anything else? At least,
5 that's my concern.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: For the investigator,
7 did they disclose the DUI?

8 MR. MAXWELL: Sir, I'm not looking to say to
9 that. Again, I'll have to do a bit more research and
10 get with my supervisor so we can look at and look into
11 this a little bit more deeply.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Let's go ahead
13 and hold this until the end of the meeting, if that's
14 okay with the other Board members.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's fine with
16 Gronauer.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, Board Member Flynn.
18 I didn't recognize the notary thing, but I had questions
19 on the DUI. So I have no problem trailing it till the
20 end to see if they show.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Sounds great.

22 All right. Then, let's move on to item number
23 14. Star Protection Agency, LLC is applying for a new
24 private patrol license. Kathleen M. Bolz, license
25 number 1038 is requesting that her individual license be

1 kept in abeyance so that she may become the qualifying
2 agent. And member to be approved is Scott E. Scribner.
3 Is she here, Kathleen Bolz?

4 MS. BOLZ: Yes.

5 MR. INGRAM: Come forward.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Mr. Chairman?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Commissioner
9 Nixon. I need to recuse myself. I need to recuse
10 myself from this decision based on the relationship
11 between my company and her.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

13 My computer's running a little slow today. So
14 I apologize.

15 Okay. Ms. Bolz, would you just let us know
16 what your -- what is, what's happening with this.

17 MS. BOLZ: With Star Protection, you mean?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: What's the intent,
19 what's your intention?

20 MS. BOLZ: My intention is to become the
21 qualifying manager for Star Protection Agency. And we
22 have an estimated opening date of January of 2020.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Did anyone have any
24 questions on this applicant or the application? Board
25 Member Flynn?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
3 Nixon has recused herself. Board Member Gronauer?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Is there any
6 public comment on this?

7 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Up in the north?

9 Seeing none, I would accept a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
11 motion that Star Protection Agency, LLC, they're
12 applying for a new private patrolman license, that if
13 approved, Kathleen M. Bolz, license number 1038, that
14 her individual license be kept in abeyance so that she
15 may become the qualifying agent. Members to be approved
16 are Scott E. Scribner. This is subject to all statutory
17 and regulatory requirements.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. I have a motion
19 by Board Member Flynn. Do I have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a motion and a
22 second. Any discussion on the motion?

23 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
24 signify by saying "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Passes three in favor,
2 no opposed, one recusal. All right. Thank you. Good
3 luck.

4 MS. BOLZ: Thank you.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a good day.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Next is Dark Moon
7 Farms & Kennels, LLC.

8 MR. INGRAM: Guthrie?

9 She's not present in the south.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. She's not in the
11 north, either.

12 Do any of the Board members have any questions
13 or issues with this particular application?

14 Do we have any public comment on this?

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I do have one question for
16 the investigator. Maybe I just didn't find it. This is
17 a northern person, correct?

18 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. No. She's
19 southern.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Because I saw a
21 document from Elko, Elko County for a business license.

22 MS. DONALD: She lives in Pahrump. So I'm not
23 sure if it's --

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Fictitious name.

25 MS. DONALD: I'm sorry?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Fictitious name.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: But the certification was
3 done here in Las Vegas by Metro?

4 MS. DONALD: Oh, you mean the -- yeah. No,
5 it's been a while ago. She was previously licensed.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Right. I'm just curious
7 where that was done. That's all. Because I --

8 MS. DONALD: Yeah, it was done.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We've got one thing in
10 Pahrump, one thing in Elko, and one thing in Las Vegas.

11 MS. DONALD: Right. It was in Las Vegas.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

13 MS. DONALD: I was present for it.

14 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes, go ahead.

16 MR. SALADINO: Yeah, the testing for
17 Ms. Guthrie was done at the Las Vegas Convention Center
18 by Woody Cham (phonetic spelling). He's been continuing
19 to certify through POST for the bomb detection training.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any other questions
22 from the Board?

23 Is there any public comment on this?

24 Nothing north.

25 MR. INGRAM: Not in the south.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Nothing south. Seeing
2 none, I'd accept a motion.

3 I'm sorry. Is there a motion, anyone wish to
4 make a motion?

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. I'll make a
6 motion that -- Ray Flynn, for the record, seeking
7 approval for Dark Moon Farms & Kennels, LLC, dba, Nose
8 Dogs Detection Services. They're applying for a new
9 canine handler license. If approved, Judith A. Guthrie,
10 license number 2424, requesting that her individual
11 license be kept in abeyance so that she may become the
12 qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Judith A.
13 Guthrie. This is subject to all statutory and
14 regulatory requirements.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a motion by
16 Board member Flynn. Do I have a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Second by Board Member
19 Nixon. Any discussion on the motion?

20 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
21 signify by saying "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 Opposed?

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. It passes
25 unanimously.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We're having
2 difficulty. Shannon's having a tough time hearing.
3 Yeah, sometimes there seems to be some kind of a
4 variation on the level, audio level. Could we adjust
5 the microphones maybe a little bit make or something.

6 (There was a brief period off the record.)

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Then, with that,
8 let's go ahead and move on to item number 17, I believe.

9 I'd like to note that at the meeting, the Board
10 will consider the applicants for licensure. Under the
11 authority of NRS 241.030, the Board, upon motion, may
12 close the meeting to the public for the purpose of
13 considering an applicant's character, alleged
14 misconduct, professional competence, or physical or
15 mental ability. Prior to commencement of the -- we can
16 close the hearing, and then we'll come back and do our
17 deliberation in public and our vote in public.

18 It's my understanding that Mr. Hackie may wish
19 to have a closed hearing on this. Is that correct?

20 MR. INGRAM: That's correct. That's correct,
21 Chair.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So I would need
23 a motion from the Board to move it to the closed
24 hearing.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, this might only

1 be the second one I've been involved in. Does the
2 applicant have to disclose why they want to have a
3 closed hearing, or anybody can ask?

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Well, I guess, I'd ask
5 legal to help, help us, give us direction, because we
6 don't do this very often.

7 MS. BORDELOVE: They don't usually. I mean
8 because we're going to be discussing their character, I
9 don't believe it needs to be stated as to why. However,
10 the applicant does need to request it. And then it's
11 the Board's discretion whether or not they want to go
12 into a closed session.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I guess, it would be up
14 to Mr. Hackie to come up and make that request.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

16 MR. HACKIE: I respectfully request to have a
17 closed hearing.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

19 MR. INGRAM: Please go ahead and have a seat.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. I need a motion
21 to -- for a closed hearing.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a
23 motion for the closed hearing for Mr. Hackie.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
25 by Commissioner Gronauer. Do we have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right. We
3 have a motion by -- and a second by Commissioner -- or
4 Board Member Flynn.

5 By the way, Ray, that was really low that time.
6 That was a good example of how that, the audio, is
7 varying.

8 All right. We have a motion and a second. Any
9 discussion on the motion?

10 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying
11 "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

14 It passes unanimously. Could we please have
15 the rooms cleared.

16 MR. INGRAM: I want to make a real quick
17 announcement. Right now, we're in Legislative Session.
18 And there are several rooms next-door that are taking
19 testimony right now. So as you move into the hallways,
20 please, please stay quiet, or they'll ask you to leave.
21 Okay?

22 * * * * *

23 (A closed session of the meeting was held, after which
24 the meeting was then opened back up to the public and
25 resumed as follows.)

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BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Hackie, for the record, we've just explained what your plan is, and you're changing -- you're just asking to be transferred as qualifying agent to a new corporation; is that correct?

MR. HACKIE: That's correct, sir.

BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. I'm still trying to get my head wrapped around this a little bit, but.

During the investigation, it was determined that Mr. Hackie had a previous arrest, felony arrest, that was fully disclosed when he first -- when it was first initially investigated. The information did not make it to the Board.

So the Board made a determination based on the investigation, unaware that Mr. Hackie had a previous felony conviction. The Board at that time approved his private patrol license -- or, no, I guess, approved his license. And he's held that license since -- Kevin, remind me. Was it 2015?

MR. INGRAM: December 2015.

BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: December 2015. So he's held that license and has been in good standing subsequent to that time.

1 And so the Board is now to deliberate. We've
2 not done any deliberation, but received the information
3 during the closed hearing and at this point will
4 deliberate and make their comments on this application.

5 So, Board Member Flynn, did you have some
6 comments or additional questions?

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No. I'm ready to make a
8 motion when we need to.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board
10 Member Nixon?

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir, I'm good. Thank
12 you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. And Board Member
14 Gronauer?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Kevin, I'm going to
17 ask, did I explain that satisfactorily? And I'll ask
18 counsel if I did that, also. Have I explained that
19 satisfactorily?

20 MR. INGRAM: Yes, I believe so.

21 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Then, I'll
23 accept a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, Ray Flynn, for the
25 record. Item number 17, we've got BlueKnight Global

1 Services. They're applying for a new private patrolman
2 license. I'm recommending approval. That Kevin R.
3 Hackie is transferring his qualifying agent status from
4 Beach City Investigations & Protection Services Beach
5 Cities Protective Services, Inc., license number 2122.
6 Corporate officers to be approved are Lorena Hackie and
7 Raymond A. Hackie. This is subject to all statutory and
8 regulatory requirements.

9 I'm doing this for a couple reasons. One is,
10 is that on the initial application for licensure, that
11 the -- it has been determined that the applicant was
12 honest and forthright with all the issues. Secondly,
13 the applicant has not had any trouble or police contact
14 that's risen to either citation or arrest in over 20
15 years. We have not had any issues the entire time he's
16 been licensed here.

17 That's all I've got to say.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
19 by Board Member Flynn. Do we have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second,
21 based off the same criteria that was stated before.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any public
23 comment?

24 None. All right. We have a motion by Board
25 Member Flynn, a second by Board Member Nixon. All in

1 favor of the motion, signify by saying "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any opposed?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So we have three in
6 favor, one opposed.

7 All right. Mr. Hackie, the change has been
8 approved.

9 MR. HACKIE: Okay, sir. Thank you and the
10 Board members.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We'll move
13 on to item number 20, Kelley Investigations,
14 Incorporated, private investigators.

15 Good morning.

16 MR. KELLEY: Good morning.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please identify
18 yourself and tell us what your intentions are.

19 MR. KELLEY: My name is Ted Kelley. We're
20 looking to expand our company from southeast to west,
21 out into the west, California, Colorado, Nevada. And
22 before we do any marketing or any pursuing, I want to
23 get licensed and approved.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Are there
25 any questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: If that's the case, I'd
7 accept a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I make a
9 motion to approve Kelley Investigations, applying for a
10 new corporate private investigator license. Ted N.
11 Kelly III is applying for an individual private
12 investigator license. If approved, he is requesting
13 that his individual license be placed into abeyance so
14 that he may become the qualifying agent. Corporate
15 officer to be approved is Ted N. Kelley III. This is
16 subject to statutory and regulatory requirements.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
18 Board Member Gronauer. Do we have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a second. Do
21 we have any public comment?

22 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Seeing no public
24 comment, all in all in favor of the motion, signify by
25 saying "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 Opposed, "nay"?

3 It passes unanimously. Good luck, Mr. Kelley.

4 MR. KELLEY: Thank you very much. Thank you.

5 Appreciate it.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Item 21, JBS

7 International, Incorporated.

8 Good morning.

9 MR. DEWITT: Good morning.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please identify
11 yourself and tell us what your plans are, intentions.

12 MR. DEWITT: My name is Johnny M. Dewitt, Jr.
13 I'm the corporate coordinator for JBS International.
14 We're directed by the FTA to conduct undercover tobacco
15 buys in the state of Nevada, with commissioned
16 inspectors and the side lines.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have any
18 questions by the Board? Board Member Flynn?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Is there any
25 public comment?

1 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Seeing
3 none, I'd accept a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Member Nixon. I
5 motion we approve JBS International, who is applying for
6 a new corporate private investigator's license.
7 Johnny M. Dewitt, Jr. is applying for an individual
8 private investigator's license. If approved, he is
9 requesting his individual license be placed into
10 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.
11 Corporate officers to be approved are Gail D. Bassin,
12 Angela D. Rowe and Jerri L. Shaw. This is subject to
13 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
15 by Board Member Nixon. Do we have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a second by
18 Board Member Flynn. All in favor of the motion -- any
19 discussion on the motion?

20 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
21 "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

24 It passes unanimously. Good luck.

25 MR. DEWITT: Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Jason J. Caroluzzi,
2 item number 23.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's here, but it's
4 Patrick O'Neill.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. I missed one,
6 huh? Sorry. Let's go ahead and do 23 since he's
7 already up. Is that --

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: 22 is standing right in
9 front of us.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Then, we'll go
11 with 22, Patrick T. O'Neill. Sorry.

12 MR. O'NEILL: That's okay. No problem.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning,
14 Mr. O'Neill. Would you -- well, would you identify
15 yourself and then also tell us what your intentions and
16 your plans are.

17 MR. O'NEILL: Patrick T. O'Neill. Individual
18 license and then become the qualifying agent for Rimkus
19 Consulting Group here in Vegas.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Could you give
21 us a little bit of your background.

22 MR. O'NEILL: 22 years as a police officer,
23 investigating, retired, Tacoma, Washington, and now
24 primarily work fatal and serious injury collision
25 investigation.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good. Thank you.

2 Any questions from the Board? Board Member
3 Flynn?

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Is there any public
10 comment?

11 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Seeing no public
13 comment, I'd accept a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn, for the record.
15 Jason -- I'm sorry. Now I'm doing it. Patrick T.
16 O'Neill is applying for an individual private
17 investigator license. I motion for approval. And he is
18 requesting that his individual license be placed into
19 abeyance so he may become the qualifying agent for
20 Rimkus Consulting Group, Inc., license number 1262.
21 Corporate officers to be approved are David M. Burdick
22 and Robert P. Kocher. This is subject to all statutory
23 and regulatory requirements.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a motion by
25 Board Member Flynn. Do I have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second. Gronauer.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Second by Board Member
3 Gronauer. Is there any discussion on the motion?

4 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
5 signify by saying "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

8 Passes unanimously. Good luck, Mr. O'Neill.

9 MR. O'NEILL: Thank you very much.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a good day.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Now, let's
12 try item 23.

13 Good morning. Please identify yourself, give
14 us some of your background and what your intentions are.

15 MR. CAROLUZZI: My name is Jason Caroluzzi. I
16 am a licensed private investigator in several states.
17 I've been an investigator for approximately 12 years.
18 Our previous qualifying agent at Ethos is no longer
19 employed. So I'm taking over as the qualifying agent.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Any
21 questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Is there
3 any public comment?

4 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Seeing none, I would
6 accept a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Member Nixon.
8 Jason Caroluzzi -- sorry -- is applying for an
9 individual private investigator's license. If approved,
10 he is requesting that his individual license be placed
11 into abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent
12 for Ethos Risk Services, license number 2221. Member,
13 if member is approved, it's Micah Smith?

14 MR. CAROLUZZI: Micah Smith.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Micah Smith, he is
16 subject, or they are subject to all statutory and
17 regulatory requirements.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a motion by --

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is a motion to
20 approve. Sorry.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Motion by Board
22 Member Nixon. Do I have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second. Gronauer.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And we have a second by
25 Board Member Gronauer. Did I ask for public comment?

1 Do we have any public comment?

2 MR. INGRAM: No, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Seeing none,
4 seeing no public comment, all in favor of the motion,
5 signify by saying "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

8 Passes unanimously. Good luck, sir.

9 MR. CAROLUZZI: Thank you.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a good day.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Item number 24,
12 Thomas P. Green. He's up north.

13 Hi.

14 MR. GREEN: Sir.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning.

16 MR. GREEN: Good morning.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Go ahead and identify
18 yourself, tell us a little bit about yourself and what
19 your plans are, your intentions.

20 MR. GREEN: Yeah. Good morning. My name is
21 Tom Green, for the record. And I was a peace officer in
22 Washoe County for over 26 years. I retired just in
23 January as one of the chief deputies over special
24 operations and detention. I had planned to work like on
25 a part-time basis for some attorneys in the Reno area

1 doing investigations. And so that is the reason I'm
2 applying for a license and why I'm before you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

4 Do we have any questions of Mr. Green? Board
5 Member Flynn?

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. And for
12 full disclosure, I wanted -- I've worked with Mr. Green
13 for a number of years. I've known him for a long time.

14 Is there any public comment, north or south?

15 Seeing none north.

16 MR. INGRAM: None south.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'd accept a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
19 motion. Thomas P. Green is applying for an individual
20 private investigator's license. I make a motion that we
21 approve. And this is subject to all statutory and
22 regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
24 Board Member Flynn. Do I have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. And motion
2 and a second. Any discussion on the motion?

3 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying
4 "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those opposed?

7 Passes unanimously. Congratulations, Tom.

8 MR. GREEN: Thank you.

9 MR. MAHAN: Good luck to you.

10 MR. GREEN: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Item number
12 25 is withdrawn.

13 Item number 26, S.A.F.E. Management of Nevada,
14 LLC.

15 MR. INGRAM: They are present in the south.

16 MR. MCINTYRE: Good morning.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Good morning.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning. Please
20 identify yourself, give us a little bit of your
21 background, background of the company, and your plans
22 and intentions.

23 MR. MCINTYRE: Absolutely. My name is Hunter
24 McIntyre. I -- my background is I went to law school,
25 did a little bit of the legal work, and then have worked

1 in Baltimore, Maryland in the event security industry
2 for the last seven or eight years. And our intention is
3 to open an office to provide event security and 24/seven
4 security in the state of Nevada in late 2019 or early
5 2020.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

7 Do we have any questions from the Board? Board
8 Member Flynn?

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Just a comment, especially
10 the fact that he's from back east. I appreciate you
11 pronouncing our state right. Most people get it wrong.

12 MR. MCINTYRE: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Got it close.

14 Board Member Nixon?

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Since I'm from
18 Baltimore, we always called it "Ball-more." So I
19 appreciate you pronouncing it correctly.

20 I'm good.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Do we have
22 any public comment on this?

23 Seeing none, I'd accept a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I got to do it.

25 Gronauer. I'd make a motion to approve. S.A.F.E.

1 Management of Nevada, LLC is applying for a new
2 corporate private patrolman license. Hunter K. McIntyre
3 is applying for an individual private patrolman license.
4 If approved, he is requesting that his individual
5 license be placed into abeyance so that he may become
6 the qualifying agent. Members to be approved are
7 James C. McIntyre and Blake J. Barisich. This is
8 subject to statutory and regulatory requirements.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
10 Board Member Gronauer. Do we have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Any
13 discussion on the motion?

14 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
15 signify by saying "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Aye.

19 That was in favor, correct?

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, sir.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So it passes
22 unanimously. Good luck, Mr. McIntyre.

23 MR. MCINTYRE: Thank you very much.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So item
25 number 27, ECAMSECURE.

1 MR. WORRELL: Good morning. Hi.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

3 MR. WORRELL: Good morning.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning. Please
5 identify yourself and give us a little bit of your
6 background and what your intentions and plans are.

7 MR. WORRELL: Okay. My name is William
8 Worrell, and I am with ECAMSECURE. We're a technology
9 company. I've worked for the company and our sister
10 company for about 14 years. And I am currently looking
11 to be the patrol, private patrol license holder as well
12 as the -- I'm losing my train of thought here -- the
13 qualifying agent for the company so we can move forward
14 with technologies that require us to have these
15 licenses.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Good.

17 Any questions the of the Board? Board Member
18 Flynn?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I do. Is Mr. Coffey
20 with you today?

21 MR. WORRELL: He is not.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Who's the
23 investigator on this one?

24 MR. MAHAN: It would be Mahan in the north.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Coffey, under civil

1 litigation history, there's mention that he's involved
2 in two different wage and hour lawsuits in Nevada
3 district court. Can you shed any light on that?

4 MR. MAHAN: I was not aware of those, although
5 I was aware of some financial issues related to that.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Well, I'm aware of
7 it because on his application he self-admitted to the
8 current lawsuits. So that's why I'm asking if you did
9 any follow-up work on that.

10 MR. MAHAN: No, I did not, no.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Chair, I've got
12 huge issues with the fact that the investigator didn't
13 spot it, the fact that we don't know and that this is
14 wage and hourly lawsuits that could currently be going
15 on in our own state. I'd be curious what business that
16 was that those lawsuits are arising from, also.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Worrell, do you
18 have any background on any of this?

19 MR. WORRELL: I do not, other than I know that
20 I would assume that that's for CPS Security, which is
21 based out of California. I'm not sure. I don't have
22 any details. I do not know.

23 MR. MAHAN: And, for the Board, I did reach out
24 to Mr. Coffey on several occasions, and I did not
25 receive any response from his office or his staff.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. I appreciate that
2 additional information.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Is that it,
4 Board Member Flynn?

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That's it for me on this
6 one.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
8 Nixon?

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a question of
13 counsel. Counsel, in my review of Mr. Worrell's
14 application, that he qualified for -- to be for a
15 private patrol license. But if we have questions on the
16 corporation, can we go, can we move forward just on the
17 private patrol license and then hold off on the
18 corporation?

19 MS. BORDELOVE: I don't see why not. It's
20 agendized that he's applying for an individual private
21 patrolman license. So as long as it's clear in any
22 motions that that is what you are granting. You know,
23 if he wants it to be placed into abeyance, at any time
24 he can do that without Board action. However, for him
25 to become the qualifying agent would require later Board

1 action.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you. That
3 answers my question.

4 Any additional questions from the Board?

5 Any public comment?

6 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Is there -- with
8 no public comment, I would accept a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn, for the record.
10 I make a motion that we hold this in abeyance, give the
11 investigator time to follow up with my question and see
12 if Mr. Coffey will have a response to the State of
13 Nevada.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So we have a --

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second. Gronauer.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: A motion by Board
17 Member Flynn and a second by Board Member Gronauer
18 ("Grown-our").

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer ("Grahn-our").

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Gronauer ("Grahn-our").

21 All right. All right.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I can't wait.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You've done well most of
25 the morning.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Just call me Bobby G.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Discussion on
3 the motion?

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I just want to make sure
5 with the applicant first, you understand my concerns.
6 And I'm just as troubled that he's not responding to us.

7 MR. WORRELL: Yeah. No, I understand.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

9 MR. WORRELL: I'm not -- I guess, what does
10 this mean right at this point for what I need to do?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: If I may, Kevin?

12 MR. INGRAM: Yes.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I want the investigator to
14 take additional time to answer my questions and also to
15 find out why Mr. Coffey doesn't want to respond to us.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Are you denying him?

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm -- the whole thing,
18 I'm putting -- I'm asking for abeyance. People don't
19 have to agree with me.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

21 MR. INGRAM: You're not asking for abeyance,
22 just for postponement.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah. I'm sorry. I used
24 the wrong word. All right. Let me rephrase my...

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. That -- all
2 right. My motion is that I want to postpone any
3 decision on ECAMSECURE, both William Worrell, who's
4 applying for an individual patrolman license, and if
5 approved, he was requesting that to be held in abeyance
6 so he can become the qualifying agent, and that the
7 member to be approved is Christopher L. Coffey. This is
8 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.
9 And I'm asking that we postpone this to give the
10 investigator ample opportunity to answer my questions
11 and also determine why Mr. Coffey is not responding to
12 us.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. And is the
14 second, Mr. Gronauer, are you comfortable with changing
15 the motion, with the new, the motion's change?

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, and I'm pretty
17 much the same. Okay. Yes, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. I've got to say
19 that I'm going to oppose the motion. I believe,
20 Mr. Worrell's background and that, he is applying for a
21 private patrol license, individual private patrol. He
22 qualifies. So I would be opposing the motion for
23 consideration, maybe have a different motion. But
24 that's my position.

25 Any other, any other discussion?

1 Okay. Did I, I already asked for public
2 comment? I did not, but.

3 No public comment?

4 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
5 signify by saying "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed? Nay.

8 All right. So it passes, the motion passes
9 three to one.

10 MR. WORRELL: You'll get in touch with us?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, we -- I'm sure
12 they'll be in touch with Mr. Coffey. It's up to him
13 whether he wants to respond or not. The ball's in his
14 court.

15 MR. WORRELL: Okay. All right. Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We'll go to item
17 number 28, Method Enterprises, LLC.

18 MR. RUIZ: Good morning.

19 MR. TIMNEY: Good morning.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning. Please
22 identify yourself and also give us the background and
23 what your plans are, intentions.

24 MR. RUIZ: Yeah, my name is Alfredo Ruiz. I
25 was a former Navy SEAL for nine years. I moved to

1 Nevada and worked in the security industry for the last
2 couple years. Also, started our own training business.
3 And we're looking to expand that training business into
4 the security side. So I'm applying for -- as a
5 qualifying agent for Method Enterprises.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. And who's
7 the gentleman with you?

8 MR. TIMNEY: I'm Chad Timney. My background is
9 firearms training. I've been a law enforcement and
10 firearms instructor for the last decade.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

12 Do we have any questions from the Board? Board
13 Member Flynn?

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, but, Mr. Ruiz, thank
15 you for your service.

16 MR. RUIZ: Thank you.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I appreciate that.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Couldn't be a Marine?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm just looking at
23 some background on Mr. Timney?

24 MR. TIMNEY: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And the time and

1 distance. I'm just fine with that. No, I'm good.

2 Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have any
4 public comment?

5 All right. Seeing none, I would accept a
6 motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a
8 motion for approval. Method Enterprises, LLC is
9 applying for a new corporate private patrolman license.
10 Alfredo Ruiz, Jr. is applying for an individual private
11 patrolman license. If approved, he is requesting that
12 his individual license be placed into abeyance so that
13 he may become the qualifying agent. Members to be
14 approved are Alfredo Ruiz, Jr. and Chad C. Timney. This
15 is subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
17 Board Member Gronauer. Do we have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any discussion on the
20 motion?

21 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying
22 "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any opposed, "nay"?

25 Passes unanimously. Good luck.

1 MR. TIMNEY: Thank you.

2 MR. RUIZ: Thank you.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Did you have a question?

4 MR. RUIZ: I have a question. After speaking
5 with the investigator, Paul, to apply for the work card,
6 he said come to the Board, get your approval, and then
7 possibly turn in the paperwork at that time.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's right there.

9 MR. INGRAM: Just get with Paul.

10 MR. TIMNEY: Thank you so much.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We're good, Mr. Chair.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'm sorry?

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We're good.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh, okay.

15 Okay. Item number 29, American Federal
16 Security and Protection Group L.L.C.

17 MR. ALLEN: Good morning.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Good morning.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good morning.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning. Please
22 identify yourself, give us your background, and tell us
23 your plans, your intentions.

24 MR. ALLEN: My name is Phillip Allen. I have
25 been in the both law enforcement as well as security for

1 the better part of about 27 years. My plan is, my
2 general plan is to provide professional patrol services
3 for both private and public concerns. There would be
4 both armed and unarmed services as well.

5 I'm currently serving also as a deputy chief
6 chaplain for the North Las Vegas Police Department. I
7 have worked in the both the Eighth and the Seventh
8 Judicial District Courts, bailiff. I worked as a
9 reserve park police officer for Clark County Park Police
10 and worked for one federal judge.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Great. Thank you.

12 Any questions from the Board? Board Member
13 Flynn?

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes. Can you address
15 the -- and maybe it's cleared up by now, but the latest
16 information I have is the nine accounts that are in
17 collection.

18 MR. ALLEN: That's been taken care of as of
19 today. I have in front of me right now is at least the
20 emails clearance letters from the companies. All I'm
21 waiting for is about three other companies now to send
22 me letters of the closures and clearances on each
23 account. But each one of the accounts has been resolved
24 as of today.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. You'll need to give

1 that to the investigator.

2 MR. ALLEN: Yes.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Can you explain to me how
4 you got into this bind?

5 MR. ALLEN: Most of the information that's in
6 here is all medical. And a lot of the -- a lot of the
7 bills that were incurred either were hospital visits
8 and/or copays. Now, the problem with that was so that I
9 was under -- I was insured at the time. And I've been,
10 I was battling with my insurance company to get this
11 paid. As a matter of fact, I was kind of
12 double-covered. So one company was saying, well, it's
13 not our responsibility, it's the other's responsibility.

14 In the meantime, what was happening is that
15 while I was dealing with that, it ended up on my credit
16 report. Okay. So I was just trying get it resolved
17 that way. But seeing that they don't seem to be
18 cooperating, I decided, you know, like I said again,
19 just go ahead and get it, just go ahead and get them
20 paid, since now I have all the funds. And they're all
21 resolved.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. Thank
23 you.

24 MR. ALLEN: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon, do

1 you have any questions?

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Is there
6 any public comment?

7 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. With no
9 public comment, I would accept a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
11 motion to approve American Federal Security and
12 Protection Group L.L.C. They're applying for a new
13 corporate private patrolman license. Phillip R. Allen
14 is applying for an individual private patrolman license.
15 If we approve, he's requesting that the individual
16 license be placed into abeyance so that he may become
17 the qualifying agent. Member to be approved is
18 Phillip R. Allen. This is subject to all statutory and
19 regulatory requirements.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
21 Board Member Flynn. Do we have a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And a second by Board
24 Member Nixon. Any discussion on the motion?

25 Seeing none, all in favor --

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes, go ahead.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, Gronauer.

4 I'm not personally friends or familiar with the
5 applicant. However, I'm very familiar with his work,
6 and I commend him for it, with the North Las Vegas
7 Police Department.

8 So that's all I had to say.

9 MR. ALLEN: Thank you, sir.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Al right. Thanks for
11 the disclosure.

12 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
13 "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All opposed, "nay"?

16 Passes unanimously. Good luck, Mr. Allen.

17 MR. ALLEN: Thank you, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Item number 30, OSS
19 Services, LLC.

20 Good morning.

21 MR. RIVERA: Good morning.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please identify
23 yourself, give us a little bit of your background, and
24 tell us what your plans are or your intentions.

25 MR. RIVERA: My name is Enrique Rivera. I'm a

1 former U.S. Marine. I did two tours in Iraq during the
2 initial invasion of Iraq. I've been in the security
3 world since I was 18. I'm 36 now. My intentions are to
4 bring high-end security to clientele and just high-end
5 services.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good. Well, thank you
7 for your service.

8 Any questions from the Board? Board Member
9 Flynn?

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, I just appreciate the
11 fact he mentioned he was a U.S. Marine by the fourth
12 word he spoke. So he, obviously, understands the Board
13 up here, or some of the Board.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah. Okay. Board
15 Member Nixon?

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Semper Fi. No
19 questions.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Is there
21 any public comment?

22 Seeing none, I would accept a motion. Board
23 Member Gronauer?

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Me, no. Yeah, I'll
25 make a motion. I make a motion to approve. OSS

1 Services, LLC is applying for a new corporate private
2 patrolman license. Enrique Rivera is applying for an
3 individual private patrolman license. If approved, he
4 is requesting that his individual license be placed into
5 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.
6 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
7 requirements.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion. Do
9 we have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion, a
12 second. Discussion on the motion?

13 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying
14 "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?
17 Passes unanimously. Congratulations.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

19 MR. RIVERA: Thank you, everyone.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Next is
21 item number 31, Strategic Security Corporation.

22 All right. Mr. Yonker.

23 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please go ahead and
25 give us your background. And there may be a point where

1 you want to go into closed session. And that would be,
2 have to be at your request, if you so choose.

3 MR. YONKER: I understand.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So give us the
5 background.

6 MR. YONKER: Good morning, Board and
7 Mr. Chairman. I'm Michael Yonker. I was with the
8 Washoe County Sheriff's Office for just under 18 years.
9 And I'm currently seeking to be licensed as a private
10 patrol, excuse me, private patrolman so that my
11 licensing can be held in abeyance for Strategic Security
12 Corporation and I can be the -- be the, excuse me,
13 qualifying agent.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And who's with you?

15 MR. YONKER: And this is Joe Sordi, one of the
16 owners of Strategic Security Corporation.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right.

18 MR. SORDI: Mr. Chairman, may I make a brief
19 opening statement?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sure, absolutely.

21 MR. SORDI: Okay. Great.

22 Good morning, good morning, security colleagues
23 and distinguished ladies and gentlemen of the Board. My
24 name is Joe Sordi. I'm the Vice President of Operations
25 for Strategic Security. We are proposing Michael

1 Yonker, who's seated to my left, as qualifying manager
2 so we may expand our operations into the state of
3 Nevada.

4 I'd like to share with you a brief background
5 about myself and about our principals and our ideologies
6 of the corporation. I've learned all these, obviously,
7 from my father, who was a Marine, a hard-core Marine and
8 a disciplinarian, and ran, ran his job as he see'd until
9 he passed with his demise in a tragic accident on the
10 job. He -- he ran it with truth and temperament,
11 whereas he asked his workers that if they did an honest
12 day's work and he would back them a hundred percent.
13 And what he -- and until one day -- I'll share a quick
14 story, that this one worker comes to him and says that,
15 "I'm having a problem." And he goes over and he says,
16 "Did you follow the procedure?" And, of course the
17 worker said, "Yes." And then he goes over and checks
18 the worker's procedure. And wouldn't you know it, the
19 very first thing, he missed. And, therefore, you know,
20 he took some action against him.

21 These same type of ideologies of integrity and
22 honest and hard-working ability is what I brought into
23 my 20-year with the NYPD, where I treated by colleagues
24 and subordinates with respect, a fair hand and held them
25 accountable to the highest standards. Because the best

1 is just not good enough. I served in a variety of
2 capacities from patrol officer to narcotics, public
3 mals, weapons of mass destruction, detective and
4 intelligence division, assigned to the U.S. State
5 Department for a brief period of time protecting former
6 Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, and the strategic
7 response group responsible for responding to acts of
8 terrorism and active shooters.

9 Over my 20-year career, I'd experienced
10 numerous things that were caused -- caused a momentary
11 pause, the bad signs of humanity and the good signs.
12 After all, after all this time, I came to develop some
13 things that I saw in officers and in people that I would
14 emulate what I like to call the strategic spirit. And
15 this is what we guide our entire corporation on,
16 principals of integrity, accountability, training and
17 professionalism. And this is how we base our hiring.

18 Mr. Yonker has shared with me his entire
19 personnel folder from his 17 years in law enforcement,
20 which included a detailed account of the matter that
21 resulted in the separation from his former agency. Upon
22 conducting our own due diligence, Mr. Yonker possesses
23 no criminal history, has no drug -- has passed the drug
24 screening with us, has also passed an MMPI with us. And
25 his references, both professional and personal, have

1 checked out. He holds countless accommodations for
2 bravery, actions in stopping violent crimes, as well as
3 lifesaving actions that prevented death.

4 After a complete review, we feel that
5 Mr. Yonker possesses this strategic spirit. And we are
6 comfortable at this time with Mr. Yonker as our
7 qualifying manager. Since we as a company hold licenses
8 in several of the states, we have our own in-house
9 quality control officer that runs weekly reports to
10 ensure all licensing paperwork is complete and kept
11 current. We find that having this QC officer adds yet
12 another layer to ensure qualifying managers, such as
13 Mr. Yonker, are operating within the state's guidelines.

14 Mind you, that at any point in the future,
15 should there be any adverse action taken against
16 Mr. Yonker, either civilly or criminally, we will
17 immediately terminate our agreement with Mr. Yonker,
18 notify the Board, and move to have the qualifying
19 manager replaced within 120 days, the given amount of
20 time.

21 Ladies and gentlemen of the Board, I thank you
22 for your time today. And I ask that you approve
23 Mr. Yonker as Strategic Security Corp.'s qualifying
24 manager.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Sordi.

1 Okay. Do we have -- I would expect there's
2 going to be some in-depth questions. Would you want to
3 request a closed hearing?

4 MR. YONKER: No, sir. Everyone can hear what
5 we have to say.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Because we do
7 have documents, that we'll probably come to that one
8 issue.

9 MR. YONKER: I understand.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: But you've provided
11 those to us, correct?

12 MR. YONKER: Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right.
14 Then, do we have questions from the Board? Board Member
15 Flynn?

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah. The first question
17 is just out of curiosity, Mr. Sordi. Christie Sordi is
18 listed as a 200 percent owner. I've been doing this for
19 three years. I've never seen a 200 percent owner. And
20 I've seen that on more than one document. How do you
21 become a 200 percent owner?

22 MR. SORDI: That's just the allocation of the
23 corporate shares, that the State New York, that's how
24 they allocate their shares, 200 is the highest that they
25 allocate. And that's when the corporation was

1 originally set up, that's how they list it.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

3 MR. SORDI: And, yes, she is my better half.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Well, that
5 one, that part I can understand.

6 Okay. Mr. Yonker, you're aware that we got
7 your background with the Washoe County Sheriff's Office,
8 correct?

9 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir. I provided that to your
10 investigator.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And I had asked for
12 that, and I received it, and it satisfied my curiosity.
13 I have no other questions.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
15 Nixon?

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I have no questions.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
18 Gronauer?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Give me a second,
20 please.

21 I had one reserved, but I'm okay with the
22 explanation of the goals here that the gentleman from
23 New York states that he has. So I'm okay. No
24 questions. I'm satisfied.

25 MR. SORDI: Thank you, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a question that
2 deals with one of these. One of the disciplines you
3 received at Washoe County Sheriff's Office entailed
4 working after hours as an investigator, private
5 investigator in security; is that correct?

6 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Was that within the
8 state of Nevada?

9 MR. YONKER: No, sir, that was in the state of
10 California.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Was it under a
12 licensee; in other words, was it a licensee that you
13 were working under?

14 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Or working for?

16 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. When you first
18 came and talked to us, as I recall, and I may be
19 mistaken, you indicated that it was the result of the
20 high speed pursuit, was the result of your termination?

21 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: As we know from this
23 record, there were several things over the years that
24 were involved.

25 MR. YONKER: They did list several things.

1 But, ultimately, the accident was the --

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: That was the
3 combination of all of that stuff. Okay. You
4 acknowledge all of these disciplines?

5 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And were they
7 violations of the procedures, the rules and procedures
8 for the Sheriff's Office?

9 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And you accept
11 responsibility for those?

12 MR. YONKER: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right. I
14 have no additional questions. Any additional questions
15 from the Board?

16 Okay. Is there any public comment, north or
17 south?

18 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Then, I'll
20 accept a motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
22 motion that we deny. The applicant, Strategic Security
23 Corp., they're applying for a private patrolman license.
24 Michael A. Yonker is applying for the individual private
25 patrolman license. If approved, he's requesting that

1 his individual license be placed into abeyance so that
2 he may become the qualifying agent. Corporate officers
3 to be approved are Christie L. Sordi and Joseph C.
4 Sordi. This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
5 requirements.

6 I don't have an issue with Strategic Security
7 Corp. I have an issue with the qualifying agent. We --
8 I sense there was warrant in this case. It wasn't
9 brought forth at the initial hearing. We received a lot
10 more. In looking at the documentation here, that the
11 final discipline was based on the pattern and practice
12 over the years. So I am confident in my decision to
13 make a motion for denial.

14 MR. SORDI: Chairman, may I interject for a
15 moment?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: No, we're now in
17 deliberation.

18 MR. SORDI: Okay.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And in the motion phase
20 at this point.

21 Okay. We have a motion by Board Member Flynn.
22 Do we have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a second by
25 Board Member Nixon. Discussion on the motion?

1 I'm going to support the motion, because we
2 would be approving the corporation, but additionally we
3 would be approving the qualifying agent, and we would be
4 providing an individual license to Mr. Yonker. And I
5 don't -- and if the corporation has an issue with
6 Mr. Yonker, they could terminate Mr. Yonker, but he
7 would still have his -- still have his license. And, I
8 think, that's the thing that's concerning me.

9 So, therefore, I'm going to support the motion.
10 Any additional discussion?

11 MR. YONKER: I could like to add something, if
12 I could.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'm sorry. We're in
14 the deliberation and the motion stage.

15 MR. YONKER: Okay.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: No comments at this
17 point.

18 Any additional comments?

19 Mr. Yonker would like to add an additional
20 comment. Would the Board want to hear that, or would
21 you like to move forward with the vote?

22 MR. SORDI: I would respond, sir.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I believe, under our
24 rules, he can comment during public comment. We're
25 done.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

2 MR. SORDI: Sir, I just asked --

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We have to take a vote.

4 MR. YONKER: Sir, you brought up a point that
5 you did not ask and I wasn't able to address under
6 public comments.

7 MR. SORDI: And I would ask, sir, that if I
8 could, if you would just afford me the opportunity. I
9 flew across the country, obviously, for a reason. But I
10 would like to, just based on my 20 years of law
11 enforcement experience, just intercede for a minute and
12 address a quick point to your disciplinary action, if
13 you may.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: The point of order is
15 that we're in the deliberations.

16 MR. SORDI: Okay. No problem.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And a motion has been
18 made. And you're talking a combined probably somewhere
19 in the area of about 75 years of law enforcement here on
20 this Board, maybe longer. I think, one probably has
21 that just on his own.

22 So. Okay. We have a motion. We have a
23 second. All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
24 "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

2 Mr. Yonker, you're welcome to come back and
3 apply at a later date.

4 But, I think, right now, Mr. Sordi, we're not
5 here for the first --

6 MR. SORDI: Yes.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: -- the first hearing.
8 And I think that the tone was set. We got additional
9 information. And, you know, we've evaluated it. And, I
10 think, we're at the point where the decision's been
11 made. Okay.

12 Mr. Yonker, again, you're welcome to come back
13 and apply again at a later date. But not now.

14 MR. SORDI: Okay. Thank you for your time.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We're on --

16 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, I'd mention that you
17 had a phone call at 11:00. Is that still?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: You know, that was
19 cancelled. So if you want to push forward, we can. Or
20 we can do a bio break if you want.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We're all saying yeah to
22 this bio break. 10 minutes?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. It sounds
24 good.

25 * * * * *

1 (A break was taken, 11:00 to 11:13 a.m.)

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you. We're back
4 in session, then.

5 Let's move on to number 32, Pedro Guzman.

6 MR. GUZMAN: Good morning.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning, sir.
9 Please identify yourself, give us a little bit of your
10 background, and tell us what your plans are.

11 MR. GUZMAN: My name is Pedro Guzman. I've
12 been in security for 18 years. I've been with
13 Commercial Protective Services for 18 years. I started
14 as a security officer, and I'm the current branch
15 manager. And we're looking to continue to provide
16 private security in Las Vegas.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Questions from
18 the Board? Board Member Flynn?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I have none.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I have none.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm fine, thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. I have no
25 questions. Is there any public comment?

1 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Seeing none, I'd accept
3 a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn, for the record.
5 I'll make a motion that to approve. Pedro Guzman is
6 applying for an individual private patrolman license.
7 If approved, he is requesting that his individual
8 license be placed into abeyance so that he may become
9 the qualifying agent for Commercial Protective Services,
10 Inc., license number 741. This is subject to all
11 statutory and regulatory requirements.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
13 Board Member Flynn. Do we have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Second by Board Member
16 Nixon. Discussion on the motion?

17 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
18 "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

21 Passes unanimously. Congratulations,
22 Mr. Guzman.

23 MR. GUZMAN: Thank you.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You have a good day.

25 MR. GUZMAN: Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 33, Nathan J.
2 Vargas.

3 MR. VARGAS: Good morning.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Good morning.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning, sir.

7 Would you please identify yourself, give us a little bit
8 of your background, and tell us what your plans are.

9 MR. VARGAS: My name is Nathan J. Vargas. I've
10 been in security for approximately 20 years now. And
11 I've worked all the way from officer all the way up to
12 vice president. And, I think, it's time that I take
13 that next step.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have any
15 questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair.

17 Mr. Vargas, I just have a couple questions. I
18 know it's been quite some time, but do you want to tell
19 me what happened when you were arrested for resisting a
20 police officer?

21 MR. VARGAS: Yes.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: What the circumstances
23 were.

24 MR. VARGAS: Yes. Back in -- I believe, that
25 was '99 or 2000, I think. So at the time, I was -- got

1 some information from my brother that he was joining the
2 military, he was going to leave. My brother's pretty
3 much my mother, my father. He's my everything. He was
4 all I had. We had a little bit of a disagreement.

5 I went down to the NASCAR Cafe, and I purchased
6 a meal. I was sitting there, eating my meal. And it
7 was, obviously, pretty busy. It was myself. And the
8 waitress showed up and said, "Do you mind, you know,
9 moving outside or, you know, finishing up, because
10 you've only got a bite left." And it was a couple
11 French fries and a glass of water. I just basically
12 said I was a paying customer, I just want to finish my
13 meal, as soon as I'm done I'll be out of here.

14 And the next thing you know, she shows up with
15 her manager and -- I guess, it was two Metro officers.
16 I wasn't aware of that. And, basically, said, "You
17 know, you need to leave," blah, blah, "You're -- you
18 know, you're causing a" -- how do you say? Like a
19 disturbance. And I wasn't. I was just sitting there,
20 minding my business, eating my meal.

21 And the next thing you know, somebody grabbed
22 my shoulder and ripped me back. And, like I said, I
23 didn't know that was Metro. And I resisted. Once I
24 realized -- I heard a Metro officer, blah, blah -- you
25 know, that's when I -- I stopped immediately. They put

1 me in handcuffs, and got arrested for trespassing and
2 resisting arrest. And then I do believe they later on
3 got dismissed and dropped.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. There's, obviously,
5 difference of opinion between you and your last
6 employer?

7 MR. VARGAS: Yes.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Do you want to address
9 that, because --

10 MR. VARGAS: Sure.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: -- you're already first to
12 give negative comments from the prior, but.

13 MR. VARGAS: Actually, Kevin, would it be okay
14 if I spoke on that in front of everybody? Because I
15 don't want to bash some other employer for certain
16 things, because it is somewhat personal. Or if that
17 would be all professional, if I spoke on my behalf, or?
18 Because it was -- the reason why it was -- it's a deal
19 where I did not agree with what was going on, no honor,
20 illegal activities. And so I chose to respectfully
21 resign, because I didn't want to be affiliated with
22 that.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And where are you working
24 now?

25 MR. VARGAS: I'm sorry?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Where are you working now?

2 MR. VARGAS: Right now, I'm currently
3 unemployed.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And how long has
5 that been?

6 MR. VARGAS: It's been a few weeks now, about
7 two weeks. I was working for AEGIS Security with
8 Dennis, good gentleman. And now I'm currently
9 unemployed. And I'm kind of excited about today. And,
10 hopefully, we can take this next step.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. I'm satisfied.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm done, Mr. Chair.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

15 Board Member, Nixon, do you have any questions?

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, just a little
19 follow-up. Since 2000, have you ever had run-ins,
20 citations, or anything else with police?

21 MR. VARGAS: Negative.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No citations?

23 MR. VARGAS: Like a speeding ticket? Yes,
24 speeding ticket.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: HP tickets?

1 MR. VARGAS: One in Vegas, I believe. Yes, one
2 in Vegas for speeding. And then, I think, there was one
3 in North Dakota, because, well, in North Dakota, there's
4 no signs. They're all broken down, and you don't know
5 what's what, because. And I was doing five miles an
6 hour over the speed limit, and she cited me for it.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Is that it?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's it.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Is there any
11 public comment?

12 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Seeing no public
14 comment, I would accept a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a
16 motion to approve. Nathan J. Vargas is applying for an
17 individual private patrolman license. This is subject
18 to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a motion by
20 Board Member Gronauer. Do we have a second?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion and a
23 second. Discussion on the motion?

24 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
25 signify by saying "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

3 Passes unanimously. Congratulations,

4 Mr. Vargas.

5 MR. VARGAS: Thank you. I appreciate it.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good luck.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And now, moving to the
9 area of process server, number 34, National Discovery
10 Solutions, Incorporated.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning.

12 MR. ALVAREZ: Good morning.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please identify
15 yourself, give us a little bit of your background, and
16 tell us what your plans or intentions are.

17 MR. ALVAREZ: My name is John Alvarez, and I am
18 applying for a new corporate and individual process
19 server's license. I've been in the legal support
20 business for the last nine years. And I look forward to
21 conducting business here in this state.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do we have any
23 questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Is there
5 any public comment?

6 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Seeing none, I'd accept
8 a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
10 motion that we approve National Discovery Solutions,
11 Inc., applying for a new corporate process server
12 license. John B. Alvarez is applying for an individual
13 process server license. If we approve, he's requesting
14 that his individual license be placed into abeyance so
15 that he may become the qualifying agent. This is
16 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
18 Board Member Flynn. Do we have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a second by
21 Board Member Nixon. Any discussion on the motion?

22 All in favor, signify by saying "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

25 Passes unanimously. Congratulations,

1 Mr. Alvarez. Good luck.

2 MR. ALVAREZ: Thank you. Thank you all.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a good day.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We'll go into private
5 investigator and private patrol. Number 35, Thomas G.
6 Glazier Jr.

7 MR. GLAZIER: Hi, good morning, everyone.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning. Please
10 identify yourself, give us some of your background, and
11 tell us what your plans are.

12 MR. GLAZIER: My name is Thomas G. Glazier Jr.
13 My past history employment consists of serving in the
14 United States Army from '81 to '84. From '84 to '88, I
15 served at an undisclosed weapons testing facility here
16 in Nevada as a security officer. And since 1988 to
17 current, as of last week, I served 31 years with the
18 North Las Vegas Police Department, reaching the rank of
19 lieutenant.

20 My intentions are to start a private security
21 company and work in conjunction with an entity out of
22 California named, called Premier of Medical Tourism,
23 initially starting out by providing executive protection
24 to their clients and, hopefully, expanding the business
25 to go even larger as time goes by.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. First off, thank
2 you for your service. Secondly, you've already retired
3 from North Las Vegas?

4 MR. GLAZIER: Yes, sir, effective -- March 1st
5 was my last day.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right. Any
7 questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Is there any
14 public comment?

15 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Seeing no public
17 comment, I'd accept a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
19 motion that we approve. Thomas G. Glazier Jr. is
20 applying for an individual private investigator and
21 private patrolman license. This is subject to all
22 statutory and regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
24 Board Member Flynn. Do we have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. And we have
2 a second. Discussion on the motion?

3 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying
4 "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

7 Passes unanimously. Thank you, Mr. Glazier.
8 Good luck.

9 MR. GLAZIER: Thank you very much.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a good one.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Congratulations on your
12 retirement.

13 MR. GLAZIER: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We'll move into the
15 area of private patrolman and canine handler.
16 Number 36, Global K9 Protection Group, LLC.

17 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Hooker?

18 Not present.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Not here?

20 MR. INGRAM: No, sir.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Let's move
22 on to private investigator, private patrol and process
23 server. Item number 37, Remote Risk Management, LLC.

24 MR. PADRON: Good morning, Mr. Chairman.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning, sir.

1 Please identify yourself, give us some of your
2 background, and let us know what you're planning with
3 all this.

4 MR. PADRON: Good morning, Mr. Chairman. My
5 name is Ronnie Padron. I'm the chief executive officer
6 and the qualifying agent for Remote Risk Management,
7 LLC. I also hold that position for three of our other
8 sister companies. Collectively, we service 11 states.
9 In my 23 years of being the qualifying agent and the CEO
10 of these companies, we are a full-service agency and
11 provide investigative and protective services and
12 process serving. We're looking to expand our operation
13 with our current customers and new customers in the
14 state of Nevada. And we ask that you please issue our
15 licenses.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have any
17 questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, sir.

23 Mr. Padron, do you currently do work in Nevada?

24 MR. PADRON: No. No, sir.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Have you done work in

1 Nevada?

2 MR. PADRON: No, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'm good.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Thank you.

5 Is there any public comment?

6 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Seeing
8 none, I'd accept a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I make a motion that
10 Remote Risk Management, LLC is applying for a new
11 private investigator, private patrolman and process
12 server license. Ronnie -- Padron?

13 MR. PADRON: Padron, that's correct.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: -- is applying for an
15 individual private investigator's, private patrolman and
16 process server license. If approved, he is requesting
17 that his individual license be placed in abeyance so
18 that he may become the qualifying agent. Member, member
19 to be approved, Ronnie Padron. It's subject to all
20 statutory and regulatory requirements.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion by
22 Board Member Nixon. Do we have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Second by Board Member
25 Flynn. Discussion on the motion?

1 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
2 "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Nay?

5 The motion passes unanimously. Good luck,
6 Mr. Padron.

7 MR. PADRON: Thank you very much, sir. Thank
8 you very much, Board.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a nice day.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We're now moving into
11 the registration appeals. This is -- there is no public
12 comment associated with these, as these are
13 administrative.

14 And we'll start with number 38, Lui Taulua
15 ("Tah-loh"), Taulua ("Tah-lah").

16 MR. INGRAM: He's in the south.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good morning. Please
18 state your name for the record.

19 MR. TAULUA: I'm Lui Taulua ("Loo-ee
20 TAL-loo-ah").

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Investigator
22 Saladino, it looks like this is yours. Could you please
23 recap.

24 MR. SALADINO: Yes, Mr. Chair. Investigator
25 Saladino. The applicant was denied for a 1996 robbery

1 with a deadly weapon where the applicant served 20 years
2 in the state of Hawaii. The applicant did list the
3 felony conviction. And the court date showed a
4 discharge date of January 26th of 2017.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Sir, would you
6 mind explaining what the circumstances were of that.

7 MR. TAULUA: It happened back in '95. There
8 was a robbery. There was a gun involved that I used.
9 At the time, it was like a home invasion. But back
10 then, it was the wrong choices that I made. I admit to
11 that. And I ended up getting 18 years behind me. 20.
12 I did 18 of it.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: You did 18 of the 20?

14 MR. TAULUA: Yeah.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

16 MR. TAULUA: And I had to reflect back on my
17 life and where I was going, because that's a big
18 sentence, you know. And I missed out on a lot of
19 things. I know that I was sorry that I hurt the
20 victims, the families, as well as mine, and the
21 community as well. So there wasn't a day that went by,
22 that I try to better myself, when I come home I can be a
23 better person and be a productive member of society.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any questions
25 from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes. Taulua?

2 MR. TAULUA: (Nodded head affirmatively.)

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Sir, you've been out of
4 prison a few years now. What have you done in a few
5 years?

6 MR. TAULUA: Well, I'm currently working as a
7 sew-er.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: As a what?

9 MR. TAULUA: Sewing.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Uh-huh (affirmative).

11 MR. TAULUA: Right here, make tarps for big
12 rigs. And I've been there for three months. I just
13 came from Hawaii in October.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: M-hm (affirmative).

15 MR. TAULUA: I worked auto detail. And that
16 didn't work out because of paying someone too high.
17 That's how it worked out.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Could you speak up a
19 little bit, sir. We're having difficulty hearing you up
20 here. Actually, why don't you move that microphone a
21 little bit closer to you.

22 Very good. Thank you.

23 MR. TAULUA: Since I've been here, I've done a
24 lot of stuff here. I've done work remodeling houses, to
25 an auto detailing, and now I'm doing sewing at a tarp

1 factory. So. I have my own place. I have my own
2 transportation. So I'm doing pretty good out here, you
3 know. I go to church every week. So.

4 All I'm asking for is a chance. That's all I'm
5 asking.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn, any
7 additional questions?

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: How long have you lived in
9 the state of Nevada?

10 MR. TAULUA: Since October.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Since October?

12 MR. TAULUA: Yeah.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon, any
15 questions?

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No. No. I'm good. Thank
17 you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Gronauer?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes. Sir, how old were
20 you when you committed this crime?

21 MR. TAULUA: 31.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Pardon?

23 MR. TAULUA: 31.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You committed the crime
25 when you were 31?

1 MR. TAULUA: Yeah. I'm 53 now.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Were you in trouble
3 before that?

4 MR. TAULUA: Yeah.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Let's see. Did you
6 have a criminal record before you were 31 years old?

7 MR. TAULUA: No, no.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No?

9 MR. TAULUA: No.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Do you have
11 family in Nevada?

12 MR. TAULUA: Yes.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have a support
14 group?

15 MR. TAULUA: Yes.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And a Nevada driver's
17 license?

18 MR. TAULUA: No.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have a Nevada ID
20 card?

21 MR. TAULUA: Yes.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. You've been in
23 Hawaii. 20 years is a lot of time. So, you know, I
24 don't care where you are. But, you know, at the time --
25 okay. I just have some reservations, so I'm just trying

1 to figure out where you're at right now. Do you have a
2 good support group?

3 MR. TAULUA: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you married?

5 MR. TAULUA: No, I'm single.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. What's your
7 support group consist of?

8 MR. TAULUA: It's New Life Church there in
9 Henderson.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I know where it is.
11 Okay. Do you know who the pastor is out there?

12 MR. TAULUA: Yes.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What is his name?

14 MR. TAULUA: Louie.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'm good.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'm sorry. Could you
17 repeat the name of the pastor.

18 MR. TAULUA: Lewis.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Sir, while
20 you were incarcerated, what did you do to try to make
21 your life better?

22 MR. TAULUA: Well, I took all kind of programs,
23 and I got my GED. I graduated anger management. I did
24 life skills. I did parenting. I did any, any program
25 that was available to me. I took up plumbing. I'm a

1 certified plumber. I'm certified on commercial
2 cleaning.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you very
4 much.

5 All right. I would accept a motion, if there
6 is one.

7 Do we have a motion at all?

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
9 motion. I'm going to make a motion to deny. And the
10 reason being, the applicant has been in the state of
11 Nevada less than a year. And I would like to -- I have
12 no problem if he comes before us next year, still
13 employed, still out of trouble. I would support at that
14 time. But I don't believe we've got enough time and
15 distance between him being released and asking for a job
16 in security that quick.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
18 by Board Member Flynn. Do we have a second on that
19 motion?

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second. I concur with
21 the reasons as well, time and distance.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion, and
23 we have a second. Any discussion on the motion?

24 I'm going to support the motion, also. I
25 think, more time and distance, and lack of time in

1 Nevada. Any other, any other discussion on the motion?

2 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
3 "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Passes unanimously.

6 Mr. Taulua, the denial has been upheld. But
7 you're eligible to come back in a year and reapply.

8 MR. TAULUA: Okay. I appreciate it.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you, sir.

10 MR. TAULUA: Thank you very much.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Continue the good work.

12 MR. TAULUA: Yeah. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Number 39,
14 Ryan M. Davis.

15 MR. DAVIS: Good morning, everybody.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Good morning.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Investigator Saladino,
19 it looks like you're up again.

20 MR. SALADINO: Yes, Mr. Chair. Investigator
21 Saladino. The applicant has denied for a 2005 felony
22 grand larceny out of Las Vegas. The applicant received
23 60 months suspended and was placed on three years
24 probation. The applicant did disclose the felony
25 conviction.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Mr. Davis, do
2 you want to identify yourself. And, also, please
3 identify who's with you there at the table.

4 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes. My name is Ryan Davis.
5 This is my father, Russ Davis.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

7 MR. RYAN DAVIS: He's here to support me.

8 MR. RUSS DAVIS: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you. Would you
10 please explain what the circumstances were of the arrest
11 and conviction?

12 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes, sir. I was a young,
13 immature child. Drinking, drugs got ahold of me. And I
14 pawned some stolen merchandise at a pawnshop. And since
15 then, I've reentered society. I currently possess my
16 guard card in California. I am trying to move back out
17 here to be with my family.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Questions of the
19 Board. Board Member Gronauer?

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This charge, you were
21 arrested for this charge, correct?

22 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes, sir.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And what was your
24 disposition; yeah, what was the end of it, what was the
25 results?

1 MR. RYAN DAVIS: I went to prison. And I was
2 released on parole. And I completed parole. And I've
3 been out of trouble since.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: When were you released
5 from parole?

6 MR. RYAN DAVIS: I was released from parole
7 early 2010.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What have you been
9 doing since 2010?

10 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Well, I obtained by GED in
11 2014. I've been working. I have a wife and a kid now.
12 And I currently work for Allied Universal in California.
13 And I'm trying to transfer with them out to here.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: How long have you been
15 married?

16 MR. RYAN DAVIS: I've been married for going on
17 five years this year.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

19 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon, any
21 questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: You said you were arrested
23 for selling stuff to a pawnshop?

24 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes, ma'am.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Did you take that stuff?

1 MR. RYAN DAVIS: No, ma'am. It was given to
2 me. I pawned it. I knew it was stolen, though.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Did you have any prior
6 arrests before this?

7 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes, sir. I, for -- there was
8 a three-year period where I was just out of control.
9 And I was running the streets like a hoodlum and in a
10 really place, you know. And I actually am very happy
11 that I went to prison, because since then, I realize
12 where I never want to be again, you know.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I appreciate your answer
14 to that. Just what type of offenses were you arrested
15 for?

16 MR. RYAN DAVIS: I had trespassing in a park, a
17 couple of them. It's so long ago. I did have a
18 possession of a stolen vehicle, joyriding. It was,
19 yeah, it was stuff like that.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. But the
21 reason I asked is five years for grand larceny and other
22 stuff.

23 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Oh, there was stuff that I --
24 when you walk into a pawnshop, you get numerous charges.
25 You get obtainment under false pretenses. You get two

1 counts of burglary for that. So it was all just dropped
2 down to that. And grand larceny holds a two to five
3 years.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. Thank
5 you.

6 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Davis, I had a
8 question. And maybe it's better for the investigator.

9 Investigator Saladino, on the report here, it
10 says the applicant received 60 months prison term
11 suspended and placed on three years probation.

12 But, Mr. Davis, did you actually do time in
13 state prison or in the county jail, or what?

14 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes, sir. I was in High
15 Desert State Penitentiary, and I was then transferred to
16 a Southern Desert, and then I went the five, too.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And how long have you
18 been out now?

19 MR. RYAN DAVIS: I've been out for nine years,
20 sir.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Nine years. All right.

22 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yes, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Thank you.
24 Thank you. I have no more questions.

25 Any additional questions from the Board?

1 Seeing none --

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, I appreciate --

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh, go right ahead,
4 Ray. Sorry about that.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I appreciate that. Is
6 there anything you want to add, sir?

7 MR. RUSS DAVIS: Yes.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Since you took the time to
9 be here.

10 MR. RUSS DAVIS: I speak to his character for
11 the last six years. He's given me a beautiful
12 daughter-in-law and grandson. I would like to have them
13 closer to us. I definitely don't condone what he did,
14 when he did it, but he has got his life in a forward
15 motion and on the right path.

16 So I'd like you to truly consider reversal. I
17 appreciate it.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And he's wearing the right
19 hockey team. It's all good.

20 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Yeah.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. I have no
22 further questions, Mr. Chair.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. With no
24 further questions, may I get a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah. Ray Flynn. I'll

1 make the motion that we do grant this appeal to the
2 denial. I want to base this on time and distance, the
3 fact that he is currently employed in security in
4 California. There's no other issues that have been
5 disclosed to this Board. And, also, I appreciated the
6 applicant's responses to all our questions.

7 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Thank you, sir.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
9 by Board Member Flynn. Do we have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second it. Member
11 Gronauer. Second.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Gronauer ("Grahn-our")
13 seconded.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm not Gronauer. I'm
15 Bobby G.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: See, I keep thinking
17 I'm saying Gronauer ("Grahn-our"). And, obviously, it's
18 not coming out the way I'm thinking it's coming out.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. So we have
21 a motion and a second. Discussion on the motion?

22 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
23 "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Passes four -- passes

1 unanimously, four to nothing. Congratulations,
2 Mr. Davis. You will get your card.

3 MR. RYAN DAVIS: Thank you very much, sir. I
4 appreciate it. Thank you, guys. I appreciate it.

5 MR. RUSS DAVIS: Thank you.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board, I'm going to
8 move item number 50 up, Patricia E. Barajas.

9 Okay. Shawn, this looks like it's --
10 Investigator Mahan, it looks like it's you.

11 MR. MAHAN: Ms. Barajas applied for her private
12 investigator license in November of last year. She was
13 subsequently denied for failing to disclose a felony and
14 multiple arrests on her arrest record.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So, Ms. Barajas, why
16 did you not disclose your arrests?

17 MS. BARAJAS: I did. And the denial said it
18 was for a gun charge. I have no gun charge.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. What charges do
20 you -- what charges are you aware of?

21 MS. BARAJAS: I have a felony of -- I think, it
22 might be larceny. I was very intoxicated. By the way,
23 my name is Patricia. I've been in Reno for 25 years.
24 And I've worked at Costco for four. Now, this happened
25 in two thousand -- 19 -- I can't even remember, it's

1 been so long. '99, around there, because I was
2 intoxicated. Alcoholism is on both sides of my family.
3 And I am a recovering alcoholic. And I was drinking in
4 the casino, and I took a purse that was between. I was
5 very intoxicated.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

7 MS. BARAJAS: And took a purse. And I got
8 caught for it. And I went to jail.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Did you spend time in
10 jail?

11 MS. BARAJAS: I did. They put me on house
12 arrest. I didn't do well on it. I didn't follow
13 instructions. On house arrest, it's very stringent.
14 You've got to be at home at a certain time. You've got
15 to -- also, they did alcohol tests on me. I didn't fail
16 that. But my parole officer just thought that I was not
17 doing -- I wasn't, I wasn't doing things the way she
18 wanted me to. So they made me go back to prison in
19 Las Vegas. Finished, I think, it might have been six
20 months. And I did the whole time, and I got out without
21 being on probation.

22 And so I am not an -- I'm not drinking anymore.
23 I'm a recovering alcoholic, I'd like to say. I went to
24 anger management classes. I also go to AA still now.
25 And I am a lifetime, lifetime member of an anger

1 management class in Sparks. And don't ask me the name
2 because it's a bunch of abbreviations of letters. I can
3 never remember them. As I'm getting older, it's hard to
4 remember those letters. But I'm really proud of myself.
5 Because I had a hard struggle trying to recover from
6 alcoholism. And my family's pretty proud of me,
7 especially my husband, who's put up with me for 44
8 years. And we have a home in Sparks.

9 And I thought this job would be really good for
10 me when I retire, because it's so -- H and S Brands
11 Global hired me. And it's very -- you can do the job
12 when you want to. You can accept a job or not accept
13 a -- by the way, did I say -- I'm sorry. I'm a little
14 nervous. Did I mention it's for mystery shopping? So
15 you don't have to accept it when you don't want to, and
16 can accept it. You can do three or four shops in one
17 day.

18 So I wanted to try it. I work at Costco 20
19 hours a week. I'm on disability Social Security. And
20 next year, I will be 66 and be able to retire. And I
21 thought this would be a great job to start now.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: The --

23 MS. BARAJAS: And what didn't I disclose?

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Well, that's what I was
25 trying to figure out. You said you did disclose. What

1 did you, what did you disclose on your application?

2 MS. BARAJAS: That I was a felon. Me and --
3 Shawn, is it?

4 MR. MAHAN: Yes.

5 MS. BARAJAS: We talked about that. You -- I
6 came to you before I even did anything.

7 MR. MAHAN: In fairness, in fairness to the
8 Board, she did disclose the 19 -- she listed a 1997
9 arrest for intoxicated behavior, and she did indicate
10 she was convicted. However, there were other arrests
11 that did show up in her background investigation that
12 were not discussed or disclosed.

13 MS. BARAJAS: Were they -- I don't have any
14 other felonies.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Not felonies, but two
16 domestic batteries.

17 MS. BARAJAS: I only have one. And I didn't --
18 when I looked at that, I only seen felon. I didn't see
19 misdemeanors. I didn't think misdemeanors mattered.
20 And the past jobs asked you, are you a felon? So in my
21 mind, when I was doing it, I didn't see the
22 misdemeanors. I just looked at the felony and filled
23 out the felony. It didn't even occur to me to put a
24 misdemeanor on there. But I did bring them. I got them
25 from Storey County like he asked me to.

1 And I'm still with my husband. And he couldn't
2 come today, but he said that he -- if you -- if I can
3 call him, and he could let you know how good I've been
4 doing.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have any
6 questions from the Board down south? Board Member
7 Nixon?

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No. I'm good. Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I guess, my question is to
11 the Executive Director on the reason for denial. And
12 having a -- I don't have an application in front of me.
13 But here we have, the choices are, in terms of
14 disclosure, felony, crime involving moral turpitude or
15 the illegal use or possession of a dangerous weapon.

16 MS. BARAJAS: I don't have a weapon.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I read this, and I don't
18 see misdemeanor in there. So I don't know on the
19 application.

20 MR. INGRAM: There's an application right
21 there. The application requests them to list all
22 arrests.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

24 MR. INGRAM: Including any dismissals.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

1 MR. MAHAN: And --

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So on this, this denial
3 right now, and this is for the investigator up north,
4 this denial right now is the failure to list the
5 domestic violences in 2014?

6 MR. MAHAN: Yes, sir. And there were multiple
7 arrests in addition to that. There was a vandalism
8 arrest. There was using credit cards illegally.

9 MS. BARAJAS: No.

10 MR. MAHAN: These are arrests, is what he's
11 asking for. But they were multiple. They were dating
12 back to 1976.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. But in terms of
14 recency, did she list the 1998 crime against the victim
15 over 65 years of age?

16 MR. MAHAN: She listed. That was the only
17 crime she listed, and it was -- she got the date wrong,
18 but she did list a 1997 theft while intoxicated. And, I
19 believe, I --

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

21 MR. MAHAN: -- have the Reno records police
22 report on that, also.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Right. And has there been
24 any police activity since 2014?

25 MR. MAHAN: She has not been in any, that I

1 could find, since 2014.

2 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, just for clarification,
3 Kevin Ingram. Anytime there's a felony conviction, we
4 are required to deny the applicant. And being failure
5 to disclose is another reason that we would deny. But
6 even taking the misdemeanors out of there, she would
7 have been denied just because of the felony conviction.

8 MR. MAHAN: Okay.

9 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I have no further
11 questions, Mr. Chair.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Bobby G?

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: There you go. Yes.

14 Ms. Barajas, I'm sorry if I'm pronouncing it
15 wrong, but everyone does my name, too. Barajas?

16 MS. BARAJAS: Yes.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have any
18 certificates for your anger management or alcohol abuse
19 that says you're attending these classes?

20 MS. BARAJAS: No. But I --

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because I know, even on
22 the domestic violences -- and on the domestic violence,
23 it also says you attended classes. But do you have any
24 certificates for that?

25 MS. BARAJAS: No, I didn't bring them. No.

1 They, the court, in my record it shows that I did bring
2 them to them. But I didn't know that this was going to
3 matter. I didn't. So I didn't bring them. I could
4 have brought a letter from my husband, my kids, my work,
5 my boss. I'm doing very good. I'm doing -- you know,
6 keeping -- keeping sober, and I like it. My life has
7 changed tremendously. And I'm very happy that I am
8 sober today. I'm doing good. My life has never been
9 better.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. To the
11 investigator -- you should be proud of yourself.

12 MS. BARAJAS: I am.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: To the investigator,
14 are there any certificates or anything?

15 MR. MAHAN: No, sir, I didn't receive any.

16 MS. BARAJAS: I had no idea what --

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: She showed something
18 there in her hand.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those are court
20 documents.

21 MR. MAHAN: Yes, what she brought is court
22 documents.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. It didn't say
24 she completed classes or anything?

25 MR. MAHAN: I haven't reviewed those.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you. I'm good.

2 MS. BARAJAS: Sir? Can I talk? No?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sure, go ahead.

4 MS. BARAJAS: It does state here that I did
5 everything I was supposed to do. Six months of domestic
6 violence, six months of -- 90 days of AA with
7 certificates. And I also -- let's see. I can't
8 remember. It's been a while. I hate to say it, but
9 when you start forgetting things, that means you're
10 getting old. But it is all listed in here, everything
11 that I completed for the courts.

12 I did, I made a big mistake with my husband.
13 And he took out a -- he took out -- I forget what you
14 call it, but I was not to be in contact with him or be
15 anywhere around our house that we own. And so my family
16 told me either I straighten up or they're going to have
17 nothing to do with me. I had a big decision to make,
18 and I made it. I didn't want my life going that
19 direction no more.

20 So I am back with my husband. And we're both
21 doing really good. He's retired, and I'm still working,
22 part-time.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

24 Any other questions from the Board?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Quick question. Are you

1 still attending AA?

2 MS. BARAJAS: I do. I attend AA meetings twice
3 a week at the Awana Club in Sparks, and sometimes more,
4 just depending on how I'm feeling.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

6 MS. BARAJAS: I've gone on vacations that were
7 so nice of vacations. And my granddaughter asked me,
8 "Nana, did you drink?" And I said, "No." The kids
9 drank, but I didn't. I had Cokes. So, you know,
10 drinking doesn't even come into my life anymore. I
11 don't think about it. Once in a while, I might. But I
12 can't do it. One drink is not enough. That one drink
13 would ruin my whole life.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any other
15 questions?

16 No more questions. I'd entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: It's Ray Flynn. I'll make
18 a motion to uphold the denial. And the reason being is
19 the fact of failure to disclose. I could understand a
20 life of alcoholism and maybe forgetting to disclose
21 things prior to 1998. But a reasonable person would
22 assume or believe that your most arrest you would have
23 to remember.

24 I have no problem if the applicant comes before
25 us in a year and discloses everything. I would support

1 her at that time, provided she stays on the course she
2 is now.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
4 to uphold the denial. Do we have a second?

5 MS. BARAJAS: Thank you.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second it.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We haven't voted yet.

8 MS. BARAJAS: He just said he denied it.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: He hasn't denied it.
10 He made a motion to deny.

11 MS. BARAJAS: Sorry.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
13 motion and a second. Discussion on the motion?

14 I'm going vote against the motion. I think,
15 the time from the felony is long, there's been plenty of
16 time and distance from the felony. This Board has
17 accepted the comments by individuals in the past that
18 they didn't list arrests, they didn't list convictions
19 because they are misdemeanors and they didn't think
20 they're required to. So because of that, I'm going to
21 vote against the motion.

22 Any further discussion?

23 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
24 "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed? Nay.

2 All right.

3 MS. BARAJAS: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Ms. Barajas, it's been
5 denied. But you're welcome to apply in a year.

6 MS. BARAJAS: Pardon me?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: It's been denied. But
8 you're welcome to reapply in a year.

9 Back in order to William T. Carpenter, number
10 41.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, we're on 40.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So did we miss 40? My
13 bad. I'm sorry. Who's that? Is that number 40?

14 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Coffin.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's coming forward.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sure.

17 Sorry, Mr. Coffin. Please identify yourself.

18 Oh, never mind. Hold on just a second. Let me go to
19 the investigator first. I kind of got out of sequence.

20 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Investigator Saladino.

22 MR. SALADINO: Yes, Mr. Chair. The applicant
23 was denied for a 1991 first-degree burglary, which was a
24 felony, in California. The applicant did disclose on
25 the application. The fingerprint report indicates he

1 received 120 days and a modified probation.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

3 Mr. Coffin, could you please identify yourself
4 and give us the circumstances of what this was all
5 about.

6 MR. COFFIN: My name is Brian Coffin. When I
7 was 19 years old, in 1991, myself and about seven other
8 friends, we went to a home where a family was on
9 vacation. We ended up breaking into the house. And I
10 ended up taking a car, leaving it at a nearby park, and
11 was subsequently caught and convicted of first-degree
12 burglary.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any questions
14 from the Board? Board Member Bobby G?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Okay.
16 Bobby G.

17 Mr. Coffin, since 1991 -- when did you get
18 released?

19 MR. COFFIN: Released as --

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The 120 days in jail.

21 MR. COFFIN: At four months.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, but what year?
23 Did you go to --

24 MR. COFFIN: This was in August of '91.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did you go to court and

1 all that good stuff?

2 MR. COFFIN: It was 1992 or 1993 that -- I
3 think, I was convicted in '92. I don't remember exactly
4 when I started the jail sentence.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No problem. Have you
6 been in any problems with the police since then?

7 MR. COFFIN: Yeah. I was arrested in Las Vegas
8 in '94, or it was '94'ish, '95 for grand larceny. It
9 was dismissed.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Sadano?

11 MR. SALADINO: Saladino.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry. Vincent.

13 MR. SALADINO: Those two arrests were
14 dismissed. And the applicant and I did speak about
15 those.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So they were there and
17 you saw them?

18 MR. SALADINO: Right.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And he did say it. All
20 right. No problem.

21 What do you do now?

22 MR. COFFIN: I've been a licensed bail bondsman
23 for the last six years, licensed by the Department of
24 Insurance.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. No more. Thank

1 you.

2 MR. COFFIN: It was, I did get the felony
3 expunged in 2001.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. We're good
5 with it. I'm good.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any other Board --

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Are you currently
8 working --

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any other Board
10 questions?

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, I'm sorry.

12 Are you currently working already in Nevada or
13 California?

14 MR. COFFIN: As of a week ago, nowhere. My --
15 I've been a licensed bail bondsman for the last almost
16 seven years, and my license expired March 1st. And so
17 I'm no longer employed as a bail bondsman as of about a
18 week. That's a long story, but bail bondsmen are unable
19 to renew their licenses right now. If you'd like me to
20 get into that, I can, but it's --

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I guess, are you earning,
22 working -- were you working as a bail bondsman out of
23 California or --

24 MR. COFFIN: Nevada. I've been in Nevada about
25 20 years.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

2 MR. SALADINO: Board, Investigator Saladino.
3 The Department of Insurance do a similar background as
4 we do in order to license bail bondsmen for -- I don't
5 understand why, but they become an insurance agent as a
6 bailing bondsman. And I have been in contact with one
7 of their senior investigators, Ted Bader, and we kind of
8 discussed the background process on what our two
9 agencies do.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did you discuss why
11 they don't renew licenses?

12 MR. SALADINO: I didn't understand that
13 process, what they were talking about with that.

14 MR. COFFIN: We have to do continuing
15 indicating every few years to keep our license going.
16 And as of December, the Department of Insurance was
17 actually putting on the classes. They no longer put on
18 the classes for the continuing education. They said the
19 bail industry, you guys have to get your own approved
20 classes to do the continuation education. And there's
21 no classes that are approved yet. So I can't take --
22 there's no classes to take to keep my license going.
23 Which I'm not -- it's something I didn't really want to
24 do anymore anyways. So I'm not, I'm not particularly
25 worried about it.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any additional
3 questions?

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Seeing
6 none, I'd accept a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
8 Nixon. I move to approve Brian A. Coffin, or actually
9 overturn Brian A. Coffin's request for a licensing card.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a
11 motion. Do we have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second. Gronauer,
13 Bobby G, whoever.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
15 and a second. I'm sorry. Did we have, do we have
16 discussion, or?

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah. Ray Flynn. I just
18 think we need a little clarity in the motion. The
19 motion's actually to deny the -- grant the appeal to the
20 denial.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any discussion
22 on the motion?

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, I support the motion.
24 We've got 27 and a half years between his last
25 conviction and today.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Any
2 additional discussion?

3 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying
4 "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Nays?

7 Passes unanimously. Mr. Coffin, you will get
8 your card. Your registration has been approved.

9 MR. COFFIN: Thank you. Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Number 41,
11 William T. Carpenter.

12 Good morning, sir.

13 MR. CARPENTER: Good morning.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Investigator Saladino.

15 MR. SALADINO: Yes, Mr. Chair. Investigator
16 Saladino. The applicant went before the Board in
17 December of 2016, and denial was upheld for failing to
18 disclose. The applicant claimed he thought he only
19 needed to list recent arrests.

20 This time, the applicant did disclose all of
21 the above arrests and has not had any new arrests since
22 October of 1997. Now he's here reapplying to overturn
23 his registered work card denial.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

25 Thank you. Please identify yourself. And

1 could you just kind of explain what's been going on
2 since 1997.

3 MR. CARPENTER: Well, I recently retired from
4 racing, the California Horse Racing Board, Del Mar
5 Racetrack. And other than that, I had a couple of jobs
6 since I've been here in Vegas, Fremont, experience. And
7 other than that, not too much of nothing.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

9 MR. CARPENTER: But I've done security in the
10 past. That was one of the first jobs I ever had. My
11 father did security. And I worked for a lot of
12 companies that no longer exist anymore, Pedis, Macbeth,
13 U.S. Guards. So I know the work very well.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you for
15 disclosing this time.

16 Are there any questions from the Board? Board
17 Member Flynn?

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, I remember this
19 case. I appreciate you coming back. You've stayed out
20 of trouble, and it's been 25 years since you've had any
21 trouble. And you're wearing the right T-shirt today.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: What's the T-shirt say?

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Golden Knights.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Is that --

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's somewhere in

1 Nevada.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Is that a baseball
3 team?

4 (Laughter.)

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Sorry. I'm
6 sorry. Board Member Nixon?

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Bobby G?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, sir.

10 How much time have you built in prison?

11 MR. CARPENTER: I never went to prison.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You didn't? Okay. So
13 it's just jail time, regular jail?

14 MR. CARPENTER: Just jail time.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. In 1997,
16 you were found guilty for CCW, carrying concealed
17 weapon?

18 MR. CARPENTER: Yes.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. What happened
20 with that? Did that -- the disposition says that you
21 were found guilty.

22 MR. CARPENTER: Well, I was a felon at the
23 time, and I got caught with the weapon. But it was
24 unarmed, I mean unloaded.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: At the end of it, I

1 mean at the end of court, did they fine you, place you
2 in jail, what?

3 MR. CARPENTER: Yeah, I did a year.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: A year in county?

5 MR. CARPENTER: In county, yes.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. I
7 appreciate it.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any additional
9 questions from the Board?

10 Seeing none, I'll accept a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make the
12 motion to appeal his denial. Mr. Carpenter did what we
13 said, came back a year later. He hasn't had any
14 problems with the police.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Reverse the denial.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And that's my motion.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. You kind of
18 faded there. So I just want to clarify the motion. The
19 motion is to overturn the denial. Is that correct?

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That's correct, and that's
23 the verbiage we're all going to use in the future.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Well, actually, you
25 faded, so we really couldn't hear you really that well.

1 All we heard was denial.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, I like yours. Yeah,
3 we're overturning the denial.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
5 motion. Do we have a second?

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
8 motion, and we have a second. Discussion on the motion?

9 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
10 "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: It passes unanimously.
13 Congratulations, Mr. Carpenter.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

15 MR. CARPENTER: Thank you.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good luck.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Keep it on the straight
18 and narrow, okay?

19 MR. CARPENTER: Always.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: He's still a kid.

21 MR. CARPENTER: All right. Thank you for that.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 42, Annetta
23 Alvarez.

24 Investigator Saladino, you're up again.

25 MR. SALADINO: Yes, Mr. Chair. Ms. Alvarez was

1 denied for a 2010 CCW conviction, which was a
2 misdemeanor in California. Also, a 2011 possession of a
3 controlled substance, which was a felony. The applicant
4 did disclose both of the arrests. And that's why we're
5 here today.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Good morning,
7 Ms. Alvarez. Please explain the circumstances of those
8 arrests.

9 MS. ALVAREZ: At the time, I was in a car with
10 someone else at the time. It wasn't my weapon. I just
11 took responsibility for the weapon. But the weapon
12 wasn't mine.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. And the
14 possession of controlled substance?

15 MS. ALVAREZ: Possession of controlled
16 substance, also with the same person.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: At the same time?

18 MS. ALVAREZ: Different times.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Okay. Questions
20 from the Board? Board member Bobbie G?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, Mr. Chairman.
22 Ms. Alvarez?

23 MS. ALVAREZ: Yes.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It says in here for
25 possession, PCS, possession of controlled substance.

1 MS. ALVAREZ: Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Four to five years in
3 prison?

4 MS. ALVAREZ: I got five years. I did three
5 years.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You did three?

7 MS. ALVAREZ: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are on you parole or
9 probation yet?

10 MS. ALVAREZ: No. I was supposed to have
11 stayed on parole for three years. But I was off, they
12 let me off in a year.

13 And I also, I live in Nevada, but I work in
14 Los Angeles. I have a guard card. I work for Allied
15 University. I travel here and there. I come back home
16 on Saturdays, night, because I come from work. And I go
17 back to L.A. to work Monday. And the reason why I do
18 that is because I'm a single mom. And I was working for
19 Martinique in Nevada. But the license was revoked, so I
20 had to stop working. So that's when I decided to go to
21 L.A. to try to provide for my own kids.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So you're a resident of
23 Nevada, you work in California?

24 MS. ALVAREZ: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. And do you

1 have a support group here?

2 MS. ALVAREZ: I really don't know anyone out
3 here. I have one family member, and she works for the
4 AMPR, the transporting from the hospital back and forth.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So your child is old
6 enough to take care of himself?

7 MS. ALVAREZ: No. No. No, my child, my
8 daughter, she's 17. She graduates this year. And I
9 also have a 19-year-old. She just came from
10 Victorville, because that's where I was living at first
11 before I came to Nevada. I was staying in Victorville
12 for five years. So I moved here. And so my
13 19-year-old, she stays at the house. She left her
14 college to come to the house to help me, because I had
15 to travel back and forth, but I can't leave my
16 17-year-old.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Ms. Alvarez, thank you.
18 I'm done, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
20 Nixon?

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'm going to recuse myself
22 because of the company.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
24 Flynn?

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I have nothing.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Seeing no
2 further discussion, I'd accept a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Bobby G. I make a
4 motion to overturn the denial for Annetta M. Alvarez,
5 who applied for registration and was denied.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
7 to overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So we have a motion to
10 overturn the denial, and we have a second on that
11 motion. Discussion on the motion?

12 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
13 "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

16 Ms. Alvarez, the denial's been overturned. You
17 will get your card. Okay?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Congratulations to you.

19 MS. ALVAREZ: Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

21 MS. ALVAREZ: I was tired of going back and
22 forth. Thank you, everyone.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Number 43,
25 Leo Alexander.

1 MR. INGRAM: Alexander?

2 Not here.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 44, Amber R.
4 Turner.

5 It looks like this is Investigator Donald.

6 MS. DONALD: Yes. Investigator Donald. In
7 December of 2012, Ms. Turner was convicted of possessing
8 drugs, and she received jail time. In May of 2012,
9 convicted of possessing drug paraphernalia. Both of
10 those were misdemeanors.

11 March of 2009, she had a charge of attempted
12 grand larceny. She was originally charged with a
13 felony, but it was reduced to a gross misdemeanor.

14 August of 2008, she had another gross
15 misdemeanor, conspiracy to possess controlled substance.
16 That was reduced down from a felony.

17 July of 2008, she was charged with a felony for
18 attempted burglary. She ended up serving eight months
19 in prison.

20 So she was convicted of one felony, two gross
21 misdemeanors and two misdemeanors. She disclosed all
22 arrests at the time of the application.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

24 Ms. Turner, would you identify yourself and
25 also explain the circumstances around all that.

1 MS. TURNER: I'm Amber Turner. Starting at 18,
2 I had -- my father passed away like two days from my
3 18th birthday. I went wild. I started with the wrong
4 people, started doing all this stuff that I wasn't
5 supposed to be doing.

6 So now I am trying to change my life. I've got
7 a daughter. She's very, very sick. And I'm just trying
8 to get my life together.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Questions from
10 the Board? Board Member Nixon?

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: What have you been doing
12 since 2012?

13 MS. TURNER: I have been working. I was
14 working at the JT Taco Bell over a year. I found out I
15 was six months pregnant. I ended up leaving my job.
16 And then my daughter was born in September. And then I
17 was off work for awhile. And I just recently got a job,
18 and I've been there for a year now, at Gap.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Any trouble with the law
20 enforcement since then?

21 MS. TURNER: No.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

23 MS. TURNER: But I have been -- I am waiting to
24 get my records closed at this time, with an attorney.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray -- oh, I'm sorry.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Go ahead. Sorry.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn, for the record.
3 I didn't catch it. Where are you working now?

4 MS. TURNER: I work at Gap.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Gap?

6 MS. TURNER: Yes.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And how long have
8 you been there?

9 MS. TURNER: A year.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And why do you want
11 to get involved in security?

12 MS. TURNER: I just need -- I've been doing
13 fast food all my life. So I'm trying to find where,
14 where is my life, just like trying to figure it out
15 like. I still don't know where I need to go in life.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: A couple of your arrests
17 were, or actually several of your arrests were for
18 drugs. Did you have to do anything to clean up, or?

19 MS. TURNER: No, I just, I did about eight
20 months in prison. Actually, it was like a year, because
21 I did time and time on top of it, also, while I was
22 fighting my cases. And whatever, the reason why I went
23 to prison, I told them that I just wanted to go to get
24 away, to clear up.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

1 Nothing further, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

3 Board Member Bobby G?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, sir.

5 When you're younger, you're younger, and I
6 understand all that.

7 MS. TURNER: Yes.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: In 2008, when you
9 were -- for attempted burglary, you were convicted and
10 given probation. Probation was revoked. Why was it
11 revoked?

12 MS. TURNER: That's when I had caught the other
13 felony charge. And I just revoked it myself, to go
14 ahead and go to prison.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, okay.

16 MS. TURNER: It was right, it was like four
17 months within each other.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So you went to prison
19 after that, and that was August of 2008. And how much
20 time did you spend there?

21 MS. TURNER: The actual prison time, I did
22 eight months.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And you came
24 back out, and you still had come problems with attempted
25 larceny and possession of paraphernalia.

1 MS. TURNER: The attempted larceny was the
2 felony that -- that's when I went to prison.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, okay. That's all
4 part of that?

5 MS. TURNER: Correct.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

7 MS. TURNER: And the 2012 one, I was -- they
8 arrested me, but then it was a year to date, and I never
9 got -- they didn't put this jail on my record, but it's
10 not -- nothing there. I even went to the D.A. office
11 and got a letter for them to seal my record.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'm fine, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Any
14 additional question from the Board?

15 Seeing none, I'd accept a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I do have one, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh, okay.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I do have one.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Go right ahead.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: The drugs in 2012, what
21 type of drugs were they?

22 MS. TURNER: It was marijuana.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Because I see it's
24 a misdemeanor that you --

25 MS. TURNER: Yeah, that's what they disclosed,

1 but they didn't put what kind it was. So, yeah.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. That's about
3 the only drug you get a misdemeanor for, for using,
4 possessing. Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Seeing no
6 further questions --

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Nothing further.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: No further questions.
9 I'd accept a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
11 that we overturn the denial of Amber R. Turner for her
12 registration.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
14 motion to overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Discussion on the
17 motion?

18 I'm going support the motion. I think, the
19 circumstance is pretty well explained. And we have the
20 time and distance. So I can feel comfortable with this.

21 Any further discussion?

22 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
23 "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

1 It passes unanimously. Ms. Turner, you will be
2 getting your registration card.

3 MS. TURNER: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good luck.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good luck.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I think, I need to
8 clarify for the record that on the vote for Annette M.
9 Alvarez, that the vote was three in support of the
10 motion, with one recusal, to make sure that the record
11 is clear on that.

12 All right. Moving on to number 45, Alvin
13 Thornton.

14 MR. THORNTON: Good morning.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: It looks like this is
16 Investigator Donald again.

17 MS. DONALD: Yes. Investigator Donald. June
18 of 2014, Mr. Thornton was convicted of misdemeanor
19 battery domestic violence.

20 May of 2003, he was convicted of misdemeanor
21 battery domestic violence.

22 December of 1978, out of Kentucky, he was
23 convicted of felony receiving stolen property.

24 June of 1983, out of Kentucky, he was convicted
25 of felony theft by unlawful taking.

1 So Mr. Thornton was convicted of two
2 misdemeanors and two felonies. His initial background
3 came back that he is a convicted person and showed the
4 felonies out of Kentucky. So he was never made
5 provisional. He did not disclose any arrests.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Thornton, why did
7 you not disclose any of your arrests?

8 MR. THORNTON: The only reason I didn't
9 disclose any of the arrests, as I explained to -- what's
10 your name?

11 MR. SALADINO: Saladino.

12 MR. THORNTON: -- Mr. Saladino, that was over
13 30 years ago.

14 Receiving stolen property, I bought a stereo
15 from a friend and found out later it was stolen.

16 Theft by unlawful taking, I rented a motor
17 pulley for a friend of mine's, and he never come back
18 and got it. And they charged me for that.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And what about the lack
20 of disclosure on the more recent charges of the domestic
21 violence?

22 MR. THORNTON: Domestic violence, one of them
23 was -- if I'm not mistaken, I think, both of them was
24 dismissed, in Pahrump. They was dismissed. So I
25 figured, since they was dismissed, Mr. --

1 MR. SALADINO: Saladino.

2 MR. THORNTON: Mr. Saladino told me, if they
3 was dismissed, you know, there shouldn't be no problem.
4 So that's why I didn't say nothing about it.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I guess, this goes to
6 the investigator. According to the investigative
7 report, I believe it says that both of these, both of
8 these domestic violences were convictions.

9 MS. DONALD: Originally, on the fingerprints,
10 it did say he was convicted. He did provide me court
11 documents from Pahrump after the fact. And it does show
12 the June 2014, it was dismissed.

13 The other one. The other charge, it looks like
14 he did have to do domestic violence counseling. And he
15 had a suspended jail sentence of a year. He completed
16 one day in jail. So that one doesn't look like it was
17 dismissed completely, if he did classes.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Investigator
19 Saladino, do you have anything that you want to add to
20 this?

21 MR. SALADINO: Yes, Mr. Chair. So when the
22 applicant first got denied, it was failure to disclose.
23 And then, when he came into the office and, you know,
24 was wondering what had happened, we did speak in regards
25 to the arrest and the nondisclosure. And, you know, he

1 did think this was the 30 years ago and stuff. So when
2 we spoke, he said she has no problem getting court
3 documents, which he did bring in and provide them to us.
4 And he was explained the appeal process and, you know,
5 how the failure to disclose was kind of going to, you
6 know, be a black eye. But after the fact, he did
7 provide all the necessary court documents for us, and
8 he's been very cooperative.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you. Thank you,
10 Investigator.

11 Questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair. My
13 questions are to the investigator. I'm just trying to
14 understand.

15 So let's look at number one, a battery domestic
16 violence. The records that we have are convicted, jail,
17 fine and community service.

18 MS. DONALD: Right.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So. Well, why don't you
20 explain that to me and why that's there and why I'm
21 hearing something different.

22 MS. DONALD: Because, after the fact, after I
23 had written the report, he had provided me the documents
24 showing it was dismissed. So at the time of the report,
25 I didn't have this information that it was dismissed.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. But that
2 information, the initial information came from where?

3 MS. DONALD: Fingerprint results.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. So does it show
5 that it was dismissed because he'd stayed out of trouble
6 for a year? And, because, we're -- well, let me ask the
7 applicant.

8 When you were arrested the last time, did you
9 go to jail?

10 MR. THORNTON: No.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So they just said, just
12 slapped it on this person, we'll see you later?

13 MR. THORNTON: They dismissed it.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, did you go to jail?
15 Were you arrested?

16 MR. THORNTON: Yeah, I was arrested, yes, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. All right.
18 And then did you go to court?

19 MR. THORNTON: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And what happened in
21 court?

22 MR. THORNTON: They dismissed it.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Out of court?

24 MR. THORNTON: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Do you know why

1 they dismissed it?

2 MR. THORNTON: Because it wasn't -- that I
3 didn't do nothing. She just had me arrested because
4 we -- we got into it.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Right.

6 MR. THORNTON: But --

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Are you still with this
8 person?

9 MR. THORNTON: No, sir.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And then item number two,
11 for the investigator, it shows convicted, jail, fine.
12 But then he came forward with the paperwork showing that
13 that one was dismissed, also?

14 MS. DONALD: He has the paperwork right now.

15 The fingerprints show that he pled guilty and
16 said he had credit for time served for nine days.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

18 MR. THORNTON: Can I explain that one?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, please.

20 MR. THORNTON: Okay. The only reason they
21 dismissed it, because we was ordered, and I it, so I
22 just went on and pled guilty. So they made me take
23 classes. And I did the classes, and I paid my fine. So
24 they dismissed it.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right.

1 MR. SALADINO: And, Board, Investigator
2 Saladino. These, this court document that he gave us,
3 it does show that he did complete all 28 of the 28
4 requested domestic violence classes.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Was that for conviction
6 one or conviction two?

7 MR. SALADINO: That was for the second one, the
8 2014 one.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. Thank
10 you. No further questions.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So do I understand that he
13 applied for registration and he was denied because he
14 didn't disclose, and this is the second time? No.
15 Okay.

16 MS. DONALD: The reason he was initially
17 denied, because when I ran SCOPE, it came back that he
18 was a convicted person, because he had two felonies out
19 of Kentucky.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

21 MS. DONALD: Yeah.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

23 MR. THORNTON: Which was 30 years ago.

24 MS. DONALD: This is the first time he's been
25 in front of the Board.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes. Got it. No further
2 questions.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
4 Bobby G?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, sir.

6 Mr. Thornton, are you employed now?

7 MR. THORNTON: No, sir. I do draw Social
8 Security.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. When was the
10 last time you were employed?

11 MR. THORNTON: I was employed about back in
12 September at Terrible Herbst. I worked for them for
13 three years. And I do got about 20 years of security.
14 And I am an ex-Marine. I was an MP when I was in the
15 Marines. I went after I got out of high school. Me and
16 five guys went to the Marines, we signed up. And I did
17 six months in Vietnam. And I finished up in California
18 in a Marine base there.

19 So I decided to go ahead and stay here. I
20 didn't want to go back to Kentucky.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You did six months in
22 Vietnam?

23 MR. THORNTON: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Which --

25 MR. THORNTON: It was --

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: okay. But it's just
2 because it was right at the end?

3 MR. THORNTON: Yes, sir. But I thought I'd
4 mention just about Vietnam.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Have you
6 had any trouble with the law since your last arrest in
7 2014?

8 MR. THORNTON: No, sir.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Where were you doing
10 security?

11 MR. THORNTON: I worked for Gold Spike for five
12 years on Stewart. I worked at the Western, at the
13 Western right here on Fremont for 10 years. Then I
14 worked on the west side over at New Composite for five
15 years, on the west side.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, all them places.
17 Okay. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any additional Board
19 questions?

20 Seeing none, I'd take a motion, accept a
21 motion.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Bobby G. I'll make the
23 motion to overturn the denial on Alvin W. Thornton, who
24 applied for a registration and was denied.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have a

1 second?

2 I'll second it for the purpose of discussion.

3 I'm tempted to support the motion in spite of
4 the fact of nondisclosure. I mean the '78 and '83
5 arrests are so long ago. We've had several instances
6 of individuals who have not, not disclosed in that
7 situation. And, I think, this is one of those
8 situations. So I will support the motion.

9 Any other, any other discussion?

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn, for the record.
11 We've had two people come before us -- can you hear me?

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes, I can.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. We had two
14 people come before us this morning that we've denied
15 because they didn't disclose. And it was for
16 misdemeanors also. And my issue is that it was not
17 disclosed. I have no problem if this individual comes
18 back in a year and hasn't been in any further trouble.

19 The application is pretty clear, you need to
20 disclose all arrests. I can go along with the thing
21 that happened in Kentucky over 30 years ago. And I do
22 appreciate his service to our country during a very
23 difficult time. But I need to, for my sake, I need to
24 be consistent in my voting.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any additional

1 discussion?

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I agree, for myself, the
3 consistency is important. I think that 30 years ago
4 was, you know, definitely a long time ago. But
5 certainly 2014 and '12, although a while ago, not that
6 far. And to remain consistent, I think, I have to
7 uphold the initial decision.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Thank you.

9 I think, you've convinced me that we need to be
10 consistent. So I will be opposing the motion, also.

11 So we have a motion. All in favor, signify by
12 saying "aye."

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Aye.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those opposed? Nay.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Nay.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Nay.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So the motion fails.

18 Do we have another motion?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I make a
20 motion that we approve staff's recommendation of denial.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have a
22 second?

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. And
2 discussion on the motion?

3 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
4 signify by saying "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 Opposed, "nay"?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nay.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So the motion passes
9 three to one.

10 So you're welcome to come back in a year and
11 reapply.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And I will support you.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

14 MR. THORNTON: All right. Have a good day.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You, too.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sir, one last thing.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Sir, Mr. Thornton.

18 MR. THORNTON: Yes.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: If you do choose to
20 reapply in a year, be sure and disclose.

21 MR. THORNTON: Okay.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'm going to take
23 another one out of order, number 56, Leondre Holmes.

24 Is that you? And you've not been sworn in,
25 have you?

1 MR. HOLMES: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. He needs to be
3 sworn in.

4 MR. HOLMES: Excuse the attire. I was at work
5 and couldn't get out to dress properly.

6 MR. MAHAN: Don't even worry about it.

7 MR. INGRAM: Is there anybody else --

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah, we need to have
9 him sworn in.

10 MR. INGRAM: -- that's going to testify, that
11 hasn't been sworn in? If you're going to testify,
12 please stand up, and we'll swear you in.

13 MS. DONALD: So stand up if you didn't before.
14 Have you stood up before to --

15 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN IN LAS VEGAS: No.

16 MS. DONALD: Okay.

17 MS. BORDELOVE: So anybody who didn't do it
18 this morning. Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole
19 truth, and nothing but the truth?

20 (Applicants and witnesses present in Las Vegas
21 and Carson City were sworn.)

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Mr. Holmes,
23 did I pronounce your first name okay?

24 MR. HOLMES: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Give me just a moment.

1 All right. This was Investigator Maxwell.

2 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right.

4 MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Holmes was denied for a 1995
5 conviction out of California for carrying a loaded
6 firearm in a public place. It was -- the type of
7 conviction was unknown. Probation was modified. And he
8 did disclose this.

9 In 2002, also in California, he was convicted
10 of first-degree robbery, possessing a narcotic
11 substance. This was at felony level. Disposition says
12 1203.2 PC probation revoked in lieu of filing.
13 1203.2 PC is a form of probation in lieu of a prison
14 term. The arrest was disclosed. The probation that was
15 revoked was from a previous misdemeanor drugs
16 conviction. This was not listed on the report as it
17 would not have prevented the applicant from obtaining
18 the work card.

19 The applicant was not made provisional. The
20 convictions were confirmed using the fingerprint report.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Please identify
22 yourself and explain the circumstances of your arrests.

23 MR. HOLMES: My name is Leondre Holmes. The
24 arrest in 1995, I don't know what they mean by public
25 place. I was driving a car, someone else's car, got

1 pulled over for a ticket. As the officer was writing
2 the ticket, some other officers came, was going around
3 the car. I had my hands on the steering wheel, and he
4 said, "Freeze. He has a gun." And I don't move or
5 anything. I sit there. Because I'm like, I have no
6 gun. My hands are on the steering wheel. What is he
7 talking about?

8 So they got me out of the car and went under
9 the seat. And, sure enough, there was a gun in the car.
10 I had no knowledge of it, but I was in possession of the
11 car, driving the car, but the car was not registered to
12 me.

13 So I took -- the case was mine. I was just
14 driving the car. I don't know if that's what they mean
15 by public place. But I got pulled over in the car.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: What was the
17 disposition?

18 MR. HOLMES: It was a misdemeanor. Probation.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Probation. Did you
20 serve out the probation?

21 MR. HOLMES: Yes, I did.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Did you serve
23 any jail time at all?

24 MR. HOLMES: No, I didn't, except for when they
25 initially arrested me.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sure. What about, what
2 about the first three, robbery, possession of narcotics
3 and controlled substance?

4 MR. HOLMES: Yeah, I have paperwork of my
5 convictions and can be introduced, whatever. And I have
6 never did no robbery. So that on there, I have no clue
7 what that is.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do you want to give him
9 the paperwork that you have, so he can take a look at
10 it.

11 MR. MAHAN: So what's this for?

12 MR. HOLMES: These are all the charges that I
13 have, that I know that that I've been arrested and
14 convicted for. And robbery is -- I never did a robbery.

15 MR. MAHAN: For the Board, Investigator Mahan.
16 These are orders for dismissal and, apparently, four
17 different counts. The court reduced the felony offense
18 to a misdemeanor. So an order for dismissal indicates
19 number -- find the case number on this.

20 It looks like 221023. And so it looks like the
21 felony was reduced to a misdemeanor. All convictions or
22 pleas were deferred entry of judgment.

23 MR. HOLMES: And I only have been convicted
24 four times. 1995 was a misdemeanor with the gun charge.
25 And the other three were felonies. But I never done a

1 robbery. I never stole or took anything from anyone.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And were these charges
3 ultimately reduced --

4 MR. HOLMES: Yes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: -- sentences?

6 MR. HOLMES: Yes.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sentences to, what were
8 they reduced to?

9 MR. HOLMES: To misdemeanors.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All of them?

11 MR. HOLMES: Yes, they were.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

13 MR. MAHAN: Okay.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you,
15 Investigator.

16 Any questions from the Board? Board Member
17 Bobby G?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon?

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes. What have you been
21 doing since your last conviction?

22 MR. HOLMES: Since. My last conviction was in
23 2007. I moved out in Nevada in 2015. So I've been here
24 for the past four years. I'm currently doing
25 construction. I applied for, to work security. I was

1 working security, but when my appeal got denied, I
2 couldn't go any further. I was working with a company
3 called ESI. They have two divisions. One division's
4 called blue shirts. You just work events. If you want
5 to apply for your appeal and do actual security, you
6 can, which I did. And that was denied. And so I
7 couldn't. Well, I could have stayed working blue
8 shirts, but the pay wasn't enough to take care of me and
9 my son. So I'm doing other work until I see what goes
10 on with this.

11 Also, in the process, I have took classes and
12 gotten certificates. I have certificates in defensive
13 tactic class, report writing, OC chemical training,
14 responsible gaming awareness, BCI credit card fraud
15 prevention, closed body and area search, tunnel 31
16 incident, restrain reporting, hazardous communication,
17 slips, trips and fall, sexual harassment. And my adult
18 and pediatric CPR/AED and first aid classes is Saturday.

19 I grabbed the wrong folder. This was copies of
20 the original folder I have with my certificates and
21 originals I was going to bring, but I grabbed the wrong
22 folder.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

24 Any additional questions?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes. So what was your

1 last conviction for, then?

2 MR. HOLMES: My last conviction was in 2007.
3 That was for piracy, bootlegging.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Where was that?

5 MR. HOLMES: That was in California.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. And what was the
7 ultimate determination on that one?

8 MR. HOLMES: Probation.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Are you still on
10 probation?

11 MR. HOLMES: No. I've been off. I just did
12 three years probation. I've been off probation since
13 2010. I haven't been in any trouble in California
14 before I left or here in Nevada since I've been here.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Was that a felony or --
16 I'm sorry. Was that a felony or a misdemeanor?

17 MR. HOLMES: The piracy was a felony.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And was that disclosed on
19 your application?

20 MR. HOLMES: Yes. Before I filled it out, I
21 even asked someone. Because coming from California,
22 dealing with the clean slate program, they tell us, if a
23 regular job or a state job, if anything's been dismissed
24 or expunged, you don't have to reveal it and that you
25 only go back seven years, no more than 10. But if I'm

1 applying for a federal job, I have to disclose anything,
2 no matter if it was expunged, reduced or not. I have to
3 provide that information for a federal job.

4 When I applied for this, they didn't say that
5 it was federal, but on the application it said include
6 all your arrests. I included everything from what I
7 know that I was convicted of, to all the times that I've
8 just been arrested by the police, just taken down, no
9 charge was ever involved and I'd get released in three
10 days, or if I bail out, didn't go to court, charges
11 were never pressed.

12 I wrote down as much as that I could remember.
13 And I also wrote a note that there's some that I did
14 forget, that I forgot, that there is a couple others.
15 And I hope that didn't hinder me from being accepted for
16 my application.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

18 MR. HOLMES: Thank you.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I've got questions,
20 Mr. Chair.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Go ahead. Go
22 ahead, Ray.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I got some confusion
24 here. So on the form that's in front of us, we have two
25 arrests listed. And I'm trying to keep count based on

1 the discussion now. I'm up to six.

2 So my question's for the investigator. How
3 many arrests are you aware of, of the applicant?

4 MR. MAXWELL: One that was convicted of a
5 felony, one that was to do with weapons. But there are
6 other ones that were shown to be misdemeanors, which we
7 don't normally deny on.

8 Also, the piracy one was disclosed. But on the
9 fingerprint report, the charge that it's shown at, once
10 you look it up, it shows that it was a misdemeanor.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. So, Mr. Maxwell, so
12 you're aware of all the arrests?

13 MR. MAXWELL: Yes. Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Then, why don't we list
15 them on the information we get here? Because there's --
16 there's listing for felony, gross and misdemeanor. I'm
17 just curious why we don't list them all.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Can I ask a question?
19 Are these listed here because they're disqualifying,
20 where the other ones would not be listed because they're
21 not disqualifying; is that the separation?

22 MR. MAXWELL: Yes. Yes, sir, that is correct.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman?

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The only problem I have

1 there is the time and distance again, where you're
2 looking at the felonies, and then, afterwards, you know,
3 you have one that's a '95, and then 2002, but then you
4 have another one in 2007. You know, I think, at least
5 the latest one should be, should be listed somehow.
6 We've got to figure that one out.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That creates me a
9 problem.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I agree with Board Member
11 Gronauer. I think, it's better for the Board if they're
12 all listed. Because there's some of these where they're
13 all listed, and there's some that aren't, whether
14 they -- they're involved in that. I just would like
15 consistency in the future. And maybe that's something
16 Kevin can address down the road. Or if you guys
17 disagree with me, let me know why. But it just makes it
18 a lot easier.

19 Because by bringing up these other ones today,
20 whether it was through questioning or self-disclosure,
21 it creates confusion, obviously, amongst all three of us
22 sitting here. So we need a better process of reporting.

23 And for the applicant, I really appreciate your
24 honesty. That means a lot in my book.

25 MR. HOLMES: Thank you.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So I just want to get
2 clear. When was the last time you had handcuffs on you?

3 MR. HOLMES: For batteries, it was 2007. I
4 went through training.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Right. Two thousand --

6 MR. HOLMES: I went through training.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. My --

8 MR. HOLMES: -- where, you know, they showed us
9 how to actually put on handcuffs. So.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. I know. No. Your
11 honesty is one of the better ones I've seen this
12 morning. So thank you.

13 MR. HOLMES: Thank you.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So it's been 12 years
15 since you've been arrested?

16 MR. HOLMES: Yes.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you. I'm done.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any other, any other
19 questions from the Board?

20 Investigator Maxwell, do you have anything that
21 you want to add at this point?

22 MR. MAXWELL: No, sir, just that my processing
23 will be, will be changing for the future, and everything
24 will be listed from the fingerprint report as we get
25 them, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I think, from my
2 perspective, I understand the nuance of, if he didn't
3 have these two convictions, he would have been given a
4 probationary card and would have been issued a
5 registration card. But for these two convictions, which
6 are disqualifying, that's what brought him in front of
7 us, or that's what caused the denial. Am I correct
8 there?

9 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir, that is correct.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you. And
11 it doesn't make any difference how recent. Well, I'm
12 sure, in the investigative aspect, it makes a difference
13 on how recent the latest arrest was. But, again, the
14 recency for that, if it's a misdemeanor, and it's not
15 disqualifying, then it doesn't come into play.

16 MR. MAXWELL: It all depends, it all depends on
17 the varying factors of the nature of the arrest, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Right. Okay. I think,
19 I'm understanding the nuance there.

20 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, this is Kevin, for the
21 record. I'll make sure that this is taken care of for
22 the future.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

24 MR. INGRAM: We'll make sure that the policies
25 are followed.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Right.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And, then, Mr. Chair, just
3 so I'm clear, because I don't think you're following
4 where I'm going, I understand that there are certain
5 offenses that we deny for automatically and certain
6 offenses that don't rise to the level of denial. But, I
7 think, when we're making a judgment call on an item that
8 could easily be denied in the old days, under the new
9 system, we need to look at the complete record of the
10 individual.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Right. No, I --

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And I need to know the
13 complete, I need to know the complete record of the
14 individual for me to waver.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Right. No, I get
16 exactly where you're coming from. I know exactly.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any other
19 discussion from the Board?

20 Then, I would accept a motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn, for the record.
22 I'll make a motion that for Leondre Holmes, that we
23 overturn the denial, based on a lot of discussion and
24 the fact of the honesty of the individual, and we do
25 have time and distance.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So we have a
2 motion to overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second. This is Nixon.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
5 motion and a second. Any discussion on the motion?

6 I'll support the motion based on the comments
7 of Board Member Flynn.

8 Any other, additional comments?

9 Seeing none, all in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

12 Passes unanimously. Mr. Holmes, you will get
13 your card.

14 MR. HOLMES: Okay.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right.

16 MR. HOLMES: Thank you. Appreciate it.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Stay out of
18 trouble.

19 MR. HOLMES: I will, definitely. Thank you all
20 very much.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: May I suggest we take a
22 stretch break for 10 minutes.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So be back at 1:15.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: 1:15 it is.

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(A break was taken, 1:02 to 1:15 p.m.)

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BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I think, we're on number 46, Nathan Haines.

MR. HAINES: Good morning, Board.

BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

MR. HAINES: Excellent. I'd like to present. I started in security in 500 Metro. I've been here, security. I have three years with America's Best Security. And I have two years of preventive measures with open combat, secure tech, closed down. My best accomplishment is I have worked as a supervisor with a 12-man crew making 16.50 an hour, plus overtime.

I do have a current offer, which I need, security industry specialist, for 17 an hour, wearing an earpiece and a suit at a high-end store. I'm currently employed by the -- Exit Timeshare, LLC and Americare Health and Nutrition. Mr. Marty Gonzalez formed this company. He's doing a Congressional thing with George Bush, Jr.

BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Just have a seat, sir. And let's go ahead and --

MR. HAINES: Oh, okay. Just -- yeah.

BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We'll proceed in our

1 fashion.

2 MR. HAINES: Okay. I'm sorry.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Investigator Donald, it
4 looks like you're up.

5 MS. DONALD: Yes. Investigator Donald.

6 Mr. Haines was arrested in 2016 for the charge of
7 manufacture, purchase, possess, sell, advertise or
8 transport a hoax bomb. I denied him due to the nature
9 and recency of the conviction.

10 We obtained the police report from the
11 Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. In the
12 report, Mr. Haines made several violent threats against
13 his previous employer and, also, the Nevada Department
14 of Education, Training and Rehabilitation, both in
15 person and over the phone, and was trespassed from the
16 properties.

17 He made comments to his employer that, quote,
18 "I'm bipolar, and you are going to cause me to be
19 hospitalized for months." He also stated he would be
20 back, and the next time he would be showing up in a ski
21 mask.

22 He threatened the head of marketing, who
23 terminated him, saying he was going to cut his head off
24 with a -- expletive -- hatchet. He also said, if the
25 company does not give him what he wants, he was going to

1 come to the call center with the C-4 and blow up the
2 building.

3 He threatened the supervisor near the Harmon
4 Center by lifting up his shirt and revealing a gun
5 holster.

6 On December 29th, 2017 and August 10th, 2018,
7 he had a competency determination and was remanded to
8 justice court.

9 On 9-27-2018, he was found guilty of a gross
10 misdemeanor to manufacture, purchase, possess, sell,
11 advertise or transport a hoax bomb. He was sentenced to
12 Clark County Detention Center for 364 days with credit
13 for time served.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Mr. Haines?

15 MR. HAINES: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please identify
17 yourself. Speak slow enough so that the stenographer
18 may record your words. But why don't you explain to us
19 what happened.

20 MR. HAINES: Nathan Garcia Haines. So what had
21 occurred was after the Selena Gomez concert, 2016,
22 April, I was not given work for 32 days. I was owed one
23 commission check. We were paid commission and hourly.
24 Now, the last sale was for \$8,750. Now,
25 Mr. Bobby Horowitz came in from TLC. He was the new

1 vice president of marketing. So for 32 days, I was not
2 given a schedule. I was told I had work. But I am
3 currently also licensed under the time-share board. All
4 our sales for licensing, 10 cents, the broker. So I
5 knew I was owed a sale commission. So, obviously, I --

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So, Mr. Haines, pardon
7 me for interrupting you.

8 MR. HAINES: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We don't need that deep
10 of a background. What we need --

11 MR. HAINES: Oh, okay.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please explain the hoax
13 bomb.

14 MR. HAINES: All right. There was a call made
15 for them to fax over to Medicaid. I had a third of my
16 tooth cracked off by the employer when I was assaulted
17 by four people after Mr. Bobby Horowitz disclosed he's
18 affiliated with the mob. I had called Metro police. I
19 have ripped tissue that will not heal right here. I
20 have a report here from a dentist for \$9,783 that's
21 signed 2-18-18. I need to have my tooth ripped. I need
22 to have a bone graft. I need to have a surgical
23 implant, custom abutment --

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Haines.

25 MR. HAINES: -- and a crown put on.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Haines.

2 MR. HAINES: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please stick to the
4 hoax bomb.

5 MR. HAINES: Okay. They have made allegations
6 that I said hoax bomb. We went into preliminary. No
7 one showed up. They dropped the case, but I had to take
8 the gross misdemeanor. It was an open case. I had a
9 public defender. I tried hiring a real lawyer. My mom
10 and dad did not want me to use the family business
11 lawyer. We went into preliminary. No one showed up.
12 And it was dropped at that.

13 None of these witnesses showed up. This is a
14 false allegation that was never stated. I have images
15 of a security bill. I've never touched a firearm in my
16 life. But that's when the charge ended. No one showed
17 up to preliminary. No one. No one in that report
18 showed up. It was dropped. But I had a public
19 defender. Now, I do have an option to try to reopen it,
20 but it would be stupid, in district court, with a real
21 attorney.

22 I have taken the records sealing class through
23 the state. It can be sealed in another about a year and
24 a half, right here, a gross misdemeanor. I've taken a
25 class. By NRS codes, once it's sealed, I don't need to

1 disclose any anymore. And that's where I'm sitting
2 right now with that.

3 That was never -- that never happened. I never
4 said that statement. Their allegation is that when I
5 called, two people heard over the phone, says he
6 transferred to voicemail. That was not on there.
7 Because none of that matches the voicemail. But the two
8 people who said they heard it --

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Haines.

10 MR. HAINES: Yes.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Let's stay on top. You
12 were convicted --

13 MR. HAINES: Yes.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: You were convicted of
15 the hoax bomb. In fact, Board Member Flynn, why don't
16 you, you're closer to the -- why don't you go ahead try
17 to rein this in a little bit, if you would, for him, and
18 let's kind of stay on topic.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I just want to make sure.
20 Do you know why you're here today?

21 MR. HAINES: Yes.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. I'd like to
23 hear why you think you're here.

24 MR. HAINES: To appeal my work card denial.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And your work card

1 denial, you were denied because you were convicted. How
2 that happens --

3 MR. HAINES: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: -- isn't up to this Board.
5 You were convicted in the state of Nevada.

6 MR. HAINES: Correct.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And you were sentenced to
8 the 364 days, including time served.

9 MR. HAINES: Yes, sir.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That occurred in 2016.

11 MR. HAINES: Correct.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Which is less than three
13 years ago when this, the conviction occurred.

14 MR. HAINES: Correct, right.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So your work card was
16 denied for the crime of a hoax bombing, which is an
17 automatic denial for a work card. All right. This is
18 your chance to explain to us, all right, before we have
19 questions, on why you think we should overturn the
20 denial.

21 So, I believe, you've sat here all morning.

22 MR. HAINES: M-hm (affirmative).

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And you've heard various
24 members of the Board talk about not only honesty, but
25 more, just as important, recency. So you have been

1 convicted of a crime with threatening to blow up not
2 only an employer, but also a state office. And we're in
3 a state building. So they're very serious charges.

4 Now, what you want to do in the future, you
5 know, I have no issue with that, whether you want to go
6 back into court and try to get the conviction
7 overturned, or if you want to have it sealed, in another
8 year and a half, that would be a different matter before
9 the Board.

10 MR. HAINES: Right.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: But before the Board today
12 is the fact that you were denied for a threatened crime
13 of violence. You could have easily also been convicted
14 of terrorist acts. But you weren't. They went with
15 hoax bombing. So that's why we're here.

16 I understand, and I respect your frustration in
17 terms of the former employers, and you got screwed over
18 and things of that nature. But right now, we're dealing
19 with only one small aspect of the entire life situation
20 that went on then.

21 MR. HAINES: M-hm (affirmative).

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And that is the fact that
23 you were convicted.

24 MR. HAINES: M-hm (affirmative).

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Do we agree with that?

1 MR. HAINES: Correct, and I accept
2 responsibility by accepting that conviction.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And then you also
4 understand that the Board also looks at time and
5 distance of from when the act occurred.

6 MR. HAINES: Okay. Sorry about that.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Fine. All
8 right. So I have some questions for you.

9 And, Mr. Chair, if you don't mind, I'd like to
10 question the applicant.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please, go right ahead.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. What are you doing
13 currently for employment?

14 MR. HAINES: I currently work at Americare
15 Health and Nutrition. I do sales over the phone for
16 liquid oxygen, HDH and natural vitamins under Marty
17 Gonzalez.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: M-hm (affirmative).

19 MR. HAINES: I'm on a phone dialer.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

21 MR. HAINES: And I also work for a lawyer for
22 Exit Timeshare right now.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

24 MR. HAINES: About one day out of the week,
25 hours plus five percent commission on people that are

1 signed up to get out of their timeshares. And I do
2 that, too.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, I know.

4 MR. HAINES: For the patients themselves, sir.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I believe you. And then
6 the only other question I have is why -- and let's see.
7 You were working in security prior?

8 MR. HAINES: Yes.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Why -- now,
10 these -- why do you want to get back into security?
11 That's my only other question I have.

12 MR. HAINES: I've been hired, pending having
13 the card, on by GaniVida, security specialist. I've had
14 successful moves. This would be my fifth company. With
15 the gross misdemeanor, I have disclosed it. I'm an
16 acceptable hire. It's a great direction for me to wear
17 a suit and do security. I do have experience, and this
18 would be the fifth company.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

20 MR. HAINES: And at 17 an hour, I can keep
21 these jobs on my days off and work alongside and
22 maintain three levels of employment. So that's what I
23 need to do right now.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

25 MR. HAINES: And that's just a move forward

1 being a tax-paying Republican citizen. But I have, I
2 disclosed that I accepted a conviction.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

4 MR. HAINES: I'm responsible for the
5 conviction. And I accept responsibility for the action
6 of what has been sentenced to me.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I appreciate that. Thank
8 you.

9 Mr. Chair, I have no further questions.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Board
11 Member Nixon, do you have any questions?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Have you been in trouble
13 with the law since this?

14 MR. HAINES: No.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Bobby G?
17 And just for the record, I want to make sure that it's
18 noted for the record that when I refer to Board Member
19 Bobby G, I'm referring to Board Member Gronauer, so that
20 it's clear for the official record.

21 So commissioner, or Board member, do you have
22 any questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes.

24 Mr. Haines, these, these are -- I mean it's a
25 serious matter. Okay?

1 MR. HAINES: Yes, it is.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Getting a work card is
3 a serious matter, for what we do. Some of the things
4 that are troubling me is that you did things in person
5 and over the phone in a very violent and threatening
6 manner. The police report. Okay. The police report
7 says all that stuff here. If they did not give him what
8 he wants, the company, he was going to come to the call
9 center with C-4 and blow up the building.

10 I know what C-4 is. It doesn't take much to
11 blow up a lot of stuff.

12 MR. HAINES: Right.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: A bridge is blown up
14 with that.

15 MR. HAINES: Right.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right. So. And these
17 are very serious. What caused you to do all that?

18 MR. HAINES: Well, first off, I'd have to have
19 a military background to even handle that. That, in
20 court, when they came for preliminary, that thought was
21 disclosed. With the assault, I asked Metro. They asked
22 me not to press charges when I was attacked. Now, with
23 that, I do accept responsibility for the actions of
24 calling them, because my stuff wasn't faxed to the
25 welfare board for my x-rays for my Medicaid.

1 But the severity of C-4, I do not have a
2 military background to even harness that. That is not
3 even possible. It's not possible. You'd have to have a
4 military background to even handle that. And I don't
5 have that. I don't have any characteristics of any
6 illicit or training in that.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Most police would not
8 even write that in the report --

9 MR. HAINES: Right, I understand that.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: -- if they didn't hear
11 it. I was a police officer for 30 years.

12 MR. HAINES: Right, right, right.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I wrote a lot of
14 reports and seen a lot of people do a lot of things.
15 However, to say the word C-4 is really a serious matter
16 to me.

17 MR. HAINES: Yeah.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I mean all of them are
19 serious matters. But that's really -- and that's a
20 police report, that this police officer wrote a report
21 and said this is what happened. And not only one time,
22 and it's not like you just said it one day. The next
23 day, you said this, and the next thing, or whatever
24 days, you had several threats at different times.

25 MR. HAINES: They said four calls in one day is

1 what it would transpire. The thing with the C-4, there
2 was two people that were like this (demonstrating) on
3 the phone. And they never showed up to the preliminary
4 court. That's where the C-4 --

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's --

6 MR. HAINES: No, that's where the -- the
7 voicemails, and I read the transcripts, there was two
8 people saying that. And they didn't come to
9 preliminary. But I still had to take conviction,
10 because they were willing to write that. But they
11 didn't show up for preliminary.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did you say you would
13 be back and next time you would be showing up in a ski
14 mask?

15 MR. HAINES: I said the Air Force police would
16 be coming in a ski mask. That's what I stated. Because
17 I was assaulted. They said they were affiliated,
18 involved that. That's what I said.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did you want to cut his
20 head off with a -- what, a hatchet?

21 MR. HAINES: That's not in the voicemail, sir,
22 I assure you that, I rest assured that. I'm a Bible
23 bleeding Baptist.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, but these are all
25 comments in here.

1 MR. HAINES: Yes. Yes. Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: They're in here as
3 quotes.

4 MR. HAINES: Yes.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm just, I'm just
6 trying to --

7 MR. HAINES: I assure you that. Yeah.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

9 MR. HAINES: I work with Liberty Baptist
10 Church, David Teis. He's very close with Metro police.
11 And the chaplain is Matthew Teis, on Rainbo and Lake
12 Mead. They are very close with Metro. And they have
13 only good things to say. I do have --

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: You need to slow down.

15 MR. HAINES: I do apologize, stenographer. I
16 apologize.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And right now, at this
18 point, I'm fine. You don't have to explain all that
19 stuff. I'm just trying to read the police report, what
20 it says.

21 MR. HAINES: Yeah.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So can you -- and when
23 I read that, it causes me great concern.

24 MR. HAINES: Right.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And I'm being straight

1 up with you, looking at right at your face. So I have a
2 problem with what was in that police report.

3 And so I'm good right now. Thank you. I
4 appreciate your answering the questions.

5 MR. HAINES: If they'd do their job, the
6 employer was misleading the police. The police
7 conducted business properly, with the State of Nevada,
8 with their badges. The employer was the liar. And
9 that's what it came down. Sorry.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Mr. Chairman, I'm fine.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Are there
12 any more questions from the Board?

13 Seeing none, I'd entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Bobby G,
15 referred to as Gronauer. On number 46, Nathan G. Haines
16 applied for registration and was denied. I'd like to
17 uphold the denial. That's my motion.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
19 to uphold the denial. Do we have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
22 and a second. Discussion on the motion?

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I just want it on
24 the record and for Mr. Haines to understand.

25 I understand you have your side. And I respect

1 that. But we go by the conviction. You had a course of
2 action you could have taken at the time to appeal, to
3 use attorneys and for -- you made a decision, either
4 based on family or advice of mentors, to choose what you
5 did to choose.

6 We also have an issue of time and distance.
7 And it's only been three plus years.

8 So if you're successful in the sealing of your
9 court, which you said you want to do, I'll look forward
10 to seeing you come back here.

11 That's all I wanted to add into the record,
12 sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

14 And, for the record, I will agree with you in
15 the sense that this, the recency of this, first off,
16 it's a violent crime, and the recency is -- precludes my
17 consideration to overturn the denial. So I'm going to
18 be supporting the motion.

19 Any additional comment?

20 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying
21 "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed?

24 Passes unanimously. Mr. Haines, your denial
25 has been upheld. In a year, you would be eligible to

1 return to reapply.

2 MR. HAINES: Am I open for public comment?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Not at this time. This
4 is not the opportunity for public comment. We do not
5 take public comment during this, this period.

6 So we'll move on to number 47, Ronda Bottoni.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

8 MS. BOTTONI: Hello.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good afternoon.

10 MS. BOTTONI: Good afternoon.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. I guess,
12 Investigator Donald, you're up again.

13 MS. DONALD: Yes. Investigator Donald.

14 Ms. Bottoni came into our office to apply. She listed
15 that in July of 2007, she was convicted of misdemeanor
16 domestic violence. In May of 1999, she was convicted of
17 a felony forgery and served one year, one year
18 probation. She was denied because of the 1999 felony.
19 And she did disclose both arrests when she came into the
20 office.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

22 Ms. Bottoni, could you identify yourself,
23 number one, and then explain the circumstances of your
24 arrest.

25 MS. BOTTONI: I'm Ronda Bottoni. And I had

1 wrote some checks off of my father's account. I was
2 doing some drugs that day. And him turning me in was a
3 good thing, because I got back on track after that.

4 And the domestic violence was drinking. And
5 after that, I ended up marrying him. So everything
6 worked out. And we had some kids together. So, you
7 know.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Did you
9 serve any prison time on the forgery?

10 MS. BOTTONI: No, just probation.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any jail time at all?

12 MS. BOTTONI: A couple days.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

14 Board questions? Board Member Bobby G?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, why not. Yes,
16 sir.

17 Ms. Bottoni, what do you want to do with the
18 card if --

19 MS. BOTTONI: Do security. I was just looking
20 for something different.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What do you want to do
22 if you get work card, kind of the plan?

23 MS. BOTTONI: Oh. Security.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Have you worked
25 in security prior?

1 MS. BOTTONI: No, I haven't. I've worked at
2 7-Eleven for 20 years, the same one.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Like security?

4 MS. BOTTONI: Kind of. You have your own
5 security there. Yeah. Crazy people.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Have you been in any
7 other law enforcement problems since your last arrest in
8 2007?

9 MS. BOTTONI: No.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. I'm good.
11 Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
13 Nixon?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No. No, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. With no
18 additional questions, I would accept a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make the
20 motion that we overturn the denial for Ronda L. Bottoni.
21 She's applied for a work card and was denied. I'm
22 basing this on the forgery conviction, which is just shy
23 of 20 years ago, so we've got time and distance. And
24 she explained the situation for the domestic violence.
25 And she's got a long history of solid employment.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
2 to overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We do have
5 a second. Discussion on the motion?

6 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
7 signify by saying "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

10 It passes unanimously. Ms. Bottoni, you will
11 get your card.

12 MS. BOTTONI: Thank you.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

14 MS. BOTTONI: Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 48, Naej
16 Barabin.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Is Mr. Barabin here?

18 No, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Number 49,
20 Jasmine Christmas.

21 MS. CHRISTMAS: Hello.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Hello.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Hello.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Investigator Mahan, it
25 looks like you're up.

1 MR. MAHAN: To the Board, Investigator Mahan.
2 Ms. Christmas applied for a security guard license 12-21
3 of last year. At the time of her application, she did
4 indicate that she had been arrested for a felony charge,
5 at which time she also indicated she would be providing
6 court documents for the Board.

7 She did list one arrest. But there were
8 several arrests that she did not. The one arrest she
9 did list was a 2000 grand theft charge.

10 And there's some confusion with her case. I
11 reached out to several agencies, Inglewood P.D., Culver
12 City, LAPD, several agencies, in an attempt to find her
13 records, and it was that I was unable to locate any
14 records for her.

15 She was denied on failure to disclose based on
16 a weapons conviction from 2011. And at point, that's
17 where the confusion comes in. It appears that she was
18 an ex-felon at the time of that arrest. So. There was
19 nothing on record that I could locate.

20 And even this morning, Ms. Christmas sent me an
21 email indicating she was unable to obtain her court
22 records that she originally said she would bring. And
23 so we have no court dispositions or court records to
24 review.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Ms. Christmas,

1 would you please identify yourself and, also, explain
2 the arrests, and help clarify some of it.

3 MS. CHRISTMAS: My name is Jasmine Christmas.
4 In 2009, I was, I was arrested for grand theft. I
5 forged a check from my mother. My mom was an addict,
6 and she used to leave me and my siblings at home at long
7 periods of time. So me being the oldest daughter, I had
8 nothing else to do. I didn't have any foods to feed
9 them or anything to give them, let alone clothes for
10 them to go to school. So that's where the forgery comes
11 in at.

12 In 2011, as far as the possession of a firearm
13 case, I was at a friend's house. Friends were getting
14 into it. Somebody had a gun on them. At this time,
15 I've never been arrested. I've never been in trouble.
16 I was a good child. I went to school and graduated
17 early. I graduated from college, from Santa Monica
18 College, with all honors.

19 You know, that was, this is my first time ever
20 being in a position like this. So, you know, just being
21 around the wrong crowds, and the person who I was with
22 had the gun. So they charged me because I was a felon
23 already. And, well, I just got out of jail actually,
24 and I already had a charge for a grand theft, a felony
25 charge. So I didn't know that this person had the gun

1 on them. I'm not saying, hey, you know, you got a gun
2 in your purse? I didn't know that that person did.

3 So they charged me with the possession of a
4 firearm. I did 292 days, pregnant at that.

5 For my grand theft charge, they gave me a
6 county year. I did four months and 20 days, got out on
7 work release, did my work release. They gave me three
8 years probation. I did my probation. They let me go
9 early because of me complying with my probation.

10 As far as my records, I wasn't even able to
11 obtain my records. I called, like because I've tried to
12 see if they have them in the file. They didn't have
13 them in the file anymore, because the cases are old.

14 I haven't gotten in any trouble. You know, I
15 had to give my daughter up because I couldn't take care
16 of her for years, for a few years. I missed a good four
17 years out of my own child's life because of the felony,
18 you know.

19 It's hard trying to find employment and trying
20 to get a job. And people don't want to take a chance on
21 you, even though you know you won't mess up or commit a
22 crime. You know, it's just hard taking a gamble with
23 certain companies that you're trying to get a job with.

24 Actually, I am, I am currently employed right
25 now with T.J. Maxx. I have a job offer right now with

1 Coca Cola. I'm waiting on my background, address that,
2 and stuff to come back right now. That job pays 16.50
3 an hour. I've kept sustainable work. I just was
4 working at Fanatic and Bed, Bath and Beyond, their
5 warehouses. I had an interview for Amazon on Monday.
6 So, you know, I have a lot of people taking chances on
7 me now. A few years ago, I couldn't say that.

8 I have my daughter now. I just had a little
9 boy. I'm in a position now to actually be able to give
10 my kids stability and financial stability and take care
11 of them.

12 So, you know, I haven't got in trouble since
13 those cases, let alone a jaywalking ticket, at all.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have any
15 questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I do for the
17 investigator, Mr. Chair.

18 These five cases that are listed on the form
19 that we have before us, is that all the arrests that
20 you're aware of?

21 MR. MAHAN: Yes. Yes, sir.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And then, out of
23 those five, remind me, which of those did she disclose?

24 MR. MAHAN: She disclosed a March 2011 grand
25 theft charge. So the third one, number three. Or I'm

1 correct. So it is not on it. So, apparently, it's not
2 on there.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I think, we -- everyone is
4 on the wrong one. You're on the last person. This
5 is --

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. My apologies.
7 I will take back all those comments.

8 MR. MAHAN: Oh.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: On mine, I show, I show
10 two.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah, no. Yeah.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. I'm on the
13 right one now. All right. But she only disclosed one
14 of the two, you're saying?

15 MR. MAHAN: Yes, sir. On the application, it
16 was the 2011 grand theft charge, and that want in March.
17 However, her FBI fingerprints come back with a June
18 arrest. Which, according to the fingerprints, she was
19 released with a writ to promise to appear, which she
20 failed to appear on. And her subsequent last arrest was
21 in 2015 on a warrant for failing to appear for that
22 charge.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. We didn't -- I
24 wish we would have known that. All right. Let's, let's
25 start from scratch, because this is the second time I'm

1 confused today. For the three of us up here that are
2 all looking at us like we don't know what's going on,
3 could you please tell us every one of the arrests she's
4 had.

5 MR. MAHAN: Her one denial report that I
6 printed up yesterday has four arrests listed on it.
7 There are four arrests on her fingerprint report.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. The charge and
9 the dates?

10 MS. MAHAN: So she has a -- and correct me.
11 There's a typographical on number three. It should be
12 3-12 of 2011. That was ex-felon in possession of a
13 firearm. Number one was uttering a forged instrument,
14 1-28-2009. And number -- arrest date, number two, was
15 June 21st, 2011. So they were out of sequential order.
16 That was CCW in a vehicle with previous felony
17 conviction. And then number four was failure to appear
18 after written promise on that felony warrant for the CCW
19 arrest.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And that was in 2015,
21 correct, the warrant?

22 MR. MAHAN: Yes, sir.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. So she disclosed
24 two out of the four?

25 MR. MAHAN: On her application, she disclosed

1 one.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: One out of the four.

3 Okay. All right.

4 Did you understand my questions to the
5 investigator?

6 MS. CHRISTMAS: Yes, I understand your
7 questions.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. So I got --
9 tell me about the last one, in 2015.

10 MS. CHRISTMAS: Okay. The 2015 one, I don't
11 even remember getting -- I didn't even get arrested in
12 2015. I got arrested in 2014. It was for restitution
13 for my probation. I got picked up on that. They gave
14 me time served and dismissed all my cases, because I did
15 my time on them.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And where were you
17 arrested?

18 MS. CHRISTMAS: I was arrested out here. I did
19 30 days. Well, I was arrested at the Welfare
20 Department, because I was reinstating my benefits.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And they ran you and then
22 came up with the warrant. Okay.

23 MS. CHRISTMAS: I didn't even know. It was
24 crazy. Because I had just went off to L.A. several
25 months ago, because my mom had just passed around that

1 time, and I went to go check in and do everything, and I
2 didn't have any warrants. So when I came, and that's
3 when I put the motion in for me to get my probation
4 dismissed. And they end up dismissing my probation.

5 And when I got picked up, and I was it
6 explaining to the officer, like, you know, I just took
7 care of almost all of this. I don't even understand how
8 I got a warrant for my arrest. Regardless of the fact,
9 they took me to jail. I did like 28 days here. I went
10 to L.A. I was out there probably 20 days, went to
11 court, case dismissed, they let me go on Sunday.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. So my last question
13 for you is why did you not disclose the three arrests
14 that we didn't know about?

15 MS. CHRISTMAS: The only -- I've only been
16 arrested for the grand theft, possession of a firearm,
17 and then the restitution one that I got picked up out
18 here. The reason why I didn't disclose the possession
19 of a firearm, because when they say the case was
20 dismissed, I thought it was thrown out, I didn't have to
21 worry about it anymore.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

23 MS. CHRISTMAS: Now, the grand theft, you know,
24 they didn't say that. She just said, you know, you
25 maxed out your time, you can go home. That's what that

1 was. So.

2 Like I said, I've never been in trouble before.
3 I'm not a bad person. I don't do bad things at all. So
4 I did that, you know, and I take full responsibility for
5 it. You know, I was wrong. Whichever way it goes, I
6 was wrong. It was wasn't my decision to begin with. So
7 I was wrong, and I do accept all accountability for all
8 my actions.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
10 Appreciate your response.

11 I'm done, Mr. Chair.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Board
13 Member Nixon?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Bobby G?

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No questions, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. No additional
18 questions. I'll accept a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Bobby G. I'll make a
20 motion. Number 49, approve the staff recommendations of
21 denial for Jasmine M. Christmas, who appealed the
22 registration for her denial.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So the motion,
24 there's a motion to uphold the denial by Commissioner
25 Bobby G. Do we have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a
3 second. Discussion on the motion?

4 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion to
5 uphold the denial, signify by saying "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those opposed, "nay"?

8 The denial is upheld. Ms. Christmas, your
9 denial has been upheld. You will be eligible to reapply
10 within a -- in a year. Not within a year, but in a
11 year, you'll be eligible to reapply. You probably -- if
12 you choose to reapply in a year, please bring any court
13 documents that you can forward so that we can get this
14 sorted out.

15 MS. CHRISTMAS: All righty. Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 51, Tyger
19 Summerise.

20 MR. SUMMERISE: The C-4 guy is out of the
21 building, right? I just want to --

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I think he is.

23 MR. SUMMERISE: I just want to make sure.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Investigator Maxwell,
25 you're up.

1 MR. MAXWELL: Thank you, sir. Investigator
2 Maxwell. Mr. Summerise first appeared before the Board
3 in the March 2018 meeting, where the denial for a work
4 card was upheld due to nondisclosure of the following
5 arrests.

6 1997, out of California, carrying a loaded
7 firearm in a public place. It was a misdemeanor.
8 Disposition said he got 24 months probation and five
9 days jail.

10 2001, out of California, misdemeanor trespass.
11 24 months probation, 11 days jail.

12 2002, out of California, petty theft under \$50
13 without a prior, which was a misdemeanor. Disposition,
14 it just says convicted and fined.

15 In 2008, out of California, misdemeanor
16 battery. He was released, detention only.

17 2012, out of California, misdemeanor
18 intoxication. He was released with just intoxication.

19 He was told that he could reapply in one year.
20 The applicant has disclosed his arrests and has not been
21 in trouble since his last appearance before the Board.
22 He's appealing for the denial to be overturned so that
23 he may be granted his work card. The applicant was not
24 made provisional.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Mr. Summerise,

1 what do you have to say? Or first identify yourself,
2 and go ahead and explain. Thank you.

3 MR. SUMMERISE: Okay. My name is Tyger
4 Summerise. And, first of all, I just want to apologize
5 for not disclosing the priors before. The reason I did
6 not disclose it before is because in California I did
7 have these sealed. And employees of the courts did tell
8 me that I didn't have to disclose this unless I applied
9 for a federal job, law enforcement or a CCW in any
10 state. Which two and a half years ago, I did move to
11 Nevada. I did apply for a CCW. I did disclose it then,
12 because I know the FBI is going to deny me based on me
13 not disclosing that.

14 So I thought that I didn't have to disclose it
15 when I applied here for this license. So that's why I
16 failed to disclose it. I'm not trying to hide anything.
17 I didn't think that I'd have to. So when I was denied,
18 I talked to Mr. Maxwell, and he told me, you're going to
19 have to disclose this, you know, just for future
20 reference.

21 And, also, I did hear, on one of the arrests,
22 that I was incarcerated. I've never been incarcerated
23 overnight. I don't know how that came up. But I didn't
24 do 11 days in jail ever. They kept me for a few hours
25 and let me go. So I don't know where that came from.

1 But I am looking to relocate. I currently live
2 in California right now. I'm currently working as the
3 loss prevention officer at Gucci and Balenciaga in
4 Beverly Hills. I'm working six days a week between two
5 companies. They offered me a supervisor position at one
6 of the stores out here in Las Vegas. However, I do need
7 to get my license to relocate.

8 Now, even if you guys failed to overturn the
9 denial, they did offer me a retail sales position
10 working at the company. So I will probably relocate no
11 matter what. However, the supervisor position is on the
12 table, you know, when the person currently holding that
13 position decides to leave and retire, so.

14 That brings me before the Board today.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

16 Any questions from the Board? Board Member
17 Bobby G?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's Tyger ("Tie-ger")
19 not Tyger ("Tee-ger"), right?

20 MR. SUMMERISE: I get it all. T, tiger.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Summerise.

22 MR. SUMMERISE: Yeah.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Summerise, I
24 commend you for coming back in a year, you know, get
25 this stuff all straightened out, and everything's been

1 up-to-date.

2 Just one question for Mr. Maxwell.

3 MR. MAXWELL: Sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All this stuff is
5 squared away now?

6 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Where are you --
8 you work now in Beverly Hills?

9 MR. SUMMERISE: Yeah, I work at the Gucci store
10 two days a week, and I work at Balenciaga right
11 next-door in Beverly Hills, Rodeo Drive.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Are you a
13 card holder now on the CCW?

14 MR. SUMMERISE: CCW in Nevada, yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You are?

16 MR. SUMMERISE: Yes, I am.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That's all.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

19 Board Member Nixon?

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Your presentation, you
23 answered all my questions. You did what we asked you to
24 do, and you're back here today. So thank you.

25 MR. SUMMERISE: No problem. Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: If no further
2 questions, I'd entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Bobby G. Because of
4 discussion here and your cooperation, I -- number 51,
5 Mr. Tyger Summerise, I make a motion to approve, to
6 overturn the denial, overturn the denial for
7 Mr. Summerise.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
9 motion to overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion and a
12 second. Do we have any discussion on the motion?

13 Seeing none, all in favor of the overturning
14 the denial, signify by saying "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?
17 Passes unanimously. Mr. Summerise, you will
18 get your card.

19 MR. SUMMERISE: Thank you very much.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good luck.

21 MR. SUMMERISE: Thank you.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

23 MR. SUMMERISE: Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 52, Jose
25 Rodriguez-Rios.

1 MR. RODRIGUEZ-RIOS: Good morning.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Investigator Maxwell,
4 it looks like you're up again.

5 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. The applicant was
6 denied for a 2005 unlawful possession of a controlled
7 substance not for purpose of sale, out of Nevada. This
8 was felony level, to which he received probation not to
9 exceed 18 months. He did disclose this on the
10 application as a misdemeanor, but the court records show
11 that it remained as a felony conviction. The applicant
12 was not made provisional.

13 He did have several other arrests that were not
14 listed because they were either traffic, dismissed or
15 there was no disposition found on them. His last arrest
16 was in 2010. I think, it was Nevada ICE, aiding and
17 removal, under Section 212.237. That was dropped on or
18 around 3-21 of 2011.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.
20 Mr. Rodriguez-Rios, please identify yourself, and then
21 please explain the arrests.

22 MR. RODRIGUEZ-RIOS: My name is Jose
23 Rodriguez-Rios. In 2005, I got arrested for possession
24 with intent to sell. Which I wasn't, just because it
25 just in a couple baggies. And I didn't know what a

1 felony was at that time. I was 18. I never got in
2 trouble before. And they just told me, if you take
3 probation, that you won't go to prison. I get the
4 prison, I'm like, okay, you know.

5 And, well, I got -- I did the probation. But,
6 I guess, it was dishonorably -- what's that word?
7 Dishonorly discharged? No. That I completed it, but it
8 was dishonorly. I didn't know that until recently when
9 I -- after I applied for the guard card, I went to the
10 courthouse to do some research. And, I guess so, it was
11 dishonorably. I completed it. But, I think, it was
12 because I missed a couple times, a couple meetings that
13 I to go in. I think, it was because of that.

14 Then, 2010, I hired lawyers that could reopen
15 it, try to seal it. He told me he did it. So that's
16 why I put misdemeanor. I thought he -- I didn't know
17 that it was still a felon, a felony.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right.
19 Questions from the Board? Board Member Nixon?

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So this was disclosed.
21 And what have you been doing, what work have you been
22 doing since then?

23 MR. RODRIGUEZ-RIOS: Manual labor work. Or I
24 recently got hired, and I was supposed to start this
25 weekend. It's Kentico Reader Service, home care for

1 disabled adults. But I was in training this week, and I
2 told them I had a meeting. So they rescheduled. I will
3 start on the 25th.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Have you been in trouble
5 with the law since?

6 MR. RODRIGUEZ-RIOS: Not since my last arrest,
7 which was like in 2011, for a DUI, 2010, something like
8 that, 2009. That was the last time.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Rodriguez, what type
12 of drugs was it that you were arrested for?

13 MR. RODRIGUEZ-RIOS: Marijuana.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Marijuana.

15 MR. RODRIGUEZ-RIOS: Just a couple baggies,
16 but.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. You answered
18 the question.

19 Mr. Maxwell.

20 MR. MAXWELL: Yes.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So his last arrest was
22 when?

23 MR. MAXWELL: 2010, sir.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And that was the ICE,
25 or was that the DUI?

1 MR. MAXWELL: That was the ICE.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Prior to the
3 ICE, when was his last arrest?

4 MR. MAXWELL: November two thousand -- no, I'm
5 sorry. There was a DUI in 2011, but there was no
6 disposition on the file, sir.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And then these
8 other arrests that he talked about, did he disclose
9 those and they're just not on the form?

10 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. Thank
12 you. No further questions.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Board
14 Member Bobby G?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, sir, Mr. Chairman.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. No
17 additional questions. I'd entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
19 motion to overturn the denial. Time and distance on the
20 one charge that would deny him, and we're looking at in
21 excess of 14 years, the subject's honesty, and his
22 employment history.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion to
24 overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a second on the
2 motion. Discussion on the motion?

3 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
4 signify by saying "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those opposed, "nay"?
7 Passes unanimously. Mr. Rodriguez-Rios, you
8 will get your card. Good luck.

9 MR. RODRIGUEZ-RIOS: Thank you very much. I
10 appreciate it.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good luck.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You have a good day.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 53, Allister K.
14 Rodriguez.

15 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Good afternoon.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good afternoon.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Investigator
18 Maxwell, it looks like you're up again.

19 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. The applicant was
20 denied for a 1997 forgery charge out of California.
21 Disposition was two years probation, 11 days jail. This
22 type of offense is classed as a wobbler in California.

23 Also, in 1998, out of California, possession of
24 a controlled substance in prison at a felony level, with
25 three years probation, 90 days jail. The disposition

1 states that the probation was terminated.

2 These were disclosed. And, also, the applicant
3 provided court documents. The arrests were confirmed on
4 the fingerprint report. The applicant was initially
5 made provisional as these arrests were out of state.

6 He also had another couple of arrests not
7 listed that were at misdemeanor level.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Is that it?

9 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Thank you.
11 So, Mr. Rodriguez.

12 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do you want to explain,
14 first off, what a wobbler is, and then the arrests,
15 please.

16 MR. RODRIGUEZ: I don't even know what a
17 wobbler is.

18 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chairman, Investigator
19 Saladino.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: It says this --

21 MR. SALADINO: In the state of California --

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah. It says in
23 California.

24 MR. SALADINO: In the State of California, they
25 have certain, certain ones that can go either way. It

1 could be a felony or a misdemeanor or even a gross
2 misdemeanor. It depends a lot on the sentencing and how
3 they structure it through the courts.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you very
5 much for the explanation.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And, also, Mr. Chair, to
7 add, on the charging document, the prosecutor has
8 discretion under the wobbler law to either charge it as
9 a misdemeanor or felony. And the same with the judge on
10 the sentencing, the judge can change it under the
11 wobbler law. And there's a list of offenses. They're
12 pretty extensive.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right. So,
14 Mr. Rodriguez, could you explain -- first off, identify
15 yourself, and then explain the arrests, please.

16 MR. RODRIGUEZ: My name's Allister Rodriguez.
17 And which, which arrest are you referring to, the
18 forgery?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah, well, the forgery
20 and then the possession of controlled substance in the
21 prison.

22 MR. RODRIGUEZ: On the forgery, I went into a
23 bank to cash a check that someone gave me, to get some
24 money. I ran out the bank, got chased, got caught. As
25 I was -- got arrested. When I was in jail, they found

1 marijuana in my shoe. So then they gave me another case
2 while I was already incarcerated.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

4 Questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn?

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: What are you doing these
6 days? And, hopefully, you're working in radio. You've
7 got an incredible voice.

8 MR. RODRIGUEZ: I work for Ross in loss
9 prevention.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

11 MR. RODRIGUEZ: At the moment.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: How long have you been
13 there?

14 MR. RODRIGUEZ: I've been there almost a year.
15 That's the first job I got when I got to Las Vegas,
16 Nevada.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And what did you --

18 MR. RODRIGUEZ: It believe, it will be a year
19 in April that I've been here. Before that, I worked at
20 Hertz Rent-a-Car in California. Dependable Auto
21 Shippers, car ship company. I worked for Frank Scott in
22 Torrance, California, the Mayor. I worked for the
23 hospital, patient transport and technologist assistant.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon, any

1 questions?

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Bobby G?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No questions, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Seeing no more
6 questions, I would entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I'd move
8 to overturn Allister Rodriguez's denial.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion to
10 overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Discussion on the
13 motion?

14 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
15 signify by saying "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

18 Passes unanimously. Mr. Rodriguez, you will
19 receive your card.

20 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Thank you very much. I
21 appreciate it.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Good luck.

23 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Thank you very much. And the
24 same to all the rest of you guys.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 54, Danielle --

1 I'm going to try and say it -- Quinones?

2 MS. QUINONES: I'm now divorced. I'm Figueroa.
3 I'm finally divorced. So I'm going back to Figueroa,
4 even if I have to.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

6 MS. QUINONES: I just haven't mailed it back.
7 I won't have to do it Quinones no more.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Then, we
9 will look at -- Investigator Maxwell, this is yours?

10 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. 2007, out of New York,
11 possession of controlled substance, third-degree
12 narcotic drug intent to sell at the felony level.
13 Disposition was five years probation, which started on
14 December 3rd, 2008 and ended December 2nd, 2013. This
15 was disclosed. The type of conviction was not known
16 until the fingerprint report was received, which is why
17 the applicant was initially made provisional.

18 There is another arrest not listed. That was
19 reduced to the disorderly conduct at a misdemeanor
20 level, and that was out of 2017. June 2018 was a
21 conditional discharge, community service and five days.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you,
23 Investigator.

24 Ms. Quinones, would you please explain the
25 arrest and the subsequent arrest, also.

1 MS. QUINONES: Okay. Danielle Quinones. So I,
2 basically, had a boyfriend who was predicate felon. And
3 I didn't know what a predicate felon was at that time.
4 So I was hanging around him. And he had drugs, and he
5 told me to hold it. We both got caught. Not knowing at
6 that time about parole and everything, obviously, they
7 were watching him and waiting for him to mess up again,
8 because he was a predicate felon. I didn't know that at
9 that time.

10 I had a disorderly conduct, which is supposed
11 to be sealed. I was told by my lawyer it's going to be
12 sealed, so there's no need to mention it. So if I'm not
13 wrong on that part, that would be the only reason why I
14 didn't disclose that was because it was supposed to be
15 sealed.

16 And I was, basically, going to my daughter's
17 school. And they had called security because of the
18 fact that my -- they said that my daughter stole a
19 phone. And I have children, and I go to bat for my
20 children. I teach my children not to steal. And my
21 child gave the phone back. And the principal,
22 basically, was like, you know, she's a good kid, but the
23 facts are the facts are the facts. And I'm going to go
24 to bat for my child. The facts are she gave the phone
25 back. So they tried to make her to be a -- you know, a

1 thief. And my daughter's been pushed back. She doesn't
2 have a father. I'm the only one she has.

3 So that's why I got disorderly conduct, because
4 I go to bat for my children.

5 I had the problems that I had. I got out.
6 Once I got out, I never went to jail. I turned my whole
7 life around. I didn't even -- before this conviction in
8 2007, I was a dancer. So to feed my children, that's
9 what I did. After that, I learned everything, you know,
10 not to be around these certain type of people,
11 everything like that.

12 In 12 months, I went and I got an associate's
13 degree. I got certified. I was on the dean's list.
14 And I also got my GED. All of that I acquired in 12
15 months. I went on to do my bachelor's. And I had to
16 stop. I have five classes left. I went on to do home
17 health aid, which I've been doing in New York for four
18 to five years.

19 My aunt got sick. She's blind. She needs
20 help. And she's the only family member left. Told my
21 kid, come on, let's go. Came here to help her. So I
22 perceive that to be her home health aid. Because that's
23 what I've been doing.

24 Everywhere that I've been trying to go, they've
25 been going against me. I went and I got a State of

1 New York -- the certificate of disabilities to help me
2 to get jobs. So that's, basically, what I've been
3 using.

4 It's just me and my child out here helping my
5 aunt. I need to do security because it pays enough to
6 support my child.

7 I wanted to do Lyft. I came out here with the
8 thought, I'm going to do Lyft. Lyft is not supposed to
9 go past seven years, but they went past seven years, and
10 they told me I couldn't work for them because of that.

11 I went to Teamsters 631, passed with flying
12 colors. But what else? Your felony.

13 So I'm just trying, I'm trying to do anything
14 out here for my child. And I'm trying also to help.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

16 Questions from the Board? Board Member Nixon?

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So are you currently
18 working?

19 MS. QUINONES: Yes. I work for Bell Trans
20 right now at a call center. I've been working there for
21 three months. I was provisional, so I worked at
22 security. And then I went on to the limousine. And
23 then I just transferred to the call center. So I'm
24 still at the call center. I just bought a car. I got
25 my income tax. I bought a car. I paid my rent for a

1 couple of months, so that I wouldn't have to worry, so
2 that I could try to go back to school and finish. So
3 I'm doing everything I'm supposed to do.

4 And now I do Postmates. I'm trying to work.
5 Everywhere I go, they do see the felony. But I do
6 Postmates. And I do have my job at the call center,
7 Bell Trans.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, Investigator Maxwell,
9 the felony was disclosed. The other thing that just
10 recently happened wasn't, but it was just an arrest, or
11 was it a conviction at all?

12 MR. MAXWELL: It was reduced to disorderly
13 conduct. And it says that the -- it got a conditional
14 discharge and that she did five days community service.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And this was back
16 in 2011, or? I'm sorry.

17 MR. MAXWELL: 2017.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: '17.

19 MR. MAXWELL: And there's a conditional
20 discharge in 2018.

21 MS. QUINONES: Was it supposed to be sealed?

22 MR. MAXWELL: It doesn't tell me that.

23 MS. QUINONES: It was supposed to be sealed.
24 That's what I was told. When it went in front of the
25 judge, they said it would be sealed after six months,

1 you don't have to say anything. So that's what I was
2 doing.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: In New York, or?

4 MS. QUINONES: New York.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh.

6 MS. QUINONES: That was almost two years ago.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

8 MS. QUINONES: I'm just, I'm trying. I'm doing
9 everything. I have two other children. My daughter,
10 she went to private high school. She just finished. I
11 paid for that. My husband took me to child support. I
12 paid child support by doing everything else. I have a
13 16-year-old that's about to move here. He wants to take
14 care of me.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
17 Nixon, did you have any additional questions?

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Board Member
20 Bobby G?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No questions, sir.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I just want to make sure.
24 So we've got two arrests, both in New York, but the
25 felony that would deny her was over 10 years ago?

1 MR. MAXWELL: 2007, sir, yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Which union was that,
3 which teamsters union?

4 MS. QUINONES: Teamsters 631.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Doing what?

6 MS. QUINONES: Doing the flagging. I was
7 thinking, since I got the appeal for this, that I was
8 going to appeal that. Then I'm thinking, do I appeal
9 this? So my idea today to come in here was, if I don't
10 get a second chance, the other things that I would do, I
11 would appeal it and keep appealing and keep appealing.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

13 MS. QUINONES: To keep going for my children.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. I have no
15 further questions, Mr. Chair.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any additional
17 questions from the Board?

18 Seeing none, I'd accept a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I motive that we overturn
20 Danielle Quinones' denial for a work card.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
22 to overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second. Bobby G.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
25 motion and a second. Discussion on the motion?

1 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
2 signify by saying "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those opposed, "nay"?

5 Passes unanimously. Mrs. Quinones, you now
6 have your card. Your card's been approved.

7 MS. QUINONES: Go to work.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Your card's been
9 approved. So good luck.

10 MS. QUINONES: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right.

12 MS. QUINONES: Thank you. Quick question. Now
13 that I have these divorce papers, do I have to go back
14 to Figueroa to get my card, or do I have to wait for the
15 divorce decree?

16 MR. SALADINO: Just send them to us, and we'll
17 upload them to your file. Then we'll get your card
18 issued with the right name that's on the divorce decree.

19 MS. QUINONES: Thank you. Thank you.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good luck.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Good luck.

22 MS. QUINONES: Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Number 55,
24 Patricia Johnson.

25 MS. JOHNSON: Good morning. Good afternoon.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Investigator Maxwell,
2 it looks like you again.

3 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. Thank you. In 1988,
4 out of California, the applicant was convicted for sale
5 of drugs at a felony level. She received a four-year
6 prison sentence. This was disclosed. And the applicant
7 was not made provisional. The arrest was confirmed
8 using the fingerprint report.

9 Also, prior that, there were five arrests at a
10 misdemeanor level. The last arrest was in 2000, and
11 that was also at the misdemeanor level, where she
12 received 12 months probation. And that was for driving
13 with a suspended license.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you,
15 Investigator.

16 Ms. Johnson, do you want to explain the felony
17 arrest and circumstances surrounding that?

18 MS. JOHNSON: Yeah. I got around the wrong
19 crowd, didn't listen, ended up selling drugs, got caught
20 up and went to jail, did my time, came home. And then I
21 had another case, like he said, another case, something,
22 I thought I forgot. And when I was doing my
23 application, I said, well, the main one I remember is
24 this one, like with doing the time and everything on
25 that. And then, after that, and then I did my time. I

1 came home. And then I started having kids. And then I
2 just forgot about all the other stuff. I just kind of,
3 I think I erased it out of my head or something. But I
4 remember that case, because that case sticks with me,
5 because I just couldn't, I didn't understand, how did I
6 get caught up in that. Because I'm the only girl out of
7 five boys. And it's like, oh, she's always into
8 something, or she's bad. No, those were the boys. But,
9 no, I just remembered that case and the stuff on that
10 case, and I just didn't remember the rest.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

12 Board Member Bobby G, do you have any
13 questions?

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Is this Mr. Maxwell
15 again? One for Mr. Maxwell. So she did report this
16 felony?

17 MR. MAXWELL: The felony, yes, sir.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did she report any
19 other ones, they're not disclosed at all?

20 MR. MAXWELL: Give me one second, sir.

21 It was just the felony that was disclosed, sir.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And the latest one,
23 then, was 2010?

24 MR. MAXWELL: I believe, it was 2000. Let me
25 just confirm. That was March of 2000 for driving with a

1 suspended license.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right.

3 Ms. Johnson, do you have a driver's license now?

4 MS. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Valid driver's license
6 in Nevada?

7 MS. JOHNSON: M-hm (affirmative). For Nevada,
8 no.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Where's it from?

10 MS. JOHNSON: California. I live in Barstow.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. No problem.

12 MS. JOHNSON: And I didn't know my license was
13 suspended until the police stopped me that day. I
14 didn't know.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. No more
16 questions, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

18 Board Member Nixon?

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So have you been working
20 since you were released or recently?

21 MS. JOHNSON: Yes. I worked. Since I
22 released, I started out with American Bank, because I
23 was going the next day when all that had happened. And
24 I came home. I finished my license out, and when it
25 expired, I didn't renew it. I went on to doing in-home

1 care for my brother. He had got shot multiple times.
2 So I was doing in-home care for him, which I still am
3 off and on. But right now, so I'm still doing that, and
4 I'm employed at Inter-Con Security in L.A., California,
5 well, Pasadena.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Your intention is to move
7 out here, then, if --

8 MS. JOHNSON: I have a daughter out here. She
9 has two kids. I'm getting up in age, and I just want to
10 be a little closer.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Maxwell, besides the
14 2010 driving on a revoked license, what are the other
15 four, misdemeanors, I'm guessing?

16 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Just what the charge was
18 and the years, please.

19 MR. MAXWELL: 1979, PC robbery, PC kidnapping.
20 There is nothing on those on the severity. There was no
21 disposition. Again in '79, robbery again. There was no
22 disposition on that. 1980, disorderly conduct,
23 prostitution, 12 months probation. '84, accessory,
24 started off as a felony transport, sell of narcotic
25 controlled substance, but it was reduced to a

1 misdemeanor. That was three years probation. And then
2 it leads into the felony, felony arrest in '88, felony
3 conviction.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. When you were 29,
5 you smartened up. Right.

6 Nothing since 1988, except that one driving
7 charge?

8 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you. No
10 further questions.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. With no
12 additional questions, I'd accept a motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
14 Nixon. I move that we overturn Patricia Johnson's
15 denial and allow her the work card, due to time.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
17 to overturn the denial. Do we have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds. We
19 accidentally cut off Board Member Nixon. She said due
20 to time and distance.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh. Thank you.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We've got 31, 31 years
23 since the felony. And during that time, there was one
24 traffic offense.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a

1 motion to overturn and a second. Any discussion on the
2 motion?

3 All in favor, signify by saying "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Was it unanimous?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh, okay. I'm sorry.

8 I didn't hear. Okay. All in favor, say "aye." We'll
9 do the vote again. All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those opposed, "nay"?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nay.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. The motion
14 passes by a vote of three to one.

15 So, Ms. Johnson, you'll get your work card, or
16 you'll get -- your registration will be approved. Good
17 luck.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Have a good day.

19 MS. JOHNSON: Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 57, Grefford
21 Dixon.

22 MR. DIXON: Good afternoon.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right.

24 Investigator Maxwell, still you.

25 MR. MAXWELL: Thank you, sir. 2007, out of

1 Rhode Island, possession of a Schedule 1 to 5 controlled
2 substance, second offense, two years 355 days prison.
3 This was disclosed.

4 1995, out of Florida, fraud, illegal use of a
5 credit card at felony level. The disposition just said
6 guilty, slash, convicted. This one was not disclosed.

7 The applicant was not made provisional. Both
8 arrests were confirmed on the fingerprint report. But
9 only the Rhode Island one was confirmed by the
10 applicant.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Mr. Dixon, would
12 you please identify yourself, and then explain the
13 arrests, in particular the one which you did not
14 disclose.

15 MR. DIXON: I'm Grefford Dixon. For 1995, in
16 Florida, I don't remember not disclosing that. But I
17 was arrested for a fake -- the use of a fake charge
18 card. I was in a hotel with another person. He was in
19 one room, and I was in another room. And I had just met
20 him. He was from Philly. And he asked if I wanted
21 something to eat, was I hungry, and I said yes. So he
22 ordered some Chinese food. And when the delivery person
23 came, he signed a name. And then, when he asked me was
24 I hungry, I said yes, so he ordered me some food. And
25 it came to my room, and I signed it. The next thing I

1 know, the police came. And it ended up being for
2 forgery and use of a fake charge card. There was no
3 charge card. Just, I just signed my name.

4 And back in Boston, I was charged. I did two
5 years mandatory in Plymouth County for possession of a
6 controlled substance. After that, I completed three,
7 three drug programs, North Cottage, and two of them was
8 ministry programs. And I completed two while I was
9 incarcerated, anger management and substance abuse.

10 And I've been clean with drugs. I was selling
11 and using at the same time. I've been clean from drugs
12 since my last incarceration.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Questions from
14 the Board? Board Member Flynn?

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes. Mr. Dixon.

16 MR. DIXON: Yes.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Why did you not disclose
18 the credit card arrest?

19 MR. DIXON: Well, it was a long time ago. It's
20 like -- but I could explain why. It's I just don't
21 remember sometimes. Some things I can remember. Some
22 things I can't.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, you remembered it
24 pretty good this afternoon.

25 MR. DIXON: Yeah. Yeah, but it just came up.

1 Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Maxwell.

3 MR. MAXWELL: Sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Any other arrests besides
5 what we talked about?

6 MR. MAXWELL: Going by the fingerprint report,
7 just court-issued warrants. There's nothing, no other
8 arrests, so to speak. There's just warrants issued.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Related to these cases?

10 MR. MAXWELL: Yeah.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And, Mr. Dixon,
12 what are you doing these days?

13 MR. DIXON: Well, I work for the Traffic
14 Control of Las Vegas.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Uh-huh (affirmative).

16 MR. DIXON: I was working with Station Casino.
17 I've been here two years from Boston.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Uh-huh (affirmative).

19 MR. DIXON: And odd jobs with Marathon Staffing
20 and LegaMax. But I just got my flagger's card, and I'm
21 working on my OSHA card. I just got my flagger card
22 last week. And I want to do security. I'm 60 years old
23 now. I'm tired of hard-labor work. The pay is good and
24 the benefits. And I'm out here with my 12 grandkids,
25 so, m-hm (affirmative).

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: 12?

2 MR. DIXON: Yes.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: God bless you.

4 MR. DIXON: Thank you.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You don't have any money
6 left.

7 MR. DIXON: I'm trying to.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I have nothing further.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Board
10 Member Bobby C, Bobby G? I can't even get that right.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That's a classic. That's
12 a classic, Mr. Chair. I will remember that, especially
13 amongst Bobby and my friends.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, I've only been a
15 cop 44 years.

16 Mr. Dixon, you said you got your flag card?

17 MR. DIXON: Yes.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: From where?

19 MR. DIXON: Traffic Control of Las Vegas.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, okay. Are you now
21 or have you ever been in a drug program?

22 MR. DIXON: Yes, m-hm (affirmative).

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Have you completed one?

24 MR. DIXON: Yes.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you in one now?

1 MR. DIXON: No.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, that's all I
3 have, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any additional
5 questions from the Board?

6 MS. NIXON: I have a quick question. For the
7 1995, did you do any jail time for that?

8 MR. DIXON: Like four months.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Four months?

10 MR. DIXON: Yes.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you. That's all.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: That's all. All right.
13 Seeing no more questions, I would accept a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make the
15 motion to overturn the denial. And I'm basing this on
16 that his one failure to disclose, that's the older case,
17 and that's over 20 years ago. He was pretty forthcoming
18 and upfront with us this morning. He has been -- he
19 stayed out of trouble for over 20 years. And he's shown
20 a consistent work history.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion. Do
22 we have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a motion, and
25 we have a second. Do we have discussion on the motion?

1 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
2 signify by saying "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nay.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have -- the motion
7 passes by a vote of three to one. Mr. Dixon, you will
8 be receiving your registration, your card. Good luck.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

10 MR. DIXON: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Number 58, Neicee
12 ("Nee-see") Browne.

13 MS. BROWNE: Good afternoon.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Good afternoon.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Good afternoon. Did I
16 pronounce that correctly?

17 MS. BROWNE: Yes, you did.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

19 Well, Investigator Maxwell, it looks like you
20 get the clean-up matter. You're up again.

21 MR. MAXWELL: Yeah, bringing in the rear, sir.

22 In 2007, out of California, the applicant was
23 convicted for possession of marijuana for sale at a
24 felony level. Disposition shows three years probation,
25 60 days in jail less three days for time served.

1 Probation started in November of 2008 and ended in
2 November of 2011. This was not disclosed.

3 In 2008, out of California, felony burglary,
4 three years probation, 120 days jail less 47 days for
5 time served. Probation started January of 2009 and
6 ended January of 2012. This also was not disclosed.

7 The applicant was initially made provisional.
8 The arrests were found on the fingerprint report and
9 were confirmed by searching San Bernardino court
10 documents.

11 There was also a 2004 DUI, which was dismissed.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Ms. Browne,
13 would you explain the arrests and why you did not
14 disclose.

15 MS. BROWNE: Actually, I didn't disclose it,
16 because I had ended up getting the information from
17 somebody else instead of me asking the people that I was
18 dealing with. And I asked should I put it on there, and
19 they said, if it wasn't here, then I didn't have to put
20 it. So I didn't put it, but I did think about putting
21 it, but I didn't ask the right people in order for me to
22 give that information.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'm sorry. I forgot to
24 ask you to identify yourself, also, please.

25 MS. BROWNE: Neicee Browne.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. I didn't get all
2 of that. And so I'm going to ask you to repeat. You
3 said you did disclose?

4 MS. BROWNE: No, I said I did not disclose. I
5 had ended up asking someone should I disclose that, and
6 it was in California, and they told me no. Instead of
7 me going to the source and asking the source, I didn't.
8 So I didn't disclose the information.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

10 MS. BROWNE: And I truly apologize for that.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Questions from
12 the Board? Board Member Nixon?

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Since these arrests and
14 convictions, what have you been doing, what work have
15 you been doing?

16 MS. BROWNE: When I was in California, it was
17 kind of hard for me for a minute due to the background.
18 So I ended up coming out here in 2012. But it was
19 probably like a good month, I ended up starting out at
20 Wendy's. I ended up being -- left Wendy's with two, I
21 mean two weeks notice, and went to Walmart. I was at
22 Walmart for five years, manager, customer service
23 manager. And I kind of changed it up, because it was
24 kind of like high value, and I went to security. Well,
25 I had also been doing RT home care for over three years.

1 So I've been swinging that with the other jobs that I've
2 been having.

3 So I ended up leaving Walmart. And I wanted to
4 go into security. So I went to security and did the
5 security. But while I was doing that, I was also trying
6 to move forward as far as pay rate. So I was trying to
7 get another security job on top of the one that I
8 already had.

9 So when I called to inquire about me not
10 getting my card, I think I spoke with Ms. Shelly and --
11 or Sheila.

12 MS. DONALD: Shelly.

13 MS. BROWNE: Shelly. And she let me know the
14 reason why I didn't get my card is due to being denied
15 because of my background. So she told me that I can
16 also come to a hearing with you guys.

17 But I also went to California, and they sent me
18 a declarization for me to send back, I guess, to write
19 and ask the judge. Because due to my terms and
20 conditions, after my three-year probation, it was
21 supposed to, my felony was supposed to get dropped to a
22 misdemeanor. So when I inquired through the courts,
23 since this happened, they told me, after I finished
24 probation, I was supposed to go to court, and then they
25 were supposed to drop it. But I wasn't aware of that.

1 So now it's still on my record as a felony,
2 which is closed. All the case, the cases are closed.
3 But I am still taking care of the California.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Bobby G?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No questions, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn?

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes. Could you explain to
9 me what the circumstances were behind the arrest and the
10 conviction of the burglary.

11 MS. BROWNE: The arrest and conviction of that
12 was I was dealing with a guy. He was supposed to be my
13 friend. So they have these knock-off shoes, like Nikes
14 and Air Force Ones. He had a lot of them. And I helped
15 him sell those shoes. He said he had his own company.
16 He wrote me out a check that looked like a check, and he
17 wrote it out to me. When I went to the bank to cash it,
18 it was something going with the number on the top of it.
19 So they kept giving me a hard time. And when I left,
20 they ended up raiding my apartment for, I guess,
21 plastic, ink and all of that stuff, like if I was
22 manufacturing the checks. But I got the checks from
23 someone that I was doing business with, and they wrote
24 me out the check.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

1 MS. BROWNE: M-hm (affirmative).

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Nothing further.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. No additional
4 questions from the Board. I would accept a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
6 motion we deny the appeal. The reason being, failure to
7 disclose on both the arrests.

8 You've sat through, to the applicant, you've
9 sat through here most of the day. And you need to
10 disclose. And, you know, I'm sorry that you went to
11 somebody that gave you bad information. You could have
12 easily asked any of the staffers here.

13 MS. BROWNE: All right. And that's what I
14 thought about afterwards.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. But, you know, you
16 can come before us a year from now, and we'll see what
17 you've done in the last year, and then we won't have the
18 issue if you disclose it.

19 MS. BROWNE: Okay. And do I just -- do I wait?

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We haven't voted, so.

21 MS. BROWNE: Okay.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: They don't always agree
23 with me, especially Mr. D.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So we have a motion to
25 uphold the denial. Do we have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We have a second. So
3 we have a motion and a second to uphold the denial. Any
4 discussion on the motion?

5 Seeing none, all in favor of the motion,
6 signify by saying "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

9 The motion is unanimous. The registration has
10 been -- the denial of the registration has been upheld.
11 Ms. Browne, if you -- in a year, you are eligible to
12 come back and reapply.

13 MS. BROWNE: Thank you guys so much.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And if you choose to
15 reapply, please, please disclose.

16 MS. BROWNE: Disclose. I will.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

18 MS. BROWNE: Okay. Thank you guys. Have a
19 nice one.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Let's go back up the
21 list. I have a -- I believe, it's a Naej ("Nayjh")
22 Barabin, number 48. Did he ever show up?

23 MR. INGRAM: Naej Barabin?

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well --

25 MR. INGRAM: No.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. If he's not
2 there, we also had one, Leo Alexander, number 43.

3 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Alexander?

4 Not present, either.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I'd accept a motion to
6 uphold the denial on both of those, number 43 and
7 number 48.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make a
9 motion that number 43, Leo Alexander, and number 48,
10 Naej Barabin, that we follow the recommendations of
11 staff and support the denial.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have a
13 motion. De we have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Bobby G. I second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. A motion
16 and a second. Discussion on the motion?

17 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
18 "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

21 All right. The motion passes unanimously to
22 uphold the denial.

23 It seemed like we had someone else that didn't
24 show. That was, I believe, number 36, Global K9
25 Protection Group. Is that correct?

1 MR. INGRAM: Correct. Mr. Hooker?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yes.

3 MR. INGRAM: He's not, is not present.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion that we
5 move this to the next meeting.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion
7 to move this to the next regularly scheduled meeting.
8 Do we have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I have a motion and a
11 second. Discussion on the motion?

12 All in favor, signify by saying "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"?

15 Passes unanimously.

16 Is there anything else on the -- those items
17 that I -- was it number 10?

18 MR. INGRAM: Yes, number 10.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh, it's number 10,
20 yes. That was Rancho Security Services, LLC. Are they
21 in the room?

22 MR. INGRAM: Zlata Zujic and Nenad Stojanovic?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I believe, it was Board
24 Member Bobby G, that you had some questions as far as
25 one of the applicants. Is that correct?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That is correct, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. What's the
3 pleasure of the Board?

4 MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Chairman, if I may,
5 Investigator Maxwell.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please.

7 MR. MAXWELL: The question from Mr. Gronauer
8 was about the DUI that Mr. --

9 MR. INGRAM: Stojanovic.

10 MR. MAXWELL: And DUI pending that the
11 gentleman had. This was disclosed on the application.
12 But it wasn't put into the background report, because
13 the DUI was a misdemeanor and pending due to the
14 applicant being involved in a diversion program at the
15 present time.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Didn't you have a question
17 about the numbers?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I had the wrong one.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. Good.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So what's the pleasure
21 of the Board?

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, I'm trying to
23 figure out what all the options are here. Can we move
24 it to the next meeting?

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, we can.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'd like to --
2 this is Gronauer, or Bobby G, or Bobby C. I'd like to
3 move number 10, item number 10. Rancho Security
4 Services, LLC, license number 875 is seeking member
5 status approval for Zlata Zujic and Nenad Stojanovic.
6 This is subject to all statutory. And what I want to do
7 is I'd like to place this on the next agenda for the
8 next regular meeting.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So we have a
11 motion and a second to place this on the next regular
12 agenda. Discussion on the motion?

13 I'm going to just, I'm going to oppose the
14 motion. It was disclosed. It has not typically been,
15 or that we reject someone because of a pending
16 misdemeanor DUI, I mean. And so I'm uncomfortable
17 voting to move this to the next agenda item. In normal
18 circumstances, it would have just been a block vote.
19 And, I think, a pending DUI where he's in a diversion
20 program is not sufficient to delay the licensing.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If you don't mind,
22 Mr. Chairman, I would qualify it again. I think, when I
23 went through all the records there, it's for a second
24 person, also, in there, that this is where the notaries
25 were all the same, on the same dates in different

1 states, it's for the same dates. I'd have to go through
2 that again. But that's why I had some kind of a worry
3 about it.

4 I'm just trying to get out of my other things
5 here.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I understand your
7 concern. I just --

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, I just don't see
9 how that many people can have the notaries all signed
10 the same date, same time, the same notary, and they all
11 live in one -- different places, and they're all in the
12 same place getting notarized the same date. It just, it
13 bothers me, that's all.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I understand. We have
15 a motion on the floor. Is there any additional
16 discussion on the motion?

17 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
18 "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed, "nay"? Nay.
21 The motion passes three to one. It will be
22 moved to the next regularly scheduled meeting.

23 All right. So moving on down the agenda, I
24 think we have a couple more items to deal. Number 59,
25 review discussion and decisions on Assembly Bill 184.

1 Kevin, I think you're up.

2 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

3 A.B. 184 is a bill sponsored by Assemblywoman
4 Brittney Miller. And it was originally heard on the 6th
5 of March. It is a bill proposing mandatory training for
6 armed security officers, for 40 hours of mandatory
7 training. Additionally, for psychological exam and
8 alcohol and drug testing, prior, completion prior to the
9 Board issuing an armed work card. It also requires
10 eight hours of comprehensive training for unarmed
11 security guards. And, additionally, requires
12 certification or training for any other tools that a
13 security officer might carry in the line of duty less
14 than lethal. So that is would be like the asp, batons,
15 the chemical agent, electronic devices, handcuffs,
16 batons. So they're requiring additional training for
17 that.

18 The last part of the bill is requiring that
19 any, I'd say, increased penalty for any individual that
20 assaults a security guard while on duty.

21 And it was originally heard. There are three
22 fiscal notes, one of them being ours, attached to the
23 bill. And because of that, it will be referred to the
24 Ways and Means Committee. It has not been scheduled for
25 a meeting there yet.

1 I have been in contact with Assemblywoman
2 Miller. And I am also in conversations with two of the
3 individuals that initiated the bill with Assemblyman,
4 Assemblywoman Miller. And they're going to be meeting
5 with me later this week to discuss some possible
6 amendments to the bill to where the Board could possibly
7 support. I originally testified in opposition, because
8 I didn't feel that the Board could support that bill in
9 its entirety.

10 I did also provide an additional handout and
11 cites A.B. 184, and that's just a pros and cons that was
12 provided to the Assembly of Commerce and Labor, and
13 then, additionally, a copy of the fiscal note that was
14 provided to the Legislature as well.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

16 MR. INGRAM: I do believe we have some
17 individuals in the audience wishing to speak on this, as
18 well as any questions you might have for me.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I have one
20 question for --

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sure, go right ahead.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Kevin, can you tell us
23 what the current laws or any that's related to training,
24 alcohol testing, fingerprinting, for both armed and
25 unarmed, as the law states now?

1 MR. INGRAM: There's no requirement for a
2 psychological exam. There's no requirement for alcohol
3 and drug testing. Some licensees choose to count, as
4 part of their onboarding, psychological exams done and
5 alcohol and drug testing. That's not a requirement
6 under our statute.

7 As far as the training for unarmed security
8 guards, there is no required training for them.
9 However, there is required training for anyone that
10 wants to work armed. And that's an eight-hour
11 classroom, five hours on the range, prior to being able
12 to get a work card.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And none of this
14 would cover in-house security, this is strictly
15 contract?

16 MR. INGRAM: That was -- yeah, there was
17 testimony asking. The way the law is written, even
18 though it falls under NRS 648, there was questions, is
19 this going to be pertain to in-house security? Is it
20 going to pertain to casino security? And based on the
21 fact that it falls under 648, that is correct, it would
22 only be for individuals licensed and registered under
23 our statute.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Kevin, I have a couple

1 questions, if you don't mind. First, I have to find
2 them.

3 So if someone wants -- I just want to clarify.
4 If someone wants to apply for a registration, this is
5 what that would apply to, correct, for them to apply for
6 a registration card, security card?

7 MR. INGRAM: That's correct. It would be the
8 same process. They'd be applying for the registration
9 card. However, prior to us issuing, unarmed would be
10 required to attend an eight-hour training class and
11 provide successful completion to us. And then armed
12 would be required to attend that 40-hour firearms
13 training, and then additional training for any
14 additional tools they were to carry on their belt, prior
15 to the Board issuing an armed status.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Would the Board be able
17 to issue a -- the way I understand it, they can't go to
18 work for a security company without having a card. And
19 so --

20 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: -- without the
22 training, would the Board still be able to issue a
23 provisional card?

24 MR. INGRAM: The way that the law is written,
25 no.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So, in essence, they
2 would be required to get that, that that training before
3 they could apply for a card. And they wouldn't be able
4 to go to work for a security company that would provide
5 them that training, because they don't have a card.
6 It's kind of a -- you know, it's kind of a loop
7 situation, you know. It's like a no-win situation.

8 Unless they -- which a couple of the people who
9 we had testify today, they testified that they had, in
10 fact, taken that training on their own. But that's on
11 their own dime and their own expense. They would not be
12 able to do it.

13 MR. INGRAM: Right. That was part of the
14 testimony I provided was -- and if you look at the pros
15 and cons testimony, you know, it could happen two ways.
16 Either a licensee can bear the cost of sending a person
17 to training.

18 However, again, our statutes say you have to
19 have at least a provisional work card to start training.
20 So if that's the case, we would have to change all of
21 those regulations, which is part of the process, stating
22 that they can start attending training prior to a
23 provisional registration.

24 The other testimony I provided was, with our
25 recent review at the Sunset Committee last year, the

1 two, the two different times that we testified -- and
2 I'm going to be required to testify before them again at
3 the Legislative Session this year -- they're already
4 concerned about how much money an applicant has to pay
5 to go to work.

6 If the applicant has to burden his costs, the
7 eight-hour training is going run from anywhere as low as
8 \$75 to as high as \$150 for the unarmed. Certifications
9 for each tool that I mentioned, the less than lethal,
10 those certifications can run from anywhere from \$30 to
11 \$150 apiece.

12 And they have different certification times.
13 Some are good for two years. Some are good for three
14 years. So we would have to track all of that as well.

15 And then, additionally, with the firearms,
16 that's 40 hours of firearms training. The 40-hour
17 classes run anywhere from three to 400 to \$500 for a
18 40-hour training class. And, I think, it would be
19 cost-prohibitive.

20 When I testified, I was just trying to bring to
21 the committee's attention that these costs would be
22 incurred or borne by the applicant or the licensees.
23 And, unfortunately, they -- I shouldn't have testified
24 on behalf of that. I should have just testified based
25 on what our Board requirements or concerns would be,

1 because they're going to leave that open for other
2 people to testify to the burden for their applicants.

3 But we already have a problem getting people on
4 board quickly enough. You know, with the -- the
5 individuals that were testifying in support of this, it
6 was kind of unique. Each one of them run their own
7 training academies, as well as having a license for
8 security. But what came to mind was the companies with
9 large numbers of armed security, or even more
10 importantly the armored transport companies, and the
11 costs that would be incurred and the delay in the hiring
12 process.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right. Any
14 additional questions from the Board of Kevin?

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: The Board of Kevin or the
16 Board and Kevin?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: No, the Board.

18 MR. INGRAM: The Board of Kevin.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any questions of Kevin
20 from the Board?

21 MR. INGRAM: From the Board.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do you have a question?

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Go ahead.

25 No, we do. We have something.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Are we allowed to make a
3 comment on this, or? Yeah, okay.

4 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes. This is an action item.
5 So you could even go to the point of directing Kevin to
6 make some sort of report or something to -- in his
7 meetings with the legislators or anything of the sort.
8 But this is an action. So you can fully discuss.

9 MR. INGRAM: Give me direction of how you want
10 me to testify at the next --

11 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes.

12 MR. INGRAM: -- at the next committee or
13 whatever.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I, you know, as someone
15 in the industry, I find this problematic because of the
16 cost. It is prohibitive to someone who doesn't have a
17 job. Generally, when they're coming for employment,
18 they don't have a job. And so to have the burden of
19 these fees, they can't do it, nine times out of 10.

20 I cover another state in my territory that has
21 these same type of costs. And they, I mean individuals
22 cannot afford this. So we lose a lot of applicants
23 because of the process.

24 While I support training, and I think that's
25 always a good idea, they have to be working in order to

1 do that. And the problem with putting them on the books
2 and then training them and then finding out whether or
3 not they can get a guard card is what we went through
4 this afternoon. If they get denied, we've now, you
5 know, put all these costs and this investment into an
6 employee, and they may not pass the guard card test or
7 the guard card application process.

8 And then, also, the guard card goes, or the
9 work card goes with the individual. So even though you
10 go through this entire process of training and putting
11 them on the books, and they get the guard card, they
12 walk and they go work for Bobby G.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I mean, I guess, I find
15 this very problematic, because you are in a loop, and it
16 ends up becoming very cost-prohibitive not only for the
17 individual trying to get the license, but also for the
18 companies.

19 While, you know, some of us can afford that
20 burden, the smaller companies are just not going to be
21 able to afford to do armed business because of this.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And then the psychological
24 test just adds a larger cost onto that and, I think,
25 time on the Board or on the PILB.

1 MR. INGRAM: I've looked into the psychological
2 examination with -- we did that with the Department of
3 Corrections for a few years. And a lot of law
4 enforcement agencies are actually starting to gear away
5 from the psychological exam. Some still use it.

6 And the reason for that is a psychological exam
7 is a snapshot in time. The moment that that individual
8 is sitting before a psychologist, they can be in a
9 certain frame of mind, and they can pass that
10 psychological exam. And they leave. They find out they
11 passed. And they're driving to work. They finally got
12 their approval. We gave them an armed guard card.
13 They're driving to work, and they work with their best
14 friend, and they both work armed. And on the way to
15 work, the individual who just got approved gets a phone
16 call from his wife and says, "Hey, I'm leaving you. I'm
17 not going to be home when you get home. I'm leaving you
18 for your best friend." And then the applicant goes work
19 to meet his best friend, who he just found out his wife
20 is running off with, and they're both working armed, it
21 puts them in a different mind set.

22 So what's being -- what testimony is being
23 shown on psychological exams is it doesn't necessarily
24 predict future behavior. It analyzes the person at that
25 small snapshot in time.

1 I am trying to gather some of that information
2 if I need it for testimony. But in speaking to a lot of
3 individuals that heard about A.B. 184, they were saying
4 the same thing.

5 Those psychological exams run \$250 to \$300 a
6 person, on top of those other expenses I already
7 mentioned.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It addresses packs.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And, Mr. Chair, I've got a
10 couple comments on this. I mean I don't think anyone is
11 against professionalizing and professionalizing through
12 training any occupation. But I see a couple things
13 here.

14 One is, this looks like a solution in search of
15 a problem. We sit here four times a year. Staff
16 reviews complaints. We're all intelligent people. We
17 monitor our media. You know, I'm unaware of a crisis or
18 problem in the industry that's requiring this.

19 My second concern is I -- and this goes back to
20 my work days. I don't know where people come up with
21 that 40 hours fixes anything. I'd be curious what the
22 subject matter is and who made the determination on the
23 hours. So.

24 And then, on top of that, you know, if you
25 look, even within the industry, there is different

1 degrees of security being provided. And those companies
2 that are providing security in more complicated or
3 sensitive areas, making sure that their people are
4 trained before they put them out there. And they don't
5 want to lose those contracts, so.

6 I look forward to tracking this and watching
7 this and seeing the discussion. But those are my
8 comments.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

10 Board Member Bobby G, do you have comments?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, I totally agree
12 with both my colleagues here.

13 And have we -- Kevin, have we reached out, are
14 you -- when you're talking to Assembly people, then, are
15 you asking them why this has come about?

16 MR. INGRAM: It was a bill that was proposed to
17 them by two different license holders of ours. And she
18 took the ball to run with it. And as I said, after
19 testimony at the hearing, both of them have reached out
20 to me and said, "Hey, can we get together and maybe come
21 up with, you know, kind of an amendment or a proposal to
22 move forward?"

23 I will tell you that Florida and Texas both
24 have a tiered level system for, you know, if you're a
25 level A or a level 1, you're an unarmed security guard

1 with into tools on your belt. If you're a level 2 or a
2 level B, you can carry one or more of the less than
3 lethal tools. If you're a level C or 3, now you can
4 worked armed with a handgun. Level 4, now you can have
5 a rifle or shotgun.

6 So there are some states that have these
7 requirements in place. Some of them, some states
8 require 40 hours, some states require 30, some states
9 require 16.

10 Part of the testimony at the hearing was that
11 the Board, if this bill passed, we would initiate what
12 had to be trained and that number of hours. The
13 conversations I'm having with the two license holders I
14 told you of, you know, right now there's a eight-hour
15 training class required to work armed, and then your
16 qualifications and your recerts and everything.

17 Coming from the training background, I agree
18 with Board Member Flynn, 40 hours is one of those
19 numbers that people like to throw out there. But when
20 you're trying to pass 40 hours of training, basically,
21 what people are hearing is, so, for a whole week, I'm
22 going to pay for this person to go to training and pay
23 their salary and pay for the coverage of their post.
24 Right?

25 So, traditionally, you don't go from eight

1 hours to 40, you don't go from zero to 60 or zero to a
2 hundred. You increase it incrementally. A lot of
3 times, in the training environment, we don't even say 32
4 hours. Because 32 hours means four full days, or at
5 least that's the psychology of it. And a lot of times,
6 we would say 30 hours of training. Of that 30 hours, 16
7 of it need to be classroom. The other hours of training
8 would be FTO, you know, for training on the job. So
9 that you can learn the classroom environment and learn
10 what you're supposed to do, and then you've got a
11 demonstration by having the on-the-job training.

12 We would have to look at -- you know, right
13 now, we certify firearms instructors. We'd have to look
14 at are certified firearms instructors willing to teach
15 the less than lethal? If they are, are we going to give
16 them additional requirements that they have to train on
17 the less than lethal? Are we going to have to look at
18 charging those CFIs more than the \$100 certification
19 fee, so that we can track their certifications?
20 Because, again, you've got your instructor level, you've
21 got your end user level of all of these.

22 So it would take quite a bit of work. We could
23 do it. You can see in the fiscal note I talked to our
24 database provider. They can do a build-out to do a lot
25 of the tracking for us at the tune of \$39,000.

1 So when I testified, that would be money we
2 would have to recoup, I'm going to put, add in my
3 estimate another full-time administrative assistant on
4 board to be able to track and make sure that we're
5 tracking these reciprocal certifications. Because it's
6 not going to be everybody certified in January of every
7 year. It's going to be whenever they certified, a year
8 from that point or two years from that point.

9 So we're really going to have a lot of staff
10 insight and overview on that as well, which would be an
11 expense. So you're looking at \$90,000 expense for the
12 Board the first year. Where is that money going to come
13 from? We're going to have to raise the fees which the
14 Sunset Committee is already saying is too high.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Also, to follow up on
16 that, Kevin, when you -- when people pass laws in other
17 states, there's annotations to the law, why, why did
18 this happen? Did we look at that, like in Florida, why
19 did they make this law?

20 MR. INGRAM: As of this time, no. I've reached
21 out to Florida, Texas and one other state. Oh,
22 California.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because every bill has
24 annotations to it that says what's the reason it came,
25 where it came from, why it came. I just, I agree with

1 Commissioner Flynn when he says this is a solution
2 looking for a problem. I don't see it any other way.

3 Okay. No, that's all I have.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Two more comments,
6 Ms. Chair. The first one, are the people --

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Flynn?

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah. There's some people
9 sitting here.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah, that's what I was
11 going to ask. It appears we have public testimony. So
12 do we want to go ahead and have the public testimony,
13 and then we can deliberate and then make some
14 recommendations?

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I just wanted to
16 know if any of the proponents were here, before we went
17 to public comment.

18 No? Not a proponent? All right.

19 And then the question I had was for the
20 Executive Director.

21 The next time this bill comes up in either of
22 the -- any of the committees, could you send us an
23 email.

24 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Because, if anything, even

1 if I'm out of town, it's something that I'd like to
2 watch and listen to the debate.

3 MR. INGRAM: And Board members are welcome to
4 testify as well. Anybody can testify.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm not volunteering for
6 that. I just want to hear it.

7 MR. INGRAM: You're not? I thought I heard you
8 on the record volunteer.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No. Not yet.

10 MR. INGRAM: Okay. I tried.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We do have to be
12 careful. If the Board members decide they want to
13 testify, I would expect legal would talk to us about
14 open meeting law and too many Board members.

15 MS. BORDELOVE: If you have one Board member
16 testify, we're fine.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Let's move on, Mr. Chair,
18 and see if we've got any public comment.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Does anybody here want to
21 speak?

22 MR. ZANE: Yes.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We have one.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: We don't know him, but.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Never seen this guy

1 before. He used to wear a tie.

2 MR. ZANE: I don't have to anymore. Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sir, please identify
4 yourself, and.

5 MR. ZANE: Mark Zane, license number 830.

6 Thank you, sir.

7 We were, I was in a meeting yesterday with the
8 Nevada Society of Professional Investigators, and this
9 topic was raised. I'm not here in any official capacity
10 clothes, so I can't speak for the association. I can
11 relate, though, some of the comments that were made.

12 A board member, or a member of the association
13 asked them to address the bill. And the association
14 tends to take the position that it doesn't have anything
15 to do to us, do for us or against us, and we're not here
16 to defend or espouse a position on behalf of the
17 security industry, because they're big enough, tall
18 enough, strong enough, they should have already been
19 associated. They should be here en mass. They should
20 be taking care of this problem on their own. So unless
21 it effects the private investigators, it's not our
22 problem. However, we do see that that encroachment
23 wouldn't be far away in the same statutory schemes.

24 So it's something that is concerning. It's
25 concerning in the way that the bill is drafted. Because

1 all of the security guards will be under this
2 prohibition. But me, as a P.I., I can go out and shoot
3 anybody I want under eight hours of training. So I'll
4 still be good.

5 So it doesn't make a lot of sense to take
6 something that exists in a licensing scheme and
7 parameter and only apply it to one discipline within
8 that license and scheme, number one.

9 Number two, we don't really need to talk about
10 all the costs associated with what's this going to bring
11 to the table, because that's just so apparent.

12 The other thing is the way that the bill is
13 drafted, at least we're paying homage to our newest tax
14 base, and we don't have to be tested for marijuana in
15 our system, because it's going to be specifically
16 exempted. We'll probably run into a problem with that,
17 because most of the drug test's for everything,
18 including marijuana. But it's nice to know that we have
19 some legislators that want to say, "If you're loaded
20 beyond tolerance when you show up, we won't test you for
21 that, still allow you to carry your gun." So it's nice
22 that it's in the statutory scheme. If you didn't read
23 it yet, it says we won't test you for marijuana.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So that's different than
25 current law, because current law in Nevada is employers

1 still can hold employees to this.

2 MR. ZANE: Yeah, but in this particular
3 statute, we won't be testing you for it.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

5 MR. ZANE: So, "If you're loaded during the
6 test, we'll be fine with you."

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

8 MR. ZANE: So, as you can see, and, also, it
9 doesn't take much of an imagination, if you read the way
10 the bill's drafted right now, that it applies to a
11 licensee as well as a registrant.

12 So it's another layer of whether or not you get
13 licensed in this state, if you're going to carry a
14 firearm, to be -- have a private patrol license. And
15 that takes away from the discretionary function of the
16 Board.

17 So I don't know that we want some psychologist
18 giving a \$350 test and mandating that we not give a
19 license to somebody because of what that particular
20 psychologist came up with.

21 So it's fraught with a lot of issues. And
22 there's some credible cosponsors on the bill that I
23 intend to talk to. You know, I don't know about the
24 original sponsors, but there's a couple of cosponsors on
25 there that I'll talk to.

1 But from my perspective as an individual and a
2 licensee within the state, I oppose this in no uncertain
3 terms for any number of reasons, the best of which I've
4 heard described by Mr. Flynn, this is a solution looking
5 for a problem.

6 Thank you.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

8 MR. INGRAM: I would like to affirm, also, in
9 addition to A.B. 184, you might want to take a minute to
10 peruse A.B. 132. A.B. 132 isn't pertinent to any of our
11 laws and regs, but it's basically removing preemployment
12 screenings for employers. So it's almost exactly
13 contrary to what A.B. 184 is saying. I thought that was
14 kind of interesting.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Including psychological
16 testing and drug testing and all of that other stuff, on
17 A.B. 132.

18 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have a question for
20 counsel.

21 MS. BORDELOVE: M-hm (affirmative).

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have a question for
23 counsel. I don't believe it's a problem, but I'm going
24 to have to ask. Okay. Some of these sponsors and
25 cosponsors are people I know personally, known them for

1 years. I can go up there as Bobby G and don't have to
2 be a commissioner of the Board?

3 MS. BORDELOVE: You can go up. But to the
4 extent --

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You got to be careful
6 what.

7 MS. BORDELOVE: If you're going out there and
8 giving testimony or something --

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.

10 MS. BORDELOVE: -- as an individual, that's
11 different, as long as you're not representing the Board.
12 However, for open meeting law purposes, my worry is when
13 you are talking -- not to legislators, because that's
14 fine, especially if you're not talking to them as a
15 representative of the Board -- you're talking with other
16 Board members, that is where an open meeting law problem
17 can arise.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: How about if I go to
19 the office and sit down and talk to them?

20 MS. BORDELOVE: That you can do. And you can
21 even do it as a representative of the Board, but you
22 can't, don't have the power to take any action --

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right.

24 MS. BORDELOVE: -- as a single member. You
25 don't have the power to do anything as a single member

1 in terms of committing or anything.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It doesn't matter,
3 yeah, I know.

4 MS. BORDELOVE: But there's nothing that
5 prevents you from speaking with legislators, or.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I just want to
7 make sure I don't overstep a ways.

8 MS. BORDELOVE: Quarantining, I guess, public
9 testimony, I would recommend that that probably be
10 authorized through the Board, if you're speaking as a
11 representative of the Board.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm not speaking to --
13 no.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any other public
15 testimony or public comment in the south?

16 MR. INGRAM: No, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have one
18 up north.

19 Please identify yourself.

20 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon. My name is Rick
21 Brown. I'm a license holder, but I'm not affected by
22 this. I'm a private -- or a polygraph examiner. But I
23 just had some questions, based on reading this, that
24 maybe Director Ingram might want to consider.

25 Unless it's covered in the section where it

1 says "continuing education deemed by the Board," I
2 didn't see anything in here where it would say how often
3 these folks would have to recertify.

4 You know, when we were law enforcement
5 officers -- I'm retired from the State of Nevada -- we
6 had to certify every year. My son's a law enforcement
7 officer in California. He's currently going through his
8 two-year qualification to redo all of these
9 certifications.

10 Would these people have to pay for this
11 training annually and do this again, where they're
12 license holders, or they're qualifying agents, have to
13 pay for them to go through this training every year?

14 And, also, like Mr. Flynn said, you know, the
15 40 hours, here in Nevada, we go through something --
16 what is it, 26 hours? I mean granted we go through a
17 nine-month academy or more when we first start. And
18 then, every year, we have to do another 26 hours of
19 annual training to recertify and everything. Where did
20 the 40 hours come from? And are we going to require
21 these people to go through this 40 hours every single
22 year and put this burden on the companies, that they now
23 have to cover all of their people at various times of
24 the year for 40 hours every year?

25 Something to think about.

1 MR. INGRAM: Right. That's a really good
2 point. And that was one of the questions I posed was
3 on the continuation education, it says that we're going
4 to deem what is correct for that, I mean and we're going
5 to say this is the continuing education they need to do.

6 But, to your point, I'm assuming, when you're
7 saying the recertifications, you're talking about those
8 less than lethal tools and that kind of thing?

9 MR. BROWN: Exactly. Less than lethal tools.
10 And in law enforcement, as any and all of your Board
11 members and investigators can say, we had to recertify
12 on those and show proficiency annually. Same thing with
13 our firearms. At a minimum of quarterly, we had to be
14 to show proficiency with our firearms.

15 Are going to be able to -- are we going to say
16 those of our security officers, they only have to do
17 this once, and they're good for their career, however
18 long they're going to be security officers? Or are we
19 going to determine -- or are you going to determine, as
20 a board, that once they show proficiency in this 40-hour
21 training, they're good for as long as they're going to
22 be a security officer?

23 It didn't address that in the law. I don't
24 know if it's covered in that. As the continuing
25 education as the Board determines, I don't know if

1 that'll be covered by that, if this passes, or if there
2 is going to be some type of stipulation to that. And
3 now that becomes a further burden on the Board to have
4 to check that every year to make sure that these people
5 are continuing with that. And it becomes a further
6 burden on either the individual or the company to have
7 to keep up those payments to make sure that that's going
8 on.

9 It becomes a big boon for those two companies
10 that run those academies and say, "Hey, send them to me,
11 we'll keep them trained." But that, that becomes a
12 financial burden on those people or those companies that
13 have to send them through that every year.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

15 MR. BROWN: Something to be considered when you
16 think about that.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you.

18 MR. BROWN: Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Then, it's up to
20 the Board to give Kevin direction as far as his
21 testimony or his support or his objections, opposition,
22 et cetera, et cetera.

23 Who wants to go first?

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I think, in
25 terms of the pushback on the training, that needs to

1 come from the industry. I'd recommend we remain neutral
2 on that.

3 But, obviously, you know, in terms of what the
4 course content's going to be, why is it 40 hours, what
5 happens on the recert, to describe the problems of what
6 happens, you know, how can somebody go about getting a
7 provisional.

8 You know, Jim, Jim, you know as well as I do,
9 it's sausage-making. And this is very early in the
10 sausage.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So. But. And the cost to
13 the P.I. Board. And I know that there's a movement in
14 Carson City to cut the costs down, not only for
15 licensing, but also additional barriers or bars to jump
16 to get the license. And in this case, we're going
17 against the conventional wisdom at least of what was
18 going on up there a month ago.

19 So I don't know how successful this is going to
20 be. But I find it very interesting that today we have
21 nobody from the actual security industry to speak to us
22 on this matter or let us know what their strategy is.

23 So I'd be cautious that we need to remain
24 neutral as this goes forward, except for where it
25 effects the Private Investigators Licensing Board.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Well, Kevin's already
2 put together the fiscal note. Typically, a fiscal note
3 puts some kind of brakes on some legislation.

4 So at this point, it hasn't passed out of
5 committee. And even if it does pass out of committee,
6 it'll have to go to the ways and means subsequent. And
7 so there's going to be several bites at this apple. So
8 we'll -- as it starts going along, we'll start seeing
9 what it really will be doing or what intent.

10 I mean the key is, Kevin, I'm sure, is when you
11 sit down with them, find out where they're coming from
12 as far as why they -- and, you know, I think,
13 everybody's brought up some good, good points as far as
14 questions on what, why 40 hours, why not 32 hours, why
15 not 16 hours. You know, I mean what's so magical about
16 40?

17 And, but the biggest impediment I see to
18 implementation is the process by which statutes already
19 require, you know, limit us as to who we can give cards
20 to and limit them as far as when they can go to work.
21 If you can't go to work before you get a card, then you
22 can't -- the company can't implement the training.

23 And so this is a quagmire, catch 22. So, you
24 know, those things, we need to get settled. Because if
25 it gets passed in the current language, then it's going

1 to put the Board in the position that it's going to be
2 unenforceable even by regulation. So.

3 Anyone else have anything more to say?

4 Okay. Does that give you direction, Kevin?

5 Anything else you need?

6 MR. INGRAM: Yeah. And as far as me going
7 ahead and meeting with three two companies that are kind
8 of behind the bill, I'm hearing that the Board doesn't
9 have any issue with we meeting with them and, again,
10 asking them where they're coming from, what's an actual
11 must-have in the bill, versus things that they might not
12 have thought about, expense to the applicants.

13 Obviously, I would not give any kind of direction to
14 them in amending the bill, but, rather, try to gather as
15 much information as I can and tell them our concerns.

16 Is that what I'm hearing?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah, I think so.

18 MR. INGRAM: Okay.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: This is an action item.
20 And so I heard kind of the formation or the starting of
21 the framework of a motion to stand neutral on the bill
22 pending its process. Is that what I heard? I don't
23 know if that was right, or if that was Bobby G.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, I didn't say stay
25 neutral on the bill.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, I said that we need to
2 express not necessarily a pro or a con on this. I
3 think, the strategy would be how this will impact the
4 Private Investigators Licensing Board in terms of the
5 costs, the additional personnel, the monitoring.

6 One of the public comments was, okay, we got
7 this training, what about the recert.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sure.

9 MR. INGRAM: So the three stances that I can
10 take on the bill are either opposition, support, or
11 neutral. Opposition means that I cannot agree to the
12 bill as written 100 percent. Support means I agree to
13 the bill 100 percent as written. And neutral means I
14 don't care whether the bill passes or not. I have
15 absolutely no say in whether it passes or not.

16 So that was, I was trying to testify as
17 neutral. And I was educated on I couldn't do that if I
18 wanted to say anything negative against the bill. So I
19 had to change my testimony to opposition. Just so you
20 know. If I testified neutral, that means we could care
21 less whether it passes or not.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So is there a
23 motion out there for a direction to Kevin on how to
24 stand on the bill?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Well, I -- this is Board

1 Member Nixon. I move that Kevin oppose the bill as it's
2 written right now, until we get the clarifications
3 needed in the language.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So we have a motion.
5 We have a motion to -- we have a motion to provide
6 direction to oppose the bill. Do I have a second for
7 that motion?

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: As the reasons stated,
9 yes, Ray Flynn seconds.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. So we have a
11 motion and a second that we would oppose the bill as
12 written today. Okay. Is that the way I'm understanding
13 the motion?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, sir.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Discussion on
16 the motion?

17 All in favor of the motion, signify by saying
18 "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Those opposed, "nay"?

21 Okay. Then, the bill passes unanimously.

22 Next order of business, Board comment and
23 futures agenda items.

24 Our next meeting is June, after the Legislative
25 Session. So Kevin will be able to report on what

1 happened with the legislation.

2 MR. INGRAM: If I still have a job after that.
3 Well, and what I was going to ask the Board, I mean if I
4 see -- I see this morphing, and we see changes. Would
5 the Board be opposed to us calling a special Board
6 meeting in regards to the bill as it moves through the
7 legislature? I think, it's important enough that, you
8 know, we be able to change our direction in support if
9 it's changed enough that we can, or whatever. Would the
10 Board be opposed to that?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: There's a finite date
12 for BDRs to be, you know, brought forward and all. And
13 this is still a BDR. There's a finite date for this to
14 be heard.

15 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You understand. And, I
17 think, that's what we have to just look at. No, I'm not
18 opposed to anything like that. And we need extra time.
19 We need extra time. But, I think, we have to have some
20 type of voices. If everybody brought their voices.
21 Actually, I hate to say it, but Zane actually has good
22 ideas. No, you're right.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So the Board is open to
24 a special meeting, if need be, for determination on this
25 bill, or whatever.

1 Okay. Does anybody have any Board future
2 agenda items or anything?

3 Kevin, could we get an official report on the
4 reciprocity that we have established, on one of our
5 agendas. Do you know I'm talking about?

6 MR. INGRAM: Well, I think, we have no
7 reciprocity other than polygraph examiner applicant for
8 licensure if they -- I'm sorry. Oh, you're talking
9 about license by endorsement, the new one?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Right. Yes.

11 MR. INGRAM: Yes. Yes, I could put that on the
12 agenda, absolutely.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right. Do
14 we have any final public comment?

15 I'd accept a motion for adjournment.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. Motion to
17 adjourn.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.
