There's 14 181 that are pending, that are being worked right now. 15 There's 27 that were withdrawn. And 37 were denied. 16 The licensing applications through those dates, 17 we had zero applications for canine handler. We had 18 four private investigator applications. Four were 19 20 approved at the last Board meeting. We had nine private 21 patrol applications. Eight were approved. One was denied due to not meeting the minimum requirements. 22 had three process server applications. All three were 23 approved. We had no repossession applications. 24 that the corporate applications, new corporate 2.5

applications, we had 16 applications, and 16 were approved at last Board meeting.

As far as complaints right now, December 1st through February 14th, five complaints were received against our license holders, ranging from a failure to pay employees, civil complaint, process server handling of a situation. And the approximate turnaround for our investigations are one week. You can see that one was referred to the Nevada Labor Board. One was referred to the EEOC. Two of the investigations were closed with no findings. And one was outside of PILB jurisdiction, was referred to that authority.

The next page is the summary for a year. So that would be status, the stats from January of 2018 through December. You can see at the top graph, these figures don't include denied or provisional withdrawn applications, but these are the approved number of work cards by month. You can see our busy month last year was April. We processed 1,188. This year, our busy month is probably going to be anytime between now and April. They moved the Electric Daisy Carnival up a month. So we're going to be inundated with applications during that timeframe.

As far as number of backgrounds for licensure, you can see by each Board meeting. There were 33 new

licenses in March of last year, 80 in June, 55 in 1 September, and 39 new licenses in December. 2 As far as the unlicensed activity citations, we 3 provided a graph there. Right now, to date, starting 4 January 1, we've already issued \$62,500 in citations and 5 fines. And currently we're working on recouping them. 6 7 The majority of the individuals that set up payment plans were paid in full. We do have, I believe, five 8 that were referred to the Controller's Office for 9 collections. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: What was the --11 And that's all I have. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okav. What was the unusual height for in January and February this year, 14 January this year, what was that? 15 MR. INGRAM: We became part of -- we became 16 part of the Night Watch program that is made up of 17 Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, their Special 18 Investigations Unit, their Events Planning Unit, and the 19 20 Gaming Control Board. And we've been cracking down on 21 unlicensed activity on executive protection inside the nightclubs, inside of all the casinos. And we made 22 multiple arrests in one night. 23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Oh. All right. 24 That 2.5 explains it.

1 not germane. 2 So, therefore, we'll have to work on the accounting and the personnel separation during the next 3 legislative session. But in the meantime, we are 4 creating our own databases. We're converting everything 5 over to the Enterprise IT system for the state. They're 6 7 the IT department for all state agencies. And we are going to be changing our email. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And who's with you? 14 15 MR. YONKER: And this is Joe Sordi, one of the owners of Strategic Security Corporation. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. 17 MR. SORDI: Mr. Chairman, may I make a brief 18 opening statement? 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sure, absolutely. 21 MR. SORDI: Okay. Great. Good morning, good morning, security colleagues 22 and distinguished ladies and gentlemen of the Board. 23 name is Joe Sordi. I'm the Vice President of Operations 24 2.5 for Strategic Security. We are proposing Michael

Yonker, who's seated to my left, as qualifying manager so we may expand our operations into the state of Nevada.

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I'd like to share with you a brief background about myself and about our principals and our ideologies of the corporation. I've learned all these, obviously, from my father, who was a Marine, a hard-core Marine and a disciplinarian, and ran, ran his job as he see'd until he passed with his demise in a tragic accident on the He -- he ran it with truth and temperament, whereas he asked his workers that if they did an honest day's work and he would back them a hundred percent. And what he -- and until one day -- I'll share a quick story, that this one worker comes to him and says that, "I'm having a problem." And he goes over and he says, "Did you follow the procedure?" And, of course the worker said, "Yes." And then he goes over and checks the worker's procedure. And wouldn't you know it, the very first thing, he missed. And, therefore, you know, he took some action against him.

These same type of ideologies of integrity and honest and hard-working ability is what I brought into my 20-year with the NYPD, where I treated by colleagues and subordinates with respect, a fair hand and held them accountable to the highest standards. Because the best

is just not good enough. I served in a variety of capacities from patrol officer to narcotics, public mals, weapons of mass destruction, detective and intelligence division, assigned to the U.S. State Department for a brief period of time protecting former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, and the strategic response group responsible for responding to acts of terrorism and active shooters.

Mr. Yonker has shared with me his entire personnel folder from his 17 years in law enforcement, which included a detailed account of the matter that resulted in the separation from his former agency. Upon conducting our own due diligence, Mr. Yonker possesses no criminal history, has no drug -- has passed the drug screening with us, has also passed an MMPI with us. And his references, both professional and personal, have

checked out. He holds countless accommodations for 1 bravery, actions in stopping violent crimes, as well as 2 lifesaving actions that prevented death. 3 After a complete review, we feel that 4 Mr. Yonker possesses this strategic spirit. And we are 5 comfortable at this time with Mr. Yonker as our 6 7 qualifying manager. Since we as a company hold licenses in several of the states, we have our own in-house 8 quality control officer that runs weekly reports to 9 ensure all licensing paperwork is complete and kept 10 current. We find that having this QC officer adds yet 11 another layer to ensure qualifying managers, such as 12 13 Mr. Yonker, are operating within the state's guidelines. 14 Mind you, that at any point in the future, should there be any adverse action taken against 15 Mr. Yonker, either civilly or criminally, we will 16 immediately terminate our agreement with Mr. Yonker, 17 notify the Board, and move to have the qualifying 18 manager replaced within 120 days, the given amount of 19 20 time. 21 Ladies and gentlemen of the Board, I thank you for your time today. On house arrest, it's very stringent. You've got to be at home at a certain time. You've got 14 to -- also, they did alcohol tests on me. I didn't fail 15 that. So Mr. Thornton was convicted of two 1 2 misdemeanors and two felonies. His initial background came back that he is a convicted person and showed the 3 felonies out of Kentucky. So he was never made 4 provisional. He did not disclose any arrests. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Mr. Thornton, why did 6 7 you not disclose any of your arrests? MR. THORNTON: The only reason I didn't 8 disclose any of the arrests, as I explained to -- what's 9 your name? 10 MR. SALADINO: Saladino. 11 MR. THORNTON: -- Mr. Saladino, that was over 12 1.3 30 years ago. Receiving stolen property, I bought a stereo 14 from a friend and found out later it was stolen. 15 Theft by unlawful taking, I rented a motor 16 pulley for a friend of mine's, and he never come back 17 and got it. And they charged me for that. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And what about the lack 19 20 of disclosure on the more recent charges of the domestic 2.1 violence? MR. THORNTON: Domestic violence, one of them 22 was -- if I'm not mistaken, I think, both of them was 23 dismissed, in Pahrump. They was dismissed. 24 figured, since they was dismissed, Mr. --2.5

MR. SALADINO: Saladino. 1 MR. THORNTON: Mr. Saladino told me, if they 2 was dismissed, you know, there shouldn't be no problem. 3 So that's why I didn't say nothing about it. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I quess, this goes to 5 the investigator. According to the investigative 6 7 report, I believe it says that both of these, both of these domestic violences were convictions. 8 MS. DONALD: Originally, on the fingerprints, 9 it did say he was convicted. He did provide me court 10 documents from Pahrump after the fact. And it does show 11 the June 2014, it was dismissed. 12 13 The other one. The other charge, it looks like he did have to do domestic violence counseling. Investigator 18 Saladino, do you have anything that you want to add to 19 20 this? MR. SALADINO: Yes, Mr. Chair. So when the 21 applicant first got denied, it was failure to disclose. 22 And then, when he came into the office and, you know, 23 was wondering what had happened, we did speak in regards 24

- BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And that is the fact that you were convicted.
- 24 MR. HAINES: M-hm (affirmative).
- BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Do we agree with that?

MR. HAINES: Correct, and I accept 1 responsibility by accepting that conviction. 2 3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And then you also understand that the Board also looks at time and 4 distance of from when the act occurred. 5 MR. HAINES: Okay. Sorry about that. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Fine. So I have some questions for you. 8 right. And, Mr. Chair, if you don't mind, I'd like to 9 question the applicant. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Please, go right ahead. 11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. What are you doing 12 13 currently for employment? MR. HAINES: I currently work at Americare 14 15 Health and Nutrition. I do sales over the phone for liquid oxygen, HDH and natural vitamins under Marty 16 Gonzalez. 17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: M-hm (affirmative). 18 MR. HAINES: I'm on a phone dialer. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. 21 MR. HAINES: And I also work for a lawyer for Exit Timeshare right now. 22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: 23 Okay. MR. HAINES: About one day out of the week, 24 2.5 hours plus five percent commission on people that are

signed up to get out of their timeshares. 1 And I do that, too. 2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, I know. 3 MR. HAINES: For the patients themselves, sir. 4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I believe you. And then 5 the only other question I have is why -- and let's see. 6 7 You were working in security prior? MR. HAINES: Yes. 8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Why -- now, 9 these -- why do you want to get back into security? 10 That's my only other question I have. 11 MR. HAINES: I've been hired, pending having 12 1.3 the card, on by GaniVida, security specialist. I've had successful moves. This would be my fifth company. With 14 the gross misdemeanor, I have disclosed it. I'm an 15 acceptable hire. It's a great direction for me to wear 16 a suit and do security. I do have experience, and this 17 would be the fifth company. 18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. 19 20 MR. HAINES: And at 17 an hour, I can keep 21 these jobs on my days off and work alongside and maintain three levels of employment. So that's what I 22 need to do right now. 23 24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. MR. HAINES: And that's just a move forward 2.5

being a tax-paying Republican citizen. But I have, I 1 2 disclosed that I accepted a conviction. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. 3 MR. HAINES: I'm responsible for the 4 conviction. And I accept responsibility for the action 5 of what has been sentenced to me. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I appreciate that. 8 you. Mr. Chair, I have no further questions. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. 10 Member Nixon, do you have any questions? 11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Have you been in trouble 12 1.3 with the law since this? MR. HAINES: No. 14 15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Bobby G? 16 And just for the record, I want to make sure that it's 17 noted for the record that when I refer to Board Member 18 Bobby G, I'm referring to Board Member Gronauer, so that 19 20 it's clear for the official record. 21 So commissioner, or Board member, do you have any questions? 22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes. 23 Mr. Haines, these, these are -- I mean it's a 24 2.5 serious matter. Okay?

MR. HAINES: Yes, it is. 1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Getting a work card is 2 a serious matter, for what we do. Some of the things 3 that are troubling me is that you did things in person 4 and over the phone in a very violent and threatening 5 The police report. Okay. The police report manner. 6 7 says all that stuff here. If they did not give him what he wants, the company, he was going to come to the call 8 center with C-4 and blow up the building. 9 I know what C-4 is. It doesn't take much to 10 blow up a lot of stuff. 11 MR. HAINES: Right. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: A bridge is blown up with that. 14 MR. HAINES: 15 Right. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right. So. And these 16 are very serious. What caused you to do all that? 17 MR. HAINES: Well, first off, I'd have to have 18 a military background to even handle that. That, in 19 20 court, when they came for preliminary, that thought was 2.1 disclosed. With the assault, I asked Metro. They asked me not to press charges when I was attacked. Now, with 22 that, I do accept responsibility for the actions of 23 calling them, because my stuff wasn't faxed to the 24 welfare board for my x-rays for my Medicaid. 2.5

But the severity of C-4, I do not have a 1 military background to even harness that. 2 That is not 3 even possible. It's not possible. You'd have to have a military background to even handle that. And I don't 4 have that. I don't have any characteristics of any 5 illicit or training in that. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Most police would not even write that in the report --8 MR. HAINES: Right, I understand that. 9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: -- if they didn't hear 10 I was a police officer for 30 years. 11 MR. HAINES: Right, right, right. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I wrote a lot of 14 reports and seen a lot of people do a lot of things. 15 However, to say the word C-4 is really a serious matter to me. 16 MR. HAINES: Yeah. 17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I mean all of them are 18 serious matters. But that's really -- and that's a 19 20 police report, that this police officer wrote a report 2.1 and said this is what happened. And not only one time, and it's not like you just said it one day. The next 22 day, you said this, and the next thing, or whatever 23 days, you had several threats at different times. 24 2.5 MR. HAINES: They said four calls in one day is

what it would transpire. The thing with the C-4, there 1 was two people that were like this (demonstrating) on 2 the phone. And they never showed up to the preliminary 3 court. That's where the C-4 --BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's --5 MR. HAINES: No, that's where the -- the 6 7 voicemails, and I read the transcripts, there was two people saying that. And they didn't come to 8 preliminary. But I still had to take conviction, 9 because they were willing to write that. But they 10 didn't show up for preliminary. 11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did you say you would 12 1.3 be back and next time you would be showing up in a ski mask? 14 15 MR. HAINES: I said the Air Force police would be coming in a ski mask. That's what I stated. Because 16 I was assaulted. They said they were affiliated, 17 involved that. That's what I said. 18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did you want to cut his 19 20 head off with a -- what, a hatchet? 21 MR. HAINES: That's not in the voicemail, sir, I assure you that, I rest assured that. I'm a Bible 22 bleeding Baptist. 23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, but these are all 24 2.5 comments in here.

MR. HAINES: Yes. Yes. Yes. 1 2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: They're in here as 3 quotes. MR. HAINES: Yes. 4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm just, I'm just 5 trying to --6 7 MR. HAINES: I assure you that. Yeah. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. 8 MR. HAINES: I work with Liberty Baptist 9 Church, David Teis. He's very close with Metro police. 10 And the chaplain is Matthew Teis, on Rainbo and Lake 11 Mead. They are very close with Metro. And they have 12 1.3 only good things to say. I do have --BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: You need to slow down. 14 15 MR. HAINES: I do apologize, stenographer. I apologize. 16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And right now, at this 17 point, I'm fine. You don't have to explain all that 18 stuff. I'm just trying to read the police report, what 19 20 it says. MR. HAINES: Yeah. 2.1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So can you -- and when 22 I read that, it causes me great concern. 23 24 MR. HAINES: Right. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And I'm being straight 2.5

up with you, looking at right at your face. So I have a 1 2 problem with what was in that police report. 3 And so I'm good right now. Thank you. I appreciate your answering the questions. 4 MR. HAINES: If they'd do their job, the 5 employer was misleading the police. The police 6 7 conducted business properly, with the State of Nevada, with their badges. The employer was the liar. And 8 that's what it came down. Sorry. 9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Mr. Chairman, I'm fine. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Are there 11 any more questions from the Board? 12 13 Seeing none, I'd entertain a motion. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Bobby G, 14 referred to as Gronauer. On number 46, Nathan G. Haines 15 applied for registration and was denied. I'd like to 16 uphold the denial. That's my motion. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion 18 to uphold the denial. Do we have a second? 19 20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. We have a motion 21 and a second. So if you're successful in the sealing of your 8 court, which you said you want to do, I'll look forward 9 to seeing you come back here. 10 That's all I wanted to add into the record, 11 sir. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you. And, for the record, I will agree with you in 14 the sense that this, the recency of this, first off, 15 it's a violent crime, and the recency is -- precludes my 16 consideration to overturn the denial. So I'm going to 17 be supporting the motion. 18 Any additional comment? 19 20 Seeing none, all in favor, signify by saying "aye." 21 (Board members said "aye.") 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Opposed? 23 Passes unanimously. Mr. Haines, your denial 24 has been upheld. In a year, you would be eligible to 2.5

Ms. Christmas applied for a security guard license 12-21

of last year. At the time of her application, she did

indicate that she had been arrested for a felony charge,

at which time she also indicated she would be providing

court documents for the Board.

She did list one arrest. But there were several arrests that she did not. The one arrest she did list was a 2000 grand theft charge.

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And there's some confusion with her case. I reached out to several agencies, Inglewood P.D., Culver City, LAPD, several agencies, in an attempt to find her records, and it was that I was unable to locate any records for her.

She was denied on failure to disclose based on a weapons conviction from 2011. And at point, that's where the confusion comes in. It appears that she was an ex-felon at the time of that arrest. So. There was nothing on record that I could locate.

And even this morning, Ms. Christmas sent me an email indicating she was unable to obtain her court records that she originally said she would bring. And so we have no court dispositions or court records to review.

BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Ms. Christmas,

would you please identify yourself and, also, explain 1 2 the arrests, and help clarify some of it. MS. CHRISTMAS: My name is Jasmine Christmas. 3 In 2009, I was, I was arrested for grand theft. I 4 forged a check from my mother. My mom was an addict, 5 and she used to leave me and my siblings at home at long 6 7 periods of time. So me being the oldest daughter, I had nothing else to do. I didn't have any foods to feed 8 them or anything to give them, let alone clothes for 9 them to go to school. So that's where the forgery comes 10 in at. 11 In 2011, as far as the possession of a firearm 12 13 case, I was at a friend's house. Friends were getting into it. Somebody had a gun on them. At this time, 14 I've never been arrested. I've never been in trouble. 15 I was a good child. I went to school and graduated 16 early. I graduated from college, from Santa Monica 17 College, with all honors. 18 You know, that was, this is my first time ever 19 20 being in a position like this. So, you know, just being 21 around the wrong crowds, and the person who I was with had the gun. So they charged me because I was a felon 22 already. And, well, I just got out of jail actually, 23 and I already had a charge for a grand theft, a felony 24 2.5 charge. So I didn't know that this person had the gun

on them. I'm not saying, hey, you know, you got a gun in your purse? I didn't know that that person did.

So they charged me with the possession of a firearm. I did 292 days, pregnant at that.

2.5

For my grand theft charge, they gave me a county year. I did four months and 20 days, got out on work release, did my work release. They gave me three years probation. I did my probation. They let me go early because of me complying with my probation.

As far as my records, I wasn't even able to obtain my records. I called, like because I've tried to see if they have them in the file. They didn't have them in the file anymore, because the cases are old.

I haven't gotten in any trouble. You know, I had to give my daughter up because I couldn't take care of her for years, for a few years. I missed a good four years out of my own child's life because of the felony, you know.

It's hard trying to find employment and trying to get a job. And people don't want to take a chance on you, even though you know you won't mess up or commit a crime. You know, it's just hard taking a gamble with certain companies that you're trying to get a job with.

Actually, I am, I am currently employed right now with T.J. Maxx. I have a job offer right now with

Coca Cola. I'm waiting on my background, address that, 1 and stuff to come back right now. That job pays 16.50 2 an hour. I've kept sustainable work. I just was 3 working at Fanatic and Bed, Bath and Beyond, their warehouses. I had an interview for Amazon on Monday. 5 So, you know, I have a lot of people taking chances on 6 7 me now. A few years ago, I couldn't say that. I have my daughter now. I just had a little 8 boy. I'm in a position now to actually be able to give 9 my kids stability and financial stability and take care 10 of them. 11 So, you know, I haven't got in trouble since 12 13 those cases, let alone a jaywalking ticket, at all. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Do we have any 14 15 questions from the Board? Board Member Flynn? BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I do for the 16 investigator, Mr. Chair. 17 These five cases that are listed on the form 18 that we have before us, is that all the arrests that 19 20 you're aware of? 21 MR. MAHAN: Yes. Yes, sir. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And then, out of 22 those five, remind me, which of those did she disclose? 23 MR. MAHAN: She disclosed a March 2011 grand 24

theft charge. So the third one, number three. Or I'm

1 correct. So it is not on it. So, apparently, it's not 2 on there. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I think, we -- everyone is 3 on the wrong one. You're on the last person. 4 This is --5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. My apologies. 6 I will take back all those comments. 7 MR. MAHAN: Oh. 8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: On mine, I show, I show 9 10 two. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah, no. Yeah. 11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. I'm on the 12 13 right one now. All right. But she only disclosed one 14 of the two, you're saying? 15 MR. MAHAN: Yes, sir. On the application, it was the 2011 grand theft charge, and that want in March. 16 However, her FBI fingerprints come back with a June 17 Which, according to the fingerprints, she was arrest. 18 released with a writ to promise to appear, which she 19 20 failed to appear on. And her subsequent last arrest was 2.1 in 2015 on a warrant for failing to appear for that charge. 22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. We didn't -- I 23 wish we would have known that. All right. Let's, let's 24 start from scratch, because this is the second time I'm 2.5

confused today. For the three of us up here that are 1 all looking at us like we don't know what's going on, 2 could you please tell us every one of the arrests she's 3 had. 4 Her one denial report that I 5 MR. MAHAN: printed up yesterday has four arrests listed on it. 6 7 There are four arrests on her fingerprint report. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. The charge and 8 the dates? 9 MS. MAHAN: So she has a -- and correct me. 10 There's a typographical on number three. It should be 11 3-12 of 2011. That was ex-felon in possession of a 12 1.3 firearm. Number one was uttering a forged instrument, 14 1-28-2009. And number -- arrest date, number two, was 15 June 21st, 2011. So they were out of sequential order. That was CCW in a vehicle with previous felony 16 conviction. And then number four was failure to appear 17 after written promise on that felony warrant for the CCW 18 19 arrest. 20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And that was in 2015, 2.1 correct, the warrant? MR. MAHAN: Yes, sir. 22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. So she disclosed 23 24 two out of the four?

25

MR. MAHAN: On her application, she disclosed

1 one. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: One out of the four. 2 Okay. All right. 3 Did you understand my questions to the 4 investigator? 5 MS. CHRISTMAS: Yes, I understand your 6 7 questions. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. So I got --8 tell me about the last one, in 2015. 9 MS. CHRISTMAS: Okay. The 2015 one, I don't 10 even remember getting -- I didn't even get arrested in 11 2015. I got arrested in 2014. It was for restitution 12 1.3 for my probation. I got picked up on that. They gave me time served and dismissed all my cases, because I did 14 15 my time on them. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And where were you 16 arrested? 17 MS. CHRISTMAS: I was arrested out here. I did 18 30 days. Well, I was arrested at the Welfare 19 20 Department, because I was reinstating my benefits. 21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And they ran you and then came up with the warrant. Okay. 22 MS. CHRISTMAS: I didn't even know. It was 23 crazy. Because I had just went off to L.A. several 24

months ago, because my mom had just passed around that

time, and I went to go check in and do everything, and I 1 2 didn't have any warrants. So when I came, and that's when I put the motion in for me to get my probation 3 dismissed. And they end up dismissing my probation. 4 And when I got picked up, and I was it 5 explaining to the officer, like, you know, I just took 6 care of almost all of this. I don't even understand how 7 I got a warrant for my arrest. Regardless of the fact, 8 they took me to jail. I did like 28 days here. I went 9 to L.A. I was out there probably 20 days, went to 10 court, case dismissed, they let me go on Sunday. 11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. So my last question 12 13 for you is why did you not disclose the three arrests that we didn't know about? 14 MS. CHRISTMAS: The only -- I've only been 15 arrested for the grand theft, possession of a firearm, 16 and then the restitution one that I got picked up out 17 here. The reason why I didn't disclose the possession 18 of a firearm, because when they say the case was 19 20 dismissed, I thought it was thrown out, I didn't have to 2.1 worry about it anymore. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okav. 22 MS. CHRISTMAS: Now, the grand theft, you know, 23 they didn't say that. She just said, you know, you 24 maxed out your time, you can go home. That's what that 2.5

1 was. So. 2 Like I said, I've never been in trouble before. I'm not a bad person. I don't do bad things at all. 3 I did that, you know, and I take full responsibility for 4 it. You know, I was wrong. Whichever way it goes, I 5 was wrong. It was wasn't my decision to begin with. So 6 7 I was wrong, and I do accept all accountability for all 8 my actions. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you. 9 Appreciate your response. 10 I'm done, Mr. Chair. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. Board 12 1.3 Member Nixon? BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No questions. 14 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Bobby G? BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No questions, sir. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. No additional 17 questions. He was released with just intoxication. 18 He was told that he could reapply in one year. 19 20 The applicant has disclosed his arrests and has not been 21 in trouble since his last appearance before the Board. He's appealing for the denial to be overturned so that 22 he may be granted his work card. The applicant was not 23 made provisional. 24 25 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Mr. Summerise,

what do you have to say? Or first identify yourself, 1 and go ahead and explain. Thank you. 2 MR. SUMMERISE: Okay. My name is Tyger 3 Summerise. And, first of all, I just want to apologize 4 for not disclosing the priors before. The reason I did 5 not disclose it before is because in California I did 6 7 have these sealed. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: 22 Thank you, 23 Investigator. Ms. Quinones, would you please explain the 24 2.5 arrest and the subsequent arrest, also.

Okay. Danielle Quinones. 1 MS. QUINONES: So I, basically, had a boyfriend who was predicate felon. 2 I didn't know what a predicate felon was at that time. 3 So I was hanging around him. And he had drugs, and he told me to hold it. We both got caught. Not knowing at 5 that time about parole and everything, obviously, they 6 7 were watching him and waiting for him to mess up again, because he was a predicate felon. I didn't know that at 8 that time. 9

I had a disorderly conduct, which is supposed to be sealed. I was told by my lawyer it's going to be sealed, so there's no need to mention it. So if I'm not wrong on that part, that would be the only reason why I didn't disclose that was because it was supposed to be sealed.

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And I was, basically, going to my daughter's school. And they had called security because of the fact that my -- they said that my daughter stole a phone. And I have children, and I go to bat for my children. I teach my children not to steal. And my child gave the phone back. And the principal, basically, was like, you know, she's a good kid, but the facts are the facts are the facts. And I'm going to go to bat for my child. The facts are she gave the phone back. So they tried to make her to be a -- you know, a

- thief. And my daughter's been pushed back. She doesn't
 have a father. I'm the only one she has.
- So that's why I got disorderly conduct, because I go to bat for my children.
- I had the problems that I had. I got out.
- 6 Once I got out, I never went to jail. I turned my whole
- 7 life around. I didn't even -- before this conviction in
- 8 2007, I was a dancer. So to feed my children, that's
- 9 | what I did. After that, I learned everything, you know,
- 10 | not to be around these certain type of people,
- 11 everything like that.
- In 12 months, I went and I got an associate's
- 13 degree. I got certified. I was on the dean's list.
- 14 And I also got my GED. All of that I acquired in 12
- 15 | months. I went on to do my bachelor's. And I had to
- 16 stop. I have five classes left. I went on to do home
- 17 | health aid, which I've been doing in New York for four
- 18 to five years.
- My aunt got sick. She's blind. She needs
- 20 help. And she's the only family member left. Told my
- 21 | kid, come on, let's go. Came here to help her. So I
- 22 | perceive that to be her home health aid. Because that's
- 23 | what I've been doing.
- Everywhere that I've been trying to go, they've
- 25 been going against me. I went and I got a State of

New York -- the certificate of disabilities to help me 1 to get jobs. So that's, basically, what I've been 2 using. 3 It's just me and my child out here helping my 4 I need to do security because it pays enough to 5 support my child. 6 7 I wanted to do Lyft. I came out here with the thought, I'm going to do Lyft. Lyft is not supposed to 8 go past seven years, but they went past seven years, and 9 they told me I couldn't work for them because of that. 10 I went to Teamsters 631, passed with flying 11 colors. But what else? Your felony. 12 13 So I'm just trying, I'm trying to do anything out here for my child. And I'm trying also to help. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank vou. 15 Ouestions from the Board? Board Member Nixon? 16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So are you currently 17 working? 18 MS. QUINONES: Yes. I work for Bell Trans 19 20 right now at a call center. I've been working there for 21 three months. I was provisional, so I worked at security. And then I went on to the limousine. And 22 then I just transferred to the call center. So I'm 23 still at the call center. I just bought a car. 24 2.5 my income tax. I bought a car. I paid my rent for a

couple of months, so that I wouldn't have to worry, so 1 that I could try to go back to school and finish. So 2 I'm doing everything I'm supposed to do. 3 And now I do Postmates. I'm trying to work. 4 Everywhere I go, they do see the felony. But I do 5 Postmates. And I do have my job at the call center, 6 7 Bell Trans. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, Investigator Maxwell, 8 the felony was disclosed. The other thing that just 9 recently happened wasn't, but it was just an arrest, or 10 was it a conviction at all? 11 MR. MAXWELL: It was reduced to disorderly 12 13 conduct. And it says that the -- it got a conditional discharge and that she did five days community service. 14 15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And this was back in 2011, or? I'm sorry. 16 MR. MAXWELL: 2017. 17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: '17. 18 MR. MAXWELL: And there's a conditional 19 20 discharge in 2018. 21 MS. 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Kevin, I think you're up. 1 2 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair. A.B. 184 is a bill sponsored by Assemblywoman 3 Brittney Miller. And it was originally heard on the 6th 4 of March. It is a bill proposing mandatory training for 5 armed security officers, for 40 hours of mandatory 6 7 training. Additionally, for psychological exam and alcohol and drug testing, prior, completion prior to the 8 Board issuing an armed work card. It also requires 9 eight hours of comprehensive training for unarmed 10 security quards. And, additionally, requires 11 certification or training for any other tools that a 12 13 security officer might carry in the line of duty less than lethal. So that is would be like the asp, batons, 14 the chemical agent, electronic devices, handcuffs, 15 batons. So they're requiring additional training for 16 that. 17 The last part of the bill is requiring that 18 any, I'd say, increased penalty for any individual that 19 20 assaults a security guard while on duty. And it was originally heard. There are three 21 fiscal notes, one of them being ours, attached to the 22 And because of that, it will be referred to the 23 bill. Ways and Means Committee. It has not been scheduled for 24 2.5 a meeting there yet.

I have been in contact with Assemblywoman 1 2 Miller. And I am also in conversations with two of the 3 individuals that initiated the bill with Assemblyman, Assemblywoman Miller. And they're going to be meeting 4 with me later this week to discuss some possible 5 amendments to the bill to where the Board could possibly 6 7 support. I originally testified in opposition, because I didn't feel that the Board could support that bill in 8 its entirety. 9 I did also provide an additional handout and 10 cites A.B. 184, and that's just a pros and cons that was 11 provided to the Assembly of Commerce and Labor, and 12 13 then, additionally, a copy of the fiscal note that was provided to the Legislature as well. 14 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. MR. INGRAM: I do believe we have some 16 individuals in the audience wishing to speak on this, as 17 well as any questions you might have for me. 18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I have one 19 20 question for --21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sure, go right ahead. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Kevin, can you tell us 22 what the current laws or any that's related to training, 23 alcohol testing, fingerprinting, for both armed and 24 2.5 unarmed, as the law states now?

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MR. INGRAM: There's no requirement for a
 1
   psychological exam. There's no requirement for alcohol
 2
   and drug testing. Some licensees choose to count, as
 3
   part of their onboarding, psychological exams done and
    alcohol and drug testing. That's not a requirement

However, prior to us issuing, unarmed would be 9 required to attend an eight-hour training class and 10 provide successful completion to us. And then armed 11 would be required to attend that 40-hour firearms 12 1.3 training, and then additional training for any additional tools they were to carry on their belt, prior 14 to the Board issuing an armed status. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Would the Board be able 16 to issue a -- the way I understand it, they can't go to 17 work for a security company without having a card. And 18 19 so --20 MR. INGRAM: That's correct. 21 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: -- without the training, would the Board still be able to issue a 22 provisional card? 23 24 MR. INGRAM: The way that the law is written, 2.5 no.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So, in essence, they would be required to get that, that that training before 2 they could apply for a card. And they wouldn't be able 3 to go to work for a security company that would provide 4 them that training, because they don't have a card. 5 It's kind of a -- you know, it's kind of a loop 6 situation, you know. It's like a no-win situation. 7 Unless they -- which a couple of the people who 8 we had testify today, they testified that they had, in 9 fact, taken that training on their own. But that's on 10 their own dime and their own expense. They would not be 11 able to do it. 12 13 MR. INGRAM: Right. That was part of the testimony I provided was -- and if you look at the pros 14 and cons testimony, you know, it could happen two ways. 15 Either a licensee can bear the cost of sending a person 16 to training. 17 However, again, our statutes say you have to 18 have at least a provisional work card to start training. 19 20 So if that's the case, we would have to change all of 21 those regulations, which is part of the process, stating that they can start attending training prior to a 22 provisional registration. 23

eight-hour training is going run from anywhere as low as \$75 to as high as \$150 for the unarmed. Certifications for each tool that I mentioned, the less than lethal, those certifications can run from anywhere from \$30 to \$150 apiece.

And they have different certification times. Some are good for two years. Some are good for three years. So we would have to track all of that as well.

And then, additionally, with the firearms, that's 40 hours of firearms training. The 40-hour classes run anywhere from three to 400 to \$500 for a 40-hour training class. And, I think, it would be cost-prohibitive.

When I testified, I was just trying to bring to the committee's attention that these costs would be incurred or borne by the applicant or the licensees.

And, unfortunately, they -- I shouldn't have testified on behalf of that. I should have just testified based on what our Board requirements or concerns would be,

because they're going to leave that open for other 1 people to testify to the burden for their applicants. 2 But we already have a problem getting people on 3 board quickly enough. You know, with the -- the 4 individuals that were testifying in support of this, it 5 was kind of unique. Each one of them run their own 6 7 training academies, as well as having a license for security. But what came to mind was the companies with 8 large numbers of armed security, or even more 9 importantly the armored transport companies, and the 10 costs that would be incurred and the delay in the hiring 11 12 process. 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. All right. Any additional questions from the Board of Kevin? 14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: The Board of Kevin or the 15 Board and Kevin? 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: No, the Board. 17 MR. INGRAM: The Board of Kevin. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Any questions of Kevin 19 20 from the Board? MR. INGRAM: From the Board. 2.1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do you have a question? 23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Go ahead. 24 2.5 No, we do. We have something.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Are we allowed to make a 2 comment on this, or? Yeah, okay. 3 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes. This is an action item. 4 So you could even go to the point of directing Kevin to 5 make some sort of report or something to -- in his 6 7 meetings with the legislators or anything of the sort. But this is an action. So you can fully discuss. 8 MR. INGRAM: Give me direction of how you want 9 me to testify at the next --10 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes. 11 MR. INGRAM: -- at the next committee or 12 1.3 whatever. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I, you know, as someone 14 in the industry, I find this problematic because of the 15 It is prohibitive to someone who doesn't have a cost. 16 job. Generally, when they're coming for employment, 17 they don't have a job. And so to have the burden of 18 these fees, they can't do it, nine times out of 10. 19 20 I cover another state in my territory that has 21 these same type of costs. And they, I mean individuals cannot afford this. So we lose a lot of applicants 22 because of the process. 23 While I support training, and I think that's 24 2.5 always a good idea, they have to be working in order to

- do that. And the problem with putting them on the books and then training them and then finding out whether or not they can get a guard card is what we went through this afternoon. If they get denied, we've now, you know, put all these costs and this investment into an employee, and they may not pass the guard card test or the guard card application process.
 - And then, also, the guard card goes, or the work card goes with the individual. So even though you go through this entire process of training and putting them on the books, and they get the guard card, they walk and they go work for Bobby G.
 - BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.

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- BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I mean, I guess, I find this very problematic, because you are in a loop, and it ends up becoming very cost-prohibitive not only for the individual trying to get the license, but also for the companies.
- While, you know, some of us can afford that burden, the smaller companies are just not going to be able to afford to do armed business because of this.
- BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay.
- BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And then the psychological test just adds a larger cost onto that and, I think, time on the Board or on the PILB.

MR. INGRAM: I've looked into the psychological 1 examination with -- we did that with the Department of 2 3 Corrections for a few years. And a lot of law enforcement agencies are actually starting to gear away 4 from the psychological exam. Some still use it. 5 And the reason for that is a psychological exam 6 7 is a snapshot in time. The moment that that individual is sitting before a psychologist, they can be in a 8 certain frame of mind, and they can pass that 9 psychological exam. And they leave. They find out they 10 passed. And they're driving to work. They finally got 11 their approval. We gave them an armed guard card. 12 13 They're driving to work, and they work with their best friend, and they both work armed. And on the way to 14 work, the individual who just got approved gets a phone 15 call from his wife and says, "Hey, I'm leaving you. I'm 16 not going to be home when you get home. I'm leaving you 17 for your best friend." And then the applicant goes work 18 to meet his best friend, who he just found out his wife 19 20 is running off with, and they're both working armed, it 2.1 puts them in a different mind set. So what's being -- what testimony is being 22 shown on psychological exams is it doesn't necessarily 23 predict future behavior. It analyzes the person at that 24 2.5 small snapshot in time.

I am trying to gather some of that information 1 2 if I need it for testimony. But in speaking to a lot of individuals that heard about A.B. 184, they were saying 3 the same thing. 4 Those psychological exams run \$250 to \$300 a 5 person, on top of those other expenses I already 6 mentioned. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It addresses packs. 8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And, Mr. Chair, I've got a 9 couple comments on this. I mean I don't think anyone is 10

couple comments on this. I mean I don't think anyone is against professionalizing and professionalizing through training any occupation. But I see a couple things here.

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One is, this looks like a solution in search of a problem. We sit here four times a year. Staff reviews complaints. We're all intelligent people. We monitor our media. You know, I'm unaware of a crisis or problem in the industry that's requiring this.

My second concern is I -- and this goes back to my work days. I don't know where people come up with that 40 hours fixes anything. I'd be curious what the subject matter is and who made the determination on the hours. So.

And then, on top of that, you know, if you look, even within the industry, there is different

degrees of security being provided. And those companies 1 that are providing security in more complicated or 2 sensitive areas, making sure that their people are 3 trained before they but them out there. And they don't 4 want to lose those contracts, so. 5 I look forward to tracking this and watching 6 7 this and seeing the discussion. But those are my comments. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you. 9 Board Member Bobby G, do you have comments? 10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, I totally agree 11 with both my colleagues here. 12 13 And have we -- Kevin, have we reached out, are 14 you -- when you're talking to Assembly people, then, are you asking them why this has come about? 15 MR. INGRAM: It was a bill that was proposed to 16 them by two different license holders of ours. And she 17 took the ball to run with it. And as I said, after 18 testimony at the hearing, both of them have reached out 19 20 to me and said, "Hey, can we get together and maybe come 2.1 up with, you know, kind of an amendment or a proposal to move forward?" 22 I will tell you that Florida and Texas both 23 have a tiered level system for, you know, if you're a 24 level A or a level 1, you're an unarmed security quard 2.5

- with into tools on your belt. If you're a level 2 or a
 level B, you can carry one or more of the less than
 lethal tools. If you're a level C or 3, now you can
 worked armed with a handgun. Level 4, now you can have
 a rifle or shotgun.

 So there are some states that have these
 - So there are some states that have these requirements in place. Some of them, some states require 40 hours, some states require 30, some states require 16.

- Part of the testimony at the hearing was that the Board, if this bill passed, we would initiate what had to be trained and that number of hours. The conversations I'm having with the two license holders I told you of, you know, right now there's a eight-hour training class required to work armed, and then your qualifications and your recerts and everything.
- with Board Member Flynn, 40 hours is one of those numbers that people like to throw out there. But when you're trying to pass 40 hours of training, basically, what people are hearing is, so, for a whole week, I'm going to pay for this person to go to training and pay their salary and pay for the coverage of their post. Right?
 - So, traditionally, you don't go from eight

hours to 40, you don't go from zero to 60 or zero to a 1 hundred. You increase it incrementally. A lot of 2 times, in the training environment, we don't even say 32 3 hours. Because 32 hours means four full days, or at 4 least that's the psychology of it. And a lot of times, 5 we would say 30 hours of training. Of that 30 hours, 16 6 7 of it need to be classroom. The other hours of training would be FTO, you know, for training on the job. 8 that you can learn the classroom environment and learn 9 what you're supposed to do, and then you've got a 10 demonstration by having the on-the-job training. 11 We would have to look at -- you know, right 12 13 now, we certify firearms instructors. We'd have to look at are certified firearms instructors willing to teach 14 the less than lethal? If they are, are we going to give 15 them additional requirements that they have to train on 16 the less than lethal? Are we going to have to look at 17 charging those CFIs more than the \$100 certification 18 fee, so that we can track their certifications? 19 20 Because, again, you've got your instructor level, you've 2.1 got your end user level of all of these. So it would take quite a bit of work. We could 22 do it. You can see in the fiscal note I talked to our 23 database provider. They can do a build-out to do a lot 24 2.5 of the tracking for us at the tune of \$39,000.

So when I testified, that would be money we 1 2 would have to recoup, I'm going to put, add in my estimate another full-time administrative assistant on 3 board to be able to track and make sure that we're 4 tracking these reciprocal certifications. Because it's 5 not going to be everybody certified in January of every 6 7 year. It's going to be whenever they certified, a year from that point or two years from that point. 8 So we're really going to have a lot of staff 9 insight and overview on that as well, which would be an 10 So you're looking at \$90,000 expense for the 11 Board the first year. Where is that money going to come 12 1.3 from? We're going to have to raise the fees which the Sunset Committee is already saying is too high. 14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Also, to follow up on 15 that, Kevin, when you -- when people pass laws in other 16 states, there's annotations to the law, why, why did 17 this happen? Did we look at that, like in Florida, why 18 did they make this law? 19 20 MR. INGRAM: As of this time, no. I've reached 21 out to Florida, Texas and one other state. California. 22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because every bill has 23

annotations to it that says what's the reason it came,

where it came from, why it came. I just, I agree with

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Commissioner Flynn when he says this is a solution 1 looking for a problem. I don't see it any other way. 2 Okay. No, that's all I have. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okav. 4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Two more comments, 5 Ms. Chair. INGRAM: Absolutely. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Because, if anything, even 2.5

if I'm out of town, it's something that I'd like to 1 2 watch and listen to the debate. MR. INGRAM: And Board members are welcome to 3 testify as well. Anybody can testify. 4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm not volunteering for 5 that. I just want to hear it. 6 7 MR. INGRAM: You're not? I thought I heard you on the record volunteer. 8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No. Not yet. 9 MR. INGRAM: Okay. I tried. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: We do have to be 11 careful. If the Board members decide they want to 12 13 testify, I would expect legal would talk to us about 14 open meeting law and too many Board members. MS. BORDELOVE: If you have one Board member 15 testify, we're fine. 16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Let's move on, Mr. Chair, 17 and see if we've got any public comment. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Does anybody here want to 21 speak? MR. ZANE: Yes. 22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We have one. 23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: We don't know him, but. 24 2.5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Never seen this quy

He used to wear a tie. 1 before. 2 MR. ZANE: I don't have to anymore. Thank you. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Sir, please identify 3 vourself, and. 4 Mark Zane, license number 830. 5 MR. ZANE: Thank you, sir. 6 7 We were, I was in a meeting yesterday with the Nevada Society of Professional Investigators, and this 8 topic was raised. I'm not here in any official capacity 9 clothes, so I can't speak for the association. 10 relate, though, some of the comments that were made. 11 A board member, or a member of the association 12 13 asked them to address the bill. And the association 14 tends to take the position that it doesn't have anything to do to us, do for us or against us, and we're not here 15 to defend or espouse a position on behalf of the 16 security industry, because they're big enough, tall 17 enough, strong enough, they should have already been 18 associated. They should be here en mass. They should 19 20 be taking care of this problem on their own. So unless 21 it effects the private investigators, it's not our problem. However, we do see that that encroachment 22 wouldn't be far away in the same statutory schemes. 23 So it's something that is concerning. 24 2.5 concerning in the way that the bill is drafted. Because

all of the security guards will be under this 1 prohibition. But me, as a P.I., I can go out and shoot 2 anybody I want under eight hours of training. So I'll 3 still be good. 4 So it doesn't make a lot of sense to take 5 something that exists in a licensing scheme and 6 7 parameter and only apply it to one discipline within that license and scheme, number one. 8 Number two, we don't really need to talk about 9 all the costs associated with what's this going to bring 10 to the table, because that's just so apparent. 11 The other thing is the way that the bill is 12 13 drafted, at least we're paying homage to our newest tax 14 base, and we don't have to be tested for marijuana in our system, because it's going to be specifically 15 exempted. We'll probably run into a problem with that, 16 because most of the drug test's for everything, 17 including marijuana. But it's nice to know that we have 18 some legislators that want to say, "If you're loaded 19 20 beyond tolerance when you show up, we won't test you for

BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So that's different than current law, because current law in Nevada is employers

that, still allow you to carry your gun." So it's nice

that it's in the statutory scheme. If you didn't read

it yet, it says we won't test you for marijuana.

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still can hold employees to this. 1 2 MR. ZANE: Yeah, but in this particular statute, we won't be testing you for it. 3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okav. 4 MR. ZANE: So, "If you're loaded during the 5 test, we'll be fine with you." 6 7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. MR. ZANE: So, as you can see, and, also, it 8 doesn't take much of an imagination, if you read the way 9 the bill's drafted right now, that it applies to a 10 licensee as well as a registrant. 11 So it's another layer of whether or not you get 12 13 licensed in this state, if you're going to carry a firearm, to be -- have a private patrol license. And 14 15 that takes away from the discretionary function of the Board. 16 So I don't know that we want some psychologist 17 giving a \$350 test and mandating that we not give a 18 license to somebody because of what that particular 19 20 psychologist came up with. 21 So it's fraught with a lot of issues. And there's some credible cosponsors on the bill that I 22 intend to talk to. You know, I don't know about the 23 original sponsors, but there's a couple of cosponsors on 24 there that I'll talk to. 2.5

But from my perspective as an individual and a 1 licensee within the state, I oppose this in no uncertain 2 terms for any number of reasons, the best of which I've 3 heard described by Mr. Flynn, this is a solution looking 4 for a problem. 5 Thank you. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you. MR. INGRAM: I would like to affirm, also, in 8 addition to A.B. 184, you might want to take a minute to 9 peruse A.B. 132. A.B. 132 isn't pertinent to any of our 10 laws and regs, but it's basically removing preemployment 11 screenings for employers. So it's almost exactly 12 1.3 contrary to what A.B. 184 is saying. I thought that was kind of interesting. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Including psychological 15 testing and drug testing and all of that other stuff, on 16 A.B. 132. 17 MR. INGRAM: Correct. 18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have a question for 19 20 counsel. MS. BORDELOVE: M-hm (affirmative). 21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have a question for 22 counsel. I don't believe it's a problem, but I'm going 23 to have to ask. Okay. Some of these sponsors and 24

BORDELOVE: That you can do. And you can 21 even do it as a representative of the Board, but you can't, don't have the power to take any action --22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: 23 Right. MS. BORDELOVE: -- as a single member. 24 2.5 don't have the power to do anything as a single member

in terms of committing or anything. 1 2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It doesn't matter, yeah, I know. 3 MS. BORDELOVE: But there's nothing that 4 prevents you from speaking with legislators, or. 5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I just want to 6 7 make sure I don't overstep a ways. MS. BORDELOVE: Quarantining, I quess, public 8 testimony, I would recommend that that probably be 9 authorized through the Board, if you're speaking as a 10 representative of the Board. 11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm not speaking to --12 1.3 no. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Any other public 14 15 testimony or public comment in the south? MR. INGRAM: No, sir. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: All right. We have one 17 up north. 18 Please identify yourself. 19 20 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon. My name is Rick 21 Brown. I'm a license holder, but I'm not affected by this. I'm a private -- or a polygraph examiner. But I 22 just had some questions, based on reading this, that 23 maybe Director Ingram might want to consider. 24 Unless it's covered in the section where it 2.5

says "continuing education deemed by the Board," I 1 didn't see anything in here where it would say how often 2 these folks would have to recertify. 3 You know, when we were law enforcement 4 officers -- I'm retired from the State of Nevada -- we 5 had to certify every year. My son's a law enforcement 6 7 officer in California. He's currently going through his two-year qualification to redo all of these 8 certifications. 9 Would these people have to pay for this 10 training annually and do this again, where they're 11 license holders, or they're qualifying agents, have to 12 1.3 pay for them to go through this training every year? And, also, like Mr. Flynn said, you know, the 14 40 hours, here in Nevada, we go through something --15 what is it, 26 hours? I mean granted we go through a 16 nine-month academy or more when we first start. 17 then, every year, we have to do another 26 hours of 18 annual training to recertify and everything. Where did 19 20 the 40 hours come from? And are we going to require 21 these people to go through this 40 hours every single year and put this burden on the companies, that they now 22 have to cover all of their people at various times of 23

the year for 40 hours every year?

Something to think about.

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1 MR. INGRAM: Right. That's a really good And that was one of the questions I posed was 2 on the continuation education, it says that we're going 3 to deem what is correct for that, I mean and we're going 4 to say this is the continuing education they need to do. 5 But, to your point, I'm assuming, when you're 6 7 saying the recertifications, you're talking about those less than lethal tools and that kind of thing? 8 Exactly. Less than lethal tools. MR. BROWN: 9 And in law enforcement, as any and all of your Board 10 members and investigators can say, we had to recertify 11 on those and show proficiency annually. Same thing with 12 13 our firearms. At a minimum of quarterly, we had to be to show proficiency with our firearms. 14 15 Are going to be able to -- are we going to say those of our security officers, they only have to do 16 this once, and they're good for their career, however 17 long they're going to be security officers? Or are we 18 going to determine -- or are you going to determine, as 19 20 a board, that once they show proficiency in this 40-hour 21 training, they're good for as long as they're going to be a security officer? 22 It didn't address that in the law. I don't 23 know if it's covered in that. As the continuing 24 education as the Board determines, I don't know if 2.5

that'll be covered by that, if this passes, or if there 1 is going to be some type of stipulation to that. 2 now that becomes a further burden on the Board to have 3 to check that every year to make sure that these people are continuing with that. And it becomes a further 5 burden on either the individual or the company to have 6 7 to keep up those payments to make sure that that's going 8 on. It becomes a big boon for those two companies 9 that run those academies and say, "Hey, send them to me, 10 we'll keep them trained." But that, that becomes a 11 financial burden on those people or those companies that 12 1.3 have to send them through that every year. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you. 15 MR. BROWN: Something to be considered when you think about that. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you. 17 MR. BROWN: Thank you. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Then, it's up to 19 20 the Board to give Kevin direction as far as his 21 testimony or his support or his objections, opposition, et cetera, et cetera. 22 Who wants to go first? 23 24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I think, in 2.5 terms of the pushback on the training, that needs to

- 1 come from the industry. I'd recommend we remain neutral 2 on that.
- But, obviously, you know, in terms of what the course content's going to be, why is it 40 hours, what happens on the recert, to describe the problems of what happens, you know, how can somebody go about getting a provisional.
- You know, Jim, Jim, you know as well as I do,
 it's sausage-making. And this is very early in the
 sausage.
- BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah.

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- BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So. But. And the cost to
 the P.I. Board. And I know that there's a movement in

 Carson City to cut the costs down, not only for

 licensing, but also additional barriers or bars to jump
 to get the license. And in this case, we're going
 against the conventional wisdom at least of what was
 going on up there a month ago.
 - So I don't know how successful this is going to be. But I find it very interesting that today we have nobody from the actual security industry to speak to us on this matter or let us know what their strategy is.
 - So I'd be cautious that we need to remain neutral as this goes forward, except for where it effects the Private Investigators Licensing Board.

BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Well, Kevin's already put together the fiscal note. Typically, a fiscal note puts some kind of brakes on some legislation.

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So at this point, it hasn't passed out of committee. And even if it does pass out of committee, it'll have to go to the ways and means subsequent. And so there's going to be several bites at this apple. So we'll -- as it starts going along, we'll start seeing what it really will be doing or what intent.

I mean the key is, Kevin, I'm sure, is when you sit down with them, find out where they're coming from as far as why they -- and, you know, I think, everybody's brought up some good, good points as far as questions on what, why 40 hours, why not 32 hours, why not 16 hours. You know, I mean what's so magical about 40?

And, but the biggest impediment I see to implementation is the process by which statutes already require, you know, limit us as to who we can give cards to and limit them as far as when they can go to work.

If you can't go to work before you get a card, then you can't -- the company can't implement the training.

And so this is a quagmire, catch 22. So, you know, those things, we need to get settled. Because if it gets passed in the current language, then it's going

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to put the Board in the position that it's going to be
