4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Good  
5 morning. I'll call to order the Private Investigators  
6 Licensing Board of the State of Nevada.

7 Mr. Ingram, would you give us a roll call.

8 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

9 Acting Chair Ray Flynn?

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Here.

11 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Tammy Nixon?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here.

13 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Robert Gronauer?

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Here.

15 MR. INGRAM: We have a quorum.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Reference  
17 public comment. Members of the general public may  
18 comment on matters appearing on the agenda and may bring  
19 matters not appearing on the agenda to the attention of  
20 the Board. The Board may discuss the matters not  
21 appearing on the agenda but may not act on the matters  
22 at this meeting. If the Board desires, the matters may  
23 be placed on a future agenda for action. Public comment  
24 will be limited to five minutes per person at the  
25 discretion of the Chairman but will not be restricted

1 according to the person's viewpoint.

2 In addition to public comment being taken at  
3 the beginning and at the end of the meeting, public  
4 comment may be accepted after each agenda item prior to  
5 the Board taking action. However, prior to the  
6 commencement and conclusion of a contested case or a  
7 quasi-judicial proceeding that may affect the due  
8 process rights of an individual, the Board will not  
9 consider public comment, pursuant to NRS 233B.126.

10 So, first off, is there any public comment  
11 before we start the meeting?

12 Do we have any public comment up north?

13 MS. KLEMME: No, we don't.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

15 Seeing no public comment, Mr. Ingram. Okay.

16 Mr. Ingram, can you give us reports and updates, please.  
17 And, also, introduce your staff.

18 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. We'll start with the  
19 introduction of staff. In the north, to the far left,  
20 we have Mary Klemme. She's our Financial Specialist in  
21 our Carson City office. To her left is Jordan Jones.  
22 He's our investigator for the northern area. And we  
23 have Shannon Taylor, who's our reporter today.

24 In the south, across and to my left is  
25 Supervisory Investigator Vincent Saladino; Zachary

1 Swarthout, Investigator; Shelly Donald, Investigator;  
2 Paul Maxwell, Investigator; and then we have Board  
3 Counsel, Mr. Mike Detmer. My name's Kevin Ingram, and  
4 I'm the Director.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

6 MR. INGRAM: Following that, I did provide the  
7 budget status report to the Board members. Do any of  
8 you have any questions?

9 We are on track right now with our budget, no  
10 problems, to include the transition from the Attorney  
11 General's Office over to the Enterprise IT. So it says  
12 that has gone fairly smoothly. We are ironing out a few  
13 wrinkles, but we are completely off of the Attorney  
14 General's website and servers now. All of our email  
15 addresses have changed from the @ag.nv.gov to  
16 @pilb.nv.gov with the state. The former system is gone.  
17 So we're going to be in operation now. Our email  
18 addresses have changed from first initial, last name  
19 @ag.nv.gov to first initial, last name @pilb.nv.gov.

20 Vinny, do you want to go ahead with the  
21 statistics?

22 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino. So  
23 this last go-round, from September to December, we had a  
24 total of 50 applicants for licensure. We had two  
25 canines, no repos, no polygraph. We had six for process

1 serving, six for private investigations, 16 for private  
2 patrol, and 20 corporate applications for either name  
3 changes or adding corporate officers to it.

4 From September to December, we processed 2,687  
5 work cards. There was a little bit of an increase due  
6 to the Life is Beautiful event, iheart Radio, Day N  
7 Vegas Festivals. We have 1,394 active, 971 provisional,  
8 180 that are still pending, 76 have been withdrawn, and  
9 76 have been denied.

10 So the active ones have received them, they've  
11 been mailed, and the cards are to them.

12 Provisional, we're just waiting for fingerprint  
13 reports. Right now, we're a little bit behind because  
14 of the increase to the actual fingerprint cards that got  
15 sent to us. You know, a lot of out-of-state folks  
16 registered. So that kind of -- the cards, I guess, take  
17 longer to process through the FBI repository. So that's  
18 why we have quite a few pending.

19 The withdrawals, that was either they're  
20 missing information, not following up with the  
21 investigators. So those applications have been  
22 withdrawn.

23 And then the denied ones, they're denied  
24 pursuant to the NRS.

25 On the next page, outcome of complaints, we

1 received a few. Most of them came in under one  
2 particular case that we've had going. It's for a claim  
3 they're not paying their staff properly. That then went  
4 into an unlicensed activity and, also, a multiagency  
5 collaboration to get the fines to that company.

6 And three of them, unlicensed, they came from  
7 Las Vegas Metro, licensees reporting stuff, and work  
8 cards.

9 And then we had a complaint in regards to a  
10 work card holder. A bail bond agent had reached out to  
11 tell us the complaint that was coming. And that was  
12 taken care of internally.

13 We had a couple that we referred to Las Vegas  
14 Metro. And we had two unlicensed PIs, that those cases  
15 were unfounded. And one unlicensed turned into a PPO  
16 going for licensure probably in March.

17 Some violations were for some license holders.  
18 Let's see. Not properly displaying on the roster, even  
19 after we've given time to get everything right. And we  
20 do make ourselves available to help, help folks if you  
21 have any trouble with your bulleting. We issued out  
22 \$1,100 in citations for violations for that. We  
23 received \$525 of that. And \$575 is still outstanding.

24 Working without work cards, we issued 200. We  
25 received a hundred. And we still have a hundred

1 pending.

2 License number not properly displayed, we've  
3 issued out \$500 in violations, and we're still waiting  
4 to collect on that.

5 Working without a firearm requalifications,  
6 that's kind of a bigger one. We have \$500 outstanding  
7 in regards to that.

8 Then the unlicensed activity, we had 13. We  
9 had six of them reported by nightclubs, two reported by  
10 licensees, one through a licensee background meeting.  
11 One came in through a phone complaint, two by Las Vegas  
12 Metro. And one was an on-site where we uncovered a  
13 company that was doing security consulting. Four of  
14 them right now are in payment plans or have made  
15 complete payments. And we have \$35,000 still pending.  
16 Most of them, we're in talks with, hoping to get them  
17 into either, A, get on a payment plan with us or, B, go  
18 before the Board and get licensed here in the future.

19 And that's it.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Vinny, I've got a  
21 couple questions. Remind me. What does PPO stand for?

22 MR. SALADINO: Private patrol officer.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then,  
24 secondly, the security consultant, that issue, what type  
25 of business were they consulting to? We don't need the

1 name of the business. But that's a different issue.

2 I'm just curious.

3 MR. SALADINO: It was a Fortune 500 company.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, okay. Here  
5 locally?

6 MR. SALADINO: Here locally, yes.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

8 MR. SALADINO: At one of the bigger expos.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Gotcha. All  
10 right. Thank you.

11 Any other questions from the Board?

12 As always, thank you.

13 All right. I'll call for review and approve of  
14 the transcripts from September 11th, 2019. For possible  
15 action.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I didn't like some of  
17 the...

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You can amend  
19 them if you don't like them. You didn't like them, or  
20 you didn't have the truth? There's a difference.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I'll -- are you  
22 taking a motion?

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I'm taking  
24 a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I'll make a

1 motion to approve.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a  
3 motion. Is there a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And we have a  
6 second. All those in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any  
9 opposed?

10 Motion carried. The transcript's accepted.

11 Mr. Detmer, can you swear in all the witnesses  
12 for today, please?

13 MR. INGRAM: So anyone that may be testifying  
14 today or answering questions of the Board, please stand  
15 and raise your right hand.

16 MR. DETMER: Do you hereby swear or affirm to  
17 tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the  
18 truth?

19 (All applicants and potential witnesses present  
20 sworn/affirmed.)

21 MR. DETMER: Thank you. And just as a  
22 reminder, if and when you come up and testify, please  
23 state for the record that you are aware that you are  
24 under oath.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We'll



1 proceed. Item next, a request for exemption. Seth  
2 Schrenzel of High Rock Security, Inc., license number  
3 2635, is asking for the Board to grant an exemption as  
4 outlined in the NAC 648.338. Mr. Schrenzel is  
5 requesting that the Board allow them to hire John Craig,  
6 an active out-of-state peace officer, for the annual  
7 Burning Man event to be held in northern Nevada  
8 August 20, 2020 through September 7, 2020.

9 Is Mr. Schrenzel here or up north?

10 MR. SCHRENZEL: I am, and I am aware I'm under  
11 oath.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh. I'm sorry.

13 Okay. Tell us what you're doing and why you  
14 want to do it this way.

15 MR. SCHRENZEL: Sure. So John Craig is a  
16 college friend of mine who went on to become a federal  
17 law enforcement officer, is currently the lead law  
18 enforcement officer at the Shenandoah National Park in  
19 Virginia, working for the National Park Service. He has  
20 a long history with me. I've known him for about 15  
21 years. I officiated his wedding for him.

22 I am the -- we have the contract for private  
23 security for the annual Burning Man event. And I wanted  
24 him to work with us last year, but because of his  
25 federal law enforcement background, here I am

1 petitioning the Board to allow him to work in the state  
2 of Nevada as an out-of-state federal law enforcement  
3 officer. He has no other law enforcement interests in  
4 the state of Nevada.

5 So I'd like the Board to be able to grant him a  
6 work card.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What exactly will  
8 he be doing for your company at the event?

9 MR. SCHRENZEL: He'll be a standard unarmed  
10 security guard performing standard security guard  
11 duties.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And does  
13 his supervisor or the -- and/or the park superintendent  
14 know that he's applying for this, and has permission?

15 MR. SCHRENZEL: They do know. There's a formal  
16 permission process that he's been through with the  
17 Shenandoah National Park, and his supervisors have  
18 granted him permission to work this event.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any  
20 questions from the Board?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Do we have  
22 the documentation on that, that he's been granted?  
23 Because we've requested that prior, with other  
24 applicants.

25 MR. SCHRENZEL: I'd be happy to get that and

1 provide it for you, and maybe get approval contingent  
2 upon receiving that document.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good with that.  
4 Thank you.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anybody else?  
6 Kevin, do you want to say something?

7 MR. INGRAM: Yes. So you mentioned that the  
8 duties he's going to be performing are going to be  
9 standard security officer duties. Traditionally, the  
10 Board only grants an exemption if there is a subject  
11 matter expert as to a certain field that's going to be  
12 utilized in this state. They don't traditionally grant  
13 approval for somebody that's providing standard duties.  
14 Can you elaborate on that a little bit?

15 MR. SCHRENZEL: Certainly. So his primary  
16 responsibility will be on duty, on shift as one of the  
17 few security guards that we have at this very limited  
18 contract. In addition, though, his background as a  
19 federal law enforcement officer is valuable to me and my  
20 team. Because, as I'm sure you're aware, the Burning  
21 Man event deals with the Bureau of Land Management law  
22 enforcement agencies. And having somebody on my team  
23 that I can ask questions of and can provide a federal  
24 law enforcement perspective is a valuable asset to my  
25 team. Now, while that would not be his only and primary

1 responsibility, it is the reason that I've decided to  
2 come ask you today to allow him to work on this contract  
3 with me.

4 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any public  
6 comment?

7 Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm going to make a  
9 motion. I'll make a motion to approve Seth Schrenzel.  
10 It is slightly out of the ordinary, but I understand  
11 your predicament. All right. But with the contingency,  
12 to approve. Seth Schrenzel of High Rock Security,  
13 license number 2635, is asking the Board to grant an  
14 exemption as outlined in NAC 648.338. Mr. Schrenzel is  
15 requesting that the Board allow them to hire John Craig,  
16 an active out-of-state peace officer, for the annual  
17 Burning Man event held in northern Nevada August 30  
18 through September 7, 2020, but on the contingency that  
19 Mr. Schrenzel -- I'm sorry for -- my name is the same  
20 way, so -- provide documentation from Mr. Craig's now  
21 employer that he can work this event.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
23 have a motion. Do I have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All in

1 favor, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

4 The motion carries. Okay. You just need to  
5 get that documentation to the investigator that's on the  
6 case or Director Ingram.

7 MR. SCHRENZEL: Will do. Thank you. I  
8 appreciate your time.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Good  
10 luck to you.

11 All right. Next, I'm going to call for a block  
12 vote. These are just corporate name changes, change in  
13 corporate officers, change in qualifying agents, things  
14 of that nature. All of them have already been through  
15 background investigations. And the vote I'll be calling  
16 for is items numbers 7, 8, 9, 10, 12, 15, 16, 17, 18,  
17 19, 21, 22, 23 and 24.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, I asked  
19 you to pull item 11. But you could put it back on. And  
20 that's a block vote, too.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We  
22 will add number 11.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion to  
24 approve the block vote as stated.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We have a motion  
2 and a second for approval. Okay. Any public comment on  
3 the block vote, either here or up north?

4           All right. All those in favor, say "aye."

5           (Board members said "aye.")

6           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

7           The motion carries.

8           All right. If you were amongst those numbers,  
9 you are free to go. Congratulations on the changes of  
10 your ownership or status of your companies. And if you  
11 want to sit here and listen to us the rest of the day,  
12 you're more than welcome to, also.

13           UNIDENTIFIED MAN IN LAS VEGAS: And you  
14 included number 11?

15           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We ended up  
16 adding number 11. But at first, we didn't. But number  
17 11 is good to go. Congratulations.

18           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You can stay if you  
19 want.

20           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
21 Number 13, Rancho Security Services, LLC, license number  
22 875, is seeking member status approval for Zlata  
23 Zujic -- and I apologize if I have trouble with these  
24 names, and you can correct me when you come up -- and  
25 Nenad Stojanovic. This is subject to all statutory and

1 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

2 So are either of those people in the room? And  
3 if so, please come to the front.

4 Good morning.

5 MS. ZUJIC: Good morning.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. If  
7 you could identify who you are. And are you with her,  
8 sir?

9 MS. ZUJIC: Yes.

10 MR. STOJANOVIC: Yes.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Who  
12 you guys are and what we're doing here today.

13 MS. ZUJIC: Yes. My name is Zlata Zujic. And  
14 we bought Rancho Security a year ago. And we just want  
15 to expand it so we can do the, you know, security  
16 services.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What did you do  
18 prior? Hold on one second.

19 (There was a moment off the record.)

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Just respond to  
21 the question. What were you guys doing before this  
22 business?

23 MS. ZUJIC: Oh, I have a lot of experience in  
24 home care. And I also have a lot of experience in  
25 businesses that are open. You know, we buy businesses

1 and sell and develop them. I also have a law degree.  
2 So I have a lot of legal experience. I don't practice.  
3 But I do. So that's my background.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sir?

5 MR. STOJANOVIC: Yes.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You are?

7 MR. STOJANOVIC: Oh, my name is Nenad  
8 Stojanovic.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

10 MR. STOJANOVIC: I'm from Europe, but I moved  
11 here around six years ago, so.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What have you  
13 been doing for employment for the last six years?

14 (There was a moment off the record.)

15 MR. STOJANOVIC: So my name is Nenad  
16 Stojanovic. So I'm coming from Europe. I was doing,  
17 for the last six years, I was in trucking business, so.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Trucking?

19 MR. STOJANOVIC: Yes.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
21 Tell us about your DUI that's pending.

22 MR. STOJANOVIC: Okay. I got, yeah. That was  
23 in California. It was last year.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's why I'm  
25 concerned, because it was last year. Tell me about it.



1 What happened?

2 MR. STOJANOVIC: Well, I hurt my leg and  
3 playing soccer here in Las Vegas. And I went there for  
4 therapy. And my friend was nuts to go out for a drink.  
5 You know, and I was there with my cousin. We just  
6 decided, because of him, he insists to go out, we went  
7 to Hollywood. That was second time I was there. And I  
8 decided to show him one of the -- the bar. Which the  
9 name is Danny Trejo. That's one of the Hollywood  
10 actors. And they were closing. And they were closing  
11 probably around 11:30. And when we went inside, they  
12 said, "We are about to close." And we already paid for  
13 parking out there, like \$15 or \$20. And my cousin said,  
14 "Let's go to the bar close there."

15 And usually I do not drink. And he doesn't  
16 drink. But we just decided we can. But later, I found  
17 out it's not regular beer, it's something they call  
18 California beer, or something. I'm not really sure.  
19 They sell it for business. We didn't know for the time.

20 And then the girl and one of my friends from  
21 Belgrade, Serbia, I remember, when my cousin didn't do  
22 well, she said she want to go home. I asked him if he  
23 want to go to the hospital. He said, "No, no, I just  
24 want to go home." And at that time, I just get in the  
25 car and start driving. Which I didn't think that this

1 was a good idea. That wasn't one of the best, the  
2 biggest mistakes that I make. So.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have you been to  
4 court on it yet?

5 MR. STOJANOVIC: Yeah, I've been.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what --

7 MS. ZUJIC: He's on probation for six months.

8 MR. STOJANOVIC: For six months.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You're on  
10 probation?

11 MR. STOJANOVIC: Yes.

12 MS. ZUJIC: Yes.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And  
14 do you have a driver's license? You're his mom?

15 MS. ZUJIC: No.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So do you  
17 have a current driver's license?

18 MR. STOJANOVIC: Yes.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
20 questions from the Board?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I have one  
22 question of Mr. Stojanovic.

23 MR. STOJANOVIC: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It says that your  
25 permanent resident card expired November 13, 2019. Has

1 it been unexpired since? Because you're authorized to  
2 work in the United States until this card expires,  
3 granted an extension. Do you have all the documentation  
4 to show that?

5 MR. STOJANOVIC: Yes, I have the second new  
6 card.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Investigator Maxwell?

8 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. Mr. Stojanovic --

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're going to  
10 need to speak up here.

11 MR. MAXWELL: Yes. Mr. Stojanovic provided  
12 documentation.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. I  
14 have no further questions.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
16 questions from the Board?

17 Any public comment?

18 All right. I'll call for a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll  
20 make a motion for approval for Rancho Security Services,  
21 LLC, license number 875, seeking member status approval  
22 for -- excuse me with the names -- Zlata Zujic and Nenad  
23 Stojanovic. This is subject to all statutory and  
24 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion.  
3 I have a second. All in favor, state "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

6 Motion carries. Congratulations.

7 MS. ZUJIC: Thank you.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good luck to you.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No more drinking  
10 California beer.

11 MR. STOJANOVIC: I'll do my best.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 14.

13 Allied Private Investigations & Security Services, Inc.,  
14 license number 2050, is seeking a corporate officer  
15 status approval for Karl Zundel. This is subject to all  
16 statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible  
17 action.

18 Anybody here representing that?

19 MR. TAYLOR: I'm John Taylor.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please come  
21 forward, sir.

22 MR. TAYLOR: John Taylor, qualifying agent for  
23 Allied Consultant Security Services, 2050.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And,  
25 sir, do you remember you're under oath?

1 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, sir.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us  
3 what's going on.

4 MR. TAYLOR: I talked to Mr. Zundel about a  
5 week ago, and he made me aware that this came up on his  
6 background, the DUI. And he asked was it okay if he  
7 didn't attend and that I inform, which I agreed to.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Did he  
9 indicate why he couldn't attend?

10 MR. TAYLOR: No, he didn't.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And he's going to  
12 be your qualifying agent for your company?

13 MR. TAYLOR: No. He's asked, and he's one of  
14 the owners, and he's asked that he be put on as a  
15 corporate officer with the other two owners.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.  
17 Personally, I'm concerned he's not here.

18 MR. TAYLOR: M-hm (affirmative).

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Especially the  
20 fact that there was adverse information. But we'll see  
21 how you do. But don't take offense if we decide to  
22 postpone this until we see him in person.

23 MR. TAYLOR: Understood.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
25 Any questions from the Board?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I just have a  
2 statement. Gronauer. I have statement that if it's not  
3 important for him to be here, it's, you know, I have a  
4 problem with voting on this.

5 MR. TAYLOR: Yeah, I talked to him,  
6 understanding I don't know what he relayed to the  
7 investigator, whoever had that. But from my knowledge,  
8 it was resolved. And, I guess, he didn't -- he lives in  
9 California, so.

10 MR. SWARTHOUT: So I did talk to him about the  
11 more recent DUI. He did provide documentation that he  
12 is on probation for that. He did say it had to do with  
13 family members that were going through medical issues  
14 back in Florida at the time. And he did complete all  
15 the stuff for that probation. He did not have much  
16 information on the first DUI out of California in 2001.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So what year was  
18 the first one?

19 MR. SWARTHOUT: 2001.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And the second  
21 one?

22 MR. SWARTHOUT: 2017.

23 MR. TAYLOR: Can I add something?

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

25 MR. TAYLOR: During that time, he'd lost his

1 father. And he's not a drinker. In fact, I've been out  
2 with him. He doesn't drink. But, I think, during that  
3 time, he had some resent issues. He's a good guy. He's  
4 been qualified before. He's been through background  
5 checks. He was a prior school teacher. And he  
6 contracted with his business in Florida with the CIA.  
7 So he's been through extensive background checks. And  
8 outside of that, I think, that's all squared away.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
10 questions?

11 Any public comment?

12 All right. Call for a motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: One more question. He has  
14 completed all the stuff since his last DUI?

15 MR. SWARTHOUT: Correct.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm going to make a  
17 motion for denial, or if he wishes to postpone it, with  
18 their information. Allied Private Investigation &  
19 Security Services, Incorporated, license number 2050,  
20 seeking corporate officer approval for Karl Zundel.  
21 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
22 requirements.

23 MR. DETMER: You have to state the reason.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I just don't see how we  
25 can. And that's the reason for my motion.

1 MR. TAYLOR: That's important to him. And  
2 that's why he contacted me. But I agree.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I agree. Sir,  
4 it's not your time. You guys are talking. We're going  
5 through a motion right now. Thank you.

6 All right. So just for clarification, the  
7 motion is for -- the motion is for --

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Postponement.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- for  
10 postponement with their consent.

11 All right. So what happens, sir, is if you  
12 don't consent to the postponement, then the only option  
13 we have is either approval or denial. If you consent to  
14 the postponement, we'll put this on the next agenda.

15 MR. TAYLOR: So are you requesting his presence  
16 the next time?

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, we would  
18 want his presence here, based on seeing where this is  
19 going.

20 I don't know. Counsel, did I describe it  
21 adequately?

22 MR. DETMER: Absent, essentially, the  
23 information, that would mean that you would have the  
24 discretion to postpone it.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So we



1 don't need the consent?

2 MR. DETMER: That's my knowledge or  
3 understanding.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's my motion.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I made the motion.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The motion is to  
9 postpone. Do I have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We  
12 have a second. All those in favor, state "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

15 Okay. We will put this on the next agenda.

16 MR. TAYLOR: And just for the record, I do  
17 agree to that, no problem, to what is necessary.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

19 MS. KLEMME: Excuse me. Excuse me. Hello?

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes?

21 MS. KLEMME: Can we take about a 10-minute  
22 break? We're having voice delay issues. And IT can  
23 reset the video. It'll take about 10 minutes, if we  
24 could do that.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, we don't

1 have a choice. So the answer's yes.

2 MS. KLEMME: Okay. Thank you.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We're  
4 on a 10-minute break.

6 (A break was taken, 9:37 to 9:56 a.m.)

7 \* \* \* \* \*

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We're  
9 continuing the Private Investigator Licensing Board  
10 meeting for December 10th.

11 We'll call item number 20. DJ Boss Associates  
12 is applying for a new corporate private investigator  
13 license. If approved, Derk J. Boss, Jr., license number  
14 1476, is requesting that his individual license be kept  
15 in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.  
16 Member to be approved is Derk J. Boss, Jr. This is  
17 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
18 For possible action.

19 I'm assuming you're Mr. Boss?

20 MR. BOSS: Good morning. I am Derk Boss. I am  
21 aware I'm under oath.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good. Yeah.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If I could state that  
24 the people in the audience, when I went out to -- in the  
25 lobby out there said they can't hear. You guys can't

1 hear us. So everybody's having a communication problem.

2 So all of us would have to speak up. Okay?

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So they can hear what's  
5 going on.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And this is our  
7 first time here. Normally, we face out.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And that's why.  
10 And now we're projecting across. So we're all getting  
11 used to the new facility.

12 So, Mr. Boss, tell us why you're here and  
13 what's going on.

14 MR. BOSS: Well, I'm here asking to qualify as  
15 an agent. I'd like to form my company. And first off,  
16 for some tax purposes, this would be a little bit better  
17 for me.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And give us a  
19 little background on the company.

20 MR. BOSS: DJ Boss Associates has been in  
21 operation off and on since about 2007. I do primarily  
22 consulting for casinos. And my background is gaming  
23 surveillance and security. And I normally work with  
24 them and provide them input on security and surveillance  
25 that applies to the casino operations, gaming

1 operations.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then  
3 the issue, the main reason you're before us is to  
4 explain the two different bankruptcies. One was quite  
5 some time ago, and the other one was about four years  
6 ago.

7 MR. BOSS: Actually, I've only been in one  
8 bankruptcy.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, we've got one  
10 that was filed in December of -- I mean February 2011.

11 MR. BOSS: M-hm (affirmative).

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, it was  
13 together.

14 MR. BOSS: Yes.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: My apologies.

16 MR. BOSS: That's okay.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: It was the same  
18 one, sir. My apologies. That's on me.

19 MR. BOSS: No worries. And so about -- I'm  
20 sorry. So I started my business in 2008. And as we all  
21 know, 2008 is when everything went to heck in Las Vegas.  
22 I had just left my job as vice president over at the  
23 local properties and for the prime purpose of starting  
24 this business. And, of course, it was based on training  
25 and consulting with casinos. And they were not

1 interested at that point.

2           So I went through my 401(k), trying to, you  
3 know, keep things up and support my family. You know,  
4 at the end of the year, year and a half of trying, you  
5 know, I'd spent all of my money. I couldn't do it. Our  
6 homes were struggling. So I had to go back to work.  
7 But it wasn't in time. I had to go back to work out of  
8 state to, you know, make it up. And so I, you know,  
9 filed the bankruptcy. And I, you know, filed one where  
10 I had to pay the debt that I had and reduce it, but I  
11 would have had to pay a lot, and they discharged it.

12           And so here I am today, you know. I had a  
13 couple taxes, too, mostly of my own fault. You know, I  
14 had planned to work to keep my company going, keep it  
15 afloat. And I expected that our -- the taxes that were  
16 withheld from my wife's and mine's salaries would cover  
17 the taxes of what I made. Because I wasn't making very  
18 much out of the PI business. And but that, it was good  
19 and not good, good and bad. Because I did start getting  
20 business. And so at the end of the year, I got myself  
21 caught, you know, with not being able to fund the taxes  
22 like I should have done.

23           So I had to learn my lesson and had to -- now I  
24 pay it properly, and I'm on a payment plan and have been  
25 for all this time, and it's up-to-date. And I don't

1 intend to go there again.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

3 Okay. Zach, anything to add?

4 MR. SWARTHOUT: No, sir.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any

6 questions from the Board?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, Mr. Boss. It's

8 Boss?

9 MR. BOSS: That's it. No pun intended.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Our investigation was  
11 done by our investigator. October 10th is the report,  
12 October 10th, 2019. Okay?

13 MR. BOSS: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And it says you're on a  
15 payment plan.

16 MR. BOSS: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I just asked that  
18 question. I don't have to ask you. I'll ask our  
19 investigator. Do we follow up with that, like every  
20 license that -- or we approve something, do we follow up  
21 that he's following all the payment plans?

22 MR. SWARTHOUT: Most of the time, they keep  
23 providing us info to keep it up. I myself haven't had  
24 anybody that had this issue. I assume we would keep it  
25 up and make sure that they're keeping up with everything

1 else.

2 MR. BOSS: I can certainly provide that.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, you know, that's  
4 fine. I'm just, I'm just trying, for my own knowledge  
5 here right now. Well, you provided those documents.  
6 And those documents that you provided in October,  
7 October 10th, were all the things on October 10th?

8 MR. BOSS: Correct.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And then it  
10 goes; how long does this stay for, how long?

11 MR. BOSS: It's, I think, it's like five years  
12 that I have to pay.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Five more years?

14 MR. BOSS: Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

16 MR. BOSS: Hopefully, sooner than that.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.  
18 That's all I have.

19 MR. BOSS: Thank you.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. If no  
21 other questions, any public comment?

22 Seeing none, I'll entertain a motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make it.  
24 Gronauer. I'll make the motion to approved DJ Boss  
25 Associates, applying for a new corporate private

1 investigator license. If approved, Derk J. Boss, Jr.,  
2 license number 1476, is requesting that his individual  
3 license be kept in abeyance so that he may become the  
4 qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Derk J.  
5 Boss, Jr. This is subject to all statutory and  
6 regulatory requirements.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
9 have a motion. I have a second. Any further  
10 discussion?

11 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
12 in favor, state "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

15 Motion carries. Congratulations. Good luck to  
16 you.

17 MR. BOSS: My thanks to the Board. Thank you.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank  
19 you, sir.

20 All right. Number 25. Private Eyes Screening  
21 Group Incorporated is applying for a new corporate  
22 private investigator license. Sandra L. James is  
23 applying for an individual private investigator license.  
24 If approved, she is requesting that her individual  
25 license be placed into abeyance so that she may become



1 the qualifying agent. Corporate officer to be approved  
2 is Sandra L. James. This is subject to all statutory  
3 and regulatory requirements. For the possible action.

4 Good morning, Ms. James.

5 MS. JAMES: Good morning. I'm Sandra James.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you're aware  
7 you're under oath?

8 MS. JAMES: Yes, I'm aware I'm under oath.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us  
10 why you're here and what you're doing.

11 MS. JAMES: I have owned a Private Eyes Inc. in  
12 California for the last 20 years. And so, a year ago, I  
13 started Private Eyes Screening Group in Nevada to move,  
14 to hire more people in Nevada, to move out my corporate  
15 office out of California. I still have Private Eyes  
16 Inc. in California. But I would like to move to Nevada,  
17 as it's a more business-friendly state, and hire more  
18 people here.

19 And Private Eyes is background screening,  
20 employment, preimposed employment screening.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I also --  
22 and the investigator on this is?

23 MR. SWARTHOUT: Investigator Swarthout.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Wow, you are busy  
25 this morning. If I'm reading this correctly, she's got

1 an outstanding citation for unlicensed activity?

2 MR. SWARTHOUT: It has been dealt with and paid  
3 for.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well,  
5 then, why don't you tell us about the background there  
6 on that.

7 MR. SWARTHOUT: So it was dealing with the  
8 office and advertising certain services in California.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're going to  
10 need to speak up, because I'm having trouble hearing  
11 you.

12 MR. SWARTHOUT: Okay. So it was dealing with  
13 the office out here. It's in the state. Some of the  
14 services are stuff that is deemed to be not public  
15 record and that out here, which would require them to be  
16 licensed to advertise those services out here.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So if I  
18 understand you correctly, they were advertising to do  
19 services that are covered under approval of license?

20 MR. SWARTHOUT: Correct.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: But we don't know  
22 whether they did those services or not, they were cited  
23 for the advertisement of it?

24 MR. SWARTHOUT: Correct.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. James,

1 do you want to respond to that just for our edification?

2 MS. JAMES: Sure. Last year, I bought a  
3 building in Reno, Nevada to -- and so this year, we had  
4 to build out the building, and we started to. And I  
5 have another business here called 4506Transcripts.com.  
6 And with that business, we have had that business in  
7 Nevada for some time. And we verify people's income  
8 with the IRS by getting the tax transcripts.

9 So when we got the building complete this year,  
10 we moved into it. And I did advertise on my website the  
11 new address that we have, the Reno location. And so  
12 it's Private Eyes Inc. and Private Eyes Screening. So  
13 on our website we added Private Eyes Screening Group to  
14 it, and we have the -- had the Reno address. And when I  
15 was requested to remove it, I did so the same day.

16 We're not, we were not actually conducting any  
17 investigations in Nevada at this time. But I do have  
18 staff that I'm paying for 4506 for insurance purposes,  
19 for health insurance. I am paying that staff for 4506  
20 now through Private Eyes Screening Group.

21 So I am a hundred percent owner of all three  
22 entities.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

24 MS. JAMES: So I did pay the citation and  
25 remove the advertisement from our website.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank  
2 you.

3           All right. My questions are answered. Any  
4 other questions of the Board?

5           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have one question for  
6 the investigator. Through your investigative prowess,  
7 was there a way to find out about how long this was  
8 being advertised? I mean you found out one time. But  
9 the time period, back in time?

10          MR. SWARTHOUT: There was not.

11          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: How did you figure it  
12 out?

13          MS. JAMES: I can respond to that.

14          MR. SWARTHOUT: A post.

15          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: They did post  
16 something? All right. Hold on. If they did posting,  
17 I'm just trying to figure out if they did posting.

18          MR. SWARTHOUT: It was through the website and  
19 social media. I tried going back to see if I could see  
20 that there was date stamps on that, and I could not find  
21 date stamps for any updates.

22          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

23          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ms. James, go  
24 ahead, respond, please.

25          MS. JAMES: Yeah, I started, I put the -- when

1 we moved into the building in Reno is when we added the  
2 address to our website. That's when we added our Reno  
3 address to social media, was in June of this year.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And a  
5 citation was issued?

6 MR. SWARTHOUT: October 30th.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So depending on  
8 the date, either three or four months.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're good?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have nothing.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tammy?

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'm good. Thank you.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
15 public comment?

16 All right. Seeing none, I'll call for a  
17 motion.

18 Call for a motion for the second time.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'll make a motion.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we approve  
22 Private Eyes Screening Group Inc. for a new corporate  
23 private investigator license. Sandra L. James is  
24 applying for an individual private investigator license.  
25 If approved, she is requesting that her individual

1 license be placed in abeyance so that she may become the  
2 qualifying agent. Corporate officer to be approved is  
3 Sandra L. James. Subject to all statutory and  
4 regulatory requirements.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
6 have a motion. Do I have a second?

7 So we can move this forward and at least have  
8 some discussion on the vote, I will second this.

9 Any public comment?

10 Any comment from the Board?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. Gronauer. I  
12 have a problem with it, only because Ms. James has been  
13 in business a long time in California, for quite a  
14 period of time, and she'd be, I would consider her to be  
15 familiar with the laws and our statutes here for private  
16 investigators licenses. And I'm just, I'm disturbed by  
17 that she was doing -- she opened an office, she did  
18 everything back in June, at least, of 2019, and didn't  
19 do anything until an investigation was started. And it  
20 just, it just bothers me, that's all, that they were  
21 operating without a license for that long period.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, this is Ray  
23 Flynn, for the record.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's my assessment.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right. And maybe

1 I heard something slightly different. And I'm going to  
2 look to the investigator to figure out which way we're  
3 going on this. I heard that she had been doing work in  
4 Nevada that wasn't under the purview of a license. And  
5 she had opened up a new building in Nevada for her  
6 business. That her website, that is both in California  
7 and here, she added the address to her website of the  
8 security licensing that she's doing in California. It  
9 was the issue of the address for advertising business.  
10 Although we have no documentation to prove the  
11 allegation that she was doing unlicensed activity in the  
12 state of Nevada. Is that correct?

13 MR. SWARTHOUT: Correct.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All is we have is  
15 that she advertised?

16 MR. SWARTHOUT: Correct.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And she explained  
18 that she advertised because they added the address of  
19 her brand-new building to her website?

20 MR. SWARTHOUT: Correct.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. That's why  
22 I don't have an issue. It was brought to her attention.  
23 She probably paid the fine. She probably, well, applied  
24 for licensing. She probably took down the  
25 advertisement. I see it as there was no evidence of her

1 trying to circumvent the system.

2 So without anything said, I'll call for a vote.  
3 All those in favor, say "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Those opposed?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion  
8 carries on a two-to-one vote. Congratulations,  
9 Ms. James.

10 MS. JAMES: Thank you very much. Have a great  
11 day.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
13 Number 26, Zachary -- I'm going to try this, Daigle --  
14 Daigle is applying for an individual private  
15 investigator license. If approved, he is requesting  
16 that his individual license be placed into abeyance so  
17 that he may become the qualifying agent for PreCheck,  
18 Incorporated, license number 1618. Corporate officers  
19 to be approved are Bruce E. Berger, Michael J. Kucza and  
20 James C. Owens. This is subject to all statutory and  
21 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

22 And you are, sir?

23 MR. DAIGLE: I'm Zachary Daigle.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you're aware  
25 you're under oath?



1 MR. DAIGLE: I understand I'm under oath.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Bring us  
3 up-to-date. Why are you here?

4 MR. DAIGLE: So I've been with PreCheck about  
5 16 years now. The company was recently sold to the  
6 original founder, Barbara C. Sardon, who was the

23           MR. DAIGLE: Thank you very much for your time.

24           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

25           Number 27. Geoffrey Hazard is applying for an

1 individual private investigator's license. This is  
2 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
3 For possible action.

4 Mr. Hazard, are you here?

5 MR. HAZARD: Yes. Good morning. I'm Geoffrey  
6 Hazard, and I'm aware that I'm under oath.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh. Thank you.  
8 Good morning. All right. Tell us about your business  
9 and what you want to do.

10 MR. HAZARD: Sure. My company is a fire  
11 investigation company based in California. We've been  
12 around since 1977. I'm one of the managing partners.  
13 And up until recently, we had an employee that lived in  
14 Reno, who was a licensed private investigator, who had  
15 been performing our fire investigation work in the state  
16 of Nevada. He left the company over the summer to start  
17 his own company. So that created a void in our ability

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

5 "Neh-vad-ah." I'll get it, I promise. Thank you, sir.

6           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Have a  
7 good day.

8           MR. HAZARD: Thank you. You, too.

9           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 28.  
10 Pharaohs, LLC is applying for a new corporate private  
11 patrolman license. Mina G. Boules is applying for an  
12 individual private patrolman license. If approved, he  
13 is requesting that his individual license be placed into  
14 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.  
15 Member to be approved is Mina G. Boules. This is  
16 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

18           Good morning, Mr. Boules.

19           MR. BOULES: Good morning.

20           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you aware  
21 you're under oath?

22           MR. BOULES: Yes.

23           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you aware  
24 you're under oath?

25           MR. BOULES: I'm aware of that.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.   So tell us  
2 about your company.

3           MR. BOULES:   So I experience, and I have a law  
4 degree.   So I have experience in law and security  
5 industry.   So I have decided to start off my own  
6 security company.

7           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   So you worked for  
8 other security companies before?

9           MR. BOULES:   I worked for many.

21          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:   No, no, do you have a  
22 work card to work for all these security companies as a  
23 security officer?   They're all in California, none in  
24 Nevada?

25          MR. BOULES:   No, some of them in Nevada.

1 MR. SWARTHOUT: Board Member Gronauer, he does  
2 have an active work card in the state of the Nevada.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. We just have a  
4 communication problem, then. Thank you. I appreciate  
5 that. I'm good.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
7 other questions from the Board?

8 Okay. Seeing none, any public comment?

9 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. I mean I'll  
10 call for a motion. My apologies.

11 MR. BOULES: The company name is Pharaoh  
12 Security Services, not Pharaoh, LLC. That's the  
13 corporate name, Pharaoh, LLC. Oh, okay.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'll make a motion.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Pharaohs, LLC, who is

19 MR. BOULES: Boules ("Bohls").

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: -- Boules is applying for  
21 an individual private patrolman license. If approved,

24 Member to be approved is Mina G. Boules. He would be  
25 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a

25 discussion?

1           Seeing none, all those in favor, say "aye."

2           (Board members said "aye.")

3           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

4           Congratulations.

5           MR. BROCKWAY: Thank you very much.

6           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 30.

7 Resolve Assurance LLC is applying for a new corporate  
8 patrolman license. Timothy A. Cook is applying for an  
9 individual private patrolman license. If approved, he's  
10 requesting that his individual license be placed into  
11 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.

12 Members to be approved are Timothy A. Cook and Tucker L.  
13 Stokely. This is subject to all statutory and  
14 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

15           Good morning, sir. And you are?

16           MR. COOK: I'm Timothy Cook, sir. I'm aware  
17 I'm under oath.

18           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
19 Tell us about your company and what you want to do.

20           MR. COOK: The company was established in 2019,  
21 the business. I want to, basically, establish myself  
22 and my partner as the qualifying agents for the company.

23           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And your  
24 background?

25           MR. COOK: I'm currently an executive in the

1 hotel-casino industry. Prior to that, 24 years in the  
2 Air Force.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you for  
4 your service.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's the Air Force.

6 MR. COOK: Also, my partner is an ex-Marine  
7 Beret. It's the Army.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I got to deal  
10 with this.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you a Marine? I  
13 don't think...

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. A  
16 little punchy today. It's the holiday season.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And he's hungry.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
19 questions from the Board?

20 Seeing none, any public comment?

21 All right. I'll call for a motion.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move to

11 All those in favor, state "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

14 Okay. The motion carried. Congratulations,  
15 sir.

16 MR. COOK: Thank you very much.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And thank you for your  
18 service.

19 MR. COOK: Thank you, sir.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 31.

21 Contingency Concepts, LLC is applying for a new  
22 corporate private patrolman license. Paschal Facchini  
23 is applying for an individual private patrolman license.  
24 If approved, he is requesting that his individual  
25 license be placed into abeyance so that he may become

1 the qualifying agent. Members to be approved are  
2 Paschal Facchini, Peter J. Facchini and Brett M.  
3 Krueger. This is subject to all statutory and  
4 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

5 Good morning. And you are?

6 MR. FACCHINI: Paschal Facchini.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So I got it  
8 right?

9 MR. FACCHINI: It's close.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Close. All  
11 right. Tell us about your company and what you want to  
12 do.

13 MR. FACCHINI: So Contingency Concepts is with  
14 my son Peter. And we're looking to establish security  
15 services within the Las Vegas area. I've actually  
16 pulled out of retirement to hold this license because of  
17 my law enforcement background as well as spending 18  
18 years in contract work in security.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And where were  
20 you in law enforcement, sir?

21 MR. FACCHINI: I was with the Port Authority of  
22 New York and New Jersey.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Excellent.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
25 questions from the Board?

1 All right.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I have a  
3 question. Gronauer. What position does Brett Krueger  
4 have in the company?

5 MR. FACCHINI: He's the operations manager. My  
6 son Peter as well as Brett are both retired military,  
7 special operations command. And they export an interest  
8 in utilizing individuals from that part of the service  
9 to provide service in this area, security in this area.

6 record, neither was a felony, and neither involved a  
7 weapon?

8 MR. MAXWELL: No, sir. Correct.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

11 office here?

13 beginning, yes, sir.

14 MR. DETMER: I missed it.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Young years, I know.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I

7 qualifying agent for Thomas Protective Services, Inc.,  
8 license number 1309. This is subject to all statutory  
9 and regulatory requirements. For possible action.

10           Good morning, sir. You are?

11           MR. GARCIA: I'm Victor Garcia.

12           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you're aware  
13 you're under oath, sir?

14           MR. GARCIA: Yes, sir.

15           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell  
16 us about the business and what you want to do.

17           MR. GARCIA: Basically, we want to expand our  
18 business within the state. I have been hired by a  
19 company that's from Texas and chosen to be a qualifying  
20 agent. And we want to expand our business here in the  
21 state of Nevada. I've been chosen to be the qualifying  
22 agent. That's why I'm here.

23           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank

3 it.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: There's one  
6 arrest in your record.

7 MR. GARCIA: Correct.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you want to  
9 talk about that?

10 MR. GARCIA: Sure.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I got to ask this  
6 question. You know I'm going to ask this. Who came up  
7 with this name, and why?

8 MR. KENNY: That was me.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
10 Explain why anyone would hire a company called Chaos.

11 MR. KENNY: Yeah. So it's actually a -- it's  
12 the same name, that I have a few other companies that  
13 are named the same, Chaos and whatever the industry it  
14 is. And so, at the end of the day, I was just more  
15 focused on getting to the next step as in a security  
16 company instead of thinking about the names and whatnot.  
17 And so I stuck with what was comfortable with me, and I  
18 stuck with that name.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, well, that  
20 actually makes sense when you said you've got other  
21 companies. And what businesses are the other companies?

22 MR. KENNY: Mortgage banking and real estate.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What type of  
24 banking?

25 MR. KENNY: Mortgage banking.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.   All right.  
2   What type of security do you want to do?

3           MR. KENNY:   We want to do, we want to work with  
4   companies, like my companies that I have.   You know,  
5   certainly, the concept was the office that I work out  
6   of, it's -- now it's downtown Las Vegas, which is a  
7   little bit of a -- it's a nice area, but it's a little  
8   bit rough there.   So we want to have, you know,  
9   full-time security.   And my mother's businesses are  
10   similar, and it would need that type of service.   So by  
11   being able to handle that in the companies that I  
12   already have a -- that I already have ownership over,  
13   kind of get our guys trained on, hope to be able to  
14   offer those services to our people.   And it's a way to  
15   build our security company while I was being able to  
16   train, train our people, you know, with using the  
17   company that I already have.

18           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   So if I  
19   understand correctly, you want to do your own in-house  
20   security?

21           MR. KENNY:   Correct.

22           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   You'd want the  
23   license so that after you get your in-house security up  
24   and running, then you can also contract outside?

25           MR. KENNY:   Exactly, yes.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.   Thank you.

2           Any other questions from the Board?

3           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:   I'll make a motion to

4 approve.   Gronauer.   I'll make a motion to approve.

5 Chaos Security, LLC, is applying for a new corporate

6 private patrolman license.   William D. Ledford is

7 applying for an individual private patrolman license.

8 If approved, he's requesting that his individual license

9 be placed into abeyance so that he may become the

10 qualifying agent.   Members to be approved are William D.

11 Ledford and Stephen W. Kenny.   This is subject to all

12 statutory and regulatory requirements.

13           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.   Do I have

14 a second?

15           BOARD MEMBER NIXON:   I second.   You'll do the

16 public?

17           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   I'll do that

18 every time.

19           BOARD MEMBER NIXON:   Okay.

20           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   So it just flows

21 better in the transcript.   All right.   I have a motion.

22 I have a second.   But I will call for any public

23 comment.

24           Seeing none, is there any other, further

25 discussion on the motion?

1           Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
2 in favor, state "aye."

3           (Board members aid "aye.")

4           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

5           All right. Motion carried. Congratulations,  
6 gentlemen.

7           MR. LEDFORD: Thank you.

8           MR. KENNY: Thank you.

9           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good luck to you  
10 guys. Have a good one.

11           All right. Number 34. Arne Ogaard is applying  
12 for an individual private patrolman license. If  
13 approved, he's requesting that his individual license be  
14 placed into abeyance so that he may become the  
15 qualifying agent for Five Diamond Screening, LLC,  
16 license number 2787. This is subject to all statutory  
17 and regulatory requirements. For possible action.

18           Good morning.

19           MR. OGAARD: Good morning.

20           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What's your name?

21           MR. OGAARD: Arne Ogaard.

22           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Are  
23 you aware you're under oath, sir?

24           MR. OGAARD: Yes, sir.

25           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What pin are you



1 wearing?

2 MR. OGAARD: LAPD.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Retired out of  
4 there?

23 Tell us what you're here for and what you want to do

14 MR. RITA: Thank you. Have a good day.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 36.

16 The Stonewall Viper Group, Incorporated, dba as  
17 The Company, is applying for a new corporate private  
18 patrolman license. Gregory S. Rodriguez is applying for  
19 an individual private patrolman license. If approved,  
20 he's requesting that his individual license be placed  
21 into abeyance so that he may become the qualifying

1 Good morning, gentlemen.

2 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Good morning, sir.

3 MR. CHANDLER: Good morning, sir. My name is  
4 David Chandler. I'm aware I'm under oath.

5 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Last name is Rodriguez. First  
6 name is Gregory. I'm aware I'm under oath.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I always  
8 ask about development. Okay. I know that yours -- what  
9 yours is.

10 And yours is?

11 MR. RODRIGUEZ: I'm retired LAPD, 35 years now.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 38. Oh,  
9 my apologies. Number 37. Joe R. Rodriguez, Jr. is  
10 applying for an individual private patrolman license.  
11 If approved, he is requesting that his individual  
12 license be placed into abeyance so that he may become  
13 the qualifying agent for American Guard Services, Inc.,  
14 license number 1364. This is subject to all statutory

16 Good morning.

17 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Good morning, sir.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

17 Seeing none, the motion carried.

18 Congratulations, sir. You have a good day.

19 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, sir. Thank you.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 38.

21 Jason C. Sullivan, dba Tahoe Life Security. It makes  
22 sense. Tahoe. Okay.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah, I got that.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: In police work,  
25 we call that a clue. Okay. Is applying for an

1 individual private patrolman license. This is subject  
2 to all statutory and regulatory requirements. For  
3 possible action.

4 Good morning. I'm assuming -- or who are you?

5 MR. SULLIVAN: I'm Jason Sullivan.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You're  
7 aware you're under oath, sir?

8 MR. SULLIVAN: Yes, sir.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us  
10 about your company and what you would like to do, sir.

11 MR. SULLIVAN: I own Tahoe Life Security in the  
12 state of California. Currently, we're providing armed  
13 security and unarmed security on the state line. I've

24          And you are?

25          MR. THAKER:   I'm Parth Thaker.  I'm aware I'm

1 under oath.

2 MR. JACOBSEN: I'm Glen Jacobsen. I'm aware  
3 I'm under oath.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good enough.  
5 Your lapel pin, sir, is that your company?

6 MR. THAKER: Correct.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. What  
8 do you guys want to do here in Nevada?

9 MR. THAKER: So we are a security company based  
10 out of New York. And we recently expanded in New Jersey  
11 and Indiana. And now we're looking to expand in Nevada  
12 as well, Illinois, California. So we're looking to open  
13 a branch here. It's to provide security service in

4 been arrested?" he did disclose, and he did provide

15 arrested in New York City for pot -- I don't know what  
16 the original charge of menacing, I don't know what that

19 had taken over there. When I got there, I found some  
20 serious misconduct going on. And I had begun the  
21 process of suspending and terminating a subordinate

18 in security, specifically in California and here in  
19 Nevada. I've been here in Nevada five years. And the  
20 balance of that time was back in California, the same  
21 company, essentially for all that time.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
23 questions from the Board?

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you currently  
25 licensed in Nevada?

1 MR. VANREMORTEL: Yes, I am.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. For what?

3 MR. VANREMORTEL: I am with Securitas, and I  
4 have a guard card. I have a guard card.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
6 other questions?

7 Seeing none, any comments from the public?

8 Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
10 that we approve Kenneth M. --

11 MR. VANREMORTEL: VanRemortel.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: -- VanRemortel -- thank  
13 you --

14 MR. VANREMORTEL: You're welcome.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: -- for an individual  
16 private patrolman license. If approved, he is  
17 requesting that his individual license be placed in  
18 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent for  
19 Pinkerton Consulting & Investigations Inc., license  
20 number 1029. This is subject to all statutory and  
21 regulatory requirements.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a  
23 motion. Do I have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion and

1 second. Any further discussion?

2 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
3 in favor, state "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The motion  
6 carries unanimously. Congratulations. It's approved.

7 MR. VANREMORTEL: Thank you very much.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have a good day.

9 MR. VANREMORTEL: You too. Thank you.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 41.

11 Jeffery W. Bruckner is applying for an individual  
12 process server license. If approved, he is requesting  
13 that his individual license be placed into abeyance so  
14 that he may become the qualifying agent for ProDox,  
15 L.L.C., license number 1710. This is subject to all  
16 statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible  
17 action.

18 Good morning.

19 MR. BRUCKNER: Jeffery Bruckner, and I'm aware  
20 I'm under oath.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good  
22 enough. Tell us about your company and what you want to  
23 do.

24 MR. BRUCKNER: ProDox is a document retrieval  
25 company. We provide support to primarily insurance

1 defense firms. We basically get documentation for them.  
2 And, well, I've been with them since 2004. And I'm  
3 trying to be the qualifying agent.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Fair  
5 enough. Short and sweet. I don't have any questions.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have no questions.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any public  
9 comment?

10 Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
12 that Jeffery W. Bruckner be approved for an individual  
13 process server license. If approved, he is requesting  
14 that his individual license be placed into abeyance so  
15 that me may become the qualifying agent for ProDox,  
16 L.L.C., license number 1710. This is subject to all  
17 statutory and regulatory requirements.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I got a  
19 motion. Do I have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any  
22 further discussion?

23 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
24 in favor of the motion, state "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

2           The motion carried. Congratulations.

3           MR. BRUCKNER: Thank you.

4           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have a good day.

5           MR. BRUCKNER: Have a good day. Thank you.

6           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 43,

7 Gene L. Jacobson, dba -- oh, no. My apologies.

8 Number 42. HES-Hurricane Eviction Services, LLC is  
9 applying for a new corporate process server license.  
10 Maria D. Buck is applying for an individual process  
11 server license. If approved, she is requesting that her  
12 individual license be placed into abeyance so that she  
13 may become the qualifying agent. Member to be approved  
14 is Maria D. Buck. This is subject to all statutory and  
15 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

16           Good morning.

17           MS. BUCK: Good morning. I'm Maria Buck, and I  
18 know I'm under oath.

19           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank  
20 you. What would you like to do with your license if we  
21 give it to you?

22           MS. BUCK: Actually, I obtained a small  
23 business for evictions in 2013. And since then, the  
24 regulations changed. And July 1st of this year, I have  
25 to put a stop for my business for a minute until I can

1 get the license and continue my services.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I guess,  
3 do we know about the change?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, yeah. July 1st.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Just for me, so I  
6 know in the future, what is it?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Landlords cannot, to  
8 simplify, landlords cannot serve their own process.  
9 They have to be served by a licensed private process  
10 server or an attorney. And an attorney has a law degree  
11 that says it. And if a licensed private process server  
12 does the business, all their people that serve have to  
13 have word cards.

14 MS. BUCK: Correct.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And, also, there's no  
16 need for a certificate of mailing if a licensed process  
17 server serves it. But it still has to be mailed.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you,  
19 Bobbie. Can I get training credit for that? That's  
20 really good.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thanks.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
23 other questions from the Board?

24 All right. Seeing none, any public comment?

25 All right. Seeing none, I'll call for a

1 motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a  
3 motion that HES-Hurricane Eviction Services, LLC is  
4 applying for a new corporate process server license.  
5 Maria D. Buck is applying for an individual process  
6 server license. If approved, she is requesting that her  
7 individual license be placed into abeyance so that she  
8 may become the qualifying agent. Member to be approved  
9 is Maria D. Buck. This is subject to all statutory and  
10 regulatory requirements.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
12 have a motion. Do I have a second?

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion and  
15 section. Any further discussion?

16 All right. Seeing none, I'll call for a vote.  
17 All those in favor, state "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

20 All right. Congratulations.

21 MS. BUCK: Thank you, sir.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have a good day.

23 MS. BUCK: Merry Christmas, you all.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Merry Christmas.

25 All right. At this time I'll call Gene L.

1 Jacobson, dba Private Investigators International is  
2 applying for an individual process server license.  
3 Subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
4 For possible action.

5 Good morning.

6 MR. JACOBSON: Good morning, gentlemen, ladies.

7 ACTING BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You are?

8 MR. JACOBSON: I'm Gene L. Jacobson.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Before we get started,  
10 I have to make a statement. I've known Gene for a few  
11 months. And while we're kind of friendly, we don't  
12 really hang out together much or anything like that. I  
13 know him, and I know about his business. And I just  
14 wanted to put that out there. I have no problem voting.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good  
16 enough.

17 And you're aware you're under oath, sir?

18 MR. JACOBSON: Pardon me, sir?

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you aware  
20 you're under oath; were you here when we gave the oath?

21 MR. JACOBSON: Yes.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
23 Tell us what you want to do with your business.

24 MR. JACOBSON: At my age, I've done about  
25 everything. I've got a license in about 14 states. And



1 not that that's important, but the fact is I've devoted  
2 a lot of my time to volunteer my services, including  
3 Metro. They use me, et cetera, at no charge.

4 I met a few gentleman from the military about a  
5 year or two back. And after, well, they came to my  
6 office, I sat down and I thought about, gosh, what  
7 they're telling me was important, and it made me feel  
8 pretty good. So what I've decided to do with the rest  
9 of my career is to develop a business plan and program  
10 where I can put together either brochures, or whatever,  
11 to put together something where they can utilize it in  
12 all these states, including the current statutes,  
13 ordinances, et cetera, to help the veterans and help  
14 retired law enforcement to get into this industry. Some  
15 of them have been injured. Some of them haven't had,  
16 you know, such a great time.

17 So that's basically my objective. And the  
18 reason I'm applying for this license is this is the  
19 third license in the group that I have. I'm already a  
20 licensed private detective and a patrolman. And I'm  
21 just adding this to it because I've been contacted by  
22 several individuals who a lot of them may be in law, not  
23 law enforcement, attorneys, saying, "Do you serve  
24 papers?" I says, "No, I don't."

25 So that's where I am today.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.   Well, and,  
2 first, I applaud what you want to do.

3           All right.   Any other questions?

4           All right.   Any public comment?

5           Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

6           BOARD MEMBER NIXON:   This is Nixon.   I move  
7 that Gene L. Jacobson, dba, who is applying for an  
8 individual process server license.   This would be  
9 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

10          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.   And on  
11 this particular one, I'm going to second.   So I got a  
12 motion and a second.   And I'll call for a vote.   All  
13 those in favor, state "aye."

14          (Board members said "aye.")

15          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Any opposed?

16          Okay.   With that, congratulations, sir.

17          MR. JACOBSON:   Thank you, gentlemen and ladies.  
18 Lady.   Excuse me.   Have a good day.

19          BOARD MEMBER NIXON:   You, too.

20          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Number 44,  
21 Las Vegas Residential Properties, LLC, applying for a  
22 new corporate process server license.   Jerry D. King,  
23 Jr. is applying for an individual process server  
24 license.   If approved, he is requesting that his  
25 individual license be placed into abeyance so that he

1 may become the qualifying agent. Member to be approved  
2 is -- Yaakov?

3 MR. KING: Very good.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you --  
5 K. Greenspan. This is subject to all statutory and  
6 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

7 Good morning. And you are?

8 MR. KING: Jerry Don King, Jr.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And  
10 you realize you're under oath?

11 MR. KING: Yes, sir.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell  
13 us what you want to do with this license if you get it.

14 MR. KING: We, Las Vegas Residential Properties  
15 is a property management company, cell phone properties.  
16 We have approximately, I think, at this point, 10,000  
17 doors in Las Vegas. And as he was stating about the new  
18 rule that came into effect in July, we are looking to  
19 bring our service for like delivering notices,  
20 et cetera, in-house. And this would be a big promotion  
21 for me if I get this license. So that's what we're  
22 doing.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're not  
24 putting any pressure on me by saying this.

25 MR. KING: It is, it really is actually.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:  What's your  
2 background?

3           MR. KING:  I've been in the legal business  
4 since 1994.  I worked for a private attorney for 18  
5 years, and which the first half of that employment I saw  
6 his serve process, did court errands, filed paperwork  
7 with the court, et cetera.  From that point, the other  
8 half of my service for him, I became his office manager  
9 and basically conducted all the office administrative  
10 duties in the office as well as served process.

11           I'm currently employed by Music Industries,  
12 Inc., which is the sister company for Las Vegas  
13 Residential Properties.  I do all the eviction  
14 paperwork.  I process all their evictions for the  
15 California properties.  And I also serve some notices,  
16 some subpoenas, et cetera.  And I'm also a notary,  
17 commissioned notary for company.

18           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:  All right.  Thank  
19 you.

20           Any other questions?

21           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:  Yes.  Mine will be to  
22 Investigator Maxwell.

23           MR. MAXWELL:  Sir.

24           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:  The adverse, diversion  
25 on here.

1 MR. MAXWELL: The applicant disclosed three  
2 arrests. In 1990, possession of narcotic substance.  
3 The charge was dismissed on completion of a diversion  
4 program. The applicant has been totally honest with me.  
5 He wrote me he planned to get paperwork on that  
6 particular one.

7 And the second one, January 2nd, 1993, felony  
8 possession of narcotic substance, the applicant received  
9 a 36-month probation, which was going to be discharged  
10 on paper in 1996. Okay. So the second one, felony  
11 possession of a narcotic substance, April 6th of '93,  
12 the applicant received a 36-month probation, which was  
13 completed and discharged on April 6 of '96. He then  
14 received a pardon from the Governor of California, and  
15 he did supply us a certificate showing that pardon.

16 And the last one was 2003, possession of a  
17 narcotic substance. The charge was dismissed upon  
18 completion of a drug court program. And the applicant  
19 did provide us with paperwork showing that dismissal.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you, Mr. Maxwell.

21 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why don't you  
23 hang on just for a second.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. King?

25 MR. KING: Yes.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Since these past  
2 arrests, have you been in any trouble whatsoever?

3 MR. KING: No, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: How long have you been  
5 working for the company you're working for now?

6 MR. KING: Seven years. Well, seven years in  
7 April. April 1st it will be seven years.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What did you do, since  
9 the last arrest that you had, with this company?

10 MR. KING: The only other employment was for  
11 the last 18 years, I worked for a private attorney,  
12 George D. Kelly. And from there, I worked, I started  
13 working here.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.  
15 No further.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
17 questions?

18 All right. Any public comment?

19 Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
21 that we approve Las Vegas Residential Properties, LLC,  
22 who is applying for a new corporate process server  
23 license. Jerry D. King, Jr. is applying for an  
24 individual process server license. If approved, he is  
25 requesting that his individual license be placed into

1 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.

2 Member to be approved is Yaakov Greenspun.

3 MR. KING: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you. Greenspan.

5 This would be subject to all statutory and regulatory  
6 requirements.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a  
8 motion. Do I have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Further  
11 discussion?

12 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
13 in favor, state "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

16 The motion carries. Congratulations.

17 MR. KING: Thank you so much. Thank you,  
18 Mr. Maxwell.

19 MR. MAXWELL: See you.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 45. Aris  
21 Vegas, LLC is applying for a new corporate process  
22 server license. Alec R. Morgan is applying for an  
23 individual process server license. If approved, he is  
24 requesting that his individual license be placed into  
25 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.

1 Member to be approved is Alec R. Morgan. This is  
2 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
3 For possible action.

4 Good morning. And you are?

5 MR. MORGAN: Good morning. I'm Alec Morgan.  
6 I'm aware I'm under oath.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us  
8 about what you want to do with this company and your  
9 background.

10 MR. MORGAN: And so I'm trying to have the  
11 property management company to also be in compliance  
12 with Senate Bill 151 to serve properties with notices.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And  
14 your background, sir?

15 MR. MORGAN: I was a property manager, a  
16 property manager for 12 years. I've just been serving  
17 these notices by myself for that amount of time.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
19 questions from the Board?

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You have several  
21 properties?

22 MR. MORGAN: The property management company  
23 I'm working with, they have 9,000 doors right now. I've  
24 worked in our partner complexes up to a thousand units.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You realize that if



1 other people serve documents, they have to have a work  
2 card --

3 MR. MORGAN: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: -- under your --

5 MR. MORGAN: Yes, sir.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
7 public comment?

8 Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
10 that Aris Vegas, LLC be approved for a new corporate  
11 process server license. Alec R. Morgan is applying for  
12 an individual process server license. If approved, he  
13 is requesting that his individual license be placed into  
14 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.  
15 Member to be approved is Alec R. Morgan. This would be  
16 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a  
18 motion. Do I have second?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion  
21 and a second. Any further discussion?

22 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
23 in favor, state "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

1 The motion carries. Congratulations.

2 MR. MORGAN: Thank you very much. You guys  
3 have a great day.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 46.  
5 Ethan, I believe it's Tseu ("Shoo"), is applying for an  
6 individual process server license. This is subject to  
7 all statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible  
8 action.

9 Good morning, sir.

10 MR. TSEU: Good morning.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you are?

12 MR. TSEU: My name is Ethan Tseu ("Jay-oh").

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: My apologies.

14 MR. TSEU: No, that's good.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Again, I have to state,  
16 Ethan, in my previous life when I was the elected  
17 constable, he worked with me for quite a few years.  
18 We've known each other for quite some time. I haven't  
19 seen him or socialized with him for quite a few years.  
20 And I'd have no problem voting on this.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good  
22 enough. All right.

23 Are you aware you're under oath, sir?

24 MR. TSEU: Yes.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell

1 us what you want to do with this license, and your  
2 background.

3 MR. TSEU: I'm starting a business here,  
4 process serving, serving court documents. My background  
5 would be nine and a half years with the Constable's  
6 Office here in Las Vegas, serving paperworks, doing  
7 evictions. And I'm here today, since the new law  
8 started on July 1st, to serve paperwork and be licensed.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you still  
10 working for Constable's Office?

11 MR. TSEU: No, I am not.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
13 questions from the Board?

14 Any public comment?

15 Seeing none, I'll entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
17 that we approve Ethan Tseu --

18 MR. TSEU: Yes.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: -- who is applying for an  
20 individual process server license. This would be  
21 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And this  
23 is Ray Flynn. I'm seconding this one. Any further  
24 discussion?

25 Seeing none, I call for a vote. All those in

1 favor, state "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

4 The motion carried. Congratulations. You have  
5 a good day.

6 MR. TSEU: Thank you very much. Have a great  
7 holiday.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We've  
10 got -- you know what, we'll take a quick break. We're  
11 going to take a 10-minute bio, nutrition, get some fresh  
12 air, break. It'll be 10 minutes, up north.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We're  
17 moving on to the dog and pony portion. Number 47,  
18 canine handler. T.A.C. Protective Service, LLC, license  
19 number 2704, is applying for a new canine handler  
20 license. Mishon Hurd-Korkmaz is applying for an  
21 individual canine license, handler license. If  
22 approved, she is requesting that her individual license  
23 be placed into abeyance so that she may become the  
24 qualifying agent. This is subject to all statutory and  
25 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

1 Good morning. And you are?

2 MS. HURD-KORKMAZ: Mishon Hurd-Korkmaz. Yes, I  
3 know I'm under oath.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. That was  
5 pretty close.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I was going to say damn  
7 close, but we'll keep it clean.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: It's all right.  
9 All right. It's still morning. So good morning.

10 MS. HURD-KORKMAZ: Good morning.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tell us about  
12 this company and what you want to do with it.

13 MS. HURD-KORKMAZ: So T.A.C. Security is  
14 already in existence, and they're adding canine. And  
15 then they have asked me to be the qualifying agent.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

17 MS. HURD-KORKMAZ: Because of my history.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And  
19 for staff, bring me up to speed. And just the canine  
20 portion, they don't just handle them. The dogs get  
21 certified. But the qualifying agents don't have any  
22 specific training, or. Vinny, go ahead.

23 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. So with  
24 a canine handler license, the individual that's going to  
25 hold the license is responsible for the canines. So the

1 company still has their PPO qualifying agent, and now  
2 they've added a canine license to that as well.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good. All  
4 right. The question's asked and answered. Thank you.

5 Any other questions from the Board?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
8 public comment?

9 Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. I move that we  
11 approve T.A.C. Protective Service, LLC, license number  
12 2704, for a new canine handler license. Mishon  
13 Hurd-Korkmaz is applying for an individual canine  
14 handler license. If approved, she is requesting that  
15 her individual license be placed into abeyance so that  
16 she may become the qualifying agent. This would be  
17 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
19 have a motion. Do I have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
22 have a motion and a second. Any public comment?

23 Seeing none. I already called for that  
24 already. Any further discussion?

25 None seen. I'll call for a vote. All those in

1 favor, state "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

4 The motion carried. Congratulations. Have a  
5 good day.

6 MS. HURD-KORKMAZ: Thank you.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 48.

8 Protective Force International LLC, license number 2687,  
9 is applying for a new canine handler license.  
10 Jonathan G. Alvarez is applying for an individual canine  
11 handler license. If approved, he's requesting that his  
12 individual license be placed into abeyance so that he  
13 may become the qualifying agent. Subject to all  
14 statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible  
15 action.

16 Good morning to you, sir.

17 MR. ALVAREZ: Good morning.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have to protect  
19 the -- I'm familiar with these folks, because their  
20 office is right downstairs from my office, and so I see  
21 them quite regularly. We do no business together. We  
22 actually haven't done anything social, because they  
23 won't take me out to eat or anything, so, buy me a  
24 drink. Actually, we're all good. I just wanted to, you  
25 know, disclose that. We're good.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Good  
2 morning. And you are?

3           MR. ALVAREZ: Good morning, Board. My name is  
4 Jonathan Alvarez, and I acknowledge I'm under oath.

5           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell  
6 us about your company and what you want to do.

7           MR. ALVAREZ: We have --

8           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I don't have any  
9 questions. Any questions from the Board?

10          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I do.

11          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

12          (The Reporter indicated that we didn't hear  
13 everything.)

14          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We'll  
15 start again. Tell us about your company and what you  
16 want to do.

17          MR. ALVAREZ: We have an existing security  
18 operation here in Las Vegas, Nevada. And we're adding a  
19 canine division that's operating.

20          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm  
21 going to call for any questions of the Board.

22          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Under  
23 investigation, the investigator's conclusion, it says it  
24 requires an applicant for a dog handler's license, to  
25 the satisfaction of the Board, his or her ability to



1 handle while training livestock. So do we need your  
2 update or anything like that?

3 MR. SWARTHOUT: He did pass the exam. It was  
4 administered at the Las Vegas Convention Center by Woody  
5 Chan, who is POST's secondary education.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And we've been  
8 using the convention center for awhile now, right; we no  
9 longer use Metro?

10 MR. SALADINO: So, currently, being that the  
11 convention center has the ability to get the explosive  
12 material needed for the exam, we've just been using  
13 that. We will need to go back to Las Vegas Metro once  
14 we get anybody who wants to apply for patrol canines  
15 and/or drug detection.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Gotcha.

17 MR. SALADINO: Right now, with the explosives,  
18 the convention center's been very great to us.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good. Thank you.

20 All right. Any other questions?

21 Any public comment?

22 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote, or a motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
24 that we approve Protective Force International LLC,  
25 license number 2687, for a new canine handler license.

1 Jonathan G. Alvarez is applying for an individual canine  
2 handler license. If approved, he is requesting that his  
3 individual license be placed into abeyance so that he  
4 may become the qualifying agent. This would be subject  
5 to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
7 have a motion. Do I have a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
10 further discussion from the Board?

11 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
12 in favor, state "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

15 The motion carries. Congratulations.

16 MR. ALVAREZ: Thank you all.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Congratulations.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. The  
19 combined title private investigator and private  
20 patrolman, number 49, Michael A. Buxton, applying for an  
21 individual private investigator and private patrolman  
22 license. Subject to all statutory and regulatory  
23 requirements. For possible action.

24 Good morning. And you are?

25 MR. BUXTON: I'm Michael Buxton, and I

1 acknowledge that I'm still under oath.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

3 Mr. Buxton, tell us about your business and what you  
4 want to do with your license.

5 MR. BUXTON: Well, this is really just the  
6 start of my business. I seem to have gone backwards,  
7 but I wanted to secure my license first. My background,  
8 I have approximately six years narcotics experience in  
9 Nevada and about six years patrol. I've also spent two  
10 years training the police in Iraq, in Baghdad. And I've  
11 worked for multiple private investigator companies here  
12 in town.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm just  
14 looking up something here.

15 And I do have one question. I know it's some  
16 time ago, but can you share with me why you did not pass  
17 probation with the Department of Corrections?

18 MR. BUXTON: They didn't give me a reason. But  
19 during that time, I was going through a really bad  
20 divorce. And as you saw on my record there, I was  
21 convicted of the DUI while I was working at the prison.  
22 And then I was served with a restraining order at work  
23 by my wife. So I don't, I don't know if they thought  
24 that was a problem or what. But they never specifically  
25 gave me a reason.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.  Is this  
2 and ex-wife or wife?

3           MR. BUXTON:   She's now an ex-wife.  We've been  
4 officially divorced since about 2011.

5           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.  Thank you.  
6 Any other questions of the Board?

7           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:  I have one for  
8 Investigator Maxwell.  That's part of the adverse  
9 information?

10          MR. MAXWELL:  Yes, sir.

11          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:  Do you have anything  
12 else there?

13          MR. MAXWELL:  No, sir.

14          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:  Okay.  And, Mr. Buxton?

15          MR. BUXTON:  Yes.

16          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:  How many police  
17 departments did you work for?

18          MR. BUXTON:  I worked for two.  I worked for  
19 Humboldt County and Lyon County.

20          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:  Okay.  And when you  
21 worked, for about 10 years?

22          MR. BUXTON:  I'm sorry?

23          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:  How long did you work  
24 for each one?

25          MR. BUXTON:  I worked for Humboldt County for

1 approximately 10 years and then Lyon County for  
2 approximately three, I believe.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. When did you  
4 leave Humboldt County?

5 MR. BUXTON: I left Humboldt County in  
6 approximately 2005.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And why did you leave?

8 MR. BUXTON: My wife wanted to move to Reno.  
9 And so I got a job closer to Reno. I applied out in  
10 Lyon County.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And then you  
12 worked for Lyon County Sheriff's Office; is that  
13 correct?

14 MR. BUXTON: That's correct.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Why did you  
16 leave Lyon County?

17 MR. BUXTON: I had a couple friends go over to  
18 Iraq to do contract work. And so I decided to go over  
19 there. It seemed like a good opportunity and good money  
20 at the time.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. On the Iraq,  
22 where you said you trained things in Iraq, do you have  
23 any documentation for that?

24 MR. BUXTON: I just have my -- I've got a lot  
25 of photos. But there wasn't really much paperwork that

1 they gave us. I don't know if I have any exit paperwork  
2 or anything like that.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Real quick, I  
4 don't know, would there be W-2s?

5 MR. MAXWELL: I don't think so, for a separate,  
6 for a private company.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, W-2 for tax  
8 purposes.

9 MR. MAXWELL: Yeah. Not for that.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Then, we  
11 won't require that. Yeah, that was 12 years ago.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. I'm  
13 good.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
15 questions?

16 Any public comment?

17 Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
19 that we approve Michael A. Buxton, who's applying for an  
20 individual private investigator and patrolman, private  
21 patrolman license. This would be subject to all  
22 statutory and regulatory requirements.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
24 have a motion. Do I have a second?

25 All right. For the purposes of moving this

1 forward, Ray Flynn, I will second this. We have a  
2 motion and a second. Do we have any discussion?

3 Anything you want to put on the record?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, I just, I'm just  
5 concerned about the two police departments, leaving.  
6 And then no record about what he says he did in Iraq,  
7 that just gives me a problem.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I can't  
9 speak to Iraq, but I do know I did 15 years on Nevada  
10 posts, and with the rural sheriff's departments, tenure  
11 is something that lacks.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's interesting.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. So there  
14 are officers that go from agency to agency, either due  
15 to job conditions as well as salary. As well as  
16 problems, too. But we don't know. Did we get anything  
17 back from the departments?

18 MR. MAXWELL: Just confirmation that he did  
19 work for the departments.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right. All  
21 right. And what was the date of the last -- the  
22 restraining order with the ex-wife was, what, more than  
23 10 years ago?

24 MR. MAXWELL: 2011.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Nine years ago.

1 All right. We have a motion. We have a second. I'll  
2 call for a vote. All those in favor, state "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Two to one  
7 in favor. The motion passes. Congratulations, sir.

8 MR. BUXTON: Thank you so much.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
10 Number 50, International Protective Service, Inc.,  
11 applying for a new corporate private investigator and  
12 private patrolman license. Aaron T. Jones is applying  
13 for an individual private investigator and private  
14 patrolman license. If approved, he is requesting that  
15 his individual license be placed into abeyance so that  
16 he may become the qualifying agent. This is subject to  
17 all statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible  
18 action.

19 Good morning. And you are?

20 MR. JONES: Aaron T. Jones.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you're aware  
22 you're under oath, sir?

23 MR. JONES: I am aware.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell  
25 us about the company and what you want to do.



1 MR. JONES: Sure. International Protective  
2 Service has been in existence for almost 14 years now.  
3 I started the business when I was still a police  
4 officer. And we're in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona,  
5 California. And we're looking to get our Nevada  
6 license.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And how do we  
8 pronounce our state?

9 MR. JONES: "Neh-vad-ah."

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Very good. All  
11 right. It's been a long day. I thought I heard  
12 something else.

13 All right. Any questions of the Board?

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I do. Gronauer.  
15 Where, the information?

16 MR. MAXWELL: The best information was 2018.  
17 The applicant had a civil judgment filed against him  
18 with Erie County Supreme Court in New York for  
19 defaulting on a company business loan. The applicant  
20 provided me with the paperwork showing that this was  
21 settled out of court shortly thereafter. He provided  
22 proof of payment and final balance showing that  
23 everything was good.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Jones, what police  
25 department do you work for, did you work for?

1 MR. JONES: I retired from the Valencia County  
2 Sheriff's Office, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Where?

4 MR. JONES: Valencia County, New Mexico, south  
5 of Albuquerque, New Mexico.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I don't know  
7 where it is. Where is it?

8 MR. JONES: It's down south of Albuquerque.  
9 It's a small sheriff's office. It's just south of  
10 Albuquerque, New Mexico.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's sheriff's office,  
12 but a lot of big difference.

13 MR. JONES: They have a lot of crime.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. It's a major  
15 safe place to drive, too. You just don't want to speed  
16 there.

17 MR. JONES: That's right.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You want to tend to  
19 stay the other way.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
21 questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
24 public comment?

25 Seeing none, I'll entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
2 that we approve International Protective Service, Inc.,  
3 who is applying for a new corporate private investigator  
4 and private patrolman license. Aaron T. Jones is  
5 applying for an individual private investigator and  
6 private patrolman license. If approved, he is  
7 requesting that his individual licenses be placed into  
8 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.  
9 This would be subject to all statutory and regulatory  
10 requirements.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a  
12 motion. Do I have a second?

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion  
15 and a second. Any further discussion?

16 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
17 in favor, state "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

20 Okay. The motion carried. Congratulations.

21 MR. JONES: Thank you so much. Merry Christmas  
22 to you all.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Merry Christmas.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Jones, it's  
25 "Neh-vad-ah."

1 MR. JONES: "Neh-vad-ah."

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 51.

3 Ralph P. Ray -- come save us -- is applying for an  
4 individual private investigator and private patrolman  
5 license. If approved, he is requesting that his  
6 individual license be placed into abeyance so that he  
7 may become the qualifying agent for Century Security  
8 Management of Las Vegas, license number 1315. This is  
9 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
10 For possible action.

11 Good morning.

12 MR. RAY: Good morning.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you are?

14 MR. RAY: Ralph Ray. And I'm aware I'm under  
15 oath.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And I do  
17 bring attention to the Board, for the record, that I do  
18 know Mr. Ray. I've known him through my employment with  
19 Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. We do not  
20 socialize. It's been quite some time since I've seen  
21 him. And I feel I have no issue voting on this matter.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And Gronauer. I, too,  
23 would like to disclose that I've known Mr. Ray for, I  
24 don't know, 30 some years. And I haven't talked with  
25 Mr. Ray for probably 10 years. And, also, I have no

1 problem voting on this one. That's from my -- I know  
2 him from our previous relationship with the Las Vegas  
3 Metropolitan Police Department.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I don't know him. So I'm  
5 an odd man out here.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
7 Ralph, tell us what you're doing here and what you want  
8 to do with your company.

9 MR. RAY: The company I work for, Century  
10 Security, I'm actually qualifying, qualified agent for  
11 them. I was working with Larry Burns over there just  
12 prior to his passing, unfortunately. He should have  
13 been doing this today. And I stepped in to do it after  
14 he passed away.

15 We currently are looking to possibly expand and  
16 going in the private investigative direction. I  
17 employed one of the retired Metro homicide detectives,  
18 who's working for us currently, is a manager and not  
19 doing anything private investigative-wise. But looking  
20 at going in that direction a little bit with that part  
21 of the license. And maintaining what we're doing on the  
22 guard side currently as Century Security and trade shows  
23 and some fixed post positions.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.

25 Any other questions from the Board?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you for your  
2 service.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Seeing  
4 none, any public comment?

5 Seeing none, I'll call for a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
7 that we approve Ralph P. Ray, who is applying for an  
8 individual private investigator and private patrolman  
9 license. If approved, he is requesting that his  
10 individual licenses be placed into abeyance so that he  
11 may become the qualifying agent for Century Security  
12 Management of Las Vegas, license number 1315. This  
13 would be subject to all statutory and regulatory  
14 requirements.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do I have  
16 a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion,  
19 and I have a second. Any further discussion by the  
20 Board?

21 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
22 in favor, state "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

25 The motion carries. Congratulations, Ralph.

1 MR. RAY: Thank you.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have a good day.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And have a good  
4 holiday.

5 MR. RAY: Yeah, you too.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Item  
7 number 52 is postponed?

8 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So  
10 we'll carry that on to the next meeting, or tomorrow?

11 MR. SALADINO: That'll be postponed to March.

12 MR. INGRAM: That'll be March.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. The  
14 next meeting.

15 MR. INGRAM: March 3rd.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Now  
17 we get ready for the registration appeals, is the best  
18 way to phrase this. Was anyone not here this morning  
19 that needs to be sworn in? Please stand. Anybody that  
20 needs to be sworn in, please stand.

21 Everybody that's sitting, I'm assuming you were  
22 sworn in or you don't need to testify, one or the other.  
23 Counselor, all yours.

24 MR. DETMER: My pleasure. Those who are about  
25 to testify, please raise your right hand. Do you hereby

1 swear or affirm to tell the truth, the whole truth, and  
2 nothing but the truth?

3 (All applicants and potential witnesses present  
4 were sworn/affirmed.)

5 MR. DETMER: When you all come up for your  
6 testimony, before you start testifying, please just  
7 recite that you are under oath, or that you're aware  
8 that you're under oath. Thank you.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
10 Number 53, Alex Holden.

11 All right. Mr. Holden, we will trail that one.  
12 Number 54, Laval Lee Jenkins.

13 Mr. Jenkins, please come forward.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That'll work  
15 better. You guys get along, right?

16 Okay. Vinny, it's yours.

17 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.  
18 The applicant was denied for a 2012 possession of a  
19 controlled substance. It was at a felony level. The  
20 applicant did disclose the arrest on the application and  
21 provide the 1203.4 dismissal paperwork.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Anything  
23 else?

24 MR. SALADINO: That's it.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.



1 Mr. Jenkins, how are you today?

2 MR. JENKINS: I'm doing good, thank you.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you aware  
4 you're under oath?

5 MR. JENKINS: Yes, sir.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What was  
7 the drug?

8 MR. JENKINS: It would actually be tobacco and  
9 cell phones. It was actually a thing where my now  
10 girl -- we're still together, my children's mother.  
11 Basically, her dad actually influenced her into trying  
12 to deliver a bag of tobacco. You know, he's been doing  
13 life, you know, life since she was about two. And what  
14 happened was we drove there, got cold feet. And when we  
15 turned around, we got suspected. They pulled us over.  
16 And there was a little bit of marijuana in the car. And  
17 he also found the tobacco and everything. And we told  
18 the truth from there. And then that's what put us on  
19 probation. And then if we completed probation, it would  
20 get expunged.

21 And that was the whole thing of what happened.  
22 And since then, I've just been trying to be a good  
23 father, basically.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you were  
25 trying to deliver a cell phone and tobacco?

1 MR. JENKINS: Yes, personal. And, yeah,  
2 they -- yeah. Yeah.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What prison was  
4 this?

5 MR. JENKINS: That was, I don't know if it was  
6 in Kings County, close to -- what's that? Close to  
7 Bakersfield, a little close to Bakersfield.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I thought  
9 you said Kings County.

10 MR. JENKINS: Yeah, you know, it's in Kings  
11 County. It's like -- yeah. It's by, I want to say,  
12 Fresno. There you go, Fresno.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Fresno?

14 MR. JENKINS: Yeah.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. A lot  
16 different than Bakersfield.

17 MR. JENKINS: Yeah.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. What  
19 have you been doing for the last seven years?

20 MR. JENKINS: Working. I was in California. I  
21 worked security in California at Stater Brothers and  
22 Walmart. And then my children's mother, she had  
23 opportunity out here to come out to Vegas. So I moved  
24 out here just to be closer to the kids. And ever since  
25 then, I've been working at Verizon. And I wanted to

1 have some backup, you know, just like for holiday time,  
2 just in case I need to get, you know, to get extra money  
3 for the kids or whatever, I needed a little backup money  
4 just in case.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And if I  
6 heard you correctly, because I'm not sure if they heard  
7 it, you're with Verizon or Horizon?

8 MR. JENKINS: Verizon.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What do you do  
10 for Verizon?

11 MR. JENKINS: Tech coach, tech support,  
12 troubleshooting, troubleshooting, if you call, and  
13 troubleshoot the phones, but.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
15 Any other questions from the Board? All right.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What do you plan on  
17 doing with a word card?

18 MR. JENKINS: Basically, I want to -- because I  
19 was doing security in California. And I always liked  
20 security. And I, basically, didn't have the card to  
21 start security when I came out here. And I just want to  
22 get back in it and, also, have a second job so I can  
23 provide for my family.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you worked armed or  
25 unarmed security?

1 MR. JENKINS: Unarmed.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
4 other questions of the Board?

5 Do I call for public comment?

6 MR. DETMER: This is due process, so there's no  
7 public comment.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Then,  
9 I'll call for a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
11 that we approve -- is it grant or overturn?

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Grant the appeal.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we grant the  
14 appeal for Laval Lee Jenkins, who's applied for a  
15 registration card.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion.  
17 Do I have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second it.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion  
20 and a second. Any further discussion?

21 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
22 in favor of granting the appeal, state "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

25 The motion is granted. Congratulations to you.

1 MR. JENKINS: Thank you.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Have good  
3 holidays.

4 David Wright. Mr. Wright.

5 All right. We will trail that one, too.

6 Ahmad Carney. Mr. Carney, please come on down.

7 Mr. Saladino, is this one yours, too?

8 MR. SALADINO: Yes, sir.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And  
10 you are Mr. Wright?

11 MR. CARNEY: Ahmad Carney.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Carney. My  
13 apologies. Mr. Carney, and you aware you're under oath?

14 MR. CARNEY: Yes.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Good  
16 afternoon.

17 MR. CARNEY: Good afternoon.

18 MR. SALADINO: So the applicant was denied for  
19 a 1991 possession of a controlled substance for sale at  
20 the felony level. The applicant did disclose it.

21 1996, possession of a controlled substance,  
22 cocaine again, for sale. The applicant did receive a  
23 prison term for this. The applicant did serve five  
24 years and eight months and a couple days, is what he  
25 stated to me.

1           In 2003, a domestic violence. He received 30  
2 days, it was at misdemeanor level, 30 days in jail and a  
3 year probation. Again, it was disclosed.

4           2008, a DUI where he received three years  
5 probation and classes as well.

6           November 8th of 2018, another misdemeanor DUI  
7 where he's serving informal probation right now. The  
8 applicant disclosed that, upon completing this -- this  
9 is the one -- that he is eligible to be in another state  
10 while he's on this informal probation. So that's -- and  
11 he's got classes. So he's hoping to be off the  
12 probation sooner at the completion of the classes.

13           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So if I  
14 understand correctly, and either one of you can answer,  
15 in California, informal probation means you don't need  
16 to show up regularly for the probation officer, but  
17 you're still on probation in the eyes of the court?

18           MR. SALADINO: Correct.

19           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We do not  
20 normally grant anybody a work card that's on probation  
21 or parole. And you're aware of that. We want to hear  
22 your side. It doesn't mean that we can't. But just on  
23 the record, I've never granted one, so.

24           Tell us why you're in Las Vegas, or Nevada, and  
25 what you want to do here.

1 MR. CARNEY: I'm in Nevada because of the cost  
2 of living, tax purposes. I have my family here as well.  
3 I have three kids that are at Spring Valley High, Spring  
4 Valley Mountain, and Buffalo High School.

5 I enjoy security. My dad done security. I  
6 have my sheriff card. I have my TAM card. I have my  
7 alcohol awareness card. The only thing I don't have is  
8 my PILB card. I do have a non-gaming card, which I  
9 already let you guys know. I feel I should qualify for  
10 it because of the sheriff department gave me a  
11 non-gaming card as well.

12 So I'm currently working at Embassy Nightclub.  
13 And I'm also working at UPS. I'm also working at CNXX.  
14 That's a nightclub as well. So I just need the  
15 opportunity to move forward.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What are you  
17 doing at the nightclubs?

18 MR. CARNEY: Security.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you work for  
20 the...

21 Do you want to ask some questions?

22 MR. INGRAM: So when you are working at the  
23 nightclub, who pays you?

24 MR. CARNEY: Embassy.

25 MR. INGRAM: Do you have a card?

1 MR. CARNEY: Yes, I do.

2 MR. SALADINO: We've actually visited the  
3 Embassy Nightclub previous, and they do have their own  
4 W-2 in-house security that they utilize.

5 MR. INGRAM: Is that the same for the CMXX?

6 MR. CARNEY: Yes. And I had to go through the  
7 sheriff's department in order to get my gaming license  
8 to work for there. Yes.

9 MR. INGRAM: Thank you. Okay.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
11 questions?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The DUI you were  
13 speaking of -- this is Gronauer. The DUI you were  
14 speaking of is 1 November a year ago?

15 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do we have paperwork  
17 that says all this stuff, then?

18 MR. SALADINO: We have paperwork showing that  
19 he is current with his classes. And the reason I  
20 allowed him to come for the appeal for it was the fact  
21 that it was informal probation. And as long as there's  
22 no other arrests or anything, there's no -- the courts  
23 do not worry about it.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And to follow up with  
25 the question that I had earlier, do we ever follow up



1 with stuff like that?

2 MR. SALADINO: We can, yes.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, obviously, we  
4 can. But is it something we do normally, or we just  
5 don't do it unless we find something out?

6 MR. SALADINO: So, typically, these things are  
7 investigated when they move employers. Though there's a  
8 NAC chapter that we utilize. So if they move employers,  
9 then it becomes provisional for another 90 days. So we  
10 can verify then or during their renewal cycle.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
13 questions of the Board?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So do you currently have  
15 a license?

16 MR. CARNEY: I currently don't. And I just  
17 filed the paperwork for California to where they could  
18 not put an issue out and I could have my license here in  
19 Nevada.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

21 MR. CARNEY: So there was paperwork I had to  
22 file. I had to file it after December 30.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: One other question,  
24 please, Mr. Carney. Why do you want this work card?

25 MR. CARNEY: I want to eventually own my own

1 business. But at the same time, I want to get involved  
2 with the casinos and so forth. I've been denied because  
3 I didn't have a PILB card. I applied at about four or  
4 five different casinos. I ended up at the Embassy. And  
5 CMXX club for now. This was the card I was able to get  
6 from the sheriff's department. So I went through all  
7 the process that I need to go through. And now I'm here  
8 at the Board trying to get my PILB card.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
10 Seeing no other questions, I'll call for a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
12 that we continue with the denial of Mr. Carney due to  
13 time and distance and he's still under probation.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a  
16 motion, and I have a second. Any further discussion of  
17 the Board?

18 Okay. All those in favor of the motion, state  
19 "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The appeal  
22 is not granted. We can see you in a year. Hopefully,  
23 your probation will be over, and we'll go forward from  
24 there.

25 MR. CARNEY: Okay. Thank you, sir.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Catharine  
2 Freitag.

3           All right. We will trail that one.  
4 Dontrell Blackburn.

5           All right. Frederick. All right. How do you  
6 pronounce your last name, sir?

7           MR. NNABUIFE: "Nah-bee-fah."

8           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Huh?

9           MR. NNABUIFE: "Nah-bee-fah."

10          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: "Na-nah-bee-fah."

11          MR. NNABUIFE: Yes, sir.

12          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you  
13 aware you're under oath?

14          MR. NNABUIFE: Yes, sir.

15          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Vinny, is  
16 this yours, too?

17          MR. SALADINO: Yes, sir.

18          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Let's  
19 talk about this one.

20          MR. SALADINO: It was a 2011 possession of  
21 marijuana at a felony level where he received a 12 to 36  
22 months suspended prison sentence and was given three  
23 years probation. He did disclose it at the time of  
24 application, provided court documents. The applicant  
25 was honorably discharged from his probation on

1 March 27th of 2014. And he was informed about the  
2 appeal process at the time of his application.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: How much  
4 marijuana did you have? Because a 12- to 32-month  
5 suspended sentence.

6 MR. NNABUIFE: 55 pounds.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 55 pounds?

8 MR. NNABUIFE: Yes, sir.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I'd say.  
10 All right. What have you been doing for the last nine  
11 years?

12 MR. NNABUIFE: I've been doing the personal  
13 bodyguard. It's professional work here and there as a  
14 personal bodyguard.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And who are you a  
16 personal bodyguard for, or?

17 MR. NNABUIFE: Just several musicians, football  
18 players and the rappers.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Where do you do  
20 this personal bodyguard work?

21 MR. NNABUIFE: I bring them to -- they come to  
22 Vegas. And my friend knows them. So they call me, and  
23 I help them out. And they don't come all the time, just  
24 every once in a while.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you know what

1 you're doing is illegal?

2 MR. NNABUIFE: Yes, sir. And they wanted me to  
3 get a PP, a PILB card, so I could get it make more  
4 money.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: When's the last  
6 time you did some of this bodyguard work?

7 MR. NNABUIFE: Oh, like two months ago.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Two months ago.

9 MR. NNABUIFE: But that's a long time.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I appreciate your  
11 honesty, I do. Because we get people before us that are  
12 not honest to us about that. But it puts me in a tough  
13 position right now, that you're doing illegal work, and  
14 you're asking for us to sanction that. You shouldn't be  
15 doing any bodyguard work whatsoever, end of story.  
16 None.

17 MR. NNABUIFE: Maybe they're just trying to  
18 tell me that, too, but I usually --

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm just telling  
20 you it's illegal. I don't care what they tell you.  
21 Just like the 55 pounds of dope, somebody probably told  
22 you to deliver it. That was illegal, too.

23 MR. NNABUIFE: Yes, sir.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
25 questions of the Board?

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So are you working for a  
2 company doing this, or are you just doing this on your  
3 own, they pay you directly?

4 MR. NNABUIFE: They pay directly.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: They pay you directly?

6 MR. NNABUIFE: Yeah. They just like pay me to  
7 walk them in. So the security guards want me to go  
8 apply for doing this. But they know me, so they don't  
9 have to get the card, so they bring the business.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, the only thing --  
12 this is Gronauer. You seem like a very nice gentleman.  
13 The trouble is, and we deal with people who have done  
14 this before, and our practice has been, because of how  
15 it's happening, that we would have to deny. That's what  
16 we've done mainly in the past, at least since I've been  
17 around, how we've done it in the past. You have to get  
18 this stuff together. Because even the places you're  
19 going into, without the proper credentials, they could  
20 be fined, also, even though you're doing it for friends  
21 and all this other stuff. It's a problem. I appreciate  
22 your honesty, too. But you got to stay with what the  
23 law says.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So he can answer a  
25 question?

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, that's why  
2 he's there.

3           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So even if he gets  
4 the license, he can't work individually for, you know,  
5 Joe rapper. So I just want to make sure he understands  
6 that, that if they him the license, he can't just get a  
7 call from whatever basketball player and go work for  
8 him. I don't know if that'll be clear.

9           MR. DETMER: That's my understanding. The  
10 abilities and practice is limited by the license as to  
11 the company.

12           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So do you understand that?

13           MR. NNABUIFE: Yes, I do.

14           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: You have to work for a  
15 company if you get your card?

16           MR. NNABUIFE: Yeah.

17           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

18           MR. NNABUIFE: That's why the company, that's  
19 why the company want us to get it.

20           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

21           MR. NNABUIFE: You know, I'm going to be under  
22 their license to work.

23           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

24           MR. NNABUIFE: He got his own insurance for us,  
25 for security.

1 MR. INGRAM: What's the name of the company  
2 that's hiring you?

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

4 MR. NNABUIFE: I don't even know if I have it  
5 now.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Is it here in Vegas?

7 MR. NNABUIFE: It's here in Vegas, on  
8 Charleston.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Charleston.

10 MR. INGRAM: Do you know the name?

11 MR. SALADINO: Bulwerks?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Who?

13 MR. SALADINO: Bulwerks.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Is it Bulwerks?

15 MR. NNABUIFE: I'm sorry?

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Bulwerks?

17 MR. NNABUIFE: Bulwerks, yeah, I think. Yeah,  
18 I think, it's that, yeah.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
20 other questions?

21 MR. NNABUIFE: And I want to work for Griz  
22 Nightclub. They want me to work for them. But I don't  
23 have no sheriff card. So I was in that same situation,  
24 you know.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank



1 you.

2 MR. NNABUIFE: Thank you, sir.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Saladino,  
4 anything else?

5 MR. SALADINO: Nothing else.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
7 other questions of the Board?

8 All right. I'll call for a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: One more quick question.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: When did you find out that  
12 you need the license? I mean did you -- someone just  
13 started calling you, and because you're a big guy at the  
14 gym, they said, "Hey, come work for us"?

15 MR. NNABUIFE: The guy that was calling me, he  
16 said that he got in trouble before. And he stopped  
17 calling us and said, "You have to get a card," because  
18 he doesn't want to get in trouble. Because he got in  
19 trouble before.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Who's that guy?

21 MR. NNABUIFE: It's Adam.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

23 MR. NNABUIFE: Because he want us to be on  
24 the -- he got caught, that I mentioned, and so he wants  
25 to get it, get it.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, it's Gronauer.  
3 And I don't take pleasure in it, but I make a motion to  
4 uphold the denial of Frederick Nnabuiife, who applied for  
5 registration and was denied.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any discussion by  
8 the Board?

9 I'm going to support this. And understand, the  
10 reason I'm supporting it, it isn't because of your  
11 conviction nine years ago with the marijuana. It has to  
12 do with your doing illegal work. But I can only speak  
13 for myself. If you come before us again in a year, and  
14 you don't do any more illegal activity, and I will  
15 support you, provided nothing else happens.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm in the same place.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah. We just wanted you  
19 to do it the right way.

20 MR. NNABUIIFE: Yes.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So I  
22 got a motion. I got a second. Any further discussion?

23 No further discussion. All those in favor of  
24 the motion for denial, state "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 MR. NNABUIFE: Thank you.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Opposed?

3 All right. Motion denied.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Keep it right. Come  
6 back in a year.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
8 Number 60, Tyrone Hinton.

9 Good morning, gentlemen.

10 MR. HINTON: Good morning.

11 MR. CALDONETTI: Good morning.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Who's who?

13 MR. HINTON: I'm Tyrone Hinton.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tyron Hinton.

15 Okay. And you are?

16 MR. CALDONETTI: I'm Stephen Caldonetti.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And why are you  
18 here, Stephen?

19 MR. CALDONETTI: I'm his former case manager at  
20 the Salvation Army. It's called Veteran Services.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, I  
22 appreciate you coming here and supporting your client.  
23 We don't see too much of that. So it's probably going  
24 to be something nice to hear.

25 MR. CALDONETTI: Yeah.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

2 Mr. Saladino, is this yours again?

3           MR. SALADINO: Yes, sir. All right. So the  
4 applicant was denied for a 1986 child abuse at the  
5 felony level, where he received a two-year -- two years  
6 of probation.

7           2013, it was a misdemeanor battery charge that  
8 was dismissed.

9           2012, there was another battery charge of a  
10 victim over 65, as a gross misdemeanor. The gross  
11 misdemeanor was also dismissed. The applicant did  
12 provide court documents and disclosed that one as well.

13           2012, a gaming, slash, fraudulent acts at  
14 felony level. That one was also dismissed.

15           The applicant listed some of the arrests on the  
16 report. However, the felony was found when we got the  
17 fingerprint report. And that was the child abuse out of  
18 Missouri.

19           And that's why they're here now.

20           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So if I got it  
21 correctly, everything was disclosed except the 1986?

22           MR. SALADINO: Correct.

23           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Hinton,  
24 anything you want to add before I ask my questions or  
25 the Board asks questions?

1           Okay. Well, why did you not disclose the 1986  
2 arrest?

3           MR. HINTON: Because I knew it wasn't a felony  
4 here.

5           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Now, what?

6           MR. HINTON: That one wasn't a felony here.  
7 That was disclosed as a -- that went down, I pleaded  
8 that down to a misdemeanor assault.

9           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right, but the  
10 application requires you to list all arrests. It  
11 doesn't say felony or otherwise.

12          MR. HINTON: No, sir.

13          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why did they  
14 charge you with child abuse?

15          MR. HINTON: She went and she was throwing some  
16 sand at somebody else, and I spanked her a couple times.  
17 And her mother took and she didn't like it, so she put a  
18 case against me.

19          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The child's not  
20 on the forms?

21          MR. HINTON: No, sir.

22          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tell me about the  
23 battery of the victim over 65.

24          MR. HINTON: That was an altercation, and he  
25 assaulted me, I assaulted him. Him being over 65, then

1 I got the case.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why did he  
3 assault you?

4 MR. HINTON: We were in a room, sitting, and he  
5 was talking real loud. And I just asked him to calm it  
6 down, you know, keep it quiet. And he just reached out.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: At a shelter?

8 MR. HINTON: No, sir. This was at -- it was,  
9 it was Veteran Services.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So tell me  
11 about your military experience.

12 MR. HINTON: Three years in the Marines.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What years were  
14 you in?

15 MR. HINTON: 1980 to 1983.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You went overseas  
17 or on a ship?

18 MR. HINTON: No action. We went Okinawa. I  
19 didn't do Korea. I did Philippines.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Okay.  
21 Thank you for your service.

22 MR. HINTON: Thank you for yours.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN GRONAUER: Mr. --

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I'm not done

1 yet.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry. You said,  
3 "Okay."

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm going to talk  
5 to his counsel. What would you like to say?

6 MR. CALDONETTI: He's been in my program for  
7 about a year and about three months. He just recently,  
8 you know, completed it successfully. From the year and  
9 three months that I worked with him, I mean he's been  
10 eager to volunteer. He's always -- you know, his  
11 character, I can't speak more volumes for this man. He  
12 stepped it up whenever I needed somebody to help, fix  
13 the building, help with remodeling. And he even worked,  
14 when we left, he stayed there for an extra four or five  
15 hours at night painting. And I mean he did a lot for  
16 us. And he was like the only one out of like 40 people  
17 that would actually step up.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.

19 Mr. Hinton, one last question. Where are you  
20 employed now?

21 MR. HINTON: With WGS Security.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So you  
23 received a provisional?

24 MR. SALADINO: That's correct, he did receive a  
25 provisional.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.   All right.  
2 All right.   It's all yours.

3           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:   Is it okay?

4           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Yeah.

5           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:   It also said, in the  
6 '86 one, which was before, but also the 2012, on your  
7 notes here it says that this arrest was not disclosed,  
8 either, the gaming and the fraudulent acts.

9           MR. SALADINO:   That's correct.   I misread that,  
10 being that it was dismissed, and the other ones he did  
11 disclose.

12          MR. HINTON:   So I put that on there.

13          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:   Okay.   Put that under  
14 one.   In the three years that you were in the Marine  
15 Corps, what rank did you attain?

16          MR. HINTON:   E-3.

17          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:   Now, you have your  
18 provisional.   And if you get your permanent card, what  
19 do you plan on doing?

20          MR. HINTON:   Sir, the reason why I took this  
21 job, because it was long-term.   And the other guys that  
22 was working, they was saying, okay, we're full-time,  
23 we're full-time.   And then the work went out.   So this  
24 opportunity came up, and I took this job out here.

25          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER:   Do you have family



1 here?

2 MR. HINTON: No, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I think, it's really  
4 commendable that you would show up, do the work, for the  
5 chapter.

6 MR. HINTON: Yes.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I think, that's really  
8 good. I think, it's commendable for you.

9 MR. HINTON: Yes, sir.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because, apparently,  
11 you've had some anger issues, or whatever.

12 MR. HINTON: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So I'm good.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I have a question.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: At WGS, was his  
17 provisional suspended?

18 MR. SALADINO: It was, yes.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So you work for  
20 WGS?

21 MR. HINTON: That's right.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Is that a private security  
23 company, or is it in-house?

24 MR. HINTON: No, ma'am. It's not private,  
25 because they -- we've done dispensaries, cellular, and

1 we've done hotels. We just acquired two shopping malls.  
2 And this is just not here in Vegas, this is in different  
3 states, also.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So are you working  
5 here in Vegas, then, right now?

6 MR. HINTON: Yes, ma'am.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I have a question.

8 MR. SALADINO: So here's probably how I feel it  
9 happened, was being that the applicant was denied, the  
10 company did not have him on the roster, but I was unable  
11 to send a employer denial letter out.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

13 MR. SALADINO: So the employer didn't know that  
14 it was denied.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

16 MR. SALADINO: And, I guess, there was a  
17 breakdown in the communication there.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So was he notified  
19 that he was denied?

20 MR. SALADINO: He received a letter, yes. It  
21 was on October 8th.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, there's a  
23 breakdown somewhere.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The question is

1 more for the staff than you, sir. We're trying to  
2 figure out where the breakdown was. You're not supposed  
3 to be working right now if your work card was denied.  
4 But we'll just -- you may be working in the next 10  
5 minutes. We'll figure it out.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.

8 MR. INGRAM: Did we issue a citation to the  
9 company for failing to put him on the roster?

10 MR. SALADINO: We didn't know he was working  
11 for the company until today.

12 MR. INGRAM: So they will be getting a  
13 citation.

14 MR. SALADINO: They will be getting a citation.  
15 And that's no fault of yours.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So he  
17 wasn't on the roster when we asked, and he was supposed  
18 to be on the roster?

19 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Where was  
21 he working when we denied?

22 MR. SALADINO: We don't know.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. He  
24 applied for a word card. We said no. And he didn't  
25 list an employment at the time?

1 MR. SALADINO: Yeah.

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah. So when they apply,  
3 it's up to the business to put them on a roster saying  
4 that they have worked for us. We actually hired them  
5 onto the roster. And when they leave us, we take them  
6 off the roster. If you don't, then they don't know, the  
7 Board doesn't know where they work.

8 MR. SALADINO: So he can't even be added to the  
9 roster until he's in a provisional status.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: But he had a  
11 provisional status from the beginning?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Right.

13 MR. INGRAM: It's not active.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: He had a provisional.  
15 And the letter saying --

16 MR. INGRAM: Did you change addresses from the  
17 time that you applied, or did you receive the letter  
18 that shows the work card was denied after your  
19 provisional?

20 MR. HINTON: Yes, sir, I did change addresses.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did you receive the  
22 letter?

23 MR. HINTON: I believe, I did, too, yes, sir.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, we  
25 can't fault him.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Right.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll  
3 let you guys put your heads together, see how we can  
4 possibly fix this. You guys do brainstorm.

5 You didn't do anything wrong.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: This is on us.  
8 No, everything's good. We're going forward.

9 All right. If no other questions from the  
10 Board, I will entertain a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm make a motion.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That we approve Tyrone  
14 Hinton, applied for registration, and approve --

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Overturn the  
16 denial.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry. It's  
18 overturn the denial.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Grant the appeal.  
20 Grant the appeal.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So we grant the appeal.  
22 That's my motion.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
24 have a motion. Do I have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going  
2 to support this. I just want to go on the record. I'm  
3 supporting this because I've got time and distance. I  
4 can understand why you chose not to report the 1986.  
5 You reported everything else. And the fact that your  
6 counselor is here with you. And you've done good since  
7 your last involvement with the police. So that's why  
8 I'm supporting that.

9           So I'll call for a vote. All those in favor,  
10 state "aye."

11           (Board members said "aye.")

12           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

13           Unanimous. Congratulations, sir. You have  
14 your work card.

15           MR. HINTON: Thank you all.

16           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 61, Dustin  
17 Hippenstein.

18           MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Hippensteel.

19           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hippensteel.

20           MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Yes, sir.

21           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. That's my  
22 eyes. You're correct. I was wrong.

23           Did you have all these?

24           MR. SALADINO: Yeah.

25           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

1 Vinny, tell us what you've got here.

2 MR. HINTON: All right. So the applicant was  
3 denied for a 2010 felony robbery conviction. He did  
4 disclose it and did provide court documents as well.

5 2014, misdemeanor DUI. This was also listed.

6 There was a retail theft out of Utah that was  
7 also disclosed, at a misdemeanor level.

8 A DUI out of Florida in 2008. This was also  
9 disclosed and was at a misdemeanor level.

10 The applicant listed his arrests and conviction  
11 history and was advised of the appeal process at the  
12 time that he applied.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.  
14 Hippensteel?

15 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Yes, sir.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tell me about the  
17 robbery.

18 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: I was in a very bad place in  
19 my life. I'm not a criminal. I was trying to hurt  
20 myself. And I took a car that wasn't mine, and crashed.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You took the car  
22 by force, it wasn't like car theft?

23 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: No, there was no physical.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, okay.

25 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: But, yes, sir, if that's...

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No threat, or whatever.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And how many  
3 years were you in prison?

4 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Two.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Two. Where did  
6 you do your time?

7 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Well, they, obviously,  
8 transfer you in different places. But High Desert and  
9 Indian Springs.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What have you  
11 been doing the last five years?

12 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Well, I was a hospitality  
13 management major at Florida International University.  
14 So I did hospitality up until I got my personal training  
15 license through the International Board Science  
16 Association about four years ago. So I was doing  
17 hospitality. I was a host at Mandalay Bay Foundation.  
18 And then I left there probably about four years ago,  
19 whenever I was licensed for my personal training. And  
20 then I went to Snap Fitness.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tell us, why do  
22 you want to work in security, why do you want to do  
23 that?

24 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: I just got married in April.  
25 So personal training is very seasonal. It's part-time.



1 So I just wanted to do like a part-time weekend or work  
2 events per se for another, a different company.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you have a  
4 company lined up that wants to hire you?

5 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: No, sir. I've seen posts and  
6 stuff online, and that's why they say, obviously, you  
7 know, you have to go and get your card and everything,  
8 otherwise no need to apply. But like I said, you know,  
9 personal training is part-time and kind of, you know, my  
10 bread and butter. And I'd like to try to do like  
11 security or something on the weekends, my second, you  
12 know, fill probably 60 hours, to take care of the wife.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
14 Any other questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Sir, the DUI in 2014,  
16 where was that, which state, in Nevada?

17 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You got a hundred 80  
19 days?

20 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: I'm sorry?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: How much time did you  
22 serve for that?

23 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: No, that was taken care of.  
24 That, it violated my parole. But, yeah, it sent me back  
25 from my parole from the original sentence.

1 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: He was on parole.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I got that, yeah.

3 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Yeah, it was, obviously, the  
4 original case. That, you know, they just, they put me  
5 in a fire camp where I fought fire up north.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Now I  
7 understand.

8 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: And then they shot me back  
9 out.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Went in a circle.

11 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Yeah.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
14 other questions from the Board?

15 Seeing none, I'll entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Just one question.  
17 Everything is resolved now, there's nothing outstanding,  
18 all the paperwork's done?

19 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: A hundred 20 months is  
21 a long time. That's what I'm trying to get here.  
22 You're not on probation anymore, you're not on paper at  
23 all?

24 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Absolutely not. Basically,  
25 you can clean that up in six years. I was on probation,

1 I mean, I'm sorry, parole after I was released. So it  
2 probably took me, you know -- once you get paroled, then  
3 they, obviously, knock off a little bit more time. And  
4 then, so probably about two years or whatever, maybe  
5 three I did on parole.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you know when you  
7 got off paper?

8 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: I'm sorry?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you know when you  
10 got released off paper from parole and probation?

11 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: I would say, 2016. I have  
12 the document somewhere.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Saladino, you were  
14 pointing to something.

15 MR. SALADINO: Yeah, one of his -- the last  
16 time he paid the courts was June 27th of '12.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And then you went back  
18 to prison?

19 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Yes, that was, yeah, because  
20 that was on the parole.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I have nothing.  
22 I'm done.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll  
24 entertain a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'll move that we grant

1 the appeal for Dustin Hippensteel, who's applied for a  
2 registration card.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I got a  
4 motion. Do I have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second it.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
7 discussion?

8 I'll put on the record I'm going to support.  
9 We have time and distance since you've been in trouble.  
10 You've got a good work history up to this point. And  
11 your honesty and forthcomingness before the Board, we do  
12 appreciate that, so.

13 I'll call for a vote. All those in favor of  
14 granting the appeal, state "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

17 Okay. The appeal's granted. Congratulations.

18 MR. HIPPENSTEEL: Thank you.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You have a good  
20 day.

21 Jeremiah Carrillo.

22 Are you Jeremiah?

23 MR. CARRILLO: Yes, sir.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You realize  
25 you're under oath?

1 MR. CARRILLO: Yes, sir.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Vinny,  
3 it's all yours.

4 MR. SALADINO: So the applicant was denied for  
5 a 2010 misdemeanor charge out of California where he was  
6 originally charged as carrying a loaded firearm in  
7 public. It was reduced to a CCW in a vehicle. He did  
8 disclose the arrest. This is the second time he was  
9 denied. The first time was on 10-21 of '14 when he  
10 tried to renew his work card. And now he's back again  
11 to get his work card.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You waited five  
13 years before coming back. Nothing wrong with that.  
14 Usually, people come back within a year.

15 MR. CARRILLO: I didn't know the first time  
16 that I could appeal it.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, okay. Well,  
18 what have you been doing the last five years?

19 MR. CARRILLO: Security.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Where?

21 MR. CARRILLO: I've been doing it for companies  
22 that doesn't require the PILB. Well, when I first  
23 started doing security, there was no PILB. You just  
24 went down to the -- got a sheriff's card, either armed  
25 or unarmed. So I was doing that armed. And then I had

1 the lovely incident in the state of California with the  
2 firearm. Then, when I came back from that incident, I  
3 still had years on my actual sheriff's card. So I was  
4 still doing work then. When that got expired, I went to  
5 renew it. They said, "No, you have to get a PILB card."  
6 That's was when I got first denied because of my lovely  
7 incident in California.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We don't need the  
9 editorial.

10 MR. CARRILLO: So then I took a little bit of  
11 time off from security. And I've been doing security  
12 again now. I'm working currently for the Segal Group,  
13 who owns the like Pink Boxes, Segal Suites, and a bunch  
14 of other properties.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And if we  
16 were to give you your cord, what do you intend on doing?

17 MR. CARRILLO: There's a company that currently  
18 wants to hire he, because, I guess, they have a contract  
19 with the courthouse, and that's what they personally  
20 want me to do for them, be armed security there for that  
21 contract.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank  
23 you.

24 Any other questions?

25 All right. I'll entertain a motion from the

1 Board.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a  
3 motion to grant the appeal for Jeremiah Carrillo.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We  
5 have a motion. Do we have a second?

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any  
8 discussion?

9 All right. I'll put on the record that we have  
10 time and distance and a long employment history.

11 I'll call for a vote. All those in favor of  
12 the granting the appeal, state "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

15 The motion carried. Congratulations.

16 MR. CARRILLO: Thank you, gentlemen. Thank  
17 you, ma'am.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Patrick Cotham.

19 All right.

20 MR. COTHAM: How are you doing? I'm aware I'm  
21 under oath.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And  
23 you're -- just confirming, your Mr. Cotham?

24 MR. COTHAM: Yes, sir, Patrick Cotham.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Vinny, is

1 this yours, too, even though he's up there?

2 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Did  
4 you guys do any work, or?

5 All right. Okay. It's all yours.

6 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a  
7 1993 possession of a loaded firearm. It was at a gross  
8 misdemeanor level, where he received probation. He did  
9 disclose this arrest on his application, and he was  
10 advised of the appeal process.

11 There also was a 1994 receipt of stolen  
12 property at a misdemeanor level. This one wasn't  
13 disclosed. It was found on the fingerprint report.

14 And then a 2000 out of California, possession  
15 of marijuana for sale, two counts. They were both  
16 felony levels, but those were dismissed. And that was  
17 also found on the fingerprint report.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank  
19 you.

20 Mr. Cotham, on your last arrest, sale of  
21 marijuana, what kind of weight are we talking about,  
22 what was the amount?

23 MR. COTHAM: Sir, it was 11 grams of marijuana.  
24 They called it possession for sale because I had a scale  
25 with me.



1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, that never  
2 helps. All right. On the firearm, 1993, I mean we're  
3 talking over 25 years ago. But I do need to know what  
4 the background was on that.

5           MR. COTHAM: I was young and foolish and  
6 thought I was tough and needed a gun to back up my  
7 actions. I didn't use the gun in any crimes. I got  
8 pulled over by the California Highway Patrol. I didn't  
9 have a driver's license. That gave them probable cause,  
10 and they searched the car and found the weapon.

11          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We'll ask  
12 a question. What have you been doing the last 25 years?

13          MR. COTHAM: I've been raising four beautiful  
14 children. Well, one is 24. I have four kids. The last  
15 10 years, I've been working security in California.  
16 Since 2014, I've had a security guard card. And the  
17 company I work for is now offering me chances to travel  
18 to other states to work. And that's why I'm applying  
19 for a card here in Nevada.

20          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
21 And thank you for your coming forward with all this.

22          Any other questions from the Board?

23          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Cotham, is there a  
24 reason that you didn't disclose the possession of  
25 marijuana for sale?

1 MR. COTHAM: I believe, I did disclose it. It  
2 was possession of marijuana. I didn't put down the for  
3 sales, because the charge was reduced. And I wasn't  
4 understanding that I needed to put down what I was  
5 arrested for. So I put down what I was convicted of.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And you were convicted  
7 of it?

8 MR. COTHAM: I was only convicted of a  
9 possession of marijuana charge.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
12 other questions of the Board?

13 Okay. I will entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. This is Nixon. I  
15 move that we grant the appeal for Patrick Cotham, who's  
16 applied for registration.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion.  
18 Do I have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We have a second,  
21 Any discussion?

22 I'll put on the record that we definitely have  
23 time and distance on this. So I am supporting the  
24 motion. Any other discussion?

25 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those

1 in favor of granting the appeal, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

4 Congratulations, appeal granted.

5 MR. COTHAM: Thank you very much for your time.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.

7 It's like communicating with a space station  
8 (videoconferencing).

9 All right. Patricia Lewis.

10 All right. We'll trail that one.

11 Gene Hobdy.

12 Are you Mr. Hobdy?

13 MR. HOBDY: Yes, sir, I am.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you  
15 aware you're under oath, sir?

16 MR. HOBDY: Yes, sir.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
18 Mr. Saladino.

19 MR. SALADINO: So the applicant was denied for  
20 a 2007 failure to register as a sex offender. It was at  
21 a felony level, where he was found guilty and given 36  
22 months probation. He did disclose this and provided  
23 court documents. This stems from an arrest, slash,  
24 conviction from February 3rd of '98. The applicant has  
25 a no expiration on his registration requirements.

1           There was also a 2012 DUI out of California,  
2 where it was at misdemeanor level, 36 months probation.  
3 This was disclosed, and court documents received as  
4 well.

5           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What about  
6 the disclosed -- well, he didn't disclose the failure to  
7 register and drugs?

8           MR. SALADINO: That was disclosed, yes.

9           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The  
10 failure to register, it was disclosed?

11          MR. SALADINO: Yes.

12          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Was the 1998  
13 charge disclosed?

14          MR. SALADINO: That one was not.

15          MR. HOBDY: What was '98?

16          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The original  
17 charge that you register as a sex offender for.

18          MR. HOBDY: Okay. I'm going to back up, back  
19 in like '85, something like that.

20          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

21          MR. HOBDY: Yeah, I did disclose it, that. And  
22 that's what I thought was the main thing was, because  
23 that is -- I had sexual battery charge, and I was  
24 convicted.

25          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

1 MR. HOBDY: So I did my time, did everything  
2 moving forward. When I got out, I was on probation and  
3 parole. Nobody told me I really had to register. That  
4 really wasn't a big deal. And I had kind of a --  
5 changed probation officers, changed probation officers  
6 three or four time during that, and nobody ever made an  
7 issue out of registering. So I didn't really register.  
8 I didn't make it a big deal. I was working and cleaning  
9 my life and moving forward.

10 My wife and I finally got a divorce. And I was  
11 applying for custody of my son at the time. And then,  
12 when we went to court, her attorney tried to use this  
13 against me as reason why not to grant me custody of my  
14 son. And then it all came out, and told me I have to  
15 register. Okay. And then they came to my office  
16 looking for me, and that's when I was arrested for not  
17 registering. But I didn't realize that I was supposed  
18 to be registering. Now that I do, I register every year  
19 on time.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. But it  
21 states here that you did list that address.

22 MR. HOBDY: Yes.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: My question now  
24 is, what was the circumstance of the 1985 arrest for  
25 sexual battery?

1 MR. HOBDY: That was '85. Yeah, that was a bad  
2 deal. That was drinking, drugs, bad marriage. I was in  
3 a place I shouldn't have been. I got involved with a  
4 woman, not a teenager, she was a woman. I was coming on  
5 to her. She said, no, I didn't stop, blah, blah, blah.  
6 And it just escalated. And they came. They called the  
7 cops. I was arrested. And it went forward like that.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: How much time did  
9 you do?

10 MR. HOBDY: I got two years. And I tell you, I  
11 don't make excuses. I shouldn't have been there. So it  
12 was my fault. And to this day, it's something that I  
13 regret, and I'll take it to my grave.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: But you haven't  
15 had any other --

16 MR. HOBDY: No. That's 35 years ago. No, I  
17 moved forward. To speak to my credit right now, my  
18 character, I'm a Vietnam veteran. I'm a disabled  
19 veteran. I am involved with the American Legion,  
20 American Legion Riders. I'm a public California elected  
21 official to the American Legion Riders. I'm in charge  
22 of over 900 riders in southern California. We do a lot  
23 of work for veterans, veteran issues, community, youth  
24 programs. I also started my own nonprofit organization  
25 in Coachella, which is the Coachella Valley Single

1 Veterans. And I donate back to the single veterans.

2 So I'm trying to do lot of positive things in  
3 my life. And I'm trying to put this behind me.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What do you do  
5 for employment?

6 MR. HOBDY: Well, I'm retired. I was a  
7 California state contractor. I'm retired now. And I  
8 have my Social Security and then my disability with the  
9 VA. And I supplement my income. I work with a company  
10 that we do traffic control, and we have the police  
11 motorcycles, and we have uniforms, and so we do traffic  
12 control of different events. And that's why I need the  
13 card. Once in a while, they have events in Nevada that  
14 they want me to come help them do traffic control. But  
15 I need the guard card. So I can't do it. I don't have  
16 a guard card. This I'll not be doing all the time, just  
17 a couple times a year.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm still  
19 learning. So we require guard cards for if he wants to  
20 do traffic control?

21 MR. SALADINO: So the company that he's  
22 referring to, they contract with CSC at the Electric  
23 Daisy Carnival.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

25 MR. SALADINO: And they're under the care,

1 custody and control of CSC during that event.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So they -- for  
3 all their employees. Gotcha. Okay. All right. I  
4 don't have any other questions.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: It have a quick question.  
6 So I'm just trying to understand the timeline. The  
7 original incident happened in '85; is that right?

8 MR. HOBDY: Yeah, I forget the date.

9 MR. SALADINO: The records that we have, it  
10 stems from a 1998 incident. And it's not even disclosed  
11 really on the fingerprint report other than it talks to  
12 the non-expiring for registration is what it talks to.  
13 And it stems from a, yeah, February 3rd of 1998  
14 incident.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So there's only one  
16 incident, there's not two, one in '85 and one in '98?

17 MR. SALADINO: It did seem like it was just the  
18 one.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

20 MR. SALADINO: And then it was the failure to  
21 register in '07.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

23 MR. SALADINO: And the DUI.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Okay.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Hobdy, where do you



1 live now?

2 MR. HOBDY: Indio. Indio, outside of Palm  
3 Springs.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. How long have  
5 you been in Nevada?

6 MR. HOBDY: A couple hours. Actually, I left  
7 Palm Springs, and I got here, and I've been sitting in  
8 the hallway waiting. As soon as I get done here, I'm  
9 leaving.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you know, if he's  
11 over here and working the Electric Daisy Carnival, and  
12 you're staying overnight or something, you're going to  
13 have to register with the police department?

14 MR. HOBDY: Okay. I'll do that.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, I'm just --

16 MR. HOBDY: I didn't know that.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I mean, before,  
18 you said, "I wasn't told." I want to make sure you  
19 understand that --

20 MR. HOBDY: I will do that.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: -- you have to register  
22 with the Metropolitan Police Department.

23 MR. HOBDY: I'll do that.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And ex-felon and  
25 also the sexual assault stuff.

1 MR. HOBDY: I don't even jaywalk anymore.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I just want to make  
3 sure that you understand.

4 MR. HOBDY: Yes, sir. Thank you.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So that you don't get  
6 confused with that. Because you have investigators at  
7 the Electric Daisy Carnival, and you can get hit with  
8 that again.

9 MR. HOBDY: What would be the best way to do  
10 it, just come into Vegas and find a police department?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Police department.

12 MR. HOBDY: I will.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The Las Vegas  
14 Metropolitan Police Department.

15 MR. HOBDY: Okay.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And register.

17 MR. HOBDY: If I'm granted a card, I will do  
18 that.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I don't know about that  
20 yet, so.

21 MR. HOBDY: Yeah, I know. Move forward.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
23 other questions?

24 All right. Call for a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move

1 that we grant the appeal, due to time and distance, to  
2 Gene Hobdy for his registration card.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We've got a  
5 motion and a second. All right. Any other discussion?

6 All right. I'll call for a vote. All those in  
7 favor, state "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?  
10 Okay. The motion carried. Congratulations.

11 MR. HOBODY: Thank you, sir. Thank you for your  
12 time. I appreciate it.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Listen to my  
14 colleague.

15 MR. HOBODY: I appreciate that.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Noah  
17 Carter-White.

18 MR. WHITE: Yeah.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hi.

20 MR. WHITE: How are you doing?

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you  
22 Mr. White?

23 MR. WHITE: Yes, sir.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And you're  
25 aware you're under oath?

1 MR. WHITE: I do know I'm under oath.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

3 Mr. Saladino.

4 MR. SALADINO: Okay. So this denial of the  
5 word card is kind of unique. This is where we're  
6 quoting NAC 648.344, which once you're added to a  
7 roster, you become into a provisional status again.

8 We received some information in regards to the  
9 criminal history of the applicant. And since then,  
10 we've also had a couple other arrests since the denial  
11 of the work card. And that's what we're here for.

12 I also have a video to play for the Board in  
13 regards to the applicant while he was working with his  
14 registered work card for a company.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So if I  
16 understand correctly, we've got -- we have an arrest  
17 after he was granted a work card?

18 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And we have  
20 video, also, that shows another violation?

21 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
23 Roll the videotape.

24 Mr. White, are you aware of the videotape?

25 MR. WHITE: No, I'm not.

1 MR. SALADINO: Five minutes?

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, we'll take  
3 a five-minute break while we get the IT issues fixed.

4 \* \* \* \* \*

5 (A break was taken, 1:02 to 1:08 p.m.)

6 \* \* \* \* \*

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We'll  
8 proceed.

9 Okay. Do you want to describe what's going to  
10 happen, or just do you want to roll the tape?

11 MR. SALADINO: So this video was brought to us  
12 by a licensee of ours. When we were moving forward the  
13 denial, there was a couple other employers that had  
14 listed on the profile, an internal database for us, that  
15 states why individuals have been terminated from  
16 employment. Upon reading the one for this particular  
17 licensee, I contacted them, and this is what was  
18 provided to me.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

20 (A videotape was played.)

21 MR. SALADINO: So this is a gas station, a 76  
22 gas station. It's going to start again in the  
23 beginning. It's going to replay. That was the latter  
24 part of it.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: This is

1 April 3rd?

2 MR. SALADINO: Of this year, yes.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. They're  
4 not going to be able to hear you, Vinny.

5 MR. SALADINO: What's that?

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: They're not going  
7 to be able to hear.

8 MR. SALADINO: I'll talk loud.

9 So our applicant, the work card holder, is  
10 right here. At this time, it appears he's taking off  
11 his security equipment and gear.

12 At one point, the firearm is passed to the  
13 clerk. The clerk then hands it back, and security in  
14 the back office.

15 And this video shifts now over to where the  
16 video poker machines are.

17 That register and stuff will be over in this  
18 area. And he's going to come into the screen and crash  
19 into the corner.

20 That's pretty much it. The licensee also  
21 states that the other security officer that was called  
22 in, and that one was also terminated.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We've  
24 got two issues. Tell me about the -- what do we know  
25 but the discharge of a firearm, structure?

1 MR. SALADINO: So that was, on December 20th of  
2 2017, it looks like, it appears a couple other times in  
3 SCOPE where it pops up where he had court requirements  
4 from North Las Vegas. I got the police reports for it.  
5 And the summary of it was Mr. White shoots about six or  
6 seven rounds in the air in an apartment complex because  
7 he finds out that his girlfriend was having relations  
8 with another individual. He was identified through  
9 photos provided by the school district to the  
10 individuals that called the complaint in.

11 Then, while he's being on probation or serving  
12 something for the courts, there was another incident  
13 where on, it looks like, February 18th of '18, he goes  
14 into an apartment, starts destroying the apartment. And  
15 then, when the individual comes into the apartment, he  
16 points a gun at them and racks it. That was when North  
17 Las Vegas, when they saw that he was fleeing from the  
18 apartment, and they had him at gunpoint, he states, "Go  
19 ahead, shoot me. I'll get paid. And I'll sue your  
20 ass."

21 With those arrests and then him being denied on  
22 September 9th, we have two other arrests that have  
23 happened. One was for a possession of a CCW. The  
24 police report summary for that one, it was a party at  
25 the D Casino, where the individuals at this party were

1 getting trespassed the from the D Casino. Las Vegas  
2 Metro happened to be in the area. When they got there,  
3 somebody had said, "Somebody's got a gun." When Metro  
4 approached Mr. White, they found two handguns. He  
5 stated he was taking them back to his vehicle because he  
6 was hired to do private security for the party. And  
7 then, most recently -- that was October 8th of this  
8 year.

9           And then the super recent was November 25th of  
10 '19, where he got a conspiracy to commit burglary,  
11 burglary while in the possession of a firearm or deadly  
12 weapon, buy and receive stolen property, two counts.  
13 The conspiracy is the only one at gross misdemeanor.  
14 The rest are all at felony level, along with the felony  
15 carrying a concealed weapon.

16           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So he's got at  
17 least three or four arrests that haven't even been  
18 adjudicated yet, correct?

19           MR. SALADINO: Correct.

20           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Can I ask?

21           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

22           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So did I understand this,  
23 did he have a regular guard card, an armed guard card,  
24 he was fully licensed?

25           MR. SALADINO: Right.



1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And then all these  
2 instances started happening, and that when we took it,  
3 it was taken away?

4 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. White.

7 MR. WHITE: Yes.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You've been busy  
9 the last a couple months. It's not my place, but, I  
10 think, there was something else going on in your life.  
11 I'm just being up front. We can't grant you a card  
12 while you have multiple cases outstanding. I don't even  
13 need to address the violence that we saw in that  
14 videotape while you were employed by someone. And you  
15 started out in the movie about taking off your gear and  
16 taking off your gun and engaged in a fight with someone.  
17 I don't know. A professional doesn't do that.

18 So I really don't need to ask you any questions  
19 because we've got numerous cases that have not been  
20 adjudicated yet. So I will see if anybody else has got  
21 any questions.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Is this a company weapon?

23 MR. WHITE: No, it's my personal one.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
25 other questions?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Were you on duty as a  
2 security officer at that time?

3 MR. WHITE: I was actually on lunch. I was on  
4 property.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. On your property  
6 there?

7 MR. WHITE: I was on property.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What precipitated that?

9 MR. WHITE: Where I was at, it was called  
10 Ensworth Street South, right, a little bit before  
11 South Point. Just 30 minutes before, we had detained a  
12 previous trespasser, and we also detained his girlfriend  
13 at the time. We did that, his girlfriend at the time.  
14 After the police came and all that, we had too much,  
15 because it took us like two and a half hours, it took  
16 too much. We went to the store in front of the  
17 property, which we were allowed to go to. We went to  
18 the store, and he came in making death threats, oh, "Who  
19 likes to snatch girls up?" So I said -- and he was  
20 like, "Oh, well, do you want to pass me the gun? I'm  
21 going to shoot you," and this, and, basically, death  
22 threats and was going really like, "Oh, just stay right  
23 here. Stay right here. I'm going to come back, and I'm  
24 going to show you something." And that's what caused  
25 it.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Carrying the card and  
2 being hired by a security company and all that, you  
3 should be pretty well-vetted and, also, pretty  
4 well-experienced or understanding that 9-1-1 isn't that  
5 far away.

6 MR. WHITE: Okay.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And instead of taking  
8 all the time to take your gear off, put it someplace,  
9 have somebody else handle your gun, and then all the  
10 things that happened, I think, I -- you know, there's  
11 just too much here. I appreciate it. Thank you.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. No  
13 other questions, I'll entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we uphold the  
15 denial of Mr. Noah Carter-White's registration.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
17 discussion?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a  
20 second. All right.

21 I'll put on the record, we've got adjudicated  
22 cases. You've got to, you're going to deal with the  
23 courts before we even consider granting. So I will be  
24 supporting it.

25 So all in favor of upholding the denial?

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion  
3 approved. Your card's denied.

4 MR. WHITE: When can I come back and do it  
5 again?

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You can come back  
7 within, in a year, the soonest you can come back. I  
8 don't know if all your court stuff will be adjudicated  
9 by then. But can you reapply in one year.

10 MR. WHITE: Okay. Thank you. I appreciate it.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
12 Jordenn Lawson.

13 Are you Mr. Lawson?

14 MR. LAWSON: Yes, sir.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: How are you?

16 MR. LAWSON: I'm okay.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good. Are you  
18 aware you are under oath?

19 MR. LAWSON: Yes, sir.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

21 MR. SALADINO: So Mr. Lawson fell into that  
22 same NAC 648.344. Again, this was brought to our  
23 attention from a licensee in regards to the criminal  
24 history that, when the applicant applied, wasn't there,  
25 and then, when the work card was granted, it came about.

1           We have a March 12th, or I'm sorry,  
2           September 12th of '19 was a felony child abuse or  
3           negligent battery. He was found guilty of the lesser,  
4           or a misdemeanor battery. But this was also while he  
5           had the active work card.

6           10-1 of '18, out of Nevada, child neglect or  
7           abuse or endangerment, gross misdemeanor, 364 days of  
8           jail suspended. He was on probation for 18 months. The  
9           applicant's probation was revoked on 9-12 of '19 for an  
10          arrest where he did credit for 25 days and needed to  
11          report to P and P.

12          2014, child abuse or neglect, disorderly  
13          conduct, battery with use of a deadly weapon with  
14          substantial bodily harm at a felony level. He was found  
15          guilty of misdemeanor battery. The battery with use of  
16          a deadly weapon causing severe bodily harm was reduced  
17          to a misdemeanor battery. And the child abuse was  
18          reduced as well. The applicant received a suspended  
19          jail sentence and impulse control counseling.

20          2012, child endangerment. That case ended up  
21          being dismissed by the D.A.

22          The reason we ended up moving forward with the  
23          denial of the work card is that he's currently on  
24          probation for the gross misdemeanor child abuse.

25          Also, there was numerous videos found where

1 Mr. Lawson is using force, searching individuals, using  
2 chemical agents in the performance of this duties. This  
3 is information we do have on our videos of this.

4 Mr. Lawson worked for numerous licensed companies and  
5 has been terminated for conduct that is detrimental to  
6 the company in many cases.

7 As Mr. Lawson stated to me on the phone call,  
8 he's a different type of patrol officer, he's hands-on.

9 And that's why we're here today.

10 MR. LAWSON: And then I didn't state to you on  
11 the phone that I was hands-on. I said some of the  
12 companies that I work for, which is Tac One, that you  
13 told me that was one of the companies that reported me  
14 for moral character, okay, that's what he enforces.  
15 Okay. When we're on patrol, like I don't -- if I see a  
16 resident getting beat up, or a leasing agent, and I'm  
17 armed, and we get called by that resident, I don't come  
18 on our property, sit there in her leasing office and,  
19 "Oh, oh, oh, oh, just give me -- hold on. Let me call  
20 the cops right quick." We're armed, and I detain that  
21 person for Metro to finish his arrest. I'm not no  
22 aggressive or I go after people type of person. That's  
23 what I told you over the phone.

24 As far as all those child endangerment cases --

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Lawson.

1 MR. LAWSON: Yes, sir.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, this is my  
3 hearing. It's not your place.

4 MR. LAWSON: I'm sorry. I'm listening.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And you  
6 don't question my witnesses. Okay. So let's start from  
7 scratch. I've got questions for the investigator, and  
8 I'll get to you.

9 MR. LAWSON: Okay.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is he on  
11 probation or parole right now, Vinny?

12 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Does he  
14 have any court cases that still need adjudication?

15 MR. SALADINO: No.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What  
17 exactly is he on probation for again? Remind me.

18 MR. SALADINO: Gross misdemeanor child  
19 endangerment.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Tell  
21 me about the multiple child endangerment and child  
22 welfare charges.

23 MR. LAWSON: Just because of my -- I was in a  
24 bad custody case with my kids' mother. So she was doing  
25 all this trying to take my kids full custody. Which I

1 just won my kids in custody court and got custody of  
2 them. So it's -- yeah.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you have  
4 custody of the children?

5 MR. LAWSON: Yes.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: She does not?

7 MR. LAWSON: No, we have split custody. I have  
8 them Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday, and she has  
9 them for the rest of the days.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you  
11 supervise -- so you actually have full custody of them  
12 half the time?

13 MR. LAWSON: Yes.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. But you're  
15 on probation for how long?

16 MR. LAWSON: My probation, I was on for a year  
17 and a half. I'm supposed to be off May 16th of 2020.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Uh-huh  
19 (affirmative).

20 MR. LAWSON: I was granted. I filed a motion  
21 in front of my judge, to my probation officer, to talk  
22 to her about me going on security. So she granted me to  
23 carry my firearm as long as I'm on work hours, to stay  
24 out of -- so I can make my hours and stuff, 40 hours a  
25 week, and stuff like that, so I can still -- don't have



1 to do the community service and stuff. So I don't need  
2 my eight hours anymore if I can stick to this in-house  
3 doing service for that month.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And  
5 you've got a video that you want to show us, also, or is  
6 it because he was in the other video?

7 MR. SALADINO: So the videos just show the way  
8 we train folks and using that whole detaining somebody,  
9 where the Metro police ends up releasing them, because  
10 it's only a trespass.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right.

12 MR. SALADINO: So it just, the evidence was to  
13 show how the abuse of power and not understanding what a  
14 security personnel is supposed to do. That's what that  
15 was for.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I have a quick question.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, please ask.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So. Okay. He had a guard  
19 card, and then there was something that happened that  
20 triggered us to investigate, so, investigate him?

21 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And he had his  
23 armed guard card. So. Okay. And then, so when he's  
24 arrested or this has happened, did he disclosed, so  
25 after he had his license, did he go back and disclose

1 that he had been in trouble?

2 MR. SALADINO: Right. But there was no reason  
3 to, because it wasn't a renewal of the work card.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

5 MR. SALADINO: This happened during the  
6 five-year that it's issued.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So they don't have  
8 any obligations as license holders to go back and say,  
9 "Hey, I got in trouble"?

10 MR. SALADINO: Not as for registered work card  
11 holders, no. Licensees will report certain things that  
12 come up to us.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Right. But as the actual  
14 work card holder, they don't have a responsibility to do  
15 that?

16 MR. SALADINO: No.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
19 You've been here most of the day?

20 MR. LAWSON: Yes, since --

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you know, we  
22 don't grant work cards to anybody that's on probation or  
23 parole?

24 MR. LAWSON: Even if I have documents showing  
25 that I can, I'm able to work security while on parole,

1 probation?

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, even if you  
3 have documents. I mean we've never granted a work card  
4 to somebody on parole or probation.

5 MR. LAWSON: Okay.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: But do you want  
7 to run it? How long is the video?

8 MR. SALADINO: There's a handful of them. We  
9 can --

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm asking. I  
11 don't think the Board needs to see them. He needs to  
12 finish his probation or parole or work with the courts  
13 to get it ended. Because that issue alone, we're going  
14 to deny him.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

16 MR. LAWSON: And they also feel, they told me I  
17 could file a motion. But I was like, I only got three  
18 or four months. So I just, I'll be done with it all  
19 anyway. So I told them there's no point in filing the  
20 motion.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What I would do  
22 is, well, you can reapply in a year. And then we'll  
23 hear your case then.

24 MR. LAWSON: Okay.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I

1 mean no reason to run the video, unless the Board really  
2 wants to see it. I don't need to see it.

3 Bobby?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll  
6 entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we uphold the  
8 decision of the denial for Jordenn Lawson.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do I have  
10 a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. As stated  
13 before, the subject is still on probation. He can come  
14 back and see us after a he's off probation, come back  
15 and see us after a year.

16 And so I'll call for a vote. All those in  
17 favor, state "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The motion  
20 carries. The decision to deny the work card is upheld.

21 MR. LAWSON: Do you only have these hearings  
22 every year or something, or is it every six months?

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Every three  
24 months.

25 MR. LAWSON: So is it each and every three

1 months?

2 ACTING BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Every three months.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: But you have to wait  
4 six months until you're off the thing.

5 MR. LAWSON: Okay. Yeah, that's what I'm  
6 saying, can I do six months instead of a whole year?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: July.

8 MR. LAWSON: Okay. So I can come back in six  
9 months instead of a year?

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

11 MR. LAWSON: All right. I'll do that.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good luck to you  
13 guys.

14 All right. Nicholas Patton.

15 Mr. Patton, correct?

16 MR. PATTON: Yes, sir.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're aware  
18 you're under oath?

19 MR. PATTON: Yes, sir.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Who's  
21 the investigator on this one?

22 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're going to  
24 have to come down, so they can hear you, please. Okay.

25 MR. MAXWELL: In January of 2014, out of

1 Mississippi, he was charged with possession of marijuana  
2 while operating a motor vehicle with a firearm. This  
3 was at misdemeanor level. There's no disposition shown  
4 on the fingerprint results. This one he did not  
5 disclose.

6           However, the one that he did disclose was in  
7 April of 2018, again out of Mississippi, violation of a  
8 traffic ordinance, possession of marijuana with a  
9 firearm. This was at felony level. There was no  
10 disposition available on the fingerprint report. He did  
11 disclose the drugs part, but the firearm portion was  
12 found on the fingerprints. The rest was enhanced with a  
13 firearm.

14           The applicant was initially made provisional.  
15 Both arrests were found and confirmed on the fingerprint  
16 report. But he did disclose the 2018 drug portion of  
17 the arrest.

18           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.  
19 Mr. Patton.

20           MR. PATTON: Yes, sir.

21           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Basically, you  
22 disclosed three out of four things. So we want to hear  
23 your side of the story.

24           MR. PATTON: I was arrested for marijuana with  
25 a firearm. I got pulled over. They smelled marijuana,

1 so they did a search. So they searched and found the  
2 firearm. I went to a lot of jail for that. I bailed  
3 out, got a court date, went to court. They basically  
4 just wanted me to pay a fine. So I paid the fine.

5 And then the same thing happened like maybe two  
6 years later. I got pulled over, smelled marijuana, just  
7 pulled me over, searched, found the firearm there, too.  
8 So I, basically, went through the same thing with that.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Why  
10 didn't you disclose both arrests?

11 MR. PATTON: Disclose, as in put both of them  
12 down?

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

14 MR. PATTON: Well, it was the same thing. So I  
15 was figuring that it was the same arrest. Both of them  
16 was marijuana, firearm. So I just put one.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, but you  
18 didn't put down about the firearm.

19 MR. PATTON: Well, I initially thought I had  
20 put the firearm and not put the marijuana. I thought I  
21 had put the firearm, that I did put it.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The other thing  
23 is, is we're talking only about a year and a half ago  
24 when this happened. So where are you living now?

25 MR. PATTON: I currently moved out here, I've

1 been moving out here trying to start some work, security  
2 work. So I've been out here for like -- I came out here  
3 early to apply for the thing, apply for the PILB. So  
4 I've been here like three or four months.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what are you  
6 doing for work right now?

7 MR. PATTON: I work at Old Town Marquee. I do  
8 security there. I was doing security, started like  
9 doing security on Vanguard and Fremont. That's when I  
10 needed my PILB card to do that.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll let the  
12 Board speak for themselves. But I've got two issues.  
13 One is the failure to disclose. And the other one is  
14 it's only a year and a half. And it's not necessarily  
15 the marijuana. It's the fact of marijuana and the gun.

16 MR. PATTON: Yes, sir.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The gun, that's  
18 the issue before the Board, not necessarily the  
19 marijuana.

20 MR. PATTON: Okay.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What kind of gun  
22 was that? I'm just curious.

23 MR. PATTON: It was my personal firearm. It  
24 was a PT809 Taurus gun, sir.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you have it on



1 you now?

2 MR. PATTON: No, sir.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Did you  
4 smoke any pot today?

5 MR. PATTON: No, sir.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
7 Any other questions from the Board?

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you a convicted  
9 felon?

10 MR. PATTON: No, sir.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Have you gone to court  
12 for this last one, the 18?

13 MR. PATTON: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What happened in court?

15 MR. PATTON: I went to court. And, I think, it  
16 was a fine. They just simply, they just really want you  
17 to pay a fine.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What happened?

19 MR. PATTON: But, I think, on the firearm, they  
20 took it.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: How many firearms do  
22 you own now?

23 MR. PATTON: Maybe six or seven.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's just still kind of  
25 up to the laws for carrying firearms and everything

1 else.

2 MR. PATTON: I was just --

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, here, sir. Okay.  
4 It's Nevada, and you can end up in a lot more trouble  
5 here than just a fine. So just to remind you, you have  
6 to make sure you know the laws where you're staying.

7 MR. PATTON: Yes, sir. Well, I'm aware of the  
8 laws in Mississippi, was no firearm, no can have the  
9 marijuana and firearm together.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
12 questions?

13 All right. I'll entertain a motion from the  
14 Board.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion.  
16 Because it's only been maybe 18, maybe 20 months, it's  
17 less than two years since his last firearm violation,  
18 I'll make a motion to uphold the denial for Nicholas  
19 Patton, who appealed the registration.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion.  
22 I have a second. Any discussion?

23 Okay. You understand that we find that the  
24 arrest 20 months ago was too soon to getting your card?

25 MR. PATTON: Yes.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You can reapply  
2 within a year, provided how the vote goes.

3           So I'll call for a vote. All those in favor of  
4 the motion to deny the appeal, state "aye."

5           (Board members said "aye.")

6           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

7           The motion carries. Appeal denied. All right.  
8 You'll be able to reapply within a year. Heed my  
9 friend's advice in terms of figure out what the laws are  
10 in Nevada in terms of firearms. And guns and drugs  
11 don't mix, whether they're legal or no legal. All  
12 right?

13          MR. PATTON: Yes, sir.

14          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Have  
15 a good day.

16          MR. PATTON: Thank you.

17          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Joseph Mumford.  
18 Yes. You?

19          MR. DODSON: No, I'm Van Dodson. I'm the last  
20 one in the room.

21          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, there's a  
22 young lady, there's a couple people behind you. Well, I  
23 still got two more. Let's see what happens.

24          MR. DODSON: All right.

25          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I know you're

1 dying to go.

2 Joseph Huizar.

3 MR. DODSON: I'm hungry.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Van Dodson.

5 MR. DODSON: I'm aware I'm under oath.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

7 I've got a feeling, sir, that you're going to brighten  
8 up the day for me.

9 MR. DODSON: You know what, I sure hope so.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Let  
11 me find you here.

12 MR. DODSON: But I'm going to let you know  
13 right now, when I was working, I don't hate people, I  
14 don't argue with people. I'm an old man. If you start  
15 yelling at me, I'll walk away and call 9-1-1. I'm not  
16 fighting nobody. My job is to observe and report and  
17 not touch people.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We got all kinds  
19 of charges. Let's talk about those. All right.

20 So, Mr. Maxwell, this is yours, correct?

21 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. It's  
23 your time.

24 MR. MAXWELL: Okay. So January of 2008, in  
25 Nevada, malicious destruction of private property. This

1 was charged at the felony level. The applicant received  
2 nine months jail with credit for 47 days for time  
3 served, and 18 months probation. He did disclose it on  
4 the application. But this was disclosed as a  
5 misdemeanor.

6 In 1995, out of California, grand theft of  
7 money, labor, property. This was an unknown whether it  
8 was misdemeanor or worse. This is a wobbler. He did  
9 not disclose, but he did --

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What's a wobbler?

11 MR. MAXWELL: A wobbler could go either way.  
12 It could go as misdemeanor or felony.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: It's an English  
14 term?

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No.

16 MR. MAXWELL: No, it's a legal term.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Really? It's a  
18 legal term, a wobbler?

19 MR. MAXWELL: Yes.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do we have them  
21 in Nevada? Where was I here in criminal law in the  
22 academy when we talked about a wobbler?

23 MR. DETMER: It's a part of negotiations when  
24 it comes to processing the criminal offenses, so.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Really?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You've never heard of  
2 that?

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I love sitting  
4 on this board, because I get educated.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm learning all the  
6 time.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Nevada just keeps  
8 paying me back. Thank you.

9 MR. MAXWELL: No, wobbler means something  
10 totally different in the UK.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Something that we  
12 don't want to put on the record?

13 MR. MAXWELL: Absolutely not.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

15 MR. MAXWELL: Okay. So the applicant did  
16 complete the diversion program for the theft charge in  
17 1995.

18 In the November of 1995, also in California,  
19 second-degree burglary, forged name on access card.  
20 This was at misdemeanor level. Five days jail, two  
21 years probation. This was not disclosed.

22 May of '96, also out of California, petty theft  
23 at misdemeanor level. He was released to another  
24 jurisdiction on a warrant. This was not disclosed.

25 December of '96, also out of California, petty

1 theft of merchandise at misdemeanor level. The  
2 disposition was shown as convicted with probation and  
3 jail. There was no terms given on the report. This was  
4 not disclosed.

5 1997, out of California, theft, misdemeanor.  
6 Probation was reinstated. This was not disclosed.

7 2002, out of California, false check at an  
8 unknown level, a hundred 80 days jail, three years  
9 probation. This is also a wobbler. This was not  
10 disclosed.

11 2004, possession of a controlled substance and  
12 paraphernalia at misdemeanor level, two days jail, three  
13 years probation, not disclosed.

14 The applicant was originally made provisional.  
15 Only the first arrest was disclosed and verified with  
16 the fingerprint report. All other arrests were found on  
17 the fingerprint report.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. This  
19 would have been easier for me if you would have  
20 disclosed all these. But you only disclosed one out of  
21 all of the above. So it's your time to explain to me.  
22 What the heck happened?

23 MR. DODSON: Well, let's see. I was a roaming  
24 bird back in those days, doing really stupid things.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

1 MR. DODSON: And I missed -- and it's my own  
2 fault. I don't blame them. But the last breaking  
3 thing, 13 years ago, when I went to court, the judge  
4 said, "We're dropping this to a" -- to a -- what's just  
5 under, what's that one just under?

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Misdemeanor.

7 MR. DODSON: A little higher.

8 MR. MAXWELL: Gross mis.

9 MR. DODSON: Yeah, he said, "We're going to do  
10 this as a gross misdemeanor." I was under the  
11 impression that that's what I was convicted of. That's  
12 the only reason why I did that.

13 Another thing I messed up in, because I can't  
14 see worth nothing, you know. You know, war does that to  
15 a man. You know, I thought it was 10 years. That's  
16 why. I mean and that's my own fault. All right.

17 If you look at these, this time frame, I stayed  
18 out of trouble. I don't drink. I don't drink no more.  
19 I just want to be a good daddy to my kids.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I understand  
21 that. All right. And like I said, before we started, I  
22 said this would have been easy for me if you would have  
23 disclosed this stuff. You didn't disclose it. So what  
24 I'm hearing you say is that you didn't think you needed  
25 to disclose anything that was more than 10 years old.



1 Did I hear you correctly?

2 MR. DODSON: Because I misread the app.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I know the  
4 app doesn't say that, but, because I've seen it myself.

5 MR. DODSON: I know.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What have you  
7 been doing since 2004?

8 MR. DODSON: Staying out of trouble and  
9 working.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Where do you  
11 work, sir?

12 MR. DODSON: Well, I was at the Peppermill for  
13 almost like, you know, actually six years. And then I  
14 moved out here for my kids, because their momma was  
15 roaming. I set the goal. I moved down here. I've been  
16 at 7-Eleven, probably do two days a week, three days,  
17 you know. And I stayed out of trouble. And I'm not  
18 drinking. I'm not messing with drugs. And if you give  
19 me a chance, like I said, if I could stay out of trouble  
20 this long, I'm done with it. The only thing that  
21 matters to me are those two little mouths I got to feed.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

23 MR. DODSON: That's all I care about. Because  
24 at the end of the day, when the rest of the world turned  
25 on me, you know, they're all I had. And I need to make

1 a living. Right now, we're living in a shoe box. And  
2 I'm scared to say this, because I don't know that you  
3 all won't go call CPS on me. I'm doing the best I can.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I believe  
5 you're doing the best you can. My issue is you didn't  
6 disclose. All right. I'll see if the Board has got  
7 other questions.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: How old are you since  
9 you --

10 MR. DODSON: Seven 13. Their mama was a drug  
11 addict. And I had to step up and be a man. That's why  
12 I stopped all that nonsense.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The year total?

14 MR. DODSON: Yeah. And I got them from their  
15 momma. Momma likes to smoke meth.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
17 questions?

18 I'll entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: From your statement,  
20 you know, I'd love to, you know, give you that hand up  
21 and other things like that. But you didn't disclose,  
22 all these things you didn't disclose. And the reasons  
23 you're giving are just not all that good. We do the  
24 same for everybody. And, you know, I'm just trying to  
25 figure out what's the best move and vote for you.

1 MR. DODSON: Well, I --

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Where would you go to  
3 work, where would you go to work if you are granted this  
4 work card?

5 MR. DODSON: The company security is saying as  
6 soon as I clear this, I can go to work tomorrow. All I  
7 got to do is go over there and show them that I cleared  
8 it up. For 13 years, I've displayed nothing but being  
9 good. I won't even jaywalk. I don't drink. I mean  
10 that should speak for itself. I'm not -- I've made  
11 mistakes. Okay. Nobody's without sin. You know,  
12 but --

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Can I ask a quick  
14 question? Not to interrupt you. Sorry, but.

15 MR. DODSON: That's okay.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Where are you working  
17 right now?

18 MR. DODSON: Well, I get one day a week at  
19 7-Eleven.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: 7-Eleven. Okay.

21 MR. DODSON: And he's -- yeah, I get one day.  
22 You know, we live from place to place to place. Those  
23 kids go to school. They don't bother nobody. They're  
24 good kids. And I don't feel much like I'm bad right  
25 now. And I'm at the -- you know, the PT has just sent

1 me. And I can't give them nothing for Christmas. And I  
2 got a --

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have any other  
4 income?

5 MR. DODSON: No. No.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It bothers me about not  
7 disclosing. But the time and distance on that helps me  
8 out a little bit, okay, a little bit better.

9 But I'll make a motion --

10 MR. DODSON: I won't let you down.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: -- to overturn the  
12 denial for Mr. Van Dodson.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
14 have a motion to overturn. Do I have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other  
17 discussion?

18 All those in favor, state "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?  
21 Nay. The motion passes two to one.

22 MR. DODSON: So I can go right out and then go  
23 to work?

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Slow down. Slow down.  
25 It may be a couple weeks. You talk to him.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. The  
2 appeal has been granted. All right. Work with the  
3 investigator, get your work card. Good luck.  
4 Hopefully, we'll never see you again, or if we do, it's  
5 only for good things.

6           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Merry Christmas.

7           MR. DODSON: Thank you. I won't let you all  
8 down. So maybe I can work. Thank you, folks. Merry  
9 Christmas.

10          MR. MAXWELL: Merry Christmas.

11          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. That  
12 was interesting.

13          Your name again, ma'am?

14          MS. REED: Rochelle Reed.

15          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Come on down.  
16 Rochelle Reed.

17          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Maxwell.

18          MR. MAXWELL: Yes.

19          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. It's  
20 all yours.

21          MR. MAXWELL: June of 2007, out of California,  
22 the applicant was charged with felony burglary.  
23 Disposition was three years probation, one day jail.  
24 This was the reason for denial. The arrest history was  
25 submitted after the denial was issued.

1           In September of 2007, out of California, felony  
2 burglary, three years probation, 180 days jail, not  
3 disclosed. Arrest history was submitted after denial  
4 was issued.

5           January of 2008, out of California,  
6 second-degree burglary. This was unknown. No  
7 disposition was available on the fingerprint report.  
8 This was not disclosed.

9           March of 2009, out of California, burglary at  
10 an unknown level. No disposition available on the  
11 fingerprint report. This was not disclosed.

12           November 2009, out of California, probation  
13 violation, rearrest and revoke. This was unknown level.  
14 No disposition available on the fingerprint report.  
15 This was not disclosed.

16           2011, out of California, burglary at an unknown  
17 level. Again, no disposition available on the  
18 fingerprint report. This was not disclosed.

19           The applicant was initially made provisional.  
20 She did not disclose on the application form, however  
21 did provide an arrest history form after the denial was  
22 received. All arrests were found on the fingerprint  
23 report.

24           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ms. Reed, do you  
25 understand you're under oath?

1 MS. REED: Yes, sir.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The first  
3 question I have, what were you burglarizing, homes, or  
4 were you shoplifting?

5 MS. REED: No. I had walked in with somebody.  
6 I was with somebody. And she went in to go and  
7 shoplift. But I was not with her while she was  
8 shoplifting. I was with -- it shows me walking out the  
9 door. We walked in together.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
11 That's fine on this one. All right. What about the  
12 other four or five times?

13 MS. REED: Burglary.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You've been  
15 arrested a bunch of times.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I've been thinking because  
17 it's violation. But as for that, I only got in trouble  
18 one time, with that burglary, because of me walking in.  
19 That's why I'm shocked. Because all these burglaries, I  
20 haven't been in trouble like that, back to back to back  
21 for burglary. Going in and robbing, I don't do. I'm  
22 confused right now when it comes to four or five  
23 burglaries.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I've got one  
25 probation violation. I've got one, two, three, four,

1 and I got five arrests for burglary.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I think, different  
3 dates.

4 MS. REED: Like I said --

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Maxwell.

6 MR. MAXWELL: We're just confirming now, sir.

7 MS. REED: Because when I talked to -- when I  
8 went in to talk to Paul, I believe his name is, that's  
9 the one he brought up, is the 2007. That's when I got  
10 in trouble. And she ended up going on a highway --

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right.

12 MS. REED: -- pursuit with that.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So, according to  
14 you, all the arrests are one time?

15 MS. REED: Yes.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All the other  
17 entries is because you were having trouble with your  
18 probation or --

19 MS. REED: Yeah.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- not showing  
21 up?

22 MS. REED: No, it was I had got -- I was living  
23 in a complex.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right.

25 MS. REED: You know, when they come raid your



1 apartment, if you're on probation or parole or anything,  
2 you get swept up with that. And that's what I got  
3 swept up with. But I haven't been in trouble.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. How long  
5 have you been living in Nevada?

6 MS. REED: Three years, sir.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 30 years?

8 MS. REED: No, three years.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, three years.  
10 And what are you doing for employment?

11 MS. REED: At first, I was working -- I do  
12 hair. And I was working with day care. I was watching  
13 my friends' kids.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

15 MS. REED: They were paying me like that. And  
16 then, before they denied me, I was doing security.

17 MR. MAXWELL: Sir, if I may?

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, you may.

19 MR. MAXWELL: It looks like arrests one and two  
20 are linked.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

22 MR. MAXWELL: So they're part of the same  
23 arrest procedure.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Got that.

25 MR. SALADINO: And then we got November 17,

1 2009. That was a probation violation rearrest to where  
2 they were revoking the probation.

3 MR. MAXWELL: Yes.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

5 MR. SALADINO: And then 2011 is a totally  
6 separate, standalone, by itself, arrest with no  
7 disposition, meaning they probably didn't prosecute on  
8 that one.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So the original incident  
10 happened on?

11 MR. SALADINO: June 25th of '07.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And she was on probation  
13 for how long?

14 MR. SALADINO: It looked like it was supposed  
15 to be 36 months. Then there was a rearrest.

16 MS. REED: 2010.

17 MR. SALADINO: The January of '08.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

19 MR. SALADINO: And then March of '09 --

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So that arrest was --

21 MR. SALADINO: That was second-degree burglary.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So that was for  
23 another burglary?

24 MR. SALADINO: Right.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

1 MR. SALADINO: And then it looks like the '09  
2 one, where it's just a count of burglary, was linked to  
3 the probation violation. And then the November 17 was  
4 the probation violation rearrest to revoke the  
5 probation. So '07, and then we got three years, so that  
6 would take us to 2010. There was a rearrest in '09.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

8 MR. SALADINO: Then 2011, it's a standalone  
9 arrest.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And 17, which was an  
11 arrest because of the '11, 2011.

12 MR. SALADINO: November of 17, November 17 of  
13 2009.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, okay.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: She was arrested  
16 in November in?

17 MR. SALADINO: '09.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: '09?

19 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

20 MS. REED: Can I say something?

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I got that here.  
22 Okay. So no police contact since '11 with an arrest?

23 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: But she didn't  
25 disclose anything, correct?

1 MR. MAXWELL: No, sir.

2 MS. REED: It was -- okay. My felony for -- I  
3 always thought it was fraud. When I went to go talk to  
4 the PI, he told me it was burglary. From what I --

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. My  
6 question to you is, why didn't you disclose? I mean  
7 even if you told me right now that you disclosed for  
8 sitting in school, I would say, okay, you disclosed  
9 something. You didn't disclose anything. So all is I'm  
10 hearing is excuses.

11 MS. REED: No, I'm not --

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And my question  
13 is, why didn't you disclose any of these arrests?

14 MS. REED: Because I figured because it was so  
15 long, I read the paper, and it said 10 years.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Where did you --

17 MS. REED: 10 years or longer. On the  
18 application, when I put in the application.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Our application  
20 has never said 10 years or longer.

21 MS. REED: So that's why I didn't put it,  
22 because it was in two thousand --

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did you hear what  
24 I said? Our application has never had a time period on  
25 it. It says "Have you been arrested?"

1 MS. REED: You're right. But I thought it said  
2 the last 10 years or --

3 MR. MAXWELL: There's no time limit on it.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We  
5 could --

6 MS. REED: Okay. That's my mistake. That's my  
7 mistake.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Well,  
9 you didn't even disclose one thing. The gentleman  
10 before you at least disclosed some things. But you  
11 didn't disclose anything.

12 So I'll see what the Board does. What I have  
13 normally done is request that you come back again and  
14 fill out the application correctly.

15 MS. REED: Within a year, sir?

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: In a year. One  
17 of my biggest issues right now is the fact you said that  
18 you read it and it said only the last 10 years. I know  
19 what the application says. There's no time limit on  
20 that. So you couldn't have read our application.

21 Anyway, I'm done. Does the Board got any other  
22 questions?

23 I'll entertain a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we uphold the  
25 denial of Ms. Rochelle Reed for her registration.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
3 discussion?

4 So, for the record, you didn't disclose  
5 anything. And you didn't fill out the application  
6 correctly. But we will allow you to come back within a  
7 year, fill out the application correctly. You know  
8 everything you need to disclose.

9 MS. REED: Right.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And we'll see  
11 what happens then. We do have time and distance. We  
12 just don't have the actual information.

13 So that said, I have a motion. I have a  
14 second. No further discussion. All those in favor,  
15 state "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 ACTING BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Any opposed?

18 Okay. The appeal is denied.

19 All right. We got a bunch of them trailed. So  
20 I need to call them for the record.

21 MR. INGRAM: Is there anybody in the north at  
22 all?

23 MS. KLEMME: No.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: There's nobody  
25 here. So what I probably will do -- I don't need to

1 call them, I could just do a block vote, right?

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We don't have  
4 anybody. Oh, we got a yes. I got a yes.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I stopped talking.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We're  
7 going to do a block vote. And my motion is that the  
8 following will be denial of their appeals.

9 And, Kevin, why don't you call that as you see  
10 it, what's on here.

11 MR. INGRAM: Sure. I have item number 53 on  
12 the agenda, item number 55, item number 57, 58, 64, 69,  
13 70, 73 and 74.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That is correct  
15 on my sheet, also. So that's the motion. And those  
16 that -- we're going to do a block vote that we will deny  
17 their appeals. Do I have a motion?

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Or a second?

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do I have  
20 a second? I made the motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second whatever you  
22 said.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I third.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion,  
25 and I have a second. Any other discussion?

1 No other discussion. All those in favor, state  
2 "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

5 The motion carries.

6 All right. Do we have any other business  
7 today?

8 MR. INGRAM: No. That concludes our business  
9 for today. We will start with the number 75  
10 disciplinary hearing tomorrow morning at 9:00 a.m., same  
11 place.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank  
13 you up north, look forward to seeing you tomorrow.

14 MR. INGRAM: Do you want to do one more call  
15 for public comment?

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, I'm sorry.  
17 Nobody go. Any other public, is there any public  
18 comment at the end of the day today? Anybody want to  
19 say anything?

20 All right. Does anybody up north want to say  
21 anything?

22 Thank you. Have a good day. We're adjourned.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. This  
4 is the meeting of the Private Investigators Licensing  
5 Board for the State of Nevada. Today is the 11th of  
6 December, approximately 9:15 a.m.

7 And we will start. Mr. Ingram, can we do a  
8 roll call?

9 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. Acting Chair Raymond  
10 Flynn?

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Here.

12 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon?

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here.

14 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Gronauer?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Here.

16 MR. INGRAM: We have a quorum.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We have a quorum.

18 All right. Reference public comment. Members  
19 of the general public may comment on matters appearing  
20 on the agenda and may bring matters not appearing on the  
21 agenda to the attention of the Board. The Board may  
22 discuss the matters not appearing on the agenda but may  
23 not act on the matters at this meeting. If the Board  
24 desires, the matters may be placed on a future agenda  
25 for action. Public comments may be limited to five

1 minutes per person at the discretion of the Chairman but  
2 will not be restricted according to viewpoint.

3 In addition to public comment being taken at  
4 the beginning and the end of the meeting, public comment  
5 may be accepted after each agenda item prior to the  
6 Board taking action. However, prior to the commencement  
7 and conclusion of a contested case or a quasi-judicial  
8 proceeding that may affect the due process rights of an  
9 individual, the Board will not consider public comment  
10 pursuant to NRS 233B.126.

11 And, I believe, both of ours are quasi-judicial  
12 today, correct, or do we have anything non?

13 MR. INGRAM: No.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So,  
15 to start off with, is there any public comment this  
16 morning?

17 Okay. And we don't have any up north. So.

18 All right. Mr. Ingram, what's our first agenda  
19 item this morning?

20 MR. INGRAM: All right. So items number 75 and  
21 76, we're waiting on a couple of individuals to show.  
22 So if we could trail those two items and jump into item  
23 number 77.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Item  
25 number 77. Torrey Mitchell is appealing the issuance

1 of Citation 1-0007-19 to the Board pursuant to NRS  
2 648.165. For possible action.

3 MR. INGRAM: So item number 77, the Attorney  
4 General's Office has attempted to serve Mr. Mitchell on  
5 three different occasions, to no avail. We cannot prove  
6 that he was ever served.

7 So with that respect, we really can't take  
8 action on him. Nor can we move forward with collecting  
9 on a citation. So right now, we pretty much have to let  
10 it be the way it is. If he comes back into Nevada and  
11 conducts unlicensed activity again, at that time, we  
12 could take action.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And as we  
14 discussed earlier, in the interim, well, let's find out  
15 what state we believe he is residing in, and contact  
16 that local licensing authority and let them know the  
17 situation we have.

18 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. We'll do that.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
20 Since there's been no action or vote, so we'll move on  
21 to the next item.

22 MR. INGRAM: So item number 78 is a review,  
23 discussion and possible approval of the Settlement  
24 Agreement and Release in the matters of Gallian Welker &  
25 Beckstrom, L.C., and Raelene Palmer v., or vs. State of

1 Nevada, Office of the Attorney General, PILB, and ESI  
2 Security Services, and ESI Security Services vs. PILB,  
3 Cross-Claim, Case Number A-18-782763-C. For possible  
4 action.

5 MR. DETMER: And good morning. Mike Detmer,  
6 for the record, from the Attorney General's Office.

7 This agenda item, as Director Ingram has  
8 expressed, is for the possible review, discussion and  
9 possible approval of the Settlement Agreement, the cause  
10 of which is a civil complaint that was filed against  
11 multiple parties, including the Board.

12 We can go on to this matter on the record. But  
13 if the Board feels like it would benefit from a closed  
14 session discussion, I can give additional background  
15 information in a closed session.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, I would like  
17 that.

18 MR. DETMER: So if the court -- court. If the  
19 Board would like to go into a closed session, we can go  
20 off record, and we would excuse the public, and we could  
21 have that discussion.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We'll  
23 go into closed session. The public's excused. We'll  
24 call you when we're ready.

25 \* \* \* \* \*

1 (At 9:23 a.m., a closed session began, and a discussion  
2 was held off the record. Present were the members of  
3 the Board, Mr. Detmer, Mr. Ingram and Mr. Saladino. At  
4 9:42 a.m., the meeting was then opened back up to the  
5 public and resumed as follows.)

6 \* \* \* \* \*

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We just  
8 finished our closed session. And let's proceed.

9 MR. DETMER: Good morning. We're back on the  
10 record on agenda item 78. This is Mike Detmer from the  
11 Attorney General's Office, for the record.

12 As said before, this is for review, discussion  
13 and possible approval of the settlement, of the  
14 Settlement Agreement and Release in the matters of  
15 Gallian Welker & Beckstrom, et cetera, et cetera. This  
16 has been previously mentioned as far as the actual  
17 agenda item. I won't keep on reciting it. We just got  
18 back from a closed session in which we discussed the  
19 instant litigation.

20 In summary of this matter, as stated before,  
21 this is a civil complaint that was filed by plaintiffs  
22 Raelene Palmer, Gallian Welker, the law firm of Gallian  
23 Welker & Beckstrom against multiple defendants,  
24 including the Nevada Attorney General's Office, the  
25 Private Investigators Board, as well as ESI Security

1 Services.

2           And in very brief summary of the facts, circa  
3 2015, administrative disciplinary proceedings were  
4 initiated against the licensee, ESI Security Services,  
5 by Raelene Palmer on behalf of the Board while she was  
6 employed by the Nevada Attorney General's Office. In  
7 the course of these proceedings, Ms. Palmer left the  
8 Attorney General's Office, left the Attorney General's  
9 office but continued to, was allowed to continue to  
10 participate in the administrative proceedings since the  
11 prosecution thereof.

12           The civil complaint seeks -- and, again, this  
13 is in very brief summary. The civil complaint seeks  
14 damages asking for restitution for the services provided  
15 for prosecution of this, of the ESI proceedings. It's  
16 important to note that after the complaint was filed,  
17 ESI Security Services answered the complaint, along with  
18 a cross-claim seeking equitable indemnity against the  
19 Private Investigators Licensing Board.

20           With that, I would submit. I'm happy to answer  
21 any questions the Board may have. This is for  
22 discussion, review and possible action on approval of  
23 the Settlement Agreement. If the Board does approve the  
24 Settlement Agreement, it would be appreciated if the  
25 Chairman would sign. If it doesn't, then we will -- if

1 the Board does not approve, then we can go into further  
2 discussion as far as where to go from here.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Me  
4 personally, I thought we were thoroughly briefed. I  
5 don't know, does anybody have any questions?

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I do not.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: None.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And,  
9 then, in that case, I'll call for a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
11 that we accept the Settlement Agreement.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a  
13 motion. Do I have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second it.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
16 further discussion?

17 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
18 in favor, state "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

21 Okay. The motion carried. Thank you.

22 MR. DETMER: Thank you, Board.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. The  
24 next item?

25 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Reid, are you ready for --

1 MR. REID: Can we do Alfonso Redic at this  
2 point?

3 MR. INGRAM: I'm sorry?

4 MR. REID: Can we do Alfonso Redic, the next  
5 one, now?

6 MR. INGRAM: Sure.

7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Vinny, is  
8 this yours?

9 MR. SALADINO: Just the denial part of this,  
10 yes.

11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Give us a  
12 summary.

13 MR. SALADINO: So the applicant applied on  
14 October 30th of '19. His application was denied because  
15 of the three outstanding unlicensed activity citations.  
16 They're dated January 14th of 2019, January 16th of  
17 2019, and March 21st of 2019. I believe, he has entered  
18 into a payment plan. I'll defer to Investigator  
19 Swarthout for that information.

20 MR. SWARTHOUT: The applicant has entered into  
21 a payment plan.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You've got to  
23 speak up.

24 MR. SWARTHOUT: Mr. Redic has entered into a  
25 payment plan. He is current on his payment plan with



1 the Board. I can provide copies to the Board if they so  
2 need to see it.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Remind me what  
4 the fine was.

5 MR. SWARTHOUT: So he entered a payment plan on  
6 the three citations. The first one was 2,500. The  
7 second one was 5,000. And the third one was 10,000.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And when  
9 will this all be paid up based on the schedule?

10 MR. SWARTHOUT: The payment plan is set for one  
11 year. And then it would be renegotiated at the end of  
12 that year.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Renegotiated  
14 what, continue payments?

15 MR. SWARTHOUT: Continue payments.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you guys are  
17 good with this?

18 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Redic came into our office  
19 with his counsel, Mr. Reid. And we discussed a payment  
20 plan. He provided a down payment of 1,500, 500 per  
21 citation as a down payment. And then we have him set up  
22 on \$300 a month thereafter, to be renegotiated at the  
23 end of a one-year period of time. He is under the  
24 understanding that if he pays it off sooner, obviously,  
25 the renegotiated amounts could go down.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.

2           MR. INGRAM:   And it is something that we  
3 entered into voluntarily.

4           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   All right.   And  
5 what is the -- just to remind the Board here, what is  
6 the status of his work card?

7           MR. SWARTHOUT:   He does not have one at this  
8 time.

9           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN:   Okay.

10          MR. INGRAM:   I'll give you a little bit more of  
11 an overview, if I may.   Mr. Redic was a party to another  
12 unlicensed activity citation that was given to another  
13 individual.   He was working with a group of individuals  
14 one night.   And the other individual spoke to Mr. Redic  
15 and said, "You need to make things right with the  
16 Board."

17          So Mr. Redic came in, and he said he wanted to  
18 make things right with the Board.   He didn't understand  
19 the severity of the occurrences, wanted to get things  
20 right, wanted to go ahead and apply for a work card so  
21 that he could continue working legally for a licensed  
22 holder.   I discussed with him and his attorney that I  
23 can't grant that, that that would be something that  
24 would have to be approved by the Board, for him to move  
25 forward with a work card, since he had not sat down with

1 us. But if he wanted to enter into the payment plan and  
2 apply for a work card, I explained to him that we would  
3 deny him that day, which we did, and that he would have  
4 the opportunity to appeal to the Board to assist him and  
5 continue his payment plan.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

7 MR. INGRAM: That's all.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And  
9 then, looking at the package here, there's no criminal  
10 history for Mr. Redic, right, not even a traffic ticket,  
11 that we know of?

12 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. Okay. All  
14 right. Mr. Redic, do you or your counsel have anything  
15 you want to say?

16 Do we need to do oath?

17 MR. DETMER: Yes.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So  
19 everybody needs to do an oath before.

20 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Plant, do you want to go ahead  
21 and stand, so we can swear you in at the same time?

22 MR. DETMER: And for those who are going to  
23 testify, do you hereby swear, swear or affirm to tell  
24 the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

25 (All applicants and potential witnesses present

1 were sworn/affirmed.)

2 MR. DETMER: Thank you.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Reid, do you  
4 have any questions, anything you want to say to us?

5 MR. REID: Sure. This is Stephen Reid, counsel  
6 for Alfonso Redic.

7 Members of the Board, this was a  
8 misunderstanding from my client, from several clients  
9 here. They've been employed for, I know, for many  
10 years. They were not under the notion that they needed  
11 to have this license. They were not aware about this.

12 He got the first one. Twice, the same. The  
13 second one, that's when he came to my office. He wasn't  
14 actually aware of the third one until he went to,  
15 actually went to the Director's office and they detailed  
16 that.

17 So he does understand that he needs his work  
18 card, he needs the business to be licensed, and he needs  
19 to be under a licensed person who has with the PILB  
20 Board, and to make sure that he is doing everything he  
21 needs to do safely and adequately and has the correct  
22 training, and that he's not doing what he was doing  
23 before. Because his employment terminated, and he just  
24 was paid just to do what he was doing.

25 But we're in a different stage now. He

1 realizes what's going on. And that's why we both, that  
2 we came to the Executive Director's office and came to  
3 this path, this planned payment, and to get on the right  
4 track.

5 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anything you want  
6 to say?

7 MR. REDIC: Pretty much he summed up  
8 everything. I was unaware of the whole process. So I'm  
9 aware. We sat down with Kevin, and he explained  
10 everything. And I'm pretty much up on it now.

11 MR. REID: And the Executive Director spent  
12 almost two hours with us going through a lot of  
13 different details. And so, and, I think, it hit home  
14 exactly how intense and difficult these processes are.

15 But, once again, if he's able to get his work  
16 card, he does want to find a licensed person to work  
17 under and work with so that he can be employed by that  
18 person. Right now, he's working as a security at Crazy  
19 Horse.

20 MR. REDIC: Crazy Horse.

21 MR. REID: And so he wants to, he wants to move  
22 away from that and work with someone.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you  
24 working full-time now?

25 MR. REDIC: Part-time.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Part-time.

2 That's your only employment right now?

3           MR. REDIC: Only employment, yes.

4           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: How long have you  
5 lived in Nevada?

6           MR. REDIC: I'm from here.

7           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you're from  
8 here?

9           MR. REDIC: Yes.

10          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I don't have  
11 anything else.

12          BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I just want to be clear.  
13 So all of this information, all that -- okay. So, with  
14 that.

15          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I just need a  
16 clarification, also, and even -- and you could give him  
17 a work card or grant him a work card, because you can't.  
18 But did he reapply for a work card?

19          MR. INGRAM: He applied at that time. When he  
20 came in to discuss the payment plan with me, I explained  
21 the process for a work card, that he needed to get one.  
22 So he applied that day. We denied him that day.

23          BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So he didn't have a work  
24 card?

25          MR. INGRAM: He never had a work card.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And my other  
2 question, yeah, so what's this process now? If we, if  
3 we, the Board, agrees on this agreement for payment,  
4 what's this, where are we at with his work card, to do?

5 MR. INGRAM: Today you're making a decision on  
6 whether you're going to uphold the denial or if you're  
7 going to grant him his work card. If you do grant him  
8 his work card, he'll have a work card this afternoon.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The payment  
10 plan's already been set.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: My biggest thing is I  
12 want to make sure. And I'm doing the motion. Okay.  
13 Oh, I'm doing the motion.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So  
15 just so we have clarification, especially for the  
16 record, Mr. Redic was engaged in unlicensed activity and  
17 received citations for that, has admitted to the  
18 unlicensed activity, and he's making payments, and a  
19 payment plan that you're agreeable with?

20 MR. INGRAM: Yes.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We told  
22 him that he needs to be licensed to continue with his  
23 profession. So he has applied for a work card. Because  
24 of the status, and you didn't have the authority to give  
25 it to him, you guys automatically denied the work card.

1 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So he's here  
3 doing everything we've asked him to do to make his  
4 activity legal, plus paying the fine for the unlicensed  
5 activity.

6 So I will entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion.  
8 Gronauer. I'll make a motion that -- we are in entering  
9 him with the payment plan. So I'm making a motion,  
10 that's knowing the back story here, that Mr. Redic be  
11 granted a work card at this time.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a  
13 motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'd like to just add  
15 one amendment to it. But with this situation, that he  
16 continues to pay and we follow through with it.

17 MR. REID: Yes.

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, and that's  
19 a question for counsel. Can we, if he was to fall  
20 behind on payments or choose not to make any more  
21 payments, could we hold his card, then, for disciplinary  
22 reasons?

23 MR. DETMER: Does your regulations and statute  
24 have a provision for conditional issues of work cards in  
25 the sense that if you grant him this work card on the



1 condition that he maintain payments, or something to  
2 that effect?

3 MR. INGRAM: There's nothing in the statute  
4 that says that. However, traditionally, the Board has  
5 been given the ability to set conditions on work cards.  
6 The example I'll give you, that has happened several  
7 times with the Board, is an individual who's a peace  
8 officer who wants to get a work card to only do mystery  
9 shopping. The Board has granted on three separate  
10 occasions a work card that could only be used for  
11 mystery shopping and cannot be used for any other types  
12 of security. The Board has granted conditions before.  
13 But we don't have a statute that specifically says that.

14 MR. DETMER: I have read opinions that have  
15 said that, that is, the ability to lay conditions is  
16 inherent to the ability to issue a license specifically.  
17 But, I think, that might be parallel with word cards.

18 MR. REID: And if I may, from my review of the  
19 rules, is that there's no rule saying that you can't do  
20 it. So there's no reason why you can't do it. So  
21 there's no reason why you can't do it.

22 So I've spoken to my client and have explained  
23 that if the Board does decide that he's complied and  
24 he's making the payments, that there will be no issues.  
25 I mean, I think, practically, what can happen is that if

1 he were not making the payments, then he could go on the  
2 next Board here on an agenda item to say, "Go forth with  
3 action. He's not making the payments like he's supposed  
4 to," and his card would be suspended at that point.

5 And my client understands that, and he does  
6 want to continue to pay it so he can keep his work card.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, it's not on  
8 discussion of this motion of mine.

9 MR. REID: Sorry.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: There's no discussion  
11 of it. I understood from the beginning that in a year,  
12 we're to review it. So that may give some standing at  
13 that point.

14 MR. REID: Okay.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The standing at that  
16 point, if he doesn't follow through, and a year later we  
17 look at it again, and we can do whatever we might be  
18 able to do at that time.

19 MR. DETMER: Right.

20 MR. INGRAM: Well, the other thing that's  
21 outlined in the payment plan is that if he defaults,  
22 that we can move forward with collections through the  
23 Controller's Office. The Controller's Office passed a  
24 rule a couple of sessions ago actually, not this last  
25 session, but before, that said if somebody is in debt to

1 the State of Nevada, that the Controller's Office can  
2 mandate that the licensing board that issued the card  
3 could revoke. But that's without due process.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

5 MR. INGRAM: So there's a lot of different  
6 things in place that would present us from falling into.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because they were  
8 involved.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you want to  
10 add to your motion that we'll get a status update in one  
11 year?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Add on to the motion  
13 that we will get a status update in one year.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion.  
15 Do I have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'll second.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any  
18 further discussion?

19 All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

22 The motion carried. Congratulations.

23 MR. REID: Thank you very much.

24 MR. REDIC: Thank you.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

1 MR. INGRAM: It looks like we can move forward  
2 with item number 75, Mr. Adam Plant.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Item  
4 number 75, the continuation of the disciplinary hearing  
5 for Adam Plant, R-085960, pursuant to NRS 648.156. For  
6 possible action.

7 Good morning.

8 MR. PLANT: Good morning.

9 MR. REID: Good morning. Stephen Reid for the  
10 respondent in this case, Mr. Plant.

11 MS. BORDELOVE: I'm Rosalie Bordelove, on  
12 behalf of the Board.

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Can you guys hear  
14 Rosalie?

15 MS. BORDELOVE: I'll move down.

16 (There was a minute off the record.)

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Do  
18 you want to state it again, to make sure she got it?

19 MS. BORDELOVE: Sure. I'm Rosalie Bordelove,  
20 for the Board.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

22 MS. BORDELOVE: I think, I can start here, or.

23 MR. REID: We started at the last hearing,  
24 which was a few months ago now, but that the last  
25 closing, that Rosalie had done her closing argument.

1 However, it's been some months, so we agreed that she  
2 would summarize her closing, or she wouldn't do the  
3 whole closing again, because we were before the Board  
4 just a few months ago. I understand you guys have the  
5 transcripts from the last. However, those are best, but  
6 because of the time, that she had some more time to  
7 explain to you her closing.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sure. I mean I  
9 don't have an issue. Kevin sent us the transcripts, and  
10 he ordered us to read it on our weekend, but.

11 MS. BORDELOVE: I'm going to be pretty brief.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You take, you do  
13 what you need to do.

14 MS. BORDELOVE: I plan to be pretty brief,  
15 because I do know you have the transcript. And I had a  
16 chance to review what happened last time. And I had at  
17 the last hearing given the closing. Mr. Reid had begun  
18 his closing and then was cut off because we lost our  
19 remote part and our stenographer, and so we had to end  
20 the meeting then. So I'm just going to summarize pretty  
21 briefly.

22 At the last hearing, I showed to you that the  
23 respondent here had five unlicensed activity citations  
24 between August of 2018 and January of 2019. He had a  
25 meeting with the Board, after the first citation, where

1 the Board gave him a licensing application and explained  
2 some of the issues. And so I'm just going to kind of  
3 remind of those facts and what we had gone through, and  
4 remind you of the two applicable statutes we're looking  
5 at here. NRS 648.060 is the provision that was violated  
6 with the unlicensed activity. And NRS 648.156 is the  
7 provision regarding his registered work card.

8 Revocation is kind of the only option you're  
9 given. It's not as broad as it is for anything you can  
10 do on licensees. However, it is a permit that is your  
11 choice whether or not to revoke. And it's that the  
12 Board may revoke upon a finding that that work card  
13 holder has violated a provision of the chapter. And so  
14 it's up to the Board today whether that's something they  
15 want to do.

16 Since our last hearing, Mr. Plant has entered  
17 into a payment plan with the Board on the citations. He  
18 is current on that payment plan. I think, either, 1,800  
19 or 2,100 has been paid towards it. But he is current on  
20 payments. So I'm not positive which payment we're at  
21 right now at this time. But I'm sure Mr. Ingram can  
22 update you on that if you would like. But he is current  
23 on the payment plan that he entered into with the Board.

24 And that's pretty much my summary of what's  
25 going forward. And so I ask you today to just review

1 the facts and then make a decision of what you'd like to  
2 do.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Kevin, do you  
4 want to tell us what the -- finalize where we're at?

5 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. So Mr. Plant, as  
6 counsel had said, originally had two citations that were  
7 unpaid that went to the Controller's Office for  
8 collection. He's in a payment plan with the  
9 Controller's Office, I believe, on those two outstanding  
10 citations that were already referred to the Controller.  
11 We cannot take payment for that.

12 The three outstanding citations, for the total  
13 of \$30,000, is what he is currently in a payment plan  
14 for, similar to that that we discussed with Mr. Redic.  
15 On October 25th, he gave us a down payment for the \$500  
16 per citation, 1,500. He made his payment in November on  
17 time in the amount of 300. And he actually came into  
18 the office yesterday and paid an additional 300 not due  
19 until December 25th.

20 So he is on track and his payments are  
21 up-to-date. In our discussion with Mr. Plant, he  
22 assured me that he wants to get it paid off sooner than  
23 later and asked if there was any penalty for him to make  
24 extra payments or, quote, prepay the outstanding amount.  
25 Which we discussed there would be no penalty for

1 prepayment.

2 He also is in an agreement for a period of one  
3 year. At that time, based on his income, we would  
4 renegotiate the payments. He feels that if he's granted  
5 his work card and can continue to work and make more  
6 money, that that's how he can pay more towards the  
7 citation. And, again, we would just renegotiate it in a  
8 year or previous to that if you so chose.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So right  
10 now, I mean, without getting out a calculator, we're  
11 talking about nine years at \$300 a month to pay  
12 everything off?

13 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you  
15 know how much went to the Controller's Office?

16 MR. INGRAM: I do not know that. Do one of  
17 you?

18 MR. SWARTHOUT: Two citations. The first one  
19 was 2,500. The second one was 5,000. So that's 7,500.

20 MR. INGRAM: How much is he paying?

21 MR. SWARTHOUT: I do not know that.

22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I can --  
23 Mr. Reid, you're asking a question?

24 MR. REID: I'm asking my client how much he's  
25 paying a month.



1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I'm  
2 curious.

3           MR. PLANT: Yes. Recently, I mailed out two  
4 \$20 payments. You know, and the reason why they were  
5 that low is because when I mailed off a payment before,  
6 they said it was the wrong office. And I even came by.  
7 When I made my payment for the citations here in Vegas,  
8 I asked them, you know, to give me the correct address  
9 so I can know, if I'm behind on those other two  
10 payments, I can get those caught up. And I just, and we  
11 just hadn't got that clarity of, you know, what's the  
12 right address. You know, and so I will pay more when I  
13 get that information, because I definitely want to pay  
14 on all these citations.

15           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So,  
16 basically, you paid \$40 towards 7,500?

17           MR. REID: No, no, he's paid -- that's his most  
18 recent payment. He made payments prior, previously, but  
19 they were going to -- but they were, again, deposited in  
20 some of the payments. But there were some where he  
21 would send them to the PILB Board on Durango. And  
22 there's another office in Reno, Reno or Carson City.

23           MR. PLANT: My first two were sent there.

24           MR. REID: And so they got sent back. So then  
25 he sent the two \$20 just to say, "Hey, can you confirm

1 you're receiving these?"

2 MR. PLANT: Right.

3 MR. REID: And then so he can send more.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So this --

5 MR. PLANT: I'm sorry. I'm sorry. I'm sorry.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: At the bare  
7 minimum, to staff, at the next meeting, I want to know  
8 how much he's paid.

9 MR. INGRAM: Sure.

10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
11 So, anything else?

12 MR. REID: That's the question that was asked,  
13 sir.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Rosalie, anything  
15 else?

16 MS. BORDELOVE: No.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So it's up to --

18 MS. BORDELOVE: It is up to you to make -- and,  
19 Mr. Reid, I don't know if you had any other.

20 MR. REID: Yeah, I have no further.

21 MR. BORDELOVE: I don't think he's done with  
22 closing yet. He's got --

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We got like 700  
24 pages there. I think, he is.

25 MR. REID: So these were from before. So.

1 MS. BORDELOVE: Same with mine.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Reid,  
3 go ahead.

4 MR. REID: So --

5 (There was a problem with a chair.)

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I knew I was  
7 putting on some extra weight.

8 MR. INGRAM: Let's get you another chair.

9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The chair broke  
10 here. We're taking like a 30-second break.

11 (There was a minute off the record, 10:09 a.m.)

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All safe  
13 and sound. We're going back on the record. We're going  
14 on the record with that explosion, just so you know.

15 All right. Yes.

16 MR. PLANT: If I could get the proper address  
17 and place where I need to send those payments, I can  
18 actually make a payment today.

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You need to work  
20 with one of the investigators on that. You guys can  
21 exchange that, and they'll help you.

22 MR. PLANT: Well, I appreciate you offering  
23 that, so.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Reid, the  
25 time is yours.

1 MR. REID: So I don't know how far I got on my  
2 closing statement the last time. However, I'll just  
3 quickly go over some issues.

4 I did have a legal, and I still do, I believe,  
5 have a legal argument as to the citations were not  
6 specific with regards to the actual action that was  
7 carried out. However, based upon the time that's  
8 elapsed since the last hearing and what's developed  
9 since then, I've come to a different plan of defense,  
10 which is the fact that my client and the previous client  
11 actually went on TV at around six weeks ago. And it was  
12 broadcast across the state.

13 And during the interview, they were being  
14 questioned about working with Shaquille O'Neal and  
15 working with him. And about halfway through, my clients  
16 that are here sat there and said, "Hey" -- one of the  
17 questions was, well, what if -- or, "How does someone  
18 get into becoming a private security guard?" And the  
19 question -- and just so you know, this video was  
20 provided to the Executive Director and to Rosalie. That  
21 question was asked. And my client answered very  
22 specifically, said, "Hey, I just want to address  
23 everyone," words to the effect of, "I just want to  
24 address everyone right now, if everyone, anyone is  
25 looking to get into private security, they need to

1 contact the PILB board. They have some strict measures  
2 in place. Do not cross the path with them, like" -- he  
3 admitted that -- "like I've done. I messed up."

4           What we have here is someone that really, to  
5 some degree, needed a slap on the wrist, and he did get  
6 that. He was -- he had done the one unlicensed  
7 activity. He saw the piece of paper, and he came into  
8 the Board, signed it. It was a work card, I believe it  
9 was. And he was told how to get his license and what he  
10 needs to do and that he needs to work under a license.  
11 But he didn't understand that. He continued. It was  
12 the same as the prior client, is that he was working,  
13 and over the years he worked for Shaquille O'Neal. And  
14 before that, it was Snoop Dogg. And so he wasn't aware  
15 of the whole process. He wasn't aware of how serious it  
16 was.

17           We've got someone now who does have a work  
18 card, but that was, that was taken away based upon these  
19 citations. He is in a payment plan with the  
20 Controller's Office, but they don't have -- in my  
21 understanding, they don't have a strict payment plan.  
22 They just have a, "You owe this amount of money. We  
23 want a minimum of this amount per month." I don't know  
24 that for sure, but I know that he has been making the  
25 payments.

1           We did enter the Executive Director's office  
2 last month, six weeks ago, and we did sit down, and we  
3 did discuss how much is owed on the three citations,  
4 which is the \$30,000. And he did pay 15,000 -- \$1,500  
5 down. And right now, the payment's are \$300 per month.

6           He would like to increase that, and that's why  
7 he's paid this extra money just yesterday, because, for  
8 two reasons. Number one, he wants to pay more per  
9 month. And, also, two, is that he didn't want to come  
10 to Christmas time, and it's due on December 25th, and  
11 him miss the payment or be a day late or whatever, to  
12 make sure that it was on time.

13           We have a situation where the Board has a job  
14 to do. And I don't want to tell you your job. But I  
15 did actually know someone who was on the chair for a  
16 long time, that was a friend of mine. And one of the  
17 things he would always say to me was that his job on the  
18 Board is to protect the public and to make sure this  
19 isn't -- to protect and make sure that if anything  
20 happens, if any private process server or anyone doesn't  
21 do that, that they can come down and take their  
22 licenses, whatever they need to do.

23           In this case, we've got a gentleman which he  
24 did not know the law. He didn't know about what he was  
25 doing. He got told two or three times before on what to

1 do and still didn't understand it. And even, too, to  
2 this day, to a certain degree, I think, he doesn't  
3 understand the seriousness of how to get a license. He  
4 hasn't worked. The license still has got some questions  
5 marks there.

6 But what we have is someone who's now comes  
7 with me and says, "Yes, I messed up. I'm going to pay  
8 this off." He's paid a substantial amount down. He's  
9 continued to pay that amount. You determined that  
10 earlier. He's come to the Board to say, "Hey, I would  
11 like to work. I would like to be able to work under  
12 your license or a work card under your license, under  
13 your authority, that if I mess up, then you can take  
14 that away, and that's my livelihood."

15 He's not someone who's here to try and cause  
16 any problems. We know that there's the criminal case  
17 for this case, for this actual instant from January 14th  
18 when he was arrested for unlicensed activity. There was  
19 a subsequent arrest, which I'm sure that that's been  
20 made aware, and that that was, that's been dismissed  
21 through negotiations of the charges. He did not plead  
22 guilty. It was a -- he did plead no contest. It was a  
23 submittal and dismissed.

24 And he's here to say that he messed up. He  
25 would like to be put back, yeah, so he can work, so he

1 can be a good asset to the community.

2           One of the arguments I had the last time was  
3 that the Executive Director almost like used him as a  
4 platform, because he is one of the most recognized  
5 bodyguards out there, and he was doing something he  
6 shouldn't be doing. And once he got arrested, which is  
7 the first time in, in my understanding, the history for  
8 the PILB Board, was that it sent shock waves across the  
9 bodyguard community. And, I believe, it was the next  
10 day there was six to eight people came in to try and get  
11 their licenses, try and get their work card, because  
12 they didn't want to do what he -- what happened to him.

13           He went an additional step, and he went on TV  
14 and made that very, very clear. And, I believe, the  
15 Executive Director was happy with that, with the comment  
16 that he made on TV to anyone, "Hey, if you want to be a  
17 bodyguard, you need to speak to the PILB Board, and you  
18 need to make sure you get on track with them and get  
19 your license with them." It was very specific. It  
20 wasn't intentional. He was invited to come to TV,  
21 irrespective of this stuff. But when he was also  
22 questioned, in a stricter light for him, and he said,  
23 "No, I'm going to make sure that this gets the word  
24 across."

25           He's not trying to deceive anyone. He's not



1 trying to cause any issues here. He would like to go  
2 back to work.

3 And if my client wants to say anything as well,  
4 I would like him to say what he would like to say.

5 MR. PLANT: So just to what Mr. Reid just said,  
6 I've learned my lesson. When I got arrested, that was  
7 the first time ever in America in my life, and at 44, on  
8 December 17, that I've ever been arrested. There's no  
9 criminal history, ever. I'm a standup man. I take care  
10 of my wife and my kids, like I said in the first  
11 meeting.

12 And recently, me and my wife started a  
13 cheesecake company. So I left that flyer for you guys,  
14 too. So I'm really on the tail end of security, period.  
15 We have got cheesecake over there. So I'm excited to  
16 tell you that.

17 And, you know, I've learned my lesson, though.  
18 And I just don't want any stains to my name. So,  
19 basically, if I'm granted my card again, I don't think  
20 I'll do security anymore. But if I do, I just want to  
21 be in the setting that if that, if it comes across, if I  
22 come across a client that I can work for.

23 But the way the business is going with me and  
24 my wife, and which we have a license, Nevada license,  
25 everything, so I'm going to be talking tasty cheese

1 cheesecake. And, please, if you can get some, you'll  
2 see why I say we're the best cheesecake on earth.

3 So that's what I'm going, that's something to  
4 look forward to. And like I say, I just don't want  
5 anything on my name anymore. And like she said, when I  
6 did get arrested, I can't tell you number of -- that's  
7 serious, you don't want to go through that process. So  
8 I did my job.

9 MR. REID: Just a bit with the cheesecake, he  
10 did come to my office with his wife, and all licenses.

11 MR. PLANT: All of them.

12 MR. REID: But the question that came across  
13 was, "Are we allowed to do this?" "Well, what do you  
14 mean?" "Are we allowed to sell cheesecakes?" "Of  
15 course, you are. You just need a business license."  
16 And so I've explained everything to him and his wife. I  
17 explained to him more about how to do that and what to  
18 do. Because it was, it's a new platform for my client.

19 So I just can't emphasize enough is that it  
20 wasn't anything intentional. It was just that he was --  
21 had the conversation.

22 MR. PLANT: Right.

23 MR. REID: "I done that, but I just was kind of  
24 disregarding it and thinking, hey, I can bury my head in  
25 the sand." Not at all.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Real quick  
2 question, and somebody remind me. What was the second  
3 arrest for?

4           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: It was for solicitation.

5           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What?

6           MR. REID: Solicitation.

7           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Of prostitution?

8           MR. REID: Yes. Yeah, but that was dismissed.  
9 It was that was the charge filed. But I went in front  
10 of the court earlier, and the district attorney said  
11 that, yeah, case dismissed.

12           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And the other  
13 criminal case, Zero's?

14           MR. INGRAM: It's set. No, the D.A. hasn't  
15 picked it up yet.

16           MS. BORDELOVE: Yeah, we don't know what its  
17 status will be at this point. I think, the next status  
18 check is in January, and it's to determine whether the  
19 D.A. is going to file a complaint. It's in the D.A.'s  
20 hands.

21           MR. REID: And from speaking to the screening  
22 office at the District Attorney's Office, they said  
23 they're waiting for the PILB Board or the A.G.'s Office  
24 to make a decision.

25           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I'll start

1 the discussion. First of all, I appreciate your  
2 attitude this morning. Now it all makes sense why you  
3 wore that T-shirt. Because last time, you were dressed  
4 as nicely as I was.

5 MR. PLANT: Yes, I was.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I do want to say  
7 this, because, I think, I hit it on the head last time.  
8 And I got a lot of respect with your wife. And she  
9 agreed with me. And I agree with her. You were  
10 thick-headed. You didn't sacrifice anything. I mean  
11 you had plenty of chances before you got arrested. You  
12 got arrested because you didn't take it serious. And  
13 look what happened.

14 I haven't seen the video. I look forward to  
15 somebody sending it to me. I appreciate your comments.  
16 So. And we've got payment plans going. You're making  
17 payments. You're looking for another avenue and  
18 business. I do believe, if you get a card, because  
19 you're well-known in the industry, you will still work  
20 in the industry, maybe not as much as you did before.  
21 But you're well-known and well-respected in the  
22 industry.

23 So, but don't make any mistakes. We're here  
24 because you didn't -- we couldn't get your attention  
25 that you were doing something wrong. And you forced the

1 Board to go the arrest route. That's why you're the  
2 first one ever.

3 Okay. So. But I appreciate everything that  
4 was said today by both you and your counsel. So I will  
5 leave it up to my fellow Board members if they have  
6 questions.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have a statement to  
8 make. I don't think it's so much of a question. Part  
9 of your defense last time was that when you went for  
10 your work card, you thought it was a license, and  
11 something like that, you commented that you were  
12 working, and you weren't explained that.

13 MR. PLANT: Right.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The NRS was read to  
15 you, and it's right here, that explained to you what a  
16 work card is and what a license is. And you have to  
17 understand, you will have to work for a licensed person.  
18 The last time, not only your wife was in the audience,  
19 but there was another gentleman. There was a gentlemen  
20 in the audience who said that he was willing to give you  
21 a job.

22 MR. PLANT: Yeah, William Whittell.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. He was sitting  
24 over, right in front. And he said he was willing to  
25 give you a job at that time under his license.

1 MR. PLANT: Right.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So I'm just saying that  
3 I believe here that you are going to have opportunities  
4 in the future. I don't know where we're going today  
5 with you. Okay. We're a Board that decides in full.  
6 But I appreciate you coming. And, I think, your wife  
7 will appreciate it.

8 MR. PLANT: Well, you are more appreciative.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Let's stick with the  
10 card and what we're here for.

11 MR. PLANT: Okay.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The thing to me is if  
13 we're on a payment plan, we got make sure the payment  
14 plan is paid. And then, that if something happens here,  
15 we'll have to see where we go with that, also. Okay.

16 But I'm just saying I'm happier here. I've  
17 determined your attitude is much better than the last  
18 time. You were friendly, but you were different.

19 MR. PLANT: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So I appreciate  
21 it. And I appreciate the remarks from both of you all.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah, I feel much the same  
23 way. I think that I appreciate it. I can see that the  
24 -- you know, again, I'm in the industry. I'm a license  
25 holder, and I a very large group of people that work for

1 me. And one of the things that scares me the most is  
2 people like you that don't have a license or hire other  
3 people to work. We have people come in front of us  
4 every day or every time we're here that do all kinds of  
5 bad behavior, and we can't regulate it or pull their  
6 cards from them if they don't have cards. So it becomes  
7 an issue.

8           Again, I feel like it's resonated with you in a  
9 positive way, and I appreciate that. I think, if you  
10 would have asked me last time we met whether or not I'd  
11 approve a license for you, I'd say absolutely not,  
12 because you were adamant that you had not done wrong,  
13 although you had been told, you know, three times that  
14 you had done wrong.

15           MR. PLANT: Right.

16           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I appreciate the  
17 change. I look forward to the decision.

18           MR. PLANT: Thank you.

19           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

20           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

21 Kevin, I know you spent a lot of time on this. Anything  
22 you want to state?

23           MR. INGRAM: Yeah, I'll make a couple comments.  
24 I do agree with what the Board has said today. You and  
25 I, Adam, had quite a few conversations where I made it

1 very clear what the expectations were, very clear what  
2 the laws were.

3 MR. PLANT: Right.

4 MR. INGRAM: On three different occasions with  
5 you. And, again, you just chose to go forward. Which  
6 is very frustrating for me. And I was very  
7 disappointed, to be honest with you. Because I feel  
8 that you knew what the right thing to do was and that  
9 you chose not to.

10 I think, the arrest was, as Mr. Reid had  
11 stated, while it might have been the appearance that we  
12 wanted to effect arrest on you, the reason you were  
13 arrested is because you had five unlicensed activity  
14 citations. We've never, in the time that I've been on  
15 the Board, issued more than three. So I took that as,  
16 "I don't care. I'm not going to listen to you." And it  
17 did force our hand to move forward with Las Vegas Metro.  
18 Okay.

19 In the meantime, you have had a change of  
20 heart, I believe. You and your attorney met with me in  
21 my office. You took responsibility for your actions, as  
22 opposed to, "I didn't know. I didn't know." And you've  
23 entered a payment plan.

24 Well, the whole result that me and my staff  
25 were looking for, from the very first time we issued a



1 citation, was for you to become compliant, for you to do  
2 things right, for you to either get a work card or work  
3 for -- keep your work card and work for a licensed  
4 holder and be paid by that licensed holder instead of  
5 your clients, or to go forward with licensure. That was  
6 the all-time goal from day one.

7 MR. PLANT: Right.

8 MR. INGRAM: Okay. So it wasn't personal. It  
9 was business. And the actions that you chose to take  
10 determined the actions that I have to take.

11 With that said, I appreciate you going into the  
12 payment plan with me, and being current. I look forward  
13 to renegotiating in a year, if you don't have it paid  
14 off already. And best of luck to you.

15 MR. PLANT: Thank you.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
17 Whatever the motion is, I'll be adding that there be  
18 status checks since. And, also, next year, I would ask  
19 that you engage in some type of negotiations to see what  
20 the outcome, nine years, two years and another year from  
21 now. Let's see what happens.

22 MR. DETMER: And, Chairman, if I may. Mike  
23 Detmer for the record, from the Attorney General's  
24 Office.

25 This is only my second meeting with the Board.

1 And I'm sure the mechanism that the Board has to place  
2 for adjudication of these disciplinary hearings is fine.  
3 But just vocalizing my prior practice, when I put the  
4 disciplinary hearing with the complaint, typically what  
5 I see is a motion to make a determination on the  
6 violation. Then after that is decided, go into  
7 sentencing if a violation is found.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

9 MR. DETMER: And I didn't mean to interrupt. I  
10 hate to interrupt. But I wasn't sure of what the  
11 standard practice was.

12 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, what we  
13 have here is a --

14 MR. INGRAM: It's a disciplinary.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Disciplinary  
16 hearing.

17 MR. DETMER: As pointed out by --

18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We've done so  
19 many appeals, so.

20 MR. DETMER: I completely understand.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I appreciate you  
22 pointing that out at the top.

23 MR. DETMER: And as Chief Deputy Bordelove  
24 pointed out, as far as the sentencing, disciplinary  
25 regulation, as far as discipline goes, it is permissive.

1 It does say as far as the Board has the discretion to,  
2 but it seems to be limited to revoke or not revoke.  
3 But, again, it's permissible.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So what we'll be ruling on  
5 today is to?

6 MR. DETMER: Two motions.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. One would be to  
8 grant the appeal for the guard card?

9 MR. DETMER: My understanding, unless I'm  
10 mistaken, is that this was charged as a complaint. So  
11 it would be the determination as to whether or not by a  
12 preponderance of the evidence a violation has occurred  
13 as charged. If no violation is found, that's the end of  
14 it. If a violation is found, but by vote, then the next  
15 motion would be for sentencing, discipline.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Then on the appeal --

17 MR. INGRAM: That's different from the  
18 citations. This was a complaint brought against him  
19 based on the ongoing citations that his work card be  
20 revoked.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Again, I'm kind  
22 of confused. I understand the difference between a  
23 hearing and the appeals. But I'm having a problem with  
24 revoking a work card. I don't believe he has one.

25 MR. INGRAM: He does.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, he does?

2 MR. INGRAM: The work card is suspended.

3 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, okay. Yeah, I  
5 guess, if it was suspended, don't have it. Okay. All  
6 right.

7 MS. BORDELOVE: If it helps to clarify --  
8 Rosalie Bordelove, for the record.

9 If it helps to clarify, yes, a complaint was  
10 brought. And, I think, if you have any of the exhibits,  
11 it should probably be one of the first exhibits to our  
12 transcript from last time, is the complaint itself.

13 And so, as Mr. Detmer was saying, then you'll  
14 make a finding of fact first, because this will set it  
15 out to an eventual order from the Board. And so the  
16 findings of fact. And if you want to reference the  
17 factual allegations in the complaint, those are the ones  
18 we went through at the last hearing.

19 And then you could even do this into almost  
20 three parts. There's also a violation of law alleged in  
21 the complaint. Basically, that is that there was, what  
22 I've alleged is that Mr. Plant had unlicensed activity  
23 citation, citations, violated NRS 648.060. And because  
24 of that, he's subject to discipline, including potential  
25 revocation of his license under NRS 648.156.

1           And then kind of as a third step, the decision  
2 would be whether or not you want to revoke his license  
3 under that NRS.

4           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Revoke his work  
5 card.

6           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: His work card.

7           MS. BORDELOVE: I misspoke, then, I guess.

8           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's why we  
9 keep getting confused.

10          MS. BORDELOVE: Yes.

11          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sometimes we use  
12 work card. Sometimes we use license.

13          MS. BORDELOVE: Oh, there's no licenses. That  
14 was my mistake.

15          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right. Yeah, no  
16 problem.

17          MS. BORDELOVE: Yes, Mr. Plant has a work card  
18 that is currently in suspended status. And so the  
19 complaint on this is regarding his work card. And the  
20 choice, the final choice you'll be making, the first  
21 would be findings of fact, if you found that they've  
22 been proven by a preponderance of the evidence. And if  
23 they have, then it's whether you find that I've proved  
24 the violation of law by a preponderance of the evidence.  
25 And if that one, also you find that that has been

1 proven, then the question is whether or not to revoke  
2 the work card.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you. That's  
4 clear.

5 MS. BORDELOVE: And it's in suspended status  
6 pending, essentially, this hearing. And so it's whether  
7 to revoke the work card. Or if you choose not to revoke  
8 it, it will come out of suspension status and he would  
9 be permitted to work.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So then it would be  
11 three different motions or one motion for all of it?

12 MS. BORDELOVE: It might be clearest to do  
13 three, to allow either myself or Mr. Detmer to write the  
14 order later, because there will be a written order  
15 issued by the Board, as the basis. So that's depending  
16 on what you decide.

17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So let's do this  
18 right. I'll look for assistance on -- what do you want  
19 us to do to the first motion?

20 MS. BORDELOVE: Take a look, and you can do  
21 this as -- you need at least three. But the first can  
22 be one, or it can be multiple. But look towards the  
23 factual allegations in the complaint, and determine  
24 whether they've been proven by a preponderance of the  
25 evidence. And you could take them individually. You

1 can take them as one whole block. It's kind of your  
2 decision how you'd like to do that. Because you can  
3 look at them there, a guideline, and you can say, "We're  
4 finding these facts as listed in the complaint." Or you  
5 can say, "Well, we found some proved, but not all."  
6 It's your decision on that.

7 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.

8 What I've done in this fashion in the past,  
9 typically what I do is I ask the Board to review the  
10 findings of fact, the factual allegations, excuse me,  
11 and individually review it yourself. And then, if  
12 there's no issue with any of the facts as perceived by a  
13 preponderance, then you can do a block vote. If you  
14 individually see an issue with a fact, we can address  
15 it.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

17 MR. REID: So the first step. Then, once we  
18 get through the facts, then we go to the second step.  
19 And then the third step.

20 MS. BORDELOVE: Exactly.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. My  
22 left hand knows what's going on.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And my left hand.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Okay.  
25 We will proceed. I will entertain the first of three

1 motions, hopefully.

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: If I understand it -- this  
3 is Nixon. I make a motion, I make a motion that we,  
4 that --

5 MR. DETMER: Preponderance of the evidence.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: That due to the  
7 preponderance of the evidence, we agree that the  
8 respondent, Adam Plant, was at all that time performing  
9 unregistered activity.

10 MR. DETMER: And I'm sorry, Board Member Nixon.  
11 It was my fault how I characterized it. If the motion  
12 it to -- is the motion that findings of fact as alleged  
13 in the complaint have a been proven by a preponderance  
14 of the evidence, or that it was not?

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: It was.

16 MR. DETMER: Okay.

17 MR. REID: So just to clarify, with all this  
18 going back and forth, is that -- I was going to say that  
19 as issued in the complaint, that you find the findings  
20 of fact to be true and accurate, and that encapsulates  
21 all of the facts and allegations per the complaint.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: True and --

23 MR. DETMER: You heard the findings of fact.  
24 It looks likes it's findings of fact or factual  
25 allegations.



1 MR. REID: Yeah. And I believe that the  
2 motion, I believe, the motion is, in the moment, that  
3 they would actually like to find the findings of  
4 facts --

5 MR. DETMER: Factual allegations.

6 MR. REID: -- the factual allegations that are  
7 contained in the complaint to be true based upon a  
8 preponderance of the evidence.

9 MR. DETMER: Yes, that'll be fine.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What he said.

11 MR. REID: Is that correct, what the motion  
12 would be?

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes. So let's try this  
14 again.

15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: It's okay. This  
16 is a once in a lifetime case. There's nothing we can do  
17 about it.

18 Let's try one more time.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So this is Nixon. I make  
20 the motion that we find that the evidence, factual  
21 findings, factual, to be true based on the preponderance  
22 of the evidence. Maybe.

23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, and okay. So  
24 that's your motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

1           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I  
2 would, I think, just to make it clear --

3           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, please.

4           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- I would say,  
5 based on the written complaint dated the 21st of May,  
6 2019.

7           MR. DETMER: That, so that would be your motion  
8 as amended?

9           ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I'm  
10 amending hers.

11          BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

12          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Add to hers, to  
13 amend that. So we all are talking about the same  
14 document. All right?

15          BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

16          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's the  
17 motion. Do I have a second?

18          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second.

19          ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We  
20 have a motion and a second. Okay. Any discussion?

21           Okay. And for the record, I -- this is Ray  
22 Flynn. I believe that there was more than enough  
23 evidence shown to support the citations of the  
24 unlicensed activity. And I agree with the findings of  
25 the staff, the Private Investigators Licensing Board.

1 And I also support the motion of Ms. Nixon.

2 All right. Any other, further discussion?

3 Seeing none, all those in favor of the motion,  
4 state "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

7 The motion carried. All right.

8 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.

9 So the second phase would be going to the --  
10 I'm not sure how it's phrased in the complaint. Is it  
11 findings of law?

12 MS. BORDELOVE: It's violations of law as was  
13 alleged in the complete, is I've alleged one violation  
14 of law.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I get confused  
16 between what you attorneys are classifying as fact and  
17 classifying as law. The preponderance of evidence in a  
18 civil case is fact. Okay. But the preponderance of  
19 evidence in criminal cases, that's criminal, because all  
20 citations are. To me, it is probable cause.

21 MS. BORDELOVE: These are actual civil  
22 citations.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

24 MS. BORDELOVE: But the criminal matter, that's  
25 why I said the D.A., because this Board has the power in

1 a civil matter.

2 The violation of law alleged is referring to  
3 the actual statute, whether you find that the facts as  
4 proven support a finding that he violated the chapter.  
5 And then what you want to do about that would be  
6 separate.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Separate.

8 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The third one.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right.

10 MR. REID: Just to clarify, that second one,  
11 the motion is going to have to say that what's factually  
12 alleged that were said to have happened, you've agreed  
13 that there's enough evidence to say so.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Exactly.

15 MR. REID: And now the next thing is to say  
16 whether or not there's been a violation of the law based  
17 upon those factual allegations, based on what's been  
18 proven. And so that's when the motion will come in.  
19 And I don't want to put words in your mouth.

20 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm going to try  
21 this one. Okay. I'd like to make a motion that the  
22 facts and evidence presented before the Board in this  
23 hearing have supported the violation of law as stated in  
24 NRS Chapter 648 and Nevada Administrative Code  
25 Chapter 648.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second it.

2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's a second.

3 All right. Any further discussion?

4 All right. All those in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

7 The motion carried. All right.

8 MS. BORDELOVE: So the third would be whether  
9 you choose to revoke the work card under NRS 648.156.

10 MR. REID: And conditions, and tell me if I'm  
11 wrong, is that you can revoke it, you can not revoke it,  
12 you can add conditions, you can add other requirements  
13 in place if you were not to revoke it.

14 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So if we don't revoke it,  
16 do we have to unsuspend it, though? Because it's  
17 suspended right now. Do we have to add that to the  
18 motion?

19 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I'm just  
20 going to throw this out for discussion. We could, A,  
21 revoke it. We could, B, unrevoke it with conditions.

22 MS. BORDELOVE: Unsuspend it. Unsuspend it.  
23 It's not revoked. It's not revoked right now.

24 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We can revoke it.  
25 Or we can unsuspend it with conditions.

1 MS. BORDELOVE: Right. With or without  
2 conditions, yes. Yeah.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: With our without  
4 conditions.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And there's no  
7 third option. So we've got two options. All right.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make the motion.  
9 Gronauer. I'll make a motion that we unsuspend the work  
10 card for Mr. Plant, with the conditions that he follows  
11 through with the payment plan and with a follow-up in  
12 one year.

13 MR. DETMER: And Mike Detmer, for the record.  
14 Inherent within that motion is that his work card would  
15 not be revoked.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, it's unsuspended.

17 MR. DETMER: Right. But I'm just --

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. It's not  
19 revoked. All right.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

21 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any  
22 further discussion?

23 For clarification, we're unsuspending the work  
24 card. We're choosing not to revoke the work card.  
25 We're putting a condition that we will have a status

1 check within a year of his payment plan of both to us as  
2 well as the Controller's Office.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

4 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I want to put  
5 Mr. Plant on notice that if the payments are not  
6 current, I can't speak for the rest of the Board, but I  
7 would be most unhappy. Okay.

8 All right. I have a motion. I have a second.  
9 Any further discussion?

10 All right. Call for a vote. All those in  
11 favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

14 The motion carried. Okay.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Merry Christmas.

16 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We  
17 are done. Do we have any other business?

18 All right. One last thing before we adjourn  
19 for today. I will call for any public comment, either  
20 up north or down south.

21 All right. No public comment.

22 All right. I will conclude with a motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion to  
24 conclude. Let's get out of here.

25 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do I have a

1 second?

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All in favor,

4 "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We're done.

7 Merry Christmas. Happy holidays. Happy Hanukkah.

8 Happy Kwanzaa.
