If you have a radio or 22 TV or other individuals in the office, if you can just 23 make sure you close your door. That way, the court 24 2.5 reporter will be able to pick up what you're saying.

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Speak very slowly and clearly. Every time that you speak, the first time that you speak, announce your full name. And then, if the Board is asking questions, and you are responding to those questions, just state your last name before you start speaking again. And, again, that'll make it a little bit easier for our court reporter to keep up on who's speaking.

Only one person should be speaking at a time to ensure the accurate record as well. I know this is a little bit difficult, because we're used to answering questions as someone is asking them of us. Please make sure that person's able to complete their question or their statement before responding.

I would like to remind those of you that are the public attending, we will give you opportunities throughout the Board meeting for public comment. That's going to be an area that's going to be a little more difficult to manage, for the fact that if we ask for public comment, and more than one person wishes to speak, we'll just listen for the name and identify you at that time. And then we'll go to the next person.

Are there any questions before we get started?

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And I also want to advise that we will be 1 calling public comment before any votes, as well as 2 before we go through the non-licensing matters this 3 afternoon or later this morning. 4 So is there any public comment? Please speak 5 6 up. 7 All right. Hearing none, I believe, it's up to you now, item three, Kevin. 8 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Chairman. 9 Before we get started with the announcements, I 10 would like to go ahead and introduce the staff that are 11 on the call today with us. 12 13 We have our Chief of Operations, Lori Irizarry; our Supervisory Investigator, Vincent Saladino; our 14 Licensing Specialist, Shelly Donald; and we have 15 Investigator Paul Maxwell, Investigator Zach Swarthout, 16 Investigator Jordan Jones; and our Financial Specialist, 17 Mary Klemme; and we also have our court reporter with us 18 today, and that is Shannon Taylor. 19 20 I do have a couple of announcements as far as 2.1 changes in the agenda. Agenda item 47, for Scott and Crystal Carroll, 22 they've had a last-minute emergency, are unable to 23 attend today, and have requested to be postponed to the 24 2.5 next Board meeting.

Item, agenda item 54, their QA dropped out in 1 the process. And, therefore, we will not be hearing 2 item 54 today as well. 3 As far as an overview of what's been happening 4 with the Board, as you know, with the Governor closing 5 state offices March 16th, our office has been closed to 6 the public. 7 As far as continuing to work behind the scenes, 8 we've been doing that on an alternative schedule, 9 rotational basis, to try to conform to the social 10 distancing as well as we can. 11 And we did have a couple of individuals, 12 13 unfortunately, on our staff who did contract the 14 COVID-19. And I'm happy to announce that they have had 15 a full recovery and are back to work in full capacity. It did, however, put us into two different 14-day 16 quarantines. And with the second quarantine, we 17 actually had to close our office as well, with the 18 exception of three of us working from home on VPNs. 19 20 But we are back up and running. We're fully 21 staffed. And we anticipate the Governor approving us open to the public probably this week is what it looks 22 like. 23 24 And with that, I guess, Lori, do you want to go

into the statistics?

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Okay. Chief Lori Irizarry. 1 MS. IRIZARRY: I'm going to talk about the statistics. The statistics that 2 I'm speaking about are on our website underneath the 3 Meetings tab. If you go to today's meeting agenda on 4 6-2, underneath the Additional Documents Attachments, 5 there's two attachments there, one of them being 6 7 statistics, one being the NAC amendments that we're going to speak about later in the Board meeting. 8 So I'm going to speak about right now the 9 statistics. It's seven pages. I'm going to start on 10 11 page one. So these statistics were originally for the 12 13 March Board meeting. And at March, since that's our first Board meeting for the year, I had anticipated 14 speaking about what our year 2019 looked like and 15 comparing that, 2019, to 2018. So since we're 16 continuing from that meeting, I'm going to start with 17 that on page one. 18 In 2019, we had approximately 275 licensees go 19 20 before the Board. That did not necessarily mean those 2.1 individuals -- those are only the individuals that had 22 gone before the Board. It does not necessarily mean those are the ones that had applied. 23 In 2020, going forward, we have included all 24 2.5 applications as a part of our statistics. So even if

they are not brought before the Board, you'll be seeing those numbers going forward for these, from today going 3 forward. So in 2019, there were 275 people that went

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- before the Board. Work cards were 11,021 work cards were received. The number of complaints we had was 41. We issued a total of 45 unlicensed activity citations for a total of \$150,500. And violations that were issued to our licensees during 2019 was 465 individual violations for a total of \$15,775.
 - Right below there, you'll see there's a chart of how the violations broke out compared to NAC and NRS, the dollar amount, and the dollar amounts and how many fines were actually issued to our licensees.

Now, to go back in time a little bit, I'm going to compare 2018 to 2019. So the next couple of graphs will show the comparison between the two. So the first one here is talking about the licensing application. Total licensing applications in 2018 was 207 that went before the Board. And in 2019, that was 275 went before the Board. We did notice an increase of 33 percent of licensing applications. At the last Board meeting that we officially had in December was a significant increase by 128 percent from our December, in our December meeting. And I broke it down by quarter here of how

many people were actually here at the Board. 1 2 On page two, work card comparison. So in 2018, we had a total of 9,800 work cards that were processed; 3 in 2019, 11,021. We often are the busiest March and May 4 of every year. March and May of every year, we notice 5 NASCAR, Electric Daisy Carnival, and it's the beginning 6 7 of the summer events, especially here in southern Nevada, that require large amounts of security. 8 But in 2019, we had a little bit of a different 9 There were two new events, two festivals that 10 came into southern Nevada in early fall, September, 11 October. So you see there, the graph below, that 12 1.3 September, October, we had an increase from the year before because we had two new events. It was the 14 15 Day N' Vegas and the Intercept concerts and festivals that were here in southern Nevada. That brought a 16 significant number of new work card applications. And 17 we were expecting to mirror what we did in 2018 and 18 2019. But because of those two additional events at the 19 20 end of the year, it did bring our work card application 2.1 up about 12 percent. And down below, you'll see it's broken down by 22 month of how we've processed. So we could notice the 23 And we could, in our office, also schedule 24

accordingly during these trends.

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At the bottom of page two, unlicensed activity. 1 In 2018, we issued 33 unlicensed activity citations for 2 a total of \$77,500. And in 2019, we issued 45 3 unlicensed activity citations, which is a 94 percent 4 dollar increase, because it went to \$150,500. 5 The significant dollar increase we noticed was 6 7 basically because in 2018 they were issued an initial citation, which is usually \$2,500, and in 2019 some were 8 issued a second or third citation, which the dollar 9 amount is greater on, which would have brought the 10 dollar amount up to that 94 percent increase. 11 On page three, I'm going to now talk about how 12 13 we're doing in 2020. So --MR. INGRAM: If I could interrupt just for a 14 15 second, Lori. I'm sorry. Please make sure your phones are on mute if 16 you're not speaking. 17 Go ahead, Lori. 18 MS. IRIZARRY: So on page three, I'm going to 19 20 go forward with what happened in 2020. Instead of just 21 jumping in to see how we're doing, instead of grouping all six months into one chart, I'm going to break it 22 down by quarter, especially considering, like Kevin 23 spoke about, our office had a significant change these 24

last few months, office closures, the COVID situation,

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we weren't doing compliance checks, we were not allowed to -- we were requiring to social distance during these last few months. So you will see a different trend between the two different months.

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- The first chart there is 2020 licensing applications. So instead of just giving a number of how many are going before the Board, we wanted to present to you how many have applied and how many are actually going before the Board.
- So in March 2020, we had 101 people apply for licensure; 89 of them were agendized. And the difference between the two numbers was because some are postponed or withdrawn. Postponement could have been travel, they didn't have a complete application to go before a Board hearing, they missed exams -- I'm sorry -- there was exam failures, or they just postponed on their own for a better date going forward. So out of the 101 that applied, 89 were going before the Board in March.

For June, if the numbers are not finalized because we are not able at this time to determine, out of the 93 people that have given us applications for the June Board meeting, which would now be the next Board meeting, we will finalize the number of how many will go before the next Board meeting coming up. We don't know,

because we haven't taken exams yet, if individuals want to postpone. But right now, we have a total of 93 new applications for the next Board hearing.

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Next page, page four, the work cards. The first quarter of the year, we did 1,914 work card applications. That was a decrease from the quarter before. But the end of the year is usually our slowest time of the year, because we are at that lull, because we just ended a whole bunch of festivals in the fall, and we're bringing up a whole bunch of new ones come the spring. Which is why, if you look at the next chart down below, from February to May, the increase was 1,234 work card applications.

Even with our office closures and us staying at home, in the last three months, I'm happy to report that there was only a 306 work card application decrease from the first to second quarter. We were still processing the same amount of work cards. And what I want to attribute that to mainly, in February and March we really focused on getting applications in earlier for the Electric Daisy Carnival. We were gearing up for the NFL draft and NASCAR at that time. So it brought in a significant number of applications for work cards, which we were able to process even while on the stay at home order or while closing our office to walk-ins. So we

did not see a significant decrease in work card 1 applications. However, we did plan on increasing that 2 number by 2,000. So although it was the same as years 3 past, we had also anticipated bringing in an additional 2,000 work cards during this time, which we believe that 5 we'll end up now seeing not until the end of the summer 6 7 when the Allegiant Stadium opens up and the Electric Daisy Carnival and other festivals move to the end of 8 the year. So this year will be a little bit different, 9 because we're going to have our busier season at the end 10 of the summer, it looks like. 11 Moving on to page five, the first quarter of 12 13 the year we had six complaints that came to our office. They were, four were for -- I'm sorry. Five were for 14 15 licensees, and one was for a work card holder. right there on the side it breaks it down of how, what 16 category and what they were issued for. 17 But the most recent complaints we received in 18 the last quarter were six as well. One was for a 19 20 licensed private patrolman, which is currently still 2.1 under investigation and is pending. Three are for 22 They have now closed those investigations. licensees. One was for a process server. It was a COVID situation 23 regarding evictions, and that that was closed. 24 2.5 private patrolman licensee with a payroll dispute; the

individual who filed the complaint has just resolved it 1 with the company. And a private investigation company 2 that we determined was a civil matter, and we closed 3 that investigation as well. One private patrolman 4 licensee had an incident regarding battery. The charges 5 were dismissed, and Las Vegas Metro is now following up; 6 7 so we have referred that to them. And one work card complaint where the work card holder was making threats; 8 a temporary protection order has been in place, and we 9 are still monitoring that work card holder as well. 10 On to page six. When it comes to notice of 11 violations, these are the violations issued to our 12 1.3 licensees. In the first quarter of the year, we had a total of 247 violations issued to our licensees for a 14 dollar amount of \$9,050. But that was only for nine 15 licensees. So I wanted to point out, the large number 16 of violations issued for those nine licensees was mainly 17 back due to we had an audit. During that audit, there 18 was quite a few citations issued for one licensee. 19 20 although that 247 violations issued seems like a large 21 amount, I want to point out, it wasn't individual citations, it was for one company that multiple 22 citations were issued for, during an audit. 23 Moving down to the last quarter, there were 24 four licensees that received violations, for a total of 2.5

seven violations total -- so one company could have received two or three or four at the time -- for a dollar amount of \$1,375. And the breakdown is right there of how it broke down of what they issued citations for. Violations for. I apologize.

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And on the last page, page seven, unlicensed activity citations. The first quarter of the year, when businesses were still open and functioning, we noticed, there were eight unlicensed activity citations issued, three of which were paid, for a dollar amount of \$8,600. Four were still pending, for \$13,900. And there was a cease and desist order issued. The dollar amounts are a little off, because usually unlicensed activity citations are \$2,500, \$5,000, \$7,500. The reason that these citations are not divisible by those amounts is because some of these have entered into payment plans with us. So because of their payment plans, I reflected how much we received in payments and how much was pending off of their payment plans.

From those citations at the first quarter, we received them either from the casinos, the nightclub industry, law enforcement, our relationships that we have built here in town, as well as other avenues we received in our complaints, other licensees notified us as well.

Now, this last quarter, since many people were 1 not working, and we were not able to conduct on-site 2 citations, we had only issued one unlicensed activity 3 citation, which is still pending, in the amount of 4 \$2,500. And that was discovered during the licensing 5 background process when they were trying to come before 6 the Board. And that is still a pending situation. And those would be the stats going forward. 8 And the next Board meeting stats, I will compare this 9 quarter to next quarter at the next meeting. 10 Any questions? 11 This is Gronauer. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: 12 Ι 13 have one question. On your last page. MS. IRIZARRY: Yes. 14 Okay. I didn't know if 15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: you heard me or not. Okay. The pending and the paid, 16 and I understand you said because some of them were on 17 payment plans, but how many are not on payment plans 18 that are still owed? Or is everybody on a payment plan? 19 20 MS. IRIZARRY: I believe, for these unlicensed 21 activity citations on this quarter, I believe there was 22 only two individuals that were on, or on two citations they're on a payment plan. So it would be the ones that 23 are pending, how it says four, two of those would be on 24 payment plans. And so I did not include them in the 2.5

Only their dollar amount is included in the paid. 1 paid. They would be included as the number four for the 2 pending, number of pending still. 3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And what's our 4 process for that? 5 MS. IRIZARRY: If someone would like to request 6 7 a payment plan, it goes -- if they have not already been reported to the State Controller's Office, they're able 8 to issue a payment plan with them. It goes through the 9 Director, who follows up with our legal counsel, and 10 they determine what the payment plan will be. And, I 11 believe, it's between -- they have to sign an agreement 12 1.3 with Kevin. I believe, the Director could speak on that 14 more. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And for the ones that 15 ignore it, that goes to the -- where does that go? 16 MS. IRIZARRY: It goes to the Controller's 17 Office, the Controller's Office. 18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And they handle 19 20 that? 2.1 MS. IRIZARRY: Correct. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you. 22 For the record, Kevin Ingram. 23 MR. INGRAM: just wanted to make one statement, especially for those 24 2.5 in attendance, not, maybe not knowing how we collect the

fines and what we do with the fines and the citation 1 money. 2 Any money that comes into the Board, whether 3 it's a fine of a license holder or a citation for 4 unlicensed activity, that money is reverted back to the 5 state general fund. So any money we collect, we do our 6 7 own in-house, it does not fund our agency in any way. And, again, it's just reverted back to the state general 8 fund. 9 Looks like we are ready for agenda item four. 10 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Kevin, 11 then, before we go, I just want to thank Lori. That was 12 1.3 an excellent report. We've come a long way from when we first started. And these statistics and the graphs 14 15 really help to show the workload and what we're doing to protect the citizens of Nevada. So I appreciate the 16 effort. 17 MS. IRIZARRY: You're very welcome. Thank you. 18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Item 19 20 number four, review and approve transcripts from 2.1 December 10th, 2019 of the Board meeting, for possible action. year and a half trying to figure out what I wanted to 1 And so I became a bouncer. INGRAM: Thank you. 19 20 Well, obviously, we've been faced with some 21 pretty significant challenges with the COVID pandemic. And because of that, obviously, we had to cancel our 22 March Board meeting. And we were questionable on even 23 We know that the Governor has talked about 24 2.5 loosening the restrictions a little bit to possibly

allow for a group of individuals, up to 50 people to be present in a meeting as long as there's a six-foot distance around each individual attending.

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But during this pandemic, we were unable to conduct any of our licensing exams. So the individuals that had applied after we completed the backgrounds for the March Board meeting, which we just heard today, we could have gotten some of them onto this Board meeting as well for licensure review had we had an alternative to them completing an exam.

There are several states that have moved to conducting licensing exams online; Florida, Louisiana, to be specific. And the question I had for the Board is, times are changing, it's getting very difficult to get people together to get these exams done. And would we entertain switching from a required travel to Nevada to have the exam proctored in a classroom and could we potentially offer this online?

Now, I want to give you a little bit of a background that kind of plays into this as well. Not only is it the pandemic that's affecting us, but traditionally what the Board has done, since the first day I was appointed as the Director, we have required all licensing applicants who do not have a license in Nevada already, that they must travel to Nevada to

appear before the Board. Now, we did the block vote
this Board meeting, so it's kind of given us an
opportunity to talk about this to include the
exam-taking.

So an individual who's out-of-state, has

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2.5

- applied for licensure, they're required to travel to

 Nevada to take the exam. If they were to fail the exam,

 they're rescheduled, and now they travel to Nevada a

 second time. And then, for them to even entertain the

 idea of being granted a license, they now travel to

 Nevada a third time to appear before the Board for the

 Board to talk to them and ask them questions.
 - That could be a pretty pricey application process for them. Because if you're coming from the East Coast, you're spending a lot of money on air fare, hotel rooms, so on and so forth. Now, hopefully, they would pass the exam the first time. But there are still expenses for that, two trips, to take the exam and pass it and come back before the Board.
- So I just wanted to kind of throw it out there for the Board to think about. Is that really what we want to do? And if so, we totally support that. Or is it more important to get these people through the application process without taking shortcuts, but getting them through the process to where we can bring

And once we've enrolled them to take the exam, they could be given certain credentials to log into the system and accessed the test or tests that they needed to take. Again, there would be no startup costs from

Again, there would be no startup costs from this company. And the only thing that they would ask for as far as payment is for every -- as you know, we

charge a \$100 exam fee. For every \$100 that they're 1 paying us for an exams fee, we would collect the money, 2 we would then be billed by the company \$30. So we would 3 keep \$70 of the exam fee. We would pay them \$30 of the exam fee. And they would keep all of the records, you 5 know, meaning all the confidentiality agreements, the 6 7 state requirements through EITS, all of those agreements that, obviously, have to be met. And they could build 8 that platform out in approximately 14 days. 9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Kevin -- if you don't 10 mind, Ray -- I think, that sounds really good. 11 things on that. Number one, I would love, if we're 12 1.3 going to do any kind of vendor, keep it as a Nevada vendor. 14 MR. INGRAM: 15 Yes. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If that's possible. Ι 16 mean the other vendors out there, we'd have to look. 17 But I mean, I think, I would like you to go forward. 18 That would be my right now. Now, I know there's a lot of people that are going to say, "No, hey, I had to take a written exam, they should have to also." The exam process has a lot of fail-safes built into it and a lot of -- you know, the question is, well, how do you they're going to give me a test? Well, I think, you have to have somebody there sitting with them and all of that. You know, people can cheat. If they want to cheat, they're going to find a way, whether it's proctored in classroom or not.

But the system that I viewed -- and, again, we would have to have other people give us bids as well. The system I viewed, they have to set up their account before they actually start taking a test. And they're asked several personal questions, that as they're going through the exam, every so often, the question would pop up, give them the answer. Now, again, could they cheat? Absolutely.

They also have facial recognition. The problem with facial recognition is not all people have a camera on their computers. But we could set it up to where it requires it. And we had a demonstration at a workshop

for that when we were talking about potential training 1 requirements. And if the person moves out of camera 2 view, it locks their exam. Or if another person sits 3 down, it locks the exam. 4 So they have a lot of broad reach safeguards 5 that they could put in place, and all we would have to 6 do is tell them which ones we wanted to go with. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I like it, I mean I 8 like the whole idea. And, I think, you're on the right 9 track going forward. And, you know, there's always 10 going to be crises. But the whole ideas with the 11 crisis, times change, we got to change. We can't stay 12 1.3 archaic. We got to move with the times. And there's 14 probably good ideas out here. And, Board Member Gronauer, I know you were involved and part of this taking place. Now, there is a threshold automatically built in, because no one -- and, Mike, maybe you could help me here. No executive director can come within a certain percentage of the Governor's pay. LCB Sunset Committee conducted a very thorough analysis. And I could tell you that my salary as an executive director falls at the bottom of the scale with the other executive directors. But, I think, personally, I think, it's in line with what we do. The size of our agency has to take, you know, part of that as well.

So what we've done in the past is provided like or similar positions in the State of Nevada based on their job duties, and we've compared it to like chiefs of Gaming Control, we've compared it to the Director of POST, and those types of positions.

And that's when I provided them the statistics on work card fees across the states showing that we were the cheapest and that we could potentially raise the registration fees to help compensate.

During that testimony, also, though, former

Chair Zane and myself testified that we would much

rather have the licensing fee stay at the \$500, because

those are generally professionals who are established,

and that \$500 fee a year would not be as significant of

have to be like grandfathered in. Right now, if they're 1 going to work in security -- because right now, the 2 examination is only required of security officers. 3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Right. 4 MR. INGRAM: Only for security. So what has 5 happened in the past is an individual gets their work 6 7 They don't have to take the exam. And then they would go to work for a security company without having 8 taken that exam. So it is ensuring that the licensee 9 is ensuring that they pass the examination. Which they 10 could do so through the database, right, when you're 11 maintaining your roster. And if, for whatever reason, 12 1.3 they had proctored that exam for the employees, instead of them doing it online, then they keep those results. 14 So if we ever have to audit, we can find that. 15 Eventually, it's all going to be in the record. 16 It's all going to be in the database. But there are 17 some that currently are not. And that's when we call 18 and say, "Okay. We see that you've got this person on 19 20 your roster. We don't show that they've taken the 21 security exam." At times, a licensee can provide that to is. Or we just say, "You need to have them complete 22 the exam before they can continue working for you." So 23 24 either.

BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, I quess, my question

is, when they come in with a fingerprint and the entire 1 application, I was under the impression that you guys 2 had the database to check and see if they'd taken the 3 exam and passed. Is that not the case? 4 No, we can. As long as they took MR. INGRAM: 5 the exam on the paper app or if they took it online, 6 7 that'll be in the database. MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. I think, I want 8 to shed some light on this. The reason we were changing 9 this NAC 648.341 mainly came about because, you are 10 correct, Ms. Nixon, licensees were not maintaining their 11 roster to say that people had taken the exam. So at the 12 1.3 time of the audit or when we were conducting an on-site 14 investigation or a compliance check, and we see that 15 someone was working for a private patrolman company, and they had not taken the exam, we would notify the 16 licensee. But there was no, we had no authority to make 17 them pay a fine or citation for them to monitor their 18 own records to ensure the person had taken the exam. 19 20 When someone is added to the roster, you can 21 see when they've taken a past exam. So we are trying to, with this revision, put it on the licensee, so when 22 they add someone to their roster, they they're verifying 23 that they have to give the exam, that when they got 24

their card they didn't just get it for something like

process serving where the exam wasn't required at that 1 time, that when you add into the roster, that you're 2 ensuring they have the exam. Because this particular 3 NAC, later on, down the packet, you'll see we have assessed a fine to it, for that reason, for the 5 licensees that were hiring people that had not taken the 6 7 exam. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I just think that this is 8 a large administrative burden for companies to actually 9 go back and find exams, especially for folks that have 10 worked at several, you know, in the five years, they 11 worked for however many different companies. And, I 12 13 quess, if -- so if we go online and find out that they 14 didn't take the exam, but they took it on a paper exam 15 with somebody, how do we obtain that exam to keep in our records? 16 MR. INGRAM: Well, if you don't have the 17 ability to find the paper exam, then you would just 18 require that they do the online exam again. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So they have a guard card, 21 and we're making them go back and do the online exam and 22 pay for it? MR. INGRAM: Oh, no, they could do the exam 23 without having to pay. And, see, that's the hard part 24

about it is, you know, it's a registered work card, not

a guard card. And so by the registered work cards, if somebody has a registered work card, they can work under any category of license, with the exception of polygraph examiner.

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So if -- right now, the way the statute's read, and we'll get down a little bit further, too, it says security. Individuals working security have to take the The other ones don't. So they get a registered exam. work card. And a security company says, "Oh, you've got a registered work card. I'm going to hire you." And the employee says, "Yeah, I want to go to work for you." If they're not ensuring that they've taken the security exam, either by getting onto the database, which is the easiest way to do it now. But in instances where they've done it five years ago, four years ago, the card hasn't expired yet, it's not uploaded in the system, and it was given by a previous licensee, they may have a copy of it. If the licensees have those, they should be placed into the personnel file.

From this point forward, actually from the time that we switched over to Omni, so just under two years ago, all of these records should be in the system.

Because the process changed.

But like Lori said, when we're conducting audits, you know, it's hard to -- we want to hold the

This is a regulation that all ran together. It was prerequisites along with certifications of firearms instructors. And it clouded what the intent of the regulation was, because part of it was only talking about registered employees and not the CFI. So by separating it, we feel like it'll be, the intent will be there without clouding are you talking about registered employees or CFIs.

So reading 648.345, section 1, you know, a licensee or an employee who is registered pursuant to 648.1493 may not carry a firearm while performing the duties for any type of business for which he or she is licensed or employed unless the licensee or employee is certified by the Board as a firearms instructor or has successfully completed and received certification from a course of training approved by the Board in handling, in carrying, handling and using firearms safely.

We would like to add the verbiage "and is at

least 21 years of age" and then a section 2, "A person 1 in provisional status is not authorized to attend 2 firearms orientation or training and is ineligible to 3 work armed." That's the guidelines we followed for years. 5 But, again, there's nothing in writing for that. 6 7 the reason for the individuals not being able to work in provisional status, as I'm sure the Board's aware, they 8 get a provisional status once we run SCOPE, which is 9 just arrests and convictions in Nevada. And we don't 10 get their fingerprint results back from the FBI in six 11 to eight weeks. So, potentially, if somebody was 12 1.3 arrested for DB or a firearms in another state, or I mean any violent arrest, we wouldn't know it. And those 14 15 prohibited persons could ultimately be going to firearms training with range certified firearms instructors at 16 the range and handling weapons. 17 So while they're in provisional, we say, no, 18 you can't go. Once we've cleared your fingerprints to 19 20 make sure you're not an unauthorized person, then we'll 2.1 let you go to the training. ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We are requesting that since they're not a true license holder, but treated as such, and have to renew every year, and they run a business, with insurance, that we raise the fee to \$250.

Under section 1(b)(2), it says that certified firearms instructors must qualify with a course of fire established by the Board pursuant to NAC 648.346, with a minimum score of -- it currently says 275 out of 300 on a full-size B27-type target. Instead of using -- I mean targets can change and may not be available in the future. I know it says "type target." But, you know, scoring may change as well. So removing the 275 out of the 300 and adding a minimum score of 90 percent, which is higher than what the registered work cards must qualify at -- they have to qualify at 75 -- the 275 out

This comes from a lot of different areas. One of them is the bill draft that was proposed at the last legislative session mandating that firearms training be increased. While the proposal was requiring 40 hours of training, with exorbitant fees attached to it, we feel that if we, as the Board, do not take action moving forward to increase the training, that we'll be faced with a similar bill in the Legislature and, you know, may end up having to follow what the Legislature approves without us doing something in regulation.

So the first part of this is the course of fire. If you go down to section 1, let's see, 1(f)(6), it says that the registered work cards must qualify with a minimum -- or I'm sorry -- qualify with a passing score of 75 percent using a course of fire established by the Board, using a firearm of the same caliber as the firearm they'll be using while on duty. And then it goes into and actually spells out what the course of fire is. It must be required firing at least 30 rounds

of live ammunition, 75 passing score, you know, five rounds at a three-yard distance in 15 seconds, and so on and so forth.

2.5

Coming from my training background, I don't believe we really intended to put the course of fire in regulation. And if we did, I disagree with that.

Because courses of fire change and need to change. And if we can just simply say that they'll qualify with a minimum passing score of 75 percent, using an approved course of fire established and maintained by the Board, that gives us the ability to come up with our course of fire packet, along with the CFI training that they go through and follow. If the targets change, we're not —we don't have to worry about that. And, again, if we need to alter course of fires.

I'm a firm believer that if somebody takes an exam, that the next time they take the same exam, it be different, you know, maybe same questions, but in a different order, or whatever. So the way that we ran it, and I hate to compare it, but that's my background, at the Department of Corrections is myself and the Director would approve four courses of fire. And so for qualifications in certain months, you followed course of fire A. If they failed the next time they tested, they followed course of fire B. And so we kept the courses

of fire rotating, because that helps a certified 1 firearms instructor truly assess whether the person is 2 learning how to safely handle and firing a firearm or if 3 they simply have just memorized that course and they can 4 do that, but then, in a different situation, they don't 5 know how to handle any gun anymore. 6 7 So that's the reason for this proposal, to reference a course of fire. If you go down to 8 section 2, the written exam designated by the Board, 9 under section 2(a), it says "Eight hours of training and 10 instruction on carrying, handling and using a firearm 11 safely, including the completion of a written 12 13 examination designated by the Board, with a passing scoring of 75." I wanted to put in there "a minimum 14 15 passing score of 75." (b), "A minimum of" -- currently, it says "five 16 hours of instruction and training on a fire range." 17 Through many conversations with CFIs and the licensees, 18 the CFIs say these people need more than five hours on 19 20 the range. Because just because they can pass the test 21 doesn't mean they can safely carry and handle a firearm. So a suggestion of increasing that to eight hours to, 22 again, show good faith with the Legislature that we are 23 going to increase training. 24 Section 4, adding the word "minimum" passing 25

Because if they waited five days to mail it, and now it's in the 8 mail for two or three days, it comes in, we try to 9 enter them the same day, but automatically you've pushed 10 it out to where we could be looking at a couple of 11 12 weeks. 13 If the certified firearms instructors are set up in our database, which our developers have already 14 15 created this in the event that the Board approves it, the CFIs could, instead of hand-writing everything, log 16 into the system and add the individuals that were in 17 their training, enter their scores, and could make a 18 payment online for those individuals. And instantly, it 19 20 would come to us. It would go in a folder for us to 21 review and approve if all the documents were uploaded correctly or information was entered correctly. And we 22 could, essentially, be approving the firearms the same 23 day that we're notified by the CFI that he entered it. 24 2.5 The database would then automatically populate

And we're having a lot more people 2.5

1 requesting to use marked vehicles. Now, the reason we say "marked vehicles" is you're a PI and you're driving 2 in an unmarked vehicle to provide surveillance, or if 3 you're a security company that is transporting valuables in a white van, we don't see the need for their Private 5 Investigator Licensing Board license on there, because 6 7 that would kind of blow their cover. So that's why we said "marked vehicles." Those would be the vehicles 8 that have the name of the entities on them. 9

So we've added in all of the sections that uniform badge, patch or marked vehicles. And before, it said the applicant or licensee must submit with the application to the -- submit application before the use of a uniform badge, patch or marked vehicle. We added in there "submit to the Executive Director for approval."

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And then what I have to do is I have to forward those on to -- well, I don't have to. Las Vegas Metro also has to approve everything in the south per their city code, county code, I'm sorry. And so what I've done is once a licensee submits to me, then I will automatically forward it over to my contact at Las Vegas Metro, and it helps expedite the turnaround time. So there's actually two people approving the logos and the uniforms, to make sure that they are not similar to law

enforcement. 1 2 When we get to section 2, again, added marked vehicles. And then we have added some restrictions, 3 which, I think, we really need to discuss a little bit. What we've put in here is "Restrictions include use of a 5 seven point star and/or the Nevada State Seal on badges, 6 7 patches or logos"; we need to add vehicles as well. Then it says "uniforms and equipment that are 8 indistinguishable from local law enforcement; use of any 9 name, seal, or acronym that may be interpreted as 10 implying that the licensee or business is affiliated 11 with any government agency or entity." And then putting 12 1.3 on their "Each marked vehicle utilized by the licensee shall have the letters PILB followed by their private 14 15 investigator's license number permanently affixed to the driver's side, passenger side, and rear of the vehicle. 16 The license lettering must be sufficient in size to be 17 clearly legible from the center of the nearest street or 18 roadway measuring at least two inches high and one inch 19 20 wide." 21 That was provided to me by the county on what their regulations say. So we figured we should probably 22 mirror that to stay consistent. 23 24 Now, when it comes to the restrictions,

originally, it was seven point star, because those were

2.5

reserved for law enforcement only. However, now we're 1 seeing law enforcements, law enforcement branch out and 2 use shield-type badges as well. And what Las Vegas 3 Metro has a little concern on right now is, regardless 4 of the number of points on a star, when it's surrounded 5 by a circle especially, it closely resembles law 6 7 enforcement, whether it's Metro or Henderson or PPS. Now, obviously, the State seal cannot be used, but 8 that's in statute. 9 But what do we think we need to do as far as 10 stars used on the vehicles? 11 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is that a 12 1.3 question for the Board? MR. INGRAM: Yes, that's a question for the 14 15 Board. ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, before we 16 get there, I noticed, at least now in southern Nevada, 17 every single marked vehicle for security I've seen has 18 the PILB number on it. So there must have been a 19 20 requirement, maybe not an NAC, that they do require it. MR. INGRAM: That's correct. That's correct. 21 It was a direction given by the Board, but they never 22 put it into NAC. 23 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So your 24 question to the Board now, I mean besides everything 2.5

that you're asking to update, your question to the Board 1 is, in regards to the marked vehicles, how we feel about 2 putting stars on the cars? 3 MR. INGRAM: Right, stars or if there are any 4 other emblems of any kind. You know, we have in there 5 interpreted, the acronyms interpreted by implying the 6 7 licensee/business is affiliated with any government agency or entity. One of the things Metro will no 8 longer approve is -- there's some people grandfathered 9 in, but they will no longer approve "patrol" in large 10 letters unless it says "security" in front of it. 11 There's a lot of licensees that are buying 12 13 surplused law enforcement vehicles. And they're putting, you know, "call 9-1-1" on the back. They're 14 putting the antennas back on them, "to serve and 15 protect." They're trying to make it look as much as law 16 enforcement as they can. And that's one of the things 17 that we're trying to help Metro curb. 18 And so, again, I just really need, especially 19 20 with those of you with law enforcement background, 21 suggestions on what else we need to consider as far as restrictions. 22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I'm against 23

any badge being put on there. I don't -- you know, I

mean companies can do logos and they can not resemble a

But I don't know if this applies 9 to this NRS. And maybe Kevin can help. I mean this 10 NAC. 11 MR. INGRAM: Yeah, it's a great question, Board 12 13 Member Brown. It's not pertinent to this regulation. And the best information I can give you is an internship 14 is not considered a full license. And, therefore, it 15 says a licensee may bid on a contract. Until the 16 internship is completed with oversight of your mentor, 17 you're not considered a full license. So, therefore, 18 you would not be able to bid on a contract. 19 20 Once you then complete your internship and 21 you're signed off by the polygraph mentor, and we give you your full license, that's when you have the ability 22 to move forward individually and independent of your 23 24 mentor.

BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And maybe it helps that we

don't have that caveat internship license for patrol, 1 private patrolman license. 2 MR. INGRAM: Correct. Only the polygraph 3 examiner has that. 4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: 5 Right. Very unique license. MR. INGRAM: 6 7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Anything else? 8 Is there any public comment? 9 Okay. I'm not hearing any. All right. I will 10 entertain a motion. 11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'11 12 1.3 make a motion. ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please. 14 15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I make a motion on item number 86, NAC 648.570, to deny the proposed 16 language, well, yeah, deny the proposed language which 17 would allow unlicensed persons to submit a bid for 18 federal or state contracted activities regulated by this 19 20 the chapter; however, it does not permit that person to 2.1 conduct any activity in the State prior to obtaining a license to do so. 22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So I have 23 24 a motion to deny the proposal. Do I have a second? BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member 2.5

I second. 1 Nixon. 2 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any 3 comments from the Board or discussion? Okay. Hearing none, I'll call a vote. All 4 those in favor, state "aye." 5 (Board members said "aye.") 6 7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The motion to deny is approved unanimously. Next. 8 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you. Item number 87. 9 Newly proposed language to establish protocol for 10 license by endorsement. 11 This is the bill that passed last legislative 12 13 session. And we're required to put that into regulation. And, basically, what I did -- and we 14 15 discussed this before. I just wanted to put it back in as this full proposal. We're required to do this by the 16 bill, but we're also required to put it in a regulation 17 under our chapter. So it's pretty much verbatim from 18 what the bill said. I just changed a couple of the 19 20 terms to make it sound like a regulation instead of a 2.1 bill. ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: This is Rav. I 22 just, what does that mean in regular language, protocol 23 for license endorsement? 24 MR. INGRAM: It has a lot of details to it. 2.5

But in a nutshell, it was established for specifically 1 military personnel where they move around a lot or 2 medical personnel where they move around a lot, like for 3 And what they're asking is that if somebody is 4 licensed in another state, and then they are moving to 5 Nevada, as long as they -- it's like reciprocity. 6 7 long as they have met the same criterion requirements in the state they're currently licensed, and they're 8 similar to the requirements in Nevada, that the Board 9 only has 60 days to make a determination on whether that 10 person will be granted licensure or not in Nevada, 11 instead of like with our Board meetings being quarterly. 12 13 In the regulations, as they're written, I've yet to have somebody apply from another state that has 14 15 gone through the same process as us. And most of that is because of the in-depth background checks that we do, 16 reviewing their taxes and the credit, and accurate and 17 all of that. Most other states, and I don't know of any 18 others that do what we do, but most other states simply 19 20 do a criminal history background check on the applicant 2.1 for licensure and make sure they meet the minimum qualifications, which is usually like two or three 22 years, and they grant them licensure. 23 So even if they applied here, they would still 24 2.5 have to go through our whole process.

ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 1 So your proposal 2 is to take the language that became an NRS, to assist military spouses, as well as others, and apply that to 3 PILB's NACs? 4 Yes, it's a requirement of that 5 MR. INGRAM: bill that we'd use. 6 7 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm familiar with the bill. 8 MR. INGRAM: Yep. 9 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: It's years old. 10 And it's about time we clean up our language, so. 11 right. Thank you for answering that question. 12 1.3 MR. INGRAM: Yes. ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other 14 15 questions from the Board? All right. Hearing none, any public comment on 16 this proposal? 17 Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion. 18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member 19 20 Nixon. INGRAM: Correct. 18 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: But we have not 19 20 had one person, in the four years or three years that 2.1 this has been law, that's applied under that criteria? That is correct. MR. INGRAM: 22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. 23 24 Thank you for asking that question, Bobby. 2.5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okav.

We are removing the terminology "not more than." 14 And for this subsection 1, the way it is 15 currently written, it was broken down into three, I 16 would call them like tiers, first offense, second, and 17 third and subsequent offenses. We are removing that 18 tier system. And for violation of each of these 19 20 regulations or statutes, it would be one amount, not a 2.1 tier system going forward. Okay. I'm going to start with the first one 22 We are looking to add a violation fine amount 23 there. for NRS 648.070, subsection 3(d), in the amount of \$250. 24 The gray section below each of these is not 2.5

what we would see in statute or in regulation. I added 1 it for easy clarification so you don't have to keep 2 bouncing around and turning pages of what it's about. 3 So that first 648.070 is about notifying the 4 Board within 10 days in the event of a death, 5 resignation or removal of an officer. So if the 6 licensee doesn't tell us that an officer is no longer with the company, it's a violation in the amount of 8 \$250. 9 Okay. I will continue. We are adding a fine 10 amount for NRS 648.135. It was a tiered system. We are 11 removing that to a \$1,000 amount fine. This is for 12 1.3 someone, this is for a licensee who does not maintain 14 insurance and provide proof to the Board. 15 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Lori, I got a question. 16 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes. 17 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I don't have any 18 documents. You're referring to a document. I don't 19 20 have any documents. 21 MS. IRIZARRY: It's page 15 on the packet that we're discussing. 22 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 23 Page 15. 24 MR. INGRAM: You're just going to have to go down a little bit further. 2.5

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I don't have that, 1 2 either. 3 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Does anybody have it, besides me not having it, on the Board? 4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown has it. Brown has 5 it. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You get everything. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Lori, are you referring to 8 the information on the bottom of the graph you're 9 looking at or whatever? 10 MS. IRIZARRY: No, I'm talking about, so we are 11 talking about this NAC packet. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. 14 MS. IRIZARRY: And the last two pages of the 15 packet are the ones that I'm going to be speaking about, and I'm starting on page 15 of the violations. This is a \$250 fine amount. Subsection 4 of NRS 648.142. This is when 8 someone -- this is they have 30 days the notify the 9 Board of any and all address changes. If they do not 10 notify us, that is a \$250 fine amount. 11 And subsection 5 of 648, NRS 648.142 is stating 12 1.3 that a license issued is not assignable, in the amount is \$250. 14 And the next one there is subsection 1 of NAC 15 648.530, which is what we discussed previously about the 16 uniforms, badges and patches. If they do not gain 17 approval before using those uniforms, badges, patches or 18 vehicles, it's a \$500 fine. 19 20 Subsection 2 of NRS 648.140. If the qualified agent -- this is where the qualified agent must be 21 physically present in the state if they employ 22 registered employees. If you do not employ registered 23 employees or you don't have employees in the state, 24

you're not required to be a resident of Nevada.

those who do employ employees need to be a resident of 1 Nevada, or it's a \$1,000 fine. This is what we are 2 proposing. 3 Subsection 1 of NRS 648.148 states that they 4 must maintain a principal place of business. And that 5 is a \$500 fine amount. 6 7 NRS 648.148, subsection 2, is advertising, soliciting, I'm sorry, advertisement soliciting or 8 advertising business shall contain the licensee's name 9 and number. And that fine amount is \$250. 10 Subsection 1 of NRS 648.149 is they need to 11 notify the Board of each branch office within 10 days. 12 1.3 That fine amount is \$250. And that one, we came across 14 that based on half the amount of a principal place of business, for the \$250 amount. 15 And we discussed earlier about the NAC 648.343 16 about an audit process. This is if they are not in 17 compliance. So they do not provide documents. We would 18 issue a fine not more than \$5,000 for noncompliance. 19 20 Subsection 4 of NAC 648.345 states that a 21 person must carry their firearm card, slash, certification which they shall carry on their person. 22 So if someone's armed and they're not carrying a firearm 23 card on their person, it's a \$500 fine amount. 24

MR. INGRAM: And the reason we are justifying that amount is there's absolutely no way the licensee can add them to the roster if they're not registered. So the licensee full well knows that they're employing somebody that's not registered and, therefore, has not been vetted, background-checked or anything.

MS. IRIZARRY: The next one there is subsection 3(c) of NRS 648.140. This is where we talk about the roster. The licensee needs to notify the Board within three days after such employee begins their employment. It was \$25. We're making it \$100 per person.

The next one is subsection 5 of 648, NRS 648.3385. This is the one where we talk about -- we talked about it earlier and about maintaining a passport size photo for each person employed. So passport size photo or that registered copy of their active card would suffice. If they don't maintain those records or don't have a copy on file, it's a \$50 citation per person.

And subsection 1 of NAC 648.345 is that a person may not carry a firearm unless they have completed the course of training. So this is not someone who's taken the course and doesn't have their

This is employing someone or having 1 card on them. someone out in the field with a firearm that has never 2 gone through a firearm course. We jumped that to \$2,500 3 and/or review. Below that, we took off NAC 648.343. That was 5 the one talking about examinations. And we took out a 6 7 lot of that verbiage. It was about the audit. Since we revised that citation up above, we took the violation 8 out here. It just didn't, it didn't make sense anymore 9 considering the verbiage were changing. 10 NAC 648.341, ensuring that they have taken the 11 required exam. So like we discussed previously, if a 12 1.3 company is employing someone that has not taken an exam, it would be the \$250 amount per person. 14 This would 15 mean --MR. INGRAM: Again, that could be verified 16 through the database by the qualifying agent. 17 MS. IRIZARRY: The last one here is 18 subsection 3 of NAC 648.350. This is when someone must 19 20 successfully qualify for firearms certification every 2.1 six months. So if someone falls out of requal, they've taken the initial course, but they are working without 22 doing their requalification, \$500 per person. 23

And one thing that we wanted to add -- well,

"In the case of a second or subsequent violation, the Board will take any disciplinary action authorized pursuant to NRS 648.175 which the Board deems appropriate." So that verbiage is already in there. We can always jump to a Board hearing or other disciplinary actions for these offenses.

And subsection 4 is "If a notice of violation is issued, the Board will impose a fine of not more than" -- we're going from \$150 to \$250 -- "on a licensee's employee who violates subsection 1(b) of NAC 648.345." And that is the one which I was explaining to Board Member Nixon was if they are working armed but have never taken the firearm course.

And that's the end of this paper. But Kevin and I wanted to address one other thing. We talked about it today, regarding the violation. It goes along with this section as well. So at the top, we're talking it's \$1,000 for someone working that has never gotten a card. But we did not address here someone working, and if we approach them, they do not have their card on their person. We didn't include it here because it was verbiage that we were trying to impose.

In this packet, NAC 648.339 states that the person must carry their card on their person. If that's the case, we would like to attach a fine for that amount

different than from them not working, someone that 1 doesn't have a card at all. Because we believe that it 2 is a different type of violation, not having a card 3 whatsoever and not having a card on your person at the 4 time of a compliance check. 5 And with that, I will take questions. 6 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 7 Rav Flynn real What would be the fine for a security officer 8 quick. that doesn't have their card on them? 9 MS. IRIZARRY: We had not come up with an exact 10 dollar amount. We were possibly thinking keeping it in 11 line with probably about \$250. Because if you look at 12 1.3 the dollar amounts here, they're \$250, \$100, \$500, \$1,000. It's more significant not putting someone on 14 your roster, which is the \$100. But not having a card 15 on them which is similar to a firearm card was \$500. So 16 we just figure a firearm is more significant than not 17 having any work card on you. So half of that would be 18 So we were around the ballpark of \$250 working \$250. 19 20 someone, and when we approach them they don't have their 2.1 card on their person. And then 9 they could appeal to the Board. 10 Section 2 sets that appeal: Upon receipt of a 11 written request for exemption, the Board may grant an 12 13 exemption from the prohibitions set forth in subsection 1 if the Board finds that the private 14 activities of the unlicensed person on behalf of the 15 licensee would not create or tend to create: (a), a 16 conflict of interest; and, (b), the possibility of use 17 of his or her position with the public employer for 18 personal advantage. 19 20 So that's what it states now. Nowhere in that 21 regulation does it say that the Executive Director can 22 determine whether or not a person, under 1(c), if they're making a contribution to the public employees 23 retirement system. Right now, previous Board had 24 delegated to me that as long as I got a nonconflict 2.5

letter from their employer and a description of their 1 duties -- which, basically, we look to make sure they 2 don't have access to any kind of criminal history 3 records or anything like that -- that I could go ahead 4 and grant the work card instead of denying them and 5 having them go through the appeal process. Under 1(a) 6 7 and (b), I did not have that authority, and they must be referred to the Board for an appeal. 8 So in the proposed language, we added, under 9 section 2, the Board may grant an exemption from the 10 prohibitions set forth in subsection 1(a) and (b) if the 11 Board finds that the private activities would not create 12 1.3 or tend to create a conflict, or the possibility of a use of the position with the public employer for 14 15 personal advantage. And we were adding a section (c) to say that the Executive Director may grant an exemption 16 from the prohibitions set forth in subsection 1(c) if 17 the Director found that it was not or did not tend to 18 create a conflict or possibility of using their 19 20 employment for personal advantage. 2.1 ACTING BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you done?
