4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's call the
5 meeting to order.

6 This is the quarterly meeting of the Nevada
7 Private Investigators Licensing Board.

8 Can we have roll call of the members, please?

9 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.

10 Board Member Colbert?

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Here.

12 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Flynn?

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Here.

14 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nadeau?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Here.

16 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon?

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here.

18 MR. INGRAM: And Chairman Zane?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Here.

20 Item number two on the agenda is notice of
21 public comment.

22 At the beginning and at the end of the
23 meetings, we allow for public comment. These are
24 typically comments that would like to be made by members
25 of the public about matters that are not contained

1 within the agenda but are of concern to the Board and
2 the public wishes that the Board be brought up to speed
3 on a particular issue that's not on the agenda. None of
4 these issues can be dealt with in a decision, a decision
5 fashion, but it allows the public to indicate issues
6 that they believe are important that the Board should
7 take a look at and have an understanding of.

8 We don't, we don't restrict much. We have to
9 restrict it for time. Otherwise, people could just use
10 it as a forum to vent. But I mean unless you want to
11 talk about something that concerns the dairy board,
12 we're not going to cut you off, but, you know, we try to
13 keep it confined to what this Board has some
14 jurisdiction over.

15 So public comment's allowed now and at the end
16 of the meeting.

17 Additionally, for any item on the agenda that's
18 adversarial, which would be in a hearing or an appeal,
19 public comment isn't allowed nor accepted during those
20 agenda items, because there are due process
21 considerations for whoever is in the adversarial
22 setting.

23 So with that in mind, is there any public
24 comment in the south?

25 MR. INGRAM: I see none.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public
2 comment in the north?

3 Nobody's coming up.

4 Okay. Number three, let's review our current
5 financial report.

6 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, the financials have
7 been provided to all the Board members. I'll be happy
8 to answer any questions, if you have any.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Does the Board have any
10 questions regarding the financial report?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: (Shook head negatively.)

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Shook head negatively.)

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment?

16 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, we also just
17 completed our biennial audit on the finances. It's
18 conducted by an outside CPA firm as required by NRS.
19 And they found no discrepancies and give us a clean, a
20 clean report. That will be provided or has been
21 provided to the LCB for them to review.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

23 Any public comment?

24 Item number four, review and approve transcript
25 from September 6th, 2017 Board meeting, for possible

1 action.

2 Anybody like to make a motion?

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion to
4 approve the minutes from our last meeting.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
7 second. Any Board comment on the motion?

8 Any public comment?

9 All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

12 Passes unanimously.

13 Okay. Item number five, if you anticipate
14 giving any testimony today before the Board or making
15 any statements on an item that's on the agenda, we would
16 request that you now rise, raise your right hand, and
17 counsel will give you an oath.

18 Anybody here going to give testimony? Okay.

19 MR. INGRAM: Anybody that's going up for
20 licensure.

21 (Potential witnesses in Las Vegas and Carson
22 City stood.)

23 MS. BORDELOVE: Do you swear that the testimony
24 you give today will be the truth, the whole truth, and
25 nothing but the truth?

1 (Potential witnesses in Las Vegas and Carson
2 City were sworn.)

3 MS. BORDELOVE: You may be seated.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you all.

5 As a reminder, I would like everybody to
6 double-check your cell phones and make sure that they're
7 at least on do not disturb as best as possible.

8 Item number six, Invictus International
9 Holdings, LLC, dba Invictus International.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: May I go ahead and do a
13 block vote for some of these? And then, if any of the
14 Board members don't want numbers or don't want the items
15 included, then we can just set them out.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right. So on my
18 list, I have item six, Invictus International Holdings;
19 item seven, Griz Global Solutions; item eight, Vincenzo
20 Esposito; item nine, David A. Stewart; item 10,
21 Geoffrey S. Bennett; number 11, Scott D. -- I think it's
22 Levine; item number 12, Verisys Investigations,
23 Incorporated; item number 15, Jackson Services, LLC;
24 item 16, Lowers Risk Group, LLC; and item 17, Vegas Plus
25 Security and Event Staffing, LLC.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
2 for a block consideration.

3 For the people in the audience, what that
4 amounts to is Mr. Nadeau has made a motion, and we'll
5 check for a second, to hold all of these items that he
6 specified, being number six through 17, in block
7 fashion. So if there was someone here that wanted to
8 speak to any of these issues, they would need to speak
9 up, if they were held in block fashion. And as well,
10 the Board members have the ability to pull whatever they
11 think they might have an issue about as well.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I did not include number
15 13 and number 14.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I'm sorry.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So six, seven, eight,
19 nine, 10, 11, 12.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: 15, 16, 17.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 15, 16, 17. Okay.

22 Hopefully, I've explained that good enough for the
23 public, if you have something to say that's good or bad,
24 but generally it's only the bad that you'd be interested
25 to speaking to, on any one of those agenda items.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did any Board members
2 want to adjust that, or did you want to just move for a
3 second?

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, I wanted to see if
5 there was a second, and then I'm going to adjust it.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any second to
8 the motion?

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
11 and a second. Any Board discussion on the motion?

12 I would like to consider pulling item number
13 six, item number nine, item number 11, item number 15.
14 Was that on it?

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And item number 16.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd accept that as an
19 amendment to the motion.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How about the
21 second; will you accept the amendment?

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment
24 or question?

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: (Shook head negatively.)

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment?

3 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: None in the north?

5 Right?

6 All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

9 Carries unanimous.

10 I wanted to pull number six, Invictus
11 International Holdings, LLC. Oh, I'm sorry. Excuse me.
12 We'll go ahead with the block vote. Right?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I think, we just did.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Just did.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Just did? Okay. Well,
16 then, we're back to where I was. Thank you.

17 Is anybody here for Invictus International
18 Holdings?

19 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Krueger?

20 No one in the south.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No one in the south?

22 MR. INGRAM: No, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: With some of these,
24 there's a chance people won't appear. Do we have any
25 knowledge as to whether or not Mr. Krueger intended to

1 be here, or may be here, or is running late, or anything
2 like that?

3 MR. INGRAM: I have no additional information.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What's the Board's
5 pleasure? We can trail it, in case he's going to make
6 it later, or I can address my issues now, whatever the
7 Board's pleasure.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I'd suggest we
9 trail it.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We will trail item
11 number six.

12 Then, the next item was, I believe, number
13 nine, David A. Stewart. Anybody here for David A.
14 Stewart?

15 MR. INGRAM: No one in the south.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anybody in the north?
17 Okay. Likewise, trail it, Board's pleasure?
18 Thank you.

19 All right. The next item I have is item number
20 11, Scott D. Levine.

21 MR. INGRAM: He just stepped out for a minute.
22 He'll be back.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

24 MR. INGRAM: I believe, he has returned.

25 Mr. Levine?

1 MR. LEVINE: Come up?

2 MR. INGRAM: Yes, please.

3 MR. LEVINE: Good morning. Sorry about that.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. The reason
5 that I had this pulled was not a question regarding the
6 application. It was that I believe that I have a
7 conflict of interest to vote on this matter. So,
8 therefore, I couldn't, didn't want it to be unclear to
9 the public why I would abstain. So I needed to have an
10 opportunity to explain it.

11 I have a business relationship with the
12 applicant. That business relationship does not
13 represent a major financial issue in the overall scheme
14 of my corporate entity. However, it is a significant
15 volume in my process server license.

16 So, therefore, I feel that it's in the best
17 interest of the Board and the public that I represent an
18 abstention because of this business relationship, and
19 ask that Mr. Nadeau handle the agenda item.

20 Please.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So with Chairman
22 Zane recusing himself, we'd accept a motion or
23 discussion on item number 11.

24 MR. LEVINE: Item what?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Does the Board have any

1 questions of Mr. Levine?

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I don't.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: None down here.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So, I guess, I'm
5 still waiting for a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: This is Ray Flynn. I'll
7 make a motion that Scott Levine be granted a change in
8 his licensing status, that he be the qualifying agent,
9 and that that be transferred from J.J.L Process Corp.,
10 license number 1561, to a new process server limited
11 liability company, ProVest Litigation Services, LLC.
12 Members to be approved are James M. Ward and Victor G.
13 Draper. This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
14 requirements.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: We have a motion and a
17 second. Any discussion on the motion?

18 Is there any public comment on this?

19 MR. INGRAM: I see none.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Hearing no discussion and
21 no public comment, vote on the motion. All in favor,
22 say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right. Any opposed?

25 It passes unanimously. (Board Member Zane had

1 recused himself and abstained from the vote.)

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Levine.

3 MR. LEVINE: Okay. Have a nice day.

4 MR. INGRAM: We'll be in contact with you in
5 the next couple of days.

6 MR. LEVINE: Thank you.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right. Mr. Chairman.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.

9 Item number 15, right?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I think, we're on 13.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did I ask for 15 before?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: It wasn't part of my
13 motion.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I see. I'm back
15 with you.

16 Item number 13, please. Global Security
17 Corporation is applying for a new private patrolman
18 license.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Come on up.

20 He's here.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

22 MR. GRONAUER: Good morning.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who do we have? I can
25 see Mr. Gronauer.

1 MR. McCLURE: I'm Bill McClure. I'm the CEO
2 for Global Security Corporation.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you move the mic a
4 little bit closer to you, sir? There you go.

5 MR. McCLURE: Sure. I'm Bill McClure. I'm the
6 CEO of Global Security Corporation.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Can you tell
8 us a little bit about what your plan is and what you
9 hope to accomplish?

10 MR. McCLURE: Yes. Yes, sir. Our intention,
11 if we are granted a license, is to pursue a Federal
12 Protective Service contract that should be coming out
13 soon through the Department of the Homeland Security.
14 And so we hope to be competitive on that for a statewide
15 contract through FPS. As well as pursue commercial
16 business as well in Nevada.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

18 Is there any public comment regarding agenda
19 item number 13?

20 None in the north. Any in the south?

21 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Nadeau.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd make a
24 motion that Global Security Corporation be granted a new
25 private patrol license and that Robert Gronauer, license

1 number 1660A, as in Adam, be granted, that his
2 individual license be kept in abeyance so that he can
3 become the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be
4 approved are Billy H. McClure, Gregory P. Allen and
5 Roy L. Williams. All subject to all statutory and
6 regulatory requirements.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
8 have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment on the
11 motion?

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, sir, Mr. Chair. Ray
13 Flynn here. I'm going to have to recuse myself. I've
14 known Mr. Gronauer probably close to --

15 MR. GRONAUER: 40 years.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, about close to 40
17 years, through my -- when we were at Metro together.
18 I've also been in touch with him since we've both
19 retired. I've got nothing but glowing things to say.
20 But I need to recuse myself.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 Any other Board comment or questions?

23 We have a motion and a second. All in favor,
24 say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
2 We'll record the one abstention. Otherwise,
3 it's unanimous.

4 Congratulations. Thank you.

5 MR. McCLURE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and
6 Board.

7 MR. GRONAUER: Thank you. Could, Chairman,
8 could -- Mr. Chairman, could Mr. Flynn give me some of
9 them glowing comments?

10 (Laughter.)

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We don't have enough time
12 this morning, sir.

13 MR. GRONAUER: Thank you.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you guys.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The next item is number
16 14, Securitas Critical Infrastructure Services. Is
17 there anybody here for item number 14?

18 MR. INGRAM: Yes, in the south.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Did he say 13 or 14?

20 MR. INGRAM: 14.

21 MR. WRIGHT: Hello.

22 MR. CONTEH: Good morning.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning to you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
25 yourself, please, so we can get it on the record?

1 MR. WRIGHT: My name is Patrick Wright. I'm
2 putting my license in abeyance.

3 MR. CONTEH: My name is Jonathan Conteh. I'm
4 the District Director for Securitas Critical
5 Infrastructure Services.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

7 Mr. Nadeau.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I was just curious what
9 this, is this a piece of the Securitas, or is this a
10 whole separate entity, or what? I was just curious what
11 the dynamic was here.

12 MR. CONTEH: Sure. SCIS, yeah, we are under
13 the Securitas umbrella. We handle primarily the
14 government contract dealing with clearing security
15 officers.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So it's just, this
17 is part of Securitas, but this a whole new branch, or,
18 because --

19 MR. CONTEH: Yes.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- Securitas has been in
21 Nevada for quite a while.

22 MR. CONTEH: Right.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm just curious what the
24 change is.

25 MR. WRIGHT: So Securitas is already licensed

1 in Nevada. This is a proxy corporation that allows for
2 federal bids from a foreign entity. This is an
3 American-owned wholly subsidiary of Securitas.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public
6 comment regarding item number 14 on the agenda?

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Just so we have it, so
8 what will you be doing security with? That's where I'm
9 unclear.

10 MR. WRIGHT: Aerospace and defense.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment,
13 question?

14 Entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman, I would
16 move that Securitas Critical Infrastructure Services,
17 Incorporated be granted a new private patrol license,
18 Patrick A. Wright, license number 2214B, as in boy, X as
19 in x-ray, be -- that his license be placed in abeyance
20 and so he may become the qualifying agent. Corporate
21 officers to be approved are Mark B. Howell and Kevin M.
22 Sand -- I think, it's Sandkuhler. This is subject to
23 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
25 have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and second. Any
3 other Board comment or questions on the motion?

4 All in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Carries unanimous. Thank you.

8 Congratulations.

9 MR. WRIGHT: Thank you very much.

10 MR. CONTEH: Thank you.

11 MR. WRIGHT: Have a wonderful day.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You, too. Good luck,
13 guys.

14 MR. WRIGHT: Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That gets us through item
16 17, correct?

17 MR. INGRAM: We have 15 and 16.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I was confused on
19 whether -- did you ask for 15 and 16 in the pull?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So, then, we're at
22 15.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I'm sorry. Thank you
24 for keeping me in line. I had this all chronologically
25 ready to proceed.

1 Number 15, Jackson Services, LLC. Anybody
2 there for Jackson Services?

3 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.

4 MR. JACKSON: Good morning, Mr. Chairman.

5 MR. INGRAM: Excuse me. Just a second.

6 Mr. Jackson, were you sworn in?

7 MR. JACKSON: Yes.

8 MR. INGRAM: Okay.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce in
10 yourself and --

11 MR. JACKSON: My name is James M. Jackson.
12 Yes. My name is James M. Jackson.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Jackson, the
14 reason that I had this pulled is I had a couple of
15 questions regarding the corporate status of the entity.
16 If you'll give me just a second to catch up with myself
17 here.

18 You had -- are you aware of whether or not your
19 corporate status in Nevada of the company is in default?

20 MR. JACKSON: It is a brand-new LLC,
21 Mr. Chairman.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah. I was chasing down
23 a couple. Let me pull it up real quick.

24 On a few of these that were on what would have
25 probably ended up being the consent agenda, occasionally

1 I double-check the corporate standing if they're not a
2 sole entity. And I noticed, as of my current view of
3 the Secretary of State's Office, the corporation or the
4 LLC is in default status with a failure to list
5 officers. Would you be aware of that?

6 MR. JACKSON: No, sir. I only applied for that
7 LLC in September. And I was the only officer on the
8 application, and I received no notification and was
9 unaware of any notice of default.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. It indicates here
11 that it was a file date of September 18th, 2017. Does
12 that sound about right?

13 MR. JACKSON: It does, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And there's a list
15 of officers due October 31st, 2017.

16 MR. JACKSON: It was the original application.
17 I don't recall the October date, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So would it be
19 your position that if this miniscule act was just an
20 oversight, that you would understand that you'd need to
21 fix that before doing any business in Nevada, right?

22 MR. JACKSON: Yes, sir, immediately.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I can only go off of what
24 I read, which is what has been reflected on the
25 Secretary of State's website. So anybody in the public

1 that asks can take a look at it. But I see, in order to
2 make the filing, when you made it in September, the
3 necessary stuff was received, apparently, by the
4 Secretary of State, but you have inadvertently not
5 remembered to send in the updated list after you formed
6 the company. That's my guess.

7 MR. JACKSON: I understand. I can remedy that.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. That's all I had,
9 the only question that I had.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, Mr. Chair, this is
11 Ray Flynn. I've got a question for counsel. Are we
12 okay to take a vote on this, considering that the
13 paperwork and what is required for the license is not in
14 order, or should we hold this in abeyance to our next
15 meeting?

16 MS. BORDELOVE: Because the status is default,
17 I might say hold. But if you'll give me a minute, I'll
18 look and see if you have anything specific in your
19 statutes about that. But it is an LLC that is not in
20 current active status.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, do you
22 understand my question?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

24 MS. BORDELOVE: Actually, one, just for the
25 quick comment from Kevin here, and he has a good point,

1 you could, essentially, delegate it to staff, that you
2 approve it pending it becoming active by a certain date,
3 and that staff is to not approve this until it's active.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

5 MS. BORDELOVE: But that is something you could
6 delegate to staff.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. I'm good with
8 that.

9 MR. INGRAM: The original background
10 information shows that it was active at the time that
11 that was run. Since that time, it's gone into default,
12 which looks like it was for the failure of the updated
13 list of officers. Which he may or may not have been
14 notified, since it was the month prior that he activated
15 it.

16 So we would be happy to hold off anything if
17 the Board so chooses to grant.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment?

19 Hearing none, entertain a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I just have a question for
22 the applicant, that, Mr. Jackson, do you understand
23 what's going on?

24 MR. JACKSON: Oh, absolutely, sir.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

1 MR. JACKSON: I can immediately take care of
2 this.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Then, since I
4 brought it up, Mr. Chair, I'll make a motion. Jackson
5 Services, LLC, dba Jackson Services, is applying for a
6 private investigator, private patrolman, process server
7 license. If approved, Mr. Jackson, license number
8 2042A, B and C, is requesting that his individual
9 licenses be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
10 qualifying agent. Member to be approved is James M.
11 Jackson. This is subject to all statutory and
12 regulatory requirements. I would further add that this
13 license be held until Mr. Jackson and staff can work out
14 his outstanding issue on his LLC with the Secretary of
15 State.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I've got a motion. Is
17 there a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
21 question on the motion?

22 All in favor, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

25 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

1 MR. JACKSON: Thank you.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 16, Lowers
4 Risk Group, LLC. Is there anybody here for Lowers?

5 MR. INGRAM: I see no one in the south.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Board pleasure,
7 we'll trail it.

8 Okay. We're up to 17 now, right?

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, we voted.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 18, Joseph D.
11 Angulo?

12 MR. INGRAM: Good morning.

13 MR. ANGULO: Good morning.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

15 MR. ANGULO: Good morning.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
17 yourself and tell us about your license application?

18 MR. ANGULO: Yes. I'm Joseph Angulo, the
19 Branch Manager with U.S. Security Associates. I'm
20 applying to be the qualified agent for U.S. Security; if
21 approved, to continue managing the overall security
22 operations for the company.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
24 public comment regarding the license application?

25 Any Board comment regarding the license

1 application for item number 18?

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair.

3 Mr. Angulo, you had a bankruptcy a few years
4 back.

5 MR. ANGULO: That's correct.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Do you want to explain to
7 us what happened, so we can alleviate any concerns about
8 it?

9 MR. ANGULO: It was just personal matters. I
10 was working previously with another company. And I
11 moved out-of-state. When I came back, during the
12 process of looking for another job, I went into
13 financial, you know, ruins and, you know, had trouble,
14 you know, to be able to climb out of that. But when I
15 got, you know, working with U.S. Security Associates, I
16 was able to, you know, get that taken care of and
17 continue on, and in that process.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

19 MR. ANGULO: M-hm (affirmative).

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was there --

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm good, Mr. Chair.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm sorry.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm good.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah. Was there any
25 discussion with staff, when they were conducting the

1 investigation, that the bankruptcy was due mostly to
2 medical?

3 MS. DONALD: Shelly Donald. I took this over
4 for Jason Woodruff. So I did not speak to Mr. Angulo
5 personally. It was Jason's applicant at the time, from
6 the last Board meeting. So I'm unsure.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you have any medical
8 issues that were contributory to the bankruptcy filing?

9 MR. ANGULO: None.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: None. If one of the
11 investigators put it down, he would have been mistaken?

12 MR. ANGULO: That's correct.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Hang on just a
14 second so I can double-check.

15 It could have been I was mistaken. Maybe I
16 have you confused with another file. If so, I
17 apologize.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Angulo, you were on
21 the September agenda, but you didn't make the meeting.
22 Was there some reason for that, or?

23 MR. ANGULO: No, that was my fault. I just
24 misunderstood the process and wasn't aware I needed to
25 actually be here in person. I apologize for that.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you,
2 Mr. Chair.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 Any other Board questions?

5 Entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I move that
7 Joseph D. Angulo be granted an individual private patrol
8 license, that his individual license be placed in
9 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent for
10 U.S. Security Associates, Incorporated, license number
11 152, subject to all statutory and regulatory
12 requirements.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
14 there a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

17 MR. INGRAM: You have a second from Board
18 Member Nixon.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

20 We have a motion and a second. Any Board
21 comment or questions?

22 All in favor, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

25 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

1 MR. ANGULO: Thank you.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

3 MR. ANGULO: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 19, Donan
5 Engineering Company. Is there anybody here for --

6 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Fetrow?

7 No one present in the south.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll trail 19.

9 Number 20, 2nd Look Investigation & Consulting,
10 LLC. Anybody here for 2nd Look?

11 Good morning.

12 MR. SCHAIBLE: Good morning, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
14 yourself and tell us what you're hoping to do?

15 MR. SCHAIBLE: I'm Mark Schaible. I'm the
16 founder of 2nd Look Investigation Consulting. My
17 expertise, sir, has been 27 years in law enforcement as
18 an investigator for fatal and serious injury crashes.
19 Most of what I intend to do is going to be along the
20 product liabilities side with corporations such as
21 Michelin, Continental, renew some acquaintances with
22 them. I've done some work with them in the past, when I
23 was in law enforcement.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're now all done and
25 you're retired up, right?

1 MR. SCHAIBLE: I am.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
3 public comment regarding the agenda item, number 20,
4 2nd Look?

5 Any Board comment?

6 Entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
8 2nd Look Investigation & Consulting, LLC, doing business
9 as 2nd Look Investigation & Consulting, be approved a
10 new corporate private investigator's license, and that
11 Mark W. Schaible be approved for an individual private
12 investigator's license, and that his individual license
13 be placed into abeyance so that he may be the qualifying
14 agent. Members to be approved are Mark W. Schaible,
15 Patti L. Schaible. This is subject to all statutory and
16 regulatory requirements.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
18 have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
21 on the motion?

22 All right. Hearing none, all in favor, say
23 "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

1 Congratulations.

2 MR. SCHAIBLE: Thank you, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

4 MR. SCHAIBLE: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 21,

6 705 Investigations, LLC.

7 Good morning.

8 MR. DUNN: Good morning.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, it's Ray Flynn.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I just need, I just need
12 to disclose for the record that I've known Mr. Dunn for
13 approximately 20 years. He grew up in the North
14 Las Vegas Police Department. I grew up in Metro. We
15 served at the same ranks many times and worked
16 collaboratively. But we've never supervised each other,
17 nor is there a personal relationship outside the fact
18 that he's a Mustang enthusiast, of which I am also.

19 But I don't see any problem with me voting on
20 this one.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 Mr. Dunn, can you tell us just a little bit
23 about your background and what you hope to do?

24 MR. DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. My name is
25 Victor Dunn, retired Deputy Chief of North Las Vegas

1 Police Department. I'm -- the reason for applying for
2 this license is to utilize some of the skills I've
3 acquired over my past career, to provide a service to my
4 community, and to future opportunities.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.

6 Is there any public comment regarding license
7 application agenda item number 21?

8 MR. INGRAM: None.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment,
10 questions?

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Question. Mr. Dunn,
14 you're still with the Constable's Office?

15 MR. DUNN: Yes, sir. I would be relinquishing
16 that job upon approval from the Board.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 Any other Board question or comment?

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that
25 705 Investigations, LLC be granted a private

1 investigator license, Victor L. Dunn be granted an
2 individual private investigator license, and that this
3 license be held in abeyance pending his termination with
4 the Constable's Office, subject -- member to be
5 approved is Victor L. Dunn. This is subject to all
6 statutory and regulatory requirements.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
8 have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
11 question on the motion?

12 All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

15 Passes unanimous.

16 If you don't mind, Mr. Dunn, can you tell me
17 the reasoning behind the title, the name of the company?

18 MR. DUNN: 705 was my badge number, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Got you. Thank you.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck.

21 MR. DUNN: I like that.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 22, Jamie F.
23 Pelchat?

24 MR. INGRAM: She's in the south.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: In the south.

1 Hi. Can you introduce yourself and give us a
2 little bit of background and tell us what you hope to
3 do?

4 MS. PELCHAT: Yes. I'm Jamie F. Pelchat. I'm
5 with General Information Services. And our qualifying
6 agent retired from the business. And I'm hoping to fill
7 that role, if approved.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public
9 comment regarding the application?

10 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
12 regarding the application?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a question. The
15 individual that signed the contract for the qualifying
16 agent on behalf of the company is somebody by the name
17 of Nate Gabelman, and he listed his position as
18 president of the company. Are you familiar with
19 Mr. Gabelman?

20 MS. PELCHAT: Yes, I am.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Now, if we go to
22 the Secretary of State's office and check on the officer
23 status of the company -- hang on just a second.

24 This is General Information Services, right?

25 MS. PELCHAT: That's correct.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The listed president for
2 the entity is somebody by the name of Albert Bueno. Are
3 you familiar with Mr. Bueno?

4 MS. PELCHAT: Yes, sir. Mr. Bueno retired
5 recently.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I see. And the secretary
7 of the company is Jeanne Conrad. Are you familiar with
8 Jeanne?

9 MS. PELCHAT: Yes.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And Raymond Conrad is
11 listed as the treasurer. Is he still there?

12 MS. PELCHAT: He is.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what about Sharon
14 Mann being a director?

15 MS. PELCHAT: Yes.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there anybody
17 that I missed that's in the corporate structure, besides
18 Mr. Gabelman?

19 MS. PELCHAT: I would need to check on our
20 general counsel, executive vice president and general
21 counsel. Just I'm not sure if he would be considered a
22 part of the corporate board or not. I would need to
23 check on that. But everyone else is still there.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How long has it been
25 since Mr. Bueno retired?

1 MS. PELCHAT: Probably three months,
2 approximately.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: General Information
4 Services, can staff indicate whether or not we have had
5 any update regarding the retirement of the president of
6 the corporation?

7 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. I took this
8 one over for Jason Woodruff as well. So I am unclear.

9 MR. INGRAM: Gisela, do you have some
10 information?

11 MS. CORRAL: Yes, we did receive notice.
12 Gisela Corral, Licensing Specialist. We did receive
13 notice on Mr. Bueno's retirement. And our records have
14 been updated accordingly.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So Mr. -- so we
16 still need to investigate the new president; is that
17 where I'm getting?

18 MR. INGRAM: We would need to get a new
19 corporate officer application for him, yes.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

21 MR. INGRAM: And have him investigated, yes.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So all we're doing
23 right now is just the Q agent?

24 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. That's all I

1 have. Any other Board comment or question?

2 I'd entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move
4 that --

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: This is Ray Flynn. Oh.
6 Go ahead. Please.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. I move that
8 Jamie F. Pelchat be approved for an individual private
9 investigator's license and that her individual license
10 be placed into abeyance so that she may become the
11 qualifying agent for General Information Services,
12 Incorporated, license number 1422, this subject to all
13 statutory and regulatory requirements.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do I
15 have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion and a
18 second. Any Board comments or questions on the motion?

19 All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
22 Congratulations.

23 MS. PELCHAT: Thank you.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

25 MS. PELCHAT: Thank you.

1 MR. INGRAM: Congratulations.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 23, Ronald R.
3 Dormido.

4 MR. DORMIDO: Yes, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Up in the north.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I don't think he was
7 sworn in earlier.

8 MR. DORMIDO: No. I apologize. I would need
9 to be sworn in before I speak this morning.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll need to
11 swear him in, please.

12 MS. BORDELOVE: Will you please raise your
13 right hand. Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole
14 truth, and nothing but the truth?

15 MR. DORMIDO: I do.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have a seat. Can you
17 introduce yourself and tell us what you're hoping to do?

18 MR. DORMIDO: Yes, sir. My name as Ronald R.
19 Dormido. I am retired, Special Agent, U.S. Army
20 Intelligence. And I'm applying to be the qualifying
21 agent for Kroll Cyber Security.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
23 public comment regarding item number 23?

24 Any Board comment regarding item number 23?

25 Thank you for your service, by the way.

1 MR. DORMIDO: Yes, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I would move
4 that Robert R. Dormido be approved an individual private
5 investigator's license, and that his individual license
6 be placed into abeyance so that he may become the
7 qualifying agent for Kroll Cyber Security, LLC, license
8 number 2199A, this subject to all statutory and
9 regulatory requirements.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
11 there a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a second. Any
15 Board comment or question on the motion?

16 All in favor, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

19 Is Member Flynn absent?

20 MR. INGRAM: I was going to say as soon as the
21 vote finished, Mr. Flynn had to step out for a couple
22 minutes.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

24 MR. INGRAM: And he'll be back. So he did not,
25 he was not included in the vote.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So we got a four,
2 four for the license and one absence. Congratulations.

3 MR. DORMIDO: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

5 Item number 24, Premier Risk Solutions, LLC.

6 MR. INGRAM: They're in the south.

7 MR. KETTER: Good morning.

8 MR. DELAMERE: Good morning.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. Can you
10 introduce yourself and tell us what you're hoping to do?

11 MR. KETTER: My name is Steve Ketter. I'm the
12 Operations Manager for Premier Risk Solutions out of
13 Las Vegas. We are applying for the private patrolman
14 license. I'm applying for the qualifying agent.

15 I've been in the investigative and the security
16 industry for about 28 years now. And we're looking to
17 just do business here in Nevada. Our company primarily
18 operates worldwide. And we're looking to do business
19 here.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any public comment
21 regarding the license application item number 24?

22 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment?

24 Entertain a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that

1 Premier Risk Solutions, LLC be granted a new corporate
2 private patrol license, Steven J. Ketter be granted an
3 individual private patrol license, and that his license,
4 individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may
5 become the qualifying agent. Members to be approved are
6 Michael J. Delamere and Audrey D. Emmett. Subject to
7 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
9 have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second.

12 Any comment or question on the motion from the Board?

13 All in favor, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
16 Congratulations.

17 MR. KETTER: Hm?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Congratulations.

19 MR. KETTER: Thank you. Thank you very much.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

21 MR. KETTER: Gentlemen and ladies, thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 25, Pacific
23 Protection Services, Inc.

24 MR. STAPLES: Good morning.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. Can you

1 introduce yourself and tell us what your plans are?

2 MR. STAPLES: Yes, sir. My name is Melvin
3 Staples. I'm the president and cofounder of Pacific
4 Protection Services. We've been providing security,
5 contract security services in California for the last 34
6 years. I started as a security officer and when we
7 founded the company. And now I'm the CEO of the
8 company.

9 Our plans is to obtain, if approved, a license
10 in Nevada. We have national customers who ask for our
11 service. So we would like to service them also in the
12 state of Nevada.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Any public comment regarding the license
15 application?

16 Any Board comment regarding number 25?

17 Entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: This is Ray Flynn. That
19 Pacific Protection Services, Inc. be granted a new
20 private patrolman's license. Mr. Melvin Staples has
21 also applied for an individual private patrolman
22 license. On approval, he is requesting that his
23 individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may
24 become the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be
25 approved are Melvin Staples and Steve Frye. This is

1 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 26, Omerta
16 Security Solutions, LLC.

17 MR. BISHOP: Good morning, Board members, how
18 are you all doing today?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
21 yourself and tell us what you would like to do?

22 MR. BISHOP: My name is Brett Anthony Bishop.
23 What I'm planning to do is provide private security to
24 the private sector.

25 I was former Infantry in 2nd Papa 3rd in Italy.

1 And then I got medically discharged. And then I went
2 into Afghanistan as private security contractors out
3 there. I have learned a lot out in Afghanistan working
4 with clients. And I'm bringing back my knowledge to
5 improve. Because security is an evolving door, it's
6 always evolving. And it needs to evolve in the states
7 as well. And I'm here to provide that.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for your
9 service.

10 MR. BISHOP: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public
12 comment regarding the application?

13 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comments?
15 Entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
17 Omerta Security Solutions, LLC be approved a new
18 corporate private patrolman's license, and that Brett A.
19 Bishop be granted an individual private patrolman
20 license, and that his individual license be placed into
21 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent,
22 this subject to all statutory and regulatory
23 requirements.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
25 have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
3 or question on the motion?

4 It should be noted that Mr. Nadeau had to leave
5 for a few minutes, so he is not in attendance right now.
6 So we have a motion and a second. Mr. Nadeau will not
7 participate in the agenda item.

8 So all in favor, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

11 It's four, four ayes and one absent.

12 Congratulations. Good luck.

13 MR. BISHOP: Thank you very much. I appreciate
14 it. Have a wonderful day.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You have a good day.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It's anticipated that
17 Mr. Nadeau may be busy for about 15 minutes. What's the
18 pleasure of the Board; do you want to take a break, or
19 would you like to proceed with one Board member absent?

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I think, we can proceed.
21 We have a quorum.

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I agree.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. The next item
24 on the agenda is number 27, Side by Side Security
25 Strategic Solutions. Anybody here for item number 27?

1 MR. INGRAM: Ms. Cargill?

2 No one present in the south.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So we'll trail it.

4 Item number 28, Michael R.J. Loumos?

5 MR. LOUMOS: Good morning.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning, how are
7 you?

10 yourself and tell us a little bit about what you're
11 hoping to do?

12 MR. LOUMOS: My name is Michael Loumos. I'm
13 the Director of Operations for Alpha Video Surveillance,
14 and I'm looking to become the QA for the company.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public

17 Any Board comment regarding number 27?

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, it's item
19 number 28. We're trailing 27.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm sorry. Thank you. I
21 appreciate it. 28. Any public comment on item number
22 28?

23 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment on item
25 number 28?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a question. Lord
3 Management Group, Inc., do you know if it has any
4 relationship with Lord Management Group, LLC?

5 MR. LOUMOS: I don't know for sure, but I don't
6 believe so.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there anybody at Inc.
8 by the name of Geraldine Holmes?

9 MR. LOUMOS: Say that again.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there anybody employed
11 or an officer at the Lord Management Group, Inc. by the
12 name of Geraldine Holmes?

13 MR. LOUMOS: No.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. That's all I had.
15 Any other Board comment or question?

16 Entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Mr. Chairman, I move that
18 Mr. Michael R.J. Loumos be granted an individual private
19 patrol license. When granted, he is appealing that his
20 individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may
21 become the qualifying agent for Lord Management Group,
22 Incorporated, dba Alpha Video Surveillance, license
23 number 2274B. This is subject to all statutory and
24 regulatory requirements.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.

1 Is there a second?

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. We got
5 a second. Any Board comment or question regarding the
6 motion?

7 All in favor, say "aye."

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 29, Forrest D.
16 Dodd, who's applying on behalf of Command Security
17 Corporation.

18 Good morning.

19 MR. DODD: Yes, good morning, Mr. Chairman.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
21 yourself and tell us what you're hoping to do?

22 MR. DODD: Yes. Good morning, Mr. Chairman.
23 My name is Forrest Dodd. I'm the Vice President of
24 Federal Operations for Command Security Corporation.
25 And, if approved, I'm hoping to become the qualifying

1 agent for Command Security so we can begin to pursue
2 business in the state of Nevada.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Is there
4 anybody in the public that wishes to comment on item
5 number 29?

6 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

9 I'll entertain a motion.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
18 have a second?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
21 or question on the motion?

22 All in favor, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 And one absent for Mr. Nadeau. So
25 congratulations. Thank you. Good luck.

1 MR. DODD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 30, Sami P.
3 Eskelin?

4 MR. ESKELIN: Yep.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Frontline Security
6 Solutions.

7 MR. ESKELIN: Good morning.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
10 yourself and tell us what you'd like to do?

11 MR. ESKELIN: Yes, sir. My name is Sami P.
12 Eskelin. I'm a lieutenant in the Finnish Military,
13 Specialized Infantry, at the Reconnaissance Platoon.
14 After that, I worked for Securitas and Finland and
15 Sweden, and I was a branch manager for Greek Reaction
16 Task Unit as well as product development.

17 What I would like to do is offer a security
18 assessment and consultation for households and small
19 businesses as well as training solutions.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 Is there any public comment regarding item
22 number 30?

23 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any Board
25 comment regarding item number 30?

1 I'll entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn, that item
3 number 30, Sami P. Eskelin, dba Frontline Security
4 Solutions, be granted an individual private patrolman's
5 license. This is subject to all statutory and
6 regulatory requirements.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion, and we
9 have a second. Any Board comment or question on the
10 motion?

11 All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
14 With one absentee, four. Congratulations.

15 MR. ESKELIN: Thank you, sir. Thank you.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Congratulations.

17 MR. ESKELIN: Thank you, sir.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Congratulations. Good
19 luck.

20 MR. ESKELIN: Thank you. Have a great day.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 31, David W.
22 Hoffman.

23 MR. HOFFMAN: Good morning.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

25 MR. HOFFMAN: My name's David Hoffman. I've --

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Hoffman --

2 MR. HOFFMAN: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm sorry. Go ahead.

4 MR. HOFFMAN: My name's David Hoffman. I've
5 been in the security industry for about 28 years. And
6 my plan here in Vegas, Las Vegas is to provide special
7 event security primarily at the convention center.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
9 public comment regarding the agenda item number 31?

10 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment
12 regarding item number 31?

13 Entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
15 David W. Hoffman be granted an individual private
16 patrolman license, this subject to all statutory and
17 regulatory requirements.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Do I
19 have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
22 question on the motion?

23 All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

1 One absentee. Congratulations.

2 MR. HOFFMAN: Thank you so much. Have a
3 wonderful day.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 32, Neil D.
5 Heath.

6 MR. HEATH: Good morning.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

8 MR. HEATH: Neil Heath applying for an
9 individual process server license.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Were you here
11 since the beginning of the meeting, Mr. Heath?

12 MR. HEATH: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. I just wanted
14 to make a record clarification. I abstained from voting
15 with regard to your current employer or previous
16 employer, ProVest?

14 Entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that

17 license, this subject to all statutory and regulatory
18 requirements.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
20 have a second?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
23 or question on the motion?

24 All in favor, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: One absentee.

2 Congratulations.

3 MR. HEATH: Thank you very much.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

5 MR. HEATH: Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 33, GMcCurdy
7 Consulting Services.

8 Good morning.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, it's Ray Flynn
10 again.

11 MR. McCURDY: Good morning.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm going to have to
13 abstain from this vote. Mr. McCurdy and I were partners
14 in Metro, worked together his entire career, and he's
15 one of my closest personal friends.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, we still
17 maintain a quorum. So we'll go ahead and proceed, and
18 we won't hold that relationship against you, sir.

19 MR. McCURDY: Thanks.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us a little
21 bit of brief background and let us know what you hope to
22 do?

23 MR. McCURDY: Yes. So I spent 30 years at
24 Metro. I retired as an assistant sheriff. And after
25 that -- sorry, I've got something caught in my throat,

1 sitting back there waiting. But after that, I did two
2 and a half years as corporate vice president of security
3 for a hotel-casino. And I've also done law enforcement
4 consulting.

5 So I hope to take my experience and utilize it
6 as a private investigator as well as some day owning my
7 own guard company and executive protection company.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.

9 Any public comment regarding the license
10 application?

11 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment
13 regarding the license application, number 33?

14 Entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Mr. Chairman, I move that
16 GMcCurdy Consulting Services is granted a new corporate
17 private investigator and private patrolman license,
18 Gregory McCurdy is granted for an individual private
19 investigator's license and patrol, patrolman license.
20 And, if granted, he is requesting his individual
21 license be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
22 qualifying agent. This is subject to all statutory and
23 regulatory requirements.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
25 have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Motion and a
3 second. Any Board questions or comment regarding the
4 motion?

5 All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So that would be three,
8 one abstention and one absent.

9 Mr. Nadeau is now back with us.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And I won't go again.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. We got you to
12 that.

13 Congratulations. Thank you.

14 MR. McCURDY: Thanks. May I make a comment?

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

16 MR. McCURDY: I just want to thank some of your
17 employees. First, Gisela Corral, she was very helpful
18 in this process. And sometimes in government, employees
19 don't get the recognition. So I want to publicly thank
20 her and thank Mr. Ingram for his assistance when I
21 called upon him. So thank you.

22 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And we appreciate your
24 comment.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good luck.

1 MR. McCURDY: Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 34, Apex
3 Executive Protection Services.

4 MR. BARRIOS: Good morning.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. Can you
7 introduce yourself and tell us a little bit about what
8 you're hoping to accomplish?

9 MR. BARRIOS: Yes. My name is George A.
10 Barrios. I've been in this industry almost 30 years,
11 both in the corporate and private sector. I'm looking
12 to pursue new business in the state of Nevada
13 ("Nev-AH-da") and, also, in the coming year with both
14 dignitary and celebrity executive protection. And,
15 hopefully, if approved, I can continue this.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What state were you
17 hoping to do this in?

18 MR. BARRIOS: In the state of Nevada,
19 "Neh-VAD-au," "Nev-AH-da." So I'm from -- it's the
20 New Yorker in me. So I've been here 16 years. I
21 apologize.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Let's try it one more
23 time. It's "Neh-VAH-dau."

24 MR. BARRIOS: "Neh-VAH-dau."

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

1 MR. BARRIOS: "WAT-au," "KOF-ee."

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: But you're living here
3 now?

4 MR. BARRIOS: 16 years, yes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any public comment
6 regarding the application?

7 Any Board comment regarding the application?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I do, Mr. Chair.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Could you give us a
11 little clarification on your bankruptcy, 2017?

12 MR. BARRIOS: Yes. Unfortunately, you'd think,
13 with all the modern technology and all the HIPAA, the
14 doctors are communicating with medication, I became
15 gravely ill and almost passed away and almost didn't
16 make it to be here. Two different medications and in
17 and out of the hospital and three months in intensive
18 care. I was diagnosed with lymphoma, mesenteric
19 panniculiosis, and I came down with systemic candida
20 which shut down all my organs. Medical bills and
21 deductibles were almost in the hundreds of thousands.

22 Prior to that, perfect credit score, 755, never
23 late, all my payments automatically came out of my
24 account, as you can see if you pulled up my credit
25 report. And then my attorney says, "You have to do

1 this." Otherwise, they kept going into my account, and
2 they kept taking money out, even though they were told
3 not to, with the conditions I was going through. And I
4 was forced to go into bankruptcy because of medical
5 condition.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you. No further.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, hopefully, you're
8 feeling better, because I tried to push off your
9 bankruptcy on another applicant earlier.

10 MR. BARRIOS: Yes, I know, I heard that. When
11 you said medical reason, I was like, wait a minute, that
12 sounds like mine. But, yes, thank God. I lost 65
13 pounds in the process, not a good way to lose 65 pounds.
14 But, yes, I'm fully recovered right now, and
15 everything's in remission.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.
17 Congratulations.

18 Any other Board comment?

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I just had a question on
20 the -- thank you, Mr. Chairman.

21 I just had a question on the canine testing.
22 That's been handled, passed, et cetera?

23 MR. BARRIOS: Yes. I took the exam a week ago
24 today, on Monday, yes.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you,

1 Mr. Chair.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
3 questions?

4 Entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
6 Apex Executive Protection Services be granted a new
7 corporate private patrol and canine handler license,
8 George A. Barrios be approved for an individual private
9 patrol and canine handler license, and that those
10 licenses be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
11 qualifying agent for Apex Executive Protection Services.
12 Corporate officer to be approved is George A. Barrios.
13 Subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. We
16 have a second. Any Board comment or question on the
17 motion?

18 Don't know if I asked for public comment on the
19 application. If I didn't --

20 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All in favor, say
22 "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
25 Carries unanimous. Good luck.

1 MR. BARRIOS: Thank you. Happy holidays.

2 Thank you. Thank you.

3 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, at this time, would
4 you like to go back to the trailed items?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, if we want to call
6 them out and see if somebody showed up.

7 MR. INGRAM: I have the first trailed item as
8 item number six, Invictus International. Is Mr. Krueger
9 here?

10 He's not present in the south.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Not in the north.

12 MR. INGRAM: Now, traditionally in the past,
13 the Board has voted on these items in their absence.
14 However, I understand there is a question for
15 Mr. Krueger. So do you want to postpone?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do we want to wait till
17 the end of the meeting?

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Since there's questions, I
19 don't mind trailing it till the end of the meeting. It
20 doesn't change anything.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. If we can make a
22 general announcement, if you are here to have a matter
23 heard on the agenda, and you haven't been called forward
24 yet, could you please make your presence known.
25 Otherwise, we will pass all of the ones, that we had

1 passed earlier on, to the end of the meeting, give
2 everybody the last opportunity to show up before we're
3 done for the day. So if you're here for anything from
4 six to item 34, we'd like to hear from you. Otherwise,
5 we will call it back up at the end of the meeting and
6 see if anybody showed up.

7 Okay.

8 MR. INGRAM: I see no one in the south.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's nobody in the
10 north coming forward.

11 So let's move back to item 35, Board staff and
12 counsel to provide an overview of the work card process
13 along with an explanation of criminal charges dismissed
14 under California Penal Code Section 1203.4.

15 Do we need a break, or are we ready to go?

16 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to request,
17 yeah, if we could take a 10-minute break to get the
18 Power Point set up, that would be great.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 10 minutes, please.

20 * * * * *

21 (A break was taken, 10:24 to 10:36 a.m.)

22 * * * * *

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. We're back in
24 session.

25 MR. INGRAM: All right. Mr. Chairman, this --

1 I'm sorry. Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, it's Ray Flynn.
3 Reference item number 27, Ms. Cargill just arrived.
4 Unfortunately, she's been sitting through two hours of
5 Nevada Tax Commission waiting for her agenda item to be
6 called. So when the PILB is done with their
7 presentation, I'd like to bring her up from trailing.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay, sir. Thank you.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

10 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, this progress was at
11 the request of Board members just for a little bit of
12 clarification on our work card application process, time
13 frames, why sometimes the work card application is
14 delayed, along with some more clarification on
15 California Penal Code, California Penal Code 1203.4.

16 So our Chief of Operations, Lori Irizarry, is
17 going to start off the presentation, and then follow up
18 with Rosalie Bordelove giving the overview of the Penal
19 Code 1203.4.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

21 MR. INGRAM: So, Lori.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

23 MS. IRIZARRY: Can you see the presentation up
24 there in the north?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

1 (To the audience in Carson City) If you want,
2 you can move over here if you need to watch it, you can
3 move your chairs here.

4 Go ahead, please.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Why don't you do a test,
6 test count.

7 MS. IRIZARRY: Okay. Are you guys ready in the
8 north?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

10 MS. IRIZARRY: Perfect. Okay. Good morning.
11 My name is Lori Irizarry. I'm Chief of Operations of
12 the Nevada PI Board. I oversee the investigators and
13 the admin staff in our office. So I'd be the person to
14 speak about our work card process.

15 I know we have quite a few individuals here who
16 apply for the work card process. So you're familiar
17 with it.

18 I'm going to speak on the work cards, then pass
19 it to off to our attorney, Rosalie Bordelove, and she's
20 going to discuss 1203.4, which is the California Penal
21 Code.

22 So move on, right?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

24 MS. IRIZARRY: So some of the topics I'm going
25 to discuss are: the actual work card process, online

1 versus in the office, how there is a discrepancy and how
2 things could be a little bit skewed when you do things
3 online versus in the office; the initial background
4 process, the process that you would go through as a work
5 card applicant; the arrest history, which is a big
6 portion of our work card process; the fingerprinting
7 process, some of the time frames that it's taking at the
8 moment; go a little bit into if you want to become
9 armed, the firearms process; and then, once again,
10 California Penal Code 1203.4.

11 So the work card application process can be
12 made in person or online. The process is the same but
13 yet different, exact same application that you would
14 see. But if you were to come into our office, the
15 process is explained much more in detail. You have that
16 human face-to-face contact. So sometimes, when you have
17 an applicant in front of you say, "I wasn't aware," it
18 is a possibility they were not aware of things that they
19 need to disclose, because the applications look
20 different when they do it online or when they do it in
21 person.

22 We are looking to fix that. We are changing
23 our process at the moment where we're getting a new
24 database system, where it will be identical. But at the
25 moment this is not in place.

1 So you have that face-to-face contact. Our
2 office staff will go through the application with them
3 when they turn it in, and they will notify them right
4 then and there, if they listed that they have a felony,
5 that they may be denied. If they have a weapons charge,
6 or if you have anything pending, you have that human
7 contact that's going to tell them right then and there
8 that they may have to go before the Board, we need
9 additional court documents or paperwork.

10 When you do it online, there is not that, there
11 is no contact. They do the application, and they wait
12 for the investigator to give them a call to let them
13 know if there is a process that would be needing
14 additional information.

15 There is an exam, both online and in person.
16 The problem with doing it online, the exam, I wouldn't
17 really say a problem, but if they don't answer a
18 specific question, they're not taken to do the exam,
19 which could delay the process. But it is asked in our
20 online process, but you would have to read the actual
21 language to realize that you needed to take the online
22 exam as well.

23 Credit cards are accepted online. They're not
24 accepted in the office at the moment, just money order,
25 cashier's check. But we are coming into the digital age

1 and modernizing. We are going to need to have a card
2 reader, that we are going to be getting in our office,
3 so we'll be able to accept credit and debit, most likely
4 by the first of the year. So that's something that's
5 going to be coming in person.

6 You are not able to expedite online. You are
7 only able to expedite in person.

8 And the fingerprint process is exactly the
9 same. They must pay before they go get their
10 fingerprints done. So that's identical regardless of
11 which avenue you go.

12 That's just a quick overview of the process.

13 We often get asked, when does the time frame
14 start? So when you fill out the application, if you
15 started the application online, but you don't pay, you
16 know, a few days from now, it starts for everybody the
17 day that they make payment. That's when the clock
18 starts. That's when. When I'm talking about time
19 frames, it takes one to two days or one to two weeks,
20 it's from the day that they make the payment, either in
21 office or online.

22 Things that hold up our work card process are
23 what we call supplemental docs. It's one thing to
24 apply, and it's one thing to pay, but there's a lot of
25 additional documents that we may need when you do the

1 work card application process: ID's, citizenship,
2 fingerprints, photo, exam. So those additional
3 documents are what hold up the process, for the most
4 part.

5 To go into the supplemental docs, that's -- we
6 have formed a great relationship with our licensees
7 where when an individual goes in to apply for a work
8 card, usually the companies are telling them, "When you
9 go down, you're going to need to bring your two forms of
10 ID, bring your photo with you, and proof of
11 citizenship."

12 So a lot of our companies are relaying that
13 information to their employees. But that's usually
14 what's going to hold them up.

15 Some people don't walk into our office with
16 their Social Security card in their wallet. Most of
17 them don't carry two forms of ID. So they'll come into
18 our office, and they've only provided one form of ID.
19 We need that second form. Just holds up the process.

20 These are some of the delays that we're seeing
21 with supplemental docs. Proof of citizenship. They
22 brought their two forms of ID. But if you weren't born
23 in the country, we would need an additional form of ID:
24 U.S. passport, permanent resident card, employment
25 authorization card. So they have to go home or come

1 back or send that at an additional time.

2 The fingerprint process. A lot of individuals
3 will go get their fingerprints done. But we need a form
4 back. So if we don't get that form back, it's also
5 going to hold up the delay, because you'll get your
6 fingerprints, and you need to come back to our office
7 and bring us that fingerprint form.

8 Photos that are submitted online sometimes are
9 not submitted in a correct format. You'll see a
10 Facebook selfie. We're looking for a white background,
11 a TMB photo, no hats, no glasses. So we have to often
12 contact them and let them know the photos are not
13 submitted correctly.

14 The online exam. So right now, our online exam
15 is only required for private patrolman employee. Even
16 though you're not a security guard, if you're going to
17 apply for a dispatcher for a security company, you're
18 required to take the exam. So a lot of individuals
19 think, "Well, I'm not going to do security work, so I
20 don't need to take the exam." It's not until they go, a
21 week later, when someone's looking at their background,
22 that we have to contact them and say, "You know what,
23 you need to take the exam, because I know you're not
24 going to be doing security work, but because you're
25 working for that licensee, you need to take the exam."

1 So now they have to come back into our office or they
2 have to go back online and do the exam, which also
3 delays the process for them.

4 Court documents, that's probably going to be
5 our longest delay. Individuals that have any pending
6 cases, while there's egregious offenses, we need
7 additional documentation. I'll go into that a little
8 bit more. But when it comes to arrest history, that's
9 where most of the delays come from.

10 And, once again, expedite is only available in
11 the office. If someone wants to pay the expedited fee
12 online, they're not able to that at the moment. They're
13 going to have to come into the office to do it. So I
14 put it right down here in red.

15 When they're in the office, we notify them
16 immediately. There is no delay. We tell them right
17 then and there, "I have your driver's license, but we
18 need also your Social."

19 When they do it online, the individual has to
20 the wait until the investigator is at that part, what we
21 call a queue, which takes about a week for the
22 investigator to actually see their application, for them
23 to be notified.

24 So when you're in the office, they get notified
25 immediately. When it's done online, you're notified a

1 couple days later.

2 So the background process is the date that they
3 pay, the date that they start going into our workflow
4 system. We check for completeness right then and there.
5 We make sure they have all the supplemental docs. So
6 rights there, if they have all those three things, you
7 know they have a complete application.

8 Then we go to employment history. If someone
9 does not list an employment history on their background,
10 we have to take the additional step to contact them.
11 Even if you don't have employment history in the last
12 five years, you need to specifically answer the question
13 on the application that says "I do not have employment
14 history in the last five years."

15 The reason being, is we're also doing an
16 investigation on the individual at that moment. So we
17 want to make sure that they -- if they're renewing their
18 card, that if an employee is listing them on their
19 roster, and they're not putting it on their -- I'm
20 sorry. If an employee's putting on their application
21 they work for a security company, for instance, but
22 they're not listed on the company's roster, then the
23 investigator has to take the initial step to contact the
24 licensee or maybe issue a violation or a citation,
25 because there's a discrepancy there, "He's saying he

1 works for you, but you never listed him, which is a
2 requirement by chapter that you needed to put them on
3 your roster."

4 We're also supposed to be noticing any
5 unlicensed activities. If someone's applying for a work
6 card, and they're listing that they work for John Smith
7 Investigations, and we don't have a John Smith
8 Investigations, we're going to call them and say, "What
9 type of work are you doing?" "Oh, I'm in my own PI,
10 don't worry about it, I just need to get the work card."
11 No, you need to get a license.

12 So the work employment history is very
13 important. That's an additional step all of our
14 investigators look for. And it has to be listed, or
15 we're going to contact them to get the years, the last
16 five years of employment history.

17 When it comes to the arrest record, so now
18 you've got the whole paperwork process, and now you're
19 in front of the investigator. The investigator looks at
20 the arrest history. We're not just looking at what
21 you're currently -- or your recent arrests. We're
22 looking from the day that you turned 18. Could even
23 possibly be before you were 18 but if you were tried as
24 an adult. We're running SCOPE, DMV and CJIS. If you,
25 for instance, have listed an arrest or a court case

1 out-of-state, and it's fairly recent or something that
2 could possibly be something we need to look into more,
3 SCOPE and CJIS and DMV is only in the state of Nevada.
4 So the investigators now come in and search outside the
5 state to verify if what you listed is correct, that this
6 petty theft is a closed case, or this embezzlement is a
7 closed dismissed case. So now they're doing their own
8 court searches on, for instance, California,
9 San Bernardino court records, making sure that what you
10 listed is correct. Because it's not just what you list,
11 but it's what also what you don't list is what we're
12 also looking for.

13 So throughout the whole process, if the
14 application is not complete, it stops the process right
15 there. We have to stop, contact, and the admin stuff
16 for investigators, which is going to delay the process.
17 But if you think about it, an investigator has, let's
18 say, a hundred people in their queue that they need to
19 work on for the week. If they're stopping, they're
20 holding up everyone, all 99 people behind them. So it
21 delays the process to everyone behind them.

22 So we always try to go for completeness. If
23 you have a complete application, you list everything,
24 you can go throughout the work card process. Much
25 simpler.

1 A lot of the questions we get, and I know we're
2 going to go into it a little bit with 1203.4, but it's
3 the records. What are things that delay us the most?
4 Arrest records, arrest records, arrest records. When
5 someone does not disclose all their arrests, "You know,
6 I think, I got arrested, but I'm not really sure," so
7 they don't decide to list it, well, when we run the
8 background to see it, it's going to delay the process,
9 because now we -- we take the initiative where we give
10 them a second chance, we give an additional opportunity
11 for them to list their arrest.

12 So, let's say, someone has five arrests. They
13 list three, but they forgot two, but these two were from
14 20 years ago. It's possible they actually did forget.
15 The investigator will take the initiative to contact
16 them, email or call them on the phone, and tell them
17 they need to come into the office to do a second review.
18 We'll give them another, additional document and give
19 them another opportunity to list their arrest. We give
20 them the resources and tell them, "You can go to
21 Las Vegas Metro and get your SCOPE," "You can go to this
22 courthouse and get your records."

23 The reason for that is our statute says that a
24 failure to disclose arrests could be a reason for
25 denial. We understand that sometimes human error, or

1 actually they forgot because it was so many years ago.
2 So we do give that second opportunity.

3 Sometimes we may not give a second opportunity
4 if they list, for instance, in the last year or last
5 month there was a recent arrest. There was no reason
6 for you to forget it. You blatantly forgot it. In that
7 instance, we may not go ahead and allow them to give a
8 second arrest. We may deny them and allow them to come
9 before the Board and let the Board decide, for arrests
10 like that.

11 Anything that's open, active, pending,
12 probation charges, those things require a second review
13 from an investigator. If it's a -- pending warrants or
14 any pending charges, or they're on probation, we
15 normally don't process. We'll withdraw their
16 application till they clear up their pending charges,
17 arrest or warrants. At that time, once they've cleared
18 it, they can come before the individual investigator
19 again, and the investigator can go ahead and approve it
20 at that time.

21 We usually reasonably give them about six
22 months to clear up any warrants, probation or pending
23 charges. Anything past that six months time, we use
24 discretion. But most likely, we'll have to require them
25 to reapply. So we do their fingerprints and background

1 all over again. But, regardless, if six months later
2 they came to us and they showed they've cleared their
3 warrants, we'll do our due diligence and we'll follow up
4 to make sure that the warrant is actually cleared.

5 When it comes to wobblers, so, for instance,
6 they list on their work card application that they have
7 a grant theft, misdemeanor, closed, all that right there
8 is a little off, because grand theft most likely could
9 be a felony. It's a wobbler case. It's not closed.
10 Was it dismissed? Was it denied? A closed case means
11 you probably went through the process. I want to know
12 the final disposition. Was it dismissed, denied, you
13 paid a fine, you did classes?

14 So when it comes to wobblers, especially if
15 they're listing it as a misdemeanor, when we know it
16 could possibly be a felony, that takes additional due
17 diligence from the investigators. They'll usually
18 contact the individual and say, "I went and checked the
19 court records that I can check, and I found this." Or,
20 "I can't check certain court records. I need you to
21 give me court paperwork on these wobbler cases that I,
22 when I run my background, don't have a final disposition
23 on."

24 So when wobblers come up, that's a discussion
25 that's holding up the application process between the

1 investigators and the work card applicant.

2 And when it comes to denials, so we know
3 someone's going to be denied, they have a weapons
4 offense, and the individual is notified. We notify them
5 a few different ways, certified mail, regular mail, and
6 we'll also give them a call or email, saying that
7 they're going to be denied. If they would like to
8 appeal it, they have so much time before they can appeal
9 it to go to the next Board hearing.

10 The licensee who's listed on their roster needs
11 to be notified. Which is also why it's important that
12 they have their employment history listed. But if a
13 licensee comes back to us and says, "Well, I've been
14 working this guy for two months, but no one told me,"
15 well, you possibly didn't list them on your roster,
16 which is why we couldn't tell you that you're working
17 someone with a denied card. Because the moment he
18 walked into your office, he had an approved card. And
19 then two weeks later, we denied it. But we can't follow
20 up with you, because it wasn't taken it off your roster
21 to begin with.

22 So that's why it's very important that we make
23 sure that licensees are up-to-date on their rosters,
24 because we need to notify the licensees who they're
25 working for.

1 And then, before they come before the Board,
2 the investigator also has a discussion with the
3 individual letting them know, you may need court
4 documents, you may need a police report, depending on
5 the type of case it is. Before you go before the Board,
6 we need these documents to provide to them before you
7 sit in front of them.

8 When it comes to the processing time, so I know
9 that was one of the main questions that we had at the
10 last Board hearing, was how long is it taking to get a
11 work card?

12 It says July 2017. But, essentially, it was in
13 2015, our work card process, a regular process, if you
14 don't pay the expedite fee, is taking five to 10
15 business days. Five days, if you have a complete
16 application, you've turned everything in, and you're not
17 listing anything, from the date that you pay, then five
18 days later you should get your provisional work card.
19 Now, if you're missing stuff or having to follow up,
20 need court docs, that's where the 10 days delay comes
21 in. It doubles the time frame, essentially.

22 I put July because our busiest time throughout
23 the year is March through June, which I go over on the
24 next slide. But for this year, it's July to now, it's
25 going to be five to 10 business days. But the five to

1 10 business days has essentially been in effect since
2 2015.

3 When it comes to the expediting process, they
4 pay an additional \$44 to expedite their application. It
5 takes one to two business days. To avoid delays, you
6 can do it on, or in person, doesn't matter. Turn in the
7 application a hundred percent complete. Make sure that
8 you don't forget any of your previous arrests, that you
9 turn in your fingerprints, photo ID, everything's in the
10 correct format. You've listed all your employment
11 history. You have no pending warrants or charges. And
12 you provide all court docs up front.

13 Anything that would delay the process is,
14 obviously, you have any new warrants or we're having to
15 do our additional due diligence to search on these
16 arrests that are pending or unsure of.

17 I bring up the point about special events,
18 because that is what is going to -- that is -- or
19 certain times throughout the year that delays our work
20 card process.

21 So in the north and in the south, summertime is
22 very popular in Nevada for seasonal events.
23 Conventions, festivals. It's -- the end of our fiscal
24 year is the end of June. And, also, all licensees are
25 required to renew by the end of June every year. So

1 that, and it's a Board meeting month. So we usually say
2 between March and July the timing frames are extended to
3 about two to three weeks, so 10 to 15 business days for
4 a regular work card process.

5 We have the report licensees where they're now
6 familiar with our process that during these times it
7 takes a little bit longer. The reason for that mainly
8 is because the huge influx of work that's coming into
9 the state requires to us to have of a lot more work card
10 applications.

11 To kind of give you an idea, back in 2017, just
12 this past year, between March and May, we did roughly
13 500, or 650. It's about 150 difference, because I was
14 trying to count in northern Nevada as well, of paper
15 applications. So that's someone sitting in front of the
16 commuter manually inputting a paper application. These
17 applications were not brought to us online, which makes
18 the process much easier. We had three investigators at
19 the time, so we were not fully staffed. But everyone
20 was processed within two weeks before all the events
21 that had come up.

22 So even though we had this -- and, plus, our
23 staff knows that during this time, we don't really get
24 to do breaks, we don't get vacations. Everyone's all
25 hands-on, because we know this starts at this time of

1 the year. So even though it's busy, we take the extra
2 step to go ahead and make sure that we get everyone at
3 least caught up, because we can't have these events
4 understaffed, especially as a state entity.

5 So now you have your provisional. You were
6 given a card. You're able to go to work. All you're
7 waiting on now is your final work card. So there are a
8 lot of questions asked: What's taking so long? I did
9 my work card process three or four weeks ago, and I did
10 my fingerprinting; why don't I have my permit plastic
11 card?

12 Unfortunately, we have no -- we have very to
13 little control over that, because what we're waiting on
14 is the fingerprint results to come back from the
15 criminal repository, that is, the State of Nevada and
16 FBI to give us the fingerprint results. It takes about
17 three to four weeks from when the person was submitted.

18 I underline the word 'submitted' because some
19 fingerprint agencies, if you got fingerprinted today,
20 they may not submit their prints until the end of the
21 week, they submit everything once a week. Whereas some
22 fingerprint entities do it the moment that you're there.

23 So we can only depend on other -- because we do
24 third-party fingerprinting. Third parties submit our
25 fingerprints for us. It's when it's submitted. And

1 then, when it's submitted, that's when the three to four
2 weeks time frame happens where we get the fingerprint
3 results.

4 Fingerprints are sent to us by cavemen.
5 They're paper files. They're not electronic.
6 Everything is -- we have to put through staff who's
7 accessing different records. So it takes one person
8 approximately five to seven days to go through the
9 fingerprinting process. They have to unstaple, stamp,
10 manually record results.

11 And then, from there, we have a very strict way
12 of how we have to report results based on conflicts
13 using FBI security standards. So she's in charge of
14 maintaining all the records. So that, so it takes DPS
15 three to four weeks to give us the results and then
16 another week for her to input all the results. And then
17 we divide them up into two stacks, negative and
18 positive.

19 Negative results present a pretty clean
20 background, there's really nothing to be concerned
21 about. We can get them completed in about two days. In
22 two days, we can complete them, and we'll get their
23 card out in the mail in the next couple days.

24 Now, a positive result could be something as
25 simple as an arrest came up on their background. She

1 cannot approve it. It has to go to an investigator to
2 approve. An investigator can look at it and say, "Oh,
3 that's something simple, I can approve them," right then
4 and there, another two days. But if you have a complex
5 rap sheet, so investigators are working with an
6 individual who has a couple of charges, but we don't
7 know the disposition, that's where it gets convoluted.

8 So if someone, if you have a rap sheet, you
9 already filled the heavy one, it's going to take some
10 time. It's going to be about three or four days for a
11 turnaround time. Those are, once again, people are not
12 disclosing all their arrests, especially from
13 out-of-state.

14 So if they're from out-of-state, and we get the
15 results, and then we notice quite a few arrests that
16 they didn't list, now we have to contact them and say,
17 "Why didn't you list these eight arrests from Florida,
18 two from Georgia, one from Tennessee?" "I didn't think
19 you guys were going to see that."

20 So it stops the whole process and we have to
21 get court documents and do the whole thing all over
22 again. Any warrants from out of the state stops the
23 process.

24 We allow them to continue working depending on
25 the egregiousness of their -- just from the rap sheet as

1 long -- but we give them a time then. Usually, it's
2 about two weeks. In two weeks, you need to provide us
3 court paperwork, because these results that came back
4 from your fingerprints could deny you from a work card.
5 We'll, essentially, give you about two weeks to provide
6 us what we need, and we'll be in constant contact with
7 them.

8 If not, we're going withdraw your provisional
9 work card. You cannot work. The investigator has to
10 contact the licensees again. And now the individual has
11 to go before the Board and explain to the Board why they
12 didn't disclose some of their arrests that came up on
13 their fingerprint results.

14 After all the fingerprint stuff is done, we
15 roughly print about 500 cards at a time. We print them
16 about every five days. I'm sorry. We print them about
17 every five days, because throughout the week, people
18 come in to get reprints, so we can't print every single
19 day. Otherwise, it's going to hold up the individuals
20 that are in our office. So we have certain days that we
21 print cards. In five days, we'll print about 500 cards
22 and send them out. So constantly we're sending out
23 roughly between 1,500, 2,000 cards a month of people
24 that have been made complete throughout the month.

25 So I went over a lot of the different time

1 frames and days and months. I just did a quick little
2 chart here. The middle column, everybody's been
3 processed. If you're, basically you're clean, you
4 turned everything in to us, it's taking about seven days
5 on average for you to get your provisional work card.
6 Items missing, you haven't disclosed a few things, 13
7 days.

8 With the fingerprinting process, we can't
9 really control when you get those, the results. But
10 what we can control, we narrowed it down to, to get your
11 card, plastic card in your pocket, in your hands, it's
12 taking a little bit over a month to get that card,
13 plastic card, which is good for the next five years.

14 On the longer end, if there's something that
15 comes up on your rap sheet that we have to verify, it's
16 taking a little less than two months, so about a month
17 and a half, 54 days to go ahead and get your permanent
18 plastic card if we have some problems with your
19 background.

20 The firearm process is much different. You
21 cannot go get your firearms, you cannot go take the
22 firearms courses with those guys. You have to be
23 permanent. The reason for that is, we don't have your
24 final background, so we don't know if maybe domestic
25 violence would have come up, or you're not able to be

1 firearms eligible.

2 So when you finally get your permanent plastic
3 card, you're able to go take the two-day course. And
4 the CFI, the certified firearms instructor, mails the
5 documents to our Carson City office. They have five
6 days to do so. So depending, if you have a quick CFI
7 who delivers it the next day or who waits the five-day
8 requirement and does it the end of the week depends on
9 how soon we get it in Carson City. The mail time from
10 Carson City to wherever it's coming from takes about two
11 days.

12 And then our Carson City investigator -- I'm
13 sorry. Carson City admin staff roughly takes about five
14 days to go ahead and verify the paperwork that she's
15 gotten in. So what she's verifying is that this person
16 does have an active card, sometime in there it wasn't
17 denied, that the paperwork that they provided is not
18 forged, that it did come from an actual company, that
19 the company themselves are where that they took the
20 course and it's signed by the qualified agent.

21 So all these things take some time. She mails
22 out the card. From the time that you take the course
23 until the time that you get your card back to you that
24 you are now armed takes about 15 days to go ahead and
25 become armed.

1 And I went over a lot. Any questions before we
2 go to California Penal Code 1203.4?

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, Ray Flynn.
4 I've got some questions.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Go ahead.

6 MS. IRIZARRY: Please.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Go ahead, please.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Lori, on the -- two
9 things. I will only bring up the biggest issue is when
10 they don't disclose arrests?

11 MS. IRIZARRY: Or provide us additional
12 documents.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Right. So when they meet
14 with an investigator in person, is that discussed with
15 each and every person, about disclosing arrests, and do
16 we discuss the California 1203 with them?

17 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes. So in one of our slides
18 that Rosalie's going to discuss, I took a snapshot of
19 what an actual work card application looks like. And it
20 specifically says list that, all arrests, plus in lieu
21 of disposition, and I specifically include on there all
22 citations, including 1203.4, all domestic violence. It
23 lists every -- pretty much about 12 different things
24 that we normally see when it comes to some work card
25 backgrounds. But it says do not list any traffic

1 offenses.

2 So it's on our application when they do it in
3 person. But it's not listed on my online application at
4 the moment. It just has arrest history. So there is
5 some discrepancy. When some people do it online, they
6 don't see. Even though it says list all arrests, some
7 people assume, "Well, I wasn't in handcuffs, I don't
8 need to list that." But when they speak with an
9 investigator, the investigator does tell them that, you
10 know, "You know you are required to list everything."
11 And I'm not sure they're -- I know from speaking to
12 investigators, the response back is, "Well, it was
13 dismissed, so I didn't think I had to list it." Or it
14 was a closed case. But it specifically says in our
15 application, regardless of a disposition, you need to
16 list it.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So what percentage, just
18 I'm looking for a ballpark, are we doing online versus
19 in person?

20 MS. IRIZARRY: We do much more in person. So I
21 would probably say 60, 60 in office, 40 online.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Two more
23 questions. When are we going to fix the online problem,
24 so --

25 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes, so I'm really excited about

1 that. We were initially supposed to roll out
2 December 1st. We're being delayed a little bit because
3 of the holidays time, people taking off. We're going to
4 do it fresh at the beginning of the year. So I
5 anticipate a start date's on January 1. And it will
6 mimic exactly what they will see on a paper application.
7 There will be no discrepancies. So we don't have that,
8 "Well, I did it this way and did it that way."

9 And when they do it online, if they list that
10 they have a felony, a weapons charge, or any of these
11 certain parameters, like, "I do have a warrant, though,
12 but I'm under a disclaimer." Which would be, with the
13 human contact that's in our office, we're going to tell
14 them right then and there, "You need to contact the
15 investigator before proceeding with your application."

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. When it comes to
17 the firearms, what do we do with out-of-state executive
18 protection, people come in temporarily, bodyguard work,
19 how is that handled for all of us?

20 MS. IRIZARRY: There is no -- the only one that
21 we do it temporarily is the ones that have that
22 exemption with the armored cars. Everyone else is
23 required to go through our course. Even if they're
24 coming in for one day or two days, they have to get
25 their permanent card and go through our firearms course

1 before they're able to become armed. There is no
2 reciprocity between states except when it comes to
3 armored cars.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So a duly licensed
5 bodyguard for a celebrity in California escorts that
6 celebrity here, and they're armed, even though, by law,
7 we would -- under the CCW, they still have to get, what,
8 a temporary card with us?

9 MS. IRIZARRY: It depends. So if they're
10 working for a celebrity --

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes.

12 MS. IRIZARRY: -- and if they're paid by the
13 celebrity, have a W-2, then it is not our jurisdiction.
14 If they are paid, so as an entity of the third party,
15 that they're now a 1099, they're a company of one, they
16 would have to go through our licensing process, because
17 they would not be considered a work card employee at
18 that time, they would be considered as a licensee.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Could they work under a
20 Nevada license, if they could set that up prior?

21 MS. IRIZARRY: They can, but they cannot work
22 armed until they go through our two-day course.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

24 MS. IRIZARRY: Any questions up north?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No.

1 MS. IRIZARRY: Any questions?

2 Yeah, so I'm going to pass it off to Rosalie,
3 where she's going to discuss --

4 MR. SPRIGGS: Lori, I had one question.

5 MS. IRIZARRY: Oh, I'm sorry, we have a
6 question.

7 MR. SPRIGGS: I have one question. You
8 mentioned about a warrant, an out-of-state warrant.
9 That would stop the process. You would notify the
10 employer for any kind of warrant that shows up, right?

11 MS. IRIZARRY: No. So we don't know -- we are
12 not allowed to tell the employer why someone's
13 background did not go through. We can only tell them
14 they're either withdrawn or denied.

15 MR. SPRIGGS: Or it's a provisional.

16 MS. IRIZARRY: Oh, I'm sorry.

17 MR. SPRIGGS: If they get a provisional, and it
18 shows up as an arrest that they were --

19 MS. IRIZARRY: A warrant.

20 MR. SPRIGGS: If there's a warrant of any sort,
21 notify the employer?

22 MS. IRIZARRY: No. We give the individual
23 roughly two weeks to get the warrant cleared.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Excuse me. Excuse me.

25 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes?

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can we get an identity on
2 the speaker?

3 MR. SPRIGGS: Oh. Michael Spriggs, Spriggs,
4 Incorporated.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

6 MR. SPRIGGS: Thank you.

7 MS. IRIZARRY: Sorry.

8 So within that two-week time frame, if they
9 don't clear the warrant at that two weeks, then we'll
10 notify the employer, this person's card is withdrawn, or
11 revoke maybe, and they're not able to continue
12 working. But while they're going through that process
13 with us, we won't notify their licensee.

14 MR. INGRAM: It depends on the type of warrant.

15 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes.

16 MR. SPRIGGS: Thank you.

17 MS. IRIZARRY: M-hm (affirmative).

18 All right. I pass back to Rosalie. Thank you.

19 There you go.

20 MS. BORDELOVE: As she, I think, mentioned, I'm
21 Rosalie Bordelove, Deputy Attorney General and counsel
22 for the Board.

23 I just wanted to address briefly California
24 Penal Code 1203.4, because I know there's been a lot of
25 confusion with licensees, not licensees so much as work

1 card applicants, when it comes to disclosing. And
2 that's come up on appeals a few times. So I want to
3 make sure the Board and work card applications, that any
4 applicants know really what the statute says as well as
5 what some of that confusion is out there.

6 What Section 1203.4 is, is it's an avenue for
7 individuals who have been convicted of a crime in
8 California to be relieved of some of those penalties
9 only after they've completed all the terms of their
10 sentence and probation. But it does not, and that's
11 where a lot of the confusion is, it doesn't erase the
12 conviction. They still were convicted.

13 The actual language of the statute, it says
14 "The order shall state, and the probationer shall be
15 informed, that the order does not relieve him or her of
16 the obligation to disclose the conviction in response to
17 any direct question contained in any questionnaire or
18 application for public office, for licensure by state or
19 local agency, or for contracting with the California
20 State Lottery Commission."

21 And I want to actually clarify two things. To
22 one extent, the statute actually does not relieve them
23 of that obligation in the state of California. That
24 statute also would not necessarily change an obligation
25 to disclose in the State of Nevada, because Nevada

1 statutes do not say you don't have to disclose.

2 California courts actually have further
3 interpreted that statute just to specifically say that
4 it is not expunging the conviction. It's not making a
5 legal nullity, and the conviction still exists. It's
6 simply removing some of the penalties. It can at times
7 restore civil rights, abilities to vote. Things of that
8 sort are things that they can restore in the State of
9 California. But it does not alter the duty to disclose
10 a conviction on an application for a work card or
11 licensure, in general, a PILB application.

12 But the confusion largely has come from not
13 every person who's availed themselves of 1203.4 has
14 probably actually read the whole statute. Their
15 attorney or their public defender has suggested this is
16 something good for them to do, because they have been
17 released, they've completed everything. It acts as a
18 dismissal. But, again, it is not a true dismissal
19 making it as if the conviction didn't exist. And I know
20 there is some misinformation out there, I think, from
21 lawyers in California advising their clients as to when
22 it needs to be disclosed.

23 And so I just want to reiterate, it does not
24 actually relieve any applicant from their duty to
25 disclose. But there is legitimate confusion, and there

1 are applicants who have -- truly believe that they
2 didn't have to disclose because their charges were
3 dismissed under that statute.

4 And then, as Lori mentioned before, this is a
5 copy of the form on our work card application, but this
6 is only the physical form. And it does say to list all
7 charges regardless if dismissed under California Penal
8 Code 1203.4. But the online application does not
9 include that.

10 So, I think, maybe the last meeting, we had an
11 individual where that was an issue, and she had not seen
12 that and truly thought it shouldn't be disclosed. And
13 so that was, I think, part of it, just explaining some
14 of this.

15 But it's pretty brief, but. Are there any
16 questions on that from the Board?

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So, Rosalie --

18 MS. BORDELOVE: Uh-huh (affirmative).

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: -- it's Ray Flynn. I have
20 a question. So, in summary, under the 1203.4, whether
21 it's in California or Nevada, a person with a California
22 conviction that's been set aside under 1203.4 would have
23 to disclose to a government licensing body if they are
24 asked that question?

25 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes. Yes, in response to a

1 direct question of have you been convicted, they have
2 still been convicted. It changes the disposition, and
3 that's something that I am sure the investigators have
4 discovered, that it is considered dismissed. But the
5 conviction still exists.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

7 MS. BORDELOVE: Any other questions?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Nadeau.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

10 So two questions. The first one is, how soon
11 after they've completed the terms of their conviction
12 can they apply for this, I mean immediately, or is there
13 a time period?

14 MS. BORDELOVE: I'm not positive on that. I
15 think, it's immediately. I know that they do have to
16 have completed any probation and all the terms of the
17 probation. So that includes payment of any fines. That
18 includes any community service. And it also means that
19 whatever probationary period, they have to have been
20 released. So either it's been exhausted, they had early
21 release, for whatever reason. I don't know on the time
22 frames as well. I also don't know how long it takes to
23 get granted, because that's not a process I've done.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: As a follow-up to that,
25 then, and does this apply to any conviction?

1 MS. BORDELOVE: I don't believe -- I'm sure
2 there are exceptions. I think, it does apply to
3 felonies, but I don't know if it applies to all
4 felonies. I'm not sure how it's actually been applied
5 by California courts. I also don't know that, the
6 extent of a judge's discretion, when it comes to whether
7 or not they grant it.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

9 And then one question for Kevin. And, I think,
10 you said you're changing the online application by the
11 end of this month. Is it going to include that
12 language, that admonishment that even though -- well,
13 the line that's on the written application, is that
14 going to be contained in the online application?

15 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. It's going to be
16 identical.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

18 MR. INGRAM: The only reason we haven't been
19 able to do it at this time is because the current
20 database provider was unable to make those changes. And
21 by switching to this new one, it will be identical.
22 They will also, once they check yes on some of these
23 questions, it'll automatically provide a disclaimer to
24 them online. So it will be very interactive.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Perfect.

1 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

3 Anybody else?

4 Thank you.

5 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm sorry. Is there any
7 public comment regarding the presentation?

8 MR. INGRAM: Any public comment?

9 None in the south.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And none in the north.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So this wasn't really
12 agendized for a discussion among the Board. But can we
13 have some discussion?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I think, we can discuss
15 it. We just can't make any decisions.

16 MS. BORDELOVE: Let me look at that item again.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I didn't hear what she
18 said.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: She wants to look at the
20 item.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

22 MS. BORDELOVE: I think, a little discussion,
23 but no -- I think, a little discussion to the extent
24 that it's sort of clarifying or going over any of the
25 material in the presentations. But I would suggest no

1 discussion as to plans for how the Board intends to
2 treat anything, because the agenda item is not listed
3 for action, and that would go, potentially walk into
4 deliberations.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Right. That's what I was
6 concerned about. Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else on the
8 agenda item?

9 Okay. Do you want to go back to item number
10 27, Side by Side Security Strategic Solutions?

11 Good morning.

12 MS. CARGILL: Good morning.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So far, which meeting is
15 more exciting, the taxicab authority or us? At least,
16 you get a chance to view government in action.

17 Can you introduce yourself and tell us what
18 you'd like to do?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ms. Cargill, Mr. Chair,
20 he'd like you to introduce yourself and what you're
21 doing, why you're here today.

22 MS. CARGILL: My name is Spring Cargill. I'm
23 representing Side by Side Security Strategic Solutions,
24 applying for the company and for qualifying agent for
25 the company.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public
2 comment or question regarding the application?

3 MR. INGRAM: None in the south.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: None in the north. Any
5 Board comments or questions regarding the application?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

7 I'd just like an explanation of all the
8 financials going on here. You know, we have -- what do
9 we have, like six different financial issues that are in
10 play. And I was just trying to figure out what's going
11 on there.

12 MS. CARGILL: They have been resolved. I have
13 release statements for the judgments from an occurrence
14 where I was the victim of identity theft and mortgage
15 fraud, which I have a letter from the attorney, that
16 occurred in 2003 and 2004. I paid my taxes each and
17 every year. The IRS has sent the release from those.
18 And the State of Mississippi has sent a release, also.

19 The other documents I have release statements
20 from. And the last one that's working on now was from
21 2005, which was in relation to the occurrence with the
22 fraud and my neglect to file the state taxes in the
23 State of Mississippi where they had assumed that I did
24 not pay my 2004 taxes, which I did, and I did send them
25 a copy. So that's just been adjusted to \$343, which I

1 did mail to them.

2 I have a copy here of the documents, which I
3 also turned over to my investigator.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That was the only
5 question I had.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I just want to
9 confirm with the investigator that we do have these
10 documents and everything's in order?

11 MS. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. In
12 regards to the six financial issues, the first one,
13 Ms. Cargill is currently working with an attorney on
14 that one for the hundred twelve.

15 The second one, State of Mississippi, I have
16 documents releasing her of that one.

17 Number three, the IRS, I have a letter stating
18 the --

19 MS. CARGILL: Release.

20 MR. SALADINO: -- the release from the identity
21 theft. That one was an identity theft one. I have a
22 letter from the IRS stating that.

23 The number four, I do have, the State of
24 Mississippi again, I have court documents from the State
25 of Mississippi releasing her of that.

1 Number five, the Baytown Company, the applicant
2 is currently working with the courts, fighting that
3 particular case.

4 And then, the number six is student loans. I
5 have the schedule of payments for that, and that
6 payments are currently being met.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Well, and so just
8 so I'm clear, so everything except number five have
9 basically been settled?

10 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Investigator,
12 appreciate it.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board question
14 or comments?

15 Ms. Cargill, who's Tiffany Russell?

16 MS. CARGILL: Tiffany Russell is a young lady
17 that was working with me and initially was on the
18 application as being part of the company. But she has
19 been taken off.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What's your relationship?
21 And how -- she was part of the company, and now she's
22 not? How did she become not part of the company?

23 MS. CARGILL: No, she was a coworker that we
24 talked about in my initiating, starting the company,
25 that she was going to be working with me. But she has

1 been since then taken off.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Originally, you were an
3 incorporator of the company, and she was the managing
4 member. So could you tell me what the process was?

5 MS. CARGILL: Right, she was going to be the --
6 she was going to be in the supervising position as far
7 as in operations. But because of her financial
8 background, there was some things that she needed to
9 take care of, I was advised to take her off, which I
10 did.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So she has nothing
12 to do with the company?

13 MS. CARGILL: No, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
15 question, comments?

16 Entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd make a
18 motion.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I move that Side by Side
21 Security Strategic Solutions, Ltd., doing business as
22 Side by Side Security, be granted a new corporate
23 private patrol license, Spring R. Cargill be granted an
24 individual private patrol license, and that that license
25 be placed in abeyance so that she can become the

1 qualifying agent. This is subject to all statutory and
2 regulatory requirements.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
5 second.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board, any
8 Board comment about the motion?

9 All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
12 Ray, I didn't hear your vote.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I don't mind saying it
14 again. Aye.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 Congratulations, ma'am.

17 MS. CARGILL: Thank you very much.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Congratulations. You have
19 a good day.

20 MS. CARGILL: Thank you.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You should have said we're
22 more exciting than the tax commission. That would have
23 sped things up.

24 MS. CARGILL: This is more exciting. Thank you
25 very much.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I'd like you to
2 entertain something today for a change. Why don't we
3 break at 11:45 for about 45 minutes for a substance
4 break.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 11:45? Yes, sir.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. The next item
8 on the agenda would be we'll start the registration
9 appeals. Item number 36, Donna Hayes? Is Donna Hayes
10 here?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We may want to do the
12 swearing in. We had a lot of people come in.

13 MS. BORDELOVE: Yeah.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, we had an awful
15 lot of people come in in the last hour. And we may need
16 to check swearing them in.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. If you intend to
18 be called up here for any reason and talk about why
19 you're here, you need to stand, raise your right hand,
20 and be sworn. So. Go ahead.

21 MS. WEISS: Oh, no, I'm not sure.

22 MR. SALADINO: Anybody that's here for appeals,
23 please stand, be sworn in.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Nobody plans on
25 testifying?

1 MS. WEISS: Yes, she does.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Then, she needs to
3 be sworn in.

4 MS. WEISS: Oh. But I'm not the applicant.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, we know that.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anybody, anybody that's
7 going to be called up.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If anybody -- no, you can
9 stay there.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You can stay there.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, you can stay there.
12 It's just --

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Just raise your right
14 hand and be sworn.

15 Okay. Go ahead.

16 MS. BORDELOVE: Everybody good? Okay. Do you
17 swear that the testimony you are about to give today is
18 the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

19 (Potential witnesses in Carson City and
20 Las Vegas were sworn.)

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you,
22 Mr. Flynn.

23 Donna Hayes is item number 36.

24 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, for the record,
25 Donna Hayes provided supplemental documentation and has

1 since been approved. So she is removed from the agenda.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

3 Item number 37, Anthony Washington-Crowell,
4 Crowell? Anthony Washington-Crowell?

5 MR. INGRAM: No one in the south.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Will put him on
7 the back end.

8 Number 38, Chad Jones. Chad Jones?

9 MR. INGRAM: He's present in the south.

10 MR. CHAD JONES: Good morning.

11 MR. CLIFF JONES: Good morning.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good morning.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you both
15 introduce yourself?

16 MR. CHAD JONES: My name is Chad Jones.

17 MR. CLIFF JONES: Cliff Jones, owner, Kennedy
18 Auto Recovery Solutions. No relation.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Now, who's the
20 investigator on this?

21 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us some
23 background on it?

24 MS. DONALD: Sure. Mr. Jones was arrested in
25 2009 for carrying a concealed weapon. He was charged

1 with a misdemeanor. He paid the fine. He disclosed
2 this arrest.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: He disclosed the arrest?

4 MS. DONALD: He disclosed it, yes.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I was busy looking
7 up something on the computer. We denied him for what
8 reason?

9 MS. DONALD: For carrying a concealed weapon.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, okay. All right.

11 MS. DONALD: The illegal use or possession,
12 yeah.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 Mr. Jones, can you give us a little bit of
15 information about what all happened in that situation?

16 MR. CHAD JONES: Yes, sir. Me and a friend of
17 mine had been in town, and we were over at the Rio
18 having a few drinks, didn't want to drive home. So we
19 were going to walk from the Rio over to the Strip to
20 take a bus home. And in the process of getting across
21 the freeway, the cops pulled us over and searched. I
22 told them I had a knife. I didn't -- I wasn't aware of
23 the whole length thing. It was a foldable knife that
24 you carry in your pocket. I was raised on a farm. We
25 carry knives, you know. I didn't know it was illegal.

1 And, I guess, it was an inch or inch and a half longer
2 than it was supposed to be. And that's as far as it
3 went.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What happened with the
5 court case?

6 MR. CHAD JONES: What was that?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I said, what happened
8 with the court case?

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: What happened with the
10 court case?

11 MR. CHAD JONES: When I went to court, the
12 public defender told me that if I gave up the weapon and
13 did a plea, that everything would be taken care of. I
14 was, I guess, misinformed or I misunderstood him on how
15 it worked and how it was going to be put on my record.
16 I was just happy enough to just get it going and get it
17 done, paid my fine, and did that. And I thought it was
18 over with. And then, when I reapplied for my license
19 again, that's when we found out, I guess, it wasn't over
20 with.

21 But I had nothing prior, nothing after. You
22 know, it was a one-time thing. And I won't carry a
23 knife again.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: May I ask?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

2 Did you have a guard card, previously?

3 MR. CHAD JONES: Yes, I had.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So this, this came up on
5 the renewal; is that what I'm understanding?

6 MR. CHAD JONES: Yes. Yes, sir.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you,
8 Mr. Chair.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Jones, is the other
10 Mr. Jones here for moral support?

11 MR. CLIFF JONES: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okey-doke.

13 MR. CLIFF JONES: Just some character
14 reference. I've known Chad for the better part of 16
15 years. He is an honest, hardworking man. And this mark
16 on him is really kind of unjust. But it is what it is.

17 I don't see any reason for him to be denied.
18 I'm hoping the Board will approve him.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.

20 Any other -- just so the public is aware, these
21 are adversarial proceedings now. So we don't take
22 public comment during these particular pieces. So it'll
23 only go to Board comment or questions.

24 Any additional Board comment or questions?

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, Mr. Chair.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: What type of pocket
3 knife are we talking about here, lengthwise and
4 operation of it?

5 MR. CHAD JONES: It was, the blade was six and
6 a half inches. And, I guess, you're only allowed five.
7 And it was a serrated blade on just the tip on one side,
8 and then the regular blade on the other side. It was a
9 folding, folding pocket knife.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Is it spring-operated at
11 all, or?

12 MR. CHAD JONES: Yeah. Well, no, I mean you
13 just open it, and you have to push the button to close
14 it, yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. I have no
16 further.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 Any other Board question or comment?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair. Ray
20 Flynn.

21 Mr. Jones, just tell us your work history.

22 MR. CHAD JONES: What was that?

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Your work history, please.
24 I want to know your background.

25 MR. CHAD JONES: Recently, I just got off the

1 road. I was an exotics car hauler. I did all 48
2 states. Before that, I did -- let me back up. I just
3 finished a job I was on for two years doing warehouse
4 work for an electrician company. I came off the road to
5 do that.

6 Just before that, I was -- was it, it was with
7 you guys.

8 I was repossession at Intermountain Recovery.
9 I did work for them for a couple years. I bounced in
10 and out of recovery work since '94, so.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No other contacts with the
12 police that ended up with you in handcuffs?

13 MR. CHAD JONES: No.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: In your exotic car
15 hauling, did you haul any Mustangs?

16 MR. CHAD JONES: Oh, yeah. We were. Yes,
17 there were some volunteer shops. We did all the super
18 stakes.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. That was worth
20 asking the question.

21 MR. CHAD JONES: Everything you've dreamed
22 about, I have been in.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?
24 Entertain a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that Chad Jones
3 be -- that the denial be overturned and that he be
4 issued a registration card.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
6 there a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comments or
9 question on the motion?

10 All in favor, say "aye."

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I just want to
12 put on the record, I think, I'm speaking for my partners
13 up north. We're doing this because it was one incident,
14 the type of weapon involved, as well as this person's
15 work history, and zero criminal history outside of this.
16 And I would support it.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And to expand on that, if
18 I may, Mr. Chair, thank you. He had a registration
19 card. And if I'm understanding correct, that was
20 issued, it had to have been issued some time after,
21 after the incident occurred but prior to our
22 implementation of handling the registration. So we have
23 an overlapping period where he had a registration card
24 and was working in the industry. And it's only on
25 renewal that this was brought to our attention.

1 So from that perspective, you know, I -- we've
2 encountered these occasionally. And I think that this
3 is an appropriate route to take.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

5 All in favor?

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed?

8 Congratulations.

9 MR. CHAD JONES: Thank you very much.

10 MR. CLIFF JONES: Thank you.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you. Have a
12 good day.

13 MR. CHAD JONES: Thank you.

14 MR. CLIFF JONES: Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. The next item
16 is 39, Clinton Conner.

17 MR. INGRAM: He's in the south.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

19 MR. CONNER: Good morning.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let me pull you up here.
21 Who's the investigator?

22 MS. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us what the
24 situation was?

25 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a

1 1992 carrying a loaded firearm in public out of
2 California. The applicant did list the convention, or
3 the conviction on his application. And he received two
4 years of probation for the misdemeanor carrying of a
5 loaded firearm in public.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's illegal in
7 California?

8 MR. CONNER: Apparently so, sir. I was
9 arrested.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Hm. Can you tell us
11 about the situation, what happened?

12 MR. CONNER: Yes. I was in the Navy at the
13 time. I was in the military at the time. And one of my
14 shipmates had sold me a firearm. And I purchased it
15 from him. Because he had got a new firearm. So I
16 bought his. And we was out on the town. He got pulled
17 over for a traffic violation. And the police searched
18 the vehicle and found both guns in our possession. So
19 we were both arrested.

20 I paid a fine. The military busted me down in
21 rank. But I still got out with an honorable discharge,
22 I think. But that was the gist of it right there.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And when was this?

24 MR. CONNER: 25 years ago.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board

1 questions?

2 Entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn. I'll make the
4 motion that we grant Mr. Conner the appeal. The reason
5 being, it's been 15 years since the conviction, his
6 honorable service to the United States military, and
7 he's been out of trouble since.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second?

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
11 second. Any Board comment on the motion?

12 All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

15 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

16 MR. CONNER: Thank you.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

18 MR. CONNER: Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Chelsey Conway?

20 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, for the record, Chelsey
21 has withdrawn her appeal.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 41, David Ewing?

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's here.

24 MR. EWING: Good afternoon.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good afternoon.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's the investigator on
2 Mr. Ewing?

3 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us what's
5 going on, what happened?

6 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
7 felony possession and had a couple of felony -- well,
8 one felony conviction for possession and a couple
9 misdemeanor ones. The applicant applied and appealed
10 last year and had asked to, you know, come back, or was
11 instructed by the Board to come back in a year, to put
12 in a little more time and distance between his probation
13 times and whatnot.

14 There's no other criminal activities or
15 nothing. Mr. Ewing has stayed in contact with our
16 office, letting us know how good he's doing and when he
17 was going to be able to reapply to come back before the
18 Board. And that's why we're here again today.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

20 Mr. Ewing, do you have anything to say?

21 MR. EWING: I just need a chance, you know.
22 Like I said, I've been doing things, been doing for the
23 past five years. I do admit, I do have a history. But
24 I'm not that person anymore. You know, I try to do good
25 every day, do better, better every day. Now I give back

1 to the community. I sponsor people at the Salvation
2 Army and Westcare, people that are in recovery. You
3 know, like I said, I was an addict for a very long time.
4 I try to give back, because, you know, I know how tough
5 it is being an addict and trying to live down the past.

6 And I'm just asking for a chance. You know, I
7 mean, like I said, I try to do the best I can. That's
8 it, you know.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
10 question?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair.

12 Mr. Saladino, can -- I mean we get so many of
13 these over the year. Can you give me a brief history of
14 what we've got criminally?

15 MR. SALADINO: So it was a felony possession of
16 a controlled substance. The applicant has an honorable,
17 was honorably discharged from probation on May 14th of
18 2015. And, I guess, last year, when he was here, there
19 just hadn't been enough time between when he was
20 finished with probation and completing all of his drug
21 court programs. That's why he was instructed to come
22 back in another year.

23 And since then, you know, there's been no, no
24 trouble or nothing.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So no theft or violence in

1 the criminal past?

2 MR. SALADINO: No. No. It was all
3 drug-related.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

5 MR. EWING: Like I said, I was an addict. I'm
6 embarrassed by it, but I take credit for everything I've
7 done. I'm not trying to hide anything. I know I did
8 it. I'm just asking for a chance.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Which 12 Step program are
10 you sponsoring people with?

11 MR. EWING: NA.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: NA. Okay. How often do
13 you go to a meeting?

14 MR. EWING: I go to a meeting three times a
15 week. And I pick up people that are in recovery, take
16 them to meetings with me, because I know how tough it is
17 to get clean.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

19 MR. EWING: Now, I didn't go to prison. I got
20 clean on the streets. It's a very tough thing to do.
21 You know, because a lot of people go to prison, and they
22 do get clean in prison. I got clean by drug court and
23 probation.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: What are you doing for
25 employment right now?

1 MR. EWING: I was working for the tow truck
2 company, which is tow yard, you know, private impounds.
3 But I got let go three weeks ago because they're not
4 making any money in November. So I lost my job.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

6 MR. EWING: I was hoping on this, you know,
7 looking forward to this since last year.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I appreciate your
9 frankness.

10 MR. EWING: Like I said, I had -- I'm
11 embarrassed, frankly. But like I said, you know, I did.
12 I'm not going to try to hide anything. I'm not going to
13 sugarcoat it. That was me. I was a naughty person.
14 But, today, I am not that person.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you have a family?

17 MR. EWING: Yes, I do.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Wife, children?

19 MR. EWING: No, I was never married. I have
20 three beautiful kids, 25, 14 and four-year-old.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
22 questions?

23 Entertain a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, it's Ray Flynn.
25 You know, we don't often ask people to come back.

1 Obviously, there was something that spurred one of us to
2 ask him to come back in a year. He has stayed clean.
3 And the fact that there's no theft or violence in his
4 past. I move to grant him his appeal.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
7 second. Any Board comment or questions on the motion?

8 All in favor, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
11 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

12 MR. EWING: Thank you.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you. Don't
14 let us down.

15 MR. EWING: Yeah, thank you. Thank you all.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Devon Calhoun, number 42.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's here.

19 MR. CALHOUN: It's actually Deron.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, his first
21 name's Deron. I know the agenda says something else.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: D-E-R-O-N?

23 MR. CALHOUN: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 MR. CALHOUN: That would be an R.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sorry about that.

2 Who's the investigator?

3 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us a little
5 background?

6 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. Mr. Calhoun was denied
7 for a 2010 felony drugs arrest. He did not disclose the
8 arrest. The disposition, he did three years probation,
9 eight days jail. The applicant was initially made
10 provisional. And the arrest was found on the seeds of
11 the fingerprint report.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Calhoun, was
13 there a particular reason that you didn't note the
14 criminal history?

15 MR. CALHOUN: Yes, I honestly read the question
16 wrong. I thought the question was asking did I have any
17 convictions involving any weapons. Which I do not have
18 any at all. So that was just a mistake on my behalf.

19 Prior to that, I have given all my background
20 history as far as my convictions, the case. I've
21 emailed everything over to Vincent Saladino. And now
22 I'm here to appeal it.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now, is this the only
24 thing that exists in your criminal history, or is this
25 the only thing you forgot to disclose?

1 MR. CALHOUN: This is the only thing in my
2 criminal history as far as a conviction. I emailed all
3 my arrests prior to the case, and that's the only thing
4 I've ever been charged for.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you've been, you've
6 had some arrests, but you were never ultimately charged
7 for those?

8 MR. CALHOUN: As a teenage juvenile, as far as
9 like possessions of marijuana and thing like that, but
10 nothing as far as any convictions or crimes.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
12 questions?

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair, Ray Flynn,
14 for the investigator.

15 Mr. Maxwell, what do you know about his
16 criminal history?

17 MR. MAXWELL: Going off the fingerprint report,
18 sir, as stated, the arrest in 2010. And there's also
19 obstructing a public officer, 2012. And another count
20 of possession in 2012. But there's no disposition on
21 the last two, sir.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So a total of three
23 arrests or contacts with law enforcement?

24 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And on the drug charge

1 we're talking about, what was the specific charge as
2 listed on there?

3 MR. MAXWELL: One count of possession, purchase
4 coke base for sale.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Possession with
6 intent to sell?

7 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other question?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

13 When was probation completed? Was that one of
14 the 2012 notations?

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: They're looking it up.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

17 MR. SALADINO: The 2010 possession of pure
18 cocaine base felony for sale, the three years probation,
19 that was in 2010, so three years, 2013, maybe '14,
20 depending on how it went.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Mr. Calhoun?

22 MR. CALHOUN: Yes, sir.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: When did you complete
24 your probation?

25 MR. CALHOUN: I completed my probation with --

1 I would say last year, May. Last year, May.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

4 Entertain a motion.

5 Second call for a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If there's no motion,

9 then the denial stands, correct?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good question.

11 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes, that is correct.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, Mr. Chair, I'll make

13 a motion. This is Ray Flynn. I'll make a motion that

14 we uphold the denial. The reason being, he, the

15 applicant did not disclose, and we've got less than a

16 year since he's been off probation.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a

19 second. Any Board comment or questions on the motion?

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I would like the gentleman

21 to come back again next year if he feels the need and he

22 sees that we do look at things a second time.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

1 The decision has been upheld, and you're
2 eligible to reapply for reconsideration in a year.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

4 MR. CALHOUN: Thanks.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let's see. It's now well
6 past the witching hour. So 45 minutes?

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That'll be good. Thank
8 you.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

10 * * * * *

11 (A break was taken, 11:52 a.m. to 12:35 p.m.)

12 * * * * *

13 MR. INGRAM: Okay. We're ready in the south.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We left off
15 with -- 42 was the last one, correct?

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We're back in
18 session. Item number 43, Eddie Boatwright. Eddie
19 Boatwright?

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Not down here.

21 MS. DONALD: He's supposed to be down here.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll trail him.
23 Eric Dubose.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's here.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 44.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good morning to you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning, or
3 afternoon.

4 MR. DUBOSE: Good morning.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Who's the
6 investigator on this?

7 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us why he
9 was denied?

10 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. Mr. Dubose has got a
11 felony arrest for weapons in 1996 out of California.
12 The gentleman did disclose the arrest on his application
13 form. The disposition was three years probation with
14 three days jail. The applicant was not made
15 provisional. The arrest was disclosed and confirmed
16 with the fingerprint report.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And that was the extent
18 of the criminal history?

19 MR. DUBOSE: Yes. You said it was a felony?

20 MR. MAXWELL: That's what it said on the
21 report.

22 MR. DUBOSE: It was reduced.

23 MR. MAXWELL: Yeah, but.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. Well,
25 you address the Chairman. You do not question the

1 staff.

2 MR. DUBOSE: Yes, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That's just how we go in
4 order. Because, otherwise, we'll lose complete control.

5 MR. DUBOSE: Okay. I won't do it.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was this the only entry
8 for criminal history?

9 MR. MAXWELL: Just checking that, sir.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And, Mr. Dubose, if you
12 have questions, you're allowed to ask the Chair when he
13 asks if you have anything.

14 MR. DUBOSE: Okay. Thank you.

15 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir, that's the only arrest.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

17 Can you tell us what the circumstances were
18 around that case?

19 MR. DUBOSE: Yes, sir. I just, I just retired
20 back in Kansas in 1995. I was there. I was doing some
21 road construction. Our contract ended. And I purchased
22 the knife there in Kansas. And from bringing it back, I
23 didn't realize I had it in my pocket. I thought I had
24 put it in my luggage. But I had it in my pocket,
25 unaware. And once I got to California, to my

1 sister-in-law's house, me and a boyfriend were walking
2 into a store, and then we came back. And then the
3 officers were already in the compartment complex. They
4 got a call, and they were looking for somebody else, and
5 they said that we kind of matched the description. And
6 they kind of, you know, checked us both and saw that.
7 You know, my friend, he was cleared. But I had the
8 knife in my pocket. And I forgot that I had it in my
9 pocket.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. You pled guilty?

11 MR. DUBOSE: Yes.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You got three days in
13 jail and three years probation, right?

14 MR. DUBOSE: Well, they gave me, they gave me,
15 they gave me two days, I believe, it was two or three
16 days in jail. But I thought it was two years for a
17 summary probation.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What have you been
19 doing with yourself since then?

20 MR. DUBOSE: Been working.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What kind of work?

22 MR. DUBOSE: I'm currently working with -- I'm
23 currently working with We Serve right now. And they
24 take care of all of the concert and event venues on the
25 Strip. I'm one of the sole survivors of the Route 91

1 shooting of the Country Festival. And I'm just working
2 and just maintaining and just being a productive member
3 of society.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
5 questions?

6 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, we just need to
7 clarify something, if we may. This is Kevin.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

9 MR. INGRAM: So you said you're currently with
10 We Serve. Are you working for We Serve or We Serve
11 Plus, and are you working in security?

12 MR. DUBOSE: No, I'm an usher.

13 MR. INGRAM: You're an usher, so you're working
14 for We Serve?

15 MR. DUBOSE: Yes, but they also have security
16 as well.

17 MR. INGRAM: That's the We Serve Plus. Okay.
18 Thank you for clarifying.

19 MR. DUBOSE: You're welcome.

20 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board question,
22 comment?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have a question,
24 Mr. Chair.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: In addition to the
2 weapon charge, there was a drug-related charge as well?

3 MR. DUBOSE: No, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No? Was it -- I'm
5 looking at your -- I have the wrong one.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: This one.

7 MR. INGRAM: The actual charge that showed up
8 on the rap sheet, it shows possession, manufacturing or
9 selling of a dangerous weapon.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay.

11 MR. INGRAM: So the way it's listed, it could
12 be any one of those three.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. All right. That
14 answers it for me, then. Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board question?
16 Entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that Eric D.
20 Dubose's denial be reversed and he be issued a
21 registration.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Is
23 there a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray --

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
2 second. Any Board discussion or question?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, Mr. Chair. And the
4 rationale here is that this is a 1996 case, or 1995, but
5 a 1996 case, completed his probation, did serve time, he
6 did disclose. So, therefore, I think, there's
7 justification for giving him a chance.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other comment?

9 All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

12 Congratulations.

13 MR. DUBOSE: Thank you. Thank you. I
14 appreciate it.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Heather Salas-Silva. Up
16 here.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: She wasn't sworn in.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You didn't get sworn?

19 MS. SALAS-SILVA: No.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. She's going to
21 need to. She wasn't sworn.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We need to swear her in.

23 MS. BORDELOVE: Okay. Will you please raise
24 your right hand. Do you swear that the testimony you
25 give today will be the truth, the whole truth, and

1 nothing but the truth?

2 MS. SALAS-SILVA: Yes.

3 MS. BORDELOVE: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Who's the
5 investigator?

6 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What's the reason for
8 denial?

9 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
10 2006 robbery with a deadly weapon, felony, here in
11 Nevada, and a possession of a stolen vehicle in 2004,
12 also in Nevada. The applicant disclosed both
13 convictions. She finished everything she needs to do
14 for her probation.

15 On both, on both cases, she did not serve the
16 full term. She did the minimums on both of them and was
17 released because of good behavior and finishing all the
18 programs and stuff that were part of her conditions.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's do this one
20 at a time. On the 2004 possession of a stolen vehicle,
21 what was the circumstances surrounding that?

22 MS. SALAS-SILVA: I was actually at my mom and
23 dad's house. And my friends had stolen the vehicle.
24 They came and picked me up. And when the police ran the
25 plate, they knew that was a stolen vehicle. So, in

1 turn, we were all charged for the same thing, possession
2 of a stolen vehicle.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How many were?

4 MS. SALAS-SILVA: There was four of us.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did everybody --

6 MS. SALAS-SILVA: Everybody got equal time.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And then what's the
8 circumstances surrounding the 2006 robbery with a deadly
9 weapon?

10 MS. SALAS-SILVA: Actually, just to clarify, I
11 was only charged with robbery, because they couldn't
12 prove, because I did not have a weapon.

13 But I was very heavily into drugs and alcohol.
14 And a friend -- well, I'm not going to say friend,
15 because that's, that's an ill word in that community.
16 But an associate, a fellow drug user, picked me up and
17 said that he wanted a specific type of drug. I didn't
18 have it. So I told him, "Ill take you to get it." He
19 said, "No, how about you perform oral sex on me for
20 \$20?" And I said, "No." And he said, "Well, either
21 you're going to do it or I'm going take it."

22 So when he stopped at the light, I jumped out,
23 because I was raped, and I didn't want to be raped
24 again. And, in turn, he called 9-1-1 and told them that
25 I robbed him for \$20 with a two-inch knife. And because

1 of the prior, they convicted me. But.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What jurisdiction was
3 this, Reno?

4 MS. SALAS-SILVA: Yeah. Washoe County. I
5 don't know the difference.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

7 MS. SALAS-SILVA: But since then, I've gone to
8 medical school and gone -- I'm doing my paramedic
9 license now, advanced paramedic, which is what I was
10 doing at Tesla under Securitas, which is why I'm here in
11 front of you lovely people, because I needed the license
12 to be their EMT security guard. They're paying for my
13 school. I'm the regional general manager for Taco Bell.
14 I have children. I have a home, you know.

15 It's been 11 and a half years ago, and I
16 haven't had any contact with the police other than
17 donating time for them.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Yes, sir.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: How long did you spend in
20 prison?

21 MS. SALAS-SILVA: I did from September of 2006
22 till February 28 of 2008. So it's been almost 10 years
23 since I walked out of those doors.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did you --

25 MS. SALAS-SILVA: I completed parole --

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

2 MS. SALAS-SILVA: -- on July 4th of 2008, just
3 mere months after I got out of prison, because they said
4 they couldn't keep me on it, because I did so many
5 programs in prison that my back number had moved all the
6 way up to the date of release.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

8 MS. SALAS-SILVA: So I successfully completed
9 parole.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And you said you
11 currently have a job?

12 MS. SALAS-SILVA: Oh, yes, sir. I have two.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

14 MS. SALAS-SILVA: I'm just waiting on this to
15 go back to Securitas, go back out to Tesla.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you,
17 Mr. Chair.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other
19 questions?

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: May I ask the
21 investigator a question?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Investigator
24 Saladino, did you see the police report or any of the
25 court documents?

1 MR. SALADINO: Did I see what?

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Any of the -- the police
3 report or the court documents on this? You were just
4 going off the fingerprint card, correct?

5 MR. SALADINO: Correct. And according to the
6 fingerprint report, the robbery with a deadly weapon did
7 get bumped down to just robbery.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. All right. Thank
9 you.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?
11 Entertain a motion.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm going to make a
15 motion that Heather M. Salas-Silva, that the denial be
16 reversed and that she receive her registration card.

17 MS. SALAS-SILVA: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
19 there a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
22 question on the motion?

23 All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All opposed, say "no."

1 It carries unanimously. Don't make us be
2 fools.

3 MS. SALAS-SILVA: Thank you. Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I think, for the
8 record --

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just to be clear, I
11 think, she served her time, and she was -- she had an
12 explanation. She's trying to clean things up and start.
13 And we need to give her a chance.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

15 Next on the agenda is item number 46, Laval
16 Jenkins. Laval Jenkins?

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Are you Mr. Jenkins?

18 MR. BOATWRIGHT: I'm Eddie Boatwright.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Chair, we've got
20 the item 43, the gentleman's here now. It doesn't
21 appear number 46 is here.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay, sir.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So with your approval, I
24 recommend we trail 46 and we hear 43.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir. I just got to

1 find it here.

2 Eddie Boatwright?

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Eddie Boatwright?

4 He's here. He's coming up.

5 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Good morning. Good morning.

6 MS. BORDELOVE: Were you sworn in?

7 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Huh?

8 MS. BORDELOVE: Were you sworn in earlier?

9 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Yes, earlier, m-hm

10 (affirmative).

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Who's the
12 investigator, please?

13 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Pardon me?

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's talking to the
15 investigator.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who was the investigator
17 on the case?

18 MS. DONALD: Oh. Investigator Donald.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what's the reason we
20 turned down Mr. Boatwright?

21 MS. DONALD: Mr. Boatwright has an extensive
22 arrest history from 1975 to 2001. This includes
23 numerous arrests and citations. He was cited 13 times
24 for trespassing, 10 times for petty larceny, nine times
25 for felon failing to change address, one time for misuse

1 of bus stop, two times for consuming alcohol, one time
2 for jaywalking, one time for loitering, five times for
3 battery.

4 He was arrested six times for burglary, three
5 times for disturbing the peace, 10 times for resisting
6 arrest, and four times for being a public nuisance.

7 He did list some of these charges, and he
8 either paid a fine, did some jail time, or they were
9 dismissed.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What are the convictions?

11 MS. DONALD: So in 1989, he was convicted of
12 grand larceny, felony. He served around three years in
13 Nevada State Prison. He did disclose that.

14 In 1984, he was convicted of felony burglary,
15 again about three years in Nevada State Prison.

16 In 1975, he was convicted of felony grand theft
17 auto, which he disclosed, and he received around two
18 years probation.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Boatwright, is pretty
20 much all of that, are you remembering all of that stuff?

21 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Yeah, yes, Your Honor, I do.
22 And as the investigator pointed out, it's been 16 or 17
23 years. I haven't had -- been arrested or had any
24 contact with law enforcement in 17 years.

25 Back when all this stuff was happening, I was,

1 you know, into that all. You know, I was. And mostly
2 all of that stuff, it was just being a nuisance in the
3 town. I was mostly a nuisance, and it's just, really
4 just, like I said, it's a lot of those like disturbing
5 the peace and public nuisance.

6 And like I said, all this stuff happened like
7 in the '80s, in the '90s. And, you know, it's been 17
8 years I haven't been into anything. And since then, now
9 I have 14 months sobriety. I've since completed the
10 Las Vegas Rescue Mission. I've graduated with the
11 Las Vegas Rescue Mission.

12 And I'm saying, in these 17 years that I look
13 back, you know, I just want a chance now, you know.
14 It's taught me. I just want a -- it's been a while.
15 And I just want a second chance at trying to straighten
16 my life out, do something different. As I say, it's
17 been years since I've had any contact with law
18 enforcement. It'll be 18 years in around mid January,
19 without any arrests.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you have --

21 MR. BOATWRIGHT: So I have --

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you got a family?

23 MR. BOATWRIGHT: I'm sorry. Yes, I have a
24 family here in town, brothers and my father and --
25 pretty much.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What have you been doing
2 workwise in the last 17 years?

3 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Oh, I worked for, I worked for
4 Caesar's Palace. I did a couple years at Caesar's
5 Palace. I've done, I've worked the casual labor places.
6 Right now, I'm employed at the Sands Expo Convention
7 Center. And I've done a little security work for the
8 Las Vegas Recovery Rescue Mission. Mostly labor work I
9 do.

10 And I've done everything I could these last 17
11 years to stay away from -- I stay out of the law
12 enforcement. And, you know, I just want a second, you
13 know, try something different. I want to try to be in
14 the community, a help to the community. I'd just like a
15 chance at this.

16 And I can, I plan to continue this, this
17 journey I'm on. I've really enjoyed, this 17 years has
18 been really enjoyable to me. I don't have to look over
19 my shoulder. You know, I don't steal. All that stuff
20 was, it was just petty stuff. I was never like any
21 dangerous, carrying weapons dangerous guy. Just, and
22 the petty larcenies just turned into like, they turn
23 them into felonies after you have so many. But.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 MR. BOATWRIGHT: That's...

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.

2 Any other Board questions?

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Investigator Donald,
6 were any of the numerous other citations, were any of
7 those any newer than the 1989?

8 MS. DONALD: The last time he had a conviction
9 on his record was 2001.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Two thousand --

11 MS. DONALD: He hasn't been arrested, 2001, has
12 not been arrested since then.

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. And what was that
14 for?

15 MS. DONALD: In 2001, it was a citation for
16 trespassing.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board question?

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, one question,
20 Mr. Chair.

21 Mr. Boatwright, you were homeless at one point,
22 right?

23 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Yes, at one point.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Actually for a few years
25 probably, right?

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: For two years?

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, for a few years, you
3 were homeless?

4 MR. BOATWRIGHT: When this stuff was happening?

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yes.

6 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Yeah, yeah, during that time,
7 I was just homeless and just in the streets, drinking
8 and just picking up charges like she said, disturbing
9 the peace.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I get it. I was a cop for
11 33 years, and your arrest history mirrors what I would
12 think a homeless person needs to deal with.

13 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Yeah, but I've since, you
14 know, I've --

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You've got a home now,
16 right?

17 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Yeah.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

20 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Where I stay now.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?
22 Entertain a motion?

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, it's a tough
24 one, but it is the holiday season. And the fact that
25 Mr. Boatwright has not been in trouble for at least 16

1 years, he's currently employed, and he's no longer
2 homeless, I'm willing to give him a chance. And if he
3 gets in trouble, I know he'll be back before us. So I
4 move to grant him the appeal.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
6 there a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board discussion on
9 the motion?

10 All in favor, say "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
13 Congratulations.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Boatwright, don't let
15 us down.

16 MR. BOATWRIGHT: Amen. I appreciate it. I
17 won't. I won't.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Where did we leave off?

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Laval Jenkins.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Laval Jenkins, 46?

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Jenkins is not here.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Jerome Turner,
24 number 47.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Turner --

1 MR. BOATWRIGHT: I think, I'm going to go now.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right.

3 Good afternoon to you.

4 MR. TURNER: How are you doing today?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Jerome Turner?

6 MR. TURNER: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

8 Who's the investigator?

9 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
10 applicant was denied for a 2008 concealed weapons
11 charge. It was a misdemeanor. He received a hundred
12 hours of community service and completed everything.
13 And he did list the arrest on his application.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Turner, can you tell
15 me about the circumstances surrounding the charge?

16 MR. TURNER: Yeah. The reason I was is because
17 I'd just turned 21. I had no, no record or anything
18 when I was 21. I went and got a gun, but not knowing I
19 needed a concealed weapons license at the time. Didn't
20 have a concealed weapons license, got pulled over in my
21 apartment complex, and got arrested for it.

22 But it was my gun. I had the blue card and
23 everything.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: This was in southern
3 Nevada?

4 MR. TURNER: Yeah. This was in Las Vegas,
5 Nevada, yeah.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did you have it on your
7 person, or it was just --

8 MR. TURNER: Yeah.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- in the trunk?

10 MR. TURNER: Yes.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You had it --

12 MR. TURNER: No, it was on my person.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You had it on your
14 person?

15 MR. TURNER: I was leaving out of my car, I was
16 leaving my car, going to my apartment complex, and
17 that's when he pulled me over. I was not in the car,
18 though.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, I had a hard time
20 understanding all that. Just all I need to know, was it
21 on your person, did you have it?

22 MR. TURNER: Yes, sir.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. All right. Thank
24 you.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is that the only arrest

1 in the system?

2 MR. TURNER: Yes. Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
4 questions?

5 MR. TURNER: I have a question, though. I had
6 a card previous to this, so I don't know why I couldn't
7 get another one. I was working security after that. I
8 still have the card. It just expired.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Can you hear the question
10 up north?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah. But was it our
12 card or the Metro card?

13 MR. TURNER: It was an armed guard card, or the
14 guard card, yeah, sheriff's card.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sheriff's card?

16 MR. TURNER: M-hm (affirmative).

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: When did it expire?

18 MR. TURNER: That one expired probably in like
19 two thousand -- I don't know. It is probably like two
20 thousand -- I don't remember. I don't remember at all.
21 But I remember me having one. It was an armed guard
22 card before. And I wear a SuperPaw now. And you have
23 to have a guard card for that, too. And I have that,
24 too. I got that on me now.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But that's issued by the

1 Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, not this
2 agency.

3 MR. TURNER: Okay. I didn't know that.

4 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Do you have the cards on
5 you?

6 MR. TURNER: In my wallet. (Showing.) Yeah,
7 that's Sheriff's.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, that a sheriff's
9 card. Okay. Different government organization.

10 MR. TURNER: Okay.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Staff's got an item.

13 MS. IRIZARRY: Jerome, what's your middle name?

14 MR. TURNER: "Ah-TAYK-is."

15 MS. IRIZARRY: So he did have a PILB work card.
16 It recently expired. He got it issued -- it expired in
17 2012. So it would have been issued with Las Vegas
18 Metro, but we took it over in 2010. It's a 2012 card.

19 MR. INGRAM: So it was actually the Metro card.

20 MS. IRIZARRY: And no employer has hired him
21 since he had that card.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other question?

23 Entertain a motion.

24 Second call for a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Mr. Chairman, I move that

1 Jerome Turner's application be overturned and he be
2 granted the guard card.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
4 there a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment,
7 question?

8 All in favor, say "aye."

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: If you could --

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm sorry.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Just, Commissioner Nixon,
12 normally what we do when we grant an appeal, we also
13 list the reason why.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And it can be as short as
16 one sentence, but just so we can go back and look at
17 consistencies or inconsistencies and how we do things.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Sure. My reasoning is
19 because it's been so long, he has no other convictions
20 or arrests.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

25 Passes unanimous. Congratulations.

1 MR. TURNER: Thank you.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

3 MR. TURNER: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 48, Jo Anne
5 Borders?

6 MR. INGRAM: Not present in the south.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Trail it.
8 Jordan Keith, number 49?

9 MR. INGRAM: No.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Joseph Ross, number 50?

11 MR. INGRAM: He's here.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon.

13 MR. ROSS: Good afternoon.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's the investigator?

15 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

17 MS. DONALD: Mr. Ross was charged with felony
18 possession of marijuana in 2003 and for misdemeanor
19 burglary in 2002. He served jail time and received
20 probation for both offenses. And he disclosed the
21 arrests on his application.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us
23 about the two, two charges?

24 MR. ROSS: Yes. The first one I got when I was
25 in -- I was going to a community college in Victorville,

1 Apple Valley. That one was -- I didn't have nothing to
2 do with it. I had -- it was a backpack with my test,
3 name on it. And the person that went to jail, he was
4 still in -- he was working in the library at the
5 college, and he was stealing the books and returning
6 them back, but he had my backpack. So when he went to
7 jail, they emptied out the backpack. It had my test
8 paper with my name on it. And they asked him who was I.

9 And they never came and got me or nothing or
10 told me nothing about it. I didn't know nothing about
11 it. So one day, I was in school, and an officer came up
12 to me. And then that's when they had a warrant for me.
13 And so, well, they let me out on OR that same day I was
14 going to court for it. So.

15 And then I was on -- I got on probation. Well,
16 I hadn't started probation yet, but I was still on
17 probation, so. A couple months later, I was going -- I
18 came from a party with me and my friend. And I got
19 pulled over. And my friend, he was 16. I had turned
20 18. So I mean I was already on probation. So when we
21 got pulled over, he had a scale. He had a scale, and I
22 had the weed, a bag, five bags of weed in my car. So
23 since I'm on probation already, they charged me with it,
24 with a hangman scale and five bags of marijuana.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else since then?

1 MR. ROSS: No, I haven't been in trouble. I
2 haven't been, with the law or nothing. I haven't been,
3 nothing.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
5 question?

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Are you employed
9 currently?

10 MR. ROSS: Yes.

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: What type of work do you
12 do?

13 MR. ROSS: I'm a cashier at Top Notch.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: How long have you been
15 there?

16 MR. ROSS: Six months.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. And what's your
18 longest employment in the last five years?

19 MR. ROSS: Well, I was working at a limousine
20 company for two years before we closed down. Then I
21 moved out here, and because my son was born out here, so
22 I moved out here the last two years. So I've been
23 working at the AC for Millie and Stanton (phonetic
24 spelling). So I've been working on the Strips, working
25 at different warehouses, working in the kitchen.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: So you have family out
2 here?

3 MR. ROSS: No, I have -- my girl, she has
4 family. My mom's in California.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Nothing further.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment,
7 questions?

8 Entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I do have a
10 question.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

13 Mr. Ross, how much time --

14 MR. ROSS: Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- did you do on
16 probation?

17 MR. ROSS: They gave me three years summary
18 probation.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And did you serve, you
20 served the probation, you had no problems with the
21 probation?

22 MR. ROSS: Yes. Yes, they let me move from
23 Apple Valley to transfer to Los Angeles. And I didn't
24 have to check in or nothing. It was a summary
25 probation. I had to plead to get it.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. How much time did
2 you spend in jail on the marijuana charge?

3 MR. ROSS: Well, since I had -- I still had an
4 older case for the second-degree burglary, since I
5 didn't do the burglary, since they -- they put it
6 together, so they gave me on account of that. So I only
7 had to do six months, six to eight months.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And that was in the -- a
9 local jail?

10 MR. ROSS: Yes, in San Bernardino.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

13 Any other questions?

14 Entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
16 Joseph Ross's denial be reversed based upon the length
17 of time and no issues since then.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
21 second. Is there any Board comments on the motion?

22 All in favor, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

25 Congratulations.

1 MR. ROSS: Thank you. Thank you, sir.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

3 MR. ROSS: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mahogany Brown,
5 number 51?

6 MR. INGRAM: She's here.

7 MS. BROWN: Hello.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Hello.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's the investigator?

10 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What did we deny
12 Ms. Brown for?

13 MR. MAXWELL: Ms. Brown has a 2007 felony
14 arrest for grand larceny out of Virginia, to which she
15 is on probation, which started on August 2008 and
16 finished May 2009. The applicant was not made
17 provisional. And the arrest was disclosed on the
18 application form and confirmed with fingerprint reports.
19 And this was the only arrest.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 Can you tell us about the case?

22 MS. BROWN: Sure. Excuse me. I was young and
23 thought that I could get away with whatever I wanted,
24 and was leaving the store and was caught by security. I
25 was able to give them everything that was in the

1 shopping bags, tags and everything. I was convicted of
2 the charge, because it was more than \$250, for larceny.
3 And I was given the probation. I completed that in nine
4 months, because I was able to pay off my court fees
5 within that time period. And I was done and haven't had
6 an issue since then.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you spend any time in
8 jail?

9 MS. BROWN: I'm sorry?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did you spend any time in
11 jail?

12 MS. BROWN: Oh. I spent 55 days. I missed the
13 second court date, happened in Virginia, and I was from
14 Ohio. So I notified them that I wasn't able to make my
15 second court date, and they put a warrant out for me.
16 So when I was pulled over for a routine, I spent 55 days
17 in Virginia. August 15th, the conviction went through,
18 and I was able to go home.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

20 Any other Board question?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I do, Mr. Chair.

22 What are you doing now?

23 MS. BROWN: Right now, I'm seeking employment.
24 And I'm taking vocational classes at FIT, Foundation for
25 Independent Tomorrow. I'm taking my certification,

1 well, I'm getting prepared for my certification for
2 electronic health records for a medical front office.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: But you want employment in
4 security?

5 MS. BROWN: Well, right now, this is for
6 future, so I will have a -- something to fall back on.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And before you went for
8 training, what was your longest employment in the last
9 five years?

10 MS. BROWN: Employment, I was doing
11 administrative work here for Apple. Apple was
12 happening. And I was doing administrative work at Hertz
13 at the airport.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
16 questions, comments?

17 Entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, it's Ray Flynn.
19 I'll make a motion we grant her appeal, based on time
20 and distance from her criminal record, that there was
21 only the one charge and, obviously, the follow-up
22 because she forgot about it. It looks like she's
23 turning her life around. And I don't think she's going
24 to let us down.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Is

1 there a second?

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board discussion on
4 the motion?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I just have one
6 additional question, if I may.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: How long have you been in
9 Nevada?

10 MS. BROWN: I've been here four years.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Four years.

12 MS. BROWN: Actually, I'm sorry. It's five
13 years next week. So five.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Thank you. Thank
15 you, Mr. Chair.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I would tend to support
17 the motion since you didn't make any excuses. It wasn't
18 in somebody else's backpack. It's refreshing to hear
19 somebody say, "I did it, I'm done, and I'm trying to
20 move on." Thank you.

21 And with that, all in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
24 Congratulations.

25 MS. BROWN: Thank you.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Peter Wiltz?

3 MR. INGRAM: Not in the south.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are you Mr. Wiltz?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: You were sworn earlier?

6 MR. WILTZ: No, sir.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Could you swear
8 Mr. Wiltz in, please.

9 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes. Do you swear that the
10 testimony you give today will be the truth, the whole
11 truth, and nothing but the truth?

12 MR. WILTZ: Yes.

13 MS. BORDELOVE: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's the investigator on
15 the case?

16 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do you want to
18 tell us about it?

19 MS. DONALD: Mr. Wiltz was denied for a 1969
20 felony and a 1976 firearm conviction. In 1969, the
21 felony conviction was for unlawful sale of marijuana,
22 which he served five years in prison.

23 Then, in 1976, Mr. Wiltz was convicted of
24 possession of a firearm, where he was placed on
25 probation for two years, then honorably discharged.

1 Mr. Wiltz could not recall if it was a felony or
2 misdemeanor, and his fingerprints did not indicate the
3 severity, either.

4 Mr. Wiltz did list both of those arrests on his
5 application, and he has been forthcoming with the
6 information when asked. In speaking with him about why
7 he was getting a work card, he stated he'd been working
8 for ESI Security, license number 700, here and there
9 picking up shifts as a security officer, and he'd been
10 doing on-the-job training with ESI, other ESI Security
11 officers while he waited for his work card to be
12 approved, then ESI would give him a black shirt.

13 When I initially contacted Mr. Wiltz, I also
14 noticed his email address was payroll@esi-security.us.
15 He indicated he did not have an email, so the company
16 used their email. I explained to Mr. Wiltz that he is
17 not allowed to work for a company without an active work
18 card, and he regretfully understood.

19 I have since emailed ESI Security, license
20 number 700, notifying them he is not eligible for a work
21 card at this time.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Thank
23 you.

24 Mr. Wiltz, can you tell us a little something
25 about the criminal charges, even though they're quite

1 some time ago?

2 MR. WILTZ: Yeah, well, in '69 I was a
3 teenager, and I was running with the wrong people, got
4 caught up. On the gun possession, it was not on my
5 person. It was in my trunk of my car. They searched
6 the car. It was in the trunk.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And nothing since
8 then?

9 MR. WILTZ: Sir, I've been clean. I worked for
10 the Airport Authority of Washoe County for 20 years.
11 I've been trained in suspicious packages and recognizing
12 people that might be a harm to people and the
13 passengers.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

15 MR. WILTZ: And I did that for 20 years.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 MR. WILTZ: I retired.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How long ago was that,
19 when did you retire?

20 MR. WILTZ: I retired in '04. I started in
21 '84, and I retired in '04.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you're thinking of
23 security work in your --

24 MR. WILTZ: Well, related to what I was doing
25 at the airport, I thought I could fit in with the

1 security.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Right.

3 MR. WILTZ: Because I was trained to watch for
4 certain things.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So how long were
6 you working security before they sent your card to --

7 MR. WILTZ: I just --

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You could start?

9 MR. WILTZ: Yeah.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
11 questions?

12 Okay. Entertain a motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'd move that Peter Wiltz
16 be -- that the denial be reversed and that he be issued
17 a registration card.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
19 have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any Board
22 comment or question on the motion?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman, my
24 rationale on this motion is that Mr. Wiltz, the last
25 encounter that we know of was 1976. I think, there's

1 been a lot of time and distance between that. And,
2 obviously, he's had other viable jobs. So, I think,
3 it's appropriate.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other comments
5 or questions on the motion?

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I think, I think,
7 only Mr. Ingram from the PI Board was around in '76.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor of the
9 motion, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, "no."
12 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

13 MR. WILTZ: Thank you, sir. Thank you, Board.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

15 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All security was done on
16 horseback back then.

17 MR. INGRAM: Yeah, exactly. We threw rocks.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sarah Schayes, number 53.
19 Sarah Schayes?

20 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, for the record,
21 Ms. Schayes was unable to return after the break and has
22 requested that we postpone her appeal till March.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Item 54,
24 Steven McGinnis.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's here. It's

1 McGinnies, right?

2 MR. MCGINNIES: It's "McGinnis"; it was spelled
3 wrong on my birth certificate, and we just ran with it.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll have a motion for
5 number 53. Go ahead.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, at the request
7 of --

8 MS. BORDELOVE: You don't need a motion to
9 postpone it, no.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: But --

11 MS. BORDELOVE: You don't need a motion to
12 postpone it.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So --

14 MS. BORDELOVE: You can, though.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. All right. No, I
16 was just curious. Typically, if we don't hear them, or
17 someone doesn't appear, then it's a default denial.
18 Correct? So the denial would remain in place, correct?

19 MS. BORDELOVE: Right. And she's requested. I
20 mean you can have a motion on the continuance. But I
21 have a feeling that had she requested that prior to this
22 agenda being issued, she would have been put on a later
23 agenda as well.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. No, I'm good.

25 MS. BORDELOVE: I don't know that a motion is

1 required.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Counsel, if you're good,
3 I'm good.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Who's the
5 investigator on Mr. McGinnies?

6 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
7 applicant was denied for a 2010 misdemeanor conviction
8 for carrying a loaded firearm in public out of
9 California. He received three years of informal
10 probation. It also has been dismissed under 1203.4.
11 The applicant disclosed the conviction on his
12 application, provided the 1203.4 documents, as well as
13 have showing us his California registered work card to
14 work in security, as well as the armed card to perform
15 duties armed in California as well.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. McGinnies, can you
17 tell us something about, anything about the charge?

18 MR. MCGINNIES: Yes, sir. On that night, I was
19 going to a gun range. I just purchased a rifle two
20 weeks before. I had my duty carry-on in the car with
21 me, also. I went to my brother's house. We were
22 supposed to go to the range. I let him -- I won't say
23 play with it. I let him check it out. He checked it
24 out, put it back in the car. I let him put it back in
25 the car, and I failed to clear the firearm myself. You

1 know, so there one left in the chamber.

2 I got pulled over by LAPD for a U-turn in a
3 no U-turn, unsafe U-turn. And I told him that I had my
4 firearms on me. He checked one. One was empty. In
5 California, you can't have a loaded firearm. The rifle,
6 the magazine was out. Everything was separated. But
7 there was one round left in the chamber. And he charged
8 me with carrying a loaded firearm in a public vehicle.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And did you have
10 any jail or anything?

11 MR. MCGINNIES: Well, I think, they credited me
12 three days jail time. I was only there for a couple
13 hours. I bailed out. I got three years summary
14 probation, a couple fines, which is all paid. And, I
15 think, I did, I think, 18 hours of community service.
16 And everything's all good.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
18 questions?

19 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: When did you complete
22 your probation?

23 MR. MCGINNIES: I want to say two thousand, in
24 the two thousand. I'm going to give it 2014, April.

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
2 questions?

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, Mr. Chair, it's Ray
4 Flynn.

5 So what are you doing these days for
6 employment, and how long?

7 MR. MCGINNIES: I work security. I've been
8 with Allied Universal. Which we just turned to Allied.
9 It was Universal Protection. I've been there 13 years,
10 13 years, I've been at the same post for 12 years. I
11 work 88 hours a week. I work for Platinum Security.
12 That's armed alarm response. For Billet. Show, First
13 Prince of Bell Air, I work in those homes. It's
14 dangerous work at night. I work graveyard there. And I
15 work day at Fashion Institute of Design Merchandisers.
16 So.

17 I have all my qualifications, arm permit, guard
18 card, CPR first aid, baton, pepper spray, everything. I
19 haven't been in trouble since. So.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. So you're working
21 directly for the companies that own those places?

22 MR. MCGINNIES: I work for companies. We're --

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Oh, it's in California?

24 MR. MCGINNIES: Yeah.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: All right.

1 MR. MCGINNIES: I'm planning to move to Nevada
2 in February.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I appreciate your
4 pronouncing it correctly, too.

5 MR. MCGINNIES: Yeah.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'm good, Mr. Chair.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Anybody else?
8 Entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, it's Ray Flynn. I
10 make a motion that we approve Mr. McGinnies's appeal
11 based on seven years since the charge, the background of
12 why the charge occurred, his career in security, and his
13 training, and the fact that he is a security
14 professional coming from another state.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
16 have a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I --

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: A motion and a second.
20 Any further Board comment on the motion?

21 All in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

24 MR. MCGINNIES: Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It carries unanimous.

1 Congratulations.

2 MR. MCGINNIES: Thank you. I appreciate it.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

4 MR. MCGINNIES: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: William R. Conrad, or
6 Conard.

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's here. He's here.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon.

9 MR. CONARD: Good afternoon.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's the investigator on
11 Mr. Conard?

12 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Go ahead, please.

14 MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Conard was denied for a 1973
15 felony arrest for breaking and entering out of Indiana.
16 The gentleman did not disclose the arrest. The
17 disposition says one to five years prison. The
18 applicant was initially made provisional. And the
19 felony arrest was found on the seeds of the fingerprint
20 report.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Conard, can you tell
22 us why you didn't disclose the charge?

23 MR. CONARD: Well, first of all, I'd like to
24 apologize to the Board for not disclosing that. It just
25 seemed -- I don't have any excuse for not disclosing it.

1 It's just that I've done so well since then, it's just
2 like not part of my life anymore. And, once again, I
3 apologize for that.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us the
5 circumstances surrounding what occurred on that case?

6 MR. CONARD: Well, I was 19 years old. And I
7 was brought up in a bad area in Indiana. And that's --
8 I'm not blaming the people I hang around with. But I
9 was hanging around with a bunch of bad kids, and we
10 broke into a couple houses. And that was the end of it.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What have you been doing
12 with yourself since then?

13 MR. CONARD: I successfully became a state
14 contractor in California for laying floors. And I laid
15 floors for over 30 some years. I just quit in March
16 because I had to have a knee replacement. So. And I've
17 successfully trained a number of people in doing floor
18 covering. So I've done pretty well since then.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
20 questions?

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Just to comment,
22 Mr. Ingram was not working in security in 1973.

23 (Laughter.)

24 MR. INGRAM: That's two.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

1 Entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
3 we overturn the denial based upon time and distance of
4 all of this and no issues since then.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Do we
6 have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Ray Flynn seconds.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board discussion,
9 comment on the motion?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Conard, I would
13 assume that you'll -- any applications you do, you will
14 disclose?

15 MR. CONARD: Absolutely. I've learned my
16 lesson. I would never do that again. I know that just
17 because it's so far back in my life, it means that it's
18 still there.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: It's still there. Thank
20 you.

21 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

23 All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

1 Congratulations.

2 MR. CONARD: Thank you.

3 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Good luck to you.

4 MR. CONARD: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is that your fan club
6 back there?

7 MR. CONARD: Huh?

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Is that your fan club?

9 MR. CONARD: Yeah.

10 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Oh, okay.

11 WOMAN IN LAS VEGAS: I came earlier.

12 MR. CONARD: Thanks a lot.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 56, William Adams.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Not here.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We have one person in the
17 room, Mr. Chair.

18 Your name, ma'am?

19 MS. SCHMITT: Elise Schmitt. I'm here for
20 public comments.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Oh, you're here for public
22 comment.

23 All right. We don't have any other applicants
24 in the room, Mr. Chair. We do have a citizen here for
25 public comment.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Would you like to make a
2 public comment now or wait till the conclusion of the
3 meeting?

4 MS. SCHMITT: Whatever works for you guys.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: He's asking what works for
6 you.

7 MS. SCHMITT: I'll go now.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: She'll go now.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

10 MR. INGRAM: If you'll just state your name and
11 the spelling for the record.

12 MS. SCHMITT: It's Elise Schmitt, E-L-I-S-E,
13 S-C-H-M, like Mary, I, double T, as in Tom, no D.

14 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The floor is yours.

16 MS. SCHMITT: Thank you.

17 I'm actually here because of something that
18 happened to me recently. And it came to my attention
19 that there is no law on the books or nothing, any kind
20 of ruling really in Nevada in regard to GPS tracking
21 being put on vehicles by private investigators.

22 And so I want to bring this to your attention.
23 This happened to me, where a private investigator put a
24 GPS tracking device on my vehicle on behest of his
25 client, who is of no relation to me, but is my friend's

1 ex-husband, who was trying to track his ex-wife, who I
2 loaned this vehicle to.

3 So in looking into this -- the police have it.
4 It's in CSI. They're waiting for fingerprints, all of
5 this type of thing. So, obviously, they think it's an
6 issue. But my understanding is there's nothing on the
7 books in order for like me to go and say to the private
8 investigator, "Hey, you shouldn't have done this. You
9 did the wrong thing in putting this on a private
10 citizen's car that had nothing to do with this other
11 person."

12 And so there are firms -- I've looked into
13 this -- advertising for people that they will do this.
14 They don't ask about any relationship. There's no
15 ownership relationship required in order for them to do
16 this. This is, from what I understand, a -- you know,
17 the Supreme Court has come down and said that law
18 enforcement has to have a warrant in order for them to
19 put one on. So why don't private investigators have to
20 have some sort of something to answer to in order to be
21 doing this type of thing?

22 They don't check relationship ownership. You
23 know, other states are now saying that ownership has --
24 there has to be an ownership relationship in order to
25 put this on. Nevada doesn't have this.

1 So it just looks to me -- first of all, it's a
2 Fourth Amendment violation, according to the Supreme
3 Court.

4 Secondly, this really leaves a big opening and
5 opens the door for stalking, which wasn't, isn't --
6 well, it's borderline on what's going on with my
7 situation with my friend. But it opens the door, if you
8 look at it overall, that this could allow people to
9 follow people that they shouldn't be.

10 And so I just really feel like, also, it puts
11 the investigator at risk for them being -- if they're
12 not being accountable and having rules to follow in
13 regard to this, aren't they then kind of responsible if
14 somebody does use them to stalk someone and do someone
15 some harm later on?

16 I think, this could have many, many different
17 issues long-term if something isn't put on the books in
18 regard to this type of thing.

19 I think, they should have to check that there's
20 legal ownership to a vehicle. I think, it should be
21 proved to them before they go ahead and are able to do
22 this.

23 I think, also, if they are saying, like, okay,
24 "It's a divorce case. I want you to follow my wife," I
25 think, they should be required to make sure that that's

1 actually true, and that, for example, if they're hired
2 in April, and the guy calls them back in October to put
3 a device on, that maybe they should check again and see.
4 Because in this particular case, they were divorced. So
5 even, you know, he's tracking somebody who he doesn't
6 even have a relationship with anymore. Okay. So, and
7 you can just see where this could just pile up in many
8 different ways.

9 And the other thing, too, is with these
10 advertisements that I've seen on different websites with
11 various companies, they literally advertise, "Hey, you
12 think your fiance might be cheating on you when he comes
13 to Las Vegas on business, we'll put a tracking device on
14 his vehicle, and you can find out where he's going."

15 Well, my goodness, doesn't that open the state
16 of Nevada up to being said like -- we've already got
17 what stays here, you know, what goes on here stays here,
18 and whatnot. And, I think, it's horrible, you know,
19 that people are cheating. But they're not even married
20 yet. They're advertising this. You know, they're not
21 even married. They don't even have a legal binding
22 relationship. And they're advertising. So, basically,
23 but they'll do this for anybody.

24 This particular company that did this to me, I
25 went on their website, and they have a little chat box,

1 and actually went on there, and I said -- because I
2 thought, "I'm going to see how this works." So this was
3 11:00 o'clock at night. And I saw a little box was
4 there, and I thought someone was on line, so I said,
5 "Hello." And someone came on line, Tom comes on the
6 line. And Tom says -- you know, I said, "I understand
7 that you rent GPS tracking devices. I'd like to learn
8 about renting one to track," and here's how I said it,
9 "my ex-husband."

10 And he asked, he did ask me if there was any
11 kind of a stalking order or any protection order in
12 place. I says, "No." I says, "But I want to find out
13 where he's going." And he says, "Oh, okay," and, you
14 know. And I says, "Well, let me ask you this." I says,
15 "He spends a lot of time with his girlfriend's car, in
16 his girlfriend's car. Can I put one on hers, too?"
17 "Well, sure."

18 And I'm going, "Hey, wait a minute. I've
19 already said I'm not married to this person. You're now
20 telling me you'll put one on his car and one on his
21 girlfriend's car, who I have no relationship with." And
22 I said, "How soon can I get one of these?" Because I
23 was wondering, do they check, do they check the DMV and
24 see if I own, if I have any relationship to this
25 vehicle. "I can put one on as soon as tonight if you

1 need it."

2 So you see where I'm looking at this, the big
3 overall picture is they shouldn't be able to track an
4 ex, anybody, they shouldn't be able to track somebody
5 that they don't have a relationship with. I mean this
6 would be like me saying to you, Mr. Flynn, "You know
7 what, hm, I saw him the other day. I wonder what he's
8 doing. I'm going to put a machine on his car, and I'm
9 going to follow him around."

10 Because that's -- basically, they're opening
11 the door for that sort of thing to happen. And with
12 stalking being such a huge problem in this country, on
13 many different levels, I think, we're opening ourselves
14 up as a state to a lot of liability here in the long
15 term.

16 So I just think it's something that I would
17 like to ask for you guys to put on the books, for you
18 guys to consider and talk about, and figure out and get
19 this out there, that this doesn't happen to someone
20 else.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right.

22 MS. SCHMITT: So that's what I have to say
23 today.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you very much.

25 MS. SCHMITT: Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can we go back to
2 items that we trailed today? Anybody got a list of
3 those?

4 MR. INGRAM: The first item we trailed was
5 agenda item number six, Invictus International Holdings,
6 LLC, and member approval for Stephen Krueger. He's
7 still not present.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, since it's a
9 situation where sometimes these folks don't attend if
10 they're in that consent area, I think I'll just go ahead
11 and represent why I wanted to pull it, if I can find it
12 here.

13 On Mr. Krueger's application, it indicated that
14 he had previously applied with the PILB in October of
15 2016. But in the backup material, I didn't see any
16 reference to the status of that application, whether
17 that was for licensing, or for what purpose, we had
18 anything to do with him, other than I did notice he had
19 a work card as a registered employee. But the dates
20 didn't correspond with his answer on the application.
21 That was the first item.

22 The second item -- I got to get back to my
23 thought process here.

24 He indicates that in the application that he --
25 his percentage amount of the stock owned in the

1 corporation was five percent and that -- but then, in
2 looking at the Secretary of State's files, there -- and
3 I'm trying to get back to it, wherever it was.

4 There are two other corporate officers, one of
5 which is an actual other entity, which is also owned by
6 another separate corporation. So from the appearances,
7 we have the original licensee, who's a corporate
8 officer, this gentleman who's making application with a
9 five percent ownership, and then I wasn't able to locate
10 this other company as a principal in the business. And
11 that caught me a little strange to have one of the
12 limited partners actually end up being another
13 corporation.

14 So if you can give me a second, I'll look it up
15 so I'm not talking in circles, or anymore than I usually
16 do anyway.

17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

19 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You know, as far as I'm
20 concerned, you've given me more than sufficient reason
21 to postpone this to the next meeting. I'll make a
22 motion on that. We've done this before when we've had
23 questions and they've chosen not to show. So.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It's the pleasure of the
25 Board. I just don't feel comfortable moving forward

1 without having some answers.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No problem. If it's okay
3 with you, I'll make a motion that we postpone this to
4 our next meeting, and have staff advise the person that
5 they weren't here and we had questions.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do we have a
7 second?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
10 second. Any Board discussion on the motion?

11 All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed?

14 Carries unanimous.

15 Next?

16 MR. INGRAM: The next item on the agenda that
17 was trailed was item number nine, David A. Stewart,
18 change in licensing status.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So that was another issue
20 that I had with regard to the Secretary of State's
21 records indicates that there are other officers involved
22 in, or officers involved in the corporation who
23 apparently are not subject to or haven't been subject to
24 licensure to this point.

25 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I'll make a motion we

1 postpone and have staff contact the applicant to let
2 them know we have questions.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Can we discuss the
6 motion?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any discussion on the
8 motion?

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah. So you're saying
10 that there are other members, corporate members of Kolb,
11 Stewart & Associates that are listed in the corporate
12 documents, but they've not been -- because this, this
13 company has a license. Have we verified that, on the
14 corporate?

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, I just looked it
16 up, and that's one of the things that raised my --

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, but we know that they
18 have -- because, I guess, where I'm kind of confused,
19 Kolb, Stewart & Associates already has a license.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Correct.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So do we know that the
22 corporate officers that are listed in the state,
23 Secretary of State's office have not yet been approved
24 by this Board?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I couldn't find it.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Or as corporate officers
2 in our database?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Right.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And I think that
6 they're -- one of them is probably a family member. And
7 the other one, I don't know the relationship. But
8 according to the corporate records on file in Nevada,
9 other people are there that haven't been before.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now, it raises a question
12 for me, because I differentiate between directors and
13 officers. You know, so it's kind of like if you're an
14 officer of the corporation, you're subject to be
15 licensed.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Of course.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: If you're just a director
18 or you don't three percent share or something, that's a
19 debatable issue. You know, it would be like licensing a
20 public company, we're not going to license everybody who
21 owns stock in a public company. But, clearly, officers
22 of the corporate entity, we think, would need to be
23 licensed.

24 I don't know that there's any skulduggery. I
25 just think that we want to be paying attention, well, we

1 put the president up for licensure when there's actually
2 a secretary and a treasurer and everybody else.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Got it.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other
5 questions?

6 All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

9 All right. Carries unanimous.

10 Next?

11 MR. INGRAM: The next item trailed was item
12 number 16, Lowers Risk Group, LLC.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That was the same
14 circumstance, I believe. Let me look real quick.

15 I believe, we have one of the -- one, I think,
16 David Lowers is the licensee. But in the corporate
17 records, we have a Don and a Matthew as well, but I
18 didn't notice any record that they'd ever gone before
19 the Board.

20 MR. INGRAM: Those would be members or
21 corporate officers?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I got David Lowers as a
23 managing member, Don M. Lowers as a managing member, and
24 Matthew Lowers as a managing member.

25 So we could get a motion to let them know to

1 come and see us.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll go ahead and make a
5 motion that we move this item to our next regularly
6 scheduled meeting.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
10 second. Any Board discussion on the motion?

11 All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 Any opposed, say "no."

14 Carries unanimous.

15 Next?

16 MR. INGRAM: Okay. The next item on the agenda
17 that was trailed is item number 19, Donan Engineering
18 Company, Jack Fetrow.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll look it up real
20 quick.

21 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, Ray Flynn.
22 I'll make a motion that we postpone. This is a
23 brand-new machine. I'd like to see this person and have
24 them available to answer questions.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
3 second. Any comments or question on the motion?

4 All in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Carries unanimous.

8 Next?

9 MR. INGRAM: That takes us to the registration
10 appeals. The registration appeals I show that were
11 trailed were item number 37, item number 46, item number
12 48, and item number 49 and item number 56.

13 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I'll entertain
14 a motion, if it's okay with you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: That on today's agenda
17 items number 37, 46, 48, 49 and 56, that we support
18 staff's decision and deny the appeals.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do we have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
22 and a second. Any Board discussion or question on the
23 motion?

24 All in favor, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 Any opposed, say "no."

2 Carries unanimous.

3 Next? That moves us to item 57, correct?

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

5 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Ingram.

7 MR. INGRAM: So item number 57 on the agenda, I
8 provided to the Board the Senate Bill 69 as enrolled in
9 its entirety, and then also provided proposed language
10 for Nevada Administrative Code to set up the procedure
11 for us to be compliant with the portion of Senate
12 Bill 69 that takes effect February of 2018. So this is
13 the only opportunity we really have to meet to discuss
14 the language.

15 I've provided it to you in your documents. But
16 if anybody needs a hard copy to look at right now, I do
17 have some extra copies here. And, I believe, we have
18 them in the north. Does anybody need that?

19 Okay. So Senate Bill 69 put in provisions
20 during its -- as it morphed through the Legislature.
21 The bill started off as one thing and ended up capturing
22 a whole bunch of different things.

23 And, basically, the thing that we need to
24 determine today is the language for us to consider
25 licensure by endorsement. And license by endorsement is

1 another way of saying reciprocity with other states.

2 And in the supplement that I gave you that's in
3 the blue underlined, basically, what I did is I
4 extracted the information directly from the bill, as
5 written, and made it specific to our Board at direction
6 of legal counsel, Sarah Bradley, in the north, who's
7 working on all of this language or for all of the other
8 boards and commissions, because it affects all of them.

9 The items that I wanted to point out
10 specifically that there's some questions or concern on
11 my part, that you may want to discuss and amend what
12 I've provided, on that handout that's in the blue
13 underline, under section 1 and subsection (b), I wanted
14 to point out here, it says that the Board can license by
15 endorsement if an individual possesses qualifications
16 that are substantially similar to the qualifications
17 required for issuance of a license to engage in that
18 occupation or profession in this state.

19 The reason I wanted to point that out is many
20 states consider their work card or registered employees
21 to be licensed. And so what we have to do as a board is
22 we constantly are interacting with those other states to
23 find out what license means in their state. So the
24 example here would be, is if somebody has a license to
25 do security work in California or Utah, we would have to

1 find out whether it really is a true license or whether
2 it's similar to our registered work card. Nine times
3 out of ten, it is equivalent to our work card.

4 So just because they're licensed in another
5 state doesn't mean we have to consider that. It has to
6 be substantially similar.

7 So that's the first item I wanted to point out
8 that gives us a protection under this Nevada
9 Administrative Code proposal.

10 Under section 2(g), it also says that for them
11 to engage in the occupation in the state, that such a
12 person has to pay any applicable fees for the issuance
13 of a license that are otherwise required for a natural
14 person to obtain a license in this state. So that would
15 be their background investigation fees.

16 About the only thing that I don't see falling
17 under this umbrella would be they would not be required
18 to take the exam. But all the other fees that are
19 assessed with backgrounds, including fingerprints and
20 things of that nature, they would still have to pay to
21 the state. It's just our time frame's going to be a
22 little bit shorter.

23 If you go down to the second to the last
24 sentence there, under 2(g), you'll see that it says that
25 they have to have had their fingerprints done and signed

1 a waiver. But at the very last, it says "or proof that
2 the applicant has previously passed a comparable
3 criminal background check." And that is to be
4 understood as in their respective state.

5 I believe that the way it's written might be
6 too lenient. And I would ask that the Board consider
7 putting an amount of time that we would consider a
8 background investigation done in another state. A lot
9 can happen in a year, as far as arrests and convictions.
10 And I would just ask the Board to entertain setting up a
11 time frame there, before I move on.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you have something in
13 mind?

14 MR. INGRAM: Well, right now, with the
15 licensees, it says anything over six months we can
16 request it. So if they've had a background check done
17 in another state that is the FBI criminal repository,
18 and they've been cleared in another state, I would
19 suggest no longer than six months.

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, I've got a
21 question.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

23 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So what you're saying is
24 that, let's say, a person is licensed in Utah.

25 MR. INGRAM: M-hm (affirmative).

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: And they've had their
2 licensing for two, three years, and they come here, that
3 we would require them to go through a background
4 investigation?

5 MR. INGRAM: Fingerprint investigation, I
6 would. The only exception, I would say, to that, and
7 it's hard to write in -- I'd have to defer to counsel.
8 There are some states that are currently enrolled in
9 what they call Rap Back. Rap Back is an almost
10 instantaneous feedback for states that have the
11 infrastructure for Rap Back to run in their states.
12 Once a background check is done on an individual, and
13 they're put into the Rap Back system, any person that's
14 run a background on that individual will get a lifetime
15 of updates if they've ever been arrested or convicted.

16 So, for instance, Florida just rolled out
17 Rap Back. So if we had an individual that applied here
18 in Nevada for licensure, and I can confirm through the
19 bureau there that they were run through the Rap Back
20 system and they're currently clear, I would say that
21 would be something that we could accept. However,
22 there's only about four states right now in the union
23 that utilize Rat Back.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. I have an
25 additional question. So a Nevada licensee that was

1 approved today, when's the next time they have to go
2 through a background check?

3 MR. INGRAM: At the time that the Board deems
4 that they need to be, if there is something that comes
5 up.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So we never require them
7 to go through an additional background check?

8 MR. INGRAM: That's correct. However, in the
9 proposal for the workshop coming up in January, that's
10 one of the items on the agenda, or one of the items in
11 the NRS and NAD -- NAC revisions -- can't talk today --
12 to have them go through background checks more
13 frequently. A lot of states have them do a background
14 check every year at renewal time. Other states say
15 every two years. Other states say every five years.

16 With us, we do the initial background. And if
17 we don't see it fit, if there's not a problem and they
18 never change their status, we don't do it again. If
19 there's a change of status for a licensee in Nevada, and
20 it's over -- 18? 15?

21 MS. IRIZARRY: 18.

22 MR. INGRAM: -- 18 months, we will run another
23 background check on them, on a change of status.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair, since
25 Mr. Ingram's asking for feedback, can I comment?

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: The initial intent of this
3 law was to protect spouses of the military if they get
4 transferred. And you're right, it turned into something
5 else. It's like making sausage.

6 I, you know, would not support that if it's
7 older than six months. I would support where we hold
8 it, similar to what we're proposing for our own. And
9 then you answered my question. So if we're going to do
10 it for Nevadans for 18 months, then I would say 18
11 months on this. Only because I'm familiar with the
12 initial intent of this law. And the initial intent of
13 this law is to protect the spouses of our military.

14 But that's just a comment. There's four other
15 people here.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you would propose that
17 to fit in where?

18 MR. INGRAM: Under section 2. And I'm sorry.
19 I said (g). It's (h). It's section (h). That we put
20 in there "or proof that the applicant has previously
21 passed a comparable criminal background check within the
22 last 18 months."

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board members have
24 any other comment?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Sounds reasonable to me.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I'm okay with it.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Anybody else?
3 We'll live with the Flynn magic language.

4 MR. INGRAM: Okay. So I'll make that
5 adjustment to add "within the last 18 months, semicolon,
6 and" and then, again, following up with section (i),
7 which is already a requirement.

8 Section 3 says "The board may require an
9 applicant for issuance of a license by endorsement to
10 engage in the occupation" -- "to engage in an occupation
11 or profession in this State submit with his or her
12 application" all the other things that we currently
13 have, proof satisfactory to the Board that they have at
14 least achieved a similar, passing score on a similar
15 exam or nationally recognized exam in the other state.

16 So if other states do not have that, they've
17 automatically worked in here on the Senate Bill that
18 they would have to test at that time if they're not
19 required in another state to test. And then complete
20 the requirements of an appropriate vocation or academics
21 or professional program of study, if required.

22 Number 3, under 3(a)(3), the very bottom there,
23 it says "Has engaged in the occupation or profession for
24 which the applicant is seeking a license by endorsement
25 in this State pursuant to the applicant's existing

1 licensure for the period of" -- and right here, it said
2 that the Board could determine the length of time. I
3 suggested five years preceding the date of the
4 application, because that would prove that they have the
5 minimum requirements established by the state, that, you
6 know, we require that they have them get five years or
7 10,000 hours. But it does say -- it doesn't say
8 directly preceding the date. It says preceding the
9 date. So that, again, we could ascertain that they did
10 meet the minimum qualifications for Nevada.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I don't see any problem
12 there.

13 MR. INGRAM: So far, so good?

14 Okay. On the second page, that would be 3. Or
15 I'm sorry, 3 was there. That would be item subsection
16 4(c), does say "Any other information required by the
17 board."

18 So this is when we're requesting supplemental
19 documents for our current licensees. Obviously, we're
20 going to be able to ask for the same documentation,
21 their filings from their respective states, for
22 domestic, or if they filed a Nevada foreign. So that
23 would cover us there as well.

24 Section 4 really comes into play here in that
25 it states that the Board, it says that we have 21 days,

1 business days to notify the applicant that we need more
2 information. Well, we're doing that more quickly than
3 that, so I don't think that's going to be any kind of an
4 issue.

5 And it says "Unless the board denies the
6 application for good cause" -- which Board staff does
7 not do. That would strictly be the Board -- "the board
8 shall approve the application and issue a license by
9 endorsement to engage in the occupation or profession to
10 the applicant not later than"; "Sixty days after
11 receiving the application."

12 So the good and bad about this, the 60 days
13 starts from the date we receive the individual
14 application. So it's going to be a constant 60 days
15 from every application we receive. Because right now,
16 we receive them, we get them set up for the next
17 quarterly Board meeting.

18 So this would be an ongoing, constant that the
19 Board has to make a decision within 60 days. But it
20 lays that out and says that, under section 5 that a
21 license by endorsement to engage in the occupation or
22 profession in this state issued pursuant to this section
23 may be issued at a meeting of the board or between its
24 meetings by the presiding member of the board, which
25 would be Board Chairman, and the Executive Director of

1 the Board, which would be myself. Such an action shall
2 be deemed to be an action of the board.

3 And I know this is something the Board really
4 didn't really want to consider at one time. However,
5 now that it's in statute, it's something we're going to
6 have to consider.

7 So that would mean Chairman Zane and myself,
8 within 60 days of every application that meets the
9 requirements under license of endorsement, that he and I
10 would have to at least meet telephonically to review all
11 of the documentation to make the decision. Or if it
12 falls within 60 days from the next quarterly scheduled
13 Board meeting, obviously, we would do it then. So
14 there's going to be some that won't be able to be
15 postponed to the next Board meeting and some that will.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: For legal counsel, would
17 there be an issue if there was a ratification process?

18 MS. BORDELOVE: I think, with the statute, I
19 mean there's no problem with the ratification, I don't
20 think, as long as the person could go to work within
21 that 60 days.

22 Basically, this part of the provisions that, I
23 think, were intended to protect military spouses, the
24 idea being, being moved so frequently, they can come
25 into the state, if they move with their military spouse,

1 and easily be able to get their required certifications
2 or licensure and go to work, and not have to wait a real
3 long time. So.

4 I'll have to look into it a little bit more,
5 but I don't initially see a problem with saying you guys
6 would meet and initially review it and, essentially,
7 similar to the provisional process, and then the Board
8 ratifies it at a later date, as long as they can go to
9 work as of that earlier date.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That would be my
11 preference.

12 MS. BORDELOVE: But I'll look into that a
13 little bit more, and I'll also talk with Sarah.

14 MR. INGRAM: Those were the items that I had
15 that were of a concern to me. Everything else pretty
16 much follows what we currently do anyway.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Couple questions,
18 Mr. Chair.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, go ahead.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Is there a national
21 clearinghouse that would set, basically, help in
22 identifying substantially similar licensed
23 investigators, or whatever?

24 MR. INGRAM: There's not a current one.
25 However, in my position as the president of that

1 international association of regulators, we met in
2 Chattanooga in November. There's a living breathing
3 document that we as an association are working on across
4 the United States to come up with that. We are about 70
5 percent complete at this time. And we've set a time
6 frame of six months to have that completed to be able to
7 disseminate to all 50 states, because they're dealing
8 with the exact same thing that we're dealing with in
9 Nevada. And that's something that an individual has
10 volunteered, once we get it up and running, that they're
11 going to keep it current. So that will be available to
12 us within the next six months.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That was question number
14 one.

15 Question number two, and that is, we meet four
16 times a year for two days. What if we met six times a
17 year for one day? That would then, all of our meetings
18 would fall within the 60-day period, for the most part.
19 That's for the Board to consider. I don't know that
20 that's necessary, but that's for the Board to consider.

21 How important do we -- how important does the
22 Board want to review applications?

23 So that's... And you answered the other
24 question, the other question I had, the third question
25 of the two. We do not do any kind of relicensure

1 background. Is that correct? You said that once
2 someone is issued, if there's no change of status or
3 anything, then it's a renewal that -- and there's no
4 additional background check. But you are working on
5 that for under our regulations, correct?

6 MR. INGRAM: That is correct, yes. As I said,
7 there's some states that require it every renewal.
8 There's other states that require it every two years,
9 some that require it every three. There's no really
10 consistent requirement that I'm aware of. And some
11 states do it one time and never do it again. So.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Does -- and my number
13 four question of my two, does this apply to registration
14 cards?

15 MR. INGRAM: No. Licensure is the way it's
16 written.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So it only applies
18 to those that license, not registration?

19 MS. BORDELOVE: Plus, I would say, applying for
20 new, even if they came up with registration, applying
21 for a new registration card happens in shorter amount
22 of time than that anyway.

23 MR. INGRAM: With the exception of an appeal.

24 MS. BORDELOVE: With the exception of an
25 appeal.

1 MR. INGRAM: But it says we -- but, see, we
2 have the ability to deny those and go to appeal. So I
3 don't think that it would violate any of those --

4 MS. BORDELOVE: Right.

5 MR. INGRAM: -- as written.

6 MS. BORDELOVE: That's what I was saying, I
7 don't think it would, either, because that process is
8 quicker.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. Good. Because we
10 had an example today where we have a registered in
11 California that came over, and he wasn't being -- you
12 know, he was denied in Nevada. And so, obviously, that
13 fits within the criteria a little bit. I just see that,
14 I was just questioning if that was an issue on this.

15 MR. INGRAM: You know, that sparks another
16 interesting point in that other states pass people on
17 their criminal background that we do not. So if we
18 don't require them to do a fingerprint in our state, we
19 could very possibly be in that same boat, to where
20 California gave them a license, that we would not give
21 them a license based on their criminal history
22 background.

23 So we may want to consider running fingerprints
24 on every single applicant. Not to throw a wrench in the
25 system, but.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Well, you just did.

2 MR. INGRAM: I did. You're welcome. That's my
3 number one payback to you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

5 MS. BORDELOVE: No.

6 MR. INGRAM: I don't have anything else, other
7 than I need to have a decision made that I can take
8 forward to LCB to show them that we have approved
9 something moving forward, so that we can start following
10 those guidelines effective February 1st.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well --

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Mr. Chair.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Go ahead.

14 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: On the first item, not the
15 wrench item, but the first item, I think, we should
16 continue to meet quarterly. And in these particular
17 situations, we can issue a provisional. Because I know
18 that the effort that not only staff has to go through,
19 but also getting an attorney here for our four meetings,
20 I wouldn't want to now schedule out to six.

21 So I have no problem with a provisional. We're
22 going to see them sooner or later. And I am fairly
23 confident that the other 49 states, they want to protect
24 the public, too, when they're doing their licensing,
25 although there are differences.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: We had a perfect example
4 of, I think, four applications today that the Board
5 wanted more information. And I don't know that the
6 statute allows for a provisional licensure. Either you
7 license or you don't.

8 I'm not advocating for six, for six meetings a
9 year. I'm just saying that I don't know that, if the
10 statute requires issuance within 60 days, with no -- and
11 we had probably three or four applicants today that have
12 been moved to the next meeting, that would, could
13 conceivably be automatic.

14 And so, I guess, that comes down to, do we want
15 to see the applications or don't we? Because it's going
16 to be -- I mean, I guess, that's what the question comes
17 down. And I'm not, I'm not looking for any additional
18 work for staff or for attorneys, or additional cost.
19 But it just comes down to does the Board want to look at
20 the applications or not?

21 Because, otherwise, we're going to be looking
22 at -- we're not going to be looking at the full picture.
23 We're not going to be looking at all applicants that
24 come over for endorsement. We're only going to be
25 looking at those that are within the 60-day window of

1 our meetings.

2 And so that's what I'm, that's what I'm looking
3 at. We're going to be -- there's going to be an
4 inconsistency. And, I think, that opens us up for some
5 issues. And once licensure is issued, we can't just say
6 that, uh, no, no, we're going to take this back, because
7 the Board made a different decision.

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: No, I see, I see your
9 point, Jim. I guess, the question would be -- and I
10 don't know. I don't have the answer, either. So I've
11 got staff and I've got the attorney. Can we issue
12 provisional licenses?

13 MS. BORDELOVE: And I'm not sure yet. I think,
14 that language would have to be put in this regulation
15 that the -- it would have to be edited, section 5 would
16 have to be edited to say, if the license, if it's in
17 between those meetings, then it would be, you know, the
18 Board and the executive -- or, sorry, the Executive
19 Director and the Chairman could issue as provisional and
20 then pursuant to a later approval by the Board.

21 And I'm not -- I need to reread the bill,
22 because, basically, SB 69 and what came out of it,
23 because I'm not sure, based on this language, that that
24 is something you could do. So I would have to get back
25 on that more officially. But the language, as written

1 in this regulation, would not allow for that. And so
2 what I need to look at is whether the regulation you
3 guys could create could allow for it.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What about the
5 possibility that --

6 MR. INGRAM: So we'll just have to schedule
7 another Board meeting before February 1, after review
8 with Sarah, you and I.

9 MS. BORDELOVE: Yeah.

10 MR. INGRAM: What we may have to do is --

11 MS. BORDELOVE: Telephonic Board meeting, as
12 long as you have -- somebody has to be somewhere with a
13 phone in public. But you can.

14 MR. INGRAM: Yeah.

15 MS. BORDELOVE: Open meeting law related. Just
16 the issue of if you guys want to have a meeting where
17 you discuss this language, that can happen as a
18 telephonic meeting as long as there is one location
19 within the state the public can attend. But it doesn't
20 have to be videoconferenced. It can just be here or at
21 your offices that there is an ability for the public to
22 attend and listen in.

23 MR. INGRAM: Because it sounds like we're going
24 to need to run this by Sarah Bradley, who is in charge
25 of this whole concept. They're dealing with a lot more

1 issues, obviously, with the medical boards and some of
2 the boards that, you know, require a higher level of
3 licensure. And we've just been given a strict deadline.

4 So we could always do that. We could always
5 schedule a special Board meeting where we just meet for
6 that, that item, you know, whether it's on the phone or
7 whether it's telephonic, or teleconferenced, or
8 whatever, to do that, to finalize it before the
9 February 1st, whatever the Board wishes.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, it is Nevada.
11 Deadlines are meant to be missed.

12 MS. BORDELOVE: I can say, just by briefly
13 looking back at SB 69, the language of subsection 5
14 right now does very closely mirror it. So most likely,
15 my answer is going to end up being that, no, you can't
16 do a provisional. If it's issued by the Chairman and
17 the Executive Director, it's issued as of that point.
18 But I'll still look into it and get a better answer.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And that's issued by the
20 two of them in concert, or one or the other?

21 MS. BORDELOVE: I think, you could require
22 it -- the language of SB 69 and both of these say
23 together. It says by the presiding member of the Board
24 and the Executive Director of the Board. SB 69 states
25 it may be issued at a meeting or between its meetings by

1 the presiding member of the regulatory body and the
2 executive head of the regulatory body. So, I think, it
3 would have to be a joint decision.

4 But that joint decision would not have to
5 happen in a public meeting, because one member doesn't
6 make a quorum, because Kevin's not a member.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So, I think, we're
8 hearing that we're going to go ahead, talk to Sarah,
9 get some definitive language of what other boards are
10 going to do. And when we get closer to a deadline,
11 we're going to have a telephonic meeting, talk about
12 something that meets the statute, and be done with it.

13 MR. INGRAM: Are all of the Board members
14 planning on attending the public workshop for
15 January 10th? Because if that's the case, we could
16 piggyback on that meeting as well.

17 As long as it's noticed, right?

18 MS. BORDELOVE: By workshop, you mean this one?

19 MR. INGRAM: No, workshop being the revisions
20 to NRS and NAC.

21 MS. BORDELOVE: We just can't adopt language in
22 the same day as.

23 MR. INGRAM: Oh, gotcha.

24 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: So we need two days.

25 MR. INGRAM: So that might work if --

1 (The Reporter indicated having difficulty
2 hearing.)

3 MS. BORDELOVE: I don't know if it matters what
4 I was stating, if there's some issues as to what can be
5 adopted. And I'll look back at 233B. But there's some
6 restrictions on what you can adopt in the same day that
7 you workshopped that language.

8 MR. INGRAM: What if we noticed it as a
9 separate meeting?

10 MS. BORDELOVE: And if you're at the point
11 where you're sending a draft to LCB, and you're not
12 finally adopting, that might be fine. I need to look.
13 And if it's different regulations you're talking about,
14 then.

15 MR. INGRAM: Right. We can do the workshop for
16 the regulations, and then we can notice this as a
17 separate Board meeting.

18 MS. BORDELOVE: But it's the same day.

19 MR. INGRAM: Yeah. The workshop notice would
20 be made.

21 MS. BORDELOVE: Yeah.

22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: This is Ray Flynn. I got
23 a question for the director. Are we going to be meeting
24 here for the workshop?

25 MR. INGRAM: Yes.

1 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. All right. My
2 calendar.

3 I'll be back, Mr. Chair, while they look. I'll
4 be gone for two minutes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

6 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: I got to put money in the
7 meter.

8 MR. INGRAM: There's no meters, right? That's
9 back twice.

10 Do you want to take a five- or 10-minute
11 off-the-record?

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Depends upon counsel, how
13 much time she needs.

14 MS. BORDELOVE: To look through this, five or
15 10 minutes should be okay to give you at least some
16 answer. I just have to find it in here.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. On a break, Kevin.
18 Thank you.

19 * * * * *

20 (A break was taken, 2:27 to 2:39 p.m.)

21 * * * * *

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Are we ready?

23 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Yes, sir.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We'll go back on
25 the record.

1 MS. BORDELOVE: Okay. I think, there is -- I
2 have a little bit of confusion, I guess, also, as to
3 what was being workshopped in January. So since this
4 regulation is not being workshopped in January, then
5 oral hearing on this regulation can happen in the same
6 day. It'll be noticed separately, but it can happen in
7 the same day.

8 The issue is you can't hold the oral hearing on
9 a regulation the same day that you workshop that
10 regulation, that those have to be held on separate days.
11 But since you're workshopping other regulations, and
12 this one's not being workshopped at that time, you're
13 okay to do it both in the same day in January.

14 MR. INGRAM: So we'll make sure that we notice
15 it separately, if that works for everybody.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Is it possible that we
18 could have the meeting right before the workshop, as far
19 as scheduling, schedule-wise?

20 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely, because I haven't --

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, I saw the workshop
22 being at 9:00. Maybe we could have our meeting at 9:00
23 and the workshop start at 10:00?

24 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. I haven't noticed the
25 workshops yet. That'll be going out in the next few

1 weeks.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

3 MR. INGRAM: So we can definitely do it first
4 thing. And that way, those of you that have to leave
5 can leave.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

7 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

9 MR. INGRAM: You're welcome.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

11 Are we done with 57? Is that enough
12 discussion?

13 MR. INGRAM: I believe so.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. 58, review and
15 discussion and decision on Executive Director's salary.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I asked the
17 Chairman to put this item on. We were caught a little
18 bit flat-footed last meeting on how to, you know, how to
19 really set the Executive Director's salary.

20 And I did some research over the last couple
21 months. And executive director salaries are all over
22 the place, but our Executive Director probably is one of
23 the lower paid executive directors in this system.

24 There is really no, what I could say,
25 apples-to-apples. And, I think, that's what Kevin was

1 trying to tell us last time. POST is about the closest,
2 and even POST is, you know, still apples and oranges.

3 So I don't know how to handle this. I probably
4 should have had it agendized differently. But I'd like
5 to move for reconsideration of our action the last --
6 and, counsel, help me out here. But I thought I would
7 move for reconsideration of our action at the last Board
8 meeting. And then I would be prepared to make a new
9 motion.

10 MS. BORDELOVE: That, I think, is fine. This
11 agenda item's listed as a decision and for possible
12 action. So you can take action on it with respect to
13 his salary.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So, I guess, my motion is
15 for reconsideration. Since this is the first meeting
16 after the last meeting where -- and I was one of the aye
17 votes for the last motion. So. So, I guess,
18 somebody --

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do we have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, Ray Flynn seconds.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any discussion on
22 the motion?

23 All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

1 Carries.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So continuing on with
3 this item, you know, I looked all over the place.
4 There's a couple things that I would like to include in
5 my motion. Number one, my motion would be to increase
6 the Executive Director's salary by nine percent. Which
7 would bring his salary closer to -- I believe, to POST.
8 And, again, POST and PILB are not, they're not exactly
9 the same, but they're -- I think, they're close enough.

10 So my motion is to increase the Executive
11 Director's salary by nine percent, which would bring it
12 pretty close to, I think, POST, if you do the math.

13 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Do I
15 have a second?

16 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

18 MR. INGRAM: As far as how that goes, you know,
19 I appreciate you guys considering this. I really do.
20 The increase that the Board gave me at the last Board
21 meeting was a \$5,000 increase that was already put into
22 effect. So Personnel won't be able to go back and take
23 that away and then change it.

24 So what you would have to consider would be an
25 increase over and above what was already given to me.

1 And a nine percent increase of what I was making before
2 would not be something that could be considered.

3 MS. BORDELOVE: Well, just a comment. You
4 could, you could do a percentage off of what it was
5 before, just --

6 MR. INGRAM: Get the difference.

7 MS. BORDELOVE: Subtract \$5,000 out, get the
8 difference.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: The previous was 84,
10 correct?

11 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Which one?

13 MR. INGRAM: 84.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So, then, I guess, my
15 motion would be to -- I think, parliamentary
16 procedure-wise, I'm not real good. But if we just
17 rescinded the action from last, then we just took away
18 his salary. So maybe we don't reconsider last meeting's
19 action and we just supplement.

20 Counsel, do you understand my logic process
21 there?

22 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes. The supplementing. When
23 you were, I guess, reopening discussion, I wouldn't
24 necessarily say it is as rescinding the prior.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

1 MS. BORDELOVE: So if you use that terminology
2 in your prior motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

4 MS. BORDELOVE: Since it has already gone in
5 effect, I can't recommend rescinding it, but.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So we reconsider
7 it. So we know there's already a \$5,000 in place. So
8 my motion, then, would be to amend that \$5,000 to an
9 additional \$2,560.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I'll second.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
13 second. Do we have any comments or questions on the
14 motion?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So the nine percent to
16 \$84,000 would have been \$7,560. Is that correct?
17 Somebody do the math, because I'm not -- obviously, I'm
18 not. But, I think, it would be \$7,560.

19 MS. BORDELOVE: My nine percent math came out
20 the same.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. So \$7,560. His
22 salary was already increased by \$5,000. And so that
23 would bring it up to the nine percent.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other comment on the
25 motion?

1 Any public comment?

2 All in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

5 And if you can't figure out how to get it to
6 Personnel, you don't deserve it. Thank you.

7 (Laughter.)

8 MR. INGRAM: Thank you very much. I really
9 appreciate that. Thank you, Board.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So may I continue on?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Sure.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: So I'm hoping that this
13 is still under the same agenda item. Or maybe we should
14 put it under the Board comment and future agenda items.
15 But it would seem to -- this is kind of an arbitrary
16 process that we're going through on making these
17 decisions. It would seem to me that it would be more --
18 a better process to have annual evaluation and salary
19 considerations.

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And have that in the --
22 excuse me -- in administrative code under the Executive
23 Director's piece. I think, that's where, where it would
24 fall.

25 That way, we're not, we're not doing this.

1 There's a logical process. There could be a -- not a
2 review committee, but there could be a subcommittee or
3 something appointed that would then be able to figure
4 this out and have a much more cohesive approach.

5 So I don't know if I can make a motion under
6 that, under this item or if we need to table it and
7 bring it back for the next, under, bring it back under
8 future agenda items.

9 Counsel, what's your sense?

10 MS. BORDELOVE: So you're wondering whether you
11 can -- what motion are you wanting to make?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I want to make a motion
13 that we, number one, establish an annual salary review
14 for the Executive Director. And that may only be able
15 to be articulated in the -- in regulation. And if
16 that's the case, then we need to work on a regulation
17 that would implement that.

18 So, I guess, I'm reaching out to you to help me
19 formulate whether I need to -- how I can put that in a
20 motion, or.

21 MS. BORDELOVE: I was going to say, if you want
22 it to be a requirement for future boards, I mean as this
23 board changes as members at times leave and we get new
24 members, then it would need to be put in regulation. If
25 it's a practice that you simply just want to do, such as

1 you can even put it under future agent items, say, "Put
2 this on agenda in a year, we want to talk about it
3 again," you could be as informal as that. But if you
4 would like it to be a requirement of the Board, then I
5 would recommend putting it into regulation, and you can
6 draft some language and have it heard in January.

7 It wouldn't take a motion necessarily on that.
8 The future agenda item, I don't know if it requires a
9 motion. But you suggest it. I think, in terms of
10 creating new regs, that's a little beyond the agenda
11 item that is there right now, but doesn't prevent you
12 from wanting to draft some stuff to be talked about
13 later. But I don't know that general Board consensus on
14 this could be had at this time.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. And just for my
16 comment purpose, I think, it needs to be memorialized.
17 And, I think, it needs to be memorialized in regulation.
18 Because it's not going to be Kevin forever. And, I
19 think, we need to have, in my opinion, I think, we need
20 to have something that's hard-and-fast, that it's -- we
21 just don't automatically start saying, "Hey, it's time
22 to give the Executive Director a raise." I think, it
23 needs to be a consistent and memorialized in the
24 regulation.

25 So I'll approach it under the future agenda

1 items.

2 MR. INGRAM: Would you like me to draft some
3 proposed language for you and incorporate that in the
4 January 10th workshop, where we're going to be reviewing
5 all of the laws and regs for amendments anyway? That
6 might be the most fitting place for it.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would, you know, I
8 would go with that. But I'm just one member of the
9 Board. There hasn't been a whole lot of discussion from
10 any of the other members.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, I don't have a
12 problem one way or the other, if you want to put it
13 together and propose it as a regulation. Because we can
14 beat the sausage to get it then.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yeah.

16 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah, I agree. This is
17 Ray Flynn. I agree with the Chair. Let's just make it
18 an agenda item. I've got my own thoughts. But this
19 ain't the time for the debate. The debate, the
20 discussion will be when it's an actual agenda item.

21 MS. BORDELOVE: You can -- I don't know. To
22 require it as an agenda item doesn't necessarily, but
23 it's going to direct Kevin to draft some language for
24 that agenda, that you might want to do it in a motion.
25 And that would be, I would think, under agenda item 59.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So we're done with
2 58. 59, Board comment, future agenda items.

3 I'd entertain a motion to direct the Executive
4 Director to put together some language to address a more
5 formalized payroll category for his position.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Sure, or salary, and a
7 salary review, put that in a salary review. I'll second
8 that motion.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Board comments regarding
10 the motion?

11 All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
14 Carries.

15 Additional Board comment, future agenda items?

16 MR. INGRAM: I'd like to make an announcement,
17 if I may.

18 We recently lost our investigator in our Carson
19 City office. Jason Woodruff was selected as a Gaming
20 agent. and, once again, they like our recruiting and
21 training practices, and they continue to steal from our
22 agency. So we're glad that he was promoted to that
23 position.

24 Chief Irizarry and myself will be traveling to
25 Carson City this Thursday. We have interviews set up.

1 And, hopefully, we can make a selection on Thursday to
2 move another individual forward for background. So
3 we're, realistically we're looking at probably a
4 February-March start date for a new investigator in the
5 north.

6 And so never a dull moment.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, just for general
8 discussion, I think, so that we don't get behind like we
9 have in the past, if it comes to the point where it
10 starts to affect how we're operating, we may very well
11 want to reach out to licensees that don't have a
12 conflict of interest and that can do it at a modified
13 rate, to assist in any place where the subjective items
14 can be dealt with, and then funneled back up to staff,
15 so that decisions are made, so that it would keep it
16 subjective as far as the content of an investigation or
17 whatnot.

18 I know that we don't want to travel down that
19 road unless we have to. But I also don't want to get
20 behind like we were before.

21 MR. INGRAM: I don't see that as an issue.
22 Being fully staffed in the south, I think, we'll be able
23 to handle any of the volume that comes through. If it
24 went beyond March, we'd be in trouble. But we always
25 entertain that idea of using outside resources as you've

1 directed. Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment?

3 Okay. Public comment. Any public comment in
4 the south?

5 MR. INGRAM: Anything else?

6 MS. SCHMITT: Just I'd be interested to see if
7 you guys are going to --

8 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You need to come up here.
9 We need to put you on record.

10 MS. SCHMITT: Okay.

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We have one.
12 You have to identify yourself.

13 MS. SCHMITT: Elise Schmitt, again,
14 S-C-H-M-I-T-T.

15 Just that I'd like to know if you guys will
16 take this matter under consideration and see, able to --
17 you know, can I look forward to coming back in three
18 months and seeing that you guys have talked about it?
19 I'm not sure how your process works. So.

20 MR. INGRAM: Any items that are brought forward
21 through public comment, Board staff will continue to
22 follow up on.

23 MS. SCHMITT: Okay.

24 MR. INGRAM: And if you would -- before you
25 leave, I'll give you one of my business cards, and we

1 can keep in touch with you.

2 MS. SCHMITT: Okay. I'd appreciate that.

3 Thank you.

4 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: We have no others,

6 Mr. Chair.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other public

8 comment in the north? Anybody want to speak? Yell.

9 Scream.

10 Okay. None here.

11 So until tomorrow, we're adjourned.

12 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: See you tomorrow.
