3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. We're
4 going to call the meeting -- what is this? -- the second
5 quarterly meeting of the Private Investigators Licensing
6 Board to order. Today is June 14, 2018.

7 Can we have roll call, please?

8 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.

9 Board Member Colbert?

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Here.

11 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nadeau?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Here.

13 MR. INGRAM: Chairman Zane?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Here.

15 MR. INGRAM: And, for the record, Board Member
16 Flynn and Board Member Nixon will not be present today.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Item number 2 is
18 public comment.

19 We have a public comment portion to the agenda
20 at the first and at the last of the meeting. Public
21 comment is generally any topic that you think the Board
22 needs to be aware of or you think would be of interest
23 to the industry. Whatever you think that we should have
24 information about, that's not on the agenda, we're
25 willing to take public comment now and, again, like I

1 said, at the end of the meeting.

2 Is there any public comment in the south, here
3 in Las Vegas?

4 Seeing none, is there any public comment in the
5 north?

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 3 is a review
9 of the current financial report.

10 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

6 All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

9 Carries unanimous.

10 Item number 5, all applicants and witnesses to
11 be sworn.

12 If you're here today to give testimony on any
13 issue, we require that that testimony be sworn and
14 subject to the penalty of perjury. So if you intend to
15 speak here, other than at the end of the meeting in
16 public comment, now would be a good time to en mass
17 stand, raise your right hand, be sworn in.

18 Counsel, please.

19 MS. BORDELOVE: Do you swear that the testimony
20 here today will be the truth, the whole truth, and
21 nothing but the truth?

22 (All applicants and witnesses present were
23 sworn.)

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you very much.

25 Item number 6, ADI Holdings, Inc., license

1 number 1728, is requesting a corporate name change.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If you'll accept a motion
5 for a block vote, I would submit.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman --

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second? Oh,
9 I'm sorry. Go ahead. I'm sorry.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I second.

11 Mr. Chairman, I would submit for a block vote
12 the following items: item 6, item 7, item 8, item 9,
13 item 10, item 11, item 12, item 13, item 14.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Colbert, do you
15 second for those particular items?

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, sir, I second that.

7 what these items include, for the record?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: If you feel, yeah, if
9 you'd like.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Item number 6 is under
11 Change of Licensing Status, ADT Holdings, Incorporated.
12 Under Corporate Officer, number 7 is LP Innovations,
13 Incorporated. Number 8, also under Corporate Officer,
14 is Sectran Security Incorporated. Under Change of
15 Licensing Status - Qualifying Agent, Existing
16 Corporation, number 9, Steven C. Thompson; number 10,
17 Reid A. Jones; number 11, Glenda Gray-Meyer. Under
18 Changes of Licensing Status - Qualifying Agent, New
19 Corp, number 12, Aluttiq & Technology, LLC; Lowers Risk,
20 or number 13 is Lowers Risk Group, LLC; number 14 is
21 Specialized Attorney Services, Incorporated.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, Mr. Nadeau.
23 Okay. Is there any public comment?

24 No public comment. Any Board comment on the
25 motion?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No, sir.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
4 to handle all in block fashion. Does that motion
5 include the approvals, Mr. Nadeau?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. So we've got
9 a motion to approve 6 through 14. All in favor, say
10 "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

13 Carries unanimous. So if you're here for 6
14 through 14, and you're all done, we appreciate you
15 sticking around and participating in your state
16 government, but we know you won't, so thank you for
17 coming.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would move approval on
21 item number 15. It's BaronHR Security, Incorporated.
22 I'd move for approval. I just had a disclosure that I
23 wanted to make in conjunction with this one.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Do we have a
25 second?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: On number 15?

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I'd like to -- no. I
4 want to find out a little bit about Mr. Morris and his
5 liens.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I'll withdraw my
7 motion.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Next
9 item on the agenda is number 15, BaronHR Security, Inc.
10 Is there somebody here for Baron?

11 Good morning.

12 MR. MORRIS: Good morning, Chairman, Board
13 members.

14 MR. CRATE: Good morning.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
16 yourselves for the record?

17 MR. CRATE: My name's Dan Crate. I'm the
18 current license holder, number 445. And Mr. Michael
19 Morris is the president and proposed corporate officer
20 for BaronHR Security.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 MR. MORRIS: Good morning.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

24 Okay. Mr. Colbert.

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes. Mr. Morris, can

1 you kind of give us a little status on your tax liens
2 and what was going on there?

3 MR. MORRIS: Yeah, most of those have been
4 finalized. And, also, there's arrangements, too, for
5 those final payments to be made. Those are deducted
6 from my weekly payroll check.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. And the
8 investigator working on this?

9 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Did you receive any
11 documentation of his compliance with these?

12 MR. MAXWELL: We did make contact with the
13 gentleman, and he has been notified and made the
14 payments on his things, sir.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: So all of these have
16 been pretty much put to rest?

17 MR. MAXWELL: As far as I'm aware, sir, yes.

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. All right. I
19 have no further, then.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I, too, would have, I
21 would have had some questions with regard to the
22 financial background had I not been familiar with your
23 qualifying agent, who would not tolerate any
24 impropriety. So.

25 So, Mr. Nadeau?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I move to
2 approve that BaronHR Security, Incorporated be granted a
3 new corporate private investigator and private patrol
4 license, Daniel D. Crate, license number 445 and 445A,
5 be granted his individual licenses be kept in abeyance
6 so that he may become the qualifying agent. Corporate
7 officer to be approved is Michael M. Morris. Subject to
8 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And, Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
12 second.

13 Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: As a disclosure,
15 Mr. Crate and I served on this Board for a number of
16 years together and, but we have no interest outside that
17 Board relationship. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 I, too, I didn't serve on the Board with
20 Mr. Crate, but I filled his vacancy and attempted to do
21 as good a job on this Board as he did, that I watched
22 him do. So. But I don't have any conflict of interest.

23 Any public comment, question regarding the
24 agenda item?

25 Any Board comment or question regarding the

1 motion?

2 All in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

5 Carries unanimous. Thank you.

6 MR. MORRIS: Thank you.

7 MR. CRATE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

8 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Colbert?

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes?

10 MR. INGRAM: The microphone that's closest to
11 the stenographer.

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

13 MR. INGRAM: The little flat microphone, can
14 you slide that down towards you a little bit? We're
15 getting a lot of feedback.

16 Thank you, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Item number 16,
18 Invictus International Holdings.

19 Come on forward, please. Good morning.

20 MR. KRUEGER: Mr. Chairman, Board members.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
22 yourself, please?

23 MR. KRUEGER: My name's Stephen Krueger, and I
24 work with Invictus International, LLC.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's see. We

1 carried this over. There was some questions, I believe,
2 as I recall, with regard to some corporate holdings
3 about the Secretary of State. Have you been in contact
4 with the staff about any of the questions that were
5 raised at the previous Board meeting?

6 MR. KRUEGER: Not myself personally, no, sir.
7 Matt Keotting is our qualified agent, and Michael
8 Dichiaro, which, unfortunately, they were delayed, and
9 they're on the way here now. So I haven't been
10 contacted about those questions.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Would you like to
12 push this until the other parties arrive?

13 MR. KRUEGER: Yes, sir. They're on their way
14 right now, if we can.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. No problem. Just
16 get ahold of us at a break.

17 MR. KRUEGER: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And let us know
19 everybody's here.

20 MR. KRUEGER: Okay. Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I'm sorry.
22 Board members, is that okay?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: It's okay with me. Thank
25 you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

2 Number 17, R & G Securities LLC.

3 Hi.

4 MS. BROWN: Good morning.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
6 yourself, please?

7 MS. BROWN: Hi. My name's Garnetta Brown.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. This item was also
9 on a previous Board agenda. I don't recollect why we
10 needed you to appear, but.

11 MR. INGRAM: She was not present at the last
12 Board meeting.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, okay. I would have
14 known that, but I'm having a little difficulty with my
15 old computer actually coming alive here.

16 So you were -- you have applied for a private
17 patrolman. Can you tell us a little bit about your
18 background and yourself and what you hope to do?

19 MS. BROWN: I'm a retired armed guard, North
20 Las Vegas. At this point, I'm trying to establish my
21 license for different entities, apartment complexes, the
22 Raiders stadium, providing transportation as well as
23 security.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who was the investigator
25 on this?

1 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Do you have any input?

3 MS. DONALD: No, everything was fine, no
4 issues.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So the only reason that
6 we set this over was because she didn't appear?

7 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
9 public comment with regard to agenda item number 17?

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: None up north.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Any Board
12 comment regarding agenda item number 17?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion. Yes,
15 sir.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I think, part
17 of the reason, because this was a new corporation and a
18 new applicant is part of the reason that it was held
19 over.

20 I would move to approve R & G Securities LLC,
21 doing business as R & G Securities, be granted a new
22 corporate private patrol license, Garnetta Brown be
23 granted her individual license and that it be placed in
24 abeyance so that she may become the qualifying agent.
25 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory

1 requirements.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
4 second. Any Board conversation or question regarding
5 the motion?

6 All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

9 Carries unanimous. Thank you.

10 MS. BROWN: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Just as a matter of
12 disclosure, we were running through these agenda items,
13 we have particular information from the staff and the
14 investigators that we've already been provided, that is
15 part of the background investigation. So on occasion
16 you'll wonder why somebody needed to make an appearance
17 here and sit here for about two minutes and then be done
18 with. Well, the biggest reason for that is so that
19 someone else that we might not have any information
20 about might have information about this person or this
21 company.

22 So if you all are sitting here, we've already
23 done our investigation, and we're not aware of something
24 that you might be aware of, because many of the people
25 sitting in here, that's your business, is being aware of

1 things. And so if it doesn't pop up in a background
2 investigation, and somebody shows up and says, "I know
3 this person to be not good for this industry," on
4 occasion it's good to have somebody pop up and say, "And
5 I can prove it."

6 So that's why you see this. And it's kind of
7 important for people to show up, especially in the
8 initial licensing phase, so that they may be heard.
9 Sometimes you don't even know that you're dealing with
10 the same person until you see that person, because
11 you've seen them in another particular setting in some
12 sort of vetting process, but you didn't know them.

13 So as part of the transparency of what goes on
14 here, it's like, you know, I mean we hate to think that
15 we missed something in an investigation, but there are
16 parameters to all investigations, as everybody's aware.
17 So if we miss it outside that parameter, it's pretty
18 helpful to say, "I know the guy to be a mass murderer,
19 but he just got away with it forever."

20 So that's why we're doing what we do, and
21 that's the reason that we do what we do. But,
22 ultimately, it's not fair to make somebody sit here and
23 plead their right to have a license with the Board. So
24 it's not as if we're going to sit here and pound you,
25 unless we have issues with the investigation that we've

1 conducted and we need answers, because we haven't gotten
2 them.

3 So just as a matter of clarity, that's why we
4 run through this stuff the way it's done.

5 Any questions?

6 Next item on the agenda is DTA K9 Services,
7 LLC. Somebody from DTA?

8 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, sir.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Introduce yourself,
10 please.

11 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, Dan Taylor with DTA K9.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

13 MR. TAYLOR: Good morning.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us a little
15 bit about yourself and what you hope to do?

16 MR. TAYLOR: So I am a current license holder
17 with DTA Security Services. And we're looking to expand
18 our services to our clients to now include canine
19 services. So we've applied for the canine license.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Investigator
21 Donald, this is yours?

22 MS. DONALD: Yes.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And we've jumped
24 through all of the hoops required for the canine
25 portion?

1 MS. DONALD: He did. Did wonderful with the
2 test.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Is there any
4 public comment or questions regarding agenda item number
5 18?

6 Any Board questions or comments regarding
7 number 18?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I believe that Mr. Taylor
11 wasn't able to appear at the last meeting, and that's
12 why this was carried over.

13 With that said, I'd move --

14 MR. TAYLOR: That is correct.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, that said, I'd
16 move to approve DTA K9 Services, LLC be granted a new
17 corporate canine handler license, D.E. Taylor, Jr. be
18 granted an individual license and that license be placed
19 in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.
20 Member to be approved is Kimberly A. Taylor. Subject to
21 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
24 and a second. Is there any Board comment or question on
25 the motion?

1 All in favor, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

4 It carries unanimous. Thank you.

5 MR. TAYLOR: Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: On to the category of

7 Private Investigator, number 19, AccuSource, Inc.?

8 Is there someone from AccuSource, Inc.? Lianne
9 Charton-Holder?

10 All right. How about we trail number 19.

11 Item number 20, Service Scouts, Inc.?

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: It's up north.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there somebody up
14 north for Service Scouts?

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Good morning.

17 MR. SMITH: Ladies and gentlemen, I'm James
18 Smith, representing Service Scouts, Incorporated.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Can you tell
20 us a little bit about the company and your background
21 and what you hope to do?

22 MR. SMITH: Yeah, certainly. I'm a former
23 grocery executive. I founded Service Scouts in 1996.
24 We've been performing secret shopping nationally except
25 in Nevada. And we are applying for a license so that we

1 can do secret shopping in the state of Nevada where I
2 live.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

4 MR. SMITH: The Oakland Raiders are a client,
5 and they're moving to Las Vegas, so they'd like me to
6 help them out.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
8 public comment with regard to item number 20, Service
9 Scouts, Inc.?

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: None north.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment
12 regarding number 20?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

16 So, basically, up until this time, any work
17 that you have done in Nevada you've done through
18 Spencer?

19 MR. SMITH: Yes.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 But I would -- it appears that you've done
23 something right, because especially in the mystery
24 shopper category somebody would have been squealing on
25 you by now.

1 MR. SMITH: It's been kind of nice, though,
2 I've been able to not work at home. So I've been
3 traveling. Yeah.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah. Well, if I lived
5 in Incline Village, I don't know if I'd want to travel.

6 MR. SMITH: Yeah. Thank you. It's a nice
7 place.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

9 MR. SMITH: Appreciate the opportunity to be
10 here.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 Any further Board conversation?

13 Entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
15 Service Scouts, Inc. be approved a new corporate private
16 investigator's license and that James N. Smith, Jr.,
17 that be given his private investigator's license and
18 that it be placed into abeyance so that he may become
19 the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be approved
20 are Mealani M. Smith. This is subject to all statutory
21 and regulatory requirements.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
24 second. Any Board comment or questions on the motion?

25 All in favor, say "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

3 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

4 MR. SMITH: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 21, Asset
6 Protection & Security Services? 21, Asset Protection &
7 Security Services, Jennifer Jonas?

8 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chairman?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes?

10 MR. SALADINO: They've been asked to postpone
11 it till September.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, okay.

13 I'd move that we postpone item number 21 at the
14 applicant's request until the September Board meeting.
15 Is there a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board questions or

20 All in favor, say "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
23 Carries unanimously.

24 Item number 22, The Staretz Group L.L.C.

25 MR. STARETZ: Yes.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Good morning.

2 MR. STARETZ: Good morning.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
4 yourself and give us at a little bit of background?

5 MR. STARETZ: Yes. I'm David Staretz. I'm a
6 retired law enforcement officer after 25 years. I'm
7 eager to start my own private investigative firm. And I
8 hope my actions make this Board proud.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. This was
10 Investigator Donald. I still don't have my computer up
11 and running, so. We're completed?

12 MS. DONALD: Yes, we are.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And no red flags?

14 MS. DONALD: None at all.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Is there any
16 public comment regarding the agenda item number 22?

17 Any Board comment regarding item number 22?

18 Entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
20 The Staretz Group L.L.C. be approved a new corporate
21 private investigator's license and that David M. Staretz
22 be approved his individual private license and that it
23 be placed into -- that his individual license be placed
24 into abeyance so that he may become the qualifying
25 agent. This is subject to all statutory and regulatory

1 requirements.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
4 second. Any Board comment or question regarding the
5 motion?

6 All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
9 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

10 MR. STARETZ: Thank you very much.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good luck.

12 Item number 23, 1st All File Recovery USA, Inc.
13 Good morning.

14 MR. BELKIN: Good morning. How are you?

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Can you introduce
16 yourself and give us a little bit of background?

17 MR. BELKIN: Sure. Dmitry Belkin. I'm
18 president and CEO of DigitalForensics.com and 1st All
19 File Recovery. I've been involved in digital forensics
20 for probably six to 10 years in some fashion. I'm here
21 to request licensing to be able to provided digital
22 forensic services in the state of Nevada.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
24 public comment regarding the item number 23?

25 MR. BELKIN: My wife's a current license holder

1 in Ohio as well.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No public comment?

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Board
5 comment, item number 23?

6 As I recall, going through your file, you did
7 have a citation for unlicensed activity that you
8 satisfied, correct?

9 MR. BELKIN: We did. We paid the fine. You
10 know, digital forensics is such a gray area in a lot of
11 states. Our pay-per-click ads were set up to target the
12 entire United States. And so, you know, unknowingly, we
13 were, obviously, offering our services in Nevada. We
14 were fined. We paid. And promptly after that, I
15 decided to make a decision to come here and get
16 licensing to make sure I'm in compliance.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And from the staff
18 perspective, there isn't any other indication of a
19 violation other than that rendition?

20 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. No, no
21 other red flags or anything. I spoke with Ohio as well,
22 and they were very forthcoming with information in
23 regards to his license and stuff, so.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

25 Any other Board comment or question?

1 Entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
3 1st All File Recovery USA, Incorporated, doing business
4 as Digital Forensics Corporation, be approved a new
5 corporate private investigator's license and that Dmitry
6 Belkin be granted an individual private investigator's
7 license, and that his individual license be placed into
8 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.
9 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
10 requirements.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
13 second. Is there any Board comment or question on the
14 motion?

15 All in favor, say "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
18 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

19 MR. BELKIN: Thank you, sir.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for being
21 legal.

22 MR. BELKIN: Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 24, The FYI
24 Alliance L.L.C.

25 MS. CURETON: Good morning.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. Could you
2 introduce yourself and give us a little bit of
3 background.

4 MS. CURETON: Yes. I'm Pam -- excuse me,
5 Pam Cureton, managing member of The FYI Alliance L.L.C.
6 I have more than 30 years of experience in law
7 enforcement and investigation in another state, and I'd
8 like to continue that similar work here in Nevada. So I
9 wanted to be credentialed.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public
11 comment regarding item number 24?

12 Any Board comment or question for the
13 applicant?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
17 The FYI Alliance L.L.C. be granted a new private
18 investigator license, Pamela D. Cureton be granted an
19 individual private investigator license and that that
20 license be placed in abeyance so that she may become the
21 qualifying agent. This is subject to all statutory and
22 regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
25 second. Is there any Board comment or questions

1 regarding the motion?

2 All in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

5 It carries unanimous. Congratulations.

6 MS. CURETON: Thank you very much.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for coming.

8 Item number 25, William Luttig, doing business
9 as Gray Area Investigations.

10 MR. LUTTIG: Good morning.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
12 you doing?

13 MR. LUTTIG: Hey, pretty good.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Can you give us a
15 little bit of background and tell us what you're hoping
16 to do?

17 MR. LUTTIG: I moved here in like 2001. And I
18 have been going through some executive protection
19 schools and stuff. But I switched to private
20 investigations about nine, nine years, 10 years ago,
21 with Jim Perry. And he kind of, I guess, semi-retired
22 maybe. He's just not doing a whole lot. And he
23 suggested, hey, you might as well just get your -- try
24 and get your own license, you know, and he'll help me
25 out. So that's where I'm at. And I'm really excited to

1 do this.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
3 public comment regarding item number 25?

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
6 regarding item number 25?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
11 William J. Luttig, dba Gray Area Investigations, be
12 approved an individual private investigator's license.
13 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
14 requirements.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
16 there a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
19 question on the motion?

20 All in favor, say "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
23 It carries unanimous. Congratulations.

24 MR. LUTTIG: Thank you. Thanks for your time.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 26, Dree

1 Cellemme ("Sel-man"), "Sel-mee"?

2 MS. CELLEMME: "Sel-eh-mee."

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Sel-eh-mee." Sorry
4 about that. This is Revelations Private Investigations.
5 Are you "Dree" or "Dray"?

6 MS. CELLEMME: "Dray."

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Dray." I'm sorry.
8 Okay. Can you give us a little bit of background and
9 tell us what you're hoping to do?

10 MS. CELLEMME: I'm a former special agent with
11 the FBI. I've been a licensed private investigator in
12 California since 2011. I specialize in indigent
13 criminal defense and spent five years with the federal
14 public defender down in San Diego. And now I'm coming
15 back to Las Vegas.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, if you've
17 been in California, it's nice to come back to Vegas.

18 MS. CELLEMME: Much bigger house for a lot less
19 money.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Any public
21 comment regarding item number 26?

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment
24 regarding item number 26?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any motion on item number
3 26?

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
5 Dree A. Cellemme, dba Revelations Private
6 Investigations, be approved an individual private
7 investigator's license. And this is subject to all
8 statutory and regulatory requirements.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
11 second. Any Board comment or question regarding the
12 motion?

13 All in favor, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
16 Carries unanimous. Thank you.

17 MS. CELLEMME: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Nichole Harrison, item
19 number 27?

20 Good morning. You're Nichole?

21 MS. HARRISON: Yes.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Can you give
23 us a little bit of background and tell us what you're
24 hoping to accomplish?

25 MS. HARRISON: Sure. My name is Nichole

1 Harrison. I've been doing investigations for big
2 corporations, as recently as my prior employer, with
3 MGM. I did security and theft. I'm currently employed
4 with Barclays as a vice president, doing investigations
5 there. I have a certified card examiner's and a
6 certified internal auditor's certification. And I'm
7 looking, I'm very eager to start my own business.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public
9 comment regarding item number 27?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment
12 regarding item number 27?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any motion?

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
17 that Nichole M. Harrison be approved an individual
18 private investigator's license. This is subject to all
19 statutory and regulatory requirements.

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
22 second. Any comments or questions with regard to the
23 motion?

24 All in favor, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 Any opposed, say "no."

2 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

3 MS. HARRISON: Thank you. I just have one
4 question. Who's Gisela?

5 MS. CORRAL: Here.

6 MS. HARRISON: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Now, do we need a
8 break, anybody need a break?

9 Yes, sir.

10 MR. SALADINO: Excuse me, Mr. Chair. In
11 regards to item 16, all members of Invictus
12 International have arrived.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. The pleasure of
14 the Board to go back with respect to item number 16?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Sure.

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Sure.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now, we -- previously,
18 you were here.

19 MR. KRUEGER: Yes.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'll need to get you
21 sworn, both of you sworn in, so that your testimony can
22 be taken under oath.

23 MR. KOETTING: Okay.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The counsel will, if
25 you'll raise your right hand.

1 MS. BORDELOVE: Raise your right hand, please.
2 Do you swear that the testimony you give today will be
3 the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

4 MR. DICHiarO: Yes.

5 MR. KOETTING: I do.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Can you
7 introduce yourselves respectively?

8 MR. KOETTING: Good morning, Mr. Chair. I'm
9 Matt Koetting. I'm the qualified agent for Invictus
10 International here this morning to appoint Steve Krueger
11 as a managing member as well. Mr. Dichiaro is MBI Asset
12 Management LP. He's one of the managing members of
13 that, which is also an invested owner of our company.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. And
15 let's see. Who is the investigator on this license?

16 MR. KOETTING: The fire patrol operator.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No, the investigator
18 instead.

19 MR. KOETTING: I'm sorry.

20 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I believe that
22 there was an issue about corporate holdings and how the
23 structure of the company was put together.

24 MR. KOETTING: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I think that there was

1 disclosure with regarding -- there was proper disclosure
2 regarding MBI. But then there was a question about
3 R and D, or RD Inc.

4 MR. DICHIARO: I believe, that's how it is. So
5 MBI is an asset. It's RD and MBI. It's all part of an
6 asset protection plan, which is put in place here in
7 Nevada to protect my assets. I am from New York. I was
8 in business for over 32 years there. I moved here in
9 2010. And, you know, we, basically, personally finance,
10 you know, various businesses. This one, I'm actually
11 not only financing them, I'm actively going to be
12 working with.

13 So MBI is, that's what it is, it's part of an
14 asset protection. The guy who's listed as the agent,
15 his name is Tom Hughes, he's the managing agent.
16 Because it wouldn't be much of an asset protection plan
17 if my name was listed all over the place.

18 So that's the whole thing.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, the reason it
20 caused a problem is because there is this licensing
21 process.

22 MR. DICHIARO: Okay.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We can't, within the
24 regulatory scheme, we -- it's our duty to make sure that
25 somebody who otherwise might not be entitled to

1 licensure --

2 MR. DICHiaro: Right.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- or qualified for
4 licensure be considered. And when an entire corporate
5 entity is listed somewhere in the birthright of the
6 entity who's attempting to get licensed, it causes a
7 particular question about how deep do we need to go to
8 find out whether or not Frank Sinatra owns it.

9 MR. DICHiaro: Okay. Well.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So we're here to
11 determine --

12 MR. DICHiaro: Yeah, yeah, maybe I could work
13 with the investigator. I hear you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I mean I understand the
15 asset protection. We've had billionaires here to get
16 licensed, and because they couldn't turn over their
17 financials to us, they elected to fly away somewhere
18 else. So it's --

19 MR. DICHiaro: Right. We're not adverse to
20 doing that. I'm also not adverse to telling that I, you
21 know, technically, am the owner. And, obviously, you
22 know, if I have to sign something saying that. And I'm
23 the only one that's going to be part of this company.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Based upon these
25 representations, does that give us enough clarity to --

1 about the structure of the company to conclude that we
2 know who the players are?

3 MR. MAXWELL: I would say so, sir, yeah.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
5 public comment regarding item number 16?

6 Any Board comment regarding item number 16?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm sorry. Either one of
10 you folks have anything else to add?

11 MR. KOETTING: No, Chair. If you need anything
12 else for additional notice, transparency, I'm happy to
13 do so. We've been working kind of hand-in-hand. Gisela
14 helped us a lot out with the license. But because of
15 the process of our growth, we're looking to launch
16 California and pass the launch in California right now
17 and acquiring another company, which has been moving
18 quite quickly with it. We also, unfortunately, lost our
19 accounting services early this year. As many of you may
20 know, Camden Security, they dumped us because a memo was
21 revealed.

22 So it slows downs a little bit, so that the
23 professional things have been handled for us. But
24 anything else we can do, we're happy to do so.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I've already asked for

1 public comment. There was none. Board comment?

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
6 Invictus International Holdings, LLC, doing business as
7 Invictus International and Invictus GS3, license number
8 2282B, be approved and that Stephen F. Krueger be
9 granted his license, and that this is subject to all
10 statutory and regulatory requirements.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second that.

12 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, for clarification on
13 the motion, Mr. Krueger is not seeking licensure. He's
14 only seeking member approval for the currently licensed
15 Invictus. So we would need to rephrase that motion a
16 little bit.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I'll rephrase that to
18 that Invictus International Holdings, LLC, doing
19 business as Invictus International and Invictus GS3,
20 license number 2282B, boy, be granted member approval
21 for Stephen F. Krueger. This is subject to all
22 statutory and regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second that amended
24 motion.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion

1 and a second. Board comment or discussion regarding the
2 motion?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Carries unanimous. Thank you for coming.

8 MR. DICHIARO: Thank you.

9 MR. KOETTING: Thank you.

10 MR. KRUEGER: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Now we're moving
12 back. Again, does anybody need a break?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No. Let's go ahead and
14 move on.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Category of
18 Private Patrolman, item number 28, Nakuuruq Solutions?

19 How did I do with that?

20 MR. MARTEN: Good.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. Okay. Can you
22 introduce yourself and tell us a little bit about what
23 you'd like to do and your background?

24 MR. MARTEN: You bet, yeah. I'm a retired
25 peace officer, 20 years of experience kind of at

1 supervision and management. I have 10 years in the
2 private investigations and private security industry,
3 with six of that in management. My current company,
4 Nakuuruq Solutions, is currently seeking federal
5 contract opportunities here in the state of Nevada.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you. Is
7 there any public comment regarding item number 28?

8 Any Board comment regarding item number 28?

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

10 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
13 Nakuuruq Solutions, LLC be granted a new corporate
14 private patrol license, Thomas B. Marten be granted an
15 individual private patrol license and that that license
16 be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
17 qualifying agent. Members to be approved are Anne M.
18 Donohue, Romina L. Fincher, John Lanzillo -- I guess,
19 it's Lanzillotta. Is that close? Okay.

20 MR. MARTEN: Close. Close, yes.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And Laura B. Mitchell.
22 Subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
25 second. Is there any Board comment or questions

1 regarding the motion?

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

7 Passes unanimous. Congratulations.

8 MR. MARTEN: Thank you very much.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

10 Number 29, Ahtna Professional Services, Inc.?

11 Did I say that right?

12 MR. MEYER: Yes, you did.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 MR. MEYER: Good morning.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. Can you

16 introduce yourself and give us a little bit of

17 background?

18 MR. MEYER: Yes, sir. I'm Brett Meyer. I'm

19 the security program manager with Ahtna Professional

20 Services. We provide armed and cleared work for the

21 federal government. And that's our interest in working

22 in Nevada.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Item number 29, is

24 there any public comment?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment
3 regarding item number 29?

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any motion?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
7 Ahtna Professional Services, Incorporated be granted a
8 new private patrol license, Brett A. Meyer be granted an
9 individual private patrol license, that that license be
10 placed into abeyance, his individual license be placed

1 Chambers. D stands for Demetrius.

2 I am inspired to start this security company to
3 better help educate and protect the communities that I
4 grew up in. I'm a Nevada -- I'm a Nevada, Las Vegas
5 native. So I know a lot about all of the communities
6 that have kind of been looked over and lacking in these,
7 in these areas that I've stated. So I'm inspired to
8 start this security company to just, to do just that.

9 I have over 10 years of experience in security.
10 My family has a lot of background in law enforcement as
11 well as military. So I'm just real eager to do my part
12 here in the city.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'm inspired to
14 have heard that.

15 All right. Anybody have public comment
16 regarding item number 32?

17 Any Board comment regarding item number 32?

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: In regards to your lien
21 with the State of Nevada, can you give us a little
22 information on that, please?

23 MR. CHAMBERS: Yes, sir. I believe, it was the
24 summer of two thousand and -- I want to say nine. I
25 worked with a summer program on the UNLV campus called

1 Upward Bound. It was a summer program where high school
2 students can come in and get the college experience over

6 currently the CSO for a corporation here in town. And

10 for -- to get a license.

8 Number 35, Adam Wertsbaugh. Did I say that

9 right?

10 MR. WERTSBAUGH: Yes, you did.

12 you give us a little bit of background?

13 MR. WERTSBAUGH: Yes. Good morning, Mr. Chair.

6 license number 1364. This is subject to all statutory

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I have a motion. Is
10 there a second? We have a motion and a second. Any
11 Board comment or question regarding the motion?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."
14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
16 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

17 MR. WERTSBAUGH: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 Item number 36, Joseph K. Adamo? Is that the
20 right pronunciation?

21 MR. ADAMO: Yes. Good morning.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. You're
23 Joseph?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us a little

1 bit of background?

2 MR. ADAMO: Yes. I'm excited to be here
3 today, you know. I spent the last several years raising

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

2 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

3 MR. ADAMO: Thank you, guys.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Moving to Process

5 Server. Do we need a break? Good?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I have a --

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- an 11:00 o'clock

9 telephone call, telephones conference that, if we could
10 just keep plugging through until 11:00 clock, I would

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: They're up north.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: They're up north.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

23 MS. CALHOUN: Good morning.

24 MR. HOAGLAND: Good morning.

25 MS. CALHOUN: I'm Dawn Calhoun.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
2 yourselves? I'm sorry.

3 MS. CALHOUN: That's okay. I'm Dawn Calhoun.
4 And this is Brandon Hoagland. We're starting CH
5 Couriers as local delivery for the legal community and
6 process servers. I've worked as a legal secretary,
7 paralegal for the last 20 years and am moving to change
8 and have my own business. And Brandon has been a
9 security guard for the last four years. And we're
10 excited to start this venture together.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

12 Is there any public comment with regard to item
13 number 37?

14 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment

20 issue that's got some history behind it. But the fact
21 that there were two bankruptcies, can you give me a
22 little bit of background about what circumstances
23 brought on two separate filings?

24 MS. CALHOUN: Yes. The first one was due to a
25 divorce. And I was caring for my four children at the

1 time. He never paid child support or anything. And I
2 ended up having to file bankruptcy after the divorce.

3 The second one was due to medical on two of my
4 children, who one was hospitalized for a few weeks. The
5 other one, she has an ongoing eye disease and mounting
6 medical bills and everything. So I was forced to
7 declare bankruptcy a second time.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 MS. CALHOUN: M-hm (affirmative).

10 MR. HOAGLAND: If I may add, she really did
11 try. I am her only son. She did do her best to raise
12 us and take care of us while we were growing up.

16 somebody who had two bankruptcies?

17 MS. CALHOUN: Right.

20 It's just in this environment we've got to air it.

3 MS. CALHOUN: Thank you very much.

4 MR. HOAGLAND: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Congratulations.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Good luck.

7 MS. CALHOUN: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 38, 705
9 Investigations, LLC?

10 MR. DUNN: Back again.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

12 MR. DUNN: Good morning.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you give us
14 a -- introduce yourself and give us a little bit of
15 background?

16 MR. DUNN: My name is Victor Dunn. I'm a
17 retired North Las Vegas deputy chief. I currently
18 possess a private investigator's license, along with
19 private patrolman. I would like to add this one to the
20 company as well.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You just thought it was
22 easier to keep coming here, right?

23 MR. INGRAM: You'll be back for canine.

2 Any Board comment regarding item number 38?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I was just curious. Most
6 of the time, the sheriff's office or somebody like that
7 handles civil process. What type of civil process was
8 involved in the police department?

9 MR. DUNN: Well, early on in my career, patrol
10 officers oftentimes would serve civil papers from out of
11 state, from agencies that were from out of the state.
12 So as a police officer, we did serve that. Also, as a
13 constable, we served civil papers. And I did that
14 for -- starting January 6 of 2014.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. I'm sorry.

16 MR. DUNN: About four years.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you. I apologize.
18 I -- somehow I got confused on that. Thank you for your
19 explanation. I appreciate it.

20 Nothing else, Mr. Chair.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 Any other Board comment?

23 Entertain a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
25 705 Investigations, LLC be granted a new corporate

1 process server license, Victor L. Dunn be granted an
2 individual license and that that individual license be
3 placed in abeyance so that he can become the qualifying
4 agent. This is subject to all statutory and regulatory
5 requirements.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
8 and/or question regarding the motion?

9 All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
12 Carries unanimous. Thank you.

13 MR. DUNN: Thank you.

15 Ebnetter ("Eb-nit-er")?

20 Ebnetter. I'm the operations manager of Nevada Legal
21 Support Services. I've worked with our current
22 qualified agent, Stephanie Sibley, since 2011. And as
23 well as that, facing the military. I'm a local
24 Las Vegas. I'm born and raised. And so Stephanie
25 Sibley is still employed with the company. However, me

1 taking over as a qualifying agent would be a succession
2 plan, as she wants to move on to do some other stuff.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there anybody
4 in the public who would like to comment on item number
5 39?

6 Any Board comment on item number 39?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I think, I need to make a
10 disclosure. I believe, my company does some sub work
11 for your company. But I don't think it's of a major
12 level. And I'm not even so sure that it's the same one,
13 but I think it is. I think, we do some work for you in
14 the boonies.

15 MS. EBNETER: The boonies. Okay.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But I don't, I don't have
17 a conflict, so I'm not disclosing one. But I wanted to
18 make a public disclosure about the possibility that you
19 might have paid me \$10 once before, but.

20 All right. Any other Board comment or
21 questions?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Tara McClelland, item
18 number 40?

19 Good morning. You're Tara?

22 bit of background, please?

24 McClelland. And I have worked for a law firm in the
25 valley for about 14 years now, doing all of their

2 to make it official. And then I can also do contract
3 work on the side to help support my family.

5 MS. MCCLELLAND: That's why I'm here.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Any public

1 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

2 MS. MCCLELLAND: Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Item number 41, Johnno
4 Lazetich?

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: He's up north.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

7 MR. LAZETICH: Good morning.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
9 yourself and give us a little bit of background?

10 MR. LAZETICH: How are you doing? My name is
11 Johnno Lazetich. In 1981, my dad, my parents came to
12 Reno and started Reno-Carson Messenger Service. And so
13 now that I'm about 40, I believe the child labor laws
14 don't really apply to me that much anymore. And so my
15 dad's getting old, and so it was time for me to kind
16 make sure that -- to get my own license, just kind of
17 protect -- my parents are getting older, and just kind
18 of protect Reno-Carson and potential, any business
19 opportunities in the future, aside from Reno-Carson
20 Messenger Service.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, I met your
22 father, and I would assume he'll let you know when the
23 rules don't apply anymore.

24 MR. LAZETICH: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment

1 regarding number 41?

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
5 regarding item number 41?

6 Entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that

23 MR. PEARCE: Good morning.

24 MR. HAMMOND: Good morning. How are you?

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good. How are you?

1 If you could introduce yourselves respectively
2 for the record, and give us a little bit of background.

3 MR. PEARCE: Good morning, Chairman and
4 members. My name is John Pearce. If approved, I'll be
5 the qualifying agent for VWK9. I've got over 35 years
6 of experience in the canine working dog industry, with
7 explosive detection. That has been our, my focus. If
8 approved, we want to bring our services here to
9 Las Vegas.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

11 MR. HAMMOND: My name is Paul Hammond. I have
12 28 years in working dogs experience around the world.
13 Unusually, 20 of those have been in hostile
14 environments, hazard explosive detection. Iraq,
15 Afghanistan seven years, Northern Ireland for 15 years.

16 So we're very excited about the possibility of
17 bringing the Auburn University patented technology Vapor
18 Wake, which is body-worn explosive detection, to
19 Las Vegas and Nevada. So that's why we're here.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. But I don't want
21 to go much further than that. Otherwise, I'm going to
22 have to get a dictionary and encyclopedia.

23 Is there any public comment regarding item
24 number 42?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment
3 regarding item number 42?

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
7 motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I move that
9 VWK9, LLC be granted a new corporate canine handler
10 license, John C. Pearce be granted an individual canine,
11 canine handler license and that that license be placed
12 in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.
13 Member approved, Paul M. Hammond. Subject to all
14 statutory and regulatory requirements.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion and a second. Is
17 there any Board comment or question regarding the
18 motion?

19 All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

22 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

23 MR. PEARCE: Thank you.

24 MR. HAMMOND: Thank you. Mr. Chairman, I'd
25 like to thank Gisela, who's been absolutely outstanding

1 this whole process.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

3 MR. PEARCE: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Appreciate it.

5 Item number 43 in the category of Private
6 Investigator and Private Patrolman, International
7 Security Network?

8 Hi.

9 MS. ENGLE: Good morning.

10 MR. CARTON: Good morning.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
12 yourselves and give us a little bit of background?

13 MS. ENGLE: Hi. My name is Pamela Engle. I'm
14 a former Reno police officer, retired, and then also
15 have 13 years of federal court security officer
16 experience.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

18 MR. CARTON: My name is Vincent Carton. I'm
19 actually representing ISN on the European branch. So
20 we're actually assisting the U.S. branch now starting
21 up. So I'm here to give support and also to represent
22 Ms. Joan E. Leitner and Jerome F.R. Soine.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair --

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, we're not selling

1 anything here, so we don't have to talk about tariffs,
2 right?

3 MR. CARTON: No, that's right.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I also worked with
7 Ms. Engle there at the police department. We have no
8 contact, though, other than on occasional social
9 gatherings, but nothing business-related.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.

11 Is there anyone in the public that would like
12 to have any comment regarding item number 43?

13 Any Board comment regarding item number 43?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I move that
18 International Security Network, Incorporated, doing
19 business as ISN, be granted a new corporate private
20 investigator and private patrol license, Pamela J. Engle
21 be granted her individual private investigator license
22 and private patrol license and that that license be
23 placed in abeyance so that she may become the qualifying
24 agent. Corporate officers to be approved are Joan E.
25 Leitner and Jerome F.R. Soine. This is subject to all

1 statutory and regulatory requirements.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
4 second. Do we have any comments or questions regarding
5 the motion?

6 All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
9 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

10 MS. ENGLE: Thank you.

11 MR. CARTON: Thank you very much.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 44, Kelmar Global.

13 MR. RIDDLE: Good morning.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning. How are
15 you?

16 MR. RIDDLE: Good, thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You're Mr. Riddle?

18 MR. RIDDLE: I am, yes, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Great. Kelly Riddle?

20 MR. RIDDLE: Yes, sir. I've been in law
21 enforcement seven years. In my 20s, I started my
22 company 29 years ago with my former partner, who
23 finished his degree in marriage and family counseling.
24 That's what he wanted to do in the '90s. So we
25 separated at that time. I've continued on. We do

1 mainly corporate work and preemployment-type work.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any public comment
3 regarding item number 44?

4 Any Board comment regarding item number 44?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a motion?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I would move

10 investigator's license and private patrolman license and

12 investigator and -- investigator and private patrolman

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 45, PSYOPS
3 Consulting.

4 Good morning.

5 MR. PRIMAS: Good morning.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you introduce
7 yourself and give us a little background?

8 MR. PRIMAS: Yes. Brett Primas, retired law
9 enforcement here in Las Vegas, about a year and a half
10 ago. And I've been asked to look into a couple of
11 different areas. And knowing that I have to be licensed
12 to do that, that's why I'm here.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
14 public comment regarding item number 45?

15 Any Board comment regarding item number 45?

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, just a real
18 quick question.

19 How does PSYOPS have to do with the
20 investigative and private patrol? I was just curious
21 about what, what your correlation was with that.

22 MR. PRIMAS: Well, a couple different acronyms
23 I came up with, depending on what, what I'm going to be
24 doing. But mainly it would be civil and criminal case
25 review, business continuity planning, as well as

1 security and threat assessment.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

4 Any other Board comment or question?

5 Entertain a motion?

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I move that
7 PSYOPS Consulting, LLC be granted a new corporate
8 private investigator and private patrol license,
9 Brett A. Primas be granted an individual private
10 investigator license and private patrol license, that
11 that, those licenses be placed in abeyance so that he
12 may become the qualifying agent. Member to be approved
13 is Brett A. Primas. And subject to all statutory and
14 regulatory requirements.

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
17 and a second. Any Board comment or question regarding

19 All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

22 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

23 Daniel Holley, item number 46.

24 Good morning.

25 MR. HOLLEY: Good morning.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Holley?

2 MR. HOLLEY: I am.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Nice to see you. Can you
4 give us a little bit of background?

5 MR. HOLLEY: My name is Dan Holley, retired
6 detective of Las Vegas Metro. And my brother is in the
7 security business here in Las Vegas, has been for over
8 20 years. And the company he works with was losing
9 their license or licensing, have relocated out-of-state.
10 So I became interested. And it was, essentially, at
11 first, to keep him in work, right, so he wouldn't --
12 and, but now I've become very interested in the work.
13 And I'm excited for a bright future, and I'm looking
14 forward to what's next.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is this an older brother
16 or a younger brother?

17 MR. HOLLEY: Younger.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Younger. Who wins the
19 fights?

20 MR. HOLLEY: It would be me.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Especially as the QA?

22 MR. HOLLEY: Especially.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Any public
24 comments regarding item number 46?

25 Any Board comment regarding items number 46?

1 Entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
3 Daniel E. Holley be approved and for his individual
4 private investigator and private patrolman license and
5 that these licenses be placed into abeyance so that he
6 may become the qualifying agent for Capital Guard &
7 Patrol, Inc., license number 1249. Corporate officer to
8 be approved is Michael J. Johnson. This is subject to
9 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
12 and a second. Is there any Board comment or question
13 regarding the motion?

14 All in favor, say "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
17 Carries unanimous. Thank you.
18 Congratulations.

19 MR. HOLLEY: Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now we're moving to the
21 category of Private Patrolman and Canine Handler. And
22 item number 47 is K2 Solutions.

23 Good morning.

24 MR. COPELAND: Good morning, Mr. Chairman.

25 MR. KJELLEN: Good morning, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you here earlier and
2 were sworn?

3 MR. COPELAND: Yes, sir.

4 MR. KJELLEN: Yes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Could you
6 respectively introduce yourselves and give us a little
7 bit of background?

8 MR. KJELLEN: My name is Shayne Kjellsen. I'm
9 the commercial services manager for K2. I have over 25
10 years of military and federal level counterterrorism
11 experience.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for your
13 service.

14 MR. COPELAND: Kelly Copeland. I've been a
15 San Diego police officer for 10 years, SWAT and canine,
16 and am currently the law enforcement instructor for K2
17 Solutions.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. What are you
19 hoping to do in Nevada?

20 MR. KJELLEN: Part of our experience and
21 business over the last year has been we provide a canine
22 explosive detection services for 12 NFL teams. And in
23 that instance, we're going to have one here in Nevada
24 to -- we need to prepare ourselves and go through all
25 the right steps to make sure that we're able to do that

1 here in your state as well.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
3 public comment regarding item number 47?

4 Any Board comment regarding item number 47?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
8 K2 Solutions, Incorporated be granted a new corporate
9 private patrol and canine handler license, Kelly J.
10 Copeland, Jr. be granted an individual private patrol
11 and canine handler license, that that license, those
12 licenses be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
13 qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be approved are
14 Lane, and I'm going to just say Kjellsen ("Kel-sen"),
15 James Lynch, Nancy M. Smith and Susan Kjellsen. This is
16 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: A motion and a second.
19 Any Board comment or question regarding the motion?

20 All in favor, say "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
23 Carries unanimous. Thank you. Welcome to
24 Nevada.

25 MR. KJELLSSEN: Thank you.

1 MR. COPELAND: Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Now we move to the
3 category of Private Investigator, Private Patrolman and
4 Process Server, item number 48, Michael Carmody.

5 Good morning.

6 MR. CARMODY: Good morning.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Michael Carmody?

8 MR. CARMODY: Yes, sir.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you give us a little
10 bit of background and tell us a little something about
11 what you're hoping to accomplish?

12 MR. CARMODY: Born and raised in Las Vegas,
13 retired recently as a captain from North Las Vegas
14 Police Department after 26 years.

15 As far as the process server goes, I was
16 possibly going to work part-time for the North Las Vegas
17 Constable. So I figured I'd get that. I'm not really
18 sure whether I need that or not, but I just wanted to be
19 legal with that.

20 And I would like to start my own private
21 investigating bodyguarding company.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any public comment
23 regarding item number 48?

24 Any Board comment regarding item number 48?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah. Mr. Chair, thank

1 you, Mr. Chair. I've struggled with this process server
2 qualification. And I don't know about any of the other
3 Board members. And, I guess, I was going to ask the
4 investigator how he could verify or how he verified the
5 hours to qualify for process server. The other one is,
6 that's -- there's no question. It's just the process
7 server side of it.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's the investigator?

9 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. I spoke with
10 Mr. Carmody, and we went over his hours and his duties
11 over the years, and he explained to me what he'd been
12 doing and his process server experience. And I felt he
13 had enough hours based on his years of experience and
14 the job descriptions he had provided to me.

15 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair, Investigator
16 Saladino. Also, part of the duties per NRS 289.027,
17 that law enforcement agencies are required to adopt
18 policies and procedures to serve certain subpoenas for
19 peace officers. So in his capacity as a captain, he
20 would have to prepare those documents. So that's what
21 we kind of used as well, when we were going through the
22 NRS for powers of peace officer, while we were doing
23 that.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay. If the

1 investigators can feel comfortable with him meeting the
2 qualifying hours, then I'm comfortable with that.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
4 comment?

5 Entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
7 Michael L. Carmody be granted his individual private
8 patrol investigator -- or excuse me -- private
9 investigator, private patrol and process server, subject
10 to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
13 question on the motion?

14 All in favor, say "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
17 Carries unanimous. Congratulations.

18 MR. CARMODY: Thank you, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Going to item
20 number 49, Other Business, Dan E. Taylor.

21 Good morning again.

22 MR. TAYLOR: Good morning again.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let's see. I think,
24 you're here to ask for an exemption, right?

25 MR. TAYLOR: That's correct.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And that's for the
2 Consumer Electronics Show?

3 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Maybe, probably, since
5 you saw quite a few people in the audience, you might
6 want to give us a brief -- I know what you're looking
7 for, but the public might not be. So advise. So can
8 you give us a little quickie on what you need the
9 exemption for?

10 MR. TAYLOR: Absolutely. So the Consumer
11 Electronics Show is actually the largest trade show in
12 the industry. This past January, there were 184,
13 184,000 attendees that came to the event here in
14 Las Vegas. There is, you know, a number of risk
15 assessments and additional security measures that are
16 taken to provide extra layers of safety for the event
17 based on just some of the criteria and profile. There
18 actually were some federal resources that were applied
19 this year as well.

20 The waiver for the police officers is something
21 that the Consumer Electronics Show has obtained through
22 their security contractor in years past. And this is
23 for off -- or active duty out-of-state police officers
24 that do come in and, based on their experience level,
25 are able to provide some additional resources and just

1 additional resources to the event.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there any public
3 comment regarding item number 49?

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Nothing here.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment
7 regarding item number 49?

8 Entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
10 Dan E. Taylor, Jr., the qualifying agent for DTA
11 Security Services, LLC, license number 1067, be granted
12 an exemption, as outlined in NAC 648.338, for the use of
13 six active out-of-state peace officers to work in
14 elevated security positions during the January 2019
15 Consumer Electrics Show. And, also, that all of the
16 officers have registered works cards. Subject to all
17 statutory and --

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second, is there a
19 second?

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Let me add, subject to
22 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, sorry about that.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, that's me.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And we have a motion and

1 a second. Any Board comment or question regarding the
2 motion?

3 All in favor, say "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

6 Carries unanimous.

7 MR. TAYLOR: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Item number 50,
9 ESI Security Services.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: They're here in the
11 north, Mr. Chair.

12 MR. CAMPBELL: Good morning, Mr. Chair. Rick
13 Campbell. With me is Mr. Hendi today.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good morning.

15 Mr. Ingram, can you give us the background on
16 this agenda item?

17 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

18 ESI Security Services had -- we've come to a
19 stipulated agreement with them recently. They have been
20 compliant with all of the agreement. And as part of the
21 agreement, they were given the opportunity to petition
22 for an advisory opinion on how to -- what
23 classifications within their company would require
24 registered work cards and which ones would not.

25 Mr. Hendi provided me a list of proposed

1 positions for us to review. And at the direction of the
2 Board, I reviewed those positions. I drafted a letter,
3 which Board members were copied on, outlining what the
4 expectations were.

5 In response to that, Mr. Hendi and his counsel
6 drafted the petition for advisory opinion. And I find
7 that all of the items that were outlined in their
8 petition were in line with what our letter, what the
9 intent of our letter was, and feel that we both have
10 come to a genuine understanding of what's expected
11 within the scope of both of those letters.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Campbell,
13 Mr. Hendi, do you have any response?

14 MR. CAMPBELL: I'd just like to add that the
15 primary issue here was the Events Services employees.
16 As you know, in the past, there have been some citations
17 regarding the scope of what the Events Services
18 employees could or couldn't do at an event.

19 And so we just want to be very clear that as
20 part of an Event Services employee's -- as an example,
21 you're all familiar with the Peppermill cup swap for a
22 plastic cup versus a paper -- or a glass bottle or a
23 glass cup. So we want to be very clear that in that
24 process, an Events Services employee will have to
25 actually physically, you know, talk to a person, that

1 there'll be a stop, as far as being able to converse
2 with them, but that Events Services employee does not
3 have any ability to detain, refrain or stop a person
4 from going on to an event with a glass cup. That's an
5 example.

6 So we've outlined three or four of these. We
7 just want to make sure that, as a necessary part of an
8 Events Services employee to be a ticket taker, an usher,
9 those types of things, that there is a -- not really a
10 stop, but there's a --

11 MR. HENDI: Pause.

12 MR. CAMPBELL: There's just, there's a pause to
13 allow them to, the two people have to converse to get
14 the message across of either swapping a cup or getting a
15 wristband or buying a ticket.

16 So that's a clarification that Mr. Hendi and
17 Mr. Ingram discussed. We're all on board on that. I
18 think, we've got a clear understanding that, that as
19 long as they stay within that parameters, don't try to
20 physically restrain a person if they refuse to, say,
21 take a paper cup, that that's not a function that should
22 be the employee should be registered.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So in the particular
24 position that we're in now is, does the correspondence
25 settle the issue, or is it that we're looking for an

1 official opinion of how the Board views it and this is
2 going to be the written word from this point forward?

3 MR. CAMPBELL: Yes, that was part of the
4 stipulation. And Ms. Bordelove, maybe Ms. Bordelove can
5 speak to that if she'd like to.

6 MS. BORDELOVE: I can kind of speak to what --
7 the petition was made under one of your administrative
8 regulations, NAC 648.430, which allows the -- it allows
9 anybody. So this isn't just pursuant to any
10 stipulation. At any point, an applicant or licensee may
11 petition the Board for a declaratory order or advisory
12 opinion concerning the interpretation or applicability
13 of any provision of the statute or regulation or of any
14 decision of the Board which directly affects the
15 applicant or licensee conducting activities required to
16 be licensed by Chapter 648.

17 So this petition falls under there. The Board
18 will issue an advisory opinion that will be official
19 based -- I mean that'll be drafted and issued after
20 today's meeting based on what the Board decides.

21 So this is something the Board needs to look at
22 and decide. And, I think, the background Kevin was
23 trying to give is that at this point we're not in
24 disagreement with anything that they are petitioning.
25 The letter you were copied with, kind of this is Board

1 staff's position on those same job descriptions.

2 My only advice, I think, to the Board would be,
3 to the extent that you are considering, keep to making
4 the order specific to job descriptions given and not
5 necessarily regarding things beyond, because we could go
6 on forever speculating what could happen outside of, you
7 know, out of those, but keep to the descriptions that
8 are in the petition and whether the Board feels those
9 job descriptions would require licensure.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And so, at this juncture,
11 we would be in a position to, if it's the Board's
12 pleasure, adopt the findings that are concluded in the
13 correspondence, ask you as legal counsel to provide us
14 with the opinion for the Board, and then --

15 MS. BORDELOVE: Right, I'll be drafting the
16 opinion like they do with board orders.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

18 MS. BORDELOVE: But you could adopt, if you
19 agree with what was written by Kevin, you can.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any
21 public comment? Or do you have anything additional,
22 Mr. Campbell?

23 MR. CAMPBELL: No, I think, the petition that
24 we filed outlines the positions that the parties
25 discussed and the positions that are in question. And

1 so we're fine with getting these positions, Events
2 Services employees in these particular positions, being
3 defined as not being having to be registered as long as
4 they are doing what's in the job description.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

6 Is there any public comment regarding item
7 number 50?

8 Any Board discussion regarding items number 50?

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I
12 just want to make sure, though. And the case is the
13 Events Services personnel and the ESI personnel all will
14 be wearing different uniforms clearly identifying their
15 individual respective association with the event?

16 MR. CAMPBELL: That's correct. And as an
17 example, if an Events Services employee talks to a
18 patron and says, "You have to swap your glass out," and
19 that patron, you know --

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Just moves on.

21 MR. CAMPBELL: If he keeps moving on, then that
22 Events Services employee will contact an ESI saying this
23 person has breached security, you know, and that person
24 will take care of it.

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: That answers my question.

1 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

3 Any other Board comment or question?

4 Entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I probably
6 should just restate, as I have in the past, you know,
7 I'm a member of a social club, a social organization
8 with both Mr. Hendi and Mr. Campbell. We occasionally
9 run into each other at different times at this
10 particular event. But we have absolutely no
11 relationship outside that, that club. And I don't feel
12 like there's any conflict for me to vote on this issue.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 That being said, would you like to make a
15 motion?

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Well, let me try. Let me
17 try.

18 Mr. Chair, I would move that ESI Security
19 Services, Incorporated, license number 700, Mahmoud
20 "Mike" Hendi, that he be granted his petition pursuant
21 to NRS 648.430 related to the requirements for
22 registration under NRS 648.060 for employees of ESI
23 and/or Events Services.

24 MS. BORDELOVE: So this isn't really a petition
25 to be granted. I would suggest that instead you look at

1 them and either incorporate the letter, as Chairman Zane
2 suggested, or look at the job descriptions and say, and
3 simply make a motion to state that the descriptions as
4 written either do or do not require licensure.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Can I refer to the
6 petition and indicate that the job descriptions, as
7 outlined in A, B, C, D and E of that petition, be
8 granted? Counsel, you got to help me out here.

9 MS. BORDELOVE: Let me see. I don't have it.
10 Do you have the petition?

11 MR. INGRAM: I've got it right here.

12 MS. BORDELOVE: So --

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: And I don't have Kevin's
14 letter, so I can't refer to that specifically. Somebody
15 else might.

16 MS. BORDELOVE: You could simply say, if you
17 feel that they do not need, like I'm sure you could say
18 that the job descriptions, as outlined in A, B, C, you
19 know, from the petition, that your motion is that, as
20 described, they don't require licensure.

21 Is that what you're trying to get to? Because,
22 in fact, that would be, for the record, I think, that
23 motion would get the point across, that the
24 descriptions, you could do one at a time, or you can
25 block them if you're doing them all together. You could

1 make the motion that they, the descriptions, as written,
2 do not require licensure.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right. And, Kevin,
4 that's good for you?

5 MR. INGRAM: Yes, we agreed to that. Yes,
6 absolutely.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right. So let me
8 kind of rephrase the motion to say that, in response to
9 the petition by Mr. Hendi, my motion is that job
10 descriptions in the petition, as outlined in: A,
11 checking patrons at an event who have a glass drink
12 container and offer them plastic container, when the
13 event organizer does not want glass containers on their
14 premises, does not require licensure; that, B, checking
15 patrons at an event for identification to ascertain
16 whether they are of legal age to consume alcohol and,
17 therefore, issue the wristbands, wristband, does not
18 requires licensure; checking or scanning tickets for
19 entry into an event venue does not require licensure;
20 staffing a parking lot or access point to parking does
21 not require licensure; and, E, staffing the ticket sales
22 booth for either parking or entrance into a venue does
23 not require licensure. When, in the event a patron does
24 not act according to requested, that all further
25 activity would be required of ESI Security.

1 Counsel, does that work?

2 MS. BORDELOVE: Yes.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.

5 Is there a second?

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second. Any Board

8 comment or question on the motion?

9 All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

12 Passes unanimously.

13 MR. CAMPBELL: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'm going to
16 have to step out.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'm going to have to step
19 out of the room for probably about a half an hour.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Half an hour?

21 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We're going to be
23 on a break for a minimum of a half an hour. The reason
24 being is that Mr. Nadeau has a private matter that he
25 has to look into. And there are two other Board members

1 who are missing. So we must have three people in order
2 to conduct business. So with Mr. Nadeau taking his time
3 that he needs to take right now, we're not able to
4 continue this until he comes back and there's three of
5 us.

6 So, at a minimum, so that you can plan on
7 things, we won't be back until 11:30 at least. So check
8 back at 11:30. We won't start without you before then,
9 guaranteed.

10 We're on break.

11 * * * * *

12 (A break was taken, 10:55 to 11:34 a.m.)

13 * * * * *

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's go back.
15 We're back in session.

16 Let's go back to item number 19, please.
17 That's AccuSource, Inc. Is there anybody from
18 AccuSource here?

19 MS. DONALD: Mr. Chairman, she did state she
20 may have scheduling conference, but she didn't let us
21 know for sure.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, then, we'll
23 trail it till the end of the meeting.

24 That brings us back up to item number 51, Vegas
25 Valley Evictions, Andrea Richards?

1 MS. BORDELOVE: You have the old agenda.

2 MR. INGRAM: Oh, yeah, we gave you the new one.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

4 MR. INGRAM: This changed.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So it's not on
6 there at all?

7 MR. INGRAM: No.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Never mind. So,
9 then, we move to Registration Appeals.

10 MR. INGRAM: We've got a number 51 still.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, okay. Oh. Oh.
12 Okay. You put something in its place.

13 MR. INGRAM: I did.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I got it now.

15 MR. INGRAM: I did. Testing you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Okay. Item
17 number 51 is an item to possibly elect a Chair.

18 I'm currently the Chair of the Board. But my
19 membership in the Board ends the last day of this month.
20 And I asked the Governor, or I advised the Governor's
21 Office that I didn't wish to seek reappointment. So I
22 wasn't going to make application. So that means that
23 the Chairman goes away at the end of this meeting, or
24 it's the last day of the month, whatever situation
25 occurs.

1 So, for me -- and many people might not have
2 been aware of it. Every three years these positions
3 come up to be considered, and you have to apply to be
4 considered and all this stuff. I've been here almost
5 nine years. I thought that I had one more term left in
6 me. But when it came down to the deadline to make the
7 application, I had to weigh a certain -- a lot of
8 different things, and many of which are things
9 associated with my business, things associated with
10 getting things accomplished that you intend to do when
11 you set out to do public service and whatnot.

12 The catalyst probably more than anything is two
13 factors for me to not seek reappointment. And those two
14 factors are the business environment is changing
15 radically. And there are certain -- many people would
16 think that when you have a position like this, and you
17 are also in the industry, that might tend to give you
18 some benefit being in that situation. Where in
19 actuality it tends to create a hardship. Because in
20 this particular position you have to not only pay
21 attention to your ethical obligations in accordance with
22 statute, but you also have to pay attention to just the
23 appearance of those ethical obligations, not just, maybe
24 do I violate something if I do this? Or does it even
25 look like I might violate something?

1 So it tends to hold your arm behind your back
2 when you're trying to operate a business. And, you
3 know, for example, here recently I had a couple of
4 problem customers in my business. And when they wanted
5 some resolution to a problem that I didn't feel that I
6 was liable for, their next step was, logically, we're
7 going to sue you, we're going to do this, we're going to
8 do that. It's the normal things that you deal with.

9 And then, when that doesn't get the reaction
10 that they're hoping for, then they find on Google that
11 you have this other position. So then they say, well,
12 maybe I'll just make some problems with you with the
13 Governor's Office, and I'll do these other things that
14 start to become kind of like a course of nature. So
15 that kind of keeps your arm behind your back and, you
16 know, things of that nature.

17 I'm not too close to retirement that I don't
18 have to pay attention to what my business needs are. So
19 it's -- and, also, some competitors like to take the
20 same position and say, well, he might be making a
21 benefit on this, he might be making a benefit on that.
22 And I run a business that we have national clients. So
23 I get a little feedback about what some of my
24 competitors say when they go to a national event or
25 different things of that nature.

1 So the bottom line is, is that before I allow
2 it to have a negative impact on my business, and so that
3 it doesn't have a negative impact to this Board or the
4 staff of this Board for the work that gets done here,
5 I've elected to say that I can't continue to dance with
6 one arm behind my back. So since there's a few people
7 inviting me to dance, and I don't mind dancing, I think
8 I'll release that arm from behind me and keep my
9 balance.

10 So I'm all done here at the end of the month.
11 So that needs for this Board to take an action to elect
12 a Chairman so it continues to go. And I trail along on
13 my merry way.

14 As I was before, I was a fairly active
15 participant in these meetings before I ever came on this
16 Board. And I would assume that I'll be just as active
17 as I was before, but it'll probably be on that side of
18 the table.

19 So from that perspective, I'm not missing much.
20 I set out to do a lot of things, and I put a pretty
21 healthy agenda on the staff, on myself. A lot of those
22 things didn't get done in that time frame that I had
23 envisioned, because of a lot of different things outside
24 of our control. You know, the budget issues being what
25 they are, staffing issues being what they are, staffing

1 vacancies being what they are, the Governor imposed a
2 couple of moratoriums on regulations and statutory
3 changes. There's government-imposed timelines for
4 getting laws changed if you're doing it from a Board
5 seat rather than just running out and grabbing a
6 legislator and saying, here's my contribution, take my
7 ideas to the Legislature.

8 So there's certain things that you can get
9 accomplished here, and there's certain things you can
10 get accomplished over there. I've served here for
11 almost nine years, done the best job that I thought I
12 could do, and now I'm done on this side of it.

13 So that's why the agenda item is here.

14 And is there any public comment on item number
15 51?

16 UNIDENTIFIED MAN IN LAS VEGAS: Thank you for
17 your service.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 Okay. Any Board comment to item number 51?

20 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mark?

21 MR. INGRAM: I'd like to --

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chairman?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
25 Mark, you've done a really good job on running the

1 meetings and doing what was necessary. And so,
2 obviously, we all appreciate it.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, thank you for
4 your --

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: My pleasure.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you for your
7 diligence.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No problem. My pleasure.

9 MR. INGRAM: And, also, we have the staff,
10 Mark, who want to thank you for your leadership, your
11 guidance, your support that you've given us over the
12 years. I'm going to miss having you sit here next to
13 me. But, you know, like everything in life that goes
14 on, we'll have a new Chairman here. And if there's
15 anything we can do to help you out, just reach out and
16 let us know.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Appreciate it.

18 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So, as for item
20 number 51, we'll have the vacancy on the Chair. So we
21 need to make a motion to nominate somebody that would be
22 willing to do it. And if nobody has any qualms, I would
23 make a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Go ahead.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. And I'd move,

1 I'd make a motion that Jim Nadeau be made Chair.

2 Is there a second? Let's have a second before
3 he says no.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I'd second that.

5 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, for the record, I did
6 speak with Board Member Flynn, who was not able to
7 attend today. He fully supports the nomination and
8 would vote in favor of Mr. Nadeau assuming the duties of
9 Chairman. Also, in speaking with Board Member Nixon,
10 she was not interested in running for Chair this time.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. So
12 we've got a motion and a second. Any Board comment or
13 questions on the motion?

14 All in favor, say "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

17 Carries unanimous. But that's not till this
18 meeting's over. I'm still in charge. Thank you.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I just hope I can do as
20 good a job as you have.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I know you can.

22 Okay. Item number 52, Registration Appeals,
23 Tomas Baltazar?

24 Nothing in the south. All right. We'll trail
25 number 52.

1 David Banks, for 53?

2 How are you doing?

3 MR. BANKS: I'm all right. How are you?

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Were you sworn in
5 earlier?

6 MR. BANKS: No, sir, I was not.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can I let
8 everybody know, you need to, if you're here for a
9 registration appeal or to speak to the Board on anything
10 other than just a general public comment, you'll need to
11 stand, raise your right hand and be sworn.

12 MS. BORDELOVE: Do you swear that the testimony
13 you give today will be the truth, the whole truth, and
14 nothing but the truth?

15 (All applicants and witnesses present were
16 sworn.)

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 Okay. Mr. Banks. Let's see. Who's the
19 investigator on Mr. Banks?

20 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

22 MS. DONALD: Let's see. In 1991, Mr. Banks had
23 a willful discharge of a firearm out of California, and
24 he was convicted and served 24 months probation.

25 In 1994, he had a carrying a concealed weapon

1 charge. He was convicted, had 24 months jail with the
2 majority being suspended.

3 Mr. Banks did disclose both arrests. And since
4 the early 1990's, he has not been arrested since that
5 time.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Banks, can you
7 give us a little background about those, those arrests
8 and convictions?

9 MR. BANKS: One was discharged in the back
10 yard, but nothing violent or anything. And the other
11 one, I must have currently checked out, because I never
12 had a violation. I wasn't that kind of kid.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MR. BANKS: So. I raised my kids not to be
15 that kind of kid.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

17 MR. BANKS: So far, I've been successful.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And these, these
19 were disclosed?

20 MS. DONALD: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I failed to make a
22 disclosure about the registration appeals. Those of you
23 who were here earlier heard me ask for public comment
24 before we went to Board comment on the situations. In
25 this particular setting, this is quasi adversarial. So

1 the public really doesn't have any participation in
2 these registration appeals. This is between the
3 appellant and the Board. So I won't be asking for
4 public comment, and we won't, we don't entertain it,
5 because there's due process issues that we have to pay
6 attention to. So I won't be asking for public comment
7 during this portion of the process.

8 Sorry if I interrupted you.

9 MR. BANKS: No problem.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Are there any
11 other Board comments or questions?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If you'll accept a
15 motion, I'll make one.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I would move
18 that David Banks' registration be granted and the denial
19 be overturned.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Is
21 there a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, explanation,
24 since we're just starting on this.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: It's been well over 20
2 years since Mr. Banks has any type of criminal record.
3 And I believe that time and distance and that type of
4 thing, he deserves another chance.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.

6 MR. BANKS: Thank you, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment
8 or question?

9 All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Opposed, say "no."

12 It's been approved. Your appeal is granted,
13 and you'll be given a work card.

14 MR. BANKS: Thank you, sir.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Alfred Clark?

16 Good morning.

17 MR. CLARK: Good morning.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Investigator
19 Saladino.

20 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.
21 Mr. Clark was applied. When it came time to renew his
22 work card, there was a 2012 carrying a concealed weapon
23 without a permit. Mr. Clark served one year of
24 probation. And he did disclose the arrest.

25 Mr. Clark has not lost any of his firearms

1 credentials. He can still, you know, have a firearm.
2 He has provided court documents as well as letters from
3 security companies that wish to hire him, and also works
4 as a trainer in regards to firearms.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. But the end result
6 was a gross misdemeanor, correct?

7 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
9 questions?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yes. Mr. Chair, would
11 you ask him to go ahead and explain what the
12 circumstances were.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I'm sorry. Would you
14 tell us about the arrest and the process.

15 MR. CLARK: Yes, sir. While working at the --
16 a gun show, my motorcycle jacket had fallen over the top
17 of my pistol. And during a brief encounter with the
18 person that I was working for, who had shorted me my
19 pay, one of the other employees decided to run over and
20 grab one of the police officers there. And while I was
21 leaving, with my pay settled, the police officer decided
22 to come over and talk to me. My jacket being over the
23 top of my pistol at the time, he decided to cite me and
24 send me off.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Have you been here

1 before?

2 MR. CLARK: Yes, sir, over a year ago.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Okay.

4 MR. CLARK: Since then, I've taken several,
5 several more weapons classes. I'm still an instructor
6 for one of the local companies, working with them,
7 teaching law enforcement. I've also gotten my Virginia
8 guard card, which is a five-day weapons class, helped
9 actually part of the -- instruct part of that class with
10 a company called EPI, Executive Protection Institute.
11 In addition to that, taking their executive protection
12 class.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So you had applied
14 before, we upheld the --

15 MR. CLARK: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- the denial?

17 MR. CLARK: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And now you're back a
19 year later?

20 MR. CLARK: A little over a year, yes, sir.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

22 MR. CLARK: I had to leave the state for
23 approximately 18 months.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No more questions.

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
4 Alfred J. Clark be granted and approved his card, his
5 reversal changed.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
7 to grant the appeal. Is there a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
10 question on the motion?

11 All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
14 Carries unanimous. We will issue the card.

15 MR. CLARK: Thank you, gentlemen.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

17 Taham Cristilli. I might have butchered that.
18 Taham, T-A-H-A-M, Cristilli?

19 All right. We'll trail it.

20 Lamont DuBose?

21 Okay. Well, let's see. Who's the
22 investigator?

23 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

25 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a

1 felony conviction. He did not disclose it on his
2 application. He had an unauthorized use of a credit
3 card and the credit card as theft, where he received a
4 fine, to pay restitution and three years probation out
5 of --

6 MR. DUBOSE: Louisiana.

7 MR. SALADINO: Louisiana.

8 In 2003, crime against nature, slash,
9 prostitution, where he also received a fine, suspended
10 sentence and probation.

11 And in 2004, illegal possession of a stolen
12 credit card. It was a felony, where he served three
13 years of probation. And his P&P probation was
14 terminated unsatisfactory.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you give us a
16 rundown on the criminal history?

17 MR. DUBOSE: Yes. This was during a time
18 period that I was getting out of, you know, hanging
19 around people that were in bad elements. And so it was
20 usually a situation where I was with other people, and I
21 would get caught along with them. You know, it has been
22 a while, 16 years since any of this has happened.

23 And I did, I did do restitution for the one,
24 yeah, many of the charges, and actually I ended up
25 getting -- paying all the restitution for everything.

1 I'm actually employed with CSC and East Ridge
2 and Reliance Security. So I'm able to, you know, still
3 get employment, even though, you know, this is pending.
4 The reason why I did not list it, I believed, I thought
5 that when you're on probation, I thought, when you
6 complete the probation, you ended up like it's not, you
7 know, it's not, you're not convicted, in other words.
8 And so I didn't put that on there because I thought it
9 had been taken care of. I thought it had been
10 completed. And so that's why.

11 And, but, on these, on the one, I did have to
12 pay on one of these charges, that I did pay, you know,
13 pay all restitution, and everything was completed on all
14 those charges.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But what, what part of
16 the application process led you to believe that you
17 didn't need to disclose the arrests?

18 MR. DUBOSE: I thought that, I thought that it
19 was if you're convicted. And I thought that when you
20 had probation, you weren't convicted. And so I was
21 confused. You know, I thought that when you were
22 convicted, you didn't have probation, when you had
23 probation, you didn't have like a conviction. And so,
24 you know, I didn't fill it.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So the last time

1 that you had any participation in the criminal justice
2 process is when?

3 MR. DUBOSE: 2004.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 2004?

5 MR. DUBOSE: Yes. And, actually, I looked
6 those cases up, and there was -- all payments were
7 received, and all cases were closed. I had to go to the
8 docket and look them up myself, too.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And you mentioned you're
10 working for some different licensees. In what capacity?

11 MR. DUBOSE: Yeah, that was when I had my
12 probationary licensing. And as soon I got that, then I
13 got the employment with CSC as an event -- you know,
14 event services.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So then, once the
16 Board notified you, then you got --

17 MR. DUBOSE: Yeah, then it was, basically, I
18 couldn't work anymore, because I had to explain it to
19 you today, what happened. I'm actually -- they're
20 waiting for me to figure it out. Because I'm employed
21 with CSC and Reliance and did a good job there.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So can you tell me
23 about the circumstances about the criminal charges?

24 MR. DUBOSE: Yes. A lot of this activity was
25 earlier in my life when I was running around with people

1 who were a bad element. And I don't know, if you just,
2 when you come out of that element, then you realize the
3 things you've done. And, you know, being around that
4 element, I had to remove myself and leave that, that
5 city. And everything changed for the better after that.
6 I went to Miami. I had my real estate license. I'm a
7 wedding planner now in Nevada, I mean a wedding
8 officiant and a notary public.

9 So everything changed by leaving that
10 environment. And I've never been in trouble again.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
12 questions?

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have a question. What
14 created the situation where your probation was
15 terminated unsatisfactory for the felony charge?

16 MR. DUBOSE: You know, I saw that. But I don't
17 know what they meant by that, because it says
18 unsatisfactorily, but then it's release issued. So case
19 closed. So even though it says unsatisfactory, it says
20 release issued and case closed. So the case was closed,
21 and it says the fines were paid, paid in full. So they
22 ended up getting the payment, but then it says
23 unsatisfactory. But that's not -- it says release
24 issued and case closed. Because the cases are closed
25 now.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Does the investigator
3 have any further on that, on that issue?

4 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. When I
5 tried to contact the P&P department in Louisiana, he did
6 unsatisfactory because it took so long for the
7 restitution to be paid. But the restitution was paid.
8 And that's just what their records put down as, as
9 happening.

10 MR. DUBOSE: M-hm (affirmative), yeah.

11 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other questions?

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would move that Lamont
18 DuBose be granted his registration and his denial be
19 overturned.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
23 and a second. Any Board comment or question on the
24 motion?

25 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All -- Oh, I'm sorry.

2 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: If I may make a couple
3 comments. Number one, under normal circumstances, I
4 would, because of the nondisclosure, I wouldn't even, I
5 wouldn't consider this. But we do have, we have some
6 time and distance. I'm sure that if he applies again,
7 he will realize that when it says arrests, convictions,
8 it means it. But there's a change of, change of time
9 and a change of location that I'm putting in, that I'm
10 taking this into consideration.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.

12 Any other Board comment?

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did you second?

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

19 Carries unanimous. We'll be issuing you a
20 card.

21 MR. DUBOSE: It's in Reno?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Pardon?

23 MR. INGRAM: We'll be in contact.

24 MR. DUBOSE: Okay.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Dexter Dukes? Dexter

1 Dukes?

2 We'll trail 57.

3 Charles Gardiner?

4 Good morning, or afternoon. Are you "Gard-ner"
5 or "Gar-deen-er"?

6 MR. GARDINER: Either one's fine.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Investigator
8 Donald.

9 MS. DONALD: Yes. I denied Mr. Gardiner for
10 the carrying a concealed weapon back in 1998. He was
11 convicted. It was a misdemeanor charge. He received
12 probation and a fine. He did disclose that arrest.

13 And he had a couple more. One was from 2001,
14 willful obstruction of a law officer. He disclosed.
15 And then, in 1996, simple assault, which was dismissed.
16 And he disclosed that as well.

17 I wrote -- at the time of the report, we didn't
18 have his fingerprint results back. Since then, we have
19 received them, and it was just those three arrests,
20 which he disclosed all three.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us the
22 circumstances surrounding those, those arrests?

23 MR. GARDINER: Yes. So, in '96, I think that
24 was the simple assault. I was working as a loss
25 prevention investigator for Niemann Marcus. And we had

1 done an arrest. And the person that we arrested became
2 agitated and whatnot. Anyway, she ended up calling the
3 police on us because, when we searched her, she didn't
4 have anything. But it wasn't my case. I was supporting
5 another officer on the case. And it went to trial.
6 Things got dismissed, because even her lawyer was the
7 one who dismissed the charges against us based on the
8 fact that we're simply just trying to ask her questions
9 and she became erratic.

10 The second one, with the concealed weapon, that
11 time, I'd come off a deployment. I lived with a
12 girlfriend who was, you know, a pretty passionate
13 person. I mean not that, I mean not in that way. But,
14 you know, very -- but, yeah, she loves trouble. Right?
15 And she was a little unstable. And I came off
16 deployment. I didn't want to really talk to her because
17 she was trying to figure out where we were going and
18 whatnot.

19 Well, anyway, I tried to stop her from leaving
20 the house. So I took my weapon and concealed it the
21 front of my pants. And I went to the store to get, you
22 know, a pack of cigarettes, just to cool off, you know,
23 give everything time to cease. And on my way back, she
24 had been doing loops on this access road. And she had
25 stopped her car, waiting to me to, you know, to talk to

1 me.

2 A police officer saw the blinkers on. And he
3 saw me. He stopped me. And he's like, "Hey, you know,
4 what's going on?" It's like, "Ah, nothing." "Put your
5 hands up," the whole deal. Did that. And before he
6 started to search me, I informed him, I was like, "Hey,
7 officer, I just want you to know that there's a weapon
8 in my pants, behind me." At which time he arrested me.
9 You know, when we got in the back of his squad car, I
10 pretty much explained like, look, man, I didn't feel
11 safe, you know, leaving the weapon in the house. And at
12 the time, I couldn't think of any other option. You
13 know, I mean I wasn't going to leave it in the bush or,
14 you know, try to hide it somewhere in the house.
15 Because I'm pretty sure, she probably would have found
16 it.

17 So that being said, they confiscated the
18 weapon, asked me if it was my military weapon. I was
19 like, no. They kept it. Paid the fine, did probation,
20 and that was it.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

22 MR. GARDINER: And then what's the other one?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Willful obstruction of a
24 law enforcement officer in Georgia.

25 MR. GARDINER: That was in Atlanta, the same

1 place. At the time, they had closed down this district
2 known as Bucket. Not really closed it down. It was
3 still open. But they were really enforcing on people
4 standing in the street and all this other stuff. So my
5 cousin and I, we had just come out of a place and were
6 walking across the street. And as we're walking across
7 the street, a cop car comes speeding up. You know, I
8 mean it was going fast. Right? And by time I'm
9 looking, he's got his blinkers on. So I stopped. I
10 looked, continued to walk. And, yeah, he was like,
11 "Hey, come over here." You know, and then that was
12 that.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comments?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: None.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I would move
17 that we grant the appeal for Charles Gardiner, based
18 upon time and distance and the fact that he reported all
19 these issues.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion. Is
21 there a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Oh. Second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
24 question on the motion?

25 All in favor, say "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

3 Passes unanimously. And we'll issue you a
4 card.

5 MR. GARDINER: All right. Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Joseph Gennuso?

7 MR. GENNUSO: Yes, sir.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let's see. Investigator
9 Saladino.

10 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.
11 The applicant was denied for a 2010 battery with
12 substantial bodily harm, and it was a felony, where the
13 applicant received three years of probation. He did
14 disclose the arrest, provided court documents, and knew
15 that because of this, this case, that he would come
16 today before the Board for the appeal hearing. That was
17 the only arrest in his history when we got his
18 fingerprints and everything. And he did disclose it.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So this happened in 2010?

20 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So probation ended in
22 '13, '14?

23 MR. SALADINO: The last part of '13.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So nothing with
25 the system after the last part of '13?

1 MR. SALADINO: Right.

2 MR. GENNUSO: If I may say, that actually was
3 an incident that happened in December, December 20th of
4 2008, and the arrest itself took place in 2010 for it.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us
6 about the circumstances surrounding that?

7 MR. GENNUSO: Kind of an interesting situation.
8 Not sure if you guys remember the wedding chapel brawl
9 downtown. Turned out to be a pretty big mess, if you
10 will, between the Hells Angels and the Mongrels.

11 I was invited as an actual guest of the
12 daughter of the actual groom. Which I had just met her
13 three weeks prior at my job at the time that leased a
14 space inside the Hard Rock. She asked if I wanted to
15 go. Got there. Unbeknownst to me, her dad was the
16 president of the Hells Angels. There was Hells Angels
17 standing outside of the chapel when I arrived. And I
18 actually was looking around in kind of disbelief myself.
19 After, she was, "Oh, by the way, my dad's president of
20 the Hells Angels." I was like, okay, well, we're at a
21 wedding chapel, what could happen?

22 So that's where it passed, the whole thing. A
23 big fight breaks out. Not to go into a full detail, it
24 was 1700, the disposition on the thing. The fight took
25 place. I heard a woman screaming from inside the

1 chapel. I believed that was the woman that I was there
2 with. And I knew that she was never away from her dad's
3 side. After that time, I ran inside the chapel. A big
4 fight's going on. I'm walking into it. I noticed that
5 the girlfriend is nowhere around. I see her brother,
6 which is the groom, standing around a pile of people
7 that are on top of her dad. I put my arm around him.

8 At the time, so you guys also understand, I was
9 working as a bail enforcement agent. So I put my arm
10 around him, and I'm backing away from the pile of these
11 people with him, and I heard somebody yell, "Knife." At
12 the time, there was a guy crawling towards us, just
13 flailing his arms wildly. I backed away, and I hit him
14 two times. It shows on the tape. It was, it came out
15 in testimony and everything during the trial.

16 That's, that was my whole involvement. I
17 backed away from that, knowing, like I said, being a
18 bail enforcement agent, I put my hands on this guy, I
19 was now liable for his wellbeing. So watching him run
20 across the run room, fell into the wall and was being
21 jumped by four or five different guys, I took it upon
22 myself, got in the middle of it, grabbed him by his
23 shirt, and drug him out the door and threw him down
24 behind the big gazebo.

25 That was my whole involvement. At some point,

1 I turned around and ran and got into my car and left the
2 property.

3 Two years after that, that's when the actual
4 indictments were handed down, everything went on. Court
5 was going on. The trial was going on. And after so
6 many continuances, I felt the only way I was going to be
7 able to at that point, you know, get on with my life was
8 just take a deal. I wanted to go to court with this.
9 And the D.A., for one reason, time after time after time
10 after time, kept continuing it. So at that point, I
11 took a deal and took the felony battery.

12 Because, like I said, I wanted to go in front
13 of the judge and be able to argue my case on why it was
14 self-defense on my part. A guy's coming at me with a
15 knife. And I actually asked the investigator, "So,
16 should I let him stab me?" And he goes, "Well, yeah,
17 then you have self-defense." I was like, "Well, if he
18 stabbed me the right way, I'm not here, and now you guys
19 have a murder trial on the other end, too."

20 So I took it upon myself and just took that
21 deal at the time. Which I now realize has altered my
22 life for the worst. I mean at that point, I was, being
23 a bail person, you know, I was well on my way to working
24 into going to Metro and being SWAT by this time. That
25 was my life's goal. And this has since destroyed all of

1 it.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
3 comments or questions?

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

6 MR. GENNUSO: If I can make one last statement
7 on my own behalf?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

9 MR. GENNUSO: I just, I know what it looks like
10 on paper. And I can assure you folks that that's not
11 the gentleman that's standing before you today. I'm a
12 family man. I have a brand-new son that's actually 17
13 months old. He's in the hospital today because he's
14 having issues. He's got Down syndrome.

15 I've worked in multiple aspects of helping
16 people reacclimate to daily life from the military. I
17 donate my time with at-risk youth. I do all the things
18 that I can to help out the community, if you will.
19 Because, again, I wasn't born here, but I've been here
20 since I was 10 months old, and I love Las Vegas. And I
21 want to make it a better place.

22 And I'm just respectfully requesting from the
23 Board an opportunity to be able to get back to the only
24 thing I've ever done in my life, which is security work
25 and helping out in that nature. So I appreciate your

1 guys' time today.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Thank you.

3 Entertain a motion.

4 Second call for a motion.

5 I'd move that we grant the appeal for Joseph
6 Gennuso. Is there a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
9 and a second. Is there any comment or question on the
10 motion?

11 I make the motion because I am a little bit
12 familiar with the transaction that took place at the
13 incident. It was a long, drawn-out prosecution process
14 with a lot of possibly questionable antics by the state
15 as well as a lot of criminal defense attorneys that I
16 recall. And that's borne by the -- when you say it
17 happened in 2008 and then you weren't in the system
18 until 2010, that indicates the labor necessary to at
19 least bring the indictments.

20 So usually this would be a tough call. If it
21 would have been battery with substantial bodily harm,
22 just because you met somebody and got into it with
23 somebody, I probably wouldn't have made that motion.
24 But, like I say, I was familiar with the activity
25 associated with that occurrence at that particular

1 location. And the fact that you weren't in the best
2 company in the world.

3 MR. GENNUSO: I had just met those folks that
4 day, unfortunately.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But the fact that you're
6 not before us for anything since then says a lot. So
7 that's why, that's why I made the motion.

8 MR. GENNUSO: Thank you, sir.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I just, if I may, I just
12 have one question for Mr. Gennuso.

13 Were you a member of the -- were you associated
14 with, other than being with the daughter of the head of
15 the group, were you associated with any of the groups,
16 the motorcycle groups?

17 MR. GENNUSO: No, sir. I actually, I had just
18 met those people that day and met the daughter three
19 weeks prior at my actual job. And after this incident
20 took place, within that, that month or two period, I
21 severed all contact with everybody involved. I didn't,
22 I didn't want to become a member. I didn't want to be
23 any kind of friends of the members. It was one of the
24 things, like I said, had ruined my dream of becoming law
25 enforcement. And I knew that I could do -- you get

1 judged by the company you keep. And I knew right then
2 and there that wasn't the company that I wanted to keep.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

5 Anything else?

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: (Shook head negatively.)

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

10 Carries unanimous. We will get you a card.

11 MR. GENNUSO: Okay. Is there something I do at
12 all, or do you guys just contact me?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We'll contact you.

14 MR. GENNUSO: Thank you. Have a good day.

15 Sir, thank you for your time and your service.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

17 Christopher Gentry?

18 MR. GENTRY: Good afternoon.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon.

20 Let's see. Investigator Saladino.

21 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.

22 The applicant was denied for a 2000 arrest out of
23 Georgia for pointing or aiming a gun at another. It was
24 a misdemeanor. The applicant received 24 months of
25 probation and restitution. The applicant stated that

1 this arrest and conviction stemmed from a law
2 enforcement incident where he was a deputy. And he did
3 disclose it on his application.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you explain
5 that a little bit for us?

6 MR. GENTRY: Yes, sir. I was a police officer
7 at the time. I had been on the force since '96. And I
8 got out on the stop and put the two individuals that
9 were fighting inside of a vehicle early in the morning.
10 I want to say it was 2:30, 3:00 in the morning, I
11 believe. That was so long ago, I don't remember
12 exactly, but. And I separated the two individuals. And
13 the wife became belligerent and started to fight and
14 argue with me.

15 And I completely mishandled the situation.
16 Instead of verbally deescalating the situation, I
17 stepped back and drew my weapon and waited for backup to
18 get there, so I could keep an eye on both of them.
19 Which I should have just deescalated it, looking back on
20 it. And, unfortunately, I just handled it incorrectly.

21 And then probably six months later, they
22 charged me, and I plead out to the two years probation.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That was a misdemeanor,
24 right?

25 MR. GENTRY: M-hm (affirmative).

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
2 questions?

3 Entertain a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
5 Christopher Gentry be granted his registration and the
6 denial be overturned.

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second? We have a motion
9 and a second. Any comment or question regarding the
10 motion?

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, first off, the
12 length of the time, the fact that he just did disclose,
13 I think, are important on this point.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

15 All in favor, say "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
18 Carries. We'll give you a card.

19 MR. GENTRY: Thank you, gentlemen. Appreciate
20 it.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Scott Heitkamp
22 ("Heet-kamp")? Did I say that right?

23 MR. HEITKAMP: "Hyte-kamp."

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Hyte-kamp." I'm sorry
25 about that.

1 MR. HEITKAMP: I've been called worse.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Investigator Donald.

3 MS. DONALD: Yes. I denied Mr. Heitkamp his
4 work card for possession and manufacturing and selling a
5 dangerous weapon. That's what the charge stated. This
6 happened in 1986. He was convicted. According to the
7 fingerprints, he received 36 months probation. And he
8 did disclose the arrest.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you fill us in on the
10 circumstances surrounding the arrest?

11 MR. HEITKAMP: Yeah. It's kind of funny. I
12 was actually walking in Riverside. And I was having a
13 carnival at the time. I was visiting some friends. And
14 I was wearing the spiked gauntlet, the -- back in the
15 '80s where like really everybody was wearing at the
16 time. The difference is because I had a ring, that when
17 I closed the fist, they classified as a brass knuckle.
18 I didn't, wasn't aware. Then I offered it to the
19 officer, and he said, "No, you're going to jail."

20 I was released on Monday. This happened on a
21 Friday night. Monday morning, I was released. The
22 judge said, "You're out of here." And I wasn't even
23 aware of the probation. They didn't tell me. They just
24 said, "You're out of here." And that was it.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All right. Any

1 Board questions?

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

3 Entertain a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I'd move that
5 we grant the appeal for Scott Heitkamp, based upon time
6 and distance and the fact that he did disclose.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
10 or question on the motion?

11 All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
14 Carries unanimous. We'll be issuing you a
15 card.

16 MR. HEITKAMP: Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Will Hopkins?
18 Good afternoon.

19 MR. HOPKINS: Good afternoon.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Investigator Maxwell.

21 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. Investigator Maxwell.
22 Mr. Hopkins was denied.

23 (The Reporter indicated there's difficulty
24 hearing Mr. Maxwell.)

25 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

1 Mr. Hopkins had 22 convictions, six at the felony level.
2 And he was initially made provisional. All the
3 convictions were found on the fingerprints, which he did
4 not initially disclose. When contacted, he did provide
5 an arrest history. There is an attached spreadsheet
6 detailing all the convictions.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Mr. Hopkins, there's
8 quite a few things. I don't know that we can go through
9 all of them in particular. Was there a particular
10 reason that you didn't disclose any of these arrests?

11 MR. HOPKINS: Well, for one, I was -- it
12 happened so long ago. Okay. I was on drugs. And I got
13 out and I got in rehab. And the reason I didn't
14 disclose it, because I was under the impression that
15 after so long, I didn't have to do it. When I got off
16 parole, my parole officer told me I didn't have to do
17 that anymore. And so.

18 I got out of jail, and I ended up having a
19 life-changing experience. You know, in 2010, I ended up
20 having, I had a cancer operation, and I survived it.
21 And that changed my whole life. You know, I went to the
22 drug program. And I've been clean ever since. And I
23 don't know. It was just my fault, you know. I admit
24 that.

25 You know, all my cases was like drug cases with

1 using drugs or petty thefts and so on. And I didn't
2 have any violence in my record. And so I was just under
3 the impression that I had to do it. But I went back to
4 L.A. since then and got a copy of all my cases and
5 stuff. And I thought they was, you know, what did they
6 say, expunged or some word. But they wasn't. And so
7 they gave me paperwork to get it done. And, you know, I
8 was just under the wrong, misinformation.

9 Since then, I came out here. And in 2012, I
10 got married. So. I'm older now, much older. And I'm
11 just trying to be a productive member of society.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

13 MR. HOPKINS: That's all.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
15 discussion?

16 Do you have anything else to add?

17 MR. HOPKINS: No, I'm just, I hope to have a
18 chance to continue to work, you know. Because now I'm a
19 grandfather and everything. I'm just trying to be
20 positive.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

22 MR. HOPKINS: I was working in a security
23 company. They said they would hire me back if I could
24 get a card.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Right. Okay.

1 MR. HOPKINS: I liked the job that I did at the
2 time that I did it. And since I've been in Vegas,
3 Las Vegas, I haven't been in any trouble or anything,
4 you know. And I think I could be a productive member of
5 society.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's see. I'd
7 make a motion to uphold the denial and deny the work
8 card for Mr. Hopkins.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
11 second to deny the appeal and uphold the denial. The
12 reason I make that motion is I understand about people
13 having a change of life and entering into the realm of
14 responsibility. But that responsibility would have been
15 to disclose all of these things. I'm pretty confident
16 that this, that this vote would have went a different
17 direction had all of those things been disclosed.

18 MR. HOPKINS: I couldn't remember dates, but I
19 did tell them I had a criminal history.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah, but the application
21 doesn't say, just give a what you remember. It asks you
22 for arrests. So that's why I'm making it. You know, we
23 have to vote on it.

24 MR. HOPKINS: Yeah.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other conversation or

1 discussion or question regarding the motion?

2 All in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

5 Carries unanimous. You're welcome to reapply
6 in a year, and disclose everything.

7 MR. HOPKINS: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 Number 63, Douglas Jefferson?

10 Good afternoon.

11 MR. JEFFERSON: Good afternoon.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have
13 Investigator Maxwell.

14 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2005,
15 Mr. Jefferson had a felony robbery charge out of
16 California. He received probation. And he was not made
17 provisional as the arrest was disclosed on his
18 application form.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us what
20 that, what was, what happened, how that robbery
21 occurred?

22 MR. JEFFERSON: The actual robbery occurred in
23 2004. Being young, childish and immature, I was with a
24 bunch of friends, celebrating a birthday. One of my
25 friends committed a robbery. Which actually he snatched

1 a purse. I didn't do anything to stop him. So when I
2 was apprehended by the police, I actually took full
3 responsibility of my part. I didn't go through a trial.
4 I pleaded not -- I pleaded guilty. I completed one year
5 county jail time and a five-year felony probation.

6 Since then, I've had kids. I've matured. I've
7 worked security for awhile in California and had various
8 other jobs, also.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: When was it that you were
10 officially off paper?

11 MR. JEFFERSON: I believe, it was 2012.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 2012?

13 MR. JEFFERSON: Yes.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
15 questions?

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Just one, sir. What
17 type of work are you doing now?

18 MR. JEFFERSON: Right now, I'm not doing any.
19 I just got to Nevada full-time two weeks ago. But
20 before I came, I was doing security. I'm actually still
21 hired with the company until further notice.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's in California?

23 MR. JEFFERSON: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a

1 motion.

2 I'd move that we overturn the denial and grant
3 the appeal for Douglas Jefferson.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
6 second. Any Board comment or question regarding the
7 motion?

8 I have a comment. For me, you're right at that
9 level where it would be maybe not enough time has gone
10 by, but maybe so. But the fact that there hasn't been
11 anything other than that is probably the deciding factor
12 for me and the reason I made it. So.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board comment?
15 Yes, sir.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I
17 can support the motion, because he did disclose it.
18 It's been 10 years since he got off of probation. He
19 has absolutely no other criminal history. So I can
20 support the motion. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 All in favor, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

25 Carries unanimous. We will get you a card.

1 Thank you.

2 Anthony Johnson?

3 Good afternoon.

4 MR. JOHNSON: Good afternoon.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Investigator Donald.

6 MS. DONALD: Yes. In 2010, Mr. Johnson was
7 arrested for possession of controlled substance and
8 probation violation. This was taken off the
9 fingerprint. The disposition was unknown. However,
10 Mr. Johnson stated he received one year probation and
11 attended classes.

12 In 2005, he was 17 at the time of the
13 conviction of kidnapping, but he was tried as an adult,
14 and he was charged with a felony. He had multiple
15 probation violations. When we looked at court
16 documents, it was still, had been going on in 2010. So
17 he did end up being tried as an adult, and the case went
18 on for several years because of probation violations.

19 He did disclose both arrests, however.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us what
21 happened? First, start with the kidnapping. What was
22 that situation?

23 MR. JOHNSON: I was 17. It was a Friday, I
24 believe. Walking to the store. Seen a group of kids
25 that went to another school, that was with two other

1 girls. We were with a bunch of kids ourselves. Walking
2 back to the apartments, one of the girls was walking in
3 the front. I was walking in the front with her. The
4 other group, the rest of the group was in the back. And
5 when we got to the apartments, two of the dudes that we
6 met, Stoosh, he was having a discussion and arguing with
7 one of the chicks. He slapped her. She left her friend
8 behind. We ended up walking her friend back to 7-Eleven
9 where we met them. And when we walked back to the
10 house, we got arrested, got pulled over.

11 The girl came out of the house and told the
12 police that we was with a group of people and kidnapped
13 her and had a gun to her back.

14 There was no gun. She walked, she walked on
15 her own. There was no force. There was nothing
16 kidnapiish about the whole situation. We was just with a
17 bunch of kids. She walked on her own. The guys that
18 she was with, you know, were having an argument with
19 her. He slapped her. She left her friend. And by me
20 walking her friend back to the 7-Eleven, and then that's
21 how I got arrested.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did you take a
23 plea, or did you go to trial?

24 MR. JOHNSON: Well, they postponed it for nine
25 months. And at the end of December, of the nine months,

1 they told me that I did my one-year service and that I'd
2 get a five-year probation, and I was done with it. I
3 didn't plead. So.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What about the possession
5 of controlled substance in 2010?

6 MR. JOHNSON: I was at a girlfriend's cousin's
7 house. And before he left, he asked me to hold
8 something. I held it. I went to sleep in the chair.
9 And by the time I woke up the next morning, there was a
10 police sweep. They wasn't there for me. But the person
11 that they was there for was no longer there. And I
12 ended up just getting caught up in the sweep.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So that was a violation
14 of the probation for the kidnapping?

15 MR. JOHNSON: Yes.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So what kind of
17 time did you do?

18 MR. JOHNSON: I did maybe two weeks and some
19 classes. And I was on -- ran a few tests for like
20 violence.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So when were you
22 off paper?

23 MR. JOHNSON: Off paper was -- for which case?

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: At the end of the day,
25 when they're all done.

1 MR. JOHNSON: Just for the kidnapping case, I
2 was done by 2010. I'm not sure of the exact dates or
3 time that it led me to be done. But I was done in 2010.
4 I was on a five-year probation on the kidnapping
5 situation.

6 The 2010 case, I did my classes. I paid for
7 the classes. And, I believe, I was done within a couple
8 of months of getting arrested.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So nothing else in the
10 last eight years?

11 MR. JOHNSON: Nothing else. I was working for
12 CSC. I was working for Acne. I just moved on. When I
13 got the phone call that my guard card was being
14 suspended, I ended up getting another kind of job at
15 Coffee Cakes, South Buffalo. Nothing else.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.
17 Any other Board questions?

18 I'd move that we overturn the denial and issue
19 a card to Anthony Johnson.

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Again, it's a matter of
22 being a close call. But coming from that background and
23 not being responsible for anything else, at least that
24 you've been caught for or charged with, in the last
25 eight years says something. So I'm taking you at your

1 word that you're a different person.

2 MR. JOHNSON: Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I would imagine that your
4 wife, who's sitting behind you, thinks that you're a
5 different person. Otherwise, she wouldn't waste her
6 time.

7 MR. JOHNSON: Right. And she has a 14-year-old
8 son. I told her about the case in the first place, so.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion
10 and a second. Is there any Board, further Board comment
11 or question on the motion?

12 All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
15 Carries unanimous.

16 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

18 Ora Johnson?

19 Good afternoon.

20 MS. JOHNSON: Good afternoon.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We may need to move that
22 over. Can you -- yes, move to that chair. That would
23 be great.

24 MS. JOHNSON: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

1 All right. Investigator Donald.

2 MS. DONALD: In 2008, Ms. Johnson was convicted
3 of battery out of California. She received probation,
4 some jail time, and it was dismissed under 1203.4.
5 Don't know if that was a felony or a misdemeanor. It
6 wasn't clear in the fingerprints.

7 In 2007, she had a conviction for domestic
8 battery. It was a misdemeanor.

9 In 1973, and this was originally why she was
10 denied, she was convicted of grand theft, which was a
11 felony.

12 In 1973, additionally, she also had a burglary
13 charge where she was convicted of a felony.

14 And in 1971, out of California state, she had a
15 grand larceny felony charge, which she was convicted.

16 She did serve some time in prison in the '70s,
17 but the fingerprint report wasn't very clear on how much
18 time she served. She did disclose all her arrests,
19 however.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Let's see. Let's
21 work backwards. What was the circumstances behind the
22 battery in 2008?

23 MS. JOHNSON: Well, I think, I was living in an
24 apartment. And I don't think I did. The lady jumped on
25 me, beat me in my head. I went to the hospital. She

1 called the police. And I should have went to court and
2 had her arrested. I didn't. I just took the beating.
3 So, there you are.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, what about
5 the domestic battery in 2007?

6 MS. JOHNSON: In Nevada?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

8 MS. JOHNSON: Oh, this is my daughter. Ripped
9 my blouse. Called the police. And they took me to
10 jail. I do my time, 3,500, paid everything. So now I'm
11 here. She wants to live with me. No, thank you. I
12 live by myself, so I won't have that problem again.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And then, 1973, a
14 California grand theft?

15 MS. JOHNSON: Oh, yeah, I was real young then.
16 And I did 16 months there. And never been back again.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And '73 for burglary?

18 MS. JOHNSON: Yeah, and watched them, and they
19 told me not to come back to the state anymore. And I've
20 never been back there or anything.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what was the
22 burglary?

23 MS. JOHNSON: Shoplifting clothes.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Shoplifting?

25 MS. JOHNSON: Yeah, for shoplifting. And now

1 I'm working with the school cross guard, doing cross
2 guard work. Which you only get 30 minutes in the
3 afternoon, 30 minutes in the morning. You get all the
4 holidays off. You get summer breaks. You get winter
5 breaks. So I do need a few more hours.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How -- I mean I see that
7 you haven't been involved in the criminal justice system
8 in the last 10 years. Well, from the date of the
9 arrest.

10 MS. JOHNSON: Yeah.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So it would be, what, six
12 years since you're all done with probation?

13 MS. JOHNSON: Yes.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And it was ultimately
15 dismissed under the California statute?

16 MS. JOHNSON: Yes.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. The thing with the
18 battery and the domestic battery, what do you do now to
19 curtail your response to adverse settings?

20 MS. JOHNSON: Walk away.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Walk away?

22 MS. JOHNSON: Just walk, walk away.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What makes you think that
24 security or PI license-type activity is where you want
25 to be?

1 MS. JOHNSON: I had a guard card before, here.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Here?

3 MS. JOHNSON: Yeah. And I worked. But I
4 didn't tell them I hadn't even listed. So when it was
5 time to renew it, they wouldn't give it to me. And I
6 went back. My mother passed away, so I went to
7 California. And so I came back, tried to apply for it.
8 And I've disclosed all my arrests.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So when you had it
10 before, was that issued by Metro?

11 MS. JOHNSON: Yes.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The police department?

13 MS. JOHNSON: Yes.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And how long did
15 you work security then?

16 MS. JOHNSON: For the whole year.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: The year?

18 MS. JOHNSON: Yeah.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

20 MS. JOHNSON: And I didn't want to continue to
21 try to work and lie to my company and get me in trouble
22 and get the company in trouble.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

24 MS. JOHNSON: Yeah.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What year was that?

1 MS. JOHNSON: Oh, that's been over 10, 15 years
2 ago.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
4 questions?

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would move that the
10 registration for Ora Johnson be issued and the denial be
11 overturned.

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second? We
14 have a motion and a second. Any Board comment or
15 questions on the motion?

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, to address the
17 motion, the batteries, the battery and the domestic
18 battery are not serious injury, and the other arrests
19 are a long time ago. So, from my perspective, we should
20 issue her the card.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

22 All in favor, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

25 Carries unanimous. We'll get you the card.

1 Thank you.

2 Mark Mallory?

3 Good afternoon.

4 MR. MALLORY: Good afternoon.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Investigator Saladino.

6 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.

7 This applicant was denied for failing to disclose, along
8 with two felony arrests, 54 in total arrests, starting
9 from 1983 and as recent as 2016. One of the felonies
10 was a false imprisonment with violence where it was 32
11 months in prison, and that was in 2002. Let's see.
12 There was another felony, robbery with a firearm in
13 1992.

14 We have uploaded a spreadsheet to document all
15 the arrests that came back on the fingerprint report.

16 In 2006, out of a hospital in California, he
17 was -- "mentally disorder parolee" was what the report
18 said released him as. And there's been numerous
19 violations of court order, violations for probation.
20 And that, like I said, started in 1983 and went to 2016,
21 with a couple felonies. And it was not disclosed on the
22 application.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Mallory, based
24 upon the reading here and on the spreadsheet and the
25 representations of the investigator, you may have a

1 right to ask for this portion of this meeting to be held
2 in private, because we may need to talk about your
3 physical and mental health.

4 MR. MALLORY: (Nodded head affirmatively.)

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And that's something that
6 you have a right to have done in a closed session if you
7 think it's warranted.

8 MR. MALLORY: I don't think that that would
9 be -- well, yeah, we could. Yes, we can, if you think
10 that that would be necessary.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No, you, you need to
12 think that that's necessary. I can't. Everything that
13 I'm going to do is going to be in an open record.

14 MR. MALLORY: Well, first of all --

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So unless you state --

16 MR. MALLORY: -- I have never had a weapon in
17 my hand and robbed anybody. So I don't know where that
18 came from.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, but before we go
20 tromping down all of these things --

21 MR. MALLORY: Yeah.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- I just want to make
23 sure you understand you have the right to maybe --
24 because they've said here that there was an issue about
25 some mental fitness.

1 MR. MALLORY: Yes.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. You have a right
3 to ask us to hold this meeting --

4 MR. MALLORY: In open court, yes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And if you don't want
6 this meeting closed --

7 MR. MALLORY: I can have a closed meeting.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You can have a closed
9 meeting if you want it. But I can't close it because I
10 feel like it.

11 MR. MALLORY: Okay.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. So if you
13 don't want it closed, it's not closed.

14 MR. MALLORY: We can have a closed meeting.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You want a closed
16 meeting?

17 MR. MALLORY: Yes, as far as I see lies in my
18 files.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. All right.

20 MR. MALLORY: And I've got four uncles that --

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Wait a minute.
22 We'll do that in closed session.

23 MR. MALLORY: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay?

25 So what we're going to do is close this portion

1 of the meeting. But you'll need to stick by close,
2 because when we're done, we have to reopen it and make
3 our decision in front of the public.

4 MR. MALLORY: Exactly.

5 MR. INGRAM: Will you escort everybody out,
6 down the hall a little ways.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So we'll be right back to
8 you as soon as we can get through the evidentiary
9 portion of this matter.

10 MR. INGRAM: So all of you in attendance need
11 to exit now.

12 And, Zach, just hang out there. Take them down
13 the hall a little ways. And then we'll let you know
14 when to bring them back in. Thank you.

15 * * * * *

16 (From 12:50 to 1:07 p.m., a closed session of the
17 meeting was held, after which the meeting was then
18 opened back up to the public and resumed as follows.)

19 * * * * *

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Everybody that
21 wants in, in?

22 Okay. We've finished that portion of the
23 presentation to where we bring you all back in, because
24 we can't make a decision in closed session, because this
25 is all supposed to be open and ready to go.

1 So now we're moving back into open session.
2 And we're continuing with the matter with regard to the
3 appeal of Mark Mallory.

4 Mr. Nadeau?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

6 Investigator Saladino, since we're back in open
7 session, I wanted to ask that question again. All of
8 this information that's provided in this spreadsheet
9 came off of the fingerprint record from the FBI; is that
10 correct?

11 MR. SALADINO: That is correct, sir.

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, MR. Chairman.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

14 All right. We've gone through the
15 investigator's presentation. We've heard what you've
16 had to say, Mr. Mallory. So based upon that, unless you
17 have something to add --

18 MR. MALLORY: (Shook head negatively.)

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- I'll call for a vote.
20 All right?

21 MR. MALLORY: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So item number 66
23 for Mark Mallory, do we have any other questions by the
24 Board?

25 Do we have a motion?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I'll make a
2 motion.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

4 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I would move
5 that the denial for Mark Mallory be upheld.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
8 second to uphold the denial. Any Board questions or
9 comments regarding the motion?

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, based on the
11 criminal history that we have, if Mr. Mallory has --
12 contends that it's not accurate, then it's his
13 responsibility to go through and question those things
14 that he feels are inaccurate, you know, follow the
15 process if he feels those things are inaccurate.

16 But, I think, the recency of the criminal
17 history is more than enough to justify denial.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

19 Any other Board conversation, question?

20 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor of the
22 motion, say "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
25 Carries unanimously.

1 We've denied your appeal and upheld the denial.

2 MR. MALLORY: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So you can reapply in a
4 year.

5 MR. MALLORY: Yes. Okay. Do you send me a
6 paper saying that, in the mail, that I was denied?

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I don't believe that's
8 usually the process, because you're here now.

9 MR. MALLORY: Uh-huh (affirmative).

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And we are ending, you
11 know, our decision --

12 MR. MALLORY: I'm saying do I get any legal
13 paper saying that I was denied?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, you can go on to
15 the website after the court reporter --

16 MR. MALLORY: Right.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- puts on the minutes.
18 And all of the minutes by the stenographer --

19 MR. MALLORY: Right.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- indicate that to be
21 the case, I believe.

22 MR. MALLORY: Thank you so very much.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 MR. MALLORY: I'm not accurate on all the
25 computer stuff. Okay. Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you. Appreciate
2 it.

3 MR. MALLORY: M-hm (affirmative).

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 67, Russel McGinnis?

5 MR. MCGINNIS: Good afternoon.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you doing?

7 MR. MCGINNIS: I'm good.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Who's the investigator?

9 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

11 MR. MAXWELL: Mr. McGinnis was denied for a
12 1989 possess, sell, manufacture dangerous weapons
13 conviction out of California, for which he received 12
14 months probation. He was not made provisional because
15 he disclosed the arrest at the time of his application.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

17 Can you tell us the circumstances surrounding
18 that charge?

19 MR. MCGINNIS: Firstly, I didn't know all of
20 that was on there. The only thing I was arrested for
21 was I was going to pick up my cousin's two kids, because
22 their parents were both on crack. And this is right
23 after I got out of the military. So I was going to pick
24 the kids up, take them to the pier fishing.

25 I was walking in the front of the apartments,

1 and a bunch of people ran past me. So I'm not going to
2 turn around to run because everybody runs past me. I
3 didn't hear anything. I didn't see anything. So I kept
4 walking. Got to, just about the to steps to go
5 upstairs, and somebody said, "Hey, you." And I turned
6 around, and it was the sheriff. So he says, "What are
7 you doing here?" So I said, "Well, I'm going to get my
8 cousin's kids, take them fishing." He says, "Okay.
9 Cool. Come here. Do you have any weapons?" Which I
10 had my fishing knife.

11 Back then, BDUs had a thigh pocket. So I was
12 rushed and I put my fishing knife in my thigh pocket.
13 And I walked over to him, and I told him. He said, "Do
14 you have any weapons?" I said, "Yes, I have my fishing
15 knife in my pocket." And that was the whole thing. And
16 he said, "I could let you go, but it is a concealed
17 weapon, so I have to take you in."

18 And that, that was the whole thing.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did you get any
20 jail time?

21 MR. MCGINNIS: No, sir. I actually only spent
22 three years on probation.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you for your
24 service, by the way.

25 MR. MCGINNIS: Oh, thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And nothing since
2 then?

3 MR. MCGINNIS: No, sir. I've had -- been
4 cleared. I've worked superbowl. I work the Oscars
5 every year. I work, I work for Insomiac now, which we
6 do EDC out here. And pretty much that's all I've been
7 doing for the past 10 or 12 years, besides working for
8 the school district as security.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. But everything in
10 California?

11 MR. MCGINNIS: Yes, everything in California.
12 Although I did work EDC out here, but I didn't have a
13 position where I needed a guard card.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did events service-type
15 stuff?

16 MR. MCGINNIS: Yes, pretty much, with Insomiac.

17 MR. INGRAM: You're employed by Insomiac?

18 MR. MCGINNIS: Yes, sir, I am.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board
20 questions?

21 Entertain a motion.

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I would move
23 that we overturn the denial on Russel A. McGinnis and
24 grant him a card.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

2 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: That's based on --

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
4 second. Okay. Motion and a second. Any Board comment
5 or question?

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, sir. That's based
7 upon the distance and the fact that he did disclose it.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

9 All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
12 Carries unanimous. We'll get you a card.

13 MR. MCGINNIS: Thank you very much.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Jamar Morris?

15 Good afternoon.

16 MR. MORRIS: Thank you. Good afternoon.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Investigator Saladino.

18 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.

19 The applicant was denied for a 1992 second degree
20 burglary, which was a felony, out of Missouri, where the
21 applicant received three years of probation and 50 hours
22 of community service. The applicant did disclose the
23 arrest and conviction and provided court documents as
24 well. And that was the only arrest on his history.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you give us a

1 rundown on that?

2 MR. MORRIS: Sure. I was -- actually, I never
3 touched it or went inside the home. What it was, I was
4 doing a favor for a friend of a friend, asked me to take
5 him somewhere. Took him to the location. I have no
6 intentions of robbing nobody. He's -- he goes in with
7 another friend of his to his apartment. And I'm sitting
8 in the car the next time the police come up the street.
9 And they asked me what I'm doing. I said, "I'm waiting
10 on some friends that's in this apartment up here." And
11 that's it, you know. He said, "We have a call that
12 there's a burglary in place, taking place." And I'm
13 like, ah, I'm like in shock and disbelief, and I don't
14 know what's going on.

15 And so the next thing I know, they impound the
16 car, locked me up. And they released me. I didn't know
17 I had a warrant for a year later, you know, and why I'm
18 getting probation. I took probation. I was only like
19 18 or 19 years old. Because I wanted to get back out of
20 jail. They said, "You plead, we get you probation, you
21 get out of jail today." I wanted to go home.

22 So the lawyer said he would get me SIS, meaning
23 that my record's going to be clear when I complete the
24 probation. I knew I'd complete the probation, because I
25 wasn't a criminal. I had a job. I was, you know, doing

1 things. So. I completed the probation course. And
2 that's it.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That's it. Okay. Any
4 other Board questions?

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

6 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
9 we overturn the denial on Jamar D. Morris based upon the
10 time, distance and the fact that he did disclose.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
14 second. Any Board comment or question on the motion?
15 All in favor?

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
18 Carries unanimous. We'll get you a card.

19 MR. MORRIS: Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 Paul Nader?

22 Good afternoon.

23 Investigator Saladino.

24 MR. SALADINO: Yes. The applicant was denied
25 for a 1990 felony statutory rape where he received two

1 years in prison. The applicant was denied in 2016 and
2 is now reapplying. There was a mishap with the
3 scheduling. And that's why he's here now reapplying.
4 He did disclose the arrest. And that's why we're here
5 today.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So you were here
7 once before doing this, right?

8 MR. NADER: I was about five minutes late and
9 was denied. So I showed up after five.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh.

11 MR. NADER: Really late, so. I just had the
12 wrong information, so.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So you waited the
14 year, and now you're here?

15 MR. NADER: Yeah. I went back to Detroit and
16 came back here, so.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us
18 about the criminal charge, what were the circumstances
19 around that?

20 MR. NADER: Yes. I just came out of the Army,
21 after a few years. And I -- neighbor's friends. We
22 hung out with some people. And the -- it wasn't the
23 girl, it was the parents that might have pressed the
24 charges. And according -- the girl said -- she lied.
25 And there was no violence. It was consensual. But the

1 parents wanted to, you know, press charges.

2 And I was 20 at the time, very, you know, still
3 naive at that time. It was so long ago, it was --

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How old was the girl?

5 MR. NADER: I think, it was 16, something like
6 that, so.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How much time did
8 you do?

9 MR. NADER: Five months.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Five months.

11 MR. NADER: Got out a month early for good
12 behavior, and.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

14 MR. NADER: It was so long ago. I'm such a
15 different person. And, you know, it's -- it's been
16 haunting me for the last 30 years, and.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

18 MR. NADER: So, God, I wish I could take that
19 day back.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Well, at least you
21 got a wish for 365 days every year.

22 Any other Board questions or comments?

23 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, I move that
2 Paul J. Nader, that his registration be issued and the
3 denial be overturned.

4 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
6 second. Any Board comment or question?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, again, he
8 disclosed it, and it's been a long time.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you, sir.
10 All in favor, say "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
13 Carries unanimous. We'll give you a card.

14 MR. NADER: Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

16 Jose Ocasio?

17 MR. INGRAM: Is there anyone currently in here
18 that has not been sworn in? Everybody's been sworn in?

19 Thank you.

20 MR. OCASIO: Good afternoon.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon. How are
22 you?

23 MR. OCASIO: Commission and Board.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. We got
25 Investigator Saladino.

1 MR. SALADINO: Yes. And the applicant was
2 denied for a 1989 criminal sale of controlled substance
3 out of New York, where he received a six-month jail
4 term. This was not disclosed.

5 There was a 1994 abuse or abandonment, cruelty
6 of a child, which was a felony, out of New Jersey. The
7 applicant did disclose this arrest.

8 And of the two convictions, the two felony
9 convictions, he did list one of them.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there a reason
11 why you didn't list the controlled substance arrest?

12 MR. OCASIO: Yes. I believe, they told me that
13 after a few years, they will close it out. And I never
14 bothered. Because I didn't know, I knew nothing about
15 the law. I was a child. I was a kid.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How old were you in '89?

17 MR. OCASIO: Well, born in 1963. I'm 55.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: That doesn't give me this
19 info. You look pretty young.

20 MR. OCASIO: Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what was the
22 circumstances? Well, let's go back to the '89
23 controlled substance. They got you for the sale.

24 MR. OCASIO: It's been a long -- it's been very
25 rough for me with my family. They've been with drugs,

1 prostitution, selling. And I decided to leave New York,
2 to leave my parents. And they taught me drugs and
3 whatever have you.

4 But as far as at the time, I have a stepsister.
5 She was 14 years old. This is the family I never knew.
6 And she was 14 years old, and she had four kids. One
7 day, I decided to go and visit her. And there was this
8 guy what is nude. So I got into a fight with him. And
9 she was crying. \$4,000. Because I first was looking
10 for her, because the childrens was not going to school.
11 And I got in a fight with the guy. And they said I did
12 it, my own sister, stepsister.

13 So I left it just like that. When I was in
14 jail, I said, "Why is she saying I do this and that?"
15 And she got fined \$4,000. So I tried to fight it inside
16 the jail, and they said it was too late, because now
17 they had to send me someplace else. So on good terms, I
18 was there for 48 days, and which I have all the records
19 here.

20 And then, after that, they told me that, okay,
21 but the reason was that, when I got into the fight, "You
22 was forgetting that there were kids in there." So they
23 put it as endangering the welfare of the childrens.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What have you done
25 for work?

1 MR. OCASIO: I worked Santa Sand Yards
2 (phonetic spelling). I was a very excellent carpenter.
3 And I can't do that anymore. I paid child support. And
4 which I already paid enough to pay for college. Now I
5 can't get a job. So I'm trying to see if I can get a
6 second chance and get an eight-dollar job. Paying 700
7 for college, you know, and it's hard.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. How many kids do
9 you got?

10 MR. OCASIO: One.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: One. Okay.

12 MR. OCASIO: The boy, he's 19 now.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Where's he at?

14 MR. OCASIO: In New York. I mean New Jersey.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How did you get to
16 Las Vegas?

17 MR. OCASIO: So I've been around, met this
18 wonderful woman, been married with her for 20 years.
19 And I'm sorry I'm broke. She's taken care of me all my
20 life, I think, the cycle, stuff that I do. And that's
21 about it. I can't get a steady job because of this.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
23 questions, comments?

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

1 MR. OCASIO: And I'm sorry, Commissioner.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No problem.

3 Entertain a motion.

4 I'd move that we overturn the denial and issue
5 a card to Jose Ocasio.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: There's a motion and a
8 second. Is there any Board discussion on the motion?

9 I make the motion because of the age of the
10 crime, and I can buy the fact that there was a
11 misunderstanding about the lack of disclosure for the
12 criminal sale of controlled substance. If you were
13 willing to put down the abuse and abandonment and
14 cruelty to a child, and you forgot the one that was five
15 years before that, I don't imagine it was done
16 purposeful. So that's my reasoning.

17 Any other Board comment or question?

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

22 Okay. We will give you a card.

23 MR. OCASIO: Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

25 John Patrick?

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I had a question for
4 counsel. I just want to make sure for my own clarity.

5 Any vote that we have, any vote that we take,
6 in order for the motion to pass, has to be unanimous
7 wrong the three of us?

8 MS. BORDELOVE: No.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: It doesn't?

10 MS. BORDELOVE: No. It just has to be a
11 majority of the members present. You have to have a
12 quorum, at least three of you, to be able to have the
13 meeting.

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

15 MS. BORDELOVE: But then, at any point, the
16 vote just needs to be a majority of the members present.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Good afternoon.

19 MR. PATRICK: Good afternoon.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let's see. You're John
21 Patrick?

22 MR. PATRICK: Yes, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We're looking at
24 Investigator Saladino.

25 MR. SALADINO: Yes. The applicant was denied

1 for a 1995 sale of controlled substance, which was a
2 felony. He received three years and two months in
3 prison. The applicant did disclose it.

4 And there was a 2001 carrying of a concealed
5 weapon, also out of California, where there was a
6 six-month jail term. And this was also disclosed as
7 well.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us the
9 circumstances surrounding the controlled substance?

10 MR. PATRICK: Yes. Actually, you know, growing
11 up Los Angeles, you know, I have three brothers, you
12 know. And me personally, they actually found it on the
13 ground. And, you know, about me being in the yard along
14 with my brothers, about me being the oldest, they
15 actually, you know, bypassed them and put it on me. So
16 I actually, being a big brother, I took it and went on
17 ahead and done the time for it.

18 But, you know, during those times, you know, I
19 actually learned my lesson. I paid my debt back to
20 society. That's why I'm here now, to see if you guys
21 can grant me, you know, my guard card so I can continue
22 to work doing security work.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what was the
24 circumstance surrounding the 2001 carrying a concealed
25 weapon?

1 MR. PATRICK: Actually, same situation. I was
2 walking, my brothers, you know. The area we lived in,
3 it's -- it was kind of chaotic, you know, as far as, you
4 know, the gang, your gangs and the whatnot. So I took
5 initiative to carry, you know, a weapon with me to
6 protect them. And, you know, at that time, I was young.
7 And I walked. And as I was walking -- we was walking up
8 the street. It was on a day that, I guess, the police
9 were patrolling neighborhood, something happened. And
10 when I got to the corner, they seen us. You know, I
11 guess, we looked suspicious. So they got me. And I
12 actually told them, I said, "Look, sir, look, I have a
13 weapon on me." And when, when I disclosed that to him,
14 they rushed me to the ground, took the weapon from me,
15 took me to jail for it.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What was the weapon?

17 MR. PATRICK: What was the weapon?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah, gun, knife?

19 MR. PATRICK: It was a gun, yeah.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. You got six months
21 in jail for that?

22 MR. PATRICK: Yes. Yes, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So the selling of a
24 controlled substance, you did three years?

25 MR. PATRICK: Yes, three years, two months, out

1 of four.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What have you been
3 doing since 2001?

4 MR. PATRICK: Oh, since, since 2001, I've been
5 working various jobs, like Walmart, Toys R Us. And
6 after that, after that, I went into surgery. After
7 everything, I went to surgery. I got my thyroids
8 removed. And ever since then, I've been like going, you
9 know, in and out of jobs.

10 But now I'm here because I moved, I moved from
11 Los Angeles to here to renew my guard card. And
12 definitely I want to be able to continue to work in that
13 field, because that's what I'm good at. And I also have
14 a wife behind me that works with security as well, 15
15 years, she worked 15 years of it as well.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So most of your security
17 work's been in California?

18 MR. PATRICK: Yes.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
20 questions?

21 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
24 motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that

1 we overturn the denial on John H. Patrick based upon the
2 time and distance and the fact that he reported it.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. We have a motion.
4 Is there a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board question
7 or comment on the motion?

8 All in favor, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
11 Passes unanimous. We'll give you a card.

12 MR. PATRICK: Thank you, sir. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Jay Propes ("Prah-pes")?

14 MR. PROPEs: "Prohps."

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: "Prohps." Okay.
16 Investigator Donald.

17 MS. DONALD: Yes. In 2000, he's got a charge
18 for false statement when registering a firearm.
19 According to the fingerprints, he was convicted and
20 received probation. And he did disclose it.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Can you tell us
22 about that?

23 MR. PROPEs: It was a simple misunderstanding.
24 My ex-wife tried to get custody of my child two years
25 prior. She got a temporary restraining order. My

1 understanding and what my attorney's understanding was,
2 the second I walked into court the temporary fell off.
3 In the paperwork at the final, it said all existing
4 restraining orders were to remain in full effect. Well,
5 as far as I knew, there wasn't an existing one. So I
6 went down to purchase a firearm for work. Because I've
7 been doing security about 24 years now. And I just
8 marked no because I wasn't aware of it.

9 And undercover P.D. for Anaheim Police
10 Department wanted me as an in for a bar that I worked
11 at, they wanted me to be their cover. I told them they
12 could have come to me instead of having me arrested, but
13 that there was no illegal activities in the bar, because
14 we didn't allow it. When they didn't find anything,
15 they had to press charges.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did you go to
17 trial, or did you take a plea?

18 MR. PROPES: I took a plea, two years
19 probation. I went back and had it expunged. As well as
20 afterwards, I have actually had a permit, including
21 firearms permits in the state of Nevada since that time.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what have you
23 been doing for employment?

24 MR. PROPES: I've been doing security. I've
25 been a manager for about 11 years. I just left

1 California in March, came out here with the job
2 opportunity. And then, when my card got denied, I took
3 a temp job as a forklift operator over at Ken's
4 Dressings, which actually paid better.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
6 questions?

7 Entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I would move
9 that we overturn the denial on Jay Propes, based upon
10 the time and the distance and the fact that he did
11 disclose.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion. Do we
13 have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board comment or
16 question on the motion?

17 All in favor, say "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

20 Passes unanimous. We'll issue you a card.

21 MR. PROPEs: Thank you, guys.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

23 MR. PROPEs: Have a good day.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Ramon Sanchez, Ramon?

25 Yes.

1 MS. DONALD: That's my applicant. Gisela's
2 going to be interpreting for him.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Did the
4 stenographer understand that, we're going to have an
5 interpreter?

6 THE REPORTER: Yes.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Ms. Gisela.

8 MS. DONALD: Did you read the charge, so you
9 can tell him what I'm saying?

10 MS. CORRAL: M-hm (affirmative).

11 MS. DONALD: Okay. We received his fingerprint
12 report back. In 2006, he was convicted of a felony for
13 transportation of illegal aliens, and he received
14 probation.

15 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

16 MS. DONALD: Okay. 2005, convicted of a felony
17 for alien smuggling, received three years supervised
18 release.

19 MS. CORRAL: And what year was that?

20 MS. DONALD: 2005.

21 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

22 MS. DONALD: For bringing in and harboring
23 aliens, unknown.

24 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

25 MS. DONALD: In 2004, alien smuggling. The

1 prosecution declined to press charges.

2 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

3 MS. DONALD: There were two more charges of
4 alien smuggling; but it could be, because it's
5 California, it's possible it's the same arrest, because
6 there's prosecution declined or it's unknown.

7 2002, one count of domestic battery and false
8 imprisonment with violence, disposition unknown.

9 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

10 MS. CORRAL: He said -- I'm sorry. What was
11 the charge?

12 MS. DONALD: Domestic battery, false
13 imprisonment with violence.

14 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

15 MS. DONALD: 2001, DUI for alcohol, unknown.

16 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

17 MS. DONALD: The applicant did not disclose any
18 of the arrests. When he came into the office, Griselda,
19 the other -- one of our staff members, spoke with him
20 and explained what, you know, why we were denying him,
21 and that if he could get court documents, that would be
22 very helpful. But we didn't receive any court
23 documents.

24 So when the fingerprint results came back,
25 there is a lot of charges that are unknown whether he

1 was actually prosecuted, other than the two felonies
2 that he received that show that he had received those
3 and was convicted.

4 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

5 MR. INGRAM: What was his answer?

6 MS. CORRAL: I'm sorry?

7 MR. INGRAM: What was his answer, for the
8 record?

9 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

10 MS. CORRAL: Okay. Also, he's stating that the
11 reason why he didn't disclose anything on his
12 application is someone else helped him because of that
13 language barrier. So he didn't really understand the
14 application. So when he was -- when I asked him about
15 the court documents, he said that he didn't know he had
16 to bring -- he doesn't have any, any court documents of
17 any sort. It's been too long. He really didn't
18 remember and/or understood the process.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How many times do you
20 recall being convicted of alien smuggling?

21 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

22 MS. CORRAL: So he remembers two times being,
23 basically, stopped, driving with undocumented
24 immigrants. At the time, he didn't know they were
25 undocumented. He was giving a ride to about...

1 (Ms. Corral spoke with Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

2 MS. CORRAL: Like four people. So when they
3 got stopped by the police -- or actually not, it wasn't
4 the police; it was immigration -- he found out that they
5 didn't have any proper documentation and that they were
6 in the states illegally. And he remembers two times in
7 San Diego happening.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How many different times
9 has he spent time in jail?

10 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

11 MR. CORRAL: Okay. So he was arrested, and he
12 spent about four to five months while the investigation
13 was ongoing. After the investigation was completed,
14 they let him go.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there anything else
16 he'd like to say?

17 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

18 MS. CORRAL: So, basically, he's saying that,
19 unfortunately, it happened about, over 13 years ago. He
20 really didn't seem to have a need to disclose anything,
21 because he didn't know that he had to do it on his
22 application. Nobody really told him. And, obviously,
23 he didn't understand, because it's in English, so.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there any other
25 Board questions?

1 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: I have one, Mr. Chair.
2 What is his citizenship status?

3 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

4 MS. CORRAL: He's a resident alien. He has his
5 resident card.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Okay. That's all.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Investigator Donald.

8 MS. DONALD: Yes, I just wanted to say one
9 other thing. I have two felonies listed. It is
10 possible there was just one felony, two different
11 charges. Sometimes in California they start to tell,
12 they'll duplicate things on the record. So because he
13 was convicted of the same thing, I mean as far as
14 receiving, you know, six months custody, the three-year
15 supervision, it could have been one felony with two
16 charges. It's hard to say on that.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So --

18 MS. DONALD: But there was at least one felony.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And that was when?

20 MS. DONALD: 2006 was the latest date.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So if the burden
22 is ours to say, here's the fact, what can we prove?

23 MS. DONALD: That he does have at least one
24 felony.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: One felony?

1 MS. DONALD: Yes, and it does show that on the
2 fingerprints. And, additionally -- oh.

3 (There was a brief discussion off the record
4 between Mr. Ingram and Board Chairman Zane.)

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. I'm sorry. Any
6 other Board questions?

7 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
9 motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'd move that we -- go
12 ahead.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No, you go ahead.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'd move that we uphold
15 the denial of the work card registration on Ramon
16 Sanchez Vega.

17 The reason for this is that the language
18 barrier isn't a good enough response for me, based upon
19 what processes are available to make sure there's a full
20 understanding of what's being asked. I know that it's
21 quite a while removed, and there might be some question
22 about the repetitive nature of the list of crimes. But
23 by the same token, I think, if full disclosure was even
24 attempted, we'd have a different prospect here.

25 So from my viewpoint, he could reapply in a

1 year and disclose whatever exists in his background and
2 his history, and that would help the Board to determine
3 whether or not he's worthy of a work card or not.

4 MR. INGRAM: Do you want her to translate that,
5 too?

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, please.

7 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

8 MS. CORRAL: He was just saying that he didn't
9 know if he had to disclose. He didn't really understand
10 the application. So, obviously, he's going to make sure
11 that next time he applies that he discloses everything,
12 even if he doesn't understand. He's going to ask where
13 to disclose it. So.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Did we get a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Yeah, I believe, I
16 seconded it. Didn't I?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment
18 or question on the motion?

19 All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

22 Okay. We have upheld the denial, and you can
23 come back in a year and reapply.

24 (Ms. Corral interpreted for Mr. Sanchez Vega.)

25 MS. CORRAL: Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Tyler Schmitz?

2 MR. SCHMITZ: Hello.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How are you?

4 MR. SCHMITZ: Good, how are you?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I'm fine.

6 Investigator Saladino.

7 MR. SALADINO: Yes. The applicant was denied
8 for a 2004 carrying concealed weapon out of Wisconsin.
9 It was not disclosed on the application.

10 And there was a 2003 resisting an officer,
11 which was a misdemeanor, and he did receive a -- had to
12 pay a fine.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Was there a reason you
14 didn't disclose those two?

15 MR. SCHMITZ: The -- honestly, I didn't
16 remember, and I thought that it was not going to be on
17 the record. I was a taxi driver, and they did an FBI
18 background check as well, and none of that came up. So
19 I thought, over, beyond the time frame, and it was over.
20 Honestly, why I didn't disclose it.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And what was the
22 circumstance surrounding the resisting, or obstructing
23 an officer in 2003?

24 MR. SCHMITZ: That was with an OWI. I was
25 drunk. I was very intoxicated at that time. I was 17,

1 too, as well, when it happened. But I was just very
2 intoxicated.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. They said the OWI
4 isn't on there.

5 MR. SCHMITZ: It was all when I was a minor. I
6 was 17. My ID was messed up in Wisconsin, so it said I
7 was a year older. So I went to the jail for a night.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh. And what about the
9 CCW in 2004?

10 MR. SCHMITZ: I was driving in a friend's car.
11 We just went to the corner store, came back. I got
12 pulled over for not using my blinker. They searched the
13 vehicle, and they found my friend's gun in a gun box
14 under the passenger seat. But because I was driving, I
15 got the ticket.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
17 questions?

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What have you been doing
21 for work?

22 MR. SCHMITZ: I was a security bike patrol at a
23 gym. But when the provisional reannounced, I stopped.
24 And I've been doing Uber and Lyft for about two weeks
25 now.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Entertain a
2 motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I move that
4 we overturn the denial on Tyler Schmitz, based upon the
5 time involved here and the fact that they're both
6 misdemeanors.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Second?

8 For discussion, I'll second. We have a motion
9 and a second for overturn, for time. And I'm not
10 inclined to support the motion given the fact that there
11 was no disclosure, even though they were a while ago and
12 even though they wouldn't have kept him from being
13 considered.

14 That's a difficult call to make, because they
15 are misdemeanors.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll be honest. They're
19 fairly recent. Clearly, he remembers the circumstances.
20 And yet he didn't disclose. That's my struggle with
21 this.

22 MR. SCHMITZ: I remembered them after they were
23 brought to my attention by your investigators. But the
24 main reason I didn't disclose them, I knew it happened,
25 but I didn't disclose them because, when I started as a

1 cab driver, they did the FBI background check as well,
2 and it came back clear, and I assumed that.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: They came back with no
4 felonies.

5 MR. SCHMITZ: Okay.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board question
7 or comment?

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

9 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All in favor of the
11 motion, say "aye."

12 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Aye.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

14 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: No.

16 The motion failed. So the appeal is denied.
17 And you're free to come back in a year and reapply.
18 Thank you.

19 Desean Smith, Desean?

20 We'll trail.

21 William Tennant?

22 We'll trail.

23 Zachary Thomas?

24 Good afternoon.

25 MR. THOMAS: Good afternoon, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Investigator Maxwell.

2 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. Investigator Maxwell.

3 Mr. Thomas was denied for a 1983 felony drugs conviction
4 out of California. He was initially made provisional.
5 The arrest was not disclosed. And the disposition off
6 of the fingerprints says that he served four years in
7 prison.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You said four years
9 prison?

10 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: On the printout we have
12 here, it says 11. Is that just the term?

13 MR. INGRAM: Are you on the right one?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Tennant?

15 MR. INGRAM: Zachary -- oh, Tenant, no, we
16 trailed Tennant.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Oh, I'm sorry. I'm
18 sorry. I'm looking at the wrong guy. You could be
19 somebody else for a couple, you could be somebody else
20 for a couple minutes, in my mind anyway.

21 MR. THOMAS: I got nervous when you said 11
22 years.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: It started with a T. Now
24 I'm on the same page. Thank you.

25 Can you tell us about the circumstances of

1 that?

2 MR. THOMAS: Well, sir, I was -- grew up in
3 Los Angeles, California, in a ghetto, where they had the
4 riot. Hanging around the wrong people. Doing what they
5 do. And I got busted. And I didn't do four years. I
6 did, I think it was about two and a half. And after I
7 came home, I moved out. I moved away.

8 I've been trucking now for 17 and a half years.
9 I just got a truck in January. Before that, I did
10 security in Bakersfield, California for about two years.
11 Before that, I was working in temporary agencies and
12 doing security off and on. So.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Was there a reason
14 that you didn't disclose this when you filled out the
15 application?

16 MR. THOMAS: Well, usually, when I fill out an
17 application or anything, they go 10 years back. And
18 that's why I didn't disclose it, because it's been,
19 what, 35 years. Yeah, that's why I didn't disclose it,
20 you know. So I'm figuring 10 years, you know. It's
21 been over, it's been, like I say, 35 years. So that's
22 what I thought.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
24 questions?

25 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would move that

6 Zachary C. Thomas be issued his registration and the

7 denial be overturned.

8 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Motion. Is there a
10 second?

11 I think, we might have been talking over. Did
12 you second, Mr. Colbert?

13 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Yes, I did.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

15 Okay. We have a motion and a second. Any
16 comment or question on the motion?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, it's been 35
18 years.

19 Mr. Thomas, the next time you fill out the
20 application, disclose it.

21 MR. THOMAS: Yes, sir.

22 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

24 All in favor, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

2 Carries unanimous. We'll get you a card.

3 MR. THOMAS: Okay. I'll hear from you guys

4 through the mail, or?

5 MR. INGRAM: We'll contact you.

6 MR. THOMAS: Thank you, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

8 Curtiss Tucker?

9 Good afternoon.

10 MR. TUCKER: Good afternoon.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Let me make sure I get

12 the right guy here.

13 Investigator Maxwell.

14 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. Investigator Maxwell.

15 Mr. Tucker was denied for two felony convictions in 1998

16 out of California. He was not issued provisional as he

17 disclosed the first one, which was a felony possession

18 of narcotic controlled substance, which he was committed

19 to prison. On the fingerprints, another one showed up

20 where it says "felon in possession of a firearm," where

21 he had an eight months prison consecutive sentence. But

22 the first one was disclosed.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us about the

24 first charge, the possession of narcotics?

25 MR. TUCKER: The possession of narcotics, I was

1 young. I left home. And I was, basically, trying to
2 keep money for my sense of survival out there in the
3 street, when I left home, because I didn't want to go
4 home at the time. And I got with the wrong crowd, and
5 we got to selling it, selling narcotics. And that's
6 when I got, got...

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And then what's
8 the second charge, the felony?

9 MR. TUCKER: I was in a car with, actually, at
10 the time, my girlfriend's brother. And the police
11 pulled us over. There was a gun in the car, sitting
12 right there on the transmission part right there in the
13 car. They pulled me out. When they pulled me out, then
14 they pulled him out. And what happened was, with me
15 being out on O.R., they gave me the case with the gun.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Arrested for that charge,
17 though, they stacked it and --

18 MR. TUCKER: Yes, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: -- did it consecutively?

20 MR. TUCKER: Yes, sir. They ran it together.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Together?

22 MR. TUCKER: M-hm (affirmative).

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. What made you
24 disclose the one and not put down the other one?

25 MR. TUCKER: Because I figured that was both

1 together. I had let them know that I did have charges
2 that would happen together.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You did?

4 MR. TUCKER: I did, yeah. And I figured it was
5 together, because as I had my guard card out in
6 California, and I disclosed that. And then, when I got
7 out here, I was working for American Staffing. And I
8 disclosed that then, just like you just said. It came
9 up on there that it could stop me from working. And
10 American, had to start going to CSR.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
12 questions?

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Pleasure of the
15 Board, motion.

16 I move that we overturn the denial and issue
17 the work card.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there -- there's a
20 motion and a second. Any Board comment or discussion on
21 the motion?

22 I make the motion because I can buy the fact
23 that there was some confusion about the disclosure. And
24 from my perspective, why would you disclose one that's
25 probably more culpable than the other, if you're trying

1 to purposely hide it anyway. So I can buy the fact that
2 there was some confusion, and it probably shouldn't be
3 counted against him.

4 Any other Board comment?

5 All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

8 Carries. Unanimous. There we go, on that.

9 We'll get you a card.

10 MR. TUCKER: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: All right. Thank you.

12 Ernest Wallace?

13 Investigator Saladino.

14 MR. SALADINO: Yes. The applicant was denied
15 for a 2007 concealed weapons conviction. This was a
16 misdemeanor. The applicant received probation. He did
17 disclose it on his application. And that's why we're
18 here.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us the
20 circumstances about that?

21 MR. WALLACE: I was working for a company
22 called AT Systems Security. I was on my way home. I
23 had my jacket on. And there was another company in my
24 place, which was Justa Heights (phonetically spelled),
25 called Silver City Security, who also I worked for. And

1 the gentleman that was in there was with a girl. And we
2 had a couple words, and I told him I was going to call
3 Gene and tell him that he's got a girl in his car.
4 Which was a mistake. And then he called the police and
5 said that I pointed my gun at him.

6 So I called dispatch. I told them, I said, "I
7 didn't point my gun at him." He stops and said, "Wait."
8 So I did. So I waited. In the midst of waiting, I put
9 my jacket back on. And there was a Smith, you know,
10 inside. And when the officer came, he said he was going
11 to arrest me for, number one, pointing a gun at him.
12 But he was wondering why my gun wasn't loaded. And,
13 number two, he put down "partially concealed weapon,"
14 which I didn't know.

15 But either way he put it, it was my mistake,
16 because being a security card in Nevada from 2002
17 to 2005. And I had every license there was to have.
18 You know, I messed up by confronting him, having this
19 confrontation with this young man. He had no way out
20 but to do something, because he was about to get fired,
21 you know. But the truth, me and this gentleman, we
22 speak every time we see each other. We are not friends,
23 but we are, "Hey, how's it going?" so on and so forth.

24 I waited 12 years to get this back. I did
25 community service. I did anger management. I did

1 everything I was supposed to do to change from being --
2 not a mantra. I wouldn't say that. But just looking at
3 people more just like, "Hey, what are you doing?"
4 instead of just -- and just saying, "Hey, how's it
5 going?" Just minding my business, and going home.
6 That's it.

7 But I waited 12 years. And this business,
8 security is my life. And like I said, every license
9 there was to have in Nevada, I had it. Gaming, armed,
10 armed and private, bodyguard, I did it all. And I lost
11 everything. And I'm sitting hearing now, guys, and I'm
12 wondering. I waited 12 years like what the paper told
13 me. I'm sitting here getting my license back in five.
14 You know, which is good.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, life has also
16 changed over time. Before -- the rules have changed
17 over time. Before, any felony was no-go. And that's
18 changed over time. I mean you could have come in here
19 with a felony from 1955, and we would have said no. But
20 that's changed over time.

21 MR. WALLACE: But that's what, that's what
22 happened, like I said. And like I've been trying to be
23 at work ever since. Like I said, when I've had to put
24 in applications in the last 12 years, all they ask me
25 is, "What did you do the last 25 years?" From New York

1 to Virginia to Las Vegas, security.

2 And then having a gun charge, even though it's
3 my gun -- and my gun is sitting at home right now. I
4 got the two years probation. I went and picked it up.
5 No one will even look at me. No one will give me a
6 chance to go in and interview. Not unless someone knows
7 me and knows my character, and maybe they will talk to
8 the supervisor or the person signing, then I get the
9 job. But beyond that. And I wasn't used to that,
10 because when I was younger, I always got a call back,
11 and I always shined in interviews, I knew I was going to
12 get that job. Not today.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
14 questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Mr. Chair, I say we
19 overrule the denial for Ernest Wallace and issue him a
20 card based upon the fact that he did disclose, and it's
21 been quite a while since this issue took place.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. There's a motion.
23 Is there a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any Board comment

1 or question regarding the motion?

2 All in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

5 Passes unanimous. It looks to me like it's a
6 good day to be Wallace.

7 MR. WALLACE: That's something my daddy would
8 say, sir.

9 MR. INGRAM: We'll be in touch with you.

10 MR. WALLACE: Thanks, guys. Thank you so much.
11 Thanks.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Alton Warner?

13 Good afternoon.

14 MR. WARNER: Good afternoon.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Investigator Donald.

16 MS. DONALD: Yes. In 2003, Mr. Warner was
17 charged with a felony for making a fictitious check out
18 of California. He received formal probation, jail time,
19 and he paid restitution. He did disclose it. And he
20 did provide court documents.

21 In 1997, out of California, he was convicted of
22 a misdemeanor grand theft property. Probation, jail,
23 restitution. He disclosed that as well. And he also
24 provided court documents for that arrest and conviction.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Can you tell us -- let's

1 start with the latest one. What was the situation
2 around the check?

3 MR. WARNER: I had just, I lost my job. And
4 what he said he was going -- he said he had some money
5 for me. And he said, "Here's a check." You know, so
6 I'm like, oh, okay. I thought it was good. I didn't
7 know it was bad till I got there. And then, because
8 I -- I just, you know, I shouldn't have did it. But,
9 you know, it was a situation where I should not have. I
10 should have stayed at home. And so I did something I
11 shouldn't have done.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: How much was the check?

13 MR. WARNER: \$1,400.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And then what about the
15 grand theft property?

16 MR. WARNER: Well, that was, I was working for
17 the school district. And I ordered some uniforms. And
18 the principal said I didn't order the uniforms. And me
19 and him had words, and he put his hand on me. And I
20 body-slammed him.

21 So we went to court. And at the time, I was
22 coaching high school, Pop Warner, and the LAPD football
23 team at the same time. So they was like, "Well, okay,
24 you can't coach at L.A. Unified anymore. But, you know,
25 we're not going to, you know, give you no time."

1 Because I -- before that, I had never been in trouble.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: But I mean what was the
3 occasion that caused you to be arrested?

4 MR. WARNER: Oh, because it ended up being
5 because I had a fight with the principal, and he said
6 that I spent money, that I didn't do. He said I -- when
7 I said I ordered uniforms, I was coaching, and I ordered
8 uniforms, he said I didn't. And it was, you know, it
9 was like, basically, his word against mine and
10 everything. And I showed him the receipt, and he didn't
11 believe me.

12 And so that's why I ended up going. That's
13 what, they said I took the check without getting
14 anything.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Any other Board
16 questions?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

18 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

20 I move that we overturn the denial and issue
21 the card, based upon the amount of time that's elapsed.

22 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We have a motion and a
24 second. Any question or comment regarding the motion?

25 All in favor, say "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."
3 We'll issue you a card.

4 MR. WARNER: Thank you, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.
6 Wesley Widerholt?

7 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: He's up here.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

9 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Were you sworn in?

10 MR. WIDERHOLT: Yes, I was sworn in.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: This is for Investigator
12 Donald.

13 MS. DONALD: Okay. In 1996, Mr. Widerholt was
14 convicted of a felony, assault with a deadly weapon.

15 In '87, he was convicted of a felony, inmate
16 manufacturing a weapon.

17 And two times in '86, he was convicted once of
18 a felony, inmate manufacturing a weapon, and then an
19 armed robbery felony.

20 He disclosed all of the arrests. And I spoke
21 to him on the phone. He told me the sentences were
22 served concurrently. He was released from prison in
23 2002. And he did disclose everything.

24 He had received several years in prison. I'm
25 not sure exactly what the total amount of years he

1 spent. But he stated, you know, four years for one and
2 two years for another, five years for another arrest.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: What can you tell us
4 about your -- let's talk about the criminal stuff that's
5 outside the prison system. What can you tell me about
6 your first arrest and conviction?

7 MR. WIDERHOLT: The first arrest was
8 October 31st, 1985. I was arrested for a strong-armed
9 robbery on a store owner. Me and a couple of friends,
10 we did it. And we were arrested the same night. I was
11 19 years old. And it was extremely stupid.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: So then, after that, you
13 had two situations where, in prison where it's inmate
14 manufacturing a weapon?

15 MR. WIDERHOLT: Yes. And the dates are wrong.
16 I'm sorry. They're 1987 and 1989. One was out of --

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay.

18 MR. WIDERHOLT: One was out of Sacramento
19 County, which was old Folsom. Or new Folsom. Excuse
20 me. The other one was out of Sonora, which was
21 Jamestown. And I received two years consecutive for
22 both terms.

23 I had those weapons because I was -- I'd never
24 been in a population of these type of people before.
25 And I grew up in a small town. And a couple different

1 times I got extremely scared for my life. So I
2 manufactured those weapons in fear of my life.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. And then what
4 about the '96 assault with a deadly weapon?

5 MR. WIDERHOLT: I was at a bar. I got in a
6 confrontation with somebody. He pulled a knife. I
7 pulled a pocket knife. He put his away. I put mine
8 away. He went and called the police. Because I was on
9 parole, I was automatically found guilty. I was given
10 the maximum term, which is four years. So I had served
11 seven out of nine years, and then I served three years
12 out of four.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. So what was your
14 last occasion within the criminal justice system, either
15 on parole or any type of supervision?

16 MR. WIDERHOLT: I had a 2009 assault, but it
17 was a misdemeanor. I was on probation for about a year.
18 I was given -- I ended up filing probation. Then I did
19 a 90-day term. And that was in Nevada. That was in
20 Reno, Nevada.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what was the
22 circumstances around that?

23 MR. WIDERHOLT: I was dating a girl who stole a
24 camera from me. So I went to her house to retrieve the
25 camera. And I told -- she tried to leave the residence

1 where she was at. So I pulled a knife and I popped her
2 back tire. And the officer said that that was assault
3 with a deadly weapon. And they dropped it down to a
4 simple assault, in the courtroom.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: And what have you been
6 doing for employment in the last 10 years?

7 MR. WIDERHOLT: I've been driving truck for
8 multiple different companies, including my last job was
9 Granite Construction. Before that, I worked for Frehner
10 Construction. I was a laborer. I've worked for various
11 warehouse companies.

12 February 14, 2017, I was injured on the job.
13 Been fighting with workman's comp ever since, trying to
14 find a type of job that would be a little bit better
15 suited. I have an injury to my right wrist.

16 And I was approached at a JobConnect to
17 interview for a company called Securitas. So I
18 interviewed with her. And I disclosed to her about my
19 felony past. And she said that she only went seven
20 years back, as far as felony conviction. And then, when
21 I got your paperwork, I seen that you said any felonies.
22 So I disclosed it on your paperwork.

23 I'd also like to add that I've had a history of
24 drug problems. And October 1st, 2015 is my clean date.
25 And I have over two and a half years clean.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Congratulations.

2 MR. WIDERHOLT: Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any other Board
4 questions?

5 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

6 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I would move that
11 Wesley -- is it "Wid-r-hohlt"?

12 MR. WIDERHOLT: "Wide-r-hohlt."

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- Widerholt be issued
14 his registration and the denial be overturned. And I'll
15 explain if there's a second.

16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Please.

18 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: First off, Mr. Widerholt
19 has disclosed. I think, he's been very forthright with
20 the Board. I think, he is -- again, we have the --
21 2009?

22 MR. WIDERHOLT: Yeah.

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: -- 2009 that didn't even
24 come up, you've explained that before it showed up.

25 So I just think he's been forthright with the

1 Board. I think, he should be given an opportunity.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Anything else?

3 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. All in favor, say
5 "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

8 Passes unanimously. That's what it looks like
9 when honesty prevails.

10 MR. WIDERHOLT: Wow. Well, thank you,
11 gentlemen. And thanks for doing the investigation. You
12 know, when I applied for Amazon, they went seven years
13 back and none of this stuff popped up. So I was in
14 question of myself, well, should I disclose it on your
15 paperwork or not? And I just said yes and I disclosed
16 it. So I'm glad I did.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: I would imagine, if you
18 hadn't, though, you would have seen a different outcome.

19 MR. WIDERHOLT: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you.

21 MR. WIDERHOLT: Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Aric Young?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Not here.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Aric Young?

25 Okay. Well, let's go back down through the

1 list.

2 MR. INGRAM: 52, 55 and 57.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Item number 52,
4 Tomas Baltazar?

5 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Not here.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 55, Taham
7 Cristilli? Taham Cristilli?

8 MR. INGRAM: 62.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 62.

10 MR. INGRAM: I'm sorry. 57.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 57?

12 MR. INGRAM: Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Dexter Dukes? Dexter
14 Dukes or Dexter "Doo-kess"?

15 MR. INGRAM: And then 62.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 62, Will Hopkins?

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair, didn't we take
18 action on Mr. Hopkins? I thought we denied Mr. Hopkins.

19 MR. INGRAM: Oh, I'm sorry. We denied him.
20 Yes, correct. That's correct.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Mr. Hopkins is
22 dealt with.

23 MR. INGRAM: 75.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: 75, Desean Smith?

25 MR. INGRAM: 76.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We didn't do Mr. Tennant?

2 MR. INGRAM: No.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 76, William

4 Tennant?

5 MR. INGRAM: 82.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Number 82, Aric Young?

7 There's nobody coming forward. Could I have a
8 motion we deny all of those appeals. Well, I'll make
9 that motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: I'll second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any Board conversation or
12 question regarding the motion?

13 All in favor, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

16 Passes unanimous.

17 MR. INGRAM: There's one more item that's
18 trailed. That's item number 19, AccuSource.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Could we go back to item
20 number 19, AccuSource, Inc. But there was some question
21 about them having a scheduling conflict; is that
22 correct?

23 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Could we have a
25 motion to postpone this until the September meeting.

1 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No moved.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Is there a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Second.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any question or comment?

5 All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any opposed, say "no."

8 Passes unanimous.

9 I guess, we're at 83, Board comment and future
10 agenda items.

11 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Mr. Chair?

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Did I miss, on number 44,
14 did we -- I didn't make any notes on number 44.

15 MR. INGRAM: Yeah, we did. That was approved,
16 Mr. Riddle. That was a unanimous pass.

17 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Okay.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: We approved it.

19 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: All right. Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Okay. Is there anything
21 to raise on Board comments and future agenda items?

22 Any public comment in the north?

23 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: No public.

24 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No public.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Any public comment in the

1 south?

2 We have one public, but he's being quiet.

3 MR. SPRIGGS: Why, yes, sir. Michael Spriggs
4 has a comment, president of the Nevada Society of
5 Professional Investigators, would like to say thank you
6 to Mr. Zane for his service and being the Chairman and
7 for the professionalism you've brought to the Board.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Well, thank you.

9 MR. SPRIGGS: All of the Board members
10 respected him over the years. And I know our group, we
11 definitely have been satisfied with you being here.
12 Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Thank you very much.
14 Appreciate it. It's been a privilege to serve with all
15 of you. Thank you.

16 BOARD MEMBER NADEAU: Thank you, Mark.

17 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: Thanks, Mark.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: You bet.

19 Motion to adjourn.

20 We're adjourned.

21 MS. DONALD: It's not official till you use the
22 thing, the gavel, one last time.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN ZANE: Yeah (used gavel). We're
24 done.
