I do have a couple of points that I'd 8 like to share under item number three, if possible. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Yeah, let's go back to 10 item number three, because I got moving and forgot that 11 you did have an item you wanted to point out. Thank 12 1.3 you. 14 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir. So what we are going to start doing at every 15 Board meeting is give the Board and those in attendance 16 a breakdown of the audits, the number of work cards, the 17 number of applicants, so that the Board and those in the 18 audience can see what Board staff takes care of during 19 20 the quarters. So I've provided an additional handout to the 21 Board this morning. And if you take a look at the nice 22 little graphs that Chief Irizarry put together for you 23 here, I'll kind of walk through that so that we can get 24 it on the record. 2.5

In the time frame of September 1st through
 1
   November 30th of this year, our staff processed 2,134
 2
   work card applications. Of those work card
 3
   applications, 1,478 are now active. 37 were denied.
 4
   And all 37 have appealed. 95 are in pending status.

   And pending status could be anyone that's awaiting to be
 6
   made provisional. It could be because we're missing
 7
   information, or we have an incomplete app, or that, you

   Provisional status just, basically, means that we have

            MR. INGRAM: Hearing none, I'll go ahead and go
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On the back side of the page, you'll see the 1 forward. same time frame. We received a total of 14 corporate 2 applications for licensure. Of the 14 corporate 3 applications, we approved 13. The one that was not 4 approved was a failure to meet the minimum 5 qualifications. 6 7 We received 36 individual applications. you can see the breakdown, as far as the categories that 8 we received them in. Canine, we received three. 9 Private investigator, we received 11. Private patrol, 10 we received 19. Process servers, we received two. 11 Repossessors, we received one. And all but one of those 12 1.3 applications was approved. There was a private patrol officer that was aligning himself with that same 14 corporation that was denied who did not meet the minimum 15 qualifications, so that one was denied. 16 As far as the complaints, there were 15 total 17 complaints received by the Board. Now, these complaints 18 are over and above unlicensed activity complaints. 19 20 these are complaints on license holders. We received a 2.1 total of 15, ranging from failure to pay employees 22 correctly, working without registered work cards, insurance lapsing or -- and there were a couple that 23 were EEO complaints as well. I'm sorry. There was one 24 2.5 EEO complaint.

All of the complaints were satisfied, and we 1 2 did not write any citations of the licensees based on the outcome. There were five that were referred over to 3 the Nevada Labor Commission for some payroll issues. 4 All of those are currently being resolved or have been 5 resolved. So no citations have been issued for that. 6 7 The one complaint that went to EEOC was really not under our jurisdiction, and so the EEOC picked that up. 8 We had two of them that were complaints that 9 were not justified. I'll give you the example of one of 10 We had a complaint against a security company 11 working without a license. And when we investigated, it 12 13 was an employee of the 7-Eleven. And 7-Eleven was employing them as a security officer. And as you know, 14 a bona fide employee of a company does not have to be 15 licensed with us. So two of those were nonjustified. 16 And then the last one was pending with the City 17 of Las Vegas. The City of Las Vegas had -- there was 18 violations of the city code, not Chapter 648. 19 20 city's taken care of that. 21 Right now, on all of our complaints, when they come in, we have approximately one-week turnaround on 22 finalizing the investigations, with the exception of 23 some ongoing investigations that we are working directly 24 with IRS. We are working with some of the other local 2.5

law enforcement agencies who have taken a lead on it. 1 And then we also have the federal government involved in 2 a couple of the investigations that we're doing. 3 they take the lead on that. Once a decision's made, then we'll be able to bring those before the Board, if 5 need be. 6 7 As far as the unlicensed activity citations, we issued 10 during this quarter. Four of the 10 have been 8 paid in full. One of the citations has been sent to the 9 Controller's Office for failure to pay, and it is 10 currently in collections. And we have five citations 11 that are still within the 30-day appeal process. 12 13 I'd answer any questions with the Board may 14 have. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Do any members of the Board have any questions? 16 BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No. 17 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah. This is Ray Flynn. 18 Kevin, is it possible for us to, for you guys 19 20 to produce a year-end now, or would that be something 2.1 that would be easier going forward? MR. INGRAM: Going forward. 22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. 23 MR. INGRAM: Correct. The old database doesn't 24 have the ability to search a lot of this information 2.5

that we're now capturing in our new database. 1 2 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: M-hm (affirmative). MR. INGRAM: So I can do my best to maybe throw 3 some numbers together. But, I think, going forward 4 would be the most accurate presentation of where we are. 5 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Then, Mr. Chair, I would 6 7 ask that in the -- I'd really like that report, because it's a good overview of the activity of the PILB. And I 8 would ask that that be part of our regular meetings, a 9 quarterly report out. 10 But I'd also like to see, if it's okay with 11 you, a year-end report also, going forward. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: I agree with you, Board Member Flynn. I think, this is really good data for us 14 15 to really get a perspective on what's going on as far as unlicensed activity and all of the other things. 16 Kevin, I did have a question. What's the 17 normal turnaround on your unlicensed activity citations, 18 or do you -- I know you have some that are within the 19 20 30-day appeal process. But what's the normal turnaround 2.1 on this? MR. INGRAM: Well, the minute that we receive a 22 complaint, we open an investigation in our new database. 23 And it's assigned to Supervising Investigator Vincent 24

Saladino. After his review, he'll assign it to an

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investigator to go ahead and start gathering the data. 1 Obviously, we have Investigator Mahan there in the north 2 that we have assigned a couple to. He's done a 3 fantastic job following up on those. And then in the 4 south. 5 General turnaround, as far as gathering 6 7 information, is anywhere from, what, one to three weeks, Vinny? 8 MR. SALADINO: (Nodded head.) 9 MR. INGRAM: So about one to three weeks on the 10 fact-gathering, depending on how complicated it is. 11 I said, some of the investigations uncover criminal 12 1.3 violations. And at that time, we involve the appropriate authorities for that. 14 15 As far as closure of the investigation, it could be as quickly as one day. Or, as I've said, we 16 have some that just came in yesterday, as a matter of 17 fact, that have not been assigned yet. And a couple of 18 them look like it might take months to complete the 19 20 investigation, based on a cursory review. 21 But general turnaround, as long as we have all the information, is approximately one week. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Good. 23 Thank 24 you. Any other questions from the Board? 2.5

Seeing none, Kevin, would you mind introducing 1 2 the PILB staff. 3 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. I would love to do that. Thank you. 4 To my left is Board Counsel Rosalie Bordelove. 5 She's been our Board Counsel for quite a while now. 6 7 we have a really good working relationship with her and her staff. Directly to her left is Supervising 8 Investigator Vincent Saladino. To his left is our Chief 9 of Operations, my number one, Lori Irizarry. Directly 10 to her left is Zachary Swarthout. He's one of our 11 investigators. Directly to his left is Shelly Donald, 12 1.3 Investigator. Directly to her left is Paul Maxwell, an Investigator with us. And directly to his left is 14 Gisela Corral, and she is our Licensing Specialist. 15 And there directly behind you, to your left on 16 the screen, or to your right, is Investigator Shawn 17 Mahan. And to his right is Mary Klemme. She's our 18 northern Office Manager. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Thank you. Thank you 2.1 very much. MR. INGRAM: And directly in front of you, 22 also, is our court reporter, Ms. Shannon. 23 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Great. Thank you. 24 2.5 Thank you very much.

             BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Sure. I just want to let

   you know that during the last quarter, I attended the
18
    International Association of Security Regulators
19
20
   Conference in Scottsdale. It's something that Kevin
2.1
   made mention he's been actively involved with this
   association for years. He was the current -- was the
22
   president. He served out his term. And I'd asked over
23
   a year ago the ability to go to observe what happens at
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   this. And he was able to fit it into the current
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1 budget.

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It was two days long, and it was definitely well worth my time. There was not one session or a breakout session that I did not learn something from, everything from the history of regulating authorities to policies and procedures that are commonplace throughout not only our nation, but also other countries. I had a great conversation with a representative from Canada, a lot of shared interests.

The other thing that I really enjoyed was interacting with the members of the security industry. I'm one of the two Board members that are a citizen at-large. And so I never worked in the security industry. So it was really interesting to understand their perspective and how they view regulations and, also, the process of grading the regulations.

So I highly encourage Kevin to continue to try to get funding for this, and encourage other members of the Board. If we could have send one every year -- they have an annual conference -- that would be great. And if nobody wants to go, I'd volunteer to go to the next one. That's how well worth it was to me. So.

MR. INGRAM: To add to that, we just had a board meeting last week. The current president, Fabian Blache from Louisiana, and then me, as immediate past

president, and we just approved a new membership for 1 South Africa. And we have members from the United 2 Emirates, India, eight provinces in Canada, the National 3 Council in France. So we truly are an international 4 association. And the sharing of information has been 5 phenomenal and has helped me to be successful in my 6 position. BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: So, and where is the 8 next conference next year? 9 MR. INGRAM: Right now, there's three areas 10 that are being considered: Washington D.C.; California, 11 here on the west coast; and, also, Canada, for the next 12 1.3 conference. It'll be held either October or November. We're working out the details. Our theme for this 14 15 conference is going to be everything security and investigative related to the cannabis industry and how 16 it's taken the states and countries by storm. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Very good. Now I can 18 understand why Ray volunteered to go to the next one, if 19 20 it's in Canada. All right. Very good. 21 MR. INGRAM: And at this time, I think, we're ready for the presentation from Ms. Irizarry if you 22 don't have any other questions. 23 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: No, let's go ahead and go forward. 2.5

MS. IRIZARRY: Good morning. 1 My name's Lori Irizarry, Chief of Operations. 2 3 I was asked to do a brief presentation on our new website. It's been up and running for a few months 4 now, probably about six or so months. But we haven't 5 actually --6 7 (The Reporter indicated it's difficult to hear Las Vegas.) 8 MS. IRIZARRY: Okay. I was asked to give a 9 brief presentation on our new website, go over with you 10 on what our new witness looks like. 11 Am I talking too fast, Shannon? 12 13 (There was a brief discussion with the Reporter regarding an inability to completely hear Las Vegas.) 14 MS. IRIZARRY: Okav. We tailored our website 15 to model all of the other state websites. So if you go 16 to the Governor's website or to the Controller's Office, 17 all of our websites now have the same template type. 18 it's a little bit more user-friendly. 19 20 It's going to give you a view of the tasks at 21 the top. So when we go onto our website, there's an initial landing. There's a carousel. All these are 22 interactive. You can click on here. It'll take you to 23 a Google map of our location. There's an actual image 24 of our Las Vegas location. You have Crime Stoppers. 2.5

Here's our Carson City office. Crime Stoppers. 1 See Something, Say Something; as security industry or other 2 industries, the people we work in conjunction with, law 3 enforcement. So if a security officer needs to report 4 something, they can always come to our website instead 5 of looking for another state agency's website to find. 6 7 At the bottom, there are some key button items. So the number one thing people usually come to our 8 website for is to apply for a work card. 9 Click the Identify for a Work Card. If you're 10 an employee -- employer, and you want to verify 11 someone's work card to make sure it's still currently 12 13 active, you can verify a work card. Apply for a license. The apply for a license 14 15 function right now is not up and running. If you click here, it takes you to a part of our website with some 16 information on the requirements to be a license holder, 17 and to contact our Licensing Specialist, Gisela. 18 has the electronic license applications, don't have the 19 20 paper app at the moment for a license holder. 21 The initial landing for the website. Our About Us page tells you about our mission statement. 22 You can meet our Board members here, read bios for each 23 of them. Our newsletters. Our statutes, NRS 648, and 24 NAC 648, which is what governs our agency. And our 2.5

organizational chart of all of our employees and our staff. There's a brief overview of who we are.

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The Public Access is one of the -- is going to be probably the number one thing where you're going to click on when you come onto our website. The Public Access is going to be where you would verify, as the public or as a Board member or as a licensee, if someone has a work card, if it's active, the status of their work card, our license holders. All of it is in one spot.

So if you are looking for an individual person who has a work card or their provisional, and you want to see the status of it, you would type in their work card number here. Or you can look them up by first and last name. Some instructions here on the side. If I'm looking or a John Smith, you have to type in a portion of his first name with an asterisk and a portion of his last name with an asterisk in order to find him. If you type in the full name John Smith, you may get exactly that person, but he may be John Smith, hyphen, Jones. You won't find him unless you put that asterisk in. So we recommend sticking that star in there.

You can look for a particular company name. If you want to find -- let me give you an example. So here's my test subject. So if I wanted to look for an

individual, I know that John Cruz has a work card, and he's a license holder. I typed in J. You can add a few more letters if you need to.

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But John Cruz, any one of these, they're all the exact same person, but it tells you here that he has three different licenses. So any one of them, I get all the information. I don't have to click on each one individually. It tells you right at the top, John Cruz.

The first up information right here is going to be his work card information. He's an active work card holder. The status is right here, if he's active, provisional, pending, denied, withdrawn. You're only able to add someone, new license holders if they are active or provisional. When they were given their temporary card. When they were given their permanent plastic card. And when their card is going to expire.

This is to keep in mind that someone may have a provisional today, but in a couple months from now, when we get their fingerprints back, they could be denied. So you may have the paper in front of you. It's always good to go on our website and double-check to make sure they're still in provisional status before you hire them.

Tells you what companies they're currently working for. It does not list past companies. It is

the responsibility of the license holder to add and take
people on and off their roster.

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Something I want to point out, as new license holders that are at the company, if you add someone to your roster today, they will automatically be on your site that you're looking at. When you add them on through your portal, as we call, it's realtime, you see them on your portal right then and there. If you were to come to our website and check to see if it's on the public site, it takes approximately the end of the business day for it to refresh. So the next day, you will see it on this site if you want to verify it. So John Smith added to your company, when you look on the website, it won't actually show you that, because it will probably come up the next day. It refreshes overnight. So keep that in mind.

My person here, he works for Cruz

International. He is the qualifying agent, private
patrolman, private investigator. It tells you his
individual licenses are two are in abeyance.

So this one verification gives you all the information on John Cruz that we have in our system for him. This is a verification. This is not proof of licensure. They cannot use this form to show that they are licensed with us. This is to verify. They get a

They get a work card. They get a license 1 certificate. Those are proof of their license with us. 2 is just for you to verify the information. 3 Back to our website real quick. 4 So Public Access. If you ever want to look up 5 a list of all of the security companies, all the P.I. 6 7 companies, any repossessor companies, you would click into the list of the active licensees by category. You 8 would fill out the form. It an email, takes about 10, 9 15 minutes, a list of any, all active companies in that 10 category. So if you want to look for all the 11 repossessors here in the state, it can give you a list. 12 13 You type in your name, your email, and what you're actually looking for or what category of license you're 14 looking for. We do to the produce lists of individual 15 work card holders, only license holders. 16 What I will say is that this information is 17 being updated constantly. So if a change you made 18 today, once again, it may not be updated until the next 19 20 day on that list itself. 21 MR. INGRAM: Lori, do you want to talk a little bit about the corrupt file, you know, versus the new and 22 how we're going through that daily. 23 MS. IRIZARRY: So the main reason for the 24 2.5 update is because our previous system that we were using

was a little bit outdated, a little bit older. 1 So transitioning everything from the older system to the 2 new system, there has been some issues. And what we 3 are -- like somebody asked if our older, like old 4 addresses, some of the information was -- so verify 5 license holders coming up are probably --6 7 (The Reporter interrupted due to an inability to completely hear Las Vegas.) 8 MS. IRIZARRY: So we are trying to work through 9 some of the data issues that we're having. The way that 10 we're expecting to do that is to let our licensees know, 11 go on the website, here's what address to you want 12 13 displayed to the public, mailing or physical, what's your contact information you want. 14 So when we finally clean up the data 15 information, that's what would be displayed on the 16 active licensee list. Some of the information is there 17 currently. So you can still go on in and find a company 18 and see some address. But we're trying to clean up, 19 20 because some addresses are still missing, some contact 21 information is still missing, because switching from one to another there's always some hiccups in between. 22 On this Public Access page is where you file a 23 complaint. You can either download the form or actually 24 It goes directly to our -- to the 2.5 input the form.

investigator. And, once again, like Kevin said earlier, it takes about a week turnaround time to get it back to you.

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The Meetings tab is anywhere you would find upcoming meetings, Board meetings, agendas, minutes. These are all the current meetings for the past year. And then you can go to our archived meetings and workshops. If we are looking at changing any NRS, any NRSs, NACs, any public workshops, this is where you'll find the workshop and meeting dates here. And any of our old, past meetings all the way to 2005. minutes as well.

The Licensing tab is, if you want to be become licensed, it lets you know right at the top this is not for a work card. I know, in other states, the words work card and license are interchanged. Here in Nevada, a license is held by the company, a work card is for the individual. So it lets you know right at the top this is for a license only, tells you how to apply for a license. Right now, you contact Gisela.

needed to know information about the exam, it's got exam dates, tells you exactly what's going to be on the exam, what you need to study, the book that you would need to purchase if you are going to be a P.I., where the exam

1 locations are, and the exam dates.

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2 Work cards. Another top button on our website is going to be when someone wants to apply. 3 Here vou find all the printable documents, the fingerprint 4 locations, the application itself, and you want to print 5 it out and bring it into the office. At the moment, you 6 7 are only able to apply in our offices. But we've just finalized our work card application online. And this is 8 a kind of an example of what it will look like. 9

So this is the work card application. It has a landing page. And what it tells you right here off the bat is you have to complete the entire application from start to finish and pay. You can't save and come back to it. The work card application's only about six or seven pages, so it shouldn't -- it's nothing that you would need, like a license application, where you're talking 20, 30 pages. It tells you the fees right at the top, tells you what you're going to need before you start the application, what you'll need to turn in, either now or later, for it to be completed. And once you read this, continue to the application.

Our application is much more user-friendly. It goes tab by tab. Fill everything out. And when you get to the bottom, click submit. And you're able to pay online. Now, expedite fee, you weren't able to pay that

1 expedite fee online before, you had to come into our 2 office. We're now allowing you to pay expedite.

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What expedite means -- if you pay the regular fee, it takes about one to two weeks currently to get a work card. If you pay the expedite fee, it takes about two business days to be able to rush it now, if it had come into our office now, as far as a website account. It's going to make it a little bit more user-friendly.

This would be the work card process. It also explains reasons the license would be denied and some employment restrictions that our work cards have on them.

The CFI tab is right now fairly minimal. The goal with this is CFIs, Certified Firearms Instructors, are able to input all their firearms information on our website instead of having to drop off and mail their information to us, which will help with the process turnaround time. Pretty standard forms, has any form that you may need would be here. Instead of going to each individual tab, basically, the forms, all of our forms will be listed here.

Our contact information. Our hours of operation. We are closed for lunch every day 12:00 to 1:00. We do take credit cards in our office now. We just still don't deal with cash.

And our online portal. This online portal is where, when you are a license holder, where you would go to adjust your roster, check to see if you have a fine issued to you, how you could pay it, renew your license, add or take away any of your -- update your contact information, add a branch location, add an individual sheet from your company that may not be a corporate officer, but you want to add Mary as your person who wants to update your roster, you can add it and do all of it in your online portal.

Here are some instructions on how to create an account, manage your roster, and renew your license.

When you click on the portal, what it will look like, or this is what it looks like.

Every single new license holder, regardless if you are on our old system or you're becoming licensed today, you must request access to our site. None of your old information from the old site transferred over to the new site. Passwords aren't effective, so we can't transfer passwords from one site to another. So you are requesting to request access to our site. So you would come on here and request access. What we're looking for mainly is your email, first and last name, date of birth, and social.

That's how it links everything, first name,

last name, date of birth, and social. 1 And we're going by what's on your state ID, because that's how we --2 that's how we input you in our system. So if you go by 3 Bob, and your name's Robert, you need to go with that, 4 or it won't link your account, kind of a tip there, 5 because that's creating a little bit of problem. If you 6 7 have a hyphenated last name, and you only go by Jones, but you're Jones, hyphen, Smith, you need to put 8 everything that's on that. Whatever you need with your 9 fingerprints is how we have you in the system, which is 10 how you would input it on this as well. 11 Once you log in and create an account, it takes 12 13 about 10 to 15 minutes. You'll get an email sent to That email, you click on it, and then you're able 14 you. to access our account. That 10 or 15 minutes is what 15 it's doing is it's looking for you, gathering if you 16 have a license, a work card, if you have been denied. 17 What it's doing, it's creating one account, and then you 18 can log into one site and keep all of your stuff on one 19 20 site. 21 Many of our licensees have relogged in during their renewal process. This online portal is not for 22 work card holders. It's only for license holders. 23 you're a license holder and you have a work card, you'll 24 see your work card on there. But this is not for 2.5

someone who's applying for a work card. You only get 1 online, apply for a work card. You don't have an 2 account in our system if you have a work card. 3 And other than that, I'll leave it there, if 4 you have any questions, from the Board. 5 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN IN THE AUDIENCE: So for our 6 7 application, would it be --MR. IRIZARRY: There is a question, Board, 8 Board Chairman, if you want to respond. 9 MR. INGRAM: Well, I would just like to say 10 that if there's questions from the audience, that's 11 going to be handled in training sessions. So if the 12 1.3 Board has any questions about the presentation, we would entertain the Board's questions. 14 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Anybody have any questions? 16 You can go ahead and take the website down, if 17 you would, Lori. 18 Great. Thank you very much. 19 20 Do any of the Board members have any questions 2.1 or follow-up? BOARD MEMBER COLBERT: No. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Flynn? 23 MR. INGRAM: No questions here. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Board Member Nixon? 2.5

So. 22 And she knew that my father had just bought me 23 a Desert Eagle .44. She called the cops and said that 24 2.5 she was freaking out because there's a person with a gun

in her house. And, well, it escalated from there. 1 let the cops in. I showed them exactly where they could 2 find the weapon. It was Condition 4, which means no 3 magazine in the magazine well, no round in the chamber, 4 and the weapon's on safe. I also had a trigger lock on 5 And it was locked inside of another drawer. 6 7 So I didn't see any real problem with that. The issue that they had, when they found it, is that 8 even though I was renting the room and sharing it with 9 another person, they did find paraphernalia in the same 10 And even though the weapon was locked away in a 11 locked drawer, they still considered it within the 12 1.3 vexus. So since that -- they took me into jail. 14 we came to a plea agreement. Since it was my first 15 offense, it was nonaggressive, I completely complied 16 with every order that the officers gave me, they were 17 able to drop it down to a misdemeanor, the attempted 18 possession by a restricted person. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. There's -- on the paperwork here, it also says 18 that she made a false statement as a matter of fact, 19 20 besides the failure to disclose. So I'd like him to 2.1 cover both of those issues. MR. MAHAN: Well, for clarity, she did disclose 22 four arrests. However, they did not coincide with 23 actual arrests. She listed, in 2010, a drunk driving 24

arrest; in 2003, a petty theft arrest. In 2013 to '16,

So it was a mishmash of dates that she tried to 8 put together that did not coincide with her actual 9 criminal history. 10 MS. HESTER: I didn't have it in front of me, 11 and I told the gentleman I wasn't definite on the dates, 12 1.3 so he told me to just do the best that I could. BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Okay. And then what about 14 15 the false statement of material fact? MR. MAHAN: That was involved.
