11 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you, Shannon.

12 Also, we have in attendance myself, Kevin  
13 Ingram, Executive Director. We have Lori Irizarry,  
14 Chief of Operations. Vincent Saladino, Supervisory  
15 Investigator. Mary Klemme, she's our Financial  
16 Specialist in the Carson City office. Jordan Jones, our  
17 Investigator in the Carson City office. And then in  
18 Las Vegas, Zachary Swarthout, Investigator. Paul  
19 Maxwell, Investigator. And last, but not least, our  
20 Licensing Specialist, Shelly Donald.

21 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. First off, I want  
23 to address public comment. Members of the general  
24 public may comment on matters appearing on the agenda  
25 and may bring matters not appearing on the agenda to the

1 attention of the Board. The Board may discuss the  
2 matters not appearing on the agenda but may not act on  
3 the matters of this meeting, at this meeting. If the  
4 Board desires, the matters may be placed on a future  
5 agenda for action. Public comments may be limited to  
6 five minutes per person at the discretion of the  
7 Chairman but will not be restricted according to  
8 viewpoint.

9           Considering the length of our agenda over the  
10 next few days, I will be limiting all public comments to  
11 no more than five minutes.

12           In addition to public comment taken at the  
13 beginning and the end of the meeting, public comment may  
14 be accepted after each agenda item prior to the Board  
15 taking action. However, prior to the commencement and  
16 conclusion of a contested case or a quasi-judicial  
17 proceeding that may affect the due process rights of an  
18 individual, the Board will not consider public comment  
19 pursuant to NRS 233B.126.

20           Okay. Before we get started, is there any  
21 public comment?

22           Okay. Hearing none, Director, let's do item  
23 number three.

24           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

25           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman? This is

1 Gronauer. Mr. Chairman?

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Since it's public  
4 comment, I'd just like to make a real quick comment to  
5 the Board from my perspective. Okay?

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sure.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. What I want  
8 to say is, I'm going to tell you, this is a long agenda.  
9 And it's going to take a lot of patience from everybody.  
10 And I don't want us to be remiss and forget some people  
11 later on.

12 After going through this agenda and looking at  
13 all the reports, the investigative reports and how  
14 they're written, there's such a big difference from what  
15 they used to be to what they are today. They're so  
16 professionally done, so clear. They're actually, I  
17 don't want to say enjoyable reading, because it's a long  
18 reading session, but they were actually informative.  
19 And much, the clarity was much appreciated as far as I'm  
20 concerned. So I want to say kudos to everybody there.

21 And there was one more comment. Whoever put  
22 together before on this agenda, before 10 years, prior  
23 to 10 years and after 10 years, with the color scheme,  
24 that was tremendously helpful and I thought that was  
25 very brilliant.

1           Anyway, that's all I have to say, but I wanted  
2 to say that now before we go through all this and get  
3 too lazy or too tired to tell anybody. Thank you.

4           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you, Bobby. And I  
5 echo your sentiments.

6           All right. Kevin, it's all yours.

7           MR. INGRAM: Okay. And just to let you know,  
8 that overview was put together by Chief of Operations  
9 Lori Irizarry. She does a phenomenal job putting stats  
10 together. And I, too, appreciate her hard work and  
11 dedication.

12           So I have provided the Board with the  
13 financials. I sent you the last update yesterday.  
14 We've had such an increase of flow now that we're  
15 settled into the next fiscal year.

16           Does the Board have any questions about the  
17 financials that were provided?

18           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If I may. Gronauer.

19           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, Bobby.

20           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I would just like to  
21 find out if, I mean how are we going about this  
22 collection of the outstanding fines? It seems like  
23 there's quite a bit out there and very little has been  
24 collected.

25           MR. INGRAM: Right. Outstanding fines, some of

1 them, we have gone into payment agreements with the  
2 individuals. Those are collected monthly. And actually  
3 Investigator Swarthout tracks to make sure that  
4 everybody is on point with their monthly payments to us.  
5 We did give them a two-month relief due to Covid, and  
6 they have all started making their monthly payments  
7 again.

8           For citations and fines that go beyond the  
9 appeal date and the individuals who have not paid, we  
10 make three attempts to get payment from them. If that  
11 fails, they are turned over to the Nevada State  
12 Controller's Office for collections at that time. And  
13 then the Controller's Office goes through the  
14 collections process. We will receive part of the money  
15 that is collected, and the Controller would receive part  
16 of the money that's collected as well.

17           So that's the majority of the outstanding  
18 fines. There are a few, and Lori can talk to that point  
19 when she presents the statistical report, that have  
20 recently been issued and though for payment has not been  
21 received.

22           Does that adequately address your question?

23           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I'm fine with  
24 that. I just want to make sure we have it on record.  
25 Thank you.

1 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.

2 Any other questions on the financials from the  
3 Board?

4 Okay. I'll move into the FY20 budget  
5 closure -- right now, the financials you're looking at  
6 are for FY21, which started June, I'm sorry, July 1st.  
7 The closure of fiscal year FY20 is through June 30th.  
8 There's been a large delay --

9 Anyone who calls in, please place your phone on  
10 mute. Thank you.

11 Please place your phone on mute. Thank you.

12 So FY20 has had a delay in closure due to the  
13 Covid CARES Act. There was some funding that was given  
14 to the State of Nevada. We were actually fortunate  
15 enough as a board to receive some of that CARES funding.  
16 So because of the funding having to hit before we could  
17 close out FY20, the Controller's and Treasurer's Office  
18 were delayed as well.

19 I will tell you that our budget is finalized  
20 and just awaiting fiscal year close by the Attorney  
21 General's Office. And at that time, any of our surplus  
22 that is remaining will be carried over to fiscal year  
23 '21. Generally speaking, that's about \$400,000 that we  
24 carry forward, which is still shy of what the statutory  
25 requirement is for the Board. Each board and commission

1 is required to have at least six months of finances in  
2 reserves every year to cover expenses should revenues  
3 stop. We are making a dramatic increase over the last  
4 few years. And I'll have more of a finalized update for  
5 the Board at the December Board meeting.

6 For the amount of Covid CARES Act funding that  
7 we received, we only received reimbursement for the  
8 salaries of individuals that remained 100 percent paid  
9 for the days of actual quarantine. If we were working  
10 from home, we did not get that money. But if we were  
11 officially quarantined, we did. And it's just right at  
12 \$50,000, which will be a tremendous help to our budget  
13 this year.

14 The next thing that I'd like to point out to  
15 the Board is we did reopen our offices to the public on  
16 June 15th after getting approval from the Department of  
17 Human Resources, following all OSHA and CDC guidelines.  
18 Lori will cover some statistics as well. We are seeing  
19 a decrease in work card applications, much due to most  
20 of the large events in the state or all of the large  
21 events being cancelled.

22 We have faced major problems with our database  
23 over the last eight years that I've been here. About  
24 two years ago, we switched to a new database provider in  
25 hopes that it would fit. We had a tremendous challenge

1 with this year's renewal, because the database is still  
2 not working the way it needs to be. I've spoken with  
3 the provider on several occasions, and they've been put  
4 on notice that they must get this fixed within a  
5 reasonable amount of time, which is about 90 days. And  
6 we have already started looking at an alternative vendor  
7 that we may have to switch to. Obviously, when we get  
8 to that point, the Board would be involved, and we can  
9 go over the vendors as well.

10           Then Legislative Counsel Bureau proposed  
11 regulation changes that were discussed at the June Board  
12 meeting are in their absolute final revision with LCB.  
13 They put it into draft. We've reviewed, made  
14 suggestions. They sent it to us again, and we made the  
15 final revisions, suggestions. And I'm happy to say that  
16 my point of contact said that all of our last proposed  
17 revisions would be finalized into draft. Once that's  
18 done, we will be calling for a special meeting for  
19 notice of intent to act on those, where the Board would  
20 actually approve them. And then we would start through  
21 the LCB process. And I'll keep the Board apprised of  
22 that as well.

23           At this time, if the Board has any questions on  
24 what I've presented, I'll be happy to answer them. Or  
25 we can move on to the statistics, and I'll have Lori



1 present those.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: This is Ray Flynn. I  
3 just want to make mention that I did a tour of the PILB  
4 offices to see what they were doing with the Covid  
5 crisis that's going on, and saw the measures that they  
6 had put into place for the protection of the employees  
7 as well as the protection of the public. Without  
8 violating any HIPAA, have there been any other Covid  
9 incidents amongst staff since I visited you?

10 MR. INGRAM: No, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. That's great  
12 news. And then the only other question I had, Kevin, is  
13 there any updates on the reappointments?

14 MR. INGRAM: No, sir. The last response that I  
15 received was that I would be notified once the Governor  
16 had made a decision.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And we have two  
18 that are up in October, correct?

19 MR. INGRAM: Yes, we have two up in October,  
20 plus this current vacancy.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
22 Anybody else from the Board, questions for the Director?

23 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Lori, would you like to go  
24 ahead and give your statistical overview.

25 MS. IRIZARRY: All righty. Good morning.

1 Chief of Operations Lori Irizarry. I'm going to be  
2 reviewing the statistics from this last quarter. So it  
3 goes from June to September. The statistics are  
4 available on our website, the charts that I'm going to  
5 be speaking of. If you go to the website, click on  
6 meetings. Go to the September 1st meeting and  
7 attachments. You'll find all this information there.

8           So starting on page one, the licensing  
9 applications, this past quarter, it was a little unique,  
10 because we postponed the March meeting to the June  
11 meeting and then June to September. So the numbers are  
12 a little different than in years past. But this past  
13 quarter, we had 136 licensing applications, and 108 of  
14 them were agendaized. The reason that the 20 so were  
15 not placed on the agenda were either they were  
16 withdrawals or postponements. The postponements  
17 included someone who had failed the exam, two  
18 backgrounds that are still pending that were not able to  
19 make it to this coming agenda, five that had exam and  
20 Covid conflicts. That was basically they were not able  
21 to travel, or they were dealing with a quarantine  
22 situation where they were not able to attend the exam.  
23 One chose not to proceed. And then another one had a  
24 violation that was issued to them that they are  
25 appealing, so they were going to hold off until a future

1 Board meeting.

2 If you could please mute your phone when you  
3 come into the meeting, I'd appreciate it. Thank you.

4 The others that were withdrawn were five  
5 decided not to proceed. Their business practices had  
6 changed over the past couple of months, primarily due to  
7 the Covid situation, so they were not needing licensure  
8 here in Nevada after all. Four did not meet the minimum  
9 qualifications. And one, there was a health issue.

10 Going down below, for work card applications,  
11 from June 1st to just August 27th, which would have been  
12 last Thursday, there were 2,691 work card applications  
13 that were received. That was a decrease of a little --  
14 that was a decrease of 457 work cards from the last  
15 quarter.

16 And it doesn't seem like that big of a  
17 difference, but in actuality, this time frame over the  
18 summer months is when we get most of our work card  
19 applications. We have a lot of festivals, large events,  
20 like Kevin was speaking about. We had anticipated the  
21 Allegiant Stadium bringing in a lot more of the security  
22 guard industry. We did get a lot of those work cards  
23 last quarter, but it significantly declined when it  
24 discussed not keeping the stadium open for games. So  
25 even though that number seems like it didn't decrease

1 much from last quarter, it was a significant decrease  
2 for us. Because, right now, usually every year, we  
3 probably see roughly 800 to a thousand more than the  
4 number that we had presented.

5           From those 2,691 work cards, 331 are still  
6 pending. Two hundred of those is because we're still  
7 missing information from people, fingerprints, photo Id,  
8 something's missing where we can't make them  
9 provisional. And 129, investigators are still  
10 processing.

11           On to page two. When it comes to complaints, I  
12 had changed this chart significantly from ones that I've  
13 showed you in the past. I broke it down into categories  
14 of license.

15           So in this situation, we had a total of 20  
16 complaints across every category of license that we --  
17 across every category of license that we regulate except  
18 for polygraph examiners. So there were a total of 20  
19 complaints. Nine of them were for unprofessional  
20 conduct or behavior. Those things kind of were either a  
21 hostile or forceful repossessions, we noted. We had a  
22 few of those complaints. We had work card holders that  
23 were acting unsafe or were using excessive force. Seven  
24 possible unlicensed activity. One services not rendered  
25 by a licensee. Two uniform or vehicle concerns. And

1 then one person working without a work card.

2 From those 20, 12 of them are still under  
3 investigation or pending. We either just received them  
4 or it's a larger investigation. Three have been closed.  
5 It says four there, but it's actually one was referred  
6 to an outside agency, which is DETR. And then the other  
7 ones, additional actions were taken. It was either a  
8 civil matter or we are pending an audit, we're going to  
9 conduct an audit, a work card was made inactive, or we  
10 issued a cease and desist.

11 On the last page, page three, is notice of  
12 violations. This past quarter, eight individual  
13 licensees received violations, but only in two separate  
14 categories. We're not doing as many compliance checks  
15 or on-site audits as we had before. But we'll conduct  
16 them if necessary, but they're not as frequent, for  
17 obvious reasons. So the investigations and notice of  
18 violations we had issued were only in two categories.  
19 Some were either not properly displayed on the roster,  
20 or the person not having a work card. Out of those  
21 eight licensees, a total of 22 individual violations  
22 were issued, for a total of \$600, all of which has been  
23 paid.

24 And the last statistic here is unlicensed  
25 activity citations. This past quarter, all categories

1 that we regulate, except for polygraph, we found  
2 unlicensed activity in those categories. For canine  
3 handlers, there were two. Process server, one. It was  
4 a process server and PI company that had one.  
5 Repossessors, one. The large dollar amount for that one  
6 reposessor is 10,000, because it was a third or  
7 subsequent offense. And the security industry,  
8 private -- I'm sorry. Private patrolman industry, there  
9 were three. Two were issued a cease and desist. One  
10 was issued a citation.

11 Out of that \$20,000 amount, all of it is  
12 pending. Two are appealing. And four have not paid.  
13 So those two that are appealing, I include them in the  
14 total because of the dollar amount that was issued, but  
15 they're still pending their citations.

16 These unlicensed activities are reported to us  
17 various ways. Industry relationships. Las Vegas Metro.  
18 Some were conducted when they applied for a license, we  
19 noticed some unlicensed activity during the licensing  
20 process background. A complaint from the general  
21 public. And then one, our reception staff, because we  
22 do have walk-ins, noticed unlicensed activity when they  
23 walked in, and notified an investigator, and it was  
24 found in that way. And the two cease and desist, even  
25 though the citations were waived, the citations still --

1 I'm sorry. Even though the fine was waived, the  
2 citation still stands. And those were reported to us by  
3 Las Vegas Metro.

4 And with that, I also want to say thank you for  
5 the compliment on the Excel spreadsheet for the  
6 workcards. And if you have any questions, I'm  
7 available.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I don't have any  
9 questions.

10 All right. We'll move on to agenda number  
11 four, review and approve transcripts from June 2nd, 2020  
12 Board meeting.

13 I just want to thank Shannon. I believe, that  
14 was a record number of pages that I read, the years I've  
15 been on the Board. And great job. And I know that's a  
16 lot of hard work. So thank you.

17 THE REPORTER: Thank you very much.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Seeking a  
19 motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.  
21 Motion to approve the transcript from the June 2nd, 2020  
22 Board meeting.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
24 Do I have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Board Member Nixon.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Board Member --

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Board Member  
4 Nixon seconded. Any discussion or edits?

5 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
6 in favor of approving the transcripts, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any opposed?

9 All right. Motion carried.

10 Kevin and legal, what I would like to do,  
11 instead of do a roll call and do the oath, could we do  
12 the consent items, since they won't have to testify?  
13 And then we probably could clear 30 to 60 people off  
14 this call.

15 There's some people that aren't listening. I  
16 can tell by them not being on mute. I hear wind  
17 blowing. I can tell people are walking.

18 MR. DETMER: And Mike Detmer, for the record.  
19 Yes, Chairman, if they're not testifying, we don't need  
20 to swear them in. I don't see any reason why you can't  
21 do it that way.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So if there's no  
23 concerns from the Board, I'd like to move forward on the  
24 consent block vote.

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, this is



1 Board Member Brown.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I would like to pull item  
4 number 32 for our review.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I have some concerns there  
7 that I'd like answered.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sure. That's why I'm  
9 putting it out for the Board. All right. Number 32  
10 will be removed from the block vote. Any others?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, Gronauer.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do we have to, like  
14 number 33, you know, I know him from work, but I had no  
15 relationship for the last 10 years. I don't know if I  
16 have to say that or not.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I think you said it.  
18 That's all we need to know. I mean you know of the  
19 individual, and you don't have a personnel relationship  
20 with him. So that suffices as far as I understand the  
21 NACs and the NRS.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Then, that's  
23 fine.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Chairman Flynn, this is  
25 Nixon.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I have a question. So 8,  
3 9 and 10, I need to abstain or recuse myself from  
4 voting.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So when we vote  
6 for the consent, just state on the record that you're  
7 going to abstain from those. And then make your vote  
8 for those that are remaining.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it. Thank you.

10 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, for clarification, this  
11 is Kevin Ingram.

12 Board Member Nixon, was that 7, 8, 9 and 10?

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, it's 7, 8, 9, 10 and  
14 20.

15 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you. I want to make  
16 sure I capture that correctly.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Do I need to state why I'm  
18 recusing myself?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, I believe, you do.  
20 If.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Do I need to do that now,  
22 or?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, when we do the --  
24 when we'll do the motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
2 concerns?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And Gronauer. I just  
4 wanted the Board to know that I had a little concern  
5 with 7, 8 and 9 because of the three people doing  
6 different things, and I was a little confused between  
7 their roles. And I read over the NRS, and I was  
8 instructed by -- given some good information from our  
9 Executive Director, and I really looked at it, and I  
10 have no concerns with it any longer. I didn't know the  
11 difference between the corporate officers and qualified  
12 agent. I wanted to make sure that somebody wasn't  
13 trying to do all of them. But, apparently, it's not. I  
14 read the NRS also, and looks good.

15 I'm good. I just wanted to make sure that  
16 everybody knows I did question that. That's all.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, we all have a  
18 learning curve. Thank you.

19 All right. Any others?

20 All right. Then, I am looking for a motion for  
21 the consent items, which is 7 through 46, plus number  
22 70, with the exception of number 32.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Chairman, this is Board  
24 Member Brown. I would like to move that we pass those  
25 items, although I do need to abstain from voting on

1 item number 45 as it is me.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. So  
3 you're abstaining from 45. And, I believe, Commissioner  
4 Nixon's abstaining from 8, 9, 10 and 11.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No. I'm abstaining from  
6 7, 8, 9 and 10, as they all have, they all have my  
7 senior leaderships as a part of the request. I don't  
8 know them personally, but feel that it would be proper  
9 for me to abstain from that.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And, additionally, I'm  
12 abstaining from number 20. This is a person that used  
13 to work for me, and I -- yes, this is a person that used  
14 to work for me.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a  
16 motion. Do I have a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second it.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All those in  
19 favor, state "aye." Oh, wait, wait. Wait, wait.  
20 Before we do the vote, definitely on this, being such a  
21 large item, I'm just going to call. Is there any public  
22 comment or concerns with this, the items on the consent  
23 agenda?

24 All right. Hearing none, I've got a motion.  
25 I've got a second. All those in favor, state "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

3 Okay. Motion carried. Kevin, are you clear?

4 MR. INGRAM: I'm sorry. Yes, I am.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Let's  
6 go ahead and do the roll call, conference call attendees  
7 and confirmation for people being under oath. And I'll  
8 leave that up to you.

9 MR. INGRAM: Yes. All of those that were  
10 approved on the block vote, items number 7 through 31  
11 and items number 33 through 46, can now leave the call.  
12 You've been approved. And we will be contacting you  
13 shortly. Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And, also, number 70.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, and number 70. I'm  
16 sorry. I missed that one. Thank you.

17 Okay. So, Mike, do you want to go ahead and  
18 swear everyone in that's currently on the call? And  
19 then I'll do a roll call after that.

20 When I do the roll call, please state that you  
21 are present on the call and that you understand you're  
22 under oath. Thank you.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And, Kevin, excuse me  
24 one second. This is Gronauer.

25 Mr. Chairman, I missed number 70, also. I

1 meant to say that I had a relationship with him through  
2 the department, but I have no ongoing relationship  
3 except I like the guy. Okay. No problem.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

5 MR. DETMER: Okay. Good morning. Mike Detmer,  
6 for the record.

7 For all those who are going to testify, if you  
8 could raise your right hand. Do you swear and affirm to  
9 tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the  
10 truth?

11 (Applicants and witnesses present were  
12 sworn/affirmed.)

13 MR. INGRAM: All right. So at this time, I'll  
14 go ahead and take a roll call to make sure that you are  
15 on the call. And as I said, once I call your name, if  
16 you'll just confirm you're on the call and that you  
17 understand you're under oath, I would appreciate it.

18 First person, item number 32, Adam R. Mandilk?

19 MR. MANDILK: Yes, Adam R. Mandilk. I  
20 understand I am under oath.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

22 Item number 47, Crystal Carroll and Scott M.  
23 Carroll had a last-minute conflict with scheduling.  
24 They've asked to postpone to December.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: What number was that,

1 Kevin?

2 MR. INGRAM: Item number 47.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

4 MR. INGRAM: Next person, Christopher P., is it  
5 Stabile ("Stay-bel")?

6 MR. STABILE: Yes, it's Christopher P. Stabile  
7 ("Steh-beel").

8 MR. INGRAM: "Steh-beel."

9 MR. STABILE: I'm here, and I understand that I  
10 am under oath.

11 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

12 William A. Henry?

13 MR. HENRY: Yes, William A. Henry. I  
14 understand I'm under oath.

15 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

16 Mark B. Howell?

17 Mr. Henry, is Mr. Howell on the call today?

18 MR. HENRY: No, I believe that he had been,  
19 there was indications that he had already gone through  
20 and didn't have to be. I think, Jean Dobner, one of the  
21 attorneys, had checked and said that she didn't need to  
22 be on and, I believe, Mark Howell didn't to be on, but I  
23 did.

24 MR. INGRAM: Okay. That's fine. Thank you.

25 MR. HENRY: They're on both standby, if

1 necessary.

2 MR. INGRAM: Okay. No problem. I don't think  
3 we had any questions for Mr. Howell. But thank you.

4 David R. Bean?

5 MR. BEAN: This is David R. Bean, and I  
6 understand that I'm under oath.

7 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

8 Jeffrey A. Miller?

9 MR. MILLER: Jeffrey Miller is present on the  
10 call, and I understand I'm under oath.

11 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

12 Gregory J. Schuff ("Shoof")?

13 MR. SCHUFF: Yes. It's Schuff ("Shuf"). I am  
14 present, and I do understand I'm under oath.

15 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir. Sorry for the  
16 mispronunciation.

17 MR. SCHUFF: Not a problem.

18 MR. INGRAM: Kyle D. Hardy?

19 MR. HARDY: Yes, Kyle D. Hardy is on the call,  
20 present, and I know that I'm under oath.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

22 Michael Healea ("Hay-a-lay-a")?

23 MR. HEALEA: Michael Healea ("Hay-lee"). I am  
24 on the call, and I understand that I'm under oath.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir. Please forgive my



1 mispronunciations.

2 Gary S. Rosenfeld?

3 MR. ROSENFELD: Gary Rosenfeld on the call. I  
4 understand I'm under oath.

5 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

6 Joshua A. Claunch?

7 MR. CLAUNCH: I'm present and understand I'm  
8 under oath.

9 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

10 Kurt Strakaluse? Kurt --

11 MR. STRAKALUSE: Present.

12 MR. INGRAM: -- Strakaluse?

13 MR. STRAKALUSE: Kurt Strakaluse on the call  
14 and under oath. Thank you.

15 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

16 Amanda M., is it Fredette ("Freh-det")?

17 MS. FREDETTE: This is Amanda Fredette. I'm on  
18 the call, and I understand I'm under oath.

19 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, ma'am.

20 Kathleen P. Larmour?

21 MS. LARMOUR: This is Kathleen Larmour. I'm on  
22 the call, and I understand I'm under oath.

23 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, ma'am.

24 Margaret H. Martin?

25 MS. MARTIN: Hi. This is Margaret Martin. I'm

1 on the call, and I understand I'm under oath.

2 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

3 Joel L. Kisner ("Kiz-ner")?

4 MR. KISNER: Joel Kisner ("Kyz-ner") is here,  
5 and I understand I'm under oath.

6 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

7 Matthew E. Bergamo?

8 MR. BERGAMO: Matt Bergamo is here, and I  
9 understand I'm under oath.

10 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

11 Jeffrey A. Kaplan?

12 MR. KAPLAN: Jeff A. Kaplan. I'm here. I  
13 understand that I'm under oath.

14 MR. INGRAM: Excellent.

15 Mr. Chair, that's the roll call for the  
16 9:00 o'clock call-in. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Without any  
18 further adieu, we'll do item number 32. Adam R. Mandilk  
19 is applying for an individual private investigator's  
20 license. If approved, he is requesting that his  
21 individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may  
22 become the qualifying agent for Frasco, Incorporated,  
23 license number 1026. This is subject to all statutory  
24 and regulatory requirements. For possible action.

25 Mr. Mandilk, please tell us a little bit about

1 yourself and what you want to do.

2 MR. MANDILK: Yes. I'm Adam Mandilk. I've  
3 been with Frasco Investigative Services for almost 14  
4 years now, and just going into a management position  
5 from being a field investigator. So I'm going to do  
6 both field and manage the Las Vegas office kind of a  
7 plan.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
9 Any questions from the Board?

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
11 Brown. My concern was that the investigation found that  
12 Mr. Mandilk had operated without a license. He'd been  
13 licensed for five years with the same company and then  
14 worked essentially in the same capacity without a card.  
15 Now he's going to be the qualifying agent, and that's  
16 the person who has to make sure that everybody has  
17 cards. I'm just a little curious as to why that  
18 happened when he'd been working in that capacity with a  
19 card for a number of years prior to.

20 MR. MANDILK: Yeah, I mean I have no excuse for  
21 it. I was sick early in February, and we were slow at  
22 work, and I just missed the email coming from corporate.  
23 And I just didn't think about the work card being due  
24 until I was going through the wallet one day. It just,  
25 it's completely my fault.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. This is Board  
2 Member Brown again, for the record. Thank you, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
4 questions?

5 Does any of the investigators want to weigh in,  
6 in reference to the work card issue?

7 Any other questions from the Board?

8 Any public comment?

9 Okay. Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.

10 Okay. I'm seeking a motion a second time.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
12 Brown, Chairman.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I move, I move that the  
15 Board approve Mr. Mandilk's request, that his license be  
16 placed in abeyance and so that he may become the  
17 qualifying agent for Frasco, Incorporated.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

19 I have a motion. Do I have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion and  
22 second. Any further discussion?

23 All in favor, state "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

1 Okay. Motion carried. Thank you, sir.

2 MR. MANDILK: Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I believe,  
4 we're on number 48, corporate officer. Verisys  
5 Corporation, license number 1519, seeking corporate  
6 officer status approval for Christian Stabile. Subject  
7 to all statutory and regulatory requirements. For  
8 possible action.

9 Mr. Stabile, tell us a little bit about  
10 yourself and what you want to do.

11 MR. STABILE: Sure. My name is Christopher P.  
12 Stabile. I'm the current chief financial officer of  
13 Verisys Corporation. I'm requesting to serve as the  
14 corporate officer for Verisys Corporation whose license  
15 is number 1519.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

17 Any public comment?

18 Okay. Any questions from the Board?

19 Okay. I'll be seeking a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
21 Nixon. I move that we approve Verisys Corporation,  
22 license number 1519, who is seeking a corporate officer  
23 status approval for Christopher Stabile. This is  
24 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.

1 Do I have a second?

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.

3 Second.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a second.

5 Any further discussion?

6 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
7 those in favor, state "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

10 Motion carried. Congratulations, Mr. Stabile.  
11 Have a good day.

12 MR. STABILE: Okay. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 49,  
14 Paragon Systems Inc., license number 1411, seeking  
15 corporate officer status approval for William A. Henry  
16 and Mark B. Howell. Subject to all statutory and  
17 regulatory requirements.

18 Mr. Henry, a little bit about yourself and what  
19 you want to do here.

20 MR. HENRY: Yes, sir. William Henry. I've  
21 been in the security business for about 25 years now and  
22 always in the kind of controller, treasurer type of role  
23 for about the last 20 years. I was kind of a guard  
24 before that. And this is for Paragon, I'll be their  
25 treasurer. And so this is for one of the corporate

1 officer positions.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

3 Any public comment?

4 Hearing none, any questions from the Board?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes, Mr. Chairman. This  
6 is Board Member Brown.

7 A question for the investigator. This was the  
8 criminal history checks hadn't been completed at the  
9 time that this was set up. I was just wondering the  
10 status of those.

11 MR. SWARTHOUT: Investigator Swarthout. As of  
12 this meeting, we have received the fingerprint results  
13 on both applicants, and both of them were negative.

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
15 Brown. Thank you, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
17 questions?

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
19 Nixon. On your credit, sir, you have a charge-off.  
20 Could you explain briefly what that was the result of?  
21 You said you didn't have any knowledge of it.

22 MR. HENRY: Actually, I didn't. So the  
23 investigator had asked me about it. And when he did, so  
24 I pulled my credit report. It had come up a few months  
25 ago. So I went ahead, I opened up a dispute with

1 Transunion. I got ahold of Synchrony Bank, which is  
2 where it had come, which where it had originated from.  
3 We went, I went to their fraud department. We found  
4 that it looks like it had been opened through PayPal  
5 Credit with an address that had been in Connecticut,  
6 that it was back about 20 years ago when I lived back  
7 there. So I've got a fraud investigation opened with  
8 them. I contacted Experian, also, opened up a dispute  
9 with them. And this is, you know, this is the only  
10 thing in, you know, kind of a 28-year credit history,  
11 you know, that this had ever come up.

12 Last week, my FICO score kind of popped back up  
13 into the, you know, 820 range, where it used to sit most  
14 of the time. So, I think, there's probably been some  
15 movement on it. But I didn't see where the dispute yet  
16 had been closed out, you know, with their  
17 investigations. When I talked to them last week, they  
18 were still, you know, they were still active  
19 investigations with the credit bureaus and with the, you  
20 know, with the bank.

21 But, you know, I actually, you know, didn't  
22 know anything about it until the investigator actually  
23 brought it to my attention.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Understood. Thank you,  
25 sir.



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anybody else?

2 All right. I'll be seeking a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
4 Nixon. I move that Paragon Systems Inc., license number  
5 1411, is approved, corporate officer status for William  
6 Henry and Mark B. Howell, I'm sorry, William A. Henry  
7 and Mark B. Howell. This would be subject to all  
8 statutory and regulatory requirements.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
10 Do I have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
12 Brown. I second.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further  
14 discussion?

15 Okay. All those in favor, state "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
18 Congratulations, Mr. Henry. Motion passed.

19 MR. HENRY: Thank you, sir.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 50. SOC  
21 Hawthorne, LLC, license number 1357, seeking member  
22 status approval for David R. Bean and Jeffrey A. Miller.  
23 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
24 requirements. For possible action.

25 Mr. Bean, tell us about your yourself and what

1 you want to do here.

2 MR. BEAN: Good morning, Mr. Chairman and Board  
3 members. My name is David R. Bean. And I'm applying  
4 for membership, corporate officer membership for license  
5 1357 to serve as general counsel and corporate secretary  
6 for SOC Hawthorne, LLC.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

8 Any public comment?

9 All right. Any questions from the Board?

10 I do have one. You had an interesting incident  
11 with the Harvard Police Department. Was that a  
12 fraternity prank or something, or? I'm just curious.  
13 And the reason, full disclosure, many years ago, I was  
14 attending a senior executive course at Harvard and  
15 actually did a ride-along with their police department.  
16 So I'm just curious, due to your background, as this is,  
17 it was an unusual case.

4 MR. BEAN: Oh, it was my honor. Thank you very  
5 much.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any  
7 other questions from the Board or -- well, before I get  
8 there, any public comment?

9 All right. Any questions from the Board?

10 Okay. Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
12 Nixon. Thank you, sir, for your service.

13 I move that we approve SOC Hawthorne, LLC,  
14 license number 1357, who is seeking member status  
15 approval for David R. Bean and Jeffrey A. Miller. This  
16 would be subject to all statutory and regulatory  
17 requirements.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
19 Do I have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
21 Brown. I second.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion and  
23 second. Any further discussion?

24 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.  
25 All those in favor, state "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
3 Mr. Bean, you have a good day. Congratulations.

4 MR. BEAN: Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman  
5 and the Board. Appreciate it.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Item number 51.  
7 June's Legal Service, Incorporated, license number 1068,  
8 seeking corporate officer status approval for Gregory J.  
9 Schuff. Subject to all statutory and regulatory  
10 requirements. For possible action.

11 Mr. Schuff, why don't you introduce yourself  
12 and tell us what you want to do here.

13 MR. SCHUFF: Okay. Yes. I'm Greg Schuff. I'm  
14 just basically updating the records. I've been an  
15 officer of the corporation from the inception.  
16 Apparently, it was never listed on the PI Board's  
17 qualifications. So I'm here to clear that up.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any public  
19 comment?

20 All right. Hearing none, any questions from  
21 the Board?

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, I'm sorry, Mr. Schuff.

23 MR. SCHUFF: Yes.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Just to follow up on the  
25 bankruptcy, one, it's a little confusing, because it

1 says that you did file bankruptcy, and then in the  
2 background it says you didn't. So I'm just a little  
3 confused. If you could update us on that.

4 MR. SCHUFF: Sure. Yes. I did file  
5 bankruptcy. It's property related. It's a Chapter 13,  
6 which is different than a 7. So, in other words, I'm

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Go ahead.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we approve

8 seeking corporate officer status for Gregory J. Schuff.  
9 This would be subject to all statutory and regulatory  
10 requirements.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
12 Do I have a second?

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second. Gronauer.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion and a  
15 second. Any further discussion?

16 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.  
17 All those in favor, state "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
20 Congratulations, sir. Have a good day.

21 MR. SCHUFF: Thank you very much.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Director Ingram, are  
23 where we're supposed to be? Kevin?

24 MS. IRIZARRY: He got cut off. He just said  
25 give him one moment. I apologize.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Until he  
2 comes back on, I believe, that's all we had for the  
3 9:00 o'clock, correct? We don't have anything else till  
4 10:00?

5 MS. IRIZARRY: Correct, we would start number  
6 57, yeah, at 10:00 a.m.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You mean 52? Or we  
8 continue to 57?

9 MS. DONALD: Investigator Donald. We have the  
10 9:00 o'clock calls go through item 56.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. So  
12 number 52. Dragon Master Security, LLC dba Integrity  
13 Global Security, license number 1652, is requesting a  
14 corporate name change to Integrity Global Security Inc.  
15 Kyle D. Hardy will remain the qualifying agent. Member  
16 to be approved is Michael Healea. This is subject to

19 Are either of you gentleman with us? And if

20 dba Integrity Global Security, license number 1652 is  
21 requesting a corporate name change to Integrity Global  
22 Security Incorporated. Kyle D. Hardy will remain  
23 qualifying agent. This is subject to all statutory and

25 it.



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

2 I have a motion. Do I have a second?

3 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair?

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes?

5 MR. INGRAM: Kevin Ingram, for the record. We  
6 need to include the member to be approved in the motion,  
7 please.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I'll amend the  
9 motion to approve with the gentleman to be added on. I  
10 can't remember his name right now. I don't have it  
11 there.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Michael Healea.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, Michael Healea.  
14 Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have an amended  
16 motion. So I need another second, please.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
19 and a second. Any further discussion?

20 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.  
21 All those in favor, state "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
24 Congratulations, gentlemen. Have a good day.

25 MR. HEALEA: Thank you.

1 MR. HARDY: Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 53.

3 Global Corporate Services, LLC dba GCS, applying for a  
4 new corporate private patrolman license. If approved,  
5 Gary S. Rosenfeld, license number 1738, is requesting

7 DUI back in 2012. I just wanted to verify that

8 everything was taken care of with that and that we don't

9 have any other issues. Because he doesn't have a

10 current driver's license due to Covid. I just wanted

11 to, you know.

12 MR. CLAUNCH: Yeah, everything has been cleared

13 up as of 2012. I paid my fines and did my class. I do

14 have a current license now, that I can forward a copy

15 of. I was able to get employment.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Perfect.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, we will need a copy

18 of your driver's license and then as soon as possible.

19 MR. CLAUNCH: No problem.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other

21 questions?

22 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a

23 motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member

25 Brown. I'll try to tackle the big motion. I move that

1 we approve the new corporate private patrolman license  
2 to Global Corporate Services, LLC doing business as GCS,  
3 and that we also approve Mr. Rosenfeld, placing his  
4 individual license in abeyance so that he may become the  
5 qualifying agent. And I move that we also approve  
6 Mr. Rosenfeld and Mr. Claunch as members or officers of  
7 the corporation. Subject to statutory and regulatory  
8 requirements.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
10 Do I have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
12 Nixon. I second.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
14 and a second. Any further discussion?

15 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
16 in favor, state "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any opposed?

19 Hearing none, motion approved.

20 Congratulations, gentlemen. Have a good day.

21 MR. CLAUNCH: Thank you for your time.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 54.

23 Retail Security Services, Incorporated is applying for a  
24 new corporate private patrolman license. If approved,  
25 Kurt J. Strakaluse, license number 1662, is requesting

1 that his individual license be placed in abeyance so  
2 that he may become the qualifying agent. Corporate  
3 officers to be approved are Amanda M. Fredette,  
4 Kathleen P. Larmour, and Margaret H. Martin. This is  
5 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
6 For possible action.

7 Are we all here this morning?

8 MR. STRAKALUSE: Good morning, Board.

9 MS. LARMOUR: I'm here, Kathleen Larmour.

10 MR. STRAKALUSE: Kurt Strakaluse.

11 MS. FREDETTE: Yes. Amanda Fredette.

12 MS. MARTIN: Margaret Martin.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Will one of you  
14 choose to be the spokesperson, tell us what we're doing,  
15 and a little background on all of yous.

16 MS. LARMOUR: So my name is Kathleen Larmour.  
17 I'm the CEO, slash, president of Retail Security  
18 Services. I have been supplying security guards to the  
19 retail and restaurant industry for 20 years. We just  
20 found out recently that we have to have a license and  
21 qualifying agent in Nevada. We didn't, we were never  
22 aware of that. We paid our fines. We hired Kurt.

23 And what our business is, is we comply, like I  
24 said, unarmed, slash, armed security guards, depending  
25 on our clients, what they need. It could be because

1 they are having work done overnight and they need to  
2 have a security guard in there with the contractors in  
3 there. It could be because it's a high crime area, so  
4 use a security guard at this time. It could be because  
5 we follow the -- we have a mobile thing, we follow the  
6 managers to the bank to make their deposits. If there's  
7 an employee issue, we will provide a security guard to  
8 walk all the employees out to their cars.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

10 MS. LARMOUR: You're welcome.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any public comment?

12 Okay. Whoever the investigator is on this, I  
13 would like you to address the unlicensed citation,  
14 unlicensed activity citation to the Board, because I'm  
15 sure there's going to be questions.

16 MS. MAXWELL: This is Investigator Maxwell. On  
17 November 14th of 2019, Retail Security Services, Inc.  
18 received a first offense \$2,500 citation. That was  
19 citation number I-0152-19, and this was for unlicensed  
20 activity. The citation was paid and closed on  
21 December 4th of 2019.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll do the  
23 first question. What would make you think that you did  
24 not need a license in the state of Nevada to operate  
25 here?

1 MS. LARMOUR: So prior, prior to November, we  
2 had been working in the state of Nevada providing  
3 service security guards. And we contacted the state.  
4 We pay taxes, sales tax. Nobody has ever mentioned to  
5 us, and maybe we didn't do enough due diligence as laws  
6 are changing, that we needed to do that. So as soon as  
7 we found out, we started the process immediately.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And where are you  
9 based out of, your company?

10 MS. LARMOUR: Long Island, New York.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And how many  
12 other states do you operate in?

13 MS. LARMOUR: All of them.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You operate in all 50  
15 states, including Alaska and Hawaii?

16 MS. LARMOUR: Yes, sir. I'm sorry. We do not  
17 operate in Arkansas. It's the only state we don't  
18 operate in.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And do you have  
20 licenses in those other states to operate in?

21 MS. LARMOUR: Yeah, we're working on them.  
22 Because when this happened with Nevada, we found out  
23 that some of the other states, that you do need to do  
24 this. So we have like 22 we're working with now, going  
25 through the same process as Nevada.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
2 questions from the Board?

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, yes. This is Board  
4 Member Nixon.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, go ahead.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So how many employees do  
7 you have in Nevada, and do they have licenses? Because  
8 the last 20 years, you had armed and unarmed officers or  
9 employees. And you don't have a license. And now I'm  
10 not sure if they do.

11 MS. LARMOUR: We have a license on file for  
12 every single company we've used and every single one of  
13 their employees. We contract it out. We were  
14 subcontracting it out. Now that we know that we can't  
15 do that without a license, and we have a qualifying  
16 agent in your state who we work with.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So your company had never  
18 actually been working locally for the last 20 years,  
19 you've been subcontracting local companies?

20 MS. LARMOUR: Yes, ma'am.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I see. Okay.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, Gronauer. Who is  
24 the investigator on this?

25 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.



1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Good morning,  
2 Mr. Maxwell. Listen, I just need a -- I'm having some  
3 difficulty with it, because they may or may not be  
4 licensed in other states that they're also working in  
5 that they're supposed to be licensed in. I have a hard  
6 time trying to track this whole record. And how long  
7 have they worked here, and have you been able to show  
8 that they had outsourced this to other licensed  
9 companies in Nevada, were you able to track that down?

10 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. I wasn't  
11 the one that issued the citation. So just give me one  
12 second, sir, and I'll find that information out for you.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And was I clear  
14 enough on what I'm asking?

15 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

17 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair, Investigator  
18 Saladino.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, go ahead, Vinny.

20 MR. SALADINO: So with the unlicensed activity,  
21 the way this kind of came about was the contracts with  
22 the Nevada-based business was with Retail. And when we  
23 got wind of the way the contracts were being drawn up  
24 and how the security services were being billed to  
25 Retail, but we had a Nevada licensed company providing

1 the services, that was where the issue lied was with the  
2 money loop. So, in other words, if Retail would have  
3 said to, say, ABC Security, license number 123, in  
4 Nevada, "We have an opportunity here at this Nevada  
5 Retail store, you can contact them and get your own  
6 contract with them and conduct the business," that would  
7 have been fine. But the problem was the Nevada business  
8 was paying Retail, and then Retail was paying the Nevada  
9 entity. So that's how that came about.

10 When we told them that the business model that  
11 they're using here in Nevada would have to change, and  
12 they would need to be licensed here and have a  
13 qualifying agent, they paid their citation, and then  
14 they moved forward with licensure.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So I just, I  
16 don't want to make this confusing, but I want to put it  
17 basic as I understand it. Any of the security work, in  
18 terms of the actual officers that provided security, was  
19 done by Nevada licensed security officers or Nevada  
20 licensed companies, correct?

21 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

22 MS. LARMOUR: Yes, sir. Yeah, we have no  
23 employees --

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm asking the  
25 investigator. I'm asking the investigator.

1 MS. LARMOUR: I'm sorry.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, that's okay. I want  
3 to be clear. No, that was on me.

4 Continuing with the investigator, so what had  
5 happened here is that these companies dealt with a  
6 parent company. And by our law, that parent company is  
7 similar to security consulting, they need to be licensed  
8 in the state of Nevada?

9 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I  
11 think, I understand what happened. And they tried a  
12 business model that may have worked elsewhere, but it  
13 doesn't work here. And they paid their fine; that is  
14 correct?

15 MR. SALADINO: That is correct.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And, lastly, they're  
17 doing what we want them to do now, after being found out  
18 that this is the way it works here?

19 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
21 Mr. Maxwell, do you have an answer to Commissioner  
22 Gronauer's question?

23 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. That was  
24 basically what I found out and what I was going to say  
25 is exactly what Investigator Saladino said, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Gronauer, are you  
2 satisfied?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have a problem about  
4 the other states that they're still looking into. You  
5 would think that this company would have known to do  
6 this in 48, 49 states. I'm just having a problem with  
7 it. I'm satisfied with our explanation, but I can't  
8 vote for it.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

10 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Questions from the  
12 Board?

13 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair, Investigator  
14 Saladino.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

16 MR. SALADINO: So when we did issue the  
17 citation to Retail, we did also bring up the fact that,  
18 you know, this, that their business model, you know,  
19 might need to be looked at in other states. And like  
20 one of the corporate officers had mentioned, you know,  
21 they are moving forward now with licensure in those  
22 other states, I think, because it had never been pointed  
23 out before. Because if we did an on-site audit where  
24 the contract was through Retail, we would see a Nevada  
25 licensed officer there, you know, a contract with, you

1 know, we would see the Nevada entity that's probably  
2 licensed through us. And it's only through seeing the  
3 actual contract where we were able to, okay, this, you  
4 know, something's wrong here, and we need to get it  
5 fixed.

6           When we contacted Retail and we advised them  
7 what was going on here in Nevada, that's where they  
8 said, "Oh, we probably should look at these other  
9 states." And we said, "That would, you know, be very  
10 wise, just to make sure you don't have this issue in any  
11 of the other states." And that is, you know, why  
12 they're moving forward with licensure here. And like  
13 was pointed out earlier, they are moving forward with  
14 licensure in other states as well.

15           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Yeah, no, I --  
16 thank you. I appreciate that. And as I mentioned  
17 before, there's a similarity when out-of-state  
18 consultants come in and provide a complete package for  
19 large corporations or even small corporations on  
20 services.

21           All right. Any other questions from the Board?

22           Is there anything that the applicants would  
23 like to add before I call for a motion?

24           MS. LARMOUR: I think that -- this is Kathleen  
25 Larmour speaking. I think that when it came to our

1 attention, like you said, we started reaching out to  
2 other states. We have qualifying agents in other states  
3 at this point, and we're going through the same process  
4 that we're going through with Nevada. I mean it was  
5 really an innocent thing. I've been in business many  
6 years and I never knew that that had to happen, so, you  
7 have to have a license and a qualifying agent. And, I  
8 think, we have we've done everything we were supposed to  
9 do since we found out.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And how many  
11 years has your business been in existence?

12 MS. LARMOUR: Retail Security Services has been  
13 in business for six years. But prior to that, I also  
14 own another company, Professional Retail Services. We  
15 were running security through them. But it got so large  
16 that we separated it off into a separate business. And,  
17 also, because it required different insurances and  
18 different workers' comp rules and workers' comp stuff.  
19 So we split it off so that it was, we were following all  
20 of the rules that we needed to follow for security  
21 guards happening.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And whereabouts  
23 in Long Island are you headquartered?

24 MS. LARMOUR: Medford.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

1 MS. LARMOUR: It's about in the middle of the  
2 island.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I started my  
4 career many, many, many years ago as a store detective  
5 for ANS in Manhasset.

6 MS. LARMOUR: Oh, so you're a Nassau in  
7 Suffolk.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh. This is Gronauer.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: See, where my concern  
12 lies, this is a big company that should know what the  
13 rules have been, or are, and they should have checked  
14 them out a long time ago. How long did they operate in  
15 Nevada may have stopped several licensed people in  
16 Nevada from having the business that they have taken  
17 doing it not the proper way.

18 So I'm really, I got a concern with how many  
19 years they operated here and how many times they didn't  
20 look into something. They're big enough and smart  
21 enough to know what they're supposed to do. I have a  
22 hard time believing you're in business for 20 years and  
23 not being able to figure out the business model in each  
24 state and what is required.

25 I believe, it probably hurt some of our

1 businesses in Nevada that are properly licensed that  
2 wanted them jobs, also. So that's where my angst is,  
3 just so you understand.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And Commissioner  
5 Gronauer, that was a statement, not a question, correct?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry. That's  
7 correct.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
9 comments, any other comments from the Board?

10 All right. And I'm going to ask for any public  
11 comment the second time, only because there's contention  
12 here.

13 All right. Hearing no public comment, I will  
14 call for a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
16 Nixon. I move that we approve Retail Security Services,  
17 Inc. who is applying for a new corporate private  
18 patrolman license. If approved, Kurt J. Strakaluse --  
19 sorry -- license number 1662, is requesting that his  
20 individual license be placed into abeyance so that he  
21 may become the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to  
22 be approved are Amanda M. Fredette, Kathleen P. Larmour,  
23 and Margaret H. Martin. This would be subject to all  
24 statutory and regulatory requirements.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.



1 Do I have a second?

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
3 Brown. I second.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion,  
5 and I have a second. Any further discussion?

6 All right. This is Ray Flynn. And, for the  
7 record, my concern is how legal are they in the other  
8 states? Because we have never approved anybody that was  
9 out of compliance in another state. So that is what I'm  
10 looking at when we come to a vote. Now, if I knew they  
11 were in compliance in the other states and there's proof  
12 of that, I'd be thinking something else. So.

13 Any other discussion?

14 All right. I have a motion. I have a second.  
15 All those in favor, state "aye."

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Aye.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Aye.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All those opposed? Nay.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nay.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So, Mr. Detmer,  
21 because we have an opening, we have an even vote. What  
22 happens?

23 MR. DETMER: I think, the motion doesn't pass.  
24 It doesn't pass by simple majority.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I

1 would tell the applicants to work with our investigator,  
2 keep them updated on what's going on in the other  
3 states. And once I know that we're okay wherever you're  
4 operating, I will seriously take a look at that the next  
5 time you apply.

6 MR. DETMER: And, Chairman, I apologize.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

8 MR. DETMER: Chairman, I apologize for the  
9 interruption. It was my assumption, then, that with the  
10 motion not passing, there would be a separate motion  
11 maybe to deny, or maybe for conditions, or whatever it  
12 is that is the Board's pleasure.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So you heard our  
14 legal counsel. The motion didn't pass, so we need  
15 another motion to continue this forward.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a  
17 second motion.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Go ahead.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion that  
20 the applicants work with our investigators, and our  
21 investigators to be sure that all the other 49 states  
22 that have to be in compliance, that they are in  
23 compliance before they reapply here.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any discussion on  
25 the motion?

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
2 Brown.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Question for counsel. I'm  
5 a little confused. We didn't have a majority. We had  
6 an even split. I think, that's why the Chairman  
7 requested your knowledge. Does just the fact of having  
8 a split make this not pass?

9 MR. DETMER: I'm sorry, Board member. You  
10 broken up after "split" on my end. I can try to answer  
11 the question that I perceive it was or where it was  
12 going. The fact that it went to a split vote, the  
13 motion doesn't pass. I mostly just wanted to bring that  
14 there was no other motions that wanted to be made in  
15 those regards. If it was a denial, that would be one  
16 way. If it was motion with conditions, that would be  
17 another way. I just wanted, I was hoping for something  
18 other than -- and that's for clarity of the record, than  
19 to leave it out there in the ether as far as what's  
20 happening.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

22 MR. DETMER: If the Board just wants to go  
23 forward right now and say it's not approved, therefor  
24 that's the end of it, that is a possible recourse. But  
25 for clarity of the record, I thought it might be good to

1 have a motion to deny or a motion with conditions, or  
2 whatever it is that is the Board's pleasure.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. This is  
4 Gronauer again. Okay. Rescind that motion and make a  
5 motion for denial. I think, we're at Retail Security  
6 Services applying for a new corporate private patrolman  
7 license. If approved, Kurt J. Strakaluse, license  
8 number 1662 is requesting that -- I'm in the right  
9 place, right? Placed in abeyance so that he may become  
10 the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to become,  
11 Amanda Fredette, Kathleen Larmour, and Margaret H.  
12 Martin. This is subject to -- and that's my denial. I  
13 mean the motion is for denial.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
15 for denial. Do I have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
17 Brown. I guess, I second so that we can get it passed.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further  
19 discussion?

20 All in favor of the motion for denial, say  
21 "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion denied.  
24 Do I have another motion concerning item 54?

25 All right. I'll make the motion for discussion

1 purposes. I make a motion that Retail Security  
2 Services, Inc., that's applying for a corporate private  
3 patrolman license, if approved, Kurt J. Strakaluse,  
4 license number 1662, is requesting that his individual  
5 license be placed in abeyance so that he may become  
6 qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be approved are  
7 Amanda M. Fredette, Kathleen P. Larmour, and Margaret H.  
8 Martin. This is subject to statutory and regulatory  
9 requirements. I will add to that that we will deny  
10 it -- no, this isn't making sense.

11 Mr. Detmer, you got us all confused. I know  
12 you didn't mean to. Please weigh in, Mr. Detmer.

13 MR. DETMER: Yes, Chairman, it's my pleasure.  
14 And, again, so the motion was to approve the licenses,  
15 you know, the PPL and the board members, things of that  
16 nature. The motion didn't pass. So that kind of left,  
17 in my perception, my interpretation, the item kind of  
18 out in ether as far as what was to happen with it next.

19 The Board could have just, theoretically just  
20 moved on to a separate agenda item, and that would have  
21 been it. But it also kind of raised the question as to  
22 what was the ultimate determination beyond approval.  
23 That is to say, if there was a separate motion maybe to  
24 approve it just without any kind of -- approval actions  
25 with conditions. I wasn't aware of anything on those

1 lines.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a denial.  
3 But I will -- we have a denial. We have a unanimous  
4 vote. And that motion stands. And the only thing that  
5 I will do, and you tell me if I can, I will direct the  
6 applicants. They heard the discussion, they heard our  
7 concern, as well as they know the history of this Board  
8 about unlicensed activity in other states, is I am  
9 asking the Board to work with our -- the applicants to  
10 work with the investigator. And when they have  
11 licensure that is required in those other 49 states --  
12 and if they don't require a license, we'll need proof of  
13 that, also -- then they can come before us again and  
14 seek to do business in Nevada legally. And that is my  
15 direction for them to think about. They don't have to  
16 follow my advice. And I will leave it at that.

17 Is that okay, Mr. Detmer?

18 MR. DETMER: Yes, Chair.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I couldn't hear you.

20 MR. DETMER: Yes, Chairman, that is correct.

21 That is sufficient. That is fine.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Does the Nevada  
23 PILB understand what I'm doing?

24 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir, crystal-clear.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

1 MR. INGRAM: Kevin Ingram, for the record.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. All right.  
3 That's it. Let's go on to the next item. Number 55.  
4 Pinnacle Consulting and Advisors LLC is applying for a  
5 new corporate private investigator license. Joel L.  
6 Kisner is applying for an individual private  
7 investigator license. If approved, he is requesting  
8 that his individual license be placed in abeyance so  
9 that he may become the qualifying agent. Members to be  
10 approved are Joel L. Keiser, Kisner, my apologies, and  
11 Matthew E. Bergamo. This is subject to all statutory  
12 and regulatory requirements. For possible action.

13 And I just need, for the record, I do know Joel  
14 Kisner when he worked for Metro, although we did not --  
15 we weren't friends socially. And to my knowledge, he  
16 was never in my direct chain. And I have no issue  
17 weighing in on this.

18 Good morning, gentlemen. Please state who you  
19 are and why you're here and a little bit about the  
20 background of the company.

21 MR. KISNER: Good morning, sir. This Joel  
22 Kisner. As you had mentioned, I was with Metro. I did  
23 a little over 27 years in law enforcement. I retired in  
24 2017 out of the homicide section where I finished my  
25 last 10 years. I went to work for Caesar's, the

1 director of special investigations, compliance and  
2 regulatory investigations for Caesar's, kind of  
3 handling, for lack of a better term, their internal  
4 investigations at the corporate level for the company.  
5 And in April, I was furloughed from the company. And in  
6 February, I kind of saw that happening. So Matt and I  
7 created the LLC and started the application for the PI  
8 license that I'm here for now.

9 Our intention to kind of work in suitability  
10 and regulatory-style investigations, background  
11 investigations, and offer some sort of assessment for  
12 cases that companies or law firms would have related to  
13 specifically use of force, security, and that type of  
14 direction. And that's the reason I'm applying for the  
15 private investigator's license.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

17 Is Mr. Bergamo with you?

18 MR. KISNER: Yes.

19 MR. BERGAMO: Hey, there, Matt Bergamo's  
20 online.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tell us a little bit  
22 about yourself, sir.

23 MR. BERGAMO: Yeah, just a little bit about me.  
24 I started to work in Las Vegas about seven-ish years  
25 ago, started with Caesar's Entertainment where, you



1 know, I started auditing for the Gaming Control Board  
2 under Caesar's. And after that, I worked with Joel or  
3 alongside him, you know, performing background  
4 investigations and working for the Caesar's  
5 investigations unit.

6 Right now, I work for MSTs, which is a DOE  
7 government contractor, where I perform security  
8 assessments and, you know, other safeguard-related  
9 assessments.

10 And, yeah, as Joel said, now I'm going to be  
11 helping him out with, you know, the business. We're  
12 currently seeking the license.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.  
14 Any public comment?

15 All right. Hearing none, any questions from  
16 the Board?

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'm  
18 actually familiar with Mr. Kisner, also, only from the  
19 work at Metro. We were never under direct or command.  
20 But I've said several just regular hello and goodbyes  
21 with him. That's about it. No problem. I don't see it  
22 should bias me in any way.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
24 questions?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah, I had a few. This

1 is Board Member Nixon.

2 So, Mr. Kisner, in your financial disclosure  
3 here, it says that reviews the applicant's financial  
4 history, some negative information. It says that the  
5 paperwork would be updated. And I wanted to find out  
6 with the investigators whether or not that has been  
7 done. Because it seems we have a 2008 bankruptcy that  
8 was maybe withdrawn.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We'll go to  
10 the investigator first. Can you clear that up, please?

11 MR. MAXWELL: This is Investigator Maxwell.  
12 With the financial, with the collection that was  
13 revealed, I contacted Mr. Kisner, and he has gone into a  
14 payment plan to resolve that situation. And he did  
15 provide me with the paperwork.

16 With regards to the Chapter 13 bankruptcy, I  
17 questioned Mr. Kisner on this, and he told me that it  
18 all resulted from being poorly advised and that he did  
19 withdraw the filing before it was actually approved by  
20 the trustee. So the bankruptcy did not go into full  
21 fruition, it was withdrawn before it could go any  
22 further.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And so does he have  
24 other financial concerns, and if so, so how much is  
25 outstanding in the payment plan?

1 MR. MAXWELL: Those were the only two things  
2 that came up on the background report. And I've got a  
3 payment schedule starting from 8-3 of this year going  
4 through to March 28th of next year. So he's got the  
5 same amount of increments to be paid up until March 28th  
6 of next year.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'm not sure if I'm just  
8 not seeing it, but I don't see on the report how much  
9 we're talking about that's outstanding, I guess.

10 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. Just one  
11 second, ma'am, and I will total that up for you.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And then,  
13 Mr. Bergamo, it seems as though you've had a couple of  
14 DUIs. I wanted to make sure that everything was taken  
15 care of on these and we haven't had any incidents in  
16 Nevada.

17 MR. BERGAMO: Matt Bergamo here. Those were  
18 about 15 to 12 years ago. Everything has been taken  
19 care of. There is no issues and nothing pending.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And you have an active --  
21 let me see. So you do have an active license?

22 MR. BERGAMO: I do.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yep. Okay.

24 MR. BERGAMO: I also have what's called an HRP  
25 where they also, you know, take into consideration,

1 physical and mental health and qualifying me for  
2 government related work as well. And that is, I just  
3 received that, and that is good to go.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: This is Chairman Flynn.  
6 For the record, what does HRP stand for?

7 MR. BERGAMO: Human reliability program.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you, sir.

9 MR. BERGAMO: My pleasure.

10 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. I just  
11 calculated. Mr. Kisner, he owes just over \$2,000.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Gotcha. Gotcha.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
14 questions?

15 Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
17 Brown. I move that the Board apply for a new corporate  
18 private investigator license for Pinnacle Consulting and  
19 Advisors LLC, and that Joel Kisner be granted his  
20 individual private investigator license, which should  
21 then be placed in abeyance so that he may become the  
22 qualifying agent. I also move that Joel Kisner and  
23 Matthew Bergamo be authorized as members of Pinnacle  
24 Consulting and Advisors LLC. And this is subject to  
25 statutory and regulatory requirements.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
2 Do I have a second?

3 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes?

5 MR. DETMER: I'm sorry. I apologize for the  
6 interruption. The language in the motion was well  
7 crafted. I just wanted to be sure as to the first part,  
8 where you were applying, that it was a motion to approve  
9 for the PIL and as well as for his license to be put in  
10 abeyance. Would that be correct, Board Member Brown?

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes, that would be  
12 correct. Thank you. I'm sorry for the confusion.

13 MR. DETMER: It was perfectly constructed  
14 motion. I just want to be clear for the record. Thank  
15 you very much.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Commissioner  
17 Brown, we're all learning. This is only your second  
18 meeting. It took Bobby and I about 12 of these meetings  
19 to, and we still don't get it right.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Me, too.

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Well, good.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So I have a  
23 motion. Do I have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion

1 and second. Any further discussion?

2 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.

3 All those in favor, state "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

6 Congratulations, gentlemen. Motion carried unanimously.

7 You have a good day.

8 MR. KISNER: Thank you very much.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, I'm going  
10 to take about a five-minute break here real quick.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You know what, we're all  
12 going to take a five-minute break.

13 Mr. Ingram, we're going to break for five  
14 minutes. I'm going to put you on mute.

15 MR. INGRAM: Sounds good. I'll stay on the  
16 line. And with your permission, I'll go ahead and start  
17 taking roll call.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. We still have two  
19 more from the morning agenda, if I'm correct.

20 MR. INGRAM: Actually, one more, yes, sir.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 56 and 57?

22 MR. INGRAM: Just 56, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. 57 starts  
24 the new one, right?

25 MR. INGRAM: That's correct.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Go ahead and  
2 do your roll call and oath, and we'll all be back.

3 MR. INGRAM: Sounds great.

4 Mr. Detmer, did you want to do the oath before  
5 you break, or did you need a break?

6 MR. DETMER: I'm happy to do the oath.

7 MR. INGRAM: Okay.

8 MR. DETMER: For those who are about to testify,  
9 would you raise your right hand. Does everybody swear  
10 or affirm to tell the truth, the whole truth, and  
11 nothing but the truth?

12 (Applicants and witnesses present were  
13 sworn/affirmed.)

14 MR. INGRAM: At this time -- this is Executive  
15 Director Ingram. I'm going to call off your names. And  
16 at the time I call off your name, if you'll just answer  
17 that you're present and that you understand you're under  
18 oath, I would appreciate that.

19 Just prior to that, those of you that called  
20 in, in the public, I know we had Mr. Mike Spriggs on the  
21 call. Mr. Spriggs, are you still there?

22 MR. SPRIGGS: Yes, I am.

23 MR. INGRAM: Wonderful. And Jon Girard, I had  
24 you on the call earlier. Are you still there?

25 He might have taken a break. Theresa Jones,

1 are you still on the call?

2 MS. JONES: Yes, I am.

3 MR. INGRAM: Wonderful. Thank you.

4 And is there any other public that's on the  
5 call right now prior to me getting to those that were  
6 just sworn in? Any other public, go ahead and state  
7 your name for the record, please.

8 MR. ZANE: Mark Zane.

9 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mark. Welcome.

10 MR. ZANE: Thank you.

11 MS. MEREDITH: Amanda Meredith.

12 MR. INGRAM: Amanda Meredith?

13 MS. MEREDITH: Yes, sir.

14 MR. INGRAM: Thank you very much, Amanda.

15 Anyone else?

16 MR. ALVAREZ: Jonathan Alvarez.

17 MR. INGRAM: Jonathan Alvarez. Thank you,  
18 Jonathan.

19 MR. REEVES: Jermain Reeves.

20 MR. INGRAM: Say that again.

21 MR. REEVES: Jermain Reeves.

22 MR. INGRAM: I'm -- it's Mr. Reeves. What's  
23 your first name, sir?

24 MR. REEVES: I'm Jermain Reeves.

25 MR. INGRAM: Jermain. Thank you, sir. Sorry



1 about that. And it's R-E-E-V-E-S?

2 MR. REEVES: Yes, sir.

3 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

4 Anyone else?

5 MR. HALL: Johnny Hall.

6 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Johnny.

7 MR. DRISKILL: Aaron Driskill.

8 MR. INGRAM: Aaron who?

9 MR. DRISKILL: Aaron Driskill.

10 MR. INGRAM: Thanks, Aaron.

11 MS. FERBER: Amanda Ferber.

12 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Amanda.

13 Any other public?

14 MR. SANDERS: Michael Sanders.

15 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Michael, I'm going to do a  
16 roll call for you as somebody that's sworn in. So I'll  
17 come back to you.

18 Any other just public?

19 Okay. So roll call coming up for the remaining  
20 licensing hearings that we have scheduled. Do I have  
21 Nadiya Aziz?

22 MS. AZIZ: Present, and I understand that I'm  
23 under oath.

24 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Nadiya.

25 Anthony Haskamp? Anthony R. Haskamp?

1 MR. HASKAMP: Yes, present, and I understand  
2 I'm under oath.

3 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.  
4 Tara A. Deane?

5 MS. DEANE: Present, and I understand I'm under  
6 oath.

7 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, ma'am.  
8 Mark E. Deane?

9 MR. DEANE: Present, and understand I am under  
10 oath.

11 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.  
12 Michael Flores Jr.?

13 MR. FLORES: Present, and I understand I am  
14 under oath.

15 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.  
16 Alyssa Marie C. Atilano?

17 MS. ATILANO: Present, and I understand I'm  
18 under oath.

19 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.  
20 Randall Rodriguez?

21 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Present and understand I am  
22 under oath.

23 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.  
24 Steven Aguilar?

25 MR. AGUILAR: Present and understand I am under

1 oath.

2 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

3 Robert M.M. Wright-Fogle?

4 MR. WRIGHT-FOGLE: I am present, and I  
5 understand I'm under oath.

6 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

7 Christopher Pancoast?

8 MR. PANCOAST: Present, and I understand I'm  
9 under oath.

10 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

11 Glacie McGuffin?

12 MR. MCGUFFIN: I am here, and I understand I'm  
13 under oath.

14 MR. INGRAM: And I'm sorry. Is that Clacie,  
15 with a C?

16 MR. MCGUFFIN: That is correct, Clacie.

17 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

18 MR. MCGUFFIN: Thank you.

19 MR. INGRAM: Christopher Copenhaver?

20 MR. COPENHAVER: Yes, I'm here, and I  
21 understand I'm under oath.

22 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

23 Anthony Escamilla?

24 MR. MCGUFFIN: He's trying to join but was  
25 unable to because of the limit.

1 MR. COPENHAVER: Sir, he's trying to join, but  
2 he's unable to because of under the -- it's over the  
3 limit.

4 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Anyone that's currently on  
5 the phone call for a work card appeal, please disconnect  
6 and call back at your prescribed time. So any work card  
7 appeals that are currently on the call, please go ahead  
8 and hang up, so we can get the licensees on the call  
9 with us.

10 MS. IRIZARRY: Mr. Hall, Johnny Hall, this is  
11 Investigator Lori Irizarry. You are number 141 on the  
12 agenda. So if you please kindly call back. You are  
13 tomorrow at 10:00 a.m. So Wednesday, the 2nd, at  
14 10:00 a.m.

15 MR. HALL: Oh, okay. Sorry.

16 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Lori.

17 MS. IRIZARRY: Thank you.

18 MR. INGRAM: All right. How about John  
19 Henderson?

20 MR. HENDERSON: Present, and I understand I'm  
21 under oath.

22 MR. INGRAM: Excellent. If somebody could let  
23 me know once Anthony Escamilla is on, that would be  
24 great.

25 MR. MCGUFFIN: Yes, sir, we will.

1 MR. INGRAM: Oh, thank you.

2 Is it Mickle ("Michael") Billingsley?

3 MR. BILLINGSLEY: Present, and I understand I'm  
4 under oath.

5 MR. INGRAM: Did I pronounce your first name  
6 correctly?

7 MR. BILLINGSLEY: Yes, you did, Mickle.

8 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

9 Aaron Driskill?

10 MR. DRISKILL: Aaron Driskill present, and I  
11 understand I'm under oath.

12 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Aaron.

13 And Jermain Reeves, I think, you spoke during  
14 the public. Are you still there and under oath?

15 MR. REEVES: Present, and I understand I'm  
16 under oath.

17 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

18 And Michael Sanders?

19 MR. SANDERS: Present, and I understand I'm  
20 under oath.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

22 Ian C. Wagner?

23 MR. WAGNER: Present, understand I'm under  
24 oath.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

1 Cameron P. Ford?

2 MR. FORD: Present, and I understand I'm under  
3 oath.

4 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

5 William Schoen? William Schoen?

6 MS. DONALD: Director Ingram?

7 MR. INGRAM: Yes.

8 MS. DONALD: This is Investigator Donald. He  
9 was approved under item 70.

10 MR. INGRAM: Thank you very much.

11 Maria Torres Arellano?

12 MS. ARELLANO: Present, and I understand that I  
13 am under oath.

14 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

15 Okay. Is Anthony Escamilla now on the call?

16 Okay. Mark Splinter?

17 MR. SPLINTER: Present, and I understand I'm  
18 under oath.

19 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mark.

20 Okay. We have everyone accounted for with the  
21 exception of Mr. Escamilla.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Kevin, it's  
23 Ray Flynn, for the record. I'm back on the call. Would  
24 you mind taking a roll call, and then we will get  
25 started again.

1 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. So let's see. Chairman  
2 is now on the call.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Present.

4 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Detmer, are you on the call?

5 MR. DETMER: I am.

6 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

7 Board Member Brown?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm here.

9 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Gronauer?

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Here.

11 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here.

13 MR. INGRAM: And, Shannon, are you back on?

14 THE REPORTER: Yes, I'm back on. I never left.

15 MR. INGRAM: Okay.

16 THE REPORTER: I have been reporting this.

17 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you, Shannon.

18 THE REPORTER: Yeah, thank you.

19 MR. INGRAM: Do you need to take a break before  
20 we start again?

21 THE REPORTER: Oh, no, thank you. I'm good.  
22 I'm good to go. Thank you.

23 MR. INGRAM: Please interrupt us if you do.

24 THE REPORTER: All right. I certainly will.  
25 Thank you, sir.

1 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

2 Board member, or I'm sorry, Board Chair Flynn,  
3 we have everybody accounted for, with the exception of  
4 Anthony Escamilla, item number 63, unless he's just  
5 called in.

6 Anthony, are you on the call?

7 Okay. So we can go ahead and move forward with  
8 item number 57, or I'm sorry, 56, if you would like,  
9 sir.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. Item number 56.  
11 Jeffrey A. Kaplan DBA K & K Confidential Investigations  
12 is applying for an individual private investigator  
13 license. This is subject to all statutory and  
14 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

15 Mr. Kaplan, a little bit about yourself and  
16 what you want to do here.

17 MR. KAPLAN: Yes. Good morning, everyone.  
18 Jeff Kaplan, K & K Confidential Investigations. I've  
19 been a licensed private investigator in the state of  
20 California since 2005. I have worked in the industry  
21 since 1993 under an investigator license in California.  
22 I am currently in the middle of moving to Nevada and  
23 applying for a license here to continue working. We do  
24 a lot of sex trafficking cases, and I work with a lot of  
25 nonprofit foundations, that Nevada's well-known for



1 needing that type of work. So we're looking to expand  
2 operations here.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you, sir.

4 Any public comment on this agenda item?

5 All right. Hearing none, any questions from  
6 the Board?

7 Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
9 Nixon. I'm sorry. I couldn't get off mute quick  
10 enough. There's a lot of questions here under the  
11 financial section.

12 Investigator, have all of these been resolved?

13 MR. KAPLAN: Yes, there's nothing out. As I  
14 explained to Investigator Maxwell who did the  
15 background --

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hold on. Hold on. Hold  
17 on. This is, the question was for the investigator.

18 MR. MAXWELL: This is Investigator Maxwell.  
19 With regards to the items listed, the Chapter 13  
20 bankruptcy was discharged in 2007, about two and a half  
21 years after it was filed. And, also, the March 26th,  
22 2013, the lien, state tax lien, was released on  
23 March 26, 2014. Every one of them that is listed there  
24 was either released or discharged, yes.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And, Mr. Kaplan, I

1 mean how did we -- this is a lot of money for tax  
2 issues. We have how did we get here?

3 MR. KAPLAN: Yes. I'm sorry, as I started to  
4 speak inappropriately. As I explained to Investigator  
5 Maxwell, I was married. There was some confusion in my  
6 ex-wife's name. It came up initially with the state tax  
7 board in California and then with the IRS. Which we  
8 went through an initial bankruptcy with an attorney that  
9 recommended we do a reorganization. We did that to  
10 clear up tax issues, because the IRS kept coming back  
11 every couple of years claiming there was an issue. It's  
12 been an ongoing battle for multiple years. I've paid  
13 the IRS no money. They've continued to release it after  
14 I've refiled the taxes with them several times. And I  
15 do have all documented records.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from  
18 the Board?

19 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a  
20 motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
22 Nixon. I move that we approve Jeffrey A. Kaplan DBA, or  
23 doing business as K & K Confidential Investigations. He  
24 is applying for an individual private investigator's  
25 license. This is subject, this would be subject to all

1 statutory and regulatory requirements.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

3 I have a motion. Do I have a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I  
5 second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
7 I have a second. Any further discussion on this item?

8 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
9 those in favor of the motion, state "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any opposed?

12 The motion carries unanimously. Thank you,  
13 Mr. Kaplan. You have a good day.

14 MR. KAPLAN: Thank you all. Have a great day.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Item number 57.  
16 Mark J. Splinter II dba Mark Splinter Investigations is  
17 applying for an individual private investigator's  
18 license. This is subject to all statutory and  
19 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

20 Mr. Splinter, tell us a little bit about  
21 yourself and what you want to do here.

22 MR. SPLINTER: Good morning. This is Mark  
23 Splinter. I am the owner of Mark Splinter  
24 Investigations. I am applying for a PI license in the  
25 state of Nevada. I have spent 25 years as a private

1 investigator, working for the first 17 years within an  
2 FIU environment for 40 national corporations. In 2017,  
3 I opened my own business in California. I have been  
4 licensed since 2016, I believe. Prior to that, I worked  
5 under a previous license in California. And I'm hoping  
6 to continue my career in Nevada. I live in the Incline  
7 Village area, and I'm hoping to work primarily in  
8 northern Nevada. My specialties are surveillance, sex  
9 trafficking, yeah, primarily. Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

11 Any public comment on this item?

12 All right. Hearing none, any questions from  
13 the Board?

14 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a  
15 motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Board Member Nixon. I  
17 move that we approve Mark J. Splinter II, doing business  
18 as Mark Splinter Investigations. He is applying for an  
19 individual private investigator's license. This would  
20 be subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. Do I  
22 have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a  
25 motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?

1 All right. Hearing none, all in favor, state  
2 "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.

5 Oh. Any nays?

6 All right. Motion carried. Thank you,

7 Mr. Splinter. You have a good day.

8 MR. SPLINTER: Thank you. Have a nice evening.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 58. Protect-Us  
10 Security Corporation is applying for a new corporate  
11 private patrolman license. Nadiya Aziz is applying for  
12 an individual private patrolman license. If approved,  
13 she's requesting that her individual license be placed  
14 in abeyance so that she may become the qualifying agent.  
15 Corporate officer to be approved is Nadiya Aziz. This  
16 is subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
17 For possible action.

18 Ms. Aziz, please tell us about a little bit  
19 about yourself and what you want to do here.

20 MS. AZIZ: Hello. My name is Nadiya Aziz, and  
21 I am the owner of Protect-Us. I graduated in 2004 with  
22 a degree in criminal justice and concentration in event  
23 science. I did my internship under the deputy coroner  
24 for Los Angeles County Coroner's Office. I went to work  
25 for a security company and opened up my own company,

1 which is Protect-Us, about eight years ago. And I would  
2 like to expand out to Nevada.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.  
4 Any public comment?

5 MS. AZIZ: Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Hearing  
7 none, any question from the Board?

8 I do, for the investigator. I noticed in the  
9 background there was something about a citation for  
10 unlicensed activity, pretty recent. Can you comment?

11 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair, this is Investigator  
12 Saladino. For unlicensed activity? I don't, I'm not  
13 seeing that in the report.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Maybe I -- that  
15 could be on me. And I apologize. Maybe I --

16 MR. SALADINO: No problem.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- had it on another one  
18 and put it in the wrong, my notes are wrong. Anybody  
19 else have questions while I check?

20 Okay. I see what I did. Ms. Aziz, and for the  
21 record, I apologize. You've never had an unlicensed  
22 activity citation. I made a mistake on my notes. So  
23 you're all good.

24 MS. AZIZ: All right. You made me a little  
25 nervous there. I was like, I haven't done any business

1 there.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I know. You're all  
3 good. It's on me.

4 MS. AZIZ: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
6 questions?

7 All right. I'll call for a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
9 Nixon. I move that we approve Protect-Us Security  
10 Corporation, who is applying for a new corporate private  
11 patrolman license. Nadiya Aziz is applying for an  
12 individual private patrolman license. If approved, she  
13 is requesting that her individual license be placed into  
14 abeyance so that she may become the qualifying agent.  
15 Corporate officer to be approved is Nadiya Aziz. This  
16 would be subject to all statutory and regulatory  
17 requirements.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
19 Do I have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I  
21 second.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion and a  
23 second. Any further discussion?

24 All those in favor, state "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.

2 Thank you, ma'am. You have a good day.

3 MS. AZIZ: Thank you so much. You guys have a  
4 good day.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 59.  
6 ETS Risk Management Incorporated is applying for a new  
7 corporate private patrolman license. Anthony R. Haskamp  
8 is applying for an individual private patrolman license.  
9 If approved, he is requesting that his individual  
10 license be placed in abeyance so that he may become the  
11 qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be approved are  
12 Tara A. Deane and Mark E. Deane. This is subject to all  
13 statutory and regulatory requirements. For possible  
14 action.

15 Are you, are both of you here?

16 MR. DEANE: Good morning. Yes, yes. This is  
17 Mark Deane here. And, I believe, Tara and Anthony are  
18 on the call as well.

19 MS. DEANE: Yes.

20 MR. HASKAMP: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Would one of you start  
22 off. Tell us what you're doing here and what you want  
23 to do in Nevada.

24 MR. DEANE: Thank you. Good morning to  
25 everyone. My name's Mark Deane, CEO of ETS Risk



1 Management. A little bit about myself, former member of  
2 British government in a covert counter-terrorism role.  
3 Relocated to America with my family in 2012, and we  
4 started ETS Risk Management, which is a small risk  
5 management company.

6 One of our clients, a large 1410, has  
7 significant presence in Las Vegas for a large event  
8 that's held annually there. So we're hoping to  
9 formalize our relationship and our licensing within  
10 Nevada to ensure compliance moving forward to help  
11 support that client and, hopefully, grow business within  
12 the state as well.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

14 Is there any public comment on this item?

15 Okay. Hearing none, any questions from the  
16 Board?

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
18 Nixon. In your investigation, in the investigator's  
19 notes, it says that you were fined for doing unlicensed  
20 activity in Nevada. Could you tell us a little bit  
21 about that.

22 MR. DEANE: Good morning, ma'am. Is that for  
23 me, just to check in, and not for the investigator? I  
24 just wanted to make sure.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, I'm sorry. Let's

1 start with the investigator. Sorry about that. I was  
2 not clear.

3 MR. DEANE: No, no, absolutely.

4 MR. SWARTHOUT: Investigator Swarthout. They  
5 were fined in December 6 of 2019 for an event. The  
6 citation number was I-0157-19. It was for the Amazon  
7 Web Seb Services Reinvent 2019 that was held at the  
8 Sands Expo. This citation has been paid in full.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And then,  
10 Mr. Deane, I'm sorry, did you not know that you needed  
11 to be licensed in Nevada, or what happened there?

12 MR. DEANE: Yeah, absolutely, ma'am. It was  
13 complete oversight on our behalf. And I know ignorance  
14 is never an excuse. But it was one where I was there in  
15 a project management role, and there were multiple  
16 licensed entities on site. So we just had a complete  
17 lack of -- well, just ignorance on our behalf. We  
18 didn't realize that as a program management, even in  
19 charge of licensed entities, that we also had to be as  
20 well. So as soon as we identified that, we applied for  
21 this license to make sure that moving forward we're a  
22 hundred percent compliant.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Understood. Thank you.  
24 That's all for me, Chairman.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I've got a

1 question for the applicant. So were you hired by the  
2 event organizer, or were you hired by Amazon Web  
3 Services?

4 MR. DEANE: Directly by AWS, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm surprised  
6 they didn't check. Normally, Fortune 10 companies are  
7 very careful about stuff like that.

8 All right. Any other questions from the Board?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, this is Gronauer.  
10 Are you licensed in any other state?

11 MR. DEANE: Sir, we recently just became  
12 licensed in New Mexico, again for a direct task for a  
13 client.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Are you  
15 operating in other states besides New Mexico?

16 MR. DEANE: No, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
19 questions?

20 All right. I'll call for a motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
22 Nixon. I move that we approve ETS Risk Management Inc.,  
23 who is applying for a new corporate private patrolman  
24 license. Anthony R. Haskamp is applying for his  
25 individual private patrolman license. If approved, he's

1 requesting that his individual license be placed into  
2 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.  
3 Corporate officers to be approved with Tara A. Deane and  
4 Mark E. Deane. This would be subject to all statutory  
5 and regulatory requirements.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
7 Do I have a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion and  
10 second. Any further discussion?

11 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.  
12 All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion  
15 carried. Congratulations to you. You have a good day.

16 MR. DEANE: Thank you all. Have a good day.

17 MR. HASKAMP: Thank you.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you. Bye-bye.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 60. State  
20 Security Protection LLC is applying for a new corporate  
21 private patrolman license. Michael Flores Jr. is  
22 applying for an individual private patrolman license.  
23 If approved, he's requesting that his individual license  
24 be placed in abeyance so that he may become the  
25 qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Alyssa

1 Marie C. Atilano. This is subject to all statutory and  
2 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

3 Are both of you here?

4 MS. ATILANO: Yes.

5 MR. FLORES: Yes, correct.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. One of you be the  
7 spokesperson and tell us a little bit about the company  
8 and why you're here and what you want to do in Nevada.

9 MR. FLORES: My name is Michael Flores Jr.  
10 I've been in Nevada since 2006, started my career in  
11 2006. We're looking to start State Security Protection.  
12 I started as a security officer in 2006 with Monument  
13 Security, worked my way up to supervisor, manager,  
14 account manager, and after 10 years I became the branch  
15 manager of the company. We're looking now to branch out  
16 on our own and start our own business.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any public  
18 comment on this item?

19 All right. Hearing none, any questions from  
20 the Board?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm looking at the  
24 eight arrests from 1997 to through 2009. For our  
25 investigator, what have we found out, are these all

1 taken care of, what's going on with this?

2 MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair, this is Investigator  
3 Saladino.

4 Yes, all of the arrests have been taken care  
5 of. I even contacted the applicant to see if we were  
6 able to get a certificate for the substance abuse. We  
7 were able to contact Central Coast Headway Program. But  
8 after seven years, they discard the records. So he did  
9 complete a substance abuse program. The first couple  
10 were juvenile. So he was, you know, underage and was  
11 placed in juvenile hall. We did try, like I said, to  
12 get the substance abuse certificate to show that he has  
13 dealt with that issue. And then the records, we haven't  
14 found anything since the 2009 warrant for the driving  
15 without a license.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Does the  
17 applicant show any certificates from these schools, or  
18 you said substance abuse places, did he produce any  
19 certificates? Because if you go through them, you get a  
20 certificate.

21 MR. SALADINO: Correct, and that's what we  
22 tried to locate. He completed the -- let's see. In it  
23 was like '06 when he had completed it. But after so  
24 many years, the company where he got the certificate  
25 from, they discard them. So we were unable to get an

1 actually certificate. But Central Coast Headway  
2 Program, you know, they do have him on record as being  
3 there, they just weren't able to produce the record  
4 because the files are discarded.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And I understand  
6 under finding out if he's a citizen, a real person, or  
7 whatever, he was confirmed with a certificate of live  
8 birth from the state of California. I see that he had a  
9 lot of driver's license problems, including a warrant.  
10 Obviously, this goes back 10 to 11 years ago. However,  
11 between the substance abuse and the driver's license  
12 stuff, and they all would go into a warrant and not  
13 tickets, does he have a driver's license?

14 MR. SALADINO: It is correct. He has a current  
15 driver's license that expires July 20th of 2027 here in  
16 the state of Nevada.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I appreciate for your  
18 good work you're doing. Thank you.

19 MR. SALADINO: You're welcome.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Flores, do you want  
21 to comment about those years that are under scrutiny  
22 right now? Although we do know it's been 11 years ago.  
23 I mean that we need to be comfortable that we don't have  
24 to worry about that.

25 MR. FLORES: Yeah, I'd like to comment. I know

1 I've made some mistakes in my past. And, yes, it was  
2 over 12 years ago. It's something that I have carried  
3 with all my life. It has hindered me from progress.  
4 But, and the same token, I have made so much progress  
5 over the years. And I believe that that is in my past,  
6 and I can comfortably say that it is in my past. I do  
7 not look back to that time, because that is in my past.  
8 I am moving forward now. And I could assure you that  
9 that is no problem anymore.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

11 Any other questions from the Board?

12 All right. I am seeking a motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, I had one final  
14 question. All of these have been resolved? And this is  
15 for the investigator.

16 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. That was it.

18 So I move that we approve State Security  
19 Protection LLC, who's applying for a new corporate  
20 private patrolman license. Michael Flores Jr. is  
21 applying for an individual private patrolman license.  
22 If approved, he is requesting that his individual  
23 license be placed into abeyance so that he may become  
24 the qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Alyssa  
25 Marie C. Atilano. This is subject to statutory and



1 regulatory requirements.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
3 Do I have a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a  
6 motion, and I have a second. Any further discussion?

7 Seeing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
8 in favor, state "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
11 Mr. Flores, you have a good day. Thank you.

12 MR. FLORES: Likewise. Thank you so much.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay, number 61.

14 MIB-Shield LLC is applying for a new corporate private  
15 patrolman license. Randall J. Rodriguez is applying for  
16 an individual private patrolman license. If approved,  
17 he is requesting that his individual license be placed  
18 in abeyance so that he can become the qualifying agent.  
19 Member to be approved is Steven R. Aguilar. This is  
20 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
21 For possible action.

22 Gentlemen, are you both here?

23 MR. AGUILAR: Yes, sir.

24 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Yes, sir. Good morning, Board.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. One of you be the

1 spokesperson and tell us why you're here and what you  
2 want to do in Nevada, a little bit of background on your  
3 company.

4 MR. AGUILAR: Good morning, all. This is Steve  
5 Aguilar. My background started 25 years ago as a career  
6 law enforcement officer. Started with the City of  
7 Compton, California. And the sheriffs took over, so it  
8 became L.A. County Sheriff. And eventually I left and  
9 went to Homeland Security as a special agent. I retired  
10 with about just under 20 years. And all that time that  
11 I just spoke of, I was doing security, either working  
12 for other companies or helping out, until lately, like  
13 the early 2007, I think, when I finally applied for some  
14 of my own licenses.

15 I work, well, an array of different industries.  
16 I finally found the niche of entertainment industry.  
17 It's music and actors, and which crosses over to Nevada.  
18 And we have a client that we have that has some active  
19 accounts in Nevada. As you can imagine, right now, some  
20 of the industry has closed down because of Covid. They  
21 would like to open or extend to Nevada. I found -- I  
22 don't reside in Nevada, so I found what I believe is a  
23 qualified agent, which is Randall Rodriguez, and he also  
24 has some law enforcement background.

25 And that's all, without a question.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. Any  
2 public comment on this?

3 All right. Hearing none, questions from the  
4 Board?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: For the investigator,  
8 can you get into a little bit about doing without a  
9 license at Broad Acres Market?

10 MR. SALADINO: Yes. This is Investigator  
11 Saladino. So when I contacted Mr. Aguilar in regards to  
12 it, he had stated that he had done some work for Broad  
13 Acres outside of Nevada and that he was kind of brought  
14 on to kind of help them get started after the closure  
15 and then when they reopened. He told us that he was  
16 only doing COVID-19 checks. He had requested to do  
17 more, like bag checks and spot checks on folks coming  
18 in, but Broad Acres at the time didn't want it. I had  
19 asked him to provide something in writing from Broad  
20 Acres stating that that's all they were doing was -- was  
21 the COVID-19 checks. However, Broad Acres stated that  
22 they did not want to put anything in writing. They were  
23 worried about legal ramifications or something to that  
24 effect.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So he just was

1 issued a cease and desist, that was it?

2 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And just going  
4 through your whole report here, it is very informative.  
5 But I'm a little confused. The December 2012 revoked  
6 applicant's license and training certificate, let's do  
7 that. That's July 14, 2010 conviction. What was that  
8 conviction? Somewhere I'm missing something.

9 MR. SALADINO: So that was in the report for  
10 the law enforcement, slash, public records. There was a  
11 felony conviction out of Los Angeles, California on  
12 July 14th, 2010. He completed two years of felony  
13 probation. And that was for false imprisonment by  
14 violence.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Can I ask, was that  
17 admitted to by the applicant? Or you said it was  
18 discovered, so.

19 MR. SALADINO: No, the applicant reported that.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

21 MR. SALADINO: And he did provide his 1203.4  
22 dismissal paperwork as well.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And does it have  
24 anything to do with the going after a debt that was  
25 owed?

1 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And then, in  
3 2015, the registration, security guard registration was  
4 revoked because he didn't comply with the terms of his  
5 probation. Can you get a little deeper?

6 MR. SALADINO: Yes. So with --

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because if you can,  
8 that's great.

9 MR. SALADINO: So according to BSIS, which is  
10 the California Bureau of Security and Investigative  
11 Services, the license that was issued for his private  
12 investigator was issued on March 13th of '09. It was  
13 revoked when this issue had come up about the arrest  
14 from 2004. He had a hearing with BSIS, and they  
15 subsequently revoked all his licenses. Then there was a  
16 decision that was made effective December 10th of 2016  
17 where he had his licenses reinstated. And then they  
18 were again immediately revoked because he did not meet  
19 all the terms and conditions set forth by BSIS.

20 So his probation is going to expire in 2021 if  
21 all the terms are met with BSIS. So currently he's on  
22 probation with BSIS in regards to his licensing in  
23 California.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Yeah, he's  
25 currently on probation with them, correct, for all these

1 violations. All right. No problem. I'm just trying to  
2 figure it out. Thank you.

3 MR. SALADINO: You're welcome.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And Mr. -- the  
5 applicant, can you, do you want to explain any of this?

6 MR. AGUILAR: Sure. So I was retired about  
7 eight months already. I was in the process of a private  
8 investigation. And you can see what happened. They  
9 claimed that there was a -- that I held them against  
10 their will and a bunch of other stuff. The court case,  
11 as you can see, was really extensive. But ultimately it  
12 was vacated and dismissed, and all my licenses were  
13 fully restored.

14 As far as the probation aspect, that was just  
15 because I didn't -- I felt once it was all restored, it  
16 was good to go, and I didn't file some paperwork with  
17 BSIS. Apparently, they have their own little probation  
18 status. Which I found out later on. And I've been  
19 compliant ever since.

20 But everything was restored, including my POST  
21 certificate. I am a firearms instructor. And I do  
22 backgrounds for a local agency. So my record is now  
23 clean, I believe.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you employed now?

25 MR. AGUILAR: Well, I'm the owner of this

1 company. And then I just do consulting work.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And this company  
3 is licensed where?

4 MR. AGUILAR: California. It's here in  
5 California, and then now we're trying to cross over to  
6 Nevada.

7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, Tammy.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
10 Nixon. I have a follow-up question. So it says here  
11 the applicant's probation will expire in 2021. So are  
12 you able to practice legally in California?

13 MR. AGUILAR: You're asking me, Steve Aguilar?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, sir. Yes, sir, I'm  
15 asking you.

16 MR. AGUILAR: Yes. Yes, because that's not a  
17 criminal probation. That's a BSIS probation.

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: But under their licensing,  
19 are you able to -- and maybe this is for the  
20 investigator. Is he able to practice in California on a  
21 probationary status?

22 MR. SALADINO: So from what I've seen from  
23 BSIS's decisions that they've made, on their website, it  
24 shows that his work card, his like security guard card  
25 is the only thing that's active. And everything else

1 has been placed -- has been revoked pending the outcome  
2 in 2021 if he meets all the terms of the probation.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm just having -- this  
4 is Gronauer again.

5 MR. AGUILAR: This is Steve Aguilar. As far as  
6 I know, I'm pretty sure that I have no restrictions.  
7 I'm able to operate as normal as long as I follow the  
8 terms and conditions that they have.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Aguilar, you've  
10 been in law enforcement for quite some time, correct?

11 MR. AGUILAR: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Which means you  
13 did some investigations and stuff like that. You have  
14 to understand, you would normally cross all the t's and  
15 dot all the i's if you are investigation somebody. So  
16 when you say "I believe, I believe I believe," I think,  
17 you should know. And that's where my problem lies right  
18 now. And we aren't getting a -- we're not getting a  
19 real clear answer at this point as far as I'm concerned.  
20 And with our past practices, if somebody had outstanding  
21 warrants, outstanding payments, or on probation for  
22 certain things, we don't look, we don't look highly on  
23 that. So I'm just letting you go know that. I just  
24 have my own problems with this at this point.

25 MR. AGUILAR: Understood. And, I guess, to



1 clarify, yes, I am fully authorized, and I can operate.  
2 There's no restrictions.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: This is Ray Flynn, for  
4 the record. You are on probation for your license to a  
5 date in 2021, correct?

6 MR. AGUILAR: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
8 Any other questions from the Board?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, I'm good.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I will call for a  
12 motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
14 Nixon. I move that we do not approve MIB-Shield LLC,  
15 who's applying for a new corporate private patrolman  
16 license. Randall J. Rodriguez is applying, should be  
17 denied his individual private patrolman license and not  
18 be allowed to be placed into abeyance and become the  
19 qualifying agent. I'm also moving that we do not  
20 approve Steven R. Aguilar. That's my motion.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
22 Do I have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer seconds.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All those in --

1 well, before, any other discussion?

2 All in favor of the motion, state "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
5 The application was denied. Gentlemen, I suggest that  
6 when you're done with probation and you have  
7 documentation to certify that, to recontact the  
8 investigator and proceed.

9 MR. AGUILAR: Okay. Thank you.

10 MR. RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tammy, I'm going  
12 to need you to take over for a little bit. I've got  
13 to -- I'm being distracted over here.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: You got it.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm going on  
16 mute. I'll let you know when I'm back.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. The motion that is,  
18 or the item that is up now is number 62. Knight Watch  
19 Protection Agency LLC is applying for a new corporate  
20 private patrolman license. Robert M.M. Wright-Fogle is  
21 applying for an individual private patrolman license.  
22 If approved, he is requesting that his individual  
23 license be placed into abeyance so that he may become  
24 the qualifying agent. Members to be approved are  
25 Robert M.M. Wright-Fogle and Christopher K. Pancoast.

1 This would be subject to all statutory and regulatory  
2 requirements.

3 I do need to note that I need to recuse myself  
4 from this vote as both gentlemen used to work for me at  
5 Allied Universal.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. This is  
7 Gronauer. Ms. Nixon, with you and Ray out of this, that  
8 leaves only two of us. Could we go to legal and just  
9 see if we could just trail this for a couple?

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

11 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. That  
12 could be trailed if that would be the most efficacious  
13 manner in which to proceed. The Chair in this case  
14 would be Board Member Nixon, who is acting as Chair, has  
15 the ability to table items until later.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. I would like to go  
17 ahead. Do I need to go through the whole thing? Can I  
18 just go ahead and table this until Board Chairman Ray  
19 Flynn comes back?

20 MR. DETMER: Yes, Board Member Nixon. You can  
21 just move to the next agenda item.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Perfect.

23 MR. DETMER: Sorry, gentlemen. We don't have  
24 enough people to make a vote. So we will trail this.

25 Okay. So moving to the next item, item number

1 63. Single Source Security, LLC doing business as  
2 Protos Security, is applying for a new corporate private  
3 patrolman license. Clacie J. McGuffin is applying for  
4 an individual private patrolman license. If approved,  
5 he is requesting that his individual license be placed  
6 in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.  
7 Members to be approved are Christopher D. Copenhaver and  
8 Anthony L. Escamilla and John P. Henderson. This would  
9 be subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

10 So I open this up. Are there any public  
11 comment or questions on this item?

12 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon, Kevin Ingram.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

14 MR. INGRAM: We had Mr. Anthony Escamilla  
15 unable to call in earlier. So he was not sworn in.

16 Mr. Escamilla, are you still, are you now on  
17 the phone call?

18 MR. ESCAMILLA: Yes, sir, I am.

19 MR. INGRAM: Mike, would you go ahead and swear  
20 him in, please.

21 MR. DETMER: It would be my pleasure.

22 Sir, do you hereby swear and affirm to tell the  
23 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

24 MR. ESCAMILLA: I do.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

1 Board Member Nixon, we are free to go ahead and  
2 proceed. Thank you.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So I open it up  
4 again. Are there any question, public questions?

5 Okay. Any Board member questions?

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes. Board Member Brown.  
7 If I could ask Investigator Saladino what the unlicensed  
8 activity was in 2019.

9 MR. SALADINO: Yes, sir. Investigator  
10 Saladino. So this, again, happened to be a company that  
11 does not reside here in Nevada, that was contracting  
12 licensed security companies here in Nevada. And, again,  
13 that contract ran through Protos and not a Nevada  
14 entity. So that's why they were cited for the  
15 unlicensed activity.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, sir.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So this is Board Member  
18 Nixon. I have to ask the same questions that we asked  
19 the other entities that's were not -- I'm sure they're  
20 subcontracting as well. Are they licensed in other  
21 states? And what was the lack of follow-through here  
22 for Nevada? And that would be for --

23 MR. HENDERSON: Yes, ma'am.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Go ahead.

25 MR. HENDERSON: Yeah, this is John Henderson.

1 I go by Patrick. But this is, just to add some color,  
2 we are, like you're aware, we are a management company,  
3 a hundred percent a management company. So we provide  
4 the opportunities for companies in your area, in your  
5 state to work underneath us. And so our goal is to get  
6 vendors that have properly been licensed in Nevada and  
7 carry the appropriate level of insurance, and that  
8 they're in good standing. That's what we do.

9 And when Investigator Saladino reached out to  
10 us, we were, unfortunately, we were just unaware of this  
11 in your state, and we took swift action to get, to kind  
12 of get it squared away. So he was really, you know,  
13 very, he communicated really well with us. We did  
14 whatever we needed to do.

15 The other states, we are out of Virginia, so we  
16 are licensed with the DCJS with Virginia. And we have  
17 been -- we ran into some -- a couple years ago, we had  
18 an interaction with Arkansas, and we were able to get  
19 that squared away as well. We were, unfortunately,  
20 we -- we, as a management company, in many states are as  
21 to a hundred percent, so we don't have any officers on  
22 our payroll. So for us, we are just the middleman.

23 So we apologize. We were just unaware of this.  
24 And we'll take swift action to get it squared away.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So what --

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If I --

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Go ahead, Bobby.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry. I  
4 interrupted. That's my fault. Go ahead if you have  
5 something. I didn't mean to step on you.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No worries.

7 So what other states are you, do you do  
8 business in?

9 MR. HENDERSON: We do business in -- well, it's  
10 wherever the business is currently with our clients.  
11 But we have done business in the majority of the states  
12 in the U.S., Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So are you licensed  
14 properly in those states?

15 MR. HENDERSON: Yes, ma'am, as far as we are,  
16 everything so far. And I'll let Tony speak on that as  
17 well as Chris. But as far as what we've reviewed and  
18 everything like that, we have no other citations. And  
19 we are trying, as always, to keep up with the states. I  
20 mean states come up with new regulations or whatnot.  
21 But as far as I'm concerned, we are. We've done our due  
22 diligence so far. And so I'll let them comment on that.

23 MR. COPENHAVER: Yes, and thank you, Patrick.  
24 This is Chris Copenhaver. Just to add into what Patrick  
25 has said, for all those areas in which we've done

1 business, we have sought license and applied and  
2 obtained where it was needed. And, you know, to our  
3 best of our knowledge, we are in good standing in all  
4 states. As Patrick said, you know, occasionally things  
5 will crop up. Either with, if it's a license or  
6 anything like that, just like it was done with you guys,  
7 we take swift action, jump on it right away. We want to  
8 do the right thing. You know, we want to be transparent  
9 in all our business.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. It's  
12 one thing to be reactive. I'd rather it be proactive on  
13 your part. When you say you believe you're all  
14 up-to-date in all these other states, we just went  
15 through earlier today with another company, and it's a  
16 problem. How long have you been operating in Nevada?

17 MR. HENDERSON: I believe, we started doing a  
18 little bit of work from time to time in 2010. And,  
19 again, our focus was just making really sure that our  
20 vendors are licensed. And that's what we really focused  
21 on. And we were unaware of needing this specific  
22 license. But we have hired Clacie McGuffin to come in  
23 and provide this, to be this like individual for our  
24 company.

25 But we do have no presence in, we have no



1 physical presence in Nevada, either. We are out of  
2 Virginia. So we have no brick-and-mortar or any  
3 structure there. We work with a lot of, some of the  
4 best companies, security vendors in your state. So we  
5 work through them.

6 MR. COPENHAVER: And, Patrick, I just wanted to  
7 add in, too, our focus has always been into ensuring  
8 that the providers, the vendors that we utilize, as  
9 Patrick indicated, are properly licensed. You know, we  
10 track that information. The insurance is up to par. We  
11 have a very strong dedicated team to ensure that all the  
12 documentation that we are receiving is correct and  
13 valid, a strong, robust quality assurance program for us  
14 and also our clients. And, you know, I guess, our  
15 office will focus on them. And occasionally, we just  
16 didn't ask the question like, you know, for especially  
17 your state, Nevada, should, you know, is this, and then  
18 we fall under ourselves.

19 But, again, just it's always been, for us, it's  
20 ensuring that who is servicing our client sites, our  
21 locations, is properly licensed, properly insured,  
22 properly trained and all that. And it was just an error  
23 on our part not to fully investigate for Nevada.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I don't know if  
25 you're acting as just an intermediary, or are you just a

1 qualified agent, or are you corporate officers? You  
2 know, it just puts me where I'm not sure what your role  
3 is. If you're already operating with licensed people in  
4 Nevada, they're the ones who are licensed, what is your  
5 role? And if you get licensed here -- it's just you  
6 should have been licensed. And if you're licensed here,  
7 you have to have a qualified agent here and have your  
8 records here.

9 Kevin, if you mind, if you don't mind, Kevin,  
10 can you speak to that a little bit?

11 MR. INGRAM: Yes. And they're aware of the  
12 need now for the qualifying agent to be present in  
13 Nevada to oversee the operations. Regardless of whether  
14 they have boots on the ground or they're delegating or  
15 subcontracting work to one of our license holders, they  
16 fall under that, the same umbrella that the other  
17 company did. They are the company that is taking on the  
18 contracts with individuals in Nevada. There's where the  
19 money goes. They, in turn, then hire a licensed  
20 individual to do the work. So, therefore, they're part  
21 of the money flow, they're part of the licensing need in  
22 Nevada, performing more as a security consultant, and  
23 then subcontract out, which, as we all know, requires  
24 licensure.

25 So they are kind of falling under the same

1 umbrella, Board Member Gronauer. And, I guess, my  
2 question is we haven't gotten a definitive answer of, of  
3 the other states that they're working in, are they  
4 licensed there?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right.

6 MR. INGRAM: You know, we've heard that they  
7 think they're falling under and doing everything  
8 correctly. But we don't have a definitive answer. Are  
9 they licensed in other states that they're to be  
10 licensed in?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, and they said  
12 that they're looking into it and, to the best of their  
13 knowledge, they are. And that answer's just -- I'm  
14 sorry. It sounds like a very professional company  
15 that's just working on the fringes of some things at  
16 times. That's the way I feel about it. And in  
17 Nevada -- did I say Nevada? Oh, yeah, in Nevada, almost  
18 across this country, people know how, what licensing has  
19 to be done in Nevada. I mean I just know that from  
20 being on this Board, how many people say, "Oh, my God,  
21 you guys are tough." Yeah, we're tough, but then we  
22 protect everybody from Nevada and everybody with  
23 licensing.

24 So that's just a statement. But what I'm  
25 trying to get to is I agree with you, we have to know if

1 they're licensed or not. We already did this earlier  
2 this morning. And that gives me the problem. So I'm  
3 done.

4 MR. COPENHAVER: One thing -- and I appreciate  
5 the comment. And, you know, our -- this is Chris. Our,  
6 you know, our -- you know, just to really understand who  
7 Protos is, is when we work with these large corporate  
8 clients of ours that may be headquartered in Chicago or  
9 New York or wherever else, and we take on their program,  
10 our goal and our asset is to really give them a full  
11 view, you know, all their locations and their security,  
12 you know, what are the officers seeing, you know, what  
13 type of incidents are they. We try to put some  
14 analytics and data behind the program, so they can, you  
15 now, find out, A, is the program effective, and then are  
16 they taking the proper steps to ensure them that there's  
17 a good -- you know, the security's provided correctly.

18 So we're all about intelligent data. And, you  
19 know, in this, we have, you know, we have hired a  
20 compliance officer to ensure that we do meet the  
21 compliances of all 50 states. So we're, Patrick and I  
22 try to just be as transparent and truthful as we can.  
23 You know, we want to be transparent. We want to ensure  
24 that we're doing the right thing. And that was the  
25 thing we wanted to ensure, and we hired this compliance

1 officer.

2 I don't know if, Patrick, if you want to add  
3 anything to that or not.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So. Thank you,  
5 sirs. I appreciate it, I think, you know, now.

6 Are there any further questions?

7 Any public questions?

8 MR. ZANE: I have a public question, if you can  
9 hear me.

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, I can.

11 MR. ZANE: Hi. This is Mark Zane from the  
12 Nevada Association of Licensed Repossessors.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

14 MR. ZANE: I tried, I attempted to interject on  
15 item number 54, but the phone wouldn't allow it. And  
16 I'm interjecting now because it's a similar subject  
17 matter. And it may be that it's the specifics of the  
18 application or the regulation that applies to the  
19 statute. But how does item number 63 differentiate from  
20 the business model that the Board previously analyzed  
21 with Trustify as it applied to private investigators  
22 and, before that, several years earlier, as it applied  
23 standards to repossession forwarding companies  
24 nationwide who did little more than contract with the  
25 banks in order to find licensed entities state by state

1 where regulations required licensure to put the work?

2 I'm just trying to find the nuance, the difference.

3 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.

4 While it was initially qualified as a public question,

5 it actually goes to public comment --

6 (The Reporter indicated having difficulty

7 hearing.)

8 MR. DETMER: So, I believe, while it was  
9 initially qualified as a public question, it actually  
10 goes to public comment. And there is no statutory  
11 obligation to respond to questions. It just is an  
12 opportunity for the public to make a comment regarding  
13 this potential, well, regarding this agenda item. But I  
14 leave it to the Chairwoman's or the Acting Chairwoman's  
15 discretion.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you for that.

17 MR. ZANE: I can change it to a comment. I  
18 just thought maybe a clarification would send me back to  
19 my seat. But I can change it to a comment if it pleases  
20 the Chair.

21 MR. INGRAM: And, Board Member Nixon, Kevin  
22 Ingram, for the record. I think, I can give a very  
23 brief explanation that might be important on the record.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, please. Thank you.

25 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you.

1           Mr. Zane, to address that, differences of the  
2 example Trustify, Trustify's business model originally  
3 was set up in this way. And once Trustify found out  
4 they were going to have to get licensed with this  
5 business model, they chose to change the business model  
6 to where actual contracts would be directly with the  
7 licensed individuals in Nevada. They would no longer be  
8 in the money flow, with the contracts being directly  
9 with the licensed individuals in Nevada. And then what  
10 happens is those individuals that are licensed in Nevada  
11 could sign up to be part of their reference model to  
12 where Trustify could be used as that platform to place  
13 individuals directly in contact with a license holder.

14           So, hopefully, that clarifies for the Board the  
15 difference here in the situation we're dealing with  
16 today.

17           BOARD MEMBER ZANE: That sends me back to my  
18 seat as it applies to the private investigator, since I  
19 don't -- I'll make a comment with regard to the  
20 application to repossessioners, then, since it's not  
21 appropriate to ask a question.

22           In, I believe it's 2005, the Board took a  
23 similar situation with what they termed to be  
24 repossession forwarders, who hold themselves out  
25 nationally to be the master contract holder on behalf of

1 any national bank or any captive finance company, be it  
2 Honda Financial, Toyota Financial, whoever the case  
3 might be. And there was a matter brought before the  
4 Board for a hearing. It was fairly highly litigated at  
5 the Board meeting. And at the time, it was the Board's  
6 position that as long as these entities were hiring  
7 locally licensed service providers, that there was no  
8 jurisdiction on behalf of the Board to limit their  
9 activity if they were only acting in a forwarding  
10 capacity.

11 So that's what caused the quandary, and that  
12 was more specifically my comment.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, I guess, my question  
14 could be for legal, just to make sure I'm clear, because  
15 now I'm a little confused. It is a regulation that even  
16 if they are subcontracting the business, if they are  
17 part of the financial process, they are required to  
18 possess a license to do business in Nevada?

19 MR. DETMER: Madam Chairwoman, is this  
20 pertinent and relevant to the actual agenda item?  
21 Because my concern is we're kind of going off the agenda  
22 item that this is licensure for.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Because I just --  
24 it's getting -- okay. So if there is nothing else for  
25 public comment or any other questions from the Board,



1 I'd like to move forward.

2 MR. ZANE: Madam Chair, I don't have anything  
3 further. I just wanted to make sure that that was clear  
4 on behalf of my membership.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Fantastic. Thank  
6 you so much, Mr. Zane.

7 Any further questions from the Board?

8 Okay. I move for a motion.

9 This is a second request for a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
11 Brown. I move that we approve the application of Single  
12 Source Security, LLC doing business as Protos Security  
13 to obtain a corporate private patrolman license, and  
14 Clacie McGuffin be approved for his individual private  
15 patrolman license, which will be placed in abeyance so  
16 that he may become the qualifying agent. I also move  
17 that we approve Christopher Copenhaver, Anthony  
18 Escamilla, and John Henderson as members of the  
19 corporation. Subject to all statutory and regulatory  
20 requirements.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Is there a second?

22 Okay. So there is a motion but no second. Is  
23 there another motion? Or is that how I move forward?  
24 Sorry, legal.

25 MR. DETMER: Yes, Chairwoman.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Is there another  
2 motion?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's Gronauer. I make  
4 a motion that we deny. Single Source Security, LLC dba  
5 Protos Security is applying for a new corporate private  
6 patrolman license. Clacie J. McGuffin is applying for  
7 an individual private patrolman license. If approved,  
8 okay, he is requesting his license, so I deny that.  
9 Members to be approved, to be denied is Christopher D.  
10 Copenhaver, Anthony L. Escamilla, and John P. Henderson.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

12 Can I second that?

13 MR. DETMER: Yes, Madam Chairwoman.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So I second. And  
15 the reason I second is to remain consistent with what we  
16 did with Retail Security Services and not having the  
17 knowledge of whether or not they are consistently  
18 licensed properly in the other states.

19 So there is a motion and a second. All in  
20 favor, please say "aye."

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Aye.

22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Aye.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Aye.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: The motion passes.

25 Mr. McGuffin, please work with the PILB staff to, you

1 know, clarify whether or not the rest of your licenses  
2 are in order in the rest of the states. And then we can  
3 move forward in, you know, requesting approval maybe in  
4 the next meeting.

5 MR. MCGUFFIN: Thank you.

6 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tammy this is  
8 Ray. I'm back.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Actually, I've been back  
11 for a little bit. My apologies for leaving you on this  
12 one. I did not expect that.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Who.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Can we go back, I'm sorry,  
16 to -- you might have missed it -- 62? I had to recuse  
17 myself. So there wasn't enough people to vote.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Of course, we  
19 can. So number 62. Did you call for public comment  
20 before the vote?

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I don't think I did  
22 anything because I had to recuse myself and there wasn't  
23 enough people.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So on item number  
25 62, is there any public comment?

1           Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

2           MR. DETMER: And I'm sorry, Mr. Chairman. This  
3 is Mike Detmer, for the record. Maybe it's my -- I'm  
4 not in full recollection of it. But was there  
5 discussion on this matter when it was initially called?

6           BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, there was not.

7           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Then, we'll  
8 start from scratch.

9           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: There was nothing on  
10 this.

11          BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And then,  
12 for full disclosure, this is the problem when you're  
13 working from home, I got contractors here, and I might  
14 have to leave one more time, Tammy.

15          BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it.

16          BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hopefully, they'll leave  
17 me alone for a little bit.

18          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Write them a check.  
19 You'll be fine.

20          BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. Yeah. You left  
21 your checkbook here. They're getting big money.

22          BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are they licensed?

23          BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 62.  
24 Knight Watch Protection Agency LLC is applying for a new  
25 corporate private patrolman license. Robert M.M.

1 Wright-Fogle is applying for an individual private  
2 patrolman license. If approved, he is requesting that  
3 his individual license be placed in abeyance so that he  
4 may become the qualifying agent. Members to be approved  
5 are Robert M.M. Wright-Fogle and Christopher K.  
6 Pancoast. This is subject to all statutory and  
7 regulatory requirements. For possible action.

8 Gentlemen, are you both here?

9 MR. FOGLE: Yes, sir, Robert Fogle is here.

10 MR. PANCOAST: Yes, sir, Christopher Pancoast  
11 Jr. is here.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. If one of you  
13 could be a spokesperson, tell us what you want to do and  
14 what you want to do in Nevada, please.

15 MR. FOGLE: Yes, sir. My name is Robert Fogle.  
16 I was born in Detroit, Michigan. I am here today for  
17 my -- to become a qualifying agent for Knight Watch  
18 Protection Agency. I've been working security for about  
19 eight or nine years. And that's pretty much it.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What do you want  
21 to do here in Nevada?

22 MR. FOGLE: Yes, I'm trying to open up my own  
23 company as a qualifying agent.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

25 Any questions from the Board?

1 All right. Hearing none, I'm seeking a motion.

2 All right. I'm calling for a motion a second  
3 time.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
5 Brown. I move that Knight Watch Protection Agency LLC  
6 be approved for a corporate private patrolman license,  
7 and that Robert M.M. Wright-Fogle be approved for his  
8 individual patrolman, private patrolman license, which  
9 would be placed in abeyance so that he may become the  
10 qualifying agent. I also move that Robert M.M.  
11 Wright-Fogle and Christopher K. Pancoast be approved as  
12 members of the corporation. Subject to all statutory  
13 and regulatory requirements.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

15 And just so we're clear, because there was a  
16 little confusion on this one, I'm going to call for  
17 public comment a second time.

18 Okay. Hearing none, I have a motion. I have a  
19 second. Any further discussion?

20 Okay. Hearing none, all those in favor, state  
21 "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion approved.  
24 Thank you, gentlemen. You have a good day.

25 MR. FOGLE: You, too. Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Director Ingram, if I'm  
2 correct, we're up to number 64?

3 MR. INGRAM: That is correct.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 64.  
5 Mickle E. Billingsley dba Watch Security Services is  
6 applying for an individual private patrolman license.  
7 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
8 requirements. For possible action.

9 Mr. Billingsley, are you here?

10 MR. BILLINGSLEY: Yes, I'm present.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us a little  
12 bit about yourself and what you want to do in Nevada.

13 MR. BILLINGSLEY: For here in Nevada, I've been  
14 in security a little over five years. I'm looking to  
15 start my individual license patrol, if approved, to give  
16 a quality service, security service here in Vegas.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

18 Any public comment on this applicant?

19 Okay. Hearing none, any questions from the  
20 Board?

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
22 Nixon. I just wanted to make sure that all issues with  
23 the bankruptcy -- I know it's been a while, but that has  
24 been taken care and there are no outstanding items?  
25 This is for the investigators. Sorry.

1 MR. SALADINO: Yes, that is correct, there is  
2 no outstanding items.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
5 questions?

6 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a  
7 motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
9 Nixon. I move that we approve Mickle E. Billingsley  
10 doing business as Watch Security Services, who is  
11 applying for an individual private patrol license. This  
12 is subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
14 Do I have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further  
17 discussion?

18 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
19 in favor, state "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

22 Okay. Motion carries. Congratulations,  
23 Mr. Billingsley. You have a good day.

24 MR. BILLINGSLEY: Thank you. And have a great  
25 day, too.



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 65.  
2 Aaron T. Driskill is applying for an individual private  
3 patrolman license. If approved, he's requesting that  
4 his individual license be placed in abeyance so that he  
5 may become the qualifying agent for Brink's  
6 Incorporated, license number 450. This is subject to  
7 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

8 Mr. Driskill, are you here?

9 MR. DRISKILL: Yes, sir, I am.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. A little bit  
11 about yourself and what do you want to do here.

12 MR. DRISKILL: Yes, sir. For the last two  
13 years, I've been working at Brink's Incorporated. For  
14 the last year and a half, I've been the branch trainer.  
15 I was training under the prior QA, Mr. Stan Hanaoka,  
16 who's now retired. And, basically, I would just like to  
17 follow in the same footsteps he did to continue to have  
18 the company stay successful and in compliance and make  
19 sure everybody's trained properly.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

21 Any public comment on this applicant?

22 All right. Hearing none, any questions from  
23 the Board?

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I have a question. This  
25 is concerning the background did reveal some adverse

1 information about doing unlicensed activity.

2 MR. DRISKILL: Was this for the investigator or  
3 myself?

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: The investigator. I'm  
5 sorry. Am I reading that correctly?

6 MR. SALADINO: No, there is no unlicensed  
7 activity in regards to this applicant.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Was it the  
9 financial history, then, that was the -- I'm sorry --  
10 the adverse information?

11 MR. SALADINO: Yes. There was two collections  
12 accounts, that the applicant is currently in a payment  
13 plan to satisfy these collections accounts.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And is he current  
15 in his payment plan?

16 MR. SALADINO: That is correct.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
19 questions?

20 Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
22 Nixon. I move that Aaron T. Driskill be approved for an  
23 individual private patrolman license. He is requesting  
24 that his individual license be placed in abeyance so  
25 that he may become the qualifying agent for Brink's

1 Incorporated, license number 450. This would be subject  
2 to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
4 Do I have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a second.  
7 Any further discussion?

8 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
9 those in favor of the motion, state "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
12 Congratulations.

13 MR. DRISKILL: Thank you so much. Have a  
14 wonderful day.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 66.  
16 Jermain L. Reeves is applying for an individual private  
17 patrolman license. If approved, he's requesting that  
18 this, his individual license be placed in abeyance so  
19 that he may become the qualifying agent for St. Moritz  
20 Security Services, Incorporated, license number 1453.  
21 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
22 requirements. For possible action.

23 Mr. Reeves, are you here?

24 MR. REEVES: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You know the

1 drill, a little bit about yourself and what you want to  
2 do here.

3 MR. REEVES: Okay. Well, after high school, I  
4 went into the Marine Corps. I was honorably discharged  
5 after seven years four months in 2001. I moved to,  
6 after being discharged, a couple of months after, I  
7 moved here to Las Vegas. Right away, I started working  
8 with Wackenhut Security Company for a little over two  
9 years. And after that, I worked with the Rio, security  
10 over there, while I was going to college, on an  
11 apprenticeship program with Local 12 Operating  
12 Engineers, worked with them for a couple of years until  
13 the company went down. And then I got back into  
14 security with St. Moritz Security Services. I've been  
15 St. Moritz Security Services since 2010, started off as  
16 a regular guard, worked my way up to field supervisor,  
17 account manager, the branch operations manager. Now I'm  
18 the regional manager where I assist with not only here  
19 in Las Vegas but Hawaii, Arizona and also California.

20 The company has asked me to apply for the  
21 private patrolman QA. So I applied for it.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, thank you.  
23 And thank you for your service to our country.

24 MR. REEVES: Yes, sir.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any public

1 comment on this application? Okay.

2 Okay. Hearing none, any questions from the  
3 Board?

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
5 Nixon. Just for the investigator, has all issues with  
6 his financial concerns over the years been taken care of  
7 and cleared?

8 MR. SALADINO: Yes, they have.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: First of all,  
14 Semper fi. The next thing is --

15 MR. REEVES: Semper fi.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The other part of this  
17 is you had no other arrests since them early domestic  
18 violence ones; is that correct?

19 MR. REEVES: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And the  
21 bankruptcy things were just touched on. No, I'm good  
22 now. Thank you. And thank you for your service.

23 MR. REEVES: Yes, sir. Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I want the record to  
25 reflect that the last arrest was 21 years ago.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any  
3 other questions?

4 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Board Member Nixon. I  
6 move that Michael D. Sanders be approved for an  
7 individual private patrolman license.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tammy?

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: He is --

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tammy? We're talking  
11 about Jermain Reeves, please.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, sorry.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's okay.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Correction. I move that  
15 we approve Jermain L. Reeves for an individual private  
16 patrolman license. If approved, he should put his  
17 individual license in abeyance so that he may become the  
18 qualifying agent for St. Moritz Security Services, Inc.,  
19 license number 1453. This would be subject to all  
20 statutory and regulatory requirements.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
22 Do I have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second it.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion and a  
25 second. Any further discussion?

1           Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
2 those in favor, state "aye."

3           (Board members said "aye.")

4           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
5 Mr. Reeves, congratulations to you.

6           MR. REEVES: Thank you very much.

7           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 67.  
8 Michael D. Sanders is applying for an individual private  
9 patrolman license. If approved, he's requesting that  
10 his individual license be placed in abeyance so that he  
11 may become the qualifying agent for Hospital Shared  
12 Services, Inc. dba HSS Inc., license number 1575. This  
13 is subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.  
14 For possible action.

15           Mr. Sanders, are you here?

16           MR. SANDERS: Yes, sir.

17           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. A little bit  
18 about yourself and what you want to do in Nevada.

19           MR. SANDERS: So I joined the U.S. Army as a  
20 military police officer in 2008, and I joined in the  
21 reserves, I joined HSS in 2010, worked out of Denver  
22 until 2016, which I was taken over to Nevada to run a  
23 program, Southern Hills Hospital. I've been in Nevada  
24 ever since, lived there. And I am trying to get the  
25 qualifying agent status as Nevada is my primary

1 residence, and I am the highest ranking person in the  
2 company in the state of Nevada.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you for  
4 your service, sir. Are you still serving in the  
5 reserves?

6 MR. SANDERS: I am. I just last year was in  
7 Romania and Bulgaria doing a year as running a PMO over  
8 there.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you again.  
10 All right. Any public comment on the  
11 application?

12 Okay. Hearing none, any questions from the  
13 Board?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I  
15 have a question.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Sir, in the investigator's  
18 report, it states that you might be a little bit behind  
19 on payments for collection accounts, but you'd be  
20 working to get back up on those. What's your situation  
21 with those now?

22 MR. SANDERS: Absolutely. And I appreciate the  
23 comment. I am working with creditors right now. I've  
24 come into some recent issues as Covid has reduced one of  
25 the incomes in my household. However, I'm still working



1 with them. I actually set up this morning a payment  
2 plan on the medical one. And I have a meeting scheduled  
3 with a creditor this afternoon via phone call.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?

6 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
8 Brown. I move that Michael D. Sanders be approved for  
9 his individual private patrolman license, which he will,  
10 if approved, place in abeyance so that he may become the  
11 qualifying agent for Hospital Shared Services,  
12 Incorporated doing business as HSS Incorporated, license  
13 number 1575. This is subject to statutory and  
14 regulatory requirements.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
16 Do I have a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Is there any  
19 further discussion?

20 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
21 those in favor, state "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.

24 Mr. Sanders, congratulations. Have a good day.

25 MR. SANDERS: Thank you so much. Thank you,

1 everybody on the Board.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 68.

3 Ian C. Wagner is applying for an individual private  
4 patrolman license. If approved, he's requesting that  
5 his individual licensing placed in abeyance so that he  
6 may become the qualifying agent for NY SEB, Inc.,  
7 license number 2126. This is subject to all statutory  
8 and regulatory requirements.

9 Mr. Wagner, are you here?

10 MR. WAGNER: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You know the  
12 drill.

13 MR. WAGNER: I've resided in Las Vegas for just  
14 under 20 years, originally from Philadelphia,  
15 Pennsylvania. I've been in several security positions,  
16 ranging from guard all the way to director of security,  
17 both private and casino settings, for just about 13  
18 years now. I'm applying so NY SEB, Inc. can continue  
19 its security services in Nevada without lapse and  
20 staying in compliance.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

22 Any public comment on this applicant?

23 Okay. Hearing none, any questions from the  
24 Board?

25 Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
2 Nixon. I move that Ian C. Wagner be approved for an  
3 individual private patrolman license. When approved, he  
4 is requesting that his individual license be placed in  
5 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent for  
6 NY SEB, Inc., license number 2126. This is subject to  
7 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
9 Do I have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I second it. Gronauer.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion and a  
12 second. Any further discussion?

13 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
14 those in favor the motion, state "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
17 Mr. Wagner, you have a good day. Congratulations.

18 MR. WAGNER: Thank you, guys. Have a good day.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We'll move on to  
20 canine handler, number 69. Ford K-9 LLC is applying for  
21 a new corporate canine handler license. Cameron P. Ford  
22 is applying for an individual canine handler license.  
23 If approved, he is requesting that his individual  
24 license be placed in abeyance so that he may become the  
25 qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Cameron P.

1 Ford. Subject to all statutory and regulatory  
2 requirements.

3 Mr. Ford, are you here?

4 MR. FORD: Yes, I am.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us a little  
6 bit about yourself and what you want to do here.

7 MR. FORD: I have been in canine since 1995. I  
8 first served in the Air Force as a military working dog  
9 handler and trainer. From 2000 to 2006, I owned a  
10 canine training business in Florida training law  
11 enforcement agencies from all over the world. After  
12 having that business, I ended up being in law  
13 enforcement, worked as a police officer in Florida and  
14 Texas, both as a police canine handler trainer and state  
15 certifying official. During that time was the kind of  
16 the height of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars, and ended  
17 up working as a government contractor training 300  
18 teams within that period of time to go to the Middle  
19 East.

20 After that, I ended up in San Diego. I was the  
21 senior instructor for Naval Special Warfare SEAL  
22 teams 1, 3, 5 and 7 as their canine subject matter  
23 expert. When my contract ended in 2018, I ended up  
24 here. In 2019, as the training director for Silver  
25 State K-9, one of the owners, John Kelly was a student

1 of mine back in 2002. And, I believe, he was the first  
2 private canine handler for Nevada back in those days.

3 I currently am a certifying official for the  
4 National Police Canine Association, California POST and  
5 drug beat. And I'm also a subject matter expert on all  
6 police canine related cases in regards to detection  
7 within various cases in Utah, Florida and California. I  
8 also currently assist in research at Duke University and  
9 Texas Tech on canine behavior and learning.

10 Ford K-9 is a business actually mostly all  
11 about human education and relations communication with  
12 dogs and how to, you know, best utilize that. But per  
13 NRS statute, canine handler is also defined as a person  
14 who trains and employs dogs for safety or security for  
15 compensation. My business not a security business.  
16 However, there might be a point in time where I am  
17 requested by a client to train a dog. So I want to  
18 ensure that I'm in compliance with the PILB for all  
19 licensing requirements.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Well,  
21 Mr. Ford, a couple things. One, thank you for your  
22 service.

23 MR. FORD: Thank you, sir.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Secondly, as a former  
25 dog handler myself, you are by far the most qualified

1 person that's ever come before this Board, in my  
2 opinion. And I'm guessing you're a Belgian Malinois  
3 guy?

4 MR. FORD: Yes, I do have one.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And I'm a German  
6 Shepherd guy. I'm a little bit older, then.

7 MR. FORD: Okay. Don't hold it against me.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm going to try not to.  
9 But thanks for being here. And, also, thank you for  
10 your due diligence in seeking this license.

11 MR. FORD: I appreciate that.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any public  
13 comment?

14 Okay. Hearing none, any questions from the  
15 Board?

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, Gronauer.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: For some reason, I was  
19 cut off in the beginning as soon as you started, you  
20 called this to the public meeting. And I know Mr. Ford.  
21 When he worked for Protective Force, he was right  
22 downstairs from me. We talked quite often. I really  
23 believe I should just not participate in this here vote.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Understood.

25 Any other comments or questions from the Board?

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, thank you.

2 So I'm looking at your financial history and  
3 you have a lot of recent collections or charge-offs.  
4 Could you, I guess, for the investigator, are these  
5 up-to-date, have they been taken care of, are we in  
6 payment plans, what's going on with these?

7 MR. SWARTHOUT: Investigator Swarthout. The  
8 applicant, Mr. Ford, provided documentation that he's  
9 still up-to-date on these payment plans. Two of these  
10 have already entered into payment agreements with the  
11 Whitestone Legal Group. The other ones are still under  
12 that Whitestone Legal Group but no payment plans have  
13 been entered. But he's up-to-date on his payment plans  
14 with Whitestone.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, Mr. Ford, then, are  
16 you working with the other groups to get a payment plan  
17 set up, how do you intend to resolve?

18 MR. FORD: Correct. Yes. So what I did was  
19 these were unsecured debts from a past relationship with  
20 high interest. So I exercised my options to find a best  
21 way to, you know, handle that debt in a shorter period  
22 of time. So I entered an agreement with Whitestone  
23 Legal Group. They have power of attorney. What I did  
24 was I started paying Whitestone Legal Group and stopped  
25 paying the creditors. That allowed Whitestone Legal

1 Group to enter in negotiations on my behalf to reduce,  
2 basically, the debt of interest on those accounts. Like  
3 the investigator stated, two of those have already  
4 reached settlement. The other ones are, of course, in  
5 negotiation and are settled accordingly as they reach  
6 the settlement disagreements.

7 I've been, like I said, paying them ever since.  
8 I never really stopped paying. I just changed who I  
9 paid. I paid Whitestone Legal Group, who takes that  
10 money and collects it, and as agreements are settled  
11 they pay those off.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it. Thank you.  
13 That's it for me.

14 Did we lose the connection?

15 MR. FORD: I'm still here.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm still here, Brown.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Did we lose the Chairman?

18 MR. INGRAM: Chairman Flynn?

19 Mr. Detmer, are you still here?

20 MR. DETMER: Yes, Mr. Ingram.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you. It looks like we lost  
22 the Chairman. I'll reach out.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Is Board Member Gronauer  
24 on still?

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm here.



1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Do we have enough  
2 to make a vote, in case he just?

3 MR. DETMER: If the question was to me, I  
4 believe, you do. So, I believe, the Board has two  
5 options. One would be to wait for the Chairman to get  
6 back online. Or the second would be for somebody to  
7 stand in as acting chairman or chairwoman and handle the  
8 vote.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Kevin, are you able  
10 to reach him?

11 MR. INGRAM: I'm still waiting on a reply.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Understand, I can't  
13 vote, I already pulled myself out of it. Gronauer.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

15 MR. INGRAM: The other option is we have item  
16 number 185 on the agenda that I was hoping to hear  
17 before we took our break from this afternoon, because  
18 it's a licensing agenda item, too. We could possibly  
19 trail item number 69 and proceed with item number 185.  
20 A Board member would have to take the acting capacity to  
21 allow for that to happen.

22 MR. DETMER: That would be correct. So the  
23 existing agenda item can be tabled if there was a Board  
24 member that was to stand in as the acting chairperson.  
25 And then we can move to a separate agenda item. Or,

1 again, we can wait for Chairman Flynn to come back  
2 online.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Board Member Nixon did  
4 a great job earlier. Let her do it again.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you. The only  
6 problem is, is where do I find 185 on...

7 MR. INGRAM: Item 185 is going to be the second  
8 to the last page of the agenda. It should be --

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: But I don't find...

10 MR. INGRAM: The documents were e-mailed under  
11 separate cover.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it. Okay. Let me.  
13 Sorry, guys.

14 MR. INGRAM: Last-minute addition.

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So let's move  
16 forward, since Chairman Flynn, we lost him. Let's move  
17 forward in tabling number 69, Ford K-9 LLC. Our  
18 apologies, the technical difficulties here. We'll  
19 definitely come back to you, sir.

20 MR. FORD: Okay. I'll be here.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Sorry about that.

22 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon, I just sent  
23 you an email.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hello, it's Ray Flynn.

1 MR. INGRAM: Oh, there we are.

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: There we go.

3 MR. FORD: There we go.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Saved by the bell. Thank  
5 you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: For whatever reason, my  
7 cable went out in my entire neighborhood. So I'm on a  
8 voice-over IT. So I'm on my cell. A little plug for  
9 FirstNet, it's working.

10 All right. So where were we? And my  
11 apologies.

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: We were going to do, or  
13 working on a motion for Ford K-9 LLC, but there wasn't  
14 enough people. So I can make the motion. If you call  
15 for that. I'm sorry.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. No, no, my  
17 apologies again. Like I said, things are out of my  
18 control here.

19 All right. I'll call for a motion on item  
20 number 69.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. This is Board  
22 Member Nixon. I move that we approve Ford K-9 LLC, who  
23 is applying for a new corporate canine handler license.  
24 Cameron P. Ford is applying for an individual canine  
25 license. If approved, he's requesting that his

1 individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may  
2 become the qualifying agent. Member to be approved is  
3 Cameron P. Ford. This would be subject to all statutory  
4 and regulatory requirements.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
6 Do I have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further  
9 discussion?

10 Okay. Hearing none, all those in favor, state  
11 "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Aye, if I missed it.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

15 Motion carried. Mr. Ford, thank you for your patience.  
16 And you have a good day.

17 MR. FORD: You, too. Thank you very much.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. Ingram.

19 MR. INGRAM: We have one other agenda item that  
20 is a license agenda item, if you wanted to do it before  
21 a break. That's item number 185, if you want to take  
22 that out of order.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 185.

24 MR. INGRAM: Everything was sent under separate  
25 cover. It as a last-minute addition.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, process server,  
2 185. Maria Torres Arellano is applying for an  
3 individual process server license. Subject to all  
4 statutory and regulatory requirements.

5 Ms. Arellano, are you here?

6 MS. ARELLANO: Yes, I am.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware  
8 you're under oath?

9 MS. ARELLANO: Yes, I am.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us a little  
11 bit about you and what do you want to do here in Nevada.

12 MS. ARELLANO: Well, I live, I've been living  
13 here in Nevada for the past, oh, my God, 25 years. I  
14 went to UNR. And after graduation, I started working in  
15 the apartment complexes. I really liked it. And ever  
16 since, I've been there, for the past 11 years. And,  
17 like I said, I plan to, my goals are to get approval for  
18 my license and to provide good quality service.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

20 Any public comment on this applicant?

21 Okay. Hearing none, any questions from the  
22 Board?

23 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a  
24 motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'm

1 sorry. I'm just a little late getting it off mute.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, Bobby.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. For the  
4 investigator, explain the hours to me for qualification.

5 MR. JONES: Sure. This is Investigator Jones.  
6 When speaking with her current employer, Mr. Delappe, he  
7 attested to 11,000 hours. But when speaking with him,  
8 he testified that only 38 percent of her time was  
9 actually performing duties related to process serving  
10 with the apartment complex. So that's where a vast  
11 majority of her hours comes from.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And so she  
13 qualifies under the having enough time, right?

14 MR. JONES: Correct.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I just wanted to  
16 make sure. Thank you. I'm good.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
18 questions?

19 All right. Hearing none, I will call for a  
20 motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
22 Nixon. I move that we approve Maria S. Torres Arellano  
23 for the license of process server.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
25 Do I have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any further  
3 discussion?

4 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.  
5 All those in favor, state "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion  
8 carries. Congratulations, ma'am. You have a good day.

9 MS. ARELLANO: Thank you so much.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Ingram, how  
11 do you want to proceed?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Do we have one more,  
13 number 70?

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, number 70 was part  
15 of the consent agenda.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

17 MR. INGRAM: Yes. And so with that, we have  
18 the rest of the individuals calling in at 1:00 p.m.  
19 today. So if the Board wants to take a break until  
20 1:00 p.m., that will give us a good start this  
21 afternoon.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I think, that's a great  
23 idea. Thank you all for your patience this morning.  
24 We actually got through this. And, all right, I'll be  
25 back on about five to 1:00.

1 MR. INGRAM: Sounds good.

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Bye now. All right.

4 MR. INGRAM: Is anyone else still on the call?

5 Please go ahead and call back in at 1:00 o'clock, and

6 we'll get started at that time. Thank you very much.

7 \* \* \* \* \*

8 (A break was taken, 12:15 to 1:00 p.m.)

9 \* \* \* \* \*

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Shannon, it's Ray. Are  
11 you ready?

12 THE REPORTER: Yes, I am.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Kevin, why don't  
14 you call roll.

15 MR. INGRAM: Chairman Flynn?

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Here.

17 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Brown?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Here.

19 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Gronauer? Board  
20 Member Gronauer?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Here.

22 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon?

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here.

24 MR. INGRAM: And, Shannon, you're here.

25 THE REPORTER: Yes, I am. Thank you.



1 MR. INGRAM: We have a quorum, Chairman, and we  
2 can go ahead and proceed with item number -- do you want  
3 to take item number 186 first before we go into the  
4 appeals, sir?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, not really.

6 MR. INGRAM: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We've got people that  
8 are waiting. Let's go and do that. And we can get to  
9 that tomorrow.

10 MR. INGRAM: All right. Sounds good.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So do we need to swear  
12 people in, or how are we going to do this?

13 MR. INGRAM: Mike, if we want to go ahead and  
14 swear everybody in for the 1:00 o'clock call-in. And  
15 then what they can do is, once the Board calls their  
16 name, they can confirm to the Board that they're under  
17 oath.

18 And then, with your permission, Chairman, I'll  
19 interrupt you at 2:00 o'clock. We'll do the same thing.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

21 MR. INGRAM: Okay. So, Mike, if you'll go  
22 ahead and swear everybody in for the 1:00 o'clock  
23 call-in, we would appreciate it.

24 MR. DETMER: It would be my pleasure.

25 For those who are about to testify, if you'd

1 raise your right hand. Do you hereby swear or affirm to  
2 tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the  
3 truth?

4 (Applicants and witnesses present were  
5 sworn/affirmed.)

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. This  
7 is the Private Investigators Licensing Board, State of  
8 Nevada. We're doing our afternoon session of day one.  
9 And we're just starting registration appeals.

10 Number 71, Domonick Mincieli ("Min-skel-ee")?  
11 I hope I'm pronouncing it right.

12 MR. MINCIELI: Mincieli ("Min-see-el-ee").

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mincieli. My apologies.  
14 Okay. Sir, do you realize you're under oath?

15 MR. MINCIELI: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let staff  
17 start.

18 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In  
19 November of 1988 and in the state of Utah, Mr. Mincieli  
20 was charged with possession of marijuana at misdemeanor  
21 level. Disposition shows that it was a fine. He did  
22 disclose this.

23 In 2002, out of California, he was charged with  
24 discharging a firearm with gross negligence. This was  
25 at the felony level. He received a 90-day suspended

1 jail sentence and three years probation. He did  
2 disclose this and did provide court docs. The probation  
3 started on July of 2002 but was revoked on 9-21 of 2004.  
4 It was reactivated 12-30-2004. That was completed  
5 10-17-2005. This was reduced to a misdemeanor per the  
6 court docs.

7           The applicant disclosed the arrests and was not  
8 made provisional. He was denied on 12-24 of '19. The  
9 applicant disclosed on the application that he had a  
10 2004 open container charge. This did not show up on the  
11 fingerprint report. However, this could possibly  
12 explain the hiatus in the applicant's probation listed  
13 on item 2.

14           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

15           Mr. Mincieli, I know it's been some time ago,  
16 but it is a firearms charge, so we have to ask about it.  
17 So do you want to give us your version of the story and  
18 the arrest and the probation?

19           MR. MINCIELI: Yeah, I was a young kid. I went  
20 to -- I thought because my firearms registered that I  
21 could, basically, travel anywhere with it. So at the  
22 time, I went into California, went into Huntington Beach  
23 for, basically, a wedding. And I got into, basically,  
24 an altercation with a bunch of people, and I made a  
25 mistake by pulling out my firearm. I was a young kid at

1 the time. So I, basically, made a mistake. And I paid  
2 for it. And I really haven't been in any problems thus  
3 far since then.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what have you done  
5 in terms of employment the last 18 years?

6 MR. MINCIELI: Transport cars. And, basically,  
7 my aunt owns a few restaurants in the state of Nevada,  
8 Las Vegas, and I've worked for her for pretty much the  
9 duration of my time.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
11 Any other questions from the Board?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes. This is Board Member  
13 Nixon. So discharging a firearm, you know, I know you  
14 said you pulled it, but is that all that happened, or  
15 does that include actually firing it?

16 MR. MINCIELI: Yeah. So, basically, I was in a  
17 vehicle when everybody surrounded the person that was  
18 driving in that vehicle. And instead of just like  
19 speeding off, I brandished the weapon and I shot it in  
20 the air to disperse the crowd. So that's, basically,  
21 what I did, just thinking, trying to get out of the  
22 situation I was in. So I -- basically, it was the wrong  
23 thing to do regardless of what I thought at the time.  
24 So. So it was just a hard lesson I had to learn, being  
25 a kid at the time.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And then what was  
2 the gap in your probation? Why was it revoked?

3 MR. MINCIELI: It was revoked because I was on  
4 my way home and I had a beer. So the girl, my  
5 girlfriend was driving at the time. She was pulled  
6 over. And the stipulation, wasn't allowed to drink. So  
7 they took me to Henderson jail. And that's when I found  
8 out they were going to put me on a probation hold. And  
9 then I had to go back and report to Orange County and  
10 then start over. And then I completed it. And that was  
11 it. They didn't give me any special programs to do  
12 other than to just to stay in trouble, stay out of  
13 trouble, which I have done after, after all that.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. I'm good. Thank  
15 you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
17 questions from the Board?

18 Okay. Mr. Detmer, it's been a while since  
19 we've done these. Remind me, do we take public comment  
20 during the appeals, or, because it's a due process, no?

21 MR. DETMER: I don't believe the Board is under  
22 an obligation to, provided that it's doing them at the  
23 beginning of the session and at the end of the session.  
24 However, if the Board has set a precedent of doing it  
25 after each item, they can take public comment.

1 MR. INGRAM: This is Kevin, for the record. We  
2 generally have not allowed public comment during  
3 appeals.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Then,  
5 we'll continue what we've done before.

6 All right. With no questions from the Board,  
7 I'll entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is --

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Oh,  
10 sorry.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Gronauer, go ahead.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I make a motion  
13 that we allow a work card. Or how am I going to say it?  
14 We do not -- I make a motion that --

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Grant, we grant the  
16 appeal.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, we grant the  
18 appeal. I'm sorry. Thank you. I couldn't figure it  
19 out.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No problem.

21 All right. I have a motion for granting the  
22 appeal. Do I have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further

1 discussion?

2 Hearing none, all in favor, state "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.

5 Mr. Mincieli, congratulations. You have a good day.

6 MR. MINCIELI: Oh, my God, thank you so much.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 72,  
8 Milton Gomez. Are you here, sir? Calling Mr. Gomez a  
9 second time.

10 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair?

11 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: Yeah.

12 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Gomez did not reply to emails,  
13 nor did he reply to a certified and mailed letter to  
14 him.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I'll  
16 call for a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion that we  
20 uphold the denial for Mr. Milton Gomez.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
22 to uphold the denial. Do I have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a second.  
25 Any further discussion?

1           Hearing none, all in favor, state "aye."

2           (Board members said "aye.")

3           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion passed.

4           Number 73, Steven Gumbus, are you here?

5           MR. GUMBUS: Yes, sir, here. Yes, here, sir.

6           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Staff, do you  
7 want to -- oh, Mr. Gumbus, do you realize you're under  
8 oath?

9           MR. GUMBUS: Yes, sir.

10          BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Who's  
11 the investigator on this?

12          MR. JONES: Good afternoon. This is  
13 Investigator Jones. The applicant applied January 31st  
14 of 2020. He was initially denied for possession of what  
15 he had stated was karate sticks. The fingerprint  
16 results came back, and that was actually found to be  
17 carrying concealed dirk or dagger. The applicant did  
18 disclose this. This charge was initially dismissed  
19 under 1203.4.

20          The applicant has also been arrested in 1983  
21 and 1994, but are not grounds for denial.

22          BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Gumbus, do  
23 you want to tell us your side?

24          MR. GUMBUS: That's exactly correct, sir. I  
25 was coming from a karate, I was training and I had



1 karate sticks in my pocket. And I was harassed by  
2 police, pulled over, just walking home. And they, you  
3 know, did what they did for karate sticks and then put  
4 on the paper dirk and dagger, he told me. Is that two  
5 different items? I was not violent. I was not  
6 fighting. I didn't use any type of weapon or hurt  
7 anybody. But yet, you know, they, you know, did all  
8 that. So everything he's saying is exactly correct.

9 I actually moved to Nevada about nine months  
10 ago, hoping I could still work for the security company  
11 that does not have an office in Nevada. I still have my  
12 guard card in California. And I would love to, you  
13 know, work here and, you know, work in Nevada.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. How long have you  
15 been a security guard?

16 MR. GUMBUS: I've been a security guard for  
17 over 20 plus years. I understand all levels of  
18 stationary, mobile patrol, firearms. I've assisted  
19 Santa Monica police in arresting gang violence, drug  
20 stops. I mean I have over 20 plus years, sir.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.  
22 And what have you been doing in the Nevada the last nine  
23 months?

24 MR. GUMBUS: Waiting for my guard card.  
25 In-home healthcare, helping an old man, you know, eat

1 and shower.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

3 Any other questions from the Board?

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I do. Mr. Gumbus, it says  
5 on here that the second and third charges, that you did  
6 not disclose. Can I ask why you didn't, sir?

7 MR. GUMBUS: What was that?

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So on the report here it  
9 states that you did not disclose the second charge of  
10 receiving known stolen property and taking a vehicle  
11 with the -- without consent, I'm assuming, and then  
12 inflicting corporal injury on spouse or cohabitant. It  
13 says that you did not disclose that information or those  
14 arrests. Can I --

15 MR. GUMBUS: Oh.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: -- have you tell us why  
17 you did not?

18 MR. GUMBUS: Oh. I didn't even know that that  
19 was the type of charge on there. The vehicle, I  
20 believe, it was a girlfriend that got mad because I took  
21 a rental car. You know, for that reason, I can remember  
22 that. And then called the police because I had their  
23 rental car.

24 The inflicting corporal punishment, I don't  
25 even know anything about that. I just know there was a

1 lot of fake, false charges on me from two different  
2 ex-wives that I had.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

4 MR. GUMBUS: Hello? Hello?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, we hear you.

6 Okay.

7 Any other questions from the Board?

8 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a  
9 motion.

10 Call for a motion a second time.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN. Board Member Brown. I  
12 move to grant the appeal.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
14 for granting the appeal. Do I have a second?

15 Second call for a second.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Can I ask a follow-up  
17 question? Can I ask a quick question?

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, you may.

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Investigator, I'm not sure  
20 which one that was. On the second two charges, to be  
21 clear, they were not disclosed by the applicant, right?

22 MR. JONES: That is correct.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Calling for a  
25 motion third time. I mean a second.

1 All right. I don't have a second. I'm going  
2 to ask, is there any other motions?

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
4 Nixon. I move that we deny the appeal based off of our  
5 past, based on our past experiences in that if someone  
6 does not disclose, no matter how long it's been, that we  
7 do not approve them.

8 MR. GUMBUS: Could I interject real quickly?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Gumbus?

10 MR. GUMBUS: Okay.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Give me a minute. This  
12 is our time, not yours, sir.

13 MR. GUMBUS: Okay. Yes, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
15 Anything else, Tammy?

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, sir, I'm good.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So I have a  
18 motion. Do I have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. Gumbus,  
21 I don't normally do this, and I hope I don't get in  
22 trouble, but I will allow you to say something now.

23 MR. GUMBUS: Okay. I've been working as a  
24 security guard in California. I passed the background  
25 check. I got my guard card right now in my pocket,

1 current. I have a guard card now that's current for  
2 California. I didn't even know I needed to have a guard  
3 card for Nevada. And I was ready to go to work. The  
4 company, Inter-Con, that I worked for before I got here,  
5 does not have another post, they don't have a company  
6 here. I did not know that those charges for that, the  
7 car, that car and inflicting, what did she say, corporal  
8 punishment or whatever, I had no idea that that was even  
9 existed. I know that I had some jealous girlfriends  
10 that lied on me in the past, long -- I mean we're  
11 talking, this had to be maybe in the '80s, and I had no  
12 idea.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

14 MR. GUMBUS: And I have a nine-year-old son.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, Mr. Gumbus?

16 MR. GUMBUS: I have a son that I have to take  
17 care of. If I don't go to work, I won't be able to  
18 survive.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Gumbus, I  
20 understand.

21 For the investigator, just for as part of  
22 discussion of the Board, what were the years of the  
23 other charges that weren't disclosed?

24 MR. JONES: The receiving known -- I'm sorry.  
25 This is Investigator Jones. The receiving known stolen

1 property was in 1983. The inflicting corporal injury  
2 was in 1994. And the carried concealed dirk or dagger  
3 was in 2001.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. But the two that  
5 were -- but the first two were the ones that weren't  
6 disclosed?

7 MR. JONES: Correct, 1983 and 1994.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I  
9 have a motion. I have a second. Any other discussion  
10 amongst the Board?

11 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
12 those in favor of the motion, state "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

15 Okay. Motion carries.

16 All right. Mr. Gumbus, you mentioned  
17 California about six times. I'm being very polite. We  
18 are not California. We operate differently. This is a  
19 different state. We have a different constitution. We  
20 have different laws as well as administrative codes.  
21 And you need to disclose. This doesn't mean that you  
22 cannot reapply. But if you reapply again, you need to  
23 disclose everything.

24 MR. GUMBUS: Oh, I didn't even see that stuff  
25 on the background check.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And if you don't  
2 remember those type of arrests, that's a different  
3 issue. The bottom line is, and per our Board, if you  
4 don't disclose, we don't see you as being truthful.  
5 People don't forget arrests. So, next time, remember to  
6 disclose everything.

7 MR. GUMBUS: What year, what year were these  
8 things they had in there, eighty --

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, you're done.  
10 Mr. Gumbus, you can talk to the investigator tomorrow,  
11 in two days, when we're done with these hearings.

12 MR. GUMBUS: So I could reapply again?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, you will.

14 MR. INGRAM: In a year.

15 MR. GUMBUS: Right.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

17 MR. GUMBUS: All right. That's good, that's  
18 said and that's done.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

20 Number 74, Alvin Thornton. Are you here, sir?

21 Mr. Thornton, are you here?

22 MR. THORNTON: Hello?

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, is this

24 Mr. Thornton?

25 MR. THORNTON: Yes.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize  
2 you're under oath, sir?

3 MR. THORNTON: Excuse me?

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you realize you're  
5 under oath?

6 MR. THORNTON: Yes, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
8 investigator, why don't you give us an overview.

9 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.  
10 Mr. Thornton is a returned applicant. His denial was  
11 upheld at the March 13th, 2019 Board meeting for failure  
12 to disclose. The applicant has since disclosed. His  
13 felony convictions were over 30 years old. He has  
14 reapplied. He waited a year. And he was told he should  
15 come back to one year to appeal again. And he's back  
16 now after disclosing on his application and wishes to  
17 appeal again.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And I do recall  
19 that one. And he followed the wishes of the Board and  
20 what we've always done before. Disclosure is very  
21 important. It has been over 30 years ago. And that's  
22 all I need. Sir, thank you for reapplying.

23 Any other questions from the Board?

24 Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.



1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Board Member --

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, Bobby.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'll make a  
5 motion that we grant the appeal of Alvin Thornton. It's  
6 time and distance and everything looks good.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
8 Do I have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further  
11 discussion?

12 Hearing none, all in favor, state "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
15 Mr. Thornton, congratulations, and thank you for  
16 following the wishes of the Board.

17 MR. THORNTON: Okay.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 75,  
19 Julius Profit. Mr. Profit, are you here?

20 MR. PROFIT: Yes, I'm here.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware  
22 you're under oath?

23 MR. PROFIT: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
25 please proceed.

1 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. Mr. Profit  
2 was denied for a 2002 assault with a firearm on a  
3 person, out of California. This was at the felony  
4 level. He received five years probation and jail time.  
5 He did disclose the arrest and was not made provisional.  
6 The arrest was confirmed with the fingerprint report,  
7 and the applicant was denied in April of this year.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Profit, give  
9 us your version of this. And, also, let me know what  
10 you've been doing the last 13 years.

11 MR. PROFIT: 13 years? Okay. So the incident  
12 happened -- I'm 37 this month. I was 18 at the time, so  
13 a teenager. But I got into an altercation with some  
14 guys at the time. And they found out where I lived and  
15 were coming to my house, harassing me and all that kind  
16 of stuff. So I got a gun. And the next time they came  
17 to my house, I fired some shots.

18 And so, basically, I was arrested and went  
19 through that whole process, got probation, and haven't  
20 been in any kind of trouble since. That, it's actually  
21 in the process of being dropped to a misdemeanor and  
22 expunged right now. It's been on hold because of Covid.

23 But since then, I've been working consistently.  
24 I work mostly construction. Right now, I'm working UPS.  
25 I just opened up a nonprofit that raises money and,

1 basically, it's to raise money for their school fees and  
2 stuff like that.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

4 MR. PROFIT: Okay.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
6 questions from the Board?

7 Hearing none, I'll accept a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
9 Brown. I move to grant the appeal of Julius Profit.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
11 Do I have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a  
14 second. Any further discussion?

15 Hearing none, all in favor, state "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion  
18 carries. Mr. Profit, congratulations. Have a good day.

19 MR. PROFIT: Thank you. You guys, too.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 76. David  
21 Jennings, are you here?

22 MR. JENNINGS: Yes, sir. David Jennings. I'm  
23 here and have been sworn.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So you understand  
25 you're under oath?

1 MR. JENNINGS: I do.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. For the  
3 investigator, please proceed.

4 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.  
5 Mr. Jennings was denied for a 1993 carry a loaded  
6 firearm in a public place, which was a misdemeanor,  
7 where the applicant received 36 months of probation and  
8 a fine. The applicant did disclose, did disclose the  
9 arrest on his application and also provided the 1203.4  
10 dismissal paperwork at the time of his application.

11 And, now, he did apply about five years ago.  
12 And the reason he didn't go forward at that time with  
13 the appeal was he didn't have the dismissal paperwork in  
14 his hand at the time. So that's why he had waited. And  
15 now he's come back and applied this go-round, providing,  
16 you know, the dismissal paperwork and disclosing it on  
17 the application.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So I'm clear, not  
19 only did he disclose, but he's also got paperwork as far  
20 as the state of California is concerned that states it's  
21 been dismissed?

22 MR. SALADINO: That is correct, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

24 Mr. Jennings, what have you done almost the last couple  
25 decades?

1 MR. JENNINGS: The last couple of decades, I've  
2 been in the Army. I've been active duty. I've been in  
3 the National Guard here in Nevada. And, currently, I'm  
4 in the reserves. And I'm expecting my 20-year letter so  
5 that I can put that into my retirement packet.

6 Also, when I came back from my OIF deployment  
7 in 2010, I began working as a security guard at the  
8 Station Casinos at Red Rock. Besides that, I did three  
9 contracts overseas embedded with the military, two in  
10 Afghanistan and one in Camp Arifjan, Kuwait, where I did  
11 intel analysis.

12 So, basically, that's all I've been doing.  
13 Plus, I've been volunteering for as much additional  
14 duties as I can get.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, first off, thank  
16 you for your service. And, secondly, you are a textbook  
17 case on the people that came to Nevada, allowing us to  
18 look at time and distance on these firearm offenses.

19 So. I have nothing further. Any questions  
20 from the Board?

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
22 Brown. I have a question.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Jennings, I may have  
25 misunderstood. Did you say that you came back from the

1 military at some point and were working as a guard at  
2 one of the Station casinos?

3 MR. JENNINGS: Yes, I was working at Red Rock  
4 for approximately one year as a security officer.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Did you have a  
6 registration card at that time?

7 MR. JENNINGS: No. They don't require it  
8 because it's -- as it was explained to me, they're a  
9 private company and they don't require it. So I didn't  
10 have to apply for anything. I didn't carry a weapon.  
11 So. So there was no additional paperwork necessary and  
12 no issue.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.  
14 You'll have to forgive me. I'm the newest Board member,  
15 and sometimes I miss those things.

16 MR. JENNINGS: No problem. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You know, I asked the  
18 same question years ago, so. Some casinos do require  
19 it, but it's up to the casino itself. But if you're  
20 working for an entity that's not a contract guard  
21 service, you don't require one.

22 Is that correct, Kevin?

23 MR. INGRAM: Yes, we wouldn't retire one unless  
24 your working for a third party. Generally speaking, if  
25 they work in any kind of a gaming establishment, they're

1 required to be registered with the Gaming Control Board,  
2 though.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That is correct. Okay.  
4 Any other questions from the Board?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, Mr. Chair.  
6 That's where I got confused.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Hearing no  
8 questions, I'll seek a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
10 Nixon. I move that we grant the appeal for David  
11 Jennings.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
13 Do I have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. I second.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Gronauer seconds.  
17 Any further discussion?

18 Okay. Call for a vote. All in favor, say  
19 "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion passes.  
22 Congratulations, Mr. Jennings. Is that all your kids in  
23 the background?

24 MR. JENNINGS: No. I'm in a car with nobody  
25 else.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good enough.  
2 Okay. You have a good day. Congratulations to you,  
3 sir.

4 MR. JENNINGS: Thank you. And thank you,  
5 members of the Board. And I also wanted to say thank  
6 you, Mr. Saladino.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good luck.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Hey, Ray.

9 MR. INGRAM: I would like to remind everyone  
10 that if you are on the call, please have your phone  
11 muted unless you are speaking. Thank you.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I think, that was Bob  
13 the builder at Ray's house.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. -- I'm  
15 going to try on the pronunciation -- Curameng, number  
16 77. Christopher Curameng, are you here, sir?

17 MR. CURAMENG: Yes.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: How do you pronounce  
19 your last name, sir?

20 MR. CURAMENG: Curameng.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Curameng. Okay. Do you  
22 realize you're under oath?

23 MR. CURAMENG: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
25 investigator, please proceed.



1 MR. JONES: Sure. Investigator Jones. The  
2 applicant was arrested in 2008 initially for a robbery  
3 and conspiracy to commit a crime. This charge was  
4 amended to carrying a loaded firearm in public. The  
5 applicant received eight months in jail and three years  
6 probation. This was later dismissed under 1203.4. This  
7 was disclosed, and we do have court documents for this.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

9 Okay. Mr. Curameng, please tell us what  
10 happened on this case.

11 MR. CURAMENG: Okay. So, well, I was 18 at the  
12 time. And I would carry, I carried a firearm on me for  
13 self-defense. And at the time, the police were called  
14 to a robbery in the area. So they were rounding up  
15 suspects. That's when they stopped me and searched me,  
16 found my firearm, and arrested me.

17 But later, those robbery charges were dropped  
18 and dismissed, because they found the guy who actually  
19 did the robbery. The victim had pointed him out. But,  
20 however, I still had a firearm on me. I was 18 at the  
21 time. I wasn't old enough to own a firearm. I would  
22 carry one for self-defense, because I've been robbed at  
23 gunpoint before. I lived in a very high crime  
24 neighborhood, been a witness to multiple shootings. So,  
25 yeah, it's just, at the time, I felt that that was what

1 I needed to do. Maybe it wasn't the best decision. But  
2 I just thought that, you know, I could get out of jail  
3 faster than I could get out of the grave.

4 So. Yeah. But that, you know, that was a long  
5 time ago. Since then, I was in the military. I joined  
6 the French Foreign Legion, did six years over there in  
7 the infantry. I've been deployed to Maui, Niger, UAE,  
8 as well as being a part of the domestic counterterrorism  
9 operation over there.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Did you serve in  
11 the U.S. military or just the French Foreign Legion?

12 MR. CURAMENG: Just at French Foreign Legion,  
13 sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, you're the  
15 first one I've ever met that's done that.

16 MR. CURAMENG: Yeah, it was an interesting  
17 experience. You have to learn French. I met my wife  
18 out there. And, yeah, it was a good experience.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any  
20 other questions from the Board?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, for the applicant.  
22 Are you working now?

23 MR. CURAMENG: Yes. I'm actually doing  
24 security right now in California. I was actually hired  
25 for an overseas contract. But everything got shut down,

1 you know, due to the coronavirus. And, you know, I  
2 wanted to go out to Nevada. I have an address in Nevada  
3 as well. I wanted to, you know, start working, kind of  
4 get away from California.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
6 questions?

7 All right. Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I  
9 move that we grant Mr. Curameng's appeal.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
11 Do I have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a second.  
14 Any further discussion?

15 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
16 in favor, state "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Appeal's granted.  
19 Congratulations, sir. You have a good day.

20 MR. CURAMENG: Thank you. I appreciate it.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 78, David  
22 Haxby. Are you here, sir? Mr. Haxby, David, number 78?

23 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, Kevin Ingram. We tried  
24 to notify him via email and two forms of mail, one  
25 certified, and we did not receive a response.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll entertain a  
2 motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion that we  
6 uphold the denial of Mr. Haxby.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Do I have a  
8 second?

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
11 and second. Any further discussion?

12 All right. I just want to read into the  
13 record, it is a weapons charge. We always want to hear  
14 from the applicant. He has decided not to give us, or  
15 be in contact with the Board. So that's my reason for  
16 voting.

17 All those in favor, state "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
20 The appeal is denied.

21 All right. Number 79, Walter Bigornia.

22 MR. BIGORNIA: Bigornia. I'm present.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you. All right.  
24 Do you realize you're under oath?

25 MR. BIGORNIA: Yes, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
2 investigator, please proceed.

3 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2004,  
4 Mr. Bigornia was charged with carrying a loaded firearm  
5 in a public place. This was out of California. It was  
6 at misdemeanor level. And the disposition shows 36  
7 months probation and 30 days jail. He did disclose this  
8 and was not made provisional. And the arrest was  
9 confirmed with the fingerprint report.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Sir, why don't  
11 you tell us what happened.

12 MR. BIGORNIA: I was working as a security  
13 officer. And then the day before, it was, I worked  
14 swing. So my wife and I were trying to go to  
15 California, I mean Sacramento to buy a house. And I was  
16 trying to get enough sleep. And so I put my weapon into  
17 the glove compartment intending to place it in the case  
18 and put it in the back of the vehicle in the morning.  
19 But due to we were rushing, I forgot that the weapon was  
20 there. So I got stopped at the Vallejo area for  
21 speeding. And the California Highway Patrol, he asked  
22 me for the registration and the proof of insurance. And  
23 it's in the glove compartment. And when I opened that,  
24 then he saw the weapon. And I got an arrest.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What have you

1 been doing for employment the last decade or so?

2 MR. BIGORNIA: Security, security guard. I  
3 stopped right now for about eight months because I'm  
4 trying to transfer from -- the company that I was on is  
5 Securitas. And I was trying to switch over from  
6 California to Nevada. But I got denied on this  
7 application.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

9 Any other questions from the Board?

10 All right. Hearing none, call for a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
12 Nixon. I move that we grant the appeal for David Haxby.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. Do I  
14 have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Chairman.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Let's try  
18 this again. This is for number 79. I've got a motion  
19 and a second.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Excuse me, Chairman.  
21 Put the wrong name, said Haxby. Haxby was already done.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right. Bigornia.

23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, okay. I'm sorry.  
24 Okay. Sorry. This is Board Member Nixon again. I move  
25 that we grant the appeal for Walter Bigornia.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. And  
2 who wants to second that?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion and  
6 second. Any further discussion?

7 Hearing none, all in favor, state "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
10 congratulations, sir. You have a good day. Motion  
11 carries.

12 MR. BIGORNIA: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 80,  
14 Darrell King. Mr. King, are you with us?

15 MR. KING: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
17 investigator -- oh, Mr. King, do you realize you're  
18 under oath?

19 MR. KING: Yes, sir.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
21 investigator, please continue.

22 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2005,  
23 Mr. King was charged with dangerous weapon in a vehicle.  
24 It was at misdemeanor level in the state of Nevada.  
25 Court documents show that this charge was dismissed

1 along with another charge for driving without a valid  
2 license. He did disclose and also provided court  
3 documents.

4 In 2006, in the state of Nevada, he was charged  
5 with carrying a concealed weapon at county misdemeanor  
6 level. The weapon was forfeited. He received a fine  
7 and 50 hours of community service. This was also  
8 disclosed and court documents were provided.

9 Also in two thousand --

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, continue, please.  
11 My apologies.

12 MR. MAXWELL: No worries. Also in 2006, in the  
13 state of Nevada, he was charged with conspiracy to  
14 commit a crime. This was at gross misdemeanor level.  
15 He received a 12-month suspended sentence from CCDC and  
16 was placed on 36 months probation. This was also  
17 disclosed and court documents provided.

18 2012, in Nevada, he was charged with a fray at  
19 misdemeanor level. Disposition shows that this was  
20 denied by the Clark County District Attorney. He did  
21 disclose and court documents were provided.

22 2013, also in Nevada, he was charged with  
23 reckless driving at misdemeanor level. He received 30  
24 days suspended jail sentence. This was closed on  
25 4-21-2014. He was ordered to stay out of trouble, which



1 was closed 4-21 of '14. He went to DUI school, which  
2 was satisfied on 7-27 of '14, and received 59 hours of  
3 community service. And the case was closed on  
4 8-18-2014. This was also disclosed and court docs  
5 provided.

6 The applicant was made provisional on 7-10-2020  
7 but was not added to any roster. He was denied on  
8 8-5-2020. The applicant disclosed all arrests which  
9 were confirmed with the fingerprint report and court  
10 documents.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And the last  
12 arrest, I'm just confirming, was 2012?

13 MR. MAXWELL: 2013, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 2013. Okay. Seven  
15 years ago. Okay.

16 Mr. King?

17 MR. KING: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tell us, why don't you  
19 explain most of these, if not all.

20 MR. KING: All right. The first time I was  
21 arrested, I had a firearm that was given to me as a  
22 gift. I went and got my first apartment. It was given  
23 to me as a gift. And just was kind of ignorant to the  
24 law. And I had it in my vehicle, got pulled over. And  
25 when I provided, you know, the registration and the

1 insurance, the gun was in the glove compartment. So I  
2 ended up going to jail for that, for being, basically,  
3 under 21 with a pistol instead of a rifle.

4           The next, I think, the next one you said was  
5 the arrest in 2006. I had a shotgun that I just  
6 purchased. And I was all super stoked that I had the  
7 gun. And I was trying to break it down and clean it and  
8 play with it, and the gun went off. And I was -- and it  
9 just was just negligence. And I ended up -- my neighbor  
10 ended up calling the police. The police came out. And  
11 I ended up getting in trouble for that. That was that  
12 time.

13           Conspiracy to commit a crime. I was with a  
14 buddy of mine who had taken, who had just taken a purse  
15 from someone. He called me a short time after to come  
16 pick him up. Someone saw him getting in my car. And I  
17 got arrested with him for him snatching a purse, for  
18 conspiracy, for him snatching the purse, and they said I  
19 conspired with him to snatch the purse.

20           The reckless driving was, essentially, I fell  
21 asleep at the light. And what can I say, I had a couple  
22 drinks, I fell asleep at the light. And I was in the  
23 wrong, I was 100 percent wrong. And I blew a 0.87, and  
24 they took me to jail. And that was my last time, I  
25 think, that I was arrested.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what have you  
2 been doing for employment the last seven years?

3 MR. KING: Oh, I actually went to culinary  
4 school and got my degree. So I've been a chef. I've  
5 been a chef for nine years now. So I was doing that,  
6 and everything was going good, and then COVID-19 just  
7 shut all the casinos down. So I had a buddy who owned a  
8 security company, and he told me if I went out and got  
9 my PILB card it would allow me to pick up some work with  
10 him so I can continue to support my family. And then  
11 that's, you know, that's how I arrived here. But I'm  
12 still a chef. I still, you know, enjoy cooking. And I  
13 just, I needed to have multiple forms of income. So  
14 that's what I'm trying to do.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I appreciate your  
16 honesty.

17 All right. Any other questions from the Board?

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
19 Nixon. And I'm sorry for my ignorance, but I'm not --  
20 what's a fray?

21 MR. KING: It's --

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What is a fray? It's  
23 fighting in public.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah.

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Got you. Okay.

1 MR. KING: I forgot to mention that one. That  
2 was --

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Bobby and I in the back  
4 parking lot.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You remember that. Oh,  
6 my God.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: God, you two. Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're welcome.  
10 Any other questions from the Board?

11 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a  
12 motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a  
14 motion to grant the appeal.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
16 Do I have a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
19 and second. Any further discussion?

20 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
21 those in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
24 Mr. King, congratulations. The appeal's been granted.

25 MR. KING: Thank you. I appreciate it. You

1 guys have a good day.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You, too.

3 All right. Number 81, Jarrod Guilford. Are  
4 you here, sir?

5 MR. GUILFORD: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize  
7 you're under oath?

8 MR. GUILFORD: I do.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
10 investigator, please continue.

11 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
12 applicant was denied for a 1998 possession of a weapon,  
13 CCW, in a vehicle, which was a misdemeanor in  
14 California. He was convicted and received 36 months of  
15 probation, which was dismissed under 1203.4. The  
16 applicant disclosed the arrest and conviction on his  
17 application. And the fingerprint report confirms that  
18 this was dismissed under 1203.4.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

20 Mr. Guilford, do you want to tell us what  
21 happened?

22 MR. GUILFORD: Yes, sir. I lived in  
23 southern -- after getting out of active duty military, I  
24 moved to southern California, resided there for eight  
25 years, attended college. In late 1997, I went out of

1 town to meet some friends, went up to north to  
2 Santa Barbara traveling by myself. I had a firearm with  
3 me which was legally purchased at a gun store in  
4 southern California. On the way back, I was pulled over  
5 for speeding. And when the trooper asked me if I had  
6 any weapons or firearms in the car, I admitted to it,  
7 and promptly was taken to jail.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well --

9 MR. GUILFORD: After -- oh, go ahead.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go on. My apologies.

11 MR. GUILFORD: No, no, I was just -- I've been  
12 listening. So I was just going to give you the  
13 information of what I've been doing since. I was going  
14 to move forward with that. But if you have questions.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, no, no. Go ahead.

16 MR. GUILFORD: Okay. After, in 2003, after  
17 getting back from a one-year deployment, after  
18 September 11th, I was hired by the Douglas County  
19 Sheriff's Office. I've been a deputy sheriff for 16  
20 years in northern Nevada, to include 10 years with SWAT,  
21 three years as a detective, and one year undercover  
22 narcotics. I had the opportunity to purchase four  
23 years, so I have my 20, 20 over. And as you probably  
24 are well-aware, now is not the best time to be in law  
25 enforcement, and I just kind of had to hang it up.

1 I have consequently had some security job  
2 prospects due to my pedigree and my resume. So I'm  
3 making the application for the PILB Board.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You broke up.  
5 Did I hear Douglas County Sheriff's Office?

6 MR. GUILFORD: Yes, sir, 16 years.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. And  
8 then --

9 MR. GUILFORD: And I purchased four.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. No, I understand  
11 it. I'm in PERS, too. What branch of the military were  
12 you in?

13 MR. GUILFORD: I did active duty Army out of  
14 Fort Bragg, North Carolina, as a paratrooper. And I did  
15 seven years as a cavalry scout observer in the  
16 California National Guard.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you for  
18 your service.

19 All right. Any other questions from the Board?

20 Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll  
22 make a motion. Time and distance, the whole thing. I  
23 make motion to grant the appeal.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I've got a  
25 motion. Do I have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
3 and a second. Any further discussion?

4 Hearing none, all those in favor, state "aye."

5 (Board members said "aye.")

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.

7 Mr. Guilford, congratulations. You have a good day.

8 MR. GUILFORD: Okay. Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I think, that was his  
10 phone.

11 All right. Number 82, Kamran Estifae. And if  
12 I mispronounced it, my apologies. Are you here, sir?

13 MR. ESTIFAE: Yes, sir, this is Kamran  
14 Estifae.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, okay. Do you  
16 realize you're under oath?

17 MR. ESTIFAE: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
19 investigator, please proceed.

20 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.

21 Mr. Estifae is another return to the Board. There was  
22 some confusion the first time he had come to the Board  
23 in regards to a license and a registered work card. I  
24 spent some time with the applicant explaining the  
25 differences between a license to provide security



1 services and the registered work card. He now  
2 understands the difference between the license and the  
3 registered work card.

4 He did list his felony charge. That was  
5 reduced to a misdemeanor per 1203.4. He also provided  
6 all the documentation from the Nevada Public Safety  
7 showing that he has met his 15 years for registration.  
8 This was the only arrest on the applicant's background.  
9 And, again, like I said, the first time he was told, he  
10 didn't understand the difference, and he was told to  
11 come back in a year. And he did come back, waited  
12 exactly a year, and was set up for the appeal again.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Is he a  
14 registered sex offender?

15 MR. SALADINO: Not anymore. He met his 15  
16 years that he was required to. He also provided the  
17 letter from the Department of Public Safety saying that  
18 he no longer has to register.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And I do recall  
20 this case.

21 We have a new member of the Board.  
22 Mr. Estifae, you want to tell us about your arrest  
23 again?

24 MR. ESTIFAE: No.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No?

1 MR. ESTIFAE: I did not understand. Can you  
2 say that again, please?

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you want to --  
4 although I was here when you were here a year ago and I  
5 recall your story, we have new members of the Board.  
6 And I'm asking you to explain the arrest again, please.

7 MR. ESTIFAE: Oh, okay. It is one page. Can  
8 I read it to you? It's a little bit longer. Is that  
9 okay, or I cannot?

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I -- what were you  
11 accused of doing?

12 MR. ESTIFAE: Because I wanted the card to  
13 work harder. And I work for, right now, 10, 15 years  
14 for the company as a manager of the office. But I want  
15 to get that certificate and card to work in security  
16 over there. And the first time, you know, the license,  
17 I thought I can open my business. And based on those  
18 two, this time I want get the card.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Estifae, I need you  
20 to explain to the Board about your arrest for annoying a  
21 minor. What happened?

22 MR. ESTIFAE: Oh, okay. I was, at that time,  
23 I was in California, and I worked as a sales manager in  
24 the Galaxy Auto Center. And I have brand-new cars over  
25 there that I use, in storage. Because I drive all

1 different cars, not my car. And one day, I go over  
2 there, the owner, together, go to the clinic next lots,  
3 next to the car lots, to get the free HIV test. And  
4 after we passed the test, the worker who works there  
5 gave everybody the condom, the full pack of condom.

6           So we got to -- and I put all of the condom  
7 inside a storage car, my car. My car doesn't drive.  
8 Just I sleep over, I sleep over there for a year. And  
9 then, after a while, the owner had a heart attack, and  
10 he got to a hospital, and he was in the hospital for six  
11 months, and then finally he died. And the car was in.  
12 And I drive my car, because under my document they  
13 cannot touch my car.

14           And then the same day I drive out into the  
15 street, with everything in my car, like in storage. And  
16 then I go to my cousin's house to help her with shopping  
17 charge. She's 18. And I go to Long's drugstore.  
18 Inside the drugstore, I see a girl that looked at me and  
19 smiled. And I never see her in my life. I thought, she  
20 knows me. And then I purchased my cousin's shop and  
21 backed up my car. And then she do the same time out of  
22 the store and walking around. And then I go by my car.  
23 It was a residential area. And I have to go very slow,  
24 like five miles per hour. She thought I chase her. And  
25 she is scared. And she called her mom. And her mom

1 called the cop.

2           And they arrested me. They put me in the jail  
3 for 30 days. And then I get the bond and I get out. I  
4 hired an attorney. And my attorney says, "You know, you  
5 better accept the charge." There is several charges,  
6 but my attorney dropped all of them except one of them.  
7 And I said, "You know, I don't want back to jail. I  
8 never go to jail in my life. I am scared of the jail.  
9 Do what you can do for me." And the attorney said,  
10 "Just accept one charge, and I promise to you no more  
11 jail." And I said, "Okay." And I accept it, and they  
12 give me no more time for jail, but they said, "You have  
13 to register for life." It happened in California.

14           And then, after a while -- they put me on the  
15 probation for seven years. After seven years, I  
16 finished my probation. And then, because California was  
17 so high for living, I cannot afford it, I moved to  
18 Nevada, Las Vegas here.

19           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Estifae?

20           MR. ESTIFAE: Yes.

21           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.  
22 I believe, your phone is really scratchy. So we try the  
23 best that we can.

24           Are there any other questions from the Board?

25           BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: For the applicant.

3 Okay. So, then, this was annoying a child rather than  
4 molesting a child? Do you know the difference of that?

5 MR. ESTIFAE: Yeah, I know that. But I never  
6 molest this child, I never touch the girl, nothing. But  
7 the judge gave me that charge. I don't know why. And  
8 my attorney said, "Just accept it. Otherwise, we'll  
9 have to go to jury. And in the jury, maybe you lose  
10 it." You know, he has scared me all the time, my  
11 attorney. And then I said, "Okay. I accept it." You  
12 know, he says, "Raise your hand in the court, and the  
13 that's it, and you don't go anymore to jail."

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

15 MR. ESTIFAE: And I didn't --

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Estifae, hold on  
17 one second.

18 Hey, Bobby, it's Ray.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Just FYI, California has  
21 a broad misdemeanor --

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- under, I believe it's  
24 600 something, and it is annoy, slash, molest.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right. That's what I

1 thought had happened. That's why it was reduced down to  
2 a misdemeanor. He doesn't have to register after 15  
3 years.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Right.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So I mean I'm familiar  
6 with that law. I just wanted to make sure that he  
7 didn't get out of the car, the girl didn't get in his  
8 car. I wanted to make sure we had the right charge,  
9 that's all, the right information.

10 You never touched the girl, you never got out  
11 of the car, she never got in your car, is that correct?

12 MR. ESTIFAE: Correct.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That's all I  
14 needed to know.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
16 questions?

17 Okay. Hearing none, I will entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is very unusual  
19 for me. This is Gronauer. I'll make a motion.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because of the  
22 California laws and how it probably did happen, what  
23 he's talking about, I'm going to say, I'm going to make  
24 a motion to grant the appeal. It's a little bit  
25 against what I wanted --

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Who's ever got their  
2 phone on, unless you're the applicant, please put it on  
3 mute. Thank you.

4 Go ahead, Bobby.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Again, slight  
6 reservation. But I make a motion to go ahead and grant  
7 the appeal.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
9 Do I have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Board Member Nixon. I  
11 second.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any  
13 further discussion?

14 I just want to add that we have time, distance,  
15 and the applicant followed the instructions of the  
16 Board. The case has been dismissed. He's no longer  
17 required to register. And I want to reiterate what  
18 Commissioner Gronauer said that there was never any  
19 touching involved or physical violence towards the  
20 child.

21 So with that, I'll call for a vote. All those  
22 in favor, state "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The appeal is  
25 granted. Congratulations, Mr. Estifae. Have a good

1 day.

2 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, Kevin Ingram.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

4 MR. INGRAM: Normally, I was going to stop you  
5 at 2:00 o'clock to do some more swearing in. But we're  
6 sworn in through items number 91, if you want to just  
7 proceed until we're done with 91.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I want to proceed.  
9 Let's keep it going.

10 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.

12 Mr. Benjamin cross, number 83. Are you here,  
13 sir?

14 MR. CROSS: Yes, I'm here.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize  
16 you're under oath?

17 MR. CROSS: Yes, sir, I do.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
19 please proceed.

20 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. When the  
21 applicant applied, he was denied for unlawful carrying  
22 of a weapon, which was a misdemeanor in Texas, where he  
23 was found guilty and received three years of probation.  
24 The applicant disclosed the arrest and conviction at the  
25 time he submitted his application, and wishes to appeal



1 the decision.

2 Oh, on my report, I noted that we didn't have  
3 the fingerprint report. We have since received it. And  
4 that is the only arrest on the applicant's fingerprint  
5 report.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what was the charge,  
7 again, in Texas in 1996?

8 MR. SALADINO: It was the unlawful carrying of  
9 a weapon.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: In Texas?

11 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. There's an  
13 editorial there.

14 Okay. Mr. Cross, go ahead. I'd like to hear  
15 your version.

16 MR. CROSS: When I was walking, I had just got  
17 off of work. I was working as a security officer. And  
18 I was walking from one county to the other. And there's  
19 like a small, in between counties, just like a small  
20 city called Meadows. And I didn't have my proper  
21 documentation with me when I was walking. So he  
22 arrested me. I mean that's all I can tell you. He  
23 arrested me, patted me down. He asked me if I had any  
24 weapons. I said, "Yes, I do." And, of course, he went  
25 from there, he says, "Do you have your documentation

1 with you that you can carry a firearm?" And I was like,  
2 "Yes, I do, and you can call the company that I'm  
3 working for." And, but he didn't do all that, he just  
4 arrested me.

5 Of course, I was making like \$6.25 an hour at  
6 the time. I didn't have an attorney. And I would have  
7 been able to actually get this dismissed, because I was  
8 walking from one county to another county, and in Texas  
9 law you can -- there's no law that's stating that you  
10 have to carry a license from one county to another,  
11 especially if you're walking.

12 So, basically, I got my years of probation and  
13 did my time and did what I had to do. And I haven't  
14 been arrested ever since. I've kept myself clean. I've  
15 served in the Marines in Mexico. I have dual  
16 citizenship. I have a security clearance, because I  
17 worked overseas at the NATO base in Camp Bondsteel. And  
18 I'm just trying to provide for my family. And so, if  
19 granted, that's what I will do, continue working here in  
20 Nevada.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What are you doing here  
22 in Las Vegas for employment?

23 MR. CROSS: I work for compliance for a  
24 pharmacy.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Medical marijuana

1 pharmacy or regular pharmacy?

2 MR. CROSS: No, a regular pharmacy, yeah.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. And  
4 then there was a background. You were a Marine serving  
5 in Mexico. Were you with the Mexican Marines?

6 MR. CROSS: Yeah, I joined.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The reason I asked, we  
8 already had a French Foreign Legion.

9 MR. CROSS: I was with the Marina. No, I was  
10 with the Mexican Marina in Mexico.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, okay. All right.  
12 Any further questions from the Board?

13 Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
15 Nixon. I move that we grant the appeal for Benjamin  
16 Cross.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do I have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any further  
20 discussion?

21 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.  
22 All those in favor, state "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Motion carries.

25 Mr. Cross, congratulations. You have a good day.

1 MR. CROSS: All right. Thank you, Board.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. George Clay,  
3 number 84.

4 MR. CLAY: George Clay. I'm here, and I  
5 understand I'm under oath.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Good enough.  
7 All right. Investigator, please proceed.

8 MR. JONES: Thank you. This is Investigator  
9 Jones. The applicant applied in June of '20. He was  
10 denied for an arrest in April 2008, which was unlawful  
11 contact with a child, which was a gross misdemeanor.  
12 The fingerprint report shows that he served nine months  
13 in jail. This was disclosed, and we do have court  
14 documents for this.

15 He originally applied with the PILB in 2013, at  
16 which point he was denied. He did not appeal this  
17 denial. He reapplied again in 2016, which he was denied  
18 again. He did appeal the 2016 denial but did not  
19 attend. He did provide court documents. And in the  
20 sentencing minutes from this arrest, it does mention  
21 that he was working for a private security company. He  
22 has no electronic restrictions, is not required to  
23 register as a sex offender. He has his gun rights  
24 restored and is the principal owner of a California  
25 private patrol company, and is active and in good

1 standing with the BSIS.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Clay.

3 MR. CLAY: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Tell us about your  
5 arrest for unlawful acts with a child.

6 MR. CLAY: So in 2007, during the age of  
7 My Space, I was contacted by someone whose profile said  
8 they were 17. I actually waited until after their  
9 profile said they were 18. So this would have been, I  
10 want to say, roughly September 2007 before I responded  
11 to their instant message thing through Facebook, or  
12 through My Space. We ended up talking for a little bit,  
13 and then we ended up meeting at a park. And we did end  
14 up making out for a little bit. And my hands wandered.  
15 I mean I did slide down the back, I did cup the  
16 buttocks, things like that.

17 But after all of that, I kind of got this weird  
18 feeling. We did exchange some emails and some texts  
19 still after that. But just it got to the point I ended  
20 up actually going back to California. I was contacted  
21 by a detective. Because, apparently, she ended up  
22 getting pregnant, at which point they went through all  
23 her contacts and stuff. She got pregnant from a  
24 different person who was convicted. But they ended  
25 up -- he took my statement. And then, apparently,

1 unbeknownst to me -- I had ended up getting a job at the  
2 Department of Aviation here in Clark County. And in  
3 April, I was arrested on an outstanding warrant, which I  
4 didn't know anything about.

5           And then my attorney ended up dealing with  
6 everything. So the end-all be-all, the case came out in  
7 March, I want to say March 23rd, I think, 2010.  
8 Investigator Jones should have the date. But so I ended  
9 up getting convicted of the unlawful contact. It  
10 wasn't, my understanding was it wasn't anything to do  
11 with the kissing at the park, it was the internet, the  
12 email and the text message stuff. And I ended up  
13 getting sentenced to nine, but only did six months. And  
14 then, like I said, I was, like he said, I was released,  
15 no nothing after that.

16           I've since renewed my cards in California  
17 several times. And I know it's unrelated. But I've  
18 renewed by conceal weapons in Nevada. And I've received  
19 my Utah and Florida ones since then as well.

20           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So two questions.  
21 How old were you in 2008?

22           MR. CLAY: Let's see. That would have been  
23 made me, ballpark, 36. I was born in February '72. So  
24 that would, yeah, 36, almost 37.

25           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And, then, just

1 for clarification, what do you do for employment now?

2 MR. CLAY: So since the -- my mother's 75. So  
3 since the quarantine lockdown started, roughly March,  
4 I've been in Nevada. I do her errands in things like  
5 that for her.

6 When I'm in California, I do security work down  
7 there. In fact, I have to go, I think it's later this  
8 month or early next month, to do my psych eval to renew  
9 my firearms permit. But I've had my guard card there  
10 since 1992. I've had, except for there were a couple  
11 years, I had the prior PILB one, but I had the sheriff's  
12 cards up here. But those are from like the '90s and, I  
13 want to say, early 2000s. Again, I think, the  
14 investigator has that, because part of a phone call we  
15 had. But I've been doing security work ever since,  
16 basically, since 1992.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

18 MR. CLAY: But I have not worked anything in  
19 Nevada because I don't have the license to pick up any  
20 guard work or anything up here in the security field.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

22 Any other questions from the Board?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you married now?

1 MR. CLAY: No, sir, I've never been married.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. No problem.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?

4 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a  
5 motion.

6 Okay. I'm going to call for a motion a second  
7 time.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's Gronauer. I'll  
9 make a motion.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Go ahead.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, because the usage  
12 and all that, and it's not really all that long, I'm  
13 just going to have to say I make a motion to deny the  
14 appeal.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
16 Do I have a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
19 I have a second. Any further discussion from the Board?

20 Okay. All those in favor, state "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

23 Okay. Motion carries. Mr. Clay, you can  
24 reapply in one year.

25 MR. CLAY: All right. Thank you, sir. You all



1 have a good day.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You, too.

3 All right. Mr. Yosepp, and help me with the  
4 pronunciation, number 85, are you here?

5 MR. YOSEPP: Yes, Yosepp Terry.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize  
7 you're under oath?

8 MR. YOSEPP: Yes, I do.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
10 investigator, please continue.

11 MR. JONES: Yes, Investigator Jones again. The  
12 applicant was arrested in 2006 out of California for a  
13 concealed carry of a firearm, which was a misdemeanor.  
14 The applicant was ordered to pay fines, and the weapon  
15 was ordered to be destroyed. Initially, when the  
16 applicant applied, he did not provide court documents,  
17 but when asked to do so later, he did, out of Orange  
18 County, which confirmed this.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Sir, tell us what  
20 happened.

21 MR. YOSEPP: All right. So I did, I did send  
22 the court documents when I initially put in my first  
23 application, because I did it on line. It was inside of  
24 the borders on the one line, how you put them in, like  
25 attach them. So it was on there as an attachment.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. No, no. Tell us  
2 what happened with the arrest.

3 MR. YOSEPP: Oh, okay. So, basically, in 2006,  
4 I went to a shooting range. Me and some friends were in  
5 different cars. We went to the shooting range. After  
6 the shooting range or, you know, after we was shooting  
7 or whatever, in California, they have you walk in with  
8 your clip in one hand and your gun in the other hand,  
9 with no bullets in it. Because you have to purchase the  
10 bullets when you get in there.

11 So I went in. I purchased the bullets. We,  
12 you know, were shooting at the shooting range. I go to  
13 leave. Instead of -- like, basically, I was in a rush.  
14 So instead of like putting my gun back in the lockbox,  
15 to leave, I ended up leaving the gun in my center  
16 console, with no clip in it, and the clip was on the  
17 door. I made it like two lights down from the shooting  
18 range. The target was in the back of the car. I got  
19 pulled over by Anaheim police. They walked up to the  
20 car. They asked me, you know, for my license,  
21 registration. They asked me was there anything in the  
22 car. I told them, "Yeah, my registered firearm." Then  
23 they, you know, had me get out of the car. When they  
24 searched the car, they, basically, found my firearm,  
25 with no clip, in the middle, center console. Then they

1 seen the clip on the door.

2 Basically, I was cited and then released. I  
3 was then -- you know, I went to court. They ended up  
4 giving me summary probation, three years, I want to say,  
5 with \$1,300 fine, which was like \$100 a month. And then  
6 I was put on three months summary probation, I mean, I'm  
7 sorry, three years summary probation. I served that  
8 time.

9 As soon as I served that time and I was off of  
10 summary probation, I moved to Nevada. And when I moved  
11 to Nevada, immediately when I got here, I was a student  
12 at UNLV, and I also was working in the school district.  
13 And I also had a guard card through Las Vegas Metro  
14 Police Department back in 2010, and it expired in 2013.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

16 MR. YOSEPP: Oh, one more thing. One more  
17 thing. I'm sorry.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

19 MR. YOSEPP: And then, in April, I was just  
20 approved to get another registered firearm. So I just  
21 purchased another firearm in April. And I was approved  
22 by Public Safety, Nevada Public Safety.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, when you mean you  
24 were approved for a firearm means you passed the Brady  
25 background check to allow you to purchase the firearm?

1 MR. YOSEPP: Yes. Yes, that's what I was  
2 talking about.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

4 All right. Any questions from the Board?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: We didn't have, at the  
8 time of the report, we didn't have the fingerprints.  
9 Anything updated about fingerprints?

10 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. No, not at  
11 this time.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You still don't have  
14 fingerprints?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.

16 MR. JONES: No, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is that, for a case to  
18 come before us like today on appeal, is that unusual?

19 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. We were hoping  
20 to have them at this time. It's about the time we  
21 usually get them back. It just hasn't come in yet.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

23 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, this is Kevin, for the  
24 record.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, go ahead, Kevin.

1 MR. INGRAM: I'm going to run in and check  
2 with our fingerprint specialist and see, by chance, if  
3 we have them, if you want to trail this and move on.  
4 I'll get right back to you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You know what, we can  
6 take a quick five-minute break. We've been going for  
7 almost an hour and 15.

8 MR. INGRAM: Okay. I'll have that information  
9 for you when we return.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We're going  
11 to take a five-minute break.

12 MR. YOSEPP: Can I say one more thing?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No. We're on a  
14 five-minute break, and then you'll be able to say one  
15 more thing.

16 MR. YOSEPP: Okay. I got you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you,  
18 sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm going on mute.

20 \* \* \* \* \*

21 (A break was taken, 2:17 to 2:21 p.m.)

22 \* \* \* \* \*

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. This is Ray  
24 Flynn. I'm back. Kevin, are you back?

25 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. And Investigator

1 Saladino has some fingerprints that he can go ahead  
2 share with the Board.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Before we do  
4 that, let's take a roll, please.

5 MR. INGRAM: You bet.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Shannon --

7 MR. INGRAM: So today we have Chair Flynn on  
8 the call right now.

9 Board Member Brown?

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Present.

11 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Gronauer?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Here.

13 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here.

15 MR. INGRAM: And court reporter Shannon Taylor?

16 THE REPORTER: Here.

17 MR. INGRAM: Michael Detmer, legal counsel?

18 MR. DETMER: Present.

19 MR. INGRAM: Okay. We're good to go.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Kevin, it's  
21 your show.

22 MR. INGRAM: All right. So, Investigator  
23 Saladino, can you go ahead and provide the Board the  
24 overview of the fingerprint report, please?

25 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino. So

1 there was the 2006 carrying a loaded firearm in a public  
2 place. That is the only misdemeanor conviction for the  
3 applicant. It does show he received three years  
4 probation and a fine. And that was the only arrest on  
5 the fingerprint report.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. So we  
7 do have fingerprints. All right.

8 Any other questions from the Board?

9 All right. I'll seek a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's Gronauer. I'll  
11 make a motion to grant the appeal for Mr. Yosepp.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
13 Do I have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any further  
16 discussion?

17 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
18 those in favor, state "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
21 Congratulations, sir. You have a good day.

22 MR. YOSEPP: All right. Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 86, Andrea  
24 Austin, are you here?

25 MS. AUSTIN: Yes, I'm here.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand  
2 you're under oath?

3 MS. AUSTIN: Yes, I do.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
5 investigator, please proceed.

6 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2009,  
7 Ms. Austin was charged with aggravated battery causing  
8 great body harm out of Illinois. This was at the felony  
9 level. Disposition shows 18 months probation. She did  
10 disclose the arrest and provided court docs. And the  
11 probation was terminated one month early, after  
12 completion of terms. And the date for that termination,  
13 the completion of probation was 9-3 of 2010.

14 The applicant was not made provisional. The  
15 arrest was confirmed with the fingerprint report and the  
16 court documentation. The applicant listed that she had  
17 been employed with Allied Universal in November 2019;  
18 however, did not appear on the Allied Universal roster.  
19 And this turned out to be that she applied for a  
20 position but was not hired due to the work card denial.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Austin, do  
22 you want to tell us about your arrest?

23 MS. AUSTIN: Yes. I actually lived in  
24 Wisconsin. I had just moved back to Chicago. And when  
25 I went back to Chicago, I had a court hearing for child



1 support. I went to the court hearing for child support  
2 at the Cook County Daley Center, or whatever. And when  
3 I was there, I was on my phone. So after the hearing, I  
4 was on my phone talking to the child support agency in  
5 Wisconsin in regards to the hearing that I had just  
6 left. They didn't have the correct information in  
7 Illinois because it was an interstate case. They didn't  
8 have the correct information. And so I was on the phone  
9 contacting my child support agency. And as I was on the  
10 phone talking to my agency, one of the guards, she  
11 yelled and screamed at me and told me I couldn't be on  
12 my phone, or whatever. And I said, "Okay." She's like,  
13 "Well, you have to go outside the doors." So I'm like,  
14 "Okay. I'm going to go outside the doors."

15 I'm walking outside the doors as I'm still on  
16 the phone with my child support agency. She comes  
17 behind me and she grabs my arm. When she grabbed my arm  
18 really hard, she yanked me, my phone hit the ground.  
19 And then she punched me. And when she punched me in my  
20 eye, I told her, I threw my hands up, and I told her, I  
21 said, "Well, I'm going to sue you." And when I told her  
22 I was going to sue her because she just hit me for no  
23 reason, then she tried -- that pissed her off more.  
24 Then she tried to hit me again. When she tried to hit  
25 me the second time, I wouldn't let her hit me, so I hit

1 her back. And when we -- we was fighting. And then,  
2 after that, they broke us up. I got charged. She  
3 didn't, of course. She was a guard at the court office.  
4 So she got off, and I got arrested.

5 I had never been in jail in my life. That was  
6 the only time I've been in jail. I didn't know how the  
7 system worked, didn't know anything. I had a public  
8 defender that told me that it was best for me, "Oh, if  
9 you just say that you were guilty, you can get out of  
10 jail." I'm sitting in Cook County jail, which is one of  
11 the worst jails in the world. I didn't know what to do,  
12 how to do. All I knew I was needed to get back home to  
13 my kids. So I ended up pleading guilty to the charge.

14 But long story short, I did my 18 months  
15 probation. I actually got off at 17 months with no  
16 problems. I did 60 days in jail, 18 months probation.

17 After all of that, I have worked security since  
18 then. In Chicago, I worked security. I had, I got  
19 married. I was young when all that happened. I got  
20 married, had other children. I was a secretary at an  
21 auto company. And then I, now I am a travel agent here  
22 in Nevada.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

24 Now, just clarification. And this is for the  
25 investigator. The charge is aggravated assault, I mean

1 aggravated battery?

2 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir, that's correct.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then for  
4 Ms. Austin, was this a court bailiff, or was this a  
5 security guard that was working for the county?

6 MS. AUSTIN: I'm not exactly sure. I think,  
7 she was a county.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The reason I'm  
9 saying is I know in Illinois they have a separate charge  
10 for battery or assault on a police officer. And,  
11 obviously, that's what's listed here.

12 MS. AUSTIN: Yes, I think, that's what, I  
13 think, she was for the county.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Then she was a  
15 security guard. All right. So thank you for your  
16 responses.

17 Any other questions from the Board?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes. This is Brown. And  
19 for the investigator, if you were able to find out, what  
20 I'm seeing also is great body harm. Do we know what the  
21 injury was to the person?

22 MR. MAXWELL: Negative, sir.

23 MS. AUSTIN: I don't even know why it says  
24 this.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Well, that answers my next  
2 question to see if you knew what it was, Ms. Austin.  
3 I'm good.

4 MS. AUSTIN: I have no idea why it says that.  
5 As far as my understanding, she wasn't, she wasn't  
6 harmed. I don't know why it says that. But, again, I  
7 don't know how the legal system works. This is my first  
8 time and only time in trouble, and that was 11 and a  
9 half years ago. So I don't know.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

11 MS. AUSTIN: But I did provide documents, court  
12 documentation.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from  
14 the Board?

15 All right. I'll entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
17 Brown. I move that we grant the appeal.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
19 Do I have a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
22 I have a second. Any further discussion?

23 Hearing none, all those in favor, state "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

1 Congratulations, Ms. Austin. You have a good day.

2 Motion carried.

3 MS. AUSTIN: Thank you. Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

5 Number 87, Rojelio Castrejon. And if I butchered that  
6 pronunciation, my apologies. Number 87. Mr. Castrejon?

7 Mr. Ingram, anything you can add on this?

8 MR. INGRAM: I believe that Mr. Castrejon had  
9 confirmed that he would be attending.

10 Lori, am I incorrect on that?

11 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes, he was notified by phone,  
12 email and mail. But I was just notified by front office  
13 staff that some, two people have just called in stating  
14 that they were not able to get on the line, that it was  
15 packed. So I'm not certain if you want to postpone him  
16 until some people get off the line. But from what I  
17 understand, people are not able to get online right now.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, you know,  
19 we're running over. And we've got one, two, three,  
20 four, five more to go. All right. We will definitely  
21 trail this one, especially the fact that we heard from  
22 him that he wanted to be here, and we know the line's  
23 packed with over 50 people. So. Okay.

24 Number 88, Mr. Pullen.

25 MR. PULLEN: Yes, sir, I'm here, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. Pullen,  
2 do you realize you're under oath?

3 MR. PULLEN: Yes, sir, I do.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
5 investigator, please proceed.

6 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 1973,  
7 Mr. Pullen was arrested for resisting an officer and  
8 burglary out of New Jersey. This was at the felony  
9 level. He got a five-year suspended prison sentence and  
10 three years probation. He did disclose this is on the  
11 application. He was initially made provisional on  
12 10-1-2019 and was not added to anyone's roster. He was  
13 denied 11-5-2019.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
15 Mr. Pullen, tell us about your arrest.

16 MR. PULLEN: Okay. Well, I was young and dumb.  
17 And I was like 20 years old. And I was totally  
18 intoxicated and was with my cousin, who at the time, I  
19 found out later on, was actually a heroin addict. And  
20 we got in his car about 2:00 a.m., after being in the  
21 bar. And he drove to a back road and parked the car and  
22 said, "Come one, man, I want you to help me with  
23 something." I didn't even know, I was drunk, about to  
24 black out.

25 The next thing I know, he's busting into the

1 Golf gas station right down in the middle of my hometown  
2 of Pikestown, New Jersey. And I went in, and he went  
3 in, and he started stealing money out of the floor safe  
4 with a coat hanger. And I was standing in there. And I  
5 was trying to understand what I was even doing in there.  
6 And I saw a cop checking the door. And I said, "Dang,  
7 we better just get out of here. Come on, man. The cops  
8 are coming." And so he hid by the door. And when the  
9 cop came up to the door, he raised the bay door and ran  
10 out and punched the cop, at this point I ran around the  
11 back of the building and ran away. So I was, I was  
12 really scared actually.

13 And so, yeah, I got -- let's see. I didn't  
14 realize, because I was -- that was like my first time  
15 ever getting in real trouble with the law. I didn't  
16 realize that I was, you know, admitting to a felony  
17 charge at the time. However, I'm not going to deny it,  
18 because now that I know, yes, I did. I was an  
19 accomplice. It was not my idea to do it.

20 In any event, I got three years probation. I  
21 don't remember anything about five years. I didn't know  
22 it was that lengthy. But I know that what I got was  
23 three years probation. It was unsupervised actually,  
24 because I was working at the time and I called in once a  
25 month. Mr. McGarrett was his name. And about one and a

1 half years after, you know, my probation, I was let off  
2 with good behavior. And that's basically it.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

4 MR. PULLEN: It's not something I did again.  
5 In fact, I've been sober. I don't drink, I don't do  
6 drugs, and I don't do any of that. And I've been sober  
7 since 1983.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Well, first  
9 off, I appreciate your honesty and the fact what you can  
10 recall from 47 years ago. We have applicants that can't  
11 remember one-tenth of what you remember to something  
12 that happened to them last year. So thank you for that.  
13 I'm not going to ask you what you've been doing the last  
14 47 years. I just want to, in the last couple years,  
15 what have you been doing for employment, and do you live  
16 in Las Vegas?

17 MR. PULLEN: Yes, I do live in Las Vegas, sir.  
18 And what I actually have been doing for employment is  
19 side work whenever I can get it. And I'll tell you why.  
20 My ex decided that she did not want to raise any  
21 children. I didn't know she was about that when we got  
22 together. So, subsequently, I've been raising my now  
23 seven-year-old daughter by myself, with no help, since  
24 2013.

25 So, yeah, I'm just recently starting to get



1 back into the work force, because I found someone I  
2 could trust to baby-sit my daughter. I was working at  
3 Spread The News Nevada, Spread The Word Nevada actually,  
4 sorry, which was a distributorship of books to the  
5 elementary schools in the county of the Clark County  
6 here. Of course, as my fate would have it, I got laid  
7 off because of the coronavirus. And so, you know,  
8 consequently, I'm just collecting Social Security, which  
9 has helped me a lot, and waiting for \$18,000 of back pay  
10 from unemployment. That's the truth, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I believe you. I've  
12 got some friends that have been dealing with DETR, too.

13 Okay. Any other questions from the Board?

14 MR. PULLEN: No, sir.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, from the Board. Not  
16 you. We're done.

17 MR. PULLEN: Oh, I'm sorry. Sorry.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's okay.

19 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a  
20 motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
22 that we grant the appeal of Randall Pullen.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
24 Do I have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further  
2 discussion?

3 I'll just add to the record this is an easy  
4 one. We have time and distance of 47 years.

5 So call for a vote. All those in favor, say  
6 "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

9 Okay. Motion carries. Congratulations,  
10 Mr. Pullen.

11 MR. PULLEN: Thank you very much, folks. I  
12 really appreciate it. Now, what do I do next? Do I,  
13 can I still reapply like a year later, and then I'm  
14 still going to be with a hold, or how does that work?

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, no, no. We granted  
16 your appeal.

17 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: You're approved.

18 MR. PULLEN: Okay. Okay. So, then, I don't  
19 have to worry about it again even if I don't try in  
20 time, in another two years, is that how it works?

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm going to  
22 let Mr. Ingram respond.

23 MR. PULLEN: Why is that funny? I don't know.

24 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Pullen, we will be contacting  
25 you shortly to work out getting your registered work

1 card to you. Because your appeal's been granted.

2 MR. PULLEN: Okay.

3 MR. INGRAM: And then we'll talk to you about  
4 renewal in five year. Okay?

5 MR. PULLEN: Okay. Thank you very much, folks.  
6 I really appreciate your time and effort today. Have a  
7 great day.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You, too.

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 89, Sitka  
11 Coppedge.

12 MS. COPPEDGE: Speaking.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did I pronounce your  
14 names correctly, ma'am?

15 MS. COPPEDGE: Yes, you did. Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize  
17 you're under oath?

18 MS. COPPEDGE: Yes, I do.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn it over  
20 to the investigator.

21 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.

23 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a  
24 1999 distribution of a controlled substance, out of  
25 Oregon, which was a felony. The applicant received two

1 years of probation. She did disclose it on her  
2 application. And her probation lasted from February 1st  
3 of 2000 to January 20th of '02. This was confirmed with  
4 the fingerprint report. And, again, the applicant did  
5 disclose it on her application.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
7 Ma'am, what was the circumstances of the drug arrest?

8 MS. COPPEDGE: I'm sorry. You were breaking  
9 up.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What was the  
11 circumstances of your arrest?

12 MS. COPPEDGE: I was downtown around six or  
13 seven at age 17 trying to pick up fliers. And they were  
14 doing a drug bust and arrested me without any drugs.  
15 And the lady picked up a wrapper on the ground. And  
16 they told me that I -- I went to court, and they said I  
17 had controlled substance. I had like several charges.  
18 I had a controlled substance charge. I had a controlled  
19 substance by a school, a thousand feet from a school.  
20 And I had a distribution charge. And the drugs, they  
21 got me because they said there was residue on a wrapper.

22 And I pled guilty because I was coerced into  
23 taking a plea bargain. I didn't really understand what  
24 entailed in the plea bargain. And at the time, my dad  
25 lived four hours away. And my mom was working full-time

1 at the Post Office. And she kind of had her hands full,  
2 because my brother was on drugs and alcohol, and then --  
3 my oldest brother, and my sister was going through  
4 teenage pregnancy. And so me having a problem with the  
5 jail was too overwhelming for her. Long story short, I  
6 went through the court system alone. And I really  
7 didn't know what I was plea bargaining into. So I took  
8 the plea bargain with probation rather than what I  
9 thought was going to go to prison.

10 And since then, I had a child, two years after,  
11 single parent, no father. And he has graduated high  
12 school this year. And in 2012, I moved to Nevada and  
13 raised my son. And after he got into high school, I  
14 went back to college. And I should be graduating this  
15 semester. And I will transfer to UNLV after that.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. How old were you  
17 when you were arrested?

18 MS. COPPEDGE: I was 17, and I was charged -- I  
19 was 17 when I was arrested, but by the time the case was  
20 over, I was 18.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then what are  
22 you doing for employment now?

23 MS. COPPEDGE: Currently, I'm on unemployment.  
24 And I also do these odd, I do these medical research  
25 jobs. And they're not consistent wages. Prior to that,

1 I worked for Dotty's Casino.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

3 MS. COPPEDGE: Before going to full-time  
4 school.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

6 Any other questions from the Board?

7 Okay.

8 MR. CASTREJON: Hello?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah?

10 MR. CASTREJON: I was told to make my presence.  
11 This is Rojelio Castrejon.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Castrejon, if  
13 you can hold on, we will deal with you next.

14 MR. CASTREJON: Oh, thank you, sir.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. No  
16 questions from the Board. I'll entertain a motion.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion to  
20 grant the appeal of Ms. Coppedge.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
22 Do I have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I got a

1 second from Mr. Brown. Any other discussion?

2 All right. Hearing none, all those in favor,  
3 state "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The motion  
6 carries. Congratulations, ma'am. Good luck to you.

7 MS. COPPEDGE: Thank you so much. I appreciate  
8 your time and your service. Have a good day. Bye.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 87,  
10 Mr. Castrejon, thank you for joining us. I understand  
11 there was a problem calling in.

12 MR. CASTREJON: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you  
14 understand -- oh, were you given the oath?

15 MR. CASTREJON: I was not.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Ingram, can  
17 you handle?

18 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Detmer, can we get you to  
19 swear Mr. Castrejon in, please?

20 MR. DETMER: It would be my pleasure.

21 Sir, do you hereby swear or affirm to tell the  
22 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

23 MR. CASTREJON: I do.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
25 investigator, please continue.

1 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2008,  
2 Mr. Castrejon, in Florida, was charged with possession  
3 with intent to sell cocaine at felony level. The  
4 disposition was 10 years one month of prison and three  
5 years supervised release. He did disclose and provided  
6 court documents. The applicant served seven years three  
7 days of his sentence, and his probation was completed in  
8 January of 2019. The arrest was disclosed on the  
9 application, and the application provided court  
10 documents and probation documents. The arrest was  
11 confirmed with the fingerprint report and document  
12 provided by the applicant.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.  
14 Mr. Castrejon, tell us about your arrest,  
15 please.

16 MR. CASTREJON: This occurred back in 2008,  
17 2009. I was -- do you want to know about what happened,  
18 or, or the time, what is it you would like to know,  
19 facts?

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What happened? I mean  
21 you get 10 years for cocaine. It had to be some heavy  
22 weight.

23 MR. CASTREJON: Well, no, not -- no. What  
24 happened was I was in a position where I -- I,  
25 basically, was a mule, if you want to call it that. I



1 was never involved with the drugs themselves. I  
2 happened to be involved for less than six months that  
3 cost me over seven years of my life. I've never done  
4 anything with it. I was in a desperate state. I don't  
5 know what happened. I somehow got involved, and I  
6 couldn't get out. And once you're in these type of  
7 situations, they kind of put a hold on your life,  
8 unfortunately. And the more I tried to get out of it,  
9 it just became harder and harder.

10 But like I said, it was six months of my life.  
11 That has nothing to do with what I came back to. I  
12 lived a very square, very straight, conservative  
13 lifestyle. I even covered all my taxes. I was told by  
14 the prosecutor not to worry about anything, not to pay  
15 my taxes, not to worry about my licenses. I went ahead  
16 and went with my CPA, and we squared everything away. I  
17 wanted all of my issues clean, like I always had before  
18 leaving, while I was fighting the case for a year during  
19 2008, 2009.

20 Unfortunately, since I fought the case, they  
21 tried to charge something different than other than I  
22 just was involved in a very short period of time, which  
23 is, like I said, a short six months. The case escalated  
24 against me. I didn't realize that you don't fight the  
25 government. So I should have just, you know -- I did my

1 best, and I told the truth. And what happened is since  
2 I pled my side, and so forth, and at the end, well, I  
3 was sentenced to so many years.

4           However, during my sentence, I did appeal it.  
5 And I won. Unfortunately, they said if throw it out,  
6 they would have to reissue everything from scratch. I  
7 had already had been in the system for three and a half  
8 years and fighting it with my attorney. So I said to  
9 myself, do I really want to go through all this again?  
10 So, instead, we submitted paperwork for me to be  
11 released early, which I was given that honor of being  
12 released early, a year and a half, in fact, for good  
13 conduct. I never served any time in any high  
14 penitentiary or any type of high level. I went directly  
15 to a camp, because of my history, because of my  
16 background and my references and so forth.

17           And after all that occurred, I just came back.  
18 Everyone that I've dealt with, you know, since before  
19 and after, as far as probation officer or pre-probation,  
20 have been completely helpful in me getting back into and  
21 acclimated to everything. It's been a slow process for  
22 me because of what happened to me in the past. And I  
23 take full responsibility. I made a mistake. It was  
24 wrong. I was involved in that situation. However, I've  
25 been doing my best to get back on my feet.

1 I've been working with -- eventually, I got a  
2 job with a college, which is a government, you know,  
3 it's a government job. I do really well there. I just  
4 work very part-time, because that's the only position  
5 that's available to me. I really need the income to get  
6 back on my feet. I have a nephew I take care of that  
7 I've been taking care of for the last three and a half  
8 years. He just turned nine. So the income is very  
9 important for me. So I've been doing my best with what  
10 I have now.

11 And I've also, I'm educating myself. I go to  
12 school. I just finished a mortgage lending license that  
13 was extremely hard. I've taken the exam, and I passed  
14 with an 85 last week.

15 So little by little, my life is kind of coming  
16 back to what it was before any of the incident and what  
17 it was before. I live a very straight, narrow. I just  
18 like to follow things by the book. And that little  
19 mistake just is not, I mean that big mistake, it cost me  
20 a lot of time. But that's exact, I mean that's what  
21 happened. I was involved in something that I shouldn't  
22 have been. I was at the wrong place at the wrong time.  
23 And it just, it just escalated.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Castrejon?

25 MR. CASTREJON: Yes, sir?

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I think,  
2 you've expressed your position. And you're starting to  
3 repeat yourself. I appreciate what you said.

4 MR. CASTREJON: Okay. Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You summed it up. You  
6 got involved in a bad situation. You paid the  
7 consequences for it.

8 MR. CASTREJON: Yes, sir.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Which college are you  
10 working at now?

11 MR. CASTREJON: College of Southern Nevada.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what do you  
13 do?

14 MR. CASTREJON: I'm student affairs. So I deal  
15 with admissions and financial aid. So I deal with the  
16 parents and special programs, for funding.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

18 MR. CASTREJON: Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
20 questions from the Board?

21 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a  
22 motion.

23 All right. Second call for a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, this is Gronauer.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You know, okay. I'll  
2 make a motion. It's because he's done his time. He's  
3 been out for about five years, has no other record or  
4 anything else going on. He's off probation for over a  
5 year. I make a motion to grant the appeal.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
7 Do I have a second? Any discussion?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Brown.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I was seconding. I don't  
11 know if I walked on somebody.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No. Did you want to add  
13 anything?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, sir. I was just going  
15 to second the motion.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a second.  
17 The only thing I want to add for the record is we've got  
18 12 years since the events. And there's been no other  
19 reoffenses. And he's done what he was required to do.  
20 And I'm supporting it.

21 So call for a vote. All those in favor, state  
22 "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Passes  
25 unanimously. Congratulations, Mr. Castrejon. Good

1 luck.

2 MR. CASTREJON: Thank you. Thank you so much.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're welcome.

4 Number 90, Mr. Trunell, are you here, sir?

5 MS. TRUNELL: I'm here, yes.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, Ms. Trunell. My  
7 apologies.

8 MS. TRUNELL: That's okay.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware  
10 you're under oath?

11 MS. TRUNELL: Yes.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. For the  
13 investigator, please continue.

14 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
15 applicant was denied for a 1999 possession and sales of  
16 narcotics, cocaine, at a felony level, out of  
17 California, where they received three years probation,  
18 suspended jail time and a fine. The applicant did  
19 disclose this arrest and provided court documents to  
20 show that all the requirements for the court were met,  
21 and the conviction was dismissed under 1203.4.

22 There was also a disturbance of the peace that  
23 she listed on her application. However, the fingerprint  
24 report did not report this arrest. And, again, this was  
25 disclosed by the applicant at the time of her

1 application.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Trunell, do  
3 you want to add anything, tell us what happened?

4 MS. TRUNELL: Yes. So as far as my possession  
5 and sale, I was young, I was 18, fresh out of high  
6 school. I lost my grandmother. And I was over visiting  
7 an aunt of mine. And it just so happens I was over  
8 there for about a week or so, and the police had come  
9 and raided her house. And when they raided her house,  
10 they found marijuana, they found cocaine already wrapped  
11 up in baggies and stuff. So I was arrested, me and my  
12 aunt was arrested. And I had, first, it was a D.A.  
13 reject. And then they had refiled on me, and I didn't  
14 know.

15 So I had went to go visit a cousin of mine that  
16 was in jail at the time, and they arrested me at that  
17 time for when I was charged with, back when I was 17.  
18 And, I think, it was 1998, '99, one of the two. So I  
19 had did jail time for that. And then I had got out.  
20 Like I said, I was at the wrong place at the wrong time,  
21 with my aunt, not knowing what she was doing, and things  
22 like that.

23 And as far as my disturbing the peace, I was in  
24 a casino in California, and I was smoking a cigarette,  
25 and I didn't know I wasn't supposed to smoke in

1 California. And they came and they snatched it out of  
2 my mouth. And it kind of made me upset. And then me  
3 and one of the securities had a, you know,  
4 back-and-forth argument. And then they had took me  
5 downstairs. And then it went from there.

6 But moving forward, I haven't been in any  
7 trouble since then. I learned my lesson the one time  
8 being in the wrong place at the wrong time. I try to do  
9 my best, because I have kids. I'm a single parent.

10 And I moved to Nevada. Moving forward, I moved  
11 to Nevada in 2014. And I was working for a call center.  
12 And I then moved back to California in 2017 due to my  
13 kids' father was incarcerated. And I previously just  
14 moved back last year in June, me and my mom and my kids.  
15 So I've been here. And I'm trying to find something  
16 different to do. I currently do cross-guarding, but I  
17 can't do it now because of the pandemic. So I was  
18 trying to apply for, you know, a security guard, you  
19 know, guard card and, also, to see if I ever would have  
20 got a permit. But I had to go to the PIB, you know, and  
21 I was denied.

22 So that's what I'm here for now. And I also  
23 take care of my mom, who was just recently diagnosed  
24 with Parkinson. And being a teacher, due to the  
25 pandemic, of my kids.



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I appreciate your  
2 forthrightness.

3 All right. Any other questions from the Board?

4 Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to  
6 grant the appeal.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
8 to grant. Do I have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a  
11 motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?

12 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.  
13 All those in favor, say "aye."

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
15 Congratulations, Ms. Trunell. You have a good day.

16 MS. TRUNELL: Thank you so much. You guys have  
17 a good day as well.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
19 Number 91, last one for this session. And then those  
20 that are sitting on the call, we'll get to you next,  
21 after we do some administrative work.

22 Mr. Rip Mason, are you here, sir?

23 MR. MASON: Yes, I'm here. I'm here.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware  
25 you're under oath?

1 MR. MASON: Yes, I am aware.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
3 investigator, please continue.

4 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The applicant  
5 was denied for an arrest in July of 1994 out of  
6 California, which was a robbery with a firearm at a  
7 felony level. The applicant did disclose it and stated  
8 that he had served five years in prison, which was  
9 confirmed by the fingerprint report.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Sir, do you want  
11 to tell us what happened?

12 MR. MASON: Yeah. Living in Los Angeles, just  
13 graduated from high school in September, and I turned 18  
14 in October, and got arrested December 9th, 1994. So it  
15 kind of, was out of high school, a lot of friends was  
16 doing robberies. And I had this group of associates  
17 doing robberies, and they were making money. And I was  
18 working at Target. I had a kid on the way and said,  
19 hey, I can make a couple quick \$5,000 if I'd just ride  
20 with them. And that was what the extent of it was.

21 I went to one robbery with them and got caught  
22 and got, went to L.A. County, did 10 months of fighting  
23 my case. I finally got a lawyer that separated myself  
24 from friends of mine, because they had other robberies.  
25 I had just the one. They were trying to group all the

1 robberies, you know, with all of us. It was like a  
2 12-year sentence. So I ended up getting five, ended up  
3 taking a five-year deal.

4 I did two and a half of that five, got out at  
5 21, and pretty much haven't looked back. I've been  
6 married 13 years. Just moved to Nevada about three,  
7 four years ago. Been working at the shelter, homeless  
8 shelter for about three years. So I moved here from  
9 Seattle, was doing the homeless shelter thing out there,  
10 worked security for about 20 years off and on, doing  
11 both security and working in nonprofits. Just finished  
12 my PMP, project management associate.

13 So I'm on the right track. It's just I'm  
14 trying to cover up all the past, you know, childhood,  
15 just angst of growing up in that big ole city of  
16 Los Angeles.

17 So that's kind of the long and the short of it,  
18 man, just a good guy, just that was my only major  
19 hiccup.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

21 MR. MASON: And the gun, oh, yeah, let me say  
22 one thing. The gun was a BB gun. I hate guns. I don't  
23 know if they have that in the report. But my friends,  
24 the people who was with me, had real guns. But the gun  
25 that they caught with me was a BB gun. I've never shot

1 a firearm in my life. I hate firearms. I know it's not  
2 the popular thing, you know, here, but. Oh, yeah.  
3 That's the extent of the firearm. It was a BB gun. It  
4 wasn't a real gun, my gun.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. You summed  
6 it up. It was 21 years ago, and you were young and not  
7 necessarily so smart as we are today.

8 MR. MASON: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
10 questions from the Board?

11 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a  
12 motion.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. This is Ray  
14 Flynn. For those of you that are on the call, please  
15 put your phone on mute. Thank you.

16 All right. It's Ray Flynn. I'm calling for a  
17 motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make  
19 the motion.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion for what?

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Make a motion to grant  
22 the appeal of Rip Mason.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I  
24 have a motion. Do I have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Nixon  
3 seconds. Any further discussion?

4 Hearing none, call for a vote. All those in  
5 favor, state "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
8 Congratulations, Mr. Mason. You have a good day.

9 MR. MASON: All right. Gratitude. I  
10 appreciate you guys.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Ingram, it's  
12 all yours.

13 MR. INGRAM: For those of you on the call at  
14 this time, we should have a group that was told to call  
15 in at 2:00 p.m. and a group that was told to call in at  
16 3:00 p.m. We should have plenty of room for all of  
17 them.

18 So at this time, we are going to administer the  
19 oath of office. Or, the oath of office, wow. How about  
20 the swearing in for those of you that are going to  
21 testifying today.

22 Mr. Detmer, can you please do the swearing in  
23 for us, please?

24 MR. DETMER: It would be my pleasure.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

1 MR. DETMER: For those of you who are about to  
2 testify, do you hereby swear or affirm to tell the  
3 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

4 (Applicants and witnesses present were  
5 sworn/affirmed.)

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And, Director  
7 Ingram, we're going to be doing 92 through what number,  
8 hopefully?

9 MR. INGRAM: Hopefully, we get 92 through 120.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We will try our best,  
11 see what we can do by 4:00 o'clock.

12 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 92.  
14 Chisena, Carol Chisena. And if I'm mispronouncing, my  
15 apologies.

16 MS. CHISENA: Yes, sir, I'm here.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize  
18 you're under oath?

19 MS. CHISENA: I do.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. For the  
21 investigator, please continue.

22 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2006,  
23 the applicant was charged with possession of  
24 methamphetamine with intent to sell in the state of  
25 Nevada. This was at felony level. Disposition showed

1 that she received a minimum of one year to a maximum of  
2 four years suspended sentence in Nevada State Prison.  
3 She also received three years probation. She did  
4 disclose the arrest and did provide court documentation.  
5 The applicant previously held a work card, which expired  
6 in 2007. She was told to wait 12 years to reapply. The  
7 applicant disclosed the arrest and was not made  
8 provisional. This was confirmed with the fingerprint  
9 report and court documentation.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ma'am, please  
11 give us, tell us what happened.

12 MS. CHISENA: Well, first of all, I don't know  
13 how. It wasn't methamphetamine. It was pain pills.  
14 But what happened was my daughter and I were homeless.  
15 I wouldn't say a friend, somebody I know offered me  
16 money for my prescription pain medications. And that's  
17 how it all started. And I'm not here to, you know, deny  
18 that what I did was wrong. I know what I did was wrong.  
19 I paid the price. I lost my court 12 years ago.

20 You know, I've worked very little in the last  
21 12 years. And now I'm in my 60s. And next year, I'm  
22 going to collect Social Security. But it just isn't  
23 enough for me to live on. And at my age, now that I'm  
24 61, I just fear that I'm not going to ever get another  
25 job without this security card. And my background, of

1 course, is military, federal law enforcement,  
2 corrections and security. So I'm just appealing to your  
3 good nature and that you could help me out here and give  
4 me back my card so I can go to work.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What branch of  
6 the military were you in?

7 MS. CHISENA: The Air Force.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then where  
9 were you federal law enforcement?

10 MS. CHISENA: Lompoc federal prison, United  
11 States penitentiary. Well, actually, I was at the camp.  
12 But, you know, it was the penitentiary and the camp  
13 together. Yes.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And you  
15 didn't retire from the federal government?

16 MS. CHISENA: No, I didn't.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What happened with your  
18 employment with the federal prison?

19 MS. CHISENA: With the federal prison, I moved.  
20 My husband and I moved. He had to relocate. I went to  
21 Orange County. And down there, I worked security, and I  
22 did, I did some other, other things that weren't really  
23 my forte. And then I moved to Las Vegas from Orange  
24 County. And I got my security card right away when I  
25 moved here. And I probably worked at 10, 11, 12



1 different security companies since I've lived in Vegas.  
2 But, like I said, in 2008, I screwed up, and I lost it.  
3 And I have paid the price for it.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Thank  
5 you.

6 Any other questions from the Board?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: To the applicant. This  
8 is Gronauer to the applicant. What kind of work have  
9 you been doing recently?

10 MS. CHISENA: Well, my best friend owns a  
11 medical billing company. So she taught me medical  
12 billing back in 2008. And whenever she has a contract,  
13 I help her out with that. And I also live with her.  
14 She actually was my lifesaver. But now she's retiring  
15 because she's 65. And so I'm going to have to try to  
16 find some other kind of work.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. I  
18 appreciate it.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
20 questions?

21 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a  
22 motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member  
24 Brown. I move to grant the appeal.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.

1 Do I have a second?

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a  
4 motion. I have a second. Any other discussion?

5 Hearing none, all in favor, state "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
8 Congratulations, ma'am. You have a good day.

9 MS. CHISENA: Thank you so much.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ronnie Saunders, number  
11 93, are you here?

12 MR. SAUNDERS: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You're aware  
14 you're under oath?

15 MR. SAUNDERS: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
17 please continue.

18 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2006,  
19 out of Tennessee, Mr. Saunders was charged with theft of  
20 property \$500 to \$1,000. This was at the felony level.  
21 Disposition shows guilty as charged with one year  
22 suspended sentence. This was disclosed.

23 2008, out of Tennessee, charged with no  
24 driver's license at misdemeanor level, convicted,  
25 suspended sentence. This was disclosed.

1           2008, also in Tennessee, criminal impersonation  
2 at misdemeanor level, convicted, suspended sentence,  
3 with a \$500 fine. This was disclosed.

4           2016, in Nevada, possession of a drug not for  
5 interstate commerce at misdemeanor level. He pled  
6 guilty and disclosed the arrest on his application.

7           The applicant appeared before the Board on  
8 March 7th of 2018 where the denial was upheld. He was  
9 invited to reapply in one year, which he is now doing.  
10 The applicant was not made provisional. All arrests  
11 were disclosed and confirmed with the fingerprint  
12 report. He was denied in February of this year.

13           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

14           Mr. Saunders, tell us about your most recent  
15 arrest first.

16           MR. SAUNDERS: Hello?

17           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. Mr. Saunders.

18           MR. SAUNDERS: Hello?

19           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Can you hear me?

20 Mr. Saunders, are you here?

21           MR. SAUNDERS: Yes. Yes. The phone was  
22 breaking up. Yes, I'm here.

23           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Tell us about  
24 your most recent arrest.

25           MR. SAUNDERS: I was walking on Las Vegas

1 Strip, and for the first time coming down here, I was  
2 under the influence of marijuana. They locked me up,  
3 and they took me to the back and roughed me all up,  
4 because they thought I was somebody that I wasn't. And  
5 I had to break it down. They kept on thinking that I  
6 was somebody that I wasn't until they proved that I  
7 wasn't. And instead of locking me up on their charge,  
8 they said, well, the marijuana. So they charged me with  
9 that, and I was locked up for that. I did like an hour  
10 or two in jail. Then they let me back out. I had to go  
11 to court and fight it with a lawyer, under the influence  
12 of marijuana.

13           And back in the day, my other past was I was  
14 buying gift cards, Walmart gift cards, back in the day,  
15 in Memphis, Tennessee. I was a -- I'm a single, single  
16 father, you know, I have no father. It's just me and my  
17 mom. I was just doing adolescent things. I just, I had  
18 a bad past. But as you see now, I have never done no  
19 jail time. All the little charges I was charged with,  
20 they were just trying to feed my family.

21           I'm doing better now. I'm down here with my  
22 mom in Las Vegas. I appealed. I came out here the  
23 first time I got denied. Right now, I'm working, was  
24 working at the Dollar Tree, and now so working two jobs  
25 that I've been holding down, to feed my family, getting

1 hours.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

3 MR. SAUNDERS: And I'm just trying to make my  
4 way.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

6 MR. SAUNDERS: I've never had, I didn't get a  
7 chance to get an open door. And I was 17 and was just  
8 surviving from there. My mom -- and the only reason I  
9 got that, because I didn't have any money. So I could  
10 have paid, but I didn't have any money. So they gave me  
11 probation for 11 months. And I finished it all out,  
12 graduated good, and nothing after that.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.  
14 Any other questions from the Board?

15 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a  
16 motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Ray, I had one more  
18 question. I'm sorry.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: To the applicant. So  
21 you were denied your card almost two years ago, and you  
22 were asked to wait a year, and it's been almost two  
23 years, and you finally reapplied. Is that correct?

24 MR. SAUNDERS: Yes, sir. Because I had a job  
25 at the Dollar Tree, and I thought --

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: We're good. We're  
2 good. That's good. No problem. Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
4 questions?

5 Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's Gronauer.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion.  
9 And I want Mr. Saunders to know that it's not about  
10 handouts. It's a hand up. And that's what he's asking  
11 for. And, I think, that's pretty cool. I'll make a  
12 motion to grant the appeal for Mr. Ronnie Saunders Jr.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
14 Do I have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a second  
17 from Nixon. And any other discussion?

18 The only thing I'll add is he was denied a  
19 couple years ago, time and distance. And not only we  
20 asked him to stay clean for a year, he stayed clean for  
21 another two years. So I've got no issue with this.

22 I'll call for a vote. All those in favor?

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion  
25 passes. Congratulations, Mr. Saunders. Good luck to

1 you.

2 MR. SAUNDERS: Thank you.

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Good luck, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 94,  
5 Mr. Sperling, are you here?

6 MR. SPERLING: Yes, I am.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You're aware  
8 you're under oath?

9 MR. SPERLING: Yes.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
11 please continue.

12 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 1985,  
13 Mr. Sperling was arrested in Hawaii with the charge of  
14 dangerous drugs. This was at the felony level.  
15 Disposition showed it was a Class A felony, 20 years  
16 prison, and also Class B felony, 10 years prison, to run  
17 concurrently. He did disclose this and provided court  
18 documentation. The disposition is from the fingerprint  
19 report and court docs. The applicant disclosed a  
20 disposition of 13 months in a minimum security prison  
21 and work furlough. This arrest conviction was  
22 disclosed, and he was not made provisional. This was  
23 confirmed with the fingerprint report and court records.  
24 And he was denied in February of this year.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

1           Sir, I know it's been 35 years ago, but you  
2 were handed a pretty heavy sentence. So tell us what  
3 happened and why.

4           MR. SPERLING: I came over on a three-day golf  
5 trip with some buddies. And we were, basically, a  
6 little bit coked out of our mind. And so I went into a  
7 house, not knowing. I was supposed to pick somebody up.  
8 They said, "Can you pick me up at this address?" I went  
9 in the house not knowing that the occupant of the house,  
10 I guess, he'd been selling to undercover cops for  
11 numerous times. And they were in the process of raiding  
12 the place while I was in it. And I got caught with, I  
13 think it was 10 grams. That's why they gave me an open  
14 20. Anything over a gram, I think, gets serious stuff.

15           And so, but then, when they did all the  
16 research, after the trial and all that stuff, I went to  
17 a minimum security place. And I spent a lot of the time  
18 either in work furlough or in a halfway house. And I've  
19 been clean 34 years and six months and -- or almost. I  
20 think, I'm two days away from my anniversary, six-month  
21 anniversary.

22           I've had my own business here for 20 years.  
23 It's a sign company. I'm here in Hawaii right now. I'm  
24 supposed to be in Vegas April 22nd, because I was going  
25 to come back and live here part-time. And I wanted to



1 get a job working at the T-Mobile Arena and support the  
2 Golden Nuggets. And then I talked to some people at  
3 some job fairs when I there, and the guy says, "Well,  
4 you got to get this card." And so I told him about my  
5 past. He says, "Well, they're going to shoot you down.  
6 So just file an appeal." So I did.

7 And I, you know, I hope to get back there. I  
8 just don't know. I'm kind of waiting for the vaccine  
9 like everybody else. And because we got a nice condo.  
10 It's all been remodeled. It's sitting there waiting for  
11 us. And my wife and I kind of wanted to do our  
12 semi-retired years out of Vegas, you know. And I wanted  
13 to work. I didn't want to sit around and do nothing.  
14 That can only go on for a certain number days a week.  
15 So I thought, you know, get a job as a security guard  
16 would be great, either go to concerts and, you know,  
17 hockey games and all that stuff, and work out of there.

18 So that's why I applied for everything. But  
19 nothing with drugs. I've got my own business, pay  
20 taxes. And everything's been fine since then.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware  
22 T-Mobile is not open, and they probably won't open till  
23 next January?

24 MR. SPERLING: That's why I'm sitting in  
25 Waikiki right now. And people keep calling. I have a

1 bunch of musician friends there. I spent two months  
2 there when I came to apply. And I'm a musician, also.  
3 The music scene there is far superior than anything on  
4 the planet. And so I told my wife, "I know where I'll  
5 be five nights a week." Because the music thing is  
6 great. And we wanted to base out of there. I've got  
7 grandkids about three and a half hours away. So I  
8 thought that's close enough. And we bought the condo at  
9 the right time.

10 So I kind of wanted to retire there when I'm  
11 not in Hawaii. And so, but I wanted to work. I don't  
12 want to sit around and do nothing. So that why. I  
13 tried to get a job as a security guard, and that's when  
14 the guy told me all the channels to go through.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Well, I  
16 appreciate you going through all the channels and the  
17 hurdles. And we're aware it's been 35 years. And thank  
18 you for staying clean.

19 MR. SPERLING: Yes.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm jealous.  
21 I'd rather be sitting on a beach in Hawaii right now,  
22 trust me.

23 MR. SPERLING: The only thing open right now,  
24 you have to be in the water, though. That's the only  
25 thing open here.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

2 MR. SPERLING: Yeah.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from  
4 the Board?

5 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a  
6 motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move  
8 that we grant the appeal.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I've got a  
10 motion. Do I have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion and  
13 second. Any further discussion?

14 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.  
15 All those in favor, state "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. The  
18 motion passes. Congratulations, sir.

19 MR. SPERLING: Mahalo. And aloha. We'll see  
20 you next year, I hope.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Go Knights, go.

22 MR. SPERLING: That's right. The game's on in  
23 two hours. All right. Take care. Bye-bye.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I lost count  
25 thinking about the beach in Hawaii. What number are we

1 up to?

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: 95.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 95,  
4 Dava Wallace. Are you here, sir? Mr. Wallace, number  
5 95, are you here?

6 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. Ms. Wallace has  
7 decided to, since her card denied, she did not want to  
8 go before the Board.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Call  
10 for a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And?

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion to  
14 deny the -- I mean, yeah, deny the appeal.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's all right. We're  
16 all punchy. All right. I have a motion. Do I have a  
17 second?

18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
20 discussion?

21 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
22 in favor of denying the appeal, state "aye."

23 (Board members said "aye.")

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion  
25 carries. Appeal denied.

1           Number 96, Toney Milner, are you here? Number  
2 nine six, Toney Milner?

3           All right. Any information from the staff?

4           MR. INGRAM: I'll check the front office.

5           MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. He was notified  
6 by phone, email, and he confirmed that he was going to  
7 be in attendance. I haven't heard anything regarding  
8 him yet.

9           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I'll  
10 call him one more time. If he's not here, we'll trail  
11 it. Mr. Milner, Toney, are you here?

12           All right. We'll trail this one.

13           Number 97, David Martin-Trussell, are you here,  
14 sir?

15           MR. MARTIN-TRUSSELL: Yes, I'm here.

16           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.

17 Mr. Trussell, are you aware you're under oath?

18           MR. MARTIN-TRUSSELL: Yes, sir.

19           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Investigator, please  
20 proceed.

21           MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
22 applicant was denied for a 2001 criminal threat at a  
23 felony level, out of Kansas, where he received 12 months  
24 of probation, eight months in jail. This was disclosed  
25 on the application.

1           Also in 2001, out of Kansas, a criminal  
2 trespass, which was a misdemeanor, where he received a  
3 \$50 fine. Again, this was disclosed.

4           There was a misdemeanor battery, 2001, out of  
5 Kansas, five-day jail time and a \$100 fine.

6           Misdemeanor theft, 2001, again out of Kansas,  
7 convicted, five more days in jail. This was also  
8 disclosed.

9           Purchase, possess or consume alcohol by a  
10 minor, out of Kansas in 2002, convicted, \$200 fine. The  
11 applicant did disclose the arrest.

12           And the applicant wishes to appeal to the  
13 Board.

14           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So  
15 confirming, his last arrest was 2002?

16           MR. SALADINO: Correct, 2002, for minor in  
17 possession of alcohol.

18           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
19 Mr. Trussell, tell us about these arrests in your  
20 misguided youth.

21           MR. MARTIN-TRUSSELL: The one on the  
22 misdemeanor theft, that was I lived in a duplex, and my  
23 brother-in-law lived in the front one. And he just kept  
24 turning the cable on. He'd climb the pole and turn the  
25 cable on. And then they'd turn the cable off. And a

1 month later, he'd climb the pole and turn the cable on  
2 again. Finally, since there was two duplexes there,  
3 they came over wanting to know who did it. I like my  
4 brother-in-law. He's the one who hooked it up. He had  
5 no shame. And he told them he did it. But because  
6 there were two duplexes, and they were both turned on,  
7 we were both charged with theft of services.

8           And on the alcohol purchased by a minor, I was  
9 18, 19 years old, and I was at a party. And the police  
10 came over, and they broke up the party and asked for ID.  
11 And I was underage. And I was charged with a minor in  
12 possession of alcohol.

13           The 20, 22 years ago, on my criminal threat, I  
14 kept having -- a lady kept calling me and calling me and  
15 calling me and hanging up. This was like 1:00, 1:30,  
16 2:00 o'clock in the morning. And I'll be honest with  
17 you, I called her back and I told her, "Hey, quit  
18 calling me. Quit calling me." She kept calling me. I  
19 called back and I told her, "Hey, if you don't quit  
20 calling me, I'm going to burn down your house." She  
21 recorded that. Two days later, the police were at my  
22 door with a felony warrant for criminal threat for  
23 telling her I was going to burn down her house.

24           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What have you  
25 been doing? Do you live in Las Vegas now?

1 MR. MARTIN-TRUSSELL: I'm actually in Kingman,  
2 Arizona. I moved out to Las Vegas, because my parents  
3 live in Bullhead City, Arizona, and they're getting  
4 older. And I've been a repo agent in Colorado for about  
5 the last 15 years. And I moved out here because I had a  
6 guy that moved out here from Colorado that promised me a  
7 job. Well, I wasn't aware of the PILB card out here.  
8 So I've been held up right now. And right now, I'm just  
9 doing these trip service jobs. And they're making it  
10 right now, but.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

12 All right. Any other questions from the Board?

13 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a  
14 motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to  
16 grant the appeal.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
18 Do I have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll  
20 second it.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a  
22 motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?

23 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All  
24 those in favor, state "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The motion  
2 carries. Congratulations, sir. You have a good day.

3 MR. MARTIN-TRUSSELL: Thank you so much.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Please put  
5 your phones on mute unless you are the applicant.  
6 Obviously, it sounds like somebody's cleaning your  
7 kitchen in the background.

8 All right. Number 98, Rickey Bolen, are you  
9 here, sir?

10 MR. BOLEN: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize  
12 you're under oath?

13 MR. BOLEN: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Turn it over  
15 to staff, the investigator.

16 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The applicant  
17 was denied because of the carrying a loaded firearm  
18 charge from November of 2004. Originally when the  
19 applicant was arrested, it was a felony. During the  
20 prenegotiations, it was reduced to a misdemeanor, which  
21 was also later dismissed under 1203.4. This was  
22 confirmed by the fingerprint report and was the only  
23 criminal arrest on there.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

25 Mr. Bolen, because it's a firearms charge, we

1 have to take a good look at this. Can you tell us what  
2 happened?

3 MR. BOLEN: Yes, sir. Basically, I was in the  
4 wrong place at the wrong time. There was a party going  
5 on in the back of the apartment complex where my  
6 girlfriend at the time was living there, back in 2004,  
7 which just so happened to be a well-known thing, area in  
8 Los Angeles. And the party was full of gang members,  
9 who I really wasn't familiar with, because she hadn't  
10 really been staying there for a maybe a couple of  
11 months.

12 And as I was in the house, I heard some  
13 commotion going on out of my kitchen window. So me kind  
14 of being -- I did grab my firearm, being noseey. As I  
15 was walking out, going towards the back, I guess, during  
16 the commotion, I guess, the neighbors or someone called  
17 the police officers. And they were also coming in. As  
18 I was walking to the back, one stopped me. And he  
19 searched me, found the firearm. I was arrested.

20 It was my first time, without any prior  
21 felonies or anything like that. So they gave me a plea  
22 deal. And I did my three-year probation. I paid my  
23 restitution. And my conviction was dropped to a  
24 misdemeanor, and it was eventually expunged.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

1 MR. BOLEN: And now, as of right now, I'm  
2 working for the U.S. Census, the enumerators.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.  
4 All right. You answered all my questions.

5 Any other questions from the Board?

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hearing none, I'll  
7 entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a  
9 motion to grant the appeal -- it's time and distance,  
10 everything's good -- for Mr. Rickey Bolen.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
12 Do I have a second?

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Brown seconds.  
16 Any further discussion?

17 Hearing none, I'll take a vote. All those in  
18 favor, state "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
21 Congratulations, Mr. Bolen. You have a good day.

22 MR. BOLEN: Thank you. You, too.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Damion Herd, are  
24 you here, number 99?

25 MR. HERD: Yes, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Herd, are you  
2 aware you're under oath?

3 MR. HERD: Yes, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
5 please continue.

6 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones again. The  
7 applicant was denied for an arrest in January of 1997  
8 for attempted voluntary manslaughter, which was a  
9 felony. The fingerprint report does not show the  
10 severity. However, after speaking with the applicant  
11 and looking at the time served on the fingerprint  
12 report, it was determined that he did serve 15 years and  
13 six months in prison. This was disclosed.

14 There was also another arrest in September of  
15 2019 for obstructing and resisting an officer. The  
16 fingerprint report does not show the severity or the  
17 disposition. The arrest occurred after the application  
18 was completed, and it was not disclosed, but. And the  
19 applicant was never made provisional.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Herd, tell us  
21 what happened.

22 MR. HERD: In 1997, I was convicted of  
23 attempted voluntary manslaughter. I was arrested for a  
24 young man being shot not too far from my house.  
25 Basically, there's a wall separating my house from the

1 business area. The young man got shot over there. It  
2 was stated that there was people in front of my house,  
3 which is only two people in front of my house at that  
4 time. I was not one of them. The police arrested me.

5 I fought my case. I got a mistrial while  
6 fighting my case because of the identification process  
7 that was done. The D.A. decided to refile after I  
8 appeared back in court for the -- whether they was going  
9 to -- well, when I went back to court after the mistrial  
10 for the consideration of whether it was going to be  
11 dismissed or if the D.A. was going to refile on me, I  
12 came back to court with a scar on my lip. And in my  
13 case, the victim said that he hit me in my mouth. I had  
14 a mouth full of braces. When I first started my case,  
15 there was no scars on my mouth.

16 Right after my appeal, I mean right after my  
17 original mistrial, I go back to the county jail, and a  
18 riot erupted the morning I woke up. And it had nothing  
19 to do with me. But because it was a racial thing, of  
20 course, I got hit in the mouth. Full of stitches. Go  
21 back to court. The D.A. sees this, refiles.

22 And when I go through my second trial, I'm  
23 begging my attorney to get the medical records. He  
24 never did. I got found guilty because of the scar on my  
25 mouth. And the jury was told that's what they said.

1 And in my appeal, trying to appeal with my appeal  
2 attorney to file a misidentification, he did not. He  
3 filed on a jury instruction. And when I got my results  
4 back, they said I never filed anything on  
5 misidentification or anything like that.

6 I served my time. I came home. I got hired as  
7 an accountant, ran into a supervisor who personally told  
8 me he doesn't like black people and fired me.

9 After that, I started my own company, Four Star  
10 Mobile Detail, and I have a full detail service. I've  
11 been all over Los Angeles, Orange County, San Bernardino  
12 detailing cars. I even have a deal, I even do certain  
13 sheriff's cars certain times. I'm just moving around.

14 The arrest in September, I can honestly tell  
15 you, I don't know what happened.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I know what happened,  
17 you got arrested.

18 MR. HERD: Well, no, I can explain what  
19 happened, to my knowledge is. And what happened that  
20 day is I went to a friend's house. And we were  
21 chilling. I had a couple of drinks. And at some point  
22 in time of me putting my daughter's sweater in the  
23 closet, when I went and picked it up off the ground and  
24 asked him, "Can I put it in the close?" I don't remember  
25 the night. I woke up the next day and I was

1 incarcerated. And I had a concussion. All is anybody  
2 could tell me is I tripped, fell, hit the ground. The  
3 police came. When they was looking at it, when I woke  
4 up, I was hysterical. And that's all I know of that  
5 arrest. And I'm still dealing with that process right  
6 now.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you on  
8 probation?

9 MR. HERD: No.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And how long  
11 have you been out of prison?

12 MR. HERD: I've been out of prison since 2011.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

14 MR. HERD: I'm a single father, been raising my  
15 own kids for -- since their mother's ran out of our  
16 lives. And I'm just trying. You know, I've been doing  
17 guard card for CSC. I actually got guard carded for CSC  
18 in October or November. And I've been working for them.  
19 Well, until Covid shut us down, I've been working for  
20 them. But since then, the only thing I've really been  
21 doing is my detailing to keep me and my family above  
22 float.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. But your guard  
24 card's in California?

25 MR. HERD: Yes.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

2 Any other questions from the Board?

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I have a  
4 question.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: For the applicant, you  
7 said that you're still going through some of the  
8 business. Are you in court for the 2019 arrest, what's  
9 going on?

10 MR. HERD: Yes. I'm supposed to be going back  
11 on the 23rd to have the consideration of either it being  
12 dropped or they're going to take it to the next level  
13 because of they -- with the medical records, it was  
14 deduced that I had a concussion that night, and I never  
15 went through any medical procedures that night with a  
16 head trauma.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And why didn't you  
18 disclose this?

19 MR. HERD: I didn't, well, I had the head  
20 trauma. The head trauma was visible. But when I went  
21 to -- when I went to court, that was, even with the  
22 bandage on the head, there was no mention of it. And  
23 then, when I bailed out, I went to the doctor's because  
24 I was having extreme headaches, and they said I had a  
25 concussion. So the next court date that we had, I



1 couldn't get up there. And it was supposed to be  
2 postponed until this or that. They had to consider it.  
3 And then we went on Covid lockdown, and my next court  
4 date is the 23rd of October.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. So my  
6 next question is why didn't you disclose this on your  
7 application?

8 MR. HERD: The application was done before that  
9 even happened.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

11 MR. HERD: Because when, I believe, when CSC  
12 directed the applications for a guard card, I'm not sure  
13 when it exactly happened, and I thought that everything  
14 that was going on at the moment, as soon as I new, was  
15 on there.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. Brown,  
17 are you satisfied?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm a little confused, but  
19 I'll go with it.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: He had already submitted  
21 his application, and he was arrested subsequently.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If I can, Chairman.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And maybe Jordan Jones  
25 can explain it, because it says date applied is

1 April 17th, 2020. The arrest was September 29th, 2019.

2 MR. JONES: That is what I am showing as well.  
3 And I will look at the hard copies of everything right  
4 now.

5 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. I think, I can  
6 speak on this. With that, with what had happened, CSC  
7 had turned in applications at the end of last year and a  
8 test for an event, but never paid. So they held onto  
9 the applications. When they needed bodies, which they  
10 were going to use these people for at the EDC Festival  
11 that was supposed to be this past year, that's when they  
12 turned in the applications and paid.

13 So when he's talking about turning in an  
14 application, he had turned in an application with his  
15 company, who had not turned it in to us yet because he  
16 was still in California at the time. So he filled out  
17 an application physically the end of last year, but it  
18 did not get turned in or paid to the PILB until the  
19 beginning of this year, 2020.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's clears it up.  
21 That shows the whole picture. I think, that might have  
22 been the tipping point for myself and Mr. Brown.

23 MS. IRIZARRY: You're welcome.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.

25 MS. IRIZARRY: You're welcome.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, Chief.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then, for the  
3 investigator, I just want to confirm. We have an  
4 outstanding case that's still being adjudicated in the  
5 Clark County court system?

6 MR. JONES: Correct.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. Any  
8 other questions from the Board?

9 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a  
11 motion to deny the appeal for Mr. Damion Herd.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
13 Do I have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any  
17 further discussion?

18 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
19 in favor of the motion to deny the appeal, state "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
22 Mr. Herd, we have never granted an appeal nor have we  
23 ever granted a work card when someone has an outstanding  
24 court case. And if you get that cleared up and taken  
25 care of, please reapply.

1 MR. HERD: Okay. No, I truly understand you.  
2 Trust me.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. You  
4 have a good day. Thank you.

5 MR. HERD: You, too, as well.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 100.  
7 I'm going try the pronunciation. My apologies ahead of  
8 time. Sha'taney Moret?

9 MS. MORET: Sha'taney Moret.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sha'taney Moret. Okay.  
11 Thank you, ma'am. Obviously, you're here. Do you  
12 understand you're under oath?

13 MS. MORET: Yes.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the  
15 investigator, please continue.

16 MR. JONES: Investigators Jones again. The  
17 applicant was denied for a burglary, which was a felony  
18 out of California, in July of 2007. This was disclosed.  
19 The fingerprint report showed that she spent 270 days in  
20 jail and three years of probation. The charge was later  
21 dismissed under 1203.4.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Moret, tell  
23 us about the burglary.

24 MS. MORET: At this time, I lived in Riverside,  
25 and all my family lived in L.A. So on the weekends, I

1 would go to L.A. to visit my family. So one early  
2 Saturday morning I went down to L.A. I seen one of my  
3 friends. He was like, "Can you give me a ride?" I'm  
4 like, "Sure, no problem," gave him a ride down the  
5 street. He's like, "Hold on real quick." I waited,  
6 didn't think nothing of it. The next thing I know,  
7 police was coming out. He'd broken in somebody's house.  
8 Went to jail. The witness even said I had nothing to do  
9 with it. I never got out of the car, didn't touch  
10 anything. I was just sitting in the car, honestly,  
11 giving him a ride. He got away. I did serve the time.

12           And ever since then -- I've never got in  
13 trouble before that, never had a parking ticket or  
14 anything. So it was just like an at the wrong place at  
15 the wrong time.

16           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Have you had any  
17 other arrests since 2007?

18           MS. MORET: I went, I've been in Vegas since  
19 2016. And it got dismissed. But me and my boyfriend  
20 had like a -- I don't want to say domestic violence, but  
21 disturbing the peace. Like they took to us to jail for  
22 a day, and then that was it.

23           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I appreciate your  
24 honesty.

25           For the investigator, were you aware of that

1 one?

2 MR. JONES: Can you repeat that one more time,  
3 please?

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Were you aware of that  
5 arrest that she's talking about?

6 MR. JONES: No. The only one I show is the  
7 burglary.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. And,  
9 Ms. Moret, what have you been doing for employment?

10 MS. MORET: Since then, before I went to jail,  
11 I was a CNA. So when I came home, I had to fight, like  
12 go before the board, like how I'm doing now, to get my  
13 nursing license back. So since then, I'm still working  
14 as a CNA. It's going on almost like 15 years as a CNA.  
15 So I'd just like to switch it off. When I was in  
16 California, I got my guard card. I actually went  
17 through the same process as I'm going through right now  
18 to get approved for it. And I got approved. And I also  
19 did the three-year probation in California for my guard  
20 card. I did that with no problems. And I've just been  
21 in Vegas now.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: How long have you been  
23 living in Las Vegas?

24 MS. MORET: Four years now.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any

1 other questions from the Board?

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: For the applicant, this  
3 is Gronauer. How long ago was your, what you call it,  
4 it wasn't a domestic violence, but you both went to  
5 jail, how long ago was that?

6 MS. MORET: 2018.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So that was here  
8 in Nevada, then?

9 MS. MORET: Correct.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you and that same  
11 person still together?

12 MS. MORET: Oh, no. Toxic. No. I have an  
13 11-year-old. So when I came back, I'm willing to let  
14 it go. I don't want my son to think it's okay to put  
15 your hand on a woman. So I don't mind dismissing a man.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Very good. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I'm just -- for  
18 the investigator, did we also do a SCOPE on her, or is  
19 it just fingerprint return?

20 MR. JONES: Yes, I just ran the SCOPE again,  
21 and I see the domestic battery here which was denied.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

23 MS. MORET: The reason why I didn't put it  
24 there is because when I applied for my nursing license  
25 and jobs, they tell me that it's not there. So I didn't

1 assume if I should put it down or not.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Well, you  
3 know now it is there.

4 MS. MORET: Yes.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: There's a record of it.

6 MS. MORET: Thanks for letting me know.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Yeah. And I  
8 appreciate you bringing it up to us. Okay. Because  
9 that's disclosure.

10 MS. MORET: M-hm (affirmative).

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So sooner or later, we  
12 would have figured it out.

13 MS. MORET: Of course. Of course. I'd rather  
14 than honest now than later. Like I said, I have an  
15 11-year-old to raise. And I'm only looking out for the  
16 best for us. I'm a CNA now, but I do like to switch up  
17 my trade sometimes and do something different.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I appreciate that.  
19 CNA is a hard job.

20 MS. MORET: Especially right now.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
22 questions from the Board?

23 I will entertain a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Can I ask a real quick  
25 question of the investigator? Everything for the



1 domestic violence has been closed, and there's no  
2 outstanding issues on that?

3 MR. JONES: That is correct.

4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. All right. Thank  
5 you.

6 Chairman, I move that we approve, I'm sorry, we  
7 grant the appeal of Ms. Sha'taney Moret.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
9 Do I have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Commissioner  
12 Brown seconds. Any further discussion?

13 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
14 in favor, state "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
17 Congratulations, ma'am. You have a good day.

18 MS. MORET: You, too. Bye-bye.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 101,  
20 Shauneese Webb, are you here? Shauneese Webb, number  
21 101, are you here?

22 For staff, can you advise?

23 MS. IRIZARRY: We did speak to -- this is Chief  
24 Irizarry. We spoke to her on the phone where she  
25 confirmed verbally, as well as confirmed in an email

1 that she was aware of the time of her appeal.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to  
3 trail this one.

4 Number 102, Janae Anderson?

5 MS. ANDERSON: Here.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Anderson, are  
7 you aware you're under oath?

8 MS. ANDERSON: Here. Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
10 please proceed.

11 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The applicant  
12 was denied for several arrests, the first one being in  
13 July of 1998, possession of cocaine, which was a felony.  
14 The applicant did disclose this. The applicant served  
15 three years probation. She stated that it was detention  
16 only. The fingerprint report shows that it was a  
17 suspended sentence.

18 The applicant was again arrested in 2005 for  
19 fraud by person unauthorized to provide goods, which was  
20 again a felony. The applicant did disclose this. She  
21 failed to disclose the disposition as one year  
22 probation. The fingerprint report confirms that this  
23 was also a suspended sentence.

24 The applicant continued to list several  
25 misdemeanors, including several which were not found on

1 the fingerprint report.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And can you give  
3 me the category of misdemeanors?

4 MR. JONES: Sure. At the beginning of the year  
5 2000, out of California, there was vandalism, which was  
6 not found on the fingerprint report, but was stated that  
7 it was dismissed.

8 In 2001, out of California again, inflicting  
9 corporal injury on a spouse or cohabitant, which was a  
10 misdemeanor, stated that she was only detained. The  
11 applicant was forthcoming and disclosed this, but it was  
12 not found on the fingerprint report.

13 In 2005, we have trespassing out of Nevada.  
14 This was found on the fingerprint report but does not  
15 show a disposition.

16 In 2007, out of California, we have fugitive  
17 from justice, which was self-disclosed but not found on  
18 the fingerprint report.

19 In 2008, we have vehicle without owner's  
20 consent, out of California, which, again, she  
21 self-disclosed, but it was not found on the fingerprint  
22 report.

23 And, finally, in 2013, in California,  
24 inflicting corporal injury on a spouse or cohabitant,  
25 which was self-disclosed but not found on the

1 fingerprint report.

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what was she a  
3 fugitive for in '07?

4 MR. JONES: She did not state, only says that  
5 she did one year county time. But, again, it was not  
6 found on the fingerprint report.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

8 MS. ANDERSON: And I have --

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ms. Anderson, tell us  
10 about these arrests. And there's a bunch of them.

11 MS. ANDERSON: Two thousand -- 1998, I was 18  
12 years old. My boyfriend sold drugs. I was in Reno with  
13 him, me and my cousin. And he was walking up to the  
14 Greyhound to leave Reno. I was holding his sweater or  
15 his hoodie. At the moment, I believe, he was opening a  
16 pack of cigarettes or a soda or something. As we were  
17 walking to the Greyhound, someone in a cab asked him if  
18 he was holding or if he had something. He reached for  
19 his sweater from me. So, apparently, at that moment I  
20 realized I was holding his drugs. Me and my cousin  
21 continued to walk ahead of him while he was attending to  
22 whatever he was doing in the cab. Before we could even  
23 make it a block away, some officers were coming out of  
24 an alley, and they grabbed me and my cousin, detained  
25 us. They let her go. She was a minor. I was 18, so I

1 went to jail.

2           They had about five or six felony charges on  
3 me. I was looking at, I believe it was three to five  
4 years in prison. They dropped everything if I would  
5 have pled guilty to the conspiracy to sell the  
6 controlled substance. My parents didn't have the money  
7 to continue to fight. I just went ahead and agreed to  
8 it and got the three years probation.

9           In 2000 and 2001, I was with my son's father.  
10 It was kind of a toxic relationship. The vandalism,  
11 that was me kicking in the door. He wouldn't open the  
12 door for me. I was pregnant at time with our son. So  
13 when the police came, it was footprints in the door.  
14 So, I guess, that was the vandalism on that part.

15           The 2001, the inflict of injury of the spouse,  
16 or whatever that was, that was again me and my son's  
17 father. I'm not too sure of the injury, 'cause he never  
18 went to the hospital, he never received any stitches.  
19 So I don't, I don't know what the injury was.

20           2005, the trespassing, that was at one of the  
21 casinos in Las Vegas, just drunk, and we got escorted  
22 out of the club or out of the casino.

23           The one in 2007, the fugitive, that was from  
24 2005 from the fraud case. I went out of town without  
25 reporting that. And I was being supervised by

1 California. The fraud happened in Tahoe, Nevada side of  
2 Tahoe. I then moved to California. California, again,  
3 they were supervising me for Nevada. So when I was in  
4 California, I went back to Nevada without reporting to  
5 California. So when I came back to California and  
6 reported with my P.O., they gave me a year violation  
7 time because I did go out-of-state without reporting  
8 that.

9 In 2008, the stolen vehicle, I was with my best  
10 friend driving. I was the passenger. She was driving a  
11 stolen vehicle from her boyfriend. I don't think it was  
12 stolen. Something happened with the paperwork. I  
13 think, that all got resolved. But I was never charged  
14 with anything.

15 And 2013, another, another domestic  
16 relationship with my ex, who I'm no longer with. It was  
17 a pretty much a head-on fight, and I pretty much got the  
18 best end of the fight honestly. And I went to jail, but  
19 I bonded out, and no charges were filed against me.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you  
21 doing for employment the last few years?

22 MS. ANDERSON: 2018. I just moved back to  
23 Nevada last year in September. 2018, well, 2017 and  
24 2018, I was working for Amazon. At the end of 2018, I  
25 injured my left rotator cuff. So I was off all the way

1 up until October of last year. When I moved back to  
2 Nevada, I went to Safeway where I'm a head cashier  
3 there, but off due to coronavirus. So I'm collecting  
4 unemployment from that now. Then I applied for the  
5 security position here at the ammunition Army base,  
6 which I was hired, but I have to go through all this  
7 stuff to get a license to be able to be a guard.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So you're up in  
9 Hawthorne, Nevada?

10 MS. ANDERSON: Yes, this is where I'm from, and  
11 I back home now, yes. And I have a 19-year-old son  
12 who's home with me.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And if I  
14 understand you correctly, that if you get a card, that  
15 the contract security at the Army base will hire you?

16 MS. ANDERSON: Yes. I've already been hired.  
17 I'm just going through the process of getting the card.  
18 The job is being held for me and everything.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And that's an  
20 armed guard position?

21 MS. ANDERSON: Yes, sir, it is.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any  
23 other questions from the Board?

24 All right. Seeing none, I'll entertain a  
25 motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
2 Nixon. I move that we grant the appeal for Janae  
3 Anderson.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I got a motion.  
5 Do I have a second?

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll  
7 second.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
9 I have a second. Any further discussion?

10 All right. I just want to put on the record  
11 that most of these arrests were when she was younger.  
12 And outside of the domestic violence, all these were 12  
13 years plus. And I'm sure the DOD contractor is doing a  
14 more intensive background than we are. So I don't have  
15 an issue supporting this.

16 That being said, I'll call for a vote. All  
17 those in favor, state "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.  
20 Congratulations to you, ma'am. You have a good day.

21 MS. ANDERSON: Thank you. You, too.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 103, Bruce  
23 Armour ("A-mor"), are you here?

24 MR. ARMOUR: Yes. My name is Bruce Armour  
25 ("Ar-mor"). I understand I'm under oath.



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Armour ("Ar-mor")  
2 it is. And you realize you're under oath. Okay.

3 Investigator, please continue.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, if I may?

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, you may.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: On the last one, I  
7 voted no.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I never heard that.  
9 Okay. So we have a vote of -- that the record will  
10 reflect, on number 102, Janae Anderson, that the motion  
11 passed to grant the appeal only by a vote of three to  
12 one.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.

15 Mr. Armour. I'm sorry. Investigator, please continue.

16 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The applicant  
17 applied in December of 2019, initially was denied for  
18 two felonies, the first being out of Florida in May of  
19 1982, burglary of a structure and, in addition,  
20 marijuana with intent to sell. The applicant did  
21 disclose that it was a felony. The fingerprint report  
22 does not show a disposition.

23 In July of 1982, also out of Florida, we have  
24 burglary with assault or battery, which the applicant  
25 also disclosed was a felony. And, again, the

1 fingerprint report does not show the disposition.

2 And those were the only two felonies.

3 In 1979, we have larceny of a vehicle, which  
4 the applicant disclosed. The fingerprint report does  
5 not show the severity or the disposition.

6 In August of 1981, New Mexico again, possession  
7 of stolen property. The applicant did not disclose.  
8 The fingerprint report does not show the severity or the  
9 disposition.

10 In 1980, New Mexico, the applicant had a DUI,  
11 which was not disclosed. And the fingerprint report  
12 does not show severity or disposition.

13 In 1990, we have another DUI. The applicant  
14 did not disclose. The fingerprint report does not show  
15 severity or disposition.

16 And in 2010, there was a possession of a  
17 controlled substance here in Nevada, which was a  
18 misdemeanor. And it was self-disclosed, but it was not  
19 found on the fingerprint report.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

21 Mr. Armour, please explain your arrests.

22 MR. ARMOUR: Yes, sir. Well, when I was in  
23 Florida, yes, sir, I got them felonies. I was young and  
24 stupid. I did them. They were auto burglaries. No  
25 weapons were involved. I was stealing stereos. And

1 they sentenced me to two years, but I took one year on  
2 the Sarasota road gang. So I did the one year on the  
3 road gang and did my probation after I was done with  
4 that, did my probation and paid my restitution. And I  
5 did one, after that, auto burglary after that. And no  
6 weapons were involved.

7 And, but, and I've tried to keep my life pretty  
8 clean. When I moved out here to Nevada, everything was  
9 really good. I got in Local 12. And I'm retired from  
10 Local 12. And I did most of my, most of my work at the  
11 Nevada test site. So I've been through a lot of  
12 background checks, and a lot of people asked me  
13 questions because of my past. And, but, anyway, I  
14 worked at the test site. And I've been trying to get my  
15 life back together.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you were an operating  
17 engineer at the test site, heavy equipment?

18 MR. ARMOUR: Yes, sir. I did most of my 13  
19 years out at the Nevada test site.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So why do you  
21 want to be a security officer after being an operating  
22 engineer?

23 MR. ARMOUR: I'm getting older, and I don't  
24 want to do hard hats and steel-toed boots and  
25 construction. And they gave me a temporary card. And I

1 did it, I did the convention, one convention downtown  
2 before my license got suspended and the virus took over,  
3 but. And I like it. And I'm an alert person. And I  
4 like security.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then what  
6 year were you on the road gang in Florida?

7 MR. ARMOUR: 1982, in between the first two  
8 felonies right there for the auto burglaries that I had.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. No, and the  
10 reason, I think, it was up to 1978 they still called it  
11 the chain gang.

12 MR. ARMOUR: Oh. It was the road gang, they  
13 called that road gang when I was there, so. And it was  
14 terrible.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I can only imagine. All  
16 right.

17 All right. Any other questions from the Board?

18 All right. Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.

19 Call for a motion a second time.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member  
21 Nixon. I move that we grant the appeal for Bruce  
22 Armour.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I've got a  
24 motion. Do I have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further  
2 discussion?

3 I just want to put on the record that we've got  
4 time and distance, plus the fact that the person worked  
5 at a site that requires a national security clearance.

6 Okay. Call for the vote. All those in favor,  
7 state "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
10 Congratulations, Mr. Armour. You have a good day.

11 MR. ARMOUR: Oh, thank you. Have a great  
12 evening, you guys. Thank you. Bye-bye.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Hopkins,  
14 number 104?

15 MR. HOPKINS: Yes, I'm here.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Hopkins, are  
17 you aware you're under oath?

18 MR. HOPKINS: Yes, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
20 please continue.

21 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. At the  
22 time of writing this report, we hadn't received his  
23 fingerprints. But we have received them since.

24 The applicant was denied in March of 2018,  
25 appeared before the Board at the June 14th meeting where

1 the denial was upheld. He was invited to return in one  
2 year. And he's now returning for his second appeal. He  
3 has disclosed his arrest history on the new 2020  
4 application. He has not been in trouble since his last  
5 appearance before the Board.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And then he  
7 had a whole bunch of arrests, correct?

8 MR. HOPKINS: Yes, sir.

9 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir, he did.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: This is for the  
11 investigator.

12 All right. So, like I said, there's a new  
13 member of the Board. Actually, there's a couple that  
14 weren't here back when we heard him over two years ago.  
15 So the last arrest what was year?

16 MR. MAXWELL: February 18, 2009, out of  
17 California, for a possession of narcotic controlled  
18 substance where he received two years confinement.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So '09, so 11  
20 years ago. And then give us a summary of what the  
21 arrests that he's got. I know we've got like 22 of  
22 them, but.

23 MR. MAXWELL: He's got 1971, stolen vehicle,  
24 90-day confinement. Level was unknown.

25 And 1974, unlawful driving away of a motor

1 vehicle, two years probation, at felony level.

2 1975, stolen property, confinement, three years  
3 four months to five years, at felony level.

4 '76, violation of controlled substance,  
5 confinement, 30 days, probation six months, level  
6 unknown.

7 1979, battery warrant and petty theft, 20 days  
8 confinement, three years probation, level unknown.

9 1983, petty theft, 20 days confinement, 18  
10 months probation, level unknown.

11 '85, theft of personal property, 90 days  
12 confinement, 36 months probation, level unknown.

13 '86, burglary, 20 days confinement, two years  
14 probation, level unknown.

15 '86, possess hypodermic needle syringe, 42 days  
16 confinement, 24 months probation, level unknown.

17 1987, fight, noise, offensive words. He  
18 received a fine. Level unknown.

19 '88, theft, petty theft with prior, 60-day  
20 confinement, which was a suspended sentence, three years  
21 probation, level unknown.

22 '88, petty theft with prior, probation revoked,  
23 confinement of 103 days, level unknown.

24 1989, grand theft auto, probation revoked,  
25 confinement one year four months, level unknown.

1           1990, solicit specified health and safety acts,  
2 60 days confinement with 11 days suspended, 24 months  
3 probation, level unknown.

4           1991, petty theft with prior, two years  
5 confinement, level unknown.

6           1993, first-degree burglary, two years  
7 confinement, felony level.

8           1995, second-degree burglary, four years  
9 confinement, felony level.

10           1999, felony parole violation, which was  
11 involving drugs, two years confinement, felony level.

12           2002, possess narcotic controlled substance,  
13 three years confinement, at unknown level.

14           2005, felony parole violation, again drugs,  
15 probation terminated, two years confinement, felony  
16 level.

17           2007, driving without a license, two years  
18 probation, unknown level.

19           And the last one, which is 2009, possession of  
20 a narcotic controlled substance, two years confinement,  
21 at an unknown level.

22           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.  
23 Mr. Hopkins.

24           MR. HOPKINS: Yes, sir.

25           BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What have you been doing



1 for employment since 2009?

2 MR. HOPKINS: Well, after 2009, I didn't get  
3 out of prison until two thousand -- oh, yeah, that was  
4 2009. Okay. I was working at the Labor Ready and  
5 stuff. And so I had, I moved out of California because  
6 I wasn't making enough money, and it was expensive. So  
7 the idea was, after I moved out of the California, I  
8 moved out here in like 2013 or something like that,  
9 2012. And I was working at the Hard Rock. Just then, I  
10 worked at the Hard Rock. I worked at a security  
11 company. I was working security. And my card got  
12 denied. So. But they said they'll take me back. And I  
13 had several other jobs. I worked at Amazon. And I did  
14 Uber. Ever since I've been out here, I was driving Uber  
15 ever since like 2013, '14. And since the coronavirus, I  
16 stopped. And the last job I was working at was Amazon.  
17 And that was it.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

19 MR. HOPKINS: And since then, I got my family  
20 back. I got married to my childhood sweetheart since  
21 I've been knowing since she was eight years old. And  
22 I'm just trying to live, you know, live a good life now.  
23 You know, I'm trying to provide for any grandkids and  
24 stuff, you know. And I got much older. I'm older now.  
25 And I can't do really physical, physical work, you know

1 what I mean, like construction and all that type of  
2 stuff. So I've just been holding onto like driving jobs  
3 and working in casinos.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

5 Any other questions from the Board?

6 Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.

7 All right. I'll call a second time, calling  
8 for a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: There is Board Member  
10 Brown. I'm a little hesitant, but I'm hoping that now  
11 that he's nearly 70 years, he's learned his lesson. And  
12 I will move to grant the appeal.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
14 to grant the appeal. Do I have a second?

15 Do I have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer goes second.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
18 I have a second. Any discussion?

19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'm much like Brown, that  
20 it's -- Board Member Brown. It's a little concerning to  
21 me that there's a long history there. I think, this is  
22 probably the longest I've ever heard. But due to age  
23 and time and distance, yeah, I'll go forward.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. All  
25 those in favor, say "a," "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And any of those  
3 opposed, say "nay." And I say nay.

4 So three to one. Congratulations. We grant  
5 your appeal.

6 MR. HOPKINS: Oh, thank you very much, sir.  
7 Now, what do I have to do, how will I know when I can  
8 get a card so I can start working? Because I have a  
9 company that's willing to hire me.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to let  
11 Mr. Ingram respond to you.

12 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Hopkins, we'll be reaching out  
13 to you here in the next day or so to instruct you on how  
14 to move forward. And we'll be getting your card ready  
15 for you. Okay?

16 MR. HOPKINS: All right. Thank you very much.  
17 You guys have a great day. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm going to  
19 call for a -- because we're getting close to calling it  
20 for a day. Because maybe it's just me --

21 UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Oh, man.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- but I'm starting to  
23 lose concentration. And it's not fair to the  
24 applicants.

25 UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Oh, man.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I'm sorry, sir.  
2 Next time, identify yourself.

3 MR. INGRAM: Number 96, Toney Milner.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is Toney Milner here,  
5 number 96? Calling Toney Milner a second time.

6 All right. I'll call for a motion from the  
7 Board.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No call, no show. I'll  
11 just go ahead. I'll make a motion to deny the appeal  
12 for Mr. Toney Milner.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Deny the appeal.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, deny the appeal,  
15 Mr. Toney Milner.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I  
17 have a motion. Do I have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any  
20 discussion?

21 All right. All those in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.  
24 Appeal denied.

25 Number 101, Shauneese Webb? Number 101,

1 Shauneese Webb, are you here?

2 Okay. Call for a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to  
4 uphold the original denial. Or deny the appeal. Sorry.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: It's okay. All right.  
6 I have a motion to deny the appeal. Do I have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any  
9 further discussion?

10 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those  
11 in favor of the motion to deny the appeal, state "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?

14 Okay. Motion carried.

15 All right. The reason I wanted to do those,  
16 because some of these have been going 20 minutes. And I  
17 don't plan on going beyond 4:30 today.

18 So number 105, Jim Mathews, are you here?

19 Number 105, Jim Mathews?

20 Okay. We will trail this one to tomorrow.

21 Number 106, Maurice Webb?

22 MR. WEBB: Here.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. Webb,  
24 thank you. Do you realize you're under oath?

25 MR. WEBB: Yes, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
2 please continue.

3 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. Mr. Webb  
4 was denied for the following arrests.

5 In 2006, out of the California, felony  
6 burglary, where he received a disposition of four years  
7 prison. He did disclose the arrest and provided court  
8 documentation.

9 2008, out of California, illegal possession,  
10 et cetera, of a concealed weapon, felony level, five  
11 years prison. He did disclose the arrest and provided  
12 court documentation.

13 2017, in Nevada, misdemeanor disturbing the  
14 peace, 75 days jail, which was suspended, and he  
15 received counseling. This was also disclosed.

16 The applicant disclosed all of the arrests and  
17 was not made provisional. He was denied on June 19th of  
18 this year.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. What  
20 was the date in 2017?

21 MR. MAXWELL: That was January, sorry, February  
22 the 1st, 2017.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

24 All right. Mr. Webb, tell us about these  
25 arrests.

1 MR. WEBB: My 2006 burglary, I was with the  
2 person who actually committed the burglary. But in  
3 order for me to get a lesser charge, I just had to plead  
4 out guilty, and that was in California.

5 My 2008 possession of a firearm, I was on  
6 parole. I did have a firearm on me at the time. So  
7 when they pulled me over, they asked me if I had a  
8 firearm, and I told them yeah. They took me in for a  
9 felony possession of a firearm, a legal firearm.

10 And the disturbing the peace of February 1st, I  
11 was at my uncle's house. There was a whole bunch of  
12 commotion, and I ended up getting into an argument with  
13 one of the police officers. And so he took me in for  
14 being intoxicated. But he told me, when I went to see  
15 the judge, he told me if I stayed clean for a year, it  
16 would get downplayed to disturbing the peace.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you  
18 doing for employment these days?

19 MR. WEBB: I've been working at McDonald's at  
20 the state line, Primm, Nevada since 2015.

21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.

22 MR. WEBB: In fact, I've been the manager there  
23 since 2015 as well.

24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So you want to go  
25 from being a manager at a restaurant to being a security

1 officer?

2 MR. WEBB: Yeah. I mean I worked security in  
3 California before I moved to Nevada, and I liked it.  
4 It's just hard for me to find a job due to my whole  
5 record and everything. But, I think, security would be  
6 something that I'm actually really interested in doing.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

8 All right. Any other questions from the Board?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Board Member Gronauer  
10 to the applicant.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: In 2006, for the  
13 burglary, you got a four-year prison sentence. How much  
14 time did you build on that?

15 MR. WEBB: I did two years and six months.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So you got out,  
17 and you got arrested again right after that, 2008?

18 MR. WEBB: I got arrested 19 days later.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. And then  
20 you had a five-year prison sentence on that. How much  
21 time did you build with that one?

22 MR. WEBB: I got out. I went in 2008. I got,  
23 I went up to prison in November of '08. I got out  
24 December 10th of 2010.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So total, you



1 did about four to five years total built time, right?

2 MR. WEBB: Yes, sir.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. All right. And  
4 who did you get in the argument with? You had an  
5 argument with the police in February '17?

6 MR. WEBB: The February 1st one, yes. They  
7 were trying to figure out what was going on in the  
8 alley. And I thought they were talking about what we  
9 were doing at my uncle's house. And we were having a  
10 shouting match back and forth. And he asked me, "Oh,  
11 have you been drinking?" I told him, "Yeah." And he  
12 was like, "So you're intoxicated, and you're not in the  
13 yard." So he ended up taking me in. But when I talked  
14 to the sergeant, the sergeant said, "You know, since you  
15 all was going back and forth, I'll see what I can do for  
16 you." So I went to court, and they told me just be good  
17 for a year, and I had suspended sentence for a year.  
18 And then, if I was good and did my counseling classes,  
19 that they were going to downplay it down to a disturbing  
20 the peace.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Did you complete all  
22 the counseling?

23 MR. WEBB: Yes, I did all of the counseling  
24 programs that they sent me to.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And was that down in

1 Primm where the disturbing the peace was?

2 MR. WEBB: No, it was in Las Vegas.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I wanted to see  
4 if it was a resident deputy or not. All right. Thank  
5 you.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
7 questions from the Board?

8 Okay. Hearing none, call for a motion.

9 Call for a motion a second time.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's Gronauer. I'll  
11 make a motion to deny the appeal.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I've got a motion  
13 to deny. Do I have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion  
16 and a second. Any discussion?

17 Okay. I'll call for a vote. All those in  
18 favor, state "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.  
21 Mr. Webb, I'm sorry to say we will not grant your  
22 appeal. It doesn't mean that you cannot reapply in  
23 another year. I can only speak for myself. I've got a  
24 concern that you've got an arrest as recent as three  
25 years. Normally, we do not go for that with the

1 security industry, so, in terms of what the PI Board's  
2 done before. So you have a good day, sir.

3 MR. WEBB: Okay.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 107,  
5 Jonathan Woods.

6 MR. WOODS: Yes, sir, I'm here. How are you  
7 all doing?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Doing good. No, not  
9 really.

10 MR. WOODS: Yeah, I'm just trying to get up,  
11 out of here.

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you realize you're  
13 under oath, sir?

14 MR. WOODS: Yes, sir.

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,  
16 please continue.

17 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The applicant  
18 applied in July of this year. He was initially denied  
19 for self-reporting two felonies, both out of the  
20 California, the first being in October of 2008 for false  
21 impersonation, which the applicant states resulted in  
22 six months probation, the second felony being in April  
23 of 2010, out of California, attempted to sell marijuana.  
24 This was disclosed. And the applicant states that it  
25 resulted in probation, but does not remember the length

1 of time.

2 It's showing that the applicant never submitted  
3 fingerprints. And so we do not have the fingerprint  
4 results back.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So we don't have  
6 fingerprints back.

7 MR. WOODS: Oh. Is that going to be an issue?

8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You'll get a chance to  
9 speak in a minute.

10 MR. WOODS: Oh, sorry.

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's okay.

12 MR. WOODS: Okay.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: For the investigator, I  
14 just want to confirm. We have not received fingerprints  
15 back?

16 MR. JONES: It looks like they were never done.  
17 So we would not get them back.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. You were  
19 kind of garbled. I could not understand a word you  
20 said.

21 MR. JONES: Is this better?

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: A little bit.

23 MR. JONES: It does not look like the applicant  
24 ever got his fingerprints done. That's why we never  
25 received them.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh. Okay. Well, here's  
2 the deal. And this is for the applicant. We cannot do  
3 anything without your fingerprints, A, being submitted  
4 and, secondly, us getting a report back. There are many  
5 times we find out a lot more on the fingerprints than we  
6 do on the application or the test results. So there's  
7 no record of you ever submitting fingerprints.

8 MR. WOODS: Right. Yeah, I forgot about that  
9 part. I totally forgot.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Big part.

11 MR. WOODS: Yeah. Yeah. I'm sorry about that.  
12 So what happens now?

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm going to have to cut  
14 you off.

15 MR. WOODS: Okay.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're going to have to  
17 get your fingerprints done.

18 And then let me ask Director Ingram. Is this  
19 one that he's got to wait a year, or is this one where  
20 if he gets his fingerprints in, we can see him in  
21 December?

22 MR. INGRAM: It all depends on how you want to  
23 find on this item. In the past, the Board has given an  
24 individual an opportunity to withdraw their appeal until  
25 they can get things sorted out. If they withdraw their

1 appeal, then they can come back sooner. If the Board  
2 actually denies, it would be a year.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Well, okay.  
4 Thank you for reminding me.

5 So, Mr. Woods.

6 MR. WOODS: Yes.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: If you withdraw your  
8 request for an appeal, we will give you the time to get  
9 your fingerprints done. And then you can be on the next  
10 Board meeting. It'll either be, I believe it's November  
11 or December. If you don't want to do that, then we'll  
12 go forward. And if you get denied, and you heard what I  
13 said what we've done before, you're going to have to  
14 wait a whole nother year. So it's your call, sir.

15 MR. WOODS: Okay. So I'll just go ahead and  
16 proceed now. And if I'm approved, do I still, I'll go  
17 get my fingerprints and all that after I'm approved, if  
18 I'm approved?

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No. If you withdraw  
20 your request for an appeal --

21 MR. WOODS: Okay.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- I will give you time  
23 to get your fingerprints done. And we'll get you on the  
24 next Board meeting in December.

25 MR. WOODS: Okay. So if I proceed, I won't get

1 that chance, it'll just, basically this will be all for  
2 nothing, but.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: If you proceed, we'll  
4 take a vote. And if we deny you, you're going to have  
5 to wait a year.

6 MR. WOODS: Oh, okay. Well, I'll proceed.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You want to go forward,  
8 or you want to withdraw your appeal?

9 MR. WOODS: Every time you ask for that, it  
10 sounds like a trick question. Because I'm trying to  
11 figure out if you guys --

12 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. It's not a  
13 trick question. Let me. I'm going to try one more  
14 time, and then I'm going to let --

15 MR. WOODS: Okay.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- my old partner, Bobby  
17 Gronauer --

18 MR. WOODS: Yeah.

19 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: -- try to explain it if  
20 I can't.

21 MR. WOODS: Okay.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We don't have your  
23 fingerprints because you never did them.

24 MR. WOODS: Right. Right.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So we have never given

1 anybody a work card without fingerprints. If I go  
2 forward, we're going to call a vote. If you lose,  
3 you've got to wait a year to reapply.

4 MR. WOODS: Okay.

5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: If you withdraw today  
6 your appeal, we will give you time to get your  
7 fingerprints done, redo the application, and we'll get  
8 you on the next Board meeting. It's your call.

9 MR. WOODS: Okay. Okay. See that part, that's  
10 what I don't understand. So if you guys do approve me,  
11 then do I still have time to get my fingerprints, or?  
12 I'm sorry. I'm missing that part. I don't understand  
13 all that.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, we will allow you  
15 to withdraw your appeal.

16 MR. WOODS: Oh, okay.

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Give you time to get  
18 fingerprints. And we'll see you in December.

19 MR. WOODS: Oh, okay. Cool. All right.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Which one do you want to  
21 do?

22 MR. WOODS: I'll proceed.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You'll proceed with  
24 getting your fingerprints done?

25 MR. WOODS: Yeah.



1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Is that clear  
2 enough for you, Mr. Ingram?

3 MR. INGRAM: You know, I just want to make sure  
4 he understands what he's agreeing to.

5 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Right.

6 MR. INGRAM: I'm like you, Board Chair, I'm not  
7 sure he's understanding. If I may give it a shot to  
8 explain?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I'm going to let  
10 Bobby give it a shot.

11 MR. INGRAM: Okay.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Woods.

13 MR. WOODS: Yes, sir.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. This is Board  
15 Member Gronauer. Listen, here's the deal real quick.

16 MR. WOODS: Okay.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nobody's ever received,  
18 that we know of, nobody's ever received an approval  
19 under a denial if they don't have fingerprints here. So  
20 most people, we ask them to make a decision. And their  
21 decision would have to be withdraw today so they can be  
22 on the next agenda if they have their fingerprints done.  
23 Otherwise, most likely, there's a good chance that you  
24 may not get approved today.

25 MR. WOODS: Oh, okay. So. Okay. I hear what

1 you're saying. So I'm just going to go ahead and  
2 withdraw. Because it sounds like you guys are telling  
3 me if I do proceed right now, you're just going to  
4 automatically deny me, because you don't have the  
5 fingerprints, right?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. You've got it  
7 clear. You understand.

8 MR. WOODS: A lot of times, I'm kind of slow,  
9 so. Yeah, I got it.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, you talked to the  
11 right person, because I'm the one who's slow on this  
12 Board.

13 MR. WOODS: All right. All right. Yeah, I'll  
14 withdraw. I'll do the smart thing, because it sounds  
15 like you guys really want me to withdraw. And I'll just  
16 go ahead and get that done. So, yeah, I'll do that,  
17 yes, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Let  
19 the record reflect that Mr. Woods has withdrawn. And we  
20 may see him in the December meeting.

21 MR. WOODS: Oh, you will.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you, Mr. Gronauer.  
23 I appreciate it.

24 MR. INGRAM: Kudos to Gronauer. All right.  
25 Thank you, Gronauer.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I've seen him talk to  
2 very difficult people in my life that I couldn't get  
3 through to. So he did well.

4 MR. WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have history. I have  
6 history.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

8 MR. WOODS: Okay. So that's it, right?

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's it.

10 I'm going to try one more. Number 108, Chase  
11 Fleming, are you here?

12 MR. FLEMING: Yes, I'm here.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware  
14 you're under oath?

15 MR. FLEMING: Yes, sir, I am.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm going to  
17 turn it over to the investigator.

18 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones again. The  
19 applicant applied in February of 2020. He was  
20 originally denied for an arrest in December of 2018 here  
21 in Nevada for drawing a deadly weapon in a threatening  
22 manner. This was disclosed, but no court docs were  
23 provided. The applicant states that it was originally a  
24 felony that was reduced to a misdemeanor through a plea  
25 deal, which is also reflected in the fingerprint report.

1 The fingerprint report also shows that he spent three  
2 days in jail.

3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And where did this  
4 occur?

5 MR. JONES: That was here in Nevada.

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. In  
7 Las Vegas? Or is it a northern case?

8 MR. JONES: This was in Reno.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.  
10 Mr. Fleming, tell us about the arrest.

11 MR. FLEMING: All right. So on Christmas Eve,  
12 December 24th, 2018, my girlfriend, who I've been with  
13 for the last five years, she has kids, and her father  
14 had moved back to town from Washington. He had been  
15 gone eight years. And I had been raising her for three  
16 years. And we had did an agreement to where she would  
17 take my stepdaughter -- I consider them my  
18 stepchildren -- for the Christmas Eve and that we would  
19 do the exchange at the McDonald's on McCarran here in  
20 Reno that evening, on Christmas Eve.

21 And when we went to pick up my stepdaughter,  
22 him and his girlfriend had showed up, and they didn't  
23 show up with my stepdaughter. They showed up with just  
24 two of them. And so when my girlfriend got out of the  
25 vehicle to approach them to ask where my stepdaughter

1 was, he had shoved my girlfriend out of the way, and he  
2 had ran at me with his hand in his pocket.

3 Now, I was open-carrying my firearm on me. And  
4 when he had ran at me with his hand in his pocket, when  
5 he got about five feet away from me, I did withdraw my  
6 firearm on him, and I told him he needed to step back,  
7 that I had a firearm.

8 At that point, my girlfriend was already on the  
9 phone with Reno P.D., and she had told them the  
10 situation. Reno P.D. advised me to get back in my  
11 vehicle and put my firearm in the middle console and  
12 wait for officers to arrive. I fully complied with  
13 that. I got back in my vehicle, and I put my gun into  
14 the center console, and I waited for officers to  
15 respond. When the officers arrived, at the time of the  
16 incident, they didn't see why I should have pulled my  
17 firearm out. And so they ended up taking me to jail  
18 that evening, on Christmas Eve.

19 So I stayed in jail, I believe, until the 27th.  
20 And then, when I spoke with the judge, she did tell me  
21 that she could see in my behalf where it looked like  
22 self-defense with him charging at me. She told me,  
23 though, you know, I just have to be smarter about the  
24 way I do things. Which I agree with, you know. It was  
25 the heat of the moment. And, you know, I did a dumb

1 thing. So I did not receive any probation. I didn't  
2 receive any additional jail time. I had no fines. I  
3 did eight months of court services during the time of me  
4 going to court and getting the extensions.

5 And then, when I went back to court in August,  
6 the judge had spoke well D.A. The D.A. told the judge  
7 that he had spoke with my stepdaughter's dad as well and  
8 confirmed that he did threaten me and tell me if I did  
9 show up he was going to do something. And so the D.A.  
10 asked the judge to reduce my sentence from the felony to  
11 the misdemeanor with drawing the deadly weapon in a  
12 threatening manner. I did surrender my firearm that was  
13 involved in that incident. However, they did not revoke  
14 my rights to own firearms. I could still have a  
15 firearm. And they did say they could see where it was  
16 self-defense on my behalf.

17 So due to the three days I did spend in jail,  
18 the judge gave me credit for time served, and she ended  
19 my case.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you  
21 doing for employment these days?

22 MR. FLEMING: So I actually had gotten hired on  
23 at ESI. I was doing the ESI. But then my PILB card was  
24 denied initially. So what they did is they actually  
25 kept me on for a while, and I was doing the event

1 services side of it all the way up until June. But  
2 because of Covid and all of the events here in Reno,  
3 unfortunately, getting canceled, I wasn't able to keep  
4 pursuing that.

5 And so, right now, I just took my BLS  
6 certification, because I have enrolled for my EMT  
7 starting January, so I can go to work with REMSA here in  
8 Reno.

9 And, also, right now, I'm waiting on a job with  
10 Invictus. I talked to Jeff, who's the head guy at  
11 Invictus here, and I told him that I had an appeal for  
12 my PILB card today. And if I get my PILB card passed  
13 today, then I have a job with Invictus Security here.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

15 MR. FLEMING: You're welcome, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other  
17 questions, any questions from the Board?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Board Member Gronauer,  
19 to the applicant. Do you have a CCW card?

20 MR. FLEMING: I do not have a CCW. I was  
21 open-carrying my firearm, because it is legal to  
22 open-carry here. I just, like I said, I made the wrong  
23 decision at the wrong time. But I do not have my CCW.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I understand it's  
25 open-carry here. But here's the deal. If you go to

1 classes for CCW, they'll teach you and have you really  
2 learn when and when you shouldn't pull out a firearm.  
3 So that would be a very good class for you to finally  
4 attend. Okay. I just wanted to know if you had a CCW,  
5 because that's a good class. Thank you.

6 MR. FLEMING: Thank you, sir.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other  
8 questions?

9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. So I just  
10 want to make sure that everything's closed out on this,  
11 because we don't have any court documents. Are we  
12 positive that everything's closed out? Because this is  
13 very recent, or two years ago.

14 MR. FLEMING: Yeah, everything was closed on  
15 August 19th, I believe, of 2019.

16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'm sorry. That was for  
17 the investigator.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That was for the  
19 investigator.

20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.

21 MR. FLEMING: Oh, I'm sorry. I'm sorry.

22 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The  
23 fingerprint report does not -- it does show that it is  
24 finalized and there's nothing pending.

25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Anything else?



1 I'll take a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move  
3 that we uphold the denial. Time and distance, this is  
4 only two years ago. And, you know, that's just the  
5 standard we've been holding ourselves to. So I move  
6 that we uphold the denial.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
8 Do I have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a  
11 motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, Mr. Chairman.

13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, go ahead.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It would be nice in the  
15 future for an applicant or maybe the investigators, with  
16 something like this here, where it's right in a real  
17 gray area, even though it's recent, that's why I'm going  
18 along with the motion, but the idea is maybe a court  
19 transcript from the applicant or something like that.  
20 Because something has to tell us what really happened  
21 there.

22 MR. FLEMING: I can provide.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, no, that's it.  
24 That was just a suggestion. Thank you.

25 MR. FLEMING: Oh, I was going to say, I just,

1 if I could have the opportunity to --

2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Fleming.

3 MR. FLEMING: -- I can always provide --

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Fleming.

5 MR. FLEMING: -- my court -- yes?

6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Your time is done.

7 Okay. We're in the middle of voting.

8 MR. FLEMING: I just feel that's unjust.

9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, that's good.

10 I'll call for a vote. All those in favor, say  
11 "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 MR. FLEMING: Thank you guys.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. You have a  
15 good day, sir. You can reapply in a year.

16 Okay. Mr. Ingram, on number 105, Jim Mathews.

17 MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Correct me if I'm wrong.

19 He was notified to only call in today, correct, so I  
20 really can't trail him to tomorrow?

21 MR. INGRAM: That's correct, he was notified  
22 that his hearing was today, sir.

23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm going to  
24 call him one more time, then. Jim Mathews, number 105?  
25 Jim Mathews, number 105?

1 Okay. Call for a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll --

3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Nixon.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, Mr. Brown.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'd move that we uphold  
6 the denial of his application.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.  
8 Do I have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. Gronauer.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Gronauer seconds.  
11 Any further discussion?

12 All right. Hearing none, call for a vote. All  
13 those in favor of denying the appeal, say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. For  
16 those that, unfortunately, we cannot get to, my sincere  
17 apologies. It is, it might have been a long afternoon  
18 for you. It's been a much longer day for the Board.

19 MR. PAYNE: I'm next. Gosh.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We went, we went a half  
21 hour beyond what we normally do. We do this as a  
22 service. And it's getting very hard to concentrate at  
23 this point.

24 MR. PAYNE: Excuse me. Can you please just do  
25 one more? I'm the next one.

1 MR. INGRAM: Whoever, whoever is speaking needs  
2 to stop speaking.

3 MR. PAYNE: Okay.

4 MR. INGRAM: Anybody that has their phone not  
5 on mute, please place your phones on mute so the Board  
6 Chair can continue.

7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So, Mr. Ingram, do you  
8 want to give instructions what to do about tomorrow on  
9 those 10 or 15 we didn't get to today?

10 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

11 So item numbers 109 through 120, tomorrow  
12 morning we will reconvene at 9:00 a.m. And at that  
13 time, we would like you to go ahead and call in at  
14 9:00 a.m. We will take you before the others that have  
15 been instructed to call in at 9:00 a.m. So you will be  
16 at the beginning of the Board meeting tomorrow. So  
17 please be on time. Please call in and immediately place  
18 your phones on mute. And you'll call in to the same  
19 number with the same password.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Ingram, may I make a  
21 suggestion, too, for these 11? If there are people that  
22 have to work tomorrow morning, if they want to call in  
23 later in the day, I will accept that, if they -- or a  
24 doctor's appointment or something of that nature.

25 MR. INGRAM: Okay. So any of you, items 109

1 through 120, if you need to call in later than  
2 9:00 a.m., please send us an email.

3 And, Lori, did we give them a specific email to  
4 respond to?

5 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. When they were  
6 emailed the confirmation, it has my email address on  
7 there. So you can give them my email address as a  
8 correspondence, that's fine.

9 MR. INGRAM: Okay. So those of you, if you  
10 don't have her email address, it's L, for Lori, last  
11 name I-R-I-Z, as in zebra, A-R-R-Y at pilb.nv.gov. So  
12 if you'll confirm that you'll be calling in at 9:00,  
13 that would be great. If you need to call in later in  
14 the day, please let us know what time.

15 And we will be closing down the meeting again,  
16 Board Chair, 4:00, 4:30 tomorrow?

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.

18 MR. INGRAM: Okay.

19 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. One more thing.  
20 For those that are agenda item number 109 through 120,  
21 I'll send you an individual email right now, before  
22 5:00 p.m. Because my email's a difficult one. So I'm  
23 going to send each of you an email. Whatever email that  
24 you applied with on our website when you applied for the  
25 first time, that's the email I'm going to email each of

1 you right now. If you would respond to that email,  
2 please.

3 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Lori.

4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll call  
5 for a motion to adjourn for the day.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make that motion.

7 MR. DETMER: Mr. Chairman? Chairman, I  
8 apologize. Mike Detmer, for the record. Do you  
9 normally take public comment at the end of a one of  
10 two-day meeting?

11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I probably do.  
12 Mike, I'm losing my mind here, so.

13 MR. DETMER: No, Chairman, you have been  
14 amazing. The endurance of the Board is amazing. I  
15 appreciate you humoring my interruption.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, no problem.

17 I will take public comment.

18 MR. BAGLEY: This is Brett Bagley. I was  
19 present since 2:57, instructed to call in at  
20 3:00 o'clock. And I'll be attending tomorrow morning at  
21 9:00 a.m.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you, sir. I  
23 appreciate your cooperation. What number are you?  
24 Because I want to remember cooperative people.

25 MR. BAGLEY: I'm actually not sure, sir. My

1 name is Brett Bagley.

6 comment. Thank you for your time.

7 All right. I'll call for a motion to adjourn.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Board Member Gronauer.  
9 I make a motion to -- whatever it is.

10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

11 Do I have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second.

14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All in favor,  
15 state "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Shannon, thank you so  
18 much. Rest your fingers tonight.
