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1	WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 2, 2020, 9:00 A.M.
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3	MR. INGRAM: Good morning, everyone. This is
4	Director Kevin Ingram. And I want to welcome everyone
5	in the call this morning. It is 9:00 o'clock. We have
6	a huge agenda, so we're going to go ahead and get
7	started.
8	A couple of housekeeping items I'd like to
9	cover real quickly with you. I'd just like to remind
10	everyone to keep your phones on mute until called upon.
11	And once you have had your hearing, you can go ahead and
12	hang up for the day.
13	I would like to remind everyone to speak loudly
14	and clearly. We have a court reporter that is also on
15	the line with us, and so we need to make sure that we
16	can capture everything that's being said.
17	When you are going to speak, please announce
18	your full name. And then, when you are answering
19	follow-up questions from the Board, if you could just
20	state your name before each response, we would
21	appreciate that.
22	Only one person should be speaking at a time to
23	ensure that we have that accurate record. If the Chair
24	or any members of the Board ask you to stop talking,
25	please do so at that time, so we can adequately respond.

1	The public will be given opportunities to
2	comment before the Board meeting and after the Board
3	meeting today. We will not be taking public comment for
4	each agenda item.
5	That's what I have so far for the introduction.
6	And, Chairman, would you like to take over from
7	here? Chairman Flynn?
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Can you hear me now?
9	MR. INGRAM: Yes.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good morning.
11	This is Ray Flynn, for the record. Shannon, are you
12	ready?
13	THE REPORTER: Yes, I am. Thank you.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I guess, for this
15	morning, I know we have one item that the person's asked
16	to move up due to them flying out of town. And we can
17	do that, Kevin. We can do that first. And then we can
18	do the people that were left over from yesterday. And
19	then what I would like to do is to do 186.
20	We did 120 items yesterday, and a lot of them
21	were consent. And today we have 68 items, none of which
22	are consent. And if we even did 10 minutes per item, I
23	doubt we're going to get through. But we're going to
24	try the best we can.
25	So if you're okay with my suggested agenda,

1	Kevin, we'll get started.
2	MR. INGRAM: That sounds great, yes, sir.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Could you do a
4	call of members, please.
5	MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. Chairman Flynn?
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm here.
7	MR. INGRAM: Board Member Brown?
8	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Here.
9	MR. INGRAM: Board Member Gronauer?
10	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Good morning. Here.
11	MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon?
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here.
13	MR. INGRAM: Okay. And then we have Shannon
14	Taylor, our court reporter. We have myself, Kevin
15	Ingram, Lori Irizarry, Chief of Operations, and
16	Supervising Investigator Vincent Saladino, our Financial
17	Specialist in the north, Mary Klemme, Investigator in
18	the north Jordan Jones, Investigator Swarthout,
19	Investigator Maxwell. And everybody is currently
20	present, sir. We do have a quorum, so we can proceed.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And maybe I had
22	background. Is our legal counsel with us?
23	MR. INGRAM: Legal counsel, I'm sorry,
24	Mr. Michael Detmer, is on the line with us as well.
25	Thank you.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good morning.
2	And, Mike, I know I tease you a lot, but I really
3	appreciate the advice and counsel that you give us.
4	I've had several from your office. And I'll be blunt.
5	You're my favorite. You've been the best so far for me
6	at least, being Chair.
7	MR. DETMER: It's my pleasure, sir. And I need
8	to be kept in my place. So I thank you for it.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I'm
10	still going to tease you today.
11	All right. Let me address public comment.
12	Members of the general public may comment on matters
13	appearing on the agenda and may bring matters not
14	appearing on the agenda to the attention of the Board.
15	The Board may discuss the matters not appearing on the
16	agenda but may not act on matters at this meeting. If
17	the Board desires, the matters may be placed on a future
18	agenda for action. Public comments may be limited to
19	five minutes per person at the discretion of the
20	Chairman but will not be restricted according to
21	viewpoint. And for today, due to our aggressive agenda,
22	I will be limiting them to five minutes.
23	So at this time, before we get started, I will
24	ask, is there any public comment?
25	Hearing none, Kevin, I'll let you proceed,

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1	please. Hello?
2	MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you. So starting off
3	today, we have agenda items 109 through 130 that have
4	currently called in, are on the line. As you had
5	stated, item number 166 had then asked, due to a flight,
6	to go ahead and be heard this morning. And then we also
7	have, you know, the item 186 that you had mentioned we
8	want to get taken care of at the beginning.
9	So at your pleasure, please go ahead and
10	proceed with the agenda item that you would like to take
11	first.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Let's do number
13	166, Nicholas Galindo.
14	Mr. Galindo, are you with us?
15	MR. INGRAM: He's calling in right now. I'm
16	hoping he's not having trouble getting through.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll wait a
18	second.
19	MR. GALINDO: Hello? Chairman Flynn?
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
21	MR. GALINDO: Hi.
22	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
23	Brown.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
25	MR. GALINDO: Hi. Nice to meet you.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hold on one second.
2	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: We need to swear in this
3	group. Can we do the swearing in of this group?
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, that is a great
5	comment. Thank you.
6	MR. INGRAM: Let's see if Mr. Galindo on is on
7	the call yet.
8	Mr. Galindo, are you there?
9	MR. GALINDO: Yes, I'm right here.
10	MR. INGRAM: Okay. Excellent. So the swearing
11	in can take place, then, for 109 through 130 plus item
12	number 166, Mr. Galindo.
13	Mr. Detmer, will you please swear everyone in.
14	MR. DETMER: It would be my pleasure.
15	For those who are about to testify, do you
16	hereby swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and
17	nothing but the truth?
18	(Applicants and witnesses present were
19	<pre>sworn/affirmed.)</pre>
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Item 166,
21	Nicholas Galindo. You said you're here. I'll turn it
22	over to the investigator.
23	MR. GALINDO: Thank you.
24	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.
25	MR. GALINDO: Hello, nice to meet you.

1	MR. MAXWELL: Hello. In 2010, the applicant
2	was arrested in California for burglary second degree at
3	felony level. Disposition shows 180 days jail, three
4	years formal probation. The San Bernardino Superior
5	Court website was accessed for the court documents. The
6	applicant finished probation on 4-21 of '14.
7	At the time of the application, the applicant
8	was employed as event staff by ESI Security Services,
9	license number 700. Once he was made provisional on
10	11-26 of '19, he was moved up to security officer. He
11	was denied on 1-6 of 2020 and terminated from the ESI
12	security position the same day. The applicant stated in
13	his appeal letter that he was demoted back to event
14	staff until the outcome of this appeal.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
16	Mr. Galindo, do you want to tell us what was
17	going on and why you didn't disclose?
18	MR. GALINDO: Why I didn't disclose, yes. I
19	just want to make something very clear of what I did.
20	What I did is strictly on my shoulders. And I take full
21	responsibility for what I did. I was with the wrong
22	people. I was not my parents were not the best
23	people. So I was lead down the wrong path. So I just
24	want to let that be on the record.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

1	MR. GALINDO: So. Go ahead.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you done?
3	MR. GALINDO: Yes, I'm done.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any questions
5	from the Board?
6	MR. GALINDO: I am sorry. I'm just kind of
7	caught off guard. It was so sudden. So I'm a little
8	out of my element right now. Apologies.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's okay,
10	Mr. Galindo. Do you have something more to add?
11	MR. GALINDO: Yes, I do. Oh, I don't have my
12	paperwork with me.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We need to move
14	on, Mr. Galindo.
15	MR. GALINDO: Yes, I understand.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a big agenda
17	today.
18	MR. GALINDO: Yes, I understand.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to

7	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Do I have
9	any discussion?
10	Okay. All in favor, state "aye."
11	(Board members said "aye.")
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The appeal is denied.
13	Mr. Galindo.
14	MR. GALINDO: Yes.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You can reapply in a
16	year. We have a standard that you need to disclose your
17	criminal history. And that is the reason why. You have
18	a good day, sir. Have a safe flight. Thank you.
19	MR. GALINDO: You, too. Bye.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 109,
21	Bernard Payne.
22	MR. PAYNE: Good morning.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you here, sir?
24	MR. PAYNE: Yes, I am. Good morning.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand

1	you're under oath?
2	MR. PAYNE: Yes, sir.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn it over
4	to the investigator.
5	MR. JONES: Good morning. This is Investigator
6	Jones. The applicant applied in November of 2019. He
7	was denied for a carrying a concealed weapon without a
8	permit for an arrest in February 2018 at the misdemeanor
9	level. The applicant received a suspended jail
10	sentence. He was ordered to forfeit the gun and was
11	able to perform 50 hours of community service in lieu of
12	a fine. This was the only arrest found on the
13	fingerprint report.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And the applicant did
15	not disclose this?
16	MR. JONES: This was disclosed, and court docs
17	were provided.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. All
19	right. Mr. Payne, anything you want to add, state?
20	MR. PAYNE: No, it's self-explanatory. It's
21	fine.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I'd be curious,
23	because you're you know, we take any gun charge very
24	serious, especially the
25	MR. PAYNE: Okay. I have an explanation.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, please.
2	MR. PAYNE: I was a professional street
3	performer, professional musician. And I've always
4	open-carried. I've always worn out there. I have
5	pictures with me with Metro and everything. So I was a
6	very positive entity out there as a street performer.
7	And I was out there for like five years. And,
8	eventually, things changed. They made an ordinance to
9	get the street performers out of there, which they
10	succeeded. And I was just made a sacrificial lamb.
11	But everything is fine. I've played in every
12	major casino in town. So that was just a chapter in my
13	life and not negative. Because they know I had it.
14	That was in February. And it was cold that day, so I
15	was just trying to perform and get out of there. I
16	didn't want to leave my gun in the car because there was
17	too many eyes watching. So that's what that was.
18	And, actually, the original reason they even
19	confronted me was they said that I was two decibels over
20	the sound. They're not professional sound men. But,
21	you know, instead of arguing and everything, I just, I
22	move on with my life. Time is the most valuable thing
23	in the universe. I don't waste it. So that's my
24	answer.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.

MR. PAYNE: Yes. 1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any questions from the 2 3 Board? BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I just want to 4 understand. You said that you open-carry. I'm sorry. 5 And this is Board Member Nixon. But on the arrest or on 6 7 the paperwork that we have, it says it was a concealed. Was it indeed concealed? 8 MR. PAYNE: I had my hoodie on back in 9 February. It was a cold day. That's the only reason. 10 Other than that, I wouldn't. I took a chance, I took a 11 risk, but just to perform and get out of there. But 12 13 I've never been in any trouble, you know. And I've 14 been, I purchase a shotgun. It wasn't like a felony 15 where I couldn't buy it where they sell firearms. So I understand. I'll get my CCW so I can be a hundred 16 17 percent. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member 18 Gronauer. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. 21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: For the investigator, he spent the hours of community service. And we have 22 23 paperwork to say that that was completed? 24 MR. JONES: I'm checking right now. 2.5 Yes, this was completed.

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1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
3	questions?
4	All right. I'll entertain a motion.
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
6	Nixon. I move that we uphold the denial. And for me,
7	it's based on the time and distance.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
9	Do I have a second?
10	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. I second.
11	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Brown second.
13	All right. Any further discussion?
14	I'll call for a vote. All those in favor of
15	the motion, state "aye."
16	(Board members said "aye.")
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. The appeal
18	is denied. And you can reapply in a year, sir.
19	MR. PAYNE: Oh, man.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good luck to you.
21	MR. PAYNE: Oh, man, that is just.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 110, Geron
23	Funches? Mr. Funches, or Funches, are you here, sir?
24	All right. I will trail that.
25	Number 111, Raad Sunna, if I'm pronouncing that

1 correctly? 2 MR. SUNNA: Yes, sir. Correct. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you. 3 I'll turn it over. Oh, do you realize you're under 4 oath, sir? 5 MR. SUNNA: Yes, sir. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Turn it over to 8 the investigator. MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2016, 9 the applicant was charged with aiming a gun at a person 10 in the state of Nevada. This was at gross misdemeanor 11 level. The disposition was 364 days suspended sentence 12 13 and 36 months probation. They did disclose and provided court documents. The applicant disclosed the arrest and 14 was not made provisional. The arrest was confirmed with 15 the fingerprint report and court documents. He was 16 denied 3-12-2020. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. 18 Mr. Sunna, do you want to explain what 19 20 happened? 21 MR. SUNNA: Yes, sir. Back in 2010, my family purchased a couple of tobacco shops. And both my 22 brother and I were working them individually. 23 December 2nd, 2016, well, I should say a month prior to 24 that, we had sold one of the locations. And the new 2.5

1	owner is a family friend of ours and asked if I would be
2	able to cover him until he went out of town and
3	returned. So I said yes. I went into the store like
4	normal, and I did open-carry on my side.
5	At about 5:20, 5:30 p.m., three masked men
6	rushed into the store, one going behind the counter
7	towards me and one on the opposite side and one coming
8	down the middle. I did feel my life was in danger. I
9	didn't know what their intentions were. So I drew and
10	opened fire. The other two fled. The other one went
11	down by the door.
12	The original on December 2nd, this occurred.
13	And Metro arrived on scene, did their thing. They
14	released me. And it wasn't until December 5th, that
15	night around 6:00 p.m., where I got a call from a
16	detective saying they needed to ask further questions.
17	And that's when they placed me under arrest for the
18	original charge being open murder. And I did do a
19	72-hour holding period in the detention center. I was
20	released on house arrest. I was allowed to go to work,
21	attorney meetings and doctor's appointments and
22	et cetera.
23	It wasn't till evidence came to light. Well,
24	the original charge, why it was that way, because they
25	said all the shots were to the back. And later on,

evidence came to light showing it incorrect. 1 Two shots were in the front that traversed the body, and the rest 2 of the shots followed after that. 3 Later, also, more evidence came to light that 4 the charge was filed incorrectly. And it was reduced to 5 a gross misdemeanor. There was a 365-day jail time 6 7 suspended. I was placed on probation. And I was discharged from probation on June 18th of 2019 for 8 complying with all the rules and everything. And I also 9 did a hundred hours of community service. 10 And since then, the case has been closed. I'm 11 just waiting to actually go ahead and expunge and seal 12 13 in June of 2021. But at the same time, I'm also trying 14 to apply for a position that requires a PILB card. And that's it. I'm still legally allowed to carry a 15 firearm. I can purchase and carry. But I would just 16 have to wait till June to get my CCW. 17 And that's pretty much everything. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you, sir. 19 20 MR. SUNNA: Yes, sir. 21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any questions from the Board? 22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. 23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. 24 25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: For the investigator.

1	I believe, it was Maxwell.
2	MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.
3	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do we have any police
4	report on this or anything to see what really happened
5	here? I mean this seems a little bit convoluted, a
6	little bit crazy. It started out with murder and down
7	to aiming a firearm?
8	MR. MAXWELL: I don't have any, I don't have
9	any police report, sir. I've just got the court
10	documents and the fingerprint report.
11	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: By court documents,
12	what do you mean by that?
13	MR. MAXWELL: The documentation that shows the
14	charge that he was charged with, which was aiming a
15	firearm at a human being. And it gives the dispositions
16	and the final outcome, and it tells you the completion
17	of community service, probation, that type of stuff,
18	sir.
19	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. I'd love to
20	have the court documents tell me what happened in court
21	here all the way. I mean there's just something that
22	doesn't, doesn't fit right with me.
23	Could I have a question? Mr. Chairman, I'd
24	like to question the applicant.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, go ahead.

1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Sunna?
2	MR. SUNNA: Yes, sir.
3	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You fired the shots,
4	and one went down. Was he deceased?
5	MR. SUNNA: Yes, sir. He died on the way to
6	the hospital.
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That's all I
8	have. Thank you.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And if I recall
10	the case, Mr. Sunna, the decedent was 13 years old. Is
11	that correct?
12	MR. SUNNA: Yes, correct.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
14	questions from the Board?
15	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: A question from Board
16	Member Brown for the applicant.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.
18	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Sunna, did you say
19	these gentlemen were armed when they came at you?
20	MR. SUNNA: One of them was armed with a knife,
21	correct.
22	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.
23	MR. SUNNA: Yes, sir.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from
25	the Board?

1	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I know we don't have
2	the police report, and you said there were some mistakes
3	made in the filing and such. Was there camera footage
4	of this incident inside the shop? And did the you
5	know, I'm assuming that the police department would have
6	had access to this footage?
7	MR. SUNNA: Yes, there is. And there was also
8	camera footage of the three assailants next-door in the
9	vestibule putting on the masks and preparing for the
10	the rush.
11	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Okay. I have
12	nothing else. Thank you.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
14	questions from the Board?
15	All right. I'll entertain a motion.
16	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Very
17	unusual situation. But from the heights of it to the
18	lows of it, and it's so sad anybody got killed in any
19	situation, but with the facts that were presented at
20	this point from the applicant and the final disposition
21	of the case, I'm going to make a motion to grant the
22	appeal.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
24	to grant the appeal. Do I have a second?
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Nixon.

1	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion,
3	and I have a second. Any further discussion?
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'm with Gronauer. This
5	is, you know, this is a difficult one for me. But,
6	yeah, this is a challenge. I feel like we don't have a
7	lot, a lot or all the information. But, yeah. That was
8	all, just more of a statement. Sorry.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And just for
10	discussion purposes, I've got an issue with time and
11	distance. And I also have an issue that he can't do
12	anything till June 2021 to further a firearm issue.
13	Mr. Galindo, real quick, this is an unarmed
14	position? I'm sorry. Mr
15	MR. SUNNA: Sunna.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sunna. Is this an
17	unarmed position?
18	MR. SUNNA: I would assume so. The job
19	description did not state anything about carrying. But
20	I do have no, nothing holding me back from being able to
21	carry or purchase.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
23	Without any further discussion, I'll call for a vote.
24	All those in favor, state "aye."
25	(Board members said "aye.")

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any opposed,
2	state "nay." Nay.
3	Okay. Motion carries three to one.
4	Congratulations, sir. You have a good day.
5	MR. SUNNA: You, too. Thank you very much.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 112,
7	Jeremy Jongepier?
8	MR. JONGEPIER: Yes, sir.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did I pronounce that
10	correctly?
11	MR. JONGEPIER: It is "Yung-eh-peer."
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Jongepier. All
13	right. Do you realize you're under oath?
14	MR. JONGEPIER: Yes.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn it over
16	to the investigator.
17	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2015,
18	in Nevada, the applicant was charged with
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Jongepier, I
20	believe, that's your phone. Can you put it on mute
21	until we ask you a question? Thank you.
22	Go ahead, Mr. Maxwell.
23	MR. MAXWELL: Thank you, sir. 2015, in the
24	state of Nevada, the applicant was charged with assault,
25	carrying a concealed weapon without a permit, at

1	misdemeanor level. He did disclose, and court docs were
2	provided. The disposition showed it was 90 days plus
3	90-day concurrent jail sentence, which was suspended.
4	He was ordered to stay out of trouble, community
5	service, counseling. The property was forfeited. And
6	all of the conditions were satisfied by August 4th,
7	2015.
8	The applicant was initially denied in 2017 for
9	the weapons conviction. He disclosed the arrest on his
10	application and was not made provisional. The
11	conviction was confirmed with SCOPE, the fingerprint
12	report and court documents.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
14	Mr. Jongepier, can you tell us what happened?
15	MR. JONGEPIER: So there was a kid in my
16	neighborhood who was being arrested for a murder that
17	had happened like at the end of my block. I happened to
18	be, or young and stupid, and I was nosey, and I went to
19	go watch him get arrested. And I had, oh, I always
20	open-carried at that time. And I had put my gun inside
21	my glovebox. When I got out of my car to go, the police
22	barricade happened. And some gentleman ran up to me,
23	and he tried to fight me. And I put my hands up. And
24	when I lifted my hands, he saw my holster. We were
25	separated by the police officers. The officers told us

1 to go our separate ways. I didn't know the guy had lived in my 2 neighborhood. I drove past his street. He threw a 3 handful of rocks at me and my fiance at the time, hit my 4 I stopped my car, and I yelled some profanity at 5 car. him, which I really regret doing. That's what the 6 7 assault charge was about. And then I drove back to my house. And about 15 minutes later, I had my 8 neighborhood barricaded off saying that I had assaulted 9 this guy and with my firearm. 10 And they dismissed it down to a concealed carry 11 firearm, which was in my glovebox, that I admitted to. 12 13 And two weeks after I was released off of house arrest, 14 they no longer had that criminal charge. So. And I was 15 forced into taking a plea. I would have went to a trial with it. But my lawyer, since it was such a high 16 priority case, they wanted 25 grand, and I couldn't 17 afford it at the time. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. 19 Any 20 questions -- put it back on mute unless the Board has 21 questions. You've got a very scratchy phone. Okay. Thank you. 22 Any questions from the Board? 23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I --24 2.5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hearing no questions,

1	I'll entertain a motion.
2	I'm calling for a motion a second time.
3	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Chair, this is Brown.
4	I think, we're pausing. I thought Board Member Nixon
5	had a question.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, I didn't hear her.
7	My apologies.
8	Go ahead, Tammy.
9	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No. Thank you. I wanted
10	to find out. It says assault, carrying a concealed
11	weapon. Did you assault anybody with the weapon, or was
12	there actually any physical confrontation, or was this
13	just you yelling profanities at somebody?
14	MR. JONGEPIER: Yes, ma'am, there was no weapon
15	involved with the assault. It was all verbal.
16	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And then, when they
17	saw your belt, was there an actual gun in the holster,
18	or was
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Jongepier, it's your
20	phone. I don't know if you could step to another part
21	of where you're at, if you're at home. But we cannot
22	hearing anything. And we can't even hear ourselves
23	speak.
24	MR. JONGEPIER: Is this better?
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: A hundred percent.

1	MR. JONGEPIER: Oh, is it? Okay. So, no, I
2	did not have the firearm inside of my holster. It was
3	inside of my glovebox, because I felt that it was more
4	responsible to step out with my gun being locked up with
5	the officers around. I did not want to intimidate any
6	of the officers with a firearm during a police
7	barricade, so I had it locked away in my glovebox. And
8	that was during the whole confrontation with the
9	gentleman, also.
10	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Understood. Thank
11	you.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
13	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have another
16	question. Have you, for the applicant, have you
17	attended a CCW class?
18	MR. JONGEPIER: Yes, sir, I have. And the only
19	problem with my having the CCW is I haven't had enough
20	money to pay for the court documents and fingerprinting
21	down there, just because I've been laid off because of
22	the Covid. But I have taken the actual class.
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I understood that
24	part, and I was trying to figure out, okay, about the
25	money part. But, okay. The other part is, if you took

1	the class, they pretty well instruct you when to bring a
2	gun and not to bring a gun, or bring it out or not to
3	bring it out. Is that correct?
4	MR. JONGEPIER: Yes, sir. And this, I'd taken
5	the class after that I had gotten this charge. So.
6	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
8	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a
9	motion.
10	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I
11	move that we grant the appeal.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
13	Do I have a second?
14	I'll call for a second again.
15	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'm sorry. I'm on mute.
16	I second. This is Nixon.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
18	I have a second. Any further discussion?
19	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, this is Gronauer.
20	I probably won't be able to support this for the simple
21	reason of time and distance on this one. And I'm glad
22	he took the CCW class, but it was afterwards. And I
23	just won't be able to support it probably. And that's
24	my reason, time and distance.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. All

those in favor of the motion, state "aye." 1 2 (Board members said "aye.") 3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Those opposed, state 4 "nay." 5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nay. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries three to one. Good luck. 8 All right. Mr. Brett Bagley, are you here? 9 MR. BAGLEY: Yes, good morning, Director 10 11 Ingram. I'm here. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize 12 13 you're under oath? MR. BAGLEY: Yes, sir. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll turn 15 this over to the investigator. 16 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2010, 17 in the state of Mississippi, the applicant was charged 18 with fleeing from police. This was at the felony level. 19 20 Disposition shows three years probation. And this was 21 disclosed by the applicant. In 2018, in the state of Nevada, he was charged 22 with engage in lewd, dissolute conduct in public place. 23 This was at misdemeanor level. He received six months 24 suspended jail sentence and a fine. This was also 2.5

1	disclosed.
2	The applicant was initially was made
3	provisional on November 1st, 2019 but was not added to
4	added to anyone's roster. The arrests were disclosed on
5	the application and were confirmed with the fingerprint
6	report. He was denied December 3rd, 2019.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
8	Mr. Bagley, anything you want to add?
9	MR. BAGLEY: Yes. I've prepared a statement in
10	the interest of saving time and getting all the
11	pertinent facts at hand. Let's see.
12	In June of 2010, I was employed as a tour bus
13	driver in Las Vegas. After a long work week, I rented a
14	vehicle and drove to Georgia to help a friend. He
15	stated they needed immediate help to get out of a
16	domestic violence situation. I made only one stop to
17	rest, and I was unable to sleep with all that was on my
18	mind. I got back on the road and reached Georgia two
19	days later. And on the way back to Las Vegas, I began
20	to experience the effects of extreme sleep deprivation.
21	Being a professional driver and having driven many long
22	trips before, I pushed myself beyond my limits without
23	realizing it.
24	A police officer in Vicksburg, Mississippi
25	initiated a traffic stop for an out headlight. I was in

1	a dreamlike state at this point simply from extreme lack
2	of rest, and no drugs were involved. When I saw only
3	blue lights in the rearview mirror, I did not perceive
4	it to be a police car, since it did not have any red
5	lights. In my normal frame of mind, I'm well aware that
6	police vehicles in other areas of the United States use
7	only blue lights. I graduated as class president of the
8	Monterey Peninsula College Law Enforcement Academy in
9	2000. And I come from a law enforcement family. I was
10	also a licensed driving instructor in the state of
11	California from 2003 to 2004. Traffic safety has been a
12	passion of mine throughout my life. I truly thought it
13	was someone attempting to impersonate a police officer,
14	in my frame of mind, and drove away at a high rate of
15	speed. My judgment and perceptions had been completely
16	impaired from my extreme lack of adequate rest.
17	I remember reaching a large railway area where
18	there's only one way in or out. And when I turned
19	around
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Wait, wait. Mr. Bagley?
21	MR. BAGLEY: Yes.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You explained
23	that. I see where that's going. I accept your
24	explanation. Talk to me
25	MR. BAGLEY: Okay.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: about the lewdness in
2	public.
3	MR. BAGLEY: Okay. This was the second arrest
4	here in Pahrump. This was after I was a limousine
5	driver in Las Vegas from 2011 to 2017. And I was
6	involved in a vehicle versus pedestrian accident as a
7	pedestrian and suffered a knee injury, which took nine
8	months to recover. So I had moved to Pahrump to
9	recover. I was becoming extremely distressed and began
10	to lose sleep over a period of days. And while I was in
11	my camper, I stayed up all night watching videos on
12	YouTube. Since I was not driving anywhere, I did not
13	see any potential problems, and I ended up in the same
14	dreamlike state by morning and sleepwalked out of my
15	camper not wearing any clothing and was promptly
16	arrested by the Nye County Sheriff's Department.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. The
18	rest of the Board
19	MR. BAGLEY: I do have more.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We have limited time.
21	If the rest of the Board's got questions and they want
22	you to continue with your statement, I'll allow it. But
23	I'm good with your explanation so far.
24	MR. BAGLEY: Okay. The only thing I have to
25	add is a letter from the psychologist as the explanation

1	for my actions, if I might add that. It takes less than
2	a minute. It could be pertinent for the decision.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Read
4	what the psychiatrist says about your condition and as
5	it applies to being a security officer.
6	MR. BAGLEY: Actually, I'm applying for mystery
7	shopping. But, yes, this is from Laurel Life in
8	Chambersburg, Pennsylvania, dated 29 September 2010,
9	just after the first incident.
10	It says, it reads here: Mr. Bagley was seen
11	for a psychological interview assessment on
12	September 20, 2010, and the status of examination
13	reveals that it be focused and calm
14	(The Reporter asked Mr. Bagley to read slower.)
15	MR. BAGLEY: Okay. No problem.
16	Prior to the incident in Mississippi that
17	occurred in June, Mr. Bagley had no history of any
18	mental health or substance abuse issues. Given all
19	available information, it seems evident that the cause
20	of Mr. Bagley's aberrant behavior at the time of his
21	arrest was the result of sleep deprivation. After over
22	a week period of attaining minimal sleep, he began to
23	exhibit signs akin to a brief psychotic episode. In
24	addition to slow response time and impairment in motor
25	skills and judgment and fragmented thought processes,

1	one of the psychological effects of sleep deprivation
2	can be microsleeps. This occurs when the brain
3	automatically shuts down for a brief period, leading the
4	person to mentally fall asleep regardless of what they
5	are doing. During a microsleep, the person is in a
6	dreamlike state, causing distorted perceptions. As the
7	person is unable to distinguish reality from waking
8	dreams, inappropriate behavior and emotional responses
9	are common. This, I believe, has occurred when
10	Mr. Bagley was driving a vehicle. Given his lack of the
11	late history and current presentation, as long as
12	Mr. Bagley attains adequate rest, it is my professional
13	opinion that the June incident was an isolated incident
14	and not apt to recur.
15	And that was by Tara Louchery, licensed
16	clinical psychologist from Laurel Life.
17	I have since been diagnosed with severe sleep
18	apnea where I have over 30 events an hour, and it wakes
19	me up over 250 times a night, making it impossible to
20	get rest. I was diagnosed just last year and received a
21	BiPAP machine and went from 30 events down to five, and
22	I'm finally receiving the rest that I desperately needed
23	for years. I did not know I had this condition.
24	I've strived to be a moral person all of my
25	life. These incidents are extremely embarrassing. I

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1	try to belo others whenever pessible. And for me to be
1	try to help others whenever possible. And for me to be
2	involved in incidents such as this, while I take
3	responsibility for my actions, there were contributing
4	factors that definitely were in play for something like
5	this to happen.
6	I apologized to the police officer in person.
7	He's the one that had the charges brought down. I had a
8	destruction of property, assault on a police officer.
9	He's the one that went to the D.A. and asked them to
10	drop those charges after speaking with me and getting
11	the facts.
12	I have nothing else to add at this time.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Bagley?
14	MR. BAGLEY: Yes, sir.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I appreciate your
16	statements. I'll turn it over to questions from the
17	Board. And just so you know, my issue has nothing to do
18	with your medical condition. My issue is time and
19	distance. And your last incident was only two years
20	ago. But we'll see what the rest of the Board feels.
21	Any questions from the Board?
22	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. To
23	the applicant, if you get a card, what do you plan on
24	doing with it?
25	MR. BAGLEY: Well, I plan to become an

outstanding mystery shopper. I have a lot of customer 1 service experience in hotel and limousine. I had an 2 offer from QSI Specialists with Alex. And I plan to do 3 mystery shopping quality assurance. 4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. 5 MR. BAGLEY: You're welcome. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other questions from the Board? 8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member 9 I quess, mine's more of a statement. I'm just a 10 Brown. little worried that both of these charges came upon a 11 decision that you made. Granted, you didn't make a 12 13 proper decision because of lack of sleep. What I'm worried about is if you get into any kind of position 14 15 where you have any type of authority or a weapon, and you make a decision that, yeah, I'll work the overtime 16 shift, and you have another one of these incidents. And 17 that's my concern. 18 MR. BAGLEY: I can understand your concern, 19 20 sir. And as far as --21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Bagley? MR. BAGLEY: -- the mystery shopping, I don't 22 think it's the same as security or --23 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Bagley? Mr. Bagley. 2.5 That was a statement. It wasn't a question.

1	MR. BAGLEY: Oh, I'm sorry.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's okay.
3	All right. Any other questions or statements
4	from the Board?
5	All right. I'll entertain a motion.
6	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I
7	can make a motion.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
9	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion that we
10	deny
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The appeal.
12	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you. Thank you.
13	We deny the appeal for Mr. Bagley.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
15	Do I have a second?
16	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any further
18	discussion from the Board?
19	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
20	in favor of the motion, state "aye."
21	(Board members said "aye.")
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any opposed,
23	state "nay."
24	All right. Hearing none, motion carried.
25	Mr. Bagley, you can reapply within a year. And I can

1	only speak for myself. That would be more time and
2	distance. I might be more apt to change my views.
3	Thank you for your time.
4	MR. BAGLEY: That would be the first time.
5	Thank you for your time. Have a good day.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 114,
7	Kevin Martinez? Number 114, Kevin Martinez?
8	All right. I will trail that one.
9	Number 115, Donald Williams?
10	MR. WILLIAMS: Donald Williams here.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Good
12	morning, Mr. Williams. Do you realize you're under
13	oath?
14	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to turn
16	it over to the investigator.
17	MR. JONES: Thank you, sir. Investigator
18	Jones. The applicant applied in December of 2019, where
19	he was denied for the arrest in 2013, which began as a
20	felony and was reduced. It started off as a child
21	cruelty, possession of marijuana for sale, and receiving
22	known stolen property. This was reduced to a
23	misdemeanor carrying concealed firearms. They did
24	disclose this, and they did provide court documents.
25	Previously, before that, the applicant was

1	arrested for two counts of commercial burglary in
2	November of 1995, which they did disclose as well.
3	And then, in 2000, there was a warrant issued
4	for this burglary. The fingerprint report does not
5	indicate the status of that warrant.
6	The applicant was, had applied before, in late
7	December of 2016, and was denied. So the applicant has
8	reapplied in 2019 and is appealing this decision again.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
10	All right. Mr. Williams, why don't you tell us
11	about the criminal history. And then I'm real curious
12	about the child endangerment charge that was pled to a
13	different one.
14	MR. WILLIAMS: Okay. With the commercial
15	burglary, I was, you know, at the store buying stuff and
16	giving receipts to another guy, and he was going back in
17	and trying to steal the stuff and, you know, regain the
18	money. And I got caught doing that. That was a big
19	mistake on my part.
20	And the arrest in 2013, with the child
21	endangerment, there was no endangerment to my child, but
22	they found a weapon in the top of the closet, and in the
23	report they said that my son was holding the weapon in
24	his hand or jumping on the bed. And at the time, I was
25	outside the dwelling. And the police went inside and

1	found the gun on the bed, or he threw it on the bed and
2	said that my son was near it.
3	And I went through all the court proceedings.
4	The family, father and child program, the drug programs,
5	I did everything the courts needed me to do to rectify
6	the situation. And I got my children back in record
7	time. They said it was the quickest they ever seen.
8	Within six months, I had my children back.
9	And I decided to move to Las Vegas to get away
10	from that lifestyle. And I've been living a productive
11	life here in Vegas. My credit score is going up. I'm
12	paying all the creditors I owe. I joined the church,
13	Victory Outreach of Las Vegas. We feed the homeless in
14	the winter with chili and cornbread and give out
15	blankets and prayer and things like that.
16	So I've changed my whole life around
17	completely. I work two jobs. I donate plasma. I do
18	whatever I can to stay on the positive side of the law
19	these days.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you. And I am
21	familiar with your church, and they do a lot of good
22	work here in town.
23	MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah. I have my own car.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What are you doing for a
25	job now?

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1	MR. WILLIAMS: For a job, I work at a company
2	called Secure Source. I've been working there for three
3	years. All my reviews are 4.5 and higher. I've never
4	missed a day of work. I have my own car.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what do you do for
6	them?
7	MR. WILLIAMS: I'm a guardsman. I'm a private
8	guardsman for Las Vegas Paving and Aggregate.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Thank
10	you.
11	Any questions from the Board?
12	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Board Member Gronauer.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
14	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What is a guardsman for
15	Las Vegas Paving, what does that entail? I don't
16	understand. Is that
17	MR. WILLIAMS: I just guard equipment. You
18	know, when they have like million-dollar equipment
19	that's out on the side of the freeway or something, or
20	also in the mountains somewhere, we just go out there
21	and watch it.
22	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. This is a
23	question for Mr. Ingram.
24	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Kevin, maybe I'm

1 confused. But does a guardsman guarding the equipment 2 out there for a private company, do they have to have a 3 card?

MR. INGRAM: In depends on how they're hired. If they're hired as an actual employee of the company, and their duties are to guard that equipment, then they don't fall under NRS 648 or NAC 648. If they are hired as an independent contractor to do that, then, yes, they would be required to be licensed.

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Well, he said he's working for Securitas, or whomever. And I'm just trying to figure out how that all plays into this here. And that's what I'm asking.

MR. INGRAM: So I would ask the applicant, you know, is the company that you're currently employed for, are they part of Las Vegas Paving, or does Las Vegas Paving hire this company to provide those services? MR. WILLIAMS: They're part of Las Vegas

19 Paving. They're based out of Arizona.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What's the name of that 21 company?

22 MR. WILLIAMS: Secure Source. I don't know the 23 details. A church member, because when I needed a job, 24 he introduced me to the lady. And she just gave me the 25 job, and she has me, you know, watch equipment here and

1 there. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Hold on. 2 To the applicant again, who gives you the paycheck, 3 where does your paycheck come from? 4 MR. WILLIAMS: My paycheck comes from Secure 5 Source. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I'm with you, 8 Bobby. I have an issue. 9 Mr. Williams, we're going to have to look into 10 this further. 11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I think, we have 12 to trail, put it someplace else or try it another time. 13 I don't know. But I can't even deal with this one right 14 15 now. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, and neither can I. 16 Let me explain to the applicant. 17 Sir, there may be a question that this company 18 is operating improperly in the state of Nevada. And 19 20 that would affect your employment with it, on your 21 application for the card. So what Commissioner Gronauer is asking is that we trail this, allowing staff and PILB 22 to take a look. I mean we're going to be here for 23 eight, nine hours. We'll be able to give you a 24 2.5 decision. If I was to have to move forward right now, I

1	
1	would deny this.
2	MR. WILLIAMS: I did, I did something wrong?
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll tell you what, do
4	you want to come back in about 1:00 o'clock?
5	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Director
7	Ingram, that's like four hours. Hopefully, somebody
8	from your staff can track this down and see what the
9	deal is.
10	MR. INGRAM: Actually working on it right now
11	as we speak, sir.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So, Mr. Williams,
13	I appreciate your patience. And why don't you just call
14	back in at 1:00 o'clock, and we'll hear you again.
15	MR. WILLIAMS: Okay, sir. Thank you.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.
17	All right. Number 116, William Landreth. Are
18	you here, sir? Number 116, William Landreth?
19	All right. I'm going to trail this one.
20	Number 117, Royale Brown?
21	MR. BROWN: I'm here. How are you doing, sir?
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm doing good. Thank
23	you, sir. Do you realize you're under oath?
24	MR. BROWN: Yes, I do.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to turn

1	this over to the investigator.
2	MR. BROWN: All right.
3	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. 2005, out
4	of New York, the applicant was charged with misdemeanor
5	DUI. Disposition showed three years probation. It was
6	disclosed on the application.
7	2010, also out of New York, another DUI at
8	felony level. Disposition showed five years probation
9	and 16 weeks jail. This was also disclosed.
10	The applicant disclosed the arrest conviction
11	and was not made provisional. This was confirmed with
12	the fingerprint report.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
14	All right. Sir, do you want to explain your
15	DUIs?
16	MR. BROWN: Well, they're pretty much, yeah,
17	these, I would, I would classify these as just, you
18	know, as reported. They happened, you know, within I
19	mean the first one was just I would just classify
20	them as isolated, unfortunate isolated incidents that
21	and not, I would not, and not I wouldn't if you
22	would, you know, I don't, I don't think they they
23	don't reflect, they're not a reflection of my personal
24	character or the type of yeah, like I was saying,
25	just isolated, unfortunate incidents. I don't know.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Can you explain why the arrest in 2010 made it a felony? Did you injure 2 somebody? 3 MR. BROWN: No, nobody was injured. These 4 were -- I think, it was because of the multity, the 5 number of incidents that happened. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. MR. BROWN: They were actually, they weren't 8 They were actually classed as DWIs, driving while 9 DU. intoxicated. I think, it might have been the nature of 10 the -- maybe my BAC level. Or just I'm not sure 11 exactly. You know, I quess, the first one, okay, that 12 13 was the lenient. That was the misdemeanor. That was 14 my, I would call it a slap on the wrist. But then, you know, when I got, when I went ahead and when I did the 15 same thing in 2010, then that's when it, you know, 16 because that's when it was, it became more of a serious 17 offense, so. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you have a 19 20 driver's license right now? 21 MR. BROWN: No, it's not, not -- I'm still tied up with -- in Albany. But New York state, they're 22 not -- well, I have, I have written appeals to -- so 23 that I could, because there's a hold placed on my 24 driver's record from New York state. 2.5

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
2	doing for employment now?
3	MR. BROWN: I'm self-employed right now. I
4	have, over the past, you know, three, four, five years,
5	I've been doing various, you know, some various, yeah,
6	I've been on various different payrolls. You know, I've
7	worked at Walmart Super Center, worked for, you know,
8	other retail outlets. And I've also done I'm a
9	basketball school trainer for a company called
10	Lab Works. But, yeah, just.
11	And, currently, right now, I'm just, I'm trying
12	to do my own thing with like kind of self-employed with
13	Allow Me Services. It's my own, my personal company
14	where I just perform, you know, various services,
15	miscellaneous services that, you know, kind of like odd
16	jobs. Because I'm fairly good, I'm pretty good with my
17	hands. So, yeah, I'm trying to, yeah, I just do
18	contract work right now.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
20	And just so you know, I'm aware that the last time you
21	were arrested was over 10 years ago. So I'm going to
22	turn it over to the Board, if they have got any
23	questions for you.
24	Any questions from the Board?
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes. So this is Nixon.

1	This is for the investigator. Quick question. He said
2	his license is held up in New York. Is everything taken
3	care of with his probation and paying off of fines, jail
4	time, is all of that closed out?
5	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. As far as
6	I'm aware, ma'am, yes. But I would just like to clarify
7	something with reference to the felony 2010. According
8	to the fingerprint report, the reason why that was a
9	felony level DU, DWI was because he'd had a previous
10	conviction of the designated offense within a 10-year
11	period.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
13	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And, Tammy, just an FYI,
15	some states require you to go through a process as well
16	as classes.
17	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And in some states, you
19	have to take the driving test to get your driver's
20	license back. And that might be the issue with him
21	living here and trying to get his New York license.
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I see. Okay. Thank you.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from
24	the Board?
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member

Gronauer. To the applicant, what do you plan on doing 1 with a card? 2 3 MR. BROWN: I would like to start trying to apply for different security, security officer position. 4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'm fine. 5 MR. BROWN: In Henderson or Vegas, or Vegas or 6 7 Henderson. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good. Thank you. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other 9 questions from the Board? 10 All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a 11 motion. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we grant the appeal for Mr. Royale Brown. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 15 Do I have a second? 16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a 18 motion and a second. Any further discussion? 19 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those 20 21 in favor, state "aye." (Board members said "aye.") 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries. 23 24 Congratulations, Mr. Brown. You have a good day. Thank you. Yes, I appreciate it. 2.5 MR. BROWN:

BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 118, 1 2 Trayana Jordan? 3 MS. JORDAN: Trayana Jordan. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good morning, 4 ma'am. 5 MS. JORDAN: Good morning. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you realize you're under oath? 8 MS. JORDAN: Yes, sir. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn it over 10 11 to the investigator. MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2013, 12 13 state of Nevada, the applicant was charged with larceny from a person, to the amount of \$3,500. This was at 14 felony level. Disposition showed a minimum of 12 15 months, maximum of 32 months suspended sentence and 36 16 months probation. This was disclosed, and we do have 17 court docs. 18 Also in 2013, state of Nevada, resist a public 19 20 official, at misdemeanor level. Disposition showed classes and a fine. And this was disclosed. 21 The applicant disclosed the arrests on the 22 application and was not made provisional. She was 23 denied 4-22 of 2020. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Jordan, tell 25

1	us what happened, please.
2	MS. JORDAN: Okay. So the resisting the
3	officer, that was actually the first charge I had ever
4	caught, 18 years old, was having a little domestic
5	dispute with a boyfriend of mine. It was my first time
6	ever, you know, being in trouble with the law. I was
7	18, kind of freaked out, and they arrested me.
8	I was supposed to stay out of the trouble.
9	Unfortunately, I didn't, and that's when I caught the
10	case for the larceny from the person. I was out in a
11	public place. I did come across some belongings that
12	were not mine. I did take them. And instead of turning
13	them in, which I should have, I took them. I was caught
14	with that possession, and I was arrested for it. And I
15	had to suffer the consequences for that, unfortunately.
16	I was placed on probation. And that was
17	revoked. Which that got me sent to Nevada Department of
18	Corrections. I went in with credit time served,
19	finished out my case, came home on a closed case, no
20	parole or anything. Which that was in 2015.
21	And since then, I have become a mother. Like I
22	said, I was 19 years old when I caught that case. I'm
23	now 26. I'm a mother of three kids, trying to do the
24	best that I can by my children and live my life without
25	any trouble. I haven't had any trouble since then, not

even a ticket. I've worked several jobs, holding those 1 down, and just trying to do right by my life and my 2 children. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. 4 Any questions from the Board? 5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: To the applicant. 8 You said you found property. This says larceny from a 9 person. It's a little different than finding a property 10 just laying around somewhere. So why is it larceny from 11 12 a person? 13 MS. JORDAN: Because that was the charge ended 14 up being. That's what they dropped it down to. 15 Initially, it was robbery and conspiracy. Because when I took the wallet, she had suspicion that it was me, 16 because she did see me go into the bathroom. When she 17 asked to check my property, I told her no, and I 18 proceeded to leave. So maybe that's why. But I didn't 19 20 physically take anything from anyone. 21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Originally, it was robbery? 22 23 MS. JORDAN: That was the original charge. 24 When I first got arrested, they did charge me with 2.5 robbery and conspiracy. But it was dropped because I

1	didn't rob her, or, you know, I didn't conspiracy. I
2	took it out of a public restroom. And they told me that
3	by law, I'm supposed to try to return someone's property
4	instead of taking it.
5	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And then you
6	said your probation was revoked. Why did that happen?
7	MS. JORDAN: Because I didn't check in with my
8	probation officer. I had missed the call. And they put
9	out a warrant for me. And when I went to court, they
10	revoked it, they didn't reinstate it.
11	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And how much time did
12	you do?
13	MS. JORDAN: In Nevada Department of
14	Corrections?
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes.
16	MS. JORDAN: About 10 months, 9 or 10 months.
17	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.
18	MS. JORDAN: M-hm (affirmative).
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
20	questions from the Board?
21	Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.
22	Call for a motion a second time.
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Sorry. This is Board
24	Member Nixon. Due to time and distance or, so you
25	got out or, Investigator, she got out in 2016?

MS. JORDAN: '15. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Maxwell? 3 MR. MAXWELL: Yes. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: She asked you a 4 5 question. MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. I'm just checking the 6 7 notes. If you just got me a second, sir. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 8 MR. MAXWELL: It looks like January of 2015. 9 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So the original 10 incident happened in '13, and then she spent, or between 11 probation and time, it was done in 2015? 12 13 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, ma'am. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you. 14 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Still waiting on a motion. 16 I don't have a motion. Mr. Detmer, does this 17 automatically mean that the appeal's denied? 18 MR. DETMER: Good morning, Chairman. Mike 19 20 Detmer, for the record. I've actually never had this 21 happen before. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman? 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, then, I 23 will make a motion, and we'll see what happens, just to 24 2.5 move it along.

1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman?
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah?
3	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll
4	make it easer for all of yous. Okay? I'll make the
5	motion. Is that okay?
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'd like to make a
8	motion to deny the appeal.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
10	to deny the appeal. Do I have a second?
11	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
13	motion. I have a second. Any discussion on the motion?
14	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
15	All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
16	(Board members said "aye.")
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed, state
18	"nay."
19	Okay. Motion carries. Ms. Jordan, you can
20	reapply in a year. Thank you for your time.
21	MS. JORDAN: Thank you.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 119, Elmer
23	Moore. Mr. Moore, are you here?
24	MR. MOORE: Yes, I am.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize

1	you're under oath, sir?
2	MR. MOORE: Yes.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn this
4	over to the investigator.
5	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
7	MR. MAXWELL: In 2015, state of Nevada, the
8	applicant was charged with coercion nonsexual. This was
9	at the felony level. It was disclosed. And we do have
10	court documentation. The disposition showed a maximum
11	of 36 months, minimum of 12 months in the Nevada State
12	Prison, which was suspended, 36 months probation and a
13	hundred hours community service. The applicant
14	disclosed the arrest and was not made provisional. The
15	arrest happened after the issue of the applicant's first
16	work card, which expired in 3-27 of this year. The
17	arrest was confirmed with the fingerprint report and
18	court documents. He was denied 3-23-2020.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
20	Mr. Moore, tell us about the coercion charge.
21	MR. MOORE: 2015, I moved out here, started
22	working. My mother-in-law was homeless in California.
23	So I moved her out here with me. They had a little, a
24	little daughter. And I kept telling them not to have
25	her wear a T-shirt and her panties around the house.

1	And we got into it. And I kicked them out. And then
2	about five hours later, the police was at my house,
3	arrested me for touching her. Which I didn't.
4	And I was in jail. Losing my house, my kids
5	was going to go homeless. So I took a plea deal to get
6	out to make sure my kids wasn't homeless. So I had to
7	choose my life over theirs. So I messed up my life to
8	make sure they had a good life. And I'm not looking
9	back from it, just keep moving forward.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And you did time for
11	this?
12	MR. MOORE: I stayed in jail for two months.
13	And I got out, did my hundred hours of probation, I mean
14	my hundred hours of community service. I did probation
15	for two years, but I got out early on probation for good
16	behavior for a year. And I just haven't looked back
17	since. And I just, I learned how to just do my life and
18	just don't try to help nobody.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So you were a
20	security officer before all this happened. What are you
21	doing now for employment?
22	MR. MOORE: I'm doing scheduling for a temp
23	agent right now. And so I'm trying to get my guard card
24	back, because my old previous company, so they're
25	holding my position until I get my guard card back. And

1	so I can't do nothing until I get this. And I'm not
2	trying to mess up nothing. So I'm doing the proper
3	steps.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
5	Any other questions from the Board?
6	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.
8	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Where's the
9	coercion? I'm just, I'm lost. I'm lost with
10	MR. MOORE: That was the plea, that was the
11	plea deal.
12	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's okay. What
13	MR. MOORE: Go ahead.
14	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What was the original
15	charge?
16	MR. MOORE: Pled to the minor under 16. And
17	whatever that is, I never went to jail. But I know I
18	didn't touch nobody. So I just took a plea deal to get
19	out so my kids won't be homeless, because I was losing
20	my place. So they hit me with the nonconsensual
21	coercion.
22	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right.
23	MR. MOORE: I did probation. If I messed up,
24	I'd get three to five years in jail.
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

For the investigator, Mr. Maxwell. 1 MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. 2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. In your 3 notes, when I made my notes, I said maybe you can 4 explain some of this. 5 MR. MAXWELL: M-hm (affirmative). 6 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Anything that you can tell me about this? 8 MR. MAXWELL: Okay, sir. So the charge, the 9 first charge was lewdness by a person over 18 with a 10 child less than 14. But the courts, the court's final 11 charge was coercion with force or threat of force. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. I 14 just needed that explained. I appreciate it. Thank 15 you. MR. MAXWELL: You're welcome. 16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No more questions, sir. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other 18 questions from the Board? 19 20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So for the investigator, I 21 just want to make sure I understand the notes. He had a quard card before. This probably happened during the 22 time that he had an active guard card. When he went to 23 renew, that's when we found out about it, and he was 24 denied at that time? 2.5

1	MR. MAXWELL: Yes, ma'am, that is correct.
2	When he came to renew his guard card, he disclosed it on
3	the application, and that's when we denied it.
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, so he did disclose.
5	Okay. All right. Thank you.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
7	questions?
8	All right. I'm seeking a motion.
9	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
11	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm going to time
12	and distance on this one. And it's a complicated
13	really, for where it started. I have to make a motion
14	to deny the appeal.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
16	to deny. Do I have a second?
17	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
19	motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?
20	Okay. All in favor of the motion, state "aye."
21	(Board members said "aye.")
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
23	Mr. Moore, you can reapply in a year, sir. You have a
24	good day. Thank you for your time.
25	MR. MOORE: Thank you.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 120,
2	Anthony Rocco? Number 120, Anthony Rocco?
3	All right. I'm going to go back to the other
4	ones that we're trailing, so we can close out this part
5	of the agenda and move on.
6	Number 110, Geron Funches, are you here?
7	MR. ROBERTS: Excuse me. I'm sorry to
8	interrupt. My name is Tijuan. Did you call Tijuan
9	Robertson yet?
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What number are you,
11	sir?
12	MR. ROBERTSON: 65880.
13	MR. INGRAM: His item, agenda item 126 has not
14	been called yet.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, you'll be in the
16	next hour, sir. You'll be in the next hour.
17	MR. ROBERTSON: The next hour?
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yep.
19	MR. ROBERTSON: Okay. Thank you.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
21	Calling Geron Funches last time.
22	All right. I will entertain a motion.
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a
24	motion. I'm sorry if I stepped on somebody.
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Go ahead.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, Bobby.
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I make a motion
3	to deny the appeal for Geron Funches.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
5	Do I have a second?
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any discussion?
8	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
9	in favor of the motion, say "aye."
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	MS. HAWKINS: Hello. May I interject, please?

14	is Chyna Hawkins. If I'm not mistaken, I have a meeting
15	with you all. Good morning, by the way.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ma'am, you're
17	MS. HAWKINS: My number is
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ma'am? Ma'am?
19	MS. HAWKINS: Yes?
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're interrupting a
20	proceeding. Wait till we're done. And then we will
	take your question. Okay. You're in the middle of a
22	
23 24	hearing. MS. HAWKINS: Okay. Thank you.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Place your

1	phone on mute, please. Thank you.
2	All right. Number 114, Kevin Martinez.
3	Mr. Martinez, are you here? Call second time,
4	Mr. Martinez?
5	Okay. I'll entertain a motion.
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we
7	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, Tammy.
9	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
10	that we uphold the denial of Mr. Kevin Martinez.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
12	Do I have a second?
13	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
15	I have a second. Any discussion?
16	Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All
17	those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
18	(Board members said "aye.")
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
20	Number 116, William Landreth, are you here?
21	MR. LANDRETH: Yes, I'm right here.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Landreth, do
23	you realize you're under oath?
24	MR. LANDRETH: Yes, I do.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn this

1 over to the investigator. MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The 2 applicant was denied for a felony assault with a deadly 3 weapon not a firearm, out of California, in 2012. This 4 was a felony. The court documents show he was convicted 5 and placed on three years formal probation. The 6 7 applicant stated on his application this was as a weapon charge and said that he got some of his things stolen. 8 The court documents show it was a felony conviction, and 9 he received three years probation and 24 actual days in 10 11 jail. In 2007, out of California, there was a 12 13 conviction for carry concealed dirk or dagger. This charge in California in a wobbler, meaning depending on 14 the disposition of it, it can be charged as a felony for 15 a misdemeanor. He did receive three years probation, 16 which was terminated, and the applicant received a year 17 jail time. 18 In 1984, out of California, there was a mail 19 20 fraud, slash, wire fraud, which was charged as a 21 misdemeanor, where he received three years probation and a \$5,000 fine. The applicant did list it and wrote it 22 down as wire fraud and stated he paid \$87 in 23 restitution. The fingerprint report shows three years 24 probation, which ended up being extended two more. 2.5 Ιt

1	doesn't state why it was extended.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
3	All right. Mr. Landreth, do you want to
4	explain your arrests, please?
5	MR. LANDRETH: Yes. Well, at first, the first
6	one was computer, being into computers in 1984. And the
7	FBI had raided a whole bunch of people around the
8	country, including me. And I don't know. I don't
9	really think I wanted to defend myself. And my
10	father said, no, that wouldn't really be acceptable.
11	And so I ended up taking a plea on one of the three
12	charges. Because they had three charges. And one of
13	the three, which I just pled guilty to whatever one they
14	wanted to. And it was an \$87 charge. That's what they
15	charged me in restitution for it. And that was in '84,
16	or '85 actually. It was '84. It was actually October
17	'83 when that, yeah, was at my house. But it was about
18	nine months later when I actually went to court on it.
19	Okay. And the other ones, and both of them,
20	basically, are false arrest charges. I mean I was in my
21	own place in Los Angeles when I had a place at the
22	Ballington Plaza. And there was like some noise
23	complaints or something. And these people were just
24	banging on my door, and I would open the door. And then
25	one time when I opened the door, I walked out and there

were police pointing guns at me. 1 2 And they ended up arresting me and, also, physically abusing me and accusing me of, at first, to 3 me anyway, in my room, they were saying they were going 4 to find drugs in my room and they were going to hang me 5 on drugs. But I wasn't really doing any drugs at all. 6 7 And, but they did find a carving knife. You know, I had other knives in my room. But I got the carving knife 8 from a food processor I had brought. It came with the 9 food processor that I had bought. And it was just 10 basically a really -- I mean the cops that arrested me 11 were all on speed, and they were really like violent and 12 13 angry at something. And, well, I ended up being homeless. And when 14 I was homeless, I was going up to Seattle. And I ended 15 up going out to Hawaii. And then I came back from 16 Hawaii. And I was in Santa Barbara for this last charge 17 18 here. This quy, John Tomlin, I think, he said his 19 20 name was, was like, had stolen my blankets and all my 21 stuff like 11 days previously. And I come up to my place, just coming up to Halloween, I remember, because 22 I was at this Halloween party at the Alano Club. And I 23 was coming up to my stuff right there on East Beach near 24 the Carillo, back out there. And they were going 2.5

1	through my stuff. They like had it all spread out, and
2	they were all looking through it and picking out what
3	they wanted and stuff. And I got really mad and said,
4	"Who the hell is taking my stuff again?" And they
5	jumped me. And I got away from it, called 9-1-1,
6	flagged down the police. And then I was the only one
7	who was arrested. And they accused me of
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Landreth,
9	what are you doing for employment these days?
10	MR. LANDRETH: Oh, I'm working with
11	Contemporary Services Corporation here in Los Angeles.
12	And they're the ones who wanted me to get the PILB card
13	for when they occasionally have a job coming down in
14	Las Vegas.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So they want
16	you to be a private investigator?
17	MR. LANDRETH: No, no, not a private
18	investigator, just a security guard, unarmed security
19	guard.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
21	Any other questions from the Board?
22	Okay. I'll call for a motion.
23	I'll call for a motion a second time.
24	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. This is
25	Gronauer.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion that we
3	deny the appeal.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
5	Do I have a second?
6	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a motion.
8	We have a second. Okay. Any further discussion?
9	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
10	All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
11	(Board members said "aye.")
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
13	Mr. Landreth, you can reapply in a year. Good luck to
14	you, sir. Have a good day.
15	MR. LANDRETH: Okay. Thank you.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The last one
17	trailing, Anthony Rocco? Anthony Rocco?
18	Okay. I'll call for a motion.
19	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to
20	uphold the denial.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
22	Do I have a second?
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. A motion and
25	second. Any further discussion?

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1	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
2	All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
3	(Board members said "aye.")
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
5	All right. Mr. Ingram.
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Chairman?
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Just for future
8	reference.
9	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: It took us 75 minutes to
11	hear 12 cases. And you know I cut off extended
12	testimony, a couple of them, and some trailed. So use
13	that for future reference putting agendas together.
14	MR. INGRAM: Absolutely.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Because there's no way,
16	I think, we're going to get through all these today.
17	There's just way too many. And we have to let them
18	speak.
19	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: As well as discussion
21	from the Board.
22	All right. If no one has any issues, I'm going
23	to call for a five-minute bio break. And we'll come
24	back on at 10:30. I'm going to go to mute.
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.

MR. INGRAM: Everyone, please stand by. 1 The 2 Board is on a short five-minute break, and they will 3 resume shortly. \* \* \* \* \* 4 (A break was taken, 10:24 to 10:30 a.m.) 5 \* \* \* \* \* 6 7 MR. INGRAM: So we will be starting with item number 121. These are the individuals that were told to 8 call in at 9:00 a.m. this morning. So at this time, we 9 will have items number 121 through 141 on the call. 10 So we'll have two different hours that are currently coming 11 Would you like me to go ahead and take roll call, 12 up. 13 sir? BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. 14 MR. INGRAM: Okay. So we have Chairman Flynn. 15 Board Member Brown? 16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Here. 17 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Gronauer? 18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Here. 19 20 MR. INGRAM: Board Member Nixon? 21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here. Legal, Michael Detmer? MR. INGRAM: 22 MR. DETMER: Present. 23 24 MR. INGRAM: And Shannon Taylor? THE REPORTER: Present. 2.5

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1	MR. INGRAM: Okay. We're good to go, sir.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Do we need
3	to swear anybody in, or?
4	MR. INGRAM: I think, we should probably swear
5	everybody in at this time.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Detmer, it's
7	all yours.
8	MR. DETMER: It would be my pleasure.
9	For those who are about to testify, do you
10	hereby swear or affirm to tell the truth, the whole
11	truth, and nothing but the truth?
12	(Applicants and witnesses present were
13	sworn/affirmed.)
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Do
15	you want to update us on number 115, Mr. Ingram?
16	MR. INGRAM: Sure, I'd be happy to. After
17	investigation, we have uncovered that this individual
18	who testified, the company Secure Source is not licensed
19	in Nevada. We contacted the company and have confirmed
20	that they are providing services in Nevada. And we are
21	following up with a complete investigation and will be
22	moving forward with that here in the next day or so.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So do we want
24	to what's the best way to proceed with Mr. Williams?
25	Do we want to put him on hold, or do we want to hear him

1	at 1:00 o'clock?
2	MR. INGRAM: That's entirely up to the Board.
3	Mr. Williams, being employed by an unlicensed company,
4	you know, if the Board perceives his employment as him
5	being misled and being able to work for the company
6	legitimately in Nevada, the Board could find in that
7	favor. The Board could also find that, you know, he is
8	part of an an unlicensed activity operation in Nevada
9	and could potentially deny his appeal for that as well.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. For the sake
11	of discussion, I'll just throw it out to the Board. I
12	have no issue hearing from him on the status of his
13	card. The fact that the company's unlicensed, and
14	especially at his level of employment, I think, that
15	would be out of his decision-making. So I have no issue
16	hearing him at 1:00 o'clock. Because I felt he had time
17	and distance. But, you know, I'm only one person of
18	four.
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
20	Nixon.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Go ahead.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead, Tammy.
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I agree with you.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Bobby, you wanted
25	to weigh in?

1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I'm on the same
2	page. I have no problem when it's not his fault. He's
3	just got a job and he's happy.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Then,
5	we'll hear him when he calls in at 1:00. And if by
6	chance he calls in a little earlier, Kevin, we'll make
7	sure to put him on.
8	MR. INGRAM: Sounds good. Thank you, sir.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Without any
10	further without any further to-do, number 121, Brent
11	Wheeler, are you here, sir?
12	MR. WHEELER: Yes, sir, here.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize
14	you're under oath?
15	MR. WHEELER: Yes, sir.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll turn to
17	it over to the investigator.
18	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Saladino.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is he in the office with
20	you?
21	MR. INGRAM: Each one of us are in our own
22	office, sir. Let me see if his phone is not connecting.
23	MR. SALADINO: I'm here. I had a headset
24	issue. Sorry about that.
25	MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thanks.

1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Go ahead, Vinny. 2 It's all yours. MR. SALADINO: Okay. We're on Mr. Wheeler, 3 correct? 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, number 121. 5 MR. SALADINO: All right. Mr. Wheeler was 6 7 denied for a 2009 felony battery with serious bodily injury. The applicant was convicted, with three years 8 probation, two years suspended prison sentence, and a 9 The applicant disclosed the arrest and was 10 fine. sentenced to two years in prison, but it was suspended. 11 He was placed on three years probation with conditions 12 13 that he serve 90 days in jail, pay restitution and 14 complete anger management classes. On March 9th of 2012, the applicant -- the 15 applicant committed to pay restitution in the amount of 16 \$130 per month. The total restitution amount was 17 \$84,681.48. This is what caused the applicant's 18 probation to be extended to 12-2 of 2014. 19 20 The applicant did complete all of his terms for 21 probation. He subsequently was denied for his California repo license or work card. However, he 22 appealed that and was granted, after serving three years 23 of probation for the Bureau of Security Investigation 24 They concluded on July 16th of 2019. He did 2.5 Services.

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1	disclose the arrest and provided court documents, along
2	with his BSI appeal and the information from the hearing
3	where he was granted his work card for repossession in
4	California.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. all right.
6	Mr. Wheeler, I'm aware that this occurred in '09. And
7	I'm also aware that you disclosed, which I appreciate.
8	Tell us the circumstances behind the battery with
9	serious harm.
10	MR. WHEELER: Yes, sir. Well, it actually
11	happened in 2005. We went to I was in court for four
12	to five years, you know, fighting it. So it happened on
13	December 23rd. A couple and a girlfriend of mine had
14	gone out for dinner and drinks. And when we were
15	leaving the bar, my friend's wife had gone up to the bar
16	to pay the bill, and we were kind of standing bank at
17	the door. And she encountered another customer at the
18	bar who was intoxicated and putting his hands on her and
19	whispering in her ear and stuff. So I noticed that
20	standing from the door. So I approached and kind of
21	just put my back to him and kind of went in between just
22	to let him know that, you know, she was there with
23	somebody. So he proceeded to grab my shoulder and turn
24	me around and face him and said, you know, "What the F
25	are you doing?" And I said, "Well, this is my friend,

1	and we're paying our bill, and we're leaving," and I
2	turned back around. And he grabbed me again and spun me
3	around, said, "No, that ain't right, man. What are you
4	doing? Do you want to fight?" or whatever, whatever his
5	accusation was, and said, "No, no." I turned around,
6	and he grabbed me one more time a little more
7	aggressively and said, "No, I'm going to F you up." And
8	at that point, I struck him three times.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And did he go to
10	the hospital?
11	MR. WHEELER: Yes, he did.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Was he in a
13	coma?
14	MR. WHEELER: No, sir. No.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What was the serious
16	injury?
17	MR. WHEELER: A broken nose.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any
19	other trouble with the police since then?

13	Hawkins, are you here, ma'am?

18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to turn

20	MR. SALADINO: The applicant was this is
21	Investigator Saladino. The applicant was denied for a
22	2014 attempted robbery, out of California, which was a
23	felony level. She was found guilty, three years of
24	probation. And this was dismissed under 1203.4. The
25	applicant did disclose and provided the California

1	dismissal paperwork showing that the felony conviction
2	was dismissed under 1203.4.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
4	Ms. Hawkins, I appreciate your honesty in disclosing.
5	Please tell us about what happened with this robbery.
6	MS. HAWKINS: So, you know, I really do have a
7	problem with the fact that they put robbery. The reason
8	why I have a problem with that is because the gentleman
9	that assaulted me only called the Los Angeles police
10	department because he knew that he was wrong. So I was
11	incriminated because of his false portrayals.
12	So the issue that I have with this gentleman is
13	that, you know, me, being in a store, I was with, you
14	know, other people, and, you know, I saw him physically
15	assaulting a woman. And because, you know, this woman,
16	you know, she was African American. I know these are
17	like, oh, don't make it about race. But I understand,
18	as a young woman, at the age and at the time, that I
19	have been a victim to, you know, racism and
20	discrimination. So what I do not like, because I have
21	been a victim to domestic violence, is men putting their
22	hands on women. I am totally against that.
23	So with me trying to stop the man, I'm like,
24	"Hey, excuse me." Like, you know, and what he did
25	instantly was swing at me.

1	So it ended up in the altercation. And instead
2	of me calling the authorities, it's something that he
3	took upon himself. So with him calling
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ms. Hawkins?
5	Ms. Hawkins?
6	MS. HAWKINS: Okay.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Was the person here, was
8	that person the store owner or store employee?
9	MS. HAWKINS: Actually, he was like a secret
10	shopper. And that's why I'm like, "Well, I didn't take
11	anything. So how are you guys disclosing that, you
12	know, this is a robbery?" I could see if I walked into
13	the store with a gun and say, "Hey, give me everything
14	in the register." That's something that did not happen.
15	So that's why I say it was fault on his behalf.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The person that he was
17	arguing with, was that person involved in the
18	shoplifting incident?
19	MS. HAWKINS: No, I wasn't with the person. I
20	saw him antagonizing the person.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I didn't ask that. I
22	said, do you know what the circumstances were between
23	him and the woman, before you got involved?
24	MS. HAWKINS: No, just the fact that
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. You

1 answered. 2 MS. HAWKINS: -- I saw him putting his hands on 3 the woman. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you. 4 What are you doing now for employment? 5 MS. HAWKINS: Oh, I thought I was able to 6 7 explain all these things. Okay. Well, right now, since Covid --8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I have --9 MS. HAWKINS: No, no, I completely understand. 10 Nobody wants to hear about race. Everybody wants to 11 ignore it. Nobody wants to hear about discrimination. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I did not --14 MS. HAWKINS: I'm just speaking on my behalf 15 because I know I was a victim to this. And the only reason why that I was even convicted was because I had a 16 public defender that did not speak on my behalf. And 17 because I had no type of help on my family's behalf, I 18 was a former foster youth, so I had no additional help. 19 20 I had no one that I could reach out to. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ms. Hawkins. 21 MS. HAWKINS: I'm listening. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Ms. Hawkins. 23 24 MS. HAWKINS: Yes. 25 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I asked you a question.

1	You answered it. And I thanked you.
2	MS. HAWKINS: Oh, okay.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I wanted to know what, I
4	wanted to know what you're doing for employment now, so
5	we understand your background before we make a decision.
6	MS. HAWKINS: Okay. Sorry. I get excited.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You answered that. I
8	let you expand on why you thought it happened. I asked
9	some follow-up questions. You answered them. I made no
10	statements whatsoever. Okay. You're the one that's
11	brought up racism. We've never mentioned that here at
12	all. So I'm asking you a question
13	MS. HAWKINS: No, that's fine.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: for background, is
15	what are you doing now for employment, so I can
16	understand the type of person that's before us now.
17	MS. HAWKINS: Okay. Well, with COVID-19, I
18	really don't have resources as to working right now.
19	But what I did is I reached out to several different
20	type of employment agencies. And I reached out to
21	different type of jobs that I feel like I wouldn't mind
22	doing. Security just happens to come up. Because I see
23	that, you know, with like M.D. or like anything that
24	pops up on these job seeker websites, that a lot of
25	them, you know, include security. So I was like, well,

1	you know what, I never really thought about it, but, you
2	know, I don't mind doing something like that.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. But before Covid
4	happened, what did you do for employment?
5	MS. HAWKINS: I worked various. Rowe. I
6	worked at MGM. And I had, you know, done customer
7	service. I had done fast food. I did a number of
8	things.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
10	MS. HAWKINS: I'm really like a go-getter. So
11	it doesn't really bother me.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.
13	MS. HAWKINS: As long as I can provide for my
14	family.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
16	Let me see if any other members of the Board have
17	questions.
18	Any questions from the Board?
19	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, I
20	think
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hearing none, I'll call
22	for a motion.
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, this is
24	Gronauer. I'd like to make a statement first.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. Yeah, sure.

1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Everybody on, everyone
2	on the line knows, we don't see anybody, we don't have
3	any pictures of anybody on these here, or anything else.
4	We don't know what your race or anything else is. And,
5	actually, we don't really care. What it's about is what
6	we're talking about, is trying to get you back to work
7	and get you a card. That's for everybody to understand
8	that. So I don't know who's who or what's what on
9	there. And I don't think any other Board members know,
10	either. I just wanted to make it clear to everybody on
11	the phone that
12	MS. HAWKINS: Thank you.
13	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: we don't have
14	pictures of them. What we have right now is just what's
15	in front of us, is their history, and they're working on
16	their denial.
17	MS. HAWKINS: Thank you.
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. With that
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Board Member Gronauer,
20	thank you for that. Than you for saying that, because I
21	agree. But I do have a quick question.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Go ahead.
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: For the investigator. So
24	it says found guilty, three years probation, dismissed.
25	When did everything end, when was everything completed,

was it 2017? 1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And that question is for 2 3 the investigator. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes. 4 MR. SALADINO: I'm just, my computer's firing 5 up here for this. The 1203.4 dismissal was filed and 6 7 signed off on December 16th of '19. However, the court proceedings were completed in September 25th of 2017. 8 So she was done with probation September 25th of 2017. 9 And then, two years later, she was able to get the 10 1203.4 expungement. 11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Gotcha. Okay. Thank you. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other 14 questions? All right. I'll entertain a motion. 15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a 16 motion. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. 18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion that we 19 20 grant the appeal for Ms. Chyna Hawkins. 21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. I have a motion. Do I have a second? 22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second. This is Board 23 Member Nixon. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 25

1	I have a second. Any further discussion?
2	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
3	in favor, state "aye."
4	(Board members said "aye.")
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
6	Ms. Hawkins, congratulations. You have a good day.
7	MS. HAWKINS: Oh, God bless you. Thank you.
8	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Excuse me.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 123, Larry
10	Benford, are you here?
11	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Excuse me.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Larry Benford?
13	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: No. I've been here since
14	9:00 o'clock.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, so have I, sir.
16	Larry Benford, are you here?
17	Okay. We're going to trail that one.
18	MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair, Investigator
19	Saladino. Mr. Benford was notified via telephone, mail
20	certified, and email, and we had no response that he was
21	going to attend.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm still going
23	to trail it, as I've done with others. But thank you
24	for letting us know that.
25	All right. Number 124, Tarza Tell?

1	MR. TELL: Yes, I'm here.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Do you
3	realize you're under oath, sir?
4	MR. TELL: Yes.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn it over
6	to the investigator.
7	MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The applicant
8	was arrested in October of 2008, out of the state of
9	California, for first-degree burglary. This was a
10	felony. He served 180 days in jail, five years
11	probation. This was disclosed.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Tell, tell us
13	about the burglary. And I am aware that it was 12 years
14	ago.
15	MR. TELL: Yes. This happened when I was 17.
16	I just had my first kid. It was a boy. Then I was
17	around my high school friends. They weren't the right
18	crowd. So then they caught me six months later at an
19	apartment with my kid. Then I went to jail. And now I
20	have five kids. I have four boys and one girl. And I'm
21	just trying to work and feed my family.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What was the
23	burglary, what did you burglarize?
24	MR. TELL: It was a residential house.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what are you

1	doing for employment these days?
2	MR. TELL: I never actually had a job. I've
3	been on because I never had help as far as
4	parent-wise. So I've been on SSI like my whole life.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So you
6	haven't had a job your whole life?
7	MR. TELL: Yes.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any
9	other questions from the Board?
10	MR. TELL: No.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, no, I'm asking the
12	Board. Thank you, sir. Let's see if they got questions
13	for you.
14	Any questions from the Board?
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.
17	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: To the applicant, are
18	you living in Nevada now?
19	MR. TELL: Yes. I live in Nevada with my
20	family. I live by the Air Force base.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. How long have
22	you lived here?
23	MR. TELL: I've been here for like two and a
24	half, three years.
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That's it.

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1	Thank you.
2	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And this is Board Member
3	Nixon. Have you applied at different locations and, you
4	know, have an offer as of yet?
5	MR. TELL: No. No. No, I don't. The only
6	thing I applied for was the guard card license. That's
7	my first start.
8	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
10	questions?
11	Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.
12	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll move
13	to grant the appeal.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
15	Do I have a second?
16	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
18	I have a second. Any further discussion?
19	Just for the record, we've got time and
20	distance. It was one event. I'm in favor of letting
21	him try to get his first job, so.
22	All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
23	(Board members said "aye.")
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
25	Okay. Motion carries. Congratulations,

1	Mr. Tell. Good luck to you.
2	MR. TELL: Okay.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 125, Ian Hain.
4	MR. HAIN: Yes, sir, this is Ian Hain.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Hain, do you
6	realize you're under oath?
7	MR. HAIN: Yes, I do, sir.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll turn
9	it over to the investigator.
10	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The
11	applicant was arrested in September of 2013 in Nevada
12	for DUI resulting in serious bodily harm. This was at
13	the felony level. The fingerprint report and court
14	documents did not show any disposition. He did disclose
15	it. And we do have court documents. The applicant
16	disclosed that he received two to five years in a
17	correctional facility, and he was released after 15
18	months and completed his parole. The applicant came off
19	paper on January 25th of 2016.
20	In the October 2013, in Nevada, conspiracy to
21	commit burglary, a gross misdemeanor, he did disclose,
22	and we do have court documents. The applicant was
23	sentenced to 364 days in jail to run concurrent with the
24	above-mentioned sentence in arrest 1. His was given 160
25	days credit for time served.

1	In January of 2012, in Nevada, he was arrested
2	for supplying alcohol to minors. This was at
3	misdemeanor level. There was no disposition available
4	on the fingerprint report. And this was not disclosed,
5	and we do not have court docs.
6	The applicant was initially made provisional on
7	6-3 of 2020 and was hired by Martin Ross and Associates,
8	LLC, license number 1245, on 6-15 of 2020. The arrests
9	were confirmed and found on the fingerprint report. He
10	was denied on 7-21 of this year and terminated by Martin
11	Ross and Associates the same day.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
13	Mr. Hain, do you want to discuss your history
14	there?
15	MR. HAIN: Yes, sir. This is Ian Hain. So all
16	that happened. For that January 2012 charge of
17	supplying minors with alcohol, I was actually a minor,
18	and I did not get that charge. I originally we were
19	downtown Reno and ended up getting in a fight. Somebody
20	knocked my friend out. So we got arrested. And, I
21	believe, I was only arrested for minor in consumption
22	for that. That's what my thought was.
23	Currently, I was in the Marine Corps. So when
24	my first sergeant found out that I got arrested, they
25	called the jail and let me get out of jail and go back

to southern California, Camp Pendleton, where I got a 1 page 11. 2 Currently, with what was going on there, I got 3 injured in Afghanistan in January of 2010. And I 4 started having seizures. So I was waiting for over two 5 years to get medically discharged. While my unit went 6 7 on another deployment, I became really hell-bent on alcohol consumption to the point where that's pretty 8 much what I did on a day-to-day basis. 9 And then, September, when I got into that DUI 10 accident, the charge from October was actually -- I 11 don't know why it says October. It was from the day 12 13 before September 1st when I got into my accident. I was going on a weekend binge out in Fernley. And I ended up 14 running into an ex-friend that was causing problems with 15 parents. And we got in a fight in his front yard. So 16 that's the burglary with battery. It later got dropped 17 down to conspiracy to commit burglary when I was going 18 to trial for that while I was in prison. 19 20 I got out of prison for the DUI substantial 21 bodily harm. One of my best friends broke his back. He spoke on my behalf. That's why I got sentenced from two 22 to five. 23 And since then, you know, I've learned. 24 You 2.5 know, I go to meetings. I go to church. I've got a

1	wife now, a son now. I've stayed out of trouble ever
2	since then. I've been trying to find my place in the
3	work force. Most recently, I was doing tow trucking,
4	before Martin Ross. And then I switched to Martin Ross
5	because, with all the hours that I was working as a tow
6	truck driver, I was diagnosed with diabetes, and I
7	couldn't really focus on food and my medicine. So I
8	took an easier job.
9	And then Martin Ross, I got originally got
10	approved and then found out that I have to go through
11	the appeal process. So that's what I'm doing today.
12	And I just want to let you guys know that I appreciate
13	your time, and I really have changed for the better.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Hain, first
15	off, I want to thank you for your service to our country
16	and as well as the sacrifice that you gave. And I
17	appreciate your comments and your honesty and what
18	you've done for self-improving. I have no questions. I
19	will ask the Board if they have any questions, and we'll
20	proceed.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: To the applicant, you
24	said you're routinely attending meetings?
25	MR. HAIN: Yes. It has been a little difficult

1	with Covid, but I do. We do some Zoom meetings with NA.
2	I do NA just because, you know, alcohol, to them, is a
3	drug. And I found out that they're more family-oriented
4	than AA. But I do attend.
5	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.
6	And Semper Fi to you. But the other part about this is,
7	are you familiar with the alcohol, the veterans court in
8	Las Vegas, Las Vegas Township and also in Henderson?
9	MR. HAIN: I, while I was going through the
10	trial, I did not know about the veterans court. I only
11	found out about the veterans court after I was in
12	prison. So I couldn't, as to my knowledge, use that to
13	help me out anymore.
14	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Well, you
15	still could reach out to them, and they could still help
16	you get to certain places and keep you helping and maybe
17	use you as a mentor. I'm just giving you that advice.
18	Okay?
19	MR. HAIN: Yes, sir. Thank you so much. I'll
20	keep that in mind.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. And, also,
22	thank you for the service.
23	MR. HAIN: Thank you.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
25	Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.

1	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move we
2	grant the appeal of Mr. Hain.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
4	Do I have a second?
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
7	motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?
8	Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All
9	those in favor, state "aye."
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
12	Mr. Hain, congratulations. You have a good day.
13	MR. HAIN: You, too. Thank you so much. God
14	bless you all.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 126,
16	Tijuan Robertson? Mr. Tijuan Robertson?
17	All right. I'm going to trail this one.
18	Number 127, Marvin Warren?
19	MR. WARREN: Yes, I'm here.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Warren, do
21	you understand you're under oath?
22	MR. WARREN: Yes.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll turn it
24	over to the investigator.
25	MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The applicant

1	has listed several felonies and several other arrests,
2	all of which occurred in the state of Nevada.
3	In February of 2011, the applicant was arrested
4	for attempted murder and assault with a deadly weapon.
5	The fingerprint report does not show disposition.
6	However, the applicant states that he was convicted of
7	this.
8	In May of 2014, he was initially arrested for
9	two counts of burglary. This was reduced to one count
10	of attempted burglary at the felony level, and he was
11	sentenced to up to 30 months incarcerated.
12	In August of 2016, he was arrested again for
13	possession to sell a Schedule I or II substance and was
14	sentenced to 48 months.
15	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Excuse me.
16	MR. JONES: I'm sorry. Did someone say
17	something?
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Continue, please.
19	MR. JONES: In May of 2014, there was another
20	arrest for conspiracy to commit criminal contempt. This
21	was a gross misdemeanor. And this was not disclosed.
22	The fingerprint report does not show a disposition.
23	In 2015, we have contempt of municipal court.
24	In July of 2016, we have possession of
25	marijuana less one ounce, misdemeanor. This was

1	dismissed and confirmed by the fingerprint report.
2	And again in 2016, we have contempt of
3	municipal court, and the disposition is unknown.
4	All of the felonies were disclosed and
5	confirmed by the fingerprint report. However, none of
6	the misdemeanors were disclosed.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Warren, do
8	you want to explain what happened and, also, why you
9	didn't disclose the misdemeanors?
10	MR. WARREN: Yeah, sure. When it came to the
11	misdemeanors, honestly, I didn't, I didn't really know
12	what the misdemeanors exactly were. But I knew what my
13	felonies were. So that's why I disclosed the felonies.
14	But when it comes to the 2011 arrest, I was
15	arrested for attempt murder. I was
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, and I got a lot of
17	background. Those of you that are on the call, unless
18	you're the applicant, you need to go on mute. You need
19	to go on mute, please, unless you're the applicant.
20	Okay. Mr. Warren, let's try again.
21	MR. WARREN: Okay. So, once again, like I
22	said, when it came to the felonies, it is pretty much
23	all the charges I've pretty much known about. When it
24	came to the misdemeanors, I didn't really know what the
25	misdemeanors were. I didn't really know the exact

1	charges to list them.
2	And in the 2011 arrest, I was a 16-year-old. I
3	was arrested for attempt murder. I was convicted for
4	assault with the use. I did two years in YOP, which was
5	in High Desert State Prison. I was convicted for nine,
6	or, no, it was 24 to 48 months.
7	I was just young. I mean a lot was going on in
8	my life at the time. I did assault the person. I
9	didn't injure anyone. But I did assault the person as
10	far as his life, you know. So. And I do regret the
11	situation. I mean I did do my time. And I've grown
12	from it.
13	From the 2014 arrest, the attempt burglary, I
14	was with a couple of friends. I was 18. I had probably
15	been out for like a year from my 2011 arrest, with some
16	friends and everything, and we were just messing
17	together, whatever. And we was, we were going to
18	burglarize a residential home. And we saw that we were
19	on camera, so we just left the scene. And I ended up
20	getting caught a little bit later, or whatever. And I
21	was convicted of an attempt burglary. I was convicted
22	for I think, I did, I think, it was 19 to 48 for that
23	one.
24	And then, for the sales, the most recent sales
25	felony, I ended up selling some marijuana to an

1	undercover cop. And I I was in the hard times at the
2	time. I was, you know, I was pretty much trying to
3	figure out a way to make some money, or whatever, and
4	didn't see that it was the right way, so. And now I'm
5	just, you know, looking toward the future now.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What are you doing for
7	employment these days?
8	MR. WARREN: As of right now, I was working for
9	B&B Glass. But due to the pandemic, you know, it's hard
10	to travel. And I was also doing temp for what's it
11	called? Odyssey. And that's for like, they work
12	like I don't really know exactly what to say, but we
13	do like maintenance.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Thank
15	you.
16	Any questions from the Board?
17	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I'm just a little
18	confused. He was convicted. But no one was hurt. I'm
19	not sure.
20	MR. WARREN: Like I said, I was convicted of
21	assault with the use of a deadly weapon. No one was
22	injured as far as like no one, no one, like no injury
23	was like was inflicted. It was at first, but they
24	dropped the charge from attempted murder.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So, Mr. Warren,

just for clarification, you fired a gun at somebody and 1 2 missed? 3 MR. WARREN: Yes. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 4 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you. 5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer, for 6 7 the applicant. Mr. Warren. MR. WARREN: Yes. 8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: When did you finally 9 get released from prison, the last time you've been 10 released? 11 MR. WARREN: The last time I was released was 12 13 December, I believe, 18, 2018. 14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions? BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member 16 Brown. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Hearing 18 none, I'll call for a motion. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Board Member Brown has 21 something. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, I'm sorry. I 22 couldn't hear him. Go ahead. 23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is for both the 24 investigator and the applicant. I'm a little confused, 2.5

1	looking at the dial sheet. In July of 2016, you were
2	arrested for possession of marijuana. You said that was
3	the last charge. But then a month later, you're
4	arrested for possession to sell a Schedule I or II drug
5	and conspiracy to violate the Uniform Controlled
6	Substance Act.
7	MR. WARREN: Yes. Oh, I'm sorry.
8	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Explain that to me.
9	They're two separate charges, correct?
10	MR. WARREN: Yes, yes. First, I was arrested,
11	I was arrested of selling a controlled or no, no. I
12	was arrested of possession of a controlled substance at
13	a friend's house. I had some, I had some cocaine and
14	some marijuana on me, or whatever. And they're illegal
15	substances at the time, so, and one of them is
16	definitely an illegal substance. So I went to jail for
17	that. And, I believe, they ran that concurrent with the
18	2016 arrest of the Uniform Substance Act, Controlled
19	Substance Act.
20	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. But, so the first
21	one, you were arrested for marijuana and cocaine. What
22	were you arrested on, on the second one, in 2016?
23	MR. WARREN: The sale, like I said, that was
24	the sale to the undercover.
25	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Were you out on

1	bail on the first charge?
2	MR. WARREN: No, well, I was out. They had
3	released me because oh, because it was in North
4	Las Vegas, and they transferred me to the county, and I
5	didn't, I don't think, I think that I had like court or
6	something like that, like they had just released me for
7	court. They just had released me like for court. They
8	just gave me a paper and said I had court in North
9	Las Vegas.
10	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from
12	the Board?
13	All right. I'll entertain a motion.
14	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
15	Nixon. I move that we uphold the denial.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
17	Do I have a second?
18	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any further discussion?
20	I'll just add that it is my opinion that we
21	don't have enough time and distance. There's been a
22	significant amount of activity.
23	All right. All those in favor of the motion,
24	state "aye."
25	(Board members said "aye.")

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
2	Okay. Motion carried. Okay. Sir, good luck
3	to you. You can reapply in a year.
4	Okay. Number 128.
5	We still have somebody with a lot of
6	background. If you're not Mr. William Evans, please put
7	your phone on mute. I've still got a phone with a lot
8	of Mr. Evans, are you here? Call Mr. Evans a second
9	time?
10	MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair, Investigator
11	Saladino. Again, we had tried telephone, email, and
12	sent certified and regular mail. We did not hear back
13	from Mr. Evans.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
15	Number 129. And then I'm trailing that. 129, Noah
16	Borden?
17	MR. BORDEN: Here.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Borden, do
19	you realize you're under oath?
20	MR. BORDEN: Yes, sir.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to turn
22	this over to the investigator.
23	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2009,
24	out of California, the applicant was charged with the
25	offense of throwing substance at a vehicle, at

1	misdemeanor level. Disposition was 15 days jail. This
2	was disclosed, and we do have court documents.
3	In August of 2009, also in California, the
4	charge was burglary first degree at a felony level.
5	Disposition showed four years probation and six months
6	jail. This was disclosed, and we do have court
7	documents.
8	January 2010, California, there was a violation
9	on the probation and a rearrest and revoke of probation.
10	And this links into item number 4.
11	In March 2010, burglary first degree, at felony
12	level. Disposition is two years prison. He did
13	disclose, and we do have court documentation.
14	The applicant disclosed the arrests and was not
15	made provisional. The arrests were confirmed with the
16	fingerprint report and court documents.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. Borden,
18	why don't you explain to us the nature of your arrests.
19	MR. BORDEN: Like the burglary?
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, all of them, sir.
21	MR. BORDEN: The first one, I really don't
22	remember. I just, I think, I was 18. And
23	(The Reporter asked Mr. Borden to speak
24	louder.)
25	MR. BORDEN: My first one, I think, I was 18.

1	And I had family, a lot of family members, a lot of
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Borden?
3	MR. BORDEN: Yes.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Borden, we're going
5	to have to figure out your phone, because we can barely
6	hear you. It sounds like, I could be wrong, but you're
7	outside, and you may be walking. There's a lot of
8	background noise. So either go indoors, speak louder,
9	or I'm going to have to postpone you for later on today.
10	MR. BORDEN: Hello. Is this better?
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I still have background.
12	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, this is Kevin Ingram.
13	I believe that we still have somebody else that has not
14	muted their phone.
15	Anyone that is currently on this call, who is
16	not speaking to the Board Chair at this time, place your
17	phone on mute, please. Thank you.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Let's try it
19	again. Go ahead, sir.
20	MR. BORDEN: Yes. Well, at 18, I had some
21	family members that was throwing rocks on the freeway.
22	And I
23	(The Reporter interrupted, trouble hearing the
24	applicant.)
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm going to

1	try one more time. After that, Mr. Borden, I'm going to
2	have to ask you to call back in and maybe get a better
3	circuit or a better line. Because we cannot hear you,
4	and that doesn't help your case here.
5	MR. BORDEN: So do I call in again, or no?
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, don't know what
7	kind of phone you're using. It sounds like you're
8	muffled. Are you in, are you by yourself, or you're out
9	in public?
10	MR. BORDEN: Yes. I'm by myself. I'm at home
11	actually.
12	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: There's some other
13	outside interference here. Somebody else has their
14	phone on.
15	MR. INGRAM: Again, everyone that is currently
16	on this call, you need to place your phone on mute. If
17	you don't, we will not be able to proceed with the
18	hearings today. So whoever is outside with horns
19	honking and traffic in the background, place your phone
20	on mute. This is going to be the last request.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Kevin?
22	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. I believe that that
23	phone is now on mute, sir.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'd love to know who
25	that is.

All right. Mr. Borden, please proceed. 1 MR. BORDEN: Okay. At 18, I was arrested 2 3 for --BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You need to speak up, 4 Mr. Borden. 5 MR. BORDEN: I said, at 18, I was arrested for 6 7 obstructing against an officer. And then the burglary case, that was something 8 that happened, but it wasn't actually burglary. But I 9 went to the house. Somebody was there. I thought it 10 was vacant. And the stuff that I took was replaced to 11 the people. And one of the neighbors pointed me out. 12 13 And I ended up going to jail for that and released. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. 15 Any questions from the Board? BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I don't 16 want to draw this out any longer. But what was the 17 probation violation that got you to serve your full 18 sentence for the burglary, sir? 19 20 MR. BORDEN: Since I was going to school, and I 21 didn't know the -- read the like -- basically, I didn't tell them I changed my address. Because I moved out 22 from my old place. 23 24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. And if I understood you correctly during all the muffle, the 2.5

1	throw the substance at the vehicle, you were 18 years
2	old, and you were throwing rocks at cars?
3	MR. BORDEN: No. I had younger siblings that
4	was throwing rocks on the freeway, and I went down there
5	to get them, because one of the people told me that they
6	saw my sister and brother down there. And I went down
7	there. The officer told me to leave. And I didn't
8	leave, because I told them I couldn't go back to the
9	house without them. And he took me to jail.
10	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
12	questions from the Board?
13	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a
14	motion.
15	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll move
16	to grant the appeal.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
18	Do I have a second?
19	I'll call for a second.
20	Okay. I don't have a second. Motion failed.
21	I'll call for a new motion.
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I'm not sure during the
23	muffle. I have a quick question. When was the
24	last incident? I want to make sure we have time and
25	distance.

BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: For the investigator, 1 2 she wants to know when the last contact was, the last 3 arrest? MR. MAXWELL: My apologies there. You cut out 4 The last arrest, according to the fingerprint 5 there. report, was March 25th of 2010. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Can I go back and second the first motion? Sorry. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, we need -- yeah, I 9 know what you want to do. But technically and by 10 Robert's Rules, we need a new motion, because the first 11 one failed, and I called it. So I'm seeking a new 12 13 motion. 14 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we grant the 15 appeal. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 16 Do I have a second? 17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a 19 20 motion. I have a second. Any further discussion? 21 Okay. All those in favor, state "aye." (Board members said "aye.") 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The motion 23 24 passes. Congratulations, Mr. Borden. You have a good 2.5 day.

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1	MR. BORDEN: Thank you. You, too.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 130,
3	Anthony Herrera.
4	MR. HERRERA: Yes, this is Anthony Herrera.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you realize
6	you're under oath, sir?
7	MR. HERRERA: Yes, I do.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the
9	investigator proceed.
10	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The
11	applicant was arrested on October 1995, out of
12	California, for attempted murder at felony level. This
13	was while he was a juvenile. And he did not disclose,
14	and we do not have court documents. And this explains
15	the item number 2, which is December 29th, 1999,
16	California, violation of parole at felony level. There
17	is no disposition available for this. This was not
18	disclosed, and we do not have court documents.
19	5-4-2000, California, parole was revoked. This
20	is felony. No disposition available. This was not
21	disclosed, and we do not have court documents.
22	September 23rd, 2000, in Arizona, disorderly
23	conduct, possession of a weapon by a prohibited person,
24	felony level. The disposition shows 2.25 years in
25	Arizona Department of Corrections. This was disclosed

1	on the application as a gross misdemeanor.
2	March 3rd, 2007, in California, felon,
3	et cetera, possession of a firearm, felony level. This
4	was disclosed on the application as a gross misdemeanor.
5	The disposition was convicted, committed to prison, 20
6	months prison under the Street Gang Act. This was
7	disclosed, and we do have court documents.
8	8-4-07, California, possess controlled
9	substance for sale, at felony level. This was disclosed
10	on the application as a gross misdemeanor. Convicted,
11	committed to prison, 96 months prison. Disposition also
12	states felony while on bail or recognized under the
13	Street Gang Act. It was disclosed. We do have court
14	docs.
15	7-24 of '13, in California, possession of a
16	controlled substance in prison, felony level.
17	Disposition showed convicted, probation and jail, four
18	years prison, which was a suspended sentence, four years
19	probation and, also, a fine. This was not disclosed,
20	and we do not have court documents.
21	2-24-2015, California, parole violation at
22	unknown level. There was no disposition available for
23	this. Did not disclose. No court documents.
24	3-5 of '15, California, parole violation again,
25	level unknown. Also, no disposition. This was not

1	disclosed. No court documents.
2	10-12-2017, California, sodomy with force,
3	unknown level. Disposition shows that the prosecution
4	released, it was detention only, and he was released and
5	let go because of lack of sufficient evidence. This was
6	not disclosed, and we do not have court documents.
7	The applicant disclosed arrests four, five and
8	six. He was not made provisional and was denied on
9	7-9-2020. The arrests were found and confirmed with the
10	fingerprint report and court documents.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
12	All right. Mr. Herrera, please explain.
13	MR. HERRERA: Okay. For one, I'm pretty bad at
14	dates. So those are probably the reason why I didn't
15	disclose as far as '95. I wasn't quite sure if I was to
16	disclose that, because it was longer than 10 years ago,
17	which was when I was a juvenile. I'm currently 42 years
18	old. Those happened when I was 16 years old.
19	As far as my gun charges, they weren't involved
20	in no crimes or anything. They were just, one was found
21	on me, and another one was found in my house. They were
22	never involved in no crimes or anything along those
23	lines.
24	When I was younger, I did have a drug issue
25	when I was younger. And I've pretty much got that

1	tamed, as I've got 13 years clean under sobriety.
2	As far as my violation, as far as in 2015, the
3	violation was I had some photos on my phone, which were
4	probably when I was probably like 16, 17 years old. And
5	when my parole officer seen those photos, he basically
6	said, "You know, that's a violation." And he took me
7	in. And then, once it he told me, "Okay, that I'll
8	give you back your phone. You have to delete the
9	photos." No problem. I deleted the photos. It was a
10	done deal.
11	As far as '17, for, what is it, sodomy or
12	something like that, it was with my wife. You know, me
13	and her had a big disagreement. There was no physical
14	altercations or anything along those lines. When I went
15	to jail, I went there for like two or three days. I
16	went to court, and the court threw it out, because there
17	was no evidence or anything along those lines as far as
18	that.
19	Since then, since I've been out, since I've
20	been out of prison, I have currently enrolled in
21	college. I did three semesters in college. I'm
22	currently well, not currently. Right before I moved
23	to Las Vegas, and I've been in Vegas since July 1st,
24	before that, I was a drug and alcohol counselor for NFI
25	in Riverside, California. And so I can't continue the

1	drug and alcohol counseling in California out here
2	because the recommendations are different. They want
3	you to have a bachelor's degree out here. Which, in
4	California, their credentials are different.
5	So, you know, so now I'm just trying to look
6	for a different field. I applied for different
7	positions as far as with security jobs, and they all
8	required a guard card. So that's where I find myself
9	doing this.
10	I am currently employed right now. I'm a
11	custodian at a gym. And I just changed my life
12	dramatically, you know, and I'm just trying to look for
13	that chance to grow and do something better with my
14	life.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
16	Any other questions from the Board?
17	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
18	Nixon. I'm just trying to determine time and distance.
19	So on, it looks like the last incident that was had with
20	law enforcement was, it's a very minimum, or it's a
21	very in 2015. Because we have parole violation, no
22	disposition and not disclosed. So is that outstanding,
23	and what does that mean? And maybe that's for the
24	investigator.
25	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. There was

1	no disposition on the fingerprint reports to show when
2	he actually finished his parole. So I'm unable to get
3	that at the moment. But I'm looking through the
4	paperwork again just to see if I can find something. So
5	if you could just bear with me a second.
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.
7	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. While
8	Investigator Maxwell is looking at the question, for the
9	applicant, are you still on paper, sir?
10	MR. HERRERA: No, I'm not. I am currently off
11	of all paper. I currently paid off all my restitution
12	fees. I have been in no trouble or anything along those
13	lines since then.
14	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And when did your
15	parole end, that you satisfied your parole?
16	MR. HERRERA: I want to say, I'm almost
17	thinking, I think, it was 2016, I want to say. It was a
18	little bit after my violation.
19	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.
20	MR. HERRERA: You're welcome.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
22	questions?
23	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a
24	motion.
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member

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1	Nixon. I move that we uphold the denial. There's just
2	not enough time and distance here.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
4	Do I have a second?
5	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
7	motion and a second. Any further discussion?
8	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
9	All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
12	Mr. Herrera, you can reapply in a year. Good luck to
13	you, sir.
14	MR. HERRERA: All right. Thank you.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Ingram, for future
16	planning, we've been going an hour, and I've done one,
17	two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten,
18	including three that are trails. Please factor that in
19	next time we have an agenda.
20	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 131,
22	Christopher Dunn.
23	MR. DUNN: This is number 131, Christopher
24	Dunn. I am here. I am fully aware that I am under
25	oath.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
2	All right. Investigator, please proceed.
3	MR. DUNN: Let me add some details. I believe,
4	I can save the Board some time.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, no, Mr. Dunn, this
6	is our meeting.
7	MR. DUNN: Okay.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So please hold on there,
9	and I'm going to have the investigator speak.
10	MR. DUNN: Certainly.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.
12	MS. IRIZARRY: Hi. Good morning. Chief
13	Irizarry. Mr. Dunn was denied for a 1980 carrying
14	concealed weapon without a permit, misdemeanor offense,
15	out of South Carolina. He did not disclose the offense
16	on his application. He received a \$108 fine, and the
17	gun was confiscated. Mr. Dunn was made provisional, and
18	he was incorrectly allowed by staff to take the firearm
19	course prior to being made active. After being made
20	provisional, he went to work an armed position for a
21	licensee from April 21st, 2020 until he was they were
22	notified when his fingerprints came back and I contacted
23	them on July 28, 2020.
24	Mr. Dunn, I wanted to point out, when he had
25	applied, it was during the time that our office was

1	closed due to quarantine. So when he had applied, it
2	was online. When we opened back up, by that time, in
3	May, he had already received his provisional and was
4	allowed to take the firearm course. It wasn't until we
5	got the fingerprints back that I notified them of the
6	weapons offense, that his card was denied. He has since
7	been denied and let go by the company pending his
8	appeal. He has provided a police report and his 8214
9	military documents as well as special military
10	clearance. So his firearms rights have been restored.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
12	Mr. Dunn, the issue is the fact that you didn't
13	disclose. And the Board and I are well-aware that this
14	occurred 40 years ago. And, obviously, that will be
15	taken into consideration. So please explain to us why
16	you didn't disclose.
17	MR. DUNN: Sir, I had lived a lifetime of
18	having a secret and top secret security clearance as an
19	adult, you know. I held a top secret security clearance
20	for sensitive compartmented information access, which is
21	SCI. And, I guess, I was kind of flippant, and that's a
22	fault of mine, when I was filling out the application on
23	line. I had a couple of distractions. Later, it dawned
24	on me, oh, I didn't disclose it. Well, it was difficult
25	to try to find somebody to try to get that fixed. I

1	couldn't do it online, once I realized it. And, you
2	know, the COVID-19 thing was going on. I got busy with
3	work that I was doing, and I was happy to have found
4	that work with my brother's prior special forces.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What do you do
6	currently for employment?
7	MR. DUNN: Well, I'm retired Army, I'm retired
8	Special Forces with about 25 years. And I'm not doing
9	anything right now. I'm on hold until I get this PILB.
10	If I don't get this PILB, I'm not going to be able to do
11	anything. Right now, really, and I want to make this
12	clear to the Board, right now, first of all, I'm
13	embarrassed to be having to be before the Board.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Dunn?
15	MR. DUNN: Yes?
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I want to help you. And
17	in this case, less may be more. So let us proceed.
18	Okay?
19	MR. DUNN: Okay.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Anything
21	other questions from the Board?
22	Okay. I'll call for a motion.
23	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to
24	grant the appeal.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.

1	Do I have a second?
2	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.
3	And I just want to qualify. Typically, I wouldn't
4	because of the nondisclosure. But because of the office
5	closure and everything else, I'm a little bit kinder
6	maybe. But I second.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And I'll add on
8	the discussion. This occurred 40 years ago. The
9	gentleman's had no other incidents in his past. It was
10	a misdemeanor from 40 years ago. He served honorably in
11	the Army and retired. So I don't have an issue with
12	this, so.
13	All right. I'll call for a vote. All those in
14	favor, state "aye."
15	(Board members said "aye.")
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any opposed?
17	The motion carried. Congratulations, Mr. Dunn.
18	You have a good day.
19	MR. DUNN: Thank you, sir.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.
21	William Cannon II, number 132.
22	MR. CANNON: I'm here.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Cannon, are
24	you aware, realize you're under oath?
25	MR. CANNON: Yes, sir.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn this
2	over to the investigator.
3	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 1993,
4	out of California, the applicant was charged with
5	carrying a CCW in a vehicle. This was at misdemeanor
6	level. The disposition showed probation, jail. The
7	fingerprint report did not show the specifics of the
8	disposition. They did not disclose. We do not have
9	court documents.
10	The applicant was initially made provisional on
11	12-24-2019 and was hired by Contemporary Services
12	Corporation, license number 1621, on January 22nd of
13	this year. He was denied on 2-3 of this year and
14	terminated from CSC on 2-6 of this year. The arrest was
15	not disclosed and was found on the fingerprint report.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Cannon, do
17	you want to explain what happened here and why you
18	didn't disclose?
19	MR. CANNON: I don't recall not disclosing.
20	There were a couple questions, I think, I was kind of
21	confused on in regards to the misdemeanor and the felony
22	questions. So, I think, I got a little confused there
23	on the application.
24	But just to brief you guys on the situation, at
25	the time, I was trying to apply for an armed guard card.

I was -- the information I was told to do was go to a place called the West L.A. Gun Club, which held a firearms course. So I was told to go down there, register for that course, and take the course, and then come back to the place where I was trying to apply to, to get my guard card.

On my way home, driving through Culver City, I 7 had a traffic ticket. This is why I was arrested. 8 Ιt was a traffic ticket that I didn't pay. And it turned 9 into a bench warrant. That's what caused me to get 10 pulled over. When I pulled over, the officer said, "You 11 have a warrant for your arrest." And I'm, you know, I'm 12 13 confused, because I completely forgot. And he said, "It was a traffic ticket you didn't pay." And I, "Oh," I 14 said, "for the headlights?" And he said, "Yeah." I 15 said, "Okay." 16

And so he asked me to get out of the car. Well, he asked me if I had any weapons in my car. Now, being that I was just coming home from the West L.A. Gun Club, the idea was I went down there with my firearm, and I was going to try and take the course. But I had to register for the next course that was coming up, so on my way home

24 My confusion, well, my big confusion was, was 25 the concealed, the word "concealed." Now, in

Los Angeles, it's a little trickier. I'm thinking, if I 1 have it in my trunk, I'm hiding it. If I have it in my 2 glove compartment, I'm hiding it, in the glove 3 compartment, I'm hiding it. So my idea, as a young quy, 4 is to keep my gun unloaded, which it was unloaded, and 5 just to have it on the seat next to me, because it's not 6 7 concealed. I'm not hiding it. I'm trying to have it in the wide open, right? 8

So the officer pulls me over. He asked me if I 9 have any weapons. I put my hands up, and I said, "Yes. 10 I have my firearm. It's right here next to me. It's 11 registered in my name." He pulled his weapon out, and 12 13 he asked me to get out of the car. He opened the door I got out. He explained to me that I'm being 14 for me. arrested for the warrant, I have to go to court because 15 I didn't pay a traffic warrant, it's a bench warrant 16 It just so happens that I had y firearm in the car 17 now. with me. And not understanding how to carry it is what 18 got me the concealed weapons charge. 19

Now, the way it should be carried in California, it has to be in a locked compartment, in a safe. It has to have a lock actually going through the gun. And the bullets have to be in another compartment. So it was a matter of how it was being carried. And that's pretty much what happened.

1	As far as how I filled it out on the
2	application, I think, I was confused. Because I don't
3	have any felonies. I've never been to prison, never,
4	nothing. My record's clean, other than this misdemeanor
5	here. They let me out on O.R.
6	That's pretty much the whole situation. I was
7	trying to get a security job at that time.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Dunn, I accept your
9	explanation. You're becoming repetitive. The question
10	was why you didn't disclose. And you said you were
11	confused by the application, is that correct?
12	MR. CANNON: Yes, sir.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why is the application
14	confusing, why is the application confusing to you?
15	Because I've read that application a bunch of times. I
16	just want your opinion.
17	MR. CANNON: Well, I don't know if it's the way
18	the question is phrased. Because I don't have any
19	misdemeanors. But then it asks if I have see, I
20	can't, I can't think of how it's actually phrased, but.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I'll tell you
22	what. I'm going to, I'm going to have one of the
23	staff Mr. Dunn, I'll have one of the staff read the
24	question.
25	MR. CANNON: Okay.

MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Chair, this is Investigator 1 Maxwell. 2 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. MR. MAXWELL: The question is phrased "Have you 4 ever been convicted of a crime involving the illegal use 5 or possession of a dangerous weapon?" 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. All right. Any questions from the Board? 8 Oh, and I apologize, Mr. Cannon. And what are 9 you doing now for employment? 10 MR. CANNON: Well, right now, I'm a personal 11 trainer. I've been working at 24-Hour Fitness. So I 12 13 went to school for that. And 24-Hour Fitness has closed down. Previous to that, for the past 18 years -- I 14 moved to Las Vegas, been here since 2018. For the past 15 18 years, I was working as a bookkeeper in Los Angeles 16 for an accounting firm. Since I've been here to 17 Las Vegas, I've gotten my concealed firearms permit. 18 Even the State of California has issued me a California 19 Department of Justice handgun and safety certificate. 20 21 You know, I've been issued these things. So I don't know. Like I said, when I answered 22 the question, I don't know, I didn't know exactly how to 23 answer the question. Because I don't know. 24 I'm figuring that has been gone off my record. I don't know 2.5

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1	how to answer the question. I think, I was confused
2	right there. But I know I have no record.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Listen, I believe you're
4	confused. You'll know how to answer the question in the
5	future.
6	MR. CANNON: Yes, sir.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And thank
8	you for explaining what you're doing now.
9	So any questions from the Board?
10	Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.
11	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
12	Nixon. Due to the nondisclosure, again, I just, our
13	preference is to not approve. And so I'd move that we
14	uphold the denial of the guard card.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
16	Do I have a second?
17	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
19	motion and a second. Any further discussion?
20	I'll call for a vote. All those in favor,
21	state "aye."
22	(Board members said "aye.")
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No. Nay.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed, state
25	"nay."

1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nay. Gronauer.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So we got
3	three-one. The motion does carry. Mr. Dunn, you can
4	reapply in a year. Please, please, disclose everything,
5	and things might go a different way.
6	MR. CANNON: Sir, my name's not Mr. Dunn. I
7	don't know if we have the right one.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm sorry. Mr. Cannon.
9	Mr. Cannon. My apologies. I'm juggling 189 files in
10	front of me.
11	MR. CANNON: Yeah, I know. I've been on the
12	phone for an hour and a half listening. I feel for you
13	guys. I feel for you.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
15	All right. Number 133, James Douglas.
16	MR. CANNON: I don't, I don't, I didn't get my
17	decision.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Douglas, are you
19	here?
20	MR. CANNON: Is there a yes, or is there a no?
21	I didn't get a decision. I didn't hear it.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, the motion was to
23	deny the appeal. It was a vote of three to one. You
24	can reapply in a year. My suggestion to you is when you
25	reapply, please disclose everything.

1	MR. CANNON: But I just heard some guy
2	previously disclose his, but you guys appealed him, you
3	approved him through.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I don't need to
5	explain my decision. But because you seem like a
6	reasonable man, his was 40 years ago.
7	MR. CANNON: Right. And this was, what, 27.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: He served his country 25
9	years in combat.
10	MR. CANNON: 27 years, sir.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I am done. Thank
12	you, sir. You have a good day.
13	MR. CANNON: Okay. You, too, sir, have a great
14	one.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 133, James
16	Douglas?
17	MR. ROBERTSON: Did you call the one for
18	Robertson yet, or no?
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 133, James
20	Douglas, are you here?
21	Okay. I'm going to trail that.
22	Number 134, Bernard Williams? Mr. Bernard
23	Williams?
24	I'm going to trail that.
25	Mr. Marc Williams, number 135. Marc Williams?

MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, I'm here. 1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Williams, 2 thank you for attending. Do you realize you're under 3 oath? 4 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I will turn 6 7 this over to the investigator. MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. I'm just 8 waiting for it to load up, sir. Okay. 1991, out of 9 California, the applicant was charged with inflicting 10 corporal injury on spouse/cohabitant. 11 This is at misdemeanor level. Disposition showed 24 months 12 13 probation and 30 days jail. This was not disclosed. We do not have court documents. 14 1992, out of California, inflict corporal 15 injury on spouse/cohabitant. This was at misdemeanor 16 36 months probation, 365 days suspended jail 17 level. sentence. This was disclosed. And no court documents. 18 1995, California, forgery and burglary, 19 20 misdemeanor level, three years probation, 20 days jail, 21 no disclosure, no courts docs. 1997, California, battery, misdemeanor, 36 22 months probation, no disclosure, no court docs. 23 1999, out of California, annoying phone call, 24 2.5 obscene, threat, misdemeanor level, two years probation,

1	45 days jail, no disclosure, no court documents.
2	Also in 1999, out of California, possession of
3	a narcotic controlled substance, misdemeanor level, 365
4	days jail, no disclosure, no court documents.
5	In 2000, out of California, threaten crime with
6	intent to terrorize, felony level, five years probation,
7	365 days jail, no disclosure, no court docs. This
8	conviction was originally a felony that was later
9	reduced to a misdemeanor under California 1203.4-17 PC.
10	The applicant did not provide any court documents for
11	this.
12	The applicant did not disclose his full arrest
13	history and was made provisional on 2-10 of this year.
14	All arrests were found on the fingerprint report. He
15	was denied on 3-10 of 2020. At the time of his denial,
16	he was not placed on a licensee's roster. On
17	August 7th, 2020, Mr. Williams walked into the Las Vegas
18	PILB office and asked about the status of his card.
19	Because he was working for Preventative Measures,
20	license number 1633, Preventative Measures was then
21	contacted and issued a notice of violation for
22	continuing to employ Mr. Warren on a denied card and not
23	properly adding him to their roster. He has since been
24	terminated.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

Okay. Sir, can you explain not only the 1 arrests, but, more importantly, why you didn't disclose 2 3 them? MR. WILLIAMS: I forgot. I was looking for the 4 papers. I just forgot. I try to put a lot of bad 5 things behind me and leave it alone and move on. I just 6 7 forgot it. I'm sorry. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You forgot every one of 8 those? 9 MR. WILLIAMS: No, I didn't. I thought I put 10 them down there. I must have just -- my mistake. I'm 11 12 sorry, sir. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you 13 doing for employment now? 14 MR. WILLIAMS: Looking for work, trying to. 15 Well, I can't get my card for taking care of people, 16 which I was doing most of my life, live-in, taking care 17 of people, caregiver. And I can't get that. I was 18 hoping to get my guard card so I can get back to work. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why can't you get your 21 health card to take care of people? MR. WILLIAMS: Oh, I passed the test. I got 22 all the paperwork. But I had a job, and they went back 23 24 about 23 years, 25 years. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I guess, I'm missing. 25

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What did you do before you became unemployed? 1 2 MR. WILLIAMS: I was looking for work and 3 homeless. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So vou've never 4 had a job? 5 MR. WILLIAMS: Out here, no. Well, I worked 6 7 for -- I can't remember the company, a caregiver service, for about a month. I've got -- I worked at 8 Amazon as a driver. I kept getting lost. I wasn't 9 familiar with the streets of Las Vegas, and my tokes 10 turned over. I got them all mixed up. I was too slow. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And how long have 12 13 you lived in Las Vegas? MR. WILLIAMS: It's been a year and a half. 14 Ι got down here in 2019, about January or February, about 15 January. I came down here mostly to help my 16 stepdaughter out with her kids. When I get down here, 17 she leaves. I came down here. That's how I got in 18 contact with my stepdaughter, because my other, my 19 20 firstborn daughter died, and I came down here for the 21 funeral. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Sorry to hear 22 that, sir. 23 24 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. 2.5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other

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1	questions from the Board?
2	Okay. Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.
3	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
4	Nixon. I move that we uphold the denial.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
6	Do I have a second?
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion and
9	second. Any other discussion?
10	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
11	in favor of the motion, state "aye."
12	(Board members said "aye.")
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
14	Mr. Williams, you can reapply in a year. You have a
15	good day, sir.
16	MR. WILLIAMS: You, too. Thank you.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Alvin Hooks,
18	number 136?
19	MR. HOOKS: I'm here.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Hooks, do you
21	realize you're under oath?
22	MR. HOOKS: Yes, sir.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the
24	investigator continue.
25	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 1985,

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1	out of California, the applicant was charged with CCW in
2	a vehicle, carry a loaded firearm in a public place.
3	This was at misdemeanor level. Disposition showed a
4	fine. This was not disclosed. We do not have court
5	docs.
6	In 1991, out of California, possession of a
7	narcotic controlled substance, misdemeanor level.
8	Disposition showed that this was dismissed after the
9	successful completion of a diversion program. This one
10	was disclosed, but we do not have court docs.
11	The applicant was denied for the weapons
12	conviction. He was initially made provisional on 6-3 of
13	this year, as the arrest was not disclosed, but was not
14	added to any roster. The arrest was found on the
15	fingerprint report. And he was denied on 6-16 of this
16	year.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Hooks, I
18	understand the charges you didn't disclose was 35 years
19	ago, but I want to know why you didn't disclose.
20	MR. HOOKS: I actually thought I did put it on
21	the application. I may not have had the correct year,
22	but I would have swore I put it on when I did the
23	application. It was 1985. I might have put 1987,
24	because it was so long ago, I wasn't sure. But I'm
25	pretty sure I put it on there. If I didn't, that was

1	I'm sorry about that. But I'm pretty sure I put it on
2	there. And I thought I also put on there that the case
3	was dismissed.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So, Mr. Maxwell,
5	is there more than one entry for arrests on his
6	application?
7	MR. MAXWELL: I'm just checking his profile
8	now, sir. The only things that were listed on his
9	arrest history is the possession of controlled
10	substance.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Hooks, what are you
12	doing now for employment?
13	MR. HOOKS: I actually just moved to Las Vegas
14	about six months ago. I'm staying with my daughter
15	right now. I am retired. But I also went out and found
16	a part-time job. I'm a produce clerk at the 99 Cent
17	Store. I had applied for the guard, I mean the guard
18	card for the new football stadium for the Raiders and
19	everything. So I went through that whole process, the
20	interview, orientation and everything, and then I found
21	out later that I was denied. So I was looking for the
22	job at the Raiders stadium because it was a day job,
23	just to supplement income.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what did you
25	retire from?

1	MR. HOOKS: I worked in television most of my
2	life. I was in broadcast distribution. I worked for
3	several companies. My last company, my most recent
4	company was Spectrum Payroll. I worked for Warner
5	Brothers. I worked for several other companies. But
6	it's always been in broadcast distribution.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
8	Any questions from the Board?
9	Okay. No questions. I'll entertain a motion.
10	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. Based on
11	the fact of the time and distance, even though he didn't
12	disclose it, I move that we approve the appeal.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I've got a
14	motion. Do I have a second?
15	I'll call for a second.
16	Okay. Motion failed. I'll seek another
17	motion. Obviously, people are thinking something else.
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. It's Gronauer.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
20	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion for
21	denial of the appeal.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
23	for denial. Do I have a second?
24	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.

1	I have a second. Any further discussion?
2	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
3	All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
4	(Board members said "aye.")
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
6	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Nay.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion
8	carries three to one. Mr. Hooks, you can reapply in a
9	year. Please remember to disclose the other charge.
10	MR. HOOKS: Understood. Thank you, guys.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 137,
12	David Robles Beltran?
13	MR. BELTRAN: Here.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you
15	understand, sir, you're under oath?
16	MR. BELTRAN: Yes. Good morning.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good morning to you.
18	I'll let the investigator proceed.
19	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
20	applicant applied on February 21st, 2020. He was made
21	provisional on 2-27 of 2020. He did list a 2013
22	domestic violence, which was at a felony level, that was
23	dismissed, and the applicant did provide a letter from
24	the City Attorney's Office showing that the charges were
25	not filed and that the case was dismissed.

1	Before receiving the fingerprints, the
2	applicant was denied on 3-18 of '20 for a June 6th, '06,
3	out of California, carry a concealed weapon in a
4	vehicle, which was a misdemeanor, where the applicant
5	received 24 months of probation.

When the applicant was contacted in regards to 6 7 the weapons conviction, he stated that he had misread the application and was not trying to lie. He thought 8 providing the documents for the felony case from 2013 9 was enough. He had just, you know, forgotten about the 10 misdemeanor charge from '06. He was trying frantically 11 to provide any kind of documents, court documents that 12 13 he could provide for that arrest once he noted that he did miss it on the application. Since 2013, there has 14 been no other law enforcement encounters. 15

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Beltran, do 17 you want to explain why you didn't disclose?

MR. BELTRAN: I forgot about it. I've been 18 working for G1 going for seven years until my wife and I 19 20 tried to buy a house here in Vegas a year ago. 21 Currently, I do not have a job right now. And poor my wife, she works two jobs paying the mortgage until I get 22 my PILB. The PILB card, that will help my family. 23 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. 2.5 Any other questions from the Board?

1	Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.
2	Call for a motion a second time.
3	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
5	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Before I make a motion,
8	I want to make a statement, if it's okay.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, of course.
10	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So everybody on
11	the phone can hear, the problem with not disclosing, it
12	creates double, if not triple work for everyone. The
13	investigators have to do the first start of it all.
14	They issue cards. And then, all of a sudden, things
15	come back, and then they have to recall, redo everything
16	all over again. Then it has to come to an agenda, and
17	it has to come to the Board. The reason it's so
18	important to disclose is because, number one, we have to
19	know about it up front. Number two, we can't waste
20	everybody's time. This time ends up costing a lot of
21	money through the state and through the PILB.
22	That's my statement. With that statement, I'd
23	like to make a motion.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The motion, because of
	503

1	that statement, the motion is for denial.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
3	I have a motion. And when you run for
4	something, I'll vote for you.
5	I'm seeking a second.
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
8	and a second. Any further discussion?
9	Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All
10	those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
11	(Board members said "aye.")
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
13	Mr. Beltran, you can reapply in a year. Please remember
14	to disclose everything.
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm not running for
16	anything.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, well, I voted for
18	you every time.
19	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thanks.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm going to throw this
21	out to the Board.
22	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Excuse me.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do we need to take a
24	lunch break?
25	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Excuse me. Hello.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: This is Chairman Flynn.
2	I'm speaking to the Board. Please.
3	Do we need to take a lunch break? I sense us
4	getting slower.
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I think, 30 minutes
6	wouldn't kill us.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. No, that's
8	what, that was our plan, and we were going to do it at
9	12:00 anyway. So. All right. What I'll do is we will
10	go on a lunch break for 30 minutes, come back here at
11	12:33.
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Kevin, I'm going on
14	mute. Oh, no, I'm just going to call back in. Or
15	should I go on mute because we're limited to 50?
16	MR. INGRAM: Why don't you stay on and just
17	mute, so that you don't get locked out.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to mute
19	now.
20	MR. INGRAM: That would be good for all the
21	Board members. Thank you.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I don't how
23	backlogged we are. I don't know if you want to make an
24	announcement, have people call in at different times.
25	I'm going to leave it up to you.

1	MR. INGRAM: Sounds good. Thank you.
2	So for everyone that's on the call right now
3	and, Shannon, you don't have to stay on for this. It's
4	just kind of a public announcement. If you want to go
5	ahead and stay on, that's fine, but not required.

10	Would you like me to proceed with the roll call?
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, please.
12	MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir. Obviously, you
13	are present.
14	Board Member Brown? Board Member Brown?
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It was supposed to be
16	12:33.
17	MR. INGRAM: Oh, was it 12:33?
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Obviously, Board Member
20	Gronauer is here. Thank you.
21	Board Member Nixon?
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Here and shaking her head.
23	MR. INGRAM: We hear the rattle.
24	Shannon, I know you're there.
25	Board Counsel Detmer, are you on?

1	MR. DETMER: Here.
2	MR. INGRAM: Excellent. So as soon as
3	Mr. Brown gets back on the call, we will be good to go,
4	sir.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
6	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm here. Sorry.
7	MR. INGRAM: Oh, no problem.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And no apologies. You
9	had till 12:33.
10	MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Brown.
11	Chairman Flynn, just as a reminder, we had a
12	few items that were trailed a little bit earlier.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Actually, yeah, there's
14	five items, and I'm going to call those first.
15	MR. INGRAM: Perfect. Okay.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 123,
17	Larry Benford, are you here? Mr. Benford?
18	All right. I'll call for a motion.
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Hey, Kevin, I don't
20	remember that gentleman's name that had asked. He said
21	he was at work. He was trying to go between his car and
22	work to was that him?
23	MR. INGRAM: No, that one was number 126.
24	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Gotcha. I just
25	wanted to make sure that wasn't him and we discount him,

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1	because he came back and said he was still trying to
2	work with his boss. So, okay.
3	MR. INGRAM: Yes.
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
5	that we uphold the denial for Mr. Benford.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
7	Do I have a second?
8	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion and
10	second. Any further discussion?
11	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
12	in favor of the motion, state "aye."
13	(Board members said "aye.")
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The appeal is
15	denied.
16	Number 126, Tijuan Robertson?
17	MR. ROBERTSON: Present.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Robertson, do
19	you realize you're still under oath, sir?
20	MR. ROBERTSON: Yes, sir.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to turn
22	this over to the investigator.
23	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. 2013, in
24	the state of Nevada, the applicant was charged with
25	attempted larceny from a person at felony level. This

1	started as a felony. He received 24 to 60 months in
2	NDOC, which was suspended, and four years probation.
3	This was later reduced to a gross misdemeanor after
4	successful completion of probation. It was disclosed,
5	and we do have court documents.
6	2018, in Nevada, carrying a concealed weapon
7	without a permit, misdemeanor level. Disposition was 90
8	days jail suspended, told to stay out of the trouble for
9	one year, which was satisfied on 12-26 of '19.
10	Counseling, satisfied 3-27-19. 39 hours community
11	service, which was satisfied on 3-27 of '19. And the
12	property was forfeited on 12-27 of 2018. This was also
13	disclosed. And we have court docs and the police
14	report.
15	The applicant disclosed both arrests and
16	provided court documents. He was not made provisional.
17	Both arrests were confirmed with SCOPE, court documents
18	and the fingerprint report.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
20	Mr. Robertson, why don't you explain your
21	arrests, please.
22	MR. ROBERTSON: I was going to say was thank
23	you for your time, and thank you for coming back to me.
24	I don't want to be like a trouble to you guys. I
25	appreciate you guys coming back to me. I'm just at work

1	right now trying to work with the boss, let him know
2	that I have an important phone call early this morning.
3	So. But what I do say to that was that that
4	incident happened for the to sell firearm, it was
5	actually my arm, my weapon. And it was me and my
6	girlfriend, we had, I guess, we got into it. We got
7	into it on Christmas. But it was something crazy. Like
8	I was going to my cousin's house, because, you know, it
9	was the holidays. Everybody liked to cook for the
10	family. And I'm one of the cooks. So I was heading in
11	there. The long story short, heading there, she closed
12	the door, locked the door on me. And then, after that,
13	like I tried to get through the door, to get through the
14	door, and I had my firearm on me on the side of my
15	waist. And then the police. And then she called the
16	cops. And then she called them, she said that "He has a
17	firearm. He has a firearm on him and everything. Can
18	you please help, help. Can you please come. Help,
19	help." And I wasn't going to do anything to her. I was
20	just trying to get in the house, and everything right
21	there.
22	And the police draw their the police came
23	around me, and they draw their weapons on me with
24	shotguns and everything. And they said, "Put the gun,
25	take the gun out of your pocket," or something like

1	that. But I had a holster the whole time. It was just
2	hanging out where you could see the gun. And then he
3	just saw me with a firearm, so. You know, because you
4	cannot, you know, basically, have a weapon without a
5	holster. It has to be showing. Because I don't have a
6	CCW, at the time. Now I know for sure to get one now,
7	because if it ever gets like that again.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what about
9	the other arrest, the attempt larceny?
10	MR. ROBERTSON: The attempt larceny, that was
11	when I was like, I'd say, about 20 something, I don't
12	remember, like 20 years old at the most. I was living
13	with my dad that came, he came flying from Louisiana.
14	And things was just going bad, as me being his kid, but
15	we was listening to the wrong, some of the wrong things
16	and the wrong crowd at the time.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What did you
18	steal? What did you steal?
19	MR. ROBERTSON: Say it again? What did I
20	steal?
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.
22	MR. ROBERTSON: I don't know what I stole. It
23	was an actual case where they say it was the
24	documents said that it was a robbery, but then they
25	dropped it down to a gross misdemeanor, larceny from a

1	person.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You don't remember what
3	you stole?
4	MR. ROBERTSON: Well, it was, I was, okay,
5	basically, that it was basically a robbery when I was 20
6	years old. I was going, I was just like, basically like
7	homeless, and I didn't have nowhere to go, me and my
8	dad. And then I had to find a way to try to make some
9	money even though I was trying to work at the time. It
10	was, basically, like the robbery. Yeah, it was a
11	robbery. But they dropped it down to a gross
12	misdemeanor.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did you rob a business,
14	or did you rob a person?
15	MR. ROBERTSON: Well, they said it was, they
16	said it was, they said, yeah not a person. I don't,
17	they don't have all the documents there? I thought they
18	might have all the documents there. I'm sorry.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm asking you what you
20	remember. It was seven years ago.
21	MR. ROBERTSON: I leave all this here stuff to
22	the past, to be honest with you.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. That's fair
24	enough.
25	MR. ROBERTSON: I'm looking to the future.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. What are you
2	doing for work these days?
3	MR. ROBERTSON: Right now, I'm in school for
4	welding. And right now, I work construction doing
5	underground.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
7	Any other questions from the Board?
8	MR. ROBERTSON: Um.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Robertson, I'm done
10	with my questioning. I want to see if the Board has got
11	any other questions for you.
12	MR. ROBERTSON: Oh, I thought it was me. I'm
13	sorry.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's okay. It's okay.
15	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
16	Nixon. Sir, you know, I applaud everything that you're
17	doing and that you went through some hard times. So, I
18	think, I need to better understand the gravity of what
19	was done here. What is it that you took from, from
20	whomever, a store or a person?
21	MR. ROBERTSON: Oh, is it my turn to talk now?
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, sir.
23	MR. ROBERTSON: Okay. Okay. I just wanted to
24	make sure. Well, basically, it was like money.
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.

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1	MR. ROBERTSON: From the store.
2	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And then there was
3	no weapon used?
4	MR. ROBERTSON: No, no weapon was used.
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And you were saying
6	that you were homeless at the time?
7	MR. ROBERTSON: Yeah.
8	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
10	questions?
11	All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a
12	motion.
13	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move,
14	based on time and distance, or lack thereof, that we
15	uphold the denial.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
17	Do I have a second?
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
20	and a second. Any further discussion?
21	Okay. Hearing none
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Chair, I
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll call for a vote.
24	Yes, go ahead. Sorry.
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah, Mr. Robertson, you

1	know, I really, I agree with the group, but I would
2	really like to see you come back. So please don't be
3	discouraged by this. You know, get a little bit of
4	distance and because you sound like you're really
5	trying. So please don't be discouraged by this, and try
6	again.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
8	I have a second. There's no further discussion. I'll
9	call for a vote. All those in favor of the motion,
10	state "aye."
11	(Board members said "aye.")
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And,
13	Mr. Robertson, you can apply in a year. You heard from
14	one of the Board members, and I will concur, let's get a
15	little more time and distance. You have a good day,
16	sir.
17	MR. ROBERTSON: Thank you.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 128,
19	William Evans. Number 128, William Evans?
20	Okay. I'll call for a motion.
21	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to
22	uphold the denial.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
24	Do I have a second?
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.

BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further 1 2 discussion? 3 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those in favor, state "aye." 4 (Board members said "aye.") 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries. 6 7 Number 133, James Douglas. Is Mr. Douglas Is James Douglas here? 8 here? MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Chair, Investigator Maxwell. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. 10 MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Douglas was attempted to be 11 contacted by telephone, email and, also, regular mail, 12 13 and we received no response. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. I'll 14 call for a motion. 15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we uphold the 16 denial. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 18 Do I have a second? 19 20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second. 21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further discussion? 22 Okay. Hearing none, call for a vote. All 23 those in favor of the motion, state "aye." 24 (Board members said "aye.") 2.5

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
2	Number 134, Bernard Williams. Mr. Williams,
3	are you here? Mr. Williams, Bernard Williams?
4	MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Chair, Investigator Maxwell.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
6	MR. MAXWELL: Again, attempts were made to
7	contact the gentleman, but nothing was received back
8	from him.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll ask for a
10	motion.
11	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we uphold
12	Bernard Williams' denial.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
14	Do I have a second?
15	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. I have
17	a second. Any further discussion?
18	Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All
19	those in favor, state "aye."
20	(Board members said "aye.")
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
22	Commissioner Nixon, just FYI, I'm going to have
23	to jump off at 1:00 o'clock for about 10 minutes. I'm
24	just going to give you a heads-up. I'm going to need
25	you to take over for about 10 minutes.

1	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. No problem.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And then, when I come
3	back, and after we do one or two, Kevin, I think, we
4	need to make sure we hear 186 today.
5	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. We also have Mr. Donald
6	Williams, 115, who was instructed to call back at 1:00.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
8	MR. INGRAM: So would you like us to trail that
9	one until you are able to come back on the call?
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, the Board knows
11	where I stand. I think, I was pretty clear. But, yeah,
12	you know what, let's see what happens. I should be back
13	by 1:15 or 1:20.
14	MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So number, I
16	believe, we're up to 138. Number 138, Willie Darwin?
17	MR. DARWIN: Yes, that's correct.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Mr. Darwin,
19	do you realize you're under oath?
20	MR. DARWIN: Yes, sir.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the
22	investigator speak.
23	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. 1993, the
24	applicant was charged with receiving stolen property,
25	out of California, unknown level. Disposition showed

1	one year four months in prison. This was not disclosed,
2	and no court docs were provided.
3	In 1997, also out of California, second-degree
4	burglary at felony level. Disposition showed 16-month
5	prison. Also, not disclosed, no court docs.
6	The arrests were not disclosed, and the
7	applicant was initially made provisional on 12-9 of '19
8	but was not placed on any roster. The arrests were
9	found on the fingerprint report. And he was denied on
10	1-8 of '20. In his the appeal letter, the applicant
11	mentioned an expungement, but the fingerprint report did
12	not reflect this. After conversing with the applicant,
13	he said he was attempting to obtain copies of his
14	expungement paperwork in time for the appeal hearing,
15	but nothing was received by this office.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Darwin,
17	what's the status of your expungement?
18	MR. DARWIN: My status was I was trying to get
19	the paperwork, the copy of my expungement. But,
20	unfortunately, I couldn't get it. I tried calling
21	several places. I tried to go online and tried to find
22	my documents. But, unfortunately, I couldn't get that.
23	But for the case, you know, receiving stolen
24	property, that, that was something that I should have
25	never did, meaning that my cousin had stole something

1	from the store, and, I guess, I was a Guinea pig that
2	took the ties back, which was the merchandise, and
3	returned them for cash. And loss prevention had, you
4	know, held me and took me to jail.
5	And ever since then, I got out was jail,
6	discharged my parole, and ever since then, I never got
7	in trouble again after that. And then, also, I had
8	obtained a guard card for several years in California,
9	renewed and everything.
10	So I moved to Nevada, you know, to try to start
11	a new life, because I was tired of California. And I
12	applied for the guard card, thinking that I'm going to
13	get it because, you know, I had a guard card in
14	California.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
16	doing for employment right now?
17	MR. DARWIN: Actually, I work for Domino's
18	Pizza as a delivery driver. And right now, I was
19	scheduled to be there at 1:00, but my employer
20	understands the situation. I explained it to her. So
21	they're just waiting for me to come in.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I appreciate it.
23	The big issue is, is that as far as your record is, is
24	you are not expunged. It would either show an
25	expungement or the record would disappear. So that'll

leave it that you didn't disclose. 1 2 MR. DARWIN: I can get that. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Let me see if the Board has any other questions. 4 Any questions from the Board? 5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Can I have a question 6 7 for Mr. Ingram? BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. 8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Or for Mr. Maxwell, 9 either one. On the application, it says arrest. 10 Ιt doesn't say anything about, you know, you've been 11 cleared or anything else. It just says arrest. Is that 12 13 correct? That is correct, sir. 14 MR. MAXWELL: 15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. I'm qood. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other 17 questions? 18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Because there was a 19 20 mention of 1993, there was a receiving stolen property, 21 and then he never got in trouble again. But there's another arrest and subsequent conviction, it seems like, 22 for a felony burglary in the second degree. Is that, is 23 24 that the case, sir? MR. DARWIN: Yes, ma'am. And, actually, that 25

1	didn't happen in '93. That happened in '97.
2	MR. DETMER: Right. So you stated earlier that
3	in '93, after receiving stolen property, you weren't in
4	trouble again. But after that, you were arrested and
5	convicted of burglary in the second degree.
6	MR. DARWIN: Well, I'm going back to '93. That
7	probably was, you know, riding in a stolen car, you
8	know, that I didn't know it was stolen. And that was
9	the issue probably they was talking about, mentioning it
10	as '93.
11	And then, '97, I got in trouble at a store that
12	my cousin stole some merchandise. And like I mentioned,
13	I was the Guinea pig that, you know, take the ties,
14	return the ties in for cash. And that's when I got
15	arrested.
16	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it. Okay. Thank you.
17	MR. DARWIN: And then, after '97, I didn't have
18	no other deals with the police.
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it. Thank you so much
20	for clarifying it.
21	MR. DARWIN: I'll clarify that.
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
24	questions from the Board?
25	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a

1	motion.
2	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member
3	Nixon. I move that we uphold the denial of Willie
4	Darwin's guard card application due to nondisclosure.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
6	Do I have a second?
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Motion and
9	second. Any further discussion?
10	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
11	in favor of the motion, state "aye."
12	(Board members said "aye.")
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
14	Mr. Darwin, you can reapply in a year. Good luck to
15	you, sir.
16	MR. DARWIN: Thank you.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 139, Mark
18	Mcafee.
19	MR. MCAFEE: Here.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Mcafee, do
21	you understood you're under oath?
22	MR. MCAFEE: Yes, sir.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the
24	investigator, please proceed.
25	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 1989,

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1	out of Oregon, Mr. Mcafee was charged with controlled
2	substance offense. This was at felony level.
3	Disposition was 90 days jail, five years probation and a
4	fine. This was not disclosed. There's no court docs.
5	The applicant stated in his appeal letter that he was
6	given three years probation. However, the fingerprint
7	report shows five years on the disposition.
8	The applicant was made provisional on 12-16 of
9	'19 and was hired by Marksman Security Corporation,
10	license 1791. He was denied on January 22nd of this
11	year and terminated from Marksman on January 23rd of
12	this year.
13	On his appeal letter, the applicant gave a
14	statement for not disclosing the arrest. He stated that
15	he was the victim of an attempted breaking and entering
16	and that he disclosed his 1989 felony to the attending
17	police officer. He stated that the officer then ran him
18	and said that the felony didn't come up. And on that
19	reasoning, the applicant assumed it had been expunged.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And I had
21	background on my end. What was the arrest for 31 years
22	ago?
23	MR. MAXWELL: A controlled substance offense,
24	sir, at felony level.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

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1	All right. Mr. Mcafee, yeah, Mcafee, please
2	tell us what happened and why you didn't disclose.
3	MR. MCAFEE: First off, I'm an honorably
4	discharged U.S. Air Force veteran. And I've worked 25
5	years with the Teamsters.
6	Second, I'd like to say that in '89, I was in
7	possession of marijuana with intent to sell. I met all
8	my probation requirements. And I have not had any
9	run-ins with the law since.
10	I've always disclosed the charges. And then,
11	in 2018, the investigator has already told you what
12	happened in 2018. Someone had broke my window. And the
13	investigating officer told me that the charges didn't
14	pull up when he ran my name. And so, therefore, I
15	thought the charges weren't on there anymore. So,
16	therefore, I didn't claim them.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What did you do
18	in the Air Force?
19	MR. MCAFEE: I was a fireman, sir.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And how long were you in
21	the Air Force?
22	MR. MCAFEE: Four years.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what are you
24	doing now for employment?
25	MR. MCAFEE: I've worked conventions, driving

1	forklift. I was at U.S. Right-of-Way for 18 years
2	driving forklift in Portland. But then I moved to Las
3	Vegas, and I was working conventions, setting up and
4	tearing down, for the Teamsters. And then Covid hit us,
5	and that work wasn't available anymore. So I went to
6	some temporary agencies. And I've been working on some
7	temp jobs that have come up.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm just curious. You
9	mentioned you were a firefighter in the Air Force?
10	MR. MCAFEE: Yes, sir.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did you ever apply for
12	fire department jobs here or where you lived prior?
13	MR. MCAFEE: No, sir.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any
15	other questions from the Board?
16	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, I guess, you know, to
17	Gronauer's point, it does state on there, have you ever
18	been arrested. And, I think, it even goes as far as to
19	say ever, for anything, and it lists a couple of things.
20	You know, again, because of your service and the time
21	and distance on this, you know, I want to be positive.
22	But it's very clear. It asks, you know, in several
23	different ways, have you ever been arrested? Why
24	didn't, why didn't that trigger, you know, the thought
25	that maybe I should just admit it or disclose it?

1	MR. MCAFEE: Ma'am, I made a mistake in not
2	disclosing that, based on the information that the
3	officer had gave me in 2018. And I regret that. He
4	told me that I didn't have to disclose that any longer.
5	I felt it was off my records.
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.
7	MR. MCAFEE: Thank you, ma'am.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
9	questions?
10	All right. Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.
11	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move,
12	based on time and distance, that we grant the appeal.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
14	to grant the appeal. Do I have a second?
15	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second
16	based on time and distance and service in the military.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
18	I have a second. Any further discussion?
19	Okay. I'll call for a vote. All those in
20	favor, state "aye."
21	(Board members said "aye.")
22	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed, say "nay."
24	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nay.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The motion

1	carries three to one. Good luck to you, Mr. Mcafee.
2	MR. MCAFEE: Thank you very much. And I
3	appreciate your guys's decision.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 140, Jesse
5	Sierra, are you here? Mr. Sierra, Jesse Sierra, are you
6	here?
7	MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Chairman, Investigator
8	Maxwell.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: M-hm (affirmative).
10	MR. MAXWELL: This gentleman was tried to be
11	contacted by several, several means, and no response has
12	gotten back to us.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I'm
14	going to trail this one, as we've done with the others.
15	Number 142, Anthony Dunn.
16	MR. DUNN: I'm here.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Dunn, do you
18	understand you're under oath?
19	MR. DUNN: Yes.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to turn
21	it over to the investigator. And I'm going to jump off
22	the call for about 10, 15 minutes. Commissioner Nixon
23	will be Chair in the meantime.
24	And then, Kevin, I'm going to mute, so I can
25	call back in, I mean so I can get right back in.

1 MR. INGRAM: Thank you. 2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member 3 Brown. MR. INGRAM: Anyone that's currently on the 4 phone, if you will mute your phones until called upon, 5 please. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Investigator, could you 8 please hold. Kevin, I do believe that we jumped over 141, 9 Johnny Hall. 10 MR. INGRAM: That is correct. 11 MR. HALL: Yes. 12 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So, Mr. Hall, are 13 you on? 14 MR. HALL: Yes. 15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you. 16 Investigator, can we review Mr. Hall, please? 17 MR. JONES: Sure. This is Investigator Jones. 18 The applicant --19 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Sir, can you please mute 20 21 your phone? UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Oh, yeah. I'm sorry. 22 MR. JONES: All of the arrests are out of 23 California. 24 In June of 1997, the applicant was arrested for 25

a carry concealed weapon in a vehicle. 1 This was 2 disclosed. The fingerprint report does not show the disposition, but the applicant stated that he was 3 quilty. 4 In April of 1995, we have the unlawful taking 5 of a vehicle. We do not know the severity or the 6 7 disposition, but the applicant stated that he was convicted. 8 In 1996, we have taking a vehicle without the 9 consent of the owner, at the misdemeanor level. 10 The applicant was sentenced to three years probation. 11 The applicant was also sentenced to one year in jail. 12 But 13 both of these were suspended. This was not disclosed. In June of 1997, we have a felony taking a 14 15 vehicle without the owner's consent. The fingerprint report does not show the disposition. And this was not 16 disclosed. 17 Again in '97, we have vehicle theft. The 18 fingerprint report does not show the disposition or the 19 20 severity. 21 In 2001, we have inflicting corporal injury on a spouse. The fingerprint report does not show the 22 severity or the disposition. And this was not 23 disclosed. 24 Finally, in August of 2019, there's inflicting 25

1	corporal injury on a spouse. The fingerprint report
2	does not show the disposition. However, the applicant
3	states that this was dismissed.
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Sir, could you
5	explain the situations here and why you did not
6	disclose.
7	MR. HALL: The reason I didn't disclose, I was
8	in an accident in 2012. I was in a severe accident
9	involving a semi. I wasn't in the vehicle. I was on
10	the highway, and the semi hit my body. I was trying to
11	tour. I was on excuse me?
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: We need everybody to mute
13	their phones other than the applicant speaking, please.
14	Go ahead, sir.
15	MR. HALL: Yeah, I was on my way home from
16	Texas, and a semi flipped over in front of me and my
17	friend. I was on a motorcycle. We pulled over to try
18	to help the gentleman get out, and we were struck by
19	another semi. I was severely injured, and I had memory
20	loss. So that's the reason why I don't remember a lot
21	of things from my past.
22	That's all I can say about that. I don't
23	remember.
24	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. And the latest
25	incident or are there any Board questions?

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1	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
2	Brown. I'm probably going in the same area you are.
3	The most arrest, sir, in August of last year,
4	what was the disposition of that?
5	MR. HALL: What charge was that, again?
6	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Inflict corporal injury
7	upon a spouse, a domestic violence related charge.
8	MR. HALL: I was actually, I was actually the
9	victim on that. I was the one who called the police. I
10	was involved with a female, and she actually assaulted
11	my mother, which I take care of. My mother is suffering
12	from dementia. She assaulted my mother. I called the
13	police. And there was an altercation between the both
14	of us, because I had to, you know, obviously, remove her
15	from my mother. So when the cops came, they took us
16	both to jail.
17	So the case was I got a letter from the D.A.
18	saying that they weren't going pursue the case. I don't
19	have the letter. I lost it moving here to Vegas.
20	And that's the reason I moved to Vegas. I
21	moved here with my mother, away from that situation, so
22	I can, you know, give me and my mother a start over.
23	I've just barely been taking care of my mother for a
24	little over a year, or about a year and a half now. And
25	my mother's never been in my life. I was a foster kid

1	at age five. And before taking care of my mom, I hadn't
2	seen her in 20 years, so. I got a call that she was on
3	the streets. And so I just wanted to take care of her.
4	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay, sir. Thank you. Do
5	you remember the vehicle theft in 1997?
6	MR. HALL: Vaguely. In '97, I didn't steal the
7	car. A friend of mine picked me up in a stolen car. It
8	was my birthday. We went out to a club. And after the
9	club, he was too intoxicated to drive, so I started to
10	drive. And we got stopped, and it was a stolen car, and
11	I went to jail for it.
12	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Were there other
13	charges, because Count II?
14	MR. HALL: Well, I was on probation already. I
15	was on juvenile probation for a car theft when that
16	incident happened. So when that incident happened,
17	that's when my probation and everything was revoked.
18	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Any other questions?
20	Sir, what do you do now for work?
21	MR. HALL: Before moving here to Vegas, I was
22	supervisor of a warehouse. Actually, before my
23	accident, I'm a graduated surgical technologist. But
24	because of my memory loss, I wasn't able to go back to
25	work and unless I went back to school. And so I just

1	decided to pursue something else. So like I said,
2	previously, before coming here, I was a supervisor of a
3	warehouse. Upon coming here, I worked at Ellis Island
4	doing security, right before the Covid hit. And I
5	haven't been doing anything since the Covid.
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.
7	Investigator, I don't know if I can ask a legal
8	question, or Director. Can we work on getting the
9	paperwork and kind of do the withdrawal thing, and then,
10	you know, come back with the paperwork saying he's
11	cleared of the latest incident in 2019?
12	MR. INGRAM: Kevin Ingram, for the record. If
13	he withdraws his denial and is able to provide that
14	information, we could then potentially put him on the
15	December Board meeting for a new hearing. If you go
16	forward, and he is denied today, then he would have to
17	wait for a year to reapply.
18	MR. DETMER: And this is Mike Detmer, for the
19	record. And I actually had to seek confirmation from
20	Kevin. Many boards will have a statute or regulation
21	that speaks to withdrawal and then has to be approved by
22	the board or commission. I'm not personally aware if
23	this Board has such a provision or it can just be done
24	absent vote.
25	MR. INGRAM: Traditionally, what we do,

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1	Mr. Detmer, is he can request to withdraw, the Board
2	would vote to allow the withdrawal, and then move
3	forward that way. Is that kind of what you're
4	suggesting?
5	MR. DETMER: Yeah, I'm, as we speak, looking
6	for a statutory or regulatory provision that would spell
7	out whether or not there needs to be a Board vote to
8	allow for it. If prior practice, though, has been to
9	require a vote, then that's what I would recommend, if
10	that is the way the Board wants to go. And assuming
11	that's the way he wants to go as well, of course.
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Any further discussion
13	from the Board, or questions?
14	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
15	Brown. I just want to ensure that Mr. Hall understands
16	what we're talking about right now, before he makes a
17	decision.
18	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yeah, I just didn't know
19	if anybody had any thoughts on this really.
20	MR. HALL: From what I'm understanding you,
21	you're saying that if I request a removal, then I can
22	come back at a later date?
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, sir. So, I think,
24	you know, for me, your story's compelling. I can
25	understand why, you know, because of your medical

1	condition, you did not remember and disclose. You do
2	have time and distance, except for this latest case.
3	MR. HALL: Right.
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And so I would like some
5	proof that this has been dropped
6	MR. HALL: Okay.
7	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: in order to make a
8	decision on it.
9	MR. HALL: Okay.
10	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So if you could hold off.
11	Board members, are we kind of, are we in the
12	same mind space, I guess, on this?
13	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'm on the
14	same page with you.
15	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So, sir, I'm going
16	to give you the opportunity here.
17	And, Kevin, because we haven't voted on this in
18	the past, have we, on withdrawals?
19	MR. INGRAM: On some occasions you have, and
20	some occasions you haven't. And it's probably in the
21	best interest of the Board to start, you know, making a
22	decision on the record. If he requests a withdrawal,
23	and then you were to entertain a motion and approve that
24	motion, then it's a lot cleaner record moving forward.
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So I would need one

of the Board members to make a motion? 1 MR. INGRAM: That would be after the request of 2 him to withdraw. 3 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Got it. So, sir, here's 4 5 your opportunity. MR. HALL: Okay. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: If you request to withdraw, you can come back, with the paperwork or the 8 documents requested, at the next Board meeting. If not, 9 then you would have to wait a year. 10 Okay. Well, I will make that 11 MR. HALL: request to withdraw and come back later with the proof. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. MR. HALL: And how am I to submit the proof? 14 15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So let us, let's qo through the process and vote on that. And then someone 16 from the PILB will get to you and explain that process 17 to you. Okay? 18 MR. HALL: Okay. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I'll take a motion now 21 on Mr. Hall's request to withdraw his application at this time, or his appeal at this time. 22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move 23 that we grant Mr. Hall's withdrawal of his appeal so 24 2.5 that he can come back at a later time.

1	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Is there a second?
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second it.
3	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Any other
4	discussion?
5	Okay. All in favor, please state "aye." Aye.
6	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Aye.
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Aye.
8	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Aye.
9	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So that's
10	unanimous. Sir, Mr. Hall?
11	MR. HALL: Yes.
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Please get in contact with
13	the Board, and they will explain to you how to get that
14	information or how to get that information to them. And
15	the request is that you go back and provide that
16	information so we can make a better decision. Okay?
17	MR. HALL: Okay. Thank you very much.
18	MR. INGRAM: And, for the record, Kevin Ingram.
19	Mr. Hall, Investigator Jones will reach out to you in
20	the next couple of days. Okay?
21	MR. HALL: Okay. Thank you.
22	MR. INGRAM: Thank you.
23	MR. HALL: Okay. You guys have a nice day.
24	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.
25	Okay. And Anthony Dunn, number 142, are you

here? 1 2 MR. DUNN: I'm here. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir. 3 And thank you for the understanding. 4 Okay. Investigator, can we please hear about 5 Mr. Dunn? 6 7 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The applicant was arrested in 1992, out of the Georgia. 8 The charge was theft by receiving stolen property, at 9 misdemeanor level. Disposition showed 12 months 10 probation, four days jail. This was not disclosed. 11 1994, out of Georgia, DUI, misdemeanor, 12 12 13 months probation and a fine, not disclosed. 1996, Georgia, DUI, misdemeanor, 12 months 14 probation, two days jail and a fine, not disclosed. 15 Also in 1996, out of Georgia, the charge was 16 battery, misdemeanor, 12 months probation and a fine, 17 not disclosed. 18 Also in 1996, out of Georgia, another DUI, 19 misdemeanor level, a fine of \$2,500, not disclosed. 20 In December of '96, in Georgia, probation 21 violation at felony level, probation terms are altered, 22 not disclosed. On the disposition, it gave a date of 23 12-13-1996, and it said continue on a regional probation 24 2.5 or parole order.

1	In June of '97, in Georgia, the charge was
2	habitual violator, federal, sorry, felony level.
3	Disposition showed two years probation, 40 hours
4	community service, and not disclosed. The fingerprint
5	report did not mention specifics. However, the
6	applicant had been convicted three times previously for
7	DUI.
8	In 1997, in October, in Georgia, probation
9	violation, misdemeanor level. Probation terms were
10	altered. This was not disclosed. The disposition did
11	not give the altered probation terms.
12	In 2017, in Nevada, misdemeanor domestic
13	battery. This case was denied in the court. It was
14	disclosed, and court docs were made available.
15	The applicant was initially made provisional on
16	9-16 of '19 but was not added to any company roster. He
17	disclosed item number 9 and provided court
18	documentation, but the other arrests were found on the
19	fingerprint report. He was denied 10-8 of '19.
20	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.
21	Mr. Dunn, can I verify, do you understand that
22	you're under oath?
23	MR. DUNN: Yeah. Yeah. No, you didn't say
24	that, but I understand.
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you. And so,

1	please, you know, you've heard the concerns or the
2	investigator's notes. Would you please update us.
3	MR. DUNN: All I'm telling you is I don't
4	think, some of that stuff is not me. Somebody must have
5	been using my name. Because I did lose my ID, right. I
6	did lose my ID. There was 400 and something dollars
7	stolen out of my wallet, right. And I lost my ID.
8	Somebody was out. And I did go down to the police
9	department. I don't know what they called this in '94
10	when your identity was being stolen, or whatever,
11	whatever. Like, but I know, back in '97 and '96, I did
12	get two. I got a DUI one year. Then I got a DUI the
13	second time.
14	I went back. I went back because I wanted to
15	get a watch ya call it? What kind of card? Not the
16	guard card, but the federal fingerprint card, right, to
17	work at the casino. So I went back to Georgia in 2007,
18	right, and went there and disclosed that I went to the
19	court, right. Instead of them, instead of them telling
20	me, right, that I have to do time here, they said just
21	don't get any DUIs and this is closed out. I went, I
22	flew down there just to get that done, to get the cards
23	that I needed.
24	So I wouldn't have ever known that I had any,
25	any felony, right, because I never thought I did. They

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1	said if I got a third DUI. He mentioned four DUIs. So
2	I know for a fact that that ain't it, because I know I
3	only got two. Okay. I've only had two, like in '96 and
4	'97.
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Please mute your phone if
6	you're not speaking.
7	MR. DUNN: You can't hear me?
8	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, I can hear you, sir.
9	I hear a lot of background noise as well.
10	MR. DUNN: Oh. Yes, I don't know if I'm able
11	to get this information. That was when I went down
12	there, right. And not even the situation, right. I was
13	working for Amazon last year, right. In April, I
14	started working in April, right. When this Covid
15	stuff I'm 60. I'll be 61 next month, right. I was
16	just trying to get a job in time so my kid can get in
17	school. I got a five-year-old. It's my first kid ever,
18	right. I always worked. So I don't know where to get
19	this information. But I've always been a good person,
20	always got a job. I always pass backgrounds in all the
21	jobs I have had in Las Vegas. I've been here 20 years,
22	right. And before I lived here, I lived in Georgia for
23	nine years. I sold cars and helped people out.
24	So the DUIs was coming from me driving a car.
25	I got caught driving. All this other stuff, based on

1	what, I don't have a clue. I don't have a clue, because
2	that wasn't me.
3	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, sir, you were not
4	arrested in 2017 for domestic battery?
5	MR. DUNN: No, never. Never. I wasn't
6	arrested, ma'am.
7	MR. MAXWELL: Madam Chair, Investigator
8	Maxwell.
9	MR. DUNN: Oh, yes, I did. I did. I went to
10	jail, but it wasn't for that. Like they said it was,
11	and they let me go after two hours. The only reason why
12	I went to jail is because nobody can watch my son,
13	right. We had to both go in there, right. And I didn't
14	get charged for that. I didn't get that charge.
15	So what they did, two years ago, they came back
16	after two years, and I got a battery charge, right. I
17	did like 26 weeks, 26 weeks and paid \$980, right.
18	Because I wasn't the one, I wasn't the one should have
19	even got the charge. The person should have got the
20	charge. Well, but because we lived together, and we
21	still live together and married, right, and we still
22	live together and got married, I got that charge. And
23	they moved it down to a battery. It was supposed to be
24	a domestic, but they moved it down to a battery. And I
25	asked them, why did I have to pay all this money out

1	when I didn't do something, right. And they knew it was
2	the person that did it. But I got the charge instead of
3	she getting the charge, right. Because I had never did
4	anything to deserve that. And so I actually did the 26
5	weeks, paid the \$980, right, anything. That's that.
6	Other than that, I went, well, I was trying to
7	get a job with you guys. This popped up. And I didn't
8	understand why the security place didn't hire me,
9	because I didn't know nothing about
10	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.
11	MR. DUNN: the charges you're talking about.
12	Go ahead.
13	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.
14	Investigator, did you have something to add?
15	MR. MAXWELL: Yes, ma'am. Investigator
16	Maxwell. Just to clarify, all the charges were taken
17	from the gentleman's fingerprint report. But he is
18	correct, the domestic battery from 2017, there were no
19	charges for that one, it was actually denied in court.
20	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Okay.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Madam Chair, this is
22	Gronauer.
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes.
24	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: May I make a statement?
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Absolutely.

1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Usually, and from back
2	experience, past experience and now, domestic violence,
3	if you go to jail for domestic violence, whether it's
4	for one hour, two hours, whatever, you go to jail for
5	it, that will not come off your record.
6	MR. DUNN: I didn't get charged for domestic
7	violence.
8	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm not talking to you.
9	MR. DUNN: They said it was a battery.
10	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm not talking to you,
11	sir.
12	MR. DUNN: Oh, I'm sorry.
13	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Wait your turn. Wait
14	your turn. I'm just trying to clarify so the Chairman,
15	the Chairwoman would understand. Domestic violence will
16	usually stay. And if they reduce it down to any charge,
17	it'll still stay on your record as domestic violence.
18	Just so you know.
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, Director Ingram, I
20	just want to reiterate or ask again. It does on the
21	application say "Have you ever been arrested?"
22	MR. INGRAM: That is correct.
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And then it lists a bunch
24	of, you know, a bunch of items. It's not "Have you ever
25	been convicted, have you ever been?" It's "Have you

1	ever been arrested?" And at that point, that's when you
2	should, you know, admit or, you know, state that you've
3	been arrested, because you would have had to have been
4	arrested for these things in order to get it on your
5	record.
6	MR. DUNN: Are you talk to me?
7	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No. To Director Ingram.
8	MR. INGRAM: And you are correct, Chairwoman.
9	The only thing that we have a little caveat on is don't
10	list minor traffic violations. But it says list "all"
11	arrests. There's no time frame. It says "all."
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, sir. I think, it
13	even says "ever."
14	MR. INGRAM: Correct.
15	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.
16	Any other Board questions or statements?
17	Okay. I'll move for a motion. Or, you know,
18	I'll look for a motion.
19	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
20	Brown. I move that we uphold the denial.
21	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you, sir.
22	I need a second.
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second it.
24	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, then, are there any
25	other comments?

1	Okay. All in favor of us upholding the denial
2	for Mr. Dunn, say "aye."
3	(Board members said "aye.")
4	MR. DUNN: You got something for somebody else.
5	I'm confused, right. I told them when I went down
6	there, I don't need the job. I never did it. I don't
7	like people putting stuff out there on me that I didn't
8	even do.
9	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Sir, thank you for your
10	time. Thank you for your time. The decision's been
11	made. You can appeal in a year.
12	MR. DUNN: Okay. Thank you.
13	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.
14	MR. DETMER: And, Madam Chair, I apologize.
15	This is Mike Detmer, for the record. Was that unanimous
16	when the motion passed?
17	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes.
18	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I believe so. Thank you.
19	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes.
20	MR. DETMER: And I apologize for the
21	interruption.
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No worry.
23	MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, Kevin Ingram.
24	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Yes, sir.
25	MR. INGRAM: If we could go ahead and have

1	Board counsel go ahead and swear everybody in that's on
2	the call at this time, we can keep moving fairly
3	quickly.
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you.
5	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Detmer, will you swear those
6	individuals in.
7	MR. DETMER: Always it's my pleasure.
8	For those who are about to testify, raise your
9	right hand. And do you hereby swear and affirm to tell
10	the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?
11	(Applicants and witnesses present were
12	sworn/affirmed.)
13	MR. DETMER: Thank you very much. And please
14	be sure and mute your phone until your item is called.
15	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you, sir.
16	Is Mr or I'm sorry. 143, Amra Webster?
17	MR. WEBSTER: Yes, ma'am, I'm here.
18	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you, sir.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And, Tammy, I'm back.
20	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you. We're on 143.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We're on 143. Do you
22	want to do it, or do you want me to jump back in?
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Please jump back in.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. 143,
25	Amra Webster, are you here, sir?

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1	MR. WEBSTER: Yes, sir, I am.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're going to need to
3	speak up, if that's Mr. Webster.
4	MR. WEBSTER: Yes, sir, I am here.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good enough. Do
6	you understand you're under oath?
7	MR. WEBSTER: Yes, sir, I do.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll turn it over
9	to the investigator.
10	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2004,
11	out of California, the applicant was arrested for
12	burglary at the felony level. This was disclosed. One
13	year four months prison, less credits of 217 days for
14	time served, three years probation. Probation was
15	revoked in 2006. And we pulled the court documents from
16	the San Bernardino Superior Court website.
17	In February of 2006, in California, unlawful
18	sexual intercourse with a minor under 18, at the felony
19	level. This was disclosed. One year four months
20	prison, less credit of 43 days for time served and 14
21	days for good conduct. Again, the court documents were
22	pulled from the San Bernardino Superior Court website.
23	In 2008, California, petty theft with a prior,
24	felony level. This one was not disclosed. One year
25	four months prison, less credit of 69 days for time

1	served and 22 days good conduct credit. Court documents
2	were again pulled from the San Bernardino court website.
3	The applicant was not made provisional. His
4	disclosed arrests were checked on the San Bernardino
5	Superior Court website, and they were shown as felonies,
6	and he was denied on January the 2nd of this year.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
8	Mr. Webster, do you want to explain what
9	happened and why you didn't disclose?
10	MR. WEBSTER: Yes, sir. The reason why I did
11	not disclose that was, is because that was actually ran
12	concurrent with something else that I was being charged
13	for.
14	So I'll take you back to the sex with a minor
15	under the age of 18. I had a relationship with the
16	woman who is now my wife, with three kids, Nicole Yates.
17	She got pregnant with our son at the age of 17. During
18	a meeting with the doctor, she disclosed information
19	about me, and which the doctor took that information and
20	was allowed to violate me on my probation. She, it was
21	stated that she had to give information in regards to a
22	crime due to the fact of the age difference between me
23	and Nicole. So that's why I was violated on probation,
24	was because I had caught a new case in regards to the
25	sex with a minor.

Again, I have a relationship with Nicole Yates, who is now Nicole Webster. We have three kids together, and we raise seven kids together.

In regards to the petty theft, sir, the reason 4 why that wasn't disclosed is because, like I said, it 5 was ran concurrent with something else. I was arrested 6 7 for a petty theft. They found out that I was with Nicole. I had used Nicole as a way to help in regards 8 to having my back in regard to not being found guilty of 9 the petty theft. They still stated that I was guilty of 10 the petty theft. And because I was with Nicole, I have 11 a crime that stated that I wasn't supposed to have 12 13 contact with her. And while I was fighting those conditions of parole, they had violated me for that. 14

15 So I was understand the impression that I 16 wasn't being charged for a violation of parole and not 17 for the petty theft, which is one of the reasons why I 18 did not disclose the information. And I apologize for 19 that.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So I'm clear, for 21 the investigator, which one did he disclose? 22 MR. WEBSTER: I disclosed the sex with a minor 23 under the age of 18 and the commercial burglary. 24 Because I was violated for broken conditions, I did not

25 disclose the petty theft, which was a new charge.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
2	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. That is
3	correct, sir. The burglary was disclosed, and the
4	unlawful sexual intercourse with a minor was disclosed.
5	The petty theft was not.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then,
7	Mr. Webster, what are you doing for employment now?
8	MR. WEBSTER: Well, currently, right now, sir,
9	I am, I am guard-carded in the state of California. I
10	got guard-carded with a company called Global
11	Protection. I do private security bodyguard work. It
12	was so I worked my may up. I am now a field
13	operations manager. I've only stopped working,
14	obviously, because of things going on with Covid.
15	During events that I was working, I came across
16	a company called DTA Security. They liked my work
17	ethics. They were a security consulting company. And
18	during the job that I was managing one of their events,
19	they offered me an opportunity to come to work for their
20	company, which they are out of Nevada. So, actually,
21	DTA is the one who paid for my fees to get licensed in
22	hopes that I could be able to do a trade show that was
23	happening in January. But the time frame and,
24	obviously, because I had a felony, which required an
25	automatic dismissal, that I wasn't able to that job with

1	them. And they have been very patient and waiting to,
2	hopefully, get a decision that would favor for me to be
3	able to do some work with them.
4	Like I said, I still do security work, private
5	work in California only, with Global, like home parties
6	and things of that nature, whatever it is allowed to be
7	done currently right now in California.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And you're
9	currently residing in California?
10	MR. WEBSTER: Yes. Yes, sir.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
12	MR. WEBSTER: For the or no problem, sir.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
14	questions from the Board?
15	All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a
16	motion.
17	I'm call for a motion a second time.
18	MR. THOMAS: Yes, Eddie Thomas.
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I just want to make
20	sure. This is Nixon. I just want to make sure. He
21	disclosed two of the three charges?
22	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. That is
23	correct, ma'am.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And I understand it that
25	he disclosed the felonies and forgot about the petty

1	misdemeanor?
2	MR. MAXWELL: The petty theft showed as a
3	felony on the fingerprint report and, also, the
4	San Bernardino court website, but that was the one that
5	wasn't disclosed.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
7	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And we did do, we did do
8	one year four months in prison for that petty theft?
9	MR. WEBSTER: Yes, ma'am. And, again, I know
10	how serious you guys are about disclosing information.
11	And the only reason, like I said, that I did not
12	disclose that because I was told that that was being ran
13	with my violation of probation, excuse me, a violation
14	of parole. I was given two conditions of parole. One
15	was because, to not have contact with Nicole, because
16	they looked at her as a victim instead of an individual
17	who I had a relationship with. We're a five-year
18	difference. We had a son. So it look a long time in
19	order to be able to fight those conditions, of which I
20	was granted and was given the ability to have contact
21	with her.
22	One of the other conditions was they had given
23	me conditions that I couldn't have a relationship with
24	any minor kids under the age of 18, even though I did
25	not have to register and was not required to register as

a sex offender. So that stopped me from being able to 1 2 raise my kids with Nicole. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Oh, I see. 3 So, again, when I -- we were with MR. WEBSTER: 4 each other because we had to sneak around in order to be 5 able to have a relationship, so that I could raise my 6 7 And so, again, when -son. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Did you two get married? 8 MR. WEBSTER: We got, we actually, we've been 9 together for 18 years, but we've only been married for a 10 year. We got married last year in April. 11 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I see. Okav. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead, Bobby. 15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. When you look at the record, okay, and you see it's one year four 16 months for the first one, one year four months the 17 second one, one year four months for the third one, what 18 California did or what the courts did here, apparently, 19 20 is they put all these right together. You know, and so 21 when he violated probation, the other one comes up, the other one came up. I think, that's what he was trying 22 to explain. At least that's the way I understand it. 23 And when you look at that, the way it's all written out, 24 2.5 San Bernardino, it's one year four months, one year four

1	months, one year four months. It's like, okay, you
2	violated your probation, so now we'll add this on to you
3	again. That's, you know, almost like a stacking up.
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So, Bobby, just so I
5	understand, so he only in total did one year four
6	months, not one year four months three times?
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's up to the
8	applicant to answer that or else
9	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.
10	MR. WEBSTER: Yes. Yes, ma'am, that is
11	correct. With the petty theft violation, again, they
12	told me it was a broken condition. So I was being
13	charged for breaking conditions of parole. They ran
14	concurrent. And that was the only thing that I was
15	being aware of, because they were trying to get me more
16	for the broken conditions, because they felt that it
17	would hold more time. But when they found out that it
18	was breaking conditions in regards to Nicole, who we
19	have kids with, my conditions in regards to my kids was
20	dismissed while I was incarcerated. And a month after I
21	was released in December of 2008, January 1st my parole
22	officer contacted me and told me that my conditions in
23	regards to Nicole were dismissed.
24	So all this stuff, yes, sir, and yes, ma'am,
25	was all ran concurrent, which is why I was only was

1	released 30 days and was already off of parole.
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Excuse me. But
3	that's the way I'm looking at it, too, is that because
4	of the way it's written on here, it looks like
5	everything was concurrent, it was all put together. And
6	then he made a misstep, and so they said, "Okay. We'll
7	add this to it." And somebody can violate his parole at
8	this time, or probation, whatever.
9	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Thank you. I'm
10	ready to make a motion.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
12	questions?
13	Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.
14	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is
15	MR. WEBSTER: I know it's Nixon.
16	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I don't know my name.
17	Nixon. I move to approve the appeal of Mr. Amra
18	Webster.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
20	Do I have a second?
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.
22	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I will second.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Gronauer
24	seconds. Any further discussion?
25	All right. Just for the record, I understand

1	why there's confusion, but I also understand that
2	Mr. Webster did disclose. And maybe we missed a minor
3	procedural thing, but he did disclose, if anything, the
4	more serious charges. And he explained himself well.
5	So with that, I will, unless there's any other
6	discussion, I'll call for a vote.
7	Hearing none, all those in favor of the motion,
8	state "aye."
9	(Board members said "aye.")
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
11	All right. Mr. Webster, good luck to you.
12	MR. WEBSTER: Thank you guys so very much. I
13	really appreciate this, sir, ma'am.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.
15	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.
16	MR. WEBSTER: Thank you guys.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Ingram, do you want
18	to do Mr. Williams, number 115?
19	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. We had asked him to
20	call back in at 1:00 o'clock.
21	And Mr. Donald Williams, agenda number 115, are
22	you currently on the call, sir?
23	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir, I am here.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.
25	Mr. Williams, please understand that you're still under

1	oath. Do you understand that?
2	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to let
4	Mr. Ingram tell you what we found out. And before you
5	jump to any conclusions, I'm going to speak after
6	Mr. Ingram, because I don't think you're going to make
7	the right conclusion.
8	MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair. So the
9	information that we were able to uncover
10	(There was an outside interruption.)
11	MR. INGRAM: Excuse me. Who's speaking right
12	now?
13	(There was an outside interruption.)
14	MR. INGRAM: Who's speaking right now?
15	MR. WILLIAMS: I don't know, sir.
16	MR. INGRAM: Okay. I think, they got off the
17	call.
18	Okay. Mr. Williams, what we were able to find
19	out was that the company you were employed by
20	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
21	MR. INGRAM: is not licensed in Nevada. We
22	did contact them, and they did provide us information
23	that they are currently providing services in Nevada.
24	MR. WILLIAMS: Okay.
25	MR. INGRAM: So we have opened an investigation

into that company, and we will be following through on a 1 very thorough investigation of that company. So at --2 MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah, I got the -- oh. I'm 3 4 sorry. MR. INGRAM: So at this time, I'll turn it back 5 over to Chairman Flynn. 6 7 MR. WILLIAMS: Okay. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And, Mr. Williams, 8 whatever the company is doing, as far as I'm concerned, 9 has no reflection on you. 10 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you, sir. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You did answer our 12 13 questions before. More importantly, you did disclose what occurred. And so I don't have any further 14 questions. I will throw it out to the Board if they've 15 got any. 16 All right. Hearing no questions -- hearing no 17 questions from the Board, I will entertain a motion. 18 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll 21 make a motion to grant the appeal. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 22 Do I have a second? 23 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We have a motion. 25

1	We have a second. And I'll call for a vote if there's
2	no further discussion.
3	All those in favor, state "aye."
4	(Board members said "aye.")
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
6	Mr. Williams, congratulations. You have a good day.
7	MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. I appreciate it.
8	You have a good day.
9	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Thank you.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So if I'm correct, we're
11	up to number 144, Mr. Ingram?
12	MR. INGRAM: That is correct, 144.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Why don't we
14	do, before we get to that, why don't we your 186. Let's
15	make sure we take care of that today.
16	MR. INGRAM: Okay. So item number 186. I'm
17	going to go ahead and ask legal counsel Detmer to go
18	ahead and take over on this item agenda, so that we
19	don't in any way affect the Board's ability to decide on
20	a hearing in the future.
21	Mr. Detmer.
22	MR. DETMER: And good afternoon. Mike Detmer,
23	for the record. Out of consideration for the Board's
24	time, the length of the agenda, as well as those in the
25	queue, I'm going to make every effort to be brief and

1	try to just summarize and allow for questions as needed.
2	This summary investigation is being conducted
3	into a set of matters, will determine if it would be
4	prudent to get issued subpoena duces tecum for further
5	substantiation and/or for burden of proof
6	considerations. While NRS 648.160, I believe it's
7	sub 3, cannot be interpreted to vest the authority to
8	issue subpoenas in the Executive Director, it was my
9	belief that out of further prudence, it would be a good
10	idea to have this delegation clearly provided by the
11	Board.
12	So with that, I would submit. So if it wasn't
13	clear, the main request for this agenda item, the
14	delegation of authority to the ED to issue subpoena
15	duces tecum on the matters that are listed under this
16	item.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So do you have
18	anything else, Mr. Detmer?
19	MR. DETMER: I submit to any questions that the
20	Board may have.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And just for my
22	fellow Board members, the Executive Director discussed
23	this with me during one of our regular discussions,
24	meetings. And I felt that not only can we delegate this
25	to him, in terms of issuing subpoenas, but I did ask him

1	that, in the future, when he does use this delegation,
2	that he needs to report to the Board on the type of
3	subpoenas he's issuing and the type of cases.
4	And with that, I'll turn it over to any
5	questions from the Board.
6	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
8	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, it gives him
9	optimum power. I have no problem with that at all, in a
10	lot of ways, and I trust our Executive Director. And,
11	but there's always other executive directors maybe in
12	the future. And I just want to know, do we have any
13	guidelines for something like this, rather
14	MR. DETMER: This is Mike Detmer, for the
15	record. I'm sorry. Please proceed, Board Member
16	Gronauer.
17	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'm sorry. The
18	idea was the guidelines that was just stated just tell
19	us about afterwards. I'd like to know maybe if we have
20	some guidelines to keep him within them guidelines.
21	That's all I'm asking.
22	MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. So
23	as to this particular agenda item, it is specific to a
24	certain investigation that's being conducted on an
25	appeal citation. It is my belief that it was going to

be a more generalized delegation for any and all 1 investigations, that that should probably be done under 2 a regulation. 3 In this instance, it would be specifically for, 4 again, for this particular investigation and only for 5 matters that would further the investigation, either for 6 further substantiation reasons or for burden of proof 7 considerations. 8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So, I quess, going to 10 Commissioner Gronauer's, there's no guidelines right 11 now, either under NAC or PILB policy, is there, for 12 13 subpoenas? MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. 14 No, 15 nothing that is clearly spelled out, as far as the NRS 648 or NAC 648 goes. There are, there is 16 generalized language, but it's basically just for the 17 purpose of investigation or for matters of importance to 18 the Board. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So, I think, we've got 21 two matters at hand. One is the subpoenas that the Executive Director wants to execute now for a particular 22 investigation, and then what we do in the future. 23 And that's how I understand where the discussion should go. 24 MR. DETMER: Chairman, if I may, I would advise 25

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1	against the latter. I believe, it's going to be for
2	future delegations. If it's like a broad one, like a
3	generalized rule of general applicability, that needs to
4	go by regulation. This would just be specific to this
5	one, this one matter.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
7	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, if I may, Kevin Ingram.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
9	MR. INGRAM: Since our discussion, I reached
10	out to LCB, under the direction of Board counsel, to
11	clarify how we would move forward for future, if the
12	Board intended to do so. It was too late to get it on
13	the proposed NACs that have already been provided. And
14	we can do that in the future. But, again, as Mr. Detmer
15	said, that would be under a separate agenda item on a
16	future meeting, for us to be able to move forward and
17	draft that. At the time we briefly spoke, we did not
18	have that understanding from LCB at that time. So this
19	is new information since we last spoke.
20	Thank you.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. So for
22	today's purposes, it's only you're asking for subpoenas
23	on these four cases. Is that correct?
24	MR. INGRAM: That is correct.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then you guys

1	will work on putting something together, if we do this
2	in the future, to address Commissioner Gronauer's
3	concern, which I also agree with.
4	MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. That
5	can't be done, Chair, because
6	(There was an outside interruption.)
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Those of you that are on
8	the call that aren't part of this agenda item, you need
9	to mute. Thank you.
10	Bobby, are you okay with this?
11	Is anybody there? It just went really silent.
12	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, I'm here now.
13	Okay.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The way it's written in
16	the agenda item is pretty, it is specific. So it
17	already gives you the guidelines for them four cases.
18	So long as we're not going any further than that, I'm
19	good with it.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Kevin, can you
21	divulge what type of cases these are?
22	MR. DETMER: Chairman, if I may?
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
24	MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. I
25	hesitate to go any too far into a factual, the factual

1	scenario, because I don't want to bias the Board if and
2	when it sits as the trier of fact. I will go to what
3	extent that I can. What I can say, if it's helpful in
4	the immediate, is that it is an unlawful activity
5	citation.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good enough.
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's good.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I good. So we
9	understand that this is strictly for these four cases
10	that has to do with unlawful activity. And I need a
11	motion to delegate.
12	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
14	motion. Do I have a second?
15	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
17	I have a second. Any other discussion?
18	I'll call for a vote. Oh, before I call for a
19	vote, is there any public comment on this particular
20	item?
21	All right. Hearing none, call for a vote. All
22	those in favor, say "aye."
23	(Board members said "aye.")
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
25	All right. Number 144, Philip Corrado.

Mr. Corrado, are you here? 1 MR. CORRADO: I am present. 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you for your 3 patience, sir. Do you understand you're under oath? 4 MR. CORRADO: Yes, sir. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the 6 7 investigator jump in. MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. 9 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a 10 1987 defraud an innkeeper, out of Virginia, at a felony 11 level, where he was convicted and received two years of 12 13 probation. The applicant did not disclose this arrest. The court documents show he received two years of 14 15 probation. In 1988, out of Virginia, there was a larceny 16 credit card theft at a felony level. The applicant was 17 convicted and received five years of probation. The 18 applicant did not disclose this arrest. This arrest and 19 20 conviction caused the applicant's probation for 21 defrauding an innkeeper to be revoked. The applicant was then sentenced to five years of probation. 22 In 1997, out of California, there was an 23 24 inflict corporal injury to a spouse at a felony level, 2.5 where the applicant received four years of probation and

1	four months jail time. They did disclose this and also
2	provided the California Penal Code 1203.4 on his
3	application. The dismissal was confirmed with the
4	applicant's fingerprint report.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Corrado, do
6	you want to explain why you didn't disclose?
7	MR. CORRADO: Absolutely. Just an oversight,
8	to be totally honest with you and to throw myself at the
9	mercy of the Board here. I hadn't disclosed that on any
10	of my security clearance applications for probably the
11	past 20 years. And, honestly, I'm not denying it. I
12	did both of those. It did happen back, back then, when
13	I was younger. And I wish I would have put that on my
14	application, because I wouldn't be in the situation
15	today and wasting everybody's time. So I do apologize.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. It's short and
17	sweet. I like that.
18	All right. Any other questions from the Board?
19	Okay. Mr. Corrado, what are you doing for
20	employment these days?
21	MR. CORRADO: I am currently a federal canine
22	contracted officer with the Defense Logistic Agency in
23	Tracy, California, with the Department of Defense, where
24	I have been with them for the past four and a half
25	years.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And why do you want a
2	guard card in Nevada?
3	MR. CORRADO: I own and operate my own company
4	here in California, which is Confidential Canine. And I
5	do get calls very often to come out and help with big
6	major events that are out there. And I also am heavily
7	involved in the private aviation sector. And I have
8	several clients that go in and out of Nevada at least
9	every month, sometimes twice a month. And I would like
10	to be able to come into Nevada to legally be at the
11	airport and see a few planes and make sure these planes
12	are getting screened before my clients get back on them.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
14	MR. CORRADO: You're welcome, sir.
15	All right. For the second time, any questions
16	from the Board?
17	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I have a
18	question. This is Gronauer.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
20	MR. CORRADO: Yes, sir.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. When you come in
22	and out of Nevada, who are you working for?
23	MR. CORRADO: Generally, I work for JetSmarter
24	or XO Jet. And I also work for, I also do some
25	security well, it's not really security. We're

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1	getting some suites for the executives at Twitter. So,
2	basically, when I do fly in, I fly into Nevada. I'd
3	stay at the airport. I usually don't leave the airport.
4	They come back. I make sure the plane's fine, and they
5	fly out.
6	But I have not been going to Nevada since I
7	talked to the investigator. And I haven't been to
8	Nevada since probably last year. But I have been going
9	in and out of Nevada before I even knew I needed a work
10	card. I didn't think I needed one, because we would
11	come in, and, like I said, I never even left the
12	airport. I'd usually stay in the plane. But I do get
13	called quite a bit by other companies to come in to work
14	some events.
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Well, a
16	work card is not a license. Do you understand that?
17	MR. CORRADO: Yes, sir, I do understand that.
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So if you have a work
19	card, you should be working with a licensed person.
20	MR. CORRADO: Correct. Mr. Vinny explained
21	that to me. Like I told him, I do get other companies
22	that want me to come out there. But he did also tell me
23	that I should probably mention to the Board that I do
24	want to follow up and get our active license with the
25	state, so we can be 100 percent within the limits of the

1	law here.
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Mr. Ingram, did
3	I explain that correctly?
4	MR. INGRAM: Yes. If they're working DOJ
5	contracts specifically with the airlines, they may have
6	some freedom to do that. But working independent of
7	DOJ, you are 100 percent correct. And, I think, it was
8	well-explained. Thank you.
9	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.
10	Thank you, Mr. Corrado.
11	MR. CORRADO: You're welcome, sir.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
13	Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.
14	I'll call for a motion a second time.
15	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
16	Brown. I move that we grant the appeal for Mr. Corrado.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
18	Do I have a second?
19	Okay. I have a motion, but I don't have a
20	second. I'll call it one more time.
21	Okay. Motion failed. I'll call for a new
22	motion. Anybody that has a new motion?
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion we deny

1	the appeal, with a caveat that we usually stay with the
2	noncompliance or not reporting it. And, I think, he can
3	reapply if do all the proper stuff.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
5	to deny. But, all right, and we will explain that to
6	the applicant. Do I have a second?
7	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
9	and a second. Any further discussion?
10	Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All
11	those in favor, state "aye."
12	(Board members said "aye.")
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
14	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Nay. Brown.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. One opposed. So
16	the motion passes three to one.
17	So, Mr. Corrado, basically, what you heard is
18	that when you reapply in a year, disclose everything.
19	And, hopefully, things will go a lot better.
20	MR. CORRADO: All right. Thank you very much.
21	I'm not going to let this hinder me working, to be
22	totally honest with you, so. I mean I did everything I
23	was supposed to do. I understand what you guys said. I
24	have had no problems with anything. And I've heard you
25	guys approve way worse since I've been on the line for

1	the past three hours. But again, I will reapply. But
2	if I have to come into Nevada with a flight, I'm not
3	going to let my client sit there and not have
4	protection. We both know the private industry has
5	nobody checking those planes there. And I'm not going
6	to let my clients down.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, don't be
8	threatening our procedures. You have fun in California.
9	MR. CORRADO: I'm not threatening your
10	procedures. You're threatening my livelihood.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You enjoy your business
12	in California. You have a good day, sir. Well, look,
13	I'll remember you next year when you come forward.
14	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair. Mr. Chair, if I may?
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.
16	MR. INGRAM: Any violations of our chapter are
17	also, can be processed criminally, both for misdemeanor
18	and gross misdemeanor. I just want to put that on the
19	record. Thank you very much.
20	MR. CORRADO: All right. You're welcome.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm well aware of the
22	criminal charges.
23	MR. CORRADO: Okay. Thank you very much. Have
24	a great day.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 145,
	574

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1	Stephanie Amaya, are you here? 145, Stephanie Amaya?
2	Okay. We will trail that.
3	146, Charles Meeks, are you here?
4	MR. MEEKS: Yes, sir.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Do you
6	understand you're under oath, sir?
7	MR. MEEKS: Yes, sir.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to turn
9	this over to the investigator.
10	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2000,
11	out of Oklahoma, the applicant was charged with larceny
12	of merchandise from a retailer. This was at felony
13	level. Disposition showed he was given one year in
14	jail, where 315 days of those were suspended, and an
15	unknown probation term. This was not disclosed, and we
16	do not have court docs.
17	The applicant did not disclose the arrest on
18	the application. He was initially made provisional on
19	12-5 of '19 and was not on any roster. The arrest was
20	found on the fingerprint report, and he was denied on
21	1-8 of this year.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you want to
23	explain what happened, please?
24	MR. MEEKS: Okay. The bottom line is I was
25	wrong place, wrong time. I was young. My brother was

1	shoplifting, him and his friends. And they got away.
2	His friends pointed the finger at me, since I was over
3	the age. And I got arrested for their crime. And next
4	thing I know, I'm doing the I'm doing jail time for
5	their crime that they committed.
6	And I did not disclose it because it was almost
7	20 years ago. And the time I went to go put the
8	application in, it was too late.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why? I misunderstood.
10	Why was it too late to disclose?
11	MR. MEEKS: I already submitted the
12	application. And I had a lot of stuff already going on
13	in my life already, taking care of mom and dad.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
15	MR. MEEKS: But that's my fault.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. What are you
17	doing for employment now?
18	MR. MEEKS: I'm a mobile mechanic. I do
19	mechanic work for disabled vets.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
21	Any other questions from the Board?
22	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Where do you
23	live now, sir?
24	MR. MEEKS: I live here in Las Vegas, right
25	here in North Las Vegas, 89030, over by Kerry and

1	Commerce.
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Are you
3	registered with the Sheriff's Department?
4	MR. MEEKS: Yes.
5	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you know what I
6	mean? Are you registered as an ex-felon?
7	MR. MEEKS: Oh. No, sir.
8	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Do you know the
9	law on that?
10	MR. MEEKS: No, sir.
11	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. I advise
12	you to look that up, okay, about registering as an
13	ex-felon with the Sheriff in Clark County.
14	MR. MEEKS: Yes, sir.
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And that's all I have.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
17	questions?
18	All right. Call for a vote. I'm sorry. I'll
19	call for a motion.
20	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
21	that we uphold Mr. Charles Meeks' denial due to
22	nondisclosure.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
24	Do I have a second?
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

1	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Brown will.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Gronauer seconds. Any
4	further discussion?
5	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
6	All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
7	(Board members said "aye.")
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
9	All right. Mr. Meeks, good luck to you. You
10	can reapply in a year.
11	MR. MEEKS: All right. Thank you, sir.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 147,
13	Tonja Newson?
14	MS. NEWSON: Yes, sir.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand
16	you're under oath?
17	MS. NEWSON: Yes, sir.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the
19	investigator jump in.
20	MR. MAXWELL: 1986, out of California, the
21	applicant was charged with taking a vehicle without
22	owner's consent, at misdemeanor level. Disposition
23	showed 180 days jail. This was not disclosed. We do
24	not have court docs.
25	In June of the same year, in California, grand

theft from a person. This was charged at misdemeanor 1 level. 36 months probation, 180 days jail, not 2 disclosed, no court docs. 3 January '87, California, possess CS 4 paraphernalia, misdemeanor, six months jail, not 5 disclosed, no court docs. 6 7 In March of '87, possess narcotic controlled substance, out of California. This was a wobbler. 8 Disposition showed a 16-month prison, did not disclose, 9 and no court docs. The wobbler means that it could be 10 charged as either a misdemeanor or a felony. 11 April of '88, out of California, possess 12 13 narcotic controlled substance. Again, it was a wobbler. 36 months probation, not disclosed, no court docs. 14 February '89, California, obstruct/resist a 15 public officer, misdemeanor, 60 days jail, not 16 disclosed, no court docs. 17 July '91, California, false ID to specific 18 peace officers, misdemeanor, two years probation, nine 19 20 days jail, not disclosed, no court docs. 21 February 2000, California, possess narcotic controlled substance, felony, 16 months prison, not 22 disclosed, no court docs. 23 The applicant was initially made provisional on 24 2.5 February of this year and hired by Contemporary Services

1	Corporation, license 1621, on February 19th of this
2	year. All arrests and convictions were found on the
3	fingerprint report. She was denied on March 10th of
4	this year and terminated from CSC the same day.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
6	Do you want to explain why you didn't disclose?
7	MS. NEWSON: Well, I'm just so, I'm ashamed.
8	I'm just so ashamed I can't even talk. I got my life
9	together now. But I don't, I'm not a I was doing
10	good. And I didn't think I had to go back so far. 10
11	years? But there's more than that. But I so
12	embarrassed. Even if you don't give it to me, I'll
13	understand. I'm 56 years old. I was on drugs. I lived
14	in the projects. I lived in Vegas. I got a job. I
15	work at Amazon. I'm a new driver. But I'm just, oh, so
16	sorry. I didn't even realize I did all that stuff. I
17	know I did something. I was on drugs. I'm just, I'm so
18	sorry.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. What
20	we'll do, since you forgot most of these, and I believe
21	you, is that we will ensure that you get a listing, that
22	we'll send to you, either email or mail, so you'll
23	remember in the future for whether you're applying for
24	this job or any other.
25	MS. NEWSON: I won't apply no more, because I'm

1	just, I'm done. I never thought that it would come back
2	this far. I'm 57. That happened over 20, 30 years ago.
3	But I understand it. But I'm done.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, no, but, you know,
5	we're still having a meeting. I'm only speaking for
6	myself. There's other Board members here.
7	MS. NEWSON: I mean I was working, I was
8	working in Vegas at the Sphere. I worked at 3:00 at
9	night to 11:00 in the afternoon, and that was my shift.
10	And they wanted me back. But I didn't even know I did
11	anything until they came and got me.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
13	MS. NEWSON: I was like, what did I do? And
14	they pulled me from my post.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Take a
16	breath.
17	MR. NEWSON: Oh, yeah.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Maxwell, what was
19	the year of the last arrest?
20	MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir. Investigator Maxwell.
21	That was February of 2000.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 20 years ago.
23	And did he disclose any?
24	MR. MAXWELL: No, sir, nothing was disclosed.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.

1	Any other questions from the Board?
2	MS. NEWSON: You know, my life was doing good.
3	I just need a chance. I'm embarrassed, though. Just
4	give me a chance.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay, ma'am. Just catch
6	your breath.
7	No other questions from the Board?
8	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll ask a couple
9	questions. Ms it's Ms. Tonja, right?
10	MS. NEWSON: Yes, sir.
11	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Ms. Newson?
12	MS. NEWSON: Yes.
13	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Where did you live when
14	you were having the drug problems?
15	MS. NEWSON: In the projects, they call it the
16	biggest thing going in L.A.
17	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: In L.A. Okay. Where
18	do you live now?
19	MS. NEWSON: I live in Vegas. I live up here
20	by Subway. I got a new car. My credit score is good.
21	I work with Amazon. I Lyft drive. But I haven't done
22	no Lyft driving since this stuff broke out. And when it
23	broke out, I was working at CRC. And I was there at the
24	Sphere. I worked 3:00 at night. And I was there every
25	day. They wrote a letter. They want me to come back.

1	And I didn't even know what I did.
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's okay. I'm just
3	trying to get some clarity out of it. That's all. No
4	problem.
5	MS. NEWSON: I haven't done nothing. I'm so
6	sorry. I'm just, I just started crying when I heard her
7	read that stuff. I'm just sorry.
8	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. We're not
9	trying to hurt you or anything else. We just have to do
10	our job.
11	MS. NEWSON: Okay.
12	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Calm down. Thank you.
13	MS. NEWSON: I appreciate this.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
15	questions from the Board?
16	All right. I'll seek a motion.
17	Okay. I'm calling for a motion a second time.
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm going to make a
19	motion. This is Gronauer.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Go ahead, please.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And it's against
22	what we usually do, I mean what I usually do. The
23	nondisclosure is very, very important to me.
24	MS. NEWSON: Yes, sir.
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And if you look at it

1	as being messed up on drugs and stuff. But we've denied
2	other people. And I don't do this on pity or anything
3	else. I do it as a hand up rather than a hand out. And
4	I'm just trying to figure out what's the best thing to
5	do. I don't know Ms. Tonja at all. I don't think it's
6	telling for you all the way. But the disclosure really
7	bothers me. And I just, I could just make the motion.
8	It's up to the Board to do the rest. I'll make a motion
9	to grant the appeal.
10	MS. NEWSON: Thank you.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
12	to grant the appeal. Is there a second?
13	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I would like to second.
14	But, you know, again, I'm with Gronauer that this is
15	normally not our practice. But when I look at the
16	crimes, it does seem as though most of them are, you
17	know, not done to a particular person, most of them, but
18	based off of drug addict or drug problems. And so I
19	will second this motion based off of time and distance.
20	MS. NEWSON: Thank you.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I've got a
22	motion. I've got a second. Any further discussion from
23	the Board?
24	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have to make it clear
25	to everybody else, prior and after, that it is very

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1	serious, again, I'll be redundant, about disclosure.
2	This happens to be well over 20 years ago, and that's
3	the reason I gave it a little extra okay. Thank you.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I got a motion.
5	I've got a second. Any other discussion?
6	MS. NEWSON: Thank you.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Hearing
8	none, I'll call for a vote. All those in favor, state
9	"aye."
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	MS. NEWSON: Thank you.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed?
13	All right. Motion carries. Congratulations to
14	you. Good luck.
15	MS. NEWSON: Thank you. Thank you. Thank you.
16	Do I just hang up? What do I do?
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Ingram.
18	MR. INGRAM: Yeah, just go ahead and hang up.
19	An investigator will reach out to you in the next day or
20	so.
21	MS. NEWSON: Thank you. Thank you so much.
22	Thank you.
23	MR. INGRAM: Thank you. Bye-bye.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 148,
25	Marian Williams. Is Marian Williams here? Calling

1	Marian Williams one more time?
2	All right. I will trail this one.
3	Number 149, Timothy Baden?
4	MR. BADEN: I'm here.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did I pronounce your
6	last name correctly?
7	MR. BADEN: Yes, you did.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware
9	you're under oath?
10	MR. BADEN: Yes, sir, I am.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Will the
12	investigator please give us your report.
13	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
14	applicant was denied for a 1984 robbery with the use of
15	a firearm, out of California. This was a felony, where
16	the applicant received a minimum of 12 years prison
17	sentence. The applicant did not disclose this arrest
18	and conviction. The fingerprint report showed the
19	conviction and prison sentence.
20	Also in 1984, there was a grand theft property
21	and report of false crime, which was a misdemeanor,
22	where the applicant received 36 months probation and 180
23	days in jail. The applicant did not disclose this
24	arrest and conviction. And just to make it clear, the
25	misdemeanor conviction was in April of 1984. Whereas

1	the robbery with use of a firearm was November 30th of
2	1984.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Baden, do you
4	want to explain why you didn't disclose?
5	MR. BADEN: The reason I didn't disclose was
6	because twice, once by an apartment manager that did a
7	background check on me for an apartment in California,
8	told me I no longer I didn't have a record showing.
9	Well, I verified that with the Riverside County Sheriff,
10	a deputy at the Riverside County Sheriff's Department
11	that told me the same thing. So it was my understanding
12	that I no longer needed to disclose.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So let me understand.
14	An apartment manager told you you didn't need to
15	disclose?
16	MR. BADEN: Well, no, an apartment manager told
17	me that I no longer well, she did say I didn't need
18	to disclose. But I went to the sheriff's department to
19	verify, and they told me the same. I was told the same
20	thing there, I no longer had to disclose.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did you get anything in
22	writing?
23	MR. BADEN: No, I didn't. It was verbal.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you remember who the
25	deputy was?

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MR. BADEN: No, sir, I don't. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you 3 doing currently for work? MR. BADEN: I'm on Social Security, and I'm an 4 ordained pastor. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other arrests 6 7 besides that robbery one in 1984? MR. BADEN: Not that I can remember. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what was the 9 circumstances of the robbery? 10 MR. BADEN: I had just lost my mom. And I 11 allowed myself to be influenced. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Who did you rob? MR. BADEN: I robbed a store. 14 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Was anybody injured? 16 MR. BADEN: No. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what are you 18 doing for employment now? 19 20 MR. BADEN: I'm on Social Security. And, as I 21 say, I am an ordained pastor now. I don't get paid for What I do is I do broadcast. I've been doing 22 it. broadcast over KKBV. 23 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Thank 2.5 you.

1	Any other questions from the Board?
2	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Can I just I'm sorry.
3	Can I just confirm the name is Timothy Baden?
4	MR. BADEN: Yes.
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So, I guess, I go
6	back to the original. Even if someone told you that you
7	didn't need to disclose anymore, the application states
8	"Have you ever been arrested?" I just have such a hard
9	time with, you know, not disclosing these that are even
10	arrested.
11	MR. BADEN: I can understand that, from having
12	sat here yesterday and listened, because I was told
13	yesterday I needed to call. And then for the few hours
14	that I've been listening today, I can understand that.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
16	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I have a
17	question. How much time did you do, how much time did
18	you build in prison?
19	MR. BADEN: I did eight and a half years.
20	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So you were
21	around 29 years old when this robbery occurred, correct?
22	MR. BADEN: About 27, I think.
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Where did you do
24	your time?
25	MR. BADEN: I did it in the last place I was

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1	at was in Norco, California. But I was also, I started
2	out in Tehachapi. And I went to Donovan Correctional
3	Facility. And I paroled out of the facility in Norco.
4	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And you are off
5	all paper now?
6	MR. BADEN: Yes, I am. I have been '96.
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. No problem.
8	Thank you.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
10	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, you know, let me
11	make another statement. Okay. Because it always helps
12	to, because since everybody else is on the line, if you
13	don't mind, Mr. Chairman?
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, not at all.
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. You know,
16	listening, you know, I understand people in California
17	and Nevada, they run, property managers are supposed to
18	run background checks. That don't mean they do real
19	good. Some background checks for gun purchases don't
20	always come back properly, because they're not always
21	ran properly. And to go to a police department to run,
22	they could just run a local thing and say there's
23	nothing. Because you'd have to do I think, Ray would
24	understand, I mean the Chairman would understand a
25	Triple I or something like that to find out your

1	information.
2	So it is still is incumbent on the applicant,
3	on every applicant, to "Were you ever arrested?" Ever.
4	And most of our applicants sound very, very intelligent.
5	They sound intelligent enough to read the question and
6	write the answer.
7	I want to make sure everybody understands that.
8	I'm good. Thank you.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
10	questions?
11	All right. Hearing none, I'll entertain a
12	motion.
13	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. My motion
14	this is Gronauer.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
16	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: My motion is to deny
17	the appeal.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
19	to deny. Do I have a second?
20	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I
21	reluctantly second. I just wish they would just. I
22	second.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any further discussion?
24	Hearing none, I'll call a vote. All those in
25	favor of the motion, state "aye."

1	(Board members said "aye.")
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: The appeal is denied.
3	Mr. Baden, good luck to you. And, please, please, reply
4	next year, and remember to disclose.
5	MR. BADEN: I will. And thank you.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. George Harvey,
7	number 150?
8	MR. HARVEY: Yes.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Harvey, do
10	you understand you're under oath?
11	MR. HARVEY: Yes, sir.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. For the
13	investigator, can you please present?
14	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
15	applicant was denied for a December 22nd, 1989
16	transport/sell narcotics, slash, controlled substance,
17	out of California, at a felony level, where the
18	applicant received three years of probation. The
19	applicant did not disclose the arrest and conviction.
20	It was found on his fingerprint report.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Harvey, do
22	you want to explain why you didn't disclose?
23	MR. HARVEY: I didn't know. I didn't know.
24	Because I got out, and then around eighty but, I
25	think, '95 I started my own business. And ever since,

1	I've just been doing my own business. And I moved to
2	Las Vegas. And I haven't been in trouble. So it wasn't
3	nothing that I was thinking of. All I was thinking
4	about was trying to better myself, and that's what I
5	did.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You do remember you were
7	arrested, correct?
8	MR. HARVEY: I do and I don't. It was so long.
9	And I know that might sound crazy. But I, like I said,
10	I do and I don't.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
12	doing for employment now?
13	MR. HARVEY: I'm self-employed here in Vegas.
14	I've been here 14 years and still run my same business
15	for 14 years. And I just opened up a nonprofit
16	corporation for my daughters. And that's what I'm
17	doing, just my business, self-employed. Still have the
18	same location.
19	And to be honest with you, I actually just went
20	to get the security job because I've never had a job,
21	and it was actually a bid, and I actually got the job
22	itself. And it ended up, turned out being good.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
24	questions from the Board?
25	Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.

1	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move to
2	deny the appeal due to nondisclosure.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
4	Do I have a second?
5	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
7	I have a second. Any other discussion?
8	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
9	All those in favor, state "aye."
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
12	Mr. Harvey, please apply next year, and remember to
13	disclose.
14	MR. HARVEY: All right. You guys have a
15	wonderful day.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You, too.
17	Number 151, Stephen Mitchell. Mr. Mitchell,
18	are you here? Calling Stephen Mitchell, number 151?
19	All right. We'll trail that.
20	Mr. Lawrence Moore?
21	MR. MITCHELL: I'm here. I'm here. I'm here.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Who's this?
23	MR. MITCHELL: Stephen Mitchell.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Sir, do you
25	understand you're under oath? All right. You've got a

1	lot of background. So let's try it again.
2	Mr. Mitchell, do you understand you're under oath?
3	MR. MITCHELL: Yeah.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,
5	please proceed.
6	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
7	applicant was denied for a 1999 petty theft with prior
8	offenses, out of California. This was a felony level.
9	Convicted with three years probation, two years prison
10	suspended, 180 days jail suspended. The applicant did
11	not disclose this arrest. This was found on the
12	fingerprint report. In California, petty theft with
13	prior convictions can be charged as a felony.
14	In 1998, out of the California, there was a
15	petty theft with prior jail term. This was charged as a
16	misdemeanor, where the applicant was convicted, 36
17	months probation, 13 days jail and a fine. The
18	applicant was also sentenced to a work program.
19	In 1996, out of California, there was a
20	shoplifting charge, where it was reduced to a fight,
21	slash, challenge in a public place. The applicant did
22	not disclose this. It shows that the shoplifting charge
23	was dismissed. And the applicant was convicted of
24	fighting or challenge to fight in a public place,
25	receiving three days in jail.

1	Again in 1996, out of California, petty theft
2	of personal property, misdemeanor. The fingerprint
3	report says there was a conviction, with no other
4	disposition given.
5	In 2018, out of California, driving with no
6	license, a misdemeanor, where the applicant received a
7	fine and a five-day jail time. They did disclose this
8	on the application. The fingerprint report showed the
9	applicant was arrested for driving without a license and
10	driving on a suspended license five times: 2009, 2012
11	twice, 2013, and again in 2016.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Anything else?
13	MR. SALADINO: That's it.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Mitchell, why
15	didn't you disclose?
16	MR. MITCHELL: Well, the '90s stuff, that was
17	all ran concurrently, and it was dropped down to a
18	misdemeanor. I didn't know. I was straight from county
19	for like a year. I didn't know how far they went back.
20	Other than that, I would have reported that. And I
21	reported everything else about my driving. That was it.
22	And mostly I just have the driving tickets. But, you
23	know, in the '90s and stuff, I was staying in L.A. I
24	just had my first kid. I was doing anything I can to
25	get money. That was it. But other than that, I didn't

1	know how far they went back. I thought it was, you
2	know, like California, like 10 years or something like
3	that. But other than that.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay, sir. Just for
5	clarification, I mean I've seen the application several
6	times, and it says "Have you ever been arrested?" It
7	doesn't put a timeline on it. And I hear a lot, I hear
8	a lot today, this, you know, talking about
9	MR. MITCHELL: Well, when you're coming from,
10	when you're coming from another state, you don't know
11	the rules exactly right off the back to where you are
12	you kind of, you kind of assume that if they don't go
13	too far back, to where most of the states. Most of the
14	states go back no more than 10 years or 15 years, so.
15	So, you know.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm not
17	going to get in an argument with you. What are you
18	doing for employment right now?
19	MR. MITCHELL: Right now, I work sanitation.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And how long have
21	you been doing that, sir?
22	MR. MITCHELL: All my life. But since I've
23	been out here, I've been doing that since I lost the
24	security job. So that's been a while now.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any

1	other questions from the Board?
2	MR. MITCHELL: Yeah. Well, not a question.
3	I'm sorry. A comment. Like it's kind of like a little
4	bias, because you I heard a lot of people cry, and
5	all that, telling their 30-year story, and you guys just
6	deny them like that. And what I'm saying is you only
7	denied them because of this, because they didn't tell
8	about it. Some of these people, they're 60 years old,
9	don't even remember it. But that's the way to go.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I appreciate your
11	comment. Thank you.
12	Any other questions from the Board?
13	MR. MITCHELL: Hm-m (negative). Just hurry up
14	and deny it.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Sir, it's
16	not your time. It's the Board's time.
17	Okay. I'll entertain a motion, since there's
18	no questions.
19	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
20	Brown. I will honor Mr. Mitchell's request and move to
21	deny the application. Or the
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
23	Do I have a second?
24	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.

I have a second. Any other discussion? 1 2 Okay. All those in favor of the motion, state "ave." 3 (Board members said "aye.") 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any opposed? 5 The motion carried. Mr. Mitchell, please 6 7 reapply in a year. And disclose everything, please. That's what we require in Nevada. 8 Okay. Number 152, Lawrence Moore? 9 MR. MOORE: Yes, sir. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good afternoon, 11 Mr. Moore. Are you aware you're under oath? 12 13 MR. MOORE: I'm sorry? 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you aware you are 15 under oath? Did you take an oath before? MR. MOORE: Oh, yes, sir. Yes, sir. Yes, sir, 16 I'm very aware, sir. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. 18 Investigator, please proceed. 19 20 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The 21 applicant was denied for a 1998 bank robbery, out of Texas, at a felony level, where the applicant was 22 convicted, five years 11 months prison term. 23 This arrest and conviction was not disclosed. 24 The fingerprint report showed the applicant received five 2.5

1	years and 11 months prison. On April 4th of the 2003,
2	he was released on a supervised release program.
3	In December 4th of 2003, out of Texas, he
4	received an aiding and abetting supervised release
5	violation. There was no, it wasn't categorized as a
6	misdemeanor, gross misdemeanor or felony. He did
7	receive 12 more months. This was not disclosed. And
8	the applicant did 12 months in a Federal Bureau of
9	Prisons. This was found on the fingerprint report.
10	Nothing further.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Moore, do you
12	want to explain why you didn't disclose?
13	MR. MOORE: Well, the charge, that happened so
14	long ago, like I mean like maybe like, what, 20 years
15	ago. And like I relocated. I relocated, once I got out
16	of prison, and moved to a different state, because it's
17	like, but they tell you like if you relocate from a
18	different state and change your life. Which I have
19	done. I moved to California, met my wife. We moved out
20	here. I think, think 2005 we moved out here. Got
21	married 2011. I got made head of security 2008, was
22	decorated 2008, employee of the month, employee of the
23	year 2007. All my jobs have been security out here.
24	And let me add, let me add, let them go back to
25	that 12 months. The reason why they gave me the 12

1	months is because the probation officer gave me a
2	choice. He said, "If you go to a treatment center and
3	give me 90 days sobriety, I'll keep you out on the
4	streets." Which I had done that successfully, graduated
5	the program, and he still went and put the he still
6	went and put the bench warrant out for my arrest.
7	Which, which when they got me back to Texas, they were
8	going to subpoena him. But I told them, no, because he
9	had gave me adequate enough time to get myself together,
10	and he could have locked me up. And that's why I was
11	like being a man about it. And I told the judge, I was
12	like, "Sir, look, I did what I did, he did what he did."
13	So the judge was like, "Okay. I'll give you 12 months,
14	cut you loose." And once I did that, I moved out here
15	on the west coast, ain't had a speeding ticket since
16	'05.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you living in
18	Las Vegas now?
19	MR. MOORE: It was one speeding ticket, one
20	speeding ticket, too.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Moore, are you
22	living in Las Vegas now?
23	MR. MOORE: Sir, I live across the street where
24	the Raiders' practice facility is at.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what are you

1	doing for employment?
2	MR. MOORE: Well, currently, right now, I'm
3	union right now. So they got me on unemployment due to
4	the Covid thing right now. And I was working for CSC.
5	So. And I was working over at the Sphere.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
7	MR. MOORE: And they pulled my from over there
8	at the Sphere. And I've been on unemployment ever
9	since, with Caesar's Palace.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
11	Any other questions from the Board?
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon for the
13	investigator. So he said he's been working security for
14	the last, since he's been here in Vegas, which has been
15	some time. Is that for a casino, or has that been
16	MR. MOORE: A hotel resort, ma'am, on
17	Convention Center Drive, ma'am. I got plaques, I got
18	plaques, I got plaques. I've been on the honor roll out
19	here. I've been in the Cordon Bleu. I graduated the
20	Cordon Bleu, 2013 honor roll graduate. I got all my
21	certificates, everything. I'm decorated out here.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I'm assuming, then, he
24	was working for a casino, directly for a casino, not
25	subcontracted to a company. Because I also heard CSC.

MR. MOORE: Just --1 2 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Sir, this is for the investigator. 3 Because I also heard CSC. And so I'm just a 4 little confused. 5 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. 6 7 MR. MOORE: Well, the security job that I held --8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Moore, please let 9 the investigator speak. Thank you. 10 MR. MOORE: Oh, I'm sorry. 11 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. 12 13 According to the applicant's application, he wrote down the Royal Resort Hotel out here in Las Vegas from 14 October 23 of 2011 to November 15th of 2016, where he 15 did security. The reason for leaving, he put laid off. 16 The applicant was originally made provisional on 17 February 25th of 2020, because of the nondisclosure. He 18 was working for CSC until he was terminated on 19 20 March 10th of 2020 when we received the fingerprint report. 21 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. Got it. Sorry. 22 23 Thank you. Okay. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other 2.5 questions?

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1	MR. MOORE: Oh, sir, can I add? That 2011 was
2	the second time. The first time I worked at the Royal
3	Resort, like I said, was in 2006. That was the first
4	time. Now, like I say, when they ran back then, that
5	was the mob ran that hotel. So it was like, like it was
6	word of mouth. They hired me. And then like I held it
7	down. I held it down with no weapon for 10 years there
8	by myself. Which they made me head of security there at
9	the hotel.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Moore, no one is
11	questioning your work employment history. Thank you.
12	MR. MOORE: Oh, okay. I'm sorry.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I believe
14	your employment history, I personally do.
15	All right. Any other questions from the Board?
16	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a
17	motion.
18	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This Commissioner Nixon.
19	I move that we uphold the denial, due to nondisclosure,
20	of Mr. Lawrence Moore.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
22	Do I have a second?
23	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
25	motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?

1	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
2	All those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
3	(Board members said "aye.")
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The motion
5	passes. Mr. Moore, please reapply in a year. Thank
6	you.
7	MR. MOORE: Thank you.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Ingram. Mr. Ingram,
9	we've been going over two hours. We're going to take a
10	bio break, five minutes.
11	MR. INGRAM: Sounds great. Thank you.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. We're on
13	break.
14	* * * *

17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Hello. It's Ray. Can
18	you hear me?
19	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. Thank you, Chairman.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do we need to do
21	anymore oaths, or are we good?
22	MR. INGRAM: I think, it's probably a pretty
23	good idea to do oaths again, because the last group to
24	call in was 2:30. So we might as well get that taken
25	care of before we move forward.

BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 1 MR. INGRAM: That will take us through agenda 2 3 item 172. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll leave it up 4 to you and Mr. Detmer. I'm going to go on mute. 5 MR. DETMER: Good afternoon. For those of you 6 7 who are about to testify, can you raise your right hand? Do you hereby swear or affirm to tell the truth, the 8 whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 9 (Applicants and witnesses present were 10 sworn/affirmed.) 11 MR. INGRAM: And I'm sorry. Shannon, are you 12 13 back from break? THE REPORTER: Yes. Yes, Kevin, I'm right 14 15 here. Thank you. MR. INGRAM: Wonderful. So we'll go ahead and 16 take roll call now that everybody's been sworn in, make 17 sure everybody's back from our break. 18 So, Chair Flynn? 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm here. MR. INGRAM: Board Member Brown? Board Member 21 Brown? 22 Board Member Gronauer? 23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll say what the 24 2.5 attorney says, I'm present.

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1	MR. INGRAM: You are a present.
2	Board Member Nixon?
3	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I am here.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, that's good.
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I am here.
6	MR. INGRAM: Board Member Brown?
7	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I am present. I was at
8	the time, but I was locked out of my phone. I'm trying
9	to remember my passcode.
10	MR. INGRAM: You were successful, sir.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Try one, two, three,
12	four.
13	MR. INGRAM: So we do have all the Board
14	members present, we do have a quorum, we do have legal
15	counsel with us, and our court reporter is ready, sir.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I believe, we're
17	153.
18	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Gary
20	Territo, are you here, sir? Gary Territo?
21	All right. We will trail that one.
22	John Arzu?
23	MR. ARZU: Yes.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Did I
25	pronounce that correct, sir?

MR. ARZU: Yes, sir. 1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand 2 you're under oath? 3 MR. ARZU: Yes, sir. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll let the 5 investigator speak. 6 7 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The applicant was denied for a 1981 brandishing a firearm or 8 weapon, in California. This was charged as a 9 misdemeanor, where the applicant received 24 months 10 probation, 30 days in jail. The applicant did not 11 disclose this weapon conviction. This charge in 12 13 California can be charged as a felony or a misdemeanor. Since the applicant received 24 months of probation, it 14 15 was charged as a misdemeanor. In 1986, out of California, there was a charge 16 for alien smuggling. There was no level attached to it. 17 It was an arrest only. No charges were filed. 18 In 1987, out of California, there was a willful 19 20 cruelty to a child possibly causing death. This also 21 was charged as a misdemeanor, where the applicant was convicted with 24 months probation, 65 days jail time 22 suspended. 23 In 1991, out of California, felony spouse 24 2.5 beating, slash, inflict corporal injury to spouse. This

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1	was at a felony level. The applicant received a
2	prefiling deferral. The fingerprint report shows the
3	prosecution moved forward with the prefiling deferral,
4	which is a diversion program, and did not report
5	anything further.
6	In 1992, out of California, there was a felony
7	level insufficient funds for a check, where he was
8	convicted, two-year prison sentence. This also was not
9	disclosed.
10	In 1993, out of California, there was an
11	assault with a deadly weapon not a firearm causing
12	substantial bodily injury and battery as well. This was
13	dismissed due to a lack of to a delay.
14	In 2016, out of California, the applicant was
15	charged with offering a false instrument for filing,
16	slash, forgery. There was no disposition for this
17	charge.
18	The applicant was notified on June 5th, 2020
19	about a warrant. On July 28th, 2020, I spoke with the
20	applicant about the warrant. I was unsure if there was
21	a language or a comprehension issue. The applicant is
22	78 years old and stated his attorney is working on the
23	warrant and will get more information. The applicant
24	believes the warrant is a case of identity theft. The
25	applicant was made provisional but never worked for a

1	licensed company. He was not on anybody's roster.
2	That's it.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Vinny, you might
4	need to either change your batteries or put on a new
5	cover on your mic with your headset. You've got a lot
6	of background coming through when you speak.
7	MR. SALADINO: All right. Sorry about that. I
8	grabbed my headset now, my other one.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
10	Mr. Arzu, what do you know about this warrant, or do you
11	know anything about it?
12	MR. ARZU: Yes. I applied for Section 8
13	housing, and they're the one that told me about this
14	warrant. And I told them people had been using my
15	identity. And I got the three credit agencies. And I
16	talked to my lawyer about it. I'm a member of a shield
17	at home. My lawyer told me that being a veteran, that
18	another veteran was using my identity.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What branch of
20	service did you serve our country?
21	MR. ARZU: I served in the United States Army
22	in Vietnam.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, thank you for your
24	service, sir. I appreciate that personally.
25	MR. ARZU: Thank you.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why did you not disclose
2	these arrests?
3	MR. ARZU: Well, because I was a younger man.
4	And just had got out of the Vietnam service. And I was
5	attending counseling to get my mind back together. And
6	I was I had a lot of nervous and the scaredness in
7	me. And I was seeing a psychiatrist. And I went to
8	bank teller school, graduated, and started working at
9	the bank as a bank teller. And I had issues working at
10	the bank. I was hearing voices. And I worked for Bank
11	of America, main branch, in Van Nuys. And they let me
12	go because of my Vietnam experience, my problem after
13	the service.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And then I just want to
15	digress. Vinny, it's obviously not your headset. I
16	believe, it's Mr. Arzu's phone. My apologies.
17	MR. SALADINO: No problem.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
19	doing now for employment, sir?
20	MR. ARZU: I'm a Salvation Army soldier and a
21	born again Christian for 25 years. I don't drink. I
22	don't smoke. And my drinking was my problem back there.
23	And I'm eventually here to work locally. And I
24	volunteer with the Salvation Army. And I went to
25	correction officer school. And I'm doing community

1	corrections.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
3	MR. ARZU: You're welcome.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from
5	the Board?
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Sir, did you remember the
7	incidences that happened, you know, back in the early
8	'90s?
9	MR. ARZU: Yes, ma'am, I remember. But I have,
10	I have problems in the United States Army back there.
11	And I attend my, I was going to hospital, VA hospital
12	for treatment.
13	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I understand that and, you
14	know, appreciate your service as well. But you did
15	remember these incidences at the time of the
16	application?
17	MR. ARZU: No, ma'am, I don't remember. I had
18	issues back there, because my wife left me for another
19	man. And I had, I was working doing security and armed
20	security. And I used my service weapon and shoot up in
21	the air. I ain't shot at nobody. I shot up in the air.
22	Because I was upset because she left me for another man.
23	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. So that was the
24	first one. Okay. Got it.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other

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1	questions?
2	Hearing none, I'll seek a motion.
3	I'll seek a motion a second time.
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
5	that we uphold the denial based off of nondisclosure and
6	the amount of issues. Thank you.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Understood. All right.
8	I have a motion. Do I have a second?
9	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
11	I have a second. Any discussion?
12	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
13	All those in favor of the motion, say "aye."
14	(Board members said "aye.")
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed, say "nay."
16	Okay. The motion carries. Mr. Arzu, good luck
17	to you. Please remember to disclose everything if you
18	decide to reapply in a year. You have a good day, sir.
19	MR. ARZU: Yes, sir. Thank you.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you for
21	your time and your service.
22	MR. ARZU: All right. Thank you. Bye-bye.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 155,
24	Alex Robinson.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Robinson, is that
2	you?
3	MR. ROBINSON: Yes, I'm here.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understood
5	you're under oath?
6	MR. ROBINSON: Yes, sir.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I'll
8	let the investigator proceed.
9	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 1986,
10	out of California, the applicant was charged with
11	possession of a narcotic controlled substance at the
12	felony level. Disposition showed was three years
13	probation. It was not disclosed. SCOPE showed the
14	applicant to be a convicted felon. He was made
15	provisional in error, but that was then rectified. The
16	felony conviction was not disclosed. The fingerprints
17	showed applicant was convicted of a felony and did three
18	years probation. This information was confirmed with
19	the applicant on the telephone. And he did not have
20	court documents from this 34-year-old arrest.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Robinson, why
22	didn't you disclose?
23	MR. ROBINSON: I didn't think you all went back
24	that far. But if I would have asked, I would have found
25	out you all went farther back. So at that time, I

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1	thought it was probably 7 to 10 years. I'm sorry for
2	that.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
4	doing for employment now?
5	MR. ROBINSON: Oh, right now, I'm on Social
6	Security. I'm not working at the time. But I'm
7	pursuing work now. So I want to get my guard card now.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. How long have you
9	lived in Nevada?
10	MR. ROBINSON: Since 2013.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
12	Any other questions from the Board?
13	All right. Hearing none, I'll accept a motion.
14	Call for a motion a second time.
15	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a
16	motion.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion to
19	deny the appeal.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I
21	have a motion. Do I have a second?
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
24	I have a second. Any further discussion?
25	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those

in favor of the motion, state "aye." 1 (Board members said "aye.") 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any opposed, state 3 "nav." 4 Okay. Motion carries. Mr. Robinson, good luck 5 And please disclose if you choose to reapply in to you. 6 7 a year. MR. ROBINSON: All right. Thank you. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 156, Michael 9 Strawberry? 10 MR. STRAWBERRY: Michael Strawberry here, sir. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand 12 13 you're under oath? 14 MR. STRAWBERRY: Yes, sir, I do. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you. All right. Investigator, please proceed. 16 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. In 2001, 17 out of California, the applicant was charged with the 18 offense of false checks, records, certificate, 19 20 et cetera, at a felony level. The disposition showed 21 that he received 56 days jail, which was suspended, three years probation. He did disclose. The charge was 22 later reduced to a misdemeanor, then dismissed under 23 1203.4 PC. And this was disclosed on the application. 24 2006, out of California, he was charged with 25

1	carrying a concealed weapon in a vehicle. This was at
2	misdemeanor level. The disposition was a three-year
3	probation and a fine. And this was not disclosed.
4	The applicant was initially made provisional on
5	6-17 of 2020 and was hired by Dragon Master Security,
6	license number 1652, on 7-14 of this year. The arrests
7	were confirmed and found on the fingerprint report. He
8	was denied on 7-17-2020 and was terminated by Dragon
9	Master Security the same day.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
11	Mr. Strawberry, do you want to tell us why you
12	didn't disclose that arrest?
13	MR. STRAWBERRY: Well, I was actually, I
14	guess, it was removed off my record, from what I was
15	told back when I had gotten arrested. So it was totally
16	removed, you know, off my record. And I had no
17	knowledge of it. When I came here to Vegas, I've been
18	working Sunrise Hospital, MGM, working with everyone. I
19	mean I've been doing securities, you know, practically
20	all my life. I was an LAPD officer prior to the arrest
21	when I had the concealed weapon, when I had the weapon
22	actually, and I had my badge with me and everything. So
23	I was technically working. I mean it was like, I mean I
24	was, been well, I had any badge and my gun, but it
25	wasn't, wasn't on me, but it was in my carry-on bag, so.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Who told you that you
2	didn't have to disclose? Now, I understand you did
3	disclose the felony. And it's more recent. And I do
4	appreciate that. I will take that into consideration.
5	I'm just curious, I mean not more recent, why you didn't
6	disclose the most recent arrest, which was for the CCW.
7	I'm confused.
8	MR. STRAWBERRY: Well, the CCW was a law. I
9	was under the impression that it was taken away as well.
10	It was, you know, it was, as far as I new. Put it that
11	way. I didn't know that that was still on my record.
12	It was supposedly, it had gotten taken care of. So.
13	And that's the only thing that I can imagine why. I
14	don't know why it came up, because it was pretty much
15	taken care of.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What do you mean by
17	pretty much taken care of? I don't understand.
18	MR. STRAWBERRY: Well, I mean what I'm saying
19	is I, when I got arrested, supposedly the case was a no,
20	it was taken away. So the weapon was with the case that
21	I was on, which I had gotten arrested for.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So for the investigator,
23	on that case, was it dismissed?
24	MR. STRAWBERRY: It was dismissed.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, no, I'm asking the

1 investigator. 2 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The 3 documentation I've got does not show a dismissal, sir. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And does it show 4 a fine, a forfeiture, time served? 5 MR. MAXWELL: All it shows, sir, is a 6 7 three-year probation and a fine. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Got 8 it. All right. Mr. Strawberry, what are you doing for 9 employment right now, sir? 10 MR. STRAWBERRY: Well, sir, I had a stroke in 11 2018. So I had been working until, until I got notified 12 13 that I wasn't able to work here. So it's been two years 14 now since I've worked, so. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm sorry about your stroke. 16 MR. STRAWBERRY: Thank you. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I hope you're 18 recovering. 19 20 MR. STRAWBERRY: I had two strokes. I had 21 another stroke in 2019. So, you know, I'm getting back, trying to get back to work and do what I have to do, 22 sir. 23 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What did you do 2.5 prior to the stroke?

1	MR. STRAWBERRY: I was working at Sunrise
2	Hospital, security, a public safety officer. And I was
3	working at MGM as well. So I was working at both
4	places. So that's where I had the stroke, when I was at
5	MGM, when I was rescuing some people from a car, a
6	burning car, and things like that. So I had the stroke
7	that night. And the following day, I went to Sunrise,
8	where I worked, Sunrise Hospital, where I worked. And I
9	was in the hospital for, you know, about a week and a
10	half. And then I had another stroke in 2019, in April.
11	So I was in the hospital for about a week and a half
12	there as well.
13	So I'm just, you know, fully recovering now
14	with meds and went to the doctor and everything. And I
15	was here at Planet 13 when I got the notice that I
16	wasn't able to work there, so. No other place had done
17	that, Sunrise or MGM had, or even the other, prior
18	security job I had, had anything as far as that's
19	concerned, as far as what happened here at Planet 13.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
21	Any other questions from the Board?
22	Yeah, go ahead.
23	All right. I guess, no questions. I will
24	entertain a motion.
25	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll make

1	a motion. I move to deny the appeal.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
3	Do I have a second?
4	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
6	motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?
7	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
8	All those in favor, state "aye."
9	(Board members said "aye.")
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any opposed, say
11	"nay."
12	Okay. Motion carries. Mr. Strawberry, good
13	luck to you. Please reapply in a year, and include
14	everything.
15	MR. STRAWBERRY: All right. Thank you, sir.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.
17	All right. Number 157, Eddie Thomas.
18	Mr. Thomas, are you here?
19	MR. THOMAS: That's me, sir.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand
21	you're under oath?
22	MR. THOMAS: Yes, sir.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. The investigator,
24	please proceed.
25	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The

1	applicant was arrested in 1993, out of California, for
2	carrying a concealed weapon on his person. This was at
3	misdemeanor level. Disposition showed one year
4	probation and a fine. This was not disclosed, and we do
5	not have court docs.
6	In 2006, out of Washington, possession with
7	intent to distribute marijuana, felony level, 14 months
8	custody, three years supervised release. This one was
9	disclosed.
10	January 2009, out of Washington, probation
11	violation, unknown level. The applicant entered a
12	guilty plea on 2-10 of '09 and was sentenced to 60 days,
13	with credit for time served, and 30 months supervised
14	release. This was not disclosed.
15	The applicant disclosed the felony conviction
16	on his application and was not made provisional.
17	Arrests were found and confirmed with the fingerprint
18	report.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Unless you're one
20	of the applicants being heard right now, I need you to
21	put your phones on mute. Thank you.
22	Mr. Thomas.
23	MR. THOMAS: Yes.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why didn't you disclose?
25	MR. THOMAS: You know what, sir, I just totally

1	forgot about it. Like I've been listening to the other,
2	the guys and the ladies on the phone. I just, it was so
3	long ago, I just, just didn't put it on there. But with
4	the marijuana, I did disclose everything there. I'm
5	sorry about that.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, how long have you
7	lived in Las Vegas?

Well, sir, I was going to tell you 8 MR. THOMAS: a little bit about how I made my journey here. I'm an 9 ex-CFL and NFL football player. First of all, I made 10 poor choices back then and bad decisions. 11 And moving from there, after being, my marijuana conviction, I was 12 13 in the Seattle area coaching kids football and a chef until present. Me and my wife decided to move here to 14 15 Las Vegas before the pandemic in February. I was hired by Safe working at the Allegiant field with the Raiders 16 and doing security with the Raiders, UNLV and concerts. 17

And that's what brought me here. We were going to buy property. Well, we still are. But the pandemic kind of slowing the income down. But I am hired through Safe. But they need, I needed a PILB card, so they told me to apply for it.

And, once again, that's how I made my journey here with my wife.

BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then, for the

1	investigator, let me make sure I understand this. He
2	did disclose the felony, but he neglected to disclose
3	the misdemeanor?
4	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. That is
5	correct, sir.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
7	And then, just for my own edification,
8	Mr. Thomas, how long did you play for the NFL?
9	MR. THOMAS: Oh, I played from 1990. I got
10	drafted in 1990 to Cleveland. And then from Cleveland,
11	I went up to Edmonton, won a couple Grey Cup rings, went
12	to the Superbowl in '93 with the Chargers. We lost to
13	the Niners. Stan Humphreys was our quarterback. I'm a
14	gunner, meaning I run up and down the field, special
15	teams, defensive back. I went up to D.C. Lions in '94,
16	'5, Grey Cup. Played with Detroit Arena League, Detroit
17	Lions. And Winnipeg through '98 to 2000.
18	And then I retired. And that's when I got in a
19	little bit of trouble with the marijuana situation. And
20	like my mother said, I made a poor decision, I mean a
21	bad decision and poor choice. And I'm just trying to
22	move on, and me and my wife, and work mostly, you know,
23	you guys. Ray, I don't know what's going to happen, but
24	work for the Raiders, who my good friend got me in to
25	work with those guys security. And here I am.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
2	MR. THOMAS: You're welcome.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from
4	the Board?
5	Hearing no questions from the Board, I'll
6	entertain a motion.
7	Call for a motion a second time.
8	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Commissioner
9	Nixon, or Board Member Nixon. I make a motion to
10	decline the appeal for Mr. Thomas.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
12	Do I have a second?
13	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
15	I have a second. Any other discussion?
16	All right. All in favor of the motion, state
17	"aye."
18	(Board members said "aye.")
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
20	Mr. Thomas, you can probably tell by the inflection of
21	the voices, this was not a popular decision. I just
22	wish you would have disclosed everything. Please
23	reapply in a year. And good luck to you. I'd like to
24	see you reapply. And if you disclose everything, I will
25	probably lean towards it. You have a good day, sir.

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1	MR. THOMAS: Thank you.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
3	Number 158, Schlinda Maxwell?
4	MS. MAXWELL: Present.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Ms. Maxwell,
6	do you understand you're under oath?
7	MS. MAXWELL: Yes, I do.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the
9	investigator speak.
10	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
11	applicant was denied for a 1998 burglary and impersonate
12	to make other liable, out of the California, where they
13	were convicted, three years probation and 90 days
14	suspended jail sentence. The applicant did not disclose
15	this arrest and conviction. This was found on the
16	fingerprint report. Both of the charges are considered
17	wobblers in California, so they can be charged as
18	felonies or misdemeanors.
19	The applicant was contacted on April 13th via
20	email with the details of her case, to include phone
21	numbers and case number. The applicant did not provide
22	any court documents to show if the charges were a felony
23	level or misdemeanors. And then she was denied.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Maxwell, do
25	you want to explain why you didn't disclose your

1	arrests?
2	MS. MAXWELL: I had, I believed I had typed it
3	in on the website. But when I received I did receive
4	their email today. I was going through my old emails.
5	My phone wasn't working at that time. So that's the
6	only reason why I didn't disclose it to you.
7	It was a misdemeanor charge. I did 10 days in
8	jail. I had used a credit card. I was dealing with the
9	wrong type of people, and they talked me into using a
10	credit card for money. And when I went into the store
11	to use it, when the gentleman went to use the card, I
12	ran out of the store. And he ran after me and got my
13	license plate. And a few months later, I got arrested
14	for that. And I did the 10 days. So, I believe, I was
15	in jail for 10 days.
16	And then, after that, I started working
17	nonstop. I currently am working for CSC. I've been
18	working for CSC since 2012, I believe, or 2013. I just
19	recently got my guard card, though, last year. But I've
20	been doing security with them for the past eight years.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And where were you doing
22	the work, was it in California?
23	MS. MAXWELL: Yes, I've been doing it in
24	California. And they had asked if I wanted to work for
25	EDC. And so I went and I had got my fingerprinting done

1	and whatnot. And like I said, I believed I had put it
2	on the application. I know I typed it in. But I don't
3	believe it saved it. So I apologize for that.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you currently
5	living in California, or are you living in Nevada?
6	MS. MAXWELL: I'm currently living in
7	California. But I'm looking to seek employment in
8	Nevada with CoreCivic. I wanted to see if I could
9	become a correctional officer. But I need to have my
10	guard card and, not only that, go through the process
11	and whatnot, which I'm doing right now in California.
12	So that's the reason why I would like to get my
13	guard card.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
15	All right. Any other questions from the Board?
16	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a
17	motion.
18	Call for a motion a second time.
19	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion for
22	denial. You've got to fill out the application.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
24	motion. Do I I need a second.
25	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
2	motion and second. Any further discussion?
3	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
4	in favor, state "aye."
5	(Board members said "aye.")
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
7	All right. Ms. Maxwell, good luck to you. Please
8	reapply in a year.
9	MS. MAXWELL: Okay. Thank you.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
11	Number 159, Jim Sullivan?
12	MR. SULLIVAN: Hello, sir.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Jim Sullivan, is
14	that you?
15	MR. SULLIVAN: Yes, sir.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand
17	you're under oath?
18	MR. SULLIVAN: Yes, sir.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,
20	please proceed.
21	MR. JONES: Thank you. Investigator Jones.
22	The applicant was denied for a felony attempt to commit
23	assault with a deadly weapon here in Nevada in November
24	of 2005. This was not disclosed, but we do have court
25	documents.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Sullivan, why
2	didn't you disclose this arrest, this felony arrest?
3	MR. SULLIVAN: I didn't know what I'm doing
4	that time, boss. And I went to the school for the
5	domestic violence. And I have a probation for two
6	years, and I have done that. Then, I've been starting
7	work here and keep busy of my life, you know, doing
8	yeah.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. What are you
10	doing? You said you're working. What are you doing for
11	employment, sir?
12	MR. SULLIVAN: Sir, I was working right now at
13	the sushi restaurant right here in Spring Mountain.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
15	MR. SULLIVAN: I was a sushi chef.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any other
17	questions from the Board?
18	MR. SULLIVAN: But I was applying for a
19	security card, but I was denied for it. I don't know
20	why.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You were denied because
22	you forgot to disclose that arrest.
23	MR. SULLIVAN: Oh.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.
25	MR. SULLIVAN: I'm so sorry, sir.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's okay. I mean
2	when they ask you if you've ever been arrested, you have
3	to disclose. It doesn't mean we're going to deny you
4	because you were arrested. We're more concerned about
5	honesty, which is an important part of the being a
6	security officer.
7	MR. SULLIVAN: Okay. Sorry. I'm really sorry,
8	sir.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
10	MR. SULLIVAN: I did not know.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from
12	the Board?
13	MR. SULLIVAN: No, sir.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, Mr. Sullivan, I'm
15	speaking to the Board. Thank you.
16	Any other questions from the Board?
17	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: So I just want to make
18	sure I understand. This is Nixon. The applicant did
19	have a guard card previously, and maybe the incident
20	happened while he had his guard card, and so when he
21	knew that his guard card expired, he reapplied, and
22	that's when it was denied?
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Maxwell?
24	MR. JONES: Investigator Jones.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Sorry.

1	MR. JONES: You're fine. The applicant, that
2	is correct, the applicant did have a previous work card.
3	But it goes back further than our database shows. So
4	I'm not sure when it expired. But probably as Member
5	Nixon has stated.
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay. I see. Okay. All
7	right. Thank you.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions?
9	Okay. Now I'll entertain a motion.
10	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
11	that the
12	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will move to deny.
13	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further
15	discussion?
16	All right. Call for a vote. All those in
17	favor of the motion, state "aye."
18	(Board members said "aye.")
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
20	Mr. Sullivan, good luck to you. Remember to disclose
21	when you apply in a year.
22	MR. SULLIVAN: All right, sir. Thank you very
23	much, sir.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're welcome.
25	All right. Number 160, Aaron Harris?

Mr. Harris, are you here? Call Mr. Harris one more 1 2 time? 3 Okay. I'll trail that. Number 161, Deborah Newman? Deborah Newman, 4 are you here? 5 Okay. I'll trail that. 6 7 162, Nicolas Catchings? MR. CATCHINGS: Yes, here. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Catchings, do 9 you understand you're under oath? 10 MR. CATCHINGS: Yes. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll leave it up 12 13 to the investigator. MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. 15 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for an 16 April 28th, 2012 inflict corporal injury to spouse or 17 cohabitant, out of California. This charge is a wobbler 18 in California, meaning it can be charged either as a 19 20 felony or as a misdemeanor. The applicant was 21 convicted, received three years probation, eight days in jail. This was not disclosed. And no court documents 22 were provided to show if it was charged as a misdemeanor 23 24 or a felony. That's it. 25

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Catchings, why
2	didn't you disclose?
3	MR. CATCHINGS: I apologize for not putting
4	that on the application. But I think
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm sorry. There was
6	background. I couldn't hear you.
7	MR. CATCHINGS: I said I apologize about not
8	putting that on the application. But I do have all the
9	paperwork that says I completed it.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I understand you
11	completed it. But I want to know, and I accept your
12	apology, I just want to know why you didn't disclose.
13	MR. CATCHINGS: I didn't think that when I
14	went to court before I moved out here from California,
15	they said that everything was expunged, basically, that
16	nothing showed on my record.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you have paperwork
18	showing that it was expunged?
19	MR. CATCHINGS: I probably do.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, if you've got
21	paperwork showing it expunged, I would submit that.
22	Well, let's see what happens.
23	Any other questions from the Board?
24	All right. No questions from the Board. Then,
25	I will entertain a motion.

1	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to
2	deny the appeal.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
4	Do I have a second?
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
7	I have a second. Any further discussion?
8	Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All
9	those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
10	(Board members said "aye.")
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
12	Okay. Mr. Catchings, you can reapply in a year. Find
13	that paperwork that shows it was expunged. When you
14	find that paperwork, submit that with your application
15	along with your disclosure next year.
16	MR. CATCHINGS: Okay. Thank you.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You have a good day,
18	sir. Thank you for your time.
19	Number 163, Darion Fennoy?
20	MR. FENNOY: Here.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did I pronounce your
22	name correctly, sir?
23	MR. FENNOY: Yes.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the
25	investigator take over.

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1	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
3	MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
4	2011 carry concealed weapon on person, out of
5	California. This was a misdemeanor, where the applicant
6	was convicted and received three years probation, 90
7	days suspended and a fine. This was not disclosed. It
8	was found on the fingerprint report.
9	In 2012, out of California, the applicant was
10	charged with theft, where it was later reduced to fight,
11	slash, loud noise or offensive words. This was a
12	misdemeanor charge, where they were found guilty and
13	received a fine.
14	2013, out of California, possession of
15	narcotics, slash, controlled substance. This was a
16	misdemeanor. The applicant was able to complete a drug
17	program in lieu of being charged. So, then, being that
18	he completed the drug program, there was no criminal
19	charges filed.
20	The applicant, since he didn't disclose his
21	arrest history, he was made provisional on
22	September 27th of '19. The applicant worked for Reliant
23	Security, license number 1902, from October 10th of '19
24	to 10-28 of '19. The applicant was denied on 11-5 of
25	'19 when the fingerprint report was received.

1	Nothing further.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Fennoy, why
3	don't you let us know why you didn't disclose these
4	three arrests.
5	MR. FENNOY: For the weapon, I thought it was
6	already expunged, because the court paper said that.
7	Well, I got court papers, or I can go get court papers
8	saying that is was expunged. Because I have an active
9	guard card in California right now. And so I wasn't
10	told that it was expunged. Now, as far as for the other
11	ones, I thought, just because I finished my classes and
12	things like that, it was expunged, to me. That's what I
13	was told.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Please
15	understand, just because it's okay in California doesn't
16	mean it's okay in Nevada. We have different states,
17	different laws, different constitutions.
18	MR. FENNOY: Yes.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you still living in
20	California, sir?
21	MR. FENNOY: No, not right now.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So you're in
23	Las Vegas?
24	MR. FENNOY: Yes.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What are you doing for

1	employment?
2	MR. FENNOY: Well, I'm doing the temp agency
3	right now. And I just recently got my OSHA card for
4	construction.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
6	Any other questions from the Board?
7	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, can I make a
8	redundant statement?
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, please.
10	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
11	Brown. And I've actually pulled up the application,
12	because I've heard this so many times now. But it says
13	"If you have ever been arrested, any criminal citation,
14	indictments or orders to appear"; and under it, it gives
15	a list of things. And, one, it says "List all charges
16	regardless if they were expunged, dismissed or denied."
17	We're hearing so many people believing that they were
18	expunged. But our application actually says so.
19	Thank you.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, thank you for
21	making the statement, and thank you for putting it in
22	the record. I am aware of that. And, actually, we
23	added that two years ago because of people claiming they
24	didn't know. Thank you.
25	All right. Any other statements or questions

1	from the Board?
2	Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.
3	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll move
4	to deny the appeal.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
6	Do I have a second?
7	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Nixon. I second.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion and a
9	second. Any further discussion?
10	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
11	in favor of the motion, please state "aye."
12	(Board members said "aye.")
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
14	Mr. Fennoy, can you reapply in a year. Please disclose
15	everything.
16	MR. FENNOY: Okay.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. 164, Brandi
18	Johnson, are you here? Brandi Johnson, number 164, are
19	you here?
20	Okay. Number 165, Tony Burden? Tony Burden,
21	are you here?
22	MS. JOHNSON: I'm here. Did you hear me?
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Who's this?
24	MS. JOHNSON: This is Brandi Johnson.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good afternoon,

ma'am. 1 MS. JOHNSON: Good afternoon. 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware 3 you're under oath? 4 MS. JOHNSON: Yes, I am. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator, 6 7 please take over. MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. The applicant 8 was denied for an arrest in June of 2018. This resulted 9 in three charges, the first being discharging of a gun 10 in or on a public thoroughfare or in a public place. 11 This was at the misdemeanor level and was not disclosed. 12 13 The second was a false report of a crime, also a 14 misdemeanor. They did disclose this, but no disposition 15 was found on the fingerprint report or SCOPE. The final charge for this arrest was a false statement to 16 obstructing a public official. This was a misdemeanor, 17 which was also disclosed, but no disposition was found 18 on the fingerprint report or SCOPE. 19 20 In July of 2016, the applicant was arrested for 21 battery. This was at the misdemeanor level, but was dismissed after diversion and all requirements were met. 22 And this was disclosed. 23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So if I understand 24 2.5 correctly, the one that was wasn't disclosed was the

1	discharge of firearm in 2018?
2	MR. JONES: Correct. And the final charge was
3	in 2012 for petty larceny, at the misdemeanor level. No
4	disposition was found on the fingerprint report or
5	SCOPE.
6	The applicant was made provisional. However,
7	this was corrected when the fingerprint report came
8	back, as she was on the two rosters, and was terminated
9	appropriately.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Johnson, why
11	didn't you disclose the most recent charge in 2018,
12	discharging a firearm?
13	MS. JOHNSON: I thought I did put it on there
14	as well as the others. So I'm not too sure. And I did
15	my paper, as in I wrote it and brought it back in. So I
16	know that. I probably, I probably didn't write it on
17	there out as detailed. But I know I put it on there.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did you do a paper
19	application, or did you do a computer application?
20	MS. JOHNSON: I did a paper application and
21	brought it back in.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll give you the
23	benefit of the doubt.
24	For the investigator, is her application there?
25	Could you take a look.

MR. JONES: If you give me just one moment, I
will pull it up.
BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I certainly will.
MR. SALADINO: Chairman, this is Investigator
Saladino.
BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, go ahead.
MR. SALADINO: I'm currently looking over the
written application that's been scanned into her
profile. And everything we have a petty larceny.
Let's see. Have you ever been arrested? She circled
yes. Petty larceny, trespassing, wrong police, wrong
info to police, paid a fine. That was all she
disclosed.
MS. JOHNSON: Well, exactly what I was saying,
I put it all on there as in detailed as possible,
because the lady told me, as I was sitting there, do not
make it go past, like don't make it look like that.
Like, you know, she's like, make it detailed, but not as
detailed, because you don't want it to go past the paper
line. There was only so much paper line to write in.
So I was detailing, as it said on there, that writing,
or disclosing wrong information to the police. Which
that was one of my charges for the 2018. Which they
said that's what it was, because they dismissed all the
other charges. What I was going for was disclosing the

1	wrong information to the police officer.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So for the investigator
3	or one of the investigators, so I'm confused. Was the
4	discharge a firearm and the other charges all connected
5	to the same arrest?
6	MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. That is
7	correct. The discharging of the gun, the false report
8	and the false statement were all part of the same
9	arrest.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And not having an
11	application in front of me, did she use all the space
12	provided?
13	MR. SALADINO: Mr. Chair, Investigator
14	Saladino.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes.
16	MR. SALADINO: No, there was more lines below,
17	where she would have wrote in more.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
19	MR. SALADINO: And, you know, we do tell them
20	to, you know, disclose everything they can, and, you
21	know, if it's something that we know is going to be a
22	denial, an investigator will come out and talk to them
23	and tell them how to proceed from there, if it's
24	disclosed right when they turn in their application.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. I

1	just wanted to get that on the record. I'm aware. And
2	I also know that there's been times where we've used an
3	addendum sheet. So.
4	All right. Any other questions from the Board?
5	Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.
6	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
7	that we uphold the denial of Ms. Brandi Johnson.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
9	Do I have a second?
10	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
12	I have a second. Any other discussion?
13	Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All
14	those in favor, state "aye."
15	(Board members said "aye.")
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Johnson,
17	please reapply in a year. Use all the space. Disclose
18	everything.
19	MS. JOHNSON: Okay.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you for your time,
21	ma'am. You have a good day.
22	MS. JOHNSON: Thank you.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 165, Tony
24	Burden. Mr. Burden, are you here?
25	MR. INGRAM: Chairman Flynn?

BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: If you're not 1 2 Mr. Burden, you need to place your phone on mute, 3 please. Thank you. Call one more time, Mr. Tony Burden, number 4 165? 5 Okay. Kevin, I show one, two, three, four, 6 7 five, I show six that we're trailing on this sheet. I'd like to call them now if you show the same. 8 MR. INGRAM: That would be great to proceed 9 with the trailed items. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 145, 11 Stephanie Amaya, are you here? 12 13 MR. INGRAM: Chairman Flynn? BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. 14 MR. INGRAM: We do have item 140 from the 15 previous page trailed as well. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Oh, okay. Let me. All 17 right. Number 140. So we got seven. All right. Let's 18 catch up on these. 19 20 Is Jesse Sierra here? Jessie Sierra, number 140? 21 Okay. I'll entertain a motion. 22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move 23 that we uphold the denial. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 25

1	Do I have a second?
2	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further
4	discussion?
5	If not, I'll call for a vote. All those in
6	favor of the motion, state "aye."
7	(Board members said "aye.")
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
9	Number 145, Stephanie Amaya? Stephanie Amaya,
10	are you here?
11	Call for a motion.
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Chairman, it sounds like
13	someone's trying to. Can we call her again maybe?
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Stephanie
15	Amaya, are you here?
16	Okay. I'm not hearing anything. I'll call for
17	a motion.
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Motion to
19	deny.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
21	Do I have a second?
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Second. This is Nixon.
23	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Nixon seconds.
25	Any further discussion?

1	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
2	in favor, state "aye."
3	(Board members said "aye.")
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
5	Marian Williams, are you here?
6	(There was an outside interruption.)
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I cannot hear a word
8	that person is saying, if somebody can help me.
9	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: They're talking in the
10	background, Mr. Chairman, commenting on our decisions.
11	It's somebody with an open line.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I think, they
13	left.
14	All right. Marian Williams, are you here?
15	Okay. I'll call for a motion.
16	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
17	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to
18	deny.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Second?
20	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Gronauer seconds. Any
22	further discussion?
23	Hearing none, call for a vote. All those in
24	favor, state "aye."
25	(Board members said "aye.")

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
2	Gary Territo, are you here? Mr. Territo,
3	number 153?
4	All right. I'll call for a motion.
5	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
6	that we uphold the appeal, or the denial.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
8	Do I have a second?
9	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any further
11	discussion?
12	Okay. Hearing none, call for a vote. All in
13	favor, state "aye."
14	(Board members said "aye.")
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
16	Aaron Harris, are you here, number 160, Aaron
17	Harris? Mr. Harris?
18	Okay. I'll call for a motion.
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we uphold the
20	denial.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I need a second.
22	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion
24	and second. Any further discussion?
25	Hearing none, call for a vote. All those in

favor, state "aye." 1 (Board members said "aye.") 2 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Motion carries. Deborah Newman, are you here? Deborah Newman, 4 161? 5 Okay. I'll call for a motion. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Motion for denial. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 9 Do I have a second? 10 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I second. 11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Nixon seconds. Any further discussion? 14 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those 15 in favor, state "aye." 16 (Board members said "aye.") 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries. 18 Number 165, Tony Burden. Tony Burden, are you 19 20 here? Mr. Burden? 21 Okay. I'll call for a motion. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move that we uphold the 22 denial. This is Nixon. 23 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do I have a second? 2.5

1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
2	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Gronauer seconds.
4	Any further discussion?
5	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
6	in favor, state "aye."
7	(Board members said "aye.")
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
9	I believe, we already heard number 166. Is
10	that correct, Mr. Ingram?
11	MR. INGRAM: That is correct.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 167,
13	Kenyoda ("Ken-yoh-deh") King, if I'm pronouncing that
14	correctly.
15	MS. KING: It's "Ken-yah-deh."
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: "Ken-yah-deh." Good
17	afternoon, ma'am. How are you?
18	MS. KING: I'm doing pretty good.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,
20	please take over.
21	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. Sorry.
22	Investigator Maxwell.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
24	MR. MAXWELL: The applicant was arrested in
25	2013, out of Iowa. The charge was theft, at the felony

level. There was no disposition available. This was
 disclosed on the application, but it did not show up on
 the fingerprint report.

2006, out of the Iowa, use of a deadly weapon,
a misdemeanor, two days jail. This was not disclosed.

6 2010, out of Iowa, assault, intent to inflict 7 serious injury, misdemeanor. Substance abuse evaluation 8 and restitution, two years suspended prison sentence, 9 suspended fine, two years probation. Probation shows it 10 being revoked on 9-17 of 2012. Time served 999 days per 11 the fingerprint report. This was not disclosed.

12 4-24-2018, out of Iowa, disorderly conduct, 13 misdemeanor. There was a fine. And this was not 14 disclosed.

The applicant was not made provisional due to the disclosure of the felony conviction. This did not show up on the fingerprint report. The other arrests were on the fingerprint report but were not disclosed by the applicant.

20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. 21 Ma'am, do you want to explain as to why you 22 didn't disclose?

MS. KING: Absolutely. Well, when I came there, that was the first time that I filled out an application. And as far as knowing the dates, I didn't,

1	this was my first time filling it out, so as far as the
2	knowing the dates for those charges, I didn't know them
3	off the head. So. I did the application in the office.
4	I did all the fingerprints and everything that
5	(There was an outside interruption.)
6	MS. KING: I'm sorry? I didn't hear you.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I didn't say anything.
8	That wasn't me.
9	MS. KING: Oh. Okay. So far as like the dates
10	or anything, I didn't know them, but off the back of my
11	head, and I didn't want to lie, so I just, I didn't
12	actually write them. And the lady at the front desk
13	already told me that, yeah, she let me know in the
14	beginning that I was going to get denied and come up
15	before the Board. And she said I'd be able to explain
16	it then. So.
17	But, yeah, totally transparent with all of my
18	charges. It's just the date. I didn't have all my
19	paperwork in front of me. But I do now. So whatever
20	you guys want to know, I'm open.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And just so you
22	know, I've been doing this for a few years. I've
23	accepted people for admitting what they've done and not
24	including the date, because I understand people forget
25	dates. But they do remember being in jail, they

remember being arrested, they remember going before the 1 2 court. 3 MS. KING: Oh, yes. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Are you in Las Vegas now 4 or California? 5 MS. KING: I am in Las Vegas now. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what do you do for employment, ma'am? 8 MS. KING: I work in -- I work at Voltaire. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 10 MS. KENYODA: I'm on PCA right now because of 11 the clients that I had got Covid. So I have small 12 1.3 children, so I had to step back from that. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I understand that. 14 15 Okav. Any other questions from the Board? MS. KING: As I stated before, whatever you 16 guys want to know, I'm open. I have all my paperwork in 17 front of me. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from 19 20 the Board? All right. I'll entertain a motion. 21 (There was an outside interruption.) 22 BOARD MEMBER FLYNN: You need to put your phone 23 on mute. Either that or we need to call the meeting. 24 2.5 So you need to put your phone on mute.

1	(There was an outside interruption.)
2	MR. INGRAM: Whoever is on their phone right
3	now, you need to mute so that we can continue the
4	hearing. If you continue to speak, we will close the
5	hearing and no one will be heard. Please mute your
6	phones at this time.
7	(There was an outside interruption.)
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: And who are you, sir?
9	MS. KING: Are we continuing?
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I don't know, Ms. King.
11	We're trying to hear your case, but there's a whole
12	bunch of people that are chirping in on your behalf.
13	MS. KING: Jesus. Well, I don't know them, so.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I haven't had
15	anybody else come in with fans today.
16	MR. INGRAM: I think, they hung up, Chairman.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Like I said, it was kind
18	of interesting. She's got a lot of fans. We haven't
19	had any others today.
20	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Chairman, did you ask for
21	a motion?
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, not yet. Not yet.
23	I was asking if there was any question from the Board.
24	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Okay.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Before the fans chirped

1 in. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman? 2 (There was an outside interruption.) 3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gosh. Mr. Chairman? 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. Who's this? 5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Bobby G., Gronauer. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah? BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That gentleman 8 who was making all that, he's been saying that for about 9 five people now. So I don't think it's on Ms. King, 10 just so you understand. I heard it several times with 11 several people. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I believe you. One of my weaknesses is my hearing. So I heard it that time. 14 15 All right. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I just wanted to listen 16 to her. So if we have to take her singly, and that's 17 it. But I don't believe he had anything to do with her. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. 19 20 Ms. King, we had a lot of interruptions. I tell you 21 what, I will give you a moment if there's anything you want to add for us before we continue, because of the 22 interruptions and I lost my train of thought. 23 MS. KING: I'm just, I'm open to transparency, 24 2.5 whatever you guys want to ask me. As I stated before, I

don't know anything about the disruption. So, yeah.
 That's what I have to say.

BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then, again, I mean you disclosed one of the arrests, which was the felony. Why didn't you disclose the other ones? That's the issue that's here is the nondisclosure.

7 MS. KING: Like I said, I didn't want to lie on the paperwork as far as putting everything. I wanted to 8 put exactly what it was. Because it's not like I 9 haven't talked about it before. I've been in prison. 10 So I talked about my past, stuff like that, my juvenile 11 detentions, and talked about it. It's not like I'm 12 13 trying to hide it. I'm public with it. Like even on 14 social media, I'm public with my charges and everything that I have done and, you know, and my transformation in 15 I have a letter from the Governor of Iowa life. 16 restoring my citizen rights. I have countless like 17 certificates from everything I've done over the years. 18 I mean it's not like I'm trying to hide it. Like I 19 20 said, I'm open and transparent to anything. It doesn't 21 matter what it is. What you guys have to ask me, I'm open to it. 22

BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what was your
 last arrest, what do you recall your last arrest being?
 MS. KING: I'm now thinking, because I wrote it

1	down, it said 2018. And, I think, it was in March.
2	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: It was disorderly conduct,
3	2018.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
5	MS. KING: Okay. I just wanted to make sure
6	that was the right one. Okay. 2018, disorderly
7	conduct.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what were the
9	circumstances of that arrest, ma'am?
10	MS. KING: The circumstances, I was eight and a
11	half months pregnant, high-risk pregnancy during that
12	time. And my I have my two teenagers were in high
13	school. They were being trolled by a group who calls
14	themself PPE. And they were messing with my kids for
15	the last five, six months, and whatever. We have police
16	reports, and whatever. And on the last day of school
17	for summer out, they decided they were going to jump
18	them. There were three boys and seven girls involved.
19	I picked my kids up from the bus area where they're
20	dropped off. I'm sitting in my truck. And as my kids
21	stepped off the public transportation, these three boys
22	and seven girls attacked them.
23	Imagine being a mother, and I'm eight and a
24	half months pregnant, watching your two daughters
25	getting beat up by a group of kids. Huh-uh. My

1	disorderly conduct was jumping out of my vehicle trying
2	to save my kids.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Were you arrested
4	or cited?
5	MS. KING: I was arrested. They actually maced
6	all of us. I was arrested.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what police
8	department was this?
9	MS. KING: This was in Davenport, Iowa.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
11	MS. KING: And I was eight and a half months
12	pregnant, and I needed to save my teenagers from this
13	group, who are known as, they called theirself the PPE.
14	It was weird.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what happened when
16	you went to court on that?
17	MS. KING: I'm sorry. Did you say something
18	else?
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I wanted to know
20	what happened when you went to court on that case.
21	MS. KING: I didn't really go to court. My
22	lawyer, he gave me this I was eight and a half months
23	pregnant when this happened. So everybody was trying to
24	close it. It was not seen as, oh, my God, she's the
25	lupus of society. I was seen as I was protecting my

babies. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. 3 Any other questions from the Board, now that we've not some quiet going on? 4 All right. Hearing no questions, I'll 5 entertain a motion. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a motion. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead. 9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry for all the 10 stuff that was going on in Ms. King's stuff. But the 11 nondisclosure, I have to make a motion to deny the 12 13 appeal. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 14 Do I have a second? 15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll 16 second. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 18 I have a second. Any further discussion? 19 20 Okay. Call for a vote. All those in favor, 21 state "aye." (Board members said "aye.") 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried. 23 24 Ms. King, I'm sorry. You can reapply in a year. Please disclose everything. If you don't remember the date, 2.5

1	just write the charge.
2	Okay. Number 168, Devauntae Scroggins? And I
3	apologize if I butchered that name. Number 168,
4	Scroggins?
5	Okay. I will trail that.
6	169, Bradley Laverne?
7	MR. LAVERNE: Here. I'm present, sir.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand
9	you're under oath, Mr. Laverne?
10	MR. LAVERNE: Yes. Yes, sir.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator,
12	please proceed.
13	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The
14	applicant was arrested in 2002 in Kentucky. The charge
15	was theft by deception, at felony level. Disposition
16	shows two years prison, less 160 days for credit for
17	time served. This was not disclosed.
18	2012, out of California, child cruelty with
19	possible injury or death, at felony level, 365 days
20	jail, four years probation. This was disclosed, but we
21	do not have court docs. This was actually partially
22	disclosed on the probation/parole section of the
23	application.
24	2009, California, DUI at misdemeanor level, 48
25	hours jail, three years probation. This was disclosed.

1	The DUI and child cruelty were partially
2	disclosed, but not their level of severity. And so the
3	applicant was initially made provisional. The arrests
4	were found and confirmed with the fingerprint report.
5	Applicant was made provisional on 12-11 of '19. He was
6	listed on ESI Security, license number 700, roster as
7	employed from 12-18-19 to 1-23-19, at which time we
8	notified the licensee that the card was denied, and he
9	was terminated.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Laverne, why don't
11	you explain the child cruelty, so I can understand it
12	better.
13	MR. LAVERNE: What had happened, sir, is that,
14	what had happened, sir, is that, unfortunately, a buddy
15	of mine that I went to basic training and we continued
16	in the military I was in, I'm a United States Army
17	combat veteran, Operation Iraq Freedom, if you will,
18	sir. And my good friend was killed in combat at that
19	time in Afghanistan. I did not know how to deal with
20	death very well at that time. He was a very close
21	friend of mine. Like I said, we went to the military
22	together.
23	I was heavily drinking. My stepson came
24	outside, was smarting off to me. And I said, "Please
25	get away from me," at which time my ex-father-in-law

1	proceeded to call the sheriff and make false
2	allegations. When the sheriff pulled up, natural
3	instinct of any combat soldier, if you folks will, he
4	jumped at me, made a threat towards me. And I ended up
5	back-handing him in front of the sheriff's department.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN NADEAU: Okay. Why didn't you
7	disclose some these arrests?
8	MR. LAVERNE: I was told by ESI at the time,
9	sir, which is the security company I was working for,
10	that because they were so old, that they should not be a
11	problem and I did not need to disclose them. And I was
12	told that by the owners of ESI.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, I just want to
14	make sure I get this correctly. ESI Security told you
15	not to disclose these?
16	MR. LAVERNE: Right. Because I explained to
17	them how old they were. And they said, "Well, it
18	shouldn't be a problem. You should be okay to get your
19	PILB. You don't need to disclose them."
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. We
21	will definitely follow up on that.
22	MR. LAVERNE: Had I known to do that, I would
23	have done it, sir.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
25	MR. LAVERNE: I was just going by the direction
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1	was employer at the time.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right.
3	MR. LAVERNE: And I do show remorse for my
4	actions. That was a long time ago. I realize I made a
5	mistake, folks. But I have been trying to prepare very
6	much for this hearing, because I really want to be a
7	security officer. And I was a security officer in
8	Stockton, California for a great many years.
9	And I've been working in a nightclub part-time
10	as a bouncer. It's not really security, but it is, kind
11	of deal. They don't require a PILB, but. And I have a
12	very good rapport with my current employer, up until
13	COVID-19 hit and the bars got shut down. That's why I'm
14	currently not working.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
16	Any other questions from the Board?
17	Hearing none, I'll call for a motion.
18	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I move
19	that we uphold the denial. I go back to the form. It
20	can't be any clearer. And thank you for your service,
21	sir. I appreciate your efforts. But you have to
22	disclose. So that's my motion.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I have a motion. Do I
24	have a second?
25	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

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1	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Okay.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Brown
3	seconds. Any further discussion?
4	Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All
5	those in favor of the motion, state "aye."
6	(Board members said "aye.")
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion passes.
8	Okay. Sir, you can reapply in a year. We will
9	definitely follow up on your statement about ESI and
10	make sure that they we'll get to the bottom of that
11	one.
12	Is that correct, Mr. Ingram?
13	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
15	MR. LAVERNE: Okay. Well, with that being said
16	and it not being my fault, folks, I know you already
17	made a motion and all that, but that being said, you
18	know, that was not my fault. That was the fault of the
19	employer. So I don't understand why you guys are still
20	denying me when I'm not the one who is at fault here.
21	It's the employer.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'll be blunt.
23	MR. LAVERNE: Yeah.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We're going to follow
25	up. And we'll find out what their version of this story

Do you know what the name of the employee that told 1 is. 2 you that? 3 MR. LAVERNE: I don't. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 4 MR. LAVERNE: They no longer work there. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, how do you know 6 7 that? MR. LAVERNE: Oh, I see ESI all time. They're 8 all over Reno, so. They do all the events in Reno. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. We will follow up 10 11 on your statement, sir. MR. LAVERNE: Okay. 12 1.3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you. MR. LAVERNE: So when do I get to apply again? 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 170, Christopher 15 Mr. Moore, are you here? Christopher Moore, Moore. 16 number 170? 17 Okay. We'll trail that. 18 Number 171, Kenneth Bryant, are you here? 19 20 MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Chair, Investigator Maxwell. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes. 21 MR. MAXWELL: Mr. Bryant actually withdrew his 22 He's actually returned back to California, and 23 appeal. he is no longer seeking a work card in Nevada. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the 25

record show that he's withdrawn. 1 2 Number 172, Lavelle Pearson? Mr. Pearson, 3 Lavelle Pearson? Okay. Trail that. 4 Kevin Theophile? And if I mispronounced that, 5 my apologies. Kevin Theophile? 6 7 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman, Kevin Ingram. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. 8 MR. INGRAM: I think, we probably ought to go 9 ahead and swear item numbers 173 through 184 real 10 quickly before we proceed. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And with 12 13 that, we've been going 90 minutes. I'm going to get the Board take a bio break. Because we don't get breaks. 14 15 We got to listen to the phone. MR. 3	Okay. We'll trail that one.
4	Artura Demoss? Artura Demoss?
5	Okay. We'll trail that.
6	Reve Wilson?
7	MS. WILSON: Here.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did I pronounce your
9	name, Reve ("Reev")?
10	MS. WILSON: It's "Reh-vay."
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. My apologies,
12	Ms. Wilson.
13	MS. WILSON: That's all right.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand
15	you're under oath?
16	MS. WILSON: Yes.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Can I have I'll let
18	the investigator give their report.
19	MS. WILSON: Okay.
20	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The
21	applicant was arrested in 2007, out of California, for
22	appropriation of lost property. This was a misdemeanor.
23	Disposition showed 10 days jail, one year probation.
24	This was not disclosed. We do not have court docs.
25	2011, out of Louisiana, attempted felony left,

1	felony level, six months suspended sentence, one year
2	probation. This was not disclosed.
3	The applicant did not disclose the arrests.
4	These were found on the fingerprint report. She was
5	initially made provisional on 10-14 of 2019 but was not
6	added to any roster. She was denied 10-16 of 2019.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
8	Ms. Wilson, do you want to explain to us why
9	you didn't disclose?
10	MS. WILSON: I knew I was arrested. To be
11	truthful, I didn't even remember like when and what
12	years or anything. I just knew it was in Louisiana.
13	And I didn't even remember the one in California. That
14	one's new to me now.
15	And then tomorrow will make a year that I've
16	been out here in Vegas. So I just really didn't think,
17	because I haven't been in trouble in so long.
18	And I did get my provisionary when I moved out
19	here, and I had started working at the Mandalay Bay
20	doing security. But then, when I got hired at a second
21	job, that's when I was told that my guard card wasn't
22	going to come and something showed on my background.
23	But I never knew what it was until now.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you employed
25	now, or?

MS. WILSON: Yes, I'm employed. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And what do you do, 3 ma'am? MS. WILSON: I do janitorial. I work at the 4 Grandview time share. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any 6 7 other questions from the Board? MS. WILSON: No, I just didn't know what I had 8 and what years. I just know it's been a while. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. 10 Let me see if any of the Board members have questions for 11 you, ma'am. 12 13 MS. WILSON: Okay. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from the Board? 15 Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion. 16 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member 17 Nixon. I move that we uphold the denial. One, time and 18 distance. And, two, nondisclosure. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you. I have a motion. Do I have a second? 21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further 23 discussion? 24 Okay. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. 25 All

those in favor of the motion, state "aye." 1 2 (Board members said "aye.") 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Motion carries. All right. Ms. Wilson, you can reapply in a year. Please 4 disclose those two arrests next time you come. 5 MS. WILSON: It was 2007 and two thousand and 6 7 whatever? BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 11. 8 MS. WILSON: Okay. All right. Thank you. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. You have a 10 11 good day, ma'am. Thank you. All right. Mr. Heard, Sederick Heard, number 12 177? Mr. Heard? 13 Okay. I'm going to trail that. 14 Jerome Raines? 15 MR. RAINES: Yes, I'm here. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Raines, are 17 you aware you're under oath? 18 MR. RAINES: Yes. 19 20 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the 21 investigator chime in. MR. JONES: Thank you. This is Investigator 22 Jones. The applicant was denied for a felony burglary 23 charge in California in 2007. The disposition and 24 severity do not show on the fingerprint report, but the 2.5

1	applicant states that he was incarcerated.
2	In 2009, the applicant was arrested for
3	burglary again. The fingerprint report does not show
4	severity or disposition. And the applicant did not
5	disclose.
6	In 2010, the applicant was arrested in
7	California for violation of felony parole. The
8	fingerprint report does not show the severity or
9	disposition. And the applicant did not disclose.
10	The applicant was denied previously from a 2019
11	application. So he is back to the Board to try again.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Raines, we
13	denied you once before for not disclosing. Why didn't
14	you disclose this time, again?
15	MR. RAINES: Last time, I was denied for the
16	first felony in 2007. I don't know, I don't know of the
17	one in 2009. I don't know of any other one. That was
18	the only one I had. So I don't know if that's my
19	brother or not. I was on probation for that.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What about the other
21	charges? There's a total. It shows you've been, unless
22	I'm incorrect, it shows you've been arrested four times.
23	MR. RAINES: Yeah, I didn't hear the other two.
24	I heard the one in 2007 and 2009.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll give you the

benefit of the doubt. 1 2 Investigator, could you remind him what the 3 other two charges are. MR. JONES: Sure. We have the burglary in 4 2007, the burglary in 2009. There is a felony burglary 5 that was two months later. The fingerprint does not 6 7 show if that was the same charge. And then, again, in 2010, violation of felony parole. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. So, Mr. Raines, 9 what you're saying is, if I understand you correctly, to 10 your belief, you only have one charge? 11 MR. RAINES: Yes. 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And then the parole violation had to do with that one charge? 14 MR. RAINES: Yes. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you still on 16 parole? 17 MR. RAINES: No. I've been off for a while. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you required 19 20 to register as an ex-felon? 21 MR. RAINES: I don't believe so. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you currently 22 living in Nevada? 23 MR. RAINES: Yes, I'm in Nevada now. 24 2.5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what do you

1	do for employment, sir?
2	MR. RAINES: I work at ESI as event services.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other
4	questions from the Board?
5	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Chairman, this is Brown.
6	I want to make sure that I understand. There's one
7	charge of burglary, and the other three that we see are
8	violations of parole of the same offense, it just
9	doesn't appear that way, except for the fourth?
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm leaning towards the
11	other charges. I'm not, and I'm not sure. I don't have
12	the paperwork in front of me. But maybe the
13	investigator can chime in. I think, they're all related
14	to the one charge.
15	MR. JONES: Yes, Investigator Jones. The 2007
16	burglary shows a different reason. The 2009 arrest,
17	which shows two years incarcerated in prison.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You haven't been
19	in trouble since two thousand and when was your last
20	parole violation, what year?
21	MR. RAINES: I believe, it was 2010. Oh, no,
22	2009, and I went into 2010.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. You haven't been
24	in any trouble for 10 years?
25	MR. RAINES: No, I haven't been in any trouble,

but traffic tickets. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Any 3 other questions from the Board? Okav. I'll entertain a motion. 4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to 5 uphold the denial. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okav. I have a motion. Do I have a second? 8 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Nixon. I second. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 10 I have a second. Any discussion? 11 Okay. Hearing none, call for a vote. All 12 13 those in favor, state "aye." (Board members said "aye.") 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Raines, I'll 15 just speak for myself. I think, we need a little more 16 distance with your felony. If you apply again in a 17 year, and you list everything as required, I'm only 18 speaking for myself, I'll probably see this differently. 19 20 Good luck to you, sir, and you have a good day. Number 179, Elbert Taylor? 21 MR. TAYLOR: I'm here. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Elbert Taylor, are you 23 24 here, sir? MR. TAYLOR: I'm here. 25

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We're going to trail
2	that one.
3	Number 180, Michael Garcia, are you here?
4	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Chairman, I do have a lot
5	of noise, but, I think, he said he's here.
6	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chairman?
7	MR. GARCIA: Garcia, 180, is here.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm going to this is
9	Ray Flynn, everybody. All right. Number 179, Elbert
10	Taylor, are you here?
11	MR. TAYLOR: I'm here.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you,
13	sir. Do you understand you're under oath?
14	MR. TAYLOR: Yes, sir.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you. All right.
16	And the investigator, please proceed.
17	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah.
19	MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
20	1998 first-degree burglary, out of California, where the
21	applicant was sentenced to 17 years in prison. This was
22	not disclosed on the application.
23	1993, out of the Tennessee, there was another
24	first-degree burglary, at a felony level. He was
25	convicted, four years in prison. The applicant did not

1	disclose this arrest. After reviewing the fingerprint
2	report, the applicant served a term in Tennessee from
3	'93 to '97 and then was convicted again in California
4	for the above charge.
5	1992, in Tennessee, forgery. This was an
6	arrest only. No charges were filed.
7	1990, in Tennessee, aggravated robbery, two
8	counts. Again, this was just an arrest where no charges
9	were filed.
10	1990, out of Tennessee, unlawful possession of
11	a weapon. Again, this was an arrest with no charges
12	filed.
13	1987, attempt to commit a felony, out of
14	Tennessee, where the applicant received two years of
15	confinement. This was a felony and not disclosed.
16	In 1984, out of the Tennessee, there was a
17	burglary at a misdemeanor level, where they were
18	sentenced to nine months of jail.
19	The applicant did not disclose any of his
20	arrest history. He was made provisional on 2-27 of '20.
21	He did not work for any licensed company during his
22	provisional status. All the arrests and convictions
23	were found on the applicant's fingerprint report, and
24	then he was denied.
25	Nothing further.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Taylor, why didn't
2	you disclose anything?
3	MR. TAYLOR: I disclosed the last time I was in
4	prison. But I thought it was in '92. He said it was
5	'98. I thought it was 1992 all the way up to 2012. I
6	did my time. I put that on there. Well, I applied to
7	One Stop, because they were going to help me pay for it,
8	and I thought that she did put it on there. I told her
9	about it, but I don't know if she put it on there or
10	not.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So you're saying
12	somebody else filled out your application, you didn't?
13	MR. TAYLOR: No, I didn't, I didn't do the I
14	went to One Stop, and they were going to help me pay for
15	it. And we did the paperwork together. She asked me
16	the questions, and she just wrote in down. That's what
17	I thought she did.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did you sign the
19	application?
20	MR. TAYLOR: Yes, I signed the application.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Did you read all the
22	entries when you signed it?
23	MR. TAYLOR: Well, I, to be honest with you, I
24	didn't, because I felt that she did everything
25	correctly. And she gave me the check and the

application. I took it down to the place and I turned 1 2 it in. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. This is a painful 3 lesson when you have somebody else fill out your 4 application for you. 5 MR. TAYLOR: I understand that, both helping 6 7 me. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Are 8 you living in Nevada now? 9 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, I am. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What do you do for 11 employment, sir? 12 MR. TAYLOR: Well, I'm working two jobs. I 13 work for a warehouse. And starting Monday, I start 14 15 working for Bennett as a maintenance crew. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you. Any other 16 questions from the Board? 17 MR. TAYLOR: No, sir. I've been off of parole 18 since, I've been off parole for seven years, and I 19 20 haven't been in any trouble. I worked in California as 21 a security guard for five years. And I didn't even know anything about, I forgot all about all the arrests that 22 was in Tennessee. Really I did. 23 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I, like I said --24 well, I already said what I said. All right. Let me 2.5

see if any of the other Board members have questions, 1 2 sir. 3 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, sir. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any other questions from 4 the Board? 5 All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a 6 7 motion. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: This is Board Member 8 Nixon. I move that we uphold the denial of -- well, 9 that we uphold the denial. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 11 Seeking a second. 12 13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any further 14 discussion? 15 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those 16 in favor of the motion, state "aye." 17 (Board members said "aye.") 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries. 19 20 Mr. Taylor, good luck to you. You can reapply in a 21 year. Please fill out the application yourself. Don't depend on other people to fill out important paperwork. 22 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, I understand that. 23 Thank 24 you. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Good luck. 25 Good

1 luck to you, sir. 2 MR. TAYLOR: Thank you. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Number 180, Michael 3 Garcia, are you here? 4 MR. GARCIA: Yes, sir. Present, 180, Michael 5 Garcia. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Are you aware 8 you're under oath? MR. GARCIA: Yes, sir. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Investigator, 10 11 please proceed. MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. In 2008, 12 13 out of California, there was a charge for possession of 14 marijuana for sale. This was at a felony level, where 15 the applicant received 16 months prison sentence. This was not disclosed. 16 In 1996, out of California, CCW in a vehicle. 17 This was a misdemeanor, found guilty where the applicant 18 received three years of probation. This also was not 19 20 disclosed. 21 2006, out of California, possession of marijuana for sale. This was reduced to a misdemeanor, 22 received three years of probation. 23 October 7th of '18, out of Nevada, there was a 24 possession Schedule I, II, III or IV controlled 2.5

This was reduced to a misdemeanor. Court 1 substance. documents show that he was convicted of possession of a 2 dangerous drug. And the case was closed on 1-22 of 3 2020. 4 2012, out of Nevada, coercion by force. 5 This was started off as a felony, was found guilty of 6 misdemeanor coercion no force. Court documents show 7 that the charge was reduced to a misdemeanor, where he 8 was sentenced to 25 hours of community service. This 9 case was closed on 4-18 of '13. 10 The applicant did not disclose his arrest 11 history. The out-of-state convictions were found on the 12 13 fingerprint report. Local arrest history for the misdemeanors were reviewed, and the applicant was made 14 15 provisional. Once the fingerprint report was received, the applicant's provisional was revoked and denied. And 16 he's here for his appeal. 17 Nothing further. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Garcia, why 19 20 didn't you disclose anything? 21 MR. GARCIA: Well, to be honest with you, sir, all that was supposed to be put behind me, down to a 22 misdemeanor. And on the application, it said there that 23 I had a felony, which I was going to put down, but it 24 got dropped to a misdemeanor. Right now, the felony 2.5

that I have, it's going under review for Proposition 64. 1 I got the deputy in charge in West Covina, California 2 taking care of whatever they need to take care of so I 3 could go back to work. 4 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I know the 5 application says "any arrests." 6 7 MR. GARCIA: Right. And as you're seeing --BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Why didn't you -- I'm 8 just curious. Why didn't you disclose any of your 9 arrests of your history? 10 MR. GARCIA: Because I, for sure, I thought, I 11 already thought about a month ago that my expungement 12 13 was supposed to be done for my 2006 arrest, which I violated in 2008. I didn't call in to my probation 14 officer one day. And ever since then, my attorney that 15 I had hired had passed away. And all this time, I've 16 had numerous jobs. I worked at Disneyland. I worked 17 for the City of L.A. And they do a thorough background 18 there, and everything cam back clean. And I was even 19 20 going to purchase a firearm one time, but I didn't do 21 that, I didn't have enough money.

And right now, the Raiders stadium is holding my position as the lead to run the whole stadium over there as soon as this is cleared up. And I've already gone through all the paperwork and stuff, which includes

1	CR-106 info, CR-106, all the forms that are provided to
2	me for to get expungement for my record, for a clear
3	request. And it's in motion right now. It's everything
4	is going to go actually next month today. On my
5	birthday, October 2nd, everything should be taken care
6	ever.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. But you
8	understand that today, at the hearing, when we have to
9	make a decision, there's no expungement, all this stuff
10	is on your record?
11	MR. GARCIA: Right. I understand.
12	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: And can I state, can I
13	make a statement real quick? Again, this is so
14	frustrating, because even on the application it says,
15	even if it was expunged, if you've been arrested, to
16	note it. So it's just. This is Nixon making a
17	statement. Sorry.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, that's okay.
19	All right. Any other questions from the Board?
20	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a
21	motion.
22	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: I move we uphold the
23	denial.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
25	Do I have a second?

BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. 1 Second. 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further discussion? 3 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote on the 4 All those in favor, state "aye." 5 motion. (Board members said "aye.") 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: And, Mr. Garcia, when you apply in a year, you understand, even though it's 8 expunged, as our application says, you need to disclose. 9 MR. GARCIA: Yes, sir. I understand that, sir. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good luck to you, sir. 11 12 Thank you. 13 Number 181. BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Chairman? 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. 15 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Chairman, this is Nixon. 16 I, unfortunately, have another meeting that I cannot 17 miss. So I will have to drop off for the last few. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I appreciate your 19 20 service the last two days. This has been an aggressive 21 agenda. I don't know if Kevin's going to be on my Christmas card list this year. But thank you. 22 BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Nor mine. But it's, as 23 24 always, a pleasure. Thank you guys. Have a good 2.5 evening.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Be safe.
2	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Tammy?
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I just want
4	to confirm, before we go forward, we have a quorum?
5	There are three of us here. Mr. Detmer, is that
6	correct?
7	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Tammy?
8	MR. DETMER: That would be my count, Chairman,
9	yes.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
11	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: It sounds like Bobby's
12	trying to ask me a question before I hang up.
13	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes. All I was going
14	to say, can I go with you?
15	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: No, you need the quorum.
16	Take care.
17	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, okay.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good one.
19	BOARD MEMBER NIXON: Bye.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Number 181,
21	Linda Lopez, are you here?
22	UNIDENTIFIED MAN: I might as well go, too.
23	MS. LOPEZ: I am. I'm here.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Please do.
25	All right. Ms. Lopez, do you realize you're

1	under oath?
2	MS. LOPEZ: Yes, I do.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the
4	investigator take over.
5	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The
6	applicant was arrested in 1992, out in California. The
7	charge was vandalism. It was a misdemeanor.
8	Disposition was 24 months probation. This was not
9	disclosed.
10	The next two items are linked. On April 4th,
11	1997, out of California, one charge was false ID to
12	specific peace officers, misdemeanor level. Disposition
13	showed probation, jail. This was not disclosed. The
14	second charge was accessory. This was at the felony
15	level. The disposition showed 450 days jail, which was
16	suspended, and five years probation. This was not
17	disclosed. But the applicant did provide court
18	documentation when asked. The conviction was later
19	reduced to a misdemeanor and dismissed under 1203.4 PC.
20	And as I said, the application did provide the court
21	documentation showing that.
22	In 1999, in California, a fraud to obtain aid,
23	felony level, 20 days jail, 72 months probation. This
24	was not disclosed.
25	2011, January 2011, California, DUI, alcohol,

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1	drugs, misdemeanor, 19 days jail, three years probation,
2	not disclosed.
3	July 2011, California, driver's license
4	suspended, et cetera, DUI, special violation,
5	misdemeanor, 30 days jail, 48 months probation, not
6	disclosed. The disposition did show that on 12-2 of
7	2016 the conviction was set aside and dismissed under
8	1203.4.
9	The arrests were not disclosed. SCOPE showed
10	the applicant is a convicted person, which was confirmed
11	with the fingerprint report. And the applicant was not
12	made provisional.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. Lopez, do you
14	want to tell me why you didn't disclose anything?
15	MS. LOPEZ: Why I did not disclose anything is
16	because I had all those cases have been expunged and
17	dismissed. I had an FBI report. With my cases, they
18	were held up since 2005. I didn't know that
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. You heard
20	the statements before. And on the application it says
21	list all arrests, including those that have been
22	expunged.
23	MS. LOPEZ: Right. So I didn't. I didn't.
24	Well, it's probably my fault altogether. I take
25	responsibility for that. I don't recall exposing any of

1 them. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: 2 Okay. MS. LOPEZ: Because I was under this effect 3 that they were all expunded and dismissed. Since I'm 55 4 this year, I didn't figure that I needed to, if it was 5 expunged and dismissed. You know, I never had --6 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Well, vou're 7 required to. Let me see if --8 MS. LOPEZ: Yes. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: What are you doing now, 10 currently, for a job? 11 MS. LOPEZ: I have an LLC to do Lyft here in 12 13 Las Vegas. And I now work for the Golden Entertainment 14 two years as an EVS utility porter at Stratosphere. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okav. MS. LOPEZ: And my record is clean, so. I 16 just, when they had it, an opportunity came up to become 17 a security guard over at the stadium, I applied. First 18 thing, they gave me a telephone interview. And then all 19 20 the things that they required, I did that. So then, 21 when the club card came back, it came back with that work fair card, which was a felony. Which they say if 22 you ever plead guilty to a felony and have it reduced to 23 a misdemeanor and expunded, you are still not entitled 24 to receive like, I quess, the gun charge, or whatever 2.5

1	like that. You have to go for something different, I
2	guess, now. So I have to go back to the FBI, Department
3	of Justice, and it's where I started, to get that
4	cleared. So.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: In the state of
6	Nevada in the State of Nevada, you are required, even
7	if you believe they're expunged, and but we don't
8	have any record of expungement. But even if you believe
9	they're expunged, you need to report them.
10	MS. LOPEZ: Yeah, I do have, I have my whole
11	FBI printout, which I could have provided at that time.
12	I still have it today. But if I don't get a chance to
13	work at the stadium, I'll just wait and then try it
14	again next year. I mean I've been listening to all
15	these cases. And had I known, I don't have a problem
16	expunging, I mean disclosing it, because it has been
17	expunged. And I can prove that. And if that was the
18	case, I would not have, you know, I would have just
19	provided the paperwork, wrote it on the paper, and put
20	it down there, because that's only the right thing to
21	do. And everything was expunged.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
23	MS. LOPEZ: I even drove a cab here. I drove a
24	cab here in Vegas when I first came. But that's the
25	reason how I found out that those 2000 cases, or 2005

1	cases weren't expunged, because the taxi authority, the
2	lady who gave me a paper, told me to challenge my
3	record. That's where I am now, that's how I got to
4	where I am today. Thanks.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you. Let me see
6	if there's any questions from my fellow Board members.
7	Any other questions from the Board?
8	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a
9	motion.
10	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
11	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move
12	that we uphold the denial.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right.
14	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I have a
16	motion. I have a second. Any further discussion?
17	All right. Hearing none, I'll call for a vote.
18	All those in favor, state "aye."
19	(Board members said "aye.")
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
21	All right. Ms. Lopez, you know what to do in a year.
22	Thank you for your time, ma'am. You have a good day.
23	MS. LOPEZ Thank you. You guys have a great
24	day.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Thank you.

1	All right. Kelvin Butler, number 182?
2	MR. BUTLER: How are you doing?
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Butler, I'm doing
4	tired. Thank you for being here. And thank you for
5	your patience. Do you understand you're under oath?
6	MR. BUTLER: Yes.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'm going to turn
8	it over to the investigator.
9	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
11	MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a
12	2015 possession of a controlled substance with intent to
13	sell, out of Nevada. This was a felony. The applicant
14	received four years probation, four years 19 months
15	prison suspended. This was disclosed. And we have
16	court documents.
17	In 2009, possession of drug not introduced into
18	commerce, was a misdemeanor, pled guilty, took classes,
19	received a fine, 50 hours community service. Court
20	documents also confirm this.
21	2010, out of Nevada, possession of drug not
22	introduced into commerce and domestic battery. The
23	applicant pled to reduced charges. The applicant was
24	sentenced to DV classes, drug counseling and community
25	service. The court documents verify that as well.

2011, out of Nevada, robbery and conspiracy to 1 2 commit robbery. This was dismissed. And court documents show that it was dismissed. 3 2012, out of Nevada, possession of a drug not 4 commerce and not introduced into commerce. It was a 5 misdemeanor, found quilty, sentenced, suspended jail 6 7 sentence, counseling, community service. The court documents also verify that. 8 7-7 of '12, out of Nevada, another misdemeanor 9 drug conviction. The applicant just received credit for 10 time served in that case. 11 2014, out of Nevada, felony robbery. This 12 13 charge was reduced to petty larceny misdemeanor. The applicant was sentenced to pay restitution, complete 14 impulse control counseling and stay out of trouble. 15 Court documents show he had a financial hardship and 16 picked up a new possession of marijuana charge and 17 served 60 days. 18 2015, out of Nevada, another possession of 19 20 drugs. It was a misdemeanor. Found quilty. And, 21 again, credit for time served. 2017, possession of Schedule I, II and obtain 22 or use ID of another to avoid, slash, delay. This was a 23 felony level charge, but the D.A. did not file charges. 24 The court documents verify that as well. 2.5

1	4-17 of '20, out of Nevada, false statement to
2	obstruct a public officer. This was a misdemeanor.
3	This case was also dismissed, and the court documents
4	show that.
5	The applicant did not disclose that he was
6	arrested. Oh, I'm sorry. The applicant did disclose
7	that he was arrested and violated his probation. He did
8	not disclose the arrest. It was a felony. And he was
9	convicted.
10	In total, applicant had 29 local arrests and 10
11	citations. At the time of this report, we did not have
12	the fingerprint report. However, we do have the
13	fingerprint report, and we only have the local arrests
14	that are listed on the form.
15	Nothing further.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Butler,
17	anything you want to say?
18	MR. BUTLER: A lot of those charges was me
19	being young, you know, going through a situation. Well,
20	there's really no excuses. You know, you go through
21	phases in life. You know, and it made me understand
22	then. And then I'm 32 years now and being in jail up
23	here. You know, so, honestly, I tell you them was all
24	mistakes. I should never have been using drugs or
25	hanging out with the wrong crowd, you know.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I understand that. And,
2	but I also know that you've had recent police activity.
3	Can you explain those?
4	MR. BUTLER: Recent police activity can just
5	only be me getting pulled over, driving with no license.
6	But 2016, 2015, since I was 16, was actually what as far
7	as I got. That was a felony. And I got caught with
8	drugs. And it was supposed to be a gross misdemeanor.
9	I did my time out at Desert. I got out of there. And
10	since then I got out in like 2019, April 20th. And
11	since then, I was working at Cornerstone. And right
12	now, I'm employed at Vons off of Maryland Parkway and
13	Twain in Las Vegas, Nevada.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Why do you want
15	to be a security officer?
16	MR. BUTLER: Honestly, I like security. You
17	know, a lot of my buddies security. And, you know, I'm
18	kind of a big dog myself, you know. And already I like
19	it. I'm really a protector. Like my family, I got a
20	lot in them in my family as protectors, that they look
21	up to me, oh, Kelvin, he's going to save the day, you
22	know.
23	So really it's a job that I've really been
24	wanting for years. But I would do a failure and made a
25	mistake early. And I didn't have a roll model or bug in

1	my ear, like, oh, Kelvin, don't do this, don't do that.
2	You have to bump your heard in order, you know, to learn
3	as your old man, that, the mistake that you went
4	through. If you don't learn from them, you're never
5	going to learn.
6	You know, so, honestly, I like security. It's
7	better than Vons. Like I work at the Vons grocery
8	store. You know, like I said, I'm pretty six foot
9	four, you know, guard and security. I got a lot of
10	friends that work out there in L.A., bouncers. They're,
11	"You can get a security and make good money." But the
12	problem, I have to get the guard's card to better my
13	life, you know.
14	So if you guys give me the opportunity today, I
15	promise you, there will never be no more failures or a
16	mishappening or a misunderstanding with the police or
17	anything. I learned, in order for me to be around my
18	kids or my family, I can't do BS, I can't be you
19	know, there ain't no excuses, basically.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
21	Let me see if the rest of the Board has any questions of
22	you, sir.
23	Any other questions from the Board?
24	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, the most recent
25	one was, that I can see, was April of 2020. That was

1	just a couple months ago, with the false statement to
2	obstruct a public officer. What's that about?
3	MR. BUTLER: That right there is the officer.
4	I didn't give him a false statement. I told him my
5	name. And on the 2020, of this year, 4-20? It was
6	like, well, I was downtown on Fremont. And me and my
7	girl was talking, or we was having a disagreement. And
8	the police just come in and out of the blue just stops
9	me for no apparent reason. If I'm not, you know,
10	wrongness, I'm not doing nothing, harming anybody,
11	personal property or harming anybody, period, you
12	shouldn't have no reason to stop me or jazz me about the
13	problem with my sweetheart. If I want to go grow braids
14	in my hair, if I wanted, you know, to look the way I
15	want to look, don't judge me. You just have a
16	conversation with me before you just judge me. Don't
17	just think that you have a badge, you can just
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Hold on. Hold on.
19	Hold on.
20	MR. BUTLER: do this to me.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Hold on. I asked you
22	one thing, what was it about. That's all. You know, I
23	feel
24	MR. BUTLER: That's what it was about, sir.
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You said you and your

girlfriend were having a disagreement. So, apparently, 1 2 the police came out of nowhere. All right. So something happened after that. So I'm fine with it. 3 Don't worry about it. Thank you. 4 MR. BUTLER: All righty. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any other 6 7 questions from the Board? Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion. 8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will make a motion. 9 I move to uphold the denial. 10 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion. 11 Do I have a second? 12 13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Second. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any further discussion? 14 Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those 15 in favor, state "aye." 16 (Board members said "aye.") 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Mr. Butler, you 18 can reapply in a year. Try not to have any police 19 20 contact in the next year. 21 MR. BUTLER: Okay. Thank you. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Good luck to you, sir. 22 Appreciate you being here today and your patience. 23 MR. BUTLER: All right. Thank you. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Number 183, Ryan 2.5

Prentiss, are you here? Mr. Prentiss, are you here? 1 MR. PRENTISS: Prentiss. 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, is this Ryan 3 Prentiss? 4 MR. PRENTISS: Yes, it is, this is Ryan 5 Prentice. 6 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand you're under oath? 8 MR. PRENTISS: Yes, sir. 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll let the 10 investigator take over. I think, I remember this case. 11 Go on. 12 13 MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. The applicant previously appeared before the Board in March 14 of 2017. Mr. Chair, would you like me to read the old 15 work card denial report? 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No. It had to do with a 17 DUI. I just want to know what's happened since then and 18 if he did disclose it on the new application. 19 20 MR. MAXWELL: Okay, sir. 8-31 of 2017, state 21 of Nevada, the charge was a DUI, misdemeanor, 30-day jail sentence, which was suspended, and 69 hours 22 community service. This was not disclosed, but we do 23 have court documentation for this. 24 Like I said, the denial was upheld in March of 25

1	2017 for his previous denial, and he was told that he
2	could reapply in March of 2018. His previous denial
3	report is attached, and he hasn't had a DUI since his
4	last appearance. He was not made provisional.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'm just a
6	little confused. Did he disclose the DUI this time?
7	MR. MAXWELL: Negative, sir.
8	MR. PRENTISS: Sir, I went to the police
9	station. I got my paperwork from the police station,
10	all my charges, and I put them all on there. All my
11	charges I got from back when I was younger till now, I
12	put all my charges on that paperwork, sir. It was, I
13	know it was a lot, but I made sure I went down to the
14	police station and got the paperwork that, you know,
15	stated all my charges. And I sat down and I wrote them
16	all on my paperwork. I remember that, because I've
17	still got the paperwork in my car.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. And then you
19	handed this paperwork in with and you handed this
20	paperwork in with the application?
21	MR. PRENTISS: No. No, sir. I wrote down
22	everything that was on the paperwork that I got from the
23	county jail. The county jail gave me, you know I
24	forgot the word. How do you say the word? All my, my
25	whole record. I went and got my whole record from

1	there. I had to pay them money. And everything I had
2	on that paperwork, sir, I put on there. All my charges,
3	I put on there. And I don't know.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You're saying you put
5	down the DUI on your application?
6	MR. PRENTISS: I'm sure I did. Because
7	everything, all the paperwork, all my charges, I wrote
8	down on that paper. Because, like I said, I went down
9	to the county jail and I paid to get all my record. I
10	paid to get my record. They're on there.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Prentiss, relax. I
12	want to ask the investigator something.
13	Mr. Maxwell, do we have a list that he wrote
14	out everything that he did, or a printout from the
15	county that he submitted with his application?
16	MR. MAXWELL: Investigator Maxwell. Yes, sir,
17	we have the arrest history form that the gentleman
18	filled out. And I'm just going over it now to make sure
19	I didn't miss anything. So if you could just bear with
20	me a second, sir.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, I recall we denied
22	him because he didn't list his arrest, including his
23	DUI, and we asked him to come back in a year because it
24	was a misdemeanor. So he's waited two years. And,
25	obviously, he's disclosed some things, right, because

1	you got a list there?
2	MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir, he disclosed everything
3	that was on his previous arrest. I'm not seeing the
4	2017 DUI, but I'm just going to double make sure in case
5	I missed it.
6	MR. INGRAM: Mr. Chair, Kevin Ingram, for the
7	record. I'm looking at the application that he
8	completed. He did not list the 2017 DUI. He listed a
9	DUI for 4-4-2007. And that's the only DUI he listed.
10	He did list
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: He listed all the other
12	crimes he committed, right? He had a bunch as a kid.
13	MR. INGRAM: Correct. He listed the 2009, the
14	two in 2009, the DUI in 2007, DMV charge, yeah, 6-25-07,
15	and a possession in 1994. No DUI for 2017 was listed.
16	MR. PRENTISS: Okay. Sir, was it for the
17	county jail or for north town? You know what I mean,
18	because I don't remember. You know, I don't know if it
19	was the north town or Metro. Because, like I said, I
20	went down and got the Metro paperwork. And I filled out
21	all I could do. I think, I even had extra papers, to
22	fill them out, from the lady.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Prentiss?
24	Mr. Prentiss?
25	MR. PRENTISS: Yes, sir.

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1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: We'll sort this out. I
2	recall your case. I even remember about the DUI. So.
3	I got other Board members here. But, I believe, you
4	tried to do the right thing.
5	MR. PRENTISS: Yes, I have. You know, I've
6	been changed. You all told me to stay out of trouble
7	for a year and come back. I stayed out of trouble for
8	almost two and a half years.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I know. You haven't
10	been in trouble since 2017. And I appreciate you coming
11	back. All right?
12	MR. PRENTISS: Yes, sir.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: So hold on a second.
14	Let me. You just need to be quiet for a little bit
15	while we sort this out.
16	MR. PRENTISS: Yes, sir.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Anything you
18	want to add?
19	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Chairman, I have a
20	question for Investigator Maxwell, when he's ready.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah. Mr. Maxwell?
22	MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.
23	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: As I understand this, he
24	has listed all of his offenses on his previous
25	application. But in the meantime, while he was told to

1	wait and not do anything wrong for a year, he got
2	another DUI. And that is what he has failed to
3	disclose. Do I understand that correctly?
4	MR. MAXWELL: That is correct, sir.
5	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. I just
6	wanted to make sure I understood that. So he disclosed
7	everything on his previous application. But this new
8	one, that happened in his waiting period to apply again,
9	he has not disclosed. Thank you.
10	MR. MAXWELL: Yes, sir.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do you understand that,
12	Mr. Prentiss, you did not disclose this last arrest?
13	MR. PRENTISS: I don't, I don't understand.
14	Because I haven't, I haven't pulled a DUI. Okay. In
15	2017. No, no, no, no. I haven't been in no trouble. I
16	was working. I worked at Savers for three, almost three
17	years straight. And I ain't been in trouble.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. What date do
19	you show for the DUI, Mr. Maxwell?
20	MR. MAXWELL: The date on the fingerprint
21	report is August 31st of 2017, sir.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And that is the
23	arrest, not a continuation of the case?
24	MR. MAXWELL: That is the arrest date as shown
25	on the fingerprint report, sir.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Does it show
2	what agency arrested him or where he was booked?
3	MR. MAXWELL: Las Vegas Metro.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. Do
5	you understand that, Mr. Prentiss?
6	MR. PRENTISS: Yeah, I understand, but I don't
7	remember that. Like I say, I've been working for almost
8	three years. And I ain't been in no trouble. I've been
9	working.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is there a disposition
11	on the DUI?
12	MR. MAXWELL: The disposition just states that
13	it was guilty at trial and he was found guilty.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No sentence on it?
15	MR. MAXWELL: Nothing on the fingerprint
16	report, sir. But let me just refer to the court
17	documents.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
19	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, this is
20	Brown. On his work card denial report it shows a
21	disposition of 30 days in jail, suspended, 69 hours of
22	community service.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
24	MR. MAXWELL: That is correct, sir.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Is that on the

spreadsheet, or are you looking on the something else,
Mr. Brown?
BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm looking at the actual
work card denial report by Investigator Maxwell.
BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Gotcha. Okay. Thank
you.
All right. Any other questions from the Board?
All right. I call for a motion.
BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer.
BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown, and I move
to uphold the denial.
BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I have a motion.
Do I have a second?
Mr. Gronauer, are you here?
BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, I'm here. I
can't, I can't second it.
BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Neither can I.
Motion dies. I'll call for another motion.
BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion.
This is Gronauer. I make a motion to grant the denial.
Grant the appeal. I'm sorry.
BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you want to
put a reason on there, for the record?
BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. For the reason
is, you know, I know it just says to disclose this one.

1	But he went through all the lengths of getting all the
2	other reports and putting them all on there. I think,
3	you can tell just how he is, a little bit hyper, at
4	least it seems to me over the phone. I think, he just
5	blew it off by accident. I don't really think it
6	intentional, or else he would have put all the other
7	things on there are, trying to stay out of trouble. I
8	think, he should have remembered about it. But I'm good
9	with it right now since he went through all the extra
10	trouble.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I
12	have a motion. Do I have a second?
13	All right. For the purposes of moving this
14	forward, I will second. Which is unusual, but there's
15	only three of us. Any further discussion?
16	Hearing none, I'll call for a vote. All those
17	in favor of the motion to uphold the appeal, "aye."
18	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If wasn't for the
19	uphold of the appeal. It was to grant the appeal.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: That's what I meant.
21	I'm tired. Thank you. No, you're correct.
22	All those in favor of granting the appeal, say
23	"aye." Aye.
24	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Aye.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Those opposed?

1	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Nay.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Passes two to
3	one. Good luck, Mr. Prentiss. Stay out of trouble.
4	Don't let us down.
5	MR. PRENTISS: Oh, I got it?
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: You got it, sir.
7	MR. PRENTISS: Oh, thank God. Thank you, sir.
8	Thank you.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Stay out of
10	trouble.
11	Number 184, Monica McDaniels, are you here?
12	MS. MCDANIELS: Here.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do you understand
14	you're under oath?
15	MS. MCDANIELS: Yes.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. I'll leave it to
17	the investigator.
18	MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
20	MR. SALADINO: The applicant did disclose the
21	arrests that follow.
22	2005, out of California, possession of
23	concentrated cannabis, at the time was a felony, where
24	they were convicted, received three years of probation.
25	2008, out of the California, possession of

1	cocaine for sale. This was a felony. And they were
2	convicted, receiving five years of probation.
3	2005, out of California, exhibiting deadly
4	weapon not a firearm, misdemeanor. This was a probation
5	violation. The charge for exhibiting deadly weapon was
6	not filed. The applicant's probation was revoked. And
7	there was no further disposition on the fingerprint
8	report.
9	2006, out of California, battery of a
10	spouse/ex-spouse. Again, this was just an arrest, and
11	no charges were filed.
12	2008, battery of a spouse/ex-spouse, out of
13	California, misdemeanor. They, again, looked at this as
14	a probation violation, and they just revoked the
15	probation.
16	2010, trespass, occupied property without
17	consent, loiter, another probation violation, an arrest
18	only. No charges were filed.
19	2011, out of California, grand theft from a
20	person. This was a felony level. Convicted, five more
21	years of probation.
22	2011, out of California, possession of narcotic
23	controlled substance. There was no level given to this
24	one. This was an arrest only and found on the

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1	2014, out of California, possession of a
2	controlled substance without prescription. This was a
3	misdemeanor. And it was found on the fingerprint
4	report.
5	The applicant did disclose her arrests, her
6	arrest history, and disclosed that she had felonies.
7	During this whole process, the applicant was very rude
8	during her application process, cursing at staff and
9	being extremely vulgar. We explained, tried to explain
10	the appeal process and have her have her chance in front
11	of the Board. And, again, as in the report, says very
12	rude to staff.
13	That's it.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Ms. McDaniels,
15	I'll give you a chance to speak.
16	MS. MCDANIELS: I don't know about the rude to
17	staff part. The guy told me I was going to get denied
18	as soon as he seen me. He didn't even know me. He
19	didn't even run my background. He just looked at the
20	paper and said I was going to get denied.
21	Everything else, I put every arrest I ever had.
22	And I never got arrested ever since 2014.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And do you
24	understand you can be denied for arrests? We are not
25	California.

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1	MS. MCDANIELS: Okay. But I disclosed. I
2	didn't know that, see, I didn't know. I just knew that
3	I was supposed to disclose everything. And I put
4	everything that I knew I ever got arrested for on the
5	paper.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And then can you
7	explain why you cursed out our staff?
8	MS. MCDANIELS: I don't remember cursing them
9	out. But I do remember telling him that it's not fair
10	what he's saying to me, because they don't, they never
11	even ran my background yet.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay.
13	MS. MCDANIELS: An Asian guy. It was an Asian
14	guy.
15	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Well, and you're
16	here. So why don't you explain to me why we should give
17	you a chance, with your lengthy arrest history,
18	including arrests within the last 10 years?
19	MS. MCDANIELS: I've been trying to stay out of
20	trouble. I don't live in California no more. I moved
21	to Nevada. And I never got in trouble in Nevada for
22	nothing else ever. I've never been to jail.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. How long
24	have you lived in Nevada?
25	MS. MCDANIELS: For eight years, since 2012.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And what do you
2	do for employment, ma'am, where do you work?
3	MS. MCDANIELS: I work at ABM Janitorial for
4	the Raiders stadium, but we can't do anything right now
5	because they can't have anything.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Gotcha. Okay.
7	Any other questions from the Board, besides me?
8	I'm done.
9	Okay. Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion.
10	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a
11	motion.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Go ahead.
13	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion to
14	deny the appeal. I'll just put to it, the last arrest,
15	again, was in 2014. If was in California but still is
16	for narcotics, and there's been a previous history of
17	narcotics. So at this time, it's a little bit too
18	early.
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Got you.
20	All right. I have a motion. Do I have a
21	second?
22	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Any further
24	discussion?
25	All in favor of the motion, say "aye."

1	(Board members said "aye.")
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carries.
3	Ms. McDaniels, thank you for your time. You can reapply
4	in a year. Let's see what happens as we get more time
5	and distance since your narcotics charges. You have a
6	good day, ma'am.
7	Okay. Number 185, Maria did we do this one,
8	Kevin, or?
9	MR. INGRAM: Yes, sir. We're at the point
10	where we have three items trailed, 174, 175 and 177.
11	And then we go right into Board comment, future agenda
12	items and public comments, sir.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. But we
14	already did Maria Torres Arellano?
15	MR. INGRAM: That is correct.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. I've
17	got 174, 175, 177. All right.
18	Gentlebreeze Ung-Watson, are you here?
19	Mr. Watson?
20	Okay. I'll seek a motion.
21	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I make a
22	motion for denial.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do I have a
24	second?
25	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Any discussion?
2	Hearing none, call for a vote. All those in
3	favor of the motion, state "aye."
4	(Board members said "aye.")
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Demoss, are you
6	here? Artura Demoss, number 175?
7	Okay. Call for a motion.
8	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move
9	that we uphold the denial.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Do I have a
11	second?
12	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. Gronauer. I'm
13	sorry.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. And any further
15	discussion?
16	Hearing none, call for a vote. All in favor of
17	the motion, state "aye."
18	(Board members said "aye.")
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Motion carried.
20	And, I believe, what, 177, Kevin?
21	MR. INGRAM: That's correct.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Sederick
23	Heard, are you here? Mr. Heard?
24	Not hearing, I'll call for a motion.
25	BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a

motion for denial. 1 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. 2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown seconds. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Any further 4 discussion? 5 Hearing none, call for a vote. All those in 6 7 favor of the motion? Aye. BOARD MEMBER BROWN: 8 Aye. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm sure he said "aye." 9 All right. Motion carries. 10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Chairman, before 11 you go any further, can I just ask a question? 12 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yeah, please. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Numbers 172 and 173, I 14 15 had them marked that we trailed them. Did I make a mistake? 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Well, we did trail them, 17 and then we ended up voting to deny them. 18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I didn't cross 19 20 them off. Thank you. 21 BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Kevin, please tell me under 187 you don't have a lot. 22 MR. INGRAM: I don't have a lot. 23 I did want to mention that, again, with the 24 2.5 finalization of the regulation changes that went over to

1	LCB, we will be calling for a special meeting. I'll
2	send out a request for dates available for that to be
3	able to notice of intent to act to adopt those.
4	The other thing, I wanted to take just a
5	minute. I know it's been a long day. I wanted to thank
6	Board staff for doing such a great job. Putting all
7	this stuff together was very difficult. It was
8	basically combining two different Board meetings along
9	with three Board meetings worth of appeals. It was very
10	difficult. It was very labor-intensive. I want to
11	thank the Board for your indulgence and having the time
12	to get through all of this to prevent additional
13	backlog. This was very difficult on everybody and quite
14	agonizing, to be blunt.
15	And I just want to thank everybody involved. I
16	think, everyone did a great job. Thank you.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you.
18	And I can only add kudos to staff as well as
19	the Board.
20	I do have a question. Are we caught up, or do
21	we, if we were to start another one, do we got more
22	appeals?
23	MR. INGRAM: We are all caught up on appeals as
24	of right now. The only appeals that will be heard in
25	December will be the ones post this Board meeting.

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you.
2	All right. If there isn't anything else, I'll
3	call for public comment.
4	MS. JONES: This is Theresa Jones.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Mr. Detmer, do we need
6	to want to read that paragraph or just call for public
7	comment?
8	MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. You
9	can call for public comment.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I just
11	wanted to make sure you're with us. I was testing you.
12	MR. DETMER: Thanks, Chairman.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Yeah. He's
14	playing with his Lego set. Okay.
15	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Chair, it sounded like
16	somebody was trying to say something as you were trying
17	to get counsel.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I will
19	well, I've got the counsel. All is I have to do is call
20	for public comment. We're at the end of the day.
21	Understand we cannot take any action in public comment,
22	but we will listen to you.
23	Is there any public comment?
24	MS. JONES: Yes. This is Theresa Jones. I
25	just want to piggyback on Kevin Ingram. This was

1	brutal. And I applaud everyone, the Board, Executive
2	Director and the investigators, on a well-done job
3	getting through all of the appeals.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Theresa, being one of
5	our fans that's at every one of our meetings, and you
6	sit through these, I appreciate you being here. I
7	appreciate what you do for your association. And thank
8	you for your comments.
9	MS. JONES: Thank you.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. I'll call
11	for a motion for adjournment.
12	MS. DUNN: Wait a minute. Did you hear me,
13	sir?
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: No, I didn't.
15	MR. DUNN: My name is Christopher Dunn. I was
16	number 131.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Yes, Mr. Dunn, I'll let
18	you speak.
19	MR. DUNN: Okay. Thank you. First of all, I
20	would like to thank the Board and the Board staff for a
21	job well done. It's been a long day for you guys. I
22	recognize that.
23	One thing, though, I would like to suggest.
24	And I don't know whether to present it to you as a
25	problem and then not present a solution, because I don't

know the solution. I mean that's not really the right 1 thing to do. But, I guess, what I'll do is present it 2 as a consideration for you quys. And you probably have 3 already thought about it. In conducting these boards in 4 the manner in which you have just done, you allow too 5 many riffraff to have interruption ability in a formal 6 7 proceeding. It also drags on for guite some time and runs late. 8

9 I do not know the solution. And I know you 10 guys are aware of this. You guys put in the long day 11 and the hard times doing this. And I'm not taking 12 anything away from you. You guys did a great job. And 13 I've listened the entire time.

14 Somehow, maybe Nevada has a budget to provide 15 an information technology guru who can somehow fix this 16 for you and prevent the backlog of people sitting and 17 listening to the other cases. Immediately behind mine, 18 somebody complained about the Board's determination for 19 my particular situation, and he was very different than 20 I am.

I don't know. I guess, it's also been long, a long day for me in listening to you guys. I hope I have provided something of value to you in my rambling here. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. Thank you, sir, for your comments. And you understand, we cannot take

1	action. But your comments are in the record.
2	All right. Is there any other public comment?
3	Okay. Hearing none, I will call for a motion
4	to adjourn.
5	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to
6	adjourn the meeting.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Do I have a second?
8	Bobby?
9	Well, I'll second. We may have lost him due to
10	a battery issue.
11	Well, Mr. Detmer, you're going to have to work
12	some more.
13	MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.
14	Chairman, as far as adjournment goes, I often see those
15	as board action. But oftentimes, other boards, I don't
16	even see them on the agenda. So that, and if it's not
17	on the agenda, the Board doesn't have to continue in
18	perpetuity. To develop it for an action item, I mean
19	with those that are present, I'm sure you could take a
20	vote and, with the existing members, have that
21	constitute as an effective motion and action.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: Okay. All right. All
23	those in favor of adjourning, say "aye." Aye.
24	BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Aye.
25	BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: All right. Thank you

for being here. Motion carries. Thank you, Shannon. You did a great job. THE REPORTER: Thank you very much. Everybody be safe out there. BOARD CHAIRMAN FLYNN: I'm signing off. \* \* \* \* \* (The teleconference meeting adjourned/concluded at 5:06 p.m.) -000-
