- So as I stated, my name is Andrew Cowie. I'm the Chief Executive Officer and a licensee authorized to do business within the state of Nevada as a private security service company.
- One of the specific matters, I would like to be succinct and just be brief. I pursued sued my education through the military up to a bachelor's of business and a master's in organizational psychology with an emphasis in training and development. On or about August of 2020, an individual in the state of Nevada, in Las Vegas, was shot and killed by an armed security officer. So I'd to just take one moment. This is a matter of public knowledge. The video of that incident was released approximately a month ago. And this has been an and going issue.

The specific point that I'm making is I asked

myself, at the time of that incident, one second before 1 2 this incident occurred, what was the amount of training that officer had received? So I went to my own personal 3 experience obtaining a work card and then obtaining my 4 armed card as well, which I currently have and are 5 My experience of obtaining a work card was 6 7 walking into the PILB's office on or about approximately 2018, 2019, if I'm not mistaken. Excuse me. I filled 8 out an application on a clipboard. And when I looked at 9 the questions for the exam that I had taken, I really 10 didn't know what the answers were. 11 So wanting to have an idea of what the 12 13 requirement was, being a security, firearms and law enforcement instructor formerly in the state of 14 15 California, I just answered the questions. I quessed. I just went across and just scribbled whatever answer I 16 wanted. I walked up to the window. The customer 17 service representative behind the window corrected my 18 answers, had me sign something, and said, "Okay. You'll 19 20 get your provisional in two to three days." 21 As I walked out the door, I immediately recognized that the barista that serves us our coffee 22 has a higher degree of training than the majority of 23 work card holders in the state of Nevada. 24 Work card holders are entrusted with observing 25

and reporting, but predominantly observing and reporting 1 2 life-threatening emergencies, such as fire, earthquakes, floods, or disorder. And in the political climate, that 3 we're faced now with a defund the police movement, amongst other circumstances, we have seen an 5 unprecedented amount of riots and civil unrest. 6 7 during such times, businesses turn to the private security sector to obtain comfort knowing that their 8 lifelong investments are protected. Because it's too 9 expensive to afford a police officer to be standing in 10 front of their doors when their obligations are required 11 to the greater public. 12 13 So having said all of the above, an individual lost their life. And according to my observation and 14 assertion at this juncture, that officer had only 15 completed approximately 13 hours of training. Eight 16 hours perhaps were supposed to have been completed, 17 according to the NRS requirement for an individual to be 18 licensed as an armed work card holder. They received 19 20 the classroom portion and a single qualification. Being a licensee holder, I have hired 21 approximately 70 to 75 individuals over the past several 22 months and approximately 35 of which are currently 23

employed by myself at this juncture. During the time

that I have been in operation here in the state of

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Nevada, I have had several circumstances and incidents, 1 such as individuals smoking marijuana on property on the 2 clock while at work. And when approached, the question 3 is, "Hi, what are you doing?" "Well, you never told me I couldn't do that." 5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Excuse me, sir. 6 7 MR. ANDREW COWIE: Yes? BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Excuse me, sir. 8 This is Board Chair Nixon. Unfortunately, you have five 9 minutes, and you've already hit that time limit. 10 give you another minute or two to get to the point. 11 know, unfortunately, you have a time limit. 12 13 MR. ANDREW COWIE: No, thank you very much for 14 bringing that to my attention. I appreciate it. Let me conclude. I am respectfully requesting that it be 15 placed on the next meeting agenda for the Board to have 16 the ability to make action, regardless of what that 17 action may be, but to render action regarding 18 investigating what it would take to require and 19 20 institute a minimum training standard requirement for 2.1 all work card holder applicants. And to the new Board member, thank you for your 22 service with the Federal Bureau of Investigation. 23 myself, as a Marine, once a Marine always a Marine. 24 Wе 2.5 would never send agents or troops without training. You

go just don't do it. Otherwise, in those worlds, we 1 2 lose lives. And this is one example of that situation. So I'm respectfully requesting of the Board 3 that it be placed on the next meeting agenda 4 specifically to minimum training standard requirement 5 for initial work card holder applicants. 6 7 And that concludes my request. Thank you for your time, and I appreciate your guys's service on the 8 Board. 9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir, for your 10 11 comment. Is there anyone else in the south that would 12 1.3 wish to make comment? Hearing no additional public comment, we'll 14 15 move to the next agenda item. Director Ingram, could we please move -- well, 16 actually, let me first ask, are there any changes to the 17 agenda today? 18 MR. INGRAM: Yes, there are a couple of 19 20 changes. If you look at item number 53, Mr. Magsayo has 21 requested that his appeal be moved to the September Board meeting. And item number -- let's see. I quess, 22 that's the only one that's requested to be moved. 23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good. And, Director 24 2.5 Ingram, can we please move to the announcements, reports

and any updates? 1 2 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. So as we get started, I'd like to just cover a couple of housekeeping terms 3 now that we're going to get into actual testimony. 4 So anybody that's on the phone right now, if 5 you could please make sure that your phones are muted at 6 all times, so we don't have background noise, we would 7 greatly appreciate that. 8 When you're called upon to speak, we would ask 9 that, if you're using a cell phone, do not use the 10 speaker function, as we get delays with that. 11 We would ask that you speak very slowly and 12 13 clearly. We do have a court reporter that is transcribing the meeting. We just want to make sure we 14 15 have the most accurate record as possible. When you first speak, the first time, please 16 announce your full name and spell your last name. And 17 then when responding to follow-ups, just state your 18 name for the record again. 19 20 The public will be given opportunities to 21 comment throughout. And with that said, I have provided the Board 22 with the financial report and would be happy to answer 23 any questions the Board may have on the finances. 24 25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any

questions concerning the financial report given by 1 Executive Director Ingram? 2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member 3 Gronauer. How many outstanding fines still have to be 4 collected? 5 MR. INGRAM: Correct. We still have some 6 outstanding fines. 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What's the length of 8 time on there? 9 MR. INGRAM: Actually, when we get to the 10 statistical report, Lori's going to go into it. 11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okav. 12 13 MR. INGRAM: If we can table that to the statistics. 14 15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Absolutely. Anything you desire. 16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So. 17 MR. INGRAM: Any other questions on the 18 finances? 19 20 Okay. Hearing none. 21 A real brief overview of what's going on in the office right now. As everybody has been aware, Senate 22 Bill 35 was a bill sponsored by the Office of the 23 Attorney General, and that is the bill to remove the 24 Private Investigators Licensing Board out from under the 2.5

umbrella of the Attorney General, where our funding has

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just been sitting since early 2000. And it's a good 2 move. We're the only board and commission in the State 3 that was set up in the State general fund. It's been 4 difficult for the Attorney General's Office and myself 5 to be able to close out their budget and my budget. 6 7 So SB 35 was approved. It was signed into law by the Governor. And as of no later than October 1st, 8 we will be completely removed from the State general 9 fund, which leads me to kind of an overview of what I 10 have going on to make that happen. I'm working with the 11 Treasurer's Office, the Office of the Controller, and 12 13 the Governor's Finance, along with interviewing potential accounting and payroll companies to take over 14 the accounting and payroll duties that the State 15 provides us. I've applied for and received our federal 16 tax employee identification number for us to work 17 independently. And I'm working closely with the Public 18 Employers Retirement system and the Public Employee 19 20 Benefits Program system to make sure that myself and 21 staff continue to get the State benefits we always have. 22 We're still considered State employees. That doesn't change anything. It's just a matter of functionality. 23 We'll no longer be using the State financial systems. 24 2.5 We'll no longer be using the Treasurer's or Controller's

Office. 1 Potential completion, I've got it estimated at 2 August 1, which is a little difficult based on some 3 things that have popped up. I now have to, since the 4 Attorney General's Office won't be doing the contract or 5 for accounting and payroll, I have to hurry and go 6 7 through a training class to become a certified contract manager, and it's on the 15th and 16th of this month. 8 Once that's done, then I can go into contract with 9 companies and we can start moving forward. I'm already 10 working with Wells Fargo. We're ready to roll out a new 11 bank account. And then, at that time, once we get the 12 13 accounting company on board, they'll be involved with the bank, as will our database provider. 14 15 So, again, an estimated completion date of August 1st, but we have up until October 1 to actually 16 consolidate the change. 17 Right now, we're in the FY 21 budget closure 18 process. Come June 30th, our fiscal year will end. 19 20 We're sitting really well. Our reserves have not had to 21 be touched over the last three years. So our reserves 22 are building to the required amount by statute. currently running a balance of approximately 23 \$1.2 million throughout the year, which is the six-month 24

requirement. So the Legislature was really happy to

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hear that. 1 2 And, obviously, we're going to incur some additional expenses by moving out from under the 3 Attorney General's Office. But by removing from the 4 State, we'll also have some savings. I don't see that 5 will really severely impact our banking anyway. 6 7 If the Board has any questions, I'd be happy to answer any questions on that. 8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I thought you were 9 going to keep going on. This is Gronauer. Who are you 10 looking into about taking over the payroll and stuff? 11 MR. INGRAM: There's three companies that I'm 12 13 currently speaking with. One of the companies currently has six other boards and commissions. The other company 14 has three. And the additional company doesn't have any 15 State contracts at this time. 16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Maybe I 17 misheard, then. I thought you said something about 18 working with the county and the State, or something like 19 20 that, with your payroll stuff. 21 MR. INGRAM: We're removing, we're being removed, and so we have to hire. 22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So you're talking about 23 24 private companies? 2.5 MR. INGRAM: These are private companies.

Yeah, I have something 1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: 2 like five of them. I know. Because some of them are very good, and some of them are very reasonable price, 3 so. MR. INGRAM: Yes. Since we're in negotiation, 5 I can't go into details. 6 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay. (The Reporter indicated an inability to hear.) 8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Shannon, the question I 9 asked was Wells Fargo Bank is normally used by 10 committees. 11 MR. INGRAM: And the answer is yes. The State 12 13 contracts with Wells Fargo. Wells Fargo will get pretty good discounts. And they're willing to do a joiner with 14 me, since we've been utilizing them, which means we 15 won't have any increase in fees. We will most likely be 16 using QuickBooks. Most, all of the three providers that 17 are frontrunners use QuickBooks. Which means we will 18 have to purchase some QuickBooks checks from the bank, 19 20 so there was an expense there. And then all of our 21 current invoices will be paid by check, and so that'll probably transfer. Wells Fargo's going to see if they 22 can get something set up like that with me. None of the 23 other boards or commissions uses it. It's not going to 24 2.5 be an expense, or a very minimal expense. I think, it

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makes since to go that route. But we'll have to see.

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to go ahead and give the statistical report? 1 MS. IRIZARRY: Hello, good morning. Chief of 2 Operations Lori Irizarry. Can you hear me okay, 3 Shannon? 4 THE REPORTER: Yes, I can. Thank you. I can 5 hear you very well actually. 6 7 MS. IRIZARRY: Perfect. Okay. I am pulling the statistics on -- they're posted right now on our 8 website. If you go to meetings, and today's meeting, 9 June 9th, the attachment, it says June 2021 statistics. 10 That's what I'm reading off of. 11 Okay. On page one, these are just the stats 12 13 from March of '21 to June of '21, so the second quarter. The licensing applications that were received, the ones 14 that were -- they've all been before the Board, except 15 there are two private patrol licensees that had, that 16 are being postponed because their applications were 17 incomplete. One private investigator, postponed the 18 application also because it was incomplete. And one 19 20 withdrew it on their own because they did not meet 2.1 minimum qualifications. For canines, one, we needed to complete the 22 So most likely they will be at the next Board 23 meeting in September. And then one canine licensee 24 2.5 withdrew. They just decided not to proceed with the

1 application.

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Otherwise, all people will be heard today before the Board.

Work card applications. In the second quarter of 2021, we processed 2,404 work cards. From that number, there are 226 still pending. Pending, either they're not made provisional or active or denied or withdrawn, they're in pending status. From that 226 that are pending, 109 of them are pending because the individual applicant is still missing information, so fingerprints, photo ID or additional information.

The investigators right now are approximately seven business days out on running backgrounds. That's not including the individuals that are expediting. So it's about a week out. If you applied today, you'd be a week out till you have someone review your application.

There are 477 that are in provisional status, so that temporary provisional status. And right now, the criminal repository is taking approximately four to five weeks to deliver the results. Where last time, when we spoke in March of 2021, the results were taking a little over, close to three months. So that has significantly changed. We believe that to be because lots of people are back in the office in the Department of Public Safety, so we're getting the results much

Another way to put that is, compared to the 1 quicker. first quarter, we had only 282 in the whole quarter of 2 the first quarter of 2021 that remained active. 3 in this quarter, it's now a little over 1,500. And 4 then, at that time, we had a lot of people in that 5 temporary status, about 1,200, and now we have close to 6 about 500 in provisional status. So those numbers have 7 significantly flipped, where when we get the results, 8 we're able to turn their backgrounds around much 9 quicker. 10 On page two, this is, I took the whole page, 11 and I tried to break it down to be as detailed as 12 13 possible. These are the complaints and/or investigations we received in the office. Again, it's 14 15 work card holders. We also get complaints regarding staff or licensees or unlicensed activity. 16 As you see here, the main complaints that came 17 in were in four categories this past quarter: work card 18 holders, process server, private investigator, or 19 20 private patrolman officer. The way it broke down is the 21 majority of the complaints and/or investigations were completed on the private patrolman category, which would 22 be 18, followed by four PI's, one process server and 23 four on work card holders. I broke it down to just what 24 were the complaints and/or investigations started or 2.5

regarding.

That's going to be the colored section.

They were professionalism, unlicensed activity, people 2 working without work cards. 3 At the bottom here, because that's a 4 discretionary, kind of I'm telling you what I believe 5 they are, should be broken down into, I kind of gave you 6 7 a little insight of what professionalism means essentially. It could be a complaint about 8 discrimination, a violent behavior while on duty, vulgar 9 language, unprofessional conduct that was reported to us 10 by law enforcement. Unlicensed activity, 11 self-explanatory, anyone performing work here in the 12 13 state of Nevada is required to be licensed by our chapter or registered. Services not rendered, someone 14 15 making a complaint regarding breach of contract or services not rendered. The felony/pending convictions, 16 that is either going to be a, for the most part, a work 17 card holder who someone is saying should not have a work 18 card currently because they have criminal activity or 19 20 pending felony charges or they have a felony on their 21 record. Or it's going to be regarding a company who they believe is doing criminal activity. 22 unregistered employees, someone working without a work 23 24 card.

So you can see the breakdown there. Out of the

27 total complaints and/or investigations, 12 of them

1

are still pending. The majority of that is that I 2 noticed in the last four weeks we received seven 3 complaints. So that went up to 12. So that's why 4 they're still pending, outgoing, they're still under 5 investigation. Five have been closed with no action. 6 7 There has been one cease and desist issued, three other actions. Two audits are in the -- we're in the middle 8 of doing two audits or have been completed. 9 Three citations or violations have been issued. And one we 10 refer to as a civil matter. 11 On the last page there, notice of violations, 12 1.3 these are actual violations that we had issued to a licensee or work card holder from March to June 2021. 14 There have been a total of 11 violations issued to 10 15 licensees, I should say 10 licensees and/or work card 16 holders. One company received two violations. That's 17 why it's 11 violations but 10 licensees or work card 18 holders. For a total of \$4,225. Of that, \$1,000 of it 19 20 is still outstanding, either because they have -they're within that 30-day period when they can still 21 appeal the decision and/or it was just recently they're 22 requesting an appeal. Therefore, \$1,000 is still 23 outstanding. This last quarter, there was one audit 24 that has been fully completed. It came out to a 2.5

violation of \$14,650, which has been paid in full. 1 The unlicensed activity citations this past 2 quarter, there were seven citations issued. Six of them 3 were for first-time offenders, which is a \$2,500 amount 4 for first-time offenders. And one was for a second-time 5 offender, which is a \$5,000 citation. Four of them are 6 7 still pending, and three have been paid. The pending is either going to be because they are still in that 30 8 days where they can appeal the decision, or they have 9 decided to the appeal the decision and that may be 10 possibly heard before the Board in the future. 11 That's all I got. Questions? 12 13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This is Board Member Nixon. 14 On the work card applications, do you see that --(The Reporter indicated an inability to hear.) 15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, no problem. So I was 16 asking Lori if during the summer she sees an uptick in 17 the application process just because of, you know, I 18 think, EDC is coming up, there's a lot of stuff that's 19 20 opening up now and a lot of need for applications or for 2.1 work cards. MS. IRIZARRY: So, yes. Chief of Operations 22 Chief Irizarry. That is something I closely follow. 23 When EDC was expected to go on, we had a lot of buzz, 24 and we were getting applications. And then it was all 2.5

the way up until the 11th hour, and they stopped it. 1 So we did get a little bit of applications anticipating 2 that it was going to start in May. Right now, with the 3 majority of our applicants that are coming in, we're 4 noticing, are going to be for Allegiant Stadium. And 5 people gearing up for the festivals are expected to come 6 7 at the end of this summer. We are hearing from many, I think, I am hearing 8 from many licensees that they are looking for 9 individuals to start coming back to work. 10 hopefully, that would bring the people that have been 11 waiting to go back to work. But I don't see a decrease 12 13 in the numbers. We're always around 250 to 300, either up every quarter or down. It's usually right within 14 But next month and the month after that, we 15 that range. have quite a few licensees who are scheduling with us, 16 saying they're going to drop off big packets in large 17 amounts, hoping for the Life is Beautiful, iHeartRadio, 18 EDC and all that, Allegiant Stadium, all that stuff 19 20 opening up. So I anticipate my September numbers being 2.1 pretty high. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Have we heard any updates 22 I thought I heard October. 23 on EDC? MS. IRIZARRY: Yeah, so it should be the two 24 2.5 weekends before Halloween. This Thursday is the day

they go on sale again for tickets. So what from I 1 understood, when they cancelled it in May, they were 2 told to cancel in May, but we're doing it in October. 3 So we'll see it in October. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any other 5 questions from the Board concerning the updates? 6 7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. don't know if it's really the updates. I just believe, 8 I just have a question for the Executive Director. Our 9 investigators do a heck of a job. They have a lot of 10 work. With the new change and everything, and I don't 11 know about the old way, but I'm talking about the new 12 13 way, are we going to be able to maybe hire one or two more investigators to lighten this burden a little bit? 14 15 And it may be that we need of our investigations done. I mean, just asking. 16 MR. INGRAM: Right now, as far as what we got 17 on the reviews, that's pretty standard. As far as the 18 investigations, you know, we have weekly huddles with 19 20 them, discuss what's going on. None of them appear to 2.1 be overburdened at this time. However, we do have an opportunity to hire one additional investigator if the 22 need arises. I do have one vacancy that we're sitting 23 on right now with our new restructure. And with 24 Stephanie being promoted from her front position in the 2.5

front office, she's our new Investigative Assistant is 1 what we're calling her, and she's starting to take some 2 of the follow-up burden off of the investigators. 3 seems to be working fairly well. It's in its infancy. 4 And we're already seeing it relieving one of them. 5 we want to continue that approach first. Should the 6 7 need arise, so, yes, we have money in the budget, and we do have a vacancy that we could fill. 8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: My concern was, come 9 October, between now and October, we have so many new 10 things coming on line, especially in the south. And 11 with that, there's going to be an uptick. There's just 12 13 no way around it. And, you know, the investigators we have, I mean they need to have time off. There's a 14 possibility they get sick. There's a possibility they 15 need to go on vacation. And all you have to do is look 16 at them. And then the idea is, I'm just looking at it 17 for just the whole unit running smoothly. You know, 18 they're important cogs in the wheel. But they're also 19 20 human beings that have families and everything else. 21 Things can happen. I was just looking at that safety valve at the end. 22 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. That's all taken into 23 Their leaves are never denied unless there's 24 2.5 two people asking for the same time. So as far as the

management of the staff coverage, I think, we're good. 1 In the past, what we've done is maybe hired a couple of 2 temps to help manually enter applications during the 3 That's generally the approach we take, instead influx. 4 of hiring an actual investigator, because it's more busy 5 work. However, we're seeing a lot more people applying 6 7 on line. So I'm constantly evaluating, making sure that 8 we are not overburdening. Right now, there's no 9 overtime. Very, very little flex time, and that's only 10 if they're requesting, hey, I've got a case, I need to 11 work a couple extra hours, can I do that? So they're 12 13 keeping up with the volume. But I'm constantly reviewing that, absolutely. And if a change needed to 14 15 be made, I would definitely. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, you've taken care 16 of my concerns. I just wanted to put it out there for 17 future reference, also, you know, where we were now, 18 what steps we're taking forward. Thank you. 19 20 MR. INGRAM: I appreciate it. Thank you, sir. 21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, staff, thank you very much for the updates and the great work that you've 22 done. I actually really enjoyed the agenda and the 23 setup now. It's very clear and, I think, absolutely 24 2.5 helpful. So thank you for all that hard work.

Are there any other questions or concerns about 1 2 the updates or reports? 3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Great job. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Then, we'll move to 4 the next agenda item, which is number four. Agenda 5 item number four is to review and approve the 6 7 transcripts from the March 2nd meeting and the March 3rd meeting as well as the March 29th meeting. Should I 8 break those out? 9 MR. So I was just really in and 12 1.3 out all of the month of June. As soon as I rectified that situation, I finished the application, made the 14 15 payments and got my work card. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then I see back 16 in November 9th of 2020, the Kroll company was issued a 17 cease and desist because they had been operating more 18 than 120 days without a QA. 19 20 MR. HILL: Yeah, and my understanding with that 21 is that so Kroll got acquired by a company called Duff & 22 Phelps. Duff & Phelps actually had a person in Reno that held the, I guess, the license. He guit without 23 telling anybody. But, I guess, during the merger of 24 Kroll and Duff & Phelps, there was a lot of 2.5

miscommunication between the companies. And I was not 1 able to complete my application in time for the Board 2 last year due to issues with getting Qsex from FBI 3 employees. I had one fill it out, it was incorrect, 4 another. Because there's a board member that's former 5 FBI, he remembers there was an assistant director that 6 7 was fired for talking to the press like one day before he was allowed to retire. So the FBI went into a --8 we -- nothing like this can be done without going 9 through headquarters. So I could not find anybody that 10 was willing to go on record with the Qsex. And then I 11 had an issue with -- I used to be a full-time instructor 12 13 for College of Southern Nevada. And I could not, because of due to COVID, and so I could not get the 14 15 letter that states that there was no, no issues with me working and teaching at the same time. So I was not 16 able to finish my application. So they issued the cease 17 and desist. Duff & Phelps reached out, they reinstated 18 I got my application in. I was able to find a 19 20 former supervisor who filled out the forms correctly. 21 And that's where I am today. So I think, a lot of those issues was just the merger between the two 22 companies Duff & Phelps and Kroll. Kroll didn't 23 understand they had this obligation until they were 24 informed by Duff & Phelps. 2.5

I tried to 3 work with the investigator to see how, what else I 4 needed to get this, to get this cleared out. I mean I'm 5 not having -- I've never been being dishonest about 6 7 anything. I've been honest from the beginning. been willing to help out and find as much information as 8 I can. And that's where I'm at right now. 9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, Investigator 10 Saladino, I remember and in the notes that there was a 11 request for paperwork from the Internal Affairs. Did we 12 1.3 ever receive that information? MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. Yes, I 14 did receive information from the captain of Internal 15 Affairs. Everything that the applicant stated about the 16 incident with the off-duty firearm, the nonstopping of 17 pursuit when told to stop the pursuit, and then the 18 incident with the costume where the lady had his badge, 19 20 those were all the things that lead up to the department 2.1 allowing him to resign in lieu of termination. The captain stated that, yes, he did resign in 22 lieu of termination. He is not rehireable with the 23 California Highway Patrol. He couldn't speak on behalf 24 2.5 of any other law enforcement agency. He said, with

California Highway Patrol, he would be not rehireable. 1 And after the separation, there was no pending charges 2 that followed him after he resigned from California 3 Highway Patrol. 4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, sir, it seems that in 5 your statement here, you had stated that you were 6 7 rehireable and had no restrictions for a law enforcement position. What's the discrepancy there? 8 MR. AGUILAR: Well, maybe it was a 9 misunderstanding with the Highway Patrol, but I have 10 even applied with -- my first year in Las Vegas, I even 11 tried to apply with -- not Las Vegas Metro. I didn't go 12 1.3 through with it. I just decided that part of my life 14 was over, and I let it alone. But I am, as far as I 15 know, I am absolutely rehireable with any department. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So back to my question, 16 while I understand you've changed your mind on Metro, 17 there seems to be a discrepancy of whether or not you're 18 rehireable. The state says no. And for some reason, 19 20 you think you are. 21 MR. AGUILAR: Not with the CHP, no. If I said that --22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. 23 MR. AGUILAR: -- I'm sorry if that came out 24 2.5 wrong.

This has raised two considerations, one, the time, expense and costs of issuing the subpoenas, either through direct Board action, as well as a consideration to potential bias created upon the factual statements that arise or are given in the request for a subpoena.

And in having and in making this consideration, what we're trying to avoid is making a rule of general applicability. This isn't a request, the intent is not to request the Board to just carte blanche give the --whether it be the Executive Director or the Chairperson, power to issue subpoenas by delegation now. It's to make future regulation change. And that would incur or create a rule of general applicability. Rules of general applicability always have to be by regulation or statute.

So summing all of this up, this is for the Board to decide or discuss the efficiency of the statute and whether there's interest in changing the regulation or creating regulation that would vest the Chairperson the power for the issuance of subpoenas duces tecum.

I will add that, typically speaking, the boards that I have worked with, the chairperson has always had

subpoena duces tecum power. This is the only board that 1 I am aware of, off the top of my head, that I can think 2 of right now, where it requires direct Board action. 3 So this is for the Board's discussion. 4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I'll open this up to 5 discussion, based off of the description for -- of NRS 6 648.160. MR. DETMER: And, again, Mike Detmer, for the 8 I forgot to add that I'm happy to answer any 9 record. questions that the Board may have. 10 MR. INGRAM: And, for the record, Kevin Ingram. 11 This is in follow-up to past discussions of Board 12 13 delegating subpoena rights to the Executive Director.
