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BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning, everyone, and welcome to the June 9th Private Investigators Licensing Board meeting, quarterly meeting. I'd like to now call the meeting to order.

Director Ingram, would you please take roll call.

MR. INGRAM: Yes, ma'am. We'll start with you, Chair Nixon?

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Here.

MR. INGRAM: Board Member Bezick?

BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Present.

MR. INGRAM: Board Member Brown?

BOARD CHAIR BROWN: Present.

MR. INGRAM: Board Member Cortez?

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Present.

MR. INGRAM: Board Member Gronauer?

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Here.

MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, I would like to put on the record that Mr. Timothy Bezick is our brand-new Board member, who is present. He has recently been appointed by the Governor and will start serving his three-year term.

So, Mr. Bezick, would you like to take just a

1 minute and give us a brief overview of who you are and
2 what you've done.

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: My name is Timothy
4 Bezick. I was in the FBI as a special agent for
5 approximately 30 years, retired in 2004. Then I went to
6 work for a defense contractor in the Washington, D.C.,
7 area. I retired from that in, I think, around 2016 and
8 moved to the lovely state of Nevada, which I had worked
9 previously. And I'm glad to be here.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, welcome aboard,
11 Mr. Bezick. We're happy to have you on the team.

12 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Thank you very much.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

14 Okay. So now we move to public comment.

15 Members of the general public have the opportunity to
16 speak on items appearing or not appearing on the agenda.
17 The Board may discuss the matters not appearing on the
18 agenda but may not take action at this time. This
19 session will happen both now in the beginning of the
20 meeting and then at the end of the meeting before we
21 close.

7 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you, Shannon.

8 THE REPORTER: When you were still signing
9 everybody on. So thank you for asking.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. Sorry about
11 that.

12 So if you would, is there any public in the
13 north, any public comment in the north?

14 Hearing no public comment, is there any public
15 comment in the south?

16 MR. ANDREW COWIE: Yes, there is.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. Could you
18 please state your name.

19 MR. ANDREW COWIE: Good morning. My name is
20 Andrew Cowie. I am the Chief Executive Officer for
21 Counterforce LLC, license holder number 2972.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. What would
23 you like to discuss this morning?

24 MR. ANDREW COWIE: Yes. Good morning, board of
25 directors. I'm a little bit impromptu, so I apologize.

1 I'm not as prepared as I was anticipating. However, I'm
2 currently traveling through Arkansas on my way back to
3 Las Vegas, having picked up two beautiful patrol cars
4 that will be integrated into our fleet here shortly. So
5 yay for us.

6 New board of director, the gentleman who just
7 got onto the Board, congratulations on your appointment
8 to the Board. We look forward to working with you as
9 time moves forward.

10 So as I stated, my name is Andrew Cowie. I'm
11 the Chief Executive Officer and a licensee authorized to
12 do business within the state of Nevada as a private
13 security service company.

14 One of the specific matters, I would like to be
15 succinct and just be brief. I pursued my education
16 through the military up to a bachelor's of business and
17 a master's in organizational psychology with an emphasis
18 in training and development. On or about August of
19 2020, an individual in the state of Nevada, in
20 Las Vegas, was shot and killed by an armed security
21 officer. So I'd to just take one moment. This is a
22 matter of public knowledge. The video of that incident
23 was released approximately a month ago. And this has
24 been an and going issue.

25 The specific point that I'm making is I asked

1 myself, at the time of that incident, one second before
2 this incident occurred, what was the amount of training
3 that officer had received? So I went to my own personal
4 experience obtaining a work card and then obtaining my
5 armed card as well, which I currently have and are
6 active. My experience of obtaining a work card was
7 walking into the PILB's office on or about approximately
8 2018, 2019, if I'm not mistaken. Excuse me. I filled
9 out an application on a clipboard. And when I looked at
10 the questions for the exam that I had taken, I really
11 didn't know what the answers were.

12 So wanting to have an idea of what the
13 requirement was, being a security, firearms and law
14 enforcement instructor formerly in the state of
15 California, I just answered the questions. I guessed.
16 I just went across and just scribbled whatever answer I
17 wanted. I walked up to the window. The customer
18 service representative behind the window corrected my
19 answers, had me sign something, and said, "Okay. You'll
20 get your provisional in two to three days."

21 As I walked out the door, I immediately
22 recognized that the barista that serves us our coffee
23 has a higher degree of training than the majority of
24 work card holders in the state of Nevada.

25 Work card holders are entrusted with observing

1 and reporting, but predominantly observing and reporting
2 life-threatening emergencies, such as fire, earthquakes,
3 floods, or disorder. And in the political climate, that
4 we're faced now with a defund the police movement,
5 amongst other circumstances, we have seen an
6 unprecedented amount of riots and civil unrest. And
7 during such times, businesses turn to the private
8 security sector to obtain comfort knowing that their
9 lifelong investments are protected. Because it's too
10 expensive to afford a police officer to be standing in
11 front of their doors when their obligations are required
12 to the greater public.

13 So having said all of the above, an individual
14 lost their life. And according to my observation and
15 assertion at this juncture, that officer had only
16 completed approximately 13 hours of training. Eight
17 hours perhaps were supposed to have been completed,
18 according to the NRS requirement for an individual to be
19 licensed as an armed work card holder. They received
20 the classroom portion and a single qualification.

21 Being a licensee holder, I have hired
22 approximately 70 to 75 individuals over the past several
23 months and approximately 35 of which are currently
24 employed by myself at this juncture. During the time
25 that I have been in operation here in the state of

1 Nevada, I have had several circumstances and incidents,
2 such as individuals smoking marijuana on property on the
3 clock while at work. And when approached, the question
4 is, "Hi, what are you doing?" "Well, you never told me
5 I couldn't do that."

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Excuse me, sir.

7 MR. ANDREW COWIE: Yes?

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Excuse me, sir. This is
9 Board Chair Nixon. Unfortunately, you have five
10 minutes, and you've already hit that time limit. We'll
11 give you another minute or two to get to the point. You
12 know, unfortunately, you have a time limit.

13 MR. ANDREW COWIE: No, thank you very much for
14 bringing that to my attention. I appreciate it. Let me
15 conclude. I am respectfully requesting that it be
16 placed on the next meeting agenda for the Board to have
17 the ability to make action, regardless of what that
18 action may be, but to render action regarding
19 investigating what it would take to require and
20 institute a minimum training standard requirement for
21 all work card holder applicants.

22 And to the new Board member, thank you for your
23 service with the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I
24 myself, as a Marine, once a Marine always a Marine. We
25 would never send agents or troops without training. You

1 go just don't do it. Otherwise, in those worlds, we
2 lose lives. And this is one example of that situation.

3 So I'm respectfully requesting of the Board
4 that it be placed on the next meeting agenda
5 specifically to minimum training standard requirement
6 for initial work card holder applicants.

7 And that concludes my request. Thank you for
8 your time, and I appreciate your guys's service on the
9 Board.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir, for your
11 comment.

12 Is there anyone else in the south that would
13 wish to make comment?

14 Hearing no additional public comment, we'll
15 move to the next agenda item.

16 Director Ingram, could we please move -- well,
17 actually, let me first ask, are there any changes to the
18 agenda today?

19 MR. INGRAM: Yes, there are a couple of
20 changes. If you look at item number 53, Mr. Magsayo has
21 requested that his appeal be moved to the September
22 Board meeting. And item number -- let's see. I guess,
23 that's the only one that's requested to be moved.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good. And, Director
25 Ingram, can we please move to the announcements, reports

1 and any updates?

2 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. So as we get started,
3 I'd like to just cover a couple of housekeeping terms
4 now that we're going to get into actual testimony.

5 So anybody that's on the phone right now, if
6 you could please make sure that your phones are muted at
7 all times, so we don't have background noise, we would
8 greatly appreciate that.

9 When you're called upon to speak, we would ask
10 that, if you're using a cell phone, do not use the
11 speaker function, as we get delays with that.

12 We would ask that you speak very slowly and
13 clearly. We do have a court reporter that is
14 transcribing the meeting. We just want to make sure we
15 have the most accurate record as possible.

16 When you first speak, the first time, please
17 announce your full name and spell your last name. And
18 then when responding to follow-ups, just state your
19 name for the record again.

20 The public will be given opportunities to
21 comment throughout.

22 And with that said, I have provided the Board
23 with the financial report and would be happy to answer
24 any questions the Board may have on the finances.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any

1 questions concerning the financial report given by
2 Executive Director Ingram?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member
4 Gronauer. How many outstanding fines still have to be
5 collected?

6 MR. INGRAM: Correct. We still have some
7 outstanding fines.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What's the length of
9 time on there?

10 MR. INGRAM: Actually, when we get to the
11 statistical report, Lori's going to go into it.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

13 MR. INGRAM: If we can table that to the
14 statistics.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Absolutely. Anything
16 you desire.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So.

18 MR. INGRAM: Any other questions on the
19 finances?

20 Okay. Hearing none.

21 A real brief overview of what's going on in the
22 office right now. As everybody has been aware, Senate
23 Bill 35 was a bill sponsored by the Office of the
24 Attorney General, and that is the bill to remove the
25 Private Investigators Licensing Board out from under the

1 umbrella of the Attorney General, where our funding has
2 just been sitting since early 2000. And it's a good
3 move. We're the only board and commission in the State
4 that was set up in the State general fund. It's been
5 difficult for the Attorney General's Office and myself
6 to be able to close out their budget and my budget.

7 So SB 35 was approved. It was signed into law
8 by the Governor. And as of no later than October 1st,
9 we will be completely removed from the State general
10 fund, which leads me to kind of an overview of what I
11 have going on to make that happen. I'm working with the
12 Treasurer's Office, the Office of the Controller, and
13 the Governor's Finance, along with interviewing
14 potential accounting and payroll companies to take over
15 the accounting and payroll duties that the State
16 provides us. I've applied for and received our federal
17 tax employee identification number for us to work
18 independently. And I'm working closely with the Public
19 Employers Retirement system and the Public Employee
20 Benefits Program system to make sure that myself and
21 staff continue to get the State benefits we always have.
22 We're still considered State employees. That doesn't
23 change anything. It's just a matter of functionality.
24 We'll no longer be using the State financial systems.
25 We'll no longer be using the Treasurer's or Controller's

1 Office.

2 Potential completion, I've got it estimated at
3 August 1, which is a little difficult based on some
4 things that have popped up. I now have to, since the
5 Attorney General's Office won't be doing the contract or
6 for accounting and payroll, I have to hurry and go
7 through a training class to become a certified contract
8 manager, and it's on the 15th and 16th of this month.
9 Once that's done, then I can go into contract with
10 companies and we can start moving forward. I'm already
11 working with Wells Fargo. We're ready to roll out a new
12 bank account. And then, at that time, once we get the
13 accounting company on board, they'll be involved with
14 the bank, as will our database provider.

15 So, again, an estimated completion date of
16 August 1st, but we have up until October 1 to actually
17 consolidate the change.

18 Right now, we're in the FY 21 budget closure
19 process. Come June 30th, our fiscal year will end.
20 We're sitting really well. Our reserves have not had to
21 be touched over the last three years. So our reserves
22 are building to the required amount by statute. We're
23 currently running a balance of approximately
24 \$1.2 million throughout the year, which is the six-month
25 requirement. So the Legislature was really happy to

1 hear that.

2 And, obviously, we're going to incur some
3 additional expenses by moving out from under the
4 Attorney General's Office. But by removing from the
5 State, we'll also have some savings. I don't see that
6 will really severely impact our banking anyway.

7 If the Board has any questions, I'd be happy to
8 answer any questions on that.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I thought you were
10 going to keep going on. This is Gronauer. Who are you
11 looking into about taking over the payroll and stuff?

12 MR. INGRAM: There's three companies that I'm
13 currently speaking with. One of the companies currently
14 has six other boards and commissions. The other company
15 has three. And the additional company doesn't have any
16 State contracts at this time.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Maybe I
18 misheard, then. I thought you said something about
19 working with the county and the State, or something like
20 that, with your payroll stuff.

21 MR. INGRAM: We're removing, we're being
22 removed, and so we have to hire.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So you're talking about
24 private companies?

25 MR. INGRAM: These are private companies.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I have something
2 like five of them. I know. Because some of them are
3 very good, and some of them are very reasonable price,
4 so.

5 MR. INGRAM: Yes. Since we're in negotiation,
6 I can't go into details.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay.

8 (The Reporter indicated an inability to hear.)

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Shannon, the question I
10 asked was Wells Fargo Bank is normally used by
11 committees.

12 MR. INGRAM: And the answer is yes. The State
13 contracts with Wells Fargo. Wells Fargo will get pretty
14 good discounts. And they're willing to do a joiner with
15 me, since we've been utilizing them, which means we
16 won't have any increase in fees. We will most likely be
17 using QuickBooks. Most, all of the three providers that
18 are frontrunners use QuickBooks. Which means we will
19 have to purchase some QuickBooks checks from the bank,
20 so there was an expense there. And then all of our
21 current invoices will be paid by check, and so that'll
22 probably transfer. Wells Fargo's going to see if they
23 can get something set up like that with me. None of the
24 other boards or commissions uses it. It's not going to
25 be an expense, or a very minimal expense. I think, it

1 makes since to go that route. But we'll have to see.

2 In the meantime, I'm going to set up a
3 two-signature checks and balances for all checks that
4 are written, just so we have more than just one person.
5 And cash, of course, the accounting firm has a checks
6 and balance there, too, because they're the one that
7 authorizes the transfers. They follow all the state and
8 federal guidelines. And I don't see that there'll be
9 any issue there, other than maybe a little bit more of a
10 delay in payment.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer again.
12 Is Wells Fargo -- I'm just trying to stay with this. Is
13 Wells Fargo going to do QuickBooks, is that what you're
14 saying?

15 MR. INGRAM: No, no, no. The accounting
16 company will be the individuals that work with, use
17 QuickBooks. QuickBooks integrates very well with this
18 Wells Fargo.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I use that. I'm just
20 saying, but we want to make sure, if it's online, also,
21 if you will be the user, or you can at least look into
22 it.

23 MR. INGRAM: Oh, absolutely.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You know, we'll be able
25 to look into it.

1 MR. INGRAM: You'll be able to see what it is.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. The people on
3 signing?

4 MR. INGRAM: I'm sorry?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The signers?

6 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So you have
8 access to it, you have to watch it, also?

9 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Trust but verify.

11 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. And everything is
12 real-time with the two frontrunners. Everything is
13 available real-time online from anyone, as long as we
14 have the VPNs and the ability.

15 So everything is going to be available to the
16 two signers online in real-time. We'll be able to
17 remote in from anywhere as long as we have our VPNs and
18 be able to see payroll, be able to see withholdings, be
19 able to see leave usages, be able to see the balance of
20 every line item in the budget, you know, real-time. So
21 if there's ever anything in question, either myself or
22 the second signer will be able to rectify it
23 immediately.

24 Any other questions?

25 Okay. That's all I have. Lori, did you want

1 to go ahead and give the statistical report?

2 MS. IRIZARRY: Hello, good morning. Chief of
3 Operations Lori Irizarry. Can you hear me okay,
4 Shannon?

5 THE REPORTER: Yes, I can. Thank you. I can
6 hear you very well actually.

7 MS. IRIZARRY: Perfect. Okay. I am pulling
8 the statistics on -- they're posted right now on our
9 website. If you go to meetings, and today's meeting,
10 June 9th, the attachment, it says June 2021 statistics.
11 That's what I'm reading off of.

12 Okay. On page one, these are just the stats
13 from March of '21 to June of '21, so the second quarter.
14 The licensing applications that were received, the ones
15 that were -- they've all been before the Board, except
16 there are two private patrol licensees that had, that
17 are being postponed because their applications were
18 incomplete. One private investigator, postponed the
19 application also because it was incomplete. And one
20 withdrew it on their own because they did not meet
21 minimum qualifications.

22 For canines, one, we needed to complete the
23 exam. So most likely they will be at the next Board
24 meeting in September. And then one canine licensee
25 withdrew. They just decided not to proceed with the

1 application.

2 Otherwise, all people will be heard today
3 before the Board.

4 Work card applications. In the second quarter
5 of 2021, we processed 2,404 work cards. From that
6 number, there are 226 still pending. Pending, either
7 they're not made provisional or active or denied or
8 withdrawn, they're in pending status. From that 226
9 that are pending, 109 of them are pending because the
10 individual applicant is still missing information, so
11 fingerprints, photo ID or additional information.

12 The investigators right now are approximately
13 seven business days out on running backgrounds. That's
14 not including the individuals that are expediting. So
15 it's about a week out. If you applied today, you'd be a
16 week out till you have someone review your application.

17 There are 477 that are in provisional status,
18 so that temporary provisional status. And right now,
19 the criminal repository is taking approximately four to
20 five weeks to deliver the results. Where last time,
21 when we spoke in March of 2021, the results were taking
22 a little over, close to three months. So that has
23 significantly changed. We believe that to be because
24 lots of people are back in the office in the Department
25 of Public Safety, so we're getting the results much

1 quicker. Another way to put that is, compared to the
2 first quarter, we had only 282 in the whole quarter of
3 the first quarter of 2021 that remained active. Where
4 in this quarter, it's now a little over 1,500. And
5 then, at that time, we had a lot of people in that
6 temporary status, about 1,200, and now we have close to
7 about 500 in provisional status. So those numbers have
8 significantly flipped, where when we get the results,
9 we're able to turn their backgrounds around much
10 quicker.

11 On page two, this is, I took the whole page,
12 and I tried to break it down to be as detailed as
13 possible. These are the complaints and/or
14 investigations we received in the office. Again, it's
15 work card holders. We also get complaints regarding
16 staff or licensees or unlicensed activity.

17 As you see here, the main complaints that came
18 in were in four categories this past quarter: work card
19 holders, process server, private investigator, or
20 private patrolman officer. The way it broke down is the
21 majority of the complaints and/or investigations were
22 completed on the private patrolman category, which would
23 be 18, followed by four PI's, one process server and
24 four on work card holders. I broke it down to just what
25 were the complaints and/or investigations started or

1 regarding. That's going to be the colored section.
2 They were professionalism, unlicensed activity, people
3 working without work cards.

4 At the bottom here, because that's a
5 discretionary, kind of I'm telling you what I believe
6 they are, should be broken down into, I kind of gave you
7 a little insight of what professionalism means
8 essentially. It could be a complaint about
9 discrimination, a violent behavior while on duty, vulgar
10 language, unprofessional conduct that was reported to us
11 by law enforcement. Unlicensed activity,
12 self-explanatory, anyone performing work here in the
13 state of Nevada is required to be licensed by our
14 chapter or registered. Services not rendered, someone
15 making a complaint regarding breach of contract or
16 services not rendered. The felony/pending convictions,
17 that is either going to be a, for the most part, a work
18 card holder who someone is saying should not have a work
19 card currently because they have criminal activity or
20 pending felony charges or they have a felony on their
21 record. Or it's going to be regarding a company who
22 they believe is doing criminal activity. The
23 unregistered employees, someone working without a work
24 card.

25 So you can see the breakdown there. Out of the

1 27 total complaints and/or investigations, 12 of them
2 are still pending. The majority of that is that I
3 noticed in the last four weeks we received seven
4 complaints. So that went up to 12. So that's why
5 they're still pending, outgoing, they're still under
6 investigation. Five have been closed with no action.
7 There has been one cease and desist issued, three other
8 actions. Two audits are in the -- we're in the middle
9 of doing two audits or have been completed. Three
10 citations or violations have been issued. And one we
11 refer to as a civil matter.

12 On the last page there, notice of violations,
13 these are actual violations that we had issued to a
14 licensee or work card holder from March to June 2021.
15 There have been a total of 11 violations issued to 10
16 licensees, I should say 10 licensees and/or work card
17 holders. One company received two violations. That's
18 why it's 11 violations but 10 licensees or work card
19 holders. For a total of \$4,225. Of that, \$1,000 of it
20 is still outstanding, either because they have --
21 they're within that 30-day period when they can still
22 appeal the decision and/or it was just recently they're
23 requesting an appeal. Therefore, \$1,000 is still
24 outstanding. This last quarter, there was one audit
25 that has been fully completed. It came out to a

1 violation of \$14,650, which has been paid in full.

2 The unlicensed activity citations this past
3 quarter, there were seven citations issued. Six of them
4 were for first-time offenders, which is a \$2,500 amount
5 for first-time offenders. And one was for a second-time
6 offender, which is a \$5,000 citation. Four of them are
7 still pending, and three have been paid. The pending is
8 either going to be because they are still in that 30
9 days where they can appeal the decision, or they have
10 decided to the appeal the decision and that may be
11 possibly heard before the Board in the future.

12 That's all I got. Questions?

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This is Board Member Nixon.
14 On the work card applications, do you see that --

15 (The Reporter indicated an inability to hear.)

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, no problem. So I was
17 asking Lori if during the summer she sees an uptick in
18 the application process just because of, you know, I
19 think, EDC is coming up, there's a lot of stuff that's
20 opening up now and a lot of need for applications or for
21 work cards.

22 MS. IRIZARRY: So, yes. Chief of Operations
23 Chief Irizarry. That is something I closely follow.
24 When EDC was expected to go on, we had a lot of buzz,
25 and we were getting applications. And then it was all

1 the way up until the 11th hour, and they stopped it. So
2 we did get a little bit of applications anticipating
3 that it was going to start in May. Right now, with the
4 majority of our applicants that are coming in, we're
5 noticing, are going to be for Allegiant Stadium. And
6 people gearing up for the festivals are expected to come
7 at the end of this summer.

8 We are hearing from many, I think, I am hearing
9 from many licensees that they are looking for
10 individuals to start coming back to work. So,
11 hopefully, that would bring the people that have been
12 waiting to go back to work. But I don't see a decrease
13 in the numbers. We're always around 250 to 300, either
14 up every quarter or down. It's usually right within
15 that range. But next month and the month after that, we
16 have quite a few licensees who are scheduling with us,
17 saying they're going to drop off big packets in large
18 amounts, hoping for the Life is Beautiful, iHeartRadio,
19 EDC and all that, Allegiant Stadium, all that stuff
20 opening up. So I anticipate my September numbers being
21 pretty high.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Have we heard any updates
23 on EDC? I thought I heard October.

24 MS. IRIZARRY: Yeah, so it should be the two
25 weekends before Halloween. This Thursday is the day

1 they go on sale again for tickets. So what from I
2 understood, when they cancelled it in May, they were
3 told to cancel in May, but we're doing it in October.
4 So we'll see it in October.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any other
6 questions from the Board concerning the updates?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I
8 don't know if it's really the updates. I just believe,
9 I just have a question for the Executive Director. Our
10 investigators do a heck of a job. They have a lot of
11 work. With the new change and everything, and I don't
12 know about the old way, but I'm talking about the new
13 way, are we going to be able to maybe hire one or two
14 more investigators to lighten this burden a little bit?
15 And it may be that we need of our investigations done.
16 I mean, just asking.

17 MR. INGRAM: Right now, as far as what we got
18 on the reviews, that's pretty standard. As far as the
19 investigations, you know, we have weekly huddles with
20 them, discuss what's going on. None of them appear to
21 be overburdened at this time. However, we do have an
22 opportunity to hire one additional investigator if the
23 need arises. I do have one vacancy that we're sitting
24 on right now with our new restructure. And with
25 Stephanie being promoted from her front position in the

1 front office, she's our new Investigative Assistant is
2 what we're calling her, and she's starting to take some
3 of the follow-up burden off of the investigators. That
4 seems to be working fairly well. It's in its infancy.
5 And we're already seeing it relieving one of them. So
6 we want to continue that approach first. Should the
7 need arise, so, yes, we have money in the budget, and we
8 do have a vacancy that we could fill.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: My concern was, come
10 October, between now and October, we have so many new
11 things coming on line, especially in the south. And
12 with that, there's going to be an uptick. There's just
13 no way around it. And, you know, the investigators we
14 have, I mean they need to have time off. There's a
15 possibility they get sick. There's a possibility they
16 need to go on vacation. And all you have to do is look
17 at them. And then the idea is, I'm just looking at it
18 for just the whole unit running smoothly. You know,
19 they're important cogs in the wheel. But they're also
20 human beings that have families and everything else.
21 Things can happen. I was just looking at that safety
22 valve at the end.

23 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. That's all taken into
24 account. Their leaves are never denied unless there's
25 two people asking for the same time. So as far as the

1 management of the staff coverage, I think, we're good.
2 In the past, what we've done is maybe hired a couple of
3 temps to help manually enter applications during the
4 influx. That's generally the approach we take, instead
5 of hiring an actual investigator, because it's more busy
6 work. However, we're seeing a lot more people applying
7 on line.

8 So I'm constantly evaluating, making sure that
9 we are not overburdening. Right now, there's no
10 overtime. Very, very little flex time, and that's only
11 if they're requesting, hey, I've got a case, I need to
12 work a couple extra hours, can I do that? So they're
13 keeping up with the volume. But I'm constantly
14 reviewing that, absolutely. And if a change needed to
15 be made, I would definitely.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, you've taken care
17 of my concerns. I just wanted to put it out there for
18 future reference, also, you know, where we were now,
19 what steps we're taking forward. Thank you.

20 MR. INGRAM: I appreciate it. Thank you, sir.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, staff, thank you very
22 much for the updates and the great work that you've
23 done. I actually really enjoyed the agenda and the
24 setup now. It's very clear and, I think, absolutely
25 helpful. So thank you for all that hard work.

1 Are there any other questions or concerns about
2 the updates or reports?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Great job.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Then, we'll move to
5 the next agenda item, which is number four. Agenda
6 item number four is to review and approve the
7 transcripts from the March 2nd meeting and the March 3rd
8 meeting as well as the March 29th meeting. Should I
9 break those out?

10 MR. DETMER: I think, please do March 2nd and
11 3rd and then the 29th.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So let's go first
13 for review and questions on the March 2nd and 3rd
14 transcripts. Were there any questions or concerns about
15 those?

16 Okay. If there's no questions or concerns,
17 I'll move -- I'm looking for a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I make a
19 motion to approve the minutes for March 2nd and 3rd.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
21 Cortez. I second the motion. Did you say March 29th as
22 well?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No. No.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We're going to do it
25 separately.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Oh, I'm sorry. Separate.
2 Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion and a
4 second. All in favor of approving the transcripts for
5 March 2nd and 3rd, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. We'll move
8 to -- the motion passes. So then we'll move to the
9 March 29th transcript. Were there any questions or
10 concerns about that meeting and those transcripts?
11 Okay.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
13 Cortez. I motion to approve minutes for the March 29th
14 Board meeting.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
16 a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I second.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
19 second. All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The motion passes.

22 So the next agenda item is to swear in all
23 applicants for the next section of the agenda.

24 MR. INGRAM: So this will be a swearing in of
25 anyone that is going to be testifying under the request

1 for licensure, change of status, corporate officers. So
2 anybody that will be testifying on item numbers 25 and
3 beyond that, if you could go ahead and raise your right
4 hand.

5 And, Counsel Detmer, would you like to swear
6 them in for us.

7 MR. DETMER: It would be my pleasure. For the
8 record, Mike Detmer.

9 Those of who you are about to testify, if you
10 could please raise your right hand. Do you hereby swear
11 or affirm to tell the truth, the whole truth, and
12 nothing but the truth?

13 (All applicants and witnesses present were
14 sworn/affirmed.)

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I would ask anybody
16 that's about to testify, again, to Executive Director
17 Ingram's first request, please state your name, spell
18 out your last name, and then please acknowledge that you
19 understand you're under oath. And that would help us
20 greatly.

21 So the next agenda item is to consider a block
22 vote. Oh, I'm sorry. I'm sorry. Let's go back.
23 Director Ingram, if you could do a roll call of the
24 attendees for the agenda.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

1 So I will do a roll. If you'll just let me
2 know that you're present, and please acknowledge that
3 you're under oath.

4 Mr. Brett Rosen? Brett Rosen?

5 Okay. Christine Martin?

6 MS. MARTIN: Acknowledged, under oath. Hi,
7 Kevin.

8 MR. INGRAM: Hi. Thank you.

9 Kirsten Judd?

10 MS. JUDD: Yes. Hello.

11 MR. INGRAM: Hi, Kirsten.

12 MS. JUDD: Hi there.

13 MR. INGRAM: Do you acknowledge that you're
14 under oath?

15 MS. JUDD: Yes.

16 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

17 Christopher Lange?

18 MR. LANGE: It's Christopher Lange present, and
19 I acknowledge I am under oath.

20 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

21 Jeffrey Cooley?

22 MR. COOLEY: This is Jeffrey Cooley. I'm
23 present. I acknowledge I'm under oath.

24 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

25 Savannah Miele?

1 MS. MIELE: This is Savannah Miele. I'm
2 present, and I acknowledge I'm under oath.

3 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

4 Michael Hill?

5 MR. HILL: This is Michael Hill. I am present,
6 and I acknowledge I'm under oath.

7 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

8 Christopher Matteson? Christopher Matteson?

9 Patrick Puzzuoli? Patrick Puzzuoli?

10 Jason Morris?

11 MR. MORRIS: This is Jason Morris. I'm
12 present, and I acknowledge that I'm under oath.

13 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

14 David Dickerson?

15 MR. DICKERSON: This is David Dickerson. I am
16 present, and I acknowledge I am under oath.

17 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

18 Timothy Dowd?

19 MR. DOWD: Yes, this is Timothy Dowd. I am
20 present, and I acknowledge that I am under oath.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

22 Brian Erbis?

23 MR. ERBIS: Good morning. This is Brian Erbis,
24 and I acknowledge that I'm under oath.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

1 Perry Bonarrigo?

2 MR. BONARRIGO: Perry Bonarrigo. I'm present,
3 and I acknowledge I am under oath.

4 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

5 Patrick Kakos?

6 MR. KAKOS: This is Patrick Kakos. I'm
7 present, and I acknowledge I'm under oath.

8 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

9 Carl Toth ("Tauth")?

10 MR. TOTH: This is Carl Toth (Tohth"), and I'm
11 present and acknowledge I'm under oath.

12 MR. INGRAM: Thank you. Apologize for the
13 mispronunciation.

14 Anthony Aguilar?

15 MR. AGUILAR: Anthony Aguilar, present. I
16 acknowledge I'm under oath.

17 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

18 Scott Allen?

19 MR. ALLEN: Scotty Allen is present, and I
20 acknowledge I'm under oath.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

22 Timothy Stutzman?

23 MR. STUTZMAN: This is Timothy Stutzman. I'm
24 present, and I acknowledge I'm under oath.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

1 Donald Redlin?

2 MR. REDLIN: Donald Redlin. I'm present, and I
3 affirm I'm under oath.

4 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

5 Charles Terry Brown?

6 MR BROWN: This is Charles Terry Brown, and I
7 acknowledge that I am under oath and I'm present.

8 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

9 Robert Noriego? Roberto Noriego? I apologize.

10 MR. NORIEGA: That's all right. This is Robert
11 Noriega. I'm present, and I acknowledge I'm under oath.

12 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

13 Jason Berckart?

14 MR. BERCKART: This is Jason Berckart. I am
15 present and acknowledge I'm under oath.

16 MR. INGRAM: Okay. We'll go back. Brett
17 Rosen?

18 MR. ROSEN: Yes, this is Brett Rosen. I'm
19 present, and I acknowledge I'm under oath. I apologize,
20 my car.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

22 Christopher Matteson?

23 Patrick Puzzuoli?

24 Okay. Are there any members of the public
25 currently on the call? If there are public members just

1 calling in to listen in, if you could state your name
2 for the record, please.

3 MS. BERMAN: Gabbey Berman from Protective
4 Force International.

5 MR. INGRAM: Thank you. Any other members of
6 the public?

7 MR. HALL: Jeffrey Hall from Bestmark
8 Operations.

9 MR. INGRAM: I'm sorry, sir. I talked over
10 you.

11 MR. HALL: Jeffrey Hall from Bestmark
12 Operations Company.

13 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Jeffrey.
14 Any other members of the public?

15 MS. MOORE: Anna Moore, CoventBridge Group.

16 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

17 Any other members of the public?

18 MR. FLORENCE: Douglas Florence, QA at
19 Bestmark.

20 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Douglas.

21 Anyone else?

22 Hearing none, it looks like we can move
23 forward.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we're now looking at the
2 potential block vote. You know, we have noted in our
3 agenda some suggestions, 7 through 24. I'll entertain a
4 motion, or if there is any folks that we want to pull
5 out.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I just have a question.
7 This is Gronauer.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sure.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: For the Executive
10 Director, please. The people you named that didn't
11 affirm that they're here or under oath, do we put them,
12 still put them into whatever we want to vote on?

13 MR. INGRAM: The individuals that I just called
14 roll call for --

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah.

16 MR. INGRAM: -- are not considered in the block
17 vote.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right. Okay. They're
19 the ones that --

20 MR. INGRAM: After 24.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: After 24. All right.
22 It's no problem. I just want to the make sure it's
23 right.

24 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And it's good

1 now. I have one after that.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good. Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So are there any
5 questions or concerns about the potential block vote,
6 items, agenda items 7 through 24?

7 I hear no concerns. I'll entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
9 Cortez. I motion to approve consent items for potential
10 block vote 7 through 16. Oh, I'm sorry. Through 24, I
11 believe.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion.
13 Do we have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Brown.
16 Okay. Brown. Sorry, Mr. Brown. I overspoke.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
18 Brown. Second.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you want to be the
20 second?

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Board Member Brown, did
22 you want to second?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: That's correct. I second
24 the motion.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

1 So we have a motion, and we have a second. All
2 in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. The motion
5 passes.

6 MR. INGRAM: So anyone that is on the call for
7 items number 7 through 24, your request has been
8 approved. You'll be contacted by the Board in the next
9 couple of days. And you no longer need to stay on the
10 call unless you wish to hear the rest of the meeting.
11 Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The next agenda item
13 is review the corporate officers.

14 Agenda item number 25. Mr. Rosen, are you on
15 the line?

16 MR. ROSEN: I am.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you. So
18 please go ahead and tell us a little bit about yourself
19 and what your intention is with the change.

20 MR. ROSEN: Sure. My name is Brett Rosen. I
21 work for Securitas Security Services USA. I've been
22 with the organization, along with its predecessor
23 companies, in excess of 21 years. I started my career
24 through corporate accounting in their corporate services
25 function, worked for 14 years in our field operations as

1 a field controller, and the last five years back in our
2 corporate facility as the divisional controller over
3 North America.

4 I am applying because our current vice
5 president of finance and treasurer, I will be assuming
6 his roll since he is heading towards his retirement. So
7 hence the request here today.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

9 MR. ROSEN: Sure.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
11 questions for Mr. Rosen?

12 Okay. I have a question. Investigator Jones?

13 MR. JONES: Yes.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I'd just like to verify
15 that his fingerprints, that he had a positive for a DUI
16 in 2006. Was that in his actual application?

17 MR. JONES: I believe so. Checking right now.
18 Yes. Yes, it was.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

20 Are there any other questions?

21 Okay. If there's no -- I hear no other
22 questions. I'll entertain a motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
24 Brown. I move that we grant corporate officer status to
25 Mr. Rosen.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
2 a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
4 Cortez. I'll second the motion.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
6 second. All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations. Oh, the
9 motion passes. Congratulations, Mr. Rosen. Please get
10 with the PILB Board for any further questions and your
11 information.

12 MR. ROSEN: Great. Thank you very much. I
13 appreciate it. Thank you all.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Have a great
15 day.

16 MR. ROSEN: All right. You do the same. Take
17 care.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda item number 26,
19 Green Valley Security. Is Christine Martin on?

20 MS. MARTIN: Yes, ma'am, I'm right here. Thank
21 you.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning.

23 MS. MARTIN: Good morning. How are you guys?

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We're good, thank you.

25 MS. MARTIN: Good. Long morning for you.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Lots of coffee.

2 MS. MARTIN: Yeah.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Please tell us a little bit
4 about yourself and what the intention is with the
5 change.

6 MS. MARTIN: Well, I have been in the security
7 field since the late '80s. My ex-husband and I began a
8 security firm in California, then moved to Las Vegas,
9 Nevada in the early '90s, and we started Green Valley
10 Security. Around 2007, 2008, I purchased Green Valley
11 Security as a hundred percent shareholder.

12 And around 2010, I believe, that is when the
13 corporate status changed and I became a corporate
14 officer. I did send Shelly the paperwork. So I was
15 kind of confused on that. But, I guess, that's neither
16 here nor there. It had my maiden name on there, and
17 that may have been the confusion. And we did change,
18 once I got married in 2012, to my married name. So I'm
19 not quite sure. But I have been running Green Valley
20 Security, basically, since the '90s, we have been in
21 business here in Las Vegas.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so are there any
23 questions from the Board?

24 Okay. I'm sorry. For myself, the question
25 that I had was the actual date on the application, there

1 wasn't anything for Green Valley Security as a
2 shareholder. But it sounds like that paperwork was
3 turned in to affirm that. Investigator Swarthout?

4 MR. SWARTHOUT: She had a work card with us
5 since before. Investigator Swarthout. And on her
6 application, the work card goes back, and SCOPE shows
7 when Metro, LVMPD, handled her work card. From her work
8 card application, it looks like she's been part of the
9 company since 1999.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay. That was my
11 only question.

12 MS. MARTIN: And I'm really tired.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I definitely understand.

14 MS. MARTIN: And we've seen it, we've seen it
15 all.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Definitely understand.
17 Are there any other questions from the Board?
18 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a
19 motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
21 Cortez. I motion to approve Ms. Christine M. Martin for
22 corporate officer status of Green Valley Security with
23 license number 1592.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we
25 have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll
2 second.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

4 I have a motion. I have a second. All in
5 favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 (Dog barking.)

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The dog's on, also.

9 MR. INGRAM: I think, the dog approved it, too.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The dog approved.

11 MS. MARTIN: That was mine.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. So, but I couldn't
13 hear. Brown and -- they did?

14 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Brown, did you also affirm
15 with an aye?

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
17 Brown. Aye.

18 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Aye.

19 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. The motion
21 passes. Congratulations, Ms. Martin. Hopefully, this
22 will get you some rest.

23 MS. MARTIN: Thank you so much. Take care, all
24 of you.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thanks, Christine.

1 MS. MARTIN: Thank you. Bye, Kevin.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We'll go into agenda
3 item number 27, private investigator.

4 Kirsten Judd. Are you on the line, ma'am?

5 MS. JUDD: I am. I am. Good morning.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. So please
7 tell us a little bit about yourself and what your
8 intentions are with this license.

9 MS. JUDD: Sure. Thank you for considering my
10 application to the Board.

11 So I have been an investigator out of Oregon
12 for -- it will be four years this coming October. And I
13 had a background, went to college for criminal justice,
14 and really enjoyed that field, and ended up after that
15 being a stay-at-home mom for many, many years. So that
16 kind of took me out of the work force. I did real
17 estate part-time during those years. And about almost
18 four years ago, I decided, you know, I really miss
19 criminal justice, so I'd to like, you know, a PI.

20 And so I started my own business and learned
21 from the ground up, you know, and with other people that
22 I knew that were in the field in Oregon helping me along
23 the way. It's been very successful and interesting and
24 the last, you know, almost four years now. And I
25 decided to make the move to Nevada in 2019, thinking of

1 change. Unfortunately, my husband had passed away in
2 2017. And so I decided it would be healthy for me just
3 to make a change in a new location. So I came to
4 Nevada. And since then, I've been balancing going back
5 and forth, running the business in Oregon and oversight
6 of two other investigators out of Oregon.

7 And so now I'm making the jump here in Nevada.
8 I really love it here. It's been wonderful. And I'm
9 hoping to ultimately open a business here in the state
10 of Nevada.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Great. Thank you for that
12 update.

13 MS. JUDD: You're welcome.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Board, are there any
15 questions?

16 Okay. So I have a couple of questions,
17 questions, Ms. Judd. In your background, there was some
18 information concerning a charge, none of which were a
19 part of your application. Could you elaborate and then
20 really let us know why these charges weren't listed in
21 your --

22 MS. JUDD: They were listed.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: They were listed. I'm
24 sorry. They weren't on your fingerprints. Sorry about
25 that. Never mind.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Are you referring to the
2 disclosure?

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. This is Board
5 Member Cortez, if I may, Chair Nixon.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Absolutely.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I believe, Board Member
8 Nixon is referring to an incident that was
9 self-disclosed. Back in 2013, there were some false
10 swearing charges or incidents.

11 MS. JUDD: Yes.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I'll let you go ahead and
13 give us a little background on that situation.

14 MS. JUDD: Sure, I'd be more than happy to.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

16 MS. JUDD: Right around that time, I was
17 involved in a pretty contentious custody dispute with my
18 ex-husband, Mr. Southard. And prior to that, I had
19 remarried Mr. Larkin. And I didn't turn in the
20 paperwork because I didn't want to legalize the
21 marriage. I had second thoughts about the marriage.
22 And I had told Mr. Southard that as we continued our
23 relationship after that point. And I didn't know that
24 if you didn't turn a license in -- I assumed that it
25 meant you weren't legally married. But I was wrong.

1 Apparently, it does mean, even if you don't turn a
2 license in, that since you signed that form, you are in
3 a legal marriage. So Mr. Southard went, as part of our
4 custody case, and he had filed these complaints against
5 me, I mean to gain kind of an upper hand in the custody
6 battle. Now, this is, you know, seven years ago. And
7 since then, everything has been smoothed out, and the
8 children are now grown, that were subject of these
9 custody issues.

10 But so that was kind of the motive in doing
11 that. And I didn't, like I said, I didn't know. And
12 that ended up, that charge for falsifying ended up being
13 dropped by the State of Oregon.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you, Mrs. Judd,
15 Ms. Judd. I do believe that suffices the question. And
16 I do want to say that I appreciate the self-disclosure.
17 It does make a difference in an impact of my
18 decision-making. So I do appreciate it.

19 MS. JUDD: Sure. You're welcome.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
21 questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member
23 Gronauer. Good morning to you, Ms. Judd.

24 MS. JUDD: Good morning.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What kind of work were

1 you doing in 2013, when all this stuff was happening?

2 MS. JUDD: I had had a real estate license, and
3 I had on and off done that, but really not much. At
4 that point, I had my daughter. My last daughter was
5 born in April of 2012, Velvet. And I was primarily a
6 stay-at-home mother at that time.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. You weren't
8 working on your Oregon PI work or anything?

9 MS. JUDD: No. I wasn't licensed in Oregon
10 until after that point.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That takes care
12 of that. Thank you.

13 MS. JUDD: You're welcome.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
15 questions from the Board?

16 Hearing no other questions, I'll take a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
18 Cortez. I motion to approve Kirsten Judd as a private
19 investigator, as an individual private investigator
20 license, subject to all statutory and regulatory
21 requirements.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we
23 have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll
25 second.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

2 I have a motion. We have a second. All in
3 favor, say "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

6 Congratulations, Ms. Judd. If you have any further
7 questions -- the motion passes. If you have any further
8 questions, please contact the PILB Board.

9 MS. JUDD: Thank you so much to the Board.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Have a great
11 day.

12 MS. JUDD: You, too.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda item number
14 27. Christopher Lange, are you available?

15 MR. LANGE: Good morning. This is Christopher
16 Lange, L-A-N-G-E.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Please
18 tell us a little bit about yourself and what your
19 intentions are with the license.

20 MR. LANGE: I'm born and raised in New Jersey.
21 I have a degree in criminal justice at a college in
22 New Jersey. I was hired by the Metropolitan Police
23 Department in 2002. I just retired this past spring.
24 While I was employed by LVMPD, I was a sexual assault
25 detective for seven years. Over that course of the

1 time, I acquired a lot of contacts with some defense
2 attorneys who were constantly telling me about the need
3 for investigators and consultants. And this seems like
4 a good time for me to. And I've been offered additional
5 employment or just consulting work with attorneys. So
6 that was my intention in getting, becoming a private
7 investigator.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir, for your
9 service.

10 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Lange?
11 Hearing no questions.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, I have one.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Sorry.

15 Mr. Lange, is it "Lang" or Laynghe"?

16 MR. LANGE: "Lang." The E is silent.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

18 Okay. Why did you leave the Metropolitan Police
19 Department besides just plain retirement, were you asked
20 to retire, or did you just retire?

21 MR. LANGE: I developed a heart condition. And
22 I had bought some years as well. So I took a medical
23 retirement.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. From the
25 investigator's note, there's that you've been accused of

1 an act of constituting untruthfulness or lack of
2 integrity in March 2016.

3 MR. LANGE: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And Internal Affairs,
5 and they determined that the applicant had not been, had
6 not been untruthful with the information provided; is
7 that correct?

8 MR. LANGE: That's correct, sir.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Very good. In
10 that time, Internal Affairs was a lot tougher than they
11 were in the past. So I have to believe that that was a
12 good investigation. Thank you.

13 MR. LANGE: Yes, sir. Just a real quick thing
14 is I just, I trusted a partner. He gave me incorrect
15 information. The person that made the complaint against
16 me never called me or checked my notes, and then they
17 found out later through my notes, through the computer
18 automated dispatch, and they had the other detective's
19 signature in the case that mishandled the evidence. And
20 from what I understand, he was investigated later. But,
21 yeah, the untruthfulness was dropped against me.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Very good.
23 Thank you. I'm a retired sergeant from Metro. And I
24 retired, I think, before you came on. So we never did
25 any work together, have we?

1 MR. LANGE: Yes, sir, you actually came to my
2 academy and taught the constable classes.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That's -- but we
4 had no -- yeah, I was an instructor at that time. But
5 we had no other contact, you weren't under my command or
6 anything else, correct?

7 MR. LANGE: Never under your command, sir. I
8 just heard a lot about you.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. We'll stop that
10 right there.

11 (Laughter.)

12 MR. LANGE: My mouth is getting a little dry
13 speaking to you.

14 (Laughter.)

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: We'll stop that right
16 there. Thank you. Okay. Thank you.

17 MR. LANGE: Thank you, sir.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any other questions from
19 the Board?

20 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
21 motion.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
23 Cortez. I motion to approve Mr. Lange for a private
24 investigator license, subject to all statutory and
25 regulatory requirements.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we
2 have a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll
4 second the motion.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

6 We have a motion. We have a second. All in
7 favor, say "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The motion passes.
10 Congratulations, Mr. Lange. If you have any questions,
11 please contact the PILB Board.

12 MR. LANGE: Thank you very much. I appreciate
13 all of your time.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

15 MR. LANGE: Have a wonderful day. Bye-bye.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Madam Chair?

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
19 Brown. Before we take the next agenda item, I need to
20 disclose that Mr. Cooley and I have been involved in
21 trainings together and casual contact in the office when
22 I worked for the State of Nevada, but I don't think it
23 will affect my ability to vote on the matter.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir, for
25 that information. I appreciate that.

1 Mr. Cooley, are you on the line?

2 MR. COOLEY: Yes, I am. Jeff Cooley,
3 C-O-O-L-E-Y.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

5 Mr. Cooley, tell us little bit about yourself and what
6 your intentions are with the private investigator's
7 license.

8 MR. COOLEY: I've lived in Nevada since 1976.
9 I started with the Churchill County Sheriff's Office in
10 '97. And I just recently retired there in March. I've
11 been married to my wife for 22 years. And prior to
12 retirement, I had a couple of defense attorneys that
13 came to me and expressed the need for a PI here in town,
14 because the closest is 60 miles away in Reno. So after
15 doing almost 16 years of investigations, I thought I
16 would give it a try and help them out.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.
18 Board, are there any questions?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. On
20 the application, was that, the arrest for '95 and a
21 minor, was that on his application? Oh, he disclosed
22 it. Never mind. Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm good.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, on your application, I

1 also see you have a letter of reprimand.

2 MR. COOLEY: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Could you please give us
4 the details on that.

5 MR. COOLEY: We had a sheriff that was leaving
6 the Sheriff's Office, and he was going, running for
7 Justice of the Peace. He was wanting one of his friends
8 to run for Sheriff. So prior to anything else, we have
9 a system called PLO, which is -- we use for -- which I'm
10 going to get as a private investigator, but we use for
11 looking up phone numbers, relatives, during coroner
12 cases or just to try to find somebody, skip tracing. So
13 I looked up his number, was going to call him and see
14 what his intentions were with the Sheriff's Office.
15 Then my partner in investigations found some, that he'd
16 been arrested for a criminal charge in Nye County. So
17 that got brought up at a meeting. So he assumed that
18 somebody had done a background check on him. Which they
19 did an investigation, found out that there was no
20 background check done. However, they saw that I looked
21 into this system, his name up. So when it was brought
22 up to me, as they passed it on to the State, I was
23 truthful and said I looked it up for a phone number.
24 And so I was given a letter of reprimand. And I just --
25 that was it.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
2 additional questions?

3 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
4 motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
6 Cortez. I motion to approve Mr. Cooley for an
7 individual private investigator license, subject to all
8 statutory and regulatory requirements.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we
10 have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Board Member Bezick. I
12 second.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have
14 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. The motion
17 passes. Thank you, Mr. Cooley. If you have any
18 questions, please contact the PILB Board.

19 MR. COOLEY: Okay. Thank you. Thanks for your
20 time.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations to you.

22 MR. COOLEY: Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda item number
24 30. Ms. Savannah Miele, are you with us?

25 MS. MIELE: Yes. Savannah Miele. The last

1 name is M-I-E-L-E.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning.

3 MS. MIELE: Good morning.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Would you tell us a little
5 bit about yourself and what the intentions are with the
6 license.

7 MS. MIELE: Yes. So I've lived in Vegas for,
8 basically, my entire life. I went to UNLV, worked
9 full-time, went to school full-time, and graduated with
10 a bachelor's degree in criminal justice. I went into
11 investigating shortly after, and I've been doing that
12 for almost 10 years, I think. I've been employed with
13 CoventBridge Group, who I'm trying to be the Nevada
14 license holder for them.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any questions,
16 Board, are there any questions for Mrs. Miele?

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
18 Cortez. I do have a question, Mrs. Miele. Could you
19 talk to me about the incident reported in an interview
20 where your previous employer, unfortunately, let you go
21 due to falsifying some time?

22 MS. MIELE: Yes. So back then, I was going
23 through a lot of family things. I was not in my right
24 state of mind and made a couple mistakes which led to
25 that. And since then, I have learned from my mistake.

1 So that was completely out of the my character. I'm not
2 like that at all. And just did a complete one eighty
3 and just been hard-working since.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Is that a second, or was
5 that a different employer than the Mandalay Bay, MGM?

6 MS. MIELE: Yes, correct.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

8 MS. MIELE: That was the only investigation.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So when did this
10 incident occur, the falsifying of info?

11 MS. MIELE: I can't recall the exact.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Was it before or after
13 the Mandalay incident?

14 MS. MIELE: Oh, that was way before. That was
15 my first investigating employees. So that was shortly
16 after I started this line of work.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: How old were you at the
18 time of the incident?

19 MS. MIELE: Early 20s.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And talk to me
21 about the incident at Mandalay Bay.

22 MS. MIELE: Okay. So I was employed by Robert.
23 Which I am so sorry I forgot to add him to my
24 application of being employed with him. But we were
25 working a domestic case at the Mandalay Bay. And he got

1 a room for the night. Because our subject was staying
2 up there, so he got a room close to the subject's room.
3 We went upstairs, and he put a like a socket camera on
4 the wall, so we can see who the subject was bringing to
5 and from his room. So I went downstairs. I did my
6 surveillance work for the night. Went out to dinner
7 afterwards. You know, went back up later to the room,
8 and our door was locked. So I called downstairs,
9 thinking it was just the key that wasn't working. And
10 that's when they sent security officers up there and
11 proceeded to tell us that they went through our room to
12 search for items. Because it was the October 1
13 anniversary. So they went through our room. Obviously,
14 they didn't find anything. I noticed that the camera
15 was taken off the wall. So I didn't know if it fell off
16 or if somebody took it off. But it all kind of, you
17 know, came into place when they came up there and
18 started questioning why the camera was on the wall.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And this was back in
20 2018, correct?

21 MS. MIELE: Correct, yes.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That's all the questions
23 I have. Thank you.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have a question.
25 It's Gronauer. It just bothers me that you listed all

1 the other employers, but you failed to list this
2 employer because you forgot to put it on the
3 application. And this one had a lot of problems with
4 it. And it just kind of, that it just slipped your mind
5 does not help me at all.

6 MS. MIELE: Honestly, it really, it's because I
7 did maybe like a couple cases for him. So it really
8 didn't like register, because I wasn't with him for a
9 long time. So I just, I really didn't, I didn't even
10 think about it. Obviously, I didn't forget about the
11 MGM incident. But it just didn't register in my head to
12 put him down because I wasn't with him for that long.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This is Board Member Nixon.
14 One question. What ended up happening? Because
15 according to the report here, you refused to sign the
16 trespass document from the MGM. What ended up happening
17 with this whole investigation?

18 MS. MIELE: So they put me on, yeah, the no
19 trespass list for the MGM properties. The document that
20 they gave me was, it just wasn't professional. Like the
21 font was all blurry. And I'm just like is this like a
22 real document, or are they just, you know, making it
23 seem like more official and they want us to just leave.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then so you were
25 not on Mr. Clymer's PILB roster. Why was that? Hello?

1 MS. MIELE: I'm sorry. I put you back on mute.
2 Yeah, I was not aware of that at all. I was getting
3 paid. My taxes were getting taken out. Like nothing
4 was sketchy about it at all. So I was surprised when I
5 read that on the report.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any other questions?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
8 Brown. I just want to go on record that I have the same
9 concerns as Board Member Gronauer. It seemed to be a
10 significant enough incident that even if you only worked
11 for him a short time, you would have recalled that you'd
12 done so.

13 MS. MIELE: Yeah, I didn't want, I didn't mean
14 to hide it from you guys. I'm sure that's probably what
15 it looks like. But that's not, not the case at all.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any other questions from
17 the Board?

18 Mr. Saladino, you investigated this. Do you
19 have any other input into the incident?

20 MR. SALADINO: This is Investigator Saladino.
21 So during the investigation with Mandalay Bay and their
22 security managers, the trespass is a lifetime trespass.
23 A month later, they put her on their facial recognition
24 system, to where she was at another property, where she
25 was again asked to leave, because she had been

1 trespassed from all MGM properties. During that
2 investigation, I do have the paperwork for that. The
3 forms that were used were, you know, standard forms for
4 trespassing somebody from a, you know, local casino and
5 stuff. So they didn't look anything strange to me. The
6 corporate, corporate security from Mandalay Bay was very
7 adamant about not wanting to lift this ban anytime soon.
8 And that was the end of that investigation.

9 Robert Clymer, ever since the investigations,
10 did receive a citation for a violation for not having
11 them added to the roster. And that had been taken care
12 of back when this was investigated.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you for that insight.
14 Any further questions?

15 Okay. No further questions. I'll entertain a
16 motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'd
18 like to make a motion to deny the application of private
19 investigations for, as private investigator for Savannah
20 Miele.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
22 a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
24 Cortez. I do second that motion.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a

1 second. All in favor, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Ms. Miele, your
4 application has been denied. The Board will contact you
5 with next steps, or you can reapply in a year. Thank
6 you.

7 MS. MIELE: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We'll move on to
9 agenda item number 31. Michael T. Hill, are you on the
10 line, sir?

11 MR. HILL: Yes. This is Michael T. Hill, the
12 last name H-I-L-L.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Please
14 tell us a little bit about yourself and your intentions
15 with the license.

16 MR. HILL: Yeah. My name is Michael Hill. I
17 was with the FBI for a little over 30 years. That's
18 what brought me to Las Vegas. I guess, two and a half
19 years ago, I separated from the FBI and joined Kroll,
20 which is my current employer. I guess, in order for
21 Kroll to do business in the state of Nevada, I have to
22 get the private investigator license, which I wish to
23 place in abeyance so that I can become the qualifying
24 agent for Kroll Cyber Security, LLC.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I'll open it up to the

1 Board. Are there any questions from the Board?

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
3 Cortez. Mr. Hill, I see that, unfortunately, you ran
4 into some financial trouble. Where are you at with the
5 with completion of the plan that was set up?

6 MR. HILL: It is scheduled to be completed
7 in -- it's now October of 2021. It shows here that
8 Capital, that two accounts were charged off. Those
9 actually went to collections. And I have paid those off
10 as well.

11 My financial troubles basically stemmed from
12 trying to keep my older son out of jail. Working for
13 the FBI so long, I made the decision that it was easier
14 for me to take a hit on my credit than it was for my son
15 to have felonies on his arrest record, on his record.
16 It started with a DUI in Las Vegas. Come to find out,
17 he had issues in California, Florida and Utah. And by
18 the time I was done paying attorneys and keeping him out
19 of jail and making him do what he needed to do, it cost
20 me a little over \$50,000.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you,
22 sir.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Mr. Cole -- or I'm
24 sorry. Yeah, Mr. Hill, I noticed here in the
25 investigator's notes that you started working for Kroll

1 Cyber Security, and you did not have a registered work
2 card. It looks like you did remedy that, but not until
3 July 8th of 2020.

4 MR. HILL: Yes. So I went back and looked
5 through my emails. I did get that email on the 21st of
6 May. I did begin to fill out the application. But
7 between May and July, my mother became ill, and I was
8 making numerous trips to Salt Lake City and back. Being
9 the oldest son, it was my duty to be there. I lost my
10 father unexpectedly the day after Christmas about 13
11 years ago, and I'm not really in a position to lose my
12 mother without being there. So I was just really in and
13 out all of the month of June. As soon as I rectified
14 that situation, I finished the application, made the
15 payments and got my work card.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then I see back
17 in November 9th of 2020, the Kroll company was issued a
18 cease and desist because they had been operating more
19 than 120 days without a QA.

20 MR. HILL: Yeah, and my understanding with that
21 is that so Kroll got acquired by a company called Duff &
22 Phelps. Duff & Phelps actually had a person in Reno
23 that held the, I guess, the license. He quit without
24 telling anybody. But, I guess, during the merger of
25 Kroll and Duff & Phelps, there was a lot of

1 miscommunication between the companies. And I was not
2 able to complete my application in time for the Board
3 last year due to issues with getting Qsex from FBI
4 employees. I had one fill it out, it was incorrect,
5 another. Because there's a board member that's former
6 FBI, he remembers there was an assistant director that
7 was fired for talking to the press like one day before
8 he was allowed to retire. So the FBI went into a --
9 we -- nothing like this can be done without going
10 through headquarters. So I could not find anybody that
11 was willing to go on record with the Qsex. And then I
12 had an issue with -- I used to be a full-time instructor
13 for College of Southern Nevada. And I could not,
14 because of due to COVID, and so I could not get the
15 letter that states that there was no, no issues with me
16 working and teaching at the same time. So I was not
17 able to finish my application. So they issued the cease
18 and desist. Duff & Phelps reached out, they reinstated
19 that. I got my application in. I was able to find a
20 former supervisor who filled out the forms correctly.

21 And that's where I am today. So I think, a lot
22 of those issues was just the merger between the two
23 companies Duff & Phelps and Kroll. Kroll didn't
24 understand they had this obligation until they were
25 informed by Duff & Phelps.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So thank you for the
2 explanation. So a part of this application, there's two
3 other individuals, Mr. Puzzuoli.

4 MR. HILL: Yes.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then Matteson. Are
6 either of those gentlemen on the line?

7 MR. HILL: Not to my knowledge. Yeah, and I,
8 to be honest, I don't, I don't know who either of those
9 are. I'm assuming that they are probably higher-ups in
10 Duff & Phelps. So I don't know if they were notified to
11 be here.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So real quick, Investigator
13 Swarthout, were they notified to be?

14 MR. SWARTHOUT: To my knowledge, they would
15 have been notified.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Yes.

17 MR. INGRAM: Investigator Lancaster, are you on
18 the phone?

19 MS. LANCASTER: Yes, I am.

20 MR. INGRAM: Can you confirm that they were
21 notified to attend?

22 MS. LANCASTER: Yeah, I notified the head
23 person that the meeting was that day, or was today. So
24 they would have been notified.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Can I ask?

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

2 MR. INGRAM: The follow-up question I have for
3 you, Shelly, is that the other name that's being
4 referenced, are you familiar with that name, Duff &
5 Phelps, or?

6 MS. LANCASTER: Duff & Phelps, yes, I am.
7 Because it is the company, I believe, that bought out
8 Kroll. And when I'm in correspondence with them, it's
9 somebody from Duff & Phelps.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So who's the license going
11 to be under?

12 MS. LANCASTER: It's Kroll.

13 MR. HILL: It is. And Duff & Phelps actually
14 just changed their name to Kroll within the past 30
15 days, so.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's easier.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

18 MS. LANCASTER: If you need to speak to the
19 potential corporate officers, I can contact the
20 licensing compliance person and see if we can't get them
21 on the phone, if you would like.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, no, we're clear. I
23 just, you know, if they were noticed, they should have
24 been on, if they wanted the license.

25 So Board Member Gronauer.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Mr. Hill,
2 what would your position be?

3 MR. HILL: I am a vice president over cyber
4 security.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

6 MR. HILL: So we do cyber incident response.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay. Were you
8 going to be the qualifying agent?

9 MR. HILL: Yes.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Do you know
11 if they have an up-to-date -- the last Secretary of
12 State business license here expired January 2021. Do
13 you know if you have an up-to-date business license for
14 Kroll?

15 MR. HILL: My understanding is that they did
16 all that paperwork and that it was approved.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm talking about the
18 Nevada business license for State of Nevada. Because
19 the one that's in your records here says it expires
20 1-31-21. And, I think, that was this January that
21 passed.

22 MR. HILL: I am not sure. I could definitely
23 reach out and find out. But my understanding was that
24 they were supposed to take care of all that before this
25 Board meeting.

1 MS. LANCASTER: Investigator Lancaster.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah.

3 MS. LANCASTER: Yeah, I just looked on the
4 Secretary of State, and it is valid through 2022.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. The record
7 that was given to us says '21. All right. Thank you.
8 I appreciate that.

9 MS. LANCASTER: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
11 questions for Mr. Hill?

12 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Board Member
13 Bezick. Mr. Hill, you resigned from the FBI after more
14 than 30 years. Were you eligible to retire?

15 MR. HILL: No. So there's two different
16 retirement systems in the FBI. One is for the special
17 agents, which are the gun carriers. And one is for the
18 professional support, which are non-gun carriers.
19 Special agents can retire after 20 years at age 50 and
20 immediately draw benefits. Non-special agents have to
21 have 30 years and be age 57 before they can retire and
22 draw benefits. So I, basically, deferred my retirement
23 until age 62. So when I turn 62, I can, I will be able
24 to get my retirement and pension.

25 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
2 further questions from the Board?

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
4 Cortez. This is a question for counsel. If I'm reading
5 this correctly, we've got three items.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I've got four.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yeah, four. Okay. Can
8 I -- we're not dealing with Mr. Matteson or Puzzuoli
9 because they're not here; is that correct?

10 MR. DETMER: I can't answer that. I don't --

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We're looking for the
12 motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Oh, okay. So we're going
14 to have to go step by step, from my understanding, as to
15 what I'm motioning for or what we motion for.

16 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. The
17 way I see this particular agenda item, as far as the
18 actions for consideration, is the licensure for
19 Mr. Hill --

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Right.

21 MR. DETMER: -- is --

22 * * * * *

23 (The connection between north and south was
24 lost. There was a period off the record to reestablish
25 the connection, 10:35 to 10:45 a.m.)

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MR. INGRAM: Okay. So we're back on the record.

Shannon, can you attempt to tell us where we were in the discussion when we lost us?

BOARD MEMBER BROWN: You dropped, you were in the middle of saying there were four actions in the motion.

MR. INGRAM: Okay. So we can pick up from there.

THE REPORTER: Oh, okay. Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Brown.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So then I will -- we will go back to entertaining a motion on agenda item number 31.

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I am motioning to grant Mr. Hill with an individual private investigator license, so that he may be placed in abeyance as a qualifying agent.

MR. DETMER: Forgive me. Mike Detmer, for the record. I believe, it is be granted his private investigator license, and that be placed into abeyance so that he can become the qualifying agent, correct?

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That is correct, that is what I meant.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a motion. Do I
2 have a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I'll
4 second.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So I have a motion.
6 I have a second. All in favor of the first motion, say
7 "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All opposed?

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. No.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So the motion passes three
12 to one in favor of Mr. Hill obtaining his individual
13 private investigator's license and it being put into
14 abeyance.

15 MR. INGRAM: Four to one.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Four-one. Sorry. My math
17 is sometimes off.

18 Okay. So, then, congratulations, Mr. Hill.
19 The Board staff will reach out to you for next steps.

20 MR. HILL: Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So then now I'll entertain
22 a motion for the rest of the agenda item number 31.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
24 Cortez. It's my understanding I'm going to motion that
25 Kroll Cyber Security be granted the name change to Kroll

1 Associates, Incorporated, subject to all statutory and
2 regulatory requirements.

3 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. That
4 is the fourth of the four, it's four of four. There was
5 number three and four, which was the member approval for
6 Matteson and Puzzuoli.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I did, I bypassed that
8 because I need clarification as to their attendance.

9 MR. DETMER: Understood.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The motion was for the
12 name change.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So going and where
14 we're at right now, I have a motion for the name change
15 to be approved for agenda item number 31. Do we have a
16 second?

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll
18 second.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion, and
20 I have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That motion passes. Okay.
23 And then can we ask Board counsel a question?

24 MR. DETMER: Please.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. On the members to be

1 approved, Matteson and Puzzuoli, can we trail that until
2 they come into attendance?

3 MR. DETMER: The Board has the discretion,
4 absolutely.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And how does that affect
6 them? I guess, maybe that's for Mr. Ingram.

7 MR. INGRAM: Well, traditionally, the Board has
8 required anyone who submitted a background to attend.
9 The Board has taken action upon the individuals that
10 have the clear backgrounds. Had these two individuals
11 been a standalone agenda item just for corporate
12 officers, they would have been included in the consent
13 agenda items.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

15 MR. INGRAM: So the Board can, you know, take
16 whatever actions they'd like to. We can have
17 Investigator Lancaster request to have them, you know,
18 call in at a later date, we could trail them, or you
19 could go ahead and take action on them as well, whatever
20 you desire.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, I guess, my question to
22 the Board would be, then, were there any questions for
23 Matteson and Puzzuoli?

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
25 Cortez. I have a question for Mr. Hill. Did you

1 indicate that you don't know either of these two
2 individuals?

3 MR. HILL: Yeah, they are part of like the
4 corporate office for Duff & Phelps. So I mean I
5 recognize their names, but I don't know either of them
6 individually. I've never met them. I've seen them on
7 email chains and video conferences, but that's it.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So question for
9 counsel. So who is applying, which, who is applying to
10 get these members approved?

11 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. My
12 understanding would be, just based off the agenda, that
13 they were applying.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So this is Board Member
15 Cortez. I'm going to motion to deny approval of
16 membership to Mr. Matteson and Mr. Puzzuoli. Should
17 they feel the interest to apply again, they should,
18 they're encouraged to do so. But I am going to deny
19 such at this time.

20 MR. INGRAM: For clarification, they're not
21 applying for licensure.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No. Membership? If
23 approved.

24 MR. INGRAM: If they're corporate members on
25 the Secretary of State --

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

2 MR. INGRAM: -- they are required to apply as a
3 member or corporate officer with our Board to make sure
4 that the records are -- so we're not granting them
5 licensure, we're only granting them member approval
6 saying they're part of the company. Just for
7 clarification, just for clarification.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And I'm going to
9 backtrack. I'm sorry. Did I, didn't I motion for the
10 licensing, or did I say membership?

11 MR. INGRAM: Well, denying their ability to
12 become a member.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

14 MR. INGRAM: They're required by our statutes
15 to reapply.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Got it.

17 MR. INGRAM: So for them to reapply --

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Nonconducive, it's almost
19 redundant.

20 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, time out a
22 second, please. All right. I mean we're right back to
23 what we've talked about in previous meetings. One of
24 the things are, if you're supposed to be on the agenda,
25 and you're supposed to call in, if you don't call in, we

1 have had previous events where we have denied because
2 they didn't call in. So, to me, membership or anything,
3 you know, I had a problem. That's why I voted no
4 against Hill. Because he didn't know anybody. So now
5 we're at this point here where he's saying, well, you
6 know, the second say this. Well, I don't care, because
7 at this point, these people had the responsibility to
8 call in.

9 MR. INGRAM: I'm not advocating for them.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, you sounded more
11 like --

12 MR. INGRAM: I'm trying to clarify.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's fine.

14 MR. INGRAM: You want them to be present, and
15 they're not going to --

16 (The Reporter indicated an inability to hear.)

17 MR. INGRAM: I'm just trying to clarify for the
18 record that they are not applying for a license.
19 They're applying for corporate member status. And it's
20 a requirement of our laws that they apply for member
21 status. And if the Board wants to take action saying,
22 they're not here, we're going to deny them, that's fine.
23 I just wanted to clarify the record.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This is Board Member Nixon.
25 One further question for clarification. If we deny

1 their membership right now, how does that affect them
2 doing business?

3 MR. INGRAM: Well, then the company is out of
4 compliance because the members haven't been approved.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so, you know,
6 so, and this is for me, because, as a Board Member, you
7 know, we just consented to a bunch folks doing the same
8 thing, name changes, and they weren't here. And so,
9 again, I just want to make sure we all understand that,
10 you know, they're executives of the company. I'm not,
11 again, asking that they should be here or shouldn't.
12 But we consented to a bunch of items.

13 So that being said, are there any other
14 questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I'll ask for
16 clarification, for Kevin. This is Board Member Cortez.
17 So to I'm clear, whether or not we approve, deny,
18 request that they call in, not going to matter as other
19 than what you just said, they'll be in violation. So
20 we'll come back, or they'll get violated, get fined. Is
21 that how that's going to work?

22 MR. INGRAM: Well, if you are just approving
23 Mr. Hill --

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct.

25 MR. INGRAM: -- today and the corporate name

1 change, you could approve them without corporate
2 officers. And then they can be placed on a future
3 agenda item. They would be out of violation until such
4 time. But I'm not going to issue them a violation
5 because you approved them to work and then be out of
6 compliance if you deny their membership. That's not
7 fair to them.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. I am also
9 going to concur with Board Members Nixon and Gronauer
10 that you're scheduled to be on the agenda. It's
11 professional standing to show up. We have to show up.
12 You should be showing up. You're requesting approval
13 from us. So for you not to show up, it speaks somewhat
14 of your level of professionalism and loyalty to whatever
15 it is that you're applying for.

16 I am willing to trail the matter and see if
17 they can get on the phone, till this afternoon. But
18 outside of that, I'll move forward with my
19 recommendation at that point.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we just, are we going to
21 trail it?

22 MR. DETMER: Madam Chair, we have the
23 discretion to trail this part of the agenda item until
24 later on. It's your discretion.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So in consideration

1 with Board Member Cortez -- do I have to move?

2 MR. DETMER: You have discretion to trail that
3 part.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we'll go ahead
5 and trail the portion of approving members Matteson and
6 Puzzuoli until later this afternoon after the appeals.

7 Investigator Lancaster, could you -- your name
8 changed. If you could please contact them and let them
9 know that that portion will be on hold, if they could
10 join us.

11 MS. LANCASTER: Okay. I will do that.

12 MR. INGRAM: At what time would you like them
13 to call?

14 MS. IRIZARRY: This is Chief Irizarry. The
15 last session for the work card appeals is 3:00 p.m. We
16 have them calling in at 10:30, 11:30, 2:00 and 3:00.
17 We're a little bit behind now. So just keep that in
18 mind. The last session is at 3:00 o'clock they should
19 call in.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we'll have them call in
21 the first part of the last session, so estimated around
22 3:00 p.m. this afternoon.

23 MS. LANCASTER: Okay. I'll let them know. I
24 believe, they're all on east coast time, on mountain
25 time or east coast. But I will let them know.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Appreciate it.

2 So, again, the Board's part of agenda item
3 number 31 is trailed until 3:00 p.m. this afternoon.

4 So, Mr. Hill, the Board will contact you for
5 next steps on your portion.

6 MR. HILL: Okay. Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

8 MR. HILL: Thank you very much.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So now we move to
10 agenda item number 32, which is Accurate Background LLC.
11 Mr. Morris, are you with us?

12 MR. MORRIS: I am with you. My name is Jason
13 Morris. I am a licensed private investigator, have been
14 in the state of Ohio for over 25 years. I am, have been
15 licensed in Nevada for several years. I am moving to
16 put my license in abeyance and license and be the
17 qualified agent for Accurate Background.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

19 Are there any questions from the Board?

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
21 Brown. I'm sorry. I'm not sure which member we're
22 talking to on this application.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Item 32.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It's Mr. Morris.

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I have a question for

1 Mr. Dickerson if he's available.

2 MR. DICKERSON: Yes, I'm here.

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Dickerson, it says in
4 the background and in your application that you had a
5 charge for sexual battery in 1993 stemming out of an
6 argument. Can you explain to me how that comes about,
7 an argument turns into sexual battery?

8 MR. DICKERSON: Actually, I was never charged.
9 I was arrested. Actually, it was a drop-off of a
10 custody, the exchange of custody, and got in an argument
11 with my soon-to-be ex-wife. She was preventing me from
12 leaving. I picked her up and moved her to the side and
13 literally left. And then I was arrested. Actually, she
14 would not file charges beyond that. She called the cops
15 in anger. They picked me up. It got processed,
16 fingerprinted, and I was released. The DA never filed
17 charges. I was never -- nothing ever became of it.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Was there something in the
19 way that you picked her up that resulted in this being a
20 sexual battery rather than something --

21 MR. DICKERSON: Actually, I was, I never knew
22 until I was there that it was sexual. Because it was in
23 her apartment at the time. Literally, she was
24 preventing me from leaving. And I just literally lifted
25 her up and moved her to the side. And then I don't know

1 what she told the police, but, again, I was arrested at
2 my place and taken in. I was processed and released.
3 And I never actually had contact with prosecutors.
4 Nothing ever amounted to it.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

6 So, Shannon, I've just been informed by
7 Investigator Jones that the south has been disconnected
8 again.

9 MR. INGRAM: Sorry. We dropped off again. Our
10 apologies.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Mr. Dowd -- Dickerson.
12 I'm sorry. Mr. Brown, did you have any, Board Member
13 Brown, did you have any more questions after that
14 answer?

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, I did not.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any other
17 questions for Dickerson, Mr. Dickerson?

18 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Yeah, this is Board
19 Member Bezick. I've got a question for Mr. Dickerson.

20 Mr. Dickerson, there was a bankruptcy in August
21 of 1994. What were the circumstances of the bankruptcy,
22 and has it been discharged?

23 MR. DICKERSON: Yes, it was discharged then.
24 It was actually all part of the same ongoing divorce.
25 So there was, it was a personal bankruptcy. It was just

1 all part of the same process. It wasn't a great couple
2 of years there, so.

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any other
5 questions from the Board?

6 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
7 entertain a motion for item, agenda item number 32.

8 Second request for a motion for agenda item
9 number 32, Accurate Background.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
11 Brown. I move that we approve the corporate private
12 investigator license for Jason B. Morris, allowing him
13 to put his individual license in abeyance so that he can
14 become the qualifying agent. I also move to approve
15 members David Dickerson and Timothy P. Dowd for the
16 company.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
18 a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
21 second. All in favor, say "aye."

22 (Board members said "aye.")

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The motion passes.

24 Gentlemen, congratulations. The Board will contact you
25 for next steps.

1 MR. MORRIS: Thank you very much.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

3 MR. DICKERSON: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So agenda item --

5 * * * * *

6 (There connection between north and south was
7 lost. There was a period off the record to reestablish
8 the connection.)

9 * * * * *

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we were on agenda
11 item number 33. I will call Brian Erbis. Are you with
12 us, sir?

13 MR. ERBIS: Present. And good morning, Madam
14 Chairperson.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. So,
16 Mr. Erbis, please tell us a little bit about yourself
17 and your intentions with the license.

18 MR. ERBIS: I'm a retired New York city police
19 detective with 23 and a half years of service, half of
20 which was roughly spent on patrol, and roughly half was
21 in an investigative capacity where I specialized in
22 general crimes and also in financial crimes
23 investigations.

24 As far as moving to the great state of Nevada,
25 my wife and I have been coming out here since 2004,

1 where she has family. We decided that this was going to
2 be the place to retire to. And as such, she transferred
3 from the Eastern District of New York in Brooklyn, where
4 she was a U.S. attorney, to the District of Nevada. I
5 stayed behind six months and then followed suit and
6 retired.

7 What I'm looking to do with my license is,
8 being that I have a specialty in financial crimes
9 investigations, I'm looking to consult businesses on
10 their internal controls, do fraud examinations, and even
11 mystery shop.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

13 So, Board, are there any questions for
14 Mr. Erbis?

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
16 Cortez. I do have a question. However, is --
17 Investigator Jones has joined us?

18 MR. INGRAM: In the north.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Oh, he is up north.

20 Okay. Investigator Jones, this is Board Member
21 Cortez. I do have a question regarding the open case of
22 stalking, protective restraining order. Can I get some
23 information or the update?

24 MR. JONES: Yes. This is Investigator Jones.
25 Mr. Erbis emailed me notifying that he did plead guilty

1 to the charge, which was a Class C misdemeanor. And,
2 additionally, the protection order was renewed and
3 expires on May 10th, 2023.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

5 Mr. Erbis, this is Board Member Cortez. Could
6 you elaborate on the incident, please?

7 MR. ERBIS: Yes. I just wanted to add that the
8 judge also issued a certificate of release of
9 disabilities, just one step in New York, the court
10 system, showing that the judge thinks that you're
11 reformed. So, yeah, unfortunately, regrets, I have a
12 few, to say the least. It's regrets that I live with on
13 a daily basis, and I have regrets that I'm going to live
14 with for the rest of my life, all the embarrassment, how
15 I embarrassed myself and my family.

16 In 2014, well, I formed a casual relationship
17 with a female detective in the NYPD. It lasted a few
18 years. I'm not proud of it. I strayed outside of my
19 marriage. It was the way I handled stress. It was
20 dysfunctional. It didn't end well. I actually ended
21 the relationship. There was communication afterwards
22 because she refused to give me some of the items that I
23 had left behind in exchange for her key, which I had
24 been forthcoming about. There were some hard feelings
25 after that. There was a lot of emotions involved. We

1 kept sporadic contact throughout that spring and summer.
2 She told me not to contact her anymore. I did not. As
3 of fall, when she told me not to contact her, about six
4 months later, she contacted me, asked me how I was
5 doing. And we argued back and forth. I didn't take no
6 for an answer, because she asked me to stay away before.
7 I regret it. It was some emotions that I was dealing
8 with, that I went on my own and sought counseling. I
9 did counseling for about a year and a half.

10 And, ultimately, I retired. I retired. I was
11 able to get my pension. I retired in good standing.
12 But I found that even though the case was ongoing, I
13 found it was more important to repair my marriage and to
14 retire and rebuild my family.

15 And, again, I'm, you know, I'm sorry about it.
16 It was definitely out of character for me. It was not
17 the way I was raised. You know, and I never come close
18 to breaking the laws. You know, as we all know, I took
19 an oath to uphold the law. Unfortunately, with my own
20 personal feelings, my own personal hurt get in the way,
21 and, you know, I created a situation for myself that
22 I'll have to live with for the rest of my life.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand. I
24 understand.

25 MR. ERBIS: But I'm just looking to move

1 forward, you know, and be the person that I am.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you. When was the
3 last time you had contact, phone, internet, social
4 media?

5 MR. ERBIS: Well, so, so the charge contact,
6 non-contact was from -- it was a little off, but it was
7 from like 2016 to 2018. We have not had contact since.
8 The arrest was in 2019. There was a temporary order of
9 protection given. It was noted that I had not violated,
10 that I had obeyed the order of protection throughout the
11 temporary process period. And the case was just about
12 three years old.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm sorry. Where does
14 the other party reside?

15 MR. ERBIS: In New York.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. All right. Those
17 are all my questions. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
19 questions from the Board?

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, this is Gronauer.
21 Sir, you were employed by the New York Police Department
22 from '96 to 2020, correct?

23 MR. ERBIS: That's correct.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. And just
25 explain to me why you left.

1 MR. ERBIS: So I retired, even though the case
2 was ongoing. But my wife had started the job about
3 seven months before in the District of Nevada. I was
4 going back and forth. I was staying behind. And, you
5 know, I would have daily phone calls with my
6 nine-year-old son, who was upset as to why I couldn't be
7 out here. My wife and I were working on, you know, we
8 were going to save the marriage. So I felt that my
9 family was more important. I finally put my family in
10 the position that it should have been in when I had been
11 ignoring them throughout the time that I had strayed
12 from my marriage. So that's why I left.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. In less than
14 four years, you were able to retire from New York Police
15 Department?

16 MR. ERBIS: I retired, yes. I mean I don't
17 have permission to have firearms, because there's an
18 order of protection. But I have a retired ID card. And
19 I got my pension.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Explain to me
21 the last part again. After four years, you still get a
22 pension?

23 MR. ERBIS: Well, no, I'm retired. I retired.
24 And I was able to get my pension. I have a retired ID
25 card. And I retired in good standing, except the fact

1 that I can't have firearms, obviously, because I have,
2 you know, an active order of protection against me.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.
4 I appreciate it.

5 MR. ERBIS: You're welcome.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
7 further questions?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
9 Brown. I have a question. Sir, what is the other party
10 alleging may still be going on that would cause a judge
11 to continue this protective order?

12 MR. ERBIS: Well, it's standard in New York
13 City. There's nothing, there has been no allegations of
14 any continued contact. The last contact that I was
15 accused of was in February of 2018. So as standard
16 under New York state law, if you plead guilty or if
17 you're found guilty of a misdemeanor or a Class B
18 misdemeanor, it's a final two-year order of protection.
19 An A misdemeanor, it's three-year order of protection.
20 And felony is a five-year order of protection. That's
21 standard.

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I'm sorry. You said the
24 last contact, was it in 2018?

25 MR. ERBIS: Correct. The last contact between

1 her and I was in February of 2018.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. But the protective
3 order was resulted in 2019.

4 MR. ERBIS: Oh, the arrest was in -- so the
5 investigation into the case took a year and a half. It
6 was, you know, transferred from one district attorney's
7 office to another because of jurisdiction. And then
8 that took nine months. And then there was another six
9 to seven months before the new district attorney had
10 charged the case. So I was arrested on July 26th, 2019.
11 There was a temporary order of protection issued that
12 continued throughout the case. And then when I pled
13 guilty, recently, the final order of protection as per
14 statute took effect, which is two years.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Got it. Thank you.

16 MR. ERBIS: I just wanted to add, it was not
17 prosecuted as a domestic violence crime. And, but as
18 such, being that it's, you know, a misdemeanor, a
19 B misdemeanor, it's a mandatory two-year order of
20 protection.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
22 questions?

23 Okay. If there are no other questions, I'll
24 entertain a motion.

25 Second request for a motion.

1 MR. FOMBY: This is Charles.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir?

3 MR. FOMBY: I was scheduled a court date today
4 at 11:30.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, we're running a little
6 bit behind. You'll have to hold. We're not to your
7 item yet. What agenda item are you?

8 MR. FOMBY: You want the code that was given to
9 me?

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So are you Mr. Fomby?

11 MR. FOMBY: Yes.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, I think, you're
13 scheduled for 3:00 o'clock.

14 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. They're going
15 to call in at 10:30 and then 11:30, depending which
16 agenda item you are.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. So folks that
18 were told to call in at 10:30, we are behind. We had
19 some technical issues this morning. So if you could
20 call back in at noon, or at 12:30.

21 MR FOMBY: 12:30?

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

23 MR. INGRAM: Those of you that have called in
24 at 10:30, probably call back in at noon. Those of you
25 that were told to call in at 11:30, why don't you call

1 back at 12:30.

2 MR. FOMBY: Okay.

3 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And sorry about any
5 inconvenience.

6 MR. FOMBY: I'm supposed to call back at 12:30.

7 UNIDENTIFIED MAN: I'm sorry. So was supposed
8 to call at 11:30, back at 12:30?

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir.

10 UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Okay. Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sorry about the
12 inconvenience.

13 UNIDENTIFIED MAN: Okay. Thanks.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sorry. We're falling so
15 far behind.

16 So, again, I am now looking for a motion for
17 agenda item number 33, Mr. Brian Erbis. Is there a
18 motion? It's for Brian Erbis Consulting LLC.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'm
20 having a little bit of difficulty, not with the
21 gentleman himself. It's the situation. The situation
22 is that there's an open case, an open case of
23 restraining order or protective order. Is it a
24 restraining order or protective order?

25 MR. ERBIS: If I may, Mr. Gronauer, the case is

1 closed. I took a -- I pled guilty to it. It's just
2 that the order of protection by statute is in effect for
3 two years.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I understand.

5 MR. ERBIS: I would just like to remind you
6 again and the Board that I've been compliant with the
7 case throughout the whole three-year time period.
8 There's been no contact. I definitely would never
9 contact this person ever again.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I understand that. My
11 struggle is that, in our past, the way we usually we
12 handle things. Now when we handle things, when we have
13 open -- even though your case is closed as that goes.
14 But there's a protective order. And if we grant
15 something, where does that leave us in the end? If we
16 not grant it on time and distance before, this is quite
17 new, and you have another hearing on it. Was it May
18 11th?

19 MR. ERBIS: Oh, yeah, that passed. That's when
20 I pled guilty.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, that was when it
22 went into effect for another couple years. And I
23 understand how that works in New York. I'm from the
24 east coast myself, and I understand how some of the
25 states work, especially New York. It's just that I

1 have, I'm just having a difficult time because of our
2 past, the way we handle things.

3 With that, I'll make my own motion. I don't
4 feel real good about it, but I have to make it because
5 of our past procedures. I make a motion that we deny
6 Brian Erbis Consulting LLC, who is applying for a new
7 corporate private investigator license. Brian Erbis is
8 applying for an individual private investigator license,
9 requesting that the individual license be placed into
10 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.

11 And I'm just making this a denial at this point
12 from me. That's my motion. It's up to the Board to
13 make a vote after that.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion.
15 Do we have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
17 Brown. I will second for the same concerns.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have
19 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any opposed?

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Aye. Can I make a
23 comment, then?

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So you're opposed?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No, I am not opposed. I

1 will vote aye to that motion.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion to
3 deny Mr. Erbis his corporate investigator license is
4 approved. Or, yes, approved.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The motion passes.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The motion passes. Board
7 Member Cortez would like to make a statement.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Erbis, I have to say
9 that I as well was on the fence with making this
10 decision. Unfortunately, because I know you have
11 already -- the case has been, it's been in disposition.
12 However, the actual restraining order remains active.
13 If I were to go ahead and grant this, and, God forbid,
14 that you make contact, that's going to come back on me.
15 And for legal reasons, I just can't ethically approve it
16 at this time.

17 I do encourage you to follow up on your
18 endeavors, preferably after everything is closed. So,
19 with that, I wish you luck.

20 MR. ERBIS: This is one final request. Is
21 there a way maybe the Board will consider putting this
22 all in abeyance for the two-year time period? I would
23 continue to be in abeyance until May 10, 2023, when the
24 order of protection is over.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I think, at that time, sir,

1 you'd have to just reapply.

2 MR. ERBIS: Okay. I'm just concerned about the
3 repercussions out of that, that denied, but okay.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And, generally, when you
5 come back, sir, and this, we do have this, you know,
6 where we deny folks, and they return after, you know,
7 they've completed their time or whatever's going on, and
8 we do reconsider as a whole new case.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The time and distance,
10 that plays a huge factor into it. And this will allow
11 us to have more time.

12 MR. ERBIS: I understand that.

13 MR. INGRAM: The other thing to consider --
14 this is Kevin Ingram, for the record. The background's
15 been completed up to this point in time. So if you were
16 to reapply, say, i two years after the order expires,
17 we're only going to have to do the background from this
18 date forward to when you reapply. So there would be
19 less expense on your background, because this portion is
20 already done. So even though you're going through the
21 entire background investigation again, consider, you
22 know, three-quarters of it already done. Okay?

23 MR. ERBIS: Okay. I understand.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

25 MR. ERBIS: Thank you for your consideration.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So now we're on
2 agenda item number 34, Prudential Defense Solutions.
3 Mr. or Mrs. Bonigarro?

4 MR. BONARRIGO: Bonarrigo.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Bonarrigo. Sorry for that.
6 Are you present?

7 MR. BONARRIGO: I am present.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Please tell us a
9 little bit about yourself. And tell us a little bit
10 about yourself.

11 MR. BONARRIGO: Sure. I spent 31 years in the
12 United States Navy and came to Las Vegas to retire, got
13 a job as the director of security at a pretty posh
14 community called Red Rock Country Club. I was the
15 director of security there for five years. Tried to
16 start our own security company, and that didn't go too
17 well. So, but I did obtain the PPL license. And I've
18 had that license since about 2014. And I've been a
19 qualifying agent now for -- well, this will be my fourth
20 company.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Is Mr. Kakos
22 available as well?

23 MR. KAKOS: Yes, I'm present on the line.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And, sir, how are
25 you involved with this endeavor?

1 MR. KAKOS: So I own Prudential Defense. I got
2 in the security business 15 years ago, started my own
3 company in 2018, and have been slowly progressing
4 through growing throughout the country.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
6 questions for Mr. --

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Either one.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: For either gentleman?

9 Okay. So I have a question for Mr. Kakos. On
10 your application, under the financial portion, there is
11 a lot of information concerning federal tax liens.
12 Could you please explain having that, the situation.

13 MR. KAKOS: Yeah. Your investigator only sent
14 me two tax liens, one federal and one state. I'm
15 currently under audit. I've been asking the IRS to just
16 give me a final number for the last, I don't know, seven
17 years now. And we're hopefully soon to get to that
18 point. I pay my taxes, file timely every year. And
19 there's just one dispute that was out there. Hopefully,
20 I'll have that number soon. But I've been working with
21 them through my attorneys for the last seven years, and
22 they've just been very slow to give me a final number.
23 And once that number is finalized, payment will be sent
24 in full.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So have you one

1 under the federal tax lien, and that's the one you're
2 waiting for information on?

3 MR. KAKOS: Correct, yes. The state, the state
4 tax lien has already been resolved and paid in full.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

6 MR. KAKOS: Surprisingly, you know, the State
7 of Michigan, for whatever reason, almost every other
8 year I tend to get a tax lien from them. And as soon as
9 I get the lien, I pay it in full. It's just the way
10 that my accountant calculates the stated-owed taxes.
11 But, yeah, that's already been paid in full.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, Investigator
13 Swarthout, I'm not seeing a release date on the state
14 tax lien. Has that been resolved?

15 MR. KAKOS: The state has been paid in full.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, this is for the
17 investigator. Sir.

18 MR. KAKOS: I'm sorry.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This is for the
20 investigator. Thank you.

21 MR. SWARTHOUT: The documents that he provided
22 showed that the two civil judgments had been shown as
23 being paid and taken care of. I don't have anything for
24 the state tax one as of yet.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So you have the civil

1 judgments?

2 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yeah, the two civil judgments.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But not the state one for
4 2,500?

5 MR. SWARTHOUT: Correct.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sir, are you aware
7 of that one? It's for 2,579. The date it was filed was
8 3-28-19.

9 MR. KAKOS: Yes. That was paid in full a few
10 months ago, as soon as actually, I think, your
11 investigator made me aware of it, and I sent the check
12 in immediately. I had gotten no notice from the state
13 on that lien.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So you had no
15 notice?

16 MR. KAKOS: No. The State of Michigan
17 typically doesn't. It's very strange, but what they'll
18 do usually is they'll assess a lien, and typically
19 they'll just withdraw it right out of the bank account
20 that I file the taxes from. Surprisingly, they didn't
21 this time, so I just sent the check in.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
23 Cortez. Is that the same for your federal tax lien?

24 MR. KAKOS: Yes, the federal tax lien is still
25 ongoing. So all I'm waiting on is for the IRS to give

1 me a final number. That number of 55,209 is not
2 reflective of any interest or penalties they wanted to
3 assess. So as soon as they give me that final number,
4 again, a check will be sent in for that as well. That's
5 been in process for years now. I don't know how to
6 speed them up any faster. It's just the way they
7 operate.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, Investigator
9 Swarthout, we have no documentation that the 2,579 has
10 been taken care of?

11 MR. SWARTHOUT: Correct.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sir, would you mind
13 providing a check number or something that could prove
14 that that's been handled?

15 MR. KAKOS: Absolutely. I can get it through
16 my bank account and get the check number and cashed
17 check from that and email it to the investigator.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then,
19 Investigator Swarthout, do you have any information on
20 the federal tax lien?

21 MR. SWARTHOUT: Just the letter that his
22 attorney provided that they are currently working on
23 getting that situated.

24 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. I have the
25 recommendation to Chair Nixon that if she wanted to

1 email something, to email it to myself, because it has
2 the VPN for the work computer. It would come directly
3 to me.

4 MR. KAKOS: And who is this, Sheila?

5 MS. IRIZARRY: Lori Irizarry. I'm going spell
6 it for you, the email address. It's a difficult one.
7 Let me know when you're ready.

8 MR. KAKOS: Yes. Hold on one second. Okay.
9 Go ahead with that.

10 MS. IRIZARRY: That's L-I-R-I-Z like zebra
11 A-R-R-Y at pilb.nv.gov.

12 MR. KAKOS: Okay.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, sir, what we're going
14 to do is we will trail this item till 3:00 o'clock. And
15 if you could email that to Chief Irizarry. And we will
16 be able to make a vote, we'll be able to take a vote.

17 MR. KAKOS: Sounds good.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We're going to trail
19 this one so we can. Okay. Okay. So thank you, sir.
20 We'll get back to you on item number 34.

21 MR. KAKOS: Thank you so much.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So I do need to make
23 an announcement. Anybody that has joined, that was
24 calling in at 11:30, we are running behind. We've had
25 some technical difficulties. If you could please call

1 back at 12:30. And this is for the work card appeals.

2 Sorry for any inconvenience.

3 MR. TAYLOR: Hello?

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes?

5 MR. TAYLOR: Okay. I'm calling. This is
6 Shamell Taylor calling. I'm calling from the east coast
7 side. So I was the one that was supposed to call in at
8 11:30, which was 2:30 my time?

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir.

10 MR. INGRAM: Right. So right now, we're going
11 to ask that you call back at 12:30. We're running
12 behind due to technical difficulties.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: One hour from now.

14 MR. TAYLOR: All right. Because I already, I
15 already told my job I was going to be running late,
16 because I was supposed to be there about 4:00 o'clock.

17 MR. INGRAM: Sir, we understand. But we have a
18 lot of individuals that have been on the call since
19 9:00 a.m. that are ahead of you.

20 MR. TAYLOR: All right.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Very sorry, sir. We've had
23 technical difficulties.

24 MR. TAYLOR: All right. Thank you.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

1 MR. WIGGINS: Hello, everybody. This is Dwight
2 Wiggins. I'll call back at 12:30, too, because my
3 appointment was at 11:30.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Appreciate
5 it.

6 MR. WIGGINS: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Moving on to the
8 next agenda item, item number 34, Carl Toth.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: 35.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 35, item number 35.

11 MR. TOTH: This is Carl Toth, T-O-T-H.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Tell us a
13 little bit about yourself and what your intentions are
14 with the --

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Excuse me, Madam Chair.
16 This is Gronauer. This one I have personal interest in,
17 because I am the qualified agent for them now. He's
18 taking my place. So I'd rather just stay away from it.
19 I have to problem with him, but. Thank you, Mr. Toth.

20 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. It's
21 my understanding that Member Gronauer is recusing and
22 abstaining from voting based on the things that were
23 made under NRS 281A.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's what I should
25 have said.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

2 I'm sorry. Mr. Toth, please.

3 MR. TOTH: Yeah, I'm retired Air Force after 25
4 years in the Air Force. And, basically, the security
5 experience in the state of Nevada from 2005 to my
6 current position with North American Security as the
7 contract manager. I am applying for the individual
8 private patrolman license, and if approved, it'll be
9 placed in abeyance so that I can become the qualifying
10 agent for Global Security Corporation.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: He's almost qualified
12 to be a Marine.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you for your service,
14 sir. And good luck working with the -- okay.

15 Okay. Are there any questions from the Board?

16 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
17 motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
19 Brown. I move that we grant Mr. Toth his individual
20 private patrolman license and allow him to place that in
21 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent for
22 Global Security Corporation.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
24 Cortez. I'll second the motion.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a

1 second. All in favor, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The motion passes.

4 Mr. Toth, Board staff will contact you for next steps.

5 Congratulations, and good luck to you.

6 MR. TOTH: Thank you. Have a nice day.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You, too.

8 Okay. Agenda item number 36. Anthony Aguilar,
9 are you on, sir?

10 MR. AGUILAR: Yes, I'm here, present. My last
11 name is --

12 MR. INGRAM: Those of you that are on the call
13 right now, please mute your phone until called upon.
14 Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Aguilar, could
16 you please tell us a little bit about yourself and what
17 your intentions are with the license.

18 MR. AGUILAR: Well, I'm born and raised in
19 Los Angeles. I've been involved with the Highway Patrol
20 since I was 15, out of Explorer. I was in there until I
21 was about 22. When leaving the academy, became a squad
22 leader in the academy. I even tore my rotator cuff and
23 still graduated as I never give up mentality. Got
24 stationed some of the first stations, did about seven
25 years there, started an Explorer program out of myself

1 from the ground up. I'm very well oriented in the
2 community. Been five years since I moved to Vegas. My
3 12-year-old daughter lives with me full-time.

4 And I'm currently with the same company I've
5 been for the past five years, CPI. And I would like to,
6 if granted, get my license in abeyance so I can become a
7 qualifying agent for the company I currently work for,
8 CPI Security.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
10 questions for Mr. Aguilar?

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
12 Cortez. Mr. Aguilar, are your financial strains, are
13 they all caught up?

14 MR. AGUILAR: Yes. There was a -- I provided
15 the latest letter which was --

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: ASAP?

17 MR. AGUILAR: -- submitted to the investigator.
18 Yes.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
20 Cortez again. I'm seeing that at the last Board meeting
21 you had resigned from the Highway Patrol. Is this, are
22 you the gentleman that I asked if you resigned based on
23 union negotiations?

24 MR. AGUILAR: Well, it was, yeah, in lieu of
25 termination.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Do you recall that
2 it was me who asked you that?

3 MR. AGUILAR: I'm not sure who was the one that
4 asked me that. But, yes, I do remember someone asked.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Just so I know
6 that you're the individual of this case, just so I
7 recall my memory. Okay. Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
9 questions?

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
11 Brown. Mr. Aguilar, could you refresh my memory as to
12 why you resigned in lieu of termination from the
13 California Highway Patrol?

14 MR. AGUILAR: The latest incident, which was --
15 I know it's Halloween time, October 2011, I was at a
16 good friend's restaurant. It was just closed to the
17 public. It was just people that worked there. I was
18 dating this girl. She -- her costume was, you know, a
19 short skirt with the whole police outfit, you know, the
20 typical ones you find at the store. She had my replica
21 badge on. And so during the night, I left early from
22 this event, went home, had to work early the next
23 morning. I guess, she went to another party outside
24 somewhere near Universal Studios in L.A., ran into an
25 off-duty officer at this party, went up to her and said,

1 "Hey, where did you get all this stuff? It looks good.
2 And where did you get this badge from?" And I wasn't
3 there, so I don't know all the details. But, anyways,
4 there was some kind of a confrontation between both of
5 them, and he called his supervisor, and then they did an
6 investigation on all. He just warned to make sure, he
7 wanted to know if that stuff wasn't stolen or -- because
8 she wasn't really saying anything. So that was the
9 whole part of that investigation.

10 That was just one of, and then the latest, that
11 was, like I said, in October of 2011. And then back
12 in -- let me see here. Then there was another incident
13 off-duty where I was at my parents' house. This was in
14 2009. Someone told me that someone had hit my vehicle
15 outside. It was parked. I ran outside to see what was
16 going on. It was one of the local gang members that hit
17 my car. And he was acting very aggressive with me.
18 And, you know, he jumped in his car. Me, not knowing
19 what was going on, what he's about to grab, so I get my
20 off-duty revolver, and I point it to him, and get out of
21 the car. He had his hands up. Nothing happened. I
22 called the sheriffs immediately, my supervisors. They
23 came down. They made sure everything happened the way
24 it happened. And that was that.

25 I was never, never had any charges or anything.

1 All these incidents were investigated and concluded. I
2 tried to get as much information for everyone here since
3 there was minimal information last time. I tried to
4 work with the investigator to see how, what else I
5 needed to get this, to get this cleared out. I mean I'm
6 not having -- I've never been being dishonest about
7 anything. I've been honest from the beginning. I've
8 been willing to help out and find as much information as
9 I can. And that's where I'm at right now.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, Investigator
11 Saladino, I remember and in the notes that there was a
12 request for paperwork from the Internal Affairs. Did we
13 ever receive that information?

14 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. Yes, I
15 did receive information from the captain of Internal
16 Affairs. Everything that the applicant stated about the
17 incident with the off-duty firearm, the nonstopping of
18 pursuit when told to stop the pursuit, and then the
19 incident with the costume where the lady had his badge,
20 those were all the things that lead up to the department
21 allowing him to resign in lieu of termination.

22 The captain stated that, yes, he did resign in
23 lieu of termination. He is not rehirable with the
24 California Highway Patrol. He couldn't speak on behalf
25 of any other law enforcement agency. He said, with

1 California Highway Patrol, he would be not rehireable.
2 And after the separation, there was no pending charges
3 that followed him after he resigned from California
4 Highway Patrol.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, sir, it seems that in
6 your statement here, you had stated that you were
7 rehireable and had no restrictions for a law enforcement
8 position. What's the discrepancy there?

9 MR. AGUILAR: Well, maybe it was a
10 misunderstanding with the Highway Patrol, but I have
11 even applied with -- my first year in Las Vegas, I even
12 tried to apply with -- not Las Vegas Metro. I didn't go
13 through with it. I just decided that part of my life
14 was over, and I let it alone. But I am, as far as I
15 know, I am absolutely rehireable with any department.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So back to my question,
17 while I understand you've changed your mind on Metro,
18 there seems to be a discrepancy of whether or not you're
19 rehireable. The state says no. And for some reason,
20 you think you are.

21 MR. AGUILAR: Not with the CHP, no. If I said
22 that --

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

24 MR. AGUILAR: -- I'm sorry if that came out
25 wrong.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

2 Board, are there any other questions?

3 Okay. Hearing no other questions, I'll
4 entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll
6 make a motion to deny Anthony Aguilar, who is applying
7 for an individual private patrolman license. He is
8 requesting that his individual private patrolman license
9 be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
10 qualifying agent for CPI Security Solutions.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
12 a second?

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
14 Brown. I'll second the motion.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
16 second. All in favor, say "aye,"

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Unfortunately, sir, your
19 request is denied. Please, if you have any questions,
20 reach out to the Board staff.

21 MR. AGUILAR: How do I do that? I thought
22 everything was answered here with this. I thought all
23 the questions was answered. I mean I came back, I
24 showed you the -- I mean I applied almost immediately.
25 I've done everything you've asked me to do. I haven't

1 been dishonest about anything.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, I appreciate that.
3 The Board has made its decision. Thank you. Have a
4 great day.

5 Okay. We'll move to item, agenda item number
6 37, Scott T. Allen. At this point, I do need to
7 disclose that Mr. Allen did work for me at Allied
8 Universal at one time. So at this point, I am going to
9 have to recuse myself from any decision on this matter.

10 MR. DETMER: And Mike Detmer, for the record.
11 It is my understanding Chairwoman Nixon's abstention is
12 based on representations she made as far as prior
13 employment by this particular applicant. So she is
14 recusing and abstaining from the vote.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. Thank you.

16 Okay. Mr. Allen, are you with us?

17 MR. ALLEN: Yes. Hello. This is Scott Allen,
18 A-L-L-E-N as in north.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Please
20 tell us a little bit about yourself and your intentions
21 with the license.

22 MR. ALLEN: Yes. Good morning, Board. Again,
23 my name is Scott Allen. My friend and me moved out to
24 Las Vegas in late 2014. And I've been in the security
25 industry ever since. I started with Allied Barton as an

1 armed officer for the State of Nevada and promoted up
2 through mergers to the general manager with Allied
3 Universal. I am currently the current branch manager
4 for Weiser Security based in Las Vegas over in Nevada.
5 And I'm requesting approval to be the qualifying agent
6 for Weiser Security Services over in Nevada.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

8 Are there any questions from the Board?

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
10 Cortez. This is for Investigator Jones. I see that you
11 attempted to make contact with the applicant, and you
12 have yet to receive the documentation regarding the past
13 due account; is that correct, or do we have an update?

14 MR. JONES: Yes. This is Investigator Jones.
15 I did request documentation for the prior incident in
16 question. He stated that he was going to work on
17 getting that, but I have yet to receive anything.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
19 Cortez. Mr. Allen, is there a reason why we have yet to
20 receive the documentation, or do you have any
21 information regarding that?

22 MR. ALLEN: The requested documentation is
23 regarding an account through a debt services, through
24 Peak Legal Services. They're based out of California.
25 Since receiving the information from the investigator,

1 I've reached out to Peak Legal. I've not received a
2 phone call back or an email. I did, through my emails,
3 the last communications received from them was
4 July 20th, 2018. I'm continuing to try to contact Peak
5 Legal Services to receive the documentation as to why
6 the payments stopped coming out of my account for that
7 collection services. And it was in the middle of 2018
8 as to when the payments stopped coming out. After
9 Google research, the company still is intact. However,
10 I have not been able to receive communication back from
11 Peak Legal Services as to why the recent payments
12 stopped.

13 BOARD CHAIR CORTEZ: Thank you.

14 Investigator Jones, this is Board Member Cortez
15 again. Were there any other red flags or information
16 that the Board should be made aware of, outside of what
17 Mr. Allen has indicated?

18 MR. JONES: All information in the report is
19 current, and there's been no new information or red
20 flags in regards to the financial situation.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Great. Thank you.

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Allen, this is Board
23 Member Brown. I have a question for you regarding your
24 military history. The background investigation lists
25 that you left the Marine Corps as an E-3. You list E-4

1 in your application. Is there a discrepancy there, or
2 am I reading it wrong?

3 MR. ALLEN: Yes, there is discrepancy. And I
4 have the -- the original DD214 did list E-3 as a lance
5 corporal. However, I was honorably discharged as a
6 corporal. And I do have the updated and corrected
7 version of the DD214. I just can't remember; there's an
8 acronym after the DD214 for the correction of the
9 administrative paperwork. But I do, I do have that if
10 the investigator would like me to email it to him.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. I
12 believe, Investigator Jones would appreciate that.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I
14 have a little follow-up to Brown's, Board Member Brown's
15 question. I know you cannot change a DD214, no matter
16 what. All right. You have to have a DD215. Has that
17 been issued to you?

18 MR. ALLEN: Yes, I do, I do have the corrected
19 form. It's on my -- I have a PDF copy of it.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And because they do not
21 change a DD214. Once it's made first, the original
22 stays original. And it usually takes about a year to
23 have a DD215 added on, and all that is is an addendum to
24 your DD214.

25 MR. ALLEN: Okay. I understand.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What you usually get
2 back, it's just not even an email, just a piece of paper
3 that this is an addendum to your -- this is a DD215
4 addendum to your 214. So I don't know where you got
5 that, that belongs in the Marine Corps.

6 MR. ALLEN: Yes, sir. Sorry for the
7 miscommunication on the actual name on the form. If
8 it's a DD215, that is what I have, and I can email that
9 to the investigator.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Because now it
11 comes out of Quantico, Virginia, and that's a little
12 difficult to get at times. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
14 further questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
16 Cortez. I'm motioning to grant Mr. Allen his individual
17 private patrolman license, being placed in abeyance so
18 that he may become the qualifying agent for Weiser
19 Security, Inc., license number 1400, subject to all
20 statutory and regulatory requirements.

21 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. Just
22 for clarification, and I apologize for having misheard,
23 but that was a motion to approve the license and hold in
24 abeyance, correct?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That's correct.

1 MR. DETMER: I'm sorry if I misheard.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No, I probably said it.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. Do we
4 have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
6 Brown. I'll second the motion.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
8 second. All in favor, say "aye."

9 (Board members said "aye.")

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then this is Board
11 Member Nixon. I'm abstaining. So it passes four to
12 one. Thank you. Congratulations, Mr. Allen. Board
13 staff will contact you on next steps.

14 MR. ALLEN: Thank you very much. Have a good
15 day.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Item number 38.
17 Mr. Stutzman, are you on line?

18 MR. STUTZMAN: Yes, I am. This is Timothy
19 Stutzman, S-T-U-T-Z-M-A-N.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Sorry for
21 the delay. Sir, please tell us a little bit about
22 yourself and your intentions with the license.

23 MR. STUTZMAN: Yeah. I started in corrections
24 in 2003 at Lake Erie Correctional Institution in Ohio.
25 I worked there, I want to say, until 2019. I

1 transferred to Leavenworth Detention Center in Kansas,
2 with CorpCivic, who I was also with in Ohio. I've since
3 moved out here to Nevada Southern Detention Center with
4 CorpCivic. I've been here since January as the chief of
5 security.

6 I'm applying for an individual private
7 patrolman license, to be placed in abeyance so that I
8 can be the qualifying agent for CoreCivic here in Nevada
9 Southern Nevada Detention Center.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

11 Any questions from the Board?

12 MR. STUTZMAN: No, ma'am.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any questions from the
14 Board?

15 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
16 motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
18 Brown. I move that we grant the individual private
19 patrolman license to Mr. Stutzman, and allow him to
20 place it in abeyance so that he may become the
21 qualifying agent for CorpCivic, Incorporated doing
22 business as Nevada Southern Detention Center.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
24 a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll second.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
2 second. All in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.
5 Member Cortez has stepped out of the room. She will not
6 be participating in the vote.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So your motion
8 passes, sir. Congratulations. And Board staff will
9 contact you with next steps.

10 MR. STUTZMAN: Thank you very much. Have a
11 great day.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You as well.

13 Okay. Agenda item number 39. Mr. Redlin, are
14 you available?

15 MR. REDLIN: I am. Donald Redlin, R-E-D-L-I-N.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Tell us a
17 little bit about yourself and your intentions with the
18 license.

19 MR. REDLIN: I moved to Nevada in 1987 from
20 Texas. I started working in security in the 1988. In
21 1991, I went into the casino part of it till 1999. At
22 that time, I was an emergency medical technician, so I
23 got into the medical field until 2005. In 2006, I got
24 back into the security industry. In 2013, I went into
25 security logistics, and I wound up in my current

1 position at Brink's Global Services. I'm asking for
2 approval of a private patrolman license, and it placed
3 in abeyance so that I may become their qualifying agent
4 as their previous qualifying agent retired.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you for that,
6 sir.

7 And then do we have Mr. Domanico? Are you on
8 the line, sir?

9 Okay. Are there, Board, are there any
10 questions for Mr. Redlin?

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
12 Cortez. Mr. Stutzman, have you had any -- oh, I'm
13 sorry, Mr. Redlin. I see that there was an arrest over
14 in 2006 for DUI-related charges.

15 MR. REDLIN: Yes, ma'am.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I also see that there
17 were some personal issues going on and you made a poor
18 decision resulting in consequences. Where are you at
19 with that now?

20 MR. REDLIN: Oh, that, that was adjudicated. I
21 met all my requirements on July the 20th of 2007.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No, I'm asking mentally,
23 where are you at with that now? You still have -- are
24 you amicable with the ex? I see you have a daughter in
25 common.

1 MR. REDLIN: We have a daughter. She's turning
2 18 this month. Her mother, I don't speak with her. I
3 haven't spoke with her in, I don't know, a year, maybe
4 year and a half. We don't have a -- we don't have any
5 kind of contact. Our daughter's 18. We have no reason
6 to have contact, so. Or she's turning 18.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
9 questions for Mr. Redlin?

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
11 Cortez. I am motioning to approve Mr. Redlin for an
12 individual private patrolman license, and that that
13 license be placed in abeyance so that he can become the
14 qualifying agent, subject to all statutory and
15 regulatory requirements.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a motion. Do I
17 have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll second.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion, and we
20 have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations,
23 Mr. Redlin. The agenda item has passed. The Board
24 staff will contact you for next steps.

25 MR. INGRAM: Chairman, the item --

1 MR. REDLIN: Okay. Thank you very much.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Hang on one second, sir.

3 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Redlin, hold on a minute.

4 MR. REDLIN: Okay.

5 MR. INGRAM: The agenda item has not been
6 approved, just the approval for his individual license.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right.

8 MR. INGRAM: So agenda item 39 has not been
9 approved in full. The portion of agenda item 39 was the
10 approval of the individual license for Mr. Redlin, to be
11 placed into abeyance and that for him to become the
12 qualifying agent for Brink's Global Services USA, Inc.,
13 license number 2886. We still have the section of
14 corporate officer for Ronald Domanico to be heard or not
15 heard.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

17 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're correct. Sorry
19 about that.

20 So, I guess, are there -- Mr. Domanico, are you
21 on the line, have you joined us?

22 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Redlin, were you under the
23 impression that Mr. Domanico was going to be on the call
24 today?

25 MR. REDLIN: It wasn't relayed to me one way or

1 another. I've been going through our corporate
2 compliance officer and Ms. Lancaster on my presence. So
3 I don't know his situation or his status.

4 MR. INGRAM: Understood.

5 Investigator Lancaster, can you confirm that
6 Mr. Domanico was indeed requested to attend today?

7 MS. LANCASTER: Investigator Lancaster. He
8 probably was not, because his background was totally
9 clear, and in the past we haven't required them to be on
10 the call or be at the meeting if the background was
11 clear. So he probably was not notified.

12 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

13 MS. LANCASTER: M-hm (affirmative).

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So do we want to make a
15 motion?

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
17 Cortez. Based on the information received, I am going
18 to motion that we approve Mr. Ronald Domanico as
19 corporate officer, subject to all statutory and
20 regulatory requirements.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
22 a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll
24 second.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a

1 second. All in favor, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion for
4 the completion of agenda item number 39 passes. And,
5 Mr. Redlin, Board staff will contact you for next steps.

6 MR. REDLIN: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

8 MR. REDLIN: Thank you very much. Have a good
9 day.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Item number 40. Terry
11 Brown, are you on the line?

12 MR. BROWN: Yes. This is Terry Brown,
13 B-R-O-W-N.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Also,
15 is -- Terry Brown. I just want to make -- hang on one
16 second. You're the only one?

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yeah, there Charles.
18 There's Terry. There's Charles.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So Charles Terry
20 Brown is not the same as --

21 MR. BROWN: Yes. It's Charles Terry Brown.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

23 MR. BROWN: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Okay. So,
25 Mr. Brown, tell us a little bit about yourself and what

1 your intentions are with the license.

2 MR. BROWN: In a nutshell, it's been 12 years
3 of solid law enforcement. Went to the private sector,
4 worked for a private investigator, learning much about
5 the private sector and business. Went and worked for a
6 security company for a couple years, where pretty much
7 where all the decisions for this company. And then I
8 started my own company back in 2005.

9 My intentions for this particular license in
10 Nevada, I have clients who anticipate moving to Nevada.
11 I'm pretty sure you guys heard a lot about what's going
12 on in California. It's kind of a mad exodus to get out.
13 And so my clients are pondering the same decision as
14 well. So in anticipation of that move, we want to
15 expand our operations to Nevada as well.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

17 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Brown?

18 No. Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll
19 entertain a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
21 Cortez. It says a lot of information in there, and I
22 want to hope I get this right. But I am going to motion
23 that we approve Mr. Charles Terry Brown for a new
24 corporate private patrol, patrolman license and an
25 individual private patrolman. I'm seeing two different

1 ones. Is that correct? Okay. So I motion to approve
2 both, and that both licenses be placed in abeyance so
3 that he may also become the qualifying agent.

4 MR. DETMER: It says the individual license is
5 being held in abeyance.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes.

7 MR. INGRAM: Well, it's just one. He's
8 applying for an individual and requesting that his
9 individual license be placed into abeyance.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. I was getting
11 confused.

12 MR. INGRAM: That's okay.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And corporate.

14 MR. DETMER: And corporate member status, I
15 believe, is the third.

16 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And the corporate member
18 status.

19 MR. INGRAM: You got it.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do
21 I have a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I second.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
24 second. All in favor, say "aye."

25 (Board members said "aye.")

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Mr. Brown, you
2 have been approved. The agenda item passes and you've
3 been approved. Board staff will contact you for next
4 steps.

5 MR. BROWN: Thank you for your time, Board.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

7 Okay. We're moving on to agenda item number 41
8 under private investigator and private patrolman
9 license.

10 I would like to make an announcement, though.
11 We did tell people to call back in at noon. It is now
12 12:05. Our apologies. We're trying to work through
13 these as quickly as possible. So if you were asked to
14 call in, please --

15 MR. INGRAM: Stand by.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Stand by. We're getting
17 close.

18 Okay. Agenda item number 41, Redwood Private
19 Security, LLC. Mr. Noriego, are you on the line?

20 MR. NORIEGA: Yeah, it's actually Noriega, with
21 an A. It's been misspelled on the agenda there.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

23 MR INGRAM: Oh. Our apologies. Thank you.

24 MR. NORIEGA: Oh, no worries.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then is

1 Mr. Beckart on the line as well?

2 MR. BERCKART: Yes. Mr. Berckart. I'm on the
3 line as well.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Berckart. So I've murdered
5 both of you guys's names. Sorry about that.

6 MR. NORIEGA: It's quite all right.

7 MR. BERCKART: It's okay. We get it.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Gentlemen, please
9 tell us a little bit about yourself individually and
10 what the intention is with the license.

11 MR. NORIEGA: Okay. I'm a retired police
12 officer with about 28 and a half years of experience and
13 as a full-time police officer and about another five
14 years experience in the military reserve police officer.
15 Done many types of security for special events, such as
16 football games and concerts, and the like. Also,
17 dignitary protection for people that have come to the
18 universities in the state where I did work and did this
19 work with the Marshal's Office, Secret Service,
20 et cetera. I've also had extensive experience in
21 investigations specializing in backgrounds and internal
22 affairs.

23 So what I'm looking for is an individual
24 license, to be placed in abeyance so that I can become
25 the qualifying agent for Mr. Berckart and Redwood

1 Security. This is necessary expand to Nevada. And to
2 obtain my private investigator's licenses in Nevada to
3 extend my own private investigator's business.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

5 Mr. Berckart.

6 MR. BERCKART: Yes, thank you. So I have a
7 bachelor's in criminal justice back in 2005. I've been
8 in private security management for over 18 years. With
9 the last 14, I served as an area vice president for a
10 large regional company, where I did oversee our
11 operations in parts of northern California as well as
12 southern Nevada for a prior licensee that has since been
13 acquired.

14 I decided to start Redwood Private Security in
15 2020. We're based in California. And like the
16 gentleman before us, we have a lot of clients that are
17 making the move out to Nevada. And we'd like to
18 continue to expand our business out here. And having
19 knowledge of the area, I think, it's a good fit for our
20 company.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you,
22 gentlemen.

23 Board, are there any questions for either
24 gentlemen?

25 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a

1 motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
3 Brown. I move, and I'm going to try to get this in
4 order, that we grant Mr. Noriega a private patrolman
5 license, allow him to place that into abeyance so he may
6 become the qualifying agent for Redwood Private
7 Security, LLC. I also move that we allow the company
8 Redwood Private Security, LLC for a corporate private
9 patrolman license. I also move that we grant
10 Mr. Noriega's application to become -- or to have a
11 private investigator's license, an individual private
12 investigator's license. And then, as part of the
13 motion, I move to allow Mr. Berckart to have corporate
14 member status for Redwood Private Security, LLC.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do
16 I have a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
18 Cortez. I second. And thank you for reading that.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
20 have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

21 (Board members said "aye.")

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.
23 Congratulations, gentlemen. Your request has been
24 granted. The motion passes. The Board staff will
25 contact you for next steps.

1 MR. NORIEGA: Thank you very much. Good
2 afternoon.

3 MR. BERCKART: Thank you. You guys have a
4 great day.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

6 MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, that takes us two
7 trailed items. The first trailed item is for item
8 number 31, where we were, Investigator Lancaster was
9 going to try to get ahold of member Matteson and
10 Puzzuoli.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I thought they were told to
12 call in at 3:00.

13 MR. INGRAM: Well, I have an update from her.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

15 MR. INGRAM: So, Investigator Lancaster, could
16 you go ahead and give us the update on those individuals
17 and whether or not they were actually noticed to appear.

18 MS. LANCASTER: Yes. So I went and looked back
19 at my emails. And they personally were not noticed to
20 appear, because, again, their backgrounds were
21 completely clear. They didn't have any, any issues with
22 them at all. And like I said, in the past, the Board
23 has generally not required corporate officers to appear
24 or be present when there are no issues with their
25 background. So I noticed Michael Hill and the licensee

1 and compliance person but not those two individuals
2 themselves.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you for that update.
4 Board, are there any questions?

5 MR. FLORENCE: Douglas Florence here, just
6 public comment.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, sir, we cannot have
8 public comment during this timeframe.

9 MR. FLORENCE: Okay. Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: M-hm (affirmative).

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do we have to go back
12 to these now and approve them or disapprove them?

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Just that one motion.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We approved one already.
16 We are just working on the membership.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member --
18 sorry.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So seeing that there is no
20 questions from the Board, I will entertain a motion for
21 the trailed item.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
23 Cortez. I move to approve corporate membership for
24 Christopher Matteson and Patrick Puzzuoli, given the
25 updated information.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
2 a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
5 second. All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I'm not sure if
8 they're on, or if Mr. Hill is still on, but the Board
9 will contact you with next steps.

10 MR. INGRAM: The next trailed item on the
11 agenda is agenda item 34. And that was for Perry
12 Bonarrigo and Patrick Kakos. I believe, we're waiting
13 for an email. Is that correct?

14 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. I emailed him,
15 and I haven't received back yet.

16 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Did we ask him to trail at
18 3:00 o'clock as well?

19 MS. IRIZARRY: That's what I emailed him.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we'll come back
21 to that, then.

22 Okay. So now we're at the registration appeals
23 portion. We do need to have counsel swear you in. So
24 all that, everybody that's on the line for registration
25 appeals, please, when you come on, after you swear, when

1 you're called to testify, please make sure that you
2 reference that you understand that you're under oath.

3 Counsel?

4 MR. DETMER: For the record, Mike Detmer.

5 Those who are about to testify, if you can please raise
6 your right hand. Do you hereby swear or affirm to tell
7 the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

8 It's very quiet.

9 (Applicants and witnesses present were
10 sworn/affirmed.)

11 MR. DETMER: And when your item is called,
12 please state and acknowledge that you recognize that you
13 are still under oath.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So thank you all for
15 your patience. And we're very sorry about any
16 inconvenience this caused.

17 So we'll start at agenda item number 42.

18 Mr. Daniel Blanchard, are you on the line?

19 MR. BLANCHARD: Yes, ma'am, I am.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you,
21 Mr. Blanchard. Could you tell us a little bit about
22 yourself.

23 MR. BLANCHARD: My name is Daniel Blanchard. I
24 moved to Vegas in '92, graduated from Las Vegas High
25 School, went into security in 19, went into the casino

1 industry at 21. I've been doing security most of my
2 life. I'm just trying to get back on track and get
3 everything with the license and be good to go in my
4 life.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I understood. Thank you,
6 sir.

7 Board, is there any questions?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
9 Brown. I have a question for Investigator Jones. My
10 note said Mr. Blanchard was denied earlier in 2008. He
11 did not appeal. His current application is where he
12 failed to disclose his felony?

13 MR. JONES: Correct. I do not have the 2008
14 application in front of me. But he did not disclose on
15 the newer application.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

17 And, Mr. Blanchard, can you explain why you
18 failed to disclose those charges?

19 MR. BLANCHARD: The cases have been dismissed.
20 I never, ever got a felony. Till this day, I still
21 have a concealed weapon. I'm still working at Beachside
22 South Casino, and I have like a -- I don't even know
23 what they're called. You know, when you go into the
24 security in the casino, they do backgrounds for like
25 gaming. I have them licenses.

1 I have no felonies on my record. I don't
2 understand when they said that I had a felony. The only
3 thing that I had back in '08, when I was talking to
4 Jordan, was that they said that I got stopped for a
5 case, when I had a concealed weapon, or something like
6 that, charge on me. The only thing that I had in '08 is
7 I stopped a fight, put brass knuckles in my back pocket,
8 forgot I had them. When the officer came to arrest the
9 two people, they found them on my person. I went in. I
10 turned in everything. I did a class in impulse control.
11 I complied with everything they did. I paid a fine.
12 And it was dismissed.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. I'm reading the
14 background, and it shows a 2009, June of 2009 that you
15 were convicted for felony carrying a concealed weapon.
16 It was originally charged as battery with substantial
17 bodily harm, a felony, and that was dismissed per
18 negotiations.

19 MR. BLANCHARD: Right. That was the same case.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

21 MR. BLANCHARD: There was a fight. There was a
22 fight that I was -- I was doing security. There was a
23 fight. I had broke it up. We had got in an altercation
24 with the gentleman. And I had took the brass knuckles
25 out when they showed up. I had kept them in my pocket,

1 not knowing, forgot that I had them. And when they did
2 a search, I had them on my person.

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. I was mistaken.
4 The carrying concealed weapon was a misdemeanor. My
5 question was why didn't you disclose this? If I'm not
6 mistaken, the application states to disclose all arrests
7 regardless of outcome. Now, I'm paraphrasing, because
8 there's several different outcomes that it covers,
9 including a California code that allows them to be
10 dismissed or removed. So why didn't you disclose these
11 when the application says that you have to?

12 MR. BLANCHARD: I wasn't aware of that I had
13 anything like that when I applied. Because I mean,
14 because like I said, I've been doing security almost all
15 my life. I didn't even see that when I filled it out.
16 I only did it one time, only because, the only time I
17 applied for this card now is that my company that I was
18 with, it was an Arizona license that we were working
19 under, and then when they moved to Nevada and got bought
20 out, they told me I needed a guard card. That's the
21 only time that I applied. I don't know when it says
22 something about '08.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
25 questions?

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
2 Cortez. Question for, or clarification, I guess.
3 Investigator Jones. On the first application, did he
4 list the felony then?

5 MR. JONES: It's my understanding he was still
6 going through the 2007 process, so he had not been
7 convicted of anything yet, and it was determined he had
8 an active case. I do have his 2008 application in front
9 of me. I can double-check, if you'd like.

10 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino, for the
11 record. We do have an uploaded application from
12 February 2013 where the applicant did disclose that he
13 is going through a court case.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

15 MR. SALADINO: Put a license on hold. He wrote
16 that on there. And then he also disclosed an '03, '09,
17 2010, a battery, or a robbery, battery and assault, and
18 another 2009 battery as well, on that old application.
19 I think, Investigator Jones is getting confused with the
20 database. There was no date on there. But this was in
21 2013.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So I'm sorry. Did you
23 just mention a 2003?

24 MR. SALADINO: That was on his application from
25 2013, correct.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And the current
2 application I'm looking at right now does not list that,
3 correct?

4 MR. SALADINO: Right.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So this is Board
6 Member Cortez again. Mr. Blanchard, is there a reason
7 why you chose to do it the first time, second time, not
8 the third time, add some, omit some? There's a problem
9 with the inconsistencies that I'm having. These are
10 criminal charges, and you're requesting a work card.
11 You've got to give me something better than I thought
12 they were dismissed, they didn't work. It's very clear
13 in the application, you are to list everything
14 regardless of disposition. It's better to tell us
15 everything versus not. So I'm getting a lot of
16 inconsistency. You've got to help me out here.

17 MR. BLANCHARD: Yes, ma'am. I was told -- and
18 if I put that down, that was probably cases that was in
19 my head from so long ago. And then when I beat the
20 cases or they got dismissed or charged, I, my physical
21 knowledge, thought that it wouldn't show up anymore. I
22 didn't know, when they got dismissed, that they were
23 still pending or anything that you see in your addiction
24 to -- I mean because I went on to continue doing
25 security in my life. So I didn't understand that they

1 were pending or I got charges. Because everything that
2 I gave you guys were just dismissed.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Right. And I understand
4 that. But just so you are understanding where I'm
5 coming from, you need to list everything the exact same
6 way and add whatever you missed to the most current
7 information. You are requesting a work card that
8 involves legal action.

9 MR. BLANCHARD: Yes, ma'am.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: When you have those
11 deficiencies, I can't go with it. Just because you
12 thought they were dismissed or thrown out of court, that
13 doesn't give me enough to approve something that you are
14 well aware of and it's written multiple times. And I'm
15 also aware that the investigators go above and beyond
16 reminding every applicant to list everything.

17 So, Madam Chair, I don't know if there are any
18 other questions. That's all I have.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So are there any
20 other questions from the Board?

21 Hearing no other questions, I'll entertain a
22 motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
24 Cortez. I'm going to motion that we uphold the denial
25 for Mr. Blanchard's work card at this time.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
2 a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
5 second. All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Blanchard, your
8 appeal has been denied. And so you can reapply in a
9 year. I would encourage you, sir, to make sure that you
10 list all arrests and/or convictions. Thank you, sir.
11 Have a great day.

12 MR. BLANCHARD: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr., or Ms. Sheldon, Dawn
14 Sheldon?

15 MS. SHELDON: Yes, I'm here.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Could you
17 please tell us a little bit about yourself.

18 MS. SHELDON: I am a current full-time nursing
19 student right now. I participate greatly within the
20 community. I coach my son's T-ball team and then my
21 son's soccer team. I applied to be a service processor
22 back in November. But, due to my previous criminal
23 history, I had to sit in front of the Board to be able
24 to be granted that. I would like to be granted the card
25 so therefore I can have part-time employment in either

1 the security field or the service processing so that I
2 can support myself through nursing school. I currently
3 work over at the Reno Events Center and through the
4 union doing concerts and all of that effect. And with
5 COVID being lifted and everything, having this card
6 would open up my opportunity to have some extra income
7 while I am in nursing school.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you so much
9 for your information.

10 Board, are there any questions for Ms. Sheldon?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
12 Ms. Sheldon, is there a reason you didn't list all of
13 your arrests?

14 MS. SHELDON: So back in -- it was either
15 October or November when I had put in my application, I
16 had listed down my felony charges that I had out of
17 Washington and my arrests. When we did the FBI criminal
18 background, some, the investigators let me know that
19 there were some things that had come up, that I had just
20 either forgot about or didn't list because I believe
21 there were arrest records. And I know that's not an
22 excuse for any, for omitting it. But I at the time
23 believe I had filled it out to the best of my knowledge.
24 And speaking further with the investigator, I had
25 realized that I omitted those, a couple of those

1 charges. And I was under the impression that they were
2 added to my application since I had to be sitting in
3 front of the Board.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So have you had any
5 kind of arrests with drugs? Have you done any programs
6 for drugs?

7 MS. SHELDON: No, I have not done any programs.
8 I have been, I have been sober since my last arrest,
9 which was in Washington. I believe, that was in 2006.
10 I've been sober since then. I had a wake-up call being
11 arrested there. And having the potential to having
12 prison time faced in front of me, I decided to get
13 sober. And I've no longer had any dealings with any
14 kind of drugs.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Congratulations to you.
16 Now, you say you're in nursing school. What does that
17 mean, nursing school?

18 MS. SHELDON: Right now, I am going to Unitech
19 College here in Reno, Nevada to become a licensed
20 practice nurse. During last year, I was laid off nine
21 different times. And like I had indicated, I do the
22 events. I set up for concerts. I was also a full-time
23 dental assistant. And with COVID, I was laid off so
24 many times, I thought to myself, okay, well, then, maybe
25 I should look for a career that doesn't really have that

1 potential if we were to ever have a pandemic again. I
2 have three children, and I want to be able to support
3 them and be a contributing member of society. And I
4 can't really do that if I continuously am being laid
5 off.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I understand. The
7 thing is, if you're going to school to be an LPN, and
8 that takes a lot of concentration in what you're dealing
9 with, writing and filling out forms and reading forms.
10 And our application says, have you ever been arrested?
11 It doesn't say felony, misdemeanor or anything else.
12 Whatever you've been arrested for. And so it's
13 specific.

14 And I am proud for you that you've been clean
15 all these years and sober. And the three children. But
16 I just worry when you don't list them. That's all.

17 Thank you.

18 MS. SHELDON: Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
20 questions?

21 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
22 motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I move to
24 grant the appeal for Ms. Blanchard. Or Ms. Shelton.
25 I'm sorry.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
2 a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second it, because
4 of time and distance.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So I have a motion.
6 I have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Congratulations,
9 Ms. Sheldon. Your appeal has been overturned.
10 The Board will get in touch with you for next steps.

11 MS. SHELDON: Thank you very much for your
12 consideration. I appreciate it.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're very welcome.
14 The next agenda item, agenda item number 44,
15 Evans.

16 MS. EVANS: Yes, I'm here.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon. Ms. Evans,
18 please tell us a little bit about yourself.

19 MS. EVANS: I just moved back here to Las Vegas
20 from Texas. I was here for five years and moved to
21 Texas. I was there. I was a security officer for three
22 years, well, two and a half years. And right now, I'm
23 working at Amazon. And I'm trying to get my license to
24 do security again. I was a supervisor in Texas at a car
25 lot, Texas Direct Auto Zone.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
2 questions for Ms. Evans?

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
4 Cortez. I have a question for Investigator Jones. I'm
5 reading some information that she refused to make an
6 attempt regarding her arrest history. Can you give me
7 some more information regarding that?

8 MR. JONES: Yes. Give me one moment.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No worries.

10 MR. JONES: This is Investigator Jones. She
11 had provided information from a third-party criminal
12 background search, in which you can pay and have them
13 run a background on you. She provided that and refused
14 to re-fill out the arrest history form, and just
15 provided that in lieu of actually filling out our
16 arrest history form.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So it would be like
18 submitting a resume instead of an application?

19 MR. JONES: I'm not entirely sure that's quite
20 the same, but I suppose so.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. No worries.

22 Board Member Cortez. Mrs. Evans, is there a
23 reason why you decided to forego completing the
24 application as required?

25 MS. EVANS: Not necessarily. I have bad

1 arthritis in my hands. As far as doing a lot of
2 writing, it cramps up real bad. So I did the best I
3 can. So advise from my daughter, she said, "Mom, just
4 why don't you just try to give them the paper." And
5 that's what I showed, well, that's what I was told to
6 do. So. She usually do all the writing for me, but
7 she's working for the Post Office now, and she don't
8 have time for it.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I can appreciate the
10 convenience of doing such. However, requirements are
11 requirements. It is highly inconvenient to fill out
12 redundant information. However, it is a requirement,
13 and it should have been taken care of.

14 MS. EVANS: I'm sorry.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
16 questions for Ms. Evans?

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ms. Evans, since your last
18 incident in 2001, what have you been doing?

19 MS. EVANS: I went to, I moved out where my
20 daughter is. She works for the Post Office right now.
21 She was in the military. After completing my time and
22 everything, my probation, I moved to Tennessee with her,
23 and I baby-sitted military kids, the kids of military
24 parents, while they was -- well, I had one that was
25 deployed. And I had, I have some kids I took care of.

1 And other than that, I went to school, because just I
2 was trying to go for psychology to work with children.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

4 MS. EVANS: And I also wanted to be a drug
5 counselor, after being sober for 20, over 20 years.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, ma'am.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
8 Cortez. I might have missed this, Mrs. Evans, but what
9 are your intentions if you're granted a work card? Do
10 you have employment or an employer --

11 MS. EVANS: Yes.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- on standby? Or what
13 are your intentions?

14 MS. EVANS: Yes, I do, Securitas. I
15 transferred from Texas here. Under the knowledge of
16 knowing what, knowing that I will have a job here, and I
17 transferred here. And when I got here, they say I have
18 to come down and get a card. And I was denied the card
19 because of my background. And so now I've just been
20 like doing Amazon work shifts. But this is getting a
21 little bit too much for me with my arthritis. But I'm
22 sticking in there, 10 hours a day.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

24 MS. EVANS: But I do think I'm going back to
25 Securitas if I get my card.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, ma'am. Any
3 other questions for Ms. Evans?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Ms. Evans,
5 you did the entire three years in federal prison camps?

6 MS. EVANS: No, I did 25 months.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So, yeah, from
8 '97 to February 2000.

9 MS. EVANS: Yes. And I was also was -- I did
10 my parole, my probation. I was released off of
11 probation early, parole early.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. You're not on
13 paper right now?

14 MS. EVANS: No. No. No. I haven't been on
15 paper in years.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That's the only
17 time you built in prison or jail?

18 MS. EVANS: Yes.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so one last
21 question from me. All of this was disclosed, even
22 though it wasn't on the application, it was disclosed
23 and not found by fingerprints, this was disclosed on the
24 original application?

25 MS. EVANS: Yes, it was, it was in the papers.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It was on the original
2 application?

3 MS. EVANS: I don't think I wrote it on the
4 application.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh, I'm sorry. Ma'am, I'm
6 speaking to Investigator Jones.

7 MS. EVANS: Oh, I'm sorry.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, no problem.

9 MR. JONES: No, it was not disclosed.

10 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. The applicant
11 did not specifically hand-write the information on her
12 application.

13 MS. EVANS: Right.

14 MS. IRIZARRY: What she provided, in the lobby,
15 what she provided was a court document -- not court
16 document. She did a third-party background search. She
17 had a history of her criminal record. I gave it back to
18 her and explained to her that you need to list it
19 yourself. And I kind of had to show her what you're
20 looking at on this page and telling her where to write.
21 When she turned in the actual application, what she
22 submitted was just exactly the document she provided me
23 in the lobby, that I told her to hand-write, with the
24 application. So she did disclose. She didn't fill in
25 the gaps.

1 When he denied her her application, yeah, when
2 he denied her work card, he gave her a secondary
3 opportunity to still list her arrests. She filled out
4 the document for her contact info, but she didn't fill
5 in the remainder part where she would have had to have
6 written them again. That's what she provided.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So it was provided, the
8 information was provided before the fingerprints were
9 ran, we didn't find out about this because of the
10 fingerprints?

11 MS. IRIZARRY: Correct.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Got it. Okay.
13 Are there any other questions?

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes. Gronauer.
15 Question for the investigator, or either one. For
16 people with any type of disabilities, where she said she
17 had arthritis, and she disclosed that, that she couldn't
18 write, that would be one thing. But what is our normal
19 handling of this area by the staff?

20 MR. INGRAM: I can't speak to exactly what
21 happened. But if somebody was to come in and -- we're
22 passing mics around, Shannon. The main mic doesn't seem
23 to be working.

24 So general protocol would be, if somebody comes
25 in and they claim that they need assistance with

1 completing the app, we would provide them that
2 assistance. But, you know, if it's not requested, we
3 can't offer, because we don't know what's needed.

4 So as far as what actually transpired, you
5 know, Chief, did she request assistance or any of that?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, what I understand
7 from Ms. Irizarry is that she explained to her that it
8 had to be filled out and gave her a second application
9 to do it. That never happened.

10 MS. IRIZARRY: Correct. Chief Irizarry. If I
11 recall, she never mentioned at the time there a medical
12 situation. She just was having difficulty understanding
13 the document that she provided, what her arrests were.
14 So on, I believe, it was like 10 or so pages, I kind of
15 highlighted, this is the date, this is what it is, you
16 tell me what happened at the end.

17 If there was a situation where I was asked to
18 go before the window and someone said they did have a
19 writing disability, we would most likely advise them
20 they could fill it out online, because you're not
21 requiring to type. But in this situation, I don't
22 recall her ever mentioning a medical problem.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
24 further questions for Ms. Evans or anybody else?

25 Okay. Hearing no other questions, I will

1 entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I
3 make a motion to uphold the denial of Deniese Evans, who
4 applied for registration, and it was denied. She was
5 applying and was denied.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
7 a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
9 Cortez. I'm going to second the motion. And strongly
10 recommend that if you're given yet another opportunity,
11 find someone to fill it out in complete form. I
12 understand it's inconvenient. But it is what it is, and
13 we all have to do what we have to do.

14 I will second the motion for upholding the
15 denial.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a motion. Do I
17 have a second? Or I have a motion. I have a second.
18 All in favor, say "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All opposed, say "nay."
21 Nay.

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Nay.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So can we ask each person
24 individually for their vote? Board Member Gronauer?

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Aye.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board Member Cortez?

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What are you asking for?

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, we didn't hear all of
4 the votes.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yay to deny.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board Member Nixon.
7 I am a nay to deny.

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'm
9 also a nay to deny.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then Board Member
11 Bezick?

12 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Aye.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're an aye. So it's
14 three to two. Okay. Okay. So, unfortunately,
15 Ms. Evans, the denial is upheld. You can apply again in
16 a year. When you do so, please ask someone to help you
17 if you have some sort of challenge filling out the
18 forms.

19 MS. EVANS: Okay. I have a question. Do I get
20 refunded my money for doing the fingerprints and paying
21 for a license?

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, ma'am. You can reapply
23 in a year.

24 MS. EVANS: So I don't have to pay for it?

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, ma'am, you will have

1 to pay again.

2 MS. EVANS: All right. Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Next --

4 MS. EVANS: Have a great day.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You, too.

6 The next agenda item, next agent item, item
7 number 45. And, Mr. Lundquist, are you on the line?

8 MR. LUNDQUIST: Yes. Eric Lundquist, yes,
9 ma'am. Can you hear me?

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, I can. Tell us a
11 little bit about yourself.

12 MR. LUNDQUIST: About a year and a half ago, I
13 contacted a PI in Las Vegas that I used to work for
14 approximately 13, 14 years ago, and he agreed to take me
15 back on. So I then visited the PILB office to see, you
16 know, what the new procedures was, because I went
17 through the old procedure. About 13 years ago or so,
18 like I said, when I worked for him, I worked for also a
19 couple other PI's that is were retired FBI. And all of
20 this was in hopes of working with my dad, who's also
21 retired FBI, and help him with his PI business in
22 Arizona. And, unfortunately, we lost him to cancer.
23 And at that point, my career was basically put on hold.
24 And so I'm trying to get back into it. And I do have
25 the offer to go back and work for a well known PI in

1 Las Vegas.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
3 questions for Mr. Lundquist?

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
5 Cortez. I do have a questions. Mr. Lundquist, can you
6 give me a little bit of background of the incident that
7 occurred in 2009? I believe, all requirements have been
8 satisfied as of last year. However, I would like to
9 know some more information.

10 MR. LUNDQUIST: Yes, absolutely. Most
11 importantly, what took place took place entirely within
12 my home, which I felt needed to be protected. And more
13 importantly, the people in my home, we considered
14 ourselves a family unit. And, you know, there were two
15 men who had refused to leave. It was late in the
16 evening. And I felt as though they were potentially a
17 threat to myself, my roommate and friend and her
18 10-year-old daughter.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The two individuals that
20 you're talking about, were they roommates? Or I'm a
21 little confused. Was this amongst family members?

22 MR. LUNDQUIST: No. No. To me, one of them
23 was a complete stranger, and the other one was a person
24 that I'd only met one time.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. I think, I have an

1 idea. All right. Thank you.

2 MR. LUNDQUIST: Thank you.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

4 Mr. Lundquist, what have you been doing since 2020?

5 MR. LUNDQUIST: I'm having trouble hearing you,
6 but, I believe, you asked me what have I been doing
7 since a certain date?

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, just in the last
9 two years, what have you been doing?

10 MR. LUNDQUIST. Oh. Well, for the past five
11 years, I've had a steady job in upstate New York. But
12 it's a job that is low-paying. You know, beautiful
13 area, nice benefits, nonmonetary benefits, you know, but
14 not a good paying job. And it's well past time for me
15 to start saving for retirement.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
17 Cortez. Exactly what kind of job was it? I didn't get
18 the specifics to your job duties.

19 MR. LUNDQUIST: Oh. Oh, well, it's unrelated.
20 I was a working at a bicycle shop, a hobby of mine, a
21 habit of mine, something I've done off and on since I
22 was in high school.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

24 MR. LUNDQUIST: Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further

1 questions from the Board?

2 Okay. Hearing further questions, I'll
3 entertain a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'd
5 like to make a motion to grant Erik Lundquist his
6 registration.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
8 Cortez. I will second the motion to overturn.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have
10 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Mr. Lundquist,
13 your appeal has been overturned or granted. And the
14 Board will, the Board staff will contact you with next
15 steps.

16 MR. LUNDQUIST: Thank you very much.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. Congratulations.

18 MR. LUNDQUIST: Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gina Crowder. Ms. Crowder,
20 are you on the line?

21 MS. CROWDER: Yes, I am.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do you understand you're
23 under oath?

24 MS. CROWDER: Yes, ma'am.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Tell us a

1 little bit about yourself.

2 MS. CROWDER: Yes. I am a licensed realtor in
3 New Jersey and was just recently licensed here in
4 Nevada. I moved to Las Vegas last September. And I've
5 applied for a work card to be a mystery shopper to
6 supplement my income.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
8 questions?

9 So I'll ask Investigator Jones. I'm not sure
10 if it's real clear with this. Did the applicant
11 disclose this prior to the fingerprints on the actual
12 application?

13 MS. JONES: Investigator Jones. Yes, she did.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then I'm not
15 sure I understand what a PC 1203.4 is.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Penal code.

17 MR. INGRAM: Penal Code, California.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh, is that the one that --

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: California Penal Code.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gotcha. Okay. Okay. Are
21 there any further questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
23 Cortez. Mrs. Crowder, could I get a real brief synopsis
24 of what occurred? What was the embezzlement about?

25 MS. CROWDER: Yes. I was 18 years old. This

1 happened in 1983. I was working in a store and took
2 some money, because I was unable to pay my rent, instead
3 of going to my parents, which I was estranged from at
4 the time. And I was convicted. And I served time
5 served. I had one year probation. And that was
6 completed. I applied for expungement in 1993, I
7 believe, which was granted. And I've had no further
8 arrests or any type of legal issues since that time.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Who was the employer?

10 MR. LUNDQUIST: I'm sorry?

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Who was the employer
12 where the incident occurred?

13 MS. CROWDER: I believe, it was Foxmoor was the
14 name of the store or corporation, I believe,
15 F-O-X-M-O-O-R, I believe. I'm not totally sure, but, I
16 believe, that's what it was.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. No worries. Thank
18 you.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
20 questions?

21 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a
22 motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
24 Cortez. I motion to overturn the denial for
25 Ms. Crowder's work card.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
2 a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. Second.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion.
5 We have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. For the record,
8 Ms. Crowder, your motion has been overturned. Or I'm
9 sorry. Your appeal has been overturned. Your denial
10 has been overturned.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations. The Board
12 will be in touch with you.

13 MS. CROWDER: Thank you very much.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're very welcome. Have
15 a great day.

16 Agenda item number 47, Harvey Boyer?

17 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Boyer, are you on the phone?
18 Last call, Harvey Boyer?

19 Do you want to trail?

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, we'll trail agenda
21 item 47 for the end of the meeting.

22 Agenda item number 48, Jesse Ellington?

23 MR. ELLINGTON: Jesse Ellington here.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon, sir. Tell
25 us a little bit about yourself. Oh, sir, could you

1 please confirm, do you understand you're under oath?

2 MR. ELLINGTON: Can you repeat that, please?

3 MR. INGRAM: Have you been sworn in?

4 MR. ELLINGTON: Yes. Yes, I have.

5 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, tell us a little bit
7 about yourself.

8 MR. ELLINGTON: Well, basically, I've been in
9 the real estate business since 2001. And I donate a lot
10 of my time working, volunteer my time in the juvenile
11 detention centers in Atlanta and Cleveland, Ohio. I
12 moved to Las Vegas with my wife in December of 2012.
13 Worked for Delta for four years. Worked for a security
14 company as a supervisor. When I moved here, that's when
15 I found out about these cases that was on my record.

16 Now I'm working for an agency as an account
17 manager overseeing their accounts, their employees, for
18 a temporary vacancy.

19 (Outside interruption, loud music.)

20 MR. ELLINGTON: Hello?

21 MR. INGRAM: Hold on just a second.

22 So everybody, please stand by, if you can hear
23 us. Somebody's placed their phone on hold.

24 Okay. Whoever's on there, please do not place
25 your phone on hold. Place your phone on mute. Thank

1 you.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That was good music.

3 MR. INGRAM: So we're back to Mr. Ellington.

4 MR. ELLINGTON: Yes. Yeah, so since I've been
5 here in Las Vegas, I'm working this particular job and
6 also working with the youth from the age of 10 to 21 in
7 physical training and career training. That's,
8 basically, the gist of my life up until today's date.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

10 Are there any questions for Mr. Ellington?

11 Okay. So just so that I'm clear, Mr. Jones,
12 Investigator Jones, was this information disclosed prior
13 to fingerprints, or did we find this out based off the
14 fingerprints?

15 MR. ELLINGTON: I disclosed. Well, when I
16 initially, back in, I guess, 2014, applied --

17 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Ellington?

18 MR. ELLINGTON: Yes?

19 MR. INGRAM: That, that question was for the
20 investigator. I'm sorry.

21 MR. ELLINGTON: Oh. Oh, okay. Thank you.

22 MR. JONES: This is Investigator Jones.
23 Everything was disclosed initially on the application.
24 And he did provide court documents for one of the
25 arrests when requested.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

2 Are there any further questions?

3 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
4 entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move
6 that we grant the work card registration for
7 Mr. Ellington.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. I have a
9 motion. Do we have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
11 Cortez. I will second the motion to overturn the denial
12 and grant the work card.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
14 have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

15 (Board members said "aye.")

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

17 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Brown stepped out. He
18 won't vote on this.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh, okay.

20 MR. INGRAM: Board Chair, just for consistency
21 sake, in the past, the Board will usually put on the
22 record why they're willing to grant or uphold the
23 appeal. Could we get a little clarification on why
24 we're granting this appeal.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

1 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Bezick, would you like to
2 elaborate on why you would like to grant the appeal?

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Time and distance.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: There you go.

5 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

7 Okay. So the appeal is granted.

8 Congratulations, Mr. Ellington. The Board will contact
9 you with further information.

10 MR. ELLINGTON: Okay. Thank you. And you guys
11 have a great day.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You, too.

13 MR. INGRAM: You as well.

14 MR. ELLINGTON: Okay.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Joseph Arell,
16 are you on the line, sir?

17 MR. ARELL: Yes, ma'am, I am. This is Joseph
18 Arell, and I understand I'm still under oath.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Tell us a
20 little bit about yourself.

21 MR. ARELL: Well, my name is Joseph Arell. I
22 moved up here to Las Vegas, Nevada back 15 years ago, in
23 2006. And I've been doing security work ever since.
24 I've done everything in security, armed security,
25 unarmed security. I've been a supervisor two different

1 times. Very well-rounded. And this is what I do for a
2 living.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
4 questions for Mr. Arell?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
6 Mr. Arell, you stated that you were doing security for
7 some time here in Nevada?

8 MR. ARELL: That's correct, sir, yes.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have a work
10 card?

11 MR. ARELL: I do not. That's part of the
12 problem. Of course, that's why I'm filing the appeal.
13 I've been working mainly under the gaming, Gaming
14 Control Board working security in the casinos. And for
15 the past seven years, I've been working for a slot route
16 company doing armed security, transporting money around
17 town, and doing jackpot payouts and so forth. And I'm
18 trying to branch out and get out of the gaming industry.
19 And I'm trying to do something like more like contract
20 security. That's why I'm applying for the PILB card.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Not a problem. That
22 just clears it up. That's all. Thank you.

23 MR. ARELL: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
25 Cortez. I have a question for Investigator Jones. I

1 think that Mr. Arell was denied a card back in 2012. Do
2 you happen to know the reason why? I mean it says
3 weapon. So what was the outcome of that? Was it upheld
4 or denied and that was the decision?

5 MR. JONES: This is Investigator Jones. I
6 would have to check the database and let you know
7 momentarily what the outcome was.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That's okay. We can, I'd
9 like to ask Mr. Arell. Could you elaborate on that
10 information? Why were you denied back in 2012?

11 MR. ARELL: Yes, ma'am. Back in 2012, I was
12 denied because I did not disclose on my original
13 application with you guys that I had a deadly weapon
14 charge, possession of a dirk or a dagger, through the
15 state of California. And the reason why I did not put
16 it on my application is because I filed for expungement
17 when I first moved up here to Las Vegas. And I was told
18 by the California court system that it would never show
19 up on my record again. And after I applied, it did show
20 up on my record.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you so
22 much.

23 MR. ARELL: You're welcome.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any further
25 questions from the Board?

1 MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair?

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes?

3 MR. INGRAM: Just for clarification, he made a
4 statement. Mr. Arell, you had stated the reason for
5 wanting to get a work card was that you wanted to get
6 into contract security. Do you understand that you're
7 applying for a registered work card and not for a
8 license? What that means is when you have a registered
9 work card, it's much like being registered with the
10 Gaming Control Board. You will only be able to work
11 security for a company that is licensed in Nevada. You
12 could not work as an independent contractor. Are you
13 aware of that?

14 MR. ARELL: Oh, yes, sir, I am. Yes, I am.

15 MR. INGRAM: Okay. Thank you very much. I
16 just wanted to clarify that.

17 MR. ARELL: Yes, sir. Yeah, the application I
18 put in for was for actually for Loomis, being an armored
19 service technician. That's the most recent application
20 I've put in for.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Madam Chair.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

23 Okay. Are there any further questions for
24 Mr. Arell?

25 Okay. No further questions, I'll entertain a

1 motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
3 Cortez. I motion to overturn the denial and grant
4 Mr. Arell his work card based on the case being closed,
5 disposition, everything has been taken care of. Time
6 and distance.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do we
8 have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
10 Brown. I'll second.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. We have a
12 motion. We have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations, Mr. Arell.
15 Your appeal has been granted. The Board will contact
16 you with next steps.

17 MR. ARELL: Thank you very much. I appreciate
18 everything.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Have a
20 good day.

21 MR. ARELL: You, too.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda item number 50.
23 Joshua Kimbell, are you on the line, sir?

24 MR. KIMBELL: Yes, ma'am. Joshua Joseph
25 Kimbell, and I understand that I am under oath.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you for that, sir.
2 Tell us a little bit about yourself.

3 MR. KIMBELL: Yes. My name is Joshua Joseph
4 Kimbell. At the age of 18 I became an EMT and went to
5 school to become an EMT for Remsa Washoe Medical Center.
6 At the age of 21 I got a DUI on my 21st birthday and
7 spent a couple nights in jail. Got into the night life
8 downtown working as a bouncer and bartender and barback.
9 Hung around some undesirable people. And in 2011, I was
10 charged and convicted for robbery with a deadly weapon.
11 I spent six years in the Nevada Department of
12 Corrections, an additional three years on parole.

13 Since then, I'm no longer on paper. I haven't
14 been in any trouble. I currently work for Bristlecone
15 Family Resources as a treatment aid and medical tech,
16 providing services for veterans and ex-felons that are
17 in treatment for alcohol and drug addiction. And I am
18 looking to obtain my card. In 2018, I started my own
19 LLC, Back Office Management Solutions. And my goal is
20 to obtain my PILB for purposes of sales, client
21 relations, marketing and IT for security companies.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
23 questions for Mr. Kimbell?

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
25 Cortez. Investigator Jones, I'm seeing that there was

1 some denials in 2010 and 2019 based on the fact that
2 Mr. Kimbell was possibly on probation. What's the
3 status of that now?

4 MR. JONES: This is Investigator Jones. Can
5 you provide clarification of exactly what you're looking
6 for?

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Is Mr. Kimbell on
8 probation?

9 MR. JONES: No, he is not on probation.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So everything
11 closed. Well, because I see he was granted a
12 provisional back in 2019, but he wasn't able to move
13 forward because he was possibly still going in the legal
14 system. And then during the provisional, everything got
15 notified, then he was terminated. So now we're back
16 again. Is that correct, is that what I'm understanding
17 that's happening?

18 MR. JONES: Correct. He is totally off paper
19 as of 2020.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

21 MR. INGRAM: For the record, the reason he was
22 made provisional in 2019 is because he failed to
23 disclose on his application. So when fingerprints came
24 back, the provisional was revoked at that time for
25 failure to disclose. Now he's coming back, and he is

1 disclosing.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What was it, was there
3 anything at the time of the initial application, or was
4 it just the misdemeanor?

5 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry.

6 MR. INGRAM: We're getting it. We're passing
7 it down (mic).

8 MS. IRIZARRY: To repeat that, Shannon, I was
9 just clarifying, does she want to know if he listed
10 anything in 2019. That's what she was asking. And from
11 what I see, so there was a 2010 and 2019. So in 2019.

12 Jordan, if you have his 2019.

13 I'm sorry. So I'm looking at the note from
14 back then. It says applicant -- this is for the two
15 thousand -- yeah, 2019. Applicant needs to disclose two
16 arrests. So I'm assuming that he did not.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then, if I
18 understand this correctly, he did not come and appeal in
19 2020.

20 MS. IRIZARRY: No, in 2019, when he originally
21 applied, he did not disclose that he was made
22 provisional. It was realized in the fingerprints. So
23 they said it was denied, come back when you are off of
24 paper. He reapplied, and he got off paper in January of
25 2020. So he is reapplying today, saying everything is

1 all done, can I get the card now.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Perfect. Okay. So
3 my question, Mr. Kimbell, is why did you not disclose
4 during your 2019 application?

5 MR. KIMBELL: Under my 2019 application, I'm
6 pretty sure that I disclosed my six-year, my major
7 felony. Anything that wasn't disclosed, I do not have
8 any excuses for and I take full responsibility for.

9 MS. IRIZARRY: In 2019, he did not disclose it
10 this time around.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But in 2019, did he
12 disclose the six-year?

13 MS. IRIZARRY: 2019, he did not. That's why he
14 was made provisional.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, sir, in 2019,
16 you didn't disclose your felony.

17 MR. KIMBELL: Yes, ma'am. Okay. I do not have
18 any excuse for that, and I do accept full responsibility
19 for that.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right. Thank
21 you.

22 All right. Any other questions from the Board?
23 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
24 motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll

1 make a motion. First of all, Mr. Kimbell, I'm just
2 going to say, I have to applaud you for putting yourself
3 back on your feet and going in the right direction after
4 six years of prison. That's pretty tough to do and come
5 back into society and do the things you've been trying
6 to do to help yourself and other people. So with that,
7 that's commendable. Time and distance right now after
8 you got off probation in January 2020.

9 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. So while I
10 was -- I read through the note. His application now I
11 just pulled up for me. We're working remotely. I
12 apologize. In 2019, he did disclose it on his
13 application. He did it online. And I do see that he
14 did list it. He writes 4-27-11, armed robbery, out of
15 Reno. He writes the sentencing was sentenced to two to
16 six years in the NDOC 4-11 to 4 of '17. He also
17 discloses arrest dates 4-27 of '11. Oh, I'm sorry. He
18 listed it twice. Repeated it twice. He did list it in
19 2019. Okay.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'll continue
21 with my motion, then, because that was the reason I'm
22 going to go. I'd like to grant your appeal. I believe,
23 you've done everything correctly up to this point, from
24 the time you got yourself straightened out, out of
25 prison. Coming out of prison, it's tough to do, to

1 reintegrate into society and do a good thing. And so
2 with that, I commend you.

3 MR. KIMBELL: Thank you, sir.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So your motion is to?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: To grant the appeal.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: To grant the appeal. Okay.

7 I have a motion. Do I have a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
9 Cortez. I will second that motion.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
11 second. All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So congratulations,
14 Mr. Kimbell. Your appeal has been upheld. And you will
15 receive your work card. The Board will be, or the Board
16 staff will be in touch with you shortly on next steps.

17 MR. KIMBELL: Thank you to all the Board
18 members. I've worked really hard these past couple
19 years up to this point. I know this may be small to
20 some people, but this really means the world to me. I
21 greatly thank you for your understanding.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. Thank you, sir. And
23 best of luck to you. Congratulations.

24 MR. KIMBELL: Thank you. Have a nice day.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda item number 51.

1 Mr. Jackson, are you with us?

2 MR. JACKSON: Yes, ma'am, I am.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Do you understand,
4 sir, that you're under oath?

5 MR. JACKSON: Yes, ma'am, I do.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you. Tell us
7 a little bit about yourself.

8 MR. JACKSON: My name is Richard Jackson. I'm
9 a native of Las Vegas, Nevada, been there all my life,
10 born and raised. I worked various jobs throughout my
11 life. Back in 2005, I got a job at the Las Vegas Mini,
12 Mini Grand Prix. Sorry, I'm a little nervous. Mini
13 Grand Prix, doing security. So I did security there for
14 like five years, from like 2005 to 2010. They have a
15 new manager that came in, and they cleaned house, so.

16 After that, I worked labor union, I mean not
17 labor union, labor, labor, labor jobs, doing odd jobs
18 for -- I'm sorry. I just have a brain fog. But,
19 anyway, I did labor jobs. And I ran into a guy in the
20 store, and he was working for a security agency. I got
21 a job doing -- get an application with them, started
22 working with them. They was called Secure Force. I did
23 like six years with them. Again, they came across --
24 they were based out of Arizona. So they said they
25 didn't have to have a guard card. So I did the

1 application. I did like five or six years with them.
2 And then, I guess, the company decided to go to -- they
3 got a -- so I lost my job with them.

4 So I came to apply for a work card to try to go
5 to the new company, which was All Pro, I think, All Pro.
6 And here I am. I'm just applying. And I'm trying to
7 see, can I, you know, keep working and, you know, take
8 care of my family. I've been with my spouse for 35
9 years, five kids. Just had one graduate last week. Got
10 the last one, my youngest one, he graduates next year.
11 I'm just trying to stay productive in society and keep a
12 job and keep, you know, keep a roof over my kids' head,
13 you know.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

15 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Jackson?

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I have a -- this is Board
17 Member Cortez. I do have a question for counsel. For
18 Kevin. What has past practices been, or what have other
19 situations been when we have a registered sex offender,
20 with granting an appeal? The reason why I'm asking is
21 because, in my head, I grant you an appeal, and he
22 actually already indicated that he will be working, or
23 he has worked at Mini Grand Prix, where it's
24 predominantly family, children-oriented business. What
25 has been past practices, or has a case like that been

1 for the Board discussion?

2 MR. DETMER: I would say -- Mike Detmer, for
3 the record. It's Board discretion. It's
4 qualifications, good moral character, all the
5 considerations designated by statute or regulation.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it.

7 MR. DETMER: All that gets factored into
8 consideration.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, can I ask, are you
11 currently registered?

12 MR. JACKSON: Yes, ma'am.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any other questions
14 from the Board?

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
16 Cortez again. What have you been doing, well, what were
17 you doing between 1996 and 2021, what were you doing
18 during that time frame? I know it's been a while, but
19 I'm just kind of curious.

20 MR. JACKSON: Oh, I've done various jobs, from
21 cooking and cooking in the hotel-casinos. I do various
22 jobs. I worked at a car auction. Anything I could do
23 to keep, you know, to keep working. I worked for Labor
24 Ready for years. Man, I just do whatever I can.
25 Whenever I can fill out an application, I get a job, I

1 go to work. That's what I do. I even worked doing
2 delivery driver for a flower shop.

3 You know, I really do understand my position
4 because of my background, of what I've been through.
5 But that's a lot of years behind me. I've never been in
6 any more trouble since then, nothing like, nothing in
7 that character. I just try to do what I can to survive
8 and keep going. That's what I do. You know, it's -- I
9 mean, you know, I walk with my head up, and I just go
10 in, and I just pray, and I just go in the door and fill
11 out the application and pray for the best outcome. I do
12 whatever I can. I don't have no choice of work.
13 Whenever I fill out an application and they hire me,
14 that's what I do. That's where I'm at, till the door
15 close.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

17 Are there any other questions for Mr. Jackson?

18 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a
19 motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Can I ask a question
21 before a motion, please, Madam Chair?

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sure.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Jackson, this is
24 Board Member Gronauer.

25 MR. JACKSON: Yes, sir.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I believe, you said
2 you're married and have children now?

3 MR. JACKSON: Well, I'm not legally married,
4 but I've been with my wife 35 years, since 1986. We
5 have kids, yes.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Consistent, like no
7 break in that, you've just been with her that long?

8 MR. JACKSON: No, I've been with her that long,
9 yeah.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Well, I
11 guess, you're married. Okay. No problem.

12 MR. JACKSON: Yes, sir. Yes, sir, I'm married.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No problem. I just
14 wanted to make sure. And how old are your children?

15 MR. JACKSON: My oldest, my oldest child is 37.
16 My youngest child is 16.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.
18 I appreciate it.

19 MR. JACKSON: M-hm (affirmative).

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any other questions
21 from the Board?

22 MR. JACKSON: Me? Are you talking to me?

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, sir, I'm asking the
24 Board.

25 MR. JACKSON: Oh, I'm sorry.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No problem.

2 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll call
3 for a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion.
5 It's Gronauer. I started to write 51-49 on this here.
6 The 51 percent is to grant the appeal. So that's my
7 motion, to grant the appeal of Mr. Jackson.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
10 Cortez. I'm right there with you, Board
11 Member Gronauer. I am going to second the motion to
12 approve the work card.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It had to do with time
14 and distance in my motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct. I'm with you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
17 second. I have one question before. Investigator
18 Jones, was this on his application or found via
19 fingerprints?

20 MR. JONES: He did disclose it prior to
21 fingerprints.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And the same thing
23 with his -- okay. Thank you.

24 I have a motion. I have a second. All in
25 favor?

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Congratulations,
3 Mr. Jackson. Please, you know, don't make us regret
4 this. You know, we're really on the border with this
5 one. So please, you know, don't make us regret this.
6 But your appeal has been granted. You will be issued a
7 work card.

8 MR. JACKSON: I sure thank you. I thank you to
9 all the council. A I promise you, I promise you with
10 everything that you will not regret this.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

12 MR. JACKSON: Thank you. You don't know what
13 you just done, the weight that you just took off me.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good luck to you, sir.

15 MR. JACKSON: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So the Board, if don't
17 mind, I'd like to do agenda item number 52 and then
18 maybe take a 10-minute bio break.

19 Okay. So agenda item number 52. Shamell
20 Taylor, are you on the line?

21 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, I am. Good afternoon.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon, sir.
23 Please tell us a little bit about yourself.

24 MR. TAYLOR: Okay. My name is Shamell Taylor.
25 I'm originally a security guard at Allied Universal.

1 I've been working with them for a year and three months
2 now. And, basically, I had other jobs before this. I
3 used to work for Panera Bread in 2015, no, 2016 for four
4 years. Before that, I was working in a deli store from
5 2010 to 2016. So practically I've been working for like
6 the past 11 years.

7 I'm basically now, I'm trying to relocate with
8 Allied as we speak. So I'm trying to relocate with them
9 in Vegas. I came down to Vegas last year on vacation to
10 visit my nephews. Because I have nieces and nephews
11 that look up to me. So I was just wondering, you know,
12 I would like try to relocate with them. And, basically,
13 I've been with Allied for a minute. I've been working
14 with, I work with Fox at different sites with them. So
15 now I'm working at the UPS building with them now, as we
16 speak.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.
18 Board, are there any questions?

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
20 Brown. Mr. Taylor, why did you fail to disclose a
21 number of your arrests?

22 MR. TAYLOR: A number of my arrests? Okay. So
23 when I read the application, there was one question that
24 it kind of like it confused me a little bit. Because it
25 said, it was something about my felony one. But I have

1 all my disposition papers. And I sent in a pill
2 package.

3 And I have -- so, basically, my last other two
4 I had were 2015 for violation, a pair of tickets.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, I think, the question,
6 and I don't feel that you've answered it -- Board Member
7 Brown, if I overstep you, please let me know. But you
8 did not disclose them on the application. And the
9 application is very clear in that it states list all
10 arrests or convictions. And yours are recent. So,
11 again, why did you not disclose?

12 MR. TAYLOR: Well, so I'm going to explain that
13 a little bit more. So I totally forgot that. Because I
14 figured that if they gave me -- that's the pair of
15 tickets. These were violations, that they was not going
16 to actually pop up, because they were sealed. And I
17 pleaded guilty to time served and community service.
18 And then I got, that's the pair of tickets for those.
19 And those were violations. So, I guess, that was a
20 mistake that I didn't put on my application. And I'm
21 sorry about that.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Taylor, this is Board
23 Member Cortez. I've got five different incidences where
24 you failed to disclose, not just one. And I do see that
25 you provided your packet that included character

1 reference letters and two security guard training
2 certificates. Again, the question is, why did you fail
3 to disclose any of your criminal history, not one, but
4 all of them? If your answer is you just don't know, you
5 forgot, you admit it, then I need to hear something of
6 that line.

7 MR. TAYLOR: All right. So maybe I made a
8 mistake, and I probably didn't like recognize. So it's
9 my mistake that I didn't like give you all the
10 information that I was supposed to. And I apologize for
11 that.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

14 MR. TAYLOR: You're welcome.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

16 Investigator Jones, does Mr. Taylor currently have a
17 work card, and is he currently working?

18 MR. JONES: He does not currently have a work
19 card. He is still located in New York. And to provide
20 earlier clarification on why he did not disclose, during
21 a phone conversation with Mr. Taylor, he believed that
22 there was a statute of limitations of seven years, which
23 is part of the reason why he did not disclose.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Fair enough. Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any

1 further questions for Mr. Taylor?

2 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Yeah, this is Bezick.
3 Mr. Jones, I think, five of your arrests were for
4 controlled substances. Are you sober now?

5 MR. TAYLOR: Yeah, they're still convictions.

6 MR. BEZICK: You're sober now, you no longer
7 use drugs?

8 MR. TAYLOR: No. I am drug-free. I work
9 security. I've been with them for a year and a half.
10 And I just want to relocate and try to get my pill call
11 so I could like, you know, be able to, you know, take
12 care of my nephews when I'm out there. And I still have
13 family, relatives out there that want to see me. So
14 that's why I'm taking this time to talk with you and
15 explain myself.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.
17 Board, are there any further questions?

18 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
19 entertain a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'd
21 make a motion to deny the work card for Mr. Taylor. And
22 the reason for that is staying consistent with failure
23 to disclose.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
25 a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I have a question. This
2 is Board Member Cortez. I have a question again. Has
3 there been past precedence as far as time and distance,
4 or is that more discussion?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: More of a discussion.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
8 have a second. Or I have a motion. Do I have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll
10 second.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
12 have a second. All in favor of upholding the denial,
13 say "aye."

14 (Board members said "aye.")

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion is
16 upheld. Sir, I would encourage you to try again in a
17 year. Please read the application thoroughly and make
18 sure that you state all of your convictions, arrests,
19 anything. It's better for us to know than for us to
20 find out.

21 MR. TAYLOR: Well, I thank you. Have a nice
22 day.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

24 So at this point, we're going to take a
25 10-minute break. We'll be back at 1:45.

1 MR. FOMBY: I have a question. Sorry to
2 interrupt.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir, real quick.

4 MR. FOMBY: My name is Charles Fomby. I was
5 scheduled at 12:30. But you all are aware that I'm
6 here, right?

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir. You're coming up
8 in about two, you're --

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Three.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Three more down. Two more
11 down. One was trailed.

12 MR. FOMBY: Okay. Great. Because I have to go
13 get my girl around like 2:50.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We'll do our best, sir.

15 MR. INGRAM: All right. So we're on a
16 10-minute break. We'll be back at 1:45. You're welcome
17 to stay on the phone.

18 MR. PERRY: Okay. I have a question, too.
19 Brandon Perry.

20 MR. INGRAM: We're on a break. We're not
21 answering any more questions right now. Thank you.

22 MR. PERRY: Yes, sir. Yes, sir.

23 * * * * *

24 (A break was taken, 1:34 to 1:52 p.m.)

25 * * * * *

1 MR. INGRAM: Okay. We're back on the record.

2 Shannon, are you ready to go?

3 THE REPORTER: Yes, I am, Kevin. I'm ready to
4 go. Thank you.

5 MR. INGRAM: Thank you so much.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thanks, everyone.

7 So right now, we're on agenda item number 53,
8 but that has been trailed. So agenda item 53 has been
9 trailed.

10 We'll move on to agenda item number 54.
11 Brandon Perry, are you on the line?

12 MR. PERRY: Yes. Yes, I am.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, do you understand that
14 are you under oath?

15 MR. PERRY: Yes.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

17 So we are going to move to Investigator
18 Saladino. Could you tell us a little bit about
19 Mr. Perry's background.

20 MR. SALADINO: This is Investigator Saladino.
21 The applicant was denied for nondisclosure of a 2009
22 aggravated unlawful use of a weapon, slash, possession
23 of a firearm, invalid firearm owner's ID, out of
24 Illinois. The applicant received two years of
25 probation. Probation started on 5-25 of '09 and ended

1 on 5-25-2011. The applicant did not list the arrest and
2 the conviction. Once I contacted the applicant
3 regarding it, he did provide court documents showing the
4 disposition of the case and that his probation had been
5 completed.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
7 questions for Mr. Perry?

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
9 Cortez. Mr. Perry, is there a reason why you failed to
10 disclose such until asked?

11 MR. PERRY: Well, I apologize about that. I
12 was like, I was rushing. I was rushing the application.
13 And like filling out applications is not really my
14 strong point. And I apologize for overlooking it,
15 because I was rushing it. You know, I have a learning
16 disability. I learn differently. And I'm slightly,
17 like slightly dyslexic. So I apologize if I didn't
18 properly put it on there. So please forgive me for
19 that.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any other
21 questions for Mr. Perry?

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
23 Mr. Perry, good afternoon to you. What have you been
24 doing in the past five years or so?

25 MR. PERRY: Well, I worked at McDonald's in

1 2013. From there, I did jobs like at temp services, out
2 of temp services working for the Thomason Bank, working
3 for Sam Boyd Stadium, cleaning stadiums. From there, I
4 worked at Taco Bell for two years as a cashier. And
5 from there, I worked more temp services. And after
6 that, I was a facility manager at EOS Fitness out here.
7 Have you heard of that company, EOS Fitness?

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. EOS.

9 MR. PERRY: EOS, yeah. We called it EO's.
10 But, yeah, EOS Fitness. I was a facility manager there,
11 sales rep when I moved there, and they ended up
12 promoting me to a different position as a manager there.
13 And I had to leave there due to the COVID situation.
14 And right now, as of right now, I work at 7-Eleven. And
15 I also do Lyft. And I have a business in crypto
16 currency as well.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Hold on. You've
18 said that you had a learning ability. Well, just to get
19 into crypto, you've got to have some, a little bit
20 better than a disability of learning, let me tell you.

21 MR. PERRY: Yeah, it's challenging. I don't
22 back down from a challenge. Because I have kids, you
23 know. I have two kids I raised since they were little.
24 I have a son that lives with a different mother, with my
25 ex-wife. And me and my wife got a kid on the way right

1 now. So I can't allow my disability to stop me. I just
2 have to work a little more harder than the next person.
3 But I'm willing to show my kids that I'm willing to be
4 the best role model I can be. I learned not to try, but
5 I learned to give. You know, my kids are depending on
6 me. You know, my background situation, I was young. I
7 didn't have responsibility. I didn't realize, later
8 now, how much it was going to affect me. But I have a
9 house. I have two, and I have mouths to feed. And they
10 depend on me every day, and they look at me, they say
11 where am I going, "Daddy," ask me, "Daddy, where are you
12 going?" "I'm going to work."

13 I'm not going to the streets. I'm being the
14 best father I can be and the best example I can be, and
15 my kids will really look up to me.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Perry. Okay.
17 Mr. Perry, I'm just going to cut you short a little bit.
18 Explain the firearms.

19 MR. PERRY: So I was at the wrong place at the
20 wrong time. I was holding, I was holding the gun for a
21 friend. And somebody, I guess, somebody saw them give
22 me the gun. And they told. So I was young. I
23 panicked. I didn't know what to do. So I ran, you
24 know, because I'd never been in trouble prior to that.
25 And they charged me with the unlawful use. I never used

1 it. I just had possession of it. I didn't know
2 nothing, I didn't know anything about the system. I was
3 just nervous. I just wanted to get out of jail, because
4 I'd never been arrested. And I was young. I didn't
5 know nothing about the system. I didn't know that. I
6 didn't have a lawyer, you know.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay. I'm going
8 to cut you off again. I understand. You were 23 years
9 old at the time.

10 MR. PERRY: Yeah.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So I'm just trying to
12 figure it out. That's not like being a little child.

13 MR. PERRY: Yeah.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And, you know, taking a
15 gun from somebody to hold it for them, it's like taking
16 drugs from somebody to hold it for them. It's not mine,
17 it's theirs. Okay. Thank you.

18 MR. PERRY: Yeah. Yes, sir.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any more
20 questions?

21 Mr. Perry, one question from me. How long have
22 you been in Nevada?

23 MR. PERRY: I've been in Nevada since 2012, of
24 November.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Any other

1 questions for Mr. Perry?

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: One more. Mr. Perry,
3 this is Gronauer again. Do you have a work card now?

4 MR. PERRY: No. I had a work card. Yes, I had
5 one, but it was postponed due to the appeal.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, I see. You had a
7 provisional, and almost two weeks later it was denied
8 again, okay, was terminated from Custom Security. All
9 right. Thank you.

10 MR. PERRY: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. If there's no other
12 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I
14 make a motion to deny the appeal by Mr. Perry for
15 nondisclosure, just keeping with what we, or I've done
16 mainly in the past.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
18 a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
20 Brown. Hesitantly, I will second based on past
21 practices.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
23 have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Unfortunately, Mr. Perry,

1 at this time, we're going to decline your appeal.
2 Please try again in a year, and make sure that you get
3 assistance that you need with the application. But
4 please make sure you disclose everything.

5 MR. PERRY: Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda item number
7 55, Mr. Fomby. Mr. Charles Fomby, are you on the line?

8 MR. FOMBY: Yes, this is Mr. Fomby.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Thank you
10 for your patience.

11 MR. FOMBY: Yes.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Saladino, can
13 you tell us a little bit about Mr. Fomby?

14 MR. FOMBY: Well, I live in Las Vegas, Nevada.
15 Me and my family, we stay out here. I do Uber Eats
16 right now, because I lost my job with McDonald's and
17 with Securitas due to the appeal. But when I was at
18 McDonald's, I worked for the Palms. I was a manager.
19 They closed the Palms down. And then I decided to do
20 security. So that's why I applied for my security card.
21 And I was working for Securitas at the Link, but then
22 due to the appeal, I lost that job. And so, since then,
23 I've been doing Uber Eats. And pretty much this is
24 where I am now.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

1 Investigator Saladino, can you tell us a little
2 bit about this?

3 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.
4 The applicant was denied for a 2014, out of California,
5 a grand theft, which was a felony. The applicant
6 received one year of probation, had to pay restitution
7 and court fees. The applicant completed the terms for
8 the court. And, subsequently, it was 1203.4 where it
9 was reduced to a misdemeanor and dismissed under the
10 California Penal Code 1203.4.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, sir -- are there any
12 questions from the Board?

13 MR. FOMBY: I handle every --

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Excuse me, sir.

15 MR. FOMBY: Yes.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This is for the Board.
17 Sorry.

18 MR. FOMBY: Oh. Sorry.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
20 Investigator Saladino, does the penal code that you just
21 stated, does it usually admonish and tell them that this
22 should still be reported?

23 MR. SALADINO: Correct. 1203.4 does say that
24 for any type of licensure, you do have to disclose that
25 you've had this arrest and then now, under 1203.4 for

1 California, it's been dismissed and/or reduced.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right. But it still
3 has to be?

4 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Any type of license?

6 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other questions
9 for Mr. Fomby?

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
11 Cortez. Mr. Fomby, is there a reason why you failed to
12 disclose such?

13 MR. FOMBY: I wasn't aware of what he just
14 said. But I appreciate that I actually just got on to
15 that. Because I was, I'm pretty sure that it was
16 dismissed. So I mean when I did my research before I
17 actually applied, it said it's dismissed and you don't
18 have to say it on there. But, I guess, under the penal
19 code they used, I guess, I needed to do that. But I
20 didn't know that at that time, until now.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

22 MR. FOMBY: I would have put it down.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
24 questions?

25 This is the one we had issues with in the past.

1 I'm just noting that this is the penal code that we've
2 had issues with in the past out of California,
3 applicants understanding that regardless of what they
4 were told by California, that they need to actually note
5 it on their application.

6 MR. INGRAM: And for the record, Kevin Ingram.
7 That's correct. In past Board hearings, there's been
8 many times they testified and said, I talked to my
9 attorney, they said I don't have to disclose. Which is
10 correct, because they're talking to a California
11 attorney. But what the California attorney doesn't do,
12 doesn't tell them, is if you're applying for licensure
13 in another state, under that penal code it specifically
14 says you must disclose. And so the Board has taken each
15 individual situation into account every time and made a
16 determination on that, knowing that oftentimes the
17 attorneys are telling them they do not have to disclose.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

19 MR. SALADINO: Madam Chair?

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes?

21 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino, for the
22 record. Once I did contact the applicant, he did
23 provide the 1203.4 documentation showing that the felony
24 was refused to a misdemeanor and then it was dismissed
25 under that penal code.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Does it also -- excuse
2 me. This is Gronauer. Does it also show, when they get
3 that dismissed, do they not get informed at that time
4 that they have to still, when you go for licensure, it's
5 reported?

6 MR. FOMBY: Yeah, I wasn't told anything by my
7 attorney. And I actually spoke with them, too, before
8 everything. So I tried to make sure that I understood
9 that.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Hold on, sir. Hold on,
11 Mr. Fomby. I just wanted my question answered by our
12 investigator.

13 MR. FOMBY: Okay.

14 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. Number
15 seven on the order that he provided to me says that this
16 order is granted under the provisions of Penal Code
17 Section 1203.4. The petitioner is required to disclose
18 the above conviction in response to any direct question
19 contained in any questionnaire or application for public
20 office or for licensure by any state or local agency.
21 It says it on every one.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right, it does. I just
23 wanted to get that clear. Because I understand the
24 confusion. If somebody says, if I was convicted of
25 something, but it was dismissed, I get that. But they

1 send me a letter and tell me here's what it is, you got
2 to get that, too. So. And we're talking to people here
3 who are intelligent, because they're applying for jobs.
4 But they also have to be consistent in what they do.

5 MR. FOMBY: Yeah, I have my papers. I try to
6 be on top of it.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Hang on, sir.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, we appreciate. This
9 is talk amongst the Board and answering questions with
10 the Director. Thank you.

11 MR. FOMBY: Sorry. Sorry.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
13 questions?

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
15 Cortez. I do have a question for Investigator Saladino.
16 Is Mr. Fomby still on probation?

17 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. He is
18 not.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So I'm just
20 reading the disposition resulted in him being on
21 probation?

22 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Got it. Thank
24 you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further

1 questions or discussion concerning Mr. Fomby?

2 MR. FOMBY: Are there any questions for me?

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, sir. About you.

4 MR. FOMBY: Oh.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Hang on.

6 If there's no further questions, I'll entertain
7 a motion.

8 Second call for a motion on Mr. Fomby.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
10 Brown. Based on our practices and for consistency, I
11 move that we uphold the denial.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do
13 I have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
16 second. All in favor, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, I understand the
19 confusion. And I appreciate, you know, your hard work
20 to keep up with your paperwork. I would suggest that
21 you apply again in a year. Your denial has been upheld.
22 Please apply again in a year, and make sure that you
23 note everything on your record.

24 MR. FOMBY: Okay. Will do.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir, for your

1 patience and time. Thank you.

2 Agenda item number 56. Mr. Wiggins, are you on
3 the line?

4 MR. WIGGINS: Yes, ma'am.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

6 Investigator Saladino, can you tell us a bit
7 about Mr. Wiggins?

8 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
9 applicant was denied for a 2004, out of Washington
10 state, a misdemeanor carrying a pistol without a license
11 and simple assault. The applicant pled guilty, received
12 180 days confinement and one year of probation. This
13 was not disclosed.

14 There's also a 1989, out of Washington state,
15 for distribution of cocaine, which was a felony. He did
16 receive one year of probation for that. The applicant
17 did not disclose. When I spoke to the applicant, he
18 stated he was not sure if this charge was a felony or a
19 misdemeanor. Washington state charges cocaine
20 possession and distribution as a felony.

21 2010, out of Washington state, there was a
22 misdemeanor for possession with intent to deliver
23 marijuana. This charge was denied. There was no
24 charges filed. And this wasn't disclosed.

25 2015, there was a felony charge for receiving

1 stolen property, \$1,000 or more, and an unauthorized use
2 of a vehicle. The applicant was found not guilty of
3 this charge on August 3rd, 2015. This also wasn't
4 disclosed.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
6 questions for Mr. Wiggins?

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez.
8 Mr. Wiggins, is there a reason why you failed to
9 disclose when it was pretty clear that the application
10 indicates you need to disclose all criminal history?

11 MR. WIGGINS: Yes, ma'am. Well, when I was
12 actually doing loss prevention out here, doing security
13 and meeting guys on the strip that was doing security,
14 and I explained to them like I did have felonies, but
15 they was like 10 or plus years ago, they was like, well,
16 I think, the State of Nevada shouldn't be aware of it
17 and they shouldn't bring it up. That's why I'm saying
18 it's my fault. I should have been, I should not have
19 been listening to other people. I should have just put
20 it on there, because I seen it on here big as day. And
21 I apologize. There's really nothing I can say, because
22 I seen it on there big as day. I was, due to all the
23 charges, I ain't going to say I was young, because I
24 knew what I was doing. But I was young, you know.
25 Washington, D.C., I -- I was young.

1 You know, I came to Vegas to better myself, to
2 change. And I'm here now on the phone trying to get my
3 security card back so I can take care of my family.
4 That's it. And I apologize for not disclosing on the
5 application.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

7 Any further questions from the Board?

8 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
9 entertain a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
11 Cortez. I motion to uphold the denial for failure to
12 disclose. Time and distance, last incident occurring as
13 of 2015. I'll submit that.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we
15 have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have
18 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

21 Mr. Wiggins, we would encourage you to apply
22 again in a year. Your denial has been upheld. Please
23 make sure that you don't listen to anybody and you fill
24 out the paperwork as stated, disclosing everything.

25 MR. WIGGINS: Yes, ma'am. Thank you, ma'am.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

2 Mr. Fudge, are you here?

3 MR. FUDGE: Yes, I am here.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

5 Mr. Saladino, can you tell us a little bit
6 about Mr. Fudge's background?

7 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.
8 The applicant came in and disclosed a 1972 strong arm
9 robbery felony conviction out of Mississippi. The
10 applicant received five years probation and served 22
11 days in jail. The applicant disclosed this arrest and
12 conviction at the time he applied. At the time he
13 applied, he was explained the denial process and how the
14 appeal process worked. The applicant was forthcoming
15 with this information, and then it was backed up with
16 the fingerprint results.

17 The applicant also served in the United States
18 Air Force and received an honorable discharge.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: First, Mr. Fudge, thank you
20 for your service.

21 MR. FUDGE: Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
23 questions for Mr. Fudge?

24 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
25 motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I
2 make a motion to grant the appeal for Mr. Fudge. It's
3 on time and distance.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
5 Cortez. I'll second the motion.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion, and
7 I have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

10 Mr. Fudge, congratulations. Your denial has
11 been overturned. Thank you for being forthright in your
12 application. And best of luck to you.

13 MR. FUDGE: I want to thank you and the Board
14 so much, and especially Mr. Saladino for listening to me
15 and working with me. Thank you all.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Saladino, good job.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you for your
19 service.

20 MR. FUDGE: Thank you.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Air Force.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Have a good day, sir.

23 MR. FUDGE: You, too.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda item number
25 58. Mr. Oldham, are you on the line? Mr. Donoval

1 Oldham?

2 MR. INGRAM: Donoval Oldham, do you have your
3 phone on mute?

4 Trail?

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. Okay. We're going to
6 trail agenda item number 58 and go to agenda item number
7 59. Mr. Adams, are you on the line?

8 MR. ADAMS: Yes, I am.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Thank you
10 for your patience.

11 Investigator Saladino, can you tell us a little
12 bit about Mr. Adams?

13 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Adams, can you please confirm
14 that you acknowledge you're under oath?

15 MR. ADAMS: Yes, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

17 MR. ADAMS: You're welcome.

18 MR. SALADINO: All right. Investigator
19 Saladino. The applicant was denied for a 2017, out of
20 Nevada, drawing a deadly weapon in a threatening manner.
21 He received a suspended jail sentence and 75 hours of
22 community service, which was completed on 1-8 of 2018.
23 The applicant disclosed the arrest and conviction. All
24 requirements were met for the court on 3-6 of '18.

25 The applicant did work for Allied Universal as

1 a security guard since 2018. When his renewal was
2 denied, he was terminated pending the outcome of the
3 appeal. He did disclose the arrest on his renewal
4 application.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

6 Are there any questions from the Board?

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
8 Cortez. Mr. Adams, could you give me a little brief
9 history on what the incident was?

10 MR. ADAMS: Yes, ma'am. It was, you know, I
11 was -- it was the 4th of July. You know, I was
12 drinking. And we was, me and my friends went out to the
13 mountains to shoot. We didn't know that we was inside
14 the city limits. So when they came and got me, they
15 arrested me and told me that this was in the city
16 limits.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: All right. And were you
18 20 years, 20 years of age at the time; is that correct?

19 MR. ADAMS: I was twenty -- I think, 26 or --
20 26, I believe. It was three years ago.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And you were shooting in
22 a public like area like outside? So it's 4th of July,
23 you walk outside, outside you start firing your weapon?

24 MR. ADAMS: No. We was in a -- we drove to,
25 into Centennial where the mountain was. We didn't know

1 it was still inside the line of the city limits.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So this is a remote
3 location? Were their residents around? I'm just trying
4 to get a picture of what happened.

5 MR. ADAMS: No, it was people walking down the
6 street, residents, and they seen it, and they reported
7 it.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Okay. Thank
9 you.

10 MR. ADAMS: No problem.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
12 questions?

13 (Outside interruption.)

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, if you're not on the
15 call and being questioned, could you please mute your
16 phone. We're getting a little bit of background noise.

17 And, I think, there's a Board member question.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown
19 for Mr. Adams. And maybe Mr. Gronauer can shed some
20 light on this. The charge that we see is drawing a
21 deadly weapon in a threatening manner. If you're just
22 out shooting and people see you do that, that doesn't
23 seem to amount to that charge for me, unless there's
24 something within the City of Las Vegas that I'm unaware
25 of.

1 MR. ADAMS: That's the City of Centennial, sir.
2 I'm being honest with you guys. That's what happened.
3 And I'm accountable for it, and I own up to my wrongs.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

5 Investigator Saladino, do you have any further
6 information?

7 MR. SALADINO: Yes. The original charge was
8 discharging a gun or other weapon where persons might be
9 endangered. And that holds a level of gross
10 misdemeanor. Through the courts, it ended up being
11 reduced down to drawing a weapon in a threatening
12 manner, which holds a misdemeanor level. We did acquire
13 the police report regarding this case, and it says just
14 like the applicant had said. There was a report of
15 shots being fired. When marked units had arrived, they
16 started questioning the homeowners that were there.
17 Mr. Adams was forthcoming. And the police officers even
18 write in the report that he was being cooperative, he
19 told them exactly where the firearm was and, you know,
20 and took responsibility for it, during that time with
21 the police.

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. That
23 clears that up for me.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any other
25 questions for Mr. Adams?

1 Sir, I have a question. This was during 2017.
2 You apparently already had a guard card?

3 MR. ADAMS: Yes, ma'am, I already had a guard
4 card.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Did you report to
6 your employer or to your -- to the PILB that you were
7 arrested and convicted?

8 MR. ADAMS: I wasn't doing security at that
9 time. But I did also call the PILB Board and let them
10 know as well. They just said, just when I renew my
11 guard card, make sure I put it on my application.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

13 MR. ADAMS: No problem.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any other questions?

15 Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll
17 make a motion to grant the appeal for Mr. Adams, for the
18 simple reason that the police report says how
19 cooperative he was, he took on the responsibility of it.
20 And it was 2017. Some people do go out by the
21 Centennial, by the mountains out there. It's still city
22 limits. And this charge could have been a lot more
23 serious than what it turned out to be. But, and since
24 he has had no problems since 2017, and he lived up to it
25 right from jump street, I'm good with him. So that's

1 the reason for my granting of the appeal.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a motion. Do I
3 have a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I'll
5 second.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. I have a
7 motion. I have second. All in favor, say "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

10 So, Mr. Adams, your denial has been overturned.
11 The Board will get with you for next steps.
12 Congratulations. Have a great day.

13 MR. ADAMS: Thank you, guys. Thank you, Board
14 members. Thank you, everybody, for this. I appreciate
15 you guys. Have a wonderful day.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You, too.

17 Agenda item number 60, Kim Gonzalez.

18 Ms. Gonzalez, are you on the line?

19 MS. GONZALEZ: Yes, ma'am, I right here.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. I'm sorry.

21 Ma'am, do you understand you're under oath?

22 MS. GONZALEZ: Yes, ma'am, I do understand I'm
23 under oath.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

25 Investigator Saladino, could you please tell us

1 a little bit about Ms. Gonzalez.

2 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.
3 The applicant was denied for a 1992 felony possession of
4 a controlled substance, out of California. She was
5 convicted and sentenced to one year and four months in
6 prison.

7 Also, there was a 1992, out of California,
8 grand theft auto. Found guilty of a misdemeanor, taking
9 vehicle without the owner's consent, where she was
10 granted three years of probation. The applicant did
11 disclose this arrest. And this charge was dismissed
12 under 1203.4 according to the fingerprint report.

13 1993, out of California, there was a
14 misdemeanor for disorderly conduct, prostitution,
15 soliciting. She was convicted, received two years of
16 probation and then a suspended jail sentence. This
17 charge was also dismissed under 1203.4.

18 The applicant was denied for the felony
19 conviction. At the time, she was working for Allied
20 Universal. They were notified of the denial. And now
21 she wishes to appeal.

22 MR. INGRAM: Excuse me. Anybody that's on the
23 phone right now, please make sure your phone is muted,
24 so that we don't get the background noise. Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. So just because

1 there's a lot of noise going on, she did disclose the
2 convictions, both of them?

3 MR. SALADINO: No, she had disclosed the ones
4 that had been dismissed under 1203.4, but not the felony
5 controlled substance, where she was convicted, and that
6 was upheld, received one year four months of prison.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Got it. Okay. Are there
8 any questions for Ms. Gonzalez?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. She
10 did not disclose the other one that says it's a
11 misdemeanor, disorderly conduct, prostitution?

12 MR. SALADINO: That one was disclosed, yes.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It was?

14 MR. SALADINO: Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, here it says no.

16 MR. SALADINO: Oh. Then, it wasn't.

17 MR. INGRAM: You want to double-check that.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The charges were
19 dismissed, but it wasn't disclosed.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.

21 MR. SALADINO: The only thing that was
22 disclosed on the application was the grand theft auto
23 that got reduced to taking vehicle without consent.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any other questions?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Ms. Gonzalez, this is

1 Board Member Cortez. Is there a reason why you failed
2 to disclose?

3 MS. GONZALEZ: Are you asking me?

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes, I am.

5 MS. GONZALEZ: Oh. Yes. First, let me say
6 this. I was a different person back then. I was on
7 drugs. I did go to prison. I was released in 1993.
8 From that point till today, I've never been arrested.
9 I'm clean off of drugs. It's been, the case that they
10 actually denied me my card was 32 years old. And I
11 thought the statute of limitations on it had already
12 taken place, because when I was released from prison in
13 1993, I thought I had expunged everything. But, I
14 guess, that one case slipped through the cracks, and I
15 didn't remember. So when they denied me, I went down to
16 California, went back to the courthouse, pulled all the
17 paperwork, filed the expungement, and they told me that
18 the expungement was granted. And I did that in December
19 of 2020.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So am I understanding
21 that you did not disclose because you were under the
22 impression that since the case was closed, expunged,
23 there was no need to?

24 MS. GONZALEZ: Yes, ma'am. And then the
25 statute of limitations. At that point, it had been 26

1 years. And I had passed every other background check
2 that I had taken from the time I moved to Las Vegas. I
3 moved to Las Vegas in 2008. And I worked for Coach USA
4 as a dispatcher. But that's when the economy trumped,
5 and I was laid off of every job that I tried to get.
6 However, in 2010, I started working for North Las Vegas
7 Care Center, which was a senior assisted facility. And
8 I was granted. They said my background was cleared.
9 And I worked there for five years. So at that point --

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand. I'm sorry.
11 I didn't mean to interrupt. But I understand where
12 you're coming from. Thank you.

13 MS. GONZALEZ: You're welcome. I'm sorry.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That's all right.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So are there any
16 other questions for Ms. Gonzalez?

17 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
18 entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
20 Cortez. I am motioning to overturn the denial and grant
21 Ms. Gonzalez the work card.

22 Prior to ending that, I do need to stress on
23 everybody, regardless whether it's the disposition is
24 pending, it's done, the case is open, it's closed,
25 please write it down to the application. It cannot get

1 any clearer. But I do understand different states
2 require different things. That's a whole nother issue.
3 So please be aware of the requirements in the
4 applications that are you applying, or filling out.

5 So with that, I am going to motion that we
6 overturn the denial and grant her work card.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
8 a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Oh, do I need to say
10 based on time and distance, to overturn? Okay.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, again, I have a motion.
12 Do I have a second?

13 Okay. So the motion doesn't pass, without a
14 second. So I'm open to another motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
16 Brown. I think, where my problem with this is, and it
17 may be the same problem for Mr. Gronauer, is for the
18 majority of the day today, we've been denying these if
19 they have not disclosed, regardless of why they have or
20 have not disclosed. I understand. I feel for a lot of
21 these people. But we are dealing with past practice and
22 our current day, that we're going along, practice that
23 we're working with today. So I'm on the fence about
24 this issue.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member

1 Cortez. I completely agree. And that's kind of where I
2 was going with what's past practice and time and
3 distance. I mean we're talking about cases in 1992. So
4 that was my reasoning for giving this individual an
5 opportunity to start over again. At some point, we're
6 going to need to allow this individual to prove themself
7 again.

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: And this is Board Member
9 Brown, for the record. I understand that, and I agree
10 with that wholeheartedly, with the time and distance.
11 But our practice in the past, and today especially, is
12 if they have failed to disclose, we're denying it. And
13 our application says they need to report all arrests,
14 and there's a minutia list there of even if it's this,
15 this, this, or 1203.4 PC. So I agree with you that we
16 need to allow these people to work. This stuff is in
17 their past. But all day today, we've been going with if
18 they failed to disclose, we're not granting the appeal.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Agreed with that. I
20 think -- this is Board Member Cortez again. I think, my
21 issue, able to, so based on my approval, is because it
22 was out of California. I do know that states vary,
23 state to state. Or requirements vary state to state.
24 And I do realize it's the applicant's responsibility to
25 be on point with everything in the state that they're

1 applying for.

2 Again, the time and distance, in the '90s, it's
3 a different state, the applicant thought it was
4 expunged, therefore no need to report. But I do get it.
5 I'm in law enforcement. Any omissions or any lack of
6 information given, it's an automatic withdrawal. So I
7 understand both points.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll
9 make a second motion, then. Did you make the motion,
10 Mr. Brown?

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That's where we're at.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, okay. I'm going
13 to make a new motion. And I agree totally on both sides
14 here. The trouble is, the date of the application was
15 7-15-2020. It has nothing to do with the distance of
16 anything else as far as I'm concerned. The paperwork is
17 there. And the folks that we're dealing with, I know
18 they're intelligent enough to fill out the paperwork and
19 fill it out properly. So with that, since it was wasn't
20 filled out properly, and keeping it to past practice,
21 and especially with today, the denial of the work card
22 for Ms. Kim Gonzalez for all those reasons.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do
24 I have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll

1 second.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I've got a motion. I have
3 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Ms. Gonzalez, you know,
6 again, you see that it's very difficult for the Board.
7 Because, I believe, we're probably all in the same boat
8 that Board Member Cortez is. This has been a long time
9 ago and, had it been listed in the application, would
10 not have flagged or been at issue. So, you know, our
11 suggestion is that you come back in a year. Please make
12 sure you indicate everything on your application. And
13 you should have no issue getting, you know, no issues
14 with this Board. But please make sure, again, you
15 disclose everything.

16 MS. GONZALEZ: All right, ma'am. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Have a great
18 day.

19 Okay. Agenda item number 61, Horacio Lemus.
20 Mr. Lemus, are you on the line?

21 MR. LEMUS: Yes, ma'am.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are you requesting an
23 interpreter, sir?

24 MR. LEMUS: Yes, I need interpreter, please.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

1 (There was a discussion off the record.)

2 MR. INGRAM: Stand by, Mr. Lemus. We're having
3 a little discussion with the attorney. Okay?

4 MR. LEMUS: Okay.

5 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

6 (There was a discussion off the record.)

7 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Lemus, do you have someone
8 with you that can interpret for you?

9 MR. LEMUS: Yes, my wife.

10 MR. INGRAM: Okay. And what is your wife's
11 name, sir?

12 MR. LEMUS: Veronica Rangel.

13 MS. RANGEL: Veronica Rangel.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Veronica Rangel.

15 MR. INGRAM: So that's Veronica?

16 MR. LEMUS: Yes.

17 MR. INGRAM: Thank you, sir. I'm going to take
18 note of that.

19 And, Veronica, what's your last name, please?

20 MS. RANGEL: It's Rangel, R-A-N-G-E-L.

21 MR. INGRAM: Thank you. And are you
22 comfortable interpreting for Horacio?

23 MS. RANGEL: Yes, I am.

24 MR. INGRAM: Thank you very much. We
25 appreciate that.

1 MR. DETMER: And Mike Detmer, for the record.

2 What's her name, again?

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Veronica.

4 MR. INGRAM: Veronica.

5 MR. DETMER: Veronica?

6 MS. RANGEL: Yes?

7 MR. DETMER: We're going to swear you in,
8 because you're essentially going to be translating for
9 Mr. Lemus. But that if you heard, you have to be sworn
10 in as well. Okay?

11 MS. RANGEL: Okay.

12 MR. DETMER: Can you raise your right hand?

13 MS. RANGEL: Yes.

14 MR. DETMER: Do you hereby swear or affirm to
15 tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the
16 truth?

17 MS. RANGEL: Yes, I do.

18 MR. DETMER: Thank you very much. And as part
19 of the translation, can you confirm that Mr. Lemus is
20 comfortable with you translating for him, for the
21 record?

22 MS. RANGEL: Yes. Yes, he is.

23 MR. DETMER: I need you to repeat that to him,
24 and then have him give an answer to you, and then you
25 give the answer to us.

1 MS. RANGEL: Okay. (Interpreting.) Yes, he
2 is.

3 MR. DETMER: Okay. And thanks very much for
4 that. That's the format we're going to follow. All
5 right. So don't answer for him.

6 MS. RANGEL: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, Investigator
8 Saladino, could you please tell us a little bit about
9 Mr. Lemus.

10 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. So the
11 applicant was denied for a 1992 carrying a concealed
12 weapon on person. It was a misdemeanor level, out of
13 California.

14 MR. DETMER: Mr. Saladino, I apologize for the
15 interruption. Give her a chance to translate as well
16 your statements so that he would be more as part of the
17 discussion.

18 MR. SALADINO: Okay.

19 MR. DETMER: Ma'am, could you translate that to
20 Mr. Lemus.

21 MS. RANGEL: Yes. (Interpreting.)

22 MR. LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): Yes.

23 MR. SALADINO: The applicant received 24 months
24 of probation. And on August 7th, 2015 his conviction
25 was dismissed under 1203.4.

1 MR. LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): Okay.

2 MR. SALADINO: This arrest and conviction and
3 subsequent dismissal was not disclosed at the time of
4 the application.

5 MR. LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): Okay.

6 MR. SALADINO: 1999, there was a misdemeanor
7 battery assault with a deadly weapon not a firearm,
8 domestic violence. This charge was dismissed.

9 MR. LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): Yes.

10 MR. SALADINO: This was disclosed on the
11 application.

12 MR. LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): Yes.

13 MR. SALADINO: 2001, there was a felony charge,
14 out of California, for, again, domestic violence where
15 he received 36 months of probation. The applicant did
16 list this arrest and provided court documents when he
17 appealed.

18 MR. LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): Yes.

19 MR. SALADINO: 2007, out of California, there
20 was a misdemeanor DUI. The applicant received 36 months
21 of probation and a fine. The applicant did disclose
22 this arrest and stated that he completed the program.

23 MS. RANGEL: (Interpreting.) Yes, he did it
24 all.

25 MR. SALADINO: The applicant disclosed three

1 out of the four arrests. And when he was denied and
2 contacted, he did provide the 1203.4 documentation and
3 his court documents. He was made provisional but was
4 not hired or put on a roster by a licensed company.

5 MS. RANGEL: (Interpreting.) No, no, he did
6 not work.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ma'am, could you please ask
8 Mr. Lemus if he completed the Spanish version of the
9 application or the English version.

10 MR. LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): In English.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
13 Cortez. Veronica, were you the one who filled out the
14 English packet? Or, Horacio, were you the one that
15 filled out the English packet?

16 MS. RANGEL: I was the one who filled it out
17 for him.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

19 This is Board Member Cortez. I do have a
20 question for Horacio. Would you like me to ask it in
21 Spanish and English? For the Board, I'll that in
22 English. Okay.

23 Horacio, is there a reason why you failed to
24 disclose the 1992 case and, also, why you failed to
25 provide all of the court documents for the 2001 case?

1 MR LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): First of all, I
2 want to say that I'm sorry. Because I barely moved from
3 Los Angeles to Las Vegas. I had all my paperwork in
4 boxes then. And what I did, to come here, is to work.

5 MS. RANGEL: He says since they were old cases,
6 he didn't think of putting them down. And because they
7 were dismissed, he didn't think of putting them down.
8 And since he didn't have that in mind, that's why he
9 didn't even remember to put them in.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

11 MS. RANGEL: M-hm (affirmative).

12 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. Your question
13 was if he filled the application out in English or in
14 Spanish. We do not post anywhere that we have the
15 application in Spanish. On our website, there's an
16 option to print it. But the electronic version doesn't
17 come in Spanish. If they would have asked that, they
18 could have gotten a Spanish version. But it's not
19 posted or it's on our application saying we have it
20 available in Spanish. So the application would be in
21 Spanish, but the disclosures would be in English, like
22 the civil applicant with the Department of Public Safety
23 and the exam would still be English, though.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

25 Are there any more questions for Mr. Lemus?

1 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
2 entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
4 Brown. I move to uphold the denial based on our current
5 practices.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
7 a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
10 second. All in favor, say "aye."

11 (Board members said "aye.")

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr. Lemus, unfortunately,
13 your guard card, or your license has been denied.
14 Please, when you fill out the application again, make
15 sure that you list all of the incidences.

16 MS. RANGEL: (Interpreting.) He wants to know
17 when does he have to reapply again, because he needs to
18 work. He says that he has been working as a security
19 guard for 33 years.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: He can apply again in one
21 year, ma'am.

22 MR. LEMUS (through Ms. Rangel): Okay.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you so much.

24 MR. INGRAM: Thank you for your assistance,
25 also, Veronica.

1 MS. RANGEL: You're welcome.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda item number
3 62. Ms. Jackson?

4 MS. JACKSON: Yes, I'm here.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

6 Investigator Saladino, can you tell us a little
7 bit about Ms. Jackson?

8 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
9 applicant was denied for a 2005 felony conviction for
10 fraud with identification documents. This was out of
11 Georgia. The applicant did receive probation. She was
12 convicted for five years of probation, which started on
13 6-8 of '15, and she ended early on 11-15 of 2018. The
14 applicant disclosed this arrest and this conviction as a
15 misdemeanor.

16 2017, there was a misdemeanor conviction for
17 criminal trespass, out of Georgia, where she received
18 probation, 12 months, community service, and
19 restitution. This was completed on 4-26 of '18. The
20 applicant did disclose this arrest as well.

21 There was a little bit of confusion in regards
22 to her felony conviction. When I spoke to the applicant
23 after receiving the fingerprint report, she was under
24 the impression that this conviction was going to be
25 reduced once she finished her probation. However,

1 speaking with U.S. Probation Officer Ashley Bremmer, she
2 stated that she did complete the probation on 11-15 of
3 '18, it was still a felony conviction, and only her
4 right to vote was restored. And the U.S. probation
5 officer also provided a letter stating that as well.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any questions for
7 Ms. Jackson?

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Can
9 you explain, Ms. Jackson, can you explain what the fraud
10 documents were, fraud with identification documents?

11 MS. JACKSON: I -- ID.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I'm sorry. Ma'am, we
13 didn't quite understand the response.

14 MS. JACKSON: It was ID and check.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: ID theft, check?

16 MS. JACKSON: Yes.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And then, in
18 2017, you were arrested on a different charge, criminal
19 trespass, while you were still on probation; is that
20 correct?

21 MS. JACKSON: Yes.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
24 Brown. I have a question for Investigator Saladino.

25 MR. SALADINO: Yes, sir.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Looking at the report
2 we're looking at, she was provisional for over a year.
3 Is that because of a delay in fingerprints from the FBI?

4 MR. SALADINO: That is correct.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
7 questions from the Board?

8 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
9 entertain a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
11 Brown. I move to grant the appeal and overturn the
12 denial.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
14 a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
17 second. All in favor, say "aye."

18 (Board members said "aye.")

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Ms. Jackson, your
20 denial has been overturned. And the Board staff will
21 reach out to you concerning next steps.
22 Congratulations.

23 MS. JACKSON: Thank you, you guys. Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Have a great
25 day.

1 MS. JACKSON: You, too. Bye-bye.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr. Barns. Mr. John Barns,
3 are you on the line?

4 MR. BARNES: Yes, I'm here.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

6 So this is agenda item number 63, Mr. John
7 Barns. Investigator Saladino, could you please tell us
8 about Mr. Barns.

9 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Barns, for the record, Kevin
10 Ingram. Are you, can you confirm that you're currently
11 under oath, please?

12 MR. BARNES: Yes.

13 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

14 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
15 applicant was denied for a 2014 misdemeanor exhibited
16 deadly weapon not a firearm, out of California. The
17 applicant received 36 months probation and a fine. The
18 applicant stated that he received a weekend in jail,
19 parenting classes and summary probation for one year.

20 2014, again, out of Nevada, there was a
21 misdemeanor trespass not amounting to burglary and
22 possession of stolen property.

23 I'm having technical difficulties.

24 The applicant received a suspended jail
25 sentence, community service, and petty larceny

1 counseling for this. This case was pending and a
2 warrant had been issued. The applicant had owed court
3 fees. At the time of this report, I was unable to reach
4 the applicant. And since then, he has taken care of the
5 warrant status and paid the court fees back.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

7 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Barns?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
9 Brown. Mr. Barns, can you give me a brief summary of
10 the exhibited deadly weapon case and why it resulted in
11 parenting classes?

12 MR. BARNES: In 2014, I moved my child's mother
13 and me into an apartment in Palmdale, California. Our
14 home got broken into. I was home at the time. And the
15 guy had a gun in his hand, and I had no weapon. So the
16 only thing I could do was scream and with 9-1-1 on the
17 phone. So he ran away. The police came. Nothing was
18 done.

19 I moved her into another home where I made a
20 weapon myself, a stick with nails in it, just because
21 the police told me there was nothing they can do to
22 protect us, you know, basically. So me and her got into
23 an altercation, basically, and she -- I told her she
24 could leave. So she left. She came back with her
25 mother and her brother, and they, basically, tried to

1 attack me. Her brother has a broom in his hand trying
2 to hit me. So I saw my stick behind my door, so I
3 grabbed it, and I defended myself. Because he was at my
4 home trying to assault me. She, basically -- they
5 turned it around, called the police, said that I
6 assaulted them. And which I never assaulted them at
7 all. It was just me and her brother having an
8 altercation because he wanted to come in my home and
9 take my stuff. Basically, you know, me and his sister
10 had an altercation. It had nothing to do with it.

11 So the whole situation was flipped around on
12 me. Which I had no witnesses. I had nobody there. I
13 was by myself. So it was three on one. And, basically,
14 I'm just a young dude, barely, you know, coming out of
15 anything. I had got my first job, because I had a baby
16 with her. And I was working. And she told me it wasn't
17 enough. So she left me. So, basically, it was just
18 going back and forth in court where she was trying to
19 take my rights away. And which she did. When they put
20 me in jail, then when I was released they told me that I
21 had lost my custody of my son due to the fact that I
22 pulled that stick out on her brother. So. But I was
23 being attacked myself. So.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: And was this done in front
25 of your child, or was there some type of endangerment of

1 your child, why you had to do parenting classes?

2 MR. BARNES: No. My child was not there,
3 present at the time. I gave my son to her. She just
4 wanted her stuff. And I told her that we can set up a
5 time. Because we were too busy arguing, and I wasn't
6 trying to get put out of my apartment. But, again, she
7 got me arrested. So I got evicted out of my apartment,
8 because I was in jail and I missed a time of paying my
9 rent, so they evicted me. So I had nowhere to go. I
10 was homeless. I was doing bad for a long time. She got
11 me for child support. So I was, basically, just -- she
12 told me, basically, I could pay her or go back to jail.
13 So I had to pay. And I had to live on the streets at
14 the same time.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. My next
16 question is why did you not disclose these?

17 MR. BARNES: At the time, when I did the
18 application, it, basically, said disclose criminal
19 history, meaning I didn't think I had -- I had no
20 felonies. So every application I've done since I have
21 moved around -- I lived in Wisconsin, California -- all
22 just closed felonies. And I have no felonies at all.
23 So I didn't think that it was necessary to disclose
24 that, because it was already a closed case.

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
2 questions from the Board?

3 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
4 entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move
6 that we uphold the denial, based on past practices.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
8 a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
10 Cortez. I'll second the motion.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
12 second. All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I'm sorry, Mr. Barns.
15 We're going uphold the denial of your work card. You
16 have the opportunity to apply again in one year. In
17 doing so, please, again, like we've requested for
18 everybody that we've denied, please make sure that you
19 note everything on your application, all arrests, any
20 convictions. Just more information is better.

21 MR. BARNS: All right.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

23 Johnathon Dixon, item number, agenda item
24 number 64. Mr. Dixon, are you on the line?

25 MR. DIXON: Yes, I'm on the line.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Are you
2 aware, sir, that you're under oath?

3 MR. DIXON: Yes, ma'am.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

5 Investigator Saladino, could you please tell us
6 a little bit about Mr. Dixon.

7 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
8 applicant was denied for a 2003 misdemeanor unlawful
9 carrying of a firearm, out of Texas. The applicant
10 received 12 months probation. This was uncovered on the
11 fingerprint report as the applicant did not disclose.

12 2004, there was a felony conviction for
13 possession of a controlled substance, being cocaine. He
14 received five years probation. Again, this was found on
15 the fingerprint report.

16 2007, out of Texas, there was a misdemeanor,
17 unlawful carrying of a weapon, which was a knife, and a
18 possession of a controlled substance, cocaine. He
19 received 75 days jail sentence, served 25 days of that,
20 and paid a fine. The applicant was placed in a medical
21 facility for detox for six months. And this wasn't
22 disclosed.

23 2011, out of Texas, there was a misdemeanor
24 assault causing bodily injury to a family member. He
25 received 54 days in jail and paid a fine. This was not

1 disclosed.

2 In 2015, there was a misdemeanor possession of
3 marijuana less than two ounces. He received a court
4 fine of \$200. And this was not disclosed.

5 The applicant did not disclose his arrest
6 history. He was made provisional. However, he was not
7 added to any licensee's roster.

8 The applicant did disclose his arrest history
9 after being denied and now wishes to appeal.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

11 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Dixon?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

13 Mr. Dixon, what is the reason you didn't disclose?

14 MR. DIXON: For the state of Texas, it was over
15 10 years. And those cases, controlled substance, it was
16 supposed to have been less than a gram that was supposed
17 to have been found in the car when driving. The second
18 time it happened, it happened again in my car. I think,
19 they found less than a gram or so in the car. And they
20 actually had charged me for that also. I never did
21 drugs before. It was --

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay. Hold on,
23 sir. Mr. Dixon, hold on. Okay. I understand that
24 part. But I mean there's quite a few arrests, and you
25 didn't disclose any of them. Now, the past, the present

1 and the future, for everybody that applies, it says very
2 succinctly on the application to list all arrests, it
3 doesn't have to be convictions. It says arrests. It
4 doesn't have to be a felony, or it can be a misdemeanor,
5 just arrests. And so it seem to be very clear. And it
6 hurts. I would rather, personally, as a Board member,
7 I'd rather see everybody get a work card so everybody
8 could get back to work. But these rules are pretty --

9 MR. DIXON: The second time --

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Hold on. These rules
11 are pretty simple. And I kind of just feel bad about
12 having to deny somebody a work card because they don't
13 disclose. But it's a rule that's very simple to follow.
14 And if you're going to get a job in security, today
15 security is a very professional profession compared to
16 what it was maybe 20, 30 years ago. And with that, you
17 have to be able to follow all the rules.

18 So I'm sorry you didn't disclose, or anybody
19 else hasn't disclosed. But this message has got to get
20 out to everybody. I appreciate why you didn't disclose,
21 in a way. But it's no excuse. There's not even a
22 reason. Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
24 questions for Mr. Dixon?

25 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll

1 entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I
3 make a motion to deny the work card or the appeal for
4 the work card for Mr. Dixon, because of past practices
5 of not disclosing. It makes no sense.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
7 Cortez. And, again, I'm not a fan of something so
8 simple, and I can't grant something that would be very
9 beneficial to the individual. Please follow the
10 instructions. It says over and over again, report
11 arrest and criminal history.

12 I second the motion to uphold the denial as it
13 stands.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
15 have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

16 (Board members said "aye.")

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any opposed?

18 MR. INGRAM: In the north, we apologize. Could
19 you, Board Member Brown and Board Member Bezick, can you
20 individually state what you voted, aye or nay.

21 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I vote
22 aye.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I also
24 voted aye.

25 MR. INGRAM: Thank you very much.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

2 MR. INGRAM: Appreciate it.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Mr. Dixon, as you
4 heard, you know, again, just please apply again in a
5 year. Make sure that you document all of your arrests
6 and/or convictions no matter how long ago they were.
7 Sorry, your application is still denied. You can
8 reapply again in a year. Thank you.

9 MR. DIXON: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Karl Peterson, are you on
11 the line?

12 MR. PETERSON: Yes, I am.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

14 Investigator Saladino, could you please tell us
15 a little bit about Mr. Peterson.

16 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Peterson for the record, Kevin
17 Ingram. Would you please confirm that you're currently
18 under oath.

19 MR. PETERSON: I do.

20 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

21 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
22 applicant was denied for a 1982 felony, out of Illinois,
23 for residential burglary and delivery of a controlled
24 substance. The applicant received a four-year prison
25 term for the burglary and two years for the delivery of

1 a controlled substance. The applicant did not disclose
2 the arrest or convictions. The fingerprint report shows
3 the applicant was paroled on February 10th of 1984.
4 When I contacted the applicant in regards to his arrest
5 history, he stated that he had been in an accident where
6 he had lost his memory. And when he filled out the
7 application, he did so at the best of his knowledge,
8 with no intention to deceive or to leave anything out.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any questions
10 from the Board?

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
12 Cortez. Mr. Peterson, you indicated you had an accident
13 and head injury. What kind of accident are we talking
14 about, like what happened, was it a vehicle accident,
15 was it a stroke?

16 MR. PETERSON: No, ma'am. It was a -- I was
17 driving a commercial vehicle cross-country. And I had a
18 head-on collision, kind of jarred my mind a little bit.
19 I've been working excessively to regain my memory. The
20 only thing I haven't regained is my long-term. You
21 know, my short-term, I've regained that.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Were you diagnosed with
23 any kind of disability or delay or impairment, by any
24 chance?

25 MR. PETERSON: No, ma'am.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Are you taking any kind
2 of medications for such?

3 MR. PETERSON: No, ma'am.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Any substance
5 abuse issues?

6 MR. PETERSON: No, ma'am, never have been.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So this is Board Member
8 Nixon. You said you've been working to regain. Are you
9 working with a therapist or anybody, a doctor or any
10 type of a medical?

11 MR. PETERSON: Not currently. I moved to
12 Nevada in October of 2018. All, most of the memory that
13 has been regained has been from my former wife. You
14 know, my relatives, my niece, you know, they don't
15 really have any knowledge of what I'd done before I got
16 married to my former wife. But after the accident, I
17 was in the hospital for a total of 18 months. In the
18 process, you know, I had worked to get my memory back
19 the best I could. I do, however, have a one-inch by
20 one-inch plate on the left side of my head from the
21 injury. However, I'm doing well now. I have no
22 problems, you know, I have no memory issue, you know,
23 for short-term memory.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, sir, the question --
25 I'm sorry. What have you been doing since your

1 accident, sir, for employment?

2 MR. PETERSON: I'm, basically, retired. The
3 company I was working for, after 35 years, told me I had
4 to retire. So I semi-retired in December of 2010. And
5 since then, I've worked a day here and a day there. I
6 got a job with Custom Garden, yeah, Custom Security
7 Garden Patrol here in Las Vegas. And, you know, there
8 was no issue. You know, I've been able to do my job.
9 I've been able to live my life to the best of my
10 ability.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

12 Are there any other Board questions?

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

14 Mr. Peterson, do you remember being in prison?

15 MR. PETERSON: No, sir, I don't.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You spent six years in
17 prison. I'm just trying to refresh your memory. You
18 spent six years in prison, and you don't remember any of
19 it?

20 MR. PETERSON: Not particularly, sir. You
21 know, like I say, my long-term memory just disappeared.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

23 MR. PETERSON: You know. Since that particular
24 time, you know, I have lived a life, a productive life.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No problem. Thank you,

1 sir. You answered the question. Thank you.

2 MR. PETERSON: Thank you.

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick in
4 northern Nevada. Mr. Peterson, do you have any official
5 medical documentation of long-term memory loss?

6 MR. PETERSON: No, sir, not any longer, I
7 don't.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
9 questions for the Board, from the Board?

10 MR. PETERSON: Yes, I have one question for the
11 Board.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, this is the Board
13 asking you any further questions.

14 MR. PETERSON: Oh. Oh, I'm sorry.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It's no problem.

16 Okay. Any further questions?

17 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
18 entertain a motion.

19 At this point, I'm going to make a motion.
20 This is Board Member Nixon. Due to the circumstances of
21 the accident, I am going to break protocol here. We did
22 have a case like this before where we had an individual
23 who was in an accident and could not remember long-term
24 memory and did not complete the application. Due to
25 that, I'm going to move that we overturn the denial and

1 grant Mr. Peterson his license. And time and distance
2 of the actual conviction.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
4 Cortez. I'll second the motion. But I would like to,
5 again, based on prior practice, or time and distance,
6 because past practice is a denial, I am basing on the
7 fact that, sadly, you did suffer some kind of memory
8 losses. I urge you to get all the help that you need.
9 But I am okay with the overturning the denial at this
10 time.

11 MR. PETERSON: Thank you very much.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: There is Gronauer. I
13 have one thing.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: For the investigator,
16 was there any record of any accident?

17 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. I don't
18 have any record of an accident.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Did you look for one?

21 MR. SALADINO: I didn't look.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a motion. I have
23 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any opposed?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Nay.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So four to one, the
3 motion passes. Mr. Peterson, you will be granted your
4 work card. Please, you know, get any assistance that
5 you need. But congratulations. The Board will contact
6 you on next steps.

7 MR. PETERSON: Thank you so very much, Board.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're very welcome, sir.

9 MR. PETERSON: Thank you. Have a great day.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You, too.

11 Agenda item number 66. Mr. Castellanos, are
12 you on the line? Again, calling for Mr. Castellanos?

13 Okay. We will trail this item till the end of
14 the meeting.

15 Okay. Moving to the next one, Mr. Smith.

16 Mr. Michael Smith, are you on the line?

17 MR. SMITH: Yes, I am.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

19 Investigator -- oh. Are you aware, sir, that you're
20 under oath?

21 MR. SMITH: Yes.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

23 Investigator Saladino, would you please tell us
24 about Mr. Smith.

25 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.

1 The applicant was denied for a 2007 felony conviction
2 for assault with a deadly weapon not a firearm and
3 reckless driving. This was disclosed at the time he
4 submitted his application with court documents showing
5 that the charge was reduced from a felony to a
6 misdemeanor on 10-23 of 2020. He did also receive a
7 1203.4 dismissal as well.

8 That was the only arrest.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

10 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Smith?

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
12 Cortez. Mr. Smith, could you tell me the incident.

13 Apparently, it was a golf club. Did it take place on
14 the golf course?

15 MR. SMITH: No. It was in the trunk of my car
16 at the time of the incident, something I was moving. I
17 was moving out when this whole thing went down, and it
18 just happened to be in the trunk of my car when the
19 anger started flaring from both sides.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And what happened after?

21 MR. SMITH: I'm sorry?

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then what?

23 MR. SMITH: Oh. I mean would you guys like the
24 whole story?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Well, just from the part

1 where the argument ensued.

2 MR. SMITH: Okay.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And then when it got
4 physical.

5 MR. SMITH: Basically, I was moving out of my
6 ex's house, my ex-fiance'. As I was packing my stuff
7 and getting ready to leave, I guess, people were
8 impatient, and the new boyfriend showed up and started
9 provoking me. And I just kind of flew off the handle
10 and whacked him.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

12 MR. SMITH: Yeah. It was pretty reckless.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

14 Any further questions for Mr. Smith?

15 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
16 motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I make a
18 motion to grant the appeal of Mr. Smith. Time and
19 distance.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. I
21 second the motion.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion and
23 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

1 MR. SMITH: Excellent. I'm glad that's behind
2 me.

3 (There was a period off the record due
4 technical difficulties and the Reporter being
5 disconnected from the call. After being reconnected,
6 the Reporter read back the last thing she was able to
7 report before the disconnection.)

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That was it.

9 MR. INGRAM: Excellent. That was when the
10 motion passed to overturn the denial and grant him a
11 word card.

12 THE REPORTER: Yeah, I don't know what happened
13 on the call. We're having some gremlins today, I think.

14 MR. INGRAM: Yes, we are. And we're just now
15 speaking about item number 68, Nicholas Ryan. So do you
16 want us to go back and have Investigator Saladino cover
17 that as well for you, please? That might be smart.

18 THE REPORTER: Yes, for sure. I mean I
19 wouldn't have any of that on the record. Anything you
20 said after Mr. Smith, I was not even on the call, so.

21 MR. INGRAM: So do you want to go ahead and
22 call him and ask him if he's under oath again.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, Mr. Ryan, as you
24 heard, we have to go back. So we're going back and to
25 the very beginning of speaking to you, if you don't

1 mind.

2 MR. RYAN: Not at all.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, sir, do you
4 understand that you are under oath?

5 MR. RYAN: Yes.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And now,
7 Investigator Saladino, can you please tell us about
8 Mr. Ryan.

9 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.
10 The applicant was denied for a 2015 felony conviction,
11 out of California, for keep a place of sale controlled
12 substance. The applicant received 36 months of formal
13 probation, which started on the March 6th of 2018 and
14 ended on 3-6 of '21. The applicant motioned the court
15 on December 8th of 2020 to have the charge reduced to a
16 misdemeanor. On December 10th of 2020, the motion to
17 reduce was granted per California Penal Code 17 of
18 1203.4.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

20 MR. RYAN: I'm sorry. One correction. The
21 charge was controlled possession for sale. The
22 maintaining a place, that was the misdemeanor that they
23 chose to reduce it to. That was not the original
24 charge.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Please hold.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Well, the charges were
2 reduced to a misdemeanor is what you said, correct?

3 MR. SALADINO: Right.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So while Investigator
5 Saladino is looking up that information -- go ahead.

6 MR SALADINO: So the original charge was
7 possession of a controlled substance for sale. Going
8 through the courts, they got him for the charge of keep
9 a place to sell, meaning being that it was out of his
10 home, and that's where the narcotics that he was
11 selling. So it did, the charge did change. The
12 original one was possession of a controlled substance
13 for sale.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
15 questions for Mr. Ryan?

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.
17 Mr. Ryan, was this some place you were just -- what type
18 of drugs were you selling, or was this a grow house?

19 MR. RYAN: No, this was just my prescription
20 Adderall. I was prescribed Adderall. And I sold the
21 Adderalls that I just wasn't using at the end of the
22 month.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay. Thank
24 you. That was prescription drugs. Thank you.

25 MR. RYAN: Yes.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other
2 questions for Mr. Ryan?

3 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
4 entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make a
6 motion to grant the denial for Mr. Ryan, based on he's
7 already done all the stuff he's supposed to do, and time
8 and distance.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Wait. Grant the denial
10 or overturn the denial? Grant the appeal?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Grant the appeal. I'm
12 sorry. Grant the appeal, on time and distance. He's
13 completed everything he was supposed to complete.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
15 Cortez. I'll second the motion to grant his appeal.

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thanks.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion, and I have
18 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

19 (Board members said "aye.")

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So Mr. Ryan, your
21 denial has been overturned. You will get a -- the Board
22 will reach out to you for next steps. Congratulations.
23 And if you have any questions, let us know.

24 MR. RYAN: I do have questions. I thank you.
25 I don't know if it's worth, you know, taking up

1 everybody's time who's waiting. Is there questions I
2 could ask after this call?

3 MR. INGRAM: Our Board staff will reach out to
4 you.

5 MR. RYAN: Okay.

6 MR. INGRAM: And we'll be happy to answer any
7 questions you might have.

8 MR. RYAN: Thank you so much.

9 MR. INGRAM: Thank you for disclosing.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Item number, agenda item
11 number 69, Oshea Collins. Mr. Collins?

12 MR. COLLINS: Yes, present. Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Are you
14 aware you're under oath?

15 MR. COLLINS: Yes, ma'am.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

17 Investigator Saladino, can you please tell us
18 about Mr. Collins?

19 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
20 applicant was denied for a 2010 felony conviction, out
21 of California, for sale or furnish marijuana for sale.
22 The applicant received four years in prison and three
23 years probation and a work program. This was not
24 disclosed.

25 1992, misdemeanor, out of California, for

1 inflict corporal injury to spouse. This is a domestic
2 violence charge. The applicant received 18 months of
3 probation. This was not disclosed.

4 1993, out of California, misdemeanor, carry a
5 loaded firearm in a public place and battery. The
6 applicant received five days in jail, a fine and a work
7 program. This was not disclosed. The applicant did
8 state that this was not a weapon, meaning a firearm, but
9 having ammo in his possession. The applicant could not
10 get court documents to back that up.

11 1999, out of California, a misdemeanor
12 conviction for tattooing a person under the age of 18.
13 The applicant received 36 months probation. This was
14 not disclosed.

15 The applicant did not disclose any of his
16 arrests or charges or incidents on his application. The
17 applicant's local arrest history were only mild
18 citations for consuming liquor where it's bought and
19 obstructing. Currently, the applicant is not on
20 probation.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

22 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Collins?

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Very
24 simple question. Sir, why didn't you disclose all these
25 here charges?

1 MR. COLLINS: Certain ones, the ones I could
2 actually remember, because it had been over 10 years
3 ago, I put on the paper. I didn't know the actual dates
4 and the actual charges, but I did put on there I had a
5 case. The minute I thought that I had a case. When my
6 paper was denied, and it came, I was issued a permit. I
7 had started working. And then I received a letter in
8 the mail saying that it was denied. The minute I got
9 that letter, I went so the investigators board, talked
10 to them. I got in touch so I could get in touch with my
11 PO in Long Beach. He's no longer working at the
12 facility. So for me to get any of that information, I
13 had to go through some channels, which I got in touch
14 with the court. I received a document in the mail. The
15 minute I received the document, I took that back up to
16 the investigator and the board.

17 I just, I put on there I had charges, but I
18 didn't know exactly what I was charged with, what they
19 were saying, as far as the actual dates. But the minute
20 I found that out, I turned that in. I also, once I
21 received that letter, because I was working for Blossom
22 Security, where I was in security, I reported that to
23 them, because I was just trying to go about things the
24 right way. And I reported that to them. So they said
25 they had to let me go, but if this was approved, I can

1 come back to them.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Investigator Saladino,
3 on his initial application, and I'm not sure if that's
4 what we're seeing right here, is anything noted on
5 there?

6 MR. COLLINS: Excuse me, ma'am.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, sir, please hold.
8 Sir, please hold.

9 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. On the
10 original application that was submitted online, on the
11 questionnaire, on probation or parole, he did mark yes
12 of a start date of September 1 of 2010 to September 1 of
13 2011. Reason, he listed misdemeanor.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, no arrests or --

15 MR. SALADINO: No other, nothing other than
16 that's the only thing that was there.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
18 questions for Mr. Collins?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: To the investigator,
20 Saladino. He said he brought you paperwork?

21 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This was after he was
23 sent the letter, though?

24 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thanks. And he

1 was already agendized?

2 MR. SALADINO: Right.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
5 questions from the Board?

6 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
7 entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
9 Brown. I move that we uphold the denial.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do we
11 have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. And a reason
13 there, Mr. Brown?

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr. Brown, why are you
15 wanting to uphold the denial?

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Because of the failure to
17 disclose, as we've done numerous times today. It's
18 plainly listed on the application.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll second that for a
21 second time.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion.
23 We have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

24 (Board members said "aye.")

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Collins, I

1 understand that you didn't have all the information. At
2 any time, you could pull up your paperwork and find that
3 information that's needed, noting that it actually is
4 requested on the paperwork. And it is important.
5 You're asking for a position of trust within the
6 community. And so we need to know as much information
7 about you as necessary to make those decisions. You are
8 more than welcome to appeal, or to apply again in one
9 year. I would, you know, advise you to make sure that
10 you document everything that you have, now that you know
11 the dates and times. Thank you, sir.

12 MR. COLLINS: Yes, ma'am. Ma'am, do you mind
13 if I say one other thing? Would you mind?

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, sir. We're actually
15 very far behind. We need to continue moving forward.
16 Thank you, sir. Have a great day.

17 MR. COLLINS: You, too.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda item number
19 70. Pamela Jackson, are you on the line?

20 UNIDENTIFIED: What happened to 65?

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm sorry. What?

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I'm sorry. Is this
23 Ms. Jackson?

24 MR. INGRAM: Pamela Jackson?

25 Trail that?

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, we'll go ahead and
2 trail agenda item number 70.

3 Did we pass 65?

4 MR. INGRAM: No, 65 was already heard, Mr. Karl
5 Peterson.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: It's already done. We
7 approved it already.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: 66 is trailed.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 66 is trailed, and now 70
11 is trailed.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: 58, 66 and 70.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right. Okay.
14 So we're going to move now to agenda item number 71.
15 Mr. Colbert, are you on the line?

16 MR. COLBERT: Yes, ma'am.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Are you
18 aware, sir, that you're under oath?

19 MR. COLBERT: Yes.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

21 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
22 applicant was denied for a 2013 felony conviction, out
23 of California, for oral copulation with a person under
24 16 years old. The applicant received five years of
25 formal probation and 190 days jail. Probation started

1 on 10-21 of '13. The applicant disclosed the arrest and
2 conviction and provided court documents showing
3 probation was completed on 10-21 of '18. And the case
4 was dismissed under 1203.4 on November 14th of 2018.

5 The applicant also disclosed a 2011 misdemeanor
6 charge, out of California, for inflict corporal injury
7 to spouse, slash, cohabitant, domestic violence. No
8 charges were filed in this case. The applicant
9 disclosed the arrest and provided a letter from the City
10 of Los Angeles, Supervising Deputy Attorney Travis
11 Austin, stating that the City Attorney's Office declined
12 to file criminal charges against the applicant.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

14 MR. SALADINO: Also, the applicant did
15 disclose, provided court documents. He is not required
16 to register as a sex offender. And this was verified on
17 California and Nevada's sex offender registry. The
18 applicant was 23 years old at the time of the 2013
19 arrest.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you for that.

21 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Colbert?

22 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
23 motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Yeah, this is Bezick. I
25 move that we overturn the denial and grant the work card

1 for Mr. Colbert.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. I have a
3 motion. Do we have a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
5 Cortez. I'll second the motion.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
7 second. All in favor, say "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.
10 Congratulations, Mr. Colbert. Your denial has been
11 overturned. The Board staff will reach out to you for
12 next steps.

13 MR. COLBERT: I just want to thank everyone for
14 considering me, and I appreciate it. Have a blessed
15 day.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're very welcome, sir.

17 MR. COLBERT: Good-bye for now.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Anthony
19 Jefferson, are you on the line?

20 MR. JEFFERSON: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, are you aware that
22 you're under oath?

23 MR. JEFFERSON: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

25 Investigator Saladino, could you tell us about

1 Mr. Jefferson.

2 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
3 applicant was denied for a 1994 felony conviction, out
4 of California, for robbery first degree. He was
5 convicted and received three years probation and one
6 year jail suspended. The applicant stated that, in his
7 appeal letter that he completely failed to remember this
8 incident and: It was not my intention to falsify,
9 withhold or not disclose any information. The incident
10 happened when I was about 19 years old and just barely
11 graduating high school when I stupidly got into a fight
12 on a city bus and took something that did not belong to
13 me This unfortunate incident happened so long ago that
14 I failed to recollect. We are talking about something
15 that happened over 25 years ago, when I was a child and
16 I was dealing with multitude of issues, which my
17 immaturity level caused me to act out.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

19 Board, are there any questions for
20 Mr. Jefferson?

21 Okay. If there's no questions for
22 Mr. Jefferson, I'll entertain a motion.

23 I'll make a second call for a motion concerning
24 agenda item number 72, Mr. Jefferson.

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member

1 Brown. I will move to uphold the denial, based on
2 failure to disclose a serious crime.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
4 a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
7 second. All in favor, say "aye."

8 (Board members said "aye.")

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr. Jefferson, again, it's
10 just the failure to disclose. I understood it was years
11 ago. And it really does pain us to deny. But we have
12 to remain consistent in requiring that people, you know,
13 answer the questions. So thank you, sir. You have the
14 ability to apply again in one year. Now that you have
15 the information about the incident, please make sure
16 that you document fully.

17 MR. JEFFERSON: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Have a
19 great day.

20 Mr. Glen -- Mr. Starling, are you on the line?

21 MR. STARLING: Yes, I am.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Sir, are
23 you aware you're under oath?

24 MR. STARLING: Yes, I am.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

1 Investigator Saladino, can you tell us about
2 Mr. Starling?

3 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
4 applicant was denied for a 2000 misdemeanor conviction
5 for carrying concealed weapon on person, out of
6 California. The applicant received 48 months of
7 probation. Probation started on November 29th of 2000
8 and ended on December 12th of 2004.

9 (Outside interruption.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, would you mute your
11 phone until you're asked to speak.

12 MR. STARLING: Yes. Yes, yes.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

14 MR. SALADINO: 1203.4 dismissal was issued on
15 September 26th of 2006 per the court documents. The
16 applicant did not disclose this weapons conviction.
17 Once the applicant was notified of the denial, the
18 applicant provided court documents to show the
19 conviction was dismissed under California Penal Code
20 1203.4 and now wishes to appeal.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

22 Are there any questions for Mr. Starling?

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Starling, this is
24 Board Member Cortez. Is there a reason why you failed
25 to disclose the charge?

1 MR. STARLING: Yes. To be honest with you,
2 because I took care of everything through the County of
3 San Bernardino, and that was something on that, that on
4 their part that they didn't clear it off my record in a
5 timely manner, because they was going through this whole
6 system update. Otherwise, I would have disclosed it if
7 I knew it was there. But it was the reason that they
8 didn't clear it off their records. But when I was
9 notified that it wasn't cleared off my record, I made
10 the necessary adjustments, and what I had to do is get
11 in contact with the San Bernardino courts and then get
12 back in contact with you guys, say, look, this is what
13 happened, and here is the document. And they took care
14 of it right away.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIRMAN NIXON: Board, are there any
17 more questions for Mr. Starling?

18 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
19 entertain a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move
21 that we uphold the denial, based on lack of candor on
22 the application.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Do we have
24 a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion and a
2 second. All in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr. Starling,
5 unfortunately, we cannot overturn your denial for a work
6 registration. Please apply again in one year. Make
7 sure that you note everything on your application.
8 Thank you.

9 I'm going to move to item, agenda item number
10 74. Mr. Washington, are you on the line?

11 MR. WASHINGTON: Yes, I am.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Sir, are
13 you aware you're under oath?

14 MR. WASHINGTON: Yes, I am.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

16 Investigator Saladino, could you please tell us
17 about Mr. Washington.

18 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
19 applicant was denied for a 2018 misdemeanor conviction
20 for carrying a concealed weapon in a vehicle, out of
21 California, where he received two years of probation, a
22 fine and a work program and a suspended jail sentence.
23 The applicant stated that he was an armed security in
24 California, was leaving work when he was stopped by law
25 enforcement. The firearm was on his duty belt and

1 holstered in the back seat.

2 The applicant did not disclose the conviction.
3 A search of the California's Security and Investigative
4 Services, BSIS, did confirm that the applicant has a
5 current security guard card in California for an exposed
6 firearm and baton permit. BSIS did suspend the
7 applicant's registration on 5-10 of '19 and then
8 overturned the decision on August 5th of '19. The
9 applicant wishes to appeal the denial.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

11 Are there any questions from the Board?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Investigator, this is
13 Gronauer. That puts a little caveat in there a little
14 different like when you say that. In California, they
15 suspended it and all that, and then they reinstated it,
16 because of situations. That's the way I understand it?

17 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because he had a card
19 to carry an open weapon. Is that correct?

20 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And then the gun was
22 open on his duty belt in the back seat. And then he got
23 in trouble for it. But then they reversed their
24 decision and said that's not good.

25 MR. SALADINO: Correct. BSIS, once they had

1 their disciplinary review committee regarding no
2 automatic suspensions for the weapons violation, they
3 overturned it when they realized, you know, how it came
4 to be, being that he was an armed security guard, it was
5 in the back seat holstered in his duty belt.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. The next
7 question is for Mr. Starling.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Washington. We're on
9 Washington.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, I'm sorry.
11 Washington. Mr. Washington.

12 MR. WASHINGTON: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Why didn't you disclose
14 it?

15 MR. WASHINGTON: Well, I didn't know exactly
16 what the charge was. But it wasn't, I didn't say
17 anything about it on my background, like on the
18 background check.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Why didn't you
20 disclose it, though?

21 MR. WASHINGTON: Oh, okay. I didn't know that
22 I didn't. I'm sorry about that. But for the most part,
23 I thought it wasn't even on my background anymore, just
24 because after two years they said that it shouldn't be.
25 But I'm guessing that it was. So that's why I didn't

1 disclose it. But for the most part, that can never
2 happen again, just simply because I am a CCW holder in
3 Nevada now. So we won't have any problems like that
4 anymore.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, I guess, my question is
7 there's two different things. There's BSIS, did you,
8 and then the --

9 MR. WASHINGTON: Yeah, they did the --

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, hang on one second.

11 So, Investigator Saladino, he was arrested and
12 convicted of this. Was that overturned, or?

13 MR. WASHINGTON: No, you know what, I don't
14 know exactly --

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, please hold. Sir,
16 please hold. I'm talking to the investigator. Please
17 hold.

18 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The CCW
19 in the vehicle was he was convicted of it. It is a
20 misdemeanor charge in California. BSIS looked at his
21 licensing status or his registered work card with them,
22 suspended it at the time, found out what it was about,
23 and then reinstated his work card, being that it was in
24 the performance of his duties. That's separate from
25 what the courts did. The courts upheld him having the

1 firearm in the vehicle.

2 Madam Chair, this is something that has come up
3 with the past with registered armed security in
4 California. We've had a couple denials that had been
5 overturned in the past where security staff was leaving
6 their work performance or leaving their work area and
7 was pulled over by law enforcement.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I don't know, and I
9 don't know if we can find the answer to this, but in the
10 state of California they're required to put it in their
11 trunk or have it on their body, versus, you know, in the
12 back seat?

13 MR. SALADINO: I know in the state of
14 California there's a lot of restrictions regarding
15 firearms. It's very difficult to get a CCW there.
16 However, I don't understand. If you're an armed
17 security officer in a uniform, and you explain that to
18 law enforcement, I can't answer to why he was charged
19 with those charges.

20 MR. INGRAM: Do we need to clarify for the
21 record what California BSIS is?

22 MR. SALADINO: I said that into the record.

23 MR. INGRAM: I apologize. Mr. Saladino said he
24 already said that in the record. I just missed it.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any

1 further questions for Mr. Washington?

2 Sir, you were convicted, and you were given --
3 well, what happened when you went to court, what were
4 you told?

5 MR. WASHINGTON: So at court, pretty much the
6 only reason why I pled to the charge was so that my gun
7 license wouldn't be taken if I went to trial and then
8 they convicted me. But once I got done with everything
9 that I had to do, they didn't tell me anything. I still
10 haven't even heard from them. It was just like, you
11 know, go, go, go home. After my last court date, they
12 didn't tell me, oh, you can comment back within six
13 months and, you know, do this or that. They just, I
14 still haven't heard from them. So I have to, I guess, I
15 have to do it on my own and go find out what exactly I
16 have to do to get that off my background. Because this
17 has been very, very much of a headache.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do we have any court
19 documents saying that information's done or a
20 disposition?

21 MR. WASHINGTON: Oh, it's definitely done.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, I'm asking the
23 investigator.

24 MR. WASHINGTON: Okay. I'm sorry.

25 MR. SALADINO: Out of the Municipal Court of

1 San Jose, it shows that, the two years probation. And
2 that was completed, I want to say it was in '19. It was
3 completely early with the probation. So he's off paper
4 now.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
6 questions for Mr. Washington?

7 So if there's no further questions, I'll
8 entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I'll make
10 the motion. Although we've been going with this
11 nondisclose all day long, this here has a whole
12 different meaning than all the other things does. And
13 the other ones are bad enough. But this one here, to
14 me, just seems to be way out of line. Armed security
15 guard in uniform. The gun's in the back seat. I'm just
16 going to make the motion that because of those reasons,
17 we're going to, I'm going to make a motion to grant the
18 appeal for Mr. Washington.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
20 a second?

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
22 Cortez. I am also going to second that motion. I
23 agree, this is rather confusing. You have a conviction,
24 but then you have someone else telling you that it's
25 overturned. And I kind of understand why he would say

1 he made the deal if that's actually how the negotiations
2 went down. I am comfortable with the information
3 provided. So I am going to second the motion.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
5 second. All in favor, say "aye."

6 (Board members said "aye.")

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Washington, your
8 work card will be approved. Sir, you know, until you
9 get this figured out, if you fill out anything else, I
10 would put it on your application so you don't run into
11 these issues. But congratulations. Your work card is
12 approved.

13 MR. WASHINGTON: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And they will, the Board
15 staff will contact you for next steps.

16 MR. WASHINGTON: Thank you, you guys. I truly
17 appreciate it.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're very welcome, sir.
19 Thank you.

20 MS. JACKSON: I don't mean to interrupt. This
21 is Pamela Jackson. My name was called.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, ma'am, we trailed your
23 appeal until the end of the session because you didn't
24 respond. So. But if you could please hold, we'll call
25 you again at the end with all the rest of the trails.

1 MS. JACKSON: Yes, ma'am. Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

3 We'll go on to the next item number, agenda
4 item number 75, Toni Readus.

5 MS. READUS: Yes, I'm here.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ms. Readus, are you on?

7 MS. READUS: Hello?

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, is this Ms. Readus?

9 MS. READUS: Yes, it is.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are you aware,
11 ma'am, that you're under oath?

12 MS. READUS: Yes, I do.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

14 Investigator Saladino, can you please tell us
15 about Ms. Readus?

16 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino.
17 The applicant was denied for a 1998 felony conviction,
18 out of California, for petty theft with priors. The
19 applicant received 16 months prison sentence. On
20 October 6th of 2000, the fingerprint report shows a
21 parole violation. The applicant did not disclose
22 when she submitted her application. She did disclose
23 after the denial was received.

24 1990, there was a misdemeanor conviction for
25 petty theft, out of California, where she received three

1 years probation. The applicant was arrested on 6-29 of
2 '90 and 8-29 of '90 for petty theft. The fingerprint
3 report shows that she pled to another charge that wasn't
4 listed.

5 1990, out of California, there was a
6 misdemeanor again for petty thefts with priors, where
7 she received three years probation and 120 days in jail.
8 The fingerprint report shows this was the same, shows
9 the same arrest conviction in December. This one was
10 October. There was another one in December.

11 1992, out of California, there was a felony for
12 second-degree burglary and theft of personal property,
13 slash, petty theft. This was dismissed as she pled to
14 other charges, being that she was on probation.

15 2004, out of California, there was a
16 misdemeanor theft, where she was convicted and received
17 three years of probation.

18 2006, again in August, there was a felony petty
19 theft with priors. She received three years of
20 probation, 30 days jail and a fine. The penal code for
21 this arrest is the triple-6 PC, which is a felony in
22 California.

23 2009, in June, out of California, there was the
24 petty theft again. The prosecution deferred and revoked
25 her parole.

1 2015, there was a felony for felon on prison
2 grounds. The applicant was only detained, and she was
3 released.

4 The applicant failed to disclose her arrests
5 and convictions. On her appeal letter to the Board, she
6 stated: For one, I thought the app said the last five
7 years.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
9 questions for Ms. Readus?

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
11 Cortez. Mrs. Readus, could I get an explanation as to
12 why you failed to disclose any of your convictions or
13 arrests?

14 MS. READUS: Actually, I tried to do as many as
15 I can. Because when I was getting in trouble, I was
16 getting in trouble back-to-back. And as you can see,
17 all of my crimes was petty theft with priors, with
18 priors, with priors. And then I finally went to prison.

19 I haven't been in trouble since 2003. I've
20 been listening to all of these cases. I listed about 10
21 of them. I was discharged in 2003. I have not been in
22 trouble since 2003. So where he's coming from with
23 2015, I don't know nothing about that. I moved to
24 Las Vegas like three years ago. I've had a jaywalking
25 ticket that I forgot about, and I went to jail for that

1 for like four days. That's the only time I've been in
2 trouble since 2003.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So my question to
4 you was -- ma'am, excuse me. Sorry. My question to you
5 was why did you fail to disclose any of the criminal
6 history? I understand that you're questioning about the
7 2015. But I got seven other ones.

8 MS. READUS: I don't know nothing about 2015.
9 But, anyways, I --

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Forget about the 2015.
11 Ma'am, I'm asking about the prior seven ones. Why did
12 you fail to disclose any of those?

13 MS. READUS: Oh, yeah, I did put some of them
14 down. I couldn't remember all of them. So when --

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

16 MS. READUS: I put it as best -- oh, no, okay.
17 When I first came down, the officer just brought my
18 discharge card in person. Because I have two of them.
19 I haven't been in trouble since 2003.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No, I understood that,
21 ma'am. This is Board Member Cortez again. But I want
22 to express -- ma'am, what I need you and every other
23 applicant to understand is that it clearly states you
24 need to list everything, regardless of your opinion,
25 whether it happened five years ago or 10 years ago. It

1 asks you to list everything. And then I also have some
2 information that when you were asked, or on your letter,
3 the letter of appeal, your letter indicates: For one, I
4 thought the app said the last five years.

5 MS. READUS: Okay. Yes, that's what I did say.
6 Because that's what I thought it said.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

8 MS. READUS: So when I came in here and filled
9 it out, I was in a hurry because I went to the place,
10 they told me to go and --

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, ma'am.

12 So, Investigator, was anything listed on there,
13 on the initial app?

14 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. I have
15 the app right here. I'm pulling it up. And there is
16 nothing listed in her arrest history.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

18 Board, are there any other questions for
19 Ms. Readus?

20 Okay. Hearing there's no further questions,
21 I'll entertain a motion.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
23 Cortez. I'm going to motion to uphold the denial, based
24 on time and distance, the severity of cases, and failure
25 to disclose.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Is there a
2 second?

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown will
4 second.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
6 have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board Member Gronauer is
9 not in the room, so he is not voting.

10 But, Ms. Readus, we are upholding the denial of
11 your work card. You are more than welcome to come back
12 in one year and apply again. Again, it can be on the
13 phone, and even with yourself, you know, it is important
14 that you list everything. And so we would encourage you
15 to do that if you do decide to apply again. Thank you.
16 Thank you, ma'am.

17 Okay. Moving to agenda item number 76, Daevon
18 Davis. Mr. Davis, are you on the line? Mr. Davis, are
19 you on the line and possibly muted?

20 MR. INGRAM: Trail?

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We are going to
22 trail agenda item number 76 to the end of the meeting.

23 Moving on to agenda item number 77, Elmer
24 Moore. Mr. Moore, are you on the line?

25 MR. MOORE: Yes.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Are you
2 aware you're under oath?

3 MR. MOORE: Yes.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

5 Investigator Swarthout, could you please tell
6 us a little bit about Mr. Moore.

7 MR. SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied for a
8 conviction of a felony. This is his second time coming
9 before the Board. His denial was upheld at the
10 September 23rd, 2020 Board meeting. His conviction is
11 from 2015, is coercion with force or threat of force.
12 He was sentenced to 12 months to 36 months in Nevada
13 State's Prisons, it was a suspended sentence, and had 36
14 months probation. The original case was lewdness by a
15 person over 18 with a child less than 14. The applicant
16 was honorably discharged from probation on November 6th,
17 2017. The applicant listed this arrest on his
18 application and was not made provisional.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Is he registered?

20 MR. SWARTHOUT: He is not required to be
21 registered at this time.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
23 questions for Mr. Moore?

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
25 Cortez. Mr. Moore, what have you been doing since you

1 last came before us?

2 MR. MOORE: I was working for a temp. Then I
3 got let go a week after I got denied for my guard card.
4 So I've just been looking for work, not successful. But
5 I reapplied for my guard card again, because I had got a
6 job offer for a security company.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Where at, if you don't
8 mind me asking?

9 MR. MOORE: GardaWorld Security.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
12 questions for Mr. Moore?

13 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
14 entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
16 Cortez. I'll motion to overturn the denial and approve
17 Mr. Moore his work card, based on the information
18 provided. He followed through as instructed last year
19 with time and distance, giving some more time to allow
20 another opportunity to get the work card. So I am
21 motioning to overturn the denial.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a motion. Do I
23 have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Yeah, this is Bezick. I
25 second.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion, and
2 I have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

3 (Board members said "aye.")

4 BOARD CHAIR BROWN: This is Brown saying nay.
5 I have some reservations about waiting a year before
6 reapplying.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do you want to expand on
8 that, Mr. Brown? I'm sorry.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes. Normally, as we've
10 been doing, when somebody is denied, we tell them that
11 they can reapply again in a year. He had his appeal
12 hearing in September of '20. It's not yet a year.

13 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. The reason why
14 it was September of last year is because we combined
15 three Board meetings together. So when he originally
16 applied, it was, I want to say, the first quarter of
17 2020, which is why we allowed him to reapply. Because
18 of COVID, we were not able to do those meetings. So,
19 essentially, he did wait a year. It just wasn't heard
20 before the Board till September. So we made that
21 discretion for the individuals that were current, the
22 Board meeting in September of 2020.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. With
24 that explanation, I'll change my vote to aye.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. So thank you

1 for that. So the motion passes.

2 And, Mr. Moore, your work card registration has
3 been approved. The Board will reach out to you for next
4 steps.

5 MR. MOORE: Okay. Thank you so much. You all
6 have a good day.

7 MR. INGRAM: For the record, Board Member
8 Gronauer is not in the room right now, so he did not
9 vote.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

11 Okay. Agenda item number 78, Mr. Eric Reyes.
12 Mr. Reyes, are you on the line?

13 MR. REYES: Yes, ma'am, I am.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Are you
15 aware you're under oath?

16 MR. REYES: Yes, I am.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

18 Investigator Swarthout, can you tell us a
19 little about Mr. Reyes?

20 MR. SWARTHOUT: So the applicant was denied for
21 a felony conviction. He was convicted in 2010 of false
22 imprisonment. He received a prison term of six months.
23 He did receive a 1203.4 for it. He listed it on the
24 application. He also provided a copy of a certificate
25 of rehabilitation which was granted on September 17th of

1 2020. He was paroled on October 4th of 2010, after that
2 conviction.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
4 questions for Mr. Reyes?

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
6 Cortez. I have a question for Investigator Swarthout.
7 Have the fingerprints been received?

8 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes, they have.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Anything positive
10 or negative or anything?

11 MR. SWARTHOUT: They showed the conviction.
12 His original arrest was for robbery second-degree, one
13 count, one count of possession of controlled substance
14 while armed, one count of possession of narcotics
15 controlled substance, one count of conspiracy to commit
16 crime, one count of impersonating a police officer, one
17 count of manufacture, sell, possess dangerous weapon,
18 et cetera, one count of false imprisonment, one count of
19 sexual battery, sexual arousal, one count of carrying a
20 loaded firearm in a public place.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And this was from the
22 2010 case?

23 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Got it. So it was
25 charged with the --

1 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So are there any
4 questions from the Board, any other questions?

5 Mr. Reyes, I have one question. What have you
6 been doing since you've been released?

7 MR. REYES: Well, I've been doing odd jobs here
8 and there. I currently was granted my guard card in
9 California. So I'm currently working security in
10 California.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
12 further questions from the Board?

13 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
14 motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'm
16 sorry. I was away for a little bit. Was there
17 fingerprints done?

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: M-hm (affirmative).

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I didn't.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
21 Cortez. I'm going to motion to overturn the denial and
22 grant Mr. Reyes a work card.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. I have a
24 motion. Do I have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member

1 Brown. I'll second.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
3 second. All in favor, say "aye."

4 (Board members said "aye.")

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I abstain because I
6 wasn't in.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

8 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.
9 Member Gronauer's abstention is based on his not being
10 present for the discussion and deliberation.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

12 So we have three in -- no, four in favor, one
13 abstention. The motion passes. Mr. Reyes,
14 congratulations. You're getting your work card. The
15 Board staff will reach out to you with further steps.

16 MR. REYES: Thank you, ma'am. Thank you for
17 this decision.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Have a great
19 day.

20 MR. REYES: You, too. Take care.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We're now at agenda item
22 number 79, Luis Lopez. Mr. Lopez, are you here, sir?

23 MR. LOPEZ: Yes, ma'am. Thank you. Good
24 afternoon.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon.

1 Investigator Swarthout, can you please tell us
2 about Mr. Lopez?

3 MR. SWARTHOUT: Okay. The applicant --

4 MR. INGRAM: Mr. Lopez, for the record, Kevin
5 Ingram. Would you please acknowledge that you are
6 currently under oath.

7 MR. LOPEZ: Yes, sir.

8 MR. INGRAM: Thank you very much.

9 MR. SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied for a
10 conviction of a felony and conviction of an illegal use
11 and possession of a dangerous weapon.

12 2010, the applicant was convicted of a felony
13 for possession of a firearm by convicted person by CCW
14 on a person with prior convictions. That was 1203.4.

15 In 2009, the applicant was convicted of a
16 felony vandalism, was sentenced to 180 days in jail,
17 suspended, and three years probation.

18 In 2008, the applicant was convicted of a
19 misdemeanor disorderly conduct, prostitution, sentenced
20 to 10 days in jail and two years probation.

21 SCOPE didn't show these arrests. The applicant
22 did list them on his application and was not made
23 provisional due to listing the convictions. When he was
24 contacted, he did provide court documents for the
25 vandalism and the possession of a firearm by a convicted

1 person with CCW charge. Fingerprints showed an
2 additional arrest from 4-3 of 2002 for possession,
3 manufacture, sell dangerous weapon, et cetera. He was
4 sentenced to juvenile hall at the time.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
6 questions for Mr. Lopez?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I have a question for
8 the investigator. This is Gronauer. In number three,
9 the 2008 March arrest for misdemeanor disorderly
10 conduct, prostitution, it says this arrest was disclosed
11 by the -- was not disclosed by the applicant, was found
12 on the fingerprints. But on top, where it says
13 disclosed, it says yes.

14 MR. SWARTHOUT: That must have been a mistake.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Typo?

16 MR. GRONAUER: Yeah.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Which one is the typo?

19 MR. SWARTHOUT: That he didn't disclose it, it
20 wasn't disclosed.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: He did disclose?

22 MR. SWARTHOUT: No, it wasn't disclosed.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It wasn't. Okay.

24 MR. SWARTHOUT: It was found on his
25 fingerprints.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

2 Mr. Lopez?

3 MR. LOPEZ: Yes, sir?

4 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member
5 Gronauer. Can you just explain to me why you didn't
6 disclose the misdemeanor disorderly conduct,
7 prostitution in 2008?

8 MR. LOPEZ: My apologies, sir. I thought I
9 did. I thought it was part of the disposition court
10 papers that I provided the State of Nevada. And my
11 apologies if I probably just misread or didn't find it
12 there. Just I received the court documents from my
13 court, and I sent it on by. And I didn't realize that
14 it was not in there. My apologies. I didn't realize I
15 had to, also, the juvenile case as well. You know, I
16 didn't know I had to go way back that far.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Born in '86.

18 MR. LOPEZ: You know, and if it's okay with the
19 Board, with your permission, I am currently working with
20 a security company, and I actually have the CEO and the
21 COO available to speak upon, you know, my character, if
22 you would allow it.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is between the
24 Board and you at this point. Again, in 2008, you said
25 it was a juvenile one. Well, you were over, you were

1 well over 18 years old by that time.

2 MR. LOPEZ: No, because I heard someone say
3 something about that juvenile case. I just overheard
4 that. I just thought it was part of the process, and I
5 wasn't aware.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm not aware of any
7 juvenile case.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: 2002. He was sentenced
9 to juvie hall.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, okay.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That was my question.
12 That was not disclosed. You're asking on the 2011,
13 2008.

14 MR. LOPEZ: Right.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So, for clarification,
16 why did you not disclose the '08, you thought you did,
17 but you didn't?

18 MR. LOPEZ: Correct, I thought I did it, I
19 thought it was part of the disposition court papers that
20 I provided. I thought I did put the actual penal code
21 on the actual application. Just I couldn't find any
22 other information.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I think, you're getting
24 the cases mixed up. You're getting the cases mixed up.
25 Because on the 2008, it was not disclosed, and it

1 actually was found on fingerprints by our investigators.

2 MR. LOPEZ: And I'm just explaining that I
3 assume, I thought it was part of the disposition papers.
4 And during the application process, I had to reprint the
5 paperwork again. Because I was trying to redo it to
6 make sure everything was correct. And I probably
7 missed, I probably didn't, forgot to put it in there.
8 But, again, I thought it was included in the disposition
9 papers. I apologize if it was not included.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
11 further questions from the Board?

12 MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, I'd like to follow up
13 with one of his statements, if I may. Kevin Ingram, for
14 the record.

15 Mr. Lopez, did I hear you say that you're
16 currently working for a security company?

17 MR. LOPEZ: Correct, sir. I was just pretty
18 much doing more administration work, you know, providing
19 the interviews, providing uniforms.

20 MR. INGRAM: Can I ask you what the name of
21 that company is?

22 MR. LOPEZ: Yes, sir. It's Pono Security. So
23 I'm not an actual guard. I just pretty much do more the
24 administration work. And just like everybody else wants
25 to be an asset to the company. And I'm just looking to

1 expand.

2 MR. INGRAM: All right. Mr. Lopez, let me
3 interrupt you. Regardless of the position that you hold
4 with a licensed entity, you must have a registered work
5 card. It doesn't -- you don't have to just have a card
6 to be a guard. If you're working for them and they're
7 paying you, on a denied card.

8 Investigator Swarthout, do you have any more
9 information on that?

10 MR. SWARTHOUT: So the company currently does
11 not have a QA. The QA resigned. The company has been
12 notified of his denial. And they've been issued a
13 violation once they confirmed that he was working for
14 them.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What's the name of the
16 company?

17 MR. SWARTHOUT: Pono. Pono, P-O-N-O.

18 (There was a discussion off the record.)

19 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.
20 There was a question from the Chairwoman to me regarding
21 next steps. If that was the question, my only comment
22 would be to not go into discussion about this other
23 company, that is being Pono, like cease discussion about
24 it.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any

1 further questions from the Board for Mr. Lopez?

2 Okay. And so I just want to make it clear, and
3 this is for Investigator Swarthout, all the arrests and
4 convictions, except for one, were listed on his
5 application?

6 MR. SWARTHOUT: That is correct.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay. Are there any
8 further questions for Mr. Lopez?

9 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll
10 entertain a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
12 Brown. I move to uphold the denial of the work card for
13 failure to disclose and the accidental disclosure of
14 working without a card.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. I have a
16 motion. Do I have a second?

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. I second.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
19 second. All in favor, say "aye."

20 (Board members said "aye.")

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, Mr. Lopez,
22 unfortunately, your work card has been denied, based off
23 the fact that you didn't disclose one of your
24 convictions or arrests. You are more than welcome to
25 come back in one year and apply, but please make sure

1 that you note everything on your application.

2 MR. LOPEZ: All right. Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

4 Okay. Last agenda item before we go to the
5 trailed items. Agenda items number 80, Corey Cantu.

6 Mr. Cantu, are you on the line?

7 MR. CANTU: Yes, ma'am, I am.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. Are you
9 aware, sir, that you're under oath?

10 MR. CANTU: I am, yes.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Investigator Jones,
12 can you please tell us about Mr. Corey?

13 MR. JONES: Certainly. This is Investigator
14 Jones. December 8th of 2000, out of California, the
15 applicant pled guilty to sexual battery and anal and
16 genital penetration by a foreign object. We do now have
17 the fingerprint results, and both charges did result in
18 a misdemeanor, which resulted in a fine, counseling,
19 jail, registration, and three years probation.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I'm sorry, sir. Was that
21 listed on his application?

22 MR. JONES: Yes, it was disclosed.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It was disclosed. Okay.
24 So I'm not sure if this is a typo, but it says from 2001
25 to two thousand -- or to 2200. Is that supposed to be

1 2020, sir?

2 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones.

3 MR. CANTU: Yes.

4 MR. JONES: That's correct, that's supposed to
5 be 2020.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIR CORTEZ: Wait. From 2001 to 2020?

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: To '20, 19 years.

9 BOARD CHAIR CORTEZ: Oh, okay. Got it.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any questions for
11 Mr. Cantu?

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I
13 have a question for Investigator Jones.

14 MR. JONES: Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Were you able to verify
16 the time for registration, sex offender registration; is
17 it 2001 to 2020?

18 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. I do not have
19 court documents physically stating any length of time.
20 However, I did check both the California and Nevada
21 registry this morning, and he was not on either one.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Can I ask, and this may be
24 my ignorance, but under severity it says other, and then
25 it goes to that wobbler. What does that mean?

1 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. My
2 understanding, as far as the criminal law goes, he was
3 charged, and the judge has the ability to sentence to
4 that. They found the more gross misdemeanor. Maybe to
5 a misdemeanor, I don't know, but my only experience has
6 been to a gross mis.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. But under severity
8 it says other. Do we have the paperwork? What does
9 that mean, what was it classified as when he was
10 convicted?

11 MR. JONES: Investigator Jones. At the time of
12 this report, we were unsure. However, I take it that
13 both charges were misdemeanors.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

15 Are there any further questions for Mr. Cantu?

16 Okay. I hear no questions from the Board.
17 I'll entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
19 Brown. I move that we grant the appeal and grant
20 Mr. Cantu his work card.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do
22 I have a second?

23 MR. DETMER: Give the basis for the motion.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh. I'm sorry. Could you,
25 Mr. Brown, could you please give us the basis for your

1 motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: The basis is the time and
3 distance. It's been 19 years, well, it's actually been
4 21 years now, but he did 19 years on the sex offender
5 registry. He's met all the conditions of his probation
6 and his sentence.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. I have a
8 motion. Do I have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I
10 second.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
12 have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

13 (Board members said "aye.")

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations, Mr. Cantu.
15 Your registration card has been approved. The Board
16 staff will reach out to you for next steps.

17 MR. CANTU: Thank you. Thank you all for your
18 time. I appreciate this.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're very welcome, sir.
20 So now we'll go back to the items that we
21 trailed.

22 MR. INGRAM: 34 is the first one I have. Chief
23 Irizarry, did you ever receive an email from Mr. Kakos
24 or Mr. Bonarrigo from Prudential Defense?

25 MR. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. Prudential

1 Defense. Yes. And Investigator Swarthout has reviewed
2 it.

3 MR. INGRAM: Perfect. Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Investigator Swarthout,
5 was -- I think, that one was the one where the tax, or
6 the state taxes he stated was taken care of, and he was
7 going to provide proof of that.

8 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes. So he did send proof that
9 the payment was received by Michigan's Department of
10 Treasury and Collections. It was processed today.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So. Okay. Mr. Kakos, are
12 you on the line?

13 So can we have someone call him and ask him to
14 get back on the line, or how do we proceed?

15 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. I'll email him
16 and call him.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay So can we trail this
18 one again and move on to the next item that was trailed
19 while we get Mr. Kakos online?

20 MR. INGRAM: The next one I have on the agenda
21 is number 47, Harvey Boyer.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Boyer, are you
23 the line? Mr. Boyer, are you on the line and possibly
24 muted?

25 Okay. So if Mr. Boyer is not on the line, I'll

1 entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
3 Cortez. I motion to uphold the denial, and based on the
4 no-call, no-show.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have
6 a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
9 second. All in favor, say "aye."

10 (Board members said "aye.")

11 MR. INGRAM: We didn't hear in the north. I'm
12 sorry.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown is aye.

14 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick is an aye.

15 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

17 The next item that was trailed was?

18 MR. INGRAM: Donoval Oldham.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr. Oldham, are you on the
20 line? Mr. Oldham, are you on the line and possibly
21 muted?

22 Okay. Seeing that Mr. Oldham is not on the
23 line, I'll entertain a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board member Cortez. I
25 motion to uphold the denial, based on no-call no-show.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do
2 I have a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown
4 seconds.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. I
6 have a second. All in favor, say "aye."

7 (Board members said "aye.")

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The next one that
9 was trailed?

10 MR. INGRAM: The next one I have is 66, Luis
11 Castellanos.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Castellanos, are
13 you on the line? Mr. Castellanos, are you on the line
14 and possibly muted?

15 Okay. Seeing that Mr. Castellanos is not on
16 the line, I'll entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
18 Cortez. I motion to uphold the denial, based on no-call
19 no-show.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do
21 I have a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll
23 second.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. I have a
25 second. All in favor, say "aye."

1 (Board members said "aye.")

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

3 MR. INGRAM: The next item is item number 70.

4 This is Pamela Jackson. I believe, she's on the line.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ms. Jackson, are you still
6 on the line?

7 MS. JACKSON: Yes, ma'am.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

9 MR. INGRAM: Can you confirm you're under oath?

10 MS. JACKSON: Yes, sir.

11 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Saladino, can
13 you please tell us about Ms. Jackson?

14 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The
15 applicant was denied for a 2000 felony conviction, out
16 of California, for possession of a controlled substance.
17 The applicant received 36 months probation and a
18 suspended jail sentence. The applicant stated that: I
19 was pregnant at the time. I made a mistake, doing it
20 for someone else. But I admit that I got to suffer the
21 consequences.

22 2001, felony conviction, out of California,
23 for inflict corporal injury to spouse, battery domestic
24 violence. The disposition of this is not recorded. The
25 applicant stated she two served two weeks in jail and

1 was released. The applicant was originally arrested for
2 this on August 22nd of 2000, and received a deferral.
3 The applicant stated she was in an abusive relationship
4 at the time.

5 2008, there was a misdemeanor conviction, out
6 of California, for vandalism, which was reduced to
7 obstruct public officer, per the fingerprint report.
8 She received three years of probation for this. The
9 applicant stated she was arrested for destruction of
10 private property and paraphernalia that she had on her.
11 And she received community service for this.

12 The applicant did not disclose her arrests and
13 convictions. She was made provisional and worked for
14 Universal Protection Services from March 22nd of 2021 to
15 March 31st of 2021, when her card was denied. And now
16 she wishes to appeal the denial.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
18 questions for Ms. Jackson?

19 Okay. I'm not hearing any questions.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
21 Cortez. Ms. Jackson, I do have a question for you. Is
22 there a reason why you failed to disclose any of your
23 criminal history?

24 MS. JACKSON: Well, it was an honest mistake.
25 I was in a hurry when I was filling out the application.

1 And I'm also nearsighted, so, and the words are kind of
2 close together. I'm not making an excuse, but that's
3 the reason why I went over it really quick, because I
4 was doing it quick. That's no excuse. I apologize for
5 that.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
8 questions for Ms. Jackson?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
10 Brown. I have a question for Investigator Saladino.

11 MR. SALADINO: Yes, sir.

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Was the rest of the
13 application complete?

14 MR. SALADINO: I'm looking that up right now,
15 sir.

16 The applicant expedited it. And she did
17 complete her work history. She marked down an
18 individual in case of an emergency, contact. Marked no
19 on all the arrest history stuff. Signed and dated it.
20 Got her fingerprints done the same day. Two forms of
21 identification. And the exam.

22 So everything was complete on the application,
23 and there was no disclosure of the arrests.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any other

1 questions from the Board?

2 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a
3 motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
5 Brown. I move to uphold the denial, based on failure to
6 disclose.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. We have a
8 motion. Do we have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have
11 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Unfortunately,
14 Ms. Jackson, we're not going to be able to issue you a
15 work card. Your application has been denied. As you
16 heard throughout the conversation this afternoon, please
17 make sure, in a hurry or not, that you complete your
18 application in its entirety and list everything. You
19 are more than welcome to apply again in a year.

20 MS. JACKSON: Yes, ma'am. Thank you guys so
21 much for listening.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

23 MS. JACKSON: Have a great day.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You, too.

25 MR. INGRAM: The next item I have trailed is

1 item number 76, Daevon Davis. Mr. Davis, are you on the
2 line? Mr. Davis, are you on the line and possibly
3 muted?

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. As you heard,
5 Mr. Davis is not on the line. I'll entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
7 Cortez. I motion to uphold the denial, based on the
8 no-call, no-show.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion.
10 Do we have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This --

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second. Or
13 Brown. One of us.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have two. We have a
15 second. I have a motion. I have a second. All in
16 favor, say "aye."

17 (Board members said "aye.")

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The motion passes,
19 and the denial is upheld.

20 MR. INGRAM: And, Lori, did you say that they
21 are now on?

22 So, Mr. Kakos, are you on the line?

23 MR. KAKOS: Yes, I am.

24 MR. INGRAM: Wonderful. Thank you for calling
25 back in. We're sorry for the delay. It's been a long

1 day with a lot of technical difficulties. We were able
2 to get some more information. Mr. Kakos, will you
3 please confirm that you're still under oath with us,
4 please.

5 MR. KAKOS: Yes, I am under oath.

6 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Mr. Kakos, we received
8 your paperwork, and it looks like it was stated that the
9 payment was made today. Is that the case?

10 MR. KAKOS: Correct. Yes. So after I got off
11 the phone with you guys, I went through my bank records,
12 and I found my IRS payments for the federal government
13 had all cleared by check, and the State of Michigan had
14 not cleared. So I called and waited on hold and was
15 told that they had not received one and that I could
16 make a payment online today. So I went ahead and did
17 that.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
19 further questions?

20 Okay. Hearing there's no further questions, I
21 may have one. What item number?

22 MR. INGRAM: Item 34.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Did we do part of it and
24 not the other part, we approved part of this?

25 MR. INGRAM: I don't think we did anything.

1 And I don't know if Mr. Bonarrigo is on the phone again
2 or not.

3 Mr. Bonarrigo, are you back on the phone with
4 us?

5 MR. KAKOS: I don't believe he is. I had
6 received a call to call back in, but I don't know that
7 he had.

8 MR. INGRAM: Sure. No problem. Thank you.

9 This is a change of status now, on
10 Mr. Bonarrigo --

11 (The Reporter indicated an inability to hear.)

12 MR. DETMER: Not necessarily. It shouldn't be.
13 But we could refer to the record if there's a question
14 as to whether or not Mr. Bonarrigo was considered
15 earlier for licensure. And by the way, this is Mike
16 Detmer, for the record.

17 MR. INGRAM: Would you like us to reach out to
18 Mr. Bonarrigo, and?

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I just want to -- did we
20 bring this up and did we approve Bonarrigo?

21 MR. KAKOS: No.

22 BOARD CHAIRMAN NIXON: No. Okay. So a
23 question to legal counsel. Can we break this up and
24 approve one and not the other?

25 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. I'm

1 actually uncertain. This is a domino type of thing,
2 remove Bonarrigo's licensure, and is that going to term
3 it.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And, Madam Chair, can I
6 recommend that we push it to the next Board meeting so
7 we can them both here?

8 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. That
9 is a viable alternative. Or if she chooses, the
10 Chairwoman has the discretion to trail.

11 MR. INGRAM: And, again, just for the record,
12 for clarification, Mr. Bonarrigo is a change of status
13 application, if you look at his application. So,
14 potentially, the Board can consider that as a consent
15 item. Or they can consider it as a whole item because
16 of that, in his absence. The Board could postpone. Or
17 we could -- I've got his cell phone. He would probably
18 get on the phone with us right away. And that's at the
19 Board's discretion as well.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So if I could clear it up,
21 I guess, my concern is not Mr. Bonarrigo as much as it
22 is Kakos and his outstanding IRS debt. I don't know if
23 the Board has any concerns. So I don't know if we want
24 to. Are there any questions from the Board surrounding
25 that?

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. The
2 only thing on that subject is I'm a little disappointed
3 that we talked about it earlier, and he said that this
4 was taken care of. And then we find out it's taken care
5 of today, after we already discussed it. That gives me
6 a little --

7 MR. KAKOS: I completely understand, I can
8 completely understand that. I went through my check
9 records. I had found the check, check number 402. So
10 my check, it was not cashed.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. I'm not
12 done speaking, sir. I didn't break in on you. I'm not
13 done speaking, please. Okay. And as far as the IRS,
14 the other things that are out there, do we have some
15 proof that they're paid for?

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So my understanding -- and,
17 Investigator Swarthout, please feel free to enlighten
18 us -- it's still out there, and it's about \$55,000. And
19 so knowing what can happen and that we were told that
20 the taxes were paid --

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Gives us some concern.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, gives me some concern.

23 MR. SWARTHOUT: That is correct. The \$55,000
24 is still outstanding. He is working with an attorney on
25 getting that situated.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Is that the one -- it's
2 Gronauer again. Is that the one that you had a letter
3 from the attorney or something?

4 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: He's a real attorney?

6 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I mean on letterhead?

8 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes.

9 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, I guess, I go back to
11 are there any questions from the Board concerning this
12 item? And, you know, do we want to -- or are there any
13 further questions from the Board?

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Is the issue that
15 Mr. Bonarrigo is not here?

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, I don't have an issue
17 with Mr. Bonarrigo. But I have an issue with the fact
18 that the taxes stated earlier.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Right.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr. Kakos said the taxes
21 were paid. We found out they were paid today. And we
22 still have a hanging \$55,000 from the IRS, you know.

23 So Board Member Nixon. My concern is we were
24 told earlier that the taxes were paid. And I understand
25 the discrepancy and your explanation, sir. But that

1 turned out not to be the case. And there is an
2 additional \$55,000 plus out there. And if that becomes
3 a financial difficulty at some point, the pay will not
4 get paid. And so that's where I have some concern
5 leaving that open and not having an answer for that.

6 MR. KAKOS: Oh, yeah, I completely understand
7 that. And if you don't mind, I can -- I do roughly
8 \$13 million a year in revenue, which is the federal
9 marshals, U.S. Marshals alone. My average payroll on a
10 weekly basis is north of \$800,000. I have more than
11 adequate ability to be able to pay that as soon as it's
12 resolved. I've been waiting on it -- this is years. I
13 was unable to refinance my house. This burden has been
14 going on for years. And it's a simple dispute. The
15 year in question, I made less than \$100,000, paid
16 \$30,000 federal tax, and somehow was assessed for an
17 additional 55. It makes no sense to me. It made no
18 sense to my attorney. And we've been battling it for
19 years. As soon as they give me a final answer, I'd love
20 to move past it.

21 I can understand where you're coming from with
22 the wherewithal. I use ADP for my payroll. My
23 payroll's never been missed. I pay approximately 2,000
24 people. I understand \$55,000 seems like a large amount
25 of money, but it's really miniscule in the grand scheme

1 of things in the business that I do. I'd
2 love to resolve it, I really would. As soon as they
3 give me the answer, I will write a check that day.

4 And I do understand where you're coming from
5 with the State of Michigan. I don't have an answer for
6 that. I wrote the check in March. It didn't clear.
7 went through my bank records. That's how I found it
8 didn't clear. And you guys will notice the amount of
9 the lien was \$2,700. The amount that I paid today was
10 over \$5,000, because they assessed more penalties and
11 interest on it, on top of that.

12 So that's the best I have. And that's the
13 reason why we were coming to Nevada, was Customs and
14 Border Patrol, because of our presence with the U.S.
15 Marshals, has asked us to take over or take a look at,
16 rather, I should say, the prisoner transport from
17 McCarran Airport as well as Reno Airport and a few
18 others. Because we are the largest provider of private
19 security for the U.S. Marshals in the U.S. So that's
20 the reason why we are moving towards Nevada. It's still
21 months out, potentially, even next year. But that is
22 what we are coming to Nevada for.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I think, I
25 misunderstood at the beginning. This is Gronauer. I

1 may have misunderstood at the beginning on this phone
2 call, that you contacted the IRS also, along with
3 contacting this \$5,000 deal with Michigan. So. And you
4 said something about the IRS said something to you
5 today?

6 MR. KAKOS: No, no, no. I'm represented by an
7 attorney for the IRS. And they've been -- I think,
8 they'd just like to collect the check. Ironically, you
9 guys -- I kind of chuckled a little bit. I pay \$35,000
10 or \$40,000 a month in legal fees. I don't talk to the
11 IRS. I could talk to the State of Michigan. But my
12 attorneys don't let me talk to the IRS. They've been
13 disputing it for years. It's still not settled. As
14 soon as they have a number for me, that's all I've asked
15 for is just give me a final assessment number, and I'll
16 pay it in full. No questions asked. I'm done with it.
17 But they have not given it to me. I've been bounced
18 between three different agents over the last few years,
19 and just still waiting on a number. And it's always,
20 within the next 90 days, sir. That's the answer that I
21 get.

22 I did not call the IRS today, no. I only
23 called the State of Michigan and found out they had not
24 received the check. After I had already looked in my
25 bank records and seen that no check had cleared, I

1 called them, and they told me to go online and pay it,
2 and I did immediately.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
4 questions from the Board?

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, one for the
6 attorney, if you don't mind.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It could be anybody
9 here. All right. But the attorney specifically. This
10 is Gronauer again. I think, we did something like this
11 in the past. But then again maybe it's just a dream.
12 It does seem a nightmare right now. Did we have it
13 where we can approve something with an attachment on it
14 that if it's -- then we could look at it in a year from
15 now, and if it's not settled?

16 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. Just
17 because I don't recall off the top of my head, what is
18 the length of the license, a year?

19 To answer your question specifically, many
20 statutes or boards will have a provision that
21 specifically say that you can condition the license for
22 any cause deemed sufficient by the board or commission.
23 I don't recall this Board specifically having that.
24 However, I have seen some that have said that is
25 inherent, the ability to grant any license and place

1 conditions on it.

2 So I believe that the answer is, yes, you can
3 place conditions on a license. However, in doing so,
4 the Board has to be very careful to be specific about
5 those conditions and what the effect is if those
6 conditions are not met.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: The ability to have a
8 license.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I remember --

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: We had something.
11 Excuse me. It was your first time on the Board. I
12 think, it was my first or second.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So. And I know we had
15 something like that where we put a provision on it. But
16 I'm just trying to figure out. You know, when you say
17 be specific, I'm not the attorney. My son is. Okay.

18 MR. DETMER: It's just be careful as far as
19 what those conditions are. Because oftentimes, there's
20 conditions we place on a license, but then the Board
21 will neglect or forget to say what the effect of that
22 condition is if it's not met.

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, is there -- now
24 we'll go to the Executive Director. This is still
25 Gronauer. Do you have such a thing -- or, Lori, do you

1 have such a thing as a tickle box, when this one year
2 come up, and you have notes under it?

3 MR. INGRAM: Absolutely, we can do that.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We review every year,
5 right?

6 MR. INGRAM: Correct.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: But, you know, you
8 renew every year, just go on and renew. Okay. And then
9 I'm just saying, is there a caveat on there that says,
10 okay, when you renew this, you know, you're going to
11 look at it?

12 MR. INGRAM: We review, myself and/or Shelly
13 Lancaster reviews every submission online to do the
14 final approval, to make sure that the documents are
15 accurate or need correcting. So it's not totally
16 automated.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: You need more staff or
18 more investigators. They need a raise.

19 MR. INGRAM: So what I was saying is even
20 though our online renewal process seems to be fully
21 automated, that myself and one other staff member go in
22 and review every single online renewal submission, to do
23 the final approval, to make sure that all of the
24 documents that are uploaded are, in fact, the correct
25 documents, before we approve, fully approve the renewal

1 for the year.

2 So it would be easy for myself and Board staff
3 to place notes to make sure that certain requirements
4 are met before we hit the approve button next year
5 during the renewal cycle.

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I get that.
7 Now, that makes me a little bit comfortable. The
8 uncomfortable part is, is specific what we're talking
9 about. Okay. What happens if it doesn't do it? It's
10 just as simple as, you know, a license, and that seems
11 like that's oversimplification.

12 MR. DETMER: Well, so the revocation of any
13 license would require a hearing. But if a condition is
14 placed on it, it could be a violation of conditions.
15 You could still have the hearing, as far as the
16 violation of the condition on the license.

17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Just like this, like
18 you just go ahead and have a hearing, or it could happen
19 that way?

20 MR. DETMER: Correct, essentially, yes.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. For work cards
22 and all.

23 MR. DETMER: Or it could lead to a discipline,
24 too, as to a violation or an order.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I'm just being

1 overly cautious, because when you said -- yeah, I mean
2 that really puts a yellow sign on me instead of a green
3 one.

4 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. And
5 I appreciate that. A conditional license can be tricky.
6 And maybe that's a personal opinion of mine. Others may
7 disagree. But I am aware of another commission that
8 does that quite frequently. But, again, I always prefer
9 that it is --

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And it's still
11 Gronauer. And the idea, Mr. Detmer, well, thinking
12 about it, you know, we could, something pretty simple,
13 but when you getting contracts or conditions, you know,
14 here goes 16 pages. You know, I mean you have to be
15 really -- because you want to be that specific, you
16 know. And when you indemnify it and all this other
17 stuff, there's all that stuff that gets involved.

18 And I'm just trying to figure that out.
19 Because, I believe, this is a good corporation, a good
20 company. I believe, there's good people. But I've had
21 a problem with the way we went on already earlier with
22 Mr. Kakos. Okay. Nothing personal against him. But
23 the way the situation ended up. And because of that
24 situation, it keeps my leery of the whole thing. And it
25 would make me feel a little more comfortable putting

1 something on there, because he said this is in the
2 making, might be a year or two from now before. They
3 just want to have their license in place.

4 I believe, that's what you said; is that right,
5 Mr. Kakos?

6 MR. KAKOS: That is correct, yes. I just
7 wanted to make sure we are prepared. I did the
8 walk-through several months ago. They were talking
9 about fiscal year of next year, possibly sooner.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: What is your fiscal
11 year? What is your fiscal year?

12 MR. KAKOS: My fiscal year is January.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. January to
14 December.

15 MR. INGRAM: For the record, Director Ingram.
16 I just want to kind of piggyback on what Board Member
17 Gronauer is asking. Mr. Kakos, you're aware that to bid
18 on a contract in Nevada, even if it's a federal
19 contract, that you're required to be licensed before
20 bidding, correct?

21 MR. KAKOS: Correct. Correct. There has been
22 no bidding. It was just a walk-through.

23 MR. INGRAM: Okay. That's the reasoning for
24 moving forward with licensure. There is currently an
25 RFP out for prison transport, that I'm aware of. And I

1 know that they're going to be amending that and
2 reopening an RFP, because there's -- the State is
3 hurting for inmate transport services in Nevada. So
4 there is a potential that an RFP could be coming out in
5 the next few months that you would want to bid on. So I
6 don't know when that's going to happen. So. And I
7 don't want to speculate, other than I know it's in the
8 works.

9 If the Board was to choose to postpone you to
10 the September Board meeting, if you were to request that
11 the Board move you to the September Board meeting, and
12 they grant that, would that give you sufficient amount
13 of time to move forward on this, do you think, or is it
14 still really up in the air with the attorney?

15 MR. KAKOS: You know, it's still up in the air.
16 I've actually recently moved from one attorney to the
17 other. A lot IRS attorneys -- and, again, I could go on
18 for hours with this, it's been seven years in the
19 making -- their game is to delay, delay, delay, offer
20 and compromise. I can't do that. I literally -- and
21 long story short, I had a balloon payment of over
22 half million dollars due on my home. I could not
23 refinance it. I had to come up with that money last
24 month, because of this lien. This lien has been the
25 bane of my existence.

1 So I would much rather pay \$55,000 than the
2 \$560,000 I just had to write a check for last month.
3 All I want from them is them to tell me, that's it, in
4 full, you're done. All they've ever told me is there
5 may be additional assessments. I don't want to pay
6 blindly, because what if their additional assessments
7 are another hundred thousand.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Okay.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board Member Gronauer, do
10 you have more questions?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I want to throw the
12 shovel away. I already dug a big enough hole. I'm
13 good. I think, everybody on the Board, including our
14 staff and our attorney, right now, at least it's a
15 picture here. And we may all look at it a little
16 differently, but, I think, we have a picture. Okay. So
17 now we have to go from there. That's the way I feel,
18 Madam Chair.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any
20 further questions from the Board for Mr. Kakos?

21 Okay. At this time, I'll entertain a motion.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: There's like three
23 different ways to go with this motion, maybe even more.
24 All right. I really believe from -- whatever month
25 we're in now -- June to September, the IRS, it's very

1 difficult to say that you're going to deal with the IRS
2 in three months. Okay. And his fiscal year is January
3 to January.

4 And, Mr. Kakos, one of the things I'm worried
5 about now, with this new revelation about an RFP out
6 there, that maybe -- it's not out there yet, but it's
7 coming, and we don't know when. It could be this year.
8 It could be next year. And with that RFP out there, if
9 we give you a license, and then all of a sudden you
10 don't fulfill our conditions, then you don't have a
11 license again. It's just I'm looking at a lot of
12 different things. So I'm trying to figure out the best
13 way. To me, right now, I'd like to put a provision on
14 there after a year. And, I think, in a year, because
15 you've already been dealing with this for some years.
16 And maybe you can put a fire under the attorneys' butts,
17 I mean, you know, underneath of the attorney, and see if
18 they can actually do something. Because this could have
19 a heck of an impact on your business one way or the
20 other here.

21 MR. KAKOS: I agree.

22 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Either a very positive
23 one or a very negative one. So I'm not trying to hurt
24 business. But I really have a problem because of what
25 happened earlier. So my deal is I'd like to make a

1 motion. Now, how specific I can get with this
2 provision, I'm not really sure. Okay. Because I don't
3 know if I'm smart enough in that area or intelligent
4 enough in that area to express it the way I believe it
5 should be expressed. And with that, I might need the
6 crutches of our attorney.

7 The idea, to me, is I'd like to make a motion
8 to approve whatever number we're on now, 34, okay,
9 Mr. Kakos. I make a motion to approve Prudential
10 Defense Solutions, Incorporated, who are applying for a
11 private patrolman license. And Perry J. Bannock --

12 MR. KAKOS: Bonarrigo.

13 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: -- Bonarrigo, license
14 number 1750, is requesting that his individual license
15 be placed into abeyance so that he may become the
16 qualifying agent. Corporate officer to be approved is
17 Patrick S. Kakos. And that's what, I think, too, with a
18 provision that the IRS, you work diligently, your
19 attorneys or someone works diligently with the IRS to
20 try to get this matter solved within one year from
21 July 1st.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Can I --

23 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: One second. Let me
24 just finish that part, and then we will.

25 And then if you do not comply with this, that

1 your license will be revoked.

2 MR. DETMER: So with that, I believe, we're
3 moving into discussion on the motion. Mike Detmer, for
4 the record. My concern, as phrased, is that there is
5 a -- there has to be a determination on what diligent
6 efforts will be.

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I know, one that
8 works.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Should we put a financial
10 amount on it, like payments being made?

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I say payment in full.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Right. Payment in full
13 in one year. I mean that's not fair, because like you
14 said --

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Because we don't know
16 what --

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Between now and IRS's
18 communications, that might be another seven years.
19 That's not fair to the applicant.

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I would love to kick
21 this ball just to September. I think, that would be a
22 nice thing to do. Okay. However, I don't believe that
23 can happen by September. It could happen tomorrow, but
24 I don't believe it will. So my idea is, you know, we
25 say that the diligence is that it be paid in full. The

1 heck with the diligence.

2 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. And
3 the motion can proceed as stated. Alternatively, going
4 back and just kind of, again, speaking this through as
5 we're talking, again, with provisional or conditional
6 licenses, with the diligent language --

7 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Let's just take that
8 out.

9 MR. DETMER: Take it out? Okay.

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes. So take that out.
11 The provision is that it be paid in full one year from
12 July 1st of 2021.

13 MR. DETMER: And that it be effective, that is,
14 that if it is not paid in full by that July 1st date,
15 he's not able --

16 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: We'll revoke the
17 license, and then you have the hearing.

18 MR. INGRAM: Prevent them from renewing,
19 instead of revoking. They would not be allowed to
20 renew.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, they won't have a
22 license, they can't renew it. Because it'll be July 1st
23 again would be the license.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. So can I ask,
25 Executive Director, we renew in July, right?

1 MR. INGRAM: We renew on or before July 1st.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: July 1st.

3 MR. INGRAM: So we open the renewals in May.

4 They have May and June, till June 30th. There is a
5 provision that if they don't make the June 30th
6 deadline, that their license expires until such time
7 that they pay a late fee and the renewal amount, up
8 through July 31st. August 1, it's expired.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So can I make a stab at
10 the --

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Would we have to do
12 something with this motion first, or not?

13 MR. DETMER: I would just keep this as a
14 discussion on the motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Let's keep
16 discussion.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So is the Board
18 comfortable with making the motion to grant the license
19 to both individuals early?

20 MR. INGRAM: And hold the corporation.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, we'll bring it up,
22 but once we're ready. But to review his license again
23 July 1 to see where his status is with the IRS. And if
24 it's not complete, have some discussion at that time in
25 that event.

1 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.

2 Would his license expire on July 1 anyways?

3 MR. INGRAM: My thought is at the June Board
4 meeting.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, that's right. At the
6 June Board meeting we would review it again, see what
7 the status is. If it's cleaned up, then he can renew,
8 if no problem. If not, then we need to discuss next
9 steps.

10 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer. I'm sorry.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No, no, no, no. No, I
12 was going to say, technically, he is taking -- there's
13 legal paperwork going through to try to get that \$55,000
14 taken care of.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So he is being diligent.
17 So you can't really say he's not trying.

18 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: He is.

20 MR. DETMER: Again, there can be a
21 determination on diligence, based on the review of the
22 Board. I believe, the June date would make more sense
23 than the July date. And the July date, it's basically a
24 question on issuance anyways.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Right.

1 MR. DETMER: So you'd just be doing a renewal
2 hearing eventually. So I qualify this. There's always
3 unperceived circumstances when it comes to conditional
4 licenses. Again, this is maybe a personal opinion. But
5 was we sit here now, I don't see an issue that pops into
6 my mind.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion, then,
8 and, again, still just for discussion -- I want to make
9 sure we get it right -- would be that we would grant
10 Prudential Defense Solutions, Inc. a new private
11 patrolman license.

12 MR. INGRAM: Corporate.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, wait a minute. Don't
14 we have two things going on?

15 MR. INGRAM: They're applying for a corporate
16 license. And then Perry Bonarrigo --

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Private patrolman license.
18 If approved, Perry Bonarrigo, license number 1750, is
19 requesting that his individual license be placed into
20 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.

21 MR. INGRAM: Correct. So it's a corporate
22 license they're applying. It's Prudential that's
23 applying for the license.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

25 MR. INGRAM: Perry already has one.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

2 MR. INGRAM: Place it into abeyance to be the
3 QA.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

5 MR. INGRAM: Right.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So that would be one.

7 Corporate officer to be approved would be Patrick S.
8 Kakos. This would be --

9 BOARD CHAIR CORTEZ: As a provision.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- as a provision that
11 during his renewal in June, his IRS --

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Fulfillment.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- issues will be reviewed
14 again and, hopefully, resolved. And if not --

15 MR. INGRAM: And I would say, the Prudential
16 corporate license, during the renewal of the Prudential
17 corporate license, that the corporate officer's IRS debt
18 be satisfied. Because, again, it's not his renewal --

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

20 MR. INGRAM: -- as corporate officer. So
21 during the corporate officer -- or during the corporate
22 license renewal for Prudential, that the corporate
23 officer has satisfied his debt with the IRS, something
24 like that.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And if not, you know, you

1 know, during the June meeting, it will be reviewed.

2 MR. DETMER: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, it will be reviewed.
4 Because if it takes seven years, right, it may be even
5 be done tomorrow, or it may be done in another seven
6 years from now. I'm sure it won't be tomorrow. But at
7 least we'll review it again and see where it's at. But
8 if he's not got the lawyer, and did pay the taxes, and
9 we revoke, right. But we'll review it during that time.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm comfortable with
11 that.

12 MR. DETMER: Again, Mike Detmer, for the
13 record. There's always the possibility of unperceived
14 circumstances, but.

15 MR. INGRAM: And so can we get the provision in
16 there, also, that, you know, we're not automatically
17 going to revoke. It's going to be reviewed in June.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right.

19 MR. INGRAM: And determine whether or not to
20 move forward with renewal, or whether action needs to be
21 taken. That way, if he's still in these, these
22 conversations with the IRS, they're getting closer, but
23 it's not resolved yet, that you can extend the renewal
24 based on, you know, again, unforeseen circumstances
25 where he hasn't been able to, you know, pay the debt.

1 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.
2 Again, with consideration of the unforeseen or the
3 unknown, I believe this would work.

4 MR. INGRAM: Would you like to state for the
5 record what the motion is.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I can try again. Clean it
7 up as needed. But, so I will make a motion. There's no
8 further questions from the Board, right?

9 MR. INGRAM: Well, we have a motion standing.
10 So you can say this motion with the following changes.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

12 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I read all my first
13 one.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So with Board Member
15 Gronauer's motion, we are going to add the caveat or the
16 provision that, you know, Mr. Kakos, we'll review his
17 corporate officer status to ensure that he's made some
18 progress with the IRS or is at least still in
19 discussion, during the June meeting if it has not been
20 resolved.

21 MR. DETMER: Yes. And unless I'm misstating
22 the Board's intent, in addition to that, if it is not
23 met or he as not, if the review does not meet the Board
24 standards, such will have bearing on the ability to
25 renew.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, correct.

2 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. So,
3 originally, this was Member Gronauer's motion. Member
4 Gronauer, are you okay with the amendment to your
5 motion?

6 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, I love it. Yes.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
8 Cortez. I will second that motion, as stated, from both
9 members.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have
11 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

12 (Board members said "aye.")

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

14 So thank you, Mr. Kakos, for your patience and
15 understanding this. You know, we have concerns with
16 this, but we do not want to stop you from you doing
17 business.

18 MR. KAKOS: Oh, absolutely. I appreciate all
19 of your time. And I'm sure it's been a long day for you
20 guys. I was on two hours earlier. Hopefully, you guys
21 got a lunch break in.

22 MR. INGRAM: No, we didn't, but that's okay,
23 'cause the Board Chair is buying dinner.

24 MR. KAKOS: There you go.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any questions, sir, about

1 this?

2 MR. KAKOS: No, I'm perfectly okay with it.
3 And I'm hoping it's resolved in the next week.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

5 MR. KAKOS: So I have no problem with that.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So Board staff will
7 contact you for next steps.

8 MR. KAKOS: Sounds good. Thank you so much.

9 MR. INGRAM: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I think, we got
11 everything, all the applications?

12 MR. INGRAM: So we have one additional agenda
13 item, agenda item 81.

14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I was going home.

15 MR. INGRAM: Board counsel, did you want to try
16 to take the lead on this one?

17 MR. DETMER: If the Board will allow me to.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, please.

19 MR. DETMER: So in reference to -- sorry. Mike
20 Detmer, for the record. In reference to other business,
21 number 81, Mike Detmer on behalf of the Executive
22 Director. This item is on the agenda for the Board's
23 consideration of its subpoena statute and its
24 efficiency.

25 As it's being currently used, a subpoena duces

1 tecum can only be issued with Board action, whether
2 that's by direct issuance by the Board or through
3 delegation by the Board to Board staff, the Executive
4 Director. This has raised two considerations, one, the
5 time, expense and costs of issuing the subpoenas, either
6 through direct Board action, as well as a consideration
7 to potential bias created upon the factual statements
8 that arise or are given in the request for a subpoena.

9 And in having and in making this consideration,
10 what we're trying to avoid is making a rule of general
11 applicability. This isn't a request, the intent is not
12 to request the Board to just carte blanche give the --
13 whether it be the Executive Director or the Chairperson,
14 power to issue subpoenas by delegation now. It's to
15 make future regulation change. And that would incur or
16 create a rule of general applicability. Rules of
17 general applicability always have to be by regulation or
18 statute.

19 So summing all of this up, this is for the
20 Board to decide or discuss the efficiency of the statute
21 and whether there's interest in changing the regulation
22 or creating regulation that would vest the Chairperson
23 the power for the issuance of subpoenas duces tecum.

24 I will add that, typically speaking, the boards
25 that I have worked with, the chairperson has always had

1 subpoena duces tecum power. This is the only board that
2 I am aware of, off the top of my head, that I can think
3 of right now, where it requires direct Board action.

4 So this is for the Board's discussion.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I'll open this up to
6 discussion, based off of the description for -- of NRS
7 648.160.

8 MR. DETMER: And, again, Mike Detmer, for the
9 record. I forgot to add that I'm happy to answer any
10 questions that the Board may have.

11 MR. INGRAM: And, for the record, Kevin Ingram.
12 This is in follow-up to past discussions of Board
13 delegating subpoena rights to the Executive Director.
14 And the comments that Board Member Gronauer had made
15 that, you know, once that's established, you never know
16 who your Executive Director is going to be and whether
17 or not you want to give them the authority to issue
18 subpoenas without Board knowledge. And so after
19 visiting, it seems counsel and Board Chair, we're taking
20 another stab at it that maybe it's similar in other
21 boards that the Board Chair have that power, that it
22 would make more sense for us to go that route.

23 So that's how this agenda item came to be
24 today.

25 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you for listening

1 to me. I'm serious. Because I was very serious about
2 it. It had nothing to do with a personal thing. I've
3 seen organizations change. And as that leadership -- do
4 you want to talk about the Constable's Office? I've
5 seen things change. And so when that changes, you got
6 to be careful. At least, with a chairman of the board,
7 there is a whole different responsibility there.

8 Thank you for being Chairman, matter of fact.
9 I like the way you fought for it.

10 Anyway, no, I appreciate it, because I really
11 put some thought in that day. And looking at it now,
12 and you guys really did a good job coming up with some
13 of this. And that makes sense to me. I really don't
14 have a problem with that, because it's easier. Then,
15 the Board can deal with the Board Chairman a lot easier.
16 You know, I mean I realize this Board is the boss of the
17 Executive Director, and I get that. But that's still a
18 wildcard at that point. The Chairman of the Board
19 creates a whole different responsibility there.

20 So I'm good with it. I was redundant there,
21 but I'm really good what what's going on there. Thank
22 you. Thank you for the thought.

23 MR. DETMER: And Mike Detmer, for the record.
24 I wasn't too sure if this was clear a hundred percent.
25 It doesn't have any immediate change.

1 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right.

2 MR. DETMER: It's for the future. All
3 regulations would have to be drafted. And we missed
4 this round. So it would be on the next round.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That's a legislation
6 situation. That's what I was saying, wait, this can all
7 happen right now.

8 MR. CASTELLANOS: Excuse me. I'm sorry to
9 interrupt you. But I've been waiting since 4:00 this
10 afternoon. And I don't really hear my name called.

11 MR. INGRAM: What is your name, sir?

12 MR. CASTELLANOS: My name is Luis Eduardo Mazo
13 Castellanos.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Castellanos.

15 MR. INGRAM: We asked, what, three times?

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. Sir, we called you at
17 least three times. And since you did not answer during
18 that, during your time, we --

19 MR. CASTELLANOS: Oh. I've been on the call,
20 I've been since 2:00, since 2:00 this afternoon.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, we even trailed
22 that and brought it back.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, we had actually pushed
24 it back a couple of times waiting for you to come on.
25 So, unfortunately, you did not hear it.

1 MR. CASTELLANOS: But I --

2 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: We got interrupted.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir. Sir.

4 THE REPORTER: Sir.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, we have a couple
6 people talking. And so, you know, for the items that
7 were trailed, we called your name several times. We
8 actually also mentioned or requested to find out if you
9 were on mute. And you did not respond. So if you,
10 unfortunately, did not hear your name, I'm sorry for
11 that. But we did take a vote, and the denials were
12 upheld. So you have the opportunity to apply again in a
13 year and come back and make your cases.

14 So, unfortunately, at this time, you will not
15 be granted a work card.

16 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: Oh, my God, \$180.

17 MR. CASTELLANOS: I could pay that.

18 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: You have to wait a whole
19 year, another. That is so unfair.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So --

21 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: Because we've been on the
22 phone all this time, waiting, waiting. Oh, my goodness.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I am sorry. We have called
24 your name several times. Again, thank you. If you
25 could apply at the Board in another year. Thank you.

1 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: Do we have to pay again?

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. Thank you.

3 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: Oh, my God.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So on item number 81, then,
5 what's the next step, we just accept the comments and
6 close it out?

7 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record.

8 (Outside interruption.)

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ma'am, you're going to have
10 to get off the phone.

11 MR. DETMER: Okay. Mike Detmer, for the
12 record. Yes, this was just for discussion to kind of to
13 gauge the Board's interest. Having heard the -- I'm
14 sorry. Was there any more, did you call for any more
15 discussion? Because we got interrupted.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No. Or, well, let me.
17 Okay. Is there any more discussion about agenda item
18 number 81?

19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you for being the
20 Chairwoman.

21 MR. INGRAM: Any discussion in the north?

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Bezick has
23 stepped out. But I don't believe that there was going
24 to be any comment on it. I think, we're all good with
25 it.

1 MR. INGRAM: This is Kevin. I'm just asking
2 counsel, would their next step be to go ahead and make a
3 motion for myself and counsel to move forward with
4 formulating language to be presented at a future Board
5 meeting for them to accept into the record for me to
6 move forward with the LCB?

7 MR. DETMER: Yes. Mike Detmer, for the record.
8 That is correct, Director Ingram. I do, however, want
9 to say, now, it is my belief and interpretation that it
10 can be done by regulation. LCB may have different
11 beliefs on that. But I just want to throw that in
12 there. But what Director Ingram said is correct. The
13 Board can take action, if they would like to.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, then --

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'll make a motion.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, I'll entertain a
17 motion on agenda item number 81.

18 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I make a motion that we
19 direct the Executive Director to get on this and start
20 putting it together so we can have something to present.
21 I don't think we need anything more than that.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member
23 Cortez seconding the motion to have Director Kevin draft
24 some language for the proposal.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion and

1 a second. All in favor, say "aye."

2 (Board members said "aye.")

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

4 Okay. So we're at agenda item number 82. Is
5 there any Board comment or future agenda items, for
6 possible action?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
8 Brown. And a part of me hates to even say this, but I
9 don't know if we can discuss this now. I would like to
10 have some type of discussion on the denials based on
11 failure to disclose when we're dealing with things that
12 are years old. Or are we going to continue with -- and,
13 Mr. Detmer, stop me if I'm going too far. Are we going
14 to continue with the policy that if they fail to
15 disclose, we're automatically denying it? We've gone
16 back and forth today. And I've got some concern over
17 it.

18 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. I
19 believe, no, you're fine with your comments. As this is
20 discussion for possible future agenda items, you're okay
21 bringing it up here for that purpose. And so, yes, we
22 can add to a future agenda item the Board's
23 interpretation, policy, procedure, as it goes to denials
24 and its ability to make determinations, based on the
25 facts presented, on whether or not to maintain, whether

1 or not to uphold a denial based on the facts presented.

2 I was kind of telegraphing there.

3 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's Gronauer. You
4 know, it's my concern totally. I think, we all had that
5 concern today. Because I hate to see people out of
6 jobs, I mean especially at this time. But the idea is,
7 I was looking at it from, I believe, somewhere in the
8 past -- I don't know, these three years have just been a
9 blur -- but somewhere in the past, that we were able to
10 tell somebody we don't have to discuss this today, you
11 can you put this on the next Board. If they've been
12 doing a denial and say, you know, you go get your stuff
13 together, and put it on the next Board, rather than
14 making the decision at this Board. I don't know, but I
15 thought we could do that.

16 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. We
17 need to be careful, because now we're starting to go
18 into deliberation. So I mean if it's still on what
19 we're going to put --

20 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No, no, put it on the
21 agenda. It's part of that whole discussion. Because
22 I'm just trying to say, and then we can discuss this
23 later, you know, and then we can't. To me, I just felt
24 that somewhere in the line that we were able to do that.

25 That's it. I'm done. Stick a fork in this

1 guy. Okay. I should have been harpooning away.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Like I'm still confused
3 as to when can we have -- I guess, I just need
4 clarification. Could I have an answer, like at what
5 point and how many years have gone by? Obviously, it's
6 case by case and based on the character, facts presented
7 or opinions presented. How many years is enough time
8 gone by to allow an opportunity for an individual to put
9 past that chapter and keep it moving?

10 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And it's part of that
11 discussion for the next Board.

12 MR. INGRAM: Once we agendize this --

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

14 MR. INGRAM: -- if you want to discuss the
15 processes or procedures and how you're making
16 determinations, then, on the record, as an agendized
17 item, you guys can discuss it in-depth.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it.

19 MR. INGRAM: And then can you take Board action
20 on it. Right now, it's just helping facilitate --

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Put it on an agenda.

22 MR. INGRAM: -- a future agenda so you can have
23 those discussions.

24 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: She kind of complicated
25 things. Just put it on an agenda.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But I have of a question.
2 I mean it's ultimately up to us whether or not we decide
3 each time whether or not to deny or whatever. We've
4 just been doing it based off of, you know, past
5 practices.

6 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer, for the record. The
7 Board is able to make a determination on it, backed
8 by -- they need facts for a determination. So somebody
9 who has an armed robbery that they didn't disclose,
10 people have armed robbery priors, and they don't make
11 the disclosure, but one guy's goes on to -- and I'm not
12 saying, I am not saying this is the case. But this
13 would be relevant or dispositive of the determination.
14 But, you know, one guy goes on to start nonprofits and,
15 you know, cures diseases, and does all kinds of things,
16 and the other doesn't. Maybe those are factors for
17 consideration as to whether or not they uphold or deny
18 the appeal.

19 So the Board can take all things into
20 consideration.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And can I make a statement
22 about this? I think, and, Board Member Gronauer, you
23 and I were on the Board when we were face-to-face. And,
24 I think, we made different decisions based off of that.
25 Because we saw people. We, you know, were able to

1 really kind of understand a little bit better. I think,
2 some of these decisions that we're making now, our
3 precedent now is a little bit different because it's
4 over the phone.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: One brush is hitting
6 all right now.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right. So.

8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: And when we looked at
9 them individually, you're a hundred percent right, you
10 get a whole different read and know what's going on,
11 just by body language, by everything they do, how they
12 present themselves when they come in. I mean there's a
13 lot of stuff.

14 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer. We are going into
15 deliberation. It seems like we're going in that
16 direction.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have one question,
18 then, Executive Director. Our next meeting, is it in
19 person?

20 MR. INGRAM: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

22 MR. INGRAM: Moving forward, now, our next
23 Board meeting dates have changed to September 15th and
24 16th. I think, I sent that to you in an email. And
25 then December 8th and 9th. From this point forward,

1 barring any unforeseen circumstances or direction by the
2 State or the Governor, we will be having our Board
3 meetings in person. We will be using the Gaming Control
4 Board's boardroom at the Grant Sawyer Building and the
5 one in Carson City. I'm not sure where that's located.
6 I will be finding out, obviously, once we get that
7 confirmation back.

8 I've already filled out the paperwork for the
9 agreements. And I'll put that on the future agenda item
10 as well when we're at that meeting, housekeeping rules
11 for utilizing their location and things of that nature.
12 But it will be videoconferenced again. And as long as
13 the Board is willing to be flexible to allow me to
14 schedule around the Gaming Control Board's usage,
15 they're going to let us use it as much as need to. So
16 even for special meetings, I'll be working with counsel
17 as a future agenda item as well. I'll be working with
18 counsel on getting the unlicensed appeals scheduled. So
19 we'll have to have special Board meetings to get those
20 heard. Any disciplines or anything like that. Because
21 we need to get caught up, because we've been delaying
22 based on COVID. Now that the restrictions are lifted,
23 we need to jump on it and get approved right away.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, I think, to
25 answer Board Member Brown's question, I think, yes, we

1 can have some discussion. But, you know, and, again,
2 Board Member Brown, if you disagree with me. I do think
3 that the difference in a live is a lot different than
4 how we're doing it now. And so, hopefully, that will
5 help some of this. But it is, obviously, a great
6 question to bring up and discuss.

7 So, I guess, do I need to make a motion on
8 that?

9 MR. INGRAM: No. I'll just go ahead and add it
10 to the next agenda for you.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So is there -- and
12 thank you for that, Board Member Brown.

13 Are there any other Board comment or future
14 agenda items?

15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This may be my last
16 Board meeting. I still haven't been reappointed.
17 Mine's up June 30.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Let's get them on the
20 phone.

21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm going to call them.
22 I have to call them.

23 MR. INGRAM: We've been in contact with the --
24 no, they are aware of his termination. And they're
25 trying to appoint people to boards. There are many,

1 many, many vacancies on many boards. And now that the
2 legislative session is out, our contact at his office
3 for boards and commissions is saying he's making that a
4 priority. We're one of the priorities.

5 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: If this is my last one,
6 thank you all for everything you did. I'm serious. I
7 have a tremendous respect for you guys.

8 MR. INGRAM: Well, and we totally enjoyed
9 having you on the Board.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It's been interesting.

11 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: My brain just works a
12 little different. I can't help that.

13 MR. INGRAM: So do we have any other items, or?
14 We got to get public comment.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes. Do we have any other
16 Board comments or future agenda items?

17 Okay. Hearing none, we'll move to item number
18 83, public comment. Again, this is the space for
19 members of the general public to make comments on
20 matters appearing on the agenda and may bring up matters
21 not appearing on the agenda to the attention of the
22 Board. The Board may discuss the matters not appearing
23 on the agenda but may not act on the matters. If the
24 Board desires, the matters may be placed on future
25 agenda items.

1 So I'll ask here, are there any public comments
2 up north?

3 MS. KLEMME: No, none in the north.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

5 Are there any public comments in the south?

6 Okay. Hearing no public comment, I move to
7 adjourn the meeting.

8 So the meeting is adjourned. Thank you. And
9 thank you for all your patience during this long
10 meeting.
