This is the section where we'll have public comment. Members of the general public may comment on matters appearing on the agenda and may bring matters not appearing on the agenda to the attention of the Board. The Board may discuss matters not appearing on the agenda but may not act on the matters at this meeting. If the Board desires the matters may be placed on future agenda for action.

Public comment will be limited to five minutes per person at the discretion of the Chairperson but will not be restricted according to viewpoint.

Are there any public comments in the south?

Okay. No public comment in the south.

Are there any public comments in the north?

Hearing there are no public comments we'll move to the next agenda item.

Executive Director Ingram, can you please read announcements and do report -- reports and updates.

MR. INGRAM: Yes, ma'am. Thank you.

First of all, I would like to go ahead and do introductions of our staff. We'll start over here to my right. We have Chief Lori Irizarry. And we have Investigator Shelly Lancaster. We have Investigator Assistant Stephanie Barroso. And over on my left we have

Investigator Zachary Swarthout and Supervisor Investigator

Vincent Saladino. We started calling him Vinnie because

that's what we know him by.

To my left is Board Counsel Mike Detmer. And I'm

Kevin Ingram.

Just a brief overview for the Board on our transition out-of-state general fund. We are set to go live October 6th. There was a little bit of a delay. However, we've got all of those bugs worked out. So we'll be working as an independent Board come October 6th for sure with a soft opening of October 2nd to make sure all of the bugs are worked out that we want.

Additionally, I would like to welcome our newest court reporter, Ms. Kathy Jackson. Thanks for being with us today. Ms. Jackson is in the north, and she's going to be transcribing the meeting.

So I would ask anybody that is testifying to speak slowly and clearly, stating your name and the spelling of your last name please for the record when you -- when you are first addressing the Board.

As far as the financials, the financials have been provided to the Board. Does the Board have any questions on financials?

Any questions in the north?

Okay. At this time I would like to ask Chief Irizarry to cover our latest statistics for you. Thanks, Lori.

MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. I'm going to be reading the statistics. There are some on the tables when you signed in. If you didn't grab one it's also on our website for those on the phone. On our website you go to the meetings tab. On today's meeting underneath attachments, the only attachment there will be the statistics. It's a three-page document.

Okay. So starting on page one, this is going to be the stats from the last Board meeting which was June to I stated as of yesterday, so September 14th of 2020 -- 2021. A whole year I missed.

So before the Board today the licensees that were going for the 2021 Board meeting there were 73 applications that were received. Of that 56 of them have been placed on the agenda which would be six postponements, 11 withdrawals. The withdrawals and postponements made up mainly of private investigator and private patrolman license.

Postponements were for reasons for like somebody to retake the exam. So they will most likely be at the next Board meeting or someone is no longer employed with the company and we also had fingerprints that were still pending

so they would not be agendized today.

Reasons for withdrawal, there was a person who had a conflict with their current government employment and two individuals decided not to move forward.

At this Board meeting we have the majority of licensees going to into private patrolman category followed by private investigator. We have no one at this Board meeting going for a process serving license.

Working our way down, work card applications. I just saw there's a typo. So the work card applications from June 1st to September 10th was actually 3,581 total applications. The number at the top there where it says 2,404, that was actually June statistics.

So this past quarter we have had increase of 1,177 work card applications which was a 49 percent increase in the last three months prior to the quarter before. And that's actually been the largest work card applications we've received since June of 2019.

The main reason for the work card -- taking work card applications is because Las Vegas mainly has opened back up. So starting in June we had a lot more work card applications for Allegiant Stadium, mainly in the security industry. So Allegiant Stadium brought in a lot of work card applications for us. Where Allegiant Stadium has festivals

and events. It also opens up activity on the strip. So we have a lot more for that.

And right now we are gearing up for Life is Beautiful, which is this weekend which has attributed to a huge influx, somewhere between five to 600 new applications that came in in the past month.

So just from August 1st to yesterday out of the 3,400 applications that, 3,500 applications that we received 1,600 of them have come from August 1st to today. That is why you see a lot of individuals in a pending status.

The reason they are in a pending status is because -- I'm sorry, not pending, provisional status is because we haven't received their fingerprints back just yet because they are going before the Board -- I'm sorry, we haven't received the fingerprints back just yet because they just got fingerprinted some time in August. Fingerprinting is also taking about two months to get back to us from the criminal repository.

After Life is Beautiful this weekend we will have EDC in the middle of October, followed by Day N Vegas first week in November. And we also in the north just passed Hot August Nights and Night in the Country. That will be the large influx of work cards.

On the second page, complaints and investigations

this past quarter. Complaints and investigations broke down into basically five different types of categories. This would be the first time that you notice there is a PILB staff complaints. There are two on there. I mention all complaints and investigations that the Board receives. I touched on that one in particular. Those two had no findings. It was actually another state agency they thought was our staff. It actually wasn't. It was a gaming control board security situation so it would not be with us. That's why it was closed.

And the other one was regarding a work card individual who thought his card should not be denied and had a disgruntled moment. Still a complaint that was officially filed with us.

The others make up, the majority of complaints and investigations we have are going to be in the private patrolman category which is 15 total. From that six of them are still pending. Four have closed. Four have resulted in audit. Audits can be, we have two that are going through the audit paperwork process. When they mail stuff in we're reviewing their personnel records and documents they send in. And two audits were conducted onsite in the north from Pines Check Hot August Night event and Night in the Country. And then one has resulted in violation of citation at this time.

Out of the, all of the complaints, there's a total of 24 of them, nine are still pending. Right now we are averaging 42 days from when we receive a complaint or an investigation is open until we officially close it or have a final determination. Nine we've had no action or they have closed. Four are those audits, one citation, one referred to another state agency which would be that gaming control board incident that we had.

On to page three, notice of violations. These are the violations that would be issued to a licensee or a work cardholder. There were three categories with three NRS or NAC's that were violated. People not listed properly.

I'm sorry. People not -- I'm sorry. Individuals working for a licensee without having an active work card. Either they never had one to begin with or their card expired and they were continuing to work for a licensee.

Individuals who took the initial firearm course but did not qualify within the proper months so they were out of their firearm recalls. And one individual or one company got a violation for not having their license properly displayed. It was a total of eight violations but the seven licensees because one company got two violations so it's seven licensees.

There was one audit conducted not onsite but one

audit conducted for a private patrolman licensee which was a violation of \$7,000 which has been paid in full. The violations for that audit were mainly roster issues and personnel records that were not turned into us, were not complete. That would be a violation of NRS 648.140 subsection (3) (b).

In the last section there is unlicensed activity citations. There have been five unlicensed activity citations issued this past quarter, three of which were for private patrolman. One for private investigator and one for a company that is conducting PI, private investigations and private patrolman services in one, which was a total of \$20,000. The first violation is 2,500 which was for four of those offenders. And the fifth violator is a third or subsequent offender which is a 10,000 dollar offense.

I don't want to elaborate on those too much because they are still pending within their 30-day appeal rights. So this breakdowns as three private patrolman, one private investigator and one combined. That's what I got. Thank you.

MR. INGRAM: Thanks, Lori.

The last information I would like to provide the Board before we move on, item number, agenda item number 11 has been withdrawn. That person is no longer employed by the

| 20 | My concern is we're not hiring Nevadans who are |
| 21 | qualified, and we have plenty of them. And the police |
| 22 | departments all do overtime, and I'm trying to figure out why |
| 23 | we can't hire Nevadans rather than people from six different |
| 24 | states. |

MR. TAYLOR: Right.

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: So if you can satisfy me with that I would be happy. Because I have no concern with you and your company, all right. It's just that I have a concern we're not taking care of our own people.

MR. TAYLOR: Yeah, absolutely. And so what these individuals bring that, one, they are active duty police officers. And absolutely, Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department has -- we work all over the country. And I can say that, and this is home for us as well, that Metro has the best department that we have work with across the country, hands down.

What these individuals give us is the continuity, the history. We can go to special events. We have a great relationship with them. And, you know, we work the special events at Metro throughout the year on many many events, including CES. Our bill at CES with Metro special events is over six figures. So we -- and, again, we work with them throughout the year.

In this case though this is a situation where these individuals are assigned. We are able to work with the same individual in their roles throughout the event as opposed to bringing in different assignments. You know, with special events we get different officers of different things

because it isn't overtime, and so they are not able to commit the same officer to these roles from day one through to the last day.

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I understand the logistics. Being former Metro I understand how it works, and you would get different officers each day. I still have a problem with our unemployed people here or our qualified people here to work, especially at this time. This is a different time than 2019 in 2021.

So I do, I agree with your reasoning, still not happy. Just so you know, it's just me, all right. Thank you.

MR. TAYLOR: I understand. And just one more to that. Again, you know, they are at a specialized level just being active duty police. You know, we can't go out and hire that directly. We can't hire active duty police directly.

And I can tell you that we -- we have, even though they are, yes, there is a very large number of unemployed in the state right now, we have had, and we've been here now for 13 years. We have had the most difficult time getting people to -- to actually apply and interview with us since COVID. Since we returned in June we've had the most difficult time than we've ever had and we just -- it's like somebody turned the faucet off. We've been unable, and

| 20 | MR. KEMPEL: Good morning. Doron Kempel. Thank |
| 21 | you for your time and for considering our request. Very |
| 22 | quickly, a few points. First of all, we take this process |
| 23 | very seriously as well as the domain. Let me start again or |
| 24 | was that okay? As well as domain of security and the |

subdomain of patrolman, bodyquards, et cetera.

On that point, before immigrating to the United States 25 years ago I was deputy commander for special ops in the Israeli Military. So I have great familiarity with security. I've seen action. I know what firearms can do. I take it very seriously.

Secondly, advisors to Bond include some of your prior colleagues, including head of secret service, former head of U.S. Secret Service Mark Sullivan. Former deputy director of the FBI John Pistole. Also former director of the TSA. Heads of police for Chicago Jody Weiss. For New York, Kelly. For Boston, Ed Davis. For Seattle, Kathleen O'Toole. From Miami, Don Dalupa. There are more police officers in every state. We have at least one former police officer who's helping us liaison with the state.

I take that seriously and I was personally embarrassed when we learned about our mistake in the State of Nevada because these people trust me and I felt that I had failed them. As soon as I learned that we made that mistake I took immediate action.

Number one, we suspended all operations in Nevada, not only bodyguards but anything. We were immediately in dialogue with Mr. Ingram and his team.

Secondly, we suspended all advertising for

bodyguards nationwide. I suspended all interviews because the media was very interested to talk about this interesting topic, and we don't really offer bodyguard services. Though we don't like to talk about that. Bodyguards are not the heart of our service.

The heart of our service is offering people peace of mind and helping them in situations that are below the 911 line. Let me give you an example. Ride sharing industry in the United States, every month 60,000 911 calls, 60,000. How many of those are legitimate emergencies, 0.8 percent. That means that 59,200 dial 911 without it being an emergency. This is the tip of a much deeper iceberg on an already very burdened 911 system. That's where we step in. We help them. We're by their side. But unfortunately speaking, if anything goes bad then we escalate. We give 911 first responders situational awareness of what's going on.

We've already handled about 50,000 cases since 2019. Most of them routine. Peace of mind. People are worried. But about one, one and a half percent are emergencies and we save lives.

With that we're taking this very seriously. We immediately started licensing efforts across 30 of the major states in the United States. I'm not going to say which ones because then I'm going to get in trouble for the ones that

are not major, but you know what I mean. And we immediately 1 2 hired, not rented people like James as qualifying agents. 3 I'm happy to take any questions that you might 4 have for me. Thank you. 5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member I do have a question for Mr. Kempel. The unlicensed 6 activity, talk to me about it. What was going on? 8 MR. KEMPEL: Can you repeat the question. 9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The unlicensed activity in 10 2019. 11 Yes. So basically what I failed to MR. KEMPEL: 12 mention is that I also reprimanded our lawyers. We have a 13 lot of lawyers and a lot of insurance lawyers given 14 everything that we're doing. Our lawyers without naming them 15 assured us that because these are not our bodyquards, they are bodyquards -- for example most of the bodyquards are 16 bodyguards of the firm G4S now part of Allied Universal. 17 18 These are professional licensed people. 19 Basically whenever any one of our members, 20 consumers or corporate personnel, the bodyguard, we would 21 reach out for example to the company like G4S, and we would 22 share with them all of the details of the case. And then 23 they would find the right bodyguard. And then through our

call centers we would monitor the job from start to finish.

24

We have an app that sits on the phone of the bodyguard as well as the consumer.

Thank you for your question. We have had no such jobs in Nevada. So we were talking about it and it was an interesting topic coming towards the election for the media to talk about, but we didn't market it very much and it's not the heart of our business. So at the time that Mr. Ingram reached out to us we've done zero jobs in Nevada. However, we were interviewed in Nevada, and one of the companies that was working for G4S was also interviewed.

But when we did some jobs in other states, I just described what the other jobs, if that was your point, could be the person taking per cash out of their hair salon, wanting somebody to escort her to the parking garage, custody exchange. Go ahead, sorry, Ms. Nixon.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So what was the unlicensed activity exactly in Nevada?

INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino, S-a-l-a-d-i-n-o. The unlicensed activity stemmed from the interview that was on one of our local news channel in the way the website was set up.

The reason the dates look a little skewed was when we finally got in touch with Mr. Kempel and Mike Staple, they let me know that their New York office had been shutdown

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member Cortez. Let's go ahead with the back story.

MR. ROWLEY: Well, I would love to say we were coming here to cleanly apply for a license and wish us well and move forward. Obviously we have made a series of mistakes leading up to this. We tried to comply from the moment we were notified until today. We're hoping we can get back in the good graces and move forward.

So the back story is March of '19 we didn't do business in Nevada. We are licensed in 37 states. We've been in business 20 years. We are a business well north of \$100,000,000 and we were notified by a customer in '19 asking if we can provide services in Nevada.

We have a process. We work with active duty police officers who we register as security guards and provide that service for higher level of service. Every state manages police officers working off duty in a different way. So our first step is is to contact the licensing board, ask how that's managed.

Clearly we made a huge mistake in that process, and it was our understanding mistakenly, that the Board didn't govern police officers working off duty. In that environment we moved forward. We obtained a business license and we began doing business in the state.

Fast forward to January '21. The Board identified us working in Las Vegas at a Chase Bank which was a customer and identified that we had to have a security license in order for the person to be working there. We ceased services, went out and found a subcontractor who is a licensed Nevada company.

While we were beginning the application process, inserted them in the process. Realized we had made a second mistake which in order to utilize a subcontractor to provide services we still had to have the security license. So we were notified of that. So we ceased all the services in the State of Nevada. We were assessed the 2,500 dollar fine for that. We immediately paid the fine. We've been working through the application process.

Jon is our qualified manager in the State of Washington. He's a 27-year retired Washington State Trooper. He's worked with us for a number of years. He passed his test. We completed the application process, and we're here to do it the right way and to move forward.

I assure you we are an honest and ethical company. We recognize we made a mistake, and we're here to fix it and move forward.

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you. I do see the fine and fees were paid within a month so I do appreciate

1 that. I do have another question. This is Board Member 3 Cortez by the way for the record. Mr. Nelson, we do have a sensitive subject that was an incident that occurred in 2001. It has been dismissed. Who was the victim? 5 6 MR. NELSON: Who was the victim? Do you want her 7 name? BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: No. Family member? 8 9 Girlfriend? 10 MR. NELSON: No. My name is Jon Nelson, and I am 11 retired trooper of 27 years. While on duty as a trooper I 12 made a stop. And the female was a female person, and I made 13 the stop, did not write a citation. Left, went home and then 14 30 days later I was arrested. 15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So from January to 16 today --17 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: That's a comma not a 18 period. Keep going. 19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. 20 MR. NELSON: So I was arrested for a rape and 21 false imprisonment. There's a back story to this. And the 22 back story is my wife at the time had applied for a school 23 position in a school district. The president of the school 24 board was Debbie Edwards. Her husband happened to be the

sheriff of Thurston County, long long time sheriff.

So five women put in for this job. My wife is the only one that met the minimum qualifications of that job and she knew it and her friends are the other four and they all kind of knew it. She did not get the job. Another lady got the job. So my wife filed a grievance. And on Tuesday morning we had a court hearing, a grievance hearing in court and I went to jail Monday night.

And there was some insight, scuttlebutt. I went to jail for obvious reasons because the grievance was against Debbie Edwards, the president of the school board. And so I go to jail. They do their stuff. I go to jail. Made a lot of allegations. So the first court hearing the -- the person making the allegations had wrote a statement, like a ten-page statement.

In court the judge asked her because there's crossed out stuff, and then there's handwritten stuff under there. And under -- oh, she said she did not do that. Lots of stuff on the statement was changed. You could tell it was scribbled out, literally scribbled out and handwritten in different handwriting underneath. She said she did not do that. The detective said he didn't do it.

So I was released from jail on bond. And then the criminal investigation started. The first investigation

was by the Thurston County Sheriff's Office. So that went through a couple of months, however long it was. I was on administrative leave for about nine months. So the state patrol cannot start their investigation until the criminal investigation is done in Thurston County. It was completed. All charges were dropped.

I actually had a knock on my door one day and a guy standing there says I can help you on this. I asked him how did you find me. He told me. I said, well, you need to contact the Thurston County Sheriff's Office or state patrol. He did. They put a wire on. He was actually a boyfriend of the girl's cousin. They put a wire on him. He was in the car with his girlfriend and this other female that made the allegations. And then it — she stated she wanted to sue the state, get a million dollars and travel the world was her exact wordage on the wire and some other things.

So slowly they dropped all charges. State patrol did their investigation. Their investigation went through and all charges were dropped, and I continued as a trooper. The FBI filed for -- they wanted my case file. I went through a grand jury. They got the case file. They did an investigation, and I was totally exonerated from the FBI, and I retired two years ago as a trooper.

| 21 | history. |
| 22 | During the last Board meeting there was |
| 23 | discussion by the Board that we wanted to kind of talk out |
| 24 | why certain registered work card appeals were denied and felt |

that a true failure to disclose on occasions had kind of handcuffed the Board into finding anyone that failed to disclose any portion on their work card application they felt that it had to be responded with an uphold of the denial.

And the Board had wished to discuss on the record maybe considering some other factors or other ideas on how the Board might find during the appeals section for the registered work card.

Mr. Detmer, do you have anything more to add to that?

MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer for the record. I apologize. I have a hard time speaking with the mask on. If the Board is comfortable with me proceeding this way.

Mr. -- excuse me. Director Ingram has done a fantastic job as far as relaying the agenda item as I recall it. When it comes to the determination of viability for a registration card, the statute 648.1493 actually relays the factors for determination. The Board as is my recollection was -- was doing its job in considering all the variables that speak towards viability and it had started focusing, not focusing but one of the factors of determination was nondisclosure of a prior.

This is a factor for determination but by its mere existence my understanding would be should not be an

automatic disqualifier. As the Board again can and should
take into consideration all facts and circumstances. If
there's a nondisclosure of an individual that who didn't
disclose an event that happened 100 years ago, of course I'm
speaking by pure exaggeration, that's a different -- that's
something to take into consideration for someone who didn't
factor in a crime that committed -- he was convicted of
yesterday. So it's a balancing. It's a weighing all of the
facts and circumstances.

This is just in summary. As the Board progresses through this agenda item I'm happy to answer any question or that I may possibly be assistance of.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So could I ask a quick procedural question then. As a part of deliberation and discussion of this what are we trying to accomplish? Are we changing anything or are we just trying to as a Board come to a consensus of how we want to move forward?

MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer for the record. I don't believe it was a -- we're on. I don't believe it was a desire or decision to make a bright line as far as how the Board is going to rule on these. As if you were to do that one might argue that is a rule of general applicability which would be codified or should be codified by regulation.

My understanding was while a specific for

1 possible action, I believe that was just in case. This gives you more range as far as what can be done is that the idea 3 was that this would just be a discussion as far as the factors the Board takes into consideration when determining 5 whether to uphold or deny or grant or object to the 6 registration. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. 8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I believe -- this 9 is Gronauer. I believe some of the problems we've had in the 10 past few years has been that we start denying people because 11 they failed to disclose certain then comes in the California 12 Penal Code.

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Now, I understand how our investigators this last time really clarified that fairly well because it says when you're, I can't remember the code number, but when you receive this and say we've dismissed your charges or exonerated or whatever the heck it is at that time you still were arrested for it and you're dismissed.

And on that now, I believe when they receive that notice the person receives notice from California. What it says is that you still have to report your arrest on applications. If I'm correct in that or no?

INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. So included in penal code 1203.4, the last little sentence on

it says further, if this order is granted pursuant to the provisions of 1203.4 the defendant is required to disclose the above conviction in response to any direct question contained in any questionnaire or application for public office or for licensure any state local agency or for contracting with the California State Lottery.

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you, Investigator Saladino. I wanted to make sure that was clear.

You know, that's a big deal because a lot of people that's what they use, you know, and I don't blame them. I mean once I'm exonerated or cleared and I get a Court order I can understand them saying, well, I don't have anything to worry about. But they have to read the whole thing, just like they have to read our whole application. That creates, you know, some type of problem, but I don't see it as a problem now that it's clearly delineated where it's stated.

I think some of the things were also, I agree with our -- it's hard to believe this but I agree with our attorney, that we have to -- we have to take in the entire scope of it. You know, there's discussion sometimes about what is time and business. You know, we say that quite often. I mean is two years the time or five years, ten years or whatever. Well, then it's not only time and distance --

and without the penal code but time and distance it's also severity of the crime.

Now we've had murder people, people who were arrested for murder did 20 years in prison, were fine for ten years, you know, that's a whole different story. But, you know, so that could be, okay, we can get away with that. I mean, get away with, we can just say that's applying to time and distance. That's fine, are good. Some people were trying to explain also.

So the idea to me is that's all we had to do is just clear up some of the way we think because there's been a couple of times where all of us have sat here and said I hate doing this but you didn't report this, you know, and that creates a problem.

Now if you don't report a crime from 20 years ago
I don't really have a real problem -- I don't have a problem
with that unless it's something to do with moral turpitude
or, you know, armed robbery and things that you served time
for you should remember that. Once you build time you always
remember building time. I never met an ex-prisoner that
didn't remember how much time they built and where they built
it. So how much time you served in prison -- I'm sorry. I'm
talking my street stuff.

The idea to me is so I think all we had to was

just clarify some of that gray area because we all can see time and distance as something different. But then we have to add in all of the other factors. I think when we make that decision, and I believe Mr. Detmer, our attorney, has told us before you have to tell us why you went with that, not just time and distance but why.

That's my conclusion in this. I don't know how the people up north feel about it. And I would like some other interjection. I'm done.

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member

Cortez. I do have a couple of comments and piggyback off of

Board Member Gronauer. I don't know who to address this

question to. But on the application does it state regardless

of what state your criminal history comes from, regardless of

the time and distance you are to report because I think a lot

of the people who are from out of state are like, oh, that

happened in a different state. I don't need to report it

here. Is that clearly stated because a lot of people like to

say, well, according to PC or according to this, okay, does

the State of Nevada and these are requirements. So just out

of curiosity, does the application clearly state regardless

of the state the crime was committed?

MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. On the paperwork card application it states, I'll kind of read it to you

verbatim. Pursuant to NAC 648.339 the Board may deny, that's bold and underlined, an application if an applicant has been convicted of a felony or a crime involving moral turpitude or illegal use or possession of a dangerous weapon.

There's three questions that are asked after that. One, have you ever been convicted of a felony charge. Answer no. Number two, have you ever been convicted of a crime involving the illegal use or possession of a dangerous weapon, yes or no. And question number three, which I believe is what you're referring to. Have you ever been arrested, had any criminal citations, indictment and/or orders to appear in court. In the chart below list all arrests, citations and/or orders to appear in court. Failure to list all events could result -- could result in the denial of your registration application.

List all charges regardless of how long ago the incident occurred. List all charges regardless of what state it occurred in. List all charges and/or citations regardless if you were placed in handcuffs. List all charges regardless if they were expunged, dismissed or denied. List all charges regardless if dismissed under California PC 1203.4. Do not list parking or minor moving violations.

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you, Chief Irizarry. You answered my question and it's pretty clear.

My thoughts as far as how we want to go about this as a Board, my opinions are the time and distance of the event, obviously the severity of the actions. Every case is going to be different. In my opinion I need to know how old you were at the time of the incidents. I need to know how old you are today. Your level of maturity then and now. What have you done between time and distance.

I do believe and, again, every circumstance is different. Five years is a little too soon. And, again, you have to consider your time or your age. Where are you in life? What are you trying to do? Are you still in the criminal mindset or are you still truly trying to move on beyond your mistakes?

So the severity of action does play a large part. How old you were. How long ago was it. And then I also need in your testimony, I need to know where are we at with your level of integrity. You failed to report your criminal history. It's pretty clear. Actually, it's not pretty clear. It is clear in black and white. There are Spanish interpreters so that can help you in a different language. Was it a moral turpitude. Was it weapons related. Was it a negotiated case, stuff about level or nature I think that plays into my decision making.

I just need to know whether you were honest or

not. Just mention it. I'm not judging you as a person. 1 judging the behavior at the time it was committed. Now, if 3 this behavior became a career now we're on a different story, and I'm not going to take much consideration based off 5 nothing has changed. So with that -- with that I'll just submit that's 6 my opinion. Any other Board Members, 8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 9 discussion? 10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. 11 And I believe I may be the cause of all of this. 12 understand time and distance, the type of crime committed. I 13 can't quote specific cases that we've had, but there have 14 been cases where we had a gentleman applying to be a security 15 He's 63 years old and he had a minor consuming officer. 16 arrest when he was 18 years old which he failed to disclose. 17 On one hand I understand, hey, you didn't read the fine print. You failed to disclose that's an issue. 18 19 What I was worried about is, okay, this is a long time ago. 20 Is it really all that big of a deal. But we have a thing 21 where we would quote a lot of times based on past practice we're going to deny this. 22 23 Well, I -- I just -- there's sometimes that I

feel that we don't need to do that. We don't need to stand

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on past practice for that if somebody has, you know, done 57 odd years of good living after a minor arrest that they didn't put down. I don't want to be tied down by we have done this in the past, past practices that we have to deny that person. And I believe that was my issue with the whole thing. Thank you.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member

Cortez. I forgot to mention I completely agree with that. I

was uncomfortable denying one last Board meeting exactly

because of that. I don't remember what I did a month ago.

So trying to figure out what I did 25 years ago is going to

be a challenge.

However, I do agree with you spent time in jail. You have law enforcement contact, how do you not remember that? It's -- it's not a positive event. So you are going to remember it. Again, we're talking about a senior citizen. That was a long time ago. There's a lot more life events that have occurred between then and now. I would take that into consideration. Was it honest, oh, crap I forgot to mention that. It was dismissed or it was this. I'll take that into consideration, again, where you're at, what you're trying to do with your work card and what exactly are you applying to get to reverse the denial.

So I think we all have a pretty good idea of what we need to consider. I -- I agree with Board Member Brown. I don't want to be limited as to past practices, as quite honestly I don't agree with past practices. There was a gentleman that I reluctantly agreed to deny it, but I do believe he's back so I'm glad to see him back. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board Member Bezick, do you have? BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Obviously each case is But to me everything hinges on the severity of different. the crime. So it's very dependent on how severe the crime was, not necessarily time and distance. Even if you committed a major crime 40 years ago I think that should be listed. You can't say, oh, I forgot about that because I think it's merely impossible to forget about.

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BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Do you have more?

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez again.

We're stressing the failure to report. That's an integrity issue. You're applying for a work card. You're going to be in some sort of safety security situation and if I can't trust you to tell me exactly what has occurred in your past life how am I going to trust you to do the right thing with a work card. So that's where I will stand if I get testimony of.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I think, you know, I agree with the entire Board. It has been kind of disheartening sometimes to deny folks that, you know, had a bad check writing incident 20, 30 years ago and didn't remember. And so I think I agree that it depends on the severity, the type of crime and time and distance. So I think, you know, I'm not sure how we move forward but yeah, I think --

MR. DETMER: Just for discussion.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, you know, I think we're all in agreement that, you know, we can start looking at this more individualized. I do think it was a little more difficult to do that when we're over-the-phone because it's hard to see people and understand, you know, if they understand the gravity of not, you know, noting everything down. So I think it's a little bit easier when folks are in person. So I do appreciate that we're now back in person.

I would say one thing. I went to go get a license a while ago where I had to go get fingerprints. And while at that fingerprint location, you know, there was a young lady in front of me. And she said I had a DUI, you know, years ago but I don't know if I put it on. And the actual person that was helping her with her fingerprints said, oh, don't worry about it. It was over ten years ago.

And I think that sometimes is where we get that

whole, well, the PILB told me I didn't need to do it because it's over ten years. I don't think it's us or, you know, the staff. I think it's, you know, they're at a fingerprint place. It's an off duty or, you know, an offshoot of what we do. So I don't know that if that's a training issue because they have agents that are, you know, that are working for them.

So, you know, I almost wonder if we shouldn't have some kind of training session on that and what they should note or what they should tell applicants when they ask those questions. Either prefer them to the PILB directly or tell them they don't know, but to give some sort of advice is problematic, so.

MR. INGRAM: Kevin Ingram. We can definitely reach out to our fingerprint associates and have a discussion on that, absolutely. Thank you.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any further discussion on this agenda item? Thank you, everyone.

Agenda item number 47, Mr. George Clay. Are you here? Please tell us a little bit yourself and why you're here.

MR. CLAY: So I've worked security in the State of California since 1992. I had a -- back when the sheriffs, the Metro use to issue cards, I had one of those back in the early '90s as well. Back in 2007, so 14 years ago, I was contacted by somebody on My Space, which kind of tells you how long ago that was. And the birthday on there said they were 17. So I waited for the birthday change to 18 until I answered the e-mail or instant message from them. I ended up meeting them one time.

And then I was later contacted by Metro because apparently she had gotten pregnant by somebody else, and she actually turned out to be 14, even though they found multiple birth dates with different birth dates on it. I ended up pleading guilty to unlawful contact with a minor but it's no probation. No registration. No nothing. So my understanding is that is what was prohibiting me from getting my card here.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

Are there any questions from the Board?

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Clay, correct?

MR. CLAY: Yes, sir. I believe I talked to you

you did then are two different things, okay. But I'm looking at it going, okay, you should know who gets in your car.

MR. WONG: Yes, sir.

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. I have -- I just have my own problems with it. Two gun things in three years -- in two years and you say the obstruction. But there's got to be something to receive 36 months probation and it wasn't terminated until May of 2021. And then it just says to me there's something else that might be going on there. Thank you.

MR. WONG: All right.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, Board Member Nixon. You know, the application, and I'm looking at it, and it very clearly states list all charges regardless if they were expunged or dismissed --

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Or denied. List of all charges regardless if they were dismissed or reduced under California Penal Code. List all charges regardless of what state it occurred in. List all charges, charges and/or citations regardless if placed in handcuffs. There's a lot of all in there. And so for me, you made a decision to, you know, become your own lawyer or just, you know, disregard the paperwork. It says list everything.

12021 or 1201.1.

In addition as required by the penal code section 299 (f), relief under the penal code section 17 1203.4 and 1203.4 (a) does not release the defendant from the separate administrative duty to provide samples, print impressions under DNA and forensic identification database.

If the defendant is found guilty by a tier of fact, not guilty by reason of insanity or pled no contest to a qualifying offense as defined in the penal code.

It also says, number five, the defendant is required to disclose the above conviction in response to any direct questioning contained in any questionnaire or application for public office or licensure by any state or local agency or for contracting with the California State Lottery.

So come back around this year I applied for a 5 position in security in Allegiant Stadium. 6 application I did not include my charges because being dismissed and being out here I wasn't sure. 8 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you. 9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any other questions? 10 Okay. With no other questions, I'll entertain a 11 motion. 12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member 13 Did you indicate what you plan on doing with the 14 work card? 15 MR. ACEVEDO-CASAREZ: No, I haven't been asked. 16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And that's my question. 17 MR. ACEVEDO-CASAREZ: I want to continue working 18 at Allegiant Stadium. I am currently a medical assistant at 19 Red Fox Surgery Center. I have a wife and we have two boys 20 and we recently had a daughter three weeks ago today. All of my applications that I have submitted since I've been living in Las Vegas all have that record on there. So that honestly, ma'am, was, you know, my mistake. My mind has been in 1,000 places since I moved to Las Vegas. I definitely

apologize. You know, I will take my consequences for my 1 2 actions, you know, either way if it's positive or negative, 3 ma'am. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you. And it 5 looks like, and I'm sorry, Saladino, we have not received the 6 paperwork from him yet. INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. 8 So I do have the court docs for the misdemeanor, carrying a 9 concealed weapon. Probation, based on the court docs that I 10 received from the San Bernardino website, it shows that the 11 probation ended August 12th of '21. The applicant had stated 12 it completed early in June, and that was just if he had the 13 paperwork for it I wanted that. But it shows he was off 14 paper August 12th of '21. 15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Well, I tried to disclose everything that I've 17 done in my past, but there was one specific thing that Mr. Zachary, who was my investigator, contacted me on which I 18 19 did not know it was on my record because I was not arrested 20 for it. 21 It was a message that I had sent to my daughter's dad in regards to what my daughter had done. And he told me 22 23 he was going to come by my house. Well, he didn't show up to

my house. So I sent him a message. I didn't know that he

had me in this group. I'd never go through the group, okay, to see who is all in this group. Come to find out it was a girl that was in my daughter's dad's group that I was dating her baby's dad and she wanted revenge because he wasn't interested in her anymore.

So when I sent the text to my baby's dad, telling him I'm going to beat, excuse my French. I'm going to beat your ass when I see you because your daughter has done something to break the law. And you're a pastor now. Do you want to be doing your daughter's eulogy because if she keeps doing this up she's going to be gone.

So the girl seen the message because it went to everybody in the group. The police contact me by phone, telling me to come down and pick up a ticket. I come down. I pic up a ticket. I go. The D.A. contacts me. She tells me come to her office. So I go to her office. Excuse me, I was in an accident so I'm in a lot of pain. Please for give me.

I go to her office. And I showed her the text message that I had sent to my baby's dad. And she seen that it went to everybody in the text message. So she seen that it was like a revenge thing. It was like a revenge thing like she was trying to get at me to get me caught or whatever.

| 17 | knowledge. I didn't know that. |
| 18 | BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: It's like sex offenders, |
| 19 | everything, no matter where it happened you still have to |
| 20 | register in the state. |
| 21 | BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh, sorry. Go ahead. |
| 22 | BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: All you have to do is go |
| 23 | to the Metropolitan Police Department. I don't know where. |
| 24 | Just give them a call. You know, call the 311 number, all |

1 right. Just dial 311. Ask them where you register as an 2 ex-felon, and they will send you to it. It will cost you a 3 few bucks. I don't know what it is, but it's going to save you a lot of problems down, all right. It's not going to 5 hinder your employment. If you get this card it shouldn't 6 hinder anything. With that --BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other questions? 8 9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member 10 Cortez. I do have a question. Mr. Davis, is there a reason 11 why you failed to disclose the 2007, 2009 or '98 and a '98 12 incident to what occurred. One occurred in September and one 13 occurred in June. 14 MR. Sir, in 2018 when you were convicted of two 10 counts of battery, charge of domestic battery which reduced 11 the battery after completing the requirements for the case, 12 why did you fail to disclose that one, because it sounds bad, 13 the battery? 14 MR. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

Investigator Swarthout, so I can understand this, the carjacking was listed on the application but the rest wasn't?

MS. HENRY: No. The --

Basically last year in 2020, before the pandemic got real chaotic and whatnot I came to Las Vegas, and I was certified for a CCW, for a concealed weapons permit for the purpose of executive protection and high end clients and things like that.

I did everything. I got approved. I got certified. I have the, I'm sorry, the CCW permit card from Vegas. Recently, beginning of this year I came back because I was told as any type of line of security work in Las Vegas you have to have a work permits card, and I guess it's the like the guard card. It's the same one that I have as in California.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Uh-huh.

MR. LINCOLN: So within that I did the test and everything. I stated on -- on the application my convictions and whatnot. I believe in 2012 I had an incident where I was an armed officer. I had my firearm located in the glove compartment, and it should have been secured in the back in a glove box. From that I was pretty much detained that night. And later on that morning I was released. The charges were dropped.

I also got documentation as far as from the Long

Beach Courthouse, they dismissed the case, and I gave it to the -- the personnel that was on Durango Street and also had faxed those in. I spoke to two different personnels at the time when I did the application and as well over-the-phone and they confirmed that they had all of the paperwork as far as the sealed documents and everything that was disclosed from that.

I had a couple of other things in the past, in my teenage years, like railroad fare evasion, not having a valid ticket at the time for the trains, things like that. As far as that those are the things that — the one incident I'm more concerned about was the gun charge as far as it being something that was charged as being a felony and then it was, you know, removed. Everything else was kind of like, more of an like an infraction thing. Like I said, the railroad evasion, not having proof of fare, things of that nature. I couldn't think of anything else. That was probably like miscellaneous stuff.

So basically that's just the line of work that I do. Because of the pandemic and everything that's been going on it's very hard. There's really no work. Like I said, I have a family to feed. The work that I'm doing right now I have a commercial license as far as driving my private transportation but that's a hole because of the pandemic as

That's my protection. 20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right. 21 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Listen, thank you. 22 lost my train somewhere. That's where it goes. It just went 23 off track. Okay. You said that's what you're going to do.

What I plan to do with the guard card is I, you know, in my position right now I manage some wonderful people, one of them being Art Moreno, who is the supervisor for Safe Management, who does the contracting for Allegiant Stadium and he offered me a job. Also Mr. Phillips, who is the owner of Allied Universal, I got to meet him. Great guy. He also offered me a position and kind of steered me the right way to go in getting my guard card.

Of course, with information in front of you you already know I was denied because of a couple of felonies that I got that happened, I want to say a different life ago. I was 20 years old, but I'm not going to deny, you know, that I did, I committed those offenses. Like I said, I was a kid.

In that time I've managed to, last month I grabbed my certification in alcohol and addiction counseling where I plan on furthering my education. But unfortunately

1 with everything else it costs money. You want to further your education. You want to go back to school. And I do 3 have two wonderful 12 year olds at home that just love to eat so, you know, I have to keep a full time job. I have a wife, 5 a wonderful wife who's getting her master's degree in accounting. I'm also putting her through school. 6 So with this opportunity I'll be able to keep my 8 position at Walmart and be able to supplement my income with a part-time for a weekend -- weekend job. 10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir. And I 11 applaud you for the work you've done to get here. So thank 12 you for that. 13 Board, are there any questions? 14 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes. This is Gronauer. 15 I had a question for the investigator. I had a question for 16 Mr. Swarthout. Zach, you said you have another summary. 17 Explain some stuff here in this report. 18 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes. So we're waiting 19 on the fingerprint results. We did get them back on the 9th. 20 It does show the arrest that he did disclose. There are some 21 other arrests that weren't disclosed. Most of them appear to be 5-1 2019, reckless driving, domestic battery. 22 23 looks like he was arrested. No conviction there.

We got into an argument where I left. The police were called. In that process they told my wife they couldn't do nothing about it because I'm a grown man. So the cop kind of led her to did he touch you. Did he push you. Did he hit you. And my wife responded, well, he bumped on the way out the door.

MR. GONZALEZ: That was enough to -- to order an arrest. I did go through my domestic battery classes. I did my 12 days. Did I deserve it? Absolutely. I shouldn't have

The most thing that really is amazing to me is I work for the Super Bowl. When Pittsburgh played Arizona I worked for the George Steinbrenner's Field. I got approved to get the job and it was an FBI, an incredible check because you go to players house and whatnot, and I didn't get it because someone else that was older decided to want to do this. And this job, whether rain, shine or thunder you have to work. You know, you work three days off, you work 15 days straight. So I didn't get the job, but that went through the Super Bowl.

And last one I left town. I got the school district to call me and they wanted to give me a job. When I did the background check it cleared with him. I don't know if it was seven or ten years. And then now I get denied for a hiccup that I had 33 years ago, to be exact 32 years ago. I was 17. I had just got tried as an adult. I went to the Clark County. I almost died in there. I had a concussion to the skull. I had a lot of injuries. It was going to get my property and not commit crime, to not do nothing. I was raised properly or differently. So I wasn't raised to -- you know, I didn't burglarize and didn't when I was young. That

wasn't me.

So it was just for shack that was given to me, wanted a visual up here, and I didn't want to be by her and I left. So I knew that it had ended up with her. So I went and it was there in the living room, got my hat and left. I was going to spend the night over at a friend's house. When I got back there was cops everywhere. They arrested me. I did three months, four months in high power with Robert Weeks. There was an unsolved mystery, with a lot of bad people.

The only thing that saved me was that my brother is an ex pro boxer. He spent 31 years in the Mirage. And I have martial arts and boxing experience. If it wasn't for that I would have been in bad shape. I had to be always isolated alone because of this. And the charges were lewdness with a minor to intent, burglary with intent and battery with intent.

I didn't do no burglary. I didn't touch her. I went to get my property. So they dropped everything. They scared me. I was looking at 30 years. So I took, it scared me, the three years probation. I didn't know the Oscar Goodman. That's a good friend of mine. I didn't know Rosco Jimenez's son. I didn't Carmichael Lucci, all of the lawyers that I know, that could help me. So I took the deal, three

1 years and that was that. 2 I've had hiccups since, but they had been far. I 3 have not been in trouble. I have my certificate for carpet cleaning. I have my own business that I sold to my brother, 5 and I want to get this job because I want to be with the 6 director and they really want me on board at the Fashion Show Mall. I'm a good candidate for them, and I think I would be good. I would give them my all. 8 9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir. 10 what do you do currently? 11 MR. ONGORY: I have -- I'm working for a 12 gentleman right now in the Signature Hotel in the MGM 13 part-time. And I'm doing my carpet cleaning. You know, jobs 14 that are coming. My brother is running it, other people that 15 know I do great work. Carmine and Kenny are a friend of 16 mine. 17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you. 18 Board, any questions? 19 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Investigator, are 20 fingerprints in? INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes. We did receive his 21 fingerprints. There are a couple of arrests that weren't 22 23 listed on his application. They are all from out of state. 24 One of them was from San Diego. The original arrest was for

August 18th of 2000. Original charges were rape of spouse by 1 force, sodomy, threatened crime, intent to terrorize. 3 he ended up being convicted of was inflict corporal injury on spouse cohabited. He was convicted three years. Probation, 5 180 days jail for that one. 6 And then out of Florida, March 27, 2005, DUI misdemeanor, convicted. And then May 26, 2006, DUI misdemeanor, convicted 8 9 out of there. 10 And then out of Arizona there is August 2nd, 11 1997, DUI, which he was convicted of. 12 And then there was a March 20th, 1998, he was 13 making false reports, a misdemeanor. It does not show as a 14 conviction, just as an arrest. 15 BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. This is going to be a question for our Chief. It says that prior to him 16 applying he contacted Chief Irizarry numerous times to 17 18 discuss his arrest history and the possibility he got a minor 19 dismissed offenses out of state. It seems like he was trying 20 to make every attempt for assistance. 21 MS. IRIZARRY: Chief Irizarry. Yes, Mr. Mesa, he -- he's contacted me I would say probably more than ten or so 22 23 times since he applied. He was -- I did advise him list

everything. He did mention I don't know if I remember

everything. He did go the extra effort to go -- I know he doesn't have transportation. He went to get his scope here in Las Vegas, and I believe he got some other court documents or he was able to get some information from I want to say Florida. He did mention numerous times I don't know if there's anything else anywhere else.

I guess I would testify that he had mentioned consistently or every time we spoke that he was trying to make an effort to remember or to get the information, but I believe that's all he had listed at the time.

MR. ONGORY: And when I did -- when I did this they -- I didn't -- I wasn't allowed in, and I tried to put everything. I wouldn't hide nothing. And I wanted to touch on a few of the cases.

I mean, this -- y'all make the rule.

1 I mean, if that's what they say don't do it don't do it. BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So just to clarify a 3 little bit we don't make the rules as far as each and every employer and their policies and procedures. As your job to observe and report that is the job. It's out of your 5 6 jurisdiction to go above and beyond to use of force unless it's an imminent and immediate threat. 8 I get what you you're saying because I do work 9 with officers that there's some of that mentally. However, 10 it's a very small line and you will find yourself in a 11 criminal courtroom facing criminal charges of assault, 12 battery of those natures. That's what I'm trying to avoid. 13 I am a little concerned with that because it 14 seems like it's a little bit of a trigger happy. I do have a 15 hot temper and I can. We have a situation here in 2020, 16 2019. I've got information that you're not necessarily 17 conducting under policies and procedures, going a bit above 18 and beyond use of force. It's an issue in today's day and 19 age. So I just -- I kind of wanted to get an idea. Do you 20 believe you have somewhat of anger issues or impulse control 21 issues? 22 MR. LAWSON: No. Like I was telling him, we 23 don't --

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I need you to tell me

because I wasn't there for you conversation.

MR. LAWSON: I'm just trying to make sure I'm talking into the mic. Like I was telling him when I spoke to him on the phone a year, year and a half ago, we don't clock in and, oh, let me just go out there and get hands on. No. No. You get certain calls that you have to do your job. You know, it's like do your job. You get fired for not protecting people that's paying you. So it's like -- it just depends on what type of situation you're in.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So can I ask a question. The company -- I want to ask you what companies you've worked for. But in the employment of those companies have they taught you or have you been through any deescalation classes?

MR. LAWSON: Yeah. We go through all type of training classes from firearms to baton, asps, Metro training. We took -- some of the companies out here have like Metro classes they will pay for and stuff. All you gotta do is pay for the certificate and stuff like that.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Have you been through any of them, and when I say deescalation meaning when you walk into a hostile environment, you walk into a problem, like for example on a bus, have they taught you how to bring all of that down without using anything on your belt yet?

MR. LAWSON: Yes, ma'am. Actually being a

firearm carrier, yes. We don't actually go in, you know,
escalating the situation and trigger happy, yeah, or stuff
like that.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So you've gone through that deescalation --

MR. LAWSON: Yeah.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- and MOAB and all those other courses.

MR. LAWSON: Uh-huh.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so in that you do understand, you know, as a private citizen you do not have the power to arrest. And so, you know, not only for yourself and you can put yourself in harms way and in addition, you know, get arrested but your company as well, you know, both of them. If there's someone that wants to sue you for doing something that they felt was above and beyond what your scope was that you could get arrested for that.

So we're just trying to understand your mentality when you go into a situation. I do get that there's times when it's escalated and you need to do other things. But we have video and we have, you know, just all kinds of reports that you seem to be a little bit more above and beyond, what the kids call today extra, right. So we want that make sure that, you know, you understand that. And that we don't take

the responsibility of putting you out on the streets. 1 we're trying to understand where you're at in your head right 3 now before we make a final decision on whether or not we're going to, you know, move forward with the guard card. 5 MR. LAWSON: Okay. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We appreciate that you have a 6 kid. You have kids and you have a family that you need to 8 support and all of that. But we need to understand and feel comfortable that we're not releasing you out to the public to 10 cause harm. 11 No. I get you. MR. LAWSON: 12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any further questions? 13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. 14 I have a question for Investigator Saladino. I didn't get in no serious trouble in Las Vegas,

Nevada until May -- May 9th, 2019, when I caught my CCW

charges. I did house arrest for probably like a month or so.

Two years of probation, no violation, no trouble, no dirty

piss tests. Got off, got off probation. I obtained my work

card again. I took my CCW class. I got my paperwork, my -
everything right here that's my CCW class. It was submitted

by Metro.

I made a mistake by having my gun concealed and the whole incident I made a mistake. I just didn't know who the undercover police were. I made a mistake. I don't ever want to go through that again. That's why I took the time to, when I got off I obtained my work card. I obtained my

CCW. My CCW just recently got submitted. I went to Metro. 1 2 I got all of that to prove to you guys. 3 I made a mistake. I just want to get back to 4 I got a good company I can go back to. 5 Security Service, 15th, the manager. I just want to get back 6 to work because Door Dash is not doing it for me. I just want to get back to work. I made my mistake. I did my time. I did two years, no trouble at all, no violation, no nothing. 8 I got all my information. When I got out I obtained my work 10 card again. I did my CCW class, passed it, submitted it with 11 Metro. Everything is right here, the fingerprints. 12 Everything is right here. 13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. 14 MR. LOYAL: I just want to get back to work 15 because Door Dash and Grub Hub, it's not doing it for me. Ι 16 have myself and two kids to take care of. And, you know, 17 Door Dash ain't doing it. 18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I understand. 19 MR. LOYAL: You know, I made a mistake. 20 apologize to you guys and myself, but I just want to get back 21 to work. 22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. 23 MR. LOYAL: You know, I'm not a bad person. 24 made a mistake. And I have these papers if you guys want

We do have police reports if 15 the Board wants information on the arrest from the police 16 reports. 17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So if I could please because 18 I feel like I walked into the middle of a story here. 19 was the arrest for? 20 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: So the first arrest was 21 May 9th, 2019, as for carrying a concealed -- concealed 22 weapon without a permit and resisting a police officer. 23 the police reports, Metro was watching him because there was 24 an incident earlier on that he wasn't charged with until

May 12th for that charge.

And when they went to stop him, they were in an unmarked car. They got in front of his vehicle. They swerved so they would not hit. And when he got out of the car he started reaching for a firearm that was in his belt. When they identified themselves he did stop reaching. They did retrieve the firearm and taken into custody with no incident.

MR. LOYAL: That's true.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I did.

MR. LOYAL: I didn't know what --

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sir? Sir, let us finish. So I just want to make sure he wasn't in uniform. He wasn't on duty as far as security. Because it sounds like he had a guard card and he was working security.

INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: So at that time for that incident no. The May 12th, 2019 arrest was related back to a March -- April 30th, 2019 incident where he was at the Ahern Casino, where is that, the Sahara and Las Vegas Boulevard area. And in that incident the individual that reported said that there was a green laser on his chest. And later on when he got out of the vehicle, supposedly he showed him a firearm that had a green laser attached to him. That's why he ended up filing a police report because he felt that the firearm

If you look at sub two, if an applicant's registration is denied, denied, suspended or revoked by the Board on two or more occasions may not reapply for registration earlier than five years after the date of the most recent position of the Board denies, suspend or revoke the registration of the applicant. This requires a degree of regulatory interpretation. But in the first one they say further than one year. And in the second one they say not

| 1 | earlier than five years. One could possibly interpret that |

INVESTIGATOR JONES: The first text message was cut off. So I'll start with the second starting from the recipient and not Mr. Burges. "So keep spouting your lies on social media and keep breaking the law because you believe you have a right. Oh, by the way, I sent the screen shots of this conversation and the screen shot of you breaking the TPO to Metro." Burge then responds "I'm a LEO, law enforcement officer, and I never punched her. Never assaulted her. And I have the videos to prove it. I am however working for DHS and other Nevada agencies for bail enforcement and private investigations. And I know for a fact that you need to stay away from me because if I see you, my friends in Metro, sir, will give you a nice pair of bracelets for interfering with a federal investigation."

They text back and forth for about four hours and then Mr. Burge states. "I'm filing a harassment lawsuit against you, unless that's not your name. If that's the case I want to see your ID. Here's the authority to demand
