## MEETING NOTICE AND AGENDA

## AGENDA

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1 CARSON CITY, NEVADA, TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 13, 2022

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4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning, everybody. I'd  
5 like to call the meeting to order. I will start with roll  
6 call. Mr. -- Executive Director Ingram, please.

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you, Madam  
8 Chair. We'll start with Chair Tammy Nixon.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Here.

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Board Member Tim  
11 Bezick.

12 MEMBER BEZICK: Here.

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Board Member Rick  
14 Brown.

15 MEMBER BROWN: Here.

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Board Member  
17 Katherine Cortez.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Here.

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: And Board Member  
20 Robert Gronauer.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: Here.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: We do have a quorum  
23 and we're ready to proceed.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. This is the

1 portion where we allow for public comment. Members of the  
2 public may comment on matters appearing on the agenda and may  
3 bring up matters not appearing on the agenda to the attention  
4 of the board.

5 The Board may discuss the matters not appearing  
6 on the agenda, but may not act on the matters at this meeting.  
7 If the Board desires, the matters may be placed on a future  
8 agenda for action.

9 Public comment may be limited to five minutes per  
10 person at the discretion of the chair, but will not be  
11 restricted according to viewpoint.

12 Is there anybody down south that would like to  
13 make public comment?

14 Okay. Seeing no one down south, is there anybody  
15 up north who would like to make public comment?

16 MEMBER BROWN: We don't have anybody present,  
17 Madam Chair. This is Board Member Brown.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Seeing there's no  
19 public comment, we'll move to the next Agenda Item.

20 Board, executive director announcements and  
21 reports and updates, please.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you, Madam  
23 Chair. Kevin Ingram for the record.

24 First of all, I'd like to start by introducing

1 our staff that we have present. We'll start with the north.  
2 In the north, we have our court reporter, Shellie Loomis, with  
3 us.

4 So I will ask that when providing testimony,  
5 state your name, spell your last name and speak clearly and  
6 concisely so that she can capture everything that's being  
7 said.

8 We have Investigator David Hubber on the screen  
9 down here who's to your far left. We have Investigator Ricky  
10 Diaz. He's the next individual over from the left. You've  
11 already met the Board.

12 The chief investigator in the south farthest to  
13 my left is Vincent Saladino, and to his right is Zachary  
14 Swarthout. We have our licensing specialist in the back,  
15 Stephanie Rosso, who -- to whom most of you have been  
16 speaking, and our legal counsel today is Chricy Harris. And  
17 my name is Kevin Ingram.

18 I have provided some stats to the Board to kind  
19 of give you a quarter-by-quarter overview. This is our first  
20 true quarter to quarter, and you'll see that the license  
21 applications for second quarter from the June board meeting,  
22 you can see that we had a total of 41 applications, a total of  
23 36 approved, and a total of five either withdrawn or denied,  
24 compared to last year same quarter of 38 applications, 31

1 approved and seven withdrawn or denied. So we're pretty  
2 consistent in our licensing application throughout the year.

3 When it comes to work hard applications -- excuse  
4 me, for April of 2021, we received 722 applications to the --  
5 April of this year 1389.

6 In '21, 654 -- I'm sorry, 645 were made active  
7 and April of this year, 1170 were made active. Last year 57  
8 were withdrawn and this year 142 were withdrawn. April '21,  
9 there were 20 denied, and this year in April, 77.

10 Generally speaking, when you see an increase in  
11 the number of applications received, you will see an increase  
12 obviously in the approvals and the denials.

13 For May of '21, we had 756 to '22 of 1618. May  
14 of '21, there were 681 made active to May of '22, the 1,284,  
15 51 withdrawn in 2021 -- excuse me -- and 244 withdrawn in May  
16 of 2022. Denied in '21 were a total of 24 and denied in May  
17 of '22 were 90.

18 In June, last year, we received 1,040. This year  
19 in June, we received 936. Now, you see the uptick in April  
20 and May over last year and then a downslide for June,  
21 mostly due to Electric Daisy Carnival being moved forward in  
22 the year last year. It was a little bit later. They delayed  
23 it, so that's the answer for the number of applications  
24 decreasing.

1           In June of '21, we made 941 active. In June of  
2 '22, we made 733 active. There were 65 withdrawn in 2021, 169  
3 withdrawn in June of '22 and there were 34 denied both years.  
4 So the Quarter 2 total for 2021 was 2518 applications  
5 received; for 2022, 3,943. So you can see the staff is very  
6 busy throughout the year.

7           The withdrawals normally are individuals that  
8 were either missing information on their application. When  
9 they were contacted, they failed to follow through or they  
10 just decided not to proceed.

11           On complaints and investigations for second  
12 quarter of 2022, we didn't have a true reading for '21 because  
13 OnBase wasn't tracking it. But we'll be tracking moving  
14 forward.

15           Complaints for second quarter, we received ten  
16 complaints for PBO. Nine of those were closed, one is still  
17 open, investigation, a recent one, and of those ten  
18 complaints, two violations were issued.

19           For private investigator, there was one received  
20 and one closed. No action. Process server, one received, one  
21 closed, no action. Repossessors, two received, two closed, no  
22 action.

23           And for work card, there was one received and it  
24 was closed due to the licensing company taking action against



1 the individual. So a total of 15 complaints were received for  
2 second quarter, 14 were closed, there's one open and so far  
3 two violations have been issued.

4 As far as unlicensed activity citations, 2021  
5 versus 2022, second quarter, 2021, six unlicensed activity  
6 citations were issued. 2022, four were issued and we have a  
7 breakdown there for first, second subsequents.

8 This quarter, this year have been all new  
9 citations. They haven't been reoccurring. Of the citations  
10 that were written this year, all four were for private patrol  
11 unlicensed activity.

12 Does the Board have any questions on the  
13 statistics?

14 Hearing -- sorry.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: For the citations that were  
16 written, have they been paid?

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Yes. The next thing,  
18 I provided the Board with the profit and loss statement for  
19 last year, last fiscal year.

20 Does the Board have any questions on that?

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: I do. This is Board Member  
22 Cortez. I was looking at the profit and loss for this year.  
23 I just want to make note for the record, I was overlooking,  
24 obviously there is a line -- itemized line for every category.

1           Noticing that in the salary of wages, it's  
2   incredibly low for the amount of work that you guys provide.  
3   I do want to let the public know that because when you look at  
4   numbers, it's very easy to assume that, wow, this company is  
5   getting a crap load of money when, in actuality, when you look  
6   at the breakdown, the employees aren't getting paid for the  
7   amount of work that's going on.

8           So I just want to make you guys clear or anybody  
9   else reading the minutes unless -- I just want to make that  
10  noted for the record because I am also noticing -- I don't  
11  know if we've gotten there or I might be jumping ahead --

12           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah, you are.

13           MEMBER CORTEZ: -- for the budget. Okay. Sorry,  
14  that's it.

15           EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you, and I  
16  agree. You know, I think everybody present today knows that  
17  State of Nevada employees make, on average, about one-third  
18  less than county and city positions in a public sector.

19           You know, I'm fortunate to have the team that I  
20  have and they stick it out with me, because they could go  
21  other places and make a lot more money. We try to make it a  
22  healthy working environment.

23           I have a fantastic team that works hard every day  
24  and those of you that have been licensed for a while, you know

1 what I'm talking about. So we appreciate your support as  
2 licenses holders as well, and thank you for the kind words.

3           So on the profit and loss, I'm not going to go  
4 through line item by line item with you, but I will tell you  
5 that we were able to -- after all expenditures paid, based on  
6 some salary savings of a restructure of our agency.

7           I have two vacant positions that I'm not  
8 intending on filling because with our structured streamline  
9 processes, we're becoming more efficient in the way we're  
10 doing our jobs and we have no backlog at all. So I'm happy to  
11 say that.

12           Due to that, we were able to add an additional  
13 \$275,760 to our reserve account. For those of you that aren't  
14 aware of what a reserve account is for state agencies, we're a  
15 self-funded agency. 100 percent of our revenues come from  
16 licensing fees and backgrounds and applications for work  
17 cards. We do not get money from the legislature.

18           So if we don't have revenues coming in, I can't  
19 pay expenditures including our rent, our electricity, our  
20 salaries and everything there. We're required by law to have  
21 six months worth of expenditures in our reserve account at all  
22 times.

23           That means at all times, I have to have about  
24 \$900,000 sitting in my checking account. That way, if our

1 revenues stop, we can continue to sustain our expenses for a  
2 six-month period of time. I'm happy to say right now, we have  
3 1.3 million in there.

4           So we've been able to incrementally increase  
5 that. We're getting close to a year of reserve now, and that  
6 doesn't happen very often. So I'm pretty proud of our efforts  
7 there. And that's all I have on the profit and loss.

8           Are there any questions?

9           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I'd just like to echo  
10 Board Member Cortez. I work with other states and licensing  
11 in my position outside of this board, and it is a challenge  
12 working with other boards. They're oftentimes short-staffed  
13 and/or they lose their staff to internal positions to the  
14 State and other positions they get paid higher.

15           So these guys do do a fantastic job and I want to  
16 make sure in the upcoming budget that we do recognize that so  
17 we can work on retention.

18           So that being said, we'll move on to -- yeah, go  
19 ahead.

20           MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member Gronauer.  
21 I have a comment to follow up to that. When we talk about  
22 staff, all the people we see who are coming on and knowing  
23 everything, I want to make sure when we talk about the staff,  
24 we also add our executive director in there as part of staff.

1 Sometimes I think we just think of all the other employees and  
2 put their executive to the side.

3 Well, to herd all these cats is a deal, it's a  
4 real big job. And just for the volume alone, we spoke about  
5 this a little earlier, and the depth and breadth of their  
6 investigations as investigators, I just want to make sure that  
7 the executive director, no matter whom he or she may be, now  
8 or later, gets the recognition. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Absolutely. And he's been a  
10 great big help for me in reaching out to other states in  
11 showing how they've streamlined their systems and how to make  
12 it work better. So there's been great progress in that, so I  
13 do appreciate that support.

14 Anything up north on this current subject? Okay.  
15 Seeing there's no comment, we'll move on. So then we will  
16 look for Agenda Item 4, review and approve the transcripts for  
17 the June 14th and 15th, 2022 board meeting for possible  
18 action.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
20 motion to approve the transcripts of June 14th, 15th, 2022 as  
21 written.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a -- I have a motion.  
23 Do I have a second?

24 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I will

1 second.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: A motion and a second.

3 All in favor say, "aye."

4 (Motion carries.)

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

6 Okay. Agenda Item Number 5, review and --  
7 wowzers. Review and approve FY, fiscal year 2023 budget for  
8 possible action.

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you, Madam  
10 Chair. I've provided the proposed budget to the Board. This  
11 is the first year that we've all -- that we're going to be  
12 speaking about our budget in open session for approval.

13 Some of you may know that last legislative  
14 session, our board originally was set up under the Attorney  
15 General's office. So we were under their umbrella and we were  
16 part of the state financial system.

17 When that bill passed a few years ago, we became  
18 an independent board and commission just like all the other  
19 boards and commissions. We were set up very uniquely  
20 different and now we are truly a state board. Because of  
21 that, in an open meeting, we are to discuss the budget and  
22 have the Board approve it for the first time. So that's why  
23 nobody's heard of us before.

24 So I've prepared the budget, I've provided that

1 to you, and you can basically see that what I did is I took  
2 last year's profit and loss statement and based on the uptrend  
3 of the number of applications we were seeing increasing, I  
4 adjusted the budget accordingly.

5 The good thing about a self-funded budget is it's  
6 not really that difficult to adjust because it's based on last  
7 year's revenues and expenditures.

8 So that trend tends to increase about 3 percent  
9 every year and, therefore, this year's budget, total budget  
10 proposed is just under 2 million. If the Board has any  
11 questions, I'd be happy to answer any of those for you.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez and  
13 this is the area where I was referencing for those reading the  
14 minutes, where you see the amount being proposed, and like  
15 Executive Director said, 2.2 -- just under 2.2 million, which  
16 is a little more than this last year.

17 As indicated also in the increase of work being  
18 distributed in the IOP. So it -- where I'm looking at it, it  
19 makes perfect sense, and yet I want to reiterate the salary  
20 wages don't really truly reflect that 2.2 million.

21 THE REPORTER: Can they speak in the mic more?  
22 (Discussion off the record.)

23 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. Our  
24 stenographer is asking if the Board members down south can

1 speak up or move closer to the microphone, please.

2 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So the only thing that I  
4 would ask in this, so that it doesn't look like such an  
5 increase from actuals to proposed, is that if we could do an  
6 estimated budget based from where we are right now to the end  
7 of the year and so it looks more in line.

8 It doesn't need to be this year, but maybe going  
9 forward, that's something that we look at since this is our  
10 first year because I think, you know, when I look at it, a lot  
11 of times when we do our budgets, we look at what the  
12 estimated -- what we estimate the rest of the year would  
13 entail, costs and everything else so that there's a better  
14 sense of a jump.

15 When you look at FY '23, it looks like a big jump  
16 in revenues and expenditures and it's not really if you had  
17 taken it out all the way through the year.

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: And that's a great  
19 point that you make there. In FY '23, we had to go ahead and  
20 incorporate three months worth of being on your budget system  
21 still. So that accounts for that increase.

22 And also with the increase, we're looking at  
23 about, again, a 3 to 5 percent uptick in the number of  
24 applications we're receiving. So with that happening, our



1 revenues jump significantly, which obviously offsets and  
2 brings our expenses up that much, too, because for every  
3 dollar that comes in for applications, that adds an expense of  
4 background investigations for those additional people as well  
5 as my costs for fingerprinting jump up dramatically.

6 I mean, every month we're paying close to -- it  
7 depends on the month, anywhere from 40 to \$65,000 a month just  
8 in fingerprinting expenses to the Department of Public Safety  
9 to run the fingerprints for us. But that's why.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah.

11 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Is that extra three  
12 months.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah. And so when you look  
14 at that delta between --

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Yes.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: -- June -- January and June  
17 to the 2023 budget, it looks like a huge delta between the  
18 two. And it's not really because you're not spending all the  
19 way through the year. So that was the only -- yeah, thank  
20 you.

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: I'll take that in  
22 account for the next year. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So any further questions from  
24 the Board? Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll

1 entertain a motion.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
3 motioning to approve the FY '23 budget as proposed.

4 CHAIR NIXON: I have a motion. Do we have a  
5 second?

6 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I will  
7 second.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a  
9 second.

10 All in favor say, "aye."

11 Motion passes. You good? Okay.

12 (Motion carries.)

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we'll move on to  
14 Agenda Item Number 6, please, review and discuss, approve  
15 increase board staff pay.

16 As discussed in previous statements today, and I  
17 think you heard probably Bobby talk about in the past, the  
18 amount of work that the individuals do, our staff does, that  
19 it's not always commiserate with the pay that they receive.  
20 And so we wanted to bring that up.

21 Thank you, Executive Director, for bringing that  
22 up for our approval. So if you could go with that.

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: A brief overview.

24 So as has been stated over and over again, for

1 several board meetings now over a year, year and a half, board  
2 members have suggested pay increases for staff. And, you  
3 know, being in the state, being under the umbrella of the  
4 Attorney General's office, there were certain classification  
5 and pay scales that had to be followed and adhered to  
6 100 percent.

7 Now that we're an independent board, class are no  
8 longer -- staff are no longer considered classified. We're  
9 all at will employees now and, therefore, pay scale -- payroll  
10 can be adjusted by the Board with their approval.

11 Traditionally, the State of Nevada employees  
12 receive a 3 percent cost of living per year. With the last  
13 several years, there's been no cost of living raise. A lot of  
14 that was attributed to COVID expenses, layoffs and things of  
15 that nature. So no cost of living has been given since 2019.

16 However, expenses have increased, inflation has  
17 increased. Our medical benefits for every state employee have  
18 increased by 9 percent, and yet no pay increases for staff.

19 So I put together some stats and some, you know,  
20 dollar amounts for the Board to consider based on the Board  
21 members have been giving -- given to me. I really had to wait  
22 and see where our budget fell when we became an independent  
23 board because a lot of our expenses increased dramatically  
24 when we became an independent board by having to hire an

1 accounting firm, by having to pay all the fringe directly,  
2 instead of it being through the State of Nevada.

3           And so I wanted to make sure that we were still  
4 going to have enough money in reserve, which as I mentioned  
5 earlier, we have plenty of money there.

6           So the initial proposal that I wanted to make was  
7 for board staff to receive a 5 percent increase. That would  
8 impact the personal budget that was just approved by an  
9 additional \$43,000. By the time you incorporate in the salary  
10 increase and the fringe benefits, it would be an impact of an  
11 additional 43,000.

12           The Board had asked me -- several board members  
13 had asked me to bump it up a little bit and maybe look at a  
14 7 percent increase. In doing so, that would impact our  
15 personnel expenses by \$60,000, just under \$60,000. And if the  
16 Board so chose to go to a 10 percent increase, that would  
17 impact the personal expenses by an additional \$86,000 and,  
18 again, fringe is included in that.

19           So those would be the numbers we're looking at.  
20 Again, based on the fact that we carried over an additional  
21 275,000 --

22           MEMBER GRONAUER: Excuse me, excuse me.

23           EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Yes?

24           MEMBER GRONAUER: What was included in that?

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: That would be salary  
2 increases, plus the fringe benefits.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Across the board?

4 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Correct.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

6 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: And so that would  
7 include, you know, all the costs of retirement costs and --

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: Exactly. Okay. Thank you.

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: You're welcome.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I do have a -- I do have a  
11 question. When you have board staff in here, does that  
12 include yourself?

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: That would be -- that  
14 would be up to the Board to decide.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez for  
16 the record. Who all would that be?

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Everybody but him.

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Yeah, I propose it is  
19 everyone except for me.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So if we did add you  
21 to that, what -- could you give us that, what that would look  
22 like?

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: It -- well, actually  
24 on the 10 percent, that's me included.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, that's you included?

2 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Correct.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. That's really...

4 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Board Member Bezick. Did  
5 I hear you say previously that the past couple years, there  
6 was no cost of living increase for staff?

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You're breaking up really  
8 bead.

9 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Board Member Bezick. Did  
10 I hear you say previously that the past couple years, there  
11 was no cost of living for staff?

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: That was correct, sir, yes.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. One  
14 more time, Mr. Ingram. What did -- when was the last time an  
15 increase was awarded?

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: The State of Nevada  
17 cost of living increase, the last one was awarded to staff in  
18 2019.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: And that was because they were  
20 under the State --

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Correct.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: -- Correct?

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Correct. I believe  
24 this year -- well, I know this year, July 1, the Governor gave

1 all state employees that were non-union a 1 percent increase.  
2 That did not include us. And anyone that was part of the  
3 union received 3 percent increases.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So as I'm looking at the  
5 budget, I just want to make sure. So currently you're  
6 proposing 2000 -- FY 2023, that your gross profit would be 2  
7 million -- 2.1 million, almost 2.2 million.

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: That would be revenue  
9 gross profit, yes.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So with that, you're  
11 seeing that if we did the 10 percent, it would decrease by  
12 80,000, so basically 2.117?

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Right. You can see  
14 on the budget, the net income for the year, last year, was  
15 275,000. This year it's proposed at 482,000.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: So basically the  
18 86,000 would come off of the 482,000.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Got you.

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: And still putting  
21 almost \$400,000 additional dollars in reserve.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: I appreciate the numbers you've  
23 got and the information -- this is Gronauer, I'm sorry. The  
24 numbers you put out there, and it gives a bright line and

1 clear view of what we need to do and how it should be done.

2           Again, to reiterate, the work they really do is  
3 amazing. All you have to do is look at our packets and  
4 everything we get. So -- and then we get a 50 percent raise,  
5 right, as the Board?

6           (Laughter.)

7           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Wait. We do.

8           MEMBER GRONAUER: Strike that, strike that. We  
9 don't get paid.

10          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We get paid?

11          MEMBER GRONAUER: So 50 percent of nothing is  
12 nothing.

13                 Anyway. So, again, I think you did a yeoman's  
14 job of putting that stuff together so we understand where  
15 we're at and what we're doing, and I could see that with the  
16 increase. And, you know, it sounds like a lot if we say  
17 10 percent.

18                 It sounds like a lot except we go back 3, 4,  
19 5 years and realize it really isn't. And then the Board -- in  
20 the future, whatever Board members are around, can do whatever  
21 they want, you know, if it comes up again.

22                 So I'm ready to make a proposal whenever you're  
23 ready for that.

24                 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So...



1                   MEMBER CORTEZ: I -- so this is Board Member  
2 Cortez, I do have one last question.

3                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

4                   MEMBER CORTEZ: Are we proposing -- this might  
5 open up a can of worms, but I am a previous --

6                   THE REPORTER: Can she repeat that? I'm having a  
7 hard time hearing her.

8                   (Discussion off the record.)

9                   BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Excuse me, this Board Member  
10 Brown. Excuse me, the court reporter is having trouble  
11 hearing you, Board Member Cortez. If you can start over  
12 again, she couldn't hear most of that.

13                   MEMBER CORTEZ: So this is Board Member Cortez.  
14 I'm -- my question is: Are we motioning to -- or are we  
15 considering this an annual increase, a one-time increase? Do  
16 we want to discuss that from a union contract perspective?  
17 That's what I'm looking at and I know the -- some contracts, I  
18 know with the State, the county, we do either three-year,  
19 two-year, whatnot.

20                   Again, that's -- that might be a discussion for  
21 the investigators, whether they want to entertain unionizing  
22 or if we just want to leave that within the Board.

23                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I guess my question  
24 since -- and I don't know, that's kind of open, but just to

1 kind of narrow it down a little bit. Typically, there's the 3  
2 percent increase when we were underneath the State; right?

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Well, with the  
4 exception of when the Governor --

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right.

6 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: -- and the  
7 legislature did not approve the increases for the last three  
8 years.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right. So going forward,  
10 since we're not underneath them, what would that look like?

11 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Salaries can be  
12 adjusted at any time by the Board now. This proposal is a  
13 one-time.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So this proposal would be one  
15 time and we -- and I don't know if we need to speak to you,  
16 but would we propose that we would review this annually? You  
17 know, that be part of the motion, I guess?

18 MS. HARRIS: That could be part of the motion.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Because I think --  
20 does that answer your question?

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes. Would the Board be inclined  
22 to consider cost of -- wait, annual cost of living increase?

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: That's called COLA.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes, thank you. Like an annual

1 cost or COLA, only an annual at that time.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So that's the one time --  
3 (Simultaneous speaking.)

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct. The one time ten  
5 percent today, right?

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: Every year COLA increase is to  
8 be --

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So that would be part -- you  
10 need to -- the next step is to make a motion. The motion  
11 would be both parts if you would like.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: Right. I just want to hear from  
13 the Board what they feel about that.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I don't think we would need  
15 to make -- can we have open discussion about that? Okay. Got  
16 you.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer in the open  
18 discussion. Good points brought up by Board Member Cortez.  
19 The annual, to me, is -- not important right now is 10 percent  
20 one time at this moment, okay? Now, you want to look at COLA  
21 increases and stuff like that, again, now we have the figures  
22 put in front of us without that, they've said.

23 So, to me, I would rather leave all that out  
24 until another time because COLA increases come by the years.

1 We'll see what happens, we don't know what's going to happen,  
2 what's not going to happen.

3 I believe we're doing a very frugal job by Kevin.  
4 What I mean, he's cheap. So he watches the money very well,  
5 and with that, what we haven't discussed with the COLA  
6 increase and cost and all this other cost. So, to me, I would  
7 rather -- my part of the discussion is I'd rather leave it as  
8 it is today, 10 percent across the board for all our  
9 employees, including our executive director, one time now.

10 And in the future, if pay raises come up again,  
11 anything can come up, I mean, COLA can go out of the roof.  
12 Who knows what we're going to do with the politics we live in  
13 now and later, who knows. So the best thing to me, I mean,  
14 that was part of my -- again, not to be redundant, but as an  
15 annual -- not an annual increase, it's a one-time increase.  
16 That increases now for ten percent for all employees,  
17 including Kevin.

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Madam Chair, if I  
19 may.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah.

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Kevin Ingram for the  
22 record. The -- kind of in line with what Board Member  
23 Gronauer is saying, with us being a self-funded agency, it's  
24 hard to really establish a pay increase every year because

1 it's going to be based on revenues. If we take a hit during  
2 this year, a proposed \$484,000 that's going to go into  
3 reserves could be negative.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right.

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: And we can pull in  
6 from the reserve. So more of a guideline might be to  
7 review --

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Review. That's what I --

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: -- no later than  
10 September.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah.

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Of every year.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Correct.

14 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: To see whether or not  
15 that can be justified or not just because of us being  
16 self-funded. I understand what Board Member Cortez is saying  
17 and that would -- that normally works when you have an  
18 established budget with money coming from the legislature.  
19 We're a little bit different.

20 And as far as unionization, all state  
21 employees -- in fact, we have a notice up in the break room  
22 that we're required to have. At any time, any state employee  
23 can choose to join an AA and be part of the union. I  
24 discussed it with my staff, told them it was up to them.

1 I gave them the overview that we're required to  
2 do as leaders to say here's the benefits, here's some of the  
3 downfalls, what say you. And all of them collectively said,  
4 we don't want to be a union. So that's where they stand right  
5 now and that could change at any moment, also. Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, Bobby, that would be  
7 my -- is the one-time 10 percent, I agree. But I would like  
8 to agendaize the review of the budget at this time and  
9 salaries. I think we kind of forget about it. We mention it,  
10 but then we forget about actually putting it on the agenda  
11 maybe, and I'd like to make sure we don't do that.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer again, yes. Now, so I  
13 understand, we can make this motion.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yep.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: And then also part of that  
16 motion can be reviewed every September.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yep. And not put a cap on it  
18 or CVI, just review salaries --

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: -- yeah, because it could be  
20 plus, it could be minus.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Because I can't promise  
23 self-funding the agency myself and you have to be careful how  
24 you know your money because you're responsible for all your

1 money.

2 This is -- mommy state is not out there to give  
3 you money and when mommy state was out there, they wouldn't  
4 give you money. So you have to make your own money, you have  
5 to do your own work and so that's -- yearly review is fine. I  
6 think it catches everybody's --

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: Whatever you want to do in the  
9 future.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yep, yep.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: Who knows who the board members  
12 may or may not be at that time.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I got you. Any comment up  
14 north? Okay. Hearing there's no comment up north, we'll  
15 entertain a motion on Agenda Item Number 6 to discuss and  
16 approve increase on board staff for possible action.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll make a  
18 motion to approve a one-time 10 percent pay raise. I'm going  
19 to stop one second here. We have to discuss something else.  
20 If you try to do it that way -- when does the meet begin?

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: When would it be effective?

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: It would be effective  
23 the next pay period.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I was just going to say the

1 next pay period --

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: -- I just want to make sure  
3 that -- once again, Gronauer. I make a -- whatever I'm  
4 making.

5 I'll make a motion to approve a one-time 10  
6 percent increase for all staff members, which that means --  
7 that includes Executive Director as a staff member, and for  
8 this to be reviewed annually in September.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Effective?

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: Effective immediately.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Next meeting.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Which would be...

13 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
14 second.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
16 second.

17 All in favor say, "aye."

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Motion passes.

19 Congratulations. It's well deserved, appreciate  
20 it.

21 (Motion carries.)

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you very much  
23 to the Board. Thank you for the kind comments and I'll be  
24 sure and pass those along to all the staff that were not



1 present today, as well. I'm sure they'll be greatly  
2 appreciative of the increase. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All righty. So, Counselor  
4 Harris, would you mind swearing everybody in?

5 MS. HARRIS: For anyone in the audience,  
6 including up north, who's on the agenda or plans on  
7 testifying, can you please stand and raise your right hand.

8 (Multiple people sworn.)

9 MS. HARRIS: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we now are into the  
11 potential block vote -- potential block vote, sorry. Not  
12 enough coffee. So we have Agenda Item Number 8 through 20  
13 that are -- we have the option to block a vote on.

14 Are there any concerns or any pull-outs that the  
15 Board would like to do -- to question the individuals within  
16 this block -- potential block vote?

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'd just  
18 like to abstain from voting on Number 9, pull it from the  
19 block votes. I -- a metro police officer that I might believe  
20 might at one time been in my chain of command.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Anyone else?

22 Okay. So we have a potential block vote. I'll  
23 look for a motion. The block vote would include Agenda Item  
24 Number 8, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20.

1 Agenda Item Number 9 would be removed so that Board Member  
2 Gronauer can recuse himself from that vote.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
4 motioning to approve consent Items Number 8 and Number 10  
5 through 20.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
7 we have a second?

8 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I will  
9 second.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
11 a second. All in favor say, "aye."

12 (Motion carries.)

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So that agenda -- that  
14 potential -- that block vote is approved.

15 Anybody that's in the audience that was  
16 underneath those agenda items, you are welcome to leave now if  
17 you would like. We're not going to call you forward. If you  
18 would like to stay, you're more than welcome to join us.

19 Agenda Item Number 9, Thomas Riesselmann is  
20 applying for an individual private patrolman license. This is  
21 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements. I'm  
22 looking for a motion on that particular agenda item.

23 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
24 move that we approve the license for Mr. Riesselmann as an

1 individual private patrolman.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
3 we have a second?

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
5 I'll second that motion.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and have a  
7 second. All in favor say, "aye."

8 All -- sorry, all abstain?

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member Gronauer.  
10 I abstain.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So the motion passes three --  
12 I'm sorry, 4 to 1. Thank you, Mr. Riesselmann. You're here.  
13 Thank you. Congratulations. You're free to go if you would  
14 like.

15 (Motion carries.)

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So now we're on Agenda  
17 Item Number 21, Dan E. Taylor of DTA Security Services, LLC,  
18 License Number 1067.

19 Are you here, sir? Good morning.

20 THE APPLICANT: Good morning.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good to see you again. It's  
22 that time of year. Okay. So, Mr. Taylor, you're asking for  
23 an exemption. Would you please explain to us what we would  
24 need to consider?

1 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

2 So DTA Security Services is asking the Board for  
3 an exemption to bring in six active duty police officers from  
4 out of state to support the security operation at the annual  
5 CES event coming in January of '23.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Is there any questions from  
7 the Board?

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. Hi,  
9 good morning. Out of what state?

10 THE APPLICANT: They're various states, New York,  
11 Texas, Louisiana.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: And what kind of leave would they  
13 be using?

14 THE APPLICANT: I'm sorry, what kind of what?

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: What kind of leave? Is it  
16 personal leave? Any disciplinary action pending,  
17 investigations?

18 THE APPLICANT: It is personal leave, so it's not  
19 in conjunction with any of their departments. They're not  
20 being --

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Not planning any --

22 THE APPLICANT: -- contracted through their  
23 Department.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

1 MEMBER GRONAUER: Good morning, Board Member  
2 Gronauer. You know I'm not a fan of this, okay?

3 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: You know we have Metropolitan  
5 police department here and Las Vegas police. We have Nevada  
6 highway patrol, many police departments that would love to be  
7 part of this, and I'd rather take home grown people and have  
8 them make money here.

9 Also, when you say many departments, metropolitan  
10 police department would never allow this to -- to their  
11 officers to go somewhere else and do it. There's a policy.  
12 Now, you have a policy for all these many police departments  
13 you're talking about that says they can do this.

14 THE APPLICANT: We do. And so just to address  
15 those, we do contract with Las Vegas metro police, the special  
16 events department. We -- and again, this year, those  
17 schedules have already been submitted, working with Justin  
18 White, the officer within that department that is going to  
19 coordinate the police services for CES this year, that  
20 invoices will -- right now, we're projecting to be at \$146,000  
21 for the Las Vegas metro, a portion of the security operation.

22 So that -- you know, that includes a dispatcher,  
23 a lieutenant, a couple of captains, the sergeants, the command  
24 post relief officers. You know, it's a very thorough program

1 that we bring in from the metropolitan police department.

2           So it is something that we're -- and we're very  
3 happy to do that, and we actually increase that each year with  
4 the volume that we contract through there.

5           The other departments that these officers come  
6 from, they are aware of that. In the past, we have required  
7 letters from their department to authorize them, to  
8 acknowledge and authorize that they're coming to Las Vegas to  
9 work in an unarmed security role for the CES event.

10           MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Do you have letters?

11           THE APPLICANT: I don't, no, because we haven't  
12 asked them to participate yet pending the Board's approval.

13           MEMBER GRONAUER: I end up with some angst, okay?  
14 And the angst is very subtle with me. One of the officers --  
15 if I was charging the police department in Las Vegas, New  
16 Mexico, okay, and my officer came here to do part-time work  
17 where other officers are, and that officer -- my officer got  
18 hurt here. Where does that liability go?

19           I'm just trying to figure out how that happens  
20 because this is why we are so hard on licensing here. We've  
21 had, many times, people come here, do work, their personnel  
22 get hurt, they leave and the State of Nevada gets stuck with  
23 the liability or the workman's comp.

24           I don't understand how that works and I'm -- you

1 have to understand, I'm very -- I'm all for it. You can spend  
2 100 -- \$400,000 on -- or \$186,000 on all the other things here  
3 for Las Vegas.

4 Why can't you spend another six people here? I'm  
5 not getting it.

6 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Why do you need them (sic)  
8 officers? Our officers are just as well trained, if not  
9 better trained, especially in Las Vegas.

10 THE APPLICANT: Absolutely. I agree with you  
11 100 percent with regard to we -- even though we're licensed  
12 here and we're based here in Las Vegas, Nevada, we do this  
13 type of work all across the country, and there's absolutely --  
14 and I'm not just saying that because we're based here, but  
15 there's no comparison. And, in fact, I had this conversation  
16 with Justin White a couple weeks ago.

17 There's no comparison with the police departments  
18 that we work with to the Las Vegas metro police department  
19 across the country, and these are major cities from Dallas to  
20 Chicago to LA. There's just -- there's no other department I  
21 would rather work with.

22 With regard to the insurance during this time, in  
23 the past when this waiver has been approved, this -- those  
24 individuals are direct employees of DTA Security Services. So

1 they are covered by our insurances that we carry. So that  
2 would be -- if there was an injury, fortunately we've not had  
3 that in the past, but if there were an injury, it would be --  
4 we would cover that just like we would for any of our other  
5 employees on the roster.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So can I ask, sir, real  
7 quick? This is Tammy. As far as the actual individuals, are  
8 they the same individuals that have come in or the same  
9 officers that come in every year?

10 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And why are those specific  
12 officers chosen year after year?

13 THE APPLICANT: So what that gives us, which was  
14 the other kind of answer to Board Member Gronauer's question,  
15 it gives us that consistency. It gives us that experience and  
16 the history that they have with the functions that we assign  
17 to them during that event.

18 Probably the biggest difference here with that is  
19 that these individuals are able to come in. They're in for,  
20 on average, six days. It could possibly be up to eight days.  
21 But that consistency with the background experience that they  
22 have for the event in that security function makes the  
23 difference in that, yes, we do have a large schedule with  
24 metro, Las Vegas metro police, and they supply officers every



1 day.

2 But we don't -- they're not able to supply that  
3 consistency, the same officer every day in the same role. So  
4 that's the reason that these six individuals are called out  
5 and --

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are they basically requested  
7 by client because of that consistency, or is it just something  
8 that you guys are used to?

9 THE APPLICANT: It's our operation.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

11 THE APPLICANT: So they're not coming out to work  
12 for somebody else. They're coming out to work, you know, for  
13 DTA in support of the CES security operation. But they are  
14 placed in the same role each year up to this point.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The client's familiar with  
16 those people then?

17 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Mr. Taylor, are --  
20 have you identified these six to still have a current active  
21 work card with us? Because I don't -- in the past, what we've  
22 done is these individuals have gone through our background,  
23 they have registered work cards with us, and basically what  
24 board staff does, if the Board approves it, we'll turn their

1 card on for that 6 or 8 days and immediately turn that card  
2 off again so they cannot continue to use it, other than the  
3 time frames, if you so choose to approve it.

4 Are they all still -- do they still have active  
5 work cards that we could turn on?

6 THE APPLICANT: Correct. That's correct.

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Okay. Thank you.

8 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
10 not comfortable with making a decision if I don't have a  
11 confirm. I mean, I appreciate your word and all that, but I  
12 would need some confirmation. I heard that they weren't yet  
13 on board, so they haven't actually said yes. I mean, they  
14 haven't signed any kind of legalities of what's going to  
15 happen over here.

16 So I'd like to have names of the officers just so  
17 we can have that. I definitely agree with activating the work  
18 cards if they're still there just during that time frame.  
19 Other than that, I mean, I'm just going off your word saying  
20 I've got active peace duty police officers.

21 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum. Yeah, and we can provide  
22 that information. We don't make an offer to them or ask them  
23 to come out until we have the approval or the waiver from the  
24 Board, so...

1           MEMBER CORTEZ: Right. Understood. But you can  
2 imagine my situation, I'm just saying, oh, okay, well, so, you  
3 know, a P.O. who's really not that great of a P.O., yep,  
4 approved that I don't know who it is. So I'd like some kind  
5 of verification that the individual is legit and he is  
6 approved to work out here.

7           EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: For the record, Kevin  
8 Ingram. Traditionally, what's happened is if the Board  
9 approves -- because, again, they can't hire them or go into  
10 contract with them --

11           MEMBER CORTEZ: Right.

12           EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: -- until you guys  
13 approve them. Traditionally, what happens is once the Board  
14 has approved it, Mr. Taylor will provide work staff, the names  
15 of the individuals.

16           Again, we have to go in and activate the card  
17 to -- for them to be able to be placed on his roster for that  
18 period of time. So once he provides us those dates, we  
19 activate the card. So we are in control of whether that  
20 persons gets approved or not.

21           So the Board, in their motions, could say upon  
22 final approval of board staff, that they do have an active  
23 work card that can be activated for this short period of time.  
24 Does that answer your question?

1 MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes, it does. Thank you.

2 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Perfect. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
4 questions? Hearing there's no further questions, I'll  
5 entertain a motion. Sorry.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm not doubting your  
7 integrity. I'm not doubting your company, your licensing,  
8 licensee, which is in very good standing. I have no problem  
9 with that at all. I just don't like people from foreign  
10 states, not -- making money that our officers can make a week,  
11 this is Las Vegas. Do you know how many events we do? So I'm  
12 just not comfortable. So apparently I've been talked out of  
13 this somehow, but I want you to hear the comments. And just  
14 understand, it's not against you, it's not a personal thing.

15 THE APPLICANT: I understand.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: It's definitely a business  
17 thing to me because our officers deserve that in different  
18 places, and they have just as much experience, if not more  
19 from somebody from a foreign place that don't even know our  
20 rules. So I really have a problem with that. Unless you're  
21 at every one of them six people and why six? Why not 20? I'm  
22 just at a point -- I cannot get comfortable with -- and I'm  
23 sorry, but I want to make sure you understand --

24 THE APPLICANT: All right. I understand.

1 MEMBER GRONAUER: -- my point of view. I was a  
2 cop 30 years and I'd rather see our people get taken care of.  
3 I don't care what department as long as they're Nevada  
4 department.

5 THE APPLICANT: Uh-huh.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you. That's the end of  
7 my comments.

8 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

9 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown --

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions or  
11 comments?

12 MEMBER BROWN: Yes. This is Board Member Brown.  
13 I have a couple questions for Mr. Taylor.

14 Mr. Taylor, these six individuals have worked for  
15 you in the past and they're going in the same positions. Are  
16 they supervisory positions?

17 THE APPLICANT: Not -- no, not supervisory. They  
18 don't have any direct reports or --

19 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. But they are six people  
20 that have done this for you before?

21 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

22 MEMBER BROWN: And they have registered work  
23 cards, they've been through our background process and have  
24 been approved?

1 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

2 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And have the local  
3 agencies, Las Vegas Metro, North Las Vegas, Henderson, whoever  
4 you pull from, have they given you all that they can give you?  
5 They basically said this is it, this is the number, and then  
6 you need these six individuals on top of that?

7 THE APPLICANT: Yeah. No, I feel like they would  
8 be able to provide additional, over and above what we  
9 currently have on schedule, and our -- really our only source  
10 for law enforcement is the Las Vegas metro police with the  
11 exception of what we've had approved in the past for these six  
12 individuals. But I do feel like they could certainly  
13 accommodate additional requests.

14 Again, the reason that we come in and request a  
15 waiver each year is just the background that these individuals  
16 have with the event and the function that they perform, and  
17 the fact that they're able to work in that role all the way  
18 through the event for the 6 to 8 days that we have scheduled  
19 that position.

20 MEMBER BROWN: Whereas the officers that you get  
21 from Las Vegas metro, they could be different each day based  
22 on who signed up for the over time or whatever?

23 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

24 MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

1 THE APPLICANT: They are different every day.

2 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.

3 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
5 the Board or comments? Okay. Hearing no further questions,  
6 I'll entertain a motion.

7 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
8 move to grant the exception and allow these six individuals to  
9 activate their work cards and work for the CES convention.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do we have  
11 a second?

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
13 I'll second the motion. However, upon clearance of all  
14 workers being cleared.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion to  
16 approve the exception for Dan E. Taylor Security Services,  
17 Dan E. Taylor DTA, as long as they have -- the officers have  
18 cleared all PILB requirements, and we have a second.

19 All in favor say, "aye."

20 All opposed?

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, no.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So the motion passes five  
23 to -- 4 to 1, sorry. Thank you, sir.

24 THE APPLICANT: Thank you, ma'am. Thank you,

1 Board.

2 (Motion carries.)

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Next agenda item is  
4 change of license status, corporate name change, Integrity  
5 Support Services, Inc., DBA Employment Screening Services,  
6 License Number 1703.

7 Is James Crockett here and Chad Parodi and  
8 Matthew Peace?

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Madam Chair, for the  
10 record, Matthew Peace has withdrawn his application. So  
11 you'll just be hearing on the --

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The two.

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: The two individuals  
14 today.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Good morning,  
16 gentlemen.

17 (All say good morning.)

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning. Tell us a  
19 little bit of about yourselves and the intention with the  
20 change.

21 (Simultaneous speaking.)

22 (Discussion off the record.)

23 THE APPLICANT: Nicholas Dufour, general counsel  
24 for ClearStar.



1 THE APPLICANT: Chad Parodi, chief executive  
2 officer for ClearStar.

3 THE APPLICANT: James Crockett, Nevada PI.

4 THE APPLICANT: On December 2021, ClearStar  
5 acquired Integrity Support Services, doing business as ESR.  
6 It was an asset purchase and it purchased basically  
7 essentially all of the contracts and all -- everything that  
8 goes with the purchase agreement.

9 So as a result, ESR already had a license, PI  
10 license through Jim, and what we're requesting is just to be  
11 allowed to have Jim transfer the license to -- well, to be  
12 able to use it for ClearStar instead of ESR.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Board, are there any  
14 questions?

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
16 Mr. -- did you say Parodi?

17 THE APPLICANT: Parodi.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Parodi. What college did you go  
19 to?

20 THE APPLICANT: Sorry?

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: What college did you go to?

22 THE APPLICANT: Georgia Southern University.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And I'm asking because of  
24 the 1991 incident, I can remember. Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions for the  
2 Board?

3 I have one. Does this mean since you have the  
4 asset purchase, that the -- was it -- the other company, ESR,  
5 will be no longer -- be dissolved and you'll be just be  
6 working under ClearStar?

7 THE APPLICANT: That's correct. That's correct.  
8 The seller basically still owns the ESR. They changed the  
9 name, but he's retiring and they're just waiting. There's  
10 an -- how do you call it, an earn out, you know, at the  
11 one-year end. And once that's done, it's going to dissolve.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Got you. Okay. Do you have  
13 everything, Executive Director, to close that out on my end?

14 Okay. Any further questions?

15 Hearing no other -- no further questions, I'll  
16 entertain a motion.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
18 am motioning to grant the corporate name change from Integrity  
19 Support Services, Inc. to ClearStar, Inc. DBA Employment  
20 Screening Resources. James Crockett will remain the  
21 qualifying agent. Member to approve are Nicholas Dufour and  
22 Chad Parodi, all subject to statutory regulatory requirements.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
24 a second?

1 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
2 second.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
4 second.

5 All in favor say, "aye."

6 (Motion carries.)

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The motion passes.

8 Congratulations. Good luck to you.

9 (Motion carries.)

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Agenda Item Number 23, we're  
11 now into the changing of license status, qualifying agent and  
12 new corporations. The agenda item is Agenda Item Number 23,  
13 IsraGuard Security Services. Is Mr. Steven Ketter in the  
14 audience, please? Come forward, please, sir.

15 And then do you have Moshe Benabou? Please come  
16 forward, sir. Thank you, gentlemen. Please tell us a little  
17 bit about yourselves and the intentions with the change.

18 THE APPLICANT: Well, I'll start, and hello  
19 again. I saw you guys last month. There was a specific  
20 reason why Mr. Benabou was not here last month. There was a  
21 positive COVID test that prohibited him from flying.

22 If you recall, when I asked to ask a question,  
23 the question, I wanted to do -- go off the record so we didn't  
24 make that public. But regardless, we're here today. He's

1 able to make it. Both of us flew in from different parts of  
2 the world. We were both overseas yesterday and we flew in  
3 just for this.

4 So just to kind of reiterate, I've been in the  
5 security industry for nearly three decades. I've worked in  
6 multiple states. I was -- also, like you guys, I was on a  
7 licensing board for about four years, two of which I was the  
8 chairman of the board. So I can respect and understand your  
9 positions here.

10 I've done work with a number of clients. I've  
11 been licensed in different states, including Maryland and Utah  
12 and now Nevada since approximately, I think, 2016.

13 As of 2018, I was the qualifying agent for a  
14 company called Premier Risk Solutions for which I was there  
15 for about two years, and subsequent to that, I changed over  
16 and became the qualifying agent for Next Gen Watchmen where I  
17 was at up until June of this year when we put somebody else in  
18 that position, and I was hoping to become the qualifying agent  
19 for his regard.

20 I've known Mr. Benabou for probably seven or  
21 eight years now. I've worked directly for him on projects for  
22 maybe the last four years or so. Many of the projects we  
23 worked together are out of the state and he has an interest in  
24 his company of -- beginning to do business here, getting

1 clients in the State of Nevada, and he approached me and asked  
2 if I would be willing to transfer or come from my previous  
3 qualifying agent and be the qualifying agent for him. And  
4 I've decided to do that and so that's where I am today. Thank  
5 you.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Mr. Benabou.

7 THE APPLICANT: Yes. First of all, sorry about  
8 last time when I didn't make it. It was hard to communicate  
9 with that. My background is about 30 years in the security  
10 industry. I'm retired from the Israeli government. I moved  
11 to Nevada about 2013 and traveling all my life, so this is the  
12 time for me to come and settle down and bring my experience to  
13 Nevada.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. What are the -- so my  
15 question is: You intend to provide security guard services?

16 THE APPLICANT: Security guard and training.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Do you currently have  
18 business in Nevada?

19 THE APPLICANT: I have a corporation in Nevada.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. But no services?

21 THE APPLICANT: No, no.

22 THE APPLICANT: We're -- as of right now, we're  
23 prepared to do that if need be, because I've reactivated my  
24 PPO after the last meeting was in abeyance, paid the fee,

1 reactivated it, got liability insurance, put the people on in  
2 the event. But up to this point, we haven't had any. But we  
3 anticipate.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.  
5 Board, are there any questions?

6 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown,  
7 question for Mr. Benabou. I see that you've had some  
8 financial difficulties, 2010, real bad year in 2011 and up  
9 2014. Have those all been settled?

10 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir, everything has been  
11 sorted. Been long time ago, yeah.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. Do  
13 you have any proof that everything has been sorted, because  
14 according to the notes that I have, you were unaware of this  
15 judgment question, and it's a pretty substantial amount of  
16 money and they were all IRS linked. You took care of all of  
17 that?

18 THE APPLICANT: Everything has been cleared a  
19 long time ago, yeah.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: It was cleared?

21 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So it was not cleared when  
23 you were asked?

24 THE APPLICANT: I've been -- sorry?

1           MEMBER CORTEZ: It was not cleared when you were  
2 asked from the investigator?

3           THE APPLICANT: Yes, it was cleared. Yes, ma'am.

4           MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And again -- okay. So my  
5 next question is to Investigator Diaz: When you questioned  
6 the applicant, according to your notes, he was unaware of the  
7 judgment when questioned. Now he's standing before the Board  
8 saying that everything's been cleared, and I just want to  
9 reiterate for the record because, according to you,  
10 Mr. Benabou, you've paid everything off. In 2014, 82,000;  
11 2012, 75,000; 2011, 17,000; 2011, 15,000; 2011, another one,  
12 10,000; 2011, 1,000; 2011, 121,000.

13           Let's see. What else? Civil judgment and then a  
14 final judgment was for a total amount of 13,000. It was a  
15 rental property, you took care of all of those financials?

16           THE APPLICANT: Everything has been cleared and  
17 you guys can check directly with IRS, yeah.

18           MEMBER CORTEZ: Investigator Diaz, do we have any  
19 more information about that?

20           INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: This is Investigator Diaz.  
21 Last that I have checked, I believe they're -- like he said,  
22 he did not know about any of this, and I believe it all still  
23 stood. I believe we had an IRS report for one to two of  
24 these, but not all.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So just so I'm clear, because  
2 you broke up a little bit, he was unaware when you spoke to  
3 him, but you do -- as far as paperwork wise, you have an IRS  
4 report stating that there are still some settlements or liens  
5 against him active?

6 Okay. Sorry, Investigator Swarthout.

7 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: This is Investigator  
8 Saladino for the record.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Saladino, sorry.

10 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: I'm currently on Bay  
11 County circuit court and the case is now matching the case  
12 numbers that we have on file. The status has all been closed  
13 now.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And what about the  
15 IRS? Is that the same?

16 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: That is the IRS.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Got you. So let me --

18 THE APPLICANT: I'd like to clarify something.  
19 The last time you'd asked me --

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Please hold. Please  
21 hold.

22 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. So the next one  
24 that is the Bow Cat, Inc. (sic.). Is that taken care of?



1 (Pause in proceedings.)

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Will that one take a little  
3 bit more time, Investigator?

4 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
5 the record. I apologize, the writing is super small on the  
6 website.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. While we're letting  
8 him read through that, are there any other questions for the  
9 gentlemen?

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. My concern  
11 was the one you just asked about because that's a civilian  
12 type thing. It's all from the IRS, has something to do with  
13 rental property or something.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I guess I would have a  
15 follow-up question: Even if they are taken care of, sir,  
16 what -- because it's concerning when we're going to allow a  
17 business to open, we want to make sure that payroll is going  
18 to be met. That's always my concern, right? So how did you  
19 get into this situation?

20 THE APPLICANT: So what's when I moved back to  
21 the U.S. in 2003, I moved to Palm Beach, Florida, opened a  
22 business there and then oils crashed completely all the  
23 businesses. We tried to sell down with IRS and everything, no  
24 comments, no nothing, just going and going and going.

1           So -- and when I shut down the company,  
2 everything is right after we completely -- so we settled down  
3 slowly, slowly and then my business manager disappeared till  
4 everything is canceled.

5           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

6           THE APPLICANT: May I add something?

7           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sure.

8           THE APPLICANT: Okay. So for the last four years  
9 that I've worked with different projects of -- probably in the  
10 range of 30 to 40 different events that I've worked, I have  
11 never experienced a problem. I've always been paid for  
12 everything. So that's a snapshot of what has been over the  
13 last four years.

14          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

15          INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
16 the record, The Bow Cat (sic.) is closed.

17          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any further  
18 questions from the Board?

19                 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll  
20 entertain a motion.

21                 (Discussion off the record.)

22          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, he said it's closed.

23                 Do you have any other questions? Okay. So I'll  
24 entertain a motion.

1 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown for the  
2 record.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

4 MEMBER BROWN: Go ahead, Board Member Cortez.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Go ahead, Mr. Brown. Go ahead.

6 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. This is Board Member Brown  
7 for the record. I move that we approve the corporate private  
8 patrolman license for Mr. Ketter who will place his individual  
9 license in abeyance and become a qualifying agent, and I also  
10 move that we approve Moshe Benabou as a corporate officer  
11 for IsraGuard Security U.S., Incorporated.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion.  
13 Do we have a second?

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez, I  
15 second the motion.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
17 second.

18 All in favor say, "aye."

19 (Motion carries.)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Motion passes.

21 Congratulations, gentlemen.

22 THE APPLICANT: Thank you very much.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: (Microphone off.) I appreciate  
24 you showing up for this because it's very important --

1 THE COURT REPORTER: I can't hear.

2 (Discussion off the record.)

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: It was really good.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: I just reiterating again --  
5 reiterating -- can you hear me now, Mr. Brown?

6 MEMBER BROWN: Yes, sir. Thank you.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Here's the deal: I want to  
8 make sure that everybody is for -- everybody is good. The  
9 comment I want to make is: I appreciate you returning here  
10 for this series. Last time you didn't come.

11 THE APPLICANT: I didn't want you to catch the  
12 COVID, so --

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: If you don't show up, any  
14 licensee -- anybody looking for a license in the State of  
15 Nevada, they don't want to show up, I don't want to give them  
16 a license.

17 THE APPLICANT: A hundred percent.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay? So thank you.  
19 Appreciate it. Good luck.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Thank you,  
21 gentlemen.

22 Okay. Next, Agenda Item Number 24, we'll take  
23 this last one, 24, and then take a ten-minute break. We'll go  
24 to 25. If it goes past the time -- I'm telling you --

1 MEMBER CORTEZ: Let's go, let's do this.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So Agenda Item Number  
3 -- huh?

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: We're going to do 24 and 25 just  
5 to keep it in there.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Her OCD is kicking in and  
7 kicking my butt. So let's -- yeah.

8 Okay. Agenda Item Number 24, Retail Security  
9 Services is applying for a new corporate private patrolman  
10 license. Do we have Quentin Goins? Please come forward. And  
11 Kathleen Larmour, Larmour. Okay. And Danielle Procida.

12 (Discussion off the microphone.)

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We wanted to see the baby.

14 THE APPLICANT: Do you want to see it?

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Amanda Fredette.

16 THE APPLICANT: She's not here either.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

18 THE APPLICANT: She's at home with four kids.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So Retail Security  
20 Services applying, please tell us a little bit about  
21 yourselves and your intentions with the licenses.

22 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, good morning. My name is  
23 Quentin Goins, private patrolman 1425. I've had a business  
24 and a license about 15 years here and I want to change the

1 status to be QA.

2 THE APPLICANT: Good morning, I'm Kathleen  
3 Larmour. I'm the owner of Retail Security Services. I have  
4 been providing security guard services nationally for retail  
5 stores and restaurants for about 20 years.

6 We did -- I have two other companies, so when we  
7 first started Security, we did it for professional retail  
8 services. But it grew so much, I needed to move it to a  
9 separate entity because there were different insurances and  
10 requirements.

11 We -- I am based in New York. We do -- we were  
12 doing quite a bit of business here, about \$900,000 a year,  
13 until we just got stopped. We didn't -- I didn't know when  
14 Kurt stopped being our QA, he introduced me to Quentin and we  
15 did the contract. We thought -- or heard that that was all we  
16 needed to do. We didn't know that we had to come before the  
17 Board again and reapply. So we were working for two years  
18 with Kurt as our QA.

19 We do not bring in our own people. We hire local  
20 companies here in Nevada and Las Vegas to perform the work.  
21 We make sure we have copies of all their insurance, their  
22 workers' comp and we pay all the taxes.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So basically subcontract to  
24 local companies?

1 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Got you. Any other  
3 questions for Retail Services Group?

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. What is your  
5 name, ma'am?

6 THE APPLICANT: Kathleen Larmour.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Where is Amanda?

8 THE APPLICANT: Amanda is home. She has four  
9 children under the age of ten and school just started for her  
10 back in New York, so she wasn't able to make it.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: She's back in New York?

12 THE APPLICANT: Yes. Her husband is a marine and  
13 so he is --

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: Semper fi. I still have  
15 questions.

16 THE APPLICANT: Yeah. I'll answer them.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Well, Amanda has  
18 some things on here on -- you know, that I'd be a little more  
19 concerned about. So with the business, how is -- Retail  
20 Security Services, is that what you are now?

21 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And doing business  
23 without license?

24 THE APPLICANT: No. Well, we have -- we were

1 asked to provide -- Nevada is the only one, State of Nevada  
2 asked us when we applied a couple years ago, to provide  
3 business licenses for the other states that we do work in.

4 And we have submitted -- I believe we were asked  
5 to submit ten notifications, emails, letters from the other  
6 states that we work in. And because we subcontract, we're not  
7 required to be licensed in those states.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: Which states are they? If I  
9 can just...

10 THE APPLICANT: Almost all of them. I mean, I  
11 don't know. Do you want me to give you the letters that I  
12 have?

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: Let's get Swarthout. Can you  
14 explain some things on that? The lady is not here, so I can't  
15 figure it out.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: It's her --

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: -- so -- yeah, so the fine or  
18 the license -- unlicensed work was done by this entire group,  
19 not just that one lady. They were -- so they get jobs from,  
20 say, Ross's and they subcontract to local companies.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: I get what they do.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: I didn't know -- it's written  
24 on -- that one is written on --



1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah, it's on two. I  
2 think -- you're new, right, sir?

3 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So you're new, you're now  
5 trying to become a qualifying agent, and then you're the  
6 owner. And the other two ladies, are they out of New York as  
7 well?

8 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, just -- they're both my  
9 children, my daughters.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, okay. So they're both  
11 your children. So you will then get the work still.

12 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And then it will be sent to  
14 him to subcontract to other companies?

15 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, we have a list of companies  
16 that we use that are in good standing here.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Got you. And then I'm  
18 sorry, Bobby, on your question, this is a little bit different  
19 than what I'm used to.

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Madam Chair, if I  
21 may. Kevin Ingram for the record. We did list the states in  
22 the body that they provided information on. Alaska, Iowa,  
23 Missouri, Nebraska, Rhode Island, South Dakota and Wyoming  
24 both regulate on subcontracting like we do.

1           The other ones -- Minnesota, Connecticut would  
2 not provide input unless we applied for licensure and, you  
3 know, when they became before the Board originally, they paid  
4 their own license recitation. And the Board, at that time,  
5 felt that they hadn't made an attempt to get licensed in any  
6 other states and they were asking Nevada for a license.

7           And so we sent the -- well, the Board sent it to  
8 them saying, look, prove to us that you're making an effort to  
9 get licensed in other states, and then we'll reevaluate your  
10 application here in Nevada, if that helps.

11           MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, I read through it --

12           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And I think there's two  
13 different -- we had another company that had the same problem.  
14 They were subcontracts like Walgreen's and stuff.

15           MEMBER GRONAUER: Sir, what's your name?

16           THE APPLICANT: Quentin Goins.

17           MEMBER GRONAUER: May I call you Quentin? Here's  
18 the deal, Quentin. This is Gronauer. You've been a QA for  
19 how long -- or you're trying to be a QA, but you've been in  
20 business how long?

21           THE APPLICANT: About 15 years.

22           MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. Well, your license  
23 number, I can tell. Okay. Now, you understand what a QA has  
24 to do?

1 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm listening.

3 THE APPLICANT: Well, I mean, in short, it would  
4 be assuring the compliance of everything that goes through  
5 detail that operates in the State of Nevada.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: And all the people that is  
7 hired have licensing and everything else, right? You  
8 understand?

9 THE APPLICANT: Yes, I understand it.

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: I understand there was a lapse  
11 the last two years you've been working with her. Is that what  
12 I heard?

13 THE APPLICANT: No, sir. Kurt was our qualifying  
14 agent. When that contract was up, he introduced me to  
15 Quentin.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: Right.

17 THE APPLICANT: And so we've hired him in  
18 February of this year.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So since we -- since your  
20 actual November 2019, have you guys been providing services?

21 THE APPLICANT: We were up until -- I think it  
22 was May of this year. Was it May?

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So how are you providing  
24 services if you didn't have a license?

1 THE APPLICANT: Because we were working with Kurt  
2 who was our QA, so we were able to work with him.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So was Kurt licensed?

4 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: So for clarification,  
5 Kevin Ingram, a previous license holder had gotten a DBA.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Um-hum.

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: And was working as if  
8 they were a company under his DBA, and at least, on the  
9 surface, made it semi-legal. Once that was found out and that  
10 person was told, wait, what are you doing.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: You can't do that.  
13 So they broke service with that QA and that QA, through our  
14 investigation, had given them very erroneous information.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Got you.

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: That got them into a  
17 predicament. We gave them a cease and desist immediately, and  
18 once I contacted them to give them a cease and desist, that,  
19 no, it can't work that way, then they partnered with Mr. Goins  
20 to try to do things the right way.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So in 2019 when this  
22 fine originally came down, that has nothing to do with what's  
23 going on right now?

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: That's correct,

1 totally separate.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So two -- okay.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: So we're semi-legal that way,  
4 as you say.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah.

6 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: With them cease and  
7 desisting immediately, they complied with the direction of the  
8 Board and then are moving forward with a legitimate QA.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: (Microphone off.) I'll be --

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I'm sorry?

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: (Microphone off.) I love to  
12 hear it, but I'm confused. That's okay.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
14 questions?

15 MEMBER BROWN: Yes, this is Board Member Brown  
16 for the record. On Ms. or Mrs. Fredette's application, she  
17 doesn't list a position that she's going to hold in your  
18 company. What would her position be?

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: What would your position be,  
20 ma'am?

21 THE APPLICANT: Mine?

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes.

23 THE APPLICANT: I'm the chief executive office.

24 MEMBER BROWN: You're Mrs. Fredette?

1 THE APPLICANT: No, no, no.

2 MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

3 THE APPLICANT: Amanda's position?

4 MEMBER BROWN: Amanda's position, yes. On her  
5 application, she did not list what position or corporate  
6 officer she is going to be.

7 THE APPLICANT: She's basically an admin for the  
8 company. She doesn't -- she's not involved in the day-to-day  
9 activities of the company. She's an internal administrator.

10 MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

11 THE APPLICANT: She goes over contracts from the  
12 clients, she has a big part in keeping all of our licensing up  
13 to date every year.

14 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

15 THE APPLICANT: You're welcome.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So am I -- in this request,  
17 she's becoming a corporate officer?

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: (Nodded head.)

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So is she your CEO or --

20 THE APPLICANT: She's actually listed as a  
21 secretary.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Got you.

23 THE APPLICANT: So she --

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: I'm sorry, for the

1 record --

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: -- him --

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Right. The corporate  
4 officers, anyone that is on the Secretary of State licensing,  
5 those are the individuals, the top three principals who are  
6 required to apply for corporate officer status.

7 So they're corporate officers of the company and  
8 as far as duties and responsibilities they can assume whenever  
9 the company deems fit. She wasn't listed as secretary on  
10 Nevada Secretary of State.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Does that help?

12 MEMBER BROWN: Yes, it does. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. It's a little  
14 confusing. Sorry, it's a little difficult where you stand.

15 THE APPLICANT: No, I understand.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So are there any further  
17 questions from the Board? Okay. Hearing no further  
18 questions, we'll entertain a motion.

19 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, Board Member  
20 Bezick. I make a motion that Retail Security Services be  
21 approved for a new corporate private patrolman license.

22 And that if approved, Quentin Goins, License  
23 Number 1810, his license be held in abeyance so he may become  
24 the qualifying agent for Retail Security Services, and that

1 corporate officers could be approved are Kathleen Larmour,  
2 Danielle Procida and Amanda Fredette. This is subject to all  
3 statutory and regulatory requirements.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion.  
5 Do we have a second?

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez, I'll  
7 second that motion.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
9 second.

10 All in favor say, "aye."

11 All opposed?

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, no.

13 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, nay,  
14 no.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have no, 4 -- 3 to 2.  
16 You messed up my math. Brown.

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Who said no?

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have -- do we -- could  
19 we please put a reason for the nays on the record?

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. My nay is  
21 because I don't quite understand what happened between 2019  
22 and 2022, where we are right now. I'm still confused with the  
23 whole situation.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Board Member Brown.



1 MEMBER BROWN: I echo that, and also I wasn't  
2 present for the last meeting, but we denied an application  
3 because one of their applicants did not come.

4 We've required them to come from overseas, we  
5 just saw them, and now we have an applicant that hasn't come  
6 also. So those are my reasons.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. So the motion  
8 passes 3 to 2 and you are approved. Please, you know, make  
9 sure that you dot all the I's and T's and all that stuff  
10 because it is going to be watched.

11 (Motion carries.)

12 THE APPLICANT: Thank you so much. Have a great  
13 day, people.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. No, she wanted --

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: One more -- we got one more --  
16 (Simultaneous speaking.)

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: Just one more.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Please note we're fighting  
19 amongst ourselves.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: One more in this block and then  
21 we can take all the breaks.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item Number 25,  
23 Agenda Number 25, General Security Response Services, LLC.  
24 Corinthia Yancey, are you in the audience? Please come

1 forward.

2 Okay. I just want to put on the record that I  
3 will have to recuse myself from this particular decision. I  
4 have worked with Ms. Yancey in the past and so I feel it's  
5 appropriate for me to recuse myself.

6 Please tell us a little bit about yourself,  
7 Ms. Yancey and your intentions with the license.

8 THE APPLICANT: My license was approved this past  
9 January as a sole proprietor. I would like to change it to an  
10 LLC as advised by some of my supporters. I've connected with  
11 P-Tech, so they've been kind of helping me with growing a  
12 business, learning it and overall the credibility of my  
13 company. I'd like to protect it, limit my personal  
14 liabilities.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
16 questions for Ms. Yancey?

17 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
18 just want to check on the status of the Secretary of State  
19 business license.

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: For the record, Kevin  
21 Ingram. I had sent them an updated email late yesterday  
22 afternoon, you may not have received. Ms. Yancey came into  
23 the office and met with me yesterday, and Secretary of State  
24 had messed up some paperwork when she applied.

1           She's been working with them, trying to amend the  
2 documents and correct that. It's kind of a slow process,  
3 amending the paperwork with the Secretary of State. She was  
4 able to provide documents that shows that it was approved and  
5 accepted.

6           Now she's about two weeks out of receiving the  
7 actual Secretary of State business license. She is aware that  
8 if approved today, until board staff has the actual license in  
9 our hands, we will not be able to activate it. She's aware of  
10 that and accepting of that. Thank you.

11           MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, Director Ingram, for  
12 putting that on the record.

13           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
14 the Board? Okay. Hearing no further questions, we'll  
15 entertain a motion.

16           MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez  
17 motioning to approve General Security & Response Service, LLC,  
18 a new corporate private patrolman license.

19           If approved Ms. Corinthia Yancey, License Number  
20 4028, the license to be placed in advance so she can become  
21 the qualifying agent. All of this is statutory -- subject to  
22 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

23           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion.  
24 Do we have a second?

1 MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, I will second.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
3 second.

4 All in favor say, "aye."

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And I'm recused, so 4 to 1.  
6 Congratulations. Please make sure you get with the licensing  
7 board -- or they'll get with you to close out everything else  
8 that you need, okay?

9 THE APPLICANT: All right. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

11 (Motion carries.)

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Now we're going to take a  
13 ten-minute break. Thank you all for your patience. We'll be  
14 right back at 45 after, a little over ten minutes.

15 (Recess.)

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we are now on  
17 Agenda Item Number 26, the corporate officers. Do we have  
18 North Star Defense, License Number 3052, Michael Loria?

19 Please come forward, sir. Thank you. Please  
20 tell us a little bit about yourself and your request.

21 THE APPLICANT: I'm requesting to be president of  
22 North Star Defense. I've been in the towing business for  
23 about ten-plus years now. We started at zero and up to about  
24 16 employees right now. I'm looking to take over North Star

1 Defense and do the same.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
3 questions from the Board? Okay. So I'll start then.

4 I'm looking at your background and you have a  
5 somewhat extensive background. Investigator Hubbell, have all  
6 of these been resolved?

7 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Yes, ma'am, they have.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And so I'm  
9 understanding, currently you're in the car towing -- you're in  
10 the towing business?

11 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And you're going into -- this  
13 new company would be a security company?

14 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Okay. Any further  
16 questions from the Board?

17 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. Sir,  
18 what background or what qualifications do you have in the  
19 security industry?

20 THE APPLICANT: So in a security industry itself,  
21 I only have about six months. But our vice president, which  
22 is also our QA, has 30-plus years, and the two captains that I  
23 did hire both have about 15 years each.

24 So my background will be in business, running the

1 company, making sure all employees are paid, making sure the  
2 company is growing and then learn the security industry as I  
3 go on by the people that I hire.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And do you understand the  
5 qualifications of a QA? I know that you're not applying for  
6 the QA, but you understand the QA process?

7 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And what the requirements  
9 are for --

10 THE APPLICANT: -- yes, ma'am.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And work cards?

12 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
14 from the Board?

15 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a  
16 motion.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
18 motion to approve Mr. Loria to serve as the corporate officer  
19 director for North Star Defense, and that is License Number  
20 3052, be placed in abeyance with all -- and subject to  
21 statutory and regulatory requirements.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion.

23 Do we have a second?

24 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I'll second.

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: A little side bar  
2 here for just a minute.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Side bar.  
4 (Side bar conference.)

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: For the record, we're striking my  
6 comment to be placed in abeyance. That was made in error.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion.  
8 Do we have a second?

9 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I'll second.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion,  
11 we have a second.

12 All in favor say, "aye."

13 Okay. Motion passes.

14 (Motion carries.)

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir.

16 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Agenda Item Number 27,  
18 Griffin Investigations. Is that you, sir? Please come  
19 forward. Please tell us a little bit about yourself and the  
20 request for the license.

21 THE APPLICANT: I work for Griffin  
22 Investigations. December 2015, I think I started. The owner  
23 recently died and the company is transferred over to the new  
24 ownership. The previous vice president is now president of

1 the corporation and vice president and I'm the person  
2 selected.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any questions for  
4 Mr. Ludwig? Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll  
5 entertain a motion.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,  
7 motioning to approve Mr. Ludwig as corporate officer to  
8 Griffin Investigations, Inc., License Number 74, subject to  
9 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
11 second?

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
14 second.

15 All in favor say, "aye."

16 Motion passes.

17 (Motion carries.)

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir.

19 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: That was the original  
21 license, Number 74.

22 (Discussion off the record.)

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we're now onto private  
24 patrolman section. We have Agenda Item Number 28, Live Guard



1 Tech, LLC, who's applying for a new corporate private license.  
2 Antonio Perez-Vargas, are you here, sir? Thank you.

3 Are you the only one?

4 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So tell us a little  
6 bit about yourself and your intentions with the license.

7 THE APPLICANT: Yes, good morning. Good morning,  
8 Mr. Ingram, and congratulations and thank your kind staff.  
9 They were very helpful in guiding us through this process.  
10 And, Board, respectfully, thank you for being here.

11 Can you hear me okay? I'm sorry, I just noticed  
12 that I was -- probably not being heard by -- my name is  
13 Antonio Perez-Vargas, about -- back in 2013, started a  
14 technology based company to try to do live monitoring of video  
15 surveillance systems that allow us to provide what we describe  
16 as casino grade monitoring in outdoor areas like in a  
17 construction site or so.

18 We were successful after some challenges and we  
19 manufacture our equipment in Phoenix, Arizona. And one of our  
20 clients, this -- asked us if he could bring his equipment  
21 here.

22 And we did what we thought was correct back then,  
23 which was to register with the corporation commission and try  
24 to find out, you know, if there was anything else that we

1 needed to do at the time, because at the time, we didn't have  
2 anymore employees or anything else.

3 And from there, we later learned that maybe I  
4 should have done a little more diligence work and we got a  
5 citation from the Private Investigator Licensing Board. We  
6 tried to resolve it and then we got caught a little bit with  
7 COVID and it was a little bit challenging. But here we are,  
8 and I appreciate the opportunity to be here with you.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
10 questions from the Board? Okay. No questions from the Board,  
11 I'll entertain a motion.

12 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
13 move that we grant Live Guard Tech, LLC, a new corporate  
14 private patrolman license with Antonio Perez-Vargas, also  
15 being approved for a private -- an individual private  
16 patrolman license, which if approved, will be placed in  
17 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion.  
19 Do we have a second? Member to be approved, can  
20 we add that?

21 MEMBER BROWN: Oh, yes, I'm sorry. And we also  
22 grant Antonio Perez-Vargas member status.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. We have a motion.  
24 Do we have a second?

1                   MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez, I'll  
2 second that motion.

3                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion, we  
4 have a second.

5                   All in favor say, "aye."

6                   (Motion carries.)

7                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir.

8                   THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

9                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

10                  THE APPLICANT: Thank you again.

11                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Stratum Risk Advisors, Inc.  
12 is applying for Agenda Item 29. Good afternoon -- or good  
13 morning, sir, Michael Vaness. And you must be Mitchell  
14 McAlister.

15                  THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

16                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Tell us a little bit  
17 about yourself, the intentions with the licenses.

18                  THE APPLICANT: So I'm Mitchell McAlister. I'm  
19 an Australian Army veteran and I spent ten and a half years in  
20 our military. Most of that, we did special operations,  
21 several combat tours overseas.

22                  Also the chief executive for the Saline  
23 Corporations Group, License 2240. We've been licensed here  
24 since December 1, 2016, headquartered here in Las Vegas, but

1 we separate all over the U.S.

2 We're applying for essentially the second license  
3 to split some of services in the company, separate the  
4 physical security from the consulting and risk management  
5 side.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
7 questions from the Board? Okay. Hearing there are no further  
8 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

9 Do you have a question? Okay.

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: Who's the other gentlemen?

11 THE APPLICANT: Mike Vaness.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Can you speak?

13 THE APPLICANT: Absolutely.

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: Tell us about yourself.

15 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir. So I've been in the  
16 security world since about 2007. In 2008, I joined the Army,  
17 went to the 82nd, did that for about six years and then came  
18 back into the security world ever since I got out.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So when you had the  
20 problem with the IRS, apparently that was somebody else's  
21 problem, not yours?

22 THE APPLICANT: That was -- yes, that was for a  
23 tax claim. We had a CPA firm that handles everything and  
24 there was missed fee that they needed to pay on the tax

1 extension. So I provided the documentation to the  
2 investigator as far as the admission from our CPA firm as well  
3 as the release of that --

4 (Admonishment by court reporter, cannot hear.)

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: (Microphone not on.) Okay.

6 And you had some --

7 (Admonishment by the court reporter.)

8 (Discussion off the record.)

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Sir, you had some  
10 other problems with the unlicensed work?

11 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir. So about -- I think it  
12 was 2018, I was living in Phoenix at the time. One of my good  
13 friends worked for the UFC, so he asked if I wanted to help  
14 him do some EP work in Phoenix, and after that, my -- Zuffa  
15 reached out and asked if I would want them to help out over  
16 here and, unknowingly, that I had to have a security license  
17 to do it by myself as a 1099.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. You understand that a  
19 license and a work card are two different things?

20 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. You worked with a  
22 licensee who worked with a work card?

23 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. And if you're a

1 licensee, you have people with a work card that work for you.

2 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So I understand. Thank  
4 you.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
6 questions from the Board? Okay. Hearing no further  
7 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

8 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
9 move that we grant Stratum Risk Advisors, Incorporated a new  
10 corporate private patrolman license and we grant Michael D.  
11 Vaness an individual private patrolman license, which if  
12 approved, he will place in abeyance so that he may become a  
13 qualifying agent.

14 Corporate officer, I move that we grant corporate  
15 officer status to Mitchell J. McAlister, subject to all  
16 regulatory requirements -- statutory and regulatory  
17 requirements, I'm sorry. And since Mr. Gronauer gets to do  
18 his, I'll say mine, go Army, beat Navy.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion.  
20 Do we have a second?

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez, I am  
22 seconding the motion.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
24 second.

1 All in favor say, "aye."

2 (Motion carries.)

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, gentlemen.

4 Good luck to you.

5 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item Number 30,

7 Elijah Muhammad. Are you here?

8 THE APPLICANT: Good morning, everyone.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning. Okay. So I'm  
10 sorry, sir, please tell us a little bit about yourself and the  
11 intentions with the license.

12 THE APPLICANT: Okay. I'm the current -- I'm the  
13 owner of Preventative Measures Security. I've been the owner  
14 of the company since we opened in 20 -- ten years ago. So our  
15 QA, one of -- a friend of mine, 73 years old, is having some  
16 health issues. He had a couple of bouts with cancer a couple  
17 of years, beat the cancer.

18 Some things came back that are convalescing. Had  
19 another QA in mind because I really didn't want to do it and,  
20 you know, he offered me 50 percent of the business. So I  
21 said, you know, I can do it myself.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: On your way, right?

23 THE APPLICANT: That's ridiculous. So I've just  
24 decided to step in. A little bit about us, we're -- we

1 operate in five states, in the State of Nevada, California,  
2 Michigan, Washington and Florida, and I also own other  
3 businesses as well.

4 But, you know, over the last three years, just  
5 for COVID, I've kind of focused on the Nevada market because  
6 this is our stronghold. You know, we do well in the other  
7 states, but not like Las Vegas.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Do you currently  
9 reside in Las Vegas?

10 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. All right. Are there  
12 any further questions from the Board?

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez, question for  
14 Investigator Saladino. Where are we at with the Rapid Cash  
15 outstanding balance?

16 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: So the applicant --  
17 Investigator Saladino for the record. The applicant has  
18 provided court documents to show that he is paying it.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: What's the balance owed at this  
20 time?

21 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: I believe it was paid in  
22 full, correct?

23 THE APPLICANT: It's not my debt.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: Regardless, I understand you're



1 going through --

2 THE APPLICANT: But it -- yes, it was --

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: -- civil litigations through it,  
4 but what's the final amount.

5 THE APPLICANT: It was paid in full.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: Paid in full.

7 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you. No further questions.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
10 the Board?

11 MEMBER BROWN: Yes, this is Board Member Brown.  
12 Question for Investigator Hubber, I want to make sure that I  
13 understand, the scope returned positive results. Were those  
14 for the citations for the pedestrian on the highway? Is that  
15 where that comes from?

16 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: That is correct and those  
17 were taken care of, I believe, with just paying a fine.

18 MEMBER BROWN: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
20 from the Board?

21 I do have one. Investigator Saladino, on your  
22 thing here, it says that there was another lien, looks like  
23 maybe two, and that you had spoken to the applicant about the  
24 civil judgment.

1           And it was stated that he owned all the vehicles  
2 and he did -- he didn't know where this was coming from. Have  
3 we resolved all that? Has that all been closed out.

4           INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
5 the record. City Financial Auto is no longer in business. So  
6 the applicant had tried reaching out to everyone he could to  
7 find out what's going on with this and there's nobody  
8 available to even speak to.

9           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. What do you think,  
10 that it's court or it's just closed out since they're no  
11 longer in business?

12           INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: I'm not really sure.  
13 (Discussion off the record.)

14 (Board was advised of the microphones being off.)

15           MEMBER CORTEZ: My apologies. This is Board  
16 Member Cortez. My question is: How can you provide  
17 clarification to the question --

18           MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Your microphone has  
19 completely cut out now.

20           MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. My  
21 question was for Mr. Muhammad, if he could provide some  
22 clarification as to -- as far as the liens go.

23           THE APPLICANT: I've never once heard of City  
24 Financial until Investigator Hubbell reached out to me. I put

1 houses in Texas, I own property here. Everything I have, I  
2 own. I don't believe in debt. I believe that is slavery.

3 I've never heard of City Financial, whatsoever.  
4 When I spoke to Mr. Hubbell about it, I thought it was a dead  
5 issue. When I spoke with Mr. Saladino about it, I decided to  
6 reach out to them. They're not even in business. They  
7 haven't been in business for a long time. Again, I've never  
8 heard of them.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you.

10 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

11 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Madam Chair, Investigator  
12 Saladino for the record. According to the Court documents out  
13 of Clark County, the balance due as of August 18th of 2022 is  
14 zero.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. That's what I  
16 wanted. Okay. Thank you. Any further questions for  
17 Mr. Muhammad? Okay.

18 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a  
19 motion.

20 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
21 move that we grant Elijah Muhammad an individual private  
22 patrolman license and allow him to place that in abeyance upon  
23 approval so that he may become a qualifying agent for  
24 Preventative Measures Security firm, LLC.

1 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez, I  
2 motion -- or I second the motion.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion, we  
4 have a second. All in favor say, "aye."

5 (Motion carries.)

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations. Thank you.

7 THE APPLICANT: Thank you. Have a good day.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You, too.

9 Okay. Agenda Item 31, John T. Davis is applying  
10 for an individual private investigator's license. Thank you,  
11 sir.

12 THE APPLICANT: Good morning.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Private patrolman, sorry.  
14 Private patrolman license. Please tell us a little bit about  
15 yourself and your intentions with the license.

16 THE APPLICANT: Sure. I've been involved with  
17 security for the past 25 years or so. We started Southwest  
18 Protective Agency about six years, licensed through Michael  
19 Conte. He's my business partner. He is the qualifying agent  
20 now. He's getting married and moving to northern California.  
21 He's going to expand operations into California and northern  
22 Nevada and we need somebody who has to have a qualifying agent  
23 status.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any

1 questions of Mr. Davis?

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
3 do have a question for Investigator Saladino. Do we have  
4 results of the background and fingerprints of Mr. Davis?

5 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
6 the record. As of currently this morning, we do not.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So as noted by Investigator  
9 Saladino, we still don't have the fingerprints back for  
10 Mr. Davis. Thoughts?

11 Okay. So according to counsel, we can do a  
12 contingent approval based on fingerprints, so just put that  
13 in, you know, your thought process as we go through this.

14 Are there any other questions for Mr. Davis?

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
16 do have a question for you, Mr. Davis. Any issues or any  
17 contact, regardless of disposition, any contact?

18 THE APPLICANT: Aside from just daily operations?

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: No, like, hey, how's it going?  
20 Any potential criminal --

21 THE APPLICANT: No, none.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
24 the Board? Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll

1 entertain a motion.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
3 motioning to make a contingent approval for Mr. Davis to grant  
4 an individual private patrolman license, that it be placed in  
5 abeyance so that he can become a qualifying agent for  
6 Southwest Protective Agency, License Number 2194, subject to  
7 all authority --

8 (Audio feed from Las Vegas cut off.)

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion.  
10 Do we have a second?

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
13 second.

14 All in favor say, "aye."

15 (Motion carries.)

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir. Now,  
17 remember, that's contingent on the fingerprints coming back.  
18 So please stay in contact or they'll contact you if there's  
19 anything adverse. If it comes back adverse, then it is not  
20 approved.

21 THE APPLICANT: Thank you very much.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Thank you.

23 Now that we've gone to break and come back, I see  
24 some new faces, some shiny new faces, which is fantastic. I'm

1 glad you're here, but I would like to have you all sworn in,  
2 just --

3 MS. HARRIS: For those on the agenda or for  
4 anyone who plans to testify, can you please stand and raise  
5 your right hand.

6 (Prospective people sworn.)

7 MS. HARRIS: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Now we're on Agenda  
9 Item Number 32, Coleman Security. Mr. Troy T. Coleman, are  
10 you here, sir? Okay.

11 THE APPLICANT: Good morning.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And it's just you, good  
13 morning still, yeah.

14 THE APPLICANT: Oh, yeah.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah. Tell us a little bit  
16 about yourself and the intentions with the license.

17 THE APPLICANT: So I'm a security officer of a  
18 security company and a private investigator in the State of  
19 California for the past 18 years or so.

20 And my intentions for -- were to be in compliance  
21 with the State of Nevada if I have a client that comes here  
22 and -- for entertainment and...

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So if I could ask,  
24 you're mostly entertainment security? Is that what it is?

1 THE APPLICANT: Personal security.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Personal security. Okay.

3 Any further questions from the Board?

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: Yes, this is Gronauer. Is it  
5 armed?

6 THE APPLICANT: Some is armed, some is not.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have an armed card?

8 THE APPLICANT: I'm a firearms instructor and I  
9 do have -- not for Nevada, I do not have it. I was going to  
10 get it after this process. I will get my CCW.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. It's nice that you want  
12 to get it.

13 THE APPLICANT: Well, it depends on -- yeah.

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: You understand what you mean?

15 THE APPLICANT: Yes, yes, I understand.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Because personal  
17 security whether or not its to bear arms, I was just trying to  
18 figure it out.

19 THE APPLICANT: No problem. I have both licenses  
20 in California and I plan on here. I just wanted to get  
21 through this process first. This is a long process.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes. Any further questions  
23 from the Board?

24 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown for the



1 record. Mr. Coleman, what did you do for work from 1991 to  
2 2004? You didn't list it on your application.

3 THE APPLICANT: I was part -- I'm part of law  
4 enforcement as well. And then once I got injured, that's when  
5 I started my security company.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So from '90 -- what was it,  
7 Mr. Brown? From 90 --

8 MEMBER BROWN: Well, I -- he shows -- in the  
9 background, it shows that he was employed by the Alameda  
10 County Sheriff's Office in California from May 29th, 1990, to  
11 May 4th, 1991. On his application, he lists his job starting  
12 in 2004.

13 What did you do from 1991 to 2004, sir?

14 THE APPLICANT: Law enforcement, sir.

15 MEMBER BROWN: And who is that law enforcement  
16 with?

17 THE APPLICANT: It started off, my first agency  
18 was Alameda County Sheriff's Office, went through the academy,  
19 starting working the jails. That wasn't my cup of tea. So I  
20 moved over to San Jose Police Department and then I spent the  
21 rest of the time there until I was injured.

22 MEMBER BROWN: And you were injured in -- around  
23 1991? Is that when you ended your law enforcement career?

24 THE APPLICANT: '93, somewhere around '93.

1 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. Well, now  
2 I'm -- I'm still confused. So you stopped being a law  
3 enforcement in '93. What did you do from '93 to 2004?  
4 There's nothing on your application for jobs prior to 2004.

5 THE APPLICANT: Yes. I also own a construction  
6 company as well, so...

7 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. So you were running your  
8 construction company after you were injured in law enforcement  
9 until you --

10 THE APPLICANT: Right.

11 MEMBER BROWN: -- began this corporation?

12 THE APPLICANT: Correct.

13 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

14 THE APPLICANT: Correct. Yes, sir.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. How long did  
16 you spend in law enforcement?

17 THE APPLICANT: About seven years, I believe, or  
18 5 to 7 years. '90 to '95, so about five years.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: I can understand being in  
20 corrections is not for you. I get that, you know. Why did  
21 you leave law enforcement?

22 THE APPLICANT: I snapped my ACL in half and just  
23 started a security company.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So you started the security

1 securities or you started the construction?

2 THE APPLICANT: Started them both about the same  
3 time while I was going through -- while I was doing rehab, I  
4 had started doing some -- so when I started -- when I left law  
5 enforcement, I started doing water damage restoration and then  
6 in the process of doing the water damage restoration, made a  
7 fairly good amount of money. And so on the restoration, you  
8 can only -- without a license, you can only remove drywall,  
9 dry things and whatnot.

10 I looked at it, I said, hey, I'm losing money on  
11 the other half putting it back in. So I went and got my  
12 construction license as well. So that's how I ended up doing  
13 that. So I have -- and then I have my security company at the  
14 same time. I still do both now.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Um-hum. So Investigator --  
16 I'm not caught up.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: Saladino.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Saladino, is his license in  
19 California in good standing?

20 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
21 the record. It is.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any further  
23 questions?

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. How did you

1 wreck your ACL?

2 THE APPLICANT: Playing basketball.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, so it wasn't on duty  
4 injury?

5 THE APPLICANT: No, it wasn't.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And then you tried to go  
7 back, you couldn't go back?

8 THE APPLICANT: Couldn't go back.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
10 the Board? Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll  
11 entertain a motion. And if I could -- just for the record, do  
12 we -- in the application, do we ask for just last ten years?  
13 Is that for the background because it seems like there's a big  
14 gap there, and I think that bothers a lot of us. But I'm not  
15 sure if that's because we only asked for the last ten years.

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: There's no limit on  
17 the number of years.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we ask for the entire  
19 background?

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: (Nodded head.)

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So did we ask for the  
22 rest of the background because there is a big gap there.

23 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
24 the record. When the applicant initially started the process,

1 he was dealing with Shelly McDonald. He stated that the  
2 licensing information that he had from California should be  
3 enough, that the law enforcement -- it was too difficult to  
4 get the letters and stuff from the agencies.

5 I did get confirmation from Alameda County that  
6 he was employed or San Jose. We didn't get any information  
7 with regards to that.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, Investigator  
9 Saladino, did they give you just a reason for separation?

10 THE APPLICANT: No, it didn't. He's looking it  
11 up.

12 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.  
13 It just says that he was -- they confirmed his employment.  
14 That was it.

15 THE APPLICANT: That's what he had asked for,  
16 just confirmation of employment. And then so it was a pain  
17 trying to get that. But they said -- they wrote me a letter.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

19 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: One more question, please.  
21 This is Gronauer. So the domestic violence in 2015 had  
22 nothing to do with your separation from --

23 THE APPLICANT: No, had nothing to do it.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: And when did you last work in

1 the police department?

2 THE APPLICANT: '90, '94, I believe '94.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Just seems like you got a lot  
4 of little gray areas in there. Okay.

5 THE APPLICANT: Go ahead and ask. I'm open. I'm  
6 open to answer questions.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I guess my question would be  
8 why you didn't go all the way back to the beginning of  
9 employment and include the law enforcement, because it is --  
10 it just seems like there's a huge employment gap.

11 THE APPLICANT: Yeah. I didn't want to answer it  
12 because it wasn't my place. But I believe it did ask for ten  
13 years.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Um-hum.

15 THE APPLICANT: And then it asked -- then it  
16 said -- on the application, it says qualifications. And if  
17 I'm a security private investigator for 18 years, I was like,  
18 why do I want to go through the hassle of trying to get all my  
19 law enforcement stuff when I already meet you guys'  
20 qualifications? I have 18 years of security. It was more  
21 than enough, and I was thinking, why go through the hassle.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

23 THE APPLICANT: That's why I didn't list it.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I understand.

1 MEMBER BROWN: Madam Chair, Board Member Brown.  
2 The employment section of the application says list all jobs,  
3 starting with the most recent.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: That's what I remember, too.

5 MEMBER BROWN: It doesn't say list all jobs that  
6 you think, you know, you've got enough to satisfy us.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any further  
8 questions from the Board? Hearing no further questions, I'll  
9 entertain a motion.

10 One final question.

11 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Saladino, his  
13 fingerprints came back clear, right? I think we -- this  
14 wasn't one of the ones where we had fingerprints or anything  
15 like that?

16 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
17 the record. We've received his fingerprints, yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
20 going to motion to approve Coleman Security a new corporate  
21 private patrolman license, Mr. Troy Coleman to be awarded the  
22 private patrolman license, and if approved, requesting that it  
23 be placed in abeyance so that he can become the qualifying  
24 agent. Corporate officer to be approved is Mr. Troy E.

1 Coleman, subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion.

3 Do we have a second?

4 Call again for a second?

5 So if there's no second, I'll entertain another  
6 motion.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll make a  
8 motion to deny Coleman Security Investigation Incorporated a  
9 corporate private patrolman license and also deny Troy E.  
10 Coleman his applying for his private patrolman license. If  
11 approved, and make a new motion to deny it.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Could I ask the reason?

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: A reason? Yeah. The reasons  
14 are too many gray areas and he decided what he wanted to put  
15 on the application, rather than just filling out the  
16 application, so saying this is just enough. It's just the  
17 kind of attitude that I don't know where a license would go  
18 with an attitude like that. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do I  
20 have a second?

21 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
22 will second for the same reasons.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a  
24 second. All in favor say, "aye."



1 All opposed?

2 So four ayes and one nay.

3 Sir, I think, you know, go back -- you can come  
4 back and apply, use your same license -- or your same  
5 application, but fill in the blanks. There's a huge gap and  
6 we just don't know what that is, right?

7 And so that makes a lot of us uncomfortable,  
8 especially those of us that are in the industry because we've  
9 had some bad licenses in the past.

10 THE APPLICANT: I understand. It was my  
11 understanding and maybe I misread it, the -- Mr. --

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Gronauer.

13 THE APPLICANT: Gronaur. It's not -- that's not  
14 -- I'm not trying to avoid anything. If -- my understanding,  
15 the application, that it only asked for ten years and I will  
16 definitely go back and look at it.

17 I thought I read it through thoroughly. And then  
18 the investigator even asked me, he says, well, what about back  
19 here? And then that's where the subject came up. I said,  
20 well, it only asks for this many hours. It asks for this.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Understood.

22 THE APPLICANT: And so that's what I put. It  
23 wasn't that I was trying to evade or to avoid any --

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We appreciate that.

1 THE APPLICANT: So...

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So understood. And I think,  
3 again, just reapply, make sure that you're thorough in your  
4 application and go back through your history.

5 THE APPLICANT: Is there a timeline after  
6 applying?

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The -- I think it's a year.  
8 Is it a year with the -- okay. So you can apply for the next  
9 meeting. Okay?

10 THE APPLICANT: Okay. Can I use the same  
11 applications, just fill in the little blanks?

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah. And they're very  
13 helpful, so, you know, ask those very specific questions, they  
14 will get you through it. Absolutely.

15 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, he was very helpful.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. All right. Thank you,  
17 sir.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Just a comment, Mr. Coleman.

19 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer again.

21 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: See, the importance of previous  
23 employees --

24 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

1 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Why did you leave?

2 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: It could have been for a theft,  
4 it could have been for a lot of different things or you were  
5 just completely fed up. We don't know that.

6 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: So there's gaps in there  
8 that -- there's a reason that you didn't say where -- or you  
9 didn't do something these years. You can say, well, I have my  
10 own construction company, bring all the tax records, bring  
11 everything.

12 You have to back it up because, again, we've had  
13 people who skip stuff and found out, well, they left because  
14 they shot their boss. Good reason to leave, you went to  
15 prison. You spent ten years in prison. So there's a ten-year  
16 gap already right there.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah.

18 THE APPLICANT: And I also looked at it as a  
19 background investigator myself for agencies, I -- when I  
20 pulled the fingerprint records --

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah.

22 THE APPLICANT: -- I'm a licensed life scanner as  
23 well.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Unfortunately, we have to

1 keep moving.

2 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We're really behind. There's  
4 a crowd behind you.

5 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

7 THE APPLICANT: Thank you, Ms. Cortez.

8 Appreciate you.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We're on to Agenda  
10 Item Number 33, private investigator licensing. Alex -- I'm  
11 going to try, Alexandros.

12 THE APPLICANT: Nikoloudakis.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah, what she said. So  
14 sorry. Alex.

15 THE APPLICANT: Alex Niko.

16 THE APPLICANT: Good morning, Board. How are you  
17 doing.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir. Tell us a  
19 little bit about yourself and the intentions with the  
20 licensing.

21 THE APPLICANT: I recently retired from the Drug  
22 Enforcement Administration as a diversion investigator. I  
23 spent 17 years. I figured there's a lot of opportunity to do  
24 financial investigations as well as with the Controlled

1 Substance Act investigations, and that's why I'm applying for  
2 the private investigators license.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
4 questions for Mr. Alex?

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: Sir, this is Gronauer. Did you  
6 work for DEA?

7 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. DEA federal or DEA  
9 Nevada? We've got a couple different ones.

10 THE APPLICANT: The United States Drug  
11 Enforcement Administration.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And how many years did  
13 you spend there?

14 THE APPLICANT: 17 years.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Why did you leave?

16 THE APPLICANT: I retired July 1st of this year.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: That's a nice reason. Okay.

18 And what have you been doing since July 1st to September,  
19 retired?

20 THE APPLICANT: Well, I'm enjoying quietness, but  
21 it's getting boring.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. No, no, I understand.  
23 What are you going to do with your license?

24 THE APPLICANT: Well, one of the things that I

1 see is opportunities for financial investigations as well as  
2 with the Controlled Substance Act violations that when I was  
3 working for the Drug Enforcement Administration, to help and  
4 assist in the private sector and working directly with  
5 attorneys as well as with clients.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: You have a wealth of  
7 information, I mean, a wealth of experience. There's no doubt  
8 in my mind in that certain area.

9 THE APPLICANT: I'm very blessed.

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: Which is needed by a lot of  
11 places.

12 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: So good luck to you as far as  
14 I'm concerned.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You forgot. You missed his  
16 marine. He's a marine, too. Thank you for your service.  
17 He's normally semper fi. His candle is semper fi.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes, I'm disappointed.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah.

20 THE APPLICANT: That's right.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: Semper fi, for sure, sir.

22 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
24 from the Board? If there's no further questions, I'll

1 entertain a motion.

2 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown --

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez --

4 oh, go ahead, Mr. --

5 MEMBER BROWN: Go ahead. Go ahead, Member  
6 Cortez. You got it.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,  
8 motioning to approve Mr. Alexandros Nikoloudakis.

9 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am, perfect.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: For an individual private  
11 investigator license, subject to all statutory and regulatory  
12 requirements.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
14 a second?

15 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
16 second.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
18 second.

19 All in favor say, "aye."

20 Congratulations, sir. Good luck to you.

21 THE APPLICANT: Thank you, thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you for your service.  
23 (Motion carries.)

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item Number 34,

1 Red Rock Intelligence Services, LLC. DBA Stealth Zero is  
2 Mr. James Artherton. Looks like that's the only one. Okay.  
3 Thank you, sir.

4 THE APPLICANT: Good morning.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning.

6 THE APPLICANT: So one quick question.  
7 Investigator, is his fingerprints in?

8 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
9 the record. We have received them and they are negative.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Fantastic. Please tell us a  
11 little bit about yourself and then intentions of your license.

12 THE APPLICANT: Sure. James Artherton. My  
13 specialty is a counterespionage book suite, intelligence and  
14 protective intelligence that kind of stuff. I do cyber  
15 security as well. I've got some qualifications over the last  
16 couple of years. So kind of the PI license gives me the  
17 official to conduct my work.

18 I've been in America for about a year and a half  
19 now with my wife and kids, so been getting client's advice to  
20 life here. But, yeah, I'm an ex-police officer. I was in  
21 London, Metropolitan police and I've been a UK PI for the past  
22 four years.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Any further  
24 questions for -- or any questions for Mr. --



1 THE APPLICANT: Artherton.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Artherton.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: English.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. No questions. I'll  
5 entertain a motion.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,  
7 motioning to approve Mr. James Artherton for an individual  
8 private investigator license, that it be placed in abeyance to  
9 become the qualifying agent and the member, subject to all  
10 statutory and regulatory requirements.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
12 a second? Oh, we need to finish it.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez  
14 again, for the company name Red Rock Intelligence Services,  
15 LLC, DBA Stealth Zero.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
18 second.

19 All in favor say, "aye."

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.  
21 Congratulations.

22 THE APPLICANT: Thank you, ma'am.

23 (Motion carries.)

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. The last one for

1 private patrolman and private investigator is Jonathan  
2 Sullivan. Good morning, sir. Still morning.

3 THE APPLICANT: Good morning.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Tell us a little bit about  
5 yourself and your intentions with your license.

6 THE APPLICANT: I was a former United States  
7 marine, former law enforcement officer, and most recently  
8 worked for the United States Department of State overseas.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. What's your intention  
10 with the license?

11 THE APPLICANT: To conduct business in Nevada as  
12 a PPO holder.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Do you currently have  
14 a clientele here?

15 THE APPLICANT: I do not.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. All right. Any  
17 questions from the Board?

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
19 Mr. Sullivan, any law enforcement contact, adverse contact?

20 THE APPLICANT: Negative.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Since 2809?

22 THE APPLICANT: Negative.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: No further questions.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from

1 the Board or do we need time on this one?

2 Okay. Hearing there's no questions, I'll  
3 entertain a motion.

4 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
5 move that we deny the application for license for Mr. Jonathan  
6 M. Sullivan for his private patrolman and private  
7 investigator's license due to integrity issues based on his  
8 background report.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion.  
10 Do we have a second?

11 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I second.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion, I have a  
13 second.

14 All in favor?

15 Do you need a moment.

16 All opposed?

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm going to go aye. Also  
18 didn't --

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm not opposing.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
22 second. All in favor say, "aye."

23 So the motion is unanimous. We're declining your  
24 application due to character in your background.

1 THE APPLICANT: Can I -- can you tell me what it  
2 is?

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah, your background that  
4 you have in there. You were denied from the 2009 board  
5 meeting and then even though you were denied, you conducted  
6 business because you received an unlicensed activity citation  
7 in 2011 for your work with the Saudi Royal family.

8 And so -- and you have a sealed portion of your  
9 record history. I'm not sure if you want us to go into that  
10 in public, but there is that portion of it as well.

11 So with all of that said, the Board is now  
12 denying you the second time for your application.

13 THE APPLICANT: So the first time that was in  
14 2009 was not for a license. It was for a work card.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

16 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, you've been denied.

18 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: If you have any questions,  
20 feel free to go to the Board -- or the office later.

21 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Okay. So we are  
23 now going to go into the work card registrations. And so just  
24 because, again, I think I see bright new faces, if you have

1 not been sworn in previously, could you please stand up and  
2 get sworn in this time?

3 MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

4 (Discussion off the record.)

5 (Multiple people sworn.)

6 MS. HARRIS: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Okay. Let's get  
8 started. Is Justin Bipialaka -- is Justin down south?

9 Okay. Board up north, do you guys have anybody  
10 in the audience?

11 MEMBER BROWN: We do not, Madam Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. All right. So it's  
13 Justin Bipialaka. Okay. We will trail that.

14 Daniel Cisneros. Okay. Thank you, sir.

15 THE APPLICANT: Good morning.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning.

17 Investigator Hubbell, could you tell us a little  
18 bit -- or why we're here, Mr. Cisneros. Sir, I'm asking the  
19 investigator.

20 THE APPLICANT: I'm sorry.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

22 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Investigator Hubbell for  
23 the record. The applicant was denied for a 1995 felony  
24 conviction out of California for drug possession and sale. He

1 was put on probation, given three years prison time after his  
2 probation was revoked. This arrest was not disclosed on the  
3 original application.

4 He also has a 1996 felony conviction out of  
5 California for the same charge, was given three years prison  
6 time. It also was not listed on the application, and in 2009,  
7 out of California, he had a misdemeanor conviction for  
8 obstruction of the public officer, resisting arrest and under  
9 the influence of a controlled substance.

10 He was given three years probation, six days jail  
11 time and for the under the influence, 12 months probation.  
12 This arrest was also not listed on the application or the  
13 updated arrest history form.

14 The applicant did not disclose his arrest history  
15 at the time of his initial application on June 3rd, 2022. The  
16 applicant submitted an updated arrest history that listed  
17 arrest Number 1 and Number 2, but Number 3 was not listed.  
18 The applicant was denied for having the felony convictions and  
19 is here today to appeal.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir -- are there any  
21 questions from the Board?

22 MEMBER BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair. This is Board  
23 Member Brown for the record.

24 Sir, you updated your arrest record and listed

1 two felonies, but failed to list a misdemeanor. Why?

2 THE APPLICANT: I didn't have my correct dates on  
3 them.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You didn't have what?

5 THE APPLICANT: I didn't have the correct dates  
6 posted on the paperwork.

7 MEMBER BROWN: You didn't have the correct dates?

8 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

9 MEMBER BROWN: So you didn't submit it; is that  
10 what you're saying?

11 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

12 MEMBER BROWN: No further.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
14 questions? Why didn't you list any of these in the beginning?

15 THE APPLICANT: Because I didn't have the correct  
16 dates on the -- actually, it asked for felony. It didn't ask  
17 for misdemeanors. So I didn't --

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: But you didn't list it in the  
19 initial --

20 THE APPLICANT: Right. I didn't do that  
21 correctly.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Why is that? Okay. So when  
23 you fill out an application, if you don't have the correct  
24 dates, at least just put it down so that we can find out the

1 dates for you.

2 THE APPLICANT: I know they were '95, '96.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, sir, do you  
4 understand?

5 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: If you don't have the dates,  
7 we can pull and wait for that.

8 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: But to put the information,  
10 that needs to happen.

11 THE APPLICANT: Right.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay? Because you went in  
13 and it made it look like you had nothing on your record.

14 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And, indeed, you do, right?

16 THE APPLICANT: Right. It's way behind me now.  
17 It's been 25 years.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Understood. Any further  
19 questions?

20 THE APPLICANT: No.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Hearing no further  
22 questions from the Board, I'll entertain a motion.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,  
24 motioning to uphold the denial based on no information



1 provided on the criminal history.

2 Mr. Cisneros, I do need to caution you. You need  
3 to read the application process in full. I don't know if  
4 there's a copy there. I have provided it. It states  
5 specifically what you need to do for your background.

6 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: And all criminal contact.  
8 Regardless of disposition, regardless of what year, even if  
9 you did not know, you knew, you just stated, sometime in the  
10 90's. You could have put that down.

11 THE APPLICANT: Right.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: You could have also reached out  
13 other board members just for future reference. At this time,  
14 I am going to motion to uphold the denial.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
16 a second?

17 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
18 second.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
20 second.

21 All in favor say, "aye."

22 (Motion fails.)

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So you will not get your work  
24 card today, sir. You can reapply in a year. When you

1 reapply, you can use your other application and ask that the  
2 office to help you. They'll help you get all your information  
3 on there. You need to make sure, like she said, every contact  
4 is on there. Law enforcement contact.

5 THE APPLICANT: I got you.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir. Good luck to  
7 you.

8 Jason Cousins. Is Jason Cousins here? Good  
9 after -- good morning still, sir.

10 THE APPLICANT: Good afternoon is all I'll say.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: There you go. Investigator  
12 Hubbell, could you please let us know why we're here with  
13 Mr. Cousins.

14 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Investigator Hubbell for  
15 the record. The applicant was denied for a 2012 felony arrest  
16 out of California for the purchase, possession and sale of a  
17 narcotic controlled substance. The judgment was a PC 1203.4  
18 out of California. He was given three years probation,  
19 365 days jail time, a fine. The imposition of sentence was  
20 suspended.

21 This arrest was listed on the application. There  
22 were originally three charges, drug charges with this, and two  
23 of the other charges were dismissed. He also had a 2004  
24 misdemeanor conviction out of California that was not

1 disclosed for the theft of personal property -- excuse me,  
2 shoplifting. He got three years probation and one day of jail  
3 time.

4 At the time of this arrest, he was also charged  
5 with a false ID to specific peace officers, and that charge  
6 was dismissed for the plea to shoplifting.

7 In 2004, he had a non-disclosed felony arrest out  
8 of California for grand theft from a person in California.  
9 This charge is a wobbler. He received probation, jail and a  
10 fine. This arrest was also not disclosed on the application.  
11 It was listed on the fingerprint report and that's how we came  
12 across it.

13 The original charges were -- started off with  
14 robbery, battery, grand theft from a person and the robbery  
15 and battery were dismissed.

16 The applicant disclosed some of his arrest  
17 history and filed his appeal at the time of his application.  
18 He was denied for having a felony drug arrest. The applicant  
19 was not made provisional and is here today to appeal.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
21 questions from the Board?

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. You can see  
23 by the last two people that we've already spoke with. Why  
24 didn't you list everything on here?

1 THE APPLICANT: Well, what I list on there is  
2 basically what was recent, which was the narcotics felony  
3 charge that was expunged. Basically, to the best of my  
4 knowledge, just coming in from San Diego to Nevada, I just  
5 felt like that was the basic to go to, to apply.

6 But I didn't know that when you do get  
7 expungement, in the fine print, it states that certain things,  
8 they're not qualified for you. I wasn't aware of that at the  
9 time.

10 So when I went to go do the fingerprints and do  
11 everything that needs to be processed, the young lady that  
12 worked there told me, hey, put your felony down anyway just in  
13 case anything like kicks back. So that's why I did what I  
14 did.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: I understand, and unfortunately  
16 too many applicants go, you know, sometimes there's time and  
17 distance on here that, you know -- and you report your stuff  
18 and you go, and here's what I'm doing in the future, what I'm  
19 doing now, what I'm doing in the future. And we can -- we'd  
20 rather see you work than not work.

21 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. I mean, everybody,  
23 not just you. So the problem is, though, following the rules  
24 is very important as far as putting on paper. It says your

1 criminal history. It doesn't say the most recent. It doesn't  
2 say no -- the longest time or whatever. It just says list it.

3 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: Again, earlier it was said even  
5 if you don't know the date, you can put 2004, 1999, whatever.  
6 So -- and it gives the investigator something to work with.  
7 Because otherwise this is the reason the volume of work gets  
8 so heavy on them because they have to go and recheck  
9 everything.

10 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: And when you -- and I'm just  
12 saying, for your good and for the good of everybody in the  
13 audience and everybody that might be on the phone and everyone  
14 in the future, please read the directions and follow the  
15 directions.

16 THE APPLICANT: You know, I definitely agree  
17 about that, that anybody that's had a past history as a young  
18 adult into adult now, to go back and get your paperwork in  
19 order.

20 Not only that, read carefully about your  
21 expungements. Doesn't matter what state you from, Nevada,  
22 California, anywhere, because that could basically hinder you  
23 from your future.

24 And as of today, you know, I just flew in from

1 San Diego because I'm getting a -- I'm trying to get the  
2 approval to get a pardon so it wouldn't hinder me from my  
3 future career in law enforcement as a probation officer with  
4 gang unit.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

6 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further -- oh,  
8 we're not done yet. Are there any further questions for  
9 Mr. Cousins? Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll  
10 entertain a motion.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
12 am going to motion to uphold the denial based on failure to  
13 report criminal history. I think we've all made it pretty  
14 clear on what the requirements are as well as the application,  
15 stating it full clear. That's it.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
17 a second?

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
20 second.

21 All in favor say, "aye."

22 (Motion fails.)

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: And if I could make one last  
24 comment. You mentioned it a couple times about your

1 expungement, your expungement, your expungement. It doesn't  
2 matter. Regardless of the disposition, you need to list it.  
3 Court papers, no court papers, you need to list it.

4 I encourage you to reread it. I thought I had a  
5 copy up there, but I also pull it up here and I literally look  
6 at it every single time I get somebody up here that says, no,  
7 it was closed. It's no longer available.

8 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, that's understandable and  
9 I'm up to speed with --

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: That's all I need to say.

11 THE APPLICANT: Oh.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah, we're good, sir. Thank  
13 you.

14 THE APPLICANT: All right. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yep. So we're on Agenda Item  
16 Number 39, Cameron King. Cameron King, are you in the  
17 audience? Okay. We'll trail Cameron. Who is Item Number --

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: I'm sorry, I'm  
19 sleeping. For the record, Madam Chair, Kevin Ingram. Cameron  
20 King asked to postpone.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: To the next board  
23 meeting. My apologies.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Item Number 40, Luis

1 Lopez. Mr. Lopez, thank you.

2 Investigator Hubbell, could you please tell us  
3 why we're here with Mr. Lopez.

4 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Yeah. Mr. Lopez was  
5 denied for a 2010 felony arrest out of California. I believe  
6 he was also denied in 2021 for this same felony arrest and he  
7 appeared in front of the board meeting at that time. The  
8 denial was upheld.

9 The charge was possession of a firearm by a  
10 convicted felon or a person with a prior conviction,  
11 misdemeanor. The disposition was jail time of one year with  
12 credit for 54 days served and three years of formal probation  
13 and to pay a restitution. The applicant did list this on his  
14 application and the case was dismissed under 1203.4 on  
15 March 1st of 2013.

16 He also has a 2009 felony conviction out of  
17 California for vandalism. This was disclosed. He had  
18 180 days in jail that was suspended and three years probation.  
19 Probation was set to expire on 11/4 of 2012 for this case from  
20 the court docs that were provided by the applicant. The  
21 applicant did list this as a misdemeanor on the application  
22 where it showed as a felony.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further --

24 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: And -- I have one more.



1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sorry.

2 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: 2008, misdemeanor arrest  
3 out of California that was disclosed for disorderly conduct  
4 with prostitution. The disposition was ten days in jail and  
5 two years probation. This was disclosed by the applicant.  
6 These arrests were all out of California.

7 In 2021, the applicant was not made provisional  
8 and he appeared in front of the board meeting and he's here  
9 again today to appeal.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
11 questions from the Board for Mr. Lopez?

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Mr. Lopez,  
13 from what I understand previously, you were denied because you  
14 didn't disclose.

15 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir. Last year, I believe,  
16 from what I recall, it was the juvenile record I didn't  
17 disclose --

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: -- okay, so you didn't --  
19 (Simultaneous speaking.)

20 THE APPLICANT: -- correct.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: You went back and did your  
22 homework, put it all down there.

23 THE APPLICANT: Yes. There were --

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: -- that's what we're requesting

1 people to do. If you did that in the beginning --

2 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: -- you may have already been  
4 work card approved.

5 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: So just give an example to  
7 people that are there the audience. It's the idea that once  
8 you do it and then you learn what you had to do, and you go  
9 back and do it, I commend you for that. It's a year later and  
10 that's pretty darn good.

11 THE APPLICANT: Yes, correct. I mean, the  
12 juvenile record, I didn't realize I had to put that in there  
13 as -- you know, I was a juvenile.

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay, sir. Thank you.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
16 Mr. Lopez, you don't -- do you -- this was out of California?  
17 You were on probation in California?

18 THE APPLICANT: Correct.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Perfect. Nothing else.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
21 for Mr. Lopez? Okay. Hearing there's no further questions,  
22 I'll entertain a motion.

23 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
24 move that we grant the appeal for Mr. Lopez so that he can get

1 his work card based on time and distance and doing what we  
2 asked, going back, waiting a year and reapplying.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
4 we have a second?

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
7 second.

8 All in favor say, "aye."

9 (Motion carries.)

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. It's approved, sir.  
11 Thank you. Congratulations.

12 THE APPLICANT: Thank you very much for your  
13 time.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Item -- Agenda Item  
15 Number 41, Deana Manning or Deana Manning. Okay. We'll trail  
16 that until the end.

17 Norris -- Agenda Item Number 42, Norris McDonald.  
18 Good -- one minute until the afternoon. Good morning still.

19 Mr. Hubbell, could you please tell us a little  
20 bit about why we're here with Mr. McDonald.

21 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Mr. McDonald was denied  
22 for a --

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: It's okay. Sorry.

24 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Mr. McDonald was --

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Go ahead, Mr. Hubbell.

2 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: He was denied for a 2000  
3 felony arrest out of Nevada. It was disclosed on his  
4 application. The charge was battery with a deadly weapon. He  
5 was incarcerated as a result. This arrest was disclosed on  
6 the application.

7 At the time, I checked court documents on  
8 July 7th, according to this report, and again on yesterday,  
9 and he still owes a \$25 fine on this case from 2000. He also  
10 lists a 2003 arrest out of Nevada.

11 The SCOPE shows it is October 17th and his  
12 application shows it November 19th as the date of occurrence.  
13 It was disclosed on his application. It was a felony. SCOPE  
14 lists it as a battery with a deadly weapon and the Court  
15 documents list it as a simple assault. He was incarcerated  
16 for this one also.

17 The dates listed on his application is  
18 November 9th, SCOPE lists the 17th of October. It was listed  
19 on the application. At the time of checking on these again  
20 yesterday, there is still a fine of \$158.54 due on this case.

21 In 2008, he had a November felony arrest out of  
22 -- I'm sorry, September felony arrest out of Nevada for  
23 trespass, possession of burglary tools. On the application,  
24 it's listed as malicious destruction of property with

1 incarceration.

2 SCOPE, it doesn't show an outcome, so I don't  
3 know what the final disposition was. This arrest was listed  
4 on the application, and as of yesterday, there's \$175 owed on  
5 this one as well.

6 In 1989, he had a felony conviction -- or arrest,  
7 rather, out of Nevada for possession of a controlled substance  
8 with intent to sell. The offense was reduced to possession of  
9 a controlled substance and he got four years probation. This  
10 arrest was listed on the application, and again, as of when I  
11 checked court documents yesterday, there's a \$75 fee owed.

12 And last, in 2018, he had a misdemeanor arrest  
13 out of Nevada that was not disclosed. He got a suspended  
14 90-day jail sentence. This arrest was listed on the  
15 application. It was found on SCOPE as a bench warrant type of  
16 arrest. Supporting court documents show that this arrest was  
17 stemming from a July 17th, 2017, incident.

18 The applicant listed all four felony arrests on  
19 his application and omitted the last one, the domestic  
20 battery. The applicant is a registered convicted person from  
21 Nevada SCOPE. The applicant was denied for having the felony  
22 convictions and is here today to appeal.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So do we have any  
24 questions for Mr. McDonald?

1 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
2 have a question for investigator Hubbell.

3 Investigator Hubbell, in your report, you list --  
4 at the bottom, you listed three felony arrests and omitted one  
5 felony and one domestic battery.

6 Arrest Number 3 in 2008, under disclosed, it  
7 shows yes, but in the description down at the bottom, it says  
8 as of July 7th, 2022, there's \$175 balance due on this case.  
9 This arrest was not listed on the application.

10 So was it disclosed? Was it not? I'm confused.

11 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Yes. It was disclosed,  
12 but the charge was actually listed as something different than  
13 what the court document said. So that was an error on my  
14 part. So it was a disclosed arrest.

15 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. For the  
17 investigator, are the fines still outstanding, the balance  
18 dues as of July 7th?

19 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Yes, sir. I actually  
20 checked yesterday afternoon, at about 1:30 in the afternoon,  
21 and they were still outstanding at that time.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.  
23 Mr. McDonald?

24 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

1           MEMBER GRONAUER: How much time have you been in  
2 prison?

3           THE APPLICANT: Six years. I wasn't aware of the  
4 fines. In fact, I can take care of the fines today. I wasn't  
5 aware of it. I thought I did everything and it's been  
6 12 years, no trouble. But I didn't know about the fines. No  
7 warrants or anything.

8           MEMBER GRONAUER: What do you do now for --

9           THE APPLICANT: I've been doing landscaping for  
10 12 years and I just want to change careers, you know. I've  
11 still got people doing security work, it's easy, sit behind a  
12 desk, help the crowd or whatever. And so I just don't want to  
13 do landscaping anymore.

14          MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Understand. Thank you.

15          MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
16 Mr. McDonald, why did you fail to report the 2018 incident?

17          THE APPLICANT: 2018? What was that?

18          MEMBER CORTEZ: The meeting.

19          THE APPLICANT: Oh, because when I called the --  
20 when I called you guys, they was like, just disclose felonies.

21          MEMBER CORTEZ: That is not what --

22          THE APPLICANT: I didn't know -- huh? Oh, it was  
23 my mistake. But, yes, it's a misdemeanor. I didn't know. I  
24 thought I disclosed all felonies. That's what I did. I

1 didn't know. It was a mistake. But they said felonies can  
2 prevent you, so -- but make sure you --

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. One more time, who said  
4 felonies?

5 THE APPLICANT: The PIB Board. I called them.  
6 They said you've got to disclose all your felonies because if  
7 you try to leave something out, then they can deny you. So I  
8 put all the felonies down, but instead of that misdemeanor. I  
9 just thought that you all wanted to see the felonies, not the  
10 misdemeanors. But I already disclosed it.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you. I'm going to  
12 go ahead and reiterate what the application states, and it  
13 states everything regardless of disposition.

14 THE APPLICANT: Oh, I --

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: Felony, misdemeanor, dropped,  
16 expunged, happened, didn't happened. There is actual  
17 documentation that you --

18 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: -- that's what being asked for  
20 you. So it looks a little suspicious when you listed 2000, 18  
21 years ago -- or well over 18 years ago, 2003, 2018 -- 1989,  
22 situation, but not 2018.

23 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, I went and paid the \$25 to  
24 get the packets of all my arrests, and so I went off that.



1 But then I should have just included the whole package and  
2 statement together. I'm sorry. I'm sorry.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: That's what I needed. Thank you.

4 MEMBER BROWN: This Board Member Brown. Another  
5 question for Investigator Hubbell. Based on what Mr. Manning  
6 (sic.) has said, with the outstanding fines that he's not  
7 aware of, have any warrants been issued?

8 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Not that I can see on the  
9 any of these cases, no, sir.

10 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
12 You're -- it's saying that there is nothing being found as an  
13 active ventry (phonetic), but the arrest was found on SCOPE as  
14 a ventry. What's the status of the ventry? Is it quashed?  
15 Is it -- was it denied?

16 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: I believe it shows the  
17 case as closed, but these are fines that are still  
18 outstanding.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
21 questions? I'll just state a concern. These are a long time  
22 ago, but with the outstanding balances, that's a little bit of  
23 a concern for me. So I think that's just -- that's one of my  
24 concerns. I'll leave that out there.

1 Any further questions from the Board? Okay.

2 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

3 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move to uphold  
4 the denial based on nondisclosure and based on outstanding  
5 fines.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion. Do we  
7 have a second?

8 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
9 second. And I also want to apologize to Mr. McDonald. I  
10 referred to you as Mr. Manning. I had it wrong in my notes.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. We have a motion,  
12 we have a second.

13 All in favor say, "aye."

14 (Motion carries.)

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I think the most  
16 concerning part is the outstanding fines just because you're  
17 not closed out. You're not whole, right?

18 So if you could go down to the courthouse and  
19 take care of those, and then when you're done and you're ready  
20 to reapply, I mean, come back in one year.

21 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: It's wintertime now. By next  
23 summer, you can almost be out of the heat, right? And you  
24 could --

1 THE APPLICANT: Can I get a piece of paper that  
2 states what --

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: They will absolutely take  
4 care of that for you, sir. So we look forward to seeing you  
5 again. Okay?

6 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: And we'll be in contact  
7 with you, please. Don't stop at the desk. We'll contact you.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We'll contact you. Okay.  
9 Thank you, sir. Yeah. Okay. Is -- we're at Agenda Item  
10 Number 43, Bernadette Murray. Okay. This is confusing.  
11 Sorry.

12 Okay. Mr. Hubbell, could you please tell us why  
13 we're here with Ms. Murray.

14 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: Investigator Hubbell for  
15 the record. The applicant was denied for a 2005 felony  
16 conviction out of Oregon for identity theft or theft. She was  
17 convicted, paid fines and had 18 months of probation.

18 The original charges were misdemeanor theft,  
19 felony theft, felony fraudulent use of a credit card,  
20 misdemeanor fraudulent use of a credit card, felony identity  
21 theft and felony crimes against a person.

22 This arrest was disclosed on the application and  
23 there were no other arrests listed on the fingerprint report.  
24 The applicant was denied for the felony conviction and is here

1 today to appeal.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you. Any  
3 questions from the Board?

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: It is -- good afternoon,  
5 Ms. Murray.

6 THE APPLICANT: I'm so embarrassed.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: It's okay. You know, everybody  
8 has something. So what have you been doing for work?

9 THE APPLICANT: What was that?

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: What are you doing for work?

11 THE APPLICANT: I actually work for an  
12 investigation office, Pyramid Investigation.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: What do you mean by that?

14 THE APPLICANT: So I do all the admin work. I  
15 file all the cases, which I need to work card or I get  
16 terminated.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: What company do you work?

18 THE APPLICANT: Pyramid.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: I can't hear you.

20 THE APPLICANT: Pyramid.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Is that here in Nevada?

22 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

24 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And how long have you been  
2 working for them?

3 THE APPLICANT: Eight months.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Eight months. Okay. Are  
5 there any further --

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah, I'd like to know what  
7 company that is. I'm not familiar with that company. Do you  
8 have a license number?

9 THE APPLICANT: It's Pyramid Investigations  
10 Incorporated. I don't know if that is helpful.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, yeah, they're looking it  
12 up right now.

13 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: While they're looking that  
15 up, were there any further questions?

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: Is it Pyramid Investigations Corp  
17 or LLC? Ms. Murray, do you know?

18 THE APPLICANT: Oh, I don't know. I'm sorry.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: How long have you been working  
20 there?

21 THE APPLICANT: Almost eight months.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Do they have letterhead?

23 THE APPLICANT: They do.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: They have letterhead.

1 THE APPLICANT: Yes. Sorry. I only --  
2 everything I file is Pyramid Investigations Incorporated.  
3 It's also underneath -- they work -- he owns a couple of  
4 different companies, all-in-one bail bonds.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Do you know where the company --

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, all-in-one bail bonds.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: -- is based out of?

8 THE APPLICANT: It's also in that same building.  
9 I can give you that address.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Mr. Garcelli  
11 (phonetic) does all-in-one bail bonds.

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: What's your  
13 employer's name?

14 THE APPLICANT: It's Andy Rendshaw.

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Andy?

16 THE APPLICANT: Andrew Rendshaw.

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Rendshaw.

18 R-E-N-D-S-H-A-W?

19 THE APPLICANT: Correct.

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sorry, just...

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: All in one.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: You get your work card, what do  
24 you plan doing?

1 THE APPLICANT: Continue working for his company.  
2 I just can't go forward as far as filing the -- I was hired to  
3 do investigation work. I have to say that I actually -- all  
4 my cases were dismissed and expunged. I know -- I thought  
5 back then, after all these years, I was able to get my jobs  
6 I've had and I've never had a holdup until they denied me.

7 So I went back to check and they said everything  
8 was dismissed except my back one, I believe, and I was not  
9 aware of that. But I work for an investigator and so I do all  
10 her filing and it's confidential work.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So if you could, we're  
12 going to take a quick five-minute break. We're doing some --  
13 looking up some stuff. So we'll be right with you. Okay?

14 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

16 (Recess.)

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We lost Mr. Bobby G.  
18 So give us two minutes.

19 (Short recess.)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you. We're  
21 missing Board Member Gronauer. Hopefully he'll come in.

22 Do we have any further questions for Bernadette  
23 Murray? Okay. Hearing no further questions -- actually...

24 So you did -- Investigator Hubbell, just to bring

1 me back to present, she did admit to the felony or she did not  
2 on her original application?

3 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: She did disclose it.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. She did disclose it.  
5 Okay. Perfect. So, Board, if there's no further questions,  
6 I'll entertain a motion.

7 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I --  
8 excuse me, I move that we grant the appeal for Bernadette  
9 Murray to obtain her work card based on time and distance and  
10 the fact that she did disclose.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez, I am  
12 going to second that motion.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion, we have  
14 a second.

15 All in favor say, "aye."

16 (Motion carries.)

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations. Good luck  
18 to you. Okay? Thank you.

19 Item Number 44, John William Barns. Good  
20 afternoon, Mr. Barns.

21 THE APPLICANT: Good afternoon.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Mr. Hubbell, please tell us  
23 why we're here with Mr. Barns.

24 INVESTIGATOR HUBBELL: The Applicant was denied



1 for a 2014 felony conviction out of California that was  
2 disclosed on his application. The charge was brandishing a  
3 deadly weapon. He received 36 months probation, six days jail  
4 time and 10 days community service work.

5 In 2014, he had a misdemeanor arrest out of  
6 Nevada that was disclosed for burglary that was reduced to  
7 trespass misdemeanor and buy and possess/receive stolen  
8 property as misdemeanor. He received three days jail time,  
9 \$1,000 fines and had to attend the class. This arrest was  
10 disclosed on the application and it appears on SCOPE as well.

11 The applicant listed his arrest history at the  
12 time of the application. He was denied at the June 2021 board  
13 meeting for failure to disclose his arrest history. The  
14 applicant was denied for having a dangerous weapons conviction  
15 and is returning here today to appeal.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Any questions  
17 from the Board for Mr. Barns?

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Barns.

19 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Barns, this is Gronauer.  
21 So you've been denied before?

22 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir. Actually, you were the  
23 reason.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: We remember saying hello.

1 Okay. And when you went back, you went, did all the stuff we  
2 requested of that we have you do.

3 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir. I completed every  
4 class that they told me to do, petty larceny classes,  
5 everything. I've been clean since 2014. I've done no type of  
6 crime. I've been working, doing security, event staffing,  
7 deliveries, anything.

8 I just recently became a foster father. So I've  
9 just -- I'm doing my best to try to make myself part of the  
10 community that I'm living in and just better myself.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: I commend you for getting it  
12 all straightened out. Thank you.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
14 Mr. Barns, what do you plan to do with your work card?

15 THE APPLICANT: I plan to further it and open up  
16 my own security company. I want to eventually help out people  
17 who are not able to work as a guard and put them as events  
18 staff.

19 That's something I started off with because I  
20 didn't have no knowledge of having a guard card in Los  
21 Angeles. So I started off as an event staff and worked around  
22 numerous felons that wasn't able to, you know, work. So I  
23 want to be able to help other people and, you know, do what I  
24 can to --

1 MEMBER CORTEZ: So more of a training?

2 THE APPLICANT: No, just a security company.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

4 THE APPLICANT: A company.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Armed or unarmed.

6 THE APPLICANT: Both.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: Tell me the incident about the  
8 2014 brandishing. What were the circumstances?

9 THE APPLICANT: What you mean? With the case,  
10 like with the court?

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Like what happened? I'm a visual  
12 girl, so I need to see the violation.

13 THE APPLICANT: Well -- okay. Well, my son's  
14 mother and me got into it. She basically was cheating on me.  
15 I put her out. Her mother and her brother showed up to my  
16 door, arguing with me about her stuff. She attacked me. So  
17 the police, they showed up, arrested her because I didn't  
18 attack her.

19 So from there, they went to seek revenge, which  
20 it was. They said that I had a weapon in my house, which it  
21 was a stick with nails in it, because prior to that, me and  
22 her lived into another apartment in Palm Dale, California, and  
23 our apartment got broken into. And the police told us that  
24 there was nothing they could do about it. So --

1                   MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Understood. I get the  
2 gist of that.

3                   THE APPLICANT: I didn't have no money for a  
4 lawyer, and so I just took the deal.

5                   MEMBER CORTEZ: All right. Talk to me about the  
6 burglary where you're accused of trespass.

7                   THE APPLICANT: They said that I had a debit  
8 card.

9                   MEMBER CORTEZ: The said or did you?

10                  THE APPLICANT: They said because the debit card  
11 had my name on it. It had my name on it. I filed for a  
12 credit card around that time. It came in the mail. I woke up  
13 to my roommate giving me my mail. I didn't think nothing of  
14 it. I accessed it online. I called it in to activate it and  
15 everything.

16                  They -- once I got to Vegas, they said that the  
17 names were wrong, which I understood, because I have prior ID  
18 and Social Security problems due to the fact that my mother  
19 and my grandmother spelled my name wrong on both of those. So  
20 I grew up basically with two names.

21                  MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you.

22                  MEMBER GRONAUER: One question for sure.

23                  THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

24                  MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you understand that -- I

1 heard you say you want to start your own business.

2 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: You understand a work card, you  
4 work for somebody that's licensed.

5 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: If you have a work card, you  
7 can't hire people.

8 THE APPLICANT: Yes, I know.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: You have to get a license to  
10 hire.

11 THE APPLICANT: I know. I was going to further  
12 it once I got this work card.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I just wanted to make  
14 sure you understood all of that, sir. I'm good. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And, sir, I heard you  
16 say earlier that you were -- some of the things that you were  
17 doing to stay employed was in that security. Are you doing  
18 that here in Nevada?

19 THE APPLICANT: No, ma'am. I'm -- right now -- I  
20 was working at the airport as customer service. If -- I  
21 have -- if you would like to see it?

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Well, you can submit it.

23 THE APPLICANT: Okay. Well, I've been working  
24 customer service and doing deliveries as of right now.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

2 THE APPLICANT: I'm just trying to balance  
3 everything until I get back my work card.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir. Any  
5 further questions for Mr. Barns? Okay. Just one comment from  
6 me. It sounds like you're doing really good and great things  
7 for the community, so we appreciate you for that and your  
8 foster service. Please keep up the good work and thank you  
9 for coming back.

10 Are there -- is there a motion for Mr. Barns?

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll make a  
12 motion to overturn the denial and grant John William Barns his  
13 card.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
15 second?

16 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I second.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion, I have a  
18 second.

19 All in favor say, "aye."

20 (Motion carries.)

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir. Thank  
22 you. You're going to make us all cry.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you for taking care of  
24 business.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, thank you.

2 Edwin Gonzalez, Agenda Item Number 45.

3 THE APPLICANT: Good afternoon.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good afternoon, sir.

5 Mr. Diaz, Investigator Diaz, would you please  
6 tell us why we're here with Mr. Gonzalez.

7 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Investigator Diaz for the  
8 record. The applicant was denied for a weapons conviction out  
9 of Las Vegas, Nevada in 2019. The applicant was charged with  
10 the unlawful discharge of a weapon and received impulse  
11 control counseling, 39 hours of community service and fines  
12 and fees.

13 The applicant did disclose this arrest and  
14 submitted a written letter from P.O. at the time of applying.  
15 The applicant was not made provisionally and is here to appeal  
16 today.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Board, are there any  
18 questions for Mr. Diaz?

19 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.

20 Mr. Diaz (sic.), would you explain the incident  
21 that led to this? Am I breaking up?

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I'm sorry, this is Gonzalez.  
23 I'm so sorry, but it's still the same background.

24 MEMBER BROWN: Oh, I'm sorry.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So sorry.

2 MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Gonzalez, I'm sorry about  
3 that. Would you explain your arrest to us, the 2019 arrest?

4 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Bring the mic down.

6 THE APPLICANT: I made a mistake. I inherit a  
7 weapon from my father in law, a former marine, and it comes  
8 with a tag light on it. And it's a pretty big gun for my  
9 hands. It's an H&K USP 40, comes with a tag light on it.

10 After work -- because I don't have a holster for  
11 it, after work, what I do is I get it out of my compartment, I  
12 take off that tag light off and I put it in my holster because  
13 I'm CCW and also open carry.

14 And that particular night, I fired -- misfired on  
15 the ground. And I had basically told them myself by realizing  
16 that I have committed a crime and I just patiently sat there  
17 and waited for the cops to see if they will show up because I  
18 was in the wrong.

19 I talked to many people, they're like, you should  
20 have just run, you should have just took off. But I'm like,  
21 what if I just told the truth and what happened.

22 Because I told the truth and what happened, I got  
23 arrested. I spent the night in jail and the Court, you know,  
24 basically asked me to do anger management classes and



1 everything like that. They put me -- they give me a fine and  
2 I took care of all that.

3 But that's all it was. It was just a mistake.  
4 Being a CCW trainer, one thing is securing your gun and  
5 another thing is continuous training, and that's one of the  
6 things that I failed on. That particular day, I did not  
7 handle my gun properly and here we are, you know.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So if I could please, real  
9 quick, are you under oath, sir? Have you been sworn in?

10 THE APPLICANT: Am I what?

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are you aware you're under  
12 oath?

13 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Okay.

15 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I just needed to ask. I see  
17 new faces. Okay. Go ahead. I'm sorry.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
19 Mr. Gonzalez, where were you when you did the accidental  
20 discharge?

21 THE APPLICANT: This was after work on a --

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: Where?

23 THE APPLICANT: I believe it's Desert Springs  
24 hospital parking lot.

1 MEMBER CORTEZ: Was it on the grounds of a  
2 hospital?

3 THE APPLICANT: Parking lot, yes. I -- my  
4 background is construction, so --

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: No, I understand that.

6 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: I just wanted to know where the  
8 discharge happened. It was --

9 THE APPLICANT: Correct. So it was not just out  
10 in the field anywhere, it was in the hospital. So I'm like,  
11 you know, you need to -- like basically, you know, like I need  
12 to face the consequences.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: And you reported it? It wasn't  
14 other people in the parking lot?

15 THE APPLICANT: No, no, I just basically stood  
16 there and waited patiently to see if anything, you know, would  
17 happen and, well, it did happen.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Board Member Cortez again  
19 for Investigator Hubbell. Do you have the police report?

20 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: This is Investigator Diaz.  
21 No, Board Member, I do not have that police report.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: Diaz. You do not.

23 Mr. Gonzalez, do you happen to have a copy of  
24 your police report? I can't imagine you brought it with you

1 today, but I was just curious.

2 THE APPLICANT: I did not.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

4 THE APPLICANT: I didn't think I was going to  
5 need it.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: All right. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions for  
8 Mr. Gonzalez?

9 MEMBER BROWN: Yes, this is Board Member Brown  
10 again. Mr. Gonzalez, were there other people present when  
11 this unintentional discharge occurred?

12 THE APPLICANT: No, sir. There was actually --  
13 to my knowledge from the police officers that went ahead and  
14 conducted the arrest, because of my incident, behind me, there  
15 was construction going on and there was two individuals  
16 committing illegal activity.

17 And because of the fire shot, they were --  
18 basically were panicked and scared. They also were  
19 apprehended because of that. But, no, this was -- a fence was  
20 in between it, but there was no other innocent bystanders.

21 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And this was completely  
22 unintentional? There wasn't -- I'm trying to understand the  
23 impulse control classes. I mean, if this is an accident, I  
24 don't understand how --

1 THE APPLICANT: That is correct. This was an  
2 accident.

3 MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

4 THE APPLICANT: And I take full responsibility  
5 for it.

6 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions? Okay.  
8 No further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

9 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move to  
10 reverse the denial and grant the work card for Mr. Gonzalez  
11 based on the fact that he completed all requirements for the  
12 misdemeanor.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do we have  
14 a second?

15 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I  
16 second.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion, we  
19 have a second.

20 All in favor say, "aye."

21 (Motion carries.)

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir, your  
23 request has been --

24 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: -- approved.

2 THE APPLICANT: Thank you so much.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. They will give you a  
4 call, okay? All right.

5 Jennifer -- Agenda Item Number 46, Jennifer  
6 Goston. Ms. Goston, it's G-O-S-T-O-N, just in case I'm saying  
7 it wrong. Okay. We'll trail that.

8 Agenda Item Number 47, okay.

9 Agenda Item Number 48, Rafael Martinez-Castillo.

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Madam Chair, just for  
11 the record, for the stenographer, Agenda Item Number 47,  
12 Shafyy Judd withdrew her appeal.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And Castillo. Okay. We'll  
14 trail that. David Roberson. Roberson. Okay. Good  
15 afternoon, sir.

16 Mr. Diaz -- or Investigator Diaz, why are we here  
17 with Mr. Roberson?

18 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: The applicant was denied for  
19 a weapons conviction out of Pleasant Hill, California in 2000.  
20 The weapon charge was listed as the possession and  
21 manufacture/sale of dangerous weapon and the applicant did  
22 receive 36 months probation.

23 The applicant did disclose this arrest at the  
24 time of applying. He was denied in 2014 for the same offense

1 and did not disclose it then. The applicant was not made  
2 provisional and is here to appeal today.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for  
4 Mr. Roberson?

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.  
6 Mr. Roberson?

7 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: It says on here that you  
9 received 36 months probation. Are you still on probation?

10 THE APPLICANT: I never served one day and I went  
11 to court on it and it was thrown out.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. It says convicted and it  
13 says 36 months probation. You can't get probation unless you  
14 are convicted. Probation doesn't mean you went to jail or are  
15 staying time in jail. It means they put you on a certain  
16 program that says for the next 36 months, don't get in  
17 trouble.

18 THE APPLICANT: I never got any of that and I was  
19 in constant contact with the Court.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: And you were what?

21 THE APPLICANT: I was in constant contact with  
22 the Court.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

24 THE APPLICANT: I went to court on it and it was

1 all thrown out.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Diaz, can you help clarify  
3 that?

4 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: I have a copy of the  
5 fingerprint report right here in front of me and it says  
6 possession/manufacture of sale of dangerous weapons,  
7 convicted, probation 36 months.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
9 Sorry. Mr. Roberson, you listed that you were convicted of  
10 possession of manufacturing and selling drugs, dangerous  
11 weapons back in 2000.

12 Do we agree on that much? On your application,  
13 you listed that arrest.

14 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, I listed.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: We agree with that.

16 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So back in 2000, you were  
18 placed on probation for that violation; is that correct?

19 THE APPLICANT: I guess, yeah.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: You don't recall having to call a  
21 probation officer every so often?

22 THE APPLICANT: None of that. I never did.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: Out of -- what city?

24 THE APPLICANT: It was Pleasant Hill.

1           MEMBER CORTEZ: Investigator Diaz, do we have a  
2 name of a probation officer by any chance? I mean, this was  
3 22 years ago. I -- if an individual is placed on probation, I  
4 guarantee they're going to know, especially for 36 months, and  
5 you have to check in. I used to be one.

6           THE APPLICANT: Okay.

7           MEMBER CORTEZ: So if I didn't hear from you in  
8 36 months.

9           THE APPLICANT: I never --

10          MEMBER CORTEZ: But okay.

11          THE APPLICANT: -- heard a word.

12          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, Mr. Diaz, quick question:  
13 Has this been closed out? Is it still pending? Is it open?

14          INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: No, it looks like everything  
15 is finished and closed out.

16          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
17 the Board? Hearing there are no further questions, I'll  
18 entertain a motion.

19          MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll make a  
20 motion to overturn the denial and grant Mr. David Roberson his  
21 card for some recent time and distance.

22          MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
23 am going to second that motion, aside from I'm pretty  
24 impressed that you didn't know you were on probation.



1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
2 second.

3 All in favor say, "aye."

4 (Motion carries.)

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, sir, you'll work with  
6 the -- they'll contact you to help you get -- finish out the  
7 rest of your stuff. Thank you for putting everything on your  
8 actual application so that that can be overturned so quickly.  
9 So thank you, sir.

10 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations.

12 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Agenda Item Number 50, Darryl  
14 Scott. Is there a Darryl Scott?

15 Sir, have you been sworn in? You have? Okay.

16 Mr. Diaz or Investigator Diaz, could you please  
17 tell us why we're here with Mr. Scott.

18 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: The applicant was denied for  
19 a felony conviction out of New Orleans in 2010. The applicant  
20 was charged with second degree battery and received 20 months  
21 in prison.

22 The applicant did disclose this arrest and was  
23 aware he will be denied. The applicant was previously denied  
24 in July of 2021 for failure to disclose. The applicant was

1 not made provisional and is here to appeal today.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any questions for  
3 Mr. Scott?

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

5 Mr. Scott, what are you plan on doing if you get  
6 a card?

7 THE APPLICANT: I plan on just a career in  
8 security.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: You need to -- I'm sorry, try  
10 again.

11 THE APPLICANT: I plan on getting my card and  
12 starting a career in security. I currently do car detailing,  
13 which doesn't pay enough. I have three kids and I'm just  
14 trying to better myself.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have a job lined up?

16 THE APPLICANT: No, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
18 the Board?

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

20 Mr. Scott, have you had any experience working in  
21 security or law enforcement capacity?

22 THE APPLICANT: No, ma'am.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: Why the sudden interest?

24 THE APPLICANT: Everyone tells me you size and

1 security would be a nice career for me if I decide to do it,  
2 so...

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. My next question is:  
4 Are you going to look into armed or unarmed?

5 THE APPLICANT: I have --

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is why I'm asking. I  
7 absolutely appreciate your stature and your size and all that.  
8 But being in that position, are you prepared to take the  
9 consequences that you may or may not have to do?

10 And for somebody -- just because somebody tells  
11 you your size, that's a little concerning because it's going  
12 to involve a lot of training and your mindset to being -- so  
13 I -- that's why I was kind of curious as to where you're at.

14 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, maybe unarmed. But I'm  
15 willing to work, you know.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. And it sounds like  
17 you're definitely willing to work. I just want you to be  
18 prepared if you're going into this line of work, it's not just  
19 your regular 9 to 5. We carry a lot more responsibility than  
20 the average person. So just take that into consideration.

21 THE APPLICANT: I understand. I appreciate it.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Madam Chair, for the  
23 record, Kevin Ingram. He is a convicted felon so he would be  
24 unable to work card.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: And because you're a convicted  
3 felon, it limits you only in certain places, not every place.  
4 Okay? You can still work as a security guard, okay?

5 THE APPLICANT: All right.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: A security professional, all  
7 right? And you can still work -- and it's up to the company  
8 who wants to hire you or not hire you. What happened --  
9 you've been car detailing? That's all you've been doing for  
10 the last 12 years?

11 THE APPLICANT: Well, I've been doing that since  
12 I've been in Vegas because I came out here to help my father  
13 during COVID.

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: When did you come out?

15 THE APPLICANT: 2000 and, I believe, 19.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. No problem. You've had  
17 no run-ins with the law?

18 THE APPLICANT: No, no run-ins.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you, sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions for  
21 Mr. Scott? Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll  
22 entertain a motion.

23 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
24 move that we grant the appeal and allow Mr. Scott to get his

1 work card.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez, I  
4 motion -- I second the motion, sorry.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
6 second.

7 All in favor say, "aye."

8 (Motion carries.)

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir. Thank  
10 you. Thanks for documenting everything.

11 Agenda Item Number 51, Elvis Tuck. Is Elvis Tuck  
12 in? Good afternoon, sir. Sir, are you under oath?

13 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You swore in earlier?

15 THE APPLICANT: No, but I signed it.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So if there's anybody out in  
17 the audience who has just walked in and is not under oath,  
18 please stand so we can swear you in.

19 MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

20 (Multiple people sworn.)

21 MS. HARRIS: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Thank you.

23 Investigator Diaz, why are we here with Mr. Tuck?

24 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: The applicant was denied for

1 the conviction of a felony out of Riverside, California in  
2 2011. The applicant was charged with the participating and  
3 criminal street gangs plus a gang enhancement and received  
4 13 years in prison.

5 The applicant also has a 2008 felony conviction  
6 for possession of a controlled substance and was sentenced to  
7 16 months in prison. He also has a 2006 Conviction for street  
8 gang activity to threaten and terrorize, was sentenced to four  
9 years in prison.

10 And he also has a 2002 felony conviction to  
11 obstructing and resist an executive officer and was sentenced  
12 to 36 months in prison. The applicant did disclose all  
13 arrests and was aware he will be denied.

14 The applicant does have an extensive arrest  
15 history with severe outcomes and serious charges, but the  
16 applicant was not made provisional and is here to appeal  
17 today.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Can I ask just for my own  
19 understanding, what is the resisting of an executive officer?  
20 Is that police?

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: A peace officer.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

23 THE APPLICANT: That was --

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, hang on. Are there any

1 questions from the Board?

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This Board Member Cortez.

3 Mr. Tuck, what -- are you still an active gang  
4 member?

5 THE APPLICANT: No, I'm out of California. I  
6 changed my life and move out.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: But are you still an active gang?

8 THE APPLICANT: No, just retired.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And what gang was that?

10 THE APPLICANT: Corona.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you have some kind of  
12 ranking?

13 THE APPLICANT: No, just regular. It was like  
14 more of like a family thing, not like --

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: All right. I'm well versed on  
16 the gang life.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
18 the Board?

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: What are you doing now, sir?

20 THE APPLICANT: Right now, I was working at the  
21 Raider Stadium.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry? I didn't hear you.

23 THE APPLICANT: I was working at the Raider  
24 Stadium being a janitor, but the security guy wanted me to

1 resign there and get a job in security. So I quit doing the  
2 janitor work and that's why I signed up for the PIL card. And  
3 he said if I get it granted, I can work there to help him out.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: How long have you lived in  
5 Las Vegas?

6 THE APPLICANT: Like a year and a half now with  
7 my dad and --

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: You have not been in any  
9 trouble?

10 THE APPLICANT: No, over -- I haven't got in  
11 trouble since 2011.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you married?

13 THE APPLICANT: Getting married. My girlfriend  
14 is right there in the back.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

16 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

17 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.

18 Mr. Tuck, you're retired from the gang life, you  
19 said. Are you still in contact with any active gang members?

20 THE APPLICANT: No, I'm not.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You have to get closer to the  
22 mic.

23 THE APPLICANT: Oh, no, I'm not, sir.

24 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.



1 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. Are  
2 you currently on any hit lists that you are aware of?

3 THE APPLICANT: Oh, no, I'm being -- I mean, I  
4 just -- I did my --

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you jump out?

6 THE APPLICANT: No, I did my time and I just  
7 left, like moved out, doing the family life now.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you. Last question:  
9 Any known threats to you and/or your family members?

10 THE APPLICANT: No, everyone respects me. I'm  
11 doing the family life.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: Can I hear from your fiancée,  
13 please? Could I have you approach?

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we'll have to swear you in  
15 real quick.

16 (Sworn.)

17 MS. HARRIS: Thank you.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. How  
19 long have you guys been together?

20 THE APPLICANT: Like almost a year.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Could you give me some kind of  
22 background? Like what do you -- what are your morals and  
23 values? What's your opinion --

24 MS. MORRELL: Mine?

1 MEMBER CORTEZ: Um-hum. What's your opinion of  
2 him?

3 MS. MORRELL: I don't -- I'm really nervous right  
4 now.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Do you think he should work in a  
6 security --

7 MS. MORRELL: I think so.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: Why?

9 MS. MORRELL: He's a good person. I don't know,  
10 just share his life. He already has. He's takes care of my  
11 kids with me. He helps me out with them. We have our own  
12 place together. We're doing, you know --

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: Have you guys been into a heated  
14 argument yet?

15 MS. MORRELL: No.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: Are you a yeller?

17 MS. MORRELL: (Shakes head.)

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And the reason why I'm  
19 asking you is because, again, when you're in a position and  
20 you come -- and you know this. When you have people who come  
21 with an attitude towards you, you are going to come  
22 aggressively.

23 And if you haven't really checked your anger and  
24 your behavior and your mental state, you're going to place

1 yourself in a position of impropriety. So that's why I kind  
2 of wanted to hear from you because you're going to know it  
3 before any of us will.

4 MS. MORRELL: Yeah.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

6 MEMBER BROWN: Wait, just a minute. Before you  
7 leave, ma'am, we need your name for the record.

8 MS. MORRELL: Jillian Morrell. Jillian Morrell.  
9 M-O-R-R-E-L-L.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Okay. Any  
11 further questions for Mr. Tuck?

12 Okay. No further questions, I'll entertain a  
13 motion.

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
15 going to motion that we overturn the denial and grant Mr. Tuck  
16 his work card.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Was there a question or -- up  
18 north?

19 MEMBER BEZICK: No, I was going to --

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion --

21 MEMBER BEZICK: I was going to make the motion,  
22 but Ms. Cortez did. This is Bezick. I will --

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a --

24 MEMBER BEZICK: I will second the motion.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
2 second.

3 All in favor say, "aye."

4 (Motion carries.)

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So the motion passes.  
6 You will get your work card, okay? Make sure you keep on the  
7 up and narrow. We want to make sure that we're doing the  
8 right thing. So we appreciate you doing and changing your  
9 life. We appreciate that, okay?

10 THE APPLICANT: Thank you, guys.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Thank you. Okay.  
12 Agenda Item Number 52, Daniel Brown. Mr. Brown,  
13 are you here? Okay.

14 Mr. Saladino -- or Investigator Saladino, why are  
15 we here with Mr. Brown?

16 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
17 the record. The applicant was denied for disclosing in 2009 a  
18 misdemeanor conviction out of California for possession,  
19 manufacture or sale of dangerous weapon. He was convicted and  
20 received 12 months probation.

21 The applicant disclosed his arrest, provided  
22 court documents, including his 1203.4 dismissal and now he's  
23 here to appeal.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. First, thank you for

1 making sure you had all your documentation and putting it on  
2 your actual application.

3 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Brown?

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

5 Mr. Brown, good afternoon. What are you planning  
6 on doing with a work card?

7 THE APPLICANT: I'm trying to switch jobs right  
8 now. I work for the jail, a private company at the jail.  
9 They transferred me from California where I was driving, so my  
10 brother works for Guarda in California.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: Move the microphone.

12 THE APPLICANT: My brother works for Guarda in  
13 California in Oakland. So I'm trying to switching careers  
14 pretty much.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: What jail are you working at?

16 THE APPLICANT: Clark County jail, but I go to  
17 Sloan County jail over there on Sloan Avenue and then downtown  
18 jail on Stewart.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: What do you do there?

20 THE APPLICANT: Well, they hired me. They bring  
21 me in as manager of the warehouse, but then I demoted myself  
22 for the driver.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions

1 for Mr. Brown? Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll  
2 entertain a motion.

3 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
4 move we grant the appeal and allow Mr. Brown to get his work  
5 card.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We a motion. Do we  
7 have a second?

8 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I second.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion, we  
10 have a second.

11 All in favor say, "aye."

12 (Motion carries.)

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Motion passes. They will get  
14 in contact with you to get your work card.

15 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Eric Caldwell.  
17 Is Mr. Caldwell here? Oh, that was postponed. Okay. Sorry.  
18 I got two agendas.

19 Mr. Kajohenae Cannon. Mr. Cannon, are you in the  
20 audience? Oh, yeah. Okay. We'll trail that one until the  
21 end.

22 Nedra Chambers. Nedra, good afternoon.  
23 Investigator Saladino, why are we here with Nedra Chambers?

24 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for

1 the record. The applicant was denied for failure to disclose  
2 1997 felony forgery out of California. There was no  
3 disposition listed on the fingerprint report.

4 2007, there was a misdemeanor out of California  
5 for possession of narcotics, forgery, driving without a  
6 license. She was convicted of the driving without a license  
7 and received 24 months probation.

8 2009 misdemeanor conviction -- or misdemeanor  
9 possession of a controlled substance. There was no  
10 disposition either on her fingerprint report for this one.  
11 The applicant was requested to gather the court docs regarding  
12 this arrest. As of this report, no reports have been  
13 received.

14 2018, out of California, driving on a suspended  
15 license, DUI with priors. Again, the applicant was requested  
16 to gather court documents and no court documents have been  
17 received.

18 I called this applicant on February 15th of '22  
19 to have her disclose her arrest and provide court documents.  
20 The applicant stated the arrests are old, they should be off  
21 my record and then she hung up.

22 When she submitted her appeal, she listed the  
23 case numbers, did not provide any dispositions for the  
24 history. She's here to appeal.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for  
2 Ms. -- yeah, Chambers?

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. Hi,  
4 good afternoon.

5 THE APPLICANT: Hi.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: Let's hear it, Ms. Chambers.

7 THE APPLICANT: At the time, I didn't do the time  
8 for the crime. And at the time, I didn't know that due to the  
9 case being misdemeanors and dismissed, I was unaware that the  
10 misdemeanor cases were needed.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So you've -- why did you  
12 fail to list your criminal history? Let's start there.

13 THE APPLICANT: Why did I fail not to?

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: Why did you not list it on the  
15 application?

16 THE APPLICANT: Because I was unaware about it.  
17 I was just trying to get a card to go to work.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Are you aware that  
19 it specifically states to list everything?

20 THE APPLICANT: Yes, now, and we did list.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Perfect. Thank you. No further  
22 questions.

23 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.  
24 Ms. Chambers, why the attitude with our



1 investigator?

2 THE APPLICANT: Because at the time I was going  
3 through a lot with my family and myself. But my attitude is  
4 different and better now.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So -- and I'm sorry if  
6 there's a follow-up to that, but my question would be: We  
7 have no documents. What do you expect us to do here?

8 THE APPLICANT: I'm sorry?

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have no documents.

10 THE APPLICANT: Because when I contacted the  
11 courts, they said there was nothing there, and where I work,  
12 they said there's nothing. I work for the Plaza Casino and  
13 they said I don't see anything.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, you know, I guess  
15 we probably should have had some documents just saying that  
16 they were closed out or they don't find anything. But  
17 according to your fingerprints, we do have actual stuff. So  
18 it's -- you know, you're asking us for a work card.

19 THE APPLICANT: (Nodded head.)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You're asking for us your  
21 trust, right?

22 THE APPLICANT: (Nodded head.)

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So the expectation is that  
24 you do some of the follow-up. They're doing their

1 investigation, they come to you, they ask for the information.  
2 So the very least that you could do is provide the  
3 documentation that it's closed out. So that's my two cents.

4 But are there any further questions? Okay.  
5 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a motion for  
6 Ms. Chambers.

7 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move that we  
8 uphold the denial based on the nondisclosure.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion. Do we  
10 have a second?

11 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
12 will second.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
14 second.

15 All in favor say, "aye."

16 (Motion carries.)

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So your work card will  
18 not be granted. My suggestion is you have the opportunity to  
19 come back in a year. Please provide all the documents that  
20 are requested and just do some of that backup work.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: You have everything here, so you  
23 have all of it if you're going to reapply.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

1                   Agenda Item Number 56, Trevon Conner. Is Trevon  
2 here? Sorry.

3                   Okay. Agenda Item Number 57, Shardae Davis.  
4 Shardae. Okay. Good afternoon, ma'am.

5                   Investigator Saladino, why are we here with  
6 Ms. Davis?

7                   INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
8 the record. The applicant was denied for a nondisclosure of a  
9 2004 felony burglary conviction out of California, a 2006  
10 felony transport or sale of a controlled substance out of  
11 California.

12                  And let's see. The applicant was made  
13 provisional, but was not added to any company's roster. The  
14 applicant was requested, again, to gather court documents for  
15 these cases. However, as of this date, we do not have them  
16 and she wishes to appeal.

17                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any  
18 questions for Ms. Davis?

19                  MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

20                  Ms. Davis, do you have any court papers with you  
21 today?

22                  THE APPLICANT: No, ma'am. I didn't even realize  
23 that I was supposed to bring court documents. I've never done  
24 any security or anything like that. I've done a whole bunch

1 of other jobs since then.

2           So when I applied for this, it was like, girl,  
3 you can do it, it's Burger King. I applied, you know, I had  
4 money tax time. I'm like, you know what, let me try something  
5 different. And so I'm just coming to see --

6           MEMBER CORTEZ: Understand.

7           THE APPLICANT: -- what the process is and  
8 whatever I need to do to get in.

9           MEMBER CORTEZ: Understand. I do appreciate all  
10 your efforts in at least trying.

11          THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

12          MEMBER GRONAUER: Ms. Davis -- this is Gronauer.  
13 Ms. Davis, do you understand the process now?

14          THE APPLICANT: Yep, I surely do.

15          MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. And what will be  
16 expected of you?

17          THE APPLICANT: I'm assuming I reapply with  
18 documentation and all proof of whatever I need to bring next  
19 time.

20          MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes, ma'am.

21          MEMBER GRONAUER: That's great, you know, and  
22 this is the only two that are listed here that we found, and  
23 it might be only two that are at risk. If it is, check with  
24 the investigators -- not today, check with investigators and

1 redo that application if that's what happens at the end of  
2 this meeting, okay?

3 THE APPLICANT: Oh, okay.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: (Microphone not on.) We have  
5 made --

6 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any other questions  
9 for Ms. Davis? Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll  
10 entertain a motion.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I make a  
12 motion to uphold denial of Shardae Davis who applied for a  
13 work card because she never reported past history.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we  
15 have a second?

16 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
17 second, and add that, Mr. Gronauer, we are still having a very  
18 difficult time hearing you.

19 (Discussion off the record.)

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Mr. Brown, I got it.  
21 Thank you. I left my seat a long time ago.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So do we need to redo the  
23 motion then?

24 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I

1 will redo the motion and second the motion to grant the  
2 appeal.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Okay. Thank you.  
4 So we have a motion, we have a second to uphold the denial.  
5 You are absolute -- oh, we have a motion, we have a second.

6 All in favor say, "aye."

7 (Motion carries.)

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So you are -- thank  
9 you. You're absolutely correct. Come and see us in a year.  
10 You have the application, you can use the same documentation  
11 to fill out your new one.

12 THE APPLICANT: All right.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And then, you know, you  
14 should be in a good place when you come back here.

15 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay? So thank you very  
17 much. Good luck to you.

18 MEMBER BROWN: Madam Chair?

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes?

20 MEMBER BROWN: Could I request a break for the  
21 north.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes. Absolutely.

23 MEMBER BROWN: Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So ten minutes. Thanks,

1 guys.

2 (Recess.)

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We're going to move  
4 on, Agenda Item Number 58, Ms. Grayson. Thank you so much.  
5 Good afternoon.

6 Investigator Saladino, why are we here with  
7 Ms. Grayson?

8 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
9 the record. The applicant was denied for a nondisclosure of a  
10 1983 felony out of Minnesota for attempt theft by false  
11 representation, convicted, received a suspended jail sentence  
12 and 18 months probation. 1984, aggravated forgery out of  
13 Minnesota, felony. Received five years probation, 15 months  
14 prison and six months jail and restitution.

15 1987, felony, financial transaction card fraud,  
16 convicted, received 17 months in prison, again, out of  
17 Minnesota. 2015, out of Oklahoma, felony, obtain or attempt  
18 to obtain controlled substance with false pretense or forged  
19 prescription. Convicted, received a deferred sentence for one  
20 year and then the case was reduced.

21 2006, misdemeanor out of Ohio for domestic  
22 violence. This was an arrest only as there was no charges  
23 filed. The applicant is here to appeal.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have -- do we

1 have any questions for Ms. Grayson?

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

3 Ms. Grayson, good afternoon. Why didn't you  
4 disclose this stuff? You already knew it.

5 THE APPLICANT: Well, I don't want to sound like  
6 a repeat broken record in here.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: That's okay.

8 THE APPLICANT: When they say ten years, I  
9 thought that's exactly what they meant, too.

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: When they said what?

11 THE APPLICANT: Only go back ten years.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Where did that come at?

13 THE APPLICANT: I don't know. That's just what  
14 the piece of paper says.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: It does not say that.

16 THE APPLICANT: When you said it then, I said,  
17 okay, I heard it too many times. So it got to be correct.  
18 But that's the reason why.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: The paper does not say ten  
20 years.

21 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: I mean, you know, again, I  
23 honestly have to say this for the people that weren't here  
24 before. A lot of things are long ago, okay? No matter what



1 their crime or whatever the crime or arrest was for, right?

2 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: It was long ago. If you just  
4 disclose it, there's a good chance -- there's a better chance  
5 that you're going to get your work card. It's up. How can I  
6 speak up anymore? Stop.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We're getting. We're getting  
8 signals.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, I can't help it. It's  
10 there.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Got you.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: I can't even get any closer. I  
13 need to lose another 20 pounds.

14 Here's the deal, okay? What I'm saying is just  
15 for benefit of everyone here, that, you know, there was a good  
16 chance you could have gotten your work card without any  
17 hassle. I'm not saying you didn't get it yet because we have  
18 to vote.

19 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: But please, everyone, list  
21 whatever your history is. I don't care if you need three  
22 pages. You can clip it all together and give it to the  
23 investigator. He'll be happy.

24 THE APPLICANT: I understand. I was a nurse for

1 15 years and they never looked at things like that.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: What are you doing now?

3 THE APPLICANT: Well, right now, my husband is a  
4 vet and his daughter just came and took power of attorney over  
5 him when he had COVID and I had it, too. So he's gone and I  
6 have a couple jobs lined up, but I can't work because I don't  
7 got the card.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you, ma'am.

9 THE APPLICANT: (Nodded head.)

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
11 for Ms. Grayson? Okay. Hearing there's no further questions,  
12 I'll entertain a motion.

13 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
14 move that we uphold the denial for failure to disclose.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
16 we have a second?

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
19 second.

20 All in favor say, "aye."

21 (Motion carries.)

22 THE APPLICANT: One year?

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes. Please reapply in one  
24 year. You have all the information, they'll help you get

1 through that, okay?

2 THE APPLICANT: All right.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Thank you.

4 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Good luck.

6 We can hear you now. Agenda Item Number 59, John  
7 Howard.

8 Investigator Saladino, why are we here with  
9 Mr. Howard?

10 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
11 the record. The applicant was denied for a nondisclosure,  
12 misdemeanor, possession, manufacture, sale of dangerous weapon  
13 out of California. He was convicted and received 24 months  
14 probation.

15 The applicant stated he had been working security  
16 in California and forgot to secure his firearm when he had  
17 gotten pulled over. The applicant has had a California guard  
18 card since 1984. 1990, out of California, there was a  
19 misdemeanor for possession of a controlled substance.

20 The applicant completed a diversion program and  
21 the case was dismissed. These were not disclosed. He was  
22 made provisional, but was not added to any licensees roster  
23 and now he's here to appeal.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any

1 questions for Mr. Howard?

2 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.

3 Mr. Howard, why did you fail to disclose these?

4 THE APPLICANT: It was my mistake that I didn't  
5 disclose the issue. I guess at the -- I was assuming that the  
6 time period and that main felony was my mistake.

7 MEMBER BROWN: I mean, the time period is, you  
8 know, something that we consider here. Had you disclosed  
9 these, this would have been a real easy thing to deal with.

10 THE APPLICANT: I understand.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: What company did you work for  
12 in California?

13 THE APPLICANT: I worked for Hughes Aircraft  
14 company.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And you worked for  
16 them for how long?

17 THE APPLICANT: Seven years.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And how long have you  
19 been in Nevada?

20 THE APPLICANT: I've been in Nevada four years.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Have you been working  
22 in security for those four years?

23 THE APPLICANT: No, I've been caring for my  
24 elderly parents.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

2 THE APPLICANT: My dad has Parkinson's and my mom  
3 had congestive heart failure.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And so now you're  
5 going back into the work force?

6 THE APPLICANT: Hopefully, yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
8 the Board? Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll  
9 entertain a motion.

10 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we uphold  
11 the denial based on nondisclosure.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
13 a second?

14 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I will  
15 second.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion, we  
17 have a second.

18 All in favor say, "aye."

19 (Motion carries.)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we've upheld the ruling,  
21 okay? This is a really hard one for us because -- I know for  
22 me personally, because it has been so long ago. It would have  
23 been really easy for us to say yes to you.

24 You seem like a nice guy and it's been a long

1 time. So please reapply and, again, we have all the  
2 information that you give to us and, again, provided to us,  
3 but thank you.

4 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

5 (Motion carries.)

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Lashawn -- Agenda Item  
7 Number 60, Lashawn Logan.

8 THE APPLICANT: Good morning.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good afternoon.

10 Investigator Saladino, why are we here with  
11 Lashawn?

12 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
13 the record. The applicant was denied for a 1992 felony  
14 conviction out of California for a robbery, second degree, was  
15 convicted and received an 8-year prison sentence, served four.  
16 The applicant was made provisional, but was not added to any  
17 licensee roster and is here to appeal.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any questions for Ms. Logan?  
19 Can I ask one question, are you under oath?

20 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am, I am.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. All right. Hearing  
22 there are no questions, I'll entertain a motion.

23 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we uphold  
24 the denial based on nondisclosure.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
2 second?

3 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
4 second.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
6 second.

7 All in favor say, "aye."

8 (Motion carries.)

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, again, this is a real  
10 hard one for us because this was so long ago. Had you just  
11 put it on your application, we wouldn't deny it.

12 THE APPLICANT: I did. The problem was -- okay.  
13 The young lady at the office gave me two applications as she  
14 did everyone prior to in case you mess up. I was in a hurry  
15 because I had to get to work.

16 I did put it on the application, but when I  
17 looked at the application, it was just sloppy. It wasn't me.  
18 I rewrote it and I just -- I missed it.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We can only go by what we  
20 have.

21 THE APPLICANT: Right.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah. So please come back  
23 and see us in a year and then we'll definitely consider the  
24 application, okay?

1 THE APPLICANT: Fair enough. Thank you so much.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

3 Agenda Item Number 61, Michael Mann. Good  
4 afternoon, sir.

5 THE APPLICANT: Good afternoon.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Have you been sworn in?

7 THE APPLICANT: Yes, I have.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Investigator Saladino,  
9 why are we here for Mr. Mann?

10 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
11 the record. The applicant was denied for a 2000 felony  
12 conviction out of Colorado for burglary where he received 18  
13 months prison sentence. 2006, out of Colorado, for a felony,  
14 possession of a controlled substance. Received 90 days  
15 suspended and 90 days probation.

16 2006, misdemeanor conviction out of Colorado for  
17 theft of a motor vehicle. He was convicted of the lesser  
18 charge, which is the misdemeanor and continued on with  
19 probation for the previous conviction from February.

20 2011, felony, possession of a controlled  
21 substance. Convicted, received two years probation, again,  
22 out of Colorado.

23 2018, felony, possession of a weapon by prior  
24 offender. This was actually dismissed by the TA out of



1 Colorado.

2 The applicant was also a habitual traffic  
3 offender in Colorado and has had numerous traffic offenses and  
4 failure to appear. The applicant disclosed his arrest history  
5 after he was denied. He was made provisional and was added to  
6 a licensees roster and now wishes to appeal.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any questions for  
8 Mr. Mann?

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

10 Mr. Mann, why did you fail to disclose any kind  
11 of criminal contact -- law enforcement contact?

12 THE APPLICANT: Well, I just moved up here from  
13 Colorado. So Colorado law is just a little bit different from  
14 Vegas. So in Colorado --

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, can I stop you there?  
16 You moved up here from Colorado to Nevada.

17 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And you're a resident of  
19 Nevada.

20 THE APPLICANT: Yes, now I am.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So now you have to follow  
22 Nevada rules.

23 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And then you read the

1 application, right?

2 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So the application  
4 says anytime, anywhere, any -- any, anything, right?

5 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So basically you just  
7 disregarded it and went back to Colorado?

8 THE APPLICANT: No. I went down to metro first.  
9 So the system at metro, when I went down there and applied,  
10 they told me just go off of what I can remember. A lot of  
11 stuff is old, 2000 -- a lot of stuff when I was a kid.

12 So I really couldn't remember everything. So I  
13 tried to go off of the dates and times as much as possible.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: But when you made the initial  
15 application, did you put any of this information down?

16 THE APPLICANT: The best I can do. I didn't know  
17 it was going to go back to 2000.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, sir, it says in your  
19 application that you did not put anything down. You put it  
20 down after you were asked about it, after your finger --

21 THE APPLICANT: See, I didn't know. That's what  
22 I'm saying. So I asked them, so they gave me what I needed to  
23 put on the application because I was confused with the  
24 application. So I sat there and talked to the investigator.

1 He's like, this is what you have -- this is what you put on  
2 the application.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions?  
4 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

5 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
6 move that we uphold the denial based on failure to disclose  
7 and criminal history.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion.  
9 Do we have a second?

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
11 I'll second that motion.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
13 second.

14 All in favor say, "aye."

15 (Motion carries.)

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You're in Nevada. Read the  
17 applications. It's very clear. It says anytime, anywhere,  
18 any -- any interaction, okay? They have all your information  
19 there. You can utilize that application as a reference. If  
20 you wish, we can see you back in one year.

21 THE APPLICANT: Okay. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

23 Item Number 62, Deonte Marshall. Good afternoon.  
24 Are you under oath, sir?

1 THE APPLICANT: (No audible response.)

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

3 Investigator Saladino, why are we here with  
4 Mr. Marshall?

5 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
6 the record. The applicant was denied for a nondisclosure of  
7 2010 felony conviction out of California for theft from a  
8 person. He was convicted and received 36 months probation,  
9 which was revoked and he was sentenced to two years in prison.

10 Once denied, the applicant did provide us 1203.4  
11 dismissal paperwork from California. That -- the first one  
12 was in April of 2010.

13 The second one, August of 2010, felony possession  
14 of a controlled substance. This was the cause of his  
15 probation to be revoked in the first case.

16 2011, felony possession of a firearm, was again  
17 convicted and those were those two years in prison for that.  
18 2014, out of California, misdemeanor, carrying a concealed  
19 weapon in a vehicle. He received 36 months probation and,  
20 again, once he was denied, he provided us 1203.4 paperwork.

21 2015, felony out of California for assault with  
22 force, causing great bodily injury. Received three years  
23 probation and, again, provided us 1203.4 documentation after  
24 it had been denied. Now he's here to appeal.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So can I ask, in the 2010 and  
2 the 2011, are those stacked or is it -- they're separate  
3 incidents?

4 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: The -- both ones in 2010  
5 were separate incidents, but what they did was they revoked  
6 the probation from the first case and that's where they got  
7 the two years of prison from to include the August 4th felony  
8 possession of a firearm.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you. Are there  
10 any questions for Mr. Marshall?

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

12 Mr. Marshall, why did you fail to disclose any of  
13 your criminal history until you were asked?

14 THE APPLICANT: Like I said earlier, I was fresh  
15 from California. I've only been here four months. I know I  
16 did the dismiss stuff out there. And I was moving fast, I  
17 just got here.

18 I was trying to hurry up and get a job since I  
19 had just moved out here. So I didn't do it. So then when it  
20 came -- when the denial letter came in, I just got all my  
21 paperwork together and run it again.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Understood. Again, just  
23 for those reading the minutes, Page 6 of 14, the arrest  
24 history is actual one whole page. It's an entire page of the

1 application.

2 And it specifically says to list all arrests,  
3 citations, orders to appear in court and all felony, gross  
4 misdemeanor or misdemeanor charges, regardless of how long  
5 ago, regardless if it occurred in another state or if you were  
6 not placed in handcuffs, if it was expunged, dismissed or  
7 denied, or if under California PC 1203.4. No parking listed.

8 So I have an issue when we're bypassing --  
9 literally a 14-page packet, we're bypassing Number 6, which is  
10 probably the most important one in the entire packet.

11 That's all.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
13 the Board? Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a  
14 motion.

15 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move that we  
16 uphold the denial based on nondisclosure.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
18 we have a second?

19 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
20 will second.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
22 second.

23 All in favor say, "aye."

24 (Motion carries.)

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So you are not going to get  
2 your work card. Like everyone else, you have the information  
3 at the actual PILB now. Please feel free to apply in one  
4 year. Good luck to you, sir.

5 THE APPLICANT: All right.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Robert Marshall, Item --  
7 Agenda Item Number 63. Good afternoon, sir.

8 Investigator Saladino, why are we here for  
9 Mr. Marshall -- oh, another Marshall. Got it. Oh, okay. I  
10 got you.

11 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino.  
12 The applicant denied for a nondisclosure of a felony case out  
13 of California for statutory rape, any person over 21 who  
14 engages in sexual intercourse under 16. He was convicted and  
15 received three years probation, DV and sex offender classes.

16 After being denied, he did provide his court  
17 documents showing after the completion of probation and the  
18 classes, the case was dismissed under 1203.4. It was  
19 dismissed on 7/23 of '12.

20 2006, it was a misdemeanor for domestic violence  
21 out of California. This was just an arrest only. This was  
22 dismissed by the Court.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Was Mr. Marshall ever  
24 granted a provisional card?

1 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Yes, he was made  
2 provisional.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for  
4 Mr. Marshall?

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,  
6 asking Mr. Marshall the same thing: Why did we fail to  
7 disclose until after you were asked by the investigators?

8 THE APPLICANT: Well, I never applied for a work  
9 card before. So I had to go -- I didn't really know how far  
10 it went back. So I had to go to California to get all the  
11 documentation, which I have right here.

12 Whenever I had to go get expungements and stuff  
13 that I have. So, again, I got denied, but I was already  
14 working. I haven't been in trouble since 2005.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: Right. But my question was why  
16 you failed to disclose it, and what I heard was you were just  
17 kind of going a little too fast and did not read the fine  
18 print.

19 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, yeah. I didn't.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Understood. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, just one quick question,  
22 are you under oath?

23 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You were sworn in?



1 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Just want to make  
3 sure. Any other questions for Mr. Marshall? No? Okay. Any  
4 questions up north? Okay. Hearing there are no further  
5 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

6 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member --

8 MEMBER BROWN: Go ahead.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: Go ahead, Mr. Brown.

10 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
11 move that we uphold the denial based on failure to disclose.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
13 we have a second?

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
15 I'll second that motion.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
17 second.

18 All in favor say, "aye."

19 (Motion carries.)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, again, sir, you're  
21 being denied again because of nondisclosure. You can work  
22 with the PILB Board at another time to get all of your  
23 information and please make sure you disclose everything so we  
24 are able to consider the application.

1 THE APPLICANT: All right.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Thank you. Good  
3 luck.

4 Agenda Item Number 40 -- I'm sorry, 64, Edward  
5 Mesa. Good afternoon. Investigator Saladino.

6 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
7 the record. Madam Chair, I'm not going to go ahead and read  
8 through the arrest history.

9 Mr. Mesa is returning from last year's September  
10 board meeting where he was -- the Board upheld his denial  
11 because there was some confusion regarding a case out of  
12 California from 2000 where it was a misdemeanor conviction for  
13 domestic violence. He had listed a coercion and there was  
14 some -- or insufficient funds case.

15 Since his last denial and the Board upheld when  
16 we -- the applicant reapplied, came into the office, sat down.  
17 We went through his entire arrest history so we have  
18 disclosure on all his arrest history.

19 Since then, he has had no contact with law  
20 enforcement and, you know, did everything the Board had asked  
21 him. He's here now for his appeal.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
23 questions for Mr. Mesa? Okay. Hearing there are no  
24 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

1 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board --

3 MEMBER BROWN: I move that we grant the appeal  
4 and allow Mr. Mesa to get his work card based on the fact that  
5 he did what we asked him to do and returned in a year.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez, I'll  
7 second that motion.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
9 second.

10 All in favor say, "aye."

11 (Motion carries.)

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So the motion passes.

13 They'll get in touch with you and you can move forward with a  
14 work card, okay?

15 THE APPLICANT: Thank you very much.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah, congratulations. Thank  
17 you for coming back.

18 Okay. Julian Oates, Agenda Item Number 65.

19 Julian Oates. Okay. We will trail that.

20 Clementtee Reed has withdrawn, so Agenda Item 66  
21 has withdrawn, Clementtee Reed.

22 Agenda Item Number 67, Jajuan Rodgers.

23 THE APPLICANT: Jajuan.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Jajuan. Good afternoon, sir.

1 Have you been sworn in?

2 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Investigator Saladino,  
4 why are we here with Mr. Rodgers?

5 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
6 the record. The applicant was denied for a nondisclosure of a  
7 2021 misdemeanor conviction out of California for carrying a  
8 concealed weapon and possession of a controlled substance  
9 without a valid prescription. He was convicted and received  
10 one year probation.

11 Once the applicant was denied, he did provide  
12 court documents and the police report for this arrest. The  
13 police report stated that Rodgers was pulled over while  
14 driving, refused to follow commands to stay in the vehicle and  
15 exited.

16 Once Rodgers complied with officers, he was  
17 patted down and the officer found a loaded handgun in his  
18 front pocket. A controlled substance was found in his  
19 backpack with approximately \$1500.

20 The application -- the applicant is now here to  
21 appeal.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So the applicant did  
23 not disclose.

24 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Correct.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Was he ever granted a  
2 work card -- or a provisional?

3 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: He was made provisional  
4 and was added to our roster.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Okay. Any questions  
6 for Mr. Rodgers?

7 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I'll  
8 ask the question of the day: Why did you fail to disclose  
9 this, Mr. Rodgers?

10 THE APPLICANT: When I was filling out the  
11 application, I honestly remembered them asking me about --  
12 because usually they say, have you been convicted of a felony?  
13 So I didn't put anything. All I remember it saying was about  
14 a misdemeanor. I would have put it. I always keep it real so  
15 if I would have seen it, I would have put it in.

16 But that's why I didn't put it down. I only  
17 remember applying for that job. I was just applying to a  
18 whole bunch of different jobs. That's the first one that  
19 called me back and that's why I started working there for the  
20 temporary.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: So this is Board Member Cortez.  
22 I do have a question. Tell me the circumstances regarding  
23 when you got pulled over and you failed to comply with officer  
24 requests.

1 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, that's when I was living in  
2 Sacramento, California. Sacramento crazy, so, you know, if  
3 you don't got a gun on you, you end up dead. So that's really  
4 why I moved to Vegas with my mom and my dad. This was a  
5 better decision to move out here. So that's why --

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Time out. You had an  
7 attitude with an officer because you live in Sacramento?

8 THE APPLICANT: I didn't have an attitude.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: Because there's officers out here  
10 that probably will act the same way in your opinion.

11 THE APPLICANT: I didn't have an attitude.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Well, according to the  
13 police report, it indicated that you were pulled over while  
14 driving, refused to follow commands to stay in your vehicle  
15 and yet you exited.

16 So my concern is, especially in today's day and  
17 age, this happened in 2021. You, being your stature, come  
18 out, you're not following officer command and you have a  
19 weapon on you. Do you see where I'm going.

20 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, but --

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Not -- and you said where you  
22 live, if you don't have a weapon, you'll get killed. Vegas  
23 ain't too far behind. In fact, it's a little more  
24 disorganized.

1 THE APPLICANT: But I don't know nobody in Vegas.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: So I'm a little concerned. Are  
3 you going to be driving around with a weapon out here, fail to  
4 follow the instructions?

5 THE APPLICANT: I'm trying to do everything  
6 legal. That's why I moved out here, fresh start. I got --  
7 I'm getting my license, my Nevada driver's licenses. So like  
8 I say, even if I don't get a work card, I'm trying to get my  
9 CDL license.

10 So either way, this is going to be a little  
11 temporary job just to save up some money. But they actually  
12 called me. I was working at Allied Security. Matt and Chris  
13 Brew, they were going to make me a supervisor, then I got the  
14 email saying that my work permit was denied. So it was just a  
15 bad time, but I understand.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So it -- so that this is  
17 clear, this is not a job that you're applying for, right? The  
18 PILB Board, the license is for you to work.

19 THE APPLICANT: Right.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right. Okay. So then when  
21 you get the card, then you go work for a company and  
22 apparently you've worked for Allied Universal.

23 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And had you a job.

1 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. You can't work unless  
3 you have the card.

4 THE APPLICANT: Right.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You didn't put all the  
6 information needed on the card -- on the application for the  
7 card. So it's kind of the chicken before the egg. You  
8 started working, you didn't quite hatch the egg, now the egg  
9 is gone so now you can't work, okay?

10 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So I don't have any  
12 further questions. Does anybody else? Okay. Hearing no  
13 further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
15 going to motion to uphold the denial based on time and  
16 distance. The incident just occurred in 2021.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
18 we have a second?

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
21 second.

22 All in favor say, "aye."

23 (Motion carries.)

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So you would have to



1 wait one year to come back and apply for the actual work card  
2 so that you can work for a security company.

3 When you apply for the work card, make sure you  
4 indicate everything on that. Your job may not ask you those  
5 questions, but the work card will. So make sure you put  
6 everything on there so that we can reconsider your  
7 application, okay?

8 THE APPLICANT: Yep.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you. Good luck.  
10 Okay. Agenda Item Number 68, Dejana Savoy.  
11 Dejana, good afternoon, ma'am. And you have been sworn in?

12 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Investigator Saladino,  
14 why are we here with Ms. Savoy?

15 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: The applicant was denied  
16 for a disclosure of a gross misdemeanor out of Nevada for a  
17 conspiracy to commit burglary where she received 12 months  
18 probation and a suspended jail sentence.

19 The applicant disclosed this arrest as a petty  
20 theft misdemeanor. The applicant was sentenced on 7/20 of  
21 2022. Currently the applicant is on probation until 7/20 of  
22 '23.

23 The applicant did disclose her arrest as a  
24 misdemeanor petty theft. However, she was convicted of a

1 gross misdemeanor and received 12 months probation. Court  
2 documents show that the applicant must stay away from TJ Maxx,  
3 Marshalls, Sierra Home Goods and HomeSense for one year.  
4 Currently, the applicant is on probation.

5 The applicant was mistakenly made provisional and  
6 now is here to appeal. She was not added to any roster.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for  
8 Ms. Savoy?

9 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.

10 Ms. Savoy, are you still on probation or has that  
11 expired?

12 THE APPLICANT: I'm still on probation for a  
13 couple more months. I just started -- it's 7/20 of this year,  
14 July, so a few months ago, two months ago.

15 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any more questions for  
17 Ms. Savoy? Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll  
18 entertain a motion.

19 I'll go ahead and make the motion. I motion that  
20 we uphold Ms. Savoy's denial based on the fact that she is  
21 still on paper on probation. No, ma'am, wait until I'm done.

22 We have a motion. Do we have a second?

23 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
24 second.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion, we  
2 have a second.

3 All in favor say, "aye."

4 (Motion carries.)

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Once you're off probation and  
6 everything is cleaned up, then please reapply. You will have  
7 to wait for the one year and then they can help you work  
8 through your actual application, okay? Thank you.

9 All right. Agenda Item Number 69, it's finally  
10 your turn.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: We were all waiting.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Agenda Item Number 69 is Kyle  
13 Shakesnider.

14 THE APPLICANT: Shakesnider.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Shakesnider. Investigator  
16 Saladino.

17 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
18 the record. The applicant was denied for a nondisclosure of a  
19 felony conviction out of California for forgery where he  
20 received five years probation.

21 There was also a misdemeanor, embezzlement,  
22 property value less than 650 in Nevada where he was convicted  
23 and received 60 days suspended jail, community service,  
24 restitution and counseling.

1 All court requirements were completed on 5/16 of  
2 '22. The applicant did not disclose his arrest history, he  
3 was made provisional and was added to our roster for a  
4 license. He's here now to appeal.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any questions?

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

7 Mr. Shakesnider, why'd we fail to disclose  
8 actually in 2019?

9 THE APPLICANT: 2019? 2019, I disclosed and went  
10 back in '19 is when I didn't disclose.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: I've got two, a 1996 and a 2019  
12 that were not disclosed. However, our investigator did see  
13 that the court requirements were completed in May of this  
14 year.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I didn't.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: According to our investigative  
17 notes, you did not disclose your criminal.

18 THE APPLICANT: Well, I think I actually -- I  
19 disclosed. I didn't disclose the one in 2019 in which I just  
20 forgot that one. But, yes, I did it. It was a family member  
21 that did this to me. They didn't pay me my wage.

22 They had filled the check out, did not sign the  
23 check. I picked the check up and signed it myself and I  
24 cashed it to pay myself. I wound up paying that family member

1 back, did the probation, got off probation. I haven't been in  
2 trouble since then.

3 This thing that happened here in Las Vegas got  
4 broken down to a misdemeanor and the issue has been thrown  
5 out. So that's my defense. It was my fault. I forgot the  
6 '19, so it is what it is.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, Investigator Saladino,  
8 the 2019, was it disclosed?

9 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: I believe it was  
10 disclosed on the application.

11 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

12 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: My mistake on that one.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And then the only one  
14 that wasn't was the one from 2000 --

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: 1996.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Or 1996.

17 THE APPLICANT: 1996, correct, ma'am. And that  
18 was strictly because it was so long in between me getting in  
19 trouble, I just forgot, plain and simple. I just forgot.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
21 the Board?

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Again, good afternoon, sir.

23 THE APPLICANT: Good afternoon.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. What do you

1 plan on doing with your work card if you so get one?

2 THE APPLICANT: Go to work as a guard. I already  
3 work at Fremont Experience. They've already promised me the  
4 job.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: Who has?

6 THE APPLICANT: Fremont Experience downtown.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, okay. All right. All  
8 right.

9 THE APPLICANT: Yes. I've been there a couple  
10 years now. I'm retired, been retired since I was 62. I'm 75  
11 now.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Is it armed or nonarmed?

13 THE APPLICANT: I beg your pardon?

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: Armed or unarmed?

15 THE APPLICANT: Unarmed if possible. I don't --  
16 I'm not particular about carrying a gun.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: Sounds good. Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
19 from the Board? Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain  
20 a motion.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I make a  
22 motion to grant the appeal on Mr. Kyle Shakesnider for his  
23 work card, and the reason for that is he reported the one in  
24 1996. He didn't report, but I feel like that time and

1 distance long gone.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. We have a motion.  
3 Do we have a second?

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
5 I'll second that motion.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
7 second.

8 All in favor say, "aye."  
9 (Motion carries.)

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Anyone denied?

11 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I say  
12 nay based on consistency. We've been denying people who have  
13 failed to disclose felonies all day.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So thank you. The  
15 motion passes, I'm reading my math 4 to 1. When you come back  
16 and do a provisional license -- or when -- if you have to come  
17 back and do a renewal, be sure you list all of them.

18 THE APPLICANT: No worries.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So you don't get caught up.

20 THE APPLICANT: Not a problem.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Okay.

22 THE APPLICANT: Thank you very much.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Thank you and  
24 congratulations, sir.

1                   Okay. Agenda Item Number 70, Vincenzo  
2 Spalatrio.

3                   THE APPLICANT: Spalatrio.

4                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Spalatrio. Okay.

5                   Investigator Saladino, why are we here with  
6 Mr. Spalatrio?

7                   INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
8 the record. The applicant was denied for a 1986 misdemeanor,  
9 carrying a loaded firearm in public out of California where he  
10 was convicted and received 12 months probation.

11                   There was also a 2010 out of Nevada for a gross  
12 misdemeanor, aiming, discharging a firearm -- or discharge a  
13 weapon where persons might be endangered. This charge was  
14 reduced to disorderly conduct. The applicant did not  
15 disclose.

16                   He was made provisional and was working for a  
17 licensee and he's here now to appeal.

18                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
19 questions? Okay. I'll ask the question of the day: Why did  
20 you not disclose?

21                   THE APPLICANT: I thought that I had disclosed  
22 the one that was in Henderson. The one in '86. Yeah, my  
23 head's like an Etch A Sketch, full of information, but a clean  
24 slate. I just completely spaced it.



1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Do we have -- can we confirm  
2 that the one in 2010 was --

3 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
4 the record. I don't believe it was disclosed. However, when  
5 it was ran, it would come up as disorderly conduct. So it  
6 wouldn't be something that we would contact the applicant for  
7 because it -- you know, disorderly conduct is not something  
8 that is going to deny him.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So it shows up as disorderly  
10 conduct, a gross misdemeanor for 2010?

11 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: I'm sorry. It should  
12 show up as a disorderly conduct, misdemeanor.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

14 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Out of Henderson.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, not gross misdemeanor.

16 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Correct.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Got you.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
19 Mr. Spalatrio, where was this incident in 2010, the discharge?

20 THE APPLICANT: It actually happened at Sunset  
21 '95. I had a gentleman -- I was on my Harley, ran into the  
22 debris field on the side of the highway and when we both  
23 exited on Sunset, I was sitting along side of him, looked at  
24 him, shook my head.

1 He started yelling profanities at me out the  
2 window, got out of his truck, reached in the bed of his truck  
3 and pulled out a four-foot solid steel breaking stake.

4 I stepped off my Harley, drew my .45, put it  
5 alongside my leg, pointed at him with my left hand and told  
6 him, if you come at me with that stick, I will shoot you where  
7 you stand.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: And you discharged it?

9 THE APPLICANT: No, ma'am. He was smart enough  
10 to get back into his car and leave.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Got it.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions?  
13 Okay. Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a motion.  
14 Are you able to carry a firearm now?

15 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am. I actually worked  
16 armed security at Station Casinos as we speak. I still have  
17 my CCW and all of that stuff was -- I was actually given my  
18 gun back by the sergeant who arrested me.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board -- sorry.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, yeah. Yeah, if there's  
22 no further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
24 going to motion that we overturn the denial and grant

1 Mr. Spalatrio a work card. And I understand we have denied  
2 those for failure to disclose.

3 The 2010 incident was a little sketchy. It  
4 wasn't a charge, wasn't something that we follow up with that.  
5 The 1986 time and distance, I'm okay with overturning that  
6 denial because of the time and distance. So with that, I am  
7 motioning to grant the work card.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
9 we a second?

10 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I'll second.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
12 second.

13 All in favor say, "aye."

14 (Motion carries.)

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Opposed?

16 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I say  
17 nay based on the failure to disclose. I appreciate your  
18 explanation and the way that you handled yourself on that, but  
19 I'm going to say nay based on the failure to disclose.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So the motion passes  
21 four to one. You do -- you will get your work card. You'll  
22 work with the office to do that and then they'll contact you.

23 THE APPLICANT: I'd like to say in leaving, you  
24 guys are awesome. I said earlier if we had people like you at

1 DMV, life would just go easy. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item Number 71,  
3 Sabrina Tunstall-Hill. Is there a Sabrina Hill? Okay. We'll  
4 trail that.

5 Agenda Item Number 72, James Williams. Good  
6 afternoon, sir. Have you been sworn in?

7 THE APPLICANT: I don't think so.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

9 MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Is there anyone else -- yeah,  
11 that one.

12 MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.  
13 (Prospective people sworn.)

14 MS. HARRIS: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Investigator Saladino,  
16 we have Mr. Williams here. Could you let us know why we're  
17 here with Mr. Williams?

18 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: This is Investigator  
19 Saladino for the record. The applicant was denied for a  
20 nondisclosure of a 2018 felony, carrying concealed firearm on  
21 a person. He received 36 months probation, work program and a  
22 fine. The applicant did not disclose.

23 Once denied, he did provide court documents. The  
24 Court documents show the charge as a felony and it shows that

1 it was not reduced. The applicant completed probation on 5/17  
2 of '22. The applicant was made provisional and was working  
3 for a license company and is here now to appeal.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
5 questions for Mr. Williams?

6 MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Williams, this is Board Member  
7 Brown. Have you completed your probation?

8 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

9 MEMBER BROWN: Thank you.

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

11 Mr. Williams, why didn't you disclose?

12 THE APPLICANT: I didn't know what that was.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: It wasn't that long ago. What  
14 do you mean? You didn't know what? I don't understand your  
15 explanation.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Do you know what "disclose"  
17 means? Why didn't you tell us? Why didn't you write it in  
18 your application?

19 THE APPLICANT: I thought I did. I put  
20 possession of a firearm.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: In your work card  
22 application?

23 THE APPLICANT: It was like five boxes. Tell you  
24 like what you did in the past. But I filled that out.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Did you do it online or on  
2 paper?

3 THE APPLICANT: On paper.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have your paper  
5 application and it's not there.

6 THE APPLICANT: It's not there?

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, sir. That's why you're  
8 here today. It's not on there.

9 THE APPLICANT: I swear, it was like five boxes  
10 that tell you, like, what you did, what he did was the thing,  
11 possession of a firearm. And I remember like I didn't have  
12 enough space and I put the little date on the side like the  
13 boxes.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Do we have the --  
15 you're looking at the application, right, Mr. -- Investigator?

16 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: I'm going to get it right  
17 now.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And you got done with  
19 your probation in this year, May?

20 THE APPLICANT: Well, I've been done. I just  
21 like -- I didn't have no transportation to keep going back and  
22 forth to LA to Vegas, you know. So once I was able to pay my  
23 restitution, I guess that's when they dropped the case. They  
24 said they did drop the -- because I had got it expunged for

1 it, too, but...

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah, you still have to put  
3 it on the paperwork. So he's looking --

4 THE APPLICANT: But I had brought the paperwork  
5 that say I had got it expunged and everything.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. He's going to look at  
7 your app. He's having them look at your application right  
8 now.

9 THE APPLICANT: Oh, okay.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Just to confirm.

11 MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Williams, this is Board Member  
12 Brown. Were you on a compact, a probation compact with the  
13 State of Nevada?

14 THE APPLICANT: No.

15 MEMBER BROWN: So you said that you moved to  
16 Nevada and you didn't have transportation to go back and forth  
17 to Los Angeles for probation. You didn't report to --

18 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

19 MEMBER BROWN: Hang on a second. You didn't have  
20 to report to a Nevada probation officer?

21 THE APPLICANT: No, no, I haven't.

22 MEMBER BROWN: Did you have permission to leave  
23 the State of California and reside in Nevada while you were on  
24 probation?

1 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, because my case wasn't  
2 like -- I had a summary probation. So all I had to do -- like  
3 do was finish school and my community service and I did that,  
4 so...

5 MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

6 THE APPLICANT: Because I was like --

7 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

8 THE APPLICANT: It was weird, like...

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Williams, this is Board  
10 Member Cortez. When did you say you moved up here?

11 THE APPLICANT: 7 years, 8 years ago.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: You moved out here eight years  
13 ago?

14 THE APPLICANT: Like 2015.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: So you moved out here in 2015,  
16 but in 2018 --

17 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, I did.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: -- you got charged in California  
19 and you got placed on probation for three years?

20 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: In those three years, where were  
22 you living?

23 THE APPLICANT: I was in --

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: In California?



1 THE APPLICANT: No, no, I was in Vegas. Well, I  
2 had the community service. I would stay with my auntie like  
3 for a couple --

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Hold on one second. While  
5 you were on probation from 2018 to your three-year -- 36-month  
6 probationary period, where were you living?

7 THE APPLICANT: Oh, I was out there until I was  
8 done with my community service and stuff when I had --

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: No, when you finished probation  
10 and then you moved to Vegas, or were you here in Vegas during  
11 your probation period? I understand you have conditions to  
12 do. When you were on active probation, were you in the State  
13 of Nevada, living here?

14 THE APPLICANT: No, I probably wasn't really  
15 because it was -- at that time, there was a lot going on,  
16 like --

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: So -- and I understand that and  
18 it was 2018. But the matter is that it's still pretty fresh.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So --

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: It's not too long.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah. And, sir, we did look  
22 at your application there. They have it. They were able to  
23 look it up and nothing's written in there. So you didn't, you  
24 know, note that on your application.

1           So with that being said, are there any other  
2 questions from the Board. Okay. Hearing there's no further  
3 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

4           MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
5 going to motion to uphold the denial based on the  
6 nondisclosure and -- based on the nondisclosure.

7           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
8 we have a second?

9           MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I'll second.

10          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
11 second.

12          All in favor say, "aye."

13          (Motion carries.)

14          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, sir, we denied your  
15 appeal. So you will not be able to work -- or get an actual  
16 work card. You are welcome to try again in one year. Okay?  
17 And they'll have your information. Thank you.

18          Agenda Item Number 73, Sean Wilson. Is Sean  
19 Wilson in? Good afternoon, sir.

20          Investigator Saladino, why are we here with  
21 Mr. Wilson?

22          INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
23 the record. The applicant was denied for nondisclosure of a  
24 2005 felony conviction out of California from -- for grand

1 theft from a person, was convicted and received a 16-month  
2 prison sentence.

3 The applicant had multiple parole violations.  
4 March 20th, '08, was arrested for possession and sale of  
5 marijuana. 2008, out of California, second-degree burglary  
6 and a violation of parole. He received three years prison  
7 sentence for that one as well.

8 2013, misdemeanor out of California for  
9 possession of a controlled substance, convicted and received  
10 four days of jail, credit for time -- credit for two days  
11 served.

12 2016, misdemeanor out of Nevada for DUI. This  
13 was disclosed. He was convicted and received a suspended  
14 driver's license for one year and DUI school. The applicant  
15 did not disclose his arrest history from California until he  
16 was denied. He was made provisional, but was not added to any  
17 licensee's roster and is here now to appeal.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any questions from the Board  
19 for Mr. Wilson?

20 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.

21 Mr. Wilson, why did you fail to disclose some of  
22 your arrest history, particularly the felonies?

23 THE APPLICANT: I thought it was so many years  
24 back that you had to go. I didn't know until today everything

1 and I was stuck in San Francisco. I didn't even like  
2 remember. I tried to contact San Francisco to get my criminal  
3 history record and it was a little bit hard for me to do it  
4 without going there.

5 And any of the DUIs, I didn't think it was like  
6 concerning to the position I have, wasn't driving. But I did  
7 find out there is some drive positions. I just didn't  
8 disclose it.

9 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. You did disclose the DUI,  
10 but you didn't disclose others. So thank you. No further.

11 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
13 for Mr. Wilson? Okay. Hearing there's no further questions,  
14 I'll entertain a motion.

15 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
16 move that we uphold the denial on the basis of failure to  
17 disclose.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion. Do we  
19 have a second?

20 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I'll second.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
22 second.

23 All in favor say, "aye."

24 (Motion carries.)

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Again, yours is a  
2 little bit different than, you know, the guy that got a felony  
3 or a misdemeanor in 1980 something, right? Yours are more  
4 recent. So time and distance on those, the expectation is  
5 that you would remember to put those on there and they are  
6 felonies, okay?

7 Just like all the rest, you're more than welcome  
8 to come back in one year. Make sure you document everything  
9 on your application. Everything needs to be included, okay?

10 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you and good luck to  
12 you.

13 Agenda Item Number 74, Jared Winters has been  
14 postponed, right? Okay. Agenda Item Number 75, Dion Stanley.  
15 Dion. Okay. We'll trail that.

16 Agenda Item Number 76, Robert Coleman. Okay.  
17 Oh, he withdrew. Sorry. Just to be clear on the record,  
18 Agenda Item Number 76, Robert Coleman withdrew.

19 Agenda Item Number 77, Varaya.

20 THE APPLICANT: Varaya Fechner.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: How do you say your last  
22 name, ma'am?

23 THE APPLICANT: Fechner.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, you're in Reno. Sorry.

1                   Okay. Investigator Saladino, why are we here for  
2 Ms. Fechner?

3                   (Discussion off the record.)

4                   INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: This is Investigator  
5 Saladino for the record. The applicant was denied for a  
6 nondisclosure. In 2021, misdemeanor out of Nevada for destroy  
7 or injure a person's property and trespassing, was convicted  
8 and received a 90-day suspended for 12 months, anger  
9 management classes as well.

10                  The applicant did not disclose. The case started  
11 off as home invasion and at the time she applied, the case was  
12 ongoing. Classes were completed on 8/15 of '22. No contact  
13 with the victim and suspended jail term expires on  
14 December 15th of this year.

15                  2020, there was a misdemeanor, disturbing the  
16 peace and resisting a public officer out of Nevada where she  
17 received anger management classes and 15 days jail suspended  
18 for one year.

19                  The case started out domestic battery and was  
20 reduced in the courts. The case was closed on December 21st  
21 of '21 and the applicant was made provisional and was working  
22 for a licensee at the time and now wishes to appeal.

23                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, ma'am, I just have to  
24 confirm because I did see you up north earlier. Are you under

1 oath?

2 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You are? Okay. Board, are  
4 there any questions for Ms. Fechner?

5 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown.

6 Ms. Fechner, why did you fail to disclose your  
7 arrest?

8 THE APPLICANT: I did not fail to disclose my  
9 arrests. I did turn in two applications at one time. I'm not  
10 sure which one she filed, but one was not filled all the way  
11 out.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I didn't hear. What was  
13 that?

14 MEMBER BROWN: Investigator Saladino, is there  
15 any way to confirm that? Would there be a file that might  
16 have the second application?

17 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Yes. Board's indulgence,  
18 I'll get that right now.

19 (Brief pause in proceedings.)

20 MEMBER BROWN: Madam Chair, this is Board Member  
21 Brown.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes?

23 MEMBER BROWN: I don't know how long this is  
24 going to take. Should we trail this for a little bit and move

1 on for time saving?

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes.

3 MEMBER BROWN: Okay. So we're going to trail  
4 this.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Saladino, are  
6 you able to have Investigator Swarthout look at that because I  
7 know you're on the next one, too.

8 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: It'll just take a few  
9 minutes for me to get that information.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Do you want to take a  
11 two-minute break? All right. Thank you. We're in a good  
12 place now time wise.

13 (Recess.)

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Is Ms. Fechner still  
15 with us?

16 MEMBER BEZICK: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, Ms. Fechner, we  
18 did look at your application. Originally you applied in July  
19 of 2022, right, or 2021?

20 THE APPLICANT: '22.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: '22. Okay. In your  
22 application in '22, you did not disclose your arrest, right?  
23 So then you were given -- I'm sorry, in May, when you applied  
24 in May. In July when you received the second application,



1 that's when you were -- you provided the information; is that  
2 correct?

3 THE APPLICANT: No. In July, that's when I  
4 received the letter to appeal.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I'm sorry. Could you put --  
6 can you put -- can you get closer to the mic? I'm having a  
7 hard time hearing you.

8 THE APPLICANT: In July, that is when I received  
9 the letter to appeal.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So -- and is that when  
11 you put your --

12 THE APPLICANT: No, ma'am.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: -- arrest information in  
14 there?

15 THE APPLICANT: No.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have your  
17 original application and that was done -- I'm sorry,  
18 Mr. Saladino, when?

19 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: The application was  
20 turned in on May 26th of '22.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. At that time, ma'am,  
22 it did not have any -- at that time, it did not have any  
23 information disclosed on there about your arrest.

24 THE APPLICANT: I returned two applications that

1 day. One, I had messed up on, checking one of the boxes. So  
2 when I went in to pay for it, I had her -- both of them for  
3 her to shred one.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So unfortunately we  
5 can only go off of what we have. And if you handed her two,  
6 then that's something that, you know -- I don't even  
7 understand how we would be held accountable for that. But  
8 unfortunately the one that we have, the one you were denied on  
9 was the one that did not have the disclosures on it.

10 Are there any further questions from the Board?  
11 Hearing there's no further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

12 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
13 move to uphold the denial based on the failure to disclose and  
14 the recency of the crimes and the suspended jail term that is  
15 still in effect according to our investigators.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do I  
17 have a second?

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion, we have  
20 a second.

21 All in favor say, "aye."

22 (Motion carries.)

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, Ms. Fechner, your  
24 work card is being denied at this point. You are more than

1 welcome to apply again in a year, just make sure at that time  
2 that you can work with the Board -- or I'm sorry, the staff on  
3 disclosure of all items, okay?

4 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

6 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

7 MEMBER BROWN: Sorry, Ms. Fechner.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Item Number 78, Lisa Bass.

9 Good afternoon, Ms. Bass. You've been sworn in?

10 THE APPLICANT: Yes, ma'am.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Investigator Saladino,  
12 why are we here with Ms. Bass?

13 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for  
14 the record. The applicant was denied for disclosing a  
15 misdemeanor carrying a concealed weapon out of Nevada where  
16 she pled guilty and received a \$55 fine and 29 hours of  
17 community service. This happened in 1993.

18 Also, in 1993, there was a misdemeanor domestic  
19 violence where she received \$100 fine and a work program out  
20 of Nevada.

21 2001, in October in Nevada, misdemeanor domestic  
22 violence. She received a \$599 fine, 60 hours of community  
23 service. The applicant did disclose her arrest history at the  
24 time she applied. The only arrest that was listed on her

1 fingerprints was a 2001 domestic battery.

2 The applicant was not made provisional and is  
3 here now to appeal.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So just for my  
5 understanding, she did disclose the 1993 conviction -- she did  
6 all of them.

7 INVESTIGATOR SALADINO: Correct.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Fantastic. Are there  
9 any questions for Ms. Bass? Okay. Seeing there's no  
10 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer, I make a  
12 motion to -- thank you, overturn the denial and grant the  
13 appeal -- and grant the appeal due to the -- she did disclose,  
14 she did all the right things.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
16 we have a second?

17 MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, I will second.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
19 second.

20 All in favor say, "aye."

21 (Motion carries.)

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations. You'll get  
23 your work card. The team will get in contact with you.

24 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: On the next steps, okay?

2 THE APPLICANT: Thank you. Have a good day.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You're very welcome. Thank  
4 you. Disclosure, that's what we needed.

5 Okay. Agenda Item Number 79, do we have Justin  
6 Austria. Sir, are you under oath? Okay. Investigator  
7 Swarthout, why are we here with Mr. Austria?

8 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied  
9 for a felony conviction out of Nevada in 2015, November 10,  
10 for a burglary. The applicant did disclose this one. He  
11 listed it as a gross misdemeanor on his app.

12 The applicant also had an August 18th, 2021,  
13 battery domestic violence. That was a DA denial. That was  
14 non-disclosed.

15 A June 22nd, 2018, out of Arizona, felony case  
16 that started out as a drug paraphernalia, possess/use, that  
17 appears to still have an active warrant as of 1 o'clock today.

18 2018, February 3rd, out of Nevada, use/possess  
19 drug paraphernalia. He is guilty. There is two counts of  
20 this one and there's still a warrant for this case.

21 An August 23rd, 2015, out of Nevada. This one  
22 was disclosed for the purpose of engaging in drug activity,  
23 use/possess drug paraphernalia. He was guilty on all counts.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for

1 Mr. Austria?

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. Are  
3 you aware you have the active warrant?

4 THE APPLICANT: I am not aware. And that's in  
5 Arizona?

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: According to our investigator,  
7 that's --

8 THE APPLICANT: No, I'm not aware. They had told  
9 me that they had dropped it because they picked me up in  
10 Arizona and then they held the charge, and then they told me  
11 they had dropped it and then they had transferred me here to  
12 Las Vegas.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: So, FYI, your warrant is active.

14 THE APPLICANT: Okay. Thank you for letting me  
15 know because I had no idea, like, and it's been years, so...

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
17 from the Board? Okay.

18 Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a  
19 motion.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer, making a  
21 motion to deny the appeal of Justin Austria for his work card  
22 because of nondisclosure, also active warrant in Arizona that  
23 we can tell apparently.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have

1 a second?

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

3 I'll second that motion.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
5 second.

6 All in favor say, "aye."

7 (Motion carries.)

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Looks like you have a  
9 little bit of clean-up to do.

10 THE APPLICANT: Thank you so much. Apologies for  
11 wasting any of your guys' time.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Have a good day.  
13 Agenda Item Number 80, Latrice Bogan. Ma'am, are  
14 you under oath? You've been sworn in? Okay.

15 Investigator Swarthout, why are we here with  
16 Ms. Bogan?

17 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied  
18 for a felony conviction, a conviction of illegal use of  
19 possession of a dangerous weapon, failure to disclose.

20 The applicant has -- was arrested on  
21 October 26th, 2013, in Nevada for carrying a concealed weapon,  
22 a misdemeanor offense. She was -- pled guilty to that one.  
23 She did disclose that arrest.

24 Out of California, there was an August 12th,

1 2005, arrest, felony level, petty theft with prior jail  
2 specific offenses. She was sentenced to 16 months prison for  
3 that.

4 A November 22nd, 2014, Nevada arrest for petty  
5 larceny. She was found guilty on that one.

6 May 24th, 2013, out of Nevada a misdemeanor false  
7 statement to obstruct a public officer. She pled guilty for  
8 that one.

9 In Nevada, March 7th, 2012, battery. That one,  
10 she was also guilty on.

11 An April 12th, 2003, out of California,  
12 misdemeanor, grand theft, money, labor property \$400. Guilty,  
13 three years probation.

14 And then a July 23rd, 2001, out of California,  
15 misdemeanor theft. Guilty, three years probation.

16 And then August 25th, 1997, out of California,  
17 misdemeanor petty theft and she would have been a minor at  
18 that time.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Just so that I'm  
20 clear, all of those she disclosed?

21 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: No. She disclosed the  
22 carrying a concealed weapon and that was the only one.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So the felony?

24 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: It was a misdemeanor.



1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for  
2 Ms. Bogan?

3 MEMBER BROWN: Ms. Bogan, this is Board Member  
4 Brown. Why did you fail to disclose, and in the  
5 investigator's notes, it says that you failed to disclose even  
6 after he told you about this and you were given a chance to  
7 disclose everything again?

8 THE APPLICANT: That's not true because I took  
9 the printout from metropolitan courthouse and they gave me all  
10 the printout and I gave them the printout for my application,  
11 stating the arrest and everything that I did. I put on my  
12 application. Plus, in 2005, when I was arrested, when I was  
13 paroled, I was shot.

14 In August -- May, Mother's Day, I was shot four  
15 months after, which I was put under a medical induced coma.  
16 So my parole officer came to see me, told me he was going to  
17 give me my life back if I got out of California. I left, went  
18 to Texas. Supposedly those charges was supposed to be dropped  
19 and I guess there wasn't, because I came here.

20 In 2018, I applied for a sheriff card at  
21 Metropolitan Police Department. I put those charges down.  
22 They told me don't put them anymore because they don't exist.  
23 So I don't know how they pulled them up. But I would have put  
24 them on there if they would have been visible when I did the

1 work card the first time in 2018.

2 The officer told me they see that I put it on  
3 there, being compliant, but they couldn't find it, so not to  
4 put them on there, on any applications.

5 But I do know -- I've got memory loss, but my  
6 memory not that good, but I do know about the charge in 2013.  
7 It wasn't a -- it was a bail that, I guess, was a brass  
8 knuckles. I didn't know that.

9 It was still put together on the bail, but the  
10 cop was being an A-hole and charged me with it. I pled guilty  
11 because it was in my possession.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So if I can just stop there.  
13 So she did the initial application, nothing was noted on  
14 there?

15 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: On her initial  
16 application, she listed the 2013. She did list it as the  
17 brass knuckles.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And then the --

19 THE APPLICANT: I gave the printout to the clerk.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: To what clerk?

21 THE APPLICANT: The -- at the PLI investigation  
22 officer. He handed me the application and she stapled it to  
23 my application supposedly. I'm not sure.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And this is with your initial

1 application?

2 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Or with the application  
4 after?

5 THE APPLICANT: Because I wasn't sure what my  
6 arrest was, the date. So I went to the courthouse the same  
7 day and came back and gave her the application with the  
8 printout.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Do we have any ancillary  
10 paperwork with her application?

11 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Not that I have with me.  
12 Would that have been printed out by LVPD?

13 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum, at the --

14 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: So would that have been  
15 a copy of your SCOPE?

16 THE APPLICANT: It was just the brass knuckles.  
17 That was only thing that was on the paper.

18 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yeah. If it's a copy of  
19 SCOPE, that's just a local arrest history. We cannot take  
20 that form from you.

21 THE APPLICANT: Okay. I tried. Because they  
22 told me they would give me a -- I asked for like all the  
23 arrests here in Vegas and all -- everything they dismissed  
24 except for that one. So that's why it wasn't on there.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And the other ones are out of  
2 California?

3 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, years ago.

4 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Four are out of  
5 California and four out of Nevada.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any other questions  
7 from the Board? Okay. Hearing there are no other questions,  
8 I'll entertain a motion.

9 How -- I'm sorry, how long have you been in  
10 Nevada again?

11 THE APPLICANT: Since my mom passed away in 2011.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And what have you been doing?

13 THE APPLICANT: I've worked every year, but it's  
14 like -- since, I told you, I got shot, it's kind of hard on my  
15 body, you know. So I try to do something easy, like security  
16 is not that much.

17 And I have seven kids to support, so I don't want  
18 to be one of those people that don't work. So I have worked  
19 ever since I've been here, just not in security.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Just not in security.

21 THE APPLICANT: (Nodded head.)

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And you came here in 2018 and  
23 you said you got a sheriff's card.

24 THE APPLICANT: Well, I came here in 2011 and I

1 went to the -- I applied in 2018 for the sheriff's card.

2 (Discussion off the record.)

3 THE APPLICANT: And then I would have been -- my  
4 sheriff card just expired. So I'll be going down there again  
5 because I had got the card and everything.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: What work do they do with a  
7 sheriff's card?

8 THE APPLICANT: Work at like gaming.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, gaming. Okay.

10 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: So on her SCOPE, it  
11 lists that she has a sheriff's card for a 24/7 Mini Mart for  
12 an on-premise employee.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Okay. I've been the  
14 one with questions, so sorry. Are there any other questions?  
15 Okay. I'll entertain a motion.

16 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
17 move that we uphold the denial for failure to disclose.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do I have  
19 a second?

20 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick, I second.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion, and  
22 have a second.

23 All in favor say, "aye."

24 ((Motion carries.))

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we're going to deny  
2 your appeal, right? But you can come back in a year, work  
3 with the office. They will have your information and they can  
4 help you with that, okay? So they're really good about  
5 helping you.

6 THE APPLICANT: Okay.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good luck to you, ma'am.

8 Agenda Item Number 81, Dee Cagle or Cagle. Okay.  
9 We'll trail that one.

10 Agenda Item 82, Owen Dumas. Mr. Dumas, are you  
11 under oath?

12 THE APPLICANT: Yes, I am.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Sounds good.

14 Investigator Swarthout.

15 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied  
16 for a felony conviction, April 14th, 2016, out of North  
17 Carolina, a felony conviction for sales schedule -- was that  
18 for controlled substance, convicted six months to 17 months  
19 and 18 months supervised probation.

20 This case appears to have an active warrant. The  
21 applicant did provide court documents for it. We have tried  
22 reaching out to the courthouse ou in North Carolina it was out  
23 of and still have not gotten any word back on the status of  
24 that potential warrant in that case.

1                   And then there is a November 4th, 2014, out of  
2 Nevada, domestic battery. He was convicted of that one. Both  
3 of those cases were disclosed. As of the other day, we  
4 received additional information from the Clark County justice  
5 court that the applicant was working for a licensee, serving  
6 convictions.

7                   THE APPLICANT: Do I get to speak now?

8                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, sir.

9                   THE APPLICANT: All right.

10                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So they were both disclosed.  
11 Got it. But one has an active warrant and we have not been  
12 able to get in contact with the court.

13                  INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: That is correct.

14                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
15 questions from the Board?

16                  MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. For  
17 Investigator Swarthout, just to confirm, you just recently  
18 discovered unlicensed activity?

19                  INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: He was working for a  
20 licensee, serving convictions. The licensee did not verify  
21 that he had a work card or anything. They have been issued a  
22 violation for that.

23                  MEMBER BROWN: Thank you.

24                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: If there are no other

1 questions -- so I had one for legal counsel. If we haven't  
2 heard back from the courts yet, this was 2016, so that's how  
3 many years ago?

4 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Six.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I mean, or maybe our law  
6 enforcement guys?

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: What's the question?

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: It said that he had an active  
9 warrant from --

10 MS. HARRIS: Yes, Chricy Harris for the record.  
11 There needs to be something substantiated from the courts at  
12 least established that that's been dealt with unfortunately.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So if anybody wants to  
14 make a motion that once it's -- so that he doesn't have to  
15 come back in a year, especially since they have reached out to  
16 the courts, can we put that in a motion if the Board desires.

17 MS. HARRIS: Okay. So if the Board is willing  
18 to -- if anyone is willing to create a motion, possibly  
19 approving with the contingency that that paperwork is  
20 provided, that those court matters had been addressed, then  
21 that's proper.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Or that -- could we also do  
23 one that he comes back in -- at the next board meeting instead  
24 of waiting one year?



1 MS. HARRIS: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'd  
4 like to motion that we pass or trail the matter to the next  
5 board meeting to allow more information for a criminal history  
6 or any kind of active warrant status.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So do you understand? So  
8 we're -- so we can deny you right now, okay?

9 THE APPLICANT: Um-hum.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And if we deny you, you have  
11 to wait one year to come back. The reason we're doing this is  
12 because we don't have the information from --

13 THE APPLICANT: North Carolina.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: -- North Carolina, right?  
15 Well, we don't want to deny you and have you wait for one  
16 year. So the motion is that we trail you to next meeting,  
17 which in December, right? So you're only waiting a couple  
18 months versus a whole year. By then, hopefully you'll have  
19 the information from North Carolina.

20 THE APPLICANT: Well, that's the thing. I had  
21 the -- I don't know how I have a warrant if I went to court.  
22 They gave me probation and I did the compact and switched it  
23 to Nevada and completed my probation out here, and that was --  
24 I finished that in 2018.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So then get with the state  
2 out here or whoever you finished with your probation with and  
3 get the paperwork, and then that way, we can make a vote on it  
4 because we don't want to -- if we deny you, we have to wait a  
5 whole year.

6 And you did what you're supposed to, you  
7 actually, you know, admitted to -- disclosed the information.  
8 So we don't want to deny you, right, because you did the right  
9 thing. But just get to the people that you finished your  
10 probation with and then, that way, we can trail you to the  
11 next meeting.

12 Does that make sense.

13 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, that makes sense.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Yeah, just get a  
15 letter or something from them so we can close this out, and  
16 then we can move --

17 THE APPLICANT: Who do I get it from, Las Vegas?

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: If that's who you finished  
19 your probation with, right? Then you would get it from Las  
20 Vegas.

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: I would assume that  
22 they would have that documentation if they transferred it here  
23 and he completed his probation. They would probably have that  
24 access.

1           If not, reach out to the other state and get  
2 something to show that you do not have a warrant there,  
3 provide that to board staff and we can do that.

4           THE APPLICANT: I sent all the documents that  
5 they were willing to even send me. It's even harder getting  
6 those.

7           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Hold on.

8           MEMBER CORTEZ: Investigator Swarthout, who's the  
9 agency that issued the warrant? If it's a warrant, you're  
10 going to need to contact the DA of that jurisdiction because,  
11 at some point, you're going to have to get it placed back on  
12 calendar for quashing. That's how that's going to work.

13          INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: It's the courthouse out  
14 of North Carolina. It gives me an address of 7900 -- or 790  
15 Rowen.

16          MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So it's issued out of the  
17 District Court, I would imagine. So what you're going to need  
18 to do is call them, tell them that you have an active warrant  
19 that's coming up in your record. We need to know how to get  
20 it on there. They may refer you to an attorney, but at least  
21 you -- there's your starting point.

22          THE APPLICANT: All right.

23          MEMBER CORTEZ: How to get that quashed.

24          THE APPLICANT: All right.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we're not done yet.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: We have to make a motion.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Let's -- so --

4 MEMBER BROWN: Madam Chair, this is Board Member  
5 Brown. If I could just offer Mr. Dumas some information. If  
6 you were here on a compact, you would have been with the state  
7 Parole and Probation, the Nevada Department of Public Safety's  
8 Parole and Probation. They have an office on Bonanza.

9 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

10 MEMBER BROWN: If you go down there, and you  
11 completed your probation with them, they should have court  
12 documentation also, okay? So try both.

13 THE APPLICANT: All right.

14 MEMBER BROWN: You may be able to get it through  
15 Nevada easier, okay? But try both. Thank you.

16 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. So we have a  
18 motion. Do we have a second? Does -- did everybody hear the  
19 motion?

20 MEMBER BROWN: Our stenographer is stating, no,  
21 she did not hear the motion.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
23 motioning to trail the matter to the next board meeting to  
24 allow confirmation of an active warrant or not.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Do we need to make a vote?  
2 Okay. So we have a motion. Do we have a second?

3 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
4 second.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion, we have  
6 a second.

7 All in favor say, "aye."

8 (Motion carries.)

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So try to close that  
10 out. The next meeting is in December. Work with this team,  
11 make sure you get all that information to them and then we'll  
12 be able to make -- take a vote on it then, okay? All right.  
13 So you don't have to wait the year. Thank you.

14 So Agenda Item Number 83, Rontiera Dunmore.  
15 Hello. Are you under -- are you under oath? Okay.

16 Okay. Investigator Swarthout.

17 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied  
18 for conviction of possession of a dangerous weapon and failure  
19 to disclose. January 18th, under Nevada in 2014, a  
20 misdemeanor conviction of carrying a concealed weapon without  
21 a permit. She was convicted to six months of jail, but it was  
22 suspended sentence and 39 hours of community service and a  
23 fine of \$500.

24 When the applicant first applied, she did not

1 disclose this and she was denied. She did disclose it on her  
2 appeal letter.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for  
4 Ms. Dunmore? Okay. Hearing there's no questions, I'll  
5 entertain a motion.

6 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
7 move we uphold the denial based on the failure to disclose.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a -- we have a  
9 motion. Do we have a second?

10 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick, I second.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
12 second.

13 All in favor say, "aye."

14 (Motion carries.)

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

16 THE APPLICANT: I don't get a chance to speak?  
17 I'm the only one that hasn't spoken and I came to the mic.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Well, this is Board Member  
19 Cortez. I'll ask you: Why'd you fail to disclose?

20 THE APPLICANT: The reason I didn't disclose it  
21 is because due to my court record sealed documents, it tells  
22 me that any inquiry -- I'm legally able to answer to any  
23 inquiry recounting the charges, that they legally did not  
24 occur. So when I had just received my records sealed earlier

1 this year, that was my initial idea was already to go straight  
2 for the guard card.

3 And when I did that, I did not know that those  
4 sealed records counts it as anything to list because of the  
5 court paperwork on the documents.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Understood. And I  
7 just want to remind you that I did read Page 6 of 14 in the  
8 entire application that lists that you are to list everything.

9 THE APPLICANT: Yeah.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: Regardless of disposition,  
11 regardless of expungement, regardless of --

12 THE APPLICANT: Yes, but it does not --

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: One second, ma'am. You failed to  
14 disclose.

15 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: So there really isn't discussion  
17 here.

18 THE APPLICANT: Yeah, but it does not state  
19 anything about the sealed record at all.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Ma'am, I really need you  
21 to relook at the application and read it.

22 THE APPLICANT: It states nothing about a sealed  
23 record.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: Ma'am.

1 THE APPLICANT: I've already had an executive  
2 board member call me and tell me I was absolutely correct  
3 about that. It states nothing about a sealed record. So I  
4 was just confused about the letter --

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Ma'am.

6 THE APPLICANT: -- the wording on the paperwork.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Ma'am, ma'am, we've  
8 made our decision. Thank you.

9 THE APPLICANT: Understood.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. We've made our  
11 decision. You're more than welcome to apply again in a year.  
12 Make sure that you document all that information. If you have  
13 any questions, you can contact the Board later. Thank you.

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: You have the application -- or  
15 the information needed. So contact the office and then they  
16 will help you. They will -- they have been overly diligent in  
17 helping applicants. So just give them a call. But as of  
18 right now, you've been denied, failure to disclose.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We voted.

20 THE APPLICANT: I mean, why do I have to disclose?  
21 My -- the Court records tell me I don't have to disclose --

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand that. But the  
23 application --

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Everybody, stop.



1 Ma'am, ma'am, you're going to be asked to leave  
2 now. It's been voted on. You've been denied. Please leave.  
3 Thank you. Thank you.

4 Okay. Agenda Item Number 84, Christopher Garcia.  
5 Thank you, sir. Are you under oath?

6 THE APPLICANT: No, I was never put under oath.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Is there anybody else  
8 that just walked in? Okay. Okay.

9 THE APPLICANT: I don't want to be wasting your  
10 time, though. I didn't disclose anything. I apologize. I  
11 didn't know anything of this.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: You have to be under oath in  
13 order to say anything. But don't worry about it.

14 THE APPLICANT: Okay. Okay.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: Just get under oath first.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So anybody that has not  
17 been -- who's just walked in, if you're going to testify, we  
18 need you to stand up and swear under oath.

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Do we have anybody in  
20 the north?

21 MEMBER BROWN: No, sir. They've all left.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you.

23 MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

24 (Prospective people sworn.)

1 MS. HARRIS: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Garcia.  
3 Investigator Swarthout, could you tell us why  
4 we're here?

5 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied  
6 for conviction of illegal use or possession of a dangerous  
7 weapon and for failure to disclose. The applicant has an  
8 August 7th, 2008, out of Nevada, conviction for a misdemeanor,  
9 carrying a concealed weapon. He did not disclose that one.

10 A February 26, 2007, out of Nevada misdemeanor,  
11 possession of drug paraphernalia. He was convicted on that  
12 one.

13 February 17th, 2006, out of Nevada, another  
14 misdemeanor, carrying a concealed weapon. He was convicted on  
15 that one and sentenced to 50 hours of community, a fine of  
16 \$500 and forfeiture of the weapon.

17 An August 5th, 2005, out of Nevada, possession of  
18 marijuana, one ounce or less, convicted and had to pay a fine  
19 of \$500.

20 An October 27, 2004, conviction out of Nevada for  
21 a minor in consumption of liquor -- I mean, dismissed what --  
22 he was told to stay out of trouble.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any questions for Mr. Garcia?

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

1 Mr. Garcia?

2 THE APPLICANT: Yes.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Three years in a row, 6, 7  
4 and -- 2006, 2007, 2008, concealed weapon. Do you have a  
5 weapon on you now?

6 THE APPLICANT: No, sir.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Why didn't you disclose  
8 it?

9 THE APPLICANT: I didn't know what to disclose.  
10 I'm like, I'm apologizing. Like I was -- if I knew what, the  
11 need of disclosing everything to you guys, I would have right  
12 off.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That's good. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Fair enough.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: That's what we want.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Well, thank you. That  
17 gives us something to work off and remember going forward. So  
18 are there any questions -- any further questions for  
19 Mr. Garcia? Okay. So no further questions, I'll entertain a  
20 motion.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I make a  
22 motion to uphold the denial for Mr. Christopher Garcia for  
23 failing to disclose.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do we have

1 a second?

2 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick, second.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion, we  
4 have a second.

5 All in favor say, "aye."

6 (Motion carries.)

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, Mr. Garcia, we  
8 encourage you to come back. Make sure you list everything  
9 that you've ever been -- you know, ever been -- had an issue  
10 with.

11 Once you do that, you can come back in one year  
12 and go through the process again. You'll probably be denied  
13 and then you'll come in front of us. If you disclose, if you  
14 tell us everything that's happened, we're more than happy --  
15 we want to help you guys.

16 THE APPLICANT: I was --

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, you're --

18 THE APPLICANT: I just didn't know. Like before  
19 when they told me that, like the lady said -- when I was  
20 writing down my application, they told me that wouldn't be  
21 considered as any type of crime. So now that they lie to me,  
22 you know, during the time that --

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: Misinformation.

24 THE APPLICANT: Misinformation, I apologize.

1 MEMBER CORTEZ: Yeah.

2 THE APPLICANT: Because I wouldn't have even  
3 brought myself today.

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: Yeah.

5 THE APPLICANT: But now that I came, I know what  
6 I need to do.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Perfect.

8 THE APPLICANT: And I'll be here next year.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yep. We look forward to  
10 seeing you.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: So will I.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yep. Look forward to seeing  
13 you.

14 Agenda Item Number 85, Khalif Golphin. Okay.  
15 We'll trail that.

16 Agenda Item Number 86, Angelina James. Okay.  
17 We'll trail.

18 Agenda Item Number 87, Denise Johnson. Hello.  
19 Investigator Swarthout, why are we here for  
20 Ms. Johnson?

21 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: So the applicant was  
22 denied for a conviction of a felony. September 29th, 1994,  
23 out of California, a felony for petty theft with prior  
24 convictions. The applicant obtained a PC 1203.4 in this case

1 on July 9th 2021 -- or 2001.

2 December 23rd, 1992, out of California, felony  
3 for petty theft with prior conviction and false impersonation.  
4 This one, she also provided documents showing that she got a  
5 PC 1203.4 reduction on this one on also that same July 9th,  
6 2001.

7 Another California conviction for January 26,  
8 1987, for a felony forgery, convicted, sentenced to six months  
9 in jail, three years probation.

10 An April 12th, 1984, out of California, felony,  
11 trespass on government reservation. Four months confinement  
12 in a federal woman's prison.

13 September 20th, 1983, out of California, give  
14 false information to a peace officer. She would have been 18  
15 at the time. The prints didn't state whether she was  
16 convicted of that or what the sentence was.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And then this was  
18 disclosed? It was disclosed?

19 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: All of it was disclosed.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Perfect. Okay. Any  
21 questions for Ms. Johnson?

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Good afternoon.

23 THE APPLICANT: Good afternoon.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. All I'm

1 trying to do is just make a statement to you because we have a  
2 lot of people come from California and say the 1203.4, so they  
3 didn't have to disclose it. Your 1203.4 says you have to  
4 disclose it if required. You did, I want to commend you for  
5 that. You did a great job.

6 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions? Okay.  
8 I'll entertain a motion on Ms. Johnson.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
10 am motioning to overturn the denial and grant Mrs. Johnson her  
11 work card.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
13 we have a second?

14 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, I'll  
15 second.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
17 second.

18 All in favor say, "aye."

19 (Motion carries.)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, ma'am.

21 THE APPLICANT: Thank you so much.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item Number 88,  
23 Corey Mathis. Good afternoon, sir.

24 Okay. Investigator Swarthout.

1 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied  
2 for a conviction of a felony and illegal use or possession of  
3 a dangerous weapon.

4 The applicant has a December 16th, 2009, out of  
5 California, felony for assault, force with a deadly weapon,  
6 not a firearm GPI likely, convicted three years prison.

7 March 4th, 2009, out of California, felony,  
8 robbery second degree. Convicted, probation 36 months and  
9 365 days jail suspended.

10 December 31st, 2006, out of California  
11 misdemeanor, threat with crime, intent to terrorize.  
12 Convicted 24 months probation and 27 days in jail.

13 November 25th, 2004, out of California, robbery.  
14 This one is unknown. He would have been a minor at the case.

15 And then October 18th, 2002, out of California,  
16 burglary. He was released to his parents or guardian also.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So if I understand  
18 correctly, the applicant originally denied in 6/25/2021 and  
19 did not disclose the denial. This time, the applicant  
20 applied, he disclosed all arrests.

21 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Okay. Any questions  
23 for Mr. Mathis? Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a  
24 motion.



1                   MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I  
2 move that we grant the appeal and allow Mr. -- sorry,  
3 Mr. Mathis to get his work card based on the fact that he did  
4 what we asked.

5                   THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

6                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion and  
7 we have -- do we have a second?

8                   MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, second.

9                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
10 second.

11                   All in favor say, "aye."

12                   (Motion carries.)

13                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir.

14                   THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

15                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: They'll work with you to get  
16 that. Okay?

17                   THE APPLICANT: Appreciate it.

18                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

19                   Okay. Agenda Item 89, Muhammad Matthews has been  
20 postponed.

21                   Agenda Item Number 90, Anthony Villarreal. Good  
22 afternoon, sir.

23                   THE APPLICANT: Good afternoon, Board. How are  
24 you?

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good.

2 Investigator Swarthout, can you tell us why we're  
3 here?

4 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied  
5 for a felony conviction and for failure to disclose arrest  
6 history. September 1st, 2011, out of Illinois, felony,  
7 aggravated battery with a weapon. He did disclose this  
8 arrest, convicted to two years probation and 156 days  
9 imprisonment.

10 October 15th, 2010, out of Illinois, felony,  
11 possession cannabis, 30 to 500 grams. Convicted, sentenced to  
12 two years probation, 60 days imprisonment. That one also was  
13 disclosed.

14 May 30th of 2013, out of California, misdemeanor,  
15 possession of controlled substance. Convicted to 36 months  
16 probation and nine days jail. That one was not disclosed.

17 July 9th, 2007, out of Illinois, misdemeanor,  
18 retail theft, display merch, less than \$150. Convicted,  
19 sentenced to 24 months supervised and that one ran concurrent  
20 with the April 5th, 2004, out of Illinois, disorderly conduct,  
21 reckless conduct, casual delivery of cannabis.

22 This one appears to be a juvenile arrest. But  
23 there was one listed as an adult probation, so his probation  
24 most likely continued as he was an adult.

1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Just so I understand, let me  
2 just ask: The 2007 was not -- which one was --

3 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The 2013, the May 30th  
4 out of California.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. That was not  
6 disclosed. All the rest were disclosed.

7 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
9 questions for the Board?

10 THE APPLICANT: If I could just say one thing.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Hang on one second.

12 THE APPLICANT: Sure.

13 MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. Why  
14 did you fail to disclose the most recent of your charges? You  
15 disclosed all the others, but failed the one that's most  
16 recent.

17 THE APPLICANT: I guess I got overwhelmed with  
18 everything I was writing on there, and I just did it to my  
19 best of my ability and my remembrance. You know, I've been to  
20 church and I gave my life back to God and, you know, for me,  
21 I'm wiped clean and -- you know, in the eyes of the Lord, I am  
22 wiped clean as well. And, you know, I apologize for not  
23 disclosing. I disclosed as much as I could at the time.

24 I have two little daughters in my custody.

1 They're in CPS right now and it's just been really hard for  
2 me. And, you know, my mind's been really jumbled up right now  
3 and I'm just trying to get to work so, you know, I can get  
4 into society and do the right thing in life and, you know,  
5 contribute to Las Vegas and bring my daughters up, take to  
6 them to church and do everything I'm supposed to do as a  
7 father and just show them the right thing to do.

8 I mean, they're even here now and they're -- I  
9 explained to them that this is -- you know, if somebody does  
10 something wrong, that we come up here, we confess to what  
11 we've done and, you know, we ask for forgiveness.

12 So I'm here for forgiveness and a second chance,  
13 and I'm sorry for the nondisclosure. It was not intentional.  
14 I disclosed as much things as I can remember at the time.

15 I remember filling out this application. It was  
16 about 1:30 a.m. when my daughters finally, you know, gave me a  
17 second to breathe, and we've just been going through a lot.

18 So, you know, I'm just here, putting it all out  
19 there and just letting you guys know that I'm sorry for my  
20 past and I just really want a second chance so I can give  
21 these girls a really good life.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

23 THE APPLICANT: You're welcome. Thank you.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Sir, if you

1 get a card, what will you do with it?

2 THE APPLICANT: I'm going to be a repossession  
3 agent. The job is already there, waiting for me. I've done  
4 this in Los Angeles, so I'm good at it and --

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: Who's the job with?

6 THE APPLICANT: In Los Angeles?

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, here.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: No, the one that's waiting for  
9 you.

10 THE APPLICANT: Speedy Recovery and the owner is  
11 Peggy.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: How did you hook up with them?

13 THE APPLICANT: I hooked up with them through an  
14 owner in Los Angeles and his name is Paul.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: And I believe they're licensed  
16 here. I believe they are. I know most of the repos. Okay.  
17 Well, it's honorable what you're doing with your children.  
18 That's nice. Thank you.

19 THE APPLICANT: Thank you, sir.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: And yourself, getting your life  
21 together.

22 THE APPLICANT: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any other questions from the  
24 Board? I know this is unusual, but I have someone with their

1 hand up over there.

2 Would you like to come and say something? Okay.

3 Come on.

4 THE DAUGHTER: We think like he could have the  
5 job because he takes good care of me and my sister, and my  
6 sister, she is always happy with him and I'm happy with him  
7 either way.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you. You guys  
9 will make us cry.

10 MS. HARRIS: Was she sworn in?

11 (Laughter.)

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any other questions?  
13 Okay. If there's no other questions, because we need tissue,  
14 can someone please make a motion?

15 MEMBER BROWN: Yes, this is Board Member Brown.  
16 I'm going to go against my usual practice here. I believe  
17 that this was an honest mistake and I am going to move that we  
18 grant the appeal and allow him to get his work card.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
20 a second?

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer, make the second.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You went over the two  
23 toughest guys over here. Okay. So we have a motion, we have  
24 a second.

1 All in favor say, "aye."

2 (Motion carries.)

3 THE APPLICANT: Thank you very much.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So you'll be granted  
5 your work card. Congratulations.

6 MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Villarreal?

7 THE APPLICANT: Yes, sir?

8 MEMBER BROWN: You need to take those girls out  
9 for an ice cream.

10 THE APPLICANT: I will.

11 MEMBER BROWN: That was very brave of her to come  
12 up here in front of all of us.

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: They're giving a  
14 thumbs up to you.

15 THE APPLICANT: Thank you, Board, very much.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

17 THE APPLICANT: I won't let you guys down.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. We appreciate  
19 you.

20 Okay. Now that we've cleaned out the audience,  
21 was -- okay. So the other two were postponed.

22 Do you guys have anybody in the audience?

23 MEMBER BROWN: We do not.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Okay. So I'm going  
2 to go ahead and read through the trailed items so the Board  
3 can do a block vote on those.

4 The first item is Item Number 36, Justin  
5 Bipialaka. The next one is Deana Manning, Item Number 41.  
6 Item Number 46, Jennifer Goston. Item Number 48, Rafael  
7 Martinez-Castillo. Item Number 54, Kajohenae Cannon. Number  
8 65, Julian Oates.

9 Number 71, Sabrina Tunstill-Hill. Number 75,  
10 Dion Stanley. Number 81, Dee Cagle. Number 85, Khalif  
11 Golphin. Number 86, Angelina James, and I believe that is all  
12 of the trailed items.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So can I just ask for a block  
14 vote on that? Okay. So I would entertain a motion on a block  
15 vote for the items listed by the executive director.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll make a  
17 motion for denial of the following work card appeals.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, hang on. Is somebody  
19 here or --

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Once again, I'll make a  
21 motion for denial of the following work card appeals and the  
22 reason for it will be no show. Number 36, Number 41,  
23 Number 46, Number 48 Number 54, Number 65, Number 71,  
24 Number 75, Number 81, Number 85, and Number 86.



1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
2 a second?

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
4 I'll second the motion.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion, we have a  
6 second.

7 All in favor say, "aye."

8 (Motion carries.)

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Agenda Item Number 93, Board  
10 comment and future agenda items for possible action.

11 Is there anything from the Board?

12 MEMBER BROWN: Yes. This is Board Member Brown  
13 for Director Ingram. I haven't had a chance to look at them  
14 all today, but it appears that we have several different  
15 versions of applications written that it looks like there's  
16 two different or maybe three different online.

17 Is there a way that -- without too much cost,  
18 that we could streamline this to one version or at least -- in  
19 the versions that I've seen, the language says, list all  
20 arrests regardless of outcome.

21 I know we shouldn't have to, but could we list  
22 the outcomes so that these people say, wait a minute, you  
23 know, it was sealed, it was expunged. We could actually list  
24 those words? I mean, not that they're going to read them, but

1 at least we've made the effort if it's not too much money to  
2 do something like that.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Yes, and that's  
4 something we've been working on. There are some old  
5 applications floating around that licensees hand out that they  
6 already have printed out and are providing to them.

7 I think that's where most of this is coming from  
8 because the online application is updated. The applications  
9 in our office, we update probably weekly based on the approved  
10 fingerprint companies. But there are some older versions  
11 floating around at other places other than the Board, and I  
12 think that's where those are coming from.

13 You've probably noticed on the licensing  
14 applications, those are a little different, too. All the new  
15 application that we send out are the newest version, but there  
16 are people who had started the application process eight  
17 months ago, 12 months ago, and they're still sending those old  
18 ones in.

19 In fact, during our last meeting in the office, I  
20 instructed the licensing specialist that if she receives old  
21 versions of the licensing apps, to have them complete the new  
22 one. So hopefully that will take care of itself in  
23 transition. We're seeing the same thing and we're just as  
24 concerned.

1 Does that help address --

2 MEMBER BROWN: -- yes, sir, it does. Thank you.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Is there a way -- do you guys  
5 have email -- I'm sure it's to companies put out that, you  
6 know, we will no longer except old applications.

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Yeah, we can  
8 definitely send out a notice to all qualifying agents,  
9 registered and individual license holders and just say,  
10 please, use the new apps, old ones will be required to be  
11 resubmitted. Yeah, I can take care of that this week. Thank  
12 you.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Anything else for  
14 board comment or future agenda items?

15 Okay. This is the section for public comment.  
16 Members of the general public may make comment on matters on  
17 the agenda and may bring up matters not appearing on the  
18 agenda to the attention of the Board. The Board may discuss  
19 the matters not appearing in the agenda, but may not act on  
20 the matters at this meeting.

21 At this point, there's no general public so we're  
22 going to make assumption that there's not going to be any  
23 public comment.

24 So a motion to adjourn. We're done. I don't

1 have a gavel anymore. So thanks, guys. I appreciate you.  
2 Sorry we were difficult on the mic this morning for you.

3 MEMBER BROWN: Thank you. Have a good evening.

4 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INGRAM: Thanks, Shellie.  
5 Thanks, Board, and again, thank you on behalf of the entire  
6 staff for the pay increase. I'm sure they will be elated. So  
7 appreciate it. Take care.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thanks, guys.
