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TUESDAY, JUNE 14, 2022, 9:00 A.M.

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CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Welcome to the June PILB meeting. Executive Director, would you like to do roll call, please.

MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Madam Chair. Let's start with Chair Nixon.

CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Here.

MR. INGRAM: Board Member Bezick.

MEMBER BEZICK: Here.

MR. INGRAM: Board Member Cortez.

MEMBER CORTEZ: Here.

MR. INGRAM: And, Board Member Gronauer will be here around 10:00 o'clock, so he's not with us this morning. And Board Member Brown will not be with us. We do have a quorum, so we can proceed.

Would you like me to go ahead and introduce board staff?

CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes, please.

MR. INGRAM: Thank you. So, with us today, to the audience's right, we have Chief Investigator Vincent Saladino. We have Investigator Zachary Swarthout. Almost forgot your first name there, Zach. We call him a lot of different things. We have Stephanie Barroso, she's our  
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1 licensing specialist. Board counsel to my left is Chricy  
2 Harris. I'm Kevin Ingram. I'm the executive director. We  
3 have Chair Nixon, Board Member Cortez, and Board Member  
4 Bezick present here in the south. In the north, on the left  
5 of the screen, we have Investigator David -- I think that's  
6 David Hubbel on the left.

7 MR. HUBBEL: Yep.

8 MR. INGRAM: Yep. Perfect. Thanks. And Enrique  
9 Diaz. We call him Ricky. And our court reporter for today  
10 her name is Joyce -- And I'm going to make sure I pronounce  
11 this correctly, Joyce. Christy Joyce, is that correct?  
12 Christy Joyce, okay. So, Christy, if we get to a point where  
13 you're having trouble hearing or if we're speaking too  
14 quietly or too quickly, please let us know, okay. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. This is the  
16 section for public comment. Members of the general public  
17 may comment on matters appearing on the agenda and may bring  
18 matters not appearing on the agenda to the attention of the  
19 board. The board may discuss the matters not appearing on  
20 the agenda but may not act on those matters. At this meeting  
21 if the board desires, the matters may be placed in to future  
22 agendas for action. Public comments may be limited to five  
23 minutes per person at the discretion of the chair, chairman,  
24 but will not be restricted due to view point.

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1           Is there any public comment in the south? Okay.  
2   Seeing there is no public comment in the south -- I'm sorry.  
3   Good morning, sir. Please introduce yourself.

4           MR. COFFEE: I'm Tony Coffee, C-o-f-f-e-e. When  
5   I got here this morning, the investigator said you look mad.  
6   So, if I'm a little nervous, it's because I am mad. I know I  
7   only have five minutes. This is the transcript from your  
8   last board meeting, page 52 to 69, a waste of time.

9           Now, I'm here to go on the record, because I'm  
10   having official documents issued to the secretary of state's  
11   office and the governor's office in reference to this.

12           You have items that you're going to take care of  
13   today. You've had board members -- And I'm sorry he's not  
14   here today or be here later, as you stated. When you, the  
15   board members, make a decision -- Now, I know I've been to  
16   the PILB office and I know the ones that work there. I know  
17   the ones I never see there. So I don't know what you guys  
18   do, if it's like an HOA thing where a couple of weeks before  
19   the board you get the notes on everybody and get updated on  
20   things. But there was decisions made in this that were never  
21   intended to be decisions kept. You had a gentleman in front  
22   of you, Item 31 of the last board, March 8th, not only stood  
23   up here and lied but told lies that people from the PILB  
24   board knew were lies and said nothing. When I was sitting  
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1 right back there it could have very easily been said to  
2 confirm that.

3 Now, do you guys do that? I have no idea. This  
4 is the fourth board I've been to and everybody seems  
5 professional. But I don't think a lot of you know that some  
6 of the decisions you make don't really get fulfilled. You  
7 have other business owners that feel the same way I do.  
8 Their statements will be submitted with my statements today.

9 You have somebody operating security in this  
10 community, okay. I was the qualifying agent of that company.  
11 Now, every time I call the PILB board with anything, they  
12 quote NRS. I have every NRS pretty much memorized when it  
13 comes to the PILB now. Your NRS states 120 days without  
14 qualifying agent. This gentleman was given 189 days and then  
15 came in front of your board. And it's in the transcript.  
16 I'm not going to bore you with what you said. I mean, you  
17 can read it. Board Member Cortez and this gentleman and the  
18 other one who's not going to be here, Mr. Brown, was very  
19 dissatisfied with what was being said in reference to that  
20 person in your last board. I feel that if those three would  
21 have been in charge of anything -- And I quote your  
22 investigator. And I call him Vinny because I can't pronounce  
23 his last name. In one of our conversations, when we get  
24 through with him, he'll be lucky to have a guard card because

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1 of everything that he has done, everything that is brought to  
2 the attention of the board.

3 But, the big thing is at the end of that board,  
4 at the end of Item 31, last board meeting on March 8th, Board  
5 Member Cortez made it very clear that this person once he was  
6 denied will not operate, will cease and desist until a  
7 qualified agent is approved, which will take place today.  
8 And that gentleman doesn't even have to be here. And I know  
9 that board member. I know we called him Bobby G back in the  
10 day. I don't know how to say his last name either. He  
11 doesn't like that procedure where people get to -- you got  
12 this block vote or whatever it's called where everybody just  
13 gets blocked together and you say yay or nay.

14 I feel as a board you have the obligation to  
15 inform this gentleman that is about to venture in to  
16 something that I guarantee you he hasn't been told the truth,  
17 the board, you have an obligation, you have an obligation to  
18 the community to make sure they're receiving services from  
19 us, the people out there providing the services.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, not to cut you off, but  
21 you have one minute left. Thank you.

22 MR. COFFEE: Okay. And I'll get to the bottom  
23 and you can read the official documents whenever they do what  
24 they do.

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1           Mr. Ingram also quoted in that, in his words,  
2 you'll see me tomorrow, we'll do a cease and desist. Once  
3 you have a qualifying agent, once he comes in front of the  
4 board and he gets approved, you can resume, the exact words,  
5 resume. He's never shut his business down since March 8th.  
6 He has never been enforced. There was no cease and desist.  
7 And that investigator right there named Zach told me on the  
8 phone there never was going to be. And when I asked him on  
9 the phone, so that was just a sham, a waste of time, his  
10 answer was yep.

11           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.

12           Okay. Any further comment in the south? Seeing  
13 there's no further comment, do we have any comment in the  
14 north?

15           Okay. No further comment in the north and no  
16 further comment in the south, we'll move on to the next  
17 agenda item. Mr. Ingram, would you mind doing the reports  
18 and updates, please.

19           MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Madam Chair. Kevin  
20 Ingram for the record. The only reports I really have for  
21 you today are the statistics that you have before you, kind  
22 of do a rundown for you. As you know, at the last board  
23 meeting, we covered all of the year-end stats. And, moving  
24 forward for the rest of the year as discussed, we'll be doing  
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1 some quarterly comparisons for you and then some  
2 up-to-the-date comparisons.

3 So, if you look on page one, the license  
4 application statistics, first quarter, which were seen or  
5 heard at the March 2022 board meeting, you can see that we  
6 had a total number of 36 new corporations that applied and a  
7 total on growth individuals at 96. Of the corporations, 30  
8 of the 36 were approved. The individuals, 79 of 96 were  
9 approved.

10 We did have six courts that withdrew or were  
11 denied and we have 17 of the individuals that were withdrawn  
12 or denied. Withdrawals can be for a lot of different reasons,  
13 the denials or the withdrawals. We had two that did not meet  
14 the minimum qualifications for the position. We had seven  
15 that decided during the background not to proceed. We had  
16 four incomplete applications that were postponed. We had one  
17 that was denied for financial background. We had two  
18 individuals that failed the exam, so they weren't able to  
19 move forward. And we had one that was denied for a previous  
20 unlicensed activity citation.

21 On page two you'll see the 21-22 first quarter  
22 comparisons for the work card applicants. I'm not going to  
23 bore you with the month-to-month, but I'll go ahead and share  
24 the quarter totals for you.

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1                   In 2021, quarter one, we received 2,001  
2 applications. In the same quarter for 2022, we received 2741  
3 applications. So an increase of 740 apps. As far as the  
4 active quarter one totals were 1842. The 2022 was 2465.  
5 Quarter one had 95 withdrawals and '22 had 148 withdrawals.

6                   We had 49 denials in 2001 to 128 denials in 2022.  
7 The reason for the major increase there, last year the  
8 Electric Daisy Carnival was postponed until October. This  
9 year it went on in May. So that's the dramatic increase for  
10 the applications that were received. I don't believe we're  
11 going to see a decline in October though, because there are  
12 several new events that are coming to town, September  
13 October, and in addition to the ones that we normally have.  
14 So I think that our increases will remain steady throughout  
15 the rest of the year.

16                   On the April and May comparison, following that  
17 quarterly reports, 2021 in two months we received a total of  
18 2,021 again. I'm sorry. 1487 received in 2021 from April  
19 and May. 2022 there were 3,007. Of the active in 2021, it  
20 was 1338. Active in 2022 is 929. And you'll see the main  
21 reason there is we had -- we still have 1536 of the 3,007 in  
22 provisional status. Provisional status, as you know, we  
23 haven't received the fingerprints back from the criminal  
24 repository to give them their permanent status but they are  
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1 approved to work. As far as pending this year, we have 229,  
2 and we have 203 withdrawn and 110 that were denied.

3 Any time they're in a pending status, it could be  
4 for a myriad of reasons. We might be waiting for additional  
5 documents from the applicant. It could have been an  
6 incomplete app. We could be waiting on fingerprints. We  
7 could be waiting on photos. We could be waiting on, you  
8 know, a number of different things from their employers as  
9 well.

10 On the next page, complaints and investigations,  
11 first quarter, you can see that for all the complaints and  
12 investigations that were completed this year, we had a total  
13 of one complaint received on a polygraph examiner. That was  
14 investigated and closed, finding no merit. There were three  
15 private patrolman complaints and investigations. All three  
16 were closed. And two violations were issued to the same  
17 company. Private investigator, we had one complaint  
18 received, one closed. Finding no merit.

19 So, of the totals, there were five complaints  
20 received, five closed, and two citations issued. You can see  
21 the reasons for the violations. It was the same private  
22 patrol company. The first violation was for employees  
23 working without a work card, use of an unapproved uniform,  
24 and using a vehicle without a license number on it.

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1           The second citation were for employees not on the  
2 roster and employee working without their work card.

3           Complaints and investigations for April and May,  
4 you can see we received a total of 13 complaints. We've  
5 closed seven. There are six that are still open. And to  
6 date we've issued two violations for those complaints.

7           Again, it was one private patrol company that was  
8 issued two separate violations. One company -- or the first  
9 violation was employee working out of firearm qualification,  
10 use of an unapproved uniform, first offense, and 45 employees  
11 not added to the roster. Employees working without an armed  
12 work card and use of unapproved uniform, second offense.

13           Unlicensed activity citations, 2021 versus 2022,  
14 first quarter. In the first quarter of 2021, there were  
15 seven issued. Five were first offenses, one was a second  
16 offense, and one was a third offense.

17           First quarter of 2022, we've issued six. And all  
18 six were first offenses.

19           2021 versus 2022, for April and May, unlicensed  
20 activity. We had in 2021, April and May, we had five issues.  
21 They were all first offenses. So far this year we've issued  
22 four and they were all first offenses. The offenses were --  
23 There were three companies working as private patrolman  
24 unlicensed, two PIs working unlicensed, and that was for  
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1 2021. 2022, all four were for private security companies.

2 I'll answer any questions if the board has any.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you for the report. It  
4 was very thorough. The one question I would ask is as far as  
5 the uptick in licenses, do you guys -- I know you had some  
6 staffing shortages for a little while. Are you having any  
7 staffing shortages at this time or you're in a good place?

8 MR. INGRAM: We currently have two vacancies that  
9 still need to be filled. We're up to date on all of our  
10 backgrounds. So, at this time, we've decided to do a little  
11 salary savings and we're running very efficient.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And then my final  
13 question. Are we still having issues getting fingerprints in  
14 a timely manner? I know that's been an issue across the  
15 country. Is that continued or is it getting better?

16 MR. INGRAM: Well, during the influx for EDC, the  
17 fingerprint results were pushed out to upwards of six weeks  
18 again. Generally speaking, we have them about four weeks.  
19 So we're right in line with where we average. And right now  
20 we're looking at about four.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. Were there any  
22 further questions from the board?

23 Thank you. Can I ask for a brief counsel with  
24 you two? Sorry. Hang on one second. Sorry about that.

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(Pause in the proceedings)

CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, everyone, for your indulgence.

Okay. So now we're in to the review and approval of the transcripts from the March 8th, 2022, board meeting. I'll open it up for possible action.

MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I motion to approve the minutes of March 8th, 2022, as written.

CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a second?

MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I'll second.

CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a second. All in favor say aye.

(The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. The motion passes.

Agenda Item Number 4, all applicants to be sworn in by Counsel Harris.

MR. HARRIS: For anyone on the agenda or who plans to provide testimony, can you please stand and raise your right hand.

(Witnesses were sworn in)

CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have items for consent for a block vote. That would be Items Number 6  
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1 through 27. I have to recuse myself from one and then just  
2 want to make notification for another. The one that I'm  
3 going to recuse myself is from the Scott Allen requesting to  
4 transfer his qualifying agent status from Weiser. I  
5 previously employed Scott Allen. And so, while I feel like I  
6 could make a decision, I'm going to recuse myself from that,  
7 so I'll pull that from the block vote.

8 And then the -- Item Number 12 is -- Oh, do we  
9 have to trail it?

10 MS. HARRIS: Yes, we'll have to trail it.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Until Bobby comes?

12 MS. HARRIS: Correct.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

14 And then Item Number 12, G4S, is now affiliated  
15 with Allied Universal. That agenda item, I do not know this  
16 individual, so I feel comfortable in making the decision on  
17 that. But I just wanted to make sure that everybody is aware  
18 that G4S is now a part of Allied Universal.

19 So, that being said, I guess Item Number 10 we  
20 will need to postpone until Commissioner Gronauer comes.

21 But, then the rest, Items 6 through 27, I'm open  
22 for a motion.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: Madam Chair, can I get  
24 clarification? Are we trailing Number 10 or Number 12?

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1           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: 10. I just gave notification  
2 on 12. I don't know the individual.

3           MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

4           This is Board Member Cortez. I motion to approve  
5 Consent Items 6 through 27.

6           MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I'll second.

7           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Can we exclude Item Number  
8 10?

9           MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez  
10 motioning to approve Items Number 6 through 27, excluding  
11 Number 10, Mr. Scott Allen.

12          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes. Thank you.

13          MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second the  
14 motion.

15          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion to  
16 consent items, block vote for items number, for Items Number  
17 6, Item Number 7, Number 8, Number 9, Number 11, Number 12,  
18 Number 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25,  
19 26, and item -- Agenda Item Number 27. All in favor say aye.

20          (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

21          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Okay. So Item  
22 Number 10 will be postponed until Mr. Gronauer arrives.

23          MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, if I may?

24          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes.  
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1 MR. INGRAM: Anyone here for those agenda items  
2 that were just approved, you're free to go. If you would  
3 like to stay and watch the rest of the meeting, you're  
4 welcome to do that as well. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

6 The next agenda item on the -- up is Item Number  
7 28. Is Mr. Steven Ketter here?

8 MR. KETTER: I'm here.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Please come up to the podium.  
10 As well as Moshe Benabou.

11 MR. KETTER: He's not here today. He's  
12 traveling.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, please tell us a little  
14 bit about yourself and your intentions with your changes.

15 MR. KETTER: My name is Steve Ketter. I'm  
16 originally from the east coast. I've been in the industry  
17 for a number of years, moved out here about six years ago.  
18 So I started doing investigative work in 1989. I started  
19 doing protective work in 1994. I've been licensed in a  
20 number of states. The last 20 or so years I was licensed in  
21 Utah. The last six years here as armed security and  
22 investigations.

23 I was a qualifying agent originally -- I was an  
24 investigator for a company called Bedrock Protection that was  
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1 out here around 2016. Subsequently, I was a qualifying agent  
2 for Premier Risk Solutions in about 2017, 2018. Subsequent  
3 to that, I've been the current qualifying agent for a company  
4 called NextGen. And then, as of now, I've been a friend and  
5 colleague of Moshe Benabou since about 2013, I guess. And we  
6 have decided that we're going to have his agency licensed out  
7 here. I'm going to be the qualifying agent for his  
8 licensure.

9 I spent some time with the employee of NextGen,  
10 Sade Brown, helped her. She is hopefully going to transition  
11 today in to the qualifying agent for NextGen.

12 And then, with this regard, we're going to  
13 continue -- we're going to try and build up a security base  
14 out here and just do regular business.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

16 Are there any questions for Mr. Ketter?

17 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Board Member Bezick.

18 Mr. Ketter, you have a number of tax liens. Have they been  
19 resolved?

20 MR. KETTER: Not my tax liens. These are for  
21 Mr. Benabou?

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right.

23 MR. KETTER: I don't know that, so I don't have  
24 an answer for that.

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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I think where we're all  
2 going to have an issue is that Mr. Benabou should have been  
3 here because, you know, we have a lot of financial issues  
4 here that's concerning to me as a practicing -- it's  
5 disconcerting. We need to make sure that you're going to be  
6 able to make payroll. And, with this level of concern with  
7 taxes, that's a problem for me.

8                   MR. KETTER: Okay. So I mean, I -- in our  
9 discussions before with the person that reviewed that, I  
10 don't think there was anything that was presented to me that  
11 that was going to be a potential issue. And, I'm certain  
12 that, had it been known, we likely could have resolved  
13 something before that. So I have a feeling that since  
14 business operations have been good so far, currently, right  
15 now, as far as how things are going to be, it's just going to  
16 be Mr. Benabou and myself. There's not going to be any  
17 other --

18                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah. Unfortunately, I can't  
19 go off of a feeling. I'm not comfortable with that, so --

20                   MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, if I may? Mr. Benabou  
21 was informed that he needed to be present for the meeting  
22 today.

23                   MEMBER CORTEZ: Madam Chair, if I may? This is  
24 Board Member Cortez. This is a question for legal. Under  
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1 these circumstances are we able to approve one and not the  
2 other?

3 MS. HARRIS: I would have to -- I would have to  
4 double-check on that. It doesn't appear to be what's normal  
5 course for this board.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: I can move forward with it either  
7 way. I just wanted to make sure what my legal parameters  
8 were.

9 MS. HARRIS: You should be fine.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Hang on, sir. Next  
11 question is actually for you. Are you here representing your  
12 potential partner?

13 MR. KETTER: Am I here representing him?

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct.

15 MR. KETTER: I mean, I would say to some degree  
16 the answer is yes.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: Are you aware that he has  
18 substantial tax liens?

19 MR. KETTER: Until you said something, I would  
20 say no.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. That tells me a lot. You  
22 are going in to business with your partner. I was prepared  
23 to move forward with a decision for you. But, at this time,  
24 I'm going to ask that both of you and your partner show up.

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1 So I don't know how we proceed with that. Otherwise, I can  
2 make the decision now.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions for  
4 Mr. Ketter? Okay.

5 MR. KETTER: Do I have a chance to answer the  
6 question?

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, sir. Sorry. With no  
8 further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

9 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make the  
10 motion that the application be denied on the basis that the  
11 other gentleman is not present and he cannot resolve any of  
12 the tax liens questions that we have.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
14 second?

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
16 will second that motion.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
18 second. All in favor say aye.

19 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Unfortunately,  
21 you've been denied at this point. You do have an opportunity  
22 to work with the board and come back for a decision later.

23 MR. KETTER: Okay. So, just a quick question for  
24 you, okay. If the matter is resolved at some point before

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1 the next quarterly meeting, can approval be made at that  
2 point or does it have to be --

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: It has to be at the meeting.

4 MR. KETTER: Okay. So the next question --

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, we have a pretty packed  
6 agenda. Please follow up with the licensing department.

7 MR. KETTER: Okay. All right. Thank you very  
8 much.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

10 Okay. The next agenda item is change of license  
11 status, corporate name change, Item Number 29, Integrity  
12 Support Services. Is Mr. Chad Parodi here and James  
13 Crockett?

14 MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, for the record, this is  
15 one of the items that's been requested to be postponed.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, okay. So, just to  
17 Mr. Ingram's point, Item Number 29 has been postponed. So we  
18 will move on to the next item, which is private  
19 investigators.

20 Item Number 30, is James R. Mathews here? Good  
21 morning. Good morning, sir. Please tell us a little bit  
22 about yourself and the intentions with the license. Tell us  
23 a little bit about yourself and your intentions with your  
24 license.

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1 MR. MATHEWS: My names is James Mathews. I'm an  
2 HR professional, basically. And what I'm intending to do and  
3 what I'm hoping to achieve is to be licensed so I can do  
4 workplace investigations. That's all I'm interested in  
5 doing. That's what I've done. I have a total of about 15  
6 years experience doing workplace investigations.

7 And so, you know, my background started, I've  
8 been in HR for over 30 years up until just recently. And I  
9 started -- Once I went overseas, I took an assignment in Iraq  
10 and I started working supporting a -- supporting a company  
11 that was supporting the US military and I got in to doing  
12 workplace investigations on a full-time basis in what the  
13 corporate world calls employer relations, even though it's  
14 morphing as we speak.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right.

16 MR. MATHEWS: Anyway, so I was able to do that on  
17 a full-time basis, on a real extensive, you know, like 12  
18 hours a day, seven days a week basis type of thing and got a  
19 lot of background in that. I've used that to work for a  
20 company called DynCorp. The first company I worked with was  
21 KBR. I was with them for about seven years. And I was with  
22 DynCorp for a couple years in Dubai. I did regional  
23 workplace investigations and was working here back in the  
24 states as an HR, senior HR generalist/slash business partner

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1 and doing some investigative work, not a whole heck of a lot.  
2 Because I was running the whole operation. I was a  
3 manufacturing concern doing the whole gamut of HR.

4 So, anyway, that job has gone away and I'm  
5 looking for the kind of -- my job that's going to transition  
6 me in to retirement. And I would like to become my own  
7 employer and I would like an opportunity to try to grow my  
8 business here in Vegas.

9 I play softball in the Sin City Summerlin  
10 softball league two years running now. So I need to be able  
11 to control my calendar, right, so that's what I'm doing here.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Gotcha. Thank you.

13 Any questions from the board for Mr. Mathews?

14 Okay, hearing there's no questions, I'll entertain a motion.

15 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make a motion  
16 that Mr. Mathews be approved for an individual private  
17 investigator license.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
19 we have a second?

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
21 do second that motion.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
23 second. All in favor say aye.

24 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)  
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1           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir. Good  
2 luck to you.

3           MR. MATHEWS: Thank you very much.

4           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Next agenda item is  
5 Agenda Item Number 31, FP Ink Investigations. Is  
6 Ms. Irizarry here? Sorry. I still haven't gotten it.

7           Okay. Please tell us a little bit about yourself  
8 and the intentions with the license.

9           MS. IRIZARRY: Well, my name is Lori Irizarry. I  
10 was a work comp fraud investigator for five years prior to  
11 coming with -- I was a PILB employee after that. My work  
12 comp fraud investigations, I was FA investigator and I also  
13 ran the Southern Nevada investigation unit for all insurance  
14 investigators here, so all types of insurance fraud. I was  
15 the president of that chair as well.

16           And then when I came to the PILB, I was an  
17 investigator and I moved my way on up to chief of operations  
18 for almost nine years. So I have quite a bit of  
19 investigation experience.

20           And now this wasn't the game plan but now I'm  
21 going to get my PI license to possibly expand my family  
22 business.

23           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

24           Are there any questions for Ms. Irizarry?  
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1 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
2 do have a couple of questions. Hi. Nice to see you again.

3 MS. IRIZARRY: Hi.

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: Not to go in to specifics, I'm  
5 pretty sure you're aware of the situation. But there is a  
6 little bit of financial history. Where are we at with that  
7 today?

8 MS. IRIZARRY: Good.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: Is everything --

10 MS. IRIZARRY: Yeah. So the two separate  
11 situations, old bankruptcy and then --

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: August 2012 and then the February  
13 '22.

14 MS. IRIZARRY: Correct. So, basically after  
15 2020, we didn't do so well, we closed the doors a little bit.  
16 Fingerprinting is what we do. So, if no one is going to  
17 work, we're not really fingerprinting. So, after everything  
18 kind of opened back up, it was still a slow uptick.

19 And then the plan was didn't want to file  
20 bankruptcy, didn't want to consolidate debt, so instead we  
21 got an attorney to negotiate the debt. So we were able to --  
22 instead of paying, like, a small minimum, because whenever  
23 you're paying the debt, instead of just paying off interest,  
24 I wanted to start paying down the debt, and so we did that.

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1 This goal was again in 2021 to start throwing more money at  
2 it after we got a good year under our belt.

3 Things took a turn. So, instead of doing that,  
4 since I had been unemployed for the last several months, we  
5 always made payments on the debt. Never defaulted on it as  
6 well. And still up to date on it as well. I think it's a  
7 couple -- about three or four more years until it's paid off.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

9 MS. IRIZARRY: Yes.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions?  
11 Okay. No further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

12 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make a motion  
13 that Ms. Irizarry be approved for a new corporate private  
14 investigators license, she also be approved for an individual  
15 private investigators license. That that license be placed  
16 in abeyance so she can become the qualifying agent and that  
17 she also has board member -- member status.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. We have a motion.  
19 Do we have a second?

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
21 Just adding that all of the motion is subject to all  
22 statutory and regulatory requirements. And I will second  
23 that motion.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
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1 a second. All in favor say aye.

2 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations. Thank you.

4 MS. IRIZARRY: Thank you guys. Bye.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Next agenda item is  
6 Agenda Item Number 32. Michael L. Davis is applying for a  
7 private investigators license. Good morning, sir.

8 MR. DAVIS: Good morning, Madam Chair, Board  
9 Members. How are you today?

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Tell us a little bit about  
11 yourself and the intentions with the license.

12 MR. DAVIS: Okay. Well, first off, my name is  
13 Michael L. Davis, D-a-v-i-s. I'm a retired division chief of  
14 the fire service. I retired in 2014. I then went in to the  
15 private sector. I got tired of the politics, attended a lot  
16 of board meetings and became kind of tired. But entered the  
17 private sector in 2014. Went to work for ESI Global. At  
18 that time it was Unified Investigations. And I worked for  
19 them until 2020 and was living in Montana. Relocated back to  
20 the State of Colorado to help my wife take care of her ailing  
21 father-in-law and I've been with Jensen Hughes since 2022.

22 I'm currently licensed in Montana, Washington,  
23 Arizona, New Mexico, Wyoming, and Missouri. I have active  
24 applications in Texas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, and Nevada.

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1           My primary role and sole role as an investigator  
2 is to perform forensic fire investigations.

3           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

4           Board, are there any questions for Mr. Davis?

5           MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
6 do have questions. Just board's indulgence.

7           This is Board Member Cortez. First and foremost,  
8 I do appreciate your honesty with a background that you've  
9 had as far as law enforcement contact, so I do appreciate  
10 that you were up front and forthcoming with our  
11 investigators. Any current judgments, liens, against you  
12 right now?

13           MR. DAVIS: None that I am aware of. I'm  
14 currently enrolled in a debt relief program through Freedom  
15 Debt Relief and I've made all of my payments and I'm  
16 scheduled to be completed I think it's either in October or  
17 November of this year. And, you know, there was one in there  
18 that says that it got turned over to collections. I'm not  
19 sure why or what that's about. But that is part of the  
20 Freedom Debt Relief program.

21           MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you so much. No  
22 further questions.

23           MR. DAVIS: You're welcome.

24           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
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1 from the board? Okay. No further questions, I'll entertain  
2 a motion.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
4 am motioning that we approve Mr. Michael L. Davis for an  
5 individual private investigator license, that it be placed in  
6 abeyance so that he may also become the qualifying agent with  
7 Jensen Hughes Incorporated, license number 2659, subject to  
8 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
10 a second?

11 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a  
13 second. All in favor say aye.

14 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir. Good luck to  
16 you.

17 MR. DAVIS: Thank you all for the opportunity.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Congratulations.

19 Okay. On to private patrolman, Agenda Item

20 Number 33. Is Sade N. Brown here?

21 MS. BROWN: Hi. Good morning.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Tell us a little bit about  
23 yourself and the intentions with the license.

24 MS. BROWN: My name is Sade Brown, B-r-o-w-n.  
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1 I'm a native of St. Petersburg, Florida, where I have prior  
2 security experience with the State of Florida Juvenile  
3 Justice Detention Center as well as Eckerd College.

4 I took a leap of faith here to Las Vegas about  
5 three years ago and I was hired on by NextGen Security where  
6 I'm currently the manager.

7 And my intentions with the qualifying agent  
8 certification is to not only gain knowledge and more  
9 experience myself but also create opportunities for my  
10 organization.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you. Now,  
12 Mr. Frye was here. Okay. So I guess, Mr. Frye, you're --  
13 Okay. Are there any questions from the board? I have a few.

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
15 do have a question not for Ms. Sade. Mr. Frye.

16 MR. FRYE: So I'm Michael Frye, F-r-y-e, the  
17 person on the bottom of the application. If you want to know  
18 about me, so I'm a native southern Nevada, born and raised in  
19 Boulder City. I've lived here my entire life except for the  
20 time that I was in the Navy. Beyond then I've lived here.  
21 I've had multiple businesses in the construction industry in  
22 different sectors through 30-some-odd years.

23 And so we had made a change, we bought out a  
24 partner, and that's why we're changing some of the

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1 structure-ship.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So can I ask what's  
3 your intention as far as the overall business? I mean, like  
4 day to day, because you're not typically in this sort of  
5 industry.

6 MR. FRYE: Well, I have been in NextGen is a  
7 minority partner before we created Watchmen. But our partner  
8 who was running that, we bought him out. So I ran it, you  
9 know -- We have meetings and what not. But it is not my main  
10 state to your point. I just basically have managers run  
11 particular entities.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Does the board have  
13 any questions?

14 MR. FRYE: Probably.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
16 Where are we at financially today?

17 MR. FRYE: So it's very interesting that you --

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: I can imagine.

19 MR. FRYE: It was kind of interesting when they  
20 brought that up, because I didn't know that that was there.  
21 That's all been settled. But there's not a mechanism or I  
22 just realized that there is not necessarily a mechanism to  
23 remove certain things that say that I owe money. Because  
24 those have all been discharged through the federal court

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1 system. And so that's something that this has brought to  
2 light that I need to work with my attorney and figure out how  
3 to get them to remove those items because they've all been  
4 settled.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Follow-up question. This is  
6 still Board Member Cortez for Investigator Swarthout. Where  
7 are we at? Do we have any court papers, any updates?

8 MR. SWARTHOUT: So Investigator Swarthout. So  
9 everything from the Eighth Judicial where the cases are  
10 found, it appears that all the cases have been paid.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you. So I guess my  
12 question is if part of what came up was that, you know, you  
13 engaged in business without submitting contractors license.  
14 And so I know the contractors have their own board. And, you  
15 know, it feels like that was kind of not adhered to. So what  
16 guarantee do we have really that you're going to adhere to  
17 proper business?

18 MR. FRYE: So what happened in that particular  
19 case, back then I was building custom homes for myself and  
20 then you can build a home and then every two years you can  
21 build another home. But, what had happened, that was during  
22 the housing crisis and I couldn't sell the home that I was  
23 in, so I had to put both homes up for sale. That one wound  
24 up selling as opposed to allowing it to go in to foreclosure.

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1           And what had happened is the mechanical  
2 contractor on the home didn't do a very good job and wouldn't  
3 come back and fix it. And basically the customer got upset  
4 and so he filed a complaint and obviously it was justified.  
5 And we basically made a settlement with the DA at the time.  
6 We couldn't contest it. But that was a function of the  
7 economy at the time.

8           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So it was based off  
9 one incident?

10          MR. FRYE: One incident, yeah. I mean, I've been  
11 a licensed contractor now, I don't know -- I mean, grew up  
12 here with my dad being a licensed contractor, so I know the  
13 rules in that regard. But, in that particular instance, it  
14 was like foreclosure or sell the home.

15          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sure. Okay. And what were  
16 you in the Navy?

17          MR. FRYE: I was a nuclear engineer in the Navy.

18          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Wow. Which is -- We don't  
19 get very many Navy people in the desert.

20          MR. FRYE: Right.

21          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So thank you for your  
22 service.

23          Any other questions from the board? Okay.

24          Hearing there's no further questions, I'll entertain a  
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1 motion.

2 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Board Member Bezick. I  
3 make a motion that Ms. Brown be approved for an individual  
4 private patrolman license and that individual private  
5 patrolman license be placed in abeyance so that she may  
6 become the qualifying agent for NextGen Watchmen LLC, license  
7 number 2818, and that Mr. Frye be approved as a member.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
9 a second?

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
11 I'll second that motion.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a  
13 second. All in favor say aye.

14 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, guys. Thank  
16 you. Good luck to you.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: Ms. Brown.

18 MS. BROWN: Yes, ma'am.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: Shout out to the JPO.

20 MS. BROWN: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item Number 34,  
22 Paul Halverson. Are you here, sir?

23 MR. HALVERSON: Good morning, Members.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning. How are you?  
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1 MR. HALVERSON: I'm fine. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good. So if you could please  
3 tell us a little bit about yourself and the intention with  
4 the license.

5 MR. HALVERSON: My name is Paul Halverson,  
6 H-a-l-v-e-r-s-o-n. Gee, where do I start? I have  
7 approximately 50 years in the gaming, casino, security,  
8 surveillance, running since -- running different departments  
9 as far as on the floor gaming. I kind of semi-retired in  
10 2020, at the end of 2020. I got a call from Zolada, Z, I  
11 call her Ms. Z, asked if I was looking to become one of her  
12 supervisors. I am currently the senior field supervisor and  
13 acting QA for the company, which is 007 Security.

14 We believe we're in a small transition because of  
15 the industry itself. We are hiring people. We have a lot of  
16 good clients. We have a lot of good people. And it's my job  
17 to make sure that she doesn't have to yell and scream at me  
18 to get the job done.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
20 questions from the board? Okay. Hearing there's no  
21 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

22 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make a motion  
23 that Mr. Halverson be approved for an individual private  
24 patrolman license, that the individual private patrolman  
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1 license be placed in abeyance so that he may become the  
2 qualifying agent for 007 Security Services, LLC, license  
3 number 875.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
5 a second?

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
7 I'll second the motion.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
9 a second. All in favor say aye.

10 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir. Good  
12 luck to you.

13 MR. HALVERSON: Thank you very much. Thank you,  
14 Kevin.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Agenda Item Number 35, Ronald  
16 Torres. Good morning, sir.

17 MR. TORRES: Good morning.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Tell us a little bit about  
19 yourself.

20 MR. TORRES: Ron Torres, T-o-r-r-e-s. I know it  
21 says Ronald on my application, but only my mom calls me that  
22 when she's angry at me.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sorry.

24 MR. TORRES: So, after 25 years in the Air Force,  
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1 I retired in 2013 and moved here to Vegas and decided I was  
2 going to try to retire but I couldn't stay at home because I  
3 got stuck going to the casinos.

4 Became an account manager at one company and just  
5 basically moved on to three different companies. And I'm now  
6 at PalAmerican and I'm trying to be the qualifying agent for  
7 PalAmerican.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

9 Are there any questions for Mr. Torres?

10 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. Mr. Torres, what  
11 did you do in the Air Force?

12 MR. TORRES: I was a military police.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you for your service.

14 MR. TORRES: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions? Okay.

16 Hearing there's no further questions, I'll entertain a  
17 motion.

18 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make a motion  
19 that Mr. Torres be approved for an individual private  
20 patrolman license, that the individual private patrolman  
21 license be placed in abeyance so he may become the qualifying  
22 agent for the PalAmerican Security Incorporated, license  
23 number 2821.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do  
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1 we have a second?

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

3 I'll second the motion.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. We have a  
5 second. All in favor say aye.

6 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.

8 Congratulations. Good luck to you.

9 MR. TORRES: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item Number 36,  
11 Mr. Michael Black. Good morning, Mr. Black.

12 MR. BLACK: Good morning.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Tell us a little bit about  
14 yourself and the intentions with the license, please.

15 MR. BLACK: I've been working security since  
16 about 2002, kind of hybrid pure security as a ranger since  
17 1998. And I wanted to become the qualifying manager or agent  
18 for High Rock Security, which is where I've been working  
19 since 2002.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

21 MR. BLACK: I guess we didn't become a real  
22 company until 2009.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any questions for  
24 Mr. Black? Okay. Hearing there's no further questions, I'll  
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1 entertain a motion.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
3 will motion to approve Mr. Black an individual private  
4 patrolman license and that the license be placed in abeyance  
5 so he may become the qualifying agent for High Rock Security,  
6 license number 2635, and all of it to be subject to statutory  
7 and regulatory requirements.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
9 a second?

10 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
12 a second. All in favor say aye.

13 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir.

15 MR. BLACK: Thank you very much.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we're going to take a  
17 quick five-minute break and then we'll be right back. Thank  
18 you.

19 (Recess was taken)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Let's go ahead and get  
21 started again. We are now on Agenda Item Number 37, Mr.  
22 Phillip A. Garcia. Good morning, sir.

23 MR. GARCIA: Good morning. How are you?

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good. Please tell us a  
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1 little bit about yourself and the intentions with the  
2 license.

3 MR. GARCIA: I just wanted to say thank you all  
4 for being here and thank you for having me, the  
5 investigators, the board, Mr. Ingram, thank you.

6 I understand that obtaining this license is a  
7 privilege and not a right. And I intend to do a great job  
8 for the community and my family. I'm sorry, sir. I intend  
9 to do a wonderful job -- I was going to say I understand that  
10 obtaining this license is a privilege and not a right and I  
11 intend on doing this particular job for the board, for the  
12 PILB, for my family, and for the citizens of Las Vegas.

13 History, I come from Michigan. I have a  
14 Bachelor's degree from Eastern Michigan University in  
15 criminal justice. I worked in the youth juvenile justice  
16 system. I've worked for the hotel casino system as well as  
17 private security companies. I just kind of got a little  
18 older and thought it was time to maybe take the reigns myself  
19 and try starting my own company.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sounds good.

21 MR. GARCIA: That's why I'm here.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

23 Are there any questions for Mr. Garcia? Hearing  
24 there are no questions, I'll entertain a motion.

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1           MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
2 motion to approve Mr. Phillip A. Garcia for an individual  
3 private patrolman license, subject to all statutory and  
4 regulatory requirements.

5           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
6 a second?

7           MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

8           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
9 second. All in favor say aye.

10           (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

11           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir. Good  
12 luck to you.

13           MR. GARCIA: Thank you very much.

14           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. The next item agenda  
15 item is Item Number 38, Austin Allen. Good morning, sir.  
16 Tell us a little bit about yourself, sir, and the intentions  
17 with the license.

18           MR. ALLEN: I'm actually -- Can you guys hear me?

19           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I can.

20           MR. ALLEN: Okay. I'm born and raised in  
21 Chicago, Illinois. I actually started on security in  
22 Chicago. One of the security companies I actually worked for  
23 had a contract with the county jail who was actually licensed  
24 to actually transport inmates from the jail to home on

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1 electronic monitoring. Started that. Came to move to Vegas  
2 for a different scenery and worked for numerous security  
3 companies here in Vegas. Dunn Account Management, armed  
4 security, a little bit of surveillance with a company that I  
5 was working for before.

6 And, for the license, I actually want to make a  
7 difference from all the things that happened with me during  
8 all of my security experience with several security companies  
9 I worked for. It was little not so much of respect or stuff  
10 like that. So I want to make a difference where the  
11 employees can have a safe haven. You know, they can --  
12 somebody has to stand up to say I understand you and I  
13 respect you. You know, things happen in life. But everybody  
14 is worried about the money and not worried about that  
15 specific person, what they want in life. So, if you take a  
16 second to say, how can I help you, what's going on with you,  
17 then that will make a big difference for that person itself.  
18 You speak to that person or make that person smile or  
19 whatever, that can make a big difference.

20 So to realize that the employees work for the  
21 clients, the clients work for us, and we need to make sure  
22 that it works both ways. Like my parents say, it starts from  
23 the home. It's got to start from within the company.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for  
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1 Mr. Allen?

2 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Board Member Bezick.

3 Mr. Allen, you were required to pay restitution. Did you pay  
4 that restitution?

5 MR. ALLEN: Yes, sir. Paid in full.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Good  
7 morning, Mr. Allen.

8 MR. ALLEN: Good morning.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have an ongoing traffic  
10 case?

11 MR. ALLEN: It's actually settled as of right  
12 now. It's been dropped down to a moving violation.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. But is it taken care of?

14 MR. ALLEN: Yes, it is. The status update will  
15 be June 30th. Everything has been dropped down to illegal  
16 parking for \$150 parking ticket. It's been paid already. So  
17 the status to make sure it's been paid is on the 30th of this  
18 month.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Investigator Swarthout.

20 MR. SWARTHOUT: Investigator Swarthout. We're  
21 checking that right now.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: I just want to see if there's  
23 any update on that.

24 Okay. Do you have a CCW?  
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1 MR. ALLEN: That's correct, yes, sir.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have a weapon on you  
3 now?

4 MR. ALLEN: No, sir.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Let me have a little bit  
6 of background. I know there was an attachment to this, but  
7 you can see I was late and I believe I received that  
8 attachment. And I believe I read it. But right now for some  
9 reasons --

10 (The court reporter interrupts)

11 MR. DIAZ: Board Member Cortez, can you repeat  
12 what you said? The stenographer did not get that.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm sorry. I was asking Board  
14 Member Gronauer while he searched for his attachment if I  
15 could ask a question, but I'm holding.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Board indulgence one second.  
17 So I think I didn't -- So there's two people on this  
18 application. I think that's where some of the confusion is  
19 coming in. Is Jondese here?

20 MR. ALLEN: Actually no. She's actually in  
21 surgery right now. She's in the hospital.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So there are two  
23 people on this application, husband and wife, right. Jondese  
24 is the wife, if I'm pronouncing that correctly. And then

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1 Austin Allen is the other applicant.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: And Austin is the one with the  
3 outstanding traffic --

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah. And then there's some  
5 stuff on --

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: And then non-disclosure for  
7 arrest in 2015, domestic violence.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yep.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: Was that domestic violence your  
10 wife, your present wife?

11 MR. ALLEN: For the new one, yes. It was  
12 resolved and, like I said, we had an argument in the front  
13 yard and it was called to the police. It was, you know, very  
14 loud and that's when he arrested.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. There's several  
16 arrests that a warrant was disclosed.

17 MR. ALLEN: The arrest that wasn't disclosed, it  
18 was something that I didn't remember was years and years ago.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Here's the other one.

20 MR. ALLEN: It was years ago. I did my best to  
21 try to get the most arrests as possible. I have tried to  
22 reach out to Chicago, Illinois for the arrest. But,  
23 currently, if any arrest is prior to 2014, they don't have it  
24 in the system anymore.

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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Well, they do, because it's  
2 coming up.

3                   MR. ALLEN: It's all on line. When I put a thing  
4 in, any arrest prior to 2014, it's not in there. It was  
5 actually on their website and I tried to apply for and  
6 everything.

7                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So Mr. -- I think it's  
8 Swarthout, I think you're the investigator on this one? Yes?

9                   MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes.

10                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: There is a list two pages  
11 long and a lot of it is from 2004, '09, '11, well before  
12 2014. Was all of that listed?

13                  MR. SWARTHOUT: Not all of his arrest history was  
14 listed. He did provide when we did the additional document  
15 that was e-mailed to the board more arrest history. And the  
16 majority of his arrest history was disclosed but not every  
17 one of them.

18                  MR. ALLEN: Most of it I was a minor. I can't  
19 remember. I tried my best to remember as much as I can. I  
20 tried to do my best to do my due diligence by calling  
21 Illinois to see if I can get that report. But, like I said,  
22 it's all on line saying the exact same thing. I tried.

23                  MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Madam Chair,  
24 is it okay? On April 2019, 2019, that's not so long ago, can  
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1 you explain to me the endangering the life of a child?

2 MR. ALLEN: 2019?

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: That's what I have. April 7th,  
4 2019, endangering the life of a child, non-disclosed. So  
5 that wasn't years ago, okay. I would just like an  
6 explanation what are we talking about here.

7 MR. ALLEN: Okay. That's not me, sir.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: Did I write down the wrong one?

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So what I have for 2019,  
10 Mr. Gronauer, is police report was obtained for this case.  
11 The police report states that in March of 2019, about 8:20  
12 p.m., the applicant entered Desert Radiology and was seen on  
13 CCTV taking a total of \$1,080 in cash from the front desk  
14 finance department. The applicant was working for a company  
15 called Bedrock Protection Agency. It lists the qualifying  
16 agent. He was contacted, no record of this incident.

17 During this time, Bedrock was being bought by  
18 PalAmerican Security. Timothy Wells, the current agent for  
19 PalAmerican, was contacted. He stated that he remembers the  
20 incident because his manager from Desert Radiology had  
21 contacted him. Mr. Wells stated that the applicant had quit  
22 before the court case was completed. That was the 2019.

23 The next 2019 was October 17th, 2019, for  
24 domestic battery, first M. Yep. So this charge was reduced  
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1 to disturbing the peace.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: Madam Chair, if I may. I believe  
3 Board Member Gronauer is looking at the applicant was  
4 arrested on September 11th, 2014, for predatory criminal  
5 sexual assault of a child. The court disposition was nolo  
6 and prosecuting. So you basically said nolo contendere. You  
7 don't remember that case?

8 MR. ALLEN: He said 2019.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand that. So I'm  
10 clarifying it for you. September 11th of 2014, you don't  
11 remember that case?

12 MR. ALLEN: No. I remember that case very well.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And did you disclose that  
14 case?

15 MR. ALLEN: Yes, I did.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So let me ask you another  
17 question. The applicant arrested on January 6th, 2021, for  
18 the burglary and the theft. That was the incident that Madam  
19 Chair indicated about the Desert Radiology. When you were  
20 asked, you indicated that you -- Sorry. Hold on one second.  
21 The police were obtained. The investigator asked you about  
22 the incident. You said you had a record of such. And more  
23 information came through. After watching the surveillance  
24 camera, the manager contacted you and then you stated that

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1 you quit before the case got -- that you had quit -- we had  
2 found out information that you quit prior to the case going  
3 to court; is that correct?

4 MR. ALLEN: According to the record, yes.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And that was in 2021?

6 MR. ALLEN: Correct.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: And one more time. I'm sorry.  
8 Did you disclose that one?

9 MR. ALLEN: Yes, I did.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: So we have some but not all  
11 disclosures of the case. My concern is that you didn't  
12 disclose all of them and we have cases -- Forget 2014. I'm  
13 looking at 2019, 2021, 2015 has a law enforcement contact and  
14 you're coming in front of here to get a law enforcement  
15 situation going on. I have a problem with that. I  
16 absolutely appreciate you wanting to get that. That's what I  
17 do for a living. So I get it. But there's a lot of issues  
18 that are causing me concern here. Nothing personal. It's  
19 what's occurred.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
21 questions from the board?

22 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. Mr. Allen, you  
23 also have some payments placed for collection. Have they  
24 been resolved?

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1 MR. ALLEN: One of them has been resolved. I'm  
2 actually working with TransUnion to get that removed. That  
3 was for the eviction that I received. I fell back on hard  
4 times on that one. So, yes, that's been taken care. The  
5 other one I'm still waiting on the insurance.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any further  
7 questions from the board?

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: Investigator Swarthout.

9 (The court reporter interrupts)

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: Investigator Swarthout, this is  
11 me, Gronauer. Can anybody hear me? Did you find the  
12 information that we requested on the traffic outstanding?

13 MR. SWARTHOUT: Yes. So the case was reduced to  
14 a stop, stand, or parked vehicle on a specific prohibited  
15 place. It looks like the fine is \$150 and it looks like he  
16 has a status check on June 30th of this year. And it looks  
17 like the fine as of today is still outstanding.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. I understand. So do you  
19 have a receipt or anything for this?

20 MR. ALLEN: I don't have it on me personally, but  
21 yeah, I do have a receipt.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Counsel, with the  
24 other half of the request not here, we're not able to ask  
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1 questions. So we can't separate them; right?

2 MS. HARRIS: Both were submitted.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Together, yeah.

4 MS. HARRIS: So it would have to.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any further  
6 questions? Okay. If there's no further questions, I'll  
7 entertain a motion.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
9 am motioning to deny Mr. Allen for an individual private  
10 patrolman license and Ms. Jondese Allen as a member. The  
11 reason being is time and distance of law enforcement contact  
12 as indicated for the record in 2021, 2019, 2015, 2014, et  
13 cetera.

14 MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, does that include the  
15 corporate license for Certified Protective Detail, LLC, as  
16 well?

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: My apology. Yes. That does  
18 include it.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And so also I did want  
20 to ask a question, Mr. Allen. In reading your actual letter  
21 to the board, it indicates that, you know, you've got  
22 yourself a certified protection detail. Are you currently  
23 practicing or have any business?

24 MR. ALLEN: No, no.  
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1           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I just wanted to make  
2 sure.

3           Okay. We have a motion. Do we have a second?

4           MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll second.

5           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
6 a second. All in favor say aye.

7           (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

8           MR. ALLEN: I appreciate it. Thank you.

9           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The next agenda item is  
10 Agenda Item Number 39, Ranger Guard, is applying for a new  
11 corporate license. Do we have Kimberly Young and  
12 Jonathan(sic) Nathan? Good morning.

13           MS. YOUNG: Good morning.

14           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Please tell us a little bit  
15 about yourself and the intentions with the license.

16           MS. YOUNG: I'm Kim Young. I currently live in  
17 Texas. We conduct private security and investigations all  
18 over Texas, about 150 employees. And we would like to  
19 conduct services in Nevada.

20           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir.

21           MR. NATHAN: I'm Jonah Nathan. I've been  
22 operating the company since 2015. I came from cyber  
23 security, cyber forensics. And it was getting boring. So  
24 you can imagine fiscal security is much more exciting. It

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1 kind of is. I got to the point where we protect heads of  
2 state, at the federal government. And, you know, Nevada is,  
3 especially Las Vegas Metro, is a growing business center.  
4 And we feel that we can provide great service locally and  
5 let's get licensed.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are you local then?  
7 Are you now?

8 MR. NATHAN: Kim is going to be local.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Gotcha.  
10 Okay. Any further questions from the board?

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board's indulgence. Board Member  
12 Cortez. Question for Mrs. Young. Talk to me about the  
13 situation that occurred in 2017 in the City of Conroy.

14 MS. YOUNG: Congray?

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: That's correct.

16 MS. YOUNG: It was a security company that we had  
17 started up together. Well, it was supposed to be a security  
18 company that we started together. It didn't end up being  
19 that. I had hired a couple of employees to help with  
20 payroll, hiring, and what not. They weren't -- They weren't  
21 exactly doing their job and I had an issue with that. So,  
22 instead of talking to me, they went to Fawn Crayton, started  
23 saying things about me not doing payroll correctly and what  
24 not. Without speaking to me, she believed them. And, from  
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1 there on out, it just -- it was a huge problem. I ended up  
2 quitting and leaving the company.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

4 MEMBER BEZICK: And this is Bezick. Ms. Young,  
5 there was a state tax lien for \$247 out of Texas.

6 MS. YOUNG: You know what, I don't actually know  
7 what that is or where it is. I mean, if it's an issue, I'm  
8 obviously more than willing to --

9 MEMBER BEZICK: You haven't contacted the State  
10 of Texas to find out what that was?

11 MS. YOUNG: I don't believe it's Texas. I think  
12 it's California, but I'm not sure. But, if it is an issue, I  
13 can certainly find out what it is and take care of it.

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: Ms. Young, this is Gronauer.  
15 What was your role in Texas in the security company you were  
16 going to start or started?

17 MS. YOUNG: I was the qualified manager of the  
18 company.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. What is the role of a  
20 qualified agent here in Nevada?

21 MS. YOUNG: Basically overseeing the running of  
22 the company.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: What does that mean?

24 MS. YOUNG: Hiring, making sure that the  
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1 employees are up to standards, that they're licensed, that  
2 they do what they're supposed to be doing and that we're  
3 conducting business appropriately the way that, you know,  
4 according to the laws and standards of the state.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: You understand that if someone  
6 works for you and they violate one of the rules this is on  
7 you?

8 MS. YOUNG: Yes, sir. Oh, yes, sir.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: So are you just going to get up  
10 and quit?

11 MS. YOUNG: No. No, sir. No.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, that's what I'm trying to  
13 figure out what happened in Texas. You said then I just  
14 quit.

15 MS. YOUNG: Well, I quit, because the lady that  
16 owned the company was saying that -- was trying to accuse me  
17 of stealing money, trying to say that I was not paying  
18 employees. She had, like, no running of the company  
19 whatsoever. I did everything, payroll, hiring, managing,  
20 everything. But, when these two employees went to her to  
21 start complaining about me, that's what she decided to get  
22 involved in the company. As soon as she started accusing me,  
23 telling me that she was going to file charges on me for  
24 theft, no, I didn't want to stay employed with her.

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1           MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I can understand that.  
2 But then we have civil judgment and I think you were just  
3 asked about it for builders as the creditor on June 17th,  
4 2008. You said you had no idea what that's about. State tax  
5 lien, which you were asked about, you had no idea what that  
6 was about. How can all of this stuff happen to you and you  
7 have no idea? You have to be informed of it one way or the  
8 other. Actually, I know you're being informed of it.

9           MS. YOUNG: I honestly do not know what the tax  
10 lien is for. I have no idea. I really don't.

11           MEMBER GRONAUER: 1993 you did disclose a  
12 bankruptcy.

13           MS. YOUNG: Yes.

14           MEMBER GRONAUER: With the other things in 1993,  
15 which was the state tax lien, you didn't disclose. So it  
16 just confuses me.

17           MS. YOUNG: I wasn't aware of it until I was told  
18 by the investigator about that. I didn't even know anything  
19 about it.

20           MEMBER GRONAUER: Give me a second here. With  
21 the board's indulgence.

22           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

23           MEMBER GRONAUER: Sir, the theft you didn't  
24 know -- there was no theft. The person just said they were  
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1 going to file a theft charge against you?

2 MR. NATHAN: Yes.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: And the assault charge in 2008,  
4 when asked about the assault, you stated that you and a  
5 friend were having a text argument, your friend's husband  
6 called the police.

7 MR. NATHAN: Yes, that's correct. We were  
8 arguing through text messaging on the phone and her husband  
9 got involved, called the police. And the whole thing was  
10 dismissed. We're still friends today.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I have no more  
12 questions.

13 MR. NATHAN: Can I share something with the  
14 board?

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Briefly.

16 MR. NATHAN: There was a couple of questions on  
17 financials. One thing we take a lot of pride in as a  
18 company, I can only attest to since I've been running the  
19 company since 2015, we've never been late one day on payroll  
20 and we pay weekly. So, I understand there can be financial  
21 concerns and that's something I've heard a couple of times  
22 tonight. Sorry. This morning. I'm still in a different  
23 time zone. And I just want to reassure the board it's  
24 something that we take very seriously.

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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And so you're the owner of  
2 the company for Ranger?

3                   MR. NATHAN: I'm a partner.

4                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Partner. Okay. Who is the  
5 other partner?

6                   MR. NATHAN: Asab Catran. You were talking about  
7 the Navy. He was in the Israeli version of the CB's.

8                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Gotcha. And she would be  
9 your local operator then?

10                  MR. NATHAN: Yes.

11                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
12 from the board? Okay. No further questions. I didn't know  
13 there was an Israeli version, so that's awesome. Hearing  
14 there's no further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

15                  MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
16 am going to motion that we approve Ranger Guard for a new  
17 corporate patrolman license, that Kimberly Young be awarded  
18 the individual private patrolman license, and that it be  
19 placed in abeyance so that she can become the qualifying  
20 agent. Corporate officer to be approved is Mr. Jonathan  
21 Nathan. All of this is subject to all statutory and  
22 regulatory requirements.

23                  MR. NATHAN: I think you have my name wrong. My  
24 name is Jonah, J-o-n-a-h.

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1 MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm sorry. Jonah Nathan. My  
2 apologies.

3 MR. NATHAN: My parents gave me a winner.

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: J-o-n-a-h.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. We have a motion.  
6 Do we have a second?

7 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. We have a  
9 second. All in favor say aye.

10 (Three members voted in favor of the motion)

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Three in favor. All  
12 opposed.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. No.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So it's three to one.

15 Approval is granted. Congratulations and good luck to you.

16 MR. NATHAN: Thank you.

17 MS. YOUNG: Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. The last one, Agenda  
19 Item Number 40, is Pac Armed LLC. Is Augustine G. Nepo?  
20 Thank you, sir. And William Kapuwai. So, Gentlemen, tell us  
21 a little bit about yourselves and the intentions with the  
22 license.

23 MR. NEPO: Good morning, Board Members. So I am  
24 Augustine G. Nepo, November, echo, paw, Oscar, Nepo.

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1 Currently, me and my partner over here, we moved from Hawaii.  
2 That was my last duty station, so I finally met up with him.  
3 We make partnership. We moved to the ninth island. We  
4 figured that we can actually do something out here since  
5 there's a lot of Polynesian culture out here.

6 Basically, our instinct is just to have a  
7 community-state business or actually community-run with the  
8 Polynesian culture. But we're just trying to make a name out  
9 here. We have a small footprint, but we just want to make  
10 sure we have a bigger name out here. Plus, our in-state  
11 agents who travel around and make sure we understand the TTP,  
12 the lessons learned that we saw throughout the few years that  
13 I've been in the military and the security business and try  
14 to bring something together so we can actually have, you  
15 know -- I'm trying to not say it in a military term. I  
16 apologize. Somewhere where we understand it throughout the  
17 whole long run, something how you guys have your NRS and your  
18 NAC. So we have it daily or annually come up, so there's  
19 what our instate is for our company.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. You, sir.

21 MR. KAPUWAI: Good morning. My name is Samson  
22 Kapuwai. I just moved here July 6th will make a year. So  
23 I'm fresh out here. And, just going off of home, I was  
24 pretty much a bouncer for over ten years and I just wanted to  
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1 come over here and get knowledge from my friend, Augustine,  
2 and just have the privilege of working with him and just  
3 growing in to this field.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

5 Are there any questions from the board?

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
7 Kapuwai?

8 MR. KAPUWAI: Yes.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Talk to me about your  
10 incident in 2015, back in Hawaii, DUI. What was the  
11 substance?

12 MR. KAPUWAI: Oh, DUI, yes. It was alcohol.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Anything else?

14 MR. KAPUWAI: No.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: What happened?

16 MR. KAPUWAI: I just was drinking at a bar and  
17 going through things. I recently lost my mom and my grandpa  
18 within five years and I kind of just went off and did my own  
19 thing. I wasn't working or anything like that. And I just  
20 was drinking and --

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm sorry. I don't mean to  
22 interrupt you. How drunk were you?

23 MR. KAPUWAI: I think it was 1.95(sic).

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: And this is why I'm asking. The  
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1 Vegas community is very challenging.

2 MR. KAPUWAI: Yes. I've been clean and sober  
3 ever since.

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: And I can appreciate that. I  
5 just encourage you to stay on the path because that's my  
6 concern. I totally appreciate Polynesian, keeping the  
7 family, we need you out here. But, as his partner, obviously  
8 he would be taking the hit for --

9 MR. KAPUWAI: Yes, of course.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: -- for whatever unfortunate event  
11 may or may not occur. That was all of my questions. Thank  
12 you.

13 MR. KAPUWAI: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I have a question. There  
15 was a -- some sort of unlicensed activity. What was that?

16 MR. KAPUWAI: That was me.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

18 MR. KAPUWAI: Because I -- Sorry.

19 MR. NEPO: He was from Hawaii.

20 MR. KAPUWAI: Yeah, I'm from Hawaii. So, when  
21 Vinnie and them came up, I told them, oh, I have everything  
22 and they said, oh, what about your PILB license. So I pulled  
23 out my PILB card and I said, oh, right here. Talking about  
24 another license. So I was getting misled from other people

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1 on how to do things out here. So I explained to them I'm  
2 from Hawaii. I don't know anything about this. But I'm  
3 willing to go to the office. And I think I went to the  
4 office so much that Mr. Ingram was like, hey man, you should  
5 work here. And I just kept going and just trying to update  
6 as much information as I can. And then I called Augustine  
7 and that's how I brought him in to help me and educate me  
8 with the process and has been smooth sailing ever since.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I appreciate it. Because  
10 we've had some people that have taken that same license and  
11 taken it to an extreme and not listened and had a lot of  
12 fines. And not listened to what the rules are. So we  
13 appreciate you coming in and learning more about it. So  
14 thank you for that.

15 Are there any other questions?

16 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. Mr. Nepo, thank  
17 you for your distinguished military service.

18 MR. NEPO: I appreciate it. Thank you. It was  
19 my honor.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. He beat me  
21 to it this time. Hawaii was your last duty station?

22 MR. NEPO: That was my last duty station, sir.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: What base?

24 MR. NEPO: Schofield.

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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Schofield, yeah. I was at  
2 Oahu.

3                   MR. NEPO: Well, that was the best part about it,  
4 my last duty station. All the other ones were not so  
5 pleasant.

6                   MEMBER GRONAUER: What military were you in?

7                   MR. NEPO: The Army.

8                   MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, that's not a military.

9                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Oh, Bobby. You were doing so  
10 good.

11                  MEMBER GRONAUER: I thought you were in the  
12 Marine Corps.

13                  MR. NEPO: Sorry, sir. I don't eat crayons.

14                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Right. No. Okay. Any  
15 further questions? Okay. No further questions, I'll  
16 entertain a motion.

17                  MEMBER GRONAUER: I have to apologize. This is  
18 Gronauer. I make a motion to approve Pac Armed LLC as  
19 applying for a new corporate private patrolman license.  
20 Augustine G. Nepo is applying for an individual private  
21 patrolman license. If approved, he is requesting that his  
22 individual license be placed in abeyance so that he may  
23 become the qualifying agent for Pac Armed LLC. Members to be  
24 approved are Augustine G. Nepo and Samson William K.

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1 Kapuwai. This is subject to all statutory and regulatory  
2 requirements.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
4 a second?

5 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
7 a second. All in favor say aye.

8 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations. And thank  
10 you again for getting educated.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: Remember from the halls of  
12 Montezuma.

13 (The court reporter interrupts)

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes, ma'am.

15 At this point in the actual agenda, we're going  
16 to take a quick break, and then when we come back we'll have  
17 an agenda item and then we'll swear in all individuals that  
18 are in here again, just in case you weren't here the first  
19 time.

20 Let's take a ten-minute break. So we'll see you  
21 back at 10:50.

22 (Recess was taken)

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So now we're on Agenda  
24 Item 41. Pursuant to NRS 644 -- I'm sorry. 6488.020(3), the  
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1 members of the board shall elect a chairman of the board from  
2 among its members by majority vote. After the election, the  
3 chair will hold office for a term of two years, beginning on  
4 July 1st of each year. Board members may nominate candidates  
5 to assume the role of chairman to be followed by a vote. The  
6 newly elected chairman will assume duties July 1st, 2022  
7 through June 30th, 2024. This is up for possible action. So  
8 we'll go ahead and take nominations.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. Are  
10 we talking nominations or are we doing a little brief intro?

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Well, I guess once you  
12 nominate yourself, you can go ahead and do an intro. So  
13 we'll go ahead and start with the nominations.

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Of course I  
15 got to be a little different. The thing is I would rather  
16 know before I make the nomination for myself or somebody else  
17 how the board -- how the chairman now feels about going on.  
18 I would like to know what her wishes are.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Well, it's been my  
20 pleasure to serve on the board for the last two years. As a  
21 member of the industry, it's been very positive for me to be  
22 a part of what actually happens in the industry. So it's  
23 been something that I've enjoyed and something that I would  
24 like to continue. I feel like I have an insider's

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1 understanding of what the needs are for the industry and what  
2 both the licensees and the actual applicants go through. So,  
3 I would like the opportunity to continue, if chosen by the  
4 board. So I nominate myself.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. This is Gronauer again.  
6 And I'll nominate the present chairman, chairwoman.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
8 am also interested in nominating myself. Just to provide a  
9 brief background. If you had the opportunity to read my bio,  
10 I am a founding member of the Juvenile Justice Probation  
11 Officers Association in 2011. I am very familiar with  
12 Roberts rules. I've been a board member for over ten years.  
13 I'm currently in law enforcement, so I'm very familiar with  
14 legalities, court process, especially with things that are  
15 involved in the PILB requirements. I'm bilingual, in case  
16 anybody needs help in Spanish, I can help you out with that  
17 understand some Roberts rules or if I need to stop a meeting,  
18 I'll let you know in Spanish, if needed.

19 I'm a no-nonsense strength kind of a shooter. I,  
20 as a chairperson, in the interest of time, I too have had to  
21 sit here. So I need things to move nice and smooth. I don't  
22 like chaos. I like nice and orderly fashion. So for that  
23 reason I am nominating myself for chairwoman.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.  
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1           Are there any other nominations? Okay. So now  
2 do I just -- we entertain a motion.

3           MS. HARRIS: Is that all the members who are  
4 interested?

5           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes.

6           MS. HARRIS: Okay. Then now would be the time to  
7 entertain a motion.

8           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So I'll go ahead and  
9 entertain a motion for the chairperson assignment.

10          MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll make a  
11 motion to -- to have our present chair -- chairperson, Tammy  
12 Nixon, be elected for a term of two years, beginning May 1st  
13 of each year. Board member may nominate a sooner role  
14 chairman to be followed by a vote the newly-elected chairman  
15 will be assured the duties from July 1st, 2022, through June  
16 30th, 2024.

17          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a nomination. Do we  
18 have a second?

19          MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I'll second.

20          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a nomination. We  
21 have a second. All in favor say aye.

22          MEMBER CORTEZ: Can I vote? Okay. Aye.

23          (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

24          CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. So then we move  
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1 forward with myself, Tammy Nixon, as the continued  
2 chairperson. Thank you.

3 I think you did. I'm going to check your pulse.  
4 But thank you all and I appreciate and am honored to continue  
5 to serve.

6 MR. INGRAM: Congratulations.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Okay. So we have  
8 a roomful of individuals for the registration appeals. And I  
9 will ask Counsel Harris to go ahead and move forward in  
10 swearing everybody in.

11 MS. HARRIS: For anyone on the agenda or for  
12 anyone who plans to provide testimony, can you please stand  
13 and raise your right hand.

14 (Witnesses were sworn in)

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I'm just confirming. It  
16 seems like we have about three, maybe four, people up north  
17 for the registration appeals.

18 MR. DIAZ: Yes, that's correct, we have four.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you. Okay.  
20 Let's get to this. Okay. Agenda Item Number 42, Chievas  
21 Johnson. Thank you, sir. Come on up. Good morning, sir.  
22 I'm going to ask --

23 MR. JOHNSON: How are you doing? Good morning.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning. I'm going to  
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1 ask Mr. Saldino to update us on why you're here.

2 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for the  
3 record. The applicant was denied for a non-disclosure of  
4 2017 felony, attempt coercion with force or threat of force.  
5 The applicant received 18 to 60 months in prison suspended  
6 and placed on probation not longer than five years. This  
7 case was reduced to disorderly conduct after the applicant  
8 completed mental health court on 1-20 of '21. The applicant  
9 had multiple competency determination hearings and was found  
10 to be competent.

11 2011, a non-disclosure of a felony, obstruct or  
12 resist executive officer out of California. The applicant  
13 received three years of probation.

14 In 2001 there was a misdemeanor obstruct public  
15 officer. He received 36 months of probation and 45 days in  
16 jail out of California.

17 2005, another misdemeanor. Three counts of  
18 obstruct a public officer. Received 36 months probation and  
19 55 days in jail in California.

20 2016 out of Nevada, it was a resist a public  
21 officer and he was found guilty and sentenced to time served.  
22 He served one day in jail.

23 The applicant disclosed the 2017 coercion  
24 conviction as a misdemeanor disorderly conduct. This case  
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1 was reduced after he completed the mental health court.

2 He was also arrested on 10-17 of '19 and 11-8 of  
3 '19 for violations of probation.

4 This investigator did request the police report  
5 from the 2017 arrest and that was provided to the board as a  
6 memo.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any questions from  
8 the board for Mr. Johnson?

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Can you hear him?

11 MR. JOHNSON: Yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Court Reporter,  
13 can you hear Mr. Gronauer?

14 THE COURT REPORTER: Yes, I can hear him. He's  
15 just a lot softer than everybody else on the board.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Mr. Chievas.

17 MR. JOHNSON: Yeah, Chievas.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Chievas. Like the Chevy.  
19 Chievas, okay. Mr. Chievas, are you still on probation?

20 MR. JOHNSON: No, I'm not.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: Do you have any kind of papers  
22 to prove it or --

23 MR. JOHNSON: Yes. I received an honorable  
24 discharge and the charges were dropped to a disorderly  
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1 conduct. I have the -- I submitted some court documents of  
2 the case being dropped.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Investigator Saladino,  
4 do we have anything on that to say he's on or off probation?

5 MR. SALADINO: That is correct, sir, he is off  
6 probation.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

8 Mr. Chievas, can you explain to me why you did  
9 not disclose some of these here arrests?

10 MR. JOHNSON: First of all, I apologize to the  
11 PILB, but I was giving notice that I only had this charge on  
12 my record. I didn't have any knowledge that I had prior  
13 charges from the past because of situations that I had  
14 over -- I guess they were saying that I had police duty or  
15 police officer.

16 What happened was at the time me and my wife, we  
17 got in to it, and I was on Sunset Boulevard and the guy --  
18 the store that I went to, he said that I stole a banana. And  
19 the police officer tried to run up on me and I was sitting  
20 down low. And he nicked himself with a cigarette. That case  
21 was basically dropped. And I went to the courts in  
22 California and got a copy of it. And they said that the case  
23 was destroyed or they destroyed it after they dropped it. So  
24 I didn't have any idea that I had a California, you know,  
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1 history or any charges as to my knowledge when I went up to  
2 the court houses, the case was dropped by the courts, and  
3 then the judge destroyed the file, you know, on that case.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. All right. What the  
5 application asked for is arrests, it doesn't matter if it's  
6 been --

7 MR. JOHNSON: At the time when I got a background  
8 check, I knew that I had this charge prior to getting this  
9 charge of assault with a deadly weapon and I had to complete  
10 probation. In this matter, I was attacked by security  
11 guards. I took them to civil court. It was a transgender  
12 male that attacked me and came up with false allegations. I  
13 was granted false imprisonment by the district court, the  
14 civil court.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: These security guards, are the  
16 same location where you had a problem before where they asked  
17 you to leave?

18 MR. JOHNSON: Yes. This was at the --

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. I read the police  
20 report. I just wanted to make sure.

21 MR. JOHNSON: Yes.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: And then if you are granted a  
23 work card, what do you plan on doing with it?

24 MR. JOHNSON: I've been -- This will be my third  
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1 license as of a guard. And I'm just trying to, like in '99  
2 was my first time becoming a guard. And I received my second  
3 license in California. I received the CPR permit and I  
4 completed the class. And, at that time, I didn't get to  
5 pursue it. I had the license but --

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: What do you plan on doing with  
7 it?

8 MR. JOHNSON: I just plan on making myself a  
9 better person and making the company I work for a safe  
10 environment, you know.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: Don't confuse a work card with  
12 a license, okay, because you keep saying license. A work  
13 card is not a license. So a work card you can work for  
14 somebody who has a license.

15 MR. JOHNSON: Right.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: I have no further questions.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
18 from board members? Okay. No further questions, I'll  
19 entertain a motion.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
21 going to motion that we uphold the denial based on time and  
22 distance of law enforcement conduct and courtroom  
23 proceedings. We have an incident back in 2017 that the court  
24 concluded on January 20th of 2021 and we also have failing to  
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1 disclose any and all criminal history.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
3 second?

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll second.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
6 second. All in favor say aye.

7 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, sir, unfortunately, we're  
9 not approving your work card at this time. If you have any  
10 questions, you can follow up with the office.

11 MR. JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.

13 Agenda Item Number 43, Jason Madi. Is Mr. Madi  
14 here? Are you up north? Okay. We'll go ahead and trail  
15 Agenda Item Number 43 for right now.

16 Agenda Item Number 44, Robert Coleman, that one  
17 has been postponed.

18 Agenda Item Number 45, Aaron Montgomery, that one  
19 has been withdrawn.

20 We're now on Agenda Item Number 46, Angela  
21 Ceballos. Good morning.

22 Investigator Saladino, could you please update us  
23 on Ms. Ceballos.

24 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
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1 applicant was denied for a 1998 felony for embezzlement,  
2 receiving stolen property, and taking a vehicle without  
3 owner's consent. The applicant was given probation and she  
4 did provide the 1203.4 documentation from California that  
5 this was dismissed.

6 In 2007, she received a felon in possession of a  
7 firearm, where she received 16 months in prison out of  
8 California.

9 2010, misdemeanor for battery, out of California,  
10 where she received 36 months probation and 90 days in jail.  
11 The original charge was battery against a peace officer.

12 The applicant disclosed after she received the  
13 denial letter, provided all the 1203.4 paperwork, and she  
14 also provided board staff numerous letters of recommendation  
15 for her jobs that she's currently holding. She's also  
16 working in the Casino S building for the MGM.

17 During this time where she was waiting for the  
18 board, she's been very responsive to making sure she doesn't  
19 miss the meeting and providing us all the recommendations  
20 that she's received.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Fantastic. Thank you.

22 Are there any questions from the board?

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: I do. This is Board Member

24 Cortez. Mrs. Ceballos, question. You were denied back in  
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1 December of 2021; correct?

2 MS. CEBALLOS: Yes, ma'am.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Do you recall the denial?  
4 I have the transcripts.

5 MS. CEBALLOS: Oh, because on the question I  
6 thought they were talking about Nevada, getting in trouble  
7 and stuff.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And the reason why I'm  
9 asking is that is this correct, failure to disclose?

10 MR. SALADINO: It was failure to disclose at  
11 first. And then, once we contacted her, she did provide the  
12 1203.4 documents and moving forward with all of that.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: I guess I'm just not happy that  
14 this was a second round. You knew to disclose everything.  
15 But I can appreciate you coming back up.

16 She was denied at first; correct?

17 MR. SALADINO: Correct. But this is her first  
18 time at a board meeting.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: My apologies. I take that back.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
21 questions?

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Did you read  
23 the paper that they gave you for 1203.4 that states what it's  
24 about on your charges?

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1 MS. CEBALLOS: The 1203.4? They said it was a  
2 1202.1A, they sent me the paper. I have it with me. It's a  
3 12-21.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: You have it with you?

5 MS. CEBALLOS: Uh-huh. I sent it to you.

6 (The court reporter interrupts)

7 MS. CEBALLOS: The order, I sent it to you, the  
8 1202.1A, I sent it to him. And it shows I got -- everything  
9 got expunged.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Out of California?

11 MS. CEBALLOS: Yes. Merced County.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. The reason I  
13 ask that question is because we've had this come up quite  
14 often. I can understand the confusion. Once you get the  
15 paper, you go, okay, good.

16 MS. CEBALLOS: Yes, sir.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: But the paper, we had it read  
18 here at a previous board meeting and what it states and that  
19 if anybody asked you, you still have to state that you were  
20 arrested. So I wanted to make sure that your paper says the  
21 same thing that we've heard before.

22 MS. CEBALLOS: Everything is the same. I mean,  
23 it's -- The battery on the peace officer, I never hit a peace  
24 officer ever. It's my ex-husband, he hit me.

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1                   MEMBER GRONAUER: Slow down. I'm just trying to  
2 find out about the paper certificate.

3                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The investigator is looking  
4 at it too.

5                   MS. CEBALLOS: Because I would never hit a peace  
6 officer. I was born and raised military. I would have more  
7 respect.

8                   MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino for the  
9 record. The applicant did provide 1203.4 documents. I'm  
10 looking at it. The cases were dismissed under 1203.4.

11                   MS. CEBALLOS: I have everything in here. It's  
12 been so long.

13                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yeah, you're fine. You're  
14 fine. So, on the paperwork that you received, when you  
15 received the paperwork dismissing your information, okay, did  
16 you understand that it states that you have to still report  
17 when you're -- that you've been arrested, even though it's  
18 expunged?

19                   MS. CEBALLOS: Yes. But when they have a  
20 question on the paper, I thought it meant Nevada, because  
21 I've been in Nevada for eight years now and so I didn't know  
22 if it, you know, if it meant, like, in California since I was  
23 living here. So I haven't been in trouble since, so I didn't  
24 understand that part. So I read it wrong and I explained it

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1 to him when he was asking. I'm, like, oh, okay, like I did  
2 with my taxi because I've been a taxi driver for six years.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Is there a -- There's  
4 a piece of paper that, you know, that she's provided up  
5 there. It's this one.

6 MS. CEBALLOS: Oh, yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So if you want, look on the  
8 bottom. And we just want to make sure everybody understands  
9 this, because this is what's on the license and that's why  
10 Ms. Cortez was so nice to print it out and highlight it. It  
11 states that list all charges regardless of how long ago the  
12 incident was, list all charges regardless of what state it  
13 was in. This is what's on the application.

14 MS. CEBALLOS: I probably just bypassed it  
15 because I like writing more than reading. So my apologies.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any other  
17 board questions? Okay. If there's no further board  
18 questions, we'll go ahead and I'll entertain a motion.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
20 Careful reading -- not reading the fine print. Because I  
21 Googled this and it took me two seconds to read this. So  
22 everybody else who is coming up for appeal understands that  
23 it took me two seconds to read this and I didn't apply for  
24 the position.

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1                   So, with that said, you were very honest in the  
2 information provided by the investigator. I am going to  
3 motion that we approve or overturn the denial and approve  
4 Ms. Ceballos her work card.

5                   MS. CEBALLOS: Thank you.

6                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
7 a second?

8                   MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

9                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
10 second. All in favor say aye.

11                   (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

12                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations. The board  
13 will contact you --

14                   MS. CEBALLOS: Okay.

15                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: -- for the next steps.

16                   Agenda Item Number 47, Artemio Figueroa. Sorry.  
17 Joshua, okay.

18                   MR. FIGUEROA: Good morning, everyone.

19                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning. Okay.  
20 Mr. Saladino, could you please update us on Mr. Figueroa.

21                   MR. SALADINO: Yes. The applicant was denied for  
22 a non-disclosure of a 2009 felony use of a controlled  
23 substance, cocaine, out of New Jersey. The applicant  
24 received 364 days in jail, suspended, two years probation,  
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1 and a suspended driver's license and a fine.

2 2006, there was a misdemeanor, loiter for the  
3 purpose of using controlled substance out of New Jersey. The  
4 applicant received a suspended jail term of 30 days and a  
5 fine.

6 The applicant did not disclose at first. The  
7 applicant did provide letters of recommendation and stated  
8 that he had passed background checks for previous jobs and  
9 the conviction did not come up and he thought it had been off  
10 his record.

11 Since the denial, the applicant has been very  
12 forthcoming with the information and wishes to appeal. He  
13 was added to the Marksman Security roster from February 16th  
14 of 2022 and was removed on 3-7-22 when he was denied.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So he did have a provisional  
16 license.

17 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Figueroa?

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez.

19 MR. FIGUEROA: Good morning, ma'am.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: Good morning. So, on the paper I  
21 provided up there, list all charges regardless if they were  
22 expunged, dismissed, or denied. Why did you fail to  
23 disclose?

24 MR. FIGUEROA: I've been out of trouble for over  
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1 ten years. I just moved here eight months ago. I graduated  
2 college. I'm an HVAC technician also. When I moved here, I  
3 worked for Nevada Single Service. They're a non-profit  
4 organization. You have to be thoroughly fingerprinted,  
5 background check. I've never been through that. Some  
6 applications do ask how long if you have a felony seven years  
7 or they don't even ask. I passed. And I had to get my CPR  
8 license to deal with the elderlies at that time. I got a  
9 certification. So I just thought it just wouldn't pop up.  
10 Honestly I can't hide what I've done in the past. It's  
11 impossible.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: Right. So I'm a little confused  
13 as to why you wouldn't list it.

14 MR. FIGUEROA: Because I haven't been in trouble  
15 in so long and I just thought maybe it wouldn't pop it. And  
16 I was in a new state. I'm not trying to make an excuse for  
17 that. I haven't been in trouble in many, many years. I was  
18 working for security. And I'm not trying to make excuses and  
19 I apologize for each one of you for making that mistake. But  
20 I just haven't been in trouble for so long and I've had  
21 plenty of jobs where they don't ask if you committed a felony  
22 or if you've been in trouble if you committed a felony in  
23 five years, then I would explain because I didn't commit a  
24 felony in five years or seven years because I've been out of  
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1 trouble for a very long time. So that was just basically it.  
2 And I know now moving forward to never make this mistake  
3 again because I don't want to be in this position. And, if  
4 you guys grant me this position, you guys won't regret it.  
5 And I won't make this mistake.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

7 MR. FIGUEROA: You're very welcome. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any other questions  
9 from the board?

10 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. The arrests were  
11 for the use of controlled substances. No longer on  
12 controlled substances?

13 MR. FIGUEROA: Oh, no, sir. Absolutely not, no.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
15 the board?

16 What are you currently doing, sir?

17 MR. FIGUEROA: I'm doing HVAC right now because  
18 my security license is on hold. But I have interviews with  
19 Granite Thursday and Wednesday. I actually have companies  
20 that are waiting to hire me.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Armed, unarmed?

22 MR. FIGUEROA: Unarmed. I wish I could be armed.  
23 Actually I can't. I don't know if that could maybe move down  
24 the road working, trying to, you know, rehabilitate myself

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1 and prove myself and maybe down the road. This is just a  
2 start.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions?

4 Hearing there's no further questions, I'll  
5 entertain a motion.

6 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move that we  
7 overturn the denial and grant the work card for Mr. Figueroa.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do I  
9 have a second?

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
11 will second that motion, just noting for the record, although  
12 you did not disclose, the information given by the  
13 investigator, you've been incredibly forthcoming since, have  
14 been made aware of the requirements, and time and distance  
15 based off of law enforcement contacts. We're looking at a  
16 2009 and a 2006 case.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. We have a  
18 second. All in favor say aye.

19 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir.

21 MR. FIGUEROA: Thank you. I appreciate you guys  
22 so much.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. The office will work  
24 with you.

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1 MEMBER GRONAUER: Stay out of trouble.

2 MR. FIGUEROA: Yes, sir. Absolutely.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item Number 48,  
4 Mr. Clarence Thomas -- Mr. Clarence Harris. Oh, God, I'm so  
5 sorry.

6 MR. HARRIS: Good morning, everyone.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning, sir. Just hang  
8 on one second. Let's -- Hey, guys, we've got to continue the  
9 meeting.

10 MR. INGRAM: For future, please do not approach  
11 board staff after the decision has been made by the board.  
12 The board will reach out to you. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

14 Okay. We're on Agenda Item Number 48, Clarence  
15 Harris. Thank you, sir.

16 Mr. Saladino, could you please brief us on  
17 Mr. Harris.

18 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a  
19 2010 felony forgery. This was in Indiana. He received 90  
20 days in a halfway house. This was not disclosed.

21 In 2000 there was a misdemeanor out of Illinois  
22 for a possession of a controlled substance. He received one  
23 year in jail.

24 2008, this one was disclosed, a misdemeanor out  
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1 of Illinois for a DUI, drugs/alcohol, where he received three  
2 years probation. The applicant started his probation on June  
3 17th of '09 and was discharged on June 17th of 2011 for the  
4 DUI probation.

5 2012, misdemeanor, possession of a controlled  
6 substance. He received an additional 15 months of probation.

7 2016, misdemeanor out of Illinois. Forgery,  
8 attempt possession of controlled substance. The forgery was  
9 not prosecuted. Possession charge was reduced and he served  
10 12 months probation.

11 The applicant did not disclose his arrest  
12 history. He was made provisional but was not added to any  
13 licensee's roster. The applicant wishes to appeal.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, Board, are there any  
15 questions for Mr. Harris?

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
17 Mr. Harris, why did you fail to disclose all of the criminal  
18 history? I've got all of one.

19 MR. HARRIS: I really didn't think I had to go  
20 back after ten years. I disclosed my DUI and my possession.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you apply on line or hard  
22 paper?

23 MR. HARRIS: I went to the office.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: You went to the office. Okay.  
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1 Were people there able to help you out filling out the  
2 application?

3 MR. HARRIS: I filled it out myself.

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. You did fill it out  
5 yourself. Did you notice on the application that it says  
6 failure to list all incidents could result in the denial and  
7 then there's also some bullet points as to why it was going  
8 to get denied. I'm asking you this because I have a very  
9 hard position and decision to make. You disclose one but you  
10 don't disclose all of them. It happened too long ago. I've  
11 got an incident that you just got discharged from probation  
12 in 2017. That wasn't long ago.

13 MR. HARRIS: That was --

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: The applicant completed probation  
15 for this case on December 7th of 2017 for an incident that  
16 occurred out of 2016.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: That's five years. You made  
18 me do my math.

19 MR. HARRIS: I disclosed that. That's the  
20 possession.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Actually you did not disclose  
22 that. I have information here from the investigator that you  
23 did not disclose the 2017 incident. You also didn't disclose  
24 the 2012 incident. You disclosed the 2008 incident. Did not  
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1 disclose the 2000 incident or the 2010 incident. I don't  
2 have any questions. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Is there any further  
4 questions from the board?

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Mr. Harris.

6 MR. HARRIS: Yes, sir.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: You know, you just saw because  
8 of time and distance somebody was approved the card.

9 MR. HARRIS: Excuse me, sir.

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: The last person was approved  
11 the card because time and distance and all the cooperation  
12 with the investigators and everything else. Now, you sat  
13 here and just -- stood there and just said I haven't been in  
14 trouble for ten years. This is 2022. And I'm just trying to  
15 make sure you understand that that time of 2017 is five years  
16 ago that you were released from probation. Are we wrong with  
17 that?

18 MR. HARRIS: No, that was from the possession  
19 that I put down in the paper, sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Saladino, could  
21 you help clarify?

22 MR. SALADINO: So I have a disclosure of a 2008  
23 DUI, alcohol/drugs.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: That's the only one.  
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1 MR. HARRIS: That is the one I had disclosed.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: That's the one did you do.

3 This one here was for forgery and attempted possession of  
4 controlled substance. This is the one you were on probation  
5 for.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And that happened in 2016.

7 MR. HARRIS: Forgery was in, like, 2010.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have the police report,  
9 sir.

10 MR. HARRIS: Forgery out of Indiana was in 2010,  
11 ma'am.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Either way you failed  
13 to --

14 MR. SALADINO: There is a 2010 felony forgery out  
15 of Indiana in 2010. There was an additional arrest in 2016  
16 out of Illinois for forgery, attempted possession of  
17 controlled substance. In this particular case the forgery  
18 was not prosecuted. It was not prosecuted. They only  
19 prosecuted him for the possession charge that was reduced to  
20 a misdemeanor and he served 12 months probation.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So do you remember in 2016?

22 MR. HARRIS: Yes.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So that was five years ago.

24 MR. HARRIS: That was the possession, ma'am.  
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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I understand. I don't care  
2 if it was standing on your toes. You were arrested, yes?

3                   MR. HARRIS: Yes.

4                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And did you claim it on the  
5 application?

6                   MR. HARRIS: Yes, I disclosed that possession.

7                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You disclosed one possession,  
8 sir, and that was not the one that was less than your first  
9 initial.

10                  MR. HARRIS: All --

11                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes, sir. Your initial claim  
12 was that you did not --

13                  MR. HARRIS: I understand.

14                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: -- disclaim it -- disclose it  
15 because it was more than ten years ago.

16                  MR. HARRIS: Yes, ma'am. I understand.

17                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Which means you stood right  
18 in front of us just now and lied.

19                  MR. HARRIS: No. Because --

20                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, sir. No, sir. The  
21 question is all arrests; is that correct?

22                  MR. HARRIS: Yes, ma'am.

23                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So you stood in front  
24 of us and lied. Is that correct, sir?

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1 MR. HARRIS: Yeah.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

3 Are there any further questions from the board?

4 Okay. No further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'll make a  
6 motion to uphold the denial of Clarence Harris who applied  
7 for registration and was denied.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do  
9 we have a second?

10 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
12 second. All in favor say aye.

13 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir. Have a great  
15 day.

16 Okay. Agenda Item Number 49, Cortney Ballou.  
17 Did I say that correctly?

18 MR. BALLOU: Good morning.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning. How are you?

20 MR. BALLOU: I'm all right.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Saladino, could  
22 you please let us know about Mr. Cortney.

23 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for a  
24 2004 misdemeanor out of California for carrying a loaded  
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1 firearm in public. The applicant received 24 months of  
2 probation and a work program. This was not disclosed. This  
3 arrest was from the University of California Police  
4 Department. The charge started out as a possession of a  
5 firearm at a school.

6 2006, out of California, there was a CCW on a  
7 person, carrying a loaded firearm in public, and affiliated  
8 with a gang member. The prosecution dismissed this based on  
9 lack of evidence.

10 2009, misdemeanor, possession of marijuana, one  
11 ounce or less while driving. He received five days in jail.

12 The applicant did not disclose his arrests or  
13 conviction. The applicant was made provisional and was  
14 working for Marksman Security from December 15th of '21 until  
15 January 26th of '22. The applicant wishes to appeal.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
17 questions for Mr. Ballou?

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Good morning.

19 MR. BALLOU: Good morning.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. All right.  
21 You've already heard me. Tell me why you failed to disclose.

22 MR. BALLOU: To be honest, when I filled the  
23 application out on my phone, I missed the stipulation that  
24 said, to be honest I missed it. That's my fault and I own up  
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1 to it. But I just missed it. I see it now. And after I got  
2 denied I see it. And so that's why I put what I remembered.  
3 You know what I'm saying, as far as the gun charge and the  
4 other stuff, I just didn't put it because I thought -- I  
5 didn't see it so I thought it was a regular application like  
6 a job, seven years. So I just didn't put it on there. It  
7 was my mistake.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

9 MR. BALLOU: Thank you.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: Oh, another question. Are you  
11 still claiming?

12 MR. BALLOU: No. I don't gang bang. The person  
13 I got caught with -- There was two other people in the car  
14 with me and they had a gun and that's why my case got  
15 dismissed. I don't know what happened with him. I never  
16 claimed a gang. Never affiliated. Never nothing. So I'm  
17 not on record as a gang member. The person that I was with  
18 was a felony gang and had just got out of jail. It was a  
19 family member.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: And you will continue to be  
21 working as a security guard?

22 MR. BALLOU: Yeah. If I can get back at Marksman  
23 or another company, I will, if you guys, you know, overturn.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: Armed? Unarmed?  
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1 MR. BALLOU: If I could get -- I don't have a  
2 felony or anything like that and I got approved for, I guess,  
3 I could say a weapon, so I'm pretty sure if I want to go  
4 armed, I can, but I do unarmed right now. I was just waiting  
5 to see this. Because this is my first application doing  
6 this. So I didn't get that far to get armed. But, if I can,  
7 yeah, I will.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: What are you doing now?

9 MR. BALLOU: I have a job at CVS and I also do  
10 mechanic stuff, so I was just coming from working on a car  
11 this morning, so excuse how I look.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: Where were you yesterday? Okay.  
13 Any further questions?

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Hearing there are no  
15 further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

16 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make a motion  
17 that we overturn the denial and approve Mr. Ballou for a work  
18 card based on time and distance.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
20 also motion to overturn the denial based on the time and  
21 distance and Mr. Ballou's forthcoming and taking  
22 responsibility for failing to do it correctly.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and a second.  
24 All in favor say aye.

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1 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.

3 Congratulations.

4 MR. BALLOU: I appreciate your time. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Now we're on Agenda Item  
6 Number 50, Danai Young. Is Mr. Young here or Mrs. Young  
7 here? Up north? Okay. We'll trail that one.

8 So we're now at the 10:30 cut-off. Do we want --  
9 We're just going to continue on. We're actually a little bit  
10 behind. So, when you come up, please, just in case someone  
11 has walked in and I haven't seen you, could you let us know  
12 that you're under oath or whether or not you walked in after  
13 Counsel Harris did that.

14 We'll move on to Agenda Item Number 51, Donald  
15 Gonzales. Mr. Gonzales, are you here? Okay. We'll trail  
16 51.

17 Agenda Item Number 52, Franchot West. Good  
18 afternoon, sir. Are you under oath, sir?

19 MR. WEST: Yes, ma'am.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Investigator Saladino,  
21 could you update us on Mr. West.

22 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino. The  
23 applicant was denied for a 2013 misdemeanor, carrying a  
24 pistol without a permit. This was out of Alabama. He

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1 received a fine. And this was not disclosed. The applicant  
2 did not disclose. Once contacted, the applicant did provide  
3 court documents for the charge. The applicant was working  
4 for ABC Legal Services as a process server and wishes to  
5 appeal.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
7 questions for Mr. West?

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. Mr. West,  
9 let me hear it. Why did you fail to disclose?

10 MR. WEST: I don't have any excuse or anything.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you read the application?

12 MR. WEST: Yes, ma'am. Just in my head I was  
13 thinking seven years ago, not a felony. It wouldn't be a big  
14 deal. That was just a lack of judgment by me. And I  
15 sincerely apologize for wasting everyone's time. It was a  
16 bad lack of judgment. And, for that, I missed out on five  
17 months of working for a pretty good company that I did enjoy  
18 working at.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: What was the incident? Like what  
20 happened?

21 MR. WEST: I got pulled over on my way to school,  
22 college. They pulled me over for a busted taillight. He  
23 wanted to check the car. He didn't have to, but I kind of  
24 just wanted to keep going and get to school. It was, like,  
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1 three in the morning. Got out of the car, flips the car  
2 over, and going all through the car. And my roommate had a  
3 gun. He didn't tell me until we were sitting outside the  
4 car. The policeman asked us, do you have any weapons, drugs,  
5 the same thing. I told him no because I didn't. He said  
6 there's a gun in my bag. And none of us said a word. It was  
7 my car, so I just kind of took it.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: And what are you -- Do you plan  
9 to go back to process serving or what do you plan to do with  
10 your card?

11 MR. WEST: I would like to go back to process  
12 serving. Hopefully from there I would like to get in to  
13 private investigating at some point if I get approved and  
14 everything. That's kind of just my short term goal right  
15 now.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. You do understand that  
17 that's a different license?

18 MR. WEST: Yes, ma'am.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. What are you doing  
20 currently?

21 MR. WEST: Right now I coach high school football  
22 and I also coach little league football. I'm also a trainer.  
23 I trained a lot of kids, a lot of college guys, a couple of  
24 NFL guys that I train. And that's pretty much what I do

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1 right now.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
3 for the board -- from the board? Okay. Hearing there's no  
4 further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

5 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make a motion  
6 that we overturn the denial and approve Mr. West for a work  
7 card.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do I  
9 have a second?

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
12 second. All in favor say aye.

13 MR. INGRAM: Excuse me, Madam Chair, could we get  
14 a reason for that?

15 MEMBER BEZICK: Time and distance.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a  
17 second. All in favor say aye.

18 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We had a second; right?  
20 Okay.

21 Thank you. Congratulations.

22 MR. WEST: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Jeffery Hunter, Agenda Item  
24 Number 53. Mr. Hunter, are you up north?

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1 MR. DIAZ: He's in the north and he does need to  
2 be sworn in.

3 MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

4 (The witness was sworn in)

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Investigator Saladino.

6 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
7 applicant was denied for a non-disclosure of a misdemeanor,  
8 possess, manufacture, or sell a dangerous weapon out of  
9 California where he received 24 months probation. This was  
10 not disclosed. However, the applicant when contacted stated  
11 in his appeal letter that it was a pocket knife that he used  
12 to break down boxes and that's what he was -- that was the  
13 dangerous weapon for the California charge.

14 In 2012 he did disclose a misdemeanor DUI out of  
15 Nevada where he received two days in jail, a victim impact  
16 panel, and an after-care program.

17 The applicant did disclose this and provided  
18 court documents for this arrest.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And the possession or  
20 manufacturing. Oh, so the possession, okay. Got it. Okay.  
21 Okay. Any questions from the board? Okay. Hearing there  
22 are no questions, I'll entertain a motion.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

24 Madam Chair, I do have a question. My apologies.  
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1           Mr. Hunter, why did you fail to disclose the  
2 1995? I realize it's a while back. But, as we've already  
3 discussed, application's pretty clear to list everything.  
4 The fact that it was in 1995, so long ago, is not really  
5 going to stand as an excuse, because once you were asked  
6 about it, you provided the information. So what was your  
7 reason?

8           MR. HUNTER: Yes. I had forgotten about it and I  
9 had been through some extensive background searches since  
10 then in the jobs I've had and it never came up. So I had  
11 really forgotten about it. But, when I got the letter and  
12 saw it, I remembered. And it was 30 years ago and I did  
13 remember it. I simply forgot about it.

14           But, going forward, of course, I will list this  
15 with the date and the charge. I was sitting in the back of a  
16 truck and me and my girlfriend, I just helped her move in to  
17 her new place and that's why we got pulled over and I had one  
18 of those pocket knives that everybody carries nowadays. But  
19 I had that on me and that's what I got arrested for.

20           I was also under the impression, I don't remember  
21 how or why, but after seven years it would be expunged is  
22 what I was told and that it wouldn't be on my record. And  
23 then it -- So after seven years --

24           MEMBER CORTEZ: That's okay. Thank you. I  
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1 understand.

2 MR. HUNTER: Okay. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
4 the board? Hearing no further questions, I'll entertain a  
5 motion.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
7 motion that we overturn the denial for Mr. Jeffery Hunter and  
8 that we approve his work card based on the time and distance.  
9 We are discussing a case back in 1995 that was not disclosed.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
11 we have a second?

12 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
14 a second. All in favor say aye.

15 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir. The  
17 office will contact you on the next steps, okay.

18 MR. HUNTER: Thank you very much.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You're welcome.

20 Agenda Item Number 54, Julian Oates, looks like  
21 it's been postponed.

22 So we move on to Agenda Item 55, Krystal  
23 Henderson. Is Krystal in our audience? Is Krystal up north?  
24 Okay. We'll continue to move forward. We'll trail this  
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1 until the end.

2 Agenda Item Number 56, Le'Quinn Johnson. Good  
3 morning, sir. It's still morning, yep.

4 MR. JOHNSON: Hello.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Saladino, would  
6 you please update us.

7 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
8 applicant was denied for a 2005 non-disclosure felony, grand  
9 theft, theft by forged invalid access cards out of California  
10 where he received a 16-month prison sentence.

11 2001 there was a misdemeanor battery out of  
12 California. He received probation and a jail term.

13 The applicant did not disclose his arrest for a  
14 felony conviction. The applicant was working for Norton  
15 Consulting and Investigations. The applicant provided a  
16 letter of recommendation from the operations manager for  
17 Norton Consulting and now wishes to appeal.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.

19 Are there any questions from the board?

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: Hi. This is Board Member Cortez.  
21 Who are you? I just saw you approach the podium.

22 Could you state your name for the record. I  
23 don't know who you are.

24 MR. NORTON: My name is ed Norton, license number  
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1 633. I did write a letter on behalf of -- we called him Q.  
2 So did our operation manager, one of our clients. I'm sorry.  
3 Not the client.

4 What I know is he shows up on time, he does a  
5 good job, he respects all that he comes in to contact with.  
6 So I'm just here to speak in his behalf and hopefully I'll be  
7 able to be his employer again. Thank you.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

9 Board Member Cortez. All right, Mr. Johnson, you  
10 already know.

11 MR. JOHNSON: No excuse. I just shot past.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: You did what?

13 MR. JOHNSON: I was in a hurry and I just kind of  
14 shot past a lot of this and it was kind of just one of those,  
15 okay --

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Johnson, do you work in an  
17 investigation office?

18 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, ma'am. I was just -- But when  
19 I was doing this, I had moved out here, I had been dealing  
20 with the COVID thing and I was looking for work. I have 13  
21 kids, babies.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: Holy moly. Is this the license  
23 you need? Just kidding.

24 MR. JOHNSON: And my wife, she also works with  
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1 the company and we have -- And I just honestly was just  
2 like -- And it was out of sight, out of mind. That stuff was  
3 so long ago when I was dumb, younger. And I know it's no  
4 excuse.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: Once again I'm going to refer  
6 back to the application process.

7 MR. JOHNSON: I'm not going to make an excuse.  
8 That was my bad. I want to apologize because I know better.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions from  
10 the board?

11 The mere fact that someone would come and speak  
12 on your behalf on the company, Mr. Norton himself, speaks  
13 volumes to your character and your job performance. So thank  
14 you for that.

15 I'll entertain a motion for Mr. Q Johnson.

16 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
18 do make a motion to overturn the denial and grant  
19 Mr. Le'Quinn Johnson his guard card.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

21 MEMBER CORTEZ: Based off the time and distance,  
22 last incident reported was 2005.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
24 we have a second?

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1 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

2 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Because he is a character, eye.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.

5 Congratulations. The office will get in touch with you.

6 We're now on Agenda Item Number 57, Marilyn  
7 Brooke. It looks like Ms. Brooke is up north.

8 MS. BROOKE: Good morning.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Good morning, ma'am.

10 Mr. Saladino, could you tell us about Ms. Brooke.

11 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Ms. Brooke, the applicant,  
12 was denied for a 2003 felony, fraud to obtain aide and  
13 perjury, out of California. The applicant received five  
14 years of probation, 32 days in jail for the perjury, a work  
15 program, and restitution. This was not disclosed.

16 Per the definition of obtain -- Per the  
17 definition of fraud to obtain aid, it is considered a crime  
18 of moral turpitude in the State of California. The applicant  
19 was working for Securitas, license number 1100, and wishes to  
20 appeal.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any questions for  
22 Ms. Brooke?

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

24 Good morning, Mrs. Brooke. A couple of things. Tell me why  
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1 you did not disclose and what was the incident.

2 MS. BROOKE: I did not disclose because I  
3 couldn't remember the date. And I had an intention on coming  
4 back to put it back on my application, but I was working  
5 graveyards, so I totally forgot, and that is on me.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: Could I ask you to speak up a  
7 little bit? I'm sorry.

8 MS. BROOKE: I forgot. I was working graveyards  
9 and I totally forgot to come back in to the office and put it  
10 on my application.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you. What was the  
12 incident about?

13 MS. BROOKE: The welfare fraud?

14 MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes. Fraud to obtain aid and  
15 perjury.

16 MS. BROOKE: Me and my ex-husband were living in  
17 a shelter. And what happened was we had to go through this  
18 community service program. And they help you get homes and  
19 you had to give up, I believe, like, 30 percent of your  
20 income or something to that effect. And we were working and  
21 hadn't reported it. And, because I had several children at  
22 the time, the welfare was paying us a lot of money. And once  
23 it got, like, past \$5,000, because we were in a shelter over  
24 a year until our house was built, they considered it to be a

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1 felony.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
4 questions from the board?

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
6 sorry. Investigator Saladino, talk to me a little bit more  
7 about this fraud to obtain as a moral turpitude. I mean, I  
8 can imagine. But against who? I'm not sure if I heard the  
9 information correct. But I didn't hear a victim, other than  
10 her and her husband buying a home through the welfare system.

11 MR. SALADINO: Correct. Investigator Saladino.  
12 In California they consider the obtaining fraud -- the  
13 obtaining the aid through the welfare as a crime of moral  
14 turpitude and it usually goes hand in hand with perjury.  
15 Perjury is always the felony.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: So welfare fraud?

17 MR. SALADINO: Correct.

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Got it.

19 MS. BROOKE: Can I say one more thing?

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: No, ma'am.

21 Are there any further questions from the board?

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Ms. Brooke,  
23 what are you doing now?

24 MS. BROOKE: I work at Travel of America Petro.  
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1 But I also spoke with the manager at Securitas and they would  
2 love to have me back.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So she works at I think the  
4 Travel of America, is that a gas station?

5 MS. BROOKE: Yeah. For truck drivers, yes.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: How long have you worked there?

7 MS. BROOKE: I've been there three months.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: And prior to that where were  
9 you employed?

10 MS. BROOKE: Securitas.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: She was granted her  
12 provisional license.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: Very short amount of time. So  
14 prior to that where were you employed?

15 MS. BROOKE: I was doing in-home care for in-home  
16 supportive services in California.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: How long did you do that?

18 MS. BROOKE: I did that for ten years.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. Is  
21 that a PCA position, personal care assistant? Is that what  
22 that was the ten-year employment you just mentioned?

23 MS. BROOKE: Yes.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you. Personal  
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1 care assistance is what PCA is. It's a state agency run  
2 program?

3 MS. BROOKE: Yes.

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any further  
6 questions? Okay. Seeing there are no further questions,  
7 I'll entertain a motion.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I make a  
9 motion to overturn the denial of Ms. Marilyn Brooke, mainly  
10 because of time and distance and she seemed to be employed  
11 for quite some time, even though sometimes have been a  
12 fraction. But I'm good with it.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
14 a second?

15 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
17 a second. All in favor say aye.

18 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The motion passes. The  
20 motion passes. Ms. Brooke, the office will get in touch with  
21 you. Congratulations.

22 MS. BROOKE: Thank you very much.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You're welcome.

24 Okay. Agenda Item Number 58, Monecka Wilson.  
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1 Good morning, ma'am. Oh, you were not? Okay. Thank you.

2 MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

3 (The witness was sworn in)

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Mr. Saladino.

5 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
6 applicant was denied for disclosure of a 1992 felony battery  
7 domestic violence out of California where she received five  
8 years of formal probation.

9 1994, there was a misdemeanor hit and run. This  
10 was an arrest only. There were no charges filed out of  
11 California.

12 The applicant did disclose her arrest history.  
13 However, she wasn't sure if it was at the felony level. She  
14 was made provisional and was added to Securitas' roster.  
15 Once we received the fingerprints, that's when we saw the  
16 charges were actually at the felony level for the 1992  
17 domestic violence. And the applicant wishes to appeal.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
19 questions for Ms. Wilson?

20 MEMBER BEZICK: Ms. Wilson, tell me about the  
21 domestic violence arrest.

22 MS. WILSON: I had a lot of domestic violence in  
23 my early twenties. This one I'm still not sure what happened  
24 that day, but I'm sure it was against my husband. We're  
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1 still together. We just had our 33rd anniversary. We have  
2 12 kids, 22 grandkids. And I'm just basically -- My youngest  
3 just turned 18 on the 21st of May. So I'm just basically  
4 trying to find something to do I can do.

5 So I'm guessing it was against my husband. It  
6 was when I was 22 and I'm 52 now. I put down everything that  
7 I thought. I just forgot about this one.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Well, you disclosed it. You  
9 didn't disclose the right level. It was a felony versus a  
10 misdemeanor.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: You were honest. You said you  
12 did not know.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Can you just  
14 tell me why it was the degree of a felony? Most domestic  
15 violences are -- Was there a weapon used or substantial  
16 bodily harm, anything like that?

17 MS. WILSON: I have no idea. I don't know if  
18 this is the one where I used an iron. Maybe it's because I  
19 used an iron.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: Now we got it.

21 MS. WILSON: As you can see, I went a lot of  
22 times in my twenties.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: I have no more questions.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you for the  
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1 giggle. Okay.

2 Any further questions for Ms. Wilson? Okay. If  
3 there's no further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I'm making a  
5 motion to overturn the denial of Ms. Monecka Wilson.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
7 we have a second?

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: And, mainly, I've got to  
9 overturn it now because she did disclose and there's  
10 definitely time and distance involved.

11 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second it.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
13 a second. All in favor say aye.

14 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

15 MS. WILSON: I appreciate you.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, ma'am.  
17 Still married, huh? Still together.

18 And, again, I'm starting to see people walk in.  
19 So, as you come up to the podium, please let us know if  
20 you've been sworn in. Okay. Or do we want to just --

21 So then let's go to Item Number 59, Agenda Item  
22 Number 59, Neil Carroll. Are you here? Neil Carroll, are  
23 you up north?

24 MR. CARROLL: I am.

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1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, have you been sworn in?

2 MR. CARROLL: I have.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Saladino, could  
4 you please let us know about Mr. Carroll.

5 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
6 applicant was denied for a 1999 misdemeanor out of Nevada for  
7 possession of a firearm, under the influence of alcohol or  
8 drugs. The applicant pled guilty and received a suspended  
9 jail sentence and counseling.

10 2001, there was a DUI out of Nevada where he pled  
11 guilty, received a \$250 fine, and DUI school.

12 2006, misdemeanor DUI, received DUI classes, AA,  
13 and community service.

14 The applicant did not disclose his arrest  
15 history. Once he received the denial letter, he did disclose  
16 his arrest history. He was made provisional because the  
17 arrests were out of Sparks, Nevada, which is Washoe County,  
18 so it doesn't show up on our initial background. The  
19 applicant was added to ESI Security from March 3rd of '22 to  
20 March 16th when he was denied. The applicant wishes to  
21 appeal.

22 And, Madam Chair, if I could, I had a  
23 conversation with current qualifying agent, Mike Hindy, with  
24 ESI. There was some issues in the office where they were  
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1 doing the applications on line and there was staff that were  
2 advising the applicant that if it was older than ten years  
3 they didn't have to put it on their application. Myself and  
4 Mr. Hindy spoke about this. Mr. Hindy has already fixed that  
5 issue in the office. So, moving forward, I believe we have a  
6 couple more folks that are here for appeals today that were  
7 also told this bad information.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

9 MR. SALADINO: Like I said, Mr. Hindy has already  
10 fixed it in his office.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Understood. Thank  
12 you.

13 Are there any questions, Board, for Mr. Carroll?

14 MR. CARROLL: No, ma'am.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
16 Sorry, Investigator Saladino. I was multi-tasking. Did you  
17 indicate that Mr. Carroll is one of the individuals who was  
18 wrongly --

19 MR. SALADINO: Yeah.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: If I could just be told which  
21 one, that would be great. Thank you. No more questions.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
23 questions for Mr. Carroll?

24 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions,  
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1 I'll entertain a motion.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
3 motion to overturn the denial based on the time and distance  
4 of all the criminal history, contact, and the fact that  
5 Mr. Carroll was given incorrect information as far as time of  
6 criminal background.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do  
8 we have a second?

9 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
11 a second. All in favor say aye.

12 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The motion passes.  
14 Congratulations, Mr. Carroll. You can go ahead and work with  
15 the office. They'll contact you to get your guard card.

16 MR. CARROLL: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You're welcome.

18 Agenda Item Number 60, Rebecca Douglas.

19 MR. SALADINO: Madam Chair, Investigator  
20 Saladino. We were able to overturn her denial at the office  
21 on the -- She brought in court documents showing that the  
22 case was not a felony.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Got it. Off calendar.

24 Do we want to take a quick break here? We've  
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1 been going for a little while.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: Can we wait until 12? It's just  
3 five more minutes.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay, five more minutes.  
5 We'll take a quick break at 12:00 o'clock.

6 So we'll go ahead and continue. Agenda Item 61,  
7 Robert Reed.

8 Mr. Saladino, could you please update us on  
9 Mr. Reed.

10 MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for  
11 non-disclosure. In 1997, a misdemeanor petty larceny out of  
12 New York, where he received three years probation. This  
13 started out as grand larceny and was reduced through the  
14 courts.

15 Again, in 1997, criminal possession of a  
16 controlled substance out of New York, where he received 15  
17 days in jail.

18 The applicant has nine more of the same charge  
19 from 1997 to 2013.

20 In 2004, the applicant was sentenced to drug  
21 abuse center.

22 2006, out of New York, misdemeanor criminal  
23 trespass, second degree. He was sentenced to time served.

24 The case started out as burglary, third degree, with illegal  
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1 entry with intent and was reduced to criminal trespass.

2 The applicant did not disclose his arrest  
3 history. The applicant was advised that he needed to  
4 disclose his arrest history due to the amount of arrests for  
5 drug possession. The applicant stated it would take New York  
6 too long to get the information. The applicant was made  
7 provisional, however, he was not added to any licensee's  
8 roster and wishes to appeal.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
10 questions from the board for Mr. Reed? Sorry.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. Mr. Reed,  
12 why did we fail to disclose?

13 MR. REED: To get my records from New York, what  
14 I was told were going to take four to six months. So, as we  
15 speak, even if I would have paid for it, which is \$150, I  
16 still wouldn't have got my records yet. But, I mean --

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: May I make a suggestion?

18 MR. REED: Yeah.

19 MEMBER CORTEZ: Request your records.

20 MR. REED: Yeah. But, I figured when I had  
21 talked to the guys at the place, I figured I would get the  
22 guard's license because I have no felonies, plus I got a  
23 sheriffs card.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: Unfortunately, we have to have  
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1 disclosure of all criminal history, regardless of where it  
2 is, what state, what the disposition is, how long it's going  
3 take the court system to get you everything. You're applying  
4 for a position where it requires everything need to be  
5 submitted. So, whether it takes forever in another state,  
6 I'm going to strongly recommend that you get started on the  
7 request because it is going to take a while. But you can't  
8 apply for something that requires something and you don't  
9 have it. Make sense?

10 MR. REED: Uh-huh.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. No questions.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
13 questions from the board?

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Mr. Reed,  
15 you knew you were arrested. Why would you have to wait for  
16 your records from New York?

17 MR. REED: No. When I asked them about that  
18 arrest, I didn't know what year it was. See, like I told  
19 them, I said all of my records is in New York. I just moved  
20 here, like, seven years ago, so I figured when I did all of  
21 that, I didn't know I had to get my records. And then when I  
22 finally found out that I had to get my records when I called,  
23 it was like four to six months. I was, like, I'm not working  
24 so how am I going to get this money. I just -- I've been

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1 doing temp agencies back and forth, but that money that I get  
2 I got pay rent, light, gas, everything else. And, plus, I  
3 got married last year. And the reason why I got married last  
4 year because the unemployment money paid for that. But, I'm  
5 still doing the temp agency, which I just started, like, a  
6 month ago.

7 So I guess the only way I could get my records is  
8 I got to just try to put money aside. It's not easy out here  
9 living in Vegas. It's tougher than living in New York. I  
10 mean, I moved from New York because there's problems, drugs.  
11 And just two days ago I just made 15 years clean.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And we applaud you for that,  
13 sir. But, you know, you now have the dates and probably can  
14 work with officer -- Investigator Saladino on those dates.  
15 What we needed was disclosure on the actual dates. You can  
16 work on later the actual dispositions of them. But, in order  
17 to work, we needed the dates to be disclosed. And, you know,  
18 you're talking about the time that it took to get the  
19 license. You probably have not been working the entire time  
20 you've had your license denied, right? So you kind of  
21 double-whammied yourself on that one, right?

22 MR. REED: Yeah.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: All right. So are there any  
24 further questions from the board? Okay. Hearing there are  
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1 no further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
3 motion that we uphold the denial based on failure to  
4 disclose. I think we've made it pretty clear what the  
5 requirements are for a guard card.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I have a motion. Do I  
7 have a second?

8 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
10 a second. All in favor say aye.

11 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Just a  
14 statement. It's interesting when somebody says I didn't  
15 remember the year. Hold on, hold on. I'm just making a  
16 statement. For future reference of everybody, for  
17 everybody's good, I would say it would probably be okay if  
18 you put on there year unknown but still report -- still state  
19 your arrest, you know what I mean? To me, year and month is  
20 important, but it's not as important as at least reporting,  
21 you know, what your arrests were. I just want to see if we  
22 can keep that -- It's not about you. It's about everybody.  
23 I just want to make that your, you know, people can  
24 understand. That's important. But it's more important to  
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1 disclose. That's my statement.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: 100 percent agree. I think  
3 there was a young lady here earlier who had put down that she  
4 had something but she wasn't sure what it was. It's knowing  
5 that you have something that's more important. We can work  
6 out the rest and the office will work very diligently with  
7 you to work out those details. You have to disclose you have  
8 something. We don't need to know the time and date. Just  
9 tell us you have something. We'll work out the rest. We'll  
10 help you. Okay.

11 MR. INGRAM: And, just for the record, Kevin  
12 Ingram. If those questions arise, if they're in the office  
13 or they call us, we tell them that, look, give us your best  
14 guess, you know, to -- and then we can identify the years of  
15 the stuff.

16 Mr. Reed, you can reapply in a year, okay. So,  
17 you know, plan on getting those records, reapply in a year,  
18 and it will be a different story. Disclose. All right.  
19 Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. It's just past 12.  
21 We're going to take a quick break, a bio break. We've been  
22 sitting here for a long time. We'll be right back. Give us  
23 until ten after.

24 (Recess was taken)  
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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We're on Item Number 62. I  
2 just wanted to make sure because I have it marked as  
3 postponed. Is Shardae Davis here? Okay.

4                   Next item number is 63, Shearwood Fleming. Good  
5 afternoon, sir. Have you guys been sworn in?

6                   MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

7                                 (Witnesses were sworn in)

8                   MS. HARRIS: Thank you.

9                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, Mr. --  
10 Investigator Saladino, could you please let us know about  
11 Mr. Shearwood Fleming.

12                   MR. SALADINO: The applicant was denied for  
13 disclosing a 1981 murder with the use of a firearm out of  
14 California. The applicant received 17 years to life in  
15 prison. This was disclosed at the time he applied and the  
16 applicant stated he served 30 years in prison.

17                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any  
18 questions for Mr. Fleming?

19                   MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Good  
20 afternoon, Mr. Fleming.

21                   MR. FLEMING: Good afternoon.

22                   MEMBER GRONAUER: What -- If you get approved  
23 with your work card, what do you plan on doing with it?

24                   MR. FLEMING: If I get approved, I'm going to --  
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1 there's a couple of companies that want me to go to work for  
2 them right away. I actually had a guard card in California.

3 But I really want to try to digress back for a  
4 minute. I did 30 years for a murder I didn't even do. It's  
5 hard to try to explain to someone the inexpressable feelings  
6 of anguish that you have when you are incarcerated and going  
7 to the board being told that we understand what you're saying  
8 but unless you confess to this, you're going to spend the  
9 rest of your life in prison. You learn a lot of things.

10 I was a normal kid. I wasn't a saint. But I  
11 always had my moral compass and my family instilled in me.  
12 And, going to prison, I found that that was the hardest thing  
13 to keep, you know. A place where you learn to tell the time  
14 of day by the shadow from the prison guards on the walls of  
15 your cell.

16 The only reason why I'm out now is because I  
17 proved that I wasn't the person that they said that did the  
18 shooting. My so-called crime partner who did less than four  
19 years and my attorney, Tracy Mason, who is now the assistant  
20 DA with the City of San Jose, she got the declaration and she  
21 got everyone from the CYA or California Youth Authority board  
22 hearings where he not only said that she did it, he bragged,  
23 boasted, saying you got the wrong man in prison. The CYA  
24 board, youth authority board, was supposed to hand this

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1 information over to the adult authority under whose umbrella  
2 I resided.

3 I don't know what happened, if there was a glitch  
4 or whatever, but I'm the one that got caught up in the mix.  
5 And so for me, when I got out, when they told -- when my  
6 attorney presented all of this evidence to the board, the  
7 first thing that they said -- Oh, oh, in addition, she had --  
8 she hired a polygraph company to come down from San Jose to  
9 Avenal State Prison where they were going to give me not the  
10 standard polygraph but the voice first analyzer. And on each  
11 occasion that they came down, when the warden came in and  
12 found out what type of polygraph they were going to give me,  
13 they canceled it. So I can only imagine how much it must  
14 have cost my attorney.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: Mr. Fleming, you don't have to  
16 go through all of that. I mean, I think it speaks volumes  
17 that you get out of prison, you come here, you apply for a  
18 card, you admit everything that you did, you -- you say you  
19 didn't do, but you served your time. So I'm just cutting you  
20 short not to be disrespectful. I don't think you have to  
21 relive it right now, okay.

22 MR. FLEMING: Thank you.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: You were either 20 or 21 years  
24 old?

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1 MR. FLEMING: 20.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: 20 years old. So what have you  
3 been doing since you've been out?

4 MR. FLEMING: Well, it's kind of hard getting a  
5 job when you have a prison record, because --

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: What have you been doing?

7 MR. FLEMING: I worked at packing trailers, rigs.

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: You were a laborer?

9 MR. FLEMING: Yeah, I was a laborer.

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: Now, I asked you again. I'll  
11 just ask you one more time. What will you do if you get your  
12 work card? You said you have several people or companies  
13 waiting to hire you.

14 MR. FLEMING: Yes, sir. Yes, sir.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: Are they all local?

16 MR. FLEMING: Yes. Actually, before I left  
17 California, I did security work, too.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: But you had your card there?

19 MR. FLEMING: Yes, yes.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. That's good. Stop right  
21 there. What prison did you do your time in?

22 MR. FLEMING: Take your choice, sir. I  
23 personally went to San Quentin.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You were in San Quentin?  
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1 MR. FLEMING: Yes, sir.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Enough said. Thank you.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
4 just have a quick question. Did you have any relation to the  
5 victim?

6 MR. FLEMING: Did I have?

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: Any relation to the victim.

8 MR. FLEMING: No. I was trying to stop the  
9 crime. I was trying to stop it.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Just brief situation. I  
11 know it happened years ago. Just give me an idea, because my  
12 mind works differently. What happened?

13 MR. FLEMING: What happened? Well, actually my  
14 car went on the flat. I was -- I'm from Venice, California.  
15 I just got off work and my car went on the flat on Venice  
16 Beach. I went back to try to get someone to tow it back.  
17 And, on the way back, I was walking down the street. It was  
18 a one-way street. And it was really dark and really trees  
19 everywhere. I mean shadows cast everywhere. And I was about  
20 to duck through this parking lot and there was a guy hiding  
21 there. And I said -- I jumped back and I said what are you  
22 doing. And he said, we're going to get these two guys coming  
23 down the street, man. And I said why. He said, my cousin  
24 got shot.

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1                   Hindsight being 20/20, Miss, I would have  
2 hightailed it out of there, knowing, you know. But part of  
3 me, just maybe you can stop, maybe you can keep this  
4 youngster from doing it. He was a youngster. I wasn't but  
5 20.

6                   MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand. Thank you.

7                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions for  
8 Mr. Fleming? Okay. Thank you, sir, for coming in front of  
9 us and also thank you for being -- disclosing your previous  
10 arrest or incarceration. We do appreciate that honesty.  
11 Thank you so much.

12                   MEMBER CORTEZ: I do have one more question.  
13 This is Board Member Cortez. You said a couple of companies.  
14 Which are the companies?

15                   MR. FLEMING: One is Mission Control. The other  
16 one is I think it's something All American.

17                   MEMBER CORTEZ: And employment is contingent upon  
18 approval of a work card?

19                   MR. FLEMING: Absolutely.

20                   MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Thank you.

21                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, thank you, sir. We do  
22 appreciate the honesty.

23                   No further questions from the board, I'll  
24 entertain a motion.

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1                   MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I make a  
2 motion to overturn the denial of Mr. Shearwood Fleming. The  
3 reasons are, whether he did the crime or didn't do the crime,  
4 he did the time. And time and distance on this one is a long  
5 time ago. And I appreciate him being man enough to come to a  
6 meeting like this, stand up and request, so he can get back  
7 on his feet.

8                   MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
9 I'll second that motion.

10                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
11 a second. All in favor say aye.

12                  (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

13                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.  
14 Congratulations.

15                  MR. FLEMING: Thank you. My mouth is dry from  
16 being so nervous. I just want to thank you.

17                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: And that's coming from a  
18 retired police officer there.

19                  MEMBER GRONAUER: I got 30 years as a cop.

20                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So thank you.  
21 Congratulations. The office will get in contact with you and  
22 help you with the rest.

23                  MEMBER GRONAUER: I went to San Quentin one time  
24 and it was enough.

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1 MEMBER CORTEZ: Make me proud.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Item Number 64, Taelase  
3 Gaoteote. Item Number 63. Is Taelase up north? 64, I'm  
4 sorry.

5 MR. HUBBEL: No, he's not.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I don't see anyone standing  
7 up for Agenda Item Number 64, so we'll go ahead and trail  
8 that.

9 Agenda Item Number 65, Terrence Alexander. Is  
10 Terrence here or up north? Okay. We'll trail that one.

11 Agenda Item Number 66, Stephen Bower. It looks  
12 like you're up north, Mr. Bower.

13 MR. BOWER: I'm right here.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I just want to confirm, sir,  
15 have you been sworn in?

16 MR. BOWER: Yes, I have.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

18 Investigator Saladino, could you please tell us  
19 about Mr. Bower.

20 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
21 applicant was denied for a 1972 felony out of California for  
22 aiding and abetting, concealment of stolen property. The  
23 applicant received five years of supervised probation. The  
24 applicant stated the charge was from stolen explosives.

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1                   There was also a 1968 misdemeanor out of  
2 California for operating a motor vehicle without owner's  
3 consent, where he received 36 months probation.

4                   Madam Chair, this is one of the applicants that  
5 had received that bad information from ESI. I do believe  
6 Mr. Hindy is also in the audience up north.

7                   Once I contacted Mr. Bower, he did state that the  
8 felony in 1972 happened. He told me that it was for the  
9 explosives. He has been very forthcoming with information  
10 since that and now he's here for his appeal.

11                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

12                   Board, are there any questions for Mr. Bower?  
13 Okay. Seeing there are no questions, we'll move forward.  
14 I'll entertain a motion.

15                   MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
16 motion that we overturn the denial for Mr. Bower and grant  
17 him his work card.

18                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
19 second?

20                   MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

21                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
22 second. All in favor say aye.

23                   (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

24                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir. Your  
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1 guard card will be -- I mean your -- Okay. I need food.

2 You're good to go. The office will contact you.

3 MR. BOWER: Thank you very much.

4 MEMBER CORTEZ: Your denial has been overturned.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Your denial has been

6 overturned. Pretzels are not going to carry me.

7 Agenda Item 67, Dyvan Brown. Okay. No one up

8 north? No one in the south? Okay. And we'll trail that

9 one.

10 Agenda Item Number 68, Matthew Lopes. Good

11 afternoon, sir.

12 MR. LOPES: How are you guys doing today?

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We're doing good. Thank you,

14 sir.

15 Investigator Saladino.

16 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The

17 applicant was denied for a 1990 misdemeanor out of California

18 for carrying a concealed weapon. The applicant received 12

19 months of probation and a fine and a suspended jail term.

20 1990 there was a misdemeanor for battery out of California

21 where he received three years probation.

22 In 1991, there was a misdemeanor assault in

23 California, where he received two years probation and 30 days

24 suspended jail term.

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1                   2021, out of Nevada, there was a felony  
2 battery -- battery, domestic battery by strangulation. This  
3 was dismissed by the courts.

4                   Initially the applicant did not disclose his  
5 arrest and convictions. He was made provisional but was not  
6 added to any licensee's rosters. The applicant did provide  
7 his court documents, which he has today. He did have to wait  
8 quite a while to get the court documents. However, he does  
9 have them with him today, and now he's here to appeal.

10                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

11                   Are there any questions from the board?

12                   MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. Why did we  
13 fail to disclose?

14                   MR. LOPES: I didn't think I had anything on my  
15 card, a gun charge. I forgot about that. I didn't even  
16 know.

17                   MEMBER CORTEZ: Hold on. You said you didn't  
18 know you had any --

19                   MR. LOPES: As far as a gun charge. I mean, I  
20 was young, running around. Well, I had been to jail. That  
21 gun charge, I had forgot about it. I never knew it. I  
22 forgot all about it.

23                   MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. What about the 2021?

24                   MR. LOPES: That was with my wife.  
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1 MEMBER CORTEZ: No. I know the circumstance.  
2 But why didn't you disclose it?

3 MR. LOPES: It was on the application, I think it  
4 happened before or after I did the application.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Can we confirm that,  
6 Investigator?

7 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
8 applicant applied for the work card on February 8th of '22.  
9 The felony for domestic battery by strangulation happened  
10 June 28th of 2021.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, you see, sir, you applied  
12 after.

13 MR. LOPES: Yes, I did. I forgot it. That was  
14 my mistake I didn't apply it. It was dismissed, so I didn't  
15 think it needed to be on there.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: But, were you arrested for  
17 it, sir?

18 MR. LOPES: It was arguing with my wife.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: But were you arrested for it?

20 MR. LOPES: Yes, ma'am.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And on the application  
22 it states --

23 MR. LOPES: That I should have it put it on there  
24 and I didn't put it on there.

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1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you still married, sir?

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes, sir.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry. This is Gronauer.

5 Is your wife here?

6 MR. LOPES: Yes, sir. She's sitting right behind  
7 me.

8 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
9 requesting that the spouse come up and give some kind of  
10 statement. I would like to get your version of what  
11 occurred.

12 MRS. LOPES: We got in to an altercation.  
13 Actually, he stopped me from going to shoot somebody, to be  
14 honest. They put their hands on me and I grabbed my gun. He  
15 tried to take my gun from me and I started fighting him.  
16 That's pretty much what happened.

17 MEMBER CORTEZ: And I do understand that when law  
18 enforcement comes out to -- No. This was in -- No. This was  
19 here in Vegas. Somebody is going. So how was it domestic  
20 battery by strangulation on your end? I know it's dismissed.  
21 Oh, because you were trying to hold him?

22 MRS. LOPES: Yeah, yeah. Actually he was trying  
23 to take the gun and I wouldn't give him the gun.

24 MEMBER CORTEZ: So you're not applying for the  
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1 guard card; right?

2 MRS. LOPES: No, I'm not.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: I wanted to make that very clear  
4 for the record. We're here for the husband.

5 MRS. LOPES: Right.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you so much. Got it.  
7 Thank you. I appreciate it.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions?  
9 No further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Officer Cortez. While  
11 you did not disclose and you know pretty clear that you were  
12 supposed to, we have incidents out of 1991, 1990 and 1980.  
13 Time and distance is plentiful. I am going to motion to  
14 overturn the denial and grant Mr. Lopes the work card. And,  
15 that is based off the spouse's information, very forthcoming.  
16 It appears as if the spouse got lucky.

17 MR. LOPES: Thank you very much.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So we have a motion. Do we  
19 have a second?

20 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
22 a second. All in motion say aye.

23 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations, sir. The  
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1 office will contact you and you'll be able to move forward.

2 MR. LOPES: Thank you very much. You guys have a  
3 great day.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You too.

5 We see someone in your audience. Are they on the  
6 agenda?

7 MR. RECHARD: Number 81.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, what agenda item are  
9 you?

10 MR. RECHARD: 81.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Could you come to the podium,  
12 sir.

13 MR. RECHARD: Number 81, ma'am.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: 81. And is there someone  
15 else over there as well?

16 MR. RECHARD: Mr. Hindy, my employer.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Gotcha. I don't want  
18 to go through all of this and have you sit and wait. So,  
19 Agenda Item Number 81, we'll go ahead and do that one. We'll  
20 skip to that since there's nobody else in the audience at  
21 this point. Okay, sir, are you here to be a character  
22 witness?

23 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No, ma'am.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. He's not here now.  
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1 And you're fine. I'm just going to skip to the gentleman  
2 that's been sitting here so that he doesn't have to wait.  
3 Okay. So Agenda Item Number, you said, 81?

4 MR. RECHARD: Yes, ma'am.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Waydd Rechard.

6 MR. RECHARD: Rechard.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Rechard?

8 MR. RECHARD: Yes, ma'am.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Hubbel, could  
10 you please update us on that one.

11 MR. HUBBEL: Yes, ma'am. Investigator Hubbel.  
12 Mr. Rechard was denied for a 2014 felony conviction out of  
13 Nevada for burglary. This was disclosed on his application.  
14 He pled guilty to the charge and was sentenced to two years  
15 in prison.

16 He also had a 2014 burglary arrest out of Nevada  
17 where he pled guilty and had nine months in jail. This  
18 arrest was also disclosed on the application. The only  
19 difference was the application was probation, where the  
20 fingerprint report listed he had nine months in jail.

21 The applicant also had a 2004 soliciting  
22 specified sex acts, a felony, out of California, where he was  
23 sentenced to four years in prison. This arrest was disclosed  
24 on the application.

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1           There was a 2003 arrest out of California for  
2 false representation concerning requirements of the Social  
3 Security Act, which is a Class A misdemeanor. He was given  
4 68 days in the custody of the bureau of prisons and 12 months  
5 of supervised released. This was not disclosed. It was  
6 found on the fingerprint reports.

7           And in 2006 he had a felony conviction, once  
8 again, for soliciting sex acts and was sentenced to four  
9 years in prison. And that arrest was also not disclosed.

10           He disclosed some of his arrest history for the  
11 October 26th of 2014. He was sentenced to two years in  
12 prison for the 2014 arrest. He was sentenced to nine months  
13 in jail as per the fingerprint report documents.

14           And, for the 2004 arrest, he was sentenced to  
15 four years in prison. These arrests were disclosed. The  
16 following arrests were not disclosed: 2003 where he got 68  
17 days in jail and 12 months supervised release. And, 2006,  
18 the applicant was sentenced to four years in prison. The  
19 applicant was not made provisional and is here to appeal at  
20 this time.

21           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: He was not made provisional?

22           MR. HUBBEL: That's correct, not provisional.

23           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any  
24 questions for Mr. Rechard?

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1                   MEMBER BEZICK: Mr. Rechar, soliciting sex acts,  
2 you got four years in prison for that. What were the details  
3 of that?

4                   MR. RECHARD: That was -- The three that he  
5 listed, those were all the same one, I believe, on the thing.  
6 I had propositioned an officer in a sting operation. During  
7 this time I just got out of the Marine Corps. I had been out  
8 of the Marine Corps a little bit. It was a very dark time in  
9 my life. I made a lot of bad decisions.

10                   But, since then -- since this last arrest, I  
11 worked diligently to put that person behind me. I've done  
12 programs. I've got a college degree. I've done years of  
13 hard work separating myself from that person. When I speak  
14 about him, it's like I'm talking about a total stranger.  
15 It's an alien concept to me.

16                   MEMBER BEZICK: So you're saying you got four  
17 years in prison for soliciting a police officer?

18                   MR. RECHARD: Yes. It was actually two years  
19 with half time. But it turned in to a felony. I just got  
20 really crappy with the cop when he arrested me.

21                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Got really what?

22                   MR. RECHARD: I got really smart and very -- I  
23 made poor choices of words and actions during that arrest.

24                   MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
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1 have a question for Investigator Hubbel. I've got two  
2 incidents of solicitation of sex acts. I've got 2006 and  
3 2004. Applicant says it's the same incident. Can I confirm  
4 that it is not and we've got two incidents?

5 MR. HUBBEL: I based it on two incidents because  
6 the case numbers were different.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: I didn't hear you.

8 MR. HUBBEL: I based it as being two separate  
9 incidents. The case numbers were different, the arrest case  
10 numbers.

11 MR. RECHARD: The date on it though.

12 MEMBER CORTEZ: So, in fact, it is just one case?

13 MR. HUBBEL: I believe it to be two separate  
14 cases. One occurred October 17th of 2004 and then the other  
15 October 19th of 2006. Looking at the fingerprint reports,  
16 the case numbers are different.

17 MR. RECHARD: In 2006 I was in prison at that  
18 time for that.

19 MR. HUBBEL: They could be the same. I base that  
20 on if they were two separate case numbers and sometimes you  
21 can go to trial as things come up and you can already be  
22 incarcerated.

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. This is still Board  
24 Member Cortez. Mr. Rechard, I'm still not understanding or  
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1 getting a clear picture of what occurred. When you -- I have  
2 experience with solicitation, not personally, but cases.  
3 Having had cases with solicitation of sexual acts,  
4 activities, and what not. I need a little more information  
5 as to what exactly occurred.

6 MR. RECHARD: I basically went to the local spot  
7 in California where I was at that the ladies of the evening  
8 resided and it turned out to be a police sting operation.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Stop right there. Again,  
10 you approached the officer. It's a sting operation. I  
11 understand that. Were you soliciting for prostitution?

12 MR. RECHARD: Yes. I was asking if they want to  
13 have sex basically.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So hang on one second.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Board Member Gronauer.  
16 Sir, okay. In a sting operation was this on the internet?

17 MR. RECHARD: No, no.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Child pornography, something  
19 like that?

20 MR. RECHARD: No, no, no.

21 (The court reporter interrupts)

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, would you wait and let  
23 Commissioner Gronauer finish the question, so we can  
24 understand. We're just trying to understand what the  
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1 situation is, because this is an extensive amount of time for  
2 the crime. So hang on one second.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Maybe I have to go to it a  
4 different way. But, Mr. Rechard, okay, after 30 years  
5 experience as a police officer myself and many arrests for  
6 soliciting for prostitution -- of arresting other people for  
7 that. I had to clarify that -- I've never once seen somebody  
8 get sentenced to four years. Usually it's sometimes six  
9 months suspended, pay a fine, up to a year. But four years  
10 for soliciting a police officer does not seem to fit in to  
11 the situation.

12 Does our -- Instead of you answering, sir, right  
13 now, can our investigator up north please try to fix this,  
14 explain it.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Mr. Hubbel, hang on one  
16 second.

17 Mr. Saladino, do you have some further  
18 information?

19 MR. SALADINO: Yes. Investigator Saladino for  
20 the record. The applicant is actually a tier two registered  
21 sex offender for a Nevada registry. It does show that  
22 December 7th of '05, soliciting to commit a crime, and that  
23 was out of the Sacramento Superior Court. They might have  
24 taken those two incidents and ran them together. But he is a  
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1 tier two register and I have his current registry  
2 information.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So for the non-law  
4 enforcement here, what does that mean? For prostitution you  
5 have to register as a sex offender?

6 MR. SWARTHOUT: Investigator Swarthout. If I  
7 remember correctly, they have to register for 25 years as a  
8 tier two sex offender in the State of Nevada.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: For hiring a prostitute?

10 MR. SWARTHOUT: It's just the tier status. It's  
11 just based on the severity of what they did. Tier three  
12 tends to be the more violent or had a whole bunch of  
13 incidents doing it and they're a lifetime. This is the  
14 second highest. Because tier one is your normal low level  
15 guys.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, sir, can you understand  
17 our concern? You didn't just solicit a prostitute.  
18 Something happened. What happened?

19 MR. RECHARD: Once I was being arrested, I made  
20 some very off-brand comments, made some vile threats. Like I  
21 said, I was dealing with a lot of stuff from three combat  
22 tours. I was just diagnosed with PTSD. I was just in a real  
23 bad spot. And I was looking for some company. I thought it  
24 was going to be able to just be a regular prostitute and it  
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1 turned out to be a cop and I was not happy about that.  
2 That's the type of person I separated myself from. I  
3 separated myself from people, places, and everything from  
4 that.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

6 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
7 do have a question for you. Mr. Rechard, do you understand  
8 what a tier two offender is?

9 MR. RECHARD: Yes, I do.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: Could you tell me what that is?

11 MR. RECHARD: I register every six months. I  
12 would like to state for the record that I do have a lawyer in  
13 California that is working to get that taken, the second  
14 offender part, out and taking it off my record so I would no  
15 longer be part of that. I can provide proof of that.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. My question is do you  
17 understand what a tier two offender is. And, if you do,  
18 police give me the definition of what a tier --

19 MR. RECHARD: I don't know the exact definition.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: Then I'm going to read you what I  
21 just found out. Tier two of the Nevada sex offender registry  
22 applies to sex crimes against victims under the age of 18 and  
23 is the second most serious class of sex offender. So I  
24 believe Commissioner Gronauer asked you was this a child and  
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1 you said no.

2 MR. RECHARD: No, it's not.

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: And you're also supposed to  
4 register for 25 years. Outside of that I have no more  
5 further questions.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any further  
7 questions from the board? Hearing there are no further  
8 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

9 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move that we  
10 uphold the denial.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
12 second?

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: I second it for the reasons  
14 that were just stated and he cannot explain the situation.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So I have a motion and  
16 I have a second. All in favor say aye.

17 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, sir.

19 Okay. Do we have anybody else in the audience up  
20 north that's waiting to be heard?

21 MR. DIAZ: We do not.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And this young lady  
23 here just walked in. Could you please come up and let us  
24 know your name. Do you know your agenda item number?

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1 MS. BOONE: Boone, B-o-o-n-e.

2 MS. HARRIS: Can you raise your right hand.

3 (The witness was sworn in)

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, let's see, Mr. Hubbel,  
5 could you please tell us about Ms. Boone?

6 MR. HUBBEL: Yes, I can. The applicant,  
7 Ms. Boone, was denied for a 2005 felony of carrying a  
8 concealed firearm in a vehicle. This arrest was disclosed on  
9 the application. And that's all that I found in her  
10 background. The applicant provided the PC 1203.4 form along  
11 with her appeal letter. The applicant was not made  
12 provisional and is here to appeal.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. So, if I  
14 understand correctly, she did disclose the felony and because  
15 of that she was not given a provisional license?

16 MR. HUBBEL: That's correct.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Are there any  
18 questions for Ms. Boone?

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Member Gronauer.  
20 Ms. Boone.

21 MS. BOONE: Yes.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Good afternoon. When this  
23 occurred you were 15 years old?

24 MS. BOONE: No. I was 25.  
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1                   MEMBER GRONAUER: 25. That's my math. You  
2 should have said 15. Okay. Can you explain what happened  
3 here?

4                   MS. BOONE: Yeah. I was coming from work and my  
5 brother and my cousins asked me to take their friends to the  
6 park. So I had my firearm with me and I was like, okay, so I  
7 just threw everything in my purse and just drove to them.  
8 And the police got behind me and said, oh, you're  
9 lane-straddling. And I said lane-straddling. They're like,  
10 yeah, you're weaving. And I was, like, no, I wasn't. And  
11 they're, like, okay.

12                   But I didn't know that my brother's friend in the  
13 back seat was a felon. So they were like, well, we recognize  
14 him, so everybody has to get out of the car. And they were,  
15 like, do you have anything. And I was, like, yeah, I have my  
16 firearm in my purse. And they were, like, well, do you have  
17 your license. And I showed them. And they were, like, oh,  
18 no, you can only wear it like that when you're at work. And,  
19 I said, okay, I misunderstood. And that's when the whole  
20 process started.

21                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Were you an armed officer  
22 then in security?

23                   MS. BOONE: Yes.

24                   MEMBER GRONAUER: Do we have your birth date  
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1 right, 1990?

2 MS. BOONE: Yes. June 8th, 1990.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: And this was out of 2005.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So this incident didn't occur  
5 as a juvenile?

6 MS. BOONE: No. I was an adult.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: It says your birthday is 1990.  
8 Do you agree with that?

9 MS. BOONE: Yes.

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: And it says the arrest was  
11 2005.

12 MS. BOONE: Yes. No. The arrest was in 2015.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: Oh, okay.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: It was a typo.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: Got it. I believe you were 25.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: I was with you. I was, like,  
17 well, not according to my math.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. I'm good.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Any further questions  
20 from the board?

21 MS. BOONE: I have a recommendation from my  
22 manager.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: I can't hear you.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: She has her letters of  
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1 recommendation.

2 MS. BOONE: Yeah. From my current managers that  
3 I work at.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: Where do you work now?

5 MS. BOONE: Circus Circus.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: What do you do there?

7 MS. BOONE: I'm an armed guard.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: It's gaming.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Gronauer. I don't have  
10 no more questions.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. No further questions,  
12 I'll entertain a motion.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Make a  
14 motion to overturn the denial of La'Saie Boone and for the  
15 reason time and distance. And you're not 15.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.  
17 I'll second that motion.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a  
19 second. All in favor say aye.

20 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, Ms. Boone. Have a  
22 good day.

23 MS. BOONE: So that means I'll be getting it?

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes. So the office will  
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1 contact you and they'll work with you on the next steps,  
2 okay.

3 MS. BOONE: Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You're welcome.

5 Okay. Do we want a minute to gather our thoughts  
6 and go through and trail things? Let's do that. Because,  
7 while Mr. Gronauer was not here, we did trail -- we had to  
8 trail one item because I couldn't vote on it. So it wasn't a  
9 part of the block vote. That's Agenda Item Number 10. And,  
10 typically, he would have been a part of the block vote. But,  
11 since he worked for me specifically at Allied, I had to not  
12 vote on that.

13 So, on Agenda Item 10, Scott Allen is requesting  
14 a transfer of his qualified agent status from Weiser Security  
15 Services, Inc., license number 1400. He's asking that his  
16 individual private patrolman license, license number 3035, be  
17 kept in abeyance so that he may be a qualifying agent for  
18 Metro One Loss Prevention Services Group, West Coast Inc.,  
19 license number 2800. I'll entertain a motion on that item.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: The chairman or the board's  
21 indulgence, can I just look this up please?

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Absolutely.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: I don't know if I know this  
24 person.

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1           They use the word Metro and stuff like that and I  
2 never know.

3           I'm good.

4           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, I'll entertain a motion  
5 on Number 10, please.

6           MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make the  
7 motion that Scott Allen transfer his qualifying agent status  
8 from Weiser Security Services, license number 1400, and that  
9 his individual private patrolman license, number 3035, be  
10 held in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent  
11 for Metro One Loss Prevention Services Group West Coast. And  
12 this is in accordance with all statutory and regulatory  
13 requirements.

14           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
15 a second?

16           MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. I'll second  
17 the motion.

18           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a  
19 second. All in favor say aye.

20           (Three members voted in favor of the motion)

21           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So three ayes and one,  
22 myself, Board Member Nixon, who has recused herself. The  
23 motion passes.

24           Next agenda item that we trailed during the last  
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1 session was a registration appeal, Agenda Item Number 43,  
2 Jason Madi. Is Jason here? Okay. So, with him not being  
3 here, I'll go ahead and entertain a motion. Just to be  
4 clear, he was scheduled to be here at 10:30 and he's not  
5 shown. So I will entertain a motion for Mr. Jason Madi on  
6 Agenda Item 43.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
8 motion to uphold the denial for Mr. Jason Madi based on the  
9 fact that he was a no call no show in addition to failing to  
10 disclose any criminal history on his application.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
12 a second?

13 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. I second.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
15 a second. All in favor say aye.

16 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The motion passes.

18 The next item is Agenda Item Number 50, Danai  
19 Young. Danai Young. Okay. Again, Young was supposed to be  
20 here at 10:30, was scheduled to be here at 10:30, and is not  
21 in the audience at this time. I will entertain a motion.

22 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning to  
23 uphold the denial for Ms. -- for Danai Young based on failure  
24 to disclose criminal history and the no call no show for  
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1 today's meeting.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
3 a second?

4 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Second.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
6 second. All in favor say aye.

7 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The motion passes.

9 The next item is Agenda Item Number 51, okay.  
10 Donald Gonzales. You are here, okay. Please come forward,  
11 sir. Okay, sir, are you under oath? Have you born sworn in?

12 MR. GONZALES: No.

13 MS. HARRIS: Please --

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, please stand and raise  
15 your hand. She's going to swear you in at the same time.

16 MS. HARRIS: Can you both please raise your right  
17 hand.

18 (Witnesses were sworn in)

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Saladino, could  
20 you please tell us about Mr. Gonzales.

21 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. The  
22 applicant was denied for non-disclosure of a 2004 felony out  
23 of Hawaii for assault and terroristic threats. The applicant  
24 received five years probation and 29 days in jail and  
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1 restitution.

2 2019, out of Nevada, was a misdemeanor for a DUI  
3 with alcohol and/or other controlled or prohibited  
4 substances, first offense. The applicant received a  
5 suspended jail sentence, DUI school, community service, and  
6 breath interlock device.

7 The applicant did not disclose his arrests or  
8 convictions. He was made provisional and was working for  
9 Safe Management. The applicant now wishes to appeal.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Are there any  
11 questions for Mr. Gonzales from the board?

12 MEMBER BEZICK: Mr. Gonzales, why did you not  
13 disclose these arrests?

14 MR. GONZALES: What was that word you said,  
15 disclose?

16 MEMBER BEZICK: Why did you not disclose the  
17 arrests on your application?

18 MEMBER CORTEZ: Why didn't you tell us?

19 MR. GONZALES: I believe I listed them all. I  
20 think I might have forgot about the DUI. But pretty much I  
21 put everything on there like the jail time and everything.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, was that after the board  
23 called you or before when you did the initial application?

24 MR. GONZALES: You know, that was before. I was  
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1 so caught up with Hawaii and California. I was trying -- I  
2 totally forgot about these, honestly. I was still going to  
3 court.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So, the question is,  
5 according to our application, you have to tell us everything  
6 that you've ever been arrested for, okay. You did not do  
7 that; right?

8 MR. GONZALES: I thought I had everything.  
9 Sorry.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You did not tell us  
11 everything. So the question is why. Why didn't you tell us?

12 MR. GONZALES: I totally forgot. It totally  
13 slipped my mind.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So it slipped your  
15 mind that you had a felony in 2004?

16 MR. GONZALES: No. I put those down. I put the  
17 felonies and all the misdemeanors and everything I got  
18 arrested for before all of that.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, you did not. So that's  
20 why you were denied was because you did not.

21 MR. GONZALES: Oh, you mean the first time? I'm  
22 sorry about that. I'm sorry about that.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes.

24 MR. GONZALES: The first time honestly I lied. I  
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1 figured someone had told me they would give me a shot, you  
2 know, to work. I thought about it after and I messed up.  
3 Yeah. But I lied.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you for that.  
5 Any further questions? No further questions,  
6 I'll entertain a motion.

7 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
8 going to motion that we uphold the denial based on time and  
9 distance. We have a 2019 case that you failed to disclose.  
10 You've also failed to disclose a 2004. You've indicated  
11 several times that you disclosed your misdemeanors and what  
12 not. We have investigators that have done the background  
13 check and there were two incidents that were not disclosed in  
14 the years 2004 and the 2019. The reason for denial is  
15 failure to disclose and time and distance of the 2019 DUI  
16 charge.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
18 a second?

19 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. I second.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
21 a second. All in favor say aye.

22 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So you will not get your work  
24 card, okay. You can apply again in one year. Make sure you  
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1 list all of the stuff that you've been arrested for anytime  
2 you've been arrested, okay. We won't deny you based off of  
3 your arrest. But we have to have all of the information to  
4 understand it, okay.

5 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
6 do have one last statement. Please don't lie. That's it.  
7 That's all I'm going to tell you. Do not lie on any  
8 application that you're applying for in a law enforcement  
9 position.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

11 Okay. Agenda Item Number 55, right, Krystal  
12 Henderson. Okay. I see no Krystal in the -- I see no  
13 Krystal in the audience. So I'll go ahead and entertain a  
14 motion.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning to  
16 uphold the denial based on the no call no show. I do have a  
17 notation that there was an update. But the client no called  
18 no showed.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So I have a motion.  
20 Do I have a second?

21 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Second.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
23 second. All in favor say aye.

24 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)  
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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. The motion passes.

2                   The next item I believe would be 64, okay. So  
3 Taelase Gaoteote. And I may be saying the name completely  
4 wrong. So please look at the agenda and make sure that  
5 that's not you. All right. This person doesn't seem to be  
6 in the audience. So we'll go ahead and entertain a motion.  
7 To be clear, I'm so sorry, they were scheduled to be here at  
8 11:30 and it's well past that. Go ahead.

9                   MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez  
10 motioning to uphold the denial. We have a 2019 that is in  
11 active warrant status. The applicant also failed to disclose  
12 and is a no call no show for today's scheduled meeting.

13                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do I  
14 have a second?

15                  MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Second.

16                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
17 second. All in favor say aye.

18                  (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

19                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.

20                  The next agenda item that I have trailed is Item  
21 Number 65. Okay. And these guys are scheduled to be here at  
22 1:30. So I'll take board counsel on this. These guys were  
23 scheduled to be here at 12:30. We've generally waited until  
24 the end of the session. Do we want to do that and start

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1 seeing these folks or do we want to move forward and go ahead  
2 and deny these?

3 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
4 comfortable moving forward. We're almost at 40 minutes after  
5 their assigned time.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: Good.

7 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. All right. Let's move  
8 forward. We have Agenda Item Number 65, Terrence Alexander.  
9 Is there a Terrence Alexander here? Okay. I'll entertain a  
10 motion.

11 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning to  
12 uphold the denial. We have failure to disclose, I believe.  
13 Oh, yes, there was a failure to disclose and time and  
14 distance. We have a 2020 case.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
16 second?

17 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Second.

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
19 second. All in favor say aye.

20 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The motion passes.

22 Next agenda item I have trailed is 67, okay,  
23 Dyvan Brown. Okay. Mr. or Mrs. Brown is not in the  
24 audience, so I'll entertain a motion.

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1           MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning to  
2 uphold the denial for the no close -- no show no call. And I  
3 believe he also -- They also failed to disclose. There is  
4 also a 20 -- failed to disclose a 2014 case but disclosed a  
5 2020 case.

6           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do I  
7 have a second?

8           MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Second.

9           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
10 second. All in favor say aye.

11           (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

12           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: 70 was postponed; right?

13           MR. INGRAM: 70 was postponed.

14           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We also have 69. So the next  
15 item that was trailed -- Was 69 postponed or trailed?

16           MR. INGRAM: We haven't gotten to 69 yet.

17           CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Gotcha. So now we  
18 have Agenda Item Number 69, William Seda. Is there a William  
19 Seda here? Okay. We'll go ahead and trail that.

20           Item Number 70 was postponed; right? So Agenda  
21 Item Number 70, Nedra Chambers, has been postponed.

22           Okay. We're now at the 1:30 calendar where folks  
23 were supposed to come in at 1:30. We do have people in the  
24 audience. I don't want to make you wait until 1:30, so we'll

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1 go ahead and start that process. I think it would be easier  
2 if you told us what your name was versus us reading through.

3 So, yes, sir, what's your name?

4 MR. AUCOIN: 78.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Great. Come on up,  
6 Mr. Aucoin. And you have been sworn in?

7 MR. AUCOIN: Yes, ma'am.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, Investigator Hubbel,  
9 could you please tell us about Mr. Aucoin.

10 MR. HUBBEL: Mr. Aucoin, the applicant, was  
11 denied for a 2007 felony conviction out of Nevada for theft.  
12 Disposition was 90 days in jail and three years probation.  
13 And that information was actually taken from his application.  
14 And this arrest was disclosed on his application.

15 There was also a 2006 misdemeanor solicitation of  
16 prostitution arrest out of Nevada, which was lowered to a  
17 citation. There was a fine that was paid and the case was  
18 closed. This arrest was also disclosed on his application.

19 The applicant disclosed all of his arrest history  
20 and filed his appeal at the time of the application. He was  
21 required to pay restitution, spend 90 days in jail, and three  
22 years of probation that ended in July of 2010. The  
23 application was not made provisional and is here to appeal.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So the applicant did  
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1 disclose the arrest and was denied based off of the felony is  
2 my understanding?

3 MR. HUBBEL: That's correct.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir.

5 Are there any questions from the board?

6 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. Sir, did you  
7 make restitution for the fifth felony?

8 MR. AUCOIN: No. It's over a hundred thousand  
9 dollars. Not all of it. No.

10 MEMBER BEZICK: Are you in the process of it or  
11 you can't do it?

12 MR. AUCOIN: I can't do it.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: What was the situation, sir,  
14 on the felony?

15 MR. AUCOIN: What was the situation?

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes, sir.

17 MR. AUCOIN: Well, my wife was working for a  
18 company and I went as a, like a, what you call as a filled in  
19 because it was for the union and I kept working there. I  
20 wasn't working and she kept cutting me checks and then we got  
21 caught and it was over a hundred thousand dollars. I haven't  
22 been in trouble since.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: How long did you guys  
24 continue this? How long did you guys do this? For how many  
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1 years?

2 MR. AUCOIN: We got caught pretty quick. Maybe a  
3 couple.

4 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So she was writing some  
5 pretty big checks?

6 MR. AUCOIN: Yes, ma'am. Like four or 5,000 at a  
7 time. And, what happened was it was so much, I was making  
8 more money than anybody in the company. They put a red flag  
9 up. They got her first and then they got me.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So you both were arrested?

11 MR. AUCOIN: Yeah. I could have said it was all  
12 her, but I took the fall too. It was me too.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Well, you  
14 didn't take the fall. You also were cashing checks. That's  
15 what I'm looking at here. How much have you paid back?

16 MR. AUCOIN: Well, I don't know how much. I did  
17 pay some back. I don't know how much.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is 2007. When did you  
19 start or stop paying?

20 MR. AUCOIN: I think I stopped in, like, 2009 or  
21 something. I don't remember, sir. Because they never come  
22 after me. They never said, oh, you have to pay it. If they  
23 would have, then I would be paying something on it. But no  
24 one said anything to me. No one said -- No one sent me

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1 anything in the mail. No one has called.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: You did three years probation;  
3 is that correct?

4 MR. AUCOIN: Yeah, I did three years probation.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: And you got off probation?

6 MR. AUCOIN: Off probation.

7 MEMBER GRONAUER: Probation officer never checked  
8 with the restitution part? Because that's from the court.  
9 It's a court order.

10 MR. AUCOIN: Yeah. He didn't say, you know, keep  
11 paying or you must pay this or you're going back to jail or  
12 any of that or I would still be paying, sir.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: Usually with some experience I  
14 have they would even take ten dollars a month, If that takes  
15 the rest of your life or somebody else's lifetime. But I'm  
16 just trying to figure out -- Maybe our investigator can tell  
17 me if he investigated this any further.

18 MR. HUBBEL: Investigator Hubbel. I do not have  
19 any information in that area.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: If I may. This is Board Member  
21 Cortez. Are you on a payment plan?

22 MR. AUCOIN: Am I on a payment plan now?

23 MEMBER CORTEZ: Are you on a payment plan to pay  
24 this, according to you, over a hundred thousand dollars?

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1 MR. AUCOIN: No. But I can get on one.

2 MEMBER CORTEZ: And I can appreciate that. But  
3 my question is you don't even know the status of your  
4 restitution. I happen to know that in the State of Nevada,  
5 at least with a juvenile, after the age of 23 your case will  
6 never close if restitution is still owed. What happens it  
7 becomes a civil judgment. So I would imagine as an adult you  
8 are now in a civil judgment that you are unaware of. So I'm  
9 going to strongly represent that you speak to your counsel  
10 and have them do their job and find out if your case is still  
11 open.

12 MR. AUCOIN: Who do I talk to about that?

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: Call your attorney.

14 MR. AUCOIN: I don't have an attorney.

15 MEMBER CORTEZ: Legal counsel. Self help desk.

16 MEMBER GRONAUER: There's legal attorneys that do  
17 things --

18 (The court reporter interrupts)

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Okay. And  
20 there are attorneys that do things pro bono. You can look  
21 him up from -- And I can't give you names because you can  
22 look him up on the internet, in the yellow pages. Most  
23 attorneys will do pro bono work. I don't know who actually  
24 to send you to. You're going to have to check with self help  
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1 desk or something like that.

2 MR. AUCOIN: Can I get the ones that can get me  
3 on the track to start paying it?

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, they can give you advice  
5 and find out if you still have this out there standing. Most  
6 likely you do have a civil case against you. Most likely,  
7 okay. I don't know. I'm not an attorney. But I think you  
8 really need to do that. And, when I said pro bono, it means  
9 free. Okay. So I suggest you do that. Because, as long as  
10 you have an open case, there's not much that we can do, all  
11 right. We want you to help yourself here. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, real quick, do you have a  
13 character witness with you?

14 MR. AUCOIN: I do.

15 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Sir, I know you've  
16 been here for a while. So would you like to come up? You  
17 got to get up close.

18 MR. HOVIVIAN: My name is Paul Hovivian.

19 (The court reporter interrupts)

20 MR. HOVIVIAN: H-o-v-i-v-i-a-n, like the girl's  
21 name Vivian with ho in front of it. I've worked with  
22 Mr. Aucoin for years and he actually got me involved in  
23 security and I have my PI card. And I'm doing very well.  
24 And there's a position that just opened up for him to go in  
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1 to be a supervisor because he's my supervisor at Allegiant  
2 Stadium for the Raiders and guest services. He was the first  
3 one hired. And he got me in there and he's been good to me  
4 and my wife and my family. And we have been friends. And,  
5 you know, I trust him very much, and I like him very well.  
6 He's almost like a brother to me and his wife is almost like  
7 a sister to my mom. My mom. My wife. She treats her like a  
8 mother. You know, she takes care of me. She's Spanish, you  
9 know, old Spanish girl, anyway.

10 So, you know, Kevin has been a great guy, you  
11 know. And when I found out that he had this situation and he  
12 didn't think he was going to be able to get his PI card, I  
13 encouraged him to come down and do this hearing and lay it  
14 all out and be honest about it and he wanted to come down and  
15 do that. He just didn't know how to do that.

16 And so I've been in the mortgage business for  
17 years. I'm more of a paper pusher. Kevin is more of a  
18 mechanic type of person. So I encouraged him to do the  
19 paperwork and get this going and to follow up and get his  
20 card so he can advance with his income and with his career.

21 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you very much,  
22 sir.

23 Investigator Saladino, can you help us here? Do  
24 we know if he has anything open?

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1 MR. SALADINO: Investigator Saladino. I'm on the  
2 Eighth Judicial District Court right now and it shows that on  
3 June 9th of 2011 he was dishonorably discharged from  
4 probation and that's because the restitution wasn't paid.  
5 The restitution amount was \$185,522.87. He has been --  
6 Probation has been closed. They gave him the dishonorable  
7 because the amount of the restitution. He wasn't able to pay  
8 that. So it's currently closed and the financial section of  
9 this shows that it is closed. There's nothing waiting.

10 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So he would -- Okay. Got it.

11 MR. AUCOIN: I did contact and nobody would give  
12 me an answer. So I just said do I owe this and nobody said  
13 anything. I've had -- When I was on probation, I had, like,  
14 eight different probation officers and not one of them told  
15 me you have to pay this. I'm being totally honest right now.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
17 questions from the board?

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I got a mic  
19 that works sometimes.

20 MR. AUCOIN: It's okay. I can hear you, sir.

21 MEMBER GRONAUER: Well, I'm talking to our  
22 reporter. You seem like a nice guy. What kind of work are  
23 you doing now?

24 MR. AUCOIN: Well, I work for several companies.  
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1 I work for the ballpark. I'm an usher. I work at Safe  
2 Management. I work at Raiders stadium. I work for a company  
3 called Best that does Mandalay Bay, we do MGM, and we do  
4 Caesar's and a lot of stuff. All I'm trying to do --

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: What do you mean they do  
6 Caesar's?

7 MR. AUCOIN: Well, shows like Elton John. Just  
8 different -- All the stuff I do is, like, for shows.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Can I ask what do you do for  
10 them?

11 MR. AUCOIN: I'm an usher.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: An usher?

13 MR. AUCOIN: Yeah. And then in the check-in at  
14 Allegiant, I'm kind of like a supervisor. I've been there  
15 the longest. I've been there since day one. And I've tried  
16 to help everybody that showed up.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: But you work for Safe  
18 Management? Okay. You work for Safe Management currently?

19 MR. AUCOIN: Yes, ma'am.

20 MEMBER CORTEZ: And your position? What's your  
21 position?

22 MR. AUCOIN: I'm an usher.

23 MR. INGRAM: Kevin Ingram for the record. They  
24 can call them whatever they want to call them. If they're  
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1 employed by a license holder, they must have an active  
2 registered work card with us to do so.

3 MR. AUCOIN: But I'm not security there. I'm  
4 just an usher. I thought only security would need a card,  
5 sir.

6 MR. INGRAM: Sir, like I said, regardless of what  
7 your job duties and responsibilities are, NRS 648.060 states  
8 that no licensee shall employ an individual unless they're  
9 registered with us. You don't have to be providing security  
10 services. If you're employed by them, you must have an  
11 active registered work card.

12 MR. AUCOIN: Okay. I didn't know. Thank you.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: Madam Chair, if I may.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Please.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: To our executive director.

16 What company is this and are they licensed?

17 MR. INGRAM: He acknowledged Safe Management and  
18 he also acknowledged Best. They're both licensed with us,  
19 yes. However, they should not be employing him in any  
20 capacity. We will be following up with both of those  
21 employers.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay.

23 MR. AUCOIN: So I'm going to lose my job now?

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sir, hang on. Let us work  
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1 through this real quick.

2 MR. AUCOIN: I just don't want to be homeless.

3 MR. INGRAM: Investigator Saladino, can you tell  
4 me whether he's on any one of those rosters or both, or  
5 Investigator Swarthout?

6 MR. AUCOIN: I think he would like to talk to  
7 you.

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We're good.

9 MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, for the record, Kevin  
10 Ingram. The investigators were able to look up several  
11 things during that little departure. And Safe Management has  
12 a separate entity with a different tax EIN number that is a  
13 guest services.

14 MR. AUCOIN: That's what I am.

15 MR. INGRAM: You work for guest services as an  
16 usher?

17 MR. AUCOIN: Yes, sir.

18 MR. INGRAM: That would be legal because it's a  
19 separate entity. We'll verify that that's how he's being  
20 paid, but that would eliminate and he is not on Best roster.  
21 So my question would be what are you doing for Best right  
22 now?

23 MR. AUCOIN: Usher. That's all I do for all of  
24 them.

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1 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Does Best have a second  
2 entity right now?

3 MR. INGRAM: We'll look into that.

4 MR. AUCOIN: They all have security. That's why  
5 I'm trying to get my card through. And, just to let you  
6 know, the day before yesterday I turned my two weeks notice  
7 in to Safe. I will not be there no longer anyway, just to  
8 let you know. But I'm still employed there now. But in two  
9 weeks I'm out of there. I just told them a couple days ago.

10 MR. INGRAM: Thank you very much.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So I'll let you guys follow  
12 up on the Best.

13 Are there any further questions for -- I forgot  
14 who we're talking about.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I just want  
16 to understand on the financial part, okay, that it's closed?

17 MR. INGRAM: That is correct.

18 MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm saying c-l-o-s-e-d. Thank  
19 you.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: He's, like, the luckiest guy  
21 in the world.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: And, Mr. Aucoin, I'm sorry.

23 MR. AUCOIN: You're good. It's French.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: Hold on. Hold on. What  
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1 company was that with?

2 MR. AUCOIN: What?

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: That 185,000.

4 MR. AUCOIN: She was working for GES at the time.  
5 And what happened was they went on a strike and I filled in  
6 for the strike. And then after the strike, the other people  
7 went back and she kept cutting me checks like I worked there,  
8 but I wasn't.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you.

10 MR. AUCOIN: You're welcome.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Any further questions? Okay.  
12 I'll entertain a motion.

13 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
14 am going to motion to overturn the denial of Mr. Aucoin. He  
15 was forthcoming with his criminal record. It appears as if  
16 he has good intention to put stuff in the past and move  
17 forward with life. So at this time I am going to motion to  
18 overturn the denial and grant Mr. Aucoin his work card.

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
20 second?

21 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I second.

22 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and a  
23 second. All in favor say aye.

24 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)  
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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: You know, your motion passes.  
2 The motion passes. You will get your work card. So the  
3 office will work with you on that, right. I have to say  
4 you're probably one of the luckiest people I've ever seen.  
5 No one walks away with 180K and doesn't pay. I mean, so good  
6 luck to you, sir. Please don't embarrass us with this  
7 privilege of working in the security industry. And you're  
8 very lucky.

9                   MR. AUCOIN: Thank you.

10                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.

11                  MR. AUCOIN: Is that it?

12                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Yes, sir.

13                  Okay. So, sir, please come on up. 77. Good  
14 morning or afternoon, sir. Okay. We have agenda --

15                  MEMBER CORTEZ: Has he been sworn in?

16                  MR. JACKSON: No, I don't think so.

17                  MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

18                                 (The witness was sworn in)

19                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have Agenda Item  
20 Number 77, Jerry Jackson, in front of us. Mr. Hubbel, could  
21 you speak up a little bit when you tell us about Mr. Jackson.  
22 We're having a little bit of a hard time hearing you.

23                  MR. HUBBEL: Sure. Mr. Jackson, the applicant,  
24 was denied for a 2005 felony conviction for first degree  
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1 possession of drugs, which is 25 grams or more, cocaine,  
2 heroin, meth. This was done in Minnesota. The disposition,  
3 he was sentenced to 86 months in prison, probation, and \$750  
4 fine. This arrest was disclosed on his application. And it  
5 occurred in Yellow Medicine County, Minnesota.

6 He also has a 2010 gross misdemeanor conviction  
7 out of Minnesota for DWI. He paid the fines and attended  
8 classes. This arrest was also disclosed on his application.  
9 It also occurred in Minnesota.

10 And, lastly, 2005 felony conviction out of  
11 Minnesota for possession of first degree controlled substance  
12 in Minnesota. It was a felony drug conviction with jail  
13 time. This arrest was not disclosed on the application. It  
14 occurred in Chippewa County, Minnesota.

15 The applicant disclosed some of his arrest  
16 history and filed his appeal at the time of the application.

17 For the 2005 arrest, the applicant was sentenced  
18 to 86 months in prison, probation, and a \$750 fine. This  
19 arrest was disclosed on the application. The 2005 arrest,  
20 the applicant was sentenced to 64 months in prison,  
21 probation, and a \$750 fine. This arrest was not disclosed on  
22 the application. The applicant was not made provisional and  
23 is here to appeal today.

24 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you.  
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1                   Are there any questions from the board to  
2 Mr. Jackson?

3                   MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
4 do have a question, but it's going to be for the  
5 investigator. Mr. Hubbel, we have two cases out of 2005.  
6 One occurred January 14th and the other one February 11th.  
7 But I'm reading in the 2005 January he was convicted -- or  
8 sentenced to 86 months in prison. Did you do prison time?  
9 So I'm a little confused how can you be in prison and do  
10 something a month later.

11                  MR. JACKSON: They charged, it's all in one.

12                  MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Wait. I'm sorry. Hang  
13 on. Let me ask the investigator.

14                  MR. JACKSON: I apologize.

15                  MEMBER CORTEZ: Is that pretty much what I'm  
16 understanding? Like, this is one situation or charged as one  
17 case?

18                  MR. HUBBEL: I believe that's correct.

19                  MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So you did disclose? He  
20 did disclose. Because I'm on the February I'm seeing that  
21 you did not. Okay. Got it. Thank you.

22                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
23 questions?

24                  MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Mr. Jackson,  
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1 what have you been doing for employment?

2 MR. JACKSON: Driving CDL trucks, semis, over the  
3 road. I've done that for a few years and decided that over  
4 the road isn't for me. So I was looking.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: How long have you been in  
6 Nevada?

7 MR. JACKSON: I came last year during the COVID,  
8 but then I had to go back home because it wasn't working out.  
9 I couldn't find a job. I couldn't be able to take care of  
10 myself. So I went back home, got my CDL, and then I came  
11 back in January, so I've been here since January of this  
12 year.

13 MEMBER GRONAUER: So you have a CDL?

14 MR. JACKSON: Yes, sir.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: How long now -- Since you  
16 returned, how long have you been in Nevada?

17 MR. JACKSON: Since January. So January,  
18 February, March, April, May, June. Six months.

19 MEMBER GRONAUER: Were you not only transporting?  
20 Were you using drugs?

21 (The court reporter interrupts)

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So, I'm sorry,  
23 Mr. Jackson, I have to repeat the question.

24 MR. JACKSON: Okay.  
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1 MEMBER GRONAUER: You're driving truck now for  
2 business?

3 MR. JACKSON: Yes.

4 MEMBER GRONAUER: When you got in to all of this  
5 mess up here in 2005 and 2010, you said you were just selling  
6 drugs, you weren't transporting?

7 MR. JACKSON: No. It was one time in 2004. Both  
8 of those charges were for one case. So then after that I've  
9 never --

10 MEMBER GRONAUER: Were you ever using drugs?

11 MR. JACKSON: No. I just was selling them.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: How much time did you spend in  
13 prison?

14 MR. JACKSON: I did five and a half years.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: All Minnesota?

16 MR. JACKSON: Yes, sir. But I also completed  
17 a -- Actually, I had 87 months, but I didn't have any other  
18 bad crimes like hurting people and stuff like that, so I was  
19 accepted for a boot camp. And so going through that boot  
20 camp and completing it, I saved, like, four years of my  
21 prison sentence.

22 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. No problem.  
23 Are you currently married?

24 MR. JACKSON: No.  
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1 MEMBER GRONAUER: Any children?

2 MR. JACKSON: Yes, I have children.

3 MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you supporting your  
4 children?

5 MR. JACKSON: Absolutely. Absolutely.

6 MEMBER GRONAUER: Are your children here or in  
7 Minnesota?

8 MR. JACKSON: They're in Minnesota.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: So, since you're driving truck,  
10 if you get approved for a work card, what do you plan on  
11 doing with it?

12 MR. JACKSON: I'm going to -- Well, actually,  
13 when I first came here, this is when I applied for the PILB  
14 card, it was right away when I got here. And I got denied,  
15 so then I started looking for other ventures. So I figured  
16 like I paid the money to do -- to get this. And, if  
17 something comes up later on down the line, some security job,  
18 I could do it. You know, there was nothing stopping me from  
19 doing that if it's something that I wanted to do. But I'm  
20 doing something completely different now. But, I want to be  
21 able to have that option if I ever choose to use that, if I  
22 was approved.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: When did you get denied?

24 MR. JACKSON: A few months ago.  
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1                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, because of the felony,  
2 Bob, he got denied right away.

3                   MEMBER GRONAUER: Yeah. But I'm trying to find  
4 out when.

5                   MR. JACKSON: February maybe. I could be wrong.

6                   MEMBER GRONAUER: February of 2022?

7                   CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Date applied was March 24th.

8                   MR. JACKSON: Thank you.

9                   MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. During the application  
10 you got denied because of the felonies.

11                  MR. JACKSON: Yeah. They thought I didn't  
12 disclose everything.

13                  MEMBER GRONAUER: Our investigators are very good  
14 at what they do sometimes.

15                  MR. JACKSON: It's all good. I understand you  
16 need to know what's going on.

17                  MEMBER GRONAUER: Thank you very much.

18                  MR. JACKSON: You're welcome.

19                  CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Are there any further  
20 questions from the board? Okay. Hearing no further  
21 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

22                  MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
23 motion to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Jackson his work  
24 card based on time and distance and Mr. Jackson disclosing  
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1 his criminal history as requested.

2 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion.  
3 Do we have a second?

4 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

5 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
6 a second. All in favor say aye.

7 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

8 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Congratulations. The board  
9 will contact you, okay. Good luck.

10 Ma'am, what's your name?

11 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: Anna.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Anna. What's your last name?

13 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: Gray-McGraw.

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Why don't you come on  
15 up. We need to get you sworn in.

16 MS. HARRIS: Please raise your right hand.

17 (The witness was sworn in)

18 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Investigator Hubbel, could  
19 you please tell us about Ms. Gray-McGraw.

20 MR. HUBBEL: Investigator Hubbel for the record.  
21 The applicant was denied for a 2009 felony conviction for  
22 possession to purchase cocaine based for sale out of  
23 California. The disposition was 120 days in jail with a fine  
24 and 36 months of probation. This arrest was disclosed on the  
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1 application.

2 There was also a 2009 possession of controlled  
3 substance with an unknown severity out of California. The  
4 charge was dismissed and this arrest was also disclosed on  
5 the application. She disclosed all of her arrest history and  
6 filed the appeal at the time of her application.

7 2009 arrest, the applicant paid a fine, completed  
8 120 days in jail, and was placed on probation for 36 months.

9 For the 1999 arrest, the charges were dismissed.  
10 The applicant was not made provisional and is here to appeal  
11 today.

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. Thank you. Were there  
13 any questions from the board?

14 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. I have one  
15 question. Ms. McGraw.

16 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: Yes.

17 MEMBER GRONAUER: Good afternoon to you. What  
18 have you been doing for work since all of this?

19 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: Security.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: You've been working security  
21 where?

22 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: In California.

23 MEMBER GRONAUER: In California. You have a  
24 security guard card in California?

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1 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: Yes.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: And how long have you been in  
3 Nevada?

4 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: March of this year.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: And what have you been doing  
6 for the last three months?

7 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: Trying -- Waiting on this date  
8 so I can go to work.

9 MEMBER GRONAUER: Are you working?

10 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: No.

11 MEMBER GRONAUER: If you get a guard card here,  
12 you get a work card here, what do you plan to do with it?

13 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: I got hired at Safe Management  
14 at the stadium and I got another interview tomorrow for --

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: You got hired by them?

16 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: Yeah. I did the interview and  
17 everything and they hired me and that's when I did my  
18 fingerprints and I told them I was waiting on this date to  
19 get my card.

20 MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. So they know that you  
21 didn't have a card at that time?

22 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: They knew I had the California  
23 card but I needed to get Nevada.

24 MEMBER GRONAUER: So your employment is --  
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1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Contingent.

2 MEMBER GRONAUER: -- provisional on getting the  
3 work card?

4 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: Yes.

5 MEMBER GRONAUER: All right. Thank you.

6 Any further questions for Ms. McGraw-Gray --  
7 Gray-McGraw? Okay. Hearing there are no further questions,  
8 I'll entertain a motion.

9 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I'm  
10 motioning to overturn the denial for Mrs. Gray-McGraw based  
11 on the time and distance. She's disclosed her criminal  
12 history as requested and I'll submit on that.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. I have a motion. Do I  
14 have a second?

15 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
17 second. All in favor say aye.

18 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you, ma'am. It has  
20 been approved. The office will contact you for the next  
21 steps, okay.

22 MS. GRAY-MCGRAW: All right. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Thank you. Good luck to you.

24 MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, those remaining on the  
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1 agenda, Items 69 through 81, were all informed to be here at  
2 1:30. So if you want to take a break.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Let's take a five-minute  
4 break.

5 (The court reporter interrupts)

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So sorry. We're going to  
7 take about a five, ten-minute break, and see if anybody comes  
8 and then if not we'll just close it out at 2:00 o'clock.  
9 Thank you.

10 (Recess was taken)

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: So, it's 2:05, just past the  
12 time that we had stated. So I want to see if there's anybody  
13 up -- Well, I'm sorry. Christy, are you ready? Okay. I  
14 wanted to see if there's anybody up north.

15 MR. HUBBEL: There is no one in the north.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And there is no one in  
17 this audience down south. So I would say we -- Do we have  
18 anything to trail or that we trailed that we need to clean  
19 up?

20 MR. INGRAM: We have Item Number 69 that we  
21 trailed and then the only other agenda item was scheduled for  
22 today. And I'll just read them all inclusive. 69, 71, 72,  
23 73, 74, 75 were scheduled to be here at 1:30 and no call no  
24 show.

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1 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. And then from then on  
2 was for next week. Because we have 76.

3 MR. INGRAM: 76 was postponed. 77, 78, 79, 80,  
4 and 81 were already heard. So we start tomorrow, day two, at  
5 9:00 a.m., with Item Number 82.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So let's go ahead and  
7 clean up what we trailed. We have Agenda Item Number 69,  
8 William Seda, who I do not see in the audience, so I will  
9 take a motion. I'll entertain a motion for that.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board's indulgence.

11 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Sure.

12 MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Gronauer. Number 79 I  
13 make a motion --

14 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: 69.

15 MEMBER GRONAUER: On Number 69 I make a motion to  
16 uphold the denial of Mr. William Seda. No call no show.

17 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
18 a second?

19 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Second.

20 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
21 second. All in favor say aye.

22 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

23 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Motion passes.

24 MR. INGRAM: Madam Chair, Kevin Ingram for the  
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1 record. I misspoke. Items Number 72 and 73 were both  
2 postponed. So I apologize.

3 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So then that leaves us  
4 with 74 and 75.

5 MR. INGRAM: 71, 74, and 75.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Okay. So we have Agenda Item  
7 Number 71 now, Toddra Thomas. I do not see anybody in the  
8 audience, so I'll entertain a motion for Agenda Item Number  
9 71.

10 MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. Motion to  
11 deny -- or to uphold the denial for Ms. Toddra Thomas based  
12 on the no call no show.

13 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have  
14 a second?

15 MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick. Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: We have a motion and we have  
17 a second. All in favor say aye.

18 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

19 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: Agenda Item Number -- Just so  
20 it's clear, Agenda Item Number 72, Brandon Quintana, has been  
21 postponed.

22 And, Agenda Item Number 73, Deanna Manning, has  
23 been postponed.

24 Agenda Item Number 74, Elizabeth Zavala. I do  
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1 not see anyone in the audience, so I'll entertain a motion on  
2 that agenda item.

3 MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I make a motion  
4 that Elizabeth Zavala, the work card denial be upheld for no  
5 call no show.

6 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion. Do I have a  
7 second?

8 MEMBER GRONAUER: Gronauer. Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: I have a motion and I have a  
10 second. All in favor say aye.

11 (The vote was unanimously in favor of the motion)

12 CHAIRPERSON NIXON: The next one is Agenda Item  
13 Number 75, Gloria Lopez. Again, there is no one in the  
14 audience, so I'll entertain a motion for Agenda Item Number  
15 75.

16 MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez. I  
17 just want to make a comment prior to my motion. I want to  
18 say it's kind of disappointing that some of these individuals  
19 did not show up, because I had in my notes that they did what  
20 needed to be done on their re-application. But, because of
