4	PILB Licensing Board meeting. I would like to start off with
5	roll call.

18	This is the section where we have public comment.
19	Members of the general public may comment on matters
20	appearing on the agenda and may and may bring up matters
21	not appearing on the agenda to the attention of the Board.
22	The Board may discuss the matters not appearing
23	on the agenda but may not act on the matters at this meeting.
24	If the Board desires, the matters may be placed on future CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

agenda for action. Public comments may be limited to five minutes per person at the discretion of the Chairman but will not be restricted according to viewpoint.

Do we have any comment in the south?

Good morning.

MR. ZANE: Good morning, Madam Chair. I lost a few pounds. You can recognize me. Good morning, Madam Chair and Board. My name is Mark Zane. I am here today on behalf of the Nevada Association of License Repossessors as its president, also in my other capacity as a license holder. I've got a couple of comments to make.

The reason that I'm here today to speak on the public comment section is to notify the Board because of the strict timelines associated with the provisions of NAC 648.430 that the Nevada Association of License Repossessors will be seeking advisory opinions on three or four specific issues and that would come at your March meeting according to the regulations. It has to be submitted at a quarterly meeting. So we'll be submitting those in time. But I wanted to give you a heads up so that the criteria and we'll get them in as early as possible.

But with a 30-day requirement associated with how fast the Board must respond, I wanted to give you a heads up.

It will be a couple, about three or four different issues,

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some of which you might not be able to do anything with without legislative change. Some of it you can probably do something with, but we need it -- we intend as an organization to make a charge to change statutory -- the statutory framework in our 648 as well as some of the regulatory stuff and to set in motion statutory authority for regulations to be further made and further enhanced along the line.

With that in mind, I'm also reaching out to the private patrolman in the state, the licensees for the private patrolman to see if they likewise would like to organize.

And I've gotten back reasonably good response from the licensees to indicate that they are receptive to some sort of organization to assist in this matter. Because once I got looking at the statute and the regulations it appeared to me that 20 repossessors could do everything in the world to try to accomplish a change in the statute and 150 security companies could roll in and say no, we don't want them and tell them to sit down somewhere.

So I don't want to spend a lot of time on the battlefield just to lose the war. So everything that we would be seeking that would be a lot of cross positions with regard to the statutes and the different licensed disciplines as it would apply to the Board and the Board function and CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

fines and forfeitures and different things of that nature.

So the NSPI, the Nevada Society of Private Investigators already exist. So I reached out to them and they indicated they are willing to participate in the process. So you would have the vast majority of licensed categories and licensees by number. And I can see it as an organizational model to where maybe the fighting can get done before we get into the actual meat of legislature or the actual meat of a regulation.

So just wanted to give you a heads up and say good to see you all. Thank you.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I appreciate that. Thank you so much. Thank you.

Any further comment in the south? Any comment in the north?

Okay. Hearing there's no more comment we'll move forward. So next is Board Executive Director Announcements, Reports and Updates. Executive Director Ingram.

MR. INGRAM: Thank you, Madam Chair. The Board has been provided the results of our biennial audit that's conducted by an outside CPM firm pursuant to regulations. You'll note that our audit came back very clean showing no discrepancies, showing that everything followed the general practices of county. And when it was presented to the LCB

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auditor there was no further information requested. So I'm glad to present that to the Board.

The second item I would like to cover is the financial statements that was sent out to the Board. You'll notice the financial statements look a little different. Now that we are no longer under the umbrella of the Attorney General's Office and we've hired an independent accounting and payroll firm, a lot more detailed information. You can see right now that our reserve has finally hit the level of a six-month reserve as required by statute. It's one of the first times that our Board has met that statute.

However, the auditors and LCB understand that most prison commissions can't reach that level. So I'm happy to report that we've met that level and that our operating and expenditures are right in line. If there's any questions I would be happy to answer those.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, but thank you. Great job on that.

MR. INGRAM: Thank you. The last thing is the statistics provided to you. I'll run through the stats for the last quarter. This is going to be through December 31st. Since the Board getting that pushed to January I'll update those a little bit for you. You can see under licensing applications October 1st through December 31st we had of the CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

corporations applications which would include any corporate officers, we had one applicant fail the qualifying agent exam. So they will be rescheduled.

One canine applicant needs to test. The testing was, it was too recent of a submission for us to get that done prior to the Board.

We have one private patrolman that was rejected due to incomplete application. They will be following up with us.

We had two private patrolman that are currently in background and were unable to finish before today's Board so they will be on the March Board meeting.

And we had one individual PPO that had an incomplete application. He's working on getting us more information.

And we had one corporation for private patrol withdrawn.

So you can see everyone that applied. We had one canine, two repossessors. One or I'm sorry, seven private investigators, 20 private patrolman. We had 7 status changes, 18 new corporations and 28 corporate officers. So the applications were coming in.

Work card applications, we processed 3,506 work cards from October 1st through December 31st. Of those 21 -- CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

2,122 are active. There are 833 in provisional status, 162 pending, 250 withdrawn and 138 denied.

The reason for pending is obviously depending on when the application is in, how quickly we get those turned around. I can tell you right now we're approximately at two turn around with expedites being completed in two to three days.

The definitions there as far as active, obviously they have completed the entire work card process. They were issued a permit work card. And provisional status, they have received their provisional status while we are waiting to receive the fingerprints from the criminal repository. Once we receive those we make them acting.

Pending application was received, entered and background has been started. Withdrawn, the application was missing information. So the application was withdrawn pending receipt of that information.

And then the denied work cards, already the work cards, that was denied based on 648.1493, many of which you will be hearing appeals on today.

The second page, the complaints and investigations, October 1st through December 31st, we had 39 total complaints and/or investigations. Of those 39, ten are still pending, currently being investigated, easy for me to CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

1 say. 14 have been closed, finding no action to be taken.

Six were referred to other agencies that had the authority to resolve the issue.

There were two human resource disputes. Those were referred back to human resources as well. We had one audit. Three citations and violations issued and three civil cases up.

So, again, a brief description of each of those categories. They are pending. It's still an ongoing investigation. Closed or no action, no findings were found to support complaint.

Referred, either referred to the correct authority such as Gaming Control Board, Gaming Commission, law enforcement.

HR disputes referred back to the company HR.

Audits were, we found enough information in the investigation that we were to follow through on a complete audit with the license holder to make sure that they are aware of all of the laws and regs.

Citations and violations. If it's unlicensed activity they are given the citation or if it was a license holder they were issued a notice of violation and a fine.

Civil cases, again, referred to legal.

On the notice of violations, these are for the CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

license holders. We had one citation that was issued -- I'm sorry, a fine that was issued for working an armed employee, an employee armed that had never gone through the arms training. That was a fine in the amount of \$750. We had one that had an employee working out of qualifications. So that was a citation in the amount of \$500. Both of those have been paid in full and we wanted to make sure that they follow and are in compliance moving forward.

The unlicensed activity citations, we issued five unlicensed activity citations in this quarter. They were all for private patrolman in the total amount of \$30,000. Of the 30,000, 27,500 have been paid. And there's one outstanding for 2,500 that was issued just recently, and they have 30 days to either pay or to appeal.

So of those citations we had two first time offenders which were \$2,500 citations. And we had an additional individual that was given a second and third and fourth citation. They are currently going through the licensing process and they have confirmed that they have ceased and desist all operations in that of its kind.

Do you have any questions on the statistics?

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: This is Commissioner

Gronauer. Mr. Ingram, when we get these reports, you know,
in, they are great reports. These are fantastic, nothing
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wrong with that. But I get a little lost because what happened to the quarter before? What happened to them cases? Are we dealing with these cases still or the quarter before that, the quarter before that? How much money is really owed to us or not owed to us? Do you understand what I'm saying? And how many clients we had in that quarter, are they hooked onto this quarter? How many, you know, citations? How many repeat citations? Repeat citations is something I would really be interested in. But anyway, can you ask one of them questions and answer today?

MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. As you know, I'm a little bit behind the eight ball on this statistic report just because of the individual that was comprising the previous or is no longer with us. So in an event, to give you the most accurate information, I just provided the stats from October to December.

At the March Board meeting that's when we generally give you the year end information, and we'll be prepared to do that. However, in moving forward I can definitely roll the previous quarter into the stats as well if you would so like and I think that makes sense.

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. Thank you. No, what I'm worried about is repeat offenders, if they pay their fine and they just keep going on and they get repeat offender CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

and keep going on, I think that's something we have to look out for and watch.

I know on our agenda we have certain things that are, I mean certain companies did certain things. But I would like to know how that began or where it began or how many times it's repeated. I'm being a little redundant, but I'm just trying to hone this in a little bit better.

MR. INGRAM: No. That makes perfect sense. The repeat offenders are the individuals that we would be moving forward with legal counsel for bringing them before the Board for disciplinary action. The unlicensed activity citation on-goings a little more difficult because they are licensed tier.

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: I'm sorry, what?

MR. INGRAM: The unlicensed activity is the repeat offenders. It's a little harder because they're not license holders. So with that we were actually in communication with the previous D.A.G., Mike Detmer, on one of the individuals to actually seek injunctive relief because they weren't. They kept getting fined but they keep doing it.

BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Right.

MR. INGRAM: That has been resolved. That issue has been resolved. And the issue with this one, again, we CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

- were at that point where we told them, look, you either stop. 1 2 You pull all your towers and staff out of Nevada or we will 3 go injunctive relief. And they decided, well, maybe what we should do is apply for licensure. I said I think that's a 5 pretty good idea. BOARD MEMBER GRONAUER: Okay. 6 Thank you. He's going to be keeping the 17 exact same license number, strictly doing a name change. 18 So 19 any information that's searched on the Secretary of State website would show that Bulwerks did a name change to Battle 20 Born. So it's not erasing anything. It's just moving 21 22 forward with him as the sole officer now. Does that answer 23 your question? So everything on the record and everything in 24 our database would still be there. That is correct. CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So and go ahead, sir, you had --

MR. BAILEY: Actually -- John Bailey. That was precisely what I was about to say is what the Director said is that there's no attempt here to separate the past from the future. This is an opportunity for Mr. Whitfield as the qualifying agent to move forward with a new name because that's all we're seeking and requesting is a change in the name.

The other point that I was going to make is that when I said the company is in good standing, it's our understanding that the license is in good standing from the Executive Director. That the matters that you're referring to, and we understand why you would be concerned about those matters, have been cleared up, have been rectified. All fines have been paid and the company as it stands and the license as it stands currently is in good standing.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I guess and sorry to interrupt you.

MR. BAILEY: Sure.

BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It's a little bit playing with words. Licensing is in good standing, but you still have two civil lawsuits outstanding.

MR. BAILEY: Yeah, but the lawsuits themselves do CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

not impact the license themselves.

And the prosecutor, 24 they -- well, not me, the defense attorney that was assigned CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

to me, he was there to make a deal.

So he told me, he said if you go ahead and plead guilty, do six months of community service the judge will take the felony off your record. I said, well, fine. I don't want a felony on my record. So all this time I worked for many -- and I was living in L.A. I just moved here to Vegas in 2019, November of 2019.

So all the times in L.A. I worked for many security companies. What was it, Unified Security, Alliance Security. I worked for Uber. I worked for Lyft. And with a felony you can't even vote. I just voted in the last election and all other elections. So you are the only ones that brought up that I had a felony. But that's the only time I know that a felony came up and the judge was supposed to take it off. So it looked like now, you know, he never took it off but I never had a problem.

But my bleeding heart I guess has allowed me to feel for some of the older folks or some of the cases that were further back. I don't know. I don't know if that's something anybody wants to discuss. It's just I figure we had time we might as well do something.

So, like you said, it's hard to come up with a hard rule to follow because every case has just a little bit different information that's either provided or not provided.

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And that's where pervious counsel said unfortunately that's why we have a Board is for those of you to kind of go with your gut and be able to communicate on the record why you're voting the way you're voting. If that helps. I don't think it does.

So, you know, with the challenges of COVID, there's a lot of boards and commissions that are having some of the same issues we are obviously, and it makes it difficult when people have to travel when they have got COVID but they are not sick enough that they can't attend virtually.

And so one of the things that I had spoken with Board Chair about was looking into using Zoom, much like the other states do, state agencies do. Gaming control in this room, they don't use this video conferencing equipment very often. What they do is they have an account with Zoom that hooks up to their cameras and their TV's and they manage everything through Zoom.

The audio visual with this video conferencing has a delay as we know. I mean, we often laugh down here that, you know, we'll ask for a motion and a second. And somebody in the north will second after somebody down here is already seconded because there's like a two second delay, and it CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

makes it difficult on both ends.

So with Zoom there would be no delay in the audio or the visual. I'm trying to get this set up prior to the March Board meeting because for the companies to come in and do a presentation on this video equipment it won't work.

I've talked to gaming control board at length. We can't borrow their Zoom because they have a license. So I scheduled a meeting. I attended with the presenter. He's working out some figures and I was just talking to Rosalie on the side, on one of the breaks also.

Zoom has gotten to a point where they can not only do the audio portion but they can also do transcription for us. So in looking at that we can do a cost analysis with the court reporter's company that we're utilizing, which they are doing a fantastic by the way. But if that's part of the package deal also, we might be able to consolidate some of expenses. Because I know one of the challenges we have is there's one court reporting agency currently doing these types of meetings and they are not always available for our Board meetings which is going to put us in a really difficult spot.

So right now I've got an analysis being done.

They want to come out and they want to do a site visit at the two rooms, north and south, and put together a more formal CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

proposal for us, and we might look at switching to that. 1 Ιt 2 will still be in the same rooms, still the same times and everything, just a different type of --3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Audio. 5 MR. INGRAM: -- software. BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So if someone wants to appear 6 7 in person they will still be able to do that. MR. INGRAM: Absolutely. It will be just like we 8 9 have right now but have a better option where if people attend from out of state for instance, they would show up on 10 11 the video screens.
