7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Welcome,
8 everybody, to the March PILB meeting.
9 Executive Director, do you want to do
10 roll call?

11 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yes, Madam
12 Chair.

13 Roll call, Chair Nixon.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Here.

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Board
16 Member Bezick.

17 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Here.

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Board
19 Member Brown.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Here.

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Board
22 Member Cortez.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Here.

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: And Board
25 Member Gronauer will not be here today.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Second item on the
2 agenda is public comment. Members of the general
3 public may comment on matters appearing on the
4 agenda and may bring matters not appearing on the
5 agenda to the attention of the Board. The Board may
6 discuss the matters not appearing on the agenda, but
7 may not act on the matters at this meeting. If the
8 Board desires, the matters may be placed on future
9 agenda for action. Public comments may be limited
10 to five minutes per person at the discretion of the
11 Chairman, but will not be restricted according to
12 viewpoint.

13 Is there any public comment down south?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Ma'am, did you want
15 to make any public comment?

16 UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: No.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And no public
18 comment up north?

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, ma'am.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Hearing
21 there's no public comment, we'll move to the next
22 agenda item. Executive Director, will you read
23 announcements, reports, and updates.

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yes, Madam
25 Chair.

1 I had went ahead and emailed all the
2 board members the financials, and if there was any
3 questions regarding the financials, I can go ahead
4 and answer them. It looks like we're still on track
5 for our proposed budget with five months remaining
6 in the budget. Revenue is on track, and it looks
7 like our legal fees are a little bit below budget,
8 but I think that's because we weren't sure who our
9 DAG was going to be. So we're on track, and we're
10 doing really well.

11 Any questions regarding the finances?

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have none.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I have none.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any questions up
15 north?

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, ma'am.

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: And for the
18 updates and reports for the end of the year
19 statistics, I'll turn that over to Investigator
20 Swarthout.

21 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Investigator
22 Swarthout. Can you guys hear me up in the north?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes.

24 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Yes.

25 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: So for licensing

1 applications for the comparison between 2023 and
2 2024: So in total for '23, 158 applied; 101 were
3 approved; 57 were withdrawn or denied. For 2024, we
4 did see an increase up to 194 apply, 98 approved,
5 and 96 are withdrawn or denied. That 96 does
6 include people that were postponed and chose to go
7 at a later board meeting.

8 So if they postponed for one board
9 meeting, that's why that number is a little bit
10 higher and they went for the next one. So we could
11 look further into that one if the Board -- for next
12 year if the Board wants a better breakdown on that,
13 just so we know. For the 2024 board meeting, there
14 was 59 that applied, 25 approved, 34 that were
15 withdrawn or denied.

16 And then work cards: For 2023, 2024
17 comparison, in 2023 we did 15,115. For 2024, we did
18 14,059 in total that were received. Of that for --
19 so it's like a 7 percent decrease. In 2023, towards
20 the end, we had F1, and then the start of 2024, we
21 had the Super Bowl; so that's probably why we had
22 that big influx during the end of that year and
23 start of our -- of last year.

24 For the quarter comparisons, total for
25 2023, we received 5,390. Of that that are active,

1 is 4,700. 0, of course, provisional; 0 pending;
2 withdrawn 401; denied 289 within the same four
3 months that -- or three months of that fourth
4 quarter. Total in '24 is 3,505. Total that's
5 active is 2,972. Provisional is 90. Withdrawn is
6 309. Denied 134. Those 90 that are still
7 provisional aren't due to the other issues we were
8 having with DPS. These all look to be late
9 applications that they didn't complete the
10 application when they first applied, that then ended
11 up turning in the items late.

12 Complaint investigations comparison: So
13 for 2023 the total was 79. All 79 were closed with
14 13 violations issued out. In 2024, we did see a
15 giant jump. We went up to 155 received. 153 of
16 them are closed with 2 of them still open and 6
17 violations issued out. Fourth quarter of '24, we
18 received 54 complaints. 52 of them are closed. 2
19 of them are still open.

20 And then unlicensed activity comparison,
21 2023 to 2024: In '23, we issued 30. In '24, we
22 issued 16. The big jump in '24 is on our third and
23 sequential. We went from 1 in '23 to 6 in '24. And
24 then fourth quarter of '23 to '24, 4 were issued in
25 the fourth quarter of '23. 6 were issued in the

1 fourth quarter of '24, with 2 of them being the
2 third and (inaudible).

3 (Reporter Clarification.)

4 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: With 2 of them
5 being the third and sequential.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Question for you,
7 Investigator Swarthout. This is Board Member Brown.
8 Do you have any idea why there were -- why we had
9 the increase in complaints in '24?

10 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: It looks like a
11 lot more are coming in on the work card holders, and
12 with the new additions of the other agencies with
13 Metro contacting us, I know we received a lot from
14 the SOAT section that was made mention in a previous
15 board meeting, the Sex Offender Apprehension Team.
16 So I believe a lot of it is coming from that. And a
17 lot of Metro is starting to reach out when they're
18 having issues with the guards now.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Great. Thank
20 you.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Quick question.
22 Board Member Nixon. On the two that are outstanding
23 for 2024, what's their timeline of -- did they come
24 in at the end of the year? Are you still working on
25 your investigation?

1 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: They came in,
2 and both of them are for work card holders; so,
3 essentially, we're monitoring to wait to see if they
4 get added to a roster that revoke under the NAC.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

6 Any further questions from the Board?

7 Okay. Investigator Swarthout, any
8 updates beyond this?

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Madam
10 Chair, Director Saladino, for the record. No other
11 updates.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we'll move
13 on to the next item, review and approve transcripts
14 from the December 11, 2024, board meeting.

15 Were there any questions concerning the
16 transcripts?

17 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
18 I'll entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
20 motioning to approve the transcripts as written.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
22 motion. Do we have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
24 I'll second.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We

1 have a second. All in favor say aye.

2 (All present Board members
3 voted aye.)

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
5 Counsel Detmer, could you please swear in
6 all witnesses.

7 MR. DETMER: Thank you, Chair.

8 For all those who are going to provide
9 statements or testify in front of the Board, could
10 you please stand and raise your right hand, please.

11

12 AUDIENCE MEMBERS,
13 having been duly sworn,
14 testified as follows:

15

16 MR. DETMER: And was that confirmation up
17 north?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes.

19 UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: Yes.

20 MR. DETMER: Thank you very much. And
21 this was Mike Detmer for the record.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you,
23 everyone.

24 The next agenda item is consent items for
25 potential blocked vote. Those items are items 6

1 through 28.

2 Does the Board -- oh, I'm sorry. One
3 does need to be removed. Item number 23 is
4 withdrawn. Unfortunately, the gentleman is not able
5 to attend; so that item number 23 will be removed.

6 Okay. Are there any other agenda items
7 that Board members had questions on, concerns with?

8 Okay. Seeing there -- oh, I'm sorry. We
9 had one more that was potential for the blocked
10 vote. That was item number 29, but we were waiting
11 on fingerprints. Did we get 29's fingerprints back?

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: No.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, again, the
14 consent items for potential blocked vote are 6
15 through 22 and then 24 through 28. Seeing there's
16 no questions or concerns with those items, I'll
17 entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
19 motioning to approve the consent items as listed.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
21 motion. Do we have a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown
23 seconds.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We
25 have a second. All in favor say aye.

1 (All present Board members
2 voted aye.)

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
4 So for the individuals that are under
5 that consent blocked vote, if there's anybody here,
6 you are welcome to leave at this time. We are
7 entertaining. You're welcome to stay as well, but,
8 you know, we don't want to force you through a long
9 day if you don't have to; so, again, you're able to
10 leave if you need.

11 So then the next agenda item is agenda
12 item number 29. Sedgwick SIU. Is anybody here for
13 that agenda item? Is Amy Brown here?

14 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Madam
15 Chair, Executive Director Saladino for the record.
16 Both of these individuals are corporate officers
17 being added to the company. Both of them are
18 attorneys -- (interruption.)

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Go ahead.

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Both of
21 them are attorneys. When we ran their backgrounds,
22 we didn't see any possible issues and they didn't
23 indicate any criminal history. We were hoping to
24 possibly do a consent on the return of negative
25 fingerprints.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So seeing that
2 they are not here and we do not have fingerprints
3 back, I will entertain a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
5 motioning to approve item number 29 contingent upon
6 return of fingerprints being cleared of any criminal
7 activity.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
9 motion. Do we have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown
11 will second.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
13 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

14 (All present Board members
15 voted aye.)

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.

17 Okay. Next agenda item is agenda number
18 30, Redwood Private Security. Is Roberto Noriega
19 here?

20 MR. NORIEGA: Noriega.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Noriega. Please,
22 sir, come up to the front.

23 Welcome, sir. Please tell us a little
24 bit about yourself and the intentions with your
25 license.

1 MR. NORIEGA: Okay. My name is
2 Robert Noriega. I'm the present Qualified Agent for
3 Redwood Private Security, LLC. We're looking to
4 change the license name to Redwood Private Security,
5 Limited Partnership.

6 If possible, I would like to combine this
7 with line item number 38, for Jason Berckart. He's
8 applying for the PPO license, and this is
9 anticipation of transferring the QA to him and
10 relieving me of the duties of QA for that particular
11 company.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So 30 and 38.

13 MR. NORIEGA: Yeah, both items involve
14 Redwood Private Security.

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Madam
16 Chair, Executive Director Saladino for the record.
17 Due to our NAC 648.270, "Partnerships, each person
18 who is a partner in a business whose activities are
19 required to be licensed by Chapter 648 of the NRS
20 must be licensed pursuant to the provisions of the
21 chapter."

22 So being that they're setting up as a
23 limited partnership, both of them needed to obtain
24 the private patrol license.

25 So Mr. Berckart applied for his

1 individual PPO license, and Mr. Noriega is doing a
2 change of status. Basically, they'll both have PPO
3 licenses. In our system we'll have one of them in
4 abeyance, which will be Mr. Noriega's in abeyance,
5 and then Mr. Berckart's would be the active license
6 for it. So that's why they're here today.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I'm sorry.
8 You can go ahead.

9 MR. NORIEGA: That pretty much explains
10 everything.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
12 there any questions on item number 30 and 38? Any
13 concerns?

14 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: And, I
15 guess, Madam Chair, if I could, for the record, we
16 would just have to amend the way the motion is made,
17 because currently it reads that Mr. Noriega will
18 remain the Qualifying Agent. So we'd be placing his
19 in abeyance and then making Jason Berckart the
20 private patrol license holder in abeyance for the
21 Redwood Private Security, LP.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I guess, why didn't
23 we just put them together originally?

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I don't
25 know.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Madam Chair.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
5 Brown. I have a question that can hopefully be
6 answered by one or the other, Mr. Noriega or
7 Mr. Berckart. The incident in 2023, the firearm
8 used in self-defense, has that all been closed
9 civilly and criminally?

10 MR. NORIEGA: Mr. Berckart probably can
11 answer that question for you, sir.

12 MR. BERCKART: Good morning.
13 Mr. Berckart with Redwood Private Security. The
14 civil case is still pending currently. That's -- we
15 don't have any timeline for closure on that.
16 It's -- I'm projecting that to go at least another
17 year or two. There's currently not any movement on
18 it.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Sir, were
20 there any criminal filings in this case?

21 MR. BERCKART: No. It was deemed
22 justifiable by the District Attorney's Office and
23 been closed out on anything criminal.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.
25 Nothing further.

1 MR. DETMER: Chair, I apologize.
2 Mike Detmer for the record. If I could have the
3 Board's indulgence. I want to confer something
4 about standard practice with the Executive Director.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Yeah, no
6 problem.

7 MR. DETMER: Is this mic broadcasting?

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yep.

9 Please hold.

10 (Discussion off the record.)

11 MR. DETMER: Are we back on the record?

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

13 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer for the record.
14 I appreciate the Board's indulgence. What I was
15 noticing was that agenda item 30 is provided on
16 today's agenda as requesting a corporate name change
17 to Redwood Private Security and then with
18 Mr. Noriega remaining the Qualifying Agent. It
19 doesn't go into any kind of specifics as far as who
20 the Qualifying -- as far as Mr. Berckart being the
21 Qualifying Agent and Mr. Noriega's license being
22 held in abeyance.

23 My concern is that that is deviating from
24 the agenda item and, therefore, it's not clear and
25 complete. The most cautious approach to abiding by

1 NRS 241 would be to do it as it's provided here in
2 the agenda, and then maybe at a subsequent meeting
3 taking those actions at that point.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So could we still do
5 a vote on both items individually or --

6 MR. DETMER: Yes. But what my concern
7 was going beyond what is provided on the today's
8 agenda, that being holding his license in abeyance
9 and making Mr. Berckart the Qualifying Agent.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Got it. Okay.

11 Okay. So it sounds like we're going to
12 have to do them separately.

13 I do have a question, why the name
14 change?

15 MR. BERCKART: Mainly, for tax -- federal
16 tax purposes. We originally had it as a separate
17 entity for liability protections and found out that
18 we kind of hurt ourselves on the tax side of things.
19 And so we're just going to combine it under our
20 limited partnership. We're bringing in all of our
21 states under one.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Got it.

23 So, Board --

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Madam.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yep. Go ahead.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
2 Brown. Question for Mr. Detmer: If we approve item
3 number 30, which leaves Mr. Noriega as the
4 Qualifying Agent, can we go down to 38 at all and
5 make Mr. Berckart the Qualifying Agent, if we just
6 made Mr. Noriega the Qualifying Agent?

7 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer for the record.
8 Thank you for the question, Member Brown. I don't
9 read -- unless I'm mistaken, I don't read 38 as
10 making him a Qualifying Agent, just making
11 Mr. Berckart a -- giving him the private patrolman
12 license.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Yes. I'm
14 sorry. I see that.

15 And then next question for you and/or
16 Executive Director Saladino: I'm not sure how we
17 ruled in the past if we have an active civil case.
18 Do you recall any times that we've gone ahead and
19 approved when we have an active civil case going on?

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: From my history --
21 this is Board Member Nixon. From my history, it's
22 only been criminal cases where we've, I think, you
23 know --

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: When we
25 proceeded with caution in regards to the criminal

1 cases. Civils cases --

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: -- yeah, we
4 usually haven't taken them in to --

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And that's
7 fine. I just didn't recall.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, that's what I
9 remember at this point.

10 Okay. So we're on agenda item number 30.

11 Okay. Any questions for Mr. Noriega at this point?

12 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
13 I'll entertain a motion for agenda item number 30.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
15 Member Cortez, motioning to approve Redwood Private
16 Security LLC, license number 3042, a new corporate
17 name change to Redwood Private Security, LP.

18 Mr. Robert Noriega will remain the Qualifying Agent
19 subject to all statutory, regulatory requirements.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion.
21 Do we have a second?

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
23 I'll second.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
25 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

1 (All present Board members
2 voted aye.)

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So that motion
4 passes.

5 One quick question, what was the actual
6 application for to put this -- his thing in
7 abeyance?

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: No, it was
9 for the name change.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So
11 congratulations, Mr. Noriega.

12 MR. NORIEGA: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Your motion has
14 passed.

15 And then we'll have to do yours
16 individually. Thank you.

17 Agenda item number 31, Drogue Ventures.
18 Is Mr. Holzschuh --

19 MR. HOLZSCHUH: Holzschuh.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And how do you
21 pronounce your name?

22 MR. HOLZSCHUH: Holzschuh.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Holzschuh. Okay.

24 Please tell us a little bit about
25 yourself and the intentions with the license.

1 MR. HOLZSCHUH: My name's Holzschuh.
2 I've been in the industry approximately 20 years. I
3 currently have a company based out of Texas.
4 Looking to expand into Nevada with a new license.
5 We've got a bunch of clients that we serve in Texas
6 and are starting to come this direction; so we felt
7 the need to apply for a license here.

8 Worked for the government for
9 approximately 25 years as a contractor. I was
10 looking forward to opening up a new business.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And,
12 Mr. John -- is it Keane?

13 MR. KEANE: Keane.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Keane.

15 MR. KEANE: Yes, ma'am.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What's your role in
17 this?

18 MR. KEANE: My role is essentially
19 employee number one in Nevada, because I'm a
20 Qualifying Agent. So Scot reached out to me and
21 said, "Hey, would you like to join my team?"

22 And this is step one to get us going.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right.

24 Board, are there any questions?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member

1 Cortez. Board Investigator Swarthout, can we get
2 the update for the member.

3 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: So I'm probably
4 going to butcher your last name, Mr. Holzschuh.

5 MR. HOLZSCHUH: Holzschuh.

6 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Holzschuh did
7 provide me a letter this morning. He's been
8 reaching out to California about those liens and
9 judgments, trying to figure out what's going on.
10 When he went down to the office, he said that they
11 would not tell him what they were for, just said
12 that they were there. So he's having to petition
13 them to release and provide him information on what
14 those liens and judgment are for.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

16 MR. HOLZSCHUH: If I may --

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Did they give you a
18 timeline on when you'll get that information?

19 MR. HOLZSCHUH: This has been going on
20 for over five years. This is all based on the fact
21 that I spent multiple years overseas as a Department
22 of Defense contractor. Made money overseas. Never
23 made a dime of it in California. Based on my
24 federal tax returns, California felt the need to
25 impose their taxes on me even though the money was

1 not made in the state.

2 We've provided them, over the last seven
3 years, that documentation that I was out of the
4 country for 300 days. None of that money was made
5 in the state of the California, not a penny of it.
6 They're not entitled to any. California, when you
7 file, if you're a resident there and you don't file
8 with them for that year, they go based on your
9 industry and your position in the industry. They
10 impose taxes on you because they felt you should
11 have filed taxes, when if you don't make any money
12 there, you don't have to file.

13 This has been an ongoing battle. When
14 Zach notified me that a bunch of others had come up,
15 I flew to California from Texas in person, went to
16 there. A lady at the counter is like, "All we can
17 give you is the numbers and stuff. You have to
18 formally request all the information."

19 Contacted a tax attorney. We filed a
20 letter with them requesting every single piece of
21 documentation that they have. Again, filed the DOD
22 paperwork that we had for all of the years that this
23 is in question, showing them that I didn't make a
24 dime of that money in the state of California and
25 that they're not owed any taxes.

1 They continue to impose additional fines
2 and fees based on additional taxes they feel I owe
3 for those years that I wasn't even there.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

5 MR. HOLZSCHUH: So we're actively working
6 on it, trying to get it, but it -- this is going to
7 be a process.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do we have a copy of
9 the actual request for the documentation?

10 Okay.

11 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes, we do. And
12 it was dated February 17th.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
14 other questions?

15 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
16 I'll entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
18 motioning to approve Drogue Ventures, LLC, a new
19 corporate private patrol officer license; Mr. John
20 P. Keane, license number 2249, to approve his
21 individual license to be kept in abeyance so that he
22 may become the Qualifying Agent. Member to be
23 approved is Mr. Scot R. Holzschuh. Both subject to
24 statutory and regulatory requirements.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a

1 motion. Do we have a second?

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This Board Member
3 Brown. I'll second.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We
5 have a second. All in favor say aye.

6 (All present Board members
7 voted aye.)

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The motion passes.
9 Hopefully, you know, you'll continue with your path
10 through all that.

11 MR. HOLZSCHUH: I'll continue with Zach.
12 I'll continue to keep Zach informed.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank
14 you. Good luck to you guys.

15 MR. KEANE: Thank you.

16 MR. HOLZSCHUH: Thank you very much.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda item
18 number 32, MRNY Consulting Solutions, LLC d/b/a
19 Narrow Security.

20 Okay. And you must be --

21 MR. SEDA: Anthony.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- Mr. Seda. Okay.
23 Please tell us a little about yourself and the
24 intentions with the license.

25 MR. SEDA: Okay. How are you doing?

1 Anthony Seda. I'm originally from New York. Don't
2 take that against me.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Only California.

4 MR. SEDA: I've been in the business 45
5 years. I actually opened up -- in 2006, I opened up
6 All Purpose Security here in Las Vegas. Been in
7 business for the 18 years.

8 In December of '23, I sold it. I sold
9 81 percent of it to someone else. I'm relinquishing
10 my 19 percent to him so I can become the Qualifying
11 Agent for Narrow Security.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And are you a
13 resident of Nevada?

14 MR. SEDA: Yes.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. You are.

16 Are there any questions for Mr. Seda?

17 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
18 I'll entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
20 motioning to approve MRNY Consulting Solutions, LLC
21 d/b/a Narrow Security, a new corporate private
22 patrol officer license; Mr. Anthony Seda, license
23 number 4211, to be become the Qualifying Agent and
24 that his license be placed in abeyance subject to
25 all statutory, regulatory requirements.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
2 motion. Do we have a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
4 Brown. I'll second.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
6 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

7 (All present Board members
8 voted aye.)

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The motion
10 passes. Congratulations.

11 MR. SEDA: Thank you very much.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're welcome. Good
13 luck to you.

14 Okay. Off to agenda item number 33,
15 S.A.F.E. Management of Nevada, LLC. Hunter
16 McIntyre. Yes.

17 MR. MCINTYRE: Good morning.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. So can
19 you tell us a little about your business and your
20 intentions with the license.

21 MR. MCINTYRE: Sure. My name is
22 Hunter McIntyre. I'm the president, CEO of S.A.F.E.
23 Management. We are an event staffing and security
24 company. We have a presence here in Nevada, and I'm
25 simply looking to become a member status because of

1 the role change.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
3 questions for Mr. McIntyre?

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member
5 Cortez. Mr. McIntyre, good morning.

6 MR. MCINTYRE: Good morning.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: When was probation
8 terminated?

9 MR. MCINTYRE: When was probation
10 terminated? I'm not sure I --

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: It was a noise
12 citation.

13 MR. MCINTYRE: Oh, oh.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: It was quite some
15 time ago, but I was just curious.

16 MR. MCINTYRE: Yeah, I don't know. I was
17 like 18; so that would have been 18 -- 18 years ago.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank
19 you.

20 MR. MCINTYRE: Yes.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any further
22 questions for Mr. McIntyre?

23 Okay. Hearing there are no further
24 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez

1 motioning to approve S.A.F.E. Management of Nevada,
2 LLC, license number 2731, member status for Hunter
3 K. McIntyre, subject to all statutory, regulatory
4 requirements.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
6 motion. Do we have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
8 I'll second.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We
10 have a second. All in favor say aye.

11 (All present Board members
12 voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Good
14 luck to you. Thank you.

15 MR. MCINTYRE: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda item number
17 34, Crisis24 Protection Solutions. Is
18 Mr. Brian Leek in? Is he up north?

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, ma'am.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Do we --

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Let me find
22 out.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Hang on one
24 second. Please hold.

25 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Well,

1 actually, Stephanie is actually on the meeting.

2 Stephanie, do you know where Mr. Leek is?

3 MS. BARROSO: I do not, but I will find
4 out.

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: All right.
6 Thank you.

7 Can we possibly trail him? We can
8 actually link into the meeting. Stephanie can send
9 him a link so if we need to talk to him, we can get
10 him.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I'd like to
12 know why he isn't here. Okay. We'll go ahead and
13 trail agenda item number 34.

14 Moving on to agenda item number 35,
15 Timberwolf, LLC, Lisa Miller.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: She's here in the
17 north. We're just getting her to where she can be
18 seen by the camera.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. You got it.
20 Thank you.

21 Okay. Ms. Miller, please tell us a
22 little bit about yourself and the intentions with
23 the license.

24 MS. MILLER: My name is Lisa Miller. My
25 husband, Ryan Miller, I'm a co-owner with him in his

1 business, Timberwolf, LLC. I'm a social worker at
2 Washoe County Human Services Agency.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And, Board,
4 are there any questions for Ms. Miller?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
6 Brown. I have a quick one. Is your husband my
7 former boss at the Nevada Department of Public
8 Safety Division?

9 MS. MILLER: Sounds like it.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. I worked for
11 her husband for many years as a detective, but I
12 believe that I can vote on this impartially.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And there was
14 a note there was a possible conflict because you're
15 a current county employee, but, for the record, we
16 do have a letter from her employer, HR, stating that
17 they didn't think that it would be an issue or that
18 it was not a conflict, but I just wanted to put that
19 on the record.

20 Are there any other questions for
21 Ms. Miller?

22 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
23 I'll entertain a motion.

24 MR. BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move that
25 we approve Lisa M. Miller as a member of Timberwolf,

1 LLC, license number 4408, subject to all statutory
2 and regulatory requirements.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
5 Member Cortez. I'll second that motion.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
7 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

8 (All present Board members
9 voted aye.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
11 Congratulations. Good luck to you.

12 Okay. We have agenda item number 36,
13 J Blair Group. Hi, good morning.

14 MR. BLAIR: Good morning.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You must be
16 Mr. Blair.

17 MR. BLAIR: Yes, ma'am.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Please tell us
19 a little bit about yourself and the intentions with
20 the license.

21 MR. BLAIR: Yes, ma'am. My name is
22 John Blair. I own J Blair Group, and we're based in
23 Los Angeles, California. I've been in the business
24 for roughly 20 years as a close protection agent.
25 I've owned the company for about 13 now. We

1 primarily focus on entertainment and executive
2 level.

3 And as Nevada is kind of becoming the
4 entertainment capital of the world -- or of the
5 United States, then we're looking to become
6 operational here. We would like to work surrounding
7 studios, and as you guys are starting to get a lot
8 of studios here, we have ongoing relationships with
9 a majority of them, and we're looking to branch out
10 into Nevada.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
12 there any questions for Mr. Blair?

13 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
14 I'll entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
16 motioning to approve J Blair Group NV, a new
17 corporate private patrol officer license;
18 Mr. John D. Blair to be approved; that his license
19 be placed in abeyance; and that he may become the
20 Qualifying Agent. Corporate officer to be approved
21 is Mr. John D. Blair. All subject to statutory and
22 regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
24 motion. Do we have a second?

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.

1 I'll second.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
3 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

4 (All present Board members
5 voted aye.)

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
7 Good luck to you, sir.

8 MR. BLAIR: Thank you, ma'am.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations.
10 Okay. So the next agenda item is agenda
11 item 37, Elite Protection Services Global, LLC. Do
12 we have William Myers here, please?

13 MR. MYERS: Yes, ma'am.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Come on up.
15 And Mr. Souza too.

16 MR. SOUZA: Yes.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, gentlemen,
18 tell us a little bit about yourself and the
19 intentions with the license.

20 MR. MYERS: Hi. My name is
21 William Myers. I'm retired from California Highway
22 Patrol. Did a little over 28 years there. I was
23 able to do some additional jobs within that
24 employment for the state involving protective
25 services and various other security jobs.

1 In my retirement, now I'm looking -- if
2 provided the opportunity, looking forward to opening
3 this -- starting this new company and providing
4 services that are required or, you know, wanted or
5 needed in the Las Vegas area, focusing mostly on
6 security as a whole, including personal security,
7 site security, whatever -- whatever the needs may be
8 and whatever services I can facilitate or provide.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Souza.

10 MR. SOUZA: Aloha. My name is
11 Jonah Souza, owner of a couple of restaurants and
12 nightlife bars in Hawaii and also in Las Vegas.
13 Looking for an opportunity also, like Bill said, in
14 the security, bars. I'm currently -- I'm from
15 Hawaii. Moved here during COVID for a better
16 opportunity and opportunities in family and
17 business. Currently, own a restaurant here in
18 Vegas, and my partner, Bill, came together and, you
19 know, had some opportunities and -- and looking to
20 see where this can take us here in Nevada. Yeah.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

22 Board, are there any questions for the
23 gentlemen?

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
25 Member Cortez. Good morning, gentlemen. I do have

1 a question for you, Mr. Myers. In regards to your
2 dismissal case, what were the conditions of
3 dismissal. Did you have any kind of restitution?

4 MR. MYERS: There was a -- there was a
5 finance restitution that was agreed upon between my
6 attorney and the state. Basically, it was my
7 understanding that it was just to cover costs of the
8 investigations.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What was the cost?

10 MR. MYERS: It was -- gosh, I don't have
11 the number off the top of my head. I believe it was
12 \$40,000.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And it was paid in
14 full?

15 MR. MYERS: Yes, ma'am.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Granting the
17 dismissal?

18 MR. MYERS: Yes, ma'am, and the
19 subsequent removal from the -- (inaudible).

20 (Reporter clarification.)

21 MR. MYERS: Of the -- the word just
22 slipped out of my mind, but --

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The case.

24 MR. MYERS: -- when it was taken off my
25 record. Expunged. That's what I was thinking

1 about. It was expunged.

2 THE REPORTER: Thank you.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And then I do have
4 a question for Mr. Souza.

5 MR. SOUZA: Yes.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Talk to me about
7 your financial issues going on.

8 MR. SOUZA: Yeah. So back to moving here
9 in -- during the middle of COVID, I had three
10 businesses in Hawaii at the time before COVID. Life
11 was beautiful. I was in the restaurant, nightlife
12 industry. Hawaii was the last to open up in COVID,
13 especially our industry of restaurants and social
14 life. I believe, going back to the record, in the
15 middle of COVID, I had a couple of businesses that
16 didn't recover. I had a couple loans for the
17 businesses at that time.

18 Now, recovering after COVID, you know,
19 credit report's, you know, 800 before COVID. Now is
20 back to, you know, 700, recovering. On my own
21 before all of this, you know, came about. But
22 looking good now. Everything is -- you know, three
23 years after, everything is looking up and heading in
24 the right direction.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Investigator

1 Cuevas, do we have documentation that everything
2 continues to be in good standing with these current
3 payments?

4 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes.

5 Investigator Cuevas for the record. Yes, the last I
6 checked was actually yesterday morning through
7 TransUnion again. Everything -- I mean, it still
8 shows on there because he's still in the process of
9 going through paying everything, but he's still with
10 the Beyond Finance through that credit resolution
11 program, and it's still in good standing.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Do we happen to
13 have the remaining balance?

14 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: I don't have the
15 remaining balance.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Souza, do you
17 happen to know your remaining balance?

18 MR. SOUZA: For those situations, I
19 believe it's half. I think I got six months left
20 through this third party that she was talking about.
21 Yeah, so almost there.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you
23 very much.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any further
25 questions from the Board?

1 Okay. Hearing there are no further
2 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I
4 move that Elite Protection Services Global, LLC, be
5 approved for a new corporate private patrol officers
6 license and that William J. Myers, his private
7 patrol officers license be approved, and that it be
8 placed in abeyance so that he may become the
9 Qualifying Agent. And members to be approved are
10 William Myers and Jonah Souza. Subject to all
11 statutory and regulatory requirements.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
13 motion. Do we have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Go ahead, Brown.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
17 Brown. I'll second.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion.
19 We have a second. All in favor say aye.

20 (All present Board members
21 voted aye.)

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Good
23 luck to you, gentlemen.

24 MR. MYERS: Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda item number

1 39, Shavers Protection Services. Do we have a
2 Garran Smith?

3 Oh, I'm sorry. I'm sorry. Actually, we
4 have 38. I skipped it. Sorry.

5 MR. BERCKART: Worried me for a minute.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sorry about that.

7 MR. BERCKART: Good morning again.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Just for
9 correction, is agenda item number 38,
10 Jason Berckart.

11 MR. BERCKART: Berckart.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Berckart. Okay. So
13 does anybody -- this is the same gentleman that was
14 with Redwood Private Investigating?

15 MR. BERCKART: Private Security.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Private Security.
17 Okay.

18 Are there any questions for Mr. Berckart?

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Sorry. Our camera
20 went blank for a minute. We were all stunned.

21 I don't believe we have any down here.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So do we have
23 any questions?

24 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
25 I'll entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
2 motioning to approve Mr. Jason R. Berckart for a new
3 private patrolman license subject to all statutory
4 and regulatory requirements.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
6 motion. Do we have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown
8 will second.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We
10 have a second. All in favor say aye.

11 (All present Board members
12 voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion
14 passes. Congratulations.

15 MR. BERCKART: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Now, Shavers
17 Protection Services. Good morning, gentlemen.

18 MR. SMITH: Good morning.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Gentlemen,
20 please tell us a -- could you please state your
21 names for the record and then tell us little bit
22 about yourselves.

23 MR. SMITH: I'm Garran Smith. This is
24 Jerrell Shavers.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And just to

1 confirm, no one's walked in; so you have been sworn
2 in?

3 MR. SMITH: Yes, yes.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Tell us a
5 little bit about yourself and the intentions of the
6 license.

7 MR. SMITH: I'm Garran Smith. I own and
8 operate Diligent Protection Group in California.
9 I've been in the security industry since I was 18.
10 I operate the business with my wife and my son here,
11 and we're looking to come here, to Nevada, and do
12 the same.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right.

14 MR. SHAVERS: My name's Jerrell Shavers.
15 As my stepdad mentioned, I help him with Diligent
16 Security. I spent four years in the United States
17 Marine Corps. After that, moved to Oklahoma, fell
18 in love with the country life. Unfortunately, my
19 stepdad here made me come back to help with
20 business, and now I'm trying to branch off myself
21 and come to Vegas.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you for
23 your service.

24 MR. SHAVERS: Thank you for your support.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are

1 there any questions for these gentlemen?

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
3 Member Cortez. I do have a couple questions.
4 First, let me ask -- Mr. Smith, talk to me about
5 your 2001 case.

6 MR. SMITH: The petty theft.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That's correct.

8 MR. SMITH: So it was shoplifting. I was
9 a kid, doing dumb things. I'm not sure if you are
10 familiar with Timberland shoes. They got the little
11 shoe tag on it.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Sure am.

13 MR. SMITH: And so I bought some shoes at
14 Burlington, but the shoes were ECCO shoes, and it
15 didn't come with a shoe tag. So when I went back
16 shopping, I saw that it was the same shoe, with the
17 same shoe tag. Me, not really thinking too much, I
18 just took it off the shoe. I purchased some other
19 items there, and I left the store.

20 Loss prevention came to me, and they
21 arrested me for shoplifting. I asked them how much
22 was the shoe tag so I could purchase it, and they
23 didn't have a price for it. So they arrested me for
24 shoplifting. I went to court. I pled guilty, paid
25 my fine, did my informal probation, and I expunged

1 my record.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So, Investigator
3 Blackmore, question regarding the background: I
4 just want to make sure I have the correct
5 background. So in the notes, you indicated that
6 when you spoke to Mr. Smith, he indicated that this
7 case was his brother and not him?

8 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Investigator
9 Blackmore for the record. So it's a 2001 burglary
10 that he stated was his brother. No documentation
11 has been provided for that just yet; however, he did
12 provide documentation for the 2002 petty theft that
13 was just discussed.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you for the
15 clarification. My apologies on that.

16 Mr. Smith, talk to me about the burglary
17 one.

18 MR. SMITH: Yeah. So my brother is now
19 deceased. But living in Fontana, it's not a big
20 city, obviously, and so from time to time, he did
21 use my name when he got arrested. And so that was
22 not the first time he used my name when he got
23 arrested. That just happened to be the one that, I
24 guess, slipped through the cracks. I never knew I
25 had a burglary charge on my record.

1 I've had, you know, several different
2 licenses in California, and none of them ever came
3 up until this background with -- here in Nevada. So
4 I went down to the police department. They couldn't
5 give me no information. As you see, I was 17. I
6 was in high school. So they didn't have any
7 information to provide for me at the time.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.
9 Mr. Shavers.

10 MR. SHAVERS: Yes, ma'am.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you fill out
12 your application?

13 MR. SHAVERS: My stepdad here helped me
14 out filling most of that application out. Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Court's
16 indulgence. Give me one second.

17 Okay. The reason why I'm asking is
18 because on your application you indicated that
19 you've never been convicted of a crime.

20 MR. SHAVERS: Correct.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And that you were
22 never -- that you weren't arrested, citations, or
23 orders to appear in court; however, your
24 fingerprints revealed an undisclosed 2019 arrest out
25 of California.

1 MR. SHAVERS: Yes, ma'am.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Those are
3 conflicting information. So you indicated that you
4 were never arrested; however, your fingerprints came
5 back with a positive hit on an arrest. Is there a
6 reason why you failed to disclose that?

7 MR. SHAVERS: So the circumstances of
8 that, it's a little tricky. 2019, I was stopped by
9 Border Patrol for suspicion of human trafficking and
10 transporting. I was released from them into CID and
11 NCIS custody because I was active duty at the time.
12 After NCIS and CID did their investigation, there
13 was nothing found that I did anything wrong;
14 however, since I was active duty at the time, they
15 did input my information into CODIS.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So you were
17 arrested and then released?

18 MR. SHAVERS: I was not arrested. I was
19 detained.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Were you detained?

21 MR. SHAVERS: I was detained. My vehicle
22 was searched. They found nothing. They let me go.
23 When I got back to base, I was stopped by CID and
24 NCIS and interviewed.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Madam
2 Chair, Executive Director Saladino for the record.
3 If I could just clarify some information that we
4 have found. When we see these conspiracy to enter,
5 transport, or harbor aliens, what we have found out
6 now is that typically the Border Patrol, or the
7 agency that is affecting that detainment or stop,
8 they will actually fingerprint individuals right
9 there at the scene, and that information goes in.

10 And then through the numerous backgrounds
11 that we've done for work card holders, we have found
12 out that it subsequently goes nowhere, and the
13 individuals are not provided any paperwork to appear
14 in court or anything. They just -- they get
15 fingerprinted right there at the time that they're
16 detained, and then that's it.

17 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: And then
18 Investigator Blackmore, just for the record too. I
19 have been in correspondence with Mr. Shavers. He
20 did try reaching out to the DA's office in San Diego
21 to see if there was anything. Nothing there. And
22 then he reached out to Department of Justice, and
23 they couldn't provide him anything as well either.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And none of this

1 showed up --

2 MR. SHAVERS: No, ma'am.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Your DD214 was --

4 MR. SHAVERS: I have an honorable
5 discharge.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
8 Brown. I have a question for Investigator Blackmore
9 regarding Mr. Smith. I want to make sure that I'm
10 understanding your notes. We've got the 2001
11 burglary and 2002 petty theft that were -- what I'm
12 trying to figure out is were they disclosed and was
13 the 2002 possession of a weapon at school disclosed
14 to you?

15 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Investigator
16 Blackmore for the record. I did get back with the
17 applicant. He did disclose those arrests.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Did you have
19 to go back to him to have him disclose, or did he
20 disclose them on his application initially?

21 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: So he disclosed
22 the petty theft on his application initially, but
23 just not the weapons one. He did provide me
24 paperwork that the DA weapons charge was a DA
25 denial.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. I believe
2 normally in these circumstances when they fail to
3 disclose something, we deny, and then they have to
4 come for an appeal. Isn't that correct?

5 (Discussion off the record.)

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Sorry. We had
7 somebody walk in.

8 Okay. I have an issue with that based on
9 what my understanding as to what we normally do. If
10 this would have been a failure to disclose and the
11 person would have been denied and then have to file
12 an appeal, is my understanding. Nothing further.

13 Well, actually, let's go ahead and move
14 forward.

15 Mr. Smith, could you explain the 2002
16 possession of a weapon at school to me.

17 MR. SMITH: So I lived next door to a
18 school growing up, and my friends were playing with
19 a BB gun and in a vehicle. I went outside to
20 retrieve a CD out of the vehicle. Someone from the
21 school, I'm assuming, called the police department,
22 and I happened to be in the vehicle retrieving that
23 CD when the police showed up.

24 So if I'm in the vehicle and when they
25 show up, the vehicle's mine, the BB gun is mine. So

1 I spent four -- Friday, Saturday, Sunday, Monday,
2 Tuesday. I spent five days in -- at the -- that's
3 county -- so county jail. They fingerprinted me.
4 They arrested me. I was in jail. 72 hours later --
5 in California, you know, 72-hour hold. They just
6 let me go, and I walked home.

7 I never went to court. Never got a fine.
8 Never saw a judge. No one ever contacted me.
9 Nothing. So there was, you know, nothing to
10 disclose until I had the background check, and then
11 it came back up. You know, I'm 42 years old. I'll
12 be 42 this year. This happened when I was 19; so I
13 didn't know about it.

14 So then when I went to the DA, they
15 obviously didn't want to press any charges 'cause
16 there was no charges to press. And that's when I
17 was able to get all the documentation that the
18 background investigator needed. They didn't want to
19 pursue anything forward because, like I said, there
20 was nothing to pursue.

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you,
22 sir.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: If we decided to
24 split this and deny half, based off of the
25 conversations that we've been having, what does that

1 look like for them?

2 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Executive
3 Director Saladino for the record. It depends on
4 which way you make your motion. The company can't
5 move forward without a Qualifying Agent. The
6 company can move forward without a corporate
7 officer. So it just depends on what the motion
8 would be.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then
10 what's the rule? Because I know we do it for work
11 cards. When someone doesn't disclose something,
12 they -- you know, they can come back in a year.
13 What's the rule for licenses?

14 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So in
15 regards to licensing, there is no mandatory wait
16 time. You know, they could possibly, you know,
17 reapply again for the next board meeting -- or,
18 actually, they would miss the September one just due
19 to deadlines, and they would have to come back in
20 December.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, do you
22 have any questions around that just based off the
23 questions that, you know, you asked? Board Member
24 Brown, I wanted to make sure that we have some
25 answers.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No. I had a
2 question. So I have a problem with the fact that,
3 you know, work card people have to wait a year, but
4 there's nothing that says the licensees have to wait
5 a year after their failure to disclose. That's just
6 kind (inaudible) for me, but I understand
7 everything. Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Based off the
9 information, are there any further questions for the
10 gentlemen?

11 Okay. Hearing there are no further
12 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
14 Brown. I move that we deny Shavers Protection
15 Services for a new corporate private patrol officer
16 license based on denying Garran A. Smith an
17 individual private patrol officer license, which he
18 wanted to place in abeyance so that he could become
19 the Qualifying Agent. And this is based off of
20 failure to disclose possession of a weapon in school
21 grounds.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
23 motion. Do we have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We

1 have a second. All in favor say aye.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Aye.

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Aye.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Aye.

5 All opposed.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Aye. No, no.

7 Opposing. Oh, wait. I'm in favor of the denial,
8 but in regards to the timeline, I would be okay if
9 they reapplied to make the December deadline based
10 on the licensing even though previous practice
11 requires a year.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So wait a
13 minute.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So those are two
15 different motions.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, it wasn't a
17 motion. It was a vote. So the vote is the denial
18 is what passed; right? The motion passes.

19 MR. DETMER: That was the pending motion,
20 yes.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So the motion passes.
22 We're denying your request for a license. Okay?

23 So, typically, what is -- if you're
24 applying for a regular work card as a security
25 officer, you're not allowed to reapply for one year,

1 and then you would come back. And then you would
2 have to disclose everything, and then you would be
3 able to apply. You would come back in front of the
4 Board, and then we would -- in general, we grant the
5 motion as long as there's no other things that have
6 come up; right?

7 MR. SMITH: Okay.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: For a work card -- or
9 for a licensee, that is not the standing; right?
10 That's not the rule. The rule is you can apply at
11 any time. So that's what she's saying on her side,
12 is that you can apply again, and you would -- based
13 on timelines, you'd be eligible to come before the
14 Board again in December.

15 MR. SMITH: Okay. So does that mean a
16 new application fee, or does it --

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That's my
18 understanding.

19 MR. SMITH: Do I submit another
20 application? Because it would be the same
21 information.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Correct.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, no, you have to
24 update the information to disclose everything.

25 MR. SMITH: To disclose everything, but

1 as far as everything else would be the same?

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So, Madam
4 Chair, Director Saladino for the record. Typically,
5 when we have folks that are reapplying for
6 licensure, instead of hitting them fully for the
7 entire licensing amount, what we'll do is like a
8 prorated amount. Since we already have the majority
9 of information vetted, we would just do like a
10 prorated -- take a deposit and then, you know,
11 update the information for the Board so there
12 wouldn't be the -- all the new fees or the original
13 fees all over again. It would be like a prorated
14 deposit and request.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

16 MR. SMITH: Do you know how much that is?

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Can we do that
18 offline, because as it stands right now, the motion
19 to deny your license has passed. I think contact
20 the licensing office.

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Stephanie
22 will work with you to get it situated.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. And they'll
24 work with you to get that taken care of. Okay?

25 MR. SMITH: Okay.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Good luck
2 to you.

3 MR. SMITH: Okay.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That was -- okay.
5 Sorry about that. Agenda item number 40, AG
6 Security Group, Inc. Good morning.

7 MR. CITRON: Good morning.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Let's see. This is
9 Aviv Citron.

10 MR. CITRON: Aviv.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Aviv Citron.

12 MR. CITRON: Close enough.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, please tell us a
14 little bit about yourself and the intentions with
15 the license.

16 MR. CITRON: So good morning all. I'm
17 the owner of the AG Security Group. We're based out
18 of New York. I'm the license holder for AG Security
19 Group in several other states. As the gentleman
20 said earlier, he's coming to Las Vegas because he's
21 got clientele coming out here, just like us. We
22 have clientele coming out here that we would like to
23 expand our relationship with or keep our
24 relationship, rather. So that's the idea, to come
25 out here and continue our operation as we have been

1 for the past eight years almost.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
3 there any questions for Mr. Aviv?

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
5 Brown. Sir, why did you fail to disclose the 2006
6 bankruptcy?

7 MR. CITRON: So I completely forgot about
8 it. It was 19 years ago. At that time I was out of
9 work, and I wasn't able to pay bills; so that's the
10 reason for the bankruptcy. However, I can say since
11 2006, I have zero debt. I learned from that there's
12 three people you don't upset: the IRS, the banks,
13 and your wife. So I've complied with all three of
14 those since, and my credit score has been in the 820
15 range since that time.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, sir.

17 MR. CITRON: Thank you.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
19 Member Cortez. Mr. Citron, did you fill out your
20 application on your own?

21 MR. CITRON: I did.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. The number 6
23 the question is your financial history and if you've
24 ever been a party to any civil action or lawsuit.
25 Is there a reason why you indicated that you were

1 not considering a bankruptcy as a civil lawsuit?

2 MR. CITRON: As I stated -- well, I
3 didn't -- to clarify that, I didn't know that that
4 qualified as a lawsuit. My understanding is a
5 lawsuit is I'm suing somebody or I'm being sued. I
6 didn't know until this minute -- until this moment,
7 rather, that that is a lawsuit. But as I stated, I
8 totally forgot about it as it was 19 years ago.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Because on
10 the actual application it says, "Please include
11 bankruptcy and tax liens as well."

12 MR. CITRON: Right. And you're a hundred
13 percent correct. The -- where I was confused is
14 there are other questions that specified ten-year
15 time frame, and this obviously exceeded ten years.
16 And like I said, at that time it did not dawn on me
17 to include that.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Just to
19 clarify, in question number 6, there mentions
20 nothing about time frames. Specifically, it says,
21 "Have you as an individual and officer of a
22 corporation been a party to any civil action or
23 lawsuit? Please include bankruptcies and tax
24 liens."

25 You indicated that you have not been

1 involved in either, just for clarification.

2 MR. CITRON: Understand. And my
3 apologies.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any further
5 questions?

6 Okay. Hearing there are no further
7 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I
9 move that AG Security Group be denied a corporate
10 private patrol officer license based on the fact
11 that he did not disclose bankruptcy as requested to
12 do so on the application.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
14 motion. Do we have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
16 I'll second.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
18 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

19 (All present Board members
20 voted aye.)

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I'm so sorry.
22 Unfortunately, because of the nondisclosure, just,
23 you know, like the gentleman before you, we have to
24 deny, but you are able to reapply, and you would
25 make the December meeting if you --

1 MR. CITRON: Okay. So just out of
2 curiosity, I am able to reapply today, or is that 24
3 hours? How does --

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: There's no timeline.

5 MR. CITRON: Okay. So, essentially, I
6 could start today and --

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That's my
8 understanding.

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Reach out
10 to Stephanie and --

11 MR. CITRON: Thank you, all. Be well.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

13 Agenda item number 41, Elite Business
14 LLCV. So we have Mr. Gary Vaughn.

15 MR. VAUGHN: Yes, ma'am.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And on the
17 agenda item we have Mr. Joshua Novak. He apparently
18 withdrew himself?

19 MR. VAUGHN: Yes.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then we
21 have Jonathan West; correct?

22 MR. WEST: Yes.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, gentlemen, tell
24 us a little bit about yourself and the intention
25 with the license.

1 MR. VAUGHN: My name is Gary Vaughn.
2 Good morning, everybody. I'm retired United States
3 Air Force Security Forces. Did 20 years. After I
4 retired, I took a DOD -- or a federal job going back
5 and actually instructing Security Forces members at
6 Nellis Air Force Base. I did that for three years.

7 And then I began contracting in 2013. I
8 went to Kuwait for a year. From Kuwait, I jumped
9 the contract to another company and worked from 2014
10 to 2017 -- or 2018 for CACI, installing security
11 around the Middle East and Africa.

12 Came back and actually did background
13 investigations for 11 months, and then COVID hit.
14 And then I just retired after that for a couple
15 years, and now we're looking to open up and try to
16 get this license and open up the security company.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Go ahead.

18 MR. WEST: Good morning. Jon West. I
19 moved here in 2001. Left for a couple years. Moved
20 back in 2005. Background in finance; so I'm kind of
21 operating as a financial partner and CFO for the
22 company, and then I have a lot of long-term
23 relationships here in Las Vegas. So I think I can
24 help generate some opportunity for the company.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are

1 there any questions for the gentlemen?

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
3 Brown. I have a question for Investigator Diaz. On
4 Mr. Vaughn's background it indicates there was a
5 bankruptcy in 2016 and a civil judgment in 2013.
6 Were those disclosed on his application?

7 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Investigator Diaz for
8 the record. So that is exactly what I was looking
9 at right now. I do have his application. It looks
10 like the bankruptcy was disclosed, but the civil
11 judgment was not.

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Mr. Vaughn,
13 in light of what you saw happen just a minute ago
14 with the person in front of you, why did you fail to
15 disclose the civil judgment out of North Las Vegas?

16 MR. VAUGHN: In 2002, we purchased a
17 house, and then in 2007, we had a child with special
18 needs that was born. We ended up doing a short sale
19 on the house just because it was going to cost too
20 much to make the adjustments to the house to benefit
21 my son.

22 So we -- it was 2008. You know, the
23 financial industry with the housing market and
24 everything else, we had taken a second mortgage with
25 a credit union. 2008, we -- all of this happened.

1 We -- we did a short sale, but at that time the
2 short sale required by law that you had to be 30
3 days late on payments. Our Realtor/lawyer at the
4 time told us, "Just stop paying."

5 So we did that. We did the short sale.
6 Short sales at that time were taking six months.
7 Our short sale for some reason with Bank of America
8 took three years. At the end of that -- we were
9 trying to avoid bankruptcy at all costs, but that
10 was our only option. We were never going to get out
11 from under that.

12 So we did a bankruptcy, and the second
13 mortgage was actually part of the bankruptcy. I
14 don't know why it shows up as a second charge on
15 there. We weren't -- that actually was included in
16 the bankruptcy with the credit union. I don't know
17 why it was -- showed up as a second. That's the
18 only reason I was unable to disclose anything,
19 because I was unaware that they put it down as a
20 second charge.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any further --

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you,
23 sir.

24 MR. VAUGHN: No problem.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any further

1 questions?

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
3 Member Cortez. Question for Investigator Diaz. Do
4 we have an update? I see that we have multiple
5 delinquencies. There's a little bit of -- I just
6 need clarification as far as the report goes. The
7 applicant's enrolled in a debt resolution agreement
8 where payments to the accounts were all stopped, but
9 then we have documentation that he is current on the
10 payments.

11 Could I get clarification on where we're
12 at with payments and the debt resolution agreement?

13 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes. So the debt
14 resolution agreement, essentially, makes him stop
15 all payments to all outstanding debts, combines
16 them, and then makes him have one payment for the
17 resolution to cover them all. That is currently
18 being paid. All of these delinquencies stem from
19 the debt resolution making him stopping all payments
20 on the debt. So that -- the paperwork just showed
21 that this is currently being taken care of, was
22 received and approved.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What is the
24 outstanding debt, the monetary outstanding debt?

25 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: I do not have the

1 outstanding debt, just the paperwork to show that
2 this -- the delinquencies and the overcredits are
3 essentially being taken care of. But I don't have
4 the paper for outstanding debt.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

6 Mr. Vaughn, do you happen to know how
7 much you're owing at this time?

8 MR. VAUGHN: I want to say -- because of
9 the way they've already paid off the majority of it,
10 I want to say the outstanding is 17,000.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

12 MR. VAUGHN: No problem.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any further
14 questions?

15 Okay. Hearing there are no further
16 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
18 Brown. Now that we know that Mr. Novak has
19 withdrawn, I move that we approve Elite Business
20 LLCV, a new corporate private patrol officer license
21 and we approve Gary Vaughn, an individual patrol
22 officer license, which he will place in abeyance so
23 he may become a Qualifying Agent. I also move that
24 we grant Gary Vaughn and Jonathan West member status
25 subject to the statutory and regulatory requirement.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member

2 Cortez. I'll second the motion.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
4 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

5 (All present Board members
6 voted aye.)

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion
8 passes. Congratulations, gentlemen.

9 MR. VAUGHN: Thank you.

10 MR. WEST: Thank you very much. You have
11 a good day.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The item
13 number 42, 1st Universal Security Management
14 Company, LLC, d/b/a. You must be Mr. Nicolosi.

15 MR. NICOLOSI: Nicolosi.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Up north, are
17 you good?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes, we're good.
19 I'm sorry. The gentleman waiting here moved. I
20 thought he was standing up. Sorry.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No problem.

22 Okay. So please tell us a little bit
23 about yourself and intention with the license.

24 MR. NICOLOSI: Good morning. Apologize
25 for the voice. I got -- it's been like this for a

1 couple of months. Can you hear me?

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah.

3 THE REPORTER: Yeah.

4 MR. NICOLOSI: Sorry. They tell me if I
5 squeeze my neck, you might be able to hear me
6 better, but I don't want to look like a puppet.
7 Anyway, I'm not trying to be Robert -- whatever his
8 name is -- Kennedy, Jr., either. So all right.

9 So my name's Tom Nicolosi. I'm a CFI out
10 here with Universal Security Management Company.
11 I'm the CEO and founder. Been doing that for a
12 while. I worked for the last two years -- I'm
13 little bit better -- approximately, two, almost
14 two and a half years as a commander for the RTC.
15 I'm currently with Inter-Con Security, who took the
16 contract over in July, July 1. They took that over
17 for Marksman Security.

18 I have already applied before. You've
19 probably seen that in the notes. There was a
20 current civil case going on where I'm the plaintiff
21 in the case. That case came to summary judgment.
22 At this time I'm making it my own personal decision
23 to let it go. I don't agree with the ruling in the
24 case, but it is what it is. At this point I've
25 wasted four years of valuable money and time.

1 I believe that I can bring a sense of
2 professionalism. I'm looking to hire a lot of
3 veterans, as I am a veteran myself. So I'm looking
4 to hire a lot of veterans, a lot of prior law
5 enforcement to bring a sense of professionalism to
6 the security industry that -- you know,
7 qualifying -- qualifying many, many, many people
8 over the course of the last few years, I've seen a
9 lot of different people come and go.

10 So -- and working as a commander, I see
11 that a lot of these younger generation that when
12 they come in, don't necessarily understand the laws
13 that govern them. And I think it's crucial that
14 they learn that. So I plan on bringing in a very
15 professional above-reproach security training team
16 as well as professionals that work security and
17 bring, like I said, a sense of professionalism back
18 to the industry.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
20 there any questions for Mr. Nicolosi?

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes. This is Board
22 Member Brown. Couple of questions for you, sir.

23 MR. NICOLOSI: Yes, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: It indicates on our
25 background report here that you did not report that

1 you were employed by the Clark County DA's Office.

2 Can you tell me why.

3 MR. NICOLOSI: It wasn't -- I wasn't
4 trying to conceal anything. What I was looking for
5 was to put down what was relevant to -- the way I
6 understood the application was they were looking for
7 relevancy to what I did in security. So that --
8 that was the only reason it wasn't put on there.

9 But I've had many discussions over the
10 course of my tenure out here working in security --
11 I'm sorry -- working as a CFI and stuff. There was
12 no reason to not disclose it. It was what I've done
13 for many, many years. I did private process
14 serving. And I had my own company back east many,
15 many, many years ago in New York City, doing the
16 same thing. And so there was nothing to not
17 disclose. It was just I felt that the application
18 was looking for relevancy, what did I do in security
19 out here looking for that as the background.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And then did
21 you serve in a branch of the military other than the
22 Marine Corps?

23 MR. NICOLOSI: No, sir.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. It's just
25 that in my understanding, in order to qualify as a

1 veteran, you have to serve three years. That's not
2 what we see here on the background. Just coming
3 from one veteran to, I guess, another.

4 MR. NICOLOSI: Okay. So according to --
5 I served during a wartime; so on the -- it literally
6 says it on my DD214. So I'm not trying to play like
7 I did something -- I never said I went across seas
8 or anything like that, but on my DD214 it classifies
9 me as a veteran. And that was supplied to the DMV
10 out here in Nevada, who has since put that on my
11 license. So, again, it's -- I'm not trying to play
12 trickery or deceit. It's what -- what your state
13 has classified it as.

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you,
15 sir.

16 MR. NICOLOSI: Yes, sir.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
18 there any further questions?

19 Okay. Hearing there are no further
20 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

21 Board's indulgence. Can I read -- or can
22 I ask one other question. On the PFI incident, has
23 that been resolved? Because it doesn't look like it
24 is.

25 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Investigator

1 Swarthout for the record. There was the status
2 check on February 21st. It was closed out then
3 because PFI had to file that order in court.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So that is
5 closed and resolved?

6 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yeah.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Got you.

8 Okay. So if there's, again, no further
9 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
11 Brown. I move that we grant 1st Universal Security
12 Management Company, LLC d/b/a Universal Security
13 Management Company a new corporate private patrol
14 officer license and that we grant Thomas A.
15 Nicolosi -- I said that right hopefully -- an
16 individual private patrol officer license that will
17 be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
18 Qualifying Agent. Also, I move that we grant Thomas
19 A. Nicolosi -- Nicolosi -- I'm sorry -- member
20 status subject to statutory and regulatory
21 requirements.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
23 motion. Do we have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
25 Member Cortez. I'll second the motion.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
2 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

3 (All present Board members
4 voted aye.)

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
6 Good luck to you. Congratulations.

7 MR. NICOLOSI: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We'll do this
9 last one for licensure, and then we will take a
10 quick break. This is for reposessor,
11 Jimmy Thacker. Mr. Thacker, are you here?

12 Thank you. Okay. Mr. Thacker, please
13 tell us a little bit about yourself and the
14 intentions of the license.

15 MR. DETMER: And, Chair, I apologize for
16 the interruption. Mike Detmer for the record.

17 Sir, were you sworn in? Did you come in
18 earlier? I apologize.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh, okay. No.

20 MR. THACKER: Yeah, I was in the corner
21 back there.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: There's just
23 movement. People are -- they just move. Thank you.

24 I'm sorry. Go ahead.

25 MR. THACKER: That's okay.

1 I work for Camping Companies. I'm the
2 Nevada operations manager. I've been there for over
3 17 years. The current Qualifying Agent is going to
4 be retiring in a few years, and they thought I would
5 be a good fit to apply.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
7 there any questions for Mr. Thacker?

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
9 Member Cortez. Good morning, Mr. Thacker.

10 MR. THACKER: Good morning.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: You filled out your
12 application on your own?

13 MR. THACKER: I had some help from the
14 owners of the company.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Same
16 question for you -- Board's indulgence. Give me one
17 second.

18 Okay. So on your application, in
19 question 6 for your financial history, you indicated
20 that you were not involved in any kind of civil
21 action or lawsuit, to include bankruptcies and tax
22 liens, and yet we do have a disclosed bankruptcy.
23 Is there a reason why you checked "no"?

24 MR. THACKER: Honestly, it's been so long
25 ago, I didn't -- I thought bankruptcies kind of fell

1 off in seven years. I have listed it in the past.
2 I just forgot this time. Like I did an application
3 before and listed it, and I honestly -- it just
4 slipped my mind. I wasn't trying to hide it or
5 anything. It was like 20 years ago.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. But you
7 indicated that you have listed your bankruptcy prior
8 to, but in this application you chose not to?

9 MR. THACKER: Right. It just slipped my
10 mind honestly.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Understood.
12 Thank you.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Thacker, this is
14 Board Member Brown. If you're approved, you're
15 going to become the Qualifying Agent. You stated
16 that the current Qualifying Agent is going to retire
17 in the future. Is he going to take a different role
18 in the company if you become a Qualifying Agent?

19 MR. THACKER: No.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: He's going to remain
21 the Qualifying Agent and you'll be the Qualifying
22 Agent also?

23 MR. THACKER: No. He's going to retire
24 completely. He -- he doesn't want to be the agent
25 anymore.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. It's just the
2 way that you said that, I felt that it was going to
3 be further down the road in the future. I just want
4 to make --

5 MR. THACKER: I was told he's going to be
6 leaving in a couple years.

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: He'll be retiring in
8 a couple years?

9 MR. THACKER: Correct.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: So he will remain
11 the Qualifying Agent for those two years?

12 MR. THACKER: If I get approved, I think
13 they're going to go ahead and remove him.

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Executive
15 Director Saladino, can we have -- they would have to
16 remove the other Qualifying Agent if Mr. Thacker is
17 approved; correct?

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: That would
19 be correct.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you,
21 sir.

22 MR. THACKER: Yeah.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any further
24 questions from the Board?

25 Okay. Hearing there are no further

1 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I
3 move that we deny Jimmy Thacker for an individual
4 reposessor license based on the fact that he failed
5 to disclose his bankruptcy.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
7 motion. Do we have a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll
9 second.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
11 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

12 (All present Board members
13 voted aye.)

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
15 Unfortunately, sir, just like the others,
16 you can reapply almost immediately, but you do have
17 to disclose all the information on everything.

18 MR. THACKER: Understood.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Good luck
20 to you.

21 Okay. At this point we're going to take
22 a quick break, and then we'll swear everybody in if
23 you haven't been sworn in previously. So let's
24 say -- it's 10:30 right now. Can we do -- 10:45
25 we'll be back. Thank you.

1 (Recess taken from
2 10:30 a.m. to 10:45 a.m.)

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do we need -- we need
4 to swear in the -- before we do that, I did want to
5 go back to agenda item number 34. 34.

6 Okay. So I got an update from Executive
7 Director. The gentleman from Crisis Protection
8 Solutions, Incorporated, Mr. Brian Leek, last
9 session we did not have his fingerprints. We did
10 vote to have a contingent approval based off of his
11 fingerprints. My understanding is they came back
12 negative.

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Correct.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: However, he did list
15 a --

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Weapons
17 charge.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- a weapons charge.
19 Do we have the date on that weapons charge?

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO:
21 Investigator Cuevas, she does.

22 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Investigator
23 Cuevas for the record. So it was an arrest from
24 July 17, 2020, for a concealed weapon in Miami,
25 Florida. The case was dismissed. We have court

1 documents to confirm the arrest and the dismissal,
2 and the fingerprint report is negative. So it
3 doesn't even list it on the fingerprint report.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So Mr. Leek is
5 not here. He's listed down for approval for
6 corporate officer status. He is not based out of
7 Nevada, but I think originally it was a part of the
8 potential block vote last time. Right?

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I believe
10 so.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So I don't
12 know if we want to make a motion based off of that
13 information, but we have not been able to contact
14 Mr. Leek at this point -- today, I mean.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
16 Brown for the record. Question for Mr. Detmer: Can
17 we -- since we had a -- we stated that we were going
18 to approve it based on fingerprints, if they came
19 back negative. Can we do that without the future
20 licensee present?

21 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer for the record.
22 I'd have to consult or at least get a confirmation
23 from the Executive Director as to whether or not
24 there is a specific statutory provision that
25 requires their presence, but I do believe -- I would

1 assume that the Board can waive that. And if that's
2 what the Board did at the last meeting by inherently
3 saying, "We're going to do the approval contingent
4 on fingerprints," and the fingerprints are back,
5 then it seems like it was set up for this. But I
6 may be mistaken as far as how that record was made.

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you.

8 (Discussion off the record.)

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And if I could, just
10 to be clear, he's not a license holder. He's a
11 corporate officer status.

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Oh, sorry.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And I don't know that
14 that makes a difference, but I just wanted to make
15 sure.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. In light of
17 that -- this is Board Member Brown -- I move that we
18 grant Crisis24 Protection Solutions, Incorporated,
19 license number 4198, corporate officer status for
20 Brian M. Leek subject to statutory and regulatory
21 requirements.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
23 motion. Do we have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
25 Member Cortez. I'll second the motion.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
2 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

3 (All present Board members
4 voted aye.)

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion
6 passes. We can notify Mr. Leek.

7 Okay. So now, Counsel Detmer, if you
8 will swear in our witnesses.

9 MR. DETMER: Yes, sure. It would be my
10 pleasure.

11 Mike Detmer for the record. For those of
12 you that were not here in the morning and you were
13 not sworn in but you're here now, I need to swear
14 you in, please. If you could please stand up and
15 raise your right hand.

16
17 AUDIENCE MEMBERS,
18 having been duly sworn,
19 testified as follows:

20
21 MR. DETMER: Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. You can have a
23 seat, sir.

24 MR. SUMRALL: I think I'm next.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh, you're next?

1 Then come on up.

2 MR. SUMRALL: These knees would rather
3 just not --

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Understand.
5 Investigator Cuevas, can you tell us why
6 we're here for agenda item 44, Mr. Michael --

7 MR. SUMRALL: Oh, no. I thought 45 was
8 next, first on the agenda. My apologies.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sorry for your
10 knees, but --

11 MR. SUMRALL: No worries.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the next
13 item is agenda item number 44, Michael Napoles.

14 Good morning, sir.

15 MR. NAPOLES: Good morning.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Cuevas,
17 could you please tell us why we're here for
18 Mr. Napoles.

19 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Investigator
20 Cuevas for the record. The applicant was denied for
21 his disclosed weapon conviction. He was previously
22 denied by the Board in June 2023. He is back
23 reapplying. He has disclosed all arrests and was
24 not made provisional due to listing his arrests. He
25 does wish to appeal today.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
2 questions for Mr. -- can you pronounce that.

3 MR. NAPOLES: Napoles.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Napoles. Thank you.
5 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
6 I'll entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
8 motioning to approve Mr. Michael Napoles -- or
9 overturning the denial based on full disclosure and
10 coming back, doing exactly what we asked.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So motion. Do
12 we have a second?

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
14 I'll second.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We
16 have a second. All in favor say aye.

17 (All present Board members
18 voted aye.)

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations, sir.
20 Thank you for coming back. Your work card will be
21 approved.

22 MR. NAPOLES: Okay. At this point do I
23 go back?

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, you can leave.
25 You can contact the office tomorrow, or they'll

1 contact you tomorrow.

2 MR. NAPOLES: In Carson City or --

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, no. Here.

4 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: I'll contact you
5 tomorrow for your card.

6 MR. NAPOLES: Oh, do you need this?

7 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: No, you can keep
8 it.

9 MR. NAPOLES: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

11 Okay. Agenda item number 45,

12 Joseph Sumrall.

13 MR. SUMRALL: Sumrall.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sumrall. Okay. Now
15 you're up.

16 MR. SUMRALL: Sorry for the confusion.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No worries.

18 Investigator Cuevas, can you tell us why
19 we're here for Mr. Sumrall.

20 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Investigator
21 Cuevas for the record. The applicant was denied for
22 an undisclosed felony conviction from 1976 in Idaho.
23 He was made provisional, but not added to a company
24 roster. He states that he did not remember the
25 arrest, which is why it was not disclosed. It looks

1 like it might have been possibly just a citation
2 because all he had to do was pay a fine and court
3 costs. And then he's here to appeal.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
5 questions for Mr. Sumrall?

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
7 Member Cortez. Mr. Sumrall, I just want to confirm,
8 per investigator's information, you failed to
9 disclose because you forgot about it?

10 MR. SUMRALL: Apparently, much like many
11 of the other applicants, yeah, forgetting is the key
12 component here. It was 1976. I'm 68. Yeah, I
13 didn't remember it. I finally did get the
14 information from Washington County, first, and just
15 recently, too, because it supposedly went through
16 the Third Court in Caldwell. That didn't -- they
17 didn't have the information. They had to dig it out
18 of a basement because it's in paper box like Raiders
19 of the Lost Ark or something.

20 And when I finally did get it from the
21 Washington County courthouse, it stated exactly
22 basically what she said, that it was withheld
23 judgment. I paid \$150 in court costs, apparently.
24 My friend back in the day, Alan Woods, was also
25 involved. I still don't remember it. It was just

1 too long ago and too much water has been under that
2 bridge frankly.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So can I ask. Is
4 this the very felony conviction that -- convicted,
5 but it was just a fine?

6 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yeah. And I think,
7 honestly, it's because of how long ago. I mean, the
8 severity does change over years. A prime example is
9 it's like with marijuana used to be felonies; now
10 they're misdemeanors. So I feel like that's because
11 of how long ago it is. 1976, for consume -- or
12 possessed controlled substance, back then it was
13 very like against drugs and that was the motive back
14 then. So I believe that's why the level was felony
15 for the severity, but, again, yeah, it looks like he
16 just paid the court costs.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Sumrall --
18 Board Member Cortez for the record -- what was the
19 controlled substance?

20 MR. SUMRALL: So it was -- according to
21 the file, it was a baggy -- it was not like --

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: A baggy of what?

23 MR. SUMRALL: Oh, I'm sorry. I'm
24 getting -- marijuana.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood.

1 MR. SUMRALL: And, yeah, it was a baggy
2 of marijuana.

3 And just if I may, I don't know if it
4 matters, because the full disclosure seems to be
5 more the problem than perhaps what I did, at least
6 at this level. Yeah, I don't even know if this is
7 appropriate, but I've been sober for 35 years and
8 drug free. And it's -- actually, a fair portion of
9 my life is still based around that. I sat on the
10 board for a recovery house. I'm still part of a
11 regular group. It was a different time and
12 different part of my life.

13 And what I hope to give back now still
14 is -- the guard card for me -- I live in Washington
15 State. This isn't even something I want to practice
16 on a regular basis here in the state of Nevada. I
17 volunteer to do these services at a couple of
18 festivals in my own area as somebody who can be --
19 sort of carry this particular, if I will, vibe at a
20 place like that and in the midst of people who are,
21 you know, on the other side of that line still and
22 bring security in a way that sort of has a humane
23 restraint component to it with an understanding of
24 what they're going through and, you know, how they
25 can affect themselves and others.

1 And this thing with Nevada is something I
2 was offered to do last year. I came down and did a
3 festival here in the state under the provisional
4 card. Frankly, very much enjoyed the experience and
5 what was able to be provided there and would very
6 much like to do it again.

7 Actually, it cost me more to do it than I
8 make from the work of this. I'm still a full-time
9 building inspector for the state of Washington
10 and --

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So just to
12 actually -- so it sounds like you're kind of like a
13 security therapist? I mean, that's --

14 MR. SUMRALL: No, fair enough. Fair
15 enough.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Kind of.

17 MR. SUMRALL: So -- well, it's funny
18 because what you said sort of ties into a way that
19 we think about it when we do this: This method of
20 humane restraint in face of somebody who's really
21 potentially causing problems to others and
22 definitively to themselves in some way. Has a
23 component of takedown, and then we use a thing that
24 they call a burrito. It's basically a full-body
25 canvas restraint, but it's for the whole body. So

1 you wrap them up in it completely, and what we say
2 is it's like swaddling a baby. It's like -- it's
3 like it's the best color you're going to get the
4 entire festival.

5 And then we take them to meds -- to the
6 medical facilities to get some help. So, yeah,
7 there is a component of that for sure. And we get
8 training about how to interact and how to
9 de-escalate and --

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are you working with
11 a specific company that's doing this?

12 MR. SUMRALL: For here in Nevada, it's
13 Black Rock.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right.
15 Very interesting.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Investigator
17 Cuevas, I do have -- say this was a misdemeanor in
18 today's day and age. How would this work as far as
19 his application?

20 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: He would have been
21 issued the work card.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank
23 you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
25 other questions?

1 MR. SUMRALL: Sorry. I didn't address
2 anybody over here as well.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That's okay.
4 Okay. Hearing there are no other
5 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So this is Board
7 Member Cortez. I'm going to motion to overturn the
8 denial and grant Mr. Sumrall his work card based on
9 the information that we heard today from the
10 investigator. This is a charge that under today's
11 law, even within the last couple years, it would be
12 a misdemeanor. This incident occurred well over 30
13 years ago, and as we heard, it was the controlled
14 substance of marijuana. And we're not discussing a
15 weapons charge. And that is my reasoning for the
16 overturning the denial.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion.
18 Do we have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We
21 have a second. All in favor say aye.

22 Aye.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Aye.

24 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Aye.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Opposed?

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Nay.

2 THE REPORTER: I'm sorry. Who was nay?

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Brown.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown,
5 nay.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So the motion passes.
7 You'll be granted your card. The office will
8 contact you.

9 You know, I think -- I've been in the
10 industry for 25 years, and I think that a lot of
11 what's happening is turning towards, you know, more
12 emotional-type support. So thank you for the
13 services that you're doing. We're seeing a change
14 in the industry to help the unhoused and mentally
15 ill, and so that is a big change. So very
16 interesting work. Thank you.

17 MR. SUMRALL: Thank you. It's actually a
18 very rewarding experience, and I'm glad to be able
19 to continue. Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Good luck
21 to you.

22 Okay. Agenda item number 46.

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 46 and 47
24 are postponed.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Just to be

1 clear, agenda item number 46 and 47 have postponed?

2 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Correct.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then

4 agenda item number 48, Elijah Richardson.

5 Mr. Richardson, are you here?

6 Okay. We'll trail. Agenda item number

7 49, Samikey Dukes. Mr. Dukes? Mrs. Dukes?

8 Okay. We'll trail.

9 Agenda item number 50, Sean Stockwell.

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Withdrew.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda item

12 number 51.

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Postponed.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You know what? Let

15 me look at this other agenda.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you say

17 postponed?

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Hang on, guys. I'm

19 pulling out the other agenda.

20 Okay. Agenda item number 52,

21 Deanna Simmons. Good morning.

22 Okay. And Investigator Cuevas, could you

23 please tell us why we're here for Simmons.

24 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Give me just

25 a moment.

1 Okay. Yes. So Ms. Simmons was denied
2 for her undisclosed weapon conviction from 2005 out
3 of California. The applicant did list one arrest,
4 but it was a nondeniable offense; so she was issued
5 her provisional but not added to a company roster.
6 She does wish to appeal today.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any
8 questions for Ms. Simmons?

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
10 Member Cortez. Good morning, Ms. Simmons.

11 MS. SIMMONS: Good morning.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Why did you fail to
13 disclose your 2010 conviction and your 2005
14 conviction?

15 MS. SIMMONS: 2010, I don't --

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Insufficient funds.
17 You served 20 months of probation, 8 days in jail.

18 MS. SIMMONS: Yes.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Why did you fail to
20 disclose that?

21 MS. SIMMONS: I didn't think that it had
22 anything to do with this, and then by me having time
23 served, I didn't think I would have to apply for
24 reasons that they -- like seven to five years, you
25 know, that we wouldn't have to put that on the

1 application; so that's why.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. For your
3 2005 conviction -- or the assault with deadly
4 weapon, why did you fail to disclose that one?

5 MS. SIMMONS: That one, too, because I
6 thought it was closed case, the time served, or
7 whatever. And then they dropped it; so I didn't
8 think that I have to put that on the application of
9 the time period frame.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Did you fill
11 out your application on your own?

12 MS. SIMMONS: Yes.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Did you read
14 it carefully?

15 MS. SIMMONS: Not quite.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Because
17 there is a specific page that it's a big stop sign
18 that says you need to list all of your criminal
19 history regardless of the time frame or whether it
20 was expunged, closed case, dismissal, whatnot.

21 MS. SIMMONS: So that's --

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No further
23 questions.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any further
25 questions?

1 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
2 I'll entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
4 motioning to uphold the denial for Ms. Simmons based
5 off a failure to disclose all of criminal history.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
7 motion. Do we have a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
9 I'll second.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
11 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

12 (All present Board members
13 voted aye.)

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, unfortunately,
15 because you did not disclose all that information --
16 on the application it very clearly states any, at
17 any time, any arrest, convictions for any time. It
18 doesn't do just the ten years or the seven years.
19 So you do have the ability to reapply in one year,
20 and then just make sure you disclose everything.
21 You tell us everything that's happened, and then
22 we'll -- you'll come before us again. Okay?

23 MS. SIMMONS: Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Good luck
25 to you.

1 Okay. Agenda item number 53, Ryan King.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: He's here with us.

3 Just so we can have you on camera.

4 MR. KING: Not a problem.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator

6 Blackmore, could you tell us why we're here for

7 Mr. King.

8 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. So

9 Mr. King was denied his work card due to a failure

10 to disclose a 2001 exhibit deadly weapon, not

11 firearm. He was convicted. He did three years

12 probation, 30 days jail, a fine and a work program.

13 He was made provisional and added to Securitas

14 Security Services's roster. Applicant wishes to

15 appeal here today.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any

17 questions for Mr. King?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member

19 Brown. Mr. King, why did you fail to disclose your

20 deadly weapon?

21 MR. KING: It wasn't deadly. It was a

22 fire -- weapon other than a firearm.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

24 MR. KING: It was at -- honestly, I

25 forgot about it because it was 24 years ago at that

1 point. The other thing was was I pleaded no contest
2 and did not get told at the time that that was
3 actually a conviction; so I did not see it as a
4 conviction until I was notified now.

5 I've done executive security. I've done
6 nightclubs. I've done overseas security. None of
7 it has ever brought it up. I'm also a trained RSO.
8 Until now it's never been an issue.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Well, we've got a
10 very good investigator, sir.

11 MR. KING: No, I understand that.

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: But as Board Member
13 Cortez said earlier, there's a -- in the application
14 there's a page that says, "Stop. List any and all
15 arrests." Not just convictions, any --

16 MR. KING: I did not see that.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: -- regardless of
18 status, how it was disposed of, or anything like
19 that, you got to list them all.

20 MR. KING: That, I did not read clearly.
21 I took it as convictions.

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any further
24 questions for Mr. King?

25 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,

1 I'll entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
3 Member Cortez motioning to uphold the denial based
4 on failure to disclose criminal history.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
6 motion. Do we have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
8 I'll second.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion.
10 We have a second. All in favor say aye.

11 (All present Board members
12 voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, sir, just like I
14 told the lady previously -- the young lady
15 previously, if -- you have to disclose everything.
16 Unfortunately, at this point you did not. You have
17 an opportunity to come back in one year and reapply.
18 If you have any questions, please contact the Board.
19 They will -- or the office. They will help you
20 through the application.

21 MR. KING: It's just one simple question:
22 Is it from the time you pulled the license, or is it
23 from now?

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I believe from now.
25 Right?

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: No, it's
2 from when we denied.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: From when they denied
4 it.

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Oh, no, no.
6 I'm sorry. From now he can reapply a year now
7 into -- yeah.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Was that clear as
9 mud?

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Year from now. Year
11 from today.

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: He can
13 reapply in March of '26.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sorry. Thank you.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Do you still do the
16 work?

17 MR. KING: Yes.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Here in Nevada?

19 MR. KING: In -- (inaudible).

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yeah. Okay. Thank
21 you. Have a good day.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It sounds like he's
23 still working in Nevada. We'll follow up on that.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN. Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda item number

1 54, Treyve'onne Williams.

2 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: So they're
3 actually part of the 11:30 block.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh, okay. So we have
5 two gentlemen here. What number are you, sir?

6 MR. BEASLEY: I'm 62.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 62. And you were
8 sworn in already?

9 MR. BEASLEY: Yes.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: When?

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: He was sworn in in
12 the morning.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: In the morning.
14 Okay.

15 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: He was here.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Do you want to
17 come up?

18 We'll get you next, sir.

19 MR. VERONA: I thought this was for
20 11:30.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yep. We'll get you
22 next, sir. Okay?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: We have number 63 up
24 in the north, Madam Chair.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: And he has not been
2 sworn in.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we've got two down
4 here, and then we'll grab him next.

5 What number were you, sir?

6 MR. BEASLEY: 62.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 62. Okay. Mr. -- so
8 we skipped, because there are in the audience, to
9 agenda item number 62, Dexter Beasley.

10 MR. BEASLEY: Yes.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Diaz,
12 could you please tell us why we're here for
13 Mr. Beasley.

14 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: The applicant was
15 denied for failure to disclose criminal history.
16 The applicant was denied for a misdemeanor
17 shoplifting conviction out of Los Angeles,
18 California in 1986. He was sentenced to 24 months
19 probation. The applicant also has a 1976
20 misdemeanor conviction for burglary and was
21 sentenced to 18 months probation. This arrest was
22 not disclosed.

23 He has a DUI in 2012 and was sentenced to
24 90 days suspended jail sentence. This arrest was
25 disclosed. And a 1995 arrest for use/under the

1 influence of PCP. There was no disposition on the
2 fingerprint report, and this arrest was disclosed.

3 The applicant did disclose an assault and
4 battery arrest on his application, and when the
5 investigator initially contacted the applicant
6 regarding the arrest history, the applicant stated
7 he was a victim of the crime and did not commit the
8 crime. The investigator did ask if there were other
9 arrests, and the applicant stated there was not.

10 The applicant was not made -- or the
11 applicant was made provisional because of this
12 investigation. Upon receiving the fingerprint
13 report and the other convictions were discovered,
14 the applicant was denied. He is here to appeal
15 today.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

17 Board, any questions for Mr. Beasley?

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
19 Member Cortez. I have a question for
20 Investigator Diaz. Which case was he supposedly a
21 victim and didn't commit the crime for?

22 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: So the applicant
23 listed an assault and battery. He listed it in
24 Los Angeles, California, and -- but it was 40 years
25 ago. He stated that he was a victim of this crime

1 but wanted to list it in case we did run him and
2 anything flagged with his name. Because of this and
3 because my investigation could not find anything
4 with an assault and battery, I did opt to believe
5 him that he was a victim of this crime.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So it was neither
7 the 1986 or the '76 case; correct?

8 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Correct.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

10 Mr. Beasley, why did you fail to disclose
11 the shoplifting and the burglary charge, both of
12 which you did probation for?

13 MR. BEASLEY: On the application it asked
14 me do I have any felonies, and I couldn't remember
15 38 years back, and I couldn't afford to -- you know,
16 to order, to get the paperwork. So I put on my
17 application that I'm -- I have a felony, just to be
18 on the safe side. Because I couldn't remember back.
19 I couldn't get the information. And when I spoke to
20 Diaz on the phone, I was -- I said, "I was hoping
21 that you would find this out for me, because I don't
22 remember. It was so far back."

23 And that's why I put on there I have a
24 felony. I don't have any felonies. I also told
25 Mr. Diaz that Nevada -- state of Nevada allowed me

1 to purchase guns. So I own firearms, but I don't
2 know -- you know, the question or criteria of your
3 approval may be different. So I didn't know -- I
4 said I might not have any felonies because -- but I
5 wasn't trying to withhold any information. I just
6 didn't remember, and I did let him know that I was
7 approved to purchase arms. So I guess I'm a good
8 guy, you know.

9 So -- but he said if -- so I was
10 afraid -- he said, "Are you -- so you can't remember
11 that far back?"

12 So I was afraid when he said that that I
13 might incriminate myself by not having any detailed
14 answers. And I couldn't remember that far back; so
15 I tried. So I still incriminated myself because I
16 couldn't explain it in detail.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So hang on.

18 Mr. Diaz, or Investigator Diaz, did he
19 put on there that he might have felonies on his
20 background or on his application?

21 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: I have his
22 application right here. He circled "yes" for a
23 felony conviction, "yes" for a crime involving a
24 dangerous weapon, and "yes" for any kind of criminal
25 citations or indictments. And then after that, he

1 put the assault and battery, DUI, and then under the
2 influence of a controlled substance. And that is
3 his full criminal history that he listed.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So, Mr. Beasley, I
5 want to follow up with what you indicated. You said
6 that you weren't sure about your felonies and that
7 only -- according to you, your understanding was to
8 list your felonies on your application. Is that
9 what you said?

10 MR. BEASLEY: To the best of my memory,
11 yes.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So the
13 reason why I'm asking you that is because you listed
14 the 2012 DUI, which is a misdemeanor. And just for
15 clarification -- and I'm going to show it to you
16 just so you see what I'm reading.

17 This is online. Okay? So this is part
18 of the application, and it says the arrest
19 disclosure. It mentions nothing about what kind of
20 charge you received. In fact, it indicates that if
21 you were -- if you've ever been arrested, had any
22 criminal citations, indictments, and/or orders to
23 appear in court.

24 You were ordered probation on two
25 different cases, is -- which is the ones that I was

1 asking you about. So that tells me that you did
2 appear in court. That was why I'd asked you why you
3 failed to disclose those two cases. I understand
4 they were a very long time ago, but we have
5 conflicting information based on your testimony.
6 You said felony, but you listed a misdemeanor. Both
7 of which, the two cases that you failed to list,
8 were also misdemeanors.

9 Does that make sense?

10 MR. BEASLEY: Yeah, it makes sense, but I
11 didn't want to say I didn't have felonies and if I
12 did; so --

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So they weren't --
14 and, again, I want to make sure that you
15 understand --

16 MR. BEASLEY: Right.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- in the event
18 that you have to reapply, doesn't matter what kind
19 of charge it is, whether it's a misdemeanor or a
20 felony. You have to list all of your criminal
21 history. And regardless of the fact if it's
22 dismissed under California PC Code, if you were
23 arrested and you appeared in court, that has to get
24 listed on the application. Okay?

25 MR. BEASLEY: Okay.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board indulgence.

2 Can I ask a quick question?

3 (Discussion off the record.)

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, Board, I was
5 asking why we would move forward if he listed that
6 he had felonies. And so that the timeline is
7 understood, he then called them and talked --
8 Investigator Diaz talked to him about the felonies
9 that he had circled versus giving him provisional
10 right away. After that, then he issued out the
11 provisional because he stated that he was a victim
12 of those felonies. Okay. I understand a little bit
13 better now.

14 Okay. Are there any other further
15 questions for Mr. Beasley?

16 Okay. Hearing there are no further
17 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
19 Member Cortez motioning to uphold the denial based
20 on the failure to disclose the full criminal
21 history.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
23 motion. Do we have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
25 I'll second.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion.

2 We have a second. All in favor say aye.

3 (All present Board members

4 voted aye.)

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, unfortunately,
6 because you did not note everything that had
7 happened to you in your past on the paperwork, at
8 this time we're denying your work card. Okay? You
9 do have an opportunity to come back in one year from
10 today and reapply. Please, you have your record
11 now. So you can take it and write it all down, and
12 then you'll be good to go. You'll go through the
13 process again. Okay?

14 MR. BEASLEY: I don't have the record.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: They can get that for
16 you. So talk to the office, and they'll help you
17 fill out the application.

18 MR. BEASLEY: The office here?

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The office for the
20 licensing.

21 MR. BEASLEY: Oh, where I put the
22 application in?

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir. Yep,
24 they'll help you. Okay?

25 MR. BEASLEY: Okay. All right.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: They have it all.

2 Thank you.

3 MR. BEASLEY: Thank you. Thank you.

4 Have a nice day.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You too.

6 Okay. I'm sorry, sir. What number were
7 you?

8 MR. VERONA: I don't know.

9 Giovanni Verona.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What's your name?

11 MR. VERONA: Giovanni Verona.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Were you sworn
13 in, sir?

14 MR. VERONA: Yeah, when he did it just
15 now.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Come on up
17 here.

18 Okay. Giovanni Verona. Okay. So we
19 have agenda item number 60. We skipped to that.
20 Giovanni Verona.

21 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT, could you please
22 tell us why we're here for Mr. Verona.

23 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant
24 was denied for a conviction of illegal use or
25 possession of a dangerous weapon, 2017, by

1 California, carrying a loaded firearm in a public
2 place. Was sentenced to 36 months probation. His
3 arrest was disclosed.

4 The applicant previously appeared before
5 the Board in the December 14th of 2023 board
6 meeting, and he is here to reapply. This time he
7 did disclose all of his arrests.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
9 there any questions for Mr. Verona?

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
11 Member Cortez. Mr. Verona, could you refresh my
12 memory as far as the 2017 carrying loaded weapon --
13 loaded firearm in public. Talk to me about that
14 case. What was it involving?

15 MR. VERONA: I had a gun.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Give me a little
17 bit more details please about the case.

18 MR. VERONA: Like going to jail? Are you
19 talking about like leading up to me getting arrested
20 that day?

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: There it is.

22 MR. VERONA: I was just at home. I had
23 already previously been shot at home. I was raised
24 in my neighborhood since I was a baby. My dad was
25 raised there. So it's always been -- after I got

1 shot, I did -- I did get a gun. I purchased a gun
2 off the streets. I carried the gun. I never used
3 the gun. I just only had it for protection. Like
4 when they got me with the gun --

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So when you say
6 "they," explain to me that situation. How did you
7 get arrested? What were the circumstances behind
8 the arrest?

9 MR. VERONA: They just pulled up and --
10 and jumped out the car, frisked me, and I had a gun
11 on me. Like I was just standing on the sidewalk. I
12 didn't get pulled over. I wasn't running. I was
13 just standing there. And the cop, the sheriff,
14 pulled up. He got out the car. He frisked me, and
15 I had a gun.

16 But since then, I've had my record
17 expunged. I did community stuff. I haven't been in
18 trouble since then really. I just take care of my
19 family. I moved out of Compton so I wouldn't have
20 those problems and my son wouldn't have those
21 problems.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And was probation
23 terminated positively?

24 MR. VERONA: What does that mean?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Like did you

1 complete all of the court --

2 MR. VERONA: Yes, I did everything I
3 needed to do. I paid all my fines. I did the
4 community service.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you so
6 much. And thank you for listing all of your
7 criminal history this round.

8 MR. VERONA: Yeah. The first time I
9 didn't know, and I still had the charges; so when
10 they told me that more than likely I would be
11 denied, I went back to California, had it expunged,
12 and then I waited a year. I reapplied, and I filled
13 it out completely.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you for all
16 that work. Yep.

17 Board, any further questions for
18 Mr. Verona?

19 Okay. No further questions. I'll
20 entertain a motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
22 motioning to overturn the denial and grant
23 Mr. Verona his work card based on the full
24 disclosure and doing exactly what we asked him to
25 do, to come back in a year and disclose all the

1 criminal history.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
3 motion. Do we have a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
5 I'll second.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We
7 have a second. All in favor say aye.

8 (All present Board members
9 voted aye.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion
11 passes. You'll go ahead and get your work card.
12 The office will contact you tomorrow. Okay?

13 MR. VERONA: Okay. Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations.
15 Have a nice day.

16 MR. VERONA: Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
18 few more people that have come in down south. I
19 think your gentleman up north -- was he sworn in?

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: He was not sworn in,
21 and he's number 63, Mr. Church.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we're going
23 to go ahead and do that again.

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Church, can you
25 stand up. You can stand up right where you're at.

1 They can see you on the camera.

2 MR. DETMER: So, Mr. Church and anybody
3 else that just walked into the room and has not
4 previously been sworn in, if you have not been sworn
5 in, please stand up and raise your right hand.

6

7 AUDIENCE MEMBERS,
8 having been duly sworn,
9 testified as follows:

10

11 MR. DETMER: Thank you.

12 MR. BROWN: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank
14 you.

15 Okay. And you said you're agenda item
16 number --

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: 63.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- 63. Okay. Good
19 morning, Mr. Church.

20 Investigator Diaz, could you tell us why
21 we're here for Mr. Church.

22 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes. The applicant
23 was denied for a felony theft conviction out of
24 Jackson County, Oregon, in 1994. The applicant was
25 sentenced to 18 months probation. He also has a

1 2001 misdemeanor conviction for a battery, domestic
2 violence and was sentenced to 180 days suspended
3 jail sentence. He also has a 2004 misdemeanor
4 driving under the influence of drugs conviction and
5 was sentenced to six months in jail and 200 hours of
6 community service. He also has a 2004 misdemeanor
7 battery, domestic violence conviction and was
8 sentenced to six months in jail and 100 hours of
9 community service.

10 He did disclose all arrests and was aware
11 he'd be denied and later submitted a written letter
12 of appeal. He was not made provisional and is here
13 to appeal today.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.
15 Board, are there any questions for
16 Mr. Church?

17 Okay. Seeing there are no questions,
18 I'll entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I
20 move that we grant the work card based on full
21 disclosure of arrest record.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
23 motion. Do we have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown.
25 I'll second.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
2 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

3 (All present Board members
4 voted aye.)

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations,
6 Mr. Church, and thank you for disclosing everything.
7 The office will contact you for next steps. Okay?

8 MR. CHURCH: Thank you for your time.
9 Thank you.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: You're welcome, sir.
11 Have a good day.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Have a good day.
13 Okay. And up north, did you have more
14 people, you said?

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, Madam Chair.
16 We're empty now.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we'll
18 start -- sir, what was your name or number?

19 MR. BOCZKO: Adam Boczko.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Boczko.

21 MR. BOCZKO: B-O-C-Z, as in zebra, -K-O.

22 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: 65.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Very
24 good.

25 Please come up, sir.

1 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: 65.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda item
3 number 65, Adam Boczko.

4 MR. BOCZKO: Boczko.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Investigator
6 Diaz, could you please tell us why we're here for
7 Mr. Boczko.

8 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: The applicant was
9 denied for a felony possession and assault with a
10 deadly weapon conviction out of California in 1996.
11 The applicant was sentenced to 12 years in prison.
12 The applicant also has a gross misdemeanor
13 conviction for a false ID to a specific peace
14 officer and was sentenced to 36 months probation.

15 He did disclose all arrests on his
16 application and submitted a written letter of appeal
17 at the time of applying. He was not made
18 provisional and is here to appeal today.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
20 questions for Mr. Boczko?

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
22 Member Cortez. Mr. Boczko, can you give me the
23 circumstances behind the 1996 case, possession of a
24 deadly weapon.

25 MR. BOCZKO: Possession of a deadly

1 weapon. I happened to be in the same car with like
2 a couple friends when I was younger, and I took the
3 blame for it.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What happened?
5 Tell me the story.

6 MR. BOCZKO: They seen a couple people
7 walking. They just opened -- you know, opened fire
8 and discharged a firearm, didn't hit nobody or
9 anything like that. And I took the blame for it.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Well --

11 MR. BOCZKO: I -- I was --

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: You took the blame
13 that somebody discharged the firearm --

14 MR. BOCZKO: Yes.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- towards the
16 home?

17 MR. BOCZKO: Towards the home, yes.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And was it
19 gang related by any chance or any affiliation with
20 any kind of gangs or tagging crews?

21 MR. BOCZKO: No.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Any relation to the
23 individuals in the dwelling?

24 MR. BOCZKO: No.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
2 further questions?

3 Okay. Hearing there are no further
4 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
6 Member Cortez motioning to overturn the denial and
7 grant Mr. Boczko his work card based on full
8 disclosure of criminal history.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
10 motion. Do we have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. Second.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
13 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

14 (All present Board members
15 voted aye.)

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.
17 Congratulations.

18 MR. BOCZKO: Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The office will
20 contact you for the next steps. Okay?

21 MR. BOCZKO: Okay. Thank you. Sounds
22 good. I appreciate you guys. Have a good day.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You too.

24 I don't know who came in next. You did.

25 MS. FERGUSON: Darlene Ferguson.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ferguson.

2 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: 55.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You guys are fast.

4 Okay. Please come up.

5 Okay. So now we're on agenda number 55,
6 Darlene Ferguson.

7 Investigator Blackmore, could you tell us
8 why we're here.

9 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes.

10 Investigator Blackmore for the record. So the
11 applicant disclosed on her application a 2010
12 assault. When her fingerprint report came back, it
13 turns out the charge was assault with deadly weapon,
14 not firearm. She did 24 months probation, 34 days
15 jail. Due to her application only saying assault,
16 we did issue out the provisional, but she was not
17 added to any roster.

18 Once we got the background check report
19 back, that's when we issued out the denial, and she
20 submitted an appeal to be here today.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
22 there any questions for Ms. Ferguson?

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
24 Member Cortez for the record. Ms. Ferguson, can you
25 give me the circumstances regarding the 2010 case,

1 the assault with a deadly weapon.

2 MS. FERGUSON: I was in a relationship,
3 and the assault was I was driving, and the vehicle
4 that I had, it was the assault and --

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So the vehicle was
6 considered the weapon?

7 MS. FERGUSON: Um-hum.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Understood.

9 MS. FERGUSON: Um-hum.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Was there injuries
11 to the other party?

12 MS. FERGUSON: No. No one went to the
13 hospital that day. And it was basically my
14 daughter's father who called in, and I ended up
15 going to jail. I did two weeks. Everything was
16 expunged. I've never been in trouble again. I
17 currently am employed in health care and just
18 looking to pull in extra money as a security
19 officer. That's it.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand.
21 Thank you.

22 MS. FERGUSON: No other trouble.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
24 other questions?

25 Okay. Hearing there are no other further

1 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
3 motioning to overturn the denial and grant
4 Ms. Ferguson her work card based on full disclosure
5 of criminal history.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
7 motion. Do we have a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion.
10 We have a second. All in favor say aye.

11 (All present Board members
12 voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations,
14 ma'am.

15 MS. FERGUSON: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The office will
17 contact you for next steps. Okay.

18 Sir? Oh, okay. Got you.

19 Okay. Now, you just came in. So
20 let's -- can we stop for a second. What was the
21 10:30 cutoff?

22 UNIDENTIFIED MALE: You guys do a
23 wonderful job.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

25 UNIDENTIFIED MALE: Have a wonderful day.

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: For the
2 10:30 block, we trailed items 48 and 49.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Where did we stop at
4 10:30?

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: At 53.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 53. Okay.

7 And we trailed items number 48 and 49.

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 48 and 49
9 in that block.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we're going
11 to go back and -- through our trailed items. We
12 have agenda item number 48, Elijah Richardson.

13 Okay. Still not in the audience.

14 Agenda item number 49, Samikey Dukes.

15 Okay. So neither are in the audience.

16 I'll entertain a motion. Again, just as
17 a reminder, they were supposed to be here at 10:30,
18 and it is now 11:30.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
20 motioning to uphold the denial based on no-call,
21 no-show. As indicated, they were advised to be here
22 by 10:30. It's now 11:30 a.m.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
24 motion. And now a second.

25 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We
2 have a second. All in favor say aye.

3 (All present Board members
4 voted aye.)

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So motion
6 passes.

7 Okay. So now we're on the 11:30 block --
8 or it was 11:00 block?

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 11:30.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 11:30. Okay.

11 Sir, you just walked in. What's your
12 agenda number?

13 MR. WHITE: Name is Troye White. I
14 believe I was scheduled for 11:30.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Yep, you're
16 right on time. So we'll have to swear you in.

17 MR. WHITE: You want me to come up?

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir. We'll
19 swear you in.

20 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer for the record.
21 Sir, if you could remain standing and raise your
22 right hand.

1 TROYE WHITE,
2 having been duly sworn,
3 testified as follows:

4
5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.
6 Okay. And, Investigator Blackmore --
7 You can have a seat, sir. Sorry.

8 MR. WHITE: Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator
10 Blackmore, why are we here for Mr. White?

11 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. So
12 Mr. White was denied for failure to disclose his
13 arrest history, including a weapons conviction. He
14 has a 2019 carry unloaded handgun in public out of
15 California. He did three years probation. He has a
16 1991, possess prohibited firearm in Oregon. That
17 charge was dismissed. And then he has a 1988
18 assault in the fourth degree charge. There was no
19 disposition for the fingerprinting report. As well
20 as a 1983 grand theft charge, as well as a burn
21 thing, not subject to arson charge. The grand theft
22 was dismissed. The burn thing was convicted, 30-day
23 confinement, 36 months probation.

24 He was made provisional, but not added to
25 a roster, and he wishes to appeal here today.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
2 questions for Mr. White?

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
4 for the record. Mr. White, why did you fail to
5 disclose any of your criminal history?

6 MR. WHITE: Basically, maybe that wasn't
7 on the applications that I applied for jobs for.
8 I'm not aware of having to file that, because I
9 would have easily done it. I would -- there's no
10 reason for me not to disclose anything that would
11 prohibit me from trying to obtain work.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you fill out
13 the application yourself -- this particular
14 application?

15 MR. WHITE: More than likely, yes.
16 Probably so. Well, no. You mean for -- for this
17 particular thing here?

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So you applied
19 for --

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do you know what this
21 is for?

22 MR. WHITE: Well, it was like I had
23 applied for security jobs, and so maybe they ran
24 background checks, like that. But there was no --

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Hang on a second,

1 sir. Do you know why you're here, what this is for?

2 MR. WHITE: I'm sorry. Yeah. Kind of.
3 Because I thought -- was this food handlers card or
4 something like that?

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, sir. So this is
6 for the state license to work as a security guard.
7 You applied for that.

8 MR. WHITE: Oh, okay. Okay. Yes, yes.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right.
10 And so you were denied because you didn't
11 disclose -- you did not tell us all of the arrests
12 and/or convictions that you have.

13 MR. WHITE: I see. I see.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so what
15 she's asking you now -- what she's asking is why did
16 you not disclose that information on this
17 application?

18 MR. WHITE: Probably because I didn't
19 realize that that was required of it, and that's
20 probably why that happened that way. Because, I
21 mean, you know, there's no reason for me to apply
22 for it if I was trying to hide or conceal anything.

23 So I do maintain my innocence. And the
24 allegations with the firearm and everything, the
25 firearm that I did have, I had just purchased it; so

1 it was legally in my name.

2 But I had moved from the state of
3 Arkansas, where there is open carry law, back to
4 California. Mind you, I'm 60 years old; so I've
5 been away from California 25-plus years.

6 When I came back, I ran into a situation
7 with -- I was being pursued by a black car with
8 black tinted windows on a four lane one-way
9 direction going. And I did whatever I could to
10 avoid. So I moved over a couple lanes, because the
11 car was driving sporadically. So as I stopped at
12 the intersection, this car pulls up beside me, and
13 it actually -- and the back window -- back window
14 comes down. Somebody comes out with their hand
15 raised up. So I have -- I have my firearm right
16 there, but I never pointed my firearm at anybody.
17 But I did show my firearm like this (indicating).
18 So that was what was reported.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

20 MR. WHITE: So I -- this whole
21 situation -- if they have street cameras, which I'm
22 sure they can pull it up, and it'll show that I was
23 being pursued. I was never an aggressor in this
24 whole matter or anything like that. But, of course,
25 you know, by the law, you know, if you have a

1 firearm -- and I guess I didn't have it. I was in
2 the process of having it registered, but I did
3 purchase it; so it was in my name.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, basically,
5 we're not here to adjudicate, you know, your issues.
6 All we need for the application is that you disclose
7 or you tell us about all of those.

8 MR. WHITE: Okay, okay.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And since you did
10 not, you were denied a guard card --

11 MR. WHITE: Okay.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- or your work card,
13 and so now we're going to go through the process.
14 But, you know -- I'm like, Investigator -- I'm going
15 through my head.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This lady here, Board
18 Member Cortez, will bring up the application and
19 show you that it very clearly says -- you know, big
20 red stop sign that says, "Stop. Please make sure
21 that you put all of" -- you know, convictions and
22 arrests --

23 MR. WHITE: No, I understand that.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- all of that in
25 there. Even if it's been expunged, even if it was

1 20 years ago, it doesn't matter.

2 MR. WHITE: Right, right.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It has to be put in
4 there. So that's what you failed to do. That's
5 what we're here to address.

6 MR. WHITE: Okay, okay.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

8 So, Board, are there any other questions
9 for Mr. White?

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
11 Member Cortez, and, again, like Board Member Nixon
12 indicated, that we're not here to adjudicate, but I
13 just want to make some clarity. Based off your
14 testimony, you indicated that you're standing by
15 your innocence and you weren't involved. I just
16 want to remind you that you were convicted of a
17 three-year probation. At some point you had to take
18 accountability.

19 MR. WHITE: I did.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct. So that's
21 not standing by your innocence. I just want to make
22 sure you're clear, because I wouldn't want you to,
23 if you are going to reapply, not add a criminal
24 history based on your position.

25 MR. WHITE: I'll do that. I would do so,

1 yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So in the
3 event you do want to reapply, just you need to make
4 sure that all of your criminal history is reported.
5 Okay?

6 MR. WHITE: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So is there any other
8 questions from the Board?

9 Okay. Hearing there are no further
10 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
12 motioning to uphold the denial based on no
13 disclosure of criminal history.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
15 motion. Do we have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
18 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

19 (All present Board members
20 voted aye.)

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So at this
22 time you're not able to get your work card, which
23 means you cannot work as a security officer. You
24 are able to apply in one year. When you reapply,
25 all of the issues that you had are actually

1 documented on this paperwork. The office will help
2 you, if you ask them to, fill out your -- you know,
3 they'll provide this to you so that you can fill out
4 your application and have full disclosure. Okay?

5 MR. WHITE: That's fine. No problem.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank
7 you.

8 MR. WHITE: Thank you.

9 Okay. So do we want to just take a
10 break, or do you want to just continue --

11 Yep, you're good. Thank you.

12 -- because when's -- the next one is not
13 until --

14 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: The next
15 group is at 12:30.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sir, what's
17 your name?

18 MR. COMEAU: Pierre Michael Comeau.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Michael Comeau?

20 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: He's agenda 72.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 72.

22 Okay. Sir. Do you want to come up
23 front?

24 MR. COMEAU: Good morning.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. You'll

1 have to swear in. Yeah?

2 MR. DETMER: Mike Detmer for the record.
3 Sir, if you could please raise your right hand.

4

5 PIERRE MICHAEL COMEAU,
6 having been duly sworn,
7 testified as follows:

8

9 MR. DETMER: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You can have a seat,
11 sir.

12 MR. COMEAU: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Investigator
14 Blackmore, could you tell us why we're here for
15 Mr. Comeau.

16 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. So
17 Mr. Comeau was denied for his disclosed felony
18 conviction. It's a 2008 possession of a forged
19 instrument in the second degree. He did five years
20 probation.

21 I just want to make it aware that he did
22 officially file back in --

23 (Telephone interruption.)

24 MR. COMEAU: Sorry. Excuse me.

25 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: So he applied

1 back in 2023. He was denied at the June 2023 board
2 meeting for the failure to disclose at that time.
3 Since then, he has disclosed all arrests. He was
4 not made provisional, and he wishes to appeal here
5 today.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

7 Board, are there any questions for
8 Mr. Comeau?

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
10 Member Cortez. Good morning, Mr. Comeau. Could you
11 refresh my memory on the incident regarding the
12 possession of a forged instrument.

13 MR. COMEAU: Yes. I cashed -- I was
14 living in New York City. I cashed a check that
15 turned out to be fraudulent. They gave me
16 probation. I never went to prison, and I've never
17 been to jail.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank
19 you for disclosing this time.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
21 other questions?

22 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
23 I'll entertain a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
25 motioning to overturn the denial and grant

1 Mr. Comeau his work card based on the disclosure
2 this round of submitting his application.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
4 motion. Do we have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
7 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

8 (All present Board members
9 voted aye.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The motion
11 passes. You will get your work card. The office
12 will contact you for next steps. Okay?

13 MR. COMEAU: Thank you so much.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're welcome.

15 MR. COMEAU: Everybody, enjoy your day.
16 I appreciate it. Thank you so much.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Have a
18 good day.

19 Okay. So we're going to take a break.
20 Do you guys still have no one up north?

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, ma'am. No one
22 present.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We don't have
24 anybody down south. We're just 11 minutes into the
25 11:30 block; so we'll just take a break. Thank you.

1 (Recess taken from
2 11:41 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.)

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Are you
4 ready up north?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes, we are.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We're ready
7 down south. Up north, do we have anybody in the
8 room?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, Madam Chair.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Down south we
11 do have a few individuals. We stopped at --

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: 54? We did
13 Mr. Williams, didn't we? 54? No?

14 MS. BARROSO: We did Darlene.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We stopped at 54.
16 Okay. Thank you for attending the
17 meeting. If you have not been sworn in -- and I
18 think all of you guys have just walked in
19 recently -- Counsel Detmer will swear you in.

20 MR. DETMER: For those who have not been
21 sworn in yet, if you could please stand up and raise
22 your right hand.

1 AUDIENCE MEMBERS,
2 having been duly sworn,
3 testified as follows:

4
5 MR. DETMER: Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So there's not
7 very many of you. You guys can have a seat.
8 There's not very many of you. Could you tell us
9 your names. I'll start right to left.

10 MS. CASTELLANOS: Sandra Castellanos.

11 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: 67.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 67.

13 Okay. And what was your name?

14 MR. WOODS: Santana -- Santana Woods.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Santana Woods. Okay.

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 69.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And your name,
18 sir?

19 MR. MCCOY: Tavon McCoy.

20 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: 71.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What number?

22 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: 71.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 71. Okay. Thank
24 you.

25 Okay. And I think -- the gentleman in

1 the back, were you in here first? I think you've
2 been in here first, yeah?

3 MR. WOODS: Yeah.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So please come
5 up front. Yep, you can have a seat. Thank you.

6 Investigator Swarthout, why are we here
7 for Mr. Woods?

8 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant
9 was denied for a conviction of illegal use or
10 possession of a dangerous weapon and failure to
11 disclose. 2024, out of Nevada, he did disclose this
12 one: Carrying a concealed weapon without a permit.
13 He was sentenced to 180 days jail suspended, six
14 months probation. And then 2017, out of Maryland,
15 possession, not marijuana, misdemeanor. He was
16 convicted, one year jail suspended, one year
17 probation. 2018, out of Maryland -- this one's a
18 felony -- controlled substance possession with
19 intent to distribute. They didn't prosecute him on
20 it. 2013, out of Maryland, assault, second degree
21 was one charge. Second charge was peaceful order,
22 failure to comply. They didn't bring the charges
23 forward on that one. 2013, out of Maryland also,
24 possession with intent to distribute, a second
25 charge of it. That one was also that they didn't

1 proceed the charges. And then we have an Excel with
2 more charges on it.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
4 questions for Mr. Woods?

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
6 Member Cortez for the record. Mr. Woods, good
7 afternoon. Why did you fail to disclose all of your
8 arrest history?

9 MR. WOODS: Because I was told in the
10 court -- I'm from Washington, DC. The court
11 probably doesn't know, but the reason they didn't
12 follow through with a lot of them charges is because
13 I have a brother -- I have a twin brother. And a
14 lot of times when the police don't know that, it's
15 been times I've been arrested. Like let's say he
16 has a warrant for something he didn't get caught
17 like doing, but they issued a warrant. Being as
18 though he's my brother, I got locked up for his
19 charges and then literally released out of jail.
20 And they told me it wouldn't be on my record or
21 anything like that.

22 So considering that, it was -- and in two
23 of them charges that he actually brought up, my
24 brother was actually convicted of one of them, but
25 it probably looks like they just didn't follow

1 through with it, and it's because they arrested the
2 wrong person. And --

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Were you arrested
4 for those charges?

5 MR. WOODS: Yeah. I was brought into the
6 station, but like they immediately released. I
7 didn't even go to court. I never even seen court
8 for a lot of those charges.

9 Now, the Nevada charge is my charge, and
10 that was a carrying a weapon without a CCW. And
11 just a back story on that, that literally happened
12 the month I moved to Nevada, me and my fiancée. And
13 we were in a vehicle, and to be honest with you, it
14 wasn't even concealed. It was a situation where
15 they was going to charge me or my pregnant fiancée
16 for it. And even though it was her handgun, just
17 her being pregnant, I just decided to go along with
18 it, but as far as that.

19 And I had a -- I did have a -- I want to
20 say like a petty marijuana charge that was mine, and
21 that was in DC a while ago, but I got that expunged.
22 I don't know if it came up or not.

23 But as far as like convictions, I really
24 don't have no felony -- I have no felony convictions
25 at all. And with the not having the CCW thing, it

1 was petty.

2 And being honest with you, I had a -- I
3 was living in Virginia at the time, where it was
4 just open carry. And I'm guessing because I moved
5 out here and it was in the car, they just wanted to
6 be petty and charge somebody with it.

7 So that's kind of like the legitimate
8 arresting conviction that I have. But I don't have
9 like no -- no like fee even type of charges. I
10 don't have like no violent type of charges. No
11 convictions or anything like that. The arrests I
12 have, had -- has been like mistaken arrests for one,
13 but the ones that are legitimately mine have been
14 like petty arrests that weren't felonies, that I
15 kind of just got arrested for.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Were you -- did we
19 ask for any paperwork showing that these ones that
20 were -- I guess they're called nolo prosequi --

21 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: So Maryland, we
22 can search. We did search a lot of them, and it
23 showed up they didn't prosecute him in that for the
24 charges. They were all found on his fingerprint
25 report; so he would have been fingerprinted.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. For those.
2 So, yeah, got you.

3 Okay. Board, any further questions?

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown
5 for the record. Mr. Woods, as far as being petty on
6 that carry conceal, there were some other charges
7 that were dismissed, including failing to yield to
8 an emergency vehicle, obliterating a serial number
9 of a gun, and possession of a gun with a removed
10 serial number. Is that the case?

11 MR. WOODS: Yeah, that's what I was
12 charged with, but they had dropped it, and I really
13 don't know why they charged me with that. I'm
14 guessing the serial number was like they couldn't
15 read it all the way or something, and that's -- I
16 guess that's why they dropped it, 'cause they felt
17 as though it was like petty, like it was -- it
18 really legitimately wasn't the case. It was just
19 they couldn't read it or whatever the case may have
20 been.

21 And it was a registered firearm, and it
22 was actually registered like to my fiancée. My
23 fiancée was a security officer where we had lived
24 at. It was literally a registered service gun; so I
25 just don't even understand all the other charges

1 they put with it.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. So I'm going
3 to assume that all of these nonprosecuted cases were
4 probably your brother.

5 MR. WOODS: Yes.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. But do you
7 recall in June of 2012, in Charles County, Maryland,
8 violating a protective order? You were found guilty
9 and spent 90 days in jail, 80 days of those
10 suspended. Do you recall that one being yours?

11 MR. WOODS: No, that's definitely not
12 mine, because I don't -- my brother, he has a --
13 that was a warrant case. My brother has a child
14 with a woman from Charles County, Maryland. And
15 being as though he was issued a warrant and they had
16 two addresses for it, it's literally probably been
17 six or seven times that I was arrested due -- of
18 course, because we look alike, but I have been
19 released, and that's probably one of the charges
20 that he had brought up.

21 Even though they let me out of jail for
22 it, he might have got convicted for it, but I'm
23 guessing because they brought me in for it, it's
24 literally probably just on my fingerprint. Because
25 I never even been -- yeah, I never -- I never did no

1 jail time like literally ever, except for like those
2 minor times that we had just discussed.

3 But my -- my brother, he has a son. I
4 think he has two kids in Charles County, Maryland;
5 so I know that has something to do with him 'cause
6 he has children out there. He lives out there to
7 this day, like so we speak.

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board
10 Member Cortez for the record. What about the
11 extradition, the fugitive from justice? Were you
12 extradited ever from a different state to another
13 state?

14 MR. WOODS: Yeah, I was -- I was
15 extradited from DC to Maryland for a warrant that my
16 brother had literally. And I was -- I was let out.
17 I've actually -- because of a situation, one -- and
18 I don't know if that came up, but one time they --
19 they apprehended me, and when I say I got a twin
20 brother, like his name is Brandon. My name is
21 Santana. He named after my grandfather. I'm named
22 after my uncle.

23 One time they extradited me by mistake,
24 and they kind of like applied force because they
25 just thought I was resisting when I didn't know what

1 was going on, where I actually sued the police and
2 won from this. I've actually had a case -- I don't
3 know if that comes up that like I sued
4 Prince George's County, Maryland, for the many of
5 times they've done this, and it's been on record.
6 I've actually sued them for that, and it just got to
7 the point where as though I was kind of tired of
8 being harassed by it.

9 That's part of the reason why I'm in
10 Nevada now, because it's like my brother's legal
11 problems between him and like my cousin and us
12 growing up, I've been so much wrongly accused,
13 pulled over, detained, all types of stuff because of
14 it. Even though my ID says my name and it's an ID
15 that -- and it's not me, but dealing with these
16 situations in real time, police kind of don't react
17 to that. But if you look that up, I've actually
18 like sued Prince George's County police for this.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So quick question,
20 on all of these cases that appear to be your
21 brother's identity, did you appear in court for all
22 of those?

23 MR. WOODS: No. A lot of them I didn't
24 even get charged. They kind of just -- they dropped
25 it from me, and they charged him and booked him, and

1 I never kind of had to go to court for --

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So you were
3 arrested and then --

4 MR. WOODS: Like released like instantly
5 almost.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So there was
7 an arrest at one point?

8 MR. WOODS: Yeah, yes.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So that's
10 the issue we're having right now. Because on the
11 application there is a page that specifically
12 indicates if you've ever been arrested, despite the
13 outcome of the actual case or what the circumstances
14 of the case was, you have to list the entire history
15 of it.

16 MR. WOODS: Okay.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And, unfortunately,
18 like you just said, you had a number of incidents
19 not on your identity, but unfortunately due to the
20 identity of your brother, and that unfortunately has
21 caught up to this situation.

22 MR. WOODS: Okay.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So can I ask, on the
24 2024 one that just happened, did you disclose that?

25 MR. WOODS: Yeah, I said that one there.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Was that disclosed?

2 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes. One out of
3 Las Vegas, the CCW, that one was disclosed.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so which
5 ones -- the 2017 wasn't him? All the rest of them
6 weren't him?

7 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yep. He
8 disclosed on his app that CCW and he disclosed a CCW
9 out of DC in '21.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then the rest
11 were not him? The rest of them were not him.

12 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: It shows up on
13 his fingerprints; so I can't tell.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You can't tell.
15 Yeah.

16 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: I did -- I am
17 looking up Maryland right now to see if he does --
18 if he had any cases out there where he did sue the
19 police department. I don't see any where the police
20 department is actually named in any of them. I show
21 one where he's a plaintiff in the case, but it
22 doesn't show on who it was that he was suing besides
23 the individuals.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So were the
25 individuals -- can we tell whether or not they're

1 police officers?

2 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: It doesn't say.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Did you sue someone
4 else?

5 MR. WOODS: No, not at all. The only
6 person I'm going to be plaintiff on is I had a -- I
7 had a custody case out there that I was the
8 plaintiff on and I had had the police case.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So did you ever do
10 probation in Maryland?

11 MR. WOODS: I did a probation before
12 judgment before, and that was on like a traffic
13 ticket or something like that.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

15 MR. WOODS: And that's kind of what they
16 do out there. They call it "PBJs." It's like they
17 give you a period to like get your stuff together,
18 and they'll like put you on like a brief probation
19 before you go back to court.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And on the 2024
21 case, you were placed on a probation as well?

22 MR. WOODS: Yeah, I was on a just stay
23 out of trouble for 180 days.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And was that closed
25 out successfully, meaning you --

1 MR. WOODS: Yeah, it's closed.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

3 MR. WOODS: Yeah, it's a thousand percent
4 closed. I waited till I was closed to even apply
5 for this.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown
8 for the record. Mr. Woods, you said there was a
9 petty marijuana one. Is that the 2017 one in
10 Maryland --

11 MR. WOODS: No.

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: -- possession, not
13 marijuana?

14 MR. WOODS: No. When I had a marijuana
15 one, it was actually in Washington, DC, but it
16 really wasn't an arrest. It was a ticket, but,
17 granted, I had to go to court for it.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do you know what year
19 that was?

20 MR. WOODS: That was in -- it was
21 right -- I want to say it was right before they
22 legalized marijuana. It might have been like 2014
23 or something like that. Maybe 2013, I want to say.
24 Whenever they legalized marijuana, I want to say it
25 was the year before that.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Like 2013?

2 MR. WOODS: Yeah.

3 And besides that, it was a -- I had a CCW
4 charge in DC. But, see, the way DC worked is kind
5 of funny because it's not a -- it's not a state.
6 They kind of -- they do everything federal. But the
7 way it is, they'll -- like if you go and they don't
8 see enough probable cause or they see that it was
9 nonsense or whatever, they do something called no
10 paper, which means like you never go to court for
11 it. They kind of just tell you right then and there
12 like, "We not charging you with this."

13 And they immediately release you for it.
14 So I really don't know if that's the same as an
15 arrest or not, considering just how they do things
16 out there.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So, unfortunately,
18 because you were detained, booked, fingerprinted,
19 and then released, that's considered an arrest.

20 MR. WOODS: Okay.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And the issue that
22 we're having is that there were a number of them
23 that were not disclosed.

24 MR. WOODS: Okay.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And in the

1 application there is a page that specifically states
2 you have to list all of your arrests despite the
3 disposition of the actual case.

4 MR. WOODS: Okay. Even if they weren't
5 for me personally?

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Unfortunately,
7 because your fingerprints are coming up as -- yes,
8 and, again, despite what the outcome of the case
9 was, technically, it was an arrest on your record,
10 which is unfortunate for your end because the case
11 did not move forward as your identity.

12 MR. WOODS: Okay.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And your brother is
14 on the East Coast --

15 MR. WOODS: Yeah.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- still.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: But there were some
18 that you did appear in court and there was a
19 disposition, meaning that they did make a judgment
20 call, and that was not disclosed. And that's the
21 other issue that we're having here as well.

22 MR. WOODS: What wasn't disclosed?

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The extradition one
24 where you said that you were extradited from one
25 case, that was not disclosed. And then there was

1 also the protective order that we were seeing. And,
2 again, this is unfortunate because it's falling
3 under your brother's identity, according to your
4 testimony, and this is based on what your brother's
5 actions are doing. But it's affecting you now,
6 again, if that makes sense.

7 MR. WOODS: You don't even -- you don't
8 see the case like me suing the police for that?

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So even if you did,
10 it's not going to really play a part into the
11 decision based off what was disclosed in the
12 application.

13 MR. WOODS: Okay.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So -- and we'll
15 explain it.

16 So, I guess, Board, are there any other
17 questions?

18 Okay. Hearing there are no other
19 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So Board Member
21 Cortez motioning to uphold the denial based on the
22 nondisclosure of the entire arrest history. We did
23 get one, but I also do want to note for the record
24 also denying based on the time and distance. We do
25 have a 2024 case with a concealed weapon out of

1 Nevada and was -- the disposition was a six-month
2 probation.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion.
4 Do we have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
7 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

8 (All present Board members
9 voted aye.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So you're not
11 going to be granted your work card, but you can come
12 back in one year. Okay? Work with the Board here
13 because -- or the office, right, because they have
14 all of this now listed down. They'll provide it to
15 you to fill out your application. So you'll have
16 all of this listed down, and it won't matter what
17 your brother's doing on the other side because they
18 don't have your arrest and fingerprint; so it won't
19 show up on your stuff; right?

20 So good for you for getting out of that
21 situation and getting away from that so that you're
22 not arrested, hopefully, anymore. But these guys
23 will help provide that information for you so that
24 when you come back in one year and see us,
25 everything has been -- everything will be disclosed

1 and we can make a different decision. Okay?

2 MR. WOODS: Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right.

4 Good luck to you, sir.

5 MR. WOODS: All right.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I'm sorry.

7 What was the next number?

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 67.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 67? Okay.

10 Yes, Ms. Castellanos.

11 Investigator Swarthout, why are we here
12 for Ms. Castellanos?

13 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant
14 was denied for a felony conviction. 2012, out of
15 California. This one wasn't disclosed. Felony
16 conviction for importation of cocaine and
17 methamphetamine and heroin. Sentence was 37 months
18 BOP and three years supervised release.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What's BOP?

20 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Bureau of
21 Prisons.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sorry.

23 Okay. Board, any questions?

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
25 for the record. Ms. Castellanos, why did you fail

1 to disclose your conviction?

2 MS. CASTELLANOS: It was an honest
3 mistake, that I read to disclose if it was an
4 assault or weapon, and ever since I came here to
5 Vegas in 2015, I haven't had to disclose it.
6 They've done thorough background check,
7 fingerprints, all kinds of jobs -- financial,
8 cannabis -- and I never needed to disclose it. So
9 it was an honest, "Okay. It's already out of my
10 record" type of deal for me.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: When you say that
12 you read that you did not have to disclose, where
13 did you read that?

14 MS. CASTELLANOS: No. When I -- that's
15 why I say it was an honest -- it was a mistake.
16 When I read the -- you have to disclose if you had
17 any -- if it's a weapon or assault related to that,
18 I just assumed that I had to disclose if it was
19 assault or with a weapon or something like that.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. I just want
21 to make you clear that on the actual application --
22 I'm going to show you exactly what you're going to
23 see if you see it. It indicates, too, if you've
24 ever been arrested, had any criminal citations,
25 indictments, and/or orders to appear in court. It

1 doesn't mention anything about assaults, weapons,
2 drug-related charges, anything like that. Any kind
3 of court disposition, any kind of arrest history,
4 that's what you have to list. So I just don't want
5 you to be confused in the event you choose to come
6 back. Okay?

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other
8 questions for Ms. Castellanos?

9 Okay. Hearing there are no further
10 questions, I'll entertain a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
12 motioning to uphold the denial based on failure to
13 disclose criminal history.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
15 motion. Do we have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
18 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

19 (All present Board members
20 voted aye.)

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So you won't get your
22 work card, but, again, you can apply again in one
23 year, and these guys are great at helping get
24 through the system; so please get their help. Okay.
25 Thank you.

1 MS. CASTELLANOS: Um-hum.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sir, you can come up
3 front.

4 Okay. Investigator Blackmore, why are we
5 here for Mr. Souza?

6 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: It's McCoy.

7 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: It's McCoy.

8 That's mine.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 71? Yep, that one.
10 Sorry. I'm all turned upside down. Yes, for
11 Mr. McCoy.

12 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: All right. The
13 applicant was denied for a felony conviction, 2009,
14 out of Ohio. This one was disclosed. Felony
15 engaging solicitation after a positive HIV test,
16 sentenced to one year jail/prison. 2002, out of
17 Ohio. This one was also disclosed. Felony
18 conviction for engaging/solicit after positive HIV
19 test. Sentenced to five years probation. 2013, out
20 of Ohio. This one was not disclosed. Misdemeanor
21 theft. Sentenced to 180 days jail, 165 days
22 suspended, 40 hours of community service, and 730
23 days probation. 2008, out of Ohio, misdemeanor
24 assault. This one wasn't disclosed. Sentenced to
25 180 days jail suspended, 40 hours of community

1 service, one year probation. 2004, out of Ohio,
2 misdemeanor theft. This one wasn't disclosed.
3 Sentenced to nine days jail and a \$500 fine.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any
5 questions for Mr. McCoy?

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
7 for the record. Like you've heard before, why did
8 you fail to disclose all of your criminal history?

9 MR. MCCOY: I was told I only had to
10 disclose the most recent; I didn't have to disclose
11 everything else that I was -- told that I only had
12 to disclose the felonies and --

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And when you say
14 you were told, who told you that?

15 MR. MCCOY: Different people. People
16 that I knew here in Vegas and at the -- I was asking
17 the lady at the -- when I put the application in, if
18 I should disclose everything, and she was saying she
19 wasn't sure. So I wasn't sure if I should put
20 everything or not put everything. And I never had a
21 guard card. This is my first time trying to get a
22 guard card; so --

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you fill out
24 the application on your own?

25 MR. MCCOY: Yes.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So I don't
2 know if you've heard me prior, too, but there is a
3 page in the application where it indicates to list
4 all of your criminal history. So I just want to
5 make sure that if you decide to come back or
6 reapply, make sure that you read all of the
7 information carefully, because it does list
8 specifically you need to list everything. So
9 regardless of what somebody else said to you or
10 whoever told you not to, please make sure that
11 you're reading carefully and slowly what the
12 application is asking you. Okay?

13 MR. MCCOY: Okay.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other
15 questions for Mr. McCoy?

16 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
17 I'll entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
19 motioning to uphold the denial based on the failure
20 to disclose the entire criminal history.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
22 motion. Do we have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
25 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

1 (All present Board members
2 voted aye.)

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So just like we told
4 the previous individuals, you have an opportunity to
5 come back in one year, and apply, from today. Work
6 with the office. They have your information, and
7 they can help you fill it out. And they're thorough
8 and great at doing that. So they'll keep your
9 information, and you have the ability to come back
10 and talk to us.

11 MR. MCCOY: May I say something even
12 though it already been motioned? I printed out my
13 criminal history, and when I went to print it out,
14 only thing came up was my last two felonies. So I
15 didn't know -- I knew the charges, but I didn't know
16 like the dates and the times and --

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And that's okay.
18 That's okay. We -- even if you don't know the dates
19 and times, we encourage you just to put down that
20 there may be more, and that at least lets the office
21 know that -- you know, sometimes we don't remember.
22 If you just have like the city or state or that
23 there may be some other things on there, then
24 that's -- you know, at least you tried to disclose.
25 So we appreciate, you know, you just putting that

1 down. Okay?

2 MR. MCCOY: Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank
4 you, and like I said, we'll hope to see you back in
5 one year.

6 MR. MCCOY: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank
8 you. Good luck to you.

9 MR. MCCOY: You're welcome.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So --

11 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Madam
12 Chair, for the record, agenda item 68 has messaged
13 us via email that he is on his way. He was ten
14 minutes out a few minutes ago; so I'm hoping he's
15 just parking.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Let's see. So
17 from when to when? We finished till 10:30; then we
18 had --

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: The 11:30
20 now starts at 54 through 63.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I got messy
22 pages. I'm just a mess. Sorry.

23 Okay. And so that was till 11:30 to
24 12:30, and then 12:30 was the next one that was
25 coming up?

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Correct.
2 So we didn't hear agenda item 54, 56, 57, 58, 59.
3 61 withdrew. And that would conclude 11:30.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 11:30 to 12:30; so
5 it's past 12:30 now.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Director Saladino,
7 I believe we did hear 56. Did you indicate we did
8 not?

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Oh, I guess
10 I missed that one. We did do 56.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So what were the
12 numbers again? 57 --

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: 54.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 54, 57, 58, 59. What
15 about 61?

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Withdrew.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. 62 --

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: We did.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- upheld.

20 66?

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: It's the next
22 group.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The next group.

24 Okay. So do we want to -- we'll go ahead
25 and do a vote. We trailed agenda items number 54,

1 57, 58, 59 until the end of the session. They were
2 supposed to be here at 11:30. It's now 12:59; so,
3 you know, I'll entertain a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
5 motioning to uphold the denials for said agenda
6 items. As indicated, they were told to be here by
7 11:30. It is now 1:00 p.m.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do
9 we have a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
12 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

13 (All present Board members
14 voted aye.)

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The motion passes.
16 64, did we miss that one?

17 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Next group.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Next group is 64.

19 Okay. It is 1:00 p.m. They were
20 supposed to be here at 12:30. Do we want to wait
21 until 1:30 and -- close enough?

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: At least until
23 1:15, I would say. One of them is hopefully in the
24 parking lot.

25 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Hopefully,

1 number 68.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we'll
3 adjourn until --

4 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: We'll take
5 a break.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We'll take a break.
7 I'm sorry. We'll take a break until 1:30 and go
8 from there.

9 (Recess taken from 1:01 p.m.
10 to 1:16 p.m.)

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have --
12 it is now 1:15. We had folks that were supposed to
13 come in at 12:30, and at this point we have one
14 gentleman here in the audience.

15 And just to verify up north, do we have
16 anybody?

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, Madam Chair.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So, sir, would
19 you mind, Counsel Detmer is going to swear you in.

20 MR. DETMER: Good afternoon, sir. If you
21 could please raise your right hand.

22

23 VINCE WILLIAMS,
24 having been duly sworn,
25 testified as follows:

1 MR. DETMER: Thank you, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And just to confirm,
3 are you agenda item number 68, Vince Williams?

4 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, I am.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. You can have a
6 seat. Thank you.

7 Okay. Investigator Swarthout, can you
8 tell us why we're here for Mr. Williams.

9 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant
10 was denied for the illegal -- for a conviction of
11 the illegal use or possession of a dangerous weapon.
12 2021, out of Nevada, attempt to carry a concealed
13 firearm or other deadly weapon. Sentence is 150
14 days jail, credit for 9 days to run concurrent with
15 another case. 2020, out of Nevada, battery
16 misdemeanor, suspended 179 days jail, one year
17 probation, a fine \$460. 2020, out of Nevada, first
18 count was domestic battery, first offense. Second
19 count was assault. Guilty on both accounts.
20 Suspended six months jail, one year probation, 48
21 hours of community service, and six months DV
22 counseling.

23 THE REPORTER: Can you slow down just a
24 touch? Sorry.

25 "Six months jail, one year probation" --

1 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yeah, one year
2 probation, 48 hours of community service, six months
3 DV counseling.

4 The applicant disclosed all three arrests
5 and convictions on his application.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

7 Board, are there any questions for
8 Mr. Williams?

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
10 for the record. Good afternoon, Mr. Williams.

11 MR. WILLIAMS: How are you doing?

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Good, thanks.

13 Can you give me the circumstances
14 regarding these cases. I understand that they ran
15 concurrently with each other?

16 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes. I was -- I was
17 accused of a DV and battery charge. It was pending,
18 and I was currently working security at the time. I
19 was stopped, unrelated traffic incident, and I was
20 arrested from carrying my own weapon from an armed
21 security job because it violated the parameters of
22 the pending case.

23 The first two charges was pending from a
24 year prior. What it constituted was a violation of
25 a stay out of trouble order. So they said that I

1 was attempting to conceal the weapon. They had to
2 put that in there because I was coming home from
3 work with my weapon on the seat. And I had just
4 finished a security shift over at Rhodes Ranch,
5 doing security.

6 The -- it violated the -- the stay out of
7 trouble order on the first two charges. So when I
8 was pulled over with my own weapon, I was classified
9 as a person that I couldn't -- that couldn't carry
10 his own weapon. I had all my cards and everything,
11 but it just violated the first order; so it
12 automatically convicted on everything else.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And when you say
14 "the first order," are we talking about the battery
15 charge or the DV with assault charge?

16 MR. WILLIAMS: Both of those was in one
17 case. And that was -- I had -- was under orders for
18 that for about a year. The case had been -- it was
19 almost -- I was within a month or two months to
20 check in for that. It was almost suspended. All
21 the charges, the classes, everything was done.
22 Fines paid, everything.

23 So when I was pulled over on this
24 particular charge, being a person that couldn't
25 carry his own weapon because of the charge, that

1 just violated the whole case.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Give me the
3 circumstances regarding the DV with assault.

4 MR. WILLIAMS: That was a false charge.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Whether it
6 was false or not, you pled guilty to it.

7 MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah. Well, because I was
8 working at Rhodes Ranch and I was working 30 hours a
9 week over, I was extremely busy, like week to week
10 to week, like nonexaggeration. I would go, work.
11 At least four days a week, I would do overtime
12 consistently for more than six months.

13 And, you know, against my better
14 judgment, I said, "Well, that's -- I'll, you know,
15 do a nolo on it." I said, "All I worked -- you
16 know, do is work and come home anyway."

17 And so, you know -- but I -- you know, I
18 should have definitely just contested it because I
19 knew it wasn't true.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. I'm not
21 hearing the circumstances regarding the DV and
22 assault charge. What I'm hearing is --

23 MR. WILLIAMS: No, it was a false charge.
24 It was a false charge.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So we have court

1 records that you plead guilty on both counts, but
2 you're telling me that it's a false charge.

3 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes. It happens all the
4 time.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And is it
6 your testimony that you were just working overtime
7 and that's what constitutes your story?

8 MR. WILLIAMS: No, no, no. That was the
9 reasoning why I didn't challenge it, because I was
10 working a lot. I was working like 30 hours per week
11 overtime.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And that's
13 not -- what I'm asking is what are the circumstances
14 behind this charge? What happened?

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What happened?

16 MR. WILLIAMS: Oh, there was an
17 ex-girlfriend that made a false charge and said that
18 I committed a battery. Police came over, took
19 reports. Nothing that could substantiate what was
20 being said, but still I was picked up. As a matter
21 of fact, I was not picked up. I called the police,
22 and I went and came to them. And they said that
23 there was substantial evidence to arrest me.

24 So I wore it out, and as opposed to
25 fighting it, which I should have done because I knew

1 I was a hundred percent right. But still I was in
2 the midst of dealing with those charges and still
3 working. And so I had all my -- you know, all my
4 credentials and working consistently and licenses
5 and, you know, I was deemed an unlawful person to
6 carry my own weapon.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Can I ask,
8 Investigator Swarthout, he had his license at that
9 time, and did he keep it? So is this just a
10 renewal; so it's just now coming up now?

11 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes, so his
12 previous card expired on 11/18 of 2024.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gotcha. And so --
14 but nothing was turned in at the time of his arrest
15 with it --

16 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: No.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- so the company he
18 worked with didn't turn in --

19 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Correct.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- the fact that he
21 was arrested? But was your -- so the armed license
22 wasn't confiscated or --

23 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: No. His armed
24 expired on 6/30 of '21.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So he has not

1 been working armed this whole time. Okay.

2 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Correct.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then so we still
4 weren't notified that he had this domestic battery
5 because that would have precluded him working armed
6 if we had known from the company; correct?

7 And so did your company know you had been
8 arrested?

9 MR. WILLIAMS: No, because the whole case
10 was still pending. There was a couple things that
11 happened in between there, but --

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so
13 according to -- connected to this case, is all of
14 this resolved now? And you paid everything, done
15 everything, gone through the classes. Everything is
16 done?

17 MR. WILLIAMS: Before I was arrested, the
18 case was a year old. The violation created
19 everything else. Everything was done. My whole --
20 a year old. Everything was done, and I was
21 currently working.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the 2021
23 thing is closed out as well; right?

24 MR. WILLIAMS: Oh, everything is closed
25 out.

1 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: All three cases
2 are closed.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And all of
4 this was admitted to and disclosed?

5 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yeah.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then we --
7 at this point he's not applying for an armed
8 license. It's still just an unarmed license?

9 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are
11 there any other questions?

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member
13 Brown. For Investigator Swarthout, when was the
14 conviction date of the attempt to carry conceal
15 firearm or other deadly weapon? Is the day we see,
16 March 11, 2021, that's the arrest date, or is that
17 the conviction date?

18 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: That's the
19 arrest date. The conviction date was 10/1 of '21.

20 MR. WILLIAMS: That's right.

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Any other
23 questions from the Board?

24 Okay. Hearing there are no questions,
25 I'll entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I
2 move that we grant the work card for Mr. Williams
3 based on full disclosure of arrest record.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Can I ask one
5 question, Executive Director or legal, is he
6 allowed -- with a domestic violence, he is allowed
7 to carry a weapon?

8 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Will not be, no.
9 This is Board Member Brown for the record. If he
10 has a conviction, he can no longer carry a weapon.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right. I
12 just wanted to make sure. Okay. All right.

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So we'd be
14 issuing an unarmed work card --

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right.

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: -- with
17 firearms ineligibility on it.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I just wanted
19 to make sure. Okay. All right.

20 So we have a motion. Do we have a
21 second?

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Brown. I'll
23 second.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a
25 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

1 (All present Board members
2 voted aye.)

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So the motion passes.
4 You'll go ahead and get your armed -- or unarmed
5 card. You know -- again, you know that you're not
6 to work armed. The office will contact you for next
7 steps tomorrow. Okay?

8 MR. WILLIAMS: Sounds good. Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank
10 you.

11 MR. WILLIAMS: Thanks for your time,
12 gentlemen, ladies. Appreciate you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

14 We've got three more minutes in case
15 someone comes flying in here, but other than that,
16 we're trailing 64, 66 --

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 70 and 73.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- 70 and 73. Okay.
19 I think this will be, on the record, the shortest
20 meeting we've had.

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I think so,
22 yeah.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Couple more minutes,
24 guys.

25 (Discussion off the record.)

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Hey,
2 Stephanie or Gigi [phonetic], if you can hear me, we
3 haven't had anybody contact the office saying that
4 they're running late or anything like that; right?

5 MS. BARROSO: No.

6 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. It is 1:30,
8 and the individuals were told to be here by 12:30.
9 So at this point we'll entertain a motion on agenda
10 item numbers 64, 66, 70, and 73, all of which are
11 not in the audience, either north or south.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez
13 motioning to uphold the denial based on no-call,
14 no-show on said agenda items. As indicated, they
15 were told to be here by 12:30. It's now 1:31.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do
17 we have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Sorry. I had our
19 button off. Brown will second.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a
21 motion. We have a second. All in favor say aye.

22 (All present Board members
23 voted aye.)

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The next
25 agenda item is board comment for future agenda

1 items. Is there anything that needs to be brought
2 up?

3 One thing that I would like to bring
4 up -- I know they're talking about it in IASUR, and
5 I have several government entities that are clients.
6 They're asking about it, too, especially with all
7 the national disasters and such, is thoughts about
8 reciprocity, maybe putting a bill together to see if
9 we can, you know, look at that. You know, is there
10 certain states that we would be interested in doing
11 that with that have like type of background checks
12 and guard cards, like California or Arizona? I know
13 Utah has one. You know, but they're in the
14 immediate area; so that if there is a national
15 disaster, we can call upon security professionals to
16 help.

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I know
18 through IASUR they have -- there's a handful of
19 states on the East Coast where like when Hurricane
20 Katrina hit, they were able to utilize security
21 staff from the surrounding states. Yeah.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Texas does it.

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yeah. We
24 can definitely look into that and see what it would
25 be for -- I would suggest, you know, California,

1 Utah, Arizona, possibly Texas, New Mexico.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. New Mexico has
3 a license. I'm not sure if all of Texas, but we
4 certainly can look into it. I know that they have
5 reciprocity. We've sent officers there because our
6 guard card license is similar or they accepted it.

7 But I think -- you know, especially, I'm
8 getting more of the requests in Northern Nevada, and
9 I'm sure other companies are too. But Northern
10 Nevada, they had the fires and stuff. They needed
11 to bring in officers to help support evacuations and
12 just other things. You know, the reciprocity helps
13 them to bring people from California or surrounding
14 states. So definitely something that we probably
15 want to look into it.

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Okay.
17 Yeah, we can definitely work on something for that.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Member Brown
19 for the record. I would like there to be some type
20 of provision that tells them they have to meet our
21 requirements, because we get a lot of these people
22 from California that say, "Oh, I only have to put
23 down things from the last seven years" or "I only
24 have to put down felonies."

25 They've got to be able to meet our

1 standards before we grant it.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. I think we
3 need to look at the bill or the whole program and
4 see what we want to accept and not accept. And, you
5 know, California may not be one that we want to
6 accept, based off of those. I know Utah is pretty
7 strict, but I think look at at least the surrounding
8 states and see what they accept, might be the way to
9 go.

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Most
11 definitely. Most definitely.

12 And then we were contacted -- our office
13 was contacted by the Arizona Department of Public
14 Safety. They're sending, I believe, a captain and I
15 don't know if it's a lieutenant investigator, or
16 something like that to that effect. April -- the
17 week of April 8th, they're going to come to our
18 office. They want to see our process, how we do our
19 registered work card applications, our licensing
20 applications, and kind of, you know, see if they can
21 fine-tune their process there.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. I have
23 volunteered you a lot because you guys do it so well
24 and it's just been a really smooth process.

25 In Arizona, Allied Universal, we've had

1 lobbyists for about almost a year now, and we
2 actually just got with their DPS and the licensing
3 group and put together a bill that is now going to
4 the senate. It was -- or, no, through the house
5 now. It was approved by the senate on Monday --
6 that they're extending their actual renewals. It
7 used to be every two years, and now the bill
8 suggests every four years. And it's been passed so
9 far with no -- no one is opposing it.

10 And then the other one is they're
11 adding -- right now you can only apply for the guard
12 card 60 days in advance, and they've moved it now to
13 whenever, you know, you need to get it -- you need
14 to apply for it. Because it takes anywhere from six
15 to eight weeks to get a guard card there. And so
16 now they've moved it to you can apply 90 days or 120
17 days. It doesn't matter. So at least that doesn't
18 create that log jam.

19 Because as it stands right now, we have
20 to put people on the leave of absence because they
21 don't have their guard card. And it's in the
22 renewal process, but the state can't get through it
23 quick enough; so we have to put people on
24 unemployment because they can't get a guard card
25 renewed.

1 So any help you can do -- I mean, you
2 guys do a fantastic job. I appreciate that support.
3 It'll be a good learning lesson for them. I think,
4 you know, with all the natural disasters that are
5 happening, that's one that's coming up a lot,
6 getting a lot of questions about it.

7 Sorry. Anything else from the Board?

8 Okay. The next section is public
9 comment, but we have no public comment -- or no
10 public down south.

11 I'm assuming you guys are the same up
12 north?

13 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Correct.

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Correct, no one
15 present.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So this very
17 quick meeting is adjourned. Thank you, guys. I
18 appreciate it.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you.

20 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Thank you.
