4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We'll go ahead and get started.

5 Thank you very much, everyone. Sorry about the delay.

6 Everybody is aware of the cyber attack that happened in the
7 State of Nevada, caused us to postpone the initial meeting in
8 September to the current meeting, so we appreciate everybody's
9 patience as we go through all the stuff to remedy these

10 concerns that we have. We'll go ahead and start this meeting.

11 Executive Director, would you do roll call?

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yes. Executive
13 Director Saladino, for the record. We'll go ahead and start
14 with the north. Board Member Brown?

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Present.

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Board Member Bezick?

17 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Here.

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Board Member Cortez?

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Here.

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Board Chair Nixon?

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Here.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: And Board Member
23 Gronauer had messaged me. He has -- he's unable to attend
24 today, so he will be out.

25 Board counsel, I do believe we have a quorum with

1 board members?

2 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Yes.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Also, while we're
4 doing role call, I'd like to introduce our newest
5 investigator, Joshua Harris. He comes to us from -- recently
6 graduated UNLV, and we're happy to have him on board.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This is the area, Agenda
8 Item No. 2, for public comment. Members of the general public
9 may make comment on matters appearing on the agenda and may
10 bring matters not appearing on the agenda to the attention of
11 the board. The board may discuss the matters not appearing on
12 the agenda, but may not act on the matters at this meeting.
13 If the board desires, the matters may be placed on future
14 agenda for action. Public comments will be limited to five
15 minutes per person at the discretion of the chair, but will
16 not be restricted according to viewpoint.

17 So is there any public comment down South?

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yeah.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: If you come up for public
20 comment, please just state your name. And I don't know --

21 MR. RITCHIE: Do I sit? stand? What's --

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Absolutely.

23 MR. RITCHIE: Okay. I appreciate your time. My
24 name is Ian Ritchie. I've had several discussions with
25 Executive Director. I'm coming as a representative of an

1 organization. It's a nonprofit called Security Alliance for
2 Survivors.

3 Just a little background, my day job is MGM
4 corporate security manager. Security Alliance for Survivors
5 was created almost by accident, but with purpose. I
6 volunteered with a group. We were looking for a 14-year-old
7 girl, and looking at social media, we were able to track that
8 she was in a hotel. We sent that out to several investigators
9 throughout the hotel, started getting hits. Long story short,
10 we found her within a few hours downtown, hence the birth of
11 Security Alliance for Survivors.

12 Since then, we've grown in the resort industry. We
13 have about 95 percent of all resorts. We also have
14 representatives up North. And even though you look at the
15 resorts as a competitive market, this is a collaborative
16 effort. We all come together. The idea behind that to is
17 help find kids that are being sex trafficked in this
18 community. Las Vegas is ground zero, not only in the nation,
19 but thought of in the world, just because of the economics.
20 Every weekend is a Super Bowl here.

21 Lots of efforts are made, but they're all working in
22 different lanes, we've discovered. Security Alliance for
23 Survivors, I'm going to refer to it as SAS just because -- was
24 just voted in as an official community partner with Metro. We
25 work straight with State Police, Parole and Probation,

1 Homeland Security. The idea is to be intelligence gathering
2 as a force multiplier. And since then, outside of the resort
3 industry, we've gravitated -- we have to look at where a lot
4 of these people are living, not only the girls. Just for
5 knowledge, the average age of a youth that's being trafficked
6 is 15, the average age of an adult is 20, and that just came
7 out last month from the sheriff. So we're not looking at
8 older -- older women. These are the ones that are being sold
9 time and time again.

10 So looking at the dailies and weeklies, we've then
11 broadened the alliance into everything from Siegel Suites,
12 Budget Suites, Emerald Suites. We have all of those in our
13 database now, and the idea is we have a -- again, an MOU with
14 Clark County Family Services. We will get a kid that's
15 missing, specifically CSEC, they're being exploited sexually,
16 and we will basically farm that out, just like we did for that
17 first girl. And it's been tremendously successful. We've
18 found a lot of them on Boulder Highway in some of the dailies
19 and weeklies.

20 Since then, we've offered an education, so going out
21 to these dailies and weeklies, for example, on Boulder
22 Highway. It's not just the security personnel. It's the
23 maintenance, it's the housekeeping, it's the ones that are
24 back of house that are going to see it, because a lot of these
25 traffickers know to hide from security.

1 So since then, we've also partnered with RTC, not
2 only the company, but the security company, as well. We've
3 worked with a lot of the security companies under PILB. I
4 mean, I can name a few, if needed, but they have been
5 instrumental, because the idea is they are the force
6 multiplier. You are the force multiplier in the communities,
7 and if we can offer a partnership with them to get intel to
8 them, basically a child that's being trafficked, or we also
9 get watch lists of traffickers that are actually operating in
10 our community, and there's tons of them.

11 So if your security personnel can put eyes on a kid
12 that's been missing or a trafficker that possibly lives in a
13 certain residence, it just enhances the force multiplier for
14 law enforcement, because now you have boots on the ground
15 watching what's happening in that particular apartment.
16 Again, that's just some of the success that we've discovered
17 working with parole and probation and Metro.

18 So again, the idea is a partnership, and we would
19 like to create a security alliance partnership with PILB under
20 your direction, and any information that we give out would
21 specifically be -- it's all public, it's just not gathered
22 this way. It would just enhance the capabilities that you
23 have. And also, we want to offer any education, so if a
24 security company goes to a client, they can say, We can teach
25 you about sex trafficking in the community and what to do, and

1 we will come in and offer that, no charge for anything. We
2 are -- we are not looking for money, we just want to be a
3 stream of compassion for these kids, but also collaboration
4 with our community.

5 So is there any -- are there any questions?

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have a few. Do you have any
7 literature that you -- you know, about your company or phone
8 numbers that you could pass out or provide to the PILB so that
9 we could get in contact with you?

10 MR. RITCHIE: Yes. We have a website.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

12 MR. RITCHIE: Yeah. It's specifically
13 education-driven. There's a lot of sites that are going --
14 again, it will soon be listed on Metro's website, as well.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then do you have --
16 you know, because there's so many security professionals out
17 there, do you have -- we work with the homeless shelters, and
18 what they do is they -- they have cards that are printed out,
19 and we give them to our security professionals and say, Hey,
20 if you see someone who you think needs assistance, give them
21 this card. And so that's a way of, you know, one, paying
22 attention to the fact that they need support, but also, you
23 know, the contacting them and giving that information to them.
24 Maybe there's a number that you can give to us as licensees
25 that would allow our security professionals to call if they

1 saw something.

2 MR. RITCHIE: Absolutely.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah.

4 MR. RITCHIE: Yes. Absolutely.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So if you can coordinate that
6 type of information with the PILB office, I think that would
7 allow us to really, you know, again, use our -- use our folks
8 as force multipliers, because I know they would appreciate
9 that.

10 MR. RITCHIE: It would -- yeah. And what we've
11 discovered is people really -- sometimes they're not
12 understanding what they're seeing. Prime example, a
13 maintenance guy on Boulder Highway, now he reports everything
14 to the security officers because some girl asked him to give
15 him [sic] a tattoo. He didn't know what the tattoo meant
16 until we taught him, this is a brand. She is being trafficked
17 right now. So it's just the red flags that go up, and all of
18 a sudden your security staff is going to sort of become
19 ingrained with contracts that they owe the employees, so
20 getting them to understand not only what it is, but then what
21 to do.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right.

23 MR. RITCHIE: So to answer your question, Rise is a
24 phenomenal organization, works directly with Vice, so they
25 are 24/7 advocates that will come out and assist not only the

1 adults -- and I hate saying "the adults," they're like 20,
2 that's not an adult in my mind, but also the youth. And
3 working directly with missing persons, we work with all of
4 those detectives to assist Vice, you know, because missing and
5 sex-trafficked are often intermingled and --

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. Because we get -- we get
7 alerts from -- I'm losing the name right now, but it's like
8 the Silver Alert, right, because there's a senior citizen
9 that's missing --

10 MR. RITCHIE: Yes.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- and then we can get it out to
12 our officers. So there's an avenue to get that information to
13 licensees, if that's something that we could help support.

14 MR. RITCHIE: That's what we'd like to create.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

16 MR. RITCHIE: So basically at the click of a button,
17 I can get everything to every resort, every daily, weekly,
18 RTC. I would like to create one with you and any license
19 holder that wants to participate. This is completely
20 voluntary. I mean, we've had some that would rather not, but
21 that's fine.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

23 MR. RITCHIE: I understand.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. We'll -- we'll work with
25 you to do something like that. I think that's worth an

1 effort, so -- I don't know about the rest of the board.

2 MR. RITCHIE: And then as far as your website, I
3 don't know if you need anything for us, that way people that
4 aren't aware, they can -- they can just look it up.

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I think that would be
6 a perfect place for it, to have it on one of our landing pages
7 on our website, you know, that way, licensees can see it, they
8 can click and get direct information from you, and -- yeah, I
9 think that would be a good resource.

10 MR. RITCHIE: Yes, sir.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
12 questions?

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair. This is
14 Board Member Brown.

15 Sir, I may have misheard you, but when you were
16 talking about information gathering, you said it's public, but
17 not gathered in that way. Are you gathering this through some
18 type of investigation? I'm wondering, you know, if you're
19 doing private investigations, if you're going to be -- need to
20 be licensed for that.

21 MR. RITCHIE: No, it's not. It's all public
22 information if you're looking at convictions or registered sex
23 offenders or anything that's found just on the websites, but
24 it's just never been collected in that fashion. Sorry if I
25 misspoke.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. No, I misunderstood.

2 Thank you, sir.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Does that -- does this
4 information, would that apply to up North, as well?

5 MR. RITCHIE: We can get information up North. We
6 have a representative, we have a team leader for SAS up North,
7 as well. I'm sure -- I don't know if you know Dean Hale
8 (phonetic). He works with us.

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: We're already on email
10 threads and stuff together with Dean Hale, so yeah. We're
11 very familiar with him.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right. Well, thank
13 you, sir.

14 MR. RITCHIE: Yes.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Appreciate it.

16 MR. RITCHIE: I appreciate your time. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Is there any other public
18 comment down South? Okay.

19 Anything up North?

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, ma'am.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Seeing there's no public
22 comment, we'll move on.

23 Executive Director, could you please do
24 announcements, reports, and updates?

25 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yes. Director

1 Saladino, for the record. I went ahead and provided the board
2 with our financials for this last quarter via email. I
3 apologize for the delay. As you know, we were hit on
4 August 24th with that statewide cyber attack; however, the
5 financials have not -- not been affected, you know. We run to
6 be able to, you know, operate without getting any revenue in
7 for about a year, so, you know, budgetarily wise, we're fine.

8 I also provided the FY26 budget to be approved. You
9 know, the board -- board finances are sitting very well. We
10 have no -- no real issues. Our licensing fees came in above
11 projected for this past renewal cycle, so that's good.

12 Also -- yeah, then just to give you a little update
13 in regards to the cyber attack, we have gotten the majority of
14 our systems or servers back. What we don't have yet is the
15 ability to have the online portals connect with our internal
16 State ones. I guess because of the cyber attack, they have to
17 go in and make sure the securities are up to par and whatnot
18 and see if there was any lingering damage from -- from the
19 attack. GTO, our State IT folks, and Naviant, our OnBase
20 provider, have been phenomenal with getting us back to where
21 we are now. Internally, we have access to the databases. I
22 do believe the public verification is working now.

23 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yeah.

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So people can verify,
25 you know, statuses of work cards and stuff. You know, we

1 tried to post as much as we could on the website when stuff
2 initially went down, but in the beginning, we had nothing.
3 Nothing would -- nothing would work. Our emails, our phones,
4 everything was down. So, you know, we -- we learned some
5 lessons from that, like possibly getting social media pages to
6 where it's not on the State network so we'll be able to get
7 information out to the public just so, you know, the public
8 knows what's going on. We realize that would be a huge
9 benefit for us to have something like that. I got information
10 in to the GTO to get that started to be approved for a social
11 media page.

12 Let's see. We opened the doors on September 18th
13 to take in paper applications. Since then, we have received
14 well over -- the last count was 661, and I'm sure it's well
15 over 700 by now. Those are paper apps, so those paper apps
16 now need to be inputted into the database. The Department of
17 Public Safety, they're back up and running. They're able to
18 get us now the fingerprint reports.

19 So currently, again, because we can't talk to
20 outside servicers with our internal databases, some of our
21 background clearance stuff has been down, so being that DPS is
22 able to get us information back from fingerprint reports a lot
23 faster than it's been with their new database, we've been
24 clearing folks, you know, as we get the fingerprint results.
25 We have pretty much all -- all the investigators working on

1 clearing -- clearing folks to get them out to work. We even
2 have admin staff doing negative fingerprints to get, you know,
3 folks that come in to be cleared right away, getting them
4 going. Like all day today, we'll be issuing cards out to
5 folks. So, you know, we're definitely -- we're definitely
6 running, it's just we -- we definitely ask you for your
7 patience while we do it.

8 Any licensee that has any questions about, you know,
9 anybody that is in their employ, if their card expires or
10 whatever, just reach out to us, shoot us an email. The email
11 is probably the best way to get ahold of us. Our phones work,
12 but sometimes they're a little wonky, but the email, I know,
13 works, and anything you send us, we'll be able to follow up
14 and get you, you know, the correct information.

15 So again, we ask everybody -- you know, we thank
16 everybody for your patience and just bear with us. I'm hoping
17 that next week with the calls I'll be on tomorrow with IT and
18 stuff, that we'll be hopefully 100 percent, and once we are,
19 I'll notify you guys via the website, you know. We'll put
20 stuff on the website so everybody knows that we're up and
21 running.

22 And as far as the -- even like the firearms, if CFIs
23 can put that information in, you know, we'll notify them,
24 because right now we're doing it all by hand in the office.
25 So again, my hats off to staff. They've done a huge -- a huge

1 heavy lift in getting these applications inputted and getting
2 people cleared to be able to go to work, and again, that was
3 our main goal was, you know, supporting industry in that way
4 by getting folks cleared to be able to work.

5 So with that, is there any questions regarding the
6 budget or the finances?

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I have none.

8 Board, are there any questions?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Not in the North, ma'am.

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: And then regarding the
11 stats, we do -- we do -- we did prepare for some of the stats.
12 What we weren't able to do was to go into more detail like
13 Board Member Gronauer had requested, and that was at my
14 direction. I've had staff focused mainly on applications and
15 licensing to get people to work.

16 So with that, I'll turn it over to Supervisory
17 Investigator Swarthout. He does have some information
18 regarding the stats, and we'll be more than happy to go into a
19 little more detail on it, if need be.

20 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Investigator Swarthout. So
21 in June of 2024 meeting, we had a total of 35 applications; 21
22 were approved and 14 were withdrawn or denied. In -- on June
23 of 2025's board meeting, we had 60 apply; 32 approved, 28 that
24 were withdrawn or denied.

25 For work cards, we did see an increase, again, for

1 the same time period for -- for 2024, we had a total of 3,240
2 apply; 2,824 are active, 266 were withdrawn, and 150 were
3 denied. For 2025 for that same quarter, 3,562 applications
4 received; 3,063 are active, 20 are still provisional, 331
5 withdrawn, and 148 denied.

6 DPS, in the middle of July, switched to a new system
7 where we're getting the fingerprints back a little bit faster,
8 depending on the cyber attack and everything else, so that's
9 greatly increased the processing time on that.

10 Complaints. In that second quarter, we received a
11 total of 77; 76 are closed, one open. One violation was
12 issued to a licensee over it. We worked with City business
13 licensing, the County, LVMPD, SIS, and NTA. We did start a
14 new relationship with SIS about trying to go out every
15 quarter, at least, to hit some of these hookah lounges,
16 nightclubs and that, and that has greatly increased our
17 presence out there.

18 Some of the complaints we received on work card
19 holders is here, and then unlicensed activity for that second
20 quarter in 2024, we had four issued; two were the first
21 offense, one of the second, and one of the third and
22 suspensial [sic]. For the same period in 2025, seven were
23 issued; five were first, zero second, and two were the third
24 and suspensial. All of the companies that were cited were
25 PPL.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any questions?

2 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I just want
3 to add to Executive Director's comments about how hard the
4 staff has had to work to overcome some of the issues that
5 we've had, and you guys have done a stand-up job of just
6 showing up and getting it done, so I really -- you know, as
7 industry and as, you know, overall work card holders, we
8 really do appreciate the support that you've given. It
9 impacts us greatly when you're not up and running, so we
10 appreciate you. Thank you.

11 Executive Director?

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I was wondering if I
13 could get a motion for the FY26 budget.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Did you get it? Hi.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, I think someone outside just
17 got connected.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Oh. It sounds like it was
19 Stephanie. We're seeing a --

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: That was Stephanie,
21 yes.

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: On a chat window here,
23 Stephanie.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are we good? Okay.
25 Sorry about that.

1 I would like to entertain a motion for approval for
2 the budget for 2026.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
4 motioning to approve fiscal year 2026 budget as presented.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
6 have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown. I'll
8 second.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
10 second. All in favor say aye.

11 (All present board members voted aye.)

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Motion passes.

13 Okay. Agenda Item No. 4, review and approve
14 transcripts from the June 10th, 2025 and June 30th, 2025
15 board meeting. Were there any questions about the
16 transcripts, questions or concerns?

17 Okay. Hearing there are no questions or concerns,
18 I'll entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
20 motioning to approve the transcripts from the June 10th,
21 2025 and the June 30th, 2025 board meeting as presented.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
23 have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a

1 second. All in favor say aye.

2 (All present board members voted aye.)

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes.

4 Counsel Itkin, would you mind swearing in all
5 witnesses?

6 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Sure.

7 For all those who are going to provide statements or
8 testimony in front of the board today, please stand and raise
9 your right hand.

10 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Are you guys going to provide
11 testimony? You -- are you going to provide testimony? No?

12 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Do you affirm your testimony
13 today will be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the
14 truth.

15 (Audience answers in the affirmative.)

16 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, everyone.

18 Okay. Agenda items 6 through 25 are consent,
19 potential block consent votes, so I'll ask now, were there any
20 questions or concerns with agenda item 6 through 25 -- I'm
21 sorry, through 24? Just as an update, on Agenda Item No. 24,
22 Mr. Johnson did pass his dog handler test, and so that one is
23 good to go, in case there were any questions about that.

24 So hearing there are no questions for agenda item 6
25 through 25 -- through, I'm sorry, 24, I'll entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
2 to approve the consent items for block vote, items 6
3 through 24.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
5 second?

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
8 have a second. All in favor say aye.

9 (All present board members voted aye.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So anybody that's on the
11 agenda that's under 6 through 24, you have been approved, and
12 you're able to stay and join us if you'd like, or you're able
13 to leave.

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Congratulations, gentlemen.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations, everyone.

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: And Madam Chair, this
17 is Executive Director Saladino, for the record. In the next
18 contingent area, we have 26 through 28. 25, agenda item
19 Marksman Security Corporation, David Pack, we're still waiting
20 on fingerprint results. There was an issue with them being
21 rejected and then being resubmitted and stuff, so that's the
22 delay there. For agenda items 26, 27, and 28, we have
23 received the fingerprint results and they're all negative,
24 meaning they're good to go.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So our options for 25 is,

1 as I understand it and we've done in the past, is that we --

2 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Oh, never mind.

3 They're in.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh. Hang on.

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Okay. I guess they're
6 not in. I'm sorry.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So as I understand it,
8 what we've done in the past is we've made -- we've made the
9 approval contingent on the person that's being -- that has not
10 come in being cleared. And so board, if that's the direction
11 you want to go with Agenda Item No. 25, so in other words,
12 they will get a contingent approval on the fingerprints coming
13 in for Mr. Pack and that they're cleared so that he doesn't
14 have to come back to the next meeting, right? And then that
15 way, once Executive Director gets those fingerprints, he's
16 able to go ahead and move forward with that license.

17 Is there any concern with that or questions about
18 that from the board?

19 Okay. Hearing there are no concerns -- yeah,
20 let's --

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I think we need to do separate.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. So I'll entertain a
23 motion, but I would like to separate from that block vote
24 number 25 just so that it's a clear motion.

25 So let's start with Agenda Item No. 25, I'll

1 entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
3 to approve Marksman Security Corporation, License No. 1791,
4 requesting a corporate name change to Marksman Security, LLC.
5 Jason Logsdon will remain the qualifying agent. The member to
6 be approved is David S. Pack, all subject to statutory and
7 regulatory requirements and contingent upon negative results
8 for the fingerprints return.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. Do we have
10 a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
13 have a second. All in favor say aye.

14 (All present board members voted aye.)

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.

16 So I don't know if Mr. Pack and Mr. Logsdon, are you
17 here? Nope. Okay.

18 Okay. So then the next potential consent block vote
19 would be for Agenda Item No. 26 and 27 and 28. I'll entertain
20 a motion.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
22 to approve potential block vote for items 26, 27, and 28.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
24 second?

25 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
2 have a second. All in favor say aye.

3 (All present board members voted aye.)

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Congratulations,
5 group. You have been approved. And again, you don't need to
6 stay, if you've been approved, throughout the session.

7 Next agenda item is Agenda Item No. 29. This
8 section is change of status for qualifying agent.

9 Do we have Aron Security, John McCluskey here?

10 MR. MCCLUSKEY: Present. Yes.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Please move forward. So we have
12 Mr. McCluskey, Mr. Curcio?

13 MR. CURCIO: Curcio, yes, and I'm representing the
14 owner, Alexander Caro, C-a-r-o.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So please tell us why you're
16 here and the intentions with the change.

17 MR. MCCLUSKEY: So I'm John McCluskey, currently --
18 with the PILB since 2018, currently holding two licenses, a
19 private investigations license and the patrol officer license,
20 changing status. I used to be representing Brosnan Security,
21 which was bought by Allied, and we separated since then. And
22 since then, Aron Security has connected with me and I'd like
23 to represent them, so requesting permission.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any questions?

25 Hearing there are no questions, I'll entertain a

1 motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board member Cortez motioning
3 to approve Aron Security, Inc. for a new private patrol
4 officer license and that Mr. John G. McCluskey, License
5 No. 2310, approve his individual license to be kept in
6 abeyance, that he may become a qualifying agent. Corporate
7 officers to be approved are Peter G. --

8 MR. CURCIO: Curcio.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- Curcio -- thank you -- and
10 Alex J. Caro, all subject to statutory and regulatory
11 requirements.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
13 second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
16 second. All in favor say aye.

17 (All present board members voted aye.)

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Congratulations.
19 Good luck to you.

20 MR. MCCLUSKEY: Thank you very much.

21 MR. CURCIO: Board, thank you for your time today.
22 Appreciate it.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The next agenda item
24 is 30, Empire Protection. Do we have Mr. Davis and
25 Mr. Hopper [sic] here?

1 MR. HOOPER: Mr. Hooper right here.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Hooper. I'm sorry.

3 MR. HOOPER: That's okay.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Welcome, gentlemen. Please tell
5 us a little bit about the intentions with changing the status.

6 MR. HOOPER: Yeah. So Empire Protection, the parent
7 company, is out of Australia and they're growing and they have
8 international clients that obviously -- well, Vegas is kind of
9 a destination for a lot of international clients, and so in
10 the past, they've just done subcontract work out when their
11 clients come in, so it got to the point there was enough
12 business that they decided to look into getting a license here
13 in Nevada.

14 And then Tyler and I know each other from years in
15 the industry and were both Marines, so I approached him with a
16 business structure deal to -- basically a way to fall under
17 our administrative umbrella from insurance to business
18 processes and everything, and then give him an international,
19 kind of, connection with reach outside of the US, so trying to
20 create like a mutual partnership here and allow us to kind of
21 start to grow here in Vegas.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any questions for these
23 gentlemen?

24 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
25 entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
2 to approve Empire Protection, LLC a new corporate private
3 patrol officer license and that Mr. Tyler R. Davis,
4 License No. 4449, be placed in abeyance so that he may become
5 the qualified agent. Member to be approved is Donald P.
6 Hooper, all subject to statutory and regulatory requirements.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
8 second?

9 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
11 second. All in favor say aye.

12 (All present board members voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Congratulations,
14 good luck, and thank you for your service.

15 MR. HOOPER: All right. Thank you. Appreciate it.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 31 On Watch,
17 LLC. Do we have Mr. Nelson here? Good morning.

18 MR. NELSON: Good morning.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Please tell us about yourself,
20 sir, and a little bit about the intentions.

21 MR. NELSON: Absolutely. Being a new company back a
22 couple years ago, I registered as a limited liability
23 corporation. Over the past couple of years, our business kind
24 of took off, and I was able to take distributions as an LLC,
25 but as a corporation, I can do payroll and take distributions,

1 and so I'm trying to change the corporation from On Watch, LLC
2 to On Watch USA, Inc. just to make it a -- some tax purposes
3 and benefits for payroll for myself.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
5 questions for Mr. Nelson?

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
7 Good morning, Mr. Nelson. How are you?

8 MR. NELSON: Good.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What's the status on the
10 revolving account right now?

11 MR. NELSON: So --

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: You have one, apparently?

13 MR. NELSON: Yeah. So I have a -- I have an
14 account -- we had an apartment -- we had a big contract in
15 San Francisco, Oakland area. We went to the apartment
16 complex, we tried to rent under our corporation. They made us
17 rent under individual names, and so people within our
18 organization rented apartments for us. That contract went
19 away, but we wanted to keep our presence in the area, so we
20 went from five apartments down to one apartment.

21 In the process of doing the transition from one
22 apartment -- from five apartments to one, we were -- like we
23 had like a week of time where we were supposed to be out of
24 one, but the apartment was -- needed painting and stuff in the
25 other one, so they wouldn't let us move in. I was talking

1 with the office manager, like, Yeah, fine, leave your stuff in
2 that apartment, nothing's -- nothing's selected for that, we
3 don't have any renters for that apartment. And so the office
4 manager I was talking with said it's fine to leave your stuff.
5 We left our stuff. The following week, we moved our stuff out
6 of that apartment into the new apartment.

7 The person -- I guess the bean counter who was in
8 control of the payments for that apartment I was in then
9 re-sent -- basically for that five days, charged me for a full
10 month's rent. And the office manager said, Hey, we'll take
11 care of it, don't worry about it. I said, Okay, fine. We
12 rented their apartment. I thought everything was great, and
13 then when I applied for this is when I found out I had a lien
14 on -- for that apartment, which we didn't know about.

15 Since, we've paid the lien, and actually, we're
16 actually taking legal against the apartment complex for
17 actually overcharging us to the tune of \$10,000, so...

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Are you on a payment plan?

19 MR. NELSON: It's already been paid off, yeah. And
20 I sent that payment in earlier today, the proof of payment.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then is that associated with
22 the other 23 delinquencies in the last 30 months?

23 MR. NELSON: Yeah. So -- so that other delinquency
24 is I went through a divorce recently. I was responsible for
25 paying off all my wife's credit card debt. On one credit

1 card, we were -- she was the primary credit cardholder. I
2 paid the -- I paid the account in full, and then there was
3 interest on it that they charged. Since it's not in my name,
4 the bill was going to her address, she never took care of it,
5 so that's where the delinquency showed up on my account.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So it's 23 different cards or --

7 MR. NELSON: Should be just 23 different
8 delinquencies.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: For one card?

10 MR. NELSON: Yeah. Correct.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gotcha. Okay. And has that
12 been resolved now?

13 MR. NELSON: That's been resolved, as well.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Do we have a copy of --
15 Investigator Diaz, have we -- do we have paperwork that that's
16 resolved?

17 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Investigator Diaz, for the
18 record. No, I have not received anything regarding the
19 collection or the delinquencies. This was as of yesterday.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You said you sent it in this
21 morning?

22 MR. NELSON: I sent it to Stephanie this morning.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Since we don't have
24 internet right now, it's hard to check, but we're going to --
25 he's going to text.

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I'm hoping Stephanie
2 can hear us so she's already looking this information up.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So board, just for
4 clarification, we did get that information. Stephanie just
5 verified that for us, so that -- that resolves my questions.

6 Board, are there any other questions for Mr. Nelson?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
8 record. It might be for Executive Director Saladino. So
9 these have been resolved in full or is it a payment plan?

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Executive Director,
11 for the record. They have been paid in full. I see the
12 restitution amount, and the balance is now at zero.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any other questions from the
15 board?

16 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
17 entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
19 to approve On Watch, LLC a new corporate private patrol
20 officer and private investigator license, and that Mr. Peter
21 Nelson, License No. 4067's license be placed in abeyance, that
22 he may become the qualifying agent. Member to also be
23 approved is Mr. Peter Nelson, all subject to statutory and
24 regulatory requirements.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a

1 second?

2 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
4 have a second. All in favor say aye.

5 (All present board members voted aye.)

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
7 Congratulations. Good luck to you, sir.

8 Board's indulgence. Can we take a quick five-minute
9 break? Five minutes. Thank you.

10 (Recess taken from 9:47 a.m. to 9:51 a.m.)

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We'll start with the
12 private patrol officer portion of the agenda, Agenda
13 Item No. 32, ABA Protection. Do we have Mr. Belov?

14 MR. BELOV: Yes. Hello.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning.

16 MR. BELOV: Good morning.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Please tell us a little bit
18 about yourself and the intentions with the license.

19 MR. BELOV: My name is Anton Belov, and I'm the
20 owner of ABA Protection. It's -- ABA Protection was started
21 2011 out of California, Southern California, Los Angeles.
22 Since then, we've expanded into 12 states. We're operating in
23 San Francisco Bay Area, we're operating in Los Angeles,
24 San Diego. We are currently operating in Ohio, Pennsylvania,
25 Philadelphia, Tucson, Phoenix, and we have some accounts

1 pending in Texas, and also a contract pending in Hawaii.

2 Our intention is to bring our business here to
3 Nevada and boost the economy and bring jobs and structure and
4 compliance and have opportunities, be able to participate in
5 opportunities for the state and local proposals, and -- as
6 well as private. A lot of opportunities here, we'd like to
7 bring our business and create a more robust economy,
8 compliance, and structure for safety.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

10 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Belov?

11 MR. BELOV: Yes. Belov.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez --

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown --

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Go ahead, Mr. Brown.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
16 record. Mr. Belov, could you please tell me why you did not
17 file taxes, resulting in a tax lien in June of last year?

18 MR. BELOV: Yes. Secretary of State of California
19 had our address as San Francisco, but we're actually -- our
20 biggest address is in Los Angeles. So due to LA fires, the
21 taxes are not due until October 15th. So we already
22 resolved this with IRS. We called them. We stated that our
23 address is actually in Los Angeles, and they have paused
24 everything until we file taxes, which are due here in a few
25 days. We're working with a tax firm to file those taxes

1 for 2024. Once that's done, then we can proceed and go ahead
2 and take care of the matter, but it was the -- it was a
3 clerical error on the State for the address.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any further
6 questions?

7 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
8 entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member --

10 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is -- this is Bezick. I
11 move we approve ABA Protection for a new corporate private
12 patrol officer's license and Anton A. Belov be approved for
13 individual private patrol officer's license, and that his
14 license be placed in abeyance so he may become the qualifying
15 agent. Corporate officer to be approved is Anton A. Belov.
16 This is subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
18 have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
21 have a second. All in favor say aye.

22 (All present board members voted aye.)

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Good luck to
24 you, sir.

25 MR. BELOV: Thank you, sir.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations.

2 MR. BELOV: Thank you, ma'am.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Triple Feed, LLC, Agenda

4 Item No. 33. Is Mr. Perez here?

5 MR. PEREZ: Present, ma'am.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gentlemen, please introduce
7 yourselves -- and you have to be loud enough for the court
8 reporter, but please introduce yourselves and tell us the
9 intentions with the license.

10 MR. WADTKE: Yes, ma'am. My name is Brian Wadtke,
11 co-owner of Triple Feed, LLC, me and my business partners.
12 They will introduce themselves in a second. We were founded
13 in 2018. We are a firearms training company based out of
14 Las Vegas, Nevada. We currently do work in multiple states in
15 terms of training, safety for firearms. We are applying for
16 our initial PPO. We all three work in the security industry.
17 I think we have a lot to offer to the community, as well as
18 the PILB.

19 MR. MUNOZ de RUEDA: Luis Munoz, current CFI here
20 for the State of Nevada, also in the industry, just trying to,
21 you know, better my life, better my family's life, and
22 hopefully better the community, as well.

23 MR. PEREZ: Jordan Perez. I'm currently actually
24 living in Los Angeles, but I have a home here in Henderson, as
25 well, recently newer to the State of Nevada. Former law

1 enforcement, I just recently retired, as I submitted the
2 paperwork showing that I was done with that part of -- that
3 chapter of my life, and I decided to move into the security
4 industry over here. I work heavily in the security industry
5 in California. I don't plan on leaving that, I just -- back
6 to what Luis and Brian said, I want to better my life and the
7 life of my child, and this is -- I believe this is the next
8 chapter of my life.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any questions for Triple
10 Feed?

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
12 record, and I'm not sure who this question should go to.
13 Might be the executive director. I have a question for Mr. --
14 on Mr. Perez's background. Did we discover the charge-off
15 accounts when he was granted his firearms instructor
16 certification in '24 or did we miss that?

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Executive Director,
18 for the record -- Saladino, for the record. We wouldn't have
19 ran that -- that portion of his background for the firearm
20 certification.

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

22 And then for Mr. Perez, you started a payment plan
23 this month?

24 MR. PEREZ: That is correct. That is correct, sir.
25 I have the documentation here showing that the payment plan is

1 set for the amount due, and then I also have my documentation
2 for my retirement.

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And you're going to
4 provide that to staff today?

5 MR. PEREZ: Yes, sir.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, sir.

7 Nothing further.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other questions?

9 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
10 entertain a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I
12 move that we grant Triple Feed, LLC a new corporate private
13 patrol officer license. We -- I move that we grant Brian K.
14 Wadtke his individual private patrol officer license that will
15 be placed in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying
16 agent. Brian Wadtke, Gerardo Perez, and Luis G. Munoz de
17 Rueda are to be approved as board member -- or company
18 members, and this is subject to all statutory and regulatory
19 requirements.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
21 second?

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. I'll
23 second the motion.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
25 second. All in favor say aye.

1 (All present board members voted aye.)

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Congratulations,
3 gentlemen. Good luck to you.

4 MR. WADTKE: Thank you, board.

5 MR. PEREZ: Thank you, board.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item No. 34,
7 Savers [sic] Protection Services. Do we have Mr. Garran Smith
8 and Jerrell Shavers?

9 MR. SMITH: Garran and Jerrell.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Garran and Jerrell. There we
11 go. Thank you.

12 MR. SMITH: Good morning.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. You guys were
14 here before?

15 MR. SMITH: Yes.

16 MR. SHAVERS: Yes, ma'am.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I remember. Okay.

18 Okay. Tell us a little bit about yourself and the
19 intention with the license.

20 MR. SMITH: My name is Garran Smith. I've been in
21 the security industry for 20-plus years. This is my son
22 Jerrell. The intentions for the license is to expand to
23 Las Vegas to grow the business, you know, help people feed
24 their families, and have a livable wage here in Las Vegas
25 and -- just as we have done in California.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
2 questions for either of the two gentlemen?

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
4 record, and I apologize for this because I wasn't present at
5 the March meeting, but I have a note here that says that
6 Mr. Shavers was denied in March for failure to disclose.
7 Normally doesn't it take a year to be able to come back after
8 we do a failure to disclose denial?

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Executive Director
10 Saladino, for the record. There is no stipulation on
11 individuals going forward for licensure for that one-year
12 waiting period. That falls for the registered work card
13 holder or registered employees getting the work card. That's
14 where that statute falls, for them.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And for Mr. Shavers,
16 sir, can you explain the 2019 arrest regarding conspiracy to
17 enter, transport, or harbor aliens?

18 MR. SHAVERS: Yes, sir. So in 2019, I was active
19 duty in the United States Marine Corps, out on a late night
20 drive, made the wrong couple turns, doing things I wasn't
21 supposed to be doing as a United States Marine, and I got
22 stopped by Border Patrol and detained, fingerprinted for that
23 charge. I was then released back into Marine Corps custody,
24 and it never went anywhere from there because I was not doing
25 anything I wasn't supposed to, I was just too far from base.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Sir, you initially said
2 you were doing things that you weren't supposed to do as a US
3 Marine. What kind of things were you doing?

4 MR. SHAVERS: Traveling more than 100 miles from
5 base.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And did you have anybody
7 else in the vehicle when you were stopped?

8 MR. SHAVERS: No, sir.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: They turned you over to the
10 Marine Corps, probably under the assumption that they would do
11 something through UCMJ, if they felt necessary?

12 MR. SHAVERS: Correct, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
15 other questions?

16 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
17 entertain a motion.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
19 motioning to approve Shavers Protection Services, Inc. a new
20 corporate private patrol officer license and approving
21 Garran A. Smith his individual private patrol officer license
22 and that it be placed in abeyance so that he may become the
23 qualifying agent. Corporate officer to be approved is
24 Jerrell M. Shavers, all subject to statutory and regulatory
25 requirements.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
2 second?

3 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
5 have a second. All in favor say aye.

6 (All present board members voted aye.)

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Congratulations,
8 gentlemen, and good luck to you.

9 MR. SMITH: Thank you.

10 MR. SHAVERS: Thank you.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you for the sweets.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item No. 35,
13 RS [sic] Risk, LLC.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: R3. You said "RS."

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: R3, sorry, Risk, LLC. Do we
16 have Gregory Vincent here and a Kealii Kaapana?

17 MR. KAAPANA: Tongue twister.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Can you say that one more time?

19 MR. KAAPANA: Kealii Kaapana.

20 THE COURT REPORTER: One more time, please.

21 MR. VINCENT: You can just call him K.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Common spelling.

23 MR. KAAPANA: First name or last name?

24 THE COURT REPORTER: Both of them.

25 MR. KAAPANA: Kealii Kaapana.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning, gentlemen.

2 MR. VINCENT: Good morning, members of the board.

3 How are you?

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good. Tell us a little bit
5 about yourself and the intention with the license, please.

6 MR. VINCENT: Okay. So R3 Risk is an
7 (indiscernible) crisis response company. We work primarily in
8 the fields of security, rescue, medical, and training. We
9 work with NGOs, government, and the private sector. We've
10 been in business as a partner since January of this year, and
11 we are looking -- we work primarily with NGOs, and we are
12 looking to expand into the private sector, so we want to make
13 sure that we have proper licensure. We do everything by the
14 rules.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We appreciate you for that.

16 Board, are there any questions?

17 Hearing there are no questions, I'll entertain a
18 motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
20 motioning to approve R3 Risk, LLC a new corporate private
21 patrol officer license and that Mr. Gregory Vincent be awarded
22 his individual private patrol officer license and it be kept
23 in abeyance so that he may become a qualifying agent. Member
24 to be approved is Kealii Kaapana --

25 MR. KAAPANA: I'll take that.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- all subject to statutory
2 and regulatory requirements.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
4 have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
7 have a second. All in favor say aye.

8 (All present board members voted aye.)

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations, gentlemen.
10 Good luck to you.

11 MR. VINCENT: Thank you so much. Appreciate it.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item No. 36,
13 Concentric Advisors. Do we have David Loftus and Jeffrey
14 Baker here, Roderick Jones? Were you guys --

15 Are they up North?

16 MR. LOFTUS: Just David Loftus.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: We have Mr. Loftus up North.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you, sir. Please
19 tell us a little bit about yourself and the intentions with
20 the license.

21 MR. LOFTUS: Okay. My name is David Loftus,
22 California native, 30 years of local and federal law
23 enforcement, eight years in the security business after
24 retirement. Six of those years, I worked for Concentric
25 Advisors out of California. I've been living in Nevada for

1 the last four years, and Concentric asked if I would take on
2 the qualifying agent so that they could drum up business here
3 in Nevada, and that's what I'm here for.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. I have a question for
5 investigators. There was a couple of ones that had this, and
6 I meant to ask earlier where it said fingerprints
7 pause/negative in the red. I didn't know what that meant, but
8 there was a couple of them. I think all three of these
9 gentlemen had that in their background. Oh, Diaz.

10 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes. So those were we were
11 waiting on those fingerprints. We did get them back. They
12 are all negative, but I believe that was just to show that we
13 didn't have them yet and the board would be updated.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gotcha. Okay. All right. I
15 just wanted to make sure.

16 So board, any questions for Mr. Loftus?

17 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
18 entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, for
20 the record. I move that Concentric Advisors, Incorporated be
21 granted a new corporate private patrol officer license,
22 Mr. David P. Loftus be granted his individual private patrol
23 officer license, which will be placed in abeyance so that he
24 may become the qualifying agent. Corporate officers to be
25 approved are Jeffrey Baker and Roderick B. Jones. This is

1 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
3 have a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
6 have a second. All in favor say aye.

7 (All present board members voted aye.)

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Congratulations, sir.
9 Good luck to you.

10 Okay. Agenda Item No. 37, Chenega Naswik
11 International. Is that close?

12 MR. TAYLOR: Yeah. Chenega Naswik International.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

14 MR. TAYLOR: How are you doing? My name is Arthur
15 Taylor. I'll be joined remotely with Terry Nihart and Peter
16 Nosek.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Can I -- can I stop you right
18 there?

19 MR. TAYLOR: You can.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Just -- have you guys all been
21 sworn in?

22 MR. TAYLOR: I was sworn in here. They were trying
23 to connect.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So gentlemen, we you -- you
25 weren't sworn in, then? So I'm going to have counsel swear

1 you in.

2 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Please stand and raise your
3 right hand. Do you affirm your testimony today will be the
4 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

5 MR. NIHART: I do.

6 MR. NOSEK: I do.

7 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Please proceed.

9 MR. TAYLOR: Okay.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So tell us a little bit about
11 yourself and the intentions with the license.

12 MR. TAYLOR: So my name is Arthur Taylor. I'm born
13 and raised here in Nevada. I have over 20 years' security
14 experience. The corporation, the company is going to be
15 Chenega Naswik International. It is a subsidiary of Chenega
16 Corporation, an Alaskan native company. They specialize in
17 protective services, administration. They primarily work with
18 the government contracts, Homeland Security, missile defense,
19 so I'm applying for a qualifying agent. Terry Nihart and
20 Peter Nosek would be the corporate officers.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
22 questions?

23 Do we have all the fingerprints back, Investigator
24 Diaz?

25 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes, we do, and they were all

1 negative again.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Awesome.

3 Board, do we have any questions for any -- for this
4 group?

5 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
6 entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
8 to approve Chenega Naswik International, LLC a new corporate
9 private patrol officer license, approving Arthur Taylor his
10 private patrol officer license, and that it be placed in
11 abeyance so that he may become the qualifying agent. Members
12 to be approved Terry M. Nihart and Peter C. Nosek, all subject
13 to statutory and regulatory requirements.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
15 second?

16 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
18 second. All in favor say aye.

19 (All present board members voted aye.)

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Congratulations,
21 gentlemen. Good luck to you.

22 MR. TAYLOR: Thank you for your time.

23 MR. NIHART: Thank you very much.

24 MR. NOSEK: Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

1 Agenda Item No. 38, Michelle Bombard. Good morning.

2 MS. BOMBARD: Good morning.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I just -- I need to check in.

4 Have you guys been sworn in?

5 MS. BOMBARD: Yes.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Perfect. So please tell
7 us a little bit about yourself and the intention with the
8 license.

9 MS. BOMBARD: I've been in the security business for
10 about eight years, and was with the company for about six,
11 then changed to another company, and they were needing a QA,
12 so I thought I would try that. I pretty much just want to try
13 to make the company as best as I can and make sure they follow
14 all the regulations and legal aspects of it.

15 MR. BOMBARD: Leon Bombard, License No. 2646. I'm
16 here just for SPS, Specialized Protective Services. They
17 sent, I believe you guys have it, an affidavit saying that I
18 could represent them. I am the national president of
19 operations, but I'm not a corporate officer.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gotcha. Okay.

21 Board, are there any questions?

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
23 record. For Supervisory Investigator Swarthout, can you give
24 me an update on the -- excuse me -- on the accounts that came
25 up through TransUnion?

1 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: One -- one, I'm sorry, could
3 you give me the dates of these? I didn't see dates. Are they
4 recent? Are they old?

5 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Most of the accounts --
6 looking at it off the TransUnion, the earliest one that was
7 open that's for collections is 9 of '24, is when it was
8 opened. A lot of the other ones are 9 of 2020, it looks like,
9 of when they were opened.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

11 I don't know if it's Mrs. or Ms. Bombard, can you
12 give me an update of where you are at with your payment plans
13 on these?

14 MS. BOMBARD: I'm with a credit score debt solution.
15 They take \$217 out of me every month. They said it will take
16 them six months to get it fixed.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: And that was starting when?

18 MS. BOMBARD: Couple months ago.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. So about four months
20 left?

21 MS. BOMBARD: Yeah.

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

23 MS. BOMBARD: You're welcome.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And Investigator Swarthout, do
25 we have any evidence of the collections that she's --

1 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: When she first started
2 contacting them, she had provided us the contact for the one
3 that she was going through. I don't have the final signed --
4 signed one yet of her entering the agreement.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do you have -- could you provide
6 us with a copy of that afterwards?

7 MS. BOMBARD: Yes. I can resend it to him, because
8 I did send him the actual contract that I signed.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

10 MR. BOMBARD: For -- for the record, I would just
11 like to bring out the fact that the QA does not have any
12 contact with money brought in or payroll.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I'm completely familiar with
14 that. We understand --

15 MR. BOMBARD: I figured you were, but I figured I
16 better just say it for the record.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. Doesn't mean they can't
18 become compromised in other areas, so I just want to make
19 sure.

20 MR. BOMBARD: Yes, I understand.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

22 Any other questions from the board?

23 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
24 entertain a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move that

1 Michelle Bombard be approved for an individual private patrol
2 officer's license, and that that license be placed in abeyance
3 so that she may become the qualifying agent for Specialized
4 Protection Services, Incorporated, License No. 1902. This is
5 subject to all statutory and regulatory requirements.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
7 have a second?

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
9 I'll second the motion.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Investigator Swarthout?

11 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: I believe that license
12 number is a different company.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

14 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Do you have your license
15 card on you?

16 MR. BOMBARD: I'll give you the number.

17 MS. BOMBARD: It's 4276.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Is that a typo, then, on the --

19 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: I believe so.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So I think we have a
21 typo. The license number is 4276, if we could -- what do we
22 need, to redo the motion?

23 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Yes.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So if we could redo the
25 motion, we have a typo in the -- in the --

1 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick again -- this
2 is Bezick again. I move that we approve Michelle Bombard for
3 an individual private patrol officer's license, and that that
4 license be placed in abeyance so that she may become the
5 qualifying agent for Specialized Protective Services,
6 License No. 4276. This is subject to all statutory and
7 regulatory requirements.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez seconding
9 the motion.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
11 have a second. All in favor say aye.

12 (All present board members voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
14 Congratulations. Good luck to you.

15 MS. BOMBARD: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 39, Full Force
17 Services. Is Mr. Andre Johnson here?

18 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, ma'am. I'm here.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning.

20 MR. JOHNSON: I'd rather stand. I'm just kind of
21 tall; is that okay?

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That's fine.

23 MR. JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And you were sworn in?

25 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, ma'am.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Please tell us a little
2 bit about yourself and the reason for the license.

3 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, ma'am. So my name is Andre
4 Johnson. I'm a new owner of Full Force Protection Services.
5 I want to lead by integrity and let you guys know I did have
6 an unlicensed activity when I moved out here doing unlicensed
7 work. I paid that fine, I think, two or three years ago.

8 Since then, I've been growing and maturing in this
9 field, this scope of work. I'm now head director of a top
10 medical firm in Las Vegas known as New Horizons Medical
11 Solutions, so I cover over 100 employees doing surveillance
12 and foot patrol throughout that company.

13 My whole plan for this business is just to protect
14 and serve and be a pillar of this community and show what
15 organization and integrity looks like, and I just plan on
16 growing and being somebody that can be counted on and
17 accountable.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Appreciate that.

19 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Johnson?

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
21 for the record. Mr. Johnson, what exactly was the unlicensed
22 activity for?

23 MR. JOHNSON: I think it was doing bodyguard work
24 or -- I think it was marketing on social media. Since that
25 point, I haven't done that. I've stayed away from those

1 activities and just been really focusing on getting my hours
2 completed, which I have, and just growing in that aspect and
3 just maturing and understanding that, you know, there is --
4 there is rules that you have to abide by, and now I know those
5 rules. And I try to teach people getting into this that it's
6 better off doing it the right way than doing it the wrong way.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

8 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you, ma'am.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
10 record. Sir, in looking at the background report we've been
11 provided, the longest at any job that you've got listed here
12 for qualifications is about three years. Most are a year or
13 shorter. Can you give me an idea why that is?

14 MR. JOHNSON: Under a year short, as in I've just
15 been working at New Horizons Medical Solutions, working there
16 under salary. So basically I've been putting in a lot of
17 hours there and just making sure that we have documentation of
18 those hours that have been provided to the board and to the
19 investigators showing that work I've done.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. But what I was talking
21 about is a lot of these jobs that you've held that, you know,
22 submitted for qualification on this are a year or less.
23 Hopefully you're not going to do that with your own business,
24 be in business for a year and bail out.

25 MR. JOHNSON: No, sir. I just --

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm just wondering --

2 MR. JOHNSON: Sorry.

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: -- why you've left all these --
4 these businesses in such a short period of time.

5 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, sir. So I think there's just
6 been times in my life where there was times to progress and
7 life has given me those opportunities. It's never been from
8 being fired or being uncomplacent or quitting. It's just been
9 life has given me some journeys and avenues, and I've just
10 been taking them, you know, full swing with that, sir.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, sir.

12 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you, sir.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any further
14 questions?

15 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
16 entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
18 motioning to approve Full Force Protection Services, LLC, DBA
19 Full Force Protection Services, a new corporate private patrol
20 officer license, approving Andre M. Johnson for an individual
21 private patrol license, and that -- officer license, and that
22 it be kept in abeyance so that he may become the qualifying
23 agent. Member to be approved is Andre M. Johnson, all subject
24 to statutory and regulatory requirements.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we

1 have a second?

2 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
4 have a second. All in favor say aye.

5 (All present board members voted aye.)

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Congratulations.
7 Good luck to you, sir.

8 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And I believe you were the one
10 who brought us the donuts. I'm sorry.

11 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, ma'am. Enjoy them. It's okay.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Now we're in the
14 repossess -- 40. I'm sorry. Number 40. Agenda Item No. 40,
15 Sequel Tour Solutions. Lloyd Nichols, are you here, sir?

16 MR. NICHOLS: That's me.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Please tell us a little about --
18 were you -- were you sworn in?

19 MR. NICHOLS: Yes, I was.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Please tell us a little
21 bit about yourself and the intentions with the license.

22 MR. NICHOLS: Absolutely. My name is Lloyd Nichols.
23 I'm owner and CEO of Sequel Tour Solutions. Started the
24 business in 1999, been in the business of security since '88.
25 Reason for the business is we have a lot of clients that are

1 coming in and out of Vegas routinely. Our goal is to be
2 licensed so we can actually represent our clients inside the
3 state, and any special programs that we get brought into will
4 be within the State guidelines, as well.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
6 questions?

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: My apologies. This is Board
8 Member Cortez, for the record. Mr. Nichols, could you talk to
9 me a little bit about your unlicensed activity that you were
10 cited for in November of last year and December of last year?

11 MR. NICHOLS: Yeah. One of our clients was opening
12 up the Sphere, and we were in -- we were in the master
13 account. When we started opening that up, we learned that we
14 had to be licensed to represent that, but when we got brought
15 in from the producer, we were all paid directly by that
16 account, so the two agreements were done prior to us getting
17 involved. So usually when these events happen, the two
18 bookers and brokers do the agreements, and we are supposed to
19 be grandfathered into that main account.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So like the -- you're calling
22 them bookers and brokers, like the event planners-type thing?

23 MR. NICHOLS: Yeah.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are they familiar now that
25 they -- they can't do that without making sure that the team

1 that -- the security team they bring in is licensed?

2 MR. NICHOLS: Yes.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And then, you know,
4 you're not from here. What's the intention with actually
5 having someone, you know, local, a resident handle when you
6 have business --

7 MR. NICHOLS: They're -- to be a registered agent,
8 yeah. That's the next step.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So you'll have -- you'll
10 employ somebody here that -- okay. Gotcha.

11 MR. NICHOLS: Yeah.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
13 questions?

14 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
15 entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez, for the
17 record, motioning to approve Sequel Tour Solutions, LLC a new
18 corporate private patrol officer license, approving Lloyd S.
19 Nichols for an individual private patrol officer license, and
20 that it be kept in abeyance so that he may become the
21 qualifying agent. Member to be approved is Lloyd S. Nichols,
22 all subject to statutory and regulatory requirements.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
24 second?

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
2 second. All in favor say aye.

3 (All present board members voted aye.)

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes. Good luck
5 to you, sir.

6 MR. NICHOLS: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations.

8 Okay. Now agenda for reposessor, Agenda
9 Item No. 41. Do we have Jimmy M. Thacker here? Good morning.

10 MR. THACKER: Good morning.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Were you sworn in originally?

12 MR. THACKER: Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Please tell us a little bit
14 about yourself and the intention with the license.

15 MR. THACKER: I moved to Las Vegas around 20 years
16 ago. I've been working with Camping Companies, doing
17 repossessions for the last 18. The current qualifying agent
18 for Camping Companies is hoping to retire soon, so I'll be
19 taking his spot as the agent.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, do we have any
21 questions for Mr. Thacker?

22 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
23 motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
25 motioning to approve Jimmy M. Thacker an individual

1 reposessor license, and that the license be kept in abeyance
2 so he may become the qualifying agent for The Camping
3 Companies, Inc., License No. 492, all subject to statutory and
4 regulatory requirements.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
6 have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
9 have a second. All in favor say aye.

10 (All present board members voted aye.)

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes. Thank
12 you. Congratulations. Good luck to you, sir.

13 MR. THACKER: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Just notified that Agenda
15 Item No. 42, Clayton Bailey, has postponed.

16 Okay. Moving on to Agenda Item No. 43, Anthony
17 Sanchez-Martinez. Are you here, sir?

18 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Yes, ma'am.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And just because people
20 are coming and going, were you sworn in?

21 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Yes, ma'am.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So please tell us a
23 little bit about yourself and the intentions with the license.

24 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: My name is Anthony
25 Sanchez-Martinez. I'm 33 years old, born and raised in

1 Las Vegas. I'm here today applying for a private
2 investigations license because investigations is -- is my
3 strength and passion. I think it's -- the field is about
4 finding the truth and protecting people. And I served nearly
5 ten years in law enforcement, mostly as a narcotics detective,
6 and then a little bit of patrol work and sergeant work, which
7 has helped me and guided me through -- through this --
8 essentially guided me through -- through -- through a skill
9 set that I think is meant for this field.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

11 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Martinez?

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
13 record. Mr. Martinez, can you explain the reason why you left
14 the Henderson Police Department?

15 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Yes, sir. So I ended up
16 being terminated after an internal investigation. That --
17 prior to that investigation, there was a lot of internal and
18 external factors that were going on in my life through a
19 separation in my marriage, and then I was also involved in an
20 officer-involved shooting, which I know now has kind of
21 affected and impaired my decision-making during that time and
22 led to -- to what that investigation became.

23 What I can say is -- is since that investigation,
24 I've done a lot of self-reflection. I've continued my
25 education and earned my master's in public administration with

1 an emphasis on criminal justice, and then currently I'm
2 serving as a team lead for an emergency response team, but
3 that experience really humbled me. It refocused my mindset,
4 and it's -- it's -- it's led me to -- to be more self-aware
5 and present.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, sir.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
8 Mr. Sanchez-Martinez, what's your -- what do you
9 plan to do with your private investigator license?

10 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: There's -- I know there's a
11 broad generalization with it. I haven't really thought about
12 exactly what -- what side I want to get into. I do have
13 connections with the legal professional side where I can maybe
14 assist certain legal professions, or -- you know, either get
15 into an individualized where I can find truth and -- and help
16 people out, but I haven't really decided exactly what field I
17 want to get into. I just know that the skill set that I bring
18 is meant for this field. I'm hoping, you know, I can kind of
19 figure it out. I know there's the association with the
20 private investigation board that I'd like to join and kind of
21 get some tips and advice on -- on what path would be best for
22 me.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And the reason why I'm
24 asking is because, speaking of your skill sets, in regards to
25 your -- the background that we were provided, in the incident

1 that unfortunately ultimately led to your termination of
2 Henderson -- with Henderson, is it my understanding that you
3 went ahead and purchased some GPS blockers in order to conduct
4 an affair that you were engaged in?

5 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Yes, ma'am. So at the time,
6 we have a mapping -- we have a mapping in our computers that
7 kind of locate us, and so it was -- the time that it was
8 utilized is when I was on lunch break so members of the squad
9 wouldn't know that -- that I was with a certain officer at
10 that time. That was the only time that they had been used.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. And I'm hoping
12 you understand why I do have concerns, because if you were
13 already on duty conducting this kind of behavior, my concern
14 is are you going to continue with this behavior. I appreciate
15 your testimony and you said that you have taken some
16 self-reflection time, however, it is concerning, because
17 ultimately we are now giving you a license to go ahead and
18 proceed to do something that I hope that you learned from your
19 mistake, but we're taking the chance that possibly not.

20 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Of course.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: If that makes sense.

22 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: No, that's -- that's a
23 completely fair assumption, and I understand that, as well. I
24 continue to better myself. I -- I seek a therapist once a
25 month, and I -- I -- ways to be able to cope with some of

1 the -- at the time, again, it's -- there was a lot of
2 internal/external factors that led and impaired my
3 decision-making that I know now -- I take full accountability
4 for and I know that my actions were wrong. And since then,
5 I've had a spotless record within the corporation that I am
6 now, and I know that I -- I truly know that that was a mistake
7 that I did. That won't happen again.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And where are you at as far as
9 your ability to maintain objective regardless of gender? And
10 I'll elaborate. I have a --

11 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Yes.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- little information where
13 you were rather -- you were expressing favoritism towards the
14 female staffers over male staffers.

15 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Yes, and that's a little bit
16 of black and white as far as context. There's a lot of gray
17 in context that was left out. My squad consisted of six
18 females and five males. Three males that had alleged that,
19 there was constant issues with them prior to even becoming
20 their supervisor, and I had no other issues with those two
21 males. That was an allegation that was brought forward, but
22 ultimately I was -- I was never found -- there was no just
23 cause for that allegation. So I truly know the professional
24 batteries that are set forth and I continue to uphold that.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you for

1 your honesty.

2 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Thank you, ma'am.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What are you doing now for work?

4 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Currently in corporate
5 security. We -- I'm a team leader for an emergency response
6 team, so our main focus is to respond to like active assailant
7 or any like violent weapon calls.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And how long you been with them?

9 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Coming up to a year, ma'am.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any further questions?

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
12 record. Sir, you said that your current position, you're
13 responding to active assailant, armed conflict. Are you doing
14 that in conjunction with Las Vegas Metro or other departments?

15 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: No, sir. that's with MGM
16 Resorts.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. So just within MGM
18 Resorts?

19 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Correct. Yes, sir.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any further questions?

22 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
23 entertain a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move that
25 we grant Anthony Sanchez-Martinez an individual private

1 patrol -- private investigator license. This is subject to
2 all statutory and regulatory requirements.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
4 have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
6 I'm going to second the motion.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
8 have a second. All in favor say aye.

9 Aye.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Aye.

11 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Aye.

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Nay.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All apposed?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Nay. Board Member Brown. Nay.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So it's three to one. So it
16 still passes, right?

17 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Yes.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It passes. I think, you know,
19 we're hesitant because of your background.

20 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Of course.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And I think we're all hoping,
22 which is not a plan, but we're all hoping that you will use
23 good judgment and continue with your -- with your recovery so
24 that, you know, we're not embarrassed. Appreciate it --

25 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Just to say something

1 about -- I'm not asking about your leniency, I'm just asking
2 for an opportunity to prove myself, and I can assure you that
3 I'll be upholding that at this point.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Appreciate it. All right.
5 Congratulations. Good luck to you.

6 MR. SANCHEZ-MARTINEZ: Thank you, ma'am.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 44, Expert
8 Investigations, Alan Stancombe.

9 MR. STANCOMBE: Stancombe.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Stancombe?

11 MR. STANCOMBE: Yes. I've been sworn in.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

13 MR. STANCOMBE: Yeah.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So sir, tell us a little bit
15 about yourself and the intention with the license.

16 MR. STANCOMBE: Okay. I'm the oldest person here, I
17 think, 65 years of age. I have a lot of experience. I'm an
18 Air Force veteran --

19 (Reporter interjection.)

20 MR. STANCOMBE: I'm sorry, Court Reporter.

21 I've been in law enforcement from the Air Force to
22 San Francisco Police Department, and I've been a licensed
23 private investigator in California since '87. I'm currently
24 still active in California, and I hold a bachelor's degree and
25 a juris doctorate, law degree, as well. And my purpose of

1 getting licensing here is I was retired, and then I got bored,
2 talked to a bunch of attorneys that need help, a good private
3 investigator that has a lot of experience, and that's what my
4 plan is. So I've got clients lined up for a lot of criminal
5 defense, family law kind of things.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any questions for
7 Mr. Stancombe?

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
9 for the record. Mr. Stancombe, could you tell me a little
10 information regarding the battery case of last year?

11 MR. STANCOMBE: Yes. I had a wild Karen that
12 assaulted me in a laundry room.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: You had a what?

14 MR. STANCOMBE: A wild Karen, elderly lady that
15 bodychecked me, and what do you do with that? She filed a
16 complaint against me. There was no action taken. It was
17 dismissed.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

19 MR. STANCOMBE: So I don't go to public laundromats
20 anymore to wash comforters.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So I just -- Investigator
22 Blackmore, the other arrests were disclosed?

23 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Correct. All arrests were
24 disclosed.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And we are positive or

1 sure that the one in 2024 has been cleared, there was
2 nothing --

3 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Correct. I have court
4 documents saying it was dismissed.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any further
6 questions for Mr. Stancombe?

7 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick.

8 Mr. Stancombe, why did -- why did this wild Karen
9 bodycheck you?

10 MR. STANCOMBE: I was taking clothes out of the
11 laundry that had been sitting there, and she came around and
12 said, "F this, F that," and bodychecked me. She's 73 years of
13 age, and she just went crazy. She was on antidepressants,
14 according to some neighbors. So I hired a criminal defense
15 lawyer who took care of it for me. She just went crazy on me.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

17 If you can elaborate, so then why did you get
18 charged with battery? Because your testimony sounds like she
19 battered you.

20 MR. STANCOMBE: Well, there's always two -- being a
21 cop for so many years and investigation work, there's two
22 sides to the story. She said one thing and I refuted that.
23 It didn't happen. I didn't assault her. I --

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Was she cited, as well?

25 MR. STANCOMBE: No, but I filed -- I sued her in

1 court and won. I have a judgment against her.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Civil suit?

3 MR. STANCOMBE: Yes.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Investigator Blackmore, do you
5 have information regarding that court case?

6 MR. STANCOMBE: It was small claims.

7 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yeah. This is Investigator
8 Blackmore, for the record. So it looks like he went before
9 the court in February, and then he received a judgment. I
10 don't have a copy of that judgment.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any further questions?

12 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
13 entertain a motion.

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I
15 move that we deny Expert Investigations, LLC a new corporate
16 private investigator license and Mr. Alan Stancombe his
17 individual private investigators license based on criminal
18 history, history as a law enforcement officer, and integrity
19 issues.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
21 second?

22 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion, we have
24 a second. All in favor say aye.

25 (All present board members voted aye.)

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So unfortunately, your
2 motion -- or your request is not going to pass. You do have
3 an opportunity to come before and appeal or a -- you have an
4 opportunity to reapply.

5 Is it for the next meeting? I'm sorry. Could
6 you --

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yeah. Executive
8 Director Saladino, for the record. For licensing, you do have
9 the opportunity to reapply. There is no statutory limitations
10 on -- or you don't have to wait a year. You are able to apply
11 at the next scheduled board meeting, which we're already set
12 up for the December meeting, so you would have to apply for
13 the March 2026 one.

14 MR. STANCOMBE: Will it -- will it -- would it be
15 the same board here?

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yes.

18 MR. STANCOMBE: And do I have the right to file an
19 action in the courts?

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Oh, most definitely.

21 MR. STANCOMBE: Okay.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you, sir.

23 Okay. Next agenda item is 45. Agenda Item No. 45
24 would be the next agenda item. That has been postponed, and
25 so the next agenda item would be Agenda Item No. 46, Garrett

1 Dobbins.

2 Good morning, sir.

3 MR. DOBBINS: Good morning, ma'am.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: How are you?

5 MR. DOBBINS: I'm doing good. How are you guys
6 doing?

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good. Please tell us a little
8 bit about yourself and the intentions with the -- with your
9 being an instructor.

10 MR. DOBBINS: My name is Garrett Dobbins. I've
11 been -- I moved to Nevada from Reno since 2009 of July.
12 Background history is mostly security, 14 years in security;
13 five and a half years for law enforcement and two years for
14 executive protection. So pretty much the reason why I went
15 from applying for a CFI instructor, because most of my
16 background is mostly for teaching, whether it's going to be
17 takedowns or firearms or anything to do with the job of
18 security or in the law enforcement field.

19 I've been asked by one of -- CFI instructor Eric
20 Kelly to go under his wings so he can -- I can help him teach
21 throughout the Nevada. This has been my passion. I have good
22 passion and talent for teaching, so we went through it and I
23 finally applied, but got denied. That's why I'm here now,
24 to -- to get the -- to hopefully get the CFI instructor, you
25 know, license.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right. Board, are
2 there any questions for Mr. Dobbins?

3 And just as a clarification, this is an instructor
4 appeal.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
6 record. Mr. Dobbins, based on the background report, you had
7 some pretty serious charges levied against you by LVMPD, which
8 resulted in your leaving the department, correct?

9 MR. DOBBINS: That's correct, sir.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board Member Brown, hang on one
11 second.

12 I'm sorry. Sir, were you sworn in?

13 MR. DOBBINS: No.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You weren't. Okay. Sorry.
15 We're going to have to swear you in.

16 MR. DOBBINS: Okay.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sorry about that.

18 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Can you please stand and raise
19 your right hand? Do you affirm your testimony today will be
20 the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

21 MR. DOBBINS: Yes.

22 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sorry about that, gentlemen.
24 Please go ahead.

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. -- this is Board Member

1 Brown again, for the record. Mr. Dobbins, have you -- you may
2 not agree with the charges that were filed against you, but
3 have you, you know, taken responsibility for those now?

4 MR. DOBBINS: Yes, sir. I try to pretty much -- you
5 know, try to like -- just try to walk a straight line and make
6 sure everything is black and white now and no gray areas. I
7 mean, a lot of the stuff I got charged with, I had a clear
8 record, you know. Had my medal of honor during October 1st,
9 you know. I tried to like ask the department to like retrain
10 me or give me a second chance. That's pretty much what I'm
11 asking for now in front of the board, to be given a second
12 chance since I -- I have no criminal record or any -- like any
13 speeding ticket or -- I'm just trying to like move on with my
14 life, hopefully next career.

15 Definitely, you know, did a lot of reflecting, as
16 well, and just, you know, tried to do my best, you know, so I
17 can provide with my family and help out also my community,
18 which, you know, I still, miss so hopefully this will be the
19 second chance I can get to continue that -- or pursue that new
20 career.

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. You -- at the time of
22 all this, you were a field training officer training rookie
23 officers, essentially, in all of the policies that you
24 allegedly violated?

25 MR. DOBBINS: Yes, sir.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
3 further questions?

4 Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
5 entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I
7 move that we uphold the denial for Garrett Dobbins' certified
8 firearm instructor license due to a displayed clear lack of
9 integrity and professionalism. I don't believe that we can
10 trust him as a trainer, and there were dishonesty issues as
11 well as misuse of official computer systems.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
13 I am going to second the motion and add that my concern was
14 that you failed miserably as a field training officer, and
15 you're applying to be an instructor, so I also concur.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
17 second. All in favor say aye.

18 (All present board members voted aye.)

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So motion passes.
20 Unfortunately, you will not be awarded that certification.
21 Thank you. Good luck to you.

22 The next portion of the agenda is the registration
23 appeals. What time were they supposed to be, to come in? I'm
24 sorry.

25 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 10:30.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 10:30. Okay. So we're going to
2 take a quick ten-minute break, and then you guys -- we'll go
3 through that. We'll make sure that everybody is sworn in and
4 move forward. So ten minutes, please.

5 (Recess taken from 10:49 a.m. to 11:02 a.m.)

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Counsel, if you would,
7 please, I think we've got some new people.

8 If you haven't been sworn in before, please stand up
9 and we'll have you sworn in.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Stand up like right over here.
11 Counsel is going to swear you in. Just face the camera so --
12 there you go.

13 (Off-the-record discussion.)

14 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: All righty. Stephanie
15 Itkin-Goodman, for the record. For all of those who are going
16 to provide statements or testify in front of the board today,
17 could you please raise your right hand? Now, do you affirm
18 your testimony today will be the truth, the whole truth, and
19 nothing but the truth?

20 (Audience answers in the affirmative.)

21 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

23 We're on Agenda Item No. 47. Is there a Carey
24 Conner here?

25 MR. CONNER: Yes, ma'am.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning, sir. Thank you.

2 MR. CONNER: Good morning.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Cuevas, could you
4 please tell us why we're here for Mr. Carey [sic]?

5 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Investigator Cuevas, for
6 the record. The applicant was denied for his disclosed
7 weapons conviction from 2019. It was a misdemeanor for carry
8 concealed weapon without a permit. He did disclose all
9 arrests, was not made provisional, so not added to a roster,
10 and is here to appeal.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Fantastic. Are there any
12 questions for Mr. Conner?

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
14 record. Mr. Conner, can you explain the two arrests for me,
15 the one in 2015 for interfering with a public officer by
16 threat, force, or violence first?

17 MR. CONNER: Yes, sir. 2015, I was at a house
18 party. Police came. They had grabbed my girlfriend at the
19 time, her aunt, who was the -- the adult supervision for the
20 party, grabbed her out the house, and then was trying to
21 arrest her. When I came out to talk to the officer, he
22 pointed his gun and two more officers came. So it wasn't like
23 that, but because of me being young and listening to my dad,
24 it ended up like that, me going to -- taking the charge
25 instead of fighting it.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Were you underage at the time?

2 MR. CONNER: I had just turned 18.

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: And sir, would you explain for
4 me -- this is Board Member Brown again, for the record. Would
5 you explain for me the CCW without a permit from 2019?

6 MR. CONNER: Yes, sir. I had a -- I had a firearm.
7 I wasn't -- I wasn't privy to the gun laws in Vegas, so I
8 didn't have a permit -- I didn't have a holster for my gun, so
9 that's why they -- I ended up with that charge.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: So you were carrying it tucked
11 down in the waistband of your pants, something like that?

12 MR. CONNER: Yes, sir.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
16 for the record. Mr. Conner, have you obtained a CCW as of
17 now?

18 MR. CONNER: No, ma'am, I haven't. I haven't even
19 touched a gun.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And what are your intentions
21 with the work card?

22 MR. CONNER: I want to have a career in security,
23 and I do -- would like to in the future have a CCW to --
24 because I do want to better my -- I don't know how to say it.
25 I'm sorry.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Better your career?

2 MR. CONNER: Yes. My career.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Is there a potential employer
4 lined up?

5 MR. CONNER: Yes, ma'am.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: With who?

7 MR. CONNER: St. Mortiz [sic].

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Is that the --

9 MR. CONNER: They do HOA security.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Got it.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And you know that if you get a
12 CCW, that doesn't allow you to work as an armed officer,
13 right?

14 MR. CONNER: Yes, ma'am.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Perfect.

16 Okay. Board, any further questions?

17 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
18 entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
20 grant the work card based on full disclosure of arrest
21 history.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
23 have a second?

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We

1 have a second. All in favor say aye.

2 (All present board members voted aye.)

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations. You will get
4 your work card. The office will contact you probably tomorrow
5 to help you work through the rest of this, okay?

6 MR. CONNER: Okay.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then thank you for being --
8 disclosing all of the information on your application.

9 MR. CONNER: Thank you. Have a good one.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Take care. Have a good day.
11 Agenda Item No. 48, Teresa Tuua-Montgomery.

12 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: She postponed.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So Agenda 48 postponed.
14 Agenda Item No. 49, Mario Valerio.

15 MR. VALERIO: Good morning.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning, sir.

17 Investigator Cuevas, could you please tell us why
18 we're here for Mr. Valerio?

19 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. The applicant was denied
20 for his disclosed weapon conviction that was in 2024. It was
21 a misdemeanor for concealed firearm. He was sentenced to pay
22 a fine, forfeit the firearm and informal probation. This
23 arrest did not show up on his fingerprint report, as he was
24 issued a citation, but he was convicted of the misdemeanor.
25 He did disclose all arrests, was not made provisional and not

1 added to a roster, and wishes to appeal.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any questions for
3 Mr. Valerio.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

5 Mr. Valerio, what's the status of your probation? I
6 understand that it's informal, but what (indiscernible)?

7 MR. VALERIO: It was terminated one year after the
8 incident, so July 11, 2025.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What were your conditions of
10 probation?

11 MR. VALERIO: Pay a fine, get rid of the -- get rid
12 of the firearm. That's it.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you have to take any kind
14 of firearm safety courses?

15 MR. VALERIO: No.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What are your intentions with
17 the work card, should you be granted one?

18 MR. VALERIO: Just continue the best I can do. Hey,
19 I love it.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Do you have a job now?

21 MR. VALERIO: Yeah. So I'm actually a private
22 investigator for five states, and this one disqualified me for
23 that. I'm actually California, Arizona, Washington, Hawaii.
24 Alaska, as well, but they never send it out there.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And give me -- what

1 were the circumstances regarding that case, the concealed
2 firearm case?

3 MR. VALERIO: I just forgot it in my bag.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So give me the scenario. What
5 happened?

6 MR. VALERIO: Oh. What happened? All right. Two
7 days prior, I went out shooting. I live in the middle of
8 nowhere in San Jacinto, California, so I would just go out
9 shooting whenever. Got home, put the bag away, dogs went
10 crazy with my other neighbor's dogs. I went out, came back,
11 completely forgot to put it back. Two days later, get ready
12 to -- I went to Disneyland. Got the same bag, threw my water
13 bottles, threw my bag -- my sweater, threw it on, so the
14 weight is the same. Got to security point, my gun was there.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

16 MR. VALERIO: Pretty much I forgot to put it away
17 where it's supposed to go.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you.

19 MR. VALERIO: I never carry firearms. I never carry
20 guns. I just went out shooting, came back, and that's what
21 happened.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, again, for
24 the record. Mr. Valerio, did you say that you're a private
25 investigator here in Nevada?

1 MR. VALERIO: Not -- well, it's suspended right now
2 at this time, but I was.

3 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: So Investigator Cuevas, for
4 the record. Just for clarification, Mr. Valerio did have a
5 work card. He was in the process of renewing it. When he
6 renewed it, he listed the arrest. Because of the arrest, he
7 couldn't renew it at the time until he had -- so he had to
8 appeal, which is why we are here today. So he was aware, his
9 employer is aware for -- that he was, and he hasn't worked
10 here for --

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So he had a previous work
13 card, not a private investigator license?

14 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Correct.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So the applicant is
16 actually incorrect stating that he had a private investigator
17 license?

18 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Correct.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Got it.

20 So Mr. Valerio, you're aware that you didn't have a
21 private investigator license, you had a work card? There's a
22 difference.

23 MR. VALERIO: Okay. That's the first thing to me.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Just so we make sure
25 you understand what kind of license you're holding or not

1 holding.

2 MR. VALERIO: Okay.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Are there any other questions?

4 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
5 entertain a motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Yeah. This is Bezick. I move
7 we approve the work card for Mr. Valerio based on full
8 disclosure of criminal history.

9 MR. VALERIO: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
11 have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
14 have a second. All favor say aye.

15 (All present board members voted aye.)

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Sir, you're good
17 to go.

18 MR. VALERIO: Thank you all.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah.

20 MR. VALERIO: Will they contact me or --

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. So they will contact you,
22 probably tomorrow. And just as a reminder, this is a work
23 card to work underneath a company as a security officer, so --

24 MR. VALERIO: Because I work under a company,
25 correct?

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah.

2 MR. VALERIO: Okay. But if I wanted to do it by
3 myself, I have to go through here, right?

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. You have to get to the
5 business -- or get a license, so you have to go through a
6 whole nother process.

7 MR. VALERIO: I might be seeing you guys soon, then.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right.

9 MR. VALERIO: Thank you very much. I appreciate --

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. And work with the office.
11 They will help you through that, so don't do any of that by
12 yourself work until you work -- you speak with the office.

13 MR. VALERIO: Okay. So just wait for the call?

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir.

15 MR. VALERIO: All right. Thank you very much.

16 Appreciate it. Thank you, everybody. Have a great day, great
17 weekend.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You too.

19 Agenda Item No. 50, Jaheim Griffin.

20 MR. GRIFFIN: Good morning.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning.

22 Investigator Cuevas, could you tell us why we're
23 here for Mr. Griffin?

24 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Mr. Griffin was denied
25 for his weapon conviction in 2022, a gross misdemeanor for

1 possession of a dangerous weapon, was sentenced to community
2 service, firearm safety class, and 120 days jail, which were
3 suspended. He did disclose all arrests, was not made
4 provisional or added to a roster, and is here to appeal.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

6 Board, are there any questions for Mr. Griffin?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
8 record. Mr. Griffin, would you explain the 2024 battery? To
9 me, it sounded like it might have been a domestic violence
10 that was pled down.

11 MR. GRIFFIN: It was like you said, but it -- I
12 don't think it was -- I think that's why it was dropped down,
13 because it was like -- it was an argument over something that,
14 you know, turned into what it -- you know, what had happened,
15 but the only reason why I was charged was because it was at
16 her house or the property, I guess, what it was. But that's
17 kind of why it went down, is because she was trying to drop
18 the charges, but I guess the State like wanted to get
19 something out of me, so they just told me to take the
20 misdemeanor because that's kind of what it was, but I -- I
21 genuinely could have got it all dropped off, but I just...

22 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Okay. Thank you.

23 And explain the 2022 possession of a dangerous
24 weapon. What type of weapon are we talking about?

25 MR. GRIFFIN: It was just a firearm. That also got

1 dropped a little bit more because it was supposed to be a
2 concealed carry without a permit. I was young. I didn't know
3 the laws. I just thought I was doing what I was supposed to
4 do, protecting myself and, you know, acting under what I
5 thought was correct. I know now that that wasn't the right
6 way to do things. I haven't carried a firearm since then
7 until I'm able to actually be able to go and get my CCW and,
8 you know, do the proper steps to being able to protect myself.

9 But yeah, it was just a situation in which I was at
10 the wrong place at the wrong time. They got me, they were
11 like, Hey, this isn't the correct way to be doing this. We
12 have to give you something, and that's when they gave me, I
13 guess, possession of a weapon. It wasn't like violent or
14 anything like that.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you, sir.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Cuevas, just to --
17 for clarification on the 2024 charge, everything is done and
18 closed out on that?

19 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. I do have court
20 documents. Everything has been closed.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any further
22 questions for Mr. Griffin?

23 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
24 entertain a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I

1 move that we grant Jaheim Griffin his appeal so that he can
2 get his work card.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. Do
4 we have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
7 have a second. All in favor say aye.

8 (All present board members voted aye.)

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The motion passes. You will get
10 your work card. The office will contact you tomorrow or the
11 next day. Give them some time because we're doing everything
12 manually, and then you'll be able to move forward, okay?

13 MR. GRIFFIN: Thank you.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations. Good luck to
15 you, sir.

16 MR. GRIFFIN: Thank you so much.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 51, Miguel
18 Beckles.

19 MR. BECKLES: Good morning to the board.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning.

21 Investigator Cuevas, could you please tell us why
22 we're here for Mr. Beckles?

23 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Mr. Beckles was denied
24 for his weapons conviction. Most recent was in 2022, a
25 misdemeanor for manufacture, import short-barreled rifle. He

1 was sentenced to one year probation and 45 days jail. He also
2 has a 1996 misdemeanor charge for force assault with deadly
3 weapon, great bodily injury likely. He was sentenced to three
4 years probation and 90 days jail. And then he does also have
5 two other misdemeanor charges in 2007; one for battery spouse
6 and the other for assault.

7 None of the arrests were disclosed -- my apologies.
8 He did disclose two of four arrests, was made provisional
9 since the arrests that he disclosed were misdemeanor arrests
10 and were the two battery -- the 2007 for battery and assault.
11 He was not added to a company roster. Once fingerprint
12 results were received and showed the 2022 and 1996
13 convictions, he was denied, and is here to appeal.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, do we have any questions
15 for Mr. Beckles?

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
17 for the record. Mr. Beckles, why did you fail to disclose all
18 of your criminal history?

19 MR. BECKLES: A lot of it, I just had forgotten,
20 didn't have the dates. I just moved here from California, so
21 I didn't have all the paperwork in front of me.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Understood. Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any further questions?

24 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
25 entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
2 deny the work card for Mr. Beckles based on nondisclosure of
3 criminal history.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
5 have a second?

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
8 have a second. All in favor say aye.

9 (All present board members voted aye.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So in the State of Nevada, the
11 PILB license, it's very clear online and on the actual
12 paperwork. It says, Stop, do not move any further, make sure
13 you have -- you list of your arrests, and it puts all the
14 categories of, you know, probation, whatever -- whatever it
15 is. So by not disclosing those arrests, you know, we're
16 denying the -- the application. You do have an opportunity to
17 come back in one year to reapply, okay?

18 MR. BECKLES: Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank you. Have a
20 great day.

21 MR. BECKLES: You too.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 52, Sermetra
23 Moses. Sermetra Moses? Okay. We'll trail that agenda item.

24 Agenda Item No. 53, Erin Johnson. We'll go ahead
25 and trail Agenda Item No. 53.

1 Agenda Item No. 54, Stephonn Johnson.

2 MR. JOHNSON: I'm here.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning, sir.

4 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Cuevas, would you
6 please tell us why we're still here for Mr. Johnson?

7 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Mr. Johnson was denied
8 for his undisclosed weapon conviction in 2018. It was a
9 misdemeanor for CCW in vehicle. He was sentenced to three
10 years probation and a work program. He did disclose his 2019
11 misdemeanor -- he listed it as possession, but it was dropped
12 off to driving without a license, and he was sentenced to pay
13 a fine. He was made provisional but not added to a company
14 roster, and then was denied for his failure to disclose his
15 CCW in vehicle conviction and is here to appeal.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
17 questions for Mr. Johnson?

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
19 for the record. Good morning, Mr. Johnson.

20 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Is there a reason why you
22 failed to -- or what was the reason why you failed to disclose
23 all of your criminal history?

24 MR. JOHNSON: I believe it wasn't enough room, so I
25 just put, you know, what I felt to put down. I didn't know to

1 put down possession or anything specific, so...

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So when you say that you felt
3 you didn't have enough room, you mean room on the application
4 to list all of your history?

5 MR. JOHNSON: Like everything, yeah.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. When you say
7 "everything," is there more than -- are there more than two?

8 MR. JOHNSON: Oh, no, not at all.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So --

10 MR. JOHNSON: But I was thinking -- sorry.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Just so you're aware, the
12 application that you filled out has at least five spaces. And
13 then if additional spaces were needed, you were to request or
14 go ahead and add that. So I just want to make sure that it's
15 your testimony that there wasn't enough room even though
16 there's five options -- or five preset areas where you can
17 list your criminal history, and yet you only have two.

18 MR. JOHNSON: Mm-hmm. So what I was thinking was
19 like all the warrants and everything I've done, so I was like
20 where I'm to put in the -- you know.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Okay. Thank you.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any further questions?

23 Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
24 entertain a motion.

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, for

1 the record. I move that we deny the appeal for Mr. Stephonn
2 Johnson for failure to disclose.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
4 have a second?

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez. Are we
6 denying the appeal or are we upholding the appeal?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Sorry if I spoke wrong. This
8 is Board Member Brown again. I move that we uphold -- we
9 uphold the denial for Stephonn Johnson.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: There we go. Okay.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez seconds
12 the motion, failure to disclose all criminal history.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
14 have a second. All in favor say aye.

15 (All present board members voted aye.)

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So unfortunately, at this time
17 you won't get your license. You can reapply in a year.
18 Please contact the board and they will -- or the office. They
19 will help you fill out the application.

20 MR. JOHNSON: Appreciate it.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank you.
22 Adrian Tyler -- Agenda Item No. 55, Adrian Taylor.

23 MR. TAYLOR: I'm here.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning, sir.

25 MR. TAYLOR: Good morning.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Cuevas, why are --
2 could you please tell us why we're here for Mr. Taylor?

3 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Mr. Taylor was denied
4 for his felony and weapons conviction. It was 2009 felony for
5 conspiracy to sell or possess with intent to sell a
6 hallucinogen. He was sentenced to two years probation, 60
7 days jail. 18 months of the jail sentence was suspended. And
8 he has a 2008 misdemeanor for criminal use of weapon. He was
9 sentenced to pay a fine. He has a 2014 misdemeanor for use or
10 possess drug paraphernalia, sentenced to 12 months probation
11 and 12 months suspended. The applicant was made provisional,
12 not added to a company roster, and he does wish to appeal
13 today.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any questions for
15 Mr. Taylor?

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
17 Good morning, Mr. Taylor. Is there a reason why you failed to
18 disclose your criminal history?

19 MR. TAYLOR: I had completely misunderstood the way
20 that it was put together. All my prior convictions are from
21 another state. They're all out in Kansas, so I haven't been
22 in trouble with anything in the State of Nevada, so I was just
23 under my impression that most of my felony convictions and
24 everything that I had took place didn't have any legal
25 precedence for the State of Nevada when I actually applied for

1 the license.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Just to be clear, did
3 you fill out the application on your own?

4 MR. TAYLOR: Yes.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So -- and I'm just
6 going to show you for reference, on the application, there's
7 this one page that has a big old stop sign, and it does
8 include to list all arrests, citations, order to appear in
9 court, and all felony, gross misdemeanor, and misdemeanor
10 charges, regardless of how long ago the incident occurred,
11 whether it was in another state or county, even if it was
12 dismissed under the California PCU, et cetera.

13 So I just want to make sure in the event that you do
14 want to reapply, that you stop, go slow, and read everything
15 listed under the application requirements, okay?

16 MR. TAYLOR: Yes. Definitely. I kind of was -- I
17 had already came into the office -- apologize. I had already
18 came into the office and had attempted to fill out the
19 application there, and when I originally got denied and I seen
20 that it was online, I came down, spoke directly, went in the
21 back and we had an actual one-on-one conversation on where I
22 went wrong at with filling out the application. And I was
23 told that the only thing I could do is if I didn't want to
24 mess up any further ability to, that I necessarily had to be
25 here to appear and actually explain the situation.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. All right. Thank
2 you.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any further
4 questions?

5 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
6 entertain a motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
8 deny the work card for Mr. Taylor based on nondisclosure of
9 criminal history.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
11 have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
14 have a second. All in favor say aye.

15 (All present board members voted aye.)

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So motion passes. Again,
17 we have people that come back all the time, and so it -- we
18 would love to see you come back. Again, work with the office,
19 make sure you disclose everything, and we can go from there.

20 MR. TAYLOR: What do I actually need to do going
21 forward from here?

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Just -- you can reapply in one
23 year, and then when you go through the application, like
24 Counsel Cortez said, you just make sure that you list
25 everything. If you have anything new, make sure you list

1 that, and then you would go -- your application would go
2 through the process. The office is really good at helping, so
3 definitely engage those guys in a conversation.

4 MR. TAYLOR: Okay.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Awesome. Thank you.

6 MR. TAYLOR: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 56, Corey James.

8 Mr. James? Okay. We'll trail.

9 Agenda Item No. 57, Anthony Simpson.

10 MR. SIMPSON: Here.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Hello. Were you sworn in, sir?

12 MR. SIMPSON: Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Investigator Cuevas,
14 could you tell us why we're here for Mr. Simpson?

15 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. Mr. Simpson was denied
16 for his felony conviction in 2008 for grand theft from person.
17 He was sentenced to 24 months probation and 105 days jail. He
18 also has a 2024 felony, domestic battery, strangulation. This
19 case was dismissed. A 2022 misdemeanor, destroy property of
20 another, was sentenced to one year stay out of trouble, pay
21 restitution, and impulse control counseling. The original
22 charge for that 2022 arrest was felony home invasion, but it
23 was dropped down to the misdemeanor.

24 And then he has a 2021 felony for possession
25 schedule I or II controlled substance and possession to sell

1 schedule I or II GHB. That case was dismissed.

2 The applicant did originally when he first applied
3 not disclose his arrest. When we ran our initial background
4 check, he was contacted by one of the investigators to
5 disclose the arrest that did appear, so he was given the
6 opportunity. He then went ahead and listed everything,
7 including the 2008 felony; however, that one, he listed as a
8 misdemeanor. Because it was in California, they did issue the
9 provisional. He was added to Safe Management of Nevada, LLC's
10 roster. Once the fingerprint results were received, the
11 conviction actually showed as a felony, and now he is here to
12 appeal.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So just so I understand,
14 he originally noted all of his -- or he originally did not
15 note all his convictions on the application, he was brought
16 in, they had a conversation, he did list them, but he misled
17 the listing from felony to -- from misdemeanor to felony?

18 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Correct. Yes.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so is this a -- a --
20 is he reappearing from a previous board?

21 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: No.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay.

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Madam Chair, Executive
24 Director Saladino, for the record. So when we had initially
25 ran this individual's background, we would see the Nevada

1 cases.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So the Nevada cases,
4 yes, they show felonies, but they were dismissed. We see a
5 misdemeanor -- or a felony that was reduced to a misdemeanor,
6 and then we see another felony that was dismissed. So the
7 severity of the arrests, you know, would warrant us to call
8 and say, Hey, we're doing your background, we see these, can
9 you list these out for us on your application? Because
10 they're dismissed, we know we still are able to issue the work
11 card, we just want them to disclose it, you know. Because
12 they were dismissed, again, we want to get individuals to
13 work.

14 By the individual providing the information about
15 the California case, we can't see it. We see this stuff in
16 Nevada, we take them at their word to get them to work, so he
17 says it's not a felony, it's a misdemeanor, we get him to
18 work, fingerprints come back, now it's a felony, so that's
19 how -- that's how that comes together.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Is that -- is that what we do
21 with all the applicants, we bring them back and have a
22 conversation with them?

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: For the most part, the
24 ones where we know we can issue the work card, those are the
25 ones that we are working with, because again, we're trying to

1 get folks to work. We know it's dismissed, they don't have a
2 conviction, there's nothing that's going to keep them getting
3 the work card, as opposed to, you know, we have three
4 dismissals, we bring them before the board for failure to
5 disclose, you know, they wouldn't be able to work had they
6 just disclosed it, so we give them the opportunity. We call
7 and say, Hey, can you put these -- you know, come fill out
8 your application with the arrest history. We don't have any
9 grounds to really dismiss -- or deny them because they've been
10 dismissed.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
12 questions for Mr. Simpson?

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
14 for the record. Mr. Simpson so just out of curiosity, why did
15 you initially fail to disclose your history?

16 MR. SIMPSON: I think -- I think I --

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Hang on one second.

18 Whoever is on the line, can I ask you to either mute
19 your phone? We're getting some background noise.

20 Go ahead. Thank you.

21 MR. SIMPSON: I think I was just confused on the
22 application until I did give -- I think I spoke to an
23 investigator that it has to be everything, so that's when I
24 had made my second sheet, because I had to fill out two forms,
25 so I -- I was just unaware of everything.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Investigator Cuevas,
2 just to be clear, did he not list any of his history or just
3 one or two?

4 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: So when he first applied, he
5 didn't list anything.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Any of it, until he was -- had
7 a conversation?

8 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So this is more of a
10 comment. I have an issue with that already because as you
11 previously heard, people are getting denied because they
12 failed to disclose their history. Your situation happens to
13 be a little different, so you were given an opportunity there.

14 Second question is, talk to me about your 2024
15 domestic battery by strangulation case.

16 MR. SIMPSON: Yeah. I was dealing with a female and
17 it kind of was like a -- a playing act that turned serious,
18 and then she just added extra to it.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Talk to me about your
20 2022 destroy property of another under \$250.

21 MR. SIMPSON: The destroy of property, yes, that is
22 when I had kicked someone's door down, and then that was just
23 it. I didn't enter it, I just kicked the door.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Was it someone that you knew?

25 MR. SIMPSON: Yeah.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. What were the
2 circumstances behind it? Give me a little more information.

3 MR. SIMPSON: Like -- like meaning like what
4 happened afterwards or --

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What happened that led you to
6 go kick in this individual's door?

7 MR. SIMPSON: Oh. This person didn't have a key,
8 and I couldn't fit inside the -- their window, so me, being a
9 man, she being a woman, cannot kick the door down just for
10 her, she can actually get in, so that's what I did.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And did you attend your
12 classes?

13 MR. SIMPSON: Absolutely.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Why did you list your felony
16 down as a misdemeanor?

17 MR. SIMPSON: Which one?

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: 2008 grand theft from a
19 person.

20 MR. SIMPSON: Okay. So from my understanding from
21 that long ago, I thought that since it got dropped to a
22 misdemeanor, that it's a misdemeanor. I didn't think that it
23 was a felony.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But is it listed in the court
25 documents as a felony?

1 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah.

3 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: So on the fingerprint report,
4 it showed as a felony. So it never shows through fingerprint
5 reports that it was ever reduced.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right. And you were -- so you
7 were convicted of a felony?

8 MR. SIMPSON: See, my understanding, it was dropped
9 to a misdemeanor, so that's why I put a misdemeanor.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
11 again, for the record. Tell me the circumstances regarding
12 that case. It was grand theft from a person. What happened?

13 MR. SIMPSON: And this was in 2008, correct?

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct. You were sentenced
15 to 24 months of probation.

16 MR. SIMPSON: I remember that I didn't have nothing
17 to do with the situation. I basically just didn't say
18 nothing, just didn't tell, and just took the deal.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So you took two years of
20 probation and 105 days of jail for having nothing to do with
21 the situation?

22 MR. SIMPSON: Correct. Absolutely.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Do you have any further
24 questions?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I do not.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any further
2 questions?

3 Okay. With no further questions, I'll entertain a
4 motion.

5 Oh, you guys are on mute.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: We haven't said anything, but
7 this is Board Member Brown, for the record. I move that we
8 uphold the denial of Anthony Simpson's appeal based on the
9 initial failure to disclose. I have issue with the fact that
10 we're setting a precedent here of bringing people in and
11 allowing them to change things.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: The --

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Go ahead.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
16 I'm going to second the motion, also include time and
17 distance. We have cases from 2024 and 2022.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
19 have a second. All in favor say aye.

20 (All present board members voted aye.)

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay. So unfortunately,
22 at this time we're not going to be able to approve your --
23 your work card. You do have an opportunity to return in one
24 year. Again, you can work with the office to make sure that
25 your application is thorough and complete. I need you to

1 disclose or make sure that everything on your arrest record is
2 in your actual application, okay?

3 MR. SIMPSON: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Have a good day.

5 Agenda Item No. -- was that 57? Yes.

6 Agenda Item No. 58, Tyshon Cornish. Tyshon Cornish.
7 Mr. Cornish? Okay. We'll trail.

8 Agenda Item No. 59, Shadonna Brown. Ms. Brown?
9 Okay. We'll trail.

10 Agenda Item No. 60, Brandon Gibson. Mr. Gibson?
11 We'll trail.

12 Agenda Item No. 61, Richard Figueroa. Good morning,
13 sir.

14 MR. FIGUEROA: Good morning.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning. Please have a
16 seat.

17 MR. FIGUEROA: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Investigator Blackmore,
19 could you tell us why we're here for Mr. Figueroa?

20 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Investigator
21 Blackmore, for the record. Mr. Figueroa was denied for
22 failure to disclose. There was a 1990 felony criminal
23 possession of a controlled substance in the 4th degree from
24 New York. There was no disposition per the fingerprint
25 report. I did reach out requesting court documentation, but

1 court documentation has never been received up to today. The
2 applicant was made provisional, not added to a roster, and he
3 submitted a request for appeal today.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
5 questions for Mr. Figueroa?

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is why Board Member
7 Cortez, for the record. Mr. Figueroa, why did you fail to
8 report your 1990 conviction?

9 MR. FIGUEROA: Because from my understanding, they
10 told me -- well, not -- when I finished my probation that I
11 could apply and I didn't have to list --

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: When you say "they," who's
13 "they"?

14 MR. FIGUEROA: The probation office.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Out of New York?

16 MR. FIGUEROA: Yeah.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

18 MR. FIGUEROA: When I was finishing my probation, I
19 completed the probation and I just tried to move on with my
20 life. I didn't -- I just forgot about it, and I always
21 applied answering no because I was, I believe, a minor at the
22 time.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Did you fill out your
24 application on your own?

25 MR. FIGUEROA: Yes.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Were you -- did you
2 happen to see that little red page -- or that page where it
3 said, Stop, fill in all of your criminal history that I showed
4 a previous applicant?

5 MR. FIGUEROA: Yeah. But from my understanding,
6 I've always put no and I never had a problem because I've
7 gotten other work cards before.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

9 MR. FIGUEROA: I've gotten fingerprinted. I've
10 gotten a gaming card here in Nevada.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So what I'm going to
12 tell you is that just because they have told you out of the
13 State of New York -- you are now in a different state. Every
14 state has its own set of rules. Our requirements are that you
15 do need to disclose all of your criminal history, despite what
16 state, how it happened, when it happened, if it got dismissed,
17 not dismissed, or reduced down in charges.

18 MR. FIGUEROA: And it was over like 30 years ago,
19 so -- yeah.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand that. Regardless
21 of the time or how long ago, you are -- per the application,
22 you were required to report all of your criminal history. And
23 I do understand it's been a long time, but these are the
24 requirements of the application.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And the other thing is is you

1 said you have a gaming card. It's different than this card.
2 So each board is going to have their own statutes, as well, so
3 ours states that you have to disclose everything.

4 MR. FIGUEROA: Okay. Because I've like -- I've
5 gotten fingerprinted before, never had an issue, and I went on
6 with my life, you know, working.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sure. Yep. Okay.

8 Board, any other questions for Mr. Figueroa?

9 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
10 entertain a motion.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
12 motioning to uphold the denial based on the failure to
13 disclose criminal history.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. Do
15 we have a second?

16 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
18 favor -- we have a motion. We have a second. All in favor
19 say aye.

20 (All present board members voted aye.)

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Just like the previous
22 applicant, you do have an opportunity to come back in one
23 year. You know, you have to list everything, unfortunately,
24 with ours, okay? All right. Thank you, sir. Good luck to
25 you.

1 MR. FIGUEROA: Thank you.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 62, Crystal
3 Adams. Crystal Adams? We'll trail.

4 Before we go to the next, what's the time frame?
5 I'm sorry, guys.

6 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: We're at 11:30 now.

7 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Agenda items 57 through 68
8 were instructed to be here at 11:30.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So then we're a little
10 bit early for those guys. Oh, 11:30. Okay. Got you.

11 All right. So we'll go through this section -- what
12 did you say it was, 65? 68. Okay. We'll go through this
13 section and we'll go back and trail -- we'll go back to the
14 trails, and then we'll take a break.

15 Okay. Agenda Item No. 63, Mike --

16 MR. ZUNIGA: Zuniga.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Zuniga. Okay. Thank you.

18 MR. ZUNIGA: You're welcome.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Blackmore, could
20 you tell us why we're here for Mr. Zuniga?

21 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Investigator
22 Blackmore, for the record. Mr. Zuniga was denied for his
23 failure to disclose felony conviction, as well as other
24 arrests. He has a 2005 felony receive, et cetera, known
25 stolen property from California. He was convicted, 36 months

1 probation and a work program and two days jail. This is
2 typically a wobbler in the State of California, so could be
3 convicted as a felony or a misdemeanor. I did receive court
4 documents from the applicant. The court documents confirm
5 that it was a felony conviction.

6 The second arrest was a 2023 misdemeanor DUI out of
7 Nevada. He was convicted to 12 months stay-out-of-trouble
8 order, DUI program, as well as the victim impact panel. The
9 applicant did not disclose this arrest. There was a 2009
10 misdemeanor, inflict corporal injury for spouse or cohabitant
11 out of California. He was convicted, 36 months probation --
12 sorry. Sorry. That -- my bad. 36 months probation, 45 days
13 jail. The applicant did not disclose this arrest. This,
14 again, is a wobbler in the State of California, so I did
15 request court documents. They were received and it showed
16 that it was indeed a misdemeanor conviction. He was made
17 provisional and added to Marksman Security, and then he
18 submitted a written appeal for request today.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any questions for
20 Mr. Zuniga?

21 MR. ZUNIGA: Zuniga.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Zuniga. Sorry.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
24 for the record. Mr. Zuniga, why did you fail to disclose your
25 criminal history?

1 MR. ZUNIGA: The reason why is because the case is
2 from California, and like it happened in 2006, and I got it
3 sealed and I got it expunged, and I was under the impression
4 that you don't have to, you know, put that on -- on any
5 application. But I guess not, and I learned my lesson and --
6 and I don't have a problem with, you know, writing down what
7 I've done wrong in my life and, you know, I -- I own -- I
8 own -- you know, I own up to it and I just want to learn from
9 it and just move forward. I just want to get back to work.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So you said that you
11 didn't disclose the ones out of California because they were
12 expunged?

13 MR. ZUNIGA: Expunged and sealed. I got them paid
14 for.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Then why did you
16 file to disclose the Nevada charge in 2023?

17 MR. ZUNIGA: The Nevada charge, I didn't -- I didn't
18 do it because it wasn't a felony, it was a misdemeanor, and --
19 yeah. That's what -- but I did write it down on the second
20 time when they told me to write everything down. I -- I was
21 just -- it was my first time going through this process, so it
22 was kind of like -- you know, I didn't know all the answers to
23 it. But now that I know, it will never happen again. I will
24 write everything down. I was already with Marksman Security.
25 I worked with them for three months. I never missed one day,

1 never was late, and they told me as soon as you get it fixed,
2 you can come back and work with us, and I just -- I just want
3 to provide for my family. I don't move like that no more.
4 I'm a father of four kids, and my number one goal in life is
5 just to provide for them.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And you filled out your
7 application on your own?

8 MR. ZUNIGA: Yes, ma'am. I went to the Durango
9 office.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So I just want to make
11 sure that in the event you decide to reapply, if -- however
12 the outcome is, that you make sure that you do list everything
13 despite it being expunged or closed or that it happened in
14 California and it was under the PC 1203.4, okay?

15 MR. ZUNIGA: Yes, ma'am. Absolutely.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Just want to be sure you're
17 very clear about what's needed.

18 MR. ZUNIGA: Yes, ma'am. You guys are right. I'm
19 going to have everything on there, anything I do.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Perfect. Thank you.

21 MR. ZUNIGA: You're welcome, ma'am.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any further questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
24 record. Investigator Blackmore, based on Mr. Zuniga's
25 testimony, was he brought in and allowed to do the application

1 over again with these disclosed?

2 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Investigator Blackmore, for
3 the record. Give me just one moment. One moment, please.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: While she's looking that up,
5 Mr. Zuniga, did you say that you were brought in and you
6 were -- you listed them on the application after you were
7 notified?

8 MR. ZUNIGA: Yes. It was over an email, sir. They
9 sent me an email and notified me. I was still working with
10 Marksman at the moment, and they notified me about it, so I
11 sent all the information back to Cassandra Blackmore and --
12 yes.

13 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: So Investigator Blackmore,
14 for the record. Yes. So he disclosed after he was denied on
15 the arrest history portion for the appeal paperwork.

16 MR. ZUNIGA: Yes.

17 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

18 Board, can you see my confusion on this?

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. I do think that that's
20 something we need to address, but I think we're going to, you
21 know, maybe bring that up at the end of the meeting, because I
22 do agree.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So board, are there any further
25 questions for Mr. Zuniga?

1 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
2 entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
4 motioning to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose
5 the criminal history. I'm also going to note that I am going
6 to stay consistent with the previous denial. Even though the
7 applicant was allowed to amend their application, there was
8 still an initial failure to disclose any criminal history.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
10 second?

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
13 second. All in favor say aye.

14 (All present board members voted aye.)

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So unfortunately, at this
16 time we're not able to -- to grant your -- your appeal. So
17 you do have an opportunity to come back in one year and apply.
18 Again, you can work with the office, who will help you. As
19 long as you list everything you have now in your application,
20 you shouldn't have an issue if you haven't done anything since
21 then. Wish you the best of luck, and sorry it turned out this
22 way. Good luck to you, sir.

23 Okay. Agenda Item No. 64 --

24 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Withdrew.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh. Sorry.

1 Agenda Item No. 65, Walter Turner.

2 MR. TURNER: Yes, board. Good morning, everybody.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Good morning.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Blackmore, could
6 you tell us why we're here for Mr. Turner?

7 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Investigator
8 Blackmore, for the record. Mr. Turner was denied for his
9 failure to disclose felony conviction. He had a 2014
10 possession of a controlled substance out of the State of
11 Nevada. He did a 12- to 30-month sentence in NDOC and up to
12 three years' probation. This arrest did occur in a 2012
13 warrant initially. As far as the disclosure, he did not
14 disclose.

15 There was a 2020 misdemeanor, domestic battery. He
16 was convicted, stay-out-of-trouble order, and community
17 service, as well as a 2022, two counts, first count is
18 domestic battery in the second degree, second count is break,
19 injure, or tamper with a vehicle. Both charges were
20 dismissed. The applicant did not disclose this arrest.

21 The applicant was not made provisional or added to a
22 roster. The applicant wishes to appeal.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Quick question. Are
24 you -- have you been sworn in, sir?

25 MR. TURNER: Yes, ma'am.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
2 questions for Mr. Turner?

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez, for the
4 record. Mr. Turner, why did you fail to disclose your
5 criminal history?

6 MR. TURNER: So ma'am, I'm currently enrolled in
7 Northwest Career College furthering my education. I didn't
8 fill out the application. I was only asked some questions,
9 and she was under the impression that we only had to go back
10 seven years.

11 When I got the denial notice in the mail, I -- I
12 went up to the school kind of upset because I wasn't sure what
13 was going on, and I filled out the appeal -- excuse me. I
14 filled out the paper, and that's where I believe I listed
15 everything correctly.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I can ask quickly, who's
17 "she"?

18 MR. TURNER: There is a representative for the
19 criminal justice program who takes care of the PILB process as
20 you reach that point.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: At the Northwest Career Tech,
22 right?

23 MR. TURNER: Yes, ma'am.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

25 MR. TURNER: And when I reached that point, she did

1 the mock interview, and then we went on to the application.
2 And I was only asked questions, and then as I said, I listed
3 everything I could remember and think of on the appeal
4 process.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Thank you.

7 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Investigator Blackmore, for
8 the record. So just preface, we do get a lot of applications
9 from the Northwest Career College; however, I did have a
10 verbal conversation with one of the representatives over the
11 phone that -- the process she described to me what they do is
12 they sit down with the applicant at the computer and they walk
13 through every single question together, and then they finish
14 the application together.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Mr. Turner, were you with that
16 representative while you were filling out the application?

17 MR. TURNER: Yes, ma'am.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So when you came to the
19 part of your criminal history, you're saying that she filled
20 it out but did not list anything. Did she ask you about it?

21 MR. TURNER: Yes. Yes.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: She asked you about your
23 criminal history?

24 MR. TURNER: Yes. One by one, she told me to
25 disclose it and I opened up and I disclosed it --

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The first time?

2 MR. TURNER: Yes. As I'm sitting in -- right after
3 the mock interview, yes, ma'am. And I told her everything I
4 could remember, and I asked her myself, Well, how far are we
5 going back? She said, I'm -- I believe only seven years,
6 because the statute of limitations or something, and I was
7 just following instructions in that -- in that --

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: You were following her
9 instructions?

10 MR. TURNER: Her instructions in that aspect. But I
11 have no -- no problem speaking about any prior conviction or
12 anything.

13 I do, however -- I do, however, have a background
14 check that was provided by a DoorDash -- one of the DoorDash
15 companies, in which I have charges on there that I was
16 actually in a rehab program when that happened, so I could not
17 have even done that. It was the burglary charge, and then
18 I -- the vehicle vandalization charges, that's the first time
19 I'm hearing that, as well, so I know that's something I may
20 need to look further into.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Is the college aware that this
23 is, you know, supposed to go back their entire time versus
24 just the seven years?

25 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: I believe so. They were

1 also informed to what possibly could deny an application as
2 far as severity, you know, if they're on parole or probation,
3 kind of the things we look for in the initial application, so
4 they are aware of that.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
6 other questions for Mr. Turner?

7 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
8 entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
10 motioning to uphold the denial for failure to disclose all of
11 criminal history.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. Do
13 we have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
16 have a second. All in favor say aye.

17 (All present board members voted aye.)

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the motion is upheld.

19 You know, you have an opportunity to come back in
20 one year. You have -- or you can obtain a copy of this
21 application from the office, and then you'll have everything
22 you need to fill out the actual application. I guess, you
23 know, we just need to follow-up with them and make sure that
24 they know it's all the way back, but unfortunately, you're
25 kind of stuck in the situation. So if you have any questions,

1 let us know. Thank you. Good luck to you.

2 MR. TURNER: Thank you. Thank you for your time.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

4 Agenda Item No. 66, Al Sepulona. Hi.

5 MR. SEPULONA: Hello.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And you were here for -- to get
7 signed in -- to be sworn in?

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Were you sworn in?

9 MR. SEPULONA: No, I wasn't.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You weren't. Okay.

11 Is there anybody else in the room that was not
12 previously sworn in?

13 MR. SEPULONA: Because my appointment said 11:30, so
14 I got here --

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Yeah, you're fine.
16 You're fine.

17 Anybody that hasn't been sworn in, counsel is going
18 to swear you in now. Go ahead and please stand.

19 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Stephanie Itkin-Goodman, for the
20 record. Can you please raise your right hand? Now, do you
21 affirm your testimony today will be the truth, the whole
22 truth, and nothing but the truth?

23 (Audience answers in the affirmative.)

24 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Investigator Blackmore,

1 could you please tell us why we're here for Mr. Sepulona?

2 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Investigator
3 Blackmore, for the record. Mr. Sepulona was denied for
4 failure to disclose. He has a 1986 enter a noncommercial
5 dwelling, convicted, 12 months, two days jail. This arrest
6 happened in April and resulted in a probation violation that
7 following August.

8 There is a 1986 petty theft, convicted, ten days
9 jail. A 1987 receive, et cetera, known stolen property for
10 the first charge, second charge was tamper with vehicle, and
11 then third and fourth charge were burglary. Counts 1 and 2,
12 he was convicted, he did probation and jail; counts 3 and 4,
13 he did 24 months probation.

14 In 1988, it looks like there was a false info to a
15 police officer warrant. There was no disposition for his
16 arrest; however, it did result in another arrest warrant in --
17 on July 10th of 1990.

18 And then there's a 1989 burglary where he was
19 convicted, 36 months probation, 15 days jail. There is an
20 Excel attached with some additional arrests, as well. He did
21 not disclose anything. He was asked for court documentation.
22 No court documentation was ever received. He was made
23 provisional but not added to a roster, and he wishes to appeal
24 today.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any questions

1 for Mr. Sepulona?

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

3 Good afternoon, Mr. Sepulona. Is there a reason --

4 MR. SEPULONA: Yes, ma'am.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Is there a reason why you
6 failed to disclose your history?

7 MR. SEPULONA: Honestly, I thought it just goes back
8 ten years because none of that I hear says 2000 and something.
9 None of the court documents she has has 2000 on it. They're
10 all 19-something, you know, so I only went back like ten
11 years. I didn't know I had to go back, you know, to my
12 childhood, my -- you know, adolescence. I mean, that was the
13 past, and when the century change, you don't hear my name in
14 there, you know, and that's all I'm asking.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Did you fill out your
16 application?

17 MR. SEPULONA: Yes, ma'am.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Well, the reason why
19 we're asking if you filled out your application, there is a
20 page, it has a nice big stop sign on there. The first bullet
21 point, it indicates that you need to list all arrests,
22 citations, order to appear in court, and all felony, gross
23 misdemeanor, and misdemeanor charges. First bullet points
24 lists all charges, regardless of how long ago the incident
25 occurred.

1 MR. SEPULONA: Okay. My question was, I was at the
2 fingerprint place when I filled that out, so I was never told
3 that -- you know, I didn't know.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. This is on the
5 application itself, so when you filled out that application,
6 there is a page in that application packet, whether you did it
7 on paper, whether you did it online, that will show this exact
8 page, okay?

9 MR. SEPULONA: I totally understand.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: But I do agree with you, this
11 is all in the 1980s, so I understand what you were thinking;
12 however, per the clear instructions --

13 MR. SEPULONA: My fault.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- all charges --

15 MR. SEPULONA: I take full responsibility for it.
16 Usually when I do fill out an application, they say go
17 back 10 years, 15 years, just like your jobs, you know.
18 People don't put their job from 1987 or 1996 on their app, so
19 I'm not looking at it that way. I'm looking at it like as far
20 as back I can go with jobs. I don't go as far as back as my
21 criminal record.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

23 Board, are there any further questions for
24 Mr. Sepulona?

25 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll

1 entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
3 motioning to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose
4 all criminal history.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
6 second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
9 have a second. All in favor say aye.

10 (All present board members voted aye.)

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So unfortunately --

12 MR. SEPULONA: I am not worried about it, ma'am.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Great. Thank you.

14 MR. SEPULONA: Yeah. I'm with the Teamsters Union.
15 Only reason why I came here was to figure out why am I here.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sure. Well -- yeah. So now --

17 MR. SEPULONA: Because they were like saying that
18 your card not denied and, you know, I was supposed to be
19 scheduled on the 15th, and then they rescheduled it to the
20 9th, and I'm like, I do have a life, you know what I mean --

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. So, sir --

22 MR. SEPULONA: -- and I went beyond this --

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we appreciate you coming
24 in --

25 MR. SEPULONA: But I do thank you and I wish you

1 guys have a wonderful and blessed day. Be the best version
2 you can be. Take care.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You have an opportunity to come
4 back in one year, if you'd like.

5 MR. SEPULONA: It's all good.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

7 MR. SEPULONA: No problem. God bless you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yep. Have a good one. Thank
9 you.

10 Okay. Agenda Item No. 67, Jason Criddle. Jason
11 Criddle?

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Mr. Criddle is here in the
13 North, Madam Chair.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

15 Investigator Blackmore, could you tell us why we're
16 here for Mr. Criddle?

17 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Mr. Criddle was
18 denied for being convicted of a felony, as well as moral
19 turpitude and failure to disclose.

20 So he has a 2001 felony conviction, so there are
21 three counts total. First count was burglary, second count
22 was taking a vehicle without an owner's consent, third count
23 was possession of a stolen vehicle. Counts 1 and 3 were
24 dismissed. Count 2 was convicted. He did three years parole
25 and probation and then sex offender treatment. The applicant

1 did not disclose his arrest, and he did provide a
2 California 1203.4 about a month and a half after he was
3 initially denied.

4 There is a 2002 felony conviction for sex with a
5 minor three-plus years younger. He was convicted, three years
6 probation, sex offender treatment. He also got this as
7 a 1203.4 dismissal after he was denied.

8 There's also a 2005 felony conviction, two counts;
9 one is sexual intercourse with a minor under 18, and then two
10 was vehicle theft. Both don't have a disposition per the
11 fingerprint report. The applicant did not disclose.

12 There is a 2009 misdemeanor case, first count is
13 assault in third degree. The second count is a domestic
14 violence enhancer. There is no disposition per the report;
15 however, there was a February 2009, as well as a March 2009
16 for contempt of court for violating a protection order arrest.
17 So he --

18 MR. CRIDDLE: I (indiscernible) anything about that.

19 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: -- provisional and added to
20 Seros (phonetic) and Securitas, and he wishes to apply [sic]
21 here today.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
23 questions for Mr. Criddle?

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
25 record. Mr. Criddle, why did you fail to disclose your arrest

1 history?

2 MR. CRIDDLE: It wasn't the fact that I was trying
3 to disclose it. After I maxed out, because after
4 everything -- after everything was initially done for -- as
5 far as my case goes, I had a very -- I don't know the word to
6 put it, but I had a very aggressive probation officer, so I
7 went ahead, maxed myself out, so when I got out, I didn't have
8 to worry about anything, but I was also told after ten years,
9 it would be dropped down to a misdemeanor after -- after that.

10 So for me, when I was also asked the initial
11 questions at Securitas, I gave them everything that I was
12 asked. There was nothing that he asked that had anything to
13 say with how long this -- how long this happened, how long ago
14 was it. He literally said, As of recently, have you had
15 any -- any -- anything as far as convictions, felonies or
16 anything of that goes. I have not, so I didn't -- I just went
17 about it that way, and I just went about it on the way of
18 figuring what Solano County was going to do after they --
19 after my initial -- my initial conviction, after the ten
20 years, that's what I thought it was.

21 As far as the 2005 and 2009, I have nothing -- I
22 have no prior with that. Like did I have some trouble in
23 Colorado with my ex-wife? Yes, I did. But other than that,
24 as far as the -- I wasn't trying to not say anything. It -- I
25 was going along with what I thought what was to be true, which

1 was after ten years, it will be dropped down to a misdemeanor.
2 And before I -- again, I'd already applied. I'm -- here I
3 am 40, I didn't think anything by it. I thought that it was
4 dropped down to a misdemeanor just on what I was told back
5 then. If I would have known anything beforehand, I would have
6 disclosed that all the way around. That's why I made it a
7 point to call Solano County, do what I need to do, get it
8 dismissed, because I'm thinking this is what it was. I -- I
9 have nothing to hide. I have nothing to hold.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Did you fill out your
11 application or --

12 MR. CRIDDLE: No. It was actually the guy -- it was
13 actually the -- the man that hired me at Securitas that filled
14 out everything.

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: He filled out the PILB
16 application for you?

17 MR. CRIDDLE: I didn't fill out anything as far as
18 the PILB application goes. I didn't fill out anything. Only
19 thing he did give me was a -- was a paper to go get my
20 fingerprints and bring it back to him. That was it.

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Unfortunately, Mr. Criddle, I
22 think Securitas gave you some bad information. As you've seen
23 before, Board Member Cortez said, you know, when you look at
24 the application, "Stop, read this," and it says list
25 everything, whether it's been reduced to a misdemeanor or

1 dismissed under PC 1203.4. You've got to list everything. So
2 unfortunately, Securitas gave you some bad information.
3 Hopefully our staff is going to reach out to them and educate
4 them that they just basically --

5 MR. CRIDDLE: Screwed me.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: -- a guy -- yeah. Because --

7 MR. CRIDDLE: Listening to everybody, I already said
8 to myself, like, Dang, dude. Then I'm screwed, then.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yeah, unfortunately. I'm sorry
10 that you got bad information, but we have a precedent on these
11 types of things. Thank you, sir.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any further
13 questions for Mr. Criddle?

14 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
15 entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
17 deny the work card based on nondisclosure of criminal history.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, Mr. Criddle. Have a
20 good rest of your day. Sorry.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
22 second?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
25 second. All in favor say aye.

1 (All present board members voted aye.)

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.

3 The last agenda item before we go back and -- and
4 clear out the trails is Agenda Item No. 68, Marty Hall. Is
5 there a Marty Hall? And you've been sworn in, sir?

6 MR. HALL: Yes. Good morning.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good morning.

8 Okay. Investigator Blackmore, could you please tell
9 us why we're here for Mr. Hall?

10 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Mr. Hall was denied
11 for his failure to disclose felony conviction. He has a 2005
12 felony conviction. There's two counts; first count is
13 possession of a controlled substance. He was convicted, 36
14 months probation and jail. The second count was transport,
15 et cetera, controlled substance. That was dismissed. The
16 arrest also resulted in failure to appear warrants June
17 of 2005, September of 2005, January 2006, as well as
18 February 2007.

19 There's also a 2014 felony conviction for stalking,
20 and then violating the restraining order. He was convicted,
21 did three years probation. There is a 2009 misdemeanor
22 contempt of court. He was convicted, 90 days jail. The
23 arrest originally started out as violating a protection order,
24 domestic with priors, as well as vandalism. This arrest also
25 resulted in another contempt of court arrest on November

1 of 2009. And then there's a misdemeanor, 2014. This was the
2 only arrest that was disclosed. So it was obstructing,
3 et cetera, a public officer for the first charge, second
4 charge is willful cruelty to a child. For the first count, he
5 was convicted, did three years probation, 90 days jail.
6 Second charge was dismissed. This arrest did start out as
7 kidnapping for ransom, so he was not made provisional, not
8 added to a roster, and he wishes to appeal today.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So just so I understand,
10 the 2014 arrest and conviction was disclosed; the rest were
11 not?

12 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Correct. Only the 2014 was
13 disclosed.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gotcha. Okay.
15 Board, any questions for Mr. Hall?

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
17 Good afternoon, Mr. Hall. Is there a reason why you failed to
18 disclose all of your history?

19 MR. HALL: Well, I was hoping -- I know you're
20 smiling. I was thinking I could save you all some time. I'm
21 going to get denied -- oh, hey, everybody on the TV. Because
22 I don't see, you know, a reason -- I did my best, you know
23 what I'm saying? I know y'all are going to deny me, just -- I
24 just think -- I think it should be changed up a little bit far
25 as how the system is being ran. It's just going to take a

1 year for us to come back and apply, you know. As people,
2 we're trying to feed our kids. I sleep in a car, but -- I did
3 my best.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Understood. Appreciate that.
5 Board, any other questions for Mr. Hall?

6 Hearing there are no questions, I'll entertain a
7 motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
9 motioning to uphold the denial based on the failure to
10 disclose all of the criminal history.

11 MR. HALL: All righty.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
13 second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
16 second. All in favor say aye.

17 (All present board members voted aye.)

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Again, sir, really, really
19 sorry. This group of folks, I've worked with them for years
20 now. They will help you fill out your application. Please
21 come back and see us in is a year. Please engage with these
22 guys to help you fill out that application and get it
23 completed as best as possible. I -- we understand your
24 circumstance.

25 MR. HALL: All right. Don't be sorry.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Best of luck to you, sir.

2 MR. HALL: Thank you.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a couple of
4 agenda items that we need to go back and -- that we trailed,
5 and see if these folks have come in. The first one that I
6 have, and correct me if I'm wrong, Executive Director, is 52,
7 53, 56, 58, 59, 60, 62; is that correct?

8 Okay. So let's start with 52, Sermetra Moses. Erin
9 Johnson? Okay. Corey James? Tyshon Cornish? Shadonna
10 Brown? Brandon Gibson? Crystal Adams? No one here. No one
11 up North? Okay.

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, Madam Chair.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Executive Director, when
14 were they asked to come in, this group?

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: That group would be
16 10:30 and 11:30.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So 11:30 -- do we want to
18 hold off on the 11:30? Okay. Okay. So they were told to
19 come in at 10:30 and 11:30, respectively, but they have not.
20 They are not in either of the rooms, so I will entertain a
21 motion for that -- for those -- again, that's 52, 53, 56, 58,
22 59, 60, and 62.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
24 motioning to uphold the denials for set agenda items for a no
25 call, no show. They were asked to be here at 10:30 and 11:30

1 respectfully [sic]. It is now 12:15 p.m.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
3 have a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
6 second. All in favor say aye.

7 (All present board members voted aye.)

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Why don't -- I think,
9 board, this is a good place to take maybe a ten-minute break.
10 I'm sorry.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes. Madam Chair, this is
12 Brown for the record. We get a bit of a break in the audio
13 every now and again. What was the disposition for item
14 No. 64, Kaluna, A.S. Kaluna?

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Withdrew.

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Withdrew. Okay. Thank you.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yep. So this is a good place to
18 take like a quick ten-minute break. We'll come back in, swear
19 everybody in that's here, and then we'll finish up. Thank
20 you.

21 (Recess taken from 12:16 p.m. to 12:29 p.m.)

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have some new
23 people that have come in. If you have not previously been
24 sworn in, please stand up and counsel will swear you in.

25 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Stephanie Itkin-Goodman, for the

1 record. For all those who are going to be providing
2 statements or testimony in front of the board, can you please
3 raise your right hand? Do you affirm your testimony today
4 will be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

5 (Audience answers in the affirmative.)

6 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Up North, is there
8 anybody in the room up there?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, Madam Chair.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay. Agenda
11 Item No. 69, Rhonda Pittman. Good afternoon, ma'am.

12 MS. PITTMAN: Good afternoon. Kind of scary, huh?

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Don't be scared.

14 Investigator Blackmore, could you please tell us why
15 we're here for Ms. Pittman?

16 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Ms. Pittman was
17 denied for failure to disclose her felony conviction, as well
18 as other arrests. There was a 1999 felony conviction for
19 possession of a controlled substance. She was convicted to 36
20 months probation. There was a 2011 misdemeanor battery
21 domestic violence. This was a DA denial. A 2004 battery
22 domestic -- battery domestic violence. This was dismissed.
23 A 1997 hit-and-run property damage. She was convicted on the
24 misdemeanor, 36 months probation.

25 Applicant was not made provisional and not added to

1 a roster. She wishes to appeal before the board.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
3 questions for Ms. Pittman?

4 MS. PITTMAN: I didn't hear that last part.

5 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: The last part? Which part?
6 Was it after --

7 MS. PITTMAN: After the property damage, the
8 property damage.

9 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: That you were not made
10 provisional, you were not added to a company's roster, and you
11 wish to appeal here before the board today.

12 MS. PITTMAN: Okay.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any questions
14 for Ms. Pittman?

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
16 Good afternoon, Ms. Pittman. Is there a reason why you failed
17 to report any of your criminal history?

18 MS. PITTMAN: Well, like that last one I asked
19 about, I forgot all about that. I don't even know what that's
20 about. And I've had -- I've done so many of these before in
21 the past that I didn't know that you went back 30 years. Some
22 of those were 30 years, and so I was surprised. I have been
23 doing hair for a long time, so this is like, wow.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you.

25 MS. PITTMAN: But I don't do anything bad, and I

1 haven't. I've raised my kids, you know. It's been a long,
2 long time. I learned my lesson and that's it. It's done and
3 over with.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Got it.

5 Board, are there any further questions for
6 Ms. Pittman?

7 Okay. Hearing there's no further questions, we'll
8 entertain a motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
10 motioning to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose
11 any criminal history.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
13 second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
16 second. All in favor say aye.

17 (All present board members voted aye.)

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So unfortunately, we're not
19 going to be able to move forward giving you your work card,
20 okay? But just so you understand, there is a part of the
21 application that has a big stop sign and it says that you need
22 to make sure that you list all of your arrest history or
23 criminal convictions.

24 MS. PITTMAN: Yeah.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: If you have any questions or you

1 don't remember them, you now have a little bit of a -- a
2 boilerplate, if you will, to the application. So just work
3 with the actual office, and they'll help you fill out the
4 application to make sure you get everything in there, okay?

5 MS. PITTMAN: Okay.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And if you don't remember
7 specific times or dates or stuff like that, just put that you
8 had an arrest in 2026 or 2025 -- 20- -- or 1987, it doesn't
9 matter. Just put that you had one and you can't remember, but
10 at least we know that you're trying to -- you're trying to
11 tell us what happened, okay?

12 MS. PITTMAN: Yeah.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

14 MS. PITTMAN: At that last one, I don't even
15 remember. I don't even know what that's about, to be honest.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, this will give you an
17 avenue to look into that. So -- do we have the printout or --

18 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: I can go ahead and email
19 her what was on her background report and she can go from
20 there.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So if you want to do
22 that, you can reach out to them. They'll email it to you so
23 you can look into it. It'll have something that you can trace
24 down and try to look into, okay?

25 MS. PITTMAN: Okay. May I ask one more thing?

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sure.

2 MS. PITTMAN: Who do I go to to help me with the
3 application to make sure it's properly put together?

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The office off of Durango. They
5 will help you.

6 MS. PITTMAN: Okay. It's hard to get into that
7 office. Can you explain to me how I get into that office on
8 Durango?

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Like physically getting in?

10 MS. PITTMAN: So where exactly was it -- yeah. I've
11 been running around since 9 o'clock this morning trying to
12 find one place or another. I was here first, they said they
13 knew nothing about you, so I've had a long morning already,
14 so --

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Well, why don't you call
16 them in the morning on Friday or Monday when you've had some
17 rest, and then they will help talk you into how to get there,
18 okay?

19 MS. PITTMAN: Okay.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It's pretty easy. It's just a
21 row of offices and they're, what, the second one in right next
22 door to the fingerprint one.

23 MS. PITTMAN: Oh, okay. I do know that one because
24 I ended up there this morning.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So that's exactly where

1 you need to go. They'll help you fill that out, okay?

2 MS. PITTMAN: Okay. Do I ask for somebody for help
3 or --

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, ma'am --

5 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: You can refer to me
6 directly. I'm Cassandra.

7 MS. PITTMAN: Pardon me, hon?

8 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: You can refer to me
9 directly. I'm Cassandra.

10 MS. PITTMAN: Okay.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

12 MS. PITTMAN: Thank you very much.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. And they will help
14 you, but you have to -- you have to hold off for one year,
15 okay? So a year from today, you can go ahead and -- or
16 actually, would it be today or would it be the meeting that we
17 were supposed to have?

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: It would be today.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So you have to hold off
20 for a year, and then you're able to come back and reapply,
21 okay?

22 MS. PITTMAN: So next year at this time?

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, ma'am.

24 MS. PITTMAN: Okay. Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

1 Agenda Item No. 70, Brandon Herring. Mr. Herring?

2 Okay. We'll trail.

3 Agenda Item No. 71, Monique Jenkins. Good
4 afternoon.

5 MS. JEDKINS: Good afternoon.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Blackmore, could
7 you tell us why we're here for Ms. Jenkins?

8 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Ms. Jenkins was
9 denied for failure to disclose. There was a 2009 burglary and
10 receiving known stolen property. There was no disposition for
11 the fingerprint report. This arrest was not disclosed. I
12 requested court documentation, but never received it.

13 She was made provisional and added to LLI and Best
14 Crowd Management's roster, and she wishes to appear here
15 before the board today.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any questions for
17 Ms. Jenkins?

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
19 Good afternoon, Ms. Jenkins. How are you?

20 MS. JEDKINS: Fine.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Is there a reason why you
22 failed to disclose your 2009 conviction?

23 MS. JEDKINS: It was in 2009. I didn't remember.
24 Like it's been so long, and that was the only thing I had on
25 my record. I totally forgot about it.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do you know what the judgment
3 was from that?

4 MS. JEDKINS: No. Actually, I don't remember. I
5 think it was a misdemeanor.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do you have any of the court
7 documents for it or are you able to get those? Because you're
8 going to need that to -- to -- to apply.

9 MS. JEDKINS: It was in California, so I would have
10 to go all the way back there.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Okay. Board, any
12 other questions for Ms. Jedkins?

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, for
14 the record. Not for Ms. Jedkins, for -- but for Investigator
15 Blackmore. It says on our form here that it's a misdemeanor.
16 Were you able to confirm it was a misdemeanor? Normally a --
17 granted it's California, but normally burglary, receiving
18 known stolen property are felonies.

19 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: So -- Investigator
20 Blackmore, for the record. So it's unknown severity for both
21 counts. I do know that they are wobblers in California, as
22 well, which is why court documents were requested, as well.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: If there's no further questions,
25 I'll entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
2 motioning to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose
3 criminal history.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
5 second?

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
8 have a second. All in favor say aye.

9 (All present board members voted aye.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Just as I told the previous
11 lady, you are able to come back in one year. Work with the
12 board -- or the office. They will help you fill out your
13 application. Even if you don't remember the exact dates or
14 whatever, just put something down that says, you know, you
15 have an arrest and you're not sure when it was or what
16 happened. We'll be able to help you get through that, okay?

17 MS. JEDKINS: Okay.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Good luck to you,
19 ma'am.

20 MS. JEDKINS: Mm-hmm.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 72, Gerald Ward.
22 Good afternoon.

23 MR. WARD: Hello. Good afternoon.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Blackmore, could
25 you tell us why we're here for Mr. Ward?

1 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Mr. Ward was denied
2 for his disclosed felony conviction. Happened in 1999,
3 conspiracy with intent to distribute crack cocaine. He was
4 convicted. He did 76 months confinement, four years parole,
5 and a restitution of \$894. He did disclose this arrest.

6 He was not made provisional, not added to a roster,
7 and he wishes to appeal.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
9 questions for Mr. Ward?

10 Okay. Hearing no questions, I'll entertain a
11 motion.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
13 motioning to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Ward his work
14 card based on full disclosure.

15 MR. WARD: Thank you. Oh, I'm sorry.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: One minute.

17 We have a motion. Do we have a second?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
20 second. All in favor say aye.

21 (All present board members voted aye.)

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Now.

23 MR. WARD: Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The office will contact you or
25 you contact them for the next steps, okay?

1 MR. WARD: Thank you. Mm-hmm.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank you, sir.

3 Good luck to you.

4 Agenda Item No. 73, Phillip Batts. Mr. Batts?

5 MR. BATTS: How are you doing?

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Hi. Good. How are you?

7 MR. BATTS: All right.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Investigator Blackmore,
9 could you please tell us why we're here for Mr. Batts?

10 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Yes. Mr. Batts was denied
11 for felony conviction, as well as moral turpitude and failure
12 to disclose. There is a 2009 felony domestic battery
13 conviction. He was convicted, did two years in DOC, 18 months
14 probation. This was the only arrest that was disclosed.

15 The following arrests were not disclosed: There is
16 a 2010 felony, failure to return to lawful detention.
17 Fingerprints results show that he was convicted; a 2010
18 felony, three charges, burglary for the first, second, auto
19 theft, third, theft. Counts 1 and 2 were dismissed. Count 3
20 was convicted, 150 days jail, probation. And then there was a
21 2919 felony, two charges -- sorry, two counts for driving on a
22 suspended license. The first count, they didn't prosecute,
23 second count, he -- it was reduced to a misdemeanor. He did
24 two days in jail. I do have an Excel with the remaining
25 arrests, as well.

1 He was not made provisional and not added to a
2 roster, and he wishes to appeal today.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any questions for
4 Mr. Batts?

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
6 Mr. Batts, good afternoon. Is there a reason why you failed
7 to report all of your criminal history?

8 MR. BATTS: It was so long ago, and I was --

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Well, what about the 2019 one?
10 That wasn't too long ago.

11 MR. BATTS: That charge was a driving, so I really
12 didn't think that I should put that on there.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Okay. Fair enough.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other questions?

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
16 record. Excuse my ignorance. Investigator Blackmore, can you
17 tell me where the moral turpitude is in these charges?

18 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: So on the Excel that was
19 provided, there's multiple domestic battery warrants.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any further
22 questions?

23 No further questions, I'll entertain a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
25 motioning to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose

1 all of the criminal history.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
3 have a second?

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
6 have a second. All in favor say aye.

7 (All present board members voted aye.)

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You know, same thing I told
9 everybody else, you have an opportunity to come back in a
10 year. You have everything listed now, so it should make a
11 good roadmap for you. We look forward to seeing you.

12 MR. BATTS: Okay. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Good luck to you.

14 Agenda Item No. 74, Synsaysha Thomas. Okay.

15 Ms. Thomas? Okay. We'll trail.

16 Agenda Item No. 75, Ruby Jamerson. Good afternoon.

17 MS. JAMERSON: Good afternoon.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Diaz, could you
19 tell us why we're here for Ms. Jamerson?

20 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes. The applicant was denied
21 for failure to disclose criminal history and tempered habits.
22 The applicant has 17 total arrests and 14 were charged as
23 solicit or engage in prostitution, but only four were
24 convicted, the four right here on this document. The others
25 were all DA denials.

1 The applicant only disclosed three arrests, and
2 after she was denied, she later submitted an appeal along with
3 her full arrest history --

4 (Reporter interjection.)

5 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: My apologies.

6 The applicant only disclosed three arrests, and she
7 denied and submitted an appeal, along with the rest of her
8 arrest history. She was not made provisional, and is here to
9 appeal today.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez, for the
11 record. Investigator Diaz, I might have misunderstood or
12 heard incorrectly, but I'm seeing that she did disclose and
13 disclosed 17 total out of the 14. Are we -- is this for Ruby
14 Jamerson?

15 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Correct. For Ruby Jamerson, she
16 did disclose the 2009, the 2007, and the 2006 solicit or
17 engage in prostitution. Those ones were convicted and she did
18 disclose those. She did have 14 others that were DA denials
19 that she did not disclose for the same charge.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Because I have showing
21 that she disclosed everything, and I don't have an additional
22 sheet showing the others that were not disclosed, so I just
23 want to make sure that I have the correct application. Hold
24 on.

25 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: From what my report --

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Did she have -- I'm sorry. Did
2 she have a spreadsheet that went along with this?

3 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: No, ma'am. I did not make a
4 spreadsheet. The other ones were all DA denials, so I did not
5 put them on the report, only the ones she disclosed and the
6 ones that were actually convicted. The other 14, she did not
7 disclose, and they were not convicted. They were all DA
8 denials.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: In the future, I'm going to
10 request if I can get that spreadsheet included.

11 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes, ma'am.

12 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
13 record. Investigator Diaz, you may not know off the top of
14 your head, but were any of the 14 DA denials more recent
15 than 2013?

16 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: No. The last arrest was 2013
17 for contempt of court.

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. And I think where the
19 confusion may come in is in your summary, it says the
20 applicant disclosed 17 total arrests and 14 were charged as --
21 they were -- 14 were charged, and only four were convictions.
22 I think we're confused on the she disclosed a total of 17.

23 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: My apologies. I do have her
24 actual application -- or her -- the arrest history of the
25 application. There were three arrests listed here for

1 solicitation, one, two, and three, from '09, '07, and '06, and
2 that is the only thing on her application. When her
3 fingerprints came back, there was the contempt of court
4 in 2013 that was not disclosed, the 2010, 2009, 2007, and 2006
5 for solicit or engage in prostitution, the 2010 she did not
6 disclose, 2009, 2007, and 2006, she did. Along with those
7 there, were also 14 other ones for the same charge that she
8 did not disclose. These ones were not convictions, they were
9 DA denials.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any questions
12 for Ms. Jamerson?

13 Is there a reason why you didn't -- same question we
14 ask everybody --

15 MS. JAMERSON: Yeah, I tried to remember as many as
16 I could, and then I even went back and printed everything out
17 from the police department and like everywhere I could find
18 anything that had my name on it and submitted it. I literally
19 only --

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: With your original application
21 that you -- you provided that printout?

22 MS. JAMERSON: No. I just -- she told me to just
23 put as many as I could remember and the date, like whatever
24 year it was, and that's what I did. I did not purposely just
25 not put them on there. I did not remember them, and then I

1 went and printed everything out and I submitted all of them
2 that they had at the police department.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: When the -- the Investigator
4 Diaz or whoever -- who did you work with?

5 MS. JAMERSON: Well, I went to the main office at
6 Durango, and then I received the denial letter from the --
7 my -- I believe Jesse was his name, and -- and then I went
8 back, and I'm like, Okay, maybe there's something that I
9 missed. I went to the police department, printed out
10 everything that I had, and then went back and filled out
11 everything that I had missed. Because again, it was a very
12 turbulent time in my life.

13 I'm not going to make any excuses. I made bad
14 choices. I'm not that person anymore. I have three little
15 girls I'm trying to take care of, and I'm just a working mom
16 trying to do the best that I can. I can't take back what I
17 did, but I did not not try to disclose it. I just -- again,
18 it was a turbulent time, I don't remember everything, and I
19 did as much as I could, and then I even went back to disclose
20 everything once I knew that I was missing stuff.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
22 questions?

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the
24 record. No questions, but just a little bit of clarification
25 on confusion for us. The -- the work card denial report that

1 we're looking at shows the 2013 conviction as disclosed, but I
2 looked at Investigator Diaz's form, and it shows that it's not
3 disclosed, so I'm not sure where that got messed up in the
4 system, but --

5 MS. JAMERSON: That was only --

6 (Simultaneous speakers.)

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So do you want -- go ahead and
8 finish, Mr. Brown.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm finished. I just -- I --
10 that's where my confusion is. I'm hearing Investigator Diaz
11 saying that only three were disclosed, but I'm seeing one that
12 is, and his denial report that's sitting here in front of us
13 is different than the denial report that was sent to the board
14 members, or at least me.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So -- okay. So you're
16 saying, ma'am, that the last one, 2013, stemmed from a
17 previous one?

18 MS. JAMERSON: Yes, ma'am.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

20 MS. JAMERSON: Yes, ma'am.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So could you explain that?

22 MS. JAMERSON: So I had -- I had a clause, stay out
23 of trouble. I ended up having to leave the state due to
24 domestic violence with my children's father. I could not
25 appear in court because he was looking for me at the time, so

1 I stayed with my mother for a period of time before I was able
2 to come back to Nevada. When I did come back to Nevada --

3 (Reporter interjection.)

4 MS. JAMERSON: Oh, I'm sorry.

5 When I did come back to Nevada, I did try to, you
6 know, at least get myself into court, but before I was able to
7 do that, I was picked up by the police.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And that's the contempt of
9 court?

10 MS. JAMERSON: Yes, ma'am.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And you -- so you did -- you did
12 not disclose that?

13 MS. JAMERSON: Well, I did, but I thought it was
14 because when I put the 2009, I thought that was -- since it
15 was one case, that it would be combined together, because I
16 went to the exact same judge during that time because she was
17 the person taking care of the case. I didn't know that it
18 would count separately, because it was -- the original case
19 was in 2009. If I would have known that it was separate, I
20 would have definitely disclosed it, which is why I did go
21 print out everything to redo and submit.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
23 questions -- any further questions?

24 Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
25 entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
2 deny the work card based on nondisclosure of criminal history.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
4 second?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown. I'll second.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
7 second. All in favor say aye.

8 (All present board members voted aye.)

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I understand the situation
10 and not knowing or remembering all the stuff, and we
11 appreciate you trying to do the best you could on the actual
12 application. You have a roadmap now with that application,
13 and certainly this office is more than willing to help. So if
14 you go back to the office on Durango, they'll be able to help
15 you get through that application, okay? Unfortunately, we're
16 denying the work card this go-around, but please come and see
17 if in a year, if you have the opportunity.

18 MS. JAMERSON: So what's the chance that I'll be not
19 denied again? Because I already been denied. I'm just
20 asking.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. No, that's a fair
22 question. We don't deny based off of what's been done. It's
23 the not telling us everything that happened, not putting it in
24 the actual application. So we haven't denied you because of
25 what -- the actions that were done, right? It's just based

1 off of normally time and distance, how long it has been from
2 the time of the last conviction, and there's been a
3 significant amount of time, and then the fact that you're
4 disclosing it all, which I understand is a little bit jumbled
5 because you had a lot going on at that time. So again, I
6 would definitely try to reapply in one year and work with
7 these guys. They'll help you.

8 MS. JAMERSON: Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I'm sorry. Good luck to you.

10 Agenda Item No. 76, Oscar Enriquez.

11 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Withdrawn.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh. Sorry. Okay. Yeah. He's
13 withdrawn. Just for the record, Oscar Enriquez, Agenda
14 Item No. 76, withdrew.

15 Agenda Item No. 77, Clifford Rav- --

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Ravareau, Madam Chair. He's
17 here in the North.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ravareau. Okay.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Correct. Ravareau, Madam
20 Chair.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ravareau. Okay. Thank you.
22 Have you been sworn in, sir?

23 MR. RAVAREAU: Have I been what?

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Have you been sworn in?

25 MR. RAVAREAU: No.

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No. He came in after the
2 swear.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Is there anybody down
4 South that's not been sworn in? Sir, have you been sworn in?

5 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. If you have not been
7 sworn in previously, could you stand, and counsel will swear
8 you in?

9 MR. POPAL: Sorry. My English is very --

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What? I'm sorry.

11 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Stephanie Itkin-Goodman, for the
12 record. For all those who are going to provide statements or
13 testify in front of the board, can you please raise your right
14 hand? Now, do you affirm your testimony today will be the
15 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

16 (Audience answers in the affirmative.)

17 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

19 Mr. -- I'm sorry. Investigator Diaz, why are we
20 here for Mr. Ravareau?

21 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: The applicant was denied for a
22 felony buy/possess stolen property conviction out of Reno,
23 Nevada in 2019. The applicant was sentenced to 30 months in
24 prison. He also has a 2013 felony burglary conviction, this
25 arrest was disclosed, a 2013 felony burglary conviction, this

1 one was also disclosed, a 2012 misdemeanor for probation
2 violation, this was disclosed, and a 2011 burglary conviction.
3 This arrest was also disclosed.

4 The applicant did disclose all arrests and was aware
5 he would be denied and later submitted a written letter of
6 appeal. He was not made provisional and is here to appeal
7 today.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

9 Board, are there any questions for Ms. Ravareau --
10 Mr. Ravareau?

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
12 for the record. Mr. Ravareau, are you -- you're not currently
13 on any kind of supervision?

14 MR. RAVAREAU: No, ma'am.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thank you so much.

16 MR. RAVAREAU: No, ma'am, I'm not.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Appreciate it. Thank you.

18 MR. RAVAREAU: You bet.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Are there any further
20 questions for Mr. Ravareau?

21 Okay. If there's no further questions, I'll
22 entertain a motion.

23 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
24 grant the work card for Mr. Ravareau based on full disclosure
25 of criminal history.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
2 have a second?

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
5 have a second. All in favor say aye.

6 (All present board members voted aye.)

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sir, thank you for coming
8 back. Thank you for the full disclosure. Congratulations.
9 Your work card will be issued to you. The office will contact
10 you with next steps, okay?

11 MR. RAVAREAU: Okay. Thank you. Thank you, board.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Good luck.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good luck to you.

15 Agenda No. 78, Mohammad Popal. Investigator Diaz,
16 could you tell us why we're here for Mr. Popal?

17 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes. The applicant was denied
18 for a misdemeanor open/gross lewdness and conspiracy to commit
19 battery conviction out of Las Vegas, Nevada in 2022. The
20 applicant was sentenced to nine months probation and 364 days
21 in jail. The applicant also has a 2023 felony arrest for
22 attempted murder with a deadly weapon. This arrest was
23 dismissed. It was not disclosed.

24 The applicant also has a 2023 felony arrest for an
25 immigrant without a visa. This is unknown. There was no

1 disposition on the fingerprints. The applicant did not
2 disclose all arrests, and later submitted a written letter of
3 appeal. He was not made provisional and is here to appeal
4 today.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So did I understand he
6 was not made provisional because of the felonies, but he did
7 disclose them?

8 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: No, ma'am. He did not disclose
9 anything. He circled "no" on everything.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
11 questions for Mr. Popal?

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
13 for the record. Mr. Popal, why did you fail to disclose any
14 criminal history?

15 MR. POPAL: When I did the paper -- sorry. My
16 English not very good.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That's okay.

18 MR. POPAL: When I did the paper, I don't read
19 the -- when I fill out the paper for card, I don't read the
20 back and my brother help me. He don't explain all that paper
21 for me (indiscernible).

22 (Reporter interjection.)

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You have to speak up a little
24 bit.

25 MR. POPAL: Okay. When I fill out the paper for

1 question card, I don't see that -- the paper, the question
2 about the criminal, about that story. I don't see because my
3 English not very well about that.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any further
5 questions?

6 Okay. Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
7 entertain a motion.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
9 motioning to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose
10 any criminal history.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
12 second?

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
15 have a second. All in favor say aye.

16 (All present board members voted aye.)

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we can't issue your work
18 card, but you can reapply in one year. You have now what you
19 need to put in the application, okay?

20 MR. POPAL: Okay.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: As long as you don't have
22 anything else come up.

23 MR. POPAL: Okay. Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good luck to you. Thank you.

25 Number 79, Ronald Laeli. Good afternoon, sir.

1 MR. LAELI: Hey. How are you guys doing?

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good. How are you?

3 Investigator Dumas, could you tell us why we're here
4 for Mr. Laeli?

5 MS. DUMAS: The applicant was denied due to a 2010
6 felony, which he was convicted of, in Hawaii due to one count
7 possession of amphetamine or dangerous drugs. He was
8 sentenced to 108 months in prison. He served 87 of them
9 with 60 months supervised release.

10 He also had a 2017 felony for violation of
11 probation, which he also disclosed, sentenced to three months
12 in prison with 57 months of supervised release. The applicant
13 disclosed all his arrests, was not made provisional, and is
14 here to appeal today.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any questions for
16 Mr. Laeli?

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
18 Good afternoon, Mr. Laeli. Is there -- are you on any kind of
19 supervision now?

20 MR. LAELI: No, ma'am.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So everything was
22 completed, positively termed?

23 MR. LAELI: Yes, ma'am.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Perfect. That's all I needed
25 to know. Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other questions?
2 Hearing there are no questions, I'll entertain a
3 motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
5 to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Laeli his work card based
6 on full disclosure.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
8 second?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
11 second. All in favor say aye.

12 (All present board members voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So motion passes. You will get
14 your work card. Work with the office. They'll help you,
15 okay?

16 MR. LAELI: Okay.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Probably tomorrow. Wait until
18 tomorrow or Monday.

19 MR. LAELI: Copy that.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We're -- okay. Or Monday.
21 Thank you.

22 MR. LAELI: Okay. Thank you. Thank you all.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda No. 80, Stevie Adams.

24 MR. LAELI: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon.

1 MR. ADAMS: Good morning -- good afternoon. Sorry
2 about that. Got here a little early.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. Investigator Dumas, could
4 you please tell us why we're here for Mr. Adams?

5 INVESTIGATOR DUMAS: The applicant was denied due to
6 a couple felonies; a 2008, convicted of nine counts of
7 threaten crime with intent to terrorize in California, 2015
8 felony, convicted of evading a peace officer, disregard
9 safety. He was sentenced to 32 months in prison. 2018, he
10 was convicted of a felony, one count to obstruct public
11 officer, one count battery on spouse, ex-spouse, or person
12 dating. He was sentenced to nine days in jail with three
13 days -- three years' probation.

14 2021, he was convicted of a felony, attempted
15 battery with deadly weapon. He pled guilty and he served time
16 at the Nevada Department of Corrections. In 2024, he was
17 arrested for felony making threats, false information, act of
18 terrorism, along with a carry concealed weapon without permit.
19 This one was -- as I said, was dismissed or denied.

20 The applicant is on the Clark County felony
21 registry. He was not made provisional and is here to appeal
22 today. All of these arrests were disclosed.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any questions for
24 Mr. Adams?

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Board Member Brown, for the

1 record. Mr. Adams, can you explain the 2024 arrest for me.

2 MR. ADAMS: Which one, exactly? Which one is that?

3 The --

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Making threats, false
5 information, act of terrorism, and carrying a concealed weapon
6 without a permit.

7 MR. ADAMS: Yes. That -- that was with a medical
8 thing that I had. It was misinformation far as a phone call
9 with my insurance provider. I got hit by a car when I was 10
10 and I have been going through medical treatment, and the guy
11 over the phone said -- he was a guy who seemed like he didn't
12 understand English very well, so he -- like I was not
13 receiving treatment and I was requesting to speak to a
14 supervisor, and the guy just disconnected the call and said
15 that I made a threat to them, which later on, we went through
16 in court. I did not make any threat to him or anything like
17 that, and the case was dismissed.

18 So I wasn't on any kind of probation. I changed my
19 life from all the stuff that -- in my past and things like
20 that. I got three daughters who I've been raising and
21 working -- working for for the last seven years, and just
22 trying to be a better person and a better father.

23 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, sir.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez.

1 Mr. Adams, is everything up to date as far as -- as far as
2 your registry goes?

3 MR. ADAMS: Yes, I believe so.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Investigator Dumas, do we have
5 any information that states otherwise, that he's up to date
6 with all registrations?

7 INVESTIGATOR DUMAS: No, he's -- correct. He's
8 current.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Perfect. And
10 compliant?

11 INVESTIGATOR DUMAS: Correct.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Awesome. Thank you.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other questions?
14 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
15 entertain a motion.

16 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
17 grant the work card based on full disclosure of criminal
18 history.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
20 have a second?

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
23 have a second. All in favor say aye.

24 (All present board members voted aye.)

25 MR. ADAMS: Thank you, guys.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The board -- they will contact
2 you tomorrow or Monday and tell you next steps, okay?

3 MR. ADAMS: Thank you, guys. I really appreciate
4 that.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations. Good luck to
6 you, sir.

7 MR. ADAMS: You guys have a good day.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You too.

9 Okay. So we are now moving into the agenda portion
10 that should start at 1:30, so I'm going to go back and
11 trail -- review our trails, and then we will take -- I don't
12 know. Do we want to take a quick break or -- okay.

13 Do we have -- do we have anybody up North?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, ma'am, we do not.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So maybe -- does anybody
16 need a break? Okay. So if we don't need a break, we have
17 quite a few people down South that have come in sporadically,
18 so we'll maybe go out of agenda order to address those folks
19 until 1:30.

20 So we have Agenda Item No. 70 that I'm seeing that
21 needs to be -- that was trailed, right? Okay. So we have
22 Agenda Item No. 70, Brandon Herring. Are you here? Okay.
23 Mr. Herring is not in the office -- or in the room. This was
24 a 1 -- or, I'm sorry, 11:30?

25 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 12:30.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 12:30 appearance notice, so
2 since he's not here, I'll entertain a motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
4 motioning to uphold the denial for Brandon Herring based on no
5 call, no show. Was advised to be here at 12:30. It is
6 now 1:09 p.m.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
8 have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
11 second. All in favor say aye.

12 (All present board members voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.

14 Item No. 74 was postponed, for the record.

15 Okay. So I'm going to go by memory, which isn't
16 great, so I'll have to ask you guys to be honest. I think,
17 sir, you in the back, what's your name? I think you've been
18 here for a while.

19 MR. STEPHENS: Deandre.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What's your last name? Is that
21 your last name?

22 MR. STEPHENS: No. Stephens.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Stephens. Do you know your
24 agenda item?

25 MR. STEPHENS: 99.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 99. Okay.

2 And sir, I think you've been here for a while, as
3 well?

4 MR. RICHARDSON: Richardson.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Richardson?

6 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes, ma'am.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What was your agenda item?

8 MR. RICHARDSON: 94.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 94. Okay.

10 And I think next was -- how long have you -- have
11 you been here for a while?

12 MR. COLE: Yeah. Donald Cole.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Cole.

14 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: 97 -- no, sorry.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: 88.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sir, behind -- yes.

17 MR. RIGGINS: Charles Riggins.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Riggins?

19 MR. RIGGINS: Riggins.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Riggins. Okay.

21 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: 103.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And ma'am, what's your
23 name?

24 MS. WHITE: April White. April White.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: April. Okay. 85.

1 And ma'am, you just walked --

2 MS. JENKINS: Adriana Jenkins.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Say it again.

4 MS. JENKINS: Adriana Jenkins.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Adriana, right?

6 MS. JENKINS: Yes.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And sir, you've been here for a
8 while.

9 MR. GONZALEZ: Rafael Gonzalez.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we're going to take
11 you out of order from the agenda, just because you guys are
12 here and we want to make sure you're not sitting here for too
13 long.

14 So sir, you in the back, the first one, do you want
15 to come forward? Deandre, Mr. Stephens. Okay. So for the
16 record, we have Mr. Stephens.

17 MR. STEPHENS: Yeah. It's misspelled.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Deandre?

19 MR. STEPHENS: Yeah.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have Mr. Deandre
21 Stephens here.

22 Investigator Swarthout, could you tell us why we're
23 here for Mr. Stephens?

24 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
25 due to a felony conviction. This is the applicant's second

1 time on appeal. His first appeal hearing was in March 2022.
2 2011 out of California, prohibited own, ammo, et cetera,
3 sentenced to 16 months in prison. 2010 out of California,
4 felony robbery. The probation was revoked and he had to do 16
5 months in prison concurrent with the first -- first arrest
6 listed. 2010, California, felony possess narcotic controlled
7 substance, 12 months probation. 2018, California,
8 misdemeanor, trespass injure, sentenced to 12 months probation
9 and 1 day in jail.

10 California 2006, theft, misdemeanor, sentenced to 24
11 months probation, four days jail, and then 2006 out of
12 California, misdemeanor possession of marijuana, sentenced to
13 four days in jail. The applicant did disclose all arrests on
14 this second time going through.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
16 questions for Mr. Stephens?

17 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
18 entertain a motion.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
20 to approve -- to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Stephens
21 his work card based on full disclosure second time around.

22 Thank you for doing what was asked.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
24 second?

25 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
2 second. All in favor say aye.

3 (All present board members voted aye.)

4 MR. STEPHENS: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The office will work with you,
6 okay, on next steps. So probably today or Monday, they'll get
7 in touch with you, okay?

8 MR. STEPHENS: All right.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Congratulations,
10 sir. Good luck to you.

11 MR. STEPHENS: Thank you.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're welcome.

13 Okay. Mr. Richardson.

14 MR. RICHARDSON: Good afternoon, everyone.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon.

16 Okay. Investigator Swarthout, could you tell us why
17 we're here for Mr. Richardson?

18 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
19 for a conviction of felony and the illegal use or possession
20 of dangerous weapon; 2008, out of California, felony,
21 discharged firearm with gross negligence, convicted to 210
22 days jail, three years formal probation. 2006 out of
23 California, misdemeanor DUI, sentenced to drug classes. 2006
24 out of California, carry concealed dirk or dagger. This one
25 didn't have a dispo listed, but he was arrested on two

1 warrants for that case. The applicant did disclose all
2 arrests on his application.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
4 questions for Mr. Richardson?

5 Hearing there are no questions, I'll entertain a
6 motion.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
8 motioning to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Richardson his
9 work card based on full disclosure.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
11 have a second?

12 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick sends.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
14 have a second. All in favor say aye.

15 (All present board members voted aye.)

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
17 Congratulations. Again, the office will contact you.

18 MR. RICHARDSON: Okay. Thank you. You guys enjoy
19 the rest of your day.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

21 Okay. So I think we're going this way now. Okay.
22 Mr. Cole.

23 MR. COLE: How are you doing?

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a little bit
25 of a discrepancy in our work drive. It comes up as 97, but in

1 the agenda, it comes up at 88 for Mr. Cole, in case there's
2 some confusion there.

3 And you've been sworn in. I remember seeing you.

4 Investigator Swarthout, could you tell us why we're
5 here for Mr. Cole?

6 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
7 for a felony conviction. The applicant disclosed a 1991 out
8 of Ohio felony for dumping of hazardous waste. He listed it
9 as being sentenced to six months house arrest and two years
10 probation. Currently his fingerprints were just rejected.
11 We're still waiting on the fingerprint results to come back.

12 MR. COLE: Why would my fingerprints be rejected?

13 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: It could have been a bad
14 read when they did the card or when you had them scanned.

15 MR. COLE: Okay. Because that -- that's the only
16 thing I have on my record.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. We understand -- yeah.
18 We understand. We're having -- you know, the whole State hack
19 thing has slowed some stuff down, so we understand that that's
20 part of it.

21 On this, counsel or Executive Director, could we do
22 contingent on it coming back clear, his fingerprints coming
23 back clear?

24 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: On them coming back
2 with just this one arrest that was disclosed.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. I'm sorry. You're
4 correct.

5 So we have an opportunity to do an approval,
6 depending on which way we want to go, contingent to his actual
7 fingerprints coming back. He did have his fingerprints
8 rejected. Could be a bad read or, you know, just -- so you'll
9 have to -- have you had them redone yet?

10 MR. COLE: Yeah. I had them redone on that second
11 letter that you had sent that said that the fingerprints were
12 bad, and that's been months.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. There's been an issue
14 with the State hack, so things are coming back a little bit
15 slower. But yeah, we'll -- we'll work with you on that, okay?

16 MR. COLE: Okay.

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Madam Chair, this
18 week, I want to say it was either Monday or Tuesday, our
19 fingerprint specialist had reached out via email to DPS
20 regarding Mr. Cole's fingerprints because we noticed
21 fingerprints cards and the rejection ones are the ones that
22 have like the longest delays on them, so we have reached out
23 to them to get answers for Mr. Cole.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So board, are there any
25 questions for Mr. Cole?

1 Okay. There's no questions. I'll entertain a
2 motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
4 motioning to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Donald Cole his
5 work card, pending negative results of his fingerprints once
6 they've come back.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do we need to append to say --

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yeah.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We need to say other than his --

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Pending negative results and
11 no additional arrests or convictions.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
13 have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. We have a
16 second. All in favor say aye.

17 (All present board members voted aye.)

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So you can't go to work
19 yet, but once they get your fingerprints back, as long as
20 there's nothing on it, then you're able to go right to work.
21 You won't have to come back here to see us, okay?

22 MR. COLE: Okay.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So work with the board and the
24 fingerprint company to make sure that they get your records
25 back from your fingerprints, okay?

1 MR. COLE: Okay.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Awesome.

3 MR. COLE: Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Congratulations.

5 MR. COLE: Thank you.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Contingently.

7 Okay. Sir, have you been sworn in?

8 MR. RIGGINS: Yes.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. What was your -- Rafael?

10 MR. RIGGINS: Charles Riggins.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay. Investigator Diaz,
12 you want to tell us why we're here for Mr. Riggins?

13 MS. DUMAS: This is Investigator Dumas, for the
14 record. He's actually mine.

15 The applicant was denied due to a felony, which he
16 was convicted of in 2005 for mayhem out of California. He was
17 committed to two years in prison. This was disclosed. A
18 1998, he was convicted of a misdemeanor for entering or
19 remaining on posted property. This was not disclosed, and he
20 was sentenced to three years probation with fines and a work
21 program.

22 MR. RIGGINS: That is not me.

23 MS. DUMAS: This is the applicant's second denial.

24 He was not made provisional, and is here to appeal today. And
25 I think that's a typo. I believe it was disclosed the second

1 time.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Do you want to take a second to
3 check?

4 MS. DUMAS: I don't bring the applications with me.

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I have it right here.

6 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: And we don't have the ability
7 in the North to look at a computer.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. They're looking now.

9 Okay. Mr. Riggins, you said that that wasn't you?

10 MR. RIGGINS: '98? I don't remember anything '98.
11 It was '95 and 2005 that I could remember.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. But was it entering or
13 remaining in a place?

14 MR. RIGGINS: No. '95 was -- '95 was, I believe,
15 drug charges and gun charges, I believe, '95, but I -- I
16 didn't go to jail for that, wasn't convicted for that, and
17 then 2005 was the only thing else.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay, so the 1998 says three
19 years probation with fines and work program. Does that sound
20 familiar?

21 MR. RIGGINS: That's not me.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And you say the 1998, you
23 don't have anything?

24 MR. RIGGINS: No.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: This was off of his

1 fingerprints?

2 MS. DUMAS: Yes. It was on his fingerprints, the
3 1998, which is why I included it into the report.

4 MR. RIGGINS: Yeah, I don't remember anything from
5 '98 or nothing. Nothing.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you ever enter a
7 properly -- a property unauthorized?

8 MR. RIGGINS: No.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you ever remain on a
10 property unauthorized, you were asked to leave and refused to
11 leave?

12 MR. RIGGINS: Not that I can recall.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So per your testimony, why
14 were you placed on probation?

15 MR. RIGGINS: I never been on probation.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So you were never
17 placed on probation and you never did a work program?

18 MR. RIGGINS: No.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So per your
20 fingerprints, they're coming back as that you did.

21 MR. RIGGINS: I never been on probation or any
22 programs. I only been on parole.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So when you were on
24 parole, what were your conditions? What did you have to do on
25 parole?

1 MR. RIGGINS: I followed everything on parole. I
2 was on parole like three years and like a few weeks.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And that was per which charge?

4 MR. RIGGINS: That was the mayhem, because I got
5 out -- I got out '07 and I got off parole in 2010.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We're looking at some
7 stuff here. Hang on.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What did you say the 1995 was?

9 MR. RIGGINS: That was -- I got caught up in a drug
10 sting in LA, and I believe it was drugs that was put on me,
11 but they threw it out. And then it was a gun that never had
12 my prints on it, and I didn't even go to jail -- I didn't stay
13 in jail long for that.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Were you arrested for that
15 incident?

16 MR. RIGGINS: Yes. I was arrested and released.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So we're kind of
18 getting into muddied waters here right now, but if you're
19 indicating that you were arrested in 1995, why was that not
20 listed on your application?

21 MR. RIGGINS: I did -- I did put '95. I put '95
22 and 2005.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We're looking up --

24 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Madam Chair, Board Member
25 Cortez?

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown for
3 the record. In talking to Investigator Dumas, Mr. Riggins
4 disclosed what he is referring to as the '95 charge on his
5 application, but his fingerprints show the '98 for remain --
6 enter and remain on posted properties. Fingerprints do not
7 show the drug arrest that he's talking about, but he entered
8 it as that. So he disclosed, he just disclosed the wrong
9 thing.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it. Okay. But he's also
11 testifying that he was not involved in that posted property
12 incident and that he did not do any probation.

13 MR. RIGGINS: If I had any probation, I would have
14 did it. I would have complied and did it. Probably identity
15 theft, because I had went through that before, but I don't
16 understand -- I don't know anything about no probation.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Sure. They're just checking on
18 some things real quick, okay? So hang on one second.

19 Okay. So while they're looking that up, do you want
20 to just -- we'll trail you for a couple minutes, let them, you
21 know, kind of figure all that out, and we'll move on with the
22 other folks, but at least we'll -- we'll look and make sure we
23 have the right information, okay?

24 MR. RIGGINS: Yes.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right. So for right

1 now, we're just going to trail Mr. Riggins for a short period
2 while they follow up on some information, and then we'll come
3 back to him.

4 Okay. The gentleman in the back, what was your
5 name?

6 MR. GONZALEZ: Rafael Gonzalez.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Mr. Gonzalez, do you want
8 to come up? You want to come forward?

9 MR. GONZALEZ: Good afternoon, everyone.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon.

11 Investigator Swarthout, could you tell us why we're
12 here for Mr. Gonzalez?

13 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
14 due to a felony conviction, 1967 out of New Jersey, felony
15 receive stolen vehicle, sentenced to five years confinement,
16 suspended, and three years probation. 2004 out of Nevada,
17 misdemeanor domestic violence with no prior convictions. This
18 was an arrest only. That applicant disclosed both arrests on
19 his application.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

21 MR. GONZALEZ: Excuse me. Can you be so kind to
22 tell me about the first one? You say five years and what?

23 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Five years confinement
24 suspended, three years probation.

25 MR. GONZALEZ: Consignment?

1 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Confinement. It was
2 suspended. You didn't have to serve any time in prison.

3 MR. GONZALEZ: Oh, okay. Because I didn't. Okay.
4 Just want to be clear for my head.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, you're good. You're good.
6 Board, any questions for Mr. Rivera Gonzalez?
7 Hearing there are no questions, I'll entertain a
8 motion.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
10 to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Rivera Gonzalez his work
11 card based on full disclosure.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
13 have a second?

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
16 have a second. All in favor say aye.

17 (All present board members voted aye.)

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we're going to go ahead and
19 grant your work card.

20 MR. GONZALEZ: Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The office will call you
22 tomorrow or Monday --

23 MR. GONZALEZ: Thank you so much.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- with next steps. All right.

25 MR. GONZALEZ: I appreciate that.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

2 MR. GONZALEZ: Who will call me? The office?

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

4 MR. GONZALEZ: Thank you so much.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Have a good day.

6 MR. GONZALEZ: You guys have a fantastic day, and
7 again, thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're very welcome.

9 Ma'am, I think you were next. What was your name
10 again?

11 MS. WHITE: April White.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: White. Agenda Item No. 85,
13 April White.

14 Investigator Swarthout, could you tell us why we're
15 here for Ms. White?

16 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
17 due to a felony conviction, conviction of illegal use,
18 possession, or -- dangerous weapon and failure to disclose.
19 2000 out of Georgia, felony arson, first degree. This was not
20 disclosed. Sentenced to six months confinement and four years
21 and six months probation and restitution. 1994 out of
22 New Jersey, this one was disclosed, felony, unlawful
23 possession of handgun, sentenced to three years probation, 300
24 hours of community service, and a fine of \$125.

25 2022 out of Georgia, misdemeanor, theft, loss,

1 mislaid property, sentenced to 12 months probation and a fine
2 of \$500. This one was not disclosed. 2018 out of Florida,
3 felony. Adjudication was withheld in this case. The charges
4 were resisting officer with violence, felony, and the second
5 charge was resisting officer without violence, misdemeanor.
6 2008, felony -- or 2008 out of Florida, misdemeanor, fraud,
7 insufficient funds, check adjudication, was also withheld for
8 this one. 2008 out of Florida, felony, this one was
9 dismissed. Count 1 was battery, aggravated use of deadly
10 weapon. Second charge was resist officer without violence.
11 Third offense was false 9-1-1 calls.

12 2007 out of Florida, this one wasn't disclosed,
13 misdemeanor resist officer without violence. Adjudication was
14 withheld. Florida, 1999, felony. This one was dismissed.
15 This one wasn't disclosed. Fraud, illegal use of credit card.
16 Second charge was grand theft larceny. And then out of
17 New Jersey, 1993, misdemeanor, shoplift, take merchandise
18 without pay. This one was dismissed. This one also was not
19 disclosed.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Can -- I'm sorry. Board, any
21 questions for Ms. White?

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
23 Ms. White, why did you fail to disclose any of your criminal
24 history?

25 MS. WHITE: I -- I have no idea.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: You have no idea why you did
2 not disclose?

3 MS. WHITE: I mean, I don't see me not disclosing
4 it.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you write down your
6 criminal history on your application?

7 MS. WHITE: I don't recall.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So that's my question
9 to you. So you don't know if you did or did not put your
10 criminal history?

11 MS. WHITE: I don't -- I don't recall. I would not
12 have left any of -- any of that -- any of these things out. I
13 don't recall.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So according to our
15 information, you did not list any of your criminal history, so
16 that was --

17 MS. WHITE: So I put an application with no criminal
18 history on it, is what you're saying?

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That's what I have, yes.

20 MS. WHITE: That can't be right. Can I -- do you
21 have a copy or something?

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Did you fill out your paper
23 application or did you do it online?

24 MS. WHITE: I been through a lot of situations, so I
25 can't -- I don't recall.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay.

2 MS. WHITE: I can't even -- so...

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: No worries. So according to
4 this, you applied in February of this year.

5 MS. WHITE: Okay. How?

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Online.

7 MS. WHITE: Do I -- online?

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yeah.

9 MS. WHITE: Okay. Is there a -- like everybody
10 else, you can see it and --

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So I don't have a copy of your
12 actual application, but according to the investigations by our
13 investigators, you failed to list any -- or I'm sorry. You
14 have one, a 1994 conviction charge of an unlawful possession
15 of a weapon. And as you heard the investigator list, there's
16 a number of other additional convictions that you did not
17 list.

18 MS. WHITE: So I did list --

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You listed one. You did not
20 list the others.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And there was one as recent
22 as 2022.

23 MS. WHITE: Yeah. That's what I would have -- I
24 brought my paper, my file for 2022, so I don't --

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So the one that you did

1 list was a 1994 case.

2 MS. WHITE: Can you repeat the 19- --

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: There's a number of them.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. What we can do is have
5 you go up to the office. They have a copy of your application
6 and criminal history, and you can get that for your next try,
7 okay?

8 MS. WHITE: Okay. Can I have the address to the
9 office?

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. We'll --

11 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Sorry. Investigator Cuevas,
12 for the record. Ms. White, I don't remember if you remember.
13 You came to the office and I brought you back to my office.
14 We sat down. I printed out a copy of your online application,
15 which I gave to you. I took a copy of your ID because we gave
16 you a copy of your federal fingerprint report, and you signed
17 that paperwork. So I'm not sure where that paperwork is now.
18 The paperwork you're asking for is the one that I gave to you
19 when you came into the office.

20 MS. WHITE: Okay. So what I have to do to --

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we're -- we've got to
22 finish our process, but we were just asking if you -- if --
23 why you didn't fill out that paperwork correctly, I guess,
24 with the information, but you're saying you don't remember,
25 right?

1 MS. WHITE: Yeah. I don't -- I don't see why I
2 would -- if she gave me the paperwork, and then the 2002 -- I
3 brought my disposition for the 2022. I have it in my -- here
4 with me, so I don't understand why I wouldn't have --

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. Okay. All right.

6 MS. WHITE: So you said I need to go to the office
7 and get --

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, we need to finish the
9 process that we're going through right now, so we're going to
10 finish this.

11 Board, are there any other questions for Ms. White?

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I do have one last question.
13 Are you currently on probation?

14 MS. WHITE: No. And that's -- I have that document
15 with me. That's what I did bring. I thought that was what
16 stopped me.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

18 MS. WHITE: Can I ask a question?

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Let us finish the process, and
20 then we'll --

21 MS. WHITE: Okay.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any other
23 questions?

24 Okay. Hearing there are no other questions, I'll
25 entertain a motion.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
2 motioning to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose
3 all of her criminal history.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
5 have a second?

6 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. We
8 have a second. All in favor say aye.

9 (All present board members voted aye.)

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we're not going to be
11 able to issue your work card, but you can go up to the office,
12 and apparently they've already provided you with that
13 information. They can give you your application, your
14 criminal history, which has already, again, been provided.
15 When you fill out your application again in one year, then you
16 will have all of that information. Just make sure you put it
17 on your application, okay?

18 All right. Did you still have have a question?

19 MS. WHITE: Yeah. I wanted to -- I had -- when he
20 said from '94 to '95, it was one incident. It sound like
21 he -- with the unlawful possession of a firearm and
22 terroristic threat, that was -- happened and I got that
23 dismissed, but it's, like you said, three different years.
24 Can you -- can you --

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But ma'am, it's all on your

1 history, so when you get that arrest history, if you want to
2 go up and get it again, then they'll be able to give that to
3 you.

4 MS. WHITE: So do I -- I have to pay again or is it
5 another appeal?

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You would have to pay and go
7 through the entire process again in one year, okay?

8 MS. WHITE: Okay.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mr. Riggins, if you'd like to
10 come back up, I think we've got some information.

11 MR. RIGGINS: I was actually a security guard in
12 '97 and '98 in California. I had got my -- I was a guard at
13 the time.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Hang on one second.
15 Let's get the information.

16 Okay. This is Agenda Item No. 103, Mr. Charles
17 Riggins. We needed some clarification on some items, and I do
18 believe we have that now.

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yes. Director
20 Saladino, for the record. Based on the fingerprint report,
21 January 10th, 1995, out of Long Beach, possession of a
22 controlled substance warrant, that's one cycle. Then we go
23 into cycle 2, September 3rd of 1980 -- 1998, it goes into
24 remain/enter on posted property, and it gives a warrant
25 number. Cycle 2, it goes into municipal court of Pomona,

1 where it's enter/remain on posted property, convicted,
2 probation, three years probation, fine, work program,
3 suspended sentence.

4 Then we go into out of Culver, Culver City Police
5 Department, one count enter/remain on posted property. That
6 just ends there, so that's probably the warrant. 2001, one
7 count enter under the influence of controlled substance, one
8 count enter noncom dwelling. Those two were -- dispositions
9 were unavailable.

10 Then we go into cycle 5, which is the 2005 inflict
11 corporal injury to spouse or cohabitant, where that one
12 shows -- first comes up dismissed, then mayhem was the
13 additional charge they added where you had the two years
14 prison, which was disclosed on your application, and then a
15 driving ticket, and that was it.

16 So based on the fingerprint report, yes, there was a
17 work program that supposedly was put on you from the municipal
18 court of Pomona where they gave you three years probation, a
19 fine, and a work program, and that date was September 3rd
20 of '98.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So can I ask a question? Did
22 the -- did the -- '95, there was multiple items. Was that --
23 did they -- you said "cycle 1." For us non-law enforcement,
24 does that mean they kind of -- it was all one and it just kept
25 rolling?

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: That's how I -- that's
2 how I read them. When the -- the cycles, that just shows
3 where there was some type of fingerprinting or arrest, and
4 then the warrant sometimes will pop up again, when the
5 individual goes in for something else, they'll put that cycle
6 in there again for the warrant if they're --

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So it's stacked?

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: -- based on another --
9 right.

10 MR. RIGGINS: So the '98 might have been when -- the
11 time we were in Cascade and -- by Raging Water and we were
12 coming out the mountains from jumping in this little -- they
13 got this little -- it's like a 14 feet deep like pool thing in
14 the mountains, and we were coming out. And it was some cops
15 right there, and that's probably what the trespassing or
16 whatever that was. I just remember when -- as y'all talking,
17 because there was some other guy that came out and they didn't
18 get tickets, but when we came out, they gave us tickets and
19 told us never come back to they city. So that's probably what
20 that was, but I forgot like we were coming out of that -- out
21 of the mountains and it's called Cascade. It's near Raging
22 Water.

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Okay.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: But you don't recall doing
25 three years of probation?

1 MR. RIGGINS: No.

2 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So would they -- did
3 they just ticket you? Culver --

4 MR. RIGGINS: They ticketed --

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: -- just ticketed
6 you --

7 MR. RIGGINS: They ticketed us and told us to never
8 come back, yeah.

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Which that could have
10 been why it went into warrant status, because it was a ticket
11 that was given, and then like he said, he forgot and then it
12 went to a warrant status.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But there was another incident
14 in 1995 that wasn't disclosed?

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: This is the one you're
16 talking about, yeah. Oh, that one, I don't know where that
17 one ended up with that controlled substance warrant. The --
18 seems like when the '05 arrest hit, they had a couple charges
19 on there, conflict corporal injury --

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, the '95.

21 MR. RIGGINS: A lot of charges got dropped. I think
22 they just kept the mayhem. I been doing good since about 15
23 years. I actually been a security guard from 2016 until 2024
24 since I got here, because I couldn't work without the card,
25 but I got my guard card in Cali a couple years ago. It just

1 recently expired because I was on a traveling team. That's
2 how I ended up here.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Okay. I think I -- I
4 think I figured it out now. So 1995 with the controlled
5 substance warrant. In 2001, there was a -- there was an
6 arrest out of Los Angeles by the sheriff's office where they
7 had one count under the influence of controlled substance and
8 one count enter noncom dwelling, which is probably that Pomona
9 case --

10 MR. RIGGINS: One -- yeah. That was that, and then
11 probably LA was I was at a house -- one -- like I went to jail
12 one day because I was in -- it was like on 4th of July. It
13 was a fight outside and I went outside with an alcohol bottle,
14 and the cops rolled up and said I was drinking in public or
15 something. So I was in jail like one day, out the next day,
16 and that was that.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. It sounds like we've
18 got some -- some clean-up to do on the application,
19 ultimately, so -- okay.

20 Board, are there any -- I mean, I know it's kind of
21 messy and all over the place, but are there any questions for
22 Mr. Riggins? If there's no further questions, I'll entertain
23 a motion.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
25 to uphold the denial for failure to disclose all of the arrest

1 history. And as Board Member Nixon indicated, sounds like
2 there's a lot of clean-up that needs to get done, but we --
3 our office will now have a record of what needs to get
4 disclosed.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a motion. Do I have a
6 second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a motion. I have a
9 second. All in favor say aye.

10 Aye.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Aye.

12 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Aye.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Nay. Brown is nay.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay. So three to one,
15 motion passes.

16 Unfortunately, sir, it sounds like on your actual
17 arrest history, there's a little bit more there than was
18 actually put on our criminal history, as well, so
19 unfortunately, it's just a little confusing, but you have your
20 arrest history now or they can provide it to you and they can
21 help you actually fill out the application so that it's
22 thorough, and we look forward, again, to seeing you back in a
23 year.

24 MR. RIGGINS: I'll be back because this is my whole
25 life. I been doing this my whole life. All my family members

1 are cops.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I appreciate it, and we look
3 forward to seeing you back.

4 MR. RIGGINS: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yep. Take care.

6 Okay. I think you're -- have you been sworn in,
7 though?

8 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I haven't, no.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Have you been sworn in, ma'am?

10 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The rest of you in the
12 room, have you been sworn in?

13 Okay. So please stand and we'll have counsel swear
14 you in.

15 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Could you please raise your
16 right hand? Do you affirm your testimony today will be the
17 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

18 (Audience answers in the affirmative.)

19 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And are you Adriana Jenkins?

21 MS. JENKINS: Yes.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Please come.

23 MS. JENKINS: Good afternoon.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon. This is Agenda
25 Item No. 86, and again, we are a little bit out of -- out of

1 order here. It is past 1:30, so you'll be the last one that
2 we'll take, and then we'll have everybody else go in order.

3 Okay. Investigator Swarthout, could you please tell
4 us why we're here for Ms. Jenkins?

5 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: All right. The applicant
6 was denied due to felony conviction and for failure to
7 disclose arrest history. California, 1999, felony welfare
8 fraud, sentenced to five years probation, 150 hours of
9 community service, and pay restitution of \$9,661, and that is
10 her only arrest.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, any questions for
12 Ms. Jenkins?

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez,
14 for the record. Ms. Jenkins, why did you fail to disclose
15 your criminal history?

16 MS. JENKINS: Because I couldn't remember the date
17 and I couldn't remember what -- what -- when it happened. And
18 actually, I didn't go to jail or anything like he said. I did
19 pay, you know, restitution and I was on probation. I just
20 couldn't -- I just didn't know the days, the date.

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Thanks.

22 MS. JENKINS: And I -- and I had to go look for the
23 paperwork, but I had already put the application in.

24 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Understood. Thank you.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any other questions?

1 Okay. If there's no questions, I'll entertain a
2 motion.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
4 to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose criminal
5 history.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
7 second?

8 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
10 second. All in favor say aye.

11 (All present board members voted aye.)

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Unfortunately, because you
13 didn't but that information in, but, you know, the office will
14 help you. You're able to come back and reapply in a year.
15 You have your information now. In the future, if you don't
16 have the dates, just put down, you know, arrested and a
17 round-about date, and we would have been able to work with
18 that, because at least you're notifying us that something
19 happened.

20 MS. JENKINS: Okay.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So -- all right. Good
22 luck to you, ma'am. We hope to see you again in a year.
23 Thank you.

24 So we're going to go in order now. Just to clarify
25 up North, do you guys have anybody in the -- in your office?

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, ma'am, we do not.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have Agenda

3 Item No. 81, Alfred Washington. Mr. Washington? Okay. We'll
4 trail.

5 Agenda Item No. 82, Kimberly Johnson. Okay. We'll
6 trail.

7 Agenda Item No. 83, Tressa Kenyatta.

8 MS. KENYATTA: Yeah. I read the paperwork, so I
9 knew my number was 83.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: There you go.

11 MS. KENYATTA: Good afternoon.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon.

13 Okay. Investigator Swarthout, could you tell us why
14 we're here for Ms. Tressa?

15 MS. KENYATTA: Tressa.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Tressa.

17 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
18 due to a felony conviction, 2008 out of Texas, felony possess
19 marijuana, less than or equal to 50 pounds, greater than 5,
20 sentenced to three years probation and a \$3,000 fine, and then
21 she had the sentence modification to three years confinement
22 in 2013. 2005 out of Nevada, misdemeanor petty larceny, and
23 fingerprints and SCOPE both show the conviction, but does not
24 list what the applicant was sentenced to.

25 2004 out of Nevada, misdemeanor, possession of drug

1 paraphernalia, sentenced to one day of jail. 2004 out of
2 Nevada, misdemeanor petty larceny, sentenced to nine days
3 jail. 2003 out of Nevada, gross misdemeanor, conspiracy to
4 commit a crime, sentenced to six months CCDC, one year
5 probation. 1995, Arizona, misdemeanor shoplifting, second
6 count, making false report. Both of them, she was issued a
7 fine. The first one was a \$200 fine, the second charge was a
8 \$100 fine.

9 1992 out of Arizona, shoplifting, misdemeanor,
10 sentenced to three years probation to run concurrent with
11 case 8. 1992 out of Arizona, misdemeanor, the first two
12 charges were shoplifting, the third charge was obstruction of
13 police, sentenced to three years probation, which also ran
14 concurrent with Arrest No. 7. The applicant disclosed all of
15 her arrest history.

16 MS. KENYATTA: Oh, I did? I'm 57. I can't remember
17 a lot of that stuff, but yeah, here I am.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Here you are. Okay.

19 MS. KENYATTA: I can still show my face.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: There you go. Good for you.
21 Board, are there any questions for Ms. Kenyatta?

22 MS. KENYATTA: Kenyatta.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh, Kenyatta. Okay. Sorry.
24 Are there any questions?

25 Hearing there are no questions, I'll entertain a

1 motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
3 to overturn the denial and grant Ms. Kenyatta her work card
4 based on full disclosure of her criminal history.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
6 have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
9 have a second. All in favor say aye.

10 (All present board members voted aye.)

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations.

12 MS. KENYATTA: I don't know why I'm so emotional.

13 Thank you. Is that it?

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That is it, ma'am.

15 MS. KENYATTA: What else do I need to do? They will
16 tell me?

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: They will contact you today --
18 I'm sorry, tomorrow or Monday.

19 MS. KENYATTA: By phone or email or what?

20 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: By phone or email,
21 whichever we can get ahold of you with.

22 MS. KENYATTA: Okay. Phone is good. Thank you. So
23 I can leave?

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, ma'am. Good luck to you.

25 MS. KENYATTA: All right. Thank you. I'm going to

1 jump around outside. Good luck to you guys.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. The next one --
3 congratulations.

4 MS. KENYATTA: Thank you.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: The next one is Crystal Jones.

6 (Simultaneous speakers.)

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm sorry. Mr. Brown, for the
8 record. What was that? Is it postponed?

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. We get this
11 little break in audio every now and again.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So the -- we've done
13 agenda item 85, 86, and 87. We're now -- and 88. We're now
14 on Agenda Item No. 89, Chrysanthea Mallory. Good afternoon.

15 MS. MALLORY: Good afternoon.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Swarthout, could
17 you tell us why we're here for Ms. Mallory?

18 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
19 for the conviction of a felony, 1993 out of California,
20 felony, keep, place, sell, et cetera, controlled substance.
21 The fingerprints do not show the sentence to this one. 1998
22 out of California, felony, robbery, second degree, sentenced
23 to 36 months probation, 135 days jail. The applicant did
24 disclose both of the convictions on her application.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any

1 questions for Ms. Mallory?

2 Okay. Hearing there's no questions, I'll entertain
3 a motion.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
5 to overturn the denial and grant Ms. Mallory her work card
6 based on full disclosure of criminal history.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
8 have a second?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
11 have a second. All in favor say aye.

12 (All present board members voted aye.)

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. You'll get your
14 work card. Same, tomorrow --

15 MS. MALLORY: Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- or Monday, they'll contact
17 you.

18 MS. MALLORY: Thank you very much.

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You're very welcome.

20 MS. MALLORY: You guys have a blessed day.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You too. Congratulations.

22 MS. MALLORY: Thank you.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Agenda Item No. 90, Peter
24 Holloway. Mr. Holloway? Okay. Trail.

25 Agenda Item No. 91, Bill Coats. Mr. Coats? Okay.

1 We'll trail.

2 Agenda item 92, Derrick Rooks. Mr. Rooks? We'll
3 trail.

4 Agenda Item No. 93, Jamila --

5 (Off-the-record discussion.)

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. All right. So we will go
7 back to the trailed items to see if anybody is here. Was --
8 okay. So we have 81, 82, 90, 91, 92, items were trailed.
9 Is -- do we have Alfred Washington? Kimberly
10 Johnson? Peter Holloway? Bill Coats? Or Derrick Rooks?
11 Okay. None of the aforementioned are in the audience, so I
12 will entertain a motion.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
14 motioning to uphold the denials for agenda items 81, 82, 90,
15 91, and 92 based on no call, no show. They were advised to be
16 here at 1:30. It is now 1:55.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
18 have a second?

19 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a second. All in
21 favor say aye.

22 (All present board members voted aye.)

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.

24 We're now on agenda item 93. We're going to take a
25 quick break because those folks aren't supposed to be here

1 until 2:30, and so -- let's just take a ten minute. We'll
2 come back, we'll start with you guys that are in the room when
3 we come back.

4 Sir, I know you've been here for a while. What was
5 your name?

6 MR. MANN: My name is Michael Mann. I'm supposed to
7 be here at 2 o'clock.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Sir, what was your name
9 in the back?

10 MR. PAYNE: Rahsaan Payne.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Who?

12 MR. PAYNE: Rahsaan Payne.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And sir, what was your name?

14 MR. PERSONS: Rickey Persons.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So when we come back,
16 we'll do one, two, three, okay? All right. Quick ten
17 minutes. Thank you.

18 (Recess taken from 1:56 p.m. to 2:07 p.m.)

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. If you have not been
20 sworn in, please stand. We'll have counsel swear you in.

21 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Stephanie Itkin-Goodman, for the
22 record. For all those who are going to provide statements or
23 testimony in front of the board, can you please raise your
24 right hand? Do you affirm your testimony today will be the
25 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

1 (Audience answers in the affirmative.)

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: For the gentleman up North, what
3 is your name, sir?

4 MS. MALLORY: John Harrison.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Number 95, Madam Chair.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. It looks like we may go a
7 little out of order.

8 Okay. Agenda Item No. 102, we'll take you first.
9 Mr. Mann, are you here? Good afternoon.

10 MR. MANN: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator -- Investigator
12 Diaz, could you tell us why we're here for Mr. Mann?

13 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes. The applicant was denied
14 for a felony burglary conviction out of Lakewood, Colorado
15 in 2000. He was sentenced to 18 months in prison. The
16 applicant also has a 2006 felony conviction for possession of
17 a controlled substance, this was disclosed; a 2006 misdemeanor
18 for theft of a motor vehicle, this was disclosed; a 2011
19 felony for possession of a controlled substance, this arrest
20 was disclosed; and a 2018 felony for possession of a weapon by
21 a prior offender. This case was dismissed; it also was
22 disclosed.

23 The applicant has been labeled as a habitual
24 offender for traffic and failure to appear by the State of
25 Colorado. He was previously denied in June of 2022 for a

1 felony conviction and failure to disclose, and the board did
2 uphold the denial in September of 2022. He did disclose all
3 arrests on this application, and later submitted a written
4 letter of appeal. He was not made provisional and is here to
5 appeal today.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any questions
7 for Mr. Mann?

8 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
9 entertain a motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
11 grant the work card based on full disclosure of criminal
12 history.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
14 have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
17 have a second. All in favor say aye.

18 (All present board members voted aye.)

19 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations, sir.

20 MR. MANN: Thank you.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you for coming back. We
22 do appreciate you coming back and going through the process.
23 The office will contact you with next steps, okay?

24 MR. MANN: Thank you, guys.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Thank you. Good

1 luck to you, sir.

2 Agenda Item No. 96, Rahsaan Payne.

3 MR. PAYNE: Yes.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon, sir.

5 MR. PAYNE: Good afternoon. How are you doing?

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good. How are you?

7 MR. PAYNE: All right.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Diaz, could you
9 please tell us why we're here for Mr. Payne?

10 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Yes. The applicant was denied
11 for a felony burglary and unlawful possession of automobile
12 conviction out of (indiscernible) Illinois in 1997. He was
13 sentenced to five years in prison. The applicant also has
14 a 2001 felony armed robbery conviction, a 2006 felony sexual
15 assault conviction, a 2007 felony child abuse conviction, and
16 a 2009 felony receiving stolen property conviction.

17 The applicant was previously denied in February
18 of 2024, and the denial was upheld by the board in June
19 of 2024. The applicant did disclose all arrests and did
20 provide court documents to the PILB, as well as a written
21 letter of appeal at the time of applying. He was not made
22 provisional and is here to appeal today.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any questions
24 for Mr. Payne?

25 Okay. Seeing there are no questions, I'll entertain

1 a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
3 to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Payne his work card based
4 on full disclosure of his criminal history this round.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have a motion. Do
6 we have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
9 have a second. All in favor say aye.

10 (All present board members voted aye.)

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Congratulations, sir. Good luck
12 to you.

13 MR. PAYNE: Thank you very much. Thank you, guys.
14 That's awesome.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agenda Item No. 101, Rickey
16 Persons.

17 MR. PERSONS: Persons.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good afternoon, sir.

19 MR. PERSONS: Good afternoon.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Swarthout, could
21 you tell us why we're here for Mr. Persons?

22 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
23 due to conviction of a felony and the illegal use or
24 possession of a dangerous weapon, 2007, out of California,
25 felony, possession of a firearm with prior convictions, second

1 charge child cruelty, possess, injure, death, sentenced to one
2 year jail, five years probation. California, 2003, felony.
3 The charges weren't filed. It was an arrest only, but count 1
4 was battery domestic violence, count 2, escape from custody.
5 2001, California, possession of a controlled substance. This
6 case was dismissed with no charges filed.

7 The applicant did disclose all of his arrests on his
8 application. I did accidentally mark "no" on the disclosures
9 on the last two charges.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So everything was disclosed.
11 Okay.

12 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Yes.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any questions for
14 Mr. Persons?

15 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
16 entertain a motion.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
18 to overturn the denial and grant Mr. Persons his work card
19 based on his full disclosure of his criminal history this
20 round.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
22 have a second?

23 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
25 have a second. All in favor say aye.

1 (All present board members voted aye.)

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Congratulations, sir.

3 MR. PERSONS: Thank y'all.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yep. The office will contact
5 you in the next couple days, okay?

6 MR. PERSONS: All right. Thank you.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

8 We have one up North?

9 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Number 95.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 95? Okay.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes. Madam Chair, he's here in
12 the North.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Good afternoon.

14 MR. HARRISON: Good afternoon.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Cuevas, could you
16 tell us why we're here for Mr. Harrison?

17 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Yes. So Mr. Harrison was
18 denied previously for nondisclosure at the June 12, 2024 board
19 meeting. He has reapplied, has listed all arrests that would
20 include -- excuse me -- a 2017 misdemeanor for trespass
21 unoccupied structure, a 2014 felony robbery that was
22 adjudication withheld, he was a juvenile when that occurred, a
23 2014 felony, burglary of unoccupied structure unarmed, he was
24 also a juvenile when that arrest occurred.

25 Like I said, he did disclose all arrests when he

1 re-applied, and he is here to appeal again.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, is there any
3 questions for Mr. Harrison?

4 Okay. If there are no questions, I'll entertain a
5 motion.

6 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. I move we
7 grant the work card based on full disclosure of criminal
8 history.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
10 have a second?

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
13 have a second. All in favor say aye.

14 (All present board members voted aye.)

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Motion passes. Congratulations,
16 sir. Good luck to you. The office will contact you in the
17 next couple of days. Good luck to you.

18 MR. HARRISON: Thank you. Thank you so much. Thank
19 y'all.

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Have a good rest of your day.

21 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Good luck.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Ma'am, what's your name?

23 MS. COLE: Gabrielle Cole.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Cole?

25 MS. COLE: Yeah, Gabrielle.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Come on up. Okay. Hi.

2 Welcome. We're on Agenda Item No. 97, Gabrielle Cole.

3 Investigator Dumas, could you please tell us why
4 we're here for Ms. Cole?

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Just one second, Madam Chair.
6 We're having a little technical difficulty. 88 in there --
7 (indiscernible).

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So it's 88 in our --

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. We're good to go. Go
10 ahead.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you.

12 MS. DUMAS: Okay. Okay. Investigator Dumas, for
13 the record. Gabrielle Cole was denied due to a 2014 felony
14 assault with a deadly weapon. This was dismissed under
15 a 1203.4 dismissal, which was disclosed. Also in 2014 was
16 convicted of misdemeanor vandalism, sentenced to three years
17 probation, also disclosed. 2018, domestic violence,
18 misdemeanor, which was dismissed or denied, also disclosed.

19 The applicant disclosed all arrests, provided all
20 the court documents showing the 1203.4 dismissal from
21 California, was not made provisional, and is here to appeal
22 today.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

24 Board, are there any questions for Ms. Cole?

25 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll

1 entertain a motion.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
3 to overturn the denial and grant Ms. Cole her -- her work card
4 based on full disclosure.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
6 have a second?

7 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
9 have a second. All in favor say aye.

10 (All present board members voted aye.)

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.
12 Congratulations. They'll call you in the next couple of days.

13 MS. COLE: Thank you so much.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Thank you.

15 Were the other -- when was the other --

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I think we're in
17 the 2:30s now.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Number 93.

20 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: 93 is on her way here. She
21 showed up to the office.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So we have from 93 to 104
23 left. They were told to be here at 2:30, so we're just going
24 to kind of wait. We know that one is on their way, and we
25 just had a gentleman walk in, so we'll take them as they come

1 in.

2 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: There's only three or four
3 left.

4 MR. COOKS: Good morning, everybody.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Afternoon.

6 MR. COOKS: Afternoon. Sorry about that.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What's your name, sir?

8 MR. COOKS: Demetrius Cooks.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We're going to take you
10 right away since you're the only one here. We're going to
11 have you swear in first, through, so --

12 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- remain standing.

14 MR. COOKS: Okay.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Counsel?

16 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Can you please raise your right
17 hand?

18 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

19 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Now, do you affirm your
20 testimony today will be the truth, the whole truth, and
21 nothing but the truth?

22 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

23 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. You can have a seat
25 at the...

1 Okay. Investigator Swarthout, do you want to tell
2 us why we're here for Mr. Cooks?

3 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
4 for a conviction of a felony, 2008, out of California, felony
5 transport/sell narcotic controlled substance, sentenced to 180
6 days jail, 36 months probation. 2003 -- or 2023 out of
7 Nevada, misdemeanor domestic battery, first offense. This was
8 a DA denial. 2010 out of California, misdemeanor false ID to
9 specific police officers, sentenced to three days jail and two
10 years probation.

11 2008 out of California, felony, charge one was
12 burglary, charge two receiving known stolen property
13 \$400-plus, charge three, conspiracy to commit a crime. This
14 was a DA denial. 2005 out of California, felony, possess,
15 purchase (indiscernible) for sale. The applicant would have
16 been a juvenile at that time. This is his second time before
17 the board.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, are there any questions
19 for Mr. Cooks?

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
21 Investigator Swarthout, I just want to get clarification. For
22 the 2023 arrest, I know it's a DA denial, but was that
23 disclosed?

24 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: No.

25 MR. COOKS: Yes, it was.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I was asking the investigator.

2 Give me a second.

3 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: I have it marked down as

4 no. I'm bringing it up right now. Let me check.

5 He has the transportation controlled substance,

6 burglary, possession of coke, and possession of substance, and

7 then he has one -- a fifth arrest listed as false ID.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So was that the one in 2023 that

9 he listed?

10 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: He listed it out of

11 California with no -- no date.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So it was listed or it was

13 not, or disclosed?

14 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: It doesn't appear that that

15 one out of Nevada is disclosed.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Mr. Cooks, were you

17 arrested in Nevada on April -- somewhere around April 23rd,

18 2023 for a domestic battery?

19 MR. COOKS: That, I can't recall. April -- was that

20 April?

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: A couple years ago, domestic

22 battery, were you arrested?

23 MR. COOKS: I'm trying to see. Do they have the

24 address on file?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That, I don't have.

1 MR. COOKS: So yes, I was arrested, but I was
2 working for the guard card company at the time.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. But you were
4 arrested --

5 MR. COOKS: Yeah.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- for that incident?

7 MR. COOKS: Yeah.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Is there a reason why
9 you did not disclose that incident?

10 MR. COOKS: It's definitely disclosed.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So we have that you did
12 not disclose that incident.

13 MR. COOKS: Meaning -- it was a DA reject.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand that it was a DA
15 denial, but it was not disclosed that you were arrested on
16 your application. So on your application, did you -- like did
17 you place that you were arrested?

18 MR. COOKS: Well, by it being a DA reject, I didn't
19 know to put it on the application. That was the only reason,
20 but I wasn't trying to hide nothing or --

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Got it.

22 MR. COOKS: Because that's why I went up for the
23 board in the beginning, is because something that I didn't put
24 on my application, but I wasn't aware of everything that you
25 guys see and everything that I know. I wasn't aware of that.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And you filled out the
2 application on your own?

3 MR. COOKS: Yeah, at the office on my own.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. Okay. Did you
5 carefully read that one page that has the big old stop sign
6 and that says to list all charges, regardless of how long ago,
7 whether they occurred in another state, charges and/or
8 citations, even if you weren't placed in handcuffs, all
9 arrests --

10 MR. COOKS: Yeah. I couldn't -- it was so much at
11 the time. They even have to give me the paper to even put
12 down some of the stuff that I had already.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But this was the most recent
14 one, like two years ago, so --

15 MR. COOKS: Yeah. So with it being a DA reject, I'm
16 not -- and that's just the only thing. I'm not familiar with
17 what you guys were looking for far as fill this out --

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But it -- it -- so saying that
19 you weren't familiar, especially since you've been through the
20 process before and denied, it's clearly stated on the
21 application what we're looking for. So, you know, saying that
22 you don't know, again, since it's your second time going
23 through it now, maybe even your third --

24 MR. COOKS: This is my first time, far as me coming
25 up here to the board.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No, I understand coming to the
2 board, but you've been denied before, right?

3 MR. COOKS: Yeah, because it was -- it was like the
4 same thing.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right. So then --

6 MR. COOKS: So it's -- it's that I don't have all
7 the information to put for -- like I don't know everything --

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right.

9 MR. COOKS: -- each -- every -- not that I've been
10 arrested a lot, but I don't know all of them.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. But in your -- in the
12 actual summary, it says that you went to the office and you
13 got your arrest history, right?

14 MR. COOKS: Yeah, and it wasn't on there --

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

16 MR. COOKS: -- the one that you guys are talking
17 about right now.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And when did you go to
19 the office to get your arrest history?

20 MR. COOKS: That was after, way after April.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So in 2023?

22 MR. COOKS: I just went to the office -- yeah, like
23 last -- the end -- it was a little bit before the board, so it
24 was around April 2023 that I went to --

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 2023 or 2025?

1 MR. COOKS: To reapply, it was 2020- -- it was two
2 years ago, almost.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So two years ago, you
4 went and got your arrest history, right?

5 MR. COOKS: Correct.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so it had everything
7 listed, right? It had everything listed, right, except for
8 the 2023 incident?

9 MR. COOKS: Yes.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so when you were at
11 the office, they were trying to tell you, but you were upset,
12 right? Rightfully so, maybe, but, you know, you were upset --

13 MR. COOKS: No, I was just kind of going through the
14 cases.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

16 MR. COOKS: It wasn't nothing to do personally with
17 the people there at the office. It was just me personally
18 going back and trying to jog my memory, which as I seen each
19 case, it kind of jogged me back to each thing --

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

21 MR. COOKS: -- and can kind of --

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Did they -- did they try to --
23 because it had noted here that they tried to explain to you if
24 anything recent's come up, make sure you list that, right?

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Madam Chair, if I may. Okay.

1 So you went to the office twice, right?

2 MR. COOKS: Every -- every --

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: A couple years ago when you
4 first got denied --

5 MR. COOKS: When I first applied --

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct. And did you go --

7 MR. COOKS: And that day --

8 THE COURT REPORTER: Wait.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Hang on. And then did you go
10 again earlier this year?

11 MR. COOKS: So the day that I went in for the first
12 time, I didn't put that I had any arrests.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct. Correct. So now I'm
14 talking about this year. So sometime around March/April, you
15 went back to the office, and then did they provide you your
16 fingerprints?

17 MR. COOKS: They did, and they provided me with a
18 paper with every arrest that I've ever had.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Perfect. And were you asked
20 did you receive any kind of arrests, citations, or any kind of
21 new convictions since the last time? Did they ask you that?

22 MR. COOKS: No, ma'am.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So we have information
24 that that question was asked, and the reason why they probably
25 asked that is because you did obtain a --

1 MR. COOKS: Yeah, but --

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Hang on one second, please.

3 MR. COOKS: Yeah.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: You did obtain a new arrest
5 since the first denial, okay? So you got denied the first
6 time because you didn't write everything down, correct?
7 You're following that part?

8 MR. COOKS: Yeah, but it's like --

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And so then when you went back
10 to the office, they handed you the fingerprints and said, Are
11 you sure you didn't -- or, Do you have any new arrests? You
12 didn't want anything to hear about it and you left, and the
13 reason why you were asked that, because they had -- they saw
14 on paper that you had obtained a new arrest in 2023.

15 The reason why they asked you that or they tried to
16 bring it to your attention is because that's what needed to be
17 listed on your new application. So your second time around,
18 you didn't list that arrest because according to you, it was a
19 DA denial, but that wasn't what she was asking or trying to
20 bring to your attention.

21 MR. COOKS: And that's what I lacked the knowledge
22 of, ma'am. And that's --

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: You did not -- you did not
24 lack that knowledge because on the --

25 MR. COOKS: I didn't know I was --

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Hang on one second, please.

2 On the application, it clearly states, and I'm going
3 to show it to you again, on page 7, "Please list all arrests,
4 citations, orders to appear in court, and all felony, gross
5 misdemeanor, and/or misdemeanor charges."

6 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: And I'm going to show you the
8 exact same thing.

9 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

10 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So for you to sit here and
11 testify, say that you did not have the information, that's
12 incorrect. Everybody who applies for this guard card has this
13 sheet of paper --

14 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- whether it's online or on
16 paper.

17 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

18 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So that's why, unfortunately,
19 it was brought to your attention, but because it was in your
20 head it's a DA denial, I don't have to write it --

21 MR. COOKS: Yeah, but I -- and I know -- and I'm
22 just saying that I'm not trying to be honest [sic] or lie --

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I agree with you. I agree
24 with you, but your testimony -- you're a little incorrect in
25 what you're saying. You do have the information, but

1 you're -- you're not understanding that --

2 MR. COOKS: It is just a misunderstanding --

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- the information needed, you
4 needed to write it.

5 MR. COOKS: It's more so of a misunderstanding
6 than --

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Absolutely.

8 MR. COOKS: -- me being dishonest.

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Agree. Nobody is saying that
10 you're being dishonest --

11 MR. COOKS: Okay. Yeah. That's --

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- but what we are saying is
13 that you are incorrect. Somebody was trying to help you, but
14 because you -- in your head, you already had decided that it's
15 a DA denial, I don't need to do it, you walked out and left --

16 MR. COOKS: Yeah.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- but unfortunately, you
18 missed the information that was trying to be given to you.

19 MR. COOKS: But at that point, I would have thought
20 someone would say, Hey, Demetrius, you have a DA reject --

21 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: We can take you to the lake --

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So wait. Wait. Wait. Wait.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- but we can't force you
24 to -- to give you the water.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So what you're saying is on an

1 average basis, that office has 600 people in a quarter that
2 comes in and applies for a guard card, we're supposed to go to
3 every single person and go, Wait, wait, you have X in your
4 background, make sure you put it in? That's impossible. It's
5 the applicant's responsibility to understand what's in their
6 background, and if you don't understand it or don't understand
7 what's being asked of you, to ask for help, right?

8 MR. COOKS: Correct.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: You chose not to listen to the
10 help that was trying to be given to you. That's all I'm
11 saying.

12 So again, Investigator Swarthout, is there anything
13 that we missed in that?

14 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: No.

15 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board are there any questions?

16 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Madam Chair, this is Brown, for
17 the record, if I may.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, sir.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: The Arrest No. 4 on here was
20 disclosed. It's also a DEA denial, and he disclosed that. Is
21 there a chance, because we've had this issue come up already
22 today, that that "no" on Arrest No. 2, I think, could be a
23 typo? Because I'm understanding from my investigators up here
24 that there's sometimes something with the system that if you
25 don't have all of the PDF, it will revert back to a "no," even

1 though the investigator put a "yes." Is there any chance that
2 this was actually disclosed? Because there is another DA
3 denial that was disclosed.

4 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: Investigator Swarthout, for
5 the record. I do have his app here. I don't see that one
6 listed. Looking back at when he got his prints, the prints
7 were -- that he received was from his original application
8 in '23, so they would not have had that arrest listed because
9 it -- that arrest was after the prints were -- were taken last
10 time.

11 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Thank you for the
12 clarification, Investigator Swarthout.

13 MR. COOKS: With that being said, so the first time
14 when you come in, you pay for your fingerprints and your
15 arrest records. That's one incident. I came in again and
16 paid for -- that was after the one that you guys were talking
17 about, the DA reject, so when I went in again, that was after
18 that incident when I paid for a new fingerprint and record. I
19 went in and paid for a new one recently.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: But the fingerprint and record
21 that you're paying for is for us to verify that you have not
22 been in trouble or arrested, right? That's not for us to tell
23 you what you've done. Does that make sense?

24 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We -- we help you with it,

1 they're willing to help you with it, but that's not our job or
2 the -- the staff's job to tell you what you've done.

3 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am. I just feel like when I did
4 get the arrest record, it was more so like just -- it just
5 took me back into a time where it was like not the best time
6 of my life.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Understood.

8 MR. COOKS: So was I upset at no one? No, I wasn't.
9 More so at myself just to see the -- the stuff that was on my
10 record.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Understood.

12 MR. COOKS: Since I left California, I've been out
13 here in Vegas, I've pretty much changed. That little last
14 incident that I did get into, it was so -- it was so like --
15 shouldn't have even made it to the -- to this -- it shouldn't
16 have made it this far, for the situation being me on my way to
17 work with my full uniform on --

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Mm-hmm.

19 MR. COOKS: -- and my stepson calls the police, you
20 know, and that's why I was a DA reject, because I was at my
21 own home, and I didn't think that that would get on my record.
22 I didn't think that. Was I arrested? Yes, but I never
23 thought that they would actually type that in on my record --

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

25 MR. COOKS: -- and that's why I wasn't -- it's like

1 something that -- like say, for instance, you might get into
2 an accident or run over a cat and you're like, I should have
3 wrote that down, but you didn't. So it's like I didn't think
4 that that was that relevant because I really felt I didn't do
5 anything wrong.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. I just -- this is Board
7 Member Cortez, for the record. I just want to be very clear
8 or have -- make that you understood clearly. You did list a
9 DA denial that occurred --

10 MR. COOKS: Correct. That's why I --

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Hang on. Hang on.

12 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: That occurred in 2008, okay?
14 But you did not list the DA denial that occurred in 2023.

15 MR. COOKS: Yeah.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: What I want to make sure that
17 you understand, if you have to go through this process again
18 or if you choose to --

19 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- you need to list your
21 arrests --

22 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- even if it's a DA denial.
24 If it's a California dismissal code, you have to list
25 everything, which you now clearly understand.

1 MR. COOKS: I do, ma'am.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Right.

3 MR. COOKS: And I -- and to be honest, if I would
4 have known that that little -- I wouldn't have been
5 anticipating on coming to this meeting, even ironing my shirt,
6 my collar, at that, I wouldn't have been anticipating it at
7 all knowing that I was supposed to pretty much put -- and me
8 and my stepson, I mean, it's like --

9 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So you actually said it. You
10 were arrested, and that's the key word that I needed you to be
11 very clear with, because on the application, it says list
12 arrests.

13 MR. COOKS: So with them arresting me and taking me
14 to -- to the station, like I said, I didn't know that that was
15 going to be put on paper, because with the conversation I
16 had --

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Even if it wasn't put on
18 paper, you were arrested.

19 MR. COOKS: So I'm thinking like if I did -- how can
20 I say it? Some companies are different. It's not the first
21 company I've applied for, and I think you guys -- some of them
22 are more sensitive, and I haven't got in trouble lately, so
23 I'm really trying to put my past more so behind me more
24 than -- how can I say -- like just remembering all my arrests
25 every day. That's not -- it's like a negative input, so it's

1 not something that -- me being a positive person, it's not
2 something that I think about.

3 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah.

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I hear you absolutely wanting
5 to do the right things and making the proper steps to move
6 forward with your past.

7 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

8 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I completely 100 percent
9 believe that.

10 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am. So it's more so may be I,
11 you know, move to another state, I don't involve myself with
12 trouble. And it's like -- you know, it's more so like I'm not
13 a troubled person, so...

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And we understand that and
15 appreciate that.

16 MR. COOKS: It wasn't that I was trying to be
17 dishonest or --

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We understand that.

19 MR. COOKS: -- you know, such a thing like that.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We do understand that. And our
21 goal is, just so you -- everybody knows, our goal is to get
22 everybody to work --

23 MR. COOKS: Yes, ma'am.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- you know what I mean, but we
25 also have a process we're entrusting you, you know, with

1 safety and security, and so we have to make sure that, you
2 know, that process is detail-oriented and is completed, right?
3 So if -- you know, again, let us go through the process, and
4 then we'll -- we'll come back at the end here and have a
5 conversation.

6 So board, are there any other questions for
7 Mr. Cooks?

8 If there's no other questions, I'll entertain a
9 motion.

10 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown, for
11 the record. I motion that we uphold the denial for Mr. Cooks'
12 appeal and not grant him his work card based on the failure to
13 disclose.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we have a
15 second?

16 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
18 second. All in favor say aye.

19 (All present board members voted aye.)

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. So again, I appreciate
21 you. I appreciate what you're trying to do. Thank you for
22 ironing your shirt and coming in. At least now you
23 understand, you know, what we're -- what we're trying to make
24 sure that you understand. You will not be granted your work
25 card. You, unfortunately, will have to wait another year --

1 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: This is his second time.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Oh.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: It's five years now.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So unfortunately, for your
5 second time, you have to wait five years to apply again. So,
6 you know, if you don't have any other issues in that five
7 years, you have your history, you can work with the office,
8 and they will work with you.

9 MR. COOKS: Thank you.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Good luck to you, sir.

11 MR. COOKS: Thank you.

12 INVESTIGATOR BLACKMORE: Don't forget your
13 headphones.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We only have -- we have
15 two people in the audience.

16 Ma'am, what was your name?

17 MS. HARRIS: Syreeta Harris.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Harris.

19 And ma'am, are you -- what was your name?

20 MS. ANDERSON: Jamila Anderson.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Oh, okay. You're the one
22 that -- okay. Gotcha. Since you were -- you were agendized
23 earlier, we'll go ahead and call you up. Have you been sworn
24 in?

25 Have you guys been sworn in? No. Okay. So please

1 stand. We'll swear you in.

2 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Stephanie Itkin-Goodman, for the
3 record. For all those who are going to provide statements or
4 testify in front of the board, can you please raise your right
5 hand? Do you affirm your testimony today will be the truth,
6 the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

7 (Audience answers in the affirmative.)

8 MS. ITKIN-GOODMAN: Thank you.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Ms. Harris -- I'm sorry.
10 Ms. Anderson, will you please come up?

11 MS. ANDERSON: Yes, ma'am.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Swarthout, could
13 you tell us why we're here for Ms. Anderson?

14 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
15 for a conviction of illegal use of possession of a dangerous
16 weapon and failure to disclose, 2023 out of Nevada,
17 misdemeanor conviction for discharging gun in or on public
18 thoroughfare or in a public place, sentenced to forfeit of the
19 property and credit for time served. Out of Nevada, 2019,
20 misdemeanor unlawful discharge of a firearm. That was a DA
21 denial. 2009 out of Ohio, disorderly conduct, sentenced to 30
22 days jail and 23 days suspended with credit for seven days
23 served.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Board, any questions for
25 Ms. Anderson?

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.
2 Ms. Anderson, good afternoon. Is there a reason why you
3 failed to disclose your criminal history?

4 MS. ANDERSON: No. That paperwork was completed by
5 my school career adviser.

6 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So they --

7 MS. ANDERSON: And I advised her of everything at
8 the time.

9 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: What was the school?

10 MS. ANDERSON: North- -- Northwest Career College.

11 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So you had someone else
12 complete your application, and they submitted it --

13 MS. ANDERSON: She assisted me.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: -- on your behalf?

15 MS. ANDERSON: Yes.

16 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. And did you review that
17 application when --

18 MS. ANDERSON: She submitted everything. She asked
19 me questions and she was inputting the information I was
20 telling her. I explained the situation of the 2023. She's
21 like, You can explain everything to them, but they should go
22 ahead and approve anything, you can appeal --

23 (Reporter interjection.)

24 MS. ANDERSON: Okay. Yes. They should go ahead and
25 approve everything. If they have us come back as an appeal,

1 which we knew it was going to come back, because I had already
2 been discussing this the entire time that I was in school,
3 like, Hey, if I can't get my card, this, this, and that.
4 They're like, We're just going to fill it out, you're going to
5 go ahead and either get an approval or an appeal, and that was
6 that.

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: So unfortunately -- this is
8 where it's unfortunate, when you have someone else fill out
9 your application, because they submitted it on your behalf and
10 they submitted it without any kind of criminal history.

11 MS. ANDERSON: That was something that she said she
12 would help- -- that's basically what she was doing.

13 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand that --

14 MS. ANDERSON: Like had I known differently, I would
15 have filled it out myself, but I literally sat there and
16 advised her of what was going on.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Quick question. Do we have her
18 application?

19 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: They do do it online over
20 there, and we do have the email chain between the applicant
21 and Investigator Blackmore back when she was applying. So in
22 the online app, it was -- on the arrest history page, "no" is
23 marked on all three questions.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So, you know, to Ms. Cortez's
25 statement earlier, unfortunately, because it was filled out

1 and it didn't have anything in it, that's a conversation
2 you're going to have to go back and have with the college,
3 because, you know, really, they should not be submitting --
4 this is a conversation that I think the board will probably
5 have with them too. They should not be submitting
6 applications --

7 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: On anyone's behalf.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right. It's something that you
9 should fill out on your own, because it does have a lot of
10 stuff in there. It says, Stop, please disclose everything,
11 you know. It's something that each student should be reading
12 on their own.

13 MS. ANDERSON: And I was -- disclosed that
14 information when she asked it. Even the investigator who we
15 were emailing back and forth through, I advised her of all
16 this information, as well. She knows that information, as
17 well. She's the one that also said, Just, you know, go ahead
18 and -- I know what you said. When they send you the appeal,
19 just make sure you go to the office and you explain your
20 situation, but this has been talked about numerous times, the
21 entire time.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: When you say "the investigator,"
23 do you -- do you know who you were talking to?

24 MS. ANDERSON: I think it's in my phone.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: We have the email

1 correspondences back and forth between you and the
2 investigator, but unfortunately, at the end of the day, this
3 falls right back on the individual you had submit it on your
4 behalf, so it is a conversation that you need to have with
5 whomever it was -- because I absolutely believe that you were
6 telling her everything, but she failed to -- to complete the
7 application correctly, and that's what, unfortunately, happens
8 when you have someone else submit an application on your
9 behalf.

10 MS. ANDERSON: I didn't have her do it. She said
11 that she was going to do it because this is what they do.

12 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand.

13 MS. ANDERSON: That's what she said.

14 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: But ultimately, you, as the
15 applicant, agreed to have someone else submit it on your
16 behalf.

17 MS. ANDERSON: I'm sitting there speaking of what
18 exactly is going on, so I don't know --

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I understand that.

20 MS. ANDERSON: -- that she's not typing this. She's
21 sitting there literally inputting the information, supposedly.

22 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yeah, supposedly.

23 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And unfortunately, we weren't
24 there, so there's -- there's no -- you know, there's no way
25 for us to know what actually happened.

1 So board, are there any other questions for

2 Ms. Anderson?

3 Hearing there are no further questions, I'll
4 entertain a motion.

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
6 to uphold the denial based on failure to disclose any criminal
7 history.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. Do we
9 somewhere a second?

10 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Bezick seconds.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: We have a motion. We have a
12 second. All in favor say aye.

13 (All present board members voted aye.)

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Unfortunately, we're not going
15 to be able to move forward. It will be denied. You do have
16 the information now. You are able to come back in one year
17 and reapply and, you know, make sure that you note all of the
18 information that's actually on the application.

19 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I'm going to suggest that you
20 fill out your application. I understand that they were
21 helping you, but at the end of the day, I would like to see
22 you back in a year, you having filled it out. It puts us in a
23 really bad position --

24 MS. ANDERSON: And it puts me in a bad position --

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Absolutely.

1 MS. ANDERSON: -- as well. So what am I supposed to
2 do in regards to what someone else said they were doing, and
3 then I'm the one suffering --

4 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Say no, thank you, and you
5 fill out your --

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, I think you have an avenue
7 to go back to the school and have a conversation with the
8 school's leadership about what just happened, but that --
9 that's incumbent upon yourself.

10 MS. ANDERSON: Thank you.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Ma'am, what was your name,
12 again? I'm sorry.

13 MS. HARRIS: Syreeta Harris.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Please come forward.
15 Good afternoon.

16 MS. HARRIS: Good afternoon.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Investigator Swarthout, why are
18 we here for Ms. Harris?

19 INVESTIGATOR SWARTHOUT: The applicant was denied
20 due to a felony conviction. The applicant was previously
21 denied and upheld at the June 2022 board meeting. 2009 out of
22 Nevada, felony, forgery, uttering forged instruments,
23 sentenced to 48 months of prison. 2002 out of Nevada,
24 misdemeanor, trespass not amounting to burglary, pled guilty
25 to the lesser offense. 2002, February 1st out of Nevada,

1 destroy property of another, misdemeanor, pled to the lesser
2 offense. 2005 -- 2015 out of Nevada, gross misdemeanor,
3 discharge a weapon where a person might be in danger. She was
4 convicted of that one. 20- -- or 1998 out of Nevada,
5 misdemeanor domestic battery violence [sic], was found guilty
6 and issued citations.

7 The applicant, when she first applied, all these
8 arrests showed up. The applicant, when she reapplied, had
9 just got them all sealed and provided the sealing documents
10 with her application.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, are there any
12 questions for Ms. Harris?

13 Okay. Hearing there are no questions, I'll
14 entertain a motion.

15 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Board Member Cortez motioning
16 to overturn the denial and grant Ms. Harris her work card
17 based on the full disclosure of her criminal history.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So we have a motion. Do we have
19 a second?

20 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
22 have a second. All in favor say aye.

23 (All present board members voted aye.)

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So congratulations.

25 MS. HARRIS: It's been a journey. Thank you.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yes, ma'am. Congratulations.
2 The office will contact you in the next couple of days on next
3 steps, okay?

4 MS. HARRIS: Okay.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. Congratulations.

6 MS. HARRIS: Thank you guys so much.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Thank you. Take care.

8 Okay. So that's all that's here in the -- in the
9 southern location. They were told to be here at 2 or 2:30, so
10 we're going to wait another ten minutes, and then we'll close
11 out this portion of the agenda. So we'll be on break for ten
12 minutes.

13 (Recess taken from 2:50 p.m. to 3:02 p.m.)

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: All right. So we have left
15 agenda item 104, Amir Flowers. He is not in the room. He was
16 told to show up at 2 -- 2 or 2:30?

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: 2:30.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: 2:30. So with him not being
19 here, I will entertain a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez
21 motioning to uphold the denial for agenda item 104, Amir
22 Flowers, based on no call, no show. He was told to be here
23 at 2:30. It is now 3:03 p.m.

24 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. Do we
25 have a second?

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Brown will second.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. We have a motion. We
3 have a second. All in favor say aye.

4 (All present board members voted aye.)

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Motion passes.

6 The next agenda item is 105, board comment and
7 future agenda items.

8 Is there any board comment or future agenda items?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair. This is
10 Board Member Brown, for the record. Is there any way that we
11 can do some education with these career colleges? We probably
12 have, but apparently the word is not getting down to the
13 people sitting with these applicants, and they're basically
14 getting hosed because somebody else is doing their application
15 for them. And granted, they should probably be reviewing it,
16 but if we could do some education to help these people out,
17 I'd appreciate it.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Agreed. And I think, you know,
19 we've had some conversation, I think that is going to happen.
20 I completely agree with you, because we had at least two
21 examples right now that -- that something is going on, so --
22 absolutely.

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Board Member Brown,
24 Director Saladino, for the record. I remember years ago we
25 ran into the same issue with the folks that would issue out

1 the vouchers. We were having some issues with that, you know.
2 They go to the State welfare office and some of the other
3 Christian charities, that they were issuing out these
4 vouchers, but they were, you know, basically just telling them
5 just fill it out, don't put anything down, it will be fine,
6 and then obviously now they're basically just wasting the
7 voucher.

8 So I know the previous director had reached out to
9 them and kind of educated them on our process and stuff and,
10 you know, let them know like, Hey, we're not trying to just
11 take your money either, you know. If there's going to be, you
12 know, a criminal history on there, you know, just pay the 85.
13 We know there's going to be a process to this.

14 So I think moving forward, we're going to reach out
15 to the Northwest Career College and basically educate them on
16 our process and -- you know, and how we can be of service, you
17 know, moving forward so we don't have issues like this like we
18 had today.

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Thank you, sir.

20 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Any other board -- board
21 comments?

22 Okay. Do you want to --

23 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: This is Board Member Cortez.

24 I do have questions, or maybe I need clarification as to
25 what's going on. There were a couple applicants, maybe one or

1 two, talking about going back to the office to amend their
2 application to reflect the criminal history. Is there
3 something new that's going on with the process or -- my issue
4 is that once -- if they did not -- if they failed to disclose
5 their criminal history on their application, then it's a
6 failure to disclose, but then they're going back and they're
7 being allowed to amend. Is that fair to everybody else?

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, and I agree. I think --
9 you know, I understand the governor's order to get everybody
10 to work. I completely understand that, but I feel like we
11 also still need to follow our consistent process, because then
12 if we one-off one or the other and everybody doesn't get that
13 same treatment for whatever reason, it becomes a challenge to
14 our entire process, so is that -- is that -- has that changed?

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Director Saladino, for
16 the record. So the process hasn't changed. We have always
17 reached out to applicants when we have arrest history that are
18 nonconvictions. The way our statutes read, we've always had
19 to deny on a -- on a conviction. The whole failure to
20 disclose and then upholding it at the board has been the
21 board's -- the way the board has moved forward with it. If
22 you fail to disclose on your application, you know, you come
23 back in a year.

24 What we have always done since 2016 when I started
25 with the PILB, if you have an arrest history where it's

1 arrests, the investigator would contact the applicant and say,
2 Hey, I know -- I see these were denied, but you were arrested.
3 We need you to disclose them on the application. That's where
4 we have that arrest history sheet, that additional one that
5 we've had. So we have them fill it out, and the reason for
6 that was there's not a conviction, so there's nothing really
7 keeping them other than they didn't complete the application
8 correctly, right? So we would have them fill it out.

9 More times than not, they're -- they're honest with
10 us at that point, you know, because we already have -- we see
11 the information, they -- they -- Oh, yeah, I did -- I didn't
12 realize that if I just got arrested, this is, you know, what
13 happens, I thought I had to be convicted. No, we explain the
14 process, and then we move -- we move forward with, you know,
15 getting them their work card.

16 When they have -- when they don't disclose all
17 disqualifiers like felonies, weapon convictions, you know,
18 there's really nothing we can do with that, you know. They're
19 going to be denied anyway. Even if they disclosed it, they're
20 going to be denied, so that's been our process the whole time.

21 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Is --

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: We -- when we -- when
23 we have the denial letter go out, there's a part on the denial
24 letter where it says, "Please list your arrest history," and
25 that's where we have always -- okay, they were denied, and now

1 they're -- they're verifying what we already know, you know,
2 themselves. That was where the board has the authority to
3 decide if they're going to issue the work card, you know.

4 That's -- that's how I've always seen it done, and
5 it's only been the last couple years where failure to
6 disclose, you know, was kind of not so much automatic, because
7 there has been, you know, situations where the board has
8 issued, but it's been of the stance that the board has taken
9 where you fail to disclose, we're going to see you in a year,
10 and that's, you know, how we've moved forward.

11 Am I explaining that correctly? Am I missing
12 something?

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So I have a question because,
14 you know, we just went through the case with Cooks, who had a
15 failure to disclose an arrest that -- you know, and he said it
16 over and over again, it was just arrest, I didn't think it was
17 going to be -- and it was dismissed. Was he called in and had
18 the conversation with that?

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Mr. Cooks came into
20 the office. He asked for -- one, he complained right -- right
21 after he got denied about a refund. We told him we don't
22 give -- or we did -- we provided a service. We ran your
23 background, we did the thing, you know, you didn't appeal on
24 time.

25 He comes back into the office, he gets his

1 fingerprint report from his previous denial, so now we don't
2 know what happened moving forward. So he gets that and the
3 Gigi was the one who spoke to him, our office manager, and
4 said, This is the old one from when you first applied.
5 Anything new, any other arrests that came up, you need to tell
6 us, because we don't know it. So if you had an arrest, you
7 know, anytime you were in handcuffs, just like the back of the
8 application says, she says that to him. He doesn't want to
9 hear it and he walks -- storms out of the office all mad that
10 he's got to reapply and whatnot.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Well, I -- I get that. I'm not
12 really actually talking about the reapplication. It's more
13 the fact that, you know, he had an arrest, and if he was
14 brought in and given the opportunity to -- to disclose it --

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Okay. I -- I
16 understand what you're saying.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: See what I'm saying? Then --
18 and I'm just using him as an example as not being utilized
19 consistently. We -- we open ourselves up to problems.

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So with an individual
21 that's been previously denied by the board, we have no choice
22 but to deny them to bring them back before the board. We're
23 not able to issue them the work card once there's been a board
24 decision, if that makes sense.

25 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: It does, but I feel like, you

1 know, there's -- there -- there could be concerns with it not
2 being consistent, is my concern.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Well, I'll --

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And I don't know -- board, I
5 mean --

6 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Can I comment? Sorry.

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: My concern would be if
8 we denied -- if we denied everybody who failed to disclose an
9 arrest, we would have 200 agenda items, if not more.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

11 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: You know, so like
12 we're trying to -- that's -- I mean, I felt like that's why we
13 have investigators, you know. You have your -- you get your
14 background ran, you have these arrest histories, they're --
15 they're minor misdemeanors, they're not violent, we clear
16 them, we have them disclose it on their application or, you
17 know, fill out the arrest history form, upload it to the
18 records so we have knowledge of it, we move on.

19 If it's a felony weapons conviction, you know,
20 violence, stuff like that, that's when we deny and bring them
21 before the board to let the board make the determination.
22 That's how I've always seen it done from when I started
23 in 2016. By all means, if -- if the board wants us to do it a
24 different way, we definitely can. I just know from seeing the
25 amount of applications we do receive, we would have over 200

1 agenda items every quarter.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And so --

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Go ahead.

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown. I
6 guess my confusion on this comes is this, I think, is the
7 first time that we've, as a board, seen this where it's come
8 up. If you've been doing it in the past and we've never seen
9 it where it says they came in and were allowed to amend their
10 application, we -- we've never known that. We've never seen
11 that. This is the first time we've seen it, and that's why
12 it's causing us an issue.

13 If this is something that you do with those extra
14 100, you know, agenda items and we don't ever get to see
15 those, that's fine, but this time, we saw it. And I agree
16 with the chair that we put this on open -- you know, we -- on
17 the record, and there could be people sitting out there in the
18 audience that go, Hey, wait a minute, I didn't get that, and
19 they may not completely understand it, and then you've got
20 people coming in to complain.

21 I just -- if this is something that you've done
22 since you've been here and have never shown us before, you
23 haven't pulled back the curtain, okay, but this is the first
24 time for me the curtain was pulled back and we saw that this
25 is occurring.

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Board Member Brown,
2 this has been the first time in probably -- yeah, since I've
3 been there where folks have given us bad information, you
4 know, and just blatantly flat out lied to us when we're -- you
5 know, we're trying to help them, you know. Whether it be --
6 you know, you come in, you tell us you have a felony, okay.
7 Like that -- we understand stuff happens, you know. We've
8 seen it, you know, 104 agenda items already today, you know.

9 If you disclose it from jump street, this becomes a
10 process. You go before the board, time and distance -- we
11 always tell them exactly what the board tells them, you know,
12 the severity of the incident, the time and distance, the fact
13 that you're disclosing, we tell them that moving forward with
14 their -- with their application.

15 When we have the ones where the arrest history are
16 not automatic disqualifiers, you know, okay, yeah, they didn't
17 disclose, but we're going to give them the opportunity now,
18 disclose this, we can upload it and move on, and we get the
19 fingerprints, it matches exactly what they had said, so, you
20 know we're good. This time we've had folks that come in and
21 just -- you know, they gave us bad information, they tell us,
22 No, it wasn't a felony, you know, and, you know, here we are
23 now. We have no choice now but to deny them, even though we
24 gave them an opportunity to be straight with us.

25 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Okay. So this -- sorry. Go

1 ahead.

2 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Go ahead. Go ahead.

3 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: I guess my confusion now
4 moving forward, because you'll see on the notes that initially
5 was not disclosed, however, once we discussed it with them,
6 then they disclosed, and I have previously said, Well, I have
7 an issue that you didn't disclose it the first time. But now
8 you're telling me that no, after explanation with the
9 applicant, then it's like, Oh, no, they disclosed, yes, it
10 matches the fingerprints, so everything is now lined up.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: That's only for the arrests,
12 right, not for the convictions?

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Right. Yeah. If
14 there are convictions, especially weapons convictions, felony
15 convictions, there's nothing we can do. We still have to deny
16 them.

17 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Correct.

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: You know, the reason
19 we put that information in there is so the board knows that we
20 did speak to the individual, you know, we spoke with the
21 applicant, they knew they were denied. We asked them to list
22 out their arrest history, you know, because more times than
23 not, once they're denied, they're like, Oh, yeah, I do
24 remember that, you know, I had that felony, I -- you know, I
25 did shoot up that car.

1 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: See, and that's where I'm
2 like, well, did you remember because now I just reminded you
3 or did you remember because now you're getting caught?

4 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: And that's -- that's
5 the reason why they get denied and have to come before the
6 board.

7 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So just -- just so that I'm
8 clear, and I think it's on the record, the arrest portion of
9 it is something that you, this team, the board has been
10 executing on consistently for years now; this is just the
11 first time that we're actually hearing -- not actually hearing
12 about. This is the first time it's come up in a meeting?

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yes. Yes.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. And this is only done
15 with arrests that are not violent, non- -- I don't want to
16 say nonserious --

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Nondisqualifiers.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Nondisqualifiers, and so that --
19 that is something that's a practice that's been happening for
20 years now?

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Yes.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Board, did you have any
23 more questions or concerns with that?

24 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: This is Bezick. But I think
25 as long as it is uniform and consistent with each applicant,

1 we're fine.

2 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: But it kind of feels like it's
3 no -- it's going to -- it's not consistent. That's --

4 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: So can I make a comment?

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Yes.

6 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: As an investigator, right, I
7 have a background report, I'm doing my cue, I'm running
8 backgrounds for people who submitted applications so I can
9 issue them a provisional. Our goal is to get people to work.
10 Vinnie mentioned, if we denied every single person that did
11 not disclose a DUI, failure to appear, anything minor, but
12 just because they just failed to disclose, it would be more
13 than 200. And then you're going to think those people now
14 have to appeal. We'd be here for days going through -- and
15 not for nothing, but the board -- you know, you guys have your
16 precedent.

17 Now all these 200 people that didn't disclose,
18 they're coming back in a year. They don't get to work. Yes,
19 there's other opportunities. Las Vegas is huge and there's
20 plenty of opportunities for work, but for some people, that's
21 very crushing. So we, as investigators, are trying to help
22 these people to get to work.

23 If I see someone who has a DUI from ten years ago,
24 it was dismissed, they -- nothing happened with it, I'm going
25 to take that opportunity to reach out to that person, Hey, I

1 see you have this one arrest, you didn't disclose it when you
2 applied. It's not -- a nondeniable offense. Go ahead and
3 update this arrest history for me. I give them a deadline. I
4 need you to get this to me by this time so I can continue
5 processing your application and issue your provisional. Now,
6 if that deadline isn't met, at that point, I gave you that
7 opportunity, let's go ahead, we -- I can't do much more than
8 that, right?

9 Now, it sucks for those people who have out-of-state
10 arrests. When we run SCOPE, we don't have access to those
11 out-of-state arrests. So I can see where you guys see, you
12 know, it's kind of this or that, but we're doing the best we
13 can with the information that we have at that time.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So if it's an out-of-state
15 arrest, because you don't have SCOPE, then they -- they're not
16 called in and asked those questions, but that's solely because
17 it's an out-of-state?

18 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Correct, because --

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: No. No. That's not
20 correct. SCOPE will only show local, local for Clark County
21 and Nevada. The fingerprint report is what shows the
22 out-of-state arrests. But when we talk to those individuals
23 that have local arrest history, you know, we can see from the
24 application that they put where they're born, you know, or an
25 out-of-state address and they have Nevada arrests or whatever,

1 we always ask them that, Is there anything from out of state,
2 you know, that you have that's going to come up, you know.
3 We -- we really do try our best to get the -- get the correct
4 information on the application.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, I know, but I'm just
6 saying for the out-of-state folks, you know, once you run
7 their reports, what you're saying, you -- you don't see their
8 arrest history?

9 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: Not initially.

10 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Not initially. Okay.

11 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: For federal, the fingerprint
12 results is what will give us everything.

13 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gotcha.

14 INVESTIGATOR CUEVAS: But the initial to get them to
15 work on a provisional, we do a SCOPE background check. Like
16 Vinnie said, a SCOPE is going to give us local.

17 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Gotcha. Okay.

18 Are there any other --

19 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. So this is Board Member
20 Brown, again, for the record. So we -- the gentleman that's
21 caused this controversy today, we shouldn't have seen him,
22 right? He should have been one of those people that you
23 handled in the background, one of those 200 or 100, and we
24 shouldn't have seen him today and therefore, we wouldn't be in
25 this position or confusion that I'm having?

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: If -- if his felony
2 conviction want a felony and it was truly a misdemeanor, yes,
3 you would not have seen him today.

4 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

5 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. That makes sense. Okay.
6 Thank you.

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

8 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: I had one --

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: This is Board Member Brown
10 again. I'm sorry. If you're going to close out, I've got a
11 couple more things, but if you were going to -- go ahead.

12 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, I had one thing.

13 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I'm sorry.

14 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And then certainly -- the one
15 thing that I wanted to bring up was the actual incident that
16 we went through with the hacking and how that, you know, took
17 us down for such a long time, and we're still kind of going
18 through the repercussions of that. You know, I -- my thoughts
19 are that this is something that's probably going to happen
20 again, just because the nature of everybody on the internet.
21 I wanted to work on having some conversation about setting up
22 contingency plans for this type of event, should it happen
23 again.

24 You know, we were able -- one of the only states
25 that I've worked with that were only able to stay open during

1 COVID, right, because we were able to come into the office and
2 still work and do what we were supposed to do. I don't think
3 anybody anticipated what a hack would do to us and how it
4 would close down all these other systems that we wouldn't have
5 access to, and so I wanted to set up -- you know, talk about,
6 start discussion about doing research about contingency
7 planning if something like this does happen again, you know,
8 what are some protocols that we could fall back to as far as
9 like some background checks through -- you know,
10 nonfingerprinted, just Social Security numbers, that type of
11 stuff to keep people working.

12 Because as industry, we still have to supply
13 employees to accounts, and just as -- you know. And I know
14 that there's probably some other companies that went through
15 the same thing, but for, you know, my company alone, you know,
16 we are down probably, you know, 50 to 100 people that we need
17 to employ because of turnover and all the stuff that happens,
18 new accounts, and so that impacts us because we're not able to
19 now service customers, and these customers are oftentimes, you
20 know, large-name distribution companies or, you know,
21 hospitals, and so they need security.

22 So there's -- we're kind of stuck in a -- in a place
23 where we can't put people to work, but we have customers that
24 need security and safety services, and so that puts us in a
25 precarious place. And we never want to -- and I'm sure

1 there's probably some that just went ahead and put people to
2 work, you know. That's not the position we want to put
3 companies into having to make that choice of just putting them
4 to work and taking that risk on.

5 So I don't know -- I guess I'm asking Executive
6 Director, and maybe legal, is that a subcommittee that we put
7 together to try to come up with some protocols? I mean, how
8 do we go about doing that? Or just ask for it to be on the
9 agenda this next time to start the discussion?

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Madam Chair, I'd
11 already been thinking about, you know, backup plans and
12 contingencies for -- for it. Talking with our IT folks, we're
13 looking at -- well, one, I'm looking at different background
14 companies that would be able -- that wouldn't be on a State
15 server to begin with that would be able to get us the
16 information that we need.

17 Currently the way the statute reads, it only says
18 the fingerprint repository is what we're supposed to get our
19 background information from, so my thought was if I found a
20 couple companies that are able to give us information, I know
21 some states don't report to these companies, but if I found
22 one that reports to, say, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico,
23 California, the ones, you know, right here in our area and
24 present that to the board, that these companies give us a good
25 background, we're getting, even if it only goes back ten years

1 or so, enough information to be able to move forward, and then
2 maybe we could present that to legal to see if that's
3 something that we can get approved or if we have to go to
4 legislation to amend the NRS to state that, you know, maybe
5 just a fingerprint repository and/or, you know, a vetted or
6 licensed background company or something like that, so to put
7 something like that together.

8 I'm also looking at ways to have backup servers that
9 are separate and apart from the State servers, whether it be
10 in the office, it be a flash drive, whatever we can set up to
11 where we have our information, you know, backed up to where I
12 can just plug it into a computer now and access it, whether it
13 be password-protected, however -- however the GTO tells us we
14 can put that together, we're also looking at doing that so we
15 wouldn't lose our data. We'd still have, you know, OnBase, it
16 would just be on this so I might not have -- you know, I can't
17 put new information into it, but I have everything that's been
18 backed up, you know -- you know, every -- every month, every
19 quarter, every two weeks, however it's set up, you know, to
20 have that information.

21 So I think with that, you know, we'd still be able
22 to do a lot of our work. This one really crushed us because
23 Department of Public Safety was down, you know. They weren't
24 able to take fingerprints, you know. DMVs were closed, all
25 that kind of stuff to where you couldn't even turn your

1 computer on, and that's what hurt us.

2 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Right.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: But I do have, you
4 know, plans for that, and I can have that for -- for the
5 December meeting.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay.

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I'll have some company
8 names and stuff for December, and then we can present that to
9 legal and you can let us know like what we would need to do
10 moving forward for those background companies.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And I think for me, I'd like to
12 understand what the protocol would be once the systems do come
13 back up, like what would companies be required to do, because
14 if they only have a, you know, subcontracted background, then,
15 you know, that doesn't award them a work card, right? It
16 gives them kind of a temporary work card, but then the
17 companies would be responsible for making sure that the actual
18 application was in and that once that the State is back up and
19 running, the application is reviewed like it would be
20 normally, and that person is either now granted a work card
21 or, you know, there's further investigation or they have to
22 come before the board. So I want to make sure we set up
23 protocols for the after we're back up and the system is
24 running too, what the companies would be required to do.

25 Okay. Board Member Brown?

1 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yes. Thank you, Madam Chair.
2 Board Member Brown, for the record. I know that the -- the
3 cyber hack has caused you guys a lot of headache in the
4 office. I was just wondering if you have any update on the
5 move of our Carson City office and if you would be available
6 to come up and help facilitate that, Executive Director.

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So I do know we have a
8 meeting where Ricky is going to view one of them or two of
9 them on Tuesday. Is that what you -- did you get that email,
10 Ricky?

11 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: I didn't get an email back. I
12 reached out to her, but I don't have a response yet.

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Okay. So from the
14 Division of Administration from Public Works, tentatively
15 Tuesday morning. We've heard back from RR Boulevard. Now,
16 this one might be an issue because they say they're only
17 allowed to have three people working in that space, so
18 obviously if we had our -- we wouldn't be able to have our
19 board meetings in the conference room. I got to make sure
20 they understand that, you know, we're going to have applicants
21 coming into the -- into the building, so we'll have to talk
22 about that.

23 And then we have -- I can't remember the address for
24 the other one, Ricky. It was RR and then something street --

25 INVESTIGATOR DIAZ: Downtown.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: So just for clarification for
2 everybody, because I don't know that you all know, but the
3 Carson City office, the lease is -- is expired or expiring and
4 we -- you've decided that -- or the State is --

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: So I -- yeah. I
6 didn't decide to move. The building that we were in, when I
7 was in the renewal process, somebody from the administration
8 office dropped the ball when it came time to renew, and then
9 when the governor's office stepped in to look at it, they said
10 everybody is moving out, we only have a couple contracted
11 State agency people working in this building, it's going to be
12 a ghost town.

13 So then we talked about it, and we don't have a lot
14 of people in Carson City anyway, so we decided to would be a
15 better move to move to Reno. So I got four buildings -- four
16 tentative buildings last week -- or this week, and two of them
17 obviously aren't going to work. The two that we were going to
18 look at seemed like they'd work the best, and, you know, Ricky
19 helped me pick those because he knows the Reno area better,
20 and now we have it set up for Tuesday to view one of them.

21 We don't have that much to ask for up there other
22 than, you know, we need to have -- at least be more than three
23 people in the building, because we have people coming in
24 for -- turning in their applications, and we need to build
25 a -- a -- like split the lobby that we have there to where we

1 can have a window and a secure door, you know. So that's kind
2 of our ask, and, you know, they're trying to get us a location
3 now.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: And so --

5 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Are these State buildings,
6 Executive Director?

7 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I don't think they're
8 State buildings.

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay.

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: I can ask -- I can ask
11 Jaime from administration if they have any room in a State
12 building. So the whole -- the whole reason nobody wants us in
13 a State building is because we have applicants coming in to
14 apply. So if they understand what our -- how our process
15 works -- not that we have that much foot traffic in the
16 Northern part anyway, but I have a feeling moving to Reno,
17 we're going to get more foot traffic because most -- you know,
18 most of everybody that does anything up there is in Reno, so I
19 have a feeling it's going to -- you know, we're going to get
20 more foot traffic if we move to Reno.

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Okay. Next thing from me, my
22 appointment is ending at the end of October. I imagine that
23 they don't post openings until it's actually open. I'm not
24 sure about this administration. Previous administrations have
25 taken up to a year to do a reappointment, so I may not be at

1 any more meetings, depending on when that comes through, if
2 I'm the one selected.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Well, I'll reach out
4 to the powers that be to let them know that your appointment
5 is coming up and see about getting you reappointed or whatever
6 we got to do.

7 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I -- I have some information
8 that somebody else may be applying, somebody from the South
9 may be applying, and that's, you know, their prerogative, but
10 I know you probably agree with the former Executive Director,
11 they wanted to have a couple of us up here in the North, so
12 I -- you know, I don't know if that has any, you know,
13 persuasion for the governor to make those decisions or his
14 staff to make those decisions.

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: Okay.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Can I ask, Board Member Brown,
17 you already did your application and everything?

18 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, I have not. They -- it's
19 not open. It doesn't show an opening for the seat. I think
20 like any State agency, it has to expire and the seat has to be
21 open before they can announce it. I don't know.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: No --

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SALADINO: No, I'll find out.
24 I'll reach out to the folks tomorrow and find out what you
25 need to do.

1 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah, because I've always put
2 mine in before it expired, and so --

3 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Oh, okay.

4 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. So --

5 BOARD MEMBER CORTEZ: Same.

6 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: -- I would go -- oh. You're
7 not -- there's -- is there an application online at all for
8 you to fill out?

9 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: I believe so. I think that's
10 the way I did it the last time.

11 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Yeah. I think I would go and
12 fill that out. My only concern is with the shutdown, how far
13 back they are now with things.

14 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: Yeah. Okay. That's it for me.
15 Thank you.

16 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Anyone else?

17 BOARD MEMBER BEZICK: Nothing from me.

18 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Okay. This is the
19 section for public comment. There is no public down South.
20 Is there any public up North?

21 BOARD MEMBER BROWN: No, Madam Chair.

22 BOARD CHAIR NIXON: Okay. Then this meeting is
23 adjourned. Thank you very much.
